1 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Good afternoon. The time now  
2 is three o'clock. This meeting will now come to order.  
3 I'm going to ask for the invocation for Chaplain Mary  
4 Artry. Chaplain Artry.

5 CHAPLAIN ARTRY: Thank you, God, for every dignitary  
6 in the room. Chief White, the Mayor, I thank you and  
7 honor you for what you're doing. I thank you all, oh God,  
8 for keeping us protected from all hurt, harm and injury.  
9 Thank you for your love and kindness and all of your  
10 tender mercy, oh, God. We bless you and we honor you for  
11 favor in this meeting, that the words will go forth, oh  
12 God, and we will come to solutions and agreements. In  
13 Jesus name, amen.

14 COMMISSIONERS: Amen.

15 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you.

16 CHAPLAIN ARTRY: You're welcome.

17 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you. Madam Secretary,  
18 introductions of commissioners.

19 MS. SHAW: Thank you, Mr. Chair.

20 MS. SHAW: Chair Bryan Ferguson – Here.

21 MS. SHAW: Vice-Chair Annie Holt had an excused  
22 absence.

23 MS. SHAW: Commissioner Cedric Banks –

24 MS. SHAW: Commissioner Willie Bell – Present,  
25 District 4.

1 MS. SHAW: Commissioner Linda Bernard – Commissioner  
2 Linda Bernard, District 2. Good afternoon, everyone.

3 MS. SHAW: Commissioner Willie Burton –

4 MS. SHAW: Commissioner Lisa Carter –

5 MS. SHAW: Commissioner Jesus Hernandez – Present.

6 MS. SHAW: Commissioner Jim Holley – Present.

7 MS. SHAW: Commissioner Ricardo Moore –

8 MS. SHAW: Commissioner QuanTez Pressley – Here.

9 MS. SHAW: Mr. Chair, you have a quorum.

10 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you. Thank you. Now I'd  
11 like to have a motion for the approval for the agenda.

12 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: So moved.

13 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Of 2023.

14 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Second.

15 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Second. Any discussion? All in  
16 favor? Aye. All opposed? That agenda has been approved.

17 Now I would like to have the minutes for March 16th,  
18 2023.

19 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: So moved.

20 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Second.

21 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: It has been seconded. Any  
22 discussion? All in favor? Aye. All opposed? it has been  
23 approved. Ms. Shaw introduction of BOPC staff, please.

24 MS. SHAW: Thank you, Mr. Chair. For BOPC staff, we  
25 have Mr. Robert Brown, Ms. Jonya Underwood, Ms. Theresa

1 Blossom, Ms. Candace Hayes. Mr. Ainsley Cromwell from  
2 OCI, Ms. Melanie White from the administrative staff. We  
3 have DPD HR Director, Katrina Patillo, American Sign  
4 Language Interpreters, Ms. Yakata and Dr. Stephanie  
5 Beatty. We also have Don Handyside, our court reporter.  
6 Media Services is providing the audio and we have  
7 Sergeant Alan Quinn providing audio.

8 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you. Assistant Chief,  
9 who do you have? You're sitting in, sir.

10 ASSISTANT CHIEF LEVALLEY: Good afternoon, Assistant  
11 Chief David LeValley sitting in for Chief White.

12 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Who do you have with you  
13 today?

14 ASSISTANT CHIEF LEVALLEY: I will let the staff  
15 introduce themselves please.

16 Command Staff Introductions - Not audible.

17 ASSISTANT CHIEF LEVALLEY: Looks like that's it.

18 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: That's it? Welcome. Welcome.  
19 Ms. Shaw, any elected officials?

20 MS. SHAW: We do have some guests here today to  
21 announce Ms. Marie Overall and she's from Representative  
22 Tyrone Carter's Office. We also have Ms. Fredia Butler  
23 from the Second Precinct Community Relations President.  
24 That's all we have to announce today so far.

25 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Alright, fantastic. Well, into

1 the Chair's report. First, I would like to apologize to  
2 the listening audience and the people that were in  
3 attendance of last week's meetings. It seems like this is  
4 becoming a broken record for me, right? I can say it a  
5 million times and it just doesn't resonate for some  
6 people, right? So this commission, we have spirited  
7 people on this Board. So it's 11 of us and we all have  
8 different ideas on how things should be ran and how  
9 things should go and some of us are very vocal about it.  
10 But I want everybody to know there's rules to be vocal,  
11 right? There's rules put in place. I want to urge the  
12 commissioners to abide by those rules. So, because we do  
13 have things put in place to make those rules stick, and I  
14 don't want to do that because I like hearing your ideas  
15 and I like hearing your thoughts and I like the debate. I  
16 like it. But we have to do it in a respectful manner. We  
17 can't talk over one another.

18 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: That's not going to be  
19 tolerated anymore. I can't have that go through since now  
20 I have citizens calling me, telling me, make it stop.  
21 That's what I'm going to do because the citizens are my  
22 boss and I have to listen to them. So that's what I'm  
23 going to have to do within my power. There's a lot of  
24 things going on about how many minutes a person gets to  
25 speak. Two minutes. That's what we have. We have two

1 minutes to speak. Time yourself for two minutes and make  
2 it count. Make your two minutes count. I know I can. I've  
3 done it countless of times. Countless of times. One is a  
4 big story that I'm proud of right now. I can honestly say  
5 that I had to use my elevator pitch and elevator pitches  
6 was like 30 seconds. I had to use it because I wanted to  
7 keep my school open. Dawson Elementary School. I had 30  
8 seconds to make my pitch.

9 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: I want to say right now,  
10 Dawson is still open. Now I can't say it was totally  
11 because of me, but at least I put it out there in 30  
12 seconds and someone was listening. I want to say, when do  
13 we as a Board get a chance to meet so we can hash things  
14 out, so we don't have to hash it out at a board meeting  
15 in front of the public? I've been told, and it's been on  
16 the record, that our parliamentarian said, if we are not  
17 voting on anything, we can meet as long as we are not  
18 voting on anything. I'm going to take some words from  
19 Commissioner Dr. Holley, she gets paid the big bucks. So  
20 I'm going with that because there's some things that's  
21 been happening I have to get out to the full Board. I  
22 have to. So that way we can discuss it. So we can figure  
23 out a plan of action instead of getting on here roughshod  
24 and telling you in front of the public and you feel like  
25 you've been blindsided. Well, I don't want to blindside

1 you anymore. But what I'm going to do is say, okay, I'm  
2 going to be having a meeting, a get together, an  
3 informational meeting just for information only.

4 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: We will not be taking any  
5 votes and we won't be taking any action. But you're going  
6 to know what I know. Because one thing I want to be is  
7 very transparent. Honest. That's what I want to be.  
8 That's what I've always maintained to be. When my  
9 integrity is in question, I take that to heart. My PSA, I  
10 want to put this out to the news media. We need your  
11 help. The news media is good in reporting all the bad  
12 stuff on stuff that happened. We are reporting on we  
13 caught them. DPD caught them. Let this be a lesson. Stop  
14 doing what you're doing in the City of Detroit because we  
15 have a way of life too. We should live without being in  
16 fear. The police are doing a good job of catching them.  
17 They are. But we need some proactive stuff to make it  
18 stop before it happens. I think if we keep putting it out  
19 there, quit, you're going to get caught. I think pretty  
20 soon it will resonate. We are trying to do something  
21 because one of the calls that keep coming in is my car  
22 got stolen. What are you guys going to do about my car?  
23 Well, guess what?

24 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: They gave away over 600 locks  
25 last Friday. So that means at least 600 cars hopefully

1 won't get stolen if you use them properly. I understand  
2 some of the other precincts gave some away too. So we  
3 hear you. We're trying to do something, but we need your  
4 help. We do. Worst thing to do is get up in the morning  
5 and your car is not there. That's the worst feeling,  
6 especially when you knew in your heart you could have  
7 done something to make it stop. Put it in your driveway.  
8 Get your alarm. If your dog is barking, get up and go see  
9 what he's barking about. Put lights around your house,  
10 clean out your garage, park your car in your garage. Talk  
11 to your neighbors. Get to know who they are. You don't  
12 have to like them, but at least know who they are. Look  
13 out for one another. We can make this stop. We can. We  
14 can. We sure can. My street, we're bragging, joking,  
15 cracking jokes about our street is a Green Light block  
16 since all our neighbors, we look out.

17 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: We actually watch cars back up  
18 down our street because they know everybody comes outside  
19 and looks, especially when they trying to do something  
20 wrong on our block. We have challenges too. But if we all  
21 can come together and convince each other, hey, this is  
22 our street. We want to come home to peace. We duplicate  
23 that throughout the city of Detroit, that's what we have.  
24 We have peace. I think that's all we want. Hey, that's it  
25 for my Chair report. Now we have a resolution for



1 Lieutenant Fredrick C. Bowens. Commissioner Bernard, will  
2 you do us the honors?

3 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I need the resolution.

4 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Oh, is it in your packet?

5 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: It's in your packet.

6 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: In your packet. Look right  
7 here.

8 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: You passed it.

9 COMMISSIONER: You just passed it.

10 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Go right past you, sir.

11 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Before this?

12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Right passed it.

13 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: The light.

14 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: President. He's a good reader.

15 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Okay, here we go.

16 COMMISSIONER: You all are good.

17 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Ladies and gentlemen, this is  
18 a resolution honoring Lieutenant Fredrick Fred C. Bowens  
19 Posthumously. Fredrick C. Bowens was appointed to the  
20 Detroit Police Department on May 8th, 1989. Upon  
21 graduating from the Metropolitan Police Academy, Officer  
22 Bowens began his career in the Sixth Precinct Patrol  
23 Operations section. Whereas Officer Bowens dutifully  
24 served the Sixth Precinct and the Training Academy.  
25 Officer Bowens displayed tremendous knowledge and

1 leadership skills and was promoted to the rank of  
2 Sergeant on August 7th, 1996. Sergeant Bowens was  
3 reassigned to the Sixth Precinct and Tactical Services  
4 Section on May 4th, 2001. Sergeant Bowens was promoted to  
5 the rank of lieutenant. His assignments included being  
6 reassigned to Tactical Services Section, Mounted,  
7 Southwestern District, Police Reserve Section,  
8 Northeastern District, Tactical Mobile, 12th Precinct,  
9 Northeastern District, 11th Precinct and Detainee  
10 Detention Center.

11 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: On Monday, March 13th, 2023,  
12 Lieutenant Fredrick C. Bowens badge number 0296 passed  
13 away. Whereas during his law enforcement career,  
14 Lieutenant Bowens was the deserving recipient of a  
15 Chief's Unit Award, Departmental Citation Award, two  
16 Lifesaving Citation Awards, the Aretha Franklin Funeral  
17 Recognition Award, both Consent Judgment Awards, the  
18 Major League Baseball All-Star Recognition Award, the  
19 Rosa Parks Funeral Recognition Award, the Super Bowl 40  
20 Recognition Award, and numerous letters of from citizens  
21 and superiors. Whereas Lieutenant Bowens passionately  
22 served the Detroit Police Department and the citizens of  
23 Detroit for 34 years. His professionalism, commitment to  
24 public service, integrity, and dedication were accredit  
25 to the Detroit Police Department.

1 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: He was highly respected by his  
2 peers as a consummate professional. Now therefore, be it  
3 resolved that the Detroit Board of Police Commissioners  
4 speaking for the citizens of Detroit and the Detroit  
5 Police Department awards this resolution posthumously in  
6 recognition of Lieutenant Fredrick C. Bowens, 34 years of  
7 dedicated and diligent public service. His  
8 professionalism, integrity, and standard of commitment to  
9 the city of Detroit and its citizens merit our highest  
10 regards. We salute you, Lieutenant Fredricks C. Bowens,  
11 for a job exceptionally well done. I move adoption of  
12 this resolution. Mr. Chairman.

13 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: I second it.

14 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Any discussion? All in favor?

15 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

16 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: All opposed? It shall be  
17 adopted into the records. Thank you, Sergeant Fredrick C.  
18 Bowens. Job well done. Thank you.

19 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you to his wife and  
20 family for the sacrifices they made.

21 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes. Chief Assist-

22 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Nothing, Mr. Chair.

23 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Assistant Chief.

24 ASSISTANT CHIEF LEVALLEY: Yes, sir. Again, good  
25 afternoon to the Board. I will start with the Chief's

1 report. First giving an update on injured officers. We  
2 currently have 2 members of the department who are  
3 disabled and recovering at home due to on-duty injuries.  
4 Both officers are injured in car crashes. One is a police  
5 officer from the 10th Precinct. The other is a police  
6 officer from the Seventh Precinct. For Covid, we  
7 currently have 5 members that are quarantined or  
8 isolated. That's down from 13 last week. Only 1 of those  
9 members is currently testing positive, which is down from  
10 9 last week. Crime data. Homicides we're at 51 right now.  
11 Last year we were at 48. That's 6% up. Non-Fatal  
12 shootings we're at 143. Last year 132, which is 8% up.  
13 Robberies 297. Last year was 251, which is 18% up. Our  
14 total part 1 crimes right now is 2,305. Last year was  
15 2,204, which is 5% up from last year.

16 ASSISTANT CHIEF LEVALLEY: A few significant events  
17 to report on or significant incidents. The first is a  
18 double shooting, one fatal and one non-fatal involving  
19 juveniles. On Thursday, March 16th, 2023, officers were  
20 dispatched to the 13th thousand block of Frankfurt to  
21 investigate two people shot. Officers arrived at the  
22 scene and observed the first victim, a 15-year-old male  
23 on the ground, suffering from a gunshot wound. Officers  
24 rendered first aid to the victim until medics arrived.  
25 The victim was transported to a local hospital where he

1 was pronounced dead on arrival. The second victim, a 17-  
2 year-old male, was also shot and transported privately to  
3 the hospital where he was listed in critical condition.  
4 Officers gathered evidence and interviewed witnesses at  
5 the scene. Witnesses stated they heard several shots and  
6 observed two Black males run north from the location.

7 ASSISTANT CHIEF LEVALLEY: Homicide detectives  
8 responded to the scene to conduct a follow up  
9 investigation. Detectives canvas the area for video,  
10 evidence, and additional witnesses. At this time, a  
11 person of interest has been identified. We are working to  
12 locate and bring in for questioning. Anyone with  
13 additional information regarding this incident is asked  
14 to contact Crime Stoppers at 1-800-SPEAKUP. The second is  
15 homicide. On Friday, March 17th, 2023, officers were  
16 dispatched to the 2000 block of Prince Hall Drive to  
17 investigate a person shot. Once officers arrived at the  
18 scene, they observed the suspect lying down in the front  
19 room with his hands behind his back surrendering to  
20 officers. The suspect told officers where the weapon was  
21 located, that the victim was his brother, and that he  
22 shot him because he touched his clothes. The suspect was  
23 taken into custody.

24 ASSISTANT CHIEF LEVALLEY: Officers continued to  
25 secure the location when they discovered the victim

1 suffering from a gunshot wound to the chest. The victim  
2 was declared dead at the scene. Officers also observed  
3 the victim holding a large knife in his hand while lying  
4 on the floor. Homicide detectives responded to the scene  
5 to conduct a follow-up investigation. Upon obtaining the  
6 information and completing the investigation, a warrant  
7 request was submitted to the Wayne County Prosecutor's  
8 office on March 19th. As of now, that warrant is still  
9 undergoing a review. The third incident is a double  
10 homicide. On Saturday, March 18th, 2023, officers were  
11 dispatched to the 15,000 block of Harwell to investigate  
12 two people shot. Officers arrived at the scene and  
13 observed the victims in the driver and passenger seat of  
14 a silver Chevrolet Tahoe. Both victims appeared to have  
15 been shot.

16 ASSISTANT CHIEF LEVALLEY: Medics arrived at the  
17 scene and declared the victim's dead at the scene.  
18 Homicide detectives arrived at the scene to conduct the  
19 follow-up investigation. Detectives canvased the area for  
20 additional evidence, witnesses, and video. Witnesses  
21 reported hearing several shots and then seeing a dark  
22 colored vehicle leave the scene. Anyone with additional  
23 information regarding this incident is asked to contact  
24 Crime Stoppers at 1-800-SPEAKUP. Also, information on a  
25 non-fatal shooting involving police officers. On Monday,

1 March 13th, 2023, officers were in the 6,000 block of  
2 East Seven Mile when they observed a white Ford  
3 Expedition and a brown GMC Tahoe firing shots at each  
4 other. The expedition, which was traveling at a high rate  
5 of speed, lost control, and crashed into several parked  
6 vehicles. Officers approached the Ford Expedition and the  
7 occupant of the vehicle fired shots at the officers.

8 ASSISTANT CHIEF LEVALLEY: Officers returned fire at  
9 the suspect and eventually took the suspect into custody.  
10 No officers were injured during the exchange of gunfire.  
11 The suspect was transported to a local hospital for  
12 treatment. The homicide task force was dispatched to the  
13 scene and conducted a follow up investigation. The  
14 suspect was later interviewed by detectives and indicated  
15 that Detroit police officers did not shoot him and that  
16 he knew who had shot him. Detectives from the Homicide  
17 Unit submitted a warrant for the suspect to the Wayne  
18 County Prosecutor's office. Additionally, he was wanted  
19 on a federal felony warrant out of Kansas City, Missouri.  
20 Extradition arrangements are underway. A few  
21 announcements. On Tuesday, March 21st, commander Melissa  
22 Gardner and officers from the D'S Third Precinct held  
23 their monthly community relations meeting at 6:00 PM.

24 ASSISTANT CHIEF LEVALLEY: These meetings provide an  
25 opportunity for community members to connect with law

1 enforcement, learn about the functions of their precinct,  
2 and strengthen the partnership between citizens and  
3 officers. New DPD graduation, class 2023 B. On Friday,  
4 March 24th, tomorrow, DPD will host a graduation ceremony  
5 for Class 2023 B. Ceremony will take place at 10:30 AM at  
6 Greater Grace Church located at 23,500 West Seven Mile  
7 Road, Detroit, Michigan. 27 student police officers will  
8 take the oath of office to protect and serve our great  
9 city. A recruiting event. One day hiring process. On  
10 Saturday, March 25th, DPD will host a one day hiring  
11 event at the Detroit Police Training Center located at  
12 6050 Linwood Street. The event will take place from 8:00  
13 AM to 4:00 PM and will allow interested citizens the  
14 opportunity to complete most of the DPD hiring process in  
15 just one day.

16 ASSISTANT CHIEF LEVALLEY: Lastly to report as the  
17 resolution was already read that on Monday, March 13th,  
18 2023, Detroit Police, Lieutenant Fred C. Bowens passed  
19 away. Lieutenant Bowens was a 34-year veteran who was  
20 widely respected and loved throughout the department. On  
21 Friday, March 24th, his viewing will be held at Swanson  
22 Funeral Home, located at 14751 West McNichols from 12:00  
23 PM to 6:00 PM. The funeral service will be held on  
24 Saturday, March 25th at 10:30 AM with a family hour at  
25 10:00 AM located at Perfecting Church, 7616 Nevada in



1 Detroit. Thank you.

2 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you, Chief. Let the  
3 record show that Commissioner Burton has entered the  
4 building. Welcome sir.

5 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Thank you.

6 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Pressley.

7 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Thank you through the Chair.  
8 My question's more just a reminder. I requested several  
9 meetings ago that we might receive some data regarding  
10 closure rate with cases in DPD. So if we can get an  
11 update on when we might receive that report, I'll  
12 appreciate it.

13 ASSISTANT CHIEF LEVALLEY: Okay. We'll get it to you.

14 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Bell.

15 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you.

16 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Holley.

17 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. Deputy  
18 Chief, one of the kids was my kids. The 14-year-old that  
19 did come to his death with the 17 year old on March the  
20 16th. We're having problems with the family burying the  
21 young man. I did as best as I've done so far. But I  
22 wanted to ask you, I thought there was something when a  
23 person is a homicide in the city of Detroit, there is a  
24 fund or something that the family can basically submit or  
25 suggest or get some help to bury that person, especially

1 if they're under 18. Is there anything that you know that  
2 can help or if you don't now, basically you could call me  
3 tomorrow if you would please.

4 ASSISTANT CHIEF LEVALLEY: Yeah, we'll follow up on  
5 that. I know that there's victim's assistance advocate at  
6 Major Crimes and they're able to help with the victim's  
7 assistance program through the state. I don't know about  
8 a fund that we have specifically, but-

9 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Nothing in the city?

10 ASSISTANT CHIEF LEVALLEY: Not that I'm aware of.

11 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I think I can respond. The  
12 Victims of Crime Act Fund is run by the prosecutor's  
13 office. Every person who's a victim of crime, whether  
14 it's a homicide or a robbery or rape, is entitled to  
15 compensation from that fund. Or their family as if  
16 they're not alive. So yeah, there is a fund. I don't know  
17 that you run a fund. I've never heard that DPD did, but I  
18 know the prosecutor's office runs that fund.

19 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I thank you for that  
20 commissioner. I'm always so much for asking if you had  
21 the fund. I think or thought maybe since you're involved  
22 in this stuff so much that there may be something that  
23 families will be asking from the police department or  
24 from assistance in terms of helping. I mean, what was the  
25 age of the two Double homicides? What are the ages there?

1 ASSISTANT CHIEF LEVALLEY: I don't know their exact  
2 ages, but they were not juveniles. They were older.

3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay. Good.

4 ASSISTANT CHIEF LEVALLEY: Adults.

5 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Not good, but, nevertheless.  
6 Okay. But thank you commissioner. I'll see what but I  
7 mean the family's having a hard time with this. I think  
8 we'd like about 40% of all homicides last year were under  
9 17. Thank you, Mr. Chair.

10 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Bernard.

11 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Good report. I'm sorry to hear  
12 about the shootings and what occurred. I do want to  
13 mention to you though that yesterday – I'm going to pull  
14 the full report. I was listening to a report on  
15 television about crime and young men, Chief. What they  
16 were saying is that in almost 80% of those cases, there's  
17 no male figure in the house. No father in the house. This  
18 particular group it's out of New York and it's trying to  
19 arrange for one year long mentoring period for young men.  
20 The fact that there are no men in the household Monday  
21 said that you can't teach despite what we all think as  
22 women that we can teach anybody anything. That you can't  
23 teach a man how to be a man. They said that even the  
24 responses that perhaps we get at the police department  
25 and perhaps that the military gets in terms of recruits,

1 the guys are just soft. They just don't know what's going  
2 on. They don't have that whatever hutzpah is that men  
3 usually have. They said also that girls who are in those  
4 families are more likely to have children out of wedlock  
5 and prior to marriage. So there's a huge problem and  
6 their position to address it through mentoring. I know  
7 that we have some programs, but are there any direct  
8 programs to assist young males? Because 85% of households  
9 now are headed by women according to their stats. So what  
10 can we do about this?

11 ASSISTANT CHIEF LEVALLEY: We do have a program. It's  
12 run primarily out of the Ninth Precinct. It's a mentoring  
13 program. Some officers at that precinct run and they're  
14 involved in some of the schools. The name of it slips my  
15 mind right now though. I can't think of the name of it,  
16 but I'm sure it'll come to me in a minute. But we do have  
17 a program that we run through the department and there's  
18 a number of youths that are involved in that program.

19 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Obviously, we need it to be  
20 further than the Ninth Precinct. We need it in all 12  
21 precincts, including Downtown Services because that's  
22 where this problem lies in terms of violence and guns.  
23 But it is what the Chief calls making poor decisions.  
24 There's just no man anywhere to provide guidance and just  
25 check kids like hold it here. That kind of thing. So

1 anyway, thank you for your report.

2 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Wow. Thank you.

3 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I'll bring that report in. I'm  
4 going to print it for you.

5 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you. Commissioner  
6 Burton.

7 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I'm just going to say I have no  
8 questions as of right now on behalf of the community. But  
9 I'm just going to say thanks Mr. Chairperson.

10 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: You're welcome, sir. Chief, I  
11 just got a couple of things. On the new non-lethal  
12 weapons, how close are we coming with that? The bola I  
13 think you throw in to talk to the people for barricaded  
14 gunmen that we just had one like yesterday.

15 ASSISTANT CHIEF LEVALLEY: That particular piece of  
16 equipment we don't have yet. Some of the others we do  
17 have in a small testing phase. They're being used by our  
18 CIT or carried by our CIT group. So the Chief recently  
19 started east side and west side Eames that would be that  
20 are trained and they're responding to mental health  
21 crisis calls. Those units were equipped with some of that  
22 equipment in order to have many more options available to  
23 them to be able to deal with those situations. That was  
24 just recently deployed in the last few weeks.

25 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: They haven't used them yet,

1 correct?

2 ASSISTANT CHIEF LEVALLEY: No. They have no incidents  
3 of them. Haven't been used.

4 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yeah. Because a lot of reports  
5 I've seen people came out peacefully.

6 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Right.

7 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: But that's a good thing that  
8 CIT is talking them out. That's a really good thing.  
9 Because that's what we're trying to do, listen. Use non-  
10 lethal force. Right. Especially when people are in  
11 crisis, that's the best thing. Another thing, the  
12 weather's starting to get warm, and the Chief says  
13 something about ramping up the drifting and drag racing  
14 and whatever you want to call it. The guys are going to  
15 get a handle and a heads up on that.

16 ASSISTANT CHIEF LEVALLEY: Yes, we will be out there  
17 early. We haven't deployed it yet, but like in the past  
18 few years, it'll be run out of our Organized Crime  
19 Division, and we will be out there in full force.

20 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Now will that also include the  
21 minibikes and the dirt bikes too?

22 ASSISTANT CHIEF LEVALLEY: Yes.

23 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Okay.

24 ASSISTANT CHIEF LEVALLEY: Four wheelers, ATVs, dirt  
25 bikes.

1 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Okay. Fantastic.

2 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Hernandez, he was up.

3 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commission Hernandez. No  
4 questions? Okay. Thank you. Thank you as always. Oral  
5 communication. Mr. Brown.

6 MR. BROWN: Yeah. Good afternoon, Mr. Chair and this  
7 honorable Board. Currently we have six speakers. I'll  
8 call those in attendance. Ms. Fredia Butler, followed by  
9 Ms. Bernice Smith.

10 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Fantastic. Remember, you have  
11 two minutes and please give us some construct criticism.  
12 Something we can use. Something we can help with.

13 MS. BUTLER: Good afternoon.

14 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Afternoon.

15 MS. BUTLER: Chair, as a community activist and sent  
16 out over 700 rob calls each month. My cry is wake up  
17 sleeping giants. To speak before you and others, I'm  
18 adding a quote from our United States Attorney General  
19 Merrick Garland to my presentation. I speak with no fear  
20 or favor and from me I'm adding with no affection. I come  
21 to these meetings to learn, get information, share my  
22 thoughts, and get help. I live and work in District 7. I  
23 have received help and information from Commissioner  
24 Bell, Commissioner Carter, Commissioner Holley,  
25 Commissioner Moore, Chief Investigator Akbar, and Ms.

1 Blossom. I am concerned about our city and not just where  
2 I live. Several people have told me they only cared about  
3 their area. I cannot think in those terms because  
4 whatever goes on in our city affects all of us physically  
5 and mentally. Commissioners, many times I have stood  
6 before o'clock to time my presentation and will begin  
7 again to do so. If I run overtime and have not finished  
8 my presentation, I will stop and ask and speak at another  
9 time. It is important for me to attend these meetings and  
10 share with communities the information I received and  
11 what I have stated before you. I'm grateful that we are  
12 given the two minutes to speak. Thanks for listening.

13 MR. BROWN: Ms. Smith.

14 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you.

15 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Go Bernice. Go Bernice.

16 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Mr. Smith is back.

17 MS. SMITH: I've covered up because I don't have any  
18 teeth. Good afternoon.

19 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Good afternoon.

20 MS. SMITH: I'm so glad to be here and be able to  
21 have the strength to come down here and see all of you  
22 and say a little two cent of words. First of all, I would  
23 like to make a suggestion to all our precincts.

24 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Microphone.

25 MS. SMITH: Look at me baby. Can we start having



1 meetings again at the precincts to let the neighborhood  
2 people know that they must have some hand in all this  
3 shooting and killing. I am so tired of looking at my TV  
4 at 12 o'clock and I see my Chief on and I see my police  
5 department on because of things that's going on. Shooting  
6 a 13-year-old got shot last week. I mean, why is this  
7 going on? Number one, where are the parents? Do you think  
8 I would allow you to come into my house with a gun? I  
9 won't say the word, but you know what I'm saying? But  
10 anyway, no. You cannot come in my house. I want to have  
11 attention to what you're doing and they should pay  
12 attention, but they don't do it. I blame the parents  
13 mainly because you're not taking care of your adult  
14 children. If they're not working, then why are they  
15 running the street shooting going on? You can't walk down  
16 the street. I hate to watch my TV at 12 o'clock because I  
17 know something happened the night before. Another thing,  
18 can we talk with these young men and these young ladies?  
19 If your mate is being purple to you or something wrong  
20 and everything, why don't you leave them if it's  
21 possible?

22 MS. SMITH: I know you can. I've seen people leave.  
23 Why do you have to shoot the woman? I can't understand  
24 that. It hurts my heart when I hear it and see it on the  
25 tv. So I leave this with you. Where's the rest of our

1 commissioners also? I don't see a full house here, so I  
2 would like to say something about them too. But in the  
3 meantime, be able to convey to the people here in this  
4 city that this is a good city, and we don't need all this  
5 shooting and killing. I'm hurtful when I hear it on the  
6 tv.

7 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you, Mother Bernice.

8 MS. SMITH: Thank you so much.

9 MR. BROWN: Mister Chair, your next two speakers will  
10 be Minister. Eric Blount, followed by Ms. Brenda Hill.

11 MINISTER BLOUNT: Can you hear me Board?

12 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes, we can hear you.

13 MINISTER BLOUNT: Yes. This is Minister Eric Blount.  
14 Chairperson Ferguson, your apology for last week's  
15 meeting is not acceptable. You create the environment,  
16 the atmosphere for this dysfunction and corruption. Your  
17 weekly public address statements that have nothing to do  
18 with police officer misconduct is only a reminder to the  
19 public and to the commissioners that under your  
20 leadership police officer misconduct will not be the  
21 focus of this Board as long as you are the leader of this  
22 Board. Some may question why I cannot be silent. The  
23 Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King's other famous speech  
24 entitled A Time to Break the Silence in which he stated  
25 that silence is betrayal. I am encouraged by the

1 disruption on this Board and here is why. I experienced a  
2 message from God preached by the legendary Reverend Dr.  
3 Renita Williams at Third New Hope Baptist Church August  
4 25th, 1996. In her preaching, she convinced us that there  
5 are times when conditions are so bad that soldiers in the  
6 army of God have a God-given right to be righteously  
7 indignant. The conditions of this Board fit this so bad  
8 conditions she preached about.

9       MINISTER BLOUNT: The hiring and firing before paying  
10 the Reverend Jerome Warfield is but another example of  
11 the corruption on this Board. The lack of integrity and  
12 transparency in this process has led to what I believe is  
13 an historic first. Commissioner Bell, Burton, and Holley  
14 all agreed by their vote that the hiring of the OCI Chief  
15 not be taken back to the commission, to a subcommittee.  
16 Again, they agreed by their vote to.

17       MR. BROWN: Ms. Brenda Hill.

18       MS. HILL: Okay. Can you hear me?

19       CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes, we can hear you.

20       MS. HILL: Yes. Yes. Thank you for speaking about  
21 what's going on and how people are treating each other on  
22 the Board. But I'm not concerned about that. You all can  
23 go for each other. In fact, I love it. A revolution is  
24 not going to be pretty. But however, week after week  
25 after week, you start out with that. But we don't get

1 what is the biggest issue on this Board secure. That's  
2 the OCI and that department. Now we're on years, on  
3 years. We're trying to hire people and always some shady  
4 stuff happens. We need a better police department. What  
5 we are doing is not working. Violent crime and  
6 carjackings are up. I don't understand how we feel that  
7 we're going to surveil our way out of this. That's not  
8 working. How come they could see stuff at gas station but  
9 can't see people carjacking folks. There're cameras  
10 everywhere. Well, facial recognition does nothing but  
11 over-surveil an already stressed-out population. We need  
12 a better police department. That's not to say good things  
13 are not going on. But what you're doing at this table and  
14 what goes on week to week is not productive. It's not  
15 working. So you, Mr. Ferguson, need to take another  
16 approach. Everybody on here needs to take another  
17 approach because we got the same problems week after week  
18 after week.

19 MR. BROWN: Mr. Chair, your next two speakers will be  
20 District 4, Community Advisor Council, Scotty Boman,  
21 followed by Former Commissioner William Davis. Mr. Boman.

22 MR. BOMAN: Yes. Board, I would like to address this  
23 idea of well, constructive criticism and not being  
24 negative. First of all, every negative comment, every  
25 criticism contains a constructive criticism. If you're

1 saying that their officers are doing something wrong or  
2 the Board is doing something wrong, then what you're  
3 advising them is to not do the thing that is being done  
4 wrong. We had this thing a minute ago people talking  
5 about we had budget earlier, I'm sorry. Digressing.  
6 Earlier in the week, there was a budget hearing, and it  
7 was pretty much a done deal. It was basically being  
8 argued in front of council people shortly before they're  
9 going to vote on a budget. That isn't the way to do  
10 things. You want a constructive criticism. Here's a  
11 constructive criticism. When you are having budgeting  
12 priorities or any other major policy decision of the  
13 Board, have meetings weeks ahead of time discussing that.  
14 Have a presentation, have public comments, do all that  
15 ahead of time, well ahead of it going to a final vote.

16 MR. BOMAN: Obviously, someone had to do a lot of  
17 work to put together the city's budget. It certainly  
18 wasn't done within a few days. So obviously someone knew  
19 what was going on long before the decisions were made,  
20 but the public was kept in the dark until the last minute  
21 when it was pretty much a done deal. So that's a big  
22 change that needs to be made. What should the priorities  
23 be? Yes. OCI absolutely. We need to get enough people in  
24 there. That's what we need to do. The Board's job is not  
25 to pat people on the back every time they do something

1 right but to find those who do something wrong, which is  
2 actually an easier job, since fewer people are doing  
3 things wrong than doing things right. Thank you.

4 MR. BROWN: Former Commissioner Davis.

5 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Mr. Davis.

6 MR. DAVIS: Good afternoon. Can I be heard?

7 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes, we can hear you.

8 MR. DAVIS: Okay. I'd like to start off by saying  
9 that there are meetings at the precinct. Last week I went  
10 to the Second Precinct. They had a good meeting though I  
11 had to leave to go to the city council evening meeting.  
12 We need stronger representation about what's going on.  
13 The Board of Police Commissioners should be a shining  
14 light. They need to get rid of so much cloudiness and  
15 have true transparency because that whole thing with the  
16 Chief Investigator is terrible. It makes the whole Board  
17 look bad, especially where you all say you all try. It  
18 looks like you are trying to cover up wrongdoing. It  
19 looks like you want to hire the white guy from Texas. The  
20 Chair of the Personnel Committee wanted from the very  
21 beginning. Yeah, you all need to do a better job on a  
22 number of things. I'm very disappointed. People ask me  
23 all the time, what's going on with the Board of Police  
24 Commissioners? I have to say that I didn't think it could  
25 get worse, but it has. The Board of Police Commissioners

1 shouldn't be there to be a cheerleader for the police  
2 department.

3 MR. DAVIS: They should be there as a check and  
4 balance. They could recognize when stuff is going good,  
5 but there's a lot of stuff going bad, especially like the  
6 vast number of cases not being closed. The vast number of  
7 crime all over this city. There's a number of things you  
8 all should be looking into and raising concern about, and  
9 letting the public know that you care about what's going  
10 on in the community. Not just that you're there because  
11 you got a title and that's all you want. You all need to  
12 do a better job. Thank you.

13 MR. BROWN: Mr. Chair, that was your last speaker.

14 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you. Let me clear up a  
15 couple things. I'm hearing everybody calling in. We have  
16 six people calling me in. I haven't heard one person say  
17 that they've been victims of any kind of police  
18 misconduct. We got one call. That's what we're here for.  
19 To hear If the police did you wrong and how can we make  
20 it better? Did your concerns get met through our OCI  
21 office? I haven't heard that. Heard none of that. All  
22 I've heard was complaining what we're not doing. But yet  
23 I keep hearing you saying that this Board can be much  
24 more, but we're trying to be much more by telling you to  
25 park your cars in your garage. Now, you don't want me to

1 say that?

2 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair.

3 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: I'm at an all at some of the  
4 comments I'm hearing sometimes, and I just can't step  
5 back and just let you do that in front of the whole  
6 commission. That's not fair for every single commissioner  
7 that puts their time in to do the right thing for the  
8 public. It's not fair. It is not.

9 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair.

10 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes, sir.

11 COMMISSIONER BURTON: My mic is not on, but that's  
12 not—

13 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: It's on.

14 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Oh, I didn't see a green light.

15 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: It's on. We can hear you.

16 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Okay. Thank you. I'd like to  
17 make a motion at this time. It seems like a lot of our  
18 constituents that tie into these meetings have concerns  
19 about the whole Chief Investigative position and the OCI  
20 entirely. So just to move along with the motion, the  
21 motion I'd like to put up the table today is I move that  
22 we post the chief investigator position. Do I have a  
23 second from any of my colleagues so we can have a  
24 discussion?

25 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Hearing no second motion



1 fails. So listen, we hear you. We're trying to get this  
2 right for the Chief Investigator. We want that person to  
3 stay for the long haul, not just for a couple of months  
4 or a couple of years. We want them to stay for a long  
5 haul, at least until I'm off this Board. Stay. We want  
6 you to stay and we need the right person in there. So we  
7 will not speed through this process. We just won't. We  
8 could not come to an agreement with the person that we  
9 sent the letter of offer to. It's just that simple. It's  
10 just that simple. We couldn't come to an agreement, and  
11 we have to move forward. That's what this Board is going  
12 to be doing moving forward through the Personnel and  
13 Training Committee. The Chairperson on the Personnel and  
14 Training Committee is highly capable of accomplishing  
15 that goal. He is and I have every vote of confidence in  
16 him.

17 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Mr. Chairman.

18 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes.

19 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Can the Personnel Committee if  
20 you would or maybe he's not ready to, just to let them  
21 know where we are with this be or will there be a report  
22 soon or something like that to help you out. Is that  
23 okay?

24 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Would you like to, sir?

25 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Sure. Through the Chair.

1 I'll remind you of last week's vote that this body  
2 adopted, which is for us in Personnel and Training to  
3 bring another recommendation—

4 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: It doesn't. It doesn't matter if  
5 you say.

6 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Going back to last week if  
7 we paid attention.

8 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: But maybe then from, Mr.  
9 Chairman. I'm just saying based upon what we heard, I  
10 thought it was important that you said it again. That was  
11 all.

12 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yeah. Say it again. That's  
13 what we're going to do. Secretary Shaw, your report,  
14 please.

15 MS. SHAW: Thank you, Mr. Chair. I do want to  
16 announce that we do have Commissioner Moore on the Zoom.

17 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Moore too.  
18 Commissioner Banks has joined us. Welcome sir.

19 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

20 MS. SHAW: Thank you through the Chair. So for the  
21 Secretary report first we have incoming correspondence.  
22 Those are outlined in the agenda. We have the Detroit  
23 Police Basic Recruit class 2023 B graduation ceremony on  
24 Friday, March 24th, 2023, at Greater Grace Church. The  
25 second is change of duty status to administrative leave

1 without pay, but with medical benefits for NPO Mark  
2 Robbins Badge 3622 assigned to traffic reinforcement. We  
3 also receive a letter from the National Organization of  
4 Black Law Enforcement Executives Noble, regarding their  
5 2023 annual symposium. Then we received six DPD policies  
6 for LPC's review. The first is department internet usage,  
7 also court appearances, vice and narcotics, child abuse  
8 and safe delivery of newborns, training, and facial  
9 recognition. As mentioned in the incoming correspondence,  
10 the Board receives six DPD policies for review. In  
11 addition, there are two policies currently in the review  
12 process with the Board. Our executive manager of policy  
13 is researching to determine where we left off in that  
14 process and we'll be updating the Board next meeting on  
15 where we are and what steps are remaining. I would like  
16 to recap the policy review process when DPD generates  
17 that change. So I'll share my screen here. This is just a  
18 reminder for the Board as well as the public.

19 MS. SHAW: Can we share those screens in Zoom? Thank  
20 you. So this is a policy review process, and this is what  
21 happens when DPD generates the request. So step one, we  
22 receive that policy from DPD, and then what happens next  
23 at basically at the same time, BOPC starts to do their  
24 research and policy is posted for public review. That  
25 gets published for 30 days on the BOPC website and the

1 community is notified through various channels such as  
2 the Board meetings, the delivery system, et cetera. We  
3 are looking for feedback from the community on those.  
4 After that DPD policy division provides a report to the  
5 Policy Committee, the Policy Committee reviews for  
6 changes, and then the Policy Committee votes to present  
7 to the full Board. Last but not least, that policy is  
8 brought before the full board by the Policy Committee  
9 presenting that full report for reviewing approval and  
10 the full Board votes to approve that policy. So we'll be  
11 taking those steps. In addition to that, we are reviewing  
12 this process for ways to increase input from the  
13 community and enhance the Board's overall input on  
14 policies.

15 MS. SHAW: The next thing I would like to update  
16 regarding administrative team updates is the  
17 administrative team is launching a community contact  
18 collection campaign to prepare BOPC to increase our  
19 community engagement. We have a starter list of contacts  
20 but we need commissioners and the public's help to gather  
21 more. We're looking for contact information for block  
22 clubs, community organizations, activists and grassroots  
23 organizations, especially those who are focused on  
24 policing as well as faith based groups. The campaign will  
25 start at next week's meeting on March 30th. First, I will

1 be sending an email to all commissioners asking that you  
2 reply with any community context that you already have.  
3 But then during the meetings, we'll be collecting this  
4 information from the public as well. So our participants  
5 from the community can fill out paper forms. Those will  
6 be available at the welcome table starting the next  
7 meeting. Also, the Zoom will be opening up the chat so  
8 that participants can send messages to the panelists and  
9 hosts with information regarding community groups.

10 MS. SHAW: We will also accept emails to the BOPC  
11 mailbox. There will also be a Google form that will be  
12 posted in the chat that you can submit that contact  
13 information as well. Then we'll be asking the Chair to  
14 remind everyone at the beginning of the meetings to  
15 submit the contact information via whichever channel they  
16 choose.

17 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Fantastic.

18 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Mr. Chair.

19 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes.

20 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Quick question to the Chair  
21 for our Board Secretary. Will we, as part of that contact  
22 list process, engage with the different district managers  
23 and deputy managers per district from the Department of  
24 Neighborhoods? Because I believe they have an existing  
25 running list of block clubs already per district.

1 MS. SHAW: Through the Chair. Absolutely.

2 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Thank you.

3 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Fantastic.

4 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: If I could respond in part to  
5 my colleague's question. When I have requested that  
6 information in the past commissioner, I was told by the  
7 District Chair that they didn't want to give up that  
8 information because many people who are presidents or so  
9 forth of block clubs and other things use their home  
10 address and home phone number. So they viewed it as a  
11 security quotes against us of all people. But anyway a  
12 security issue. So perhaps we can resolve that. There are  
13 only seven district managers, and those people should  
14 cooperate, I think more with the commission which is also  
15 elected – they're not elected appointed, of course – and  
16 see if we can make some progress with that. But so far,  
17 it's been mom is the word.

18 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Okay. Fantastic.

19 COMMISSIONER BELL: Through the Chair.

20 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes.

21 COMMISSIONER BELL: I raised the issue of concern  
22 that Commissioner Banks has raised for three or four  
23 meetings. Where do we stand in reference to the 300 cases  
24 that's sitting there from backlog and the 200-something  
25 cases that's been compensated. So that narrows down to

1 about 600 cases that's been idled. My understanding is  
2 that and the office not only concentrating on active  
3 casing, but what is the status of the 600 cases that's in  
4 backlog?

5 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: I think your numbers are wrong  
6 for the 600. I could be wrong myself, but we do have  
7 someone here that would be able to answer that for you.  
8 It wasn't 200 cases that they took, it was boxes of cases  
9 that they took. I don't know how many. I'm having a  
10 meeting with them on Tuesday to get the accurate number.  
11 To get the accurate number. So I'm not going to throw out  
12 a number. So, Mr. Senior investigator.

13 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Point of order. Where are we in  
14 this agenda?

15 MS. SHAW: Through the Chair. I do have a few more  
16 items in my report, if that's okay. That includes the OCI  
17 update.

18 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Fantastic. There we go. Do  
19 that.

20 MS. SHAW: Appreciate it. Thank you. I can actually  
21 skip to the OCI part if that's okay. We can just do that.  
22 Just a brief update in regard to staffing at OCI. We do  
23 have 14 investigators, including our senior investigators  
24 currently on staff. We have 13 of those investigators  
25 currently in the rotation for receiving new cases. One is

1 still in the training status and gets cases under  
2 observation. So based on our database yesterday, we have  
3 485 cases that are open. 295 of those are aged over 90  
4 days, and the other 190 have not yet aged 90 days. So  
5 that's the status of our inventory at this time.

6 MS. SHAW: Could you repeat those numbers one more  
7 time?

8 MS. SHAW: Yes, sir. Through the Chair, we have 485  
9 cases in our database right now with 295 of those 90 days  
10 are over aged.

11 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you.

12 COMMISSIONER BANKS: 795-

13 MS. SHAW: For my last, I'm sorry.

14 COMMISSIONER BANKS: No, I'm sorry. I didn't mean.  
15 Are you through?

16 MS. SHAW: I'm not.

17 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Secretary, go ahead.

18 MS. SHAW: Sorry about that.

19 COMMISSIONER BANKS: You've got the floor.

20 MS. SHAW: Thank you. No problem. Through the Chair.

21 I did want to also indicate that on the 20th, so Monday  
22 this week, the 2023/24 budget proposals for DPD and BOPC

23 were presented to city council. City council will do a

24 vote to move those into executive session. My last item

25 for today is that there has been feedback at BOPC and the



1 city council meetings at the recordings and or the  
2 meeting minutes can't be found on the website. So I'd  
3 like to share my screen and just take a quick walkthrough  
4 on where to find the information for the benefits of the  
5 community, as well as anyone else who is interested. So  
6 the best way to find the videos most quickly is to scroll  
7 down on our main page to pass all the lovely faces of our  
8 commissioners to the BOPC meetings links to recent Zoom  
9 video. If you click on that and download the document,  
10 you'll see we have the video up from last week's meeting,  
11 as well as the previous meetings there. You'll see next  
12 to the date. It's noted if that was a committee meeting  
13 that the recording is for.

14 MS. SHAW: So if you click on those, you'll be able  
15 to see those post captions or not added into these. For  
16 those who have to go to the city TV broadcasting, there's  
17 a delay on those being loaded. But if you want to see the  
18 video right away, you can do that. Then just going back  
19 to our main page, I'll let you know how to find the  
20 documents. Scrolling up to the top. So on the right,  
21 there's a yellow box for the menu. If you click on that  
22 and go to event in the dropdown. Click on the date that  
23 you want. So I'll click today. Then under government,  
24 you'll find Board of Police Commissioners. Okay. Then  
25 click apply. Then if you scroll down here, click on the

1 meeting next you want. So for today, if we click on  
2 there, all of the documents for today's meeting are  
3 included in there. Those are the quickest ways to get to  
4 the videos and the documents if anyone's looking for  
5 them. Mr. Chair, that'll conclude my report.

6 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Awesome. See, we heard your  
7 concerns. I heard your concerns and we put something  
8 together. Now, I took a lot of hits not putting the  
9 meetings out. I sure have. I kept telling them that  
10 closed captions have to get up there. But if we had to  
11 put it up without closed caption, I'll take another hit  
12 on that one. But you deserve to see these meetings. You  
13 do. If you can't see them now, now you'll be able to see  
14 him. We showed you the ways to do it. You have no excuses  
15 now. Yes. Commissioner Banks.

16 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Thank you. Through the Chair.  
17 Peace and blessing to you too, Mr. Chair.

18 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you, sir.

19 COMMISSIONER BANKS: You're welcome. Congratulations  
20 Ms. Shaw for winning the Secretary position. Okay.  
21 Congratulations.

22 MS. SHAW: Thank you so much.

23 COMMISSIONER BANKS: You speak well. Okay.

24 MS. SHAW: Thank you, sir.

25 COMMISSIONER BANKS: All right. We talked about Ms.

1 Maddox about last week that the Personnel and Training  
2 Committee would look into that and give us a decision  
3 about Ms. Maddox. I know she has a speech impediment, but  
4 if we show Mercy. The Bible says, if you show mercy,  
5 you'll receive mercy. So I'm just hoping we can show Ms.  
6 Maddox some mercy, Mr. Chair. I'm waiting on that  
7 response from you, Commissioner Hernandez. I mean,  
8 Chairman Hernandez. How are we looking? Do you have it  
9 today or next week? How are we looking? I'm not trying to  
10 put you on spot, though. I'm asking you a question. How  
11 are we looking?

12 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Point of order. Point of  
13 order, Mr. Chair. Where are we in the agenda?

14 COMMISSIONER BANKS: We're not there?

15 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: We're not there yet, sir.  
16 That's okay.

17 COMMISSIONER BANKS: That's alright.

18 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: He wanted to speak. Yes.

19 COMMISSIONER BANKS: I take it we're not there yet.

20 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: No, that will be unfinished  
21 business.

22 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Okay. Okay. You put it out.  
23 Okay. Well, is that right?

24 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Ms. Shaw.

25 COMMISSIONER BANKS: I mean well.

1 MS. SHAW: You're ready for the announcements?

2 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: We're ready for the  
3 announcement.

4 MS. SHAW: Okay. For the announcements today, our  
5 next meeting is Thursday, March 30th at 3:00 PM here at  
6 Detroit Public Safety Headquarters. The next community  
7 meeting is Thursday, April 13th at 6:30. This will be the  
8 11th Precinct presenting at King David Missionary Baptist  
9 Church, 18001 Sunset in Detroit. For monthly committee  
10 meetings for April, we have the Budget Committee meeting  
11 Wednesday, April 12th at two o'clock. Then the Policy  
12 Committee meeting same day at 3:00 PM and the Citizen  
13 Complaints Committee on April 12th at 3:30. The Personnel  
14 and Training Committee, please note that it is  
15 rescheduled to April 19th, and it is at 2:30 PM. That  
16 concludes the announcements.

17 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: No, there's going to be some  
18 changes to the monthly committee meetings. What I found  
19 out is the Chairs of those committee meetings are having  
20 a hard time getting all the commissioners together for  
21 their perspective committees on those days and times. So  
22 what I'm proposing to do is let every person that's the  
23 Chairperson for each one of these committee meetings,  
24 Chairperson of Budget, Chairperson of Policy, Chairperson  
25 of Citizen Complaint and the Chairperson of Personnel and

1 Training. You said, when you can meet. That means you  
2 will call everybody that's on your prospective committees  
3 and see when they will have time available that you guys  
4 can meet.

5 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Right. You guys set it up. But  
6 have to do it in a time to where we can let the public  
7 know. Don't give it to us at the last minute. Give it to  
8 us a couple of days before. Then you have to communicate  
9 with one so you guys can put this together. Guys and  
10 Gals. Yes.

11 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Can you call those committees  
12 again.

13 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: The committees are the Budget  
14 Committee, Policy Committee, Citizen Complaint Committee,  
15 and Personnel and Training committee. So these times,  
16 we're going to do it for April 12th. But moving forward  
17 after April the 12th, I'm going to hold you guys  
18 responsible for putting your committees together and  
19 getting your people that's on your committees together.  
20 That means you're going to have to talk to each other.  
21 Email, do whatever you have to do. That way you guys can  
22 put it together for the public. I think that's fair  
23 because it's rough trying get everybody on one day. It's  
24 rough. I want everybody to be involved. So that's the  
25 only way I figure we can do it like that. So I'm telling

1 you this thing is constantly changing, I think this is a  
2 good change right here. If anybody have any suggestions,  
3 please email me or catch me outside and say, I think we  
4 should do it like this. I'll take a look at it when we  
5 give the polls and the cons. Unfinished business.

6 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair.

7 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes.

8 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I'm for announcement.

9 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes, sir.

10 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I'd like to announce for the  
11 Board to keep former commissioner, retired Commissioner  
12 Darrell Brown in his prayers. He just lost his sister.  
13 Funeral arrangements are scheduled tomorrow at 12:30 at  
14 Pye Funeral Homes. Just so if we can all just keep him in  
15 his prayers. He was a former colleague. It's a sad loss  
16 to lose a relative. So maybe if the Board can just reach  
17 out enough to Commissioner Brown and just keep him in  
18 their prayers at this time.

19 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes, sir. We have you in your  
20 prayers. This Board does. I would like to say for the  
21 record that Commissioner Carter has entered. Welcome  
22 Commissioner Carter. Yes. New business. Yes. I'm sorry.  
23 Go ahead.

24 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: So, sorry. This is still  
25 somewhat of an announcement.

1 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes.

2 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Two things. I'll hold one  
3 for the other one. But the quick announcement is for a  
4 lot of community members. It's the beginning of the Holy  
5 Month of Ramadan. So Ramadan Mubarak to anyone who  
6 practices. It's a blessed holy month for our Muslim  
7 brothers and sisters. So I just want to acknowledge that  
8 different faith obviously exist in our community, and we  
9 should embrace as such.

10 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Fantastic. Yes.

11 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I  
12 just wanted to let everyone well, a lot of people in this  
13 room are familiar with the Detroit Association of Women's  
14 Clubs. It's the oldest club in the city of Black women.  
15 They have been in a mansion down here near Brush Street  
16 for almost a hundred years now. This weekend is their  
17 luncheon. They are honoring me as myself, Linda Bernard,  
18 my sister, Sharon Bernard, who was also a member of this  
19 commission. We're the first sisters to ever serve. As  
20 well as my niece, which many of you know, Judge Cylenthia  
21 Miller on Wayne County Circuit Court. She's chief judge  
22 of the juvenile division. So that's on Saturday. So I  
23 just want to let you know. So that's that. Nothing else,  
24 Mr. Chair.

25 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Fantastic. Thank you.

1 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Congratulations commission.

2 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you.

3 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Congratulations. Yes, sir.

4 COMMISSIONER BANKS: I've got unfinished business,  
5 Mr. Chair, on Ms. Maddox.

6 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Well, you already said it and  
7 he's going get you an answer.

8 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Okay. I thought commissioner was  
9 unfinished. So we're all clear on that now?

10 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Because you already did it.

11 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Okay. That's alright.

12 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: New business. I'd like to have  
13 them. Well, I'm going to read it. Closed session pursuant  
14 to section 8A of the Open Meetings Act, MCL15.268(a) The  
15 BOPC Chairperson requests the Board to consider  
16 discipline action for OCI Police commissioner, Supervisor  
17 Investigator, and BOPC Executive Manager policy. I need a  
18 two thirds roll call vote. It's going to be required. So  
19 I would like to have a motion to go into closed door.

20 COMMISSIONER BELL: Mr. Chairman, I think this is  
21 unusual. It's improper. It goes against the contraries to  
22 discipline procedure. You want a motion to consider and  
23 you already put it out publicly. Consider this is totally  
24 inappropriate how we should conduct our business. DPD  
25 doesn't bring that type of matter to consider and this



1 Board is totally out of line to entertain a motion of  
2 that kind. It's totally inappropriate.

3 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: But I may respond in part, Mr.  
4 Chairman?

5 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Wait, we should be able to do  
6 that under discussion. So I would like to have a motion  
7 for that.

8 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Mr. Chairman.

9 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Second.

10 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Wait, we have to have a  
11 motion. I have to state the motion. Is there a second?

12 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Second.

13 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Second. Now discussion.

14 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Mr. Chairman, my unreadiness is  
15 that I'm uncomfortable having a Personnel meeting closed  
16 session without the lawyer, without the parliamentarian.  
17 I feel that that's something that we need to always. I  
18 want to make sure we are correct as I'd really like my  
19 colleagues to really vote this down. Because we should  
20 have a lawyer and we should have a parliamentarian  
21 procedure to help us, guide us through this-

22 COMMISSIONER BANKS: That's good.

23 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: So we will not be able to be  
24 comfortable with that with this time's procedure. I don't  
25 want, for whatever reason. I don't have to say it. I

1 think everybody knows if you've been 18 years or older,  
2 you ought to know by now that we got to make sure that we  
3 are correct. So I'm asking you. I don't mean no harm to  
4 you or try to do anything against you, but I do feel I'm  
5 uncomfortable without the lawyer and without the  
6 parliamentarian.

7 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Hernandez.

8 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Thank you. Through the  
9 Chair, I'll just state that I feel comfortable with the  
10 motion as is. I would second what my colleague just said  
11 in regard to the two colleagues or personnel  
12 representation that we should have here.

13 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Any further discussion?

14 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair.

15 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes.

16 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Thank you. We have not read a  
17 legal opinion from the attorney nor have this notice has  
18 been posted properly. With the short notice therefore, I  
19 actually agree with my colleagues Commissioner Bell of  
20 District 4 and also Commissioner Holley that we should  
21 not have this today.

22 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Any other further discussion?

23 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes, sir.

24 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes. Go ahead.

25 COMMISSIONER BELL: I would hope that fairness in

1 terms to the employees is due process they're entitled to  
2 and this Board is entitled to. May consider based on  
3 verbal dialogue, are you going to give us some written  
4 documentation or you just going to speak casually to it?  
5 This is a serious matter, sir.

6 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: You're right.

7 COMMISSIONER BELL: I think we should have internal  
8 investigating of this matter what you want to bring  
9 versus off the top of your head.

10 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: First of all, I'd like to tell  
11 the public, this is not off the top of my head. This has  
12 been brewing for a minute. Like I said in my opening  
13 statement, I've been trying to get the commissioner  
14 together so we can talk about issues—

15 COMMISSIONER: But we don't have—

16 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: This is an issue. So I  
17 understand that. I understand that. So that being said,  
18 any other further discussion? We vote?

19 COMMISSIONER BANKS: We need the missing two key  
20 people though.

21 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Absolutely.

22 COMMISSIONER BANKS: It's not two key people.

23 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: You're absolutely right.

24 COMMISSIONER BANKS: That represents us. The attorney  
25 and the parliamentarian. She's very knowledgeable. Very.

1 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes.

2 COMMISSIONER BANKS: So we need an excuses right now  
3 before we can make this decision.

4 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Right. Let's call for the  
5 vote.

6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Can I make a friendly  
7 amendment to the motion? I think I made the motion. I  
8 don't know who made the motion. Okay. If I move that we  
9 agree to have this meeting when both the parliamentarian  
10 and the attorney are present in order to assuage our  
11 colleagues. It's no big deal if we don't do it today.

12 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Right. The motion was already  
13 out there. So we're going to vote now. So we can vote.

14 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Who seconded? You're going to  
15 accept my friendly amendment to the motion?

16 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: It was already seconded, so  
17 we're going to vote.

18 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you.

19 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Roll call vote.

20 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Mr. Chair.

21 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: I'm sorry.

22 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I want to make sure we're clear  
23 on what we're voting on. I've been here four years and a  
24 half and I know a lot of times we go down to this place  
25 and somebody see here say yeah and mean to say no and say

1 no when they mean yeah. I want to make sure we  
2 understand. Can we have it read on the record what we  
3 voted for?

4 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: We are voting to go into  
5 closed session and after further discussion, you guys can  
6 vote up or down whether to go into closed session. It's  
7 that simple.

8 COMMISSIONER BELL: Mr. Chair, that is not the  
9 motion.

10 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Then the second motion she's  
11 going to come up with, after we make the main motion. To  
12 go into closed session is the main motion. So we already  
13 had that second. We already had discussion. We vote it up  
14 or down, and then we can vote on her motion if she wishes  
15 to bring it up.

16 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Because commissioners, we have  
17 the other matter before us about suspending someone  
18 without pay. So we have to go into closed session anyway.

19 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: That would be awesome.

20 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: No, we're not. No, we're not.

21 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I would have the first one—

22 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: No.

23 MS. SHAW: Mr. Chair.

24 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: We're not on that.

25 MS. SHAW: Mr. Chair.

1 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes.

2 MS. SHAW: I believe the matter that Commissioner  
3 Bernard is referring to is the correspondence that came  
4 in from DPD regarding NPO Mark Robbs. That's a different  
5 closed session that we have to go into regarding  
6 suspension without—

7 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: That's not before us.

8 MS. SHAW: Right. That's not before us today. Would  
9 you like me to restate the—

10 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Restate the motion.

11 MS. SHAW: Before we vote for the record. So the  
12 motion that's currently on the table is to go into closed  
13 session today pursuant section 8A of the open meetings at  
14 MCL15.268(a) the BOPC Chairperson request the Board to  
15 consider disciplinary action for OCI police commissioner,  
16 supervising investigator, and BOPC executive manager  
17 policy – police, sorry. That requires a two third roll  
18 call vote to do that. That motion has been made and  
19 seconded. So we'll go to a roll call vote for that call.

20 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Roll call. We're done. Not  
21 yours. You went up. Go ahead.

22 MS. SHAW: Chair Bryan Ferguson – No.

23 MS. SHAW: Commissioner Cedric Banks – Yes.

24 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: That's not the question son.

25 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Oh, if we want to go into...

1 COMMISSIONER: Go into closed session.

2 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Yes. I'm going to a closed  
3 session.

4 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: He said yes.

5 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Okay.

6 COMMISSIONER BANKS: No, I mean, no, no, no, no, no.  
7 I mean I got confused, man.

8 COMMISSIONER: Just don't do that.

9 COMMISSIONER BANKS: I'm going no.

10 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: No.

11 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Which is two nos.

12 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Okay.

13 COMMISSIONER BANKS: It's two nos.

14 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Okay. It's okay.

15 COMMISSIONER: It's one motion.

16 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: That is your vote. Go ahead.  
17 Go ahead.

18 MS. SHAW: Thank you, commissioner.

19 MS. SHAW: Commissioner Willie Bell – No.

20 MS. SHAW: Commissioner Linda Benard – No. This is  
21 true.

22 MS. SHAW: Commissioner Willie Burton – No.

23 MS. SHAW: Commissioner Lisa Carter –

24 MS. SHAW: Commissioner Jesus Hernandez – No.

25 MS. SHAW: Commissioner Jim Holley – No.

1 MS. SHAW: Commissioner QuanTez Pressley – No.

2 MS. SHAW: Mr. Chair, the motion failed.

3 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you. Thank you.

4 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Motion to adjourn.

5 COMMISSIONER BELL: So move.

6 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Any discussion? All in favor?

7 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

8 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you. This meeting is now  
9 adjourned.

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
