- 1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: And now Chaplain Roberts.
- 2 CHAPLAIN ROBERTS: Gracious father we thank you for
- 3 this wonderful day and we invite your presence in this
- 4 meeting. We thanks you in advance for your guidance you
- 5 wisdom and as decisions are made for our great city. I
- 6 pray for unification among the participants as they work
- 7 in one accord. Continue to bless each participant and
- 8 their families. I see peace over everyone. In Jesus name
- 9 I pray Amen.
- 10 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thanks you so much chaplain. Mr.
- 11 Brown.
- 12 MR. ROB BROWN: Good afternoon, Mr. Chair, this
- 13 Honorable Board and citizens of Detroit. The Board Police
- 14 Commissioners mission summary. The Board Police
- 15 Commission, BOPC is a civilian agency to exercise
- 16 supervisor control and oversight of the Detroit Police
- 17 Department, DPD, as set forth in their Charter. The Board
- 18 has 11 members, 70 elected by District 4 appointed by the
- 19 mayor with the consent of Detroit's City Council. The
- 20 Board meets every week as a committee of the whole,
- 21 including 12 community/evening meetings in the district.
- 22 The BOPC is the oversight agency for the police
- 23 department. The department policy rules and regulations
- 24 governing the Detroit Police Department are jointly
- 25 developed by the Mayor, Police Chief, and this Board. The



- 1 Board has superior powder under this Charter that can be
- 2 used for investigative purposes. The Commission also
- 3 reviews, approved DPD budget pursuant to the Charter,
- 4 investigate non-criminal citizen complaints and act as a
- 5 final authority in proposing or reviewing the discipline
- 6 of employees of the department. Reviews hear
- 7 disqualification appeals from police recruits hoping to
- 8 enter the Detroit Police Academy. The BOPC makes an
- 9 annual report to the Mayor, the City Council, and the
- 10 public of BOPC activities and accomplishments. Mr. Chair,
- 11 that's the reading of the Mission.
- 12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much, Mr. Brown. At
- 13 this time, Ms. White, can I have the roll call?
- MRS. WHITE: Yes, through the Chair Vice-Chairperson,
- 15 Martin Jones. Please acknowledge your presence.
- 16 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Good morning. Vice-Chair Martin
- 17 Jones, At-Large.
- 18 MRS. WHITE: Commissioner Linda Bernard.
- 19 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Attorney Linda Bernard,
- 20 District 2. Hello, everyone.
- 21 MRS. WHITE: Commissioner Shirley Birch.
- 22 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Commissioner, Shirley Burch, of
- 23 the 3 District. Respect and love where you live.
- 24 MRS. WHITE: Commissioner
- 25 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: She's talking, she's talking



- 1 MRS. WHITE: Yes, we've accounted for her. Thank you.
- 2 MRS. WHITE: Commissioner Willie E. Bell.
- 3 COMMISSIONER BELL: Present.
- 4 MRS. WHITE: Commissioner Willie Burton.
- 5 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Present.
- 6 MRS. WHITE: Commissioner Lisa Carter.
- 7 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Present.
- 8 MRS. WHITE: Commissioner William M. Davis.
- 9 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Good afternoon, everyone. Police
- 10 Commissioner William M. Davis. Officers love where you
- 11 work.
- 12 MRS. WHITE: Commissioner Annie Mae Holt.
- 13 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Good afternoon. Commissioner
- 14 Annie Mae Holt, At-Large.
- MRS. WHITE: Mr. Chair, you have a quorum.
- 16 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much and thank each
- 17 and every one of you as Commissioners. Thank you for your
- 18 time and your commitment to this engagement that we have
- 19 each week. Thank you so much. At this time, I would like
- 20 to make a motion for approval of the agenda for August th
- 21 19 , 2021.
- 22 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: So moved.
- 23 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Support.
- 24 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: All in favor, say aye.
- 25 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.



- 1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Oppose.
- 2 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Opposition.
- 3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay, let the record,
- 4 basically... the motion carries. Thank you so much. The
- 5 minutes of the previous meetings have been distributed to
- 6 each and every one of you for today's August the 12th,
- 7 2021. I think the questions to those minutes?
- 8 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Move for approval, Mr. Chair.
- 9 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Support.
- 10 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Discussion. All in favor, say
- 11 aye.
- 12 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
- 13 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Oppose. The ayes have it. Thank
- 14 you so much for that. At this time Mrs. White, can you
- 15 give us an idea of who's here today?
- MRS. WHITE: Yes. Through the Chair, the media
- 17 services are recording the Board's meeting today and our
- 18 court reporter is Mr. Dan Handyside. The following Board
- 19 staff members are in attendance, Mr. Robert Brown,
- 20 Administrative Specialist, Ms. Theresa Blossom, Community
- 21 Relations Coordinator, Ms. Jonya Underwood,
- 22 Administrative Assistant and Investigator Tiffany
- 23 Stewart, Board Parliamentarian, Dr. Francis Jackson.
- 24 Director Katrina Patillo, Director of Police Personnel,
- 25 Assistant Corporation Counsel, Ericka Savage Whitley,



- 1 Interim Chief investigator Lawrence Akbar. And that
- 2 concludes the staff introductions for today, sir.
- 3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you very much. Chief, it's
- 4 always good to see you. We thank you for being with us
- 5 this afternoon. Can you give us an idea of who is with
- 6 you today?
- 7 CHIEF WHITE: Good afternoon. Through the Chair.
- 8 Thank you very much. I am happy to be here. I have with
- 9 me the Director of Professional Standards, Chris
- 10 Graveline. I have Ron Thomas from the DPOA Vice-
- 11 President. I have Sheila McBride who is my assistant and
- 12 my staff and whoever I'm missing, please stand up. Deputy
- 13 Chief Marlon Wilson. Thank you.
- 14 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you, Chief, and to your
- 15 staff, we thank you for being with us this afternoon as
- 16 well. Ms. White, do we have any special guests?
- 17 MRS. WHITE: Yes sir. Through the Chair Ms. Marie
- 18 Overall of State Representative Tyrone Carter's Office
- 19 and Lieutenant Mark Young of the Lieutenants and
- 20 Sergeants Association are also on Zoom. Also, the
- 21 Advisory Council Chair Scotty Bowman is present. Thank
- 22 you.
- 23 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: And thank you. Thank all of you.
- 24 At this particular time, let me just say a couple of
- 25 things to you this afternoon. Thank you again for



- 1 attending our meeting. We continue to encourage everyone
- 2 to stay safe as COVID-19 continues to exist. The Board
- 3 will continue to meet in person, but we have expanded
- 4 excess to give everyone the best chance to see and
- 5 participate at the time at which the CDC guidelines of
- 6 public meetings, really limit the space for public
- 7 seating. These expanded options give all residents and
- 8 stakeholders the best risk-free opportunity to see and
- 9 take part in every Board meeting. Commissioners at this
- 10 time, I'd like to share just a few things in terms of
- 11 updates with you and I won't be long. First of all, I
- 12 just want to let you know that the OMA prohibits a public
- 13 body from meeting remotely unless accommodation of an
- 14 absent member of the body is necessary due to the
- 15 military duty, medical conditions, and an event of a
- 16 statewide or local State emergency as a state of a
- 17 disaster declared pursuant to the governing law.
- 18 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Therefore, Commissioners, if
- 19 you're unable to attend in person, you may only
- 20 participate by way of remote options if these things that
- 21 I've mentioned briefly that you need to have a part of,
- 22 or that you use it as an excuse. And so I want to thank
- 23 all of you for being really loyal and faithful to this
- 24 piece of legislature. I want to thank TJA Adams Staffing
- 25 Service for the one for the work they've done in the



- 1 chief of police executive committee search, as well as
- 2 the Board, as we work to build the charter mandates. I
- 3 submitted to Mayor Duggan, the recommended list of
- 4 candidates and the names for consideration of appointment
- 5 to the chief of police. We will wait for communication
- 6 from the mayor. I've asked him to inform each and every
- 7 one of you individually of his choice and that it would
- 8 not go through me, but basically go from him to each and
- 9 every one of you.
- 10 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: And he is basically committed to
- 11 doing just that. The Chief of Police report today, we
- 12 look forward to hearing the Chief's report and also
- 13 updates, including the recent announcement made by
- 14 Governor Whitmer providing funds to reduce crime and
- 15 support local law enforcement agencies. I would really,
- 16 Chief, like for you to respond to that.
- 17 CHIEF WHITE: Yes, sir.
- 18 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I think all of us do. The
- 19 presentation will be, we have only one presentation
- 20 today, Sex Crimes Unit, Captain Cerner Commanding Officer
- 21 will make that presentation and certainly, I also want
- 22 you to know that I have Dr. Francis Jackson here today.
- 23 She's here to summarize and provide an overview of the
- 24 proposed bylaws and amendments to add to the committee's
- 25 structure, to the Board's operation. Staff previously



- 1 provided all supporting material to each and every one of
- 2 you. I hope you had an opportunity to read it in order to
- 3 be able to follow here and have comments or basically
- 4 read it through. Maybe in a couple of weeks to really
- 5 come and basically try to put this to a vote. However,
- 6 the summary will be valuable for each of the members, so
- 7 that we have a good understanding of what's being
- 8 proposed for your consideration.
- 9 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: And finally, OCI has cases,
- 10 rather remind each of you, we've given you certain cases
- 11 that we asked that each and every one of you to really
- 12 look at and just really try to do them so we can get the
- complaints them back to the OCI. Some of you have done
- 14 that. In fact, some of you refused to comply with this.
- 15 Also, I want you to know each and every one of you will
- 16 be sitting where I'm sitting one day or another as the
- 17 chairman of this Board. I'm asking you to really be
- 18 concerned about how we're basically going in and talking
- 19 to staff, without going through the Chairman.
- 20 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I'm just asking that we follow
- 21 all the protocols because each and every one of you will
- 22 be chairman one day. And I'm asking that you know, this
- 23 particular protocol will make things go real well. We can
- 24 expect the staff to do their work if we don't complete
- our work. NACOLES conference has begun. The conference



- 1 will go through October 7th, 2021, in person. NACOLES
- 2 conference will be held later this year. I'm asking that
- 3 the Commissioners attend the virtual conference held each
- 4 week as a way to keep you informed of the effective
- 5 practice and training to the civilian oversight. The new
- 6 OCI investigators will start working on Monday the 23rd
- 7 of this month. We're looking forward to making sure each
- 8 and every one of you has an opportunity to meet them. And
- 9 also even to really greet them as we work forward.
- 10 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: OCI, I want you to know that of
- 11 the headquarters of the OCI, the plumbing update, the
- 12 plumbing issue has been fixed, completely resolved.
- 13 Notifications have been distributed to staff. We continue
- 14 to work with the department of the city to ensure that
- 15 Commissioners, basically have all the updates that are
- 16 needed in order to be able to make sure they work
- 17 effectively. I really don't like to say it to every
- 18 meeting that we have to say to each and every one of you,
- 19 because I think all of us are basically very professional
- 20 in terms of speaking out of turn, not recognizing the
- 21 chairman, all of that. I don't want to do that. I just
- 22 want to make sure that we are all professionals. So I
- 23 don't want to have to say this anymore. I don't feel good
- 24 about saying it because I think all of you are very
- 25 professional because we all want to make sure that the



- 1 quorum of the meeting is intact. For that, I'm very
- 2 grateful to each and every one of you. At this particular
- 3 time, I'd like to move on if you don't mind, and
- 4 basically, I have a...
- 5 MRS. WHITE: A resolution, sir.
- 6 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay if that's what you're
- 7 saying.
- 8 MRS. WHITE: Yes.
- 9 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I'm looking for it, but I just
- 10 can't find it.
- 11 MRS. WHITE: Okay. Commissioner Holt is prepared to
- 12 read the Resolution as well.
- 13 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I'm telling you.
- 14 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Thank you, Chair Holley.
- 15 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: And also, Ms. White.
- 16 COMMISSIONER HOLT: And Ms. White. Resolution
- 17 honoring Corporal
- 18 Theopolis Williams. WHEREAS Theopolis Williams was
- 19 appointed to the Detroit Police Department on June 29th,
- 20 1995. Upon graduating from the Detroit Metropolitan
- 21 Police Department, Police Officer Williams began his
- 22 career at the 7th Precinct. And, WHEREAS he dutifully
- 23 served the 7th Precinct, Northeastern District, Homicide,
- 24 Narcotics, Vice Enforcement, and Major Crimes. Officer
- 25 Williams displayed tremendous diligence and aptitudes in



- 1 his assignments. On October 18th, 2018, he was promoted
- 2 to the rank of Corporal and served at the Arson Unit and
- 3 again, and homicide until his retirement. And, WHEREAS
- 4 during his law enforcement career, Corporal Williams was
- 5 the deserving recipient of a life-saving Citation and
- 6 Medal. Chief Unit Award, Consent Judgement Award, The
- 7 Major League Baseball, All-Star Recognition Award, The
- 8 Rosa Parks Funeral Recognition Award, and the Super bowl
- 9 XL Recognition Award, as well as commendations
- 10 supervisors and numerous letters of appreciation from
- 11 citizenry.
- 12 COMMISSIONER HOLT: And, WHEREAS Corporal Williams
- 13 has tirelessly served the Detroit Police Department, the
- 14 citizens of Detroit and its neighboring communities for
- 15 26 years. His professionalism, commitment to public
- 16 service, integrity, and education, have been a credit to
- 17 the Detroit Police Department. He is highly respected as
- 18 a consummate professional. THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that
- 19 the Detroit Board of Police Commissioners, speaking for
- 20 the citizens of Detroit and the Detroit Police Department
- 21 awards this Resolution in recognition of Corporal
- 22 Theopolis Williams and his 26 plus years of dedicated and
- 23 diligent public service. His professionalism, integrity,
- 24 and lifelong commitment to the City of Detroit and its
- 25 citizens merit our highest regard. We thank and



- 1 congratulate you, Corporal Theopolis Williams. Through
- 2 the Chair.
- 3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes.
- 4 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: I moved to adopt this
- 5 Resolution honoring Corporal Theopolis Williams and have
- 6 it placed in the archives of the Board of Police
- 7 Commissioners.
- 8 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Second.
- 9 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Support.
- 10 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Is there a discussion? All in
- 11 favor, say, aye.
- 12 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
- 13 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much. The motion is
- 14 carried. I have to always answer in opposition. Thank you
- 15 very much, parliamentarian. I miss you so much. Chief,
- 16 it's your time. It's good to see you again. Thank you for
- 17 being here.
- 18 CHIEF WHITE: Yes, sir. Through the Chair, good
- 19 afternoon, everyone.
- 20 COMMISSIONERS: Good afternoon.
- 21 CHIEF WHITE: And again, thank you for allowing me
- 22 to appear and present to the Board today. I will start
- 23 off by thanking this honorable body for the opportunity
- 24 to interview for the chief of police position. Though I
- 25 was a bit nervous, I thought the process was very



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- 1 professional. I appreciated the interaction with the
- 2 Commission. So thank you for that. I will start with some
- 3 updates on our sick and injured. We have one sergeant
- 4 from the 7th Precinct, one police officer from the 7th
- 5 Precinct, another police officer from the 11th Precinct
- 6 that are out recovering from injuries sustained while
- 7 working with the Detroit Police Department and we wish
- 8 them all well.
- 9 CHIEF WHITE: I do want to bring to the Commission's
- 10 attention, a very tragic and sad situation involving one
- of our officers with 24 years of service to the Detroit
- 12 Police Department. And that is Officer Khalil Biddle.
- 13 Officer Biddle, 24 years of service, the lion share of
- 14 that time spent at one Precinct, and that is the 10th
- 15 Precinct serving our community. Tragically, he went on
- 16 vacation a couple of weeks back, suffered a stroke, and
- when he exited the airplane, is what I'm understanding,
- 18 and two days ago we received the tragic news that he did
- 19 not recover and he had died. Very, very sad. I believe he
- 20 was 44 years old, 44, 45. So a young man leaves to mourn,
- 21 our department, of course, two children, 11 and 4, and
- 22 his wife. So, we will be working with the family over the
- 23 next few days to support them.
- 24 CHIEF WHITE: And I asked that the Commission keep
- 25 the department as well as his family in your prayers. So



- 1 again, a very tragic, very tragic situation. Moving on to
- 2 our COVID report, we have 25 members that are isolated in
- 3 quarantine battling a COVID exposure. 16 that have been
- 4 confirmed positive. The Commission will know that that is
- 5 a slight uptick we're seen as everyone else is around the
- 6 State, an uptick in our numbers again. So we are going to
- 7 and already have begun to implement some processes to try
- 8 to slow this down. So we don't get back to where we were
- 9 last year, which includes masking inside of the building,
- 10 masking inside of the scout car. I've put a limitation on
- 11 travel to those who are not vaccinated, and some other
- 12 things that we're looking at. We're monitoring the
- 13 reports that come out from the CDC, as well as the
- 14 reports that we get from our own doctor, Dr. Dunn, and
- 15 then making the appropriate adjustments to our operation
- 16 on a day in day out basis.
- 17 CHIEF WHITE: Moving to the crime data, we are
- 18 experiencing a 7% increase in homicide at a 5% increase
- in non-fatal shootings. I am happy to report, but
- 20 certainly not celebrating, a 26% decrease in robberies
- 21 with the total overall part one crime decrease of 3%.
- 22 Again, I want to highlight the fact that we are not
- 23 celebrating at all these decreases. And we certainly
- 24 recognize that one homicide is one too many, but we do
- 25 want to highlight the fact that this does represent a



- 1 decrease, meaning that in order to get where we're trying
- 2 to go, we have to see some movement in that direction.
- 3 And we are starting to see our work pay dividends as it
- 4 relates to crime moving in the right direction. The
- 5 command team, the officers have done an amazing job. For
- 6 example, I'd like to highlight a few things for the
- 7 Commission starting with some work that's coming out of
- 8 the Precincts, specifically.
- 9 CHIEF WHITE: So the criminal homicides are down 7%
- in the 5th Precinct, 33% in the 7th Precinct, and 12%,
- 11 I'm sorry, correction, 37% in the 12th Precinct. Looking
- 12 at year-to-date data, when we look at the non-fatal
- 13 shootings, these numbers can carry our overall stats as
- 14 well. At the non-fatal shootings, we've got an 18%
- 15 reduction in the 2nd Precinct, a 6% reduction in the 7th
- 16 Precinct, and a 22% reduction in the 8th Precinct. The
- 17 8th Precinct being one of our busiest Precincts in the
- 18 city. You know, those numbers are quite impressive and
- 19 attributed to the work of the men and women of this
- 20 department. When we look at our robberies, in our 2nd
- 21 Precinct we have a 29% reduction in robberies and a 24%
- 22 reduction in the 3rd Precinct, 18% reduction in the 4th
- 23 Precinct, 25% reduction in the 5th Precinct, 42%
- 24 reduction in the 6th Precinct, 9% reduction to the 7th,
- 25 37 in the 8th, 4% in the 9th, 18% in the 10th, 30% in the



- 1 11th, and 43% in the 12th. And again, those are year-to-
- 2 date numbers, not boasting, not bragging, but certainly
- 3 acknowledging the work that they're doing. And the reason
- 4 that this work is even more important to measure and look
- 5 at this in present time, is that these robberies are
- 6 declining even though we are getting more people in the
- 7 community, more people are out, and more people are
- 8 involved and moving around. So both those are powerful
- 9 numbers and great work by the command team and the
- 10 officers of this department. That is the visibility,
- 11 that's being out in the field, and certainly getting
- 12 these weapons off the streets, which the officers are
- doing a fine job of. I want to talk a little bit about
- 14 drag racing and drifting, again, great work coming out of
- 15 our new leadership and commercial auto theft, under our
- 16 new Lieutenant there. Lieutenant Stewart, I believe his
- 17 name is Clive, and also the leadership of our commander
- 18 and others.
- 19 CHIEF WHITE: Last week alone 36 traffic stops, 49
- 20 traffic citations, 7 vehicles impounded, 2 stolen
- 21 vehicles were recovered. 1 felony arrest, 2 misdemeanor
- 22 arrests, and 1 weapon recovered. You know, we're hoping
- 23 that by doing this work that people will make better
- 24 decisions, not drifting and drag racing in the community.
- 25 It's such a dangerous exercise. The goal is not to



- 1 continuously go out there and make these arrests, but we
- 2 will not tolerate the people who come to our town and
- 3 those that live in our town taking it upon themselves to
- 4 make the entire community unsafe by this behavior. So
- 5 we'll continue to do that work.
- 6 CHIEF WHITE: Finally, I want to bring to your
- 7 attention a number of incidents. I'll be brief but
- 8 they're very important incidents that I want to update
- 9 you on. The first one is you will recall, I reported on
- 10 this a couple of weeks back. 3 people shot, ages 14, two
- 11 15 year-olds, one 14-year-old. And this is the incident
- 12 that involved, we thought at the time, a PAL football
- 13 league, but it was not a PAL football league. It was a
- 14 football league, a new football, relatively new football
- 15 league, where a bunch of young people had some
- 16 confrontation, shots were exchanged and people were
- 17 injured. Three people in fact were injured. The good news
- is all three will recover from their injuries. And the
- 19 bad news is, we had a young person, a 16 year-old suspect
- 20 who pulled the trigger, who has confessed. It was in fact
- 21 a confession, and he's been charged with assault with
- 22 intent to commit murder. Very, very sad for him and his
- 23 family. And certainly, for the community, when you have a
- 24 young person that age making the decision such as that.
- 25 Our second incident that's been trending on social media



- 1 is someone who made a decision to chain themselves or get
- 2 chained to the top of a vehicle and drive on the Lodge
- 3 Freeway. When we see those events we react to them.
- 4 CHIEF WHITE: Oftentimes, we don't get in front of a
- 5 camera and tell everybody what doing but we're seeing
- 6 them like everyone else and we are reacting to them. The
- 7 vehicle associated with the incident has been identified
- 8 by our team. We've located the registered owner of the
- 9 vehicle. Our general assignment unit is actively
- 10 investigating this matter. And we look to see what
- 11 charges we can bring because we certainly don't want
- 12 copycats on this incident who are erroneously thinking we
- 13 are not responding to that matter. So another incident I
- 14 want to bring to your attention,
- 15 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I'm sorry, chained to what,
- 16 Wow!
- 17 CHIEF WHITE: I'm sorry. He was chained to the roof
- 18 of his vehicle and driving up the Lodge Freeway. Someone
- 19 was driving the vehicle, he was chained to the roof and
- 20 was just driving up the Freeway and ducking as he went
- 21 under the overpasses and I still, right now, we don't
- 22 know why he was doing it. It appears to be some interest
- 23 in getting some social media clicks or something along
- 24 those lines. I want to update the Commission also on a
- 25 matter. We have a number of investigations going on



- 1 within the department and sadly we've got 98%, 99% of our
- 2 men and women that are out there really doing absolutely
- 3 everything they should do want them to do representing
- 4 our agency and doing a great work of this department. A
- 5 lot of my time, however, is being spent not bolstering
- 6 that work, but bringing closure to, or attention to the
- 7 disciplinary matters in the department, which is part of
- 8 it, I get it. I would love to be able to highlight that
- 9 great work, more so but what garners the most interest is
- 10 these disciplinary matters that we have to speak on. To
- 11 that end, one in particular, I want to bring to your
- 12 attention with regards to the officers who were
- 13 surrounded at a party, and a young lady made the decision
- 14 to dance on the hood of the officer's vehicle. I took the
- 15 position based on the information that I had at the time
- 16 that the officers, based on what I was told, and based on
- 17 the information that was shared, were in a situation
- 18 where they were surrounded and it was the best decision
- 19 to not engage that citizen at that time. But I did direct
- 20 that an investigation be done and that investigation was
- 21 underway.
- 22 CHIEF WHITE: I've been updated on that
- 23 investigation, and I do have some concerns about some of
- 24 the things that I'm hearing from that investigation and
- 25 seeing from that investigation. So more to come on that,



- 1 but I did want to update the Commission on that and the
- 2 results of that investigation are lining up somewhat
- 3 different from the information I received. There does
- 4 appear preliminarily to have been an opportunity to
- 5 engage that citizen and remove them from that vehicle
- 6 safely. And that's what we're looking at but the
- 7 investigation continues. I'm not ready to conclude where
- 8 we are yet, but I just was updated in my weekly briefing
- 9 with internal affairs, and I'm wanting to make sure that
- 10 I shared that information. That investigation is
- 11 continuing. And then finally, tomorrow we will graduate
- 12 23 students, welcoming them to our family of Detroit
- 13 Police Officers.
- 14 CHIEF WHITE: This will take place at Campus Martius
- 15 at 10:30. Our operation United and this was a positive,
- 16 but certainly, will come across somewhat, if not a
- 17 positive but operation United began its exhumations or
- 18 exhuming bodies on Tuesday, August 17th. They've exhumed
- 19 thus far 31 and since 2019, they have exhumed 57. And I
- 20 know I have that listed as a positive and I'll explain
- 21 why. So over the past 35 years in Wayne County
- 22 unidentified deaths after a period of time were buried
- 23 legally because they were unidentified, no one knew who
- 24 they were, if they were foul play. You know, they spent a
- 25 particular amount of time and I don't have a specific



- 1 time and the morgue, and then at some point, they're
- 2 buried. With the advances and technology and DNA, we have
- 3 a team here that is partnered with the FBI missing
- 4 persons from around the country and using DNA analysis I
- 5 have been able to identify who some of these people are,
- 6 for a couple of reasons. One to bring closure to the
- 7 family and to see that they were a victim of crime. And
- 8 if we know on the front end that they were a victim of
- 9 crime, some of this DNA has resulted in being able to
- 10 track down the perpetrators of that crime, even years
- 11 later. So it's a very positive situation, borne out of a
- 12 very sad, tragic situation. One of the positives to come
- of this too is I was out there Monday, out in Plymouth at
- 14 the cemetery, and in speaking with the team, there was a
- 15 recovery, a skeletal recovery of a person who was
- 16 deceased at 6:00 AM.
- 17 CHIEF WHITE: I'm stopping short of saying murdered
- 18 because they don't have a determinant yet, at 16 years
- 19 old. Her son who is 50 now believes that his mother
- abandoned him when he was a child. She went missing,
- 21 moved out and abandoned him. He's a police officer in
- 22 Michigan and by virtue of exhuming her body, they in fact
- 23 know that she did not abandon them, that she did succumb
- 24 to some tragedy. They are trying to identify exactly what
- 25 that was. But the work that they're doing is bringing



- 1 closure to some 50 years later to this young man, we had
- 2 a very different version of events of his own life. So
- 3 this is a very positive situation borne out of tragedy.
- 4 And there's good work being done by the Detroit Police
- 5 Department, the FBI, and a number of other entities that
- 6 escape me right now. And then finally, the Commission
- 7 Chair has asked that I brief out on some work with the
- 8 governor herself. I'm very honored to attend a press
- 9 conference this week with the governor regarding her 4
- 10 point crime plan that involves not just Detroit, but also
- 11 Detroit.
- 12 CHIEF WHITE: And one of the biggest takeaway from
- 13 this plan is that it will be a plan that is somewhat
- 14 different from many of the plans that we've done over the
- 15 years. This plan has money for education. A reduction in
- 16 recidivism has money for programming that allows us to
- 17 break that pipeline from school to prison, it disrupts
- 18 it. And I think with this innovative program and
- 19 partnership with the Wayne County Prosecutor's Office,
- 20 we'll be able to really make an impact on crime when we
- 21 start to see some real numbers and giving people some
- 22 different opportunities to do things other than making
- 23 poor decisions. Very briefly with that, I did make a
- 24 couple of notes, if I could find them, and they are here,
- 25 education, jobs, working with domestic violence victims,



- 1 reduction in gun violence, giving the police department
- 2 and other entities training tools, resources funding to
- 3 hire more police officers, education for
- 4 Chief: Education for young people on domestic
- 5 violence, working with social workers to bring messages
- 6 to schools, kids regarding making those choices that we
- 7 talked about earlier with drag racing, and things such as
- 8 that, that they simply just may not know about. They may
- 9 think it is cool, but don't know the ramifications of
- 10 those types of decisions. So we're excited to be a part
- of it. There are also some conversations on diversity
- 12 training, mental health support for our officers, and a
- 13 number of other opportunities to really be innovative in
- 14 how we go about reducing crime in our city. And again,
- 15 you know, different ways of reducing crime. I have never
- 16 been a supporter of these tagline programs declaring war
- on drugs, war on this, war on that. They simply don't
- 18 work. It sounds good and gives you an immediate bite but
- 19 statistically we never really get to the point where you
- 20 are addressing the issues that are driving your time. I
- 21 don't like scare straight programs for kids. I said it
- 22 before, kids that are out here making these decisions are
- 23 already scared.
- 24 CHIEF WHITE: So you're not really going to help them
- 25 by scaring them more. You need to give them something



- 1 more tangible. And this program has promised to give them
- 2 that tangible result where they can see how to make
- 3 better decisions and a pathway to making better
- 4 decisions. So with that, I'll take any questions.
- 5 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you, Chief, just before I
- 6 ask Mr. Jones to do the round-robin, Commissioner Burton,
- 7 I want to make sure that you know that he's here. He was
- 8 here for roll call and then also Commissioner, I'm asking
- 9 that if you would please look forward to having a small
- 10 report for me on facial recognition for the next Board
- 11 meeting. Would you do that for us? Thank you so much.
- 12 Thank you for taking the task on as well. Vice-Chair
- Jones, would you give the opportunity for questions from
- 14 the Board members?
- 15 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Thank you, Chair Holley. The Vice-
- 16 Chair recognizes Commissioner Annie Hole, At-Large. Do
- 17 you have any questions for the Chief?
- 18 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Thank you, Chair Holley and Vice-
- 19 Chair Jones. Thank you Chief White for a very detailed
- 20 report that also is reflecting a sensitive side to DPD as
- 21 you report out on the tragedies involving citizens' loss
- of life and to their family members. And no, I have no
- 23 questions for the Interim Chief White.



- 1 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Thank you, Commissioner Holt.
- 2 Commissioner Jesus Hernandez, do you have any questions
- 3 for the Chief?
- 4 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: He's off.
- 5 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Commissioner William Davis,
- 6 District 7. Do you have any questions for the Chief?
- 7 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Yes. Question. Do you have an
- 8 update yet on the Greektown incident where a citizen was
- 9 pushed and punched and especially as it relates to what
- 10 was going on prior to that, and what happened after that?
- 11 CHIEF WHITE: I have somewhat of an update. The
- 12 investigation continues. We pulled a number of videos
- 13 from around the neighboring businesses, as well as the
- 14 body cameras. He remains suspended. I've seen nothing
- 15 that suggested he should be brought back at this time.
- 16 But the investigation is still ongoing and we're getting
- 17 close to concluding it.
- 18 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: And was there a higher ranking
- 19 officer there that observed everything, was in charge of
- 20 the scene.
- 21 CHIEF WHITE: I would say that there was more than
- 22 one high-ranking officer there. I cannot speak to what
- 23 they observed yet. At this point, I cannot say what they
- 24 observed.
- 25 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: That's all I have.



- 1 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Thank you, Commissioner Davis. The
- 2 Vice-Chair recognizes District 6, Commissioner Lisa
- 3 Carter.
- 4 COMMISSIONER CARTER: No questions, thank you.
- 5 VICE-CHAIR JONES: All right. Vice-Chair recognizes
- 6 District 5, Commissioner Willie Burton.
- 7 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I don't have any questions at
- 8 this time.
- 9 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Thank you, Mr. Burton. The Vice-
- 10 Chair recognizes District 4, Commissioner Willie Bell.
- 11 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, Vice-Chair Jones. Mr.
- 12 Chair. I just want to make a statement more or less in
- 13 terms of the interview that took place last week. I think
- 14 you responded, Commissioner Jones responded. I received
- an inquiry only ranking, retired DPD executive, and also
- 16 a very high profile NOBLE which does interviews all over
- 17 the country in some form or another, and I want to
- 18 apologize to Chief White. I don't know if he witnessed
- 19 that, but in terms of Chief Dunlap and Chief Cox, that
- 20 unprofessional behavior by this Board clapping, Amen.
- 21 Amen. That is totally inappropriate for a professional
- 22 body to act in that manner at an interview process at any
- 23 level. So I just wanted to thank Mr. Chair. If it's
- 24 appropriate, I would like Madam Secretary to direct the

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- 1 communication to those two individuals apologizing
- 2 for that type of behavior.
- 3 COMMISSIONER BELL: I just think that we need to go
- 4 on record that it's not acceptable. In the future, we
- 5 need to conduct ourselves accordingly. This is not a
- 6 cheer team, this is not ball. These people are here for
- 7 serious interviews. So I just want to state that. And I
- 8 just want to commend Chief White for doing an excellent
- 9 job in terms of what we've been dealing with crime. We
- 10 all know the impact, but there have been several programs
- 11 to change the script. It's not a Band-Aid approach. It
- 12 has to be a long-range approach in terms of what we're
- dealing with because we have a mentality where young
- 14 people with lack of parenting, and we can go on and on,
- 15 but I know it has to be a long-range plan and that's what
- 16 we're looking for. As you said, the war on drugs, war on
- 17 this that didn't work, scared straight that didn't work.
- 18 So basically I'm pleased to hear that the governor is
- 19 working with others. Thank you, Mr. Chair.
- 20 VICE-CHAIR JONES: All right. Thank you, Commissioner
- 21 Willie Bell. District 3. The Chair recognizes
- 22 Commissioner Shirley Burch.
- COMMISSIONER BURCH: I thank you so much, co-Chair I
- 24 would like to speak to Interim White regarding your
- 25 remarks that many times that Chair Holley tells us as



- 1 Commissioners to voice our opinions and do it in
- 2 courtesy, I believe I've followed those rules since I've
- 3 become a commissioner. When you mentioned that Governor
- 4 Whitmer was here, you fail to remind everybody, I don't
- 5 know how and why you did that, sir. But I'm saying that
- 6 she came to District 3 where I am the Commissioner of
- 7 District 3. So there are a lot of times that even when we
- 8 spoke to each other at the conference, it seems to be
- 9 that, it's like a lack of reporting, exactly everything,
- 10 and nobody can report everything she said. But Chief
- 11 White, did say that we have to work together. That's what
- 12 she said.
- 13 COMMISSIONER BURCH: And then she said solutions. So
- 14 it can't be about how sometimes the different
- 15 Commissioners will speak on whom they really prefer. And
- 16 they do it in a very way that they're letting the public
- 17 know. And I'm saying that really to Mr. Bell. I don't
- 18 have a problem in speaking my opinion, because I have
- 19 asked you, sir, Chief White, I have asked you for a
- 20 report from AC LeValley regarding the tipsy drug. I have
- 21 asked this Board for a report from citizens when they
- 22 have those complaints with the reports that we receive,
- 23 is there a recording of their conversation? I did not
- 24 receive an answer. And then there are times when I
- 25 commend the staff of Ms. White, Blossom and Mr. Brown,



- 1 and Ms. Underwood. But when I, as a commissioner, asked
- 2 for certain people's numbers, it's either a wrong number
- 3 or that person doesn't call back.
- 4 COMMISSIONER BURCH: So sometimes it's just the
- 5 respect that I feel I don't say I don't receive as a
- 6 commissioner. So I was there at the press conference with
- 7 you, you had a two-minute conversation with the governor.
- 8 So now I'm on her phone line where I can speak from the
- 9 perspective where you're an officer, I am a citizen and a
- 10 commissioner. So I feel the pain of my neighbors, of what
- 11 we go through that sometimes they don't get to express
- 12 it, but I do Mr. Bell, and excuse me, Chief White and to
- 13 Chair Holley. I'm not a troublemaker. I am a person that
- 14 believes in unity, but a lot of times we don't get our
- answers answered. I'll say I don't. So I wish you would
- 16 reply to me, why you didn't say anything about it. I was
- 17 present because that was an invited conference. So Chief
- 18 White, why didn't you say that in your remarks?
- 19 CHIEF WHITE: Through the Chair, there was no intent
- 20 to omit you, ma'am, I'm was just running through my
- 21 report. I had a pretty robust report. No disrespect
- intended on my end. So please accept my apologies.
- 23 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: And we will note the fact that
- 24 you were at that particular meeting, Commissioner. Thank
- 25 you so much for your comments.



- 1 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Thank you, Chair Holley. Thank
- 2 you, Chief White.
- 3 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Thank you, Commissioner Burch. The
- 4 Vice-Chair recognizes Commissioner Linda Bernard,
- 5 District 2.
- 6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Hi, everyone. A couple of
- 7 things. First of all, I think I want to address
- 8 Commissioner Bell's comments about, I assume, the
- 9 interviews last week when I express my delight at some of
- 10 the responses that two of the candidates gave, one of
- 11 which was you, Chief White, when you said that you had
- 12 coordinated the response to the consent decree, which had
- 13 lasted for more than a decade for the City of Detroit. I
- 14 am delighted about that.
- 15 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: And I would express that
- 16 delight again. Furthermore, but the other candidate that
- 17 was interviewed indicated that during his tenure gun
- 18 violence had reduced by 2000%, as I recall in his
- 19 comments because of a gun buyback program, which I have
- 20 advocated for since I have been on this Board. I, again,
- 21 express delight, and I would do it again. Now with
- 22 respect to your report Chief White, first of all, I want
- 23 to say that you did an outstanding job in terms of your
- 24 report today. It was a pleasure to listen to you and to
- 25 hear your understanding of both sides of the issue



- 1 involving crime. There are always two victims in crime as
- 2 you pointed out. The young man who shot those people. Now
- 3 he's facing three felony charges. That's a tragedy for
- 4 him and his family. And likewise, it was a tragedy for
- 5 the people who were shot.
- 6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: But the question that I have
- 7 for you, and I want to congratulate you too on the fact
- 8 that there has been a reduction in crime from the last
- 9 report we had, and then your actions obviously are having
- 10 some effect within the community. And I say to that, just
- 11 praise the Lord. But I want to know in terms of your
- 12 meeting with the governor and the allocation of the funds
- 13 for the City of Detroit, have you put together a proposed
- 14 budget for how you want to spend those funds on
- 15 education, jobs, reduction in recidivism, partnership
- 16 with the Wayne County Prosecutor, reduction in gun
- 17 violence, which is a thing that I'm very, very committed
- 18 to and making youth aware of the consequences of poor
- 19 decisions. Are you putting together a budget for, what
- 20 was it \$73 million?
- 21 CHIEF WHITE: \$75 billion is the... and thank you for
- 22 the comments, ma'am. Through the Chair, my understanding
- 23 of the dollars is 75 million of those dollars won't be
- 24 specifically for just Detroit, there'll be spread around
- 25 different communities is my understanding right now.



- 1 That's not from the governor, but from others that I've
- 2 talked to about the plan, but what the governor said, it
- 3 was \$75 million for programming.
- 4 CHIEF WHITE: So yes, to your question. We are
- 5 working on our recommendations on how that 75 million can
- 6 help us. And that includes literacy programming,
- 7 disruption from the school to prison pipeline. And those
- 8 disruptions will occur with literacy recidivism, people
- 9 who are creating small acts that will ultimately lead to
- 10 larger acts down the road if there is no interruption.
- 11 And so the team is working very hard on those right now.
- 12 We also are very interested in social workers and
- 13 counselors working in homes where domestic violence is
- 14 happening, because we recognize what the data shows as it
- 15 relates to the victims themselves, but the children of
- 16 the victims as well. So that's where the focus is.
- 17 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: My only other question relates
- 18 to in the old days, they had this program called scared
- 19 straight, where they would take classes of students to
- 20 jail, so they can see what a jail really looks like. It's
- 21 not like it looks like on TV, you know, all nice and
- 22 clean and all that. Is there anything that you thought of
- 23 that you think, because of your social work background
- 24 that you think would interdict that kind of behavior that



- 1 we can participate in or do? Is there anything the
- 2 Commission can do?
- 3 CHIEF WHITE: So, I did my graduate work in the area
- 4 of those kinds of programs and they're statistically not
- 5 valid programs because of the trauma that the young
- 6 people themselves, many of them are going through. You
- 7 know, you're not going to over scare someone, they're
- 8 already scared, but they don't have the basic tenets of
- 9 success. They don't have security, many of them. They
- 10 don't have the requisite support that they need.
- 11 CHIEF WHITE: So what happens in those types of
- 12 programs is a lot of those kids, believe it or not, see
- 13 those types of environments as security and a place to
- 14 belong. So you have to make them understand that a little
- 15 bit differently. So I'm not a proponent of scare straight
- 16 programming for kids. But I am a proponent of making them
- 17 understand what their decisions will result in. And if
- 18 you go left, this is what can happen to you. If you go
- 19 right, what can happen? And that's where we're going to
- 20 put our focus. And we get there working with the schools.
- 21 The program that we have coming in now, where we're
- 22 hiring people, can't be police officers, but there is
- 23 other work that you can do with the police. And so there
- is a lot of programming like that's going on. We're going
- 25 to continue to bolster those works.



- 1 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Can you let us know what your
- 2 proposed budget would be, at least the Chair, so he can
- 3 provide or share it with us for the funds that you're
- 4 going to get from the governor?
- 5 CHIEF WHITE: Yes, ma'am. We are literally just
- 6 putting pen to paper with our programming right now, and
- 7 I'll have something for the Commission very soon.
- 8 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you. Thank you Mr.
- 9 Chairman.
- 10 VICE-CHAIR JONES: All right. I just got one question
- 11 for you or more of a comment for clarification. With
- 12 regards to the personnel, I guess roof surfing on Lodge
- 13 Freeway. Previously I had taken note that a lot of
- 14 incidents or accidents, whatever, having to take place on
- 15 the freeways was basically the jurisdiction of the State
- 16 police. And I was wondering if you can just kind of
- 17 clarify a little bit about maybe why that investigation
- 18 didn't get turned over to them, or why, you know, Detroit
- 19 Police Departments is handling that particular
- 20 investigation so that we understand how it's handled on
- 21 the Freeways around the city?
- 22 CHIEF WHITE: Through the Chair, you're correct.
- 23 Incidents on the freeway have the primary jurisdiction of
- 24 the State police. Simply put, I directed that we do an
- 25 investigation. It happened in the City of Detroit, so I



- 1 wanted an investigation and I directed that will be done,
- 2 but that was brought to my attention. I'm very well aware
- 3 of it as well. But I wanted us to look at it because it's
- 4 ugly. And I don't want copycats, I don't want to see this
- 5 now be the new thing, you know, on the Lodge as they were
- 6 saying a couple of summers ago. So let's get in front of
- 7 it and stop. Let's find out who did it and ticket them.
- 8 We have the authority to do so, so let's do it. But the
- 9 primary jurisdiction of freeway incidents is, in fact,
- 10 the State police but Detroit police officers can in fact
- 11 enforce crimes on the freeways.
- 12 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Thank you for the report, sir, and
- 13 Chair Holley, I turn the meeting back over to you.
- 14 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I thank you so much, Vice-Chair
- 15 Jones. To Chief, thank you so much. Just to clear up that
- 16 the fact is that the 75 million is for the State, not for
- 17 Detroit. So I want to make sure we understand that. And
- 18 then what part of that would be designated you'd think,
- 19 and I think you have to be now, but I think that's part
- of the report that you can... I want to make sure when
- 21 you walk out of here that we're not talking about 75
- 22 million to Detroit but it's for the State law enforcement
- 23 and what part of that will be designated, or is it by
- 24 proposal, or what?



- 1 CHIEF WHITE: So again, I'm going to be working, you
- 2 know, this is early on, and this is our second meeting on
- 3 the issue. As you saw on the presser that the Commission
- 4 was there. You also saw that the Wayne County Prosecutor,
- 5 madam prosecutor was there but there were other
- 6 prosecutors in the room as well. And so I don't want to
- 7 misspeak. I have not been told that the entire 75 million
- 8 is coming to Detroit and Wayne County, but I haven't been
- 9 told that it isn't, either. I don't want to presume that
- 10 it will. So I'm going to make the pitch of what we need
- 11 to do the things that the governor outlined in her plan
- 12 and once I find out how much we're getting towards that,
- 13 I will report to the Commission.
- 14 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you. And finally, Chief
- 15 White,
- 16 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Permission to speak?
- 17 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: We have like 16 homicides over
- 18 what we had a year ago. Don't worry about it. I'm not
- 19 trying to pinpoint it, but when I went through each one
- 20 of those homicides, plus 6% of those are not gang-related
- 21 or drug-related. These are crimes that are family,
- 22 friends, and community-related. So I mean like you try to
- 23 help us with this next week or something. This is
- 24 disturbing because in my mind, maybe I watch television
- 25 too much, like untouchables, but I'm just saying to you



- 1 that I'm thinking this is gang-related, drug-related. But
- 2 in this, I looked at this and I looked at it for three
- 3 days. We're talking about at least 60% of these
- 4 homicides' children, guns, the families don't handle the
- 5 guns in terms of where they put them. You know what I'm
- 6 trying to say, everybody knows what I'm trying to say,
- 7 but I'm just trying to tell you, this is serious.
- 8 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: So I'm just asking, can you next
- 9 week or two, just help me with this, and help us with
- 10 this because this is a game-changer. It's a cultural
- 11 thing.
- 12 CHIEF WHITE: Yes, sir. Through the Chair, I would be
- 13 more than happy to do that. We meet on this almost daily.
- 14 And we've got a big meeting tomorrow for, weekend
- 15 strategy to talk through this. The number is 14 and
- 16 you're right, over 60% are acquainted. And then we've got
- 17 an argument base. We've got domestic violence. We've got
- 18 situations where short of being in the living room person
- 19 can't impact. So this is poor decision-making and people
- 20 using long-term solutions to solve arguments. And so,
- 21 when we talked through these homicides and we debrief
- 22 every homicide, the first question is what could we have
- 23 done differently as a policing agency? What are the
- 24 solvability factors?



- 1 CHIEF WHITE: But we also want to know what other
- 2 police impact factors, meaning if you're driving down the
- 3 street, would we have had an impact? We know this
- 4 happened inside the house, husband and wife, girlfriend
- 5 and boyfriend, people fighting over, you know,
- 6 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: We talked about the son and the
- 7 mother.
- 8 CHIEF WHITE: We just had a son and a mother. We had
- 9 a really tragic situation where the man killed his 20-
- 10 year-old girlfriend. We had you know, I mean, it just
- 11 goes on and on.
- 12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: We've got you but help us put
- 13 this into the community in terms of this. This is the
- 14 game-changer here. So thank you so much for your report.
- 15 Thank you, Commissioners for...
- 16 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Mr. Chair, Chair Holley. May I
- 17 speak, Chair Holley?
- 18 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: No, I'm sorry, Commissioner. I
- 19 need to move on.
- 20 COMMISSIONER BURCH: No, I just wanted to ask about
- 21 what Chief White just said?
- 22 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I'm just saying, Commissioner
- 23 Burton, did not have the opportunity to have a question.
- 24 I wanted to give him one.
- 25 COMMISSIONER HOLT; Correct.



- 1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Go, ahead, son.
- 2 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Yes, it was regarding the
- 3 funding that he mentioned, and will you allow me to
- 4 speak?
- 5 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Sorry to call you son,
- 6 Commissioner.
- 7 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I just wanted to make a
- 8 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Miss Burch, you have to be
- 9 recognized. Commissioner, please let me yet to the point
- 10 where I recognize you. Right now I'm not recognizing you,
- 11 so please let Commissioner Burton have the floor.
- 12 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Okay. I thought you were asking
- 13 me to speak. I apologize.
- 14 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I know, it's difficult with this
- 15 technology, Go on Commissioner.
- 16 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I'll just make a quick
- 17 statement, and I'll be briefed. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.
- 18 I just want to say to Chief White, looking at all the
- 19 different cities that have gone through a federal consent
- 20 decree. This year marks the fifth year that DPD came out
- 21 of a federal consent decree. And I know that when you
- 22 turned this department around, it wasn't easy coming out
- 23 of a consent decree. We see a lot of Chiefs have come and
- 24 gone since the federal consent decree, so I think the
- 25 city has a lot to look forward to for the future, but the



- 1 question, a real quick question, is what are your plans
- 2 for sitting down with our community activist groups as
- 3 far as talking about police reform. That's something that
- 4 the community is also interested in.
- 5 CHIEF WHITE: Through the Chair, first of all, thank
- 6 you for the compliment, but it wasn't me. It was the
- 7 department that turned around, you know, we build these
- 8 policies and come up with these reforms, and the officers
- 9 are executing these reforms. It was the police officers
- 10 who came to us and said, we want body cameras, it was the
- 11 police officers who wanted tasers. So that they had
- 12 options to fatal force. So it truly is the officer,
- 13 though I get a lot of credit for it. With regards to
- 14 reform measures, you know, one thing about a consent
- 15 judgment is spending this amount of time that we spent
- 16 under one, we serve as a model agency for many and I
- 17 still get calls on reform measures in policing.
- 18 Certainly, we were open to conversations with anyone that
- 19 wanted to discuss how we got to where we are, and
- 20 certainly, we're open to conversations, activists or
- 21 otherwise, with community leaders, members of our city,
- 22 or just to talk through what our plans are. We're going
- 23 to be transparent. We have been transparent. I'm going to
- 24 support our officers and I'm going to make sure that we
- 25 have the best policing practice.



- 1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much. Commissioner
- 2 Burch, I'll give you an opportunity. You've got two
- 3 minutes.
- 4 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Yes, sir. I just wanted to say
- 5 what Chief White was saying about the amount of money
- 6 that the governor allocated, at least that's what I
- 7 heard. She did say that she would provide money to hire a
- 8 thousand more officers for Detroit. She did say that
- 9 Chief White and also, so I just wanted to say in honoring
- 10 the officer, we were told to fly the American flag at
- 11 half-staff for the opposite that was killed in Chicago.
- 12 Do you remember what that was, where everybody's supposed
- 13 to fly the flag half-staff this weekend? Do you know
- 14 which occasion that was for Chief White?
- 15 CHIEF WHITE: Through the Chair. My understanding of
- 16 that was just to honor law enforcement in general, ma'am.
- 17 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you, Commissioner Burch.
- 18 Thank you so much. Thank you, Chief.
- 19 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Thank you, Chair.
- 20 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Presentation from the Sex Crime
- 21 Unit. I'm sorry to hold you up. Thank you.
- 22 CAPTAIN SERDA: No problem at all.
- MRS. WHITE: Through the Chair, Captain John Serda is
- on Zoom, and will be presenting from Zoom.



- 1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I saw a lot of people moving, I
- 2 thought he was here. There you go.
- 3 MRS. WHITE: We just received an update.
- 4 CAPTAIN SERDA: Good afternoon. My apologies. I did
- 5 think we were on Zoom. I was set up for that, but since
- 6 I'm right upstairs, I have no problem just coming right
- 7 down.
- 8 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Can you move the mic a little
- 9 bit.
- 10 CAPTAIN SERDA: Yes, sir. I appreciate the
- 11 opportunity to present. Greetings to this Honorable Board
- of Police Commissioners, Chief, Deputy Chief Wilson, and
- 13 all of the guests here. It's good to see you. I see some
- 14 friendly faces here. So I am the officer in charge of
- 15 Special Victims Unit which includes our sex crimes unit,
- 16 but also includes our domestic violence unit, our child
- 17 abuse unit, and our victim assistance program.
- 18 CAPTAIN SERDA: So there should be some slides
- 19 available, yes.
- 20 MRS. WHITE: Through the Chair, we did not receive
- 21 the PowerPoint presentation, sir.
- 22 CAPTAIN SERDO: I sent it to everybody, there it is.
- 23 Somebody got it.
- 24 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: There we go.
- 25 CAPTAIN SERDA: Okay. Thank you.



- 1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Go ahead.
- 2 CAPTAIN SERDA: Okay. Yes, sir. So I'm going to first
- 3 go into a little bit of definition of the sex crimes that
- 4 we prosecute and investigate. So obviously we prosecute
- 5 and investigate criminal sexual conduct cases and that
- 6 would be CSCs 1, 2, 3, and 4. But we also investigate
- 7 indecent exposure cases, human trafficking cases with a
- 8 crime nexus. And so I want to know, just give a really
- 9 brief definition. And if you look these up under State
- 10 law, they're very long and detailed definitions. So,
- 11 we've kind of condensed it here. So if you have questions
- 12 after finishing, by all means, ask them, but this is like
- 13 a summary of the definitions of these crimes.
- 14 CAPTAIN SERDA: So criminal sexual conduct in the
- 15 first degree, that would be a person is guilty of he or
- 16 she engages in sexual penetration with another. If the
- 17 following circumstances exist, the person that's under 13
- 18 years of age, or if the other person is at least 13, but
- 19 less than 16. And then there are a number of qualifiers
- 20 to that. The crime is committed during the commission of
- 21 another crime, or the perpetrator is a family member or
- 22 in a position of authority. So that would be the first
- 23 degree. Next, the second degree is also a felony that
- 24 would be fondling. And it's really the same rules as
- 25 criminal sexual conduct, one, except that there's no



- 1 penetration, but basically insane. 15-year felony.
- 2 Criminal sexual conduct, third-degree, again, a felony
- 3 that would be penetration and punishable for not more
- 4 than 15 years. That's commonly known as statutory rape
- 5 and the victim over the age of 13 years old. Generally, a
- 6 known perpetrator and the age of consent in the State of
- 7 Michigan is 16 years old with no exception. Fourth-degree
- 8 criminal sexual conduct is a misdemeanor.
- 9 CAPTAIN SERDA: Generally that would be a fondling.
- 10 That's a two-year misdemeanor with and/or \$500 fine. And
- 11 the victim is over the age of 13 years old. If they're
- 12 under, then it would be a fourth-degree and would be
- 13 second-degree. So our unit also investigates and tries to
- 14 prosecute cases where there's a date rape where a GHG
- 15 known as Gamma Hydroxyl Gatorade is involved in a date
- 16 rape drug, as I've heard it called. We also investigate
- 17 marital rape, also known as domestic violence cases,
- indecent exposure cases, child abductions by strangers,
- 19 but the sexual nexus and attempt sexual criminal conduct.
- 20 CAPTAIN SERDA: The SAC task force. I want to briefly
- 21 talk about that. We also worked with that task force and
- 22 they are the task force that has been investigating since
- 23 2009, the approximately 11,000 rape kits had gone
- 24 untested. And so far the results of that task force have
- 25 been 403 warrant requests submitted, 222 convictions.



- 1 There are 30 cases awaiting trial and 96 dismissals for
- 2 various reasons. So they're really kind of two results
- 3 when they do these tests on these DNA kits. They're
- 4 either somebody that is identified through a coda. In
- 5 other words, their DNA was in a database. So they're
- 6 identified. And then the other half are ones that are
- 7 unidentified. They're not in any database, but we have
- 8 their DNA. So we know there's a person out there who has
- 9 committed this crime, but we don't know who they are.
- 10 CAPTAIN SERDA: So now this task force is to the
- 11 point now where they're mostly focusing on these unknown
- 12 DNA cases. And they're very difficult and complex cases.
- 13 What they do with those is they work on DNA profiles.
- 14 They work on family, DNA trees, and they do genealogy
- 15 research. So they're working out a lot of those cases as
- 16 we speak, but they're very, very time-consuming. So
- 17 that's the SAC report. And our next page is about
- 18 prevention. So we'd like to just give out a couple of
- 19 tips for prevention, that is as an individual, we ask
- 20 that they stay on a main path, walk against traffic
- 21 during daylight hours, let someone know where you're
- 22 going, or if you can stay in a group, stay together,
- 23 watch each other's back. No, really means no. If you had
- 24 said no, it should be understood as no, use extreme
- 25 caution on social media.



- CAPTAIN SERDA: More and more we're getting cases
- 2 where people, especially young people are lured on social
- 3 media but anyone can be a victim from the very young to
- 4 the very old. And why should you tell? For the sake of
- 5 the next victim? So, some of our community initiatives,
- 6 and as you all know, because of COVID, a lot of things
- 7 had been put on hold, but we're starting to get back to
- 8 in-person initiatives. We're starting to get back to
- 9 workshops on sexual assault. We work with a number of
- 10 different agencies. Our main agency is our victim
- 11 assistance program. So of the 4 units under a special
- 12 victims unit, we have our victim assistance program.
- 13 Those are all social workers. Many of them are assigned
- 14 to Precincts, but we don't have enough of them for every
- 15 Precinct, but that is our goal to put one in every
- 16 Precinct.
- 17 CAPTAIN SERDA: We actually have two social workers
- 18 onboarding Monday. So I'm looking forward to meeting them
- 19 and getting them assigned. We have just completed some
- 20 interviews and hope that a couple more will be accepting
- 21 our offers of employment. And we are always looking to
- 22 hire additional social workers. I believe we have 5 or 6
- 23 vacancies right now that are funded spots for social
- 24 workers. So again, our goal is to have one in every
- 25 Precinct, but their main office is at the old Huntsville



- 1 hospital where they man a 24-hour, seven-day-a-week
- 2 hotline. They get pages from DRH when victims come in at
- 3 any time of day or night and they'll assist them. We work
- 4 closely with Wayne County Safe who has really just
- 5 changed their name to Avalon Healing program. And they
- 6 are the ones that are doing the rape kits and doing the
- 7 forensic interviews.
- 8 CAPTAIN SERDA: And then we assist. And they also do
- 9 resources to support victims. And that's one of the main
- 10 things our social workers do, is help the victims with
- 11 whatever support they need, whether it be counseling,
- 12 housing protection, PPLs, whatever they need they're
- 13 there, they help 24/7. These are some of the groups we
- 14 work with and that's only a few there are several more
- 15 that we are working with, sexual assault nurse examiner,
- 16 sexual assault, recourse team program. All good programs
- 17 that would work through and with, to assist our victims,
- 18 to get the resources that they need. One other important
- 19 thing we do is kids-TALK. And that is where there are
- 20 specially trained personnel at the kids-TALK program that
- 21 interviews our kids when they're victims. And they have
- 22 to be trained to do this. It's very specific training. So
- 23 we don't let just anybody interview kids when they're
- 24 victims. We quickly, as possible, set up these kids-TALK
- 25 interviews.



- 1 CAPTAIN SERDA: Okay. Then you know, this thing about
- 2 the Teddy bears, we keep those on hand as we have young
- 3 victims come into our office all the time and we try to
- 4 make them as comfortable as possible. And this group is
- 5 kind enough to keep us stocked with Teddy bears and a few
- 6 other items that we can give the kids to try to make as
- 7 comfortable as possible in terrible situations generally.
- 8 Just to note on false reporting on the next slide through
- 9 the FBI, an average of 8% of our cases are false reports
- 10 and that's going to happen. But it is punishable by up to
- 11 4 years imprisonment and or a \$2,000 fine. So if we find
- 12 somebody that is maliciously filing a false report, we
- will try to seek prosecution on them. It doesn't happen
- 14 very often though, we will seek prosecution.
- 15 CAPTAIN SERDA: So that's basically our main report.
- 16 I'll be happy to answer any questions.
- 17 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Through the Chair.
- 18 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Bernard, you have a
- 19 question?
- 20 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Yes. Thank you for your
- 21 report. It was a good report. You started by saying that
- 22 your unit dealt with a special victims unit. Correct?
- 23 CAPTAIN SERDA: Yes.
- 24 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: So I wanted to know, does that
- 25 include cases other than rape cases? Like, for example,



- 1 you read a lot about people being exploited now online,
- 2 particularly women you know, by guys who act like they're
- 3 going to be their boyfriend and all this kind of stuff
- 4 and take all their money. You know, it's a big con job.
- 5 Is that part of what the special victims unit does in
- 6 Detroit?
- 7 CAPTAIN SERDA: Yes. But the thing is, the victim has
- 8 to let us know what happened and they don't always, you
- 9 know, sometimes let's say they're lured and then raped,
- 10 and that terrible thing happens. And when they go to the
- 11 hospital, they don't always choose to report it to us. We
- 12 hope that they do, we try to convince them to report it,
- 13 but it's really their choice. But our special victims
- 14 unit, sex crimes is just one of the four units under our
- 15 special victims unit. Its domestic violence, child abuse,
- 16 sex crimes unit, and our victim assistance program. So we
- 17 cover all of those, but today we're specifically asked to
- 18 report out on our sex crimes unit. So hopefully we'll
- 19 report out on our other units at a future date.
- 20 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Davis.
- 21 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: No questions.
- 22 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Holt.
- 23 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Thank you, no.
- 24 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Jones.



- 1 COMMISSIONER JONES: Yes, two questions. Certainly
- 2 the very act itself is one of the most heinous things
- 3 that we deal with as a community. You know you hate for
- 4 it to be your daughter, you hate for it to be any female
- 5 member of your family.
- 6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Or male.
- 7 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Yes.
- 8 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Thank you. At any rate, at one
- 9 point there were a lot of kits that were found in an
- 10 abandoned building, and I know that there was funding
- 11 that was received in order to test those kits. I have a
- 12 twofold question. I wanted to know if those kits have
- 13 been completed, and also I'd like to know if there's a
- 14 backlog right now on cases that need the DNA tests
- 15 performed.
- 16 CAPTAIN SERDA: I don't have the specific numbers.
- 17 They have not all been completed, but they have mostly
- 18 been completed. That group has been working since 2009 on
- 19 those cases you're talking about, and currently, the
- 20 cases they're working on though, are the ones I was
- 21 identifying as unknowns. You know, they get the report
- 22 back from the lab and they're not in any database, so we
- 23 don't know who they are, but they still have ways to try
- 24 and figure out what they are. They're just long and drawn
- 25 out and difficult research that it takes for those types



- 1 of cases. So they are still working on a number of those
- 2 cases and they continue to work on them as they come in.
- 3 So there is some backlog, but nothing like it was in the
- 4 past.
- 5 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Thank you.
- 6 CAPTAIN SERDA: Yes, sir.
- 7 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Burch.
- 8 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Yes, thank you, Chair Holley.
- 9 Sir, I'd just like to commend you. That's a wonderful
- 10 program, but let me ask you this, and maybe you cannot
- 11 share it on the air. These people that evidently are
- 12 victims have to have trust in you all as far as assisting
- them. How do you gain their trust that it doesn't leak
- 14 back out that, you know, they told on you or something
- 15 like that? As I said, you probably can't share this on
- 16 the air, but how do you gain their trust? How do they go
- 17 back out and become regular citizens? If you can't
- 18 answer, you can send it, I guess, by email.
- 19 CAPTAIN SERDA: I think I can give somewhat of an
- 20 answer because that is a very difficult problem that we
- 21 deal with where the victims many times are too afraid to
- 22 report, or even if they report, they're very reluctant to
- 23 cooperate with our prosecution. So one of the ways we try
- 24 to help them is we get them in touch with our social
- 25 workers immediately. And so that they're dealing with



- 1 somebody that's not in law enforcement and has a
- 2 background in this type of work. So that helps many
- 3 times, we help them get PPOs and other resources that
- 4 they might need. But it doesn't help in every case.
- 5 Sometimes they're just reluctant to prosecute and we
- 6 still many times submit warrants anyway, even if they
- 7 refuse to cooperate with the prosecution, we still submit
- 8 warrants and then it's up to the prosecutor's office. But
- 9 generally speaking, the judges and prosecutors won't
- 10 press the case if you don't have the victim's
- 11 cooperation. So we try everything we can from talking to
- 12 them, visiting them. But we also have to be careful too
- 13 because you're right. If the perpetrator finds out,
- 14 they're cooperating with us, many times they fear
- 15 reprisal, and so we try to help them if they need to
- 16 relocate, if they need special attention at their
- 17 location, whatever can do to help, we try to help. But we
- 18 don't have the answer to every situation. And it is a
- 19 very difficult problem that we deal with in many of these
- 20 cases.
- 21 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much.
- 22 COMMISSIONER BURCH: But I just want to commend you
- 23 and good work for you. Wishing you the best. Thank you,
- 24 Chair Holley.
- 25 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you. Commissioner Bell.



- 1 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I just
- 2 want to say Captain, sex crimes are about the most
- 3 sensitive job you can work on DPD because you have a lab
- 4 victim homicide, its next, but you don't have the victim,
- 5 you have a family. I just want to say that in reference
- 6 to the rape kit that's about the most embarrassing issue
- 7 that DPD did not get high profile on, but to me, it was
- 8 very embarrassing to discover that. So my question to
- 9 you, I just really commend the Prosecutor Kym Worthy, in
- 10 terms of the work that they are still engaged in, but how
- 11 do we make sure that nothing like that happens in the
- 12 future?
- CAPTAIN SERDA: Well, I think this task force goes a
- 14 long way in addressing that because they have not only
- 15 continued to work on this backlog, but they are making
- 16 sure they're staying on top of all the current cases. So,
- 17 I agree with you, it was not the best look for us, but
- 18 we've done our best to make up for it. And I will say, I
- 19 appreciate your comments about our detectives. They have
- 20 a very difficult job, very stressful, and we try to
- 21 support them as much as we can because they have such
- 22 stressful jobs. They do great work too.
- 23 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Burton, you have a
- 24 question?



- 1 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I didn't raise a question. If I
- 2 were to raise a question I would ask you, Mr. Chairman.
- 3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay, very good. Thank you so
- 4 much. Thank you so much for your presentation.
- 5 CAPTAIN SERDA: Yes, sir.
- 6 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much.
- 7 CAPTAIN SERDA: Thank you for the opportunity.
- 8 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Absolutely. We have a report now
- 9 from the Interim Board Secretary.
- 10 MRS. WHITE: Yes, sir. Through the Chair. Honorable
- 11 Board and attendees, the incoming correspondence and
- 12 information for this week are included on the agenda. And
- 13 none of them requires actions from the Board at this
- 14 time, but just going by the list you receive the DPD
- 15 facial recognition technology report. That report is
- 16 available on the Board's web page for the public's
- 17 viewing. And there were no policy violations from the
- 18 last period or last quarter, which is indicated in the
- 19 report. You also received correspondence from Mr.
- 20 Nathaniel Green requesting recommendations of educational
- 21 work experience and community activism for establishing a
- 22 civilian oversight board. Also, the Board received
- 23 correspondence from the department regarding the Board's
- 24 21st-century policing resolution that was approved last
- 25 year. And the Board will also receive a comprehensive



- 1 report from the department in response to your
- 2 resolution. The Board also received item number 4,
- 3 correspondence from Director Katrina Patillo, human
- 4 resources bureau, regarding the response of a post by one
- of the Commissioners during the August 12th, 2021 Board
- 6 meeting and Honorable Board, please note that the NACOLES
- 7 conference is on the way. The conference sessions are
- 8 being held virtually and the sessions take place each day
- 9 until October 7th, 2021 at 2:00 PM for your viewing, and
- 10 some of the workshops this week included, but are not
- 11 limited to making civilian oversight a permanent part of
- 12 the public safety movement or a moment, the case for
- 13 diversity equity, inclusion, and law enforcement. And
- 14 then also the session today is duty to intervene. So
- 15 please tune in to those workshops. And that concludes the
- 16 incoming correspondence. Thank you.
- 17 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you, Secretary White.
- 18 Thank you very much. Unfinished business. Hearing none,
- 19 new business.
- 20 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Yes, sir. I just wanted to...
- 21 may I speak, Mr. Chair?
- 22 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay.
- 23 COMMISSIONER BURCH: To Chair Holley. I did reiterate
- last week, but I just wanted to emphasize what we did at
- 25 Dad Butler Park regarding former Commissioner David



- 1 Sanders. There is a permanent plaque that is put at that
- 2 park in renaming the park in his honor. And I want to
- 3 thank all of the law enforcement that attended the
- 4 neighborhood day event. So I just wanted all
- 5 Commissioners, those that did attend, those that could
- 6 not attend, I think we did something memorable that his
- 7 family will never forget. And also the family of the
- 8 operating engineers, 324. We must always come together in
- 9 this city to just support what is good. And I'm just
- 10 speaking for myself. I'm not a person who doesn't say
- 11 what I believe is true. And I apologize all the time to
- 12 my Lord if I've said something out of the way, but I do
- 13 remember the days of the explorers. And I know that was
- 14 during the time my children were kids in elementary,
- 15 middle school. And I remember the explorers and I hear
- 16 that it's still going on. I'm going to find out exactly
- 17 what they do to see how we can support that organization.
- 18 So I just wanted to thank all the Commissioners that
- 19 attended the Memorial and the event for neighborhood day.
- 20 Thank you, Chair Holley.
- 21 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I'll put you under
- 22 announcements, Commissioner Burch, that's an announcement
- 23 not new business. So I want to put you under there. Thank
- 24 you so much for that. Right now, I want to take time out.
- 25 Commissioners you have on your table before you are the



- 1 bylaws that we want to go over. We have Dr. Jackson with
- 2 us today and we look forward to her from time to time.
- 3 She listens from time to time virtually. So she's here
- 4 today to go over these bylaws. We put them in your
- 5 package, and so you've had... but we're not going to vote
- 6 on anything today Commissioners. We're just going to let
- 7 her go through it, have comments about it, and then maybe
- 8 after we are marinated with this, basically, we'll come
- 9 back in a couple of weeks and vote on it, if you would,
- 10 please. But today it's just information only, okay. Dr.
- 11 Jackson, thank you so much for being with us.
- DR. JACKSON: Thank you, Chairman Holley.
- 13 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Be nice to us today, please.
- DR. JACKSON: I'm always nice to you. I just want to
- 15 make a couple of observations before I get into the
- 16 specific issue of each one of these. Committees can be
- 17 very useful in helping to decrease the amount of time the
- 18 Board spends on discussing things. And what I would
- 19 strongly urge you to consider is that you don't want to
- 20 do committee work as the Board. You want to refer things
- 21 to the committee and let the committee do the background
- 22 work, do the investigation and get support. It is very
- 23 important that the number of people on each committee is
- 24 specified. And this is because of the open meetings act.
- 25 The open meetings act says very clearly that if a



- 1 committee is composed of the quorum of the Board, that
- 2 committee is subject to the open meetings act. And I'm
- 3 raising that issue because one of the provisions that you
- 4 will be voting on will allow the Chair and the Vice-Chair
- 5 to be ex officio.
- 6 DR. JACKSON: And I want to make sure you understand
- 7 what that means. Ex officio means that an officer has the
- 8 right, but not the responsibility to attend committee
- 9 meetings, but if they do attend the committee meetings,
- 10 they have the right to vote and make motions. So, you
- 11 have to be very, very clear that with the position of the
- 12 Chair and the Vice-Chair as ex officio, you do not want 6
- 13 people on a committee because that's the quorum of this
- 14 Board. And that means they have been under the OMA. The
- 15 number of people, therefore, needs to be specified for
- 16 the committees. When the Chair is authorized to present
- 17 names for inclusion on committees, from a power mentioned
- 18 point of view that is considered a nomination because
- 19 what he then asked for is approval by this Board. And the
- 20 reason I'm making a big deal out of that is that if in
- 21 fact the Chair was allowed to nominate, and that's the
- language you use, no one else can nominate.
- DR. JACKSON: Let me be clear, if the Chair is given
- 24 the authority to nominate and the Board doesn't like who
- 25 he has nominated, the Board can't nominate. The Chair



- 1 would then have to come up with more nominees, but the
- 2 process of naming people would still be the exclusive
- 3 purview of the Chair. Finally, the authority to put
- 4 people on a committee automatically takes with it the
- 5 ability to name the Chair and the members. You don't have
- 6 to specify that. Now, I did a handout for you on the
- 7 committee of the whole, and I'm asking that by the time
- 8 we address these bylaws members specifically, if you
- 9 could read that handout because I think there may be some
- 10 confusion about how the committee of the whole operates
- 11 and what your bylaws say is that under article 5 for
- 12 meetings, is that you can always go into committee of the
- 13 whole for any issue. The primary purpose of going into a
- 14 committee of the whole is to provide unlimited debate on
- 15 a particular issue. You have to have a motion to go into
- 16 the committee of the whole. And you have to specify what
- 17 you are referring to the committee of the whole. And if
- 18 you read this handout, it's just one-page front and back,
- 19 I think that will help to specify how the committee of
- 20 the whole share. For example, the chair of the Board does
- 21 not chair the committee of the whole.
- DR. JACKSON: The committee of the whole should be
- 23 chaired by somebody else, and then whoever chairs the
- 24 committee of the whole then makes the report to the full
- 25 Board when you come out of the committee of the whole. So



- 1 I think once you read the handout I did for you on the
- 2 committee of the whole, that will make some of that
- 3 clear. Now, in terms of the specific provisions, I have
- 4 made some brief notes. This will not take long. I really
- 5 want to go to number 3 on page 2 of the handout. And that
- 6 is to amend the article about adding these topics to the
- 7 committee of the whole. You certainly can adopt this but
- 8 it just is not necessary, only because your bylaws state
- 9 that the committee of the whole can handle any issues
- 10 that come before it. So you don't really have to specify
- 11 that for the committee of the whole. Going on to number
- 12 4, which identifies specifically each of the standing
- 13 committees. As I said to you before, you really need to
- 14 add the number of people who will be serving on these
- 15 committees. And that's important because of the
- 16 restrictions of the open meetings act. I would also
- 17 strongly suggest that where you say the Chair will name
- 18 that you use the term nominate, to be very clear about
- 19 what that is.
- DR. JACKSON: One of the things that I'm still
- 21 looking at number 4, where you give committees the
- 22 authority to formulate their own rules of operation.
- 23 That's very good that makes things simple, but you want
- 24 to include the open meetings act as one of the things to



- 1 which they are subject. Because that's the law and it's
- 2 going to trump everything else. I'm on page 6 of...
- 3 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Of what?
- 4 DR. JACKSON: Of the bylaw amendments. If you look on
- 5 page 6, section 7, where it says, rules of order. Each
- 6 committee may adopt rules for its own governance, not
- 7 inconsistent with the charter. These bylaws rules are
- 8 adopted by the Board with the latest addition. I think
- 9 for a query you need to add the open meetings act.
- 10 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: All of us didn't get that.
- 11 MRS. WHITE: Through the Chair. All of the meeting
- 12 proposed bylaws are included in your packets. And they
- 13 may be in the inside folder of your media kit folder, but
- 14 you should have a document that is labeled draft
- 15 recommendation to amend the BOPC bylaws with the BOPC
- 16 letterhead in your packet. And it's a 17-page packet, and
- 17 you also have the Board's bylaws as well.
- DR. JACKSON: It's in a tabular form, it's in a table
- 19 form, 3 columns.
- 20 MRS. WHITE: Correct.
- DR. JACKSON: Does everyone have it now? I'm sorry, I
- thought you were following along. You're so welcome, my
- 23 apologies. Everyone has it now?
- 24 COMMISSIONERS: Yes.



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- 1 DR. JACKSON: So I was on page 6, which was section
- 2 7, where it says rules of order. And what I'm suggesting
- 3 is that you add the open meetings act to that section to
- 4 be clear.
- 5 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Just add "and the open
- 6 meetings act."
- 7 DR. JACKSON: Yes, ma'am.
- 8 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I got you.
- 9 DR> JACKSON: You want to be careful about things
- 10 that can sound and maybe contradictory. So moving on to
- 11 page 7, under section 4, where it says special
- 12 committees. It says the Board may establish such special
- 13 ad hoc committees as it may deem necessary or appropriate
- 14 to carry out the business of the Board. Now on page 8, it
- 15 says, once the Chair has concluded a special committee is
- 16 needed to undertake a duty, it shall be presented to the
- 17 Board for approval, along with the members of the said
- 18 committee. It's not clear to me if the Board is filling
- 19 that special committee, or if the Chair is filling that
- 20 special committee. It can't be both.
- 21 DR. JACKSON: It either has to be the Board or it has
- 22 to be the Chair. Even if you give the Chair the full
- 23 authority to fill the committee or the Chair nominates
- 24 members that can be approved by the Board or the Board
- 25 can keep that authority for itself. It reads like it's a



- 1 contradiction. Maybe it's not, but in reading it, it's
- 2 not clear to me.
- 3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: What do you recommend?
- 4 DR. JACKSON: There are no right or wrong answers to
- 5 that. Whatever the Board is comfortable with. I would,
- 6 however, if I were to make a recommendation, be
- 7 consistent. If you're going to have the Chair nominate
- 8 people for the standing committees, I would think that
- 9 you would want to do the same for special committees. So
- 10 that everybody is on one page about that consistency.
- 11 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I agree.
- 12 MRS. WHITE; Through the Chair. We will make the
- 13 revision and redistribute it.
- 14 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Where are we now?
- DR. JACKSON: And the last thing, an observation I
- 16 had that I think needs to be clear, I'm on page 10,
- 17 looking at the responsibilities of the policy committee,
- 18 and if you look at number 8, which is talking about the
- 19 policy committee, it says in that third column section as
- 20 amended. The proposed changes to the bylaws will be
- 21 handled via distribution of the proposed language change
- 22 to all Board members. The policy committee will review
- 23 the proposed changes to ensure accurate bylaws positions
- 24 and clear language. And if adopted shall present the
- 25 recommended changes to the full Board for approval. The



- 1 interpretation of that sentence could be that if the
- 2 policy committee does not adopt the change, it does not
- 3 get to the Board. That's a tremendous amount of power to
- 4 give a committee, to be able to stop a bylaw provision
- 5 from coming to the Board. You may want to do that, but if
- 6 you don't want to do that, you need to make sure that
- 7 that language is changed. So that it's clear that the
- 8 committee does not have the authority to hold up a stop
- 9 sign about bylaw provision that may be presented to it by
- 10 a Board member. That would be my concern in terms of
- 11 saying this.
- DR. JACKSON: In terms of saying this. Those are my
- observations about the bylaws. I think that in general,
- 14 overall, they are very well written. And I think that as
- 15 a citizen of the City of Detroit and I'm not speaking as
- 16 a parliamentarian that the work of the Board will be
- 17 enhanced by having committees take some of that work to
- 18 do separately from sitting here as a Board. Mr. Chairman
- 19 that concludes my observation.
- 20 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you. Commissioner Bell,
- 21 there was a concern that you have. Run it by the
- 22 parliamentarian.
- 23 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes, sir. Mr. Chair, we're going
- 24 to have some in-depth conversation with this draft. I'm
- 25 not pleased with this at all. And I think you pointed out



- 1 a very key part of, in terms of the policy committee
- 2 making the decision and then go forward. I've never seen
- 3 anything like that before. But I'm not going to take up
- 4 your time here, but there are some concerns about this
- 5 document here, we need to strike out what was proposed in
- 6 the past because it's dead.
- 7 COMMISSIONER BELL: And the other part of it is that
- 8 the Inspector General made a significant ruling in
- 9 reference to our committee, why we got rid of it. And we
- 10 have to meet a criteria in terms of making sure we record
- 11 what happened because we got into issues where your word
- 12 against my word, what took place in that committee and
- 13 the open meetings act, and the only time we can meet the
- 14 6 people is at a social gathering. So that you emphasize
- 15 that point that we have to make sure that we have to be 5
- or less. That's why I think, also we have too many
- 17 committees. We need to downsize the committees. And
- 18 there's a way to do that. You know, embracing the job
- 19 description, whatever it is, but for a Board to have that
- 20 many committees, we would be spread out all over the
- 21 place, one or two.
- 22 COMMISSIONER BELL: And that's not the intent... is
- 23 to make sure that we have a working group and you can see
- 24 where we are with handling citizens' complaints. People
- are not participating, but that's my point. We have that



- 1 discussion where we're going before we get to that time
- 2 that we have a working draft that I think could need more
- 3 input. So anyone having any concern that Mr. Chair is
- 4 working on processing with the Board Secretary, but they
- 5 are my opinions, and I spent a lot of time with bylaws,
- 6 even on a national level. And I see that as something
- 7 just is not appropriate. So that's my opinion, right.
- 8 Thank you.
- 9 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you. Commissioner Bernard,
- 10 I need to hear from you.
- 11 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I don't agree with
- 12 Commissioner Bell that the proposed committee structure
- 13 that you have proposed has too many committees, there is
- only 3, as I recall. That's not too many. And as a matter
- 15 of fact, it's not as many as we have had traditionally.
- 16 We've had a personnel committee, we've had a budget
- 17 committee, and we've had an audit committee. I mean,
- 18 because you have to spread the work out because people,
- 19 this is not a full-time position for anyone here. We all
- 20 have jobs and responsibilities. This is a different
- 21 format than the initial format that you can propose Mr.
- 22 Chairman. So I'm not as familiar with this format as I
- 23 was with the original one. And I listened very carefully
- 24 to your comments and thank you very much, doctor. I
- 25 appreciate that. The only thing that I've noticed



- 1 initially was that in your executive committee summary,
- 2 what you want the executive committee to do, it says that
- 3 the chair and the vice-chair will provide ad hoc
- 4 oversight of all committees.
- 5 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I don't believe that that is
- 6 appropriate. What they can do is they can participate in
- 7 the meeting, but they're not an oversight body for a
- 8 committee. I've never seen that before in any bylaws for
- 9 any public or private organization. They can participate,
- 10 but they're not an oversight of the committee. The Board
- 11 is the oversight of the committee.
- 12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Let her respond.
- DR. JACKSON: That is not an uncommon structure to
- 14 have. Sometimes you have it because the organization
- 15 wants to make sure that the community is functioning and
- 16 that whatever has been sent to the committee is being
- 17 operable on. But like a lot of things that occur in
- 18 parliamentary procedure, it is not a matter of being
- 19 right or wrong. It's a matter of being right or wrong for
- 20 this particular group.
- 21 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I understand.
- DR. JACKSON: And so, in fact, I've seen that
- 23 particular structure, not for both of them. I will admit
- 24 that it's unusual for both the chair and the vice- chair
- 25 to have that responsibility but it is a very common



- 1 responsibility of a vice-president or vice-chair to be
- 2 what is called the liaison. And their main responsibility
- 3 is to check to make sure those committees are
- 4 functioning, and that they're meeting. And the other
- 5 thing I wanted to say is, if I could have permission to
- 6 do so, committees don't have minutes.
- 7 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Correct.
- 8 DR. JACKSON: Committees have memoranda. Okay. So I
- 9 was really responding to Commissioner Bell. Committees
- 10 don't have minutes. And even if they did, minutes don't
- 11 reflect what is said. Minutes reflect what is done. So
- 12 what people say really should not be of any
- documentation. What should be part of the documentation,
- 14 are the motions that are adopted and what is done.
- DR. JACKSON: And when you think about it five years
- 16 from now, you don't really need to know what Commissioner
- 17 Jones said. You need to know what that committee voted to
- 18 do, because what is at stake is what was the motion that
- 19 was adopted? And in general, the chair of the committee
- 20 keeps those memoranda and documents the actions of that
- 21 committee. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.
- COMMISSIONER BELL: Mr. Chairman, Dr. Jackson is
- 23 correct. I used the wrong terminology. It should be a
- 24 memo. That's what they stated, but you have to have some
- 25 documentation of what transpired. If not, you're in



- 1 serious trouble. And we were cited for that. So I used
- 2 the wrong term for minutes. Thank you for clarifying that
- 3 point.
- 4 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Davis, do you have
- 5 any comments about it?
- 6 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: I have no comments.
- 7 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Holt.
- 8 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Yes. The comment was made earlier
- 9 that we only have 2 or 3 committees. We received an
- 10 electronic version of the committees and there are 5.
- 11 MRS. WHITE: Through the Chair. The chairperson is
- 12 proposing that there be an addition of 5 committees,
- 13 however, in your proposed bylaw amendments, there are
- 14 additional committees that are listed in the event that
- 15 the Commissions or the Board would like to add additional
- 16 committees. But, as for an immediate inclusion of the
- 17 committee structure, there are technically four and then
- one ad hoc, which is the facial recognition technology
- 19 committee. So we have again included all of that
- 20 information in your meeting packet, along with the
- 21 guidelines for the subcommittee structure in alignment
- 22 with the open meetings act. And just to note for the
- 23 record that proposed 4 amendments or excuse me, committee
- 24 assignments would be policy, police recruitment and



- 1 retention, personnel and training budget, and then facial
- 2 recognition technology ShotSpotter technology committee.
- 3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Those are the committees, but
- 4 not the ones that I've recommended.
- 5 MRS. WHITE: Those are the committees that you
- 6 recommended, Mr. Chair, those are the committees,
- 7 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I didn't recommend personnel
- 8 in the original draft.
- 9 MRS, WHITE: Through the Chair,
- 10 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Go ahead, help me.
- MRS. WHITE: You recommended the companies that I
- 12 just named as an immediate inclusion in the Board's...
- 13 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: At the Board, but 7?
- MRS. WHITE: No, no, no, no. Okay.
- 15 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I'm sorry, please forgive me.
- 16 I'm having a senior moment.
- 17 MRS. WHITE: So the first committee would be policy.
- 18 The second committee would be police recruitment and
- 19 retention. That's one sub-committee. The next one would
- 20 be the personnel and training committee. The fourth one
- 21 would be the budget. And then the last one would be
- 22 facial recognition technology ShotSpotter technology.
- CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: But again, we can always delete,
- 24 okay. In your recommendations, but your right, you have
- 25 to be right. Thank you for that. Before I go,



- 1 Commissioner Burch, do you have a question for the
- 2 parliamentarian? Commissioner Burton, do you have for the
- 3 parliamentarian.
- 4 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Actually, I believe the
- 5 parliamentarian did a great job putting together this
- 6 structure that we have before us today.
- We do need to be more transparent than we have in
- 8 past practices. So I believe this is a good direction to
- 9 go in under your leadership, Reverend Holley, and the
- 10 leadership of the great doctor right here who happens to
- 11 be a parliamentarian to this body.
- 12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you. Commissioner, I
- 13 talked to you, I asked you, right? Commissioner Davis, I
- 14 called on you, didn't I?
- 15 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Yes.
- 16 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Jones, can we have
- 17 your last word?
- 18 VICE-CHAIR JONES: I'm good.
- 19 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: So again, at this particular
- 20 point, what we would do is basically really put this all
- 21 together, based up on the recommendations in the
- 22 conversation. And then we will have a meeting something
- 23 like an executive meeting in September to basically flesh
- 24 this out for each and every one of you to have some input
- 25 as well. And based on what I'm hearing from the



- 1 parliamentarian that now I've been enlightened as I think
- 2 many of you may have been, but I would say me, for right
- 3 now, but I'm just saying to you again, we'll flesh this
- 4 for you and that you have some input to it so we can get
- 5 through this. So what we'll do is basically do a draft
- 6 and then after the draft we'll come back and see if we
- 7 can get ready for the vote, the adoption. All hearts and
- 8 minds are clear, okay. All right. Thank you so much.
- 9 Thank you so much, Dr. Jackson. It's good to see you
- 10 worth every dime I'm paying you.
- 11 MRS. WHITE: Through the Chair.
- 12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I'm looking up. I thought it
- 13 were angels, what is it?
- MRS. WHITE: Yes. I just as an addition, if we could,
- 15 also, once we come up with another revised draft for the
- 16 Commissioners and the Board's consideration, we will also
- 17 share that document with the law department to ensure
- 18 that it is in compliance with the open meetings act.
- 19 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: And run it by the doctor as
- 20 well. Dr. Jackson, as well. You're right, absolutely. But
- 21 I want to make sure that Commissioner Bell,
- 22 COMMISSIONER BELL: Mr. Chair, I just want to...
- there are models out there, public bodies like us in
- 24 Detroit. I think we need to, and I already talked to
- 25 Madam Secretary by text that we need to get those



- 1 documents, to make a comparison. We don't have to
- 2 reinvent the wheel. There are examples of how they
- 3 operate, even though they don't have bylaws, they have
- 4 SOP in terms of committee work. So we don't have to
- 5 reinvent the wheel at all.
- 6 COMMISSIONER BELL: So I think once we do that, that
- 7 would help us. And I don't think there's any rush to do
- 8 this because if we rush into something then we regret and
- 9 that's when Dr. Jackson and the legal people coming to
- 10 me, take a look. You made several key points, I give you
- 11 the recognition for that. Thank you.
- 12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much. At this time
- 13 if nothing comes before us Mr. Brown announcements.
- 14 MR. ROB BROWN: Yes. Good afternoon, Mr. Chair, the
- 15 next BOPC meetings are August 26th at 3:00 PM. And keep
- in mind, Mr. Chair. This Board took a vote to cancel the
- 17 September 2nd meeting. So then the next community meeting
- 18 will be September 9th at 6:30, at the Community
- 19 Recreation Center, 2216 South Fourth Street.
- 20 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Which one we are voted to do
- 21 now?
- MR ROB BROWN: This Board voted I think a week or two
- 23 ago to cancel the September 2nd meeting.
- 24 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Oh, the 2nd. Got you.
- 25 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair.



- 1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Sure.
- 2 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I'd like to know why are we
- 3 cancelling the September 2nd meeting. Was there a reason
- 4 for that or discussion?
- 5 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I hear you Commissioner and I
- 6 know you, I know your work ethics. I appreciate it very
- 7 much. I think it's because of Labor Day, and we just want
- 8 to recognize that. And another thing I'm trying to give
- 9 some time off to some of the staff that's been working
- 10 and trying to see if I can work it out where they can get
- 11 some time off too as well. But that's it, I know your
- 12 heart and I know your work ethic, so that's the reason
- 13 why we're doing it. I support you, Mr. Chair.
- 14 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much. Mr. Brown,
- 15 who do I have today?
- MR ROB BROWN: Yes. Good afternoon, Mr. Chair. I
- 17 currently have 5 speakers. First speaker would be
- 18 Community Advisor Council Chair, Scotty Bowman, followed
- 19 by Ms. Bernice Smith, followed by Minister Eric Blunt.
- 20 Mr. Bowman is not responding. Mr. Chair, so we'll go to
- 21 Ms. Bernie Smith.
- 22 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you for your patience,
- 23 Bernice.
- 24 MS. SMITH: I'm tired of looking at you over Zoom and
- 25 everything. Anyway, I'm going to be very brief. I just



- 1 want to put you up to date on some of the things that
- 2 I've been involved in. And mainly I love my police
- 3 department as most of you know. So when we had the
- 4 incident about the man being knocked down a couple of
- 5 weeks ago, I went, taking it upon myself to go down to
- 6 Greektown. I've been going down there most of the weekend
- 7 for the last three weeks since that incident happened.
- 8 And I sit right in front of the church there on Monroe,
- 9 right behind the police wagon. And I've observed things
- 10 that I never imagined was going on down there in
- 11 Greektown. Not only do the young ladies and this
- 12 generation don't dress properly, as far as I'm concerned.
- 13 I'm not that old fashioned. I've got daughters myself,
- 14 but the fact is they're not dressing properly. And then I
- 15 did stop a couple of fellows and told him to come over to
- 16 the car, and I said to him, I said, look here, you got
- 17 some nice underwear, but pulling pants up. Believe it or
- 18 not they said, yes, ma'am, yes ma'am. So I wasn't cursed
- 19 out.
- MS. SMITH: But what I want to tell you, Greektown,
- 21 it's really chaos down there, especially on Fridays and
- 22 Saturdays. And I admire my police that's down there doing
- 23 the best that they can. And I talked to him too, when I
- 24 see something that's going wrong, for instance, when they
- 25 turn off Beaubein and going into Monroe, they'll stop



- 1 there on the left side and they'll have the lights
- 2 blinking and going on because they want to stop and
- 3 converse or whatever they want to do. I see all of this,
- 4 even from the distance that I'm sitting. So the police
- 5 will go down there and tell them to move on. We need to
- 6 have more police down there. They're doing a good job.
- 7 I'm not saying that they're not. And I do talk to them,
- 8 each one of them and tell them, I'm going to make a
- 9 report to the police commission. And they say, yes ma'am.
- 10 But the fact is, this is our city, the loud noise that's
- 11 going on down there with the motorcycles. We did have one
- 12 of the police blink his flashlight to make him quiet. And
- 13 he did, he obeyed him.
- 14 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Ms. Smith, your time is up. I
- 15 don't know if you heard the noise.
- MS. SMITH: I never do. Anyway, the police are doing
- 17 a wonderful job and I'm very proud of them. So I will
- 18 continue to go down there from 9 o'clock until around 10,
- 19 11 o'clock at night. And I will observe to see what we're
- 20 doing down there and give kudos to my police department.
- 21 They need a raise. Thank you.
- 22 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: What about the Board, what about
- 23 saying something to the Board?
- 24 MS. SMITH: The Board. I don't see the Board down
- 25 there.



- 1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: What about saying something to
- 2 the Board? Say something nice about us.
- 3 MS. SMITH: You're doing what you can do.
- 4 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: What about the Board?
- 5 MS. SMITH: The Board of the Police Commissioners?
- 6 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes, ma'am.
- 7 MS. SMITH: What can you do?
- 8 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay, bye, bye.
- 9 MS. SMITH: You're not down there observing. I'm down
- 10 there observing. I saw a couple of about 300 people down
- 11 there last night. He heard me and said, Mother Bernice,
- 12 you're doing a good job down here watching. I said, yes.
- 13 I'm watching my city.
- 14 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you very much.
- MS. SMITH: Thank you very much for letting me speak.
- 16 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: You're very welcome.
- MR. ROB BROWN: Mr. Chair, your next speaker will be
- 18 Minister Eric Blunt.
- 19 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I missed you last week, Mr.
- 20 Blunt. It looks like I'm going to miss him tonight, too.
- 21 Is he there? Mr. Blunt.
- MR. ROB BROWN: Mr. Blunt.
- 23 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I know he's there, I can feel
- 24 him. Who's the next one? We'll go back to him if he's
- 25 there.



- 1 MR. ROB BROWN: Ms. Michelle George.
- 2 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: In person.
- 3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you for your patience,
- 4 today, Ms. George.
- 5 MS. GEORGE: Thank you so much. Good to see everyone,
- 6 nice and safe. To Chairman Holley, this Honorable Board
- 7 and Deputy Chief. I just wanted to make some brief
- 8 comments. I wanted to read this about facial recognition.
- 9 There was an article, many facial recognition systems are
- 10 biased based on the United States study. Algorithms
- 11 falsely identify African-Americans and Asian faces 10 to
- 12 100 times more than Caucasian faces. Researchers for the
- 13 National Institute of Standards and Technology found. So
- 14 this article was done in 2019. The reason we fight face-
- 15 to-face so much, Mr. Williams who was discriminated
- 16 against, just testified in July before the Judiciary sub-
- 17 committee on crime, terrorism and homeland security and
- 18 Shelia Lee-Jackson, who I love very dearly is on that
- 19 committee. I think of Detroit as apartheid city. And what
- 20 do I mean by that?
- 21 MS GEORGE: The lies against proposal P, no offense.
- 22 One of my proposals was in proposal P. It went against
- 23 what we wanted for our children. We have free Wi-Fi in
- there but the downtown developers gave them free Wi-Fi
- 25 downtown but we'll talk about that but I saw Lieutenant



- 1 Young and joked about it a little bit but the issue is
- 2 that Detroit is apartheid city ever since emergency
- 3 management. Who took the police pensions? Keven Orr and
- 4 Governor Snyder, they messed with your pensions. So, I
- 5 did a video on it to tell the truth about that. So, I
- 6 wanted to talk about that. We're going to work on the
- 7 police now that we are getting our... I know that next
- 8 week I'll be in DC but that's before Dr. King's march.
- 9 But we're going to plan on going there to make sure the
- 10 police get more money, with the governor, to make sure
- 11 because the police are working in a war zone, we know
- 12 that. You can't make \$50,000 working in a war zone like
- 13 Syria and Lebanon. So, I'll be working on that more and
- 14 I'll bring that proposal back, thank you.
- 15 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you.
- 16 MR. ROB BROWN: Minister Eric Blunt.
- 17 MR. BLUNT: Can you hear me Board?
- 18 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes, we can.
- MINISTER BLUNT: Oh, you can feel me now, Reverend
- 20 Holley?
- 21 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I can feel you now, buddy, I can
- 22 feel you.
- 23 MINISTER BLUNT: This is Minister Eric Blunt from
- 24 Sacred Heart Catholic Church. It is so disappointing to
- 25 hear things will continue business as usual. Somehow the



- 1 candidates for chief of police were whittled down to
- 2 three and surprise, surprise, all three support facial
- 3 recognition technology and support qualified immunity.
- 4 There's no reason for citizens to believe that there's
- 5 going to be anything other than business, as usual in the
- 6 police department. And that is disappointing and doesn't
- 7 meet our standards. The other thing I'd like to bring up
- 8 is that the director of the city health department has
- 9 mandated that all indoor meetings require people to wear
- 10 masks, but I don't see anybody with masks. And now I
- 11 learned from last week's meeting that even the city
- 12 council is going to go a hundred percent virtual. So they
- 13 won't be in person without masks. So what special event
- 14 are you guys doing to be in person and without masks? I
- 15 pray for the health of all of you. We still need you to,
- 16 even though I disagree with most of you, I yield my time.
- 17 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Mr. Blunt, I appreciate you so
- 18 much, my friend, Mr. Cox, one of the candidates from Ann
- 19 Arbor, I think it was in Austin, basically was against
- 20 facial recognition. The other candidate basically had
- 21 some reservations on both sides. And then on the other
- 22 one, Interim Chief White was the only one that basically
- 23 had absolute support for facial recognition. And I just
- 24 want to let you know, all three of them were different. I
- 25 just want you to let you know that. And I thank you for



- 1 your comment and always thank you for your time and
- 2 wisdom that you give to this community and your service
- 3 you give to this community. Mr. Brown.
- 4 And also the time to give to this Board. Mr. Brown.
- 5 MR. ROB BROWN: Yes, Mr., Chair. Your last speaker
- 6 would be Mr. Reuben Black.
- 7 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Mr. Black you say.
- 8 MR. ROB BROWN: Yes.
- 9 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Let's give him a couple more
- 10 seconds here? Mr. Back, are you there?
- MR. BLACK: Can you hear me now Reverend Holley?
- 12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes, I can. We all can.
- MR. BLACK: It's Reuben Crowley, man. You did not
- 14 call me back, man. I got something to say but now is not
- 15 the time or place to say it. What I want to say is that
- 16 Willie Bell. Hey man, I told you that name a long time
- 17 ago. It means something and she was somebody, man,
- 18 mother, man, can't sweep her death under the rug, it was
- 19 no suicide, it's not going to happen. Man, it's my city,
- 20 I ain't going to let it happen. So hey, you can go to the
- 21 side and go out the way and all that. I told you, man,
- 22 the bus coming through, I'm driving. Lisa Coleman murder
- 23 is going to be addressed. Derek May, (audio distortion)
- 24 he was done over here, homicide is the. Well -



- 1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Mr. Crowley, you through? All
- 2 right. I don't mind you speaking Mr. Crowley, but I want
- 3 you to know this is a family program. So I just want you
- 4 to remember that. And thank all of you and thank each and
- 5 every one of you to different,
- 6 MR. ROB BROWN: Mr. Chair.
- 7 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes.
- 8 MR ROB BROWN: Is it possible to see if I can go back
- 9 to Mr. Mr. Scotty Bowman?
- 10 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Sure, I got time. The others may
- 11 want to go, but I got time. I'm waiting for Mr. Scotty
- 12 Bowman. Can you find him?
- MR. ROB BROWN: Mr. Chair, he's not unmuting, so,
- 14 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay. Mr. Bowman, you're not
- 15 muted. You're muted. Can you do that for me? I'm giving
- 16 you 5 seconds if you would, please otherwise, you'd have
- 17 to do everything next week. Thank you so much. Thank you,
- 18 Mr. Brown. Thank you for your effort as well. Board
- 19 members, what's your pleasure?
- 20 COMMISSIONER HOLT: I move that we adjourn.
- 21 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Second:
- 22 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: All in favor, say aye.
- 23 COMMISSIONERS: Aye. Thank you all so much.
