

SUMMARY

This proposed ordinance amends Chapter 18 of the 1984 Detroit City Code, *Finance and Taxation*, Article V, *Purchases and Supplies*, Division 11, *Debarment*, by amendment Section 18-11-5, *Grounds for debarment*, to specifically include the submission of false or misleading documentation to secure certification as a Detroit-based, Detroit-headquartered or Detroit-resident business as a grounds for debarment.

AN ORDINANCE to amend Chapter 18 of the 1984 Detroit City Code, Finance and Taxation, Article V, Purchases and Supplies, Division 11, Debarment, by amendment Section 18-11-5, Grounds for debarment, to specifically include the submission of false or misleading documentation to secure certification as a Detroit-based, Detroit-headquartered or Detroit-resident business as a grounds for debarment.

IT IS HEREBY ORDAINED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF DETROIT THAT:

Section 1. Chapter 18 of the 1984 Detroit City Code, *Finance and Taxation*, Article V, *Purchases and Supplies*, Division 11, Debarment, be amended by amending Section 18-11-5 to read as follows:

CHAPTER 18. FINANCE AND TAXATION

ARTICLE V. PURCHASES AND SUPPLIES

Division 11. Debarment

Sec. 18-11-5. Grounds for debarment.

- (a) A contractor may be debarred, based upon a preponderance of the evidence, for:
- (1) Violation of the terms of a City contract or subcontract, or a contract or subcontract funded in whole or in part by City funds, such as failure to perform in accordance with the terms of one or more contracts; or the failure to perform, or unsatisfactory performance of one or more contracts;
- (2) Failing to comply with state, federal or local laws or regulations applicable to the performance of a contract;

- (3) Violation of a City ordinance, City procurement or other policies or administrative order that has the gravity or sufficiency to justify debarment. The Inspector General shall make a determination on whether the violation has reached a level justifying debarment based upon the totality of the circumstances creating the violation;
- (4) Knowingly, or negligently using a debarred contractor as a subcontractor;
- Evidence of (i) the contractor or the contractor's officers or owners, or (ii) any person or entity having a direct or indirect financial or beneficial interest in the contractor or its operations; engaging in a criminal offense or civil misconduct that evidences a lack of business integrity or business honesty, including but not limited to, embezzlement, theft, theft of services, forgery, bribery, fraud, tax evasion, falsification or destruction of records, making false statements, or receiving stolen property, or violations of laws relating to the obtaining or performance of public contracts;
- (6) Submission of false or misleading documentation, or making false or misleading statements;
- (7) Submission of false or misleading information provided to the City in an attempt to secure certification as a Detroit-based, Detroit-headquartered, or Detroit-resident business, as defined in Section 18-5-1 of this Code.
- (8) Failure to report unethical conduct by a public servant that has a duty to the City of Detroit; or
- (9) Any other conduct that evidences the inability of the contractor to act responsibly in its conduct on behalf of the City.

(b) The conduct giving rise to the debarment may be based upon actions taken in

connection with work undertaken for the City, or other public entities, or private entities.

(c) There is no statute of limitations on investigations, findings of violation of the

debarment policy or the initiation of debarment proceedings.

Section 2. All ordinances, or parts of ordinances, that conflict with this ordinance are

repealed.

Section 3. This ordinance is declared necessary for the preservation of the public peace,

health, safety, and welfare of the People of the City of Detroit.

Section 4. Where this ordinance is passed by a two thirds (2/3) majority of City Council

Members serving, it shall be given immediate effect and shall become effective upon publication

in accordance with Section 4-118(1) of the 2012 Detroit City Charter. Where this ordinance is

passed by less than two thirds (2/3) majority of City Council Members serving, it shall become

effective thirty (30) days after publication in accordance with Section 4-118(2) of the 2012 Detroit



Re: Appointment-Historic Designation Advisory Board Members

As the Council considers filling a seat on the Historic Designation Advisory Board, it seems appropriate to remind Council Members that there is one statutory requirements for a member of the board and also some needs relating to the City's status as "Certified Local Government."

It is a requirement of our ordinance that one member of the Historic Designation Advisory Board be a representative of a local preservation organization which may be, but is not limited to, an historic district association or resides in an historic district. The present board has several members who meet this criterion.

Beginning in 2001, the City has been qualified as a "Certified Local Government" (CLG) under the federal historic preservation program. This benefit gives the city direct input into the nomination of Detroit properties to the National Register of Historic Places. More importantly, the status makes the city eligible for grant funds from the federal government.

Under the CLG program, we are required to have on the Advisory Board persons with certain skills to review National Register programs. The skills required include, but are not limited to, an understanding of historic preservation and the important role of culturally and architectural significant structures in Detroit. I've attached the following resume of Naomi Beasley-Porter for your consideration.

Request for LPD to Amend Article V (Slavery Ordinance) to Include the Prison

Industrial Complex

In the United States mass incarceration is a serious issue that disproportionately affects black and brown communities. More prisons in this country are being run by for profit-corporations and the industry is making large amounts of profit incarcerating people in our communities. Mass incarceration is widely considered a new form of slavery. Incarcerating a considerable amount of people causes significant negative social and economic problems in our community. It is time that we understand the economics of incarceration and advocate for real reform.

I am an advocate for the overall reform of the criminal justice system in this country. Therefore, I believe that as local government we need to ensure that we are doing our part to address the issue. I am requesting that LPD draft an amendment to Article V of the Detroit City Code that includes a disclosure requiring prospective contractors with the City, to disclose or deny by an affidavit, whether it has ties or interest in the prison industry.
