23 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Good afternoon Board. Thank you,
24 Ms. White.

25 COMMISSIONERS: Good afternoon, good afternoon.

1 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you for your attendance and
2 due diligence in terms of a timely manner. I'm going to
3 call the meeting to order at this time. We're going to
4 have innovation by Chaplain Hopkins.

5 CHAPLAIN HOPKINS: Father, we thank you for this
6 moment. We pray that you will give us the grace to lead
7 in perilous times. I pray that you bless every
8 commissioner. I pray right now, God that you bless this
9 meeting. Bless our city. God, we pray for your grace to
10 be upon every officer and everyone that's connected to
11 this meeting in the name that we pray our father, Amen.

12 COMMISSIONERS: Amen.

13 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, Chaplain. The next
14 order of business would be the introduction of the
15 Commissioners starting with the Vice-Chair.

16 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Thank you, Chair Bell. And good
17 afternoon to the Honorable Board Police Commissioners, as
18 well as the hardest working staff, the BOPC staff. Good
19 afternoon to the citizens of the City of Detroit. And of
20 course our men and women and blue. Good afternoon. My
21 name is Annie Mae Holt, Vice-Chair, and Commissioner At
22 Large.

23 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Thank you District 1.

24 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Good afternoon, everyone. Police
25 Commissioner Darryl Brown District 1.

1 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. District 2.

2 COMMISSIONER BERNARD Good afternoon on this hot
3 muggy day, everyone. I'm attorney Linda Bernard. I
4 represent District 2, soon to be home of Amazon.

5 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: With the union?

6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I put my -
7 down, right throughout the country. Detroit will be. - they voted that

8 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 3.

9 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Good afternoon everyone. I am
10 Shirley Burch. The Commissioner for the famous 3rd
11 District where we practice love where you live. Thank
12 you.

13 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 4, your Chair, Willie
14 Bell. District 5. District 6.

15 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Good afternoon, everyone. Lisa
16 Carter, District 6.

17 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Don't be shocked. I'm
18 going to say District 7 now.

19 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Oh, hello everyone. This is
20 Police Commissioner William M. Davis, District 7.
21 Officers Love where you work.

22 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. At-Large, Commissioner
23 Hernandez.

24 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Good afternoon, everyone.
25 This is Hernandez, At-Large for all 7 Districts in this

1 great City.

2 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, Commissioner Jones.

3 COMMISSIONER JONES: Good afternoon everyone. First
4 I'd like to give homage to my fellow Police Commissioners
5 to Chief White and his executive team. To First Assistant
6 Chief Bettison and our community partners are listening
7 right now. Thank you for joining us on this day.

8 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Last but not least
9 Reverend, sorry, Correction. Commissioner Holley.

10 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Amen.

11 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Thank you very much. Good
12 afternoon. Thank you so much. Present and accounted for.

13 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Thank you. It sounded
14 like a military.

15 MRS. WHITE: Mr. Chair, you have a quorum.

16 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Thank you. We move on
17 to the Agenda. Just make a note that we have a couple of
18 items in reference to the closed session that we
19 reconvened, but we didn't take an action. So I'm going to
20 have you address that during the agenda. So it would be
21 brief and to the point. It's something that we discussed.
22 Move forward approval of the agenda.

23 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: So moved.

24 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: support.

25 COMMISSIONER JONES: Support.

1 CHAIRPERSON BELL: It's been properly moved and
2 supported. Discussion. Those in favor. Aye.

3 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

4 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Opposed. Motion carries. The next
5 item would be approval of Minutes for June 3rd, 2021.

6 COMMISSIONER BROWN: So moved.

7 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Additional corrections.

8 COMMISSIONER JONES: support.

9 CHAIRPERSON BELL: They've been properly moved and
10 supported. Discussion. Those in favor, aye.

11 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

12 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Those oppose. The motion carries.
13 Ms. White the Board staff in OCI.

14 MRS. WHITE: Yes, through the Chair, the Department
15 of Innovation and Technology is monitoring and recording
16 the Board's meeting today. Our court reporter is Mr. Don
17 Handyside and the following Board staff members are in
18 attendance, Mr. Robert Brow, Administrative specialist,
19 Ms. Teresa Blossom, Community Relations Coordinator,
20 Jonya Underwood, Administrative Assistant Investigator,
21 Tiffany Stewart, Director, Katrina Patillo, Director of
22 Police Personnel, Assistant Corporation, Counsel, Erica
23 Savage Whitley, Interim Chief Investigator Lawrence

3 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Ms. White. Do we have
4 any, I'm sorry, let's go to the Deputy Chief Fitzgerald
5 representing Chief Craig.

6 DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: Chief White now, but thank
7 you, Chairman Bell.

8 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Wait a minute, wait a minute.

9 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Let's try that again. Representing
10 James E. White.

11 DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: Thank you so much,
12 Chairman. We currently have a barricaded gun situation
13 over on the west side. Chief White is out there himself.
14 So I'll be sitting in for him and he might jump on, he
15 may not.

16 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I understand that. The mission at
17 hand comes first? Can we do introductions? Any other DPD
18 personnel that you can see Deputy Chief, if not Ms. White
19 can assistant.

20 DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: Yes, I'm going to ask
21 Secretary White to do that please because I can't see
22 anyone actually.

23 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you.

24 MRS. WHITE: Yes. Through the Chair, in reviewing the
25 attendees list, I see the following Captain, Derek May,

1 Captain Lena Liddell, Captain Michael Chambers, Captain
2 Vernail Newson Commander Kyra Joy Hope, Director,
3 Christopher Graveline, Sergeant Gwendolyn Stokes,
4 Lieutenant Sharon McClure, Lieutenant Mark Young,
5 President of the LSA Association, NPO D. Maples, Officer
6 Vazquez, Police Officer Daniel Glass, Lieutenant Pestello
7 B Williams, Reserve Assistant Chief Stephen Lewis,
8 Sergeant Edward Jackson, Sergeant Gerald Hewitt, Captain
9 Tanya Leonard Gilbert. And that concludes the DPD
10 executives present today. And Mr. Chair, if I might
11 include the remaining staff members that I intended to
12 mention earlier from the Office of the Chief
13 Investigator, Investigator Giana Carter, Investigator
14 Daniel Calloway, Investigator Markita Stanton,
15 Investigator Mark, excuse me, Roslyn Banks, Investigator
16 Carolyn Nichols. And that is all that I see at this time.
17 Thank you.

18 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, Ms. White. We have any
19 elected officials or representatives of elected
20 officials?

21 MRS. WHITE: Yes. Through the Chair, former Police
22 Commissioner, Ricardo Moore is present Ms. Marie Overall
23 of State Representative Tyrone Carter's Office and
24 Community Advisory Council. Scotty Bowman are also
25 present. Thank you.

1 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Ms. White, can you send
2 me my remarks again? I seemed to have lost - my iPad is
3 not picking up the internet. Meanwhile, we're going to
4 move on to the close session issue. Commissioner Bernard,
5 are you prepared to address that issue or those issues?

6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Yes, Mr. Chairman. It became
7 apparent after we started the closed session that the job
8 specifications as written were incomplete and not
9 appropriate for the task at hand. We received many
10 resumes from people who really wanted to be an executive
11 assistant, a secretary, an administrative assistant,
12 things like that. It didn't address the core issues and
13 functions of the Board of Police Commissioners. Our Board
14 quote "Secretary" is really the Board Executive Director
15 and she, or he manages staff, they have to make decisions
16 about personnel. They make recommendations, they do
17 evaluations, they do everything that any other Executive
18 Director or CEO would do. So our resume pool was
19 reflecting the former and not the latter, not really the
20 job responsibilities appropriate to the position of Board
21 Secretary. So Mr. Chairman, I'd like to say that
22 basically, a review of the employment applications
23 regarding Secretary to the Board, we will hold our
24 current applications in advance and update the job
25 descriptions to gain a larger pool of applicants who can

1 actually do the job.

2 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: We think that currently the
3 job description is misleading in the sense that it
4 suggests the position as a clerical position and it is
5 not. And it does not include the executive level
6 responsibilities of the position. Based on this, we would
7 like to evaluate the job specifications and update them
8 appropriately. Mr. Chairperson, when you indicated that
9 you would entertain a motion at this time, concerning
10 this matter, my motion is as follows: I move that we
11 repost the Secretary to the Board position for 30 days.
12 And for staff to work with the Human Resources Department
13 to update the job description for Secretary to the Board
14 to include: 1). minimally the Secretary to the Board
15 position is the top level executive position, a non-
16 clinical position. 2) Candidates must provide a writing
17 sample. 3) Incorporate the requirement of at least five
18 years of management experience. 4) The Secretary to the
19 Board leaves the day-to-day operations of the Detroit
20 Board of Police Commissioners to enhance its overall
21 effectiveness in the delivery of oversight services and
22 initiatives. 5) They will supervise all the BOPC
23 employees in the performance of their duties in
24 accordance with the City Charter and the Board's Bylaws.
25 And then any other key administrative items as

1 recommended by Human Resources or by members of this
2 Board.

3 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Second.

4 COMMISSIONER JONES: Support.

5 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Support.

6 CHAIRPERSON BELL: It's been properly moved and
7 supported. Discussion those in favor, aye.

8 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

9 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Those opposed. The motion carries.
10 Thank you, Commissioner Bernard.

11 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you.

12 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Now we move on to the Chairman's
13 remarks. I will be brief and to the point. First of all,
14 I just wanted to knowledge the fair that the UAW Hall, I
15 mean, not UAW Hall, their facilities for retired First
16 Assistant Chief Lashinda Stair, a 25-year career. I come
17 on was a fantastic affair, really fantastic. I want to
18 thank the Commissioners that attended and wish the best
19 for our former First Assistant Chief. Also, we attended
20 the police in Detroit Fire Women's in Blue event, a
21 rooster tail, a historic rooster tail. It was a fantastic
22 affair. There was recognition of the two honorees who
23 were designated as the two from the Fire Department and
24 also from the Police Department. The keynote speaker was
25 Honorable Denise Page Hood, Chief US District Judge, and

1 Eastern District of Michigan. Outstanding remarks from
2 the District Chief Judge. I want to thank the
3 Commissioner that attended. It had been already mentioned
4 that Vice-Chair Holt and Commissioner Bernard, maybe not
5 mentioned, but they were in attendance to represent us.
6 Today we hold our Board's annual election. Every Board
7 member receives information about this process.
8 Information is also aligned to Bylaws, Article 4.
9 Officers. So we received that information. I'm going to
10 move on to - you just heard that Chief White is in a
11 barricaded gunman situation. He would be reporting out
12 hopefully if not, we would hear from Deputy Chief Charles
13 Fitzgerald and also the Chief press conference way held
14 this morning regarding the strategy for summer crowd
15 control. I assumed that a Deputy Chief will want to talk
16 about that. It has been outlined in terms of the press
17 coverage.

18 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I think you can always go back to
19 Facebook in reference to seeing it live. We are not doing
20 it live now, but see what actually took place, if you
21 have an opportunity. Today we have a resolution to
22 support Michigan Legislative action for recouping police
23 training costs. You recall that the Board previous
24 supported Senator Silvia Santana's bill to show recouping
25 train and call it most recently, State Representative I

1 wrong car to introduce house would be a 4747 with key
2 address regarding reimbursement amount on the period of
3 appointment after training, this issue impacts a city and
4 a department, and we are looking forward to making an
5 impact in this area. Hopefully, I just want to say, if
6 you look at the separation, you'll see that 12 officers
7 separated in that time period and 8 of them left for
8 another department. So once again, we have trained and
9 certified these officers for another department.

10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: They left in some instance one
11 year, two years, but I think all of them was less than
12 five years. Bills like that we definitely support. And
13 you can contact your State, Senator, and State
14 Representative in reference to the issue. We will hear
15 from the 2nd Precinct. We will hear from our HR Director
16 and also from the Police Reserve. They will get 10
17 minutes apiece. We will ensure we adhere to the timeline
18 to continue the meeting agenda. So I hope that I have the
19 Commissioners support in reference to what transpired at
20 the last meeting. We don't want to repeat that in the
21 future or whatever in terms of the timeframe and listen
22 if it is something pertinent, one minute it might be over
23 two minutes, but we're going to try to stick to that time
24 frame. So they've been informed that is the script. So I
25 need your cooperation in terms of Q and A afterward. We

1 continue to have public comments and we hopefully have a
2 meeting decorum and please Commissioners wait until we
3 recognize you. Vice-Chair is going to help me reference
4 to recognizing you, as you know I can't see all these
5 artificial hand or your hand, but we're trying our best
6 to get you in order. Commissioner Davis, yes, we see your
7 hand, we're going to try to definitely get everybody in
8 order. We are trying our best. I just want to highlight
9 that because sometimes we overlook you. I admit that. So
10 we move on to the election at this time. The Office for
11 Chair and Vice-Chair.

12 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Mr. Chair.

13 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, sir.

14 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Commissioner Burton texted me
15 saying, he's trying to get into the meeting.

16 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Well, he should text or call Mrs.
17 White.

18 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Mr. Chairman?

19 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, ma'am.

20 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I would like to move for the
21 position of Chairperson of the Board of Police
22 Commissioners, Reverend Jim Holley.

23 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Second.

24 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Well, it is somewhat premature. I
25 have to open the election process.

1 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I thought you meant [16:44
2 inaudible].

3 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay. I think this Body is ready
4 for the election of Chair first of all, then thereafter
5 we will do the Vice-Chair. Are there any nominations for
6 Chair?

7 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I nominate Reverend Holley.

8 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Second.

9 CHAIRPERSON BELL: And you really don't need a second
10 for nomination.

11 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Okay.

12 CHAIRPERSON BELL: It always stands. Any other
13 nominations; any other nominations; any other
14 nominations? I have indicated that three times, so the
15 nominations close and therefore, are we ready for the
16 vote; Vice-Chair?

17 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Yes.

18 COMMISSIONER CARTER: For the vote, there are no
19 other nominees.

20 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Well, I still want to take a vote
21 and make sure that's clear. District 1.

22 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Yes.

23 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 2.

24 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Yes.

25 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 3.

1 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Yes.

2 ASSISTANT CORPORATION COUNSEL WHITLEY: Mr. Chair, I
3 hate to interrupt. My apologies. This is attorney
4 Whitley. Can we have Reverend Holley accept for the
5 record prior to the vote?

6 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Holley, can you
7 accept [17:59 inaudible]?

8 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Yes, I do. I do.

9 COMMISSIONER BURCH: That's a good, good point.

10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you.

11 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: A major point.

12 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I assumed, but on the record he
13 accepted. District - where are we? District 4, yes.
14 District 5. District 6.

15 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Yes.

16 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 7.

17 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Yes.

18 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Hernandez.

19 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Yes.

20 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Jones.

21 COMMISSIONER JONES: Yes.

22 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Holley. Yes.

23 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. It's now official,
24 Chair-Elect will take Office on July 1st. The Chair will
25 take nomination for the Vice-Chair position at this time.

1 Are there any nominations?

2 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Mr. Chairman, I nominate
3 Commissioner Brown for Vice-Chair. He's previously [18:52
4 inaudible].

5 COMMISSIONER BURCH: I second that. Oh, we don't need
6 a second.

7 COMMISSIONER JONES: Through the Chair, I nominate
8 Commissioner Martin Jones for the position of Vice-
9 Chairman of Board of Police Commissioners.

10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Are there any other
11 nominations; Are there any other nominations; Are there
12 any other nominations?

13 COMMISSIONER JONES: Through the Chair, motion to
14 close nominations.

15 CHAIRPERSON BELL: We are closed. I announced it
16 three times. I think we in order starting off with
17 Commissioner Brown. He was nominated first of all. Well,
18 you vote who you want to vote for. We don't have to. You
19 state who you're voting for. The floor is now open for
20 voting, starting with District 1. I'm sorry.

21 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Point of information, sir.

22 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Excuse me. I'm sorry.

23 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Point of information. Both of
24 them need to officially accept.

25 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes. Have they officially accept?

1 COMMISSIONER BROWN: I do accept the nomination.

2 COMMISSIONER JONES: Commissioner Martin Jones. I do
3 accept the nomination.

4 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Vice-Chair Holt.

5 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: I cast my vote for Commissioner
6 Martin Jones.

7 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, District 1.

8 COMMISSIONER BROWN: I cast my vote for Commissioner
9 Brown.

10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 2.

11 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: My vote is for Commissioner
12 Brown.

13 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 3.

14 COMMISSIONER BURCH: I submit my vote for
15 Commissioner Darryl Brown.

16 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 4. Jones. District 5.
17 District 6.

18 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Jones.

19 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 7.

20 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Brown, definitely.

21 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Hernandez.

22 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Jones.

23 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Jones.

24 COMMISSIONER JONES: My vote is for Commissioner
25 Jones.

1 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Holley.

2 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Jones.

3 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Could we get the
4 official count this time, Ms. White?

5 MRS. WHITE: Yes. Through the Chair. There were 6
6 votes for Commissioner Jones for the office of Vice-
7 Chair. And there were 4 votes for Commissioner Brown for
8 the Office of Vice-Chair.

9 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. We congratulate
10 Commissioner Jones as Vice-Chair. We move on to the
11 Resolution to support the Mission Legislative Action for
12 recouping police training cost. I think Commission Holt.

13 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Oh, thank you. Chair Bell.
14 Resolution to support Michigan Legislative action for
15 recouping police training costs. WHEREAS as the
16 supervisory oversight body for the Detroit Police
17 Department, the Board of Police Commissioners has vested
18 charter mandated authority to ensure effective law-
19 enforcement certified and fair policing for all. And
20 WHEREAS the Michigan Commission on Law Enforcement
21 Standards, commonly known as NACOLES serves as the
22 licensing agency for all municipal law enforcement
23 officers in the state NACOLES mandates and requirements
24 are the foundation for anyone seeking to become police
25 officers. Its criteria for licensing serve as the basis

1 for recruiting training and employing new law enforcement
2 professionals. State estimates range from \$6,000 to
3 \$10,000 for the cost of basic police training. And
4 WHEREAS the Detroit Police Department has long held the
5 standards. Excuse me, the status of a state certified
6 policing agency authorized to provide training
7 certification and licensure based on MCOLES and DPD
8 requirements. The Department pays cadets during training
9 as part of this commitment to recruiting and retaining
10 the best candidates.

11 The Detroit Police Academy is recognized as one of
12 the top-tier law enforcement training programs in the
13 state and nation. And WHEREAS the City and Department
14 have experienced continued challenges with academy
15 candidates seeking other agency employment immediately or
16 a short time after graduation. Over the years, we have
17 observed a pattern where Detroit free training may be
18 used unfairly. Detroit records show that about 19% of
19 academy graduates continue to leave the Detroit Police
20 Department within five years. Such high turnover results
21 in the loss of investment of millions of public taxpayer
22 dollars, including the loss of personnel time and
23 resources; and WHEREAS in recent years, Michigan
24 legislators have introduced bills to help end this
25 pattern of allowing cities like Detroit to recruit

1 training fees and costs. During the 2019-2020 legislative
2 session, the Board supported Senator Sylvia Santana's
3 bill to allow cities to have some training costs repaid
4 by Police Academy graduates who live within three years.
5 On April 29th, 2021 Representative Tyrone Carter
6 introduced House Bill 4747 with the same intent. As
7 proposed, the bill also will require reimbursement
8 training costs to law enforcement agencies that fund
9 police training. Its basis reimbursement amounts to the
10 period of employment after training. THEREFORE BE IT
11 RESOLVED the Detroit Board Police Commissioners supports
12 Michigan Legislature action as needed and essential state
13 policy to assist municipalities with effective use of
14 public funds for police training and retention, the Board
15 urges passage of House Bill 4747 to assist greatly with
16 the Board's duty to ensure effective use of limited
17 public and taxpayer dollars and to preserve adequate
18 funding for programs, initiatives, projects, and human
19 resources that enhanced the Detroit Police Department and
20 public safety in Detroit. Through the Chair, I move that
21 we place this Resolution in the archives of BOPC.

22 COMMISSIONER JONES: Support.

23 CHAIRPERSON BELL: It's been moved and supported.

24 Discussion. Those in favor, aye.

25 COMMISSIONERS: Aye. Aye.

1 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Those opposed. Motion carries.
2 Thank you. Vice-Chair Holt, I want to say that I think
3 this bill is critical. We would also have in the near
4 future state Senator Stephanie Chang bill too. So we're
5 looking forward to that. I would hope that this Board's
6 leadership would address our unions starting with the
7 commanding officer of the police Department thereafter
8 the LSA, the DPOA, and see where they stand on this
9 particular matter in terms of the former request to that
10 extent. I know where the Council stands, but we would
11 contact the Council, we will contact the Mayor to support
12 our Resolution and all the other initiatives in the City
13 of Detroit that's concerned about this issue. This issue
14 has been before us for the last 25 years or longer. So
15 when you can see people wanting to know how we represent
16 the City of Detroit, at least we can get reimbursed and
17 recoup for the training and certification of these
18 office.

19 CHAIRPERSON BELL: So I would hope that each
20 Commissioner take it on themselves to contact the 10
21 state representative that represents Detroit and others,
22 because we have to reach across the aisle in terms of
23 getting this. I know a state rep Tyrone Carter has been
24 tireless on this issue, but he needs our support. So can
25 we get that support?

1 COMMISSIONER JONES: Yes.

2 CHAIRPERSON BELL: So Board, no doubt, you voted and
3 nobody was in opposition. So I want to thank you for
4 that. So we will move on that soon in terms of advocating
5 a resolution to this effect.

6 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Mr. Chair.

7 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes sir.

8 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Point of information.
9 Commissioner Burton is on the phone. He said that he was
10 on the call, but they refused to recognize him and he was
11 trying to vote.

12 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Well, sir, let me say this to this
13 issue. If Commissioner Burton, like every Commissioner

14 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Mr. Chairman, this is
15 Commissioner Willie Burton.

16 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Excuse me, you don't have the
17 floor, sir.

18 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I want you to know, I asked the
19 staff, how do you mute yourself or unmute yourself
20 rather, and I guess we were still waiting for that
21 prompt.

22 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Burton, you don't
23 have the floor.

24 COMMISSIONER BURTON: You went to District 5 and I
25 made myself available for the roll and all of a sudden

1 apparently you guys could not hear me.

2 CHAIRPERSON BELL: This is just what we're speaking
3 of. If Commissioner Burton would join us at 20 minutes to
4 3, like all of the majority of the Commissioners, engage,
5 dealing with any technical problem, then he wouldn't have
6 this problem weekly, weekly, weekly. So, therefore, we
7 are going to move on. You do not have the floor, sir.

8 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I'm out in the community with
9 my constituents and I'm doing the zoom from out in the
10 field, but I was present. I was communicating with staff
11 trying to get in.

12 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Excuse me, excuse me. You do not
13 have the floor, sir. I wish you would stop speaking and
14 honor our rules and regulation and bylaws, and what is
15 proper decorum. You do not have the floor. We move on to
16 Deputy Chief Charles Fitzgerald, sir.

17 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Point of information, sir.

18 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Sir, we move on to Deputy Chief,
19 Charles Fitzgerald.

20 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Okay sir.

21 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Deputy Chief, you've
22 got the floor.

23 DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: Sounds good. Thank you
24 Chair. Good afternoon, Honorable Board. First, some good
25 news. Our barricaded situation on west Graham has

1 peacefully resolved itself. The suspect has come out of
2 the house and the female that he was holding against her
3 will is also out and unharmed. So that is good news. I'll
4 go briefly through the crime stuff. And then I will talk
5 about Chief White's five-point summer crowd management.
6 Like most major cities our criminal homicides are up
7 about 16%. That's 18 over the same time last year. Our
8 non-fatal shootings are up 30% which is 103 over the same
9 time last year. Our carjackings are up 22% that about 15
10 incidents above last year, but I do want to point out
11 just in the last 30 days we have seen some significant
12 decreases across all those categories. When we expect as
13 the weather gets warmer more folks are out, the calls for
14 service go up, we expect some of that crime to go up and
15 it's going in the opposite direction. So I think it is
16 the numerous layers of our crime strategies that we have
17 in place. The hardworking men and women of our
18 department. They're giving up a lot of their family time
19 to come in on overtime and work long hours to make sure
20 everyone is safe.

21 DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: So just with homicides in
22 the last 30 days, we've dropped 13% in the last 30 days.
23 For non-fatal shootings, we've dropped 17%. So while
24 we're not super excited about it, it is trending and
25 going in the right direction. And with our strategies, we

1 continue to hope we'll see that keep going down. If you
2 didn't get a chance to watch the press conference this
3 morning, Chief White rolled out his five point plan for
4 our crowd management. The first point in the plan is
5 engaged increased presence. Point 2 is strict noise
6 enforcement and I'll kind of go into detail for each one
7 in a second. Point 3 is the racing drifting detail, which
8 we've been operating pretty much since the start of the
9 year. Point 4 is the parking lot encode enforcement. And
10 then part five is the community engagement.

11 DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: The Mayor has very
12 graciously authorized extra money for us to allow us to
13 get extra officers out there on overtime. And he has
14 approved 4000 hours per weekend for summer crowd
15 management and an additional 2000 hours for the drifting
16 speeding detail. So that will not allow us, we won't have
17 to pull from any of the Precincts. We will not have to
18 pull from anyone who's answering 911 calls for service
19 which is great. The increased presence downtown is going
20 to pull, it's going to be an overtime detail, so folks
21 will work their normal detail and then they will be
22 available for the late hours in the downtown, Greektown,
23 Rivertown, drifting, drag racing on east and west sides
24 of town and any other things that come about during that.

25 DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: So we believe the increased

1 presence is definitely going to help the strict
2 enforcement of the noise. One of the things that we've
3 noticed that keeps folks from staying downtown when
4 they're actually down there are the rooftop bars the
5 parking lots where they're playing music at accessible
6 levels. We have been meeting strategically with all the
7 business owners downtown. Chief White's main issue was
8 that we need to give them a good warning, give them a
9 heads up that 10 o'clock is going to be that cutoff time.
10 At 10 o'clock when that noise, when the loud levels of
11 music are stopped on the rooftops, we believe strongly
12 that folks will start making their way toward their cars
13 and head out of the downtown area without just that
14 constant circle of going around and around because the
15 music is playing and folks are enjoying the music.

16 DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: So between the cars,
17 parking lots, those businesses, we believe we'll get our
18 bang for our buck. The drifting and drag racing, we are
19 we're not going to let off the gas pedal for lack of
20 better terms for that. We have to continue to seize cars.
21 We have to continue to ticket owners of these vehicles,
22 take these cars under nuisance abatement, and forfeit
23 these vehicles to really make a deterrence from this kind
24 of behavior. I'm not sure if you saw during the week,
25 there was a clip of, one of our drifting, drag racing

1 areas, where cars were just deliberately running through
2 red lights and that's what we faced during these things.
3 So we need to do everything we can to ensure we have
4 enough bodies out there, we have enough staffing levels.
5 We got the helicopters up so that we can do our absolute
6 best to keep our citizens safe.

7 DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: The parking lot code
8 enforcement, we've talked about a little bit. We're going
9 to hold the parking lot employees and owners to kind of
10 hold their feet to the fire to make sure that they're
11 good partners with us. They have to have a person there,
12 an attendant in the lot. Those lots are supposed to be
13 well lit if you're not paying to stay parked and move,
14 we're going to strongly encourage them to keep folks
15 moving along. No parties, no tailgating during these
16 nights because we do see a lot of our problems with that.
17 And then the last part is obviously a big component, as
18 well is the community partnerships, getting some of our -
19 you know, we've already met with our downtown partners.
20 We're going to continue to meet with them on a regular
21 basis to make sure that they're being the partners where
22 we really want them to be and we're being the best
23 partner for them.

24 DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: And then also our community
25 members that come out and we have four different peace

1 walks scheduled already for this weekend, which are going
2 to help. And then all of our other groups, like our
3 Detroit 300 and other groups that come out and help and
4 support. So that's kind of it, in a nutshell, the Chief's
5 plan. Lastly for me, because I know there's a big agenda
6 is that I just wanted to thank everyone for coming out to
7 AC Stair's retirement party. It was a pretty fancy
8 shindig and I know that it means a lot to her for her 25
9 years. She was an amazing woman officer, everything. So
10 we're going to miss her greatly. So, thank you all that
11 you could attend. That's all I had for me, Chairman Bell.

12 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, Deputy Chief, I thought
13 that report was very meaningful, but I had one question
14 initially. My understanding is the media report out maybe
15 three or four officers were hurt in the melee last week,
16 is that true, and how are they doing?

17 DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: Yes. They're all doing fine
18 now. There are some minor injuries to the extent police
19 officers, they all get little ouiness we call them, but
20 they're doing okay. It was a dangerous, hostile situation
21 where officers were getting surrounded and virtually
22 attacked from all different directions. So that's not fun
23 for anyone. It's certainly not fun for the police, but
24 it's not fun for our citizens that come down and have to
25 endure that as well. So this plan is going to take, a big

1 push in the right direction to make sure that doesn't
2 happen again.

3 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Commissioners, the
4 floor - Commissioner Bernard.

5 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I just trying to understand.

6 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Davis next. I'm
7 sorry. I didn't see you. Commissioner Bernard, go ahead,
8 Davis will be next.

9 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: How about raise of a hand?

10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Well, I'm sorry. Ladies first.
11 Let's go ahead, we'll get to you, sir.

12 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I'm trying to understand why
13 you're closing downtown Detroit and Greektown at 10
14 o'clock. All of the businesses in Detroit, particularly
15 in the hospitality industry had been hurt greatly by
16 COVID. I mean, how can they make money if they have to
17 close 4 hours early?

18 DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: We're not closing the
19 clubs, ma'am. We're just going to move the music inside.
20 We just don't want the rooftop music to be going and
21 blaring at the levels that are uncomfortably loud for
22 most folks that come down. So we're not closing the bar
23 down. What we want to do is have them move the music
24 inside.

25 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Okay. I understand.

1 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Davis, and then
2 Commissioner Burch.

3 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Yes I have two questions, I know
4 right now a lot of people in the various communities feel
5 that their communities are not getting enough police
6 protection, enough response time. And it sounds like even
7 downtime is going to get even more service to the
8 detriment of the community and other neighborhoods. Also,
9 as it relates to that, are they also going to authorize
10 overtime for people like in the second, sixth, and tenth
11 Precincts? That's one question. My second question, as it
12 relates - do you know how many personnel we're going to
13 lose going to Columbus because it appears as they could
14 easily outbid us for our staff. Those are two separate
15 questions, sir.

16 DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: Over eight weeks ago Mayor
17 Duggan approved a large chunk of overtime money for the
18 Precincts. We are not losing anybody from the Precinct.
19 As a matter of fact, when Chief White walked in the door,
20 he made it a point to not take folks from the Precincts
21 to do a lot of these details. So we have folks that say
22 like they work a medical section, they can volunteer to
23 come down and work overtime. If you worked training, if
24 you worked some of the support side operations, they're
25 going to be working overtime downtown. I have details, we

1 meet every Friday with the Chief to talk about weekend
2 strategy in the Precincts themselves. And I have overtime
3 details almost around the clock in all of the west side
4 Precincts as does the east side. You know, when I was
5 talking about that reduction in the nonfatal and fatal
6 numbers, it's working because we have a lot of folks that
7 are giving up their family time, their weekend time, any
8 other time, their off time to work extra hours and it's
9 paying off, we're still seizing guns.

10 DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: That just an incredibly
11 large number. You know FBI in May alone, did 3.6 million
12 background checks for weapons in the United States and
13 was selling 2 million guns a month. And unfortunately,
14 the legal ones are turning illegal and they're making
15 their way to the street. So we are doing everything we
16 possibly can to keep the Precinct safe. And we've been
17 doing that for two-plus months now. So as far as losing
18 for Columbus, the only person that I know other than
19 Chief Bryant, I think she's going to do an amazing job
20 down there. I know that Captain LaShanna Potts has
21 accepted a position down there as well as an Assistant
22 Chief. And they are very fortunate to get her. She is an
23 absolute star here at DPD but Chief White and even Chief
24 Craig before that has said it many, many a time, we have
25 a deep bench. So we're going to pull up some folks that

1 are equally as talented. And we're going to be just fine,
2 Commissioner.

3 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Burch.

4 COMMISSIONER BURCH: I thank you, DC Fitzgerald, for
5 your service. Would you please ask Chief White - I didn't
6 hear in his plan regarding mental health with the drugs.
7 The drugs are so prevalent and our gas stations so easily
8 purchased by our young people. And number 11 had the
9 service of DC Bryant who's now gone. No one has been
10 replaced to take her place. And I've asked this question
11 over and over regarding the canine unit. And I'm just
12 saying, where is there further assistance? Because as I
13 watched these videos Mr. Fitzgerald, I see other people
14 taking the streets and I'm speaking of calm people like
15 pastors. So I know that the Police Department works with
16 pastors. Why can't they walk the streets and just call
17 for control as they did in Kalamazoo. Are you aware that
18 Mr. Fitzgerald that the people have to get involved to
19 help you? Evidently, you all are not, you're not calling
20 in the sheriff's department or the state police to help
21 you. You just said that you're not short, but you're not
22 addressing what I know that I live in number 11. And like
23 I said, DC Bryant is gone. I gave you quite a bit. So I
24 don't know if you can answer all that. It was a few.

25 DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: Yes, there was a few in

1 there but I'm going to do my best. And every time I hear
2 Mr. Fitzgerald, I think of my father. So that's a little
3 scary. Anyway, I'll start with the top. DC. Bryant is
4 still on our DPD until June 22nd. Once she's officially,
5 and she goes off the books, I'm sure Chief White will
6 very quickly push a nomination for the rank of Deputy
7 Chief. And he will find you a star, ma'am just as he did
8 with we did with Elaine Bryant. So we will take care of
9 that. Please don't misunderstand that when I don't
10 mention MSP in Wayne County, we beg, borrow and steal for
11 anyone's services. Wayne County has been helping us out
12 quite a bit. MSP is with their helicopters with street
13 patrols, with highway patrols. We have MSP out quite a
14 bit. And I did have something AC LeValley wanted you to
15 know for sure is that the law department has passed an
16 ordinance and they're going to run it through the city
17 council for whippets.

18 DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: I think you had mentioned
19 that at a previous meeting.

20 COMMISSIONER BURCH Yes, I did.

21 DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: So that is in the works.
22 Whippets have been a problem for years and years and
23 years, not just in our city, in everywhere. You know, it
24 is nitric oxide. It's a very quick euphoric high that
25 they can buy really, really cheap anywhere. You can go to

1 Walmart and get 25 little cartridges for like \$10. So
2 it's very, very cheap and it is a problem. So I'm glad
3 we're taking the approach. We get that pushed through.
4 And as far as gas stations, and I want to, I will tell
5 Chief White, but I'll push that along to DC Wilson and
6 the folks over at major violators. And we can step up and
7 ramp up our enforcement, the gas stations, and parking
8 stores.

9 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, Chief Fitzgerald.
10 You're issue about the canine, one of the executives
11 responded to that whole issue of how many canines they
12 have and somewhat limited. And if you listen to the
13 media, Commissioner Jones, one second, if you listened to
14 the media Wayne County Sheriff Deputy President who's a
15 former commissioner Reginald Crawford spoke to, they are
16 working overtime. They have a serious shortage of
17 manpower in the Wayne County jail. So therefore that just
18 came out recently. It has been raising an issue for quite
19 some time, but Wayne County Sheriff Chief Washington is
20 trying to help us to the best of their ability, but they
21 have a serious manpower issue also. And Mayor Duggan,
22 Vice-Chair and myself, met with him on these issues the
23 Mayor and the Assistant Chief at that time, Bettison
24 reassured us that the Precinct would get severe attention
25 across the city. And I think you, heard Chief White how

1 he responded to empowering those Commanders.

2 CHAIRPERSON BELL So I think that we're moving in the
3 right direction. I'm impressed with Chief White's
4 leadership. Anytime you change leadership, I think it's
5 crucial that he'd be out in front of the troops. So he's
6 there. I recall my career with Chief Hart. He did not
7 take the streets. He was a low-profile Chief for 20
8 years, but that is not the case in this day and age,
9 Chief White understands that in reference to the
10 leadership. So I'm impressed with that. Hopefully, we can
11 move forward. Commissioner Jones.

12 COMMISSIONER JONES: Thank you Chair. DC Fitzgerald,
13 this is Commissioner Jones. I did attend the press
14 conference this morning when the Chief was outlining his
15 five-point plan to address some major issues that we have
16 on the table now. One of the things that he did outline
17 and speaking about of deploying additional troops
18 downtown and, and Mayor Duggan having granted the
19 overtime hours that they would need to be able to do an
20 effective representation of DPD in the downtown area. But
21 he also made mention that our 911 services that are
22 citywide would not suffer as a result of deploying
23 additional troops in the downtown area. And I just wanted
24 our community to be reassured that this is going to be
25 the case, whereas he's using additional funding to supply

1 the needs for downtown, but he's not going to let the
2 rest of the city suffer for lack of 911 services.

3 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. I think DC -
4 Commissioner Davis, we are going to take one more
5 question and then we want to move up and wrap this up.
6 Yes sir, go ahead.

7 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: This is from Commissioner
8 Burton.

9 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Sir. I don't want to hear from
10 Commissioner Burton unless he talks directly with the
11 staff. I don't want to hear from him.

12 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: He said he called into the staff
13 and he got --

14 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Excuse me. Thank you. I heard you
15 loud and clear DC Fitzgerald, thank you for filling for
16 the Chief. A very thorough report. We will move on to HR.

17 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: You don't want to hear from him
18 because he's on the line directly?

19 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Move on, please. HR Director has
20 the floor.

21 DIRECTOR PATILLO: Good afternoon. Through the Chair.
22 I'll be presenting the Human Resources Bureau report for
23 the month of May. For your current department staffing
24 for sworn positions field, we have 2,566 that's 96%. That
25 includes the 57 police assistance. For your positions

1 vacant 4% vacant, 106. For total budgeted positions for
2 the sworn police assistant is 2,672.

3 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Excuse me. Excuse me, Director.
4 Commissioner Davis, you can mute your phone and have that
5 conversation, but not while we have it in the meeting.
6 Thank you. Director, go ahead.

7 DIRECTOR KATRINA PATILLO: For civilians or staff at
8 83%, 624 filled, 746 budgeted positions vacant 17%, 125
9 leaving total positions filled 3,187, positions vacant
10 231 for a total budgeted position, 3,418. For your sworn
11 recruiting from July 1st, 2020 to May 31st, 2021 total
12 applicants. We had 3,310. That's an increase of 194.
13 since the last time I briefed you all, in processing 32,
14 number hired 162, lack of interest 318, temporary
15 disqualified, 2023, disqualified permanently 421 and
16 awaiting MCOLES is 354. For your MCOLES testing, this is
17 written in physical agility for the month of May. We have
18 for the written 67 schedules, 41 appeared 28 and 41 past.
19 13 of the 41 failed, 2 rescheduled and 24 no shows. For
20 the physical agility, we had 99 schedule, 60 appeared, 32
21 of 60 past. 28 of 60 failed, 4 rescheduled and 35, no
22 shows. For the academy graduates on May 28th, we had 22
23 graduate total new hires for the month of May, we had 22
24 sworn, 2 civilians for a total of 24. For your Detroit
25 residency information as of May 31st for total sworn for

1 Detroit 574, total civilians 32529 police assistance
2 for your non-Detroit 1,935, total civilians 296 and 28
3 police assistance. Civilian new hires for Detroit
4 residents 2, sworn new hires, Detroit residents 2, police
5 assistant zero. For the attrition, the spreadsheets have
6 been included in your packet, but for the month of May,
7 we had 22 sworn, 12 civilians, one police assistant for a
8 total of 35. For your leave of absence and your
9 restricted duty, for sworn for FMLA continuous we had
10 2079 FMLA intermediate medical leave 2, military leave 7,
11 160 restricted, 49 disabled, and 16 sick. And then for
12 the civilian numbers, we had 18 FMLA, continuous 76 FMLA
13 intermediate, 4 medical leave, 4 restricted 3 six. For
14 your sworn personnel suspensions, we had a total of 10, 9
15 officers, and one corporal monthly separations for May.

16 DIRECTOR KATRINA PATILLO: Your spreadsheet is also
17 included in your packet. We had a total of 22 and then
18 for the drop program for the month of May, we had a total
19 of 572. Just an update on recruiting initiatives. So
20 we're steaming full spread ahead with the Chief White 12
21 week, 12 Precinct recruiting, and here are the projected
22 commands for the month of June. For this weekend 7th
23 Precinct weekend of 18th June is Juneteenth is going to
24 be a celebration neighborhood liaison for the week of
25 25th June, 4th Precinct. So recruiting, we're going to

1 work hand in hand with each Precinct. Please spread the
2 word to your communities, your church congregation,
3 schools, athletic teams, restaurants, grocery stores,
4 barber and beauty salons, fraternity, and sorority
5 organizations. We've also increased our social media
6 presence. And finally, just a thank you to Commissioner
7 Holley for having to BPD recruiting on his monthly show
8 last month. Pending any questions, this concludes the
9 Human Resources brief.

10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, Director.
11 Commissioners, if not, thank you for a great report. It's
12 quite thorough. And we appreciate you addressing the
13 recruiting issue. I think DPD recruit, I was recruited by
14 two or three officers I knew prior to them joining, so
15 that's sort of crucial and you rolled that out at the
16 various Precincts. So thank you for that report.

17 DIRECTOR KATRINA PATILLO Your welcome, sir.

18 CHAIRPERSON BELL: We move on to the 2nd Precinct.
19 Commander Brian Mounsey. There he is.

20 COMMANDER MOUNSEY: Hello. Good afternoon, everybody.
21 Thank you. Chairperson Bell. Good afternoon, Honorable
22 Board of Police Commissioners and community members
23 present. My name is Brian Mounsey. I'm the Commander here
24 at the 2nd Precinct. I can't see all my staff on here,
25 but I do know that we have Captain Michael Chambers

1 joining me today, Lieutenant Stacey Greer-Travis,
2 Sergeant Edward Jackson and at least a couple of my
3 neighborhood police officers are with us as well.

4 COMMANDER MOUNSEY: Like to start out, just giving a
5 little bit of an overview of the 2nd Precinct. It does
6 encompass roughly 10¼ square miles of the City of
7 Detroit. We have a population of just about 58,000
8 residents, according to the 2010 census data. We're one
9 of the few Precincts that actually has 4 city council
10 neighborhood districts that fall within the boundaries of
11 the 2nd Precinct. I know there's been some talk about
12 recruiting. There are approximately 136 officers at
13 various ranks that work out of this Precinct. What I'd
14 like to point out is when I looked at my report from last
15 year, at this time, and we had 105 last year. So the 2nd
16 Precinct is up 31 positions in total over this time last
17 year. And that's just a testament to the recruiting and
18 HR Department and the hard work that they're doing.

19 COMMANDER MOUNSEY: So that's been a noticeable help
20 here at the 2nd Precinct. Community relations, obviously
21 that's very important to us here at the 2nd Precinct.
22 We're engaged in large community organizations, such as
23 Barton, McFarland, the Little Association, Hartwell Block
24 Club. I think Ms. Pennell is on the line today. We've got
25 a 2nd Precinct community relations council, which is

1 actively led by Ms. Freda Butler, Happy Home's Block
2 Club. And also, the 2nd Precinct is home to the Detroit
3 Association of Black Organizations led by Reverend Horton
4 Sheffield. We have 6 neighborhood police officers along
5 with the community relations Sergeant that helps us put
6 programs on throughout the community, including a
7 national night out candy giveaways. This year, we were
8 able to still do drag on with the schools and we're
9 getting ready to start back up our senior movie night as
10 well.

11 COMMANDER MOUNSEY: Again, just for a collaboration
12 briefly about our crime stats for the 2nd Precinct. This
13 year we are up approximately 73% in homicides. We're up
14 46% in criminal sexual conduct. We've seen tremendous
15 success in the category of robbery where we're showing a
16 30% reduction over last year. Our aggravated assaults are
17 up by 12% for a total part one crime increase of 8% this
18 year, compared to this time last year. Property offenses
19 though are trended quite the opposite. We've done very
20 well with burglaries being reduced by 34%, larcenies 29%,
21 motor vehicle theft has been reduced by 20% and our total
22 part one property crime reduction so far this year is
23 27%. So combined between property and violent part one
24 crimes, the 2nd Precinct is currently showing a 14%
25 reduction over where we were at this time last year.

1 COMMANDER MOUNSEY: I did mention one of them our
2 struggles this year is our homicide numbers. So we've had
3 19 homicides in the Precinct this year compared to 11
4 this time last year, which is a 73% increase. Aggravated
5 assaults are up as well 447 this year compared to 400
6 last year. So those are the trends. We are working
7 diligently to try to address these trends with
8 strategies, such as restore order operations. The Deputy
9 Chief mentioned overtime. That's been authorized by the
10 mayor. We've had deployed additional resources, including
11 an extra proactive out-of-service police car on each
12 shift each day within the 2nd Precinct, we refer to that
13 as our 80 series car. We're continuing to push forward
14 and removing illegal guns from the streets. So far this
15 year, we have taken approximately 159 handguns and 31
16 long guns off the streets so far this year, compared to
17 about 76 at the same time last year. Robberies, we're
18 very happy with what we're seeing in that category.
19 That's shown a downward trend over the past several
20 years, actually. And when you look at other violent
21 crimes in the city it's just positive news that our
22 robberies, at least that category is trending down. Since
23 2018, we've had a 29% reduction in the category of
24 robbery over the past 3 years. I think that's pretty much
25 my overview as far as the stats and the background of the

1 Precinct. I know that Captain Chambers is on the line and
2 would like to share with all of you some strategies and
3 some successes that we've seen at the 2nd Precinct so far
4 this year.

5 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you.

6 CAPTAIN CHAMBERS: Yes, as the Commander said, I
7 mean, we continue to focus on our hotspot areas. Some of
8 the scout car areas that's been giving us trouble, like
9 those scout carrier 2, one to the north end, near
10 McNichols, the Greenfield, and also the area south of
11 Plymouth, the tire man, and just east of Greenfield 2728.
12 So after each shooting, and actually our detective
13 section, as well as our ceased by your team, responds,
14 they talked to witnesses, collect evidence as witnesses
15 and try and to gather as much information as they can to
16 get to the bottom of exactly what happened. And actually,
17 our detective section is leading the city and closures at
18 this particular time for non-fatal shootings at 50%. So
19 they've been doing an outstanding job in their
20 investigation and seeing the response. They really go out
21 and obtain search warrants and residences go in.

22 CAPTAIN CHAMBERS: They're getting all kinds of
23 evidence linking back to the crime scene. The Commander
24 talked about the restore orders that we're doing with
25 cooperation. We're doing offered to engage operations,

1 trying to combat some of the prostitution that's
2 occurring in the Precinct. We're also going out on a
3 Michigan Department of corrections home checks with our
4 special operations teams and, and MTOC agents. Also just
5 some of the other things we're trying to enrich our
6 officers that are here at the 2nd Precinct. We give them
7 opportunities to work in special operations, as well as
8 in the detective section to better their skillset. So
9 when they are on patrol, they're able to go back and
10 utilize the tools that they've received. At the
11 Precincts, we have an advocate that assists with personal
12 protection orders, and we also have a social worker and
13 the Chaplain section is here as well. And they go out
14 with the officers to try and assist where they can. So we
15 have a lot going on at the 2nd Precinct and our officers
16 and staff have been doing an outstanding job. And that's
17 it.

18 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, sir. Commissioner
19 Davis. I didn't see her hand.

20 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Here is my hand.

21 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: He must have said, Commissioner
22 Burch.

23 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: He normally bypass me but I know
24 about the 2nd Precinct, I was just there.

25 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Burch then.

1 COMMISSIONER BURCH. Thank you. Hello to you
2 Commander Mounsey. Every time I see your face, I have to
3 smile because you're such a good officer. Over there in
4 Precinct 2, I want everybody to know that he takes care
5 of the Imperial supermarket along with the other
6 businesses, but I just want to share with you. Please
7 give a shout out to Sergeant Burke, Lieutenant Lockhart,
8 that we miss him from number 11. That's why I said it
9 looked like we just lose people. So we're going to
10 regain, I know, but here's another question to you
11 regarding the masks that are supposed to be worn in the
12 grocery store Commanding Mounsey, sometimes the managers
13 get these irate customers that refuse to wear the mask.
14 And so what is their right as management to say, we can't
15 serve you without a mask. How do they handle that?

16 COMMANDER MOUNSEY: Through the Chair to Commissioner
17 Burch. Thank you for your compliments this afternoon. I
18 believe the CDC guidelines are now that if you are
19 vaccinated that you do not have to wear a mask in indoor
20 spaces. However, that doesn't stop a private company from
21 mandating pretty much whatever rule they would like to
22 mandate as far as - certainly, the grocery store and the
23 Imperial market and other places have the right to ask
24 their customers to wear a mask. You know, at that point,
25 the customer does not want to wear a mask the store

1 employees can simply ask them to leave and suggest that
2 you know, they don't want to do business with them if
3 they don't want to follow the rules of the store.
4 Certainly, we would respond to that, but probably at
5 best, you'd be looking at probably a trespassing issue or
6 something like that once an individual was told to leave
7 the store. But again, I mean, right now we're in times
8 where things are changing with the CDC guidelines and the
9 store owner pretty much has to make up their mind whether
10 or not they want to turn customers away. They can
11 certainly put somebody at the door too, I suppose and ask
12 customers not to enter without a mask, but as far as I
13 know, the CDC guidelines are allowing people not to go to
14 indoor spaces without a mask.

15 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Well thank you for that. Just
16 please send, through the Chair. Would you just send an
17 officer now and then like, you've been doing to just
18 check out everything like you've been doing?

19 COMMANDER MOUNSEY: Yes, I certainly will. And in
20 regards to Lieutenant Lockhart, I believe he is probably
21 one of the best lieutenants in the City of Detroit. I'm
22 happy to have him here at the 2nd Precinct.

23 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Yes, he is. That's our loss at
24 number 11. Thank you.

25 COMMANDER MOUNSEY: You're welcome.

1 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Any other Commissioners.

2 Commissioner Holley.

3 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I
4 just want to let the Commander know that Sergeant Jackson
5 is on the line. Do you want to add something to say? He
6 looks like he's strong and wants to stay something.

7 SERGEANT JACKSON: Yes, I'm sorry. I just want to
8 say good afternoon to all of the hard-working Board
9 members and everyone that's on the zoom meeting today.
10 I'm just going to piggyback off of another commissioner
11 who is expressing her love and great support for Imperial
12 Supermarket, which the 2nd Precinct, we just have a
13 phenomenal relationship with the business district and
14 Commander Mounsey, he did mention the Easter egg hunt and
15 we will not be able to do these great things that we do
16 for the community if it were not for these businesses
17 that support us here at the 2nd Precinct. So the Easter
18 egg hunt that we had at Mackenzie Elementary School and
19 Middle school was just phenomenal. We were able to work
20 with the kids, and actually passed on a great impression
21 of what we do as law enforcement officers and just build
22 that bridge in a community. So just talk about the great
23 support that we have from the community. And that's what
24 it's about partnering with the community the citizens and
25 our schools, our churches, and our chaplains, of course.

1 So pretty much that's, that's all I had to say.

2 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Bernard.

3 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Quickly, Commander. As, you
4 know, a big part of the district is on 8-mile Road there
5 and the Ferndale police, of course, is on the other side.
6 What is your relationship so to speak with them? As you
7 know as you know terrorize the west side of Detroit on a
8 regular basis and come into Detroit down Woodward and
9 everything else when they're pursuing someone. Have you
10 talked to them about any of this? They only have one,
11 black police officer out of about 70 and they are, you
12 know, they're like big brother there all the time. Do you
13 have any comments or recommendations for the community?

14 COMMANDER MOUNSEY: Well, through the Chair to
15 Commissioner Bernard. The 2nd Precinct border actually is
16 West McNichols. So the 2nd Precinct our Northern border
17 is west McNichols. And then the 12th Precinct except
18 between west McNichols and 8-mile. So myself as a
19 Precinct Commander, although we do work, we do border
20 Dearborn and other Precincts that we work with other
21 Precincts. I currently do not have a relationship with
22 the staff or the leadership of Ferndale but that's pretty
23 much, I guess I'm unable to address the concern just
24 because we border the 12th Precinct and the 12th Precinct
25 that borders six mile.

1 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you Commander and the
2 Captain. I want to Commissioners when we make statements
3 like terrorize for another Police Department, I think
4 that is inappropriate. It's a bad choice of words. As you
5 well know everybody is concern about 8-mile Road, Mack
6 Avenue, all the adjacent areas that these border concerns
7 of traffic enforcement. I just encourage everybody to
8 slow down and abide by the speed limit and they wouldn't
9 have this problem, but I wouldn't say that any department
10 adjacent to us because we never know when we need their
11 help and assistance. So we try to establish that
12 relationship with all these departments at the border of
13 Detroit, the metropolitan Detroit, in fact. So keep that
14 in mind. And I just want to make one other statement when
15 they say there's a club in Harper Woods called "They
16 Say". So we should be very cautious when we say, they
17 say. If you've got a concern about a rumor or whatever it
18 is, you should contact the Commanding Officer. And I
19 think they can respond to you appropriately and rather
20 than accurate or inaccurate, but we should not be making
21 statements of, "they say" whatever they're a part of. And
22 we don't have direct knowledge. There's a whole lot going
23 on at City Street. We move on to Reserves.

24 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Just briefly. I represent
25 people in those courts, and I actually do know what I'm

1 talking about. And there is a problem with racism on the
2 other side of 8-mile. And I apologize, it's not a 2nd
3 Precinct issue. You're absolutely correct, but that is a
4 primary concern and you can look at the cases and see.

5 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay, thank you. Thank you,
6 Commissioner Bernard. We move on to Chief Lewis. Ms.
7 White, do you have a question?

8 MRS. WHITE: Yes. Through the Chair, Commander Kyra
9 Joy Hope is on the line to give introductions before
10 Reserve Assistant Chief Lewis provides the presentation.

11 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you.

12 COMMANDER KYRA JOY HOPE: Thank you. Through the
13 Chair. Good afternoon Honorable Board and Police
14 Commissioners. I am Commander Kyra Joy Hope of the
15 Chief's Neighborhood Liaison. And I have the pleasure
16 today of introducing to you our Reserve Assistant Chief
17 of Police, Stephen Lewis. But first I would like to
18 introduce to you our two latest members, and that would
19 be Lieutenant Sharon McClure and also Gwendolyn Stokes.
20 At this time our presentation will begin with Reserve
21 Chief of Police, Stephen Lewis.

22 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, Commander. One of my
23 favorite Commanders. Thank you.

24 RESERVE ASSISTANT CHIEF LEWIS: Good afternoon
25 Honorable Board and thank you for that introduction,

1 Commander Hope. Can we get the presentation up or am I
2 going to be displaying this Ms. White?

3 MRS. WHITE: You do have capabilities. Thank you.

4 RESERVE ASSISTANT CHIEF LEWIS: Okay, give me one
5 second here. I apologize.

6 MRS. WHITE: And if staff cohost could please ensure
7 that Reserve Assistant Chief Lewis have co-host
8 capabilities. Thank you.

9 RESERVE ASSISTANT CHIEF LEWIS: Give me just one
10 moment guys. I have a little technical problem. My
11 computer just froze up a bit here. This has been
12 happening.

13 MRS. WHITE: Thank you for your patience.

14 RESERVE ASSISTANT CHIEF LEWIS: Okay. I appreciate
15 the opportunity to come before this Board on behalf of
16 the Detroit Police Reserve to give our report of where we
17 are. It's been almost a year since, since we had a
18 presentation to the Board, so for those that don't recall
19 exactly who we are, I'll give you a little introduction
20 here. Police Reserve is uniform volunteers. We possess a
21 strong desire to serve the community in a law enforcement
22 capacity. We have established much as the Board of Police
23 Commissioners by the city charter. Reserve officers play
24 an integral role in the Detroit Police Department. And
25 when called to duty, our powers are designated by the

1 Chief of Police.

2 RESERVE ASSISTANT CHIEF LEWIS: The Detroit Police
3 Reserve Corps is overseen by the Commanding Officers of
4 the Chief's neighborhood liaison, which is Commander
5 Hope. Police seniority corporals, Jeffrey Johnson and
6 Royce Hill provide day-to-day coordination and management
7 of our 120 person unit. Also, we do have Sergeant Stokes
8 and Lieutenant McClure from the Chief's neighborhood
9 liaison as their supervisors. The reserve executive team
10 is headed by reserve Police Chief Linda Bruce and myself,
11 Stephen Lewis. And we worked hand in hand with the CNL,
12 to direct and grow the membership of this valuable
13 resource. This is just an overview for your packet of our
14 organization chart that I don't need to go through in
15 this presentation, but it's there in your packet for you.
16 I want to talk about 2020 in review. 2020 was one word
17 that sums up all of 2020, and that's, COVID, not just for
18 the Reserve Corps, but for the Police Department in
19 general, but COVID played an especially impactful role
20 here in our organization. During the pandemic, we had to
21 make a lot of adjustments in a moment, but I want to tell
22 you some good things that we got done.

23 RESERVE ASSISTANT CHIEF LEWIS: We did roll out a new
24 20 hour DPR supervisor training program, all reserves
25 supervisors holding the rank of Sergeant Lieutenant. So

1 it is something that we put together in-house with
2 personnel from the training center leadership skills,
3 policies, procedures, and a variety of other operational
4 topics. I'm pleased to say that all supervisor members
5 attended and they are looking forward to making that part
6 of their annual continuing education. We provided in the
7 reserve course safety and for all COVID testing sites
8 throughout the city, the large-scale ones, and we've been
9 assisting with the vaccine clinics this year as well.
10 Reservists at those sites provided traffic control, crowd
11 control and direction, and general assistance,
12 particularly to the people that are elderly or mobility
13 challenged. We're there to help get them in and out of
14 the vaccine clinic safely. A new set of standard
15 operating procedures for the Reserve Corps was completed
16 to meet Police Department standards and a new online
17 Reserve detailed tracking application was created and is
18 in pilot testing, it can assist the department spark
19 sheet, which will provide important visibility to all
20 executive members.

21 RESERVE ASSISTANT CHIEF LEWIS: Again, our Reserve
22 Corps in COVID-19. This was a struggle for us. I am
23 pleased to say that DPR members again, volunteers
24 continued to serve throughout the pandemic. Accordingly,
25 we logged over 2,600 hours of duty time in the very heart

1 of the pandemic from May of 2020 through January of 2021.
2 That's 2,600 hours of patrol time patrol support time,
3 disability time in the neighborhoods, in these clinics,
4 in these other support sites that were of course
5 volunteer by our members. A number of DPR members were at
6 high risk of COVID complications and have taken a leave
7 of absence at various points. We also know that we've,
8 had some retirements, we've had some separations from
9 folks that are just as high of a risk people.

10 RESERVE ASSISTANT CHIEF LEWIS: We did that. Most of
11 our monthly meetings had moved online or to conference
12 calls, but we did manage to stay in touch with one
13 another and with the Police Department. Unfortunately,
14 the planned Reserve Academy class that was planned for
15 the fall of 2020 was postponed and has been greenlit for
16 the fall of 2021. Nearly all sporting concerts and
17 festival events were canceled, enforcing the Reserve to
18 assist in other functional areas. In our mat topic. When
19 you hear from DC Fitzgerald about the manpower challenges
20 that we've had, the Reserve Corps has stepped up to work
21 in support capacities that these officers on the street
22 can work more efficiently. We, come in oftentimes behind
23 sworn officers to help them in the course of their duties
24 and running errands for them, providing extra safety and
25 security on scenes which we've seen particularly

1 throughout some of the protest activity that happened
2 last year. Significantly we've had no documented cases of
3 COVID-19 for Reservist from any Police Department. We
4 did, unfortunately, have a number of Reservists that
5 contracted COVID 19, but none of them actually contracted
6 it from the department. Approximately two-thirds of the
7 reserve members today have received at least one dose of
8 the vaccine. And most excitedly for us, recruitment has
9 continued. We still have folks that are entering the
10 application process to join the Reserve.

11 RESERVE ASSISTANT CHIEF LEWIS: I'd like to bring to
12 bring Board a Memorium announcement here. I think some of
13 you have seen that Reserve Commander Henry Dodge, who was
14 the longest-serving member of the Reserve Corps, not just
15 the longest-serving reserve corps, but certainly one of
16 the longest-serving members of the Police Department with
17 53 years of service passed away earlier this year. Dodge
18 stepped down from active command in the Reserve Corps
19 last decade but was still an institution in our agency.
20 And we will feel his loss for quite some time. He was
21 known as the Dean of the Police Reserve Corps. He chaired
22 our executive meetings, but more importantly, he fostered
23 relationships across the Department and across the region
24 with other departments. Certainly in Dearborn and in
25 Haven and other places Commander Dodge was really known

1 as the face of the Reserve Corps for very long. We will
2 miss him dearly. His badge has been retired and a plaque
3 commemorating his service will be placed in the official
4 archive.

5 RESERVE ASSISTANT CHIEF LEWIS: Yes, this year we are
6 finally launching our long-awaited Detroit Police
7 Reserve, continuing education program. This really has
8 five main functional areas. We have a legal training
9 component, which is a review of statutory and case law,
10 and most importantly, the impact of that law on reserve
11 officers which, you know, is different than for regular
12 police officers. Training and departmental policies and
13 procedures and new reserve corps procedures. Again,
14 falling in line with the commonly accepted standards of
15 the Police Department. Continuing training and use of
16 force, de-escalation communication, and emotional
17 intelligence. And most importantly for our organization's
18 civic training, we are ambassadors. We made our members
19 aware of city county and state resources, so that we're
20 able to come in again behind those sworn members and
21 continue to work with especially crime victims or other
22 members of the community that needs information. We can
23 provide that information to them and allow those officers
24 [38:17 inaudible] they're up and move on.

25 RESERVE ASSISTANT CHIEF LEWIS: I have some numbers

1 of interest for you. Reserve officers contributed over
2 2,900 hours, the Detroit Police Department in 2020. Now,
3 this was a decrease for 2019, but it was exceptional in
4 light of the pandemic. And to answer some concerns about
5 where we spend our time, about 65% of our detailed time
6 is spent in the neighborhood community, not [38:43
7 inaudible]. In the past 12 months, Reserve officers
8 conducted over 700 special attention site visits,
9 Greenlight locations. And most importantly to this Board,
10 we were present for 32 days of protest in 2020. And
11 during those 32 days, we had zero citizens' complaints or
12 use of force incidents involving Police Reserve officers
13 during our entire engagement during that event, which is
14 pretty remarkable considering the high level of passion
15 amongst some members. But we are able to avoid any use of
16 force incidents.

17 RESERVE ASSISTANT CHIEF LEWIS: Just the highlight of
18 our major initiatives for 2021, we will continue to
19 increase recruitment into the Police reserve Corps. We
20 are currently assembling a new class with a target start
21 date of September. We will be helping in Chief White's
22 downtown safety and security initiative. We've already
23 had a presence down in the Greektown area. We will expand
24 that with a focus on assisting the downtown services and
25 the overtime units with weekend support for both the

1 Greektown and the central business areas, particularly
2 some of the drag racing areas that need to be closed
3 down. Again, once the sworn members get those areas under
4 control the Reserves can come in and maintain those
5 shutdowns that those street shutdowns will allow sworn
6 personnel to move on to the next task. We are preparing
7 to launch a partnership with the citizens' radio patrol
8 with which we will partner with them and NPOs to help
9 address quality of life issues to document these
10 qualities of life issues. So (Audio Distortion). We are
11 expanding reserve member participation in community-
12 focused events, and we are extremely excited about this.
13 We are increasing opportunities for reserve members to
14 expand beyond traditional frontline reserve duties and
15 into other duties such as youth mentorship through pal,
16 community wellness, and other civic outreach activities.
17 I'll speak more on that in a moment. And again, I did
18 mention the continuing education program. We tried to get
19 that off the ground last year, but we were simply unable
20 during the pandemic.

21 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Chief Lewis, you have one minute a
22 wrapped up, you are over your time.

23 RESERVE ASSISTANT CHIEF LEWIS: Okay, great. Thank
24 you, sir. I'm just going to go through here real quick.
25 Our two big focuses are recruitment. We want to get our

1 numbers up into the Police Reserve Corps and again, our
2 community division is a very significant effort here.
3 This is going to allow a lot of our long serving members
4 with 25, 35, 40 years in the Reserve Corps to transition
5 over to a more community service focus. We're going to
6 retain these members and hope it (Audio Distortion)
7 together. And now, it's an incredible expansion of the
8 opportunities to get our folks working with you. And
9 since I am overtime, I will now move on to questions.

10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay. Commissioners, do we have
11 any questions for Chief Lewis Reservist? Yes, ma'am,
12 Commissioner Burch. Yes. Ma'am.

13 COMMISSIONER BURCH: I thank you.

14 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Bernard afterward.

15 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Okay. I just want to say the
16 veterans also, can they be used in place of say if the
17 recruiting officers are unavailable, can they visit an
18 event and register people that wish to be police
19 officers; Do they do that?

20 RESERVE ASSISTANT CHIEF LEWIS: Reserve Police
21 Reservists don't typically handle recruiting for sworn
22 members. That being said, we can gather information and
23 make sure that that information goes over. We have a
24 partnership with recruiting. We would not step into their
25 shoes, but we would make sure that we're there to answer

1 questions and make sure that they are connected with
2 somebody for recruiting.

3 COMMISSIONER BURCH: So they can't do it, bottom
4 line. They can't do it.

5 RESERVE ASSISTANT CHIEF LEWIS: We can't screen them,
6 but we can make sure that they aren't lost in the
7 shuffle. And we can follow up until a member of the
8 recruiting staff gets involved and can maintain that
9 relationship until the.

10 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Okay. I just want you to know,
11 they've been invited the recruiters many times to all of
12 the markets that we have on the east coast and the west
13 side. So they have to take advantage of that, sir.

14 RESERVE ASSISTANT CHIEF LEWIS: Sure. Absolutely.
15 Yes.

16 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I just want to congratulate
17 you on an excellent report. I frequently get questions
18 about being on the reserves or actually a banker asked
19 me, Chase Bank and he wanted to be on the, on the
20 reserves. And so this report is really good. I can share
21 it and you give to people who want to be on the reserves,
22 so they'll really know what they're signing up for and
23 how it works. Thank you very much.

24 RESERVE ASSISTANT CHIEF LEWIS: Thank you,
25 Commissioner. And we would love to have them. We're in a

1 recruiting blitz right now.

2 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: And he speaks Spanish. Okay.

3 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Assistant Chief Lewis.
4 I wanted to say on behalf of the Board we know there's a
5 bill pending in Lansing. We hope to interact with that
6 bill shortly. And I want to say I started my career in
7 71, 72, working with the Reserves and I worked with them
8 in four different Precincts and they are main stay. They
9 are more trained, more certified in this day and age. So
10 they relieve officer of duties they shouldn't have to
11 perform. Give it to the Reserve, but they do an extra
12 job. And you heard from the training process Commander
13 Hope, thank you for interaction, that leadership. So I
14 think it's crucial that we're able to maintain the
15 Reserve as if you'd like Commissioner Bernard, if you
16 know, anyone want to join, not the DPD, who want to join
17 the Reserve, then recruit them. And you know who to
18 contact. Thank you. We move on to, Ms. White,

19 MRS. WHITE: Yes. Through the Chair, Honorable Board,
20 if you would please refer to the agenda that lists all of
21 the incoming correspondence for this week and they are as
22 follows the DPD facial recognition report for the week of
23 May 31st through June 6th, 2021. And please note that
24 staff continues to review those reports and submits
25 various data reports to you for your consideration in

1 that regard. The second item, the request for change of
2 duty status to administrative leave without pay, but with
3 medical benefits for police officer Alexander [01:25:00
4 inaudible] badge 2766 assigned to the 6th Precinct. Again
5 staff and the city law department are in the process of
6 reviewing that packet submission. And we'll share a
7 report for your consideration from the city law, and from
8 the BOPC staff. You also received the Human Resources
9 Report as well as various other staff reports consisting
10 of, but not limited to the MCOLE summary that was held
11 yesterday, entitled role of first-line supervisors and
12 facilitating change in law enforcement.

13 MRS. WHITE: You also received a staff memorandum
14 regarding the summary of the Detroit Charter Revision
15 proposed changes. And please note that the Detroit women
16 league of voters will be hosting a panel discussion this
17 coming Tuesday from 6 to 7:30 PM via zoom entitled
18 redesigning the Detroit Police Commission, where they
19 will be exploring the recommendations made to the City
20 Charter Revision Commission in regards to the Board of
21 Police Commissioners and the police and exploring those
22 impacts. I will be speaking on the panel discussion as
23 well as a representative from the City Charter Revision
24 Commission. Additionally, you also received various
25 correspondences about the annual Board training that is

1 upcoming June 25th through June 26 for your
2 consideration. And that training is a very extensive
3 training. We've been working very hard to put that
4 information together for you. So we look forward to
5 holding that panel discussion and those various training
6 workshops in connection with the DPD department
7 executives, as well as other external instructors who
8 will be providing various trainings for your
9 consideration. And that concludes the incoming
10 correspondence. Thank you.

11 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, Ms. White. Unfinished
12 business. New business.

13 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Yes, unfinished, wait, wait.

14 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Okay. Unfinished is I want
15 everybody to know the two city reservoir project is going
16 very well. The youngest artist that we have is 14 years
17 old. So he's probably, I think he's like 16 now. Because
18 we started this reservoir project in 2018, but because of
19 COVID, it was cut down, but I want to thank Commissioner
20 Brown and Hope. When we began that project, they were out
21 there with us. So I just want to let everybody know we're
22 back into business with the support of Rochelle Reilly
23 and also Sam Koons under the direction of the Mayor. So
24 letting you know the murals are coming back on the
25 Reservoir. Isn't that wonderful.

1 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, ma'am, that is great.

2 CHAIRPERSON BELL: New business. Announcement.

3 COMMISSIONER JONES: Well through the Chair. Well I'm
4 pleased to announce. I would like for the community to
5 mark their calendars. We'll be having our Walk for
6 Justice 3, downtown at Rivard Atwater. This is going to
7 be on June 19th. This is a walk for justice and we're
8 inviting families to come out, who have had a family
9 member victimized by gun violence. Homicide detective,
10 especially with Captain May. They've been absolutely
11 supper with regards to, communicating with families that
12 have had members lost to gun violence, but maybe they
13 hadn't quite been getting updates or had not been able to
14 get in touch with the detective in charge. They've been
15 absolutely fabulous with providing them with
16 opportunities to bridge that gap between themselves and
17 the community to let them know that they're concerned
18 about the justice that their loved one is doing, that the
19 family is doing. So we invite you again. June 19th Revard
20 Atwater Street, 9:00 AM. That's on a Saturday at 9:00 AM
21 come out and we definitely want to thank Captain May and
22 also Commander Hope for her participation in our previous
23 walks. Thank you very much, and I look forward to seeing
24 you there. We're going to help to get you some answers.

25 COMMISSIONER BURCH: New business.

1 CHAIRPERSON BELL: No ma'am, we had announcement.

2 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Well this is announcement. This
3 is an announcement Chair Bell. I just want to say that if
4 anybody's looking for a job at Angela's at Belmont or
5 Southfield, the famous Angela store, if you're looking
6 for a position as a greeter you know how that is, a
7 famous store like it is. And also at that store, we're
8 going to have a book signing that's by Archer Dennard.
9 And that's to all of the people that used to work at the
10 student transportation department at Matt and Trumbo
11 called the east side bus terminal. That was Mr. Archie
12 denied. So we're going to have a book signing. All these
13 good things are coming up now because people are free to
14 go back outside. So anybody needs a job, a woman or
15 gentlemen, give me a call and we can discuss it. Thank
16 you, Chair Bell.

17 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Mr. Brown.

18 MR. ROB BROWN: Yes. Good afternoon. Mr. Chair, and
19 this Honorable Board, the announcements for the BOPC next
20 virtual meetings, June 17th, 2021 at 3:00 PM, June 24th,
21 2021 at 3:00 PM. And Mr. Chair, I go straight into our
22 [01:30:23 inaudible] public comments.

23 MR. ROB BROWN: Thank you. Your first 3 speakers
24 would be Lieutenant Mark, Young LSA, President CAC Chair,
25 Scotty Bowman, and Ms. Bernice Smith. Lieutenant Young.

1 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Next speaker.

2 LIEUTENANT YOUNG: Hello, can you hear me?

3 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, sir. Go ahead.

4 LIEUTENANT YOUNG: First of all, I wanted to say to
5 my colleagues most of my colleagues who are going to
6 sacrifice this summer and time away from their family,
7 you are appreciated more than, you know. What's really
8 sad is that you have to do so based on speeders,
9 drifters, lawlessness of individuals that have been
10 empowered with criminality, and also people want to come
11 down to Greektown and destroy our great city.

12 LIEUTENANT YOUNG: Those men and women deserve all
13 that they could get from this from the city. And I asked
14 you again to be mindful of your rhetoric because some of
15 the same rhetoric empowers some of the actions of these
16 people. We've always had an outstanding police department
17 in the City of Detroit and we've been perfect, no, but
18 we've been better than most. And we're going to continue
19 to be better. I yield the rest of my time?

20 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you.

21 MR. ROB BROWN: Mr. Bowman. Mr. Bowman.

22 MR. BOWMAN: Okay. I was looking for the unmute
23 thing. Can you hear me?

24 MR. ROB BROWN: Yes.

25 MR. BOWMAN: Okay, great. Well, first of all, I just

1 wanted to say that, you know, in the past week I've heard
2 a lot of misinformation. I could guess I could put it
3 together and call it another example of the big lie
4 tactic at work. Specifically regarding charter revisions.
5 I was on the charter revision focus group to work on
6 portions regarding the Board of Police Commissioners and
7 civilian oversight of the Detroit Police Department, and
8 I know that what we would be doing would be saving money,
9 not costing the city more money. The big lie is that the
10 charter revision would bankrupt the city. And that's just
11 not true. People will use that though, if they're
12 objecting to other things that might be more popular, for
13 instance Chairman or de facto Chairman at sometimes Bell,
14 he wanted to have half as many meetings and we didn't put
15 that in there because we've seen the Board of Police
16 Commissioners is way too important for that. However, not
17 to fear if you think, you know, a meeting every week is
18 too much, we did better than every other week. You don't
19 have to go to any meetings because you would have a
20 conflict of interest. We did that. We got rid of the use
21 of military equipment by the police, the use of chemical
22 weapons by police and various things that really aren't
23 should not be part of policing. We have a revision that
24 provides for police that are friendly to the community
25 and also can enforce the laws to protect the community

1 from criminals. Thank you.

2 MR. ROB BROWN: Miss Bernie Smith.

3 MS. SMITH: Commissioners, good afternoon. I am very,
4 very glad that Mark Young was attending the DABO Center
5 the other day and he spoke about the police department
6 and he was very, very, he was just upsetting, the fact
7 that a lot of us people are not giving our police
8 department enough credit. And I agree with him. We do
9 need to give our police more credit than what they have
10 been given. First of all, we could give them a raise.
11 I've said that for the last two years, but in the
12 meantime, we'll just wait and see what happens. I
13 wouldn't like to let the Detroiters know, do not do not.
14 Again. I say, go into any booth and vote for that
15 charter because the fact is we know what's going on. They
16 will have to use monies and we need the money for the
17 Detroiters to pay their taxes, pay their water bill or
18 whatever it needs to be done.

19 MS. SMITH: So I advise you to be very careful when
20 you see what's going on in regards to this coming
21 election. Also, I would like to let all of, you know,
22 we're going to be good this year. As far as our crime is
23 concerned because we got a good Chief that's coming into
24 office. And I do hope that he will be able to counteract
25 a lot of this crime that's going on. Because I'm so tired

1 of seeing it on TV all the time, shooting and killings
2 and going out, this is a better city and we know better
3 and we should do better. Again. I give kudos to my police
4 department and I hope they continue to be the best that
5 they can have, especially here in Detroit, because I know
6 they're going to get better. All we have to do is just
7 give them a lot of courage and give them some kind of -
8 in other words, just tell them you love them and for them
9 to be careful, that's all I got to say. Take care.

10 MR. ROB BROWN: Mr. Chair, your next three speakers
11 will be Mrs. Sharon Parnell, followed by Mr. Tim Johnson,
12 followed by Minister Eric Blunt. Ms. Parnell.

13 MS. PARNELL: Hi, the 2nd Precinct is my Precinct. I
14 do appreciate my Commander, Captain. All my MPO is I'm
15 not going to name no names because I don't want to leave
16 nobody out. Thank you for all you do for me. And I have
17 no problem with calling about the speeding and the donuts
18 they come out and they take care of everything. And I
19 just want to say, congratulations, Elaine and Captain
20 Potts on your new positions over in Ohio. If they don't
21 want you, come on back to Detroit. We love you and take
22 care and be safe. I yield my time.

23 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay. Mr. Brown.

24 MR. ROB BROWN: Yes, sir.

25 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Can you just pause one second. I

1 want to knowledge, Ms. Butler, who was the president of
2 the 2nd Precinct police community relations for doing
3 outstanding job? She engaged the community in so many
4 areas and normally, she would attend our meeting in
5 person, but looking forward to perhaps next month her
6 involvement, but she's a key part of that Precinct. Thank
7 you, Mr. Brown, go ahead.

8 MR. ROB BROWN: Yes, sir. Mr. Johnson,

9 MR. JOHNSON: I say, thank you to the Commissioners
10 and definitely to the brave men and women at DPD.
11 Definitely appreciate what you do, sorry that you're
12 dealing with all this rhetoric right now that, that you
13 don't deserve and just know that it's a bunch of people
14 out here that really support you despite what you might
15 see in the media. Two comments, number one, definitely
16 just want to advocate for the speed sticks. So therefore
17 you all can have the tools that you need to deal with the
18 drifters and also just really congratulations on getting
19 all of these illegal guns off the street with the work
20 that you're doing. Because I think definitely when we
21 have cracks in our foundation with people getting away
22 with speeding it normally leads to other crimes and
23 things like that. So deaf and good job on that.

24 MR. JOHNSON: And number two, I didn't hear, I heard
25 about noise ordinances being broken, but a lot of people

1 in my district, district five or dealing with the
2 drifters, not only going up and down the street, but
3 playing their music very loud and fireworks that, you
4 know, one and two in the morning, along with the modified
5 mufflers. I did hear next door, that the police are going
6 to be equipped with radar to you know, check for sound
7 decibel levels. So I definitely just want to advocate and
8 support for that because, you know, imagine if you can
9 pull over some additional people for that, how many
10 additional guns and different things that you can get off
11 the street. So that's all I have to say. Thank you.

12 MR. ROB BROWN: Minister Eric Blunt.

13 MINISTER BLUNT: Yes. Board. Can you hear me?

14 COMMISSIONER JONES: Yes.

15 MINISTER BLUNT: Yes, Board. Can you hear me?

16 COMMISSIONER JONES: Yes.

17 MINISTER BLUNT: I'm Minister Eric Blunt from Sacred
18 Heart Catholic Church in Detroit. This week, the Justice
19 Department will require officers and all of its law
20 enforcement agencies to wear body-worn cameras when
21 making arrests and serving warrants. Deputy Attorney
22 General, Lisa Monaco issued this directive to the FBI,
23 the US Marshall Service, Drug Enforcement Administration,
24 Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms, and Explosives,
25 requiring these agencies to develop a policy within 30

1 days. Organizations committed to justice in regards to
2 police misconduct will continue to demand that DPD, and
3 now all of these federal agencies quickly release body-
4 worn camera footage on all arrests planned and unplanned
5 or serving search warrants. This requirement is an
6 important turn for justice and transparency as it signals
7 a ray of hope for the beginning of a process of justice.
8 In the case of disciplines, if suspension without pay,
9 why not include without benefits, put some teeth behind
10 your discipline. As far as the elections go, is this the
11 first time in the history of this Commission that both
12 the Chair and the Vice-Chair are appointees? If so, this
13 is a real problem due to each appointee continuously
14 practicing the art of deception by materially,
15 misrepresenting themselves by giving themselves the false
16 title of At-Large. Appointees on this Board also any
17 Commissioner receiving funds from the city with an
18 organization or agency bearing their names should resign
19 or be removed.

20 MR. ROB BROWN: Mr. Chair, your next three speakers
21 would be Mr. Jerry Sanders., followed by Ms. Brenda
22 Butler, followed by Mac Farr.

23 MR. SANDERS: Board, this is, am I being heard?

24 MR. ROB BROWN: Yes.

25 MR. SANDERS: Okay. I have a few statements I want to

1 make. I stay on the Southwest side of Detroit, near
2 Michigan and McGraw over by Livernois. I have a
3 continuous problem that I've called 911 about ATVs and
4 motorbikes being rolled up and down my street at
5 excessive speeds. I've stopped the police numerous times,
6 going down the street, no more than two cars behind the
7 ATVs asking them what they're going to do about this.
8 I've called 911. I've called the Precincts. I've been
9 told that 911 should be called just to be told by the
10 police officers that they cannot pursue. They cannot do
11 anything. I've had officers watched the ATVs go by and
12 not do a thing, not turn a siren on, not turn a horn on,
13 not stopping them and saying, do not do this.

14 MR. SANDERS: I am concerned because we have given
15 away the comforts of the community to save the city
16 negligent lawsuits, I should not have to suffer because
17 the city has been sued for causing accidents after
18 pursuing an ATV. And now I have to listen to this uproar
19 through my community. I'm concerned that this is what the
20 city has decided to do, because they are not thinking
21 about the tax paying good citizens. They're thinking
22 about the criminals and their pockets. So I would like to
23 know when something is going to be changed and something
24 is going to show a sign of sunshine for the good citizens
25 of the city. And the criminals are actually going to get

1 put behind bars and restrained from doing the things that
2 are causing this community to be depleted and
3 dilapidated. Thank you. I yield the rest of my time.

4 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Mr. Brown.

5 MR. ROB BROWN: Yes, sir.

6 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I don't recall the speaker's name,
7 but I would hope that he reaches out to the Commanding
8 Officer of his Precinct and also the Deputy Chief. So if
9 he want to text us, we would make sure we do a follow
10 with his concerns. So it concerned me that he raised this
11 issue, but we're addressing those issues. So if we have
12 that information, we can make sure we're able to contact
13 his Commanding Officer at his Precinct and also the
14 Deputy Chief of that area. Mr. Brown, go ahead.

15 MR. ROB BROWN: Yes, sir. Ms. Brenda Butler.

16 MS. BUTLER: Good afternoon, Commissioner and guests.
17 My question is on a past meeting, the public requested a
18 presentation by the police department on the no-knock
19 warrant. So has that presentation been done because I did
20 miss a couple of meetings?

21 CHAIRPERSON BELL: We will share that information
22 with you in terms of some form while we meet. We ask
23 address on issues so we would do a follow-up for the
24 public and for you. Thank you.

25 MS. BUTLER: You say you would share what now?

1 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Your concerns, we would address
2 those concerns.

3 MS. BUTLER: Okay. But when is the public, going to
4 get a presentation by the police department?

5 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I just want to briefly respond to
6 you, okay. We're going to move on. Go ahead, your time is
7 running.

8 MS. BUTLER: My time is not up.

9 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I said your time is running, go
10 ahead.

11 MS. BUTLER: Okay. Thank you. Thank you. Okay. So, my
12 question will be again to our new Chairman of the Board,
13 Commissioner Holley. Could you please see that the public
14 gets a presentation on the no-knock warrant because we
15 have an understanding that there is a bill that's being
16 listened to and put forth in Lansing regarding the no-
17 knock warrant in Michigan? So please, please have a
18 presentation for the public on this matter. Thanks a lot
19 and have a great evening.

20 MR. FARR: Good afternoon. My name is Mac Farr. I
21 live in Pingree Park. We are pleased to see a modest
22 decrease in the volume severity and intensity of drag
23 racing in Detroit. And we would also like to use this
24 opportunity to urge the Board of Police Commissioners, to
25 direct the command staff of the department, to accelerate

1 the acquisition and deployment of stop sticks. With the
2 recent addition of the helicopter unit, there is a
3 noticeable decrease in drag racing, but there is still
4 much to do in our neighborhoods for traffic calling.
5 Residents believe that officers in squad cars need
6 additional resources to apprehend drag racers and
7 drifters. Stop sticks are an effective demobilization
8 device that when used correctly can deflate tires on the
9 offending vehicles. Part of the reason that these drag
10 racers and drifters come to Detroit has to do with the
11 widespread perception that officers here are powerless to
12 enforce. Please help to hasten this process to get stop
13 sticks in the field this summer. They are an effective
14 tool that are used in many, many locations, including
15 with the Michigan State Police, as well as other
16 municipal departments in the state of Michigan. We
17 believe that Detroit deserves the same tools as our other
18 suburban counterparts. And I'd also like to use this
19 opportunity to also voice support for the rank and file
20 police in the department, and also to urge folks to vote
21 against the charter amendment. Thank you.

22 MR. ROB BROWN: Mr. Chair, your next 3 speakers will
23 be Ms. Michelle George, followed by Ms. Brenda Hill
24 followed by Ms. Tawana Petty. Ms. George.

25 MS. GEORGE: Yes, sir. Hi, Mr. Brown. To Chairman

1 Bell. Can you hear me, Mr. Brown, can you hear me?

2 MR. ROB BROWN: Yes.

3 MS. GEORGE: Okay. Thank you. To Chairman Bell and
4 the Honorable Board. Well, first of all, I want to
5 congratulate the Chiefs Elaine Bryant and Captain Potts
6 and Assistant Chief Stair. We are losing some remarkable
7 talent, so I know they would do an excellent job in
8 Columbus, also I know Commander Hope is still here. So we
9 thank God for Commander Hope as well. I also want to say
10 Commander Mounsey is doing an excellent job and the
11 officers at the second police Precinct. To Lieutenant
12 Young, I know we do pray for the officers. I know I do.
13 Our prayer team, we pray for the officers and we pray for
14 you all as well. I don't like to say with respect mother
15 Bernice. Mother Bernice that charter, we have the right
16 to put that charter on the ballot. They were not honest
17 with that charter and I'm on the call with the financial
18 review commission when they do the presentation. And we
19 sat on those calls. I was one of them for 4 hours putting
20 things in that charter, but what's not going to happen is
21 if they're going to tell us not to at least vote. That's
22 the issue. They don't want to go on national TV in a
23 minute. So somebody about to do a talk about it
24 nationally anyway. No, we're going to vote on that
25 charter. We're going to vote, but like you said, we have

1 a right to vote and thank the Lord for the Michigan
2 Supreme Court that put a stay on that. So I just want to
3 say that was my comment with the officers and everything
4 like that. We do pray for Detroit officers and are going
5 to make sure that they get more money and we do encourage
6 because we know that they're putting their lives on the
7 line every day, but, you know, we have issues with law
8 enforcement across the country. One has nothing to do
9 with the other, but we do pray for our officers. I want
10 Lieutenant Young to know that.

11 MR. ROB BROWN: Ms. Brenda Hill.

12 MS. HILL: Yes. Can you hear me?

13 MR. ROB BROWN: Yes.

14 MS. HILL: Yes. I have three issues. It was just a
15 travesty committed by the Commission today. We have two
16 unelected Commissioners as far as Chair and Vice-Chair.
17 That should never happen. I mean, I don't believe Chair
18 Bell should be chief pooper scooper, but however he was
19 elected and there should at least be one person that was
20 elected by the people. And that's what this city is
21 voters and not appointments, and that should be redone.
22 And you can see how the vote went right along who was
23 appointed lines. Also for Chair to chastise Linda Bernard
24 for stating that Ferndale and Royal Oak police hasn't
25 been terrorizing. And I'll use the word, terrorizing our

1 people for decades, for centuries, as a matter of fact,
2 since their inception is a fact. Gross Point and all the
3 cities outside of 8-mile Road. And for Chair Bell to say,
4 well, just followed the law. That has not been an issue,
5 it's being black and living in Detroit that has been an
6 issue. And they have been terrorizing people over and
7 over and over again. I could go further and I'd like to
8 thank Captain Potts and Deputy Chief Elaine Bryant. I've
9 worked with both of them personally. They've been
10 fantastic and thank you for your service and you need to
11 get rid of facial recognition. It does not work. It has
12 not worked. And that's a terrorist act on this city.

13 MR. ROB BROWN: Ms. Tawana Petty.

14 MS. PETTY: Yes. Can you hear me?

15 MR. ROB BROWN: Yes.

16 MS. PETTY: There's always an uproar when black youth
17 are engaged in dehumanizing behavior, but a lot of young
18 people engage in this type of behavior realized a long
19 time ago that they are only visible to the people around
20 them when they start acting out. The fact that many
21 belong to family, struggling with poverty unaffordable
22 water, unaffordable housing, lack of internet access and
23 inadequate education and recreational activities only
24 becomes visible after those young people are either
25 harmed or do something considered illegal. Their

1 frustrations and anger about their living conditions only
2 becomes a concern for many when that anger leaves the
3 privacy of those young folk homes and makes it out into
4 the streets. At some point, respiriting, empathy, and
5 compassion for our young people and their conditions has
6 to enter the strategy. If we don't care about our youth,
7 who will, if we don't make sure they are eating, well-
8 hydrated have safe spaces to live and play, who will?
9 It's very sad that proposal P is under attack when it's
10 one of our last chances to put some humane practices in
11 place. None of the folks speaking against it have
12 participated in the process yet they are supporting voter
13 suppression. I've worked with so many young people in
14 Detroit who have told me that nobody gives a F about them
15 and it breaks my heart. Our babies shouldn't have to
16 navigate this world feeling unloved. At some point, their
17 wellbeing has to become a priority prior to their
18 engagement with the legal system. History and the present
19 has taught us time and time again that we will not be
20 able to surveil and police our way into a better society.
21 We all want to return home safe to our families. Safer
22 communities are not blighted or disinvested in neglected
23 or abandoned. They are resources. The formula is there.
24 If you need to see it, look at the communities where non-
25 black children are actually treated like human beings.

1 Thank you.

2 MR. ROB BROWN: Mr. Chair, your next and last speaker
3 would be Ms. Brenda Andrews.

4 MS. ANDREWS: Okay. Can you hear me?

5 MR. ROB BROWN: Yes.

6 MS. ANDREWS: Okay, great. Thank you so much. Good
7 afternoon. Good evening. Chairperson Bell, Commissioners.
8 My Commissioner, Linda Bernard, DC Fitzgerald, and his
9 staff, and also to Interim Chief White. I am Brenda Goss
10 Andrews, retired Detroit Police Deputy Chief. As
11 Commander, I was in charge HR and personnel, which
12 included police recruiting, selection and hiring. The
13 fact of those leaving our departments after getting
14 training has been going on for many years, much too long.
15 I raised this issue in the latter part of 1999 into the
16 21st century. So since so many of our recruits were
17 getting trained and leaving sometimes right after they
18 graduated the academy to other agencies. In fact, I used
19 to keep a growing list of what agencies these recruits
20 went to. We were unable to get support from the
21 legislature at that time. And there might be some court
22 documents that indicated that this was unconstitutional.
23 I hope this will not be a hurdle today. I support this
24 long overdue bill. I support the resolution of this
25 Honorable Commission put forward, and I lend my voice and

1 my experience to this discussion. I will reach out to
2 Representative Carter and anyone else that is interested
3 in may reach out to me as well. Thank you so much for
4 your service.

5 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you.

6 MR. ROB BROWN: That was the last speaker, Mr. Chair.

7 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, Mr. Brown. The Chair
8 will make a motion for adjournment.

9 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: So moved.

10 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Support.

11 COMMISSIONER JONES: Support.

12 CHAIRPERSON BELL: It's been properly moved and
13 supported. Discussion. Those in favor, aye.

14 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

15 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Those oppose. We stand adjourned.

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
