2 now Chairperson Bell.

3 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Good afternoon Commissioners.  
4 Thank you, Ms. White. I hope that you overall is having a  
5 great sunny day and perhaps we can get out of this  
6 meeting in a timely manner after a couple of hours, and  
7 you can enjoy the rest of the day for a walk or stroll,  
8 or whatsoever, but we have some major items at this  
9 meeting here. So I'm going to ask for your cooperation to  
10 do this in a timely manner because we also have two  
11 interviews to conduct for a parliamentarian in that  
12 process. So bear with me and I would hope that I'm asking  
13 for your cooperation. Thank you. The meeting is called to  
14 order. Chaplain, I didn't get the name, or I might have  
15 missed it.

16 MS. WHITE: Chaplain Michael Oliver.

17 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you.

18 CHAPLAIN OLIVER: Yes, sir.

19 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, sir. Invocation, please.

20 CHAPLAIN OLIVER: Most gracious Father, we come  
21 before you first and foremost, always saying thank you.  
22 Lord, we thank you for our lying down and rising this  
23 morning. Thank you for the protection over our families.  
24 Lord, I ask that you bless these Commissioners to do the  
25 business of the City. Lord, I ask that you touched them

1 with wisdom, knowledge, and greater understanding. Father  
2 allow this meeting to run in a most smooth and beautiful  
3 way so that they can do the business that they were  
4 called to do today. So now father, I ask that you bless  
5 each one of them in their own way, God. Keep them, lead,  
6 guide, and direct them. That is my prayer this afternoon

8 COMMISSIONERS: Amen.

9 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Thank you, sir.

10 CHAPLAIN OLIVER: You're welcome.

11 CHAIRPERSON BELL: So next item would be approval -  
12 no, let's try this, introduction to the Commissioners,  
13 starting with Vice-Chair Holt.

14 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Good afternoon, and thank you  
15 Chair. Good afternoon Board, the citizens of Detroit, and  
16 the men and women in blue. Yes, I am Commissioner. Annie  
17 Holt, Vice-Chair, At-Large.

18 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you District 1.

19 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Good afternoon Board. Good  
20 afternoon to the citizens of the City of Detroit and our  
21 officers out there working the streets. This is  
22 Commissioner Darryl Brown from District 1.

23 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 2.

24 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Good afternoon, everyone. I'm  
25 attorney Linda Bernard representing District 2. It's good

1 to see you, and all my colleagues.

2 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 3.

3 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Good afternoon, everyone. My  
4 name is Shirley Burch of District number 3, where we  
5 practice, love where you live. Thank you, Chair Bell.

6 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, District 4. Willie  
7 Bell, your Chair. District 5.

8 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Commissioner Burton present.

9 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, District 6.

10 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Good afternoon, Lisa Carter,  
11 District 6.

12 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. District 7.

13 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Good afternoon, everyone. This  
14 is Police Commissioner William M. Davis, District 7. Love  
15 where you work officers.

16 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. At-Large Commissioner  
17 Hernandez.

18 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Good afternoon. This is  
19 Hernandez, At-Large.

20 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Commissioner Jones.

21 COMMISSIONER: Good afternoon. Police Commissioner,  
22 Martin Jones sending greetings out to our Police Chief,  
23 his executive staff, and all of our community partners.  
24 Thank you for being with us.

25 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Commissioner Holley.

1 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. Good  
2 afternoon to you.

3 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Good afternoon. All the  
4 Commissioners are present at this time. Ms. White, we  
5 have a quorum.

6 MS. WHITE: Yes, sir.

7 CHAIRPERSON BELL: The next item will be May 13,  
8 2021, Agenda.

9 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: So moved.

10 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Support.

11 CHAIRPERSON BELL: It has been moved, and supported.  
12 Discussion. We have two major items and one as you know,  
13 with the search for the Chief of Police. I'd like to deal  
14 with that after my remarks and also posting for the Chief  
15 Investigator which we have talked about, and I think is  
16 necessary, that would be the second item. So we're going  
17 to move right into the minutes. Next would be approval of  
18 the Minutes for May 6, 2021.

19 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: So moved.

20 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Did I say Agenda, a vote? I didn't  
21 take a vote, did I? Sorry. Those in favor of the Agenda?

22 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

23 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Those oppose? No. Thank you. The  
24 motion carries. The next item would be the approval for  
25 May 6, 2021.



1 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: So moved.

2 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: So moved.

3 COMMISSIONER HERNANDE: Support.

4 CHAIRPERSON BELL: It's been properly moved and  
5 supported. Any additions or any corrections. Those in  
6 favor, Aye.

7 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

8 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Those oppose.

9 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Oppose.

10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Did I hear one?

11 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Opposed, yes.

12 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. The next item would be  
13 the introduction, Ms. White.

14 MS. WHITE: Yes. Through the Chair, the Department of  
15 Innovation and Technology is monitoring and recording the  
16 Board's meeting today and our court reporter is Mr. Don  
17 Handyside and the following staff members are in  
18 attendance today, Mr. Robert Brown, Administrative  
19 Specialist, Ms. Teresa Blossom, Community Relations  
20 Coordinator, Ms. Jonya Underwood, Administrative  
21 Assistant, Ms. Tiffany Stewart, Investigator, Director  
22 Katrina Patillo, Director of Police Personnel, Assistant  
23 Corporation, Counsel, Ericka Savage Whitley, Interim  
24 Chief Investigator Lawrence Akbar, Supervising  
25 Investigator as well as Acting Supervising Investigator,

1 LiSonya Sloan, Acting, Supervising Investigator Rosalia  
2 Madrigal, Senior Investigator, Adella Rivera and  
3 Investigators, Hannah Hiller, Kesha, Washington, Gianna  
4 Carter, Markita Stanton, Daniel Calloway, Roslyn Banks  
5 and Carolyn Nichols, and also Ms. Stephanie Phillips are  
6 all in attendance today for Board staff. Thank you.

7 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Welcome to the staff. Deputy Chief  
8 Charles Fitzgerald is representing Chief Craig.

9 DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: Chairman Bell, thank you so  
10 much for having me today, sir.

11 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you for your attendance. Ms.  
12 White, do we have any elected officials or  
13 representatives of elected officials?

14 MS. WHITE: Yes, sir. Through the Chair, former  
15 Police Commissioner, Jessica Taylor is present today, and  
16 also Miss Marie Overall from State Representative Tyrone  
17 Carter's office. And also just to note for the record  
18 Commissioner Jesus Hernandez is present. Thank you.

19 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. And welcome to the  
20 former Commissioners for their attendance, especially  
21 Commissioner Jessica Taylor. I served under her as  
22 Chairman when I came on the Board along with Lisa Carter.  
23 When we joined, she was the Chair at that time. Move on  
24 to the next item which is my report. I would ask that you  
25 bear with me. We had a couple of several, not several but

1 major but a couple of major items. On Monday as you know,  
2 Chief Craig announced his retirement effective June 1st,  
3 2021. Since the appointment by the emergency manager,  
4 Kevin Orr in 2013, Chief Craig has shown effective  
5 leadership and management by the Detroit Police  
6 Department. He helped in two long federal consent degrees  
7 and bring the department into the modern era of community  
8 policing. He has been a visionary, innovator as an expert  
9 in public safety and law enforcement. The Department, the  
10 City, and the resident are better today because of Chief  
11 Craig and his commitment to excellence. His inspiration  
12 of others and his skills and initiative implemented high  
13 standards and groundbreaking programs.

14 CHAIRPERSON BELL: The Board of Commissioners and  
15 community also have benefited from his willingness to  
16 have open dialogue and to honor the principle of civilian  
17 oversight. The Board has always appreciated his ability  
18 to engage and educate the public. We congratulate Chief  
19 Craig for this remarkable career, knowing that he got the  
20 best start possible by attending and graduating from the  
21 Detroit public school, Cass Teck. I want to throw it  
22 because he mentioned it at his press conference and I  
23 leave the Detroit Police Academy. We thank him for his  
24 service and remain forever grateful that he started and  
25 will end his police career in his hometown. We have seen

1 his bravery in action as an officer and as a Police Chief  
2 including his battle against COVID-19. We all continue to  
3 wish him and his family, the very best as is required  
4 under Section 7805 of the City Charter, the Board will  
5 perform its mandated duty to conduct a professional  
6 search, to identify qualified candidates for the Detroit  
7 Police Chief, as the Charter requires, the Board will  
8 submit a list of finalists to the Mayor for appointment  
9 subject to City Council's approval.

10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: As you well know, that is 3 names  
11 that we submit to the Mayor. As Chairman of Board on four  
12 different occasions, I had worked closely with the Chief  
13 since 2014. I am impressed with Chief Craig's leadership  
14 and willingness to work with the Board. I also want to  
15 add Commissioner Lisa Carter to serve in the capacity as  
16 Chair, and she has worked closely with Chief Craig and  
17 the executive team. Closing note, the search firm process  
18 to search without interference on the Board or Mayor.  
19 Interested police executive can submit their resume or do  
20 a bio to the search firm. That's the process. If you know  
21 anyone in that capacity who wants to apply, I think  
22 there's been a national event in terms of people being  
23 aware so they can apply once we established the search  
24 committee, but they can prepare themselves with the  
25 resume.

1           The cost for the search firm will be covered by the  
2   City, not the BOPC budget. Board members, please review  
3   all memos sent regarding this item. Thank you for your  
4   cooperation. I want to thank Ms. White for sending out  
5   communication in reference to how this process is going  
6   to work and you should be good to review it and you can  
7   all look at the Charter, it's quite clear in our mandate.  
8   Today, I would entertain a motion for the Board to adhere  
9   to the Charter of the mandate regarding the next step for  
10   the position of Chief of Police.

11           COMMISSIONER BERNARD: So move.

12           COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Support.

13           COMMISSIONER BURCH: I second it.

14           VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Is it necessary to extend the  
15   motion?

16           CHAIRPERSON BELL: I think, Commissioner Holt, can  
17   you read the official motion?

18           VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Sure, even though it's obvious that  
19   we were doing what, 11 to zero? Okay. Thanks. I move that  
20   in alignment with City Charter, section 7805, the Board  
21   shall perform its mandated duty to conduct a professional  
22   search with a reputable and qualified search firm to  
23   identify qualified candidates for Detroit Police Chief.

24           COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Support.

25           COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Second.

1 CHAIRPERSON BELL: It's been moved and supported. I  
2 want to thank all of you Commissioners. I heard  
3 Commissioner Bernard and others. Thank you for your  
4 second. Are there any discussions on this matter? Roll  
5 call vote. Vice-Chair Holt.

6 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Yes.

7 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 1.

8 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: I think he's on mute.

9 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I'll come back. District 2.

10 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Yes.

11 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 3.

12 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Yes.

13 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 4. Yes. District 5.

14 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Yes.

15 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 6.

16 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Yes.

17 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 7.

18 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Yes.

19 CHAIRPERSON BELL: At-Large, Commissioner Hernandez.

20 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Yes.

21 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Jones.

22 COMMISSIONER JONES: Yes.

23 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Holley.

24 COMMISSIONER JONES: Yes.

25 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 1. Ms. White.

1 MS. WHITE: Yes, sir. There were 10 = Yes votes. The  
2 motion passed.

3 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. The National Police  
4 Week. You have a sea of information on that. In  
5 recognition of National Police Week, the Board continues  
6 to thank Chief Craig, DPD executives and the men and  
7 women in the ranks, DPOA members, LSA members, and  
8 command officer union members, and all those civilians  
9 who worked on behalf of DPD. We thank you for your  
10 dedication and service in the City of Detroit, especially  
11 in these difficult times. DPD has shown up each day and  
12 really come out to be a tremendous workforce,  
13 notwithstanding what we've been dealing with. On today's  
14 Agenda, we're going to have the Chief's report by Deputy  
15 Chief Fitzgerald. We also have a presentation from the HR  
16 Director, Katrina Patillo, and the 8th Precinct with  
17 Commander Daryl Patterson, and Captain LaShanna Potts.  
18 Under new business, we will hold an interview for the  
19 contract position of Parliamentarian. Last, the Board has  
20 received several updates regarding the Board's staffing  
21 position. Today, I would entertain a motion regarding the  
22 position of Chief Investigator.

23 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: What kind of motion you want?

24 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Well, Commissioner Hernandez?

25 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: I can move it, yes. I move

1 that we repost the position of Chief Investigator. Ms.  
2 White has the details as to the expansion of the search  
3 as well.

4 COMMISSIONER JONES: Support.

5 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: I will second it.

6 CHAIRPERSON BELL: So thank you. Commissioners Holley  
7 and Jones. Discussion. Those in favor, we'll do a roll  
8 call vote. Vice-Chair Holt.

9 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Yes.

10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 1. District 2.

11 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Yes.

12 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 3.

13 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Yes, sir.

14 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 4. Yes. District 5.

15 District 6.

16 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Yes.

17 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 7.

18 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Yes.

19 CHAIRPERSON BELL: At large. I'm going to reverse the  
20 order this time. Commissioner Holley.

21 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Yes.

22 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Jones.

23 COMMISSIONER JONES: Yes.

24 CHAIRPERSON BELL: And Commissioner Hernandez.

25 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Yes.



1 MS. WHITE: Through the Chair. Yes, sir. there were  
2 9=Yes votes. The motion passed.

3 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Thank you,  
4 Commissioners.

5 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Mr. Chairman, I'd like to  
6 point out on the last vote when Melanie when you said  
7 there were 10 votes, they were 9. Both Brown and Burton  
8 weren't on that either. When you said there were 10 votes  
9 at the previous motion, it was only 9. Same thing as now.

10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I thought I heard Commissioner  
11 Burton vote. Yes.

12 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: He wasn't on the call. He's  
13 not on the call.

14 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay. No problem, we move on. If  
15 they want to clarify that we can do that at a later date.  
16 Thank you, Commissioner Bernard. We move on to now hear  
17 from DC Fitzgerald on behalf of Chief Craig. Thank you.

18 DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: Good afternoon Honorable  
19 Board. I would keep this report out short because I know  
20 you have a robust Agenda. Certainly, we're talking about  
21 crime, criminal homicides, and our non-federal shootings,  
22 still continue to be an issue for us. This year 2021,  
23 we're at 110 homicides where last year we were at 84, I'd  
24 say a have 31% increase. As far as non-fatal shootings.  
25 This year, we're at 340 last year, we were at 234 this

1 same time, which has a 45% increase. That moves our part  
2 one violent crime up 24% over the same time last year.  
3 All of our part one, our property crimes are down. Fairly  
4 substantially for the most part. Burglaries are down 36%.  
5 Larcenies are down 25%. Motor vehicle theft in the city  
6 is down 12%. So it puts us at about a 9% decrease in  
7 overall part one crime.

8 DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: But much like many, many of  
9 the major cities across the City. It's the shootings and  
10 the homicides are just truly been plaguing us as it has  
11 been for quite a few months, actually. With all that said  
12 the amount of runs coming in this and that the one single  
13 bright side you can pull out of is that we're still  
14 looking. We keep hovering right around that 11-minute  
15 mark for part one for response time for priority ones. So  
16 the men and women continue to get out there every day,  
17 even during like we've said for the past year COVID and  
18 everything else, they're out there, they're responding,  
19 they're getting there as quickly and safely as possible.  
20 As for the Coronavirus, the update; as of this morning  
21 still have 22 members that have their last tests were a  
22 positive test.

23 DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: That's down from about 50,  
24 from two weeks ago. So it's starting to slowly trend  
25 down, but even now with as many people that have been

1 vaccinated, we still have quite a few members like at the  
2 8th Precinct this morning, there are 5 people that have  
3 COVID as at their last positive test. So it is another  
4 struggle of ours that we continue to keep dealing with  
5 every day, practice social distance and wearing a mask  
6 and all the things that keep us healthy and safe. I did  
7 receive a question I believe it's from Commissioner  
8 Bernard and it was an agreeance by Commissioner Burch.  
9 And I think it was involving the canine officers and how  
10 we deploy them. Just to let you know, we do deploy them  
11 on a daily basis. We currently have 11 dogs that we use  
12 and that is with 7 handlers. They're split over 16-hour  
13 shifts, 7 days a week.

14 DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: We have 2 officers right  
15 now that are still in training. So really that amount of  
16 time for the 7 days being handled by 5 handlers, but  
17 they're doing just fantastic work. Of the 11 dogs, 5 of  
18 them are specific to bomb-trained dogs and all the rest  
19 of our patrol dogs for tracking and other things like  
20 that. But we do utilize them every day. And we're  
21 constantly hearing them on the radio calling for that,  
22 whether it be a track or it'd be anything needed along  
23 those lines. I had another question, I believe it's from  
24 Commissioner Davis and it was just the expansion on the  
25 DWIHN and our CIT teams. I do have, if you allow Chairman

1 Bell, I have Captain Leonard Gilbert is on the phone. If  
2 you want to get an update from her on any of that  
3 Commissioner Davis, or if that can be used at a different  
4 time...

5 CHAIRPERSON BELL: If it could be brief, then we can  
6 allow her, could it be brief?

7 DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: Oh, I'm sure it can, yes.  
8 Captain Leonard Gilbert, are you on?

9 MS. WHITE: Yes, we are preparing to enable her  
10 microphone.

11 DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: Okay. Ma'am if you could  
12 just briefly give the Board an update on the CIT teams in  
13 the DWIHN?

14 CAPTAIN LEONARD-GILBERT: Yes, sir.

15 CAPTAIN LEONARD-GILBERT: Good afternoon, Honorable  
16 Board through the Chair. Thank you for having me. I am  
17 Captain Tonya Marie Gilbert of the Office of Internal  
18 External over core response partnership. Quick update  
19 today. We are in downtown services in the 3rd Precinct,  
20 as well as the 9th Precinct. We launched in downtown  
21 services around about October of 2020. To date, we've had  
22 about 198 contracts as it relates to our CIT [20:41  
23 inaudible] core response partnership program with Detroit  
24 Wayne Integrated Health Network. And then in February of  
25 2021, to be exact, we launched in the 9th Precinct

1 expanded there the pilot program, and we've had 445  
2 contacts there through the CIT response program. In  
3 addition to that, we've got about 75 people within the  
4 department that have been CIT trained, which stands for  
5 crisis intervention team training. And we continue to  
6 expand. We're scheduled to go Northwest next, which would  
7 be the 12th and 8th Precincts.

8 DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: Yes. Thank you so much.

9 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Appreciated.

10 DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: And just lastly, just  
11 talking about drifting and drag racing, because I know  
12 it's been a topic for many weeks. Last weekend, once  
13 again was another stellar week as things start to warm  
14 up, we're going to run into more contacts, but just last  
15 week alone on the two days, Saturday and Sunday, they  
16 investigated over 130 males 32 females, 121 vehicles, and  
17 of those 121 vehicles they were able to impound 3 and  
18 forfeit 2 and they made 7 arrests where weapons were  
19 recovered. So as again, as it gets warmer, just last week  
20 in general, from both sides of town, both East and West  
21 patrol, we seized 101 handguns, 4 long guns with a total  
22 of 93 total CCW arrests, which is again, just amazing  
23 work by the men and women of the Detroit Police  
24 Department and doing what they can to keep crime down. So  
25 other than I'll answer any questions that you have.

1 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioners, you have the floor.  
2 I hope that you will be brief and to the point.  
3 Commissioners.

4 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Very brief, could I please  
5 speak, Mr. Chair?

6 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, ma'am.

7 COMMISSIONER BURCH: I want to thank you, Chief, very  
8 much regarding the question we had about the canine  
9 units. Do you have any intention to train more animals,  
10 especially if they're going on runs involving the  
11 mentally ill, and the second part of the question is  
12 regarding the fire engines that continually go down  
13 Dequindre Street? Do you work together to see exactly why  
14 is it so many fire calls going toward 8 Mile toward Outer  
15 Drive State Fair? Could you just work with them to see  
16 what's going on with the fire? You can answer next week.

17 DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: That sounds good. As far as  
18 the dogs, they're in a constant state of training. As we  
19 get more dogs we will develop additional handlers.  
20 Unfortunately, there's a cost associated with every dog  
21 we add to the budget. So those are things we need to ask  
22 for down the road, but they're training nonstop. So  
23 especially when we start thinking of dealing with the  
24 mentally ill being around schools, children, everything,  
25 they take all that into consideration.

1 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Thank you.

2 DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: Certainly.

3 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Mr. Chairman.

4 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, sir.

5 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: I know out of respect, we did  
6 not identify the people from the Police Department who  
7 are with DC Fitzgerald. Can we just at least acknowledge  
8 them?

9 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, sir.

10 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Thank you Mr. Chairman.

11 DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: Yes. I'd love to. Ms.  
12 White, and if you could, because I can't see who's on and  
13 who's not on if you could run them down?

14 MS. WHITE: Yes, sir. Okay. Through the Chair,  
15 looking at the attendees' list, I see Captain Aric  
16 Tosqui, Captain LeShanna Potts, Captain Derrick May,  
17 Director, Christopher Graveline, Commander Eric Decker,  
18 Commander, Kyra Joy Hope, Commander Sonia Russell,  
19 Commander Daryl Patterson, Commander Eric Ewing,  
20 Lieutenant S. McClure, Deputy Chief Mark Bliss, Director  
21 Reid Branche-Wilson, and Sergeant Glen Anderson. And that  
22 is all that I see as far as DPD executives. And I would  
23 also like to note for the record. I see former Police  
24 Commissioner, Ricardo Moore. Thank you.

25 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, Ms. White. Thank you,

1 Commissioner Holley, for knowledging that. I just want to  
2 - any other Commissioner have a question?

3 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Oh, I see Commissioner Bell,  
4 Commissioner Davis, Commissioner Bernard, and I believe  
5 lastly, Commissioner Brown.

6 CHAIRPERSON BELL: In that order, please.

7 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Okay, sir. I was just wondering,  
8 I know the 2nd Precinct is having a food drive this  
9 Saturday, from 10 to 2, has any other Precincts having  
10 any other food drives to help our communities that you  
11 know of?

12 DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: I don't know offhand. I  
13 know that the 2nd Precinct is for sure. But I can shoot  
14 you an update. I can have them send it out via email.

15 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Okay. That'd be good. Thank you.

16 DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: Yes. Certainly.

17 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair.

18 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, sir.

19 COMMISSIONER BURTON: You know, question for the  
20 Chief?

21 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: I'm sorry.

22 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Well, he's speaking now. Go ahead.

23 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Many of the residents that I  
24 speak to in the City of Detroit has some concerns with  
25 the expansion of traffic-mounted cameras. They like to



1 know how many traffic-mounted cameras that we have  
2 currently, what is the department is going with this  
3 because they do have a lot of concerns with pervasive  
4 surveillance as well. They also have to turn when it  
5 comes to the number of Greenlight businesses in the City  
6 and they wanted to know how many Greenlight locations are  
7 there currently, and what the City of Detroit is looking  
8 to do. Because my understanding is they have a lot of  
9 concerns about pervasive surveillance. And the third  
10 question will be my final question for the Chief. We know  
11 that facial recognition is a big growing concern as far  
12 as fear in a black or brown community, they want to know  
13 is the department using facial recognition through body-  
14 worn cameras, they have heard that other law enforcement  
15 is using facial recognition and body-worn cameras. And  
16 they urge the department is if they are using it for them  
17 to stop using it. But they'd like to hear out from the  
18 Chief's Office.

19 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Burton, before the  
20 Deputy Chief responds, I'm going to take that second  
21 question. The issue about Greenlight, you just receive in  
22 your package, all of the Greenlight locations in the City  
23 of Detroit. So look at your package, it's there. Ms.  
24 White sends out quite often when the department share, I  
25 think it's once a month or whatever, we get that

1 information.

2 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Mr. Chairman, we do have that  
3 information but the community don't know the numbers as  
4 well, sir.

5 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Excuse me, you can share with your  
6 community if that's what you concern about. The DC will  
7 speak to how many, but the other item, facial  
8 recognition, as you well know, is not utilized on video  
9 cameras in the car or body camera. And Deputy Chief can  
10 elaborate on that, but you should be knowledgeable about  
11 that particular subject matter, sir, because we would  
12 have extensively covered those areas. Deputy Chief  
13 Fitzgerald. Thank you.

14 DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: Yes, Chairman, I think you  
15 did a fantastic job answering the question. We don't use  
16 video. So it's a no to that, whether body-worn camera or  
17 in-car video. As far as the total number of Greenlight I  
18 can get you that. I don't have it in front of me. I know  
19 Captain Tosqui is on the phone, but we can get it to you  
20 just as easy.

21 DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: It's over 700, sir. It's  
22 over 700 locations and still growing. So with 700  
23 locations, but we have a printout on that. So he can  
24 share with you, enlightened himself, but he can share  
25 with the body of people he deals with in District 5.

1 Thank you.

2 DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: I believe it's 752. I don't  
3 have an exact number, but please don't hold me to that  
4 exact number, but it's right around that area.

5 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Other Commissioners?

6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I would like to make a  
7 comment. I'm not trying to beat a dead horse, but I think  
8 that Commissioner Burch's correct in suggesting that we  
9 might want to utilize these dogs. They're a lot less  
10 expensive than police litigation. And with respect to use  
11 of force issues, one case can cost 50 million as you  
12 know, or more so it's a very good way to disarm a person  
13 with a gun or without a gun, or to stop a person without  
14 shooting them. So I think it's something that the - and  
15 it was utilized as the Chief, I'm sorry, as the President  
16 knows extensively prior to now. To just have 11 dogs in a  
17 department that has than 700 officers are suspect to me  
18 anyway. I think we should look at it.

19 CHAIRPERSON BELL: That was not true. We only had  
20 maybe three or four dogs and we had limited I'm impressed  
21 with the number we have it, but you need to keep in the  
22 historic perspective of African-American dealing with  
23 dogs. There is a great deal of concern about policing in  
24 terms of dogs coming from, even the civil rights era. So  
25 you need to look that up and be well aware of when you

1 talk about dogs using in the patrol force in the City  
2 streets, that's why we have a specific target area where  
3 they concentrate on. So historically, I just want to  
4 remind you of that. Any other questions?

5 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: It's a lot better than a  
6 gunshot.

7 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Well, that's not the issue. Any  
8 other Commissioner?

9 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Commissioner Brown.

10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Brown.

11 COMMISSIONER BRWN: Mr. Chairman, I apologize for not  
12 being on early. I was in a bad spot with the internet. I  
13 just wanted to have some comments since the 8th Precinct  
14 is hosting, doing a report out tonight because I know  
15 they'll be coming up next. I just wanted to just remind  
16 everyone of the great job that men and women at the 8th  
17 Precinct is doing over in the area. And to answer  
18 Commissioner Davis's question. The NPOs at the 8th  
19 Precinct and myself, and a couple of fraternal  
20 organizations, we are always at the St Timothy Church,  
21 helping out the Isaiah project, the ongoing food drives  
22 over there every second and fourth, Tuesday. And I just  
23 want to give a kudos to the command staff at the 8th  
24 Precinct and welcome our new Captain, Captain Potts. I'm  
25 pretty sure she's going to fit right in and be an asset

1 to the team over there. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

2 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, Commissioner Brown. I'm  
3 glad you pointed that out. I was recently over at the 8th  
4 Precinct along with Chief Craig and others for the  
5 historic 44 years, retirement for Gail Johnson-Brown. 44  
6 years for female officers. That bar is high. As I made my  
7 comment, I don't see our sisters or brothers staying 44  
8 years. And it was such a great setting for that order  
9 choice and the Decoration and the accolades that you got  
10 on reference to her had been investigated at 8 precinct  
11 among some on the other previous stops, we had command  
12 chief, Logan and others come out for that. So, it was  
13 really a fantastic occasion for a Precinct to host that.  
14 Thank them. Any other Commissioner before we move on, if  
15 not, we will hear from our HR Director Patillo. And thank  
16 you, DC Fitzgerald, for reporting out. Thank you.  
17 Acknowledge the executive team for your commitment. I  
18 know we're losing a great leader, but in the past, I know  
19 we don't miss a beat in from function as executive  
20 change. So thank you for that.

21 DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: No, certainly, Chairman  
22 thank you.

23 DIRECTOR PATILLO: Good afternoon, Honorable Board.  
24 Through the Chair. My name is Director Katrina. Patillo.  
25 I will be presenting the human resource dower report for

1 the month of April. So starting with current appointment  
2 staffing for sworn positions filled, we are currently at  
3 96%, for positions vacant 4% for a total of 2,672. For  
4 civilian positions, we're currently for the month of  
5 April 83% filled, 17% vacant for 746 total positions  
6 total with those position field we're at 93% filled. 7%  
7 for vacancy total 3,418 according to the budget. For  
8 police assistance, we are at 83% filled. Also, we have 12  
9 vacancies and 58 filled. Moving on to sworn recruiting  
10 for July 1st, 2020 through April 2tst, total applicants,  
11 we had an increase of 152. So we were at 3,116 for in  
12 processing 37, hired one 45 lack of interest, 265,  
13 temporary disqualified, 1,877, disqualified permanently  
14 399.

15 DIRECTOR PATILLO: And the number of waiting in  
16 NACOLESS was 393. Moving on to NACOLEES testing for the  
17 written and physical agility examinations for April 21,  
18 written, we had scheduled 45, 29 appeared 23 of the 29  
19 passed, 6of the 29 failed. There were two reschedules and  
20 14 no-shows. For the physical agility, we had 63  
21 scheduled 39 appeared, 20 of 39 passed, 19 of 39 failed,  
22 rescheduled 3, four no-shows of 21. For the Academy  
23 graduates. We did not have any graduates for the month of  
24 April because the graduating class actually graduated on  
25 May 7th. It was 19 in that class. So you'll see that

1 update on May's report. For total new hires for April 21,  
2 we had 1 sworn officer, 12 civilians, 3 police assistant  
3 for a total of 16 new hires for Detroit residency  
4 information as of April 30th for Detroit total sworn 575,  
5 total civilians 329, police assistance 29, for 9  
6 Detroiters total sworn 1,939, 290 total civilians, and 29  
7 police assistance. For civilian new hires for Detroit  
8 residents it 6, for attrition you have an updated, I mean  
9 a spreadsheet included in your packet, but for sworn we  
10 had 18, civilian 6, and total attrition 24. For leave of  
11 absence and restricted duty. By category for FMLA,  
12 continuous was sworn we had 12, for FMLA, intermediate  
13 72, medical leave 1, military 7, 144 restricted, disabled  
14 50 with 17 sick. And then for your civilian breakdown, we  
15 had 11 for FMLA, continuous, 72 for FMLA intermediate, 4  
16 medical, 1 personal education, 3 sick. Moving on to the  
17 personnel sworn suspensions for April. We had a total of  
18 10, 8 police officers, 1 corporal, 1 sergeant, and for  
19 monthly separations, we had a total of 18, for the drop  
20 program for April, we had a total of 568. Just an update  
21 for starting class of May 17th, we're going to have 22  
22 candidates that are going to start.

23 DIRECTOR PATILLO: The breakdown of that is 11 women,  
24 I mean, 11 male Caucasians, 9 African-American males, 1  
25 Arabic female, and 1 black female. In addition to that,

1 we have 15 applicants that are currently in background 16  
2 scheduled for testing this Saturday, and out of the 57  
3 applications that we've received for May 30, will  
4 continue to move on. And then finally I believe you  
5 already received the responses to the inquiries that we  
6 have from April BOPC where I briefed out at. Pending any  
7 questions that are all I have. And this concludes the HR  
8 report.

9 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you Director. I read your  
10 report and reviewed the report. It was really  
11 informative, really up to date, and covered a lot of  
12 areas that we are concerned about. I want to thank the  
13 Commissioners.

14 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Yes, through the Chair.

15 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, sir.

16 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Sir, Commissioner Brown.  
17 Director Patillo, thank you for that report. That was  
18 very accurate. I really appreciate how you laid that out.  
19 I just had a couple of questions. I know we had talked  
20 about the temporary disqualified people or disqualify  
21 people that were disqualified for the use of marijuana or  
22 admitting that they used it. I know you had talked about  
23 going back and revisiting contacting some of those  
24 people. I'd like to know where, where are we with that?  
25 And secondly what's the process for - I've gotten a



1 couple of calls and questions about officers coming from  
2 other departments and they want us to know what would be  
3 their hiring process. Would they have to go back through  
4 the entire Academy or is it an abridged Academy?

5 DIRECTOR PATILLO: So in regards to the marijuana, so  
6 we did reach back out to all the candidates and out of  
7 the ones that we reached back to, 2 reapplied, and  
8 they're in the process right now. And then I think you  
9 had another question regarding applicants that...

10 COMMISSIONER BROWN: They're already police officers  
11 in other departments, and they want to come work for  
12 Detroit. Their concern was how long would they have to be  
13 in the Academy?

14 DIRECTOR PATILLO: So probably about a month or so. I  
15 think it just depends, but they do not have to do the 6-  
16 months all the way through the Academy. But they do have  
17 to be sworn in, I believe by the Chief.

18 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Okay. Thank you very much.  
19 Appreciate it.

20 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Brown, are you  
21 speaking of certified officers?

22 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Yes, sir. Commissioner Bell  
23 certified officers from other departments.

24 CHAIRPERSON BELL: That would be great because we  
25 lose so many of our officers, to other departments. So if

1 you know anyone from Southfield or any other department  
2 who wants to join DPD, I would strongly encourage you.

3 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Yes. I've gotten a few calls and  
4 I told them, let me check. And I believe one of them may  
5 be putting the paperwork in now. I think a group of them  
6 may be coming to Detroit from various departments.

7 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you for that recruitment.  
8 Thank you, sir.

9 DIRECTOR PATILLO: Commissioner Brown. I just want to  
10 give you a telephone number. They can call Lieutenant  
11 Cole's Office (313) 596-2145.

12 COMMISSIONER BROWN: No, I'm going to give them your  
13 number.

14 CHAIRPERSON BELL: It's two separate entities. It's  
15 two separate recruiting.

16 COMMISSIONER BROWN: I know. I did give them  
17 Lieutenant Cole's number that they can contact, but they  
18 didn't want to make people think that they were  
19 interested and received phone calls. That's why they were  
20 calling asking me and I told them I would check. And now  
21 I can give them the information and they can make the  
22 appropriate calls if this is what they desire to do.

23 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Very good. Very good. Thank you.  
24 Any other Commissioner? If not Director, thank you for an  
25 outstanding report. I know you working hard. You just had

1 a career job fair, and that's ongoing in different areas.  
2 I saw that flyer and I know that we are trying our best  
3 to recruit. We also try our best to retain officers that  
4 we have, but they have freedom of choice. I'm looking  
5 forward to the Bill that State Rep Tyrone Carter is  
6 sponsoring and State Senator Chang is sponsoring that.

7 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Wait, wait. I thought it was  
8 Senator Santana.

9 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Stephanie Chang is the co-sponsor  
10 of this is my understanding, and I spoke to her recently.

11 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Okay.

12 CHAIRPERSON BELL: But we're happy for all those on  
13 board for that matter. Okay. We'll move on Director.  
14 Thank you for a great report.

15 DIRECTOR PATILLO: You're welcome, sir.

16 CHAIRPERSON BELL: And now we're going to hear from  
17 outstanding, as Commissioner Brown would say, the 8th  
18 Precinct, Command Patterson and Captain Potts. I got an  
19 opportunity to interact with her when I was at the 8th  
20 Precinct and I saw her at the paperwork and she's going  
21 to be a great asset to the Precinct but Commander  
22 Patterson is doing a great job. Commander.

23 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Through the Chair Bell: And I know  
24 the folks over at the 6th are really regretting that  
25 she's moved on, but she's our treasurer. So we're going

1 to keep moving and appreciate her.

2 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Players are drafted every day.

3 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Are we ready for the 8th Precinct?

4 COMMANDER PATTERSON: Yes, sir. Good afternoon,  
5 everyone.

6 COMMISSIONERS: Good afternoon.

7 COMMANDER PATTERSON: I'm Commander Darrell Patterson  
8 of the 8th Precinct. Through the Chair, I'd like to  
9 introduce my new Captain. She's doing a great job since  
10 she's been over here so far. I think we're going to work  
11 out well. And she will be presenting the 8th Precinct  
12 BOPC presentation for 2021.

13 CAPTAIN POTTS: Good afternoon, Honorable Board.

14 COMMISSIONERS: Good afternoon.

15 CAPTAIN POTTS: I'm thankful to be here. This is my  
16 second week of being over at the 8th Precinct, and I'm  
17 happy to report. I'm going to report out on some really  
18 great numbers. When you look at our violent one, part one  
19 crimes, we're down 9% in our homicides. When we look at  
20 our criminal sexual conduct, 1 in 3, we are up 19%.  
21 However, when I did a deep dive most of those are known  
22 offenders. Those are relationship-based incidents. So we  
23 don't have a rapist out here threatening a community.  
24 When we look at our robberies, our arm robberies were  
25 down 43%, which is a huge decrease. Our ag assaults

1 anywhere around the city. In this country, we are seeing  
2 an uptick of 18%, but as DC Fitzgerald suggested we  
3 believe COVID has played a role in those numbers.

4 CAPTAIN POTTS: However, I'll talk about some of the  
5 strategies that we're going to implement here at the 8th  
6 Precinct that has been working and some of the things  
7 we're going to do new that we believe will reduce those  
8 numbers. When you look at our property crime, our  
9 property crimes are just outstanding. In each category,  
10 we're down double digits. Our burglaries are down 48%,  
11 which is huge. Our larcenies are down 25% and as well as  
12 our motor vehicle deaths are down 13%. And so the 8th  
13 Precinct has done a phenomenal job of eradicating the  
14 crime and the 8th Precinct footprint. When you look at  
15 our non-fatal shootings versus 2020 to 2021, we're  
16 sitting now at a 14% decreased from last year. And as I  
17 said, our homicides are down 9%. Our auto theft, I  
18 attributed that to just the work that's going on with  
19 commercial auto theft and as well as the targeted  
20 enforcement that we do with our motor units.

21 CAPTAIN POTTS: Some of the strategies that I believe  
22 have been really instrumental in decrease the crime in  
23 the 8th Precinct is utilizing our ceasefire and special  
24 ops teams. We do restore orders weekly, which has yielded  
25 some really great stats for us. I'll give you an example.

1 So handguns taken off the street year-to-date, we had  
2 161. We have 404 guns taken last year. If we continue on  
3 that trend we're going to surpass that 404. We do  
4 targeted enforcement. We run an OTE operation. We do  
5 narcotics enforcement. And just to give you an idea of  
6 what our offer engage stats are, we've done four events  
7 so far. And out of those four events, we have some  
8 phenomenal stats. We've been able to arrest 10 felony  
9 arrests set 76 misdemeanors for the offer to engage. We  
10 issued 78 miscellaneous ordinances, we've confiscated and  
11 forfeited 79 vehicles.

12 CAPTAIN POTTS: We were able to confiscate 19.9 grams  
13 of cocaine, and we also recovered 4 handguns. So that's  
14 just a little bit of what the 8th Precinct is doing as  
15 far as targeting the criminal element in our Precinct. As  
16 you know, we are one of the Precincts that have  
17 ShotSpotter. We sat down with me and the Commander with  
18 our team and we believe the way that we're going to  
19 implement ShotSpotter now is you're going to see a  
20 reduction in our violent crime with us as well. We know  
21 that the summer is up ticking. However, I can proudly say  
22 that the 8th Precinct now for non-fatal shooting  
23 closures, we sit as the highest in the city at 69%. And I  
24 hope to keep that trend going as we enter the summer  
25 months. Some of the strategies that we're also doing, we

1 do gun stats where we sent our detectives to arraignments  
2 to make sure that the bonds for violent offenders are  
3 high.

4 CAPTAIN POTTS: We work with our Niva leads to make  
5 sure that when we identify a gun residue and things like  
6 that, we can put it to a criminal element and go out and  
7 lock that person up. We have a very liberal robust system  
8 with our neighborhood's CB patrols, and we just started  
9 here under Commander, Kyra Hope the new kingdom patrol,  
10 which is going to utilize our churches, and they're going  
11 to go around 3 miles each way. That's going to be some  
12 more eyes and ears. One of the things that I'm going to  
13 bring here is our community roll call, where we go out in  
14 the community and our hotspot locations, and we do  
15 community role calls. That was very successful in a 6th  
16 Precinct. And I believe that it will be successful in the  
17 8th Precinct. I'm also looking at doing a cop on the  
18 block for some more community programming. We do have a  
19 very good NPO program here, but there's always room for  
20 improvement. We still have our brotherhood program, which  
21 is out of Henry Ford High School. Due to COVID, they're  
22 working on zoom right now and the NPOs right now, we're  
23 just basically going out doing conflict resolution. We  
24 held a restorative practice, the first event last fall.  
25 It was very successful. The Commander and I are looking

1 to extend that going into the summer months. And we're  
2 also doing bike lanes, safety initiatives, police  
3 encounters, stranger danger, career days, senior  
4 awareness so forth, and so on. We just had coffee with a  
5 cop. It was my first one and it was extremely well  
6 attended. So I'm looking forward to just implementing  
7 some more things over at the 8th Precinct in a  
8 partnership with Commander Patterson who, thus far has  
9 been a great partner.

10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, Captain. I want to know  
11 what you're not doing over there. Mighty impressive I  
12 know. I want to just pause to get permission. I just want  
13 to thank the 8th Precinct, but I also want to give very  
14 rare, a shout-out to my Precinct, number 5, and commander  
15 Ewing was on this call earlier. So I covered 2 precincts  
16 like Commissioner Burch. Some of the other Commissioners,  
17 Burton you too, covered a 9 and 5, but I lived in number  
18 5. So I really monitor it all the time because I see the  
19 interaction with the officers. Commissioners, do you have  
20 any questions for the Captain or the Commander.

21 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Mr. Chairman?

22 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, sir.

23 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Captain, I think we probably  
24 need to move you around so that we can have that report  
25 in all these Precincts. But let me ask you this. Pardon



1 me for my ignorance, but what is community roll call?

2 CAPTAIN POTTS: So community roll call is where we  
3 take, which would be inside our building, our roll call  
4 with our four shifts on platoon 1 through 4, and we take  
5 them out and put them in a community. So it's a way for  
6 the community, especially in our hotspots. So like where  
7 we noted there are no drug houses, where we have  
8 businesses of illegal activity. We literally take our  
9 roll call to them and it does two things. It lets the  
10 citizens know that we're serious about conducting crime  
11 initiatives in their Precinct footprint, but it also puts  
12 the criminal element on notice that we see them and they  
13 now have our full attention.

14 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Thank you.

15 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Mr. Chair?

16 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Commissioner Davis.

17 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes and then Commissioner Burch.

18 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: So, I can speak?

19 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Oh, yes, sir.

20 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Okay. I would like to say that I  
21 am sad. Captain Potts did an outstanding job and like say  
22 the community role call is something that I had received  
23 plenty of support from the neighbors, you know, like say,  
24 I mean, I got a lot of it, you know. It's good that the  
25 changes that Commander Williams and Captain Potts was

1 able to accomplish up at the 6th Precinct because I used  
2 to get a whole lot of negative calls about the 6th  
3 Precinct. Now, I get a whole lot of positive calls and I  
4 hope it continues.

5 CHAIRPERSON BELL: It'll continue. You got a great  
6 Commander over there. I don't know the Captain who  
7 replaced her, but I'm pretty sure Captain Potts is going  
8 to interact with, and share some of her expertise and  
9 insight to the 6th Precinct, I mean continued at the 6th  
10 Precinct. You know, we all work together, both the  
11 Commanders work together.

12 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Commissioner Bernard.

13 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I want to know what cop on the  
14 block is, and you've mentioned something called the  
15 brotherhood program.

16 CAPTAIN POTTS: Okay. So cop on a block, I actually  
17 took it from Allen Park PD. It's like a block party. What  
18 we do is we go out and we section off an area within a  
19 two-block radius and we actually do things and interact  
20 with the community. So we'll have face painting. We'll  
21 have some informative literature there. When I did it  
22 over in the 6th Precinct, we invited the FBI to come out  
23 and just basically put a human face to policing. And it  
24 went over extremely well. I did it four times in the 6th  
25 Precinct and I'm hoping to do it a little bit more in the

1 8th Precinct. And as far as brotherhood, it is a program  
2 that's out of hearing for a high school where we go and  
3 have mentorship for young males and females. We do also  
4 have the sisterhood program, unfortunately, here at the  
5 Precinct right now we don't have any women involved in  
6 Henry Ford, but I'm looking to change that now that I'm  
7 over here.

8 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Through the Chair. I believe I can  
9 go at this time.

10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, ma'am.

11 COMMISSIONER BURCH: No, Commissioner Burch.

12 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Commissioner Burch.

13 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Thank you, Miss Annie.

14 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: You're welcome.

15 COMMISSIONER BURCH: I just want to say  
16 congratulations, Captain, and kudos over here to number  
17 11 under the leadership of Commander Slappy, we also have  
18 a new Captain. Her name is Kimberly Blackwell. She is  
19 really starting off with a fire that we had a theft,  
20 believe it or not, on a pot, Butler Park had two big  
21 large flower pots that have been there for years. All of  
22 a sudden it disappeared. So we could not understand why  
23 in the world would somebody steal flower pots in a park.  
24 Long story short, the Captain had to reign and go on full  
25 force to find out who did it through her investigations.

1 We're proud of her. She goes and attends as Commissioner  
2 Brown was bragging about how they have food. Well, guess  
3 what Commissioner, our Captain went to one of our sites,  
4 the Davidson Village, and was accompanying the people  
5 while they were giving out food.

6 COMMISSIONER BURCH: We give out food from Reverend  
7 Griffin's church, also Second Ebenezer. So all of us are  
8 meeting the needs of our people. So I don't want you to  
9 think that it's just over there. Number 8. It's over  
10 there at Number 11 too. Now I made the same things about  
11 number 11, but I know what 11 does do and they could do  
12 better, ma'am. Like you have cop on the block, we have  
13 cop on the block too, okay. So we all out here to correct  
14 and save our citizens because we are loving where we live  
15 in District 3. Thank you, ma'am. Thank you, Chair Bell.

16 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you for this competitive  
17 spirit of the Precinct. Vice-Chair Holt.

18 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Thank you, Chair Bell. Okay.  
19 Commander Patterson and Captain Potts. I'm going to need  
20 you to help me remember. I believe at the coffee with the  
21 cop, you were describing a strategy that you had  
22 implemented to cut down some negative traffic at that  
23 convenience store right there on Lahser and Grand River.  
24 Was that at the coffee with the cop that you're  
25 explaining?

1           COMMANDER PATTERSON: It was at one of the Coffee  
2 with the cop? I don't think we mentioned it yesterday,  
3 but what we've done recently we've had at least four  
4 wraparounds at that location. And what we do is we send  
5 police officers into that location, our special ops, our  
6 ceasefire members. We also send our traffic cars over  
7 there to that location and we just flood the area with  
8 police. That particular area with the city liquor has  
9 been a troublesome area for the 8th Precinct and citizens  
10 have been coming to us complaining about that location.  
11 So every now and then I'll make sure that our special ops  
12 crew goes over to that area and conducts a wrap-around  
13 into that area and make sure that we kind of take a bite  
14 out of crime in that area. The last one we did we got 6  
15 felony arrests. Five of those were CCWs or carrying a  
16 concealed weapon. One was a felony warrant. We wrote 198,  
17 tickets recover one stolen vehicle and we recovered 4  
18 firearms from that particular event. So every time we go  
19 over there, it makes a dent in what's going on in that  
20 area. Every shift has been notified by me to pay extra  
21 special attention to that location. That location is a  
22 Greenlight, and I make sure that everybody on every shift  
23 goes to that location daily. I pass by there every day.  
24 And if I see a problem, I make sure I called the Precinct  
25 back and get somebody up there. So we're giving extra

1 special attention to that location. And especially due to  
2 the fact that they're opening that new Obama Building  
3 right across the street, we want to make sure that area  
4 is clear and safe for everybody to enjoy.

5 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Thank you, Commander Patterson. And  
6 again, we cannot say too many times how fortunate we are  
7 to have Captain Potts at the 8th. Thank you Chair Bell.

8 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. If there is no other  
9 question for the Commander.

10 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Mr. Bell.

11 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, ma'am.

12 COMMISSIONER BIRCH: Not a comment to him, but I  
13 wanted to thank AC Hope for coming to our 11th Precinct  
14 community relations meeting. It was encouraging to see a  
15 colleague come to another person. Another Commissioner's  
16 meeting. I just want to thank her personally for  
17 attending our meeting.

18 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. But that's what she  
19 does, she's citywide.

20 COMMISSIONER BURCH: That's what she does? Okay.

21 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Citywide. And she has been over to  
22 my Precinct too. I want to thank the Commander and the  
23 Captain of doing a great job at the 8th Precinct.  
24 Continue that spirit of fighting crime, but also  
25 relationship. I'm not going to call it public relations.

1 I heard on the radio just recently, all the people  
2 talking about police reform, we need people and community  
3 reform in terms of what in our community. This, you will  
4 know the issue that we have to deal with it just off the  
5 hook and no community is not immune to it. And so I call  
6 it, people reformed and community reform. That's what I  
7 was supposed to among others on this call meeting growing  
8 up in the city of Detroit. So let's be proud and try to  
9 re reinstate that. We move on to the next item would be  
10 Ms. White.

11 MS. WHITE: Through the Chair, Honorable Board,  
12 you've received all of the incoming correspondence for  
13 this week and it is listed on the Agenda and staff co-  
14 hosts will bring up the Agenda for the community's  
15 information and reference as well. Number one, weekly DPD  
16 facial recognition technology report for the week of May  
17 3rd through May 9th, 2021. You also received the human  
18 resources report as well as various other staff reports  
19 from BOPC staff and OCI staff. Additionally, the letter  
20 of resignation from investigator Kesha Washington was  
21 also submitted. And also you received responses from the  
22 disciplinary administration regarding BOPC questions that  
23 were submitted for last week's presentation. And that  
24 concludes the incoming correspondence.

25 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, Ms. White, Ms. White in

1 reference to Commissioner Burton's concern about the  
2 Greenlight, Ms. White has agreed to post it on our  
3 website and people can take a look at it. So share that  
4 with your District in terms that it will be posted on the  
5 website, the Greenlight locations in the near, near  
6 future. Unfinished business. New business.

7 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Oh, Through the Chair.

8 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, ma'am.

9 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: All right. In light of the fact  
10 that we as Commissioners spend 180 Thursdays a year. I  
11 moved that we give ourselves and our families and our  
12 friends, the gift of time by taking a break on May 27th,  
13 for the Memorial weekend.

14 COMMISSIONER BURCH: I second.

15 CHAIRPERSON BELL: It's been properly moved and  
16 supported. Discussion.

17 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Discussion. Mr. Chairman.

18 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, sir.

19 COMMISSIONER BURTON: You know the Detroit Police  
20 Department is involved in the community's lives 24/7 and  
21 they have to bear witnesses that this Board has taken a  
22 lot of breaks off. And so they really want to hear from  
23 elected officials and they prefer that this Board takes  
24 no more time off. It's really preposterous for us to  
25 submit taken additional breaks at this time, knowing that



1 many of our constituents are still having some  
2 challenges, plug ging into these meetings because of  
3 internet, difficulties. Poverty is a growing issue here  
4 in America's blackest poorest city, Detroit, Michigan.

5 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Burton, I hear you  
6 loud and clear, but I don't see us - we haven't taken off  
7 since January. It's a grueling schedule for the Board to  
8 meet weekly, and this would not stop you from going out  
9 in your District or wherever you go, to interact with  
10 that community. But it would also give our staff a little  
11 break too because our two top individuals haven't had a  
12 vacation. I would like to get them that week off in terms  
13 of taking because we're not going to meet on that day if  
14 this passes, so we ready for a vote. Any other  
15 discussion? Yes, sir.

16 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I call for an off-the-record  
17 roll call vote, sir.

18 CHAIRPERSON BELL: No problem, sir. District 1.

19 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Commissioner Brown is not on mute.

20 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay. I'll come back. District 2.

21 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Yes.

22 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 3.

23 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Definitely.

24 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 4. Yes. District 5.

25 COMMISSIONER BURTON: No.

1 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 6.

2 COMMISSIONER CARTER: 6.

3 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 7.

4 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: No.

5 CHAIRPERSON BELL: At-Large. I'm sorry. I'm back to  
6 Vice-Chair Holt.

7 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Yes.

8 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay. Commissioner Hernandez.

9 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Yes.

10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Jones.

11 COMMISSIONER Jones: Yes.

12 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Holley.

13 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Yes.

14 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Did I miss anyone?

15 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Mr. Chairman, I was trying to  
16 chime in on the discussion. I just wanted to make a  
17 comment before I voted that our days that we meet and the  
18 number I mean, I believe it is Charter mandated. So just  
19 in the future, we've got to make these recommendations.  
20 Let's just make sure that we're not violating the Charter  
21 and my vote is going to be a no.

22 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. I think we are in  
23 compliance with our meeting, with the Charter. The body  
24 has to make the decision with reference to the best  
25 interest of the community. And as I stated, we have a

1       tremendous schedule. Ms. White, what is the vote?

2               MS. WHITE: Through the Chair? There were 8 yes votes  
3       and there were 3 no votes. The motion passed.

4               CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, Ms. White. Are we  
5       prepared for the interviews?

6               MS. WHITE: Yes. Through the Chair, Dr. Fletcher  
7       Bland is on the line and that is the first candidate for  
8       the parliamentary interviews. And we are preparing to  
9       move him over to the panel gallery. Honorable Board while  
10      we are doing that, you have received all of the  
11      documentation in preparation for today's parliamentary  
12      interviews, including, but not limited to the resumes of  
13      each candidate and also the support material involving  
14      the interview questionnaire and other material for your  
15      reference and use.

16              COMMISSIONER BURTON: Mr. Chairman. My apologies. You  
17      didn't call for any more new business.

18              CHAIRPERSON BELL: We are going to move on, sir? We,  
19      at this point in time, thank you.

20              MS. WHITE: And also Honorable Board for your  
21      reference, the interview format will be as follows the  
22      interview questions. I will pose the interview questions  
23      to the candidate. There are 8 technical questions and  
24      that will conclude the technical portion of the  
25      interview. And then immediately thereafter the interview

1 will be open for Commissioners to ask any additional  
2 follow-up questions. And at that time after the  
3 conclusion of all of the interview questions, the Chair  
4 will give final remarks. And then the candidate will be  
5 asked to return back to the virtual waiting room for  
6 further instructions. Also, please note that each  
7 interview for each candidate will last between 15 to 20  
8 minutes. It should not be any longer than 20 minutes for  
9 each candidate interview. And also that will allow for  
10 you to move forward with the meeting announcements and  
11 the public comments in a timely fashion. And if the staff  
12 call is complete and let me know if Dr. Fletcher Bland  
13 has arrived? Good afternoon, Dr. Bland, if you could  
14 please enable your microphone, please. And again,  
15 Honorable Board, your first candidate is Dr. Fletcher  
16 Bland for the contract position of parliamentarian. And  
17 if it is your pleasure, I can move into the brief  
18 instructions of the interview, and then we can move  
19 forward to the interview questions.

20 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes ma'am.

21 MS. WHITE: Okay. Dr. Bland, could you please speak  
22 so that I can make sure that you can hear me and that I  
23 can hear you as well during this interview? Staff co-  
24 hosts are still working with Dr. Bland's microphone to  
25 ensure that it is working properly. Dr. Bland, okay. I

1 will move forward with the interview introduction, and I  
2 know that staff cohorts are still working with Dr.  
3 Bland's microphone.

4 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Ms. White, is he on zoom, or he's  
5 calling here?

6 MS. WHITE: He is on zoom, and I do see where the  
7 video is enabled. And I thought that the microphone was  
8 also enabled, but for some reason, we are experiencing  
9 some technical challenges at this time. Dr. Bland, if you  
10 can speak at this time because we have sent several  
11 messages for you to enable your microphone.

12 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Could we suggest that he comes in  
13 on his phone? That's not allowed Ms. White. Through the  
14 Chair.

15 MS. WHITE: Yes. Through the Chair. That is  
16 permissible. Dr. Bland, if you can hear me and then also  
17 staff co-host please send a message to Dr. Blanton to  
18 inform him that he can sign in from his phone, and then  
19 we can move forward with the interview. For the second  
20 candidate interview, I have not received notification  
21 that they are in the waiting room just yet. So we will be  
22 waiting for Dr. Bland.

23 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay. Announcement. I just want to  
24 knowledge Wayne State Chief, or public safety there  
25 Brother Hope, Chief Hope. And thank you for your support

1 as you well know, they patrol in an area of Wayne State  
2 and do an outstanding job in that area. So we appreciate  
3 cheap coat points, state, public safety. We have always  
4 worked together and under his leadership, he's interacted  
5 with us quite often.

6 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Any announcement we can make  
7 now. Yes, sir. Go ahead and announce when we can make it  
8 now.

9 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Ms. White: Can you help me with  
10 that?

11 MS. WHITE: Yes. Through the Chair Commissioner,  
12 Reverend Holley has the announcement regarding  
13 vaccinations taking place at his church, little rock,  
14 excuse me, historic little rock Baptist church on May  
15 27th, 2021. And Commissioner Holley, if you can also  
16 share the timeframe, please?

17 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: It's the 23rd day of May, 12 to  
18 3, and 16 and up. Then also Mr. Chairman and food  
19 community, we have also the bulletin now. So too we have  
20 a clinic that we have vaccinations, but also we've got  
21 the ability now to go to those who are homebound but  
22 that's somebody who's homebound. We can go directly to  
23 them and give them the vaccination as well. Thank you  
24 very much.

25 CHAIRPERSON BELL: That's great. A really good

1 announcement that people should take advantage of.

2 Commissioner Burch, you have an announcement?

3 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Yes, sir. Thank you.

4 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Then Commissioner Bernard.

5 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Okay. Thank you, Mr. Chair. I  
6 wanted to announce that Community United for Progress and  
7 the 8-mile Boulevard Association is going to do a cleanup  
8 this Saturday from 9 o'clock until 2. What we're doing is  
9 cleaning the strip of Van Dyke and 8-miles back all the  
10 way down to Dad Butler Park where we've come together  
11 with the sheriff department, Sheriff Rafael Washington  
12 has been very supportive and will have his men there  
13 along with the police department in Warren and our DPD.  
14 So as we come together, you're beautifying getting ready  
15 to prepare. Our next activity will be to address the gas  
16 stations that are in disarray on the outside. So if you  
17 clean off the outside, you clean the inside of your  
18 business to represent Detroit as to what it is. I think  
19 you. Anybody wishing to join us, please be up there at 8  
20 o'clock at the Belmont Shopping Center or 9 o'clock on  
21 this Saturday, the 15th. Thank you, Chair Bell.

22 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you for that announcement.  
23 Commissioner Bernard.

24 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Just real quickly, everyone.  
25 We have the announcement actually in our packet about the

1 Detroit Police Department's, women in blue event. It is  
2 Tuesday, June 8th, from 8:30 in the morning to nine 30.  
3 And Melanie, if you don't mind, if you would contact the  
4 foundation and make sure that they have a table for every  
5 Board member, and if they bring a guest, a guest like we  
6 have in the past, this is so cool because Denise Hood,  
7 Judge Denise Hood was the first black female chief judge  
8 for federal district court in the, in the history of the  
9 state of Michigan is our peanuts speaker. She's a  
10 personal friend of mine. We both worked for Coleman young  
11 together, and I know that you ever, and Holly know her  
12 husband who former Councilman and Reverend Nicholas very  
13 well. So hopefully we can all be present for this. We  
14 used to do it as the Board and the staff as well for this  
15 particular event, if you've left the reserve our table so  
16 that our staff or we can come, I sure would appreciate  
17 it. And the Board's table is supposed to be upfront.

18 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Bernard, due to  
19 COVID-19. They can't accommodate staff or additional  
20 personnel. I'm hoping they can accommodate the  
21 Commissioners, but they have put that part of the  
22 communication out. They are trying to have this in the  
23 public setting, but also comply with what we are dealing  
24 with. So that's the reality. It's not a blanket  
25 invitation to everybody. So keep that in mind.



1 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I didn't know they had limited  
2 invitations.

3 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Because of Covid, they eliminate  
4 everything. They are trying to control that environment.

5 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I can send them to you.

6 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. But by all means, you  
7 should be there.

8 COMMISSIONER JONES: Through the Chair.

9 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, sir.

10 COMMISSIONER JONES: I have an announcement to make,  
11 if I may?

12 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, sir.

13 COMMISSIONER JONES: All right. Well this Saturday at  
14 9:00 AM at the River Walk downtown right there at Rivard  
15 and Atwater. We're going to have our second Loop Legacy  
16 Institute walk. We had our first back on April the third,  
17 and what we're doing is that we are reaching out to  
18 families that have lost family members to gun violence in  
19 the City of Detroit, we're gathering, we're coming  
20 together. We're marching, we're making our voices heard  
21 and making our voices known. We're going to have homicide  
22 detectives that are going to be on hand. So in the event  
23 that someone has not been able to contact anyone at EPD  
24 about their particular case if it is unsolved. We're  
25 going to have DPD associates there, and they're going to

1 get contact information for them.

2 COMMISSIONER JONES: So that that way they can look  
3 their cases up and be able to respond to the people that  
4 are in a great deal of pain all across our community. So  
5 we're going to walk, we're going to March, we're going to  
6 get together. We're going to share in the different  
7 exhibits appearances that we've had, and we're going to  
8 help to get them some answers for their cases. And we  
9 have to stand up in our community about the violence  
10 that's taking place too many lives, too many promising  
11 lives are being lost all across the city, and we're going  
12 to do something about it. So that's this Saturday, May  
13 15th at the River Walk at Atwater, Hart Plaza downtown,  
14 9:00 AM. And I want to see everybody come out. So  
15 distancing, there's going to be plenty of room for that.  
16 And masks are required. Face coverings are required. So I  
17 hope to see you there. We're going to have guest  
18 speakers. I'm going to be speaking. It's going to be  
19 quite an event out of it. It's going to be memorable and  
20 hopefully, we can get our people some help. Thank you.

21 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair.

22 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Through the Chair.

23 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: We have an interview.

24 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Well hold on, hold on one second,  
25 please. Ms. White, where are we with that?

1 MS. WHITE: Yes, we're still working with Dr. Bland.  
2 So if you would like to move to public comments.

3 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Well we can reschedule those two  
4 interviews. You got an issue with the second party too,  
5 right or concerned that you're not there or whatever is  
6 that correct?

7 MS. WHITE: I believe the second candidate has  
8 arrived.

9 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: I think we should proceed with the  
10 interviews, even though my announcement would take less  
11 than two seconds.

12 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: I doubt that.

13 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Set the interview up, and we will  
14 deal with Commissioner Holt's announcement. Set the  
15 interviews up.

16 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Bless her heart.

17 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, you have the floor.

18 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Oh, thank you. Thank you so very  
19 much. Okay. Delta Sigma Theta sorority is having its  
20 second round of expungement there. The event will be on  
21 May 18th at 6 o'clock. And this particular expungement  
22 fair focuses on expunging, the records for folks who have  
23 had moving violations as well as encounters regarding  
24 marijuana fines and what I'd like to do if it's  
25 permissible is to share my Board of Police, Commissioners

1 phone number with any person who would need me to email  
2 the flyer. My Board of Police Commissioner's phone number  
3 is (313) 920-6498. And again, that's so that folks can  
4 look at having their traffic violations and marijuana  
5 offenses expunged from their records. Thank you Chair  
6 Bell. Thank you community for allowing that time.

7 CHAIRPERSON BELL: All these are very, very important  
8 announcements. So hopefully they take heed. Ms. White  
9 where are we?

10 MS. WHITE: Yes. We're still working to bring Dr.  
11 Bland into the, excuse me, Dr. Jackson into the meeting.  
12 And that was the second candidate Dr. Francis Jackson.

13 CHAIRPERSON BELL: So yes, ma'am.

14 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: I guess Commissioner Burton?

15 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Commissioner Holt, you know  
16 that you can expunge up to three years now?

17 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Let me say this Commissioner  
18 Bernard, I know nothing about it other than to advertise,  
19 but thank you for sharing. Thank you so much.

20 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: In unlimited misdemeanors,  
21 except for the ones that involve drinking. If you have  
22 multiple drinking and driving offenses, those can't be  
23 expunged. But as you know, the Secretary of State keeps a  
24 separate record. There are two types of punishment that  
25 can be meted out in those situations. One can be by the

1 court. The other is by the Secretary of State. We have no  
2 control over the Secretary of State. The expungement is  
3 totally based on what happens in the criminal justice  
4 system.

5 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Thank you again for sharing.

6 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Ms. White.

7 MS. WHITE: We're still working to get the candidates  
8 in the meeting room.

9 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Mr. Chair, I suggest sir,  
10 please, can we move on and I do it another day?

11 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I'll go along with that. We having  
12 problems. Hopefully, we can work out those issues. We can  
13 schedule them again next week because we don't want to  
14 hold up the Agenda. We are agreed to try to move it on.  
15 Mr. Brown.

16 MR. ROB BROWN: Good afternoon, Mr. Chair and this  
17 Honorable Board. Your next BOPC virtual meeting will be  
18 May 20, 2021, at 3:00 PM. And because the Board just  
19 passed the week of May 27th, your next meeting would be  
20 after that would be June 3rd, 2021 at 3:00 PM.

21 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you.

22 MR. ROB BROWN: And if it's okay with you, sir. I can  
23 go straight to public comments?

24 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, sir.

25 MR. ROB BROWN: I currently have, I had 15, but

1 currently have 14. Lieutenant Mark Young said he was in a  
2 meeting. So I'll call them by three. Your first speaker  
3 would be Ms. Bernie Smith, followed by Minister Eric  
4 Blunt, followed by Mr. Steven Brown. Ms. Smith.

5 MS. SMITH: Good afternoon to the Commissioners. I am  
6 very happy to be able to speak to you again, after such a  
7 tremendous announcement that we had this week, it really  
8 took me back. And I was really without words, but in  
9 other words, I just want to know if the Chief will  
10 really, really feel as though that he's qualified to run  
11 for office. I will talk to him at a later time, but I do  
12 wish to express my thoughts and who we should have to  
13 take his place. We all know what's going on here in the  
14 City of Detroit and how many robberies, killings, and so  
15 forth that we have. All right. I think right now it's  
16 time for us to have a strong woman, especially a black  
17 woman. We don't take too much stuff off of anybody. So my  
18 suggestion to the police department and to your  
19 Commission look up Renee Hall, we all know she went to  
20 Dallas and they gave her such good conduct over there.

21 MS. SMITH: Even though there was some racism that  
22 was involved, she's still a great woman that we should  
23 have as our leader here in the Detroit area. I think  
24 she's doing a hell of a good job. So I'm supporting Renee  
25 Hall. We do have some good men, but I think it's time for

1 a woman to come and be in charge of the police department  
2 here in Detroit because we do need someone that's really  
3 interested in our welfare. There are too many shootings  
4 going on and I think we need to put a stop to it. I'm  
5 tired of looking at it on TV and I'm sure you are too. So  
6 let's get together guys. And let's put a woman as our  
7 next police chief. I'm sure she'll do a hell of a good  
8 job. Take care. And God bless all of you. I love you.  
9 Bye.

10 MR. ROB BROWN: Mr. Chair, the next speaker will be  
11 Minister. Eric Blunt. Minister. Eric Blunt. Minister  
12 Blunt.

13 MINISTER BLUNT: Yes. Can you hear me, Board?

14 MR. ROB BROWN: Yes, sir.

15 MINISTER BLUNT: This is Minister Eric Blunt from  
16 Sacred Heart Church. Chairman Bell, your comments on  
17 community reform need more than police reform. It is  
18 totally inappropriate. This comment has shown that there  
19 is something wrong with black people and that we are  
20 inherently criminals. And both of these assumptions can  
21 be nothing further from the truth. Chairman Bell, please  
22 restrict new business topics for the Board of Police  
23 Commissioners' purpose and not for vaccine locations or  
24 for fraternities, sororities, announcements to the HR  
25 Director. Indiscipline. Why not publicly list these

1     indiscipline, a lot like the Giglio Bradly list that the  
2     Wayne County Prosecutor publicly lists on a quarterly  
3     basis. This Board was created to address police  
4     misconduct. The new class of 11 white males and 9 black  
5     males, the trend continues and also their residency is  
6     also in question. On the 8th Precinct. The 8th Precinct  
7     is doing a phenomenal job of reducing crime. Please be  
8     even on this. There are lots of other reasons why crime  
9     can be reduced, such as employment, unlivable wages.  
10    Commander Patterson, this wraparound, flood the area with  
11    cops. How about flood the area with literacy  
12    achievements, college tuitions, employment, and again,  
13    livable wages. I yield my time.

14           MR. ROB BROWN: The next speaker will be Mr. Steven  
15    Brown.

16           MR. BROWN: Hello, this is Steven Brown in District  
17    3, Precinct 11. I just wanted to say that it's kind of  
18    difficult and interesting to hear how we're kind of stuck  
19    in this find a new police chief at the end of a mayoral  
20    cycle when there's less than a year for the existing  
21    mayor and policies and procedures to continue. There's no  
22    guarantee that the next mayor coming in is going to be  
23    interested in the level of surveillance that we currently  
24    have. One of the big issues that a lot of people have. I  
25    do find that when you look for crime, you will find



1 crime. And I'm hoping that our officers are looking at  
2 our citizens, not as perpetrators or suspects, but  
3 actually as the citizens of the city that deserves some  
4 attention and respect. I do realize when there are  
5 disturbances and they need to be handled in a way that  
6 continues to think about the person's mental health and  
7 the traumas that exist in this community as they stand.

8 MR. BROWN: I'm not saying that you get a pass for  
9 having trauma, but we need to talk about this trauma and  
10 not just figure the person's so sick that we're just  
11 going to put, you know, get rid of them. We need to be  
12 careful walking with the people is going to help reduce  
13 the amount of shall we say, community trauma and seeing  
14 police officers out on the street. A lot of people aren't  
15 familiar with seeing police officers out on the street as  
16 much as we do. It can be a real concern. Thank you.

17 MR. ROB BROWN: Mr. Chair, your next three speakers  
18 would be Ms. Brenda Butler followed by Ms. Lori Parks  
19 followed by Detroit resident. Ms. Butler.

20 MS. BUTLER: Hello?

21 MR. ROB BROWN: Yes, we can hear you.

22 MS. BUTLER: Good afternoon to the Police  
23 Commissioners. I have two concerns this afternoon. And  
24 one of the concerns is at one of your earlier meetings,  
25 when we were talking about the no not warrant, I had

1 requested that a presentation be done by the appropriate  
2 police officer to the community on exactly how there's no  
3 not warrant work. You guys voted that you think it was 30  
4 seconds before the officers could enter your home. But  
5 when I read the actual warrant, it does not state that in  
6 the warrant. So we need some clarity on that as a  
7 community. And I also would like to know what is the  
8 ordinance on tinted glass? This is to an officer tinted  
9 glass in the automobiles. What is that policy or  
10 ordinance? Thank you, and I yield my time.

11 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you.

12 MR. ROB BROWN: Miss Lori Parks.

13 MS. PARKS: Good afternoon, and thank you for taking  
14 my call. I have a couple of comments. We would like to  
15 know all of the disciplinary actions that we're taking  
16 for the police officers and what and what the outcome of  
17 the discipline was. And then I have a comment, or when  
18 are you recruiting officers to come to our city, Detroit  
19 from a lot of these hostile suburbs. We will strongly  
20 like to encourage them to live in the community where we  
21 live while they are doing the police work. And I still  
22 need to see if you guys know exactly what your job duties  
23 are since you weren't elected, or even - I really need to  
24 know from the people who were appointed to this position,  
25 to let the citizens of Detroit know what the job

1 description of the Police Commissioners do? It's not to  
2 tell me about what kind of loops you have in down here at  
3 River Walk. We need to know exactly what your job  
4 description is. That's fine and dandy but do other things  
5 in the community to keep the community together. But I  
6 need to know from all of you, what your job description  
7 is, and we need to know from each and every one of you at  
8 the meetings that you hold, whether it's zoom or in  
9 person. So thank you for taking my call. I yield my time.

10 MR. ROB BROWN: Mr. Chair your next speaker will be a  
11 Detroit resident.

12 DETROIT RESIDENT: Hello? Can you hear me?

13 MR. ROB BROWN: Yes.

14 DETROIT RESIDENCE: You can hear me, okay, great.  
15 Thank you. Well, I'm sorry. I missed a part of the  
16 beginning of this. My apologies. And I do want to say, I  
17 am not against all police officers. I do that. There is a  
18 need for them. I do have a big concern about the training  
19 of Detroit police officers. I've encountered some that  
20 are very nice and lovely. I've encountered others that  
21 need training. They don't understand the first amendment.  
22 If you don't do exactly what they say, they think they  
23 can just throw you around and charge you with disorderly  
24 conduct and that needs to change. And so, and I don't  
25 know, is that, was that a leadership issue? Where was

1 that coming from? But I do want to say with police Chief  
2 Craig's leaving, I guess he's here until June. Is he  
3 going to apologize to all the Detroiters whose houses  
4 were taken by the land bank, through that nuisance  
5 abatement program that is really unconstitutional,  
6 eminent domain, but they just put a different color  
7 lipstick on the pig and collar the chicken because please  
8 Chief Craig submitted a declaration saying blood is bad.  
9 And if you've got blood, you could have dead bodies or  
10 bad this and that. And that's used in every case that  
11 they go and take people's property. Well, if blood is so  
12 bad, then why wasn't he telling the city they needed to  
13 do something about the land bank houses that they  
14 basically do nothing to, unless there's a very verbal  
15 complaint about it, or they're getting ready to sell. So  
16 for that reason, Mr. Craig, you're not a good candidate  
17 for governor and you don't even attend the meetings and  
18 listen to the public.

19 MR. ROB BROWN: Mr. Chair, your next three speakers  
20 would be Ms. Brenda Hill followed by the caller with the  
21 last three numbers, 402, followed by Mr. Reubin Black.

22 MS. HILL:

23 MS. HILL: Okay, Good afternoon. I'd like to echo  
24 Pastor Reverend Blunt. The comments about the community  
25 were out of line by Willie Bell, and it seems that he's

1 doing this more and more and more. I'm just losing all  
2 kinds of respect for him and his leadership. I do want to  
3 say and I don't agree with Bernice often, but we have  
4 some fine women on the police force, Bryant and Slappy.  
5 Some of them have been spoken about today. I think they  
6 should be in the running for the new police chief.  
7 Bettison may be a cohesive transition. The community  
8 knows him. Most of the community likes him. But what we  
9 do not need is a white police chief in a majority city. I  
10 enjoy Fitzgerald and a couple of them. Valley should not  
11 be even considered, period. And so in a majority city  
12 that's being gentrified to the nth degree. There's no way  
13 that we need a white police chief. Also, this Board is  
14 supposed to be civilian oversight. It's not to be, make  
15 friends not to be, you know the new buddy of what's going  
16 on. We have some of the highest crimes in this country.  
17 There's no way that you shouldn't be irate about that.  
18 These smiles and jovial - I mean, that's your job to  
19 highlight that stuff and make changes and those things.  
20 And I'll be back next week.

21 CALLER 402: Hello. Can you hear me?

22 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Yes, ma'am.

23 CALLER 402: I was wanting to make a comment on  
24 Captain Potts. When I first got here, she helped me and  
25 she also taught me how to continually stand and be

1 resilient. And just as all the DPD family has and all the  
2 Commissioners, I want to commend her highly for her work.  
3 And her number 8, Also Commander Gardener. She helped  
4 with the place where I live now, when the responders  
5 know, and the fire chief, what to do to keep the building  
6 safe. I wasn't in here, but it could have fallen down  
7 with explosion implosion, but they made it safe. We can  
8 come back in. And by the time I got here, I noticed they  
9 were pulling off and it was safe to come in. Also when  
10 they spoke about the muzzle on the people having a bite  
11 out of crime in number 8, I say, get your muzzle on with  
12 the bulldog grip, just like a good neighbor, DPD is  
13 there. And also, I want to thank you all for continuously  
14 standing and teaching me how as a civilian to stand up  
15 against the things that I have to face as a civilian. And  
16 knowing that you all are doing such a great job standing,  
17 even when people speak and things are happening and  
18 they're highly adverse, but you continue to stand. And  
19 have that who opened their window kind of thing. It's  
20 cold, let's close the window. That response, correctly  
21 response. Thank you so much for wrapping your arms around  
22 the citizens this way, and helping to keep us safe in so  
23 many different ways.

24 MR. ROB BROWN: Mr. Reubin Black, Mr. Reubin Black.

25 MR. BLACK: To the Honorable Commissioners, William

1 Davis, Darryl Brown, and Mr. Willie Burton. This is not  
2 for you. This is for the other clowns that participate in  
3 this circus every weekend. Every member of the Board of  
4 Police Commissioners that has never said one word on any  
5 of these meetings about police misconduct need to be  
6 resigned immediately. And this goes to the Chairman Bell  
7 and I told you out of my mouth that this was going to be  
8 something different. The 2021 election cycle in the City  
9 of Detroit is going to be totally different. You're  
10 running again for office over in District 4. You're not  
11 going to win. Matter of fact, you're going to get out of  
12 here before your term is up. I do believe because there's  
13 going to be people coming in and asking questions that  
14 you don't want to answer.

15 MR. BLACK: And Melanie White, every Board member has  
16 heard me, heard the audiotapes of her lying blatantly and  
17 Jonya Underwood, disregarding the City Charter,  
18 disregarding the responsibility to the citizens. And  
19 Lawrence Akbar is in charge of all the nonsense that gets  
20 covered up at the OCI. The OCI has covered up a murder  
21 investigation, misconduct, complaint, but Derek May, now  
22 that he got the book. The assistant Wayne County medical  
23 examiner to rule a homicide, a suicide due to a Facebook  
24 post. Nowhere in America that had been done before. Now,  
25 the Board of Police Commissioners was instituted for

1 civilian oversight of a police department that was out of  
2 control. Well, it's backed out of control again, because  
3 you got officers running around here, feeling like they  
4 are all that. You've got thousands of great officers on  
5 the police force and all the ones that are doing it  
6 nonsense is making them look bad and doing them a  
7 disservice because they get up and put that badge on  
8 every day and come out here to protect us from the nuts  
9 running around Detroit. Willie Bell, you're cocksucker is  
10 done talking.

11 MR. ROB BROWN: Caller with the last three numbers,  
12 842, Miss Michelle George, and Miss Sharon Parnell.  
13 Caller with the number 842, last three numbers.

14 CALLER 842: Mr. Chair. I'll move on to see if I see  
15 Ms. Michelle, George. I don't see Mr. George. I see Ms.  
16 Parnell. Ms. Parnell.

17 MS. PARNELL: Yes. Can you hear me?

18 MR. ROB BROWN: Yes.

19 MS. PARNELL: Okay. I want to give kudos to the 2nd  
20 Precinct. They have a mobile bike patrol and they come  
21 around and they check on all the seniors. I do appreciate  
22 that because I do live alone and I want to thank Chief  
23 Craig for all he has done, but I wish he would go home  
24 and retire and just relax and enjoy his life and  
25 Bettison, I'm cheering for you and Renee Hall. That's all



1 I have everybody stay safe. Thank you.

2 MR. ROB BROWN: Mr. Chair, your next two speakers  
3 will be D. Lyons followed by Ms. Tawana Petty. D. Lyons.

4 D. LYONS: There is no way that Todd Bettison..

5 MR. ROB BROWN: Mr. Chair that was Mr. Black. So we  
6 heard him before. So we'll go to Ms. Petty.

7 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you.

8 MR. BLACK: He's always cutting me off. He's known to  
9 be untruthful at the Board meeting...

10 MR. ROB BROWN: Ms. Petty.

11 MS. PETTY: Hello? Yes ma'am. Can you hear me?

12 MR. ROB BROWN: Yes.

13 MS. PETTY: Okay. Thank you all for this opportunity  
14 to speak. As always, I am grateful to lift up the  
15 officers that I think are doing tremendous work, not just  
16 the ones to whom I happen to be related to. And in  
17 addition to that, I'm going to be deeply grateful to see  
18 a parliamentarian be a part of this Board. I think that  
19 it has been, I know it's been very difficult to witness  
20 the type of power struggle and hierarchical type of  
21 situation that exists on this board. It's really  
22 difficult to see ideas be squashed when they are in a  
23 different opinion to the Chair. And it's really difficult  
24 to continue to witness the Board function as and non-  
25 neutral extension of law enforcement that does not give

1 any service to the officers. It does not give any service  
2 to the community.

3 MS. PETTY: And there really does need to become a  
4 time when you all see yourself as a separate entity. I  
5 believe some of you should try out for the police  
6 department because you've missed your calling. It is not  
7 for a civilian oversight body. Some of your functions as  
8 law enforcement officers out of uniform. And so I really  
9 want you to deeply consider that because that type of  
10 mentality for civilian oversight does not create a safe  
11 situation for the residents. It does not create a safe  
12 culture for accountability for the officers. And so I  
13 yield my time. Thank you.

14 MR ROB BROWN: Miss Michelle George.

15 MS. GEORGE: Oh, okay. Mr. Brown.

16 MR. ROB BROWN: Yes.

17 MS. GEORGE: Okay. Thank you. Thank you. I was trying  
18 to get on because I did not hear the meeting, so it would  
19 not be fair for me to comment on the meeting, but AC  
20 Bettison has a heart for the people and I'm not saying  
21 others do not. When we looking in this area, I want the  
22 Board of Police Commissioners to think about this and,  
23 and listen to the positive comments, not comments,  
24 calling people out their names. And not talking about  
25 those comments, but to people listening to the comments,

1 like the young lady was talking about the note not  
2 warranted and what Ms. Hill was speaking of, listen to  
3 the comments and Ms. Petty, because you need to try to  
4 bring back the trust to the community. When we look out  
5 and see the killing of unarmed black men and women, I got  
6 a police officer who stopped me the other day.

7 MS. GEORGE: My heart stopped beating. You have to  
8 look at that. When police officers stopped [01:39:40  
9 inaudible] people of color, we don't know what they going  
10 to do. I may take my key out, maybe looking in my purse  
11 to get my license. God forbid, I thought she had a gun.  
12 That doesn't work. Some see African Americans first, not  
13 all of the police officers like Ms. Parrnell stated the  
14 2nd Police Precinct, they have wonderful officers, there,  
15 both places. They care for the people. We were at a  
16 meeting the other day. They do care for the people. So if  
17 some can model that and model just like captain a pot  
18 says a heart for the people, a lot of the officers do,  
19 but you also have to look at what's happening in this  
20 country with what's happening. When we looked at Tamir  
21 Rice, Eric Garner, most of those moms are in my  
22 organization, the National Action Network. And it took  
23 the lynching of George Floyd. And I do pray for the  
24 family all the time. He was lynched. We saw that that's  
25 trauma. I can't even look at Derek Chava's face when they

1 show it on my phone. I got to...

2 MR. ROB BROWN: Mr. Chair that was your last speaker.

3 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, Mr. Brown. We are going  
4 to reschedule the interview, and we'll make sure they in  
5 the waiting room or whatever you call that prior to the  
6 interview. We'll probably move them up on the Agenda, but  
7 we have communicated that to them. The Chair would  
8 entertain a motion for adjournment.

9 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: I move that we adjourn.

10 COMMISSION BERNARD: So moved.

11 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Support.

12 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Support.

13 CHAIRPERSON BELL: It has been properly moved and  
14 supported. Discussion. Those in favor, Aye.

15 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

16 CHAIRPERSON BELL: We stand adjourned. Thank you for  
17 participating.

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
