- 13 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Amen. Thank you so very much,
- 14 Chaplain Estes. Now we will have the introduction of the
- 15 Commissioners. District 1.
- 16 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Good afternoon, everyone, and
- 17 happy Opening Day. This is Commissioner Darryl Brown,
- 18 District 1.
- 19 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you, Commissioner Brown.
- 20 District 2.
- 21 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Hello, attorney Linda Bernard,
- 22 District 2. I'm sorry. I have to turn the TV down in a
- 23 minute. I'm watching the trial on HLN regarding Georgia
- 24 Floyd.
- 25 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you. District 3. I believe



- 1 Commissioner Burch has an excuse. Correct. Ms. White.
- 2 MRS. WHITE: Yes, ma'am.
- 3 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you for sharing. District 4.
- 4 I believe Commissioner Bell has requested an absence,
- 5 excuse. District 5. Has commissioner Burton come on yet
- 6 Mrs. White?
- 7 MRS. WHITE: I have not seen any indication just
- 8 yet, but I will make sure to notify you, Madam Chair.
- 9 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: I would truly appreciate that.
- 10 District 6.
- 11 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Good afternoon. Lisa Carter,
- 12 District 6.
- 13 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Good afternoon, former Chair, Lisa
- 14 Carter. District 7.
- 15 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Good afternoon, everyone. Police
- 16 Commissioner William M. Davis of the great District 7.
- 17 Love where you work officers.
- 18 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you, Commissioner Davis. At
- 19 Large, Commissioner Hernandez. Ms. White, have we seen
- 20 Commissioner Hernandez yet?
- 21 MRS. WHITE: No, ma'am I do not see him just yet, but
- 22 I will make sure to notify you when he arrives.
- 23 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you. I'd appreciate that.
- 24 Commissioner at-large Commissioner Jones.
- 25 COMMISSIONER JONES: Good afternoon everyone on the



- 1 Board of Police Commissioners, to the Detroit Police
- 2 Department and Chief Craig and his executive staff, and
- 3 also to our wonderful community listeners who are
- 4 participating in the discussion. I'm Police Commissioner,
- 5 Martin Jones. Thank you for attending.
- 6 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you, Commissioner Jones.
- 7 Commissioner At-Large Reverend Holley.
- 8 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Thank you very much, madam
- 9 Chairperson, Jim. Holley, present.
- 10 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you. And of course, I'm
- 11 Commissioner At-Large, chairing the meeting today, Annie
- 12 M. Holt. Next on the agenda is the approval of the
- agenda. Is there a motion to approve the agenda?
- 14 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: So moved.
- 15 COMMISSIONER JONES: Second.
- 16 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Are there questions? Those in
- 17 favor?
- 18 ALL: Aye.
- 19 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Those opposed? With no opposition,
- 20 the motion on the agenda pass. Approval of the Minutes.
- 21 COMMISSIONER BROWN: So move.
- 22 COMMISSIONER JONES: Support.
- 23 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Those in favor.
- 24 ALL: Aye.
- 25 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Those opposed? With no opposition,



- 1 obviously, the Minutes passed as well. At this time I
- 2 will introduce or share the Board's Chairperson's report.
- 3 On March the 30th, 2021, the City's Public Health
- 4 Director, Denise Fair declared a local state of emergency
- 5 due to recent public health concerns surrounding the
- 6 increase in COVID-19 cases. Therefore the Board's remote
- 7 meetings have been extended through May 31st, 2021, or
- 8 until earlier times when the order is rescinded. The
- 9 Board has received a copy of the emergency order for
- 10 control of the epidemic. It is also available on the
- 11 city's website. For more information, please visit the
- 12 city's website or review the email attached.
- The Board will continue holding its regular weekly
- 14 meetings via the zoom virtual platform through May 31st,
- 15 2021. We will also share regular updates as we received
- 16 information. City Council. The Board's budget hearings,
- 17 executive hearings. The City Council is now holding
- 18 executive hearings.
- 19 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Information is forthwith coming on
- 20 the Board's scheduled executive session for staff vacant
- 21 positions. The city's human rights department is
- 22 currently reviewing posting and screening application
- 23 resumes based on the Board's current vacancies. We will
- 24 receive further updates as this process continues.
- 25 Presentations today will be a vice presentation led by



- 1 Commander Jacqueline Pritchard when she will also make a
- 2 slideshow presentation on human trafficking. We will
- 3 entertain two motions under unfinished business. One will
- 4 have to do with the applicant appeal of Max Pedro, as
- 5 well as the Board's position the DPD revised manual
- 6 directive 203.7, search warrant, and execution.
- 7 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Mrs. White.
- 8 MRS. WHITE: Yes. Ma'am.
- 9 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Oh, I went ahead. I went ahead.
- 10 Oh, thank you for being so polite though. Would you now
- 11 introduce our Board staff, Chief of Police, and elected
- 12 officials for representatives?
- MRS: WHITE: Yes. Through the Chair, Honorable Board
- 14 and DPD executives, and attendees. Good afternoon again.
- 15 The department of innovation and technology is monitoring
- 16 and recording the Board's meeting today. Our court
- 17 reporter is Mr. Don Handyside and the following Board
- 18 staff members are in attendance today. Mr. Robert Brown,
- 19 Administrative Specialist, Ms. Jonya Underwood,
- 20 Administrative Assistant, Investigator Tiffany Stewart,
- 21 Director, Katrina Patillo, representing Police HR
- 22 Division, Interim Chief Investigator Lawrence Akbar,
- 23 Supervising Investigator Ainsley Cromwell, Supervising
- 24 Investigator LiSonya Sloan, Senior Investigator Rosalie
- 25 Madrigal, and Assistant Corporation Counsel, Ericka



- 1 Savage Whitley. And that concludes the Board staff
- 2 members introductions today, Madam Chair,
- 3 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you for the introduction.
- 4 So, in your introduction then we assume that there are no
- 5 elected officials or representatives.
- 6 MRS. WHITE: The notification that I have just
- 7 received through the Chair, Ms. Marie Overhaul of State
- 8 Representative Tyrone Carter's Office DPO, Vice-
- 9 President, Ronald Thomas is also present and Community
- 10 Advisory Council Scotty Bowman of District 4 is also
- 11 present. Thank you, Madam Chair.
- 12 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: And thank you, Ms. White. Now
- we're going to have Chief Greg's report. Do we know who
- is present to extend that report?
- 15 MRS. WHITE: Yes. Through the Chair, Assistant Chief
- 16 Todd Bettison is attending and representing Chief Craig
- 17 today.
- 18 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Oh, good. So Assistant Chief Todd
- 19 Bettison, you're on.
- 20 ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: Yes. Ma'am. Well, I'll
- 21 start out by introducing our folks that are on the line
- 22 as well. So we have Lieutenant Guntzviller with us.
- 23 Captain Tosqui of our Real-Time Crime, going down the
- 24 list, we have Lieutenant John Kennedy on the line,
- 25 Lieutenant Coles from recruiting Lieutenant Sharon



- 1 McClure, from CNL, Chief Neighborhood Liaison, and
- 2 Captain Ryan Carter from Narcotics Major Violators. And
- 3 we have various other sergeants on as far as recruiting
- 4 as well. And it looked like I think a lot of folks
- 5 probably had Opening Day for the holiday. You know, I
- 6 think that's where a lot of folks are. So, I wish I was
- 7 there. So I'll jump right into the report in regard to
- 8 our Coronavirus update, as you alluded to, as far as the
- 9 numbers going up. There's no difference within the police
- 10 department.
- 11 ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: We've seen an uptick in
- our numbers as well, nothing like last year. So we know
- 13 that master is of course, working and many of our members
- 14 have been vaccinated. But currently, we're sitting at 38
- 15 members that are quarantine or isolated, and we have 33
- 16 members who have recently tested COVID positive. And the
- 17 area where we see the most numbers out is the 7th
- 18 Precinct with 7 members out. So with these numbers at
- 19 this time it's not impacting our operations. So we're
- 20 okay in that regard. And we're going to closely continue
- 21 to monitor that in regards to crime, our homicides are up
- 22 compared to this time last year, sexual assault up 1%, in
- 23 regards to aggravated assault, which includes the
- 24 category of non-fatal shootings that is 33% or not being
- 25 a shooting category. When you extrapolate that out of



- 1 33%, it's up 52% compared to last year, robberies
- 2 continue to be the knobbly as far as being down, our
- 3 robberies are down 33%, and carjackings are up 31%.
- 4 ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: That's for our total part
- 5 one violent crime that is up 18%. And when we moved to
- 6 property part one crimes in all categories that is down,
- 7 burglary down 37%, larcenies 31%, and motor vehicle
- 8 deaths 14%. So total property crimes 28% down. And when
- 9 you average the two the property crimes with the violent
- 10 crime part one. Our total part one crime is down 14%. So
- in regards to enforcement efforts, what are we doing
- 12 constantly to eradicate violence in our city, our
- officers are still out there. They're still responding.
- 14 Going into our response time last week, the prior week,
- 15 we had an average response time of below 12 minutes for
- 16 priority one. So that was to be exact 11 minutes and 43
- 17 seconds. And for part two, looking at part two that was
- 18 34 minutes and 18 seconds for a part, two response.
- 19 ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: One of the many complaints
- 20 that we continuously get from our citizens is marijuana,
- 21 you know whether it's around marijuana houses, where
- 22 dispensaries are just the black market when it comes to
- 23 marijuana. So that has been a top priority for the Chief,
- 24 as well. And so our units, our Precincts continue to
- 25 based off of narcotic complaints give special attention



- 1 and go after the individual customers, et cetera, at
- 2 those locations that frequently affect the quality of
- 3 life for residents of that area. So last week we had 120
- 4 felony arrests in that area from our Precincts for
- 5 violation controlled substance act CCWs, et cetera, from
- 6 traffic stops and other stops. We had 40 felony arrest
- 7 for probation violation, stolen vehicles are and other
- 8 crimes in those areas, 76 misdemeanor arrest. We
- 9 recovered 101 handguns, one long gun was recovered.
- 10 ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: We conducted 1,354 traffic
- 11 stops. We impounded 147 vehicles. 8 vehicles were
- 12 recovered and the narcotic proceeds were 43 grams of
- 13 cocaine. 5,469 grams of marijuana, 8.4 grams of heroin.
- 14 We recovered 265 by pills which included Xanax and
- 15 Adderall and the total currency recovered by our
- 16 Precincts was \$18,215. We executed two search warrants at
- 17 illegal grow operations. One of the things that the Chief
- 18 has touted and talked about as well is our neighborhood
- 19 traffic NPOs. So just want to kind of give you an idea of
- 20 what they do. They definitely are complaint-based from
- 21 the community. We put them in strategic areas around the
- 22 city and as a result, the neighborhood police officer on
- 23 the Westside of NPO Shabazz. Last week, he issued 44
- 24 movers, 23 sets 44 movers. He did 23 traffic stops and
- 25 impounded one vehicle and he ended up having one



- 1 misdemeanor arrest for OWI, and on the Eastside.
- 2 ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: And I'm going to give out
- 3 the injured and critically officer in a second but
- 4 Officer Mark Robbins had been on that roster for a while.
- 5 So he returned maybe about a month ago. So he's back out
- 6 there on the Eastside and in the neighborhood that's
- 7 doing traffic enforcement. So last week his stats
- 8 included 120 movers. Traffic stops he did 33 and he's out
- 9 there doing accident reports as well. So welcome back,
- 10 Officer Robbins, and jumping into our critically injured
- 11 officers. This past week Police Officer Gregory Bentley
- 12 assigned to the 7th Precinct on March 27th, he was in the
- 13 area of Holcomb and Gratiot and he was chasing a suspect
- 14 for carrying a concealed weapon while running, he fell
- 15 and sustained an injury to his left ankle. And I can tell
- 16 you that he tore his Achilles heel. So he'll be out and,
- 17 you know, just many prayers for him as he recovers, and
- 18 Police Officer Jusuf Mannah was assigned to our task
- 19 force administration. He suffered from a motor vehicle
- 20 accident, so he's out due to that. And then if we go back
- 21 to May 31st, 2020 of last year, Sergeant Michael Bailey
- 22 was injured during one of the protests and he still out
- 23 and we are praying for his speedy recovery as well. So he
- 24 sustained the injury during the protest. And I'll take
- 25 any questions the Board may have at this time.



- 1 MRS. WHITE: Yes. Through the Chair. I do see where
- 2 Commissioner Willie Burton has joined the line and also
- 3 Captain Lena Liddell is also present. I just wanted to
- 4 note that for the record. Thank you, Honorable Board.
- 5 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: And thank you, Ms. White. I'm
- 6 sorry. AC Bettison. Commissioners, you have questions for
- 7 AC Bettison.

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- 9 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: I have a question.
- 10 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: And I have a question. Go
- 11 ahead Commissioner, gentlemen first.
- 12 COMMISSIONER JONES: Open day.
- 13 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: It's a new day.
- 14 COMMISSIONER BROWN: March is over with.
- 15 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Sir, I have a question. Has the
- 16 park patrol started yet?
- 17 ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: No, the park patrol hasn't
- 18 started. We intend to launch that within the next two
- 19 weeks. So I'm waiting on the list of requests for folks
- 20 that they want assigned out. We did put out a request for
- 21 individuals that wanted to volunteer for that detail. So
- 22 we definitely have that going very shortly within two
- 23 weeks.
- 24 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Because I know of in the 7th
- 25 District, I've been getting a lot of complaints about



- 1 people driving up on playgrounds and parks and stuff, and
- 2 even moving boulders and doing things and doing a lot of
- 3 racing around parks and playgrounds and donuts and
- 4 everything. Because I know it's a big concern over in the
- 5 7th District. It's a concern across the whole city.
- 6 ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: Yes, absolutely. And now
- 7 that you brought that up too we definitely beefed up our
- 8 traffic enforcement when it comes to the Jefferson beat
- 9 and some of the other beats. So I have our traffic units
- 10 out there and we're going to be offering overtime for
- 11 other officers as well to really target traffic. That is
- 12 a huge concern. So even when we look at our top hotspots
- 13 around the city, those dangerous intersections, we pull
- 14 that data. So we're going to have the Precinct actually
- 15 assigning traffic cars to do special enforcement along
- 16 those intersections. But in regards to the parks
- 17 detailed, there'll be starting soon. And with our
- 18 drifting and drag racing detail that we run on the
- 19 weekends, I have those stats too. Over the weekend we had
- 20 basically inclement weather, it rained most of the
- 21 weekend, so we didn't have a lot of activity, but with
- 22 the detail being out there, they conducted at 137 traffic
- 23 stops.
- 24 ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: They issue 171 tickets and
- 25 impounded 7 vehicles. They made 5 arrests that wasn't



- 1 included in the other stats that was from that detail.
- 2 And two of them, they ended up getting persons carrying
- 3 concealed weapons. And also we're utilizing our aviation
- 4 and our pilots. Just yesterday I got a complaint of a
- 5 large number of ATVs out and about. And they were over on
- 6 the Southwest side. So I immediately got on the horn
- 7 called aviation, got the pilot up and we would track it
- 8 with the helicopters. They all split up and went on
- 9 different routes. But we're still going to be utilizing
- 10 that as a method. And we will, when we can, when the
- 11 vehicle is not operable, because we're not involved, we
- 12 definitely won't chase, but we can box in and we do plan
- 13 to confiscate those, whether it be ATVs, mini bikes, dirt
- 14 bikes, et cetera. It's for the safety of the youth and
- it's for the safety of the community in general.
- 16 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Thank you.
- 17 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you AC Bettison.
- 18 Commissioner Bernard.
- 19 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you, Madam Chair.
- 20 Several things Commander Bettison. The first is that when
- 21 you report your stats on the increase in crime from last
- 22 year, I think that we should remind the public that last
- 23 year, at this time you could roll a bowling ball down the
- 24 Lodge Freeway. There was no traffic. No one was out of
- 25 their house. There was no crime. There was nothing. So



- 1 when we are comparing last year to this year, you have to
- 2 go through that period when, when Detroit was a ghost
- 3 town. Actually similar to the way it was today when I was
- 4 downtown. I was downtown to go to the city County
- 5 building and the flyover was coming over for the blue
- 6 angels for the game. And there was nobody downtown. I
- 7 thought it was terrible on Opening Day.
- 8 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I mean, there were no cars, no
- 9 people, because you guys put out all this stuff about you
- 10 were going to arrest anybody who had more than five
- 11 people in a place. I'm just making that part up, but you
- 12 know what I'm saying? There was nobody downtown. It was
- 13 just disgraceful. But anyway you should couch your
- 14 statistics with the reality of the situation for 2020,
- 15 where there was no traffic actually until probably just
- 16 this year. So, our stats are way off in terms of violent
- 17 crime and other crimes, because nobody was going anywhere
- 18 or doing anything. Secondly, last year, I mean last week,
- 19 pardon me, you indicated, I think it was LeValley that
- 20 was reporting stated that you had called on the State
- 21 police to come in and help patrol Detroit, starting in
- 22 May. Just for the record, I'm unalterably opposed to
- 23 that. I think our police officers, our neighborhood
- 24 police officers, our sheriffs can handle Detroit.
- 25 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: We don't need Michigan State



- 1 Police from all over the State who have no familiarity
- 2 with Detroit or Detroiters beat coming in, to me anyway,
- 3 and being an additional heavy hand with respect, even
- 4 with the donuts and everything else, we got this. No
- 5 other city in the State has requested the State police to
- 6 come in and do routine traffic work. I think we can
- 7 handle this. They handle the freeways, we can handle our
- 8 city streets. We don't need them to do that. And frankly,
- 9 I was embarrassed by the request. Thirdly, last week we
- 10 talked, you talked about it a little bit today, too,
- 11 about the forfeiture of vehicles. You and I both know
- 12 that when a vehicle is forfeited I don't know about the
- 13 ATV stuff about vehicles, because I actually, and this
- 14 was true.
- 15 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: This was a woman's grandson
- 16 who had her car. He had weed in the car. You arrested him
- in Puritan and Wyoming. They took the car, it was a
- 18 Charger. It cost her. The forfeiture fee was 10% of the
- 19 value of the car. I was in the prosecutor's office,
- 20 myself in the Frank Murphy Building with her. So she
- 21 could pay the 20 because the car was worth 27,000,
- according to the blue book value. She had to pay \$2,700
- 23 to get her car, her car that her grandson was driving out
- 24 of forfeiture. It is a serious problem. And I would have
- 25 request on my behalf anyway, that you guys address the



- 1 issue and probably report to the Board on the issue of
- 2 forfeiture. And it's done in conjunction with the
- 3 prosecutor's office. This is not fake. This actually
- 4 happened. I was there.
- 5 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you Commissioner Bernard. We
- 6 are looking for a response from AC Bettison.
- 7 ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: So I'll respond to it. I
- 8 think that you know, she definitely deserves a response
- 9 to the question. So I'll start at the beginning. The
- 10 first one was as far as the stats in comparing apples to
- 11 apples. So we report the stats as they are. And I think
- 12 that when you look back at 2020 the stats revealed across
- 13 the country, you had the pandemic. And then you also
- 14 starting in May across the country, the George Floyd
- 15 effect with the protest, the civil unrest, just what
- 16 happened. So 2020 was a year like no one had seen. And
- 17 when you look at the stats that I reported out and even
- 18 looking at last year what we did see is, even though
- 19 there wasn't as much traffic, we saw a lot more folks
- 20 when they took to the freeways, because it wasn't cars,
- 21 they went a lot faster.
- 22 ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: So that was an anomaly.
- 23 You know you got people just speeding, flying because
- it's even hard to judge your own speed when you don't
- 25 have another vehicle to judge it against. So, I



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- 1 definitely give that to you, but we saw some interesting
- 2 things, and those things are still trending out when it
- 3 comes to the crime because the pandemic is not over. One
- 4 of the things, I've never in my 25-year career, seeing
- 5 property crime down, the levels that it is in all
- 6 categories. And then in contrast, what occurred was the
- 7 violent crime went up. So when you look at what happened
- 8 in 2020, and I know we gave an end of year report, and we
- 9 compared it to other comparable cities as well. In all of
- 10 those cities, violent crime increased 200% in some, and I
- 11 don't have that in front of me, but I could definitely
- 12 bring it back as a refresh, but it went up.
- ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: So, you know, with
- 14 individuals being out of work, disconnected, I definitely
- 15 believe, and I'm not a clinician, but I believe in, and
- 16 I've heard it looked at the research and seen the TV
- 17 reports as well, is that mental illness, you know, folks
- 18 can get treatment. It definitely had an impact. And then
- 19 you have folks that don't have anywhere to go that are in
- 20 the house. So personal disputes, the prevalence of guns
- 21 folks had stimulus money. And when you look at the number
- 22 of people purchasing firearms that went through the roof,
- 23 and it was very difficult to buy bullets. So as a result
- 24 you've had just the uptick in individuals resorting to
- 25 gun violence. So even now that's continuing to play out



- 1 and with the gun arrest that we've made, it has been
- 2 higher than in previous years. So I would just put that
- 3 out to put it in perspective. And the next point was, and
- 4 we talked about that.
- 5 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: You are talking about the
- 6 impounding of cars, and the State police.
- 7 ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: So with the State police,
- 8 when it comes to speeding, one of the number one
- 9 complaints in our community is traffic. And also we've
- 10 seen an uptick in violence on the freeways. We just saw
- 11 various freeway shootings and road rage incidents. So
- 12 we're definitely asking the State police to increase
- their numbers on our State thoroughfares. I didn't attend
- last week's meeting, but I definitely I've heard the
- 15 Chief say as well, he's made the request for an increase
- in troopers to patrol the freeways. I think that we
- definitely need them I mean, DPD, we have top side, we do
- 18 work in conjunction with them. We'd asked for airport
- 19 aviation support from the State police. So even during
- 20 the protest, it was all DPD. We didn't request an extra
- 21 anything from outside entities except for like air
- 22 support or something like that.
- 23 ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: But when it came to
- 24 actual, our officers on the ground are handling that. We
- 25 did it on our own. We didn't even ask for support from



- 1 Wayne County Sheriff. So we love our community, our
- 2 citizens, and we believe that we are definitely
- 3 connected. And if this is going to be a response DPD
- 4 takes great pride and ownership and being able to handle
- 5 that response with our community. So we do Commissioner
- 6 Bernard, as you say, we do have this, we got this, but
- 7 when it comes to aviation support because we only got so
- 8 many helicopters. And then also when it comes to the
- 9 freeways, I don't think you want to see Detroit police
- 10 officers diverted from the neighborhoods onto the
- 11 freeway, when our citizens are traveling the freeways.
- 12 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I agree.
- 13 ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: And then with the
- 14 forfeiture piece you know, it has to be teeth when it
- 15 comes to some of the things that we see. The forfeiture
- 16 law is there and the Wayne County prosecutor, in this
- 17 case, they set the rules of the terms when it comes to
- 18 forfeiture and the fees. So you know, we can have a
- 19 single purpose of the meeting or I can circle back around
- 20 with you, but when it comes to that regard I'm not
- 21 prepared to be able to respond in totality to it. But I
- 22 do know that it's the Wayne County prosecutor. It sets it
- 23 for not only the City of Detroit with those rules and
- 24 regulations are set for all the municipalities in Wayne
- 25 County.



- 1 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you. AC Bettison.
- 2 Commissioners, are there other questions?
- 3 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Though the Chair.
- 4 COMMISSIONER JONES: Through the Chair.
- 5 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Wait a second. I believe
- 6 Commissioner Jones, I don't know. I was looking down but
- 7 I believe I heard Commissioner Burton.
- 8 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Yes.
- 9 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: And then you Commissioner Jones
- 10 and thank you.
- 11 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Thank you, Madam Chair. I have
- 12 a few concerns. I will be short and brief when it comes
- 13 to MSP policing in Detroit, it really sends the wrong
- 14 message to our native Detroiters, and I'm looking at how
- 15 they didn't value the life of a child on an ATV Willard
- 16 by the name of Damon Grimes. And so it really sent the
- 17 wrong messages right here in America's blackest poorest
- 18 city, Detroit, Michigan. So Detroiters that I have talked
- 19 to so far do not want to see MSP patrolling in the City
- 20 of Detroit or through their community. Enough said I do
- 21 have some concerns from concerned citizens over at River
- 22 Towers. They are the same concerns from 8 years ago. It
- 23 still is some of the same concerns to this day. They
- 24 would like to see the dope peddling from guys coming in,
- 25 peddling dope in their buildings.



- 1 COMMISSIONER BURTON: They want to see that stop.
- 2 They want to see more of a police presence over at River
- 3 Towers. There are many different concerns that this
- 4 building has. I am concerned about how many calls were
- 5 made from the building asking for seek and service versus
- 6 the calls that actually went to service. I'm really
- 7 concerned about that because my understanding, River
- 8 Tower senior building actually are calling, not dialing
- 9 911 pretty frequently. And I'm not sure what the police
- 10 response times are with that building, but it is a
- 11 concern of mine because this building happens to fall in
- 12 the 5th District. Also, I like to see how many calls were
- 13 made for request and service and how many calls were per
- 14 service. In addition to other concerns from my
- 15 constituents in the district ended with this. My
- 16 constituents want to know in the 5th District, how many
- 17 women have gone missing in Detroit this year and how many
- 18 haven't been found? I'm not sure AC Bettison, if you have
- 19 any of these answers to any of these with you now, but if
- 20 not, can I have these provided by the next meeting,
- 21 because it's a concern of mine when Detroit reach out.
- 22 ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: Commissioner Burton,
- 23 absolutely. So with River Towers, you know, I will
- 24 definitely pull the data when it comes to the cost of
- 25 service at that location. Where is River Towers, exactly?



- 1 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Good question. It's located at
- 2 7,800 Jefferson. Actually, I've received about four calls
- 3 yesterday just from River Towers alone. I think AC
- 4 Bettison, one of the things that will be very helpful for
- 5 River Towers, if we can have them to something is wrong
- 6 with my screen, sorry: thank you for being patient. I
- 7 think one of the things we have to do, I know COVID has
- 8 played a big part with residents over at 7,800 Jefferson
- 9 which is River Towers really working with the 7th
- 10 Precinct because they do fall in the 7th Precinct. I
- 11 think it would be very helpful if we can have perhaps
- 12 maybe someone from the seventh Precinct just to go by
- 13 there every now and then not to throw anyone under the
- 14 bus or anything. I think a lot of their concerns it's
- 15 really more so you know, are really old concerns and it's
- 16 really based off of management over at River Towers. But
- 17 there are a lot of guys are coming in peddling drugs on
- 18 the building, but they will actually go back over to
- 19 Sheridan 1 and 2, which just happens to be a Greenlight
- 20 location. So it seems like the guys are coming from
- 21 across the street back over on the other side is what I'm
- 22 hearing from residents and they actually have pictures
- 23 too, by the way.
- 24 ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: So Commissioner Burton,
- 25 thank you for that. We'll definitely jump on it. And just



- 1 so you know I've gotten complaints from other senior
- 2 complexes and we have addressed it along with our major
- 3 violators. We work with management, actually had
- 4 undercover operations conducted where they would you
- 5 know, allow our officers their video footage, even other
- 6 access. And we've actually made arrests of some of the
- 7 residents who live there. So it's a lot but I will tell
- 8 you that our officers are very skilled, so we'll get to
- 9 the bottom of it. I'll get you that information. And we
- 10 will meet with as early as next week the management team
- 11 from River Towers and get you a report back because this
- 12 was very important to us.
- 13 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I appreciate that.
- 14 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you AC Bettison.
- 15 Commissioner Jones, you still have questions, please.
- 16 COMMISSIONER JONES: Yes. I just got just one or two
- 17 things really quickly. First of all, thank you, AC
- 18 Bettison for sitting in for the Chief. With regards to
- 19 the subject of the State police coming into the City of
- 20 Detroit to help assist with the traffic problems that we
- 21 having. I'm definitely, and people that I've spoken to
- 22 are definitely favorable to have that extra access to law
- 23 enforcement. So we can try to restore some of the law
- 24 enforcement on the streets. Our streets have become
- 25 freeways. I witnessed so many things personally. I



- 1 witnessed the guy sitting on the window sill of the
- 2 driver's side of his car, going down, Livernois, Sunday
- 3 with two police officers that were watching a vehicle
- 4 that had been shot up. This guy's coming down Livernois
- 5 you can and see the lights and everything.
- 6 COMMISSIONER JONES: He drove right past them sitting
- 7 on the window sill. And then when he got past them,
- 8 because one of the officers, it is lights and sirens. He
- 9 took off, he hit the gas, he flew down Livernois, trying
- 10 to get away. And then of course they couldn't chase under
- 11 those circumstances, however, but I could definetely see
- 12 people running red lights, which makes it dangerous for
- our citizens driving down the street. I went over through
- 14 the neighborhood where that child was hit on an ATV. I
- 15 went through that neighborhood because I needed to see
- 16 what was going on in that neighborhood. It was something
- 17 that shouldn't have happened. He was driving the wrong
- 18 way down the one-way street and he was speeding at the
- 19 same time. Now you can say what you want to about hitting
- 20 that child, being supplied with an ATV at his age, where
- 21 he did not know the rules of the road, how to drive or,
- 22 or even probably recognize a stop sign, but yet, and
- 23 still we need that additional law enforcement on our
- 24 streets because I see so much, I witnessed so much while
- 25 I'm out here driving back and forth through the streets,



- 1 myself. People are calling in about the drag racing and
- 2 the donuts and everything. They want to see whether it's
- 3 the FBI, CIA, whoever state police, would like to see
- 4 updated or strengthen law enforcement on our streets.
- 5 COMMISSIONER JONES: So it can make it safer for
- 6 their children to be able to play outside. And I fear for
- 7 our children that to play outside and ride their bikes in
- 8 the streets because of the people that don't know how to
- 9 regard, I have any regard for where they're at and
- 10 they're driving these high-powered vehicles. So I want
- 11 the opportunity to have the State police come into our
- 12 city to see what they can do to help us to restore some
- order and take the lawlessness out of driving down the
- 14 city streets of the City of Detroit.
- 15 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Madam Chair, one question.
- 16 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay, Commissioner Burton. Quick
- 17 statement.
- 18 COMMISSIONER JONES: I'm sorry, I didn't get an
- 19 answer in reply to my statement.
- 20 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Excuse me, gentlemen. May I
- 21 please? Okay. Commissioner Burton, your last comment.
- 22 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Thank you. Quick statement to
- 23 my colleague Martin Jones. I'm very confident that
- 24 Detroit Police Department can police the streets in
- 25 Detroit. I stand with those brothers and sisters that are



- on patrol and I bet you, they can get the job done, not
- 2 MSP. Thank you very much. I'm confident that the guys
- 3 that we have right here on patrol can get the job done as
- 4 far as policing our streets. Not MSP.
- 5 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you, gentlemen. Any other
- 6 questions, Commissioners?
- 7 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Yes, through the Chair. I think
- 8 Commissioner Davis had a question. I just have a couple
- 9 of comments. That's all.
- 10 ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: I would just like to
- 11 respond to this Commissioner Brown.
- 12 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Well, where are we with this,
- 13 Commissioner Brown?
- 14 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Yes. Okay. So AC Bettison, I
- 15 just always thank the men and women of Detroit police to
- 16 come out and do their jobs. I am in agreement with my
- 17 colleague Martin Jones, and I'm kind of somewhere along
- 18 the side with my other colleagues, but we do need the
- 19 assistance, and the assistance of Michigan State Police
- 20 will show more of a presence on the freeways and the city
- 21 limits. I think it would help, and if we could focus on
- 22 other things because we have more problems up here. The
- 23 DPD is dealing with homelessness, poverty squatters, all
- 24 types of things and I know we're stretched. So, I would
- 25 welcome the help to an extent with other law enforcement



- 1 agencies because I mean, it's no different than somebody
- 2 saying the County should stay out in the County because
- 3 they don't, they don't police the streets of Detroit, but
- 4 they're coming out to help as well.
- 5 COMMISSIONER BROWN: So, it's just no different than
- 6 welcome in help from other law agencies. Because as my
- 7 colleague Martin Jones said, there is a lot of
- 8 lawlessness out here and I'm driving out here every day,
- 9 every day, I sit at a traffic light and I think that
- 10 there's something wrong with me for sitting at a red
- 11 light now. So, I agree with him with things that are
- 12 going on. The other question I have was along the lines
- 13 of the forfeitures, and these are just comments, just
- 14 with the forfeitures. That's an issue that's out there on
- 15 the card. Well, you can answer this one. What are we
- 16 doing about cars? I noticed a number of cars being taken
- 17 from drivers that are not registered vehicle, but they're
- 18 buying them and it not getting their plates and
- 19 everything and being taken. Are these cars being
- 20 forfeited or are they being allowed to get them back once
- 21 they have proper registration, and thirdly Commissioner
- 22 Holt, if my colleague Commissioner Burton will agree to
- 23 that. We have a presentation with vice-squad today and
- 24 they're going to talk about human trafficking. So those
- 25 numbers should probably be in there to answers these



- 1 questions that he posed to AC Bettison.
- 2 ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: Through the Chair. If I
- 3 could respond to a couple of those. I wanted to respond
- 4 about the Michigan State Police, as far as their
- 5 assistance. With them being the State police, they have
- 6 jurisdiction Statewide. So the Detroit Police Department
- 7 does not have the authority to tell them when where, and
- 8 how they patrol. It's one of those courtesies. We
- 9 definitely would love this assistance as far as an
- 10 additional presence on the freeways, but I don't want it
- 11 to be construed that DPD has the power. I mean, they are
- 12 the State police and they will go and patrol as they see
- 13 fit. That's just the reality of it. So does Wayne County
- 14 Sheriff, and we work very closely with them as well. You
- 15 know, I got a lot of respect for the new Sheriff Rafael
- 16 Washington.
- 17 ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: So, he has committed
- 18 sheriff resources to help in DPD with the drag racer
- 19 drifters. And he did assist with some sheriffs last year,
- 20 helping as well because he gets those same type of
- 21 complaints that said he's getting it from Rouge, E-course
- 22 in that this drifting thing and traffic issues, it's not
- 23 just the City of Detroit issue. It's an issue across the
- 24 whole country, but also in our suburban communities, it's
- 25 an issue too. So, I just wanted to add that piece of it



- 1 and Commissioner Brown, as far as the unregistered
- 2 vehicles, this is kind of my first time hearing about
- 3 your concerns. So, we could talk offline, you could bring
- 4 me up to speed because I definitely want to be able to
- 5 answer your question and get you the right information in
- 6 a thoughtful way to really understand the scope of what
- 7 it is that you're saying.
- 8 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Okay. Thank you.
- 9 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you, AC Bettison.
- 10 Commissioners are we finished with our questions to AC
- 11 Bettison?
- 12 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Yes, let's move to the agenda.
- 13 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you, AC Bettison, as always
- 14 you come prepared to have those more educated than we
- 15 were for, at least in my example, than before you first
- 16 came. So again, thank you. Oh, well I guess we are on to
- 17 the vice- enforcement presentation, Miss White?
- 18 Mrs. WHITE: Yes. Through the Chair. Sergeant Otha
- 19 Craighead and Sergeant Jordan Grace will be presenting
- 20 out today on behalf of Commander Jacquelyn Pritchard and
- 21 Lieutenant Guntzviller but all parties are at this time.
- 22 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you, Ms. White.
- MRS. WHITE: Sergeant Craighead. Okay. We are still
- 24 working to make sure that his microphone and video is
- 25 enabled and if staff co-hosts could assist with that,



- 1 please.
- 2 SGT. CRAIG: Okay. There we go. Can you hear me now?
- 3 MRS. WHITE: Yes, sir.
- 4 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes, sir.
- 5 SGT. CRAIG: Okay. Good afternoon, Commissioners.
- 6 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Good afternoon.
- 7 COMMISSIONER JONES: Good afternoon.
- 8 SGT. CRAIG: Glad to be here. I'm Sergeant Otha
- 9 Craighead from Detroit police vice. With me is my partner
- 10 Sergeant Jordan Grace. We appreciate the opportunity to
- 11 present the slide show to you. And we're ready to begin
- 12 when you're ready. So the first slide we're presenting a
- 13 presentation on human trafficking. We put a low about 9
- 14 slides together to help to explain human trafficking as
- 15 it pertains to Detroit police bikes. The first slide the
- 16 really.
- 17 SGT. CRAIG: The first slide really describes what
- 18 Vice does. We have 10 officers, 2 sergeants'. Our primary
- 19 duty is to enforce some morality laws, and liquor laws in
- 20 the City of Detroit. Currently, we have 3 officers
- 21 assigned to a federal task force. It's called SEMTEC -
- 22 Southeast Michigan Trafficking Exploitation Crimes.
- 23 Basically, it's a federal task force headed by the FBI
- that also deals with human trafficking on a federal
- 25 level. Go to the next slide. What is human trafficking



- 1 basically? It's modern-day slavery. It's not necessarily
- 2 sex-based, but sex trafficking is a large component of
- 3 it. Exportation of a person through force fraud. Coercion
- 4 is happening everywhere in the United States. We see some
- 5 in Detroit not as much as probably on the Westside or
- 6 down in the Western lower half of the United States.
- 7 SERGEANT CRAIGHEAD: The next slide. Thank you.
- 8 Whereas human trafficking commonly encountered, this is
- 9 pretty informative. It spells out, hotels and motels are
- 10 our biggest shelters, schools, hospitals mass transit,
- 11 meaning stranded travelers, people being forced from
- 12 transit on the street, sex workers is what we commonly
- 13 see. Whereas human trafficking commonly encountered human
- 14 trafficking victims can show up anywhere, anytime. It's
- 15 up to the first responding officers to distinguish the
- 16 signs of a person being trafficked and they take
- 17 appropriate action. The appropriate action would be to
- 18 make notifications to the Vice Enforcement where we
- 19 either respond to or follow up depending on when we get
- 20 the information. But the first part would be a police-run
- 21 or a patrol officer will encounter what they believe to
- 22 be trafficking. Not that some things just aren't
- 23 trafficking. Some things are a common streetwalker
- 24 prostitute that necessarily being trafficked, not
- 25 everything is human trafficking. But it's up to that in



- 1 that initial officer to let us know, and we will vet it
- 2 and respond accordingly. Okay. We go to the next slide,

3

- 4 SERGEANT CRAIGHEAD: Who were the victims of domestic
- 5 miner trafficking? So what we see is part of the job that
- 6 SEMTE, officers working with SEMTEC, part of their
- 7 responsibility is to really aggressively go after the
- 8 minors that are in the sex trafficking world. So who are
- 9 the victim of domestic minor sex trafficking use of any
- 10 ethnicity, ethnicity, race, religion, use of any social-
- 11 economic class, female, male, trans transgender use of
- 12 all ages vulnerable use our homeless runaways to throw
- 13 away if you will use of foster care systems. The higher,
- 14 the vulnerability, the higher, the chance of
- 15 victimization. So basically we see minors, unfortunately,
- 16 you know, in a sex world. We instantly moved to you know,
- 17 they are a victim, whatever they're doing, they're
- 18 classified and we consider them victims. So we remove
- 19 them from whatever situation that they find themselves
- 20 in.
- 21 SERGEANT CRAIGHEAD: Okay, I'll go to the next
- 22 slides. It's sex trafficking. The things that we see that
- 23 alert us to sex trafficking when we encounter subjects
- 24 with numerous hotel room keys that's a telltale sign,
- 25 false IDs when they lie about their age. There are a lot



- 1 of sites that advertise and advertise sex basically. And
- 2 we see the pictures, I'm sorry, an incoming call came in.
- 3 We see the pictures of them, and we move to eradicate
- 4 that. So anyway, signs of sex trafficking would be
- 5 numerous hotel keys, prepaid money cards, false IDs, a
- 6 large amount of money on their person a frequent runaway
- 7 disappearing for long periods of time. Tattooing
- 8 branding. A lot of kids have tattoos on them marks from
- 9 violence from maybe persons that are, are pressing them
- 10 or exploiting them. That's where we see the tattoo and
- 11 then the Brandon and consistencies in their story. When
- 12 we interview alum lack of knowledge of the area that
- 13 they're in cell phones, there's not an appearance name.
- 14 So these are some of the things that we see that alert us
- 15 law enforcement to sex trafficking.
- 16 SERGEANT CRAIGHEAD: So the next slide would be how
- 17 are Detroit Police Vice Enforcement works to combat human
- 18 trafficking? So Vice respond to tips received by police
- 19 officers, citizens' crime, the crime stoppers. When we
- 20 get these tips, we determine that the human trafficking
- 21 is present and follows up on an investigation through
- 22 interviews, through surveillance through talking to the
- 23 officers because the officers are the first responders,
- 24 but a lot of how we combat it is to try and develop the
- 25 case with our person that we believe is, is being



- 1 trafficked. Surveillance is a large part of it. Vice
- 2 conducts operations, such as online statistics,
- 3 solicitations, opportune to engage operations costing of
- 4 soliciting operations, which are all specific to sex
- 5 offense crimes. Oftentimes, the offenders of those
- offenses are actually being trafficked. Not so much, you
- 7 know, it's not a large number but when we find the
- 8 trafficking is through those types of Vice operations.
- 9 Vice works in conjunction with SEMTEC, I explained on
- 10 certain operations specific to human trafficking, Vice
- 11 currently has those officers that are working with our
- 12 federal partners.
- 13 SERGEANT CRAIGHEAD: So all Vice operations are
- 14 concluded with interviews with the victim, which is
- 15 sometimes considered the suspect in order to determine if
- 16 human trafficking is occurring. Next slide. Human
- 17 trafficking investigations in 2020, Vice Enforcement and
- 18 SEMTE. We closed 94 investigations in 2020, which were
- 19 related to human trafficking or exploitation of children,
- 20 and included seven recoveries of missing persons, 29
- 21 placements into shelter programs, and 34 arrests. I
- 22 believe that concludes my slide presentation. If you have
- 23 any questions, myself and Sergeant Grace would be glad to
- answer.
- 25 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you, Sergeant Craighead.



- 1 Commissioners, I know we have questions.
- 2 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Through the Chair.
- 3 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes, Commissioner Brown.
- 4 COMMISSIONER BROWN: I get first on this one. Thank
- 5 you for the presentation. I appreciate the information
- 6 and all the work you guys are doing.
- 7 SERGEANT CRAIGHEAD: You're welcome.
- 8 COMMISSIONER BROWN: I think it's great because this
- 9 has been a subject that's been close to me with
- 10 everything that's going on. Just a quick question. As
- 11 regards to the number of young women and men that we
- 12 get those lists of them missing on a daily or weekly
- 13 basis, something like that. Is that information
- 14 communicated to your unit as well?
- 15 SERGEANT CRAIGHEAD: No, not the missing per se. If
- 16 there's a belief that that person, that missing child is
- 17 being exploited, then yes, it will come to us as a
- 18 notification, but the general missing children recent
- 19 reports that you find that they're usually handled in a
- 20 Precinct Detective Bureau.
- 21 ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: Let me jump in real quick
- 22 with that too. So, Commissioner Brown, I definitely see
- 23 where you're going and see your point and have heard and
- been asked this question many, many, many, many times. So
- 25 the missing report is definitely made it the Precinct and



- 1 the detectives when you see them on TV because we all see
- 2 constantly reports of missing youth on channels 2, 4, and
- 3 7. And that's one of the things that DPD does very well.
- 4 The detectives and the PDU communicates with Sergeant
- 5 Nicole Kirkwood from media relations. And even though it
- 6 doesn't meet the standard of an Amber alert because
- 7 that's regulated by the State, what the Detroit Police
- 8 Department does is we want to make sure that we recovered
- 9 this child ASAP. So we'll blast it out. Now, you're
- 10 seeing it coming from Detroit because, in many other
- 11 cities and departments, they don't push it out as we do.
- 12 ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: We get a missing person,
- 13 we get a youth, whether it's elderly or whomever, and we
- 14 get it to the media and enlisted the community that helps
- 15 us. Here's the downside. When the person is recovered one
- 16 day, two days, sometimes eight hours, we notify the
- 17 media, but it's not pushed out the same way. It's a
- 18 little blurb, but what we do is we take that information
- 19 and we put it on our department website also, on our
- 20 Facebook page. If you would go to our Facebook page, you
- 21 will be able to click on there and you will be able to
- 22 see recover, missing. Nicole, from our Media Relations,
- 23 keeps that up. So when it goes out there missing is big,
- 24 but when their recovery is not as big of a story. And so
- 25 we're trying to figure out how exactly to reconcile that



- 1 piece and with the conversations that we have, I've said
- 2 that if we didn't recover all those missing girls, where
- 3 are all those missing young folks, it will be families
- 4 lined up all the way or Woodward from downtown to 8-mile
- 5 saying, where's my loved one. They come home. So the
- 6 majority of them have reunited back with their families
- 7 ASAP, but the community is left hanging. So that is the
- 8 question.
- 9 COMMISSIONER BROWN: And I know Sergeant Kirkwood and
- 10 her team does a marvelous job with handling the volume of
- 11 information that they have to keep up with. All right.
- 12 Thank you very much. Sergeant Craighead and AC Bettison.
- 13 Appreciate it.
- 14 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you. Other questions by
- 15 Commissioners, please?
- 16 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: I have a question.
- 17 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Davis.
- 18 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Yes, it's a good presentation.
- 19 As it relates to some of those facilities that you have
- 20 taken them to, I know I was in our all pack meeting
- 21 recently and there was some concern raised that some of
- 22 those facilities may have people just helping to traffic
- 23 young people. Do you know anything about that?
- 24 SERGEANT GRACE: There are certain facilities we've
- 25 received tips or complaints about that might be specific



- 1 to that obviously, we have to vet those and make sure we
- 2 actually did an interrogation at one of those facilities
- 3 just recently to make sure none of the additional
- 4 offenses were occurring there, but we're also constantly
- 5 reaching out to, or searching through the community for
- 6 new shelters that we can place victims at.
- 7 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Okay. Thank you, because that
- 8 was very troubling information.
- 9 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you. Any other questions
- 10 from the Commissioners?
- 11 COMMISSIONER JONES: I have a question.
- 12 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Jones.
- 13 COMMISSIONER JONES: Thank you for your presentation.
- 14 Now, one of the things I wanted to ask is if does your
- 15 because you're Detroit, but does your investigations
- 16 take you across 8-mile road because I've received
- 17 information in the past about some of these other
- 18 transient hotels along the 8-mile corridor and some of
- 19 the transient hotels that are on that Dequindre Corridor
- 20 out in like areas like Warren. Does your investigation
- 21 take you to places like that?
- 22 SERGEANT CRAIGHEAD: That's a great question, and the
- 23 answer is yes, absolutely. So with our federal partners
- 24 and Sergeant Grace and I just had a meeting with our
- 25 federal partners at the fed building, regarding that



- 1 very, very question. We do have some troubling motels
- 2 that we have identified in Warren East point along that
- 3 8-mile area that we are investigating. We found that
- 4 we're investigating their involvement but we have
- 5 identified a few.
- 6 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you, sir.
- 7 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Any other questions,
- 8 Commissioners?
- 9 COMMISSIONER CARTER: I have a question. I'm sorry, I
- 10 have a question.
- 11 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Sure:
- 12 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Sergeant Craighead, through
- 13 your investigations, do you find that most of the women
- 14 that you recover are from the area or are they brought in
- 15 from another different part of the country?
- 16 SERGEANT CRAIGHEAD: As far as the trafficking goes,
- it's not just one way to look at it. It's hard to say,
- 18 you know, where they're coming from, but the ones that we
- 19 have investigated as far as recently have been from the
- 20 Detroit area. Now, as far as prostitution goes, that can
- 21 be from all over, you know, but as far as the trafficking
- 22 cases that we've had recently, they were from the Detroit
- 23 metropolitan area.
- 24 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you.
- 25 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you.



- 1 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Any other questions Commissioners.
- 2 Okay. I'd like to bid in
- 3 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Question, Madam Chair. My hand
- 4 was up. I'm sorry.
- 5 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Burton.
- 6 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Thank you, Madam Chair.
- 7 Question for the gentlemen that presented out, a question
- 8 for you. How many women have gone missing in Detroit this
- 9 year and how many have been found? In addition, how long
- 10 does it take to investigate a missing person and what are
- 11 the targeted age groups?
- 12 LT. GUNTZVILLER: I can address that question through
- 13 the Chair Lieutenant Andrew Guntzviller. I'm the
- 14 Lieutenant over the Vice in the Major Violators Unit.
- 15 This is a point of clarification, we have a separate unit
- 16 that handles missing persons. We have a component of our
- 17 homicide unit that handles that, and then each individual
- 18 Precincts Detective Bureau handles missing persons in
- 19 their Precincts of occurrence. The only time that Vice
- 20 would really become involved in a situation like that is
- 21 if there was a human trafficking nexus with it. So
- 22 unfortunately we don't have the statistics that you're
- 23 requesting right now. That would have to come from a
- 24 different unit within the department, sir.
- 25 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you. Would it be possible



- 1 for Ms. White to receive that information from you?
- 2 ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: Absolutely. This is AC
- 3 Bettison chiming in. Absolutely, our missing person unit
- 4 keeps track of that, and our subject matter expert is
- 5 Sergeant Shannon Jones. And so there are so many
- 6 different buckets when it comes to missing persons. And I
- 7 remember reviewing a report not too long ago, and it had
- 8 a great synopsis, so I'll make sure I get that to Ms.
- 9 White, and she'll be able to get that to the Board. And
- 10 then I love these conversations because it gives the
- 11 department a chance to really explain the barriers
- 12 aspects of missing persons. But like I said, the majority
- 13 are they leave and they come back rather quickly. And
- 14 then you have the other category of our seniors who are
- 15 suffering from dementia. So we put those out as well on
- 16 TV as well, as far as missing persons. And those are
- 17 vulnerable individuals and we have an all-out extensive
- 18 search depending on the level of danger the person is,
- 19 whether or not they can care for themselves also.
- 20 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you AC Bettison.
- 21 COMMISSIONER BURTON: To the Chair, real quick, AC
- 22 Bettison, you guys can email me personally at my
- 23 department's email address. So whatever you send to the
- 24 Board Secretary, you can also send that to me, the part
- of what I requested personally to my email.



- 1 ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: I will do that, sir. Thank
- 2 you.
- 3 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you.
- 4 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: I have one more question, Madam
- 5 Chair.
- 6 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Davis:
- 7 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Also, I was wondering, I also
- 8 recently was hearing that there was a rise in seniors
- 9 being on trafficking. Do you know anything about that?
- 10 SERGEANT CRAIGHEAD: No, that information hasn't been
- 11 brought to the Vice Unit as yet. It's something that
- we'll keep an eye on, but right now we haven't heard any
- 13 seniors being trafficked.
- 14 SERGEANT GRACE: Also through our investigations and
- operations that we've conducted we haven't been
- 16 encountering any rise in seniors being trafficked.
- 17 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Okay.
- 18 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: So, you don't have to worry,
- 19 Davis.
- 20 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: If there are no more questions
- 21 from the Commissioners, Sergeant Craighead.
- 22 SERGEANT CRAIGHEAD: Yes, ma'am.
- 23 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: You use sex trafficking and then
- 24 you use human trafficking. Are you using the two terms
- interchangeably or are the behaviors different?



- 1 SERGEANT CRAIGHEAD: Interchangeably, true, but
- 2 they're not all trafficking or sex trafficking. That's
- 3 what I, what I wanted to explain. We are familiar with
- 4 sex trafficking, but we haven't really talked about human
- 5 trafficking where maybe a migrant might come someone
- 6 might be illegal in the City of Detroit that maybe is
- 7 being forced to work or forced to do something that is a
- 8 form of trafficking as well. But for this presentation,
- 9 we limited it to sex trafficking.
- 10 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you for that clarification
- 11 also you know, when you drive through the city, you see
- 12 those, see something, say something billboards. Have you
- 13 ever had the opportunity to say perhaps to approach a
- 14 nonprofit so that we could have the same kind of alert as
- 15 it relates to human sex trafficking, whereby the person
- 16 who would be making the report, uses the human
- 17 trafficking hotline? Have we ever had a billboard posted
- 18 specifically to human trafficking, sex trafficking?
- 19 SERGEANT CRAIGHEAD: I don't believe so. I have seen
- 20 the 1-800-speak up for Crime Stoppers. If you see
- 21 something say something campaign that was publicized, but
- 22 as far as human trafficking, per se, I don't recall
- 23 seeing any billboards to that.
- 24 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: And I think the numbers are
- 25 probably different.



- 1 SERGEANT GRACE: We do receive a lot of tips from
- 2 crime stoppers or regarding human trafficking. We do get
- 3 a lot of information from those tips.
- 4 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you so much. AC Bettison,
- 5 you were going to ---
- 6 ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: I was just going to chime
- 7 in that, you know, with this is a collective effort, as
- 8 far as educating the community and our Vice Unit has met
- 9 with various hotels and motels, but particularly our
- 10 hotels where a lot of the sex trafficking takes place.
- 11 And so in many of the hotels around the metropolitan area
- 12 and even around the country, there's a campaign where
- 13 they have various things in the hotel room that
- 14 discreetly gives individual information about human and
- 15 sex trafficking so that they can get the little cards,
- 16 it's even on soap and other things where they can call a
- 17 number to let somebody know.
- 18 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you, AC Bettison. And I have
- 19 to put the plugin one of the last auto shows the Delta
- 20 Sigma Theda. We were housed out like at Joy Road. And I
- 21 mean, not Joy Road John R and I don't know, 14-miles.
- 22 And that was the canvassing we did AC Bettison the
- 23 Delta's went about the community, Sterling Heights,
- 24 Warren, and we did approach the various hotels and back
- in and in one example, we went to an apartment complex.



- 1 I mean, they're pristine, looked sort of a wealthy
- 2 complex. And we were attempting to gain access and the
- 3 objective was to leave some of those subtle items whereby
- 4 folks if they were involved in, or if they were
- 5 victimized by human trafficking, sex trafficking, they
- 6 could use that information on those soap bars to contact,
- 7 to use the hotline number, and it was interesting that
- 8 some hotel managers were resistant to us leaving those
- 9 items in that community. But again, it's a very heated
- 10 contentious. I think we discovered the Deltas did, that
- 11 human trafficking the industry itself has somewhere
- 12 around a billion dollars of money that comes into their
- 13 business, which to some degree competes, what, how much
- 14 money even drug traffickers get. So it is a very serious
- 15 matter obviously. And I'm sure, like you said, AC
- 16 Bettison, we need to work together as a community, so.
- 17 ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: I'll make sure that I get
- 18 the Board some information so that when you're out with
- 19 your constituents and you're out with the citizens, that
- 20 you will have those hotline numbers and that you will
- 21 have even as little pamphlets and stuff to give to
- 22 citizens you know I'll get you a copy and we'll figure
- 23 out how to get more, but that you could even help us
- 24 educate the community as to what to look for and how to
- 25 report it because that can help save lives and get folks



- 1 out of modern-day slavery.
- 2 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you again AC Bettison.
- 3 Commissioners, we have the 2020 Human Trafficking Report
- 4 from the State, which is very interesting and it's very
- 5 informative. And it has the 2020 date indicator because
- 6 obviously with COVID the Commissioners for human
- 7 trafficking were not able to really get their commissions
- 8 implemented. So we might want to look at how the State of
- 9 Michigan is, as well as the human trafficking.
- 10 Commissioners are trying to effectively impact the
- 11 negative numbers that that business unfortunately is
- 12 holding onto. So again, thank you DPD for making this
- 13 presentation, AC Bettison. We look forward to those
- 14 materials that you have generously extended to us so that
- 15 we, as a community, can go about and alert people on how
- 16 to see something, say something.
- 17 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Madam Chairperson, just one
- 18 quick
- 19 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner, Bernard.
- 20 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you, Madam Chair,
- 21 Commander Bettison if you have materials on that, that
- 22 you'd like to distribute, of course, I want some, and I
- 23 want to be able to distribute them, but I just wanted to
- 24 call to your attention, so you can call it to the
- 25 attention of your colleagues in our surrounding



- 1 communities. It's my understanding that a lot of human
- 2 trafficking is actually going on within the Vietnamese
- 3 community, which is out there near 14-mile and 12-mile,
- 4 where Vice-Chair Holt was. That's a huge issue as you
- 5 know, Vietnamese community and I believe it's also
- 6 happening in Southwest Detroit among the Hispanic
- 7 community. So if we could have materials, like I probably
- 8 just need American, you know, English speaking materials,
- 9 but those communities I know for a fact would probably
- 10 benefit from having materials in foreign languages. So
- 11 when you talk to your fellow chiefs and so forth.
- 12 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you, Commissioner Bernard.
- 13 That's a perfect example. That's a perfect suggestion.
- 14 Thank you so much. So again, we're going to move the
- 15 agenda. DPD, thank you.
- SERGEANT CRAIGHEAD: Thank you, ma'am. We appreciate
- 17 it.
- 18 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioners, your quality
- 19 questions are helping us to better understand this
- 20 industry of human trafficking. The next thing on the
- 21 agenda Mrs. White, your report.
- MRS. WHITE: Yes. Through the Chair, Honorable Board
- 23 and our meeting attendees and DPD executives, please note
- 24 the agenda for the following incoming correspondence for
- 25 this week, and they are as follows: Number one, weekly



- 1 DPD facial recognition technology report for the week of
- 2 March 22nd, 2021 through March 28th, 2021. The Honorable
- 3 Board also received the RFP towing and recovery services
- 4 from the DPD tow monitor, Captain Michael Parrish. Number
- 5 three, Public Health Order regarding the Open Meetings
- 6 Act dated March 30th, 2021. The panel discussion event
- 7 flyer which will be held by Wayne State University
- 8 Department of Criminology and Criminal Justice and 11th
- 9 Center will be held on April nine, 2021 regarding
- 10 corrections and reentry. Number five, the resignation
- 11 letter of senior investigator Del Veda, Moses. Number
- 12 six, Chief of Police James E. Craig's letter of
- 13 recommendation to promote detective Eric Flesh to the
- 14 rank of Sergeant. Number seven, the correspondence from
- 15 Captain Michael Parrish and our office memorandum
- 16 regarding proposed revisions to the rules of police
- 17 authorized towers. And also you received various staff
- 18 reports, including, but not limited to the research
- 19 material previously discussed on human trafficking and
- 20 the Vice Enforcement Unit. Also, the Vice Enforcement
- 21 presentation was also shared earlier this week. Also,
- 22 this just came in was the project Greenlight Detroit list
- 23 of participants, which has recently been forwarded to
- 24 your email address. And that concludes the incoming
- 25 correspondence for this week.



- 1 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you, Ms. White. So now we
- 2 will go into unfinished business. Search, warrant and
- 3 execution policy, 202.03 and that is the presentation,
- 4 Ms. White?
- 5 MRS. WHITE: Through the Chair. That is not a
- 6 presentation at this time. We have already provided the
- 7 Honorable Board and the community with the presentation
- 8 on search warrant and execution policy. And so at this
- 9 time it is a motion or a vote that is scheduled to occur.
- 10 Also Assistant Chief Bettison and Director Branche-Wilson
- 11 are available on the line if there are any additional
- 12 questions regarding that policy, but it's scheduled for a
- 13 vote today,
- 14 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Right. And I see you have provided
- 15 us with a synopsis of the search warrant policy. So we
- 16 can move on. Is there a motion?
- 17 COMMISSIONER JONES: Through the Chair: Absolutely.
- 18 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Jones.
- 19 COMMISSIONER JONES: All right. Thank you. Based on a
- 20 thorough review and announcement of the department's
- 21 policy on search warrant and execution manual directive
- 22 202.3 and the department's inclusion of the following key
- 23 updates presented on February 25th, 2021, which are as
- 24 follows: Increase in supervisory presence on all search
- 25 warrants, reducing allowable circumstances for no-knock



- 1 warrants. Members shall only conduct no-knock warrants in
- 2 the incidence of imminent threat of loss of life or
- 3 serious injury or a national security risk, and any no-
- 4 knock warrants must be approved by the Chief of Police or
- 5 his designee. I move that we approve the department's
- 6 policy on search warrant and execution manual directive
- 7 202.3.
- 8 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Do I hear a second?
- 9 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I call that we table it until
- 10 next week.
- 11 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: That motion is out of order.
- 12 COMMISSIONER BURTON: You can always table a motion,
- 13 Madam Chair.
- 14 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: The motion Commissioner Burton is
- 15 out of order, and I need to take it under advisement. Is
- 16 there a motion? Are we going to vote to support the
- 17 warrant and execution policy?
- 18 COMMISSIONER CARTER: I said second.
- 19 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Pardon me? There was no second
- 20 on your motion.
- 21 COMMISSIONER CARTER: I said second, a couple of
- 22 times.
- 23 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I didn't hear. I'm sorry.
- 24 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I called to table it because of
- 25 the



- 1 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay, question. Is there a
- 2 discussion?
- 3 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Discussion.
- 4 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I second the motion to table
- 5 the policy.
- 6 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: I'm sorry. I didn't hear that
- 7 Commissioner Bernard?
- 8 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Madam Chair.
- 9 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Excuse me, Commissioner Brown. Ms.
- 10 White, I need to see. Where are we with the second of
- 11 this motion that was introduced by Commissioner Jones?
- MRS. WHITE: Yes. Through the Chair, Commissioner
- 13 Carter, I have recorded where she seconded the motion and
- 14 that is the information that I have. I did hear
- 15 Commissioner Burton moved to table and then a later
- 16 second, but the previous motion was properly made and
- 17 seconded.
- 18 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you, Ms. White, for that
- 19 information. So we're at the second. Is there a
- 20 discussion?
- 21 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Chairperson?
- 22 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes. Commissioner Holley.
- 23 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: I'd like to ask Commissioner
- 24 Linda, why do you want this table?
- 25 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Commissioner Holley, it's a



- 1 big step forward and I agree with most of it. The only
- 2 thing that I disagree with, is that they can come in
- 3 after 30 seconds, but that somebody comes to your door
- 4 with a warrant. And if you're not at that door in 30
- 5 seconds they can break down the door. That's a problem
- 6 for me. That's the only part, the rest of it is pretty
- 7 good. You know, I like the fact that the Chief has to
- 8 approve a no-knock warrant, and I hope he does that
- 9 judiciously and not just performer. I mean, it's a good
- 10 policy other than that, but that 30 seconds, I can't move
- 11 that fast. And I know I can't from upstairs. So that was
- 12 my problem. And I can't forget about that, man that they
- 13 broke the door in. I think it was right here in Northwest
- 14 Detroit, an older man, and he busted the door and they
- 15 had the warrant and he had a (Audio Distortion). They
- 16 didn't know he was an old guy, and they shot him and
- 17 killed him. The 30 seconds is giving me a problem.
- 18 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: I got you. I got you.
- 19 COMMISSIONER JONES: Through the Chair.
- 20 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Jones.
- 21 COMMISSIONER JONES: As I understand it, even in
- 22 approving this motion, I mean approving the policy that
- 23 the policy is amendable. So it's not something that's set
- in stone. It is actually amenable at a later date in the
- event that some concerns observed by DPD, like the one



- 1 expressed by Commissioner Linda Bernard, that those
- 2 concerns can be addressed at a later date. But at this
- 3 particular point, it's about adopting the policy and
- 4 moving it forward with the ability to be able to amend it
- 5 at a later date.
- 6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: We can amend it to that right
- 7 now.
- 8 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay. Thank you. Thank you.
- 9 Commissioner Jones and Commissioner Bernard.
- 10 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Madam Chair. For discussion.
- 11 Madam Chair.
- 12 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay, we're going to take a vote
- 13 on it.
- 14 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Madam Chair, District 5 has to
- 15 weigh in for discussion as well. Madam Chair.
- 16 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: We're going to take a vote on the
- 17 motion to approve.
- 18 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Madam Chair, I have a question,
- 19 under discussion, also.
- 20 COMMISSIONER BURTON: You are going to
- 21 disenfranchised 200,000 people in the 5th District?
- 22 COMMISSIONER BROWN: And in the 2nd and 1st District.
- 23 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: We are going to take a vote on the
- 24 motion to approve.
- 25 COMMISSIONER BROWN: I tell you, you are out of order



- 1 now we are in discussion.
- 2 COMMISSIONER BURTON: You are going to violate our
- 3 civil liberty? You are going to violate the citizens of
- 4 Detroit and District 5 and District 2 and District 1.
- 5 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: We're going to move on and vote on
- 6 the motion.
- 7 COMMISSIONER BROWN. Commissioner Bernard, what's
- 8 your
- 9 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: You can either vote the motion up
- 10 or vote the motion down. Commissioner Brown.
- 11 COMMISSIONER BURTON: You are going to shut the door
- on democracy, right Madam Chair?
- 13 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Brown.
- 14 COMMISSIONER BROWN: I moved to amend the motion I
- 15 like to make.
- 16 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Support.
- 17 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Support.
- 18 COMMISSIONER BROWN: And that amendment is that we
- 19 amend the timeframe as to when they can go in after a
- 20 knock to be is it, 30 seconds to 30 seconds?
- 21 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: It is 30 seconds.
- 22 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Brown.
- 23 COMMISSIONER BROWN: To a minute.
- 24 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Brown, there's a
- 25 policy with us how long Ms. White, how far can we go



- 1 back in terms of having this policy whereby we could have
- 2 previewed it and made our comments at that time?
- 3 COMMISSIONER BROWN: That's irrelevant.
- 4 MRS. WHITE: Through the Chair, the policy is,
- 5 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Excuse me, Mr. Brown.
- 6 MRS. WHITE: The policy was originally transmitted
- 7 from the department, the early part of December 2020.
- 8 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you, Ms. White. So at that
- 9 point, I see no reason for us to try to hold this out any
- 10 longer. And again, Commissioners, if you choose to vote
- 11 the motion out on down, that's your choice. So, Ms.
- 12 White, we're going to vote on the motion. We're going to
- 13 have a vote on the motion.
- 14 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Point of information.
- 15 MRS. WHITE. Madam Chair,
- 16 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: We're going to have a vote on the
- 17 motion. And I'll start with.
- 18 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: What are we voting on?
- 19 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: We are voting to approve the
- 20 policy as it is presented to us today.
- 21 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: You can't do that. You got to,
- 22 I'm sorry Madam Chairperson. I'm not a parliamentarian
- 23 but I do know the policy from experience. But you got to
- 24 wait. You got to vote on the second motion first up or
- 25 down and then go through the first motion.



- 1 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Yes.
- 2 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Holley.
- 3 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes. Ma'am. I know I'm not a
- 4 parliamentarian, but I'm good.
- 5 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: I'm not challenging your skills,
- 6 Commissioner Holley, but from what I recall, the only
- 7 motion that is legal is the motion that was introduced by
- 8 Commissioner Jones.
- 9 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: No.
- 10 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: That's the motion that was second.
- 11 COMMISSIONER JONES: No. There was a motion put on
- 12 there to amend it, and there was a motion put on there to
- 13 table it and those motions have to be voted on Madam
- 14 Chair.
- 15 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Before the main motion.
- 16 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Before the main motion.
- 17 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Then we'll second it. The
- 18 friendly amendment will second it. That was seconded.
- 19 COMMISSIONER BROWN: So we have to vote the amendment
- 20 up or down, and then we vote on the table. Then we vote
- 21 for the main motion, Madam Chair. And I like Commissioner
- 22 Holley, I'm not a parliamentarian, but I think I'm pretty
- 23 good.
- 24 MRS. WHITE: Through the Chair, if I may. Please know
- 25 Honorable Board that according to Robert's Rules of



- 1 Order, the Chairperson has the discretion, and the
- 2 wherewithal to determine whether a motion is out of order
- 3 at any particular time. And so that is also to be
- 4 considered, but Madam Chair, it is up to you at this
- 5 time. If you want to pursue the amendment, the friendly
- 6 amendment that was made to the original motion, and then
- 7 vote on the main motion, it is within your discretion as
- 8 to the Chairperson. And that is information that is
- 9 verified again in Robert's Rules of Order, newly revised
- 10 edition, 12th edition, and also it's verified through the
- 11 City of Detroit Law Department attorney, who is also on
- 12 the call. Thank you.
- 13 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: So, let me see,
- 14 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Madam Chair.
- 15 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Excuse me, Commissioner Burton.
- 16 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: So let me see if I understand Ms.
- 17 White. We are now not supporting Commissioner Jones'
- 18 motion?
- 19 MRS. WHITE: Though the Chair is not, not supporting,
- 20 but there was a friendly amendment made to Commissioner
- 21 Jones' original main motion, and that friendly amendment
- 22 was to change or adjust the timeframe in which DPD can
- 23 enter a home with a valid search warrant. So I think
- 24 Commissioner Brown can attest to him indicating that it
- 25 should be extended to one minute versus the 30 seconds



- 1 that's in the existing policy directive or in the revised
- 2 policy directive. So that's the friendly amendment that's
- 3 on the table at this time. But again, it is up to the
- 4 Chair if you would like to pursue and entertain that
- 5 motion versus the main motion
- 6 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Madam Chairperson for the
- 7 spirit of the meeting, which I know you want. I think you
- 8 ought to do what is right. And I'm just saying to you is
- 9 that let's do it right? I don't know what the book says.
- 10 I know what the spirit says. I'm just saying to you let's
- 11 go with Brown and go back up to the other one. And we are
- 12 out of here.
- COMMISSIONER BROWN: Madam Chair, I will withdraw my
- 14 motion.
- 15 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you, Commissioner Holley.
- 16 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Excuse me Commissioner Brown.
- 17 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: So now we're entertaining the
- 18 motion to amend the time and the original discussion
- 19 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Madam Chair. I just told you I
- 20 withdraw the motion.
- 21 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Are we going to second on the
- 22 motion?
- COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Madam Chair, he withdrew his
- 24 amendment. So you only have your original motion now.
- 25 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: You know, the games that we're



- 1 playing are interfering with how much progress we can
- 2 make as a body. So do I understand now we're dealing with
- 3 the main motion?
- 4 COMMISSIONER JONES: Yes.
- 5 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you. Thank you, Commissioner
- 6 Bernard. So we have a second on the main motion.
- 7 MRS. WHITE: Commissioner Carter previously seconded
- 8 the main motion.
- 9 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: And so now we will vote?
- 10 MRS. WHITE: Yes, ma'am.
- 11 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Brown.
- 12 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Yes.
- 13 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Bernard.
- 14 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Abstain.
- 15 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you. Commissioner Burton.
- 16 Commissioner Burton, Commissioner Burton.
- 17 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: He can't hear you.
- 18 MRS. WHITE: Commissioner Burton.
- 19 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: He's not muted. He doesn't have
- 20 to hold up a note. He's not muted.
- 21 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I want to make it clear, the
- 22 Vice-Chair Annie Hope is not allowing me to weigh in on
- 23 discussion. She shutting down the door on democracy for
- 24 the citizens that live in the 5th District.
- 25 COMMISSIONER JONES: Through the Chair, that's



- 1 improper.
- 2 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I'm going to have to vote no on
- 3 this right now.
- 4 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you, Commissioner Burton.
- 5 Thank you very much for your vote.
- 6 COMMISSIONER BURTON: But I want to be able to speak
- 7 for discussion. And I was told by the Vice-Chair today
- 8 that I cannot speak during discussion. This is slamming
- 9 the door on democracy on a hundred thousand people that
- 10 live in the 5th District.
- 11 COMMISSIONER JONES: Madam Chair, that's improper. We
- 12 are voting right now.
- 13 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you Commissioner Jones.
- 14 COMMISSIONER BURTON. And I had my hand up and I
- 15 weighed in to speak for discussion.
- 16 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you Commissioner Burton.
- 17 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Vice-Chair Annie Holt told me I
- 18 couldn't speak. She told me I couldn't speak.
- 19 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you Commissioner Burton for
- 20 your no, vote. Commissioner Carter.
- 21 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Yes.
- 22 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Davis.
- 23 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: No, insufficient time.
- 24 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you. Commissioner Jones.
- 25 COMMISSIONER JONES: Yes.



- 1 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Holley.
- 2 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Yes.
- 3 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Holt. Yes. Mrs.
- 4 White, what's the outcome of that vote?

5

- 6 MRS. WHITE: Through the Chair. Madam Chair, you have
- 7 5 yes votes, 2 no votes, and 1 abstention that's counted
- 8 as a no vote. The motion passed.
- 9 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you. The games that we play
- 10 are wasting time and I'm sure the public come to these
- 11 meetings to get the true essence of why we're engaging as
- 12 civilian oversight. Okay. The next thing on the agenda on
- 13 Ms. White is the applicant appeal of Max Pedro. And he's
- 14 going to be represented by the attorney our corporation
- 15 council person. She's going to.
- MRS. WHITE: Yes. Through the Chair, Honorable Board,
- 17 the applicant appeal is on the schedule. Mr. Max Pedro
- 18 will be speaking for himself during this open session.
- 19 The assistant attorney assistant prosecuting, excuse me,
- 20 Assistant Corporation Counsel Savage Whitley is available
- 21 on the line as well to speak with regards to her
- 22 recommendation. And also the Department of Human
- 23 Resources is available, Director Patillo and Lieutenant
- 24 James Coles, and Madam Chair. If it is your pleasure and
- 25 Honorable Board if the attorney can go first with her



- 1 synopsis and recommendation?
- 2 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you, Mrs. White.
- 3 ASSISTANT CORPORATION COUNSEL WHITLEY: Good
- 4 afternoon to the Honorable Board.
- 5 ALL: Good afternoon.
- 6 ASSISTANT CORPORATION COUNSEL WHITLEY: I believe you
- 7 all received the privileged and confidential
- 8 correspondence that I sent. If there are any questions,
- 9 please let me know. I would recommend that you just go
- 10 along with the presentation or the comments that you may
- 11 have from the candidate, and if there are any particular
- 12 questions as it relates to the opinion I can provide, but
- 13 I would prefer to let the opinion stand on its own.
- 14 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you. Candidate Pedro is
- 15 going to speak now, Ms. White.
- 16 MRS. WHITE: Yes.
- 17 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you.
- 18 MR. PEDRO: Yes. Hello. Good afternoon, everyone.
- 19 Thank you for hearing me. Can you all hear me?
- 20 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes, we can.
- MR. PEDRO: Okay. Thank you. I just wanted to, first
- 22 of all, say thank you for taking the time to hear my
- 23 appeal and allow candidates the opportunity to appeal the
- 24 hiring process. If they feel that you know, they should
- 25 be moved forward and I wanted to make myself available



- 1 for any of you to ask me any questions that may be
- 2 pertinent to the hiring process that would potentially
- 3 give me the opportunity to move forward.
- 4 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I asked some questions.
- 5 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you, Commissioner Bernard.
- 6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: And I want to thank the
- 7 Corporation Counsel for providing us that very brief two-
- 8 page summary that I can't put my hands on right now, but
- 9 I want to ask you Mr. Pedro, all of the issues that have
- 10 been raised concerning your candidacy, first of all, they
- 11 have recommended that you not be able to be a candidate
- 12 for three years from now and the four or five things that
- 13 they raised were very, very minor things. As I recall.
- 14 You had alcohol, before you were 21, you bought alcohol
- 15 for your fellows. They were, I guess, under 21, but I
- 16 assume they were over 18.
- 17 COMMISSIONER JONES: Excuse me. I apologize through
- 18 the Chair. And also with Counsel Whitley. Are we free to
- 19 openly discuss the items that were mentioned inside of,
- 20 and I'm just doing this for the protection of the Board
- 21 and also of the police department as well. Is the
- 22 discussion open as far as the items that were listed on
- 23 that page that we received as far as Intel on this
- 24 particular candidate
- 25 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Mr. Pedro, is it open because



- 1 it's up to you?
- 2 COMMISSIONER JONES: Excuse me. I'm asking Mrs.
- 3 Whitely, please. Thank you.
- 4 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: It's not up to her.
- 5 ASSISTANT CORPORATION COUNSEL WHITLEY: Through the
- 6 Chair. The Open Meetings Act provides the right for the
- 7 candidate to request a closed session if he desired. Is
- 8 my understanding from Mrs. White, that he was comfortable
- 9 with an open session. So he should feel comfortable to
- 10 proceed with any questions that you all may have. I just
- 11 wanted to err on the side of discretion as it relates to
- 12 my recommendation and going through the facts, but as he
- 13 sees fit to answer questions because this is his hearing.
- 14 COMMISSIONER JONES: Okay. Through the Chair. I
- 15 apologize to Commissioner Linda Bernard for interrupting
- 16 her but I just wanted to make sure we are protected.
- 17 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Jones, thank you so
- 18 much. Commissioner Bernard.
- 19 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Just quickly. Can you just
- 20 explain the things that are in the summary that are the
- 21 reasons for the department deciding not to recommend you
- 22 go to the Academy? They're not serious or grievous things
- and perhaps you can explain them to the Board members?
- MR. PEDRO: Absolutely. So, I actually wasn't able to
- 25 read exactly what the reasons were why I was removed. So



- 1 I can assume that it was what I put down on my background
- 2 investigation sheet and what they discovered about me.
- 3 And it is true that I did consume alcohol before I was
- 4 21. I did provide under 21-year-olds with alcohol at a
- 5 time. Early on in college, I did have a fake ID that I
- 6 did get caught with. And I just want to point out and
- 7 I'm not going to sugar coat it. It absolutely was the
- 8 wrong decision that I made at the time. But I've grown as
- 9 a person. I recently graduated college and I'm going to
- 10 be attending an online master's program soon. And I know
- 11 that people do make mistakes, but I hope that you guys
- 12 can look at me as a whole person instead of just what's
- 13 the background investigators recommended in terms of the
- 14 removal from the process.
- 15 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Other questions from the
- 16 Commissioners, please?
- 17 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I would just like to remind
- 18 the Commissioners that it's interesting when you all of
- 19 us recruit people to come to the police department. And I
- 20 tell them all the time, because, you know, during the
- 21 process and everything, you're sort of encouraged, well,
- 22 have you ever done this? Have you ever done this? Have
- 23 you ever been in a fight? Have you ever anything like
- 24 this? You know, what would your neighbors say about you?
- 25 So you start talking and thinking that the recruiter is



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- 1 your friend, and in reality, the recruiter is gathering
- 2 information that can later be used to punish you. No one
- 3 would even know that he drank underage, which most people
- 4 have done, had he not told on himself, no one would ever
- 5 know that when he was 21, he bought beer for some 20-
- 6 year-olds. I mean, I just want the Commissioners to
- 7 understand what it's like when you're trying to be really
- 8 forthright and you're just bearing your soul, but you
- 9 don't realize that it can come back to haunt you. And
- 10 that's what's happened here, I think in his case. I read
- 11 your comments. Congratulations on finishing college and
- 12 congratulations on being in a master's program. Do you
- 13 speak Spanish?
- 14 MR. PEDRO: I do not, but I am, I am half Puerto
- 15 Rican.
- 16 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Okay. All right. That's the
- only other question I had because I thought you [01:35:12]
- 18 inaudible] as a Spanish person.
- 19 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes, Commissioner Holley.
- 20 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Madam Chairperson. I have
- 21 attorney Whitley, can you just give me two or three
- 22 minutes why you, based on everything that [01:35:25
- inaudible], and can you give me why you basically
- recommended for him not to be [01:35:33].
- 25 ASSISTANT CORPORATION COUNSEL WHITLEY: I basically



- 1 reviewed the report prepared by the staff and it was more
- 2 of a concurrence once I saw their concerns. I will say
- 3 the one area where I differ from the staff was regarding
- 4 the time limit there. The standard could be a minimum of
- 5 two years. They recommended three. So I put in my
- 6 recommendations that I thought two would be fine. But
- 7 that would be the minimum. But for me personally, it was
- 8 more of a proximity issue. It wasn't necessarily that it
- 9 needed to be anything that was a permanent strike on his
- 10 candidacy. It was because it was such close proximity to
- 11 when he was applying for all the various departments and
- 12 the activity that was overlapping. So if you look at the
- 13 timeline of the different polygraphs and applications and
- 14 things, and then when he applied to the City of Detroit,
- 15 that was all within a matter of months. And for me, that
- 16 was a bit concerning. I would have liked to see a little
- 17 bit more time passed from these, what we would like to
- 18 call youthful mistakes, and to see that maybe that would
- 19 not be ongoing behavior. So if there had an even at least
- 20 once a year, maybe of time that had lapsed, I probably
- 21 would have felt comfortable to deviate from the staff's
- 22 recommendation. So from where I stand is I was at two
- 23 years, and that was basically at the end of my
- 24 recommendation.
- 25 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Thank you Madam Chair.



- 1 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you Commissioner Holley.
- 2 Other Commissioners, you have questions?
- 3 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Through the Chair.
- 4 COMMISSIONER JONES: Through the Chair.
- 5 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: I thought I heard Commissioner
- 6 Brown.
- 7 COMMISSIONER JONES: Okay. He can go first. I'm
- 8 alright.
- 9 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: I heard Commissioner Brown.
- 10 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Attorney Whitley, thank you for
- 11 the way you laid everything out. I really appreciate that
- 12 information. My other question is just to Lieutenant
- 13 Coles why three years, as opposed to a year?
- 14 LIEUTENANT COLES: Through the Chair. The reason I
- 15 picked three years is because it gives us enough time to
- 16 establish a good frame of him actually doing things the
- 17 correct way. And just not having any violations again, as
- 18 the attorney said for the proximity to us, it was very
- 19 close. You know, he was still doing the things in 2019 as
- 20 he applied for the department. So our estimation is that
- 21 he needed some time for us to give him, to really be able
- 22 to evaluate his behavior after that.
- 23 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Okay. Thank you.
- 24 COMMISSIONER JONES: Through the Chair.
- 25 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes, Commissioner Jones.



- 1 COMMISSIONER JONES: I just I've got one question
- 2 because I did read through that entire report, and first
- of all, I'm going to say, Pedro, I do appreciate your
- 4 desire to become a part of the finest police department,
- 5 we feel in the country and it is a privilege to be able
- 6 to put that uniform on and be a part of this kind of a
- 7 team. I noticed that in my reading of your report, we had
- 8 multiple failures on the polygraph examinations, which in
- 9 most circumstances, most of us would probably go through
- 10 most of my lifetime without ever having to be subjected
- 11 to a polygraph examination, but you've got multiple
- 12 failures where the polygraph examination is concerned,
- which is a direct indication of a person's truthfulness
- 14 under a number of circumstances. And we're dealing with
- an entire community here. You know, we're not trying to
- 16 single you out for anything or whatever, but we
- 17 definitely need officers that have the propensity to be
- 18 truthful in their testimony against one of our citizens
- 19 If that becomes the outcome but you've got multiple
- 20 failures. Can you tell me why you think or why the Board
- 21 should possibly change their mind about your candidacy
- 22 given such information about yourself and I thank you for
- 23 appearing before the Board?
- MR. PEDRO: Absolutely. So, to answer that question,
- 25 I've taken four polygraphs. So the first one I took in



- 1 2019 and I did pass that one. Absolutely no problem. And
- 2 that was not located in the State of Connecticut. The
- 3 other three that I did were located in the State of
- 4 Connecticut, which is known to have a very high failure
- 5 rate for those tests and you know, the departments, do
- 6 not give them details on what happened to the candidates.
- 7 You're just removed from the process due to the failures.
- 8 And based on my experience with them, they're very
- 9 hostile hostile situations when you're in the room with
- 10 them. And they're very tough on you and I understand
- 11 absolutely that they want to get the truth out of you and
- 12 they want to find discrepancies in your story. But, you
- 13 know, I always absolutely was a hundred percent truthful
- 14 with them as the first examiner that I sat with would
- 15 tell any of you. And I think they could be good tools in
- 16 the right although, unfortunately for me, they didn't end
- 17 up in my favor, most of them.
- 18 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you, Commissioner Jones. Are
- 19 there other questions Commissioners?
- 20 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I would just like to point out
- 21 that as Counsel knows polygraph tests are not admissible.
- 22 And if they were truly reliable, they would be
- 23 admissible, which they are not.
- 24 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you, Commissioner Bernard.
- 25 I'd like to have Commissioner Carter.



- 1 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Yes, Madam Chair. I move that
- 2 we adopt the recommendation from the court counsel and
- 3 temporarily disqualify, Mr. Pedro for three years.
- 4 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Second.
- 5 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: It's been moved and second. Are
- 6 there questions? In that event, we'll take the vote.
- 7 Those in favor of the Board's recommendation that
- 8 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Roll call. I'm asking for a
- 9 roll call.
- 10 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay, good. Thank you.
- 11 ASSISTANT CORPORATION COUNSEL WHITLEY: Madam Chair,
- 12 may I just have a point of clarification?
- 13 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes, attorney Whitley.
- 14 ASSISTANT CORPORATION COUNSEL WHITLEY: I just want
- 15 to clarify for the record the staff recommended three
- 16 years. I basically would allow two years to three years.
- 17 So I just wanted to be clear, crystal for the record. I
- 18 was okay with two years.
- 19 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay.
- 20 COMMISSIONER JONES: Through the Chair. The motion is
- 21 for three years so that we're all on the same page?
- 22 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Well, based on the motion and
- 23 thank you Whitley for sharing that information. Our
- 24 motion has to do with having Mr. Pedro on suspension for
- 25 three years. So, and thank you, Reverend Holley, we're



- 1 going to have a roll call vote to support the Board's
- 2 recommendation that Mr. Pedro is on suspension for three
- 3 years. Commissioner Brown.
- 4 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Yes.
- 5 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Bernard.
- 6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: No.
- 7 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Burton.
- 8 COMMISSIONER BURTON: No.
- 9 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Carter.
- 10 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Yes.
- 11 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Davis.
- 12 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: No.
- 13 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Jones.
- 14 COMMISSIONER JONES: Yes.
- 15 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Holley.
- 16 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: No.
- 17 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: And I vote to support the Board's
- 18 recommendation of the three years. So that's a, yes. Mrs.
- 19 White, where are we?
- 20 MRS. WHITE: Through the Chair. There were 4 yes
- 21 votes and 4 no votes resulting in a tie. The motion
- 22 failed.
- 23 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay.
- 24 COMMISSIONER JONES: I'm sorry. Through the Chair,
- 25 but I looked like I wrote down 5 yes votes. Am I just



- 1 off?
- 2 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: You're off.
- 3 COMMISSIONER BROWN: So what does that mean for him?
- 4 Lieutenant Coles, Madam Chair, if you don't mind me
- 5 asking that question.
- 6 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: No, I do not mind you ask him the
- 7 question, Commissioner Brown. As long as you let me know,
- 8 I am supposed to be listening by calling me Madam Chair.
- 9 COMMISSIONER BROWN: I apologize, I apologize, Madam
- 10 Chair.
- 11 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: To my understanding,
- 12 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I move, Madam Chair, that Mr.
- 13 Pedro be admitted into the Academy.
- 14 COMMISSIONER BURTON: That's right. That's right.
- 15 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Wait a minute. Commissioner
- 16 Bernard, you issued a motion.
- 17 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Yes. The only motion I've ever
- 18 made, right? That he be admitted into the Academy.
- 19 COMMISSIONER BURTON:: I second.
- 20 MRS. WHITE: Through the Chair. If I may just kind of
- 21 clarify something and then also DPD HR Division Director
- 22 Patillo and Lieutenant Coles can clarify as well. This is
- 23 a motion or this circumstance is to entertain whether he,
- 24 Mr. Max Pedro can reapply to the Detroit Police
- 25 Department. This is not to automatically enter or accept



- 1 him for the DPD recruitment Academy. This is not what
- 2 that is, is to
- 3 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you, Melanie. Then I
- 4 move that he'd be allowed to reapply immediately.
- 5 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: It's been move. I support.
- 6 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: It has been moved and supported.
- 7 Is there a discussion?
- 8 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Madam Chairperson.
- 9 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes. Lieutenant Coles.
- 10 LIEUTENANT COLES: I'm sorry ma'am. I don't know if
- it's appropriate for me to ask the question at this time?
- 12 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: I would appreciate you asking a
- 13 question.
- 14 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: No, it is not. The Board is in
- 15 the middle of a vote. It is not appropriate.
- 16 LIEUTENANT COLES: Madam Chair, do I speak or no?
- 17 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Wait a second. Lieutenant Coles.
- 18 Thank you. Yes. Ms. White.
- 19 MRS. WHITE: Yes. Through the Chair. Honorable Board.
- 20 If you could please excuse me. My next statement, after I
- 21 clarify the record was to ask Director Patillo and
- 22 Lieutenant Coles to weigh in on that item, because that
- 23 is important to clarify on the record.
- 24 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Melanie that is not your
- 25 purview. That's the Chair's in charge of the meeting. She



- 1 decides who weighs in and who doesn't.
- 2 MRS. WHITE: I understand, but Through the Chair, I
- 3 just wanted to indicate that Director Patillo and
- 4 Lieutenant Coles are here for that very reason to address
- 5 what will be proper as it relates to the applicant appeal
- 6 and whether they would be applying to reapply or applying
- 7 to the Detroit Police Department for the training
- 8 Academy. So, that Chair is your decision.
- 9 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you. Ms. White, and thank
- 10 you, Commissioner Bernard. So because of the ignorance of
- 11 the Chair, I'm going to ask Lieutenant Coles to be in, on
- 12 this discussion, please.

13

- 14 LIEUTENANT COLES: Through the Chair. Thank you,
- 15 Ma'am. What I was going to say is that if we accept him
- 16 at this time to be put back into the process, then the
- 17 things that we found that we disqualified him for would
- 18 be things that we would not disqualify him for again. So
- 19 the things that we have that were on the record on his
- 20 file, we couldn't re-disqualify him for that. So he
- 21 wouldn't go directly into the Academy. But my
- 22 understanding is, this is how I see it, is that he would
- 23 be able to move forward. And the next stage would
- 24 probably be his testing portion. And I'm sorry for being
- 25 a sticker, but I did have one other question, and it was



- 1 to do with the attorney. It was saying on the
- 2 recommendation she said for a minimum of two years. The
- 3 minimum of two years would only apply in my understanding
- 4 if the Commission was the one that denied the candidate,
- 5 not for the department. So it never got to the Commission
- 6 for the Commission to deny him for a minimum of two
- 7 years. It's only on our portion. So, for us, there was no
- 8 minimum, it was just the disqualification and the years
- 9 were picked by DPD recruiting.
- 10 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: So, again, I mean Lieutenant
- 11 Coles.
- 12 LIEUTENANT COLES: Yes.
- 13 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: He could move forward, Madam
- 14 Chairman, Madam Chairwoman.
- 15 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes, Commissioner. So, Lieutenant
- 16 Coles, I know the position that you take as being the
- 17 person in charge of the Academy and standards. Now, the
- 18 thing that I noticed about Mr. Pedro, honestly, he did a
- 19 yeoman's job on the AMCOS test. I mean, he did a B and an
- 20 A-minus and, even passed the agility test. But I too
- 21 would like to and I'm probably breaking the rules, I
- 22 would like to ask Mr. Petrella, why is it he could not
- 23 wait because I think the descriptor was so that he could
- 24 mature. Why is it he could not wait for two, three years
- 25 before reapplying to the DPD? Mr. Petrella?



1 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Isn't that out of order?

- 2 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: It is.
- 3 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes, we are out of order.
- 4 ASSISTANT CORPORATION COUNSEL WHITLEY: Through the
- 5 Chair are you asking me or Director Patillo?
- 6 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: I'm sorry. I'm asking Mr. Pedro.
- 7 MR. PEDRO: Oh, why is it that I cannot wait two or
- 8 three more years?
- 9 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Correct.
- 10 MR. PEDRO: Well I just want to point out that it has
- 11 been 13 months since I first applied to the department
- 12 actually. And in that year is when I did finish you know,
- 13 college and, and apply to my master's program. So since I
- 14 first applied, it has already been over a year. So
- 15 waiting another year, I believe that it would just be,
- 16 like, I guess, due process where if I was to do that,
- just go through the process again. And I mean, I don't
- 18 know how much would change. I've matured a lot, I don't
- 19 do I quess the immature things I used to do. So I don't
- 20 know if much would change other than just more background
- 21 history to fill out.
- COMMISSIONER DAVIS: I call the question, Madam
- 23 Chair.
- 24 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay. Roll call vote.
- 25 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: What are we voting on?



- 1 COMMISSIONER JONES: What's the motion?
- 2 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Bernard, will you
- 3 please recite your motion?
- 4 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: My motion based on, I guess
- 5 the Captain's statement is that he'd be allowed to enter
- 6 the Academy because there is no reason not to, based on
- 7 what he said in terms of DPD. So that he'd be allowed to
- 8 proceed and enter the Academy. And if he fails out, he
- 9 fails out. He has to meet the criteria. He's not a
- 10 police officer. He's got a whole year of training.
- 11 COMMISSIONER JONES: Through the Chair.
- 12 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Jones.
- COMMISSIONER JONES: I would say, I don't think at
- 14 this particular point is up to the Board to vote in
- 15 whether or not a person can be a candidate for Detroit
- 16 Police Department or not. They have a hiring process,
- 17 that's regimented. He's gone through that process. It's
- 18 the recommendation of the training Academy, and
- 19 Lieutenant Coles that he is not a candidate for a police
- 20 officer position at this particular time, but it gives
- 21 him the option to be able to reapply in the event that
- 22 this circumstance change in at least two or three years.
- 23 I don't think it's in our place to be able to vote a
- 24 person into the Academy or not because he has to follow
- 25 the guidelines, which we're not familiar with ourselves.



- 1 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: It is not
- 2 COMMISSIONER JONES: If I can finish my point, please
- 3 Commissioner.
- 4 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: The question was called, the
- 5 question was called. He's out of order.
- 6 COMMISSIONER JONES: I'm taking the opportunity to be
- 7 able to join the discussion, okay. It's not up to us to
- 8 take a vote a candidate -
- 9 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: The question was called.
- 10 COMMISSIONER BURTON: You don't have permission to
- 11 speak from the Chair. Point of order. You do not have
- 12 permission, you have not been recognized by the Chair.
- 13 COMMISSIONER JONES: Commissioner, I had permission,
- 14 but I was cut off.
- 15 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Gentlemen, the Chair. Okay. Ms.
- 16 White.
- 17 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Chairperson, if I may. The
- 18 department has denied him the ability to move forward.
- 19 His appeal is before the Board. So for the purpose of him
- 20 being able to move forward, that's all this is. And
- 21 that's all the Commission does. It can approve him moving
- 22 forward in the process, or they can deny him moving
- 23 forward in the process. That was the point I was trying
- 24 to make. Commissioner Jones, I apologize if I was
- 25 inappropriate. I didn't mean to be, but that's the only



- 1 thing we're saying he's allowed to move forward in the
- 2 process. That's within our purview and we'll have a lot
- 3 of these. I mean, we used to do five of these all the
- 4 time. I mean, this is going to happen. They're going to
- 5 be other people that are going to appeal. They appeal the
- 6 decision of the department to the Commission. That's all
- 7 it is.
- 8 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay, thank you Commissioner
- 9 Bernard. Okay. Commissioner Brown.
- 10 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: To be able to move forward in
- 11 the process.
- 12 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Yes.
- 13 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Bernard.
- 14 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Yes.
- 15 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Carter.
- 16 COMMISSIONER CARTER: No.
- 17 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Davis.
- 18 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Yes.
- 19 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Jones.
- 20 COMMISSIONER JONES: No.
- 21 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Holley.
- 22 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Yes.
- 23 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: I vote no.
- 24 COMMISSIONER BURTON: You still failed to call on
- 25 Burton.



- 1 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: I'm sorry. Wait, wait.
- 2 COMMISSIONER BURTON: You're still trying to
- 3 silencing Commissioner Burton. You're shutting down
- 4 democracy. The 150,000, people that live in the fifth
- 5 district.
- 6 COMMISSIONER JONES: Madan Chair, you're giving him
- 7 an opportunity to calm down but he wants to run his mouth
- 8 instead of --.
- 9 COMMISSIONER BURTON: You did not allow me to speak
- 10 during discussion early on a business motion, you're not
- 11 allowing me to weigh in on a vote on this motion.
- 12 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: May we have Commissioner Burton's
- 13 vote.
- 14 COMMISSIONER BURTON: District five needs
- 15 representation.
- 16 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: If we can have Commissioner
- 17 Burton's vote and I apologize.
- 18 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: What's your vote Commissioner
- 19 Burton?
- 20 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I'd like it if you apologize to
- 21 the District 5 residents.
- 22 COMMISSIONER JONES: You are not going to get that.
- 23 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: I apologize. Now, what's your
- 24 vote?
- 25 COMMISSIONER BURTON: My vote right now that right



- 1 now that I'm weighing in, will be absolutely, yes.
- 2 Absolutely, yes.
- 3 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you. Okay. Miss White,
- 4 what's the vote, what's the outcome?
- 5 MRS. WHITE: Through the Chair, there were 5 yes
- 6 votes and 3 no votes. The motion passed.
- 7 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Oh, thank you.
- 8 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Madam Chair, person.
- 9 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes, Commissioner Holley.
- 10 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: I know you're mad --
- 11 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: No, I'm not angry.
- 12 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Congratulations to the
- 13 [01:57:08 inaudible]
- 14 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: But we have.
- 15 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: The standards of the DPD are
- 16 really high and we worked for that. And even though the
- 17 young man did show in terms of the academics and the
- 18 agility, there are other things that, you know, I'm
- 19 looking at, but yes, sir. Yes, sir.
- 20 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: The HR lady that we just hired,
- 21 let us know she's here. You hadn't said anything. HR
- 22 lady. I can't say her name.
- 23 MRS. WHITE: Director Patillo.
- 24 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: The vote is
- 25 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Let her have the benediction or



- 1 something. I mean, she's been there for three hours.
- 2 DIRECTOR PATILLO: Through the Chair. If you just
- 3 want my comments.
- 4 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes, please.
- 5 DIR PATILLO: I read the information. I also read
- 6 what the attorney stated, and I would have stood by
- 7 Lieutenant Coles' recommendation of three years. And here
- 8 are the reasons why. When you look at the timeframe that
- 9 the candidate applied, he applied to several different
- 10 police departments, not just the Detroit police. He was
- 11 disqualified from pretty much all of them or not
- 12 selected. In addition to that, the failure of the
- 13 polygraph, the overlapping of the incident, the
- immaturity with the drug, not the drugs, but the alcohol
- and giving alcohol to the youth. So even though he
- 16 submitted the application in 2020, the incidents were
- 17 from 2019, 2015, 16, and 17. One year would not have been
- 18 enough to demonstrate that he had the moral character to
- 19 move forward to the police department. Two years might
- 20 not have worked as well. So three years would have given
- 21 him the opportunity to prove that he has done self-
- 22 improvement and that there are no more incidents. So yes,
- 23 people make mistakes all day long, all the time. But in
- this case, my recommendation would have been three years.
- 25 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Oh, thank you, Ms. Patillo, for



- 1 your comments, and thank you, Reverend Holley,
- 2 Commissioner Holley for suggesting. Now we can move on to
- 3 new business.
- 4 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I got something under
- 5 unfinished business.
- 6 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: To new business. Commissioner
- 7 Burton.
- 8 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I move. I got a few things.
- 9 First motion. I move that we.
- 10 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Let me suggest that Commissioner
- 11 Burton, Commissioner Burton. May we ask for two motions
- 12 from you so that we can get to public comments?
- 13 Madam Chair, I'm duly elected. I've already been
- 14 silenced twice in this meeting today. I'm here to do the
- 15 business of District 5 residents, on behalf of the
- 16 citizens of Detroit. We will not stand down. We will not
- 17 be put out any more meetings. What you have done today -
- 18 you have shut down democracy by silencing District 5
- 19 elected official from speaking during discussion on the
- 20 first motion early today. And you're shutting me down by
- 21 not really allowing me to speak during a later motion.
- 22 And then, later on, you allow me to speak. You know,
- 23 District 5 has had enough of this, but anyway, moving on
- 24 with my motions on the behalf of my constituents in the
- 25 5th District is that I move that we post the Board



- 1 attorney positions, that the Board of Police Commissioner
- 2 to post the Board's attorney position.
- 3 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Second.
- 4 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Discussion, discussion.
- 5 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Commissioner Jones.
- 6 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes. I'm sorry. Commissioner
- 7 Jones.
- 8 COMMISSIONER JONES: Okay, good. This motion comes up
- 9 on a weekly basis. I move that we table this discussion
- 10 for its repetitiveness because it continues to be a
- 11 subject and it's already been ruled in previous meetings.
- 12 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Point of order. He should have
- 13 brought it up under new business every week. Point of
- 14 order.
- 15 COMMISSIONER JONES: You don't want your District
- 16 disenfranchised, but you want --.
- 17 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Burton.
- 18 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Learn how to serve the people.
- 19 COMMISSIONER JONES: You know what, through the
- 20 Chair, can you silence him so I may speak? I have the
- 21 floor.
- 22 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Jones.
- 23 COMMISSIONER JONES: Yes.
- 24 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Would you proceed with your
- 25 motion?



- 1 COMMISSIONER JONES: I move that we table that
- 2 particular motion, simply because it is a repetitive
- 3 motion. It comes up and gets voted down week in, week
- 4 out. We've already gone through all the dynamics of it
- 5 and everything. And it's already been found that the
- 6 motion is not sustainable. So I move that we table the
- 7 discussion.
- 8 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Is there a second?
- 9 COMMISSIONER BROWN: I did second. I don't second his
- 10 motion for tabling. I second Commissioner Burton's
- 11 motion.
- 12 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Is there a second to table?
- 13 COMMISSIONER CARTER: I'll second.
- 14 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay. So we vote. Commissioner
- 15 Brown.
- 16 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Hold on. Which motion are we
- 17 voting on Madam Chair?
- 18 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: We are voting to table your
- 19 motion, Commissioner Burton.
- 20 COMMISSIONER BROWN: My vote is no.
- 21 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Bernard.
- 22 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I pass right now. I'm coming
- 23 back in a minute.
- 24 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: You abstain?
- 25 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: No. I said I pass for the



1 moment. I just want to think about it for a minute. Go to

- 2 the next Commissioner.
- 3 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you. Commissioner Burton.
- 4 COMMISSIONER BURTON: No.
- 5 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Carter.
- 6 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Yes.
- 7 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Davis.
- 8 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: I vote no on this. We should
- 9 have been able to vote on all the table motion that this
- 10 is improper.
- 11 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: So you're voting, what was your
- 12 vote I missed it?
- COMMISSIONER DAVIS: I'm voting against that
- 14 unreasonable table by Jones.
- 15 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: You are voting no, on the table.
- 16 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Yes. I'm voting no on the table.
- 17 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you. Commissioner Jones?
- 18 COMMISSIONER JONES: Yes.
- 19 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Holley.
- 20 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Yes.
- 21 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: And Commissioner Holt, votes yes
- 22 to table? Where are we with that outcome Ms. White,
- 23 please?
- 24 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Commissioner Bernard needs to
- 25 weigh in.



- 1 MRS. WHITE: Excuse me.
- 2 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Bernard, you want us
- 3 to come back to you?
- 4 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I don't think it's a good idea
- 5 to post it right now. So I guess I vote to abstain.
- 6 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Holley, you vote to
- 7 table as well?
- 8 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Yes. So what's the outcome, Ms.
- 9 White?
- 10 MRS. WHITE: Okay. So I've recorded Commissioner
- 11 Bernard's vote as a yes. Is that correct? And if so,
- 12 there are 5 yes votes and 3 no votes. The motion to table
- 13 passed.
- 14 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you.
- 15 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Same thing though,
- 16 COMMISSIONER BURTON: The vote was to abstain.
- 17 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Same thing.
- 18 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: The vote is to table. Can we move
- 19 on, please?
- 20 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Madam Chair. I have another
- 21 motion I'd like to place on the record, under new
- 22 business.
- 23 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I have one comment?
- 24 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes. Commissioner Burton.
- 25 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I'm going to yield to my lady



- 1 Commissioner, which is Commissioner Bernard, and then I
- 2 will come back because she had something she wanted to
- 3 say.
- 4 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Madam Chair, it's that I
- 5 noticed on our agenda that we have the towing and
- 6 recovery services contracts. And I guess there's a
- 7 separate memo from attorney Parrish for the Chief's
- 8 Office. I want us to thoroughly deal with that. I'm going
- 9 to write you something about it because we got the notice
- 10 this week. I haven't had a chance, but I want the Board
- 11 to know that I want us to take back control and power
- 12 over towing. We should never have given it up. It's in
- 13 the charter that it's our responsibility. We have the
- 14 ability to do this. You guys are smart people, business
- 15 people. And so we have the ability to evaluate towing in
- 16 the City of Detroit. We have the ability to issue our RFP
- 17 and for the department, of course, to help us with that
- 18 evaluation. I don't want it in the purchasing department
- 19 of the City of Detroit. We can do this. It's our job.
- 20 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you Commissioner Bernard.
- 21 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Madam Chair, I yield for a
- 22 fellow Commissioner.
- 23 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: You want to pose another motion,
- 24 correct?
- 25 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Yes. Before I post that motion,



- 1 I just want to make it clear that when a Commissioner
- 2 abstains, it counts as a no vote. So that previous motion
- 3 actually failed to table.
- 4 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: No, it didn't.
- 5 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you for the enlightenment.
- 6 I'm sure Ms. White.
- 7 COMMISSIONER BURTON: It is under Robert's Rules of
- 8 Order. You can
- 9 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you, Commissioner Burton. I
- 10 think Ms. White will do research and we need to come
- 11 back.
- 12 COMMISSIONER BURTON: My motion is that the Board,
- 13 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: if you need to come back with.
- 14 COMMISSIONER BURTON: My motion that I'm putting out
- 15 here right now is that I move that we post for a
- 16 parliamentarian for this Board.
- 17 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Second, Lord.
- 18 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Discussion.
- 19 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Yes, Madam Chair, under
- 20 discussion. So that was one of the comments I was going
- 21 to raise. I know it was an ongoing issue that I did ask
- 22 for the research and contracting for a parliamentarian
- 23 back in October of 2020, and the Board staff has not
- 24 brought any information back to the research or the
- 25 contract or anything like that. I believe that's why this



- 1 motion is going forward. If we have any research on that
- 2 on establishing a contract for parliamentarian. And also
- 3 I asked at the last meeting where are we at with
- 4 providing special needs for the hearing impaired, with
- 5 the transcribing at the bottom of the captions at the -
- 6 thank you, Commissioner.
- 7 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay. Commissioner Brown. I'm
- 8 going to ask you to not put that very serious discussion
- 9 with this parliamentarian but we do need to revisit that
- 10 discussion about providing access for the hearing
- 11 impaired.
- 12 COMMISSIONER BROWN: So then that other stuff that I
- 13 talked about was presented to this Board in October, and
- 14 I've heard nothing back yet from the staff as to the
- 15 CHAIPERSON HOLT: Are you talking parliamentarian or
- 16 accidents with the hearing impaired?
- 17 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Parliamentarian.
- 18 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay. Ms. White.
- 19 COMMISSIONER BROWN: October.
- 20 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you.
- 21 MRS. WHITE: Yes. Through the Chair, Honorable Board.
- 22 I have just received some additional information today.
- 23 For some reason, the National Association of
- 24 Parliamentarians has been very busy and they have just
- 25 gotten back to me today regarding whether or not someone



- 1 would be available for that, for the question that you
- 2 pose during October. So I will definitely share that
- 3 information with you and with the rest of the Board so
- 4 that you have that information to make the proper
- 5 decision. But I just received the information just before
- 6 the meeting. So I hadn't had a chance to share it with
- 7 you. Thank you for your patience.
- 8 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Okay. Thank you. Madam Chair,
- 9 just one more thing. With that being said, I would like
- 10 to ask my colleague Commissioner Burton, would he
- 11 consider withdrawing his motion.
- 12 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Are you saying you want
- 13 COMMISSIONER BURTON: No. No.
- 14 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay. All right. Any other
- 15 questions about hiring a parliamentarian?
- 16 COMMISSIONER JONES: Through the Chair?
- 17 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Jones.
- 18 COMMISSIONER JONES: As is widely known already, we
- 19 are already in the middle of budget talks with the City
- 20 Council. We don't know at this particular point if
- 21 they're going to restore a budget for the Board of
- 22 Police, Commissioners if they're going to add to it if
- 23 we're going to be able to fill the positions that we
- 24 would say that had not been filled. People have been not
- officially assigned to certain positions, but they've



- 1 been officially doing the work for a long time right now.
- 2 So I think at this particular time, it's improper to have
- 3 a discussion about a parliamentarian until such time we
- 4 can get an answer with City Council about where our
- 5 budget is going to be at, so we know where we can go with
- 6 this thing?
- 7 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Madam Chairperson, no one's
- 8 suggesting that we have a full-time parliamentarian.
- 9 Parliamentarian like Fletcher Bland, many of you know him
- 10 as a minister and everything he's a renowned
- 11 parliamentarian in this area. He comes in for the
- 12 meeting, he sits through the meeting, that's it. It's
- 13 just a contract issue, a few hundred dollars. It's no big
- 14 deal.
- 15 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: I'm familiar with it.
- 16 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: He's really good.
- 17 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Let's call for the vote, Madam
- 18 Chair.
- 19 COMMISSIONER JONES: Based on the same information I
- 20 would table, I'll make a motion table that discussion
- 21 right now, until such time, we can find out about the
- 22 budget that's sitting before City Council right now.
- 23 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Is there a second?
- 24 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Support.
- 25 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay. We'll take a vote, and we



- 1 are voting on tabling the motion to hire a
- 2 parliamentarian. We are tabling that motion.
- 3 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: No employee.
- 4 COMMISSIONER BROWN: It's just a contract.
- 5 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay.
- 6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: For me.
- 7 COMMISSIONER JONES: And does the volunteer specify
- 8 that they are going to volunteer for the possession.
- 9 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Well, excuse me, I believe we are
- 10 talking to the contrary. So we're going to move on and
- 11 take the vote. Thank you. Commissioner Jones.
- 12 Commissioner Brown.
- 13 COMMISSIONER BROWN: No.
- 14 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Burton.
- 15 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: No.
- 16 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Burton.
- 17 COMMISSIONER BURTON: No.
- 18 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commission Carter.
- 19 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Yes.
- 20 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Davis.
- 21 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: No.
- 22 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Jones.
- 23 COMMISSIONER JONES: Yes.
- 24 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Holley.
- 25 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Yes.



- 1 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: and I vote, yes. So where are we
- on the table, Ms. White?
- 3 MRS. WHITE: There were 4. yes votes and 4 no votes.
- 4 The motion failed.
- 5 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: So the motion to table failed. So
- 6 we're back to contracting a parliamentarian.
- 7 MRS. WHITE: Yes, ma'am.
- 8 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay. Thank you for that. Okay.
- 9 Let's vote on contacting a parliament.
- 10 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Can I have clarification of the
- 11 motion. Is it's a post or a parliamentarian?
- 12 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Lisa would not require a
- 13 posting. It's just like the guy who was our court
- 14 reporter.
- 15 COMMISSIONER CARTER: I'm talking about what
- 16 Commissioner Burton said his motion.
- 17 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: We're following his motion, and
- 18 thank you former Vice-Chair Carter for that
- 19 clarification. So what we're voting on is the posting of
- 20 the parliamentarian position.
- 21 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: You're saying as a job,
- 22 MRS. WHITE: Burton.
- 23 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: We are voting on the
- 24 Commissioner's motion to post for parliamentarian.
- 25 Commissioner Brown.



- 1 COMMISSIONER BROWN. Yes.
- 2 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Bernard.

3

- 4 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Yes. If it's just for the
- 5 meetings for the 50 meetings a year, they come in and
- 6 they go out. Right. I don't have a problem with that, a
- 7 few hundred dollars.
- 8 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: It's posting, Linda, he's
- 9 talking about posting, not a contract.
- 10 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Then I won't have any money.
- 11 Then I vote no. I'm sorry. I misunderstood. I thought we
- 12 were talking apples and oranges, I was.
- 13 MRS. WHITE: Through the Chair.
- 14 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: I'm sorry, Ms. White.
- 15 MRS. WHITE: Okay. Honorable Board. If I may ask if
- 16 at all possible if only one speaker can speak at a time
- 17 so that we can make sure we're properly recording the
- 18 exact wording of the motion. And so what we have
- 19 recorded, Commissioner Burton's motion was to post for
- 20 the position of a parliamentarian. And that would require
- 21 a full-time status versus contracting. So that's the
- 22 motion on the table at the time to post for the position
- 23 of parliamentarian, which there is no position, but that
- 24 was his motion.
- 25 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Are we clear on the posting, are



- 1 we clear?
- 2 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Yes, ma'am.
- 3 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Friendly amendment.
- 4 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: We are into voting. We have got a
- 5 no from Commissioner Brown. A yes from Commissioner
- 6 Bernard.
- 7 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: A no.
- 8 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: You want a no.
- 9 MRS. WHITE: Through the Chair, there was a yes from
- 10 Commissioner Brown and a no from Commissioner Bernard.
- 11 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Well, I need to get the tally.
- 12 Okay.
- 13 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Can we start this voting
- 14 process over?
- 15 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Burton? Commissioner
- 16 Burton. What's your vote on posting the position?
- 17 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Yes, to post.
- 18 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Carter.
- 19 COMMISSIONER CARTER: No.
- 20 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Davis.
- 21 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Yes. You should have a contract
- 22 service for parliamentarian.
- 23 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Is not the motion, man? It's
- 24 not the motion.
- 25 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: I know --



- 1 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Alright, gentlemen. Let's move on.
- 2 Commissioner Jones.
- 3 COMMISSIONER JONES: No.
- 4 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Surprise.
- 5 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner. Holley.
- 6 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Another surprise, no.
- 7 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Surprise. Surprise. What's the
- 8 vote outcome?
- 9 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: The same thing.
- 10 MRS. WHITE: Through the Chair. There were 3 yes
- 11 votes and 5 no votes. The motion failed.
- 12 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you.
- 13 MRS. WHITE: Madam Chair.
- 14 COMMISSIONER BURTON: My last motion of the day,
- 15 Madam Chair, my last motion of the day.
- 16 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Burton, we're going
- 17 to move on.
- 18 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Madam Chair, I'm going to do
- 19 the business of District 5 residents. I'm putting motions
- 20 out here on behalf of the concerns of the citizens that
- 21 live in the 5th District.
- 22 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Then you need to go to City
- 23 Council.
- 24 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Burton, there are a
- 25 lot of persons who are waiting to express themselves



- 1 about this meeting.
- 2 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Madam Chair.
- 3 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: And Commissioner Burton, we're
- 4 going to go on, we're going to go on.
- 5 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Madam Chair, I call that we
- 6 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Announcements.
- 7 COMMISSIONER BURTON: That we ban the facial
- 8 recognition software technology.
- 9 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: And now we're going to move on.
- 10 COMMISSIONER JONES: Through the Chair, I have an
- 11 announcement.
- 12 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes. Thank you.
- 13 COMMISSIONER JONES: Thank you, Chair. Fellow
- 14 Commissioners and our public listening audience or
- 15 whatever. I have a walk that's supposed to take place.
- 16 It's a walk for justice that's going to be this Saturday
- 17 at 9:00 am down on the Riverwalk. This is right at
- 18 Atwater and Rivard by the Merry go Round. This basically
- 19 has to do with families of victims that have to succumb
- 20 to gun violence in the City of Detroit. So if you've lost
- 21 a loved one through gun violence or whatever, you're
- 22 going to be able to come down, you're going to be able to
- 23 walk. You're going to have homicide detectives that are
- 24 going to be able to be there and maybe have, perhaps be
- 25 able to answer some of the questions that you might have



- 1 in the event that your case is not closed, it's still
- 2 open.
- 3 COMMISSIONER JONES: So we are going to have people
- 4 available for you to talk to. We're going to have other
- 5 parents and family members that understand your story.
- 6 They understand the pain that you've been in for the
- 7 past, how many ever years has it been since you lost your
- 8 loved one? So we would like to invite you to come down at
- 9 9:00 am on the Riverwalk, right at Rivard and Atwater to
- 10 be able to come, participate, talk to other persons that
- 11 have suffered the same kind of issues in the City of
- 12 Detroit. We want you to come down, we are going to have
- 13 homicide detectives that are going to be available for
- 14 you to speak with, and I'm going to be speaking myself
- 15 personally. This is sponsored through Ms. Ringle. This is
- in honor of the Natalia Ringle Foundation, which she's
- 17 established for her son who was murdered not too long
- 18 ago, probably about a year and a half.
- 19 COMMISSIONER JONES: So we invite you to come down.
- 20 We want you to bring your masks. Social distancing has to
- 21 be a must because we're want to stay safe for everyone,
- 22 but we want to give you the opportunity to be able to
- 23 reach out and also get the information that you need.
- We're going to have information on counseling. We're
- 25 going to have information on other resources that you



- 1 might need to help you with your grief and your pain. So
- 2 again, I invite you on April 3rd, Saturday morning,
- 3 Atwater and Rivard right by the Merry go Round and
- 4 refreshment, stand and on the Riverwalk in Detroit. And I
- 5 thank you for your participation.
- 6 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you, Commissioner Jones.
- 7 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Announcement.
- 8 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes, Commissioner Davis.
- 9 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Tomorrow morning, I'll be at the
- 10 Sam River show, 9:10 am from 9 to 11. Tune in. We'll be
- 11 talking about many topics.
- 12 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you. If there are no more
- 13 announcements, Mr. Brown.
- MR. ROB BROWN: Yes, Madam Chair. These are the times
- 15 and dates for your next BOPC virtual meetings. April 8th,
- 16 2021 at three o'clock with the 11th Precinct being the
- 17 presenter, and the following week, the next meeting would
- 18 be April 15, 2021 at 3:00 pm. And with that Madam Chair,
- 19 I go right into public comments. I currently have 10
- 20 speakers. I'll call them by 3. Your first speaker will be
- 21 District 4, Community Advisory Chairman Scottie Bowman,
- 22 followed by Ms. Bernice Smith, followed by Ms. Parnell.
- 23 Mr. Bowman.
- MR. BOWMAN: Hello?
- MR. ROB BROWN: Yes sir, I can hear you.



- 1 MR. BOWMAN: Hello.
- 2 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: We can hear you.
- 3 MR. BOWMAN: Okay. I start, okay. A warrant is a
- 4 permission slip to enter the home. The person being
- 5 served must have an opportunity to inspect the warrant
- 6 before an officer may lawfully enter. We don't need the
- 7 MSP coming into neighborhoods and killing more of our
- 8 youth for traffic violations.
- 9 MR. BOWMAN: What's Chairman Bell's excuse for
- 10 telling a resident he can only make one complaint against
- 11 the DPD. I see Chairman Bell's puppet, Annie Holt has
- 12 made her authoritarian mentor proud by silencing the
- 13 voice of the 5th District. It looks like the DPDs
- 14 favorite violent criminal Duane Jones is finishing his
- 15 probation. On March 23rd a motion in order for discharge
- 16 from probation was generated. What's up with his motion
- 17 for a hearing with Vanessa Bryant on Monday, April 12th
- 18 at 11:30 am. Jones should have been in jail and fired,
- 19 not rewarded with a promotion. Is it better to beat up a
- 20 hospital patient than violate the unconstitutional
- 21 drinking age? Since the felony charges were dismissed
- 22 without prejudice, let's go back to those. Meanwhile, his
- 23 victim Shelley Smith lives as a 21st-century slave she's
- 24 kept prisoner and kept away from her family to land the
- 25 pockets of serial quardianship abuser. Mary Rowan.



- 1 Justice for Shelby. Detroit lives matter.
- 2 MR. ROB BROWN: Ms. Bernie Smith.
- 3 MS. SMITH: Good afternoon to the Commissioners.
- 4 Today was the most horrible day or one of the most
- 5 horrible days that the Commissioners have come before the
- 6 public. I can't even get upset because it is so horrible
- 7 that you were supposed to be intelligent people that
- 8 represent the Detroit Police Commission. You're the worse
- 9 you and 5. I'm going to make it my business to see how
- 10 the District of 5 is. I was in 6, but I think I'm going
- 11 to move in 5 so I can help the people get a decent
- 12 representation when they come before the Board meetings.
- 13 It is horrible. And I cannot imagine that it can continue
- 14 to go on the way it's going on. You don't let anybody
- 15 speak. You're disrespectful to each other, and you cannot
- 16 possibly think that you're doing a good thing when you
- 17 represent the people here in Detroit. It's horrible and
- 18 it's not getting any better each week it gets worse and
- 19 worse. And your representative from 5, I'm going to see
- 20 where the boundary is, because if you're going to run
- 21 again, I'm going to make sure somebody runs against you
- 22 because I don't want you to represent us anymore. Whether
- 23 we in 5, 6, or whatever, because you are a disgrace to
- 24 this Commission and no way in the world that we should
- 25 tolerate how you have outbursts, you disrespect each



- 1 other, and it's just terrible. You need to get off. You
- 2 don't know how you sound. You need to get off. Again, get
- 3 your shots and take care of yourselves because we need to
- 4 be healthy. We need to wear our masks. I bless all of you
- 5 because you need blessings. Holley, you need to pray more
- 6 about the members of your Board, because they need the
- 7 prayers. You do not respect each other like decent,
- 8 respectful people. And it's a dishonor to listen to you
- 9 each week. Take care. Bye.
- 10 MR. ROB BROWN: Miss Parnell.
- MS. PARNELL: Oh, I don't have anything to say today.
- 12 Thank you.
- MR. ROB BROWN: Okay. Madam Chair, your next three
- 14 speakers will be Minister Eric Blunt, followed by a POW
- 15 Morrison, followed by Overwhip.
- 16 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you, Mr. Brown.
- 17 MINISTER BLUNT: Can you hear me, Board?
- 18 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Yes we can.
- 19 MINISTER BLUNT: Yes. I am Minister Eric Blunt from
- 20 Sacred Heart Catholic Church in Detroit. Again this week,
- 21 at least the first hour is used for crime and crime
- 22 prevention discussion. If not elected to this Board, I
- 23 would request a Sergeant of arms with the ability to stop
- 24 the progress of this meeting. If any comment or question
- 25 is not directly related to police misconduct. In this



- 1 role, I will stop the Chief of Police from speaking on
- 2 crime or crime prevention and only be able to speak on
- 3 police misconduct. Last week, the obvious corruption of
- 4 voting was maddening. When appointee Holt had to remind
- 5 appointee Jones that he did not vote as instructed.
- 6 MINISTER BLUNT: I hate to describe it this way, but
- 7 in the 5 years, I've regularly attended these meetings. I
- 8 have never witnessed the Chairperson of this Commission,
- 9 in this case, an appointee, ask another Commissioner, in
- 10 this case, an appointee if they voted as they intended.
- 11 And when Commissioner Davis called out this corruption,
- 12 he was ignored and shut down. I do agree with Twanda
- 13 Petty's analysis that this city does not allow any other
- 14 opportunity for citizens to express their concerns of
- 15 crime to DPD leadership. So citizens and Commissioners on
- 16 this Board are basically forced to hijack the purpose of
- 17 this Board to express their concerns about crime. In
- 18 regards to the warrant policy Commissioner Bernard had
- 19 stated clearly previously that the police word is always
- 20 accepted as the truth. With that in mind, all warrants
- 21 should be very, very suspicious. Lastly, the lack of a
- 22 parliamentarian is a major problem with the function of
- 23 this Board, Mrs. White is not a certified
- 24 parliamentarian. So her opinion is only an opinion and
- 25 should not be accepted as an official statement. The



- 1 motions to post an attorney position is repetitive but
- 2 necessary. Again, the city's corporate counsel cannot be
- 3 prosecuting attorneys and defense attorneys. This is a
- 4 clear conflict of interest in clear and present danger to
- 5 this society. I yield my time.
- 6 MR. BROWN: Over With.
- 7 OVER WITH: Yeah, Chairman Willie Bell, this is
- 8 Reuben Crowley calling you. Lawrence Akbar is trying to
- 9 reach you to determine whether or not he can accept some
- 10 complaints from me over the OCI. I kind of inform him
- 11 that he doesn't have action as to whether or not to make
- 12 a complaint, but he feels as though he needs to get
- 13 approval from his bosses over the sir, we're not taking
- 14 any more complaints from you, that's period. Why not, is
- 15 there a reason? Yes, sir. There are no more complaints
- 16 that we can take from you. I have three other complaints
- 17 that are separate and aside and aside from the complaints
- 18 that I previously filed. Thank you. You can't just do
- 19 this Willie Bell, who do you think you're dealing with,
- 20 man. I ain't no joke, jack. I'm the real deal, man, With
- 21 all due respect, sir, I'm going to ask you to stand down,
- 22 to move out the way. Kenesha Coleman's murder is going to
- 23 be addressed, sir. I don't know what you guys think that
- 24 you're going to do, but I'm not --, I'm different. I have
- 25 means, resources, and ways of dealing with situations



- 1 like this, and what I'm saying is, hey, let the OCI do
- 2 it's mandated charter jobs Sir, there is nothing else
- 3 that I say to you, so I'm going to end this call, thank
- 4 you. You can tell the truth.
- 5 MR. ROB BROWN: Madam Chair, your next three speakers
- 6 will be Ciera Garrett followed by Brenda Hill, followed
- 7 by Vanessa, Bryant, followed by the Miscellaneous.
- 8 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you, Mr. Brown.
- 9 MR. ROB BROWN: Ms. Garrett.
- MR. CROWLEY: Give me the phone. Hey, what' you just
- 11 heard was it tape of Willie Bell.
- MR. ROB BROWN: That was Mr. Crowley again, Madam
- 13 Chair. We'll go to Ms. Hill.
- 14 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you.
- MS. HILL: Hello.
- 16 MR. ROB BROWN: Yes.
- 17 MR. CROWLEY: You don't need to mute me. You need to
- 18 listen to what I'm talking about and everybody.
- 19 MR. ROB BROWN: Ms. Hill?
- MS. HILL: Yes.
- 21 MR. CROWLEY: You don't need to mute me. You need to
- 22 listen. It's clear that you people are on to --
- 23 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Madam Chair. I called that we
- 24 listen to what the gentleman has to say. This is what
- 25 these Board meetings are all about, hearing from our



- 1 constituents.
- 2 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Mr. Brown.
- 3 MR. ROB BROWN: Yes.
- 4 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Are we having one person come in
- 5 at 3 different times?
- 6 MR. CROWLEY: You keep muting me and I'm still going
- 7 to come. At some point, you're going to have to deal with
- 8 the fact that the court is being ruled by.
- 9 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Can we please let this
- 10 gentleman speak, Madam Chair.
- 11 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay. Mr. Brown has not that
- 12 person spoken twice.
- MR. CROWLEY: No, I have not spoken.
- MR. ROB BROWN: Yes, he spoke already.
- 15 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Can we hear what he has to say,
- 16 Madam Chair.
- MR. CROWLEY: I haven't spoken.
- 18 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Mr. Brown.
- 19 MR. ROB BROWN: Yes.
- 20 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Can we move on, please?
- MR. CROWLEY: I haven't spoken. That was someone else
- 22 using my device. Please do not mute me again.
- 23 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Let's please hear from this
- 24 gentleman, Madam Chair.
- 25 COMMISSIONER JONES: Through the Chair. He's had his



- 1 two minutes. We listened to his recordings and we
- 2 listened to his voice. Can we please move on.
- 3 MR. CROWLEY: I demand to be heard.
- 4 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Mr. Brown.
- 5 MR. ROB BROWN. Yes Ma'am. I can't control his mike.
- 6 MR. CROWLEY: It's only proper that I be allowed to
- 7 speak.
- 8 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Mr. Brown, can you hear me.
- 9 MR. ROB BROWN: I can hear you, Madam Chair.
- 10 MR. CROWLEY: What I'm saying is words. Again, please
- 11 allow me to speak. What I'm trying to do is put it out
- 12 there, sort of public knows. Can I be heard? I want to
- 13 put it out there so the public knows what's been going
- on. None of the Board members have received any of the
- 15 hundreds of messages that I sent to them. Melanie White,
- if you go to the Detroit Unity's Facebook page, you will
- 17 listen to the conversations that I've had with Tiffany
- 18 Stewart, Melanie White, Jonya Underwood, Willie Bell, and
- 19 you, it's disturbing, what is going on, on the Board of
- 20 Police Commissioners is reprehensible. Todd Bettison, you
- 21 are here now, you're present. The question I've been
- 22 trying to get to you and ask you. You won't accept my
- 23 phone calls, but the thing I want to know is what date
- 24 the matter was of deemed civil for case (191) 111-0221.
- 25 You have dodged me now enough. Please answer the question



- 1 before this meeting is ended. What date was the matter,
- 2 deemed civil? That's the one question I need to know that
- 3 will conclude my investigation into the DPD, the OCI, and
- 4 the BOPC. And a minute to answer that question, it will
- 5 be demonstrated that you know, what's going to be
- 6 demonstrated. Please answer the question. You know the
- 7 date because you've been avoiding the issue.
- 8 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Mr. Brown.
- 9 MR. BROWN: Yes. Ma'am.
- 10 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Do we have a clock on him, I
- 11 didn't see the clock.
- 12 ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: Ms. Holt.
- 13 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes, sir.
- 14 ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: Just for the community
- 15 with Mr. Crowley. His case is civil. We sent him a letter
- 16 and Mr. Crowley is upset because.
- MR. CROWLEY: No, I am not upset.
- 18 ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: We looked into it. When we
- 19 looked into it, it was deemed civil and he wants us to
- 20 take something to the civil and move it into the criminal
- 21 arena. I do not have the power to do it and know that our
- 22 people have looked into it. They will deemed it civil as
- 23 well. So if the AG looks into it, or whoever looks into
- 24 it, it's civil. And that's what it is.
- 25 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you, AC Bettison.



- 1 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Mr. Brown, are you having problems
- 2 muting him because he has his two minutes.
- 3 MR. ROB BROWN: Yes. I'm having problems.
- 4 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Madam Chair. I do have a
- 5 concern. If the gentleman said he wrote all these letters
- 6 to all the Commissioners, how come we have not received
- 7 these letters? This gentleman said he has written to the
- 8 Board.
- 9 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Burton. I think we
- 10 heard what he said. So we can, if you feel necessary, we
- 11 can explore the accusations that he's making. Now. Mr.
- 12 Brown, can we move on?
- MR. ROB BROWN: Yes, ma'am.
- 14 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you.
- 15 MR. ROB BROWN: Ms. Hill.
- MS. HILL: Yes, I mean this whole piece with Mr.
- 17 Crowley is a big, big problem. You all need to get
- 18 together and get it together because this is becoming a
- 19 nuisance as well as a problem. And if you all can't mute
- 20 or unmute people, I mean, that's a problem as well. I
- 21 just wanted to talk about a story with it's something
- 22 going on with the screen. Yes, about the sex trafficking
- 23 and AC Bettison. About two years ago, I'm with a group
- that mentors girls, we have a broth on. It was well over
- 25 200 young ladies under the age of 17 at Don Bosco Hall.



- 1 And another lady who is in her twenties came in and said,
- 2 she's been sex trafficked. And so I called AC Bettison.
- 3 He sent over some police officers and ultimately an
- 4 officer from the State came Officer Williams.

5

- 6 MS. HILL: But these guys came to that event and they
- 7 came with guns, they came with several people to try to
- 8 get this girl out, which put our girls that were there at
- 9 that event at risk. They were going to these lengths. And
- 10 since we would not allow them in, they sent in an older
- 11 lady they went and got an older lady to come into the
- 12 event to try to get this lady out of here. And I'm
- 13 telling you this story and the police officers who
- 14 ultimately came did not have the training to handle a sex
- 15 trafficking event, a situation because they ended up
- 16 dropping the lady taking her away, but dropping her off
- 17 at a bus stop. And then the officer from the State came
- 18 and explained to us. And so, you know, I always think, AC
- 19 Bederson, and I'm glad to see your face after this long
- 20 period of time that this could happen anywhere. And they
- 21 sent out so many people to try to get this girl out of
- 22 here. And this was a four-hour event and on and on and
- 23 on. So sex trafficking is not something that does not
- 24 need our attention. It absolutely does need our
- 25 attention. We had over 200 girls that were at risk. These



- 1 people had no problem. They were not scared to do what
- 2 they
- 3 MR. ROB BROWN: Miscellaneous.
- 4 VANESSA BRYANT: Hello. My question was answered
- 5 during the discussion on human trafficking. But I would
- 6 like to say that I recognize that Ashton's run. I, and as
- 7 a representative of District 5, I think we should all try
- 8 to refrain from taking these things personally. You can't
- 9 discuss issues that are important to the citizens of the
- 10 City of Detroit if it keeps degenerating into the
- 11 personal, and that's all I wanted to say. Thank you very
- 12 much for your time Commissioners and you all have a good
- 13 day.
- MR. ROB BROWN: Madam Chair, your next two speakers
- 15 would be Lenovo followed by Mac Farr. Lenovo. I'll go to
- 16 Mac Farr.
- MR. FARR: Thank you. Yes. My name is Mac Farr. I
- 18 would like to take this opportunity to thank Assistant
- 19 Chief Todd Bettison for his work with the Pingree Park
- 20 Association to begin reducing drag racing. Their actions
- 21 have contributed to a noticeable decline in the number of
- 22 drag racing incidents. While there is still a lot to do,
- 23 this is at least the beginning. Additionally, I would
- 24 like to continue to impress upon the Detroit Police
- 25 Department, the Board of Police Commissioners, the need



- 1 for the approval of, in particular, have stop sticks, a
- 2 tactical demobilization device that can help deter the
- 3 greatest number of illegal racing vehicles, particularly
- 4 as it gets warmer. Further, the last time I appeared at
- 5 this meeting, Commissioners Holley and Burch directed
- 6 Commission staff to reach out to the Pingree Park
- 7 Association. Unfortunately, that never happened.
- 8 Additionally, despite having reached out to the Board of
- 9 Police Commissioner staff, asking for that to happen in
- 10 addition to asking staff, to connect us with our own
- 11 Commissioner Willie Burton that has also not happened. To
- 12 summarize, we thank the Detroit Police Department for
- 13 their initial response to our request, to reduce drag
- 14 racing.
- 15 MR. FARR: And we look forward to working with the
- 16 Board of Police Commissioners and the Detroit Police
- 17 Department to roll out our stop sticks this summer.
- 18 Lastly, I would like to speak to the conduct of my own
- 19 Police Commissioner, Willie Burton. Sir, you do not
- 20 represent District 5. You do a very poor job of making
- 21 our voices heard. Your own tactics, the tone, your own
- 22 apparent instability makes it clear that you do not serve
- 23 District 5 well. If there is anybody that is doing
- 24 District 5, a disservice, it is you. Thank you.
- MR. ROB BROWN: Madam Chair, We are going back to



- 1 Lenovo and see if that person is there.
- 2 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Madam Chair, if they're not,
- 3 may I ask Reverend Holley to come on right now, this is,
- 4 I just have a comment it's Holy week, obviously, and Good
- 5 Friday is tomorrow.
- 6 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you Commissioner Bernard
- 7 What were you saying, Mr. Brown?
- 8 MR. ROB BROWN: I have one more speaker, but that
- 9 person is there, but they won't unmute themselves. So
- 10 it's your call? That was going to be your last speaker.
- 11 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay. Thank you. Mr. Brown.
- 12 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Madam Chair.
- 13 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes, Ma'am.
- 14 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Just in the spirit of this
- 15 season, Reverend Holley, I'm asking for your blessing for
- 16 all of us, if that's okay with the Board. It's very
- important. This is Holy Week and it's important to me.
- 18 I'm Catholic, but that's irrelevant. And I just want to
- 19 wish everyone, a very happy Easter and a joyful Easter
- 20 and a wonderful time with your family. And tomorrow, of
- 21 course, Good. Friday is a day that I'm depressed, at
- least from 12 to 3. So if you don't mind, Madam Chair, if
- 23 that's okay with the rest of the Board, I just think we
- 24 should acknowledge Easter Week, Good Friday, and Holy
- 25 Week.



- 1 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you, Commissioner Bernard.
- 2 Commissioner Holley, how do you feel?
- 3 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: I'm fine, thank you.
- 4 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: How about doing the prayer?
- 5 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: I'm sad.
- 6 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: I think he understood my comment.
- 7 Commissioner Davis. Thank you Commissioner Holley.
- 8 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: You ready?
- 9 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes, sir.
- 10 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Eternal God, we are so grateful
- and so thankful. You've been so good to each and every
- one of us. We thank you for what you have done and we
- 13 recognize this Holy Week. We thank you so much for what
- 14 you've done for humanity. The dying, going to the cross,
- 15 dying, and rising again on Easter Sunday is a
- 16 resurrection weekend. We thank you for reconciling this
- 17 relationship with God and mankind. We ask in the mighty
- 18 name of Jesus that we go forward in unity and look back
- 19 over our lives and to see how grateful we are to be
- 20 coming through this pandemic, and we are still here. For
- 21 that we say, thank you. Thank you for just allowing us to
- 22 recognize this Holy Weekend. Let us do everything we can
- 23 to be Holy and to be loving and to be supportive of each
- other in the precious name of our Lord and Savior, Jesus
- 25 Christ. Amen.
