BOPC VIRTUAL MEETING
August 26 2021 at 3:00 P.M.

1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Good afternoon. Jim Holly,
2 Chairperson of the Board of Police Commissioners, the
3 meeting will come to order. The invocation will be given
4 about Chaplain Hunt, Chaplain Hunt?

5 MRS.WHITE: Mr. Chair, Chaplain Assistant Chief Devay
6 Myatt will provide the invocation. We just received that
7 update.

8 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Very good. Thank you for being
9 here.

10 ASSISTANT CHAPLAIN MYATT: Thank you, sir. Good
11 afternoon to all.

12 COMMISSIONERS: Good afternoon.

13 ASSISTANT CHAPLAIN MYATT: Let's pray. Heavenly
14 Father, we thank you again for the opportunity to come
15 before you. We thank you for this Board and for this
16 community as we approach the days ahead of us. We thank
17 you for your strategy. We thank you for wisdom, but most
18 of all, we thank you for the spirit of unity. We ask your
19 blessings upon this Board, City of Detroit, our Chief of
20 Police, our mayor, governor. And so we ask these things
21 in Jesus' name, amen, and in God.

22 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much. Thank you for
23 being here and filling in. I appreciate it so much. At
24 this time, I ask Mr. Brown, would you give us the mission
25 statement?

1 MR. BROWN: Good afternoon, Mr. Chair, this Honorable
2 Board and citizens of Detroit. The reading or the Mission
3 Statement for the Board of Police Commission. The Board
4 of Police Commission, BOPC is a civilian agency that
5 exercises supervisor control and oversight of the Detroit
6 Police Department DPD as set forth in the charter. The
7 Board has 11 members, 70 elected by District, 4 appointed
8 by the mayor with the consent of the Detroit City
9 Council. The Board meets every week as a committee of the
10 whole, including 12 communities/evening meetings in the
11 district. The BOPC is the oversight agency for the
12 Detroit Police Department. That department policy rules
13 and regulation governs the Detroit Police Department is
14 jointly developed by the mayor, chief of police, and the
15 Board. The Board has subpoena power under the charter
16 that can be used for investigative purposes. The
17 commissioners also review and approve the DPD budget
18 pursuant to the charter, investigate non-criminal citizen
19 complaints, acts as the final authority in opposing and
20 reviewing the discipline of employees of the department,
21 receives and hear disqualification appeals from police
22 recruits hoping to enter the Detroit Police Academy. The
23 BOPC makes an annual report to the mayor, city council,
24 and the public of BOPC activities and accomplishments.
25 The reading of the summary, Mr. Chair.

1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you very much, Mr. Brown.

2 At this time Ms. White would you give us a roll call?

3 MRS. WHITE: Yes, sir. Through the Chair, At-Large

4 Vice-Chairperson, Commissioner Martin Jones.

5 COMMISSIONER JONES: Good morning or good afternoon

6 everyone. I'd like to welcome DPD's Chief of Police,

7 Chief White and his executive staff. I also want to

8 welcome the community to our meeting, our weekly meeting

9 that we're having today. I also want to acknowledge the

10 first responders, the men, and women of the Detroit Fire

11 Department, and their crew, especially, I think it is

12 engine number 59, for their work and their services.

13 Martin Jones, At-Large, present.

14 MRS. WHITE: Thank you. At-Large, Commissioner Jesus

15 Hernandez.

16 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Good afternoon, present.

17 MRS. WHITE: At-Large, Commissioner Annie Mae Holt.

18 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Good afternoon, present.

19 MRS. WHITE: Chairperson Reverend Jim Holley.

20 District 1, Commissioner, Darryl Brown.

21 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Good afternoon, everyone.

22 Commissioner Brown, present.

23 MRS. WHITE: District 2, Commissioner Linda Bernard.

24 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Attorney Linda Bernard,

25 present.

1 MRS. WHITE: District 3, Commissioner Shirley Burch.

2 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Good afternoon. Shirley Burch
3 from District 3. Respect and love where you live.

4 MRS. WHITE: District 4, Commissioner Willie E. Bell.

5 COMMISSIONER BELL: Good afternoon. Present.

6 MRS. WHITE: District 5, Commissioner Willie E.
7 Burton.

8 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Commissioner, Willie E. Burton,
9 present.

10 MRS. WHITE: District 6, Commissioner Lisa Carter.
11 District 7, Commissioner William M. Davis.

12 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Good afternoon, everyone. This
13 is Police Commissioner William M. Davis. Officers love
14 where you've worked. Officers love where you work.

15 MRS. WHITE: Mr. Chair, you do have a quorum.

16 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much. At this time,
17 the Chair will entertain a motion for the approval of the
18 agenda for August 26th, 2021.

19 COMMISSIONER BROWN: So moved.

20 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Support.

21 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: It's been moved and properly
22 supported. Any discussion? Those in favor, say aye.

23 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

24 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Those opposed.

25 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Aye.

1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: The motion carries. The minutes
2 of the previous meeting had been distributed to each and
3 every one of you, August 12th, 2021. Are there any
4 corrections to the minutes? Hearing none, can I have a
5 motion?

6 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Support.

7 COMMISSIONER BROWN: So moved.

8 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: All in favor, say aye.

9 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

10 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Oppose. Thank you so much. At
11 this time, Mrs. White can I have an introduction of the
12 staff?

13 MRS. WHITE: Yes. Through the Chair, the Department
14 of Innovation and Technology is on the zoom call today
15 and also Media Services is monitoring and recording
16 today's Board Meeting. Our court reporter is Mr. Don
17 Handyside and the following staff members are in
18 attendance, Mr. Robert Brown, Administrative Specialist,
19 Ms. Theresa Blossom, Community Relations Coordinator, Ms.
20 Jonya Underwood, Administrative Assistant, Director
21 Katrina Patillo, Director of Police Personnel, Assistant
22 Corporation Counsel Ericka Savage Whitley, Interim Chief
23 Investigator Lawrence Akbar, Supervising Investigator
24 Ansley Cromwell, Acting Supervising Investigator LiSonya
25 Sloan, and also Acting Supervising Investigator Rosalia

1 Madrigal. Thank you, sir.

2 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: And thank you. Chief White, it's
3 good to have you with us today, and on the other days as
4 well. If you could just take time out and introduce the
5 executives that are with you today.

6 CHIEF WHITE: Good afternoon, Honorable Board, it
7 will be my pleasure. Thank you for having me here today.
8 With me is, and I didn't bring my glasses, Captain
9 Liddell, actually two of the hardest working captains we
10 have. We've got Captain Liddell from Internal Controls
11 and we also have Captain May from Homicide, just doing
12 amazing work, both of them have been very, very busy.
13 Obviously, we have my staff member here, Sheila McBride.
14 And, is there anyone else I've missed from my team? I
15 think everyone else is with us virtually. Thank you

16 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: And we thank you. What about
17 special guests, Ms. White? Do we have any special guests
18 here today?

19 MRS. WHITE: Through the Chair. I have not received
20 any notification just yet, sir.

21 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay. Thank you so much. Board
22 members, please forgive me, but I need Ms. White to help
23 me with some of these remarks if you don't mind. So I'll
24 ask her to start out with the public health order issued
25 on August 25th, 2021.

1 MRS. WHITE: Yes sir. Through the Chair, on behalf of
2 the Chairperson, the Honorable Board recently received
3 the emergency public health order declaring a public
4 health emergency due to COVID-19. Therefore remote
5 meetings will resume starting September 1st, 2021 through
6 December 31st, 2021 as allowed by the public health
7 order, unless further orders are designated by the city's
8 chief public health director. Denise Fair, based on the
9 Michigan public health code and the open meetings act.
10 Also today, the Honorable Board will take a vote to
11 determine whether to hold virtual meetings only or hybrid
12 meetings consisting of in-person and virtual access. As a
13 reminder, the Honorable Board will not meet on September
14 2nd, 2021 due to the Labor Day holiday. And the Board
15 will continue to adhere to local State and CDC
16 guidelines, as well as the open meetings act for public
17 meetings.

18 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I thank you so much. I'd like to
19 congratulate Chief White on the mayor's appointment to
20 the Chief of Police. You might want to have just a moment
21 of remarks as the Chief of Police.

22 CHIEF WHITE: Just to say thank you. I'm humbled and
23 certainly honored. This has been the highlight of my 25
24 year policing career to serve the citizens. And I look
25 forward to continuing to work with each and every one of

1 you, as well as serving our citizens. Thank you.

2 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much. We're
3 certainly looking forward to the city council
4 confirmation within 30 days from the date of your initial
5 appointment. So we'll be looking forward to that. I'd
6 like to also just let you know that today, we welcome two
7 new investigators to the OIC, Office of the Chief
8 Investigators, which is the investigative division of the
9 Board. We welcome Investigator Counts and Investigator
10 Williams. They will have the oval office immediately
11 after my remarks. Please also note on September 9th of
12 this year, we will hold interviews for the position of
13 senior investigator with the Office of Chief
14 Investigator. I'm asking Ms. White, would you help me
15 with the following remarks?

16 MRS. WHITE: Yes, sir. Through the Chair, the Board
17 currently has 4 candidates which they will interview on
18 September 9th as indicated. We'll hold 20-minute
19 interviews for each of the 3 candidates, excuse me, 3
20 candidates. And the candidates will receive an invitation
21 from city HR and the BOPC administrative staff, inviting
22 them to interview and also providing instructions for
23 coming to the meeting based on the meeting format.

24 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: We continue?

25 MRS. WHITE: Yes, sir. Then with regards to Board

1 staff vacancies, there are 4 remaining citizen
2 complaints, investigator vacancies, and as an update, the
3 Board is working very diligently to fill those vacancies
4 by November 2021. The posting will be up by week's end
5 for those persons interested in the position of citizen
6 complaint investigator and also police commissioner
7 investigator. And again, the Board is working with city
8 HR to advance through this process. Regarding other staff
9 vacancy positions, city HR is in the process of reposting
10 the positions for a secretary to the board and for the
11 chief investigator, which should be posted by the end of
12 this week. Also, the attorney to the Board position will
13 also be posted to the city's website at a future date,
14 once all HR requirements are met. Again, the Board is
15 working with city HR to ensure the recruitment selection
16 and hiring process meets all city policies and charter
17 mandates.

18 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Will you continue, please.

19 MRS. WHITE: Yes. Through the Chair, regarding
20 NACOLES conference webinars and this year's conference.
21 As a reminder to the Honorable Board, you have received
22 notification regarding the NACOLES conference webinars to
23 learn more about what is taking place around the country
24 regarding effective practices and trends in civilian
25 oversight. The Board will have reports and

1 recommendations to have for their consideration and also
2 to share with the department regarding law enforcement,
3 civilian oversight, community bridges, and public safety.
4 And again, thank you for your participation on behalf of
5 the Chairperson. And regarding today's meeting
6 presentation reports, Chief of Police report, the Board
7 looks forward to receiving various important updates
8 regarding the homicide stats that were shared earlier and
9 various other critical incident updates, as well as an
10 update on the previous pig recruitment initiative
11 regarding the resolution for Corporal Kahlil Biddle, the
12 Board will honor today, Corporal Kahlil Biddle regarding
13 his service and commitment to the city and the
14 department. In terms of presentations today, the Board
15 will hear presentations from DPD, Chaplain Corps, Chief
16 Chaplain, Linnell Caldwell and executive team, and also a
17 presentation from the Office of the Chief Investigator
18 presented by Interim Chief Investigator Lawrence Akbar
19 and facial recognition technology update from
20 Commissioner Burton. Mr. Chair is requesting and the
21 Honorable Board is looking forward to a report on facial
22 recognition today from Commissioner Burton.

23 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much, and thank you
24 for your patience with me in regards to having Mrs. White
25 to help me with these remarks and I appreciate it very

1 much. At this particular time, I'd like to have Ms.
2 Counts and Ms. Patel come up for the oath of office.

3 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Mr. Chair.

4 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes.

5 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: My mic isn't working.

6 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I noticed that when you were
7 talking, I thought it was just your mask.

8 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: No, I think it's because I'm
9 the black guy.

10 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay. So can you help me with
11 Commissioner Hernandez?

12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I can use my preacher's voice,
13 you can use my mic.

14 MRS. WHITE: We will work to get that resolved, Mr.
15 Chair.

16 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay.

17 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: We can share one.

18 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay. Bring your name tag by Ms.
19 Carter. Just bring it over here if you could. She's not
20 here. Ms. Patel, and, there you go, come right up.

21 COMMISSIONER BELL: Mr. Chair, why don't you stand,
22 you know, to get the camera, to the side, and then they
23 can see you.

24 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Can you raise your right hand,
25 please. I solemnly swear or affirm and the laws of the

1 State of Michigan and the Charter of the City of Detroit,
2 and I will faithfully and impartially (Audio distortion)
3 according to the law and the best of my ability.

4 Understand that it's all in the heart. I want you to know
5 that. Thank you so much. I want to present you with your
6 badge. Again, congratulations to you on the right one.
7 All right. Congratulations to you. Looking forward to
8 working with you.

9 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Mr. Akbar, won't you take a
10 picture with them. I don't want to bring the
11 commissioners up because of COVID and I don't know if you
12 have been vaccinated or not.

13 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: You should be in the picture.

14 MRS. WHITE: Honorable Chair and Honorable
15 Commissioners, please be mindful of the cords on the
16 floor, so, please be careful.

17 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Let's give them another big
18 hand. I've done my duty for today.

19 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Excuse me, Mr. Chairman.

20 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes.

21 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Some people are standing.
22 Maybe we can bring some chairs in, there's more than
23 enough space.

24 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: There's one over here. Miss
25 Georgia, I got a chair right over here, waiting for you.

1 I told them to save it for you.

2 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: You can bring in some more
3 chairs and there are some more people too.

4 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: At this time Chief, I would like
5 to have your report coming from you today. Thank you for
6 your patience with me.

7 CHIEF WHITE: No problem, one second here. Okay, very
8 good afternoon once again, Honorable Board.

9 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Good afternoon.

10 CHIEF WHITE: I will start off with an update on our
11 injured officers. Currently, we have 3 officers that are
12 disabled and recovering at home due to on-duty injuries.
13 1 sergeant from the 7th Precinct, 1 sergeant, I'm sorry,
14 1 sergeant from the 7th Precinct, 1 police officer from
15 the 7th Precinct, and 1 police officer from the 11th
16 Precinct. Also, sadly tomorrow we lay to rest Corporal
17 Biddle. He's a 24 year veteran of our department. He
18 passed away on August 17th. His funeral will be tomorrow
19 at 10:30 at Straight Gate International Church. Very,
20 very sad circumstances surrounding what happened with him
21 as I reported to the Board last week, on vacation with
22 his family and had a stroke and succumbed to the stroke.
23 And sadly, he will be late to rest tomorrow.

24 CHIEF WHITE: I will talk a little bit about our
25 COVID stats. We have 23 members who are currently

1 quarantined or isolated, 14 are quarantined or isolated
2 members who have tested positive. We have seen an uptick
3 in COVID exposure as well as positives. Again, we are
4 closely monitoring it and making adjustments. We've put a
5 few things out in hopes of curtailing some of it. One is
6 masking less again in buildings and we've also put an end
7 to any unnecessary travel and for those that are
8 traveling for training, we asked that they're vaccinated.
9 Moving to the crime data, we are experiencing a 6%
10 increase in homicides. We are at 210 homicides year to
11 date. Last year, at this time we were at 198. That
12 uptick, however, shows certainly an uptick, but we are
13 actually experiencing a downturn, which is excellent
14 overall.

15 CHIEF WHITE: And so we're hoping to zero out that
16 increase and go even beyond that and have some actual
17 reductions. Non-fatal shootings, it's 4% increase. We
18 were in the thirties a few months back as far as an
19 increase goes, again showing an increase. We're moving in
20 the right direction with the decrease, and again, we want
21 to zero those numbers out as well. And that's a testament
22 to the incredible work that the men and women are doing
23 in the department. I had set a very ambitious 10% crime
24 reduction upon arrival and they have surpassed that. But
25 again, these numbers are nothing to brag about at all.

1 One homicide, one shooting is one too many. Robberies at
2 26% decrease. Again, that's the visibility, that's the
3 officers doing their work, ensuring that our community is
4 safe. Why that number is incredibly significant is,
5 you're seeing a decrease in robberies when you have
6 people returning to the street, returning to engage
7 opportunities.

8 CHIEF WHITE: So you actually got more people this
9 year than you did last year at the same time. They're
10 engaging in activities that historically could lead to
11 robberies and those types of things. So just great work
12 from the men and women of the Detroit Police Department.
13 Total part one crime we're at a 3% overall decrease. So,
14 again great work. Drag racing, drifting enforcement
15 stats. We have really turned the heat up on this drift
16 and constitutionally doing great work out there, just the
17 stats from last weekend, 119 traffic stops, 96 citations,
18 18 vehicles impounded, 7 felony arrests, 2 misdemeanor
19 arrests and 4 weapons recovered. And that was just
20 amongst the drifters. Overall year to date stats 2,145
21 traffic stops, 2,553 citations issued, and vehicles
22 impounded 214, stolen vehicles recovered 16, felony
23 arrest 114, misdemeanor arrest 15, and 85 weapons
24 recovered.

25 CHIEF WHITE: During that time, I mean, we talk about

1 you know, the work of the officers and we certainly have
2 seen some, some incidents highlighted, but when you put
3 it in context and you look at the consistency of
4 professionalism that the officers are operating with,
5 something that we all can be proud of. So, you know, the
6 goal here is not to write a bunch of tickets, the goal
7 here is to not have to write tickets. So, we don't want
8 to see people drifting in our community. We have a huge
9 problem with Vassar and Outer Drive that we've been able
10 to put to rest. But oftentimes it just means they just
11 move to another location. So we continue to use all the
12 resources we have including air support helicopters so
13 that officers don't have to get into these high-speed
14 chases and both the perpetrator and the officers are
15 safe. Moving on to significant crime issues reporting to
16 me since I've been sitting here is a 5-year-old in the
17 9th Precinct that apparently, preliminary information, so
18 this is subject to change.

19 CHIEF WHITE: It appears though that preliminary, she
20 has found her father's weapon, or let me correct that, a
21 member of the household's weapon and shot herself. The
22 good news is, the text that I got, it looks like the
23 child will recover. But again, another senseless tragedy
24 that did not have to happen with responsible gun
25 ownership. Last night, even more tragic situation, a 4-

1 year old in the 9th Precinct at a gas station was hit
2 while a young man pumping gas drove off, struck the
3 child, and the child later died. He did leave the scene.
4 Our crime intelligence unit did a phenomenal job getting
5 his image out. It happened at a greenlight gas station,
6 so we had clean pictures of him. We posted those pictures
7 immediately on our social media, as well as in the media,
8 and within about 15 minutes as he turned himself in. It
9 doesn't appear it was intentional. I think after the
10 incident happened, he just got nervous and ran. But he
11 was in custody and the tragedy is what it is,
12 unfortunately. Obviously, the saddest day of that
13 parent's life occurred last night in our city at a gas
14 station in the 9th Precinct. Moving on from that,

15 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Let me ask you, I'm sorry, I
16 know this is usual. Let me ask you this. So the child was
17 hit in the gas station by a car, a five-year-old. There
18 was nobody beside him, on both sides of him. I mean, how
19 does one car miss the other people?

20 CHIEF WHITE: So the federal squad, through the Chair
21 of the federal squad is investigating it now. But what it
22 appears is that the child may have followed behind the
23 parent and ran in front of a truck and the truck was
24 gasping up, saw the adult pass did not visually see the
25 child. And the case is wide open, so I don't want to say

1 too much, but the child was struck.

2 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I'm sorry.

3 CHIEF WHITE: No, I totally understand.

4 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: It's the preacher in me. I'm
5 sorry.

6 CHIEF WHITE It's a very, very sad situation for all
7 involved, even the officers are really taking this case
8 very, very hard as you can imagine. So moving on to an
9 incident on August 16, 4444 Central Avenue at Red's bar,
10 4 individuals were shot and we talked about that, we went
11 back and we shut that business down. We found out about
12 the business operating illegally.

13 CHIEF WHITE We had another situation at State Fair
14 and Haynes, 3 individuals shot. One of them fatally, the
15 ages were 23, 25, and 27. The shooting appears to be
16 random. Based on the video, it appears that the victims
17 and suspects... it was a typo, I apologize. The shooting
18 was not random. Based on the video, it appears that the
19 suspects did know each other before the shooting. And
20 there was some type of argument and we're looking for
21 dark gray, 2015 or 2016 Chrysler 300 that was seen in the
22 area. We had a couple of incidents involving shootings in
23 a silver Chrysler, 300 of that year. So, anyone that has
24 information on that vehicle, we are very interested in
25 any information that you may have. Again, that's a dark

1 gray, 2015 or 2016 Chrysler 300. Another incident
2 occurred in a 20,000 block Cherrylawn in the 12th
3 Precinct where 3 people were shot.

4 CHIEF WHITE One of the victims fatally. The ages of
5 these victims are 43, 45 and 56. There was a party at the
6 location, unknown persons fired shots into the crowd from
7 a distance. We have a number of prior contacts in that
8 area and a number of contacts at that location. Homicide
9 is actively working that investigation, but still needs
10 assistance from the community. Anyone that has
11 information, we are asking for help in that particular
12 case. Pivoting to some positives, and certainly, you
13 know, it's a hard pivot coming out of some of the
14 information I've just given you. We did, well actually,
15 this isn't a positive. I'm going to give you one more
16 that has to do with the graduating students from last
17 week's class. As the Board is aware, we had a very
18 disappointing situation with one of the graduates last
19 week. Even after I spoke with the entire class
20 personally, and advised them that they will be held to a
21 higher standard and that, you know, they are to keep
22 being mindful of anything that they get involved in.

23 CHIEF WHITE But more importantly, this is your
24 graduation day. We know you're going to celebrate but do
25 so responsibly. Despite that, one of the students engaged

1 and at the very least appears to be disorderly conduct,
2 but as the investigation continues, perhaps, even more,
3 I'm extremely disappointed, my commitment to this body
4 and this community is to have a resolution on this case
5 in 7 days. 7 days is Monday. My intentions are to have
6 this case button up as of Monday, one way or the other.
7 And I'll be more than happy to report back the outcome of
8 that to this body the next time we meet. Moving on and
9 pivoting to positives the rest of the class has
10 graduated, is very happy to be a part of our police
11 department and earn the right to wear their privileged
12 badge. We have them doing various foot patrols in our
13 community as well as working specialty details and things
14 like that for a while, for the first few weeks of their
15 training, and then we will put them in the Precincts.

16 CHIEF WHITE: And the idea behind that is twofold.
17 One is we want them to get to know the community. So
18 we're doing that off, but unfortunately, they're not too
19 happy because of the humidity they've been experiencing
20 in the past three days with these hot temperatures, but
21 we're keeping them hydrated and we want them to introduce
22 themselves in the community. I'll be out there with them
23 this weekend. So I'll be sweating right along with them,
24 but it's important that they see the community, walk the
25 streets, and get to know them before they get inside the

1 scout cars. In addition to that, they're able to work the
2 details that are coming up with the lions' games, the
3 baseball games, and things like that. And that allows us
4 to keep our veteran officers in the Precinct, providing
5 those much-needed services to the neighborhoods.

6 CHIEF WHITE: Yesterday we did our third walk-a-mile
7 Wednesday in the community. I was out there with our
8 ceasefire group and a number of people from our Northwest
9 area. We'll continue to do that. We will be monitoring it
10 though for COVID restrictions, so we may have to just
11 shut it down, but our goal is to be out there again next
12 Wednesday in a different community. So look for us, come
13 out and walk with us. Walk-a-mile Wednesday, it starts at
14 6:00 PM every Wednesday, until further notice. Tomorrow
15 we have a recruiting event down at the 5th Precinct from
16 8 to 4. Actually, it's in the Maheras Gentry Baseball
17 Park and anyone that knows anyone that wants to be a
18 police officer, please come out, and please apply. We'd
19 absolutely love to have you. That concludes my report. I
20 am available for any questions.

21 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you very much Chief. At
22 this time Vice-Chair Jones will do the round-robin.

23 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Alright, thank you, Mr. Chairman.
24 We're going to start off with At-Large Commissioner Annie
25 Holt. Do you have any questions for the Chief?

1 COMMISSIONER HOLT: I'd just like to make a comment
2 and thank you. Chair Holley and Vice-Chair Jones. Soon
3 after the graduation last Friday we were approached by
4 Captain Haley, Mrs. White?

5 MRS. WHITE: Deputy Chief Hayes. Okay. And he invited
6 Vice-Chair Jones and me to contact the office so that we
7 could set up the neighborhood with the police officers.
8 So I'm excited to have the offices over on Schoolcraft
9 between South Beale and Evergreen, as soon as those
10 arrangements have been made. And if, unfortunately, we
11 reflect on some of the incidents that have happened in
12 the last year. You're aware that Schoolcraft was one of
13 the places where two teenagers were killed as a result of
14 an incident involving road rage. So we're looking forward
15 to that walk, Chief White in our neighborhood. And thank
16 you.

17 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Vice-Chair recognizes. Jesus
18 Hernandez. Do you have any questions for the Chief?

19 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Just congratulations again
20 on your appointment and pending confirmation. More of a
21 comment. I think I've heard from lots of folks in the
22 community around just the activity that's going on with
23 businesses. So more than anything, just very
24 appreciative. That's what the community is, at least
25 telling me in the sense of these businesses that are

1 operating without the proper permits, without the proper
2 licensing. So great work to you and the department.

3 CHIEF WHITE: Thank you, sir.

4 VICE-CHAIR JONES: All right. The Vice-Chair
5 recognizes Mr. William Davis, do you have any questions
6 for the Chief

7 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Commissioner William Davis.

8 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Pardon. Commissioner William
9 Davis.

10 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Right, young man. Okay. Yes, my
11 question to you, sir, is this, I had expected you to
12 mention the WXYZ story about complaints against the
13 police department being up 20%. And I know also that
14 since we had our last full time Chief investigator, I
15 know we've lost a lot of people, but can you comment on
16 the fact that complaints are up dramatically.

17 CHIEF WHITE: Through the Chair, I'm often looking at
18 data and complaints throughout the department. We did see
19 an uptick as a result of a lot of the protest last year.
20 But without really looking at the data that is referenced
21 in that report, I could not give you an intellectual
22 response without doing some additional work. I know
23 though again, that there has been an uptake, but I
24 haven't had an opportunity to parallel that investigation
25 with any facts in the department as of yet. But I know

1 that there are a number of complaints that have come in.
2 We've taken some time recently to look at the
3 department's complaint system, how we are handling
4 complaints. We're also in a process as a result of
5 something that was brought to my attention shortly after
6 my arrival of putting in some improvements as it relates
7 to how we internally investigate complaints, and our
8 interactions with the Office of Chief Investigator, as
9 well as a risk management component. We're not there yet.
10 We're getting close. And when we do get there, which I
11 anticipate will be in the next two to three weeks I have
12 a comprehensive report that I'm preparing for the Board
13 of Police Commissioners that I will have presented to you
14 and be available to answer any questions that you may
15 have, and it will include the uptick in complaints,

16 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Looking forward to seeing it.
17 Also Commissioner Burch says she's waiting to be called
18 too. She's having problems with the system.

19 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Okay. All right. The Vice-Chair
20 recognizes District 6, Commissioner Lisa Carter. Do you
21 have any questions for the Chief?

22 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you, Mr. Vice-Chair. Good
23 afternoon, everyone. And good afternoon, Chief. The past
24 couple of weeks, I've been reviewing cases from the
25 Office of the Chief Investigator. And my concern comes

1 when I've viewed, like last week I had 9 cases and two of
2 them involve notifications to families who had been
3 victims of crime or relatives who had been killed in an
4 accident or whatever. And the family was not being
5 notified. Could you either walk me through the process of
6 notification or provide the policy for notifications when
7 someone experiences a death or someone experiences their
8 car being towed and their car is eventually sold, sold at
9 auction? How are they notified? I experienced that, like
10 I said, in a couple of cases last week that I read.

11 CHIEF WHITE: No problem, ma'am. Through the Chair. I
12 can have Captain May speak to the notification process on
13 homicides and fatalities. And I will speak to the policy
14 with vehicles being impounded and towed.

15 COMMISSIONER CARTER: And one more thing, not on your
16 watch, but I experienced the same thing in an incident
17 that happened to my house. Someone ran into my house and
18 that person passed away and their family was looking all
19 around the city, making, you know, calling the morgue and
20 things like that. And they didn't find out until an
21 actual Facebook post. And I just find that very
22 disturbing.

23 CHIEF WHITE: Yes.

24 COMMISSIONER CARTER: So I'm sorry for interrupting,
25 but I just wanted to make that... That's why it's so

1 important for me to know the process and that people are
2 being notified when things happen.

3 CHIEF WHITE: Yes, ma'am. Captain May?

4 CAPTAIN MAY: Good afternoon, Honorable Board.
5 Captain Derek, May of Homicide. So basically when we have
6 a scene or an individual, the first thing we have to do
7 is identify that person. Now, a lot of times, family
8 members get wind of what happened and we actually talk to
9 them at the scene, but when we don't, we have to identify
10 them. And our first process is to go to their last known
11 address, to try to contact a family member. Basically, we
12 generally get in touch with somebody and we go from
13 there.

14 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Well, what I hear her saying,
15 Captain, excuse me.

16 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Go ahead, sir.

17 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: What I hear her saying my friend
18 is that the families are not notified at all. That's what
19 I hear her saying. How can that happen if somebody has a
20 heart attack or shot on the street, the family is not
21 notified? That's what I'm hearing her saying.

22 CHIEF WHITE: Through the Chair. So the families are
23 notified. There are sometimes that the families are not.
24 What I can do is just bring you an analysis at the next
25 meeting as to how that process goes with regards to when

1 they cannot notify. So the expectation is that if there's
2 a homicide and we identify the person that the next of
3 kin is notified, okay. And that's done through any
4 identification that they have on them. In times past, we
5 have sent people to their homes, you know, and to notify
6 whomever is at the house, we've gone on social media. Now
7 candidly, I have not looked at that process since I've
8 been back. So I don't want to speak if in fact, what I'm
9 expecting to be done is in fact being done. But I will
10 look at it and I will report back to the Board. But the
11 expectation is that every effort is made to notify
12 someone when we encounter a fatality. And if that's not
13 happening, then that's a concern and we will address it.

14 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you. Thank you, Mr.
15 Chair.

16 CHIEF WHITE: And very similarly, through the Chair
17 as it relates to impound vehicles. So depending on the
18 nature of the impound, if the vehicle is impounded from
19 the street, generally speaking, if it's not illegally
20 parked, it's tagged as a 48 hour notice that's put on the
21 vehicle so the owner has an opportunity to move the car.
22 48 hours later the vehicle is towed, put into the lien
23 system. Now here's what should happen when you call 911
24 and say, my car's missing, they should run it and say,
25 it's impounded by the City of Detroit Police Department.

1 I will tell you that that is an area that I have found to
2 be deficient since I've been back. That does not happen
3 routinely. It happens sometimes, but not all the time.
4 The policy is, it happens all the time. So when we looked
5 into that, I was told that we've got a number of
6 different things.

7 CHIEF WHITE: Of course, everybody puts COVID in and
8 says, COVID happened. We kind of plugged that into
9 everything these days. But also in addition to COVID
10 happening, we lost a number of employees and had to
11 reassign employees from towing. We are now stepping that
12 up. We have an extremely dynamic HR director that is
13 doing amazing work for us. I'm very proud of her and
14 happy to have her on the team. And so she's gotten our
15 civilian employee numbers. Now, I think it's 80, some odd
16 percent higher, ma'am is that correct? And some of those
17 employees are specifically going to be assigned to that
18 task. So we do need some time to fix the problems there.
19 We're not there yet. But as recent as yesterday,
20 Commander Parish and myself talked about this. A tow yard
21 reached out to us because we had vehicles that weren't
22 being taken out of lien. So we do have some problems and
23 we are working on them and I will be prepared again, to
24 report back to the Board once that process is in place.
25 And the timeline on that it's about 30 days, because

1 we've got to get the employees onboard and trained and
2 put into those seats.

3 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you.

4 VICE-CHAIR JONES: All right. The Vice-Chair
5 recognizes District 5, Willie Burton. Commissioner Willie
6 Burton. Do you have any questions for the Chief?

7 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Yes. Chief, congratulations,
8 and also congratulations with your new recruitment class
9 that you have on the streets. A request from our
10 residents in District 5, is that senior citizens, they
11 want to feel just as safe, equally safe as those at gas
12 stations and liquor stores. You know, they would like to
13 see some type of presence where officers even just, you
14 know, once a day, probably come onto their lot of their
15 senior building, or even just wave or just sit for a
16 couple of minutes or something. They just like to see
17 some visibility from officers. I know that you are
18 stretched real thin with department resources, you know,
19 far as officers and stuff, but the last request is coming
20 from, you know, being a Commissioner for 8-years looking
21 at my Lafayette Park community, which is in District 5,
22 it falls in the 7th Precinct. The park is wide open.

23 COMMISSIONER BURTON: It's an historical landmark.
24 So, you know, there have been upticks and over the years,
25 I can't speak to it right now, but there have been

1 upticks in cars being vandalized along Lafayette, Art
2 Tatum and Revere for years. And so, you know, they will
3 love to see rookie officers, you know, to know their way
4 around that community, especially through the park. There
5 are so many different openings. A person can commit a
6 crime and run through the park and they can be on their
7 way. It would really make a big difference if we can have
8 our officers, learning around Lafayette Park communities,
9 so many different openings.

10 CHIEF WHITE: Through the Chair, Lafayette Park, this
11 year, Commander Giaquinto has done a really good job of
12 keeping those issues that you speak of down to the data.
13 And you indicated that you don't know if it's, we've seen
14 the uptick this year that they did last year. He's done a
15 really good job with this team of officers over there,
16 keeping that park managed very well, that area managed
17 very well. With regards to the visibility. I'm hoping
18 that the Commission and the community is seeing more
19 visible officers in the vehicles, driving through
20 neighborhoods. That's a mandate that this administration
21 put out that we want to see officers driving through the
22 neighborhoods, not just going to run. I've heard that we
23 were seeing that. The fact that you're saying that we're
24 not, I'll reach out to the commander, and I'll also talk
25 to him about reaching out to you personally, to talk

1 about if there's something... We have some programs at
2 the various Precincts where going into the senior homes
3 and talking to the seniors is something that we can do
4 perhaps with our chaplains, as well as our NPL. So that's
5 doable. I'll make sure I reach out and have them contact
6 you.

7 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Thank you, Chief. And I know
8 that Lafayette Park community was, at some point in time,
9 I'm not sure if they still are, participating in
10 secondary employment.

11 CHIEF WHITE: Yes, they were. I don't know if they
12 still are. I know when I left they were, but again I know
13 that a lot of the problems, you know, we meet on these
14 issues a lot, probably more than folks want to. And they
15 really have done a good job this year, this summer. We're
16 controlling a lot of the problems. And as I indicated
17 with the downturn in larcenies, a lot of what was driving
18 those larceny numbers in the past, where those beenie
19 autos, those larcenies from autos and things like that.
20 So let me connect the dots with the commander and I'll
21 have him reach out to you.

22 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Thank you, Chief.

23 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Okay. Vice-Chair recognizes
24 District 4, Willie Bell. Do you have any questions for
25 the Chief Commissioner Willie Bell?

1 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, Vice-Chair, Chief
2 Craig, Let us just try that again. Chief White.... strike
3 that from the record.

4 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Turner?

5 COMMISSIONER BELL: On a serious note, this question
6 I'm dating myself. It might be before your time, but I
7 thought I heard that, and in reference to these bars or
8 liquor stores, we didn't know if they were valid business
9 places. Back in the day, there was monitoring in each
10 Precinct mostly by the sergeant doing liquor inspection.
11 That's something that is falling off the radar, or do we
12 have a different approach to that?

13 CHIEF WHITE: Through the Chair. It is not before my
14 time, sir. In fact, it was one of the questions that we
15 asked when we started looking at these facilities. So it
16 was, as you remember, it's the responsibility of the
17 supervisor at the Precinct to do those liquor
18 inspections. We are resurrecting that, and you know, the
19 reality of it is, you know, in a large department, things
20 fall off the radar. Other things become a priority. And
21 if you don't inspect what you expect, things are no
22 longer a priority. With the uptick in violence at these
23 businesses, and then we go out, we look, as we have said
24 time and time again, if you invite us to your house,
25 we're going to look around. If we find something, you're

1 not supposed to be open, we're going to close you. And
2 you got kids getting shot at 4 o'clock in the morning at
3 18 years old, who shouldn't have even been in a bar
4 period.

5 CHIEF WHITE: You know, there are rules to this
6 stuff. I mean, there's a timeframe that kids can actually
7 legally be in a bar, but I believe after 10:00 PM, they
8 cannot. So things such as that. And I don't know, don't
9 hold me to that, but I think it's around 9 or 10. I know
10 when I did the inspections, there was a timeframe if they
11 served food. So we're bringing that back and we're going
12 to do those inspections because, you know, it's not a
13 good idea to go in these bars and shut them down after
14 the fact. I mean, it plays well for five seconds, but the
15 logical question is why didn't you know before something
16 happened. So we're finding out before something happens.
17 And to that end, we actually found out about an incident
18 on an inspection a few days ago, where an 18 year old was
19 being illegally served. There were people who were
20 dancing, nude dancing in the facility and they found this
21 out on an inspection in the 4th Precinct and they were
22 able to shut it down prior to a shooting, prior to an
23 incident. So we're bringing that back. We're going to
24 mandate it out of my office, that each Precinct does a

1 number of inspections throughout the week and submit them
2 at the end of the week.

3 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, sir.

4 VICE-CHAIR JONES: All right. The Vice-Chair
5 recognizes Commissioner Shirley Burch, District 3. Do you
6 have any questions for the Chief? Shirley Burch,
7 Commissioner Burch? Vice-Chair recognizes,

8 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: She said she had a question. I
9 don't know if there is a communication issue.

10 MRS. WHITE: She may be still experiencing technical
11 difficulties.

12 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Okay. The Vice-Chair recognizes
13 District 2.

14 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you. Vice-Chairman.
15 Before I ask you the 3 little points I want to ask you
16 about in terms of your report, Chief, I would appreciate
17 it if, with the permission of the Chair, if we could all
18 take a moment of silence, and quite frankly, if we're
19 able to stand. 10 United States marines were killed today
20 in Afghanistan, and several others are dying and 60
21 Afghans were killed and, of course, a hundred of them are
22 injured as a result of this attack, really on the United
23 States, excuse me, this afternoon. It's a major, major
24 issue in if you don't mind, Mr. Chairman, those of us who

1 are able to stand, can we stand for our servicemen and
2 women?

3 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. And
4 especially in recognition of our personnel director, who
5 is a retired United States army Colonel. I thought of her
6 immediately today when this happened. So I'm very happy
7 that you allowed us to do that. Chief again,
8 congratulations on your appointment. Three things just
9 real quick. First of all, when you talk about impounding
10 and notice to people, I would appreciate it if your staff
11 might consider drafting a policy concerning that, that we
12 could take a look at, I too have reviewed cases just as
13 Lisa has where a man's car was actually... he got the
14 notice the same day his car was sold. And so, I mean, he
15 was really upset and they sold it and they sent him a
16 check for \$250, which was, I guess, the lien fee. It was
17 a thousand dollars for the sale. The lien fees were like
18 750, but they sold it for a thousand.

19 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: So they sent him a check for
20 250, but that begs the question. I thought that the
21 complaint should be sustained in that particular case,
22 because it was, we had the car for almost 3 months. He
23 got the notice. The notice was dated the day of the sale,
24 actually. Secondly, so if you would consider that I would
25 appreciate it. Secondly regarding the issue that Lisa

1 raised as well regarding notification concerning dead
2 people. You said they will go to the house. Well, if
3 you're a single person, you come to my house, I'm not
4 there, nobody's there. So I think the Chairman indicated,
5 just a policy, doesn't have to be a big deal, but we
6 should have a structure, I think, for those things.

7 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: And then finally, in the
8 reports that you gave us today, there was a fatal
9 accident at the Sunoco gas station. It's a Greenlight
10 location, 11603 East 7-mile. And your circumstances,
11 state quote, "the victim and his two brothers were
12 standing on the curb at the Sunoco gas station when the
13 suspect jumped the curb and struck the victim with his
14 vehicle, fatally injuring him. The suspect got out of his
15 vehicle, picked the victim up and handed them to his
16 brother." Like it was a dog or something. The suspect got
17 back into his vehicle and fled the scene going north on
18 Roe. Platoon 3 responded to this incident. Is there
19 anything that, you know, this is unbelievable to me, how
20 do you run over a human being, get out, pick up the
21 person, hand them to their brother and leave?

22 CHIEF WHITE: Through the Chair? I believe you're
23 reading the immediate notification from the child that
24 was struck. I'll confirm that, but those are the initial

1 circumstances of the child. The information that I have
2 is what...

3 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Oh, that's what you were
4 talking about. It didn't say that the victim was 4 or
5 anything like that, all right. I heard your report on
6 that earlier, but he handed it to him.

7 CHIEF WHITE: Yes, ma'am he did.

8 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: And then left.

9 CHIEF WHITE: Yes, ma'am.

10 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you. I didn't know that
11 that was the child.

12 CHIEF WHITE: But I will check.

13 CAPTAIN MAY: Chief, I made that scene last night. I
14 could clarify.

15 CHIEF WHITE: I think we're beyond that now, but I do
16 want you to clarify the notification process.

17 CAPTAIN MAY: Right? So what happens when we do
18 attempt to notify family members of the victims? Like you
19 said,

20 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Can you speak up, if you don't
21 mind, I can't hear you. Thank you.

22 CAPTAIN MAY: Sometimes we're not able to identify
23 the person right away, and then when we do identify them,
24 we go to their last known address. If that address is
25 vacant, it kind of presents a tough time for us to

1 actually locate the family. So we do everything we
2 possibly can, make every last known address of this
3 person in order to try to make a notification. And for me
4 to actually take a deep dive into it, I would have to
5 look into each case and see why this family wasn't
6 notified because I don't get a whole lot of non-
7 notification complaints. I have an open door policy. I
8 talked to victims, family members almost every day.

9 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: But what I'm suggesting is
10 perhaps you have a... you go to the house, nobody
11 answers. Then you go to the neighbor's house. I mean,
12 there should be a practice, you know, sort of a
13 wraparound if you will. It is a human being and we need
14 to handle this.

15 CAPTAIN MAY: Yes, ma'am, and we do do that. We do
16 care.

17 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Okay.

18 CHIEF WHITE: I think the question, through the
19 Chair, is what the policy looks like, and if we're
20 following it. And so what I'm committed to doing is
21 providing you an analogy of, if in fact, we're following
22 the policy. We will look at the last 25 to 50
23 notifications. Did we in fact follow our policy? If we
24 did not, what are the improvements we're going to make to
25 it? Then we'll look specifically at the case in question

1 and come back and tell you where the breakdown occurred.
2 We'll just need a little bit of time to do that. I think
3 two weeks should be fine.

4 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: 30 days would be fine.

5 CHIEF WHITE: All right. Thank you.

6 VICE-CHAIR JONES: The Vice-Chair recognizes District
7 1, Commissioner Darryl Brown. Do you have a question for
8 the Chief?

9 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Yes, I do, just a couple of
10 comments. I hate to beat that dead horse, but my nephew
11 was killed a year ago in a shooting. I still have not
12 been notified of anything concerning that shooting and
13 they know who I am. And I've talked to the homicide
14 detectives when they were here, and I haven't been
15 notified of anything

16 CHIEF WHITE: Through the Chair, just for
17 clarification. Are we talking about the notification of
18 the incident or an update to the investigation?

19 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Both.

20 CHIEF WHITE: Okay.

21 COMMISSIONER BROWN: I wasn't even notified that he
22 was involved, but I don't want to beat that horse. We can
23 talk about it later on, but I'm just telling you as a
24 Commissioner, sitting here, have experienced that, and

1 there was no notification. So secondly, on a lighter
2 note, congratulations.

3 CHIEF WHITE: Thank you.

4 COMMISSIONER BROWN: And then secondly, I just want
5 to commend you and the men and women of the 8th Precinct
6 under the leadership of Commander Patterson and the group
7 over there, they are patrolling the neighborhoods and
8 whoever the officer was on Grand River in the black SUV,
9 he needs a medal.

10 CHIEF WHITE: Yesterday?

11 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Yes. Because he was writing
12 tickets. He was slowing that traffic down.

13 CHIEF WHITE: He was.

14 COMMISSIONER BROWN: He was doing his job. And by me
15 being a business owner out there with several buildings
16 on that corridor, it's like I have to get in on the
17 passenger side some time and slide over to the steering
18 wheel, because I'm thinking I might get hit getting into
19 my vehicle. So wherever he was, he needs to be commended
20 because he was actually doing his job and I could see the
21 slowdown and traffic coming through there when they knew
22 that he was out there but thank you. And they are in the
23 neighborhoods. I see them in the community patrolling the
24 neighborhoods.

25 CHIEF WHITE: Thank you.

1 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Well, Chief, congratulations
2 again. This is Vice-Chair Martin Jones. I want to tell
3 you it's been an honor working with you on some different
4 projects out in the community. And in talking with
5 citizens, wherever, I've been given quite a few
6 compliments about your appointment to Chief of Police and
7 they are pleased to see you sitting in that seat. Two
8 things, I wanted to find out if there was any update on
9 the ShotSpotter program, because we haven't really been
10 hearing anything about any results or any different raids
11 or the shutdown of any operations within any of the
12 communities around the city. I was wondering if you could
13 speak to that a little bit.

14 CHIEF WHITE: Through the Chair. Yes. ShotSpotter has
15 proven very effective. We've made a number of arrests
16 and, and literally save lives, getting there so quickly
17 from ShotSpotter. I do not have that data with me today.
18 But just in the updates that I get on ShotSpotter and
19 then looking at the feasibility of expanding it, the
20 conversations that I've had with the 8th and the 9th
21 Precinct is that it's quite an effective tool.

22 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Okay, great. Your Captain May, if
23 I could have him return to the podium, please?

24 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Do we have to go through you to
25 ask him to do that?

1 CHIEF WHITE: No, not at all.

2 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: You say, to the Chair? I want to
3 know what to say to the Chief.

4 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Okay. Thank you, Captain May, for
5 coming back to the podium. In recent weeks or whatever
6 I've taken note of your work and the community trying to
7 look into, or get some kind of information out to
8 different families that have been victims of a homicide.
9 You've come out, you've taken names, and you've taken
10 telephone numbers. And my information is that you've
11 gotten back with them to give them an update about their
12 case, possibly, you know, helping to bridge that gap in
13 the community between the police department and the
14 community itself. Can you speak on that a little bit?

15 CAPTAIN MAY: Yes. It is a best practice for the
16 homicide section to have a good relationship with the
17 community, and especially the families of the victims is
18 something I take pride in and is something I want my unit
19 to do a much better job at going forward. And these are
20 the basic rules that we have. Generally, when we have a
21 victim, we identify one person who is the next to kin. So
22 if the victim was married, that would be the spouse,
23 unmarried. It would be the mother or the father. And we
24 choose that one person and that's who we communicate with
25 directly. So sometimes we have a victim and the mother

1 and father are separated, no longer together. You may
2 contact the mother, but the father would be upset that we
3 didn't contact him. We would prefer that they would share
4 the information between each other, but sometimes that
5 doesn't happen and I have had those instances, and I
6 would explain to the other parent, and I would explain to
7 my OIC, update this person also, so it is a work in
8 progress, but we are continuing to build on it. And like
9 I say, that's something that's very important to me that
10 the victim's family understand that we do care and we do
11 take this seriously.

12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you.

13 VICE-CHAIR JONES: All right. Thank you, sir. Do we
14 have Commissioner Shirley Burch, District 3? Was she able
15 to get back on with us?

16 MRS. WHITE: She's available.

17 VICE-CHAIR JONES: She's available. All right. The
18 Chair recognizes Commissioner Shirley Burch. Do you have
19 any questions for the Chief?

20 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Can you hear me, Co-Chair?

21 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Yes, we can hear you just fine.

22 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Much better.

23 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Very good. I apologize for this
24 technology but I also want to thank Commissioner Davis. I
25 also want to think of Mr. Davis, I'm going to have to be

1 on somebody's phone to be able to respond to what's going
2 on. To Chair Holley and to my colleagues, especially to
3 you, Chief White. Congratulations on your position.

4 CHIEF WHITE: Thank you.

5 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Now I want to start first with
6 you, Chief White, the positive side. Okay. Can you hear
7 me?

8 CHIEF WHITE: I can, ma'am.

9 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Very good again, I want to say
10 regarding the traffic Officer Robbins that is assigned
11 over in the 11th Precinct. He does a fantastic job, but
12 whenever he leaves Chief White, it's like the criminals
13 are aware he's gone and they come back and still do their
14 speeding and their donuts. So it's unfortunate we do not
15 have more like Commissioner Brown was saying about the
16 officer over there giving tickets, tickets, tickets. So
17 the criminals are very smart and knowing that when
18 Officer Robbins is not there Chief White, they come right
19 back and start their same routine.

20 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Okay. So I don't know what your
21 solution is to stop that. Now, the other thing about
22 recruiting, I spoke to Sergeant Hall. Excellent,
23 excellent conversation about the recruiting that I
24 reached out to him, which he already knew that there are
25 many businesses, especially the supermarkets that can

1 utilize the front of their store, where they can have a
2 table to register citizens. So we're out of here to help
3 you Chief White, but you got to recognize your help, just
4 like Captain Blackwell is working very good with the
5 community. This is why we wanted to speak to you again,
6 Dr. Griffin and Reverend McBride about the weakness in
7 number 11. So here's the negative, where we are trying to
8 serve, blend in the gas station with our beautification
9 project. Captain Blackwell is aware. You just heard
10 Commissioner Bell speak above the gas station. There's a
11 way to hold them accountable, but in a very nice way, not
12 a mean way, but we have letters out from the mayor's
13 office.

14 COMMISSIONER BURCH: We have letters from the
15 community that we want you to be a part of our community.
16 Speaking to that gas station manager also AC LeValley. So
17 sir, we're here to help you. I want you to be aware that
18 we are not trying to take things from you. So this is why
19 Dr. Griffin, and I want to make it perfectly clear with
20 you that leadership starts at the top like you. And
21 that's why we speak about number 11 so much that now I'm
22 sorry to hear sir, about what's his name Lieutenant?
23 What's his name that got in trouble, assault and he was
24 suspended? Duncan, Lieutenant Duncan. I'm sorry to hear
25 that, but he has done what he has done and I know you're

1 going to take care of it. Now, I would like to hear your
2 response to what I said, please, Chief White. Thank you.

3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you, Commissioner Burch.

4 CHIEF WHITE: Through the Chair, Commissioner. So my
5 expectation for the command is regardless of which
6 officer is doing the enforcement that you have the same
7 consistency in policing. Certainly, the officer has to
8 take some time off. But if it's a problem that is, you
9 know, 16 hours long, and we've only had 8 hours of
10 coverage, then we need to speak with that command
11 officer. And in addition to that, as you're aware, ma'am,
12 we met two weeks ago and we have a follow-up meeting
13 upcoming to discuss our outcomes from the previous
14 meeting. So I'll be looking forward to talking to you.
15 And I apologize, there were two other people on the call
16 but I cannot remember the names right now. But I mean, no
17 disrespect with that. I just got... What is it? Pastor
18 Griffin, and then there was one other pastor.

19 COMMISSIONER BURCH: It was Reverend McBride.

20 CHIEF WHITE: Yes. So I look forward to meeting with
21 you again, because remember this next meeting is to talk
22 through what has happened since the time we've last met.

23 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you. Thank you very much.

24 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Through the Chair. I turn the
25 meeting back over to you.

1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you. Thank you Vice-Chair
2 Jones. Thank you all Commissioners as well. Just quickly,
3 it's a bit long, and I appreciate your patience with all
4 of us, but there are 2 or 3 kids that have been killed
5 because of malfunction, all the buttons gone. I raised
6 about \$60,000 a couple of years ago. I came to the police
7 department asking, I wanted to use it to buy back guns.
8 My understanding was that the department felt like it
9 just doesn't work. And I respect whatever you guys say,
10 but I gave it back. The other thing is, so if you're not
11 going to let me buy back guns, Commissioner Linda, then
12 why can't we do something about giving triggers, what are
13 they calling them Mr. Bell?

14 COMMISSIONER BELL: Gun locks.

15 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: And see if we can do that. And
16 try, you know, we did 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, or 11 years ago,
17 but in other words, we have to do something and I know we
18 can't do everything and I can understand, but tell me
19 your feelings about buying guns back and I'm okay with
20 that. I think Commissioner Linda will be okay with that.
21 But what about at least trading off for trigger locks?

22 CHIEF WHITE: Through the Chair? I think the trigger
23 locks are fantastic ideas. Statistically, the buyback
24 programs just don't prove valuable. We find people are
25 truly not taking the guns, who they're going to use to

1 make poor decisions or leave unsecure for children. And
2 those are not the weapons that we're getting back in gun
3 buybacks. Those are just simply not the case. We look at
4 the data and see the impact to the community right after
5 the buyback program. And it just doesn't bear out the
6 value add. However, what does work is education and gun
7 locks and statistically that works. And what we have,
8 particularly with this young child today, who I just
9 updated will in fact survive. We just have poor gun
10 ownership. I mean, people are making poor choices. I
11 mean, you just can't leave a gun around a kid, the kid
12 finds it and pulls the trigger. So gun locks help you
13 know, at least for a while, gun safes, help and
14 education.

15 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Would you like for us to help
16 you with that. Do we have the money for that? Do you want
17 us to try to get the money for you?

18 CHIEF WHITE: We have some, we've given them out when
19 we go on foot beats, and we pass them out, knock on doors
20 and give them to the people. But we can host an opportunity
21 to come into your church or other churches and other
22 community areas and give out gun locks.

23 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Will you think about that, I see
24 Commissioner Bell ---

25 CHIEF WHITE: I'm already done thinking about it. I

1 think it will work, but the other piece of it is
2 education.

3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Sure, it goes with it, no doubt
4 about it.

5 CHIEF WHITE: I mean, a public service announcement,
6 talking through the statistics of how many kids are
7 killed by finding their parents' guns. You know, kids are
8 super smart, you know, we don't think so, but they know
9 that it's under the bed. They know that it's in the
10 nightstand and you leave them at home. Then they start
11 playing around and you know, there, you have it.

12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much,

13 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Mr. Chair.

14 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Who is speaking?

15 COMMISSIONER BELL: Mr. Chair, I wanted to,

16 COMMISSIONER HOLT: I was speaking.

17 COMMISSIONER BELL: Go ahead. Go ahead, you have the
18 floor.

19 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Thank you. Chair Holley, if we
20 can revisit, earlier this year, Commander Hope was very
21 aggressive in the gunlock program. And I know over in our
22 district in Precinct 8, we had several events whereby she
23 was supporting neighbors coming into various places and
24 collecting the gun locks. So my point here is that it's
25 all ongoing.

1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I guess what I'm trying to say,
2 Chief, and to Commissioner, sometimes you just need to
3 put it on a priority list. You know, in other words, do a
4 campaign, you know what I mean?

5 CHIEF WHITE: I do.

6 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: We do it, but we need to do it,
7 do it. Do you know what I mean? So I'm just saying to
8 you, this is the best I can say to you that you're doing
9 it, but we need a campaign. Commissioner Bell.

10 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Absolutely.

11 COMMISSIONER BELL: Mr. Chair, I just want to put
12 this gun back to rest. It comes up in 4 or 5 meetings.
13 And I agree with the Chief. I took a deep dive in the
14 research in reference to that matter. It does not work.
15 It's as simple as that. So we need to just move on and
16 buyback programs. If it worked we would've used it a long
17 time ago, but it doesn't work. And gun locks are out
18 there, every setting almost in the community. So they are
19 pushing hard on that. But ownership of guns is extremely
20 high in the black community. Now, according to another
21 study for some females buying more guns. So it's there,
22 but the Chief indicated awareness, education, but a whole
23 lot of people just are not responsible anymore. Thank
24 you, Mr. Chair.

25

1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you very much. Thank you,
2 Chief.

3 CHIEF WHITE: Finally, one last thing. I'd be remiss
4 if I didn't mention I'm going to do it quickly. It's been
5 a long meeting. 50 officers, including police officers,
6 lieutenants, various command officers and a deputy chief
7 started Cleary University yesterday in pursuit of their
8 undergrad and graduate degrees. Could not have been
9 prouder. We partnered with Cleary. We did something out
10 of the box. We've got classes being held off duty at our
11 academy. So the officers are able to get off of work and
12 go right to our academy and get educated. And as we all
13 know, there's no more of an empowering moment than when
14 you received that degree. And I want to publicly thank
15 Lieutenant Mark Young, who is just so incredibly
16 passionate about education. It was him who brought Cleary
17 to the table. We had a quick meeting, we signed the
18 agreement and these officers will have their degrees in a
19 year. It's just so incredible.

20 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Chief White, I'm cheering.

21 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much. Thank all of
22 you. A presentation at this particular time. And if you
23 could please in terms of the police chaplain.

24 MRS. WHITE: Through the Chair.

25 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes.

1 MRS. WHITE: Yes, sir. The Resolution for Corporal
2 Khalil J. Biddle.

3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay. So it's not on me, I'm
4 sorry. That's not on me, but who did you give it to?

5 MRS. WHITE: Commissioner Hernandez has volunteered
6 to read.

7 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I don't mind that, he's a good
8 reader. Commissioner.

9 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Through the Chair.
10 Resolution honoring Corporal Kahlil J. Biddle
11 posthumously.

12 WHEREAS, Khalil J. Biddle was appointed to the
13 Detroit Police Department on May 12th, 1997. Upon
14 graduating from the Metropolitan Police Academy. Officer
15 Biddle began his career at the 10th Precinct; and,

16 WHEREAS Officer Biddle dutifully served the 10th
17 Precinct Western District and the 10th Precinct, again.
18 Officer Biddle displayed tremendous knowledge and
19 leadership skills as an officer and earned promotion to
20 the rank of corporal on October 18th, 2018. On Tuesday,
21 August 17th, 2021 Corpora Kahlil Biddle, badge 4298
22 passed away; and,

23 WHEREAS during his law enforcement career, Corporal
24 Biddle was the deserving recipient of many honors. His
25 recognitions include a Chief's Unit Award, the Aretha

1 Franklin Funeral Recognition Award, both Consent Judgment
2 Awards, The Major League Baseball All-star Recognition
3 Award, The Rosa Parks Funeral Recognition Award, The
4 Super Bowl XL Recognition Award and numerous letters of
5 commendation from citizens and superiors; and,

6 WHEREAS Corporal Biddle passionately served the
7 Detroit Police Department and the citizens of Detroit,
8 his professionalism, commitment to public service,
9 integrity and dedication were credited to the Detroit
10 Police Department. He was highly respected by his peers
11 as a consummate professional.

12 NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED That the Detroit Board
13 of Police Commissioners speaking for the citizens of
14 Detroit and the Detroit Police Department awards this
15 Resolution posthumously in recognition of Corporal Kahlil
16 Biddle and his more than 24 years of dedicated and
17 diligent, public service. His professionalism, integrity,
18 and standard of commitment to the City of Detroit and its
19 citizens merit our highest regards. We salute Corporal J.
20 Biddle for a job well done.

21 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Through the Chair.

22 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes.

23 COMMISSIONER HOLT: I move that we adopt the
24 Resolution just shared by Commissioner Hernandez in honor
25 of Corporal Biddle.

1 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Second.

2 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Support.

3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: It's been properly moved and
4 second. All in favor, say aye.

5 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

6 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Oppose. It is so ordered and
7 will be put in the record. I have no further... if I go
8 down to the presentation with the chaplain Corps. Thank
9 you for being here.

10 SENIOR CORPORAL BARTELL: Good evening. Police
11 Commissioner. My name is Senior Corporal Douglas Bartell
12 and I'm the liaison for the chaplain Corps. We have the
13 best chaplain Corps, far none.

14 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: That's great. Are you a
15 preacher?

16 SENIOR CORPORAL BARTELL: No, I'm not a preacher, but
17 I have family members as preachers.

18 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: That's good. The other two
19 people with you are preachers.

20 SENIOR CORPORAL BARTELL: Yes, they're ministers.

21 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I'm just saying, they got 10
22 minutes.

23 SENIOR CORPORAL BARTELL: Yes, we know.

24 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I do want to make sure they
25 don't start hooping and going on. They got 10 minutes.

1 Okay.

2 SENIOR CORPORAL BARTELL: I just want to acknowledge
3 them for the good work that they have done and I get all
4 kinds of calls during the middle of the night and I
5 called them and they were Johnny-on-the-spot. But I just
6 want to get a little small synopsis of what they do. For
7 instance, on August 3rd, they had the national night out
8 and that was one of the big things we had in the city.
9 And they were at all of the Precincts. Also on August
10 10th, at 23600 Grand River there was a shooting where
11 there was a deceased person on the ground. All 3 or 4
12 chaplains were there. August 21st, Corporal Biddle came
13 in from Florida. They were there at the funeral home
14 awaiting his remains. We had about 10 chaplains there.
15 The 25th of this month, back to school prayers at the old
16 Tiger stadium, we had 8 chaplains there, the 25th also,
17 which was yesterday at Henry Ford Hospital, we had an
18 officer that was ill, we had 5 or 6 chaplains there. And
19 then yesterday we're on the 21st. she had also made her
20 transition, the chaplains were there. Every time they
21 call me from notification to control, I call my chaplains
22 and they are there on the spot. So I just want to
23 congratulate them and they're going to report out. Thank
24 you.

1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: What is your name for the
2 record?

3 SENIOR CORPORAL BARTELL: My name is Senior Corporal
4 Douglas Bartell.

5 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Very good.

6 SENIOR CORPORAL BARTELL: Chief neighborhood liaison.

7 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: All right. And I see on your
8 handout, you got character commitment and chemistry. I
9 know of character, I know of commitment, but what is
10 chemistry?

11 SENIOR CORPORAL BARTELL: Chemistry is how they
12 interact with the citizens in the City of Detroit, the
13 officers, the command structure, and with themselves.
14 That's what chemistry is all about.

15 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: It's relational.

16 SENIOR CORPORAL BARTELL: Yes, it is.

17 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay. Thank you so much.

18 CHIEF CHAPLAIN CALDWELL: Good evening to our
19 distinguished Police Commissioners. We thank you.
20 Protocol has been established and we thank God for this
21 opportunity to present the Corps to you. Today, I have my
22 First Assistant Chief Avis Taylor here and also my
23 Assistant Chief, Deputy Chief Devay Myatt. I mean
24 Assistant Chief Devay Myatt which our protocol, which
25 are... I had this perfect sermon, and I just found out I

1 couldn't preach it. So I want to yield my time to our
2 Assistant Chief Devay Myatt.

3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: But I see you run it like most
4 churches, you have so many assistants with you.

5 ASSISTANT CHIEF MYATT: Amen. Thank you, Chief
6 Lennell Caldwell certainly appreciate you and this
7 Honorable Chair, Honorable Board. We thank God for each
8 of you. Of course, we always thank God for our new Chief.
9 We want to publicly congratulate him. As I make the
10 presentation, we know that our time is short. Our First
11 Assistant is going to pass out the complete PowerPoint to
12 you. And I'm going to share with you in part. I'm not
13 sure,

14 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Ms. White, you will have
15 somebody...

16 MRS. WHITE: Yes, it is posted.

17 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: It's posted.

18 ASSISTANT CHIEF MYATT: All right. Amen. Thank you so
19 much. Once again, we certainly thank God for our
20 community as well as the City of Detroit. But simply the
21 leadership of the Detroit Police Department and the
22 Detroit Police Chaplain Corps, of course, our whole aim
23 is to acquire those who are committed and have the
24 chemistry and character that president just spoke of. And
25 I'm just speaking in general to some of this, because I

1 know that our time is short. So I'm just going to move
2 right along. Our mission statement is promoting a more
3 positive relationship between members of the Detroit
4 Police Department and community aiding and fostering a
5 personal growth of law enforcement officers, rendering
6 spiritual guidance where it is needed. Of course, that's
7 our whole objective is to make that connection with not
8 just our police department, but of course our community.
9 Our Chief has a vision statement that is very clear and
10 simple, but yet profound.

11 ASSISTANT CHIEF MYATT: It is. I believe he says that
12 we have a perfect machine in place to run our chaplain
13 Corps. My role as Chief Chaplain is to enhance the vision
14 that we have and to tweak what components that are not
15 working effectively so that we can operate in the spirit
16 of excellence. We must raise the bar high to accomplish
17 these goals. We aim to make a mark in the lives of others
18 that will never be erased. And of course we do take the
19 time to honor our okay, our rank and file, and of course,
20 the order that was reordered for us is out of order based
21 upon what is showing there. Okay. So again, I thank you
22 so much First Assistance, but our vision is very clear.
23 Of course it has just been shared with you, moving
24 forward. Again, we do thank God for our new Chief and
25 these are the individuals that we're reporting to

1 directly.

2 ASSISTANT CHIEF MYATT: And of course, you had an
3 opportunity to hear from our Liaison, Corporal Douglas
4 Bartell, who was a great instrument as it relates to the
5 Chaplain Corps, being able to do what she's able to do.
6 And of course you had a chance as well to meet our Chief,
7 Chief Lennell Caldwell and our First Assisted Avis
8 Taylor. And sir, we certainly thank God for you. Of
9 course, you see me at the end there. I've had a little
10 haircut to modify some things. All right. I do want to
11 add that our structure for the Chaplain Corps is set up
12 to mimic the Detroit Police Department in every Precinct.
13 We cover all 12 Precincts. At each Precinct we have one
14 deputy chief. One deputy chief covers 2 Precincts. We
15 have a commander at each Precinct and in each Precinct we
16 have approximately 4 to 8 chaplains that cover all roll
17 calls.

18 ASSISTANT CHIEF MYATT: So all roll calls are covered
19 by our Chaplain Corps. Moving right along here, our
20 history is very complete. We began in 1949 with 3
21 chaplains that were appointed by the Board of
22 Commissioners. Of course police chaplains were made
23 official by the city ordinance by January, 1975. And of
24 course so many people don't know that, that we are part
25 of the city ordinance. To date, we have approximately 102

1 chaplains that are part of our Corps. In fact, making us
2 one of the largest chaplain Corps in our nation. To date,
3 we have 2 police chaplains who have been killed or die in
4 the line of duty. And we do take the time to pause and
5 thank God for each of them. Chaplain William Paris and
6 Chaplain Commander Valerie Parks who served our Chaplain
7 Corps until her death.

8 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Can you give me like 60 seconds
9 on how a chaplain gets killed in line of duty?

10 ASSISTANT CHIEF MYATT: Yes. In this particular case,
11 they were a part of the Chaplain Corps when they were
12 deceased. So we consider them as they were...

13 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Oh, okay. All right. Gotcha.

14 ASSISTANT CHIEF MYATT: All right. The Detroit Police
15 Chaplain qualifications for the Board's knowledge, all of
16 our chaplains have to have 5 years ordination of their
17 faith. There is a federal and department criminal
18 background check for each of them. They must have a valid
19 driver's license, 3 character reference letters, letters
20 from the ministry covering interviews from our executive
21 team, one year probation before they receive a Detroit
22 Police chaplain badge. And then of course, after that,
23 we're looking for that commitment, character and
24 chemistry that you so eloquently say, sir. The training
25 that is required for all of our chaplains, not some, all

1 102 of our chaplains have gone through these trainings,
2 CPR, mental health awareness, gunshot wound, and
3 tourniquet, Narcan, firearm, ceasefire, schisms,
4 debriefing, pulse, military drilling, senior abuse and
5 aging training, domestic violence. And then of course,
6 one of our favorites is aftercare. So our chaplains are
7 well-trained and qualified for this. And let me just add
8 that these pastors and elders and ministers that are part
9 of the Corps, that does not complete the core, of course
10 we have Imans, we have priests that are part of the Corps
11 as well.

12 ASSISTANT CHIEF MYATT: Continuing on the course, let
13 me add to the Detroit Police roles and responsibilities.
14 Of course, the number one role is to bridge the gap
15 between police and community, to exhibit the ministry of
16 presence, to serve our officers, our police and their
17 families, to assist at crime scenes and to comfort
18 families of the victims, to render prayer at police board
19 commission meetings weekly. And then of course, to
20 respond to the death notice of the Detroit Police
21 Department and to pray at roll call, which include every
22 Precinct and headquarters and to officiate funerals,
23 weddings of the Detroit Police Department. So as you see,
24 we are quite stretched.

25 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: That's good.

1 ASSISTANT CHIEF MYATT: Our Precinct assignments, of
2 course, I just shared with you earlier is that we cover
3 all Precincts with all ranks and files, but not only
4 that, but all of our chaplains are committed to 16 hours
5 per month that they log in at the Precincts. And this
6 does not include the scene calls that they're called to,
7 the emergency calls that they receive on a regular basis.
8 Just to recap for a work day in the life of a chaplain,
9 of course, we attend all visual, prayer visuals of
10 officers and victims of crimes. We attend all police
11 academy, graduations and promotions to render invocation
12 and even sing the national anthem, complete minimum
13 again, 16 hours at Precincts and the headquarters. We're
14 called to crime scenes, hospital runs, hostage
15 negotiation, and barricades. We attend debriefings with
16 officers for crimes and shootings. And of course complete
17 aftercare to all victims that we serve. At this time, if
18 there are any questions from this Honorable Board, we
19 will address and take that at this time. Thank you for
20 your time in allowing us this privilege.

21 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Any questions Commissioners?

22 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Mr. Chairman, I just have a
23 comment.

24 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Me too.

25 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Let me get to Bell and then I'll

1 come right back to you.

2 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, Mr. Chair. I just
3 think we need to clarify Chaplain Park's death. It was in
4 the line of duty, if I recall. I'd like the source to do
5 a little research. If I recall it was more or less at a
6 crime scene, barricade and gun situation. So I don't want
7 that to go past, let's make sure we clarify that
8 particular matter. That was a heroic act on his part
9 being at a crime scene.

10 ASSISTANT CHIEF MYATT: That is correct, sir. You're
11 absolutely correct.

12 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you.

13 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Brown.

14 COMMISSIONER BROWN: I just wanted to thank them and
15 let the public know the wonderful job that the chaplain
16 Corps does. At the death of my nephew, they came here in
17 this very room, they prayed with me, they prayed for my
18 family and I believe Chief Taylor was even at the
19 funeral. And I really appreciate that and I never forgot
20 it. And my family were very comforted by their presence.
21 And I really appreciate that. And just thank you.
22 Continue doing the work that you're doing.

23 ASSISTANT CHIEF MYATT: Thank you, sir.

24 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: There's a chaplain, his last
25 name is Bush?

1 ASSISTANT CHIEF MYATT: Yes.

2 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: So can you go through the
3 Secretary, let her know what's going on with that and let
4 me know through her what's going on. Just let me know
5 what's going on.

6 ASSISTANT CHIEF MYATT: Awesome.

7 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay.

8 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Chairman?

9 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes, just quickly. I just want
10 to thank you for your presentation and for being so
11 tremendously professional. No one has brought us a
12 package and a pen so that we could take notes as you
13 continued. It was truly... I know your men and women of
14 the cloth, but this was truly a corporate presentation.
15 Thank you so much.

16 ASSISTANT CHIEF MYATT: Thank you.

17 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Through the Chair.

18 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Sure.

19 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Just a quick comment, whatever.
20 Out in the field, out in the streets, I have had several
21 experiences where I did work with the chaplain Corps.
22 They showed up, they comforted the family and was able to
23 basically just give some order, do a prayer visual, and
24 order to a Memorial service or whatever. So I want to
25 thank you for the job that you do out in the community,

1 each and every one of you for what you do. It's wonderful
2 work or whatever. God bless you and continue to do work
3 that serves the community.

4 ASSISTANT CHIEF MYATT: Thank you.

5 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: If you stay in any longer I'm
6 going to have to charge you, okay.

7 MRS. WHITE: Mr. Chair,

8 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes.

9 MRS. WHITE: Commissioner Burch has questions as
10 well.

11 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Burch, you have a
12 question?

13 COMMISSIONER BURCH: I'm sorry to laugh, but I just
14 want to say to the Chief Chaplain Caldwell, I had the
15 honor of speaking with you. I don't think we ever met
16 face to face, but I met you through a phone call
17 regarding the 11th Precinct, when we did what we call the
18 senior drive by. Do you remember that conversation? And
19 we needed chaplains?

20 CHIEF CHAPLAIN CALDWELL: Yes, ma'am I do.

21 COMMISSIONER BURCH: I want to thank you for that
22 because I was unaware of how that role is played in a
23 Precinct. So you shared so much with me and then sir,
24 your Assistant Chaplain Taylor that is an excellent
25 superb lady that has attended our functions at Dad Butler

1 Park. She is so open, so beautiful. Isn't she the one
2 with the angelic voice?

3 CHIEF CHAPLAIN CALDWELL: Yes, she is.

4 COMMISSIONER BURCH: I just wanted everybody to know.
5 You don't know who you're dealing with. This is about the
6 best Chaplain Corps you're ever going to see. And I'm the
7 one that was pushing it, sir. That's how you all should
8 get compensated. So maybe Reverend Holley can work
9 something out that even if it's twice a year, give you
10 something monetarily.

11 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: All right. Thank you,
12 Commissioner. Thank you so much.

13 COMMISSIONER BURCH Thanks you Chaplain. And then
14 let's talk later about Whitepaul. I want to talk about
15 Cedric Whitepaul. I thank you so much Chair for being
16 patient.

17 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much as well.
18 Commissioner Burton.

19 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Yes. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.
20 Chief Caldwell. I love your presentation that you and
21 your team had put together to share with the Board of
22 Police Commissioners today. I'm very familiar with your
23 work that you and your team often provide here in the
24 City of Detroit. I really love what you are doing. Please
25 keep up the good work and I am so proud of each and every

1 one of our Police Chaplains and especially you Chief
2 Caldwell. Thank you.

3 CHIEF CHAPLAIN CALDWELL: Thank you, sir.

4 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I thank all you very much. Thank
5 you so much. Thank you very much. You can take your
6 picture. A presentation from the Office of the Chief
7 Investigator. Thank you, Ms. Blossom. Mr. Akbar.

8 FIRST ASSISTANT CHIEF CHAPLAIN TAYLOR: In closing, I
9 just want to let you know that we do have a manual that
10 we have put together for every chaplain so that when they
11 come in, they know, and we have a directory of bio on
12 every chaplain.

13 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Is it here?

14 FIRST ASSISTANT CHIEF CHAPLAIN TAYLOR: No, we need
15 funds to have these printed, but we have a directory and
16 a bio of every chaplain in the Corps and so we wanted to
17 present that to you when we get them printed.

18 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you.

19 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Thank you.

20 FIRST ASSISTANT CHIEF CHAPLAIN TAYLOR: And then
21 we're also waiting for the Baltimore Police Chaplains to
22 come and they're asking us to train them and they'll be
23 here on the weekend of September the 17th. There are 20
24 of them that are coming.

1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you. Thank you very much.
2 I thank you very much for your patience. Mr. Akbar, you
3 may begin and make your introductions.

4 INTERIM CHIEF INVESTIGATOR AKBAR: Good afternoon
5 Honorable Board.

6 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Good afternoon.

7 INTERIM CHIEF INVESTIGATOR AKBAR: I'm Lawrence
8 Akbar, the Interim Chief Investigator. In your package,
9 you have the Office of the Chief Investigator, July, 2021
10 citizen complaint report.

11 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Who is with you?

12 INTERIM CHIEF INVESTIGATOR AKBAR: Acting supervisor,
13 investigator Madrigal. As a matter of fact, if it hadn't
14 been for her, I wouldn't be able to put this with this
15 stuff together.

16 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Can you speak a little louder?

17 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Your microphone is not...

18 INTERIM CHIEF INVESTIGATOR AKBAR: Okay, is this
19 better?

20 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes.

21 INTERIM CHIEF INVESTIGATOR AKBAR: Okay. Great. The
22 first slide OCI received 102 complaints during July of 20
23 21, 8 less than July of 2020. This chart shows how and
24 where citizens file complaints. OCI received the most
25 telephone complaints. Most of theirs are telephone

1 complaints. 38 out of 56 calls during July. This chart
2 shows the number of complaints filed against commands. Of
3 the two large two largest commands in terms of receiving
4 complaints are the 6th and the 8th. 67 complaints were
5 closed in July, involving 78 allegations. The top two
6 allegations are procedure violations and demeanor
7 violations

8 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: What is the procedure about,
9 give me an example?

10 INTERIM CHIEF INVESTIGATOR AKBAR: Procedure
11 violations are traffic stops where the complainant led
12 citations, where unjustly issued, situations where
13 complainants claimed that the police stopped them for no
14 reason. And people complained that they didn't like the
15 way the police department handled their particular
16 situation, when they responded to their home.

17 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you.

18 INTERIM CHIEF INVESTIGATOR AKBAR: 30 incidents were
19 closed in July involving a DPD member equipped with a
20 body-worn camera. 25 were captured by the body-worn
21 camera in the month of July. I'm going to go over briefly
22 with you, letting you know the violations of DPD policy
23 that our members have committed in the past. Members fail
24 not to turn on their body-worn cameras during an
25 incident, members fail to turn their body-worn cameras

1 off. They turned their body-worn cameras off before they
2 completed their investigation. Members failed not to
3 report a malfunction to a supervisor, failed to obtain a
4 functional body-worn camera and last but not least the
5 member failed to document the malfunction on their
6 activity log sheet. If an officer violates department
7 body-worn camera policy, they may be subject to
8 discipline, including, but not limited to termination.

9 INTERIM CHIEF INVESTIGATOR AKBAR: 79 DPD members
10 identified in the 67 complaints closed in July, looking
11 at the pie chart concerning rank. We have 58 police
12 officers, 9 lieutenants and 6 sergeants. Seniority wise,
13 23 police officers had less than 2 years. 19 members had
14 3 to 4 years, 11 members had 5 to 9 years, and then it
15 shoots back up. 17 officers had 20 to 29 years, received
16 complaints.

17 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Do you remember what the claim
18 was about the commander? Do you remember that?

19 INTERIM CHIEF INVESTIGATOR AKBAR: No, not often. DVD
20 calls for service complaints closed in July. 48 DPD
21 members working the afternoon shift during the time of
22 their incident, 3 to 4 years seniority, we had 16
23 officers, less than two years, 16 officers. The majority
24 of the complaints that I'm having with these officers are
25 occurring on the afternoon shift and the power shift,

1 which is the power shift generally runs from 7:00 PM to
2 3:00 AM. And those officers are not in full uniform. They
3 wear a modified uniform. In the old days, we called them
4 the 30 series. I'm going to give you an update on the OCI
5 staff and case status report. As of August the 26th,
6 2021. OCI staff on rotation. We have 12 investigators and
7 supervisory staff dealing with cases. As you well know,
8 we just hired two investigators and they started on
9 August the 23rd, 2021. And the thing that I'm really
10 proud of is one of the investigators, now she started
11 Monday, okay. She completed the case, and turned it in
12 today. The other investigator has worked her case, and
13 she should be turning her case in, in the next couple of
14 days.

15 INTERIM CHIEF INVESTIGATOR AKBAR: HR has reposted
16 the OCI investigator positions, Chair Holley and the
17 Board of Police Commissioners are looking forward to
18 conducting the interviews of qualified candidates,
19 identified HR. And we're also going to be going out into
20 the community and recruiting potential police
21 commissioned investigators working along with Reverend
22 Holley to go into the Arabic community, to attempt to add
23 more diversity to our office. OCI status, statistics as
24 of August 26th and August, 2021, excuse me, we received
25 80 CCRS, 45 and we closed. In 2021, we received up to

1 this date, 862 CCRS received 531 CCRS closed, 646
2 complaints are pending investigation.

3 INTERIM CHIEF INVESTIGATOR AKBAR: At this time we
4 have 369 complaints that are over 90, 280 cases open due
5 to staff separation, 144 of those were over 90, just to
6 clear up matters to let the commission though, and also
7 the residents in the City of Detroit, particularly our
8 customers. With respect to cases that are over 90, I want
9 you to be assured that in the beginning of the
10 investigation, all associated documents, such as the
11 body-worn camera daily activity logs, et cetera,
12 immediately are downloaded and saved into our OCI server.
13 So as soon as they get the case, the first thing the
14 investigators do is obtain those documents, obtain that
15 body-worn camera footage and download it. Complainants
16 are mailed an initial OCI letter acknowledging their
17 complaint along with a copy of their complaint form and
18 the assigned OCI investigators contact information.
19 Investigators, contact complainants and witnesses are
20 identified.

21 INTERIM CHIEF INVESTIGATOR AKBAR: Non-responsive,
22 complainants and witnesses are sent a certified letter.
23 So in the beginning of the case, we try to obtain
24 statements from the complainant and also identify
25 witnesses, and interview those witnesses right away. Last

1 but not least, which is very important to the community.
2 There are 5 different ways that you can file a complaint
3 with my office. You can do it in person by appearing at
4 900 Merrill Plaisance. It's located in Palmer Park. You
5 can also register a complaint by phone. You can call us
6 at (313)- 596-2499, (313). There will be someone there at
7 our complaint desk to take your complaint between the
8 hours of 8 and 4. And you still can leave your name and
9 your telephone number on our voicemail. And the next
10 business day, my investigators will contact you. You can
11 also fax your complaint to area code (313) 596 2482. You
12 can also file a complaint online at
13 www.detroitmi.gov/bopc. And you also can file a complaint
14 at any Detroit Police Precinct bureau or section, but
15 please ask to speak to a supervisor and he will take you
16 to a private space within his organization and take your
17 statement. At this time, I thank you for your patience
18 and time, and if you have any questions, I'll be honored
19 to take them.

20 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Do you have any questions,
21 Commissioner Davis?

22 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Yes, I have one question. Can
23 you hear me?

24 INTERIM CHIEF INVESTIGATOR AKBAR: Yes.

25 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: As we bring on more

1 investigators, do you anticipate bringing down the number
2 of cases over 90 days?

3 INTERIM CHIEF INVESTIGATOR AKBAR: Yes. Yes.

4 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: That's it.

5 COMMISSIONER BELL: Mr. Chair.

6 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes, Mr. Brown, Commissioner
7 Bell, excuse me. I'm sorry.

8 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, sir. I just want our
9 Interim Chief Investigator and his staff for doing an
10 excellent job. Unfortunately Ross Jones, Channel 7 did an
11 extensive interview with the chief investigator. I mean
12 Interim Chief Investigator and a Commissioner, and that
13 went out, metropolitan in the State of Michigan and some
14 facts, which you just stated to, we pull those tapes
15 right away. We do A, B and C, and it's unfortunate that
16 we have a Commissioner that speaks to something that he
17 doesn't have any knowledge of. And we can't get a
18 retraction on this setting here. So it's just really, I
19 would hope that in the future, you speak to something
20 that you're not an expert or have some working knowledge
21 on it. You refer to somebody else and give us an
22 opportunity. So once the information is out we can't
23 withdraw it, we don't get a recheck with Channel 7.

24 COMMISSIONER BELL: And I spoke to Mr. Jones. So

1 excellent job on the interview, under the circumstance,
2 but that information went out, we got to do better. And
3 Commissioner Davis, the second issue you raised with the
4 Chief, we are the authority in reference to this matter
5 but I think that the question should more... The charter
6 indicates that all complaints should come to the Board of
7 Police Commissioners. That is not the case. Historically,
8 complaints come to the Chief's Office. Is that correct?

9 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes.

10 COMMISSIONER BELL: And we don't have any knowledge.
11 So that's something we're trying to resolve because the
12 charter states we handle all complaints, not necessarily
13 want to handle it, but I think we need to know the
14 results and who's making the complaints.

15 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: At least.

16 COMMISSIONER BELL: I think there should be a mix and
17 I think we are having a conversation with Chief White on
18 that particular matter. Is that correct?

19 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes.

20 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, Mr. Chair.

21 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much again. Yes,
22 Commissioner Jones. I'm sorry.

23 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Good afternoon, sir. And I want to
24 thank you for the great work that you do over at OCI.
25 Just like pretty much any other department, any of the

1 businesses, any place else that you would go to in the
2 City of Detroit COVID-19 has had an impact on how things
3 are run, the attendance of employees, work production. I
4 mean, any number of things. It covers all areas because
5 the investigators, as I understand it, they have to pull
6 the body-worn camera information. They have to go out to
7 the sites where the person made the complaint scan for
8 witnesses to anything that may have happened. And, you
9 know, a lot of times from what I read the person's not at
10 home. You leave messages, you send registered letters,
11 any number of things that you do to raise the attention
12 of the person that's

13 making the complaint.

14 VICE-CHAIR JONES: So I understand how bad it can
15 kind of slow the process up if you get someone that's not
16 cooperating with the process. Do you imagine that with
17 the addition of these two new investigators that you'd be
18 able to, even before the impact, any kind of cases that
19 are kind of left hanging in the wings right now, and
20 until we can get some resolution, how do you respond to
21 that?

22 INTERIM CHIEF INVESTIGATOR AKBAR: I have no problem.
23 I have all the confidence in the new people that we
24 hired. Like I stated earlier, they hit the ground
25 running. Acting Supervisor, Investigator LiSonya Sloan is

1 training them and we're training them on real cases and
2 they're moving right along. It jumped right in the pool,
3 the deep end and they're swimming.

4 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Thank you for the job you're
5 doing.

6 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: No, thank you.

7 MRS. WHITE: Mr. Chair.

8 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes.

9 MRS. WHITE: Commissioner Burch has questions.

10 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Burch, I'm sorry. I
11 can't see you.

12 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Okay. Can you hear me?

13 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I can hear you though.

14 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Chair Holley. Can you hear me?

15 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes, we can.

16 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Okay. Very good. I wanted to
17 address this to Mr. Akbar that as far as I've asked the
18 question and thank God you answered it today about the
19 body-worn cameras that if not wearing it, they would be
20 somehow penalized, right?

21 INTERIM CHIEF INVESTIGATOR AKBAR: Correct.

22 COMMISSIONER BURCH: That's good. Now, Mr. Akbar, I
23 asked the question before that, how do we handle
24 citizens' complaints as far as calling in to a Precinct.
25 So we know customer service is the best thing we can

1 have, because that's what Chief White said. So if
2 customer service, if there's a recording of the
3 conversation with the officer and the citizen is on
4 record. So could you tell me now if that's true, does
5 each Precinct have a recording? And then I got one more
6 question.

7 INTERIM CHIEF INVESTIGATOR AKBAR: The phones that,
8 from my understanding that are recorded at the precinct
9 are at the front desk, the front desk phones, and
10 particularly the supervisor's station.

11 COMMISSIONER BURCH: They are recorded?

12 INTERIM CHIEF INVESTIGATOR AKBAR: They're recorded.

13 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Okay. Very good. Now the next
14 thing is Mr. Chair.

15 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes, ma'am.

16 COMMISSIONER BURCH: I just want to say to my good
17 friend, Commissioner Bell that I love the way that he
18 supports Mr. Akbar. So I'm just asking you Commissioner
19 Bell, would you support me with your Precinct, trying to
20 speak to the captain about the gas stations that we have
21 in District 3. So could you support me and have that
22 captain call me? That's a favor to Commissioner Burch,
23 Commissioner Bell.

24 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: He stepped out, Commissioner.

25 COMMISSIONER BURCH: He stepped out. Well, give it to

1 him when he comes back, all right.

2 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I will, I'll make sure Ms. White
3 gives it to him, okay? Thank you so much, Commissioner.
4 Thank you. Thank you so much.

5 INTERIM CHIEF INVESTIGATOR AKBAR: Thank you.

6 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioners. I really want to
7 fill all these positions by November 1st. If you can just
8 help get these positions filled. The lawyer, the
9 secretary of the investigators, all of that, so we can
10 really move forward. I think we can do that and do it
11 aggressively, but at the same time, with integrity. So I
12 just ask you to help me with that. And I met with several
13 people that I feel will be appreciative if we do this.
14 And so I'm just asking you, if you would, please help me
15 with that. I thank all of you for your questions. And
16 also for the time that you spent here. Madam Secretary,
17 you may make your report.

18 MRS. WHITE: Yes sir. Through the Chair.

19 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: We don't have a closed session,
20 do we?

21 MRS. WHITE: Yes sir, there is a closed session.

22 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: You kidding me?

23 MRS. WHITE: Yes. Just Honorable Board. The incoming
24 information and reports are listed on the agenda for
25 today for the public's viewing. And I will not go into

1 specific details, but just drawing your attention to the
2 lawsuits that came in from the City of Detroit Law
3 Department, items 3 through 5 lawsuits filed by Michael
4 Robinson versus City of Detroit, Danielle Deisch vs
5 Careema Michelle Yopp, and Carol Galloway vs. City of
6 Detroit. Also the Honorable Board, we received DPD
7 recruitment, flyers for distribution, and as well as
8 Mayor Duggan's letter of appointment for Chief of Police,
9 James E. White. And just to note, a few updates regarding
10 the NACOLEES 2021 conference update. The conference is
11 underway, it's in its second week. The conference theme
12 this year is Civilian Oversight as a Permanent Part of
13 Public Safety, where over 32 conference trainings are
14 taking place Monday through Friday until October 7th,
15 2021.

16 MRS. WHITE: And the Board's staff has shared a
17 summary highlights from this week's conference sessions,
18 covering a range of topics under the themes of reform and
19 transformative change and policing innovations in
20 oversight, strengthening the work of civilian oversight
21 and international oversight, as well as jail and prison
22 oversight. So please check your inboxes for that
23 information. And lastly, in keeping with the theme stated
24 earlier regarding civilian oversight as a permanent part
25 of public safety, this week Chief White invited the

1 Board's administrative staff to meet with the
2 department's new executive manager of policy, Ms. Raven
3 Alford. During that meeting, we discussed the Board's
4 policy approval process, strategies for enhancing the
5 department and the Board's work on DPDs policies and
6 procedures and alignment with section 7-803 of the city
7 charter and other key updates. So we are remaining busy
8 with respect to DPD policy and making sure that you have
9 the information that you need. Please note that the Board
10 still has 4 policies that are waiting for approval and
11 they will be scheduled for approval for the September 9th
12 Board meeting. And that concludes the incoming
13 information for this week.

14 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you, Ms. White.
15 Commissioner Bell, there's a conference coming up at the
16 end of the year.

17 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes, sir.

18 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: And I'm concerned when I look at
19 the budget, I'm concerned where we are. So can you work
20 with Mrs. White, let's find out who wants to go and
21 report it to to me, and then I might be able to show it
22 to the, to the Commissioners, but you have the seniority
23 around here, so if you and Ms. White, I just want to make
24 sure who wants to go and who don't want to go, can't
25 move, those kind of things because the money is short. We

1 may have to move some stuff around. I don't know, but I
2 looked at the budget and I just don't want to wait until
3 the last minute and then try to work this thing out. Yes
4 Commissioner Brown.

5 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Mr. Chairman, I need to be
6 excused.

7 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay. You've done very well
8 today. I'm very proud of you.

9 COMMISSIONER BELL: Mr. Chair. I think Ms. White has
10 an action item that we need to address. Is that correct?

11 MRS. WHITE: Correct. Regarding remote meetings,
12 whether to continue or we zoom remote meetings or have
13 hybrid meetings, which would consist of this format, the
14 in person and remote. So it's two options that you have
15 to choose from.

16 COMMISSIONER BELL: Mr. Chairman, if it's
17 appropriate, I'd like to make a motion that,

18 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Can I hear it first, before you
19 make it?

20 COMMISSIONER BELL: I'm supporting virtual meetings.
21 All virtual meetings.

22 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay.

23 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Second.

24 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Sorry, what did he say?

25 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: He wants virtual meetings.

1 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Oh, virtual. I didn't
2 understand.

3 COMMISSIONER BELL: That would be.

4 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: How long you want it. I just
5 don't like it, but I'll do what the people say.

6 COMMISSIONER CARTER: September to December 2021.

7 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Can we do a hybrid?

8 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Hybrid would be lovely.

9 COMMISSIONER BELL: I think that the situation that
10 we are dealing with, all the meetings would be virtual in
11 terms of the reality, look what we have here, nobody's
12 here.

13 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: But they're online.

14 COMMISSIONER BELL: That's the point. They have a
15 hundred people online.

16 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay. I'm sorry.

17 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Are you doing a motion?

18 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes. I'm speaking of that, we
19 have all virtual meetings in compliance with the director
20 of health for the City of Detroit that we have that
21 opportunity. That is my motion.

22 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay. Is there a second?

23 COMMISSIONER HOLT: I second it.

24 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: You second it?

25 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Yes, sir.

1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Why do you always have to second
2 it? You've heard the motion, what's your readiness?

3 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Discussion.

4 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes.

5 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Okay. Discussion. I think if
6 people are elected or appointed to a position, they
7 should be willing to do the job and not hide from the
8 public. And that's why I think if you're voting for just
9 virtual meetings, I think you're trying to hide from the
10 public.

11 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Through the Chair.

12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: But at this point though,

13 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Through the Chair, it's not
14 hiding from the public. I think that it's being in line
15 with the city health director, Denise Fair.

16 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: It is hiding if there is an
17 option.

18 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: You made your point, she's
19 making her point.

20 COMMISSIONER CARTER: It's not hiding. It's being in
21 line with the health director.

22 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Are there any other concerns?
23 Are there any other discussions?

24 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes, sir.

1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I know, not you. You already
2 made the motion that's on. Go ahead, go ahead.

3 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Thank you, Mr. Chairman, you
4 know, since, since I've been here,

5 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Can you do 30 seconds or so?

6 COMMISSIONER BURTON: So Mr. Chairman, you know, we
7 are following compliance here, as far as the Board, even
8 with our in person meeting. I think Commissioners meeting
9 in person should be the ideal model, especially when you
10 come in, you're going through the hand sanitizer check
11 and the temperature check, and most of us are wearing our
12 masks here today. So I feel that we should, we should
13 continue to meet in person and to otherwise you know, for
14 those Commissioners that choose to be virtually, allow
15 them the opportunity to go virtually. But, you know, we
16 should not discontinue our meeting in person. Not long
17 ago, Mr. Chairman, I raised the virtual meetings. I have
18 not had a pleasant experience because they were using the
19 mute button as the gravel. And so that's when you shut
20 down democracy, when the citizens of Detroit elected you
21 to do a job. And I agree with Commissioner Davis that we
22 should not run from the public. We should, we should be
23 showing up at these meetings, doing the job that we were
24 elected to do.

25 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioners, let's vote. Okay.

1 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Can I have 10 seconds.

2 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Sure you can, you're a
3 Commissioner. Yes you can.

4 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Thank you. My personal
5 preference will always be in person. I also recognize
6 that it's not about me and my personal preference. It's
7 about the citizens. We have a directive in order. It's
8 about the wellbeing of the community. And I would ask
9 that each of you consider that it's not about individual
10 preference, its collective safety.

11 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: So what are you advising us
12 then? I don't know, it's like you are doing both sides.

13 COMMISSIONER CARTER: No, it's about safety.

14 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: What is he saying?

15 COMMISSIONER CARTER: It's about safety?

16 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: My vote will be based on
17 safety, not my own personal views.

18 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I get what you're saying, I got
19 you. Any other

20 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I call for a legal opinion from
21 the law department and also all correspondence from this
22 body and the city health director, and see where they
23 recommend we also have the meeting in person.

24 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: They already have. Let's have a
25 roll call.

1 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes, sir.

2 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Madam Lawyer, you're here. Are
3 you trying to say something?

4 ASSISTANT CORPORATION COUNSEL WHITLEY: I don't have
5 to.

6 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay, very good. Roll call,
7 please.

8 MRS. WHITE: District 1, Commissioner Darryl Brown.

9 MRS. WHITE: District 2, Commissioner Linda Bernard =
10 Abstain.

11 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: You can't do that.

12 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I can't abstain?

13 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I want you to vote.

14 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I agree with what my fellow
15 Commissioner Hernandez said. I think in the interest of
16 public safety in view the health department's ruling on
17 this, which you provided in our package, that we should
18 go back to virtual meetings. Although I enjoy seeing you
19 guys personally = Yes.

20 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: So do I.

21 MRS. WHITE: District 3, Commissioner Burch.

22 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Burch?

23 COMMISSIONER BURCH: I'm sorry. I really didn't hear
24 the motion.

25 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay. Ms. White is going to tell

1 you what the motion is.

2 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: It's what you're doing right
3 now, it's being
4 virtual.

5 COMMISSIONER BURCH = Yes.

6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Okay.

7 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: You're virtual anyway, right?

8 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: She's virtual.

9 MRS. WHITE: District 4, Commissioner Willie Bell =
10 Yes.

11 MRS. WHITE: District 5, Commissioner Burton = No. I
12 did call for a legal opinion from our city law department
13 as well as all communications from this Board to the city
14 and State director pertaining to us meeting in person.
15 You know and so I'd like it if we really postpone this
16 until we review all correspondence, not just a one pager.
17 I want to see all correspondence, but also like to hear
18 from the attorney who happens to be present today.

19 MRS. WHITE: Commissioner Carter = Yes.

20 MRS. WHITE: District 7, Commissioner Davis = No.

21 MRS. WHITE: Commissioner Jesus Hernandez = Yes.

22 MRS. WHITE: Commissioner Annie Mae Holt = Yes.

23 MRS. WHITE: Vice-Chairperson Martin Jones = Yes.

24 MRS. WHITE: Chairperson Holley = Abstain.

25 COMMISSIONER BELL: There's no abstain.

1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes.

2 MRS. WHITE: Through the Chair, there were 8 = Yes
3 votes and 2 = No votes. The motion passed.

4 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay. But I liked what you said,
5 Commissioner Hernandez. I don't like it, but I think it's
6 in reference to health and that's what the health
7 departments indicated. And we gave it in your package. At
8 this time, Mr. Brown, announcements, please. And again,
9 Commissioner Burton, your comments have been noted. I
10 just want you to know that I want to have a conversation
11 but I just want you to know it's been noted and recorded.
12 It will be in the minutes, okay.

13 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Refers to the presentation
14 today?

15 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: No. In terms of the hybrid and
16 in terms of the motion itself. I just want you to know
17 your remarks have been noted.

18 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Mr. Chairman, I'd like to be
19 excused. I actually have two meetings that's going on
20 right now. Its community related. And so I need to really
21 talk to them.

22 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I know if you're leaving, there
23 must be a good reason. So I would excuse you.

24 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Absolutely. Senior citizen,
25 disabled, vulnerable society. So excuse me let me go to

1 my meetings.

2 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you.

3 MRS. WHITE: Announcements, sir. If there are no,

4 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Mr. Brown, announcements.

5 MR. ROB BROWN: Mr. Chair, Commissioner Burch has an
6 announcement.

7 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Burch.

8 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Yes, Co-Chair, I mean, Mr.
9 Chair. I have an announcement and it's very simple. I
10 just want to, since this is Thursday, the first time I'm
11 able to say happy birthday to my granddaughter, Serena.
12 She's 15. Love from your Medea. Thank you.

13 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes. Thank you. Mr. Brown, make
14 it be known how to spell my last name. I really take an
15 issue with that, okay.

16 MR. ROB BROWN: Will do, sir.

17 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: At this time, Mr. Brown.

18 MR. ROB BROWN: Mr. Chair, the announcements.
19 Upcoming Board's BOPC meetings. Thursday, September 9th,
20 2021 at 6:30PM, hosted by the 4th Precinct. Oh, that's
21 right. Sorry, Mr. Chair. Thursday, September 9th at 3:00
22 PM virtual and the next meeting after that will be
23 September 16th, 2021 at 3:00 PM. And Mr. Chair, please
24 note that the meeting for September 6th, 2021 is
25 cancelled due to observance of Labor Day.

1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay. Very good. And how many of
2 our guests,

3 MR. ROB BROWN: Mr. Chair, I currently have 7
4 speakers.

5 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay.

6 MR. ROB BROWN: The first speaker will be the
7 Community Advisory Council Chair, Mr. Scotty Bowman,
8 followed by Ms. Bernice Smith followed by Minister Eric
9 Blunt. We'll go to Ms. Smith until we get it right, Miss
10 Smith.

11 MS. SMITH: Good afternoon.

12 COMMISSIONERS: Good afternoon.

13 MS. SMITH: It's good to be here again and see you in
14 person. And what I want to say is going to be very brief
15 because I don't want the Reverend to say my time is up.
16 This past week, we all saw on TV, the recruit that this -
17 really, he did something that we do not approve of as a
18 policeman. He got drunk and he performed down there at
19 Greektown. My suggestion is we don't have to go through
20 any formalities or anything. He should be fired. The next
21 thing is, I want to know when the young lady was on top
22 of the car, the police car, where was his partner and how
23 did she get up there? And what was the result of that
24 incident? Then I want to know, because most of you know
25 that I'm usually down there at Greektown, observing

1 what's going on the weekends. I want to know what is
2 going on in regards to the large loud noise that we have.
3 Is there something that the police can do about it with
4 the cars coming down the street and they have the loud
5 noise and they're cursing? Well, the records that they
6 have is profanity, and then you have the motorcycles that
7 are also having loud noise. One police officer, he did
8 flash his flashlight at him. That curtailed that noise.
9 So I just want to know what is our position in regards to
10 the noise being portrayed down at a Greektown, and could
11 we do something about it, especially by giving maybe the
12 tickets or have it be known that we will not tolerate the
13 profanity out of the cars and the noise of the
14 motorcycles?

15 MS. SMITH: That's my concern right now. Also one
16 last thing. On West Grand Boulevard between Warren and
17 Buchanan, we have a race going on the weekends,
18 especially.

19 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: You get around now, don't you?

20 MS. SMITH: I'm a civilian.

21 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I got you.

22 MS. SMITH: And I care about my city.

23 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I hear you.

24 MS. SMITH: All right. West Grand Boulevard is where
25 I raised my children. They're on Hancock and I go to my

1 son's house on Sundays for dinner. And while we're
2 sitting on the porch after dinner, we see all of the cars
3 racing down and the motorcycles racing down. I would like
4 to have a squad car there in observance at Buchanan and
5 the Boulevard because they go through the stop sign. I
6 think it's my time. I thank you so much for your
7 attention.

8 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: And we thank you so much for
9 coming.

10 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: As the officer takes note of
11 her concerns.

12 MS. SMITH: Thank you very much.

13 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you, officer.

14 MR. ROB BROWN: Mr. Bowman.

15 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: And speak through the Chair,
16 woman.

17 MR. ROB BROWN: Mr. Bowman.

18 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Mr. Bowman, I'm trying to find
19 you. Can we go to Mr. Blunt? Mr. Blunt? That's why I
20 don't like this kind of stuff.

21 MR. ROB BROWN: Mr. Bowman?

22 MR. BOWMAN: I'm here. Hello.

23 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes. I can hear you.

24 MR. BOWMAN: Okay, good. Now, first of all, the
25 meeting by the charter is required to take place next

1 week, Labor Day. And the observed extension of the
2 holiday is not on a Thursday and the charter does specify
3 which days the meetings may be canceled. And also it says
4 that otherwise, meetings are once a week. Secondly, of
5 course, we have ongoing problems not cleaning houses and
6 we, you know, we've been hearing more cases on the news
7 complaints against officers, not resulting in improper
8 accountability. And in some cases some individuals are
9 just simply not suited for this profession, are not
10 qualified to remain police officers in Detroit, but
11 remain there anyway, including, of course, the man who
12 beat up a woman in a hospital on duty and somehow got a
13 promotion. Okay, well maybe the legal wrangling enabled
14 him to get the promotion, but that doesn't mean you can't
15 fire him.

16 MR. BOWMAN: And you don't need a criminal conviction
17 of a fire person on the Board of Police Commissioners.
18 And then of course, we also knew we have a lack of
19 response time in a number of communities. There's been
20 shootings over the city airport, and some of these in
21 residency homes and the people who are responsible, who
22 live in the neighborhood and have remained there and have
23 not been arrested in cases where, you know, human life
24 was put in danger. These things need to be attended to, I
25 think we need stronger civilian oversight. We need to

1 treat most of the police better and give them all a raise
2 and make good on those pensioners who got, you know,
3 burned back during the bankruptcy deal of a steal. So
4 thank you very much for your time and I yield.

5 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: And thank you. Mr. Blunt, are
6 you there?

7 MINISTER BLUNT: Can you hear me Board?

8 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: We sure can.

9 MINISTER BLUNT: Good. This is Minister Eric Blunt
10 from Sacred Heart Church. I cannot believe this Board
11 spent time to vote on the adherence to a health director.
12 It's akin to whether or not to stop at a red light.
13 Commissioner Bell's comments of the gun buyback program
14 and how it just does not work. This analysis could have
15 easily been done with all of these surveillance systems.
16 Facial recognition technology just does not work. This
17 should have been the statement from this oversight Board,
18 once it was known that this system misidentified people
19 of color, and this was known before the vote by this
20 Board on facial recognition technology and still, after
21 two black men were arrested and falsely identified by
22 facial recognition technology. Again, there are so many
23 bizarre behaviors in this meeting that I will cite as
24 many as I can in the short time allowed.

25 MINISTER BLUNT: Chief White, how do you come before

1 this oversight Board in charge of police officer's
2 misconduct and not know and not have a response to the
3 fact that complaints are up 20%. How do you prepare for
4 this meeting, which purpose is to address police officer
5 misconduct? Chairperson Holley, please demand
6 Commissioner's comments and questions are directly
7 related to police officer misconduct. Commissioners
8 repeatedly hijack this meeting, which is the fault of
9 leadership. Case in point, Commissioner Bernard's moment
10 of silence had nothing to do with police officer
11 misconduct. If it was for unarmed citizens, killed by
12 police officers then it would have been related. I can go
13 on and on, but this is the glaring

14 MR. ROB BROWN: Mr. Chair, the next 3 speakers will
15 be Ms. Brenda Hill, followed by Ms. Joy, followed by Ms.
16 Michelle, George.

17 MS. HILL: Yes. My name is Brenda Hill and today on
18 my way into the Precinct, I was asked for my ID again. We
19 spent over a year going over the fact that you cannot ask
20 for ID at this meeting. They were rude downstairs and
21 very disrespectful to me. In fact, they said you are just
22 making a problem for me, just give me your ID and just go
23 ahead. We'll figure it out later on and on and on. And I
24 said, no, you need to figure it out now and call
25 upstairs. Oh, they couldn't get their boss. And so we

1 went over this, it took over a year that we went back and
2 forth on this. And now that we're back, we have people
3 downstairs that don't know. I told them, even after the
4 fact, after you figure it out, then I'll give you my ID.
5 I don't have a problem, but that's not the rule. And
6 we're here in the police station where we abide by the
7 rules. Another ridiculous thing is that you all at the
8 end said that you don't want to be in the meeting, but
9 you don't even have masks on.

10 MS. HILL: That's just ridiculous to me, not that you
11 can say that the health department requires something
12 different, but however, to sit there and say that you
13 feel like you might get COVID when you don't even have a
14 mask on. It's just crazy. Just doing stuff, just to pick
15 on other Commissioners. This thing that happened in front
16 of Roy McAllister's house was deliberate to show that he
17 ain't crap. When they stood there for hours and hours and
18 one police car, it's a viral sensation. One police car
19 from a police station, less than two minutes away, there
20 were hundreds of cars that just kept coming. Somehow
21 Detroit has become the place for this crap to go down
22 because somebody isn't doing their job. I respect the
23 Chief, but however, something, somebody, someone doesn't
24 respect him and the job that's being done around here,
25 Mr. Chairman, can we find out what she was talking about?

1 MR. ROB BROWN: Ms. Joy.

2 MS. JOY: Can you hear me?

3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes, ma'am

4 MS. JOY: Well, welcome to everyone. I'm honored to
5 speak and give comments. Thank the Lord for the prayers
6 and all of the support for the police department and I
7 was thinking about being a part of you all, because I've
8 been coming there. I just don't have the credentials for
9 it, like the training or it. And who do I speak to?

10 MS. JOY: And also I wanted to, pardon.

11 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: You don't have to be trained
12 to come before the Police Commission. You can come as a
13 member of the public.

14 MS. JOY: I don't have to be, say that again.

15 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I said, you don't have to be
16 trained in anything to come before the Police Commission.
17 You're a member of the public. We welcome your comments
18 and your interaction. And if there's something that you
19 want to place on the agenda for the Police Commission,
20 then you will notify the Acting Board Secretary, and she
21 will discuss it with the Chairman and it could be put on
22 the agenda.

23 MS. JOY: Actually, okay. But I was speaking about
24 employment as well.

25 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Oh, you want to work for the

1 Police Commission?

2 MS. JOY: I guess I'm not explaining clearly.

3 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: You want to work for the
4 Police Commissions?

5 MRS. WHITE: Mr. Chair, excuse me.

6 MS. JOY: Well, I guess I'm not explaining clearly I
7 could do either if I'm trained .

8 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: This is about comments. Let me
9 ask you this. Just call tomorrow.

10 MS. JOY: General comment. Okay. Also, I'm expressing
11 condolences to the loss of lives posthumously to the
12 different officers, as well as the civilians and offer
13 prayers for the families. And also I noticed some good
14 things about honorable commander Gardner. She's a very
15 honorable officer and commander, and all of the work that
16 she's done down through the years. I just wanted to say
17 that about her and all of the commissioners. I appreciate
18 every one of you and the work she's done down to the
19 years as well. Very honorable, very honorable. Thank you
20 for letting me speak.

21 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: And we thank you for being
22 there.

23 MR. ROB BROWN: Ms. Michelle George.

24 MS. GEORGE: I just want to, through the Chair
25 Holley, and to the Honorable Board, to the deputy chief,

1 I just want you to take some notes for Chief White, if
2 you don't mind. You got it right there. Thank you so
3 much. I wanted to comment, first of all, what Ms. Hill
4 stated. I had made a comment about it a few weeks ago
5 about over 60 cars on Outer Drive shooting and being
6 viral. So we're just hoping that would be taken care of,
7 because it went viral, we all saw it on Facebook. Also,
8 maybe at the police Precinct, we can do a life screening
9 for the police officers to make sure we know their blood
10 pressure is... there is a program called life screening
11 to see if they have any blockage in their carotid
12 arteries.

13 MS. GEORGE: Because we've been seeing a lot of
14 officers lately passing from heart attacks and strokes.
15 So I'm wondering maybe I can work with you on that to
16 make sure we get some like a health fair done at the
17 Precinct. Also, we have so many young black women
18 vanishing. It pops up on my phone every other day. It's
19 something going on. We cannot take advantage of that.
20 That could be a serial killer. I know, some people were
21 telling me, I don't know if this was true. There were
22 some people snatching girls and putting them in a white
23 van. I don't know. We have to do something about this.
24 The other day on Lester Holt, they were talking about
25 Native American, young children vanishing, and nobody

1 heard their cry, two year old, just vanished. It was on
2 the news the other day because of the disparities of
3 race.

4 MS. GEORGE: And we see what's happening with black
5 girls. There's no white girls who can take out the trash,
6 14 and they just vanished. We are going to have to do
7 something about that. So it really bothered me to see
8 that. I can get all the pictures. There should be about
9 over 40 girls in the last year. Also the State law, there
10 needs to be a law about drag racing. There are no
11 consequences. That's why they're doing it. So maybe as
12 citizens, we have to make it a State law. That it should
13 be a felony. They should have to spend some prison time
14 on what's happening. Also the Chaplain Corps, we have to
15 make sure with the Chaplain Corps, they need to be, they
16 get the same police training. They do a lot. They need to
17 have guns at the site. I heard a story at the Precinct.
18 One of the commanders talking about one of the Chaplain
19 Corps almost got in a dangerous situation, especially
20 with domestic violence. I know I talked to Assistant
21 Chief Bettison about it. Our Chaplain Corps will have to
22 go through training. So thank you.

23 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you.

24 MR. ROB BROWN: Mr. Chair, your next 3 speakers will
25 be ---

1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: 3, I thought we had 7.

2 MR. ROB BROWN: Mr. James McKay followed by Mr.
3 Markus William followed by Mr. Robert Dunlap. Mr. Mackey.
4 Mackey, I should say.

5 MACKEY: For weeks now that you know, things have
6 been said about the Detroit Police Department. And this
7 goes directly to Chief White. Today, she even took
8 another message again, for me regarding Sergeant Pedusco
9 over at the 11th Precinct. Because she's going to forward
10 the information to some unknown Lieutenant that works in
11 the Chief's Office. Sergeant Pedusco over there,
12 interfering with investigations in her capacity. No, we
13 just heard Interim Chief Lawrence Akbar. He's on his
14 recording and it's playing right now. At the time his
15 boss was Willie Bell, Reverend Holley, you, Jim Holley
16 you're the Commissioner now. You're the Chair of the
17 Commission. You had a seat. I'm still trying to file the
18 same 3 complaints I've been trying to file for years.
19 Now, I don't know how the Interim Chief can put out a
20 memo about me filing a case when it's the chartered
21 mandated duty of the OCI to accept police officer
22 misconduct, complaints that don't rise to the level of
23 criminality. Now, Lawrence Akbar you've been dodging me
24 for over a year. Their complaint against is valid 100%
25 accurate and all the way through. Will somebody on this

1 Board say something today that that complaint can be
2 found and looked into by the OCI or the Board?

3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much. The next
4 discussion.

5 MR. ROB BROWN: Mr. Marcus Williams.

6 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Mr. Williams, Marcus Williams.
7 Can we go to the next one and come back? Go to Mr. Robert
8 Dunlap.

9 MR. DUNLAP: Good evening. Can you hear me?

10 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes, we can.

11 MR. DUNLAP: Yes, sir. I just wanted to pop in and
12 once again thank you and every member of the Commission,
13 as well as the mayor and all the folks in the City of
14 Detroit who one, gave me the opportunity to interview for
15 the police chief's job. Although it didn't turn out the
16 way that I hoped, I just want to assure you all that I am
17 grateful for the opportunity and I still have much faith
18 and confidence in the City of Detroit. And I will do my
19 part as a citizen of the City of Detroit and as a member
20 of law enforcement, remember the Wayne County Sheriff's
21 Office, to do all we can to make our city, the city that
22 we want it to be. And so to all of you, I say thank you.
23 To the mayor, I say thank you and to Chief White wish you
24 well, thank you.

1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you, Mr. Dunlap. Thank you
2 very much.

3 MR. ROB BROWN: Mr. Chair that was your last speaker.

4 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: You want to go back to the one
5 we just missed.

6 MR. ROB BROWN: Mr. Williams, Marcus Williams.

7 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: One more time. Just ask him one
8 more time.

9 MR. ROB BROWN: Mr. Williams.

10 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much. Okay. Can I
11 have a motion to go

12 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Mr. Chair.

13 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes.

14 COMMISSIONER HOLT: I move that we go into closed
15 session pursuant to section 8A of the open meetings act
16 MCL 15.268A regarding administrative leave without pay
17 but with medical benefits for Lieutenant Willie Duncan,
18 badge L-321, assigned to the 11th Precinct.

19 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Is there a second?

20 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Support.

21 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Support.

22 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: All in favor, say aye.

23 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

24 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Oppose.

25 MRS. WHITE: Roll call vote, sir.

1 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: There ought to be a roll call
2 vote for that.

3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Just tell me how, don't mess
4 with me.

5 COMMISSIONER CARTER: But you're here.

6 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Roll call please. I'm sorry. To
7 the right, you have Commissioner Davis, and Ms. Lawyer.

8 MRS. WHITE: Through the Chair, Vice-Chairperson
9 Martin Jones = Yes.

10 MRS. WHITE: Commissioner Linda Bernard = Yes

11 MRS. WHITE: Commissioner Shirley A. Burch = Yes

12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Ms. Burch, are you going to stay
13 here for the closed session?

14 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Chair Holley, I'm going to try
15 my best to get on it by myself.

16 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: All right. We're going to help
17 you. Miss Blossom is going up to you.

18 MRS. Commissioner Bell = Yes.

19 MRS. WHITE: Commissioner Burton =

20 MRS. WHITE: Commissioner Carter = Yes

21 MRS. WHITE: Commissioner Davis = Yes.

22 MRS. WHITE: Commissioner Hernandez = Yes.

23 MRS. WHITE: Commissioner Holt = Yes.

24 MRS. WHITE: Chairperson Holley, the motion passed.

25 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay. Thank you so much.

1 COMMISSIONER BELL: Mr. Chair.

2 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Go ahead.

3 COMMISSIONER BELL: The Charter requires a two-
4 thirds?

5 MRS. WHITE: Yes, sir.

6 COMMISSIONER BELL: So we need to have the proper
7 representation to make a decision. I mean, we can meet,
8 but in terms of voting, if we vote, you have to have two-
9 thirds of the body.

10 MRS. WHITE: Through the Chair, it is two-thirds to
11 go into closed session. But a majority vote is only
12 needed for the actual item that you're voting on.

13 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Right, ma'am

14 MRS. WHITE: Yes. So there is a two-thirds for both.

15 COMMISSIONER BELL: For both. We can check it out,
16 but I'm just letting us know that we need to be a body in
17 there.

18 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay. I see the lawyer is in,
19 we're okay. That's what the lawyer's saying. I just had
20 one walk out. What am I going to do now?

21 COMMISSIONER BELL: They're going to the restroom.

22 VICE-CHAIR JONES: He voted already.

23 COMMISSIONER BELL: We can go to another.

24 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: The motion passed, right?

25 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes.

1 MRS. WHITE: Mr. Chair, just so you know, the closed
2 session is taking place in the Skyler Herbert room, in
3 here. It is not down the hall. It's here.

4 COMMISSIONER BELL: You got to leave?

5 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: So I have to ask everyone to
6 leave?

7 MRS. WHITE: Yes. Those that are not participating in
8 the closed session, please exit, through the Chair.

9 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Mr. Chair.

10 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes.

11 COMMISSIONER CARTER: I moved that we go back into
12 open session.

13 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Second.

14 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: It's been second and supported.
15 All in favor, Aye.

16 COMMISSIONERS: Aye. Aye. Aye.

17 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Oppose.

18 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I propose that we end this
19 meeting.

20 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Through the Chair. That
21 emotion that BOPC concurred with Chief White's change of
22 duty status for Lieutenant Willy Duncan to administrative
23 leave without pay, but with medical benefits pending the
24 outcome of his criminal proceedings.

25 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Is there a second?

1 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Second.

2 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Second.

3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Discussion hearing no
4 discussion. All in favor, say aye.

5 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

6 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Oppose.

7 COMMISSIONER BELL: Role call.

8 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: We're doing it wrong.

9 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Roll call.

10 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: We should.

11 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay.

12 MRS. WHITE: Commissioner Linda Bernard.

13 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: You have to say it with your
14 name.

15 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Linda Bernard = Yes, Mr.
16 Chairman.

17 MRS. WHITE: Commissioner Shirley Burch = Yes.

18 MRS. WHITE: Commissioner Willie Bell = Yes.

19 MRS. WHITE: Commissioner Lisa Carter = Lisa Carter
20 =Yes.

21 MRS. WHITE: Commissioner William Davis -
22 Commissioner William Davis =Yes.

23 MRS. WHITE: Commissioner Hernandez -. Jesus
24 Hernandez - Yes.

25

1 MRS. WHITE: Commissioner Annie Mae Holt -

2 Commissioner Annie Mae Holt = Yes.

3 MRS. WHITE: Vice-Chair Martin Jones - Vice-Chair

4 Martin Jones = Yes.

5 MRS. WHITE: Chair Holley - Chair Holley = Yes.

6 MRS. WHITE: 9 = Yes votes. The motion passed.

7 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Mr. Chair.

8 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes.

9 COMMISSIONER CARTER: I move for adjournment.

10 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Support.

11 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Second.

12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I know you do. All in favor, say

13 aye.

14 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

15 COMMISSIONER BELL: You don't need any roll call for

16 that.

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
