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3 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Once again, this meeting will 4 now come to order. My name is Bryan Ferguson, Chairperson 5 of the Board of Police Commissioners. Now invocation by 6 Chaplain Noel Hall, please.

CHAPLAIN HALL: Thank you. Let us pray. Father God, 7 we thank you today for this meeting. We thank you for 8 every official, every leader that we have. We give thanks 9 for our mayor, mayor Duggan and our Chief of Police, 10 Chief White. God, we thank you for every leader that 11 12 serves in our community. So, Father God, we thank you, 13 especially today for mental stamina, that it may be 14 increased. God, we pray that every idea and every 15 decision made today, let it bear fruit in the lives of 16 those whom we serve. These blessings we pray in Jesus' 17 name. Amen.

18 COMMISSIONERS: Amen.

19 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you, Chaplain Hall.
20 Thank you so much. Madame Secretary, introduction of
21 Commissioners, please.

22 MS. SHAW: Thank you, Mr. Chair. Introduction of 23 Commissioners.

MS. SHAW: Chairman Bryan Ferguson - Here, District
25 1.



MS. SHAW: Vice-Chair Annie Holt - Good afternoon, 1 2 Vice-Chair, Commissioner Holt, At-Large. MS. SHAW: Commissioner Willie Bell - Present, 3 District 4. 4 MS. SHAW: Commissioner Linda Benard - Attorney Linda 5 Bernard, District 2, present. Welcome everyone. 6 MS. SHAW: Commissioner Willie Burton - Commissioner 7 Willie Burton is present on behalf of the Citizens of the 8 City of Detroit. 9 MS. SHAW: Commissioner Lisa Carter -10 MS. SHAW: Commissioner Jesus Hernandez submitted an 11 12 excused absence. MS. SHAW: Commissioner Jim Holley - Present. 13 14 MS. SHAW: Commissioner Ricardo Moore - Present. 15 MS. SHAW: Commissioner QuanTez Pressley - Here. 16 MS. SHAW: Commissioner Cedric Banks -17 MS. SHAW: Mr. Chair, you have a quorum. CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes. Cedric Banks, he will be 18 a little late when he comes when we have that. Now I 19 20 would like to have the approval of the April 27th agenda 21 2023. 2.2 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Second. 23 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Any discussion? COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair. 24

25 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes.



COMMISSIONER BURTON: I'd like to amend the agenda 1 today to give citizens an additional 30 seconds if 2 3 needed. COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I'll second that to 30 4 seconds. 5 6 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: It has been seconded. Any discussion? All in favor? Aye. 7 8 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Aye. 9 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: All opposed? 10 COMMISSIONERS: Nay. CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: The motion has failed. Any 11 12 further discussion? Can we have a motion to accept the 13 aqenda? 14 COMMISSIONER MOORE: So move. 15 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Second. 16 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Any discussion on the second? No discussion. All in favor? 17 18 COMMISSIONERS: Aye. 19 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: All opposed? The motion 20 carries. Approval of the minutes for April 20th, 2023. 21 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Second. 22 MS. SHAW: Mr. Chair, we do have one correction for 23 the minutes from 4- 20. Under the Secretary Report., the 24 date for Jerome Warfield requested by the Board was March 25 13th.



1 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: What?

2 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Not the fourth? March the

3 14th. That was the correction.

4 MS. SHAW: March 13th is the correct date.

5 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: For?

6 MS. SHAW: The date that the Board voted to.

7 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Got you. Okay. So March 13th-

8 MS. SHAW: On his date. Thank you.

9 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: But with those corrected for 10 the minutes, any other corrections? Any other further 11 discussion? All approved?

12 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes.

13 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

14 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: All opposed? Those minutes 15 with the correction have carried. Introduction of BOPC 16 staff. Ms. Shaw.

17 MS. SHAW: Thank you, Mr. Chair. For BOPC staff, we have Mr. Robert Brown. Ms. Theresa Blossom. We have 18 19 Attorney Adam Saxby with us today. Ms. Candace Hayes on Zoom. We also have DPD, HR Director, Katrina Patillo, 20 21 sign Language Interpreters, we have Ms. Yakata and Dr. 22 Stephanie Beatty. Don Handyside is our court reporter. We have Media Services doing the video and Sergeant Alan 23 24 Ouinn on audio. That's all for staff introductions. 25 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Assistant Chief Sims, who do



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1 you have with you?

2 DEPUTY CHIEF SIMS: Thank you for the promotion.

3 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Oh, you should be.

4 DEPUTY CHIEF SIMS: Deputy Chief, DeShaune Sims, 5 Western operations in for Chief White today. Looking in 6 the audience, I'll have any DPD members announce their 7 names and where they work.

8 OFFICER BLAN: Alexander Blan from District 20.

9 OFFICER: Sergeant (Bad Audio - No Mic) from Homicide 10 Task Force.

11 Command Staff Introductions - Not audible.

12 DEPUTY CHIEF SIMS: That's all for us.

13 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you. Madam Secretary,

14 any elected officials or representatives present?

15 MS. SHAW: Yes, Mr. Chair. We have Ms. Fredia Butler,

16 Second Precinct Community Relations President, former

17 Commissioner William Davis, Ms. Marie Overall

18 representative from Tyrone Carter's office. I'm sorry.

19 Representative Tyrone Carter's office, and Ron Thomas,

20 Vice President, DPOA.

21 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: I think I've seen Ms. Butler.
22 Did you say her name?

MS. SHAW: I did. Ms. Fredia Butler, Second Precinct.
CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: I would like her to say it
again. Thank you. Thank you. Welcome everybody. Welcome



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on this beautiful day. All the rain we have. For my chair 1 2 report, the news. We have made the news again, right? Again, and again and not for good reasons. This Board has 3 heard all the cries. Why? We need an audit. We need a 4 5 forensic audit. We got the audit. That wasn't good 6 enough, right? OIG coming here to help us. That's not 7 good enough. We have got internal affairs to make sure everything is going above board. That's still not good 8 9 enough.

CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: For the news to label us 10 dysfunction is not fair to a lot of commissioners sitting 11 12 on this Board, especially myself. I didn't come on this 13 Board to be dysfunctional. I came on this board to help. 14 I've been asking the audience. I've been asking the 15 people in Zoom. I've been asking people coming on here 16 for public comment. Constructive criticism, help us, 17 right? If you are going to criticize, that's fine. Put your feet in. Run. Get on this Board. Get on the Board. 18 Change the makeup of the Board if that's what you want to 19 do, right? For the Board members, I have been saying this 20 all along. We have to stop fighting, sitting at this 21 22 table.

23 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: I said, if I'm doing something 24 stupid, pull me aside. I take the steps up here every day 25 and I take them down. Catch me in the stairwell. You can



1 cuss, you can push, you can do anything you want to. But that's where it stays, inside that stairwell. It doesn't 2 come to this boardroom. Some of the commissioners have 3 been on here nine years. It's time to change. You can 4 5 change. It's never too late to change. When I first got 6 on this Board, I saw things. I was like, oh, I can make 7 that change. We're grown adults here. We should start 8 acting like it. Respect. That's who we should be giving 9 each other to the public, to the audience, even to the 10 police department. Respect. Some of the things I heard 11 over the last couple of weeks by some of the 12 commissioners it's just out of line. Totally out of line. CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: That's not fair. It's not fair 13 14 to the police department. It's not fair to the citizens. 15 It is definitely not fair to this Board or me. Stop 16 giving news headlines that they use to make us look bad. It's not fair for a lot of commissioners on this Board. 17 18 It's not because they labeled all as one. It's not. If 19 the news really wanted to do something, call them out by name. That's what you want to do. Don't say every, all 20 21 the Board, the whole Board because that's not it. I'll 22 say it again. I put some people in positions that never 23 had an opportunity. Don't squander that opportunity because when I get up out of this seat, we don't know 24 25 who's going to sit here. You may never get that



1 opportunity again. So don't put a match to your authority. Don't do it. Don't do it. I want to thank 2 3 Commissioner Cedric Banks. He's not here and should be 4 coming. I'll say it again. He was the only one, the only 5 one that sent me something. He gave me a suggestion on how he can get his committee together. Because I said, 6 7 you guys, you're the Chairperson. You figure out how to 8 pull your committee together. He gave me a good 9 suggestion.

CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: So I hope he implements that. 10 11 Ms. Butler, I hear you. How do we have a meeting amongst 12 ourselves so we can hash out some of these problems, so 13 we don't bring it to this table in front of the public 14 and get mad and kind of make decisions right away. That's 15 not fair for us. It's not. It's not fair to the public. 16 It makes it seem like we're all over the place and we 17 cannot meet amongst ourselves to hash things out. We are 18 all over the place. Our parliamentarian told me one time, 19 listen, you guys can meet as long as you are not making a decision. You're not voting on anything. You can meet. 20 You are not violating the Open Meetings Act. I'm going 21 22 with her. From Reverend Holley's words, she makes the big 23 bucks. Why shouldn't I listen to her? That's how we can get together. 24

25 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: So now we can hash out some of



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1 this stuff that's happening. The public needs our trust. The public trusts a lot of us sitting on this Board. But 2 the phone calls I've been getting on my phone, I've been 3 4 going back on them too. Call your commissioner. Oh, they 5 won't answer the phone. All those are voicemail. I don't have the number to that. I'm telling you, when you call 6 7 me, I'm going to call you back, especially if it was on 8 the Board phone. Because that's your phone. So when the 9 news say, Chair Ferguson, don't call me back. No, it's not true. I made some mistakes. When they asked you for 10 my statement, I gave it right to the media. My mistake 11 12 was I should have gave it to the public first, then this 13 Board, then the media. That's how it should have went. I 14 don't have a problem talking to the media. Really, I 15 don't.

CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: But when I put something in 16 17 writing that's an etching stone. You can't dispute that. 18 But when I talk to you, you going to take bits and 19 pieces. You saw the news. You saw where they said I said, 20 try to get a commissioner to calm down. Right? We got rules. You've been on this Board long enough. You should 21 know the rules. Act like you know the rules. Act with 22 decorum. Respect. I don't see city council acting like 23 24 that. I don't see DPD acting like that. We shouldn't act 25 like that either. We just shouldn't. So I'm hoping today



1 is the last day that we ever go off on each other like that. Especially in front of the public. I'll say it 2 again. I've done something stupid, pull me aside. Even if 3 it's during the meeting, pull me aside. Let's go outside. 4 5 Let's talk about it. I'm a big guy. I can handle it. Let's not do it in front of the Board, in front of the 6 7 people we have been emboldened to trust. Let's stop giving the news headlines. Because every time I see them 8 9 on the audience, I'm like, oh boy. Who's going to go off today? Who's going to be the one? That's not fair. That's 10 not fair for everybody. 11

12 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Come into the meeting. We all 13 signed up for this career caucus. When we got to be here. Three. You're going to be late, let us know. Let the 14 Board know you're going to be late. I'll hold off a few 15 minutes. They're going to be late. I'll hold off. But the 16 17 public's expecting us to be here at three o'clock. In your packages today, you'll see your attendance report on 18 19 here.

20 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Mine is not in here. You have one? 21 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Okay. Well, it's on the email. 22 We sent it out. So if you don't have it, it's on the 23 email. That's okay. Yeah. it's just that simple. We have 24 a job to do. We do. We have a job to do. If it's getting 25 too tough for you, let me know. Maybe I can help you. I



1 don't know if I can or not, but we're here for the 2 people. That's what we were elected and that's what we were appointed to do. It took a lot to get appointed. 3 Took a lot to get elected. They put trust in you. The 4 5 mayor put trust in you. City council put the trust in the mayor that he picked the right person for his job. The 6 elected officials, your constituents put trust in you 7 when they sat there, cutting in that over for you or 8 wrote your name in correctly. Again, if anybody in this 9 audience or anybody in Zoom land think they can do a 10 better job, come on. Run. Don't sit on the sideline run. 11 12 I don't why you coming to the meeting and watch. But give 13 us some constructive criticism. Tell us what we're doing 14 wrong. We already know that. Help us. Help us. That's it. 15 That's all I have. Now we have a senior emergency 16 services deployment operator, Walda Mobley Retirement. Wow. We have that resolution. 17

18 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Alright.

19 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes.

20 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yeah. We have it.

21 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes, we have that resolution.22 Commissioner Moore.

COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. Whereas
 senior emergency services deployment operator Walda
 Mobley assigned to communication section began her career



1 with the Detroit Police Department. She was appointed to the Detroit Police Department on September 26th, 1977, as 2 a police officer where she was assigned to a training 3 unit. Whereas she dutifully served the 16th Precinct, 4 14th Precinct, Felony Prevention Division, Major Crimes 5 and Homicide. Officer Mobley displays tremendous 6 7 diligence and aptitude in her assignments. On March 21st, 1997, she was promoted to the rank of Sergeant. Sergeant 8 Mobley's assignments included Homicide section, 9 headquarters bureau, major crimes division, assistant 10 chief of police office, mobile support section, and chief 11 12 of police office, which she served until her retirement. 13 Whereas with a continued yearning for public service, 14 SESDO Mobley returned to the Detroit Police Department as 15 an emergency services appointment operator on May 11th, 16 2015. On October 17th, 2022, she was promoted to senior 17 emergency services deployment operator. COMMISSIONER MOORE: For her career, SESDO Mobley 18

19 received numerous letters of accommodation from citizens 20 and superiors. Whereas Senior Emergency Services 21 Deployment Operator Mobley has served the Detroit Police 22 Department with great dedication for a total of 34 years. 23 Her commitment and integrity have been assets to the 24 Detroit Police Department where she is highly respected 25 as a consummate professional. Now therefore be it



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resolved that the Detroit Board of Police Commissioners 1 speaking for the citizens of Detroit and the Detroit 2 Police Department award this resolution to Senior 3 Emergency Services Deployment Operator Mobley. For her 4 5 combined 34 years of dedicated and diligent public service, her professionalism, integrity, and standard of 6 commitment to the city of Detroit. The citizens mirrored 7 our highest regards and best wishes for continued 8 9 success. We salute on congratulations, senior Emergency Services Deployment Operator Walda Mobley. I move for 10 adoption, Mr. Chairman. 11 12 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Second. 13 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Any discussion? All in favor? 14 COMMISSIONERS: Aye. 15 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: All opposed? That motion, that 16 resolution has been granted. Congratulations on your retirement. 34 years. Wow. Enjoy. But don't just sit 17 down, do something else. Deputy Chief, did I get it right 18 this time? 19 20 DEPUTY CHIEF SIMS: Yes. 21 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: I demoted you. COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Point of order Chair. 22 23 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: I'm Sorry. 24 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: I believe there's something else from the agenda. B. 25



1 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: B. The CAST president, commissioner critical incident debriefing. That's right. 2 3 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: I may through the Chair. 4 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes, sir. COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: This past Monday on April the 5 24th, 2023, at 1:00 PM the Board of Police Commissioners 6 was invited by the Chief police to the Chief's conference 7 room relative to a critical incident debriefing for an 8 incident that occurred on San Juan and McNichols on March 9 31st, 2023, approximately from 7:41 PM to 8:05 PM. As we 10 are sharing this information for the benefit of the 11 12 public there were myself, Vice-Chair Holt and Secretary 13 Victoria Shaw who was present to receive this 14 presentation. I am reading for accuracy. But I was there. 15 These remarks reflect what was shared. We were provided 16 visual aids that included a power frame presentation and 17 still photos though no video that was offered to give us an explanation on what occurred in this officer involved 18 the shooting. 19 20 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: This is BOPC's understanding

20 COMMISSIONER PRESSERT: This is bore s'understanding 21 based off of what was verbally communicated by Detroit 22 Police Department of Leadership again, with support of 23 PowerPoint presentation and steel photos. Here is what we 24 know. There was a suspect that was seen on still photos 25 removing an alcoholic beverage, chips, and a monster



1 drink from a local store without paying for them. The store manager is seen on the still photos following the 2 suspect outside the store, approaching him about the 3 items. The suspect is seen on still photos, brandishing 4 5 what appears to be a handgun. The store manager calls 911 to report the incident and one DPD unit responds to the 6 area and sees the suspect walking on a nearby sidewalk 7 with the store items in question in hand. This is 8 captured on the unit dash cam and shown in still photos. 9 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Before the officers 10 approached the suspect the suspect begins to fire 11 12 multiple rounds at the unit with the rounds striking the 13 ground and the unit shield, windshield, excuse me, while 14 officers are still inside the vehicle. This is captured 15 on the unit's dash cam and again, shown in still photos. 16 The officers get out of the unit and return fire. They chase the suspect on foot behind a house continuing to 17 return fire. The suspect is struck one time in the lower 18 left leg but continues to flee. The Michigan State Police 19 20 canine unit located the suspect hiding in a shed in a 21 nearby area, and the suspect surrendered and is rendered medical aid. Mind this medical aid was rendered by the 22 officers who were shot at. An EMS transports the suspect 23 24 in custody to the local hospital in critical condition. 25 The suspect is expected to recover. The weapon was



1 recovered.

2 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: It was a handgun. The 3 officers also recovered a 50 round drum magazine, two additional loaded extended magazines and a box of 4 5 ammunition. The suspect is facing two counts of assault with the tent to commit murder and two counts of felony 6 firearm charges. As it relates to the officers, no 7 officers were injured in this incident, and the Wayne 8 County prosecutor declined to issue a warrant on the 9 officers involved. DPD is citing as a result of self-10 defense. DPD Preliminary administrative review 11 12 anticipates no violations by the officers, but for the 13 sake of the public BOPC commits to the following next 14 steps. A monitor for any citizen complaints filed in 15 relation to this incident to request an official report 16 from the Wayne County Prosecutor's Office regarding the warrant decision to share more information, including 17 visual aids to the public as BOPC receives them. We also 18 welcome any additional questions from the public that we 19 might be able to follow up on as we continue to follow 20 21 this incident. Again, we recognize that our 22 responsibility is to oversight, and we were there to represent the community and having witnessed what we were 23 24 shared and hearing what was offered to us by the DPD leadership. We wanted to include this in our community 25



1 report so that everyone was up to speed. Thank you,

2 Chair.

3 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Welcome.

4 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Mr. Chairman. I have a question.
5 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes.

6 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Maybe this is for you, Chief.

7 Still photos versus video. Why were still photos shown as

8 opposed to video?

9 CHIEF WHITE: For a couple reasons. One is the video 10 that's being reviewed by the prosecutor office is 11 evidentiary. We found it or find it necessary if we're 12 going to do these debriefs to provide you with some 13 visual illustration of what occurred. The best way to do 14 that is still photos.

15 COMMISSIONER MOORE: So what commissioner just said 16 was that the warrant was denied by the prosecutor's 17 office.

CHIEF WHITE: That's correct. Let me make sure to 18 19 give you some clarity. We are an agency from a 20 transparency standpoint and a policy standpoint that submits a warrant for the officers arrest who are 21 involved in officer involved shootings. We simply include 22 all the information in that warrant submission, and we 23 24 submit it for the review of the prosecutor. Thereby 25 turning over everything that we have, facts and



1 circumstances-wise to the prosecutor to review if there was misconduct or criminality on the part of the police. 2 Because shooting someone unjustifiably essentially is a 3 crime. In that review of that, and that's a policy 4 decision the prosecutor made the appropriate decision not 5 6 to officer. But it's done as a layer of transparency and 7 communication for our community as well as a policy of this department to do that. 8 9 COMMISSIONER MOORE: I quess I'll stand down, but I still would wonder if the warrant was denied by the 10 11 prosecutor's office, why the Board couldn't see the 12 video. That's all. COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Against the officers. 13 14 COMMISSIONER MOORE: That's right. 15 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: But the warrant was picked up 16 for the shooter. 17 COMMISSIONER MOORE: So that's the part. Okay. 18 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Right. Yeah. 19 CHIEF WHITE: The video is, well, you got that. COMMISSIONER MOORE: Got it. 20

- 21 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Right.
- 22 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thanks. Appreciate.
- 23 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Okay. Alright.
- 24 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Good question.
- 25 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes. Let the record show that



1 Chief White has entered the building. Welcome Chief.

2 CHIEF WHITE: Thank you.

3 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Chair, just the one 4 additional point, and I don't want to offer this without 5 clarity. So the Chief can provide that clarity. It was 6 the understanding that this individual who shot at the 7 police officers was arrested previously on having a legal 8 weapon.

9 CHIEF WHITE: That's correct. I don't have that 10 information with me, but my understanding is that we had 11 a previous encounter with him where he was arrested for a 12 weapon.

13 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Thank you. On this, are we 14 still on this topic, Mr. Chairman?

15 OFFICER: What?

16 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes. Let me grab-

17 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Do Reverend Holley first. Go18 ahead.

19 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Chairman. This is, I mean, I 20 really like this debriefing at this table by the 21 commissioner. This is new and I think this is a wonderful 22 transparency and I'm really happy about this. I really am 23 and I want to commend the Chief, as well as the Board in 24 terms of really be transparent and oversight for the 25 Board. I really appreciate that. I really, really do.



1	It's my first time experiencing this on this Board in
2	terms of debriefing in regard to an incident like this or
3	any other incident. I want to thank you for that. I
4	really feel this is something that we ought to do as much
5	as possible.
6	COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Through the Chair. That's a
7	result of, again, the transparency of our Chief of
8	Police, but also the proactiveness of our Board
9	secretary.
10	CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Correct.
11	COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: We really appreciate the
12	contribution she's making to our Board.
13	CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Absolutely.
14	CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Through the Chair. Go ahead.
15	CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Because we realize that all
16	the commissioners can't be there. Right. So we need at
17	least one representative there, and then they can bring
18	it back to the public. Right. Commissioner Pressley did
19	that. But that would've never happened if it wasn't for
20	the brainchild of our Board Secretary. So I want to say
21	thank you for that. We saw a problem. We fixed it. All
22	right. So that's our form of oversight. Correct. All
23	right.
24	MS. SHAW: Thank you, Mr. Chair.

25 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Bernard.



1 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Just quickly Mr. Chairman. 2 Thank you very much for your report. It was excellent. You always provide excellent commentary my colleague. But 3 4 Chief I have a concern. Number one, there are only, what, 16 elected people in the city of Detroit. Nine are city 5 6 council people, and seven are Board members. I'm one of those Board members. I came to the briefing. I was about 7 15 minutes late. I got delayed. I actually forgot my 8 9 cellphone, went back, and got it. I was denied entry into the briefing. I don't know how an elected official or 10 commissioner can be denied entry to a briefing on a 11 12 shooting. If my tardiness was the issue. You are always 13 tardy for these meetings, and we welcome you as we 14 should. I felt that I should have been welcomed. 15 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Not only that. You spoke about 16 transparency. It denies the transparency that you're 17 speaking of. I'm not going to sort of pick up wherever we are in the conversation. You don't have to repeat things 18 for me when I come into a room and I'm late. On top of 19 that, one of your staff people, I think it was Parish, 20 came out and told me, he would "debrief" me later. That 21 22 has never happened. But just in general I don't think it's appropriate that a Board member be denied entry into 23 a meeting that involves the department that the Board is 24 25 invited to. That's number one. Number two, on the subject



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1 of transparency, for the last several meetings, and I don't know what I'm going to do about this yet, but I'm 2 going to do something. I have repeatedly requested. You 3 talk about transparency Chief, but there is no 4 5 transparency on important things. When it's a black and 6 white issue. When you can see that the police are absolutely correct and are absolutely in danger, then you 7 have the video, you got the pictures, you got everything. 8 But when it's not a black and white issue, when it's not 9 as clear that the police were correct, irrespective of 10 what the prosecutor has said, then you hide the video. 11 12 CHIEF WHITE: I don't hide anything. First of all-13 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I'm talking about the video. CHIEF WHITE: Let me just-14 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Let me tell you since-15 16 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Hang on. 17 CHIEF WHITE: Let me jump in. Listen-CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Chief. Please. Hold on. One 18 19 second. CHIEF WHITE: No, one second is gone. 20 21 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Chief. 22 CHIEF WHITE: You are not going to disrespect me in this process. 23 24 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I'm not disrespecting you. 25 CHIEF WHITE: Okay.



COMMISSIONER BERNARD: [inauduble29:44] you. 1 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Hold on. Commissioner Bernard. 2 3 CHIEF WHITE: You asked a question, but you're not going to classify or characterize anything that I do as 4 5 improper. Now you are entitled to your professional opinion, and I would ask that you keep it at that level. 6 Professional opinion. I have not held back anything from 7 this Board. As we are delivering accolades about this 8 9 process, I built this process. This was not brought to me. This is a process that I built when I became Chief to 10 provide a debrief to this Board. This was not brought to 11 12 me by a Board Secretary. She was invited as you were. You 13 showed up 15 minutes late for the debrief. There is 14 confidential and classified information, and 15 approximately 15 people in that room that have high level 16 information about an officer-involved shooting. We are 17 attempting to provide information to you at a very high 18 level and transparent level so that you can report it 19 back.

20 CHIEF WHITE: When you showed up 15 minutes late, we 21 were into the second part of the presentation, which 22 involves question and answers and confidential 23 information. It was my direction to the Chief of staff to 24 not allow anyone else into this room. It was my 25 impression that those who found it important was already



present. So 15 minutes into the conversation, there's a 1 knock at the door and I later find out that it's you. So 2 what I directed-directed, not ask-directed the 3 investigator to do. That would be Chris Radlin, who's 4 5 over professional standards, was to give you your own independent and complete debriefing on the facts and 6 circumstances of the officer involved shooting. Period. 7 That's what occurred. 8 9 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Well, let me respond to that. First of all, as I said earlier, a city council member 10

who's also an elected official cannot be denied entry

12 into a debriefing for the council.

11

13 CHIEF WHITE: There was no council member there.

14 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I'm an elected official.

15 CHIEF WHITE: You were invited-

16 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I am a police commissioner, 17 and this is the police department. If the commissioners 18 are invited, whether they're early or late, they should 19 be able to come in. That's the point.

20 CHIEF WHITE: Totally disagree.

21 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Well, I'm sorry that you22 disagree.

23 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Let them talk, commissioner.24 Let's move on.

25 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: If I may.



1 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes, you have the floor.

2 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay. Clarification. BOPC has been 3 invited to other debriefing.

4 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Correct.

5 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay. Contrary to a statement that 6 was made earlier. Now, what has up the any, I'll suggest 7 is the decision by the Board of Police Secretary, Ms. Shaw to present to the public in this form. But Chief 8 9 White is correct. We've been invited to some debriefings in there. Okay. I'd like to also say that there were law 10 11 enforcement members who received a mild tongue lashing 12 because they too came in late.

13 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I understand.

14 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Okay. Nope. We're going to 15 move on.

16 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Wait a minute. I want to make 17 one point Mr. Chairman.

18 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: We're going to move on.

19 Commissioner Bernard, we're going to move on.

20 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: We talked about transparency-

21 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Chief, your report, please.

22 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I'll deal with it after that.

23 CHIEF WHITE: Good afternoon board.

24 COMMISSIONERS: Good afternoon.

25 CHIEF WHITE: I'm going to start with my report.



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There are currently 2 members of the department who are disabled and at home recovering from an on-duty injury.

That's 1 police officer from the 10th Precinct and 1 from 3 the Seventh Precinct. We also have 6 members who are 4 currently guarantined with Covid, and we have 2 that have 5 6 tested positive. That's up from 1 last week. So we 7 clearly see a downturn in those numbers. Our homicides 8 for the year are up 4%. That represents 3 additional 9 homicides at the same time last year. I'd like to state though, we are still seeing homicides at a number that 10 represent that is the lowest over the course of three 11 12 years. But last year we had some huge success numbers of 13 reducing homicide right out the gate. So we are certainly 14 competing against the success of last year.

15 CHIEF WHITE: But we look back for a three-year 16 trend, and we see that the numbers are significantly 17 lower than three years ago. Still way too many people that are victims of homicide in our communities. We are 18 19 with our plans to reduce as many as we can by police 20 interaction. But we also recognize that it's going to take more than just the police. It's going to take and 21 22 the police to help reduce homicides in our community. Non-Fatal shootings, we have a slight uptick of 6% 23 robberies, a slight uptick of 8% with robberies. We do 24 25 have a downturn by 22% in Carjackings. We also have a



1 downturn in robberies by 4.1%. We continue to see sexual 2 assault numbers be reduced by 9.8%. When asked what's 3 driving those reductions, we just have tremendous 4 investigators and police officers and supervision in 5 those units that are doing really good work.

6 CHIEF WHITE: Particularly in the areas of criminal 7 sexual conduct. Making sure that our victims are heard, tracking down these people who are habitual offenders and 8 9 continuing to deliver good work. Carjackings a lot of proactive measures are being taken in that unit. They're 10 11 really finding some people who, particularly some young 12 kids, are engaged in some gang activity with carjacking 13 they've been able to bring into custody. We see the results of getting those offended off the street. Moving 14 on to our mental health runs for the last seven days. 15 16 I'll just go to the service calls in interest of time. Mental non-violent for 2023, 974 service calls. Same time 17 last year, 947. Mental violent, 429. Last time last year, 18 308. Mental violent not armed 1726 this year, 1510 last 19 20 year.

21 CHIEF WHITE: Suicide in progress 429 this year. 22 Again, this is year to date. At the same time last year, 23 we were at 332. 887 suicide threats this year, year to 24 date and 869 last year at the same time. Grand total 25 4,445 mental runs. Same time last year, 3,966. So we see



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1 a significant increase in those numbers, and I think it cannot be stated enough the amazing work that the 2 officers are doing out there, seeing this level not only 3 of violence but mental illness in our community. I'm 4 5 going to move to some incidents that I want to talk about. First one is a carjacking. Saturday the 22nd, 6 officers were dispatched to the 10,000 block of Joy Road 7 to investigate a call officer service for a carjacking. 8 Officers arrived at the location and talked to the 9 victim. Turned out to be a Lyft driver who stated that he 10 picked up a customer and drove him to an area of Oakman 11 12 and Apalon or Appoline.

13 CHIEF WHITE: Upon reaching the destination, that 14 same subject produced a handgun and took the victim's 15 Mazda and cell phone and robbed him. He fled the scene. 16 They called 911 Detectives from Commercial Auto Theft. 17 That same group that was talking about earlier today in reducing our carjackings. Conducted investigation, 18 gathered evidence very quickly that eventually led them 19 to the area of Clinton Township where the victim's 20 vehicle was discovered. Detectives set up surveillance on 21 22 the vehicle and observed the suspect enter the vehicle and drive away. They conducted a traffic stop. There were 23 24 two suspects in the vehicle, and they were both taken 25 into custody. The detectives prepared it and submitted a



1 warrant to Wayne County Prosecutor's Office on the 24th 2 of April. The warrant was signed, and the suspect wore 3 arraign in 36 District Court. They were arraigned for 4 carjacking, arm robbery, receiving and concealing, 5 unlawful driveway of an automobile carrying a concealed 6 weapon and felony firearm.

7 CHIEF WHITE: Suspect one was held on a \$200,000 cash bond. The second suspect was charged with conspiracy, 8 9 receiving, and concealing stolen property and he was given a \$35,000 personal bond. So outstanding work. On 10 Sunday, April 23rd, officers were dispatched to the 11 12 hundred one-no almost gave the address away. They were 13 dispatched to the area of Boston Boulevard. I'm not going 14 to give you the address but it's out there in the 15 community, but it's not going to come from me. Upon 16 arrival at the location, the officers observed the evidence that caused concern for the occupant's 17 wellbeing. This is the call involving the doctor. His 18 name is public, so I will give it to you, Dr. Hoover. A 19 relative called 911 for a welfare check to make sure that 20 he was okay. When the officers arrived, they had reasons 21 22 to believe that there was a problem or potentially a 23 crime of foot.

24 CHIEF WHITE: Detective from Homicide Unit arrived on 25 the scene and conducted an investigation. Ultimately, he



was discovered deceased inside the home. I will leave the 1 rest of the details out as the investigation is wide 2 open. Anything that I say regarding how he was found, 3 where he was found, could ultimately impact the 4 5 investigation. But we are looking for anybody who has any information on this case. The detectives have worked 6 tirelessly. I am very confident in our detectives that 7 they will make an arrest or at least identify a suspect 8 9 soon. I do not have an update right now, but I know they are working tirelessly on this case. They are doing 10 11 everything they can to identify a suspect for this act. 12 So I will keep the Board posted on that and I'll have 13 something more to say on that as soon as I'm updated. 14 CHIEF WHITE: Moving on to one last incident, a fatal shooting. Tuesday, April 25th officers were dispatched 15 16 and investigative calls to service in a 14,000 block of 17 Hubbell for a person shot. Officers arrived at the scene and observed the male shot in the left temple, sitting in 18 the driver's seat of a U-Haul truck. A short time later 19 20 the wife of the deceased arrived on the scene and positively identified him to our detectives. Evidence 21 recovered from the scene, led detectives to a person of 22 interest in the case, and two individuals were arrested. 23 This, again, amazing work. They are continuously working 24 25 the case. They're still looking for any additional



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information, but we do believe that we have two people
 that are good for this senseless crime.

3 CHIEF WHITE: But more to come on that one as well. I 4 will be updating that case as well as the doctor's case 5 as soon as I'm updated. Also, you may have seen a Michigan State Police conduct an investigation of shots 6 7 fired on the freeway and successfully made an arrest of 5 suspects I believe it was yesterday. They continue, MSP 8 9 that is, to collaborate with this department and manage the violence on our freeways among other things assist us 10 with their air unit as well as their Canine Unit. So that 11 12 support, collaboration with our department cannot be 13 understated and needs to be acknowledged. So we're very 14 happy to see that they got those 5 off the street and 15 more to come with that investigation as well. But we 16 still have a number of freeway shootings in our 17 community. Thank you.

CHIEF WHITE: Two positive stories. I read to some 18 children at preschool. It was really nice to do. The 19 other day we had a Citizens Patrol story with the Detroit 20 21 News on May 20 or April 24th from George Hunter. Our citizens are just amazing and that Citizens Patrol, our 22 seniors are very passionate about that work. Don't you 23 dare tell them they can't do it because they're seniors. 24 25 They keep our Citizens Patrol going. So please if you get



a chance to pull that story, it's a good one. We had a
 domestic violence seminar on Tuesday, April 25th. Special
 Victims Unit hosted a domestic violence seminar. They
 continue to do amazing work in that unit. It is Child
 Abuse Prevention Month events concluding. This is Child
 Abuse Prevention Month, and we have events that are
 concluding.

CHIEF WHITE: This Saturday the 10th Precinct and the 8 Child Abuse Unit and the Victim's Assistant Unit will be 9 10 hosting a family friendly event at the 10th Precinct. Then on Saturday April 29th we will host a walk and fair 11 12 from 12 to four starting at Mike's Fresh Market, located 13 at 14383 Gratiot. It's National Crime Victims' Rights 14 week. The walk and fair will celebrate survivors, offer 15 them resources. There will be food and giveaways, and 16 we'll do a march. I will be there as well. With that, I will take any questions. Lastly, just to follow up to our 17 earlier discussion. We did reach out Commissioner 18 Bernard. A message was left to you by Chris Radlin and he 19 is awaiting your call for your formal independent 20 debriefing. But that I'll take any questions. 21 22 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Chief, do you have a

23 graduation tomorrow?

24 CHIEF WHITE: I do have a graduation tomorrow. Thank 25 you for mentioning that. It's at Greater Grace at 10:00



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1 AM and we are putting a new 28 officers on the street and 2 super excited. Anyone gets the opportunity to come to it. 3 I know you will be there. Yes, our Chairman. So we're 4 looking forward to seeing any Board members or audience 5 members who would like to attend.

6 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yeah. Awesome. Thanks, Chief. I know it's a lot of things you can't say, and Lieutenant 7 Shaw's back there too. But the way that they caught those 8 5 young men was just good police work along with 9 technology. They use technology and they used good police 10 11 work. So my public service announcement, once again, stop 12 doing what you're doing because they're going to catch 13 you. All right? They're going to catch you. They're going 14 to catch you. You will get caught. You don't get caught 15 by the police, the public is going to tell you. That no 16 snitch stuff is out of the window now. Hey, telling so 17 much now and getting money and taking trips. Wow. I mean, 18 so ladies and guys and young men and old men and old women. Some of them doing that too. Because I've seen 19 some of them going to the store just ripping stuff off 20 and I'm like, you're too old to be doing that. 21

22 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Stop doing it. Alright. Cars. 23 Quick, ladies, quit going to the gas station at night. 24 Stop. Stop doing it. Don't go. Do not go. I don't even 25 care if you got somebody else. Don't go. If you're going



1 at daytime, before you get to that last \$2 of gas, look 2 around. See if anything changed. Alright? People should be coming in, going out. If somebody's standing around, 3 hold that gas mouth. Right. They come over to the car 4 5 point it at them. If you squeeze that trigger, he's going 6 to get sprayed. Right? Nine times out of 10, he won't 7 pull that trigger. So if you do the backlash, he's going to set him on fire. Now, you may get hit, but he's going 8 9 to burn up. So be safe. Be safe and be smart. Right? 10 That's one good thing. You got a car, put it in the 11 driveway with without alarm. Go buy an alarm. Put it in 12 the garage. Clean your garage out. put it in the garage. 13 You have a dog and that dog barks, get up and go see what 14 the dog is barking about. Right. I don't care if somebody 15 walking down the street. Get that dog a treat because you 16 don't know who that person was. A dog is there for a 17 reason, not just for companionship, for protection, right? Whether it's a small dog or a big dog. 18

19 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Chief, your men and women in 20 blue, I must say they're doing an awesome job. I have to 21 say they're doing an awesome job. With respect of the 22 citizens. I've seen them in action. They didn't even know 23 who I was when I walked up and just watched the 24 interaction, how they treated the citizens at a traffic 25 stop. It was phenomenal. I mean, the abuse that they were



1 taken by the citizen was unheard of, but they stayed professional throughout the whole thing. He stayed 2 professional and I got to hand it to them. That was 3 something witness to see. So whatever your command staff 4 5 is doing in all those precincts and a couple I've been to 6 is working. So I want to say thank you for those commanders you promoted and we accrue they're doing a 7 fantastic job. That's all I have. Commissioner, for the 8 9 record, Commissioner Banks is in the house. Welcome, sir. I said on the record that I appreciate you emailing me 10 and giving me your plan on how you can get your committee 11 12 together. An awesome plan. I'm waiting for you to get 13 that. Anything else I can do to help you, don't hesitate 14 to let me know.

15 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Yes, sir.

16 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you, sir. Commissioner 17 Pressley.

COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Yes. I have three questions. 18 First one through the Chair has to do with the data on 19 the part 1 crimes the east side precincts versus the west 20 21 side precincts. I mean, this may be naive. I'm just wondering, is that distinction between the numbers as a 22 result of the population on the east side versus the west 23 24 side? Or would you point to something else fueling those numbers? 25



1 CHIEF WHITE: Yeah. Through the Chair, we look at that and analyze it every single day. It's not population 2 based. Sometimes it's driven by upticks with certain 3 gangs or groups. Sometimes we have certain groups that 4 5 are working a particular area and driving robberies and homicides and that type of thing. It really touches a lot 6 of different influencers to those numbers. But we are 7 acutely aware of the difference in the two sides. When 8 9 you look at, just by way of example I was looking at it 10 this morning. Quickly when you look at are you breaking down just a whole east side or are you looking at 11 12 individual precincts?

COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Well, no, just the whole east 13 14 side. I mean the whole east side, west side precincts. 15 CHIEF WHITE: So let me give you an example. So you 16 look at Number 9, which is historically the busiest most 17 densely populated and historically has been the most violent. 34% reduction in non-fatal shootings. If you 18 look at the robberies, they're up 4.2%. But then you look 19 at carjackings, they're down 14%. So you look at what's 20 21 working, what's working is their deployment, their 22 patrol. The things that they can impact, they're impacting. You look at how many officers they got 23 working, what exercises that you're using. But do you 24 25 know what the biggest thing is? They've got ShotSpotter



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1 in their whole precinct. So the whole precinct. So it's changing decision making. People aren't randomly 2 shooting. People know if they do shoot that gun it's 3 going to draw our attention to that area. Virtually you 4 5 look at a smaller footprint it's the Seventh Precinct. 6 CHIEF WHITE: So if we go population density smaller 7 footprint with ShotSpotter, they're new to ShotSpotter. ShotSpotter's not the only tool, but it's a powerful one. 8 They're 5.7% up in burglary, 2.9% up in larceny, 21.5% 9 and those are all property crimes. But let's look at 10 their violent crime. 19% uptick in robbery and they're 11 12 holding steady with carjacking. So the measurements are 13 off when you look at population density. What really is 14 working is the tools that we have in the field, the 15 individual command officers, deployment, and then driving 16 down those things that are impacting crime like gangs, 17 group activity. Those groups that come together to 18 victimize our community and then the part 1 offenders in their community. Looking for those people because believe 19 it or not, it's really a small group of people that are 20 driving a crime in our city. We're going to make sure 21 22 that they stay focused on that. But that's where you get to make the biggest bang for your buck, is looking at 23 24 those people who are driving crime in your community. 25 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Thank you for that. I asked a



question, and this might be irresponsible. But just to kind of dispute the notion that when I was growing up, they said that the east side was more dangerous than the west side. Seeing these metrics seems to suggest that we should just be cautious wherever we go.

CHIEF WHITE: Well, just certainly look at Number 9. 6 7 I mean, we all grew up when 489 or Number 9 was called 42 1-die, right? It was one of the most violent precincts, 8 9 not just in Detroit. It is one of the most violent areas in the country. You look at what those command officers 10 have done in nine, I mean, it is remarkable. It's not 11 12 just us. I mean, we've got the US attorneys and her 13 program, our Ceasefire Units, our Gang Intelligence 14 Units. They're just all working collaboratively to drive 15 time down there. You can do it there. You can do it 16 anywhere. So we're going to take lessons learned from 17 nine, take lessons learned from eight, seeing similar success and we're going to replicate that throughout the 18 19 city. I think we're going to see these numbers come into line over the course of time throughout our city. 20

21 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Great. Thank you, through the 22 Chair. For the matter of time, I'm going to ask one more 23 question. Wonderful segway you brought to the US 24 attorney. I missed last week's meeting. You may have 25 mentioned it. I saw on the news there's some



1 collaboration in the One Detroit initiative.

2 CHIEF WHITE: Yes.

3 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Just want to get a sense on 4 what you're hoping comes out of that.

5 CHIEF WHITE: I'm hoping that we have a safer 6 community. We have a great opportunity. Everybody's at the table and no one cares who gets the credit and which 7 is fantastic. When you can leave Eagles at the door and 8 9 rank at the door and just sit down and start talking 10 about solving problems for our community. We've got a 11 fantastic US attorney. Not taking anything away from the 12 previous ones. But she's uniquely aware of our problems. 13 She's a Detroiter, Cass Tech Graduate that she reminds me 14 daily and very passionate about bringing crime down in 15 our city. She understands she can't arrest your way out 16 of crime. It's never worked. It never worked. Right? You can call her whatever you want, you can't arrest the last 17 18 criminal. So she understands seating, she understands all 19 of those things, but most importantly, she's committed to those people who are committing violence in our community 20 21 to arrest them.

22 CHIEF WHITE: We are too. We're not going to 23 apologize for you. You pull a gun on somebody, you shoot 24 somebody, you get to go to jail, period. We spend too 25 much time not talking about the victims and dancing



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with it. No, not happening. That's not what we're about. 2 That's not what this police department is going to be 3 about. If you engage this police department, you're going 4 5 to jail, and you engage us by committing crime. Don't 6 commit crime, you don't have to engage. You don't have to deal with us. You don't like the police, don't commit 7 crime. 8 9 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Thank you, Chief. Thank you, 10 Chair. CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Burton. 11 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Mr. Chairman at this time I 12 13 have no questions, but maybe later. Thank you. 14 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Bell. 15 COMMISSIONER BELL: I pass. 16 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Holley. 17 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. Just 18 one concern, Chief. I watch the news, the weather, and 19 the weather that we get in Detroit comes out of the West coast working the way through Chicago to Detroit. You are 20 21 basically my weatherman for the crime. What's going on in 22 Chicago with young people downtown, so forth from LA, is 23 there indication or anything that you can say to the 24 community in regard to the kind of things that have been 25 taking place in Chicago and with the young people in



1 particular? It gives me always guilty concern. But can you just respond to if I'm make any sense to you at all? 2 CHIEF WHITE: You are sir. Through the Chair. Thanks 3 4 for bringing that up. Yes. We are monitoring, we continue 5 to monitor proactively what happens around the country. I have colleagues in Chicago that I have talked to about 6 what they're seeing. They talked to me about what we saw 7 in Greektown. There is a lot going on with our young 8 9 people. We can't keep pointing to Covid and saying Covid is responsible for everything. I think it's Covid and 10 some other stuff. So we all have to roll up our sleeves. 11 12 Our community has to get more engaged. Our clergy has to 13 come to the table with us and they are. I mean, I'm not 14 suggesting that they're not, but we have to do more. The 15 police have to do more to try to solve this. But we will 16 not tolerate it.

CHIEF WHITE: There is no room for us to allow it to 17 happen while fixing it. We're going to police it and work 18 towards solutions to stop it in that order. Our lane is 19 policing and we will collaborate with the community and 20 21 our clergy and everyone else who wants to bring those 22 solutions from mentoring and everything else. But what we saw in Chicago and truly what we saw in Detroit that's 23 24 just no way to live. Our community deserves better. That 25 is not representative of our residence. That violence. We



had officers on every block. We had every shooting that happened downtown was an immediate arrest. Every single one. Do you know why? Because officers were right there and there was a complete disregard of the officer's presence.

6 CHIEF WHITE: The defenseless murder of the security officer who was well known to this department and a 7 friend of this department and a friend of our community 8 9 was lost by a person who chose to shoot him for no reason. The conflict was completely over and when there 10 11 was conflict, it wasn't even a serious conflict. He 12 cowardly turned and shot the guy when he looked away from 13 him and was talking to another citizen that was standing 14 there over a cutting line. Officers mad the arrest, chase him down, made the arrest took him and his accomplice in 15 16 the custody who had the weapon on her person. The 17 officers are there. He had a Detroit police literally in the frame of the video out front. It was a complete 18 disregard for life and his own life for that matter 19 because he's going to spend the rest of his life in 20 prison, hopefully. 21

22 CHIEF WHITE: So we have to work together and do a 23 lot more and come up with better solutions. But I think 24 the simple answer to your question is we're proactively 25 looking at it. We're going to be strategically out and



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1 continue to be strategically out, not just downtown, but in our communities. We're using undercover officers, 2 we're using technology. We're using our eagle eye. If 3 anybody's down there to do anything nefarious, they're 4 5 going to be taken away. Period. People deserve to be able to walk on our streets, enjoy our communities, 6 7 congregate, have fun. That's what we want to happen. It's summer in Detroit. Detroit has some of the best summers 8 9 and we all remember them. There's no reason that we can't because of some kids or some people who are bad actors. 10 So we're going to do our part. We just want the community 11 12 to do their part. Again, if we leave the guns at home and 13 somebody has a fist fight, that's no big deal. It's when 14 the guns come out. We're not suggesting that everybody's 15 going to get along. But now everybody's solution to 16 simple problems is to shoot each other and we just can't have that. 17

18 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Thank you.

19 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Let the record show that 20 Commissioner Carter has entered the building. Welcome 21 Commissioner Carter. Commissioner Moore. No question. 22 Commissioner Bernard.

23 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Just quickly, Mr. Chairman. I 24 noticed that the license plate reader material was in our 25 packet. If that's something we can discuss that you want



1 to discuss with the Chief today, or is it just here for 2 informational purposes?

CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: You can bring up any time. 3 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Okay. Chief, I noted that the 4 license plate reader contract is 5 million. I did not 5 know that the license plate reader technology not only 6 captures the license plate, but the people who are in the 7 car. Everybody's image is on the license plate reader. Is 8 that stand what are we doing with that information? I see 9 what's proposed, but I'd like to know what we're actually 10 doing with that information. I mean, I can tell when 11 12 people are reading my license plate when I'm in my car 13 because they just hang there. I know they're reading it. 14 But I did not know it also took pictures of the 15 occupants. 16 CHIEF WHITE: Where are you getting that? Through the Chair. Where are you getting at here? 17 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Right here. It's behind tab 18 five in my package. 19

20 CHIEF WHITE: Let me review the report that you were 21 looking at.

22 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Okay.

23 CHIEF WHITE: If I have it in my packet.

24 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Alright. The specification25 report, LPR, license plate reader technology section. The



1 part that talks about, you can see who's in the car, the vehicle's driver, even on the first page. The digital 2 image can include additional information such as the 3 vehicle's make and model. Okay? The vehicle's driver and 4 5 passengers, distinguishing features, that is, bumper stickers, damage, etcetera. and the state of 6 registration. On that point as I told you, I think I 7 8 mentioned it to you privately, that I had a case where a 9 man was given a ticket for no insurance, no registration. The officer, because of the license plate reader had 10 11 already pulled it up before you ever even talked to the 12 guy. So, because the guy was fumbling and probably just 13 couldn't find it, he got tickets for that. That's the 14 second question. Why are people getting tickets for no 15 registration, no insurance, when you already know what 16 they have when you come up to the side window? 17 CHIEF WHITE: Okay, so again, because we are

18 communicating with the public, it's important that we 19 provide accurate information.

20 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Okay.

21 CHIEF WHITE: So I think you're conflating issues. So 22 we have a policy that speaks to how we will engage a 23 license plate reader and our policy, thank you.

24 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I'm looking at it.

25 CHIEF WHITE: Our policy speaks to that engagement.



We don't send tickets. We don't mail you tickets. It's illegal in Michigan. We don't mail tickets to your home. As an attorney, you are well aware that there is no expectation of privacy on a plate, which is why they're forward facing. To take that to another level. Years ago when we were children, they were on the front of the car and the back of the car.

8 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: That's correct.

CHIEF WHITE: Part of the reason for that is so a 9 person in front of you could use their rear-view mirror 10 and identify your plate if something were to happen, if 11 12 you were to bump them, including the police. So there is 13 no expectation of privacy. If you ever watch reality TV, 14 you see cars, you ever notice the plates are blocked 15 because you could literally pick the plate and find out 16 where the person, your favorite reality TV star lived, 17 because their plate's structured generally through their home. The way that we will use the license plate readers 18 are, we have a huge, huge problem with auto fact. I would 19 like to share this with you. 20

21 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Chief, before you go into that, let me clear this up really quick. For the public for the record. Under number six, in its use of technology, it says the following uses of technology are



expressively prohibited to take still photos of individuals, traffic enforcement or tracking individual's movements outside of a vehicle. It states that right in there. That's what they're not going to use this technology for. It's right in here, black, and white. Not going to do it. Go right ahead, Chief.

CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: I will be brief because I know 7 there's more meetings to come. Motor vehicle theft right 8 9 now there's a 35% increase to motor vehicle theft. Motor 10 vehicle theft right now we are sitting at 1,300. I'm 11 sorry. Standby. The wrong number. I knew that number was 12 off. Hold on. Here we are. 2,929 motor vehicle thefts. So 13 what I want to do is, because I hear from people who 14 can't get to work, who can't pick up their prescription, 15 who can't, who already pay a whole lot of money for 16 insurance. Their vehicles get stolen. They get stripped. 17 So what we came up with is we already have license plate technology. What if the old hot sheet that we all know 18 about where police officers used to drive around with a 19 piece of paper with the plate numbers on it. 20

21 CHIEF WHITE: They look out and look for that plate. 22 What if we knew ahead of time that this plate is stolen, 23 and we were able to use license plate readers when that 24 stolen vehicle hits that LPR to tell us that the stolen 25 car is at Seven Mile Evergreen. Send an officer over



1 there and get the car back A, return it to the citizen B, before it's stripped and C, not make auto theft so 2 profitable in the city of Detroit for a community that's 3 already paying more auto insurance than anyone in the 4 5 United States. That is not an overstatement. I got that 6 from an insurance owner that they did the data and said, 7 we pay more than anyone else in the United States for auto insurance. So that's how we're going to use it. 8 9 Here's how we won't use it and this is right in our

10 policy.

CHIEF WHITE: It will be for auto theft, prevention, 11 12 and deterrence. It will be for locating. This is how we 13 will use it. Amber alerts, missing people. We have a lot 14 of seniors who drive off in their vehicles and they lose 15 their way. Some of them are suffering from dementia, but 16 they still have their driver's license. Some of them just get disoriented. We'll be able to identify them with the 17 LPR. Apprehension of suspects and punitive. But we will 18 not take still photos. We will not do traffic enforcement 19 20 and we will not track individual's movement outside of the vehicle. There's no reason for us to do that. So 21 22 that's the purpose of the LPRs.

23 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Yes. Just one final real quick 24 question. Are the license plate readers external to the 25 police car around town?



CHIEF WHITE: Some. We have some on scout cars right
 now.
 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Sorry. I didn't hear you.
 CHIEF WHITE: We do have some on scout cars right
 now.
 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Oh, I know on Scout cars, but

7 I'm talking about just placed, like at an intersection.

8 CHIEF WHITE: Yes.

9 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Oh, I didn't know that. I

10 didn't know.

CHIEF WHITE: We had them since 2016 and we went to COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Stationary ones.

13 CHIEF WHITE: We've had on vehicles and stationary 14 ones. When you look at the vehicle and you see all the 15 stuff on it. One of those stuffs is a license plate 16 reader.

17 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I knew about the cars, but I 18 didn't know about the stationary ones. I don't know the 19 community either.

20 CHIEF WHITE: Yeah. Then they're also in private 21 entities too.

22 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I'm sorry.

23 CHIEF WHITE: They're also in private entities too.24 You'd be surprised.

25 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner VC.



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1 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you, Chair. Crisis Intervention Training, Chief White. Ms. Shaw and I are 2 looking forward to attending the academy when those young 3 folks have their training. I'm going to share a phone 4 5 number with Ms. Shaw whereby she can contact Captain 6 Shell to put our visit on radar. Because in my example, 7 when I attended the training before, it was a two-day session and very, very engaging for the cadets to have 8 9 some notion as to what the CIT training involves. Number one. Number two, Commander Gardner had a girls' out that 10 was awesome. She had pink and green, which was okay. It 11 12 was absolutely beautiful. The environment was so girly-13 like to manage some very, very controversial discussion. 14 One of our members attended the event. So we're looking 15 forward to Perry to write an article to share her 16 impression of the event.

CHAIRPERSON HOLT: This past Saturday, I had lunch 17 with some on top of it young people. Obviously, the 18 activities that have gone on here in the city involving 19 these teenagers was a part of the discussion. One of the 20 members of the youth advisory panel feels that all young 21 22 people should not be subjected to the curfew. Whereas another member of youth advisory panel insisted on the 23 24 curfew and was even able to explain why. We need to 25 engage in a curfew until things get to normal. So



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1 obviously, and when you look on the website of the City 2 of Detroit, it is packed full of activities downtown. So 3 what can we look forward to especially as it relates to 4 our young people being able to perhaps go downtown and be 5 okay with being downtown? I mean it's all of the elements 6 here.

CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Oh, these young people say it's 7 constant on their minds that they have to be cognizant of 8 9 their environment. I'm from the South during the sixties, and I just cannot imagine always feeling as if I have to 10 watch my back when I was a teenager in Birmingham, 11 12 Alabama during the Civil Rights Movement. I mean, it 13 might not be a fair question right now, but I think our 14 young people are really wanting to become excited about all of these activities that the city of Detroit has 15 16 already posted on this website.

17 CHIEF WHITE: Well, thank you for that question. I 18 think we need to help get them excited and guide them to 19 those opportunities. It's not just walking around 20 downtown. It's other things to do as well. If they come 21 downtown, I didn't impose a new curfew. This is the 22 city's historic curfew.

23 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Correct.

24 CHIEF WHITE: We're just enforcing it.

25 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Correct.



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1 CHIEF WHITE: Part of that enforcement is to help keep them safe. Because you had a lot of kids, this isn't 2 about their clearing war on our kids. We had 95% of them 3 or more. I don't have the real data in front of me, but I 4 5 know over 90% had no incidents. They had a great time, but we're not talking about them. We're talking about the 6 7 handful that were disruptive and it wasn't kids, they're the shooters. Every shooter arrested was an adult. So I 8 9 think we had a few kids with guns, but the ones that fired them were all adults. So we want to keep our kids 10 safe too. But I think the parents have to help us. They 11 12 have to have some responsibility with us. We had kids 13 being dropped off by the Carlos at 10 o'clock at night 14 and they're just walking around in circles. Even if 15 they're not there to cause any problems, you're going to 16 have some other group that may be and that may engage 17 them. So we're not telling kids to stay way. We're just 18 saying that if you're 16 and over or 16 and 17, 11 o'clock, you either have to have a responsible adult with 19 you or you can't be in that footprint. But you can stay, 20 just bring mom and dad with you or an older brother who's 21 22 a responsible caregiver.

CHIEF WHITE: If you're 15 and under 10 o'clock.
That's it. You're 15, it's 10 o'clock, you're downtown.
If you want to stay, bring an adult. Bring someone of age



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1 who can be responsible, and you can stay. That's really it. There's no heavy-handed issue with the curfew. It's 2 the same curfew. But we want to make sure that we don't 3 have kids that are engaging other kids and having 4 5 problems. We've already talked about what happened to some other communities, and we don't want to see that 6 here because our citizens don't want it. They are calling 7 me and asking me, hey, Chief, please enforce a curfew and 8 9 that's what we're going to do. But it's not all the kids. It's just some. The officers understand if you're going 10 to dinner, you're meeting friends, they've been really 11 12 flexible with it.

13 CHIEF WHITE: But when we've got groups of kids that 14 are beyond curfew, we're going to move them along. I've 15 also directed the officers to write the parental 16 responsibility ticket. Because what good does it do to 17 give a kid a ticket, a 15-year-old? What does that do? Then what it does is it creates a situation that when 18 they're 20 and they want to get a job, they got to talk 19 about something they did at 15. Or they want to become a 20 police officer or a commissioner. I mean, there's all 21 22 these things are coming up that they've got to explain 23 from 15. They'll make mistakes at 15, 16 years old. But 24 the adults, it's their responsibility. So when the 25 parents come, if you weren't at work or there was no



other reason that you should know where your kids were, you get the parental responsibility ticket and you get to explain to a judge why it wasn't important enough to make sure that your kids were home when they were supposed to be, or at least with parental guidance.

6 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you. Through the Chair. 7 Council member At-Large, Mary Waters has put it out a record that the city of Detroit is just not going to 8 9 tolerate inappropriate behavior downtown. Especially in that it's becoming, like someone said, downtown Detroit 10 is becoming like a place similar to Manhattan. Therefore, 11 12 you're going to get some positive attention as it relates 13 to tourism and we cannot afford to go back to some of the 14 darker days when downtown Detroit was not a very popular 15 place to find entertainment. So thank you again for your 16 leadership and your ability to highlight where we might 17 look as it relates to young folks in downtown and not

18 being chaperoned.

19 CHIEF WHITE: Thank you, ma'am. Chairman, if I could 20 just say one last thing.

21 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: That's alright.

22 CHIEF WHITE: I apologize if I'm not monopolizing the 23 time, but I think it's important. It's not just downtown. 24 I mean, downtown got a lot of attention and yes, it was a 25 bad weekend. We're going to manage that. We're going to



1 make sure that we've got our deployment numbers up. Yes. But we're not taking away from the neighborhoods. We 2 still got parks of police in the neighborhoods. We still 3 got hundreds and hundreds of people that need those 4 5 services in our communities. They're going to get them. We have met every minimum deployment number that we have 6 and we're going to continue to do that. Yes, it's on 7 overtime and the officers, some of them want it, some of 8 them don't. 9

10 CHIEF WHITE: We're hiring. That's why we're 11 graduating some tomorrow. We got another class starting 12 tomorrow. We're losing less officers. So the officers, 13 unfortunately, they're not going to see the relief they 14 deserve this summer, but they're going to see it course 15 the fall because we're losing. Now our attrition rate has 16 been cut in half. So we're not hiring 30 and losing 30. We're hiring 30 and we got 10 to 15 that are retiring. So 17 18 we're plusing up at least 15 per month. But I just want you to know as the commission, that the calls for service 19 are being handled at the precinct level. That report is 20 in your file. We're not losing policing services in our 21 22 neighborhoods. That's not an option. So thank you.

23 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Plus, you have some officers24 coming back.

25 CHIEF WHITE: We do have 60 officers who have come



back from suburban agencies. I just hired 2 from Livonia
 today.

3 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: I saw that. Commissioner4 Banks.

5 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Yes. Chief White you mentioned, 6 I'm sorry. Through the Chair. Through the Chair to the 7 Chief. Through the Chair. Chief White you mentioned about 8 the incident that happened in Southwest Detroit. The 9 individual was shot. You didn't mention what he was shot 10 over. What was that individual shot over in southwest 11 Detroit?

12 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: It was not Southwest Detroit.

13 CHIEF WHITE: What did you say? I'm sorry.

14 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Go ahead.

15 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Did you mention individual?

16 CHIEF WHITE: I mentioned a few that were shot-

17 COMMISSIONER BANKS: In southwest Detroit. Right.

18 Individual shot in southwest Detroit was-

19 CHIEF WHITE: We can deal with that offline. I'll 20 give you more—

21 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Yeah, we will. We will. No22 problem. I'm all set, Mr. Chair.

23 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commission Carter.

24 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you, Mr. Chair. I just 25 have a request for an updated list of command officers.



1 CHIEF WHITE: Yes, ma'am.

2 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you.

3 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: All right. Thank you, Chief.

4 Thank you as always. All right.

5 CHIEF WHITE: Thank you all.

6 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you.

7 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Mr. Brown, oral

8 communications.

9 MR. BROWN: Yeah. Good afternoon, Mr. Chair. There 10 are currently eight speakers for public comments, and 11 I'll call those in attendance. Ms. Fredia Butler,

12 followed by Ms. Bernice followed by Minister. Eric

13 Blount.

14 MS. BUTLER: Good afternoon.

15 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Good afternoon.

MS. BUTLER: Through the Chair. Commissioners. Why did you run for this office or accepted the appointment of a commissioner? Are you serving your constituents? CHAIRPERSON HOLT: I'm sorry. We can't hear you. We

20 want to hear you.

21 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Turn to the mic.

MS. BUTLER: I said, why did you run for this office or accepted the appointment of commissioner? Are you serving your constituents? I heard a commissioner infer that this is the part-time position. Since coming to



these meetings, I have heard only one commissioner, Ms. 1 2 Shirley Burch, say what she was doing in her community to uplift people. I know you are supposed to be an oversight 3 Board, but maybe if you were doing or saying something to 4 5 benefit the communities, it would encourage all of us who think of ways we can make a difference in our city. When 6 you are serving at these meetings, your position is a 7 commissioner and not a reverend or an attorney doing your 8 job. Chief White is the only one who is reporting what 9 has happened in the city and what they are doing to 10 address the many concerns. Instead, I hear a commissioner 11 12 asking questions that are not relevant or just trying to 13 challenge the Chief and his officers.

14 MS. BUTLER: It is embarrassing to hear you say that 15 you are representing so many people. What are you doing? 16 I called out an every robocall I make, "Wake up sleeping 17 giants." We should be responsible citizens. We need to wake up and make good decisions asleep. I'm sorry. Wake 18 up and stop complaining and make good wise decisions 19 about who we select to represent us. We cannot make good 20 decisions asleep and not be educated on issues. Wake up, 21 be informed, and vote wisely. Thank you. 22

23 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you.

24 MR. BROWN: Ms. Smith.

25 MS. SMITH: Good afternoon to my commissioners.



1 COMMISSIONERS: Good afternoon.

MS. SMITH: What a day. What a day. An interesting 2 meeting. I haven't been here quite some time, but believe 3 me, I'm glad I came today. Chairman, you said everything 4 5 that I wanted to say, so I don't have to say anything 6 else. You raised hell today and I'm so glad because you 7 know what? It's important that you sit there and protect the city of Detroit. If you're not going to do the job, 8 9 you're not going to come to the meetings, you're going to be late, then why come? Why waste your time? Why waste 10 11 your gas? All right? We want you to be here and do the 12 job that you're assigned to do. Now, as far as what 13 happened down. I hate to look at my news at 12 o'clock on 14 channel two. What I saw this past weekend it was 15 outrageous. Normally, I'm there on the weekends and most 16 of you know sitting there watching everything, what's 17 going on. But I was glad I wasn't there this past weekend. But the fact is, we do need help. That help 18 needs to come not only from the police department, 19 parents, we're in the H are you with your children? 14 20 21 years old carrying guns. Outrageous. I am really upset 22 today, and I'm mad because parents are not taking care of their children. They're not paying attention. No way in 23 24 the world with my children. I raised five. I got five 25 children, I got five grandchildren, five great grand.



1	MS. SMITH: I raised hell with them all the time,
2	anytime they get wrong. But the fact is, parents, you are
3	not doing your job. I insist that you take attention to
4	your children and see what they're doing. 14 years old,
5	you're carrying guns. That's ridiculous. You should have
6	your behind in school. If you don't take care of your
7	children, what do you expect them to be? I came from
8	Chicago. I know what they're doing over there in Chicago.
9	I keep up with them all the time. I called the other day
10	and told them we're catching up with you guys over there.
11	But the fact is, we're not going to do that. We want
12	these parents to pay attention to their children. I don't
13	have my teeth in here, so I can talk to.
14	CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: It's alright. Your time is up.
15	MS. SMITH: I should have known. I'm hurt.
16	CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you.
17	MS. SMITH: Keep hurt. Is my time up?
18	CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yep. Your time is up.
19	MS. SMITH: All right. Take care of your children.
20	That's all I got to say.
21	CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you.
22	CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you so much.
23	MR. BROWN: Minister. Blount.
24	COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I'd just like to see a special
25	welcome to Mother Bernice. She's been with this board for



1 at least 20, 30 years.

2 MS. SMITH: I was the first police commissioner to 3 come along-

4 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: She's well again enough to 5 come back. Next month.

6 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Alright.

7 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: She's well enough to join us.8 Thank you.

9 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Through the Chair. She was also 10 part of a screening committee in 2013 and screen two of 11 our seating commissioners today.

12 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Okay. Go ahead, sir.

MINISTER BLOUNT: Yes. I'm Minister. Eric Blount fromSacred Heart Catholic Church here in Detroit.

15 Chairperson, you mentioned what you feel is a

16 dishonorable label of dysfunction of this Board. A better 17 description is corrupt. Just look at the agenda. The 18 awards for non BOPC employees. That's the job of the Chief. That's the job of city council. Or that's the job 19 of the mayor, not here. Then the lengthy discussions on 20 crime. What level of crime is police misconduct 21 22 acceptable? There must be some relationship to it for you 23 to spend so much time on crime. Commissioner Pressley, you started out great. This new debriefing on a police 24 25 officer shooting, but then like so many other police



1 commissioners, the conversation degraded into crime and 2 more crime and details on crime and crime and crime and 3 crime and all of you commissioners are in on it. Just 4 because you don't say anything about what's going on 5 that's wrong on this Board, doesn't give you a pass. This 6 will be on your legacy.

7 MINISTER BLOUNT: If you want some creative ideas, the police department has a risk management system that 8 9 has currently, as I know it, 127 officers that are listed as high risk of misconduct. Why isn't that discussed each 10 and every meeting? Where is OCI and their report out on 11 12 the complaints from the citizen? This new debriefing, it 13 happened two years ago. No, it happened with Hakim 14 Littleton. They released the video in completion within 15 four hours. With Porter Burks still haven't got it and 16 all we have is a-

17 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you, sir-

18 MINISTER BLOUNT: An explanation from the police19 department that not everyone buys.

20 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you.

21 MR. BROWN: Mr. Chair, your next two speakers would 22 be Ms. Lynette Louis, followed by Ms. Brenda Hill.

23 MS. LOUIS: Yes, this is Lynette Louis calling. I 24 don't know what to say. It was a lot going on at this 25 meeting today. Chairperson Ferguson, I really appreciate



1 the fact that you have acknowledged the Board's behavior. That was commendable on your part. I would like to 2 commend Chief White and the entire Detroit Police 3 Department for doing such an outstanding job in 4 5 maintaining and trying to ensure the safety of every 6 citizen in Detroit. As you said Commissioner Ferguson, what can we do? Well, I think each one of you guys in 7 your district should be trying to have public forums with 8 9 your constituents who voted you in to see what they need or how they can help. You come to these meetings every 10 11 Thursday and it's the same thing over and over again. 12 While I can appreciate Chief White being there and giving 13 you reports, what reports are you giving to the community 14 on what you are doing and to make a difference? 15 MS. LOUIS: I think personally, sometimes his time is 16 being wasted to come to these meetings when he can 17 electronically send you these reports. He has a bigger 18 job to do maintaining the safety of the city, than 19 setting up almost two hours to give a report that he could send to you guys, and you could read it. But then 20 21 again, I did see you all don't have a history of reading anything. So basically, that's probably why he's coming 22 23 to these meetings. But I would like to see the 24 commissioners being more proactive in the communities. I 25 have nothing more to say.



1 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you. Thank you.

2 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Through the Chair.

3 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes.

4 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: You know that's in our budget. 5 That was created by Secretary to the board Ms. Shaw. So 6 we all look forward to having more presence in the 7 community. If we are responsible for, say, two community 8 relations meetings at the same time, then we'll have some 9 assistance of staff persons to go to one meeting, whereas 10 we can attend another. So thank you for that comment.

CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes. Again, I've been reading 11 12 this for the past three weeks now. I'm going to read it 13 again. As a reminder, the administrative team is 14 continuing the community contact collection campaign. The 15 BOPC is collecting this information in preparing this 16 preparation to increase our community engagement. That's 17 why we're getting it. It will increase our community 18 engagement. If you have the contact information for any 19 community group, please provide the contact information so we can be in touch. You can do this three different 20 21 ways. You can fill out a paper form at the welcome table if you're here in person, and hand it to Mr. Brown. 22 You're on Zoom, attendees can send a contact information 23 directly to the host in the chat or follow the Google 24 25 link in the chat. Or you can also email the information



1 to us at bopc@detroitmi.gov. That's bopc@detroitmi.gov. CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Through the Chair. I'm sorry. You 2 mentioned the form that in fact, they're on the welcome 3 table. Now, my question, are those forms online? 4 5 MS. SHAW: The paper forms, I'm sorry, through the 6 Chair. Those paper forms are not online, but we can accept the information by email. 7 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: All right. Mr. Brown, who do 8 we have next? 9 MR. BROWN: Ms. Hill. 10 MS. HILL: Thank you and thank you for the Chief and 11 12 all you all for the job you do. Even though this may be 13 the worst Board out of all Boards police commissioners, 14 and you all have such an important position. I don't mind 15 you all fighting if it's going to come to some 16 progressive, productive end. But you're not. We're just 17 fighting about whether you are At-Large. We did that for two years, right? I mean, it's just crazy. Then if 18 anybody sits there and believes that you all are 19 productive, then you are the first that needs to go. Mr. 20 21 Ferguson, for you to turn around and say, we should tell you what you should be doing. We do. You don't listen. 22 What I've seen has been accomplished in the last couple 23 years. We've got facial recognition, a violation of our 24 civil liberties. 25



1 MS. HILL: We've got ShotSpotter, another violation. We've got Green Light, another violation that has made 2 such little measurable difference and look how much money 3 we're spending almost a half a billion dollars. We're not 4 5 getting a return on our investment. Almost \$4 million on 6 this Board. We are not getting a return on our 7 investment. I want what I hope you want. The best police 8 department possible. Now we get there. If we got to fight 9 to get there, I'm willing to fight to get there, right? I 10 want you to fight to get there. But I mean, what we have 11 right now is not accomplishing it. I want to thank 12 Minister. Blount for putting himself out there and saying 13 the bottom line. Young Black men have a target on their 14 backs and we're losing their lives. You all are on the 15 board of lives. You all need to act like it. I thank you

16 very much.

MR. BROWN: Mr. Chair, your next two speakers would
be Mr. Ruben Crowley, followed by Former Commissioner
William Davis.

20 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Mr. Crowley.

21 MR. CROWLEY: To the residence, the citizens of 22 Detroit, Michigan. What we have is a very strange dynamic 23 going on in Detroit City. Now, I only have one mic and 24 I'm only one voice. It's going to take approximately 25 55,000 mics to correct this problem. That's for the



removal recall of one mic. If we recall of one mic, we 1 can get rid of this Chief of Police, James E. White. We 2 can also recall this Board of Police Commissioners. It 3 would take about 10,000 votes to force a recall on any 4 5 one of them and get rid of all of them and get new ones 6 in. With a new mayor, we can have different. The four 7 appointees can be different appointees and we won't have the Chief of Police, James E. White. Now to James E. 8 9 White, if you're still in the room. If you're still in 10 the room and you can hear me.

MR. CROWLEY: I just left the 11 Precinct where your 11 12 sergeant over there, McClain told me that in order to get 13 a ring video, he needed to place my communication device, 14 my telephone, my main line into evidence. So I got up and 15 walked out the room. Now to get straight to it, Kaniesha 16 Coleman did not shoot herself. James E. White, you have never mentioned her name. You have never done a press 17 conference on Kaniesha Coleman because you know, it is 18 physically impossible. The laws of physics says that she 19 could have not shot herself. So instead of you dealing 20 21 with the problem, you want to sugarcoat everything and 22 sweep it under the rug with the Homicide Unit who produced the information to the Wayne County Medical 23 Examiner. We also need to get rid of Jeffrey Hudson over 24 25 in the county. Wayne County Medical Examiner, along with



Chief White, his Homicide Division, and everybody that
 participated in the coverup of the coverup of Kaniesha
 Coleman.

4 MR. BROWN: Mr. Chair, your last speaker will be 5 Former Commissioner Davis.

MR. DAVIS: Good evening. I'd like to invite the 6 7 community to Detroit NAAN is having a program over at Vernon Chapel AME Church this upcoming Tuesday, May 2nd. 8 We're going to be signing people up for internet credit. 9 We're going to be giving away some devices, some internet 10 11 devices, some laptops or what have you. We're going to be 12 having healthcare professionals there. We're going to be 13 having the police there recruiting. We especially need 14 more Detroiters on the Detroit Police Force. Hopefully, 15 everybody will come out. We have a lot of work to do in 16 this city and some of the work needs to start right here at this Board of Police Commissioners. You all have a lot 17 of work to do. I'm very disappointed in this Board. Thank 18 19 you.

20 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you.

21 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Can I have a moment to take a 22 couple minutes?

23 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Absolutely.

24 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Mr. Chairperson and to the 25 Board, I'm always concerned in terms of our time being



1 here each week. I'd like to ask, I would like to say to people like Ms. Hill, I will find out the evaluation of 2 the three things she said that the city has and that 3 we're not getting that money for her. One of my 4 5 information and my understanding with the police department, we're getting our money for this technology 6 7 that we have. I'm always concerned when Mr. Blount says we are corrupt. It's difficult to be a 79-year-old man 8 9 that spent some years in this city as a pastor to come at 10 the end of your year and somebody coming for you and use 11 the word corruption. You have people in this community 12 that perhaps think that because a minister says it that 13 it must be true.

CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I've learned to like Mr. Blount. 14 15 Love him because he's a minister and I'm a minister. I 16 like to have five things he would like to think that we 17 should be doing as commissioners rather than come here every week and tell me that I'm corrupt. I wanted to see 18 what I can do to change his mind. He can give me five 19 things. I met with him and Ms. Hill a number of years ago 20 when I became commissioner. I met with them. I just say 21 to you again, it's hard to sit here. I know I'm supposed 22 to take it. I understand that. I know it's commissioner 23 and a public figure that you got to take what people say 24 25 and they got a right to say what they want to say. But I



do feel like with this technology, we feel like there's
 no lies.

3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: There's crime. Basically, the police officers have a good percentage of catching the 4 5 crooks. I see Mr. Davis. He was here for five years and a good guy. But what did he do when he was here? I'm asking 6 7 you, Mr. Chairman, take it up on myself to see Mr. Davis, Ms. Hill, and Mr. Blount. If they give me five things 8 9 that they feel like we can do better, I would like to take on that challenge. But to sit here and day after day 10 at this point in my life and feel that we've got a city 11 12 that's going well. I mean, yes, we got problems, but 13 nothing like other cities. Thank God for that. We got 14 some good people in this city who really do everything 15 they can as the citizens.

16 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: It's not just the police 17 officer, the citizens are the ones that really keep this 18 thing together. I just feel like we do a whole lot to ourselves. A lot of people think of us that we're doing 19 good as a city, but people in the city, Pressley it's 20 21 always people that's in the city that basically complain 22 about the city. I think sometimes my sisters and 23 brothers, that we ought to do more talking to each other, not at each other. I spend my five years here as many of 24 25 us to do what we can for oversight. But I'm saying to you



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again, if there's anything you think we ought to do, you
 don't want to run. You don't want to run for the office.
 So you can take our place. I can give the mayor your name
 and he can see if he wants to appoint you.

5 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: But I'm just saying to you is if 6 we're not doing what you're thinking ought to do, then 7 won't you take our place or give me some suggestions as to how we can do it better. I want us to do better. We 8 9 work hard to do this. It may not be what you guys think what we ought to be doing. But we do have these committee 10 meetings, and we do what we can. The city is still good. 11 12 I mean, look, we go 70 homicides. Is that the police 13 fault? That's the community. Children have parents and 14 they have responsibility. The churches have 15 responsibility. There are many communities in this city 16 doing everything, small and large, trying to make a difference. 17

18 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Young guy that used to be gang members are now preaching and doing things to turn things 19 around. I just feel like if you want something perfect, 20 you going to have to wait until you get to heaven. 21 22 Otherwise, here on earth, it's going to be imperfect. But 23 we're going to do everything we can. But you guys have to help us rather than call us corrupt. I can't fight you. I 24 25 can't go at you. I can't say nothing to you. You going to



1 call me a 79-year-old man corrupt? That's not fair. I'm 2 just answering you, Mr. Blount. I love you and care about 3 you but help me to be what you want me to be. If you feel 4 I'm not what you think ought to be, help me. But 5 otherwise, I just feel like this is not fair to the 6 Board.

CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: They spend day in and day out 7 trying to make a difference to this community. Thank you. 8 I'm sorry about being emotional, but it's just tough to 9 sit here as an old man sit here and listen to this and 10 can't say nothing. You're doing everything you can. Look 11 12 at this manual. We go through this thing in three, three 13 days to get through this and then come here and try to 14 deal with this for the citizens. We don't get no money. 15 We're basically here because we love this city, and we 16 love you. I just want you to know, I thank you for 17 allowing me for being emotional, but at the same time sensitive to people what they say to us. Then run for the 18 office. If I don't like something, let me run for it. 19 20 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: If you can do better, I want you to. If you think you do better, I would tell the mayor to 21 take me out of here now. If you think you can do better, 22 23 I would give him your name. But I'm just saying to you is 24 this city is good. It's a good city and it is a lot of 25 good stuff going on. Yes, we make mistakes. Yes, we don't



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1 do everything right. But I'm telling you, we're much better than we have been. We have a long way to go but we 2 are much better than we have been and we're going to get 3 better. Especially people like you. Especially people 4 5 like you that basically constructive criticism. We love 6 it and we need it. But understand this is a job that's not even part-time. It's not fair. We ought to have full-7 time people in this role. City council don't work as hard 8 as we do. 9 10 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: They have a staff of 10 people 11 each. 12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I'm sorry, please forgive me.

13 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: So let me clear up a few 14 15 things. In the beginning that's what I brought up. I 16 brought that up in the beginning. Stuff that's been 17 happening to this Board and over the OCI, I didn't go looking for it. It fell into my lap. As the Chair, it was 18 19 up to me to act on it. Listening to the public, I kept hearing you. We need this, we need that. Well, it's here 20 and you're still not satisfied. Like he said, call us 21 corrupt. It's not right. It's not right. I am trying to 22 23 get down to the bottom-up things that's been happening here. Minister. Blount, you said we're not working on 24 25 stuff. We are. We are working on something you just said



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about OCI giving out reports. But I had to put out some
 other fires first that were more pressing because this is
 what you guys kept saying.

4 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: So I had to do that first. I 5 have been on this Board over almost two years now. Well, 6 no, a year.

7 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yeah, right. It's not a year. CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: I have yet to do oversight. 8 9 I've done it in my community but not on this Board because I'm putting out fires and trying to stop the 10 11 infighting amongst ourselves and trying to put stuff in 12 place to enhance this Board. So the next Chair that sits 13 in this seat will want to move forward instead of taking 14 us back. That's what I've been trying to do. Because if 15 you notice the calendar. Now I'm telling you, when we 16 voted for the calendar, I was the only one to vote no 17 because when I looked at the calendar, it looked like a DPD calendar. No offense. Where was the calendar at for 18 citizens? Where was the calendar at for OCI? I'm going to 19 let the cat out the bag. My thing was four and a half. 20 21 The chief investigator, we got them. Or some 22 investigators come and get reports. Some good ones and 23 some bad ones. That way we'll know if this is working. You guys will know that this is what we are doing for 24 25 you. Then our investigators, I was giving them all a



chance to come and report. Not just one. Every week they each can come up here because those are the ones that's working for you.

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CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Green Light, ShotSpotter, 4 5 speed hunts. I don't know about you guys try to take that away from the Eighth Precinct. District 1, they'll fight 6 7 you tooth and nail. Now, at first, they didn't want it, but now they love it. I love it. My street is so quiet 8 9 now. I don't get no speeding cars coming down the street anymore. Green Light. Please. I love it. I love seeing 10 11 that little flashing green light because I know I'm safe. 12 I know somebody's going to be seeing you. ShotSpotter. 13 I've told you guys, I've been out on ShotSpotter so many 14 times, it's a shame. It put me right in the smack dab in 15 the middle of the community. I get a chance to meet the 16 people that's doing something crazy, like shooting a gun 17 in the air and I get to talk to them and not one of them 18 has went to jail. We took their weapon.

19 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: I encourage them, don't do it 20 again and tell all their friends stop. Because you see 21 how quick we can get here. The community loves it. So we 22 all have to do our part individually. But to sit up here 23 and say we're not. I get it. That's your opinion, but I'm 24 trying to change it. Like Commissioner Holley said, write 25 it down, give it to us and then if we don't do it now,



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you got something in hard writing. I gave that to you. We didn't even work on it. Ah, okay. We're guilty. Like he said. We come here. We spent our time to do this. I know you heard me. You have to be one or two things doing this, to be honest with you. You have to be retired or rich.

7 COMMISSIONER: I am not either of those.

8 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: No, that's correct. I know I'm9 not.

10 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Me neither.

11 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: I do this for the love of the 12 city. I actually do this because I love the

13 commissioners. I love their passion. I love it. I met so 14 many amazing people here. It's a shame. I met them. Some 15 people I've seen on TV I'll never get a chance to meet in 16 person. But I have. If you asked me, would I do it again? 17 I will always do it again. Yes. Commissioner.

18 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Point of information chair. 19 I'm looking at the agenda and I'm seeing, what is this? 20 11 number six. It's a change of duty status. I'm used to 21 seeing this as new business. Do we have a closed session 22 today?

23 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: No.

24 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Okay. Thank you.

25 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Okay. So now we have the



1 presentation to the Board. Homicide Task. Why does it

2 take us so long? You have 10 minutes.

3 MS. MCCORD: All of that.

4 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: He made a half hour, but it is 5 what it is.

6 MS. MCCORD: Good afternoon. I am Donna McCord. I'm 7 the captain at Homicide. Today I brought with me sergeant 8 Evie. He is a 28-year veteran of the Detroit Police 9 Department, and he served the last six years on our Task 10 Force. This is different. So I want to share with you 11 just, I'll be brief on our Homicide Task Force just to 12 tell you what we do. I'm sorry.

13 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: We really can't hear what you're 14 saying.

15 MS. MCCORD: How about I just hold it?

16 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: That's good.

MS. MCCORD: So like I said it's going to be brief. 17 But as you know, one of the most important roles that 18 police officers or police departments have is 19 investigating a loss of human life through violence. So 20 what our investigators do is we sift through pertinent 21 information that we receive. What we do is go through 2.2 that information orderly and establish facts to uncover 23 the truth. So as you can see on the PowerPoint, our 24 25 Homicide Task Force is the Detroit Police Department,



1 Michigan State Police, ATF and FBI. Our Homicide Task Force was initiated, established in 2013 and we're now 2 housed at the Detroit Police headquarter or the Public 3 4 Safety headquarters. The Task Force is comprised of advanced investigators who investigate non-fatal 5 6 shootings and homicides. The purpose is for us to collab-7 I can never say that word. The purpose is to provide a collaboration of all of our resources so that we can be 8 efficient and effective with our resources within the 9 10 agency. So the types of investigations that we the Task Force investigates is homicides, non-fatal shootings that 11 involve three or more persons of which one have resulted 12 13 in a fatality.

14 MS. MCCORD: We also investigate homicide victims of victims who are 13 years or younger in any mass casualty 15 16 incident, which is four individuals or more. We also 17 investigate officer involved shootings that occur in the city of Detroit where shots were fired at the police or 18 by the police. We also investigate all in custody deaths 19 that occur within the city of Detroit. Of course, we 20 investigate any cases that the Chief of Police deems a 21 priority. The officer involved shootings. All officer 22 involved shootings are handled by our Homicide Task 23 Force. If a member of the Detroit Police Department 24 25 discharges their weapon, then MSP takes lead in that



investigation. If MSP is within the city of Detroit and
 they discharge their firearm, then DPD members of the
 Task Force will handle that investigation.

MS. MCCORD: If another agency is within our city and 4 it results in a shooting, then the Homicide Task Force 5 6 collectively would investigate that shooting. All of our officer involved shootings that result in a gunshot wound 7 are presented to the Wayne County Prosecutor's office, as 8 the Chief spoke about earlier. I'm glad he kind of went 9 over that. So you can have a brief under a good 10 understanding of what I'm talking about here today. What 11 12 they do is they evaluate both the officer and the 13 subject. It's a dual investigation where the criminal 14 actions of the member or if there was criminal actions by 15 the subject. So with that brief synopsis of what we do, I 16 know you have questions. So go ahead with your questions, 17 please. Yes, yes ma'am.

18 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: That was brief. I like that.19 Yes, Commissioner Bernard.

20 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Can you tell us how many 21 people are on the Homicide Task Force? How many are DPD? 22 How many are state police or federal agents?

MS. MCCORD: Right now, we have one embedded agent.
COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I'm sorry.

25 MS. MCCORD: Right now, we have one embedded agent.



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We have five members of DPD and five members of MSP.
 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Five members of, you said
 state-

4 MS. MCCORD: MSP. Michigan State Police. Yes, ma'am. 5 Yeah.

6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: MS. Okay. Thank you.

7 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Moore.

8 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I guess 9 to piggyback on Commissioner Bernard's question. I know 10 it's a DPD Task Force, but who's in charge? Because you 11 have four different entities.

MS. MCCORD: It's a collaboration. So because ATF has unique resources they can bring to us, and you'll also have DPD with MSP and of course the FBI. So it's a group effort. It's housed in the city. It's our Task Force, Detroit Police Department's Task Force but we work together so we can have efficient and effective service to the citizen.

19 COMMISSIONER MOORE: So DPD is giving out the orders20 on the Task Force.

MS. MCCORD: DPD houses the Task Force. The orders, it's a group effort. It's actually an agreement. I can't recall. I can't say the name of it.

24 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Memorandum of understanding.
25 MS. MCCORD: That's absolutely correct.



1 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Can we see a copy of that, please? 2 3 MS. MCCORD: Sure. I can get it to you through the Chief's office. 4 5 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Okay. Thank you. 6 COMMISSIONER: I'm sorry. Hold on one second. 7 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Memorandum of understanding. 8 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you. 9 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: No questions, Chair. CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Banks. 10 COMMISSIONER BANKS: I'm all set, Mr. Chair. 11 12 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Holley. 13 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you, sir. The closing 14 COMMISSIONER: Microphone. 15 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Your microphone. 16 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Closure of our cases maybe from 17 last year to this year in terms of closing these cases. It seemed like we get a lot of every time we turn around, 18 19 we're catching them. We're catching them. So we must be a good high record in terms of closing. Am I saying that 20 21 right? MS. MCCORD: Closure rate. I didn't prepare any 2.2 statistical data today, but however, I can get you that 23

information through the Chief's office.

24

CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: All right. Thank you. 25



1 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commission Carter.

2 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you, Mr. Chair. Are there

3 instances where you handle cases that are outside the

4 city of Detroit?

5 MS. MCCORD: Stand check, no. So we don't handle any 6 investigations outside the city of Detroit that we would 7 investigate. If a member's off duty and engaged in 8 something, then that would be handled by that

9 jurisdiction. We would just monitor.

10 COMMISSIONER CARTER: But the ATF agent wanted you to 11 do something outside of the city, you wouldn't do it?

MS. MCCORD: I don't understand the question. So the Detroit Police Department has a jurisdiction in the city. Our Task Force isn't like a Wayne County Sheriff or the regional. We only handle those cases inside for Homicide Task Force We do have other entities inside the police department that would handle something like that.

18 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you.

19 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Bell.

20 COMMISSIONER BELL: No comment.

21 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Burton.

22 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Not at this time, Mr. Chair,

23 but may be later. Thank you.

24 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Mr. Chairman.

25 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner VC Holt.



1 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you. Thank you. No. COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Mr. Chairman, how many 2 homicides have been solved let's say in the last 24 3 months and how many are still open? Well, how many 4 5 homicide cases are open period? 6 MS. MCCORD: Mam, are you speaking of Homicide Task Force cases or homicide unit in general? 7 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: That being the Homicide Task 8 9 Force because Homicide is separate. It says here it has to be at least three people involved in maybe one 10 fatality. So you're involved in the bigger cases, not 11 12 just the husband that shot the wife or the wife that shot 13 the husband. I assume that's not in your category. I 14 don't believe. 15 MS. MCCORD: So. The Homicide Task Force is part of 16 our homicide unit. Our Homicide Unit consists of several

different units. It's the Homicide General, and then you have arson and you have fatal squad. You also have missing persons and the Task Force. So the Task Force is what I was presenting to you today. As I said earlier, I didn't prepare any statistical data. However, I can get that to you through the Chief's office.

COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Can you give the Board that list if you will of departments that are within Homicide that you just told us about in the Seventh? Okay. Thank



1 you so much.

CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you. Thank you so much.
MS. MCCORD: Thank you.

4 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: All right, Ms. Shaw, Board5 Secretary.

6 MS. SHAW: Thank you, Mr. Chair. So to the benefit of 7 the honorable commissioners here and our public, I will 8 give the Secretary Report today. Our incoming 9 correspondence are listed on your agenda and are also in 10 your packets. I'm going to pull up here two flyers. One

11 moment.

COMMISSIONER BERNARD: While Madam Secretary is doing 12 that. Mr. Chairman, I noticed that we did not get a 13 14 response to Reverend Holley's letter as Chair until 14 15 months afterwards. It's in the package. I think that we should comment or do something about that. He did request 16 17 information way before the collective bargaining agreements were signed and now they're letting him know 18 about it 14 months later. That's a good catch through the 19 20 Chair.

21 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: I saw that. I'm working all 22 these-

23 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Yeah, let's respond to that.
24 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Saw that.



COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I'm sorry. Go ahead. That's no

1 problem.

2 MS. SHAW: Thank you, through the Chair. So the flyers that we're showing, we make sure that the public 3 on Zoom can see the flyers right now. So the Board will 4 5 be hosting a public hearing on Thursday, May 11th at our 6 community meeting. This will be to get feedback from the 7 community on the expansion of DPD surveillance, specifically license plate readers. So I would like to 8 9 thank Ms. Blossom for putting together these flyers. These are for the public's benefits. So we have this 10 flyer and then there's another. Commissioners, you do 11 12 have copies of these in your packets as well. These are 13 being distributed via the delivery, the BOPC website, 14 Facebook, and to our media partners as well as posters 15 will be published in the public libraries. We do look 16 forward to the engagement of the public on May 11th. 17 MS. SHAW: All right, in regard to open positions, the attorney and legal assistant documentation is being 18 drafted to appeal Corporation Council's decision. For 19 investigators we have five appointed candidates that are 20 starting on Monday, May 1st, and the investigator new 21 hire training outline is being finalized. The extended 22 posting for additional investigators did come down on 23 April 22nd, and I'm waiting for the candidate information 24 25 from Mr. Tipton. Our Chief Investigator is also starting



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1 on Monday, May 1st, Jerome Warfield. We still have our position up for the executive manager fiscal that is 2 posted on the city website until tomorrow. So if you know 3 a candidate that will serve the residents of Detroit well 4 5 in fiscal responsibility and transparency, please have 6 them apply. For our committee updates, in March Chairman Ferguson announced that committee meetings will no longer 7 be routinely scheduled on a monthly basis but will 8 instead be scheduled on an ad hoc basis by each committee 9 Chair at a date and time that works for the committee 10 members. 11

12 MS. SHAW: Committee Chairs, please give the BOPC 13 admin team at least two business day notice for 14 scheduling a meeting so that we can properly announce to 15 the public pursuant the Open Meetings Act. The following 16 matters are before the Board that you may want considered 17 by the committee. For Budget, disciplinary DPD administrative requests and towing, there are no items at 18 this time. For the Personnel and Training Committee, 19 20 Chairman Jesus Hernandez, we have two DPD applicant appeals that are pending for Jerry Lynn Johnson, the 21 second and Rasheed Dixon. For our Citizen Complaint 22 Committee chaired by Commissioner Cedric Banks, we do 23 have a citizen complaint appeal process that needs to be 24 discussed pursuant Detroit City Charter section 7-809, 25



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resolution of complaints. For our Policy Committee
 chaired by Commissioner Willie Burton, we have several
 policies that need to be discussed.

MS. SHAW: We have the license plate reader 4 specification report, which I mentioned the public 5 hearing scheduled for the 11th of May. Also, the 6 following policies, officer involved shooting 7 investigations, gunshot detection system, department 8 internet usage, child abuse and safe delivery of 9 newborns, court appearances, training, vice and 10 narcotics, facial recognition, and patrol. In addition, 11 12 we received some feedback from a citizen regarding policy 13 202.2 search and speaker, specifically the section 3.4 on 14 open view directive that the committee may want to 15 consider this citizen's feedback on that particular 16 policy. To answer the question through the Chair that 17 Commissioner Pressley had in regard to the change of duty status. That is incoming correspondence for the Board, 18 but we are not having a closed session on that today. 19 20 That information is there for your awareness, and we will be scheduling for the Board to review this at a later 21 meeting. Then lastly, I will go over the citizen 22 complaints updates. Honorable commissioners, this 23 presentation is found behind tab number five in your 24 packets as well if you would like to review it. 25



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1 MS. SHAW: So as far as recent improvements and initiatives, supervisors are continuing to coach 2 3 investigators on inventory management strategies to drive more consistent production while maintaining thorough 4 5 investigations. We are seeing preliminary success with this approach. We do have the five investigators and the 6 new Chief Investigator that are scheduled to start on 7 Monday. In addition to administrative team admins were 8 cross trained on the 22nd and the 24th of April. The case 9 assignment and closure work that was behind last week is 10 now caught up and letters are still behind as one of the 11 12 OCI admins is still out of the office. Cross training on 13 that function has not yet occurred. These definitions and 14 clarifications have been presented before, so I'll skip 15 past that. So on this slide, what we're seeing here is 16 since last week, we do have an uptick in total number of cases up to 545. But one thing I would like to point out 17 is that we are seeing a decrease in the cases that our 18 aged over 90 days. 19

MS. SHAW: So we've decreased that to 298. What's even more encouraging is that we've also decreased the cases that are aged between 61 and 90 days. So those cases that are approaching 90 days, those have decreased down to 39. So this uptick in case is really is being driven by an influx of new cases coming into the system.



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Commissioners, we do have 44 closed cases that are being

2 distributed to you today. So we ask that you would please take a look at those and return those by next week. For 3 our 2023 performance. So these are for cases that have 4 been received in 2023. We talked about this slide last 5 6 week. Again, we need to reduce the overall inventory. We 7 have to start closing more cases than are coming in and we're not at that point yet. So with the increase in 8 9 staff, we should be able to see some improvements there. So we have 443 cases that have been received so far in 10 2023. This slide shows the closed cases in 2023. 172 of 11 12 those cases are closed now and 121 of those closed within 13 60 days. 44 closed between 61 and 90 days, and 7 did age 14 over 90 days before they actually closed.

15 MS. SHAW: Then for the cases that are still open 16 that we received in 2023, 266 are still open. 19 of them 17 have aged over 90 days. So they do contribute to our backlog. We have 39 that are approaching 90 days aged. So 18 19 the team is focusing very much on that that approaching 90 day mark, those cases. So the ones in yellow as well 20 as the ones in red so that we can get those out of the 21 22 backlog. That concludes my secretary report, Mr. Chair. 23 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: All right, thank you. Yeah, let me do this really quick. 24

25 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: You hurry up and do it.



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1 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Let me you do this really 2 quick. So policy, right? There's technically three people on Policy. Chairperson Burton, myself, and Vice-Chair 3 Holt. I can't make the other commissioner show up, I 4 5 can't make them. Right. It's not fair for the Chair and 6 the Vice-Chair to even think about trying to help craft policy along with the Chairperson. It's not. So we going 7 to do something different, but it's not different. I 8 9 heard this happened before, but we're going to bring this back. We're going to have the citizens. We're going to 10 11 put policy up on delivery.gov that we're proposing to 12 change or proposing to look at. You read it, you ask or 13 see about the changes you want, you bring it to the full 14 Board in public comment. Remember you got two minutes. So 15 you got a line item you don't like, put it together in 16 two minutes or put it in writing and send it to us. 17 Right? You guys are going to be involved in the public 18 comment or the policy and the way's it's going to be handled and changed. 19

20 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Then the full Board is going 21 to vote on that policy. That's how it's going to work. 22 The full Board will vote on a policy. It's going to mean 23 you're going to know it's going to be coming up because 24 it's going to be your agenda. So that means you guys will 25 have it in your packet. We'll send it to you email on the



1 changes that's proposed, and you guys are going to get a chance to vote on it. If there's something you don't 2 like, you have to let the Board know. That way when we 3 vote on it, it'll almost be a unanimous decision because 4 you already figured out what you do and what you don't 5 6 like in the policy according to the citizens and yourself. Questions? 7 8 COMMISSIONER MOORE: I do, Mr. Chairman. How many 9 policies are we pending? 10 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: About 11. 11 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Because when I was on the 12 committee before, it was five when I took myself off the 13 committee. 14 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes. 15 COMMISSIONER MOORE: We got some more. So we're up to 16 11 now. 17 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yep, we're up to 11. 18 COMMISSIONER MOORE: But we got a process for getting these cases because I know the department has a timeline 19 where which they want to implement this. 20 21 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: We want to take the present 22 ones first. The ones that we really have to do first. The 23 ones they want to get through first. That way we can tackle those by the way. So one is probably going to be 24 25 the license plate reader. But we'll be able to hear the



pros and the cons on that. Right. Let the Board figure it
 out. Unless you've got a better idea.

3 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Yes. That's part of the reason 4 why I took myself off the committee, because I just saw a 5 lot of talk, but no work.

6 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you.

7 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay.

8 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: That's why we're going to put 9 us all to work. We're all going to be at work. Even the 10 citizens are going to be at work. Well, everybody going 11 to be at work on this one. Homework, we got to do it. 12 Yes.

13 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Mr. Chairman, almost two years 14 ago I initiated a conversation with the dean of Wayne 15 State's law school.

16 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Right.

COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I wanted them to work with us 17 18 in reviewing our policies because they have a broad lens 19 and know what's happening all around the country, of course. Because a criminal law professor that would be 20 21 doing it to help us formulate the policy that best serves 22 citizens as well as the department. I can contact the dean again and ask him to review them for the 23 constitutionality and for the, you know. We are concerned 24 25 with, of course, the rights of citizens as well as public



1 safety. But I'd like to do that again if you don't mind. They have a ton of students who do all kinds of great 2 3 work. 4 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes. Get with Secretary Shaw and-5 6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Okay. I'll work with you 7 Victoria. That'd be great. Looking forward to it. 8 MS. SHAW: Thank you. CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Go ahead commissioner. I'm 9 10 sorry. CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Mr. Chairman. 11 12 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I'll do that, Mr. Chair on all 13 of-14 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Madam Secretary. 15 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you. CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: When it comes to pick up in 16 terms of complaints can I assume that as oversight that 17 we ought to be looking at the rise of complaints that's 18 coming from the citizens in terms of those that are more, 19 what am I trying to say? In other words, I guess I'm just 20 trying to get to the point where shouldn't we be 21 concerned about how serious these complaints are? In 22 23 terms of what are we doing in terms of overseer. Is this 24 something that the staff can do to kind of give us an 25 idea of what complaints are more than others that we



ought to maybe direct it to the Chief office and how is
 this in a discipline-like way?

3 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: That's a good idea.

4 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: So in other words, what 5 precincts the commands are coming from and then you'll 6 rise to that. Hand it to them.

7 MS. SHAW: Through the Cahir. Yes, we're continuing 8 to look at the data that's coming in on the citizen 9 complaints and improving that analysis. Including 10 breakouts by precinct as well as complaint pipes as well 11 as the outcomes sustained or for those that are not 12 sustained. So we'll continue to improve that analysis and 13 present it to the Board's.

CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: It's been the whole year and we 14 15 have not had anything. Obviously, you just got here. We 16 haven't had anything to really evaluate in terms of 17 whether or not we ought to be looking at the police department in terms of getting word to them on what they 18 need to be looking for based on what the citizens are 19 complaining. Then finally, and I'll leave you alone. I've 20 been looking at this artificial intelligence. I really 21 feel like it must be something out there Mr. Chairman 22 that we ought to ask the staff to look at. Some 23 24 technology that basically once we have an intake the 25 process ought to be a little bit more professional, a



little bit more quicker. In other words, some stuff got
 to be out there that can help us with this process of
 getting this thing down and getting them taken care of
 quickly.

CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Can we have someone on staff to 5 6 look into and take what's going around the country, what 7 they are doing or what can be done and how much money that would be in terms of if we needed to have that kind 8 9 of technology. I mean, if I can tell the dog go out to the dog door, he says, Ms. Shaw's at the door. Look like 10 it would all be something that we can do with these 11 12 complaints.

13 MS. SHAW: Through the Chair. There are case 14 management systems on the market, and we are starting to 15 look at those. I'm definitely going to be working with 16 the Chief Investigator once he onboards to look at that more closely because OCI definitely needs a case 17 management system. The system that the processes as I've 18 19 observed them are highly manual right now and very prone 20 to human error. It also doesn't lend to the type of data analysis that we need for decision making. So we will be 21 looking at some more sophisticated systems and we'll be 22 presenting to this Board potential costs for those. 23 2.4 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Can you get a timeline on

25 that?



MS. SHAW: Sure. If you could allow three to six
 months.

3 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Reverend Holley will not be here. CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Well, he'll know it's in 4 5 place. He'll know it's in place. 6 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Through the Chair. CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Go ahead. 7 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you, Ms. Shaw for listing 8 9 all of the policies that we need to attend to. But you 10 did not mention the name of professor Robichaud. We're no

11 longer in communication?

MS. SHAW: Through the Chair, I did make an outreach to Professor Robichaud. Based on the historical documents that I looked at, the program that the Board was looking at, engaging with her was dependent on the school schedule.

17 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Correct.

MS. SHAW: So they are nearing the end of the semester. So I did send an email to her letting her know that the Board is still interested in engaging and the appropriate timing for the university's schedule. So I'm waiting to hear back from her on that.

23 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Because I think two part of the 24 discussion was that the students or the interns would 25 deal with policy. Okay. You indicated that training for



the OCI investigators will start when, please?
 MS. SHAW: On Monday, on May 1st.

3 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: What's that, two weeks of 4 training?

5 MS. SHAW: So we are evaluating the training 6 curriculum right now. It's looking about two weeks for 7 classroom and hands on training. Then there will be on 8 the job training that will occur after that where the 9 investigators will be conducting their cases while being 10 monitored until they have demonstrated the appropriate 11 skillset to be investigating on their own.

12 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay. Through the Chair I'll be 13 away next week. One to two college graduations. Thank 14 you. Spellman and Alabama State. Would it be appropriate 15 for me to be in on one class or so? Basically, from my 16 understanding of how the cases are accepted, reviewed, 17 and a determination is made, is that inappropriate? MS. SHAW: I don't see any concerns with any 18 commissioner dropping in on the training session to 19 20 observe. There is an outline that the trainers will be following and so it'll be important to allow them to 21 progress through their outlines so that the training can 22 23 be completed timely. But I don't see any issues with any 24 commissioner just coming to quietly observe.

25 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay. Now obviously I'll



communicate the timely I will be available so that you 1 2 can pop me in at a better time during the training. When is the Chief Investigator coming on? When is he to start? 3 4 MS. SHAW: The Chief Investigator also starts on 5-1 5 on Monday. 6 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay. MS. SHAW: We'll start his onboarding here at 7 8 headquarters. CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you for your diligence and 9 keeping this together for us. 10 11 MS. SHAW: You're welcome. 12 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Announcements. 13 MS. SHAW: Announcements. So for our announcements, 14 we have our next meeting is Thursday, May 4 at 3:00 PM 15 here at Detroit Public Safety Headquarters. Then our next

16 community meeting is Thursday, May 11th at 6:30. That

17 will be the Eighth Precinct hosting at Crowell

18 Recreational Center, 16630 Lahser Road in Detroit. Again,

19 this will be our public hearing as well on the license

20 plate reader technology. That concludes the

21 announcements, Mr. Chair.

22 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Through the Chair. One other 23 comment. As you go about planning for commissioners to 24 receive schedules as it relates to the community 25 relations meetings could we give some thought to touch



1	and base with the president to see if commissioners could
2	be included on the agenda? Which for me would have me
3	more purposeful in terms of my attendance when I expect
4	to go and be educated enough to add something to the
5	meeting.
6	MS. SHAW: Through the Chair. We can certainly do
7	that with you.

9	Announcements. Oh, you did Announcement. Unfinished
10	business. No. Unfinished business. New business. No new
11	business.
12	COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Move to adjourn.
