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BOARD OF POLICE COMMISSIONERS

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BOPC VIRTUAL MEETING

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August 4, 2022 at 3:00 P.M.

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1 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: I'm the Chairperson of the
2 Board of Police Commissioners. This meeting will now come
3 to order. Again, I want to thank you for attending this
4 Board meeting today. Recent reports have revealed that
5 four Louisville, Kentucky police officers have been
6 indicted on federal charges related to the fatal
7 encounter with Breonna Taylor. As this case progresses
8 through the justice system, we will continue to monitor
9 it for important lessons for any police agency and the
10 community. As previously evaluated, we continue to work
11 with the department towards ensuring our policies and
12 procedures are in line with best practices and allow for
13 safe community policing. At this time, we will have an
14 invocation by Chaplain Carol Caldwell.

15 CHAPLAIN ESTES: Good afternoon, with respect to the
16 Chair, Chaplain Caldwell could not be with us this
17 afternoon and so my name is Chaplain Anthony Estes, and I
18 will be offering the invocation in her stead. Let us
19 pray. We fervently ask you almighty God to pour your
20 blessing upon this Board of Police Commissioners and all
21 staff, officers, and top brass of the Detroit Police
22 Department. During this meeting, give the Commissioners
23 discerning ears as they hear reports and public comments
24 so that in the dispatch of their duties, they may serve
25 faithfully and with integrity. Amen.

1 COMMISSIONERS: Amen.

2 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Thank you.

3 CHAPLAIN ESTES: Thank you.

4 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Roll call please, Madam
5 Secretary.

6 MS. WHITE: Yes, sir. Through the Chair, Madam Vice-
7 Chair, Annie Holt, submitted an excused absence
8 notification.

9 MS. WHITE: Commissioner, Jim Holley - Present.

10 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Jesus Hernandez - Present.

11 MS. WHITE: Chair, QuanTez Pressley is enroute.

12 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Linda Bernard - Attorney
13 Linda Bernard, District 2 - Present.

14 MS. WHITE: Commissioner, Cedric Banks - Present.

15 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Willie E. Bell - Present,
16 District 4.

17 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Willie E. Burton -

18 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Lisa Carter is also in
19 route.

20 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Ricardo Moore submitted an
21 excused to absence notification. Mr. Chair, you do have a
22 forum.

23 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you. I will now I'd like
24 to entertain a motion for the approval of the agenda for
25 August 4, 2022.

1 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: So moved.

2 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Support.

3 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: All in favor.

4 COMMISSIONERS: Aye?

5 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: All opposed? Motion carries.

6 The minutes for the previous meeting have been
7 distributed on July 28th, 2022. Are there any corrections
8 to the minutes? Hearing none, there are no further
9 corrections for the minutes and will be approved as read.
10 Ms. White, can you introduce your staff, please?

11 MS. WHITE: Yes, sir. Through the Chair, Media
12 Services is handling the Board's audio and visual needs
13 this afternoon and the following Board staff members are
14 as follows: Board Parliamentarian, Dr. Francis Jackson,
15 Assistant Corporation Counsel, Christopher Michaels, Mrs.
16 Theresa Blossom, Community Relations Coordinator, Mr.
17 Robert Brown, Administrative Specialist, Interim Chief
18 Investigator Lawrence Akbar is attending via zoom,
19 Supervising Investigator Rosalia Madrigal attending via
20 zoom, Acting Supervising Investigator LiSonya Sloan and
21 Supervising Investigator Ainsley Cromwell are also in
22 attendance and Director. Katrina Patillo, Director of
23 Police Personnel is in attendance. And if I can also note
24 for the record, Commissioner Willie E. Burton has just
25 arrived. Thank you, sir.

1 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Good afternoon, Chief.

2 CHIEF WHITE: Good afternoon.

3 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: If you like to introduce
4 yourself and introduce who you have on your staff here
5 with you?

6 CHIEF WHITE: I have Deputy Chief Stewart and Deputy
7 Chief Sims. I see the director of HR is here and I can't
8 see past that. The rest of you, you have to introduce
9 yourselves.

10 OFFICERS IN ATTENDANCE: Please introduce yourselves.

11 CHIEF WHITE: And congratulations, doctor. We just
12 hired him, a retired police officer to run policy at
13 planning. So, congratulations. And we also have
14 Lieutenant Mark Young here from the Lieutenants and
15 Sergeants Association.

16 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you.

17 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Also, I have the...

18 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Oh, sorry about that Ron.

19 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Trying to act like he's nothing
20 but jelly.

21 CHIEF WHITE: There's a lot of obstruction here, Ron
22 from DPOA.

23 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Welcome everybody.

24 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Never forget about you, Ron.

25 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Making sure. Madam Secretary,

1 do we have any guests?

2 MS. WHITE: Yes sir. Through the Chair, Ms. Freda
3 Butler, president of the Second Precinct Police Community
4 Relations Council and also on zoom, Miss Marie Overall of
5 State Representative Tyrone Carter's Office and former
6 police commissioner William Davis, and also our American
7 Sign Language interpreters this afternoon, Miss Yakada
8 and Dr. Stephanie Beattie. Thank you.

9 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you. Again, I'd like to
10 thank you all for attending this Board meeting today. We
11 would like to thank Media Services and Civil Rights for
12 their hard work in ensuring that BOPC meeting videos are
13 in compliance with the city's requirements before airing
14 on the city TV or posting to detroitmi.gov. However, in
15 the interval, we posted a link to recent zoom videos
16 under the documents section at the main BOPC page. We
17 thank the public for your patience as all city
18 departments' work together to meet our goals of providing
19 access to the BOPC meeting videos. This past Tuesday, the
20 department and the community participated in a national
21 night out, allowing the community to interact and engage
22 with the department to help build bridges and build
23 enhanced partnerships to make our community safer. We
24 were also in attendance at the various events, held
25 across the city in various precincts.

1 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: We are grateful for
2 opportunities like these that help the community and the
3 department join together because we need everyone working
4 on reducing and preventing and returning crime. On
5 another note, this week, we also attended the press
6 conference on the weekend mass shooting and receive
7 updates on the recent officer-involved shooting incident
8 and other critical updates involving the department and
9 our city. We hope to learn further updates regarding
10 these items towards truly finding a way to increase
11 safety within our community. In keeping with the Board's
12 vision to make our community safer, next month, Thursday,
13 September 8th, 2022 at 6:30 PM at the McKinney Recreation
14 Center located at 22600, I mean 2260 South 4th Street in
15 a multipurpose room, the Board will host his third crime
16 reduction, community safety form entitled, aim to be
17 crime free. As a part of the form, we have invited key
18 officials from the law enforcement tradition and the
19 community at large to discuss strategies and methods
20 towards reducing gun violence in our community.

21 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: We can do this. By the time we
22 leave that room, we should have a plan of action to put
23 together. Now, we may have to tweak it a little bit, but
24 we should be able to do it. You don't want to miss this
25 one, come out to this form and give us some constructive

1 ideas. Let's be a part of the solution to help make our
2 community safer. We owe that to ourselves and to our
3 loved ones. All of the invited panelists are expected to
4 attend, and we look forward to a meaningful event and
5 discussion towards putting our plan to action, to make
6 Detroit safer. Please plan to attend so we can get this
7 thing solved. Also, Commissioners, you may have draft
8 materials for the young advisory panel in your package.
9 So you have them in your package there for the young
10 advisory panel. We continue to appreciate Vice-Chair Holt
11 and Commissioner Carter for their leadership as we
12 prepared to roll out this program with the start of the
13 new school year. Today, we also hear vital updates on
14 crime trends and other DPD matters from the Chief. We're
15 also going to have a closed session today as part of the
16 Board and the department's efforts to continue evaluating
17 and monitoring for the department to ensure compliance
18 with the policies, procedures and the law and towards
19 meeting our Charter mandate of reviewing and acting upon
20 discipline, we have two closed sessions matters.
21 Commissioners, you have received information in your
22 packets and I sure hope you read them because these are
23 important. Today, on our agenda, we'll receive a
24 presentation regarding use of force quarter two report.
25 For our reference and information, we continue to monitor

1 and evaluate this area to see what best practices can be
2 or have to be put to use and the lessons learned towards
3 ensuring a safer police-citizen encounter.

4 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: That means that if something's
5 not working, we're going to change it quickly. In regard
6 to OCI, I would like to thank Interim Chief Investigator,
7 Lawrence Akbar, and his staff and our staff for their
8 hard work investigating and resolving the cases. I put
9 them through a lot, trust me on that, I have. Our Board
10 continues to support Interim Chief Investigator Akbar and
11 his staff, especially in investigating and resolving OCI
12 cases effectively and efficiently. We appreciate the hard
13 work he has done, and he has continued to ensure we are
14 on track towards achieving our OCI goals and to ensure we
15 resolve those cases that require DPD retraining re
16 counseling or discipline. As we continue to investigate
17 OCI complaints, we are making great progress. To be
18 clear, we investigate and resolve all noncriminal police
19 misconduct. Noncriminal police misconduct, even in cases
20 past the 90 day timeframe for foreclosure, the case is
21 still being investigated.

22 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: So if we go past the 90 days,
23 we're still going to investigate it to ensure a
24 resolution. We continue to investigate and resolve cases
25 every single day. Previously it had been reported that

1 cases over 90 days went uninvestigated. The statement is
2 absolutely truly untrue, just simply untrue. It's an
3 untrue statement. The investigation of all cases begins
4 on the day they are received. Please feel free to visit
5 the Board's website or contact our offices,
6 administration, and OCI for more information on the
7 cases, investigation, process, our policies and
8 procedures, and other key information. Commissioners in
9 your packets, you have a copy of the BOPC's weekly case
10 distribution rotation list regarding the cases you
11 received today. This report will be entered into the
12 record at the appropriate time for Board action. So I
13 hope you brought your cases back because you got a packet
14 last week and I hope you did. I turned mine in.

15 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: So please, so we can get these
16 down on a rotation basis every week. Please plan to
17 review your cases and return them by next Thursday. So
18 you're going to get some on Thursday and then turn them
19 back in next Thursday or before. This will ensure that we
20 meet our goal in completing all the cases in a timely and
21 efficient manner. Lastly, one of the duties of the Board
22 Chair is to serve as a Board's official spokesperson,
23 which helps to ensure accurate information about the
24 Board and its work. As stated last week, my staff does a
25 lot of good work. We've added monthly committee meetings,

1 monthly forums, and other platforms to share even more
2 with the Commissioners and the public to ensure public
3 updates and awareness in even greater detail than the
4 weekly meeting, and as we've given you more than just
5 once a week. Again, please utilize these opportunities
6 and contact staff if you want to share recommendations,
7 or constructive criticism, and have any questions about
8 this process or progress. Thank you for your cooperation.

9 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: As I said before, we're going
10 to do this on a test pilot. So we're going straight into
11 oral comment and if it doesn't work, we'll go back the
12 old way. But one thing I have been doing, I've been
13 listening to the community and this is what they asked me
14 to do. And I told them I try it on a test, right? So
15 we'll see how this is going to work out. Mr. Brown.

16 MR. BROWN: Mr. Chair, I currently have seven
17 speakers. Three of those speakers are in attendance. So
18 I'll call them first, Ms. Bernice Smith followed by
19 Lieutenant Mark Young, LSA president followed by Mr.
20 Peter Rhodes.

21 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you. And remember you
22 have two minutes, two minutes. Please be respectful,
23 please. If you are going to criticize, give us criticism
24 so we can help the city and the Board move forward. Thank
25 you. Mother Bernice, two minutes, please?

1 MS. SMITH: Yes, sir. Good afternoon. Chief, I'm glad
2 that you're here at this particular time. I just want to
3 give you kudos for your men down at Greektown where I've
4 been going for the last three, four months on the
5 weekend. And I have no complaints so far. I did see
6 incidents where the girls were attracted to the men, and
7 the policemen, and I thought that they should be on their
8 duty. And I told them that they had to move on. But
9 anyway, what I'm really interested in, I got a call this
10 afternoon, well, yesterday afternoon in regard to the
11 towing. The towing situation there at the medical center
12 has gone out of order, in other words. I was told that
13 now they're charging cars that are parked there illegally
14 or whatever the case may be that they are being charged
15 \$600 to get their cars back.

16 MS. SMITH: I think that's outrageous and I do not
17 approve of this scamming of the people in other words. So
18 that's what I would like to let you know this afternoon.
19 And again, Chief, I appreciate the fact that the police
20 respect me down there and they're doing a darn good job.
21 And I want to let you know personally that you can take
22 my word for it. Because if I see anything wrong, I will
23 report it, but they're doing a good job. And I appreciate
24 the fact that they're protecting the people down there.
25 We do have problems. I know in every case, but down in

1 Greek town there on Monroe and Beaubien, where I do my
2 little survey and then I go to what is it? Hart Plaza,
3 also. I start there. So if we could control the shooting,
4 which I am very upset about, I would be the happiest old
5 woman in the world. Believe me, we need to stop. This is
6 our city and we don't need all this shooting going on.
7 These youngsters need to stop and the parents need to
8 check the youngsters. I give up my time.

9 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Okay. See, I knew you could do
10 it.

11 MR. BROWN: Lieutenant Mark Young.

12 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Mr. Chair.

13 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes.

14 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: My concern is that Chief, are
15 you aware of the towing or \$600 stuff?

16 CHIEF WHITE: I don't think that's city towing. I
17 think that's a private company, but we'll look into it.
18 We don't control the rates of the private companies, but
19 there are some regulations that they're supposed to be
20 capped at, but we'll take a look at it.

21 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: You know what she's talking
22 about?

23 CHIEF WHITE: I think I know what she's talking
24 about.

25 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Very good. Thank you, sir. I

1 should have known that.

2 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: That's outrageous.

3 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Lieutenant Young.

4 LIEUTENANT YOUNG: Every day they face uncertainty.
5 Violence is increasing. I do not blame the police as
6 others do. Seriously allegations have been made against a
7 member of the Office of the Chief Investigator recently,
8 but it's oversight for the police, where is oversight for
9 OCI? Let me be clear, these may only be allegations, but
10 just like the allegations made against me and my
11 colleagues during the course of our duty who holds them
12 accountable? At every meeting, there should be an
13 investigation by a neutral party. How do the alleged
14 victims feel? Are they, or have there been other
15 allegations? Who is conducting the investigations and
16 maybe of individuals that hold us accountable for body
17 cameras during their interactions, just to be cleared up
18 immediately? I don't come here to pontificate. Now, you
19 know how we feel. Imagine how we feel while we still
20 expect to do our jobs. Lack of transparency. Also, the
21 fact that the meetings are not being visual right now
22 says a lot because when I can't make a meeting, I like to
23 see the meeting. And the only reason that I can't make a
24 meeting is because I'm doing my duties.

25 LIEUTENANT YOUNG: Also, paying and supporting

1 protestors was the equivalent of paying terrorists. It
2 sent an awful message to the awesome men and women that I
3 represent of this department that placed their lives on
4 the line in front of this city, doing an incident that we
5 did not create. It was wrong. I don't stand in front of
6 you to pontificate. I stand in front of you to advocate
7 for the men and women of this entire department that risk
8 their lives and give their lives every day for this great
9 city. That's what I came to do. And I'm going to continue
10 to come and do it until people hold us accountable and
11 value, respect, and appreciate us.

12 MR. BROWN: Mr. Peter Rhode.

13 MR. RHODES: Good afternoon. My name is Peter Rhodes.
14 I'm with the Office of Detroit City Council Member,
15 Angela Whitfield Galloway. I'm just here to monitor the
16 meeting and wish you all the best of luck. And that was
17 it until now. People who are suing the City of Detroit
18 and the Detroit Police Department concerning the Detroit
19 Will Breathe, protest are not terrorists. There are
20 citizens of the United States of America and they're
21 entitled to every constitutional right. We may disagree
22 on whether the offer of judgment was correct or incorrect
23 and that's fair, but they're not terrorists.

24 MR. RHODES: That kind of language is above and
25 beyond, it shouldn't be used. They are citizens of the

1 United States with constitutional rights and the officers
2 have constitutional rights also. Thank you very much.

3 MR. BROWN: Mr. Chair. I don't see Minister Eric
4 Blount, so your next three speakers would be by zoom, Ms.
5 Victoria Shaw followed by the former commissioner,
6 William Davis followed by Ms. Vanessa Bryant Alanis. Ms.
7 Shaw.

8 MS. SHAW: Good afternoon, honorable Board. Can you
9 hear me?

10 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes, we can hear you.

11 MS. SHAW: Oh, perfect. Thank you. This is Victoria
12 Shaw, District 7. I'll be real brief today. I just like
13 to thank you Chair Ferguson for considering the public
14 feedback about the structure of public comments in the
15 meetings. We'll see if the community prefers the end, the
16 beginning or some other placement of the public comments,
17 but regardless of where we land with that, this does send
18 a message that the Board is listening to the public and
19 taking public requests and recommendations seriously. So
20 that is a positive thing. I ask that the Board please
21 continue to do that and also listen to the community in
22 all matters of oversight as we have concerns in that
23 space and will continue to provide the Board feedback. It
24 also gives the Chief an opportunity to be present for the
25 public comments, which is great, because I know sometimes

1 he has to leave the meetings early for his
2 responsibility. So this may work out really well. I'd
3 also like to thank the Board for coming up with the
4 interim solution for publishing the videos. Thank you for
5 that. And definitely look forward to moving back to the
6 normal publishing process as soon as the city catches up
7 with what they're working on, on that. Thank you.

8 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you. Mr. Brown.

9 MR. BROWN: Mr. Davis.

10 MR. DAVIS: Good afternoon. Can I be heard?

11 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes you can.

12 MR. DAVIS: Okay. I'd like to start off by
13 emphasizing the need for a truly independent analysis of
14 the information that you're receiving. You know, I like
15 and respect Chief White, but this Board cannot be a true
16 oversight Board if they do not do some of their own
17 analysis. Also, this Board needs to make sure that all
18 the candidates for the Board secretary and for the Chief
19 of OCI go to all the Commissioners because in the past
20 many people have expressed concern about the fact about
21 certain Commissioners are somewhat biased and were trying
22 to keep some of their friends in positions for years that
23 they should not be in. Also, this Board should publish
24 the opinion from the corporation council about those
25 positions. Also, I think that it's good that you have

1 this earlier, but also people should be able to come in
2 after 3:30, between #:30 and 4:00 and still be able to
3 make public comments, especially if a public comment is
4 still going on because we do not want people to be
5 rushing and not be able to speak because a number of
6 people have a number of concerns about what's going on.
7 You know, just like there are a number of people in
8 various NAN chapters in Texas who are looking at the
9 upcoming NACOLE'S convention and we may surprise you with
10 something. Because there are a couple of you all that we
11 think should not be on this Board. Thank you.

12 MR. BROWN: Ms. Alanis.

13 MS. ALANIS: Good afternoon, am I being heard?

14 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes, we can hear you.

15 MS. ALANIS: Thank you. Unfortunately, I do have
16 criticism and I hope you view it as constructive. It is
17 my understanding that there are several former police
18 officers serving as Commissioners, which in itself is not
19 a problem. However, one of your Commissioners last week
20 used a pronoun that I found problematic. He referred to
21 the department as we. And I understand being a former
22 police officer you identified, just like there are no
23 former Marines. I do understand that there are no former
24 police officers. The majority of the police officers do a
25 good job. But what I would like to see is the look of the

1 Board. You are supposed to be an oversight for the Board
2 and not an apologist. Using the pronoun we when you're
3 describing the police officers, whether you're in support
4 of them or not is problematic as a Board member.

5 MS. ALANIS: I also would like to know what is being
6 done to provide the good officers with a sense of
7 security so that they may report the bad actors in the
8 department. And I'm not talking about errors or accidents
9 or momentary lack of judgment. But we know, and even
10 though we cannot prove that there are bad actors in the
11 department and the officers deserve to feel that they can
12 clean up their department without worrying that they
13 don't have a backup in times of crisis. Thank you. That
14 is my time.

15 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you.

16 MR. BROWN: Overwith.

17 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Mr. Overwith. Mr. Overwith.
18 Going once. Mr. Overwith going twice.

19 OVERWITH: Can you hear me? Can I be heard?

20 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: We can hear you. You have
21 feedback, but we can hear you.

22 OVERWITH: Okay. Well, I want to call attention back
23 to Lawrence Akbar, OCI Interim Chief. The man is going to
24 audio recording, telling the Detroit citizens and myself
25 that he will not accept the complaint from me. His

1 reasoning, he never gave a reason. He just said because
2 we can't. He was co-signed by...

3 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Wait. Can I pause you right
4 quick? Let's pause you real quick. If you have a problem,
5 can you call me?

6 OVERWITH: Who was this?

7 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: This is Chair Ferguson.

8 OVERWITH: Oh yeah. Is there a way you can give me
9 the contact information?

10 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Well, let me finish. Hang on.

11 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair. Can he
12 finish.

13 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes, we're going to back that
14 time up. I got this. We're going back this timer.

15 OVERWITH: Chair Ferguson.

16 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Hang on, hang on. This is the
17 third time I've heard you say that. So obviously there's
18 a problem. So, I can help you get down to the root of the
19 problem. But what I can't have you do is talk about my
20 Chief Investigator, the Interim Chief Investigator.

21 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Point of order.

22 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: So right now, all I want you
23 to do, if you can take my number down or call me or call
24 the Board's Office, I can get down to the root of the
25 problem.

1 OVERWITH: I think the citizens of Detroit need to
2 know this. And I think it's not accurate and true.

3 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Not if you're going to bash.

4 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Point of order.

5 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: If you're going to bash, we're
6 not going to let that happen.

7 OVERWITH: OK, well let me rephrase that then and get
8 it corrected.

9 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: You can continue.

10 OVERWITH: Okay. Well, the audio recording speaks for
11 itself. There's an audio recording of Melanie White,
12 Jonya Underwood, Tiffany Stewart Willie Bell, Lawrence
13 Akbar, and a couple of the investigators. All of them
14 have said, the senior investigators over at OCI said the
15 same thing. They couldn't accept the complaint based on
16 what Lawrence Akbar said to them. And Lawrence Akbar was
17 given instructions by Willie Bell who was former Chairman
18 at the time. Now, one of the Commissioners I did contact
19 was former Chairman, Reverend Jim Holley, who told me he
20 never received any of the emails that I forwarded to him
21 because they were never given to him as Commissioner
22 Burch, Commissioner Bell. I mean, not Commissioner Bell,
23 Commissioner Burden, Commissioner Davis, and Commissioner
24 Brown. They never received the numerous emails I sent
25 them along with Commissioner Burch. I spoke with

1 Commissioner Burch and her pastor about this situation.
2 Now, I feel like the citizens of Detroit need to know
3 what's going on at the OCI because you got a lot of
4 officers out here running around in the streets without
5 fear of any kind of administrative remedies for them
6 doing their dirty deeds out here on the streets of
7 Detroit. And it needs to be addressed. If you give me
8 that number, I will kindly call you, explain to you, and
9 give you all the information, the tapes recording you can
10 have as well.

11 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: I got him. I know. He's still
12 on, correct? Or he can still hear me?

13 MR. BROWN: Yes, he can.

14 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Okay. Just stay right there.
15 You have a pen right now?

16 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: You're not going to give him
17 your number?

18 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes, absolutely.

19 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Mr. Chair.

20 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: I'm going to give him the...

21 OVERWITH: Yes, I can hear you. Go ahead.

22 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Area code (313) 316 2493.
23 That's area code (313) 316 2493.

24 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Mr. Chairman. Can I have a
25 point of order?

1 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: How can I help you? Yes.

2 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: My concern is I have a PhD in
3 Peopleology and one of the things I think, I appreciate
4 your effort. You're just a chairman, this for the whole
5 Board. You can't use this Board as if it's you. You keep
6 using the word, ``I.'' I can't let you talk about my OCI,
7 he's mine. Please understand we have staff and otherwise,
8 you're going to find yourself... I'm just telling you
9 from somebody who's been out here for a 110 years, you
10 need to make sure that you use this staff because your
11 heart is good. It's really good. But I'm just saying to
12 you, you must understand, you cannot take this on by
13 yourself, personal that's personal. You have a staff here
14 and a good staff. And if you're going to take somebody
15 with you, you have to take one or two people with you
16 because you never want to walk out of these meetings with
17 compromise. I'm just saying that because I said before I
18 have PhD in Peopleology, and that's all I'm saying.

19 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes, there's no...

20 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: And also people can praise as
21 well as criticize us and the staff. That's part of public
22 comment.

23 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Absolutely. Now, there's no
24 disrespect, but what I wanted to try to do was, if you're
25 going to say anything, say it through me, right? I don't

1 want you to bashing the Board or anybody else. So if
2 anything's going to go through, go through me because it
3 lands on me and then maybe I can help you guys out.
4 Right? That's all I'm saying. And I know I do have to say
5 we, but I don't want to make it seem like it's everybody
6 because most of the times it's going to be my fault. It
7 really is. When it comes down to the Board, it is my
8 fault. Whatever the chairman's sitting in this chair,
9 it's going to be their fault, correct?

10 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: No.

11 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: So wait, hang on. That's how
12 some of the public will perceive it, but there's no
13 disrespect at all. I just wanted to try to stop it.
14 That's all I'm here to do to try to stop it. And I'm
15 sorry, because it's been going on too long before I got
16 here.

17 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Mr. Chair.

18 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes, sir.

19 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I'll be short and brief. This
20 is relating to this subject matter here is that Mr. Ruben
21 Crawley has reached out to this Board, reached out to
22 individual Commissioners. This is before you all arrive
23 and guess what? We never got any of the letters that he
24 had written to the Board, we haven't got anything. And
25 these things were kept away from certain Commissioners,

1 like Commissioners like myself, Commissioner Davis,
2 Commissioner Darrell Brown. We never got any of these
3 letters. And so our letters have been kept away from us.
4 And that's why citizens have frustration because they
5 reached out to Commissioners like now and we didn't get
6 it.

7 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: That's why, here it goes,
8 another "I" again. I want to get down to the root of it.
9 I know we want to get down to the root of the problem.
10 That's what I want to get down to.

11 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: I just act privileged because
12 of old age. We can give the emails. We handled this young
13 man. I can give you emails that we've, he's in the right
14 church, but the wrong pew. In other words, his case does
15 not come for us. It goes to another place. But I can give
16 you emails, I give everybody emails that you can follow
17 this.

18 COMMISSIONER BURTON: We should have gotten it.

19 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: We're elected officials. I will
20 get it for you. There is a tracking system that we have
21 for him. I want you to understand that. I apologize.

22 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: No, it's okay.

23 MS. WHITE: Yes, sir. Through the Chair, immediate
24 past Chair, Holley just raised the item that I was going
25 to raise. We have investigated at least 10 complaints by

1 Mr. Ruben Crowley and we have resolved all of those
2 complaints and have worked very closely with DPD to
3 provide Mr. Crowley with some kind of resolution.
4 However, he was unwilling to accept the resolution, but
5 we did investigate at least 10 complaints by 10 different
6 investigators at the Office of the Chief Investigator.
7 Additionally, we will supply the dates and times of the
8 email correspondences that we sent to the full Board
9 regarding Mr. Crowley's attempts to reach the honorable
10 Board. Thank you so much.

11 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you. See how we resolve
12 that? Just that quick. We didn't even leave this room. We
13 resolved it just like that because of this.

14 COMMISSIONER BELL: Mr. Chairman.

15 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes.

16 COMMISSIONER BELL: Mr. Chairman, I agreed that we
17 spent a whole lot of time. You act as though this just
18 started. I spent a great deal of time talking to this
19 person on my personal phone number and we could not
20 resolve anything. In fact, it just continues. As you
21 well, no, he has a history of, he uses profanity toward
22 me and others. So this is not unique. So don't try to
23 take this responsibility, like I'm going to solve it.
24 It's an ongoing issue where this person popped up with
25 different names, different numbers and everything. He has

1 a right to speak to too many comments, but I think we
2 want to try to refrain from certain allegation that he
3 make in reference to us. It's not about you. It's about
4 us.

5 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you. That's why I trying
6 to stop it. All right, Chief.

7 CHIEF WHITE: Sir.

8 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Once again thank you for
9 coming. Your report please.

10 CHIEF WHITE: All right. Good afternoon, honorable
11 Board. I want to start with a brief response on...

12 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Other person... I'm sorry. Mr.
13 Chairman, I thought there was one other person on the
14 Telephone.

15 MR. BROWN: No, Mr. Chair. That was the last person.

16 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you. I misunderstood.
17 Thank you. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

18 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: I'm sorry for the
19 interruption, go right ahead, Chief.

20 CHIEF WHITE: Okay. Good afternoon Board.

21 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Good afternoon.

22 CHIEF WHITE: I want to start with a brief response
23 to two comments, but first, I appropriately introduce
24 vice president the DPOA Ron Thomas. I think I referred to
25 as, hey Ron, but good afternoon, Vice President Thomas,

1 Officer Thomas. I want to move into very quickly. The
2 question that came up on public comment about supporting
3 the officers for bringing forward information against
4 other officers that they view as out of policy and I'm
5 paraphrasing. There is a policy in place for duty to
6 intervene. We've had many instances where that has
7 occurred. Some were viewed as necessary. Some quite
8 frankly were not, but the officer was still supported in
9 both cases and multiple cases, whether we found it to be
10 necessary at the time or not. Oftentimes, number of
11 misconducts are brought forward by officers in the
12 department because of the way that they feel about the
13 department, this uniform, this badge, and knowing that
14 they're going to be supported in doing so. So I just want
15 to put that on record. The other question I believe was
16 by commissioner Davis or former commissioner Davis
17 regarding independent analysis of any data that's
18 submitted by my office. I welcome it. I welcome any
19 independent analysis of any documents that I bring
20 forward to this Board. Once I review them and they're
21 prepared by my staff. I'm confident that they support
22 whatever information that we're presenting.

23 CHIEF WHITE: Moving forward on the updated or
24 injured officers. There are 6 members of the department
25 who are disabled and recovering at home due to an on duty

1 injury. 1 sergeant from the Second Precinct, 1 police
2 officer from TSS, a police officer from our Auto Theft
3 Unit, a police officer from the Ninth Precinct and a
4 police officer from the Seventh Precinct. Now there are
5 29 members currently quarantined or isolated for COVID
6 and 27 of the members are currently positive. So we wish
7 them well. Our drag racing and drifting enforcement
8 stats, 13 traffic stops. And this is for the last
9 weekend, 13 traffic stops, 34 traffic citations, 2
10 vehicles impounded, 1 stolen vehicle recovered, 5 felony
11 arrests and 3 weapons recovered. I'll skip a year, it's
12 just regurgitation of what we've already talked about
13 with regards to these stats.

14 CHIEF WHITE: Let's get into the significant
15 incidents. First one being a triple shooting, 1 fatal, 2
16 nonfatal. On July 29th at 9:00 PM in the 17,500 Block of
17 Stoepel in the 12th Precinct, the victims, all males in
18 their twenties were in the rear of the fatal victim's
19 park car. A dark colored SUV pulled alongside the
20 driver's side of the vehicle and fired multiple gunshots
21 at the victims. The fatal victim is known as a football
22 player from Davenport University. The motive for the
23 shooting is unknown. The detectives are in the process of
24 recovering video surveillance footage and interviewing
25 witnesses. We're asking anyone with information to please

1 come forward. And I will tell you that this investigation
2 is active and continues to be worked. As recent as this
3 morning, I've been in contact with the commanding officer
4 of homicide and we've talked through it and they're
5 continuing to work the case. A very sad case.

6 CHIEF WHITE: We moving on to second incident, which
7 is a mass shooting, 8 people shot on July 31st at 2:40
8 AM, an area of 11,600 Coyle, which is our second
9 Precinct. Our defendant, Mr. Winston Curtly was engaged
10 in some type of disagreement. We believe it has to do
11 with parking. There was a large party across the street
12 from his house. He had a problem with the party, as well
13 as where the people chose to park. Unfortunately, he
14 decided to use a weapon to resolve that dispute. He had
15 multiple weapons inside the home. He shot multiple rounds
16 inside of the home striking 8 people. Sadly, 2 of those
17 people died. Just an unbelievable, unnecessary,
18 unreasonable response to a parking dispute. The officers,
19 once again, did an amazing job, got to his house in
20 record time entered the home. The home was dark. He had
21 weapons strategically placed throughout the home. So we
22 know that he was preparing to engage in a gun fight with
23 the officers. Thank God he did not. Once they got inside
24 the home they found him. He immediately surrendered and
25 was taken into custody. We learned later that he had

1 contact or conversation rather with one of the victims of
2 the shooting prior to the officer's arrival, when they
3 announced that they were going to call the police. His
4 response was I got something for them too. So he was
5 preparing for a gunfight with the officers. We recovered
6 11 firearms, 1 rifle position next to the upstairs
7 window, which is the one we believe he used to shoot at
8 least some of the rounds into the home across the street.
9 He has been remanded after arraignment. He's charged with
10 2 counts of murder, 6 counts of assault with intent to
11 commit murder, 2 counts of discharging a firearm at a
12 building and 10 counts of felony firearm.

13 CHIEF WHITE: So hopefully, he will be in jail and
14 not on the streets to hurt anyone else. Moving on to a
15 fatal shooting, August 1st 1:00 AM 12,900 Block of
16 Greiner. The victim is a 26 year old male fatally shot
17 and struck by an SUV that crashed into the porch of a
18 local residence. The driver of the vehicle fled the scene
19 on foot. Update, the suspect has been identified and
20 taken custody and a warrant request for the suspect is
21 under review by the Wayne County Prosecutor's Office. The
22 suspect also escaped custody for briefly yesterday, after
23 he was taken into custody we were able to re-arrest him
24 and get him off the streets. And we were evaluating
25 exactly what happened with that attempted escape, but he

1 was uninjured re-arrest it and taken into custody. Again,
2 good work by the officers.

3 CHIEF WHITE: We had a double nonfatal shooting
4 involving a two year old victim on August 2nd at 9:20 AM
5 in the area of Witt and Lawndale, Fourth Precinct. Two
6 people were shot including a two year old. The parents of
7 the two year old victim stated that they were driving in
8 the area when they heard shots fired and realized that
9 their two year old child was shot while in the back seat
10 of their vehicle. There was another gentleman who was
11 working on his car, a male 55, who was under the car and
12 moved from under the car to see what all the commotion
13 was. And he was shot. Tips have been received. The
14 investigation has developed a person of interest and
15 crews are actively seeking this individual for
16 questioning. On August 4th, 12:15 AM, in the 9,500 Block
17 of Littlefield, Second Precinct, early this morning, a
18 three year old female was struck by gunfire.

19 CHIEF WHITE: A 3 year old, another 3 year old female
20 was shot at home. She was privately transported to the
21 hospital in critical condition. There was 2 other minor
22 children in the home, ages 4 and 9 months, and several
23 adults. Witness interviews are underway and the mother
24 was arrested for child neglect. The preliminary
25 investigation supports the shooting was an accidental

1 discharge. The firearm was recovered. It's an assault
2 rifle, assault weapon. Child Protective Services are
3 involved in the placement of the other minor children. So
4 again, we continue to talk about this gun violence in our
5 community and particularly these weapons around these
6 children that are in unsafe positions or not properly
7 secured. So as we do this symposium that you have
8 planned. I think another part of the conversation has to
9 be securing these weapons. We'll move on to some
10 positives, very few, unfortunately for this reporting
11 period. On Tuesday, August 2nd, as you mentioned earlier,
12 we had a number of events regarding national night out.

13 CHIEF WHITE: They all went very well. I'll speak to
14 one specifically. Here at Detroit Public Safety
15 Headquarters the group, beyond the call of duty, a group
16 that annually hosts cross country motorcycle ride to
17 recognize fallen officers made a stop here at
18 headquarters to honor one of our own Corporal Darrell
19 Cross who died in the line of duty last year, you will
20 remember. They have a trailer with this picture on it and
21 every fallen officer from the previous year. And it it's
22 maintained until the end of August. Assistant Chief
23 LeValley presented them with a DPD patch and a signed
24 banner honoring Corporal Darrell Cross. We talked about
25 national night out. We went around to a number of our

1 Precincts, and then finally, tomorrow, we are having a
2 graduation for recruit class 22F at Wayne County
3 Community College at 10:30 AM. And all are welcome to
4 attend. I'll take any questions.

5 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: All right, Chief, thank you.
6 Commissioner Banks.

7 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Through the Chair. I have
8 nothing really. Peace and blessing to your Chief White.
9 Good to see you back from last week.

10 CHIEF WHITE: Thank you.

11 COMMISSIONER BANKS: You're welcome.

12 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Burton.

13 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Yes. Through the Chair, a
14 question for the Chief. The shootings that we witness in
15 the media over this past week, do you have police
16 response times for each one of those incidents?

17 CHIEF WHITE: Yes, I do. I don't have them with me.

18 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Pressley.

19 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Thank you. Through the Chair.
20 Chief White, I'm interested again, in the mental health
21 services that are being provided to officers and whether
22 or not they're willingness to receive those supports
23 noting that it's probably voluntary and not mandatory. So
24 could you educate us on those services that are provided
25 to officers noting the sort of scenes that they're having

1 to witness and, you know, how they're being able to
2 balance that and still be able to keep their morale
3 maintained?

4 CHIEF WHITE: Yes, it's tough when you look at the
5 volume that the officers are responding to. There is a
6 peer support process that we have in place, a program
7 that we have in place that's voluntary, but we reach out
8 to them proactively. When we know that they've been
9 involved in a number of critical incidents. We have a
10 formalized, critical incident debrief process that's
11 running out of our Homicide Division. And I cannot think
12 of the Lieutenant who is spearheading that. Is Commander.
13 McGinnis still here? Who is and his name escapes me right
14 now. I apologize.

15 COMMANDER MCGINNIS: Are you referencing Sergeant
16 Eby.

17 CHIEF WHITE: Sergeant Eby and he's brought a, thank
18 you commander. He brought a really dynamic program that
19 helps the officers in the critical incident debrief, and
20 also get back to some normalcy. As you can imagine,
21 seeing some of the things that they see at the rate in
22 which they're seeing them, it takes time and it does make
23 an impact or take its toll on you. So we try to monitor
24 it, we try to give them an opportunity, and they take it,
25 to debrief, talk to a professional but you know, it

1 stacks up too over the years.

2 CHIEF WHITE: So you have to build process around
3 that, which we're working on right now. In fact, I'm
4 going to be bringing something to the Board here in the
5 next few weeks. That's an overall wellness package for
6 our officers. It's got some risk pieces to it. It's got
7 some, some wellness pieces to it. And it's pretty
8 elaborate and I'm hoping that the Board finds to be a
9 good program that we can roll out soon.

10 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Fantastic.

11 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Yeah. Thank you. Because, you
12 know, I'm obviously empathetic to the heavy weights that
13 you all carry. And I recognize that the stigma that is
14 often surrounded around accessing mental health services
15 is something that our community struggles with. And I was
16 wondering whether or not that's a similar reality in the
17 Detroit Police Department or whether or not there's a
18 real openness and understanding about how important those
19 services can be.

20 CHIEF WHITE: Yes. You know, I think if nothing else
21 COVID has brought to light the need for mental health
22 support across every demographic, not just, you know, our
23 community, but certainly in law enforcement and other
24 professions, it's brought to light a lot of need. I won't
25 say that the officers are reluctant. I think that the

1 biggest concern would be, you know, that we're not going
2 to use it against them. That once they come for services,
3 we're not going to say, well, you can't do the job now,
4 so you're out of a job. So it's incumbent upon people
5 like me or dress like me, command officers to ensure the
6 officers that they've the necessary support, and if they
7 need help that it's okay to ask for them, we'll get it
8 for them.

9 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Thank you.

10 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Hernandez.

11 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Through the Chair, just a
12 brief comment. We sit here and listen, week after week to
13 what now seems a continued escalation of violent crime in
14 particular with our youth. And this comment, this
15 statement is more an effort to plead the community. Those
16 parents, those aunts, those uncles, those grandparents,
17 those neighbors who are in a position of influence with
18 our youth to have those conversations, those critical
19 conversations about gun safety, to practice
20 constitutional gun safety, to prevent all of these
21 unnecessary crimes and activities that continue to happen
22 in our community. It starts, and it ends with us. We
23 can't solely depend on our Police Department to be able
24 to do that. So it's me pleading to all of you in the
25 community to do that, and just know Chief White, for what

1 it's worth, this department and especially the great work
2 that you're doing. You continue in my thoughts and in my
3 prayers every single night, although the public may not
4 know it, although you might just think about it, the
5 entirety of this department is on little sleep. They're
6 out here for us, not for anyone else. The best we can do
7 to repay that is to have these conversations with our
8 kids. That's it.

9 CHIEF WHITE: Thank you.

10 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Bell.

11 COMMISSIONER BELL: Just a brief comment. Chief, I
12 just want to commend you constantly before the media. I
13 see the agony in terms of you responding to these
14 shootings and it's just senseless but the core problem,
15 we can talk about it forever, but the bottom line is
16 automatic weapons and people rarely use a weapon. So I
17 don't see that changing in Detroit or in this country.
18 That's a climate that they available. Unfortunately, it's
19 not about mental illness, it's just matter of madness
20 that we dealing with in this day and age. So we have all
21 the confidence, you know, national, local state and the
22 problems still continue in our community. So I don't know
23 what the solution is, but I, we continue to work at it.
24 So I feel your pain. I feel the department issue. This is
25 an unprecedented issue dealing with law enforcement.

1 You're on the front line, there are so many issues that
2 you're dealing with and people expect more for underpaid
3 officer who commit day in and day. It's like being on the
4 combat zone, you know, but once in a while you get out of
5 the zone, but they constantly in that zone. Thank you,
6 Mr. Chairman.

7 CHIEF WHITE: Thank you, Commissioner.

8 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner.

9 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. Thank
10 you Chief for appearing today. I had two things I wanted
11 to add, three things actually. The first, in response to
12 my colleague was the answer. The answer is to eliminate
13 poverty. You don't have guns and gun violence, where
14 there are wealthy people, where there are people that
15 have good jobs, housing and good educational systems.
16 It's a fact. You can go to any suburb where that exists,
17 where the medium income is above 30,000, which is what it
18 is in Detroit. In the surrounding areas, it's 56,000 or
19 something. And you don't have these issues. But that's
20 the core issue? Secondly, I have two questions. Chief.
21 The first is, I sent you a note about the young man who
22 was killed, who was here from Davenport.

23 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I think Devonport College.
24 He's a football player. For the benefit of our audience,
25 he is the nephew of the former city council, President

1 Charles Pugh, who contacted me about his death. The whole
2 family is just devastated. This is a clean kid who came
3 to Detroit. He wasn't in Detroit the first night of his
4 weekend. He came to Detroit the second weekend and now
5 he's dead. And it's just devastating for everybody just
6 thinking about it. I have nephews who come, you know,
7 home from school and just think, they're just here for 48
8 hours and then they could be killed. So it's very, very
9 tragic. And I can appreciate your efforts in that regard.
10 But my question to you actually relates to something that
11 happened last week when you weren't here. And I had an
12 extended conversation with Chief Bliss about it and it's
13 related to Mother Bernice.

14 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: And it was extremely
15 disturbing to me because, not to as a "teenager," I
16 remember the big four in Detroit and I remember the
17 terror they created in the community and for her a 90
18 year old woman to be held for more than an hour in her
19 car, instructed to get out of the car with a handicap
20 insignia on her plate with a cane. And she told the
21 officer, she couldn't get out of the car. Well, the four
22 jumped out the car, three stood up against the wall. One
23 was in her face. And I've asked for the identity of these
24 officers. I personally want to know because I'm
25 personally going to file a complaint about it. To hold

1 her there, while they literally told her to get out the
2 car. Who do they think they're talking to?

3 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I've talked to you before
4 about the courtesy issue and so forth that's happening.
5 I've told you, I've seen it myself. I've told you with
6 respect to the fireworks and so forth. There's this
7 attitude, which is not prevalent among all, but it is
8 prevalent among some. And I want to follow up on this.
9 This is my complaint on her behalf because this is
10 outrageous to me, it would never have happened to a white
11 woman anywhere. And these officers were not Black
12 officers. That is a serious issue for me. And I hope you
13 take it seriously because it could be your family member
14 or whatever that is disrespected and treated this way.
15 It's unbelievable to me. And wait a minute. What's worse
16 Chief, is she told them that she was a member of your
17 advisory council.

18 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: She had a little gold pen on
19 her lapel. She's trying to justify the fact that she's a
20 human being and a woman, which is outrageous. She doesn't
21 have to justify who she is. Her relationship with you and
22 this Board is irrelevant. No person, particularly no
23 woman that's 90 years old deserves to be treated this
24 way. Please, as a favor to me, please address this issue
25 with these officers. And I do want to know who they are

1 because I remember when Coleman was mayor and he would've
2 busted them down to nothing as you and I both know. I'm
3 not suggesting that, I'm just saying that this matter has
4 to be addressed. Thank you.

5 CHIEF WHITE: Chair, can I respond to that?

6 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Hang on, hang on.

7 CHIEF WHITE: Can I respond to that? So that is not
8 my understanding of events, but I will look into it. But
9 you don't, I don't want to get into the weeds of it. Now
10 I'm going to look into it.

11 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you.

12 CHIEF WHITE: But you never have to plead with me,
13 Commissioner to do an investigation on misconduct. I
14 always do investigations on misconduct. So that precursor
15 is never necessary to ask me to do an investigation. I'm
16 going to always do my job, the job that I'm hired to do,
17 I do it every single day. So we will look at any
18 investigation against anyone at any time. I've talked or
19 spoken with Mother Bernice. We ran into each other at an
20 event last week we talked about the incident. My
21 understanding is very different than the one that you
22 have presented here today. There were some laughs and
23 some commentary about introducing her to the young
24 officers that were on that beat. And I was told by one of
25 my deputy chiefs that that did in fact occur and that

1 they have had conversation. We don't need to get into the
2 back and forth right now. I will look into it and have a
3 report for you next week.

4 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you.

5 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: She initiated that laughter.

6 CHIEF WHITE: No, I'm speaking of the conversation
7 that I had with her and the follow up that I heard about
8 the incident and that they were introduced to who she was
9 because, the approach, they didn't know her and the
10 approach.

11 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: It does not matter].

12 CHIEF WHITE: Well, no, it does. If you, if you know
13 the context of the conversation, so it does matter. So
14 what I'm, I'm presenting to you the information that I
15 have. So I will get more information and I will come back
16 and I will present to you. She was not harassed. She was
17 not injured. There was a conversation and again, based on
18 the information that I have, but I'm going to dig deeper
19 into it because what you're characterizing here today is
20 of severe concern to me, serious concern. And I'll take a
21 look and I'll come back.

22 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you, sir.

23 CHIEF WHITE: With regards to the homicide from last
24 week, Commander, can you come up and brief out very
25 briefly on that please? The one we talked about this

1 morning involving a football player.

2 COMMANDER MCGINNIS: Yes, sir. Through the Chair,
3 unfortunately we have more questions than we do answers
4 in this case. It's a drive-by shooting and our victim was
5 fatally struck and two other individuals, nonfatal. What
6 we do know is that the perpetrator or perpetrators were
7 in a small, dark colored SUV. And we really need to get
8 some information so we can provide some answers to the
9 family.

10 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: This kid was just here for the
11 weekend. They have no idea, but I'll have them contact
12 you. I asked the Chief to have someone to contact, so I
13 will do that. Thank you for responding.

14 COMMANDER MCGINNIS: We've been in contact with the
15 father. And we're in the process of accessing video
16 assets in the area. There's nothing that is of value that
17 we can put out right now. But if there is, we will in
18 order to try to solicit some information.

19 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Yes, the football coach's
20 commentary in the paper was very heartfelt. The whole
21 team was devastated.

22 CHIEF WHITE: And lastly, if I may, if the Board will
23 indulge me just one second, I miss a very important
24 report out. It'll take me just a few seconds. We had an
25 officer-involved shooting and I don't have it in my

1 notes, so I'm going from memory. I was on the scene.
2 Officers were in the area I believe it was Tuesday night
3 in the Fourth Precinct on patrol, doing proactive patrol
4 in that area, looking for a number of people that we know
5 are causing problems in the area. We've got some gang
6 problems that are developing in the Fourth Precinct, some
7 historical gang issues that are developing in the Fourth
8 Precinct. Officers encountered a male in the street. He
9 has armed. They can see that he's armed as they approach
10 him to do an investigation. He takes off on foot.

11 CHIEF WHITE: They pursue him. He jumps the fence,
12 the officers jump the fence behind him. At some point on
13 the other side of the fence, he goes for a weapon. One
14 officer discharges, his weapon three times stopping the
15 threat and fear of his life. When the subject goes down,
16 the officer then goes over and administer CPR first aid
17 and get the suspect conveyed to the hospital where he
18 currently sits in stable condition. So he's expected to
19 recover from his injuries. We've got a warrant that's
20 being submitted to the Prosecutor's Office for his
21 actions, and there's an investigation underway by the
22 Michigan State Police and our task force into the actions
23 of the officers. And there'll be a policy evaluation body
24 camera review as well as incident review forthcoming.

25 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Fantastic. Thank you, Chief.

1 Commissioner Holley.

2 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: I really don't have anything,
3 through the Chair. Chief last week, I heard you say, tell
4 us again about those four weeks, how many people died in
5 the four weeks, if you remember?

6 CHIEF WHITE: I don't have the number with me,
7 Commissioner. When we met, I had the number, I was going
8 over the data at that time. Too many and certainly too
9 many children because they're being penalized for adult
10 decisions, they have nothing to do with what's happening
11 the two year old this morning.

12 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: In four weeks, 36 people were
13 killed, according to what I heard.

14 CHIEF WHITE: I think 36 was shot.

15 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: But the point, 36 and so many
16 died in that, right. And I'm just saying to you, I don't
17 know that much as my colleague does about poverty and
18 things like that. I just know that you can't rob poor
19 people, all of you poor, you know, I don't know why, if
20 everybody's poor, I don't know why you'd be hurting other
21 people that's poor if you don't have nothing to get from
22 them. I just feel like it's these guns, and I know you
23 don't want to talk about this Chief and I won't take up
24 my Chairman's time, in terms of the fact that that
25 concern that the community may have in terms of going

1 after these guns and that they may not feel comfortable
2 with us going after these guns, especially guns that are
3 not legal.

4 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: And I understand that, but I'm
5 just saying also we know what the problem is. We have too
6 many guns out there on the street and there are not
7 legal. And I think I can say it that my solution to this
8 is we arrest people. We prosecute them, take them to
9 court. And if they're found guilty, they go to jail. It's
10 just that simple. And I'm just saying to you, again that
11 unless we going to really get ahold of this and really
12 serious about it, how many children have to die before we
13 really understand, we may have to do the things that
14 people feel uncomfortable doing. Finally, that's, it,
15 you've been very kind. Since it's not a question, I just
16 want to vent my frustration, through the Chair on you.
17 It's frustration, that's all, sir.

18 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Chairman Ferguson.

19 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Mr. Chairman, if I can respond
20 for the Chief, I have that data that Reverend Holley just
21 asked you about. There has only been one additional
22 criminal, pardon me, homicide year to date this year, one
23 year to date as of 2022. And the other thing, in terms of
24 nonfatal shootings Jim, there's been an 11% increase. I
25 mean, I'm sorry, decrease, decrease from last year. So

1 there's 70 less non-fatal shootings year to date this
2 year.

3 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes, absolutely.

4 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Chairman Ferguson. If I may
5 ask a follow up question to the Chief relative to the
6 officer-involved shooting.

7 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes.

8 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: I just for a point of
9 information, because I'm unclear about the process. And
10 so when an officer's actions is being independently
11 reviewed by the Michigan State Police and the task force
12 is the officer still working?

13 CHIEF WHITE: They go to a restricted duty capacity.

14 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Okay. Thank you.

15 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you, Chief. Ms. White,
16 we're going to move on to the presentation to the Board,
17 use of force.

18 MS. WHITE: Yes, sir. Through the Chair, the
19 department's quarterly use of force report comes at the
20 Board's request to receive quarterly updates on the
21 department's use of force activities during the George
22 Floyd era as a result of the George Floyd killing during
23 2020, the Board and the department reviewed and evaluated
24 the department's policy use of force policy and the Board
25 proposed several changes to the D's training and use of

1 force policies at the June 11th, 2020 meeting. And just
2 as a reminder, by way of a reminder, some of those policy
3 revisions included, but were not limited to banning neck
4 holds also called choke holds, requiring a de-escalation
5 continuum and a minimal reliance on force and also
6 creating a duty to intervene for officers and the Board
7 also required the quarterly report as part of the policy
8 mandate. So again, just wanted to share some reminders in
9 regard to the use of force policy and the Board's impact
10 in that area. And I believe, excuse me, Lieutenant McCord
11 will be presenting. Lieutenant Campbell will be
12 presenting this afternoon. Thank you so much.

13 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Lieutenant Campbell. I'm get
14 ready to promote you. 10 minutes please.

15 LIEUTENANT CAMPBELL: Through the Chair. Good
16 afternoon. Board of police Commissioners. My name is
17 Lieutenant Tara Campbell, assigned to Civil Rights
18 Division. And it's an honor for me...

19 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Microphone.

20 LIEUTENANT CAMPBELL: It's an honor for me to be
21 presenting to the Board today. We're going to be
22 discussing the use of force, second quarter 2021/2022
23 comparison. If you could turn to the first slide. As you
24 can see on the first slide is category 1. There's a 64%
25 decrease for category 1, for category 2, a 51% increase,

1 for category 3, an 18% decrease and category 4, a hundred
2 percent increase. Acquiring a target was an 18% decrease.
3 And the total for 2021 was 582. And for 2022, 556 and an
4 overall percentage decrease of 4.5%. The next slide,
5 please. I'll be going over each of these slides and give
6 you the definition of a category 1, 2, 3, and 4. So a
7 category 1, as I mentioned on the first slide, it was a
8 64% decrease. Category 1 by definition is any force used
9 that a serious injury or death could occur. It is force
10 used when officers are in a situation and a subject may
11 inquire some broken bones from that situation or
12 hospitalization. Any chemical sprays that are used in
13 department canine bites, taser, dry stunts, inner probe
14 to any sensitive area and also any members of a special
15 population.

16 LIEUTENANT CAMPBELL: These events are, are captured
17 and tracked by force investigations. Next slide please.
18 Category 2, use of force. There was a 51% increase. By
19 definition category 2 defines physical controls,
20 intermediate weapons, which is our tasers and our
21 chemical sprays and any incident that could result in
22 injury or the subject complaint of injury that does not
23 meet the criteria for a category 1 use of force. And you
24 can see that 6, 8, 9, 12, and Downtown services,
25 according to this graph had slight upticks in use of

1 force. And that's not of any surprise to us because those
2 are our very busiest areas throughout the department in
3 citizen encounters. Next slide, please. Category 3 is
4 defined by any incident where force was used without any
5 injury or complaints of injury by the subject. Taser
6 discharged that does not make contact with the subject.
7 That means the prongs does not penetrate the subject's
8 skin. And also canine apprehension. And that just simply
9 means a canine is deployed and plays a role in the
10 capture of a person. There was an 18% decrease, so you
11 can look at the graph for 2021 and 2022, and it captures
12 the decrease with all the commands listed notated at the
13 bottom of the graph. Next slide please.

14 LIEUTENANT CAMPBELL: Category 4 use of force. There
15 was a hundred percent increase for category 4 and in
16 category 4 is defined when a member request EMS or a
17 person, they want the officer to physically assist by
18 placing the subject or patient into an ambulance without
19 injury to that patient, and also forcible handcuffing. So
20 it is literally the least amount of force that the
21 subject or the patient would encounter. And you can see
22 that it says a hundred percent increase, but Precincts 2,
23 8 and 12 had very, very low numbers judging from the
24 graph down at the bottom. Next slide, please. Drawing a
25 firearm and acquiring a target. There was an 18%

1 decreased and that's when a member draws a firearm and
2 acquires a target on a subject or a person and no other
3 force is used. That is investigated by the parent
4 command. Next slide, please.

5 LIEUTENANT CAMPBELL: Dangerous animals. Dangerous
6 animals are defined that an officer shall not discharge
7 their firearm at a dog or other animal except to protect
8 a member person from an imminent physical injury. And
9 there is no other opportunity to retreat. The use of
10 deadly force for every attempt will be made to use other
11 reasonable force means to contain a threat of a dangerous
12 animal. You can look on the graph below in 2021, there
13 were five incidents regarding a dangerous animal. And in
14 2022, there were 15 incidents. And it should be noted
15 that supervisors always ensure that the destruction of
16 animal report is completed. Next slide, please.

17 Compliance controls and physical controls. These are
18 numbers that are tracked in mass. So you can see in 2021,
19 there was a 21% decrease for hard hands. And for joint
20 locks, there was a 4% increase. For chemical sprays was
21 not applicable, PR24s, there were none to report,
22 pressure points, there was a decrease by 50% and the
23 total incidence for 2021, total 245. For 2022, it total
24 200 with a decrease of 18%. Next slide

25 LIEUTENANT CAMPBELL: For taser use comparison for

1 2021 for taser discharge, there were 24 incidents out of
2 the 24, 20 did not take effect. 20 took effect, and four
3 did not take effect in 2022. There were 37 incidents
4 where 22 took effect and 15 did not take effect. The
5 percentage change was an increase of 54% for taser
6 deployment. There was a 41% increase acquiring our
7 target. There was a 27% decrease in accidental
8 discharges. There were no accidental discharges to
9 report. So for 2021, the total was 76 incidents, 2022,
10 103 and an increase of 36% regarding the taser
11 comparisons for the second quarter. The next slide is a
12 use of force to arrest ratio. In 2021, there were 5,872
13 subjects arrested in 2022, there were 5,395 subjects
14 arrested. And the difference was 477. What's significant
15 about this slide is that the department only used 10% of
16 force regarding the large numbers of arrests of the
17 subjects. Only 10% of force was used for both these
18 years.

19 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: That's good.

20 LIEUTENANT: Next slide. This is a categories 1 and 2
21 use of force by race for this quarter. This chart simply
22 displays a percentage of distinct subjects where force
23 was used compared to the total number of rests for a
24 specific race. So in Black race, there was 2% for this
25 quarter in white race, there was 3%. And in the other

1 race, there was 1%. Last slide, primary areas of concern.
2 So what is important to us in the Detroit Police
3 Department is the safety and welfare of our members. And
4 also what is important to us is our community safety and
5 welfare, because we all took an oath to protect and to
6 serve. We all had to say the code of ethics and our
7 officers' work relentlessly, relentlessly out there to
8 prevent crime from being afoot. And we are here to save
9 our lives in the community's property as well. And we
10 also care about our department, we care about our
11 reputation and the civil liabilities to the city. So
12 let's quickly recap. We've talked about the category 1,
13 being a decrease, we've talked about the category 2,
14 being an increase. We've talked about the category 3,
15 being a decrease; and category 4, an increase in
16 acquiring a target decrease. So you can see that force
17 for this quarter went down tremendously. With that being
18 said, this will conclude my presentation on these slides.
19 Now, I will take questions in regard to these slides.

20 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Awesome presentation. I just
21 have one quick thing. The use of force arrest ratio is
22 that makeup of people of color, or nationalists or...?

23 LIEUTENANT CAMPBELL: Are you referring to the...?

24 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: The 2021 arrest 5,872 and in
25 2020, that 22 arrest.

1 LIEUTENANT CAMPBELL: Okay. Through the Chair that is
2 for the second quarter of all subjects that were arrested
3 for that particular quarter. Subjects of all races.

4 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: All races. Fantastic. Okay.
5 That's what I needed to know. All right. Commissioner
6 Hernandez.

7 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Thank you. Through the
8 Chair. Great presentation. Same slide, which is third
9 from last use of force ratio. Are these 2021 Q2 in
10 comparison to 2022, Q2 or is it cumulative?

11 LIEUTENANT CAMPBELL: Through the Chair? This is a
12 second quarter presentation for 2021 quarter two, as well
13 as 2022 quarter two.

14 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Perfect. Thank you.

15 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Pressley:

16 COMMISSIONER Pressley: No questions.

17 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner.

18 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. First
19 I want to tell you, this is an outstanding report. You
20 are so good at what you do. You're just are remarkably
21 talented and the Chief is I think, very lucky to have
22 you. It's clear, it's concise, it's precise. And I'm very
23 proud of our department in terms of use of force because
24 our numbers are dwindling, in terms of use of force. So
25 we must be doing something right. And I'm really, really

1 proud of our officers and of you and your department for
2 so studiously, accurately you know, assessing this day.
3 This is hard. Out of 5,000, something arrests, this is a
4 tough job to do. You did a great job.

5 LIEUTENANT CAMPBELL: Okay. Thank you.

6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: What's your name? You didn't
7 put your name on the front of your report.

8 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Lieutenant Campbell.

9 LIEUTENANT CAMPBELL: Yes. Lieutenant...

10 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: You put the Chief's name.
11 Lieutenant Campbell.

12 LIEUTENANT CAMPBELL: Yes, ma'am.

13 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you.

14 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Burton.

15 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I just want to say thank you
16 for your report, Lieutenant Campbell and also to your
17 team.

18 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you.

19 LIEUTENANT CAMPBELL: Thank you, sir.

20 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Bell:

21 COMMISSIONER BELL: Very briefly, Mr. Chair. I just
22 want to say that when we look back on the 21st century
23 accountability on President Obama, we've been out from
24 under the Justice Department in 2016. This report
25 reflects accountability reporting out, it's in-depth.

1 Back in the day, we didn't have this type of
2 accountability reporting out. So I think that department
3 need to be commended. And I think this Board need to be
4 commended in terms of the work that we address the issues
5 at hand. That's getting back to President Obama's thrust
6 to bring police in terms of more accountability. I just
7 want to share that with you and the public. Thank you.

8 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you. Awesome.
9 Commissioner Holley.

10 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Oh, It has been excellent.

11 LIEUTENANT CAMPBELL: Thank you, sir.

12 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you. See, that was easy.
13 Thank you. That was great. When you don't get that many
14 questions, everything is all right, correct?

15 LIEUTENANT CAMPBELL: Well, thank you, sir. Thank you
16 for allowing us to present today. Thank you.

17 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you. Madam Secretary.

18 MS. WHITE: Yes, sir. Through the Chair, we did have
19 a resolution for retiring Sergeant Junetta Wynn and
20 Commissioner Hernandez has agreed to read the resolution.

21 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Thank you. Through the
22 Chair. Resolution honoring retired Sergeant Junetta D.
23 Wynn.

24 WHEREAS Junetta Wynn was appointed to the Detroit
25 Police Department on July 5th, 1977. Upon successfully

1 graduating from the Detroit Metropolitan Police Academy,
2 she began her lifelong public service career at the First
3 Precinct; and,

4 WHEREAS Officer Wynn's assignments with the Detroit
5 Police Department included the Narcotics Street
6 Enforcement Unit, Twelfth Precinct, and the training
7 section. Officer Wynn excelled in these departments and
8 was well known for her passion for organized labor; and,

9 WHEREAS Officer Wynn displayed tremendous knowledge
10 and leadership skills as a police officer and was
11 promoted to the rank of sergeant on August 19th, 1988. As
12 Sergeant, while assigned to the Detroit Metropolitan
13 Police Academy, Sergeant Wynn was certified by the State
14 of Michigan commission of law enforcement training
15 standards as an instructor of state law enforcement
16 officers and recruits. She also earned certification by
17 Michigan State University as a jail removal instructor
18 and by the federal law enforcement commission and the
19 State of Michigan as a manager for juvenile operations
20 instructor. These certifications led to the creation and
21 development of the Detroit Police Department's Juvenile
22 Cadet Program. Sergeant Wynn supervised the Cadet Program
23 until she was elected to an executive officer position
24 within the Lieutenants and Sergeant's Association LSA;
25 and,

1 WHEREAS Sergeant Wynn served as an elected executive
2 officer of the Lieutenants and Sergeants Association in
3 multiple capacities. She served as the LSAs unit delegate
4 and grievance committee member for six years, Board of
5 Director, Sergeant at arms grievance committee
6 Chairperson for six years, vice president for three years
7 and president for four years; and,

8 WHEREAS Sergeant Wynn was the deserving recipient of
9 the following awards: Three Chief's Unit Awards, the 1980
10 GOP Commemorative Award, multiple perfect attendance
11 awards, both Consent Judgment Awards, the Major League
12 Baseball Award, Rosa Park's Funeral Award, Ford Fireworks
13 Award, Super Bowl XL Recognition Award, as well as
14 commendations from supervisors and numerous letters of
15 appreciation from citizenry; and, WHEREAS Sergeant Wynn
16 knew the value of education and complimented her
17 experience with a master in bachelor degree from Wayne
18 State University. She also is a certified labor
19 specialist and holds a certification in labor negotiation
20 and arbitration training. She is a graduate of the
21 prestigious Northwestern University School of Staff and
22 Command. Sergeant Wynn was selected for and completed the
23 Detroit Police Department's Leadership Academy at Wayne
24 State University's Mike Ilitch School of Business in 2018
25 to earn a graduate certificate in business.

1 NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Detroit Board
2 of Police Commissioners, speaking on behalf of the
3 citizens of Detroit awards, this Resolution in
4 recognition of Sergeant Junetta Wynn's 45 years of
5 dedicated and diligent public service. Her display of
6 courage, leadership and unwavering community spirit has
7 improved the quality of life for citizens of Detroit. We
8 wish you all the best in your future endeavors. We thank
9 and congratulate you Sergeant Junetta D. Wynn. Through
10 the Chair, I'll make a motion to approve and store this
11 Resolution in the archives as stated.

12 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Second. All in favor.

13 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

14 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: All opposed. So it should be
15 written. Thank you. Thank you, Commissioner. Unfinished
16 Business. Well, no, we have the weekly reports, facial
17 recognition, Madam Secretary.

18 MS. WHITE: Yes, sir. Through the Chair, just before
19 going to the incoming correspondence, I just want to note
20 for the record. Deputy Chief DeShaun Sims is standing in
21 for Chief White but with respect to the incoming
22 correspondence for this week, it is listed on the agenda
23 before you, and I just want to draw your attention to the
24 youth advisory panel information, which is included in
25 your packet. Again, you will receive a formal update next

1 week from Vice-Chair, Holt and Commissioner Carter
2 regarding the youth advisory panel. But again, please
3 take a look at the information in your packets. It is a
4 very thorough application packet prepared by staff, Ms.
5 Theresa Blossom and staff. And of course under the
6 leadership of Madam Vice-Chair and Commissioner Holt. So
7 please review that at your convenience. Also want to note
8 that NACOLE'S conference is coming up September 11th
9 through the 15th in Fort Worth, Texas and you will
10 receive an official update in that regard from staff, Mr.
11 Robert Brown next week and myself, but just wanted to
12 share that reminder. So please continue to monitor your
13 emails in that regard. And that concludes my report.
14 Thank you.

15 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you. Unfinished
16 business. Personal and training committee report.

17 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Thank you, Mr. Chair, through
18 the Chair and to the Commissioners, as part of the
19 personnel and training committee responsibility, we have
20 been in consultation with the city HR and the city labor
21 relations regarding the OCI's work environment and
22 workplace and the third party concerns made about the
23 OCI. First, city, HR and labor relations provide
24 information from those areas for the Board's awareness
25 and to place in the official work record. Secondly, any

1 complaints requests or notes coming to our attention
2 regarding OCI workplace environment, city HR, and labor
3 relations received in alignment with the city's policies,
4 procedure and the law. I'm confident that the Board and
5 the community and that I'm confident all of our staff and
6 all of our OCI administrators, Interim Chief Investigator
7 regarding the work they are performing each day and the
8 quality of service being delivered to the community.

9 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: We want to be sure that we are
10 providing staff with the necessary support and resources,
11 as we all serve the City of Detroit. In addition to
12 reviewing and evaluating 40 plus applications and resumes
13 to select the most qualified serious candidates for the
14 remaining investigators positions, I want to say that to
15 you again. We have 40 candidates for the OCI
16 investigators and we're making sure that they're
17 qualified serious candidates for the remaining
18 investigator positions. We're also working on few
19 initiatives and ensure all staff, including the Interim
20 Chief Investigator Akbar, as to the support he needs.
21 Regarding the Board Secretary and the Chief Investigative
22 position, city HR provided us with the resumes and
23 applications for those positions. And all of you will
24 have those resumes for those two positions in terms of
25 the Chief and the secretary.

1 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: You should have it on Friday.
2 If you don't have them, I'd ask that you call the Office
3 and make sure that you will have them. Now, there are
4 some of you guys that the mail keeps coming back. And I
5 want you to understand, we want to make sure that you get
6 this information and want to make sure that we have the
7 right information on your address and emails, but two or
8 three are coming back. And so we want to make sure that
9 you get that, so that we all be on the same accord and
10 working to further review or further actions in regard to
11 all three positions that will be on track with this. I
12 thank you, Mr. Chairman for this opportunity to bring
13 update to the Board.

14 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you.

15 MS. WHITE: Mr. Chair.

16 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes.

17 MS. WHITE: I just want to share additional clarity
18 as well. OCI, Office of the Chief Investigator. I just
19 wanted to make sure everyone is aware, all those
20 positions as immediate past Chair Holley has indicated
21 are for the Office of the Chief Investigator position
22 with the exception, of course, the Board Secretary, but I
23 just wanted to note OCI, Office of the Chief
24 Investigator. Thank you.

25 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Awesome. Thank you, Mr. Brown,

1 announcement.

2 MR. BROWN: Yes. Good afternoon, Mr. Chair, the
3 announcements. Next week, BOPC meeting Thursday, August
4 11th, 2022 at 3:00 PM.

5 BROWN: I mean, I'm sorry, at 6:30 PM with the Fifth
6 Precinct hosting at WC3 Eastern Campus with the Cooper
7 Room, address is 5901, Connors, Detroit, Michigan. And
8 then the next BOPC regular meeting here at Detroit Public
9 Safety Headquarters is August the 18th, 2022 at 3:30 PM,
10 3:00 PM. I'm sorry. And Mr. Chair from there, I go to the
11 monthly community meeting scheduled for August, which
12 meets every second Wednesday. The Budget Committee
13 Meeting, Wednesday, August 10th, 2022 at 2:00 PM. Policy
14 Committee Meeting, Wednesday, August 10th at 3:00 PM.
15 Personnel and Training, Wednesday, August 10th, 2022 at
16 4:00 PM. Citizen Complaint Committee Meeting, Wednesday,
17 August 10th, 2022 at 5:00 PM. And all those meetings take
18 place at Detroit Public Safety Headquarters in the
19 Michigan Room. Mr. Chair, the end of the comments.

20 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you, Mr. Brown. We have
21 new business.

22 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Mr. Chair, may I?

23 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes.

24 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: I would like to recommend that
25 we have a presentation from the DWIN, Detroit Wayne

1 County Mental Health. They just initiated a clinic, new
2 headquarters about half a million dollars into mental
3 health. I wanted to ask that we have opportunity that
4 they would have not just 10 minutes, but take the whole
5 20 minutes and, and give us an update on mental health in
6 the City of Detroit and how they're working with the
7 Police Department and the Mental Health department
8 working with them.

9 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Fantastic. We can make that
10 happen. Ms. White, you have all that.

11 MS. WHITE: Yes.

12 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you.

13 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: You have to get it approved. I
14 mean, of course you said it. That's it.

15 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes. That's it.

16 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Well, we have some new
17 business. Help me with this, Madam Secretary. I had some
18 incoming correspondence, right?

19 MS. WHITE: Yes, sir. Through the Chair, the
20 honorable Board received a staff report at the direction
21 and instruction of the Board leadership. And so that
22 report has been distributed to all Board members via
23 electronically and hard copies. And you have it in your
24 packets today. And I believe there was additional
25 information from Commissioner Hernandez. Thank you.

1 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Through the Chair. I'll make
2 a motion. As mentioned by the Interim Board Secretary
3 Melanie White, there was an interoffice memo that we
4 received both electronically, all Commissioners received
5 electronically, and also here physically today, dated
6 August 2nd. And it's a request for the Office of
7 Inspector General OIG investigation, concerning Police
8 Commissioner, Willie E. Burton, District 5, Detroit Board
9 of Police Commissioners conduct. I'll make a motion to
10 that effect for that investigation and that request to
11 move forward.

12 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Is there a second?

13 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Second.

14 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Any discussion?

15 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Yes. Mr. Chairman, I just read
16 this. It is unbelievable to me that one, we would even
17 consider addressing the Office of the Inspector General
18 about what are really petty grievances. A person doesn't
19 want to take a picture, so we say that that's a reason
20 for us to go to the Office of the Inspector General.
21 There are like five things here, I think that are
22 related. I just read it. I'm just reading it now. I've
23 just start making notes on it. Five things here that are
24 petty immature and totally not deserving of even the
25 consideration in my opinion of the persons in this Board.

1 I mean, if a person doesn't want to take a picture, he
2 didn't want to take a picture with Theresa Blossom. Okay,
3 big deal.

4 MS. WHITE: Through the Chair.

5 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes. Through the Chair.

6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: No, we can talk about it.

7 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Wait. Hang on, hang on.

8 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: He just made a motion in open
9 session. This is discussion on that motion, but to refer
10 a matter to the Office of Inspector General.

11 MS. WHITE: Through the Chair.

12 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes.

13 MS. WHITE: The specifics of the report contain
14 personnel related matters involving BOPC personnel. So it
15 is still under the OMA in terms of giving personnel the
16 opportunity to go into a closed session. So it still has
17 that guise covering the report. So please be mindful of
18 disclosing the details of the report on the open public
19 record. Thank you so much.

20 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Okay. So in other words,
21 please...

22 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I won't mention any personnel
23 names.

24 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner, so in other
25 words, don't even discuss it, just, you know, say you are

1 your opposition with it, and then we we'll go with your
2 vote.

3 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Mr. Chairman, you cannot vote
4 to approve if something's going to the Inspector General
5 and not discuss the details of what you're sending to the
6 Inspector General.

7 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: As long as it's not personal.

8 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Okay. I won't reference anyone
9 personally, but this is unbelievable to me. A parking lot
10 incident where another Commissioner demonstrated road
11 rage. I was present, I watched it. I mean, the fact that
12 a Commissioner didn't want to take a picture, a fact that
13 a picture's taken of someone's license plate, your
14 license plate is public information. You could take a
15 picture of me, not my license plate, anything else? How
16 is that a problem? How do these issues rise to the level
17 of an Inspector General's report? Even for our staff to
18 spend seven hours or whatever, this is like a 9 page
19 thing here and say, well, you need to look at the minutes
20 of the Board meeting to say that this commissioner's
21 behavior may not be in accordance with, let's say,
22 Robert's Rules.

23 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: We are a Board, we address a
24 Commissioner's behavior, not through the Office of the
25 Inspector General, but we address it through Robert's

1 Rules. Robert Rules is what governs the proceedings of
2 this, not the Inspector General. And this is the same
3 thing is true for the City Council of the City of
4 Detroit. There are certain Board members that have
5 different and vociferously, you know, voiced their
6 opinions in the City Council and have traditionally done
7 so, starting with Kenny Cocrall. But this, we are just
8 going to try to discipline a Board member by sending that
9 to the Office of Inspector General, it's something I'm
10 totally unfamiliar with. As a former Board member for the
11 Eastern Michigan University Board of Regents, this is not
12 how these kinds of issues are handled. They're handled
13 through Roberts Rules and furthermore is a tremendous
14 amount of resources that have been spent on this. There
15 are pictures of a car and, you know, somebody taking a...
16 who does this? What Board functions this way?

17 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Holley.

18 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: I think the concern we have is,
19 when you take my license plate, I want to know what
20 you're taking my license plate for.

21 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: That's a question. That's a
22 simple question. That's not an Inspector General's
23 question.

24 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: That may not be. I'm not
25 suggesting you are right or wrong. I'm not sure I'm

1 either one. I'm just saying to you, I would be concerned
2 if a Commissioner is taking my license plate. I want to
3 know why he or she is taking my license plate.

4 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: What does that license plate
5 tell?

6 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: It tells where I live. You tell
7 where I live. You can tell where I park.

8 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: It could tell what your
9 residency is.

10 MS. WHITE: Chair. Yes.

11 MS. WHITE: Only one speaker at a time so that the
12 court reporter can take the minutes properly, please.

13 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: He has the floor.

14 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: I'm done.

15 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: You done. Any further
16 discussion.

17 COMMISSIONER BELL: Mr. Chairman?

18 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes.

19 COMMISSIONER BELL: I understand the memo. However, I
20 think we have to look at facts. I think this matter
21 should have been referred to our attorney for corporation
22 to look into the issue, because I don't think that taking
23 a photo of a license plate rises to the issue of illegal
24 activities. It's not against the law, right? It's not
25 against the law. So I think that before we pursue it with

1 IG to probably indicate that to us, we should get a legal
2 opinion. So I would defer that in terms of the process.
3 If there are other issues then that's a separate entity,
4 but that would be the focal point that is no merits to
5 that. From my personal opinion, professional opinion, I'm
6 not aware of people who have cameras, they're taking
7 pictures of everything. So my plate is there, that's the
8 purpose of it, a public scrutiny. So I would suggest that
9 we take those steps versus the steps we're going to take
10 with IG at this time.

11 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: It's your car that was...?

12 COMMISSIONER BELL: I'm sorry.

13 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: No, so we're going to get
14 back, through the Chair. I'm obviously the new
15 Commissioner here trying to gain a learning curve. But
16 again, my sentiments would be that it wasn't that we're
17 trying to investigate criminality or something was done
18 illegally, but misconduct. And I mean, I think that was
19 the motion that was made about misconduct. And that
20 vantage point, as was just mentioned earlier, for our own
21 sense of integrity as an oversight Board, if we
22 investigate officers misconduct and we must too, ensure
23 that we're doing the same. And so we don't know what will
24 come of the report. And at that point, a determination is
25 be made, but not to the degree that an investigation is

1 done, I think it would be reasonable again in alignment
2 to what our responsibilities are.

3 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: May I ask for the
4 Parliamentarian?

5 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Not yet.

6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: She will tell you that the
7 Board investigates such misconduct.

8 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Go ahead, Commissioner Banks.

9 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Okay. I've been listening to all
10 of this. I just checked out for a minute, but I like what
11 Commissioner Bell said. He makes a good point. Before we
12 take this to the attorney general. We talking about the
13 attorney general before we take this to him. I mean, not
14 the attorney general, the Inspector General, I'm sorry.
15 Before we take this to the Inspector General, we need a
16 legal opinion first.

17 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Hang on, we have to let
18 everybody...

19 COMMISSIONER BANKS: We need a legal opinion first
20 before we just take this to the Inspector General.
21 There's a legal opinion that needs to be put on this
22 because there is no law against him doing that. There's
23 no law against him taking, you see what I'm saying? So a
24 good lawyer probably can eat that up. So we don't want to
25 be embarrassed, can pick that apart.

1 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Where's the Parliamentarian.

2 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Well, how does the Board
3 investigate misconduct by its member's misconduct?

4 DR. JACKSON: Robert Rules of Order is very clear and
5 makes a huge deep line demarcation between offenses that
6 occur at a meeting and offenses that occur outside of a
7 meeting. And the reason for that demarcation is that when
8 an offense occurs within a meeting, everyone can see it,
9 everyone can observe it. And so, as I read the memo, I
10 certainly read the part about the license plate, but to
11 me, the major portion of the memo had to do with offenses
12 that occurred during a meeting, in terms of misconduct,
13 numerous times, the Commissioner was asked to come to
14 order to stop speaking and a refusal to do so over an
15 extended period of time. From my position as a
16 Parliamentarian, that was the major portion of what this
17 was about. Now, Robert's Rules of Order, as I said, makes
18 a wide demarcation between what occurs during the
19 meeting, what occurs outside of the meeting.

20 DR. JACKSON: However, Robert's Rules of Order does
21 not take proceedings over the Charter, which is why I
22 asked the deputy counsel, if the charter addresses
23 misconduct by any elected official. And he said that it
24 does. So what is in the Charter about elected official
25 misconduct would take proceedings over what is in Roberts

1 because that is the law, and the law is going to be
2 higher than Roberts. To answer the Commissioner's
3 question, when an offense occurs during the meeting the
4 responsibility of the presiding officer is to call the
5 person by name and say, you will come to order. And what
6 I also want to make sure you understand is that it's not
7 just a Chair who can do that. Any Commissioner can say to
8 someone whose behavior is disrespectful, out of order,
9 the member must come to order. After repeated requests to
10 come to order, if that is still not being followed, then
11 you can take action to censure the individual. You can
12 even take action to ask the individual to leave the
13 meeting or to be removed. You can say, you can no longer
14 speak. So from the viewpoint of parliamentary procedure,
15 once the person has been told to come to order and they
16 continue to refuse to do so, you then can take action to
17 move, to censure them. You can also take action to have
18 them removed. However, what the Charter says would take
19 proceedings over anything. And so, my suggestion is to
20 ask Christopher how the Charter deals with misconduct by
21 an elected official.

22 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: No, not in a meeting. In a
23 meeting we're governed by Robert Rules. Misconduct by an
24 elected official is not what the Charter is addressing.
25 And when you read it, it's very clear. Our bylaws govern

1 this Board and our bylaws are very clear saying that it
2 is Roberts Rules. Misconduct in a meeting, whether it's
3 Monica Conyers or any other city council person is
4 governed by Roberts Rules.

5 DR. JACKSON: The bylaws of the Police Commissioners
6 has in fact, several rules about misconduct during the
7 meeting, in which they are expected to be professional,
8 courteous and respectful. And that at any time the
9 remarks are unprofessional or discourteous. The Chair
10 shall cut off comment or further debate. The problem for
11 the Commission is what you then do if a person has been
12 told to come to order and refuses to do so.

13 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: But clearly these are not
14 Inspector General issues.

15 DR. JACKSON: That I cannot speak to because I don't
16 know what the law is but in terms of what Robert's Rule
17 says, once a person has been told to come to order and
18 refuses to do so, this Board then has the authority to
19 take whatever measures it believes are reasonable to have
20 that person's behavior, either Censured or have that
21 person removed.

22 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Fantastic. Thank you.

23 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: But the removal requires a
24 hearing by the entire Board and both parties have a right
25 to have counsel present. I've done it before.

1 DR. JACKSON: When you have an offense that occurs
2 during the meeting, you have a motion that would then be
3 made. The individual who is accused, has the right to
4 speak in their defense. They don't have the right to
5 remain at the meeting while their behavior is being
6 discussed, but that also requires a motion. So there
7 would have to be a motion that Commissioner X will be
8 allowed to speak, but then must leave the meeting. That
9 motion requires majority vote, but you could have a
10 motion that that person would be allowed to speak in
11 their defense, but then must leave a meeting and then the
12 remaining commissioners would be able to vote what they
13 believe is an adequate, a response to continued
14 misconduct that is occurring in the meeting.

15 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: And they also have a right to
16 be represented. And sometimes those...

17 DR. JACKSON: Now, Roberts does not say that.

18 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: When the charges are put in
19 writing, you have a right to counsel.

20 DR. JACKSON: That's not in Robert's Rules.

21 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: That's not in Robert's Rules.

22 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: It is.

23 DR. JACKSON: And I don't know the law. So while I'm
24 hearing what Commissioner Burton is saying, and we know
25 that Commissioner Burton is an attorney. I'm sorry. My

1 apologies, Bernard. I'm only speaking to Robert's. I
2 cannot respond to the legal aspects that she has
3 identified.

4 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Mr. Chairman, I think there's a
5 whole lot of time we need to move on. But I know one
6 thing, we can't have two heads on this body. So either we
7 going to have an Parliamentarian who I pay \$75 an hour,
8 and I got a commission that gets \$3 an hour, I'm going
9 with the \$75. I'm just saying, somehow some kind of way,
10 we just have to have one person to be parliamentarian of
11 the city. I respect my colleague as always. I do. I
12 raised her, I know her. I'm just saying, I do feel like
13 that we need to move on and work this out with the
14 lawyer. You all have a good relationship and bring this
15 back up at another time, if you don't mind, because I
16 think...

17 COMMISSIONER BELL: Mr. Chairman,

18 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Wait, hang on. Wait. Now we
19 have to rescind.

20 COMMISSIONER BELL: I moved that we table this matter
21 for two weeks to pursue all the suggestions that come
22 forth.

23 DR. JACKSON: I'm sorry. Mr. Chairman.

24 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: There's a second.

25 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Hang on. Wait minute.

1 DR. JACKSON: The motion to table, it would not be in
2 order. He can make the motion to postpone, or you can
3 make the motion to postpone indefinitely. The motion to
4 postpone indefinitely kills it. The motion to postpone
5 means this matter must be taken up next week at the
6 meeting or it dies. But the motion to table would not be
7 the appropriate motion.

8 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Now, how about the first
9 motion that's just been seconded?

10 DR. JACKSON: The main motion, which was to adopt a
11 recommendation that this matter would be referred to the
12 Inspector General. That motion would yield to the motion
13 to postpone.

14 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Fantastic.

15 COMMISSIONER BELL: Mr. Chairman, I move, we postpone
16 this matter in the timeframe that Dr. Jackson has
17 indicated.

18 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: There was no second for the
19 first motion.

20 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: There was a second.
21 Commissioner Pressley did.

22 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Oh, you did second?

23 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Now, we need a second for this
24 motion.

25 DR. JACKSON: Yes, you do.

1 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Right.

2 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Second.

3 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Second. Any discussion.

4 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: I hope not.

5 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: All in favor.

6 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

7 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: All opposed. Nay.

8 DR. JACKSON: Roll call.

9 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Holley - What am I voting
10 on?

11 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: What is the motion?

12 DR. JACKSON: The motion to postpone.

13 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY - Yes.

14 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Bernard - No.

15 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: What are you going to do with
16 it?

17 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Banks - Yes.

18 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Because it doesn't make sense.
19 The Inspector General...

20 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Bell - Yes.

21 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: We're doing all...

22 MS. WHITE: I'm sorry. Through the Chair. If the
23 record can be clear and silent so that I can hear the
24 vote? Commissioner Bell- Yes.

25 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Banks - I just said, yes.

1 MS. WHITE: Okay. Thank you, sir.

2 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Burton - No.

3 COMMISSIONER BANKS: I thought I did.

4 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Hernandez. State for motion,
5 please?

6 MS. WHITE: The motion is...

7 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Yes. I'm confused

8 MS. WHITE: Through the Chair. The motion is to
9 postpone this matter until next week.

10 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Okay - Yes.

11 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Hernandez -

12 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Presley -

13 COMMISSIONER PRESLEY: I abstain.

14 MS. WHITE: Abstention are counted as no votes. Mr.
15 Chair.

16 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes.

17 MS. WHITE: There were 6 = Yes votes and 2 = No
18 votes, 1 abstention counting as a no vote. The motion
19 passed.

20 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: So we'll take this up next
21 week?

22 MS. WHITE: Correct?

23 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Absolutely. Okay. Now we're
24 going to be going into closed session.

25 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Just a point of information

1 though. Only because it's kind of broad to postpone. So
2 what are we expecting to happen...?

3 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Nothing.

4 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: From now until next week that
5 is going to change us handling the matter?

6 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: The thing is...

7 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Can I answer the question for
8 you?

9 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes. Go ahead.

10 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: It's a great question,
11 Commissioner. And what it said for me, next week, we make
12 a motion for another postponement. Give us time. It won't
13 be next week. We'll probably take two or three weeks to
14 do this and get it right.

15 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: I just want to be clear on
16 what we're doing though.

17 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Basically postponing it until
18 we have opportunity to really have a legal opinion and
19 move on. And take it under advisement of Bishop Bernard,
20 as well as...

21 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: We're going to move on.

22 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I have to say this. Mr.
23 Chairperson, you have a legal opinion on this from the
24 federal district court in the previous matter, that
25 involved Commissioner Burton. It lays it out very clearly

1 what the power of the Chair is and what the disciplinary
2 power of the Chair is. We have a federal court opinion on
3 this

4 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner, we just got it
5 from my Parliamentarian too. So we're going to table this
6 until next week and it has already been passed. So now
7 we're going to move into closed session. Closed session,
8 pursuant to MC 15.268, Section 8(f) the department's
9 requests for the Board to consider administrative leave
10 without pay with but with medical benefits to Officer Al,
11 pronounce his name?

12 MS. WHITE: Al-Tamimi.

13 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Muntathar Al-Tamimi, Badge
14 number 33 of the Ninth Precinct. We're going to need a
15 two-thirds roll call and close session pursuant to ML. I
16 mean, MC 15.268, Section 8(f) the department's request
17 for the Board to consider administrative leave without
18 pay but with medical benefits for Officer Jay Martin,
19 Badge number 4058, assigned to the Fifth Precinct. We
20 have a motion to go into closed session.

21 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: I'll make a motion to that
22 effect.

23 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Second.

24 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Second. All in favor?

25 MS. WHITE: Roll call vote required.

1 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Roll call.

2 MS. CHAIR: Mr. Chair.

3 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: And just for clarity. I
4 believe it is Section 8(a) of the Open Meetings Act. I
5 think you said 8(f). Just for the record to be clear.

6 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Okay.

7 MS. WHITE: Through the Chair. Mr. Chair - Yes.

8 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Holly - Yes.

9 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Bernard - Yes.

10 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Banks - Yes.

11 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Bell - Yes.

12 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Burton - Yes.

13 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Hernandez - Yes.

14 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Pressley - Yes.

15 MS. WHITE: There were 8 - Yes votes. The motion
16 passed.

17 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: This meeting will now
18 reconvene.

19 MS. WHITE: Motion to reconvene.

20 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Motion to reconvene. I'm
21 sorry.

22 COMMISSIONER: So moved.

3 votes and 2 = No votes.

4 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Okay. I'm going to closed
5 session pursuant to MCL 15. 268, Section 8(a) the
6 Department's request to consider administrative leave
7 without pay with medical benefits to Officer Tammi?

8 MS. WHITE: Muntathar Al-Tamimi.

9 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Al-Tamimi, Badge number 33,
10 assigned to the Ninth Precinct.

11 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Mr. Chairman, I recommend that
12 the Board accept the Chief's recommendation.

13 COMMISSIONER BELL: Second.

14 MS. WHITE: Discussion.

15 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Discussion.

16 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I have to raise a procedural
17 objection. This matter has already been voted on by the
18 Board. This issue is improperly before the Board
19 currently. And I think it's establishes a very dangerous
20 precedent that what the Board says on one occasion, they
21 can just change in this manner improperly. So I have to
22 object and I urge you to not approve. It was your motion
23 Commissioner Bell that was your motion.

24 COMMISSIONER BELL: Not my motion.

25 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Oh, whose motion was it?

1 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Jim Holley.

2 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Oh, Jim's I thought you
3 seconded it, Jim. I'm sorry.

4 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Roll call.

5 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Any further discussion? Sorry.
6 Roll call.

7 MS. WHITE: Mr. Chair - Yes.

8 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Holly - Yes.

9 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Bernard - No.

10 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Banks - Yes.

11 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Bell - Yes.

12 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Burton - I'm going to vote,
13 no on this one for the same reason I voted on the last
14 one.

15 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Hernandez - Yes.

16 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Pressley - Yes.

17 MS. WHITE: Mr. Chair. There were 6 = Yes votes, 2 No
18 votes. Two-thirds of 8 is 6. The motion passed.

19 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Okay.

20 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Mr. Chair, I moved that we
21 adjourn.

22 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Second.


