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2	CHAIRPERSON	FERGUSON:	Good	evening,	the	meeting	will
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- 3 now come to order. Can we have an invocation please by
- 4 Pastor Sterling Brewer who is also pastor, ecumenical.
- 5 The Interfaith Chairman Council of Baptist Pastors of
- 6 Detroit.
- 7 PASTOR BREWER: First of all, I would like to say
- 8 good evening and as the pastor of King David Baptist
- 9 Church, I'd like to welcome the congregation to District
- 10 3 as well as acknowledging the commanders and also the
- 11 residents of this district. Thank you for bringing the
- 12 Board of Police Commissioners to our community as well as
- 13 to this church. My prayer is that this place facility
- 14 will meet your comfort of standard that would allow you
- 15 to carry out your mission. Once again, I say welcome to
- 16 King David Missionary Baptist Church. Let us pray. Father
- 17 God, we come now to say thank you God for this day. Thank
- 18 you, Lord for all the leaders that are gatherers and
- 19 community stakeholders and residents that are gathered in
- 20 this facility. Thank you, heavenly Father, for being able
- 21 to stand here and for this facility with the stakeholders
- 22 in this people here that are meeting, Lord, that we will
- 23 be better because of all of us today or brothers that you
- 24 have commissioned or commanded us and we will carry out
- 25 timely. Thank you for this right now. In the name of

- 3 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you. Introduction of
- 4 commissioners.
- 5 MS. SHAW: Thank you, Chair Bryan Ferguson Here,
- 6 District 1.
- 7 MS. SHAW: Commissioner Holt Good evening. Annie
- 8 Holt Vice-Chair At-Large.
- 9 MS. SHAW: Commissioner Willie Bell has an excuse.
- 10 MS. SHAW: Commissioner Linda Bernard Attorney
- 11 Linda Bernard, hello everyone, District 2.
- 12 MS. SHAW: Commissioner Willie Burton Commissioner
- 13 Willie Burton is present on behalf of Detroit residence.
- MS. SHAW: Commissioner Lisa Carter also submitted an
- 15 excuse of absence.
- MS. SHAW: Commissioner Jesus Hernandez -
- 17 MS. SHAW: Commissioner Jim Holley Present.
- 18 MS. SHAW: Commissioner Ricardo Moore Good evening,
- 19 Commissioner Ricardo Moore here, District 7.
- 20 MS. SHAW: Commissioner OuanTez Pressley -
- 21 MS. SHAW: Commissioner Cedric Banks Cedric Banks
- 22 present, District 3.
- 23 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you. Now I'd like to
- 24 have the approval of the April 13th, 2023, agenda.
- 25 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Second.



- 1 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Any discussion? All in favor?
- 2 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
- 3 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: All opposed? The agenda is
- 4 approved. I'd like to have approval of the minutes for
- 5 March 30th, 2023.
- 6 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Second.
- 7 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Any discussion? All in favor?
- 8 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
- 9 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: All opposed? Those minutes
- 10 have been approved. Now we need approval of the minutes
- 11 for April 6th, 2023.
- 12 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Second.
- 13 MS. SHAW: Mr. Chair, we do have a correction that's
- 14 identified from the meeting last week on April 6th. So
- 15 the Board Secretary report, the last investigator
- 16 candidate was misidentified. The correct name is Courtney
- 17 Blakes.
- 18 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Those corrections. Do we have
- 19 any other corrections? No more discussion? All in favor?
- 20 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
- 21 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: All opposed? Corrections
- 22 approved for the minutes. Introduction of BOPC staff, Ms.
- 23 Shaw.
- MS. SHAW: Thank you, Mr. Chair. For our BOPC staff,
- 25 we have Mr. Robert Brown, Ms. Blossom. Attorney Adam



- 1 Saxby is on Zoom. Parliamentarian Dr. Francis Jackson,
- 2 Ms. Jonya Underwood and Ms. Candace Hayes are supporting
- 3 on Zoom. We have Ainsley Cromwell, Ms. LiSonya Sloan, Ms.
- 4 Pamela King, DPD HR director Katrina Patillo, Sign
- 5 language interpreters Ms. Toi and Ms. Yakata. Don
- 6 Handyside is here, our court reporter and with audio
- 7 Sergeant Alan Quinn audio, Sorry, Media Services for
- 8 video. Sergeant Alan Audio.
- 9 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Fantastic. Who do we have
- 10 sitting in for the Chief?
- 11 COMMISSIONER: Mr. Chair, if I may [Audio
- 12 Distortion].
- 13 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Fantastic. Ms. Shaw, do we
- 14 have any officials representing?
- 15 MS. SHAW: Thank you. We have Ms. Kim Jackson, 11
- 16 Precinct Community Relations Council President, District
- 17 4 CAC member Scotty Boman, former Commissioner Shirley
- 18 Birch, as well as Scott Benson and Elaine Counts.
- 19 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair.
- 20 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes.
- 21 COMMISSIONER BURTON: No disrespect to anyone sitting
- 22 at this table. I think when we have a honorable
- 23 councilman here, Scott Benson, who we respect on his
- 24 title in his name, Honorable Counselman, Scott Benson. No
- 25 disrespect to anyone at this table. I'm just saying it's



- 1 an honor and a privilege to have someone from council
- 2 that's a representative, this community president and I
- 3 speak for all meetings.
- 4 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: I'm going to do you one done.
- 5 Councilman Benson, can you please come up and give us a
- 6 brief?
- 7 MR. BENSON: Hey, good evening, everybody. Everyone,
- 8 thank you and thank you commissioner as well. Let's
- 9 really appreciate being able to talk this evening. I
- 10 really appreciate the Board of Police Commissioners
- 11 bringing and leading to the Third District, especially
- 12 here to our Missionary Baptist Church. It's always a
- 13 privilege to welcome this esteemed body to the Third
- 14 District when you're here to do work. Also, I just want
- 15 to really say thank you to members of the 11th Precinct
- 16 who are here behind. This is my second day. I've been
- 17 able to see them. They did a fantastic job when they came
- 18 to an anti-roof smoking tobacco workshop yesterday. They
- 19 had a forum, and they had a huge turnout. They really
- 20 brought light to the issue of gas stations and party
- 21 stores selling flavored tobacco products to our youth in
- 22 an attempt to get them hooked as the next generation
- 23 smokers of tobacco in the US. It was fantastic.
- MR. BENSON: They have these stores who came out of
- 25 the representation and really brought light to this



- 1 program. Not sure if you are aware they could see. I hope
- 2 I'm not stealing your thunder right now. It was a big
- 3 deal for me yesterday. It was that in the scene operation
- 4 and out of 22, is that the accurate number? Out of 22
- 5 party stores and gas stations around Osborne or Pershing
- 6 High School, 60 knowingly, not fake, not tricked them
- 7 into it. They knowingly sold tobacco, tobacco products to
- 8 minors and underage children. So there is a deliberate
- 9 attempt to make sure that our youth are smoking these
- 10 products and are moving their way towards either death,
- 11 stroke, or debilitating disease. The three largest
- 12 killers wrecking the United States, stroke, cancer, and
- 13 heart attacks are the three byproducts of smoking
- 14 tobacco. So I want to give them a round of applause for a
- 15 good presentation. Now if you'd like to entertain, I'd
- 16 like an opportunity to talk about Corporation Council,
- 17 Chief's Office as a part of this to bring more attention
- 18 and then use the mighty council of the states to help
- 19 enforce compliance with people not selling to our youth.
- 20 So, just once again, I want to welcome everybody here.
- 21 Thank you all for hosting this this evening. My
- 22 commissioner, they did this. Good to see you as well this
- 23 evening. Thank you all. Thank you for being in the Third
- 24 District.
- 25 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you. Let the record show



- 1 that Commissioner Pressley has entered. Thank you,
- 2 commissioner. Commissioner Banks, can you give some
- 3 greetings before we go to the Chief.
- 4 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Yes, I would. I thank God for
- 5 the 11th Precinct because back in 2016 when President
- 6 Jackson would be defeated. That Number 11 Sergeants crew
- 7 gave me all types of hot spots. Me and my church were
- 8 praying over them. Back then I took me and my church
- 9 members, remember that, Sergeant? Faithfully, we were
- 10 going out there every week. I thanked God for Captain
- 11 Jackson, Sergeant Bruce, Kim Jackson, President. My man
- 12 Levy there, officer he brought there, they were a big
- 13 blessing to me. I never will forget it and God bless you
- 14 all. Okay. Kim Jackson, thank you for giving me that
- 15 opportunity. Sergeant of Arms. That was a blessing.
- 16 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: All right.
- 17 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Mr. Chair, thank you for
- 18 allowing me to speak. Chief White send his regards. I
- 19 will Introduce the DPD team here. I am Franklin Hayes,
- 20 Deputy Chief from Crime Strategies Bureau. Also, in
- 21 attendance we have Sergeant Alan Quinn, Corporal Torres,
- 22 who is our assistant. Sorry, I've got quite a bit but
- 23 [Audio Distortion) support, as well as Charles Ewing from
- 24 the Office of Chief White. I'd like to turn my approval
- 25 over to Commander Jacqueline Bridget so that she can



- 1 introduce our awesome team here.
- 2 COMMANDER BRIDGET: Good evening, everyone.
- 3 COMMISSIONERS: Good evening.
- 4 COMMANDER BRIDGET: Introduction of officers names
- 5 not discernable Sergeant Dan Robinson. At the back is
- 6 NPO Marshall Williams. I think outside we have NPO Eric
- 7 Hill, and then we have our NPO in training. Rena is
- 8 outside. So I'm going to be very brief for time. Number
- 9 11, I came over here. I was reassigned in...
- 10 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Well, you're going to get your
- 11 ten minutes.
- 12 COMMANDER BRIDGET: I thought it was my time.
- 13 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: No. Beg your pardon.
- 14 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you. So once again, I
- 15 want to thank everyone for coming out. My name is Bryan
- 16 Ferguson. I am the Chairperson of the Board of Police
- 17 Commissioners. I have the rest of my colleagues.
- 18 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: This is a tough call, right?
- 19 Being a Board of Police Commissioner. Often, I told
- 20 somebody. I said two things you should be before they
- 21 decide to take this job. You got to be two things, either
- 22 rich or retired. But then I found out you have got to
- 23 really care. So when you care, those first two don't even
- 24 matter. Right. As commissioners, we have a heavy lifting
- 25 to do from tough decisions. I said often time or a



- 1 million times before that me being Chair is undertaken.
- 2 It's overwhelming sometime. But this is what Bishop is
- 3 probably here do. I had to make some decisions that I
- 4 never thought I'd had to make over my whole entire life.
- 5 My guy's counseling if you're watching you got to talk.
- 6 You did not tell me I'm going into this. A couple other
- 7 things. Commissioners, when you go out into the public
- 8 and you put on your presentations, I love it. Invite the
- 9 other commissioners. Invite the staff, invite the OCI
- 10 staff. They would love to come and hear your
- 11 presentations too.
- 12 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Please don't discourage any
- 13 staff or commissioners from coming to hear what you have
- 14 to say, especially when you use the Board material as
- 15 your material to hand out. I had to do that. Those are
- 16 some of the things I've been running into. Some of the
- 17 things I had to try to squash if you will. That is all
- 18 from my report. Who's going to read the resolution for
- 19 Lieutenant Kimberly Gabriel?
- 20 COMMISSIONER BANKS: You got one right here, Mr.
- 21 Chair on your left.
- 22 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Pastor Banks.
- COMMISSIONER BANKS: Alright, here we go. Resolution
- 24 honoring Lieutenant Kimberly A. Gabriel. Whereas Kimberly
- 25 Gabriel was appointed to the Detroit Police Department of



- 1 1995, upon graduating from the Metropolitan Police
- 2 Academy. Officer Gabriel began her career at the Seventh
- 3 Precinct. Whereas Officer Gabriel spent seven years at
- 4 the Seventh Precinct and Crime Scene Services. Officer
- 5 Gabriel displayed tremendous knowledge and leadership
- 6 skills as an officer and was promoted to the rank of
- 7 sergeant, February the sixth, 2004. Sergeant Gabriel's
- 8 assignments included recruiting, the Seventh Precinct,
- 9 internal controls, and sex crimes. On July the 30th, 2018
- 10 she was promoted to lieutenant. Her assignments included
- 11 the Seventh Precinct, Chief's neighborhood liaison and
- 12 internal and external relations where she served until
- 13 her retirement.
- 14 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Whereas Chief Gabriel was the
- 15 deserving recipient of the following awards. Chief's
- 16 Merit Award, both Consent Judgment Awards, the Ford
- 17 Fireworks Award, the Major League Baseball All Star
- 18 Recognition and all Rosa Parks Funeral Recognition Award
- 19 and the Super Bowl League Recognition Award, as well as
- 20 numerous veterans of recommendations of citizens and
- 21 superiors. Whereas Lieutenant Gabriel has tirelessly
- 22 served as a Detroit Police Department for the citizens of
- 23 Detroit and its neighborhood communities for 27 years.
- 24 She has served the Detroit Police Department and the
- 25 citizen of the city of Detroit with loyalty,



- 1 professionalism, integrity, dedication, and has widely
- 2 respected the law enforcement community as the consummate
- 3 professional.
- 4 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Now therefore, be it resolved
- 5 the Detroit Board of Police Commissioners speaking on the
- 6 behalf of the citizens of this great city of Detroit,
- 7 recognize and honors the lifelong contribution and
- 8 commitment to her excellence in public service of
- 9 Lieutenant Kimberly A. Gabriel. Her display of courage
- 10 and unwavering community spirit has improved the property
- 11 of life for the citizens of Detroit. We wish you all the
- 12 best in your future. We thank you and congratulate you to
- 13 Kimberly A. Gabriel.
- 14 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Through the Chair.
- 15 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes.
- 16 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: I move that we place this
- 17 resolution honoring Lieutenant A. Gabriel in the archive
- 18 for commissioners.
- 19 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Is there a second?
- 20 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Second.
- 21 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Any discussion? All in favor?
- 22 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
- 23 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: All opposed? It shall be
- 24 entered into the record. Thank you. Before we move to the
- 25 Chief, I want another reminder. As a reminder, the



- 1 administrative team is continuing the community contact
- 2 collection campaign. BOPC is collecting this information
- 3 operation to increase our community engagement. If you
- 4 have contact information for any community group, please
- 5 provide the contact information so we can be in touch.
- 6 You can fill out a paper form at the welcome table right
- 7 in the back and hand it to Mr. Brown. Mr. Brown, raise
- 8 your hand and on Zoom. Zoom attendees, send the contact
- 9 information directly to the host in the chat or follow
- 10 the Google link form in the chat. You can also email that
- 11 information to us at bopc@detroitmi.gov. That's
- 12 bopc@detroitmi.gov. Also, everyone, if they have
- 13 Facebook, go to our BOPC Facebook page, and hit like so
- 14 you can get up to date on what's going on with BOPC and
- 15 the meeting links. I mean, not links but the meeting
- 16 agenda.
- 17 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: If you notice, we put a Zoom
- 18 link on there, so you don't have to search for it. But
- 19 when you see an agenda, you can tap on the blue Zoom
- 20 link. It's going to take you right to us. Make it really
- 21 easy doing that for our citizens. That's what they've
- 22 been asking. Commissioner, if you make it easy for us, we
- 23 just barely got on Facebook. Thank God..
- 24 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Through the Chair.
- 25 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Okay.



- 1 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Did I understand that you're
- 2 saying community groups to give to everyone.
- 3 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes.
- 4 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay. I know Ms. Shaw please but
- 5 I'll suggest Ms. Shaw put this zip code into the service.
- 6 We'll be able to find most of the community associations
- 7 and block clubs venues. That's just another.
- 8 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Fantastic. Another
- 9 information. Thank you. Assistant Chief, now you're up.
- 10 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Thank you. Again, Mr. Chair,
- 11 just briefly for clarification as it relates to the
- 12 agenda. I don't see the presentation for Number 11.
- 13 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: You probably have the old
- 14 agenda. We have it.
- 15 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: It's under Number 11.
- 16 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: I understood. If not, the Chief
- 17 can have my time relating to that. Understood? I think
- 18 everyone [audio distortion] honorable counsel president
- 19 [audio distortion] virtually. I'd just like to share some
- 20 of the work that's going on by your Detroit Police
- 21 Department and the work that we're doing. Now, officer
- 22 Health and Safety is something that is essential for us
- 23 to be out and serve the community. Once you have the
- 24 status of a few officers that were injured. So we
- 25 currently have 2 members now who are out disabled. One



- 1 officer from the Seven Precinct, one from 10. Both were
- 2 involved in vehicle accidents where they were shot at.
- 3 One has an extremely long wound recovery scale. But I ask
- 4 that although there is uncertainty them in your prayer
- 5 and wish them well and they have a full recovery. Covid
- 6 is something that still affects us all. Nine members are
- 7 currently quarantined or isolated. Same numbers last
- 8 week. We had 9 last week and now this week.
- 9 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Of those 9, 5 are positive.
- 10 Still testing positive (audio distortion). As far as
- 11 crime, we officers were able to get started but a bit of
- 12 work to do. We are continuing to do the work. We're up 8%
- 13 in our homicides. Last year we had 67. 3% in our non-
- 14 fatal shooting. We're up 168 last year, 170 this year. In
- 15 our robberies they are up 10%, 122 in 2022 and 355 year
- 16 to date in 2023. That's 30 additional. So in all, we are
- 17 up 5% violent crime. We are continuing to do the work. We
- 18 have a robust crime strategy, a manual focus of our
- 19 police precincts as well as the manual focus on driving
- 20 crime down by 10%. So diligently we started, and we
- 21 continue to do the work as our commitment. Everything in
- 22 our power to drive this number down without the written
- 23 agreement. One of the other initiatives is our drag
- 24 racing.
- 25 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Cities across the country deal



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- 1 with this issue. Detroit is not immune. So we have a
- 2 dedicated force to address this. This past weekend, we
- 3 investigated 31 people, 15 traffic stops, we issued 4
- 4 citations, 24 vehicles that we investigated and made 1
- 5 felony arrest. Since we started this detail on March
- 6 24th, we had investigated 144 individuals, 95 traffic
- 7 stops, 72 citations, investigated 112 vehicles, impounded
- 8 5, made 4 felony arrests, 1 misdemeanor arrest, and 1
- 9 weapon recovered. Have this just to both continue on drag
- 10 racing detail in efforts to combat describing issue that
- 11 evaluation. Our mental health calls numbers year to date
- 12 for our service calls. Our mental nonviolent are 869
- 13 year-to-date, we're at 846 year-to-date in 2022. So
- 14 that's 53 additional. For our mental violent arm, 378
- 15 this year, 276. That's 102 additional.
- 16 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: For our mental violent not
- 17 armed, we're at 1,517 this year. We were at 1,326 last
- 18 year. Our suicides in progress, we were at 383 this year.
- 19 2 93 last year. That's 90 additional calls. Our suicide
- 20 threats were at 785 this year, 773 last year. So the
- 21 calls that didn't come in. Our total was 3004. I'm sorry,
- 22 2,932 this year, 3,514 last year. So we are almost 4,000
- 23 calls more than we serviced year to date. I'm sorry, 400
- 24 calls more service year to date with the mental health.
- 25 We talked about and shared. If you were present for our



- 1 unveiling of our mental health co response unit and
- 2 service, and the help that those that are in crisis need
- 3 when they call. So we continue to do that work. We're
- 4 still working on innovative ways to get the services to
- 5 those in need. So we continue to report on the progress
- 6 of this.
- 7 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: This is a significant incident
- 8 I'd like to share with you. The carjacking that happened
- 9 March 19th. While officers were dispatched to the 13,000
- 10 block of Livernois to investigate the call for service
- 11 for robbery carjacking. The victim pulled up in a U-Haul
- 12 truck, produced firearms and took the victim's 2016
- 13 Chrysler as well as his personal ID. Members of our
- 14 Commercial Auto Theft Unit quickly jumped on the case and
- 15 shortly thereafter, apprehended the individual
- 16 responsible for this. Just want to take a moment to
- 17 highlight about some amazing partners that are also
- 18 commit. The city state US attorney. This case got the
- 19 attention of the US Attorney office. They have adopted
- 20 this. So the individual responsible for this have been
- 21 charged federal for this offense. So thanks for that
- 22 partnership. Second incident is the April 7 shooting of a
- 23 16 year. Officers responded to 2000 at Murray Hill where
- 24 we found a 16-year-old that was struck in the chest. We
- 25 were able to obtain two individuals at the scene. One was



- 1 a 15-year-old man who was later charged with the shooter.
- 2 He was the shooter. So he was charged.
- 3 COMMISSIONER: 15?
- 4 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Yes, sir. So he is in juvenile
- 5 Detention Center in Wayne County. We are waiting. He's
- 6 awaiting charges. Deciding whether charges are there. We
- 7 had the domestic violence finger stabbing that happened
- 8 in 1900 block of Cadbury. This started when officers were
- 9 dispatched to Henry Ford Hospital for stabbing. The
- 10 victim once they got to the hospital was pronounced dead.
- 11 From that, we found out that the suspect, the victim's
- 12 sister got into a verbal altercation that turned violent.
- 13 From then the suspect's stabbed the victim's distant
- 14 boyfriend. So he's been identified, apprehended. One he
- 15 was submitted to the prosecutor's office and was charged
- 16 with second degree murder. Something that we continue to
- 17 work on. It's troubling every time. That's one of our
- 18 reasons to deal with gun violence.
- 19 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: On April eighth, we had the
- 20 shooting of a five-year-old. Officers dispatched to the
- 21 children's hospital for the shooting. Now, once the
- 22 officers arrived at the scene, they discovered that the
- 23 victim, five-year-old male had been shot in the back. The
- 24 doctors from the emergency room treated the victim. Our
- 25 investigation led us to the home of the 19,000 block of



- 1 Hornet. Our witnesses explained to the officer that the
- 2 victim was shot when the witness' weapon fell out of his
- 3 jacket pocket and stated that the weapon accidentally
- 4 discharged and striked the victim. This individual had a
- 5 valid CPN. The witness was arrested and taken to police
- 6 for processing and discovered a registered handgun to the
- 7 suspect later in the investigation, which that weapon
- 8 that discharged and struck that five-year-old on April
- 9 10th. When he was submitted to the Wayne County
- 10 Prosecutor's office, that warrant was later signed for
- 11 careless discharge of a firearm causing injury and
- 12 weapons felony firearm. He was arranged as a hundred
- 13 thousand dollars personal bond.
- 14 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: The incident made the news
- 15 nationally serve everybody and everyone in this
- 16 committee. This time, we rescue lost Tony. This Tuesday
- 17 officers of the Second Precinct responded to a call from
- 18 a horse shop from officers from the Second Precinct.
- 19 [audio distortion] to an animal farm animal shelter to be
- 20 treated and get it to a home. But again, certainly that
- 21 community that's fine with it. Certainly. Two things are
- 22 going on nationally. National telecommunications talk
- 23 about it. Certainly, one call dispatchers and everyone
- 24 had that as the tagline. So when someone is in a Police
- 25 Services. Whether it's fire, those individuals that get



- 1 them the resources they need. Again, I acknowledge that I
- 2 would encourage you if you're in the building, catch them
- 3 this week. Shut down communication on floor to see the
- 4 problem. Again, on Wednesday they celebrated its
- 5 telecommunications staff, my hosting union, which consist
- 6 of a series of events that brought the units together in
- 7 our emergency service.
- 8 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Employment operators,
- 9 dispatchers, crime manners, and telephone crime reporting
- 10 all tables were invited to breakfast. Staff were able to
- 11 also attend the hostile class and lunch was catered in.
- 12 Remember graciously hosting the Cater group for the team
- 13 that were extremely grateful. It ended with a photo group
- 14 just to capture the moment of appreciation of this work
- 15 by all public services. Thank you to something that we
- 16 don't hear quite often. So, we captured the lives of
- 17 [audio distortion]. This afternoon we had a placement
- 18 ceremony in honor of child abuse prevention where our
- 19 special unit organized an event recognizing child abuse
- 20 prevention room at Detroit Headquarters. Our child abuse
- 21 room there's pinwheels. Pinwheels represents the joint
- 22 happiness of childhood that is [audio distortion] abuse
- 23 under control. In addition to placing pinwheels, child
- 24 abuse staff also had speakers to present about National
- 25 Child Abuse Prevention Month and our partners from the



- 1 media were there and present for the event.
- 2 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Then our suicide awareness event
- 3 wrapping up National Telecommunicators Week tomorrow.
- 4 From four to eight, we will have suicide awareness
- 5 information, yoga, meditation, and self-care exercises
- 6 will be available. We will have comfort animals. Those
- 7 animals, again. From noon to four will be those that talk
- 8 about the importance of life insurance and estate
- 9 planning during those same honors. Then from two to three
- 10 there'll be an award ceremony where we will be presenting
- 11 those from Telecommunicators week. So again, a great day
- 12 for DPD and some great things going on this week. So I
- 13 have nothing further from my report. I will gladly answer
- 14 any questions to the best I can. If I can't get you the
- 15 answer today, I will promptly follow up with you after
- 16 this meeting to get answers.
- 17 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Fantastic. Thank you. Great
- 18 report as always. I just got a couple. For the suicide in
- 19 progress, how many of those have you saved? Do you have
- 20 that number? I know it's like 300 something. But they
- 21 didn't go through with it, right?
- 22 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: That's correct.
- 23 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Okay.
- 24 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: That's someone proclaiming their
- 25 willingness to self-harm. I can get that number for you.



- 1 Based on our homicide rates alone they are few and far in
- 2 between if any have actually been carried out. So I can
- 3 ask. I can get that number from our team and provide that
- 4 to you, Mr. Chair.
- 5 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Then when that happens, do
- 6 they get some help for that? They send them to. Okay.
- 7 Fantastic.
- 8 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Mr. Chair, consistent with our
- 9 practices and policies, once someone claims to self-harm,
- 10 we get them to a facility to get them the care that they
- 11 need to return to baseline or to a place where whatever
- 12 their issue is, self-harming has been taken out of the
- 13 equation is no longer under consideration. That's with
- 14 each and every run of a mental health nexus. Whether it's
- 15 the officer that petitions, whether it's a family member
- 16 that petitions them for the mental health care that they
- 17 need. That absolutely happens, sir.
- 18 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Okay. Fantastic. Commissioner
- 19 Burton.
- 20 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Mr. Chair, I have a couple of
- 21 questions. I'll just raise one now. Chief, when it comes
- 22 to officers and having breathalyzers in their vehicle,
- 23 where the department is today as far as purchasing more
- 24 breathalyzers? Do you think we have enough breathalyzers
- 25 for each officer that's on patrol? Or where are we from a



- 1 department or a city? Where do we stand right now as far
- 2 as purchasing new breathalyzers or where we and how the
- 3 breathalyzers that we have currently, how effective are
- 4 they?
- 5 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Through the Chair. Commissioner,
- 6 so two parts. The breathalyzer machine is not a mobile
- 7 device. That is something that are stationary at the time
- 8 that determination is made that someone is operating a
- 9 motor vehicle under some type of influence. What officers
- 10 carry on the street is known as a PBT, a preliminary
- 11 breath test. Excuse me. We do have several and the
- 12 quantity that we have in no way impacts negatively our
- 13 ability to properly administer them when needed or when
- 14 requested to do that. Excuse me. If you'd like for me to
- 15 get an inventory or a number of how many we have, I can
- 16 certainly get that to you. But from our management
- 17 service that monitors our assets and our supplies that we
- 18 have, we are nowhere near a level that's critical that
- 19 would impair us for making OWIRS.
- 20 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Okay. Thank you, Chief.
- 21 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Yes.
- 22 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Moore.
- COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I don't
- 24 have any questions now. DC I'll forward. the questions
- 25 right in through our secretary.



- 1 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Thank you, Commissioner Moore.
- 2 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Banks.
- 3 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Yes. Chair. Peace and blessings
- 4 to you, DC. Now what type of treatment does a suicide
- 5 victim get? What type of treatment? Well, we can you
- 6 mention that offhand.
- 7 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Thank you. Again, through the
- 8 Chair, commissioner Banks, we will take them to a medical
- 9 facility. We would get them there and the medical
- 10 professionals do that part. We don't administer any. We
- 11 certainly get to a point, and we've been trained through
- 12 our mental health co response to have that dialogue, to
- 13 bring them down and deescalate them. We have a
- 14 partnership with DWIHN who may have a clinician that is
- 15 in towed that can communicate with them to that point
- 16 that we can safely get them there. But once we get them
- 17 there those practices are done by the medical
- 18 professionals at the facilities, Sinai Grace, Henry Ford
- 19 Hospital, or any of the other facilities that we've
- 20 partnered with to do that. So I can't speak specifically
- 21 to what the healthcare specialists do and the services
- 22 they provide.
- 23 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Yes. I got one more. How is the
- 24 wellbeing of the five-year-old little boy? How's this
- 25 wellbeing doing, DC?



- 1 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Commissioner, I would have to
- 2 follow up with you on that. Whether it be our child Abuse
- 3 unit, I believe they are taking the case. I'm not sure,
- 4 but I can get that information and certainly get back.
- 5 COMMANDER BRIDGET: Through the Chair. That incident
- 6 happened in the 11th Precinct. The, the young man has
- 7 been released and he's doing fine.
- 8 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Wonderful. Thank you for that.
- 9 Commander.
- 10 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Good evening, everyone. Please
- 11 take the base off of my mic so people can hear me. Please
- 12 take the base off of the mic. Several things, Deputy
- 13 Chief. Assistant Chief, sorry. Pardon me. Couple of
- 14 things. First of all, last week, I asked the officer that
- 15 was here to come back to the Board and let us know. We'll
- 16 call them music man. The man from your church or somebody
- 17 to get our sound right. Anyway, I asked that the tape
- 18 that had been recorded, the body cam footage of the young
- 19 man that was shot, I believe 18 times by the police
- 20 department who had a pin knife be released to the public.
- 21 What's the status of that request? It's appropriate. It's
- 22 been more than enough time and the community has insisted
- 23 that they see it. I'm in accord with that.
- 24 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Through the Chair, Commissioner
- 25 Bernard. To that matter, if it's an ongoing



- 1 investigation, if it's evidence and part of a criminal
- 2 investigation, that determination is made by Chief White
- 3 and possibly in consultation with the prosecutor. So I'm
- 4 not sure where we are as far as it being published. I was
- 5 not at the table last week when you made that request. I
- 6 can take the request now and follow up. Within writing, I
- 7 can give you a response as to whether the determination
- 8 has been made, if it's appropriate at this time or if not
- 9 now, when. I can get you that information.
- 10 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: It's unacceptable for the
- 11 community to have waited this long. We've seen the video
- 12 of shooters in schools and in Tennessee and here and
- 13 there and people robbing banks and everything and we
- 14 can't see a video of our own department involving the
- 15 death of a young African American male. It's unacceptable
- 16 and it is a disgrace, in my opinion. I mean that. So I
- 17 look forward to hearing again from you next week.
- 18 Secondly I guess you probably know already the good news
- 19 that the bills that were in the legislature that
- 20 indicated that we are going to have increased gun control
- 21 in the state of Michigan have passed including the red
- 22 flag law, which will allow the police department to take
- 23 a weapon from anyone who may even have one with a CCW
- 24 with a concealed weapon permit if in fact they have
- 25 mental illness or it's reported that they have problems



- 1 or something like that.
- 2 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: So we're trying to sort of
- 3 close that window of weapons within the community. So
- 4 that was approved today. The governor will probably sign
- 5 it next week. Thirdly, I know that you're aware that of
- 6 course, last month was Women's History Month. But today
- 7 as well before the end of this month April 28th the
- 8 department commander will have to have rooms where women
- 9 officers can nurse their child or pump whatever they've
- 10 got to do. It can't be the bathroom. The law is very
- 11 clear. It has to be a nice room, quiet room in response
- 12 to the needs of women. Also there's a new pregnancy act
- 13 that has just been approved by the legislature, which
- 14 will do more for all women who are in business or in the
- 15 city of Detroit, everywhere throughout the state of
- 16 Michigan in terms of the rights that they have vis-a-vis
- 17 their employer.
- 18 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Of course, that includes
- 19 police officers. Finally, I'm excited about the fact that
- 20 they announced today that they're going to continue
- 21 cursive in the Detroit Public Schools. I think it's
- 22 disgraceful that people can't write their name or don't
- 23 have a signature. A signature is a very important thing,
- 24 and we're going to have that. But I wanted to ask you
- 25 Deputy Chief, if in fact you would consider this. We only



- 1 have 50,000 kids in the Detroit Public School system.
- 2 Each precinct has a neighborhood police officer force.
- 3 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Point of order. Mr. Chairman,
- 4 this doesn't have anything to do with this meeting or
- 5 this agenda?
- 6 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner, she has the
- 7 floor.
- 8 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I'm asking you if you would
- 9 consider, and the Chief would consider asking a police
- 10 officer. It could be the neighborhood police officer in
- 11 that particular precinct, go to visit each of the schools
- 12 in the precinct. Kids don't have any idea. They see stuff
- 13 on TV, and they see the movies and stuff. But I think
- 14 that if we become more personal with the community kids
- 15 in the junior high and high school and they get used to
- 16 seeing you and develop a relationship with you, they will
- 17 be more inclined to do what the mayor just asked all of
- 18 us to do, which is shot stopper. Which means they'll be
- 19 less inclined to fire a weapon, less inclined to take
- 20 someone's life. So we can all do more. I'm just thinking
- 21 that if we do that, it will have a very positive impact.
- 22 Both male and female officers. They just go into the
- 23 school once a month. They go through, speak to this
- 24 class, speak to that class. If that's okay with you. I
- 25 know you have to let them do it. But that concludes my



- 1 request. Mr. Chairman.
- 2 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Oh, there were a lot of things
- 3 thrown out. So I think there were two that I can
- 4 appropriately respond to and I'll start off with the
- 5 latter and our youth. It is our commitment to ford
- 6 relationships, build bridges and help the next
- 7 generation, future police chiefs and deputy police chiefs
- 8 and preachers and pastors and executives and police
- 9 commissioners. So anytime we have an invitation to bridge
- 10 that gap, to shift the narrative, shift the paradigm and
- 11 build a relationship, humanize the badge, we will always
- 12 accept that. We have programs through our brotherhood,
- 13 through our sisterhood that are actively going on now
- 14 where we're in the high schools and we're talking with
- 15 them. We have a story organization that we meet with
- 16 these young student athlete and again, help build
- 17 bridges. We are playing with them. We have community and
- 18 parody events, whether it's basketball, whether it's
- 19 softball, whether it's flag football, whether it's
- 20 hockey. So we are certainly doing everything we can to
- 21 help our future leaders and shift that narrative and
- 22 humanize the badges that we wear.
- 23 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Even the new cadets
- 24 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Absolutely.
- 25 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: They can really identify with



- 1 other kids that are 19 years old.
- DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Yes. Yes, ma'am.
- 3 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.
- 4 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Then the second piece that you
- 5 mentioned as it relates to nursing mothers, that is
- 6 something that Chief White was near and dear to him.
- 7 Certainly, from his time away serving civil rights
- 8 understanding that. So we have been in compliance. We
- 9 have made those spaces, those rooms available as the
- 10 statutes have indicated. Plus we've gone beyond what that
- 11 takes for again, our nursing mothers here in the
- 12 department. So we are certainly in compliance with that.
- 13 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you. Commissioner
- 14 Pressley.
- 15 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Yes, thank you and through
- 16 the Chair. Our questions are concerning the homicide
- 17 numbers noting that the warm weather, because it really
- 18 hit us. It has me truly concerned about what the summer
- 19 holds for us. I am deeply empathetic to what officers
- 20 have to endure, particularly that you respond to crime in
- 21 very few instances are you able to prevent it, not being
- 22 able to read people's mind. But today, I eulogized young
- 23 man by the name of Joshaun Isam, a 24-year-old who was
- 24 shot twice on the west side of Detroit, a scholar
- 25 athlete, 4.0 student. My heart just really goes out to



- 1 this community that we really are losing the best of us
- 2 before they even blossom into their potential. So I take
- 3 this opportunity at the community meeting to suggest that
- 4 we've got some real work to do. Some serious, deep,
- 5 thorough work to do to ensure that we save the lives of
- 6 our future. I recognize, again, that officers can't do it
- 7 all. We have to be able to collaborate with one another
- 8 to ensure that our communities are safe.
- 9 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Because oftentimes the
- 10 answers to our prayers are the children being gunned down
- 11 before they are able to realize their potential. So,
- 12 again, I recognize that the restraints of strategy and
- 13 tools and instruments that allows us to reduce this. But
- 14 think that we're already 8% ahead and it just started to
- 15 get warm. When I was growing up, there was this notion
- 16 that the east side was more dangerous than the west side.
- 17 But looking at these homicide numbers, there are 17 more
- 18 homicides on the west side than there are on the east
- 19 side.17 more. So I just feel like we really have some
- 20 deep soul searching to do in our community to see if this
- 21 is something that we no longer would tolerate. Honestly,
- 22 honestly, no longer tolerate, because again, the best of
- 23 us are leaving us before they reach their potential. So,
- 24 I don't know if that's a question, but I just had to get
- 25 that off my chest. Because again, as I see these numbers



- 1 it really is untenable. Thank you.
- 2 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Holley.
- 3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you, Mr. Chairman and
- 4 Commissioner Pressley. I think all of us can really be,
- 5 knowing that comment. I think one of the things I think
- 6 what we're concerned about Deputy Chief is how is the
- 7 church and other organizations playing a role in our
- 8 community? For example, when we have Chaplain Corps, I
- 9 want to know first what are the other churches doing in
- 10 the precinct? Perhaps we need to get. We've got three
- 11 preachers on the commission. Maybe we can sit down and
- 12 see what we can do in terms of reactivating them. The
- 13 other thing and I thank you for your report, Deputy
- 14 Chief. Again, as a minister, about a month and a half or
- 15 two months ago, the Chaplain Corps was supposed to make a
- 16 presentation.
- 17 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: They were not able to make the
- 18 presentation. We asked for a presentation from the
- 19 Chaplain Corps two months ago. I know that you are at the
- 20 table, and we'll be asking these questions that you can
- 21 bring the answer back. My concern is that they were
- 22 operating with no budget, and you got a \$300 million
- 23 budget. I don't know what the budget is anymore for the
- 24 police department. I just asked for a thousand dollars a
- 25 month for the Chaplain Corps. There is a memorial that



- 1 the Chaplain Corps has for three officers. We lost three
- 2 officers this year. There's a memorial that takes place
- 3 every year honoring those officers. Then after that, they
- 4 feed about 400 people. So when people make donations,
- 5 they make the donations now. Ilyich Gibson now, he makes
- 6 \$200,000 to the NWACP, which is a good thing.
- 7 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: But the rest of the community, I
- 8 gave to them. The NWACP don't have to give anything to
- 9 you. So I'm just saying to you again, there's no money
- 10 budget for that affair, as I understand it. I'm not here
- 11 to do anything. But what, God. I don't have much of
- 12 anything, but what God gives me is resources and
- 13 relations. I asked to see what I could do to help, and I
- 14 was basically not been called. But I do feel like the
- 15 Chaplain Corps should have a budget. I think that if
- 16 they're going to have 400 people at a event that they're
- 17 going to eat after you have a memorial for the community,
- 18 where would that money come from? They don't have that
- 19 right now. So I'm just asking if you could look at it for
- 20 me.
- 21 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: People come to me a lot of times
- 22 as they do to other people at the Board. They think we
- 23 have a relationship. They think we have Zeus Juice. They
- 24 think we've got the power. Well, I remind them that we
- 25 don't have that much based on what we are seeing here in



- 1 terms of the legal piece. So I'm just saying to you,
- 2 again, I don't mean to be redundant, but I am very
- 3 concerned that the Chaplain Corps has been omitted for
- 4 three months. I asked for them to have a presentation. It
- 5 seems like they may be hesitant about it from your perch.
- 6 Not you, but your perch. So I'm asking if you could help
- 7 me with that. If not, then let me try to help them.
- 8 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: But I'm just saying to you
- 9 again, this memorial for three officers, which I know
- 10 you're concerned about it. We all are when we lose
- 11 somebody. But they have no money to work with. It's my
- 12 understanding at this particular hour. So, I'm only
- 13 saying like Commissioner Pressley says, I don't know if
- 14 it's a question or what, but it's my concern. I'm asking
- 15 if you would put it in your spiritual DNA, and try to get
- 16 something to at least to me, if not for the ministers
- 17 that represent this Board. Am I making sense to you?
- DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Yes, sir. Through the Chair.
- 19 Commissioner Holley, as you indicated, working with our
- 20 faith leaders, we are certainly willing to work with
- 21 those that are committed to driving this violence down.
- 22 Again, to you Commissioner Pressley, as we know, we can't
- 23 do it by ourselves. So, certainly working with our faith
- 24 leaders, we think would be of great value in changing the
- 25 decision making and resorting to violence and extreme



- 1 violence to problem solve. If we can get out of that
- 2 mindset and we can change that, I think we can truly
- 3 drive these numbers down and make a more productive
- 4 society. As your request for the Chaplain Corps being
- 5 very transparent, excuse me. There was a leadership
- 6 shuffle and a bit of reorganization. So we wanted to make
- 7 sure that the presentation that comes before this body is
- 8 clear.
- 9 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: So we know their roles and
- 10 responsibilities, concise, factual and consistent with
- 11 the core of the chaplain, their core vision, core mission
- 12 and values. So I will get with Board Secretary to ensure
- 13 that we get on the calendar so that that presentation
- 14 comes before you by Chief Chaplain Linnell Caldwell. To
- 15 the event that you spoke of, I believe you're speaking of
- 16 our interfaith memorial through donations. The chaplain
- 17 doesn't pay for that out of their pocket. So there is a
- 18 mechanism to ensure that that annual event continues on.
- 19 So we will share with you how we got there and the
- 20 funding source for that. But that event will happen again
- 21 through our partners or through donations. So that event
- 22 is not in jeopardy, and we will certainly follow back up
- 23 with you.
- 24 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Fantastic. VC Holt.
- 25 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you, Assistant Chief Hayes.



- 1 I wish my fifth grade student were you for your delivery
- 2 and the information that you are sharing. Some we can
- 3 smile about, and of course, others that cause us some
- 4 heartache. You make mention about it leaves an imprint in
- 5 our mind when you have to cover some of the more negative
- 6 sides of our society here in the city of Detroit, the
- 7 nation. Okay, one thing you mentioned earlier about DPD
- 8 Child Abuse Unit. I happened to have been on a
- 9 presentation that DWIHN was making regarding abusive
- 10 children, mental, sexual, and obviously physical. There
- 11 was captain Nichols making a presentation. So I mentioned
- 12 it to Ms. Blossom, and she indicated that DPD had made
- 13 this presentation, I guess probably last two years ago.
- 14 So we're looking forward to Captain Nichols bringing that
- 15 presentation to the community because we can all learn
- 16 strategies of how to prevent child abuse. Okay, we also
- 17 had a conversation, the Chair and I. Believe it was the
- 18 commander of the reservist, and I mentioned this, I think
- 19 two, three meetings ago. We were looking forward to
- 20 someone contacting the commander and asking that the
- 21 commander arrange a presentation as it relates to the
- 22 role of the reserve as well.
- DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Through the Chair. Vice-Chair
- 24 Holt. So I happen to know the Deputy Chief responsible
- 25 for both the reserves and the chaplains. You're talking



- 1 to him. So I can assure you that again we'll get in touch
- 2 with the Board Secretary and schedule that presentation
- 3 on your calendar. But you'll certainly get a presentation
- 4 from our reserve Chief, Steve Lewis.
- 5 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you again.
- 6 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Fantastic. Thank you again.
- 7 Awesome.
- 8 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Mr. Chair. Can I ask DC one more
- 9 thing?
- 10 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Go ahead, sir.
- 11 COMMISSIONER BANKS: I was waiting on the answer from
- 12 DC. I was waiting on the answer from DC Cicero. I asked
- 13 him a question about three weeks ago about the Detroit
- 14 Police Department. The Detroit Police Department has a
- 15 violent dating course where you can learn strategies from
- 16 that, which I didn't know. What are some of the
- 17 strategies that you will learn from that violent dating
- 18 course DPD has? Because you got a lot of people out here
- 19 dating, and they're looking for the love of their life.
- 20 What are some of the strategies that you will learn about
- 21 a potential abuser and things if you know offhand, or can
- 22 you get that information to me? I'm not pressing you. I
- 23 did ask Assistant Chief Cicero about three weeks ago, and
- 24 I haven't seen him in a while. But I just want to let
- 25 both of you all know, because I know some folks that's in



- 1 abusive situations and they're looking for love in their
- 2 life.
- 3 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Commissioner, the course that we
- 4 put on for intimate partner violence, it's through a
- 5 series of courses when we talk about human trafficking
- 6 and others. So, I don't know what that curriculum looks
- 7 like. It's changing even from five years ago. The
- 8 prevalence of internet dating and on the apps and things,
- 9 and there's some of the terms that are gaslighting and
- 10 others that they speak about. So it's evolved since I had
- 11 a chance to see that. But I will see if I can get the
- 12 curriculum from our. I'm sorry. Not I will see, I will
- 13 get the curriculum.
- 14 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Appreciate it.
- 15 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Sent to you.
- 16 COMMISSIONER BANKS: I appreciate it. Thank you.
- 17 Thank you, Mr. Chair.
- 18 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes, you're welcome, sir. All
- 19 right. Before we go into oral communication, I have this
- 20 in my public PSA. If you get pulled over by the police
- 21 officers, they should be courteous to you. They should
- 22 treat you with dignity and respect. But if they don't,
- 23 you can fill out a complaint form and our investigators
- 24 will get to the bottom of it. If we do find something
- 25 wrong, we'll be able to give the police officer some



- 1 help. Right? But if you do run across a police officer,
- 2 please be courteous to him because they have a tough
- 3 shot. They really do. They have bad days just like we do.
- 4 So I'm asking, give them a break and I'm pretty sure
- 5 they'll give you one too. If you are drifting drag racing
- 6 and you think you're going to get away, you're not.
- 7 There's a new one that just came out the other day. It
- 8 was in Dearborn. They chased him. Get this, he went into
- 9 Walmart and tried to hide in Walmart. He actually grabbed
- 10 the apron and thought he was an employee.
- 11 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: But once the helicopter gets a
- 12 beat on you, it isn't going to happen. So they picked
- 13 them up. They got him. So let that be a lesson. Once that
- 14 helicopter gets up you might just pull over because
- 15 they're going to catch you. Because they're very good at
- 16 what they do. All right, Mr. Brown.
- MR. BROWN: Mr. Chair, I currently have 11 speakers.
- 18 The first three speakers will be former Commissioner
- 19 Shirley Birch, followed by Ms. Kim Jackson, followed by
- 20 Britain Benjamin Holly.
- 21 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: All right.
- 22 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Remember, you have two
- 23 minutes. Two minutes.
- MS. BIRCH: Excuse me. Is that Chair Ferguson?
- 25 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes, it is.



- 1 MS. BIRCH: This is Commissioner Shirley Birch.
- 2 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Correct.
- 3 MS. BIRCH: I was the commissioner here, so I think
- 4 you can allow me a few more minutes.
- 5 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Well, we can see if you're
- 6 going to open up a can of worms then you come down.
- 7 MS. BIRCH: No.
- 8 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: I can't have that.
- 9 MS. BIRCH: But it's all blessings. So you can give
- 10 me the courtesy like you did to the councilman. Is that
- 11 right, Pastor Holley? So here we go. Here we go.
- 12 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes, ma'am.
- MS. BIRCH: I want to thank you. This is my first
- 14 time back amongst all of my co Board members up there. It
- 15 is so good to see you. I know Chief Hayes very well. Just
- 16 Assistant Chief. I know all of the police officers. I
- 17 know everybody in this room. What we have spoken about
- 18 thus far with what we missed is God. I know you don't
- 19 like to hear. Too many of you don't like to hear that.
- 20 But if we do not come together and stop the division
- 21 amongst our own people, we can't get any further.
- 22 Assistant Chief White, I want you to take back to Chief
- 23 White, the ideas that come from a woman of wisdom.
- MS. BIRCH: I'll have to say that myself, that many
- 25 time our own citizens, and not you are sitting here, the



- 1 ones that are not here. When they drive and hear an
- 2 emergency truck or a fire engine, or the police coming
- 3 behind them, they don't pull over. They keep driving. So
- 4 the mayor and Chief White should do more commercials, get
- 5 out there on that TV to tell them, you must obey
- 6 emergency vehicles. How to address them. Is that right or
- 7 wrong?
- 8 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Right.
- 9 MS. BIRCH: All right. You agree with that?
- 10 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Correct.
- MS. BIRCH: Here's the next thing. I'm not going to
- 12 be too long. Our mission forever in our day, hasn't been
- 13 about love. When you love God, you've got to love me
- 14 despite your differences. So what we are doing with the
- 15 love and respect where you live, that's not only for
- 16 Detroit, that's not for blight, that is for everybody
- 17 that knows what a neighbor is. A neighbor is supposed to
- 18 care about another one and care about their children.
- 19 That's what Mrs. Birch is about. So we need to come
- 20 together, stop bickering the way we do amongst one
- 21 another, and come on out here and build back our
- 22 community called District 3. It is under the Father, Son,
- 23 and the Holy Ghost. Okay. One more thing. Mr. Ferguson.
- 24 One more thing. I have asked Chief White and Assistant
- 25 Hayes, why can't we post more signs saying no loud music,



- 1 no speeding. If you post a sign, it might click in their
- 2 brain eventually. Oh, I'm not supposed to speed. But when
- 3 they get caught one time and they pay that fine, the
- 4 money goes back into the community. Not to Mayor Duggan,
- 5 not to Chief White. It goes in the community where we can
- 6 build and open up these vocational centers for our
- 7 children to go to. They have nowhere to go, so they get
- 8 in trouble. I think that's all I have to say, and I thank
- 9 you for your time.
- 10 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you.
- 11 MS. JACKSON: Good evening to the Board. Thank you
- 12 for coming out this evening. My name is Kim Jackson,
- 13 president of the 11th Precinct Police Community Relations
- 14 Council. So I would like to wish you all a good evening
- 15 and thank you from District 3, 11th Precinct and for King
- 16 David missionary Baptist Church. Just a couple of quick
- 17 things. I want to say thank you to Commander Pritchett,
- 18 Captain Johnson, and all of our officers. I can't speak
- 19 on nobody else's Precinct. I can speak on mine. That's
- 20 the bottom line. I thank the guys every day and the women
- 21 for what they do for us. I thank them and we ought to
- 22 thank them as well just like you said. See them. Be
- 23 courteous. Hello, Hi, and keep moving.
- 24 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Correct.
- MS. BIRCH: We're doing great things over in Number



- 1 11. One thing I'd like to point out is that so far, we've
- 2 given out 14 ring doorbells, and we plan on giving out
- 3 more. The number's steadily growing. I'm hoping to do
- 4 about 50 if not more. But that is a mission that we're
- 5 on. Also, on the 1st of April, we had a 50th anniversary
- 6 sneaker ball, and that was for our explorers. Those men
- 7 and women do such a fabulous job. The event that was put
- 8 on at the Carpenters and Mill Rights Union was amazing. I
- 9 just want to tell our team they did a fabulous job out
- 10 there with our explorers. We also had an Easter egg and a
- 11 wellness fair for the Easter weekend, and it turned out
- 12 very well. Also, just to piggyback off of what Councilman
- 13 Scott Benson mentioned about our Town Hall summit that we
- 14 have for our teens regarding the tobacco and vaping. The
- 15 teens are asking the adults how can we help them? We need
- 16 to be there for them because they want our help.
- MS. BIRCH: They're asking for our help, and that's a
- 18 rarity. So if they're asking, we need to perform. I'm
- 19 here for the long haul unless 11 Precinct kicked me out.
- 20 But I'm here for the long haul. I'm here for the long
- 21 haul. So my commitment to the Explorers. If I see you
- 22 selling, I'm telling. That's my motto. If I see you
- 23 selling, I'm telling. I don't care who you are. Other
- 24 than that, our community meeting for the 11th Precinct
- 25 Police Community Relations Council is every second



- 1 Tuesday, and it is at six o'clock. Thank you.
- 2 COMMISSIONERS: Thank you.
- 3 MS. KELLY: Hello.
- 4 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Hi there.
- 5 MS. KELLY: Hi, my name is Brisson Benjamin Kelly.
- 6 Sorry for my bad handwriting when I wrote my name. I work
- 7 with City Year as a student success coach and DPSCD. Do
- 8 you guys know why many people don't trust the police?
- 9 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yeah. Right, right. Is that a
- 10 rhetorical question?
- 11 MS. KELLY: I mean, you can think about it. I mean,
- 12 you can answer if you want.
- 13 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Go ahead, keep going.
- MS. KELLY: I want to know what they have done to
- 15 earn my trust? I mean, there's never been any real reform
- 16 in the system. Every change has been internal. The
- 17 structure of the system hasn't been changed and that's
- 18 the problem. People are rarely held accountable for their
- 19 abuse of power. Some have been, but it should be
- 20 consistent. On the other hand, there are some people out
- 21 here doing the right thing. But that's their character,
- 22 not their badge. They're rarely praised for making the
- 23 community better. It's about how many arrests you made or
- 24 how many tickets you gave out. But praise for making
- 25 someone's life better, giving them a ride somewhere,



- 1 paying for a meal, stuff like that. It's not your fault
- 2 that the system is like that, and there's not much you
- 3 can do about it. But I want everyone to understand why
- 4 we're scared and why we don't have any trust. Please
- 5 don't speak like people are wrong for feeling the way
- 6 they do.
- 7 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Wait. I'm going to ask here.
- 8 Have you had any interactions with the police officer?
- 9 MS. KELLY: Yes.
- 10 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: You have?
- MS. KELLY: Yes.
- 12 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: How did that go?
- MS. KELLY: It was uncalled for and random.
- 14 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Really?
- MS. KELLY: Yes.
- 16 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: How long ago has that been?
- MS. KELLY: There was one a month ago maybe.
- 18 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Did you file a report?
- 19 MS. KELLY: I did not.
- 20 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Did you file a report?
- 21 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: You still can.
- 22 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Did you file a report?
- MS. KELLY: No.
- 24 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: You still can. You can go
- 25 right to that table right there and-



- 1 MS. KELLY: I don't know any information about the
- 2 person. I didn't see the license plate on the car. I
- 3 don't know the badge.
- 4 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Do you know exactly where you
- 5 were at?
- 6 MS. KELLY: Yes.
- 7 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: The day?
- 8 MS. KELLY: Yes.
- 9 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: That's all we need. That's all
- 10 we need.
- 11 MS. KELLY: Okay.
- 12 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: You can file a complaint.
- 13 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: That's all you need. So I'm
- 14 asking you to do that-
- 15 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair.
- 16 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: On my behalf.
- 17 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Let's be actionary.
- 18 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair. This is a
- 19 child. Should she be with her parents?
- MS. KELLY: I'm 18 years old.
- 21 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Hold on.
- 22 COMMISSIONER BURTON: But still.
- 23 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Chair.
- 24 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I'm really impressed with this.
- 25 I really am.



- 1 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Right.
- 2 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I really appreciate you being
- 3 here. What I'd like to do, if it's possible, I'd like to
- 4 arrange a meeting with you and Chief White. We could sit
- 5 down and maybe just have a conversation with him. I think
- 6 it'd be a good experience for you and maybe a couple of
- 7 other friends that you may feel like to be there. As a
- 8 commissioner. I'd like to see if I can arrange that for
- 9 you if you'd like to. I am so grateful as a senior member
- 10 of this community to hear someone like you very brave
- 11 enough and courageous enough, and honest enough. I want
- 12 to be able to see what I can do to bridge that moment for
- 13 you. If you'd like to do that, before I leave, you could
- 14 let me know if there's something you want. I'd like to do
- 15 that.
- 16 MS. KELLY: For sure. I'll talk to you after the
- 17 meeting.
- 18 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you. Make sure you grab
- 19 one of those forms. All right. What else do we have?
- 20 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: We can't hear you, Mr. Brown. I'm
- 21 sorry.
- MR. BROWN: Followed by Scotty Boman.
- 23 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Ms. McCanns.
- 24 MS. MCCANNS: Hey there. Hello. My name is Yolanda
- 25 McCanns, and I am the president of the Detroit Police



- 1 Citizen Academy,
- 2 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes Ma'am.
- 3 MS. MCCANNS: Alumni Associations.
- 4 COMMISSIONER: You go girl.
- 5 MS. MCCANNS: Thank you. Okay. Well, this afternoon I
- 6 would like to pose a question to DC Hayes, I'm not sure,
- 7 and to really to this Board. Because to me it's something
- 8 that maybe I'm passionate about and we have not, or I
- 9 have not had an opportunity to have it done. That is to
- 10 have someone from Kim Worthy's office to come out and
- 11 speak with the community so that we as a community can
- 12 also understand how come, if our officers, our command
- 13 staff arrest somebody, and then 24 hours, 48 hours, 72
- 14 hours, they are back out on the street again? I
- 15 understand that it's a protocol, but we as citizens, some
- 16 of us do not understand why it happens. We have meeting
- 17 after meeting after meeting, but we don't have anyone
- 18 from the prosecutor's office here to explain to us in
- 19 certain circumstances why this happens in certain
- 20 circumstances, why that happens.
- 21 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes.
- MS. MCCANNS: So to the president of the
- 23 commissioners and to BOPC, whoever wants answer first?
- DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Yep. Again, through the Chair if
- 25 I may. Good afternoon and great to see you, Ms. McCanns.



- 1 So we will reach out to our partners with the
- 2 prosecutor's office. They do have a community outreach
- 3 piece where they speak with members of the community that
- 4 they serve and explain to them the process. So I will
- 5 certainly put in the effort to bring that to the citizens
- 6 Police Academy. That can be the groundwork for perhaps a
- 7 broader audience in the future to share that message or
- 8 those concerns. But I will begin that work as soon as I
- 9 get back.
- 10 MS. MCCANNS: Okay. To this Board and to DC Hayes, my
- 11 group has been neglected. So we want you all to start
- 12 involving us more. I know some of our members may be a
- 13 little older, but we need to be called upon just a little
- 14 bit more.
- 15 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: What are you all doing this
- 16 weekend?
- MS. MCCANNS: It's what are we doing?
- DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: We will certainly reach out.
- 19 Again, Chief White, it's all hands-on deck with the
- 20 police department. So we just talked about our young
- 21 explorers who this summer are going to help us keep
- 22 downtown safe for both the Grand Prix as well as the auto
- 23 show and the Super Bowl. I'm sorry, the NFL draft next
- 24 year. So there is work to do from everybody. So we will
- 25 certainly make you a part of the plan.



- 1 MS. MCCANNS: If not, I'm standing on the desk.
- 2 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you.
- 3 MR. BROWN: Mr. Boman.
- 4 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Ma'am.
- 5 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Mr. Bowman.
- 6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Ma'am, if I may just respond
- 7 in part to what you said. If you want, if you're going to
- 8 have the prosecutor present, may I also suggest that you
- 9 have a defense attorney present? Because when the police
- 10 arrest someone, that's just a charge that they're
- 11 innocent until proven guilty. So sometimes in the
- 12 preliminary exam and so forth, the facts come forth and
- 13 the judge decides they shouldn't be held because they
- 14 don't think it was appropriate that either the charge or
- 15 the circumstances or whatever. But if you're going to
- 16 have the prosecutor, I urge you to also have a defense
- 17 attorney present. Thank you.
- 18 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes.
- MS. MCCANNS: This is why I'm standing.
- 20 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Well, I agree.
- 21 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: We got you.
- 22 MS. MCCANNS: The negativity. I don't like it.
- DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: I got you.
- 24 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: That's why.
- MS. MCCANNS: I did that.



- 1 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you.
- 2 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: This way. What is she doing?
- 3 MR. BOMAN: Yeah. Hello. First of all, I sound a
- 4 little funny. I have gauze in my mouth because I just had
- 5 a tooth pulled out. Yeah, I have a couple things I'd like
- 6 to bring up. The first of them though is that we have a
- 7 case where it took, I think two or three years to hire a
- 8 Secretary and a Chief Investigator. I think we're finally
- 9 there. But I wonder what was going on all that time, that
- 10 it took all that time to complete a process, which was
- 11 clearly spelled out in the charter that you're supposed
- 12 to do this. I'm wondering what happened with our...
- 13 Hopefully we're going to have a new Chief Investigator
- 14 after tonight. Now, with Mr. Warfield, what happened? How
- 15 is it that you could be extend an offer, accept an offer,
- 16 and then suddenly, oh, we changed your mind after he
- 17 accept? That makes no sense. That's one thing. Another
- 18 thing, complaints. I hear as an excuse or a reason given
- 19 as to not investigating things like the death of Kaniesha
- 20 Coleman that you only investigate noncriminal complaints.
- 21 MR. BOMAN: So my thought is misclassifying a
- 22 suicide, a homicide, I'm sorry, as a suicide, is not
- 23 necessarily criminal unless the prosecutor decides that
- 24 it's something to press charges over. Clearly the
- 25 prosecution has not done that. So therefore, the



- 1 complaint falls back to a improper decision or an error
- 2 on the part of someone in the police department that
- 3 should be investigated as a noncriminal complaint. It
- 4 should be resolved. As far as I know, it never has been.
- 5 There were other complaints. I don't remember the
- 6 gentleman's name, but there was someone else who died
- 7 where he was shot in the back of the head with a shotgun,
- 8 and it was ruled as suicide. Again, there's these
- 9 peculiar deaths where they're just misclassified and that
- 10 really need to be attended to properly. Finally, the
- 11 contract. I know the contract is already down there, but
- 12 I'm just wondering if anyone here did anything to make
- 13 sure that you're not forced to promote convicted
- 14 criminals in the future against your own wishes. Bye.
- 15 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you.
- MR. BROWN: Mr. Chair, your next three speakers would
- 17 be Mr. Bob Carmack, followed by Ms. Agnes Hickock
- 18 followed by Black Jesus.
- MR. CARMACK: Good evening. How's everybody doing? My
- 20 name is Bob Carmack. I'm from Detroit, Michigan, and I
- 21 don't know if any of you guys would recognize this, but
- 22 anybody?
- 23 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Turn around so the people can
- 24 see it too.
- 25 MR. CARMACK: Anybody recognize that person?



- 1 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: No.
- MR. CARMACK: Porter Burks. 38 bullets. Person you're
- 3 talking about. He got shot in September, early October.
- 4 It was deer hunting season. Officers were going deer
- 5 hunting practice shooting before they went deer hunting.
- 6 You got four cops that shot this kid. They're white. They
- 7 didn't want to put that out to the public, but I know a
- 8 lot of cops, they told me who it is. The mayor, the
- 9 police Chief need to tell the public what the hell's
- 10 going on. People need the truth. People need to know
- 11 what's going on. Why am I up here saying this? This
- 12 should have been done in October, not April, May, June,
- 13 July. This should have been done that week after it was
- 14 done. These officers should stand for it. The situation
- 15 about officers, I wouldn't be alive if it wasn't for
- 16 officer, and I told everybody that. Someone tried to kill
- 17 me.
- 18 MR. CARMACK: I had two officers save my life. I paid
- 19 for Doss's funeral. I paid for another cop's funeral.
- 20 Every cop in this country, they eat at the Laurel Manor.
- 21 My situation is not. It just isn't right for the public
- 22 not to know who did this. I think that should be done.
- 23 Also, there's an investigation that is being done on
- 24 Officer McKay, who, the mayor of Detroit sicked on me and
- 25 brought false charges on. The internal affairs guy is



- 1 trying to interview me and set me up for a crime when
- 2 he's supposed to be trying to help me. I asked him was he
- 3 recording me? He said no, which I knew he was recording
- 4 me. This guy's supposed to be trying to help me with a
- 5 bad officer and he is trying to put me in jail.
- 6 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Well, thank you.
- 7 MS. HICKOCK: Hi. My name is Agnes Hickok, and I am a
- 8 Black Detroit property tax refugee. I have been holding
- 9 this article about Reverend Jim Holley for about six
- 10 months. In October, we went to Ukraine, and you probably
- 11 all know it, but I've been holding onto this to help out
- 12 the Ukrainian refugees. Tens of thousands of people,
- 13 Black people in the city of Detroit have lost their homes
- 14 and been driven out to a Section eight wilderness outside
- 15 of Detroit. So I was thinking with him going to Ukraine,
- 16 he was probably going to help some of those refugees by
- 17 putting them up in that really nice big beautiful
- 18 apartment building over there on Woodward Avenue. It is
- 19 beautiful.
- 20 MS. HICKOCK: I was hoping that you would get some of
- 21 these Black people who have been driven out of the city
- 22 of Detroit. So I know it didn't have anything to do with
- 23 the police commissioner's meeting. But for a long time,
- 24 our group call them out, has given out watermelons as an
- 25 insult to Black people who don't serve the interests of



- 1 Black people. So with the Reverend Dr. Jim Holley going
- 2 to Ukraine to help Ukrainian refugees, when we have tens
- 3 of thousands of Black refugees from the city of Detroit,
- 4 he is awarded that waterman. Thank you very much for your
- 5 time.
- 6 MR. BROWN: Black Jesus
- 7 BLACK JESUS: Dr. Reverend Jim Holley, I called you
- 8 on the phone in regard to emails I sent you. I sent them
- 9 to you. Ms. Burson's gone. Commissioner Burton I talked
- 10 to you too. I also sent to Commissioner Burton as well as
- 11 Commissioner Davis and as well as commissioner Brown.
- 12 They never received them. Remember we talked about it?
- 13 But I called you at the church, right? Well, here, I just
- 14 wanted to play this for you right now and with this
- 15 watermelon in my hand so you could understand exactly
- 16 what took place. Oh, no, that's the wrong one. So now
- 17 let's go to Kaniesha Coleman. Right now, DPD, we got
- 18 Commander Pritchard been dodging my calls. Devon Johnson,
- 19 you've been out to my house. Scott Benson gone. But you
- 20 been out to my house. The guy next door tried to open up
- 21 a dope spot at my mother's house. Next door to my
- 22 mother's house.
- 23 BLACK JESUS: You came out and you saw that. I got
- 24 arrested seven times in 18 months. Seven whole times,
- 25 felony arrest by your officers. One of them said you told



- 1 him to arrest me. Officer Rose, I filed a complaint.
- 2 Board of Police Commissioners, I got no answer. All the
- 3 complaints I filed all of them times, all they filed
- 4 complaints on me administratively closed by this Board.
- 5 Now, Heaven Samuels, Kaniesha Coleman, Isaiah White.
- 6 Three individuals declared homicides. Additional evidence
- 7 presented by the Detroit Police Department, your
- 8 department, changed the ruling to suicide. All of them,
- 9 every last one of them. They did not shoot themselves.
- 10 The guy didn't shoot himself with no nineteens shotgun in
- 11 the back of his head with a blunt in his head. Kaniesha
- 12 didn't have any gun burns on her entry wound, left side
- 13 abdomen. No gun slipping. Impossible for her to have shot
- 14 herself. Suicide classification by the department,
- 15 Detroit Police Department is bogus. This commander right
- 16 here has been dodging my calls all the time. All the
- 17 calls I called you will stop.
- 18 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you, sir.
- 19 BLACK JESUS: Real situations.
- 20 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you.
- 21 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Through the Chair. I do have a
- 22 question for Mr. Crowley. You said they were
- 23 administratively closed from what period to what period.
- 24 Can you get that to Mr. Cromwell back there?
- MR. CARMACK: Mr. Cromwell knows all about it.



- 1 COMMISSIONER MOORE: You know about this, Mr.
- 2 Crowell? Can you talk?
- 3 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Who do we have next?
- 4 MR. BROWN: Mr. Chair, your next two speakers will be
- 5 Ms. Marguerite Maddox, followed by the caller with the
- 6 last three numbers 061.
- 7 COMMISSIONER: Don't.
- 8 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Ms. Maddox.
- 9 MS. MADDOX: Hello everyone. I am reading from notes,
- 10 and it concerns our safety. What's being done on the ATVs
- 11 because when I asked you if we have pedestrian, we need
- 12 to feel safe when I cross the crosswalk. Being driving on
- 13 the sidewalk and being left in the middle of the
- 14 sidewalk. The same has ATVs. They sometimes ride on the
- 15 sidewalk really nice. Also, help us to feel safe riding
- 16 through this beautiful city has to offer. I'm done. Thank
- 17 you.
- 18 MR. BOMAN: Thank you, Chair. The caller with the
- 19 last three numbers is no longer there. Your next two
- 20 callers will be Former Commissioner William Davis,
- 21 followed by Mr. Frank McGee.
- 22 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Hold on one second. If any one
- 23 of the commissioners has Ms. Maddox in their district,
- 24 please inform me or Ms. Shaw so we can try to get DPD to
- 25 get some special attention over there about those ATVs



- l riding on the sidewalk when she's trying to get across
- 2 the street. Right.
- 3 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: We can do. I'll send our drag
- 4 racing details. I'm sorry, Mr. Chairman. We will send our
- 5 drag race detail who focuses on those type of efforts.
- 6 You have our commitment that we will address it once we
- 7 get that information.
- 8 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Fantastic. Thank you. All
- 9 right, Mr. Brown. Go ahead.
- 10 MR. BROWN: Former Commissioner Davis.
- MR. DAVIS: Good evening. Can I be heard?
- 12 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes, we can hear you. Go right
- 13 ahead.
- MR. DAVIS: Okay. I would like to invite all the
- 15 people over in District 3 that may be listening or what
- 16 have you to Detroit National Action Network and Berean
- 17 Chapel Church over there on Norwood. We're going to be
- 18 having a digital equity tour event over there on May 2nd
- 19 from 11:00 AM to 4:00 PM. The last one, we had on focus
- 20 hope on February 28th, we had hundreds of people come out
- 21 and I was able to sign up a number of people for the
- 22 affordability connectivity program. There's a problem.
- 23 President Biden's built back American program that help
- 24 people get internet for free or close to free if you meet
- 25 the guidelines. We're also going to have the health



- 1 department there giving people examinations for dental
- 2 and Covid 19 tests and vaccinations. We are also going to
- 3 be registering people to vote. We're going to be trying
- 4 to drive up the voting people in each and every district.
- 5 Also, as a side note, I think that this Board needs a lot
- 6 of help. Yeah, you all have major issues, especially keep
- 7 saying that members At-Large. The city charter does not
- 8 call you members At-Large. The city target called you
- 9 appointees. You are trying to hide the fact that you are
- 10 mayor appointees, and you all seem to be there
- 11 representing the mayor, not the citizens of Detroit.
- 12 Thank you.
- MR. BROWN: Mr. Chair, I don't see Mr. McGee, so that
- 14 would be your last speaker.
- 15 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Last speaker. Okay. Thank you.
- 16 Now we have a presentation. Ms. Patillo, Director of
- 17 Human Resources Bureau.
- MS. PATILLO: Good evening.
- 19 COMMISSIONERS: Good evening.
- 20 MS. PATILLO: Hopefully it doesn't fall. I know you
- 21 received the documents. You might have those near binder,
- 22 but I actually gave you slides as well. Some things That
- 23 I'll cover will not be in the documents that were
- 24 submitted. But I wanted to give you an update on the
- 25 information. So I'll be presenting the Human Resources



- 1 report for the month of March. The report's going to
- 2 cover departmental staffing, personnel recruiting,
- 3 recruiting initiatives. Like I said, you already were
- 4 previously provided some information. So if you go to the
- 5 next slide that says departmental staffing, the
- 6 department for the month of March we're currently staffed
- 7 at 88%. For sworn members 90%, vacancies is at 10%,
- 8 police assistance was filled at 70%, vacancies at 30%.
- 9 For civilians for the month of March, filled at 83%,
- 10 vacancy 17%. If you go to the next slide that says bear
- 11 with me sworn recruiting from the beginning of the
- 12 fiscal year to March 31st. We had a total of 3,535
- 13 applications. 59 were in processing, 251 applications
- 14 were withdrawn, 2,957 applications were archived, 425
- 15 were temporary disqualified, 470 were permanently
- 16 disqualified, and 209 were awaiting MCOLEs. If you go to
- 17 the next slide that says March MCOLEs testing, the chart
- 18 depicts the written agility testing.
- 19 MS. PATILLO: So for the written test, there were 137
- 20 that were scheduled. 77 appeared. We had 46 that passed,
- 21 which is a 60% passing rate. We had 31 that failed, 40%
- 22 failure rate. We had 13 that were rescheduled, and 47 no
- 23 shows. For physical agility we had 184 that was
- 24 scheduled. 101 appeared, 57 passed, 56% passing rate. 44
- 25 failed 44% failure rate. 25 rescheduled, and 58 no shows.



- 1 If you go to the next slide, it says total new hires. For
- 2 the month of March, we had 32 sworn, and then we have 23
- 3 civilians for a total of 55 new hires for the month of
- 4 March. The next slide covers your Detroit residency and
- 5 non-resident information. For Detroit 542 sworn, 425
- 6 civilians, 15 police assistance. For non-Detroiters,
- 7 1,828 sworn, 216 civilians and 23 police assistance. Of
- 8 that, we have new hires 13. 4 civilians were Detroit
- 9 residents, and 10 for the sworn were Detroit residents.
- 10 MS. PATILLO: The next slide should be the attrition
- 11 slide. You'll continue to see a decline in attrition. So
- 12 for the month of March, we only had nine that separated.
- 13 As you all know, last year we would experience about 30 a
- 14 month. We had 9 that separated for sworn, 7 civilians for
- 15 a total of 16. The next slide covers the leave of absence
- 16 and restricted duty. For FMLA continuous, we had 19
- 17 sworn, 8 civilians. For FMLA intermediate, 66 sworn, 85
- 18 civilians. For PPL which is a new category that I
- 19 described last month. Paid parental leave. 6 sworn
- 20 medical leave, 3 for sworn, 6 civilians. Restricted, 160
- 21 for sworn, 9 civilians. Disabled, 20 sworn, 1 civilian.
- 22 Sick, 13 sworn and 3 civilians For the next slide, for
- 23 monthly separations we had a total of 9.
- MS. PATILLO: As I stated, 8 police officers, 1
- 25 lieutenant. For suspensions, we had 19. That was 17



- 1 police officers, 1 corporal, 1 sergeant. Then we had a
- 2 total of 535 in the drop. So in talking about our sworn,
- 3 our separations. I think the next slide says sworn, but
- 4 if you go to the next slide where it says department
- 5 separations 2022 to 2023. As you all know, 322
- 6 separations for 2022. As of April, we only have 39. So in
- 7 January we had 14, February we had 14, March, we had 9,
- 8 and right now we've had 2. So as you can see there's a
- 9 downward trend beginning in October if you're looking at
- 10 the slides. If you look at January to April of 2022, we
- 11 had 98 separations. January to March of 2022, we had 76.
- 12 Compared to where we are right now, we've only had 39,
- 13 which is good.
- 14 MS. PATILLO: That means the contract is working. If
- 15 you go to the next slide, it says police recruiting. So
- 16 this is separations to other departments. As you can see,
- 17 at one point in September, we were at 25, October 12,
- 18 November and December 6, January 3, February 2, March 1,
- 19 April 1. So as you can see, less people are leaving and
- 20 going to other law enforcement agencies. You go to the
- 21 next slide it says sworn appointments and new hires. Go
- 22 to the slide after that, it says, what's in our academy
- 23 right now. So right now in our academy, we have 5
- 24 classes. We have a total of 127 that are currently still
- 25 there. We have 11 of the reinstated officers that have



- 1 come back that are already demobilized out of those
- 2 classes. Then we still have 3 that are there.
- 3 MS. PATILLO: I have 56 candidates that are still in
- 4 the background. 29 in pre background. We graduated a
- 5 class in March of 28 students. Our next class will start
- 6 on 24 April. If you go to the next slide that says
- 7 2022/2023 reinstatements and go to the slide behind that,
- 8 you will see that we have since the contract renewal, we
- 9 have received 64 requests of members to return to this
- 10 department. 9 increases since last month I brief you. 22
- 11 have been hired, meaning they have done all the processes
- 12 to get back to the academy, and some of them are on the
- 13 street. 29 of those totals have been approved. We still
- 14 have 19 that we're processing. We're still receiving
- 15 more. 8 were denied and 8 withdrew. If you go to the next
- 16 slide, it says recruiting initiatives. I won't cover all
- 17 of those, but that's just some of the partnerships that
- 18 we have made in the last several months.
- MS. PATILLO: Then just some of the events that we
- 20 did in previous weeks and some of our upcoming events
- 21 that we've done. Then, as you all know, on March 25th, we
- 22 did a career day. Commissioner Moore did come out. We had
- 23 Henry Ford Medical Center that was there. They did the
- 24 pre-physical agility test. So that means basically we
- 25 assumed the cost on DPD, and the applicants did not pay



- 1 for that services. That is a service that they need to
- 2 get screened before they even take the physical duty
- 3 test. The radio show was there. KISS105.9 with tune up.
- 4 They were there doing live on the spot interviews with
- 5 the candidates, with the instructors, with DPD. The Air
- 6 National Guard was there just to show that we have a
- 7 partnership with our services in our reserves. So they
- 8 were there.
- 9 MS. PATILLO: Cleary University was there as well. We
- 10 had over a hundred applicants to come through the door
- 11 before noon. So it was all around. It was a great event.
- 12 Wonderful. The last slide that you have in there just
- 13 says separated versus new hires. That's just to show you
- 14 that we have a net gain as of where we are right now of
- 15 57 officers. So when you look at the separations that we
- 16 have compared to the hires, we are actually on the top.
- 17 We continue to average 15 separations a month from now,
- 18 15 or less to December and we hire 30 to 40. The goal is
- 19 we get 30 in the class, and we get 10 reinstatements.
- 20 That's 40. We will fill all of our vacancies by the end
- 21 of the year. So that is our goal. We have recruiting, and
- 22 we have the command staff behind us, the executive staff,
- 23 the Chief. I always say that recruiting is everyone's
- 24 effort and so everyone has to play a part. So we are
- 25 doing our part. With that being said, that concludes my



- 1 presentation.
- 2 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Awesome, as always.
- 3 Commissioner Banks.
- 4 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Chair, peace and blessings.
- 5 Through the Chair, peace and blessings to you, Director.
- 6 What were the 400 and something people disqualified for?
- 7 Why were they disqualified the 400 and something?
- 8 MS. PATILLO: So if they were, let me go to that
- 9 slide right quick.
- 10 COMMISSIONER BANKS: If you have that.
- 11 MS. PATILLO: 400 and temporarily disqualified it
- 12 could be for things such as tickets. If they're an
- 13 abundance of them and they have not been paid.
- 14 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Right.
- MS. PATILLO: It could be for if anything that's open
- 16 and active, they could be temporary disqualified. If
- 17 there's anything that we are pending, and they have not
- 18 given us the information temporarily.
- 19 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Okay. One more too, director.
- 20 DPD now has the five-year program where they max out what
- 21 is that -75 t,000 in 5 years?
- 22 MS. PATILLO: It's 85 and 4.
- 23 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Okay. I'm-
- MS. PATILLO: They max out in 4 years, not 5 years.
- 25 COMMISSIONER BANKS: 85 and 4.



- 1 MS. PATILLO: Yes.
- 2 COMMISSIONER BANKS: What type of progress and
- 3 increase have that brought as far as attracting community
- 4 people to the department of DPD?
- 5 MS. PATILLO: So, as you can see, we were filling our
- 6 classes. We're putting 30. Plus, we have individuals that
- 7 are coming back to the department. They missed the
- 8 camaraderie. They missed DPD. They missed one of the
- 9 things is the longevity has come back. Also, sometimes
- 10 when you leave, the grass is not greener on the other
- 11 side.
- 12 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Right.
- MS. PATILLO: The advancement, the promotions, the
- 14 different units that you have here. Then also we have
- 15 onsite education. We have over 300 students that are
- 16 enrolled right now in Cleary University. So it's a lot.
- 17 That contract also increased the tuition assistance I
- 18 believe for DPLSA. So it's a competitive contract.
- 19 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Okay. Wonderful. So now with the
- 20 competitive contract DPD got now, the contract is able to
- 21 compete with Warren and East Point and Grosse Pointe now,
- 22 right? Because it's right there.
- MS. PATILLO: So Warren is still higher than Detroit,
- 24 however it is respective with the other law enforcement
- 25 agency.



- 1 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Okay. Good.
- MS. PATILLO: So Warren might be an outlier.
- 3 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Okay. Thanks.
- 4 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Burton.
- 5 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Thank you. Good job. Thank you.
- 6 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I don't have any questions at
- 7 this time.
- 8 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Pressley.
- 9 MS. PATILLO: Thank you. Through the Chair. No
- 10 questions. Great report.
- 11 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Moore.
- 12 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you, Mr. Chair. First of
- 13 all, as it relates to the recruiting fair, every time I
- 14 tried to get a director credit, the director immediately
- 15 gave it to her team. I just thought that was impressive.
- 16 Director, that's good though. It's the team. It's the
- 17 team. So that's the mark of a great leader. I just want
- 18 to compliment you.
- 19 MS. PATILLO: Thank you.
- 20 COMMISSIONER MOORE: This one, I'm glad you came back
- 21 DC because I just saw this. We had an academy student
- 22 that came on and was hired February 27th and was
- 23 separated March 2nd and resigned under charges.
- 24 MS. PATILLO: So there was a student that I actually
- 25 pulled out of the class. I don't know if that's the



- 1 particular student. But what happens is we start the
- 2 class, we do the orientation, we start the class. I
- 3 pulled a student prior to the class opening up due to
- 4 some things that were flagged in the background.
- 5 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you.
- 6 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Bernard.
- 7 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Just a quick question. Who's
- 8 doing our psychological evaluations now?
- 9 MS. PATILLO: So we have Dr. White, Dr. Daniloff and
- 10 Dr. Fleming. So those doctors have been on staff for
- 11 years and so they're still here.
- 12 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: How long does that examination
- 13 take? I'm just wondering.
- MS. PATILLO: So there's two parts to the
- 15 psychological examination. They take a written portion,
- 16 which is 300 questions. Then the psychological doctor
- 17 will review that assessment in addition to their
- 18 background. So those psychological screenings with the
- 19 doctor can range anywhere from 30 minutes to three hours.
- 20 So it just depends on what the doctor discusses with that
- 21 applicant.
- 22 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you. Excellent report as
- 23 usual.
- MS. PATILLO: Thank you.
- 25 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Holley.



- 1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you, Chairman. As always,
- 2 I appreciate you and the work that you really do. Why do
- 3 we use Cleary University? What do we do with? What
- 4 academic?
- 5 MS. PATILLO: So Cleary University offers bachelor's
- 6 degree, master's degree. We also just completed a senior
- 7 emerging leaders and emerging leaders where it was free
- 8 of charge to sworn and civilians to get a certificate. It
- 9 was a six-week certificate to discuss leadership. So they
- 10 offer project management. So those are just some of the
- 11 courses I know. DC Hays can explain a little bit more
- 12 because he is actually a graduate of Cleary University.
- 13 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Wayne State is here.
- MS. PATILLO: Oh, okay.
- 15 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Wayne County Community College.
- MS. PATILLO: So Cleary actually comes to us.
- 17 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I know.
- MS. PATILLO: On site once a week.
- 19 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I don't mean no harm, but I'm
- 20 just saying to you, we give a whole lot to this
- 21 department, Wayne County Community College, and we get
- 22 nothing back. We give a little nothing back. We give you
- 23 a whole lot. There's no effort to do academics. No
- 24 effort. We do bachelor's, we do certificates, and we give
- 25 you a whole lot. Maybe it's not the question I should be



- 1 asking you, but I just feel really bad about the question
- 2 itself. I don't mean no harm, but I do know we give you a
- 3 whole lot and I get very little coming back for the
- 4 police department. The second thing of this is that, help
- 5 me with this. I'm showing my ignorance here, and I hate
- 6 to do that when I got Commissioner Pressley. But if you
- 7 got on page one, if I got 3,535 applicants, how'd I get
- 8 to 39? Did I get the two?
- 9 MS. PATILLO: No. So fiscal year-
- 10 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Wait, let's ask the question
- 11 because I know you're going to answer it. I just know
- 12 that. It's just that I don't know. But I don't know how
- 13 you get, then what is archives? I should know that. I got
- 14 15 degrees, and I still don't know what it is. I should
- 15 look it up probably. Then you got 59, 251, and then
- 16 archives almost 3000. So how do I get to that? Then at
- 17 the end of the day, I only have 30 people in the academy.
- MS. PATILLO: As I stated, that is for an entire
- 19 fiscal year. So that is not one month. That is since the
- 20 beginning of July.
- 21 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I knew you going to make-
- MS. PATILLO: Until March 31st.
- 23 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I just knew you were going to do
- 24 that to me, but I had to ask. Thank you so much. I want
- 25 to ask no more.



- 1 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: VC
- 2 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you, Human Director,
- 3 Patillo. Human Resource Director. Commissioner Banks, you
- 4 and your team in your district, are you not working with
- 5 Human Resource Director to have a recruitment fair?
- 6 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Sure. We had communications
- 7 today, wasn't it Director?
- 8 MS. PATILLO: Right.
- 9 COMMISSIONER BANKS: We are here for the-
- 10 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: So it's good to go, correct?
- 11 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Yeah, I don't mind. I'm prepared
- 12 for. I've been prepared for being on Front Street.
- 13 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay. Thank you on that. Now, with
- 14 the comment, through the Chair as it relates to WC3. I
- 15 guess I thought the officers had a choice to say, get an
- 16 associate via WC3 and a bachelor's from Cleary.
- MS. PATILLO: Yes. So we still partner with WC3.
- 18 Actually, our academy is at WC3.
- 19 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Correct.
- 20 MS. PATILLO: Right. So-
- 21 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Rent free. What I'm saying to
- 22 you is, and I'm not going to go into this.
- 23 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Right.
- 24 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I really take this very
- 25 personally, so I don't want her to bring this up. I just



- 1 say to you again, I feel like we do the same thing that
- 2 Cleary does on the social's degree. We're right here in
- 3 the city of Wayne County. It's the way I feel. Doesn't
- 4 mean it's right. It doesn't mean I'm anti department. I
- 5 just feel like I give a whole lot. I get a little bit
- 6 back. That's all I'm saying.
- 7 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: No, that's the end of my comment
- 8 because I too was really excited, obviously when DPD and
- 9 WC3 struck up that relationship.
- 10 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Awesome. Thank you.
- 11 MS. PATILLO: Is that it?
- 12 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: That's it.
- 13 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you again. Thank you again.
- 14 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Amanda.
- 15 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: You are still here. We appreciate
- 16 it.
- 17 COMMANDER BRIDGET: Good evening.
- 18 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: 10 minutes.
- 19 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Good evening.
- 20 COMMANDER BRIDGET: It's going to be very brief. I
- 21 was reassigned to Number 11 last year in January. I grew
- 22 up in District 3, 11, 1. I'm a Persian graduate. So I am
- 23 dedicated and engaged in number 11, making this the
- 24 safest precinct in the city of Detroit. I give it my all
- 25 each and every day. The numbers can be better, but



- 1 there's improvement. I mean, they have improved since I
- 2 came over to Number 11. I'm going to give you a little
- 3 synopsis of our day-to-day status as of today. But prior
- 4 to doing that, number 11, we currently have 103 officers
- 5 assigned to me. I have 78 available for patrol. Some are
- 6 out restricted duty and they're out six. I'm going to be
- 7 assigned out for various reasons. Number eight, I'm
- 8 sorry. I was in for five years. Number 11, our borders
- 9 are north is Eight Mile, the south is Miller.
- 10 COMMANDER BRIDGET: To the west is John Island. To
- 11 the east is Grand Trunk Railroad. That's the borders of
- 12 Number 11. So as far as our violent crime, my homicides
- 13 we are down 33.3%. We're down 2 victims and I know
- 14 Pressley you're glad to hear that. Our sexual assault,
- 15 however, they're up too from 16 to 14th this time last
- 16 year. Our aggravated assaults are up 63 victims from the
- 17 same time last year. What's going on with aggravated
- 18 assaults? We have a lot of inter partner and domestic
- 19 violence nexus. They're happening behind closed doors and
- 20 it's kind of hard to prevent them from happening. But
- 21 what I'm trying to do here at Number 11, I did Number 8.
- 22 I had the aftercare program over there. I know
- 23 commissioner Holt, you're familiar with that and so you
- 24 Commissioner Moore.
- 25 COMMANDER BRIDGET: What we did, well, a chaplain



- 1 would come out and they would go over to people who had
- 2 committed these offenses against their spouses or their
- 3 girlfriend's intimate partner and or DV, and they would
- 4 offer them resources. Because we found out that a lot of
- 5 the DV related incidents occurred due to lack of money,
- 6 lack of food, a lack of resources. When I found out what
- 7 the aftercare program, when you gave someone something to
- 8 eat, he came home from work, there was no need to argue
- 9 because food was already ready. The recidivism did
- 10 slowdown in the Eighth Precinct. So I'm confident that
- 11 we're going to get it here at number 11 to kind of lessen
- 12 some of these incidents that are occurring over here. My
- 13 non-fatal shootings, however, we are up too.
- 14 COMMANDER BRIDGET: Our robberies, we are up 1 from
- 15 27 to 28. Our car jackings are down too. So we had 6 this
- 16 time last year and this year we have 4. My officers are
- 17 out there working hard. A lot of times we all know that
- 18 this job is going to be very thankless. But you don't do
- 19 it for being thankful. It's a servant attitude and you
- 20 hear it's a calling. Our officers, my staff and the
- 21 captain, we are dedicated because he knows I bug him to
- 22 death, and he bugged me even more about what's going on.
- 23 I believe that what we have going on in Number 11, and
- 24 he's going to give you some of our strategies that will
- 25 continue to bring crime down. We'll continue to make



- 1 Number 11 and District 3 one the safest precinct in City
- 2 of Detroit.
- 3 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Right.
- 4 UNNAMED CAPTAIN: Thank you, madam. Just to go over
- 5 in more depth some of our strategies that we are going to
- 6 do to reduce our crime. We're going to commit some
- 7 narcotics raids, OT operations, restore peace operations
- 8 and target enforcement in high crime areas. One of our
- 9 specific strategies is our hotspot focus areas, which are
- 10 the scout car areas of 11, 1, 2, and 4, where we focus
- 11 our resources specifically to these three areas that have
- 12 been identified to up the visibility and lower the crime.
- 13 Increased patrols along the corridor of Seven Mile Van
- 14 Dyke corridor and Outer Drive corridors by precinct Motor
- 15 Units with assistance from the Traffic Enforcement Unit.
- 16 I have to give them a shout out as well. The Traffic
- 17 Enforcement Unit has done a lot of work in our precinct,
- 18 and we appreciate them.
- 19 UNNAMED CAPTAIN: We'll continue to do warrant sweeps
- 20 and MDOC checks focusing on perpetrators of gun crimes.
- 21 That's another one of our partnerships that we foster
- 22 here. We just now had an MDOC agent dedicated to the 11th
- 23 Precinct. So we're going to be able to up our number of
- 24 MDOC compliance checks. Our ceasefire initiative is also
- 25 large in our precinct and is aimed at disrupting and



- 1 dismantling groups and gangs, which last year we did have
- 2 some success with one of our larger gangs, which ended up
- 3 in the final conviction of one of our most violent
- 4 predators. So we're excited about that. Our gun stat
- 5 analysis which identifies perpetrators using guns as an
- 6 intelligence that identifies suspects who use guns by
- 7 committing crimes. Year to date, our results of our
- 8 strategies are reduction in 2 or 3 of our hotspot areas.
- 9 UNNAMED CAPTAIN: Scout 112 has reflected a reduction
- 10 in 3.8% and a 103% reduction year to date in 114.
- 11 However, our scout car, 111 is trending. It was up.
- 12 However, it is trending down from last month with only a
- 13 20.4% increase. Additionally, I'd like to add that we
- 14 have our Sexual Assault Reduction Task Force, which is a
- 15 small group of our police officers as well as some of our
- 16 community providers, which we're going to try to do some
- 17 outreach as well as enforcement along the John R
- 18 corridor, which we think will significantly reduce the
- 19 crime.
- 20 UNNAMED CAPTAIN: As far as our properties year to
- 21 date, we've had a decrease of 39.2% or down 51 incidents.
- 22 Our larceny year to date are slight increase of 10.6%, up
- 23 22 incidents. Our motor vehicle threat thefts have
- 24 increased 10.3% or up 15%. Directed patrol, our
- 25 strategies for these property crimes are directed patrols



- 1 on areas based on our data which are experiencing high
- 2 increases, conducting surveillance in hotspot areas,
- 3 working closely with our Commercial Auto Theft Unit,
- 4 collaborating with our city agencies to address our
- 5 issues such as BC, developing focus on the prior week's
- 6 hotspots and development of treatments in the high
- 7 property crime areas.
- 8 COMMANDER BRIDGET: Well, those are some of the
- 9 things here at Number 11 that we do each and every day to
- 10 try to combat the crime and continue to have it show
- 11 decreases in those areas. So some of community
- 12 engagements like the captain said earlier. We finally
- 13 have an embedded MDOC agent that we do at least five MDOC
- 14 home checks per week in which we check, especially ones
- 15 that have gun offenses. It was a challenge having our own
- 16 agent because they were sharing precincts. But now Number
- 17 11 we have our own agent. Commissioner Bernard with
- 18 Number 11, we are in the schools. We are in the
- 19 elementary schools, junior high schools, and high
- 20 schools. One of our NPOs, NPO Marsha Williams is in the
- 21 sisterhood.
- 22 COMMANDER BRIDGET: She's with Demi Osborne. We met
- 23 her. She's awesome. Phenomenal. So we are dedicated to
- 24 saving these kids and we are bridging the gap. Because
- 25 what they see on TV is not how it really is. It can be



- 1 portrayed that the police are all bad. But once you get
- 2 to know us and we bridge that gap and talk to us, we're
- 3 just like everybody else and just wear badges. So
- 4 basically, what we trying to do here is just improve the
- 5 relationship, bridge that gap because it's so important
- 6 that the community know that we care about them. I can
- 7 speak for myself, being raised in 111's area. Before I
- 8 came back to Number 11, I was over in the precinct every
- 9 weekend. My dad lives in 115. My brother lives in 111, my
- 10 uncle lives in 113.
- 11 COMMANDER BRIDGET: So we are embedded here. So I am
- 12 like I said, dedicated and I worked my behind off trying
- 13 to find ways to keep the residents in Number 11 safe. I
- 14 have the help of my NPOs, Sergeant Spruce and NPO
- 15 Robinson and the like. We do phenomenal work here in the
- 16 11th Precinct. They are dedicated to help bridge that gap
- 17 with the citizens. We had a senior Valentine's Day get-
- 18 together was awesome. President Jackson talked about last
- 19 weekend. We had our Easter egg hunt and our health fair.
- 20 We gave kids free teeth cleaning. If they had their card,
- 21 they would get the covid test. I mean, COVID shots as
- 22 well as the flu shots, if they wanted to. However, we
- 23 were a little disappointed than they were more concerned
- 24 with getting eggs than visiting the vans for the mobile
- 25 fair.



- 1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Do you know how much eggs cost
- 2 now?
- 3 COMMANDER BRIDGET: I'm sorry. Absolutely.
- 4 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Six dollars a million.
- 5 COMMANDER BRIDGET: Good point. So we have our Turkey
- 6 bingo, Halloween candy bag, basket giveaway. We have our
- 7 shot with a cop. We always have a back-to-school rally.
- 8 Our Explorer Program, I cannot tell you how fascinating
- 9 how in awe I am of the little people. They can show us
- 10 all something. Yesterday at that town hall they were
- 11 passionate because they talked to the business owners
- 12 that were ticketed and they told them, how dare you. If
- 13 we wouldn't come, how would you feel if I was to sell
- 14 something to your child? They said, you all come into
- 15 Detroit, you don't spend your money here, but you want to
- 16 sell to us. So what would you do? How would you feel if I
- 17 went across Eight Mile or went out to Bloomfield Hills
- 18 and sold to your child?
- 19 COMMANDER BRIDGET: How would you like it? So we all
- 20 took the slogan, not on our watch. We all are dedicated.
- 21 We all are committed to making sure that these store
- 22 owners who sold to our babies won't do it again. So I
- 23 just wanted to shout out to NPO Robinson. We had a
- 24 conversation after receiving some complaints about what
- 25 we were going to do about it, and it came to fruition.



- 1 It's just the beginning. Number 11 Explorers and number
- 2 11 as a whole have great things planned. We are on the
- 3 fast track, and I believe it. I think there's great
- 4 things to see coming out of the 11 Precinct.
- 5 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: All right, thank you.
- 6 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: You're not going to take no,
- 7 Chair. You're not going to-
- 8 COMMANDER BRIDGET: All right. Through the Chairs.
- 9 Are there any questions? No. I only had 10 minutes and I
- 10 was so happy to be up here before time.
- 11 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Moore.
- 12 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Oh, you know I'm going to ask
- 13 how comes you didn't mention about Nichols and Spruce and
- 14 Eric Speer-
- 15 COMMANDER BRIDGET: No, I'm so sorry. That was last
- 16 week, last Friday. Last Tuesday, they were on patrol and
- 17 a car had come to them. They said, my baby's not
- 18 breathing. So Sergeant Spruce and Sergeant Nichols
- 19 assisted in getting the child into the EMS. This is the
- 20 second time that they actually saved the life. They did
- 21 one about seven years ago.
- 22 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Wonderful.
- 23 COMMANDER BRIDGET: Divine intervention. God put them
- 24 there at the right time to save that child.
- 25 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Just one more thing as it



- l relates to the Explorer Program. I was recruited to be on
- 2 the Explorer Program when I was at number 11 as a police
- 3 officer. We did some phenomenal things and I think we
- 4 handed it off to Dereon and he took it to the other
- 5 level.
- 6 COMMANDER BRIDGET: Just run with it.
- 7 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Oh yeah.
- 8 COMMANDER BRIDGET: Just running with it.
- 9 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Phenomenal community guy. So
- 10 thanks Dereon for all you do
- 11 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Burton.
- 12 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I just wanted to say I'm
- 13 familiar with a lot of the officers here in 11th
- 14 Precinct. I think they have something special going on
- 15 with this community. They have made tremendous strides
- 16 over the years and continue to do great work here at
- 17 number 11. I remember when the 11th and the seventh
- 18 Precinct were combined. So going to a community meeting
- 19 and in those neighborhood police community relations
- 20 meetings was definitely helpful and beneficial to the
- 21 community. So, keep up the great job commander, captain,
- 22 NPOs and to your team.
- 23 COMMANDER BRIDGET: Thank you.
- 24 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Banks.
- 25 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Thank you. Through the Chair.



- 1 Peace and blessings to you. Go ahead, doctor. Peace and
- 2 blessing to you commander, captain. Now, captain, you
- 3 mentioned restoring the peace to the community. How are
- 4 you doing that? What's the strategy on how you are
- 5 restoring the 11 Precinct?
- 6 COMMANDER BRIDGET: Through the Chair, Mr. Banks-
- 7 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Restoring the peace through the
- 8 community.
- 9 COMMANDER BRIDGET: Through the Chair. It's an
- 10 initiative. It's restoring the peace. What we do is that
- 11 the 11th Precinct, most of the time we cooperate with the
- 12 Fifth precinct, the Seventh and Ninth and east side. We
- 13 target, we find out which area has the most crime, which
- 14 has uptick, and we go into those precincts and we go over
- 15 there and help them. We do warrant sweeps, those that
- 16 have warrants. We do traffic lists to educate.
- 17 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Okay, wonderful.
- 18 COMMANDER BRIDGET: The initiative is called Restore
- 19 Peace.
- 20 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Restoring the Peace. Okay.
- 21 Wonderful. I got one more too. Now you have the Shop with
- 22 a cop. Now is the cop spending his own money, do they
- 23 have a budget? Where are they taking the resident out to?
- 24 The resident of the community? How does that go,
- 25 commander? So Shop with a cop.



- 1 COMMANDER BRIDGET: So normally we go to Detroit
- 2 Public Safety Foundation. We go out and we pick some
- 3 children that are underprivileged, and we take them out
- 4 to Target or Myers, and we let them shop. So that bridges
- 5 the gap.
- 6 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Now, is there a budget?
- 7 COMMANDER BRIDGET: There're business owners that
- 8 donate as well.
- 9 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Is there a budget?
- 10 COMMANDER BRIDGET: Do we have a budget, Dereon?
- 11 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Well do you budget where you
- 12 able to spend \$15, \$40 on each-
- 13 COMMANDER BRIDGET: \$50 to spend. I think it's a
- 14 hundred dollars per child to spend. They go out and they
- 15 just shop for themselves. They shop for their mother.
- 16 COMMISSIONER BANKS: That's wonderful, commander.
- 17 COMMANDER BRIDGET: Commissioner Banks.
- 18 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Pressley.
- 19 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Yes. Thank you, through the
- 20 Chair. You spoke so eloquently about being from this
- 21 community and how it adds to the commitment that you have
- 22 and your service. I could ask this question one way, but
- 23 I'll ask it this way. What benefit do you believe it is
- 24 aided to your service to this community, knowing this
- 25 neighborhood and being a part of it?



- 1 COMMANDER BRIDGET: When I see people out that I went
- 2 to school with, that my brother went to school with they
- 3 look at me not so much as the savior per se, but they
- 4 know how I am about family. They know about my commitment
- 5 to it because I'm an average softball player, and I
- 6 travel the country playing softball even at my age. They
- 7 know that I'm dedicated to it. So I think my history
- 8 speaks for itself. When I say I'm committed, I'm
- 9 committed. When I say I'm going to do something, I'm
- 10 going to do it. So when I go through the Navy, like I
- 11 said, I was coming over here prior to coming to Number
- 12 11. Then I was an organized crime, and I was doing
- 13 several organized crimes to benefit Number 11. When
- 14 Number 11 was having a uptick in shootings with the gang
- 15 members.
- 16 COMMANDER BRIDGET: Me and ex now retired Commander,
- 17 Captain Slappy went to Hamtramck and talked to that Chief
- 18 to see, because we had some stuff with the Southern
- 19 border Number 11 that went over to Hamtramck and vice
- 20 versa. So I took upon myself and Organized Crime to reach
- 21 out to the commander to go to Hamtramck and see what was
- 22 going on there that brought crime to Number 11. So I just
- 23 think the whole John, the whole facade me and how I love
- 24 people and I'm a Christian and I love everybody. So being
- 25 who I am and the love I have for people, I want everyone



- l to be okay like I am. So I preach that sermon. That's why
- 2 I say my welcome ministry. People see me, I talk about
- 3 the Lord every chance I can and I know he sustains his
- 4 greatest-
- 5 COMMISSIONER: Preach.
- 6 COMMANDER BRIDGET: I can't help it. His grace is
- 7 sufficient. So I know me praying each and every day, all
- 8 day, he will help me get this precinct where it needs to
- 9 be.
- 10 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Great. I am so full of hope
- 11 from your presentation and seeing your passion in this
- 12 area. I think that you serve as a model for what police
- 13 can look like when people actually have a connection with
- 14 the neighborhoods in which they serve.
- 15 COMMANDER BRIDGET: Thank you.
- 16 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Holley.
- 17 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commander, I really enjoyed you.
- 18 I really do.
- 19 COMMANDER BRIDGET: Thank you, sir.
- 20 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: We can see the passion and the
- 21 pride that you have for your community. I'm just glad I
- 22 voted for Captain Johnson to be captain. I'm just glad
- 23 that you are using him.
- 24 COMMANDER BRIDGET: Oh, absolutely. He has no choice
- 25 putting this together.



- 1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Just glad that you're using him.
- 2 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Bernard.
- 3 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I just want to congratulate
- 4 you on your report. As was mentioned earlier, your
- 5 energy, your positive spirit, your leadership.
- 6 COMMANDER BRIDGET: Thank you.
- 7 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Because what I see in you is
- 8 what people refer to as servant leadership and you
- 9 promote those around you, which is the most important
- 10 thing. I always say a good quarterback's not worth a
- 11 without a good front line.
- 12 COMMANDER BRIDGET: Absolutely.
- COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Which put together is because
- 14 you never get your arm up, even if you could throw the
- 15 ball to Canada. So it's really good that you have created
- 16 this environment. I feel the warmth in this room, and it
- 17 all starts at the top.
- 18 COMMANDER BRIDGET: Thank you.
- 19 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Congratulations, my sister.
- 20 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: VC.
- 21 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you, commander, for your
- 22 awesome presentation as all the commissioners have
- 23 basically made mention. Now when you start talking about
- 24 those cigarettes and young people, I can remember, well
- 25 the last time commissioner Birch was on the Board when



- 1 she first discovered that the convenience stores, the gas
- 2 stations, and all were responsible for having young folks
- 3 engage in that negative behavior she was just so
- 4 frustrated. So I am sure she is so relieved that you have
- 5 demonstrated how you can go about making an impact
- 6 because it was as if folks had a blind eye to it. She
- 7 would describe how some of the residual from those
- 8 cigarettes would be on folks' lawns and all. So I'm sure
- 9 Commissioner Birch's excited that you've shown how to
- 10 make an impact and to make those owners responsible.
- 11 COMMANDER BRIDGET: Councilman Benson is on fire.
- 12 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay.
- 13 COMMANDER BRIDGET: He's on fire with this
- 14 initiative. He's on fire.
- 15 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Very good. Thank you.
- 16 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you. Fantastic. Wow.
- 17 Pastor Brewer, I understand you want to say something.
- 18 PASTOR BREWER: Yes, I would. Perfect. Thanks. I
- 19 understand that it's getting late, and I just would like
- 20 to say that first of all, I've been Pastor of King David
- 21 for 26 years. I was 40 years old when I came here. I went
- 22 through seven commanders in terms of relationships that
- 23 I've had with the 11 Precinct in terms of being the
- 24 shifting out of the different commanders. It doesn't
- 25 matter who they bring out, they seem to always bring



- 1 somebody in that's connected to District 3.
- 2 COMMISSIONER: All right. Good.
- 3 PASTOR BREWER: Commander Pritchard as well, as well
- 4 as captain Jackson, we lock arms. I'm just one of five
- 5 community churches that is part of this situation, as it
- 6 relates from Church of Our Father, king David, Christian
- 7 Grove, Vernon Chapel Day Spring. In other words, Solomon
- 8 Temple. In other words, they lock arms with us. And if
- 9 we're not at the meeting once a month with Captain
- 10 Jackson or Commander, they call us. Well, if we're in our
- 11 cars, we pull over and all the information that you get,
- 12 we are very familiar with. They keep us abreast as well
- 13 as the commander, as well as the community meeting with
- 14 Ms. Jackson and some of the leaders, Ms. McCannon, as
- 15 well as our Commissioner Burks. They keep us on our toes
- 16 as a church. I'm part of Persian High School.
- 17 PASTOR BREWER: Our ministry is there and I'm a
- 18 witness to the boys and girls relationships that the DPD
- 19 has at least for Persian High School, because I'd end
- 20 there. Also, this young lady, I guess as you finish with
- 21 pastor Holley somehow commit here with me at King David.
- 22 You know where I'm at. I have two preachers here. Dr.
- 23 Bowen or Dr. Ingram. We can walk with you. If you hang
- 24 with us, you'll know who these people are.
- 25 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: All right.



- 1 PASTOR BREWER: We'll give you a whole different
- 2 outlook. Your story is my story of all the police
- 3 officers that is here. It's probably at least about two
- 4 that has your story than we had a bad experience with a
- 5 police officer when we were kids. One of these have had
- 6 that. So your story's my story. I've had it, but these
- 7 police officers are my right man, my right hand.
- 8 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you.
- 9 PASTOR BREWER: They call me, I'm the shepherd,
- 10 they're my sheep dogs. They can take care of us over
- 11 here. So we lock arms. We don't move. They let us know
- 12 what's going on. We let them know what's going on. We
- 13 work as a community and that's who he is. I just want to
- 14 give you an idea of what's happening over here with the
- 15 churches.
- 16 COMMISSIONER: Okay, good.
- 17 PASTOR BREWER: As well as DPD in terms of captain.
- 18 Captain White walks with us. We get a walk with him. I've
- 19 walked with him. We are going to make sure it's
- 20 intentional that we connect with them. Since we do it,
- 21 they return the favor, and they hold us accountable based
- 22 on what we say we want. So that's the relationship in
- 23 District 3 that we have with Detroit Police Office.
- 24 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: All right.
- 25 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you.



- 1 PASTOR BREWER: With that, one other thing I can say
- 2 we're going to have a cleanup in the area here. My sister
- 3 Birch wanted me to make sure you're all going to go home,
- 4 but I got to stay here with sister Birch. Then we're
- 5 going to be cleaning up in this area on March 5th.
- 6 COMMISSIONER BANKS: It's May 5th.
- 7 PASTOR BREWER: May 5th, right. So these are things
- 8 that we do over here. So God bless you all. Thank you
- 9 all.
- 10 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you, sir.
- 11 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you.
- 12 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Now I'm going to have a report
- 13 from my Board Secretary, Ms. Victoria Shaw.
- 14 MS. SHAW: Thank you, Mr. Chair. So for my Secretary
- 15 Report today, first you have one incoming correspondence
- 16 outlined on your agenda. So policy from DPD for the
- 17 Board's review, 201.1. I have several updates for the
- 18 Board and the community. Several commissioners are having
- 19 issues. Some of you are having issues with your city
- 20 email address. So I'm asking that you bring your laptop
- 21 to headquarters and see Mr. Brown, ASAP. For all
- 22 commissioners to prevent these issues going forward, the
- 23 best practice is to bring your laptop to one meeting a
- 24 month at headquarters and connect to the network, and
- 25 that will prevent these issues going forward. My next



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- 1 update is around the BOPC and OCI presentation at DPD'S
- 2 New recruit, class 2023G, which was yesterday, April
- 3 12th.
- 4 MS. SHAW: The presentation went very well, and the
- 5 new recruits seemed very interested in learning about the
- 6 history, mission, and expectations of BOPC and OCI. Thank
- 7 you, Commissioner Moore and Senior Investigator Gianna
- 8 Coulter for stepping up and making that presentation
- 9 happen. Commissioners, this week you did receive a draft
- 10 of BOPC's answers to city council's budget questions.
- 11 Those are ready to go to the City Council except for one
- 12 component, the 2023/24 itemized proposed budget. I am
- 13 waiting on that for Mr. George's team in finance. As soon
- 14 as that's received, then that will be delivered over to
- 15 city council. I do have some updates regarding open
- 16 positions. So for Chief Investigator and five
- 17 investigators, there are candidates on today's agenda for
- 18 the Board's consideration. In regard to the three
- 19 positions that we're looking to fill on the admin team,
- 20 attorney, executive manager, as well as legal assistant,
- 21 I received the following update from Mr. Tipton in
- 22 recruiting today.
- MS. SHAW: According to Mr. Tipton, the legal
- 24 assistant and attorney positions are housed in the law
- 25 department, and we are being directed back to the



- 1 Corporation Council. So Conrad Mallett or Adam Saxby in
- 2 regards to those positions. For the executive manager,
- 3 per Mr. Tipton, this position belongs to DPD and is
- 4 appointed by the Chief of Police. He's saying that that
- 5 is not part of BOPC, however, this is our second
- 6 executive manager position in BOPC, and that first one is
- 7 already filled. So not really understanding why we're
- 8 getting this pushback on this position, but those three
- 9 positions have not been posted bottom line, and we are
- 10 having some difficulties getting those posted. There was
- 11 a question recently about the task workers. Just want to
- 12 clarify that. I have spoken with city Talent Acquisition,
- 13 city, HR, and city Labor Relations.
- MS. SHAW: Based on the rationale that Ms. Rosita
- 15 Brockington gave over a month ago, the city is refusing
- 16 to hire the task workers due to their interpretation of
- 17 the UAW contract language, the contract under which the
- 18 current investigators are organized. So we are not able
- 19 to move forward with hiring the task workers. Just to
- 20 kind of sum up what's going on with staffing right now.
- 21 The administrative and OCI teams continue to be
- 22 understaffed. As a Board, we do operate under a structure
- 23 where the Board's appointees and staff are onboarded as
- 24 city employees. So we are subject to city government
- 25 control over our recruitment and management of staff. We



- 1 currently do not have a mechanism to onboard, provide
- 2 equipment, access, or payroll to staff if we hire outside
- 3 of the city's processes. If this Board and the community
- 4 need and desires more autonomy and oversight, it will
- 5 require restructuring this Board and its relationship to
- 6 our city government. The last updates I have are the OCI
- 7 updates in regard to citizen complaints. So if we can
- 8 just display those slides, please. Commissioners, you
- 9 have these slides in your binder as well. I think it's
- 10 behind tab number five in your binders.
- 11 MS. SHAW: So moving on to the second slide, just
- 12 kind of reiterating some recent improvements in
- 13 initiatives. We are continuing the weekly spreadsheets
- 14 for supervisors to coach investigators and seniors to
- 15 close cases timely. We are focusing not only on the
- 16 backlog cases, but also ensuring that new cases get
- 17 closed timely and do not further contribute to a greater
- 18 backlog. The investigator new hire interviews are
- 19 complete, so as soon as we can get those additional
- 20 investigators onboarded, that will help with processing
- 21 cases. Going on to the next slide, please. This is just a
- 22 reiteration of the definitions and clarifications. So
- 23 after a case is closed, we have 45 days for commissioners
- 24 to review and for us to send a letter out to the citizen.
- 25 Next slide, please. So, as you can see here this is our



- 1 trend with open cases week over week by age.
- 2 MS. SHAW: Despite cases coming in, we only saw an
- 3 overall increase of two cases between last week and this
- 4 week. So that means that we are just about closing cases
- 5 at the same rate that they're coming in the door, which
- 6 is good, considering that we're not fully staffed. So
- 7 when we are fully staffed, then we should be able to
- 8 bring that total case number down. Onto the next slide.
- 9 We do have 14 cases that are currently with the
- 10 commissioners for review. Thank you, commissioners, for
- 11 working through those cases. We really appreciate it. It
- 12 helps us get the letters back out to the citizens, and
- 13 there are 25 new closed cases this week that will be
- 14 distributed to commissioners after today's meeting.
- MS. SHAW: Next slide please. So for 2023, we have
- 16 377 cases received so far, 136 of those cases are closed
- 17 now, 25 closed just within the last week and we have 108
- 18 that closed within 60 days, 27 that closed between 61 and
- 19 90 days and we did have one that closed over 90 days
- 20 aged. Then going to our last slide. So of the 377 cases
- 21 we received this year, we have 241 that remain open right
- 22 now. 17 of them have aged over 90 days, and they are
- 23 contributing now to the backlog. We have 44 that are
- 24 approaching 90 days aged. So there's a lot of focus with
- 25 the supervisors to make sure that we can close those



- 1 cases that are approaching over 90 days that we received
- 2 in 2023, so that we do not perpetuate a backlog
- 3 throughout the year. That concludes my Secretary Report,
- 4 Mr. Chair.
- 5 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you. Announcements.
- 6 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Wait, Mr. Chair, I want to
- 7 comment please on the Secretary's Report.
- 8 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Oh, okay.
- 9 COMMISSIONER MOORE: If it's okay.
- 10 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Go right ahead, sir.
- 11 COMMISSIONER MOORE: I've long said that the mayor's
- 12 office has had too much influence with the Board of
- 13 Police Commissioners. You've heard about us being under
- 14 investigation, things of that nature. But the BOPC is
- 15 just a point. You have human resources, which has done
- 16 things which has caused scrutiny to the Board. Law
- 17 department, which has caused scrutiny to the Board. That
- 18 needs to end. So I'm going to ask the mayor to tell his
- 19 appointees to take a hands off approach with the Board
- 20 because it's a public safety issue and it's a public
- 21 safety crisis when people do not trust investigations
- 22 coming through our door. We need people, we need staff,
- 23 and we're asking them to do the right thing. So, Mr.
- 24 Mayor, Mayor Duggan, please tell your people to take
- 25 their hands off of the Board so we can do what we need to



- 1 do in the best interest of the citizens of Detroit. Thank
- 2 you.
- 3 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you, Commissioner Moore.
- 4 Well said. Announcements, Ms. Shaw.
- 5 MS. SHAW: For announcements, our next meeting is
- 6 Thursday, April 20th at 3:00 PM at Detroit Public Safety
- 7 Headquarters. That'll be our regular BOPC meeting. Then
- 8 our next community meeting will be in May on May 11th at
- 9 6:30 PM and in May we'll be at the Eighth Precinct,
- 10 Crowell Recreational Center at 16630 Lahser Road. Then
- 11 there are updates in regard to the monthly committee
- 12 meetings. So we do have Personnel and Training Committee
- 13 meetings scheduled still here in April on the 15th. Then
- 14 additional committee meetings starting in May will be
- 15 scheduled on an ad hoc basis, for the direction of each
- 16 committee's Chairperson. That concludes the announcement,
- 17 Mr. Chair.
- 18 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: All right. Unfinished business
- 19 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Through the Chair. As has been
- 20 perhaps indicated earlier, yes, the Personnel and
- 21 Training Committee meeting met yesterday. It was for all
- 22 intent and emergency meeting because as Ms. White
- 23 Secretary to the Board has indicated we have a need-
- 24 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Ms. Shaw.
- 25 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Oh, I'm sorry. I am so sorry. Ms.



- 1 Shaw, thank you for that, has indicated there is a need
- 2 for at least eight investigators. But at this point we
- 3 were only able to interview and screen 5 investigators.
- 4 As everyone probably in the whole United States know that
- 5 BOPC is in need of a Chief of OCI. So on that note, there
- 6 are recommendations that came out of the Personnel and
- 7 Training Committee and I'll start with the first. We are
- 8 going to make a recommendation for the hiring of at least
- 9 five investigators. On behalf of the Personnel and
- 10 Training Committee, I move that we offer Nicole Mesiner,
- 11 the position of Investigator Police Commissioner, which
- 12 has a posted salary range of \$40,344-\$60,306. In that
- 13 it's coming out of committee. Thank you, sir. There's no
- 14 need for a second. Is there a discussion?
- 15 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: Chairman.
- 16 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: I'm sorry. Is that a salary
- 17 range? The ranges between what now?
- 18 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: The salary ranges between \$40,344
- 19 and \$60,306. What did I say?
- 20 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: The Chairman
- 21 needs to state the motion.
- 22 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: I'm sorry. Please.
- 23 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: The Chairman
- 24 needs to state the motion.
- 25 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Oh, I'm sorry.



- 1 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: The Chairman
- 2 asked for a discussion. Thank you.
- 3 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Oh, okay. Thank you.
- 4 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: She's the Chairperson of that
- 5 committee.
- 6 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: She's not Chair
- 7 of the Board of Police-
- 8 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: I got you.
- 9 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Excuse me. Point of order and
- 10 point of information, Mr. Chairman.
- 11 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes, sir.
- 12 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Can you name the members of
- 13 that subcommittee and name who's the Chair that's listed
- 14 for that subcommittee for Personnel and Training.
- 15 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Through the Chair. Are we in the
- 16 business of making a motion or at least having an
- 17 understanding who is responsible for making the motion?
- 18 Thank you, Parliamentarian. When we went through this
- 19 ritual about three meetings ago, the Chair of the
- 20 Personnel Training Committee made those motions. It is
- 21 the recommendation-
- 22 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: It is proper
- 23 for the person who's presenting the recommendations from
- 24 the committee to make the motion.
- 25 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes.



- 1 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: If it is a
- 2 committee of more than one person, no second is required.
- 3 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Correct.
- 4 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: But after you
- 5 make the motion, just like with any other motion, in
- 6 order for that motion to be on the table for the
- 7 commissioners to discuss, it must be stated by the Chair.
- 8 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Oh, okay. I'm sorry.
- 9 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: Then the Chair
- 10 asks if there's any debate.
- 11 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you, Parliamentarian.
- 12 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: So the recommendation to
- 13 appoint Nicole-
- 14 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Mesiner.
- 15 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yep. Mesiner as investigator
- 16 from the salary range of 40,344 to 60,000 and what?
- 17 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: 306.
- 18 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: 306. Roll call. Vote. No. I'm
- 19 sorry.
- 20 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: You have to ask
- 21 for the debate, Mr. Chairman.
- 22 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: For discussion.
- 23 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: Thank you.
- 24 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner.
- 25 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair. I have a few



- 1 questions on behalf of Citizen Detroit. We'd like to know
- 2 who's all on that committee. When were these names
- 3 introduced to the committees? I received the email saying
- 4 that Hernandez who Chairs that committee will be out for
- 5 the week. It also said that Mayor appointee Annie Holt
- 6 will be sitting in for Hernandez for yesterday's meeting.
- 7 So the public would like to know who all serves on that
- 8 committee, when were these names introduced to the
- 9 committee and how was this process brought apart far as
- 10 to the point that we're bringing names today? You have
- 11 commissioners that are sitting at the table who are not
- 12 aware of all of these names that is brought before us
- 13 today. We can't tell you anything about their past or
- 14 previous appointment history. But now all of a sudden,
- 15 we're talking about salaries, and it sounds like this
- 16 Board has not always been transparent.
- 17 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner.
- 18 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Sir.
- 19 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: No, no.
- 20 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Sir.
- 21 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I have the floor. This board
- 22 has not always been transparent-
- 23 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner, wait.
- 24 COMMISSIONER BURTON: This Board has not always been
- 25 transparent.



- 1 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: I think we need to answer his
- 2 question, sir, about who's on the committee. That's what
- 3 I think we need to do.
- 4 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Finish. Go ahead, sir. Finish
- 5 so I can answer your question.
- 6 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: No, this Board has not always
- 7 been transparent. We have not had ongoing conversations.
- 8 We have not had ongoing conversations about these
- 9 investigators. What most recently this Board has talked
- 10 about what's the task workers.
- 11 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Commissioner, wait. In the past
- 12 and also in addition, the Board has talked about hiring
- 13 the Secretary and the Chief Investigator.
- 14 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Burton-
- 15 COMMISSIONER BURTON: We saw how that turned out-
- 16 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Burton, can I
- 17 answer?
- 18 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Okay.
- 19 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: For the public record,
- 20 Commissioner Burton is on the Personnel and Training
- 21 Committee. He is getting every single email. Now, I can't
- 22 make him participate or him to grandstand and say he
- 23 doesn't know. He does. As the Chair, I make sure that
- 24 everybody knows what I know to a point anything I can
- 25 tell you, I will let the full Board know. Everybody knows



- 1 that I am so transparent it's a shame. So the rest of the
- 2 committee people, you-
- 3 COMMISSIONER BURTON: For-
- 4 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Let me finish.
- 5 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Point of order, Mr. Chairman.
- 6 For the record. Ms. Shaw and Commissioner Linda Bernard
- 7 were recently talking a few days ago about a officer or a
- 8 former officer for, I want to say the city of Firmdale,
- 9 whether that person or not should be one of the new
- 10 investigators.
- 11 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commission. We're not-
- 12 COMMISSIONER BURTON: In addition to that—
- 13 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: We're talking-
- 14 COMMISSIONER BURTON: On behalf a list of those
- 15 invest-
- 16 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: Mr. Chairman.
- 17 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Nor have any those discussions.
- 18 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes. You're out of order, sir.
- 19 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: Mr. Chairman.
- 20 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Individual.
- 21 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: You're out of order.
- 22 COMMISSIONER BURTON: No. This meeting is out of
- 23 order. You bring these names before-
- 24 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: Excuse me, Mr.
- 25 Chairman.



- 1 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Asking for permission. I'm
- 2 asking this Board to rubber stamp-
- 3 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner.
- 4 COMMISSIONER BURTON: These names and these salary
- 5 position-
- 6 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Then you vote-
- 7 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Is out of order. You're out of
- 8 order.
- 9 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: You vote with your conscience.
- 10 That's what you do.
- 11 COMMISSIONER BURTON: You're out of order.
- 12 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes.
- 13 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: Mr. Chairman my
- 14 advice as a parliamentarian is that you rule the point of
- 15 order not well taken. The questions are not germane to
- 16 the motion.
- 17 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Right.
- 18 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: That point of
- 19 order not being well taken, because it's not germane,
- 20 should be part of the minutes on the record.
- 21 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: She is correct. That motion, I
- 22 mean, that discussion is not germane. It's not germane.
- 23 It's not. You're right. So any other further discussion?
- 24 Let's call for the vote. Roll call vote.
- 25 MS. SHAW: Based on-



- 1 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Madam.
- 2 MS. SHAW: I'm sorry. Based on consultation with the
- 3 parliamentarian, roll call vote is not required.
- 4 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: Neither is two
- 5 thirds. If there is some dispute in your mind, Mr.
- 6 Chairman, whether the motion is adopted or not, you can
- 7 ask for a roll call vote.
- 8 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: I'd rather do a roll call
- 9 vote.
- 10 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: So let it be.
- 11 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Go ahead. Roll call vote, Ms.
- 12 Shaw.
- 13 MS. SHAW: Chairman Bryan Ferguson Yes.
- 14 MS. SHAW: Vice-Chair Annie Holt Yes.
- 15 MS. SHAW: Commissioner Linda Barnard leave?
- 16 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes. She left.
- 17 MS. SHAW: Thank you.
- 18 MS. SHAW: Commissioner Willie Burton No, because
- 19 we don't know anything about these applicants, nor have
- 20 we had any ongoing discussions about-
- 21 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Okay, sir, you said no.
- 22 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Nor do-
- 23 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: You're out of order, sir. Out
- 24 of order. You're out of order. You said it and you had
- 25 your time.



- 1 COMMISSIONER BURTON: We must know.
- 2 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Burton.
- 3 COMMISSIONER BURTON: What's going on Mr.-
- 4 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Point of order
- 5 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Person Ferguson.
- 6 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner.
- 7 COMMISSIONER BURTON: You rubber stamping this-
- 8 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Burton.
- 9 COMMISSIONER BURTON: We haven't talked about these-
- 10 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: You're on there.
- 11 COMMISSIONER BURTON: We have been in the ongoing
- 12 discussions. We don't even know who these applicants are.
- 13 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Burton, you're
- 14 out of order.
- 15 COMMISSIONER BURTON: You rubber stamping something—
- 16 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: You're out of order. Continue
- 17 Ms. Shaw.
- 18 MS. SHAW: Commissioner Jim Holley.
- 19 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Order's corrupt.
- 20 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes.
- 21 MS. SHAW: Commissioner Ricardo Moore Yes.
- 22 MS. SHAW: Commissioner QuanTez Pressley Yes.
- 23 MS. SHAW: Commissioner Cedric Banks Yes.
- MS. SHAW: Mr. Chair, you have 6 = Yes votes and 1 =
- 25 No vote.



- 1 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: All right. The motion has
- 2 passed for her to be an investigator.
- 3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: You got five more to go?
- 4 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes.
- 5 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes.
- 6 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: That's just the first up?
- 7 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Speed it up. Go ahead.
- 8 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: On behalf of the Personnel and
- 9 Training Committee, I move that we offer Justin St. Clair
- 10 the position of Investigator Police Commissioner, which
- 11 has a posted salary range of \$40,344 through \$60,306.
- 12 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: We don't need a second for
- 13 that. Correct?
- 14 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Correct.
- 15 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: The recommendation to appoint
- 16 Justin St. Clair as investigator. Any discussion?
- 17 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Yes. Mr. Chairman, who all are
- 18 the applicants that apply for these positions? Number
- 19 one. Number two. What ongoing discussions have we had
- 20 about these applicants? Where did we come down with a
- 21 short list as commissioners as a whole? When was these
- 22 decisions taking place? Why are we voting on this today?
- 23 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Go ahead.
- 24 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Through the Chairman and to my
- 25 fellow commissioner. We decided to use a committee to do



- 1 the work. The committee will do all the work and
- 2 interviews. Then they will bring the findings to the
- 3 general Board. We're basically to vote after we've got
- 4 all the information in our package. Everybody that has
- 5 been interviewed, the picture, the resume and everything,
- 6 they do the work as a committee. They recommend them to
- 7 us and we vote on it knowing that the people that they
- 8 have interviewed we know them based on our package.
- 9 That's the way-
- 10 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Commissioner Holley, somebody's
- 11 here is pulling the strings.
- 12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner-
- 13 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Rubber stamping this process.
- 14 I've served on that-
- 15 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner, he has a floor.
- 16 COMMISSIONER BURTON: The bottom line is-
- 17 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner.
- 18 COMMISSIONER BURTON: When I opened up my email, it
- 19 says that there was going to be a meeting at five
- 20 o'clock. That meeting didn't take place at five. Ferguson
- 21 came down and came. It happened at 5:30. When do you have
- 22 the Vice-Chair of the Board and the Chair of the Board
- 23 who's the ex-officio of the office and then you have one
- 24 commissioner, which is Ricardo Moore that's present,
- 25 that's voting on all of these important matters.



- 1 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner, you're on the
- 2 Board.
- 3 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I did not get these names.
- 4 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: You were in the building.
- 5 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I did not get these names in
- 6 the email that we're voting on today.
- 7 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner, you were in the
- 8 building.
- 9 COMMISSIONER BURTON: This was by done-
- 10 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: You're on this committee,
- 11 commissioner.
- 12 COMMISSIONER BURTON: We have not yet-
- 13 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: You got the email. You know
- 14 what? You didn't want to participate.
- 15 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Was that Hernandez is going to
- 16 be absent for the week.
- 17 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Absolutely.
- 18 COMMISSIONER BURTON: It's going to be sitting in for
- 19 Hernandez.
- 20 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: So you got notified.
- 21 COMMISSIONER BURTON: We did not get the names in the
- 22 email of the investigators that we're looking to hire. We
- 23 did not get that in the email. That didn't come in the
- 24 email. So when was this being discussed? When did they
- 25 discuss these names?



- 1 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Through the Chair. I call them
- 2 point of order.
- 3 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Point of order, sir.
- 4 COMMISSIONER BURTON: So list-
- 5 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Sir, point of order. Point of
- 6 order-
- 7 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Be conducted—
- 8 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Burton.
- 9 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Debate-
- 10 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Burton.
- 11 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Brought to the committee.
- 12 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Burton.
- 13 COMMISSIONER BURTON: When was the fill list-
- 14 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: You're not making yourself—
- 15 COMMISSIONER BURTON: To the committee.
- 16 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: You're really not making your
- 17 point. Because you're on the committee. So if you're not
- 18 doing your due diligence and you're on the committee,
- 19 that's not my fault.
- 20 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Do you know what, Mr. Chairman-
- 21 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: You've been asked to be on
- 22 this committee.
- 23 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Mr. Chairman, this Board has
- 24 been sued time and time again.
- 25 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: You're right.



- 1 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Since you've been the Chair.
- 2 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: You're absolutely right.
- 3 COMMISSIONER BURTON: We've been sued again.
- 4 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: You're right.
- 5 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Because something you aren't
- 6 doing as Chair.
- 7 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Right.
- 8 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Something that this Board is
- 9 not doing. This Board is out of order. This board-
- 10 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: Mr. Chairman.
- 11 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: So are you Commissioner
- 12 Burton.
- 13 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: Mr. Chairman.
- 14 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes.
- 15 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: There's a
- 16 remedy for behavior that disrupts the meeting.
- 17 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: I'm trying not to use it. I am
- 18 trying not to use it.
- 19 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: Okay,
- 20 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Mr. Chair, can I say something
- 21 really quick?
- 22 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: We're trying to get through
- 23 this, sir. Discussion, go right ahead.
- 24 COMMISSIONER BANKS: One quick thing.
- 25 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Go ahead.



- 1 COMMISSIONER BANKS: We represent the city of
- 2 Detroit. We're leaders up here. Let's keep the harmony.
- 3 We got the community out here and we can make our point.
- 4 But let's do it in harmony though. That's the way a wise
- 5 man would do it. Let's keep the harmony. Don't lose to

- 12 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Okay. The recommendation to

- 15 to be seconded, Mr. Chairman.

- 2 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Congratulations on this.
- 3 MS. SHAW: I'm sorry, Mr. Chair. There are 6 = Yes
- 4 votes and 1 = No vote.

- 2 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: All opposed? One opposed. That
- 3 motion to extend the postings for the position of
- 4 investigator has passed.
- 5 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: One last motion recommendation
- 6 from the Personnel and Training Committee. On behalf of
- 7 the Personnel and Training Committee, I move to appoint
- 8 Pastor Jerome Warfield as Chief investigator at the
- 9 previously negotiated salary of \$111,000 with a
- 10 retroactive start date of March the 13th, 2023.
- 11 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Is there a second? No. Don't
- 12 need a second. Discussion?
- 13 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Hold it right there. I read the
- 14 email. You sent out an email, right, Chair Ferguson?
- 15 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes.

- 23 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: All opposed? Aye.
- PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: No, not nay.
- 25 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Nay.



- 1 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: I'm sorry. No,
- 2 my apology.
- 3 COMMISSIONER BANKS: I oppose the promotion. I mean,
- 4 his recommendation.
- 5 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: That's two nos. Any more no's?
- 6 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Madame Parliamentarian, can I
- 7 mark my abstention?

- 13 \$11,000 as Chief Investigator retro to March.
- 14 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: I'm sorry.
- 15 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: March 13th, 2023. New
- 16 business. No new business. Can I have a motion to
- 17 adjourn?
- 18 COMMISSIONERS: So moved.
- 19 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Mr. Chair.
- 20 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: All in favor?
- 21 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Mr. Chair.
