On September 20, 2025, Project Clean Slate conducted an expungement clinic at the Mathis Center. Hosted by Judge Greg Mathis, the clinic drew a crowd of over 500 attendees! The event featured several special guests, including Judge Mathis, City Council President Mary Sheffield, City Councilmember Angela Whitfield-Calloway, and recording artists Trick Trick and Icewear Vezzo. Project Clean Slate met with over 300 clients at the event and registered over 100 more.

# Focus Hope

# Project Clean Slate at Detroit at Work



# SHARE YOUR STORY

David Reese learned about Project Clean Slate while visiting the Secretary of State. Motivated by a desire to advance his career, he registered for the program in hopes of opening new doors.

“I’m working gainfully now; I got a promotion just recently,” Reese said. “I can do private security.”

Receiving an expungement not only helped boost Reese’s professional life, but it also brought him a sense of emotional relief. “(Clearing my record) took about 200 pounds off me,” Reese said. “I feel much lighter. I feel accomplished.”

According to Reese, the entire process - from registration to expungement - took eight months. He said that, compared to the 37 years he lived with a criminal record, the time felt remarkably fast.

Reese shares his story with others in hopes of encouraging them to take the same step toward a better future. “Everything was easy – it’s just a sit back and wait type thing,” Reese said. “It’s a tremendous program to get into if you want to get your life back.”
