1 Chief of Police Craig, and she is also - okay, I do see  
2 her now. And also Honorable Board, you have received  
3 various email correspondence, documentation, mailed items  
4 this week. So please check your packet for that  
5 information. And if you have any additional questions,  
6 please feel free to let me know. And now, Chairperson  
7 Bell. Thank you.

8 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, Ms. White. I'm going to  
9 call the meeting to order. First and foremost, I want to  
10 thank my Vice-Chair Annie Holt for hosting them, chairing  
11 the meeting for the last two weeks. My understanding is  
12 that you did an excellent job and I want to thank her for  
13 -- during my absence. So I appreciate that. Before we  
14 call for the invocation by Chaplain Morris, I'm going to  
15 ask for a moment of silence for Sergeant Elaine Williams'  
16 family, Skylar Herbert's family, and the passing of Ray  
17 Solomon's family. Could we have a moment of silence then  
18 we go into invocation, please?

19 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Amen. Chaplain.

20 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Mr. Chair, is that the Ray  
21 Solomon over in District 3?

22 CHAIRPERSON BELL: That is the one and only Ray  
23 Solomon.

24 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Okay. I didn't hear about that.

25 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I didn't hear about that.

1 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I'll elaborate a little bit later.

2 MRS. WHITE: Chaplain Morris.

3 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: He was the the District manager.

4 COMMISSIONER CARTER: He's Ray Solomon senior.

5 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I will elaborate a little bit  
6 later, so let's move to invocation, please.

7 CHAPLAIN MORRIS: Lord God of grace, we just thank  
8 you. Heavenly father. We thank you for this day, which  
9 you have made. Lord God continue to give us the ability  
10 to rejoice and be glad, but have only fatherly come to

21 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, Chaplain Morris. The  
22 next order of business will be - one second, introduction  
23 of the Commissioners. District 1. District 2.

24 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Good afternoon, everyone  
25 attorney Linda Bernard for District 2. Yours for peace

1 and justice.

2 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 3:

3 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Good afternoon, everyone. I'm  
4 Commissioner Shirley Burch of the famous District 3. I  
5 just wanted to say love and respect where you live.

6 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 4. Bell, present.

7 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 5.

8 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Commissioner Willie Burton  
9 present.

10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. District 6.

11 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Good afternoon, everyone. Lisa  
12 Carter, District 6.

13 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. District 7.

14 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Police Commissioner William M.  
15 Davis. District 7. Love where you work, officers.

16 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. At-Large Commissioner  
17 Hernandez.

18 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Good afternoon, everyone.  
19 Jesus Hernandez, At-Large.

20 CHAIRPERSON BELL: At large, Commissioner Jones.

21 COMMISSIONER JONES: Good afternoon, everyone. I'm  
22 Detroit Police Commissioner, Martin Jones, being excited  
23 about the winds of change. The positive winds of change  
24 that have blown in our community.

25 CHAIRPERSON BELL: At-Large Commissioner Holley.

1 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: I don't know how to follow  
2 this. Reverend Holley, present.

3 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, sir.

4 MRS. WHITE: Madam Vice-Chair.

5 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I'm sorry. What happened to the  
6 Vice-Chair's name on this list? Vice-Chair Holt.

7 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: They thought I was going to be  
8 absent today.

9 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I noticed you earlier, but you got  
10 left off the list, but my apologies, but

11 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: That's quite okay. Good afternoon.  
12 Yes. I'm Annie May Holt. I'm Vice-Chair, Commissioner At-  
13 Large. And I'm impressed with the subtitles that are  
14 coming up here. Melanie, you guys have it going on.

15 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you.

16 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: You're welcome.

17 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: We're inspired by Commissioner  
18 Burch.

19 COMMISSIONER BURCH: I didn't hear you. What did you  
20 say, Ms. Bernard.

21 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: We were inspired by you.

22 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Oh, bless your heart. I love to  
23 inspire people, yes.

24 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay. The next item would be the  
25 approval of agenda for April 8th, meeting the agenda



1 April 8th meeting.

2 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: I move that we approve the agenda  
3 for the April 8th meeting.

4 COMMISSIONER JONES: Support.

5 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Second.

6 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Discussion. Those in favor, Aye.

7 ALL: Aye.

8 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Those opposed. Motion carries.  
9 Approval of the Minutes for April 1st. Are there any  
10 addition or correction to the Minutes from April 1st,  
11 2021? Hearing none, a voice for support?

12 COMMISSIONER JONES: Support.

13 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Aye.

14 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Aye.

15 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Been properly moved and supported  
16 and any nays? The Minutes carry, thank you.

17 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: So far, so good.

18 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you.

19 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Keep praying Reverend.

20 CHAIRPERSON BELL: We move on to Ms. White, our  
21 Interim Board, Secretary, introduction of the staff,  
22 please.

23 MRS. WHITE: Yes, sir. Through the Chair, the  
24 Department of Innovation and Technology is monitoring and  
25 recording the Board meeting today. Our court reporter is

1 Mr. Don Handyside and the following Board staff members  
2 are in attendance, Mr. Robert Brown, Administrative  
3 Specialist, Ms. Theresa Blossom, Community Relations  
4 Coordinator, Ms. Jonya Underwood, Administrative  
5 Assistant Investigator, Tiffany Stewart, Director Katrina  
6 Patillo representing Police HR Division, Interim Chief  
7 Investigator Lawrence Akbar, Supervising Investigator  
8 Ansley Cromwell, Supervising Investigator LiSonya Sloan,  
9 Senior Investigator Rosalia Madrigal and Assistant  
10 Corporation Counsel. Erica Savage Whitley are all present  
11 today, Honorable Board. And just to note as indicated by  
12 Madam Vice-Chair, the closed caption feature is activated  
13 today. And this was due to the request made by  
14 Commissioner Holley and also mentioned by Commissioner  
15 Brown and the Honorable Board. So thank you, Honorable  
16 Board for that. Thank you.

17 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Sitting in for Chief  
18 Craig is Deputy Chief Elaine Bryant. I will ask her to  
19 introduce herself and give her proper title, what  
20 authority she has when in the department please.

21 DEPUTY CHIEF BRYANT: Through the Chair, Deputy  
22 Chief, Elaine Bryant neighborhood policing Bureau city.  
23 And on behalf of Chief James Craig, I know that Director,  
24 Chris Graveline, Professional Standards Bureau is on.  
25 Deputy Chief Grant Ha, Legal Advisor, Commander Constant

1 Slappy, 11th Precinct, Captain Kimberly Blackwell, 11th  
2 Precinct and Captain Michael Parrish assigned to  
3 Operation Support. I'm not sure who else is on the line.  
4 Thank you.

5 MRS. WHITE: Through the Chair, I do see just a few  
6 more DPD executives, Captain Eric Tosqui, Captain Derek  
7 May, Captain Lena Liddell, Captain Michael Parrish,  
8 Captain Newson, Commander Decker, Commander Kyra Joy  
9 Hope, Detective Peterson and Lieutenant Frisdon and  
10 Deputy Chief Grant Ha, which I believe was mentioned  
11 earlier, but these are, in reviewing the attendees list.  
12 And that's what I see at this time. Thank you.

13 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, Ms. White. My  
14 understanding is that we have - I'm sorry, -- just one  
15 more second, please. Let's recognize any elected  
16 officials or representatives of elected officials.

17 MRS. WHITE: Yes. Through the Chair Ms. Kim Jackson,  
18 president of the 11th Precinct Police Community Relations  
19 Divisions is also present.

20 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. I guess Ms. Jackson is  
21 a special invited guest of the 11th Precinct the is  
22 reporting out though Commander Slappy. Kim Jackson is a  
23 mainstay with the 11th Precinct and I have interacted  
24 with her over the years. So we thank you for her  
25 attendance and her involvement longstanding.

1 MRS. WHITE: Through the Chair.

2 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes. Ma'am.

3 MRS. WHITE: Mr. Chair. Yes, sir. I do also have  
4 notification that State Representative Cynthia J. Johnson  
5 was here briefly and will likely return, also Ms. Marie  
6 Overall of State Representative Carter's Office is  
7 present. Community Advisory Council Chair, Scotty Bowman  
8 is here and also Police Commissioner Brown has now joined  
9 the meeting. Thank you.

10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Ms. White. Thank you,  
11 Commissioner Brown for your attendance. I'm not making up  
12 for two weeks but I do have something to say a little bit  
13 longer than what I normally would say, but I would like  
14 to open up by saying I always believe that ultimatum, if  
15 people are paying attention, then we get good government  
16 and good leadership, dated 9/17/ 2019, former president  
17 Obama. This past week, we were faced with a few sad  
18 moments in time. The press conference regarding the re  
19 lease of Eddie Johnson and support for Sergeant Elaine  
20 Williams, the dedication of the Skylar Room at Detroit  
21 Public Safety Headquarters also honoring the life of  
22 Skylar Herbert that 5-year young girl, and they said she  
23 was a young lady with her parents in celebration of that  
24 room, just on Monday, I'm sorry, on Wednesday. I just  
25 want to say that - I get my days confused, but then also

1 the passing of Ray Solomon, Senior. Ray Solomon is known  
2 that the godfather in this community for many, many  
3 years. He served in so many capacities from president of  
4 election, State Senate, you name it. He was a godfather  
5 to so many people and his present job was working on  
6 behalf of Council President Brenda Jones. As you know  
7 Brenda Jones in terms of rolling out the community, he  
8 was always there with her staff in terms of various  
9 activities. So I'm just so proud. I knew Ray over the  
10 years and we just asked a blessing on all these families,  
11 which we did a silent prayer for, lift them up as we go  
12 forward.

13 CHAIRPERSON BELL: These experiences remind us how  
14 precious life is and that we are our brothers and sisters  
15 keepers. We are here to make our community and the world  
16 a better and a safer place. Dr. Martin Luther King would  
17 say, let us be reminded that what affects one directly  
18 affects all indirectly. Just some updates. We have  
19 previously honored the life of Sergeant Elaine Williams  
20 by approving a Resolution in 2019 celebrating her life  
21 and legacy. We continue to do that. So now we are  
22 thankful for her life, service, leadership and commitment  
23 to Detroit Police Department in the City of Detroit. You  
24 would probably have the details already. A prayer service  
25 at Public Safety building tomorrow morning, on Friday

1 morning. I think it is 11 o'clock, if not, the correct  
2 information will be shared with you. Next week, we will  
3 introduced a resolution supporting the renaming of the  
4 Michigan Room to the Skylar Room to honor her life and  
5 contribution.

6 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Also present a resolution plaque  
7 to her mother and father as we continue to offer our  
8 support. We continue to keep her parents, Ebbie and  
9 Lavondria Herbert, and all the Skylar family, and friends  
10 in our thoughts and prayers. That was a very, very  
11 impressive service to change the name and with her  
12 parents and all the DPD and the executives and others  
13 attending. So we looking forward to, as we return  
14 sometime in the summer or whatever, it will no longer be  
15 the Michigan Room, but there will be a plaque in her  
16 honor. I'd hope that we have the love and respect that  
17 her life was displayed in terms of mom sharing her death  
18 with so many folks who have celebrate it even today, from  
19 all over the country, they are sending them cards of  
20 condolences of that type of appreciation. It takes a  
21 unique mom and dad to witness that and share that with  
22 others.

23 CHAIRPERSON BELL: They stated that her room is still  
24 the same a year later. So, you know, that is a process  
25 every day they have to deal with. So they spoke real well

1 in terms of continuing that. On behalf of the Board, I  
2 thank Chief Craig calling attention to issue that impact  
3 of excitement, which is bail reform. As we should know,  
4 the issue it's quite clear that we need to deal with that  
5 whole process. I want to thank Mayor Duggan, Chief Craig,  
6 Commissioner Eric Jones, and the Public Safety Foundation  
7 for putting together that dedication ceremony for the  
8 Herbert family. That was key, and we had the opportunity  
9 to participate. I said enough about Mr. Solomon,  
10 hopefully. His son is an appointee of the Mayor. He's  
11 serving in some capacity. Now. I can't think of what he's  
12 serving on, but he's been with the Mayor for quite some  
13 time. He is a young man that followed in his father's  
14 footsteps. The whole family has been engaging over the  
15 years. Also,

16 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Mr. Chair.

17 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I'm sorry.

18 COMMISSIONER BURCH: I just wanted to share since you  
19 couldn't say, Ray Solomon is the Chair over all of the  
20 District managers in District 3. That's the position he  
21 has now.

22 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, Commissioner Burch for  
23 clarifying that and sharing it.

24 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Chair Bell.

25 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, Ma'am.

1 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: He's over all the District managers  
2 in the City of Detroit.

3 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay. Thank you. Thank you.

4 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Thank you, Ms.

5 CHAIRPERSON: Thank you. I would also like to take  
6 this time to thank the Board of Police Commissioners for  
7 your hard work and dedication, especially during such a  
8 challenging unusual time. We have continued working  
9 through the pandemic and my words are not coming out -  
10 even though we are experiencing various circumstance. I  
11 want to, again, thank you for your commitment of what  
12 we've been dealing with for the last year or so. There  
13 are a few projects I'm currently pursuing, filling key  
14 vacancies, ensuring we meet our charter mandate  
15 requirements. Additionally, we have received recent  
16 updates regarding the position of the chief investigator  
17 and a closed session will be occurring next week, where  
18 the HR resourcing problem. We'll share further  
19 information on the prescreening process, and the next  
20 step was previously approved by the Board. Regarding our  
21 budget, we are currently waiting on the final decision  
22 from our City Council regarding our budget with the  
23 impact on this fiscal year and next fiscal year.

24 CHAIRPERSON BELL: So I thank you for your continued  
25 patience as we wait to see how we fare with our physical



1 health. We are finalizing the process of a contract with  
2 a registered parliamentarian for the Board meeting and  
3 various training. We are currently working with the  
4 budget department to facilitate this request. We have  
5 conducted extensive research, regarding this items. You  
6 have received information regarding two parliamentary  
7 candidates for consideration and information regarding  
8 their background, prices and experienced were included in  
9 the package. Lastly, I'm looking to implement an overall  
10 staff increase for all staff members given their  
11 dedication and sacrifice during this time. We are  
12 conducting research regarding budgetary consideration and  
13 union contract and city policy. However, we need to show  
14 appreciation to our staff for their work, dedication and  
15 cooperation during this time, if we continue delivering  
16 important civilian oversight services to the Coity of  
17 Detroit. Additionally, I'm looking into increases for the  
18 Commission, given our sincere effort, continued diligence  
19 and commitment while pursuing our affective civilian  
20 oversight.

21 CHAIRPERSON BELL: To that end, thank you for your  
22 patience and cooperation. And as we move to the next  
23 item, I just hope that in the spirit of decorum, and  
24 order that we can conduct ourselves properly and have a  
25 timely meeting. One of the concerns that I had just

1 recently of two community groups that I participated on  
2 Eastside, they say our meeting is long, it's all point,  
3 and they think it's just not fair to the public to try to  
4 stay on the meeting 3 hours and listen to the Commission  
5 going back and forth. I just want to share that with you  
6 and they try to have their meeting in a timely manner.  
7 And that's something that I think we can improve  
8 drastically on in terms of how we conduct ourselves at  
9 this meeting to get the job achieved in a timely manner.  
10 And that is our goal for this meeting and meetings in the  
11 future. So I need your cooperation in terms of - I know  
12 when we get into the Q&A process, you want to get an  
13 editorial on everything, but that is not feasible to the  
14 whole body and to the public audience to continue to  
15 elaborate, as we have had in the past, I would hope that  
16 you take notice of that and then do due diligence to try  
17 to curb that to some extent. Thank you.

18 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Through the Chair.

19 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes. Ma'am.

20 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: I move that the Board approves the  
21 Chief's recommendation to promote the following members  
22 to the rank of Lieutenant as follows: And there are four:  
23 Sergeant Jason P. Kile, Sergeant Thomas J. Grzywacz,  
24 Sergeant Clive G. Stewart, and Sergeant Matthew L  
25 Fulgenzi. Those four.

1 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Yes. I second that.

2 CHAIRPERSON BELL: They've been properly moved and  
3 supported discussion? Those in favor. Aye.

4 ALL: Aye. Aye. Aye.

5 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Those oppose? Motion carries.

6 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Thank you. I'm move the Board  
7 approves the chief's recommendation to promote the  
8 following members to the rank of Sergeant as follows: And  
9 there are 23.

10 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Oh, Lord.

11 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Corporal David L. Fitzpatrick,  
12 Police Officer Kristy M. Elswick, Detective Kevin F.  
13 Treasvant, Police Officer Tracey E Miller-Pletzke, Police  
14 Officer Gibron S. Lockhart, Detective Ashley L. Peterson,  
15 Police Officer William H. Cook, Detective Brandolyn C.  
16 Johnson, Police Officer Derrick R. Keasley, Police  
17 Officer William A. Morrison, Detective Romell A.  
18 Randolph, Detective Jesse A. Johns, Police Officer Lee E.  
19 Brown, Police Officer Jeremy D. Johnson, Detective Renald  
20 L. Attard, Police Officer Jennifer L. Kapushinski,  
21 Dectective Michael E Panackia, Police Officer Jonathan D.  
22 Gardner, Police Officer Bryan C. Hill, Detective  
23 Christian Winans-Jordan, Police Officer Karen D.  
24 Boudreaux, and Detective Arick Flesch.

25 MRS. WHITE: Through the Chair. There was one name,

1 Detective Dryell L. Cob Sanders.

2 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: I'm sorry, again, all this writing.  
3 Correct, Ms. White, and thank you on that.

4 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: So moved.

5 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Second.

6 CHAIRPERSON BELL: They've been properly moved and  
7 second. Discussion.

8 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Yes, just a quick question to  
9 you, Mr. Chairman.

10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, Ma'am.

11 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Quickly, let me understand.  
12 Several of these people already have the rank of  
13 detective. So Sergeant is a - the detective take the old  
14 corporate position, and obviously detective is lower now  
15 than Sergeant.

16 CHAIRPERSON BELL: There's no corporate rank. I mean  
17 there's informally, but basically it is police officer  
18 then sergeant and then detective also in that process,

19 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Several of the detectives are  
20 becoming sergeants. So you make more as a sergeant than  
21 as a detective?

22 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, ma'am. The sergeant rank is  
23 also by exam and detective rank is done by exam too. So  
24 you can score and be a detective and you can be promoted  
25 to the next rank of sergeant.

1 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Oh, thank you.

2 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, ma'am. They've been properly  
3 moved and second. Discussion. Those in favor, Aye.

4 ALL: Aye. Aye.

5 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Those opposed. The motion carries.  
6 Thank you, Vice-Chair Holt.

7 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: You're welcome.

8 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Next would be the detective rank.

9 MRS. WHITE: Yes, sir.

10 COMMISSIONER BURCH: You want me to read it?

11 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, ma'am.

12 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Yes, sure?

13 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay.

14 COMMISSIONER BURCH: I know you have to be tired. I  
15 hope I don't mispronounce. Police Officer Mia T.  
16 Nikolich, Police Officer Lemuel R. Sims, Police Officer  
17 Luis A. Caban, Police Officer Lawrence L. Fullilove,  
18 Police Officer Terrace M. Flanders, Police, Officer  
19 Alejandro Vela, Police Officer Edward E. Layman. Do I  
20 have to say police officer all the way down or just say  
21 their name?

22 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Police Officer.

23 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Cut down the time, but you know,

24 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Just say their name, we know they  
25 are all police officers.

1 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Okay. Police Officer Mohamed F.  
2 Barakat, Police Officer Benjamin D. Atkinson, Police  
3 Officer Lynn D. Woods, Police Officer Michael N. Davis,  
4 Police Officer Yvette Garcia, Police Officer Sandra L.  
5 Whitfield, Police Officer Rainell N. Jones, Police  
6 Officer Jermaine D Owens, Police Officer Tinisha E.  
7 Alexander, , Police Officer Lakeena T. Henry, Police  
8 Officer Robert H. Boroski. And then you have, you have  
9 the officers on this other side. Police Officer Jeffrey  
10 J. Stehlik, Police Officer Stephen Heid.

11 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Through the Chair.

12 COMMISSIONER BURCH: I move that all of these  
13 promotions be accepted. Yes.

14 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Second.

15 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Properly move and second. Thank  
16 you, Commissioner Burch. Discussion. Those in favor, Aye.

17 ALL: Aye.

18 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Those oppose, nay. The motion  
19 carries. Thank you. We want to commend all these  
20 individuals promoted to the ranks of lieutenant, sergeant  
21 and detective. A well-earned promotion. I know they're  
22 looking forward to their next job description and their  
23 assignment. I know Deputy Chief Bryant can attest when  
24 she made sergeant a long time ago. That's one of the  
25 highlights of your career. The first step you can take in

1 the department. Now you can take the detective exam and  
2 make the check. But back in the day, I think sergeant was  
3 really what you shoot for. And I just really want to wish  
4 you the best to all of these individuals and thank Chief  
5 Craig and staff for submitting their names. And we had  
6 the opportunity to review and approve. That is the role  
7 of our charter mandated duties. Next order of business  
8 would be Deputy Chief Bryant reporting on behalf of Chief  
9 Craig.

10 DEPUTY CHIEF BRYANT. Thank you sir. Through the  
11 Chair. First and foremost, I want to say thank you to the  
12 Board for approving these promotions. We greatly  
13 appreciate it and welcome to the ranks, the detectives,  
14 the sergeants and the lieutenants. I'm going to report  
15 first on crime. Total part one crime overall, we had a  
16 decrease of 14%. So our overall part one violent crime,  
17 we saw an increase of 16% with homicide being increased  
18 by 10%, zero increase in sexual assaults, aggravated  
19 assaults, we saw an increase of 30%, nonfatal shootings,  
20 we saw an increase of 33%. We saw a decrease in our  
21 robberies of 36%, carjackings increased by 31%. Overall  
22 part one property crime, we saw a decrease of 27%. So a  
23 decrease in burglaries by 38%, a decrease in larcenies by  
24 30%, a decrease in motor vehicle thefts by 12%. Our  
25 priority one response time for our prior week was 12

1 minutes and 11 seconds.

2 DEPUTY CHIEF BRYANT. And our weekly enforcement  
3 stats for the prior week, we confiscated 101 handguns in  
4 18 long guns. We arrested 169 felony arrests, including  
5 homicide assault with intent to commit murder, burglary,  
6 home invasion, robbery, armed, felonious assault,  
7 possession of stolen motor vehicle and fraud. Just to  
8 name a few. We confiscated 28.3 grams of cocaine, 10.5  
9 grams of heroin over 20 pounds of marijuana. We issued  
10 2,903 ordinances and we impounded 243 vehicles. Our  
11 illegal and drifting drag racing stats are as follows.  
12 The last week, we investigated 182 males, 45 females, 167  
13 vehicles were investigated. We conducted 167 traffic  
14 stops issued 219 ords, forfeited 7 vehicles, recovered  
15 one stolen, impounded 17 vehicles. We had 7 felony  
16 arrests and we recovered 4 weapons during that drive in  
17 detailed. Our COVID updates. We currently have 44 members  
18 who have tested positive on the department. 51 who are  
19 quarantined or in isolation with the 7th Precinct having  
20 the highest number of positive cases with 9 members.

21 DEPUTY CHIEF BRYANT: Our department is currently at  
22 45% for vaccinations, critically injured officers.  
23 Sergeant Michael Bailey from the 7th Precinct is still  
24 recovering at home from an injury he sustained back on  
25 May 30th, 2020, while trying to detain a person Police



1 Officer Jusuf Mannah from the Task Force Administration,  
2 still recovering at home after being involved in the on-  
3 duty vehicular accident on January 6<sup>th</sup> of this year,  
4 Police Officer Gregory Bentley from the 7th Precinct,  
5 he's recovering at home after sustaining an injury to his  
6 left ankle while chasing a suspect wanted for CCW on  
7 March 27th this year and Police Officer Mohamed Barro  
8 from the 2nd Precinct is recovering at home after his  
9 department vehicle was struck by a person driving at a  
10 high rate of speed on April 1st of this year, as well. As  
11 Chairperson Bell already indicated, this past Monday,  
12 Chief Craig held a press conference regarding the release  
13 of defendant, Eddie Johnson.

14 DEPUTY CHIEF BRYANT: He was released on a tether and  
15 a 10% \$200,000 bond. As you know, he's the person accused  
16 of murdering Sergeant Elaine Williams, who many of you  
17 know, she was a huge person in the community, a huge  
18 community relations officer. The judge cited it as a  
19 compassionate release due to him needing some form of  
20 medical care. Sergeant Williams was murdered almost two  
21 years ago, June 2nd, 2019, to be exact since then,  
22 between delays and trial due to COVID, court closing and  
23 the defense attorney's motion to delay, there has been no  
24 justice issue. During the press conference Sergeant  
25 Williams sister spoke on behalf of their family

1 explaining how this poor decision by this judge caused  
2 their family so much pain and just reopened their wounds.  
3 Lieutenant Donna McCore also spoke on behalf of Sergeant  
4 Williams' closest and dearest friends on the department,  
5 and on behalf of her DPD family. Pastor Mo, community  
6 activist spoke as well on the impact this decision has on  
7 the community.

8 DEPUTY CHIEF BRYANT: And also Vice-Chairperson  
9 Commissioner, Annie Holt spoke as well regarding the  
10 impact of domestic violence and offered her and the  
11 Board's support to Sergeant Williams' family, as well as,  
12 the DPD, as we deal with this tragedy. As Chairperson  
13 Bell indicated there is a prayer vigil scheduled for  
14 Sergeant Williams, April 9th, tomorrow in front of  
15 Detroit Public Safety Headquarters at 11:00 am. A  
16 dedication ceremony took place yesterday to honor Skylar  
17 Herbert. As you know, she's the beautiful little girl who  
18 lost her life to COVID last year. Her parents Lavondria  
19 Herbert and her father, Ebbie Herbert, are first  
20 responders. Mom with the Detroit Police Department and  
21 her dad with the Detroit Fire Department. In recognition  
22 of her life, the Detroit Public Safety Headquarters is  
23 renaming the Michigan Room to the Skylar Room. Director.  
24 Graveline can report out regarding any internal affairs  
25 cases and that is the end of my report.

1 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Before we go to  
2 Director Graveline, I just want to mention that we have  
3 former Commissioner Ricardo Moore attending, and also a  
4 former State Rep Bert Johnson in attendance. Thank you.  
5 We're going to hear from the Director at this time. There  
6 he is. Okay.

7 DIRECTOR GRAVELINE. Through the Chair. I do not have  
8 any specific cases to report out on. I was just here to  
9 answer any questions, if any of the Commissioners have  
10 any.

11 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Commissioners, any  
12 question for the DC Bryant or a Director Graveline at  
13 this time.

14 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Mr. Chair.

15 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, sir.

16 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Question. Of the cars that were  
17 confiscated - it was a nice number of cars that were  
18 confiscated. How many of those were directly related to  
19 racing, speeding, donuts, and what have you?

20 DEPUTY CHIEF BRYANT: The 17 impounded from our drag  
21 racing drifting detail was specifically related to that  
22 as well as the 7 forfeitures. Now, as far as the  
23 breakdown from the Precinct, I don't have the specific  
24 numbers, but I can tell you quite a significant amount of  
25 those vehicles were tagged for drifting, drag racing,

1 speeding, and things of that nature.

2 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: And that continues to be a major  
3 concern in our communities.

4 DEPUTY CHIEF BRYANT: Absolutely. And we are working  
5 diligently to try to, you know, attack as many areas of  
6 concern as possible.

7 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Thank you. That's it?

8 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Mr. Chair.

9 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, ma'am.

10 COMMISSIONER BURCH: To DC Bryant, who takes care of  
11 the whole Eastside, and also I'm glad to see that  
12 Commander Slappy is here and also Ms. Kim Jackson. In  
13 working in the District, there are so many and DC Bryant  
14 can attest to this, that there are constant calls for the  
15 speeders, that are doing the donuts, but they do them so  
16 regularly in the same location. So we just are trying to  
17 understand why they can't be caught after we identify  
18 these cars as to what they look like. We can't get a  
19 license plate, but they almost do it on a regular basis  
20 throughout the week. So we're trying to assist DC, Bryant  
21 and everybody else that's working in number 11. And I  
22 have many concerns that the citizens share with me. And  
23 you all know that my heart is with the whole city, but  
24 I'm looking at DC Bryant, the fact that today we had this  
25 senior drive-by. All of my Commissioners know what that

1 is. I do not have the NPOs went this time on the drive-  
2 by? If you could get that to me later, I don't know who  
3 they are, okay?

4 DEPUTY CHIEF BRYANT: Yes, ma'am. I will.

5 COMMISSIONER BURCH: And that's a whole issue that  
6 sometimes my fellow Commissioners understand that I'm so  
7 involved in my community with the love and respect, one  
8 of our events was canceled because there was a  
9 misunderstanding on that flyer that represented the  
10 pistons at Belmont. We have not come to closure on that  
11 to really what happened, but that was a very important  
12 meeting that was going to happen regarding the safety  
13 locks for them to give out to citizens about gun safety  
14 and the locks. So I hope that you all are going to share  
15 that with me. And then, so I can share with the other  
16 fellow Commissioners of how we did fix that confusion  
17 that we had.

18 DEPUTY CHIEF BRYANT: Yes, ma'am. Through the Chair.  
19 Commissioner Burch, as you know, you and I spoke  
20 extensively about that and we are in the process. We  
21 still want to make sure that we have that event. So we're  
22 going to circle back and we're going to meet with you,  
23 and we're going to talk about how we can make sure that  
24 that happens.

25 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Very good. I hope so.

1 DEPUTY CHIEF BRYANT: Also, as it relates to the  
2 drifters and drag racing, and in regards to the donuts,  
3 we are in the process of doing quite a few things. We've  
4 been trying everything to make sure that we deal with  
5 this problem. And one of the things that we're doing is  
6 we're not just waiting, like you say, for them to do it.  
7 We're actually proactively looking at going out to  
8 people, vehicles. If we can identify them, we will go to  
9 their homes and we'll take these vehicles. So we are  
10 definitely in the process of trying to make sure that we  
11 do everything we can to discourage people from coming  
12 down here to do this. So we are taking vehicles, we're  
13 writing tickets, we're locking people up, you know, we're  
14 doing everything that we can,

15 COMMISSIONER BURCH: I know you are, but like you  
16 say, you are short-staffed. We understand that too. You  
17 can't just take care of the whole. That's why Pastor  
18 Holley, I want him to go to these too, to make sure you  
19 all get more officers. That's really what you need, more  
20 officers to work at nighttime.

21 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Mr. Chairman.

22 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, Commissioner Holley,

23 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Yes. DC Bryant, or Mr.  
24 Graveline, last week, we talked about no-knock policy and  
25 Commissioner Bernard called up about 30 minutes, but just

1 as a courtesy, can you talk to the Chief and maybe  
2 whoever else you need to talk to, could you at least move  
3 at 30 seconds up to two minutes in terms of that DC  
4 Bryant, that we could feel that we really have some  
5 concern that you have some concern about that 30 seconds.  
6 Can you just talk about it at your leisure and come back  
7 and let us know. I'm really concerned about the 30  
8 seconds that Commissioner Bernard is talking about. The  
9 older people can't get to the door in 30 second. I tried  
10 it the other night, I tried it myself. I went from the  
11 bedroom to like, I just made it in 27 seconds and I'm 77.  
12 So I'm just asking you, would you think about that just  
13 as courtesy?

14 DEPUTY CHIEF BRYANT: Through the Chair. I wasn't  
15 aware, I wasn't on their last meeting, but I hear what  
16 you're saying and I will definitely take that back. Are  
17 you referring to when someone goes with a warrant to a  
18 home and they knock on the door? Okay. That's what you're  
19 referring to. Okay.

20 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Is that right, Mr. Chairman, is  
21 that right, Bernard?

22 CHAIRPERSON BELL: That's correct, Commissioner  
23 Holley. 30 second is pretty much standard, but we can  
24 have that discussion. It's not about old or young. It's  
25 the combination of things for the officers' safety et

1 cetera, et cetera. I'm not going to debate. We can have  
2 that discussion, but basically, it's a serious matter  
3 when it's been on the nature of what they dealing with.  
4 So you have to weigh all of that. We don't serve that  
5 many for senior citizens. So don't put yourself in that  
6 square. So let's look at the reality of what we're  
7 dealing with, but I'm pretty sure that we can have that  
8 discussion with Chief Craig and overall policy. It's a  
9 major issue when you raise that, particular matter. And I  
10 just want to say about the donuts and drag, that is a  
11 high priority with Chief Craig and Mayor Duggan.

12 CHAIRPERSON BELL: They raised that issue. They're  
13 going to do everything that's possible, but they're not  
14 going to share all this strategy they're trying to engage  
15 in, in terms of trying to deal with this, and we don't  
16 want to tip the scale in terms of what's actually going  
17 to happen, but they are well aware of Commissioner Burch  
18 and all our concern throughout the City of Detroit. So we  
19 met on that particular subject matter. So they not taking  
20 it lightly. They know it's already something that close  
21 to our hearts and our community and trying to keep  
22 everybody safe. But we are in a stage now where folks  
23 just don't care in terms of their driving behavior and  
24 activity. So I just leave it at that. Any other question  
25 or concern for the Deputy Chief?



1 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Through the Chair. Deputy Chief  
2 Bryant, I don't recall, I'm sorry. I don't recall who was  
3 here at the time, but when the gunlocks campaign was  
4 discussed that day and we were in Congress to get in  
5 touch with Commander Hope because she's over the program.  
6 And I believe I generated an email whereby Commander  
7 Hope, to some degree, said that she was working on it.  
8 And it was independent of your particular initiative,  
9 Commissioner Burch. So to the discussion whereby  
10 Commander Hope, I'm texting people, Commander Hope was  
11 supposed to help to organize a campaign, especially over  
12 here in District 1. You're aware of what's happening with  
13 that initiative?

14 DEPUTY CHIEF BRYANT: Through the Chair, Commander  
15 Hope is actually on the call. And what I can do is circle  
16 back with her to make sure that we do that because we  
17 absolutely want to make sure that we get the message  
18 across the entire city. So I'll reach out to her right  
19 after this meeting.

20 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Okay. And thank you for that  
21 response.

22 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Deputy Chief, Bryant, I have a  
23 couple of concerns. One, I would be interested if in  
24 fact, the department can identify a proactive plan rather  
25 than an arrest and lock up plan for people who are, as

1 you say, speeding and drag racing or making donuts. We  
2 have so much vacant land in the City of Detroit. I think  
3 we've got like 144 square miles as a city. If we can pave  
4 a towing lot for what, \$2 million, why can't we provide a  
5 place where people who want to have a muscle car and who  
6 want to race, and of course there are some liability  
7 issues but those can always be resolved because you and I  
8 both know through releases where they can do this. I'm  
9 not per se, I'm very concerned about the racing, et  
10 cetera. But I also understand, I think when people - when  
11 they're 16, 17, 18, 19, 20, want to drive fast and see  
12 what their car can do.

13 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: And to me, we have the  
14 resources as a city, we just had about \$800 million from  
15 the federal government under the latest Corona plan that  
16 Biden just passed to do something as proactive. I am very  
17 concerned about the continued arrest and incarceration of  
18 everybody, everything. Let me just finish. All of us have  
19 speeded, but I mean, I understand that this is a problem  
20 and I want to address it. Secondly, with respect to what  
21 you said about 17 impounds, and 7 forfeitures, if you  
22 could just come back to us and thoroughly explained,  
23 which I've been trying to explain to my colleagues on the  
24 Board, what impound fees and penalties are, what  
25 forfeiture penalties and fees are; that when you stop a

1 person and you take that car, it doesn't have to be  
2 titled to the person who is the driver. It could be  
3 titled to me or you, and that car is then taken and  
4 forfeited. I really want my colleagues to understand the  
5 nature of the penalties associated with this particular  
6 activity. And you can address that at a future meeting,  
7 but I do want a proactive approach to this problem. I  
8 mean, we're not the only community that has this problem,  
9 and there have to be other cities that have the same  
10 problem. And I don't think that the owner.

11 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, Commissioner Bernard.

12 Thank you.

13 DEPUTY CHIEF BRYANT: Through the Chair.

14 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Please, please.

15 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Chairman, I was finishing,

16 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Please, I just want to say -- DC

17 Bryant, go ahead.

18 DEPUTY CHIEF BRYANT: Through the Chair, Commissioner  
19 Bernard, I'm sorry. We actually had that initiative. We  
20 were proactive and we did do that. And what happened was  
21 they not only utilize that lot, but they also continue to  
22 go outside the lot and it got worse. And we actually  
23 wound up finding ourselves in a situation where they were  
24 actually mocking us and it was bad. We tried that, we  
25 really did. We had the same idea that you had about being

1 proactive and wanting to give them an opportunity to have  
2 a venue to let that out and try their cars out. We did  
3 that and unfortunately, it didn't work. It did not work.  
4 So, we did try that, just so you know. That was all last  
5 year. All last summer, we worked with them, we got with  
6 the influencers, we organized, and we found areas for  
7 them to do that.

8 DEPUTY CHIEF BRYANT. And it still was a severe  
9 issue. And not only that, but people wound up getting  
10 hurt. So it became a serious liability. And in addition  
11 to that, they continued to, after we gave them the  
12 allotted time, the allotted space to go out and drag  
13 drift race in other areas. And it became a huge problem.  
14 It did not work. In regards to your forfeiture question  
15 in regards to fees, Captain Parrish is actually on the  
16 line. He can speak to that. If you'd like to hear from  
17 him.

18 CHAIRPERSON BELL: He is not going to report this  
19 time. We will have that report out in the future. We want  
20 to move on.

21 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair.

22 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Next question.

23 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair.

24 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Commissioner, Commissioner Burton.

25 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Burton.

1 COMMISSIONER BURTON. Thank you, colleagues. I have a  
2 few things I'd like to address this afternoon to Deputy  
3 Chief Bryant. I have called for the video of Nikita  
4 Wallace, a protester who was placed in a hold in a  
5 chokehold by Detroit Police Department. I called for that  
6 video last year, I'm still waiting. We'd like to see that  
7 video. I also called for the video of innocent protesters  
8 that was run over by a DPD cruiser. I'm still waiting  
9 once again. I'm still waiting to see that video. January  
10 19th or 20th of this year, 1401 Shane Park View Place a  
11 fire took place, I believe on the 6th or 7th floor. I  
12 have called the police in emergency response time. I'm  
13 still waiting to hear back on that as well on the behalf  
14 of District 5 residents. Next leaves me with last week I  
15 raised here at the Commissioner's meeting on behalf of  
16 residents of the 5th District that lives in Park - no,  
17 River Towers, 7,800 Jefferson. I called for information  
18 about how many calls were made to 911 from that building.  
19 And also how many calls per service and the response  
20 time. Seniors over there have told me countless times  
21 that that building is like New Jack City. And it's a lot  
22 of drug peddling going on in the building and seniors  
23 feel afraid. So just, you know, just advocating. Also how  
24 many greenlight locations do the city currently have?  
25 What are the police response times for priority one,

1 priority two, and priority three? And my last question  
2 what can we do to stop drag race over by Pingree Park?

3 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, Commissioner Burton.  
4 Ms. White and DC. Bryant, will you make a notation and  
5 all that. Just because you call for something, for a  
6 video, it might not always be a legal issue that we can  
7 do what they can in terms of information, but Ms. White  
8 and DC, Bryant will make a notation and get back to you  
9 in a timely manner. Next question?

10 COMMISSIONER BURTON: District 5 residents, we have  
11 been waiting since, since last year, but for 7800  
12 Jefferson, I asked for that last week to be present in  
13 today's meeting.

14 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, sir. Next question or  
15 concerns. If not, we move on. Thank you DC Bryant.

16 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Chair Bell.

17 COMMISSIONER BURTON: We like to hear from the Deputy  
18 Chief since she's here.

19 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I just responded to how she going  
20 to respond. So Vice-Chair Holt, go ahead.

21 COMMISSIONER BURTON Point of order, Mr. Chairman.  
22 You cannot speak for the Deputy Chief. The Deputy Chief  
23 is present in our meeting. I'd like to hear from the  
24 Deputy Chief. Not from you Chairman Bell, but from the  
25 Deputy Chief. Please allow her to answer the questions on

1 the behalf of District 5.

2 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Vice-Chair Holt, go ahead.

3 COMMISSIONER BURTON: You are not the Chief or the  
4 Deputy Chief.

5 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Vice-Chair Holt, go ahead.  
6 Commissioner Burton, I think you should stop talking,  
7 please. You do not have the floor at this time.

8 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Point of order Mr. Chairman.  
9 You are disenfranchising the voices of one hundred  
10 thousand people that live in the 5th District, Mr.  
11 Chairman.

12 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Burton, you do not  
13 have the floor.

14 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Chair Bell.

15 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I call to overrule the Chair.  
16 Point of order. I call to overrule the Chair.

17 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Vice-Chair Holt, go ahead.

18 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Commissioner Burton also asked  
19 about the number of green lights and I believe we have  
20 that information in our packets that was given to us,  
21 maybe two weeks ago. So in that Commissioner Burton has  
22 brought the discussion up, perhaps Ms. White can put it  
23 at the top of his email, the green light.

24 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, Vice-Chair Holt. We get  
25 the information about all the greenlight and I think on a

1 monthly or every two weeks. So we're going to move on.

2 The next point of business would be our HR report by

3 Director Patillo.

4 MS. WHITE: Staff co-host could ensure that Director

5 Portillo's microphone is enabled, please.

6 DIRECTOR PATILLO: Good afternoon. Through the Chair,

7 I will be presenting. It is my understanding to report,

8 and that is for the month of February and for the month

9 of March. But I see on the agenda that they actually have

10 me in two places, but I am prepared to do both reports

11 right now if that's acceptable.

12 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes ma'am.

13 DIRECTOR PATILLO: So, these reports you have in your

14 possession, should along with the documents, which

15 contain more detailed information for the staffing hiring

16 manpower by race sex, specifically the warrant officers.

17 For current staffing, for the department for sworn

18 officers for the month of February, four positions

19 filled, there was 2,586. Positions vacant, there were 86.

20 For a total of sworn positions, 2,672. For civilians,

21 positions filled. This is all for February, 612 vacant

22 positions. 131 for total positions, 743. So for total

23 positions filled for sworn and civilians, it was 3,198

24 for vacant positions it was 217. And for total positions,

25 it was 345. In comparison to the current staffing for the



1 month of March for sworn officers, it was 2,586 filled.  
2 For positions vacant, your report says 86. I found a  
3 discrepancy, it is actually 84, leaving total positions  
4 for 2,670. For civilians, positions filled it was 620.  
5 Positions vacant it was 123. And for total position, it  
6 was 743. Total positions filled between the sworn and  
7 civilians was 3,206. Positions vacant total 207, Vice  
8 209. For total positions, 3,413. Vice what your report  
9 says 3,415, moving to the sworn recruiting for the month  
10 of July 1st, 20 through February 28, 2021, for the month  
11 of February sworn applicant's 2,761 and processing was 40  
12 to 48. Hired was 130. A lack of interest was 160.  
13 Temporary disqualified 1,558. Disqualified permanently  
14 was 300, 558.

15         DIRECTOR PATILLO: Awaiting NCOLES was 507. In  
16 comparison to the month of March, sworn for the same  
17 dates July 1st, 2020 through actually March 31st, 2021,  
18 there was an increase of 203 total applicants. The  
19 numbers should be 2,964, in processing 41, hired one 45,  
20 lack of interest, 182, temporary disqualified 1,709,  
21 disqualified permanently 384, awaiting NCOLESs was 503.  
22 Moving back to February DPD NCOLES testing for your  
23 written. In the month of February, there were 43  
24 schedule, 32 appeared. 22 out of the 32 passed the  
25 written test. 10 out of the 32 failed the written test.

1 There were 11 no-shows. For the physical agility, there  
2 were scheduled 69, 49 appeared. 35 out of 49 passed, 14  
3 out of 49 failed. There were 7 reschedule with 13, no-  
4 shows. For the month of March written scheduled 33, 25  
5 appeared. 21 out of 25 past four out of 25 failed. There  
6 were 8 no-shows. For the physical agility scheduled 53,  
7 37 appeared 26 out of 37 passed 11 out of 37 failed.  
8 There were 6 rescheduled and 10, no-shows. For the  
9 Academy graduates for the month of February, there was  
10 29, for the month of March there were 17. For total new  
11 hires for the month of February, there were 29 sworn, 5  
12 civilians, zero police assistance for total new hire 34.  
13 For the month of March, there were 20 sworn, 17  
14 civilians, zero police assistance, for a total of 37.

15 DIRECTOR PATILLO: For your Detroit residency  
16 information for the report of February, as of February  
17 28th for Detroit residents, total sworn 577, total  
18 civilians 329, police assistance was 29. There was a  
19 total of 7 new hires for Detroit residents. I mean there  
20 was civilian new hire, Detroit residents, one, sworn new  
21 hire, Detroit residents, 6 and police assistant new hires  
22 zero. For the month of March, as of March 31st for the  
23 Detroit residency, 576 sworn, 329, total civilians, 29  
24 police assistance for the civilian new hires, Detroit  
25 residency was eight, sworn new hires, Detroit residents,

1 5, police assistant, new hires, zero. For your attrition,  
2 you have the spreadsheet in your packet for the month of  
3 February, there were 23 sworn, 7 civilians, zero police  
4 assistance for total attrition of 30. And for the month  
5 of March for attrition, a total sworn 18, civilians 8,  
6 police assistance one four total attrition of 27. Move  
7 into your leave of absence and your restricted duty, for  
8 the month of February for sworn officers, I'll read all  
9 the way through FMLA continuous. It was 59 for FMLA  
10 intermediate. It was 162, for medical leave it was one,  
11 military 5 restricted, 163, disabled 45 and 617. For  
12 civilians, it was 60 FMLA continuous FMLA. Intermediate  
13 was 173, medical leave it was 3.

14 DIRECTOR PATILLO: For the month of March, the same  
15 category sworn FMLA continuous, it was 20, FMLA  
16 intermediate 71, medical zero, military zero, 153 for  
17 restricted, 42 for disabled, 13 for sick, for civilian  
18 FMLA continuous it was 11, FMLA intermediate 72, medical  
19 leave one, and sick, 3. For your sworn personnel  
20 suspensions for the month of February, you had a total of  
21 10 categorized as police officers, 8 corporals one,  
22 lieutenant one. For the month of March, you had a total  
23 of 13. All 13 were police officers. For your monthly  
24 separations for the month of February, there was a total  
25 of 23. And for the month of March, there was a total of

1 18. For your drop program, for the month of February,  
2 there is total 577. And for the month of March, it was  
3 574. And just some initiatives that we're doing within  
4 the HR department and field recruiting, we're going to be  
5 working on an upcoming virtual career fair. And that is  
6 for sworn officers and for civilians because we have a  
7 lot of vacancies. We are also working with the Northwest  
8 activity center. They're going to advertise some of our  
9 flyers on their social media platforms. We're going to  
10 conduct more social media engagement. Our field recording  
11 recruiting office has been in the communities, they've  
12 been in the neighborhoods, barbershops food banks. We're  
13 going to continue with that. For any of you all, if you  
14 want us to do some virtual campaigns at your churches,  
15 your organizations in your community, please do not  
16 hesitate to let us know. We're also working with the  
17 Detroit Public Safety Academy Leadership Team. We're  
18 going to be trying to do some military career fairs as  
19 well pending any questions that is all I have for both  
20 reports.

21 CHAIRPERSON BELL: To the Director, do we have any  
22 questions?

23 COMMISSION BROWN: Through the Chair.

24 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: I do.

25 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I hear Brown, I hear Davis.

1 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Yes, Commissioner Brown then  
2 Commissioner Davis.

3 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you.

4 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Good afternoon, Director  
5 Patillo. Thank you for that report. I just had one  
6 question. I'm always concerned about the number of  
7 disqualified people. What are we doing with the  
8 categories of the applicants that are temporarily  
9 disqualified and how are we categorizing them and what  
10 are we doing to string them along and make sure they get  
11 over that hump.

12 DIRECTOR PATILLO: Since I've been here, for the ones  
13 that I've seen disqualified, I've seen most of them  
14 disqualify for psych. So the ones that are psychology  
15 pretty much there's nothing I can really do about those,  
16 but we have some that have been disqualified for one  
17 year. Some have been three years and some have been five  
18 years. I can tell you that our initiative that we are  
19 doing, there were some apparently that were disqualified  
20 for the marijuana usage for the old I guess policy that  
21 was in place. We did find that there were 237 that were  
22 disqualified up under that campaign. We are now going  
23 back to try to contact those 237 to see if they meet the  
24 new requirement. So we did reach out to approximately  
25 within the last week 80 of those, some of them we left a

1 voicemail, emails, and things like that to see if they're  
2 still interested in coming back and reapplying for the  
3 department.

4 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Okay, great. Thank you.

5 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you.

6 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Great job.

7 DIRECTOR PATILLO: Thank you.

8 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Yes.

9 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Davis.

10 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Okay. I have a question.

11 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Oh, I'm sorry. That's right,  
12 Commissioner Davis.

13 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Excuse me. There is only one  
14 Chair.

15 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Okay. My question is this. I  
16 know this. I requested this before your time by the  
17 mobilization plan. We should have information so that we  
18 would know how long it takes us, Three-third of our  
19 officers live outside the city. We should have a  
20 mobilization plan to indicate how long it takes our  
21 officers to get here. We should be able to have a report  
22 break down with at least what zip codes our officers live  
23 in.

24 DIRECTOR PATILLO: I can work on that.

25 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: That was something that we were

1 doing in the water department years ago.

2 DIRECTOR PATILLO: Are you talking about as far as  
3 distance to get to the department or when the applicants  
4 apply?

5 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: No, I'm talking about distance,  
6 but if there's an emergency, how long it takes them to  
7 get to the Precinct.

8 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Director, he is speaking of  
9 mobilization plan, that is something that department  
10 engage in. So I think you can divert it to Chief Craig's  
11 office in terms of how that works. Mobilization one, two,  
12 whatever that is. I think we can get back. I think we  
13 addressed it in the past, we can address it in the  
14 future. That is really not in your realm. That would be  
15 mobilization of the department by Chief Craig.

16 DIRECTOR PATILLO: I'll forward it up. I'll take the  
17 note and forward it up.

18 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you.

19 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I just have a couple of  
20 comments. Good report Director. A couple of things.  
21 Number one, you said that 237 people who have been  
22 disqualified for marijuana, you would attempt to contact  
23 by phone, I guess by email. It might be helpful if we  
24 sent a letter, a formal letter as well. People do most of  
25 the time read their mail. But when you said that the

1 majority of people - and secondly, the chart that you  
2 sent me, I can't read it, that the print is so small.  
3 Apparently, it reduced itself on the demographics, the  
4 failure, when it steps from 1 2020 to 2/28, 2020. It  
5 reduced itself and so did the HR monthly suspension  
6 report. Some of these things just nipped a tiny, tiny,  
7 tiny. So I just wanted you to know that, but in terms of  
8 the psych issue, the psych issue was a major issue for  
9 the Board and for the Council to the Board.

10 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: And what I discovered was that  
11 our decisions regarding psych were not consistent with  
12 those either, even of the FBI. At the time that I was  
13 counsel there, a director said that you could be  
14 disqualified for psychiatric reasons, and that was a  
15 permanent disqualification. It is not. The federal  
16 government views psychological disqualification, like  
17 your mom, died, whatever it is that happened to you as  
18 only temporary, and that you have to reevaluate the  
19 person within one year. You can be an FBI agent, you can  
20 be a CIA agent, you can be anything in the federal sector  
21 and be disqualified for psychiatric reasons. And then  
22 finally on that point, there's only one person in the  
23 State of Michigan that is certified. She's actually a  
24 woman who is certified by the National Organization of  
25 Law Enforcement, by the FBI, and everybody else. She's a



1 psychiatrist, a psychologist on this issue. I have her  
2 information. I will send it to you. She called these  
3 things to my attention. She's absolutely brilliant. And  
4 she's the resident expert on this for all expert  
5 testimony. But she's a Michigander, she lives out there  
6 I'm thinking in Farmington Hills. So I'll send you her  
7 information.

8 DIRECTOR PATILLO: Thank you, Ma'am.

9 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you.

10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Any other questions for the  
11 Director?

12 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Yes. Mr. Chairman.

13 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, sir.

14 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Yes. I have a few questions  
15 here. I will start off with how many hours do officers go  
16 through crisis intervention training and has that number  
17 been raised lately. And in addition to that question is  
18 how many officers we have on the force as far as  
19 pertaining to our new recruits over the years have two  
20 years or more when it comes to college education and  
21 college credits. And to my final question in this arena  
22 would be out of our new recruits, how many of them  
23 actually speak a second language? That would be it for  
24 now.

25 DIRECTOR PATILLO: So I think for all your questions

1 that you asked, I do not have that information in front  
2 of me. I definitely don't have the training information  
3 because I do not handle that in my department, but I  
4 could pass that on and hopefully have an answer for you  
5 for next week. And then as far as the language  
6 specifically, you're only asking for the candidates  
7 correct in the current class?

8 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Correct. You know, because we  
9 have a disabled community out here as well. Commissioner  
10 Darryl Brown and I have been advocating for, when it  
11 comes to sign languages or any other, you know, speaking  
12 languages for that matter, whether it's a speaking  
13 language or sign language because we have a deaf and  
14 impaired community as well as, both are separate from a  
15 speech impairment or mobility challenges. I'm really  
16 concerned about those that speak a second language as  
17 well as a sign language.

18 DIRECTOR PATILLO: So basically if you have a  
19 secondary language or skill, basically like foreign  
20 language, you just want to know how many police officers  
21 have that if that's known within the department.

22 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Yes, that's what we would like  
23 to know. And if there's anything the department is doing  
24 steps, the department has taken far us ensuring that we  
25 recruit more officers with a special skill like sign

1 languages, as well as speaking a second language because  
2 our Detroit community is definitely growing.

3 DIRECTOR PATILLO: I can work on that for the next  
4 meeting or the next report. Thank you.

5 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Thank you.

6 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. We were going to move  
7 on to the 11th Precinct. Thank you, Director. Outstanding  
8 report.

9 DIRECTOR PATILLO: Thank you.

10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: And I just want to say that the  
11 Chair, can interrupt any Commissioner or designate by  
12 Chief Craig. I'm not allowed to, I would say it would be  
13 inappropriate to interrupt the Chief of Police in the  
14 sitting. By charter, the Chief is a voice at the table,  
15 so I would not interrupt the Chief of Police, but any  
16 other person meets the criteria for the Chair to  
17 intervene. I just want to set the record straight on  
18 that. HR, I'm sorry. Thank you. Commander Slappy. 11th  
19 Precinct. And thank you for your underlying support of  
20 the 11th Precinct, outstanding.

21 COMMANDER SLAPPY: Thank you. Good afternoon, sir.  
22 Through to Chair, Honorable Board, DC Bryant. For the  
23 11th Precinct currently year to date, we have a 50%  
24 increase in our homicides. 113% increase in non-fatal  
25 shootings. Our robberies 35% decreased, burglaries, 37%

1 decreased larcenies of 15% decrease and a 7% increase in  
2 our motor vehicle thefts. Some of the strategies we  
3 employ throughout the year to offset the stats are not a  
4 narcotic race, OTE operations, targeting enforcement in  
5 high crime areas. We have increased patrols in the  
6 Dequindre 7-mile out of drive corridor by our Precinct  
7 motor units and that is with the assistance from Traffic  
8 Enforcement Unit. We conduct warrant sweeps and MDLC home  
9 checks focusing on perpetrators of gun crimes in our  
10 area. And we also continue to enforce our ceasefire  
11 initiative. As it relates to our community programs,  
12 every second Tuesday of the month, we host our 11th  
13 Precinct community meeting, which is Chaired by Ms. Kim  
14 Jackson. We also have our sisterhood program at Pershing.  
15 We just conducted our safe sleep program today. And  
16 that's just a few things to name that's going on at the  
17 11th Precinct. And that is my report.

18 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioners.

19 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Mr. Chair, I'm looking at  
20 Commander Slappy. You did not even say hello to your  
21 Commissioner Shirley Burch who works in the District with  
22 you in the 11th Precinct? How are you today?

23 COMMANDER SLAPPY: I am wonderful Commissioner Burch.  
24 How are you?

25 COMMISSIONER BURCH: I'm wondering, you did not

1 acknowledge like always. DC, Bryant acknowledges that she  
2 knows who I am, but it's like you came on and you didn't  
3 care to share about the idea that we came across with the  
4 senior drive-by. That's our NPOs together with the  
5 citizens and the Church of Lomax.

6           COMMANDER SLAPPY: No, first of all, if I may through  
7 the Chair when I did come on, I apologized, but I thought  
8 I said good afternoon to - and I acknowledge the  
9 Honorable Board. So please accept my apology. Second of  
10 all, as it is related to the senior drive-by, we did  
11 conduct that today, the NPOs who were at that initiative  
12 was Sergeant Spruce, NPOs, Robinson Hill and Williams.  
13 And we did forward the photos to you, Commissioner Burch.

14           COMMISSIONER BURCH: Okay. I'll look in my phone. I  
15 haven't seen them yet, but I'll look. Thank you.

16           CHAIRPERSON BELL: Any more questions for Commander  
17 Slappy?

18           COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Just quickly. Do you have any  
19 initiatives that will address the increased homicide or  
20 are all the homicides really sort of personal in nature  
21 between people who know each other? And have we been able  
22 to solve any of the homicides?

23           COMMANDER SLAPPY: I'm sorry. Through the Chair. Our  
24 increase is a small number. It's from 2 last year to 3  
25 this year. As it relates to the ones that are closed, I

1 would not want to speak out of turn, so I wouldn't defer  
2 to someone who's online from homicide.

3 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay. Any other questions?

4 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Yes. Mr. Chairman?

5 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, sir.

6 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I do have a question. I raised  
7 this before. I'm going to raise it again today. I'm going  
8 to raise it this time to Deputy Bryant. How many missing  
9 women including do we have right here in the City of  
10 Detroit and how many of them have been found of this year  
11 alone?

12 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Burton, this is not  
13 the time for DC, Bryant. This is the time for the 11th  
14 Precinct Commander Slappy. Do you have any questions, or  
15 concerns for the Commander?

16 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Well, absolutely. I would  
17 address my question to Commander Slappy. Commander  
18 Slappy, for your Precinct alone, for the 11th Precinct,  
19 can you provide, if you don't have the numbers today, can  
20 you provide those for us at a later time, how many  
21 missing women and children or person from the 11th  
22 Precinct and how many of them were found? Looking last  
23 year at last year's numbers, as well as this year, since  
24 we only four months into this year, just for the 11th  
25 Precinct, but overall, or Deputy Chief. Bryant, I did

1 have those same questions, but I wanted to for the entire  
2 city.

3 DEPUTY CHIEF BRYANT: Through the Chair, if you  
4 please Commissioner Bell, I have those numbers for him.

5 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes. Go ahead. Thank you.

6 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Thank you, Commander.

7 DEPUTY CHIEF BRYANT: So through the Chair as of year  
8 to date, there have been a total of 250 missing females  
9 and 171 have been verified or returned. That's citywide  
10 year-to-date.

11 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Any other questions or  
12 concerns for the Commander?

13 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Yes. Through the Chair?

14 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, sir.

15 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Hey, Commander Slappy. It's  
16 always good to see you. I like that quick short report,  
17 it was right to the point. I just wanted to know with the  
18 ShotSpotter program, does any of that overlap in your  
19 area?

20 COMMANDER SLAPPY: No, sir. Not at this time.

21 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Okay. All right. Thank you.

22 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Thank you, Commander  
23 Slappy. Outstanding.

24 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Thank you, Commander Slappy.  
25 Appreciate you as well.

1           COMMANDER SLAPPY: Thank you.

2           CHAIRPERSON BELL: We move on to the Interim  
3 Secretary Ms. White.

4           MRS. WHITE: Yes. Through the Chair, Honorable Board.  
5 Please refer to the agenda for the incoming  
6 correspondence for this week, and they are as follows.  
7 Number one, the weekly DPD facial recognition technology  
8 report for the week of March 29, 2021 through April 4,  
9 2021. Also, the Board received questions regarding the  
10 towing RFP dated April 1st, 2021. Also, the human  
11 resources of packing material were distributed this past  
12 Tuesday for your weekly packet. And also you received  
13 various staff reports, including, but not limited to  
14 parliamentarian with the material. Also, information  
15 relating to the DPD promotional package, which was  
16 discussed and voted on earlier. And then also the  
17 honorable Board attended the NICOLE'S training webinar,  
18 entitled investigation and systemic review of police  
19 responses to large-scale protests. And please note on a  
20 billboard that we are in contact with the department.  
21 We've been in communication with the department, as it  
22 relates to how DPD handled protests and some of the  
23 Board's questions and inquiries as it relates to those  
24 reports and an after-action report. And so I've been in  
25 contact with director Christopher Graveline,, as well as



1 Assistant Chief Bettison, and we are working on that  
2 information to submit to the full Board. And that  
3 concludes the incoming correspondence for this week.

4 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, Ms. White.

5 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Through the Chair.

6 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, sir.

7 COMMISSIONER BROWN: I know that there were other  
8 corresponding letters that were sent to the Board. Why  
9 aren't they listed on her report?

10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Because we just received in a  
11 report that some people have issues when we add stuff  
12 that's not on the agenda. So they would be added next  
13 week as you well know some individuals have concerns. So  
14 we try to get information out. We want to list that  
15 information. So therefore that's why you don't see it at  
16 this time, but the possibility is you might have it, but  
17 we will elaborate a little bit at a later time.

18 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Okay. But these emails and  
19 notifications were sent prior to the creation of the  
20 agenda to the Tuesday package.

21 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Well, sir, I'm not going to debate  
22 you, but we would address that concern. The next item  
23 would be unfinished business,

24 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Mr. Chairman under the  
25 unfinished business issue. As you know, we got an

1 elaborate, and it's referenced here, letter regarding the  
2 towing situation from the law offices of Jerome and  
3 McLean. And we also received a proposed RFP from the  
4 procurement office for the City of Detroit regarding  
5 towing. What I would like to propose because I think this  
6 is a big issue. And one that, that we need to address  
7 fully and clearly understand is that perhaps today we can  
8 agree to, I would make a motion to postpone for 6-months,  
9 at least to extend the existing towing permits for 6-  
10 months while we have an opportunity to review these  
11 issues. And secondly, that any RFP that has been issued  
12 also be postponed during the period that we are reviewing  
13 this issue. It's a big issue. The federal court is  
14 involved.

15 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Unfortunately according to the  
16 record, and this is not a slam at the office of  
17 Corporation Counsel, because I was a managing attorney  
18 for the Corporation Counsel's Office. As you know, the  
19 federal court overruled the decision by the Corporation  
20 Counsel's Office and by the Board regarding towing. So I  
21 just am simply asking because the deadline's coming up in  
22 May and we have a lot of things that we have to address.  
23 Some of the things that I think Commissioner Brown wants  
24 to address regarding more recent correspondence and  
25 everything that we received, that we simply, that I would

1 move to, as I said, to extend the existing permits for 6-  
2 months and extend any decision.

3 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Second.

4 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Burton, let me say  
5 this to you. That is a serious issue that I think we  
6 should take time to weigh in before we just casually make  
7 a decision, say 6-months. There is more than ---

8 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Point of order, Mr. Chairman,  
9 you do not have the permission to use your position as  
10 Chair to shape the minds of this, the body. But I did  
11 call for a second. Can we move on?

12 COMMISSIONER JONES: Commissioner Burton, you do not  
13 have the floor.

14 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Burton, you do not  
15 have the floor. This is like the third or the fourth time  
16 you're trying to take over this meeting, interrupting  
17 this meeting.

18 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Point of order, Mr. Chairman. I  
19 did put a second out there on Commissioner Bernard's  
20 motion. We should vote it up or vote it down. You should  
21 call for discussion, Mr. Chairman.

22 COMMISSIONER JONES: The Robert Rules of order said  
23 that you're not supposed to do that to the Chair.

24 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Excuse me, excuse me. Commissioner  
25 Burton, thank you, Commissioner Jones. Commissioner

1 Bernard, I'm going to ask you to give us an opportunity  
2 to weigh-in on would you involve in terms of what we  
3 asking for that might be reasonable and it might be  
4 unreasonable. So let's bring the parties together with  
5 DPD and the Corporation Counsel and others to try to make  
6 the decision before we say just postponing, something  
7 like that is a serious business of the towing of the City  
8 of Detroit, as you well know. Could you entertain that?

9 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Yes, but I don't understand  
10 the structure, but Mr. Chairman, I would entertain that.  
11 We're not voting on anything involving towing. I said it,  
12 but.

13 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Through the Chair. Through the  
14 Chair. Commissioner Bernard, I agree with your position,  
15 but also because I'm not educated enough to know as Chair  
16 Bell is attempting to explain what it means to postpone  
17 for 6-months. But, I too would like some kind of time  
18 whereby we can thoroughly investigate this situation  
19 whereby we're educated enough to make a decision that  
20 will support us. So I'm with you, but like Chair Bell  
21 said,

22 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Excuse me, excuse me, Vice-Chair  
23 Holt. I did not give you the floor, please.

24 VICE-CHAIR BELL: Yes, sir.

25 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Bernard, we have

1 agreed. Let's set down a week in this week or next week  
2 and have that discussion, and see how we can handle this  
3 matter. Okay.

4 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Chair Bell, may I be in that  
5 discussion?

6 CHAIRPERSON BELL: You could be in this discussion  
7 and anyone that wants to be in this part of the  
8 discussion.

9 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Thank you. I look forward to that.

10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you.

11 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Mr. Chairman. It ought to be  
12 here in the Board of Police Commissioners meeting. We  
13 should not have secret meetings.

14 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Sir, it is no secret meeting.

15 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Whatever is going to be  
16 discussed, should be discussed in the public meeting, Mr.  
17 Chair.

18 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Sir, there is no meeting. It's a  
19 discussion in reference to her concern, which is a valid  
20 concern. She asking for 6- months. So we going to have to  
21 look into - there's a role that we play the DPD play and  
22 the City of Detroit play in this matter. In fact, the  
23 Council is involved with this whole matter of towing. So  
24 we just Commissioner Bernard has yielded to that. Well,  
25 we're going to move on. Any other unfinished business?

1 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Mr. Chairman,

2 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Would you suggest 60 days then  
3 because right now ---

4 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Give me a week, give me a week,  
5 give me a week to try to have that discussion with you.  
6 We can have that discussion prior to next week. Thank  
7 you.

8 COMMISSIONER BURTON: You're stopping the door on  
9 democracy, Mr. Chairman, I'd like to make a motion.

10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, sir.

11 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Right. I have a couple of  
12 motions I'd like to make this evening on behalf of  
13 District 5 constituents. One of the motions that I would  
14 like to raise right now this time is to raise public  
15 comments to 3 minutes for residents due to the fact that  
16 many of our constituents are having difficulties on the  
17 zoom meetings. We also have a disabled community that may  
18 be suffering from speech impairment or mobility  
19 challenges. But they are doing their very due diligence  
20 of trying to get plugged into these meetings,

21 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Support.

22 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Burton, I'm going to  
23 move that the motion is out of order. We already voted on  
24 that matter. It was voted down.

25 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Point of order, Mr. Chairman,

1 you can bring a motion back at any time. There is nothing  
2 that you can say that you have to bring a motion you  
3 know, one time or anything. I'm bringing this motion on  
4 behalf of the 700,000 people that live in the City of  
5 Detroit, and that we do have a disabled community  
6 population right here in the City of Detroit and it's  
7 actually growing, as well as we have a community that may  
8 be is suffering from mental health challenges as well.  
9 But also the police department is involved in their lives  
10 24/7, and so.

11 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Sir, we don't need an editorial on  
12 it. Excuse me, Commissioner Burton.

13 COMMISSION BURTON: Point of order, Mr. Chairman. I  
14 did place the motion out there. And then my second motion  
15 today was properly second and supported.

16 CHAIRPERSON BELL: What is the pleasure of this body?

17 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Are you muting me or silencing  
18 me? You're silencing the 700,000 people in the City of  
19 Detroit. That motion was properly second to supported,  
20 Mr. Chair. I do call that you call for the vote.

21 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Through the Chair.

22 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes. Ma'am.

23 COMMISSIONER BURTON: You cannot shut down democracy,  
24 Mr. Chairman.

25 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Excuse me, Commissioner Burton.

1 VICE-CHAIR HOLT. What is the motion? Are we going to  
2 entertain his motion, or not?

3 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Just give me a minute.

4 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Yes, sir.

5 COMMISSIONER JONES: I'd like to make a motion to  
6 table or discussion.

7 CHAIRPERSON BELL: It has been properly moved that we  
8 table that discussion under 3 minutes to extend it from 2  
9 minutes to 3 minutes.

10 COMMISSIONER JONES: Is there a second?

11 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: I second that.

12 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay. Move and second.

13 VICE-CHAIR BELL: Second to table.

14 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Those in favor of the  
15 motion to table.

16 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Aye.

17 COMMISSIONER JONES: Aye.

18 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I call for roll call vote, Mr.  
19 Chairman.

20 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Roll call vote: District 1.

21 COMMISSIONER BROWN: No.

22 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 2.

23 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: No.

24 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 3.

25 COMMISSIONER BURCH: No.



1 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 4. Yes. District 5.

2 COMMISSIONER BURTON: No.

3 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 6.

4 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Yes.

5 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 7.

6 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: No.

7 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Hernandez.

8 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: To table, Yes.

9 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Jones.

10 COMMISSIONER JONES, Yes.

11 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Holley.

12 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Yes.

13 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Mr. Chair, before you complete,  
14 you all talk too much. I'm trying to make sure that when  
15 I said no, I want to know. I voted to say yes to table  
16 it. So I said, you also confused. I think I said, no.

17 CHAIRPERSON BELL: You should say, yes to table it.

18 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Yes, ma'am you did.

19 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Thank you, Ms. Annie. I know  
20 what I said, but see, you all talk so much that you get  
21 people confused about what you're voting on. So I said to  
22 table it.

23 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes ma'am. Commissioner Holt, did  
24 I get your vote?

25 COMMISSIONER HOLT: No, sir you didn't. Yes to table.

1 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes ma'am yes. Ms. White.

2 MRS. WHITE: Through the Chair. There were 7 = Yes

3 votes and 4 No votes.

4 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you.

5 COMMISSIONER BURTON: My final motion, Mr. Chairman.

6 Under the section would be I'm moved to add final

7 comments to the agenda for the Commissioners final

8 remarks.

9 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Support.

10 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: What did he say?

11 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Would you state that please,

12 again?

13 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I move to add to the agenda

14 final remarks or closing remarks during Commissioners

15 BOPC meetings. Right now as it stands, he public.

16 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: It was second, so can we talk about

17 that?

18 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Well, let me say this that would

19 be out of order because we have an established order by

20 our bylaws. So that motion would be out of order because

21 we have established a Board of bylaws. And bylaws can be

22 a minute. It just causually. So that would be out of

23 order. New business.

24 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Through the Chair.

25 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Jones.

1 COMMISSIONER JONES: Through the Chair. One of the  
2 things I wanted to do is the Commissioners are aware of,  
3 I had been talking about a walk for justice on behalf of  
4 a murder victim in the city. It wasn't in the City of  
5 Detroit, it was actually Highland Park with a victim's  
6 name was Natalia Ringle. Mother's name is Bernice Ringle.  
7 And we had a walk for justice down to Revered Street and  
8 Atwater on this past Saturday morning. I was able to MC  
9 that event, we had a great, great turnout. We had a  
10 number of families that came out.

11 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Mr. Chair, is this an  
12 announcement or a motion?

13 CHAIRPERSON BELL: This is under new business, sir.

14 COMMISSIONER JONES: Thank you Chair. But one of the  
15 things that I want to do is I wanted to recognize some  
16 people that really helped to make that event special. We  
17 had a number of families that came out, they were looking  
18 for comfort, and they're looking for answers. And we had  
19 a number of DPD homicide detectives, and a Commander that  
20 came. And I just want to acknowledge them with a letter  
21 for the record. "Be it known to all men that the call of  
22 public service is one of the highest calls that one can  
23 answer to. Because it requires one of great talent,  
24 skill, and personal integrity. And the Italian Ringo Loop  
25 Legacy Foundation recognizes the following men and women

1 of the Detroit Police Department for contributing to the  
2 walk for justice campaign.

3 COMMISSIONER JONES: We have first Commander Kyra Joy  
4 Hope, Captain Derek May, Detective Daniel White and  
5 Police Officer Eric Brown. These officers of the DPD came  
6 out to speak with and acknowledge the families of those  
7 who have lost their family member to gun violence in the  
8 City of Detroit, to make a difference in their grieving  
9 process to help them with closure. So on behalf of  
10 Bernice Ringle and the many other families that came out,  
11 we say, thank you. And we say God bless you. These  
12 officers made the event a very special one. And in the  
13 process of calling back those families that came down,  
14 they had not had contact with the police regarding their  
15 cases, but we just want to say, thank you. We want to  
16 say, we appreciate you taking your time. And we want to  
17 say, God bless you for your efforts. Thank you.

18 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I concur.

19 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Through the Chair.

20 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, sir.

21 COMMISSIONER BROWN: It says a couple of points. I  
22 wanted to thank Ms. White for, I didn't get a chance  
23 earlier for getting the captions up. I really appreciate  
24 that. I really think that's a good service that will help  
25 out our residents that are challenged in this area. I

1 really appreciate it getting it done. And secondly, as  
2 opposed to the Chairs, right to interrupt, according to  
3 Robert's rules, you do not. So what I would like to do so  
4 we can get the attorney Ms. Savage on board with our  
5 research in that and bringing something back to the Board  
6 next week. So we can clearly understand when the Chair  
7 can interrupt a Commissioner speaking. Because to my  
8 understanding once someone has the floor until they yield  
9 it back, you know, that's that point, but there is a fine  
10 line of where the Chair can interrupt, and we just need  
11 to know where that line is. Thank you.

12 COMMISSIONER JONES: Through the Chair. On a number  
13 of occasions ---

14 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: I would like to speak too. Just  
15 keep going back to your voice.

16 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Davis, you can go  
17 next, sir. Sorry. I apologize.

18 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: I'm sorry. I wasn't paying any  
19 attention. I'll pay attention.

20 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Okay. Well my comment, since you  
21 let people make comments, is the fact that if the Chair's  
22 report was much shorter, the meetings would be much  
23 shorter. You know, you shouldn't be able to give your  
24 opinions with 20 or 30 minutes and then keep interrupting  
25 people. If you stop doing that, the meetings would be

1 shorter, sir.

2 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Davis, as you well  
3 know, I have never given a 30 minute report.

4 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: It seems like it.

5 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Excuse. I'm not going to debate  
6 you, sir. I say I have never given a lengthy report. My  
7 reports have been brief. I explained to you why I was  
8 speaking at this particular moment. A Chair has certain  
9 privileges and certain rights that come with the  
10 Chairmanship, sir.

11 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Abuse doesn't.

12 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I don't think I'm abusing anyone,  
13 sir.

14 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: I do.

15 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Jones, Commissioner  
16 Jones.

17 COMMISSIONER JONES: Through the Chair. There had  
18 been a number of occasions.

19 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Why didn't you speak next?

20 COMMISSIONER BURCH: I'll wait my turn.

21 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Please, please. We are almost at  
22 the end of this meeting. We need not be disrupting, not  
23 respect one another, sir. It's simple as that you help  
24 the Chairmanship. Commissioner Jones.

25 COMMISSIONER JONES: All right. Through the Chair,

1 There've been a number of occasions just as the one that  
2 we just experienced where people are speaking outside of  
3 their opportunities to have the floor.

4 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Like him.

5 COMMISSIONER JONES: Commissioners interrupted you,  
6 continuously interrupted other Commissioners. And another  
7 commissioner continued to do the same thing. The only way  
8 that we can have any kind of a true meeting and get  
9 through it is if we have a structure to the meeting. The  
10 rules provide a structure for these meetings. And when  
11 people continue to ignore the rules of the meeting and  
12 that's what creates chaos and confusion, which are two  
13 brothers that are inseparable. Thank you.

14 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair.

15 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Burch.

16 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Thank you. I have new business.  
17 I wanted to share that our slogan for the 3rd District  
18 and after a while be it for the whole world is love where  
19 you live. They have picked that up at the Gray Haven  
20 Marina Village downtown at the riverfront. So that's good  
21 news. The other good news is I want to thank the  
22 department of DPW, Mr. Brunridge that he posted signs in  
23 the alleys where cars are not supposed to park. Once we  
24 clean the alleys up, this is to help Commander Slappy  
25 that people are not supposed to go through that alley

1 parking cars, then they looking at our homes to see  
2 whether or not they can break in or not. You are not to  
3 park inside the alleys where we have cleaned up. And when  
4 I say we that's all over the city, Mayor Duggan has made  
5 that a charge to clean up. Is that correct, Mr. Bell. The  
6 alleys are cleaned up and all over the city.

7 CHAIRPERSON BELL: My understanding is that they are  
8 working on that due diligence, that's my understanding.  
9 So I can't say they are all clean up, but that is a major  
10 problem.

11 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Okay. I just wanted to say,  
12 thank you. And let's just try to be kind to one. That's  
13 all I got to say.

14 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair.

15 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Excuse me. Excuse me.  
16 I'm going to move on to getting back to the City Attorney  
17 wants to speak to the issue that Commissioner Bernard  
18 raised about the towing, the RFP, and the towing concern.

19 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Then after that, Mr. Chairman,  
20 I'd like to raise one final motion for the evening.

21 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Excuse me. I'm not recognizing  
22 you, Commissioner Burton. We moving on. You've been  
23 totally disruptive during this meeting. I'm not going to  
24 give you the floor.

25 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Mr. Chairman,



1 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Excuse me. Excuse me.

2 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I have to raise up an important  
3 motion on the behalf of District 5 citizens, sir,

4 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Sir, I'm not going to recognize -  
5 Ms. White, would you turn on the [01:32:30 inaudible]  
6 mic, please.

7 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I call to overrule the Chair.

8 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Support.

9 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Excuse me.

10 MRS. WHITE: Yes. Through the Chair Assistant  
11 Corporation Counsel Whitley is on the line to speak to  
12 the matter that was requested.

13 ASSISTANT CORPORATION COUNSEL WHITLEY: Good  
14 afternoon, Honorable Board. I'm in a different mode  
15 today. So I just can turn on my mic. So I can't turn on  
16 my camera, but as it relates to the specific request by  
17 Commissioner Bernard, it's my understanding regarding the  
18 legality of that, that at this time that the Board simply  
19 could not take that type of action. Once the permits  
20 expire in May, there is currently an RFP process in  
21 motion that has already begun. There is not to my  
22 knowledge, any legal permissibility for the Board to  
23 extend that. There could be continued discussions about  
24 that with Commissioners who still have questions offline,  
25 but at this time, that is not an illegal option. As it

1 relates to Commissioner Brown's requests, I will be happy  
2 to look into some things. I am excited to hear that you  
3 all are looking into a parliamentarian. So I would be  
4 happy to look into a couple of issues if that is the  
5 desire of the entire Board that I could bring to you for  
6 next week. I could send you some correspondence during  
7 the week, but I would have to know the specific question  
8 that has to be answered.

9 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Through the Chair. Thank you,  
10 attorney Savage. I will send you an email.

11 ASSISTANT CORPORATION COUNSEL: Okay.

12 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you.

13 ASSISTANT CORPORATION COUNSEL WHITLEY: And if  
14 there's no objection from the Board, I do understand that  
15 the prior practice is to get a general consensus of the  
16 Board prior to us moving on written opinions.

17 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I think we have a general  
18 consensus to act on that particular concern.

19 ASSISTANT CORPORATION COUNSEL: Okay. Thank you.

20 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. We're going to move on.  
21 We're going to move on to announcement, Mr. Brown.

22 MR. ROB BROWN: Good afternoon, Mr. Chair.

23 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you.

24 MR. ROB BROWN: Your next BOPC virtual meetings are  
25 April 15th, 2021 at 3:00 PM. And the following week,

1 April 22nd, 2021 at 3:00 PM. And if it's your pleasure,  
2 I'll go straight into public comments.

3 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, sir.

4 MR. ROB BROWN: Okay. Mr. Chair, you currently have 9  
5 speakers. Your first 3 speakers will be CAC Chairman  
6 Scotty. Bowman, Ms. Bernie Smith followed by Minister.  
7 Eric Blunt. Mr. Bowman. Mr. Bowman.

8 MR. BOWMAN: Hello? Hello? Yes, I'm right here.  
9 Hello.

10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Speak, sir.

11 MR. BOWMAN: First of all, I just want to say that  
12 Dwayne Jones is going to be having a hearing at 11:30 AM  
13 on the 12th of this month on Monday. And those of us who  
14 are offended by the fact that we have a criminal, a  
15 violent criminal who has been given a promotion by the  
16 DPD. We'll be there protesting the action. We will meet  
17 at a quarter to 11 and we'll be there until noon. So  
18 anybody who is offended by the idea that a man who beat  
19 up a woman in a hospital and was recorded on video doing  
20 it. Please show up at that meeting again. It's at the  
21 36th District Court from 10:45 to noon on Monday and I  
22 yield.

23 MR. ROB BROWN: Ms. Bernie Smith, go ahead, Bernie,

24 MS. SMITH: Good afternoon Commissioners. You know  
25 what? I'm worn out Bell, welcome back. I'm telling you we

1 sure did need you. But why is it that we have it going on  
2 every week in, week, week, and week? Is it time for  
3 District 5 to have a new Commissioner? Is his election  
4 due because I know somebody who's anxious to take that  
5 place, believe me, I am. And they would be more decent,  
6 and respectful, and know what to do. As far as the media  
7 is concerned at the Commissioner. You have two other  
8 people that are gone in the same direction and they need  
9 to stop. I mean, you don't know how you sound. You're so  
10 disrespectful to each other. You don't give a darn about  
11 your position whatsoever and the people are listening and  
12 they're tired of it. I'm tired. As old as I am.

13 MS. SMITH: I'm tired. And it's time for you to stop  
14 and be decent, respectful people. You have a position to  
15 uphold. You're supposed to represent us, but you're not.  
16 And I'm sick of you and it's time for you to get out of  
17 office. And I'm going to find out if there's a vacancy  
18 for the 5th District and Davis, you just as bad. You're  
19 not doing any better. I'm going to find out there in your  
20 District where my son lives, I'm going to see that we  
21 have somebody to start looking at your position because  
22 it is terrible. You're supposed to be intelligent people,  
23 but you're ignorant. And you're totally a disgrace to the  
24 City of Detroit. We try and have intelligent people to  
25 represent us, but you guys there, you're sad, you're very

1 sad. And I hope you mute them every time they get out of  
2 order because I would do the same thing. I'm sick of you.  
3 You're just disgraceful. Take care and God bless you  
4 because you need it.

5 MINISTER BLUNT: Yes. Can you hear me, Board?

6 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Yes, we can.

7 MINISTER BLUNT: This is Minister Eric Blunt from  
8 Sacred Heart Catholic Church in Detroit. Chairman Bell's  
9 opening comments on the importance of timeliness and the  
10 focus of this meeting is exactly the issue I've been  
11 pleading for a long time. You can give credit to whoever  
12 you want, just get it together for once this meeting  
13 shouldn't last, any longer than 45 minutes before public  
14 comment., One of the many distractions is the lengthy  
15 discussion of crime statistics and crime prevention. And  
16 there must be a clear definition of issues that qualify  
17 for new business. Commissioner Jones' lengthy public  
18 announcement was just a hijack of new business. All of  
19 these have no place with the civilian oversight  
20 Commission and this meeting's purpose, which is to  
21 address police misconduct. Look at the brief discussion  
22 on the 32nd rule on no-knock warrants.

23 MINISTER BLUNT: This should not be a brief  
24 discussion. It brings to mind the SpotShotter  
25 surveillance system and how in the world these sounds can

1 result in a no-knock warrant within two hours. This whole  
2 situation appears to be staged, to promote another  
3 surveillance system. And this ShotSpotter system clearly  
4 needs a heavy dose of propaganda just to justify its  
5 purchase. A clear timeline, including the source of the  
6 request and the approval of warrants. Some warrants are  
7 based primarily on informants' statements, which is not  
8 someone that can be independently verified and held  
9 accountable. The HR report should focus on just two  
10 things. The officer discipline, and a deep dive on  
11 qualified candidates and the warning signs of white  
12 supremacy due to Detroit being over 80% black.

13 MR. ROB BROWN: Mr. Chair, your next 3 speakers would  
14 be Caller with the last three numbers 402, resident abuse  
15 at Detroit Detention Center, and Over With. Caller with  
16 the last 3 numbers 402.

17 CALLER 402: Can you hear me?

18 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: We can hear you.

19 CALLER 402: Well. It's nice to hear your voices  
20 again, Board. I wish I could see your faces. Well,  
21 welcome to my humble abode here. I can hear you again and  
22 looking forward to the summer when we can see against  
23 each other again, and I've been talking to some of the  
24 officers in different Precincts and they have been A1  
25 customer service and also been talking to Ms. Pastor. And

1 she's been doing a great job in the community services.  
2 Well, I've been so thankful for Officer Hernandez. I  
3 believe I spoke to him before and talked to him about  
4 something. He came up in my neighborhood and after  
5 talking to him, I got a clear understanding of steps to  
6 take, to resolve things. And I just commend him very  
7 highly. I told him I would do that too.

8 CALLER 402: And Commissioner Bell. I thank you for  
9 the way that you are so reserved. It reminds me of  
10 Commissioner Carter. Is like when the people are talking  
11 and there's something sensitive comes up. It's like, "who  
12 left the fan on? It's a little bit chilly in here. And I  
13 think I'll close the window, and turn the fan off."  
14 That's the response to give. And I'm so happy to hear  
15 you. I call you the poppa of them all. You keep it on the  
16 control Commissioner Bell. I really, really commend you  
17 very highly. And for your work sake and the rest of your  
18 Commissioners. Commissioner Holt, I give you a special  
19 honor as well. You did a very good job in the stead of  
20 commissioner Bell, and I appreciate you so very much for  
21 that. That's my comment. Yes. Ma'am, yes Ma'am.

22 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Other than Bell.

23 MR. ROB BROWN: Resident Abused at Detroit Detention  
24 Center.

25 RESIDENT ABUSER: Yes. Good afternoon. Can you hear

1 me?

2 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Yes, we can.

3 RESIDENT ABUSED: Okay, great. Yes. I'm a Detroit  
4 resident that got abused at the Detroit Detention Center.  
5 I've asked people to look into it at these meetings, but  
6 nobody has done so thus far. I wanted to thank  
7 Commissioner Bernard for showing concern about young  
8 people, not getting unnecessary records, and other  
9 trouble. And it's too bad. Well, then maybe there should  
10 be an effort to try that again. Anyway, I would like to  
11 talk about the crisis center that is being proposed on  
12 Woodward Avenue in the North End, where I live. And it  
13 seems to me that the police department knew about this,  
14 but the local residents didn't know about it. There  
15 wasn't thorough community engagement done. I was told  
16 there was a meeting in January, but they missed the local  
17 block club president. They do not want it there.

18 RESIDENT ABUSED: It's not that we're opposed to  
19 people getting the services. We do believe one is needed  
20 in Detroit, but that building used to be our library. And  
21 if we all read the Detroit city charter, it states that  
22 our most precious resource is our youth. So let's have a  
23 library in every neighborhood and activities and books  
24 for them. So hopefully children don't end up in the  
25 crisis center later on. So anything you can do to take a



1 look at this folks because there is huge opposition in  
2 the North End about this. The OCI complaints. Wow. I  
3 finally got a copy of that complaint I was looking for  
4 that the law department didn't want to give me and the  
5 OCI people are not doing thorough investigations. What  
6 they just take a cop's word for it. And they don't check  
7 back with the person. I mean, there were dishonest  
8 statements in this police report and Mr. Holley, I don't  
9 really.

10 MR. ROB BROWN: Mr. Chair, your next speaker will be  
11 Over With. Over With.

12 OVER WITH: Well, two minutes ain't enough, but I'm  
13 going to get started with this. Commander Slappy, I glad  
14 you're present today. You got a couple of officers over  
15 there at the 11th Precinct. You have a resident District  
16 and the 11th Precinct, is the Precinct over there. They  
17 are totally out of bounds across the line. I'm trying to  
18 address that with the new captain over there, but she's  
19 not familiar with the processes of what goes on over in  
20 11th, but I'm going to try to bring her up to speed. Now,  
21 Melanie White, we to get to you real quick, got 15  
22 seconds. What you've been doing at the Board - everybody  
23 needs to go to Detroit. You want to be on your Facebook  
24 page and listen to the recordings and your narcissist.  
25 Willie Bell, him and his henchman, all of them, Melanie

1 White included, Tiffany Stewart, and Jonya Underwood in  
2 the office been keeping messages from you all for the  
3 longest. You all don't know anything. I just found out  
4 there are 6 or 7 complaints over at the OCI. Lawrence  
5 Akbar they've been covering it up. And I heard Derek  
6 May's name mention. He's supposed to be under  
7 investigation about OCI, but they didn't do his first  
8 initial interview, after 90 days after the complaint was  
9 filed.

10 Now, Willie Bell, I'm going to get to you for this  
11 time. You've been playing around me a long time jumping.  
12 You didn't see the setup coming. I'm coming with it. I'm  
13 the real deal, man. I hold the third-highest score in the  
14 history of the State of Pennsylvania on a GED exam. They  
15 were going to use my essay for the next year's tests,  
16 practice tests. So I'm barely a student intelligent and  
17 what you've been doing totally against the charter.  
18 Totally against it, it's just human decency, man. You've  
19 been beating up on these people over their way.  
20 Commissioner Brown, Commissioner Burton, Commissioner  
21 Davis, you all got some help now. We are going to get all  
22 these mayors, minions, Hernandez, Holt, Jones, we are  
23 going to get them all addressed. You all can call me at  
24 (737) 0420313 (737) 042-0313. Joy Road.

25 MR ROB BROWN: Mr. Chair, your next three speakers

1 will be Ms. Lory Parks followed by Ms. Brenda Butler  
2 followed by Cunningham. Ms. Parks.

3 MS PARKS: Good afternoon, gentlemen. Listen, I still  
4 say that I don't think the Commissioners know their jobs  
5 because I mean out of that for a couple of hours, we'd go  
6 on and on and on about things that have nothing to do  
7 with policing in the city of Detroit. As you know, we  
8 have had a woman that was beaten up by the police in a  
9 mental, and they knew that that police officer hit that  
10 woman over 13 times. And yes, we will be at that meeting  
11 for the hearing and it's unconscionable for me to even  
12 think of you giving him a promotion. That does not make  
13 any sense at all to me, you know, and Willie Bell, you  
14 know doggone well, Coleman Young did not want any police  
15 officers on the police commissioners. So you need to get  
16 off everybody else talking about somebody else, getting  
17 up. You need to get off because you are not supposed to  
18 be on there, whether you retired or whatever. Thank you  
19 for taking my call.

20 MR. ROB BROWN: Miss Brenda Butler.

21 MS. BUTLER: Yes. Good evening.

22 VICE-CHAIR: Good evening.

23 MS. BUTLER: My concern this evening, it's regarding  
24 the discussion that you guys had earlier on the warrant  
25 on a resident. As a resident of District 4, I would like

1 to request for our community a presentation by DPD to  
2 explain to the community how this warrant actually works.  
3 And if this warrant is an ordinance, is that a federal  
4 government policy or Detroit policy? Also, I would like  
5 to question an answer that if a warrant is issued in  
6 error on a resident and there is property destruction who  
7 pays for that destruction of the residence home. And also  
8 what is the timeline to recover the damage of that visit  
9 by the police department. Thank you so very much, and I  
10 yield my time.

11 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Good questions.

12 MR. ROB BROWN: Mr. Chair, your next and your last  
13 speaker would be Cunningham.

14 CUNNINGHAM: Honorable body. This is my first time.  
15 Can you hear me?

16 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Yes.

17 CUNNINGHAM: This is my first time coming to one of  
18 these sessions and Mr. Willie Bell or officer or chief  
19 chair, a bully is all I can say, bully, a persecutor  
20 oppressor, tyrant, tormentor, brow beater, intimidator,  
21 persecutor, oppressor, tyrannies, torment, evil. This is  
22 my first time. And I don't know if these other  
23 Commissioners are just, their conscience is seared, but  
24 my God, and everybody seems that calls in for Mr.  
25 Chairman Bell. Seems like they're a hundred years old,

1 where are the young people? 18 to like 30 calling in, or  
2 even on this, on this Board. Evil, demonic, and those  
3 that support you, I think that the billionaires and  
4 millionaires got you all on puppet strings, wicked and  
5 evil and you all can retaliate against me because God  
6 said no weapon formed against me shall prosper. My  
7 Facebook is Cunningham, Cunningham, Cunningham, Detroit.  
8 I have no fear. God has not given me a spirit of fear,  
9 but the power of love, and a sound mind. And those that  
10 go to church need to get rid of Willie Bell demon. First  
11 time listen, and all I can say is Demon, Demon, Demon,  
12 Demon, Demon, Demon, Demon, Demon, Demon, Demon, Demon,  
13 Demon, Willie Bell bully. Demon Willie Bell. Thank you,  
14 Honorable body. Have a great day and enjoy your weekend.

15 MR. ROB BROWN: That was your last speaker, Mr.  
16 Chairman.

17 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Mr. Chairman, you have to

18 CHAIRPERSON BELL: The Chair will entertain a motion  
19 for adjournment.

20 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Second.

21 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Mr. Chairman the last four  
22 digits of a phone number of a resident that tried to get  
23 into this meeting, that's in the meeting, but they are  
24 being felt, no one is calling on this person. Their hand  
25 had been up. The last four digits of the number 5211.

1 This is a citizen trying to speak for public comment and  
2 for some reason, somebody from the Board staff is not  
3 calling on this resident.

4 CHAIRPERSON BELL: The Chair is making a motion for  
5 adjournment.

6 COMMISSIONER BURTON: The last phone number is 5211.  
7 Their hand is up. I call that you recognize this person,  
8 Mr. Chairman. Public comments are for the citizens, not  
9 for us.

10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: The Chair will entertain a motion  
11 for adjournment.

12 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Are you taking a vote, Chair Bell?

13 CHAIRPERSON BELL: The Chair will entertain a motion  
14 for adjournment.

15 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Second.

16 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I call for a record roll call  
17 vote, Mr. Chairman, and before you adjourn this meeting,  
18 please acknowledge this resident that's trying to speak  
19 with their hand up for public comment. The last four  
20 numbers are 5211. They are on this call, they are in this  
21 meeting. They are trying to speak, Mr. Chairman.

22 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Those in favor of adjournment,  
23 Aye.

24 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: The State representative has  
25 their hand up too.

1 COMMISSIONER BURTON: A State representative has her  
2 hand up too. They are trying to speak, Mr. Chairman.

3 CHAIRPERSON BELL: We stand for adjournment. Thank  
4 you.

5 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Oh, Lord.

6 (Meeting Adjourned at 4:56 p.m.)

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
