2 Detroit Board of Commissioners meeting. And please note

25 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Oh, thank you so much, Miss

1 White. Thank you so much. Good afternoon, Jim Holley,
2 Chairperson of the Board of Police Commissioners. This
3 meeting will now come to order. We're so happy to have
4 with us this afternoon, Chaplain LaVerne Farmer. Thank
5 you so much for being here and we now can begin the
6 invocation.

7 CHAPLAIN FARMER: Thank you, God, we thank you for
8 your honorable men and women of the Detroit Board of
9 Police Commission, who you have ordained to oversee the
10 implementation of safety protection and justice for the
11 citizens of Detroit. God, we pray that you let no
12 distraction impede the efficiency and the effectiveness
13 of the important issues that will be addressed in this
14 meeting today. We thank you for their commitment and
15 their sacrifice, God, and you promise to be no man's
16 debtor. So God, overcompensate them and bless their
17 health, their family, and everything important to them in
18 Jesus' name we pray. Amen.

19 COMMISSIONERS: Amen.

20 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much, Chaplain
21 Farmer, that was very nice and very well done and we
22 thank you so much for being with us this afternoon. Mr.
23 Brown if you do not mind the mission statement for the
24 Board.

25 MR. ROBERT BROWN: Yes, good afternoon Mr. Vice Chair

1 Jones, this Honorable Board and citizens of Detroit. The
2 reading of the Board of Police Commission Mission
3 summary. The Board of Police Commission, BOPC is a
4 civilian agency that exercises supervisor control and
5 oversight of the Detroit Police Department DPD as set
6 forth in the charter. The Board has 11 members, 70
7 elected by District, 4 appointed by the mayor with the
8 consent of the Detroit City Council. The Board meets
9 every week as a committee of the whole, including 12
10 communities/evening meetings in the district. The BOPC is
11 the oversight agency for the Detroit Police Department.
12 That department policy rules and regulation governs the
13 Detroit Police Department is jointly developed by the
14 mayor, chief of police, and the Board. The Board has
15 subpoena power under the charter that can be used for
16 investigative purposes. The commissioners also review and
17 approve the DPD budget pursuant to the charter,
18 investigate non-criminal citizen complaints, acts as the
19 final authority in opposing and reviewing the discipline
20 of employees of the department, receives and hear
21 disqualification appeals from police recruits hoping to
22 enter the Detroit Police Academy. The BOPC makes an
23 annual report to the mayor, city council, and the public
24 of BOPC activities and accomplishments. Mr. Chair, the
25 reading of the summary.

1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much Mr. Brown. At
2 this particular time, we have the Interim Board Secretary
3 White, if you can give the roll call, please?

4 MS. WHITE: Yes, sir. Through the Chair, Commissioner
5 Darryl Brown.

6 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Commissioner Darryl Brown,
7 District 1, present.

8 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Linda Bernard submitted an
9 excused notification that she would be arriving just a
10 bit tardy today. Commissioner Shirley Burch.

11 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Good afternoon, everyone. I am
12 Commissioner Shirley Burch of District 3, where we love
13 and respect where we live.

14 MS. WHITE: Thank you, Commissioner Willie E Bell.

15 COMMISSIONER BELL: Present. Thank you.

16 MS. WHITE: Commissioner. Willie E. Burton.

17 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Commissioner Willie Burton is
18 present.

19 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Lisa Carter.

20 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Good afternoon, everyone. Lisa
21 Carter present.

22 MS. WHITE: Commissioner William M. Davis.

23 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Good afternoon, everyone. This
24 is Police Commissioner William M Davis. Officers, love
25 where you work. Officers, love where you work and also

1 help report corruption. We have a lot of it in this city.

2 MS. WHITE: Commissioner. Jesus Hernandez.

3 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Good afternoon, present.

4 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Annie Mae Holt.

5 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Good afternoon. Yes, I am
6 Commissioner Annie Holt, At-Large. And I'd like to say
7 welcome to the newly elected Board of Police
8 Commissioner, Brian Scott Ferguson, who is on this
9 meeting as well.

10 MS. WHITE: Vice-Chairperson Martin Jones.

11 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Good afternoon, everyone.
12 Welcoming our community to this meeting. This is your
13 meeting, and the police department and Chief White's
14 executives and everything. We welcome you to this
15 meeting. I'm Vice-Chair, Martin Jones, Vice-Chair of the
16 Board of Police Commissioners.

17 MS. WHITE: Mr. Chair, you do have a quorum. Thank
18 you so much, Ms. White. At this time board members, I'd
19 like for you to consider, we have a meeting to go to
20 after this meeting; the purpose of attending the Above
21 and Beyond this evening at five o'clock. So I'm asking
22 you with your permission that we suspend items 11 to 18
23 with the exception of oral comments announcements on the
24 agenda for today.

25 COMMISSIONER HOLT: So moved.

1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Is there a second?

2 COMMISSIONER BELL: Second.

3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: It's been moved and second. Any
4 discussion?

5 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Discussion.

6 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Who is that, Commissioner Davis?

7 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: So, am I to understand that
8 we're going to be putting off, you know, give more time
9 without filling the board secretary position? This
10 position's been vacant for two years. It's like people
11 are rewarded by giving tens of thousands of public
12 dollars to people that are not qualified. We need to fill
13 these positions. We shouldn't keep dragging.

14 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Any other discussion? Hearing
15 none, all should say, aye.

16 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Discussion.

17 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Burden, I didn't
18 hear you. Do you have a discussion?

19 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Yes, Mr. Chairman. Actually, I
20 agree with my fellow colleague, Commissioner William
21 Davis out of District 7. We, as a body have been dragging
22 this on a little longer than it should have and we really
23 owe it to our residents to have the discussion about the
24 secretary to the board because the interim position was
25 only supposed to be temporary and it's been long overdue,

1 sorry.

2 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: No that's okay but thank you for
3 the comment and also Commissioner Davis. I have no
4 control over what's supposed to happen today with the
5 Above and Beyond event at which all of us will most
6 likely be attending. So all the people say, aye.

7 COMMISSIONERS: Aye, aye.

8 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Oppose.

9 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Oppose.

10 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay, the ayes have. At this
11 time, the minutes of the previous meeting had been
12 distributed to each and every one of you from the meeting
13 of November 4th, 2021. Are there any corrections to those
14 minutes? Hearing no corrections, then the minutes will
15 stand approved. At this time, Ms. White, can you
16 introduce the staff that we have with us this afternoon?

17 MS. WHITE: Yes. Through the Chair, the media
18 services, and the department of innovation and technology
19 are attending today's meeting and recording the board's
20 meeting today. And our court reporter is Mr. Don
21 Handyside and the following board staff members are in
22 attendance today, Mr. Robert Brown, administrative
23 specialist, Ms. Theresa Blossom, community relations
24 coordinator, Ms. Jonya Underwood, administrative
25 assistant, investigator Tiffany Stewart, director,

1 Katrina Patillo director of police personnel, assistant
2 corporation, counsel, Ericka Savage Whitley, interim
3 chief investigator Lawrence Akbar, supervising
4 investigator, Ainsley Cromwell, acting, supervising
5 investigator LiSonya Sloan, acting, supervising
6 investigator Rosalia Madrigal. And that concludes the
7 attendance today. Thank you.

8 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: On my screen, I don't see Chief
9 White. Is he there or is someone representing him? Ms.
10 White?

11 MS. WHITE: Through the Chair, we are attempting to
12 make contact with Chief White and his executive team and
13 we'll share that notification with you soon, sir. Thank
14 you.

15 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: All right. Can you, while we are
16 waiting, can you give me the special guests that we have
17 with us this afternoon?

18 MS. WHITE: Yes, sir. Through the Chair in reviewing
19 the attendees' panelist link and receipt of
20 notifications, we have Lieutenant Mark Young of the
21 lieutenants and sergeants association, who is the
22 president of the lieutenants and sergeants association,
23 Ms. Marie Overall of State Representative Tyron Carter's
24 Office, Mr. Ernest Little, leader of the third precinct
25 police, community relations council, DPOA vice-president,

1 Ron Thomas, community advisory chair, Scotty Bowman, and
2 newly elected Police Commissioner, Brian Ferguson, and
3 also newly-elected Police Commissioner, Ricardo Moore are
4 all present. Thank you, sir.

5 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you. Thank all of you who
6 are with us this afternoon. Thank you so much for being
7 there and taking time out,

8 MS. WHITE: Mr. Chair.

9 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes.

10 MS. WHITE: I do see Deputy Chief Franklin Hayes on
11 the call who is representing Chief White.

12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay. Deputy Chief, are you
13 there with us?

14 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Mr. Chair, absolutely good
15 evening, good afternoon to all.

16 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Well, good to see you. You're
17 representing the chief this afternoon right now. Yes,
18 sir. I will do my best.

19 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I'm sure you will. Can you look
20 around and see who's with you today, if you don't mind,
21 if not, we can give you some help.

22 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Okay. I'm going to look through
23 and.

24 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: You want me to give you some
25 help?

1 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: If you could, Commissioner
2 Holley, Chairperson Holley, that would be great.

3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Ms. White, can you help me help
4 him?

5 MS. WHITE: Yes, sir. Through the Chair, in reviewing
6 the attendees' panel, I see Captain Lena Liddle, Captain
7 Derek Maye, Director Christopher Graveline, Commander,
8 Michael Parish, Assistant Chief David LeValley,
9 Lieutenant Dietrich Lever, Lieutenant James Coles,
10 Commander Michael McGinness, Sizemore, Executive Manager
11 Shelia McBride, and Captain Tanya Leonard Gilbert. And
12 that is all that I see at this time. Thank you.

13 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay. Thank you so much, Ms.
14 White, and certainly Deputy Chief Hayes, we thank you for
15 being with us this afternoon as well. And all of you that
16 we mentioned already and have not, we want you to know
17 how grateful we are and thankful we are for your presence
18 here. You know, people don't have to be nice and when
19 they are, the least you can do is say thank you. And we
20 want to make sure we do this and say, thank you for being
21 with us.

22 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Mr. Chair.

23 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes, I do. Yes, sir.

24 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: I understand State
25 representative Cynthia Johnson is with us also.

1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay, very good. Thank you for
2 making that note. Thank you so much. And I just have just
3 a few remarks and because we all basically know what we
4 have to do later on today, I wanted, first of all, just
5 to acknowledge the life and legacy of Barbara Rose
6 Collins, the first black woman from Michigan elected to
7 Congress, a long-time city councilperson, and a great
8 friend. Those of us who are my age, really go way back
9 and know what a great asset she was to this city, as a
10 friend to many past and present police commissioners as
11 well. Because I indicated to you that we want to try to
12 make sure that we get some of the things that need to be
13 done in regard to today's agenda and also we realize as a
14 couple of commissioners indicated that there is some
15 unfinished business that we have to do as well. I just
16 want to make sure that we understand right now that the
17 board recently requested several updates from the
18 department regarding towing, operation clean sweep task
19 force, and other important items. We want to make sure
20 that we get this information from the Chief's Office of
21 Deputy Chief Hayes and bring it to us at the appropriate
22 time. Please review all materials sent and any questions
23 you may have please let us know if you have some
24 questions you want to send to the Chief's Office as well.

25 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Also the staff is also reviewing

1 and evaluating the information, which will be shared and
2 the report with the board as well. Also, I want you to
3 know that the human resources department candidates as we
4 indicated to you we'll make sure that it will be time on
5 the agenda at the next meeting. Also, I want to make sure
6 that again, the Chief who has also extended an invitation
7 to tomorrow's graduation that would be at the eighth
8 Precinct auditorium tomorrow morning. And so, hopefully,
9 many of you can make that as well. Again, I just want to
10 thank you so much. And again, as I said before I'll just
11 keep my remarks very short in order for what has to be
12 done for today's meeting. Again, I thank you so much. Let
13 me just go through the agenda, if you would, please and
14 ask Deputy Hayes, I know that you are filling in, do you
15 have a report for us or are you basically waiting for
16 some more for the Chief

17 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Mr. Chair, I am prepared to
18 present to this body as well as the community the report
19 of the operations of DPD.

20 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much. You may
21 begin.

22 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES:: Yes, sir. Again, through the
23 Chair, excuse me, going over what's going on in your
24 department I want to start with our update on our injured
25 officers. Currently, we have 5 members who are at home,

1 out on-duty injury, which include a sergeant from the
2 Seventh Precinct, a sergeant from internal affairs, a
3 police officer from the Seventh Precinct, a police
4 officer from the Eleventh Precinct, and a police officer
5 from the Sixth. COVID, we currently have 37 members
6 quarantined and isolated as well as 23 members of the
7 department that have currently tested positive. Getting
8 into the crime, we have realized reductions in homicide,
9 non-fatal, shootings, and robberies. We have seen some
10 increases in aggravated assaults as well as sex crimes.
11 It is to be noted that the sex crimes, it is reporting an
12 increase, as we know, the year 2020, was the year of
13 quarantine and statistics, and the victimology has shown
14 that oftentimes sexual assaults happen by a known
15 offender.

16 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: And now that everything has
17 opened up in 2021, we are getting some of the incidents
18 from 2020 that are now being reported from into 2021. We
19 are combining our total part 1 crime numbers. We are up,
20 excuse me, we are up 1% with 377 incidents higher than
21 2020. And again, those increases are in the areas of
22 sexual assaults that have been reported, as well as
23 aggravated assaults. We still continue our drag racing
24 enforcement and initiatives from those members of the
25 police department have conducted 3668 traffic stops.

1 We've issued over 2,900 citations, 2,072 vehicles have
2 been impounded, another 29 have been stolen recoveries,
3 145 felony arrests have been made, 19 misdemeanor
4 arrests, and 109 weapons have been recovered. And sharing
5 some of the significant incidents that have happened
6 since the last time we've come before you.

7 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Most notably is that on November
8 17th, 2021 yesterday at 9:00 AM in the 16,000 block of
9 Carlisle, a female victim was fatally injured. The victim
10 pulled into her driveway and exited her vehicle and upon
11 exiting, she was approached by a suspect wearing a mask,
12 covering his face. He fired several shots fatally
13 wounding this victim and fled in a stolen dark-colored
14 Dodge Charger. The department has hit the ground running.
15 Members from the homicide were able to develop a person
16 of interest and several entities with been the department
17 are actively looking for this person. This point of
18 impact, I'm sorry, this person, excuse me, of interest,
19 his name is David Hamon, a black male, 45. We've also
20 shared this with our partners in the media, as well as
21 social media, and solicited the community's help in
22 helping to bring this person of interest in and bring
23 justice to this family and these two children that lost
24 their mother yesterday.

25 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: There were a few issues and

1 questions that were raised by the board since the last
2 time we met. And I have a few of those answers. The first
3 one in response to the department policy regarding COVID
4 vaccinations, the department does not have a COVID
5 vaccination policy. It is strongly, however, recommended
6 that all get vaccinated, and to ease access the
7 department in coordination with the health department has
8 hosted several vaccine clinics throughout the city and at
9 the different precinct locations to make vaccines
10 available to all. In response to the health, I'm sorry.
11 The health department since July 21 has been providing
12 mobile testing to all department members. They have been
13 testing two to three department entities a week. So,
14 yesterday I know they did downtown services and there
15 were two others. They're going out to where the officers
16 are to minimize the time that they're not on the streets
17 again, get these members tested so that we can certainly
18 stop the spread of, COVID. Just a few highlights that we
19 want to talk about as far as police work.

20 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: At 1:00 PM on Monday the 15th,
21 Chief White spoke at the Eighth Precinct's William
22 Hamilton auditorium. This event was to celebrate the
23 Eighth Precinct, joining the CIT crisis intervention
24 training program. Chief White spoke about the importance
25 of mental health and stress PD's commitment to helping

1 those members of the community who may suffer from mental
2 illness or be in a crisis situation. On Tuesday, November
3 16th at 1:45 PM in the Skyler Herbert room here at
4 Detroit Public Safety headquarters, Chief White did an
5 interview with Roop Raj from Fox 2, Detroit. The
6 interview was to highlight the upcoming Above and Beyond
7 event that will be going on tonight at the opera house.
8 Chief White talked about the awesome work that the men
9 and women in blue do every day, constantly being heroes,
10 making sacrifices, giving so much of themselves and the
11 best thing is that the officers come back the very next
12 day to do it all over again.

13 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: On Tuesday, November 6th, 2
14 officers from the Ninth Precinct showed true bravery and
15 our good examples of professionalism in the face of life-
16 threatening adversity, which may result in an award of
17 valor. The officers made a location in the 12,000 block
18 of Lang Street for an assault, when they came in contact
19 with an offender who was armed with a gun, failed to
20 follow the officer's commands, a struggle ensued and the
21 offender produced a handgun, pointed it at the officer's
22 head and pulled the trigger missing the officer who he
23 had targeted. The officers were able to disarm the
24 offender and take him into custody without incident. On
25 Tuesday, the 16th at 2:30 PM in the 4,000 block of Joy

1 Road, Commander Michael McGinness, as well as, Commander,
2 Tiffany Stewart, with officers, our NPOs, and officers
3 from neighborhood crime suppression support gave an
4 interview with the local media, asking for their
5 assistance in apprehending an individual wanted for
6 criminal sexual conduct, first degree of a 63-year-old
7 female.

8 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: The interview was held in the
9 community just across the street from where a good
10 Samaritan found our victim laying in the cold. Commander
11 McGinness asked the community to speak up and if they saw
12 something, say something. Our officers stayed in the area
13 to canvas, knocking on doors in trying to obtain
14 information to bring the person responsible for this
15 horrible crime to justice. Today, as we mentioned earlier
16 at 5:30 PM, the Above and Beyond ceremony will be held at
17 the opera house. It will be hosted by Roop Raj of Fox 2
18 Detroit and this will be a time to celebrate the bravery
19 and heroism with the members of the Detroit Police
20 Department. The members of the DPD will receive awards in
21 recognition for heroic acts from the past year. Chief
22 White will speak and highlight the accomplishments of the
23 members being honored.

24 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: And tomorrow at the Eighth
25 Precinct in the William Hamilton auditorium, graduating

1 class 2021J will be graduating from the police academy.
2 Chief White will speak and give encouragement and
3 guidance to this newly graduated class. This will be the
4 first time a graduation ceremony has been held at the
5 Precinct. That concludes the Chief's review. Chairman
6 Holley, you mentioned, it was mentioned a few additional
7 items or bits of information that have been submitted to
8 the board in relation to questions on towing. And I
9 believe the status or recommendation of the duty status
10 of a member, those documents have all been submitted to
11 your office, sir. That concludes my report.

12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much. And of course
13 commissioners, you did hear Deputy Chief mentioned the
14 fact about the towing, and so you have those reports in
15 your package. So, if it's a question that you want to ask
16 in regard to the response, you're welcome to do that.
17 Right now. I'm asking the Vice-Chair, Commissioner Martin
18 Jones to do the round-robin.

19 VICE-CHAIR JONES: All right. Thank you, Chair
20 Holley. Commissioner Holt, At-Large, do you have any
21 questions for the Chief?

22 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Thank you, Vice-Chair Jones.
23 Thank you Deputy Chief Hayes and no, I have no questions
24 at this time.

25 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Thank you so much. Commissioner

1 Hernandez, At-Large, do you have any questions for the
2 Chief. Commissioner Hernandez?

3 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Through the Chair, not at
4 the moment.

5 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Okay. Thank you very much, sir.
6 Commission Davis, District 7. Do you have any questions
7 for the Chief?

8 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: No, I do not.

9 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Thank you, sir. Commissioner
10 Carter District 6. Do you have any questions for the
11 Chief?

12 COMMISSIONER CARTER: No questions. Thank you.

13 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Commissioner Willie Burton,
14 District 5. Do you have any questions for the Chief?

15 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Not at this time.

16 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Commissioner Bell, District 4. Do
17 you have any questions for the Chief?

18 COMMISSIONER BELL: I just have a brief comment in
19 reference to Deputy Chief Hayes mentioning the shooting
20 of a young lady in her driveway, the mother of two young
21 kids. My understanding is that this department
22 aggressively pursued in the criminal justice system
23 failed this young lady in terms of getting an injunction
24 on two different occasions. I just want to commend the
25 department for making a serious effort to address this

1 matter, knowing the history of this young man.

2 Unfortunately, it came out in terms of a fatal shooting.

3 Just thank you.

4 VICE-CHAIR JONES: All right. Thank you, Commissioner
5 Bell. District 3, Commissioner Shirley Burch. Do you have
6 any questions for the Chief?

7 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Yes I do. DC Hayes, I want to
8 first thank you, since you became promoted to your
9 position. I thank you because you are available. You
10 respond every time we call you, and that's a good thing,
11 but let me share this with you, regarding ordinances. If
12 the police department does not start really enforcing the
13 law, and I'm saying about vehicles that actually park up
14 in their, not driveway, but in their front yard, when you
15 have a nice neighborhood and you begin to do things that
16 do not make sense, you bring down the character of that
17 neighborhood. We have reported DCAS forever to number 11,
18 and nothing's been done about this person that does this.
19 So you see the character of people when you don't enforce
20 just a simple speed limit of 30, they began it more and
21 more out of order. We thank you for the decline of the
22 donuts, but you still have to do the basic things of the
23 ordinances. You have to act like a human being with a
24 family, and you do not park in your front yard. Dequindre
25 is an awesome street, we are trying to rebuild it. So

1 would you please work on number 11 to get that done about
2 that house that constantly does that? I thank you for
3 your time

4 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: To the Chair, may I have an
5 opportunity to respond to Commissioner Burch?

6 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes, you can. I'm sorry.

7 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Thank you. Through the Chair,
8 Commissioner Burch, thank you for bringing those... Thank
9 you for the kind words. Chief White asked, was I ready
10 for the task? I told him yes and thank this body for
11 their support in allowing me to do what I was charged to
12 do. There's a two-prong approach to addressing concerns,
13 which is what you mentioned in the 11th Precinct. As
14 you're aware, we've had a change in leadership. Commander
15 Hope is now there, as well as Captain Johnson who has a
16 strong understanding of the community and certainly is
17 committed to that. So if I can get that information to
18 this problem, we will certainly address that immediately.
19 The second approach is something that Chief of Staff
20 Commander, Michael Parish is working on at the charge of
21 the chief or at his direction. We will be folding in
22 ordinance officers. They will be civilian officers to
23 address code enforcement for situations just like this,
24 as you have mentioned. So as an action item, I'll talk
25 about the timeline, the scope, and what their

1 responsibilities will be, but we have built out a
2 function in the police department to address issues just
3 like that and it is coming to a community near you, very
4 soon Commissioner Burch.

5 COMMISSIONER BURCH: I thank you so much. To the
6 Chair, Thank you.

7 VICE-CHAIR JONES: All right. District 2,
8 Commissioner Linda Bernard, are you on yet? All right.
9 Commissioner Darryl Brown, District 1, do you have any
10 questions for the Chief?

11 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Yes. DC, thank you for all that
12 you do in your leadership. I mean, you've always been
13 available to me and I really appreciate that. And I just
14 wanted to echo the comments of my colleague Commissioner
15 Bell. I do agree with him on the failure of the system.
16 It was a breakdown for this young lady, and it's just
17 sad. I do want to thank the men and women of the
18 department that really aggressively went out to pursue
19 this individual and I just hope he's brought to justice
20 soon but thank you for all that you do and thank the men
21 and women of Detroit Police Department.

22 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Through the Chair, absolutely.
23 Commissioner Brown that will certainly be done. And
24 again, I will certainly make sure that Chief White is
25 aware of the appreciation and the results of his

1 direction and leadership.

2 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Okay. The Vice-Chair recalls
3 Commission Willie Burton. Do you have a question for the
4 Chief?

5 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Yes, I do. Questioned for
6 Deputy Chief. There is a video that's surfacing the web.
7 It shows a Michigan State police officer punching a man
8 outside of a home. I want to know, could the department
9 notify the Board of Police Commissioners, based on the
10 use of force policy in conjunction with DPD as far as the
11 Michigan State Police Departments' use of force policy in
12 conjunction with ours. You know, many residents have
13 reached out over the past couple of days and have many
14 different concerns because our community is still in pain
15 and still grieving after the loss of Damon Grimes who was
16 shot by a Michigan State Police trooper with a taser
17 where he lost control of ATV Wheeler. And so concerns
18 that the citizens have in the fifth district is why is
19 Michigan State Police are policing in our community and
20 what can be done keeping MSP out of our communities but
21 more so servicing the highway. Thank you

22 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Through the Chair. Commissioner
23 Burton the information regarding to the policy of MSP, I
24 do not have. I will take all of the information that
25 you've requested back as far as what the partnership

1 looks like, what their jurisdictions and role and
2 responsibilities are. I will take that back and what
3 information I am able to provide, it will be compiled in
4 a written response and submitted to answer your
5 questions.

6 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Yes, you know, Deputy Chief
7 real quick and brief. Thank you so much. These are the
8 concerns of the citizens of Detroit, the people. They
9 want to know that whoever is policing in the City of
10 Detroit does their policy mirror on DPD and if not, they
11 are not welcome. Thank you.

12 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Okay. The Vice-Chair recognizes
13 Vice-Chair, Martin Jones. Good afternoon, DC. How are you
14 doing today?

15 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Through the Chair, I'm great,
16 Commissioner Jones and yourself?

17 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Great. Thank you so much for your
18 presentation today. My questions basically have to do
19 with the assault of what could be considered, a senior
20 that took place on Joy Road. I'll recon that area today,
21 looking around I see that area is pretty vast with vacant
22 houses, vacant buildings, burnouts, and everything else.
23 Detroit 300 will be assisting with that investigation to
24 try to see if we can bring about some kind of justice for
25 that family. Can you tell me, or can you tell the

1 community if there's anything that they should be on the
2 lookout for themselves as a part of that investigation,
3 so we can try to get that family some justice?

4 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Through the Chair, if I may,
5 Commander Michael McGinnis is on the call if we can
6 possibly bring him through. In talking to him, I was out
7 there yesterday and just watching him go through the
8 interview, this troubled him. And he made the request of
9 which it was approved to utilize every department
10 resource we have, whether it's technology, whether it's
11 manpower from different support entities to canvas the
12 area and bring justice to this family. So as far as the
13 fidelity of that incident, if we could bring Commander
14 McGinnis on, and again, he could share the information,
15 the perpetrator's information as well as anything to look
16 out for regarding the Joy Road, sexual assault

17 COMMANDER MCGINNIS: Through the Chair, Commander
18 Michael McGinnis. We are still seeking as much
19 information and tips from the community as we can on this
20 incident. We're following up on some leads that we have
21 received. However we are still in the early stages of
22 this investigation. The officer in charge and his
23 partners were out there today, again, canvassing looking
24 for witnesses. And so just anyone who might have the
25 slightest bit of information from that area, that

1 community, if they could please contact the police
2 department, the 10th Precinct or our sex crimes unit and
3 share anything they have that could potentially help us
4 identify the offender in this incident. We surely would
5 appreciate that.

6 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Thank you so much, Commander
7 McGinnis. Alright. The Chairman of the Bored, I'm turning
8 the meeting back over to you.

9 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Alright. Thanks so much.
10 Commissioner Burch, I hear you, see your hand.

11 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Yes. Thank you so much to the
12 Co-Chair and to Commander Hayes and to Mr. McGinnis, I'd
13 just like to say this candidly, that sometimes the
14 questions that we ask on this board, the officers cannot
15 speak on what strategies they may be having because other
16 people listen to this program. So the things that DC
17 Hayes, Commissioner Martin, I'm just trying to tell you,
18 some questions we ask they cannot answer because it
19 alerts the criminals of the plan. So I'm just saying that
20 to you with courtesy, that some things they're not going
21 to share, and they shouldn't share because the criminals
22 know too much. I just wanted to say that. Thank you.

23 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Through the Chair. That's exactly
24 right, Commissioner Burch. You are a hundred percent
25 right. The questions that I did ask were not questions

1 that were specific in nature, and I know that the police
2 department will only give that information, which they
3 can give, but what I wanted to do was get it on the
4 record and get it noted that the police department is
5 actively investigating that circumstance. And that's
6 exactly what they're doing. I just wanted to get it on
7 the record, that's all. I knew that he can only give what
8 information is available for the police department to
9 give and I knew that DC Hayes and also Michael McGinnis
10 would do a great job of doing that. So I thank so much
11 for your comments, Police Commissioner Shirley Burch.

12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: And I thank both of you for your
13 comments as well. I thank you so much, Deputy Chief
14 Hayes. Just a couple of things for me. We got some
15 information in regard to the towing, but can you let the
16 Chief know that we need to have a... because it has been
17 reorganized and we want to have a face to look at in
18 terms of any reporting, in terms of where we are with
19 this new organization of the towing piece that we
20 instituted several weeks ago. The second thing, is the
21 statistics in terms of those homicides that are solved,
22 is the statistics like what helped you get from the
23 community like assisting, speaking up or are those
24 homicides that basically go unsolved because of a lack of

1 community participation and any type of statistics with
2 that?

3 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Mr. Chair, if I may, I'd like to
4 recall Commander McGinnis who oversees our major crimes
5 division and homicide is a large part of that. He can
6 speak to closures and some of the contributing factors in
7 our case closures.

8 COMMANDER MCGINNIS: Through the Chair. So I
9 apologize. I was taking a call, an update on one of the
10 recent cases. You're seeking information on the closure
11 rates for homicides.

12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes, in terms of the assistance
13 that the community give you versus the assistance that
14 the community does not give you.

15 COMMANDER MCGINNIS: We get tremendous support from
16 the community. Whatever closure rate that you hear,
17 whether it's for homicides or non-fatal shootings, that
18 is 100% attributed to the cooperation we get from the
19 community.

20 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: So we talked about that whole
21 thing about snitching and all that two or three years
22 ago, that's basically gone away now?

23 COMMANDER MCGINNIS: Well, it's not that it's not
24 without challenges and I think that that comes with trust
25 in the police department and the Detroit Police

1 Department has established incredible trust with the
2 community. So we do receive information on cases.
3 Sometimes it's just a matter of making sure that we are
4 connected with the right people that have the information
5 that we need. And a lot of times people don't realize
6 that they have the information we need.

7 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: And just a follow-up with that,
8 I see there 10 less homicides this year as it was last
9 year, I mean, and also less assaults. Do you guys take
10 credit for that and if so, how so?

11 COMMANDER MCGINNIS: As the Chief says, one homicide
12 is too many. So are we happy that things are trending in
13 the right direction finally? Yes. And I think Chief White
14 has some plans, some great ideas to help continue that
15 trend. And I look forward to us making those numbers go
16 down as well as the community helping us do the same,

17 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: But I'm just telling you it's
18 great. I mean, 10 less than we had last year. I mean,
19 that's just in the assaults as well. Finally, my
20 resources tell me that about three weeks ago, there was a
21 homicide and a man's hands were cut off. If that's true,
22 does that give me as a commissioner or some person in the
23 community concerns in terms of what's going on now or is
24 it just something that just minimum, if that is true?

25

1 COMMANDER MCGINNIS: Through the Chair, I've not
2 heard of an incident like that. I should be notified if
3 something like that has occurred. My captain is not
4 aware. I just overheard him in the cubicle to say that
5 he's not familiar with it, so I don't think that that's
6 an accurate account of an incident, but I will do some
7 research and we will get back to you with an answer on
8 that.

9 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Well, I'm not going to say it's
10 a... Again, I'm glad to know that my source is not that
11 good. Thank you so much. Thank you Deputy Chief Hayes and
12 also Michael McGinnis. Thank you so much for being with
13 us. Commissioners, if you don't mind, I'd like to go to
14 the budget if you would and pull that information out so
15 that you have some good questions, if you would, please,
16 in terms of the budget. I want to basically, I've asked
17 for a synopsis in a way but I also want to make sure that
18 this is one of the few times we have, where we may have
19 questions or have input in terms of how we get to the
20 final. So I'm just saying to you, again, I'd like for
21 again, our budget director, if he would come and I want
22 to mess up his name but he will be able to basically give
23 us an introduction if you would, please. I'm always glad
24 to see you as you know and I just want you to know that I
25 mean no harm, but I want to make sure that I say your

1 name correctly. Tonight they got me on a program. H O L L
2 I E and so I got mad about that, and I know you'll get
3 mad if I mess up your name. And so again, thank you for
4 being with us and you can make your presentation now.

5 MR. NAZARKO: Thank you for having me this afternoon
6 and for the board and for the people who are attending
7 this, my name is Nevrus Nazarko. I'm the agency CFO for
8 the Detroit Police Department. And today I'll present to
9 you briefly the current financial report. Before I start,
10 I'll share the screen, but I'd like to acknowledge that,
11 give me just one second. I'd like to acknowledge that I
12 received the questions from the board in writing from Ms.
13 White yesterday and I will respond to them in writing
14 within the next two weeks. Also, I'd like to let the
15 board know that we are working on getting information
16 from the department on the 2023 fiscal year budget. And
17 by the end of December to mid-January, I'll present to
18 the board the department requests, and submit it to the
19 budget office and to the mayor the budget for the fiscal
20 year 2023.

21 MR. NAZARKO: However, again, tonight, this is the
22 presentation for the first quarter pertaining to this
23 fiscal year, give me just one second, for this fiscal
24 year of the financial activity for the Detroit Police
25 Department for the quarter ending September 30th, 2021.

1 So to the board, aside from this PowerPoint presentation
2 was the budget to actual revenues and expenses as of
3 September 30th, 2021 was submitted as a separate
4 worksheet. The grant activity reported that there were
5 two reports. One was for the grants that were active for
6 the entire department, for the entire fiscal year. And
7 the other one, the grants that were initiated from July
8 1st to September 31st. Also, the forfeiture activity, it
9 will be coming up later on the PowerPoint slide as well
10 as the capital expenditure report along with a vehicle
11 purchase report.

12 MR. NAZARKO: And I do have separate slides for all
13 these. For the first quarter ending September 30th, 2021
14 the budget revenues were \$12.6 million, and the actual
15 revenues were \$7.9 million for a variance of \$4.7
16 million, which mainly consists of the timing difference
17 when we book the income tax revenue. The main source of
18 revenue, as we have mentioned before, is the income tax
19 and utility users' tax. So we have booked the utility
20 users tax, but the income tax is lagging in terms of, not
21 in terms of collection, in terms of when we book it. And
22 again for the fiscal year, as I'll show you later on, we
23 expect to actually involve the budget on both those
24 slides. The total expenditure budget is for the first
25 quarter of 2021, where \$76 million and we spent the

1 actual amount came to \$68 million for a positive variance
2 below the budget of almost \$4.3 million.

3 MR. NAZARKO: And again, this is not any savings, but
4 mostly pertains to the timing of some of the expenditures
5 on the operating side. Although the department has had a
6 high rate of vacancy throughout the quarter, so that
7 factors in a little bit in those numbers as well. This
8 slide shows the total annual revenues for the entire year
9 for department and expenditures. So the total revenues,
10 although the actual was \$7.9 million from the first
11 quarter, the annual budget is \$55 million and the total
12 expenditures were budgeted or the actuals were \$68.3
13 million. We expect, or the budget and expenditures for
14 the entire fiscal year are \$326 million. That covers the
15 entire police department. Now the analyzed budget versus
16 the expenditure projections. The total revenues budget
17 for this fiscal year is \$55.3 million. However, we are
18 projecting that by the end of June 30th, 2022, the
19 revenues will add up to \$57.9 million, almost \$58
20 million. Total expenditures, as I mentioned in the
21 previous slide, \$326 million. We are expecting or
22 projecting at this point, this is a moving projection
23 we'll expect to spend \$325.9 million for a positive
24 variance of \$963,000.

1 MR. NAZARKO: And the forfeiture activity as of
2 September 30th, 2021, only for the three months. I'm
3 giving you the activity here under the local forfeiture
4 front, we brought in \$550,600 and spent \$297,000. Federal
5 forfeiture activities, we brought in \$9,545. And we did
6 not spend any money from the federal forfeiture fund.
7 This slide shows the vehicles that were ordered by DPD
8 during the quarter of 2000 ending September 7th, 2021.
9 And the total cost of all the consolidated, as you see on
10 this screen is \$8.6 million. And again, this slide shows
11 the type of vehicles that were ordered. The total per
12 vehicle cost and the total cost and the quarterly capital
13 projects report that capital expenditures report for DPD,
14 I did not present this on PowerPoint slides, however with
15 the attachments that I sent to Ms. White and Ms.
16 Underwood, I suppose that the board has in their
17 possession all those reports, as well as the grant
18 reports. So the grant reports for the first quarter,
19 there are two grant reports that were submitted to the
20 board. The grant report, one is titled grant report
21 corner one only. And the other one is grant report
22 September 30th, 2021, all active grants. And that Mr.
23 Chair concludes my brief summary of the financial
24 activity for the first quarter, 2021 with the attachments
25 that were submitted to you. And I would like to thank you

1 for giving me the opportunity to present this and I'll be
2 happy to take any questions.

3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much. May I have
4 the screen back please so I can see my board members?
5 Thank you so much. I see Commissioner Davis; your hand is
6 up.

7 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Ah, yes. Sir, I have a question.
8 I see you list five vehicles for executive protection,
9 what executive protection is that? Is that for executives
10 within the department or is that for the mayor's office
11 or who?

12 MR. NAZARKO: At this point I do not have the
13 delineated information for which visuals, but my
14 understanding is that these vehicles are for the entire
15 team of executive protection, including the mayor's
16 office.

17 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Does it also include the Chief?

18 MR. NAZARKO: Again, I do not have the exact
19 information as to which office these vehicles are going
20 to be covering.

21 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: When you get that information,
22 can you forward it to all of us?

23 MR. NAZARKO: I will forward that and I'll try to
24 submit that with the rest of the questions that were
25 submitted from the board yesterday.

1 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: That's all I have. Thank you.

2 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you. Commissioner Bell,
3 you have a question? Commissioner Jones.

4 COMMISSIONER JONES: I'm good, I'm good.

5 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Holt.

6 COMMISSIONER HOLT: No. Thank you.

7 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Burch.

8 COMMISSIONER BURCH: I'm fine. Thank you.

9 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Burton.

10 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Commissioner Burton. I don't
11 have a question at this time, but maybe later.

12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay. Commissioner Lisa Carter.

13 COMMISSIONER CARTER: No questions. Thank you.

14 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Brown.

15 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Yes, Mr. Chairman. I just wanted
16 to thank Mr. Nazarko for pointing out the money for the
17 forfeiture dollars and where that was located. And I'll
18 speak later on with the board about how they should be
19 allocated. Thank you for your report.

20 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Hernandez.

21 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Great presentation. Thank
22 you.

23 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you. Did I miss any
24 commissioner, tell that to my head and not to my heart.
25 Any commissioner I missed. Did I miss anyone? But you

1 know, perhaps I'm just a country preacher, so these
2 numbers, I have to work real hard to understand it, but
3 tell me this, I have an actual number on the first slide
4 that's 7909 and it goes up to 55322, that is a long jump.
5 I mean, how do you move from 7 million to 55 million? I
6 mean, just in my little arithmetic mind, it's just a big
7 jump

8 MR. NAZARKO: Mr. Chair, if I may answer that
9 question, the \$8 million, and 7.93 represents the revenue
10 that we collected and booked up to the month of
11 September. Now, throughout the year, we expect to collect
12 55. So the \$55 million is the annual fee here. The \$8
13 million pertains only to the first quarter of 2021 as the
14 revenues come in. We'll inch towards that 55 and we'll
15 surpass that. We'll go up to 57, as I mentioned in the
16 following slides.

17 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you for that. Let me ask
18 you this. This is probably... So you're going to have to
19 go to somewhere else, but when you talk about this kind
20 of money, can you ask the Chief or whoever we need to ask
21 in terms of how does African Americans and brown
22 Americans participate in making sure they get some of
23 this money that we're getting from the city, like with
24 procurement? I know that you're a number man, but tell
25 me, who do I get to, to tell me, in other words it's my

1 old civil rights days. I just want to ask you are we
2 making sure that some of these cars and things that we
3 get from the police department are basically going to
4 minorities.

5 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Just help me with that. You
6 don't have to do it today, but just help me get to the
7 right person. I know you are a number, man.

8 MR. NAZARKO: Will do. Thank you.

9 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much. As always, I
10 thank you for your report and also how you basically try
11 to make us all understand it from the least of these to
12 the best of us. And I appreciate it so much and although
13 it was shortened, we'll get the rest of it from you,
14 okay. Thank you so much.

15 MR. NAZARKO: Thank you. I appreciate it.

16 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you, commissioners for
17 your patience with the agenda and also your concerns. At
18 this particular time, Mr. Brown, I'd like to be able to
19 let people know when the next meeting is, and then we can
20 go to oral comments.

21 MR. ROB BROWN: Yes. Good afternoon, Mr. Chair, and
22 this honorable board. Due to Thanksgiving, the board will
23 not be meeting on November 25th and following that, the
24 next two board meetings would be December 2nd, at 3:00 PM
25 and December 9th, at 3:00 PM. And from there, Mr. Chair,

1 I go straight to oral communications. We currently have 9
2 speakers. Your first three speakers would be Lieutenant
3 Mark Young, LSA, president, and community advisory
4 council, Mr. Scotty Bowman and Miss Bernice Smith,
5 Lieutenant Young.

6 LIEUTENANT YOUNG: Good evening, shout out, shout out
7 to the entire DPD family. The Above and Beyond is more
8 important than the interview process that could have been
9 conducted several months prior. The men and women of the
10 Detroit Police Department deserve, not only this day, but
11 every day and our support every night. The interview I
12 saw on Channel 7 a couple of nights ago regarding towing
13 was very disturbing. When I say very disturbing, it was
14 very disturbing. It was beyond the CCR. I don't know what
15 to think about it, very disappointed. Please, before you
16 judge our members, think about yourself, and hold
17 yourselves accountable, because that was awful. Let's not
18 forget crime fighting comes at a cost, not just the
19 financial cost, the injuries, the illnesses, distress,
20 the PTSD, the deaths, and the loss of many law
21 enforcement officers right here in our very own city. If
22 you ever need to be reminded of what the men and women of
23 the Detroit Police Department say and go through every
24 day, I remind you of December 7th, 1998, Officer Lloyd
25 Michael Todd was shot in the face.

1 LIEUTENANT YOUNG: Sean Bandy lost his life and
2 Sergeant Ramon, Charles, then Officer Ramon Charles, was
3 also shot while trying to make this city safe to
4 apprehend three violent villains. While we're talking
5 about CCRS and while we're talking about demeanor
6 complaints on officers, and while we're talking about
7 hope is more important for the interview process, let's
8 never forget the men and women that sacrificed their
9 lives every day for this great city. Little isn't so
10 little and when they say that they're expected to
11 recover, Lloyd Michael Todd, who needs assistance from us
12 all right now, let's not forget him and them.

13 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you.

14 MR. ROB BROWN: Mr. Scotty Bowman, Mr. Bowman.

15 MR. BOWMAN: Okay. I had trouble finding the
16 microphone. Can you hear me now?

17 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes, we can.

18 MR. BOWMAN: Okay. First of all, I think there is a
19 very great need to clarify what is and is not appropriate
20 for OCI as far as complaints and what is within the reach
21 of the Board of Police Commissioners. A lot of this
22 confusion, disagreements and omissions came to the
23 surface when I looked over and listened to the efforts of
24 Mr. Crowley to get an investigation into the homicide of
25 Keneisha Coleman. So I think what we need is the board

1 needs to draw up a list, itemizing what does and does not
2 apply, what complaints do and do not go through the
3 office of the chief investigators, and what complaints
4 can be evaluated by the Board of Police Commissioners.

5 MR. BOWMAN: And if it's not them, it needs to
6 indicate where one should take the complaint. I think
7 this would save a lot of time and I do know that we are
8 short-staffed that the board is short staffed. OCI is
9 short-staffed. There also needs to be some clarification
10 regarding even criminal matters when they are also
11 violations of policy. Clearly, if an officer commits a
12 known crime while on duty, that it must be some kind of
13 violation of policy, and that needs to be written in
14 there as well. So I urge all of you to draft such a
15 policy and give it to, and have it get posted at the OCI
16 website. And it needs to be voted on and discussed in an
17 open fashion so that all the commissioners are on board
18 with these conclusions, or at least aware of them and
19 have a chance to vote on them. Thank you for your time. I
20 wish I had more.

21 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you.

22 MR. ROB YOUNG: Ms. Smith.

23 MS. SMITH: Good afternoon commissioners. I would
24 like first to get my condolences and I wished you could
25 extend yours to Parnell. She lost another one of her

1 family and my condolences to her. Also, I would advise
2 all women that find it necessary to be out alone night or
3 day to buy some mace so they can protect themselves
4 whenever they are being attacked, or anyone feels that
5 they want to harm them. Also, I would like to know why we
6 feel, some of us on the board, feel as though Michael
7 Shaw, who is the Michigan State Police, he's the officer.
8 We see him all the time on the TV, given reports out.
9 They are usually, in my estimation, the first ones on the
10 expressway, checking out the trouble along with our own
11 city police. So I find no reason for us not to have them
12 involved in our situation and any problems that we have
13 on the highway or anywhere else here in the city. They're
14 very necessary along with our own police. Also, I would
15 like very much to thank the responders' president. She
16 talked with me this week and she wanted me to attend, but
17 she didn't have a ticket for me, but she said that she
18 appreciated me coming and what I have done as far as the
19 police are concerned, because I think everybody that
20 knows me knows I have a love for my police department. So
21 I will not be there tonight and I hope everyone has a
22 wonderful time, even though it's a sad occasion, but we
23 have to remember the police protect us every time they
24 put that uniform on and we must thank them, at least I
25 do. That's why I'm out there doing the survey. I got to

1 know them down there in Greektown but anyway, God bless
2 our police department.

3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much.

4 MR. ROB BROWN: Mr. Chair, your next three speakers
5 will be Minister Eric Blunt followed by Ms. Joy, followed
6 by Overwith. Minister Blunt.

7 MINISTER BLUNT: Can you hear me, board?

8 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes, we can.

9 MINISTER BLUNT: Good. This is Minister Eric Blunt
10 from Sacred Heart Catholic Church. To the new
11 commissioners, Detroiters need you to be totally
12 disgusted with the overwhelming amount of time used in
13 this meeting to discuss crime; crimes, not committed by
14 police officers. Crime fighting is not the purpose of
15 this commission. This commission was created to address
16 police misconduct. This board's intentional diversion to
17 any shiny object that helps avoid the issues of police
18 misconduct must be called out. And remember facial
19 technology is a tool of institutional racism and anyone
20 who is not in opposition to facial recognition technology
21 is a supporter of white supremacy. This month, Facebook
22 has stopped using and trafficking in facial recognition
23 technology, and it plans to delete the data that it has
24 gathered through the use of this system, which is
25 associated with over 1 billion people's faces.

1 MINISTER BLUNT: The budget presentation today, the
2 meaningful questions should be concerned with the
3 functions that this over 300 million is spent on such as
4 what is the total cost of each of the surveillance
5 systems, facial recognition, green light, ShotSpotter,
6 and what is the total cost of the patrol officers? A
7 University of Michigan study released this month entitled
8 Detroiters view on crime and policing clearly states that
9 the majority of Detroiters believe that police killings
10 of black and Latino people are part of a broader pattern
11 of misconduct and mistreatment of people of color by the
12 police and would like to see significant police reform.
13 Last month

14 MR. ROB BROWN: Miss Joy.

15 MS. JOY: Can you hear me?

16 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes, we can. And thank you both.
17 Thank you.

18 MS. JOY: Yes. Thank you, Chair Holley. Kudos to you
19 for your diplomacy every week and to all of the
20 commissioners. Thank you so much for the great job that
21 you do on a weekly basis. I greatly appreciate the work
22 of the officers that I've encountered and I guess about
23 all of the departments and all of the precincts, just
24 about the 9 years I've been affiliated with the police
25 department. They're coming to the meetings and that's all

1 I've noticed about you all is just great work in the
2 communities and how you've helped and support and protect
3 and serve the communities in the City of Detroit and
4 beyond. I wish I could go to that Above and Beyond and
5 honor you properly there, but I'm not able to go, but I
6 still honor you just as well. Continue to stay as tall as
7 you do. Keep us all misty eye with the great, great work
8 that you're doing in the City of Detroit. Thanks. I'm
9 very proud to be a citizen here. Thank you so much.

10 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: And thank you, Miss Joy and
11 thank you also, Minister Blunt.

12 MS. JOY: Yes, sir. Thank you all as well.

13 MR. ROB BROWN: Mr. Chair, the next speaker will be
14 Overwith.

15 OVERWITH: Good evening, everyone. Can you hear me?

16 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes, we can.

17 OVERWITH: Okay. Reverend Jim Holley, the gig is up,
18 you're a straight up fraud. You know, I called you in
19 regard to me not being able to get communication to the
20 board of directors. I mean the Board of Police
21 Commissioners. You know, I called you and you never told
22 any of the other board members that you weren't received
23 in your communications, nor did Shirley Burch.
24 Commissioner Burch never told anybody else. Now what
25 Melanie White is doing over the Board of Police

1 Commissioners, it's all over the city. The audio
2 recordings of Willie Bell, Melanie White and Jonya
3 Underwood clearly demonstrate violation of Detroit city,
4 charter negligence, malfeasance, and more importantly,
5 total disregard and disrespect for the citizenry or the
6 citizens of Detroit in its entirety. What has been
7 perpetrated in the matter of DPD case number 20-112 that
8 Derrick Maye who's listening has direct knowledge of?

9 OVERWITH: And so does Franklin Hayes, the Deputy
10 Chief and everybody else that is in the department and
11 knows about case number 20-112. He covered up a whole
12 murder. And just because the detectives at the Eighth
13 Precinct bungled their investigation, the captain of
14 homicide and Marco Destas decided to cover up the murder.
15 I done did a thorough investigation of the BOPC. Willie
16 Bell is in total violation of the Detroit city charter.
17 He's been reelected and reappointed to this board and
18 every board member should look into the matter of the one
19 person towing committee. The man is totally corrupt and
20 check his pockets because somewhere in there, Martin
21 Jones, is that money that's been going to him in regard
22 to that towing committee.

23 MR. ROB BROWN: Mr. Chair, your next three speakers
24 would be Ms. Brenda Hill, followed by Ms. Nicole Small,
25 followed by Ms. Michelle George.

1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I see all of you, I thank all of
2 you for being with us today.

3 MS. HILL: Thank you. And I reached out to you
4 yesterday, Chair Holley. And when you get time, can you
5 call me back?

6 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay.

7 MS. HILL: And I wanted to go off on Martin Jones,
8 but I won't today but I do want to make that point but
9 the interview with District 2 Board of Police
10 Commissioner was maybe the worst display of a sitting
11 attorney. She just went after D'Etta Wilcoxson the week
12 before insinuating that D'Etta Wilcoxson lie in order to
13 keep on those who should not be in the position that they
14 are in on this board, the secretary. We needed a
15 secretary yesterday. It is not that hard to hire folks.
16 She is sitting here as an attorney justifying being
17 involved in taking money from someone who bribes your
18 official yet D'Etta Wilcoxson has done nothing criminal.
19 And yet she used more force against D'Etta Wilcoxson than
20 someone convicted of bribery and justifying her taking
21 money from that person. And yet she does not want to face
22 the music this week. She should be censured. I don't know
23 what your process is, but whatever it is, and I will do
24 whatever I can to get her removed from this board.

25 Mr. ROB BROWN: Ms. Nicole Small.

1 MS. SMALL: Thank you so much. A couple of things. So
2 in any board, the secretary is one of the most powerful
3 positions to not make a decision further just affirms the
4 concerns that we have with this body. And so many other
5 bodies in the City of Detroit. We will never be a
6 progressive city until we eliminate the corruption and
7 the lack of quality and authentic leadership that we
8 should have. If you can't decide on a secretary that
9 speaks volumes about you. I do echo some of the
10 sentiments of what was just said by the previous public
11 comment. Listen, this is a problem for you as a board to
12 sit there and to listen to that 1 minute and 30 second
13 interview from one of your colleagues and not to speak to
14 that is a problem. It is a huge problem.

15 MS. SMALL: The things that were said about, yes,
16 it's okay to accept these bribes as an elected official,
17 for someone that we know has gone to jail for an issue
18 that is dismantling what the quality of black leadership
19 and the perception of what black leadership looks like
20 for this city, whether it's just for the Board of Police
21 Commissioners, but also extending to the city council is
22 a problem to make those comments. And to say that bribery
23 with elected officials is a two-way street is even more
24 of a problem, but to sit here and to ignore that and not
25 to make a decision for one of the most prominent and

1 powerful positions on this board, which is the secretary,
2 it gives me a great pause. I expect more from you. You
3 are capable of doing better and making better decisions
4 and I'm asking you to do that. The next piece is that we
5 elected you to be civilian oversight and a lot of what's
6 being done at this table is a lot of bantering and back
7 and forth. It is time to take care of business. Crime is
8 at an all-time high. These carjackings are at an all-time
9 high. We need you to be there, be the civilian oversight
10 to ensure that we have the resources within the safety
11 department to make sure that we create an increase in
12 safety. Thank you.

13 Mr. ROB BROWN: Ms. Michelle George.

14 MS. GEORGE: Yes. Mr. Brown. Hello?

15 MR. ROB BROWN: Yes, we can hear you.

16 MS. GEORGE: Yes. Thank you. Thank you so much. To
17 Chair Holley and to the board, I wanted to first make a
18 comment. I'm sorry to hear about that young lady with the
19 injunction, and I hope we can find out what happened in
20 that situation where her life was at stake and she lost
21 her life with that. Also, I wanted to comment, in terms
22 of the police officers who one got shot. I mean, almost
23 shot the police officer. I'm glad his life was saved
24 because we know that that danger lives, like Lieutenant
25 Young stated that they put their lives on the line. I

1 would like to make a comment and I know Bishop Holley, I
2 mentioned this before. I talked about one of my family
3 members, my niece was stopped by two officers in downtown
4 Detroit.

5 MS. GEORGE: She made the complaint in September,
6 August or September, it was a Hispanic officer and I
7 forgot the other officer. And I made hone to that because
8 of the issues that are happening with the Detroit Police
9 Department. We have not heard anything. So I made a
10 complaint with OCI. I made a complaint about the
11 complaint. I haven't heard anything. And allegedly, this
12 officer told my niece he was going to give her 5
13 citations. One day, my brother will be on the phone,
14 which is the father of my niece. And the issue is, this
15 is a problem. We need to find this out because he asked
16 her, does she have any weapons in the car? And we do not
17 want this to come back. So now, I made a complaint, it's
18 on record and I made a complaint about the complaint. If
19 this is how complaints are handled, now I see what they
20 are talking about, dealing with OCI and the issue. I work
21 very well with the Detroit Police Department. I have no
22 problem, but now I see the issue. We haven't heard
23 anything. It's been three months. This is ridiculous. So
24 now I have a complaint on record. Nobody's even called me
25 about the complaint to be honest with you. So I would

1 like this issue resolved and I don't know if it's
2 connected. I don't know, the Tenth Precinct talked about
3 stopping black kids and asking them about their weapons
4 in the car.

5 MR. ROB BROWN: Mr. Chair that was your last speaker.

6 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I thank all of you very much for
7 your presentation and for your concern. And please know
8 that everything that you said today has been recorded. We
9 will go back over it and try to make sure that we respond
10 to those things that need to be responded to, so that you
11 know that your presence is not in vain. At this
12 particular time, the Chair will entertain a motion to
13 adjourn.

14 COMMISSIONER HOLT: I move that we adjourn.

15 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Second.

16 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: All in favor, say aye.

17 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

18 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Oppose.

19 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Oppose.

20 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: All right. Thank you so much.

21 Again, I thank all of you very much for your time.


