- 8 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you.

- 6 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, Ms. White, I want to
- 7 extend a warm welcome to the Board staff and the OCI
- 8 staff. It seems like we have a full house in terms of
- 9 attending the meeting, which is great. They need to be
- involved, they need to hear what's going on with the
- 11 Board of Police Commissioners. This is their opportunity
- 12 to hear you directly. Is that the Deputy Chief Bettison
- 13 from his vacation sitting in for Chief Craig?
- 14 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Is that right?
- 15 ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: Yes. Assistant Chief
- 16 Bettison sitting in for Chief Craig.
- 17 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Hello there, hello there.
- 18 ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: Hello everyone.
- 19 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Welcome back.
- 20 COMMISSIONER JONES: Welcome back Assistant Chief.
- 21 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: You should have taken us with
- 22 you.
- ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: I didn't go too far. We
- 24 had a good time, you know, just the chance to bond with
- 25 family and stuff, you know, recharge. I stayed out for



- 1 two weeks. So, just long enough to the point before my
- 2 wife kicked me out and I was ready to come back, getting
- 3 on the family nerves. It was like, go back to work.
- 4 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay. Assistant Chief Bettison,
- 5 would you introduce any DPD staff, if not, you need Mrs.
- 6 White's help, she would assist you, if not, you're going
- 7 to roll.
- 8 ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: I got it covered, sir. So
- 9 we've got Captain Tosqui here, Captain Parish, Captain
- 10 Tosqui, of course, over at Real Time Crime. Captain
- 11 Parish oversees our tow lots. We have Commander Hope from
- 12 the Chief Neighborhood Liaison. We have Commander Sidnea
- 13 Russell with us. We have Lieutenant Cole from recruiting
- 14 Lieutenant Macor upon Commander Kyra Hope from Chief
- 15 Neighborhood Liaison. We have Commander Bliss from the
- 16 Management Services side of the house. We have the
- 17 esteemed Mark Young from the Lieutenants and Sergeants
- 18 Association, you know, BIP on the line. And we also have
- 19 Sergeant Anderson from Recruiting, Sergeant Stokes from
- 20 Chief Neighborhood Liaison and Captain Leonard Gilbert
- 21 from the Office of Internal and External Relations.
- 22 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, sir. And I extend a
- 23 warm welcome to the DPD personnel, all ranks, and status
- 24 attending our meeting. We appreciate them.
- 25 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Mr. Chair.



- 1 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, sir.
- 2 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: I noticed, and in fact, I got
- 3 two texts about, I see we don't have the closed caption
- 4 today?
- 5 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I'm not, I guess we can, there it
- 6 is.
- 7 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Good.
- 8 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Elected officials, Ms.
- 9 White or representatives of elected officials.
- 10 MRS. WHITE: Yes. Through the Chair former state
- 11 legislator and tow representative, Mr. Bertram Johnson is
- 12 present also Ms. Marie Overall with state Representative
- 13 Tyrone Carter's office and Community Advisory Council
- 14 Committee Chairperson. Scotty Bowman is also present and
- 15 also for the record, Commissioner Jesus Hernandez has
- 16 arrived at the meeting. Thank you.
- 17 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. The next item would be
- 18 I want to extend a welcome to all of the individuals
- 19 that are listed by Ms. White in terms of elected official
- 20 representatives of the official. I move on to my report.
- 21 My report is very brief. I just wanted to say that we had
- 22 a very lengthy meeting last week. We met for three hours
- 23 and we council our closed session. This week is back on
- 24 the agenda, and there are some very important items that
- 25 we need to discuss in the closed session. So therefore my



- 1 wish is not the council close session because we need to
- 2 take care of these matters. Ms. White has emphasized
- 3 that, so I need your cooperation Board to do a timely
- 4 meeting in terms of how we go through our agenda. With
- 5 your cooperation, then we can have a timely meeting and
- 6 still include the closed session. Keep in mind we want to
- 7 have public comments. We definitely want to have public
- 8 comments in a timely manner. Give those individuals that
- 9 two minutes to speak to us. That's a very important part
- 10 of this meeting here. So keep it in mind as you have your
- 11 opportunity to have dialogue. So let's give them the
- 12 opportunity. We move on. The next item would be I just
- 13 want to getting that out of my I know that Assistant
- 14 Chief Bettison. I see it right there.
- 15 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Through the Chair.
- 16 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, ma'am.
- 17 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: May I be able to introduce my
- 18 emotion at this time, or do I need to wait?
- 19 CHAIRPERSON BELL: You can go ahead and Ms. White,
- 20 I'm sorry. I'm sorry. Let's try that again. Vice-Chair
- 21 Holt, go ahead.
- 22 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Thank you so much. Okay. I move we
- 23 attach Thursday, July 1st, to the July 4th celebration.
- 24 We will then resume our scheduled meeting times on July
- 25 8th.



- 1 COMMISSIONER JONES: Support.
- 2 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Second.
- 3 CHAIRPERSON BELL: It's been properly moved and
- 4 supported. Discussion. Vice-Chair Holt, could you give
- 5 some rationale behind that?
- 6 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Well, because I want to celebrate
- 7 the holiday. And we're here what is it; 48 weeks out of
- 8 the year? Also, my rationale.
- 9 CHAIRPERSON BELL: It will also give the staff an
- 10 opportunity to take a break in that timeframe, to be able
- 11 to extend it. because holiday falls on a Sunday and they
- 12 would also --. It's just not about us, it's also about
- 13 the staff and as you well know,
- 14 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Oh, wait a minute now. I have no
- 15 problem. Self-preservation is to look out for everyone.
- 16 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Mr. Chairman. The previous
- 17 question.
- 18 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay. Those in favor, Aye.
- 19 ALL: Aye.
- 20 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Those opposed.
- 21 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Oppose.
- 22 CHAIRPERSON BELL: One opposed, the motion carries.
- VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Thank you, and staff, have a
- 24 fantastic holiday over that weekend.
- 25 CHAIRPERSON BELL: That would give us pre-planning in



- 1 terms of the scheduling. Thank you, Vice-Chair Holt.
- 2 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Sure.
- 3 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Now we move to Assistant Chief
- 4 Bettison from his extended vacation.
- 5 ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: Absolutely, and thank you.
- 6 And I definitely heard you loud and clear. I will be
- 7 thorough, but I will be brief, but I will still give
- 8 accurate and great information. So we'll start out with
- 9 COVID, where we are. So we have 57 members of our
- 10 department in quarantine or isolated. We currently have
- 11 40 members of that 57 who've tested positive for COVID.
- 12 And as far as the vaccinations, we're just hovering a
- 13 little shy of 50%. We're definitely still encouraging,
- 14 and we do a slot of vaccine hesitancy out there, but
- 15 we're encouraging our members to get vaccinated, as well
- 16 as the community in general. And I know everybody's sick
- 17 of me saying I was one of the first to get vaccinated. It
- 18 didn't have any effects and I feel good. So I continue to
- 19 encourage other folks as well. We'll jump into I'll
- 20 give an update on crime in our enforcement efforts.
- 21 ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: In regards to where we
- 22 sit, year-to-date comparison compared to last year this
- 23 time, our homicides were up 31%, sexual assaults up 6%,
- 24 aggravated assaults, which include the category of non-
- 25 fatal shootings up 37%, when it's broken out,



- 1 extrapolated, non-fatal shootings specifically of the
- 2 aggravated assaults up 41%. Robberies are down 32% and
- 3 carjackings are up 35%. So total part one violent crime,
- 4 we're at 22% as far as an increase compared to the same
- 5 period last year, this time. Property crime we're down in
- 6 all those categories. I know Commissioner Davis, looking
- 7 at one of your questions from the review of last week.
- 8 You asked where we were in burglary. Was it an uptick in
- 9 burglary? So overall Citywide we're down 37% in
- 10 burglaries, larcenies down 26%, motor vehicle thefts down
- 11 12%, and property crime down 25%.
- ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: And when you average the
- 13 part one violent crime to property crime that gives us an
- 14 overall reduction of 10% compared to this year, last
- 15 time. Now Commissioner Davis with specific Precincts,
- 16 there are some areas like I'll give you an example. The
- 17 fifth Precinct has an uptick in burglaries, so they're
- 18 slightly up in burglaries and to the community who's
- 19 listening. You know, if your house has been broken into
- 20 where you were a victim of burglary, I know it doesn't
- 21 feel like, you know, you're like, what is he talking
- 22 about? My house has got broken into. So I definitely take
- 23 that into account as well. In regards to response time,
- 24 the response time for last week averaged 12.54 minutes.
- 25 So we're looking at a 13 minute response time for part



- 1 one. I know I don't see Commissioner Burton, but I know
- 2 if Commissioner Burton was here, he definitely would ask
- 3 about priority three because I know that's always
- 4 important to Commissioner Burton.
- 5 ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: If we're a priority 3, I
- 6 had that pull for last week and our priority3 and let
- 7 me let the community know what a priority three is,
- 8 first. It is a run of a less serious nature where police
- 9 assistance is needed, but not urgent. These runs may be
- 10 redirected to telephone crime reporting unit for report
- 11 purposes, and only when the following criteria exists,
- 12 the incident is not in progress, no EMS is needed or
- 13 requested. The incident occurred more than 30 minutes
- 14 from the time of the call for service and the likelihood
- of apprehension is low and there are no exigent
- 16 circumstances. So with that category, the response time
- 17 was 43 minutes for our priority threes. And it was a
- 18 total of 1,196 priority three runs that were serviced
- 19 last week. Going into some of our enforcement efforts
- 20 when we talk about you know narcotics enforcement and
- 21 complaints around locations, the Chief always has noted
- 22 and spoke to the fact that there's crime around illegal
- 23 marijuana, narcotic spots.
- 24 ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: And so as a result, we've
- 25 directed our patrols and entities to do enforcement



- 1 around those locations where we would get reports that
- 2 it's a drug house, et cetera. So with that being said for
- 3 the past week our officers on patrol, they made 151
- 4 arrests around those locations, street interactions. 74
- 5 of those arrests were for persons carrying a concealed
- 6 weapon. It was 51 misdemeanor arrests. We recovered 88
- 7 handguns for that activity. 8 long guns were recovered, 1
- 8 facsimile firearm. Also we know that traffic, of course,
- 9 is a big complaint around those locations as well. Our
- 10 units conducted 2,178 traffic stops. 195 vehicles were
- 11 impounded around those locations. 35 vehicles were
- 12 recovered. So if you were to ask, well, what's the
- 13 difference between pounded and recover? You know, we
- 14 recover a lot of stolen vehicles as well. So we recovered
- 15 vehicles and were able to get that back to their owners.
- ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: Citations. We issued 2,485
- 17 citations. And as far as narcotics 19.7 grams of cocaine
- 18 1,457 grams of marijuana, one gram of heroin 7.4 grams of
- 19 fentanyl and recovered 254 pills. in the currency, just
- 20 under \$5,000 was confiscated. And we did do 6 raids or
- 21 executed 6 search warrants of illegal grow operation last
- 22 week as well. So our officers are busy and continue to
- 23 work. And when it comes down to one of our number one
- 24 complaints, too, as far as our drifters individuals,
- 25 during the donuts in the neighborhood, you know, driving



- 1 drag racing those efforts let's see here. Over the past
- 2 weekend, we had 9 arrests. We impounded 15 vehicles and
- 3 recovered 4 weapons. And since the inception of it back a
- 4 couple of weeks ago, we have conducted over 831 traffic
- 5 stops.
- 6 ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: We forfeited 18 of those
- 7 vehicles, recovered 6 stolen vehicles, impounded 89
- 8 vehicles, recovered 40 weapons because many of the
- 9 individuals arrested they have firearms in their cars.
- 10 And, and so I know one of the questions that the Board
- 11 had was, what's the price, what's the difference between
- 12 an impoundment versus a forfeiture and the fee. So for
- example, an impound typically will cost a person \$215 to
- 14 get their vehicle back. And so it's \$125 for the tow.
- 15 It's a \$75 administration fee. And then it's a \$15 per
- 16 day fee. So the longer a person takes to get their
- 17 vehicle back is going to rack up an additional \$15 past
- 18 the \$215. In regards to a forfeited vehicle that is the
- 19 vehicle, the subject to litigation. So it's not a set
- 20 price on that. The person is taking via nuisance
- 21 abatement.
- 22 ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: And that's worked out with
- 23 the Prosecutor's Office, the courts. So the person may
- 24 not get their vehicle back, where if they do get their
- 25 vehicle back, via some type of a contract or an agreement



- 1 it's a redemption fee. And that can vary. So I don't have
- 2 a set cost on that. There were various other questions
- 3 about coordinating with Ms. White that the Board had
- 4 questions on as well. And I'll go through those very,
- 5 very quickly. I know that in regard to the fatal officer-
- 6 involved shooting where a person suffering from mental
- 7 illness was shot and succumbed to his injuries. I know
- 8 that the Chief had reported out to the Board and I
- 9 actually had a chance to see the video yesterday during
- 10 the 72-hour briefing. And, you know, I have 27 years on
- 11 the job. I've never seen anything like it.
- 12 ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: It just was something not
- describable, but it definitely highlights the point that
- 14 persons in crisis that we have to definitely do more.
- 15 Now, Commissioner Burch asked the question, why did the
- 16 officers refrain from handcuffing the individual?
- 17 Commissioner Burch, they were actually trying to render
- 18 aid. They did attempt to handcuff him. And from what I
- 19 saw on the video he actually stated, please kill me. He
- 20 was begging for the officers to kill him, but he actually
- 21 attacked the officers. You know, they were trying to
- 22 render aid. He grabbed the officers, he grabbed one
- 23 officer, he picked up a knife that they didn't see and he
- 24 started slashing. So it went from a life-saving mode to
- 25 the officers were faced with an imminent threat, which



- 1 ultimately resulted in one of the officers using deadly
- 2 force to save the life of one of the officers that was
- 3 being slashed with a knife.
- 4 ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: I know another question
- 5 asked by Commissioner Bernard, could the taser have been
- 6 used. From observation, I didn't see a point where the
- 7 taser really could have been used. They were definitely
- 8 trying to render aid and then the question, and we're
- 9 going to do more research on it as well. The man at the
- 10 time was in a bathtub full of water, and I don't even
- 11 know what the impact of using the taser would have been,
- 12 and plus at the time he didn't have a weapon and he was
- 13 also bleeding profusely and severely injured. So I don't
- 14 know if they had used the taser, you know, we will have
- 15 to continue to look further into that and we dissect it
- and it'll be an after action report where we go through
- 17 training and we did done some of that with the 72- hour
- 18 briefing, but it is a finalized written report that has
- 19 done as well, that we'll definitely make available to the
- 20 Board where all of those things will definitely, be
- 21 explored.
- 22 ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: But you know, such as if
- 23 you use electrical current with a taser with the
- 24 individual that's in water, would it exacerbate, could
- 25 that have killed him? So, we'll definitely make that



- 1 available, but those are some excellent points that you
- 2 raised, Commissioner Burch, and Commissioner Bernard.
- 3 Commissioner Jesus Hernandez, I saw that you had a
- 4 question about the neighborhood police officer program
- 5 and wanted to know from the Chief what we would be doing
- 6 as far as expanding the program. You'd want more
- 7 information about the program. I would definitely have
- 8 Commander Hope, give you written information about the
- 9 program, but it's so successful. You know, one of the
- 10 biggest requests that I get from community members is we
- 11 want more neighborhood police officers. So I would make
- 12 a recommendation that we increase the budgeted positions
- 13 for neighborhood police officers next fiscal year.
- 14 ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: So definitely would like
- 15 to work with the Board, get input from you all as well,
- 16 because you're in the community to see what that
- 17 realistic numbers should look like. Some Precincts like
- 18 our 9th Precinct, our 8th Precinct, they actually are
- 19 budgeted slotted for 6 neighborhood police officers based
- 20 off the size to crime, the population. And other
- 21 Precincts have either 5 or 4. So we looked at population
- 22 density, we looked at the level of crime and came up with
- 23 the allocation of the budget at neighborhood police
- 24 officer slots. So definitely I think it's time for us,
- 25 especially in this light and culture, to re-examine that



- 1 and request more. Commissioner Jones, I looked at your
- 2 request for information, and I think I can't answer that
- 3 now. I know you had a question regarding the Hanna
- 4 location with the individual that will suffer from mental
- 5 illness where our officers had to use deadly force and
- 6 Commissioner Brown, you expressed and wanted more
- 7 information about the Michigan State University report in
- 8 regards to Greenlight.
- 9 ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: So I have that report in
- 10 its entirety, and I've been looking into it and asking
- 11 the question of, specifically your question was, the
- 12 number of armed robberies and carjackings. Was that
- included as part of the data metrics? It was. The biggest
- 14 piece for MSU is we have multiple initiatives in one
- 15 specific area, we're throughout the City. So we're doing
- 16 a lot to be able to reduce crime, but from an evaluation
- 17 standpoint, because it's so much going on, they couldn't
- 18 attribute the reduction in various crime categories to
- 19 Greenlight or other initiatives. So that was the real
- 20 challenge for MSU. But I do have, I don't know if you've
- 21 read the report, but I had that in its entirety available
- 22 that I can provide for you. And then we can continue the
- 23 conversation on that as well. But definitely an excellent
- 24 point Commissioner Burton brought up a point for the
- 25 Chief, as far as training the community, ensuring that



- 1 the community gets training when it comes to CIT
- 2 training. We're training our officers, our goal is to
- 3 train 20% of our patrol officers on CIT.
- 4 ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: So they know how to
- 5 interact with persons suffering from mental illness when
- 6 they get there. So that the response is correct and
- 7 appropriate. But our community, when do they get
- 8 training? So the Chief has tasked Commander Kyra Hope and
- 9 Captain Leonard Gilbert to work with Commissioner Burton
- 10 and come up with community forums and other ways to be
- 11 able to get our community information in regards to that
- 12 type of training and educated and update him on that as
- 13 well. So that's an excellent point. And so I know
- 14 Commander Hope has reached out to Commissioner Burton,
- 15 and we look forward to working with him on that.
- 16 Commissioner Holley, I know you wanted an update when it
- 17 comes to training; what type of messages we're training
- 18 our officers are receiving at roll call.
- 19 ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: So one of the things that
- 20 the Chief does when it comes to things of significant
- 21 events that are current nationally, that could definitely
- 22 impact our department as far as impacting the law
- 23 enforcement in general, involving police incidents
- 24 resulting with fatal encounters. The Chief does roll call
- 25 messaging, he actually creates videos and we'll play that



- 1 at roll call. So it's a message from the Chief, and we
- 2 actually post that on our intranet as well. So anything
- 3 of significance where the Chief wants the members to hear
- 4 directly from him, we're putting it on video, as well as
- 5 we do our administrative messages. And I know that Ms.
- 6 White and you all have availability to see that which
- 7 we're always constantly sending out to our members and
- 8 the supervisors read that to the officers at roll call
- 9 and it's printed out instead of pinched back for the
- 10 officers can see it as well.
- 11 ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: And so definitely want to
- 12 continue to correspond and share that information with
- 13 the Board and anything that you think can assist. We're
- open to that as well because we know that many folks
- 15 receive information differently. So that's why we started
- 16 the video piece and the Chief didn't want the message to
- 17 be delivered via someone else you wanted them to hear
- 18 from him and Commissioner Bell, definitely thank you. And
- 19 I hope that I was concise. As far as our critically
- 20 injured officers, the additional officer that we have
- 21 this week, of course, is police officer Ricardo Sanchez.
- 22 And he was the officer that we talked about that was
- 23 injured when he was slashed and then also subsequently
- 24 struck by his partner when he was trying to shoot the
- 25 perpetrator, inadvertently shot him in the hand.



- 1 ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: And so we're examining all
- 2 that. It will be a report, looking at the 72-hour brief,
- 3 we are very, very critical. We're critical of the tactics
- 4 so that we can get it right and get it better. So but
- 5 officer Sanchez is recovering and just wanted me to
- 6 relate to everyone how appreciative he was peer support
- 7 and all the other officers involved as well. And to our
- 8 chaplains who are always there on the spot. And at this
- 9 point, I will open it up for questions if anyone has any
- 10 questions for me?
- 11 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Mr. Bell. Chair Bell.
- 12 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Me too.
- 13 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay. Show me your hands now -
- 14 Davis, Bernard, and Birch.
- 15 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Mr. Chairman, Mr. Burton is on
- 16 my phone. He wants to ask a question as well. He's on my
- 17 house line, here.
- 18 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Mr. Chairman, how you doing? Do
- 19 I have permission to speak real quick for a second?
- 20 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, sir. Go ahead.
- 21 COMMISSIONER BURTON: This is Commissioner Burton on
- 22 the record. I wanted to say to Assistant Chief Bettison,
- 23 I appreciate your thorough report today. I just have one
- 24 question for you. Is DPD doing anything right now,
- 25 updating DPD connect app, and are we still pushing that



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- 1 out in the community?
- 2 ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: I'm so glad you asked that
- 3 question. So the answer is no. So DPD connect app. We had
- 4 some students and they actually had created that app for
- 5 us. And so it got to the point that they didn't maintain
- 6 it and it became obsolete. And so we don't have that app
- 7 anymore, but we're definitely pushing out and utilizing
- 8 our social media. So Nicole Kirkwood and our media
- 9 relations team, push out all types of information to the
- 10 community via our Facebook page. And we also have, and
- I'm going to have to get that for you, and I'll get it
- 12 for you before the end of this call so we can push it
- out. But we have a I'm trying to think of the name of
- it, but it's an app, it's a crime viewer app where
- individuals are going to able to go in from the community
- 16 and see what's going on in their specific area. I just
- 17 don't have it in front of me our citizens app too, we
- 18 coordinated with them.
- 19 COMMISSIONER BURTON: DPD connect, they still talking
- 20 about it. I mean, it's like one of the best apps that DPD
- 21 came out with some time ago. And so constituents are
- 22 still asking about it and want to know more about it and
- 23 stuff like that. So I just thought I raise that.
- ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: I'm glad you did. So, you
- 25 might have to look at trying to get it back going,



- 1 because guess what, it has a nice ring, doesn't it? DPD
- 2 connect.
- 3 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Commissioner Bernard
- 4 and then Commissioner Burch, and Davis, I'm sorry.
- 5 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Just three, first of all,
- 6 thank you for a very thorough report. I just wanted to
- 7 say thank you for speaking to us Commander. I just have
- 8 three things. Number one, if you could give all of us a
- 9 link for the video that the Chief showed last week
- 10 because people have called me and asked about it and I
- 11 can forward it on. Secondly, a copy of the action plan
- 12 report on the protest. I've also been asked for that
- 13 because it was raised. And then thirdly and you can just
- 14 give us this as an email, the training manual that police
- 15 have, because the question with respect to the protestors
- 16 was whether we were acting consistently with our
- 17 training. So I said, okay, I'll ask.
- ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: Thank you. And one of the
- 19 things that I wanted to definitely say in regards to -,
- 20 because I definitely wanted to get to that guestion. I
- 21 have Director Graveline on the line and he will be able
- 22 to give you an update, but I remember that you did
- 23 request the after-action reports regarding the 2020
- 24 police protests. So Director Graveline will provide you a
- 25 verbal update and I will make any completed



- 1 investigations available to you in its entirety. Of
- 2 course, with the exception of any ongoing investigations
- 3 or limitations set by the courts due to pending
- 4 litigation. So at this point, if somebody can unmute
- 5 Director Graveline can give a little bit more
- 6 information.
- 7 MRS. WHITE: Yes, we are preparing to do that now.
- 8 Thank you, through the Chair.
- 9 DIRECTOR GRAVELINE: Good afternoon. Through the
- 10 Chair. So thank you, AC Bettison. So here's an update on
- 11 the protest investigations. From the protest last year,
- 12 there were 33 investigations opened up. To date, we have
- 13 closed 24 of them. The results of those investigations so
- 14 far have been 4 sustained for misconduct. One was the
- 15 officer who fired less than lethal rounds towards
- 16 reporters. She has been charged by the Wayne County
- 17 Prosecutor's Office. There was one who was found to have
- inappropriately used chemical spray on a protester, and
- 19 that officer received three days of suspension. There was
- 20 malicious destruction of property where a tail light was
- 21 broken out. We could not identify the officer involved,
- 22 but we've been working with that citizen to get their
- 23 tail light reimbursed. And then there was a complaint for
- 24 malicious destruction of property to (Audio Distortion),
- 25 but the officer did not have a camera on, and we found



- 1 sustained misconduct for that reason. That person should
- 2 have had a body-worn camera on. Of the other
- 3 investigations, there have been 4 not sustained, 4
- 4 exonerated, 4 closed as unfounded and 8 administratively
- 5 closed. And the administratively closed ones, generally
- 6 speaking, have been the ones where many of these
- 7 investigations we opened up due to video footage or
- 8 photographs that were on (Audio Distortion) identified
- 9 either the complainant, the person themselves, or the
- 10 police officers involved, and since we really didn't have
- 11 any witnesses to interview despite all of our best
- 12 efforts, those are the ones that have been
- 13 administratively closed. So those are the numbers to
- 14 date. And I can answer any specific questions beyond
- 15 that.
- 16 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: No, just please send us that
- 17 written report because we are asked about that all the
- 18 time, about police reaction. I appreciate you. Thank you.
- 19 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. We're going to move on
- 20 to, I think Commissioner Burch and then Commissioner
- 21 Davis.
- 22 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Thank you, Chair Bell, and to AC
- 23 welcome back. And I just, instead of taking up the time,
- 24 I will send you a list of the concerns in District 3 and
- 25 then next week, whoever is going to take the Chief's



- 1 place, they can read it off. Is that okay? I did want to
- 2 say this to you AC regarding Mr. Brundage office, would
- 3 you please work with him regarding the speed cushions and
- 4 also the frequent accidents at the corner of State Fair
- 5 and Dequindre is going into outer drive that CITO gas
- 6 station that sits on that corner has been hit several
- 7 times. And, you know, but we hear just like Commissioner
- 8 Burton is saying that our citizens need to be trained. In
- 9 the conversation, we heard citizens were saying that the
- 10 car had the right of way. People do not understand
- 11 evidently that whenever you hear sirens of the police or
- 12 fire or any kind of siren, they have the right of way,
- 13 you must stop your car. So a lot of people are not
- 14 educated AC, so that's one of the items, please. Then I'm
- 15 going to send you a list of all the concerns we have in
- 16 District 3 to help you because you like solutions too,
- 17 and that's what I wanted to say to you and thank you for
- 18 listening.
- 19 ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: Absolutely. Thank you.
- 20 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Commissioner Davis.
- 21 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Thank you, finally. I have a
- 22 couple of questions. One, how many times have mental
- 23 health professionals been accompanied or been on calls?
- 24 ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: Let's see here. So I do
- 25 have some information for you. So since we started our



- 1 mental health core response initiative these are the
- 2 latest stats that I have. 47 instances of individuals
- 3 have been connected with mental health services. 19
- 4 instances of individuals connected with housing
- 5 initiatives where we've helped folks suffering, actually
- 6 get them into housing and 6 instances of individuals
- 7 connected with substance abuse services. And so right now
- 8 at my fingertips, I don't have the number of co-response
- 9 calls to service, but I know that they're out there and I
- 10 know Captain Leonard Gilbert is on the line as well. So
- if someone could unmute Captain Leonard Gilbert's mic,
- 12 maybe she has that information real handy because she
- 13 oversees that program. Captain Leonard Gilbert.
- MRS. WHITE: Through the Chair, staff call please
- 15 assist in enabling her microphone, please.
- 16 ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: Is her mic abled?
- 17 MRS. WHITE: Okay. I believe we were in the process
- 18 of moving her over to the panelists and somehow have lost
- 19 her. So we will work on it.
- 20 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Davis, was there
- 21 another question?
- 22 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Oh yes. My next question is when
- 23 I talked to you previously about it and others about the
- 24 mobilization plan is it an update on when there's going
- 25 to be available for us to view and assess it?



1 ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: As soon as I get off this

- 2 call, I'll send it to you. I have it.
- 3 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Okay. Thank you.
- 4 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Well, if the Captain is
- 5 not available, we are just going to move on because we
- 6 are on the clock can we do that? Okay.
- 7 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Please.
- 8 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Chief can provide the
- 9 information at a later date and time, please. If not, you
- 10 can email it to us and we can share it with the entire
- 11 Board. Thank you.
- 12 ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: Thank you, sir.
- 13 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay, thank you, AC BETTISON,
- 14 thank you.
- 15 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Through the Chair, I had a
- 16 comment for the Assistant Chief. My hands been up there.
- 17 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, sir.
- 18 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Just a quick kudos that I want
- 19 to just give out. Thank you for your report and
- 20 responding to the questions I had. But I think we need to
- 21 recognize the command staff at the 8th Precinct,
- 22 Commander Patterson, Captain DeSeco, Lieutenant Duda, and
- 23 Sergeant Johns. They have implemented a program over
- 24 there where they have officers walking the beat and
- 25 putting them on the beat in some of the hotspot areas



- 1 over there. And in the 8th Precinct area, one of them has
- 2 a particular corner Grand River and Lahser and as a
- 3 result of the operations over there, this April 22nd,
- 4 they've had 6 felony arrest with CCWs, 198 ordinance
- 5 violations, 4 firearms were seized. And a litany of other
- 6 things that were there, like 89 vehicles investigating, 4
- 7 impoundments, but I just really think they need to be
- 8 recognized for the work that they're doing over there
- 9 with, with this operation, with putting officers on a
- 10 beat. And they're going to be in a lot of the areas over
- 11 there in the District one and the 8th Precinct area, like
- 12 Green River and Southfield, 7-mile and Telegraph and
- 13 continue to operation over there. I think you're doing a
- 14 phenomenal job with answering some of the questions that
- 15 the citizens are complaining about over in District 1 or
- 16 8th Precinct area. I just think they need to be
- 17 recognized for that. Thank you.
- ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: Thank you. I will
- 19 definitely ensure the Chief gets that report. Thank you.
- 20 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Commissioner Holley.
- 21 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Commissioner Hernandez was
- 22 before me. I don't want to disrespect.
- 23 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Oh, thank you. Through the
- 24 Chair, just appreciative AC Bettison of your thorough
- 25 report and coverage. Commissioner Davis actually asked my



- 1 curiosity around mental health. So thank you for that
- 2 answer as well. And sort of a sidebar. We don't have to
- 3 do it now, but just for our listening audience in the
- 4 future, if we could maybe provide some context around
- 5 what it means to be exonerated, not sustained et cetera,
- 6 those types of terms, we may be more versed in, but our
- 7 community certainly isn't. So I would just ask, a very
- 8 baby ask of defining what that means in these certain
- 9 instances. Thank you.
- 10 DIRECTOR GRAVELINE: Through the Chair. I can answer
- 11 that question. So in terms of internal affairs
- 12 investigations the results of those investigations be
- 13 sustained that is that we have proof beyond a
- 14 preponderance of the evidence and that's what becomes
- 15 sustained. If we have a finding of sustained. Not
- 16 sustained means we were not able to establish proof
- 17 beyond a preponderance of the evidence. Unfounded means
- 18 someone made a claim and through our investigation, we
- 19 found out that that purported action never happened.
- 20 It's completely unfounded. Exonerated means that through
- 21 our investigation, we found out that the action occurred,
- 22 but was in compliance with DPD policy or was essentially
- 23 appropriate behavior, even though that action occurred.
- 24 That's the distinction between our findings and internal
- 25 affairs. Thank you.



- 1 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Commissioner Holley.
- 2 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Well, thank you Mr. Chairman.
- 3 AC, thank you so much for the other report that you made.
- 4 Mr. Chairman, I had eye surgery so I had my staff put
- 5 these together, but I can't see it, but let me just say
- 6 this, AC if you would please, that one thing I'm
- 7 concerned about is that when I see all these shootings
- 8 around the country, I see like one guy was shot, and when
- 9 you have non-combative with the police, why is it that we
- 10 have like 9, 15, 17 get shot? You get shot 17 times or 6
- 11 times. Why can't one shot be enough to render and maybe
- 12 that one shot can keep a person alive as well as being
- 13 arrested. So why does the police have to shoot I'm not
- 14 talking about you or us. I'm just talking about I'm
- 15 concerned about the fact that why do so many people get
- 16 shot so many times.
- 17 ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: So, Commissioner Holley, I
- definitely will say this, that when I see some of the
- 19 things that have occurred around the country with other
- 20 police departments I'm definitely a proponent for reform.
- 21 You know a lot of it I'll use Chief Craig's words. A
- 22 lot of what we see is very, very troubling. And so we're
- 23 taught at our Police Academy that, you know, how many
- 24 shots does it take, you know, enough to stop the threat
- 25 and you, you have to assess each shot before you take



- 1 another shot. So, each shot needs to be accounted for,
- because you're looking at backdrop, you're looking at,
- 3 did that shot stop the threat? And if you notice one of
- 4 the things that I'm so proud of with the men and women of
- 5 the Detroit Police Department that I haven't seen with
- 6 other departments, and we look at the video, we want
- 7 first departments to have this body-worn camera, but it
- 8 is amazing, sir, to see our officers immediately
- 9 transition from taking that shot, or it may be two shots
- 10 or three shots. When the threat is stopped, they
- immediately go into life-saving mode where they're
- 12 applying tourniquets, where they're actively trying to
- 13 save lives.
- 14 ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: And in some of the
- 15 departments in particular, we all know about George
- 16 Floyd, but some of the other places that we've seen,
- 17 going back to other cities where it's been high-profile
- 18 instances, where you don't see any aid rendered at all.
- 19 So I can't answer that Commissioner Holley, because it
- 20 doesn't make sense to me what I've seen that has occurred
- 21 with some of these other departments, but speaking for
- 22 DPD in the training and the leadership that we provide
- our members, I'm just so proud of the young men and women
- 24 who were working for the department that are out there
- 25 that are doing it the right way. And going back to this



- 1 case, that happened on Hanna Street, they were trying to
- 2 actually provide life-saving, they went into a life-
- 3 saving mode before the threat was over. They didn't see
- 4 him per se, as a threat at that time, they were trying to
- 5 save this individual's life. And he went into attack
- 6 mode, was able to get a knife and that ended up turning
- 7 it into a fatal force encounter to save the officer's
- 8 life. But if you get a chance to see the video, you'll
- 9 see how our officers were completely different.
- 10 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Thank you so much. Mr.
- 11 Chairman, the other thing I was concerned about is that
- 12 the only sense of conscious effort are it's on that
- 13 conscience of the police department that we need to be
- 14 concerned about of how many times we have to shoot
- 15 somebody in order to stop them. The other thing I'm
- 16 concerned about is that Chief Craig last week indicated
- if I'm not mistaken, and that is that the system is
- 18 allowing people who get arrested for guns, they go,
- 19 they're not find, they are not jailed. We got it on the
- 20 record, it says one gun gets you two years. And so if we
- 21 had the summit and it seemed like we all working
- 22 together. It would seem like to me, if it's a problem
- 23 that you guys are having about the prosecutor or the
- 24 other judges, because they're not opponent, they are
- 25 elected. So it's some concern. I got 22 murders, beyond



- 1 what I had a year ago 22, which means we'll be over 200
- 2 again at the end of this year. So I'm asking you, is
- 3 there anything we can do to advocate on behalf of the
- 4 police department, that these people who basically are
- 5 arrested for guns, they basically are punished.
- 6 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Holley, I just want to say that is
- 7 a national concern. When you hear about the issues in
- 8 Detroit is throughout the country. We're not just talking
- 9 about reform with the police department, we talking about
- 10 the criminal justice system overall. So hopefully as you
- 11 stated, these judges are elected or appointed so
- 12 therefore, how can we impact it. It takes us to come
- 13 together as a community across this country. The NAACP in
- 14 American Civil Liberty, the Urban League, all us must
- 15 come together to try to advocate. And President Biden is
- 16 advocating that with the Justice Department attorney
- 17 general. So hopefully we can see some light in the
- 18 tunnel, but right now it's rather dark. I agree with you
- 19 a hundred percent.
- 20 ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: Chair Bell, I would just
- 21 add that Prosecutor Worthy has definitely taken on gun
- 22 crimes and she's issuing warrants and that when it gets
- 23 to the judges, all the people that I report to be locked
- 24 up for CCW you know, carrying concealed weapons, most of
- 25 them get what's called personal bond.



1 ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: And to the audience, a personal bond means that they don't have to pay anything 2. to get out of jail. They're released and they are back in 3 the community. And I'm not saying that's a first offense, 4 where something of a not violent thing, but some of them 5 do have very violent track records and they're released 6 as well and, I know COVID has really complicated things. 7 When we talk about compassionate releases, where you're 8 9 emptying the jails out and putting folks on tether, et cetera, but many folks being released, even not with a 10 tether. So it's just a cycle and we definitely have to 11 12 fall for that to make sure that the right folks who are 13 really a threat in driving violence in the community that they're not getting compassionate released because 14 15 they're having no compassion in the community on us. 16 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: All I'm saying Mr. Chairman and I'll leave it alone is that there's a vaccine for COVID, 17 but there's no best thing for death. And I'm just saying 18 to you, is that somehow some kind of way, the only way we 19 can get a hold of this is that we basically put pressure 20 on these judges. Thank you so much, I'll leave it alone. 21 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, Commissioner Holley. 2.2 2.3 That is an ongoing debate as we continue. But we want to move on to the next item. Item number 9, a OCI Interim 24 Chief Investigator Lawrence Akbar at this time. Thank 25



- 1 you,
- 2 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Mr. Chairman, may I have a
- 3 point of order, Mr. Chairman?
- 4 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, sir.
- 5 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Mr. Akbar, he was just here
- 6 three weeks ago. What has changed that we got to have
- 7 another report. What has changed.
- 8 CHAIRPERSON BELL: We trying to have it in a timely
- 9 manner so you can be abreast of what's going on. It will
- 10 be a brief and to the point.
- 11 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: You cut me off for him?
- 12 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I'm sorry. Go ahead, go ahead, go
- 13 ahead, go ahead.
- 14 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: I just know he was just here
- 15 three weeks ago.
- 16 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Well, we trying to have a timely
- 17 report where you can know what's going on, for the entire
- 18 Board to know.
- 19 COMMISSIONEY HOLLEY: Thank you Mr. Chairman, I'll
- 20 leave you alone. I'm not going to say nothing else. I'm
- 21 not going to say nothing else. Thank you.
- 22 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Are you okay, sir, are you okay?
- MRS. WHITE: Through the Chair. Commissioner Carter
- 24 has also arrived to the meeting. Just wanted to note that
- 25 for the record. Thank you.



- 1 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Thank you.
- 2 MRS. WHITE: Interim Chief Investigator Akbar and
- 3 Acting Supervising Investigator Madrigal, are we -
- 4 MR. AKBAR: She's getting it together right now,
- 5 share a screen. We experienced some technical
- 6 difficulties.
- 7 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: You are all messing with the
- 8 preacher, that's what it is.
- 9 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: You need some holy water in
- 10 here.
- MR. AKBAR: Okay. Hopefully we move forward, now.
- 12 Well, I guess, I won't be presenting at all.
- COMMISSIONER BURCH: Excuse me, Mr. Chair, since time
- 14 is of an essence could I just recommend that we hear the
- 15 report next week because you're asking, I'm just saying
- 16 sir,
- 17 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Burch if they
- 18 prepared in the next minute. So we want to get this out
- 19 of the way, because we still have an ongoing agenda. Are
- 20 they prepared?
- 21 COMMISSIONER BURCH: I'm not arguing with you. I said
- 22 you have a closed session. So I have my time schedule. I
- 23 may not can stay for your closed session.
- 24 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Ms. White, are they
- 25 ready?



- 1 MRS. WHITE: Yes. Through the Chair, Interim Chief
- 2 Investigator Akbar, you can still present with your
- 3 information. The Honorable Board has already received all
- 4 of the documents and PowerPoint presentations.
- 5 MR. AKBAR: Okay. Not a problem. All right. Good
- 6 afternoon Honorable Board. I am Lawrence Akbar, Interim
- 7 Chief Investigator of the Office of the Chief
- 8 Investigator. As you well know, in your packets, you have
- 9 the Office of the Chief Investigators, March, 2021
- 10 citizen complaint report. Now on the first page, it's
- 11 going to show OCI received 126 complaints during March of
- 12 2021. That's 44, more than March of 2020. The next page
- is going to show you that this chart shows how and where
- 14 a citizen complaints are file. OCI has received the most
- 15 telephone complaints, 61 out of 89 during the month of
- 16 March.
- 17 MR AKBAR: This next chart shows the number of
- 18 complaints filed against commands. 9 complaints involve
- 19 multiple commands. OCI received 3 complaints regarding
- 20 landlord tenant and eviction disputes during the month of
- 21 March. OCI is continuing to monitor this concern. Does
- 22 your members understand department policy and the OSI
- 23 role doing several disputes? Like we're going to catch
- 24 up. Next slide. Next slide after that. That's fine. I'm
- 25 going to continue. Citizen complaints, closed. 90



- 1 complaints were closed in March involving 137
- 2 allegations. The top 2 allegations are procedure
- 3 violations and demeanor violations. Procedure violations.
- 4 We're talking about citizens complaining about police are
- 5 stopping them for reason, unjustified tickets they
- 6 receive. When officers respond to their home, they're
- 7 saying that the officers didn't investigate their
- 8 situation properly. And the other top one is demeanor
- 9 violations. That includes rude non-professional conduct,
- 10 use of profanity. Commissioners, Bell, Holt, Jones and I
- 11 stressed the importance of customer service during the
- 12 new recruit training sessions.
- MR. AKBAR: It is imperative that officers' conduct
- 14 is professional to implement procedural justice and
- 15 legitimacy for fair policing. If an officer is
- 16 unprofessional in his or her actions, it may escalate
- 17 into a use of force and additional procedure allegation.
- 18 This next slide that I'm showing that you should have in
- 19 your packet, 39 incidents closed in March involving the
- 20 DPD member equipped with a body-worn camera. 35 of those
- 21 incidents were captured on body-worn camera. I'm just
- 22 going to mention about the violations of DPD policy,
- 23 which the Board has approved regarding the body-worn
- 24 camera. Members will be in violation if they do not turn
- on their body-worn cameras during an investigation, they



- 1 turn them on late halfway involved in the situation that
- 2 they're in, turn off their cameras before the
- 3 investigation's completed, fail to report a malfunction
- 4 to their supervisor, fail to document the malfunction on
- 5 their activity log sheet. If an officer violates
- 6 department body-worn camera policy, they may be subject
- 7 to disciplinary action, including, but not limited to
- 8 termination.
- 9 MR. AKBAR: I'm going to talk about on this slide is
- 10 closed investigations in March, and it's divided up into
- 11 a pie chart regarding DPD members by rank and seniority.
- 12 118 DPD members are identified in 90 complaints were
- 13 closed in March. 91 of them were police officers. 10 was
- 14 sergeants. When we look at the pie chart that talks about
- 15 the seniority, 21 police officers at less than two years
- on the job, that's really concerning. I know I say that
- 17 every week, but that's a concern. 35 members between 3 or
- 4 years, 22 members, 5 to 9 years, 26 officers between 20
- 19 and 29 years.
- MR. AKBAR: Now, it looks like we're caught up DVD
- 21 calls for service closed in March. 58 DPD members working
- 22 the afternoon shift during this time of their incident. 3
- 23 to 4 years, seniority was 22 less than 2 years is none. I
- 24 picked the afternoon shift because if you add up to the
- 25 power shift and afternoon, you're talking about 58



- 1 members being involved. And that is the most active time
- 2 pretty much during the day. Afternoon, you're going to
- 3 get a lot of in progress crime, serious part one crimes.
- 4 We're talking about homicides, carjackings shootings home
- 5 invasions, et cetera.
- 6 MR. AKBAR: OCI, I'm going to give you a report on
- 7 OCI status of staff. The Office of Chief Investigator
- 8 experienced challenges during this pandemic. However, I
- 9 continue to take proactive measures to identify solutions
- 10 to those challenges. The work-share program has ended,
- 11 therefore, the OCI staff is back to full-time status as
- of April 12th, 2021. Last week, OCI management team was
- informed that several employees of civil rights who are
- 14 housed in our facility, tested positive for COVID-19, and
- 15 the possibility of our employees may have been exposed to
- 16 them. OCI management, followed all of the City of Detroit
- 17 health department protocols by contacting and scheduling
- 18 staff, working in the building and working remotely from
- 19 home to be tested for COVID-19 at the Williams Rec Center
- 20 located at 8431 Parks. Upon completion of the testing
- 21 period, one of our employees did test positive, the
- 22 notification process regarding communication between top
- 23 level management regarding OCI, the record section and
- 24 civil rights have been established for future emergency
- 25 incidents. General Services was notified and our entire



- 1 facility was cleaned and sanitized from the conference
- 2 room to the kitchen, the restrooms, the front desk area,
- 3 and all offices. Interim Secretary to the Board, Ms.
- 4 Melanie White ordered a 14 day quarantine for the
- 5 investigative staff regarding access to our building,
- 6 safe to return to work is the plan, and we are ensuring
- 7 safety protocols are in place including, but not limited
- 8 to six feet distancing within the work space. And also we
- 9 continue to work with the Interim Board Secretary to
- 10 identify key training initiatives through NACOLES, the
- 11 City of Detroit, and other outlets to ensure staff
- 12 comports with the best practices regarding oversight
- 13 initiatives.
- MR. AKBAR: I want to thank the OCI staff are working
- 15 diligently and hard during this pandemic. I also want to
- 16 thank all the past and present Board of Police
- 17 Commissioners, who, during the pandemic, have read and
- 18 approved and returned all OCI cases, investigations in a
- 19 timely matter. Without their cooperation citizens would
- 20 not receive their finding letters, and my office would
- 21 not be able to forward, to stay in case it's a
- 22 disciplinary administration. The information is also
- 23 vital to respond to the departments of Freedom of
- 24 Information Act and other department requests I misspoke.
- 25 I meant the Law Department, freedom of information



- 1 request. I also want to thank General Service Department
- 2 again for maintaining daily cleaning of our facilities
- 3 during this pandemic. According to the OCI Chief
- 4 Investigator's files regarding FOIA request from the City
- of Detroit Law Department. The numbers are as follows: 26
- 6 requests were processed during the first quarter of this
- 7 year, 24 Freedom of Information Act requests in 2020, 22
- 8 in 2019, and 19 requests in 2018.
- 9 MR. AKBAR: Now I'm going to talk to you about OCI
- 10 statistics. OCI currently has 490 open cases and 164
- 11 cases over 90 days. 294 cases have been closed during
- 12 2021. Recently 2 OCI investigators separated from our
- organization. Their 70 cases were reassigned to the
- 14 remaining investigators on duty. General public
- 15 announcement. Citizens may file a complaint. They can
- 16 call our office at (313) 596-2499 from 8:00 AM to 4:00
- 17 PM. After business hours, they can leave a message, leave
- 18 their name and telephone number, and my investigators
- 19 will call you back the next business day. They can also
- 20 file complaints online at the City of Detroit website,
- 21 detroitmi.gov/bopc. And they also can file complaints at
- 22 any Detroit Police Precinct. We prefer that you call the
- 23 Precinct and when you do ask the request to speak to a
- 24 supervisor and they will gladly take your complaint and
- 25 your concern. At this time, I want to thank you for your



- 1 time and your patience and sorry for the technical
- 2 difficulties that I had during my presentation. But at
- 3 this time I can answer any questions if you so choose
- 4 Honorable Board.
- 5 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioners.
- 6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I just want to congratulate
- 7 you Akbar on an excellent report. Thank you very much,
- 8 and letting us know. We didn't have any idea about the
- 9 corona issue. Thank very much and for the action that you
- 10 decided to take.
- 11 MR. AKBAR: Thank you.
- 12 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Any other Commissioner. I just
- 13 want to remind you, Commissioners, the focal point is of
- 14 our charge is having non-criminal complaint. And as you
- 15 see by the FOIA information, there's been a great deal of
- 16 concern in terms of citizens' complaint. You probably see
- 17 more than in the near, near future with the media. So I
- 18 think it's very important that the Board be abreast of
- 19 what's going on and really appreciate our staff in terms
- 20 of how they're processing these complaints. So I just
- 21 think that it's very important that you stay on top and
- 22 know what's going on in terms of how we operate. That's
- 23 why I appreciate the staff coming out the OCI to tune in
- 24 for this presentation. So we're going to move on and
- 25 thank you Interim Chief Investigator Akbar for your



- 1 report. We move on to item, number B.
- 2 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Mr. Chairman, we have a couple
- of hands, and Burton is on the phone. He's addressing you
- 4 as well.
- 5 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Brown.
- 6 COMMISSIONER BROWN: So, the report that you gave and
- 7 a number of cases that you say are past due, what was the
- 8 time limit amount that was placed upon us for completing
- 9 these cases with the Department of Justice through the
- 10 concern agreement?
- 11 CHAIRPERSON BELL: 90 days.
- 12 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Okay. So 90 days, and we still
- 13 have 164 that are consistently late past 90 days and I'm
- 14 trying to figure out what method and system you are using
- 15 to track these cases, because the numbers I reported to
- 16 you a couple of weeks ago, where it was information that
- 17 was sent to me from your office. It was sent through
- 18 those channels was a total of 694 cases, I believe I
- 19 said, that's what the number was. And now you're telling
- 20 me today in a month or a few weeks that you're down 164.
- 21 So I just like to know what system are you using to track
- 22 these? And I like to come over there and looking at it.
- 23 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Brown, we will
- 24 prepare a report for you. You can come to the Board and
- 25 you can look at it. Due to COVID and due to loss of



- 1 personnel, we trying our best to address those concern,
- 2 to handle those cases. We have employees that resigned.
- 3 We have employees that went on family medical leave as
- 4 you well know, and working from home. So we are somewhat
- 5 behind, we were trying to catch up.
- 6 COMMISSIONER BROWN: So I have one more question, Mr.
- 7 Chairman and this is a safety question with COVID.
- 8 Knowing that the way the offices are set up, are the
- 9 investigators still sharing offices with one another over
- 10 there because I know it was two.
- 11 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Brown, we are not
- 12 going to have this debate. We would talk to you.
- 13 COMMISSIONER BROWN: I'm not debating. I'm asking the
- 14 man a legitimate question to make sure that the employees
- 15 are returning to work safely in a safe environment. He
- 16 can answer that question, Mr. Chairman.
- 17 CHAIRPERSON BELL: We're going to move on to the next
- 18 question. We can have a response to that issue. Any other
- 19 hands up?
- MR. BURTON: Through the Chair.
- 21 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Mr. Jones.
- 22 COMMISSIONER JONES: Good afternoon. And Interim
- 23 Chief Akbar, thank your report that you had put together.
- 24 I want to know, as, as a part of continuous and ongoing
- 25 training for DPD personnel, when you comprise these



- 1 reports, does it impact the continued training of the
- 2 officers, so that that way there's an opportunity to have
- 3 maybe there won't be as many complaints based upon say
- 4 years of seniority and the time and the time and the day
- 5 that their shift occurs, but you've highlighted in your
- 6 report. Does that impact the continuous training of DPD
- 7 officers?
- 8 MR. AKBAR: Yes it does. It does impact. And
- 9 especially the young officers, the young officers, the
- 10 older ones I'm concerned about, but I'm concerned about
- 11 them too, from the perspective of there is a phenomenon
- 12 called actual burnout. When you're constantly working on
- 13 the frontline and seeing, being in the action, and, as
- 14 you get older, your patience get shorter or whatever.
- 15 Personally, I think they need to probably maybe pull some
- of those officers off the street that are accumulating
- 17 those complaints and put them on other duties.
- 18 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Excuse me, we not going to get
- 19 into that type of dialogue. So we're going to pretty much
- 20 strike that conversation. That it's not something that's
- 21 appropriate.
- 22 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Why has he.
- 23 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Commissioned Burton's on the
- 24 phone.
- 25 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, Commissioner Burton?



- 1 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Thank you, Mr. Chairman
- 2 Commissioner Burton, present.
- 3 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Lord, this is unfair.
- 4 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I'm sorry. Commissioner Davis will
- 5 be after Commissioner Burton.
- 6 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: It's been a couple of times I
- 7 raised my hand first.
- 8 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Davis, you have the
- 9 floor.
- 10 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Okay. Thank you. Finally. Mr.
- 11 Akbar, question, are you aware of the department
- 12 disciplining anyone for repeatedly not turning on their
- 13 body-worn cameras?
- 14 MR. AKBAR: You were breaking up? I could hardly hear
- 15 you.
- 16 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Are you aware or do you know if
- 17 the department has disciplined anyone for not turning on
- 18 their body-cameras.
- 19 MR. AKBAR: Oh yes, they do. They do disciplinary. I
- 20 can't give you the numbers off hand, but they do.
- 21 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: And do we have some repeat
- 22 offenders?
- MR. AKBAR: Not that I'm aware of.
- 24 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Okay. Thank you, finally.
- 25 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Commissioner Burton's on the



- 1 phone.
- 2 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, go ahead. This is
- 3 Commissioner Burton, present for questions for you the
- 4 Interim Chief Investigator. Two questions. Question
- 5 number one, has your office made any changes to help
- 6 assist our disabled community that maybe have a vision
- 7 impairment, a speech impairment, maybe mobility
- 8 challenges, or et cetera, as well as we would like to
- 9 know, second question. We would like to know how many
- 10 investigators we have lost this last year. And my final
- 11 question for you, sir, have there been any changes with
- 12 officers not wearing body-worn cameras?
- MR. AKBAR: I'll answer your last one first. I'm not
- 14 aware of any changes regarding the officers not wearing
- 15 their body-worn cameras. With respect to what was your
- 16 first one that you gave me?
- 17 CHAIRPERSON BELL: The disability community, how we
- 18 deal with them.
- MR. AKBAR: The disability community? Well, at this
- 20 present time, we don't have any citizens that are coming
- 21 up to our facility due to COVID. If we did have people
- 22 come forward and make complaints and they have
- 23 disabilities, we're very patient, we will accommodate
- 24 them in order for them to have their complaints taken.
- 25 That's not a problem.



- 1 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Any other Commissioner?
- 2 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Through the Chair.
- 3 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Commissioner Hernandez has his
- 4 hands up, Mr. Chairman.
- 5 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Hernandez, I can't
- 6 see your hand. Okay, thank you.
- 7 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Oh, absolutely. I was using
- 8 the virtual hand. My curiosity is in parallel with
- 9 Commissioner Brown. I'd like to get a written response
- 10 from the office in terms of how we're actually measuring
- 11 and tracking what success looks like when it comes to
- 12 these complaints. So that's my "ask" for the week. Thank
- 13 you.
- 14 CHAIRPERSON BELL: And I agree. We will have that
- 15 forthcoming. We want to move on if all possible. Thank
- 16 you, Interim Chief Investigator Akbar.
- 17 MR. AKBAR: All right. Your welcome, sir.
- 18 CHAIRPERSON BELL: The next item would be, Ms. White,
- 19 have we prepared for Mr. Johnson, Detroit Towers
- 20 Association?
- 21 MRS. WHITE: Yes, sir. We are enabling his
- 22 microphone. Yes.
- MR. JOHNSON: Afternoon. Is it on me?
- MRS. WHITE: Yes, sir.
- MR. JOHNSON: Through Chairman Bell, and through you



- 1 to the Honorable Board. May it please you all, Bert
- 2 Johnson appearing on behalf of the Detroit Towing
- 3 Association. A quick question for housekeeping; Ms.
- 4 White, am I going to be sharing out my screen for the
- 5 PowerPoint presentation?
- 6 MRS. WHITE: We have it up at this time. Thank you.
- 7 MR. JOHNSON: Okay. And I would just need to prompt
- 8 you as to moving it forward.
- 9 MRS. WHITE: Yes, sir.
- 10 MR. JOHNSON: Okay. Thank you. And Chairman Bell,
- 11 while I appreciate the 10 minutes that you were giving
- me, might I be able to make some comments and then
- 13 reserve some time for our attorney Dan McLean?
- 14 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, sir.
- 15 MR. JOHNSON: Okay. Thank you very kindly. Well, good
- 16 afternoon to you all. Number one, the DTA has a rich
- 17 history. They are some of the longest serving towers in
- 18 the city's history who make up the DTA, their strengths.
- 19 If we could go to the next slide, Ms. White, their
- 20 strengths from a history and overview standpoint is in
- 21 their training. The employee training and the equipment
- 22 they bring to the table, the licensing and permitting
- 23 they hold. And most importantly, the customer service.
- 24 After all, these are Detroiters who are serving
- 25 Detroiters and their businesses and their employees; they



- 1 both love this city. I want to talk also about implicit
- 2 bias. It is completely unfair in our estimation for the
- 3 Detroit Police Department, to continue to talk about
- 4 corruption in towing.
- 5 MR. JOHNSON: Whenever the DTA discusses its issues
- 6 with this Board, Captain Parish brings corruption up
- 7 every time we meet with this Board, as a way of tainting,
- 8 the conversation. Implicit bias puts a black eye on
- 9 towing, and these fine towers are being called out all
- 10 over the country today. In the criminal justice system
- 11 and with the killing of unarmed blacks. And I think it
- 12 needs to be called out here just the same. The next
- 13 slide, please. You all have read the DTA's Mission and
- 14 our Vision over and again. I'm sure by the documents that
- 15 we've submitted, but also want to add that the DTA was
- 16 created in 2019 to unify the police authorized towers,
- 17 who recognize a growing threat to their businesses. And
- 18 that's their major competitor in DPD, Captain Parish, as
- 19 the tow monitor, he's the only one who can guarantee the
- 20 growth of his business.
- MR. JOHNSON: And how does he do that? He does it by
- 22 eliminating towers from the rotation. It's completely
- 23 unfair and unequitable in that group. No one in this
- 24 group, the DTA that is, has that authority. Captain
- 25 Parish doesn't have to work hard. He can selectively grow



- 1 his business just by eliminating us one by one. We saw it
- 2 last week with MARS. And now we know that our towers, we
- 3 believe would be next. Captain Parish is in complete
- 4 control of this process. Both he and the Law Department
- 5 want you and you Commissioners to stand by and be
- 6 stripped of your authority to oversee towing. We believe
- 7 to BOPC is best suited to make the decisions regarding
- 8 towing. And to be clear, the move to disqualify a tower
- 9 is self-serving, the city profits from that. Captain
- 10 Parish's business goes up when that happens and these
- 11 towers, they suffer. I'd like you to think about my next
- 12 statement. The tow monitor is a tower sitting on the
- 13 Board in review of us and our work. How can he decide
- 14 anything about towers when he doesn't work under the same
- 15 rules that we work on there? Next slide, please.
- MR. JOHNSON: The demographics of this group are
- 17 varied. They're Detroit based. They're women owned and
- 18 they're black businesses with Detroit employees and their
- 19 taxpayers at the end of the day, who've played the game
- the right way, no matter what's been asked or even
- 21 demanded of them. Next slide, please. We want to thank
- 22 the Chief of Police for sitting down with us in the last
- 23 year and reaching an agreement. It was after lots of
- 24 conversation and deliberation that we were able to agree
- 25 to some things. We're thankful, but now we're realizing



- 1 that there are holes unintended, we believe, in that
- 2 agreement. Right now, DPD towing is said to not exceed
- 3 25% of all tows. It's problematic for us because in the
- 4 towing reports that we look at that demonstrate, who told
- 5 what, and when, where, and how, we see that there are
- 6 inaccuracies, inconsistencies, like wrong dates, dates
- 7 that don't meet the year of 2020 when these things were
- 8 first constructed. There are some in '17, '18 and 2019,
- 9 and it's misleading data. So that when we're looking at
- 10 these reports, we cannot say to you all as Commissioners
- 11 that we know that DPD doesn't exceed 25% of all tows. We
- 12 were told that in order to get our payments, which every
- 13 other vendor in the City of Detroit gets every two weeks.
- 14 And we had to have contracts, not permits. And that the
- sole purpose for moving to contracts and away from
- 16 permits was not to change diametrically what would happen
- 17 under contracts, but so that we could get paid. And that
- 18 made a lot of sense to us. Many of you do not know that
- 19 it was some 8 to 9 years going back to these towers had
- 20 not been paid, in an ugly economy, in a recession, after
- 21 bankruptcy and with the onset of COVID. We have towers
- 22 who in the past 3 to 5 months were just paid for tows
- 23 that they made 8 to 9 years ago. There's no business in
- 24 America that we believe, and I think Captain Parish would
- 25 agree with me, could survive with that kind of pay rate.



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- 1 Next slide, please.
- 2 MR. JOHNSON: The key areas of concern that we have
- 3 are many, but I just listed 4 for you that I think are
- 4 very important for this discussion. We believe that there
- 5 is an inherent inequity in the towing rotation. If the
- 6 City of Detroit Police Department is going to be a tower
- 7 and they are in business, make no mistake about it, then
- 8 they should join the towing rotation with the rest of the
- 9 DTA, with the rest of the towers. That creates equity. I
- 10 happen to have been able to go over to the dispatch
- 11 office to look at and to hear how tows are dispatched
- 12 across the city. I met two very fine young ladies who
- 13 took me through their process. It was split up one
- 14 Eastside, one Westside. What was very notable was that
- 15 they use no software to determine via formula as to who
- 16 gets what note tow next. I sat and I watched for about an
- 17 hour.
- MR. JOHNSON: I took copious notes. They answered all
- of my questions, but the problem I took back to Captain
- 20 Parish was this, I said, Captain, how do you know if
- 21 there's not a matrix in place? If there's no formula in
- 22 place? And if there is no spoken tow rotation metric to
- 23 really understand who's getting what tows, how do you
- 24 know if you're keeping to the 25%? He said, well, Bert,
- 25 frankly, I've been doing this a long time, and I just



- 1 kind of know how to maintain those levels. I thought that
- 2 was interesting because at no time, when I was in that
- 3 dispatch center, when those tows were called in and they
- 4 were going out was Captain Parish in the room with us,
- 5 and routinely, he's not in that room because that's a job
- 6 that he's got reserved for other people. I'll move on.
- 7 Next slide, please.
- 8 MR. JOHNSON: Under those areas of concern, there's
- 9 something that I think you all should really, really
- 10 think about. DPD has always spoken to be in a
- 11 relationship, a partnership with us, but we determined
- 12 that they are in direct competition with us. The DPD has
- 13 no overhead costs because it's not a business and all
- 14 their costs are borne by the Detroit taxpayers. DTA
- 15 towers have to be concerned about both costs and profit
- 16 because they're actual businesses. And if it doesn't work
- 17 out on one side of the ledger, they lose on the other.
- 18 DPD sends us our business. Think about that for a moment.
- 19 DPD sends us our business on police authorized tows. When
- 20 they get a call and dispatch service, they're in charge
- 21 of our work. There's an inherent inequity on that point
- 22 alone. Under contracts and payments were permits and
- 23 accountability. Contracts for the sole purpose of being
- 24 paid on time, versus the current permits with no material
- 25 changes and BOPC policy is what we were promised. You all



- 1 are now staring down an RFP that says if it passes and if
- 2 the proposed towing ordinance passes at the City Council,
- 3 the BOPC is disempowered, you're out of the mix, you're
- 4 out of the game. You don't have a say anymore, going
- 5 forward. You just get notified of what happens. I don't
- 6 think you all have had a substantive conversation about
- 7 that. And you should ask yourselves, has that been
- 8 presented to me? And is that something you're okay with?
- 9 We think the contract RFP fails to protect DTA members
- 10 who've worked with DPD because the cancel clause is
- 11 easily triggered with no due process remaining with the
- 12 BOPC. When we actually achieved this agreement with the
- 13 Chief of Police, we were told that it was an agreement,
- 14 but it wasn't really a binding agreement.
- 15 MR. JOHNSON: And we feel a little duped because now
- 16 we're looking at a contract RFP that says with 30 days'
- 17 notice they can get rid of our contract. Well, that means
- 18 a tower's put on the outside of the process. It can't
- 19 even apply until the next contract term opens. And in
- 20 this instance, it would be five years. The DTA pays
- 21 strict adherence to all the rules, the surprise
- 22 inspections, the times of operations, the towing, lots,
- 23 et cetera. The DTA has been operating in good faith. DPD
- 24 is not in the rotation, and that honor system on towing
- 25 percentages, it's not anything that anyone could believe



- 1 in. There's no strict adherence on their part to the same
- 2 rules. The tow lots are in complete disarray. And I want
- 3 to show you if we could go to the next slide.
- 4 MR. JOHNSON: This is a police authorized towers lot.
- 5 This is ABA Towing. Next slide, please. It's orderly.
- 6 These are DPD lots. Next slide, please. This is ABA
- 7 Towing and very, orderly. You keep clear lines as to
- 8 where these cars are parked. You can find your car on
- 9 this lot. Next slide, please. These are DPD lots. That
- 10 sign that has that writing on top of it, you don't know
- 11 what it says under the bottom. If you go to the Grinnell
- 12 lot, those signs are not even visible, they're not up
- 13 routinely because Troy's Towing is on Grinnell. There are
- 14 people looking for their cars at DPD lots showing up at
- 15 Troy's Towing, asking when, where, why, who, and how. And
- 16 Troy has to send them back down the street to a company
- 17 that doesn't have signs up. Next slide, please. This is
- 18 Bobby's Towing, kind of looks like my grandmother's front
- 19 yard with the nice flowers and the whole nine. Next
- 20 slide, please. These are DPD lots. If our lots look like
- 21 this, we will be closed down. Our permits will be taken.
- 22 Next slide, please. This is 7Ds Towing, 7-mile in Nevada.
- 23 Next slide, please. These are pictures of the DPD
- 24 Grinnell lot. Next slide, please. This is LIJBS Towing.
- 25 Very orderly, very neat. There are walls to protect the



- 1 vision from what's happening on one side to the street.
- 2 Next slide, please. Again, these are DPD lots. Next
- 3 slide.
- 4 MR. JOHNSON: This is Executive Towing from an aerial
- 5 view. Very orderly, very neat. You can find your car, not
- 6 just by looking in the computers, but by walking down
- 7 those roads. Next slide. Again, this is the Grinnell lot.
- 8 That building that you're looking at on the right is an
- 9 active operable building, but it's in complete disarray.
- 10 Next slide, please. This is Troy's Towing right down the
- 11 street, a stark and drastic difference. Next slide.
- 12 Again, DPD lots. Next slide. This is AC Towing on the
- 13 Westside. Very clean, very orderly, adhering to all the
- 14 rules. Next slide.
- MR. JOHNSON: These are DPD lots again. Next slide.
- 16 DPD, lots again. Next slide. It takes us to the "ask".
- 17 The "ask" is very simple. The city charter and city
- 18 ordinance provides this Board clear and unambiquous
- 19 authority over the department and police towing. A lot of
- 20 police department misinformed this Board in the past when
- 21 they claimed towing permits, violated the charter, the
- 22 ordinance and state law, a claim that was wholly rejected
- 23 in federal court. And this board should not be duped
- 24 again. The DTA and other towers are simply asking for the
- 25 existing towing permits to be extended or reissued for



- 1 six months. Likewise, the BOPC should rescind the 2017
- 2 resolution by which it transferred authority for
- 3 contracting to the OCP. And my final statement. Under
- 4 your watch, this Board should not surrender its decade's
- 5 long commitment to serve the public and continuous
- 6 oversight of police authorized towing. The real reason
- 7 that we think that they'd like to disempower you so that
- 8 they can bring in a national tower. The evidence of such
- 9 is when these companies have showed up and they've been
- 10 rolling around the City of Detroit meeting with folks and
- 11 then calling our towers to see if we can be co-opted into
- 12 service with them. Now I'd like to turn it over to Dan
- 13 McLean for the rest of our presentation. Thank you, Mr.
- 14 Chairman.
- 15 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you.
- MR. McCLEAN: Thank you, Bert. Thank you, Honorable
- 17 Board for this time. We do appreciate your indulgence
- 18 here. Listen, I know, I know the DTA is tired. They trust
- 19 this Board and they've been fighting a long time. The
- 20 ordinance, and now this RFP and a contract. So that's
- 21 what we're talking about today. And as to what we're
- 22 asking, I assume the Law Department, I can only assume
- 23 that they're telling you no, no, you can do nothing about
- 24 this. RFP. You can do nothing about this contract. You
- 25 can't extend or re-issue permits for six months and that



- 1 you shouldn't, you definitely shouldn't hire someone else
- 2 to come in and look at it and see what impact these
- 3 documents will have. Those statements are wrong. I need
- 4 everyone to stop and hear what I'm about to tell you. You
- 5 are the authority over police towing.
- 6 MR. McCLEAN: The charter gives you that authority.
- 7 The city ordinance supports your role over police towing
- 8 and decades of practice have followed through on that
- 9 authority. And if that is not enough, there is a federal
- 10 court opinion that came out from the Honorable Linda
- 11 Parker. It's interpreted those documents and granted this
- 12 Body a broad grant of power over towing in this city that
- 13 same court struck down the Law Department's argument.
- 14 Your lawyer's argument, that claim that there's a line in
- 15 the charter that trumps your authority. No it doesn't.
- 16 They lost. They also struck down, the court struck down
- 17 your lawyers claim that there is a state law or an
- 18 ordinance that trumps your authority. No, the judge said
- 19 absolutely not. You have a very broad grant of power over
- 20 police towing. What this ordinance will do, which is in
- 21 the back burner. What's before us today is also the RFP
- 22 and the contract.
- MR. McCLEAN: They are going to eliminate or diminish
- 24 your oversight and involvement in police towing. It's
- 25 pretty simple. And if this doesn't raise a red flag, I



- 1 don't know what will. There's no surprise over what is
- 2 happening in that ordinance and otherwise, but where did
- 3 this come from? From the federal court? In that opinion,
- 4 it says, well, listen if you wanted the BOPC out of this
- 5 discussion, if you want them out of that process, go to
- 6 the City Council and pass an ordinance. And that's in the
- 7 background that proposed ordinance that's sitting there,
- 8 that's this RFP and contract that's carrying that
- 9 forward. Now I know everyone here has read the RFP, the
- 10 contract even that proposed ordinance. And I'm sure
- 11 you've seen the same glaring problems. We can't spend
- 12 four hours going through it line by line. But what I do
- 13 need to quickly address, because we only have a limited
- 14 amount of time is the elephant in the room.
- MR. McCLEAN: The people running these tow companies,
- ones with the DTA and the other tow companies, the City,
- 17 they are great people. Now, it's the tow companies that
- 18 are fighting hard for this Body, they're fighting for the
- 19 department and they're fighting to protect the public.
- 20 And I know, I know what everyone's thinking. Just what
- 21 Bert mentioned earlier that a few years ago, yeah,
- 22 someone paid some money and got a favor. And it's been
- 23 reflected negatively on these members of the DTA ever
- 24 since. It's not even a member, but what did these tow
- 25 companies do since then? They went to Lansing, went the



- 1 Lansing and got a law passed that specifically identified
- 2 tow companies and said, no, you cannot do that. What
- 3 about this federal case that I mentioned earlier, the Law
- 4 Department, your legal counsel, they were the ones
- 5 arguing that this Board doesn't have the authority we're
- 6 standing here saying you have.
- 7 MR. McCLEAN: That is absolutely not how that one
- 8 ended. That one ended up in your favor. And it was a tow
- 9 company arquing for you and on your behalf, excuse me,
- 10 not on your behalf, but arguing that issue to your favor.
- 11 And recently there was another case that came out about
- 12 two months ago from the federal court, Bright Financial.
- 13 That court found that well that Detroit towing is
- 14 violating the due process rights of vehicle owners. And
- 15 they listed all these things that needed to happen. One
- of the things that happened was, hey, 36 District Court.
- 17 We need you to make sure to get forms out to people who
- 18 come in, they need to have that in your hand. And what
- 19 happened, it was the towers that reached out to Bert and
- 20 myself and said, listen, make sure the courts are aware
- 21 of this opinion, so they know they need to have that
- 22 form.
- MR. McCLEAN: It was us who were there fighting to
- 24 protect the department from further issues there and also
- 25 to protect the public, to make sure they needed to have



- 1 what they need. Listen, here's thing. I know the DTA
- 2 knows we're all on the same side, we're on the same team,
- 3 but I'm sorry the Law Department has been wrong on police
- 4 towing a lot. This Body should not step away from its
- 5 obligations and the privilege of oversight and police
- 6 towing and continued involvement in police towing. I'm
- 7 going to ask you one last thing, because I know we must
- 8 be short on time. Once you all, I don't want this to go
- 9 the wrong way, but I want you all to remember my name.
- 10 Dan McClean. I want you to remember Bert Johnson. I want
- 11 you to remember the DTA and the people who are here
- 12 fighting. I want you to remember we're here fighting and
- 13 asking you for something today.
- MR. McCLEAN: Now, fast forward five years as to
- 15 police towing, how will this body be viewed at that time?
- 16 Well, people say this Board used to be something, or are
- 17 they going to say to borrow from Teddy Roosevelt that
- 18 you, this Board is the "man in the rain", that despite
- 19 everything else you are here in the fight. I trust today
- 20 that you're going to choose to fight. So here's what we
- 21 have. We have our "ask". What we're not asking is for you
- 22 to say Law Department, you're wrong. We're not asking you
- 23 to pick a side. We're asking you to look. We're asking
- 24 you to get independent counsel and to take a look at this
- 25 and see what impact this is going to have on towing and



- on this Board's authority and wherever they come down,
- 2 they come down. They should call us, talk to us. They
- 3 should call the Law Department, speak with them and come
- 4 to a resolution on it. Here's what we have. We're asking
- 5 you to extend these permits or reissue the permits for
- 6 the exact same towers for 6 months, buy you some time to
- 7 hire your own counsel to come in and look at this and
- 8 make a decision on the impact of these documents. And
- 9 finally rescind that 2017 resolution. I'm here for
- 10 questions, but thank you very much.
- 11 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you.
- 12 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: To the Chair.
- 13 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, ma'am.
- 14 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: I'd like to ask Mr. Johnson, what
- are the demographic stats regarding his membership? He
- 16 highlighted the word implicit bias, and if we received
- 17 that information in the past, I'm sorry that I'm asking
- 18 for it at this time, the percentage, I'm sorry, the
- 19 percentage of women, men, and ethnicities.
- 20 MR. JOHNSON: Through you, Mr. Chairman to Vice-Chair
- 21 Holt. No problem for the question. I do not have it
- 22 broken down in percentages. I can tell you that the
- 23 membership is made up of women-owned of black-owned of
- 24 black operated and other minority owned groups. I can get
- 25 you those percentages. And I can probably have them for



- 1 you in the next 24 hours.
- 2 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Through the Chair. Thank you so
- 3 much. I look forward to that.
- 4 MR. JOHNSON: You're welcome.
- 5 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you Vice-Chair Holt.
- 6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Mr. Chairman.
- 7 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Bernard.
- 8 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I just like to make a point. I
- 9 believe that the Corporations Counsel's Office is on this
- 10 line, but as an attorney, I'm telling you, and they know
- 11 as well that they have a clear conflict of interest with
- 12 respect to this matter. They went to court stating that
- 13 the permits that the Board issue they're contrary to
- 14 state law, they went to court stating that the permits
- 15 that this Board issue was contrary to the city charter.
- 16 And they went to court saying that the permits that the
- 17 City of Detroit were in fact a contract. You can't have
- 18 it both. You can't be on both sides of the issue. It's
- one of the reasons that we've needed a Board attorney.
- 20 Corporation Counsel cannot and does not represent the
- 21 Board of Police Commissioners with respect to this issue.
- 22 And if any of them speak to it, it's a clear ethical
- 23 violation under the code of professional responsibility.
- 24 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: And they all know that. They
- 25 don't represent the Board of Police Commissioners for



- 1 purposes of this issue, nor did they. And when Butch
- 2 Hollowell appeared before you in 2017, and I actually
- 3 have the minutes of that particular Board meeting, in
- 4 which there was no discussion whatsoever about there
- 5 was simply a resolution proposed by Mr. Hollowell that in
- 6 fact, the Board transfer its towing responsibility to the
- 7 Office of Procurement. That one statement, I have his
- 8 exact language and his motion was carried by Bishop Van
- 9 at that point. And in that particular time there was no
- 10 discussion, he made the motion as corporation counsel
- 11 representing the City of Detroit and representing the
- 12 Procurement Office. He had no time represented the Board
- of Police Commissioners. And furthermore, I'm saying,
- 14 your honor, I apologize, Mr. Chairman; all the issues
- 15 regarding equal legalities concerning towing could come
- 16 from the police department. The tow operator that's
- 17 before us today, it was the police officer, Captain
- 18 Tonti, who was giving all of the tows, to one or two
- 19 particular towers. We didn't do anything wrong. And the
- 20 same in 2017, the issue came up because the Chief of
- 21 Police's legal counsel, lawyer who sat next to him at his
- 22 end of the hall down there in the department was indicted
- 23 federal. No one on the police commission, no staff member
- of the police commission did one single thing.
- 25 Furthermore, the one tower that was indicted wasn't



- 1 indicted because of anything he did with the City of
- 2 Detroit, he was indicted because of something he did in
- 3 McComb County. We just got all pushed into this and now
- 4 as I've said earlier, Corporation Counsel, in my view,
- 5 ethically, and professionally cannot speak on this issue.
- 6 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Bernard. Would you
- 7 entertain this is Ms. White has laid out a narrative of
- 8 all the what we've been involved with. And I'm looking
- 9 at what you cited US District Court, judge Linda Parker
- 10 projected rejected corporation counsel legal opinion or
- 11 permission in order that the tow permits were not
- 12 contrary to charter, city code or state law and the
- 13 permits were valid. Would you entertain a motion to
- 14 extend these permit for 120 days for us to really see if
- 15 we can we flush this out in that timeframe? Hopefully, we
- 16 have worked with the City of Detroit, we have worked with
- 17 the DPD and I'm pretty sure that Council President Brenda
- 18 Jones has worked with us and trying to address these
- 19 concerns. Would you entertain a motion to that effect?
- 20 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Mr. Chair.
- 21 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Burch, just pause for
- 22 one second, please.
- COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Mr. Chairman. I just think
- 24 this just begs the question. I will support whatever my
- 25 colleagues on the Board want to do but this is a serious



- 1 issue. We are right under the charter. The federal court
- 2 has said that we are right. We are totally authorized.
- 3 The only thing that's standing between us and our power
- 4 right now is the fact that someone who was at that
- 5 meeting, including yourself, I'm reading your comments
- 6 right here and you had no objection, would simply move to
- 7 resend the resolution that we previously passed, that
- 8 said we wanted the Office of Procurement to assist us
- 9 with this. This really cuts into our responsibility.
- MR. RAIMI: Am I going to get a chance to respond at
- 11 some point? This is Charles Raimi. I'm Deputy Corporation
- 12 Counsel.
- 13 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Sir, you do not have the floor at
- 14 this time.
- DEPUTY CORPORATION COUNSEL RAIMI: Very well. Thank
- 16 you.
- 17 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Bernard, do you hear
- 18 me?
- 19 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Yes. I hear you, but I can't
- 20 agree.
- 21 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Would you make up that motion?
- 22 COMMISSIONER BURCH I had a question first.
- COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I make the motion, Mr.
- 24 Chairman, that we extend existing permits and postpone
- 25 any RFP for at least 90 days. In order for the Board



- 1 review that issue.
- 2 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Excuse me. To the Chair. I believe
- 3 you said 120 days.
- 4 CHAIRPERSON BELL: The legal system works in 120
- 5 days.
- 6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: 120 days, 4 months.
- 7 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Second, I second.
- 8 CHAIRPERSON BELL: It's been properly moved and
- 9 second. Discussion.
- 10 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Discussion please.
- 11 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, ma'am.
- 12 COMMISSIONER BURCH: I may not be as informed as
- 13 Commissioner Bernard, but in listening to Mr. Johnson
- 14 about the history and the exterior and interior of the
- 15 police city lots, I did not appreciate the look at all.
- 16 I'm about beautifying. And I think this Board, if we have
- any kind of power, we need to keep this because I don't
- 18 see as a Commissioner, how much power exactly do we have?
- 19 So if this going to take it away, if I trust Commissioner
- 20 Bernard that we should table this or give them more time.
- 21 But I don't agree with taking the contract from this
- 22 company. That was my opinion.
- COMMISSIONER BERNARD: That's a separate issue: We're
- 24 not voting on that. I agree with you about that company,
- 25 but this is a separate issue.



- 1 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay. Any other Commissioner, any
- 2 other commissioner wants to way in a roll call vote,
- 3 Vice-Chair Holt.
- 4 DEPUTY CORPORATION COUNSEL RAIMI. Can I address this
- 5 before it's voted on. The other side got about 25
- 6 minutes.
- 7 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Sir, sir, you do not have the
- 8 floor.
- 9 DEPUTY CORPORATION COUNSEL RAIMI: I don't understand
- 10 the procedure, Chair. The other side, Mr. Johnson and Mr.
- 11 McClean got about 25 minutes. I'm Corporation Counsel. I
- 12 would like to address this.
- 13 CHAIRPERSON BELL: You will have that opportunity.
- 14 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Through the Chair, through the
- 15 Chair.
- 16 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes ma'am.
- 17 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Chair Bell, can we allow the
- 18 Corporation Counsel to speak.
- 19 CHAIRPERSON BELL: We will allow, but we are going to
- 20 take a vote at this time. We will allow them to speak.
- 21 They'll make their position quite clear. And it's quite
- 22 clear in the past, nothing has changed of that position.
- 23 So we want to try this Board to act.
- DEPUTY CORPORATE COUNSEL RAIMI: So, you're going to
- 25 act before hearing from me?



- 1 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Mr. Chairman, are we under
- 2 discussion, though?
- 3 DEPUTY CORPORATE COUNSEL RAIMI: Isn't there a
- 4 discussion before the vote. You're not going to let me
- 5 talk?
- 6 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Let us pause and hear from the
- 7 Corporation Council on this discussion.
- 8 DEPUTY CORPORATE COUNSEL RAIMI: Thank you Chair. I
- 9 appreciate that. You've been hearing from high priced
- 10 lobbyists who are representing a special interest, not
- 11 the interest of the City of Detroit and not the interest
- of the citizens of the City of Detroit. They're
- interested in one thing, making as much money as
- 14 possible. And that's great. I believe in capitalism,
- 15 that's wonderful, but they don't have the interest of the
- 16 city or its citizens at heart. These permits, yes, my
- opinion was, and is that the permits issued in 2016 were
- 18 invalid. Judge Parker has a different opinion. The court
- of appeals may well, if it gets to that point, reverse
- 20 Judge Parker. But at this moment, the Corporation Counsel
- 21 is this Board's lawyer.
- 22 DEPUTY CORPORATE COUNSEL RAIMI: That is not a
- 23 conflict of interest in way, shape or form. I represent
- 24 the City of Detroit. I represent the City Council. I
- 25 represent the Mayor. You know, I was born in the city. I



- 1 grew up here. I went to public schools. I love this city.
- 2 And that's the only reason I have this job right now.
- 3 Every Corporation Council represents every Board and
- 4 Agency in this city. That's our job. And when we give
- 5 advice, it's binding. Even if a federal judge has a
- 6 different opinion and maybe, and we expect of this case
- 7 ever goes on appeal, it will get reversed, but that's
- 8 neither here nor there today. The real issue is what
- 9 you're being asked to do today is to basically tear up
- 10 the city charter, which makes Corporation, Counsel, your
- 11 lawyer. And you're being asked to do something that
- 12 perpetuates the horrible, horrible problems that these
- 13 so-called permits are allowed and make no mistake about
- 14 it.
- 15 DEPUTY CORPORATE COUNSEL RAIMI: You know, this is
- 16 not ancient history. After the 2016, what did this Board
- do? I heard somebody say, well, this Board did nothing
- 18 wrong in 2016. The fact that this Board did nothing in
- 19 2016. There was no process. There was no process
- 20 whatsoever. This Board has no ability or resources to
- 21 engage in RFP processes. You didn't engage in any RFP
- 22 process in 2016, or did Celia Washington. Nobody cared.
- 23 Gasper Fiore got all his spots back, all his many spots
- 24 back on the tow rotation. Nationwide got a permit. And
- 25 we're talking about the Nationwide case when the Linda



- 1 Parker decision. You know, I've spent the last, about
- 2 five years of my life in hand-to-hand combat with these
- 3 terrible towing companies that have hurt terribly hurt
- 4 the citizens of the City of Detroit. Nationwide was
- 5 charging outrageous fees, illegal fees to the citizens of
- 6 the City of Detroit.
- 7 DEPUTY CORPORATE COUNSEL RAIMI: And they were
- 8 protected and able to do it because of the permit that
- 9 Judge Linda Parker upheld. So your neighbors, they would
- 10 have their car stolen. That's not bad enough if
- 11 Nationwide towed it, instead of paying about \$200, which
- is the city's approved amount, your neighbors and friends
- 13 would go to Nationwide's lot. They'd have to pay about
- 14 \$800 to get their car out of hack. That's who you're
- 15 being asked to protect today, not the citizens of
- 16 Detroit. You're being to protect these bad towers. And I
- 17 recognize them. Many of them work hard. Many of them -
- 18 Mr. Johnson, I let you talk for a very long time. I'd
- 19 appreciate the courtesy be extended to me as well. Excuse
- 20 me. So obviously there are many fine towing companies,
- 21 but that's not the point. The point is that these permits
- 22 make it very difficult if you have a bad apple to deal
- 23 with it.
- 24 DEPUTY CORPORATE COUNSEL RAIMI: Now, the towers for
- 25 the Detroit permit are on contracts. There hasn't been



- one whiff of problem or a scandal or anything, that's it.
- 2 The contracts are just best practices. It's exactly what
- 3 this city needs after being in a bankruptcy and being in
- 4 these terrible fights with these awful towing companies.
- 5 So I ask you to consider who is your constituency here;
- 6 is it the towing companies represented by high priced
- 7 lobbyists; or is it the citizens of the City of Detroit?
- 8 That's my interest. That's the only interest I have. That
- 9 the only reason I'm in this job when I'm almost 70 years
- 10 old, because I care about the city and the citizens, and
- 11 while certainly towers are being treated very fairly by
- 12 the Captain Parish and by the Chief of Police, but they
- 13 need to be subject to proper legal controls.
- 14 DEPUTY CORPORATE COUNSEL RAIMI: And the concerns
- 15 here, if they're to be redressed at all, should be
- 16 redressed by City Council. City Council is going to have
- 17 to approve these contracts. That's the proper Body for
- 18 this towing group to take their issues to, not this Body.
- 19 This Body's job is to write rules and regulations for
- 20 towing. You've done that. The rules require equitable
- 21 towers. You've done that. If there's an issue this Body
- 22 can look at it, but that has nothing to do with the move
- 23 from permits to contracts, which is best practice, which
- 24 is everywhere in the country, which is every other vendor
- 25 in the City of Detroit is under contracts. And if the



- 1 towers have a concern, they can take that to City
- 2 Council. But what they're asking you to do is really
- 3 destructive of the protection of the public and the
- 4 charter. Thank you.
- 5 CHAIRPERSON BELL: What I'm saying to you, work with
- 6 us, give us that time to work with the Council, to work
- 7 with you. They have a fair process in reference to our
- 8 role with the city charter. That was the rationale
- 9 reasoning, why we got involved with the towing issue at
- 10 the time. So now this issue is flushed up about the city
- 11 charter interpretation. So we have worked with the city,
- 12 we have worked with Council. Why can't you give us that
- 13 time to flush this out on a fair process, they are facing
- 14 a deadline and all I'm asking to give us that opportunity
- 15 to work with you. And you might be correct a hundred
- 16 percent, but at least we want to have a clear plan to
- 17 reaching that decision. And right now we haven't had
- 18 that. It's been under a gun for the last 3 months. And
- 19 I'm just asking for a reasonable timeframe to work this
- 20 out. Is that unreasonable?
- 21 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Call the question, Mr.
- 22 Chairman?
- 23 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, call for the question. Vice-
- 24 Chair Holt.
- 25 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Yes.



- 1 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 2.
- 2 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Yes.
- 3 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 3.
- 4 COMMISSIONER BROWN: How about District 1.
- 5 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I'm sorry, district 1.
- 6 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Okay, yes.
- 7 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay, sorry, sir. District 3.
- 8 District 4. Yes. District 5.
- 9 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Commissioner Burton, District
- 10 5.
- 11 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Yes.
- 12 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 6.
- 13 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Yes.
- 14 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 7.
- 15 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Yes.
- 16 CHAIRPERSON BELL: At-Large, Commissioner Hernandez.
- 17 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Yes.
- 18 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Jones.
- 19 COMMISSIONER JONES: Yes.
- 20 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Holley.
- 21 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Yes.
- 22 CHAIRPERSON BELL: So this Board has spoken loud and
- 23 clear that we are requesting that type of cooperation.
- 24 We'll reach out to the concerned party to see if we can
- 25 reach some type of closure. They might or might not honor



- 1 our request in terms of the 120 days, but we know that
- 2 the process is a lengthy process, sometimes. We want to
- 3 help a fair discussion, ball and party. And yes, we
- 4 represent the City of Detroit. Most of us are elected
- 5 officials and others are appointed by the Mayor, all
- 6 residents of Detroit. We are concerned, so we do not take
- 7 this lightly. So that's why we trying to pursue it in
- 8 this manner. And I would ask the Corporation Counsel's
- 9 cooperation. Thank you, Commissioners. We're going to ask
- 10 Captain Parish to come forward at this time. If he feels
- 11 it's still appropriate.
- 12 CAPTAIN PARISH: Through the Chair, I'd be lying if I
- 13 said, I wasn't disappointed with what I've just seen.
- 14 I'll leave it at that. And only try to clear up a few
- 15 things that Mr. Johnson had stated, which were
- 16 inaccurate. I find it very ironic that Mr. Johnson is
- 17 talking about how he's attempting to protect the Boards
- 18 authority over towing. What's disappointing is that he's
- 19 forgetting the reason why DPD had to enter towing when it
- 20 did. No member from the DTA came to the Board and advise
- 21 the Board that there was litigation pending in Lansing
- 22 that would prohibit police agencies and municipalities
- 23 from engaging in towing operations. Not one single DTA
- 24 member came to the Board to let it know that at the state
- level, there was efforts by the tow lobby to divest, not



- 1 just this Board, but every comparable Body in the State
- 2 of Michigan from making a policy decision on whether it
- 3 was appropriate for that municipality or that police
- 4 agency to tow and store vehicles.
- 5 CAPTAIN PARISH: The DPD caught the legislation just
- 6 in time. And it was forced to stand up operations with
- 7 just a couple of months' notice. If the DTA is curious as
- 8 to why, of course they're not. They know this, it was all
- 9 a part of a plan. If the DTA is curious as to why our
- 10 lots are not where we'd like them to be, although I will
- 11 say that the Grand River lot is undergoing major
- 12 construction and it will look better than any other tow
- 13 lot, I'm confident when it's all said and done, but the
- 14 reason why the lots had to take the form that they did
- 15 was because we had weeks to get grandfathered, to get
- 16 established, so that the same group that is coming to
- 17 this Board and lecturing the Board about how it's so
- 18 concerned about your power over towing. It was so that we
- 19 would not be subject to that law that would have divested
- 20 this Board, City Council, the Mayor, and every Mayor,
- 21 City Council and comparable Board throughout the State of
- 22 Michigan from making that policy decision. Only when we
- 23 were established and only when the system show that it
- 24 was working, did the DTA want to engage in conversations?
- 25 CAPTAIN PARISH: And we engaged the DTA in



- 1 conversations. They didn't want to talk to us before the
- 2 law. They want to talk to us after the law once we beat
- 3 it. The DTA and the DPD engaged in months of
- 4 conversation, months of conversation. And we worked out a
- 5 very equitable understanding. It's true. The city was not
- 6 going to enter into a binding agreement because that law
- 7 could take that binding agreement and make it precedent.
- 8 However, we have adhere to the agreement. Okay. And when
- 9 I say the agreement, not so much in agreement with the
- 10 DTA, but a series of commitments to City Council, Mr.
- 11 Johnson talked about reports that he's getting from the
- 12 DPD. I'm very familiar with those reports. I send them to
- 13 him and I asked them when I send the reports, let me know
- if there are any issues. It's an invitation, we've never
- 15 used the system in that matter.
- 16 CAPTAIN PARISH: It's an invitation to talk about it.
- 17 When he raised the fact that there were discrepancies in
- 18 the reports, I talked to communications, it turned out
- 19 that the individual sitting at the keyboard was keying
- 20 the information wrong, and then we corrected it, we
- 21 updated it. And I continued to send Mr. Johnson reports.
- 22 And I invite the conversation. Mr. Johnson had a tour of
- our DPD dispatch facility because he asked and we were
- 24 much willing to oblige. The DTA and the DPD reached those
- 25 understandings and Chief Craig made those series of



- 1 commitments to City Council. One of those commitments -
- 2 and I say this only because it's disingenuous for the DTA
- 3 to say they were duped. One of the commitments was this,
- 4 the DPD through the chief procurement officer of the city
- 5 shall submit a request for proposal for five-year
- 6 contracts. The request for proposal shall be for a number
- 7 of towing, contractors and existence as of the date of
- 8 the submission of the request for proposal. The request
- 9 for proposal shall give due weight to the years of
- 10 experience, the police authorized towers and any requests
- 11 for proposal shall comport with any legal requirements
- 12 and is subject to the review and approval of the Office
- 13 of Contracts and Procurement. And we went in that
- 14 direction because this Body resolved to transfer the
- 15 process of selecting towers to the Office of Contracts
- 16 and Procurement. We were not trying to divest the Board.
- 17 We were trying to act in accordance with the prior
- 18 directive of the Board, and I want to read an email and
- 19 Mr. Johnson doesn't put many things in writing these
- 20 days. At least not with DPD, but I want to read an email
- 21 that Mr. Johnson stated that, excuse me, that Mr. Johnson
- 22 sent. We are in favor of Chief Craig's commitments. The
- 23 Chief's statements in his letter to the Detroit City
- 24 Council did accurately portray the conversations and
- 25 understandings we had leading up to the letter. No one I



- 1 saw for any member of the DTA regard, any of what's been
- 2 negotiated agreed upon or resolved as a sham. Nothing
- 3 could be further from the truth. We have engaged in
- 4 conversations with the DTA from the very beginning.
- 5 CAPTAIN PARISH: What's disappointing is that and
- 6 what we didn't know. And to be honest, I must be naive to
- 7 the political game that goes on. And maybe I don't want
- 8 any part of it forever after this, but I'll be honest
- 9 with you. What I didn't know, but what I've since learned
- 10 is that since that agreement, the DTA has been lobbying
- 11 many people behind the back of the department while we
- 12 attempt to maintain a cooperative relationship with our
- 13 towers. They've lobbied against key provisions of that
- 14 agreement. Those commitments that Chief Craig made to
- 15 Council they've lobbied against. I can't think of
- 16 anything more disingenuous.
- 17 CAPTAIN PARISH: And there was more, the DTA
- 18 submitted, had an opportunity to provide input on little
- 19 things that they wanted in the RFP. This was a part of
- 20 our discussion to get the DTA support for the Grand River
- 21 lot build out. And they did propose some things. One was
- 22 that we would maintain a separate rotation for forfeiture
- 23 and evidence vehicles. We incorporated that; the DTA
- 24 requested it. The DTA didn't want to handle
- 25 administrative fees. We created a kiosk system, and we



- 1 now accept those fees that are locked. And we also said
- 2 that we would define equitable distribution of towing as
- 3 runs, as opposed to vehicles. These were things that the
- 4 DTA communicated to us, and these were the things that we
- 5 agreed to. We explained to them why we could not enter
- 6 into a towing rotation. We explained that to them when
- 7 the agreement was first entered into and the DTA
- 8 extensively understood it, they may not have liked it,
- 9 but they understood where we were coming from. And as Mr.
- 10 Johnson indicated in that email, they were all for all of
- 11 Chief Craig's commitments to City Council. Where we fell
- off the tracks. I have no idea, but it's very
- 13 disappointing.
- 14 CAPTAIN PARISH: There are inaccuracies in the DPD
- 15 tow reports, Mr. Johnson has failed to report them to me
- 16 since the very first conversation to which I thought was
- 17 corrected. It's clear, he does not want to resolve
- 18 issues. He wants to keep them going to enhance his
- 19 lobbying efforts. So far, the contracts was not to get
- 20 paid. The sole purpose of the contracts was to adhere to
- 21 the best practices and to adhere to this Board's 2017
- 22 resolution. DPD did not talk loosely of corruption in
- 23 towing. The DPD has brought cases to the Board, including
- 24 MARS, including V&F, including Reds Towing. And we have
- let the Board make those determinations as prescribed by



- 1 the rules. And this Board is certainly not a rubber stamp
- 2 for me. It has certainly put me to my proofs and I've
- 3 respected that. And we continue to move on with that
- 4 process, which is why I brought MARS to the Board last
- 5 week and filed an extensive referral.
- 6 CAPTAIN PARISH: So the Board had all the
- 7 information. And one more thing that I feel obligated to
- 8 talk about because it specifically addressed one of those
- 9 towing companies that Mr. Johnson was describing in his
- 10 PowerPoint presentation. One of the companies mentioned
- in that had illegally expanded their operation in
- 12 violation of their land grant use. That may be a subject
- 13 of a referral that must come to this Board. That matter
- 14 is still under investigation. And it wasn't corrected
- 15 until the City of Detroit threatened legal action against
- 16 that tower. So for all this talk about how the tow
- 17 company is beautiful and how the tow companies are the
- 18 most professional and make the best use of their land.
- 19 They've made illegal uses of their land. I won't call out
- 20 the name of that tow company, like Mr. Johnson called me
- 21 out a moment ago because I respect the process and I will
- 22 not make a tow company's issues public until the proper
- 23 referral has been submitted, and the Board has had an
- 24 opportunity to hear at least some preliminary
- 25 information. But I'm very disappointed in the approach



- 1 that Mr. Johnson took. I'm very disappointed in what he's
- 2 saying. It's inaccurate, and I'm sorry to say, Mr.
- 3 Chairman, I'm disappointed in what the Board has just
- 4 done. I'd be lying if I didn't, and I hope the Board can
- 5 understand that I do feel the need to be honest in my
- 6 disagreement with the Board today. There's plenty more to
- 7 say, unfortunately, there's limited time, I'll save other
- 8 comments and other things that I was going to mention for
- 9 a later time. Thank you.
- 10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, Captain Parish. We
- 11 respect your honesty, and we respect you in terms of
- 12 bringing this matter to a head in terms of those
- 13 concerns, but we thought we would still be dealing with
- 14 approved permits and procurement would have handled the
- 15 contracts more or less. But seeing as though that has
- 16 changed, now, we might be on the wrong path, but at least
- 17 we asking for clarity and direction in terms of this
- 18 whole matter, with all concerned parties. I don't think
- 19 that is unreasonable. It's very seldom you get the Board
- 20 to agree and we a hundred percent agree on this matter.
- 21 So I have to respect the concern of the Board, not just
- 22 this afternoon, but leading up to this timeframe of
- 23 dealing with this issue. So there's one way we can feel
- 24 as though it might not take the 120 it might be
- 25 resolved tomorrow, I don't know. I doubt it, but at least



- 1 we're trying to make a decision in terms of how we want
- 2 to approach it.
- 3 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Mr. Chair, I do think we need
- 4 independent legal counsel on this because It is true that
- 5 the Corporation Counsel can represent any department, but
- 6 when the corporations counsel's advice and counsel is
- 7 directed, for example, against the City Council, the City
- 8 Council, of course can get independent legal counsel to
- 9 assist them with respect, to determining that issue. I
- 10 mean, it's very clear and I appreciate what you just said
- 11 Captain but as you, as you know, the agreement that you
- 12 worked out with City Council did not include the Board of
- 13 Police Commissioners at all. In fact, Chief Craig's memo,
- 14 doesn't even courtesy copy.
- 15 CAPTAIN PARISH: Through the Chair, may I respond to
- 16 that?
- 17 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: It's not necessary, we're all
- 18 way over.
- 19 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I don't think we want to continue
- 20 go back and forth. We want to move on. Okay. We want to
- 21 move on to our next item of business. I understand
- 22 clearly, but we have to understand that the charter give
- 23 the Corporation Counsel the final authority as far as the
- 24 legal issues. So I'm not going to debate it. Let's review
- it and see where we are with whole business, okay. Thank



- 1 you. Thank you, Captain Parish. And thank the Corporation
- 2 Counsel. We're going to move on to Ms. White report,
- 3 please.
- 4 MRS. WHITE: Chair, Honorable Board, all of the
- 5 correspondence is on the agenda for your reference and
- 6 information. And just please note that you received
- 7 several policy directives and they have been transmitted
- 8 to you over the past couple of months. With respect to
- 9 promotional process, the drug and alcohol abuse by
- 10 department personnel, policy bias based policing and
- 11 citizen complaint investigation. So at this time, please
- 12 continue to review those policy directives and send any
- 13 recommendations that you might have. Staff has already
- 14 conducted an extensive and thorough review of all of
- 15 those policies and directives. And we have determined
- 16 that they are in line with best practices and
- 17 constitutional protections. And the revision is greatly
- 18 enhanced the department policies. So please continue to
- 19 review those and next week, hopefully you will be
- 20 prepared to vote on those particular directives. And
- 21 again, they are promotional process bias based policing,
- 22 citizen complaint, investigations, and drug and alcohol
- 23 policy for department personnel. That concludes the
- 24 incoming correspondence for this week. Thank you.
- 25 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, Ms. White. Unfinished



- 1 business. We have Michigan Auto Recovery Service. We have
- 2 a report from last week from Captain Parish. It's quite
- 3 thorough and the Board somewhat, we need to make this
- 4 decision in reference to a recommendation. What was that
- 5 recommendation Ms. White?
- 6 MRS. WHITE: The recommendation was to suspend MARS
- 7 Tow Company for the remaining permit days, which would be
- 8 about 33 days at this time, given the expiration of the
- 9 tow permits.
- 10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, Commissioners, I think
- is a very simple recommendation, but what is your
- 12 pleasure?
- 13 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Through the Chair.
- 14 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, ma'am.
- 15 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: I move that we suspend MARS' towing
- 16 privileges for the 32 days that was noted by Ms. White.
- 17 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Are you willing to consider a
- 18 friendly amendment, Vice-Chair Holt?
- 19 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: And that amendment might be?
- 20 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Well, we've already extended
- 21 the period for the RFPs and for this issue. I'm find,
- 22 whenever you say. I second the motion.
- 23 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Thank you.
- 24 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Any other hands up or if not,
- 25 we're ready for the vote?



- 1 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Commissioner Brown's hand is up.
- 2 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Brown.
- 3 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Just from discussion from last
- 4 week. Wasn't there like a recommendation that MARS was
- 5 offering for some type of remediation or what community
- 6 service or something they were doing. I don't remember
- 7 what exactly what the language was. Do we have that
- 8 information before us?
- 9 CHAIRPERSON BELL: We don't have authority to all the
- 10 community service in the county. We have to vote this up
- 11 or down.
- 12 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I'll change the period. We can
- 13 change the period.
- 14 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay.
- 15 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: For longer.
- 16 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Are we ready for the vote? Vice-
- 17 Chair Holt.
- 18 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Yes.
- 19 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 1.
- 20 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Abstain.
- 21 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 2.
- 22 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Mr. Chair. If I may interject,
- 23 I'm sorry to interrupt the vote. Was there acceptance on
- 24 the motion?
- 25 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I'm sorry.



- 1 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Yes, there was.
- 2 COMMISSIONER CARTER: I don't recall a second.
- 3 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Linda Bernard second it.
- 4 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Okay. I know there was a
- 5 friendly amendment. I missed it. I'm sorry.
- 6 CHAIRPERSON BELL: She withdrew the friendly
- 7 amendment and went for the second.
- 8 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 2.
- 9 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I'll abstain, even though I
- 10 second it.
- 11 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 3. District 3.
- 12 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Burch, what you doing, come
- 13 on?
- 14 MRS. WHITE: Commissioner Burch?
- 15 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: She's muted.
- 16 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: She had to leave earlier. She
- 17 said she only had a limited amount of time.
- 18 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Look at that?
- 19 COMMISSIONER BURCH: I asked what's the motion.
- 20 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Ms. White to suspend 33 days or
- 21 32 days. The recommendation from the Captain. Did I hear
- 22 voice?
- COMMISSIONER BURCH: I was asking to repeat the
- 24 motion.
- 25 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Did it twice, sweetie.



- 1 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Well, I don't hear it.
- 2 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Ms. White would repeat the motion?
- 3 MRS. WHITE: Through the Chair. The motion is to
- 4 suspend MARS Tow Recovery Services tow permit for the
- 5 next 32 days.
- 6 COMMISSIONER BURCH: No.
- 7 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 4.Yes. District 5.
- 8 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Abstain.
- 9 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 6.
- 10 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Yes.
- 11 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Hernandez.
- 12 COMMISSIIONER HERNANDEZ: Yes.
- 13 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Jones.
- 14 COMMISSIONER JONES: Yes.
- 15 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Holley.
- 16 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Yes.
- 17 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Ms. White.
- 18 MRS. WHITE: Yes. Through the Chair.
- 19 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Can we go to Commissioner
- 20 Davis?
- 21 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I'm sorry. Did I call District 7?
- 22 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: No, you didn't.
- 23 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I'm sorry. I apologize. District
- 24 7.
- 25 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: No.



- 1 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Ms. White.
- 2 MRS. WHITE: Yes. Through the Chair, there were 6=Yes
- 3 votes and 2=No votes and 3 Abstentions, which count as no
- 4 votes.
- 5 CHAIRPERSON BELL: So, what's the status of the
- 6 votes?
- 7 MRS. WHITE: The motion passed.
- 8 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Any other unfinished
- 9 business? New business.
- 10 COMMISSIONER BURTON: New business.
- 11 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: New business.
- 12 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Mr. Chairman, I had my hand up
- 13 for new business.
- 14 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Davis and then
- 15 Burton.
- 16 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: My new businesses is, I
- 17 understand that the Board leadership and two out of class
- 18 managers are going to be taking some training that will
- 19 cost \$10,000. Should we be notified about that? I'm
- 20 hearing this from the city county building, instead of
- 21 from the leadership. \$10,000, we should have to vote on
- 22 that.
- 23 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Ms. White.
- 24 MRS. WHITE: Through the Chair. I can review the
- 25 records and supply that information to the Honorable



- 1 Board. I am not sure of the exact amount at this time. I
- 2 don't have that information in front of me, but I can
- 3 supply that to the Board.
- 4 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay. Thank you. I was not aware
- of the details. Okay. Commissioner Burton.
- 6 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I have
- 7 two motions to be making under new business, but first
- 8 Commissioners are getting almost like 400 pages
- 9 approximately, late Tuesday evening. We have to make
- 10 decisions at a Board meeting on Thursday. This is only
- 11 gives us a day and a half to listening audience to review
- 12 all of these pages. I mean, this is a lot of stuff here.
- 13 I mean, we are happy to work, but if you know, we could
- 14 start getting our packages a lot sooner so we can have a
- 15 full week. So I've moved that we get our information on
- 16 Friday. So Commissioners can have more time to prepare.
- 17 That's my first.
- 18 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Support.
- 19 COMMISSIONER BELL: It's been properly moved and
- 20 supported. Discussion.
- 21 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Can it be done?
- 22 CHAIRPERSON BELL: No. We have a very limited staff.
- 23 We have an Interim Chief, I mean, Board Secretary, and
- 24 when you look at coming out of the meeting Thursday and
- 25 tried to prepare for the next meeting sector and is



- 1 ongoing and there's a two days left. They supposed to be
- off on the weekend. So we don't the volume that he
- 3 speak of, the 21 pillar that is just information. You
- 4 don't have to read that, that just information at your
- 5 leisure and take you 6 months, a year. That's strictly
- 6 there, but we try to highlight the issue that we have,
- 7 but that would not be a fair to this staff to try to do
- 8 it in that timeframe. That's a tremendous effort to get
- 9 it out on Tuesday, as you well know and get it to you
- 10 timely. And I think in the past, others have said, well,
- 11 you give us too much information. We can try to condense
- 12 it and highlight. I will allow Ms. White to speak for the
- 13 staff.
- 14 MRS. WHITE: Yes. Through the Chair, Honorable Board,
- 15 you have received the lengthy and extensive packet this
- 16 week. And that is a repeat of what has already been
- 17 shared previously. We shared the policy directives and
- 18 all of the staff material that we prepared and research
- 19 and compiled. And we want the Honorable Board to have the
- 20 same information that we have to make a decision on any
- 21 given policy so that everyone is aware and fully educated
- 22 on the actual policy directive. So that is what that
- 23 information consisted of. And it was repeated in previous
- 24 packets in the past. And we just wanted to bring it back
- 25 for your refreshing. Thank you.



- 1 COMMISSIONER BURTON: And my final motion for this
- 2 evening,
- 3 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Sir, you can only speak to one
- 4 motion at a time.
- 5 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Well, I can let my colleagues
- 6 know --.
- 7 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Excuse me. We can only speak to
- 8 one motion of time, sir. Are we ready for a vote on this
- 9 matter?
- 10 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Discussion.
- 11 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I just said call for discussion.
- 12 We're going to have a discussion. Yes, sir. Any other
- 13 discussion?
- 14 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Any other discussion as it
- 15 relates to previous information that they may be sending
- 16 us, then that information could go out on Fridays. So,
- 17 the package could be less. On Wednesday afternoon, we get
- 18 our physical pack.
- 19 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Sir, as I stated some people say
- 20 we are sending out too much information. We have that for
- 21 the last several months. So maybe we just not to send you
- 22 one piece of paper or two pieces of paper, then you'd be
- 23 satisfied with highlights. Then you wouldn't be bogged
- 24 down. Okay, we ready for the vote
- 25 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: I'm not bogged down.



- 1 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay. Are we ready for the vote?
- 2 Vice-Chair Holt.
- 3 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Okay. I'm sorry, Chair Bell. What's
- 4 the motion? I'm sorry?
- 5 CHAIRPERSON BELL: To have the package send on a
- 6 Friday.
- 7 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Oh no.
- 8 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 1.
- 9 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Yes.
- 10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 2.
- 11 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: No.
- 12 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 3.
- 13 COMMISSIONER BURCH: No. She can't do that.
- 14 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. District 4. No.
- 15 District 5.
- 16 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Yes.
- 17 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 6.
- 18 COMMISSIONER CARTER: No.
- 19 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 7.
- 20 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Yes.
- 21 CHAIRPERSON BELL: At-Large, Commissioner Hernandez.
- 22 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: No.
- 23 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Jones.
- 24 COMMISSIONER JONES: No.
- 25 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Holley.



- 1 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: No.
- 2 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Commissioner Burton.
- 3 COMMISSIONER BURTON: All right. So Mr. Chairman, I
- 4 like to call my last motion today. I like to raise to re-
- 5 send the 2017 resolution that empowered the OCP and
- 6 eliminating the authority of the BOPC.
- 7 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Through the Chair.
- 8 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, ma'am.
- 9 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Ms. White, do we not have that
- 10 information; Ms. White?
- 11 MRS. WHITE: Yes. Through the Chair. I believe
- 12 Commissioner Burton is making a motion to rescind the
- 13 motion that was made in 2017. So that's.
- 14 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Oh, thank you. Thank you for that
- 15 clarification.
- 16 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I'll second the motion.
- 17 COMMISSIONER JONES: Through the Chair.
- 18 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Jones.
- 19 COMMISSIONER JONES: I'd like to make a motion to
- 20 table that discussion. It seems to me, we spent probably
- 21 the last half an hour going back and forth over that
- 22 exact same item. And until we get a get a solution there,
- 23 I don't see how we can turn around and entertain a motion
- 24 to rescind the 2017 decision that was made by BOPC. I
- 25 proposed that we just motion and table that discussion



- 1 until we come to some conclusion on the rest of that
- 2 package.
- 3 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Support to table. It's too
- 4 premature.
- 5 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Second.
- 6 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I agree with you Commissioner.
- 7 Okay. It's been properly moved to table the motion that
- 8 we prepared to vote.
- 9 COMMISSIONER JONES: Yes.
- 10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: At large.
- 11 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Which one?
- 12 COMMISSIONER BURTON: No discussion?
- 13 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Come on, let's get with it.
- 14 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: All right, I'll assume you're
- 15 calling, me. Yes.
- 16 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: We're on this substitute
- 17 motion. That's what we own.
- 18 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 1.
- 19 COMMISSIONER BROWN: No.
- 20 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 2.
- 21 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Abstain.
- 22 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I'm sorry, abstain, okay. District
- 23 3.
- 24 COMMISSIONER Triple no.
- 25 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 4. Yes. District 5.



- 1 COMMISSIONER BURTON: No.
- 2 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 6.
- 3 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Yes.
- 4 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 7.
- 5 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: No.
- 6 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Hernandez.
- 7 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Yes.
- 8 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Jones.
- 9 COMMISSIONER JONES: Yes.
- 10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Holley.
- 11 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Yes.
- 12 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. We move on.
- 13 Announcement.
- 14 COMMISSIONER BURTON: What's the vote count on that,
- 15 Mr. Chairman?
- 16 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Mr. Brown I'm sorry. Ms. White,
- 17 what is the outcome of the vote?
- 18 MRS. WHITE: Yes. Mr. Chair, there were 6=Yes votes,
- 19 4=No votes and 1=Abstention. The motion passed.
- 20 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you.
- 21 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Through the Chair. A micro comment.
- 22 I'm wondering if we could, however ask Ms. White when she
- 23 says out information, even if it's a duplication,
- 24 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Holt, I'm going to
- 25 cut you off on that dialogue, we're going to move on.



- 1 Thank you. Let's move on to we disposed of that matter.
- 2 So we're not going to have any more dialogue on that. Mr.
- 3 Brown.
- 4 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: It was a different version, though.
- 5 MR. ROB BROWN: Yes. Good afternoon, Mr. Chair and
- 6 this Honorable Board. Your next BOPC virtual meetings are
- 7 May 6th, 2021 at 3:00 PM, May 13th, 2021 at 3:00 PM with
- 8 the 8th Precinct being the presenter. Then, Mr. Chair, if
- 9 it's okay. I'll go straight to a public comments.
- 10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, sir.
- MR. ROB BROWN: You currently have 10 callers. Your
- 12 first 3 callers would be CAC Chair, Scotty Bowman, Ms.
- 13 Bernie Smith and Mr. Dana [02:22:46 inaudible]. Mr.
- 14 Bowman.
- 15 MR. BOWMAN: First of all, the BOPC and DPD don't
- 16 need reform. They need to be transformed. If the people's
- 17 charter revision is enacted, we will see transformation.
- 18 I appreciate the well assembled OCI presentation, but
- 19 many times when he was referring to visual aids, the
- 20 images were not displayed on zoom. Can this presentation
- 21 be posted on the BOPC page? The Interim Chief
- 22 Investigator said that disciplinary action may include
- 23 termination. Where is the motion to fire criminal
- 24 corporal Dwayne Jones over his assault of Shelby Smith? I
- 25 promise to make that motion in January. If he is still a



- 1 DPD employee. It is a blatant conflict of interest for
- 2 the DPD to compete with private towers when the BOPC is
- 3 in charge of towing oversight. Where is the motion to end
- 4 DPD towing and restore Detroit based private towing? I
- 5 will make that motion in January if this conflict of
- 6 interest persists. It's wrong for Chairman Bell to pick
- 7 and choose what questions Commissioners can ask based on
- 8 his personal bias, remove him. Today, I heard that CCW
- 9 arrest and undocumented gun confiscation [02:24:14
- inaudible]. I'm concerned that officers may be engaged in
- 11 violations of Detroiters civil rights under color of law,
- 12 the federal and state constitution secure the right to
- 13 have and carry firearms. Finally, why does it take so
- long for the DPD to provide requested body-worn cameras
- 15 video to Commissioners? I've seen Chief Craig show such
- 16 video on the same day. If it supports a narrative he
- 17 wishes to promote. I yield.
- 18 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Mr. Brown one second. All Office
- 19 of the Chief Investigator's presentation is always posted
- on the Board's website. It's always on the Board's
- 21 website. Mr. Brown continue.
- MR. ROB BROWN: Yes, sir. Mr. Chair, I don't see Mr.
- 23 Dana [02:24:53 inaudible]. So we going to go to Ms.
- 24 Bernie Smith.
- MS. SMITH: Good afternoon Commissioners. First of



- 1 all, I would like to welcome Bettison back from your
- 2 vacation. You've taken a long time, but that's all right.
- 3 We love you anyway. One of the things I would like to
- 4 know is it true that 1, 5 and 7 are going to be vacant
- 5 for the election? That's something for us people to think
- 6 about? Also, I would like to know from Bettison, is it
- 7 our duty, I mean, the police's duty to grab their gun on
- 8 the right side first and a taser the second time? This is
- 9 what's going on in the cities that we've been looking at
- 10 over the TV. Also, I want you to know you better listen
- 11 to your own attorney. He's not going to lie. That's his
- 12 job is to give you the good information. So listen to
- 13 your attorney, that's his job and don't forget it. Again,
- 14 I believe 5 and 7 and 1 are vacant. Anybody interested,
- 15 you know what that means? Go down to the election and
- 16 sign your name because we've got to clean up the Board up
- 17 because it's getting too outrageous and too insulting.
- 18 It's not a Board that should be advertised. In other
- 19 words, to let the people know what they're doing. I just
- 20 want it to stop. It needs to stop. Bell, you're doing a
- 21 hell of a job. I don't know how in the world you can deal
- 22 with it, but keep up the good work, anyway. Take care
- 23 everybody, wear your mask and then get your shots.
- MR. ROB BROWN: Mr. Chair, I don't see Mr. [02:26:40]
- inaudible], I don't see Watford, and so we're going to go



- 1 to Minister Eric Blunt, followed by Rosalynn Alexander,
- 2 followed by caller with the phone number 402. Mr. Blunt.
- 3 MINISTER BLUNT: Can you hear me Board?
- 4 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Yes, we can.
- 5 MINISTER BLUNT: Good. Yes. I'm Minister Eric Blunt
- 6 from Sacred Heart Church. To AC Bettison, regarding 6
- 7 search warrants. What are some of the critical pieces of
- 8 information that are relied on when requesting a search
- 9 warrant and what is the approval process; and what if
- 10 some of the information is found to be unreliable or
- 11 especially false; what are the consequences for project
- 12 Greenlight? AC Bennison said with so many initiatives,
- 13 it's difficult to measure success. So how does DPD decide
- 14 which initiatives are working well. With project
- 15 Greenlight, this is its second go around after the first
- 16 cancellation. It must've been based on something. And it
- 17 was one of the few times we, as citizens were given a
- 18 small ray of hope that DPD was trying to do things right.
- 19 Director Graveline, 33 protest investigations? This
- 20 information must be made public just like the Giglio
- 21 Bradley listing. And since Chief Craig can produce his
- 22 one-sided videos of the protests, his stories of railroad
- 23 spikes, or may not be true. Recall with George Floyd, the
- 24 police report first said he died of medical
- 25 complications. And then Chicago, the teenager, Adam



- 1 Toledo was stated to have a gun that was found around
- 2 him. The gun never had his fingerprints on them. On the
- 3 OCI presentation, all of these presentations must be
- 4 available to the public two days before a presentation is
- 5 given. I am sick and tired of this meeting and his group
- 6 looking at data that citizens have no idea what's going
- 7 on. The OCI policy regarding body-worn camera violations,
- 8 the officers must be held accountable and thought to be
- 9 inaccurate if they do not have their cameras on. I yield
- 10 my time.
- MR. ROB BROWN: Mr. Chair, I don't see Ms. Alexander.
- 12 We'll go to the caller with the last three numbers 402.
- 13 CALLER 402: Can you hear me?
- 14 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Yes.
- 15 CALLER 402: Welcome Board. I wish to be able to see
- 16 your faces sometime soon, but I'm thankful to be able to
- 17 hear your voices and to see the good work that's still
- 18 yet being done. And I can say that from personal
- 19 experience and also something happened just lately. I
- 20 mentioned, I think last week about my property, I was
- 21 able to receive back and I got it on Sunday afternoon and
- 22 the looked and everything was in order and they worked so
- 23 hard. Officers Waterly, Briggs, they worked so hard and
- 24 that everything that was supposed to be there. And also I
- 25 like to give commendation to Corporal Shand is in the



- 1 citizens academy. Excellent work officer number 8 in the
- 2 mid-day today, and praise worthy, Officer Waterly, Briggs
- 3 and Officer Shamley and number 7. Ms. Toby, and number 7
- 4 and Ms. Pastor number 5 and Officer Hill and Mr. Akbar
- 5 and his excellent work down through the years. And
- 6 Commissioner Bell, I noticed you're always open for
- 7 whatever comments that are made to listen, to work with
- 8 not to jeopardize anything, not to override anything or
- 9 what they say in the world, bogart your way. You're
- 10 willing to listen and to take heed of whatever's said and
- 11 work with it as it's deemed necessary. Thank you
- 12 Commissioner Bell, for being the way you are.
- 13 Commissioner Carter, thank you for your example down
- 14 through the years with the hope and the wind is cold in
- 15 here, whenever there's sensitive matters, shut the
- 16 windows, too cold. Now everything is fine. That's still
- 17 the response by demonstration that each one I noticed,
- 18 especially Commissioner Bell, Commissioner Carter to
- 19 give.
- MR. ROB BROWN: Mr. Chair your next 3 speakers would
- 21 be caller with the last three numbers 915, Ms. Brenda
- 22 Hill followed by Miss Michelle George. Caller 915.
- 23 CALLER 915: Hello, my name is Yolanda McCann, and I
- 24 bring you greetings from the Detroit police citizen
- 25 academy, alumni association, and also the 11th Precinct



- 1 community consul. We work closely, I work closely with
- 2 our NPOs and we had set up a program, I mean, set up a
- 3 program where we asked our NPOs, if we could set up a
- 4 program to give gun locks, because we were tired of our
- 5 young people getting killed and they went to work for us.
- 6 We asked them on this Honorable Board that stepped in the
- 7 way and caused us to have the cancel this program. Okay.
- 8 And then she say it that she wasn't notified of this,
- 9 stepped in the way of everything that we had done. How
- 10 can somebody be supposedly community oriented and would
- 11 not want the community, not just the police department,
- 12 because she said they were not involved, but for the
- 13 community to go to them and say, Hey, look, we're tired
- 14 of our young people getting killed. Can we put up or have
- 15 a program where we can give out gun locks to help deter
- 16 some of this killing of our young people? Okay. And then
- 17 the event was supposed to take place April 9th from 3 to
- 18 5 at the Bellaire shopping center. Okay. And because her
- 19 name was not on the flyer or we did not go through her to
- 20 get permission, is this Board authorized to tell the NPOs
- 21 what we can and cannot have, or the community as a whole
- 22 what we can and cannot have. And I think this.
- MR. ROB BROWN: Mr. Chair, your next speaker will be
- 24 Ms. Brenda Hill. Ms. Hill?
- MS HILL: Good afternoon or evening, is going on. I



- 1 would like to say bye right now to those of the Board
- 2 that are, do nothings and a detriment to this Board.
- 3 Again, Detroit is one of the few cities that has this
- 4 Board of Police Commissioners. And it's top heavy with
- 5 appointees, not with elected officials. And I believe
- 6 someone is running in every District of Bernice, your
- 7 facts are wrong again. Also the US attorney general is
- 8 going to oversee every police department it can. And I
- 9 recommend that we put our hand up and I work with the
- 10 police as often as I can, but we have some issues that
- 11 need to be rectified before the US justice department
- 12 comes in. Also, this Board has failed, has failed, has
- 13 failed in almost every regard because it is top heavy
- 14 with appointees. And today, the Chair who is heavy handed
- 15 with his disdain for certain Board members, but seems
- 16 gripped with the need for the power that gives him to
- 17 dismiss the order of things. These things have to change.
- 18 I think that the NPO program needs to be revamped. We
- 19 have residents that have no idea we have an NPO, the NPOs
- 20 don't introduce themselves. There are all kinds of stuff
- 21 that could be rectified that would help our neighborhoods
- 22 with this 30%
- MR. ROB BROWN: Mr. Chair, your next speaker would be
- 24 Ms. Michelle George, Ms. George.
- MS. GEORGE: Oh, yes, sir. Hi, Mr. Brown. To the



- 1 Chair and the Honorable Board and to AC Bettison, I
- 2 wanted to say it was good to listen to all the Board
- 3 members vote because normally you have some Board
- 4 members, which are the appointees voting opposite way.
- 5 Sometime it gets to citizens and opposite, but my concern
- 6 is that make sure you don't allow anyone to tell you how
- 7 to run the Board. If it's about the charter, you used to
- 8 have an independent attorney. And I'm wondering now, is
- 9 that why there's no funding allegedly for the attorney?
- 10 So we want you to just stand on your own, you know, to
- 11 operate by the charter. I also I would like to say that
- in some communities, we do not see police. I know the
- 13 police are doing the best that they can you know, putting
- 14 their lives on the line, but the whole police department
- 15 needs to be revamped.
- MS GEORGE: I don't know anything about policing, but
- 17 it takes that Mayor to make these press conferences. This
- 18 news break, every hour that I get on my phone, 30
- 19 minutes, this one been killed, this one been shot, this
- 20 one been carjacked. No, Commissioner Holley, you continue
- 21 to speak up. There is something wrong. I know the Bible
- 22 does talk about at the days end that there will be
- 23 lawlessness and people's heart will wax cold that's in
- 24 the Bible, but the Lord allows that policing, you know,
- 25 that as citizens, we need elected officials to do better



- 1 for our citizens. Now, the caller that mentioned the gun
- 2 locks. I hope that's not true. And I'm asking if it is
- 3 true, can those gun locks be issue when we see the young
- 4 children being killed? So I'm hoping maybe that could be
- 5 rectified. I don't know if that was true or not. I heard
- 6 the citizens say that. So hopefully we can look forward
- 7 to that. And also police officers, I will be sending a
- 8 proposal for the police officers to be getting more money
- 9 to the federal government. Thank you very much.
- 10 MR. ROB BROWN: Mr. Chair. That was your last
- 11 speaker.
- 12 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Mr. Brown, that's the end of
- 13 public comments. The Chair would entertain a motion to
- 14 entertain a closed discussion.
- 15 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY; I have an announcement.
- 16 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Go ahead, sir.
- 17 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Mr. Chairman, just two
- 18 announcements shortly. One is that we have an open clinic
- 19 and so if anybody needs a vaccine for the COVID, just
- 20 call me and I'll make it work for you. So we are right
- 21 across the street from the church. We have our clinic,
- 22 then I'm also Mr. Chairman. I think you'd be really happy
- 23 about this; that is Mr. Brown daughter, Logan Brown got a
- 24 full scholarship to medical school at University of
- 25 Michigan.



1 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Outstanding. Yay. Yay, Yay. 2 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: That's our Brown. That's our 3 Mr. Brown. 4 MR. ROB BROWN: Thank you, sir. CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you.
