- 1 Good afternoon, Jim Holley, Chairperson for the Board of
- 2 Police Commissioners. The meeting will now come to order.
- 3 I'm so grateful and thankful for Chaplain Ronald Franklin
- 4 to be with us this afternoon. Commander, it's good to see
- 5 you and if you don't mind, will you take us into prayer?
- 6 CHAPLAIN FRANKLIN: Yes, sir, I will. Father in the
- 7 name of Jesus, we just thank you for this day. Father, we
- 8 just thank you for the Board of Police Commissioners, and
- 9 the wisdom that you have given them. Father, we thank you
- 10 that this meeting will be so well and successful, Father
- 11 God, that people will see and admire. Lord, we ask you to
- 12 lead and guide, direct each and every member, Lord, and
- 13 we thank and praise you, Father God for choosing each
- 14 member to be on this team. God, we give you the glory,
- 15 honor, and thanks for everything you're going to do here
- 16 this afternoon and days to come, right now in Jesus'
- 17 name. Amen.
- 18 COMMISSIONERS: Amen.
- 19 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Well thank you so much Commander
- 20 Franklin.
- 21 CHAPLAIN FRANKLIN: You're welcome.
- 22 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: And thank you so much for being
- 23 with us this afternoon as well. Mr. Brown, if you don't
- 24 mind giving the mission statement to the community.
- MR. ROBERT BROWN: Yes, good afternoon Mr. Vice Chair



- 1 Jones, this Honorable Board and citizens of Detroit. The
- 2 reading of the Board of Police Commission Mission
- 3 summary. The Board of Police Commission, BOPC is a
- 4 civilian agency that exercises supervisor control and
- 5 oversight of the Detroit Police Department DPD as set
- 6 forth in the charter. The Board has 11 members, 70
- 7 elected by District, 4 appointed by the mayor with the
- 8 consent of the Detroit City Council. The Board meets
- 9 every week as a committee of the whole, including 12
- 10 communities/evening meetings in the district. The BOPC is
- 11 the oversight agency for the Detroit Police Department.
- 12 That department policy rules and regulation governs the
- 13 Detroit Police Department is jointly developed by the
- 14 mayor, chief of police, and the Board. The Board has
- 15 subpoena power under the charter that can be used for
- 16 investigative purposes. The commissioners also review and
- 17 approve the DPD budget pursuant to the charter,
- 18 investigate non-criminal citizen complaints, acts as the
- 19 final authority in opposing and reviewing the discipline
- 20 of employees of the department, receives and hear
- 21 disqualification appeals from police recruits hoping to
- 22 enter the Detroit Police Academy. The BOPC makes an
- 23 annual report to the mayor, city council, and the public
- 24 of BOPC activities and accomplishments. Mr. Chair, the
- 25 reading of the summary.



- 1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much Mr. Brown and
- 2 once again I thank you very much. At this time, Interim
- 3 Secretary White, can you give us the roll call, please?
- 4 MS. WHITE: Yes, sir. Through the Chair, Commissioner
- 5 Darryl Brown,
- 6 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Darryl Brown is here for
- 7 District 1.
- 8 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Linda Bernard.
- 9 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Hi everyone. Attorney London
- 10 Bernard, District 2.
- 11 Ms. WHITE: Commissioner Shirley A. Burch.
- 12 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Good afternoon, Mr. Chair Holley
- 13 and honorable commissioners and to the community. I am
- 14 Shirley Burch, the Commissioner for the third District
- 15 where we love and respect where we live. Thank you,
- MS. WHITE: Commissioner Willie. E. Bell.
- 17 COMMISSIONER BELL: Present. Thank you.
- 18 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Willie E. Burton.
- 19 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Commissioner Willie Burton is
- 20 present today.
- 21 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Lisa Carter.
- 22 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Good afternoon, present.
- MS. WHITE: Commissioner William M. Davis.
- 24 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Good afternoon, everyone. This
- 25 is Police Commission William M. Davis, District 7.



- 1 Officers, love where you work, Officers, love where you
- 2 work and report all public corruption.
- 3 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Jesus Hernandez.
- 4 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Good afternoon, present.
- 5 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Annie Mae Holt.
- 6 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Yes, I'm Commissioner Annie Holt,
- 7 At-Large.
- 8 MS. WHITE: Vice-chairperson, Martin Jones.
- 9 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Good afternoon, Vice-Chair, Martin
- 10 Jones, welcoming all our community members, DPD executive
- 11 staff and all who love the City of Detroit. I'm Vice-
- 12 Chair Martin Jones. Welcome to the meeting.
- MS. WHITE: Mr. Chair, you do have a quorum.
- 14 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much Ms. White and
- 15 thank each and every one of you. Thank you commissioners
- 16 for being with us this afternoon as well. I would like to
- 17 entertain a motion for approval of the agenda for
- 18 December 2nd, 2021.
- 19 VICE-CHAIR JONES: So move.
- 20 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Second.
- 21 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Second.
- 22 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: All in favor, say aye.
- 23 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
- 24 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Any oppose?
- 25 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Oppose,



- 1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: What's your correction?
- 2 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Thank you, Mr. Chairman, you
- 3 know, I opposed because I requested something 20 days
- 4 ago, pertaining to OCI, I drafted a letter to members of
- 5 the board as well as staff, therefore, I'm still waiting
- 6 for this information. The request was made on the 12th of
- 7 November asking for it to be provided to commissioners by
- 8 the 18th. Here it is, it's December 2nd and I still have
- 9 not gotten that information. So I'm going to have to
- 10 oppose this time.
- 11 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you.
- 12 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Mr. Chair?
- 13 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Please, Commissioned Holt, let
- 14 me go to Commissioner Davis, what does he want to add or
- 15 delete from the agenda?
- 16 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: I continue to object to the
- 17 appointed commissioners being referred to as At-Large.
- 18 They could be referred to as appointees or as
- 19 commissioners. The should not be referred to as At-Large.
- 20 I think that's a misrepresentation and it misleads the
- 21 public.
- 22 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay. Both commissioners are
- instead noted in terms of the comments you've made. Other
- 24 than that all in favor, say aye.
- 25 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.



- 1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: And the two commissioners
- 2 basically, it will be noted. Commissioner Holt, is there
- 3 anything else you want to add to this?
- 4 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Well, a rationale was offered in
- 5 terms of why the agenda should not be okay. And I believe
- 6 the information that the honorable chair, Commissioner
- 7 Willie Burton is requesting, we received it a second time
- 8 last night or this morning. So I'm just wondering if he
- 9 could revisit his email, he might find the responses that
- 10 he requested.
- 11 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much commissioner,
- 12 and I will try to make sure that we get that information
- 13 to him. At this time we have the minutes of the previous
- 14 meeting has been distributed to each and every one of
- 15 you. Are there any corrections to those minutes? Hearing
- 16 none, the minutes will stand as approved. At this time,
- 17 Ms. White, would you please give us an introduction of
- 18 the staff?
- 19 MS. WHITE: Through the Chair, the department of
- 20 innovation and technology they are monitoring and
- 21 recording today's board meeting and also our court
- 22 reporter is Mr. Don Handyside and the following board
- 23 staff members are in attendance today, Mr. Robert Brown,
- 24 Administrative Specialist, Ms. Theresa Blossom, Community
- 25 Relations Coordinator, Ms. Jonya Underwood,



- 1 Administrative Assistant, Investigator Tiffany Stewart,
- 2 Director, Katrina Patillo, Director of Police Personnel,
- 3 Assistant Corporation Counsel, Erica Savage Whitley,
- 4 Supervising Investigator Ainsley Cromwell, Acting
- 5 Supervising Investigator, LiSonya Sloan, Acting
- 6 Supervising Investigator, Rosalia Madrigal. And that
- 7 concludes the staff introductions. Thank you.
- 8 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I don't see posted here, Chief
- 9 White. Ms. White, do I have a substitute?
- 10 Ms. WHITE: Chief White is present, sir.
- 11 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I'm trying to find him?
- MS. WHITE: He may be on the second page, but Chief
- 13 White is in attendance, sir.
- 14 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much, Ms. White.
- 15 Chief, how are you?
- 16 CHIEF WHITE: Good afternoon, honorable board.
- 17 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Oh, there you go. Thank you so
- 18 much for being with us. You need some help in terms of
- 19 determining who's with you today or do you have it?
- 20 CHIEF WHITE: I think I have it sir.
- 21 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: You go, you go.
- 22 CHIEF WHITE: All right. We have with us today,
- 23 obviously, Director Patillo, Lieutenant James Coles,
- 24 Lieutenant Liddell oh, I'm sorry. Captain Liddell,
- 25 Lieutenant James Coles, Lieutenant Shultz, Sergeant



- 1 Purdy, my Chief of Staff, Commander Parish, LSA President
- 2 Mark Young. And I believe Lieutenant Firsdon from Force
- 3 Investigation is on as well. Also Second DC of Public
- 4 Information, Rudy Harper. I do apologize if I miss
- 5 anyone, but that's all I saw on the list, but I'm sure
- 6 there is a few more.
- 7 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay. Thank you. As always it is
- 8 good to have you with us, Chief as well. Ms. White, do we
- 9 have any special quests?
- 10 MS. WHITE: Yes, sir. Through the Chair, Corporation
- 11 Counsel Lawrence Garcia is present today. Ms. Maria
- 12 Overall of State Representative Tyrone Carter's Office,
- 13 Community Advisory Council Chair, Scotty Bowman, LSA
- 14 President, Lieutenant Mark, Young DPOA Vice-President,
- 15 Ron Thomas, Police Commissioner elect of District 1,
- 16 Brian Ferguson and Miss Alicia of State Representative
- 17 Young's Office. Thank you.
- 18 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you. I understand,
- 19 attorney Garcia, have remarks, if you would like to do it
- 20 at this particular time?
- 21 CORPORATION COUNSEL GARCIA: If you don't mind, Mr.
- 22 Chair, I just wanted to pay homage and respect to your
- 23 body and to say what a privilege it has been to work with
- 24 you guys. The last four years, I greatly esteem as you
- 25 know, the Detroit Police Department and also the Board of



- 1 Police Commissioners that supervise their activities. I
- 2 just wanted to give you my respect on my way out. My last
- 3 day will be next Wednesday. It's been an honor. Thank
- 4 you.
- 5 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: The honor has been ours as well.
- 6 Thank you so much for being with us and thank you for
- 7 just taking time out to say, see you later, so to speak
- 8 okay.
- 9 CORPORATION COUNSEL GARCIA: Yes, sir.
- 10 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you. Again, I thank each
- 11 and every one of you for joining us this afternoon. Just
- 12 a couple of things I want to say to you that the passing
- of the former Police Commissioner Bishop John Sheard, we
- 14 wanted just to acknowledge the legacy and the life and
- 15 legacy of the former Police Commissioner, Bishop John
- 16 Sheard, who was a national renowned Bishop in the Church
- 17 of God in Christ organization, a prominent leader and a
- 18 spiritual counselor, and certainly a good friend to the
- 19 chairman. We'd like to congratulate the teacher of Public
- 20 Safety Foundation, the teacher of police and fire, and
- 21 the EMS on their recent Above and Beyond award ceremony.
- 22 We want to thank you for a beautiful program and it was
- 23 very professionally done. And we look forward to seeing
- the next one. I'd like to also extend our congratulations
- 25 to the Detroit Public Safety Foundation on a job well



- 1 done and on the event also for our first responders who
- 2 would protect and serve our community each and every day.
- 3 We recently learned about the partnership between the
- 4 Detroit Public Safety Foundation and the Chevrolet Grand
- 5 Prix. We want to offer our congratulations to you on
- 6 that. We know this partnership is valuable and important
- 7 to all the public safety agencies. We are grateful for
- 8 the Public Safely Foundation, the hard work that you've
- 9 done in the past, you're doing right now, and you'll be
- 10 doing in the future. And we just wanted to thank you for
- 11 all the work and the dedication that you give. Also the
- 12 board recently requested several updates from the
- department regarding operation, clean sweep task force
- 14 reoffenders list, promotional materials, and other
- 15 important matters.
- 16 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Please review all material and
- 17 send in questions or concerns to the board office to
- 18 ensure the department's response to these requests. Also,
- 19 the staff is reviewing the documents that we will be able
- 20 to share to each and every one of you. The city HR
- 21 submitted their report regarding the secretary of board
- 22 candidates. We also have a closed session to discuss
- 23 administrative leave without pay but with the medical
- 24 benefits request for the Police Officer Teaira
- 25 Funderburg, Badge 622, assigned to the Second Precinct.



- 1 We also have moved public comments before the closed
- 2 session. You'd like to make a comment, please submit your
- 3 request. And that you would be acknowledged by the staff.
- 4 Also, I just want to mention to you that the board
- 5 received a copy of the draft calendar for review.
- 6 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: We were both on the meeting
- 7 calendar next week. So please make sure you look at the
- 8 materials that will be sent to you and that we would vote
- 9 on that next week. The NACOLES conference starts December
- 10 12, 2021 through 2016. The Board of Police Commissioners
- 11 staff has shared conference and travel information of all
- 12 board members and staff attending. Please contact the
- 13 staff if you have any questions in regard to the
- 14 arrangements. Also, I just want to mention to you that I
- 15 had a meeting with the interim secretary, with the CFO,
- 16 James George, to discuss the budget projections for the
- 17 fiscal year '23, the board's budget. We are working to
- 18 assure that our budget request remains within the city's
- 19 baseline budget to our unit.
- 20 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: We said that we would give you
- 21 updates, and obviously, you know, each one of you, you
- 22 have to vote on this, and we're just basically trying to
- 23 get it to the point where it would be knowledgeable and
- 24 feasible and also to where you can have an intelligence
- in terms of to vote on the 23rd, the year '23 budget for



- 1 the final board's approval. I also just want to ask you
- 2 if you would please, anyway, we'll basically do that. I
- 3 want to make sure that I have, let's see here, losing my
- 4 place here. I apologize to you. Resolutions, if you don't
- 5 mind. And, Vice-Chair Martin Jones, if you could, please,
- 6 if you could, this friend of mine would like that you
- 7 read the Resolution to the former Police Commissioner,
- 8 Bishop Sheard, and following that Commissioner Holt, if
- 9 you can help me with the Resolution for Sergeant
- 10 Lightfoot.
- 11 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Thank you, Chair. It is with great
- 12 honor that I read this Resolution. Resolution honoring
- 13 former Police Commissioner, John H Sheard posthumously.
- 14 WHEREAS the City of Detroit is blessed to have civic
- 15 leaders who keep the soul and spirit of the city
- 16 community and residents strong and uplifted. Decade after
- 17 decade, Bishop John Sheard was counted among these
- 18 remarkable men and women whose noble works and
- 19 accomplishments are done with quiet humility for the
- 20 greater good of all. And whereas John Sheard was born in
- 21 1937 in Mississippi, to Kussiah and OS Sheard. Mindful of
- 22 his family's teachings, he joined the great migration
- 23 when he was only 17 years old, had very little money, but
- 24 tons of faith. And whereas young, John came to Detroit
- 25 determined to work hard and make a difference in his new



- 1 hometown. He influenced many as he taught social science
- 2 and operated his driving school.
- 3 VICE-CHAIR JONES: However, his true calling show, as
- 4 he followed in his father's footsteps into the Church of
- 5 God in Christ (COGIC) and became a minister in 1973,
- 6 named to lead the Mitchell Street COGIC in 1982, Pastor
- 7 Sheard built a ministry that outgrew several buildings,
- 8 from the east side to the west side to become greater
- 9 Mitchell town. Pastor Sheard had also rose to national
- 10 prominence, rising as a Bishop and the coaching
- 11 organization and holding leadership roles, including two
- 12 decades, excuse me, as chair of the COGIC board of
- 13 bishops that helped COGIC become the largest Pentecostal
- 14 denomination in the United States of America, and WHEREAS
- in 1994, Mayor Dennis Archer named Bishop Sheard to the
- 16 Board of Police Commissioners as a Police Department and
- 17 community once again, work to address police brutality.
- During his 1994/98 term, Police Commissioner Sheard
- 19 provided much needed wisdom and quidance to help Detroit
- 20 navigate the aftermath of the fatal millstream beating
- 21 and police court trial, and to address complaints about
- 22 police shootings and abuses of the force.
- 23 And, WHEREAS Bishop Sheard, despite the countless
- demands on his time as a family man, and as a renowned
- 25 leader, always kept Detroit a priority. At times it was



- 1 transition or challenge city leaders, excuse me, city
- 2 leaders knew they could count on Bishop Sheard to provide
- 3 wise counsel and roll up his sleeves and to get to work
- 4 on issues, spanning civil rights anti arson patrols, park
- 5 beautification, and civilian oversight of law
- 6 enforcement. And WHEREAS Bishop Sheard always made
- 7 everyone feel like a longtime friend. He always
- 8 cultivated Detroit and wellbeing in progress. And on
- 9 November 11th, 2021, this beloved and faithful servant
- 10 passed away leaving all of Detroit to grieve with his
- 11 family, the Great Evangelical Temple Congregation, the
- 12 entire COGIC organization, and many, many others who knew
- 13 him.
- NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Detroit Board
- of Police Commissioners, speaking on behalf of the
- 16 citizens of the great City of Detroit awards, this
- 17 Resolution posthumously to Bishop John Sheard for civic
- 18 leadership and community service in the City of Detroit,
- 19 including his service as a police commissioner. Our
- 20 city's forever grateful that this dedicated and visionary
- 21 shepherd journeyed to Detroit as a mere penniless
- teenager, his commitment and contribution to the City of
- 23 Detroit, the Police Department, and a local resident's
- 24 merit, our highest regards.
- 25 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Through the Chair, I move that we



- 1 accept this Resolution honoring former police
- 2 commissioner, John H. Sheard posthumously, and adopt it
- 3 into our archives, the Board of Police Commissioners
- 4 archives.
- 5 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: It's been properly supported. As
- 6 I indicated this is a personal friend. There are a lot of
- 7 preachers that can preach and a lot of preachers can
- 8 basically teach but when you can do that and also just be
- 9 a good man, a good person, it's a rarity. And Bishop
- 10 Sheard was that kind of person. All agreed to the motion
- 11 say, aye.
- 12 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
- 13 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: All oppose? Thank you so much.
- 14 Miss Holt, can you help me with Ms. Lightfoot?
- 15 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Thank you, Chair Holley. Yes.
- 16 Resolution honoring Sergeant Esther L. Lightfoot. Esther
- 17 Lightfoot was appointed to the Detroit Police Department
- on August the 12th, 1985. Upon graduating from the
- 19 Detroit Metropolitan Police Academy. Officer Lightfoot
- 20 began her career at the 13th Precinct Patrol Operations
- 21 Section. And WHEREAS, Officer Lightfoot's assignments
- 22 with the Detroit Police Department included the 13th
- 23 Precinct and Commercial Auto Theft.
- 24 COMMISSIONER HOLT: And WHEREAS our Officer Lightfoot
- 25 displayed tremendous knowledge and leadership skills, and



- 1 she was promoted to Sergeant on August 8th, 1999.
- 2 Sergeant Lightfoot was assigned to the 13th Precinct Vice
- 3 Enforcement and Liquor License where she served until her
- 4 retirement.
- 5 COMMISSIONER HOLT: And WHEREAS Sergeant Lightfoot
- 6 was the deserving recipient of the following awards, both
- 7 Consent Judgment Awards, the Ford Fireworks Award, the
- 8 Major League Baseball, All-Stars Recognition Award, the
- 9 Rosa Parks Funeral Recognition Award and the Super Bowl
- 10 XL Recognition Award. She also received numerous letters
- of commendations from citizens and superiors.
- 12 COMMISSIONER HOLT: And WHEREAS Sergeant Lightfoot
- 13 has tirelessly served the Detroit Police Department, the
- 14 citizens of Detroit and its neighboring communities for
- 15 36 years. She has served the Detroit Police Department
- 16 and the citizens of the City of Detroit with loyalty,
- 17 professionalism, integrity, and dedication, and is widely
- 18 respected throughout the law enforcement community as the
- 19 consummate professional.
- 20 COMMISSIONER HOLT: NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that
- 21 the Detroit Board of Police Commissioners, speaking on
- 22 behalf of the citizens of the City of Detroit recognizes
- 23 and honors the lifelong contributions and commitment to
- 24 excellence and public service of Sergeant Esther
- 25 Lightfoot. Her display of courage and unwavering



- 1 community spirit has improved the quality of life for the
- 2 citizens of Detroit. We wish you all the best in your
- 3 future endeavors. We thank and congratulate you Sergeant
- 4 Esther L Lightfoot.
- 5 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Through the Chair.
- 6 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes, ma'am
- 7 COMMISSIONER HOLT: I move that we adopt this
- 8 Resolution honoring Sergeant Ester L. Lightfoot and place
- 9 it into the archives of the Board of Police
- 10 Commissioners.
- 11 VICE-CHAIR JONES; Support.
- 12 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Support.
- 13 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: All in favor, say aye.
- 14 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
- 15 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you. Thank you so much,
- 16 Ms. Holt. You missed your calling when it comes to those
- 17 resolutions. So I just want to thank you so much.
- 18 COMMISSIONER HOLT: You know, It's reading
- 19 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: And also, Commissioner Jones as
- 20 well. At this time, Chief White it's always good to have
- 21 you with us and I don't say that lightly. I say it
- 22 because I want you to know how important it is, based on
- 23 what's going on in this country, and based on what's
- 24 going on in America. When I look back and see that you
- 25 have almost a thousand homicides in some city, I'm just



- 1 really shaken by that. And so I just want you to know
- 2 that I'm just grateful, on behalf of all of us as
- 3 commissioners and the City of Detroit, for the challenges
- 4 that you have before you. Thank you for being with us and
- 5 at this time you may proceed with your report.
- 6 CHIEF WHITE: Good afternoon, honorable board. And
- 7 again, thank you Chair, Holley, for your kind words. And
- 8 we have an incredible task before us and the men and
- 9 women of the department are up for the task and they
- 10 continue to prove that day in and day out, which will be
- 11 illustrated by the report I'm about to provide you. But
- 12 before I get into that I do want to start with again,
- 13 extending my condolences and the condolences of the
- 14 entire Detroit Police Department to the Oxford, Michigan
- 15 people who are obviously impacted by this unbelievable
- 16 tragedy that is happening all too often in our country.
- 17 You know, we train for this, certainly we have one of the
- 18 most robust training programs, in the country, led by our
- 19 Commander Szilagy and his team.
- 20 CHIEF WHITE: And they do phenomenal work and
- 21 continue to train on active shooter scenarios around the
- 22 state, as well as in Detroit, primarily in Detroit, but
- 23 working with our partners around the state to ensure that
- 24 we've got the best training. Still, when it hits this
- 25 close to home, you realize that we're all susceptible to



- 1 this type of violence. So, a very, very tragic situation.
- 2 And on behalf of the entire department, I just want to
- 3 make sure I start with extending my condolences to
- 4 Oxford, the school, the community, and the first
- 5 responders. I will get started with my report. I will be
- 6 joined by Director Chris Graveline of Professional
- 7 Standards to touch on some areas that the board has
- 8 already asked about. So I'll rapidly go through my report
- 9 starting with the update on our injured officers. We
- 10 currently have two members of the department who are
- 11 disabled, one Sergeant from internal affairs, and one
- 12 police officer from the Seventh Precinct.
- 13 CHIEF WHITE: Our COVID stats are moving in the wrong
- 14 direction. We have 31 members currently quarantined or
- isolated. 30 of the members, isolated, I'm sorry,
- 16 quarantined are currently positive. So that's a
- 17 significant uptick and what we have seen in the numbers.
- 18 So we are really highly encouraging our members to get
- 19 vaccinated and highly encouraging those who are
- 20 vaccinated to get that third shot or the booster. I think
- 21 it won't be long before the CDC, the definition of
- 22 vaccinated will include, I believe that their booster
- 23 relatively soon. In regard to our crime data, we are
- 24 experiencing a 7% reduction in homicides, at the same
- 25 time last year, an 8% reduction in nonfatal shootings,



- 1 and a 16% reduction in robberies. I highlight that it was
- 2 stated or at least intimated, recently in a news article
- 3 that we are celebrating reductions in crime.
- 4 CHIEF WHITE: And I thought I had prefaced just about
- 5 every report with, you know, one homicide, one shooting
- 6 is one too many. However, we look at these numbers as a
- 7 point of reference to really assess where we are and how
- 8 we're going to implement our strategies going forward. So
- 9 it's important to recognize where we are, what's working,
- 10 what's not working as we continue to move forward and set
- 11 practices in place for crime reduction in the future. And
- 12 that's the purpose for providing the numbers. And
- 13 certainly when we look at a 7% reduction in homicides,
- 14 and as you indicated, Chair Holley, you know, other major
- 15 cities around the country are experiencing an uptick. You
- 16 know, we recognize some of the work that we're doing is
- 17 working. The officers have been unbelievable, well, very
- 18 much believable because they've been consistent with the
- 19 work that they've done over the years.
- 20 CHIEF WHITE: But just happy to see that their work
- 21 continues and an 8% reduction in nonfatal shootings
- 22 means, you know, one less mother, one less father, you
- 23 know, grieving the loss of a child or a spouse or a
- 24 sister or brother. So those are good numbers but we are
- 25 certainly not celebrating those numbers in any way, shape



- 1 or form. I'm going to move on to a few significant
- 2 incidents. Incident number one is a fatal shooting on
- 3 November 17th, 2021 at 9:00 AM in the 16,000 block of
- 4 Carlisle, a female victim was fatally injured. As she
- 5 pulled into her driveway at a residence, exited her
- 6 vehicle, point of exiting her vehicle, she was approached
- 7 by a male wearing a mask, with a handgun, fatally
- 8 shooting her in her driveway. Again, unbelievable
- 9 investigation from the homicide section, and some of the
- 10 true experts and professionals in our homicide that did
- 11 not stop when information pointed to one particular
- 12 person, they recognize with their experience that there
- 13 was more to this crime.
- 14 CHIEF WHITE: They unpacked what they had in front of
- them utilizing our crime analysts and technology, and
- 16 really, the digital footprints that we all make, we use
- our technology, they were able to determine exactly what
- 18 happened, and as a result, they took, the person who had
- 19 been stalking our victim, her significant, well, not
- 20 significant other, but male acquaintance, into custody
- 21 and later found that it was in fact, his son, who had,
- 22 committed this horrible act, against our victim. And he
- is currently in custody. He's a male 19, and he has been
- 24 arrested and he's in custody now. I believe it's no bond
- 25 but I may have that wrong. If it is a bond, it's a very



- 1 high bond with ten percent, but I think I got an update
- 2 that he has no bond.
- 3 CHIEF WHITE: Moving on to our criminal sexual
- 4 conduct we're continuing to look at those numbers. We see
- 5 that those numbers, we've experienced an uptick, over the
- 6 same time last year. And we continue to see that uptick,
- 7 and we're looking to identify exactly what's causing the
- 8 uptick. What we know right now is that we do not have a
- 9 sexual predator on the loose. When we look at 2019 at the
- 10 same time, the numbers are consistent with 19, still too
- 11 high, but consistent with 19. And while we look at 19 is
- 12 to just determine, you know, what was the city like at
- 13 that time, what was happening? What was the level of
- 14 contact that people had, meaning where they in the
- 15 business world, where they at school, was their ability
- 16 to make complaints or to reach out and contact someone if
- 17 they've been victimized by sexual assault. What we found
- obviously with the COVID year, which we're already, we're
- 19 still in a COVID year but the first year that COVID hit
- 20 was that limited contact really did impact the ability
- 21 for people to, to make these reports.
- 22 CHIEF WHITE: And so the uptake is consistent with
- 23 the fact that we are now moving more freely, schools are
- open, businesses are open, but still, you know, we have
- 25 too many instances of criminal sexual contact conduct,



- 1 one in three women and one in six men have experienced
- 2 criminal sexual conduct at some point in their lives. So
- 3 we're going to continue to work with our Special Victims
- 4 Unit and we're going to add capacity, make sure that our
- 5 social workers are engaged. And I just want to preface
- 6 this with the board as we continue to do this work, we're
- 7 going to engage in a high-level media campaign to
- 8 encourage the victims to come forward. We are going to
- 9 experience an uptick and that's okay and I have more
- 10 people with access to services to make those complaints,
- 11 and that's exactly what we want to do.
- 12 CHIEF WHITE: We don't want more victims, but we want
- 13 people who have been victimized to have the comfort with
- 14 the Police Department to come forward and make their
- 15 complaints. And more to come on that and you will see
- that as part of our crime strategy for 2022, which I'll
- 17 be presenting to the board early next year. Moving on to
- 18 another incident, which actually has to do with a
- 19 critical assault and a criminal sexual conduct matter. On
- 20 November 14th, 2021, our victim, a 63 year old resident
- of our city, who was observed by a witness in the 4,000
- 22 block of Joy Road was found suffering from a critical
- 23 assault. It was later determined that the victim was also
- 24 the victim of a sexual assault. The victim was taken to
- 25 the local hospital and is in critical condition. She was



- 1 fighting for her life and remains in critical condition.
- 2 Members from the Sex Crime Unit responded, worked the
- 3 location, and recovered significant evidence. In this
- 4 incident, working with the Michigan State Police in our
- 5 community.
- 6 CHIEF WHITE: And I can't emphasize enough the
- 7 community, the community, continues to be outraged by the
- 8 senseless violence, partnered with the Police Department,
- 9 going door to door and the assistance of the Michigan
- 10 State Police. And of course our sex crimes unit, driving
- 11 this investigation, we were in doing canvases and passing
- 12 out flyers. We were able to arrest two subjects, in
- 13 connection with the incident when the county prosecutor's
- office was charged. One of the subjects with assault with
- intent to commit murder was given a \$250,000 cash bond,
- 16 no, 10%, \$250,000 cash bond, no 10%, and the second,
- 17 subject is in custody on an unrelated charge but I'm
- 18 confident that the sex crimes unit is working on this
- 19 case to be able to associate the second subject with at
- 20 least being a part of the initial assault. But the
- 21 investigation continues and they're doing really good
- 22 work on this case.
- 23 CHIEF WHITE: And I can't emphasize enough, the
- 24 partnership of the community in this case. When you've
- 25 got police working with the community and showing as much



- 1 frustration as we have with these cases, you know, that
- 2 is a powerful team and it resulted in getting a very,
- 3 very violent offender off the street. I'm going to move
- 4 on to a few questions raised by the board in recent
- 5 meetings. In response to the question, I'm sorry, in
- 6 response to the question regarding the annual report,
- 7 Chief's improvement plan. I'm very familiar with that
- 8 report. It was my responsibility prior to leaving. We
- 9 have not done a crime plan in a number of years in the
- 10 Police Department. We are doing a crime plan right now
- 11 that's going to be presented to the board.
- 12 CHIEF WHITE: Prior to getting this question, I was
- 13 going to be reaching out to the board and asking if we
- 14 can include the improvement plan in the crime, strategy,
- 15 report that I'll be submitting to the board. The contents
- of the improvement plan is very similar to what's in the
- 17 crime report and the crime plan, as many of the things
- 18 we'll be implementing have to do with the improvement of
- 19 service delivery in the Police Department, with the
- 20 results or the intended result of reducing crime. So we'd
- 21 like to compress that report down. It'll be a very
- 22 lengthy and comprehensive document, in the crime
- 23 strategy, but that is a request coming to the board very
- 24 soon. In response to the requests for a projected date on
- 25 the department's presentation on the 21st century,



- 1 policing presentation, that will be January of 2022 and
- 2 the response on the homicide report that reflects a
- 3 breakdown of categories, homicide motives, and analysis.
- 4 We have already submitted that report per your request
- 5 and it should be in your packet. If not, please let me
- 6 know but I did confirm that that report was submitted
- 7 over to your office.
- 8 CHIEF WHITE: Moving on to just a few highlights, a
- 9 little bit of positivity to some things that have
- 10 happened in the Sixth Precinct. On November 22nd we
- 11 passed out 400 turkeys in the community. And that took
- 12 place at St. Peter and Paul Church in the Mondale
- 13 community. It was a huge success; they did a phenomenal
- job. On Wednesday November 24th, we received a Telly
- 15 award for our, my healthy mind episode, using words, not
- 16 weapons, which talks about crisis intervention teams and
- 17 the positive impact that mental health work has in the
- 18 community. We received three awards and we were awarded
- 19 the Telly award, which is a big award for this
- 20 presentation.
- 21 CHIEF WHITE: We're very happy to receive that. And
- 22 on Thanksgiving Day, I'm walking in the parade. A little
- 23 rain didn't stop us, very cold, but we did the full walk
- 24 and met a lot of people. It was a very, very good day.
- 25 And on Friday, the 26th, I held a press conference in the



- 1 Skylar room announcing the arrest of Jermaine Cox. And
- 2 that is the son of the person that that murdered the lady
- 3 in the driver that I spoke with earlier. I just want to
- 4 make sure that I mentioned that. Lastly, and this is
- 5 still unfolding, and this is probably one of the
- 6 highlights of the year in police work that I'm going to
- 7 be sharing with you. On Tuesday, November 30th in the
- 8 area of Grand River and Evergreen, officers from the
- 9 Eighth Precinct observed a white Chevy express van
- 10 disregard a red signal. They were on patrol. We have
- increased our patrol, our visibility in the community,
- 12 and this is a direct result of that. Seven o'clock in the
- morning, they're on patrol, doing what we want them to
- 14 do. Officers see this van run the traffic, run a red
- 15 light, conduct a traffic stop.
- 16 CHIEF WHITE: The officers approached the vehicle,
- 17 they observed a driver who was a white female, 37 with
- 18 two African American children in the back seat who were
- 19 not seat belted. Upon further investigation, the officers
- 20 could tell that the driver was a little agitated, a
- 21 little bit uncomfortable but they kept an eye on her.
- 22 They go back to the car they write a couple of tickets.
- 23 They re-approached the vehicle and they can see that the
- 24 kids aren't wearing a seatbelt and they ask about the
- 25 seat belt. The driver of the vehicle says, yeah, they'll



- 1 be fine. I'll have them put their seatbelt on. So they
- 2 asked, are these your children? She goes, yes. They look
- 3 at the kids, the two kids motion with their head, no. And
- 4 they said, okay, so they get everybody out the car. Upon
- 5 further investigation, it was determined that there were
- 6 actually three kids in the vehicle, I'm sorry, four kids
- 7 in the vehicle. And all four kids were kidnapped on their
- 8 way to school, ages 11, 8, 7, and 5. The suspect was
- 9 arrested and conveyed to the DDC. This case is continuing
- 10 to unfold. I could not be prouder of these officers for
- 11 doing their work, but not only that, letting their
- 12 intuition guide your actions and asking more questions,
- 13 as opposed to just simply saying, oh, okay, that's fine.
- 14 Go ahead and have a good day kind of thing. They asked
- 15 the question, are these your kids?
- 16 CHIEF WHITE: And then once getting into the van and
- 17 identifying that there are not two kids in the van, but
- 18 four kids this is an incredible case. So we're continuing
- 19 to look at all the pieces of it. Obviously you know, what
- 20 happened in Oxford didn't get much public attention but
- 21 certainly it got a lot of departmental attention and
- 22 rightfully so. And we're going to continue to unpack this
- 23 case and see where we're at. And as it appears to be, if
- 24 there's no other variables to this case these officers
- 25 are going to be celebrated by this department saving



- 1 these four kids from this situation is just unbelievable,
- 2 routine patrol police work. So with that, I conclude my
- 3 report and we'll take any questions.
- 4 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: And Chief, make sure that we are
- 5 involved in that celebration piece with those officers,
- 6 would you please?
- 7 CHIEF WHITE: Absolutely. It will be my honor.
- 8 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Vice-Chair Jones, can you give
- 9 us the round table for us, sir?
- 10 VICE-CHAIR JONES: With pleasure, sir. The Vice-Chair
- 11 recognizes District 1, Commissioner Darryl Brown. Do you
- 12 have any questions for the Chief?
- 13 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Yes, I do. Chief, good afternoon
- 14 and that's good news to hear.
- 15 CHIEF WHITE: Good afternoon, Commissioner.
- 16 VICE-CHAIR JONES: You hit the new button.
- 17 Commissioner Brown, you hit the mute button. Commissioner
- 18 Brown? We'll come back to Commissioner Brown. The Vice-
- 19 Chair recognizes District 2, Commissioner Linda Bernard.
- 20 Do you have questions for the Chief?
- 21 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Yes Chief. First of all,
- 22 congratulations on an excellent report. Thank you as well
- 23 for the reoffending evaluation report, which shows that
- 24 only in 94% of the part 1, if you will, major crimes, the
- 25 person who was arrested did not re-offend in terms of the



- 1 early release from bond. So that's really very, very
- 2 impressive. Thirdly, there's an HBO special right now
- 3 about sex crimes, I watched it last night and it involved
- 4 Baltimore and everything that you just said in your
- 5 report, contradicted what's happening in Baltimore, where
- 6 a pregnant girl, eight and a half months pregnant was
- 7 missing and they never even canvas the neighborhood. Like
- 8 you just said, you did. They never contacted the
- 9 neighbors. They never talked to anyone. And everyone in
- 10 the report, this is the Ashley said the Baltimore police
- 11 department was the worst they had ever seen.
- 12 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: So I just want to congratulate
- 13 you on what you just said. And in my opinion, Detroit is
- 14 the best. Finally, on the issue of sex crimes, as you
- 15 know, there was an article in the paper about a week or
- 16 so ago about it, about us ignoring them. I'm glad to see
- 17 that you are not. I would ask, however, though, in your
- 18 reports, I did notice that there's an increase and I
- 19 don't quite understand why because you know, sex crimes
- 20 can be everything from patting somebody on the behind to
- 21 actually obviously forcible rape. So we don't know, but I
- 22 would appreciate an asterisk in your report regarding
- 23 "rape" so that women in the community are unduly
- 24 terrified where there are partners getting rape, not, you
- 25 know, people that know each other, people who are dating,



- 1 you know, so that women won't think that, as you said
- 2 earlier, we don't have a serial rapist, but there are
- 3 just people, you know, out raping unknown people within
- 4 the community. Just the partnership thing I'd say does
- 5 give the community solace.
- 6 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Commissioner Bernard.
- 7 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you. Chief.
- 8 CHIEF WHITE: Yes ma'am.
- 9 VICE-CHAIR JONES: The Vice-Chair recognizes District
- 10 3, Commissioner Shirley Burch. Do you have any questions
- 11 for the Chief?
- 12 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Yes, I do. And thank you so
- 13 much. Chief White, thank you for what you're doing. I
- 14 want to please take this to Patty Kukula and to Ms.
- 15 Carter, the ladies that ran that Above and Beyond event
- 16 was awesome. I didn't have to be present, but I was
- 17 fortunate enough that I had my partners there, my
- 18 shopping center owner contributed to the event plus the
- 19 Imperial market, sir. And I had two ladies there to
- 20 represent helping the love. And that's because of you
- 21 because you have promoted the love and respect, where you
- 22 live, the signs were there. So it's just like I was
- 23 present, but the message is telling everybody through
- 24 Commissioner Bell, it was through Commissioner Davis and
- 25 Commissioner Holt that they had the sign there with my



- 1 other associates that this city is thriving and needs
- 2 more love.
- 3 COMMISSIONER HOLT: So I thank you for that and the
- 4 contributions of my partners to the event. So please tell
- 5 Ms. Patty Kukula that, that I really respect her, that
- 6 she saw the purpose of the sign. And sir, I want to thank
- 7 you as far as capturing the person that raped that lady
- 8 in her driveway. There are so many hideous crimes in the
- 9 city, and we have to address it together. Like Mr. Martin
- 10 said, it takes all of us to work together and serve the
- 11 Eleventh Precinct. Now here's a little bit, I'm not sure
- of, but I know you will investigate and find out what
- 13 happened to that lady that was imprisoned in the Mound
- 14 Correctional Center. She lost her life in that
- 15 correctional center. I appreciate you telling me later,
- 16 what's going to happen with that, and how is the
- 17 investigation going? And then sir, please understand that
- 18 this is, two other commissioners and myself that will be
- 19 ending their service, but I'm not ending my.
- 20 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Commissioner Burch.
- 21 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Say what?
- 22 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Can you wrap it up, please?
- 23 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Yes. Oh, you interrupted my
- thoughts. So, would you allow me, sir, I'm only going to
- 25 have one more time to speak on this live. So I think that



- 1 if Reverend Holley didn't say anything, then you
- 2 shouldn't do that.
- 3 VICE-CHAIR JONES: This is my part --
- 4 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Chief White.
- 5 CHIEF WHITE: Yes, ma'am, I hear you.
- 6 COMMISSIONER BURCH: You hear me. Thank you so much.
- 7 I wanted to say regarding the Eleventh Precinct, that is
- 8 a whole nucleus of the east side, we work very closely
- 9 together. And I just wanted to say to you with this being
- 10 our last term, one more term of being here, we will not
- 11 stop working with you with what's going on to make our
- 12 city, our neighborhoods respectful and loving. So I want
- 13 you to know that I haven't quit. I will be a retired
- 14 police commissioner. Thank you, Mr. Martin.
- 15 CHIEF WHITE: Thank you Commissioner Burch.
- 16 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Thank you, sir.
- 17 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Thank you Commissioner Burch.
- 18 District 4, Commissioner Willie Bell, do you have any
- 19 questions for the Chief?
- 20 COMMISSIONER BELL: I do. I do have a brief comment.
- 21 I want to thank Chief White and the DPD. It means the
- 22 women are doing an outstanding extraordinary job day to
- 23 day 24-hours. Thank you.
- 24 CHIEF WHITE: Thank you.
- VICE-CHAIR JONES: District 5, Commissioner Willie



- 1 Burton, do you have any questions for the Chief?
- 2 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Absolutely. I have a few that
- 3 come to mind. First you know, Chief, we just looked at
- 4 the news with what just occurred at Oxford schools. Does
- 5 the department have a safety plan or evacuation plan for
- 6 protecting students on school grounds? You know, no child
- 7 should have access to a gun. You know, we have to be able
- 8 to keep our children safe on school grounds. But that's
- 9 one question that comes to mind. Another question is that
- 10 were there any alerts or reports or anything that came in
- 11 pertaining to the parade. You know, I was down at the
- 12 parade, I saw many DPD officers really greeting those who
- 13 were there at the parade with smiley faces and everything
- of that nature, but what stood out was Homeland security,
- 15 standing there as Stormtroopers with assault rifles in
- 16 their arms.
- 17 COMMISSIONER BURTON: And so, I'd like to know, were
- 18 there any notifications or anything that this department
- 19 received. If so, why didn't the commissioners receive it?
- 20 If that was the case, but we don't want to see law
- 21 enforcement standing like Stormtroopers in our city,
- 22 especially at a parade. Once again DPD were greeting
- 23 people, assisting people and things throughout the
- 24 parade, and seemed to have done a pretty decent job, but
- 25 we didn't like being at the parade watching Homeland



- 1 security, standing like storm troopers. Were there any
- 2 arrests at the parade or anything of that nature, any
- 3 report or data pertaining to the parade? You had a lot of
- 4 people passing from all over. And so,
- 5 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Commissioner Burton, could you
- 6 wrap it up, please?
- 7 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Yes, that was my final
- 8 statement for this section for the Chief.
- 9 CHIEF WHITE: Well, I'll deal with your first
- 10 question first. With regards to you know, what happened
- in Oxford, Michigan, very tragic as I indicated earlier.
- 12 We have a very dynamic commander in Commander Szilagy. I
- 13 refer to him and I always make them feel that way. We
- 14 have some pretty intense meetings but he's one of the
- 15 best in the country. I know that because I get calls
- 16 about him and he's been offered to go other places, but
- 17 have chosen us, and we're very happy that he's done that.
- 18 He is constantly training and training others and
- 19 learning from others. He debriefs every one of these
- 20 cases. He loves this stuff. Trust me when Oxford settles
- 21 and we, you know, we have to be sensitive to all that's
- 22 happening. When information is released, he will debrief
- 23 it and we will learn from each and everything that
- 24 occurred there and things that we can do to be
- 25 preventative. Responsible gun ownership is the key



- 1 particularly when you mix that with those who are
- 2 suffering from mental illness, and I'm not suggesting
- 3 that this kid is by the way. I'm just speaking of
- 4 responsible gun ownership and mental illness and then
- 5 simply responsible gun ownership and children.
- 6 CHIEF WHITE: So there's a lot to unpack here but we
- 7 will be there to unpack and learn from it and to make
- 8 sure that we train to it. With regards to DPS, we have a
- 9 great relationship with Chief Johnson and we talk quite a
- 10 bit. We talked yesterday and we talked last night, and
- 11 what we're going to do is continue to train. But the work
- 12 that the commander does with his team with SRT, our Metro
- 13 division, our tactical services section, our sniper
- 14 teams, there are a number of things that happen that go
- 15 under the radar on purpose and there's a strategy to how
- 16 we do our business. With regards to the parade, yes, you
- 17 saw officers shaking hands and smiling, and that's
- 18 exactly what their role was, but what you didn't see is
- 19 those officers who were in the crowd watching the parade,
- 20 dressed like you were that day, probably.
- 21 CHIEF WHITE: And that was their role to look as
- 22 though they were enjoying the parade. But also providing
- 23 us information on those who were acutely aware of
- 24 movement and things such as that. It took a lot of things
- 25 to pull that off without incident. And we were on



- 1 heightened alert and sensitivity because of the incident
- 2 that happened prior to that at a parade where someone
- drove a vehicle into a crowd. So, you know, we're not
- 4 going to discuss in this forum all of the components to
- 5 it. I did see and walk by Homeland security who were
- 6 armed, but please understand, they were there in a
- 7 security capacity and we've seen some openly carrying
- 8 that same weapon that they were carrying in environments
- 9 such as that, which we didn't approach. So you know, it's
- 10 difficult to measure something when nothing happens, had
- 11 something happen, perhaps we'll be having a different
- 12 discussion.
- 13 CHIEF WHITE: So I'm very proud of the work that
- 14 happened Thursday. It happened without incident and
- 15 arrest. No major incidents, a lot of safety protocols
- 16 went into place. And as you indicated, the officers were
- 17 there. The uniformed officers were there doing their
- 18 thing welcoming all those who came down to enjoy the
- 19 parade in the rain, in the cold and those that were on
- 20 the cover did their work, those that were in the air did
- 21 their work, those that were on the roof did their work.
- 22 There was a lot that went into that. But offline, sir, I
- 23 will talk to you in more detail about some of the
- 24 specifics and how we deploy so that you have a better
- 25 understanding.



- 1 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Sure and in closing Chief --
- 2 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Thank you, Chief. The Vice-Chair
- 3 recognizes District 6, Commissioner Lisa Carter. Do you
- 4 have any questions for the Chief?
- 5 COMMISSIONER CARTER: No questions. Thank you.
- 6 VICE-CHAIR JONES: The Vice-Chair recognizes District
- 7 7, Commissioner William Davis. Do you have any questions
- 8 for the Chief?
- 9 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Oh, absolutely, absolutely. My
- 10 first question is this, these numbers for sexual assaults
- 11 are very, very alarming. And I know a lot of people are
- 12 very concerned about that, especially just look at, we
- 13 have five Precincts where the numbers went up over 38%,
- 14 especially Precincts 11 and 12. You know, this is very
- 15 alarming, you know, so we need to look into that a whole
- 16 lot more. And we need to do something about the vast
- 17 number of actual rapes. I'm not talking about somebody
- 18 casually touching somebody, but actual rapes in the city.
- 19 Also sir I had some Jolene's with Homeland security, you
- 20 know, when I was running the wastewater treatment plant,
- 21 we welcomed their assistance. I also think it would be
- 22 good if the department would coordinate some joint
- 23 exercises with the schools, you know, like Detroit public
- 24 schools, Wayne County Community College, Wayne State and
- other colleges, universities have some joint mark



- 1 exercises. I know we used to do that in the water
- 2 department regularly because I was one of the FEMA
- 3 trained incident commanders. I think we need to make sure
- 4 it's best to be prepared, then looking silly by not doing
- 5 what we can and should be doing. Thank you. Those are my
- 6 comments.
- 7 CHIEF WHITE: I would like to respond if I can Chair.
- 8 What regards to the cross training, that does occur. And
- 9 it occurs very often. And if it pleases the commission, I
- 10 would like to have Commander Szilagy appear at a later
- 11 day, perhaps before the break for the holidays to provide
- 12 a brief overview of that training and how comprehensive
- 13 it is and the different training groups that he trained
- 14 with for the very reason that you're speaking of
- 15 Commissioner Davis in particular, he will be training to
- 16 what happened in Oxford. He literally looks at these
- 17 cases and trains specifically to those cases so that we
- 18 learn from them, you know, the unfortunate reality is
- 19 someone's going to do it again and we pray that is not
- 20 our city, but if it is, we want to be prepared. I think
- 21 the other thing that's important to note too, Commander
- 22 Szilagy, and this department and our policy trains to
- 23 make access, to gain entry. We don't go and wait, we go
- 24 in, because we know statistically speaking, you have to
- 25 stop the threat or lives will be lost. So we're not going



- 1 to wait outside until we get the first officer on the
- 2 scene. If I'm the first officer on the scene, I have to
- 3 go in and that's what we train to, but he can speak at a
- 4 higher level for the commission with regards to this
- 5 issue. And if it pleases you we can have him come out and
- 6 do just that.
- 7 VICE-CHAIR JONES; Alright, thank you Chief.
- 8 CHIEF WHITE: Very briefly, I'm sorry, when I hear
- 9 numbers, I have to look. We talked about sexual assaults
- 10 and yes, we are alarmed and concerned. Again, we look at
- 11 19 to see the performance of the crime category, and if
- 12 it's consistent with years previous and with 20 being the
- anomaly for the reasons that I've already mentioned, we
- do see that the Second Precinct is down 2%. We see the
- 15 Fourth Precinct is down 11% and then Eight and Nine
- 16 Precincts are down 5 and 2%. So we are turning in the
- 17 right direction, those precincts, particularly number 11
- 18 who are experiencing, I believe the highest uptake of 23%
- 19 of sexual assaults, we're looking at those cases and
- 20 we're trying to identify exactly why they were occurring.
- 21 But again, the only thing we know at this point is that
- 22 they're not predator related. Now that doesn't make it
- 23 any lesser of a crime but the predator component is
- 24 something that we have to attack differently. So we're
- 25 going to continue to look at it, we're going to continue



- 1 to work. We are also alarmed and concerned and we're
- 2 going to have a plan to address the sexual assault
- 3 optics.
- 4 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Okay. Thank you, Chief. The Vice-
- 5 Chair recognizes Commissioner Jesus Hernandez, At-Large.
- 6 Do you have any questions for the Chief?
- 7 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Thank you. Through the
- 8 Chair. Thank you, Chief White, obviously for the ongoing
- 9 great work, not only of you and your executive team, but
- of all the men and women of the department. I have two
- 11 very quick thoughts, whether it be here or offline, I'd
- 12 like a little more depth, the string of vehicle break-ins
- 13 that occurred. I want to say it was either Monday or
- 14 heading into Tuesday in the, on the burner and junction
- 15 side of the city, 48209D6, that's the Fourth Precinct.
- 16 There were a series of at least 6 to 7 vehicle break-ins
- 17 on junction. Not sure if it was coincidence or not, but
- 18 also some kind of collision that occurred at that
- 19 intersection as well. So just hearing from residents we
- 20 would love to have some more depth on, and if there's
- 21 kind of concurrence to that. Secondly would be, it was
- 22 either late spring, early summer. I submitted a request
- 23 on two occasions for late hour 911 calls that were going
- 24 to a Canadian call center before being redirected over
- 25 here to the States. So I'd love to get some closure on



- 1 that. I've had residents reach back out just to get some
- 2 closure and to know if there's even a call center out
- 3 that way, or if they were somehow mistaken.
- 4 CHIEF WHITE: Through the Chair. Yes, sir, we'll get
- 5 right on that. I'll have my chief of staff provide your
- 6 office with that information early next week on both
- 7 items.
- 8 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Thank you.
- 9 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Thank you Commissioner Hernandez.
- 10 The Vice-Chair recognizes At-Large Commissioner Annie
- 11 Holt. Do you have any questions for the Chief?
- 12 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Yes. And thank you so much, Chief
- 13 White for the job that you and your DPD members are doing
- 14 here in the City of Detroit to do the best job that you
- 15 can to help us all to feel safe. Number one, we were
- 16 someplace, and you mentioned that you have a calendar
- 17 that shows when you're going to be in the community and
- 18 the last time I saw you at one of these community
- 19 meetings, you spent 30 minutes plus engaging in and
- 20 responding to citizens' questions and complaints. And I
- 21 believe you said that you created a calendar, I don't
- 22 know if it's completed and you're going to share with us?
- 23 CHIEF WHITE: Yes. So we've gotten a lot of requests
- 24 for community presentations and so we're doing a calendar
- 25 for January that's going to show where we're going to be



- 1 throughout the city. So if there are two groups that want
- 2 to come to someone else's event and ask their questions,
- 3 that'll be possible, and we'll be releasing that on the
- 4 department's website very soon, early January.
- 5 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Thank you for that because I
- 6 really believe that the citizens who attended the one
- 7 where I was, appreciated the time, the candidate list and
- 8 how you answered questions and how you basically, in one
- 9 example demanded the DPD, respond to abandoned cars,
- 10 because at least in a positive response, you were
- 11 operating on quality of life expression, okay. I have two
- 12 comments or questions that I need the Chief to respond
- to. Now does not DPD have what's called shields training?
- 14 CHIEF WHITE: Yes.
- 15 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Whereby citizens are encouraged
- 16 to know how to behave in hostage situations.
- 17 CHIEF WHITE: Yes.
- 18 COMMISSIONER HOLT: And maybe you could have that,
- 19 have a presentation for the board.
- 20 CHIEF WHITE: I can do that.
- 21 COMMISSIONER HOLT: And I'm sure the community,
- 22 people, they're aware of it because you presented it at
- 23 your precincts and we've had it twice over here at the
- 24 Eighth and at our association meeting. So perhaps you
- 25 could make arrangements for that presentation to be made



- 1 at the board. Now over here, and now I don't know if
- 2 you'll be able to.
- 3 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Excuse me Commissioner Holt, could
- 4 you make it brief, please? We have a closed session.
- 5 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Thank you, Vice-Chair. Now here
- 6 on Arron and Schoolcraft there is this huge billboard
- 7 that really is suggesting salaciousness intent. And what
- 8 we want to do is try to figure out to whom we are going
- 9 to have that billboard taken down. It has four young
- 10 ladies with their partial buttocks showing to the public.
- 11 So again, wondering to whom would we go to have that
- 12 billboard taken down?
- 13 CHIEF WHITE: I'm sorry, ma'am you said what street?
- 14 COMMISSIONER HOLT: It's on Evergreen and
- 15 Schoolcraft, the peak upper expressway.
- 16 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I can respond. The City of
- 17 Detroit, all billboards are approved by Detroit. It would
- 18 go back to building and safety and engineering, that's
- 19 who approves, and you can't even put up a billboard
- 20 without the city's license approval. So I would file my
- 21 appeals to them.
- 22 CHIEF WHITE: I'll let my chief of staff drive it
- 23 though, and we'll get back with and we can either guide
- 24 you to DC or I don't even know if they approve one thing,
- 25 but they put up something else. So let us drive it from



- 1 here and we'll follow up with you.
- 2 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Okay. I look forward to that and
- 3 thank you, Chief Craig, Chief White for everything.
- 4 VICE-CHAIR JONES: The Vice-Chair recognizes Vice-
- 5 Chair Martin Jones. I do have a couple of questions for
- 6 the Chief if I could, Miss Annie Holt. Chief White, first
- 7 of all, and definitely on behalf of all the community
- 8 activists across the city, I definitely want to thank you
- 9 for Commander McGinnis, and Captain Blackwell for their
- 10 work, their tireless work in the apprehension of the two
- 11 individuals for the rape of the 63 year old woman Melicia
- 12 Bas and so many others and everything. We all thank you.
- 13 It is a joy that we're able to celebrate that these two
- 14 people are off the street, making our neighborhoods
- 15 safer, making our wives, sisters and daughters safer and
- 16 I thank you so much for that. And as I understand it, I
- 17 think there was another high-profile arrest for a
- 18 shooting that took place back during the two months ago
- 19 also that there's an individual that's under arrest for
- 20 that crime also. So again, thank you from across the
- 21 city. We thank you.
- 22 CHIEF WHITE: Thank you for acknowledging them. You
- 23 know, Captain Severy McGinness, I mean, the list just
- 24 goes on and on. Captain Blackwell and her team, the work
- 25 that these folks are putting in. I can't say thank you



- 1 enough to them. I get to sit in front of you and get the
- 2 accolades. I get to stand in front of the camera and hear
- 3 good job Chief. But it's them, it's not me. It's them
- 4 that's carrying out the mission and just doing an amazing
- 5 job. So thank you for acknowledging them. I appreciate
- 6 that.
- 7 VICE-CHAIR JONES: You're welcome, sir. All right.
- 8 The Vice-Chair recognizes or recalls Commissioner Darryl
- 9 Brown, District 1. Do you have any questions for the
- 10 Chief?
- 11 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Yes, I do. Thank you. I had some
- 12 technical difficulties, but Chief everything I've been
- 13 hearing, I'm just proud to hear it. And thank you for all
- 14 the work that the men and women of this department do. I
- 15 would also like to encourage some of the board members,
- 16 you know, to get out in the field and go down there and
- 17 see Commander Szilagy. You know, when he has that command
- 18 unit out, he'll tell you anything you want to know. I've
- 19 been there, but Chief, my question mainly another comment
- 20 is that the Eighth Precinct also had a Turkey drive and
- 21 the NPOs put together a Turkey giveaway over here on the
- 22 west side of Detroit, which was very successful. But my
- 23 question is to the number of officers that are being
- 24 relieved from duty from the drop program, you know, what
- 25 is that actual number because I'm hearing it's actually



- 1 400 and then what is that plan, the strategy to infield
- 2 and backfield those positions and when we pull those
- 3 officers off the streets, how will this affect the
- 4 complement of officers in these precincts?
- 5 CHIEF WHITE: Actually that's not being articulated
- 6 to you and through the Chair, that's not being
- 7 articulated to you with all the details that it should be
- 8 or with the level of detail that it should be. We're not
- 9 going to be impacted by losing 400 officers. In fact
- 10 there was just a court ruling recently and we're speaking
- of the drop program. People entered the drop program 10
- 12 years ago knowing that they were essentially retiring and
- in five years they would be leaving the department. So
- 14 there was a retirement age. They entered the drop plan
- and five years ago they got a five-year extension, okay,
- 16 which took them into the drop program for 10 years. So
- 17 they went into the program eyes wide open, not being
- 18 critical of the program, but you knew when you signed up
- 19 what you were signing up for.
- 20 CHIEF WHITE: So now we're at a place where one of
- 21 our bargaining units, the Lieutenants and Sergeants
- 22 Association approached the courts and got the approval
- 23 for one year extension with my approval. So annually I'll
- 24 do an assessment of each individual requester and to see
- 25 if they are still providing the services to the community



- and to this department that they've agreed upon when they
- 2 started. And then I would give them a one-year extension.
- 3 The only collective bargaining unit that entered into
- 4 that agreement with the courts was the Lieutenants and
- 5 Sergeants Association. The DPOA is not impacted by that.
- 6 Many in the DPOA have unlimited drop, so it will not
- 7 impact them that way. This number impacts a small number
- 8 of people candidly one bargaining unit primarily the
- 9 command officers bargaining unit.
- 10 CHIEF WHITE: And it's a very small number which, you
- 11 know, I have the ability to appoint or de-appoint. So my
- 12 agreement with that bargaining unit was because you were
- 13 not captured in the judge's order, if you want to
- 14 continue in the department, you'll do so in the
- 15 bargaining unit that was acknowledged by the courts. And
- 16 that is the lieutenants and sergeants association. And I
- 17 stand firm on that because I think it's the right thing
- 18 to do for a number of reasons. And I can go into more
- 19 detail offline with you on that. But it does not impact
- 20 us negatively. We're not losing 400 officers because of
- 21 this program. In fact I have the authority to approve
- 22 annually for the next five years renewals of that
- 23 program.
- 24 COMMISSIONER BROWN: All right. Thank you, Chief.
- VICE-CHAIR JONES: Thank you, Chief. Chairperson



- 1 Holley, I turn the meeting back over to you.
- 2 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much Vice-Chair and
- 3 thank you, Chief for your patience with each and every
- 4 one of us. And thank you for articulation, the answers
- 5 that you have given us, we thank you so much. At this
- 6 time I'd like to have a presentation from the
- 7 professional standard bureau and constitution policies.
- 8 You have 10 minutes, if you don't mind we'd like to have
- 9 you to start now, if you would, please.
- 10 LIEUTENANT TRZOS: Welcome, let's set up real quick.
- 11 I'm not able to share the screen. Is there a possibility
- 12 of a shared screen?
- MS. WHITE: We will work to bring up the co-host
- 14 abilities.
- 15 LIEUTENANT TRZOS: Well, starting I'm Lieutenant
- 16 William Trzos from Internal Affairs, I'll be doing the
- 17 presentation for the Professional Standards Bureau for
- 18 the yearly stats comparison.
- 19 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you. Thank you so much.
- 20 How do you say your last name again?
- 21 LIEUTENANT TRZOS: It's Trzos.
- 22 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Oh, got you. Thank you.
- 23 LIEUTENANT TRZOS: You're welcome. Once we get the
- 24 PowerPoint roll, we get the presentation started.
- MS. WHITE: Yes, sir, you do have co-host abilities.



- 1 LIEUTENANT TRZOS: All right. We'll make our
- 2 presentation, obviously it's the Professional Standard
- 3 Standards Bureau as I said earlier. This is a PSB's
- 4 organizational chart. Director Christopher Graveline's in
- 5 charge. He's in charge of disciplinary administration,
- 6 which is currently being run by Sergeant Davis. She has
- 7 two sergeants, four police officers, one police
- 8 assistant, and two civilians. Internal Control is under
- 9 Director Graveline. It's run by Captain Lena Liddell.
- 10 She's in charge of forced investigations, which has 1
- 11 Lieutenant, 10 sergeants, 1 detective and 1 police
- 12 officer. And she was also in charge of Internal Affairs,
- 13 which has 1 Lieutenant, 10 sergeants, two investigators,
- 14 two detectives, and two police officers. For our
- 15 Professional Standards. Bureaus our complaints come in,
- 16 we have basically three different avenues we go with
- 17 those complaints. If it's a non-criminal matter or less
- 18 conduct, we usually send it to OCI, or we handle it, send
- 19 it to the command to handle, or we no case it, depending
- 20 on what circumstances are.
- 21 LIEUTENANT TRZOS: If there's criminality or serious
- 22 misconduct, Internal Affairs will handle the case. If we
- 23 have an instance where we're not sure exactly what it is,
- 24 we will send it to a preliminary investigation, Internal
- 25 Affairs, to determine what if any criminality, if there's



- 1 anything there. For PSB cases for Force and Internal
- 2 affairs, each case is given 90 days to complete. Certain
- 3 cases are expedited depending on priorities. A lot of our
- 4 cases are delayed based on prosecutor review, court
- 5 proceedings, DNA testing for forensics, the duty status
- of the members. If they're injured or sick, we can't
- 7 continue until they're back to status, we can talk to
- 8 them. And currently we have 17 cases out of the Wayne
- 9 County Prosecutor's Office for review. One was submitted
- 10 by the City of Dearborn. Eight of those cases were
- 11 submitted in 2020. We're still waiting for the prosecutor
- 12 to review them and give us a recommendation.
- 13 LIEUTENANT TRZOS: And of those 17 cases, 9 of the
- 14 members are either separated, either resigned or quit
- 15 prior to discipline. And our current duty status, we have
- 16 13 members on administrative duty. It is basically called
- 17 desk duty. We have 16 members with no guns, it is desk
- 18 duty without the gun. We have 8 members suspended without
- 19 pay and 5 members suspended without pay. I'm sorry, 8
- 20 members suspended with pay and 5 suspended without pay.
- 21 For Internal Affairs, this is our 4-year comparison
- 22 chart; this is going to October 31st, 2021 and each year
- 23 it shows the breakdown of each. Currently this year, we
- 24 have 101 cases as of October 31st. It's a 22% decrease
- over the last three years. As you see, our numbers are



- 1 pretty consistent. We have a little bit lower this year
- 2 than last couple years. So prior cases would be less
- 3 cases than last year If things go well.
- 4 LIEUTENANT TRZOS: For preliminary investigations,
- 5 this is a four year comparison. Those are the cases that
- 6 we said we investigate to see if it's actually an IA case
- 7 or not. We've actually had drastic reduction. A lot of
- 8 that is because we've actually gone off and do a better
- 9 triage of the cases coming in, so we can determine before
- 10 we make a case, whether it goes to us, OCI or the
- 11 command, and that kind of reduces our caseload, because
- 12 we can determine right off the bat that this is not a
- 13 criminal matter. This is going to need to be a matter
- 14 that the command should be handling. So that's why our
- 15 decrease has gone there. For four year cases on forced
- investigation, currently this year at October 31st, we're
- 17 at 49 cases. It is an increase. I know also for some of
- 18 the reasons for the increases that we are handling a lot
- 19 more of the category 2 incidents that the precincts have,
- 20 just because of the high profile of some of them, it will
- 21 take more to make sure the investigation's done with our
- 22 expertise. For firearms discharged in the last four
- years, as you can see, in 2021, we've had 10
- 24 unintentional discharges, 2 shots fired, 3 non-fatal
- 25 shootings and 4 fatal shootings. As you can see the



- 1 numbers for fatal shootings had dropped drastically this
- 2 year compared to last year. Last year, I think we all
- 3 know it was a very different kind of year for us as a
- 4 society. So I think those numbers don't really mean a
- 5 whole lot, maybe a little higher than usual, but I think
- 6 for circumstances with what's going on with society, it
- 7 might be some of the problems caused there, but as you
- 8 can see, the numbers are actually on the rise. I think
- 9 that's where we're definitely dealing with the training
- 10 issue. We're going to talk to our gun range and training
- and find out if we can do a better program with that,
- 12 because it's pretty much trumped the last two years.
- 13 LIEUTENANT TRZOS: Also, we could coincide with
- 14 what's going on with the COVID because our training has
- 15 been unfortunately reduced for that. For fatal pursuit
- 16 accidents in the last four years, this year, we have zero
- 17 fatal pursuits. We have 3 accidents that resulted in
- 18 critical injuries, but zero fatal pursuits. Last year we
- 19 had a 5 and 2, 5 criticals and two fatalities and in the
- 20 previous two years it was 2 and 2 and 2 and 1. So for the
- 21 purpose of making sure our members are following policy
- 22 within chases and make sure they do it safely as well.
- 23 For internal affairs case closures, this is an overview
- 24 of the last three years, obviously our numbers for 2021
- 25 are still lower because the year's not over yet and a lot



- of the cases are still open, but we have sustained
- 2 criminal, we had two cases closed sustained criminal, 14
- 3 cases, not sustained criminal, 7 cases not sustained
- 4 criminal with departmental misconduct.
- 5 LIEUTENANT TRZOS: We had 32 cases of sustained
- 6 department of misconduct. We had seven cases, not
- 7 sustained department of misconduct. We had two cases,
- 8 exonerated criminal and or departmental crime exonerated.
- 9 We had 13 administrative closures and 6 unfounded. For
- 10 forced investigation closures, obviously the same thing
- 11 we don't have in 2021, would be a little bit lower since
- 12 the year's not over yet. A lot of cases will be closing
- 13 by the end of the month. We had 12 forced cases that
- 14 exonerate use of force, 1 sustained use of force, 2 not
- 15 sustain use of force. One is not sustained use of force
- 16 by a department of misconduct. And so far is zero one
- 17 founded and 1 administrative closure, 9 sustained
- 18 departmental misconduct and 1 exonerated. For our
- 19 protests, last year, it was 2000 in the way of our
- 20 protests, we had 34 total protests, 31 closed, 300
- 21 executive reviews and you see 4 were sustained for
- 22 misconduct. We had 5 not sustained, 5 exonerated, 8 were
- 23 administratively closed, 2 were not sustained for the
- 24 misconduct, but we have a department of misconduct and 8
- 25 were unfounded. And that's the presentation we have. Are



- 1 there any questions on the review?
- 2 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioners Lieutenant, really
- 3 somewhat a comprehensive program there, a presentation
- 4 here. Let me ask you this before I asked the
- 5 commissioners, Lieutenant, when you take this information
- 6 tell us how you really take this, how do you use it in
- 7 terms of internally? How do you use it? Am I making
- 8 sense?
- 9 LIEUTENANT TRZOS: Ideally, for Internal Affairs, we
- 10 want our numbers to go down because we want our officers
- 11 to be within policy within lawful white lives, we want
- 12 people doing well. So I think we always try Internal
- 13 Affairs, look at the training aspect of our job. Is this
- 14 a training issue we have or is this something that we're
- not passing on? So we've tried to find issues and say,
- 16 hey, how can we resolve this issue? So we say, hey, well
- 17 officers not being trained, let's make sure this officer
- is aware of what's going on. Because I think it's
- 19 detrimental for our department. If we have members
- 20 getting in trouble, not realizing that they don't know
- 21 what's going on, they don't know is an issue. So we like
- 22 to definitely address, hey, we see a pattern with
- 23 training, let's make sure we resolve that. We see certain
- 24 patterns with certain commands with the same things and
- 25 let's make sure the supervisors there understand that,



- 1 hey, you guys, your members are doing this. They need to
- 2 be addressed prior to making our office.
- 3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: My concern is with those 12,
- 4 those 8 fatal and I guess I'm asking again, is there a
- 5 way that you guys evaluate this with the student as well
- 6 with the teacher in terms of how you would address it in
- 7 the curriculum?
- 8 LIEUTENANT TRZOS: We do coordinate with trainings. I
- 9 know the training academy, they do review all of our use
- 10 of force to do a tactical analysis on it and determine
- 11 whether what the officers did was technically sound
- 12 within our policy within the law. So that's one thing we
- do coordinate with them as well at every shooting we
- 14 have. So we ensure, but we also reviewed Tuesday what the
- 15 technical ways to improve this are. And actually some of
- 16 the ways, what can we avoid this too as well? Because
- obviously we don't want to remember our members getting
- 18 involved in shootings, if we don't have to. Sometimes
- 19 it's better to retreat and let the person get away, catch
- 20 a later day if we can.
- 21 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Right. Got you. Commissioners,
- 22 can I have a full screen if I could, please, so I can see
- 23 the commissioners. If there's a question that you have to
- 24 ask the Lieutenant?
- 25 COMMISSIONER JONES: Yes.



1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Who is that? Oh, Commissioner

- 2 Jones.
- 3 VICE-CHAIR JONES: This is Vice-Chair Jones.
- 4 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes.
- 5 VICE-CHAIR JONES: I wanted to ask a question because
- 6 it seems like your report was going back and forth over
- 7 the line with regards to CCRs, especially when you read
- 8 the fourth part of the investigations. Now, am I to
- 9 understand that this is a report that's generated
- 10 strictly on the Internal Affairs outside of things where
- 11 there is a possible criminal nature or is it completely
- 12 separate or does it cross over into the CCRs as well?
- 13 LIEUTENANT TRZOS: For CCR purposes, this is all for
- internal affairs, but it is, say, we get a complaint, say
- 15 a citizen calls our office and says, hey, I was robbed by
- 16 the police officer last week. And we made the allegation.
- 17 It's a criminal allegation, but we reviewed the video and
- 18 we show the officers didn't steal anything. The officers
- 19 put the water on top of the scout car, drove off and it
- 20 fell off the car. That's not a criminal matter, that's,
- 21 that's a failure to secure property matter. It's a
- 22 different policy. We're not going to be spending time in
- 23 the prosecutor's office saying, hey, the officer lost a
- 24 wallet. So that'd be a matter that we either send the
- 25 command or possibly send to OCI depending on where the



- 1 complaint came from. I guess that'd be originally to say
- 2 CCR came from OCI and said, hey, the officer stole my
- 3 wallet and we get the complaint and say, well, the video
- 4 shows, there was no theft, the officers never stole it.
- 5 They put it down at the lady's house and you see the
- 6 neighbor picking the wallet up. So that would not be a
- 7 matter for us to handle because it's not a criminal
- 8 matter. Internal Affairs handles criminal complaints. So
- 9 that'd be more of a commanding complaint say, hey, well,
- 10 you guys failed to secure the members or the civilian
- 11 property. It needs to be addressed there and still have
- 12 some discipline as well. For each and every purpose, we
- don't take CCRs here directly. We don't correlate them
- 14 unless they're exchanged through the proper procedures.
- 15 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Okay. All right. I was just
- 16 curious. Thank you.
- 17 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commission Davis.
- 18 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Yes. My question is this, I
- 19 think it listed 8 people suspended with pay. What type of
- 20 things are people suspended with pay for and how long can
- 21 someone be suspended? Because, you know, I did 34 years
- 22 with the city water department, and whenever we suspended
- 23 somebody that was without pay. So it's troubling to see
- 24 that we could have people suspended for, I know how long
- 25 with pay.



- 1 LIEUTENANT TRZOS: Well, most of those are regarding
- 2 criminal base, basically waiting criminal adjudication to
- 3 the courts. So most of the members are -- most cases that
- 4 might not be a formal offense necessarily. I think a
- 5 prime example would be a simple assault. We keep the
- 6 person off. We want them on the street, but they deal
- 7 with their criminal aspect first. And I know with the
- 8 board, we do have Director Graveline to explain to you
- 9 more about the process we'll be doing in the future with
- 10 certain members, they're suspended with pay.
- 11 DIRECTOR GRAVELINE: Through the Chair. This is
- 12 Director Graveline. To your question Commissioner Davis.
- 13 So there's a variety of reasons why we might not want a
- 14 member still in the Precinct and that's why we would put
- 15 them off with pay. It might not raise the level of
- 16 criminal adjudications. Many times we have to wait for
- 17 the Wayne County prosecutor's office to make their
- determination. And then once they do, that's generally
- 19 when we bring it to the board, to then put them on
- 20 administrative leave with no pay. So sometimes it's that
- 21 interim period that you'll see someone listed as
- 22 suspended with pay.
- 23 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: But that could last for weeks or
- 24 months?
- 25 DIRECTOR GRAVELINE: That could last for weeks or



- 1 months. And some of that is not within our control based
- 2 upon waiting for Wayne County Prosecutors decisions.
- 3 Thank you so much. Commissioner Bernard
- 4 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Just quickly Lieutenant, thank
- 5 you for your report. It was a good report. I'm about your
- 6 screen, about what hasn't happened with respect to the
- 7 protests of a year ago, where the department you know,
- 8 received numerous allegations of use of force that were
- 9 inappropriate. I've also received calls from the ACLU and
- 10 the lawyer organizations that have represented me. Some
- of these people we have yet to provide, you get to
- 12 provide either the board a report on what happened with
- 13 those protesters in terms of police conduct or provide
- 14 anyone else the final report. It's been more than a year.
- 15 Why is that?
- 16 DIRECTOR GRAVELINE: Through the Chair and
- 17 commissioner? So the reason for that is we still have
- 18 three open investigations. Some of them lagged in time
- 19 because the complaint didn't come through in a timely
- 20 manner, some just lagged because we're trying to identify
- 21 some of the people involved. But we still have three
- 22 open. In fact, I just reviewed one today. But we should
- 23 be wrapping that up here very shortly. I believe we've
- 24 given periodic numbers and briefings to the board about
- 25 what the conclusions have been, but you're right. There



- 1 has not been a comprehensive report yet. And we will
- 2 ensure that that is done at the conclusion of all of the
- 3 invest
- 4 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Chris, with all due respect,
- 5 there is as you know, a film that has been produced by
- 6 people who were involved in the protests that shows, if
- 7 you will, police brutality. You have that film, I know,
- 8 we have yet to get anything. And we have been pressured
- 9 as board members to address what happened during those
- 10 protests and a year is way more than what it is, 15
- 11 months now. I mean, it just makes no sense. We've got to
- 12 step this up and we've got to report, the board has to
- 13 report back to the public on this issue to me.
- 14 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you, Commissioners. You
- 15 want to have the last word, Graveline?
- 16 DIRECTOR GRAVELINE: The only thing I will say is
- 17 sometimes investigations take that long, especially when
- 18 we're having difficulty identifying some individuals. We
- 19 will get this done. We will report back based upon what
- 20 we've seen. We have sustained misconduct on a number of
- 21 cases, approximately 6 that I'm aware of. But many of
- 22 them were not sustained. And so I am aware of the film
- 23 but I also believe that by and large, our officers acted
- 24 very appropriately during the protests of last year. And
- 25 we will be reporting out on that.



- 1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much and thank both
- of you very much. Thank you, commissioners, for your
- 3 questions as well.
- 4 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Commissioner has his hand raised?
- 5 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Oh, I'm sorry, please forgive
- 6 me.
- 7 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, Mr. Chair. I just want
- 8 to clarify one point that the charter says, we said
- 9 weekly, that we are the final authority. That is not
- 10 true, perhaps that were true in the '70s and '80s but the
- 11 contract and arbitration supersedes that. And this is
- 12 clearly outlined that to the public, they need to know
- 13 that because the only authority we have is reference to a
- 14 suspension without pay. It's clear to this board that we
- do not fire police officers. We have oversight, but those
- 16 two areas, I think the public need to know that because
- 17 so many individuals have approached me in reference to
- 18 that particular misconception of the charter. That is the
- 19 clarity on it, and I think we need to say that to the
- 20 public the DPD, know that, so we should not be advocating
- 21 that we are the final authority. Our charter says one
- 22 thing, but arbitration contracts say something else. And
- 23 we saw that in Corporal Jones' case. We went through
- 24 arbitration. They awarded him promotion but I just wanted
- 25 to clear because when you put information out there, it



1 should be accurate and to the facts of the matter. Thank

- 2 you.
- 3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you, thank you.
- 4 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Mr. Chair.
- 5 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I need to, yes, Commissioner
- 6 Burch.
- 7 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Yes. I wanted to, what
- 8 Commissioner Bell just said, and to you, Director
- 9 Graveline. So explain to me because I'm trying to
- 10 understand what you're saying. Like when you bring before
- 11 the board, a certain officer that has been charged with
- 12 certain charges, and then it turns around and look like
- 13 we don't hear any more about a particular case. I'm not
- 14 going to mention the gentleman's name, but how does that
- 15 work? Director Graveline, when you say one thing, this
- 16 person is going to be off without pay or medical leave,
- 17 then all of a sudden we hear another motion. How does
- 18 that work? And if you can call me offline, I'll tell you
- 19 the person's name. How do you do that, change what you
- 20 said?
- 21 DIRECTOR GRAVELINE: Through the Chair?
- 22 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes.
- 23 DIRECTOR GRAVELINE: Commissioner Burch, I'm not
- 24 entirely sure. And I will call you offline. I'm not sure
- 25 which situation you're referencing. Generally speaking,



- 1 once we put someone on admin leave with no pay, absent,
- 2 an acquittal in court or something along those lines,
- 3 that person, generally speaking, is not brought back to a
- 4 full pay or full duty status. There have been situations
- 5 like that. Not too many in the recent past, I would say
- 6 over the last two or three years, but that would be the
- 7 reason we might bring someone back to full duty after
- 8 being on admin leave, no pay.
- 9 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Okay. Well, Mr. Chair, thank you
- 10 and Mr. Graveline please get my cell number and call me
- 11 then I can really talk to you personally and bring it
- 12 back to the board. Thank you.
- 13 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: All right. Thank you very much.
- 14 Thank all of you. Thank you so much, Chris. Thank you so
- 15 much, Lieutenant. Thank you both for being here. At this
- 16 time, Ms. White, can you make your report?
- MS. WHITE: Yes, sir. Through the Chair, Chief White
- 18 had to leave the meeting, so Assistant Chief David
- 19 LeValley is now in the meeting. And moving to the report
- 20 for the incoming communications for this week. Please
- 21 note the agenda that is in front of you. And we are also
- 22 working to pull that up for the public's viewing. The
- 23 weekly DPD facial recognition technology report for
- 24 November 15th, 2021 through November 28th, 2021. The
- 25 board also received the reoffending evaluation report and



- 1 NACOLES material in preparation for the board's trip and
- 2 travel training conference to Arizona. And you also
- 3 received the schedule and other relevant information for
- 4 the NACOLES conference. The board also received the
- 5 police lawsuit case number 21-169898-GZ. The board
- 6 received the project Green Light report for November
- 7 29th, 2021. Also the operation clean sweep report in
- 8 addition to other various staff reports for your
- 9 consideration.
- 10 MS. WHITE: And also I would like to mention the
- 11 board received the DPDs Detroit Police Chaplain Corps
- 12 holiday celebration invitation requesting RSVPs. If you
- 13 have not had an opportunity to RSVP, please contact the
- 14 board's office so that we can notify the Detroit Chaplain
- 15 Corps and just an update on the BOPC feedback survey,
- 16 2021, Miss Theresa Blossom, our Community Relations
- 17 Coordinator is available to provide an update in that
- 18 regard. The survey has gone live for residents' feedback
- 19 and their comments regarding the Board of Police
- 20 Commissioners and the oversight responsibilities. And Ms.
- 21 Blossom is available to give additional information in
- 22 that regard.
- 23 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Miss Blossom.
- 24 MS. BLOSSOM: Thank you. I'm going to share my
- 25 screen. As Interim Board Secretary White indicated the



- 1 survey is available now. It's been shared with
- 2 subscribers to bill PC news alerts and other gov
- 3 delivery, update subscribers. It's available, as you can
- 4 see through our website and it's also posted to Facebook.
- 5 So we expand the availability for the public to
- 6 participate. And as the board knows, this is part of the
- 7 board's resolution and support of President Obama's task
- 8 force on 21st century policing and the pillars that dealt
- 9 with making sure the community had opportunities to share
- 10 thoughts and perspectives on civilian oversight,
- 11 community policing, and public safety. It will be active
- 12 through the end of this year like with the BOPC feedback
- 13 2020, a report will be compiled, presented during a board
- 14 meeting and posted on the website. I'm available for
- 15 questions at any time. Thank you honorable board.
- 16 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much, Ms. Blossom.
- 17 Thank you so much. Thank all of you very much. Mrs.
- 18 Ericka Whitley, law department, are you still there with
- 19 me?
- 20 ASSISTANT CORPORATION COUNSEL WHITLEY: Yes, Mr.
- 21 Chair.
- 22 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Can you give me... I'd like to
- 23 have this, if you would, please, before I go to finish
- out the agenda, can you just give me a three-minute
- 25 summary of what you found At-Large appointment or large



- 1 in terms of the commissioners? You remember that?
- 2 ASSISTANT CORPORATION COUNSEL WHITLEY: Could you
- 3 repeat that, Mr. Chair?
- 4 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: This whole question about
- 5 whether commissions are At-Large or appointed. You did
- 6 research on that and what was your finding? What was your
- 7 finding?
- 8 ASSISTANT CORPORATION COUNSEL WHITLEY: Let me pull
- 9 up that. In general, it was while I'm pulling it up. I'm
- 10 sorry. I wasn't prepared for it. I believe so. The way
- 11 the charter is written in your rules, it designates the
- 12 elective members by district and it designates the
- 13 appointed members. And so it's correctly noted that the
- 14 charter references the appointed members as appointed. It
- does not say the words at large. However, it says in the
- 16 charter that the elected members are not at large. And
- 17 what I did in going through the analysis was going
- 18 through the functionalities and the responsibilities in
- 19 the charter. Now, I will reiterate that my opinion was
- 20 privileged. So it's not necessarily anything that's
- 21 groundbreaking to share, but I just wanted to be clear
- 22 that, you know, am I speaking of it at the permission of
- 23 the board discussing some of the specific things that I
- 24 said with the permission of the board? Mr. Chair?
- 25 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I'm sorry. I'm listening but I



- 1 didn't hear you, is it a question you asking me?
- 2 ASSISTANT CORPORATION COUNSEL WHITLEY: Well, we
- 3 privileged the document.
- 4 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Right, that's what I'm saying.
- 5 And we send it out, but I want to make sure that we all
- 6 understand for the audience, for the community that we
- 7 basically, you recommending that we'll be recognized, not
- 8 At-Large, but as appointed. Am I right?
- 9 ASSISTANT CORPORATION COUNSEL WHITLEY: Well, I did
- 10 not see any issue with it. I think the key would be that
- 11 when you discuss the responsibilities of the
- 12 commissioners under the charter, under the rules, their
- 13 function, and when you look at, when they call the
- 14 electric members, not At-Large, it would, you have to
- 15 just reasonably deduce that the appointed people are At-
- 16 Large. Now,, when you talk about constituent relations
- 17 and you talk about the fact that the people who are
- 18 elected represent a district, I put the definition of a
- 19 district inside of the opinion of what the charter
- 20 defines as a District and it's a geographically outlined
- 21 area. And that is what applies to the elected
- 22 commissioners. The appointed commissioners, there's no
- 23 specific designation listed for geographically
- 24 representation of the constituents.
- 25 ASSISTANT CORPORATION COUNSEL WHITLEY: So the



- 1 question becomes, if an At-Large commissioner receives a
- 2 call from someone who is in District 3, would they say, I
- 3 can't help you. If it's a district issue, would they
- 4 handle it? And my understanding and how it was described
- 5 to me is that the appointed commissioners have all of the
- 6 same responsibilities as the elected commissioners.
- 7 There's no distinguishing in the charter as to how you
- 8 all function. You all are both the same, you handle
- 9 constituent responses the same, you have the same
- 10 interaction. So without that distinction, it is
- 11 reasonable and fair to say that they have an At-Large
- 12 representation. If one of the commissioners would tell me
- that a person who's appointed does not do any constituent
- 14 relations, if they receive a complaint or a call, if they
- don't handle it and it's only the elected people who do
- 16 that, then that would possibly be a different opinion.
- ASSISTANT CORPORATION COUNSEL WHITLEY: I'm sorry,
- 18 but it's just what it is. It would not be fair to say
- 19 that as someone that's an appointee who has all of the
- 20 same responsibilities simply has to call themselves. And
- 21 so the analogy that I used is that the charter is
- 22 specific to say, not At-Large. So, because it's specific
- 23 to say that elected members are not At-Large, we don't
- 24 technically say that either. We don't say, you know,
- 25 Commissioner Willie Bell not At-Large, District 3. I



- 1 mean, the terms of art versus what the charter
- 2 specifically says are two different things. You all refer
- 3 to each other as by District, you say, I'm Commissioner
- 4 William Davis District, what, you know, I'm sorry,
- 5 district by you refer to the way you all reference
- 6 yourselves is not also specifically delineated in the
- 7 charter.
- 8 ASSISTANT CORPORATION COUNSEL WHITLEY: So it is one
- 9 of those things where you have to kind of take, as we
- 10 know, in the law, a lot of reasonableness, and you have
- 11 to look at the functionality and the practicality and
- what the commissioners are doing. So that is the reason
- 13 why we came with the... There's nothing wrong now with
- 14 the question of like, could there be other ways to write
- it? Yes. Could there be other ways to do it? Absolutely.
- 16 But is it a legal infraction? Is it a matter of law of
- 17 how you reference yourselves? In this particular
- 18 instance, the opinion is no.
- 19 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Got you. Thank you so much
- 20 attorney. At this time, can we just take a moment of
- 21 silence to basically the victims for the families of the
- 22 Oxford High School shooting incident, if we can just
- 23 pray? We fail to do that in the beginning. And I just
- 24 feel in my spirit, we need to just take time out and just
- 25 take a couple moments to just remember and pray for the



- 1 victims and their families and the various people that's
- 2 involved in this tragedy that took place at Oxford High
- 3 School in Oxford, Michigan. Can we just take a moment
- 4 now, please? Thank you so much. Is there any new
- 5 business?
- 6 COMMISSIONER BELL: Mr. Chairman.
- 7 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes.
- 8 COMMISSIONER BERNARD:
- 9 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes.
- 10 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Mr. Chairman, I wanted to
- 11 respond to attorney Whitley. I saw your---
- 12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner, Commissioner. I
- 13 really, if you don't mind, I just really want to have a
- 14 discussion about it. I just wanted to try to clear it up
- 15 and I'm not quite sure that we really got what I wanted
- 16 done. So if you don't mind, let me just move on with your
- 17 permission, please. Can I have announcements?
- 18 COMMISSIONER BELL: Mr. Chairman.
- 19 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes. Commissioner Bell.
- 20 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes. New business or unfinished
- 21 business. I just want to put on the record, my concern in
- 22 reference to NACOLES delegates from the Board of Police
- 23 Commissioners. I sent out an email to all the board
- 24 members in reference to my concern and to the Chair. We
- 25 have had this conversation over a period of time, and I



- 1 thought we had an understanding, but contrary to that, I
- 2 think in the last couple weeks, we have had two outgoing
- 3 commissioners attend the NACOLES conference at city
- 4 expense. And I think that it is improper and unethical.
- 5 They would not gain anything that would benefit the board
- 6 or the City of Detroit. When we look at it, I don't see
- 7 outgoing council people attending any conference or
- 8 anything of that nature. It's a junk trip for these
- 9 individuals involved. So I just want to put on record,
- 10 and perhaps I would draft a letter to the effect, and I
- 11 get an official response from the Chair why action was
- 12 taken in this manner. But I think the public needs to
- 13 know, because if we are oversight, DPD does not indulge
- in that type of arrangement of travel of a person who is
- 15 retiring or going off, especially when in a two weeks
- 16 period of time. So I want to put it on record to be clear
- in terms of the clarity. I thought we could handle this
- internally, that is not the case. So I think we need to
- 19 speak, at least I need to speak to it. Thank you.
- 20 COMMISSIONER BURTON: To the Chair.
- 21 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioners, Commissioner
- 22 Bell, so noted and it is on record.
- 23 COMMISSIONER BURTON: To the Chair.
- 24 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Burton, I'm going
- 25 to oral communications but I need announcements. Is it



- 1 something that you really want to speak other than what
- 2 has already been spoken? Commissioner Burton?
- 3 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Yes. Mr. Chairman.
- 4 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: You got one minute.
- 5 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I will be as brief as possible.
- 6 I just wanted to say that we all are commissioners',
- 7 number one, and we should have the same respect for one
- 8 another. And there is training that's going to be
- 9 training that's going to be conducted from the 12th
- 10 through the 16th. And so these commissioners that I quess
- 11 Commissioner Bell is referring to, are technically still
- 12 commissioners until January, and it wouldn't have
- 13 mattered one way or another. If the training happened
- 14 September versus December, this is a form of training
- 15 that they have not received, that they are entitled to
- 16 receive. And they are still sitting commissioners, and
- 17 they still represent the district that they were elected
- 18 to serve in. And so we should be fair and should have no
- 19 favoritism or nepotism or anything that we should display
- 20 because we do not want things like this to come back to
- 21 hinder this honorable board.
- 22 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you, Commissioner. Thank
- 23 you. Thank you and it would be noted on the record as
- 24 well. Mr. Brown, if you can give announcements please.
- 25 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Excuse me. Excuse me. My hand



- 1 was up.
- 2 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I'm moving on Ms. Burch,, unless
- 3 you have an announcement or something I'm moving on.
- 4 COMMISSIONER BURCH: No, I want to make a comment
- 5 like everybody else did.
- 6 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: We have a comment based upon pro
- 7 and con, so it's on the record. I'm just saying, let's
- 8 just move,
- 9 COMMISSIONER BURCH: I'm not speaking about what they
- 10 were talking about. If you will allow me to speak, Mr.
- 11 Chairman.
- 12 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Mr. Chairman, I do as well,
- 13 but I guess Commissioner Burch has something to say. Mine
- 14 is the,
- 15 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Let me just do that.
- 16 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I want to move, Mr. Chairman
- 17 we got a memo that said, in fact that we weren't going to
- 18 be able to have virtual meetings anymore. All I wanted to
- 19 do was ask for a motion that the board could send a
- 20 proposal to Lansing that would allow us to determine it
- 21 within your discretion. If in fact we can have virtual
- 22 meetings because we've been asked to
- 23 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Point of order. You did not
- 24 have permission from the Chair.
- 25 COMMISSIONER BURCH: This is what I'm saying. You



- 1 know what, have nothing against you Commissioner,
- 2 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner, commissioner
- 3 Burch, Commissioner Burch you may speak,
- 4 COMMISSIONER BURCH: I'm speaking to you.
- 5 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: You may speak.
- 6 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Yes, I thank you so much. I just
- 7 want to say before I make an announcement, if you will
- 8 allow that, that the behavior of your co-chair needs to
- 9 be addressed. You as a co-chair, I will not be
- 10 disrespected. When I'm speaking to Chief White, he
- 11 interrupts my thought by the Chief giving such a long
- 12 report. We have to delegate which subject we're going to
- 13 talk about, Chair Holley and I never get to bring my
- 14 point across to Chief White without him interrupting me.
- 15 That is Commissioner Jones. And you don't say anything. I
- 16 don't think that's courtesy. I will not be disrespected
- 17 that way. I wanted to go on record as Commissioner Bell
- 18 said, on record, that he needs to change his attitude.
- 19 And when you get ready for me to make the announcement, I
- 20 will do that before you do public comments, sir, I thank
- 21 you. I'm waiting for you.
- 22 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you, Commissioner Jones.
- 23 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Through the Chair. One of the
- 24 things that I do, and I'm pretty sure nobody has an
- 25 argument with this is that I give equal time. Equal time



- 1 that's been afforded to each and every one of the
- 2 commissioners by the Chairperson himself. She gets equal
- 3 time to put a point out. However, because she speaks in a
- 4 manner that she does, it comes out a little bit slower
- 5 and it takes a little time. She gets equal time,
- 6 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Now I don't know how to speak.
- 7 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Excuse me, I didn't interrupt you.
- 8 Excuse me.
- 9 [Crosstalk]
- 10 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioners, Commissioners,
- 11 Commissioners, Commissioner Jones has the floor.
- 12 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: My hand was up before he started
- 13 talking. But they are special privileges for special
- 14 people here.
- 15 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Look, Davis, if you don't care,
- 16 I'm just saying to you, I'm recognizing Commissioner
- Jones. I'll come to you. We have until midnight. So I can
- 18 come to you anytime I want to. So Commissioner Jones, you
- 19 have the floor,
- 20 COMMISSIONER JONES: As I was saying, sir, thank you
- 21 very much. I give equal time to each and every one of the
- 22 commissioners, some of the commissioners even take more
- 23 time than what's allotted. And I give that time equally.
- 24 And so for someone to say that I'm not doing it, or that
- 25 I'm interrupting is not a fair statement to make at all.



- 1 If you can make your statement or ask your question in a
- 2 timely manner, which most of the questions are preempted
- 3 by a lot of dialogue in that question, if they would get
- 4 to the question, they would have more of an ample enough
- 5 time to turn around and answer thereby taking the time
- 6 that they've been given. And that's what I do. I do it
- 7 fairly and I look at my clock.
- 8 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much, Commissioner.
- 9 Commission Davis.
- 10 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Ah, yes. So, well, I know that
- 11 there's a certain commissioner who did not want me to go
- 12 to NACOLES because he's afraid I'm going to.
- 13 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Look, Mr. Davis, Commission
- 14 Davis. I'm not dealing with that. I'm not dealing with
- 15 that. I'm not going to have a back to forth communication
- 16 from one commissioner to the other. So I'm just saying to
- 17 you is at this particular time I'm moving on, I'm moving
- on. So let me have Ms. Birch, do you have an
- 19 announcement?
- 20 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Yes, I do.
- 21 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay.
- 22 COMMISSIONER BURCH: The announcement is that
- 23 yesterday, we did a ribbon cutting for Mr. Pretzel, the
- owner of Belmont shopping center and the community in
- 25 Warren, Michigan. The old Walgreens has been turned into



- 1 a medical facility for seniors, and we were there with a
- 2 ribbon cutting to welcome them into Warren because the
- 3 owner of Belmont believes in connecting across the city.
- 4 So that's my organization, community united for progress
- 5 and the Belmont shopping center. We want you all to know
- 6 you are welcome naturally to go over there. That's the
- 7 announcement, Chair Holley. Thank you.
- 8 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Robert Brown.
- 9 MR. ROB BROWN: Yes, sir. Good afternoon, Mr. Chair,
- 10 these are your announcements. The next BOPC virtual
- 11 meetings are December 9th and December the 23rd. For the
- 12 public, please keep in mind the board would not be
- 13 meeting on December the 16th due to the board going to
- 14 training in Tucson, Arizona, to NACOLES. And Mr. Chair
- 15 with that, if you want me to, I'll go straight to public
- 16 comments.
- 17 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes.
- MR. ROB BROWN: Mr. Chair, we currently have 9
- 19 speakers. I call them by threes. Your first speaker would
- 20 be Lieutenant Mark, Young LSA President, Miss Bernie
- 21 Smith and Mr. Eric Blunt, Lieutenant Young.
- 22 LIEUTENANT YOUNG: Hello?
- 23 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes.
- 24 LIEUTENANT YOUNG: Not perfect. Can't be. Not
- 25 perfect. Can't be, especially in today's society. Looters



- 1 speed bumps, flash mobs, protestors, dealing with COVID
- 2 19 violent offenders with decriminalized crime. It can't
- 3 be perfect for my colleagues that's out here every day.
- 4 Law enforcement officers are victims too, especially in
- 5 the Detroit Police Department. They go out there and do
- 6 it every day. Their victims too, as the Chief says, you
- 7 know the reward, they get to do it every day. They get to
- 8 do it all over again, but we are better than most. We are
- 9 better than most, never forget that. I also receive calls
- 10 of thanks and gratitude for the men and women of the
- 11 Detroit Police Department to go out there and bust their
- 12 behinds every day. Regarding the protests and everything
- 13 else, they do an excellent job. Regarding the CCRs, when
- 14 you do a ratio for the cause of service and the citizens
- 15 contact versus number of CCRs, it's miniscule, what a
- 16 joke that evaluation alleged CCRS. We want everyone to
- 17 see what we go through every day, everyone to see what we
- 18 go through every day. The demeanor CCRs have been
- 19 beneficial to the citizens. These men and women have
- 20 stepped up and sometimes it takes some of the demeanor
- 21 CCRs to get the job done. Just like you guys all got
- 22 demeanor CCRs today, and let's not forget. Let's not
- 23 forget. If you want to know what the men and women and my
- 24 colleagues face every day, on December 7th, 1998, Mike
- 25 Todd was shot in the head Lloyd Michael Todd, Officer



- 1 Lloyd, Michael Todd, Sean Bandy was killed. Ramon.
- 2 Charles was shot. If you want to know what we face every
- 3 day, while you are talking about CCRs, Google Lloyd Mike
- 4 Todd, December 7th, 1998, 23 years ago.
- 5 MR. ROB BROWN: Ms. Bernice Smith.
- 6 MS. SMITH: Good afternoon commissioners. I'm going
- 7 to be brief because I wrote all this down so I can make
- 8 sure I get it out. My question today is why is it
- 9 necessary for a commissioner to broadcast the fact that
- 10 they got a contribution from someone and he has a
- 11 criminal record. And I don't think it's necessary for you
- 12 to brag about that. I would've kept that to myself. When
- 13 running for a police commissioner or any office in the
- 14 public, you just don't say everything about who gives you
- 15 money because you know, eventually it's going to come
- out, that he's not too good. Also, why do callers
- 17 continue to bad mouth certain commissioners for no
- 18 reason. It's sickening and I realized that we must
- 19 exercise our comments and concerns and source but
- 20 consider the source. We have crimes to be solved and
- 21 thank God for Malik and Commissioner Martin.
- MS. SMITH: They were out there on Joy Road. And what
- 23 was it? Joy Road and Dexter. I saw myself because I went
- there to see for myself what was going on. I saw that
- 25 they were giving out literature to the people in the cars



- 1 and they were doing a darn good job. And I'm glad that
- 2 they did find the person who did the crime against that
- 3 senior in the churchyard. We need to get more people
- 4 involved in what's going on in our city and stop
- 5 complaining all the time. And definitely before I get
- off, give our police a raise. They deserve it. Every time
- 7 they put their uniform on and leave their homes, they're
- 8 protecting us and we don't realize it. We're constantly
- 9 at the meetings there at the commission arguing amongst
- 10 ourselves, for what, nothing. Give our police a raise and
- 11 let them realize that they are worthy of our protection.
- 12 I say this to them down at Greektown all the time. I'm
- working on talking about your raise and they appreciate
- 14 that. So I give you this announcement again, give our
- 15 police a raise. They deserve it and stop. Always talking
- 16 about
- 17 MR. ROB BROWN: Minister Eric Blunt.
- MINISTER BLUNT: Can you hear me board?
- 19 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes we can.
- 20 MINISTER BLUNT: Yes. To Lawrence Garcia. Good
- 21 riddance. Your scandalous act of counter suing Detroit
- 22 will breathe with no evidence per judge's decision will
- 23 hopefully follow you the rest of your career. May the
- 24 attorney grievance panel investigation reveal many
- 25 truths? A subpoena was served to the police commissioner



- 1 of New York City by the January 6th committee based on
- 2 his involvement with the mayor. So please note subpoenas
- 3 to police commissioners are not new. So as this city and
- 4 its citizens take serious steps to remove corruption in
- 5 city council, let us also take serious steps with the
- 6 Board of Police Commissioners, starting at the top,
- 7 Commissioner Holley, many citizens of this city have
- 8 waited patiently to hear a clarifying statement from you
- 9 for it is a short walk by most reasonable people that
- 10 you're unwavering support of facial recognition and all
- 11 things the mayor and DPD would like to do.
- MINISTER BLUNT: And the funding approval request by
- 13 the mayor's office for a building bearing your name as
- 14 recently as February 23rd of this year. Another 1.8
- 15 million for this 18 million project was requested from
- 16 the mayor's office to city council approval. To
- 17 Councilman, I mean to Commissioner Bernard, your comments
- 18 in last week's TV broadcasted interview, in which you
- 19 expressed your opinion, that bribery is not a very
- 20 serious crime, reveals a new low in your character, which
- 21 I described in this weekly meeting as a co-conspirator to
- 22 the corruption of this board. I would not be surprised
- 23 if.
- MR. ROB BROWN: Mr. Chair, your next three speakers
- 25 will be Community Advisory Council Chair, Scotty Bowman,



- 1 Ms. Joy and Overwith. Mr. Bowman.
- 2 MR. BOWMAN: Hello. First of all, I'm reading from
- 3 the charter 7-803, duties of the Board of Police
- 4 Commissioners, established policies, rules, and
- 5 regulations review and approved department budget,
- 6 receive and resolve any complaint concerning police
- 7 department operations and make referrals to the
- 8 appropriate authority, act as final authority in imposing
- 9 or reviewing discipline of an employee, make an annual
- 10 report to the mayor and city council on department
- 11 activities. Now I appreciate a commissioner's candor in
- 12 showing himself to be complicit in violations of the
- 13 charter. Let's be clear without the charter there is no
- 14 DPD and you are not police commissioners. The fact that
- 15 some people in Detroit government found a way to assert
- 16 the BOPC's authority and get away with it doesn't mean
- 17 the authority doesn't exist anymore fact that some people
- 18 getting away with murder makes murder legal. Our city
- 19 government was party to signing a contract that undermine
- 20 your authority in violation of the charter.
- MR. BOWMAN: Anyone doing this should be held
- 22 accountable. I see nothing in the charter, barring a
- 23 disciplinary dismissal. The board had its own lawyer who
- 24 was willing to appeal to such a patient. The board needs
- 25 to have its own attorney. Meanwhile, I urge you to reject



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- 1 all budgets that include the continued employment of
- 2 abusive officers and a contract that violates the charter
- 3 you took an oath to abide by in your oath of office that
- 4 should include that you will follow the charter. And the
- 5 charter is the formative document that makes you exist as
- 6 an organization, makes the City of Detroit exist as a
- 7 city, as opposed to just a collection of population on a
- 8 map and makes the police department exist as part of that
- 9 government. Have a good holiday.
- 10 MR. ROB BROWN: Ms. Joy.
- MS. JOY: Yes. Can you hear me?
- 12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes, we can.
- 13 MS. JOY: Okay. Welcome to the board. I would like to
- 14 express some condolence for the late Pastor, Bishop
- 15 Sheard, his family and his family church. Also to you
- 16 Chair Holley, because he was a dear friend of yours and
- 17 for some praise for Miss Kukula and the great work that
- 18 she has been doing for the department and also for
- 19 Lieutenant Lightfoot for the honor that she just received
- 20 for excellence, great work for 36 years. And I would like
- 21 to make note of the goodness in our youth today. They do
- 22 have good in them. They are invaluable people. It's like
- 23 the adult children are us, the older people. We have good
- in us and I praise all people for the good that is in
- 25 them. I don't believe in deifying anyone, but to praise



- 1 the good that is in them and to bring the best in
- 2 everyone out, not just comments, but by my lifestyle and
- 3 appreciation for people and the good that they do.
- 4 MS. JOY: Anybody can say something other than, but
- 5 it takes a person to look deeper and see the good in
- 6 everyone. So I want to be one of those people and I thank
- 7 God for all of you commissioners and the police officers
- 8 and the volunteer work that you may as well say they're
- 9 doing volunteer work because of the things that they have
- 10 to go through and think and face. But I want to say,
- 11 Chair Holley, I appreciate you for your diplomacy, your
- 12 fairness, your listening, and hearing people out. And
- 13 also the authoritativeness of your stand for just doing
- 14 what is right.
- MR. ROB BROWN: Over with.
- OVERWITH: Well, I see Chief White cut out before I
- 17 get to ask this question. When Keneisha Coleman's murder
- 18 case landed on George McGinnis' desk, who in the DPD
- 19 actually classified it as a suicide. And how is Lawrence
- 20 Akbar allowed to not accept citizen's complaints and
- 21 Reverend Jim Holley, why haven't you told the other
- 22 commissioners, as you told me on the phone, never got any
- 23 of those emails and communique I sent over to you and
- 24 Shirley Burch why haven't you told the other
- 25 commissioners about that? Why is Melanie White even still



- 1 employed by the Board of Police Commissioners when it's
- 2 an audiotape of her clearly lying, disrespecting the
- 3 charter, saying that she gave messages to Commissioner
- 4 Brown, Commissioner Burton, and Commissioner Davis, and
- 5 they have not gotten anything. And I don't even have to
- 6 ask them. I know she tells her tale. Now, who is actually
- 7 calling the shots at the DPD? And I want to know why is
- 8 Sheila in the Chief's Office in the first place?
- 9 OVERWITH: Now over at the Eleventh Precinct, you
- 10 have all kinds of things going on with Lieutenant
- 11 Tadajewsji, Sergeant Monica Brudusco. Now Monica told
- 12 some officers not to look at a ring video that would
- 13 clearly demonstrate that the complaint against that
- 14 person was not true. She told him, don't look at the
- video arresting Rueben, that's me. Now, how can
- 16 Lieutenant Angelique Chadwick Bill arbitrarily deem a
- 17 matter civil, and then go to the case file in February of
- 18 2020 and change it, backdating that if she deemed it
- 19 civil in November of 2019. The case was being
- 20 investigated by Sergeant Raymond Hughes and she took the
- 21 case file from him when he was on his way back to his
- 22 desk and went in the file and put a civil designation on
- 23 it from November of 2019. Check Willie Bell.
- MR. ROB BROWN: Mr. Chair, your next three speakers
- 25 would be Ms. Brenda Hill followed by Miss Francis Withers



- 1 followed by Miss Michelle George. Ms. Hill.
- MS. HILL: Yes. Can you hear me?
- 3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes, we can.
- 4 MS. HILL: Yes. Thank you. For this time. And I would
- 5 like to take a second to acknowledge the death of Robert
- 6 Lewis, Robinson II. He is one of us that does the work of
- 7 community serving and maybe the arbiter post child for
- 8 community servant. And he passed on this past Tuesday.
- 9 I'd like to talk about Linda Bernard and the disgraceful
- 10 way that you all allowed her to treat someone who did not
- 11 do anything wrong, meaning D Etta Wilcoxon, and to the
- 12 point that you have not hired a secretary as yet. And
- 13 after you all have seen that report, how dare you sit
- 14 here and allow her word and her vision to stand, her
- 15 position to stand. She is a disgrace. She needs to be
- 16 thrown off this commission. She needs to be censored. I
- 17 was expecting the chair to have gotten information on how
- 18 you censure a police commissioner. He said that his crime
- 19 was not a super crime and D Etta Wilcoxon did nothing
- 20 wrong. And then in fact, I'll have you connect the dots
- 21 of why it is a super crime. He has compromised
- 22 representatives who give out contracts, therefore
- 23 Detroiters don't get jobs. Therefore we have poverty and
- 24 crime and murder is a super crime and it's a byproduct of
- 25 poverty.



- 1 MR. ROB BROWN: Mr. Chair, I don't see Miss Withers,
- 2 so I'm going to go to Miss Michelle George. Ms. George.
- 3 MS. GEORGE: Yes. Hi, Mr. Brown.
- 4 MR. ROB BROWN: Hi.
- 5 MS. GEORGE: Good evening, Chairman Holley, good
- 6 evening to the board. I would like to first of all, would
- 7 like to thank Ms. Melanie white for reaching out
- 8 explaining the process, the complaint. So thank you to
- 9 Ms. Melanie white and her staff. I really appreciate
- 10 that. And also I wanted to talk about the officer
- 11 stopping the lady with the children. That was excellent
- 12 work. And I just really hope that Chief White that could
- 13 be a national news story because we are seeing a lot of
- 14 kidnappings across the city. So, you know, maybe I know
- 15 it's a lot of news stories going on now. So we also want
- 16 those officers to be recognized and I want to thank
- 17 Commissioner Jones and Chief White, your team in the Joy
- 18 Road area, because our church is near that area.
- 19 MS. GEORGE: And Malik Shabas for really finding that
- 20 heinous crime that the man committed. We will put that
- 21 lady, we've been praying for her. We will continue to put
- 22 her on the prayer list as well. Also, the other day I had
- 23 a talk with some students, my students on public gun
- 24 violence, the public health crisis. I just spoke to them
- 25 about that on Tuesday when they texted me about what



- 1 happened in Oxford. And I know Detective Faust out and
- 2 did an active shooter, but some of those children, we
- 3 will continue to pray for them, but also this legislation
- 4 with gun laws and also heeding to the threat when there
- 5 are threats made. But I'm looking forward to when the
- 6 commander comes and debriefs on that. But I wanted to ask
- 7 in terms of the board, we are working on the officers
- 8 getting more money, especially that \$800 million that
- 9 came into the city where I feel some of the money should
- 10 go into officers, with the officers, so I will be talking
- 11 about that in the future, but I wonder can the board, is
- 12 there any way you can get a mediator because you know,
- 13 when we're on listening, it just seems something is not
- 14 right and I'm just wondering
- MR. ROB BROWN: Mr. Chair that was your last speaker.
- 16 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much. And thank all
- 17 of you for participating this afternoon. I'd like that
- 18 it's time the Chair would like to have a motion.
- 19 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: It looks like Nicole Small hand
- 20 was up before 4 o'clock/.
- 21 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Say what now?
- 22 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: It looks like Nicole Small's
- 23 hand was up before 4 o'clock?
- 24 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Mr. Brown is that
- MR. ROB BROWN: No, sir, it wasn't up before 4



- 1 o'clock. It was 4:11.
- 2 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Because someone didn't show up,
- 3 can I listen to her then?
- 4 MR. ROB BROWN: Then she'll call Mr. Chair, yes, sir.
- 5 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Because one dropped out anyway.
- 6 MR. ROB BROWN: Okay. Ms. Small.
- 7 MS. SMALL: Thank you so much. What happened was that
- 8 somehow the zoom ended up recycling and kicked my hand
- 9 down, so I had to erase it. I don't know if that's why
- 10 you didn't see it earlier but thank you so much for this
- 11 opportunity. A couple of things to the point about
- 12 spending money, I said this before, I think that it is
- 13 really critical right now, especially before ending the
- 14 year that this board makes a decision and moves forward
- 15 with hiring a secretary. I have not heard of any reason
- 16 not to hire a secretary. It just looks as if, you know, I
- 17 don't know what's going on in the background, but a
- 18 secretary again, to every board is one of the strongest
- 19 roles. It really, and truly is. So we have someone who's
- 20 being paid with taxpayers dollars. We need to make this
- 21 official and officially hire a secretary.
- MS. SMALL: Also I agree, we need to pay police
- 23 officers more money, but that comes along with having
- 24 someone to definitely take a deeper dive into the budget
- 25 and to make sure that we are not out here and just making



- 1 sure the secondary police officers have the opportunity
- 2 to have all of these jobs. Where is that money going? And
- 3 where is that money coming from? It was supposed to come
- 4 from a lot of the owners of these stadiums, but I don't
- 5 think that that's necessarily true, but we need more
- 6 officers in the neighborhood. And the only way that's
- 7 gonna happen is if we pay them more money. And last but
- 8 not least, I will have to say, I do agree. There's a
- 9 black cloud over this board, and we need to address the
- 10 issue. If there's anyone on this board who is taking any
- 11 type of bribes or donations from someone who is known to
- 12 give bribes to elected officials, it needs to be
- 13 addressed one way or another, just to simply dismiss it.
- 14 You know, it brings into question who else potentially
- 15 may be on the board who might be in that situation. Thank
- 16 you so much. I yield my time.
- 17 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: And thank you very much. Thank
- 18 you, Mr. Brown, for helping me with that and thank all of
- 19 the participants and all of those that basically help to
- 20 have public comment. We thank you so much. At this time,
- 21 the Chair would like to have a motion to go into the
- 22 closed session. All of you have been given a distributor
- 23 on how we go into closed session. Nobody has the
- 24 information to go into closed session. If not then can I
- 25 have a, Mr. Bell, is it a motion I need to go into closed



- 1 session? Mr. Bell?
- 2 COMMISSIONER BELL: I'm sorry.
- 3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Do I have to have a motion to go
- 4 into closed session?
- 5 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes, sir, definitely.
- 6 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Can you make it?
- 7 COMMISSIONER BELL: Can I ask Commissioner Holt to
- 8 make that motion?
- 9 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: All right. Commissioner Holt,
- 10 can you do that?
- 11 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Oh, sure. Yes. I moved that we go
- into a closed session and I'm looking for, and I found my
- 13 zoom meeting information.
- 14 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Good. Commission Davis, can I
- 15 have a second from you Commissioner Davis?
- 16 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: I didn't know if she was
- 17 finished or not because she was supposed to state the
- 18 personnel matter.
- 19 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Support.
- 20 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: She didn't finish.
- 21 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: All, all the favor, say aye.
- 22 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
- 23 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Oppose?
- 24 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Mr. Chair, you have to have a
- 25 roll call vote.



- 1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Oh, I'm sorry. Please forgive
- 2 me. Ms. White, can you give me a roll call vote on the
- 3 closed session?
- 4 MS. WHITE: Yes, sir. And also through the Chair the
- 5 closed session is pursuant to section 8 of and section
- 6 eight A of the open meetings act MCL 15.268, regarding
- 7 personnel items.
- 8 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Thank you, Ms. White.
- 9 MS. WHITE: Yes, ma'am. Through the Chair.
- 10 Commissioner Darryl Brown = Yes.
- 11 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Linda Bernard = Yes.
- 12 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Shirley. A Burch = No.
- 13 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Willie E. Bell = Yes.
- Ms. WHITE: Commissioner Willie E. Burton =.
- MS. WHITE: Commissioner Lisa Carter = Yes.
- MS. WHITE: Commissioner William Davis = Yes.
- 17 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Jesus Hernandez = Yes.
- 18 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Annie Holt = Yes.
- 19 MS. WHITE: Mr. Chair.
- 20 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Vice-Chair Martin Jones = Yes.
- 21 MS. WHITE: Thank you. Thank you, sir. And Mr. Chair?
- 22 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes. All right. Thank you.
- MS. WHITE: I'm sorry.
- 24 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Can we do this in seven minutes?
- 25 Can we get going and come back? Can you do it in seven



- 1 minutes? Can we reconvene?
- 2 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Mr. Chair, are you suggesting
- 3 to take a seven minute recess?
- 4 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I thought we're going to, excuse
- 5 me, maybe I'm missing something here. Don't laugh at me,
- 6 Mr. Davis, just pray for me. Are we going in a closed
- 7 session, we don't go back into another ---?
- 8 MS. WHITE: Another meeting link, sir. Yes, sir.
- 9 COMMISSIONER HOLT: We do.
- 10 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: So why are you laughing at me,
- 11 Davis?
- 12 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Let's go.
- 13 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Let's move on Mr. Chairman.
- 14 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Seven minutes. Seven minutes.
- 15 Okay. We're going back to it. Okay?
- 16 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Wait, Mr. Chair. I'm sorry,
- 17 forgive me. Are you indicating that the closed session
- 18 will start in seven minutes?
- 19 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes. Well,
- 20 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes.
- 21 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes.
- 22 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Okay.
- 23 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Oh, okay. Alrighty.
- We don't have to, we can stay where we are, is what
- 25 you're saying?



- 1 COMMISSIONER BELL: No.
- 2 COMMISSIONER CARTER: No. Mr. Chair, I was just
- 3 confused by the seven minutes.
- 4 MS. WHITE: Mr. Chair.
- 5 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes, ma'am.
- 6 MS. WHITE: If I may say, this meeting will remain
- 7 open so that the public can still remain attending until
- 8 you return from your closed session, you have consent to
- 9 the closed session link for your access. Thank you
- 10 honorable board.
- 11 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: And I thank you, honorable
- 12 White. Okay. At this time I need a motion to go back into
- 13 open session.
- 14 COMMISSIONER HOLT: We go back to, second.
- 15 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: All in favor, say aye.
- 16 COMMISSIONERS: Aye. Aye.
- 17 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Oppose. Okay then. I want to
- 18 deal with the recommendation from the Police Department.
- 19 If you could, Ms. White, can you state the recommendation
- 20 from
- 21 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Chair Bell, I have the motion if
- 22 it's okay.
- 23 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes. Will you do that for me?
- 24 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Okay. Thank you. I moved that the
- 25 board approved or support Chief White's recommendation to



- 1 place Police Officer Teaira Funderburg, badge number 622,
- 2 assigned to the Second Precinct on administrative leave
- 3 without pay but with medical benefits.
- 4 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: You have to have a roll call,
- 5 right?
- 6 COMMISSIONER HOLT: You need a second.
- 7 VICE-CHAIR Support.
- 8 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Second.
- 9 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay. Roll call.
- 10 COMMISSIONER BROWN: We're not having any discussion?
- 11 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: There's no discussion. We
- 12 already had discussion in the open.
- 13 COMMISSIONER CARTER: No we didn't. Now, we can have
- 14 a discussion.
- 15 COMMISSIONER BROWN: We had discussion in the closed
- 16 session.
- 17 COMMISSIONER CARTER: We can have discussion.
- 18 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Lisa, look at me, look at me.
- 19 You say I do.
- 20 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Yes.
- 21 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay. Discussion. If Lisa says
- 22 it, it's fine. So what unreadiness, anybody raise your
- 23 hand. Brown, you had something you wanted to discuss
- 24 about this?
- 25 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Mr. Chairman, I understand the



- 1 department's need to follow procedure and the things that
- 2 we always did, but in this case, we've always looked at
- 3 cases individually. And in this case, I just don't feel
- 4 that this officer woke up this morning and said, I'm
- 5 going to run a red light and kill someone. It was an
- 6 accident. I mean, she was injured. And then the memo I
- 7 got saying that it violated the fair labor standards act
- 8 for us to make this move. I didn't have anything updated
- 9 from that. So that's my position on where I'm at. I think
- 10 these are things that we really need to think about.
- 11 That's just my comments that I just don't think this
- officer got up this morning, said I'm going to run a red
- 13 light and kill someone. It was an accident and I think we
- 14 need to provide as much guidance with the department.
- 15 That's just my comment.
- 16 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Attorney Whitley, based on what
- 17 Commissioner Brown is saying, I mean, why, if it was an
- 18 accident, an accident means it's not necessarily your
- 19 fault, or if it is your fault, it's still something you
- 20 didn't do on purpose. Is that something that we need to
- 21 consider?
- 22 ASSISTANT CORPORATION COUNSEL WHITLEY: I don't want
- 23 the board's duties to get confused with the criminal
- 24 proceedings. The criminal proceedings of being charged
- 25 with involuntary manslaughter. The burden is on the



- 1 prosecutor to prove that beyond a reasonable doubt. What
- 2 this is doing, is not terminating the officer. What it is
- 3 doing is saying that pending the outcome of the
- 4 proceedings, that she will be placed on an administrative
- 5 leave. The, without pay of course is, you know, something
- 6 that is, you know, it's without pay. However, that is the
- 7 language supported by the contract. And it's specific to
- 8 being charged with a felony. So because of that, there's
- 9 not really, for me, much arbitrary analysis. That's
- 10 really following the terms of the contract. The board,
- 11 what your charter authority is, is they can't do that
- 12 unless you vote to suspend, you know, you all can be an
- 13 appellate, appeal form of sorts to do this, to suspend
- the pay. I'm sorry, I'm speaking over my words, but so
- 15 you all do need to vote to support it, but it is in line
- 16 with what the agreement says that should occur if you're
- 17 charged with a felony. I don't see any reason not to
- 18 agree with the contract, is what I'm saying.
- 19 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I got you. Commissioner Burton,
- 20 did you have your hand up for a reason?
- 21 COMMISSIONER BURTON: You know, Mr. Chairman, this is
- 22 one of those situations where it's kind of tricky, but,
- 23 we have not gotten enough information to really make a
- 24 determination on what direction we should go in today.
- 25 This is another reason why it's very important that the



- 1 board has its own attorney for decisions such as this.
- 2 The city corporation counsel cannot represent the
- 3 department and represent us at the same time. I do
- 4 recommend that we table this into our next meeting to
- 5 give us the opportunity to do our due diligence, to get
- 6 more information, but to make this decision today. I
- 7 don't think that we have enough information in but I
- 8 think it's better that we set this off to December.
- 9 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: We had two weeks, we had two
- 10 weeks on this Commissioner.
- 11 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Longer than that.
- 12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: A little bit longer than two
- 13 weeks. So, I hear you loud and clear.
- 14 COMMISSIONER BURTON: That doesn't necessarily mean
- 15 Mr. Chairman that we have to rush and make this decision
- 16 today. You are the Chair, but if you decide, along with
- 17 this body to set it off to next week to make a proper
- 18 decision, allow us to have our staff, to be able to get
- 19 the information that we need. I think that will be
- 20 better. I don't think we have enough information right
- 21 now. I think there are some things that we do not have to
- 22 make, that decision.
- 23 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: All right. Thank you so much.
- 24 Commissioner Holt, you have your hand up for a reason?
- 25 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Yes, Chair Holley. Yes. As I



- 1 indicated, we've had this on our table for quite some
- 2 time, in fact, so much time we've had access to the
- 3 information that I had to go back and reread to see, you
- 4 know, who it was we were trying to rule on today. And I
- 5 promise you when the incident happened, my heart was
- 6 broken because if nothing else, I have a familiarity with
- 7 the gentleman who lost his life. But the language is
- 8 there. The language is there. And I think we need to
- 9 follow through in our support of Chief White and him
- 10 attempting to do the best thing for the department, as
- 11 well as for the citizens of the City of Detroit.
- 12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: At this particular time, the
- 13 Chair is going to go with a roll call. Yes, with the
- 14 police department. No, not with the police department. So
- 15 the Chair is going to call a roll call now. Roll called
- 16 Ms. White. Yes, with the police department. No, against
- 17 the police department.
- 18 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Brown = No, and it has
- 19 nothing to do with the police department.
- 20 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Bernard: I actually want, I
- 21 think I want to abstain. I have some unreadiness on this
- 22 issue.
- 23 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: You can't abstain.
- 24 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I can't abstain. Okay, then I
- 25 vote yes, then I vote yes, because I agree with what



- 1 Brown said.
- 2 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Bell = Yes.
- 3 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Burton = I'm going to
- 4 abstain
- 5 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: You can't abstain. You have to
- 6 do one or the other.
- 7 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Let's ask, Mr. Chairman, let's
- 8 ask corporation counsel. I believe I am entitled to
- 9 abstain.
- 10 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I'm the Matlock.
- 11 COMMISSIONER BURTON: You are?
- 12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes. Go ahead.
- COMMISSIONER BURTON: I'm going to abstain for the
- 14 record. And yes, I can abstain. Yes.
- 15 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: No, you cannot abstain, which
- 16 means your vote is yes. Will you do that, according to
- 17 the.
- 18 COMMISSIONER BURTON: No, no, it does not.
- 19 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: According to parliamentary
- 20 procedure, it means yes, sir.
- 21 COMMISSIONER CARTER: It means no.
- 22 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: It means no.
- 23 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: It means no? Okay. So nay means
- 24 no, Medlock?
- 25 ASSISTANT CORPORATION COUNSEL WHITLEY: Yes, Mr.



- 1 Chair.
- 2 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay. You're right.
- 3 ASSISTANT CORPORATION COUNSEL WHITLEY: But it serves
- 4 the purpose for no.
- 5 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: You're right, Commissioner
- 6 Burton, you're absolutely right. I apologize to you. The
- 7 next person?
- 8 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Carter = Yes.
- 9 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Davis. Commission Davis.
- 10 Sorry about that. I said yes.
- 11 MS. WHITE: Commission Hernandez = Yes.
- 12 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Holt = Yes.
- MS. WHITE: Vice-Chair Jones = Yes.
- MS. WHITE: Chair Holley = Yes.
- MS. WHITE: There were 8 = Yes votes. 1 = No vote.
- 16 And 1 = Abstention, which is counted as a no vote. The
- 17 motion passed.
- 18 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay. Thank you so much. Thank
- 19 you. At this time, the Chair will recognize a
- 20 recommendation about a motion to the H R situation here
- 21 that we already discuss. What is your pleasure?
- 22 COMMISSIONER BELL: Mr. Chair?
- 23 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes, Commissioner Bell.
- 24 COMMISSIONER BELL: I move that we extend the search
- 25 for the secretary for one year.



- 1 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Second
- 2 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: One year.
- 3 COMMISSIONER CARTER: For one year?
- 4 COMMISSIONER BROWN: One year?
- 5 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: One year.
- 6 COMMISSIONER BURTON: This is preposterous.
- 7 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: One year. You're sure that's
- 8 what you want, Commissioner Bell?
- 9 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes, sir. We have a discussion. I
- 10 can explain, you know.
- 11 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: All right. So, who second that?
- 12 Somebody second to that?
- 13 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Commissioner Holt, second.
- 14 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Let me see you. Let me see if
- 15 you really did that. Hold your head up. Okay. All right.
- 16 So it's been second. Any discussion about the motion?
- 17 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Discussion.
- 18 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Davis.
- 19 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Commissioner Bell spoke first.
- 20 He should go first.
- 21 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay. Alright then, whatever you
- 22 tell me to do Lisa, whatever you tell me to do.
- 23 COMMISSIONER CARTER: He's the made the motion.
- 24 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Bell.
- 25 COMMISSIONER BELL: It's quite obvious that it's



- 1 going to take some time. We are in a transition time
- 2 period of dealing with this board and also what other
- 3 responsibilities, so to bring somebody on brand new, it's
- 4 a challenge in that timeframe. So it has been stated, we
- 5 gained three commissioners, we have to explain the nuts
- 6 and bolts of this board and somebody is already in place
- 7 to do that. But really, I think we hit the pros and cons
- 8 in closed session in reference to why we want to extend
- 9 this period. I think it's not unreasonable. We might not
- 10 even be meeting in person. We don't know yet. We are
- 11 going to advocate that we meet by zoom. I don't know how
- 12 it's going to play out. So there are a lot of factors
- dealing with COVID 19 that we are trying to overcome as a
- 14 board. So we don't need to have somebody in who has no
- 15 background. I think Commissioner Bernard hit the nail on
- 16 the head, we need somebody with that type of experience.
- 17 And we didn't bring forward someone with that type of
- 18 experience. Thank you.
- 19 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Got it. Commissioner Davis.
- 20 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: This is crazy. You know, this
- 21 board has already dragged its feet for two years. No
- 22 wonder people think that there's something wrong with
- 23 this board. We should not be putting this off. You know,
- 24 vote up or down with the two candidates we have.
- 25 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: What's your alternative?



- 1 Otherwise, I'm getting ready to move to a roll call.
- 2 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: This is crazy. This is corrupt.
- 3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Burton. Do you have
- 4 something to say?
- 5 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Yes, I'd like to say something,
- 6 but I think someone's talking.
- 7 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I just got him muted, so you go
- 8 ahead, quickly, quickly.
- 9 COMMISSIONER BURTOON: Okay. So you can hear me.
- 10 Okay. Thank you. So, you know, Mr. Chairman, once again,
- 11 colleagues, I urged you all to make the right decision.
- 12 And we have identified a process. This process has been
- long overdue. We do not want to open up any unnecessary
- 14 worms where this body, this board is being sued. And we
- 15 have begun interviewing, the interviewing process was
- 16 also closed by the Chairman. And I really urge you to
- 17 make the right decision on this. I think dragging this
- 18 out any further would come back to really backfire on
- 19 this board and people will start questioning. I just want
- 20 my colleagues to know, people will start to question, do
- 21 we really need an oversight board if we cannot do the
- 22 business that our charter intended for us to do. That's
- 23 it in closing?
- 24 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you. Commissioner
- 25 Hernandez.



- 1 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Thank you. Through the
- 2 Chair. We do have an obligation to have a strong talent
- 3 pool for all positions. I understand that. A year is
- 4 excessive. I can't side with that.
- 5 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: So, what is your recommendation
- 6 then?
- 7 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: I would entertain an
- 8 amendment to shorten that length of time. A year, 12
- 9 months is beyond excessive to me.
- 10 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: So either it is a motion or it's
- 11 not a motion, Commissioner Hernandez?
- 12 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Would you maker of the motion,
- 13 Mr. Chair,
- 14 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Bernard.
- 15 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: The maker of the motion was
- 16 Commissioner Bell. Would you agree to a friendly
- 17 amendment to your motion that we would resume the search
- 18 for a board secretary, as soon as we complete the filling
- 19 of the positions for the investigators, which we really
- 20 need to do as the highest priority.
- 21 COMMISSIONER BELL: The maker of the motion will
- 22 extend the amendment for six months.
- 23 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: After we get those
- 24 investigators.
- 25 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: We are going there, but I'm just



- 1 saying just help me with this. Hernandez is six months
- 2 good with you. Commission Hernandez, is 6 months
- 3 COMMISSIONER BURTON: It has been two years. It's
- 4 been two years.
- 5 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I hear you loud and clear. I'm
- 6 trying to get it down to six months now. So the
- 7 Commissioner Hernandez, would you
- 8 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Not immediately my
- 9 preference, but.
- 10 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: What is your preference?
- 11 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: I'm fine with the addition
- of Commissioner Bernard's commentary, but we also do need
- to fill seven vacancies with OCI. So I do agree with the
- 14 additional point.
- 15 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: But right now, what's on the
- 16 table Commissioners is the position of the secretary. I
- 17 need to know what we are going to do with that right now,
- 18 I have.
- 19 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Through the Chair.
- 20 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Who's talking now?
- 21 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Commissioner, Vice-Chair Jones.
- 22 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes.
- 23 VICE-CHAIR JONES: I think the amendment to extend it
- 24 to six months is good. When you look at filling the roles
- of the investigators for OCI, we cannot or there is no



- 1 time limit on it, and we're going to vote on this as a
- 2 motion that we need to give it a time limit. And the high
- 3 rules investigators are indefinite, but if we put six
- 4 months on it, then we got a definite, we've got a
- 5 definite timetable.
- 6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Six months is great.
- 7 COMMISSIONER BURTON: To the Chair.
- 8 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Burton, again, you
- 9 got one minute.
- 10 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Sure. Thank you, Mr. Chairman,
- 11 I'll be very brief. Colleagues, whether we are hiring a
- 12 board attorney today or hiring a board secretary today or
- investigators, you know, the City of Detroit HR
- 14 department is very capable of interviewing and hiring,
- 15 you know for those positions for those recommendations to
- 16 come before the board. This has been two years, just to
- 17 throw it out there. Any of this doesn't have anything to
- 18 do with one of the other, but what does is that this has
- 19 been two years and it doesn't look good by this body to
- 20 drag it out any further. We have interviewed two people,
- 21 and a third person dropped out. Let's make the decision
- 22 today based on the two candidates that were interviewed
- 23 by his body. The process was closed by the chairperson.
- 24 And then HR basically weighed in and basically said that
- 25 you know, everything checks out with them far as



- 1 backgrounds and things of that nature. So we have
- 2 identified a process. Let's stick to the course and do
- 3 not deviate. This will come back to, you know, and it
- 4 would not look good by this office and by this board. We
- 5 cannot afford these types of hospital litigations and
- 6 lawsuits at this time.
- 7 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Burton that's the
- 8 same thing. I got you. That's where I'm going, okay. And
- 9 follow me, Matlock, follow me on this, okay. What I'm
- 10 saying to you that, I need a motion, if this is the way
- 11 you feel, if that's what you feel, and we could vote it
- 12 up or down,
- COMMISSIONER BELL: Mr. Chair, there's a motion on
- 14 the floor with an amendment. There's a motion on the floor
- 15 we have to act on. I called for the roll call.
- 16 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: The minute was not second.
- 17 COMMISSIONER BELL: It was second.
- 18 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: And we don't have clarity. It
- 19 was not, who second it?
- They didn't have clarity because they were arguing
- 21 about, well, they are going to, whether they had to be --
- 22 the investigator got to be first.
- VICE-CHAIR JONES: Mr. Chair, I think Linda Bernard
- 24 second it. Through the Chair, I think Linda Bernard
- 25 second it.



- 1 COMMISSIONER BELL: I call for a roll call vote.
- 2 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Jones.
- 3 COMMISSIONER JONES: Yes, sir. We talked about the
- 4 fact that they want to also add to it, that to table and
- 5 you said that about the investigators. That was not in
- 6 the emotion.
- 7 VICE-CHAIR JONES: Through the Chair, I want to weigh
- 8 in.
- 9 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: So I'm saying to you, is this
- 10 what I'm asking and helped me with this Mr. Bell,
- 11 Commissioner Bell and Commissioner Bernard, the lawyer
- 12 and lawyer. Let me just say this. I'm just saying to you,
- 13 we are talking about six months, we're talking about in
- 14 January we will have investigators on board, but I also

- 1 COMMISSIONER BELL: It's just pretty much clear, can
- 2 we have roll call vote, sir?
- 3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Since you are running it, tell
- 4 me what is the overall -- Ms. White, do you understand
- 5 the motion of the second amendment to the motion?
- 6 MS. WHITE: Through the Chair, if I may just clarify.
- 7 The board has to vote on the amendment if it has been
- 8 made and properly seconded, you have to vote on the
- 9 amendment, which is the
- 10 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I understand that. What is the
- 11 amendment? I understand the proper procedure. I need to
- 12 know what the amendment is that we are voting on.

- MS. WHITE: There were 7 = Yes votes and 3 = No votes
- 12 for the amendment of six months.
- 13 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay. Anything else comes before
- 14 the board?
- 15 COMMISSIONER BELL: Mr. Chairman, I move for an
- 16 adjournment.
- 17 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Second.
- 18 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Hold on. We have to vote on the

- 2 MS. WHITE: Again, the tally was 7 = Yes votes and 3
- 3 = No votes for the amendment. The motion passed for the
- 4 amendment of six months. Now, you have to return to the
- 5 main motion with the amendment in the language, which
- 6 would be a motion to extend the search for board
- 7 secretary for six months.

- 10 motion A. Can we address motion A? She's trying to
- 11 confuse the issue here. We don't have, we can entertain

- 13 advice is advice, let us move on. Thank you.
- 14 ASSISTANT CORPORATION COUNSEL WHITLEY: I have not
- 15 participated in confusing this. I believe that that is
- 16 manifestation. The order would be to address the thing

- 18 future. That's just processing orders to address the two

- 23 That is my strong recommendation.
- 24 COMMISSIONER BELL: That is not the motion, ma'am.
- 25 That is not the motion.



- 1 ASSISTANT CORPORATION COUNSEL WHITLEY: I understand.
- 2 COMMISSIONER BELL: Can we vote?
- 3 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: On the motion.
- 4 COMMISSIONER BELL: On the motion? Thank you.
- 5 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Can we say what the motion is?
- 6 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: No, you can [Crosstalk]
- 7 COMMISSIONER BELL: Can we have a roll call?
- 8 COMMISSIONER BURTON: to support the table.
- 9 COMMISSIONER BELL: Can we have a roll call vote?
- 10 COMMISSIONER HOLT: I need to know what the motion
- 11 is.
- 12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Mr. Tipton. John, what do you
- 13 want?
- 14 MR. TIPTON: Yes. Attorney Whitley is correct. From
- 15 an HR standpoint, we need to let these two candidates
- 16 know where they stand. If we're not going to move forward
- on them, I need to indicate that to them. No, one's going

- 1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Mr. Tipton, does not the motion
- 2 that we have here, say the same thing in another way, by
- 3 the fact that
- 4 MR. TIPTON: No, your motion to extend the search,
- 5 that's not indicated to those candidates. Because we had
- 6 already previously indicated to the candidates that a
- 7 decision will be made at a prior meeting. So if the
- 8 decision is to be made that we're not moving forward with
- 9 them, I need to address that issue with them to let them
- 10 know.
