June 16, 2022 at 3:00 P.M.

1 MS. WHITE: Good afternoon, honorable Board,  
2 Assistant Chief Fitzgerald, DPD executives, and  
3 community. Welcome to the Detroit Board of Police  
4 Commissioners meeting. The time now is 3:00 PM and just  
5 by way of preliminary reminders, please, at this time,  
6 silence your cell phones to prevent interrupting the  
7 Board's meeting. And also if you are seeking to  
8 participate in the public comment section, please submit  
9 your comment interest card to Ms. Jonya Underwood, who is  
10 sitting at the end of this table platform. And we will be  
11 sure to at your name to the list and you may do so by  
12 4:00 PM today. And also you may sign up on Smartsheet  
13 online and the other various zoom capabilities to ensure  
14 that we are aware that you would like to speak during  
15 public comments. But again, thank you for attending the  
16 Board of Police Commissioners meeting. And at this time  
17 Chairperson, Holley

18 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much. Good  
19 afternoon. Jim Holley, Chairperson of the Board of Police  
20 Commissioners. We thank God for each and every one of  
21 you. And certainly, we thank you for being with us this  
22 afternoon as well. This meeting will come to order.  
23 Before I ask for an invocation from Chaplain Kenneth  
24 Tate, let me just have a few remarks and then we have a  
25 word of prayer. As we approach one of the most important

1 dates of United States history, June 19th the Freedom  
2 Day, let us commemorate and celebrate the freedom of our  
3 enslaved African-American ancestry. On June the 19th,  
4 1865, enslaved African-Americans were declared free in  
5 Galveston Texas, two and a half years after President  
6 Abraham Lincoln signed the emancipation proclamation. We  
7 continue to honor our African American ancestry and many  
8 of the sacrifices that have been made for us to this day.  
9 It is because of them that we can enjoy the many freedoms  
10 that we experience today. While we come a long way, we  
11 still have a long way to go. We must continue to move  
12 forward on our journey to freedom, equity, equality, and  
13 justice for all. We should never forget. At this time,  
14 Chaplain, thank you for your patience. We ask that now  
15 Chaplain Tate if you would give a word of prayer.

16 CHAPLAIN TATE: We're grateful to be here. We thank  
17 God for the Board of Directors. And right now we ask for  
18 the spirit of God to bless this meeting, this invocation.  
19 We ask for the Holy Spirit to begin to administer life  
20 and wisdom. And as we ask for the direction that you  
21 would lead, guide, and begin to give the wisdom that's  
22 needed, even at this time as this great Board of  
23 Directors go forward. And Father, we thank you for the  
24 ideas and the things that you give them right now by your  
25 Spirit we pray, in Jesus' name, amen.

1 VICE-CHAIR FERGUSON: Four members of the Board shall  
2 be appointed by the mayor, subject to the approval of the  
3 City Council. The Board shall in constellation with the  
4 Chief of Police and approval by the Mayor, establish  
5 policies, rules, and regulations review and approve the  
6 departmental budget before it's submitted to the Mayor;  
7 receive and resolve as provided in this Charter any  
8 complaint concerning the operation of the Police  
9 Department and forward all allegations of criminality to  
10 the proper internal or external law enforcement agency  
11 for further investigation, act as the final authority in  
12 imposing or reviewing discipline of employees of the  
13 department, make an annual report to the Mayor, the City  
14 Council and the public of the department's activities  
15 during the previous year, including the handling of crime  
16 and complaints and of future plans. The Board may  
17 subpoena witnesses, administer oaths, take testimony, and  
18 require the production of evidence to enforce a subpoena  
19 or order of production of evidence or to impose any  
20 penalty prescribed or failure to obey any subpoena or  
21 order the Board shall apply to the appropriate court. The  
22 Board may delegate in writing to a member of his staff,  
23 the powers to administer oath and take testimony. A  
24 delegation is revocable at the will of the Board and does  
25 not prevent the exercise of any power by the Board. Mr.

1 Chairman, the mission statement read.

2 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much. Vice-Chair  
3 Ferguson. At this time, Secretary White, would you please  
4 call the roll?

5 MS. WHITE: Yes, sir. Through the Chair, Mr. Vice-  
6 Chair, Bryan Ferguson - Here.

7 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Linda Bernard - Linda  
8 Bernard, District 2, present.

9 MS. WHITE: Commissioner, Cedric Banks - Present.

10 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Willie E. Bell - Present,  
11 District 4.

12 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Willie E. Burton -

13 MS. WHITE: Commissioner, Lisa Carter -

14 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Ricardo Moore - Present,  
15 District 7.

16 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Jesus Hernandez - Present.

17 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Annie Holt submitted an  
18 excused absence notification.

19 MS. WHITE: Commissioner, QuanTez Pressley -

20 MS. WHITE: Mr. Chair, you do have a quorum.

21 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much. And thank you  
22 to all the Commissioners who are present. I know it's hot  
23 here, not only on the outside but here in the auditorium  
24 as well. Thank you for your present. Thank you for your  
25 cooperation as well. We going to try to move this as

1 judiciously as possible. We do have a closed session and  
2 I want to remind you that we only have 7 Commissioners  
3 and so, otherwise, if anyone pops out, we won't have a  
4 quorum. I may need to let you know that. So I just thank  
5 you for being there. I'd like to entertain a motion for  
6 the approval of the agenda on June 16, 2022.

7 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: So moved.

8 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Support

9 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: On June 16th, 2022.

10 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Any discussion? Hearing no  
11 discussion, all in favor, say aye.

12 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

13 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Any opposed? I like to also let  
14 you know that I'm talking about June. The minutes have  
15 been distributed to each and every one of you, and the  
16 meeting of the previous minutes of June 9th, 2022. Are  
17 there any corrections to those minutes? Hearing no  
18 corrections, then the minutes will stand approved. At  
19 this time, Ms. White, can you let us know who's with you  
20 today?

21 MS. WHITE: Yes, sir. Through the Chair, Media  
22 Services is handling our audio and visual needs today for  
23 the Board's meeting. And our court reporter is Mr. Don  
24 Handyside and the following Board staff members are in  
25 attendance today. Assistant Corporation Counsel,

1 Christopher Michaels, Ms. Jonya Underwood, Administrative  
2 Assistant, Investigator Tiffany Stewart, Director,  
3 Katrina Patillo, Director of Police Personnel, Interim  
4 Chief Investigator Lawrence Akbar, Supervising  
5 Investigator Ansley, Cromwell, Acting, Supervising  
6 Investigator LiSonya Sloan, and Acting Supervising  
7 Investigator Rosalia Madrigal are in attendance via zoom  
8 and our American Sign Language interpreters today are Ms.  
9 Yakata and Dr. Stephanie Beattie. Thank you, sir.

10 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: And thank you, Ms. White. At  
11 this time representing Chief White is Assistant Chief  
12 Fitzgerald. Thank you for being with us this afternoon as  
13 well. Do you have anyone that you can recognize from your  
14 area?

15 ASSISTANT CHIEF FITZGERALD: Yes, certainly. Thank  
16 you, Chairperson. In the back, we've got Deputy Chief  
17 Kyra Joy Hope, Agency, CFO Nazarko, and in the back Vice-  
18 President of the DPOA, Ron Thomas. And I thought I saw DC  
19 Grant Ha running through, I'm sure he'll be back.

20 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much. Thank you.  
21 And thank you for being with us, Deputy Chief.  
22 Fitzgerald. Would you have any special guests, Mrs.  
23 White?

24 MS. WHITE: Yes, sir. Through the Chair, for the  
25 record Commissioner, Willie Burton has arrived at this

1 time and also our special guests Ms. Freda Butler, Second  
2 Precinct, Community Relations Council President. And that  
3 is all that I have at this time. Thank you, sir.

4 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: And I thank all of you by way of  
5 zoom or here in the auditorium. We thank you for being  
6 with us at any meeting, but certainly at this meeting  
7 today, because we know it's hot everywhere, not only  
8 here, but where you are as well. Nevertheless, we want to  
9 let you know how grateful we are for your presence. Just  
10 before we get started, I'd just like to, again, welcome  
11 and thank you for attending today's Board meeting. Today,  
12 we have a presentation regarding the Detroit Police  
13 Department's quarterly budget, quarter number three. We  
14 have a closed session with two items. The Board has  
15 received all relevant materials in preparation for  
16 today's meeting. We also look forward to the Assistant  
17 Chief sharing with us the important vital crime updates  
18 and critical incidents for our awareness, as well as any  
19 other events or incidents for our attention.

20 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: We also thank the department for  
21 sharing responses to the Board's inquiries regarding the  
22 number of areas that we reported during incoming  
23 correspondence. Again, I'd like to recognize and offer  
24 and congratulate Chairperson elect, Vice-Chair, Bryan  
25 Ferguson, and Vice-Chairperson elect Commissioner Annie



1 Holt on their recent election as incoming Chairperson and  
2 Vice-Chairperson to the Board of Police Commissioners for  
3 2022 and 2023. The Board staff will be in touch with you  
4 to follow on logistics and preparation for the swearing  
5 and the ceremony, which will take place on July 7th,  
6 2022, and any other matters that you need, then just call  
7 the office and certainly Ms. White would be able to  
8 handle that as well. At this time, I'm asking Deputy  
9 Chief Fitzgerald, do you have anything you want to report  
10 to us on behalf of the Chief?

11 ASSISTANT CHIEF FITZGERALD: Yes, sir, of course.

12 Good afternoon, honorable Board. Assistant Chief  
13 Fitzgerald for Chief White. He does send his regards. He  
14 is getting a couple of much-needed days off. I'll start  
15 out with the update on our injured officers.

16 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Oh, you said a couple of months?

17 ASSISTANT CHIEF FITZGERALD: No, no, a couple of  
18 days. He may have tried a couple of months, but it is  
19 just a couple of days.

20 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I'm moving for a couple of  
21 months.

22 ASSISTANT CHIEF FITZGERALD: Currently we have three  
23 members of the department who are still at home  
24 recovering. We have a sergeant from the Second Precinct,  
25 a police officer from Tactical Services Section, and one

1 police officer from the gang intelligence section, who  
2 most know was dragged by the vehicle last week or about a  
3 week and a half ago. COVID numbers are still, they're  
4 going back down. COVID is still here. It looks like we've  
5 got 13 members that are currently quarantined or isolated  
6 versus 31 last week. We have 11 that are currently  
7 positive. Crime data. I wish I had better news to  
8 announce other than, I mean, we had a bad week we had a  
9 really rough week but our homicide numbers are 120 this  
10 year versus 137 last year, it's a 12% decrease.  
11 Definitely, no celebrating there, non-fatal 370 this year  
12 versus 461 last year.

13 ASSISTANT CHIEF FITZGERALD: It's a 20% decrease.  
14 Robberies are still so far in a good direction. 602  
15 versus 605, which is a 7% decrease. Our total part one  
16 crime unfortunately is 16,344 versus 15,206 is a 7%  
17 increase versus the same time last year. Drifting and  
18 drag racing detail continues every weekend and we are out  
19 in full force, have a very good complement of individuals  
20 out doing what they can. This week we did 15 traffic  
21 stops and 6 citations. They impounded another vehicle.  
22 Significant incidents for the week. Again, these numbers  
23 are just staggering. Incident number one was a quadruple  
24 shooting in the 13,000 block of Clover Lawn. These four  
25 individuals were at a bachelor party. They were having a

1 good time at the bachelor party for someone about to get  
2 married, an argument ensued, and someone came past and  
3 shot up the house, and these four individuals right now,  
4 other than argument, we don't have a whole lot more on  
5 it. Detectives are actively investigating. We have  
6 absolutely, we've been all week asking for the public's  
7 assistance to give us more information just against  
8 senseless violence. Incident number two was a triple non-  
9 fatal shooting that happened in the 14,000 block of  
10 Griggs on June 11th. This was a shoe sale gone badly.  
11 They had him come, he's going to sell some shoes, and  
12 they attempted to rob him. There were some shots fired in  
13 both directions. The good news is that we have got three  
14 people in custody and all of the offenders have been  
15 charged with assault and intent to commit murder, assault  
16 and, intent to commit great bodily harm, armed robbery,  
17 carjacking, felony possession, felony firearm across the  
18 Board.

19 ASSISTANT CHIEF FITZGERALD: So unfortunately that it  
20 happened, but we did get some closure on that. Incident  
21 number three is a triple shooting that happened at Mac  
22 and Fairview in the Fifth Precinct on June 12th. Our  
23 victims were driving westbound on Mac when a black SUV  
24 with blue headlights pull up next to the vehicle and  
25 fired multiple rounds at the vehicle. One of our victims

1 succumbed to his injuries. Again, we really don't have a  
2 whole lot of emotion when we're asking for again, the  
3 public's assistance to help us with that incident. The  
4 last incident as far as just some of this silliness with  
5 a crime is that we had a nonfatal shooting at St John's  
6 hospital on the 13th. The incident originally started on  
7 the I-94 the people in the red challenger drove  
8 themselves to the hospital.

9 ASSISTANT CHIEF FITZGERALD: We had two different  
10 vehicles that followed came around from both directions  
11 at the hospital. And when the one person was getting out  
12 of the red challenger, they fired again. They came to  
13 essentially finish the job they tried on 94. Due to the  
14 initial incident happening on the expressway, we had our  
15 homicide task force come out, which were partners with  
16 MSP have partnered with MSP. MSP is going to take this  
17 entire shooting, the entire case. And we will assist as  
18 best we can. We do have a license plate number for the  
19 black Chevy Equinox as one of the vehicles that we put  
20 out to the media as well. And again, we're, we're hoping  
21 to get some, some help from the absolute best partners we  
22 have is our community. So a few positives before I turn  
23 it back. On Monday, June 13th, the Ninth Precinct put on  
24 a junior police bicycle academy.

25 ASSISTANT CHIEF FITZGERALD: It was a nice surprise

1 for the students at Trix Academy and those in the program  
2 received a brand new bike. It was on the media, a very,  
3 very good story. On Tuesday at Mann Elementary they were  
4 allowed to come over and visit the Sixth Precinct for a  
5 tour. They walked through the police precinct got to ask  
6 questions, get a firsthand look at everything that  
7 happens at the police precinct. It was just a really good  
8 visit. They got to go through our community closet, which  
9 was nice. They got to see that. And you're talking, this  
10 is a younger group of students we're already trying to  
11 recruit, trying to get them to come on. We were asking  
12 them early and often. Again on Tuesday, we had two  
13 separate roll calls for Operation Zinnia. Zinnia is the  
14 11-year-old that was shot in her own home shot and killed  
15 by senseless gunfire.

16 ASSISTANT CHIEF FITZGERALD: We wanted to pay  
17 whatever respects we could to the family and gives the  
18 name to this operation, the two-day operation. The first  
19 day was on the East Side. We had well over a hundred  
20 people in attendance for roll call. And then on  
21 Wednesday, yesterday, we went back to the West Side. So  
22 we're kind of flip-flopping. And then today they're back  
23 on the East Side again. Some really, really good stats  
24 out of the first two days. One importantly, we made an  
25 arrest a person with assault, intent to commit murder. We

1 followed the suspect heading out toward Metro airport and  
2 stopped the suspect. We got a really nice chunk of  
3 cocaine. They went back and did a search warrant at his  
4 house and it was just a pot full of stuff.

5 ASSISTANT CHIEF FITZGERALD: Marijuana,  
6 methamphetamine, crystal meth, fentanyl 2,700 grams of  
7 fentanyl. Just to kind of put that in perspective. If you  
8 look at, it takes about two milligrams as a fatal dose of  
9 fentanyl. There was enough fentanyl there to take out of  
10 Wayne County. So it's terrifying in and of itself. Great  
11 bit of police work by, not only our people but our CVRP,  
12 Wayne County MSP for assisting. So just great police work  
13 there. Yesterday, Chief had his walk a mile down in the  
14 Fourth Precinct. They were at 2835 Bagley and as hot as  
15 it was, they got out there and did their thing. And then  
16 lastly, tomorrow at Fitzgerald Park we are having big  
17 country pit master barbecue challenge. It is an honor of  
18 our longtime Officer Ed Thomas, who in 2019, lost his  
19 battle with prostate cancer. So nice event, you'd be able  
20 to eat some really, really good food and judge. And  
21 that's from 8 to 4. And that's all I have. Are there any  
22 questions?

23 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I know you were moving but  
24 something took place and you turned the investigation  
25 over to somebody else?

1 ASSISTANT CHIEF FITZGERALD: Yes. It was the incident  
2 that happened on the expressway because it happened on  
3 the expressway MSP takes jurisdiction.

4 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Even though it ended up in  
5 Detroit?

6 ASSISTANT CHIEF FITZGERALD: Yes, because the first  
7 young man was shot on the expressway. They followed  
8 through and we assisted throughout the entire thing, our  
9 homicide task force, and the Michigan State Police will  
10 assist as well.

11 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I got it. The second thing, if  
12 we want to know about where we are with this fentanyl in  
13 terms of where we are in the City of Detroit, what  
14 department would we look for, or maybe Ms. White, you can  
15 help me if we could have them come in and give us the  
16 information in terms of how we're doing with that in  
17 Detroit, what's happening statistics wise in Detroit with  
18 this deadly substance?

19 ASSISTANT CHIEF FITZGERALD: Certainly, and we will  
20 assist Ms. White with that.

21 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Can you help me with that?

22 MS. WHITE: Yes, sir.

23 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: And the other thing then I'll go  
24 to the Commissioners to talk but is it possible to have  
25 the prosecutor to come in and give us a report in terms

1 of the state of prosecutions or whatever you want to call  
2 it. Do we have the right to do that?

3 MS. WHITE: Yes, sir. Through the Chair, that was one  
4 of my items for the incoming correspondence report. The  
5 prosecutor's office has contacted the Board's office to  
6 request to present before the Board, during the month of  
7 July on various updates. So we will make sure to  
8 communicate that.

9 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: So, we don't have to submit any  
10 questions or anything?

11 MS. WHITE: If the honorable Board does have  
12 questions that they might...

13 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I'd be concerned and I don't  
14 know about the others, but I'm coming to the end of my  
15 time here. And a big issues is just really where we are  
16 with these guns and what happened to this one with a gun  
17 gets you two. And I know my attorney here gets mad at me  
18 sometimes, but I really need to have the information.  
19 Where are we with this? And of course, I really feel like  
20 this gun stuff somehow has got to cease in some kind of  
21 way. That's not a panacea, but it has to be a part of the  
22 equation. At this time. Commissioner Moore, do you have a  
23 question for Assistant Chief Fitzgerald?

24 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Yes. Mr. Chairman, thank you  
25 very much. Assistant Chief, earlier this week, I learned



1 about a situation at the Ninth Precinct regarding a  
2 lieutenant doing some things that he shouldn't have been  
3 doing. Can you elaborate on that?

4 ASSISTANT CHIEF FITZGERALD: Yes. We had a mentally  
5 ill woman come up to the precinct and I'll give you as  
6 much as I can because it is an ongoing investigation. She  
7 came up to the precinct. She rode her bicycle. She was  
8 completely nude. She came into the building, she came  
9 back out of the building. She dragged her bike toward  
10 Gratiot and laid down in the middle of Gratiot. A handful  
11 of officers plus a lieutenant came out, got her up, and  
12 got her handcuffed. They were moving her back toward out  
13 of Gratiot, back toward the main door. And this young  
14 lady spits in the face of the lieutenant. And if you saw  
15 it on the media, the lieutenant kind of lashed out and  
16 grabbed her hair. I think what the officers did was an  
17 amazing bit of work. You're talking about some officers  
18 who, to a ranking officer, intervened and quickly stopped  
19 her from going any further because she was very, very  
20 upset. The officers did a great job, exactly what we  
21 would expect them to do. The Lieutenant has since been  
22 put on administrative duty. She was moved and there's an  
23 investigation going now.

24 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you for that too. So they  
25 had a duty to intervene by a policy that was created on

1 December 22nd, 2020, but did they have a duty to report?

2 ASSISTANT CHIEF FITZGERALD: Oh, absolutely. Every  
3 officer has a duty to report.

4 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Is that a part of your  
5 investigation?

6 ASSISTANT CHIEF FITZGERALD: Absolutely. And when I  
7 look at that, there was another lieutenant who was coming  
8 out of the main door and the officers reported the  
9 incident to that lieutenant, which is also part of the  
10 investigation.

11 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: You okay?

12 COMMISSIONER MOORE: No, sir, not quite. My second  
13 question. I'm hot, I'm very hot, but I have to work for  
14 the citizens though.

15 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Sounds like somebody else I  
16 know.

17 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Oh, I don't want to stop. The  
18 Blue Pigs. Do you remember the Blue Pigs back in the day,  
19 do they have another program or can there be something  
20 that's relevant to our youth, similar to the Blue Pigs,  
21 something that can get kids going, something of that  
22 nature? And that's just FYI because I know you can't  
23 answer that. And I run through it because I know it is  
24 hot in here.

25 ASSISTANT CHIEF FITZGERALD: I actually can. Yes,

1 Chief White's already working on it. One of the things he  
2 was really focusing on is exactly like you said, bringing  
3 it to the Blue Pigs of 2022 where it connects to our kids  
4 a lot more than it does to what it used to.

5 COMMISSIONER MOORE: And also because the gas price  
6 is high, is their plan to fortake on vehicles from  
7 department executives, will have you parking the vehicle  
8 to save on gas?

9 ASSISTANT CHIEF FITZGERALD: Not at this point. We  
10 require 24/7 with them, myself included. My expectation  
11 is some of these scenes that are out there. So, yes, I'm  
12 not willing to park their cars at this point in time.

13 COMMISSIONER MOORE: And my last question, Assistant  
14 Chief, ShotSpotter in the parks, Rouge Park, Palmer Park,  
15 and Chandler Park. Those are areas where you wouldn't  
16 typically have a lot of eyes and ears after hours, but  
17 shots do go on. Is there a plan for ShotSpotter in the  
18 parks after dark?

19 ASSISTANT CHIEF FITZGERALD: I'm 100% in support of  
20 it, but at this point, no, I don't think they're a part  
21 of the new expansion plan.

22 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you, sir.

23 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Let the record also show that  
24 Commissioner Carter is at the table. At this time,  
25 Commissioner Hernandez, any questions for the Assistant

1 Chief?

2 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Through the Chair,  
3 Commissioner Moore stole my thunder. But I will make a  
4 very brief comment in being out at several community  
5 spaces, I'd say over the last maybe one or two weeks, I  
6 think there's a distinct appreciation for the work that's  
7 going on with drag racing, that detail in particular and  
8 also with ATVs and other mopeds and bikes. So just  
9 sincere appreciation from the community is what I'm  
10 hearing.

11 ASSISTANT CHIEF FITZGERALD: Thank you, sir.

12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much, Commissioner.  
13 Commissioner Banks.

14 COMMISSIONER BANKS: I just wanted to say, first of  
15 all, congratulations to Chair Ferguson and Vice-Chair  
16 Holt. Thank God for Chair Ferguson. You accomplished  
17 something that probably has never been done in the  
18 history of the Board in six months, you went from Vice-  
19 Chair to Chair, a great accomplishment leading the 2022  
20 class and spearheading the 2022 class into a great  
21 accomplishment like that. Bless you, brother, I salute  
22 you. And I don't know if it's, I'm sorry, Commander...

23 ASSISTANT CHIEF FITZGERALD: Assistant Chief  
24 Fitzgerald.

25 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Oh, Assistant Chief. I'm sorry.

1 I didn't know it would be so many different titles  
2 sitting right there In that seat. But Assistant Chief,  
3 what I wanted to say, with the situation that took place  
4 at the Ninth Precinct the other day, we thank God for the  
5 officers that restrained the young lady, but what charges  
6 are being held against the lieutenant, because that was  
7 excessive force. The lady was already handcuffed. That  
8 type of force was not needed. Am I right? The lady was  
9 already handcuffed. So that type of force was not needed.  
10 What type of charge would the lieutenant be dealt with?  
11 That is a use of force, right?

12 ASSISTANT CHIEF FITZGERALD: Yes, sir. We categorized  
13 that as a category one use of force and because it's a  
14 category one use of force, the investigation was moved  
15 over to Force Investigation at Professional Standards, so  
16 they will address any violations and any charges.

17 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Okay. I'm all set chief. I mean  
18 Chair, I'm sorry.

19 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Chief is fine. Commissioner  
20 Bernard, how are you today?

21 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I'm fine. Good report,  
22 Assistant Chief Fitzgerald. The only question I have is  
23 related to the new operation. What precincts are the FBI  
24 and the federal government and the U.S. Attorney's Office  
25 in?

1 ASSISTANT CHIEF FITZGERALD: Currently, they're going  
2 to focus in the Eighth Precinct and Ninth Precinct.

3 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: When Dawn Ison, the U.S.  
4 Attorney was here, she stated they were in five precincts  
5 and I thought she said 10.

6 ASSISTANT CHIEF FITZGERALD: They are going to be in  
7 five scout car areas within two precincts at this point  
8 in time.

9 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Okay. And by being there, what  
10 does that mean? They're there all day, all night, what's  
11 going on?

12 ASSISTANT CHIEF FITZGERALD: They're going to work on  
13 active cases that they have currently. They're going to  
14 look back and go through old cases that maybe weren't  
15 prosecuted. Maybe they didn't have a good enough  
16 complaint at the time, didn't have enough information,  
17 that kind of stuff. They're going to go do some  
18 historical stuff, but they're going to focus their  
19 attention on those five scout cars. So it'll be the  
20 Eighth Precinct and the Ninth Precinct.

21 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I was at a graduation earlier  
22 today at Fellowship Chapel on Outer Drive and there was a  
23 crime scene, right on Outer Drive. They had the yellow  
24 tape out. There were about eight or nine Detroit police  
25 cars. There were some like detective cars. I thought they

1 were all black cars, you know, without anything on them  
2 and then a lot of other cars Do you know what that was  
3 about if that was... you don't know, but that's okay.

4 ASSISTANT CHIEF FITZGERALD: There was a shooting? I  
5 just don't have the information right in front of me.

6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Okay. Is he okay? What do we  
7 know?

8 ASSISTANT CHIEF FITZGERALD: Deceased.

9 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Oh, so it was a major crime  
10 scene. I wasn't sure. There were so many police there, I  
11 couldn't tell what was going on. Okay. Thank you.

12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commission Burton, I'm sorry.

13 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Yes, Mr. Chairman. I have some  
14 concerns on the behalf of the citizens of Detroit. The  
15 citizens of Detroit want to know when it comes to Detroit  
16 Police Department serving on, you know various task  
17 forces or special units, what is the ratio makeup of  
18 those task forces, as well as special units? In addition  
19 further question on the behalf of the citizens of Detroit  
20 and community leaders, I'd like to know when it comes to  
21 the Detroit Police Department participating in a 1033  
22 program and 1122 program with the Department of Defense,  
23 what type of equipment have they received over the years  
24 and are there any inventory of what they received as far  
25 as what they purchased, as well as hand me downs from the

1 Department of Defense.

2 Because you know, a lot of this technology and  
3 equipment that law enforcement agencies are using is  
4 something that you normally just deployed during wartime  
5 and that's not wanted or needed on the streets of  
6 Detroit, America's blackest and poorest...

7 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: You want to... just a minute  
8 what's the...?

9 MS. WHITE: We're working to silence the court  
10 reporter. The court reporter, Mr. Handyside, if you can  
11 hear me, please silence your microphone. Thank you, and  
12 staff is working as well. Thank you.

13 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Oh, thank you, Assistant Chief,  
14 you want to respond to that?

15 ASSISTANT CHIEF FITZGERALD: Yes, certainly. Through  
16 the Chair, to answer both of your questions and I hate to  
17 do this to you, but I don't have either one of them in  
18 front of me, but we can get you a copy of both, the  
19 racial makeup of the task forces and any equipment that  
20 we have from the 1033 and I think it was 1082 you said,  
21 those programs?

22 COMMISSIONER BURTON: The 1033 program and 1122.

23 ASSISTANT CHIEF FITZGERALD: Okay, we can get that  
24 for you.

25 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Carter, good to see



1 you.

2 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Good afternoon to everyone. I  
3 have no questions at this time.

4 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Bell:

5 COMMISSIONER BELL: No questions.

6 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Ferguson.

7 COMMISSIONER FERGUSON: No questions.

8 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you, Assistant Chief. We  
9 thank you so much for your report. Thank you so much. At  
10 this time, I want to move into the budget report. You  
11 know, I'm going to mess up your name, so it's good to see  
12 you and then I'll say it after you, okay.

13 MS. WHITE: Mr. Chair, just before Mr. Nazarko  
14 begins...

15 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Say it again?

16 MS. WHITE: Mr. Nazarko.

17 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Mr. Nazarko.

18 MS. WHITE: Yes, sir. Today's report or presentation  
19 is the DPD's quarterly report, quarter number three,  
20 presented by DPD's Agency CFO Mr. Nevrus Nazarko. And  
21 this report is based on the Board's quarterly review of  
22 the department's budget and other financial review  
23 information, including, but not limited to the  
24 department's revenues, expenses, grant activity, and  
25 vehicle reports and other additional reports. So again,

1 Mr. Nazarko will be providing the presentation. Thank  
2 you.

3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Good to see you, again.

4 MR. NAZARKO: Good to see you, Mr. Chair. Good  
5 afternoon, honorable Board. I'm presenting to you today,  
6 the financial reports budget versus actual for the nine  
7 months into the fiscal year that ended March 31st, 2021.  
8 Through some logistics, I believe this report, our  
9 original date to us at the end of April, but then I was  
10 out in the training on that date and then we pushed this  
11 report to today. So, I now present, obviously the full  
12 year reports, but there is some good information in the  
13 ones that you have in front of you today. And the reports  
14 as presented are budget to actual, revenues versus  
15 expenditures as of March 31st, 2022, grant activity  
16 report, new grants only for the quarter ending at the end  
17 of March, forfeiture activity for the quarter ending  
18 March 31st, the expenditure report, and then the last one  
19 vehicle purchase report.

20 MR. NAZARKO: Is someone, Ms. White, moving the  
21 slides?

22 MS. WHITE: Yes, we are moving the slides.

23 MR. NAZARKO: Okay. Next slide, please. This shows  
24 that for the quarter ending at the end of March our  
25 budgeted revenues were 41 million approximately. And then

1 we brought in 51.5 million for a positive variance of  
2 10.5 million. So we brought in more revenues from the  
3 income tax and utility user tax mainly in the tune of 10  
4 and half million. The total expenditures for the nine  
5 months ending March 31st, 2022 were expected to spend, or  
6 the budget was, 239.9 million, and we spent 231.7 million  
7 for a positive variance of \$8.2 million. Next slide,  
8 please.

9 MR. NAZARKO: The total revenues, as I mentioned on  
10 the previous slide for the nine months ending March 31st  
11 was 51.5 million. So that's how much money we brought in  
12 revenue wise and the budget for the entire year, we  
13 expected to bring in 55.3 million. So we are very close  
14 to meeting that goal. And as a matter of fact, the next  
15 slide, I'll show you the revenue that we expect to exceed  
16 the total revenues. The actual expenditures for the  
17 quarter ending March 31st was 231.7 million and our  
18 annual amended budget, what we expected to spend for the  
19 12 months is 327 million. So as a percentage we spend for  
20 nine months 70%, 70.3% of the total budget. Next slide  
21 please.

22 MR. NAZARKO: So as I mentioned in the previous slide  
23 we have budgeted to bring in 55.3 million and our  
24 projection is we expect to bring in, or at least this was  
25 our projection at the end of March 58 million for a

1 positive variance of 3 million. And then total  
2 expenditures were budgeted to spend for the whole year,  
3 for the entire 12 months ending June 30th, 327 million  
4 and our projections are that we will spend slightly less  
5 than that 322 million for a positive variance of 4.8  
6 million. Next slide, please. The forfeiture activity  
7 report shows that for the nine months ending at the end  
8 of March we brought in 1.3 million dollars as revenues  
9 from the local forfeiture activity and then we spent  
10 \$917,000 for those nine months. On the federal forfeiture  
11 front, there is not much activity there. We just brought  
12 in 22 thousand dollars from federal forfeiture activity  
13 and then we did not spend any money from that account.

14 MR. NAZARKO: The following slide is a little bit  
15 smaller and shows the vehicle purchase report basically  
16 tells you that we placed orders totaling 8.6 million for  
17 various vehicles. You have the quantity there, the date  
18 of the order and we expect to receive them sometime  
19 during the summer of 2022. So basically between now and  
20 the end of August. So when this report was drafted again  
21 this was the beginning of April. So some vehicles may  
22 well have arrived, but again, please keep in mind that  
23 this report is at the end of March. And then the  
24 following slide shows the capital improvements throughout  
25 the department again, a detail report that shows the

1 facility on the second column that we did the repairs,  
2 the contractor, the contract amount, the funding source,  
3 and then the project description and where are we in  
4 completing the project. And for the record I submitted  
5 all the -- to back these numbers. I submitted a more  
6 detailed report that it's entitled fiscal year budget  
7 versus actual report executive summary that has detailed  
8 information on the numbers that I presented in the  
9 PowerPoint presentation. And with that, Mr. Chair, I'd be  
10 happy to answer any questions you may have.

11 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: It was always I mean, you always  
12 do a professional job. I mean, for someone that doesn't  
13 know a whole lot about numbers and stuff, I'm always  
14 impressed with you. Am I in the right place by asking  
15 you, if I'm concerned about bidding vehicles and things  
16 like that and making sure that minorities get a piece of  
17 all of this, am I in the right place asking this  
18 question, or should I go to another place, just trying to  
19 make sure or is there anything that's in your department  
20 making sure that we are doing everything we can to make  
21 sure that minority is getting a piece of this budget?

22 MR. NAZARKO: Our department doesn't handle that  
23 aspect of the purchasing. The city has a totally separate  
24 department that is called Office of Contract and  
25 Procurement who adheres to the policies and make sure

1 that enough minorities or residents of Detroit get pieces  
2 of those contracts. I know that there is...

3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: So how, if I wanted to know, or  
4 two or three commissions wanted to know and I want to be  
5 sensitive about this, will they be allowed to come in and  
6 let us know how we're making sure this money is  
7 distributed?

8 MS. WHITE: Yes, sir, we can contact the Office of  
9 Contract and Procurement and ask them to give a  
10 presentation on their criteria and the various policies  
11 for your consideration.

12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: And the other thing is, I've  
13 been watching this for a couple years, it seems to be  
14 unusual where you you're spending less, you're saving  
15 money. So, I mean, isn't that... or am I just forgetting  
16 that you... because I would normally be fussing at you  
17 about the money that you spend and now I'm fussing at you  
18 because it seemed like you... I'm not fussing, but I'm  
19 asking the question that you seem to, not really spending  
20 all the money that's there. You have a lot of variance  
21 there.

22 MR. NAZARKO: It depends on the year Mr. Chair. This  
23 year, for example, we are expected to be under budget in  
24 the tune of like four and a half to 5 million, but in the  
25 great scheme of things, when you have a budget of 360

1 million, it's a little bit slightly over 1% and is  
2 expected, but you know, for some reasons and the  
3 Assistant Chief can speak to that as well. But I believe  
4 that the high number of vacancies in department is a  
5 contributing factor to that.

6 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I'm looking at it, and I'm  
7 thinking that the city's done well with these taxes, you  
8 know what I mean? I'm looking at it on another level, but  
9 I can understand what you're talking about now. It is the  
10 vacancies that we have as well. Thank you so much. Any  
11 questions? Can you raise your hand, if you have a  
12 question? I see three or four hands and no other. So,  
13 I'll start with you, Commissioner Banks.

14 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Thank you, I appreciate it. I  
15 don't know your name.

16 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Mr. Nazarko.

17 MR. NAZARKO: Mr. Nazarko.

18 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Okay. Mr. Nazarko, you say  
19 you're on a purge of hitting the goal for 55 million,  
20 right?

21 MR. NAZARKO: Yes. On the revenue side.

22 COMMISSIONER BANKS: So what are you all going to do  
23 with that money and where are you all getting that money  
24 from and what are you all going to do with it?

25 MR. NAZARKO: Thank you for asking that question.

1 It's a complex question, but the short answer is that...

2 COMMISSIONER BANKS: You don't have, no... as you  
3 say, it's a complex question. You don't have no goals for  
4 the money?

5 MR. NAZARKO: Yes. And the goals is the budget that  
6 this Board approved. We received the money from various  
7 sources and there are two major sources, utility user tax  
8 and income tax, that amount close to 50 million out of  
9 that amount. And then that money is appropriated through  
10 the budget process. When I came before this honorable  
11 Board in January, and we gave you the budget and ask you  
12 permission to spend that money. So that's how that money  
13 is spent. It's not upon us to decide how to spend it.  
14 This honorable Board, the Mayor and the City Council  
15 ultimately decide how the money is spent. So yes, we do  
16 have a goal to receive the money based on the budget and  
17 then we have to adhere to the appropriation or allocation  
18 that this honorable Board and others, such as City  
19 Council, and the mayor authorize us to do so.

20 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Moore.

21 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. What is  
22 the number one revenue generator for the Detroit Police  
23 Department?

24 MR. NAZARKO: I would say is the utility users tax,  
25 but the income tax may take first place. So, depending on



1 the year, those are the two highest revenue generating  
2 for the Police Department.

3 COMMISSIONER MOORE: And my second question, very  
4 quickly, page seven, under the fund column, you have GF,  
5 which I believe is general fund. What is the UTGO?

6 MR. NAZARKO: UTGO are the bonds that the city issued  
7 three years ago. Some of those bonds were earmarked to be  
8 spent on projects for the Police Department.

9 COMMISSIONER MOORE: And is that an acronym for  
10 something?

11 MR. NAZARKO: The acronym stands for unlimited tax  
12 obligation bonds.

13 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you, sir.

14 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes. Commissioner Bernard.

15 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Just very quickly. Your  
16 comparisons are related to "An amended budget." In the  
17 future, can you add a column that has the original  
18 budget, then the amended budget, and then show us where  
19 the differences are? You and I both know that a budget is  
20 only a projection, and so you can frequently amend a  
21 budget, but I'd like to see what it is we projected as  
22 expenditure sources and revenue sources when we initially  
23 adopted the budget last year. So when it's been amended a  
24 few times and it distorts, you know, what we had  
25 originally agreed on. So, I'd appreciate that. That's

1 just a comment and secondly, your report references  
2 grants. I don't see the grant report and the expenditure  
3 on the grant; when you get time and you don't have to do  
4 it right now, but that's the only other thing that I'd be  
5 interested in seeing. And thank you. It's an excellent  
6 report.

7 MR. NAZARKO: Thank you. I appreciate that.

8 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Ferguson.

9 COMMISSIONER FERGUSON: Yes. Through the Chair. The  
10 local forfeiture 1.3 million, how long does it take to  
11 get that money? Is it like past years? And then it has to  
12 come forward once it goes through the court and all that?

13 MR. NAZARKO: Some of that is that way, and some  
14 other activity happens quicker, but yes, most of that  
15 involves court adjudication as well. So, the report I  
16 gave you is the cash, the amount that we received, not  
17 the amount that is hanging through the court system or  
18 not, this has actually made it to our bank.

19 COMMISSIONER FERGUSON: All right. My next one, I  
20 didn't see anything about, like, I saw the cars in there.  
21 Now, do you guys write the check once the cars are  
22 already outfitted?

23 MR. NAZARKO: It is two different processes? The  
24 purchase of the vehicle is one, and that's what you see  
25 in there. And then there is additional outfitting that

1 happens from a different vendor. And once the department  
2 gets a hold of the vehicles, it's my understanding, then  
3 we send them out to an outfitter for additional  
4 outfitting.

5 COMMISSIONER FERGUSON: Right? So that's not an  
6 additional cost there, correct?

7 MR. NAZARKO: It is an additional cost to outfit the  
8 cars based on different specifications. If we have to  
9 install the radio scene, or if we have to do various  
10 things. Not as much as the purchase of the vehicle,  
11 obviously, but there is a cost, it's mainly for the  
12 radios.

13 COMMISSIONER FERGUSON: Because what I'm trying to  
14 say is, I see what the vehicle cost is, but I didn't see  
15 what the cost was for outfitting the vehicle.

16 MR. NAZARKO: And that's a separate cost. This is the  
17 strictly to purchase the vehicles.

18 COMMISSIONER FERGUSON: Okay. My final one, my last  
19 one. Did you guys factor in because I understand you're  
20 going to need some money for ShotSpotter and the new body  
21 cams? I don't see that on it. Did you guys factor that  
22 too?

23 MR. NAZARKO: Yes, sir. This report pertains to the  
24 current fiscal year budget. The expansion of the  
25 ShotSpotter will happen in fiscal year, 2023. That's

1 about to start on July 1st. So we have budgeted from  
2 another fund, not general fund, but close to 7 million  
3 for that expansion. And then to purchase the body cams  
4 and to do the backup, we have budgeted another \$3.8  
5 million, but it starts on July 1st.

6 COMMISSIONER FERGUSON: Okay. Thank you.

7 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you. Thank you so much,  
8 Mr. Nazarko.

9 MR. NAZARKO: You're welcome.

10 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much. You honor us  
11 with your presence and your patience and also your  
12 simplicity in complicated situations. So I thank you for  
13 that.

14 MR. NAZARKO: I appreciate that.

15 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes, Commissioner.

16 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: I have a very quick  
17 question.

18 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I'm sorry. I didn't see you.

19 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Through the Chair. Is there  
20 a backup plan for funding for the \$7 million if it  
21 doesn't come out of ARPA?

22 MR. NAZARKO: No. At this point, no.

23 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: We're not anticipating  
24 budgeting out of the general fund or anywhere else?

25 MR. NAZARKO: Not for the expansion, no.

1 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Thank you.

2 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you, Commissioner. Thank  
3 you, sir.

4 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Through the Chair.

5 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes, ma'am.

6 COMMISSIONER CARTER: I'm sorry. I have a question of  
7 Assistant Chief Fitzgerald.

8 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: But not for Mr. Nazarko?

9 COMMISSIONER CARTER: I don't think so. This  
10 involves, and I don't know how long it's been since we've  
11 had a report on secondary employment, if we have.

12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: What are you asking?

13 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Well, I was looking at Ms.  
14 White because I can't recall one, not recently, no.

15 MS. WHITE: Not recently, no.

16 COMMISSIONER CARTER: I'd like to see that soon. And  
17 also there was a time when we had vendors who weren't up  
18 to date on their payment to the Detroit Police Department  
19 for our services. So, I'd like to have an update on that  
20 as well. And those were mainly when we have events like  
21 downtown or at one point some of the vendors were late on  
22 their payments, so I'd like to know that everyone is up  
23 to date on their payments or reimbursement of our  
24 services.

25 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay, good.

1 MR. NAZARKO: And at that point, if I may Mr. Chair.  
2 Yes, we do have good reports that we will provide through  
3 the Assistant Chief on both fronts.

4 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Okay. Great. Thank you.

5 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much. Thank all of  
6 you for your questions and thank you for your presence as  
7 well. This time, Secretary, could you make your report?

8 MS. WHITE: Yes, sir. Through the Chair, honorable  
9 Board and community, please refer to zoom and your  
10 incoming correspondence noted on the agenda for today.  
11 The honorable Board received the following reports and  
12 correspondences, a weekly DPD facial recognition  
13 technology report, pursuant to the Detroit Police  
14 Department directive below and included on the facial  
15 recognition report. It includes the number of facial  
16 recognition requests that were fulfilled. The crimes that  
17 the facial recognition requests were attempting to solve.  
18 And the number of leads produced from the facial  
19 recognition software. This report revealed no policy  
20 violations for the week that this report covered. The  
21 next report, the Board received was the DPD weekly report  
22 on ShotSpotter usage. This report includes all  
23 ShotSpotter events occurring from Monday, June 6th, 2022  
24 through Sunday, June 12th, 2022, as well as quarter two  
25 report. And this report also revealed the information

1 concerning both the Ninth Precinct and the Eighth  
2 Precinct in terms of the ShotSpotter usage.

3 MS. WHITE: And again, you can find this report  
4 available on the Board's web page for further review. And  
5 also we have hard copies available in the in-person  
6 meeting. The honorable Board also received the project  
7 Green Light compliance and recruiting dashboard dated  
8 June 13th, 2022, reflecting various information relating  
9 to the project Green Light program. The Board also  
10 received the ShotSpotter gunshot detection informational  
11 flyer, discussing what ShotSpotter is. It's an audio  
12 sensor that specifically detects and locates gunshot  
13 activity. The sensors are placed in communities with high  
14 gun rates, with the primary focus on keeping our  
15 communities safe. And it also details how the technology  
16 works. The various percentages with regards to the Eighth  
17 and Ninth Precinct, ShotSpotter area and it also gives  
18 additional information in regard to ShotSpotter events by  
19 the week for April 26th through May 23rd. So you can find  
20 that information again, available on the DPD's and the  
21 Board's webpage, as well as hard copies available today.

22 MS. WHITE: The Board also received various  
23 correspondences from the Chief of Police, James E. White  
24 in regard to various inquiries that the Board previously  
25 submitted and they are as follows: correspondence

1 regarding the ShotSpotter and facial recognition  
2 technology use with the inquiry dated April 27th, 2022.  
3 The Board also received responses regarding the racial  
4 employee petition and the data and statistics regarding  
5 facial recognition technology system. And then also the  
6 questions, the Board's questions regarding the DPD's  
7 reorganization plan and the organizational chart. And so  
8 again, you can find those various reports in your packet  
9 and detailed questions and responses for your  
10 consideration. And the Board received various BOPC OCI  
11 staff reports, including, but not limited to the closed  
12 session items for today and also the Office of the Chief  
13 Investigator complaint, data information and analysis  
14 reports. And that concludes my report. Thank you.

15 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much, Ms. White.  
16 Can I have Ms. Underwood, can you give me the  
17 announcements?

18 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Do you have a question for  
19 Melanie?

20 COMMISSIONER MOORE: No. I have a question for the  
21 Assistant Chief.

22 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay, go ahead.

23 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Are you familiar with the body  
24 suit that officers used to wear back in the day gun?

25 ASSISTANT CHIEF FITZGERALD: Yes.



1 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Could an AK 47 stand up against  
2 that or how would that compare?

3 ASSISTANT CHIEF FITZGERALD: I am not a hundred  
4 percent certain on the ballistic of that Ooh, I don't  
5 know.

6 COMMISSIONER MOORE: It would just seem like we  
7 needed more robust, more military like equipment to deal  
8 with the AK47, AR15, so to speak. I am just curious, a  
9 citizen just asked me.

10 I'COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Commissioner, I've  
11 actually heard that exact same feedback during ride-  
12 alongs. So it's definitely worth looking into, and I  
13 definitely have a contact that might be able to help at  
14 the Fourth Precinct.

15 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Okay, perfect. Thank you.

16 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner.

17 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I'm sorry, just one other  
18 thing in your communications, Melanie, it's really  
19 interesting Mr. Chairman, I'm sure you noticed it, that  
20 we have "unapproved" software on the department's  
21 computers and one of them is FanDuel. I found that  
22 interesting because FanDuel is a gambling software, but I  
23 was wondering Deputy Chief, if in fact you could tell us  
24 who are, just in a mini report, not today, next week, a  
25 mini report on who are all of the companies that in fact

1 do ShotSpotter type activities and how they are rated,  
2 you know, from a technological standpoint. We just went  
3 for the word ShotSpotter, which is nothing like saying,  
4 jelly. I mean, what kind of jelly, who makes the jelly,  
5 you know, we don't know anything about this. So I'd  
6 appreciated your analysis of, of the technologies related  
7 to ShotSpotter and the companies that do them since we  
8 didn't bother to ask, but I'm interested. Thank you

9 MS. WHITE: Through the Chair.

10 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes, ma'am.

11 MS. WHITE: If I may just also indicate that that  
12 question was previously submitted a while ago, but we  
13 will make sure to follow up with the department. We do  
14 know that the department is in the process of responding  
15 to all of the Board's inquiries, and so that does take  
16 time. So we will be sure to follow up with the  
17 department. And I also want to note that staff is  
18 reviewing all of the incoming correspondence to ensure or  
19 determine whether or not there is further action needed  
20 on the responses that have been provided by the  
21 department. Thank you.

22 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: You might also, Ms. White and I  
23 mean no harm with all respect, but you might want to try  
24 to put in priorities in terms of Commissioners asking  
25 certain things over and over again. So we might want to

1 put them, ask the staff to put them in priorities in  
2 terms of putting it trying to make sure we get all these  
3 in, and I appreciate you and your staff for what they're  
4 doing. Mrs. Underwood, can you give the announcements  
5 please? All of it?

6 MS. UNDERWOOD: Yes. Mr. Chair. Our next meeting will  
7 be Thursday, June the 24, excuse me, June 23rd at 3:00 PM  
8 at Detroit Public Safety Headquarters. Our next community  
9 meeting will be July the 14th at 6:30 PM, hosted by the  
10 Tenth Precinct at the Detroit Union Carpenters and  
11 Millwright Training Center. That's 11687 American Avenue,  
12 Detroit 4204. Our next monthly committee meeting will be  
13 scheduled July the 13th. It's going to be every second  
14 Wednesday of the month. The budget committee meeting will  
15 be Wednesday, July 13th at 2:00 PM. The policy committee  
16 meeting will be Wednesday, July 13th at 3:00 PM. The  
17 personnel and training committee meeting will be  
18 Wednesday, July 13th at 4:00 PM. And the citizen's  
19 complaint committee meeting will be Wednesday, July 13th  
20 at 4:30 PM.

21 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I'm sorry. Go ahead.

22 MS. UNDERWOOD: All the committee meetings will be  
23 held here at Detroit Public Safety Headquarters. May I  
24 move on to oral?

25 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Let me just mention the fact

1 that June 30th meeting will be canceled and rescheduled  
2 for June the 28th. Did you make mention that?

3 MS. UNDERWOOD: I skipped over that. Thank you, Mr.  
4 Chair.

5 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: No, it's okay. Let's do it  
6 again, so the community will understand what we're doing  
7 here.

8 MS. UNDERWOOD: Yes, sir. The Board of Police  
9 Commissioners, June 30th meeting has been canceled and  
10 will be rescheduled to be held Tuesday, June the 28th at  
11 3:00 PM here at Detroit Public Safety Headquarters.

12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: So we're still within the  
13 Charter.

14 MS. UNDERWOOD: Yes, sir.

15 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: We meeting weekly.

16 MS. UNDERWOOD: Yes, sir.

17 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much. Then we go to  
18 oral communications.

19 MS. UNDERWOOD: Moving to oral communications.  
20 There's no one in the audience that has any  
21 communications, everyone is online. We'll start with  
22 Minister Blount.

23 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: How many do I have?

24 MS. UNDERWOOD: We have three.

25 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay. Minister Blount. We missed

1 you last time, hope you're there today?

2 MS. UNDERWOOD: I'm scrolling now, sir. Just one  
3 moment.

4 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay. Sorry.

5 MS. UNDERWOOD: We'll move on to Brenda Hill.  
6 Minister Blount is not online, so we'll move on to Brenda  
7 Hill,

8 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Ms. Hill.

9 MS. UNDERWOOD: Oh, there he is. There he is.  
10 Minister Blount is here. Can I go back to him, sir?

11 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: You sure can.

12 MS. UNDERWOOD: Thank you. He's gone again.

13 MS. UNDERWOOD: There he is.

14 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Minister Blount, are you there?

15 MINISTER BLOUNT: Yes. Can you hear me Board?

16 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes, we can. Loud and clear.

17 Thank you.

18 Yes. This is Minister Eric Blount from Sacred Heart  
19 Catholic Church in Detroit. We are hopeful that the new  
20 leadership of this Board will be focused more on police  
21 officer misconduct and not to look over there, scam trick  
22 or whatever description citizens have. Commissioners are  
23 not crime fighters or revenue target goal analyst. This  
24 Board was created to address police officer misconduct,  
25 period. To the budget presentation, commissioners are not

1 minority contract monitors or revenue target goal  
2 analysts. It is amazing that no commissioner demanded to  
3 know the cost of police officer misconduct. When weekly  
4 at the City Council meetings, council members must decide  
5 to approve on average 20 lawsuit settlements, and or  
6 legal representation and indemnification due to police  
7 officer misconduct. Why was there just a brief question  
8 with no response on the gambling app on police officer's  
9 cell phones? This is totally inappropriate as we demand  
10 that the starting salaries for police officers be at  
11 least \$75,000 and that they get a gold plated pension  
12 fund, including healthcare. We want them to do the right  
13 thing all the time. Thank you for your time.

14 MS. UNDERWOOD: Our next speaker will be Ms. Brenda  
15 Hill. Ms. Hill.

16 MS. HILL: Yes. Can you hear me?

17 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes, we can.

18 MS. HILL: Yes. And I thank you for your service,  
19 Reverend. This is a hard job and I know week after week  
20 after week, I go after you, but we want the same things.  
21 We want this Board to be the oversight Board and to help  
22 the citizens of Detroit. Yes, I agree with Reverend  
23 Blount that we want officers' pay increased. In fact, it  
24 needs to be increased with inflation. Now they're barely  
25 above poverty levels with the starting salary. Also, I

1 have no hope that the people who will take your place  
2 will do a better job, will do the job necessary. The  
3 people that have been placed as Chair and Vice-Chair are  
4 suspect at best. This will be above reproach and it is  
5 not, right now. I mean, they can't simply say that  
6 they're appointed by the mayor. They have to say they're  
7 At-Large. I mean, just to confuse the public on something  
8 so simple. And also I have an issue with the ShotSpotter.  
9 We already have surveillance, drones with the facial  
10 recognition. ShotSpotter, not that it's a lot of money  
11 compared to the budget but it has microphones on there.  
12 Detroit is turning into a plantation. It's turning into a  
13 military state. This must stop. Thank you.

14 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much Ms. Hill. Is  
15 that the last one?

16 MS. UNDERWOOD: Your final speaker is former  
17 commissioner William Davis.

18 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay. Commissioner.

19 MR. DAVIS: Good afternoon. Can I be heard?

20 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: You sure can.

21 MR. DAVIS: Oh, well, I'd like to start off by  
22 thinking that you did do, I think Reverend, I think you  
23 did a much better job than the two previous rotating  
24 Chairs, and I hope that the incoming Chair and Vice-Chair  
25 do a better job than you. I think this Board still needs

1 to concentrate more on making sure it's not violating the  
2 City Charter. And this Board needs to do a better job of  
3 getting people in the positions that's already in the  
4 budget.

5 MR. DAVIS: This Board should be in an example of  
6 what's right and fair, and not doing stuff that's  
7 questionable. And also, I think this Board, especially  
8 needs a Board attorney, because how could you have an  
9 Assistant Corporation Counsel sitting on this Board,  
10 listening to stuff when he knows that you're violating  
11 the City Charter, you know, we are already exploring the  
12 possibility we might start going after them, making  
13 challenges in the attorney grievance commission on any  
14 attorney, especially the Corporation Counsel and  
15 Assistant Corporation Counsel that sits there and  
16 continuously allow you all to, you know, violate the City  
17 Charter and not say anything. We need to make sure that  
18 people are doing their jobs. And I have no problem  
19 against the current Acting Secretary or the Acting Chief  
20 of OCI, but it's criminal the way you all allow people to  
21 stay in position for years violating the Charter just  
22 because they're buddies to some people on the Board.  
23 Hopefully, this will be a better year for the Board.  
24 Thank you.

25 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you, Commissioner Davis.



1 MS. UNDERWOOD: Chair that was your last speaker.

2 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Very good. Assistant Chief,  
3 there are no years on the ShotSpotter, right? There are  
4 no years. You can't hear anything, no forces or anything  
5 like that in terms of picking up communication from  
6 people?

7 ASSISTANT CHIEF FITZGERALD: What it would do is,  
8 sorry, through the Chair, it would pick up sound in  
9 between gunshots. So if it's a rapid succession, you may  
10 hear someone screaming for help, but it's not picking up  
11 voices. It's only in between shots.

12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Got you.

13 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: But you would also pick up Sam  
14 grab that gun. That would be in between the shots

15 ASSISTANT CHIEF FITZGERALD: If it falls in between  
16 the shots, sure.

17 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Got you.

18 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Through the Chair. Could you use  
19 that as evidence, if somebody says that in admission?

20 ASSISTANT CHIEF FITZGERALD: Evidence as far as what  
21 exactly though, because it doesn't really point to  
22 anyone.

23 COMMISSIONER MOORE: It sounds like it's an admission  
24 of part of a crime to me.

25 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I didn't understand.

1 COMMISSIONER MOORE: If a person saying Sam, get the  
2 gun that sounds like it's a part of a crime.

3 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Correct. But it's still...

4 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Can you use that for a search  
5 warrant for an arrest warrant to take it to court? That's  
6 my question?

7 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Yes, of course.

8 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: With one name called Sam, you  
9 don't have...?

10 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Well, the totality of the  
11 circumstances ultimately would have to get it, Sam with  
12 what?

13 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Somebody has to shoot and  
14 somebody said, Sam, I mean, look like to me who is going  
15 to help.

16 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Sam go get the gun. But that's  
17 not the purpose of ShotSpotter though.

18 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: The other thing, I just want to  
19 make sure that the Board doesn't know or have anything to  
20 do with salary. We do not have anything to do with giving  
21 police officers a raise. I just want to get some of this  
22 stuff, every now and then, because people in the  
23 community need to know that everybody that basically do  
24 oral communications does not necessarily give you the  
25 facts. We do nothing about salary. I wish we did because

1 every police officer would have \$8,000 rather than 50. So  
2 if we could have... so again, as far as that's concerned,  
3 I just want to make sure we clear that up. At this time,  
4 the Chairman would like to have a motion to go into  
5 closed session,

6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: So moved.

7 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Support.

8 MS. WHITE: Mr. Chair.

9 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Here she comes.

10 MS. WHITE: If a commissioner could please read the  
11 language or just...

12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I don't need you to do that if  
13 you don't...

14 MS. WHITE: That's the closed session pursuant to  
15 MCL.15.268, Section 8(e) (f) and (h) a two-thirds roll  
16 call vote is required and one is for the applicant appeal  
17 and the other closed session item is for Operation Clean  
18 Sweep, task force and pending litigation; two-thirds roll  
19 call vote required.

20 MS. WHITE: Mr. Vice-Chair - Yes.

21 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I have to have a motion, don't  
22 I?

23 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Well, so moved.

24 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Support.

25 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Roll call.

1 MS. WHITE: Mr. Vice-Chair.

2 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Bernard - Yes.

3 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Banks - Yes.

4 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Bell - .Yes.

5 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Burton - Yes.

6 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Carter - Yes.

7 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Moore - Yes.

8 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Hernandez - Yes.

9 MS. WHITE: The Chair - Yes.

10 MS. WHITE: There were 8 = Yes votes. The motion  
11 passed.

12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much, ma'am  
13 Secretary. We are back into open session and I thank all  
14 for your patience and certainly for your cooperation,

15 MS. WHITE: A motion to reconvene the meeting.

16 COMMISSIONER CARTER: So moved.

17 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Support.

18 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Support.

19 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: What is the motion?

20 COMMISSIONER MOORE: To reconvene.

21 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I'm sorry. I thought she said...  
22 Any discussion? Hearing no discussion, all in favor, say  
23 aye.

24 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

25 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Opposed? At this time, we'll go

1 with the first item. And can you say what we are voting  
2 on and what the vote would be, yes or no.

3 MS. WHITE: Yes, sir. The first and only action item  
4 required is a motion is needed regarding the applicant  
5 appeal of Mr. Ishmael Johnson regarding whether to grant  
6 or deny the applicant appeal. A motion is needed.

7 COMMISSIONER BELL: Mr. Chairman.

8 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes.

9 COMMISSIONER BELL: I move that we support the  
10 Director of Personnel Patillo's recommendation to  
11 permanently disqualify the application of Mr. Johnson.

12 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Support.

13 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Is there any discussion? Hearing  
14 no discussion, do I need a roll call here or just roll  
15 call only?

16 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I have one point on  
17 discussion, Mr. Chairman.

18 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes, go ahead.

19 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Simply that, we sit here, as a  
20 jury, I have that part, but when it comes to employment  
21 issues, let a person flunk himself out. He's committed.  
22 He's interested. He's African-American. 75% of our force  
23 is not African American. That only 25% is. He's already a  
24 police officer with the medical center.

25 COMMISSIONER CARTER: That's false.

1 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: He's responsible.

2 MS. WHITE: Mr. Chair.

3 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: This is a discussion.

4 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes, but you have to have the  
5 right information. You're going to discuss it. He's not a  
6 police officer.

7 MS. WHITE: And then Mr. Chair, if we can also note,  
8 for the record, as a reminder, please refrain from  
9 disclosing details from the closed session in an open  
10 session.

11 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I don't have a problem with  
12 that. I won't disclose any details from the closed  
13 session.

14 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Right. Thank you.

15 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: A police authority, like Dan  
16 Gilbert's authority, like Wayne State police officers,  
17 they're all police authority. All the police officers  
18 right here at Wayne County Community College, they're all  
19 police officers for the Wayne County Police. I mean,  
20 Wayne County WC3 Police Authority. So they are considered  
21 police authorities and they are considered police for  
22 purposes of their job. My only point is that let him, let  
23 any person who's committed, if he flunks out, he flunks  
24 out. I mean, why we have to block anyone's any young  
25 African- American man's progress, period.

1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Any other any other discussion?

2 COMMISSIONER BELL: Mr. Chairman.

3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Let me just, you made the  
4 motion, so you have the right to do the...

5 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, sir.

6 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Then I'll come back to...

7 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: That was a discussion.

8 COMMISSIONER BELL: We have a recommendation on his  
9 background from Chief White to the Director of Personnel  
10 in the law department, honoring the request for permanent  
11 disqualification. So, to me, a whole lot of background  
12 went into this type of investigation. Sure, we want  
13 African-Americans, but we want highly qualified African-  
14 Americans for Detroit Police Department. And you name a  
15 couple department, they are not certified police  
16 officers. They have authority on the ground, but they are  
17 not all certified police officers. Besides that, this is  
18 the Detroit Police Department. Thank you.

19 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Mr. Burton, you have a minute.

20 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair. Yes. I just  
21 want to say that you know, we want to be able to be in a  
22 position where we are hiring more Detroiters, but I don't  
23 see anyone lining up outside this door who wants to be a  
24 Detroit police officer, crying out loud. But this young  
25 man is committed, passionate live in the city and I think

1 he would be a great role model for someone, some young  
2 man that's in DPS or in the community that say, hey, you  
3 know, I look up to you; you are a police officer, you  
4 live in a city. I want to be like you. And so, I read  
5 everything in his folder here, cover to cover, and I am  
6 impressed with this young man's accomplishments, what he  
7 accomplished, you know years later. I do not know this  
8 young man personally, never met him until just now before  
9 this Board, as you have met him, as he presented and  
10 spoke there, I mean, I haven't said anything to him,  
11 don't know the guy, but I will say that it boils down to  
12 do we need Detroit police officers?

13 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Do we need to hire more  
14 officers? Do we need to hire officers within the city?  
15 Allow this young man an opportunity to prove himself,  
16 allow this young man an opportunity to be all he can be,  
17 right here in the City of Detroit, with the Detroit  
18 Police Department, and let's hope that we can grow this  
19 department in a way that reflects our community. We want  
20 officers to have the same love, compassionate for our  
21 residents as we do. This young, man is a Detroiter, let's  
22 give him an opportunity. Thank you.

23 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Through the Chair.

24 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I'm moving this. Every  
25 commissioner has a right in terms of their opinion, you



1 know, and then I'm going to go to roll call, okay.

2 MS. WHITE: Understood. I just wanted to note the  
3 record, Commissioner Carter did raise her hand next.

4 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I know what she wants to do. I  
5 read her mind. Commission Banks, do you have a question?

6 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Yes. I cannot understand why,  
7 we've seen the representatives for DPD, you know, they  
8 got up here and spoke on they're going to deny the  
9 brother, okay. But the standards for DPD is, if you have  
10 no felonies, you can be police officers. The man does not  
11 have any felonies, so I can't understand why DPD is not  
12 stepping up to those standards.

13 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: That's the reason I brought it  
14 to us, Commissioner. They make their recommendation. Your  
15 job is to decide how you want this to go. Don't blame  
16 them. They're just doing...

17 COMMISSIONER BANKS: I'm not blaming them.

18 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I know, but they're doing their  
19 job and ask us to do our job.

20 COMMISSIONER BANKS: But, Mr. Chair, one quicker one.  
21 But the young man has no felonies. So he's in the  
22 guidelines of the standards with DPD.

23 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: You're bringing up stuff that we  
24 talked about in the closed session and you can't do that.

25 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Okay. I'm sorry.

1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: But right now I'm asking  
2 somebody to recognize you over me.

3 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Mr. Chair, I just want to say  
4 that that's not the only standard for the Detroit Police  
5 Department. So we have to keep that in mind too.

6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: But also, African-American  
7 males are much more likely to be stopped and arrested. We  
8 both know that.

9 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner, this is not going  
10 to be a civil rights movement here.

11 COMMISSIONER CARTER: No. And I just want to say that  
12 there are other, and I totally support African-American  
13 males and their issues with law enforcement in trying to  
14 do the right thing. I also believe that everybody cannot  
15 serve with the police department and yes that's true,  
16 everybody cannot serve. And I believe that this young man  
17 might be of better service, there are plenty of  
18 opportunities to serve the City of Detroit and the  
19 residents of the City of Detroit. And I think that this  
20 young man should look into one of those other  
21 opportunities and not the Detroit Police Department.  
22 Thank you, Mr. Chair.

23 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: At this time Chair will call for  
24 the question and the roll call.

25 MS. WHITE: Mr. Vice Chair.

1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: We're going on the motion now?

2 COMMISSIONER BURTON: The motion? State the motion?

3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Go ahead. Just say, to make sure  
4 the record is clear.

5 MS. WHITE: The motion is to support the Director of  
6 Police Personnel's recommendation or decision to  
7 permanently disqualify. Mr. Ishmael Johnson.

8 VICE-CHAIR FERGUSON: I support it.

9 MS. WHITE: Commission Bernard - No.

10 COMMISSIONER Banks - No.

11 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Bell - Yes.

12 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Burton - No.

13 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Carter - Yes.

14 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Moore - Yes.

15 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Hernandez - Yes.

16 MS. WHITE: Mr. Chair - With regret, yes.

17 MS. WHITE: There were 6 = Yes votes and 3 No votes.  
18 The motion passed.

19 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay. Thank you so much. The  
20 Chair will recognize a motion to adjourn.

21 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: So moved.

22 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Support.

23 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: All in favor, say aye.

24 COMMISSIONERS: Aye. Aye.

25 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Opposed. The ayes have it.

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
