Detroit Fire Training Division RTC

The Detroit Fire Department Training Division is a hub of excellence in the Fire Service. In 2016, the Detroit Regional Training Center (RTC), located at 10200 Erwin, was dedicated to our fallen brother, Walter P. Harris.

Our comprehensive offerings include but not limited to New Recruit Dual Role Training, In-Service Training, Emergency Vehicle Operators Course, Emergency Medical Technician Training, Live Fire Training, Confined Space and much more. Within the RTC, you will find 11 classrooms, EMS Skills Lab, and an Outdoor Training Section. Our facility has cutting-edge technology and training equipment, such as:

- Flashover Chamber simulates the live fire explosions that can happen in a house fire.
- **Driver Simulator** provide practice for drivers of emergency response vehicles before they drive actual vehicle.
- Lifepak 15 Simulaid for training medical personnel on how to provide care for patients during different emergencies.
- Lucas Chest Compression System a machine that provides chest compressions during a cardiac arrest.
- MILO Simulator Indoor emergency response simulator, provides realistic practice for various emergency scenarios.
- Bleve "propane fire" Simulator with the increased use of propane, Detroit Firefighters have to be prepared for that type of fire.







The RTC technology and equipment ensures that our dedicated professionals receive the most advanced training possible. The Training Division is devoted to fostering proficiency among our team, ultimately enhancing the safety of Detroit and its residents.

REGIONAL TRAINING CENTER **LEADERSHIP**

Chief Alfie Green began his career with the Detroit Fire Department on March 11, 1991. After completing the basic training academy, Green was assigned to Engine 54. Chief Green accepted a position as a lieutenant in the Fire Investigation Division from 2001-2003. In 2007, he accepted a position as liqutenant the Training Division and was ultimately promoted to Chief of the Training Division in 2016.

Chief Green holds a Master's degree in Education in addition to being certified as Fire Instructor III, Fire Officer III, Emergency Medical Technician and Suicide Prevention Instructor. Green and the Regional Training Center are dedicated to increasing the knowledge, skills and abilities of the emergency responders that serve the citizens of the great City of Detroit.



Under the leadership of Chief Alfie Green and our expert staff, which consist of three Captains, 13 Lieutenants, Executive Secretary II and four-support personnel, the RTC is where our firefighters and EMS professionals receive the finest training.



EMERGENCY OR NOT? WHEN TO CALL 9-1-1

- Severe pain
- · Serious injury



VISITURGENT CARE IF:

- · Unable to reach your doctor
- Need immediate care, but it's safe to wait a few hours
- Received instructions from your doctor to go to urgent care



CALLYOUR DOCTOR FOR:

- Cold
- · Simple backache
- · Sore throat
- Earache
- Non-urgent medical needs with a safe wait of a day or two

When you or a loved one begin to show signs of ill health, make an appointment with your doctor immediately. An early visit with a doctor can avoid an emergency room visit before it happens!

As part of this process, we need to get at least 15 percent of city residents trained in CPR (Hands-only included), track publicly accessible AEDs, and create an AED registry. 
MISSION STATEMENT

In the event of a grease fire in a pot, place a lid on it and remove it from the heat source




DO NOT
