

We have reviewed the above-captioned lawsuit, the facts and particulars of which are set forth in a confidential attorney-client privileged memorandum that is being separately hand delivered to each member of your Honorable Body. From this review, it is our considered opinion that a settlement in the amount of SIXTY-EIGHT THOUSAND FIVE HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$68,500.00) is in the best interests of the City of Detroit.

We, therefore, request authorization to settle this matter in the amount of SIXTY-EIGHT THOUSAND FIVE HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$68,500.00) and that your Honorable Body authorize and direct the Finance Director to issue a draft in that amount payable to Antonio Jones and his attorney, Kenneth D. Clayton, to be delivered upon receipt of properly executed releases and order of dismissal in Workers Compensation Claim #14969, approved by the Law Department.

Working Group for Community Control Over Police Surveillance (CCOPS) RE:

With an increase in local police surveillance technologies, it is important to create an open and transparent process for the approval or rejection of local surveillance technologies. My office is partnering with the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) who has developed a policy, the Community Control over Police Surveillance (CCOPS) ordinance, in order to address these issues.

Throughout history surveillance efforts have been used to intimidate and oppress certain communities and groups more than others. Including those that are defined by a common race, ethnicity, religion, national origin, income level, sexual orientation or political perspective; surveillance technology may threaten the privacy of all citizens. Thus, legally enforceable safeguards, including robust transparency, oversight and accountability measures, must be in place to protect civil rights and civil liberties before any surveillance technology is deployed and it is important to have an informed public debate as early as possible about decisions related to surveillance technology. Seattle, WA, Santa Clara, CA, Nashville, TN and other cities have already implemented various policy around surveillance technology.

Thus, this memo is to request that a working group be convened in order to have discussions around the CCOPS Ordinance. The departments being requested to send a representative are: Detroit Police, Board of Police Commissioners, Law, and Legislative Policy Division.
