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BOPC VIRTUAL MEETING

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April 6, 2023 at 3:00 P.M.

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1 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Can we do everything but vote  
2 on the agenda and the minutes?

3 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: No. Keep it  
4 simple.

5 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Okay. All right. Chaplain  
6 Muhammad Ali, are you there on Zoom?

7 CHAPLAIN ALI: Yes. Good afternoon. I'm here.

8 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Can you give us an invocation,  
9 please?

10 CHAPLAIN ALI: Of course. [foreign language 00:22]  
11 Peace and blessings be upon you all and good afternoon.  
12 Let us pray. [foreign language 00:32] In the name of God,  
13 the most compassionate, the most merciful, who holds you  
14 and me in all peoples, in a single eternal embrace. Lord,  
15 we are gathered here today with humble hearts, committed  
16 to do your work. We praise you, glorify you, and thank  
17 you for all that you have provided us and blessed us  
18 with. As we undergo the Holy month of Ramadan, we pray  
19 for strength and nourishment as we undertake this month  
20 long fast, from sunrise to sunset. We pray for physical  
21 endurance and faith to ease the pain of hunger, and bless  
22 us with peace of mind, heart, body, and spirit. We pray  
23 for knowing the joy of the blessings of a loving  
24 community, mutually engaged in the difficult but  
25 rewarding work to seek God's pleasure.

8 out the depths of human compassion. As we gather here  
9 today, we remind ourselves of the sanctity of every human  
10 life, regardless of race, religion, or status. We pray  
11 for peace in our most holy spaces and places around the  
12 world to allow those to worship you in safety and free  
13 from harm. We praise you, Lord, glorify you and thank you  
14 for all that you have provided us and blessed us with. We  
15 ask you to perfect our worship of you and teach us how to  
16 be grateful. Finally, we ask you, Lord, to bless this  
17 meeting and those present here today with guidance,  
18 wisdom, clarity, and good judgment, in our words and  
19 actions, and to safely return to our homes in peace for  
20 all praise, glory is due to you. [foreign language2:30].

22 COMMISSIONERS: Amen.

23 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you. Thank you so much.  
24 We do have a quorum. Ms. Shaw, can you do the  
25 introduction of commissioners please?

1 MS. SHAW: Thank you, Mr. Chair.

2 MS. SHAW: Chair Bryan Ferguson – Here.

3 MS. SHAW: Vice-Chair Annie Holt – Good afternoon,  
4 Vice-Chair Holt At-Large.

5 MS. SHAW: Commissioner Willie Bell – Present,  
6 District 4.

7 MS. SHAW: Commissioner Linda Bernard – Attorney  
8 Linda Bernard, District 2. Welcome everyone.

9 MS. SHAW: Commissioner Willie Burton –

10 MS. SHAW: Commissioner Lisa Carter –

11 MS. SHAW: Commissioner Jesus Hernandez –

12 MS. SHAW: Commissioner Jim Holley submitted an  
13 excuse of absence.

14 MS. SHAW: Commissioner Ricardo Moore – Present,  
15 District 7.

16 MS. SHAW: Commissioner QuanTez Pressley –

17 MS. SHAW: Commissioner Cedric Banks –

18 MS. SHAW: At this time, you do not have a quorum,  
19 Mr. Chair.

20 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Okay. Can we take another  
21 five-minute recess please? I humbly apologize. Another  
22 five-minute recess. Thank you.

23 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Can Mr. Brown get Mr. Burton  
24 from the hallway?

25 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: He said he had an emergency.

1 He came and told us.

2 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Oh, he's not staying. Oh,  
3 okay. Through the Chair, I'm sorry. I didn't hear. I had  
4 to figure out how to turn his phone off. Hold on. I'm  
5 trying to figure out your secret. That's what I did.  
6 That's what I'm doing. There it is. Okay.

7 ATTORNEY ADAM SAXBY: Quorum. That's between the  
8 precinct.

9 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: In this  
10 instance, there are certain things you can do in the  
11 absence of a quorum, but as I'm looking at the agenda,  
12 the only thing that would be on there is the reports from  
13 Ms. Shaw. So the Board may receive reports and comments  
14 from the public or staff ask questions and comment on  
15 matters of interest. It only means that those are the  
16 things you wanted to. You could receive public comments.

17 COMMISSIONER: Or to the public.

18 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: So just that  
19 the Board knows what's going on. The Open Meetings Act  
20 does allow in the absence of a quorum to take public  
21 comments and to take staff reports, meaning Ms. Shaw. So  
22 I think the Chair may be. Commissioner Bell was leaving?

23 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yeah.

24 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: He's leaving too? He's gone  
25 through the Vice-Chair? What? Outrageous.

1 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: So I'm going to ask the Board.  
2 We have two options right here. We can take public  
3 comment and then hear from the Secretary's report then we  
4 can adjourn the meeting. Or we can just adjourn the  
5 meeting.

6 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Of course, we want to hear from  
7 the public.

8 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Absolutely. So we can take a  
9 vote on that.

10 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Okay. This will be unanimous.

11 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: What am I agree to though?

12 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Public comment.

13 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Oh, that's a given.

14 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Public comment and Ms. Shaw's  
15 report.

16 MS. SHAW: Mr. Chair.

17 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes.

18 MS. SHAW: Go ahead.

19 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Ms. Shaw's report.

20 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you.

21 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Then after that we adjourn the  
22 meeting.

23 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you, Chair.

24 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: All agree? All in favor?

25 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

1 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: All opposed? No discussion.

2 Mr. Brown, public comments. Who do we have?

3 MR. BROWN: Good afternoon, Mr. Chair. We currently  
4 have five speakers. I will call those in attendance.  
5 Minister. Eric Blount, followed by Ms. Fredia Butler.

6 MINISTER BLOUNT: Good afternoon, Board.

7 COMMISSIONERS: Good afternoon.

8 MINISTER BLOUNT: How few of you there are. I'm  
9 Minister Eric Blount from Sacred Heart Catholic Church  
10 and I just want to express my deep concerns about this  
11 Board not concentrating on police officer misconduct. I  
12 believe all of you are intelligent and I think all of you  
13 are intentional. So this employment crisis, I believe is  
14 manufactured so everyone will get their attention away  
15 from police officer misconduct. We still haven't seen the  
16 full video footage from the body-worn camera of the  
17 execution of Porter Burks. We see it 30-50 feet away and  
18 then the police department cuts off the video. Even City  
19 Council has admitted they have not seen the full body  
20 worn camera footage. If you want us to believe you, if  
21 you want us to trust you, do it like you have done so  
22 many other cases and so many other areas. Even the most  
23 mass shooting has shown the police officers going into  
24 the private school from start to finish from the car to  
25 the last shot. But all we see is Mr. Porter Burks 30 to

1 50 feet away and that's it. The last thing we know is  
2 that the police officers shot him at least 19 times. Just  
3 the volume of bullets themselves makes you wonder how  
4 many bullets did it take to stop or to kill or to maim  
5 Porter Burks? Was it 5 or 15? Who said that was enough?  
6 Did they just empty their guns? We don't know.

7 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you, sir.

8 MR. BROWN: Ms. Butler.

9 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Mr. Chairman, the young lady  
10 is coming forward. Can we ask the department when that  
11 video is going to be available? Can you have a report to  
12 us by the next meeting when the full video is going to be  
13 available to the public and us in this form?

14 DEPUTY CHIEF SLOAN: Through the Chair. Yes, ma'am.

15 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you. Thank you, Mr.  
16 Chairman.

17 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: You're welcome.

18 MS. BUTLER: Good afternoon.

19 COMMISSIONERS: Good afternoon.

20 MS. BUTLER: A group of us, Commissioner –

21 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Microphone please. Thank you.

22 MS. BUTLER: A group of us all ladies formed a group  
23 before the last election in 2022 registering citizens to  
24 vote. We worked in our four supermarkets in District 7.  
25 We worked for six weeks. Some people did not know that we



1 were even having an election. Some asked whether  
2 President Obama was running. Since the election, I have  
3 begun to get ready for the election in 2024. My work is  
4 more than being president of the Second Precinct. I know  
5 how many voted in each district in the past election. The  
6 total number of people who voted was dismal, 172,919 out  
7 of our population of 639,111. Of that number 23,418 were  
8 18- to 25-year-olds who voted. Commissioners, there's  
9 plenty of work for us to do to change our condition and  
10 we can make a difference by helping people to become  
11 educated and voting. Commissioners, our city is divided  
12 in seven districts, and I don't hear what you are doing  
13 in your district. As I have requested, I'm sorry. As I  
14 have reported that each of us should be doing something.  
15 If there is a school in your district, why not visit to  
16 show support to the administrators and students? They  
17 need help. By getting acquainted with businesses owners  
18 and attending meetings in the communities will help stop  
19 some bad behaviors that's hurting our children and all of  
20 us. There are a few ideas. These are a few ideas and  
21 please do not accept gifts of any kind from the business  
22 owners. There's more to come. Thanks for listening.

23 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you.

24 MR. BROWN: Mr. Chair, your next two speakers will be  
25 District 4, Community Advisory Council member Scotty

1 Boman and Ms. Marguerite Maddox. Mr. Boman?

2 MR. BOMAN: Yes. I am now speaking and wearing my  
3 founder of Detroit residence advancing civilian oversight  
4 hat. In that role, I'd like to say that myself and some  
5 devoted activists were outside of the 36th district court  
6 while a hearing or after a hearing was scheduled to  
7 happen concerning DPD Sergeant now Dwayne Jones. Well,  
8 what happened? Is someone trying to say something? I  
9 thought I heard a comment. What happened was they had it  
10 posted as if there was no hearing going on. But then the  
11 next day, it turns out there was a hearing. Yesterday we  
12 found out there was a hearing. At that hearing, the court  
13 changed the charge as part of a deal to disorderly  
14 conduct. But Mr. Jones did plead Nolo Contendere to  
15 disturbing the peace and was convicted of disturbing the  
16 peace yesterday.

17 MR. BOMAN: Then the following they set up a court  
18 date for sentencing on May 12th. So you do now have a  
19 convicted criminal serving as sergeant who was promoted  
20 from corporal to sergeant indicating how broken the  
21 system is largely because you still have not fixed a flaw  
22 in the contract that allowed this to happen. So it  
23 happened because the contract does not specify that that  
24 policies be in order with the charter and they still are  
25 not. That's why you were all able, or your predecessors

1 were able to vote for removal and or against a promotion.  
2 I'm sorry, against a promotion and the promotion still  
3 went through anyway. So this is a problem we have. It's  
4 ongoing. As far as I know, we still have not been trained  
5 in use of force that way either.

6 MR. BROWN: Ms. Maddox?

7 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Ms. Maddox?

8 MS. MADDOX: Hello? Can you hear me?

9 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes, we can hear you.

10 MS. MADDOX: Okay. I would like to come down to the  
11 school but we need to pick another day to come down to  
12 have some conversation with some of you about training.  
13 How to act with people with all disabilities. Because we  
14 all need to be educated on how to deal with all  
15 disabilities. So please pick a day or time when I can  
16 come down and meet before the commission meetings. Thank  
17 you. I'm done and happy Easter to all of you.

18 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: You as well Ms. Maddox.

19 MR. BROWN: Mr. Chair, your next two speakers will be  
20 former Commissioner William Davis and Ms. Brenda Hill.

21 MR. DAVIS: Good evening. Can I be heard?

22 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes, we can hear you.

23 MR. DAVIS: Okay. I'd like to start off by saying I  
24 still think this Board has a lot of major issues. I think  
25 that one of the issues you all continue to allow is the

1 fact that if you look at the charter article seven  
2 section 7-802, there's 11 members of this Board, 7  
3 elected and 4 appointed. Nowhere in the city charter does  
4 it indicate that the appointees are At-Large. It is  
5 almost as if they're trying to hide the fact that they  
6 are mayor appointees and frequently it seems like they  
7 just representing the mayor, not the community. I think  
8 it's horrible that you're about to offer a job to  
9 bedrock. I mean to a white lady from Bedrock. It's almost  
10 like this is going to be end up being called the Gilbert  
11 Board because you are all just representing the interest  
12 of rich white people. This Board is drifting, drifting,  
13 drifting down, down, down. You have appointees doing a  
14 whole bunch of stuff, being responsible for stuff like  
15 this whole mess with picking somebody. Historically, the  
16 full Board would interview three people, and from those  
17 three people they would make a selection. But now this  
18 whole thing looks like everything is undercover, dirty,  
19 and corrupt. Have a good day. Bye.

20 MR. BROWN: Ms. Hill.

21 MS. HILL: Yes. Good afternoon. We have a problem.  
22 Nobody on this Board can say there's no problem. If you  
23 do, you need to walk away. There's a problem with this  
24 Board. This Board and this city is one of the few in this  
25 country that has police oversight. This is historical

1 what you're doing and it's going to go down in history.  
2 There is no way we spent two years arguing about whether  
3 four of you are appointees versus At-Large. Nothing says  
4 that you're At-Large. You just made it up. But week  
5 after, week after week after week, there was no argument  
6 about it. Just do your job. It doesn't matter what they  
7 call you. Period. Willie Burton was dragged by cops out  
8 of a meeting, and you all thought that was right. Not  
9 you, Ferguson, you weren't on there. But you all thought  
10 that crap was right.

11 MS. HILL: But meanwhile, we find out that over 70  
12 police officers can't even sign a police report. Those  
13 are the ones the public knows about. What about the stuff  
14 we don't know? I want the best police department in this  
15 country. The best. I want the best Board because we are  
16 in a unique position to have you all. We've got  
17 corruption with towing, corruption with being friends of  
18 towers. Because you don't like this one you all gang up.  
19 What's her name? Griffey would always go in and attack  
20 and take his voice away. They voted for him. Somebody who  
21 was appointed gets to railroad someone who was elected.

22 MR. BROWN: Mr. Chair, your next speaker would be  
23 caller with the last three numbers 061.

24 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: 061.

25 CALLER 061: Hello. I know two people sitting in that

1 room there that has been hit by a speeding car and I'd  
2 just like to bring this to the forefront. This is James  
3 Ford from the Obama weekend, and real talk news. Summer  
4 is coming. How can you ask your relatives to come to this  
5 city and visit you if you know that they're going to get  
6 hit or know that they might get killed? Everybody sitting  
7 in that room knows and they see it. It's going to take  
8 some work. Make it your business. Talk to the mayor, the  
9 city council and others, and the judges. Have the judges  
10 give obnoxious fines, outrageous jail time, and take the  
11 people's cars. You'll send a message to these young  
12 people, they talk too. If they know that something is  
13 going to happen to them and it's going to be outlandish,  
14 they will stop. God bless everybody and you keep having  
15 your meeting. Thank you very much. Bye-Bye.

16 MR. BROWN: Mr. Chair, that was the last speaker.

17 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Last speaker. All right, Ms.  
18 Shaw, you want to go ahead and give your...

19 MS. SHAW: Thank you, Mr. Chair.

20 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: You're welcome.

21 MS. SHAW: For incoming correspondence, they're  
22 outlined in your agenda. Commissioners, your incoming  
23 correspondence are printed in your binder, and they were  
24 emailed to you as well. Just as an announcement, the  
25 Youth Advisory Panel will be featured in an upcoming

1 Bridge Detroit article. So that it's exciting.

2 COMMISSIONER: Yes.

3 MS. SHAW: I have some updates here regarding open  
4 positions. So for the Chief Investigator, the candidate  
5 Rihanna Lockhart declined the Board's contingent offer.  
6 So the Personnel and Training committee and the Board  
7 will need to discuss next steps to appoint a Chief  
8 Investigator. For the open investigator position, six  
9 candidates were interviewed this week and we have  
10 additional interviews scheduled from Monday, April 10th.  
11 We have open positions for an attorney to the Board,  
12 executive manager finance, as well as legal assistant.  
13 Those requisitions were submitted last week, and they are  
14 still making their way through the requisition approval  
15 chain before recruiting can actually post those to the  
16 website. But they should be up soon.

17 MS. SHAW: We do have some updates regarding citizen  
18 complaints from OCI. If we can have those slides shown on  
19 the screen. We know the citizen complaints are very  
20 important to the community and we do want to be  
21 transparent about our performance. So as I continue to  
22 peel back the layers at OCI, I'll increase the data and  
23 analysis that I'll be sharing about inventory cases. So  
24 to start out, can we show the display mode on the slide  
25 please? Thank you. Perfect. We can go to the next slide.

1 So we have been focused on some recent improvements and  
2 initiatives. We have increased investigation capacity by  
3 reassigning two of our senior investigators back to  
4 actually investigating cases full-time rather than  
5 splitting their time performing administrative type  
6 functions. So that should allow us to move through cases  
7 more quickly as a whole. We've implemented weekly  
8 spreadsheet process for the supervisors to coach  
9 investigators and senior investigators to close their  
10 cases timely.

11 MS. SHAW: In addition to working on the backlog  
12 cases, there is a focus to ensure that new cases get  
13 closed timely, the most recent cases that are coming in  
14 and that they do not contribute to an even greater  
15 backlog that we have. In addition to that, as I mentioned  
16 before, we do have interviews in progress for  
17 investigators. I do want to on the next slide here, just  
18 kind of clarify some definitions for the sake of talking  
19 about the data that will be in this presentation. So a  
20 closed case is a case that actually closed when the  
21 investigator has completed their investigation and  
22 written their report and that report's been approved by  
23 their supervisor. Letters then go out to the complaint  
24 within 45 days after the closure date. Commissioners also  
25 review cases, but that happens after a case is closed and



1 they go to the commissioners for review and sign off.  
2 Cases that are sitting with commissioners for review are  
3 not included in the open case numbers that we will be  
4 reviewing today. Sign off must happen within the above  
5 45-day window so that we can get that letter out to the  
6 complaint.

7 MS. SHAW: This next slide shows week after week  
8 starting with March 16th, open cases by age. So as you  
9 can see, our total open cases have been increasing  
10 slightly over the last several weeks. We have this broken  
11 out with the age cases, which are 91 or more days old. We  
12 have in yellow the cases that are between 61- and 90-days  
13 age. Then in green, the cases that are 60 days or under.  
14 We do have cases that are with the commissioners. Next  
15 slide please. We do have 33 closed cases that are  
16 currently with the commissioners for review and sign off,  
17 expecting many of those to be turned in today. Then we do  
18 have 11 new closed cases that are being distributed to  
19 commissioners after today's meeting. So one other thing  
20 that we're doing is taking a look at our 2023  
21 performance. So we know we have a backlog. We are over 90  
22 days into 2023 at this point. So anything from last year  
23 is going to be included in the backlog. So in addition to  
24 working on that, we want to make sure that our new cases  
25 are being closed, preferably in under 60 days, but at

1 worst case scenario under 90 days.

2 MS. SHAW: So we'll start to look at how we're  
3 performing to that. So currently we have received 338  
4 cases in 2023 and 111 of those are closed already. 94 of  
5 them were closed in 60 days and 17 of them were closed  
6 between 61 and 90 days. None of them were closed in over  
7 90 days. Then going on to the next slide, we do have  
8 cases that were submitted obviously in 2023 that are  
9 still open. There's 227 of those. 8 of them are aged over  
10 90 days and they are contributing to the backlog at this  
11 point and 51 are approaching the 91-day mark. So the team  
12 is focusing very much on the cases in yellow and red  
13 because we do not want the 2023 cases to contribute to  
14 the backlog. So there's a focus there. That concludes my  
15 report, Mr. Chair.

16 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you. Now I'd like to  
17 have a motion to adjourn. Questions?

18 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I want to ask questions.

19 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Okay. Sorry. I thought we  
20 couldn't ask questions. Okay.

21 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: You can't vote  
22 on anything.

23 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Okay, go ahead. Commissioner  
24 Bernard.

25 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Oh, no. She was first.

1 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Go ahead. I'm sorry.

2 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you, Ms. Shaw. You had a  
3 very graphic thorough report. We really, really  
4 appreciate you. You mentioned three positions that we  
5 agree need to be filled. Attorney to the Board, executive  
6 financial manager, and what was the third one?

7 MS. SHAW: Legal assistant.

8 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay. Now, you said it was  
9 somewhere in the process. May I know?

10 MS. SHAW: Yes. So we have to submit requisitions for  
11 positions to be filled and then they go through a series  
12 of approvals through budget and different entities. So  
13 they are moving through approval. I think we're at the  
14 last signature before it goes to talent acquisition to be  
15 posted. So we're very close. So we are in touch with  
16 those who have to approve to make sure that they are  
17 aware that we're waiting for them so that that can get  
18 signed and approved to post.

19 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay. Who are they?

20 MS. SHAW: So I don't have the names in front of me  
21 right now. I can get the names to you.

22 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: I'd appreciate that.

23 MS. SHAW: No problem.

24 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay. I received some CCRs, and I  
25 returned them back because you have my name in the email.

1 What happened previously was that I thought it was policy  
2 practice that each investigator, once they turn the CCR  
3 over to, well let's say they turn it over to  
4 commissioners, it's basically that it's at a point  
5 whereas we clearly can see what might be lacking. When I  
6 discovered previously that some investigators do in fact  
7 indicate on that page where we sign off that the citizen  
8 is going to receive correspondences indicating once the  
9 particular CCR was resolved. Okay. I received 12, well,  
10 12. I don't know, maybe three or four of them had that  
11 notation. So my question, Ms. Shaw, is that practice or  
12 is that at the realm of the particular investigator to  
13 include that notice that is to go out and it's noted in  
14 the CCI that that particular action will take place. Is  
15 that practice or is it just at the realm of  
16 investigators?

17 MS. SHAW: So each citizen will get a letter at the  
18 end of the investigation process. So that is not at the  
19 discretion of the investigator.

20 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Perhaps I'm not making myself  
21 clear.

22 MS. SHAW: Okay.

23 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Some of the CCRs, it is actually  
24 presented that the citizen will be informed.

25 MS. SHAW: It's a notice to commissioner. You're

1 saying it's noted to the commissioner and some of the  
2 cases that you receive, and then some of them they're not  
3 noting that at the bottom.

4 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: It's not for the commissioner,  
5 it's part of the ritual.

6 MS. SHAW: Got you. Right. Okay. I can check in for  
7 that.

8 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Again, I'm trying to figure out is  
9 that a professional decision on the parts of some  
10 investigators or is it the case that you don't have to do  
11 this if you don't want to?

12 MS. SHAW: I'll check into that Vice-Chair.

13 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay. Then one last thing because  
14 I moved the motion. What is happening to the task  
15 investigators? Is that a wish list that we can strike off  
16 our list?

17 MS. SHAW: So the most recent update that I've  
18 received is that HR will not onboard them on our behalf.  
19 So I know that the Board would like to pursue that and  
20 I'll continue to have conversations. But at this point we  
21 do need to get buy-in to have them onboarded into the  
22 systems and with the access that they need to perform the  
23 functions.

24 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: From where is that buy-in to come?  
25 Through the Chair. I'm sorry.

1 MS. SHAW: That's okay. We would need to get buy-in  
2 from City HR in order to onboard new staff.

3 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you, Ms. Shaw.

4 MS. SHAW: Thank you, Vice-Chair.

5 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you, Chair.

6 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes. Commissioner Bernard.

7 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: First, I want to thank you for  
8 an excellent report that tells us at a glance exactly  
9 what's going on. I needed that. Thank you very, very  
10 much.

11 MS. SHAW: Through the Chair. You're welcome.

12 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Tons of words and so forth. I  
13 had only one question, Mr. Chairman. That is I was  
14 informed by city council representatives that they had  
15 pulled off the agenda. They were getting ready to approve  
16 our getting new computers. I mean the staff and  
17 everything, getting new computers for the office, for our  
18 investigators, everybody, and a whole bunch of new  
19 technology. Then they squashed it because of the press  
20 regarding the issues that are currently being  
21 investigated by the Board itself. So have you heard  
22 anything where they have approved those expenditures?  
23 That's my only question.

24 MS. SHAW: Through the Chair. I have not gotten word  
25 from City Council that they have taken our budget

1 proposal off the table. I owe them some responses to some  
2 questions, and we'll be getting those to them within the  
3 next few business days. So we are still in discussion  
4 with City Council about our budget is not off the table.

5 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Okay. I was told by a council  
6 member that they asked that they pulled them off.

7 MS. SHAW: Okay. I'll reach out.

8 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I'd like to see the responses  
9 that we've presented to their questions as soon as  
10 they're available.

11 MS. SHAW: Absolutely. The board will get a copy when  
12 that goes out.

13 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Before it goes out.

14 MS. SHAW: Yes.

15 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you.

16 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Any other questions? I'd like  
17 to make a motion to adjourn.

18 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: So moved.

19 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Second.

20 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: All in favor?

21 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

22 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: All opposed? All right. The  
23 meeting is now adjourned.


