A special inspection conducted on January 31, 2020 revealed that the building is secured and appears to be sound and repairable. The owner has paid all taxes and is current. The proposed use of the property is owner's use and occupancy. This is the 1st deferral request for this property.

Therefore, we respectfully recommended that the demolition order be <u>deferred</u> for a period of six months subject to the following conditions:

- A permit for rehabilitation work shall be applied for within <u>ten</u> (10) <u>business days</u> from the date of the City Council decision.
- 2. BSEED will schedule a Progress Inspection within <u>forty-five</u> (45) <u>calendar days</u> from the date of the rehabilitation permit to determine whether substantial progress has been made. Thereafter, the owner must submit to BSEED detailed inspection reports, with photos showing evidence of the work completed, every <u>forty-five</u> (45) <u>calendar days</u>, for the duration of the rehabilitation work, to demonstrate that substantial progress has been made during the approved time frame for rehabilitation.
- 3. The building shall have all imminently hazardous conditions immediately corrected, be maintained, and securely barricaded until rehabilitation is complete. Rehabilitation work is to be completed within six (6) months, at which time the owner will obtain one of the following from this department:
 - Certificate of Acceptance related to building permits
 - Certificate of Approval as a result of a Housing Inspection
 - Certificate of Compliance, required for all rental properties
- 4. The owner shall not occupy or allow occupancy of the structure without a certificate (as outlined above).
- 5. The yards shall be maintained clear of overgrown vegetation, weeds, junk and debris at all times.
- 6. Prior to seeking a permit extension, the owner must contact BSEED and request to extend the deferral period.

We recommend that utility disconnect actions cease to allow the progress of the rehabilitation.

At the end of the deferral period, the owner must contact this department to arrange an inspection to evidence that conditions of the deferral have been satisfied and that there has been substantial progress toward rehabilitation. If the building becomes open to trespass or if conditions of the deferral are not followed, the deferral may be rescinded by the City Council at any time and we may proceed with demolition without further notice. On January 29, 2020, Council president Pro Tem Sheffield directed the Legislative Policy Division (LPD) to draft: 1) a resolution calling on Governor Whitmer to prohibit mass water shut offs in ordfer to prevent a public health emergency, and 2) an ordinance prohibiting residential water shut offs against Detroit residents who are unable to pay the full water rates due to poverty.

The requested draft resolution and ordinance are attached.

RESOLUTION STRONGLY URGING GOVERNOR WHITMER TO BAN RESIDENTIAL WATER SHUT OFFS AGAINST LOW-INCOME RESIDENTS TO PREVENT A PUBLIC HEALTH EMERGENCY

By Council President Pro Tem Mary Sheffield

WHEREAS, The issue of mass water shut offs against low-income Detroit residents has been publicly debated, in the face of repeated calls for a water affordability program in the form of an income-based rate structure, for over 15 years; and

WHEREAS, The Detroit City Council's resolution passed in May 2015 called for such a water affordability program to end unjust, unhealthy and ill-advised violations of the human rights of people who are unable to pay the full rates for safe drinking water because of their economic condition, a demand City Council has been making since 2005. However, neither the Detroit Water and Sewerage Department (DWSD) nor the Great Lakes Water Authority (GLWA) has taken adequate, affirmative measures to end such residential shut offs that are the result of financial hardship; and

WHEREAS, Terminating water service to thousands of Detroit residents poses an imminent danger to public health, requiring immediate action to end the shut offs; and

WHEREAS, Potential and actual serious health effects of these water shut offs may include epidemics of water-borne diseases, infant malnutrition because of inability to prepare baby formula, inability of diabetics to prepare meals essential to maintaining health, chronic urinary tract infections, upper respiratory infections, eczema and other skin conditions and other diseases, including but not limited to flus and viruses that can best be avoided by frequent hand washing; and

WHEREAS, Over the past fifteen years while water officials in the Detroit area have continually failed to make meaningful progress toward creating a viable water affordability model for Detroit and other customers in the GLWA service area, the cities of Philadelphia and Baltimore have passed water affordability ordinances mandating income-based rate structures for low-income residential customers, and Chicago is now rapidly moving in that direction. The State of Michigan and the City of Detroit must take comparable steps to protect public health and the human rights of residential water customers whose income makes it impossible for them to consistently pay the full rates for water and sewerage services by prohibiting the mass shut offs of water services to such residents who fail to pay the full water rates because of their inability to pay; and

WHEREAS, A formal order by the Governor of the State of Michigan and the Director of the Department of Health and Human Services, pursuant to MCL 333.2251, prohibiting residential water shut offs against people who are unable to pay the full water rates because of poverty, is reasonably calculated to give impetus to longstanding demands by Detroit residents and the Detroit City Council, among others, that DWSD and GLWA develop policies for dealing with the problems of providing water to low-income people that are more protective of public health and human rights; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT The Detroit City Council strongly urges Michigan Governor Gretchen Whitmer to declare a public health emergency due to mass water shut offs against low income people in the City of Detroit, and pursuant to the authority granted to the State Department of Health and Human Services, that the Governor and the Director of said Department issue an order prohibiting water shut offs against low income people who are unable to pay water rates in full.

RE: Petition #1203 – Detroit Metro Convention & Visitors Bureau, request to install approximately 56 banners on Jefferson Ave. and Washington Blvd. in order to welcome The NCAA Fencing Championships to The City of Detroit.

The Department of Public Works, Traffic Engineering Division received the above referenced petition. This department has no objections to the placement of banners, provided that the banner installation is in compliance with the Banner Policy adopted by your Honorable Body on November 30, 2001, and subject to the following conditions:

- 1. Fifty six (56) banners are to be located along Jefferson Ave. from Washington Blvd. to Beaubien St., Washington Blvd. from Jefferson Ave. to W. Congress St., as shown on the attached map below.
- 2. The duration of banner installation shall be from March 9th, 2020 through March 23rd, 2020.
- 3. Banners shall not exceed thirty-two (32) inches in width by ninety-four (94) inches in height and should be acrylic or vinyl with standard slitting (also called "Happy Faces").
- 4. Banners shall be affixed to allow minimum of (15) feet clearance from walkway surface.
- 5. Banners shall not include flashing lights that may be distracting to motorists.
- 6. Banners shall not have displayed thereon any legend or symbol which is, or resembles, or which may be mistaken for a traffic control device, or which attempts to direct the movement of traffic.
- 7. Commercial advertising is strictly prohibited on all banners; including telephone numbers, mailing addresses, and web site addresses.
- 8. A sponsoring organization's logo and/or name may be included at the bottom of the banner in a space no more than ten (10) inches in height by thirty (30) inches in length, and letter size shall be limited to four (4) inch maximum and placed at the bottom of the banner.
- 9. Sponsoring organizations may not include messages pertaining to tobacco and related products, alcoholic beverages, firearms, adult entertainment or sexually explicit products, or political campaigns.
- 10. Sponsoring organizations may not include legends or symbols which may be construed to advertise, promote the sale of, or publicize any merchandise or commodity, with the exception of sponsorship as described in the banner policy (see section 9 of the policy).
- 11. Banner placement must be a minimum of 120 feet or every other pole apart, whichever is greater, including banners that may exist at the time of the installation and is limited to a two thousand (2000) feet radius area of the event location or within the stated organization's boundaries.



HONORABLE CITY COUNCIL (Cont.) **Petition #1203**

- 12. The design, method of installation and location of banners shall not endanger persons using the highway or unduly interfere with the free movement of traffic.
- 13. The petitioner *SHALL* secure an approval from **Public Lighting Department** to use their utility poles to hang the banners.
- 14. The petitioner *SHALL* secure Right of Way permits from City Engineering Division every time the banners are changed/replaced.
- 15. The wording on the banners will be (please see below).
- 16. Since Jefferson Ave. is a state trunk line from the above location, approval from the Michigan Department of Transportation is required.

If deemed appropriate by the City of Detroit, The City reserves the right to have the banners removed by the Petitioner at the Petitioner's cost prior to expiration date.



Re: Public Works - District 6 DFD Concerns

In response to Councilmember Castaneda-Lopez's September 23, 2019 memorandum, the Department of Public Works (DPW) provides the following responses:

1. I request that the alley behind Engine 33 (1041 Lawndale) between Olivet & Lafayette be vacated. On a recent visit to fire houses in my district it was brought to my attention that the petition to vacate the portion of the alley from the cross section to the street was submitted several times and a response was not received. I look forward to working with you on this matter.

The Department of Public Works cannot initiate an official investigation to vacate the alley until a petition is filed by the abutting property. DPW staff visited the site and explained to DFD staff from Engine 33 the procedure to initiate the petition. Once filed, we will move forward with assessing the request to vacate.

2. What is the process for notifying the Detroit Fire Department about street repairs and closures for work and events? How frequently does this happen?

Every Wednesday Traffic Engineering, a division of DPW, sends out the Road Closure Report to all impacted agencies and stakeholders in the city, including employees from the Detroit Fire Department (DFD). This report lists all the construction and/or street closures that will occur in the upcoming week, within the public right of way.

3. Both residents and Fire Engine 48 (2300 S. Fort) have met with MDOT and advocated for an additional light/crosswalk to be placed at the entrance of the fire house and near Kemeny Recreation Center to provide greater safety for pedestrians crossing and the Fire Department. Has DPW worked on this issue? What is DPW's position?

This location is under MDOT jurisdiction and any request for new pavement markings have to be approved by MDOT. DPW Traffic Engineering staff has

met with MDOT, who is currently pursuing options to ensure that the pedestrian safety concerns are fully considered.

4. Engine 1 (111 W. Montcalm): Both the alley and the parking lot for this fire house are in very bad condition. What is the timeline for repairing them?

DPW only performs work in the public right of way. City facilities, including city owned parking lots are maintained by the General Services Department (GSD). They are copied on this response. DPW will have our Street Maintenance Division schedule any needed alley repairs when our construction season commences this spring.

5. Please look into the feasibility of installing "NO PARKING" signs in front of Ladder 22, 6830 McGraw. Given the current layout it makes it difficult and dangerous to pull out of the fire house.

Our Traffic Engineering Division met with Ladder 22 to obtain a thorough understanding of their concerns. As a result, No Parking signs have been installed to facilitate the easy maneuvering of DFD vehicles.

6. Please conduct a study of the existing street markings in front of all the fire houses in District 6 to ensure they are meeting the individual needs of each fire house. Specifically, the markings in front of Engine 52 (5029 Manistique) are insufficient.

DFD has been informed that they can contact TED with specific requests for pavement markings in front of fire houses. TED will evaluate the request and will make appropriate changes, if warranted. Our normal schedule for restriping markings is from the month of June through September.

7. Engine 34 (6345 Livernois):

a. There are multiple trees in the alley that cover the electrical wires behind the fire house that contribute to multiple electrical outages. What is the status of trimming or removing these trees as the alley is directly behind city owned property?

Tree maintenance is handled by GSD. They are copied on this response.



b. I request the alley be vacated behind this fire house. Please let me know what is needed to move this process forward.

As stated in our response to Question 1, the process to vacate an alley is initiated with a petition being filed by the abutting property owners. As indicated above, a petition has not been filed, officially requesting this alley vacation.

Re: Sidewalk Repair for 10074 Cedarlawn between Griggs and Washburn

In response to the Council Member Leland's memorandum requesting an inspection of the sidewalks located at 10074 Cedarlawn between Griggs and Washburn, the Department of Public Works (DPW) provides the following response.

DPW inspected the sidewalks on Cedarlawn from Griggs to Washburn. The damaged sidewalk found at 10074 Cedarlawn did not meet the criteria for replacement under the Tree Guarantee Policy. There is sidewalk damage at approximately seven parcels that do qualify for replacement under the Tree Guarantee Policy. These locations will be added to the list for consideration in future projects. Much of the remaining damage to sidewalks on the block do not meet the criteria for replacement under the Tree Guarantee Policy.

According to the Detroit Parcel Viewer, more than 50% of the parcels on the block are owned by the DLBA. These sidewalks are not being properly maintained, and there is damage from age, plant overgrowth, and demolition activity. Also, there are several abandoned drive approaches which should be removed. Vehicles were found parking on the lawns at several locations, which violates City ordinances regarding off street parking.
