1 MS. WHITE: Good afternoon again and welcome to the
2 Detroit Board of Commissioners meeting. And please note

24 MRS. WHITE: And now Chairperson Holley.

1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much, Jim Holley,
2 Chairperson of the Board of Police Commissioners. Thank
3 you all for attending our meeting today and for viewing
4 the meeting on the cable network. I'm calling this
5 meeting to order. I'm asking at this particular time that
6 the invocation be given by Chaplain Marion Lockley.

7 CHAPLAIN LOCKLEY: Most kind of loving heavenly
8 Father, we come before you this afternoon, giving you all
9 praise, glory, and honor, thank you for your presence
10 among us during this meeting. I ask that you touch each
11 speaker's heart, Lord, and give them the wisdom and the
12 knowledge in order to express themselves. Be with each
13 and every one, we ask this in your precious name, Amen.

14 COMMISSIONERS: Amen.

15 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much. And thank you
16 for a beautiful prayer and thank you for being with us
17 today. At this particular time, Mr. Brown.

18 MR. ROB BROWN: Yes. Good afternoon, Mr. Chair, and
19 this Honorable Board and citizens of Detroit. Can you
20 hear me?

21 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Yes, we can hear you, Mr. Brown,
22 if I may, through the Chair, but Chair Holley's voice is
23 not as loud as it probably should be.

24 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I'll do better.

1 COMMISSIONER HOLT: I think it's your system, Chair
2 Holley. I don't think it's you okay.

3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Mr. Brown.

4 MR. ROB BROWN: The Board or Police Commission
5 Mission summary. The Board of Police Commissioners BOPC
6 is a civilian agency that exercises supervisory control
7 and oversight of the Detroit Police Department, DPD as
8 set forth in the Charter. The Board has 11 members, 70
9 elected by District, 4 appointed by the Mayor with the
10 consent of Detroit City Council. The Board meets every
11 week as a committee of the whole, including 12
12 community/evening meetings in the districts. The BOPC is
13 the oversight agency of the police department. The
14 departmental policy, rules, regulation governance, the
15 Detroit Police Department are jointly developed by the
16 Mayor, the Chief of Police, and this Board. The Board has
17 superior power under the Charter that can be used for
18 investigative purposes. The Commission also reviews and
19 approves the DPD budget pursuant to the Charter,
20 investigates non-criminal citizen complaints, access to
21 find out authority in opposing or reviewing the
22 discipline of employees of the department; receives and
23 hears the qualification appeals from police recruits,
24 hoping to enter the Detroit Police Academy. The Board
25 makes an annual report to the Mayor, City Council, and

1 the public of the Board's activities and accomplishments.

2 That's the reading of the summary, Mr. Chair.

3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you very much, Mr. Brown.

4 At this particular time, we'll have a roll call, Ms.

5 White.

6 MRS. WHITE: Yes. Through the Chair, Vice-

7 Chairperson, Martin Jones.

8 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Good afternoon, everyone. This is
9 the roll call and we're going to start with the Chairman
10 of the Board, Jim Holley.

11 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Present.

12 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Vice-Chair Martin Jones, present.
13 District 1, be acknowledged.

14 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Commissioner Darryl Brown
15 present.

16 VICE-CHAIR JONES: District 2, Linda Bernard be
17 acknowledged. District 2, Linda Bernard? District 3.

18 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I know that she's here.

19 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Yes, she was. All right, we'll
20 come back to her. District 3, Shirley Burch. District 3.

21 COMMISSIONER HOLT: She's muted.

22 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Shirley Burch, you're muted.

23 COMMISSIONER BURCH: I apologize. Commissioner
24 Shirley Burch. Third District. Respect and love where you
25 live.

1 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Thank you, District 4.

2 COMMISSIONER BELL: Willie Bell, present.

3 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Thank you. District 5. District 5?
4 District 6, Lisa Carter?

5 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Good afternoon. Lisa Carter,
6 present.

7 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Thank you, District 7.

8 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Good afternoon to everyone.
9 Police Commissioner William M. Davis, District 7.
10 Officers, love where you work. Officers, love where you
11 work.

12 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Thank you, Commissioner Davis. At-
13 Large Jesus Hernandez.

14 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Good afternoon, everyone
15 present. A very brief note. Could we on the agenda make
16 corrections? Linda Bernard is listed as District 3. Annie
17 Holt, her name is misspelled. Just a few other
18 corrections, please. Thank you.

19 COMMISSIONER JONES: Thank you, Commissioner
20 Hernandez, and At-Large, Commissioner, Annie Holt.

21 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Good afternoon. Annie Holt, At-
22 Large.

23 VICE-CHAIR JONES: All right. Thank you very much.
24 Ms. White, do we have a quorum?

1 MRS. WHITE: Yes, sir. Through the Chair, there is a
2 quorum.

3 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Thank you.

4 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you, Vice-Chair Jones, and
5 thank all of you for being here. At this particular time,
6 we basically have the approval of the agenda for July the
7 22nd, 2021. I call for a motion.

8 COMMISSIONER CARTER: So moved.

9 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Second.

10 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Discussion?

11 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Yes. Once we approve the agenda
12 with the necessary corrections that Commissioner
13 Hernandez pointed out.

14 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay, very good. Any other
15 corrections? Thank you so much. All those in favor, say
16 aye.

17 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

18 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Oppose. The motion carries with
19 it the necessary corrections. I'd like to have the
20 approval of the agenda for July 15th, which is today. I
21 also need... (Audio Distortion) the minutes, I'm sorry, for
22 July 15th, 2021.

23 VICE-CHAIR JONES: So moved.

24 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you. Second?

25 COMMISSIONER HOLT: I second.

1 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Support.

2 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Any discussion? All in favor,
3 say aye.

4 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

5 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Motion carries as well.

6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Excuse me, Mr. Chairman. You
7 couldn't hear me in the other room. This is Linda
8 Bernard. I'm present, but we wanted to modify the agenda
9 for the closed session for today.

10 COMMISSIONER HOLT: What?

11 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: What Commissioner Bernard is
12 saying, we need to have... I was trying to get it in
13 there... have a closed session, added to the agenda, just
14 for about 10, 15 minutes. Basically talking about the
15 recommendations to the Mayor's Office for the chief of
16 police. It'll take about 20 minutes, but some new
17 information came to us. We want to add that to the agenda
18 for today with your permission.

19 VICE-CHAIR JONES: So moved.

20 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Support.

21 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: All in favor, say aye.

22 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

23 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much. And thank you
24 for your patience with me as well. At this particular
25 time, Ms. White, can you introduce the Board's staff?

1 MRS. WHITE: Through the Chair? The Department of
2 Innovation and Technology...

3 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: I can hardly hear her.

4 MRS. WHITE: is our court reporter, Mr. Don
5 Handyside, and I would ask if there are any open
6 microphones and the background noise, if you could please
7 silence them at this time. And the following Board staff
8 members are in attendance, Mr. Robert Brown,
9 Administrative Specialist, Ms. Theresa Blossom, Community
10 Relations Coordinator, Investigator, Tiffany Stewart,
11 Interim Chief Investigator Lawrence Akbar, Supervising
12 Investigator Ansley Cromwell, Supervising Investigator,
13 LiSonya Sloan, Supervising Investigator, Rosalia Madrigal
14 and also Assistant Corporation Counsel, Erica Savage
15 Whitley. And that concludes the staff member's attendance
16 for today, sir.

17 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I don't see anyone from the
18 Chief of Police Department. Am I missing something?

19 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Are you saying you don't see?

20 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I got him now. AC Bettison?

21 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Yes, sir, he's on the call.

22 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes. Thank you so much, AC.
23 Thank you very much. Will you introduce those, if you've
24 got time to look around and basically introduce us to the
25 people that's there with you?

1 FIRST ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: Yes, sir. Thank you.
2 Chair Holley. I'll go through the list, of course, first
3 myself. I see Captain Jabbar Johnson. Sorry about this.
4 So I'll go through Captain Derek May from Homicide,
5 Captain Ladell from Internal Affairs, Director Chris
6 Graveline, Commander Kyra Hope, Second Deputy Chief Grant
7 Ha, Lieutenant Firsden, Officer Danielle Glass, Director
8 Reid Branche-Wilson, Sergeant Glenn Anderson from Police
9 Recruiting, Captain Tanya Leonard Gilbert.

10 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much. I just want
11 to acknowledge that Commissioner Burton is present at
12 this particular time. Are there any special guests Mrs.
13 White?

14 MRS. WHITE: Yes. Through the Chair. I have
15 notification of former State Representative Burt Johnson,
16 Ms. Marie Overall of State Representative Tyrone Carter's
17 Office, Community Advisory Council Chair, Scotty Bowman,
18 and a representative from State Representative Stephanie
19 Young's Office. Thank you.

20 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Oh, thank you so much. Thank
21 each and every one of you, thank you for your patience
22 with me as well. I just want to thank you once again for
23 attending today's meeting. Just two or three things I
24 just want to say that we need to deal with today, and
25 certainly before we get to the Chief's report. The next

1 steps regarding the chief of police, the national search
2 process, we need to talk about that a little bit today.
3 Last week I requested Commissioners to continue reviewing
4 the package that was provided for each and every one of
5 you. I'm asking each member to submit recommendations to
6 the Interim Board, Secretary White regarding your preface
7 for the top candidates. Staff had compiled a list of the
8 top candidates for the Board's consideration for the
9 Commissioners with submitted recommendations. I also
10 wanted to just remind you that the Board received my
11 recommendation and the staff report early today.

12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: And later in my report, we will
13 determine the next steps in regards to the top
14 candidates. So I just ask you to be patient, but at the
15 same time, these are important times that we are dealing
16 with, and so I just ask continually for your time and
17 your patience. Also, this week Board members received the
18 citizen's complaint investigations to contribute this
19 week to all Commissioners, to begin reading. Also, I want
20 you to know I had a meeting with OIC with their staff and
21 it was a wonderful meeting that I had with them and I
22 viewed the headquarters and had a good opportunity to
23 meet each and every one of them. I want to just say to
24 you, I learned that we need to basically hire about six
25 or seven OIC investigators.

1 Just want to add that to my report. And because they
2 are really overworked. Also, I just want to ask you
3 again, to continue to work with me in regards to what
4 we're trying to do and getting to the Mayor our report in
5 reference and our recommendations. But some of you have
6 not picked up your packages, have not basically, not some
7 of, but two or three of you have not submitted those to
8 me or Ms. White. I just want you to understand that
9 again, I need your cooperation, I need you to understand
10 how important it is for us to really work together in
11 regards to the things that we have to do that are on the
12 agenda. And so once again, I just want to thank God for
13 each and every one of you. And at this particular time, I
14 would ask AC Bettison for the report from the Chief's
15 Office. Are you there?

16 COMMISSIONER BURCH: He stepped away, evidently.

17 MRS. WHITE: Through the Chair, Honorable Board, and
18 Chair Holley, we are in the process of moving Chief White
19 to the panel gallery. So if staff co-hosts could please
20 also assist with that, and sign your name is under
21 Director Branche-Wilson. Thank you.

22 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay. Let me know when we get
23 there.

24 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Mr. Chair.

25 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes.

1 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: I am still requesting a list of
2 all the people to put in for it right now. This looks
3 like this is a questionable practice as it relates to the
4 selections for a new chief?

5 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Say it again, sir, I'm sorry.

6 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: I said, I am again requesting a
7 list of all the candidates to put in for it. This still
8 looks like this is a questionable practice, like the
9 cards and stacked.

10 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: And so you want more than the
11 seven we gave you. You want all 44?

12 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: I want all whoever put in for
13 it. Yes. I asked that last week and you said you were
14 going to call me.

15 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I said that?

16 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Yes, you did.

17 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Well, count it to my head and
18 not to my heart. And so I will work on that in the next
19 24 hours. Okay. I'm sorry about that.

20 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Okay, because I'm not going to
21 submit any names until I at least see the list of people
22 who put out for it because it still looks questionable,
23 sir.

24 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay. Yes, well, you make my life
25 miserable sometimes, you know? But I love you anyway.

1 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Well, you asked to be Chair.

2 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I did that. And so I will get
3 that to you. Chief, it's so good to see you, how are you
4 doing, man?

5 CHIEF WHITE: Good. Good afternoon, Chair Holley and,
6 Honorable Commission.

7 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: As asked you before, let's just
8 talk about the things that you really feel are important
9 to the community as well as to the Board. And then I have
10 the Board to ask questions. But I appreciate you being
11 here as well, but let's go to what you think is really
12 important, especially when it comes down to this report
13 that we all saw in the news.

14 CHIEF WHITE: Yes, sir. Through the Chair, good
15 afternoon Commissioners.

16 COMMISSIONERS: Good afternoon.

17 CHIEF WHITE: I will start with the tragic loss of
18 one of our active members and that was Sergeant Darryl
19 Cross or Corporal Darryl Cross on the 12th Precinct.
20 Corporal Cross was a 23 year veteran in the department.
21 He fell victim to an apparent heart attack last week. And
22 the 12th Precinct continues to grieve and mourn his loss.
23 Very popular Corporal spent his entire career at the 12th
24 Precinct and the lion's share of his career in special
25 ops. We've reached out to the family, and continue to

1 keep the family uplifted in prayer. Yesterday was a
2 balloon release for him. I attended that and there were a
3 number of members of the department there providing
4 support to the family. We're going to continue to extend
5 the department's services to them from Chaplains to our
6 peer support services.

7 CHIEF WHITE: It's just, as I indicated, a very
8 tragic loss for the officers of the 12th Precinct took it
9 pretty hard, and as the Commission is aware, there's been
10 a number of tragedies in the 12th Precinct over the past
11 couple of years. Today in the 11th Precinct, I attended a
12 family fun day for the officers. A number of officers
13 were there, we were able to talk with them, myself and
14 the command team. Assistant Chief Bettison was there as
15 well. It was really nice and positive to see the officers
16 relaxed and engaged. Many of them brought their children
17 out and it was a really nice event and that event
18 continues until 7:00 PM tonight.

19 CHIEF WHITE: Additionally, I know we've changed the
20 report from a crime perspective, but one of the things I
21 did want to mention was the tragic event that happened
22 yesterday on Pingree involving an 18-year-old and a 20-
23 year-old male. The 18-year-old is deceased. Right now we
24 continue to work on that case. Homicide is actively
25 investigating another tragic shooting in the city,

1 another issue of gun violence. Again, we talk a lot about
2 making different decisions and trying to develop
3 programming and assistance outside of policing where
4 people will make different decisions. But the unfortunate
5 reality is as soon as we lock one person up for one of
6 these tragic events, there's someone lining up to go to
7 jail right behind him. So we have to figure out a way to
8 disrupt this pipeline, the prison, and this, you know,
9 pipeline of poor decision-making and poor conflict
10 resolution.

11 CHIEF WHITE: But in any event, tragically an 18-
12 year-old young lady is deceased. A 20-year-old man is
13 fighting for his life. And we are actively looking for
14 the perpetrator. All we have right now is that the
15 suspects are driving a red late-model Ford expedition, or
16 I'm sorry, a fusion or focus. So anybody has any
17 information about that vehicle. I mean, a red Ford,
18 should stick out in a community. So if anybody saw
19 anything, a late model red Ford yesterday afternoon,
20 speeding away from the area or even driving around the
21 area, please share that information with us. The other
22 thing that happened this week, I'm very proud to announce
23 is that the department is moving forward with the CIT
24 crisis intervention program. We have implemented it in

1 the 12th Precinct with the goal of taking it citywide at
2 year's end.

3 CHIEF WHITE: And I don't know if the Commission had
4 an opportunity to see the press release on it or a press
5 briefing on it. But you could see that the officers are
6 very excited to be involved in the program. We've got
7 just under a hundred officers right now that's involved
8 in that program and we're looking to take it citywide, as
9 I indicated by the end of the year. It was a very dynamic
10 program that involves a number of different components.
11 One, in particular, is the escalation and working with
12 people who are in crisis with mental illness. It was
13 characterized as an alternative to force. That wasn't the
14 proper characterization by the media. It's a tool in the
15 officer's toolbox to use in those critical incidents. But
16 certainly not, you know, a replacement for force. The
17 officers in the department would engage in a forced
18 situation, only when necessary.

19 CHIEF WHITE: And so this doesn't take that authority
20 away from them. It just adds a tool. Oftentimes when
21 someone is in a mental health crisis, there's an
22 interpretation issue, depending on precisely which crisis
23 they're in, if it's bipolar or schizophrenia, they may
24 not be able to interpret communication at the level of
25 someone who's not in crisis. This gives the officers not

1 only an understanding of that but some tools to combat
2 it. So we're excited about that program. It's a very
3 promising program. I'm a firm believer in it. It's a
4 model policy around the country and I'm happy to be one
5 of the agencies that are adopting it early on. Finally,
6 as Commission Chair asked to brief the Honorable Board
7 out on the news report from channel 7 yesterday involving
8 Sergeant Kue, a very troubling and disappointing report
9 that has my full attention.

10 CHIEF WHITE: There are a number of complaints that
11 have been filed that my office is pulling to take a look
12 at and to see exactly what happened. One of the things
13 that's most concerning is one of the cases that was
14 dismissed, I'll be looking to understand why the case was
15 dismissed by one of the command officers in the
16 department, or if it was a current command officer,
17 former command officer. Those are the things we'll be
18 looking to understand what went into that thinking. But
19 preliminarily, I am very concerned so much that I have
20 reassigned him, pulled him off the street, put him in an
21 administrative capacity, and I'm going to be looking to
22 bring corrections to that matter very quickly. Our
23 department works very hard with the community. Our
24 community deserves policing excellence, and I will accept
25 nothing less. What I've seen thus far gives me grave

1 concerns about this particular sergeant's ability to
2 uphold the reputation of this agency and represent it in
3 a way that's consistent with our values. So I'll be
4 looking into that. I certainly don't want to render a
5 final decision in this forum, but I would just leave you
6 with that I have very serious concerns. With that, I will
7 take any questions.

8 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Vice-Chair Jones.

9 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Okay. As I call your name, please
10 be recognized. District 1. Darryl Brown. Do you have a
11 question for the Chief?

12 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Yes, I do. Chief, first of all,
13 thank you for attending the meeting today. We missed you
14 over the last few weeks. Secondly, I'm happy that the
15 crisis intervention program has taken off. I haven't had
16 a chance to really look at it. I know that last week I
17 spoke about the cahoots program that's really working and
18 effective out in Eugene, Oregon, where they using
19 alternative responders to that and not police officers
20 because I know that one of the things that people see
21 when they come out on a mental illness crisis, that they
22 look at the police if they're in those uniforms as a
23 threat. So I'd just like to know... I can sit down and
24 talk to you offline about it, but I would like to know
25 how we are going to address those issues by actually

1 using the police officers and have this program looked at
2 when we were doing the model for the crisis intervention
3 program.

4 CHIEF WHITE: I'm not familiar, through the Chair,
5 I'm not familiar with the cahoots program. The program
6 that I looked at, the CIT program, the program that we
7 implemented is something that I worked on before I
8 retired from the department last year. This is a program
9 that was built in Memphis. It serves as a model program,
10 but I'll take a look at cahoots. I know that some of what
11 you just mentioned, with regards to uniform presence is
12 part of the CIT. Again, depending on how reactive and
13 what condition a person suffers from there are times when
14 the uniform itself could be viewed as confrontational, or
15 it can be some confusion with the uniform. Having that
16 mental health professional in the car with the officer
17 who is not in uniform, obviously helps the situation. And
18 once the critical incident is made safe, we're able to
19 use those professional mental health providers to
20 deescalate and to act as a liaison from the officer to
21 the person in crisis to help alleviate those concerns.

22 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Thank you, Chief. I really
23 appreciate you just getting the ball rolling and starting
24 it in the right direction. Thank you.

25 CHIEF WHITE: No problem, sir. Thank you.

1 VICE-CHAIR JONES: The Vice-Chair recognizes District
2 2, Linda Bernard.

3 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Hi everyone. I'm sorry, I
4 can't get on my computer. For some reason, it takes...
5 you have to load into this building and that takes two
6 hours, and that's a whole other argument. But my question
7 to you Chief White actually relates to Officer Kue. I
8 believe that's how you pronounce his name. I'm very
9 concerned that there were 88 complaints lodged against
10 him based on the newspaper report. We only found that one
11 was sustained. I understand that you're doing your review
12 on your end to find out why that one that was sustained,
13 went to you, and then was dismissed within the Chief's
14 office. I'm requesting with the permission of the Board
15 and the Chair that we pull our files on those 88
16 complaints and that OCI provides the Board of Police
17 Commissioners, a report similar to the report that you're
18 requesting from your officers regarding how this could
19 conceivably have occurred, and no one, no red flag went
20 up on our end. The most important thing we do, of course,
21 is responding to the community regarding their
22 complaints, and to have this many complaints in a 12 year
23 period against one officer, all of which are actually are
24 racial. They don't seem to be gender-based. They seem to
25 be totally racial and, for that not to be red-flagged in

1 our office is a matter of concern for me. And I say that
2 because had we had 88 complaints about an officer
3 involving women, it would have been red-flagged at about
4 the fourth or fifth complaint, and for there to be 88 and
5 not to be red-flagged to our office, I mean, in a real
6 manner is of concern to me. So I'm just requesting with
7 the Chair's permission that OCI provides the Board with
8 that report. And I'd like to know who handled those
9 investigations as well. That's my only comment.

10 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Thank you, Commissioner. The Vice-
11 Chair recognizes Shirley Burch.

12 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Commissioner, Shirley Burch.
13 Thank you. I wanted to say to you, Chief White, I do not
14 expect you to be at our meetings unless it is really
15 necessary because your job, I think, should be out there
16 finding out what's going on in each of your Precincts
17 through your commanders. Sir, there are so many
18 complaints in number 11, that I'm embarrassed to say it.
19 I'm trying to help you, and all of you understand as
20 number 11 now is having a fun day. As I sit in my home,
21 there are three cars in a row racing, a hundred miles an
22 hour, sir, down the street. Now, wait, they hit my home.
23 They did not damage, but I had a crash into my own home.
24 So again, we know that these people are reckless, they
25 don't care, sir, but it's our job as citizens to be

1 protected. I'm not supposed to fear sitting in my house.
2 My neighbors are not supposed to call me continually and
3 say, there are no solutions clearly when they talk to me,
4 there are no solutions when they call the police. So sir,
5 please let it be a true investigation of leadership. I
6 really would appreciate that.

7 CHIEF WHITE: I would like to respond through the
8 Chair. So part of my visit to the 11th Precinct was a
9 family fun day. The other part was to meet with the
10 command team there. And we had a pretty lengthy
11 conversation about some of the conversations you and I
12 have had. Going forward as we've discussed, we will be
13 meeting with you personally, ma'am to discuss some of
14 your concerns, but as it relates to enforcement the issue
15 that you brought to my attention. Commissioner, I think
16 you may be aware, or maybe they failed to advise you,
17 there is an enforcement operation that starts in a short
18 period of time in your area, and I'll leave that there,
19 but it involves both DPD and our partners to address some
20 of the concerns that you've brought to our attention.
21 Were you made aware of that, ma'am?

22 COMMISSIONER BURCH: No, I was not.

23 CHIEF WHITE: Okay. Well, there will be an
24 enforcement operation that steps off in that area to
25 address some of those quality of life concerns that

1 you've brought to our attention this afternoon. We wanted
2 to launch it in the afternoon based on some of the
3 specific times that we've been provided that you've seen
4 these problems, so I look forward to a debriefing with
5 you on that at our meeting next week.

6 COMMISSIONER BURCH: I look forward to our meeting. I
7 really do. Thank you so much.

8 CHIEF WHITE: You're welcome.

9 VICE-CHAIR JONES: The Vice-Chair recognizes Willie
10 Bell, District 4.

11 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you Vice-Chair. I have a
12 couple questions, and concerns. I would hope that we
13 always keep the crime matter before us because this Board
14 needs to be informed of the issue that we're dealing with
15 and public safety, people want to know that. In the other
16 area that the CIT program that we rolled out at our
17 training session, we were all impressed by that, very
18 impressed by that. So the Commissioner who attended that
19 forum really got an overview of where we are with the
20 whole issue that some people talk about other States. But
21 the bottom line is that it's a very impressive program.
22 Perhaps we need to bring that for the Board in the near
23 future.

24 COMMISSIONER BELL: The other issue is that Sergeant
25 Kue sort of raised the flag, perhaps we as a Board need

1 to take a firm stand on promoting people if we take a
2 stand, and if they have to go to arbitration, so be it,
3 but we need to stand because we received an in depth
4 report. And when we view the motion reports of the
5 individual, and you have raised the flags on several
6 occasions about... well, we understand collective
7 bargain, et cetera, et cetera. But I think we need to
8 really address it because this sort of highlighted our
9 concern. And also when I look at it, I thought the Chief
10 handled these matters, and it's reverted back to the
11 commanding officer at that particular Precinct. And I
12 have issues with that because I think that should be
13 handled within the Chief's Office first that officer
14 command assignment.

15 COMMISSIONER BELL: The final issue is since we are
16 now reading the statement of our mission, I just had a
17 problem with that. I had a problem with it when I got
18 here three, four years ago, because it's sort of
19 misleading and I want the Chief to perhaps respond to
20 this. In article section 78034, act as the final
21 authority in posing or reviewing discipline employees of
22 the department. That is not true.

23 COMMISSIONER BELL: The Chief has that authority.
24 That's why I pulled it off the agenda because it's
25 misleading. When I look at Sergeant Jones and other

1 people. I think we have the authority to fire people,
2 discipline them, but we do not have the authority, even
3 though the charter say that, but the contracts negated
4 that a long time ago. So we need to make that correction.
5 I think it's misleading to the public on that particular
6 item. So we need to have a disclaimer, I think the Chief
7 needs to speak to that he has that authority. That's my
8 final question.

9 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Chief White, you're muted.

10 CHIEF WHITE: Through the Chair. Can everybody hear
11 me?

12 COMMISSIONERS: Yes.

13 CHIEF WHITE: So, Commissioner Bell is correct. The
14 final authority for discipline is in the Chief's Office
15 based on arbitration decisions and collective bargaining.
16 That's where the final authority for discipline goes.
17 There is a conflict and contradiction, the legal
18 contradiction in charter as a result of the collective
19 bargaining agreement trumping the charter language. So
20 that's something that's going to have to be resolved. And
21 it's something that I can look into and have a discussion
22 about, but that's not the first time that we have
23 discussed this, you know, there have been times when
24 people have been dismissed from the agency. Collective
25 bargaining arbitrators have brought them back and

1 certainly you know, binding arbitration is binding and we
2 are driven and guided by the results of that binding
3 arbitration. We cannot overrule a binding arbitration by
4 charter.

5 VICE-CHAIR JONES: All right. Thank you, Chief White.
6 The Chair recognizes District 5, Willie Burton. Do you
7 have a question for the Chief? Willie Burton, do you have
8 a question for the Chief.

9 COMMISSIONER BURTON: It's Commissioner Willie
10 Burton? Yes, I do have a question. Chief question to you:
11 where do we stand as far as training the community on
12 crisis intervention training, even if they have one hour
13 training, I think it would be great if we could have that
14 discussion because we realize that the community has very
15 little to none. In addition, where does the department
16 stand today for hiring clinical psychologists, as well as
17 a forensic psychologist. Those are my final questions.

18 CHIEF WHITE: Through the Chair. So I'll start with
19 the last question first, and that is our stance on
20 clinical psychologists. You know, the short answer is
21 simply this, long-term strategy makes sense. The question
22 that we need to noodle through is to what end. You know,
23 we have psychiatrists and psychologists on staff that we
24 can make available to our officers. We're using a lot
25 more services as it relates to debriefing officers on

1 fatal force incidents and critical uses of force. Some of
2 the things we're going to start looking at is the impact
3 of patrol officers like the late Corporate Cross who
4 spent his entire career on patrol. What is the resulting
5 impact from a psychological standpoint? Are the officers,
6 you know, de-escalating, debriefing themselves, not just
7 critical incidents, but you know, when you have that high
8 level of adrenaline, you know, five, seven days a week
9 and you know, what are you doing to decompress?

10 CHIEF WHITE: So those are some of the things we're
11 looking at Commissioner Burton, and that we'll be looking
12 to implement down the road. Right out the gate we have
13 mental health professionals on staff to work with the
14 officers. The information gleaned from this project will
15 be expanded, but this is the first really big step to
16 implementing this program department-wide. And as it
17 relates to your last question, sir, your final question
18 regarding the community CIT training, I think there's an
19 opportunity to do that, but I also think from a policing
20 standpoint, if we're going to disrupt that pipeline of
21 crime and that pipeline of poor decision making, we need
22 to really talk through what would be best used, and a
23 different type of training, maybe a conflict resolution,
24 incident de-escalation, those types of things, so people

1 don't make split second bad decisions that result in
2 long-term problems for them and others.

3 CHIEF WHITE: So I would be very interested to talk
4 to you more about that. I know we've had some
5 conversations already, but I think that I'd like to see
6 our resources used when you've got somebody who is
7 engaged in conflict and they pull a weapon, or they get
8 into these fights where, you know, it's going to result
9 in serious injury. And now they've got a criminal history
10 and they're in that criminal justice pipeline to failure.
11 Can we disrupt that early on, first incident, bringing in
12 a psychiatrist, psychologist to talk about anger
13 management and those types of things. And also in the
14 realm of domestic violence, we see a lot of victimization
15 of domestic violence and many of them are former or
16 violence victims themselves.

17 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Okay. Thank you, Chief White. The
18 Chair recognizes District 6, Commissioner Lisa Carter.
19 Commissioner Carter, do you have a question for the
20 Chief? The Chair recognizes District 7, Commissioner
21 William Davis. Commissioner Davis, do you have a question
22 for the Chief?

23 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: I have a couple of questions. 1)
24 I think the department should have a flag. They should
25 flag complaints on officers and the numbers shouldn't be

1 as high as they apparently appear to be. There should be
2 no more than 8 or 10. You know, if the average officer,
3 over the course of their career, is getting 8 complaints,
4 anytime any office exceeds 8 complaints, there should be
5 a flag on them. Also, I don't often agree with
6 Commissioner Bell, but I do in this sense that if a
7 commander can set aside discipline or set aside
8 complaints against an officer, I think that's a problem.
9 And if there is, is there a paper trail going to the
10 Chief's Office indicating why they did that? And if there
11 isn't, there should be.

12 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Also, a third thing. I live off
13 the Joy and I hear cars racing up and down Joy sometimes
14 waking me up in the middle of the night. It seems like
15 the racing and the crime and the shooting is getting
16 worse, not better, sir. Those are my three
17 questions/comments to you.

18 CHIEF WHITE: Through the Chair. We'll start with the
19 crime. The crime you know, statistically you know, we
20 have seen some reductions in crime in certain areas. In
21 the areas, you know, as it relates to property crimes and
22 things such as that, but as I've indicated in the past in
23 these presentations that, you know, no one's taking a
24 victory lap on any crime. Crime is high, crime is high in
25 the City of Detroit. Crime is high in major cities around

1 the country. There isn't a national uptick in crime.
2 There's a national uptick in this drifting and drag
3 racing. And we are out there. Today, you know, we were
4 announcing in our discussions, in our strategy meetings
5 this morning that a city ordinance has just been signed
6 as it relates to drag racing, which is going to be of
7 great benefit for us because those people who participate
8 as well as watch the drag racing can now be ticketed and
9 even arrested because it's a misdemeanor.

10 CHIEF WHITE: So, there's movement there. There are a
11 number of arrests that have taken place, but the police
12 department alone can't solve this. I mean, the people who
13 are doing it and making the decisions have to have some
14 ownership, parents have to have some ownership or
15 otherwise all we're going to do is continue to make the
16 arrest, which we do very well, but the answer isn't going
17 to be to simply make the arrest, because there's going to
18 be someone lining up to get arrested. So it's a problem,
19 but we continue to attempt to manage it. We are seeing
20 some reductions, none that are worth bragging about
21 because one victim of homicide, one victim of the
22 shooting is one too many. And certainly out of respect to
23 the 18-year-old who died last night I don't need to be
24 sitting here telling the Commission that we're seeing a
25 reduction in shootings over the past week because her

1 family doesn't feel that. Drag racing is a problem, we're
2 out there, and we've partnered with the State police.

3 CHIEF WHITE: We partnered with the Wayne County
4 Sheriff, and we're going to continue to be out there, and
5 we'll continue to take these vehicles into court and do
6 everything we can to get these vehicles off the street.
7 And I've got some independent cases that I can share with
8 you Commissioner on some real successes we've had. We've
9 got the helicopter up that's assisting us. We had a
10 gentleman last week who got into a chase and ran out of
11 gas on the freeway, and we have the helicopter up there
12 that was on top of him. So we are focused and we are
13 committed to doing everything in our power to reduce
14 crime. But when I've got people who are having fights at
15 homes and then shooting each other, I've got people who
16 are CPL holders that won't stop touching and playing with
17 their guns because they just bought a shiny new gun and
18 they're a CPL holder and they shoot themselves. And then
19 they told us that well, I don't want to lose my CPL, so I
20 was shot.

21 CHIEF WHITE: Well, the bullet went through your
22 purse and then the top of your leg, how did that happen?
23 Okay. Yeah, I was moving and playing with my gun. So, you
24 know, we've got a lot of community education that we need
25 to do. We've got people who are not using holsters when

1 they purchase these weapons, they're putting them in
2 their waste. And when you move them around, you grab the
3 trigger, POW, and now you're shot. So we've got a lot of
4 things that we need to solve for, we're committed to
5 doing it. We're Uber focused. I have all the confidence
6 in his team. And then I'm going to just move through your
7 final comment or question. And it had to do with a
8 command officer who, who may or may not have made a poor
9 decision to dismiss the case.

10 CHIEF WHITE: I don't know what went into that
11 decision yet. I wasn't here, and I don't know if I was
12 here, but I don't know when it happened. I'm pulling all
13 that information now, but the Chief's Office needs to be
14 able to trust the command team. Okay. These are
15 appointees, these are commanders and Deputy Chiefs who
16 have the responsibility of assisting and managing this
17 process. The collective bargaining agreement allows for
18 the Chief or his or her designee to make these important
19 decisions. So what I'll be looking for as Chief or
20 Interim Chief is the requisite detail that went into that
21 decision making. And if it didn't, we will make that
22 correction. I am extremely troubled by what I saw.
23 Someone brought it up earlier and I apologize. I can't
24 remember which Commissioner, I think it was you sir,
25 about the flagging 8.

1 CHIEF WHITE: It was you flagging 8 or 9 complaints.
2 We have a management awareness system that flags this
3 process for us. So what my expectation would be is that a
4 command member of this organization caught that flag and
5 had the necessary courageous conversation with the member
6 and said, you're going down a path, regardless of the
7 outcome of the complaint. If you've got 50 complaints
8 that said you didn't do it, but the allegation is the
9 same, something's wrong. And that's the level of
10 leadership that I'm going to be requiring and will take
11 nothing less. So more to come. I'm going to be looking at
12 all aspects of this, and this is going to serve as a
13 catalyst for us to look at all of our processes. We're
14 not going to waste this crisis. We're going to use it to
15 make the organization better, but I am concerned and
16 there's going to be an extreme overcorrection based on
17 this circumstance. Going forward, this will not be
18 allowed under my leadership, and none of the people that
19 I appoint leadership. You should not have a concern about
20 a command member sitting on top of a case like this and
21 arriving at this decision. That's why they're command
22 officers appointed by me. So I will be following up with
23 the Commission on this but believe me, this has my full
24 attention.

25 Thank you.

1 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Are you notified when a
2 commander does that, when a commander makes a decision on
3 the discipline case?

4 CHIEF WHITE: Through the Chair, generally speaking,
5 yes. That final file should have come to the Chief's
6 Office with a disposition on it. I cannot speak to that
7 at this point. I have to find out when it happened, where
8 it went, if it came. All those questions my team and I
9 met last night for a long time to discuss this and
10 they're getting me those answers. And I look forward to
11 having those answers in the next 48 hours. By Monday I
12 intend to have... this is not going to be a heavy lift, a
13 resolution to where we are with this case.

14 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Alright, thank you, Chief White.
15 Great answers. The vice-Chair recognizes Commissioner,
16 Jesus Hernandez. You have a question for the Chief?

17 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Thank you. Through the
18 Chair. Let me begin by thanking you for your continued
19 effort with the CIT program. I think everyone understands
20 just how critical that's going to be citywide. So lots of
21 praise your way in that space. I do support some of the
22 thoughts that my fellow Commissioners, in particular
23 Commissioners Bernard and Bell and Davis have brought in
24 terms of Mr. Kue. And I fully support an audit in that
25 space in particular, but I'll refrain from asking any

1 questions until there's more to come throughout this
2 process. I'll allow the process to happen first but I
3 will have several very pointed questions, I think once
4 the results come. Thank you.

5 CHIEF WHITE: Yes, sir.

6 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Thank you Commissioner Hernandez.
7 At-Large Commissioner, Annie Holt. Do you have a question
8 for the Chief?

9 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Through the Chair and thank you,
10 Vice-Chair Jones. Thank you again, Interim Chief James
11 White for your press release, whereby you discussed the
12 CIT program and the presentation during the press release
13 was almost equal to the presentation we had, the Board of
14 Police Commissioners had at that training in June of 26,
15 2021. Also, I appreciate you sharing a timeline as it
16 relates to the relationship DPD and WC3 will have in
17 terms of providing dual certification for police cadets,
18 and I'm sure Commissioner Holley is thrilled every time
19 that discussion surfaces. So again, thank you for your
20 leadership Interim Chief James White. Oh, and another
21 thing I believe, through the Chair, in response to Chair
22 Bell's comment relevant to the CIT presentation, I
23 believe the Board is scheduled to have that presentation
24 presented during one of our Board of Police Commissioners
25

1 Meetings. So again, Chief White, thank you for your
2 leadership.

3 CHIEF WHITE: Thank you, ma'am.

4 VICE-CHAIR JONES: And definitely we cannot leave out
5 the Chairman of the Board of Police Commissioners.
6 Commissioner Holley, do you have a question for the
7 Chief?

8 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Not really, but Chief, I thank
9 you so much. All of my adult life and basically I'm
10 always concerned about how you get rid of bad teachers.
11 And it was hard to get rid of the bad teachers in public
12 schools. Then the other thing is when you get bad police
13 officers and you, and I know that we've been working hard
14 in terms of trying to flag and giving information to the
15 office about police officers that have been flagged. I
16 just ask that you do everything that you can. You know,
17 we've been very blessed and very fortunate that nothing
18 has come off in this community. It's only going to take
19 just one little spark and we have been blessed and I just
20 think we've needed to take advantage of it.

21 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: So I'm asking you somehow, we
22 have to be able to get back, get rid of, even with
23 arbitration, we have to do something to make sure that we
24 get these guys, if not off the course, at least off the
25 street, you know, put them behind a desk or something,

1 because they're going to mess this thing up that we've
2 been working so hard in this community to try to make
3 sure with the police department, trying to make sure that
4 everything is going to be moving forward. So I thank you
5 and we look forward to this comprehensive investigation
6 that you're going to do in bringing this forward, and
7 shortly. I appreciate your urgency of this, it's so
8 important.

9 CHIEF WHITE: Thank you. Through the Chair. Thank you
10 very much. And I'll just be brief. I agree, my role here
11 is to protect the work that the good men and women of
12 this Detroit Police Department do on a day in and day out
13 basis. And it is amazing work. We have a fantastic
14 relationship with our community. My colleagues around the
15 country are envious of the relationship we have with our
16 community. I talk with a lot of them through my work with
17 the consent judgment. I've developed some great
18 relationships around the country in policing and they're
19 envious. It's the men and women of this agency that
20 caused that to happen. And no one wants a bad police
21 officer out of the agency, more than a good police
22 officer in the agency. So my job as the Chief is to
23 protect the image of this agency, protect the officers
24 who are doing this work and remove those people who
25 should not have the privilege of wearing this badge.

1 CHIEF WHITE: I take that seriously, and I will do
2 that. So trust me when I tell you I have no concerns
3 making the difficult decision to remove someone who
4 decides to disrespect this community, to be racially
5 bias, to be engaged in any bias based on race, sex,
6 gender period. And I've already taken steps even prior to
7 this incident to ensure that we have an all-inclusive
8 agency, a welcoming agency, and that these officers who
9 represent this department in a fine way, work does not go
10 on notice and that they're respected. So this incident
11 does not represent the over 2000 men and women in uniform
12 and over 1000 in non-uniform people who are committed to
13 this agency. And that's why you see the relationship that
14 we have with our community. But as you indicated
15 Commissioner, it's fragile, and one incident like this,
16 could he write years and years of work overnight. And so
17 it is my duty to ensure that that doesn't happen by
18 taking aggressive action towards anyone who attempts to
19 damage that reputation and that relationship. So it has
20 my full attention, and I'm going to do what I need to do.
21 So thank you.

22 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Well, thanks so much Chief White
23 and lastly, Vice-Chair, Martin Jones. I would just like
24 to add more of a comment. I would definitely like to
25 thank my fellow Commissioners on this Board for asking

1 the very hard, the very tough questions, and not only
2 just being able to ask hard and tough questions, but even
3 some of the Commissioners even offered solutions to the
4 challenges that we're facing right now as a police
5 department and has a Board, also. It is definitely our
6 charter mandated duties to provide the oversight that our
7 community needs. I think that the questions that our
8 Commissioners ask today are the questions that are on the
9 mind of the people in our community who we are here to
10 serve. So I thank you so much Chief for your
11 presentations, and I look forward to your next one as
12 well. I turned it back over to our Chairperson, Jim
13 Holley.

14 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much, Vice-Chair
15 Jones, and thank you Chief as well. I want to also thank
16 the hard work of the OIC, the hard work that they do in
17 terms of investigating these cases as well. And I think
18 that I'm going to work and ask Commissioners to let us
19 work hard to flag and make sure when we look at a flag of
20 7 to 10 flags, we need to be concerned about this,
21 especially when they're talking about Chief - talking
22 about being promoted. And I think Commissioner Bell has
23 always been on target with that. And so I just want to
24 make sure that we will let the community know we're going
25 to do everything we can through the Board as well, the

1 OIC and with the police department as well. I thank you
2 so much. At this particular time Commissioner Holt, can
3 you help me with the Resolution from the...

4 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Yes. Thank you, Chair Holley.
5 Resolution honoring retiring BOPC investigator, Roslyn
6 Banks. WHEREAS investigator Roslyn Banks was appointed to
7 the Detroit Board of Police Commissioners on October 27,
8 2005, where she was assigned to the Office of the Chief
9 Investigator and, WHEREAS Investigator Banks is a proud
10 graduate of Detroit's David L. McKinsey High School. She
11 attended the Detroit Institute of Technology and is a
12 graduate of Eastern Michigan University's School of
13 Police Staff and Command. And, WHEREAS BOPC Investigator
14 Banks started her career with the City of Detroit in the
15 Police Department in 1977. She served in various units
16 within the Police Department, including patrol, sex
17 crimes, public corruption, carjacking, and the Office of
18 Public Information where she served as a commanding
19 officer. She retired from the Police Department in 2003
20 and worked in the Dearborn school system for a short
21 period of time. And, WHEREAS Investigator Banks has
22 provided years of service as a volunteer in the various
23 community organizations.

24 COMMISSIONER HOLT She is a long time member of
25 Fellowship, Chapel Church, where she held positions of

1 trust, such as the director of security, a member of
2 trustee Board and former co-Chair of the trustee Board.
3 She was a star foundation volunteer member where she
4 taught third graders how to read, a member of the Zonta
5 Foundation and an advocate helping domestic violence
6 victims all over Southeast Michigan. Investigator Banks
7 also volunteered her time in Detroit with the community
8 service organization, Autism Speaks for many years. She
9 is a proud mother and grandmother and cherishes her
10 downtown neighborhood in Elmwood Park. Investigator
11 Roslyn Banks is a lifelong Detroiter who provided 41
12 years of dedicated service to the citizens of Detroit,
13 including 15 plus years, working for the Detroit Board of
14 Police Commissioners, where she is highly respected as a
15 consummate professional.

16 COMMISSIONER HOLT NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that
17 the Detroit Board of Police Commissioners speaking for
18 the citizens of Detroit awards this Resolution to
19 Investigate Roslyn Banks for more than 15 years of
20 dedicated and diligent public service and outstanding
21 work in the area of civilian oversight of law
22 enforcement. Her professionalism, integrity, and standard
23 of commitment to the City of Detroit and its citizens
24 merit our highest regard and best wishes for continued
25 services support continued success. We salute and

1 congratulate you, Investigator Roslyn Banks. Through the
2 Chair.

3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes.

4 COMMISSIONER HOLT: I moved that we placed this
5 Resolution honoring retired BOPC Investigator, Roslyn
6 Banks into the BOPC archives.

7 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: All in favor, say aye.

8 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

9 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Support.

10 COMMISSIONER: HERNANDEZ: Support.

11 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Support.

12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Opposed. Thank you so much
13 Commissioner Holt.

14 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Chair Holley.

15 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes.

16 COMMISSIONER HOLT: May I please apologize to
17 everyone for that disruption caused by my phone, please?

18 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Don't do it no more.

19 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Okay. I won't.

20 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: At this time, we'll just talk to
21 Captain Johnson in regards to the towing presentation. If
22 you would, please, if we can direct attention to that.
23 Captain Johnson?

24 CAPTAIN JOHNSON: Sir, can you hear me?

25 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes, sir, we can.

1 CAPTAIN JOHNSON: Good afternoon Chairman, and Board
2 of Police Commissioners. Today I'd like to give you a
3 short presentation on the DPD towing operations out of
4 Management Services. Hello?

5 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes,

6 COMMISSIONER BURCH: We can hear you.

7 CAPTAIN JOHNSON: Is there any way... I'm having
8 computer problems. Is there any way somebody on your end
9 could bring up the slides for me? Is that possible?

10 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: It would be up now.

11 CAPTAIN JOHNSON: Okay. Management Service, Tow Units
12 comprises of three units that work together. There's the
13 abandoned vehicle task force, police impound tow unit,
14 and the forfeiture unit. Our policy is we operate under
15 the Detroit Police Manual 204.4-2 under our main policy.
16 It is the department's policy to safeguard all vehicles
17 that are towed by members and to be sure that all vehicle
18 procedures are adhered to. Members must understand when
19 towing and the storage of vehicles is appropriate and
20 legitimate. Abandoned vehicles constitute a public
21 nuisance, a hazard to traffic and the community views
22 their removal as an essential service. Likewise, vehicles
23 involved in accidents or crimes may require towing and
24 inventory for evidentiary purposes.

25

1 CAPTAIN JOHNSON: We have 3 lot locations. The
2 current hours are 9:00 AM to 8:00 PM for our Mount Elliot
3 lot. And 9:00 AM to 5:00 PM for Grand River and Grinnel.
4 As you can see on my next slide here, the tow fees range
5 by type of vehicle, as well as how many days the vehicle
6 is stored by us. Daily DPD towing, our unit, and these
7 are some of our daily activities. On a day-to-day basis,
8 we request approximately 95 tows. So for a 24 hour
9 period, the Detroit Police Department requested about 95
10 tows. The majority of these tows are requested through
11 and to our tow partners through a rotation. However, a
12 small percentage of those tows are also handled by DPD
13 tow trucks.

14 CAPTAIN JOHNSON: We talked to 95 citizens a day on a
15 walk-in basis. Approximately 95 citizens a day walk into
16 our 3 locations requesting to get their vehicles back
17 and, or the status of their vehicles. Approximately 30
18 vehicles a day are taken into police impound lots. And so
19 those are lots just on the police side. Our last big
20 point that I'd like to make for the Commission is that we
21 are excited for the completion of the construction of our
22 Grand River lot, which will give us some additional
23 storage space so that we can better facilitate and move
24 around the vehicles and actually service the clients, the
25 citizens in a faster way. And it's like I said, I'm

1 sorry, my computer's kind of glitching, and I can't see
2 if you can see my presentation, but now it's at the point
3 if you have any questions.

4 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Just before we have questions
5 Commissioners, I want to ask that the Corporate Counselor
6 Whitley will have any updates before we go to
7 Commissioner Jones to give you two minutes apiece if you
8 want it to ask questions. Corporate Whitley, you have a
9 question, a comment, or so?

10 ASSISTANT CORPORATION COUNSEL WHITELEY: Good
11 afternoon to the Board. Erica Savage-Whitley for the Law
12 Department. I just want to give a brief overview of the
13 Ordinance. There's currently an Ordinance pending in the
14 Public Health and Safety Committee. I believe Captain
15 Johnson is familiar with it as well, but the document
16 right now is still in committee. It's a living and
17 breathing document. So this is just a general overview,
18 specifically as it relates to police authorized towing.
19 So just a couple of points about the tow rate commission.
20 It notes in the Ordinance that the tow rate commission
21 will remain advisory in nature but city council will have
22 the authority to set the tow rates in the absence of the
23 tow rate commission, acting. So in the event that they do
24 not meet for whatever reason, they're supposed to meet
25

1 every two years or they fail to act, the city
2 council will continue, and adapt the rates by a
3 resolution.

4 ASSISTANT CORPORATION COUNSEL WHITELEY: It
5 incorporates a low tow rate policy that is expected to be
6 interpreted into the, I'm sorry, integrated into the
7 contract negotiations. It also has provisions about the
8 storage of vehicles. I believe that there was some
9 language about duplicative inventory requirements that
10 they removed. I believe DPD could speak more to that one,
11 but that was a change to a section. And then the last
12 thing specific to police authorized towing is about the
13 administrative fee as determined by city council. And it
14 will say that if there is an owner of a vehicle towed by
15 a police authorized tower there will be an administrative
16 fee imposed for that. So other than that it does have
17 some other provisions, renumbering provisions, a big,
18 huge part of it is that subdivision numbers were added
19 for nonconsensual towing. So those are new provisions
20 dealing with towing cars from private property.

21 ASSISTANT CORPORATION COUNSEL WHITELEY: Like if
22 you're getting it towed from CVS or someone's business,
23 that's a new subdivision. And as well as requiring that
24 towers accept more forms of payment than cash and saying
25 that you have to have other forms and provide a receipt.

1 So that's a general overview. Oh, one last thing. If it
2 included language from the State law that requires that
3 if you are getting your car hooked up while a tower is
4 towing your car and you arrive while your car is on the
5 hook, if you pay your service fee at that time to the
6 tower, you can get your car taken off the hook at that
7 time immediately. And that was incorporated from the
8 State law. So that's a general overview. I did not put
9 anything in writing as I would typically do, because as I
10 said, this is a document that's still in committee, it's
11 only at a discussion phase. It hasn't been introduced
12 yet. So as the document moves and gets its life, and we
13 exactly know what's going to say, I will prepare a
14 document with a summary and any input or questions that
15 you may have, you know, we can discuss that while city
16 council is going to go on recess, you can submit your
17 questions and comments. And of course, the comments and
18 suggestions from the Board will be entertained. And
19 that's it.

20 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Vice-Chair Jones, can you handle
21 this as well? You got two minutes. If you have a
22 question, maybe you don't have much of his information,
23 but Vice-Chair Jones?

24 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Thank you, sir. Vice-Chair
25 recognizes Commissioner Annie Holt. You have a question?

1 Vice-Chair recognizes Commissioner Jesus Hernandez. Do
2 you have a question?

3 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Not at this time. Thank you.

4 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Vice-Chair recognizes Commissioner
5 William Davis. Do you have a question?

6 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: No, just to advance the agenda.

7 VICE-CHAIR JONES: I'm sorry.

8 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: I said no, I'd rather for the
9 agenda to be advanced as quickly as possible.

10 VICE-CHAIR JONES: All right. Thank you, sir. Vice-
11 Chair recognizes Commissioner Lisa Carter. Do you have a
12 question? Vice-Chair recognizes Commissioner Willie
13 Burton. Do you have a question? Vice-Chair recognizes
14 Commissioner Willie Bell. Do you have a question?

15 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes, sir. Briefly, I would hope
16 that our attorney Corporation Counsel Whitley would
17 respond to, is there any diminishing our role with this
18 ordinance that's going to take place in the future? I
19 would hope that she would inform us if that's a
20 possibility that we can be on board with our concern.
21 Also, is there any truth that the city might be engaged
22 in auto return? I get feedback on that. Could you respond
23 to that? I don't know that much about it, but that's the
24 dialogue.

25

1 ASSISTANT CORPORATION COUNSEL WHITELEY: Through the
2 Chair, to Commissioner Bell. To my knowledge of reviewing
3 the Ordinance and having a discussion with Chief
4 Corporation Counsel Tanya Long, I do not see anything
5 specifically amended to the terms for the BOPC directly.
6 Those things that I noted at the beginning were specific
7 to police authorized towing. Otherwise, most of the
8 provisions, if not all dealt with the other things,
9 administrative things, non-consensual towing,
10 renumbering, things of that nature, but there's no, and I
11 can also forward a current draft. I'm very cautious about
12 doing too much with the Ordinance when it's in the state
13 it is right now because it can change every day. I did
14 not see any specific thing admitted about BOPC
15 specifically. Now the closest thing I would say would be
16 the tow rate policy as a part of the contract
17 negotiations. Of course, that will be a big change going
18 forward in the future because currently, we have a permit
19 system. So I know that that's kind of in limbo right now,
20 but the goal I believe is to move to an RFP contractual
21 system. And one of the advantages of that is to
22 incorporate a low tow rate policy as a part of contract
23 negotiations, something that there's less control of
24 doing what the permits. So that's one indirect thing, but
25 no direct changes to the BOPC that I saw.

1 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Okay. Thank you.

2 COMMISSIONER BELL: Excuse me, Commissioner Jones.
3 The second part is the auto return.

4 ASSISTANT CORPORATION COUNSEL WHITELEY: I'm not
5 really familiar with that. I will defer that to Captain
6 Johnson or someone with DPD because I'm not familiar with
7 the auto return. If that's the highlight of the
8 Ordinance, I'm not directly familiar with that.

9 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Captain Johnson, you want to
10 think about it?

11 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Captain Johnson you're muted?

12 CAPTAIN JOHNSON: Can you hear me now?

13 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Yes.

14 CAPTAIN JOHNSON: So I'd have to check into that. I'm
15 not familiar with that, but I can have that for the
16 Board. I can get back with Commissioner Bell and research
17 it, sir.

18 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you.

19 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Vice-Chair recognizes Commissioner
20 Shirley Birch. Do you have a question?

21 COMMISSIONER BURCH: No questions, thank you.

22 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Vice-Chair recognizes Commissioner
23 Linda Bernard. Do you have a question?

24 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Yes.

25

1 VICE-CHAIR JONES: We can barely hear you,
2 Commissioner Bernard.

3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I can't hear you.

4 VICE-CHAIR JONES: We can't hear you, Commissioner
5 Bernard. Commissioner Bernard, we can't hear you.

6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Can you hear me now? Hello.

7 VICE-CHAIR JONES: We can hear you a little bit
8 better now. A little bit better.

9 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Okay. I'll get as close as I
10 can. Only that I do not think it is appropriate that the
11 role of the Board be diminished.

12 VICE-CHAIR JONES: I'm sorry, Commissioner Bernard,
13 we still can't hear you.

14 COMMISSIONER BURCH: I do not want the power of the
15 Board diminished, she said.

16 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Yes. Can you hear me now? I
17 don't want answers. And the issue regarding contracts
18 versus permits is a big one. And I've been contacted by
19 the towers association concerning that as you know, I
20 have no interest in this whatsoever, other than the fact
21 that I do want local businesses in the City of Detroit,
22 many of which are a minority who are towers, who are
23 paying lots of taxes and a hundred thousand dollars a
24 year in drainage fees because of their loss, to be able
25 to continue to operate profitably in the City of Detroit.

1 I understand that that is a... and I want to talk to you
2 Erica about that personally when you have an opportunity.
3 And I'll come back to the Board on another... I know the
4 Chair wants to move this meeting forward, but it is very
5 important that the Board continue its control with
6 respect to this process. And that's my only concern.

7 ASSISTANT CORPORATION COUNSEL WHITELEY: Duly noted.
8 Through the Chair duly noted. And I will reiterate this
9 Ordinance does not directly speak to that actual issue
10 of, you know, the permitting issue and things of that
11 nature. There's nothing of that nature that I'm aware of
12 in this Ordinance, but I do understand that there are
13 also implications in the big picture. I understand. And
14 certainly, I'm sure that the DPD as well as the Law
15 Department will continue discussing that with the powers
16 that be.

17 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: But it does because it
18 addresses the issue of RFPs, which are contracts versus
19 our permits, but I will deal with this separately.

20 VICE-CHAIR JONES: All right. Thank you, Commissioner
21 Linda Bernard. Vice-Chair recognizes Commissioner Darryl
22 Brown. Do you have a question?

23 COMMISSIONER BROWN: No, just to thank Corporation
24 Counsel Whitley for her work on this and bringing this

1 information before the Board. I really appreciate the
2 update on the information. Thank you.

3 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Okay. And as the Chair Holley, you
4 have a question, Chair Holley, do you have a question?

5 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY I'm sorry. No, I do not.

6 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Okay. Well, this is Vice-Chair,
7 Martin Jones. I did have a couple of other questions
8 because as you know the Board has received quite a bit of
9 information with regards to the towing issue. It's the
10 issue that we extended a couple of months ago, I believe
11 for 180 days. And in starting with the presentation by
12 the Captain I wasn't sure if this applied to just DPD
13 towing or was it all towing, including the other towers
14 as well. I wasn't sure which way you were going with it
15 when you started to dictate the policies and everything
16 and the (Audio Distortion). Can you answer that, please?

17 CAPTAIN JOHNSON: Yes. Through the Chair, all the
18 numbers that I stated were for all of the tow companies
19 that are requested through the Detroit Police Department.
20 So we get the tows and then we call either a private tow
21 or one of our Detroit Police tows. And then they go,
22 where they go from there. The majority of the tows go to
23 the private lots, and then we do store some of the tows
24 on city lots as well.

25

1 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Okay. And then answers my second
2 question about it being a part of the rotation. So I
3 thank you for your presentation and I'm turning it back
4 over to Mr. Chair, Jim Holley.

5 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I thank you so much, Vice-Chair
6 Jones. Let's move on to the secretary and the secretary's
7 report.

8 MRS. WHITE: Through the Chair, Honorable Board. If
9 you could please refer to your agenda for this week's
10 incoming correspondence and they are as follows. You
11 receive the weekly DPD facial recognition technology
12 report for July 12th through July 18th, and also various
13 staff reports, including, but not limited to the DPD
14 graduation schedule for Commissioners, NACOLE'S conference
15 registration information, and other key updates and staff
16 reports, including, but not limited to the BOPC community
17 newsletter, distribution, applicant appeals, and other
18 various updates for your information. Please also note
19 that today's closed session information is forthcoming in
20 your email inbox. So please review your emails for that
21 information. Thank you. And that concludes the incoming
22 correspondence.

23 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you very much. Unfinished
24 business, new business. Announcements.

1 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Yes sir, yes, sir. Excuse me.
2 Chair Bell. Unfinished business was that I was supposed
3 to receive a report from AC LeValley regarding the drug
4 tipsy that he had gone further into that sir, to see if
5 the city council could work, that where any substance
6 that will alter a person's mind, they would prohibit
7 being sold in our gas stations. That was AC LeValley. I
8 thank you.

9 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much, Commissioner.
10 Announcements. Commissioner Burch.

11 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Okay. The announcement is that
12 we have a total of 13 people signed up for August 7th
13 neighborhood day, and that's part of our beautification
14 and our resource table with relay races with all law
15 enforcement, including DPD. So we're doing very well in
16 some aspects. We won't be stopped in District 3 because
17 we love and respect where we live.

18 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you very much. I was
19 waiting for that. Mr. Brown, let's move it on.
20 Commissioner Davis is getting excited.

21 MR. ROB BROWN: Yes. Good afternoon, Mr. Chair, and
22 this Honorable Board. You're next 2 BOPC meetings July
23 29th at 3:00 PM and August the 5th at 3:00 PM. And from
24 there, if you want me to, I'll go to public comments.

1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes. Okay. We currently have
2 nine speakers and I call them by threes. Your first
3 speaker will be CAC Chairman Mr. Scotty. Bowman, Ms.
4 Bernie Smith, Ms. Sharon Parnell. Mr. Bowman.

5 MR. BOWMAN: Hello? Yes. First of all, I'm calling
6 out. I hear a guy say his name here, Lieutenant Mark
7 Young of our police department for participating in
8 misinformation and spreading a big lie. Oh, how come I
9 still see two minutes here? Is it that the clock isn't
10 running yet?

11 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Trust me, it's running. It's
12 running.

13 MR. BOWMAN: Okay. Now it's running. Okay. In
14 spreading the big lie. And that really is offensive. And
15 he's out there saying that P is putting pensions in
16 jeopardy. It will not be effective, better secure the
17 pensions. Secondly, I'd like to bring up another matter,
18 which is over by city airport while I'm going around
19 talking to people in my district, as Community Advisory
20 Council Chairperson, I'm running into people who are
21 telling me that the police are not responding to them
22 over in the part of the 4th district, north of I-94. Now,
23 I also found out that they're having trouble getting
24 sidewalks. I don't know if there's a connection, but
25 maybe it's all about getting people out of that area so

1 that they can build some projects. I know not what, but
2 some of these calls that police are not responding to
3 include shootings. I've walked by houses and looked at
4 them and they got holes in the side of the building that
5 looks like Swiss cheese, especially over at city airport,
6 say around Findlay and Connor, for instance. The police
7 know who these people are. If someone wants to call me
8 from the police department, I'll tell them one of the
9 addresses of where the shootings are coming from. I don't
10 know if it requires a young person to die or what, but I
11 know response time is great on my part of the district,
12 but apparently not over there. So there seems to be some
13 bias and that's something the Board of Police
14 Commissioners really should look into. Also, one more
15 thing I have yet to hear a motion to fire Duane Jones. So
16 I guess that's just something I'm going to have to do on
17 that first Thursday of January of 2022. But meanwhile, we
18 stick around and we deal with our mischief as usual on
19 the Board of Police Commissioners. Thank you, I yield.

20 MR. ROB BROWN: Miss Bernie Smith.

21 MS. SMITH: Good afternoon Commissioners. You're
22 doing a wonderful job. You're going along very smoothly
23 and I'm very proud of you. There are no complaints about
24 what you're doing at your meetings. I will tell you this
25 Commander Hope, I love her dearly. I happened to be down

1 at Greektown last week when she was on duty. I was
2 sitting there where a police truck always sits by a
3 Monroe and Bobian and the things that I saw and witnessed
4 were ridiculous. I don't know. .. all I can say about
5 Greektown and the people that participate down there, but
6 Commander Hope she did a wonderful job. She even invited
7 me to do a walk-in, even though I know I can't walk, and
8 I told her that, but the traffic down there is
9 tremendous. They continue to stop on the side and hold up
10 the other line of cars that are coming. And the police
11 have to constantly come through there and make it clear
12 for the cars to proceed. And I love the fact that they
13 are doing a good job. Last night, I was down there until
14 almost 10 o'clock, I watched the same thing. I even
15 comment on some of the people negatively and positively,
16 but the men, I must say that I saw a couple of them. I
17 saw some with their underwear in the back, and I said,
18 young man, you going to have to pull your pants up, baby?
19 You out here in the public. Yes ma'am yes, ma'am. So I
20 can say they are very intelligent down there. To me, the
21 men were, so I don't have any problem with it, but I must
22 complain about how the cars are holding up the traffic.
23 And we do have the police that comes through every now
24 and then.

1 MS. SMITH: And when they stop and ask me what I'm
2 doing, parking there. I say I'm investigating. So I tell
3 them my complaint and they will take care of it. So I
4 will tell you that and White, I want you to stay on this
5 job because we need you, the crime and the shooting
6 that's going on... People are not listening to each other
7 anymore. They'd rather use guns to satisfy their needs.
8 And this is what we have to stop. I blame those people
9 that are on Washburn. You knew there was a house there
10 that had drugs in it, and the people got killed. Three
11 people got killed last week.

12 MR. ROB BROWN: Ms. Sharon Parnell.

13 MS. PARNELL: Hi. Reverend Holley, you can call me
14 Ms. P. You don't have to say Parnell but the 2nd Precinct
15 got dead on the case. They were over here giving tickets
16 like it's supposed to, catching those speeders running
17 over the speed bumps. And I do appreciate you. Thank you
18 very, very much. Bye.

19 MR. ROB BROWN: Mr. Chair, your next three speakers
20 would be Minister Eric Blunt, caller with the last 3
21 numbers 402. Caller with the last 3 numbers 999. Minister
22 Eric Blunt.

23 MINISTER BLUNT: Can you hear me, Board?

24 MR. ROB BROWN: Yes, sir.

1 MINISTER BLUNT: Yes. Surprise, surprise. But no one
2 is surprised that a DPD officer has over 80 complaints
3 and no alarms went off for this Board. Again, I cry out
4 that this Board actively avoids focusing on police
5 officer's misconduct as evidence again today. After
6 acting so shocked at the high number of complaints
7 against one officer, the Board quickly moved on back to
8 another resolution, praising an officer and doing a deep
9 dive on crime. Both of which have nothing to do with
10 police officer misconduct. Last week, Chairperson Holley
11 stated that there was nothing this Board can do regarding
12 facial recognition. This is not true. There are still
13 actions this Board can take. This Board hands out
14 resolutions to just about anything and everything. So
15 knowing how racially biased facial recognition technology
16 is and the serious problems it creates in the black
17 community, this Board can issue a resolution condemning
18 facial recognition technology. And as if symbolically
19 reversing its approval of facial recognition technology,
20 just like when then Chairperson Bell did when he went
21 before TV cameras stating that this Board's decision not
22 to discipline Corporal Jones was wrong. I yield my time.

23 MR. ROB BROWN: Caller with the last three, number
24 402.

25 CALLER 402: Can you hear me?

1 MR. ROB BROWN: Yes, ma'am.

2 CALLER 402: Well, I just want to say, I heard the
3 good news about the CIT, the crisis intervention team.
4 And I was so happy to hear that. I see a lot of people in
5 my neighborhood and I listen to them when I go to the
6 hospitals for my appointments. So, I'm glad for the CIT
7 team, that's going to help quite a bit in every community
8 and the community-mindedness of the people over at number
9 six, I was over there and I was so impressed by the
10 officers there. I said, well, they need about maybe
11 thousands of salutes because of their customer service
12 and how they conduct themselves. And they may do their
13 work very exceptionally well. And the direction and the
14 guidance of every department. I have had the occasion to
15 meet them and talk with them about different things. And
16 also there was a recruitment event, that came up and I
17 was so impressed by that.

18 CALLER 402: Also the people there were just excited
19 and happy to be there. And they just did such a great,
20 great job in the outcome of it. And the people were
21 there, their families were there, their children were
22 there, the bomb squad, everybody was there and Ms. Woods
23 and Shawn Wilson and all of them, they were doing such a
24 great, great job. I commend them very highly on their
25 recruitment efforts at the event there. And I was

1 thinking about how you all elevate one another and how
2 you get together when you're talking about sensitive
3 matters. And I've always been impressed since my first
4 time starting to come to the meetings, were they virtual
5 or in-person, you're always doing the same thing that I
6 see Commissioner Carter, she's

7 MR. ROB BROWN: Caller with the last three numbers,
8 999. Caller with the last three numbers, 999. Mr. Chair,
9 I'll go to your next 3 speakers. Resident, followed by
10 Miss Vanessa Bryan Alanis, followed by Ms. Michelle
11 George. Resident?

12 RESIDENT: Yes. Good afternoon. Can you hear me?

13 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes, ma'am.

14 RESIDENT: Well, I think that's great that you're
15 working to have a crisis intervention team. Believe, I
16 would also recommend that all police officers get
17 training in trauma. There's an awful lot of untreated
18 trauma walking around the City of Detroit in the
19 residence, and I imagine police officers as well but not
20 all your officers know how to de-escalate and it would be
21 great if they knew how to recognize trauma and then deal
22 with that accordingly instead of it turning into
23 violence. Also about the crisis center, though, it's very
24 disappointing that people in the Northend were not
25 informed about the Detroit Wayne Integrated Health

1 Network, I'm sure that in collaboration with the police
2 department, want to put a crisis center in a building
3 that was the library in the lower Northend. People are
4 very, excuse me, in the Northend between Alger and Hayes.

5 RESIDENT: So we're not opposed to a crisis center
6 per se, and know that it is needed to have one in
7 Detroit, but not in the library. We would like to rescue
8 our library so that we can have a community gathering
9 space books, computers for people. Maybe if we had these
10 resources in the community in the first place, there
11 would be less crisis. So it's very disappointing that the
12 police department didn't reach out to people. People in
13 the north end are not happy about it, but it seems like
14 once again, as the city kind of does, it's a done deal.
15 And then, you know, the residents learn about it and
16 they're upset about it. So it really would be nice if you
17 would work with the residents of Northend to find a
18 better location for the crisis center and rescue the
19 library. And we got a problem with cops who turn their
20 cameras off.

21 MR. ROB BROWN: Ms. Bryan Alanis.

22 MS. BRIAN ALANIS: Yes, good evening, Commissioners
23 and officers. This is regarding the reinstatement of an
24 officer that had been discharged for cause. I was
25 wondering if there was specific federal case law, which

1 allows collective bargaining arbitration to supersede the
2 city charter. It may not be necessary for me to know, but
3 I think before you exceed your authority in any manner,
4 then you should look into that specifically. Because any
5 officer that had that many complaints to warrant
6 discharge is a danger to the citizenry, not only just the
7 reputation of the officers who are trying to do a good
8 job for the City of Detroit, but would be a danger to the
9 community. And I thank you for your time. And I yield my
10 time.

11 MR. ROB BROWN: Ms. Mitchell George.

12 MS. GEORGE: Yes. Can you hear me, Mr. Brown?

13 MR. ROB BROWN: Yes.

14 MS. GEORGE: Oh, okay. I just want to say hello to
15 everyone, to Chair Bell and Vice-Chair Jones, and the
16 Board. Also, Chief AC White, you're doing a wonderful
17 job. So we continue to support you. I know it's a lot of
18 work that you were left with, but when it comes to the
19 drag racing, I think it's also a misdemeanor, it needs to
20 be made a felony, but like as Chief AC White stated we
21 have to, they cannot do it by themselves. So we have to
22 come up with legislation, what we have to do. When you
23 talk about the... and it starts with the Mayor too. The
24 Mayor needs to be making a little press conference but
25 that's another subject. When you talk about the

1 marijuana, the marijuana issue with this violence,
2 there's an article that talks about... yes, we are going
3 to work on people that are in prison who have been
4 unjust, you know, 26 years for marijuana is ridiculous.
5 So working on a law to get some people out there they're
6 trying to legalize, but paranoia, unfounded distrust,
7 marijuana-induced psychosis, radical personalities, loss
8 of contact with reality, uncontrolled behavioral
9 functions is what's happening with this weed. That is
10 what you're seeing at Greektown. That is what you're
11 seeing driving. And so that's where hopefully, I can go
12 to DC soon where it has to start at the federal level
13 before they legalize, they need to get the people out of
14 prison. Thank you for catching that with the 80
15 complaints, because you're right that will lead up... I
16 met with the chief of police last week and I will not
17 call out his name, but just dealing with some of the
18 issues. But one of the most white cities in the country,
19 in the State of Michigan, but he sat down with me, you
20 know, in terms of some issues. So thank you for catching
21 it with the 80 complaints, because that can lead to
22 another issue. Commissioner Holley, facial recognition,
23 it has to go, there was a test of someone from Michigan,
24 you know, his name that was wrongly unjustly accused of
25 that facial recognition testified in front of the crime

1 terrorism, Homeland Security Committee. He's right there
2 online talking about the

3 MR. ROB BROWN: The Mr. Chair. I go to caller 999
4 again. Caller 9999. Mr. Chair, they're not responding. So
5 that was the last person for public comment.

6 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much, Mr. Brown,
7 and thank you, ladies and gentlemen. Thanks to those of
8 you who've been patient with your public comment. I want
9 to just say before, I ask for a motion for the closed
10 session. It won't take but 30 seconds. And that is, you
11 know, when you when we bring up this officer, Chief White
12 said he's going to do a comprehensive investigation. So
13 don't say that we are just passing this on. We're not
14 passing this on. We were very concerned about this and
15 any other allegations like that? So please don't say
16 that, we're not just passing on. We're basically going to
17 deal with this and you will basically hear the results of
18 the comprehensive investigation as well as others. At
19 this particular time. I want to thank all of you,
20 Commissioners I need your cooperation of another just...
21 maybe 12 to 13 minutes of public comment to conclude a
22 motion to go into closed session, pursuant to MCL 15.268
23 to review the contents of the applications for
24 appointment to public office for the chief of police. It
25

1 is very important that we talk about this, and so
2 I'm asking for a motion to go into closed session.

3 COMMISSIONER BURCH: I make that motion, Chair Holley
4 that we go into closed session.

5 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: It's been properly moved by
6 Commissioner Burch, and Commissioner Burton, properly
7 second. All in favor, aye.

8 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

9 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Oppose. Please look at your
10 phones and get the information on how to get in. Please
11 don't go to the bathroom, don't get no water, and don't
12 get no sandwiches or anything. Let's go straight to that
13 and then we get out of here. Okay.

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
