1 MS. WHITE: Good afternoon again and welcome to the
2 Detroit Board of Commissioners meeting. And please note

3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much, Ms. White.
4 Good afternoon to each and every one of you. Jim Holley
5 Chairperson of the Board of Police Commissioners. This
6 meeting will now come to order. I welcome for invocation,
7 Chaplain Jacqueline Timmons. Welcome, we thank you for
8 being with us.

9 CHAPLAIN TIMMONS: Thank you. Let us pray. Father, we
10 just thank you for this day, God. We just thank you for
11 your love, your grace, and your mercy. We ask, oh God, we
12 are thankful and we ask you to cover our governor in the
13 State of Michigan, our mayor, the City of Detroit, the
14 city council members, the Detroit Police Department, the
15 chaplains' corps, and our community. Father, we ask a
16 special blessing upon the Board of Police Commissioners
17 of God, as they come together, Father to bless our
18 community, to help our community, to help and bless the
19 City of Detroit. We pray, oh God, that your will, will be
20 done. And we thank you. Holy Spirit for your presence. We
21 thank you that you will lead them and that you will guide
22 them and that you will get the honor and the glory. We
23 thank you and give you praise in Jesus' name. Amen.

24 COMMISSIONERS: Amen.

1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much, Chaplain
2 Timmons. You can pray for us anytime. Thank you so much.

3 CHAPLAIN TIMMONS: Thank you. God bless.

4 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Mr. Brown you're up next.

5 MR. ROBERT BROWN: Yes sir. Good afternoon, Mr.
6 Chair, this Honorable Board and citizens of Detroit. The
7 Board of Police Commission Mission summary. The Board of
8 Police Commission, BOPC is a civilian agency that
9 exercises supervisor control and oversight of the Detroit
10 Police Department DPD as set forth in the charter. The
11 Board has 11 members, 70 elected by District, 4 appointed
12 by the mayor with the consent of the Detroit City
13 Council. The Board meets every week as a committee of the
14 whole, including 12 communities/evening meetings in the
15 district. The BOPC is the oversight agency for the
16 Detroit Police Department. That department policy rules
17 and regulation governs the Detroit Police Department is
18 jointly developed by the mayor, chief of police, and the
19 Board. The Board has subpoena power under the charter
20 that can be used for investigative purposes. The
21 commissioners also review and approve the DPD budget
22 pursuant to the charter, investigate non-criminal citizen
23 complaints, acts as the final authority in opposing and
24 reviewing the discipline of employees of the department,
25 receives and hear disqualification appeals from police

1 recruits hoping to enter the Detroit Police Academy. The
2 BOPC makes an annual report to the mayor, city council,
3 and the public of BOPC activities and accomplishments.
4 Mr. Chair, the reading of the summary.

5 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thanks you Mr. Brown very much
6 At this time I'm going to ask the Interim Board Secretary
7 White. If you can give the roll call, please.

8 MRS. WHITE: Yes, sir. Through the Chair, Vice-
9 Chairperson, Commission, Martin Jones.

10 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Good afternoon. Vice-Chair, Martin
11 Jones here and present and everything, welcoming all of
12 our community partners, as well as the Detroit Police
13 Department and all of the executives. Any other elected
14 or appointed officials that are with us at the zoom
15 meeting today, we thank you for attending and we look
16 forward to a great meeting

17 MRS. WHITE: Commissioner Jesus Hernandez, At-Large.
18 Commissioner, Annie Mae Holts, At-Large.

19 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Good afternoon, Commissioner
20 Annie Holt, At Large.

21 MS. WHITE: Thank you. Commissioner Holt, if you
22 could please give your introduction again, please. We had
23 some difficulties hearing you,

24 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Good afternoon. Commissioner
25 Annie Holt, At Large. How is that?

1 MS. WHITE: Yes, ma'am, thank you.

2

3 COMMISSIONER HOLT: All right now, Ms. White, you
4 know this computer. I become phobic. Thank you.

5 MRS. WHITE: Thank you. District 1, Commissioner
6 Darryl Brown.

7 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Good afternoon, everyone.
8 Commissioner Brown District 1.

9 MRS. WHITE: District 2. Commissioner, Linda Bernard.

10 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Good afternoon, everyone.
11 Attorney Linda Bernard representing District 2. Good to
12 see everybody today.

13 COMMISSIONER HOLT: You too.

14 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you.

15 MRS. WHITE: District 3. Commissioner Shirley A.
16 Burch.

17 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Good afternoon, everyone. I am
18 Commissioner Shirley Burch of District 3, where we
19 respect and love each other.

20 MRS. WHITE: District 4, Commissioner Willie E.
21 Bell.

22 COMMISSIONER BELL: Present. Thank you.

23 MRS. WHITE: District 5, Commissioner Willie E.
24 Burton. District 6, Commissioner Lisa Carter.

1 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Good afternoon, everyone. Lisa
2 Carter, District 6.

3

4 MRS. WHITE: District 7, Commissioner William M.
5 Davis.

6 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Good afternoon, everyone. Police
7 Commissioner, William M. Davis, District 7. Officers,
8 love where you work. Officers love where you work. Also,
9 Chairperson, I've had my hand up for about eight minutes
10 now.

11 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I guess I saw your hand, but I
12 don't understand why you have your hand up so early in
13 the meeting?

14 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Well, I was going to raise a
15 point that other people have raised in the past. Also,
16 the fact that when the Board Secretary gives to meeting
17 rules and regulations, that's before most of the public
18 even joins us.

19 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay. Will you let me know how
20 you think it ought to be done after the meeting or
21 during? Get to me and let me know what you want me to do,
22 okay.

23 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Well, you shouldn't give the
24 rules before people are required to be at the meeting.

1 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Through the Chair, this particular
2 part of the meeting is for the introduction of the police
3 commissioners. We should hold that discussion afterward.

4

5 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: All right. Thank you very much.
6 Can you continue, Ms. White?

7 MRS. WHITE: Yes, sir. Through the Chair, you do have
8 a quorum.

9 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay. Thank you so much.

10 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Mr. Chairman.

11 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: it's going to be, yes, go ahead,
12 Mr. Brown.

13 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Not to be the dead horse, but
14 that information, the Board don't need that information.
15 The public does. And that's what Commissioner Davis'
16 point was. It's not the Board that needs to hear that
17 information. The public needs to hear it and they're not
18 open to the meeting yet. That's the point of the comment.

19 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Unless you're hiding something.

20 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

21 COMMISSIONER BELL: Mr. Chairman, point of order.

22 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Let me just before you, because
23 we're getting off, I mean like, I, have only gone 3
24 minutes into the meeting yet. Let me just ask you, if it

1 is 3 o'clock is when we start, isn't everybody in the
2 community, as well as us on the call.

3 COMMISSIONER BROWN: We're not starting it at 3
4 o'clock. She's reading that before 3 o'clock. That's the
5 point that he was trying to make. If it's going to be
6 read at 3 o'clock, then it's okay to do that. Then the
7 public rules.

8 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: All right, we can handle that.

9 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: She started reading it at seven
10 minutes to three.

11 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Thank you.

12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay. I'll apologize. You're
13 absolutely right. Thank you so much for that. I'd like to
14 entertain a motion for the approval of the agenda for
15 September the 16th, 2021.

16 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: So move.

17 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Support.

18 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: All favor to say aye.

19 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

20 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Oppose.

21 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Oppose.

22 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: There is no opposition to the
23 agenda. What's your correction? Do you have a correction?

24 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Yes, in that the document is not
25 correct. And that it was pointed out to me most recently

1 that by our charter and by our bylaws, we do not have
2 anyone designated as, At Large, you know, there's an
3 elected and there is appointee or either it could be just
4 commissioner, but we do not have anyone that is, At
5 Large. We have no one that's elected citywide. So that's
6 a misrepresentation.

7 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: All right. So noted. All the
8 people say, aye, again, please.

9 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

10 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: All oppose.

11 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Oppose.

12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Approval of the minutes of the
13 previous meeting. That was for September 9th, 2021. Any
14 questions, any corrections to the minutes? Hearing no
15 corrections, can I have a motion?

16 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Move for approval.

17 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Second. All in favor, say aye.

18 COMMISSIONERS: Aye. Aye.

19 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Oppose. All right. Thank you so
20 much. And the other two things that you mentioned Board
21 members, I will address it as well. At this time, Ms.
22 White, can you give an introduction for the staff?

23 MRS. WHITE: Yes, sir. Through the Chair, just for
24 going to the staff introductions, I do see where
25 Commissioner Jesus Hernandez has joined the line.

1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Very good.

2 MRS. WHITE: Thank you. And also regarding other
3 members who are present on the line the department,
4 excuse me, other city entities, the Department of
5 Innovation and Technology is monitoring today's Board
6 meeting. And I will move into the Board staff
7 introductions. Mr. Robert Brown, Administrative
8 Specialist is present, Ms. Theresa Blossom, Community
9 Relations Coordinator, Ms. Jonya Underwood,
10 Administrative Assistant, Investigator Tiffany Stewart,
11 Director Katrina Patillo, Director of Police Personnel,
12 Assistant Corporation, Counsel, Erica Savage, Whitley,
13 Interim Chief Investigator Lawrence Akbar, Supervising
14 Investigator, Ainsley Crowell, Acting Supervising
15 Investigator LiSonya Sloan, Acting Supervising
16 Investigator Rosalia Madrigal. And that concludes the
17 staff introductions today, sir.

18 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: And thank you very much.
19 Representing the Chief, is it, Deputy Chief Wilson?

20 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: That's correct, sir.

21 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: It's so good to have you with us
22 this afternoon. Thank you for being there. And can you
23 give us an idea of who's with you today?

24 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: I'll start off. I've got Chris
25 Graveline and Captain Lena Liddell from Professional

1 Standards, Bureau, Commander Michael McGinnis from Major
2 Crimes, Second Deputy Chief Rudy Harper from the Chief's
3 Office, Lieutenant Mark Young, president of the
4 Lieutenants and Sergeants Association, Legal Advisor, DC
5 Grant Ha, Agency, CFO Nevrus Nazarko, Lieutenant Richard
6 Ferguson, and lastly Director Reid, Branch Wilson from
7 our office of Analysis and Strategy.

8 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much. And thank all
9 of you for being patient with me as well. I just have a
10 few remarks as always at the beginning of the meeting.

11 MRS. WHITE: Mr. Chairperson.

12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes.

13 MRS. WHITE: If I may also introduce the special VIP
14 guests and other elected officials or representatives,
15 sir.

16 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Sure you can.

17 MRS. WHITE: Yes, sir. Through the Chair, Ms. Marie
18 Overall of State Representative Tyrone Carter's Office is
19 present. Lieutenant Mark Young of the Lieutenants and
20 Sergeants Association has already been acknowledged. And
21 that concludes the notice that I have for elected
22 officials or representatives. Thank you.

23 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: And I thank you and for
24 reminding me, and certainly, counted to my head and not
25 to my heart. At this particular time I just want to

1 remind you that last week, the Board voted to authorize
2 the office of contracting and procurement to support open
3 bids, awarded tow contracts among other key items. The
4 Board would still maintain power of the Detroit Police
5 Department, tow operations, and the department's tow
6 monitored regarding the police authorized towing as well
7 as the conduct of other review and evaluations of the
8 contracts. So I want to make sure that we all understand
9 the operations and to exist with the enforcing the tow
10 rules alignment with the city's contract process that all
11 of us, the Board of Police Commissioner, tow rules and
12 guidelines. We will still be following it.

13 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: For more information, if you
14 really basically need more than what I'm saying to you
15 this afternoon. I want you to know that you can basically
16 look at the Resolution that was approved on September 9th
17 and certainly, as always I appreciate your cooperation
18 with each and every one of you. I never want any of you
19 to think that I take your kindness or your cooperation
20 for granted. Please note that the city council recently
21 held a public hearing, discussing the proposed tow
22 ordinance, the ordinance introduced by councilor
23 President Jones and our Board attorney, Attorney Whitley
24 will provide a copy of the revised proposed towing
25 ordinance, and give you updates. And we try to do all of

1 that for you next week so that everybody will have an
2 understanding of what took place in the last two weeks. I
3 also want to remind you, and I'm very grateful to Ms.
4 Blossom, Ms. White, and certainly for Chief White and for
5 all the people that basically have helped me with this
6 project.

7 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: And that is the Commissioners,
8 you have an office desk space in the Precincts for your
9 use. Ms. Blossom has included the Police Commissioner's
10 supplies, materials, complaints brochures, and other
11 items. Each Precinct will have your nameplate for your
12 use. I just want you to know that again, a lot of work
13 went into this and I want to thank all of those I already
14 mentioned for all their help in getting this to the point
15 where we feel like where you want to be closer to the
16 people that you work for in your District. So, if you
17 have any questions, please contact for any assistance
18 here Ms. White or anyone on the staff. Also, I just want
19 to remind you, earlier this week, I received information
20 based upon Commissioner Davis. I went and looked at this
21 and I want you to know regarding the hit and run accident
22 that occurred regarding one of the OIC vehicles. The
23 vehicles were parked was struck by an unknown driver. No
24 staff members were inside the vehicle when the accident
25 occurred, nor did any wrongdoing occur during the OIC

1 staff or supervisor. The Detroit Police Department
2 responded to the scene, completed an accident report, and
3 are currently investigating this matter to identify the
4 unknown offending driver who struck one of the vehicles.
5 So I just want you to know, again, if there is some more
6 information you would need about this particular
7 situation, we have it all on tape that you can look at it
8 and review it and show that everything I'm seeing has
9 transparency with that. Within the next week, the Board
10 will receive an update of proposed bylaws amendments to
11 add committees previously discussed a month ago.

12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Also our Board's parliamentarian
13 Dr. Jackson will also be present during the meeting to
14 answer any questions as we work and add committees back
15 to the structure. And then I want to remind you that we
16 have a closed session today. We got three items on this
17 closed session. And so obviously we will do this as we
18 have done in the past to try to make sure that we have a
19 public comment before we go into it, but I'm asking for
20 you to please note that I need your support. And if you
21 can just hang around long enough for us to basically have
22 these three items that we have to deal with, the
23 administrative leave without pay, a request from Chief
24 White regarding police Officer Otis Funches, Badge 690,
25 assigned to the Twelfth Precinct.

1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: And it's also Sergeant Derek
2 Loranger, Badge S-166 assigned to the Detroit Detention
3 Center. And lastly that the Board personnel item to
4 follow up on senior investigator resumes and
5 applications. I want to remind you that we are just
6 talking about the application resumes, and that's all we
7 basically want to discuss in this closed meeting. Also
8 wanted to look forward to the Chief - now Deputy Chief
9 Wilson's report discussing updates including crime and
10 critical incidents impacting the Detroit department, as
11 well as the community. Also, I want to remind you that
12 when I'm through, we have presentations, one with risk
13 management and this is something new that the Chief has
14 put in there. He mentioned it about three weeks ago. I
15 want to make sure that you know what this is all about.
16 If you have any questions or understanding about it. And
17 also we need to take time out for the Detroit Police
18 Department budget quarterly, the fourth quarter of the
19 budget. Once again, I thank each and thank you for your
20 kindness and for your patience with me giving you those
21 remarks. At this particular time, I'd like to have
22 resolutions. I think each one of you has basically been
23 assigned to a Resolution Ms. White, can you help me with
24 this?

25

1 MRS. WHITE: Yes, sir. Through the Chair, Vice-
2 Chairperson, Commissioner Martin Jones will be reading
3 the first Resolution for Sergeant Bruenton.

4 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Thank you. Through the Chair, it
5 certainly is an honor to be able to read this Resolution
6 on behalf of Sergeant Brady Bruenton. Resolution honoring
7 Sergeant Brady Bruenton.

8 Whereas Brady Bruenton was appointed to the Detroit
9 Police Department on June 16th, 1977. Upon graduating
10 from the Detroit Metropolitan Police Academy. Officer
11 Bruenton began his career at the Ninth Precinct; and,
12 WHEREAS Officer Bruenton's assignments with the Detroit
13 Police Department including the Ninth Precinct, Internal
14 Controls and Narcotics Unit; and,

15 WHEREAS Officer Bruenton displayed tremendous
16 knowledge and leadership skills and he earned a promotion
17 to Sergeant on August 26th, 1994 Sergeant Bruenton's
18 assignments, including the following units, Narcotics,
19 Gang Enforcement Crews, Prisoner Processing, Sixth
20 Precinct, and Communications Operations, where he served
21 until his retirement, and,

22 WHEREAS Sergeant Bruenton was a deserving recipient
23 of the following awards: Citation Award, two Chief Units
24 Awards, both Consent Judgements Awards, the Ford
25 Fireworks Award, the Major League Baseball All-Star

1 Recognition Award, the Rosa Park's Funeral Recognition
2 Award and the Super Bowl XL Recognition Award.

3 He also received numerous letters of commendation
4 from citizens and superiors, and,

5 WHEREAS Sergeant Bruenton has tirelessly served the
6 Detroit Police Department, the citizens of Detroit, and
7 its neighboring communities for over 44 years, he has
8 served the Detroit Police Department and the citizens of
9 the City of Detroit with loyalty, professionalism,
10 integrity, and dedication, and is widely respected
11 throughout the law enforcement community as a consummate
12 professional.

13 NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Detroit Board
14 of Police Commissioners, speaking on behalf of the
15 citizens of the great City of Detroit recognizes and
16 honors a lifelong contribution and commitment to
17 excellence and public service of Sergeant Brady Bruenton
18 for more than four decades, his display of courage and
19 unwavering community spirit has improved the quality of
20 life for the citizens of Detroit. We wish you all the
21 best in your future endeavors. We thank and congratulate
22 you Sergeant Brady H. Bruenton.

23 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Through the Chair.

24 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes,

25

1 COMMISSIONER HOLT: I move that we adopt this
2 Resolution and place it in our archives honoring Sergeant
3 Brady Bruenton.

4 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Second the motion.

5 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: It's been properly moved and
6 second. All in favor, say aye.

7 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

8 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: All oppose. Let the motions be
9 on the record. Thank you so much, Vice-Chair Jones. At
10 this time, Commissioner Burch, would you help me with
11 Corporal Lee?

12 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Yes, sir. Through the Chair, and
13 our Honorable Board, and to the community. Resolution
14 honoring Corporal Shawn E. Lee.

15 WHEREAS Sean Lee was appointed to the Detroit Police
16 Department on January 8th, 1996. Upon graduating from the
17 Detroit Metropolitan Police Academy. Police Officer Lee
18 began his career at the Sixth Precinct; and,

19 WHEREAS he dutifully served the Sixth Precinct,
20 Northwestern District, and the Sixth Precinct, again,
21 Officer Lee displayed tremendous diligence and aptitude
22 in his assignments. On August 1st, 2016, he was promoted
23 to the rank of Corporal and continued to serve at the
24 Sixth Precinct until his retirement; and,

1 WHEREAS during his law enforcement career, Corporal

3 and medal, Chief Merit Award, Seven Citation Awards, both
4 Consent Judgment Awards, the Major League Baseball, All-
5 Star Recognition Award, the Rosa Parks Funeral
6 Recognition Award, and the Super Bowl XL Recognition
7 Award, as well as commendations from supervisors and
8 numerous letters of appreciation from citizenry and ---

9 WHEREAS did something happen?

10 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: No, ma'am.

11 COMMISSIONER HOLT: No, ma'am.

12 COMMISSIONER BURCH: WHEREAS Corporal Lee has
13 tirelessly served the Detroit Police Department, the
14 citizens of Detroit, and his neighboring communities for
15 25 plus years. His professionalism, commitment to public
16 service, integrity, and dedication has been a credit to
17 the Detroit Police Department. He is highly respected as
18 a consummate professional.

19 NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of
20 Police Commissioners, speaking for the citizens of
21 Detroit and the Detroit Police Department awards this
22 Resolution, in recognition of Corporal Shawn Lee, 25 plus
23 years of dedicated and diligent, public service. His
24 professionalism, integrity, and lifelong commitment to
25 the City of Detroit and its citizens' merit, our highest

1 regards. We thank you and congratulate you, Corporal
2 Shawn E. Lee,

3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Is there a motion?

4 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: So move?

5 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Is there a second?

6 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Second.

7 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: It's been properly moved and
8 properly second. Any discussion. All in favor say, aye.

9 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

10 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Let the records note that it
11 will be part of the archives of the department. At this
12 time, Miss Holt, if you can give me some help with Police
13 Officer May.

14 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Thank you, Chair Holley. And
15 thank you, the entire Board of Police Commissioners for
16 allowing me this honor. Resolution honoring Police
17 Officer Ryan M. May.

18 WHEREAS Ryan May was appointed to the Detroit Police
19 Department on May 1st, 1999. Upon graduating from the
20 Detroit Metropolitan Police Academy. Police Officer May
21 began his career at the Ninth Precinct; and,

22 WHEREAS he dutifully served the Ninth Precinct
23 Eastern District, the Ninth Precinct again, and Task
24 Force administration until his retirement; and,

25

1 WHEREAS during his law enforcement career, Officer
2 May was the deserving recipient of both Consent Judgment
3 Awards, the Major League Baseball All-Star Recognition
4 Award, the Rosa Parks, Funeral Recognition Award, and the
5 Super Bowl XL Recognition Award, as well as commendations
6 from supervisors and numerous letters of appreciation
7 from citizenry; and,

8 WHEREAS Officer May has tirelessly served the
9 Detroit Police Department, the citizens of Detroit, and
10 its neighboring communities for more than 22 years.

11 His professionalism, commitment to public service,
12 integrity, and dedication have been a credit to the
13 Detroit Police Department. He is highly respected as a
14 consummate professional.

15 NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Detroit Board
16 of Police Commissioners speaking for the citizens of
17 Detroit and the Detroit Police Department awards this
18 Resolution in recognition of Police Officer Ryan May, for
19 more than 22 years of dedicated and diligent, public
20 service. His professionalism, integrity, and lifelong
21 commitment to the City of Detroit and its citizens merit
22 our highest regard. We thank and congratulate you Police
23 Officer Ryan M. May.

24 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Mr. Chairman, I recommend, oh,
25 I'm sorry.

1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Holt.

2 COMMISSIONER BURCH: I recommend that Officer May's
3 Resolution be put in the archives of the Board of Police
4 Commissioners.

5 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: is there a second?

6 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Support.

7 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: All in favor, say, Aye.

8 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

9 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Oppose. You know, Board members.
10 It's good to be able to talk about retirement, you know?
11 There are a lot of times when we do these Resolutions,
12 it's always post, for something and it's good to be able
13 to walk out of a police department for 20 plus years. And
14 that's a blessing in itself. Deputy Chief Wilson, you're
15 on board now.

16 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: Thank you Chair. Through the
17 Chair. I'll start off with our crime data. Homicides were
18 up 8%. We have 234 year-to-date. Non-fatal shootings
19 we're up 2%. We're at 817. We are seeing a steady
20 decline, and it's been pretty consistent over the last
21 month or two with robbery. We're down 24%. We have a
22 total of 1019 robberies. Overall, part one crime for the
23 year, year-to-date is down 3%. Next, I'll move over to
24 our drag race and drift and enforcement from last
25 weekend. That's September 10th through the 12th. Made 69

1 traffic stops, issued 52 traffic citations. Impounded 11
2 cars. Two of those vehicles were stolen recoveries. We
3 made five felony arrests, three misdemeanor arrests and
4 recovered two weapons. Next, I'll go to COVID stats. The
5 department currently has 22 members that are either
6 quarantined or isolated.

7 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: 16 of those members are
8 currently positive. The breakdown of the 22 members that
9 are quarantined, we have 18 sworn and 4 that are
10 civilian. Next, I have gotten, two incidents or cases
11 that I would like to provide an update to the Board on.
12 On September 9th at 5:25 in the 12th Precinct, in the
13 area of Burwood and Cambridge, we had an officer-involved
14 shooting. This shooting was highlighted on the news. Both
15 the subject that that's involved in this incident, as
16 well as the officer, are currently recovering from their
17 injuries. We submitted a warrant to the Wayne County
18 Prosecutor's Office for review, and they issued a six-
19 count felony warrant. The subject was charged with the
20 following charges, two counts of assault and an attempt
21 to commit murder. One count of a dangerous weapon with
22 unlawful intent and three counts of a felony firearm.

23 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: He was arraigned and he's
24 currently being held on a hundred thousand dollars cash
25 bond. The next incident and the last incident that I want

1 to provide an update to the board on this is we had an
2 incident in the Eleventh Precinct that occurred in 2700
3 Block of Halleck. It was on September 12th at 9:40 PM. We
4 had six people shot, two of the people suffered fatal
5 injuries. Victims were at this location after leaving a
6 family event. All we have right now is an unknown-type
7 vehicle drove by firing multiple shots striking all six
8 victims. Apparently, the investigation is being handled
9 by homicide. They're following up on some leads. We have
10 developed two persons of interest, and right now we know
11 the shooting was not a random shooting.

12 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: So we're pretty confident the
13 next week or two, maybe we'll turn those persons of
14 interest to people that we are ready to arrest. And last,
15 I just want to give an update on an event that we have
16 tomorrow. In the 12th Precinct, we have a family reunion,
17 pride picnic that will take place tomorrow between hours
18 or 3:00 PM to 8:00 PM at Palmer Park. This is a free
19 event and it's open to the public and it'll include food
20 games, music, and resources. And we'll have a lot of our
21 officers there to engage our community. And that will
22 conclude my report out.

23 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much, Deputy Chief
24 Wilson, and our regards to Chief White. Vice-Chairperson
25 Jones. Can you give the Board members the opportunity to

1 have a question, if they do have one for the Deputy
2 Chief?

3 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Through the Chair. Thank you very
4 much. We're going to start off from the bottom up. At-
5 Large, Commissioner Annie Holt, do you have any questions
6 for DC Marlon?

7 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Thank you, Vice-Chair Jones. Good
8 afternoon, Deputy Chief Marlon Wilson. I thank you so
9 much for your very detailed report. Last week I received
10 an email from a citizen and I think it has to do with
11 citizen patrol and apparently he had dialed 911, and the
12 operator at 911 told him that his complaint didn't merit
13 it receiving the attention one would expect when you call
14 911. Now, who places the judgment on whether her call
15 should go to the police or not. I mean, if it were a kid,
16 you know, or someone really joking, but again, I believe
17 this call was made by one of the citizen patrol
18 individuals. So who makes that call in other words, I
19 mean, who judges whether or not the call goes onto the
20 next level or the citizen, that's just cut off and, and
21 told to do something, you know, go play or something,
22 which is not what she said, but she did ignore it.

23 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: Through the Chair. Well, we
24 have policies, and procedures that govern our
25 communications system, our communications division. So,

1 you know, we do have categories that we place every call
2 in priority one, two or three. There are times where if
3 there are no safety issues to the citizen that they might
4 ask them to either make a phone call, do a report or to
5 go into a station. But if there's a call for service, we
6 take them and they're issued a priority based on the
7 nature of the call.

8 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Through the Chair. Thank you,
9 Deputy Chief. So perhaps her comment should have been
10 then for him to go into the police office, go to the
11 Precinct.

12 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: Through the Chair. If all that
13 was warranted, based on a call, was just to say it was
14 just a generated report. It could have been a phone call
15 that could have been made to our telephone crime
16 reporting unit, or the person could have been allowed the
17 opportunity to go to a Precinct. But without knowing the
18 exact circumstances. I can't say fully, but I would like
19 to, if you could remind me that set of citizens
20 information so we can follow up.

21 COMMISSIONER HOLT: And I will look for the email
22 that he sent me, and when I do find the email, I'll send
23 it on to Ms. White. Okay. In fact, I advised him to try
24 to be on this meeting today, so that he could make his
25 own comments. No, but in any event, I'll send an email on

1 to Ms. White. Through the Chair, correct, Deputy Chief
2 Marlon Wilson.

3 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: Through the Chair. Yes, that
4 would be a correct process. Yes.

5 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Thank you so much again. And
6 thank you Chair Holley for allowing me all these many
7 questions.

8 VICE-CHAIR JONES: At-Large, Commissioner, Jesus
9 Hernandez, do you have any questions for Deputy Chief
10 Marlon Wilson?

11 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Absolutely. Through the
12 Chair. I submitted an inquiry some time ago regarding
13 what I'm going to call, call center activity, a few calls
14 that went into 911 out of the 48210 sort of Delray area.
15 And those calls going into to Canada apparently at the
16 early hours of the night, 2:00- 3:00 AM. So just curious
17 if there's any kind of follow up on that item.

18 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Did you give that to us,
19 Commissioner, did you give that to the office here for
20 follow up?

21 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: I provided it to one of the
22 DCs before

23 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay. Very good.

24 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: Through the Chair, I'll
25 respond. I do recall the department receiving that

1 inquiry. I know we sent it over to our communications
2 department. Obviously, it appears based on your question
3 that you didn't receive it. I know, I did personally have
4 a conversation with our command and officer over at
5 communications and she wanted to dig into it a little
6 more. So I know she did. But I'll just need to follow up
7 with her and the Chief's Office to see where that
8 response is, and to make sure you get it.

9 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Perfect. Thank you.

10 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Okay. District 7, Commissioner
11 William Davis. Do you have any questions for DC Marlon
12 Wilson?

13 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Yes, I do. Question, sir. I know
14 on Sunday this pass Sunday, September 12th, I understand
15 that there was an officer involved in a stolen vehicle
16 and he was apprehended. Can you give us an update on
17 that? If that's true?

18 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: I don't have any information. I
19 know I have Christopher Graveline as an attendee. I don't
20 know if he can be brought over as a panelist, and maybe
21 and he can provide an update.

22 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: You got another question? We'll
23 get him on the on the zoom here. So he's working his way
24 here.

25

1 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Oh, no. That's the most
2 interesting. What had happened is that they apprehended
3 an officer in the stolen vehicle.

4 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay. We're working on that now
5 for you is another, you have, Commissioner?

6 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: No.

7 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay, but we'll come right back
8 to you. I'm not going to forget you. I want you to
9 understand that. Let's go to the next person. Oh, wait,
10 I'm sorry. Please forgive Vice-Chair Jones. I got Mr.
11 Chris on the line now, Mr. Chris.

12 DIRECTOR GRAVELINE: Thank you. Through the Chair.
13 Commissioner Davis. So yes, this last Sunday night two
14 officers in the Second Precinct saw a car driving with no
15 plate. They got behind the car to follow it. The car
16 ended up speeding away and was in a single vehicle
17 accident. The two people in the car fled out the car, the
18 person who was the passenger in that car was a Detroit
19 police officer, and he was arrested at the scene for
20 resisting and obstructing. And the reason he was arrested
21 for resisting and obstructing is after he was initially
22 identified, he ended up walking away from the police and
23 down the street away, and he was re-apprehended at that
24 point. He was held for approximately two days. He was
25 released yesterday, I'm sorry, on Tuesday. And pending

1 further investigations, there are no charges at this
2 time, but we are still investigating that case.

3 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: So, after the crash, did both of
4 the occupants exit the vehicle in an attempt to get away?

5 DIRECTOR GRAVELINE: Yes.

6 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: And the officer was pursued and
7 stopped, right?

8 DIRECTOR GRAVELINE: Yes. That is correct.

9 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Okay. That's that was my
10 understanding.

11 DIRECTOR GRAVELINE: Yes, that is correct, and we are
12 still investigating who was in possession of that vehicle
13 and the investigation continues.

14 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Thank you.

15 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Davis, I will call
16 you Colombo.

17 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: My constituents call and tell me
18 stuff.

19 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Vice-Chair Jones.

20 VICE-CHAIR JONES: All right. The Vice-Chair
21 recognizes District 6, Commissioner Lisa Carter. Do you
22 have any questions for DC, Marlon Wilson?

23 COMMISSIONER CARTER: No, sir. Thank you.

24 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Okay. The Vice-Chair recognizes
25 District 5, Commissioner Willie Burton. The Vice-Chair

1 recognizes District 4, Commissioner Willie Bell. Do you
2 have any questions for DC? Marlon Wilson?

3 COMMISSIONER BELL: I don't have a question for the
4 DC, but I would like to state this, that incident was on
5 Facebook. I would hope in the future that Chief White and
6 staff would direct us communication to our Board
7 Secretary, and we would be informed in a time of office
8 that he was arrested, then that should be a standard
9 procedure where we don't see it on Facebook and have no
10 knowledge. And then we get these types of questions at
11 the meeting. And I have to make one more point for this
12 Board. A whole lot of these remarks you make are
13 housekeeping. And accident that is not a public matter.
14 That is a housekeeping matter. I would hope that you get
15 exposed to the difference terms. Some instance that we
16 should be dealing with housekeeping, let the Chair know
17 and the Board Secretary and we can address them in that
18 manner.

19 VICE-CHAIR JONES: All right. Thank you for your
20 comments, Commissioner Willie Bell. The Vice-Chair
21 recognizes District 3, Commissioner Shirley Burch. Do you
22 have any questions?

23 COMMISSIONER BURCH: I thank you. Yes, sir. I thank
24 you so much. DC Wilson. I sent a text to one of our DCS
25 regarding all that's going on in Precinct Eleven. So you

1 mentioned some of the shootings and the murders and the
2 drag racing, but you didn't mention, or do you know about
3 the incident at Seven-mile Conant that store on that
4 corner? Do you know about that incident?

5 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: It doesn't ring a bell at the
6 moment.

7 COMMISSIONER BURCH: There was a murder. I'm just
8 saying there was a killing there. So, I'm very concerned
9 because our citizens are just reaching out all the time.
10 What's going on in Precinct Eleven, Reverend Holley, that
11 it just seems to be an outburst of more shootings and
12 shooting. I know you all going to say it's all over the
13 world. We know that, but when you have it in a certain
14 area and the people keep on complaining, but there's no
15 solutions. And then I'll be Colombo, Ms. Colombo to Mr.
16 Davis, when you were speaking about the officer arrested,
17 is this true? This was on the news too, that they said
18 that a Detroit officer was in Taylor, and it was
19 regarding domestic violence, but he was a Detroit police
20 officer. Is any of that fact, because you see there is so
21 much stuff out there, you don't know what to listen to?
22 Like Mr. Bell was saying, could you just share the
23 domestic violence of this officer and Taylor, that it was
24 one of our officers?

1 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: Through the Chair, the second
2 question, I'll let Chris Graveline speak on, but I can
3 speak on the Eleventh Precinct. We recently had a
4 meeting, because we have seen the increase in violence in
5 the Eleventh Precinct, more so than some of our other
6 Precincts. So we have re redirected a lot of our
7 resources my resources alone from organized crime. They
8 they've been redeployed over to the Eleventh Precinct
9 starting actually Monday. So we're hoping that we can
10 keep this going for a week or two and we can see some
11 reductions in the violence in the Eleventh Precinct.

12 COMMISSIONER BURCH: I hope so, sir, seriously,
13 because I keep saying, and I never get on this Board
14 complaining. I'm not a complainer, I'm a doer. I have
15 solutions. That's what I'm about. So if we keep
16 experiencing this, the citizens are afraid DC, they're
17 beginning to just don't know what to do. I hope you're
18 investigating.

19 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Let me get your question from
20 Mr. Graveline, please.

21 DIRECTOR GRAVELINE: Through the Chair, Commissioner
22 Burch, I did not see that particular news report, but
23 there is an officer who was arrested for domestic
24 violence, a Detroit Police Officer N. Taylor. In fact,
25

1 that's going to be the subject of the closed hearing
2 today at the end of this meeting.

3 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Thank you. Okay. You all need to
4 do something? Lord Jesus.

5 VICE-CHAIR JONES: All right. The Vice-Chair
6 recognizes District 2, Commissioner Linda Bernard. Do you
7 have any questions for DC Marlon Wilson?

8 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Yes, I do. We were not
9 provided the usual summary that we get on crime regarding
10 homicide, aggravated assault, which breaks down crimes by
11 Precinct. That's important to us obviously. Is there any
12 reason?

13 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: We can get that for you Ms.
14 Bernard. I can get that for you 24 hours.

15 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Okay. Thank you. So we'll know
16 what's actually happening.

17 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes. I'll get that to you.

18 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you.

19 VICE-CHAIR JONES: All right. The Vice-Chair
20 recognizes Commissioner Darryll Brown, District 1. Do you
21 have any questions for DC Marlon Wilson?

22 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Yes, I do. I have a comment too.
23 DC is good to see you again. And I just want to thank
24 everyone that's out there in the job they're doing. My
25 concerns with the officer that was injured in the

1 shooting. I heard your report on that in the Eighth
2 Precinct area. I think it was the Eighth Precinct. He was
3 shot in the stomach. How's he doing, and how is he
4 recovering and what are we looking at with the issue
5 surrounding boosters and the rise in COVID for the
6 officers? Are we going to be taking part in the booster
7 shot stuff with the officers on the street?

8 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: Through the Chair. The first
9 question, the officer I'm very happy to report he's
10 recovering. He just sustained a graze wound. So he's
11 alert, he's in good spirits, he's doing well. We we're
12 expecting him to, to have a speedy recovery. And the
13 second question regarding the boosters, I don't have any
14 information on that. I, I believe right now, everybody's
15 kind of sticking to what is being recommended, that if
16 you have, you know, issues with say your immune system,
17 you know, it's recommended that you get your booster
18 shot, but we have not started our discussion as far as,
19 not on my level. The Chief and the mayor might have, but
20 I don't have any information on if we're going to be
21 given any priority when it comes to the booster shot.

22 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Okay. And I still like to give
23 my praise to officers over there in the Eighth Precinct
24 and probably some in the Second Precinct with the
25 fantastic job they're doing with traffic enforcement.

1 There's been an increase in tows and ticket writing in
2 the bike lanes. People aren't parking their cars there
3 anymore. More Importantly in the handicap lanes and a lot
4 of the businesses. And there was a comment made earlier,
5 not to you, to the Chairman about housekeeping issues. If
6 closed sessions were granted when they're asked and not
7 ignored, we could handle housekeeping things in those
8 situations. And that's all I'm going to say about that.
9 Thank you, DC Wilson. Good to see you again.

10 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: Commissioner, you're welcome.

11 VICE-CHAIR JONES: All right. Thank you. Vice-Chair
12 Martin Jones. I just got possibly just a quick comment
13 for DC Marlon Wilson. First of all, I want to thank you
14 for appearing on behalf of the Chief. And the reports
15 that we get about the number of homicides that we've been
16 experiencing just as of late, have been troubling at best
17 for all of us. We live in the city, work in the city, we
18 shop in the city. So you understand that it's only so
19 much that can be done on the preventative side. With
20 regards to the officer that sustained a gunshot wound
21 over on Cambridge, one of the things that's extremely
22 important is that we get our officers, the equipment that
23 they need, I would have to imagine that his training and
24 that his equipment and everything that we've given to
25 these officers to help, to protect them and to help them

1 to react properly to a situation contributed to his life
2 being saved and his partner's life being saved on that
3 particular day.

4 VICE-CHAIR JONES: So we definitely want to make sure
5 that we are getting them the training that they need and
6 the equipment that they need to go out and to be able to
7 help, to try to protect the city as best that they can
8 and best wishes on behalf of the Board of Police
9 Commissioners for speedy recovery for him. Thank you.
10 Now, Chairman of the Board, I turn the meeting back over
11 to you.

12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you Vice-Chair Martin. I
13 see your hand up Commissioner Davis. I see a white hand.
14 Does that mean you're surrendering or something? What
15 does that mean?

16 COMMISSIONER BURCH: That's me. That's me.

17 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair.

18 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Burch, is that you?

19 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: No, Commission Burton wants to
20 say something.

21 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Oh, Burton. Commissioner Burton
22 are you wishing to speak?

23 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Yes. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.
24 Question for, well, DC it's good that you are here today
25 at the Commissioner's meeting. I know you don't have the

1 numbers now in front of you or anything, but within the
2 next 30 days can you share with the Board, I'd like to
3 know how many officers that we have that are currently
4 bilingual, especially those working in the downtown
5 services. And in addition when it comes to those that
6 speak a second language or anything, are there any other
7 complication for those that speak a second language? But
8 that's just my comments today and, I mean, my questions
9 today for, you know, within the next 30 days.

10 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much Commissioner
11 Burton. Thank you very much. Thank you so much. Deputy
12 Chief Wilson for your time and give out regards to the
13 Chief, if you would, please.

14 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: Yes, sir. You're welcome. Thank
15 you.

16 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Commissioner Burch has a
17 question.

18 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes. Commissioner Burch.

19 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Yes, sir. I'm sorry. It's
20 Commissioner Burch. I just wanted to, before we go into
21 the next part of our meeting, Chair Holley, I want to
22 make sure everybody hears this. I'm talking about the
23 public. To you, sir, DC Wilson, please take back to the
24 Chief. We appreciate every officer in this city. They are
25 overwhelmed by what's going on in this city. It's not

1 fair to them. They're stressed out first, take that back
2 to him, please then, to you Chair Holley, you are doing a
3 fantastic job of coming to this Board of Police
4 Commissioners as a new Chair, with all the experience
5 that Chair Bell had, he's aware of what goes on, the in,
6 the outs, the ups and downs, but you have a different
7 leadership where you open up each Commissioner that we
8 are able to speak our opinion. That is a good leadership,
9 sir.

10 COMMISSIONER BURCH: I want the public to know that
11 by you, and it's not just about any office. I don't need
12 an office at the Eleventh Precinct. We just need some
13 protection out here. Communication is key. We are not
14 communicating with the public, with our police, and we
15 are not communicating with the mayor of this city. Mr.
16 Holley, I mean, Reverend Holley, we have got to come
17 together to know we are becoming a Beirut city and that
18 does not make sense. We live in America. And when I use
19 the word love and respect where you live, that should be
20 on everybody's heart. And that's what we should be
21 focusing on. I'm going to be quiet, but you're doing a
22 good job. You can't do it by yourself, public, get up and
23 help. That's all I got to say. Thank you.

24 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Mr. Chairman. I got one closing
25 remarks if I can.

1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes, sir, everybody else, so you
2 might as well.

3 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Mr. Chairman, thank you. I
4 mean, real quick. The reason I brought up as far as the
5 officers in the downtown services, that how many of them
6 that speaks a second language? Yes, sir. I learned in
7 2014 going to a NACOLES conference that Kansas City
8 actually started this speaking emergent program with
9 Spanish with their officers. And we saw how that turned
10 some things around in a positive way in Kansas City with
11 their department. And so I just have some concerns about
12 how many of our officers in the downtown services that
13 may speak a second language knowing that you still have
14 people that still come here for various functions and
15 events and things of that nature. Thank you.

16 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you for just being aware
17 of all of that. Thank you so much, Commissioner Burton.
18 At this time, Mr. CFO, I want you introduce yourself, so
19 I won't mess it up, okay. Mr. CFO?

20 MR. NAZARKO: Yes, Mr. Chair. Good afternoon,
21 Honorable Chair and Honorable Council of Commissioners.
22 My name is Nevrus Nazarko. I'm the Agency's CFO.

23 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Say it again, say it again, say
24 it again.

25 MR. NAZARKO: Nevrus Nazarko.

1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you.

2 MR. NAZARKO: Thank you, Mr. Chair for giving the
3 opportunity to present some financial information on
4 behalf of DPD and the Office of Chief Financial Officer.
5 The reports that I submitted to the Board last month, and
6 I'll share the screen? Can I have permission to share the
7 screen?

8 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes, you do.

9 MR. NAZARKO: Thank you. Disabled. Ms. White. it says
10 that my permission is disabled.

11 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: You got it now.

12 MR. NAZARKO: Okay. Thank you.

13 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: At least I thought you had it.

14 MR. NAZARKO: Yes, I do have it. Now, I'm just
15 looking for my ---

16 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Board members, please take notes
17 on all of this, please, so that we can... there you go.
18 Let's try it one more time.

19 MR. NAZARKO: I'm going to try one more time. I got
20 it. Do you see my PowerPoint presentation?

21 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: There you go. I got it now.

22 MR. NAZARKO: So the reports that I'll show tonight,
23 and there were submitted via Ms. White to the Board are
24 the financial reports for the Detroit Police Department
25 for the quarter ending June 30th, 2021, which

1 coincidentally is the end of the fiscal year for the
2 Detroit Police Department, as well as the City of
3 Detroit. The reports to me that are the budget, actual
4 revenues and expenditures as of June 30th, 2021. The
5 grant activity report including new grants with the
6 quarter ending the June 30th, 2021. For future activity
7 for the same quarter GSD capital expenditure report and
8 the vehicle purchasing report. This slide shows that for
9 the total fields clear again, I'm going to refer to this
10 as the fourth quarter 2021, June 30, but at this coincide
11 as I mentioned earlier, with the end of the fiscal year
12 and the total revenues that we had budgeted for the
13 fiscal year, were \$52,629,000 and total expenditures were
14 \$315, 410,000 for a net tax cost of \$262,781,000.

15 MR. NAZARKO: So net tax cost means that how much DPD
16 spent and what revenues came in on behalf of DPD. The
17 actuals for the fourth quarter, 2021, again, the revenues
18 we had booked as of June the 30th were \$37,776,000. And
19 the total expenditures on that date were \$303,800,000.
20 The variance on the revenues was \$14.8 million, and the
21 variance on the negative side, meaning that we brought in
22 less revenues, but I'll explain in a minute why that is
23 the case. And then on the expenditures side, we had spent
24 as of June 30th, \$12 million less than what was allocated
25 in the budget. However, this was the case because as of

1 June 30th, we still received bills and still make
2 payments after June 30th. Therefore, we continue to
3 accrue expenditures that happened in the previous year,
4 meaning that before June 30th, but for one reason or
5 another, we didn't get the invoice whatnot, we accrue
6 them. So this amount, and I'll show you on a further
7 slide below, these amounts are constantly upgraded, so
8 the exact amount is known by now because we closed the
9 books right about now. As I said, the actuals that came
10 in on the revenue side were \$37.67 million, and the
11 budget was \$52.6 million. The expenditures \$303 million,
12 approximately versus a budget of \$350 million. Now this
13 slide shows that where we were supposed to or projected
14 to end the fiscal year after we did make all the accruals
15 after June 30th. So the budget on the revenue side was
16 \$52,629,000, and we project to bring in \$51,920,000,
17 which is only \$1.5 million short. This is surprisingly
18 you know, well because the given the fact that this was
19 the pandemic year, that the, especially the income tax
20 revenue was less than what we anticipated. So still we
21 were able to bring in revenues, not up too far from what
22 we had budgeted. On the expenditure side, as I said
23 earlier, we budgeted \$315 million and the actual
24 expenditure we project to when we close the book's file,

1 which again is any day now, we expect to be \$6 million on
2 the good side for, again, a total of \$309,330 million.

3 MR. NAZARKO: The forfeiture activity report as of
4 June 30th, 2021. And reminder this is for the whole
5 fiscal year for 12 months. Local forfeiture, we brought
6 in \$1,383,602, and we spent \$1,400,409. On the federal
7 forfeiture side the revenue was only \$100,581. And we did
8 not spend any dollars from the federal forfeiture
9 account. The vehicle purchase report which shows on this
10 slide shows basically the vehicles that we are budgeted
11 and we have ordered the city has ordered to acquire, but
12 the delivery date, as you can see here with the exception
13 of the flatbed tow truck there was estimated to be
14 delivered in June based on this information. The rest of
15 them are not going to be delivered until this fiscal
16 year, but in the month of February 2022. Again, this
17 report shows the type of vehicles, the cost and the
18 estimated deployment date. Other reports that were
19 submitted to you are the DPD quarterly capital projects
20 report that I could not fit in this slide, but I do have
21 it, if you want me to share it with you on the screen and
22 the DPD capital expenditure report as well, that has line
23 items.

24 MR. NAZARKO: Now I'd like to, Mr. Chair, I'd like to
25 acknowledge that through Ms. White couple of days ago, I

1 received a set of questions from the Honorable Board,
2 seven questions in total that I have gathered all the
3 pertinent information to answer those. So if you want me
4 to verbally, tonight, answer those questions, I can go
5 over, but if you want them in writing I'd like to ask an
6 extension by the end of the business day tomorrow or
7 Monday at the latest. However, I do have all the
8 information in that, I believe the Board requested to
9 those seven questions.

10 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I think this is very important
11 to the Board, and I appreciate your kindness in terms of
12 explaining. I'd like for you to have the answer to the
13 questions that we submitted to you, but I also want to
14 put them in writing if you would, please. This is a lot
15 to digest, and I want to make sure that the Board is able
16 to do just that. So if you don't mind as brief as you
17 can, but with clarity, if you would please. Let's do all
18 seven questions if you don't mind.

19 MR. NAZARKO: Yes, sir. Please give me a minute so I
20 can share the questions. I'm going close this. Give me
21 just one quick second, sir. With your permission, I'll
22 share the screen again on questions. I'm going to start
23 with question number two and I'll get to question one
24 again because I have the response in a different document
25 Mr. Chair. Do you see the question to for this?

1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes.

2 MR. NAZARKO: Okay. So, question number two asked,
3 how many social workers does the department currently
4 have? And the response to that is, it's a three-part
5 question. So the response to the first part is that we
6 currently have seven social workers, not including two,
7 that will start on September 20th, 2021, next week. We
8 have three seniors that are technically social workers
9 for a total of 10. What is the number assigned to each
10 Precinct? Two the response is two social workers will be
11 transferred to the Precincts by the end of the month,
12 beginning of next month and four are currently assigned
13 in the Precinct.

14 MR. NAZARKO: Part B of that question, does the
15 department expect to hire more social workers in the near
16 future? There are two that are starting on Monday, as I
17 mentioned earlier on September 20th, 2021. And the job
18 posting is posted continuously as qualified candidates
19 apply, they'll go through the recruitment process and
20 will hire more. Question number three, and the response
21 to this is in my mind, basically I have not been able to
22 put this in writing yet, but under the report, the
23 question is, under the report of General Services
24 Department, GSD capital expenditures from April to June
25 2021, please explain lines 55 to 57 regarding DMC

1 consultation and projected timeline of improvement
2 completion. This particular consultant is hired to work
3 with us on the tow yard improvements at, I believe it's
4 at the Grand River lot. This is funded with the bond
5 dollars and the improvement consists of surfacing of
6 mainly the parking lots and fencing, and there are some
7 issues I've been told that are environmentally related
8 issues. And that's why this DMC this vendor DMC
9 consulting is hired to work with the DPD.

10 MR. NAZARKO: Question number four. It says under the
11 grants report fiscally or 2021, the below list grant
12 initiative, a new grant for the current ShotSpotter
13 technology, or is this a grant initiative for another
14 deployment with another Precinct? The answer is the
15 \$100,000 that you see in the grand report is a grant from
16 ATF that was awarded in late 2020 to each of the seven
17 operation agencies Detroit been one of them, specifically
18 to support the purchase of what is now the current
19 ShotSpotter area. So these funds were included in
20 development of the active ShotSpotter target area in the
21 Eighth and Ninth Precincts that are now working or live
22 monitoring which will again, run live to March 15th. To
23 the best of my knowledge, any further expansions of the
24 ShotSpotter will be supported by ARPA funding, but we do
25 not have any firm approval or dollars allocated to

1 further expansion. Question number five. Regarding the
2 mission office of highway safety planning, this grant,
3 which is, again, is another grant.

4 MR. NAZARKO: This grant also provide assistance for
5 police overtime and or surveillance to assist with
6 deterring frequent freeway shooting incidents. If not,
7 are there any other grants that department will apply?
8 The answer is no. This grant will not provide for
9 overtime reimbursement office of highway and safety
10 planning has several funding opportunities that could
11 support this, including the distracted driving grant,
12 which was not offered this year to due to budget cuts. If
13 the funding for this opportunity becomes available, we'll
14 update the Board accordingly. Question number six.
15 Regarding line item 20, please explain further community
16 policing innovations in this initiative including any
17 goals and outcomes made in the grant application or
18 award? This particular grant, community policing
19 innovation initiative is for \$40,000 and it is not a cash
20 award. It's an award of her \$40,000 worth of creative
21 justice technical assistance training.

22 MR. NAZARKO: The CPI program is a sub-community
23 policing in innovations program, is a collaborative
24 effort between DPD Office of the Internal and External
25 Relations and Detroit's faith-based coalition aim to

1 improve DPD police community summit events. These events
2 provide an opportunity for Detroiters who have filed
3 season complaints to meet up the officers from their
4 Precinct in a natural space. The faith-based coalition
5 leads the restorative conversation between the
6 aforementioned parts. And the last question says
7 regarding line item 26. And again, this refers to the
8 grand report shown on the line 26. This particular grant
9 is for the building capacity to the safer communities and
10 this award, funds the salaries of two MDOC agents and a
11 project manager. Currently DPD has MDOC agents embedded
12 in select Precincts and specialized units.

13 MR. NAZARKO: These agents work directly with DPD
14 officers to optimize information sharing and streamline
15 enforcement operations. The financial support for the two
16 additional agents allows the program to be implemented
17 citywide. And this strategy has proven to be highly
18 successful, which led the mayor to request the
19 additional, funding to be pursued to support the
20 increased capacity. This funding fulfills this particular
21 request. And question number one, Mr. Chair was basically
22 an operational question for the DPD. I have received the
23 response, but the Office of the Chief and myself have not
24 made a response. And when I provide this document in
25 writing to the Board, that response regarding the vehicle

1 purchase report, because the question was, describe the
2 fully market patrol vehicles, pursued vehicles, pursued
3 SUVs and whatnot. I will provide that in writing to the
4 Honorable Board.

5 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: And I really thank you so much,
6 but I want to make sure that we get this presentation to
7 all of our commissioners. We'll do just that, and these
8 questions and answers as well. Commissioners, I see a
9 couple of --- You still have a question. Commissioner
10 Bernard.

11 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Yes. Mr. Chairman. I am very
12 surprised by this report. Based on this report, I guess
13 the, the general numbers in terms of the total revenues
14 and total expenditures, is the department a \$1.2 billion
15 department, sir?

16 MR. NAZARKO: No. Ma'am

17 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Well, if you're spending 300
18 million a quarter, how do you not get to 1.2 billion?

19 MR. NAZARKO: I apologize. Probably I wasn't clear
20 enough. The \$350 million budget pertains to the entire
21 fiscal year. I'm reporting on the fourth quarter, but
22 this was the entire fiscal year and not only for one
23 quarter.

24 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: So the total revenues for the
25 Police Department are what all grants and everything

1 MR. NAZARKO: \$52 million budget that has amended,

2 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: No, I'm talking about revenues
3 for the department. So the whole department is only 52
4 million?

5 MR. NAZARKO: Brings in through the income tax
6 utilities tax and other fines and fees. We bring in 52
7 million last year that changes every year. Last year we
8 brought in \$52 million, the expenditures, how much we
9 spent for all operations from A to Z in DPD was \$315
10 million.

11 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: So, the revenues have to match
12 the expenditures, \$350 million department. Is that what
13 you're saying? Because that was not my understanding. My
14 understanding was that it was much greater than that.

15 MR. NAZARKO: Ma'am no, the total budget, for
16 example, for this year fiscal year, 2022, the total
17 budget, including grants, including towing, including
18 forfeiture activity, all the funds is 341 million. Last
19 year it was 333 million out of which 315 was the general
20 fund. These expenditures, how much the department spends
21 the entire fiscal year, how much the department brings in
22 does not match, cannot match because there is no way that
23 that DPD Police Department can raise that much revenue.
24 However, this is being paid by the taxpayers and other
25 revenue sharing that comes from State of Michigan or

1 federal government. So the D P D operations are funded to
2 all those funding sources, but DPD revenues earmarked for
3 DPD are only the \$52 million that we mentioned earlier.

4 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Holt, Commission
5 Holt.

6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: One more thing, Mr. Chairman,
7 furthermore, sir, I'm disappointed in this report. We
8 don't have a report on the grants. What they're for or
9 where they came from. The only detailed report that we
10 received was on cars that we are purchasing. And I mean,
11 that's not necessarily important to me or I think to the
12 community, there is no total budget, you know, in terms
13 of, we need a much more comprehensive budget than what we
14 have.

15 MR. NAZARKO: With the permission of the Chair, I'll
16 share with you the grand report that I shared with the
17 Board, there's a separate report, not what you see in the
18 PowerPoint. There is a very detailed report, and that's
19 where the questions that I read earlier came from.

20 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: It's not in my -

21 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Bernard.

22 Commissioner Bernard. Again, we can get that to you. This
23 right here is a different report, but we can get that to
24 you. Is it okay with you so you can basically go over it
25 and have some other questions, okay?

1 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Yes,

2 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay. Commissioner Holt. I can't
3 hear you. I can't hear you.

4 MR. NAZARKO: Miss hold your mute.

5 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: When I point to my ear, it means
6 that I can't hear you. It don't mean I'm trying to commit
7 suicide, okay.

8 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Thank you, Chair, Holley. Thank
9 you again, Mr. Nazarko for your presentation today, and
10 at our training this past summer, because of the training
11 that you presented, it really helped me better understand
12 some of the dynamics relating to how and why DPD is
13 involved in towing, and some other aspects of that
14 operation that are not as pristine as they should be. So
15 thank you a lot for last year's training. Now, I see we
16 have all these cars that we're buying, and I believe
17 these cars will facilitate more officers being present in
18 our communities. I'll call it cruising as opposed to
19 patrolling. Now, where did this money come from to
20 purchase all these cars? And that's not a negative, I'm
21 just inquisitive. From where did this money come?

22 MR. NAZARKO: The money comes from different sources,
23 ma'am Commissioner. The majority of the money is through
24 the capital projects fund, which is not part of the funds
25 that I showed you earlier. And most of the vehicles in

1 the last two years had been purchased by utilizing the
2 UTGO bonds that were issued by the City of Detroit three
3 years ago, if I'm not mistaken. So that money comes again
4 from different sources, capital projects, which is in
5 essence, the taxpayers money and the bond money depending
6 on the size and the allocation through the city council
7 through the appropriation process.

8 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Thank you again for your report.

9 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Mr. Chairman.

10 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes, Commissioner Burton.

11 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Hi, you know, I actually agree
12 on this one with my colleague that we do need a, more of
13 a comprehensive budget in front of the Commission. Some
14 things that come to mind is, when it comes to the budget,
15 where's the list of lawsuits and amounts of expenditures
16 on lawsuits and settlements and lawyers' fees. In
17 addition to that, you know, where is that in the budget?
18 In addition to that is the Detroit Police Department, is
19 any money going towards 1122 program, which is with the
20 department of defense, is any of those dollars also in
21 the budget, that's probably going under a certain line
22 item that we may not know what that line item happens to
23 be. So I do agree with my colleague, we do need to see a
24 comprehensive budget plan before the Commission. I mean,
25 when it comes to vehicles and things of that nature, I

1 actually agree with my colleague once again, you know,
2 there's more important things that we really need to look
3 at when it comes to the budget. And so, you know, one of
4 the things is, is anything for us project Greenlight,
5 ShotSpotter or any other complicit biased technology. Is
6 that coming out of the budget? And so those are some
7 things that we would like to know as well. Mr. Chairman

8 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you, Commissioner Burton.
9 Let me just mention to each and every one of you. And of
10 course again, I want to make sure that you get your
11 questions asked and that you get them answered, but
12 understand we had a training, we had a training about the
13 budget we under Mr. Bell, Commissioner Bell. Basically,
14 we talked about this and we had that training so that we
15 know where everything is itemized and so forth. The other
16 thing that was at the beginning. And so again, each
17 quarter, we give you a presentation of the quarter, but
18 when you put it all together it comes out... and
19 hopefully that you keep these information that you had
20 for the last two quarters, you put them together, and you
21 have, and basically it comes out to many of the questions
22 that you're asking. But I'm not trying to, in any kind of
23 way, trying to mitigate to the fact is that you want to
24 have this question or that question answered, but I want
25 you to also know we gave you all the grants under

1 Commissioner Bell's administration. We gave you, we
2 shared you with all the grants.

3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: So I'm just saying to you,
4 again, whatever you want, put it in writing, I will make
5 sure that the CFO will get it to you, but some things
6 basically is, you in the right place, but the wrong
7 queue, I'm just saying to you, there are some things that
8 he does not deal with in terms of the lawsuits and things
9 like that. I have to go to another, another venue for
10 that. And so.

11 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Mr. Chairman, Mr. Chairman,

12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Let me, I'm not going, I'm not
13 going to, I'm not going to.

14 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Real quick Mr. Chairman.

15 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay. Yes, sir.

16 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Mr. Chairman, you know, when we
17 look at this budget, we as the people have a right to
18 know about are any lawsuits opinion against the city, are
19 they coming out of this budget as well? In addition, we'd
20 like to know is Detroit Police Department what dollars
21 have they spent with the 1122 program? And is it coming
22 out of this budget or in previous budgets. And so the
23 1122 program is a program where they can buy new
24 equipment from the Pentagon through the Department of
25 Defense. Can you answer that while we are in this

1 meeting? If not then Mr. Chairman, what is the point of
2 having this conversation?

3 MR. NAZARKO: Mr. Chairman, if I may?

4 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Go ahead, Mr. CFO.

5 MR. NAZARKO: Thank you. Through the Chair. Let me
6 answer the first one. The lawsuits are not part of the
7 budget numbers that I showed to the Board tonight. This
8 is general fund for DPD related expenditures, operational
9 and personnel. Now, the lawsuits are budgeted and as the
10 Honorable Chairman mentioned earlier are budgeted at the
11 legal department. So in the legal department and are not
12 part of this numbers. And I do not have the information
13 as Mr. Chair said he, or we have to go through the legal
14 department to ask those questions as to what has been
15 spent on lawsuits for the Police Department. So this
16 budget, those numbers I presented you tonight, I can tell
17 you a hundred percent certainty did not have any dollars
18 that pertained to legal settlements.

19 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Thank you.

20 MR. NAZARKO: Question, number two.

21 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes. Go ahead, sir.

22 MR. NAZARKO: Question number two. If there are any
23 dollars allocated in the budget, I'm not familiar with
24 the 1122 program, but you explained the Honorable
25 Commissioner that this is dollars that we use, or DPD

1 could utilize potentially to buy equipment from DOD, and
2 I can tell you with a hundred percent certainty that in
3 the budget that I explained, or in the 2022 year budget,
4 there are no such dollars allocated to buy any equipment.
5 Again, in the budget numbers that I present, if they are
6 from some other funds that I don't know, but I have no
7 knowledge or I have no dollars allocated in the budget I
8 presented to you that are earmarked to buy equipment from
9 DOD.

10 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you. You've been very,
11 you've been very - Commissioner Burton, is that okay now,
12 do you feel better?

13 COMMISSIONER BURTON: You know, I will have a follow
14 up question at a later time, but you know, if not with
15 his budget what budget

16 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I got it, I got it

17 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Do we have that they can
18 actually get, they can call up the 1122 program. I know
19 that they have gone through the 1033 program with the
20 Department of Defense where they can get military hand me
21 downs from the DOJ. But there happens to be another
22 program, which is 1122. And I am concerned I will have
23 questions but I'll put them in writing as well.

24 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: What I'd like to do, two things
25 Commissioners and to you in particular Commissioner

1 Burton, and that is the city department, law department
2 will get a presentation to them in regard to the lawsuits
3 and where the money. And so the accountability with the
4 law department in terms of the lawsuits. Again,
5 everything else that we have given you basically is been
6 the first and second a presentation. This is the third
7 one. And if there's anything left that's undone, just put
8 it in writing and we'll try to get it to you. But right
9 now I'm just saying to you that the programs you're
10 talking about, the federal programs and, and those kind
11 of things, I'm just saying to you, I'll try to find who
12 you can talk to or who you would like for us to bring in,
13 to give those kinds of questions that you seem to be very
14 concerned about.

15 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: And that's no problem with that.
16 I will do everything I can to make sure that everything
17 is made clear for each and every one of you. But please
18 understand that again, all I'm trying to do, and what
19 we're trying to do from the staff here is try to make
20 sure you have these kinds of things at your disposal so
21 that we do every year, and every administration does
22 this, make sure you have all this information. If you
23 have anything you want that you feel is undone, just let
24 me know, especially to you Commissioners Burton and
25 Bernard, because you have a little bit more knowledge

1 about these things than I do. And I want to make sure
2 that I really make sure that we have the connection
3 between you and the people that's responsible for it.

4 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: If that's okay, I'd like to move
5 on if you don't mind. All hearts and minds are clear.
6 Okay. At this time. Thank you so much. Mr. CFO. I want
7 you to give your name again, because I just want you to
8 know, I appreciate you so much.

9 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Mr. Narzako.

10 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you, Mr. Brown. So thank
11 you so much. Thank you, sir. I you round me a whole lot,
12 Mr. Brown, so you can help me with my language and
13 everything. This particular time. I'd like to go now to
14 this risk management. This is a new piece that Chief
15 White has put into place. I want you to know what this
16 really is all about. We'll take a few minutes for it
17 because I know we have to get the public comment and we
18 have to get to the closed session, but I really felt like
19 it's important that Mr. Graveline would come in and give
20 you an overview of what it is they trying to get
21 accomplished with this risk management piece with the
22 Police Department. Thank you so much, Mr. Graveline.

23 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Graveline, Graveline, Pastor.
24 We're going to help you, Graveline.

25 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Chris.

1 DIRECTOR GRAVELINE: Thank you. Through the Chair. If
2 I could have the presentation brought up,

3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Bring it up right now.

4 DIRECTOR GRAVELINE: Thank you. So we'll go to the
5 second slide here, if that's all right. So I want to give
6 a little bit of background on DPD's risk management
7 system. We've been doing digital risk management for a
8 while now since 2004, 2008. In 2008, we went out and
9 purchased the management awareness system or mass. And so
10 the MAS system is a database that tries to identify high
11 risk behaviors, so we can mitigate when we see our
12 officers are engaging in patterns or problematic
13 behavior. And so now through the years that we've used
14 it, we've identified a few shortcomings to that. And as
15 you can see on the slide, I'm not going to read
16 everything on the slide about what some of those
17 shortcomings have been, but we're trying to mitigate the
18 shortcomings that are in the MAS program. So if we go
19 ahead to the next slide.

20 DIRECTOR GRAVELINE: So what we're trying to
21 accomplish here is, for a long time, DPD has had a very,
22 just kind of static disciplinary process. You have an
23 allegation of misconduct that's followed by an
24 investigation. Adjudication of that sustained misconduct
25 from the investigation that is then appealed to a chief

1 officer, and then the penalty is imposed. But what we've
2 noticed is we're missing some elements that we think can
3 really help in identifying problematic behavior and maybe
4 curing that behavior before it becomes very problematic.
5 Next slide. So one of the things that we've noticed and
6 was brought to our attention through some of our MAS
7 profiles, there was a number of foyer requests that were
8 recently given for some of our officers MAS profiles. And
9 one in particular, we saw an officer who was identified
10 with 85 citizen complaints containing a total of 259
11 allegations.

12 DIRECTOR GRAVELINE: Now, one of the reason that
13 this officer has been able to accumulate that many
14 citizen complaints, many of them, and you'll see this in
15 some of the next slides were found to be not sustained,
16 there were no charges. And so if we can go to the next
17 slide. This officer's particular breakdown. And as you
18 can see on left, we have the types of allegations and the
19 most allegations were for procedure, followed by service,
20 and then by demeanor. But as you can also see from the
21 pie on the right, many of them resulted, or the majority
22 of them resulted in not sustained or no charge. And the
23 deficiency that we found was so when OCI gets notified of
24 a citizen complaint, or the department gets notified of
25 potential officer misconduct that investigation looks at

1 just that incident. And so a citizen could come forward
2 and say, this officer, you know, called me this name.

3 DIRECTOR GRAVELINE: And so, prior to the body-worn
4 camera, many times what we were finding out was that
5 citizen comes and says, this is the demeanor the officer
6 had. And our officer would come in and say, no, that
7 wasn't, what would that result in not sustain or no
8 charge? There was really no way to determine what was
9 going on because there was not any, a real way, just kind
10 of take a step back and take a look at the forest through
11 the tree type of thing. So if we can go to the next
12 slide. When it was brought to our attention, this person
13 has 85 citizen complaints. What we did was like, okay,
14 let's take a look at how does that person compare with
15 other officers on the department? And so we took a look
16 at, first of all, we want to take a look at the
17 comparison of apples to apples, officers who are assigned
18 to special operations.

19 DIRECTOR GRAVELINE: That's what this person was
20 assigned to in special operations. So the bar on the
21 second to the right, that's the officer's profile who had
22 85 citizen complaints, and this is how he compares with
23 other special operations officers between 2016 and 2018.
24 And as you can see, he really is kind of an outlier. Yes,
25 there are about five or six other officers with high

1 totals, but he far surpasses all of those totals. So the
2 question for the department is how can we do a better job
3 of identifying those four or five bars on the right-hand
4 side of the graph and do intervention right there? We can
5 go to the next slide.

6 DIRECTOR GRAVELINE: And this is the citizens'
7 complaints and peers' evaluations over that same three-
8 year, time period. And so why we thought it was important
9 was you can see who has the most innocent complaints, but
10 also who has the most peer interventions by the
11 department. And as you can see this particular officer,
12 once again has a profile that out distances everyone
13 else. And so we know that he was identified and there
14 were peer interventions, but there must have been
15 something wrong that we're not addressing within our
16 process. Next slide. And then finally, we took one last
17 comparison of this particular officer with all of the
18 officers who were in his same peer group, who basically
19 came in the department between September of 2007 and July
20 of 2008. And yet again, our officer far out distances
21 everyone with the same seniority rate. So what Chief
22 White has really been thinking about is how can we change
23 our process to identify those individuals that have these
24 types of profiles?

1 DIRECTOR GRAVELINE: And so if we can go to the next
2 slide. We're going to take a couple different approach
3 with our strategy. First, Chief is going to Institute a
4 risk management unit, and that's going to be headed up by
5 a Lieutenant whose entire job is to take a look at those
6 MAS profiles, to take a look at some of this qualitative
7 data analysis and try to identify who are those officers
8 who might not have sustained misconduct, but are going
9 down the wrong path in terms of problematic behavior.
10 That risk management unit is going to report to directly
11 to the Office of the Chief of Police. We're also going to
12 invest in new technology. We're making an additional
13 investment within our MAS system to help us do better
14 data analysis. In addition to the risk manager, Chief is
15 looking to bring on two other civilian employees. One is
16 a civilian risk manager, and this is to help diversify
17 the sworn civilian makeup, maybe bring a new set of eyes,
18 a new way of looking at things as well as a director of
19 diversity, equity and inclusion who'll be working side by
20 side with the risk management system, as well as
21 professional standards and identifying officers who are
22 having difficulty meeting and coming up to standard with
23 multiple citizen complaints. I'd like to also go to the
24 next slide here. We're going to insert a couple of
25 different steps into our disciplinary process. So at the

1 beginning of the presentation, I mentioned for the last
2 several decades, we've been using the same process,
3 allegation investigation, adjudication appeal. What Chief
4 White's interested in doing is after the investigation,
5 why, why are we waiting so long? We need to do a risk
6 assessment of this officer, what's going on. What can we
7 do to maybe take some steps? And that could include
8 reassignment that could include additional training,
9 mentoring, talent, blink, corrective measures. So we're
10 going to do our risk assessment at the time of
11 adjudication. And by the time Chief's appeal hearing
12 happens, we're also going to be doing a risk management
13 review and plan to help that employee, that officer
14 corrects the behavior and hopefully provide better
15 service to the citizens of Detroit. That's our plan.
16 We're going to be implementing it. Well, we've already
17 started to implement it. But the Lieutenant taking over
18 risk management, I believe it will be starting, if not
19 next week, the week after, and we're going to
20 aggressively begin to address a new risk management plan
21 within DPD.

22 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much, Mr.
23 Graveline. There are questions. Chief, I know you're in
24 office now. Chief White, where are you? I thought I felt
25 you. There you are, I know I felt you. How are you?

1 CHIEF WHITE: Good afternoon, Honorable Board. I'm
2 here.

3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Mr. Chris has done an excellent
4 job in terms of presenting this. I'm going to have the
5 Board members asked the questions, but Chief, take a
6 couple of minutes, no more than three minutes. What did
7 you really have in mind in implementing this? And then it
8 seemed to me, Chief also that the accountability should
9 start with the people who are close to the officer.
10 Please forgive me, I don't know all the ranks and all
11 this, I'm just a preacher, but like, whoever's closest to
12 the officer, there ought to be some accountability there
13 that you know, the guy that's coming drunk, you know he's
14 coming with all kinds of issues. So sometimes I'm the
15 last person to know but my members know. So can you help?
16 Just take three minutes. I want to let the Commissioners
17 ask the real questions, but if you could do that for me,
18 I would appreciate it.

19 CHIEF WHITE: Yes, sir. Through the Chair, can you
20 hear me okay with the mask? I'm in a meeting and I want
21 to make sure that we practice safety. So certainly I want
22 to just set the canvas with, overwhelmingly you know,
23 this situation is managed effectively. We've got good
24 supervision and we've got good officers, but certainly,
25 if we were only talking about good officers, we wouldn't

1 be having this situation or this conversation. There have
2 been some that have fallen through the cracks with
3 regards to our pattern and practice of behavior that
4 we've recognized through this process. So to answer your
5 question, certainly first-line supervision is the first
6 step, and it's an incredible responsibility as a
7 supervisor. Frontline supervisors and detectives play a
8 vital role, not only mentoring and guiding behavior but
9 their behavior is copied and emulated by younger
10 officers. So when we looked at this process, you know,
11 again, overwhelmingly we get it right, but there were
12 instances, and in this business, you know, one instance
13 can erode the confidence of a policing agency in this
14 community.

15 CHIEF WHITE: So we wanted to make sure that we
16 overcorrect it and fixed it, and in doing so, we looked
17 at the pattern and practice of conduct. Now, a number of
18 these cases. And I apologize, I was in another meeting,
19 so I haven't reviewed the slides and talked to Director
20 Graveline about this. But one of the things that we saw
21 in this process is many of these cases were adjudicated
22 properly. Some of them were outside of the contractual
23 guidelines for adjudication, so timeliness issues, beyond
24 two years. So that's a failure on the part of management
25 to adjudicate these cases timely. So they met our

1 process, but then we saw in some of these cases that even
2 though there were no factors to validate or prove beyond
3 a reasonable doubt, not beyond a reasonable doubt, the
4 burden is more likely than not, or for the administrative
5 process that what was alleged happened, we still should
6 have, and could have looked at the pattern of conduct
7 that was consistent. Without going into detail on
8 individuals there was one case, in particular, we looked
9 at, and so the Commission is aware. We're looking at a
10 number of cases, not just this one, where the conduct was
11 repeated over and over again, whether it was a phrase,
12 whether it was an action. So even though we couldn't
13 prove that the conduct happened, a risk manager could
14 have looked at it and said, okay, well, here are two
15 people who've never met each other at two different
16 points in time that are making a complaint about the
17 exact phraseology that an officer used in a complaint.
18 What is the likelihood of that happening, right? How
19 could this possibly happen? And so that consistency and
20 pattern and practice of bad acts should have been
21 bridged, and we should have done a number of things. And
22 this is what this process is going to do. A. You know,
23 the idea is not to fire all a bunch of police officers.
24 That's not the case, unless the action itself violates
25 the department's policy, it erodes the credibility of the

1 agency. But what if it's just a training issue, right?
2 What if it's just a situation where the service delivery
3 metrics were not met? Well, then they go into a training
4 mode or corrective action mode. But to your point, I know
5 you gave me three minutes, but to your point Chairperson,
6 there's also an opportunity for mentoring coaching,
7 because you are the first-line supervisor. So this is
8 what we're hoping to accomplish. You know, I've said it
9 over and over again, wearing this badge is a privilege,
10 is not a right. And if you don't do, what's required to
11 have this privilege, then it's our responsibility to
12 ensure that you do something else. And I'm serious about
13 that. You know, we're not playing around with that. Our
14 citizens deserve excellence in policing overwhelmingly,
15 we provide excellence in policing, but these outliers
16 will be dealt with aggressively and professionally, but
17 we will not tolerate what we found in some of these
18 cases. So with that, I'll take any questions.

19 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much,
20 Commissioners, I don't see any hands up.

21 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I have mine up.

22 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay. Then let me, let me start
23 with Commissioner Bell if you don't mind. And then we
24 have the whole police department here with the Chief, so
25 whoever we need to ask a question to, they're all here.

1 So, Mr. Graveline, we are appreciative of your
2 presentation and Deputy Chief Wilson, we appreciate you
3 pitching in for the Chief. Commissioner Bell.

4 COMMISSIONER BELL: Mr. Chairman, I think we mislead
5 the public, first of all. When we read about the charter
6 mandate that we are the final authority and disciplinary.
7 We are not the final authority, and we should make a
8 disclaimer to that. My point is this, in oversight
9 NACOLES is one of the areas of discipline, is one of the
10 key concerns throughout this country, and DPD is no
11 different. I think we need to pose the question with the
12 mayor, where do we go with collective bargaining in
13 reference to this matter. That's the key because
14 officers, we only suspend on the grievous situation,
15 violation or arrest, et cetera, et cetera, but these add
16 up. Most companies have a risk assessment that you can
17 get fired, or you can be suspended in due process. So
18 those are the core areas. I think we need to look at
19 where we are going with it. And also what impacts the
20 lawsuits in reference to misconduct. That's something
21 that is well hidden over the years, we don't talk about,
22 I'm glad it came up, but we don't get into the nuts and
23 bolts. Counsel has been the area where they sell these
24 cases. And most instances with or without our knowledge,
25 I assume the department has knowledge, but this is a gray

1 area throughout the country, in terms of the lack of
2 discipline in the police department versus working with
3 General Motors, Chryslers, and other companies in
4 America. Thank you.

5 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you, Mr. Bell.
6 Commissioner Bernard.

7 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Just real quickly Chief. First
8 of all, I think, you know, having a risk manager and
9 setting up this process is a very good idea. You are a
10 corporate entity, so to speak. You are the CEO of that
11 entity and all good companies have a risk management
12 division. What I want to know, you don't have to tell me
13 now, is, you know how you're going to budget these two
14 positions or are you simply going to use some people in-
15 house who may be, have various roles, and just reassign
16 them to this. And I might suggest that to you in part
17 because one of the things that Chief Craig did shortly
18 before he left was added 13 people to the personnel
19 department in order to deal with the new computer HR
20 system that you have, which I thought was totally
21 excessive, but that's a separate issue. But in any event,
22 you have a lot of people and perhaps, you know, sort of a
23 deep dive within the organization might save the
24 department some money, ultimately rather than adding, you
25 know, a couple of hundred thousand dollars and new

1 salaries, benefits, et cetera, for people to deal with
2 risk management issues. It's just a thought, that's all I
3 was going to suggest.

4 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Chief, briefly.

5 CHIEF WHITE: Through the Chair. My response to that
6 is that it's going to be a combination of both. I would
7 like to bring in an outside professional to support in-
8 house staff, and it's also going to be a restructuring of
9 sorts within management to accommodate what we're trying
10 to do with the oversight. Because again, the key here is
11 oversight and making sure that we have a review process
12 for these cases when they come up.

13 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Brown.

14 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: And report back to the Board
15 on it, please. Thank you.

16 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Brown.

17 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Thank you, Mr. Chairman, Chief,
18 and Director Graveline, thank you for bringing this to us
19 and put it together. I would only ask if I can get a copy
20 of your presentation just so I can read through it. I
21 think it's an excellent direction that the department is
22 taking and going and trying to address and police its own
23 self and its matters. And just, I mean, just the words
24 that resonated in my head that yesterday's keys don't
25 work in today's locks. And that seemed like that's where

1 you're moving that to address today's locks. And I really
2 appreciate the work you put into all of this. And I would
3 just like to have a copy of this, so I could just really
4 read through it. Any questions I have after that, I'll
5 follow up with you personally.

6 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you, Commissioner Brown.
7 Any other questions. I don't see any other...
8 Commissioner Holt.

9 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Thank you, Chair Holley. Again,
10 thank you, Chief White and Director Graveline for this
11 initiative, because I can think of when I first became a
12 Commissioner in 2019 and looking at the employment
13 records of some of the law enforcement members who were
14 being recommended for promotions on the like, I was
15 really confused by the guidelines that were being used to
16 allow these members to move up the administrative scale.
17 So this initiative again helps, I believe too, the Board
18 of Police Commissioners as we go about insisting on
19 conducting civilian oversight. And obviously, that plays
20 into how we move when certain law enforcement members are
21 being recommended for promotions. Again, thank you, Chief
22 White and Director Graveline.

23 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Burch, you have
24 your hand up? Commissioner Burch. You muted. I can't hear
25 you.

1 COMMISSIONER BURCH: I'm sorry. Can you hear me now?

2 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I sure can.

3 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Okay. Now my comments already to
4 Mr. Graveline and to Chief White. Thank you for
5 listening. I shared also with DC Wilson, my concern as a
6 citizen, not as a commissioner. What's going on in the
7 Eleventh Precinct is that there seems to be no move or
8 change to make it better. They are constant complaints,
9 sir. I just need you to share with me, why is it there's
10 no move into making things better and more accountability
11 out of Number Eleven when Number Nine changes commanders
12 every other week. Please share what's going on with
13 Eleven. Okay, Reverend Holley, that's it.

14 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: No, I'm just saying to you,
15 we're on another subject matter, but we'll make sure we
16 get to this next week, if you don't mind, he'll be here
17 and answer that. But right now we're talking about the
18 risk management, Commissioner

19 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Excuse me. Wait a minute. That
20 is risk management. That's the same thing I was speaking
21 to about Mr. Graveline's comments, maybe it needs to be
22 more outside. Is like if they are friends of a certain
23 officer, they let it go by. And that's what I'm saying.
24 So you have to have maybe outside help, Mr. Graveline?

1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I miss I misunderstood. I'm
2 sorry.

3 COMMISSIONER BURCH: That's okay, but I was sharing
4 that with Mr. Graveline and with Chief White.

5 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: He nodded his head to tell me he
6 heard you very well. Commissioner Hernandez.

7 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Thank you. Through the
8 Chair, Chief White. I certainly appreciate and applaud
9 the intentional work on this. I think it's long overdue
10 and Commissioner Brown articulated better than I possibly
11 could. And just given my background in DEI over the
12 years, if appropriate, I'd be more than willing to offer
13 a helping hand in this space as well, to identify a
14 civilian.

15 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much, Commissioner
16 and Chief White, you heard Commissioner Burch. And so I
17 wanted to give you the opportunity as we leave you now
18 and go into something else to respond to Commissioner
19 Burch as we leave.

20 CHIEF WHITE: Through the Chair. Thank you once
21 again. So as part of this process, we'll be evaluating
22 command response. I think you know; the command officers
23 bear some responsibility in ensuring that our personnel
24 is fit for duty in terms of training and their response
25 to the community. And that's something that we intend to

1 monitor. So as it relates to Number Eleven specifically
2 that command as well as all the other commands are part
3 of that process. We'll be implementing a 360 evaluation,
4 which is not only an evaluation from me to the command
5 officers but their peers and how they're received by
6 their peers as part of this process, as we look at risk
7 management and employee improvement. The last thing I
8 will say about that, this overall process is we're going
9 to be making some modernization to the job descriptions
10 in the department to include equity and inclusion work
11 and to include an evaluation and how we prepare for the
12 promotional examination and included in that will be the
13 ranks of detective Sergeant and Lieutenant.

14 CHIEF WHITE: And for example, members who may be
15 Giglio impaired or Brady impaired or otherwise behave in
16 manners that, you know, do not support leadership. There
17 will be an evaluation process, and that will be part of
18 how we go forward without promotional examinations
19 because once a person is promoted and they make the list,
20 there is little we can do because of collective
21 bargaining to impact who's going to be promoted. So
22 that's why some of these promotions have happened. I
23 think that the work begins at who's eligible to take the
24 test, and if there's a problem with an employee's
25 performance, then how could you argue that that employee

1 would be a good representative in supervision that's
2 training up our officers. So that's the kind of work
3 we're going to be doing. We're going to be respectful of
4 the collective bargaining agreement, but the work begins
5 at establishing who can take the test, not who can be
6 promoted.

7 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much Chief. We look
8 forward to these new updates about risk management, Chief
9 and more accountability and transparency and supervision,
10 accountability. I want to thank you so much. And thank
11 you, Mr. Chris, thank you so much and DC Wilson as well.
12 Thank you so much.

13 CHIEF WHITE: Thank you.

14 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: At this particular time, I want
15 to go now to the Interim Secretary and her updates as we
16 work our way. I want you to know, we have a closed
17 session. We have three items. I like to go after Ms.
18 White's updates, I'd really like to go into public
19 comment if you don't mind, so people have an opportunity
20 and then go into unfinished business, and all the other,
21 working our way to the closed session. Just help me with
22 this and be patient with me and just know I'm trying to
23 get to the end of the day at some point. I'm not rushing,
24 I just want you to know, I just want to try to get to it.
25 So at this time, Ms. White.

1 MRS. WHITE: Yes, sir. Through the Chair, Honorable
2 Board, please refer to the agenda and also attendees,
3 please see the agenda for the incoming correspondence for
4 this week. The Board received the weekly DPD facial
5 recognition technology report. Also the correspondence
6 from Chief of Police, James E. White regarding the change
7 of duty status to administrative leave without pay, but
8 with medical benefits for Sergeant Derek Loranger, Badge
9 S-166, assigned to the Detroit Detention Center. Also,
10 the Board received the disciplinary administration report
11 regarding the adjudicated disciplinary cases for August
12 2021. The correspondence from Ms. Coralee Trustle
13 regarding the applicant appeal, as one as the
14 correspondence from Mr. Tariq Jackson regarding the
15 applicant appeal also came into the Board's Office and
16 the Honorable Board received various staff reports for
17 your consideration this weekend. That concludes my report
18 for this week. Thank you.

19 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much, Ms. White.
20 Commissioner Burton, do you have any unfinished business?
21 Commissioner Burton?

22 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Yes, for unfinished business,
23 Mr. Chairman, I'd like to move that due to the fact that
24 we are on virtual meetings and we are still in a
25 pandemic, I move that we extend public comments from two

1 minutes of three minutes. So we can hear from our
2 constituents that may have concerns, but also may have
3 some disability challenges as well as a divide in
4 internet access. So I can raise public comments from two
5 minutes to three minutes, sir.

6 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Burton, I have no
7 problem with you, if you insist, but I've been taking
8 notes for the last six weeks, 40% of the people that are
9 doing public comment don't use all the two minutes. I've
10 been watching this. I can give you the statistics. So I
11 just want you to know, I think two minutes is really
12 enough, but if you - go ahead,

13 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Mr. Chairman, I mean, you know,
14 someone may need the full three minutes. Someone may not
15 need the full three minutes. I mean, there are times that
16 people chime into these meetings, they may not use the
17 full two minutes, but the motion has been put out there.
18 And I believe it was seconded by one of the
19 Commissioners.

20 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I don't think so. Commissioners
21 have anybody second it. I didn't hear it, I'm sorry. That
22 means Commissioner Davis?

23 COMMISSIONER BROWN: What was the motion? Can you
24 repeat it?

1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: The motion is, he wants to move
2 the comments from two minutes to three minutes and
3 Commissioner Davis has second it. And at this particular
4 time, do you want the roll call or do you want me to,
5 just to see the ayes

6 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Record roll call vote, Mr.
7 Chairman, once again for discussion. Call for discussion,
8 Mr. Chairman.

9 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I won't have any discussion,
10 it's just as simple Mr. Commissioner, it's simple,
11 whether we want the three minutes or want two minutes.
12 We've been talking about this for five years now, so
13 let's just see what we're going to do. So at this
14 particular time, Ms. White, can you give us a roll call
15 and let us know whether we... Yes means you want three
16 minutes. No means you don't want three minutes. Okay.

17 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Call for discussion, Mr.
18 Chairman.

19 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I'm not having a discussion.
20 Okay, let me, batch this up. Who has parliamentary know-
21 how in terms of whether or not I have to have a
22 discussion on something that is simple as this? Mr. Bell?

23 COMMISSIONER BURCH: I think it has been brought to
24 the table before?

25 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I know it has, but he wants

1 COMMISSIONER BELL: Chair Holley, the motion always
2 requires discussion. You can make it brief but it always
3 requires discussion.

4 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay. Thank you very much. Thank
5 you so much for your help, Mr. Bell, Chairman Bell.

6 COMMISSIONER BELL: The speaker of the motion has the
7 opportunity to speak first.

8 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay. The speaker of the motion
9 has the opportunity to speak first.

10 COMMISSIONER BELL: Make up the motion.

11 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay. Go ahead, Commissioner
12 Burton, you have the right. I give you two minutes to
13 make your case.

14 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Mr. Chairman, we have a large
15 population of residents that has a divide in internet
16 access. But we also have a growing disability you know,
17 the disabled community. We are also in a pandemic. And so
18 to make things easier I moved that we raised public
19 comments for our speaking time per speaker from two
20 minutes to three minutes. Although we know everyone is
21 probably not going to use the three minutes, it gives
22 them opportunities for us to hear them out and hear their
23 concerns because as public officials, we want to hear
24 from our constituents. They are the ones that elected us.

1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay. Very good. Any other
2 discussion?

3 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Yes. May I discuss this just a
4 little bit?

5 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: You've one second.

6 COMMISSIONER BURCH: All I need is one second. I feel
7 that now that we have our own private space in each
8 Precinct, we can meet our people there by your
9 appointment. Each commissioner can meet the people and
10 share everything they want to say because you now have
11 private space in your Precinct Commissioner Burton. I
12 love you to death. Think about that.

13 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Anyone else has a comment.

14 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Yes, I do. Through the Chair.

15 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes, sir.

16 VICE-CHAIR JONES: One of the things that we've
17 identified based on your report and people not taking all
18 of the time that they have to make their comments,
19 coupled with the fact that the Commissioner had mentioned
20 that people have limited internet access or disabilities
21 or other problems being able to communicate for certain
22 meanings. Therefore, I would suggest that giving
23 additional time, if they can't get on, to begin with, is
24 that something that would be beneficial to them or
25 beneficial to the Board, especially holding the meeting

1 over for an additional time, because we are allowing you
2 to additional time for other people to speak. Based upon
3 what he was saying about those people that are being
4 ruled out of this ability, to be able to speak and give
5 full comments. I don't see any need to turn around and
6 extend the time if they can't get on and they can't be a
7 part of the discussion at any rate. That's all I have to
8 say. Thank you.

9 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you. At this time, the
10 Chair would like a move to have a roll call vote.

11 MRS. WHITE: Commissioner Brown = Yes.

12 MRS. WHITE: Commissioner Bernard = No.

13 MRS. WHITE: Commissioner Burch = No, ma'am.

14 MRS. WHITE: Commissioner Bell = No.

15 MRS. WHITE: Commissioner Burton = Yes.

16 MRS. WHITE: Commissioner Carter = No.

17 MRS. WHITE: Commissioner Davis = Yes.

18 MRS. WHITE: Commissioner Hernandez = No.

19 MRS. WHITE: Commissioner Holt = No.

20 MRS. WHITE: Vice-Chairperson Jones. No.

21 MRS. WHITE: Mr. Chair = No.

22 MRS. WHITE: Mr. Chair, there were 3 = Yes votes and
23 8 = No votes.

24 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Mr. Chairman, I like to make my
25 last motion for today.

1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: You have a right to do that Mr.
2 Burton, but it's just that you know what we're trying to
3 do today. Go ahead and make your motion. Go ahead, sir.

4 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Mr. Chairman, I speak on the
5 behalf of a hundred thousand people in the Fifth
6 District, but also the majority of the Detroiters that
7 feel that they are shut out of public meetings. So I like
8 to move that were raised public comments from two minutes
9 to two and a half minutes. Mr. Chairman, do I have a
10 second on the floor.

11 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I just want to move this out of
12 order. I really do. I think that ---

13 COMMISSIONER BURTON: That's only an additional 30
14 seconds, Mr. Chairman.

15 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I know, but I'm just saying to
16 you ---

17 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Not even a full minute,

18 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I know, but I'm just saying to
19 you, I'm just ruling it out of order because I think
20 basically we're going over and rehashing the same French
21 fries and they are getting hard.

22 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I think Commissioner Davis
23 second that motion, Mr. Chair.

24

25

1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: No, he's not going to do it.

2 He's not going to do it this time. Right, Mr. Davis?

3 Commissioner Davis?

4 COMMISSIONER BURCH: The Chair has spoken.

5 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Mr. Davis.

6 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: I didn't say anything, sir.

7 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Very good. All of the motions
8 have failed for lack of support. At this time, Mr. Brown.

9 MR. ROB BROWN: Yes. Good afternoon, Mr. Chair and
10 this Honorable Board. We currently have five speakers or
11 do you want me to go into announcements first?

12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I want you to go into
13 announcements first, and then to the speakers.

14 MR. ROB BROWN: Okay. Announcement. The next BOPC
15 virtual meetings are September 23rd, 2021 at 3:00 PM and
16 September 30, 2021, at 3 PM, and Mr. Chair, the Detroit
17 Public Safety Foundation has an event which is called the
18 5k run and walk. It's a live race and you can call the
19 Detroit Public Safety. That's going to be October 9th,
20 2021. And you can call the Foundation for more
21 information to sign up for this event. And now Mr. Chair,
22 going into our public comments. We currently have five
23 speakers. I'll call them by threes. The first three
24 speakers will be Community Advisory Councils, Scotty

1 Bowman, followed by Ms. Bernie Smith, and followed by the
2 caller with the last three numbers, 669. Mr. Bowman.

3 MR. BOWMAN: Can you hear me, yet?

4 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes, we can.

5 MR. BOWMAN: Just to address something that I think
6 it was Mr. Jones who made a remark, Commissioner. Jones
7 made a remark about. You know, the fact that people
8 aren't being able to get on. I believe Commissioner
9 Burton was referring to people who take too long to get
10 on because of their disability. And so, therefore, aren't
11 able to get the same amount of speaking time. Also. I
12 think some people don't use their time, because it's kind
13 of hard to start a point if you can't finish it, but I'm
14 going to do that today because I don't want to give an
15 argument to keeping short speaking times. And so I think
16 we should all use up the entire two minutes, so maybe we
17 can get three next time. There are certain matters that
18 really need to be addressed badly. I would, first of all,
19 say the OCI needs to really get, I didn't even hear from
20 Mr. Akbar today. I want to find out what's going on with
21 people being members of the community, trying to file
22 complaints with the chief investigator. And remember,
23 this is supposed to be a place where people can go as an
24 alternative to making a complaint to the police directly
25 about a police officer. Why is it that people now have to

1 get approval from somebody on the Board of Police
2 Commissioners to do that?

3 MR. BOWMAN: And I'm really interested in knowing who
4 it is that's playing gatekeeper with people's complaints
5 before they even get investigated. That doesn't make any
6 sense, filtering a complaint based on an investigation,
7 then on their story, you can rule that you know, it's not
8 sustained. And then the whole budget transparency thing.
9 Oh my God. There always seems like there is one more
10 thing buried. Now, whether or not the money comes out of
11 the general fund or the law department got money from the
12 city council. And we know the city council, controls the
13 purse strings. The lawsuits pertaining to damages claimed
14 by people who believed that they were improperly treated
15 by police businesses and should be considered as part of
16 the budget discussion because it does cost us all and I'm
17 not going to yield. I'm going to keep talking because I
18 have two seconds left and I'm going to use every last
19 one.

20 MR. ROB BROWN: Chair, your next speaker will be Miss
21 Bernie Smith.

22 MS. SMITH: Good afternoon, Commissioners. I knew it
23 couldn't last Holley, keep on praying baby because it's
24 going to be all right. You got the devil still working in
25 the Commission meetings. But anyway, I got some good news

1 for you. Yours truly became a great-grandmother again
2 this morning. And I got a big bouncing baby boy and he's
3 just beautiful. So God's good. He has let me live this
4 long to see another grandbaby come into my family. We got
5 five now. Now, some more good news. I was down in
6 Greektown this past weekend like I normally do, and I
7 just want to let all of, you know, kudos to our police
8 department, especially those that are on duty down there.
9 There were more police down there, I can just about
10 count. We had them two at each corner, they were at
11 Monroe. They were at... Oh, it was just beautiful to see
12 them working down there.

13 MS. SMITH: So I just want the commission to know we
14 have some good police in our midst. And I want you to
15 give them kudos whenever you see them tell them, thank
16 you, thank you, thank you. And believe me, they deserve
17 every bit of it. There was no confusion whatsoever. And
18 this has been going on for the last three weeks that I've
19 been going down there since that incident about the cadet
20 getting drunk, nothing has happened since then and the
21 noise they have stopped the noise. It's not so loud like
22 it normally is. So, I love my police department. I don't
23 know about you guys, but you need to go down there
24 sometimes and sit and see what I see of Friday and
25 Saturdays. You take care and let the devil stay out of

1 our meetings because I'm sick of coming, not coming, but
2 I wish I could, but anyway, you take care. All of you and
3 be safe and wear your mask. Take care.

4 MR. ROB BROWN: Caller with the last three numbers
5 669.

6 669: Honorable body. Can you hear me?

7 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes, I can.

8 669: Okay. How are you doing Pastor? I'm a gentleman
9 that used to go to the Northern J-Hawk for Christ. I ran
10 the Christian Club Cunningham. How are you doing?

11 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Just fine.

12 669: God bless you. And okay. So on Facebook, my
13 name is Cunningham Cunningham Cunningham on Facebook
14 Cunningham. Cunningham Cunningham on Facebook Cunningham
15 Cunningham Cunningham. So all my calls are recorded in
16 sessions like this. And then I upload them to a cloud,
17 which is called Google Drive. I communicated to 1(313)
18 316 2603, Commissioner Davis about an assault on me. The
19 gentleman sells drugs up there. It was on the project
20 like every single day. And the police department is a
21 laughing stock because they say, well, he was assaulted,
22 he put in the police report, but those guys up at the
23 transit center, every single day. This was recorded. Even
24 reporters asking to listen that Google Drive because it
25 confirms the information and it was emailed pictures and

1 everything. This gentleman's up there selling drugs every
2 single day. It is just ridiculous that nothing is being
3 done. So we're going to move on. Also, at the Precincts,
4 when I come the handicap parking is so far away. I walk
5 with a cane. I am disabled. I came by Woodward and 7-Mile
6 and I went in the wrong way and I apologize and I hope no
7 one thinks that's disrespectful. And I was pretty polite,
8 but first, they were rude to me and I asserted myself,
9 but I didn't cuss out anybody or get belligerent. But
10 anyway, they need handicapped parking very, very close to
11 the facility. Also, I was wondering if there can be a
12 whistleblower ordinance made. So if anybody at police,
13 you know, in corruption and they know that their
14 colleague is doing wrong. I mean, there should be some
15 money and finances to get them housing out of the State
16 for a while or something like that, get some more
17 protection for whistleblowers that really helps. Also,
18 they're cutting bus services, really bad, bad service
19 increases crime because people can't get money to get to
20 work. Bad buses equal crime, and there's a DDOT meeting
21 right after this freedom of.

22 MR. ROB BROWN: Mr. Chair, your next two speakers
23 will be Over with, followed by Mr. Minister, Eric Blunt.
24 Over with.

25

1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Can you call him again, Mr.
2 Brown?

3 MR, ROB BROWN: Over with?

4 OVER WITH: No, you don't have to call me again. The
5 name of every Board of Police Commissioners is on the
6 Detroit Board of Police Commissioners. The name is
7 Kenisha Coleman. You heard the name; I've been mentioning
8 it time and time again. Now I'm about to read you
9 something that's on Facebook. The DPD the OCI and the
10 BOPC are all corrupt. And this is becoming clearer and
11 clear to everyone in Detroit, the DPD Homicide Captain
12 Derek May, the OCI Intern, Chief Lawrence Akbar, and the
13 BOPC former chairman. Willie Bell has actively cooperated
14 in the scheme to not investigate complaints made to the
15 OCI by the mother of the murder victim, Kenisha Coleman
16 regarding her homicide, her murder, Captain, Derek, Derek
17 May's action in a murder investigation has not been
18 investigated by the OCI. Under the supervision of former
19 DPD Chief James E. Craig, Lieutenant Curtis Shell of the
20 Chief's staff.

21 OVER WITH: They both attempted or did attempt to
22 arrange a meeting between the deceased grieving mother
23 and members of the DPD and an OCI investigator. While
24 there was supposedly open investigation in the Homicide
25 Captain Derek Ma's inactions and actions regarding

1 Kenisha Coleman's murder. Clearly an obvious attempt to
2 obstruct, interfere, and a supposedly ongoing OCI
3 investigation. There is rampant corruption throughout the
4 leadership of the DPD the OCI and BOPC. Willie Bell
5 former Board of Police, chairman operated a whole one-
6 person towing committee that dealt with towing contracts
7 that is in direct contradiction of BOPC policies and
8 procedures. And the definition of the word committee
9 itself. Kenisha Coleman's murder is going to be
10 addressed. And I want all of you to know that. Holley,
11 you know you're wrong.

12 MR. ROB BROWN: Mr. Chair, your last speaker would be
13 Minister Eric Blunt. Minister Blunt.

14 MINISTER BLUNT: Can you hear me, Board?

15 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes, we can.

16 MINISTER BLUNT: Yes. On the timing of public
17 comments in today's meeting, the first 30 minutes were
18 spent for resolutions of police officer retirement. So
19 allowing more time for public comment should be an easy
20 lift. Today, I have six critical issues to comment on. On
21 the issue of risk management, nothing can correct police
22 misconduct better than eliminating qualified immunity. In
23 corporate America, your misconduct puts your pension,
24 your healthcare, and your salary at risk. Commissioner
25 Davis, rejection day of last week's minutes, echo my

1 demands for years, which is to stop the intentionally
2 false titles given to Commissioners, not elected. This
3 false narrative serves to deceive the public as to the
4 power that the mayor has over this board that serves the
5 protection of misconduct of police officers. The
6 chairperson's opening comments about the BOPC officers
7 having an office in the Precincts to be closer to the
8 people you work for and with. He really meant to say the
9 police officers and not the citizens. Just review the
10 most recent report out from OCI. It clearly shows that
11 the most common method citizens use to file a complaint
12 is by calling OCI, not coming into the Precinct or DPD
13 headquarters. It is intimidating the citizens to go to
14 the lion's den, to complain about the lion. It is just
15 basic human behavior.

16 MINISTER BLUNT: The question by Commissioner Davis
17 of the officer's arrest, he is not being Colombo. He is
18 just a good example of how a commissioner can serve the
19 citizens and participate in hiding critical issues that
20 the public needs to know about.

21 MR. ROB BROWN: Mr. Chair that was your last speaker.

22 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes, Mr. Blunt, my comment to my
23 fellow Commissioner was a compliment, not a disparaging
24 mark. I just told it has a compliment and maybe I'll
25 start refraining from doing that kind of comment. The

1 other thing I want to say to Mr. Bowman, that your
2 statement is untrue, in terms of somebody blocking these
3 requests of complaints. If you have any problems, please
4 call this number again. And I want you to understand it's
5 very important when you say things in public that I have
6 to make sure that the public understands what's true and
7 that is that the OIC does not in any kind of way block
8 anybody's complaints. So I'm just saying to you again,
9 596 2499, 596 2499. If you could just basically, or you
10 can call 596 1830, and that'll get closer to where I can
11 also just make sure you get your answers.

12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: You get the answer 596 1830. We
13 do everything we can for all of you to speak. And you
14 have a right to speak. You do that. I just want you to
15 know we are doing everything we can to make sure that we
16 have transparency here. All commissioners, we work very
17 hard to make sure that we, with the oversight, that you
18 may not particularly like everything that we say, which
19 we understand that, but also you have an opportunity to
20 run for these positions. So I'm just saying to you,
21 again, we'll do everything we can. When you say things to
22 us, we make notes of them, because we want to be
23 forthright and be really transparent, and more than
24 anything else, we want to make sure that we have trust
25 with the community and with each and every one of you.

1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I want you to understand, I
2 think for the most part that we all appreciate your
3 comments, whether it's critical, constructive, or non-
4 constructive, but the point is we appreciate your time
5 that you come and basically have these comments. I want
6 you to know from my time of being here for these three
7 years or so, everything we've been doing under each
8 administration, and doing everything we can to make sure
9 that we are oversight with the police department. So
10 again, I just thank you. At this particular time with
11 Commissioners, if there are no problems, I'd like to have
12 Commissioner Holt read the motion to go closed session.

13 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Thank you, Chairperson Holley,
14 for your words. I move that. We go into closed sessions
15 for the three following reasons, regarding administrative
16 leave without pay, but with medical benefits for police
17 officer Otis Funches, Badge 690, assigned to the Twelfth
18 Precinct. Director Christopher Graveline, Captain Lena
19 Liddell DPO, attorney Carrie Moore, Assistant
20 Corporation, Counsel Savage Whitley. Number two,
21 regarding administrative leave without pay, but with
22 medical benefits for Sergeant Derrick Loranger,

23 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Ms. Holt, the law department is
24 telling me that, just read the motion, not the details of
25 the motion.

1 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Thank you, sir. And thank you for
2 that clarification, talking too much. Going back to
3 number two. Regarding administratively without pay, but
4 with medical benefits.

5 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: No, ma'am, just the motion. Oh,
6 you're right. Go ahead. I'm sorry. I'm getting voices in
7 my head, go right ahead.

8 COMMISSIONER HOLT: I'm okay, sir. Going back to
9 number two. Regarding administrative leave without pay,
10 but with medical benefits for Sergeant Derek Loranger,
11 Badge S-166, assigned to the Detroit Detention Center.
12 Number three, closed section pursuant to section 8F of
13 the open meetings act MCL15.268F, senior investigator
14 position, to review and consider the contents of an
15 application for employment or appointment to the public
16 office. If the candidate requests that the application
17 remain confidential. A three two-third roll call vote is
18 required.

19 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: A second.

20 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Second.

21 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: It's been properly moved and
22 second. Any discussion. I want you to know we sent...
23 With Commissioner Davis. I'm sorry, go ahead, sir.

1 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: I was wondering as relate to the
2 HR positions, did any of the candidates ask for a closed
3 session?

4 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes, they did.

5 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Oh, okay. That's good.

6 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: And all of you have your links
7 for the closed session. Let me, before I have you to go
8 away. You have the links for the closed session. Okay.
9 All the favor, say, aye.

10 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

11 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I need a roll call, okay. Oh,
12 boy.

13 MRS. WHITE: Commissioner Brown = Yes.

14 MRS. WHITE: Commissioner Bernard = Yes.

15 MRS. WHITE: Commissioner Burch. Commissioner Birch =
16 Yes. I'm sorry.

17 MRS. WHITE: Commissioner Bell = Yes.

18 MRS. WHITE: Commissioner Burton

19 MRS. WHITE: Commissioner Carter = Yes.

20 MRS. WHITE: Commissioner Davis= Yes.

21 MRS. WHITE: Commissioner Hernandez

22 MRS. WHITE: Commissioner Holt = Yes.

23 MRS. WHITE: Vice-Chair Jones = Yes.

24 MRS. WHITE: Chair Holley = Yes.

25 MRS. WHITE: The motion pass.

1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you. We're going into so
2 closed session.


