1 MS. WHITE: Good afternoon again and welcome to the
2 Detroit Board of Commissioners meeting. And please note
3 the following reminders for virtual meeting on Zoom.us. A
4 message regarding zoom policies: attendees do not need to
5 identify themselves unless they would like to make a
6 comment. Attendees can phone in to the meeting and phone
7 numbers will be masked by zoom.

8 If attendees join in by computer without a zoom
9 account, they may be prompted for a name and email. The
10 email is not visible to panelists or attendees. This is a
11 prompt from zoom, not the city of Detroit. Additionally,
12 the email address does not need to be your true email
13 address. It can be none@none.com or anything similar will
14 be fine for logging in.

24 MS. WHITE: And please note Honorable Board, you have
25 received several correspondences in preparation for

1 today's meeting. You've received some latest updates in
2 your email inboxes. So please check that information to
3 ensure that you have the documents for the promotional
4 item, as well as the BOPC 2022 calendar and all other
5 meeting agenda items. Thank you so much. We are still
6 waiting for Chairperson Holley to join the meeting, but
7 Immediate Past Chairperson, Commissioner Willie Bell is
8 also on the meeting. Thank you.

9 COMMISSIONER BELL: Good afternoon. I'm the Immediate
10 Past Chair Willie Bell and I will be presiding until the
11 Chair, Jim Holley joins us. The meeting would come to
12 order. Ms. Wlllklhite, do we have a quorum?

13 MS. WHITE: Yes, sir.

14 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you. It is with deep regret
15 and sadness that we announce the passing, our very own
16 Vice-Chairperson, Martin Jones, Commissioner on the Board
17 of Police Commissioners. We sent our deepest sympathy and
18 condolence to his family and loved ones as well as to the
19 Board and Detroit Police Department. Vice-Chair Jones
20 made a tremendous impact in the law and oversight
21 community. Many knew him as a fierce advocate and
22 activist for safe streets and neighborhoods. And he was
23 the same on this Board for Public Safety and Civilian
24 Oversight. We truly miss him. He was a very meaningful
25 member of the Detroit 300, as we all know. He went door

1 to door advocating on behalf of the victim, trying to
2 solicit support, witness for potentially, I would miss
3 him. He was a dear friend. Let's have a moment of
4 silence. And after that, you would hear from Chaplain
5 Littlejohn. Thank you. Chaplain Littlejohn.

6 CHAPLAIN LITTLEJOHN: May we pray? Gracious God, our
7 Lord, our Savior, and sovereign ruler, the beginning of
8 all eternity. Now who has carved out this continuum call
9 time and allowed us to sanctify you in our hearts. God,
10 we do thank you for the trust that you placed in
11 humankind. We thank you for this opportunity that you
12 grant to come before this commission. Thank you for the
13 opportunity that you grant to come before you and in your
14 presence. And God you've allowed us to come even as we
15 are. And today God, we come with mixed emotions. We come
16 recognizing that once we know you in life, we are with
17 you in death. We come knowing that nothing can separate
18 us from your love. And yet our hearts are broken, our
19 community is broken for several reasons and so many
20 different aspects. God, we find ourselves in the middle
21 of so much turmoil and upheaval challenging our
22 educational system, our political system, economics and
23 social justice.

24 CHAPLAIN LITTLEJOHN: Yet we bring all these ills
25 before you, because we know you can handle them. And we

1 know that you can handle us in them and God we know our
2 healing lies in you. You know our strength, our endurance
3 lies in you. And so as we come, God, we lift up this
4 commission. We lift up this commission as leaders of a
5 community that's hurting, families that are broken,
6 children that are fearful, a school system that seems to
7 decay in morality with young people that are crying and
8 hurting. And at the same time, other young people who are
9 imitating and putting other communities at risk, and it's
10 just the tip of the iceberg. And yet we know that our
11 strength and our hope lies in you. And so God, breathe
12 upon us up on this commission in a special way, because
13 even as we meet, there is a vacancy.

14 CHAPLAIN LITTLEJOHN: There is a vacancy just as a
15 result of today. So God we lift up and we thank you for
16 the labor and the legacy of Vice-Chair, Martin Jones.
17 Right now, we pray for his family, one by one and name by
18 name that you would come close to them, that you would
19 encircle them, that you would encourage them, that you
20 would uplift them and give us an opportunity as it would
21 allow us to be that strength and support for them. And so
22 now God has such a grave role and a grave responsibility,
23 we ask your blessings of protection upon our police
24 officers and those who sit at this table, making
25 decisions, plans, and projections, God guard their hearts

1 and their minds. Breathe upon them in a special way, with
2 a greater level of sensitivity and compassion for the
3 community. God, we ask your special blessings one by one
4 name by name on Commissioner Bernard, Commissioner Bell,
5 Commissioner Brown, Commissioner Burch, Commissioner
6 Burton, Commissioner Carter, Commissioner Davis,
7 Commissioner Hernandez, Commissioner Holley, and
8 Commissioner Holt. One by one, God touched them, embraced
9 them, encouraged them and blessed this session, bless
10 this meeting. Let it bring a smile to your face, giving
11 you honor, giving you glory that you will continue to
12 smile on our city, on our community, on our state, on our
13 nation, on our world, in the blessed name of Jesus, we
14 do pray. Amen.

15 COMMISSIONERS: Amen.

16 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much Board members,
17 thank you so much for your patience with me as well. Can
18 you hear me?

19 COMMISSIONERS: Yes, we can.

20 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Very good. I'd just like to take
21 a moment if you would, please, before we do anything,
22 take a moment to really about three minutes just to
23 remember Commissioner Jones. I am devastated by all of
24 this and got the call earlier this morning, about 5:58
25 this morning. And if we could just, if you don't mind,

1 thank you for the beautiful prayer, Chaplain. Thank you
2 for the beautiful prayer, but let's take a moment for all
3 of us commissioners, as well as those who are
4 participating in this forum. Just take three minutes and
5 just out of respect, just by our heads for three minutes,
6 if you don't mind. Thank you so much. I want to ask Miss
7 Blossom, if you could just read my comments that I wanted
8 to make sure that we get it out to each commissioner and
9 to the community as well as the press Ms. Blossom?

10 MS. BLOSSOM: Certainly Mr. Chairman. On behalf of
11 the Detroit Board of Police Commissioners, Chair Jim
12 Holley issued the following statement today. It is with
13 heavy hearts that the Board of Police Commissioners
14 announces the passing of Police Commissioner and Vice-
15 Chair. Martin Jones. Many knew him as a ferocious
16 advocate and activist for safe streets and neighborhoods.
17 As a leader in Detroit 300, he often was among the first
18 to knock on doors or approach people for information to
19 stop crime or to help police find those suspected of
20 committing crimes. He never wanted anyone to be a victim
21 of crime and his work in the community reflected his deep
22 value for getting justice for victims. Police
23 Commissioner Jones brought that same tenacity to the
24 Board where we will miss him as a colleague and leader in
25 the important work for public safety and civilian

1 oversight of law enforcement. The Board knows that the
2 entire seating grieves, the untimely loss, a steadfast
3 community champion, as we extend condolences to all his
4 family and friends, we ask everyone to keep Vice-Chair
5 Jones' loved ones and your thoughts and prayers, Mr.
6 Chairman that was the end of your statement.

7 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much, Ms. Blossom.
8 And once again, I thank all of you for being with us this
9 afternoon.

10 MR. ROBERT BRWON: Yes, good afternoon Mr. Vice Chair
11 Jones, this Honorable Board and citizens of Detroit. The
12 reading of the Board of Police Commission Mission
13 summary. The Board of Police Commission, BOPC is a
14 civilian agency that exercises supervisor control and
15 oversight of the Detroit Police Department DPD as set
16 forth in the charter. The Board has 11 members, 70
17 elected by District, 4 appointed by the mayor with the
18 consent of the Detroit City Council. The Board meets
19 every week as a committee of the whole, including 12
20 communities/evening meetings in the district. The BOPC is
21 the oversight agency for the Detroit Police Department.
22 That department policy rules and regulation governs the
23 Detroit Police Department is jointly developed by the
24 mayor, chief of police, and the Board. The Board has
25 subpoena power under the charter that can be used for

1 investigative purposes. The commissioners also review and
2 approve the DPD budget pursuant to the charter,
3 investigate non-criminal citizen complaints, acts as the
4 final authority in opposing and reviewing the discipline
5 of employees of the department, receives and hear
6 disqualification appeals from police recruits hoping to
7 enter the Detroit Police Academy. The BOPC makes an
8 annual report to the mayor, city council, and the public
9 of BOPC activities and accomplishments. Mr. Chair, the
10 reading of the summary.

11 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Ms. White, I don't have an
12 agenda with me, so you have to help me right now. I need
13 to have a roll call of our commissioners if you don't
14 mind.

15 MS. WHITE: Yes, sir. Through the Chair, Commissioner
16 Darrell Brown.

17 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Commissioner Brown is on the
18 line.

19 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Linda Bernard.

20 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Attorney Linda Bernard
21 representing District 2, with great sadness seen that our
22 former commissioner lived in my District, a block away

23 MS. WHITE: Commissioner, Shirley Burch.

24 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Good afternoon to Chair Holley
25 and the rest of the Board of Police Commissioners. I am

1 Shirley Burch of District 3, where we love and respect
2 where we live and Commissioner Holley, at the proper
3 time, I have from former chief or former assistant chief
4 of Detroit that is now the Southfield police chief wrote
5 me just a message to be shared among the Board, if you'd
6 be so kind at the proper time. Thank you.

7 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Willie E. Bell.

8 MS. WHITE: Okay. We are working to make sure that
9 he's back on the meeting. I know that he had some
10 technical difficulties earlier. Commissioner Willie E.
11 Burton.

12 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Commissioner Burton is present
13 for roll call

14 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Lisa Carter.

15 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Good afternoon, Lisa Carter
16 present.

17 MS. WHITE: Commissioner William M. Davis.

18 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Good afternoon, City of Detroit.
19 I'm here with a heavy heart. We have a lot of stuff going
20 on today. This is Police Commissioner William M. Davis,
21 District 7. Officers, love where you work, officers, love
22 where you work and also report any corruptions that you
23 know of.

24 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Jesus Hernandez. Okay. Mr.
25 Chair, Commissioner Hernandez did submit an excused

1 notification earlier, but said that he may be able to
2 join later. Also I see that Commissioner Willie Bell just
3 rejoined the meeting. Commissioner Bell.

4 COMMISSIONER BELL: Present. Thank you.

5 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Annie Holt.

6 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Good afternoon. Yes. Police
7 Commissioner, Annie Holt, At-Large and has been stated,
8 in deep sadness because of the loss of my intellectual
9 fighting partner Vice-Chair Commissioner Martin Jones.

10 MS. WHITE: Mr. Chair, you do have a quorum.

11 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much Ms. White. At
12 this time, Chief White, I can't see you, but I feel you,
13 are you here? Are you there?

14 CHIEF WHITE: Good afternoon, I am here.

15 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much. Will you let
16 us know who's with you today?

17 CHIEF WHITE: Yes sir. Before I get started on behalf
18 of the entirety of the Detroit Police Department, we
19 extend our condolences to the Board of Police
20 Commissioners, its deep sadness, the unbelievable
21 sadness. This is a deep loss for our community and for
22 our city. He was a champion for what's right and
23 certainly a community advocate. And so we mourn with you.
24 With me today is AC LeValley, AC Bettison, Captain Maye,
25 Lieutenant Shell, Commander Mounsey, Deputy Chief

1 Fitzgerald, Deputy Chief Sims, Second DC Grant Ha. It
2 looks like Lieutenant Mark Young from the LSA, Commander
3 McGinness from Homicide, Sergeant DaShell Brown, Chief's
4 Office, Captain Russell. And it looks like Sheila McBride
5 is also, from my staff on the call. Anyone I miss, I do
6 apologize. I can't see everybody.

7 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you, Chief. And Ms. White,
8 do we have any special guests?

9 MS. WHITE: Yes, sir. Through the Chair, Community
10 Advisory Council, Scotty Bowman, Miss Marie Overall of
11 State Representative Tyrone Carter's Office, Lieutenant
12 Mark, Young President of the Lieutenants and Sergeants
13 Association, Officer Ron Thomas, Vice-President of the
14 DPOA and also Mr. Alvin Stokes of Citywide Police
15 Community Relations. Thank you.

16 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: And as always, thank you. Thank
17 all of you very much for being with us this afternoon. At
18 this time, the Chair will recognize a motion for
19 accepting the agenda for the day.

20 COMMISSIONER HOLT: So move.

21 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Is there a second?

22 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Second.

23 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: It's probably been moved and
24 second. Any opposition? All in favor, say, aye.

25 COMMISSIONERS: Aye, aye.

1 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: This is William Davis. Show me
2 as a no.

3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: All right. Thank you so much,
4 Commissioner Davis. At this time, the Chair will accept a
5 motion for the minutes.

6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: So moved.

7 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Is there a second?

8 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Second.

9 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much. Any
10 opposition to the minutes? Hearing none, all in favor,
11 say aye.

12 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

13 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Oppose.

14 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much. I'm going to
15 forego any remarks. I'm basically just really out of it a
16 little bit. And let me just if I could Miss White, just
17 help me to go with this agenda with the exception of the
18 agenda will be what it is. I just want to make sure that
19 we basically have this meeting and make sure that we get
20 something done. We're dealt with this cloud of our
21 colleague's death hanging over us. So right now, Chief,
22 if you'd like to have your report, we will welcome it.

23 MS. WHITE: Mr. Chair.

24 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes.

25 MS. WHITE: Mr. Chair, I apologize for interrupting,

1 but just know that on the agenda, under your report, you
2 do have the recommendation for the promotion items to the
3 ranks of Lieutenant and Sergeant, and then you have a
4 second agenda item, sir.

5 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay. Which is the

6 MS. WHITE: The second agenda item is the BOPC
7 calendar for next year but the first item includes the
8 promotions and all of the information has been
9 distributed to all board members.

10 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you, Ms. White. Do I do
11 this first or do I go to Chief first?

12 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: No. I will move the adoption
13 of the recommendation regarding promotions to the ranks
14 of Lieutenant and Sergeant, 7 to the rank of Lieutenant,
15 26 to the rank of Sergeant and congratulations to those
16 ladies and gentlemen, who've passed the exam and who've
17 been nominated by the Office of the Chief.

18 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you. Ms. White, do I have
19 to do each of them one by one? Can I do all of them,

20 MS. WHITE: No, you do not, sir.

21 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Very good. You've heard the
22 motion, you're ready for the question. All in favor, say
23 aye.

24 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

25 MS. WHITE: Mr. Chair?

1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I need a roll call. I need a
2 roll call.

3 MS. WHITE: Yes, sir.

4 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay, I'm sorry, please forgive
5 me. Can we just go to the roll call please?

6 MS. WHITE: Yes, sir. Commissioner Darryl Brown,
7 Commissioner Brown.

8 COMMISSIONER HOLT: He's muted Ms. White.

9 MS. WHITE: I can come back. Commissioner Bernard =
10 Yes.

11 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Birch = Yes.

12 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Bell = Yes.

13 Ms. WHITE: Commissioner Burton. Commissioner Burton.

14 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Carter =Yes.

15 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Davis = Yes.

16 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Holt = Yes Ms. White and I
17 don't see Commissioner Burton in the meeting.

18 MS. WHITE: Okay. Thank you. Commissioner Brown?

19 COMMISSIONER HOLT: He's here, he's just muted. In
20 fact, he's on two.

21 MS. WHITE: Okay. Chair Holley.

22 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes.

23 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Because I'm muted now, Ms. White.
24 I don't mean to keep speaking up, but.

25 MS. WHITE: Okay. Commissioner Brown, Commissioner

1 Brown.

2 MS. WHITE: Okay. Mr. Chair, at this time you do have
3 7 = Yes votes. The motion passed.

4 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much. Do I go to
5 the second piece now?

6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Mr. Chairman, I move for the
7 adoption of the Board of Police Commissioners calendar
8 for 2022. May God bless all of us for the ability to
9 participate in 2022.

10 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Second.

11 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Any objections? Hearing none.

12 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Yes.

13 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Who is that?

14 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Mr. Chairman, this is
15 Commissioner Burton. Looking at the calendar for next
16 year, technically we actually can meet that last, so we
17 will not be in violation of the open meetings act. We
18 actually can meet on Thursday, the 29th. Apparently they
19 have that day off according to this proposal, but I
20 strongly urge, so we will be in compliance with the open
21 meetings act if the Board of Police Commissioners hold a
22 meeting on the 29th, which is a Thursday.

23 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: All right.

24 DR> JACKSON: The commission needs to make a motion,
25 Mr. Chair,

1 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: There's a motion on the floor
2 and I don't,

3 DR. JACKSON: He is making an amendment. He can amend
4 the motion to add that date.

5 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I don't accept that amendment.

6 DR. JACKSON: You don't have to accept it.

7 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Okay. Alright. I didn't know
8 that.

9 DR. JACKSON: He doesn't need your permission. If the
10 Commissioner wants to change the calendar, he needs to
11 move an amendment to the motion.

12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you, Commissioner, please,
13 let me handle this. At this time he did not make a
14 motion. This is just a suggestion. Are you making a
15 motion to Commissioner Burton?

16 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Yes, Mr. Chair. I am making a
17 recommendation to amend the calendar. So for December
18 29th to hold a meeting.

19 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Support.

20 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Do I need a roll call on this
21 Ms. White?

22 DR. JACKSON: You can call for a debate, Mr.
23 Chairman.

24 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Discussion.

25 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Can I have a discussion?

1 Commissioner Bernard, is that you?

2 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Yes, Mr. Chairman. I've
3 reviewed the calendar. The calendar is consistent with
4 the operations of the City of Detroit and with the
5 Detroit Police Department and with the City Council, none
6 of which are in session during Christmas week, the week
7 between December 21st and January 1st. And all we are
8 doing is being consistent with every other commission,
9 and every other entity in the City of Detroit and the
10 business community I might add because schools are out,
11 et cetera. So I move that the calendar be adopted as
12 drafted.

13 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay. Right now I got a second.

14 DR. JACKSON: That motion cannot be made, sir.

15 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Let me handle this, Mr. Just let
16 me handle this, please. Commissioners, is there any other
17 discussion regards to this substitute motion? Hearing
18 none, let's go the roll call

19 COMMISSIONER BELL: Mr. Chairman.

20 COMMISSIONER BURTON: There's a discussion, Mr.
21 Chairman.

22 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: You've two minutes. You got two
23 minutes.

24 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Commissioner Davis actually had
25 his hand up before me, so I will yield for him and come

1 after him.

2 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay, Commissioner Davis.
3 Commissioner Davis.

4 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: I have no need to do any
5 additional, just supporting his motion, his amendment to
6 the original laws.

7 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Mr. Chairman, I like to add
8 something then.

9 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: You've got two minutes
10 Commissioner. Go ahead, Commissioner. Mr. Burton you have
11 two minutes.

12 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Thank you, Mr. Chair. Mr.
13 Chairman, you know, at the meeting, the Board has left a
14 lot of things unfinished in past years, but commissioners
15 I urge you to keep working and keep fighting on the
16 behalf of the people in Detroit and to not let this be
17 something where we are not listening to citizens' voices.
18 Once again, Detroiters wake up every day in pain. They
19 wake up every day in poverty and they have a lot of
20 concerns about how our streets are being kept safe and so
21 we have not seen any, anything about any other meetings
22 for any other elected bodies, but the charter does speak
23 specifically that we shall meet once every week. And so
24 the 29th of December is not considered to be New Year's
25 Eve or anything because that's not until a couple days

1 later. So we actually can meet on the 29th. It doesn't
2 have anything to do with Christmas break. But it has
3 everything to do with being transparent. It has
4 everything to do with being in compliance with the city
5 charter.

6 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you, Commissioner.

7 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Mr. Chairman,

8 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: We got you.

9 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Chair Holley, Commissioner
10 Bernard's hand is raised.

11 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I just want to make one quick
12 point, Mr. Chairman, and that is that the City of Detroit
13 is closed. Our staff won't be here.

14 COMMISSIONER BURTON: That's not true.

15 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: That is true.

16 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Can you provide proof of
17 document for that, please?

18 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Burton.

19 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Burden of proof?

20 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Roll call please, Ms. White on
21 no, for the motion. Yes, for motion. No, for the motion,
22 yes, for the motion. Roll call, please.

23 MS. WHITE: Yes, sir.

24 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: This is for the amendment,
25 right?

1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: This for the amendment, yes.

2 MS. WHITE: Yes, sir. Through the Chair, that is a
3 city official recognized holiday period for the City of
4 Detroit. I just wanted to note that for the record and
5 confirm it.

6 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you.

7 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Brown. Commissioner Brown.
8 Commissioner Bernard.

9 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: We are voting on the
10 amendment, correct?

11 MS. WHITE: Correct.

12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes

13 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: No, and the city is closed..

14 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Burch.

15 COMMISSIONER BURCH: If the city is closed, No.

16 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Ms. White, I don't see
17 Commissioner Burch.

18 MS. WHITE: Oh, she just responded ma'am.

19 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Oh, there she is.

20 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Mr. Chairman, Mr. Chairman.

21 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Burton, we have
22 roll all, we have roll call. What are we going to do? We
23 are going to the roll call. Let's go with the roll call.
24 Ms. White let's go.

25 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Bell = No.

1 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Burton = Yes.

2 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Carter = No.

3 Ms. WHITE: Commissioner Davis =Yes.

4 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Holt = No.

5 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Brown = It's a yes for
6 Brown.

7 MS. WHITE: Chair Holley = No.

8 MS. WHITE: There were 6 = No votes and three = Yes
9 votes. The motion failed.

10 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Let's go to the.

11 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Commissioner Holley, can we go
12 to the parliamentarian.

13 DR. JACKSON: Parliament is here, ma'am. I want to
14 read from the open meetings act.

15 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay, go ahead.

16 DR. JACKSON: At the first meeting of a calendar or
17 fiscal year, each board must set the date, time and place
18 of the board's regular meetings. The open meetings act
19 does not require any particular number of meetings. The
20 board's schedule of regular meetings is not, of course,
21 set in stone. The board is free to cancel or reschedule
22 its meetings. So the open meetings act does not in fact
23 require that this commission meets every week.

24 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you. Thank you, ma'am
25 Parliamentarian. Thank you so much. At this time, the

1 Chair will recognize a roll call for the original motion.

2 Yes, on the calendar and no, let's go.

3 MS. WHITE: Commission Brown. Commission Brown = No.

4 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Bernard = Yes.

5 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Burch = Yes.

6 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Bell = Yes.

7 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Burton = I'm going to vote
8 no, because it appears to be a violation of the charter.

9 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Carter = Yes.

10 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Davis = I'm voting against
11 it because it is a violation, the language and the
12 charter.

13 COMMISSIONER BURTON: 7-802,

14 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Holt = Yes.

15 MS. WHITE: Chair Holley = Yes.

16 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much. What's the

17 MS. WHITE: There were 6 = Yes votes and 3 = No
18 votes. The motion passed.

19 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you, Ms. White. At this
20 particular time, what's next on the agenda, Ms. White,
21 please?

22 MS. WHITE: Mr. Chair, if we could please go back to
23 the candidates and the recent promotions for Lieutenants
24 and Sergeants, if a board member would please read the
25 names into the record so that the record is clear.

1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commission Holt, can you do that
2 for us, please and do it in a proper way and quickly?

3 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Yes, sir. I will do my due
4 diligence. Chief of Police, James E. White's
5 recommendations to promote the ranks of Lieutenant. And
6 there are seven. Sergeant George O'Gorman, Sergeant
7 Toniqua Davis, Sergeant Felicia Jewell, Sergeant Dana
8 Russell, Sergeant Gerald Hewitt, Sergeant Adam Madera,
9 Sergeant Alexis Sukey-Stankiewicz. I hope I pronounced
10 that correctly. Now, Chief of Police, James E. White's
11 recommendations to promote the ranks of Sergeant, 26.
12 Pray with me. Police Officer Joi Gaines, Police Officer
13 Antonito Walker, Corporal Marcus Cummings, Police Officer
14 Anthony Farwaz, Corporal Ebony Jackson, Corporal Gregory
15 Matthews, Detective Kristina Dunbar, Police Officer
16 Nicholas Dedeluk, Police Officer Irvette Reed, Police
17 Officer Demeisha Fambro, Police Officer Lewis Terry,
18 Detective James Kraszewski, Police Officer Paul Krause,
19 Corporal Kimberly Wilson, Police Officer Gregory
20 Tourville, Corporal William Tatum, Police Officer Daron
21 Zhou, Police Officer Troy Williams, Detective Jeffrey
22 Stehlik, Police Officer John Kiouisis, Detective Lestine
23 Gilbert, Police Officer Brian Kussy, Police Officer
24 Marvin Anthony, Police Officer Matthew Woodhouse,
25 Detective Vincent Spikes, Detective Enrique Jackson.

1 MS. WHITE: That was the end of the promotional name,
2 sir.

3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much and thank you
4 for making sure it's a matter of record Ms. White and
5 thank you Commissioner Holt, as well. I appreciate it.

6 COMMISSIONER HOLT: No problem.

7 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Chief White, can you give us
8 your report today, would you please, sir.

9 CHIEF WHITE: Yes, sir. Through the Chair. Thank you
10 for these promotions. I know it's a sad day and a rough
11 day but it's a very important day for the men and women
12 who have worked very hard for this opportunity to receive
13 their promotions. And I assure you that time doesn't
14 allow each and every one of them to come on and say,
15 thank you, but I represent all of them in telling this
16 board thank you very much for these promotions. They've
17 worked very hard at art, and they're going to continue to
18 serve this community in a very professional way. So thank
19 you for the promotions. I'm going to run through my
20 report as quickly as I can. If the board needs any time,
21 I can ask the presenter to reduce his presentation and we
22 should be able to balance out the time quite easily.

23 CHIEF WHITE: I'm going to update the injured
24 officers. We have one member of the department who is
25 currently disabled recovering from an on duty injury.

1 That's a Sergeant from Internal Affairs. 40 members
2 currently are quarantined or isolated with COVID, 33 of
3 those members have currently tested positive. COVID
4 continues to be the number one killer of law enforcement
5 around this country. And that's a stat from the IACP,
6 it's very serious. Though we are not mandating COVID
7 vaccines, we are highly encouraging members in the
8 department to please do the investigation and make that
9 appropriate consideration for your health. Getting into
10 crime. We are experiencing a 5% reduction in homicides, a
11 8% reduction in nonfatal shootings, a 16% reduction in
12 robberies. Moving over to the criminal sexual conduct,
13 the CSCs, we are still up 22%.

14 CHIEF WHITE: We have talked about this with the
15 board recently, we continue to do our analysis and
16 monitor. We're going to have a comprehensive strategy at
17 the beginning of the year as part of our crime strategy,
18 roll out to address the uptick and to make sure that
19 victims of CSC know the resources that they have
20 available. We recognize that that is going to cause an
21 even deeper uptick in the charge or in the crime number.
22 But it's important that the victims get the remedy that
23 they deserve and that we encourage them to report.

24 CHIEF WHITE: I'm going to move on to some major
25 incidents that have occurred over the past few weeks or

1 past week. On Tuesday, November 30th in the area of Grand
2 River and Evergreen officers from the Eighth Precinct
3 observed the white Chevy express van that had three or
4 four children in it, I'm sorry. The stop resulted in an
5 arrest of a female by the name of Stephanie Binder. She
6 was charged with four felony counts of kidnapping, child
7 enticement, unlawful imprisonment and driving a stolen
8 vehicle. And one felony account of receiving and
9 concealing stolen property. We continue to work this case
10 and we have determined that the perpetrator in question
11 appears to be dealing with a number of different issues.
12 If there's any bright spot out of the debriefing is that
13 she's not part of any ring.

14 CHIEF WHITE: She is not targeting you know, any
15 groups of children. This particular charge, as horrific
16 as it is, appears to have been random and motivated by
17 what appears to be drug use and some other issues that
18 she's dealing with. That was important for us to find out
19 because it was such an unusual act that we needed to
20 understand very quickly if she was part of some larger
21 group that was attempting to target our children. As
22 happy as we are to find that out, we are still very
23 concerned and happy that she is in custody with a 5
24 million bond. So she will not be able to victimize any
25 other children in our community incident. Another

1 incident is a fatal shooting, a quadruple shooting, two
2 fatal victims and two non-fatal victims. This happened on
3 December 5th at 2:30 PM on the 5,000 block of
4 Marlborough. Four individuals were shot, two of the
5 individuals suffering fatal injuries. The victims were at
6 the location when the subject attempted to rob them.
7 During the robbery attempt, several shots were fired and
8 the suspects fled the location. After an investigation
9 into this matter, homicide was able to identify the
10 suspect who is responsible for this incident. And a
11 warrant has been typed and submitted to the Wayne County
12 Prosecutor's Office.

13 CHIEF WHITE: I do want to highlight again the
14 incredible work that is coming out of this department.
15 Homicide major crimes, we've seen the work. We continue
16 to talk about the work and as you know, we celebrate the
17 work. The reality of it is I wish we could give them a
18 break. The crime in our community is still too high. You
19 know, gun violence is still off the rails. We have too
20 many illegal guns in our community, too many people with
21 legal guns, making horrible decisions to use guns to
22 solve disputes. But the officers continue to serve this
23 community with policing excellence and make these arrests
24 and catch these folks. I wish we could give them a break
25 though. I really do. The third incident involves a non-

1 fatal shooting of a four year old on December 5th, 7:30
2 at night in Whittingham. A four year old was shot.

3 CHIEF WHITE: The victim was shot at home with her
4 mother when an unknown subject began firing shots into a
5 home. Again, unnecessary gun violence using a gun to
6 resolve relatively minor disputes. The Twelfth Precinct
7 is actively investigating this incident and we have a
8 possible motive. Obviously the four year old was not the
9 target, and it appears that this may be domestic related.
10 We had a double fatal shooting on December 7th on
11 Frederick Street on the 7,000 block. The ages are 89 and
12 62. The victims are father and son, an incredible
13 tragedy. The 89 year old victim is a retired air force
14 veteran. The victims were at the location sleeping when
15 an unknown offender started to fire out front, in the
16 front of the home. And as they ran to the back of the
17 home, it appears from what our investigation has shown
18 that they shot into the back of the home.

19 CHIEF WHITE: There's a lot of pieces to this
20 investigation that I was briefed on by Commander
21 McGinness and his team yesterday that I'm not at liberty
22 to go into, but I know that they are really unpacking
23 this case and hoping to have something for us to bring
24 some closure to this family. Just a very, very sad,
25 tragic incident. On December 7th at 7:00 PM, on the 9,000

1 block of Minock, our offender, Shawn Shorts assaulted his
2 girlfriend causing injuries that resulted in the victim
3 fleeing the location. Mr. Short subsequently fled the
4 location and took the victim's three year old. You may
5 have seen this one on the news recently. Again, within
6 minutes, the officers were able to make an arrest,
7 recover the child and Mr. Shorts is going to be facing
8 some charges. His warrant was submitted to the Wayne
9 County Prosecutor's Office today. Again, outstanding
10 police work, but it appears that we've got an endless
11 pipeline of people willing to make bad choices and go to
12 jail.

13 CHIEF WHITE: But you know, these people are off the
14 streets and again, if we could just encourage better
15 decision making, we could give these detectives, these
16 investigators, and these officers a bit of a break, but
17 the reality of it is, I don't foresee that happening
18 anytime soon. A few positives, in the early morning of
19 December 4th I had a press conference on Bellevue. This
20 is the Jennifer Crumley and James Crumley incident,
21 Oxford school, which led to our community and was held up
22 in a warehouse. I'm sure everyone is familiar with this
23 case. The take away from this case is again, our Metro
24 Division, our officers, the Seventh Precinct officer and
25 Lieutenant Hall and his team, as well as the first

1 responding officers on the scene. I wish I had their
2 names, the two officers who responded and called their
3 supervisor, but in any event they were taken into custody
4 without incident.

5 CHIEF WHITE: The area was secured and we've seen how
6 the story has unfolded in the media. But again, the
7 takeaway is just amazing work. I mean, the training comes
8 through the work of our Metro Division. SRT is the best
9 in the country and there's great police work. On December
10 6th, we had an incident where we recognized two officers.
11 We gave them the medal of valor and that's Officers
12 Christina Messina and Steven Miller. The short version of
13 what happened with them is both were under attack by a
14 mentally ill and mentally deranged person who tried to
15 shoot Officer Miller in the head. He pulled the trigger,
16 Officer Miller was able to push the gun away as he pulled
17 the trigger. Officer Miller chose not to use fatal force,
18 but instead wrestled the gun away from the perpetrator
19 and took him into custody without further incident.

20 CHIEF WHITE: They are both heroes and they also, you
21 know, literally saved the life of the person because he
22 would've been justified in using fatal force. He
23 literally pulled the trigger with a gun right next to his
24 ear as he pushed it away and that person is getting the
25 treatment that he needs. And he is also going to be

1 facing some very serious charges when this treatment is
2 completed. And the second precinct, I don't have the
3 notes on that. I'll just go from memory. And we saw that
4 one on the news last night. Officers did a traffic stop,
5 40 packages from porch pirates, running around stealing
6 packages. The officers are visible, they're on the
7 streets, they are patrolling, heads up eyes open and just
8 really making a difference. We see it in our crime
9 numbers. We are not bragging. I will say it again, one
10 victim is one victim too many. One shooting is one
11 shooting too many, but when you look at the numbers you
12 see that processes are moving in the right direction and
13 we can build all of those to make our city safer as we
14 move forward. So with that, I'll take any questions.

15 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much, chief. I
16 appreciate you and the work that your officers are doing
17 and thank you for the report. Commissioner Davis, do you
18 have a question for the chief?

19 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Actually, I don't. I just want
20 to make sure that he did mention what happened over here
21 in the second precinct with those packages. That's all I
22 have to say.

23 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Brown. Commissioner
24 Burch.

25 COMMISSIONER BURCH: No questions, just prayers for

1 the police department and the City of Detroit.

2 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you. Commissioner Burton?

3 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Yes, Chair question for the
4 Chief. Can you give us a brief discussion of any support
5 services that we have to assist officers?

6 CHIEF WHITE: Yes, sir. Our chaplains obviously do
7 amazing work for us, we couldn't be more thankful to have
8 them. Our peer support under Lieutenant Gabriel, and why
9 does the captain's name escape me? I know her, I can see
10 her face, but under our Captain Tanya Leonard Gilbert,
11 great program and she continues to expand the peer
12 support program with officers who have experienced
13 trauma. Those are the two most powerful we have. And then
14 of course we have our EAP services through our HR
15 Department.

16 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Carter,

17 COMMISSIONER CARTER: No questions. Thank you,

18 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Bernard.

19 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Chief. Thank you. Thank you,
20 Mr. Chairman, for this opportunity, our only real
21 opportunity to speak. I'd like to thank Chief White, one
22 for your press conference earlier today with Kim Worthy
23 our Wayne County prosecutor regarding the issue of idle
24 threats or maybe not so idle threats that are made in
25 schools. I learned a lot. I'd also asked Chief White that

1 you join me in congratulating and also if you will, in
2 bidding farewell to three very distinguished members of
3 this board and they are of course, Mr. Davis, who served
4 the City of Detroit and the Water Department. He retired
5 from the department, I believe after around 30 years, Mr.
6 Darryl Brown, who like you is a first responder and also
7 retired from the City of Detroit's Fire Department and
8 the woman who is the heart of the Board of Police
9 Commissioners and that is Ms. Shirley Burch love where
10 you live. And as Commissioner Davis says, and work. I
11 want to congratulate you all. I met you this year. It's
12 been a pleasure to work with you. I look forward to
13 working with you in the future, just because you're not
14 here doesn't mean you're not going to contact us and
15 contact the Chair and let us know what you feel and what
16 you want. But I just want to ask that you join me as
17 Chief. It's a tough job all the way around and I
18 appreciate you greatly. And finally, I want to wish the
19 board members who are not going to be here and the ones
20 that'll be here next year a very Merry Christmas and
21 Chief you and all of your staff. I won't see you again
22 this year. So this is a big day for me for a lot of
23 reasons because I want to wish you and the entire Detroit
24 Police Department, civilian and sworn, a very happy
25 holiday season, a very safe holiday season. And I remain

1 at your service 24-hours a day. And thank you for calling
2 me this morning. Thank you.

3 CHIEF WHITE: No problem. Thank you for all of that.
4 And it is my honor to congratulate Commission Davis,
5 Commissioner Brown and Commissioner Burch on their tenure
6 with the commission and their hard work. Trust me, I know
7 they're going nowhere, they're just leaving this form,
8 but their community advocacy and my phone number will
9 continue to ring with them. And I'll be happy to answer
10 and serve what they need. So that's not a problem.
11 There'll be a more formal thank you, coming from my
12 office. My staff is working on it with a letter from me
13 and a certificate and, and certainly we are very
14 appreciative of your time and your service and your
15 commitment to the city, as well as to our department.

16 CHIEF WHITE: With regards to the press conference
17 today, thank you for bringing that up. I did miss it and
18 I'm very appreciative, ma'am Prosecutor Worthy being
19 here. And the message is very clear. This is not a joke,
20 you know, this is not a humorous situation to stop school
21 with a threat. These are felonies. People can face very,
22 very serious charges and young people can make a bad
23 situation a lot worse for themselves. If they try to
24 emulate what others are doing with these idle threats,
25 which we don't take as idle threats. We investigate every

1 single one of them as if they're real and as we should,
2 because the moment we don't, one will be real. So there's
3 a tremendous amount of resources that we send out. Today,
4 Detroit public schools are closed as a result of these
5 threats.

6 CHIEF WHITE: You know, our Cyber Crimes Unit is
7 outstanding and people need to be put on notice. There
8 are digital footprints and social media, and they walk
9 every one of them. And there are a lot of people getting
10 in trouble. You heard the numbers today on how many have
11 been charged and how many will be charged around the
12 State and certainly around this county and in the city.
13 So this is not a joke. And, you know, I think we have to
14 move beyond gentle conversation with our children on
15 these types of issues. It's time to clear our throats and
16 look our kids in the face and make some real tough
17 decisions and conversations happen. And with regards to
18 these guns, you know, candidly, I really am not trying to
19 talk about the second amendment, I'm not trying to talk
20 about either side of the aisle of where you are. The
21 bottom line is there are too many guns in our community.
22 There are too many illegal guns in our community, and
23 there are too many people who have access to guns that
24 should not, and we really need to take a stand on these
25 issues if we're serious about reducing crime. So thank

1 you for bringing that up, ma'am and giving an opportunity
2 to talk about it.

3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you. Commissioner Holt.

4 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Thank you, Chair Holley. And
5 thank you, Commissioner Bernard. I steal every word that
6 you just shared. And I know I can especially count on
7 Commissioner Brown, who did a phenomenal job this past
8 Sunday, this past summer rather, helping me and my
9 association, Grandma, number one, organize a birthday
10 party for one of our seniors over here who turned 101.
11 And I really believe, were he not available and eager to
12 help in that event, I don't think it would've gone as
13 fantastically as it did. He of course touched base with
14 the Fire Department, the fire chief, and with the time
15 that he spends up at the Precinct Eight, he was also able
16 to negotiate some of that contact. Now, Chief White,
17 you're on top of you.

18 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: You have

19 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Okay. Commissioner Holley, come
20 on. Let me talk about two NPOs at the precinct over here.
21 NPO Shark and NPO Childrey. They regularly come to our
22 association meetings and they allowed for one of our
23 citizens who was complaining about one of the homes on
24 her block participating in gambling activity. All of the
25 signs were there, people parking on the front lawn, a lot

1 of traffic. So because of the NPOs Shark and Childrey who
2 come to our meetings regularly, they were able to take
3 their citizens' complaints and launched an investigation.
4 So when they left that meeting, we really felt
5 comfortable and felt as if we were being served by DPD
6 just in their presence and their willingness to accept
7 that citizen's complaint. I'm sorry, is that enough Chair
8 Holley?

9 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes, you did a wonderful job and
10 I thank you for that.

11 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Thank you.

12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Bell.

13 COMMISSIONER BELL: No, thank you. I don't have
14 anything.

15 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Brown, are you
16 still with us?

17 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Yes. I'm still here, Mr.
18 Chairman.

19 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Do you have a question?

20 COMMISSIONER BROWN: I just wanted to thank the Chief
21 for all the hard work and especially for calling with the
22 notification today. And I believe if I got it right, the
23 four year old that was shot, I know of the family and
24 think she's doing pretty good. She's doing well in
25 Children's. So I want us to just keep praying for them

1 and their family that she makes a speedy recovery. Thank
2 you, Chief, for all the information.

3 CHIEF WHITE: Yes sir.

4 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you, Commissioner. Ms.
5 White, did I miss any commissioner?

6 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Yes. Can I raise my hand? You
7 didn't miss me.

8 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay. Certainly, Commissioner
9 Burch.

10 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Can you see me? Okay. You can't
11 see me, but you can hear me.

12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I can.

13 COMMISSIONER BURCH: I just wanted to thank you so
14 much, Chair Holley. I wanted to thank Commissioner
15 Bernard. The very kind words that you said were very
16 touching to me. And as you said, I'm not going anywhere.
17 I'm just going to be stronger for this city. And I want
18 to say Chair Holley right now and say the remarks of
19 Chief Alvin Barron. That was the assistant chief, Chair.
20 I'm speaking to police Chief White now. He called me, he
21 didn't call me, he texted me and said, would I please
22 convey the remarks to you, the chief of police, to the
23 entire board of the police commissioners, you chair
24 Holly, about the loss of Martin Jones. He wanted me to
25 announce that to you. I have access to his personal cell

1 and Chief White, if you'd be so kind to give that to me.
2 So I will have contact with you as the other
3 commissioners. Would you do that for me, Chief White?

4 CHIEF WHITE: Yes, I will. I'll do it again. I called
5 you this morning as well, but I will do that again.

6 COMMISSIONER BURCH: I thank you. And I didn't get
7 it. I'm sorry. I didn't get your call. I'm sorry.

8 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you. Thank you so much.
9 Thank you Commissioner Burch. Commission Ms. White, did I
10 miss any Commissioner?

11 MS. WHITE: You've called all of the board members,
12 sir. Thank you.

13 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you. What's the next item
14 on the agenda, Mrs. White?

15 MS. WHITE: The next Item on the agenda, Mr. Chair is
16 the use of force quarterly report, report number three.
17 However we also have the resolutions, there were three
18 resolutions that we have spoken with commissioners about
19 in preparation for today. So it is your pleasure in terms
20 of which item you would like to take at this time.

21 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay. Let's do the
22 presentations. If they could do a brief presentation, I
23 would appreciate it very much, but if they can't then
24 we'll just basically, take it all. But if they could,
25 please. I want to make sure that the three presentation

1 resolutions that we give adequate time for that. But
2 could you introduce the presentation for me, Secretary
3 White.

4 MS. WHITE: Yes, sir. Through the Chair, we are
5 moving over Director Reid Branch Wilson, who will be
6 giving the presentation regarding the use of force
7 quarterly report, number three, and staff co-host are
8 working on moving Director Wilson over to the panel
9 gallery. Also honorable board, you have received the
10 quarterly report in your email inbox, as well as the
11 PowerPoint presentation and the PowerPoint presentation
12 will be shown during, during his report. Thank you.

13 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you.

14 DIRECTOR BRANCHE-WILSON: Thank you. Good afternoon,
15 board. I'm sorry, I went out for a second. Is it okay for
16 me to begin?

17 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes, it is.

18 DIRECTOR BRANCHE-WILSON: So I will keep a brief. And
19 should you all want me to go in more depth, I absolutely
20 can, but out of respect for the loss and to this
21 community, we'll try to keep this as brief as possible.
22 So to that end, I just want to, before I show the stats
23 for January 1 to September 30th, just kind of give a
24 high-level overview on what each category means to remind
25 the board and the community what we're talking about when

1 we talk about a category one. So a category one is any,
2 is generally a serious injury or death. It can also
3 include any discharge of a firearm except at animals or
4 in the range canine bites chemical spray against
5 restrained individuals, taser drystone and a taser probe
6 to someone's sensitive areas or to a member of the
7 special population.

8 DIRECTOR BRANCHE-WILSON: So category one is
9 generally the most serious use of force. Category two is
10 any incident resulting in an injury or complaint of
11 injury that does not meet category one. So in essence
12 category one is the highest threshold and category two is
13 the threshold below that, but still resulting in injury
14 or complaint injury. Category three is a use of force
15 incident where there was no injury or complaint of
16 injury. A very common form of category three is what's
17 called forcible handcuffing. In essence, there's no
18 injury. Somebody just did not necessarily want handcuffs
19 on them at the time. Another example is a taser discharge
20 that does not make contact with the suspect. Category
21 four falls under the category three incidents, except it
22 is especially at the request of an EMS personnel.

23 DIRECTOR BRANCHE-WILSON: And so now I'm just going
24 to give the overview stats comparing year to date 2021 to
25 2020 across the categories. I know professional standards

1 talked in depth about category one last week. There is an
2 increase, a lot of that is due to increase in firearm
3 discharge as I recall, but Professional Standards can
4 walk more into that. Category two, we have and again,
5 that's category two, as a reminder is an injury that
6 doesn't meet the threshold of category one. There is a
7 pretty significant decrease in category two incidence.
8 Category three, which are incidents where there is no
9 injury. We do see an increase in category four. There
10 really has not been many category forces from January 1
11 to September 30th. And then you can just kind of see, we
12 showed how many times there was an acquired target
13 incident and gave just for context, the number of arrests
14 to compare these overall numbers too. So I do have a more
15 in-depth presentation, happy to go through it if you all
16 would like, but out of respect for you and everything
17 we're going through today, I'll pause there and just see
18 if the board has any questions.

19 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: And I appreciate it. I want to
20 know, I appreciate and your shortness of it, but we can
21 always bring you back if the board members feel like they
22 want to have more of an in depth in regard to this, but
23 right now, board member Davis, do you have a question
24 from the presentation?

25 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Only about the acquired target.

1 Those percentages are going up, you say?

2 DIRECTOR BRANCHE-WILSON: Yes sir. From 19 to 20 to
3 113 in 2021. Again, January 1 to the end of September.

4 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: I have no other questions.

5 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you, Commissioner.
6 Commission Brown.

7 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Yes. Mr. Chair. Just very quick.
8 Of the acquired targets, is there a breakdown? Is that
9 with a taser and a handgun, and it broke down categories.
10 Are they all handgun acquired targets?

11 DIRECTOR BRANCHE-WILSON: Those would all be
12 firearms, sir.

13 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Through the Chair? Excuse me, I
14 forgot. Okay. Thank you.

15 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commission of Burch.

16 COMMISSIONER BURCH: No question, sir. Thank you.

17 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commission Burton. Commission
18 Burton.

19 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Not at this time, Chair Holley

20 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Bernard.

21 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Just two questions for you.

22 Sir, the first is, are there any criminal prosecutions of
23 police officers or police personnel regarding the use of
24 force? That's question one, question two is, do you know
25 how many cases in terms of civil litigation were involved

1 in, most of them are in federal court, as you know,
2 regarding use of force for this past year, for 2021, as
3 compared to 2020, or if you don't have that information,
4 if you could provide to the board, I think it would give
5 us a good baseline to look at this issue of the use of
6 force in terms of our liability, the Police Department's
7 liability. Thank you.

8 DIRECTOR BRANCHE-WILSON: Absolutely. Thank you,
9 commissioner. And through the Chair those questions would
10 best be answered actually by Director Graveline and
11 Second Deputy Chief Ha. I don't know if they're
12 available, if they are, maybe they can answer now or we
13 can come back and give you an answer thereafter.

14 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Would you do it for us? Would
15 you just be responsible for getting back to her real
16 quick, regardless of which person you need to go to? Can
17 you be responsible and get back to the commissioner? If
18 you could do that for us, I would appreciate it.

19 DIRECTOR BRANCHE-WILSON: Through the Chair, in
20 answer to your question. So civil litigation and criminal
21 charges, as it relates to use of course, correct?

22 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Use of force.

23 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Good question.

24 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Can I have that information,
25 also?

1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Sure you can. Commission Holt?
2 You have a question?

3 COMMISSIONER HOLT: No, thank you. And thank you Mr.
4 Branche-Wilson for your presentation.

5 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Bell.

6 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, sir. No questions.

7 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: All right. Thank you. Ms. White,
8 thank you for the presentation and thank you for being
9 cooperative with us, based upon what has taken place in
10 the last 24-hours. So thank you for that. And always
11 we're grateful for your professionalism. Well, at this
12 time, Ms. White, where do I go from here?

13 MS. WHITE: Yes, sir. Through the Chair, I just
14 wanted to also mention that Commissioner Carter, I
15 believe, is still in attendance and I'm not sure if her
16 name was called for questions?

17 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Please forgive me and you're
18 absolutely right. And of course, you know, I would never
19 want to do anything to Commissioner Carter, please
20 forgive me.

21 COMMISSIONER CARTER: No problem. Thank you, Ms.
22 White. I have no questions. Thank you, Mr. Chair.

23 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you and I apologize to
24 you, I really do. At this time, Ms. White, where do I go
25 from here?

1 MS. WHITE: Yes sir. Through the Chair, the
2 resolutions. And we have asked.

3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay. That's right.

4 MS. WHITE: Yes, sir. Through the Chair, we've asked
5 Commissioner Burch to read the Resolution for Corporal
6 Peggy Conover, retirement and Commissioner Holt to read
7 the Resolution for Corporal Vincent Peterson and the
8 Resolution in support of the victims' families and
9 community in the Oxford High School shooting.

10 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay. In that order?

11 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Burch is the first.

12 COMMISSIONER BURCH: All right. Thank you so much,
13 Ms. White and Chair Holley and the Board of Police
14 Commissioners. I'm proud to read the Resolution honoring
15 Corporal Peggy K. Conover.

16 COMMISSIONER BURCH: WHEREAS Peggy Conover was
17 appointed to the Detroit Police Department on June 24th,
18 1996. Upon graduating from the Detroit Metropolitan
19 Police Academy. Police Officer Conover began her career
20 at the Fifth Precinct, Patrol Operation Section and.

21 WHEREAS she duly served the Fifth Precinct, Eastern
22 District, Central District Patrol West, reassigned to
23 Central District, City Council Security, the Sixth
24 Precinct and Gaming. Officer Conover displayed tremendous
25 diligence and aptitude in her assignments. On October

1 18th, 2018, she was promoted to the rank of Corporal and
2 reassigned to Gaming, Abandoned Vehicle Task Force, where
3 she served until her retirement.

4 WHEREAS during her law enforcement career, Corporal
5 Canover was the deserving recipient of both Consent
6 Judgment Awards. The Major League Baseball All-Star
7 Recognition Award, the Rosa Parks Funeral Recognition
8 Award, the Super Bowl, XL Recognition Award, as well as
9 recommendations from supervisors and numerous lists of
10 appreciation from citizenry and ---

11 WHEREAS Corporal Conover has tirelessly served the
12 Detroit Police Department, the citizens of Detroit and
13 its neighboring communities for 25 years. Her
14 professionalism, commitment to public service, integrity
15 and dedication have been a credit to the Detroit Police
16 Department. She is highly respected as a consummate
17 professional.

18 NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Detroit Board
19 of Police Commissioners speaking for the citizens of
20 Detroit and for the Detroit Police Department awards this
21 Resolution in recognition of Corporal Peggy Conover 25
22 years of dedicated and diligent, public service. Her
23 professionalism, integrity, and lifelong commitment to
24 the City of Detroit and its citizens merit our highest
25 regards. We thank and congratulate Corporal Peggy K.

1 Conover. Mr. Chair, I would like to recommend that the
2 resolution for Corporal Peggy K Conover be entered into
3 the archives of the Board of Police Commissioners. Thank
4 you.

5 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Support.

6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Second.

7 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: All in favor, say aye.

8 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

9 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Any oppose. Thank you so much,
10 Commissioner Burch. You did a wonderful job. Wonderful
11 job. Thank you for that. The next one, please.

12 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Thank you, Board of Police
13 Commissioners for this honor. Resolution honoring
14 Corporal Vincent M. Peterson.

15 WHEREAS Vincent Peterson was appointed to the
16 Detroit Police Department on March 21st, 1994. Upon
17 graduating from the Detroit Metropolitan Police Academy.
18 Police Officer Peterson began his career at the Housing
19 Support Section and ---

20 WHEREAS he dutifully served the Housing Section,
21 Office of Chief of Police Personnel, Police Recruiting,
22 Traffic Enforcement, Sixth Precinct, Court Liaison, Tenth
23 Precinct and Abandoned Vehicle Task Force. Officer
24 Peterson displayed tremendous diligence and aptitude in
25 his assignments. On August 1st, 2016, he was promoted to

1 the rank of Corporal and continued to serve at the
2 Abandoned Vehicle Task Force until his retirement.

3 WHEREAS during his law enforcement career, Corporal

15 Department. He is highly respected as a consummate
16 professional.

17 NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Detroit Board
18 of Police Commissioners, speaking for the citizens of
19 Detroit and the Detroit Police Department awards this
20 Resolution in recognition of Corporal Vincent Peterson's
21 27 plus years of dedicated and diligent public service,
22 his professionalism, integrity, and lifelong commitment
23 to the city of Detroit and its citizens merit, our
24 highest regards. We thank and congratulate you Corporal
25 Vincent M Peterson. Through the Chair.

1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes ma'am.

2 COMMISSIONER HOLT: I recommend that we approve this
3 Resolution honoring Corporal Vincent M. Peterson and
4 place it in the archives of the Board of Police
5 Commissioners.

6 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Second,

7 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: All in favor, say aye.

8 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

9 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Oppose? The ayes have it. Thank
10 you so much as always Commissioner Holt. You always do a
11 great job. We appreciate that very much as well. The next
12 one, please.

13 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Thank you. Chair Holley. I'm
14 growing into it. Resolution and support of victims,
15 families, and community in Oxford High School shooting.

16 WHEREAS the Detroit Board of Police Commissioners
17 have advocated for reforms that would limit mass
18 shootings as a public safety threat in the United States.
19 Mass shootings are a detriment to our values as a society
20 and our decency as human beings, yet consumers still can
21 easily buy military style assault weapons, high-capacity
22 magazines, and other weapons of mass destruction that
23 allow horrific carnage at schools, churches, and other
24 community institutes that should be safe havens. And;

25 WHEREAS on Tuesday, November 30th, 2021, a mass

1 shooting at Oxford High School in Metro Detroit became
2 the latest to claim lives and forever changed survivors,
3 families and communities. A 15 year old male is now
4 charged with murdering four students and shooting six
5 other students. And one teacher has he terrorized the
6 entire school with a barrage from a gun designed for fast
7 and mass destruction; and

8 WHEREAS our outrage, sadness, sympathy and prayers
9 are with the young students, parents and teachers of
10 Oxford High School, as well as the entire Oxford
11 community where their loss is pain and suffering. Amid
12 this shared grief and trauma, the Oakland County,
13 Sheriff, and other first responders deserve praise for
14 quick action that helped prevent a far greater tragedy
15 that day; And,

16 WHEREAS heinous attacks urgently call for law
17 enforcement and the justice system to restore public
18 safety and community calm by stopping, arresting and in
19 jailing those in charge of perpetrating or aiding, the
20 perpetration of crimes, Metro Detroit Law Enforcement
21 Agencies often worked together and the Detroit Police
22 Department provided needed assistance to ensure that all
23 parties charged by the Oakland County prosecutor were
24 found and taken into custody. As the pursuit for justice
25 continues for these new Oxford victims, we all have an

1 urgent responsibility to ensure schools, churches,
2 concerts, malls, and other gathering places are safe from
3 mass shootings.

4 THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED the Board of Police
5 Commissioners call upon the American citizenry to help
6 make Oxford High School the last entry on the list of
7 mass shootings. The US must join other civilized nations
8 by ending the sale of military style weapons, ammunition,
9 and armory. You can quit mass killings and terror.
10 Through the Chair. I move that we approve this Resolution
11 and support of victims, families, and community in Oxford
12 High School shooting into the archives of the Board of
13 Police Commissioners.

14 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Second.

15 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: It's been probably moved and
16 second, all pay to say, aye.

17 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

18 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Oppose? Thank you so much. Thank
19 all three of you very much and to the two of you for the
20 Resolutions. Thank you so much, And I think especially,
21 the Oxford Resolution that's very appropriate. And I
22 think all of us agree with that, Ms. White, if you don't
23 mind, give your report.

24 MS. WHITE: Yes, sir. Through the Chair, if I also
25 may indicate on the record that Deputy Chief Deshaun Sims

1 is now representing Chief White, who had to leave the
2 meetings and also acknowledging Police Commissioners
3 elect Cedric Banks and Police Commissioner. Brian
4 Ferguson is also in attendance for today's meeting. And
5 Mr. Chair, if I could also indicate on the record to
6 ensure that the record is clear as far as the board's
7 staff members who are in attendance today. Mr. Robert
8 Brown, Administrative Specialist, Ms. Theresa Blossom,
9 Community Relations Coordinator, Ms. Jonya Underwood,
10 Administrative Assistant, Investigator Tiffany Stewart,
11 Board Parliamentarian, Dr. Francis Jackson, Director,
12 Katrina Patillo, Director of Police Personnel, Assistant
13 Corporation Counsel, Ericka Savage Whitley, Interim Chief
14 Investigator Lawrence Akbar, Supervising Investigator,
15 Ainsley Cromwell Acting, Supervising Investigator LiSonya
16 Sloan and Acting Supervising Investigator Rosalia
17 Madrigal. Regarding the incoming correspondence for
18 today, please note the agenda which is posted for your
19 viewing. The board received the following information,
20 the weekly DPD facial recognition technology report,
21 which is posted on the board's website for the public's
22 inspection. Also, the board received the project green
23 light report dated December 6th, 2021. The board received
24 recent police loss number 21-12510, and also case number
25 21-CV-125 77. The board also received several

1 correspondences from the Police Department regarding
2 inquiries posed for human resources, monthly report, the
3 board received responses in regard to questions and
4 inquiries posed by Commissioners Holt, Hernandez and also
5 inquiries regarding the DPD's tow recognition or tow unit
6 reorganization. So that information has been distributed
7 during this meeting. And that concludes my report. Thank
8 you,

9 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Burch, you have any
10 announcement that you want to make at this particular
11 time in regard to the, yes, sir.

12 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Thank you, Mr. Chair. I would
13 like to announce the congratulations to Pershing High
14 School alumni student, Jamal White has been entered into
15 the apprenticeship of the local engineers, the operating
16 engineers 324, which Mr. Derek Sanders was a member of.
17 And so this young man is going to receive an
18 apprenticeship from that union. So congratulations to the
19 Persian alumni, of which I am and of Mr. Jamal White.
20 Congratulations, Jamal.

21 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Congratulations.

22 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Congratulations Commissioner.
23 Thank you so much. Unfinished business.

24 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Through the Chair.

25 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes sir. Commissioner Brown.

1 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Mr. Chair, I just want to just
2 do a clear up. A while back there were some derogatory
3 statements made by you against Commissioner Burton and
4 you wrote a letter of apology to be read. If it's alright
5 with you, it's just a few lines. I could just read that
6 into the record.

7 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes, sir.

8 COMMISSIONER BROWN: It says dear board members, in
9 the last two board meetings, I made remarks concerning
10 Commission Burton, not taking his meds and something to
11 the effect of whether he'd been smoking. Both remarks,
12 although said, in jest are inappropriate and lack merit,
13 please, excuse my lapse in judgment. And I sincerely
14 apologize to Commissioner Burton for making these
15 statements. And we'll put this apology on the record at
16 the next board meeting, and I look forward to seeing all
17 of you. That ends the reading of the letter.

18 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much.

19 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Thank you.

20 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: No, thank you. And I thank you,
21 Commissioner Brown. Thank you for that and I mean that. I
22 mean every word of it and I thank you for doing just
23 that. And I apologize, I didn't say it earlier, but I
24 thank you for that. Also, I want to just say to
25 Commissioner Burch, Commissioner Davis, and Commissioner

1 Brown, I'm asking that you be invited back. I have a
2 special presentation for each and every one of you for
3 the services you've rendered on the board. It is a
4 thankless job as you all know but nevertheless people
5 don't have to be nice, and when they are, the least you
6 can do is say thank you. And I want to be able to do just
7 that. So I've asked Miss Blossom and Ms. White through
8 Miss Blossom to basically invite all three of you back
9 for a special presentation and appreciation for your
10 service on the board. At this time, Mr. Brown, can you
11 give me the announcement?

12 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Mr. Chairman, Mr. Chairman, I
13 have one other item under new business.

14 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Sure.

15 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: We received a letter as you
16 know, I think from, from HR regarding the fact that we
17 needed to take a position regarding continued meetings on
18 zoom, in view of the spike in COVID in Michigan and in
19 Detroit and I would simply ask, and we can just do it by
20 concurrence. We don't even need a vote if there's no
21 objection that staff be authorized to prepare a letter to
22 the state legislature, advocating that we be able to
23 continue to have meetings by zoom, at least until March,
24 which is what Ford motor company, general motors has done
25 and every other major company, but it's expiring for

1 bodies and they asked us, asked you Mr. Chair, all of us
2 to, if you will weigh in on this issue. So I would
3 simply, if there's an objection, you know, okay, but

4 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Through the Chair, I'm sorry, I
5 just,

6 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Who is talking?

7 COMMISSIONER CARTER: This is Commissioner Carter.

8 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Go ahead, Commissioner Carter.

9 COMMISSIONER CARTER: It's my understanding that
10 there is a house bill that has been prepared regarding
11 the meetings and it was prepared by Brenda Carter, State
12 Rep, Brenda Carter, out of Pontiac. And what's being put
13 forth is that it be extended to the end of March of 2022.
14 And I don't have the house bill number, but I can get it
15 for you.

16 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: No, but can we support that
17 Mr. Chairman?

18 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Absolutely.

19 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Oh, thank you. That's all I
20 was asking.

21 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Mr. Chairman, no disrespect.
22 The house bill has not been passed. We do not have a copy
23 of it. I would like it if we could table this to the next
24 board meeting or when that bill actually gets passed
25 because we still need to have clarity.

1 COMMISSIONER CARTER: I didn't say it was passed.

2 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Dr. Jackson, give me a ruling on
3 this, please?

4 DR. JACKSON: The Commissioner needs to make a motion
5 to postpone the motion, not table to January 9th meeting.

6 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I move to postpone it to the
7 next board meeting.

8 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Is there a second? I need the
9 motion, is there a second?

10 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Second and then in discussion.

11 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Second.

12 DR. JACKSON: The question is open for debate, Mr.
13 Chairman.

14 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Mr. Chairman, I made the
15 initial motion. I'm only saying

16 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Bernard. I'm out of
17 State trying to get... Just help me with this, please. I
18 understand, according to the parliamentarian, I have to
19 go with this. I don't know what, I just have to go with
20 this. So I'm just saying to you, it is a motion, it has
21 been second by, according to my ears. Mrs. Holt,
22 Commissioner Holt. So I want to know, if you don't mind,
23 I'd like to hear from the opposition of this as to why,
24 Commissioner Bernard do you feel that it should be
25 postponed or should not be postponed at this time,

1 Commissioner Bernard, and then after that, Commissioner
2 Burton, you can tell us why you think it should be
3 postponed. At this time, Commissioner Bernard.

4 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Very, very quickly, I'm sorry,
5 your honor, Mr.. Chairman. Very, quickly. I mean, we've
6 been requested twice now by, I think it was HR. I saw the
7 memo twice that we take a position regarding continued
8 meetings on zoom. It makes sense. The spike is real,
9 especially with the new variant. It doesn't mean that we
10 have to do it but simply that we recommend to the powers
11 that be that we be allowed to continue meetings on zoom.
12 And as I said, Ford Motor Company, GM, everybody else has
13 already done it.

14 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Burton, why do you
15 want us to support this?

16 COMMISSIONER BURTON: You know, Mr. Chairman, we
17 really owe it to the citizens of Detroit, number one.
18 Secondly, the Board of Police Commissioners are traveling
19 to Tucson, Arizona on the 11th of this month. If we are
20 worrying about COVID and things of that nature, then the
21 question is why are we traveling to Tucson, Arizona?
22 Number two, we have not received anything from the house
23 of representatives based on this bill, we have not seen a
24 copy of this bill. The bill has not been voted on. So
25 therefore we can really postpone this until that bill is

1 produced and voted on. And so therefore we should
2 postpone this until the next board meeting and don't take
3 an immediate decision on this day.

4 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Well, the next board meeting
5 will be.

6 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Through the Chair.

7 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Carter.

8 COMMISSIONER CARTER: No, I think that I'm missing
9 something here because Linda requested that a letter of
10 support be submitted to the state legislator. And I was
11 just saying that the bill is there. So a letter of
12 support would be appropriate. Now I don't understand what
13 we are putting off until January. Are we putting off
14 until January the decision to what?

15 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: You probably got it better than
16 I have. My understanding is the motion that we are
17 looking at now is basically putting off until January to
18 tell whether we go virtual or whether we go personal.
19 That's my understanding of the motion that's on the floor
20 right now.

21 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: No, no, Mr. Chairman. We are
22 going personal in January unless the state authorizes a
23 continuation of virtual. So what we've been requested to
24 do is continue to support virtual because industry,
25 business, government, other than us, you know, are going

1 to continue to go virtual. I'm sorry. I got distracted.

2 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Mr. Chairman. I'd like to amend
3 a motion.

4 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: How are you going to amend your
5 own motion, Commissioner? You already have a motion on
6 the floor. How are you going to amend it? I'm just saying
7 to you, why can't we just wait until the next meeting in
8 January to handle this whole situation here. Why can't we
9 just do that?

10 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Because it expires this month,
11 Mr. Chairman. The point is we wanted to weigh in before
12 the expiration of the ability to do zoom meetings. If we
13 don't weigh in this meeting, we can't.

14 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: So what you're asking is, let's
15 do this then, let's just have a... Commissioner Burton,
16 can we have a letter supporting the legislation to take
17 place in January, can we have a letter for that? Would
18 that satisfy you right now? It'll be virtual until the
19 next meeting.

20 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Mr. Chairman, I'd like if we
21 can address this at the next meeting or give them an
22 opportunity to produce.

23 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Whoever second it, Ms. Holt can
24 you drop your second so he can drop his motion?

25 COMMISSIONER BURTON: No, I'm not dropping my motion.

1 If anything, I would make a stronger motion.

2 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Holley, I second it so we can
3 have the conversation. That's the only reason I second
4 it. I'm in total opposition.

5 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Mr. Chairman, we've already
6 sent the letter. I just got a note saying it's already
7 been sent. So the point is moot. I withdraw my motion.

8 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: All right. Very good. So right
9 now, Commissioner Burton, what are you asking us to do,
10 please? I'm sorry.

11 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: There's nothing to ask.

12 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I'd like to make another motion
13 at this time, Mr. Chairman, I'd like to move that the
14 Board of Police Commissioners adopt having hybrid
15 meetings where commissioners are able to come in person
16 as well as have the freedom and opportunity to meet by
17 zoom.

18 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Is there a second to the motion?
19 If there is no second the motion fails. At this
20 particular time, let's go to the next.

21 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Mr. Chair,

22 COMMISSIONER BELL: You are out of order.

23 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Who's telling me I'm out of
24 order?

25 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Mr. Chair. No, I didn't say

1 that.

2 COMMISSIONER BELL: I'm sorry, Mr. Chair.

3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I'm saying to you, the motion
4 failed and I'm moving on to the next agenda. There was no
5 second.

6 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Mr. Chair.

7 COMMISSIONER BURCH: I had my hand up.

8 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: You know, I'm in another State.
9 How can I see you from here? I told you, I'm on the
10 phone.

11 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Okay. Miss Annie, tell him I'm
12 trying to speak to him. Commissioner. Annie, would you
13 tell the Chair, I'm trying to make an announcement on
14 another part.

15 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay. Well let me first
16 Commissioner Burch, let me get this out of the way right
17 now. I'm asking for, so you have another announcement
18 Commissioner Burch.

19 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Yes, I do.

20 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Hit it.

21 COMMISSIONER BURCH: I wanted to ask each
22 commissioner, through Ms. White, did you receive the
23 invitation to the church lighting? I would like for each
24 commissioner to answer me prayerfully and then I hope you
25 will attend. I just need to know, did you receive it

1 commissioners?

2 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Did we get it Ms. White?

3 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Through the Chair.

4 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Ms. White, Ms. White, Ms. White.

5 I'm asking Ms. White. Did we get it out to the

6 commissioners Ms. White?

7 MS. WHITE: Yes, sir. It was sent to out.

8 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay. Very good.

9 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Chair Holley. That's what I was
10 trying to tell you.

11 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Chair Holley,

12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: At this time, the Chair will
13 recognize Mr. Mr. Brown, Robert Brown for announcements.

14 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Mr. Chair. I have one question
15 under unfinished business, sir.

16 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: What is the question, sir?

17 COMMISSIONER BURTON: You know, first, I'd like to
18 read a memorandum that I have drafted up for the
19 commissioners and you also

20 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: That's not a question.

21 COMMISSIONER BURTON: No, because the question is
22 going to come from this, sir.

23 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I'm just saying to you. If you
24 want a question, but a memorandum now, that this,

25 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Well I have a statement

1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: The Chair will not recognize

2 COMMISSIONER BURTON: And then a motion based off of
3 this memorandum

4 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I'm passed unfinished business,
5 I'm passed new business. I'm going now to announcements

6 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Point of order, sir. You only
7 went to unfinished business. You didn't go to old
8 business. So I want to bring it up under old business.

9 COMMISSIONER HOLT: There is no old business on the
10 agenda.

11 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Burton, go right
12 here very quickly. You have two minutes.

13 COMMISSIONER BURTON: So basically I draft a letter.
14 The subject is talking about potential violations of the
15 Detroit city charter. Section 7-802, the board should
16 meet at the call of the Chairperson but shall meet at
17 least once each week and may recess on Thanksgiving,
18 Christmas and New Year holidays. All meetings shall be
19 held in accordance with the Michigan open meeting act,
20 going further, Mr. Chairman, the board has officially
21 declared as last public meeting, which is today December
22 9th 2021 with this declaration of the advent, of
23 established holiday recess, we are depriving the
24 residents of the City, Detroit of our charter mandate
25 duty of meeting at least once per week. I am recommending

1 that the board hold a brief meeting on December 16th,
2 2021, or alternatively we could meet December 17th, 2021.
3 We could also reschedule the train and plan for December
4 30th in order to ensure that the board is complying with
5 the charter mandated with the requirements. It is prudent
6 to seek legal advice. I did send a copy of this to
7 Corporation Counsel Attorney Ericka Savage Whitley. So I
8 move at this point.

9 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commission, the Chair will not
10 recognize any motions from this point on.

11 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Point of order, Mr. Chairman. I
12 moved that Board of Police Commissioner

13 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Burton?

14 COMMISSIONER BURTON: This charter mandate duties
15 that

16 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I'm giving you one warning, I'm
17 giving you a warning Commissioner Burton.

18 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I move that

19 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: This is your first warning.

20 COMMISSIONER BURTON: We comply with the city
21 charter.

22 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: My second warning, my second
23 warning.

24 COMMISSIONER BURTON: And I move that we.

25 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: The third warning.

1 COMMISSIONER BURTON: hold a meeting on December
2 16th.

3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: You're now muted, you are now
4 muted.

5 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Mr. Chairman,

6 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: You're out of order. You're out
7 of order. I've asked you to tell you.

8 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Point of order, Mr. Chairman,

9 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Mr. Burton, I'm asking you,

10 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Mr. Chairman, I had the floor,
11 I made a statement and I've raised a motion.

12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Who has the mute button, because
13 I've warned him three times? So who is going to help me
14 with that?

15 MS. WHITE: The next procedure would be to entertain
16 a motion in violation of article 11, code of conduct of
17 the board's bylaws. So a motion

18 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: That's the part. That's the
19 part. I understand that because I feel like we've dealt
20 with this early in the meeting. So I ruled the motion out
21 of order, Commissioner Burton. At this time, Commissioner
22 Brown, I'm asking you to give us your announcement. And
23 after that I'm asking attorney, Ericka, I'd like for you
24 to let us know your departing remarks as we go into oral
25 presentations. Mr. Brown.

1 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Mr. Chair, I don't have any
2 announcements.

3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you. Mr. Robert Brown. I'm
4 sorry.

5 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Okay.

6 MR. ROB BROWN: Mr. Chair, I have one announcement.

7 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I know you have one. I
8 appreciate that.

9 MR. ROB BROWN: Lomax Temple AME Zion Church
10 Christian Education Department is hosting a Christmas
11 community celebration collaborating with Persian High
12 School band and choir. The 11th Precinct and Captain
13 Jevon Johnson at Lomax Temple 17441 Dequindre Street on
14 Saturday, December the 18th at 4:00 PM to 6:00 PM. And
15 the theme is Jesus is the Light of the World. Mr. Chair,
16 that's the only announcement of the BOPC meeting. The
17 next meeting

18 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Attorney Ericka. Go ahead. I'm
19 sorry.

20 MR. ROB BROWN: The next meeting is January 6th at
21 3:00 PM and following that the meeting would be on
22 January the 13th, 2022 at 3:00 PM.

23 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Attorney Ericka, I understand
24 this is your last meeting with us. I want you to know how
25 grateful I am personally, and also grateful in terms of

1 the commissioners for your loyalty and your patience and
2 all that comes with being an attorney. And your advice
3 has been so helpful to me personally. So I just want to
4 give you the opportunity to say and bring greetings to
5 us.

6 ASSISTANT CORPORATION COUNSEL WHITLEY: Thank you so
7 much, Mr. Chair. And first and foremost, I apologize for
8 the background noise. I'm at an event for work, I'm doing
9 double duty, but first my sincere condolences to the
10 family of Martin Jones. I'm hurt and broken to hear that
11 news. My condolences to the board. You are all in my
12 thoughts and you are all in my prayers. That is just
13 terrible news. As it relates to my term with the law
14 department, my last day will be in December, which is,
15 the 17th, next Friday. And it has been my pleasure
16 working with you. I am moving on, but I'm not going far.
17 I can speak to anybody offline about what I'll be doing
18 next, but it has been my pleasure to work with you all. I
19 have learned much working with this board and it's been
20 my pleasure to work with Ms. White. She is very, very
21 qualified to be doing this work and she has been a true
22 asset to me to get up to snuff when I had to go in here
23 so quickly to cover after Ms. Mazomanie left. So I just
24 wanted to tell you all, it's been a pleasure, I won't be
25 far, I'll stay in touch and I hope you all have a

1 wonderful, wonderful holiday season. Thank you so much.

2 COMMISSIONER HOLT: You didn't get our permission.

3 ASSISTANT CORPORATION COUNSEL WHITLEY: Thank you so
4 much. Mr. Brown for oral presentations.

5 MR. ROB BROWN: Yes. Mr. Chair, I currently have 11
6 speakers.

7 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Mr. Chairman, before we go into
8 oral communication, I did send a letter over to attorney
9 Ericka Savage Whitley. I like it if we have that legal
10 opinion, because we are violating the city charter by not
11 meeting once per week, that's line 7-802.

12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you, Mr. Chairman, Mr.
13 Commissioner. I will make sure the law department will
14 respond to that, whether Ericka or --

15 COMMISSIONER BURTON: She's on the zoom, Mr.
16 Chairman, she can address it now.

17 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: But she's not.

18 COMMISSIONER BURTON: This is a public meeting.

19 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: She's not going to address it
20 now.

21 COMMISSIONER BURTON: And this is the, we ought to
22 represent the majority Detroiters who rely on the Board
23 of Police Commissioners to fulfill the charter mandate
24 duties.

25 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Can I have a motion to.

1 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Through the Chair, based on the
2 number of attempts you've engaged to perhaps encourage
3 the honorable commissioner to follow your guidelines and
4 your directives. I move that the commissioner accepts to
5 be muted.

6 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Is there a second?

7 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Point of order. I want the
8 record to reflect, I did call for a legal conclusion. I
9 drafted a memorandum.

10 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Is there a second?

11 COMMISSIONER BELL: Second.

12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: It has been second. Can we have
13 roll call, please?

14 COMMISSIONER BURTON: And we have a parliamentarian
15 on the line. I'd like her to weigh in as well.

16 MS. WHITE: There was a second, Mr. Chair.

17 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I asked you for a roll call, we
18 have to have a roll call, right?

19 MS. WHITE: Yes, sir. I did not hear you. Excuse me?
20 Commissioner Brown = No.

21 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Bernard = Yes.

22 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Burch = Yes.

23 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Bell = Yes.

24 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Burton = No, this is

25 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Carter = Yes.

1 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Davis = No.

2 Ms. WHITE: Commissioner Holt. Commissioner Holt =
3 I'm sorry. Yes, please.

4 MS. WHITE: Chair Holley = Yes.

5 MS. WHITE: There were 6 = Yes votes and 3 No votes.
6 The motion passed.

7 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you. At this time. Mr.
8 Brown, can you start with your oral presentation?

9 MR. ROB BROWN: Yes. We currently have 11 speakers.
10 Your first three speakers would be Lieutenant Mark Young
11 LSA President, CAC Chair, Mr. Scotty Bowman and Ms.
12 Bernice Smith. Lieutenant Young.

13 LIEUTENANT YOUNG: I'm speechless. I had some
14 different things to say, but in light of Commissioner
15 Martin Jones passing, I am deeply saddened and disturbed.
16 He was not only a great leader, but he was an awesome
17 friend and an advocate for the Detroit Police Department,
18 the men and women of the Detroit Police Department and
19 his leadership would truly be missed. And that scares me
20 right now. The board can do one thing for me right now,
21 and that is to issue a resolution for Officer Lloyd
22 Michael Todd, who on December 7th, two days ago, 23 years
23 ago, was shot in the head. I'm sure that he would
24 appreciate that resolution, the acknowledgement from this
25 department, the oversight body of this department, I'm

1 sure his family would appreciate that.

2 LIEUTENANT YOUNG: It would also be a testament to
3 the men and women that go out there every day to face
4 uncertainty. While we are talking about CCRs, without
5 these men and women going out there every day to do what
6 they do, this city would not be saved. And nobody, I
7 mean, nobody would be able to take credit for the job
8 that these men and women risk every day to do. I am
9 appreciative to the board for not having a lot of
10 dialogue and approving those promotions. They're well
11 deserved and long overdue. If the board wanted to do
12 something right now to show a sign of good faith to the
13 men and women of this department, do the resolution for
14 Lloyd Michael Todd. If you need some help, I'll send you
15 all the documentation that you need, but you don't need
16 to do that. You can Google it in the archives of the
17 Detroit Police Department. That individual is an awesome
18 individual and his sacrifice has not gone unnoticed or
19 appreciated.

20 MR. BOWMAN: Hello? Can you hear me?

21 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes.

22 MR. BOWMAN: Okay. Most of you have violated your
23 oath of office to uphold the constitution and the Detroit
24 city charter. Climbing a top of the bodies of the Oxford
25 victims to elevate your contempt for the bill of rights

1 is despicable. The fact that many nations in the world
2 have less respect for human rights is no reason to copy
3 them. Likewise, the fact that other office holders in the
4 city go on break does not excuse this board from
5 following the charter. The fact the open meetings act
6 does not prohibit weekly meetings. It does not require it
7 either. The charter does require it. Therefore there is
8 nothing excusing you from complying with the charter. And
9 Commissioner Burton is correct that you do not need to
10 meet on Thursdays. You can schedule for other dates and
11 have compliance with the charter while not necessarily
12 having a meeting on a Thursday if it is a big problem for
13 you.

14 MR. BOWMAN: It may not be convenient, it may not
15 feel fair that you have to work through that break, but
16 this is a job that you ran for and the only reason the
17 job exists or this position exists, not really a job,
18 exists is because the charter created that position. If
19 you want to consider yourself qualified to be in a
20 position that was created by the charter, you must follow
21 the requirements of that charter to the best of your
22 abilities. That is not what I am seeing here. I am seeing
23 a group of people, most of whom do not seem to care if
24 the charter says it or not. Because the fact of the
25 matter is, there really are no teeth here. Nothing is

1 going to happen. There is no consequences. And you could
2 say, well, four years from now, maybe people can vote out
3 those they disagree with who violated the charter, but it
4 won't matter because most people aren't watching the
5 meeting and most people don't care. And so it continues,
6 I yield.

7 MR. ROB BROWN: Ms. Bernie Smith.

8 MS. SMITH: Commissioners, today is another one of
9 those most ignorant days I can imagine. No respect
10 whatsoever. We have a commissioner that we lost
11 yesterday. I have known him ever since the Detroit 300
12 has been in existence. We need to think about the people
13 who do a good job for us in this city. And I'm going to
14 miss the hell out of him. I talked with him two days ago
15 about what's going on here in this city and how we can
16 make arrangements to make it come under control. But you
17 have a commissioner on that board that does not respect
18 any of you, let alone, your director. He doesn't respect
19 anybody. Must we go on next year and go through the same
20 thing in regard to him being disrespectful, he does not
21 need to be in that seat.

22 MS. SMITH: I wish like, hell I could have ran so I
23 can get him out of that seat, but it doesn't happen that
24 way. And you Davis, I'm glad you're going to be gone
25 because you are another obstacle in that meeting. And

1 it's sad, it's really sad. We need new talent to know
2 what to do about this city. And as far as charters were
3 concerned, the Mayor Coleman Young, organized a police
4 commission. The charter came afterwards. So I feel as
5 though the charter is doing an injustice because they
6 don't even know what the hell they are talking about half
7 the time.

8 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: So it doesn't matter, it now.

9 MS. SMITH: Commissioners take care, have a happy
10 holiday if you can.

11 MR. ROB BROWN: Mr. Chair, your next three speakers
12 will be Miss Sharon Parnell followed by Ms. Joy, followed
13 by Ms. Brenda Hill.

14 MS. PARNELL: First of all I'm giving my condolences
15 for Martin Jones, my heart is really heavy. Second, I
16 want to thank Mark Young and AC Bettison for helping me
17 out with the situation in Highland Park, chief. And I
18 want to congratulate Commander Mounsey for his great work
19 with his police officers and saving all those packages. I
20 love my Second Precinct. Have a happy holiday everybody,
21 and please stay safe. Bye.

22 MR. ROB BROWN: Ms. Joy.

23 MS. JOY: Good evening. Good evening. Can you hear
24 me?

25 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes.

1 MS. JOY: Welcome to the board and to all of the
2 speakers and guests. I just want to say I appreciate
3 everyone as usual for the great work that they're doing.
4 My special thanks to Commander McGinnis for his work in
5 the homicide. And it takes a great solid mind to do those
6 works in the homicide investigations and they stay
7 levelheaded through it all. That's bravery and courage in
8 a person and I appreciate all of that. And also, I would
9 like to say my condolences for the loss of our
10 Commissioner Jones. I was very surprised that he was
11 gone, I didn't even know it. And I had spoken to Ms.
12 Underwood, maybe she didn't know it, but I spoke to her
13 last. But my condolence to the family and pray for them
14 during this time of great loss of our Commissioner Jones.

15 MS. JOY: And I want to say that I appreciate the
16 hard work that was done with the Oxford happening at the
17 children's school and then how the sheriff and the DPD
18 worked together on such hard work to get everything
19 resolved and continuing to work with the families. And I
20 saw a video where the sheriff said he was embracing the
21 children and being so compassionate to them during that
22 time. And that, that was highly commendable to help them
23 along the way. And I also wanted to say some things for
24 the commissioners that are leaving, Commissioners Brown,
25 Burch and Davis. Great work and the passion of

1 Commissioner Davis and the great work for families of
2 Commissioner,

3 MR. ROB BROWN: Ms. Brenda Hill.

4 MS. HILL: Hello? Can you hear me?

5 MR. ROB BROWN: Yes, ma'am.

6 MS. HILL: Yes. Thank you. Thank you for listening
7 today as well. I wanted to say that this board is not
8 against the police board. It's not the police to kiss the
9 police's butt board. It's an oversight board. You're
10 supposed to be here, rooting around, trying to find
11 what's wrong with the Police Department and trying to
12 make it better all the time. So things are going to be
13 contentious at times, and we need to do better. Under
14 this tutelage this board has been reduced to a joke. It's
15 mad, it's maddening. There are several issues. Linda
16 Bernard should be sanctioned, something along with Willie
17 Bell. And I'd like to just talk about Willie Bell and
18 Martin Jones. The reason I am hard on them is because I
19 expected more from both of them. I have stood side by
20 side over the years with them when they've done
21 extraordinary things, Martin Jones died and Martin Jones
22 used to protect me out on these streets.

23 MS. HILL: We used to do some dangerous, dangerous
24 work, and Martin Jones was there and he got on this board
25 and not only made some decisions that I was not in

1 agreement with, he made decisions against the people of
2 this city. And I was very, very disappointed in him to
3 the point that I had to speak out. And he's gone now, and
4 he's gone thinking that I was upset with him, which I
5 was, but nobody knows how much time we have. And you all
6 had to have to remember the same and do the right thing,
7 do the right thing. You've turned this into a mockery.
8 Thank you.

9 MR. ROB BROWN: Mr. Chair, your next three calls are
10 caller with the last three numbers 891, Motor City Rue
11 and May. Caller with the last three numbers 891. Okay.
12 Mr. Chair. I go to Motor City Rue.

13 MR. ROB BROWN: Motor City Rue.

14 MOTOR CITY RUE: Well, today it's ironic. I see James
15 White, he cut out again like he did last week before
16 people make public comments. But today mark's the
17 anniversary of the assassination of my confidant by the
18 Detroit Police Department's SRT team, Fred, the shooter
19 who shot her, broke the hallway behind the wall while she
20 was faced away, kneeling down. Now the assassination
21 designation has been concurred by the United States,
22 federal judge and his chambers when he had a 25 to 30
23 minute discussion with me about the whole matter. And he
24 concurred with me that it was an assassination. Now,
25 those tears I shared this morning at 6:30 were really

1 real. And that brings me to this right now, there's a
2 four or five year old little girl who has asked me on
3 four different occasions who killed her mama. Now, her
4 mother's case Kamisha Cole case number 20-112 has been
5 designated a suicide by the Detroit Police Department.
6 Now the high-ranking individuals who have attempted,
7 George McGinnis, Lieutenant Curtis Shell, and Derek Maye
8 have colluded with Jessica Hunter over at the OCI to give
9 her a suicide designation. It's reprehensible that this
10 little girl has to grow up with that designation tag on
11 her. So that's why I came on this meeting today to say
12 exactly this, it's totally reprehensible that they have
13 classified her mother's murder a suicide. Now, everyone,
14 let's have a moment for Martin Jones. See, I stay on real

15 MR. ROB BROWN: And Mr. Chair, I don't see May. So
16 your next caller would be Olivia Shakur followed by Ms.
17 Tawana Moore. I go to Miss Shakur.

18 MS. SHAKUR: Can you hear me?

19 MR. ROB BROWN: Yes.

20 MS. SHAKUR: Okay. I give my condolences that Mr.
21 Jones passed away and to his family. But today I'm asking
22 about the event that happened on St. Mary's. Two days
23 ago, Tuesday, there were a number of police in my
24 community, and they were just all over the street from
25 Puritan to Florence. And I went to the store, when I came

1 back, they had blocked off the street. I was getting
2 ready to walk home, like about three or four houses from
3 my house. And the officer said, you can't walk, it's too
4 dangerous. And so he had an officer to drive me to my
5 home and then get out and walk me, you know, to my house.
6 I don't know if it's safe in my community. I don't know
7 what happened. I would like for someone to please tell me
8 what's going on in my community. That's in the 1600 block
9 of St. Mary's, 1600 in the block between Puritan and
10 Florence. Are there any employees still there?

11 MS. WHITE: Yes. Through the Chair. Ma'am if you
12 could please contact (313)-596-1830, we will make sure to
13 follow up on your request. (313) 596-1830. Thank you.

14 MS. SHAKUR: I called the Eighth Precinct and I still
15 don't do anything. That's why I'm here, asking. Okay.
16 Thank you.

17 MR. ROB BROWN: Ms. Tawana Moore.

18 MS. MOORE: Hello? Hello everyone.

19 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Hello?

20 MS. MOORE: Okay. I wish everyone a Merry Christmas
21 and a Happy New Year. We've all gone through some hard
22 times this year and a couple of years back, but we are
23 moving forward. And I personally call to commend our
24 commissioner. Bill Davis. He's done a wonderful job in
25 our community, as well as the block association. I'm not

1 here to badger or dog anybody out. I'm here to thank
2 everybody for the things they do. Those that need to do
3 better. Well, yes, we need to do better, but this is not
4 the time to be dogging anybody out. This is time for a
5 memory and to love the past and to help others. Have a
6 happy holiday, everybody and especially to you Bill
7 because I really appreciate what you do for us.

8 MR. ROB BROWN: Caller with the last three numbers,
9 891, you have to unmute your phone.

10 MS. WHITE: Mr. Brown, may we come back please?

11 MR. ROB BROWN: That would be the last, oh, he's
12 unmuted now.

13 CALLER 891: Hi. Yeah, my name is yeah. I'm sorry.
14 Hello?

15 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Yes. Hello?

16 CALLER 891: Hi. Yes, my name is Anthony. I was here
17 to make a statement regarding an incident I had with the
18 Detroit police officers. Apparently they made a mistake
19 by impounding my car and basically I was reading this
20 documentation saying that they were in the wrong, which I
21 had not received yet through investigation. I'm just
22 trying to get a speedy process and see what's going on
23 with this?

24 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Melanie, can you help?

25 MS. WHITE: Yes, sir. If you could please give the

1 board's office a call, sir, we would gladly assist you
2 with your request. The number is (313)-596-1830, and we
3 will assist you with your request.

4 CALLER 891: Alright. Thank you.

5 MS. WHITE: Okay. You're welcome.

6 MR. ROB BROWN: That was your last call.

7 MS. WHITE: I believe Mr. Chair's microphone is muted
8 at this time. Commissioner Bell.

9 COMMISSIONER BELL: The Chair will entertain a motion
10 to adjourn the business before this body for dismissal

11 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: So moved and Merry Christmas,
12 everyone.

13 COMMISSIONER HOLT: second.

14 COMMISSIONER BELL: It's been properly moved and
15 second. Now we stand adjourned. Merry Christmas,
16 everybody, and happy New Year. I wish the best for all

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
