BOPC VIRTUAL MEETING
June 28, 2022 at 3:00 P.M.

1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I want to thank you for your
2 patience. We had a press conference with the Water board
3 here about 35 minutes ago. And so we had to follow that.
4 And so we were just running a little late and we
5 apologize. We certainly want you to know that we
6 appreciate your patience with us. At this time, Ms.
7 White, you might get us started.

8 MS. WHITE: Yes, sir. Through the Chair. Good
9 afternoon, honorable Board, DPD executives, and
10 community. Thank you again for attending the Detroit
11 Board of Police Commissioners meeting. Just a few
12 reminders before the Board begins the official business
13 meeting. If you would like to participate in the public
14 comments section of the meeting, please submit your
15 comment card or your name to be recognized during that
16 time. And you may do so in person with Ms. Theresa
17 Blossom who is the Community Relations Coordinator, and
18 then also you have the option of submitting your interest
19 via zoom or using Smartsheet. So please feel free again,
20 to sign up for public comments. And also we will make
21 sure to go back and capture those community members who
22 signed up last week but did not have the opportunity due
23 to technical difficulties.

24 MS. WHITE: We'll make sure to include you in today's
25 list as well. Also, the honorable Board, with respect to

1 the Office of the Chief Investigator, if you have any
2 questions or would like to make a complaint or would like
3 to lodge a concern, or seek additional information
4 regarding DPD and its policies, please feel free to
5 contact the Office of the Chief Investigator. And that is
6 the Board's investigative unit. You may contact that
7 office at (313) 596 2499, and also please feel free to
8 contact the Board's administrative office, and we would
9 also be glad to assist you with any questions that you
10 might have related to the Board of Police Commissioners
11 or the DPD. And that phone number to the Board's
12 administrative office is (313) 596 1830. And you also
13 have the option of sending an email, contacting the
14 Commissioners, and reaching out to us via Facebook and
15 other platforms that we have available for the community.
16 With that at this time, please silence your cell phones
17 if you're there in person to prevent interrupting today's
18 meeting. And again, thank you for attending the Detroit
19 Board of Police Commissioners meeting. And now,
20 Chairperson Holley.

21 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much, Ms. White.
22 Good afternoon to each and every one of you. I'm Jim
23 Holley, Chairperson for the Board of Police
24 Commissioners. This meeting will come to order. The
25 invocation will be given by Chaplain Commander Mobley. At

1 this time, Chaplain Commander Mobley, you may begin your
2 invocation.

3 CHAPLAIN MOBLEY: First of all, we want to just say
4 thank you to the honorable Commission Board. We want to
5 thank Chair Holley and all the Board members. We want to
6 thank you all for taking up the mantle to be a watcher
7 standing upon the wall. Father, you said that we would
8 come before you and enter in with Thanksgiving. We just
9 want to thank you today. You've given us a brand new day.
10 You've given us a day that we could start over again and
11 if we didn't get it right yesterday, we have another
12 opportunity to just say, thank you. We thank you for your
13 health today. We thank you for clothing us in the right
14 mind to serve in the capacity, in which much is given,
15 much is required. We thank you today. We thank you today
16 for our families. We thank you for our city. We thank you
17 for the leaders of the city.

18 CHAPLAIN MOBLEY: We thank you for people in
19 instrumental positions, Father God who makes the
20 sacrifice day in and day out to care about others, to
21 have compassion, to have humility, and to have great
22 patience. We just want to thank you. We thank you,
23 Father, right now. We pray, Lord God for wisdom to govern
24 this meeting. We pray right now that unity is the focus
25 point. We ask God in the name of Jesus, to favor us for

1 the decisions that have to be made that would affect so
2 many lives. And so Father, we thank you once again. We
3 bind the forces of the enemy that will try to bring
4 confusion and strife and division, and we, Father, speak
5 your peace, your grace, and mercy. Have your way in this
6 meeting, have your way with each individual, bless them
7 as they stand up front, and bless their families as they
8 support them. But most of all, Father, bless them for the
9 job that they're doing. You said only what we do for
10 Christ shall last. So, Father God, let this last in
11 Jesus' name, amen.

12 COMMISSIONERS: Amen.

13 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I thank you so much. Chaplain
14 Mobley. A wonderful prayer. We receive it within our
15 hearts. Thank you for attending today's meeting. Before
16 beginning our meeting today, just a brief note about last
17 week's Supreme Court decision overturning Roe versus
18 Wade, and two other key court decisions. The court ruled
19 against restrictions for carrying concealed weapons in
20 public and against civil lawsuits related to police
21 officers who failed to administer the Miranda warnings.
22 These decisions are monumental shifts from the
23 establishment rights and precedents, rather. We also
24 recently observed where President Biden signed into law
25 gun reform that will span background checks for minors,

1 interested in purchasing guns, removing guns from
2 domestic violence offenders, and creating other
3 protections of reducing and deterring gun crimes. While
4 this is a step in the right direction, we still have a
5 lot of work to do.

6 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Last night, the news report
7 indicated Detroit police turned away a man with an AR15
8 at Hart Plaza and the people are gathered around the
9 fireworks. The AR15 is a semi-automatic weapon like one
10 used in the school shooting in Texas and other mass
11 shootings at schools, at least at one church. I know the
12 Chief, and of course, his person standing in, Deputy
13 Chief Haynes, either one would be there to say more about
14 the fireworks and other events in his report. However, I
15 have to say, this is what is so troubling about the
16 Supreme Court decision. No one can see what your
17 intentions are when you have a weapon like that in
18 public. And you are not a police officer. That weapon
19 creates fear and terror.

20 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: It's a weapon that is usually
21 used by people with bad intentions who hurt a lot of
22 people even quickly, including police officers. Nothing
23 happened last night, but this is a very pivotal point in
24 Detroit and America for us all to act. The power of
25 voting is one of the most important public service areas

1 that we can engage in. We need to understand the power of
2 our voice and our vote. The Board would like to encourage
3 each and every one of you to stay engaged. We actually
4 encourage you to be active and be informed about the
5 democratic process and the quality of life that affects
6 all communities, especially our community. While some of
7 these issues may not affect you directly, they will
8 likely affect you indirectly. We must vote. We must do
9 what we can to protect and preserve our democracy and it
10 means voting in every election, not only the general
11 election but also the primary. Our lives and our children
12 depend upon your vote and our vote. Once again, I thank
13 you so much for your patience. Thank you so much for
14 being with us this afternoon. This meeting is special in
15 the sense that we are not meeting on Thursday, we are
16 meeting on Tuesday. We are substituting the meeting that
17 would be on Thursday. At this time, I will ask Vice-
18 Chairperson Ferguson to give us a short version of the
19 mission statement.

20 VICE-CHAIR FERGUSON: Through the Chair. The Board of
21 Police Commissioners has supervising control and
22 oversight of the police department as set forth in the
23 Charter. The Board of Police Commissioners is composed of
24 11 members, 7 of whom shall be elected from each non-At-
25 Large District; 4 members of the Board shall be appointed

1 by the mayor subject to the approval of the City Council.
2 Through the Chair, reading of the mission statement.

3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: All right. It's short enough. At
4 this time, I'd like to have a roll call. Ms. Blossom, are
5 you ready with it for us, or is it Ms. White?

6 MS. WHITE: Yes sir. Through the Chair, Mr. Vice-
7 Chair, Bryan Ferguson - Here.

8 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Linda Bernard - Attorney
9 Linda Bernard, District 2, present.

10 MS. WHITE: Commissioner, Cedric Banks - Present.

11 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Willie Bell submitted and
12 excused absence notification.

13 MS. WHITE: Commissioner, Willie E. Burton - Present
14 on the behalf of the majority of Detroit.

15 MS. WHITE: Commissioner, Lisa Carter submitted an
16 excused absence notification.

17 MS. WHITE: Commissioner, Ricardo Moore - Present,
18 District 7.

19 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Jesus Hernandez - Present.

20 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Annie Holt - Good afternoon.
21 Present, Annie Holt, At-Large.

22 MS. WHITE: Commissioner QuanTez Pressley - Here.

23 MS. WHITE: Mr. Chair, you do have a quorum.

24 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I thank you so much. And I thank
25 all Commissioners for taking time out. I know this is

1 basically a day that you set aside that we might be able
2 to get this meeting in according to the Charter. And for
3 that, I'm very grateful and very thankful for your time
4 this afternoon. Based on the advisement from the law
5 department it is very important that we basically have a
6 plan here regarding the current vacancies and the posting
7 positions of the secretary to the Board and Chief
8 Investigator. Therefore, I want you to know there's no
9 plan for our personnel-related matters to discuss in
10 close session. However, I will ask for unanimous consent
11 to resend the motion to go into a closed session to
12 discuss the plan.

13 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I'm also recirculating the job
14 specifications for both positions, for your review and
15 consideration. Our staff will work with city HR to post
16 the positions and prescreen candidates, based on their
17 previously approved Board hiring process. So with that in
18 mind, I just want to make sure that you will allow me to
19 do this correctly expeditiously by the rules, based on
20 the Charter. And we'll get through this with your help.
21 At this time, I'd like to have a motion based upon the
22 consent to...

23 MS. WHITE: Mr. Chair.

24 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes.

25 MS. WHITE: Yes, sir. Through the Chair, you were

1 just simply notifying the full Board of your intentions
2 regarding why the closed session item was not on the
3 agenda. So at this time you just need a motion to approve
4 the agenda in its form in its current form.

5 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay. Therefore, I'm asking for
6 a motion basically, for the agenda that we have before
7 us.

8 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Motion to approve.

9 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Second.

10 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: It's been properly approved and
11 second. Any discussion?

12 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Discussion.

13 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes sir.

14 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Mr. Chairman, you know, at last
15 week's meeting a motion was placed on the floor. And the
16 motion was also amended to postpone, which means that we
17 shall have a closed-door session on the personnel matter
18 at this meeting. And in all due respect, Mr. Chairman,
19 you know, I'd like it if we follow that process today
20 because postponing it was for the next meeting and this
21 is that meeting, and then we are prepared to move
22 forward.

23 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Any other further objections?
24 Hearing none, yes. I'm sorry.

25 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Mr. Chairman, just to follow

1 up briefly. I can agree with your motion in part.

2 However, I do feel that it is appropriate that the Board
3 discussed its two most senior executive positions in a
4 closed session.

5 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: You want that? I'm just saying
6 to you, again, in other words, we don't have to discuss
7 it because all we going to do is basically...

8 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Oh, post the job.

9 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes. That's all we're talking
10 about.

11 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: No problem, Mr. Chairman.

12 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Mr. Chairman.

13 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes.

14 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: And post it when that's all I
15 want to know.

16 COMMISSIONER MOORE: And I agree with the motion. I
17 just wished that it would've appeared on the agenda first
18 because it seems like it was some type of act to keep it
19 off the agenda. It should have still been put on the
20 agenda. We could have removed it off the agenda, but I'm
21 going to agree with the motion.

22 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay.

23 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Mr. Chairman.

24 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes, sir. You know, final
25 conclusion for this segment on this line item is the fact

1 that a motion, my colleagues, a motion was made last week
2 and Commissioner Ricardo Moore out of District 7, amended
3 that motion, which was a higher motion. And that was to
4 postpone it for this meet, this week, right here. The
5 City of Detroit...

6 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I just need to have an
7 understanding. That's all and I apologize to you if I
8 don't have the understanding. Are we talking about the
9 hires that we basically, that we promoted last week? Is
10 that what we're talking about or are we talking about the
11 interim secretary's position and the chief's position?

12 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Mr. Chairman.

13 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I'm asking which one you're
14 talking about.

15 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I'm getting to that, Mr.
16 Chairman. You know, we supported our colleague Ricardo
17 Moore, Commissioner Moore, out of District 7 when he made
18 a higher ranking motion to postpone and to postpone means
19 to the very next meeting, which is this meeting here. It
20 looks very deceiving where we don't even see it on the
21 agenda today. And we talking about the interim secretary
22 position, the interim chief investigator position. We are
23 talking about the Charter, which says we shall, we shall
24 hire...

25 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner...

1 COMMISSIONER BURTON: You know, we shall hire a
2 secretary to this Board, as well as a chief investigator.

3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner.

4 COMMISSIONER BURTON: We're talking about over two
5 years in the position Mr. Chairman.

6 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: If you let me handle this, I can
7 do this...

8 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Where it's a disservice that
9 this Board doesn't want to operate in compliance by
10 hiring a secretary or hiring a chief investigator.

11 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner, what I'm saying...

12 COMMISSIONER BURTON: This is not transparency, Mr.
13 Chairman.

14 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: If you just stop a minute and
15 I'll be as transparent as I possibly can. What we are
16 talking about here, everything that we're doing now is
17 recorded. It's on the agenda. This is recorded. And when
18 we basically will have a motion to do exactly what you
19 are asking us to do, but right now I'm just following the
20 agenda. And so when somebody basically says, we like to
21 post this or post that it will be noted and it will be
22 recorded. And therefore it will be on the agenda, based
23 upon the fact, which is the motion.

24 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Mr. Chairman, no disrespect to
25 you, but we know you didn't write this agenda. We know

1 that you didn't prepare this agenda. Mr. Chairman, we
2 know that the interim secretary to the Board prepared
3 this and therefore the interim secretary to the Board
4 kept this off today's agenda.

5 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: It's not off today's agenda if
6 you let me just run the agenda. Just let me get through
7 these two days, these two weeks. You'll be through with
8 me and I'll be through with you. I'm just saying to you,
9 let me get through it, son. Just let me get through it.
10 I'll get through it. And you'll be satisfied in the end.
11 I guarantee you you'll be satisfied. But just let me get
12 through it, please. I'm just saying to you, at this time,
13 I'm asking any other thing you want to talk about,
14 otherwise...

15 COMMISSIONER BURTON: It goes against the Charter,
16 Mr. Chairman, this totally goes against the Charter.

17 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Call for the question.

18 COMMISSIONER: Second.

19 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: All in favor, say, aye.

20 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

21 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Opposed?

22 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Opposed because this violates
23 the Charter.

24 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Are we voting on approval of
25 the agenda?

1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes, if you don't mind, will you
2 make the motion to that, please?

3 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: I move that we approve the
4 agenda.

5 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Second.

6 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: For what date?

7 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Oh, for June 28th, 2022.

8 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Second.

9 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: If there are any discussions or
10 corrections. Hearing no corrections then it will be
11 approved as read. So we just basically went...

12 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I'm against this agenda, Mr.
13 Chairman.

14 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay. You want to stay, you want
15 to participate because I'm telling you I'm going to get
16 through this. If you just be patient with me, I'm old.
17 Just be patient with me. At this time, I'm asking that we
18 have the introduction if you would please, of the staff
19 here, please?

20 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Do we need to approve the
21 minutes?

22 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I thought we did. All in favor,
23 say, aye.

24 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

25 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Opposed? I thank you so much. I

1 apologize for that. Just got me kind of discombobulated
2 but I get there. I need to know right now. Ms. White, are
3 you going to introduce your staff this year? Ms. Blossom,
4 can you do that?

5 MS. WHITE: Oh, I'm sorry.

6 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Can you give me the people who
7 are with us today, your staff?

8 MS. WHITE: Yes, sir. Through the Chair, Media
9 Services is handling the audio, the Board's audio and
10 visual needs, and recording the Board's meeting today.
11 And the court reporter is Mr. Don Handyside and the
12 following Board staff members are in attendance. Mr.
13 Theresa Blossom, Community Relations Coordinator, Board
14 Parliamentarian, Dr. Francis Jackson, Investigator
15 Tiffany Stewart, Director, Katrina Patillo, Director of
16 Police Personnel, Assistant Corporation, Counsel,
17 Christopher Michaels, Interim Chief Investigator Lawrence
18 Akbar attending via zoom, Supervising Investigator Ansley
19 Cromwell via zoom, Acting Supervising Investigator
20 LiSonya Sloan and Acting Supervising Investigator Rosalia
21 Madrigal and our American, excuse me, it should be
22 Supervising Investigator Rosalia Madrigal. Our American
23 Sign Language interpreters today are Ms. Yakata and Dr.
24 Stephanie Beattie. Thank you, sir.

25 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you, Ms. White. Chief, I

1 didn't see you come in. Thank you for being there. You'd
2 like to let us know who's with you today.

3 CHIEF WHITE: Good afternoon, Board. I have with me,
4 Deputy Chief Franklin Hayes. I have Sergeant Greg
5 Matthews from my staff and that appears to be it in
6 person.

7 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much, Chief. Ms.
8 White, have you anybody in the zoom audience to be called
9 special guests?

10 MS. WHITE: At this time, sir, I do not have any
11 notification at this time. Thank you.

12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much. Ladies and
13 gentlemen, we look forward to hearing the feedback from
14 the Chiefs regarding the Ford Fireworks held last evening
15 and the department's effort to keep everyone safe during
16 that event. We also look forward to learning more
17 importantly the vital citywide, crime updates, and
18 critical incidents for our awareness as well as any other
19 events or incidents that the Chief would like to bring to
20 our attention. Today, we have a presentation from the
21 City of Detroit's Board of Ethics, which will provide
22 more information regarding the city's ethics ordinance
23 and the Board's mandates in this regard. As a reminder,
24 the staff is planning an upcoming aim to the Detroit
25 crime-free summit. Flyers are in your package. The Board

1 of Police Commissioners has been to recent summits on
2 homicides and non-fatal shootings and other gun violence.

3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: The goal is very clear. We need
4 to work together to make sure our city is safe as
5 possible for everyone. We need to, basically, to
6 deliberate steps and actions. We need to take aim to make
7 sure that our community is very safe and crime-free. So
8 I'm asking you to just save that date for Thursday,
9 September 8th, 2022 at 6:30 PM. And we ask that you
10 please put that on your calendar. It would be at the
11 Kennedy Recreation Center, bringing a lot of top minds
12 together over the summit to discuss gun violence, gun
13 crime, convention strategies, constitutionally, and
14 quickly removing guns from our streets, and saving lives.
15 During the month of July, the Board will celebrate 48
16 years of being the most historic and prominent civilian
17 oversight agency, leading the nation in this effort.
18 Through the vision and leadership of the former Mayor
19 Coleman A. Young, in 1973, the Charter created the Board
20 of Police Commissioners, a robust civilian oversight
21 agency charged with overseeing the Detroit Police
22 Department. We look forward to sharing it with you in our
23 celebration as the leaders and civil oversight and hope
24 that you will be able to attend our community meetings,
25 which will be held in the districts where we all started.

1 In 1967, the riot of rebellion led to the creation of
2 this Board. The Board and the city have experienced
3 several evolutions.

4 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: All of which required us to
5 transform the way we do civil oversight. And we look
6 forward to a leader and prominent figures in civil
7 oversight. Voter registration tables will be set up to
8 ensure that individuals can register to vote if they have
9 not already done so. Please plan to attend and tell your
10 neighbors about it as well. Next week, a new elected
11 Board officer, incoming Chairperson Byron Ferguson, and
12 the incoming Vice-Chairperson Annie Holt will be sworn in
13 and begin their one-year term. Again, we'll congratulate
14 you and send our best wishes. We look forward to the
15 ceremony, as well as your goals and your vision for the
16 upcoming physical year toward enhancing and improving
17 public safety, law enforcement, and civilian oversight.
18 Lastly, the Board will hold its annual training
19 orientation during the month of July.

20 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: More information is forthcoming
21 from staff regarding the dates and the times for your
22 consideration. Please stay tuned regarding these key
23 items we have raised over the last two months and the
24 other civilian oversight areas for awareness. Thank you
25 so much for that. At this time, Chief, if you could give

1 us an update? I want to congratulate you on a job well
2 done last night. Basically, I counted one by one about 80
3 to a hundred thousand people. And I don't know what your
4 count is, but I counted them one by one and I just think
5 that your people are special, your officers and I
6 understand that every out there, the cook, the janitor,
7 everybody that worked at the police department was out
8 there last night. Is that right?

9 CHIEF WHITE: We had everybody we could have that did
10 not compromise our service delivery at the precincts.
11 Right. Everybody else was there. So good afternoon, Board
12 once again. This is my report. I'll get to the fireworks
13 in a moment, but I'll go through the numbers first. 5
14 members of the department recovering at home due to on-
15 duty injuries. 1 sergeant from the Second Precinct one
16 police officer from TSS, 1 police officer from gang
17 Intel, two officers from the Seventh Precinct 12 officers
18 quarantined with COVID, and last week we had 19 we have
19 10 members who have tested positive for this week, 17
20 last week. So even with the increased activity, we see a
21 decline but we know that COVID is going to be here and
22 it's going to be something we have to manage around our
23 crime data.

24 CHIEF WHITE: We are looking at a 15% reduction in
25 homicides and a 14% reduction in sexual assaults. We're

1 looking at 15% in aggravated assaults. 5%, we're losing
2 some ground, 5% on our robberies but we're paying close
3 attention to that. And carjackings continue to be of
4 concern. We have a 32% increase, but we do have an
5 overall 14%, overall, part one violent crime reduction.
6 We're going to continue to work through that and see what
7 we can do to impact the crime, you know, certainly, in
8 order to impact crime, you know, it's a multi-layered
9 approach. We need the community and certainly some of the
10 violent crime incidents that we have, like the one I'm
11 going to be briefing you on today; very low impact the
12 police can have when you have people making these types
13 of decisions. So we'll get into that a moment.

14 CHIEF WHITE: Drifting and drag racing continues to
15 be a problem in the department or in the city, rather.
16 The department is going to remain focused on it, it is a
17 very serious crime despite some thinking that its
18 entertainment, it is dangerous. These are not
19 professional drivers. They're putting our community at
20 risk. They're putting themselves at risk. I got a number
21 of calls from people talking about being hit or their
22 vehicles ending up in their front yard, into their homes,
23 and a number of other incidents that we've had throughout
24 the city that go unreported in the media but are
25 occurring. And we're going to do everything in our power

1 to stop it, to stop this drifting and drag racing dangers
2 in our community. It's something that is impacting the
3 country. It's not just Detroit. I was in LA a couple of
4 weeks back and they were having the same problems in the
5 neighborhoods. Our stats for last week. No, that's not
6 right. I'm not going to give you those stats. These stats
7 are incorrect and are not what I read this morning. I'll
8 report them next week and give you two weeks, next week.

9 CHIEF WHITE: I'm going to brief you out on a couple
10 of significant incidents that have happened. The sexual
11 assault of a 79-year-old victim on June 20th of this year
12 at 1018, of 5,000 block of Ludwick. Officers responded to
13 a police-run regarding a sexual assault that had just
14 occurred. The victim notified the officers that she heard
15 a noise in her house and that her dog was barking. The
16 victim went to investigate the source of the noise when
17 she saw an unknown suspect standing in a home's hallway.
18 After he assaulted the victim, he fled the scene of the
19 crime. Our sex crimes unit obtained a video of the
20 suspect. The images of the suspect were released to the
21 media and we were following tips. We still need the
22 media's help and we need the community's help, rather
23 than with the suspect. We're going to push that out again
24 this week. This is a suspect that was wearing a red
25 jogging suit. We are pretty confident we know who he is.

1 We just need to know where he is at. So we hope that no
2 one is harboring him. If they are, they're going to be
3 facing charges. So we'll be pushing that out again. Very
4 tragic incident involving a three-year-old victim, on
5 June 24th, 12:58, 12,000 block of Mont vista. Officers
6 responded to the location for a well-being check.

7 CHIEF WHITE: And what that is, is to go out and see
8 if the person is okay. Something happened that caused
9 someone to call the police. In this instance, this was a
10 child that hadn't been seen. Child's Protective Service
11 reached out to officers to go out for a well-being check.
12 They were attempting to identify the whereabouts of the
13 child. The suspect who turned out to be the child's
14 mother made several attempts to deceive the officers. The
15 officers continued investigating and talked about this
16 last week. Something instinctively told them something
17 was off. Upon further investigation, the mother admitted
18 that her son was inside a freezer in the basement of the
19 home. Five of the children in the home were removed and
20 placed in a safe environment. And they're working through
21 a safety plan. Unconscionable, really no words to even
22 add to what happened in this situation.

23 CHIEF WHITE: But just awful. The mother was charged
24 with felony murder, first-degree, child abuse, torture,
25 and concealing the death of an individual. Just, you

1 know, you just pray, because I don't know how you even
2 add words to that. Double fatal vehicle accident this
3 week June 26th, at 12:30 AM in the area of John Kronk and
4 central officers from our organized crime unit, which is
5 our unit that monitors our drag racing, go into an area
6 see a large group of people congregating for drag racing.
7 What the officers do, is have a couple of different
8 strategies that they do, but in this instance, the
9 officers attempted to initiate a traffic stop on a silver
10 Lincoln by activating their lights and sirens. However,
11 the vehicle drove off at a high rate of speed with
12 several other vehicles.

13 CHIEF WHITE: The officers turned off their lights,
14 verified by in-car video, and did not pursue. The driver
15 of the vehicle continued to drive at an extremely high
16 rate of speed and failed to stop at railroad tracks
17 resulting in a train colliding with the vehicle. The
18 driver was a 29-year-old man and the passenger was a 29-
19 year-old or 24-year-old correction, 24-year-old female
20 from Northville. The driver was a 29-year-old man from
21 Wickham in our city to participate in this ridiculous art
22 of drifting and drag racing. Very tragic, very sad.
23 Something that should not have happened. They lost their
24 lives for something so ridiculous and were both hit by a
25 train. The officers did attempt to extract the driver and

1 the passenger from the vehicle but were unsuccessful due
2 to the extensive damage to the vehicle.

3 CHIEF WHITE: The officers also tried to use their
4 fire extinguisher to put a fire out in the vehicle's
5 engine compartment which was successful. It's being
6 investigated now by our fatal squad team. Again,
7 extremely tragic. The last tragic event happened today.
8 This afternoon, 9,200 block of Monarch. This is a very
9 complicated story to attempt to go through. This is the
10 scene that I just left. So at some point earlier this
11 afternoon two males, 17 years old attempted to break
12 into, not attempt, they did break into a home in a 9,200
13 block of Monarch. Inside of that home is two adults, two
14 17-year-olds. And my understanding is there is a two-
15 year-old. Once inside the home and this would be the home
16 invasion they break in through the side window. One of
17 the males is armed with an AR.

18 CHIEF WHITE: The other is armed with a pistol. At
19 some point, they go into a room in the home, and they
20 encounter the male resident of the home, the adult male
21 resident of the home. And at the same point, and again,
22 this is subject to change. This is something I was just
23 briefed on; they encountered him. They see a female in
24 her thirties that's identified as his wife and they shoot
25 her. She succumbed to her injuries. She was killed

1 immediately. He then at some point engages the shooter
2 and is able to get the gun from the shooter and shoots
3 the shooter with his own gun. The shooter then escapes on
4 foot runs out of the home, down the street, takes a
5 bicycle from someone, and proceeds to try to get away at
6 the very same point in time.

7 CHIEF WHITE: The second suspect proceeds to run in
8 the opposite direction. The victim, a male victim, whose
9 wife now is shot in the home pursues the second suspect.
10 He shot the first suspect who was on a bicycle escaping.
11 Now he's pursuing the second suspect. He catches the
12 second suspect, an altercation ensues. He strikes him
13 with the weapon and is able to hold him until the police
14 arrive. The police arrive very quickly finding one
15 suspect, being held by the victim with a weapon in the
16 victim's hand striking the suspect. The suspect has
17 another weapon on him that is on his hip. The second
18 suspect that's, or the first suspect, it is getting
19 confusing, even explaining that's escaping on the bike
20 has now met up with someone else and jumped into a
21 vehicle and is conveyed to a hospital.

22 CHIEF WHITE: At the end of all of this, we have a
23 deceased 30-year-old, and we have a child that's been
24 taken to protective custody. We have a perpetrator at the
25 hospital in custody. We have a second perpetrator. The

1 one that was being held by the victim in custody and a
2 weapon recovered. And we have a victim who is awaiting
3 charges as well that we were investigating on a homicide,
4 which we later found out. So all three of them are in
5 custody. And our decedent is a 30-year-old or a female in
6 her thirties whose family is getting ready to have the
7 worst day of their lives. So those are the types of
8 crimes that are virtually impossible to impact in
9 policing. Those are decision-making situations. There's
10 no way I can put extra patrols out for that. But a very
11 tragic situation. The detectives are there unpacking all
12 of this and doing a phenomenal job as usual. And they'll
13 be bringing the appropriate charges to everyone. But I
14 just wanted to give you that information.

15 CHIEF WHITE: On Monday yesterday, we hosted our 2022
16 fireworks. I just congratulated our team earlier. The
17 officers did an amazing job, and I think everybody that
18 you talked to, Commissioner Moore was out and about.
19 Thank you for showing up for the roll call. I think we
20 saw the commitment. I know the commitment, you got a
21 chance to see the commitment of the officers. They were
22 everywhere. They were out in droves. They were
23 professional. They looked professional. They were strong.
24 I was very proud of all of them. They executed our plan
25 to perfection. We had you know, we didn't get the numbers

1 in years past, but we had pockets that were filled with a
2 lot of people. We had a lot of teams. We close out the
3 night with five arrests. Now I remember fireworks where
4 we had five arrests an hour. But we closed out the entire
5 night with five arrests. The proudest I am is of this one
6 category. And that is juveniles detained because we know
7 how the detention of a juvenile can impact their future.
8 Even though we had the curfew in effect, and parental
9 responsibility ordinance in effect, zero juvenile was
10 detained last night and that's fantastic.

11 CHIEF WHITE: And the reason for that is twofold. One
12 is the officer's level of engagement and giving the kids
13 an opportunity to correct behavior and go home. Number
14 two is a cease-fire. Cease fire was out there on the
15 ground with us, working very hard, engaging these young
16 folks and, you know, kids, they're trying to show off for
17 other kids and our officers practice great restraint,
18 they know the game and, you know, go home, right. And
19 many of them went home. Three arrests were for guns, two
20 arrests were for two intoxicated females. One of the
21 females attempted to run an officer over with her car,
22 and the other one has a few problems that she'll be
23 dealing with in the next few days. And then the one case,
24 I don't know all the details, but I know she was
25 intoxicated and disorderly.

1 CHIEF WHITE: So again, five arrests and very
2 successful night officers were just incredible. The city
3 looked great, many events going on, you know, many
4 parties going on. The traffic execution plan was
5 phenomenal. This is Deputy Chief Franklin Hayes and
6 Assistant Chief Charles Fitzgerald. They really worked
7 their toes off on this event. And, you know, behind the
8 scenes hours and hours talking to me every day, on the
9 weekends, in the evenings, just pulling all the little
10 things that people don't know about together. So it's
11 safe walking the footprint. And even with the evolved
12 radar detection or radar, I'm thinking of traffic, metal
13 detectors seamless, there was no disruption flow. Some
14 people chose not to go through them. No problem. Those
15 people who had CPLs in the areas that were not weapon-
16 free produced their CPLs and moved freely without
17 problem, there were a couple of open-carry people that
18 had no issue as long as they understood what open-carry
19 was and that you can't cover up your open carry weapon.
20 But it went well and I could not be prouder of our team
21 and our team execution. So with that, I will take any
22 questions.

23 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Tell me what happened with the
24 guy with the 45, the long gun, when you saw him, what
25 happened? And also, you have a new security thing where

1 people walk through and a lot of times people felt like
2 they...talk about those two things, if you could, please?

3 CHIEF WHITE: Very quickly, you're speaking of the
4 open-carry guy who had the AR. So yes, we did encounter a
5 gentleman who was an open-carry advocate and also
6 participated in it. He had an AR which is, you know, an
7 assault rifle walking towards the very large crowd. And I
8 get his constitutional right to open carry, but I also
9 have an entire community to protect. And if anybody's you
10 know, paying any attention to what's happening in this
11 country it would be absurd to simply let him walk towards
12 a large crowd with a machine gun and not even say a good
13 afternoon to you. So we said, good afternoon to him a few
14 times, and we made sure that he recognized that we were
15 in any area. We did Noto him. We did not harass him but
16 he has a right to open carry, and I have a right to watch
17 him open carry, and that's exactly what we did.

18 CHIEF WHITE: And he felt uncomfortable with us
19 watching him open carry, and he decided to do something
20 else with the rest of his day. And we supported that as
21 well. The metal detectors were seamless. Hart Plaza, as
22 you know, was leased out by the parade company. They
23 decided to make it a weapons-free zone. We ran that
24 through the law department to ensure that we met all of
25 the responsibilities of that and didn't violate anyone's

1 rights. We made sure that that happened. It did happen.
2 It was weapons-free. It's been weapons-free for many
3 events, not just this one. And you know, the parade
4 company was great. It worked well, no one was disrupted.
5 Some people made a decision not to go in because they
6 wanted to take their weapons. So they decided to watch
7 the fireworks from another location. And again, that was
8 fine. So families were there, kids were there. I was
9 happy to see so many families out there participating and
10 enjoying it. You know that this is a huge tradition for
11 this city. You know, many people in this room have
12 childhood memories of going to the fireworks in Detroit.
13 And so it was really nice to see the families return and
14 no problems this year.

15 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much, Chief.
16 Commissioner Hernandez, do you have a question for the
17 Chief?

18 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: I do. I'll probably do a
19 rapid-fire. Through the Chair. First of all, thank you
20 for yesterday. I was, I wouldn't really say observing or
21 patrolling, but I experienced the fireworks, and
22 thoroughly enjoyed that experience. It had an ambiance of
23 family-friendly, which was great. It was needed,
24 especially after the last two years, two years plus that
25 we've had. And I actually witnessed a few officers who

1 were engaging, I think the best way possible with
2 interesting crowds and, you know, some may have been
3 residents who were trying to get through traffic stops or
4 whatever. It may have been. A very big shout out to
5 Captain Tosqui who actually ran into and handled one of
6 those interactions very appropriately. So kudos to him.
7 Rapid-fire questions. You talked about the drag racing
8 detail. ATVs continue to be an issue, moped, dirt bikes.
9 Could we anticipate hopefully relatively soon additional
10 results to curb that activity? I was downtown earlier or
11 late last week and witnessed several laps from 50 plus
12 ATVs in the area. And I know there's somewhat of a
13 constant, but could you just speak a little bit to that?
14 And then I have two other quick ones.

15 CHIEF WHITE: I'll go quickly too. So yes, we are
16 trying to be much more strategic. We're going to use the
17 helicopters to help us with those. What we don't want to
18 do, Commissioner is these things are dangerous and
19 they're small, and the moment you light them up, I mean,
20 turn your lights on. They take off, and now if they lose
21 control and hit a bus or hurt themselves, then I'm here
22 telling you, you know, what we did or didn't do. So it's
23 a real, huge challenge for the officers because I don't
24 want someone for what equates to, you know, civil
25 infractions to lose their life because the kids are going

1 to take off a hundred miles an hour thinking that they
2 can control that thing. And they really can't. But we are
3 going to use the air support and we're going to put
4 together some ways of knowing where they stop and when
5 they stop. We're going to take enforcement action.

6 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Sounds good. Thank you. And
7 the last one, a very quick one. Out of the five arrests
8 that occurred, how many were actual Detroiters? Do you
9 have that...?

10 CHIEF WHITE: I don't have that with me, but I'll
11 find out. I'll report next week.

12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Burton.

13 CHIEF WHITE: Take that for me.

14 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I have no questions at this
15 time, Mr. Chairman, but maybe later.

16 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Holt.

17 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Thank you, Chair Holley. Thank
18 you. Chief White, excellent report. And again, my family
19 was down last night. They made me stay at home, but they
20 too could support the compliments that you've made as it
21 relates to the management of DPD and how they interacted
22 with some young people. So again, thank you DPD for
23 allowing us to enjoy last night as well.

24 CHIEF WHITE: Thank you.

25 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Vice-Chairperson.

1 VICE-CHAIR FERGUSON: None at the time.

2 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Bernard.

3 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Just quickly. I noticed that
4 you have a couple of training events coming up on mental
5 health. If a commissioner wanted to attend, could we? Now
6 one is for sworn and then one is for civilian and sworn.
7 Is it possible to attend like eight hours or something? I
8 think I'd be interested.

9 CHIEF WHITE: You're welcome to attend both.

10 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Okay. Thank you. The second
11 thing. First of all, again, congratulations on a very
12 successful fireworks evening. And thank you again for
13 your tickets. But I wanted to ask you a question. I met a
14 gentleman last night, actually from Chicago, a White man,
15 and he was telling me that he has a concealed weapons
16 permit and that he always carries his gun. He was a
17 mature guy, maybe 55 or something. Anyway, my question
18 is, does that permit, permit him to carry in Michigan?

19 CHIEF WHITE: I don't know if Chicago... it should,
20 but I don't want to go on record and say a definitively,
21 yes. I know there are some states that don't cross over,
22 but I think Chicago is one that does.

23 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Illinois does cross over. That
24 was my only question. Thank you

25 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Moore.

1 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you, Mr. Chair. A great
2 job in leadership, Chief, you showed frontline leadership
3 and you're not giving yourself enough credit, because you
4 were all over the place, and I saw you. You know, I was
5 monitoring the evolve, but you were everywhere and that's
6 great frontline leadership and it was an international
7 event. You know, we sit on an international Board and I
8 think that Detroiters sometimes take that for granted.
9 That's very powerful in the country. And Detroit is the
10 only city in the United States that's south of Canada.
11 So, I just really did appreciate the experience, the
12 downtown experience that I had. And again, great job to
13 you and your officers. The question that I have deals
14 with 911. If a citizen hears a gunshot, for example, and
15 they don't know where it's coming from, should they dial
16 911? If they do, what are they going to tell 911?

17 CHIEF WHITE: That's a great question. I'll always
18 want you to call 911 when you hear a gunshot, you know,
19 because that's something we should never take, you talk
20 about taking things for granted. If a gun is being fired,
21 likely someone's being hurt. You know, not to bring up
22 other conversations, but this is why ShotSpotter is so
23 important. I am in full supporter of ShotSpotter and I
24 really want people to take the time to educate themselves
25 on exactly what we're talking about. There is no video.

1 There is no recording taking place of your conversations.
2 There's no facial recognition. This is an identification
3 of a shot being fired in this community. Since 2021, I
4 think when it went, go live, there have been 4,000 shots
5 fired and over 4,000 shots fire calls. 67 of those have
6 resulted in arrests. So a small number, but it's the
7 arrest of somebody that's hurting somebody.

8 CHIEF WHITE: And the other thing about, you know,
9 shots in our community, because it's so frequent people
10 become desensitized to it. It becomes the new auto alarm.
11 It really does. Remember when the auto alarms came out in
12 the eighties and nineties, every time you heard, when you
13 went to a window after a while, I wish they shut it off.
14 And that's what's happening with gunshots. And I can't
15 tell you how many calls we go on where the people who are
16 shooting guns don't care that they're outside shooting
17 guns. Like the little girl who was spending the night at
18 her grandmother's house two weeks ago, who was shot
19 because the people behind her decision to go into their
20 backyards with no regard for the community, without any
21 regard for anybody hearing them shooting and calling 911
22 and shooting the air. The problem is one of the young
23 people who were shooting in the air, lost control and
24 shot directly in the backyard or in the other direction
25 and the bullet went through her home and killed her.

1 CHIEF WHITE: And she was simply Tik Toking and
2 whatever you call it and dancing and playing with a bunch
3 of other kids and she's now dead and will never be here
4 again. And if there was a behavioral change process where
5 people say, hey, you can't really shoot because the
6 police are going to come, then that little nine-year-old
7 girl could be on the next Board of Police, a Chairperson,
8 the next police chief, the next city council person, the
9 next Annie Holt, you know, seriously, the next Linda
10 Bernard, but she will never get that opportunity because
11 she decided to spend the night at her grandmother's
12 house. That's awful. And instead of us arguing over
13 things that are not true, we should be supporting
14 something that's going to save these children. You have
15 to be tired of me sitting here, giving you a report on
16 dead babies. And if there's a violation of it, hold me or
17 whatever chief, you have accountable. But to sit here and
18 be feared of not saving lives is wrong. And we got to do
19 better for these children.

20 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Pressley.

21 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Thank you. Through the Chair.
22 Chief White, my question is relative to the drag racing.
23 You talked about the two fatalities that existed and I
24 think that you note that both of them were non-
25 Detroiters. I know it may be hard to generalize this, but

1 are we finding that there are more who are in the drag
2 racing who are non-Detroiters than Detroiters that we are
3 having engagement with?

4 CHIEF WHITE: Well, let me preface my comments by
5 saying, you know, I was not trying to characterize the
6 residents as lessening the impact of what happened. I
7 mean, I'm sure you know that, but it is factual that we
8 have a large number of people coming into our city
9 participating in it and witnessing it, thinking they can
10 come here and do what they want to do and go home and
11 laugh about it and put it on social media. So yes, we do
12 see a large number of people coming to this town doing
13 that.

14 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Thank you.

15 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Banks.

16 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Yes. Through the Chair. Chief
17 White that was a great victory last night for yourself
18 and Detroit and the Detroit Police Department, based on
19 how the fireworks have been over the years, disaster over
20 the last 7, 8, 9, and 10 years. So that's a great
21 improvement for DPD constantly improving. Just wanted to
22 give you thumbs up.

23 CHIEF WHITE: Thank you, sir.

24 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you, Chief. I know you
25 have to go and we appreciate you so much and appreciate

1 your reporting to us this afternoon. Thank you so much.

2 CHIEF WHITE: Yes, sir. If I may address the
3 commissioners' earlier question about residents of the
4 arrests. The two misdemeanor assaults were Detroiters.
5 The gun arrests were one Detroit, one South Philly, and
6 one Normandale.

7 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much.

8 CHIEF WHITE: Thank you all.

9 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: No. Thank you. At this time. I'd
10 like to have the presentation from the Board of Ethics if
11 you please if you're here today?

12 MR. O'CONNELL: Yes, we are, Chairperson. Thank you.

13 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay. Very good. You may
14 identify yourself and basically identify your mission and
15 then begin your report.

16 MS. WHITE: Excuse me, Mr. Chair.

17 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Is this on zoom today, Mr.
18 Chairman?

19 MS. WHITE: Yes. Through the Chair, Mr. Chair, if I
20 may. This is again, Melanie White, Interim Board
21 Secretary. If I may just give a brief introduction before
22 the presenter begins the Board of Ethics presentation.
23 Through the Chair, this presentation is based on the
24 Board's request to receive information from the Board of
25 Ethics and also the Board. I should say that the Board

1 has an upcoming training with the Board of Ethics as
2 well. The Board of Ethics establishes disclosure
3 requirements and standards of conduct applicable to all
4 public servants. So again, its training session is coming
5 forward in that regard and the honorable Board received
6 various support material in preparation for today's
7 presentation, the PowerPoint presentation, and you also
8 have some additional support material. And if I may just
9 take just a brief, quick moment to identify some of the
10 other representatives that did not get a chance to
11 identify while the presenter prepares to give the
12 presentation. Former police commissioner William Davis is
13 online via zoom. Board Parliamentarian, Dr. Francis
14 Jackson is available on zoom. Also, Ms. Marie Overall of
15 State Representative Tyrone Carter's Office is present.
16 As I mentioned earlier Director Katrina Patillo, Director
17 of Police Personnel. I just wanted to note that for the
18 record. Thank you so much.

19 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: And thank you, Ms. White. Thank
20 you always for your help. Appreciate it.

21 MR. O'CONNELL: Ms. White, if you could promote Dawn
22 Woodman to the panelist as well. She's with me from our
23 office to help answer questions if there are any.

24 MS. WHITE: Okay. Yes, sir. Thank you.

25 MR. O'CONNELL: Thank you. Good afternoon, everybody.

1 My name is Michael O'Connell. I'm the training specialist
2 for the city's Board of Ethics. My role is to facilitate
3 the training of all public servants for the City of
4 Detroit. I've been in this role since September and I
5 started with the city a little over four years ago in the
6 city clerk's office. So the Board of Ethics is a City of
7 Detroit oversight agency. And if we go to the next slide.
8 Thank you. It's a city oversight agency's task with
9 administering the ethics ordinance for all public
10 servants, contractors, and vendors in the City of
11 Detroit. The Board renders opinions on requests for
12 advisory opinions for public servants about their own
13 behavior. We investigate complaints of ethics ordinance
14 violations that can come from either the public or public
15 servants. And we conduct our manual, and annual training
16 on the ethics ordinance and intake mandated disclosure
17 requirements through the ordinance as well. We can go to
18 the next slide. Our creation was or required by the 1997
19 Charter. It governs the conduct of all public servants,
20 requires training, and establishes those disclosure
21 requirements that we'll talk about just in just a second.

22 MR. O'CONNELL: So some people ask who a public
23 servant really is, and we talk about elected officials,
24 all appointed officials, board members, commissioners,
25 all employees of the City of Detroit, and then any

1 contractor or vendor doing business on behalf of the
2 city. So in every contract is written the requirement for
3 adherence to the ethics ordinance as well.

4 MR. O'CONNELL: For disclosure requirements, the
5 ordinance does require the disclosure of any director,
6 indirect financial interest in city contracts or matters
7 pending before City Council or any other department or
8 agency; any director or indirect interest in real and
9 personal property that's subject to any city decision
10 regarding any kind of zoning, sale, lease improvement,
11 tax abatement matter or anything like that. And then the
12 identity of any immediate family member employed by the
13 city or who is making an application for city employment.
14 So it's always better to just be as transparent as
15 possible in those processes. And we're here to help
16 facilitate that. The mayor, members of the City Council,
17 City Clerk, and candidates for election have to make
18 campaign contributions and expenditures public in
19 accordance with State law. And then any appointees must
20 also disclose those familial relationships with anyone,
21 like the Mayor, City Council, or City Clerk. And if
22 you're ever unsure, if you need to file, just reach out
23 and we're always happy to answer any questions you might
24 have about that process as well.

25 MR. O'CONNELL: So our standards of conduct are

1 broken down into roughly 12 different things. But there's
2 a lot of nuance to the ordinance. So it's important to
3 always ask questions if you have them. So we talk about
4 the willfully neglected duty or engaging in any official
5 duties for private gain, the use of confidential
6 information for private gain, disclosure, and improper
7 disclosure of confidential information. I'm sure all of
8 you know, but it's always good to get a reminder that
9 confidential information isn't always stamped
10 confidential. So just some things to remember about that.
11 And the use of city resources for commercial gain or
12 incompatible employment or rendering of services. So
13 sometimes we have a couple of issues with these and we do
14 offer the request for advisory opinion process. You're
15 able to file a request that says, I want to do this
16 thing. Does it conflict under the ethics ordinance in any
17 way with my current duties as a commissioner or an
18 employee or anything like that? Gifts and gratuities are
19 the things that we see the most. A lot of times it's just
20 wanting to be more material with their expression of
21 thanks to city employees or public servants. So the city
22 does have a \$0 limit on the value of gifts and
23 gratuities. So anyone seeking to do business with the
24 city, or already doing business with the city is not able
25 to give you a gift. And you're also not able to accept

1 any gifts of any value. That includes, you know, going to
2 the fireworks and walking around and there's a vendor
3 that wants to give you a free bottle of water, because
4 they think you're doing a great job as a police
5 commissioner. That's not okay. The bottle of water does
6 have some value. So that's still against the ordinance.
7 If the water's free to everybody, you're totally welcome
8 to take one. As long as it's available to the public at
9 the same value as it's offered to you, it's not a
10 problem. There are some exceptions to this provision in
11 the ordinance.

12 MR. O'CONNELL: We can go to that. Thank you. So if
13 you're given an award by an individual governmental body
14 or non-governmental entity in recognition of your public
15 service, that's totally fine. Complimentary copies of
16 trade publications, books, reports, pamphlets, and any
17 kind of promotional materials that are free to the
18 public, you're more than welcome to take. Gifts received
19 by immediate family members, relatives, anything like
20 that. That's not given for them to act as a third party
21 intermediary for you. It's not, give this to so and so to
22 give to the police commissioner, then it's totally fine
23 to take those things. Admission or registration fees,
24 travel expenses, entertainment, meals, or refreshments
25 that are furnished to the public servant by the sponsor

1 of an event, appearance or ceremony, which is related to
2 official city business in connection with such an event
3 or in connection with the teaching or speaking engagement
4 or the provision of assistance to an organization or
5 another governmental entity. As long as the city doesn't
6 compensate you for those things, then you're able to
7 accept those in some cases, but in all of these cases,
8 it's best to reach out to the Board of Ethics and make
9 sure that you're covered.

10 MR. O'CONNELL: So as we said before, the Board
11 receives and resolves a request for advisory opinions for
12 public servants about their own behavior. We do receive
13 and resolve complaints from the public and public
14 servants about a public servant's behavior. We provide an
15 annual report for submission to the Mayor and City
16 Council, make recommendations for improvements to the
17 Ordinance and the Charter and again, administer annual
18 mandatory training for all public servants.

19 MR. O'CONNELL: So the next steps for everyone here
20 is your mandatory ethics training is coming up here
21 beginning July 1st. We do give you a calendar quarter to
22 complete. So you are going to go to detroitethics.org. We
23 are on a separate website to maintain our confidentiality
24 and a private server so that duet doesn't have access to
25 our confidential files. So when you do access that

1 training for the first time you'll go into our website,
2 go to online services, select ethics training. There'll
3 be a button there that says start training. It'll take
4 you to our easy generator software where you'll have to
5 create an account if you've never taken our online
6 training before, and then you'll be able to sign in with
7 that account in future. And you'll be able to complete
8 that training online. It is self-paced and it does retain
9 your place if you do leave it and want to come back
10 later.

11 MR. O'CONNELL: So you don't have to finish it all in
12 one sitting, but it takes roughly 30 to 45 minutes,
13 depending on how fast you get through it. But it has all
14 the information you need in there. And then should you
15 feel that the, the Board of Police Commissioners needs a
16 little bit additional training or needs some
17 clarification? We're always here to set up a question and
18 answer session or clarifying in person training, should
19 you need it? So, we would request that you do complete
20 this training by August 30th of this year. If it goes a
21 little bit later than that, you do have until September
22 to complete that training. So we do want to try and get
23 it done early in case there are questions, then we can
24 get back to you and make sure that those are answered for
25 you.

1 MR. O'CONNELL: And this is all of our contact
2 information. This PowerPoint has been sent to the offices
3 for the Board of Police Commissioners. So all of our
4 contact information is there including my personal
5 contact information. So if you need to contact me with
6 questions about the training or you're having trouble
7 logging in, or you'd like to set up an in person question
8 and answer session or an in-person training, we're more
9 than welcome to take the time out to do that and
10 accommodate your guys' schedule. And at this time, if you
11 have any questions, I'm more than happy to answer those
12 for you.

13 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: If you have any questions, raise
14 your hand, those of you who have questions. Commissioner
15 Bernard.

16 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Just quickly. We can take the
17 training online individually at our own pace or what are
18 you suggesting?

19 MR. O'CONNELL: Yes, ma'am. It is an individual
20 online training.

21 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: If it is midnight and I wanted
22 to do it, I could just do it at midnight?

23 MR. O'CONNELL: Yes, ma'am. It is accessible 24 hours
24 a day, seven days a week on any electronic device. So
25 tablet, phone, computer, anything.

1 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: It is one hour?

2 MR. CONNELL: It should be roughly 30 to 45 minutes,
3 depending on how fast you move through the modules.

4 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you.

5 MR. O'CONNELL: No problem.

6 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Mr. O'Connell If I, as a
7 commissioner, when my time is up, can I go and work for
8 the police department?

9 MR. O'CONNELL: Well we would tell you to fill out a
10 request for advisory opinion while you're still on the
11 Board of Police Commissioners and the Board makes all of
12 those decisions. So I'm unable to tell you a definitive
13 yes or no, because the Board makes all those calls.
14 That's a little bit above my pay grade, but we would
15 encourage you to file a request for advisory opinion, but
16 there is a provision there for a one year post-employment
17 prohibition, but that's usually for public servants
18 leaving the city for private businesses, which would be
19 doing business for the city or with the city and asking
20 that public servant to then use their previously gained
21 knowledge from their position to benefit the company in
22 that position. So there are provisions in there to
23 prevent that, but it doesn't mean that every situation
24 will be enough.

25 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much. Commissioner

1 Moore.

2 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you, sir. Who's on the
3 Board of Ethics?

4 MR. O'CONNELL: Well we have our chairperson Kristin
5 Lusn, our vice-chairperson, David Jones and then our
6 members are Michael Rafferty, Mario Morrow, Byron
7 Osberne, and Robert Watt.

8 COMMISSIONER MOORE: And is it a requirement to live
9 in the City of Detroit, or does that matter?

10 MR. O'CONNELL: It is a requirement to live in the
11 City of Detroit.

12 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you.

13 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you. Thank you so much Mr.
14 O'Connell for that report. As always, we thank you for
15 showing up and really reminding us of the training, as
16 well as, reminding us of our duties in terms of ethics.
17 So I want to thank you so much and the work that you do,
18 I want to thank you for that as well.

19 MR. O'CONNELL: Thank you very much for having us
20 today. And I did want to give a quick shout out for Chief
21 White and the Detroit Police Department. We have had just
22 an overwhelming amount of police officers taking the
23 training after our meeting with Chief White and their
24 facilitation of that has just been exceptional. So we
25 can't thank them enough and we're looking forward to

1 everyone finishing training here too.

2 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you very much. Ms. White,
3 your report please.

4 MS. WHITE: Yes, sir. Through the Chair honorable
5 Board, the incoming correspondence is noted on the agenda
6 today and it includes but is not limited to the regular
7 reports that arrive into the board's office consisting of
8 the facial recognition technology report, ShotSpotter and
9 project Green Light. The honorable Board also received
10 correspondence from Chief James White, regarding the
11 DPD's police personnel and recruitment activities and
12 strategies relating to the Board's previous inquiries.
13 And the Board also received various staff reports for
14 your consideration. And just by way of brief information
15 today I attended the Michigan NAACP and the divine nine
16 legislative advocacy day at the State capital in Lansing,
17 Michigan, and I attended various workshops and received
18 in her presentations on various legislative topics,
19 including, but not limited to civil rights legislation,
20 updates, police, criminal justice, and juvenile justice
21 issues, education, public policy updates, voting rights,
22 election updates, and much, much more.

23 MS. WHITE: And so I will send the PowerPoint
24 presentation from today's event to share more information
25 with the Board in regard to some of the legislative

1 efforts that the Board is currently engaged in with
2 regards to pending criminal justice and police reform
3 bills within the Michigan legislature. And we also were
4 able to hear from the Michigan legislative black caucus
5 on some of their initiatives and efforts with regards to
6 police and criminal justice reforms and pending bills for
7 your consideration, and also just seeking to gain more
8 information and build a relationship with our Michigan
9 legislatures in terms of ensuring that we advocate for
10 those bills and those laws that the Board of Police
11 Commissioners is interested in as it relates to public
12 safety and criminal justice reform. And we also saw
13 honorable representative, State Representative Tyrone
14 Carter, and again, along with many other elected
15 officials. And so I just wanted to share that brief
16 report, but again, a formal report is forthcoming as well
17 as the presentations from today. And just lastly, the
18 honorable Board received the notification regarding the
19 recent officer involved shooting incident, and that
20 debriefing has been sent to your email. So please check
21 your emails for further details on the date and time for
22 that debriefing. And that concludes my report. Thank you
23 so much.

24 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: All right. Thank you so much,
25 Ms. Whites always... Board give me just a minute and a

1 half and just follow me if you would, please. At the
2 beginning of the meeting, I asked you to withdraw
3 regarding the vacancies of the secretary and the chief
4 investigator. And we've done that. So what I'm asking for
5 now, is basically for a motion. The motion that I'm
6 asking for is that we will post all vacancies, for
7 example, the lawyer, I'm asking that you look at it as a
8 contract for the lawyer, rather than a full job, a
9 contract with the lawyer. I'm asking that it be posted,
10 along with the vacancies for the chief investigator and
11 the secretary for the Board, all be posted with HR.

12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: We have investigations already
13 in the loop. And so we have now seven positions that we
14 have to fill. I'm asking you to understand that we need
15 to fill all of them and we need to fill them in a sense
16 of importance and priority, like the investigators. We
17 need those investigators posts filled so we can get these
18 complaints down, and then we need to have the lawyer, and
19 then we need to have the chief of OCI. And then we need
20 to have the secretary. So, the Chair would like to have a
21 motion that we notify HR that all these things will be
22 posted according to the Charter.

23 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Mr. Chairman, I'd like to make a
24 motion to immediately post and advertise the position of
25 the chief investigator for the Board of Police

1 Commissioners.

2 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Second.

3 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Second.

4 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: All in favor, say aye.

5 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

6 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Do I need a roll call, Ms.

7 White?

8 MS. WHITE: Yes, sir.

9 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Can you do a roll call for me?

10 MS. WHITE: Yes, sir. Mr. Vice-Chair. Bryan Ferguson

11 - Yes.

12 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Bernard - Yes.

13 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Banks - Yes.

14 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Burton - Yes.

15 MS. WHITE: Commission Moore - Yes.

16 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Hernandez - Yes.

17 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Holt - Yes.

18 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Pressley - Yes.

19 MS. WHITE: Mr. Chair - Yes.

20 MS. WHITE: Yes, sir. There were 9 =Yes votes. The

21 motion passed.

22 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Mr. Chairman, I also make a
23 motion to immediately post and advertise the position of
24 board secretary for the Board of Police Commissioners.

25 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Second.

1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Any discussion? Hear no
2 discussion. Can I have a roll call please?

3 MS. WHITE: Mr. Vice-Chair - Yes.

4 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Bernard - Yes.

5 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Banks - Yes.

6 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Burton - Yes.

7 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Moore - Yes.

8 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Hernandez - Yes.

9 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Holt -Yes.

10 MS. WHITE: Commission Pressley - Yes.

11 MS. WHITE: Mr. Chair - Yes.

12 MS. WHITE: There were 9 = Yes vote. The motion
13 passed.

14 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I need a motion for the lawyer
15 contract with us.

16 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Through the Chair.

17 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes, ma'am.

18 COMMISSIONER HOLT: I moved that we immediately post
19 the position of board's secretary, I mean, board's
20 attorney

21 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Support.

22 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Mr. Chairman.

23 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Is there a...?

24 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Second.

25 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I'm asking for a discussion. Who

1 wants to discuss?

2 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I want to discuss.

3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: All right, then you have the...

4 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Mr. Chairman. I strenuously
5 object to this position being a contractor position. This
6 is not like a parliamentarian and a person who comes to a
7 meeting and simply gives opinions on what's proper and
8 what's improper. The Board has always had a full-time
9 attorney. There are two things that any good organization
10 and business has. It's a strong finance person and it's a
11 good lawyer.

12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay.

13 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: You will spend far, far more
14 money if you have a good lawyer here on an hourly basis,
15 who's going to be providing you advice at 300 to \$500 an
16 hour. It makes no sense. The position is budgeted. We
17 need the position. It's a valuable management personnel
18 tool that in many instances would take up and take the
19 place of your board secretary, if they weren't around or
20 whatever. I mean, it doesn't make any sense. It's a
21 person with a postgraduate degree. We don't have any
22 people with the exception.... generally, we don't have
23 any person who work with us with postgraduate degrees. We
24 need this as a full-time position. Your lawyer is your
25 advisor. That's my point.

1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: And you have a right for your
2 point. My concern is this and like I said, I don't have
3 any problem with what you guys want to do. But the lawyer
4 that we have, he has to follow the Charter. After he
5 follows the charter, he's basically has to also check in
6 with the law department. Whatever lawyer you have, has to
7 be in tune with the law department for the City of
8 Detroit. I'm just saying to you again, if that's what you
9 want to spend money on, just someone to sit around here
10 and just a body to sit around here and basically to do
11 that, that's fine. I just feel that a contract lawyer, a
12 good lawyer does not need to be full-time. Is there
13 anybody else? You normally always have something to say.

14 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Mr. Chairman...

15 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: On the lawyer.

16 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Mr. Chairman,

17 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: You had your say, Ms. Bernard,
18 you are a lawyer.

19 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: What you're saying isn't true,
20 Mr. Chairman.

21 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I'm just saying it is true, but
22 I'm just saying to you...

23 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: The corporation counsel
24 represents the City of Detroit and represents us on
25 litigation matters where we're being sued by police

1 officers or someone like that. Our lawyer represents us
2 on policy matters on internal matters on...

3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Do you think, Commissioner, with
4 all respect, attorney...

5 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: No true. Every department,
6 elected department has its own counsel. Why should the
7 Commission be any different?

8 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Because I'm just saying to you
9 that...

10 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: City Council has their own
11 lawyer. They have the corporation council too, but they
12 have a lawyer and a whole legal team.

13 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Bernard, obviously
14 I don't have the experience or the knowledge and legal
15 terms to handle this with you. I'm just saying to you
16 again, if that's what you want to do and others want to
17 be that way, I'm just here to tell you my point of view
18 and yours. I'm not going to try to get...

19 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Mr. Chairman that's not the...
20 we are an elected body. We are not an appendage to any
21 other office. Every elected body in the city has its own
22 counsel.

23 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: The motion here is to the
24 lawyer. You didn't say contract or nothing, did you?

25 COMMISSIONER HOLT: No, sir. I didn't.

1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: You just said a lawyer.

2 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Oh, I'm on a full-time lawyer,
3 like every other elected body.

4 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I tell you real quickly and I
5 leave tonight, but you're a lawyer, I mean you're the
6 lawyer. So I'm just saying to you again, if I had another
7 lawyer, I would be like Jesus, hanging on the cross.

8 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Very funny.

9 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I'm just playing with you. Go
10 ahead, sir.

11 COMMISSIONER BURTON: You know...

12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner, we talking about
13 the lawyer.

14 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: We're talking about the lawyer.

15 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I know exactly what we're
16 talking about, Mr. Chairman, and your statements and your
17 comments is way out of line when you compare Jesus Christ
18 and, and so forth and you sit here, and you mock
19 commissioners who are making statements and are speaking
20 up on the behalf of the districts. But Mr. Chairman, to
21 get back to business, the Boar's business, the Board of
22 Police Commissioners have been around for 48 years and
23 has always had a full-time attorney to the Board. You
24 know, we cannot be an appendage to the mayor or the
25 chief. We are an independent body. We must follow the

1 Charter. This Board has not been in compliance for some
2 time and it looks like there are commissioners that are
3 part of colluding. Just to read the language here,
4 talking about a contractual attorney, when we are
5 budgeted for a full-time attorney. We have always had a
6 full-time attorney to the Board of Police Commissioners.
7 We have never had a part-time attorney. Like Commissioner
8 Bernard has said that represents the mighty second
9 District. And she speaks for her constituents as well.
10 Like she said that the Board has always had a full-time
11 attorney. We deserve to be able to be in compliance when
12 we need immediate questions answered. We cannot turn to
13 corporation counsel when corporation counsel represents
14 all city departments.

15 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Mr. Chairman, the Chief has a
16 legal staff of \$1.4 million. He has a full-time lawyer
17 and a full-time legal staff. We don't want us to have one
18 lawyer.

19 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner, why are you
20 talking?

21 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: It's because it doesn't make
22 any sense.

23 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: You can't...

24 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Point of order.

25 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: But you have to respect my

1 position. And when I tell you, you have to go through the
2 Chairman. You have to remember that.

3 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Yes, sir.

4 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: You have to go through the
5 Chairman. What I'm saying to you is, the motion is a
6 lawyer.

7 COMMISSIONER BURTON: It was read in here as
8 contractor.

9 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: It is just the motion though,
10 Commissioner. Read the motion.

11 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I read the motion.

12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Can you read the motion again?

13 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Yes. I moved to support the
14 position that the Board hires an attorney for the Board.

15 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: That's what she said. I mean, I
16 know I had a stroke, but it wasn't yesterday. I'm just
17 saying to you, I'm telling you, I'm getting what you
18 want, my man. Let's go through it.

19 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Mr. Chairman. No disrespect. I
20 was interrupted when I was making my statement.

21 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I'm telling you, your statement
22 is always everything over and over

23 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Mr. Chairman, it looks like
24 colluding is going on, on this Board and there was an
25 email that was sent out, asking for contractual attorney.

1 It was also said here...

2 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: What are we doing here though?
3 What are we doing here?

4 COMMISSIONER BURTON: We cannot have a contractual
5 attorney when we have a...

6 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: There's nothing on the Board
7 about a contract...

8 COMMISSIONER BURTON: It was in an email. It was an
9 email that was sent to all 11 commissioners.

10 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: We're talking about now. I'm
11 talking about now. The only reason I'm getting high and
12 loud is because it's my last doggone day. And I'm just
13 telling you that I'm going with this...

14 COMMISSIONER BURTON: This Board is budgeted for a
15 full-time attorney. Once again, on the record, we have
16 never had a part-time attorney. We must follow the
17 Charter. This Board has roughly, nearly what, 3.5 million
18 budget. Why should we have a part-time attorney now, when
19 that's something that we never had before...

20 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: What part did you not
21 understand? We're not talking about an attorney, a part-
22 time attorney. We're talking about an attorney.

23 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Mr. Chairman, it was put in the
24 email...

25 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Through the Chair. The

1 question, move to the question.

2 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Mr. Chairman, I second, the
3 upcoming Vice-Chair's motion that we hire an attorney,
4 pursuant to the budget.

5 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: And the discussion's been taking
6 place and so I'm going have a roll call.

7 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Thank you.

8 MS. WHITE: Yes Sir. Mr.

9 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I'd like to amend that motion.

10 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: The Chair will not accept
11 anything other than the question's being called for.

12 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Point of order, Mr. Chairman,
13 you can amend a motion.

14 MS. WHITE: Mr. Vice-Chair - Yes.

15 MS. WHIT: Commissioner Bernard - Yes. A full-time
16 attorney.

17 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Banks - Yes.

18 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Burton - I support a full-
19 time attorney. Yes, for a full-time attorney.

20 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Moore - Yes.

21 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Hernandez - Yes.

22 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Holt - Yes.

23 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Pressley - Yes.

24 MS. WHITE: Mr. Chair - Yes.

25 MS. WHITE: There were 9 =Yes votes. The motion

1 passed.

2 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Mr. Chairman.

3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: New business. Yes.

4 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Before we go on, I just want the
5 personnel and training committee to follow up
6 aggressively on these and ask for a weekly report on how
7 the status is because this has been going on so long. I
8 think that committee needs to give us a weekly report on
9 everything we just voted on.

10 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I disagree with you, but we can
11 do that. But the point is that we just started it.
12 There's nothing to report because we had another
13 position, another situation where we had interims. So
14 that's no more. That's not been going on.

15 COMMISSIONER MOORE: I just don't want it to be
16 discussed, like we did today, take these votes, and then
17 all of a sudden we just...

18 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Right. You have my support on
19 that.

20 COMMISSIONER MOORE: And that's what I mean. So,
21 therefore, if the personnel and training committee can
22 just brief us on what's taking place?

23 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: And make sure they do, okay.

24 COMMISSIONER MOORE: That's your Chair elect.

25 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I know, but he's much smart than

1 I am. New business, any new business. Hearing no new
2 business, announcements.

3 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Mr. Chairman

4 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: New business.

5 COMMISSIONER BURTON: He had his hand up for new
6 business.

7 COMMISSIONER BANKS: You can go ahead.

8 COMMISSIONER BURTON: You had your hand up. I'm going
9 yield for you.

10 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Somebody has talk to me.

11 COMMISSIONER BANKS: I was just saying, he can go
12 ahead, if he wanted to.

13 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I'm just saying... you're the
14 bishop, you talked to me.

15 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Oh, okay. Through the Chair. I
16 know today is your last day but thank you for helping me
17 make this transition easier in my first six months here.
18 You've truly been a father figure to this Board. I
19 appreciate you and I love you, man.

20 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you, and love you back.
21 Thank you. Commissioner Burton.

22 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Yes, Mr. Chairman. I wanted to
23 amend the motion that the Board has voted on because it's
24 very important that we don't send out miscommunications
25 and it's very important that this Board shouldn't

1 participate in any colluding that can come back in some
2 form of litigation against this Board. So I want to make
3 a motion for the Board to hire a full-time attorney, like
4 we have always bee.

5 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: We just did that.

6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: We just did it.

7 COMMISSIONER BURTON: But in the email it says
8 contractual...

9 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Through the Chair, the motion
10 supersedes any email.

11 COMMISSIONER BURTON: All right. But thank you.
12 Commissioner Moore and Commissioner Bernard. So, you
13 know...

14 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Mr. Chair, if I could, I just
15 want to encourage us in wisdom and that if we are indeed
16 concerned about litigation that would be mindful of the
17 words that we use. There have been some accusations of
18 collusion without any evidence being presented. And I
19 think it's important that we keep the integrity of this
20 Board even by its own commissioners. So again, I just
21 want to encourage us to be very mindful of the words we
22 use.

23 COMMISSIONER BURTON: This Board has been colluding
24 for a long time, and...

25 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Well then if you believe

1 that, there should be some action on your part that shows
2 it, because you also are part of this Board and if you
3 believe that we're colluding, then there should be some
4 action to that.

5 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Announcements, please.

6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I just want to say thank you
7 to the Chairman for his leadership, really for the
8 structure, Mr. Chairman, that you have provided the Board
9 in terms of the committees. It was so necessary. You did
10 an excellent job. The revisions to the bylaws that you
11 initiated when you first became chairman were also
12 significant. I think it moved us forward from an
13 organizational structural organizational standpoint in a
14 manner that was necessary and obviously your attempts and
15 the many, many memorandums that you've published
16 regarding decorum, et cetera, have also been impressive
17 and a mark of sound leadership. I don't always agree with
18 you on everything that you say or do, but that's not the
19 point. The point is that you have moved the needle
20 forward and that's all that I think we can you know, we
21 can all appreciate that. Thank you for that. And for the
22 fact that it has taken a lot of time. I mean, tons of
23 time, hundreds of hours.

24 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I thank you so much,
25 Commissioner. You're very nice and thank you so much and

1 all that. Announcements please.

2 MS. BLOSSON: Mr. Chairman, the announcements are
3 that the next meeting is Thursday, July 7th, at 3:00 PM
4 here at Detroit Public Safety Headquarters. The next
5 community meeting is Thursday, July 14th, at 6:30 PM in
6 the Tenth Precinct service area. The whole site is the
7 Detroit Union Carpenters and Mill Rights Training Center.
8 It's a new facility at 7515 Elmhurst. For monthly
9 community meeting announcements, please note that the
10 committee meetings are held every second Wednesday of the
11 month. The meetings in July will be the budget committee
12 on Wednesday, July 13th at 2:00 PM, followed by the
13 policy committee at 3:00 PM, followed by the personnel
14 and training committee at 4:00 PM, followed by the
15 citizen complaints committee at 4:30 PM. Also as a
16 reminder, because the Board is meeting today, Tuesday,
17 there is no Thursday meeting this week.

18 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you, Ms. Blossom. Thank
19 you so much for your timely... that you've given us today
20 doing double duties. I appreciate it so much. You may
21 call oral communications.

22 MS. BLOSSOM: Oral communications and public
23 comments. Mr. Chairman, there were four people last week
24 in zoom who did not get an opportunity to speak. I'm
25 going to let those four speakers, at your direction, go

1 first. They will be Bernice Smith followed by Eric
2 Blount, followed by Tara Brown. And I apologize, Tara
3 Brown.

4 MS. BROWN: Yes.

5 MS. BLOSSOM: Thank you. I apologize by
6 mispronouncing one's name and please note public comments
7 are limited to two minutes.

8 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: You said four. I have three.

9 MS. BLOSSOM: Mr. Scotty Bowman was on the line last
10 week. He is not here today. However, we did call and
11 remind everyone that the meeting would be Tuesday this
12 week.

13 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much.

14 MS. BLOSSOM: You're welcome, sir.

15 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Ms. Smith. Thank you for being
16 with us today.

17 MS. SMITH: Good afternoon and I'm going to be brief
18 because time is of the essence. It's a shame that you
19 can't come here and communicate with each other without
20 all the discussion. I am very ashamed of you. I came here
21 with a happy thought. So I will continue with my happy
22 thought. Last night was so tremendous, I'm just
23 overwhelmed. The Chief and his crew, they did a hell of a
24 good job. It was wonderful. I was at the bottom of
25 Woodward sitting there because I'm allowed to sit there.

1 In the meantime Hayes, you did a wonderful job. You came
2 along with the Chief in the car and then you did a happy
3 thing for me. You acknowledged my 90th birthday and you
4 had me get out of my car and take pictures. And I thought
5 that was really wonderful. Of over seven officers. That
6 was Fitzgerald and whatever, it was about seven of us, I
7 can't think of all of their names, but it was a wonderful
8 event.

9 MS. SMITH: And I'm just so happy that we acted human
10 last night. I will tell you what happened to me Friday,
11 because I was on my shift and this young man came down
12 the street with this gun strapped all the way across him.
13 I was surprised, I was shocked and I called him to my car
14 and I asked him, young man, why are you having this gun?
15 Why are you down here in Greektown? He said, well it is,
16 and what is it? Open, whatever you call it. And I said,
17 but it's not necessary. You're here to have yourself a
18 good enjoyment down here with the people. Do you want
19 somebody to bump into you and then you're going to
20 initiate a fight or you want to shoot your gun. It's not
21 necessary. And I wish you would think about it before you
22 come out your house again, carrying it.

23 MS. SMITH: I don't care about that law that we have,
24 it's not necessary. Then I got the boys, the young men
25 with the pants down. I had about four or five of them. So

1 they were very intelligent and they said, thank you
2 grandmama. They call me grandmamma now. So in the
3 meantime, I want this city to know, we have a hell of a
4 good police department. We have a good chief and we have
5 good personnel that go with it. And I was so proud of
6 them last night for what they did and the people
7 respected them and they went about their business. When
8 the police were directing them to go a certain way to go
9 out.

10 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Your time is up, I'm sorry.

11 MS. SMITH: Well, thank you so much, Holley, for
12 being with us all these many times and I hope you have a
13 wonderful time being safe in your own way. And happy
14 wedding plans.

15 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you.

16 MS. BLOSSOM: Minister Blount is in the zoom room.
17 Minister Blount.

18 MINISTER BLOUNT: Yes. Can you hear me, Board?

19 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes you can.

20 MINISTER BLOUNT: Do I get my two minutes from last
21 week and this week?

22 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Yes, he does.

23 MINISTER BLOUNT: Thank you. I'll start with this
24 week and then backtrack to last week. This Ethics Board,
25 which is another oversight Board, does it right by

1 ensuring that even their training system is not connected
2 or linked to the City of Detroit. But the public needs to
3 know if the Ethics Board has an attorney and is it also
4 the general counsel of the City of Detroit? I have long
5 complained of this conflict of interest, which to me is
6 very clear and open. Secondly, to the Ethics Board. Is it
7 ethical? Is it standard conduct or is it a conflict of
8 interest for the same law department to represent the
9 city and this independent oversight Board called the
10 Board of Police Commissioners?

11 MINISTER BLOUNT: Next is it ethical for a current
12 Commissioner on this Board with the authority to
13 discipline city employees to receive a gift from the city
14 by way of the city approving the construction of a new
15 building that will bear this Commissioner's name while
16 the Commissioner is still a current Commissioner. And
17 yes, I'm speaking to you, Reverend Holley. It is
18 heartbreaking to witness the new commissioners,
19 especially the religious leaders to fall in line with the
20 corruption of this Board. One can only imagine the system
21 used to trick or convince you to go along with this scam
22 this Board pulls on the City of Detroit. One can only
23 imagine the types of political favors and debts created
24 to hang over your head and corner you into this, look
25 over their structural system, designed to avoid focusing

1 on the majority of the time and resources that are stated
2 for this Board, which is to address police misconduct.

3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Then go on.

4 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: It's the second two minute.

5 MS. BLOSSOM: Minister Blount, you may continue.

6 MINISTER BLOUNT: Yes. To straighten up your back
7 will require you to accept being hated by this world. But
8 recall Jesus was the most hated religious person in all
9 of the Northern kingdom of Judah and the Southern kingdom
10 of Israel. Recall the Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.
11 On the year he was assassinated was given the title by
12 the U.S. Federal Bureau of Investigation, as public
13 enemy, number one. Now back to last week's comments. It
14 was by divine order that the January 6th hearing
15 coincided with the exact day and time as this Board's
16 meeting because this January 6th hearing committee gets
17 it right. They ask all the pertinent questions, they
18 demand subpoenas, they record things and they make it
19 available to the public. Why has no one questioned all
20 the systems and the procedures implemented by former
21 Chief Craig, his longstanding and continued to this day
22 support for Donald Trump that included all the seven
23 years he was chief of police here in Detroit, in
24 particular, the surveillance systems of facial
25 recognition ShotSpotter and recently revealed camera

1 surveillance systems installed at the bus stops and any
2 other surveillance systems that the public and this Board
3 of Police Commissioners may not be aware of. And I want
4 to thank Assistant Chief Fitzgerald last week, week
5 before for he is the only DPD official to accurately and
6 honestly answer the question that ShotSpotter does and
7 can record voice conversations.

8 MINISTER BLOUNT: This crime summit is again, BOPC
9 Commissioners are not crime fighters. This Board was not
10 designed to fight crime, but to address police
11 misconduct.

12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you Mr. Blount. Thank you
13 very much. You know, Mr. Blount, I've been on this Board
14 for four years and then another five years, and I've been
15 listening to your constructive criticism and obviously
16 you have a right to do that. I have never seen any person
17 that doesn't ever have nothing good to say about this
18 Board in the four years I've been here, nothing. And also
19 Mr. Blount, I'm building an \$18 million building. The
20 city gave the, gave the community 1.8 million. Maybe if
21 and the same thing that Mr. Gibbick would do. He gets
22 money from building buildings. Why couldn't the community
23 get a building just like other people that build
24 buildings? And perhaps if you build a building, you'll
25 get the same thing. But to criticize me over and over

1 again about something I'm doing for the community and you
2 are doing nothing, but basically hating.

3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I resent that. And as a
4 minister, that basically it is unfounded for a minister
5 to have that kind of spirit, day in and week in and week
6 out. I say it in all kindness, all respect. I think it's
7 seven, eight years old, 50 years as a pastor, I have a
8 right to at least say to you, I feel like it is unwanted.
9 This Board is good for this community. It has done great
10 work down through the years. And I think for the most
11 part, if you really feel like we can do better, perhaps
12 you ought to run for position and get on the Board and be
13 from this side rather than that side. But you do have a
14 right and I respect that right. But I'm just saying to
15 you again, it's my last day and I just can't take it
16 anymore. I can't take it anymore because I feel like as a
17 minister to minister, and this is not the public. I met
18 with you when I first came to be president of the Board,
19 I met with you and tried to basically feel you out and
20 you should feel me out. And yet, we come to the end of
21 this time together and we still on opposite viewpoints.
22 Nevertheless, I respect you, I respect your ministry and
23 I respect the words that you give every day. I just
24 happen to disagree with you. Let's go to the next person.

25 MS. BLOSSOM: Mr. Chairman, your next speaker is Tara

1 Brown and she'll be followed by Ms. Joy and will be
2 followed by Victoria Shaw, Tom Stevens, former
3 commissioner William Davis. And the final speaker will be
4 Yayava Kaiser.

5 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Ms. Brown. Thank you for being
6 here this afternoon.

7 MS. BROWN: Hi, thank you all for having me. My name
8 is Tara Brown. I am from District 5 and I'm a member of
9 Detroit eviction defense. The reason I'm coming to you
10 all yet again; the last time I made public comment, it
11 was to address the fact that we still have a problem with
12 police officers from Detroit, illegally evicting tenants.
13 Right now we're working with a woman, Miss Kaiser, who is
14 on the line, who was facing an eviction. She was tricked
15 with a housing scam. She ended up leasing a house that
16 didn't belong to the person who leased it to her. The
17 owner of the house actually took her to court under an
18 all occupant's kind of court case. They ended up going to
19 court. Ms. Kaiser was given X amount of days to leave.
20 Prior to her leaving, the Detroit police showed up at her
21 house, arrested her in front of her 15 year old son and
22 took her to jail for squatting.

23 MS. BROWN: She is currently being charged with
24 squatting. The only problem is she had authorization to
25 be there for another, I think maybe three to five days

1 before she was arrested. Once she was arrested, all of
2 her belongings were thrown into the street. All her and
3 her son's belongings were thrown into the street and they
4 lost their home. By the time she got out of jail, a
5 couple of days later, her home was boarded up and she had
6 no place to go. She's now living in a hotel in the City
7 of Detroit. This continues to happen and I am just a
8 person with Detroit eviction defense. And I was actually
9 able to go online, find in the register of actions in the
10 public record for 36 District Court, the actual court
11 case and the dates and it is showing that there was an
12 agreement that Ms. Kaiser would leave.

13 MS. BROWN: So I'm just trying to figure out how the
14 Detroit police with all their resources were not able to
15 look in the register of actions under the people that
16 they were supposedly representing and find this register
17 of action, showing that, yeah, you may want Ms. Kaiser
18 out now, but she's not squatting because she still has a
19 couple of days before. And I was on the roster for last
20 week. So I like my other two minutes for this week. Yeah,
21 Ms. Kaiser, like I said, was arrested. There's still a
22 court case pending and the officer, this is the second
23 time that this has happened. The last time I was here, I
24 was addressing Whitney Bernie, who was thrown out of her
25 house right before Christmas when the Detroit police

1 swooped in on behalf of her landlord and threw her out. I
2 get it. The Detroit police's job is to protect and serve,
3 but it's not to act as a bailiff for landlords who are
4 not handling their business.

5 MS. BROWN: If you can't afford to be a landlord,
6 then maybe you shouldn't be a landlord. The other problem
7 is even with an eviction, the landlord has to be in
8 compliance with the City of Detroit. I again, was able to
9 go online and see that this particular landlord doesn't
10 appear to be in compliance with the City of Detroit and
11 yet an investigator and charged this woman and was able
12 to get a warrant issue without even looking at any of
13 this particular information. And once again, it seems to
14 be the same detective, Detective Listene Gilbert I think
15 her name is. And again, your name keeps coming up with
16 all these squatting incidents. Again, I understand that
17 Detroit police has an obligation to protect and serve,
18 but it doesn't have an obligation to be an enforcer for
19 landlords who don't take the time to go file motions in
20 court and do the right thing and evict them with the
21 bailiff properly. The only time the Detroit police should
22 be showing up to an eviction is when the bailiff comes to
23 put you out and you're not in compliance with the
24 bailiff.

25 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Let me ask you this, Ms. Brown,

1 because you mentioned, I think in the middle of the
2 street there in the middle of Woodward. Chief, that's not
3 something that we can give to you that based on where
4 this is going?

5 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Absolutely. I can certainly
6 receive that and ensure that it gets to the right arm of
7 the department to look into it.

8 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: But also Ms. Brown this is a
9 good guy right here, okay. So, I want to make sure you
10 get with him. But also I think this also is a ministerial
11 thing too, so let me help you. Between the two of us, we
12 will have her a place to stay.

13 MS. BROWN: She has a place to stay, but...

14 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: But according to what she said
15 in the street. And that is that she basically has to have
16 something to sustain her.

17 MS. BROWN: Absolutely.

18 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: And that's where the ministry
19 comes in. So I'm just saying to you, again, between the
20 two of us, we will work this out. I'll give you my number
21 and you can call me in the morning by 11 o'clock, after
22 you get his number too. And between the two of us, we'll
23 take care of this.

24 MS. BROWN: And thank you, Reverend Holley. And I
25 just wanted to point out with the last 35 seconds. The

1 reason that I'm bringing this up is because Whitney,
2 Bernie, the woman that I addressed the first time I came
3 for public comment is now suing the city. You can go into
4 the register of actions for Wayne County and she's suing
5 the city. Ms. Kaiser, yes, lawyers are reaching out and
6 she too will probably be suing the city. And I understand
7 that the city is going to be sued, but what the city
8 should not be being sued for is evicting people illegally
9 or otherwise. Thank you,

10 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Mr. Chairman, if I might just
11 quickly. I understand, I know that the city's going to be
12 sued in both those cases. There's no question about it,
13 but you've raised the possibility of improper behavior by
14 a detective who you named as well as by other officers.
15 And I think the Board can request that you look into that
16 and report back to the Board, with the Chairman's
17 permission.

18 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Through the Chair, we will take
19 this information...

20 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: And would you report back to
21 the Board? This is important

22 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Through the Chair. Absolutely.
23 And if I may, if there's allegations of officer
24 misconduct certainly the OCA excuse me, the OCI arm can
25 assist and look into this matter as well. So we jointly

1 will look at these actions and address any impropriety by
2 a member of this department.

3 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you. Thank you Mr.
4 Chairman.

5 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much.

6 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Yes, sir.

7 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Ms. Blossom, the next person
8 please.

9 MS. BLOSSOM: Ms. Joy, followed by Victoria Shaw, who
10 will be followed by Tom Stevens, William Davis and Yayava
11 Kaiser. Thank you.

12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Ms. Joy, how are you today?

13 MS. JOY: I'm tremendously blessed as usual,
14 Commissioner Holley, Chair Holley and welcome to the
15 honorable Board. As usual, I appreciate all of you and
16 the great work that you've done down to the years and
17 Chair, the thing that you just did to help and assist
18 this young lady is the same thing that Commissioner
19 Brooks did for me. When I first started coming here to
20 the Board of Police Commissioner's meetings, I was
21 homeless and I had nowhere to go. Commissioner Brooks saw
22 to it with an entourage that day, I had somewhere to
23 stay, with everything that needed to get started with
24 including food brought to the door. I didn't even have to
25 go down and eat with everyone else. They knocked at the

1 door and brought it to me. And so I was treated royally
2 as a citizen. I'm still just a citizen.

3 MS. JOY: I don't hold a title. I don't work for DPD.
4 I'm not forced to say anything good about anybody here.
5 It is because I appreciate it on my own commissioners and
6 the hard work that you all have done. Chair Holley, you
7 mentioned about the food and you also helped there as
8 well as housing like what you did for the young lady. I
9 commend you very highly for that, as well as your
10 diplomacy throughout your tenure as the Chair for the DPD
11 and the Board of Police Commissioners, and also the
12 assistant to you, Commissioner Ferguson and the work that
13 you all do together and collectively the work that the
14 commissioners do in this city, and throughout this city
15 is wonderful. I am no longer homeless. I started here
16 homeless. I am no longer homeless. I have a lot of things
17 that I could contend with in my personal life. The police
18 department come to help me in my aid, come to my home and
19 help me. You all help me on the phone. Whatever I need,
20 or anybody in the city needs, the commissioners have
21 reached out to help.

22 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much.

23 MS. JOY: And I've watched it on online and it is
24 just amazing how you all just stand up. Commissioner Hope
25 as well.

1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much, your time...

2 MS. JOY: Thank you so much. I do appreciate
3 everyone.

4 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: And we thank you so much.

5 MS. JOY: Yes, sir.

6 MS. SHAW: Good evening, honorable Board.

7 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: So good to see you again.

8 MS. SHAW: Good to see you as well. Victoria Shaw,
9 District &, Grand River community block club. First of
10 all, Chair Holley, your seat gets super, super hot. I
11 hope that the Board is planning something really nice for
12 him to see him out of this seat because it's hot. Also if
13 the Board could please post a recording for last week's
14 meeting as soon as possible, because those of us on zoom
15 have not been able to catch up with that. I have a couple
16 things I know that Chief White often has to leave. I hope
17 that this feedback for both these items can make it over
18 to him. So the first one is, through the Chair, I
19 appreciate Commissioner Moore for bringing up the
20 question about 911. And when we call whether it's for
21 gunshots or drag racing, and we don't know the address or
22 the intersection.

23 MS. SHAW: We don't really know what to say because
24 the operator is asking for that information and requires
25 that information. And I know the chief kind of digressed

1 a little bit on ShotSpotter, which is fine, but we still
2 need to look at either the procedure for the operators or
3 some guidance to the citizens, because I know for me,
4 it's deterred me from calling in future instances because
5 I'm like, I'm not really sure where this is. Exactly. So
6 that's something we need to look at. Also, I did not stay
7 for the fireworks, but I did go down and check out
8 evolve. The setup looked really good. The signage was
9 clear. I do want to give kudos and thank you to two
10 officers. Officer Rizzo from Precinct 4 and Officer
11 Willis from Precinct 7. They gave me a demo of the
12 system. Let me walk through. I saw the screen. I saw when
13 the officer walked through how it picks up the firearm
14 and everything. So they were very nice professional and I
15 look forward to further discussions on how the system
16 will be used for smaller gatherings in the community when
17 we request them. Thank you.

18 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you. Ms. Victoria, the
19 Deputy Chief may say something to you.

20 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Mr. Chair. Thank you. To answer
21 both of your questions as it relates to 911, give what
22 you have, because believe me, it is vital. If you say,
23 hey, I live at 1, 2, 3, my training sergeant used to say
24 2224 Blain. So let's say you live at 2224 Blain and you
25 can call and say, I live at this address and I hear

1 gunshots in the area or I hear racing cars in the area
2 because now we have an area to start or track from. And
3 we know if we get another call and it may be a little
4 north. We now know that somewhere in between you were
5 there and that gives us a place to look a place to
6 canvas, whether it be for that vehicle, whether it be for
7 someone that may possibly have been injured through that
8 gunfire, that was certainly inappropriate, if is not at a
9 range, it shouldn't be happening. So every bit of
10 information you give is certainly valuable. So please by
11 all means, continue to call, please don't be discouraged
12 because it helps us keep the community safe.

13 MS. SHAW: That's great. Is it okay to respond to
14 that?

15 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Sure, you can.

16 MS. SHAW: Okay. So perhaps some guidance for the
17 operators. So if someone says, well, I'm not sure exactly
18 where it is. Maybe the operator can come back and say,
19 well, that's fine. Can you give your address or address
20 nearby? And we know to search that area.

21 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Absolutely.

22 MS. SHAW: Thank you.

23 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: I know the operator's boss, so
24 that won't happen. And as far as the evolve, Officers
25 Rizzo and Willis are two new officers that are from the

1 academy and are part of the Chief's initiative to know
2 this city a little more intimately before they go to
3 their precinct, where they're out walking community
4 engagement foot beats and walking and being engaged in,
5 although there are a few that wear the insignia
6 neighborhood police officer. It is the Chief's belief
7 that we are all neighborhood police officers. So those
8 officers were assigned into the Chief's detail. I will
9 certainly acknowledge your appreciation of them being
10 ambassadors of the agency and certainly of the technology
11 that we use. That's invaluable. As far as the use for
12 evolve, I will share my information with you, and give
13 you my email address.

14 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: We will build out a system in
15 concert with the department of neighborhood's office that
16 you can call your District manager and request it. And
17 then from that DPD will deliver them to whatever event
18 you may be having, presence only when called upon. So if
19 you have a security plan or someone looking over that
20 they can watch the monitors. And if that box goes off
21 certainly you can bring it to our attention. And we will
22 constitutionally address the matter someone may have the
23 permit and lawfully be carrying or whatever that looks
24 like, but we will certainly, and constitutionally work in
25 concert to make the technology available to you. And as

1 far as that Chief's program with Rizzo and Willis, I know
2 their boss too. So as soon as we get done, I'm going to
3 have a conversation after the communications and commend
4 them and put that in their file to show that they are
5 everything we've asked them to be wearing this badge.

6 MS. SHAW: Awesome. That's great. So, as DPD is
7 working with the department of neighborhoods to build out
8 the processes and procedures for using the evolve in the
9 community, is it possible to engage some of the community
10 members to kind of give some input and some thoughts
11 around some things that you might not already be
12 considering

13 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: I can, absolutely. They belong
14 to you.

15 MS. SHAW: Okay. Sounds good. Thank you.

16 MS. BLOSSOM: Mr. Chairman, the next speaker is Tom
17 Stevens followed by William Davis and the last speaker
18 will be Yayava Kaiser. Mr. Stevens.

19 MR. STEVENS: Yes, good afternoon. And thank you for
20 the opportunity to speak. I did have one question
21 regarding noise ordinances in the city. I have witnessed
22 over and over and over motorcycles, downtown area,
23 Midtown area at all hours. And I'm talking about two, one
24 to two, three in the morning playing music on these, on
25 their motorcycles. And I've seen police cars that have

1 driven right by them and have not done anything about it.
2 So I was curious what the noise ordinance is and whether
3 or not it's actually being policed.

4 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Through the Chair.

5 DEPUTY HAYES: Through the Chair. So absolutely. If
6 you go through downtown you you'll see signage we have
7 started an education campaign, right? As it relates to
8 educating this community, we believe we should educate
9 before we enforce. And from that we, we will have a
10 conversation individuals that come to this area may not
11 know that you can't have an audible sound or emit an
12 audible sound that can be heard greater than distances of
13 50 feet. So we certainly do the best we can with that.
14 The other things that we may deal with is that while they
15 may have the music blaring, sometimes they see us before
16 we see them, and while they may have driven past you, by
17 the time they get to us that music is turned down.

18 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: So I say that to say that we're
19 certainly not perfect but we commit to fostering a, a, a
20 peaceful environment holding those accountable when we
21 need to, again, constitutionally, but we will continue to
22 work at it. And as you mentioned, downtown that is an
23 area that we have worked with and we have seen some gains
24 in the last few weeks and those repeat offenders, we have
25 transitioned to issuing ordinances as we see the

1 education has not changed the behavior as we anticipated
2 it would. So we will continue to work at it, hold us
3 accountable, come back maybe in a month, if you would,
4 we'd love to have an update and hopefully it'll be a
5 favorable one that you see the progress of your police
6 department.

7 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you so much.

8 MS. BLOSSOM: William Davis.

9 MR. DAVIS: Good afternoon. Can I be heard?

10 MS. BLOSSOM: Yes, sir. We can hear you.

11 MR. DAVIS: Okay, great. Well, I would like to start
12 off by saying that myself, my son and my grandson, we
13 went to the fireworks yesterday and we enjoyed it
14 thoroughly. Also like to say that there's a tele of two
15 public bodies the Detroit City Council and the Board of
16 Police Commissioners meeting last week, both had issues
17 with zoom, but the Detroit City Council, they adjourned
18 that meeting and would not take any votes and would not
19 do no anything until they were able to resume with zoom.

20 MR. DAVIS: So the public had an opportunity to see
21 action and see votes as it was going on. That did not
22 happen with the Detroit Board of Police Commissioners. I
23 was on zoom last week as I am every week. And, you know,
24 I feel that you all regularly like to disregard the Open
25 Meetings Act. And you should also take note of the fact

1 that the Open Meeting Act was expanded just last month,
2 in May. This Board should be more aware of what they're
3 doing and how they're doing and how it looks to the
4 public. The Board should be an example of doing what's
5 right. And I have a number of issues with Detroit City
6 Council, but at least they are acting a little bit
7 better. You say that you have a corporation counsel
8 representative there, they should be pointing some of
9 this stuff out to you more forcefully. So I thought I
10 would brighten up your day on my birthday. So you all
11 have a great day.

12 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Happy birthday former
13 commissioner.

14 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Happy Birthday.

15 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Is it...?

16 MS. BLOSSOM: Yayava Kaiser and please excuse any
17 mispronunciation?

18 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yaya.

19 MS. KAISER: Yaya is actually a title because I am an
20 ordained minister through the World Church, but Tara
21 Brown did speak on my behalf. I did see Reverend Holley
22 downtown as a protest to homelessness, but I did become
23 homeless because Detective Lestine Gilbert chose to put a
24 warrant out on me. She did threaten me with warrants in a
25 situation that really had nothing to do with her. I was

1 moved into a home. I was scammed out of it. That was
2 fine. I was taken to court by a company that didn't even
3 have the right to take me to court. I was aggressively
4 arrested in front of my 15 year old child as he was
5 walking home from school. And I actually had 20 more days
6 to be in that home and to gather my things properly and
7 to move.

8 MS. KAISER: I did not come to Detroit to cause
9 trouble. I came to Detroit as a musical artist, as a
10 worldwide known healer as a community activist and healer
11 of any community that I'm in, a nurturer of my community.
12 I make jewelry. I I'm a spiritual advisor. I'm a
13 certified life coach. I'm just a lover of my people. And
14 I came here with the energy of, I guess, what Motown had,
15 and realized that sadly, that's not what I was moving
16 into. Overnight I lost everything. Overnight, my child
17 lost everything. Every tool that I built, every class
18 that every course that I built to help the community, not
19 only here in Detroit, but everywhere around the world was
20 taken from me overnight. And she's been allowed to be a
21 bully behind this badge for a long time. So I'm bringing
22 this issue because yes, I am homeless, sleeping in a
23 hotel paid by the city, but that doesn't last forever. My
24 life has been flipped upside down and I don't think she
25 thought I was going to appear in a meeting like this to

1 open my mouth, but I'm a fighter and I'm not going to
2 stop fighting until I get some resolution as to this
3 woman in her badge and how she abuses it. That's what I
4 have to say.

5 MS. BLOSSOM: Mr. Chairman, that was your last
6 speaker because it was raised with respect to last week's
7 meeting and the lost zoom connection, I want to share
8 with the Board and with the listening audience that the
9 city is working to edit the film, to include the closed
10 captioning and to post that video as soon as possible.
11 Media services capture the meeting in its entirety. So
12 whatever the zoom audience missed, they'll be able to see
13 the full meeting once it's posted to the website. Thank
14 you, Mr. Chairman.

15 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you. Ms. Brown, based on
16 the complaint that she was saying, what he's asking, the
17 deputy chief, you need to make sure, if she wants to do
18 that, that's where she starts, okay.

19 MS. BROWN: Thank you.

20 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Oh, no. Thank you. I thank all
21 of you. Thank you so much. You have something you want to
22 say nice to the deputy chief?

23 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Deputy Chief. That was real
24 nice, wonderful how you came to the young lady's rescue,
25 bringing her into a place of comfort, security, and

1 peace. I thought that was wonderful how you stepped up
2 deputy chief.

3 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Through the Chair. Thank you,
4 Commissioner

5 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair.

6 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Now tell what you would tell any
7 of us, if Chief was here, what the Chief would tell him
8 back? What the Chief say back? What we're supposed to do?

9 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: That's exactly... I understand
10 that I'm just a vessel to help bring the resources of the
11 police department to those that are in need.

12 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Somebody is saying he's a
13 preacher already.

14 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I know, he does a good
15 impression. The Chair would recognize a motion to
16 adjourn.

17 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Just one move.

18 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I'm sorry.

19 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: No, I just wanted to say
20 Chief, you should note that there were three complaints
21 about that officer on the record here tonight. So it is
22 worthy of your attention. That was all Mr. Chairman.

23 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: You recognize a motion?

24 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: So moved.

25 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Support.

1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: All in favor, say aye.

2 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Any opposed? Thank you so much.
