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CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Dr. Davenport, go ahead with
 you case.

3 DR. DAVENPORT: Yes.

4 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Go ahead, sir.

DR. DAVENPORT: Yes. Father God, thank you for this 5 6 blessed day. Thank you for this gathering of leaders. 7 Thank you, Lord for this Board, who has been given the charge to be the gatekeeper for the city, as well as the 8 contenders for the officers and men and women of the 9 Trade police department. We pray, Lord, that you continue 10 to bless them with the wisdom and the fortitude to get 11 12 the job done. We thank you for blessing their families, their individual businesses, and all those to participate 13 14 in the process to make sure we have the greatest 15 department in the city, the state, and the world. We thank you for this opportunity. In Jesus' name. Amen. 16 17 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Amen. So we do not have a quorum, so we are going to go straight to oral 18 19 communications. Mr. Brown.

20 MR. BROWN: Good afternoon, Mr. Chair. Currently 21 there are four speakers, and I'll call those in 22 attendance. Ms. Fredia Butler, followed by Minister. Eric 23 Blount.

24 MS. BUTLER: Good afternoon.

25 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Good afternoon.



1 MS. BUTLER: Commissioners, on May 4th, an officer was being promoted to the position of Commander without 2 having been vetted by the Board of Police Commissioners. 3 You requested a week to review the officer's credentials. 4 5 The officer had already moved in at the precinct. At the very next meeting, which was held May 11th, you promoted 6 the officer. What kind of vetting did you do? Now, the 7 officer has been removed from the position. I don't know 8 why he was removed, but from my observation, there would 9 be some serious concerns if he had stayed. Our 10 neighborhood police officers are doing outstanding work 11 12 in our communities. They have set up cameras to identify 13 people illegal dumping, and they are mentors for our 14 children. Commissioners. I believe in going to the source 15 to solve any issue. A gentleman calls in frequently 16 naming several officers of misconduct.

MS. BUTLER: He should come in and face the Board 17 with proof of misconduct by the officers he's accusing. I 18 spoke with Captain May, who is one of the officers being 19 accused by the caller, and I believe Captain May's 20 explanation. As citizens, we should ask questions, but be 21 willing to come before the Board that is the civilian 22 oversight of the police department, with our concerns and 23 24 receive answers. Commissioner Burton, please respect your 25 position as a commissioner. Thank you.



1 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you.

2 MR. BROWN: Minister. Blount.

3 MINISTER BLOUNT: Good afternoon, Board.

4 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Good afternoon.

MINISTER BLOUNT: I am Minister. Eric Blunt from 5 6 Sacred Heart Catholic Church right here in Detroit. I 7 didn't see it on the agenda, so I don't think anyone's going to mention it here today, so I'll have to. Today is 8 9 the third-year memorial of George Floyd being murdered by the police department. Police report said he died of 10 medical incidents, but now we know it is not true. The 11 12 only way we know it's not true is because of a 16-year-13 old Black girl, woman, young lady who decided to step forward. She had seen enough. So, everyone under the 14 15 sound of my voice, I want you to remember her name, 16 Darnell Frazier. She was going to the same store George 17 Floyd was. Her cousin wanted the little piece of candy, but when she seen what was being done to George Floyd, 18 she pulled out her cell phone and recorded it all so that 19 the police report would be shown to be a lie. 20

MINISTER BLOUNT: So today is the deadline that the police department here in Detroit had given us. If I'm wrong, correct me. That the full videotaped killing of Porter Burks would be released not only to the Board, but to the whole citizenry of Detroit. If I am wrong, please



correct me. I know it has not been released yet. Thank
 you.

3 MR. BROWN: Mr. Chair, your next set of speakers
4 would be Ms. Charnita Williams, followed by District 4
5 CAC Secretary Scotty Boman.

6 MS. WILLIAMS: Hello. This is my third week here 7 complaining about the issues I've been having with you guys. From the OCI to the Board of Commissions, the issue 8 9 I've been having for the last two and a half years with this woman is still going on. I cannot understand how 10 this is happening in the city of Detroit in 2023. All 11 12 these illegal activities. I have illegal cameras in my 13 house, listening devices. When she came to my house, home 14 invaded my home illegally. Let's not even talk about the 15 report. When I came to your OCI office, that detective 16 sat in my face and lied about the cameras. You all say 17 you want transparency. I can't get it because every time 18 I go to the police department to file a report on her, 19 they're lying about the cameras being recorded, being 20 played.

MS. WILLIAMS: I mean, having them recorded. They're not recording the conversations I'm having. So I received a letter. I went to the OCI on the 10th of May, received a letter. It was dated the 12th. That investigation is a lot of BS. So I went to the Feds last week and I'm going



to continue to go because this needs to be rectified. You
guys cannot do your job correctly. You all don't need to
be here. From the city, from the sheriff department, the
chief of police. The Feds need to come in and do
something about the city in corruption. That's where I'm
at today. Yeah. Her name is Nikita Wilson.

7 MR. BROWN: Mr. Boman.

MR. BOMAN: Hello. First of all, I'm disappointed 8 9 that you don't even have a quorum. I think that's the responsibility of all of us elected officials to do that. 10 I didn't hear the roll call, so, it's a little hard 11 12 looking on this little screen to figure out exactly who 13 did and did not attend it. We didn't have any audio until 14 the reading of the prayer. So that's disappointing. Also, 15 it's disappointing to hear that an officer was promoted 16 before the Board of Police Commissioners voted on it. 17 It's not the order it's supposed to happen in. Now back 18 to this issue that we've had going on about license plate 19 scanners. That is a topic that really needs to be fully dealt with before there's any vote on it. I guess there's 20 21 not any official vote happening today, but something to think about in the future. One thing is you have a 22 committee devoted to investigating it, and it definitely 23 shouldn't be voted on until the committee report has been 24 25 released to the rest of the Board and they've been given



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1 a proper amount of time to look at it.

MR. BOMAN: I understand the ACLU is doing a 2 presentation today, I hope that is also informative. Any 3 commissioners that are missing today's meeting, they 4 5 really need to tune in and listen to our comments and 6 watch the reports being given at this meeting so that 7 they're better prepared at the next meeting. This is a serious job and it has consequences and it's unfortunate 8 9 that not everybody is taking the responsibility seriously. I do applaud the commissioners who are 10 11 attending today. I just regret that your colleagues are 12 not apparently as committed as you. Maybe some people 13 have emergency situations. I doubt that many have 14 emergency situations all at once. Have a good Memorial 15 Day weekend coming up too. Take care. 16 MR. BROWN: Mr. Chair, your next set of speakers would be Ms. Marguerite Maddox, followed by Former 17 Commissioner William Davis. 18 19 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Go ahead Ms. Maddox. 20 MS. MADDOX: Hello? 21 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Hello. 22 MS. MADDOX: Can you hear me okay? 23 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes, we can hear you just 24 fine.

25 MS. MADDOX: Okay. I would like to comment on the



1 ATVs because they are dangerous to all of us. What do we do? Do we make sure that the ATVs are being accountable 2 for their action. We need to hold their parents 3 4 accountable and the gas station accountable. Thank you. I'm done. 5 6 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you. 7 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you. MR. BROWN: Former Commissioner Davis. 8 9 MR. DAVIS: Good afternoon. Can I be heard? CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes, we can hear you. 10 MR. DAVIS: Okay. I'd like to start off by saying for 11 12 a year before I got elected, and since then I have not 13 missed a single meeting. I think it's horrible we have so 14 many commissioners that regularly don't attend the 15 meetings. Also, I'd like to say that since the Board is a 16 regular printout of the Green Light locations, you all 17 should also find out whether or not all the Green Light locations are actually licensed. It looks bad for there 18 to be a Green Light location not to be licensed. It looks 19 to some people like this clerk that was behind the window 20 21 there is getting preferential treatment because he's related to a state representative. Also, just so that you 22 23 know, Detroit NAN had an excellent event this past Tuesday where we were passing out the information to help 24 25 sign people up for the internet to help close the digital



1 divide.

2	MR. DAVIS: We also gave out some laptops. This Board
3	should think about doing something like that too. You all
4	should think about doing something that you are actually
5	in the community actually helping people instead of not
б	doing anything. There's a whole lot more this Board
7	should be doing, especially as it relates to even the
8	license plate readers. It's hard for the public to know
9	if this is a good or a bad thing if you only get one
10	dimension, one side. You need balance. The public needs
11	to think that you are more than rubber stamps. Have a
12	great day.
13	MR. BROWN: Mr. Chair, your next set of callers we be
14	calling with the last three numbers 315 and Ms. Aol
15	Evans. 315.
16	CALLER 315: Okay. Happy Thursday. You can hear me
17	clearly?
18	CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes, we can hear you.
19	CALLER 315: Thank you. I would like to say hello to
20	the police commissioners and also to the community. I
21	would like to request you, anybody, to ask the legal
22	department to investigate the locking of these stores. I
23	do believe that if that door had not been locked, those
24	neerly would not be doed on bourned. Co if the local
	people would not be dead or harmed. So if the legal

1 that it can be corrected. The training it seems of these store owners is because more of them haven't done it, 2 they locked the doors. The other issue I have to point 3 4 out is the stores that are not licensed. As a body, I 5 would like you to request the investigation of all of the stores to find out if they are legally and fully licensed 6 as well as insured. As the co-founder of Hood Research, 7 8 we as a body stand behind these requests. Thank you. 9 MR. BOMAN: Ms. Evans.

10 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Mrs. Aol Evans.

MS. EVANS: Look, I don't do public speaking, so I'm 11 12 going to do the best I can. I'm here. I'm being used and 13 abused badly by law enforcement. My insurance, long story 14 short, I stood up to a drug dealer, child trafficker the 15 whole nine yards. I wouldn't cut my bushes down and I was 16 not scared of them. So now they had him switch it around. 17 I'm born in the game because I wasn't scared of them. My 18 insurance has been taken away which I've had since I was 17 years old. I worked for Ford Motor Company, and I 19 worked various jobs, but I've had insurance. I've had 20 21 Blue Cross, Blue Shield, Medicare, Medicaid. I've just 22 had it so long ago. I went to your police department, 23 Third Precinct, and I went in there for help.

MS. EVANS: That's it. They gave me 8 by 10 piece of paper with three columns of shelters. Right. Okay. So I

1 asked the officer, I said, can you just check some of them to see how they could accommodate me? A little bit 2 longer. I'm not familiar with shelters. I've owned a home 3 for over 40 years until it was stolen. They went behind 4 5 the bulletproof glass. So I stood there waiting and I 6 went to the window and he said, I like that. Then, so I 7 said, well, this may take a little bit of time. So I proceeded out the door and I quess when he noticed I was 8 gone he ran out and then the other officer came out. I'm 9 10 like, what is going on? Because I was barely in there for five minutes. 11

12 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Hang on. We hear you. Right. 13 We have some people in here that's going to be able to 14 help you. DC, Second Deputy Chief.

15 MS. EVANS: Nobody's helping me.

16 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: She's going to help you right 17 now. She's right here in the room. We got her for you.

18 MS. EVANS: No, wait a minute. She turned around and19 came out.

20 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: We got somebody.

MS. EVANS: She came out and two other officers came and told me to get in. I'm like, get in the car for what? CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Ma'am I do understand. We have somebody that's going to help you. She's right there. She's already standing up right now. So she's going to



1 help you. Before you leave here, she'll help you.

2 MS. EVANS: Okay.

3 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: But your time is up. You only4 have two minutes. I'm sorry.

5 MS. EVANS: Okay. Well, let me start over with two 6 minutes.

7 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: No. You can't start over with8 two minutes and two minutes already up.

9 MS. EVANS: Look, I'm living in a car.

10 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Ma'am, please. We have got

11 people that's going to help you right here. You came to 12 the right place.

MS. EVANS: Yeah. I was here before. They didn't do anything.

15 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: You came to the right place.

16 We have got the top person that's going to help you.

17 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Mr. Chairman.

18 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Right Here. Can you help her?19 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Mr. Chairman.

20 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: She's going to help you.

21 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Assistant Chief. Don't look at 22 me like you're mad at me.

23 MS. EVANS: I was sent to a mental ward.

24 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes. That's what I'm asking you.

25 MS. EVANS: For no reason.



05/25/2023 1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Are you homeless? MS. EVANS: Yeah, I was sent to a mental home for no 2 3 reason. CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I'm just saying that is your 4 5 problem. You're homeless. Is that the problem? 6 MS. EVANS: Well, yeah, I didn't make myself that 7 way. 8 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: So I'm asking you, I'll meet you outside and I'll help you tomorrow, okay? Just give me 9 the gift score. If you're homeless, I can help you. If 10 11 you need help in the police department, then we got 12 somebody to sign you for that. Now, that's the only thing 13 we can do. But I can help you with the homeless thing. If 14 you could help. He won't help you with the police. 15 MS. EVANS: Okay. Well, people need to know.

16 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I know, but I'm just saying to 17 you because of time.

18 MS. EVANS: Police department to ask for help.

19 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Right. I'm trying.

MS. EVANS: I was sent to a mental ward. 20

21 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Ma'am, we've got you. We got

22 you. She's right there. She's going to turn to you right

23 now. Right there.

24 MR. BROWN: Mr. James Ford.

MR. FORD: Good evening counsel. I'm James Ford. 25



1 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Welcome back, sir.

2 MR. FORD: Say that again.

3 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Welcome back.

MR. FORD: Thank you very much. God bless everybody. 4 5 I'm James Ford from the Obama weekend, and I just want to say I've been to eight states, 16 major cities, and I'm 6 7 just glad to be here again. But I'm sad to know that I came back and there's two people that lost loved ones. 8 9 Two rain, red lights, and traffic. It is terrible. Downtown is safe, but I'm going to be very short. I just 10 11 want to say this when I'm talking. I'm not talking for 12 the people out there. I'm talking for the people in here. 13 You all are vulnerable. I want you people to understand 14 it. Just because you're a council, doesn't mean that you 15 won't get hit. But I just say this, I'm trying to help 16 everybody in this room when I say that people are getting hit and hurt. 17

MR. FORD: But I have good news for you. I just want to say this. I was in Tampa, Florida, and I was in Houston, Texas. They send people from Tampa, Florida and Houston, Texas to Detroit to study the river walk. You have been voted in the Tampa Tribune as the best river walk in the nation.

24 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Correct.

25 MR. FORD: I just want to let you people know that I



1 was happy. I was watching it. I'm from Detroit and all that standing up. So just be happy with what you do. Now 2 if you put concentrated on the river walk and you got the 3 best one in the nation, let's have something else that's 4 5 the best. God bless everybody. I'm happy to be here. 6 Thank you. You are good people. Thank you very much. 7 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you. MR. BROWN: Mr. Chair, your next speaker will be 8 Chris Gilmer Hill. 9 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Mr. Hill. 10 MR. HILL: Hi. Hello. Can I be heard? 11 12 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes, go right ahead, sir. 13 MR. HILL: Hi, my name's Chris Gilmer Hill, lifelong 14 resident of District 2. I am calling in specifically to 15 give comment regarding the suspension of Rules and Motion 16 by Commissioner Pressley last meeting. I want to stress that that motion was not in order. The suspension of the 17 rules was a, out of order in the first place and should 18 not have been performed. But b, the motion that came 19 after the suspension of the rules did not fall under the 20 scope of that initial motion to suspend the rules. 21 22 Specifically, this Board has not voted to formally approve any policy relating to license plate readers. I 23 24 would urge the entire Board to allow those policies to go 25 through the Policy Committee and not take up anything



until the like due course has been followed for those
 specific proposals.

MR. HILL: Again, these policies, these guidelines, 3 these procedural formalities around this process aren't 4 5 just formalities. These are the rules about how this is 6 done. That's not something that we can just spend willynilly if we decide that things aren't being rubber 7 stamped as quickly as we would like. You have a duty to 8 9 the people of Detroit to actually do due diligence and look at the proposals and the policies that come before 10 you, and to criticize them, not just rubber stamp things 11 for the police department. To that end, I don't think it 12 13 would be in order to try to advance anything out of the 14 BOPC that hasn't gone through the normal channels of 15 Policy Committee. And lastly, I once again urge all 16 members who are on the Policy Committee to attend those 17 meetings.

MR. HILL: Those aren't just an optional thing that 18 can be opted out of if you decide that you don't like the 19 other people on the committee. That's part of your job as 20 police commissioners. I want to thank commissioner Willie 21 Burton once again for being one of the only ones to 22 consistently show up on this issue and on policy issues 23 in general. I would urge the entire rest of the board to 24 25 take policy seriously and to take seriously your role as



overseers of the police department on behalf of the
 people of Detroit. Thank you.

MR. BROWN: Mr. Chair, that was your last speaker.
CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Last speaker. Thank you.
COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Mr. Chairman.

6 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes.

7 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: If I may just want to address one question that was raised during public comment. 8 Number one, it is against the law in the city of Detroit 9 for a business, including this business, this building to 10 11 lock doors so that people cannot exit you. That's what it 12 says. Exit and red lights in any establishment, you 13 cannot be locked in. That's why you're supposed to have 14 breaker doors. Doors open out. It's a violation of the 15 fire code. It's a \$500 fine if in fact it doesn't occur. 16 But you could get repeat violations for every day that 17 that happens. The second thing that they asked were the stores insured Mr. Chairman. Under City ordinances, every 18 business has to be licensed to do business in the City of 19 Detroit. Part of that license is a certificate of 20 21 compliance that says that the building is up to code i.e., that it has the breaker doors that I'm talking 22 23 about that are on these doors you see here. As well as plumbing issues and everything else. 24

25 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Every commercial business in



the city of Detroit is required to be in compliance and get that license every year. So I just wanted you to be aware of that Mr. Chairman. In terms of Green Light locations, your question. I agree with you. A precursor to getting authorized for a Green Light and for the City of Detroit monitoring, it should be that the business is properly licensed. Apparently based on what was said here today that's not the case. Then, thank you Minister.

9 Blount for reminding us about George Floyd's unfortunate demise and about the fact that we are supposed to have 10 the tape today of the killing of Porter Burks, I believe 11 12 his last name is available to the public. I will follow 13 up on that. Finally, I apologize for not being here last 14 week. I was in Washington. Everyone here knows my only 15 parents are 93 and 90. They're in Walter Reed Hospital. 16 That's where I was for the last eight days. Thank you.

17 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you.

18 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you, Mr. Chairman for19 allowing me to make that comment.

20 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes. Introduction of

21 commissioners.

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MS. SHAH: Chairman Bryan Ferguson - Here, District1.

MS. SHAH: Vice-Chair Annie Holt – I apologize for being late. Yes, I'm here. Vice-Chair Annie Holt, At-



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MS. SHAH: Commissioner Willie Bell submitted an excused absence. MS. SHAH: Commissioner Linda Benard - Attorney Linda Bernard, present. Thank you everyone for being here today. It's a pleasure to see you. MS. SHAH: Commissioner Willie Burton - Commissioner Willie Burton is present on behalf of the citizens of Detroit. MS. SHAH: Commissioner Lisa Carter submitted an excused absence. MS. SHAH: Commissioner Jesus Fernandez - Present. MS. SHAH: Commissioner Jim Holley - Present. MS. SHAH: Commissioner Ricardo Moore also submitted an excused absence. MS. SHAH: Commissioner QuanTez Pressley - Here. MS. SHAH: Commissioner Cedric Banks indicated that he will be late. CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Fantastic. Now, I would like to have approval of the agenda for May 25th. CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: So move. COMMISSIONER: Second. CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Under discussion. Let me

24 clarify why some items on the agenda today, at least last 25 week's meeting, this board voted to support the expansion



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of license plate readers. The action that is still 1 outstanding is adoption. Let me make that clear. The 2 adoption of the surveillance technology specification 3 report means a report has to go along with it. It is 4 5 needed to be moved that the expansion move out of this Board and moving forward. Today, our Board Secretary will 6 7 give her presentation on the report and the status of the edits. Then the Board will vote on adoption of the 8 9 surveillance report under unfinished business. So be 10 ready for that. 11 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Through the Chair. 12 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes. 13 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: This would need the 14 assistance of the parliamentarian because we're in the 15 midst of approving the agenda. Would I amend the motion to move unfinished business after the presentation of the 16 17 Board? PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: Commissioner, 18 19 you can move to amend the agenda to move that presentation. Since this is being done during the 20 21 adoption of the agenda, you only need majority vote to have that motion adopted. Or it can be done through 22 unanimous consent if there's no objection. 23 24 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Okay. So my rationale for 25 that is, again, we usually have challenges making sure we



have the attendance for a vote. So to put it right after the presentations, while we're here about LPR from ACLU as well as the public hearing. Which gives us the opportunity to make that vote prior to the Chief's report, Board Secretary report and final announcements in new business.

7 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: That motion8 will require us a second.

9 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Now, wait, hang on. Still in 10 discussion.

11 COMMISSIONER: Second.

12 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: The two are going to go 13 together. Secretary's report and ACLU. Those two are 14 going to go together. So the ACLU is going to present 15 first, and then the Board Secretary is going to tell why. 16 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Correct. I'm just asking that 17 we move items of unfinished business after the

18 presentations to the Board.

19 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Fantastic. So we're just going20 to move, okay.

21 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Under discussion, Mr. Chairman.
 22 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes.

23 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I just want this body to know 24 as the Chair of the Policy Committee our committee is 25 still currently looking at this line item. We have not



1 worked on this. It's premature to pass this today without 2 the adoption or the approval or non-approval by our committee. So, right now, this item is still in our 3 committee. We have not worked on this. We had one 4 5 discussion that covers technology. We had another meeting 6 that was scheduled the following day, apparently, we were 7 not able to meet. But we are looking to bring this back so our committee can work hard on the behalf of the 8 9 citizens of Detroit on giving our recommendation from the 10 Policy subcommittee.

11

CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Okay?

12 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Those committee members that will be working on this would be myself as Chair, 13 14 Commissioner Linda Bernard and also Annie Holt, who sent 15 an email, basically saying that she was not able to 16 attend. So whenever we have something that we need to vote on or need to work on for that matter, for some 17 reason she's never available so we can actually get that 18 work done. But I do feel confident that this committee 19 20 can really give our recommendations. So right now, we 21 have not given the update nor recommendations on this. So 22 therefore, it'd be very premature to vote on this today because our committee has not worked on this. 23

24 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Okay. So let me unravel some 25 stuff here. VC Holt gave me her resignation to be off of



1 your committee, and I accepted it. So now you have a

2 committee of yourself and Commissioner Bernard. Now you

3 both have to meet for it to be a quorum.

4 COMMISSIONER BURTON: So, Mr. Chair-

5 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Let me finish.

6 COMMISSIONER BURTON: The Policy Committee have not 7 even received that letter.

8 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Point of order. Is that

9 germane to the agenda.

10 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Sir, let me finish. Let me 11 finish. So that means you have-

COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: That point of order hasn't
 been recognized.

14 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: I'm sorry. Let me finish this 15 first, sir.

16 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: I don't know if it's germane 17 to the motion that—

CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: I know. Let me finish. Let me 18 19 help him. So here it goes. So now you have a committee of two, which is okay. You and Commissioner Bernard can 20 21 meet. I'm asking you right now on record, when is that 22 policy going to come out of your committee? Since you 23 have all the documents and you've been circulating, when should we, this Board and the public expect for that to 24 come out of committee? Will it be next week? 25

1 COMMISSIONER BURTON: For starters, the Policy Committee have not looked at this. Commissioner Linda 2 3 Bernard-COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Point of order. This will be 4 the conversation for the unfinished business. So we can't 5 6 have that now. CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: You're right about that 7 because he can't give me a thing. So we're going to move 8 9 on. 10 COMMISSIONER BURTON: For the public, we are not 11 going to rubber stamp a policy. 12 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: We're not talking about rubber 13 stamps. You're chair of this. 14 COMMISSIONER BURTON: We'll do our due diligence. 15 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: I'm just asking what is the 16 date. I'm asking you for a date since you're the Chairman. 20 21 COMMISSIONER BURTON: We are looking at it right now. 22 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Okay. COMMISSIONER BURTON: It's under advisement with our 23 2.4 committee. CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner. I mean... 25

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1 ATTORNEY ADAM SAXBY: I'm sorry. Through the Chair. I want to clarify what the intent is here, because the 2 Board last week voted to move to approve the Chief's 3 recommendation to expand the LPR, which would then 4 effectively move that onto city council. That's already 5 been acted upon and approved. That was an unqualified 6 motion. So there was no provided X or depending on Y. Now 7 that said, and as a matter of first impression, I don't 8 see any legal prohibition on the Board voting to adopt a 9 report. But everything that goes into the Chief's 10 recommendation to move that matter forward was 11 12 necessarily encompassed in the previous motion. 13 Therefore, it is my recommendation, if the Board's intent 14 is to undo that recommendation to move it forward, it 15 would be a motion to reconsider. 16 ATTORNEY ADAM SAXBY: I would defer to the parliamentarian on what that would look like. But the 17 Board would need to reconsider that motion because from a 18

19 legal perspective, that motion necessarily encompassed

20 everything that came with moving that matter forward. I

21 just want to be clear on that because I'm a little

22 unclear on what the goal is here.

23 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I'm the lawyer. I disagree
24 with you and the former managing attorney for the City of
25 Detroit Law Department.

FRANCIS JACKSON: Mr. Chairman. 6 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Therefore, I intend to move 7 that the draft minutes be amended to explicitly reflect 8 these two procedure facts prior to their approval without 9 these corrections of the record. I do not intend to vote 10 for the approval of these minutes. 11 12 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Okay. Yes. PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. I'm trying not to do 20 it. Because some of your commissioners been on this Board 21 a long time and you should know better. You should. We 22 all should. If I told you once again, if I'd done 23 24 anything crazy or something to you out of line that you 25 didn't like, pull me in the hallway, tell me about it.



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CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: That's where it stays, in the hallway. But to call names and say somebody's this and that on public record. I'm not going to take that-COMMISSIONER BURTON: Point of order. Let's move on with the agenda. CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Excuse me, sir. This is my report. COMMISSIONER BURTON: Point of order. CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Please don't interrupt me. This is the exact same thing I'm talking about. Don't interrupt the Chair. You should know better. Do not interrupt the Chair. 12 COMMISSIONER: Through the Chair.

13 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: I can't do that.

But 6 that's not true. That's not. I'm not hearing it from the 7 public. That's who I'm not hearing it from and that's who 8 9 I work for. So I'm saying my time is coming short. So commissioners, please get together and find out who you 10 want to be the next Chair and Vice-Chair to lead this 11 12 Board for the next year. Again, we want to move forward, 13 not backwards.

14 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: We want to move forward, not 15 backwards. If there's anything I've done and you like it, 16 please enhance it. But if it's something I didn't do, 17 correct it. Add to it. Do something like that. Again, if 18 you are on a policy and you are the Chair of that policy, 19 please, please do your job and get those policies out of your committee into the full Board. When I put you on as 20 21 the Chairperson, I didn't put you on as a Chairperson because I didn't think you could do it. I believe you can 22 23 do it, but please do not bite that hand that gave you a hand up. I gave you a hand up. Don't bite that hand. 24 25 That's all I'm asking. That's all I'm asking.



2 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Okay, I'm done.

3 COMMISSIONER BURTON: For the record-

4 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: We're going to move on.

5 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I want the citizens to know

6 that the Policy Committee has been working. We've been

7 working on a number of policies. We had great

8 presentations from great organizational leaders who came

9 before our committee. But the thing about it is one of

10 the mayor appointees that serve on that committee when

11 it's time to move on matters, doesn't show. The

12 chairperson of this Board, which is you Ferguson. You can 13 go to any other subcommittee meeting and help move things 14 along. But when it comes to the policy committee, you are 15 a no show. So it falls on you.

16 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Excuse me, sir.

17 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Your lack of service.

18 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Excuse me, sir.

19 COMMISSIONER BURTON: But the committee has been 20 working and I have been doing a great job with this 21 committee and getting things out to my committee members. 22 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Okay, first of all, I'm an ex 23 officio. I do not step on anybody's toes when it comes to 24 the committee, especially the Chairperson on that 25 committee. So that's you. I asked you point blank in



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1	front of everybody in here. When do you plan on getting
2	that policy out of your committee? You couldn't give me
3	an answer. if you asked me, I could. I can give you an
4	answer right away, but you couldn't. Now I stay away from
5	your committee because I let you handle it. I let you, do

12	CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: I have accepted it. I'll send
13	it to you.
14	COMMISSIONER BURTON: I received the letter-
15	CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: I'll send it to you-
16	COMMISSIONER BURTON: Cannot not make it.
17	Resignation-
18	CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: No, I'll send it to you.
19	COMMISSIONER BURTON: A big difference.
20	CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: You'll get it in a second.
21	CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Point of order.
22	CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes.
23	CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Pardon to the Chair. Can we please
24	move on-

25 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: We are.



1 COMMISSIONER BURTON: If she put her resignation in, that's because she wasn't prepared to do the work. I've 2 sent her policy-3 4 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Holley has the floor, sir. 5 6 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I have not got one-CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Holley has the 7 8 floor-COMMISSIONER BURTON: Recommendations from her-9 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner. 10 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I have received recommendations 11 12 from-13 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Sir, please-COMMISSIONER BURTON: Commissioner Bernard. 14 15 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Holley has the floor. 16 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Burton, I appeal to you, to your character that you have and for your 17 representation of your constituents. I just want you to 18 know that you have a right to speak. You've spoken, but 19 we have a responsibility to the community of 20 professionalism. Certainly, you and the Chairman can have 21 this conversation outside. But I appeal to your inner 22 23 being that you allow us to get this moving forward. We respect what you said, and we will hear from you from 24 25 your committee. But I ask that you allow the Chairman to



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1 move this with your help and with who you represent and 2 from this city and for your decency. I ask that you as an 3 old man to a young man, just if you would please let us 4 just move this to the next level. I appreciate it so 5 much. I thank you for listening to me and thank you for 6 taking my suggestion. Thank you for that. Mr. Chairman. 7 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Go right ahead, Chief.

8 ASSISTANT CHIEF FITZGERALD: Yes.

9 ASSISTANT CHIEF FITZGERALD: Once again, Charles FITZGERALD, Assistant Chief sitting in for Chief White. 10 He would be here. But unfortunately, we had a medical 11 12 emergency half an hour prior to this meeting. We had a 13 command officer taken to the hospital. She's responsive 14 now, but we could continue prayers would be fantastic. 15 I'll move quickly through his agenda items. Crime data, 16 we're even this morning on criminal homicides. We have 99 17 this year. 99 last year. Non-Fatal shootings. Over the past few weeks, we've seen a nice little decline in our 18 year-to-date numbers. So we are under slightly at 3%. We 19 have 274 this year. 282 last year. We're still up 20 21 slightly in robberies. 527 to 507 last year where total 22 part 1 violent crime is still showing slight uptick. The 23 aggravated assaults, we're trying to do our best to get a handle on that, which we think we're making some ground 24 25 now. So more to come with that. But we are still showing



a 6% increase. Our drifting drag racing enforcement still
 continues weekly.

3 ASSISTANT CHIEF FITZGERALD: We were thankful to have a nice slow weekend last weekend where we only had to one 4 5 traffic stop. We had to investigate 7 vehicles which were nice. It's down considerably. So that's it's definitely 6 going in the right direction. As far as mental health 7 calls for service this year to last year, we're up right 8 around about 10% a little over 5,000. About 5,600 this 9 year versus 5,000 last year. So those folks are staying 10 busy. A couple of significant incidents I want to discuss 11 12 really quickly. Back on April 10th it was about nine 13 o'clock at night 1800 thousand block of Fitzpatrick Court. A child, five-year-old was unconscious taken to 14 15 the hospital where they later died just this past week 16 through the ME report. It looks like the child was given 17 way too much of an illegal substance. Mom was brought in, mom came in, admitted to the fact that she gave the child 18 some heroin to help the child sleep and the child died. 19 20 ASSISTANT CHIEF FITZGERALD: We sought charges. They 21 were signed homicide, felony murder, child abuse, first degree, delivery of a controlled substance causing death. 22 The suspect has been remanded with no bond. Just an 23 awful, awful case. Next one was an update to the triple 24 25 shooting that was mentioned earlier at the 12,000 block



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of McNichols where the store clerk locked the three 1 2 individuals in the store. We pursued charges and we were very thankful on May 18th, Wayne County prosecutor's 3 office charged the gas station clerk for refusing to open 4 5 the door. He was charged with involuntary manslaughter. 6 He was taken into custody and was given a \$200,000 cash bond. The last incident once again, this past weekend, 7 another little one, I say five-year-old got ahold of a 8 9 qun. At least that's the story that we have at this point and shot off his left thumb. 10

ASSISTANT CHIEF FITZGERALD: So again, it's kids that 11 12 are getting ahold of these weapons that it's just 13 ridiculous to me that they can still do it. Every time 14 this happens, we beg and plead and beg and plead. 15 Hopefully, someone, the folks that we really need to hear 16 it will hear it eventually. So child abuse is the case. There were three adult individuals in the house. We've 17 pursued charges on all of them. So we're waiting for the 18 final review from the Wayne County Prosecutor's Office. 19 Some more to come with that. But again, another young man 20 that will not have the use of his left thumb moving 21 22 forward. Just very sad and unfortunate. Just shouldn't 23 happen. Some positive stories. I know you're all thanking me for that to get off of that other subject. We had five 24 25 officers reinstated on May 19th.



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1 ASSISTANT CHIEF FITZGERALD: That's now brings the total to 37 officers returned to our department, so 2 that's good news. Chief White on Wednesday yesterday 3 attended press conference up in Lansing. There's funding 4 available for law enforcement agencies. We're seeking to 5 get approximately 25 million that would allow us to hire 6 approximately 200 additional officers. So that would be 7 outstanding. We had the hundred club luncheon yesterday, 8 the 59th annual for our families and surviving families 9 of our lost loved ones. It was a wonderful turnout. 10 Christine Corson, her beautiful daughter Devin, was 11 12 there. Just really nice. Lastly Chief White attended the 13 one Detroit Partnership yesterday in the US Attorney's 14 Office. It's going to be very well received. We're going 15 to spend a lot of time this summer in the Eighth to Ninth 16 Precinct with our federal partners trying to make those precincts as safe as possible to do what we can to drive 17 down some of that violent crime. 18

ASSISTANT CHIEF FITZGERALD: So, with that, sir oh, one more thing. We have a graduation class tomorrow morning. It will be at Wayne County Community College, the Northwest Campus, 8,200 west Outer Drive. We are looking to get believe 20 additional officers out to the streets as of Saturday. So more good news. So that's all I have, sir. Pending any other questions?



CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Fantastic. Commissioner
 Burton.

COMMISSIONER BURTON: Question for the Chief. What is 3 4 the department's focus to encourage young men in the city 5 of Detroit to join this department? Also, how are you all trying to win back some of the officers that you have 6 7 lost from this department? This is not Commissioner Burton's question to you Chief. This is from some of my 8 9 constituents, and they wanted me to raise that here 10 today.

ASSISTANT CHIEF FITZGERALD: Yes, certainly through 11 12 the Chair. We have, I say we, Director Patillo who's on 13 the line and could probably answer. She has so many new 14 programs that she's created to bring the attention back 15 to DPD to get young folks to be encouraged to come. They 16 go to every high school in the city, every middle school, 17 every college in the city, every college outside of the 18 city. She's also created a new program where officers can refer officers that once left and want to come back. So 19 20 now they get another monetary stipend, a little bonus for bringing folks back. We also have another monetary bonus 21 for folks that do come back that want a lateral from a 2.2 23 different department. Say you're out in, and I'm not picking on Novi, just the first city I thought of. If 24 25 someone from Novi wanted to leave and come to the great



1 city of Detroit, they can come.

ASSISTANT CHIEF FITZGERALD: With that we can pay some of their moving expenses, that kind of stuff. So there are so many programs, billboards, radio announcements, they're out at just about every event. You'll see them at a Tigers game. The Michigan Panthers on the weekend, you'll see them downtown for weekend deployment.

COMMISSIONER BURTON: Will we also see more officers 9 on patrol across the city, other than just certain 10 sectors of the city? We notice in the evening, at night 11 12 there's a lot of concentration with law enforcement 13 downtown. But many of my constituents feel like the 14 businesses downtown can actually have their own private 15 security instead of relying so much heavily on DPD. But 16 that concludes all my questions for you today, Chief. 17 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Okay. Commissioner Hernandez.

18 None.

19 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Thank you.

20 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Banks.

21 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Through the Chair. Peace and 22 blessings to you Chief. Now a 25 million grant. That just 23 brings you only to be able to hire 25 police officers. We 24 talking about a 25 million grant?

25 ASSISTANT CHIEF FITZGERALD: No sir. It's 200

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1 officers. 200.

2 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Okay. I'm sorry.

3 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: That's okay.

4 COMMISSIONER BANKS: I got it wrong. Okay. I'm sorry.
5 Alright, I'm all set.

CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Pressley. 6 7 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Thank you. Through the Chair. My question is relative to what was brought up in public 8 comment relative to the release of the footage for Porter 9 Burks. We were told that we were waiting on the Chief's 10 review. Do you have a status on where we are with that? 11 ASSISTANT CHIEF FITZGERALD: I do not. But I wrote it 12 13 down in my notes. The Chief didn't say that he was going 14 to. He's going to release it when he feels comfortable 15 releasing it. I don't know if he necessarily gave a 16 specific date, but he does have it now in his office. I'll follow up with him to ensure. 17 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Yeah, I don't know if we were 18

19 given a specific date either. I mean, I was given a 20 timeline on when the Chief might have completed his 21 review. So that was what we were told. We were waiting on 22 the Chief to do his review and then the video would be 23 released.

ASSISTANT CHIEF FITZGERALD: Yes, sir. I will follow 25 up with him.



1 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Thank you.

2 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Bernard.

3 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I want to follow up on your 4 last comment. Deputy, I mean, deputy Chief. It is

5 correct. No, Assistant Chief.

6 ASSISTANT CHIEF FITZGERALD: Assistant Chief.

7 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I'm sorry.

8 ASSISTANT CHIEF FITZGERALD: No, it's okay.

COMMISSIONER BERNARD: You are one of my favorites. 9 10 But anyway, I am, as a commissioner, not comfortable as you put it with the Chief delaying his response. I mean 11 12 giving this video to the community. That whole scenario 13 about Pope, the Chief is not comfortable doing this when 14 he has pledged himself to transparency. When he has 15 pledged himself to accountability. This is now eight 16 months old. It is unacceptable, period. This Board needs to vote on a resolution to that effect, ordering the 17 Chief to release the video. We still are the commission 18 over the office of the chief. Now, I understand that the 19 Chief works for the mayor, but he was also in the pool of 20 people that we selected to be Chief. He has a 21 responsibility to the citizens of the city of Detroit. 22 23 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: That responsibility is not circumscribed by whether he feels comfortable or 24 uncomfortable. It is irrelevant. The bottom line is that 25



1 it's supposed to be released to the community. Secondly 2 you mentioned that you were going to hire 200 officers 3 with 25 million.

4 ASSISTANT CHIEF FITZGERALD: The grant.

5 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: May I suggest to you, and you 6 could tell the Chief, he cannot police his way out of crime in the city of Detroit. We all know that the causes 7 of crime are unrelated to policing. They're related to 8 9 poverty, education, and other things. A substantial part of that 25 million should go to community organizations, 10 churches, other things who are actively engaging youth in 11 12 the community. It's not more officers. It is more 13 involvement by the people who can reach out and touch 14 someone. Police officers don't do that routinely in the 15 city of Detroit. As you know, most of them don't even 16 live in Detroit. So that's impossible for them to just 17 reach out and touch someone.

COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Then finally, you mentioned 18 that the Brain County prosecutor had brought charges 19 against the man who locked the doors. May I suggest that 20 the City of Detroit Police Department issue numerous 21 citations for all of the violations and BSE can do it as 2.2 23 well and IMO regarding the fact that the door was locked, fire code violation, all of the violations, and that 24 those violations should be served on the owner or the 25



corporation that owns that facility. It's not enough that
 that one person is being prosecuted. This is a business
 issue, a business crime. These crimes should be addressed
 by the owners of that business.

COMMISSIONER BERNARD: So please, I would suggest 5 6 strongly that because there was a life loss as a result of this. The numerous violations that exist, including 7 not having a business license, all of which have 8 financial penalties as well as criminal penalties 9 attached to them for the owners of those corporations. 10 They should be indicted or certainly be cited by you as 11 12 well. That's all I have to say. Mr. Chair.

13 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner VC.

14 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you Chair. Thank you, assistant Chief FITZGERALD. The Chair and I were at the 15 16 Eight Precinct community relations meeting this past Monday. The US Attorney General for the Eastern District, 17 18 Attorney Dawn Ison passed out these flyers. Apparently, there will be an initiative in the City of Detroit that's 19 title One Detroit. If I may, the focus federal agents 20 from ATF and FBI alongside Detroit Police, will focus 21 22 enforcement efforts in Detroit's most violent areas, Detroit's Eight and Ninth Precincts lead the city in 23 24 homicides and several other areas of violent crime in 2023. Obviously having this information shared at this 25



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1 level, and I mean, not only did she pass out the flyer,
2 she verbalized the same message. What does it look like
3 for a precinct to unfortunately demonstrate being one of
4 the highest precincts to be forced to report the highest
5 homicide rate?

6 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: What are we talking about? I'm 7 looking at the Chief's report for May the 25th, which 8 obviously is today. It's noted that the precinct in 2022 reported 13 criminal homicides and we reported the same 9 stats in 2023. The Ninth Precinct in 2022, reported 17. 10 11 Fortunately for us, their stats went down for 2023, 15 12 homicides. I guess it's interesting when you say the 13 worst homicide rate in a city, apparently one homicide 14 can rate and be a very disparity to the community. So 15 from what she's saying, there will be a charge in the 16 city of Detroit to supposedly combat those kind of 17 statistics, even though they're 13 and not 24. So again, 18 one homicide must rate very highly in this community.

ASSISTANT CHIEF FITZGERALD: Yes, ma'am. Through the Chair, just briefly. Last year the Ninth Precinct ended with 45 homicides. They led the city.

22 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay.

ASSISTANT CHIEF FITZGERALD: Number Eight, we had 37.24 They were second in the city.

25 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay.



ASSISTANT CHIEF FITZGERALD: If I go back 2, 3, 4, 5, 9 years, they're fairly consistent where they've made the 9 charge most of the time. So this year they're showing 9 yreat numbers, great success.

5 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Right.

ASSISTANT CHIEF FITZGERALD: As part of and like 6 Commissioner Burton asked earlier, how do we staff. How 7 do we send people? We staff based on crime? Part 1 crime 8 9 calls for service population included. So the Eighth Precinct has the highest amount of staffing in the city. 10 Ninth Precinct has the second highest. So that's how we 11 12 staff and that's how. Earlier I kind of heard it. I quess 13 what is the charge for Eight to Ninth Precinct command 14 team?

15 ASSISTANT CHIEF FITZGERALD: It's not very 16 comfortable sometimes because when they sit here at 17 CompStat, we go through these things. We go through individual cases, specific things, what they should be 18 doing, how they could be doing things better. It gets 19 rather uncomfortable for them. So very, very incredible 20 professionals. They're doing a good job. Please don't 21 feel that bad for them because we actually do pay them to 22 do their job. But it's a challenge. When you're a command 23 officer and you get the Eighth or Ninth Precinct, there's 24 25 a lot of heavy lifting going on. If that helps you at all



1 with your-

CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Well, yes it does. With the
comparisons you made with the 40 numbers or so. Yes.
Thank you for your explanation.

5 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Holley.

CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Through the Chair. Assistant 6 7 Chief, I thank you for your presence being here today. My concern is that a citizen that is the first response to 8 9 us was a commander was removed after we promoted him and he was sent to the precinct. Now my understanding is, is 10 that he was going there not to stay, but to basically 11 12 substitute because of someone else being absent for a 13 couple of weeks. Now I need to, I need to know what was 14 going on with that commander. If you have anything to 15 tell.

16 ASSISTANT CHIEF FITZGERALD: That is correct. The captain at the time was moved to the Second Precinct 17 because we were going to move the commander out for a 18 little bit in a temporary assignment. The captain that 19 was presently there was on vacation. He had some time 20 off. So the captain went. Once we the Chief submitted the 21 paperwork for his promotion, the original talk was that 22 he would stay at the Second Precinct, but he has since 23 24 been moved back to the 10th Precinct where he came from. The former commander of the Second Precinct is now back 25



1 at the Second Precinct.

2 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: So you could say to us that 3 there was no malfeasant that was done in regards to him 4 being there or not being there.

5 ASSISTANT CHIEF FITZGERALD: Correct, sir.

6 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay. The other thing, Minister. Blount who's consistently on point many times when he 7 comes to these meetings and certainly to Commissioner 8 9 Bernard who's very passionate about these kinds of things. It's unfair for us to really beat upon you as we 10 do as sometimes as we do, because you're basically just 11 12 here for the Chief. But I think it's important that when 13 you go back and it's important that we have our own 14 integrity, that we have character as a Board, and that 15 when things are promised to us that our Secretary should 16 be notified if it's not going to be for whatever reason. 17 My concern is that the community is losing faith in us. 18 We had a survey done. It's not that bad, but the point 19 is, it's enough for us to say we must have integrity. When things are promised to us, if we just kind of say 20 21 that we need to have that cooperation. Am I making sense 22 to you?

23 ASSISTANT CHIEF FITZGERALD: Yes.

24 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Because when we talk about 25 George Floyd, I protested at one time to state to the



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community. I was just pleased with that situation. But 1 also, I want you to understand since then, 3000 homicides 2 had taken place since George Floyd's death, 3000. Now if 3 you want to fact check me do that. But 3,000 has, has 4 5 taken place since he's died. So I'm just saying to you 6 again that we need to just make sure that some 7 cooperation we give and we take, but we have a fiduciary responsibility to the community that if something's 8 9 promised, the promises should be kept. If the Secretary is brought in to just inform us so that we can at least 10 11 let the community know we are on top of it. I'm not 12 talking at you, I'm just saying to you, if you could take 13 the message back. If you could please, that's what our 14 concern is.

15 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: It's integrity, character, 16 transparency, and when things get hot, we are always the 17 one that's going to basically have your back. Am I right? That's what we are here for. When things are right, we 18 19 are behind you. When things are wrong, we are here to basically to talk about how we can correct it. So I just 20 want to thank you for your setting in. But I also want to 21 say to you, try to make sure that the office knows this 22 team knows we have a responsibility. When we don't do 23 24 that, then it seems like we are not doing our job. Help 25 us with that if you would please.



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1 ASSISTANT CHIEF FITZGERALD: Yeah, certainly. Through the Chair. I'm just slightly lost. Is there something 2 3 that you were-CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I'm sorry. The video. 4 5 ASSISTANT CHIEF FITZGERALD: Okay. 6 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Please forgive me. ASSISTANT CHIEF FITZGERALD: No, that's okay. It's 7 just when I hear things about integrity and transparency-8 9 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I'm talking us though. ASSISTANT CHIEF FITZGERALD: No, I understand that, 10 but it was Chief White that stood up here in this room 11 12 the day and a half after that incident happened and 13 showed the video. I don't know what more could be seen, 14 but I will say that there are other things that are 15 pending. There's pending civil litigation there, say 16 pending has nothing to do with, they're detrimental to 17 the department. So that's why when I say comfortable, the Chief needs to be comfortable to release everything else 18 that you may want. But he showed the video. I don't know 19 what more you need. 20 21 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Again, Mr. Chairman, I'm not 22 here to debate it with you. I have a Secretary. My secretary informs the Board. I need to know before I come 23

25 communication goes through her so that we don't want to

24



here a reason why I don't have this or that because the

1 have this conversation.

2 ASSISTANT CHIEF FITZGERALD: Yeah.

3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: But I hear you loud and clear.

4 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Okay. Now I would like to have 5 the Board's permission to let Ms. Hill speak. She didn't 6 get a chance to speak on public comment. Is that okay for 7 the Board?

8 COMMISSIONER: Sure.

9 COMMISSIONER: Sure.

10 COMMISSIONER: Yes.

11 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Okay. Ms. Hill, are you there?

12 Mrs. Hill? She's still there, Mr. Brown? is she unmuted?

13 MR. BROWN: Yes, she's unmuted.

14 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Ms. Hill, go right ahead.

15 MR. BROWN: Not on her end though.

16 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: What's that?

17 MR. BROWN: Not unmuted on her end.

18 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Unmute. Unmute, please Unmute.
19 Ms. Hill. Going once. Mrs. Hill, going twice. Okay, now
20 we're going to have the presentation.

21 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Mr. Chairman, just before 22 that, I believe Chief, that you had asked for what were 23 the things that I think Commissioner Holley mentioned as 24 well, the things that are promised should be delivered at 25 the last meeting. As I said earlier, the Chief stated



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1 that he will provide the number of scout cars that are equipped with license plate readers at a later date. This 2 is the later date. So we still need that information. I 3 apologize to you if I sounded overly vigorous in my 4 comments, but the issue is not comfort and it's not 5 litigation. The City of Detroit Law Department has a huge 6 litigation section and a litigation section with outside 7 town. We're defending lawsuits every day. Everything from 8 bus accidents to police misconduct. So that is not a 9 reason for not having transparency with the community, as 10 you and I both well know. Thank you. 11

12 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: I would like the record to 13 reflect that Commissioner Banks has entered. Sorry for 14 that. Commissioner Banks. All right. Now we would like to 15 hear from ACLU on the LPR presentation. You have 10 16 minutes, sir.

17 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: What's his name?

18 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: State your name.

19 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

20 MR. WADOAD: Good afternoon, Board.

21 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: The microphone. Speak up 22 please. Thank you. I appreciate you.

23 MR. WADOAD: Good afternoon. My name is Ramis WADOAD. 24 I'm an attorney at the ACLU of Michigan and a District 5 25 resident. I'm here to talk today about the proposal



that's been before this Board for a little bit of time on 1 automated license plate readers. I have a presentation on 2 the Board, but before I get into the slides, I just 3 wanted to say that the ACLU of Michigan is committed to 4 promoting public participation in the Democratic process. 5 We were strong supporters of the community input over 6 government surveillance ordinance when it passed a couple 7 years ago in the city council. That ordinance gave this 8 Board a considerable role whenever the police department 9 attempts to seek whatever type of surveillance technology 10 it wants to seek. 11

12 MR. WADOAD: So because of that commitment, I would 13 be remiss if I didn't mention and expressed my 14 disappointment in the way that the BOPC handled last 15 week's discussion and vote on LPRs. The Board heard from 16 Chief White and Chief White only, and then voted to suspend the rules so that they could pull up a vote on 17 supporting the Chief's recommendation. In my opinion, 18 that flies in the face of the spirit of the community 19 Input ordinance. That is not a public debate. That is not 20 oversight. I will give some credit to the Board where a 21 22 couple weeks ago, the Board's Policy Committee invited a number of community leaders to speak and provide their 23 24 input on the LPR proposal.

25 MR. WADOAD: But this entire Board, the full Board,



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1 needs to hear from the public. I hope that this presentation contributes to that conversation. Perhaps 2 because of the Board's haste last week there's a lot of 3 confusion over whether or not this Board even voted to 4 adopt the surveillance specification report. Chair 5 Ferguson and Commissioner Bernard have stated that that 6 7 vote is still pending. The attorney's placard doesn't state his name, but the Board's attorney stated the 8 opposite. So I hope that we can continue this 9 conversation. I believe the vote is still outstanding and 10 that this presentation can just be the beginning of the 11 public's actual input into this debate and into the 12 13 Board's consideration of whether or not to adopt this 14 specification report, which it is an equal drafter with 15 the police department.

16 MR. WADOAD: So with all that said, let me jump into the presentation that is now on the board. If you can go 17 to the next slide. So, I just wanted to reiterate the 18 proposal that's on the table. Just so we're on the same 19 page. The Detroit Police Department is proposing to 20 purchase a number of automated license plate reader 21 cameras and place them at strategic locations around the 22 city. This is the map that the police department provided 23 to the Board and to the city council. You can go to the 24 25 next page. Just to provide a little bit of explanation



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about how these cameras operate and really what the
 technology is that you're considering. This technology
 not only captures license plate numbers, but the time,
 date, and GPS location of where that license plate number
 was caught.

6 MR. WADOAD: Not just the license plate number, but the make and model of the car, other identifying features 7 such as bumper stickers, other scratches, and dents on 8 9 the car. So this isn't just a license plate reader. If you can go to the next slide. This is really capturing 10 the vehicle footprint as these vendors call it. Not just 11 12 the license plate, but where that license plate was, what 13 the car that holds that license plate really looks like. 14 It's able to, across time and across space, map that 15 vehicle's location as it traverses the city. If you can 16 go to the next slide. The more data it collects, the more 17 points it can plot on this map. The more points that the police department has in its database as far as its 18 ability to search and track license plates and the cars 19 that hold those license plates. 20

21 MR. WADOAD: Over time, jurisdictions across the 22 country have collected millions and millions of "plate 23 reads" or data points on what a license plate number is 24 and where and when it is in that jurisdiction. That 25 doesn't, of course, just apply to residence of the



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jurisdiction, but any visitor that passes through a city. 1 Can you go to the next slide, please? So what does this 2 3 technology really mean for Detroiters? It's not simply a set of cameras that capture license plates. What the 4 5 Detroit Police Department is proposing is to create what can essentially be considered a mass surveillance 6 network, capturing not only license plates, like I said, 7 but when and where almost every Detroiter that passes by 8 9 these cameras, almost every visitor that passes by these 10 cameras when and where they are across time and across face to the degree of specificity that these cameras 11 12 capture the direction of that person's travel.

13 MR. WADOAD: So, obviously, I think we can all agree 14 that the vast majority of people perverting our streets 15 are innocent of any alleged crimes of any suspected 16 misconduct. So what we're looking at here is a proposal to treat all Detroiters and all visitors to Detroit as 17 potential suspects in alleged crimes, and to tract the 18 real-time whereabouts without those folks having 19 committed a crime. That raises three primary concerns 20 that I'll address today. One is the accuracy and 21 effectiveness of the technology itself. The second is 22 23 privacy and data retention issues. The third is data sharing issues. You can go to the next slide. So first I 24 will address accuracy and effectiveness. So license plate 25



readers, like all surveillance technology, like all
 technology, is a developing technology. It's not perfect.
 It's flawed in many ways. It's not a hundred percent
 accurate.

MR. WADOAD: To really understand, these are cameras 5 6 that are capturing high-speed moving vehicles and attempting to transcribe the license plates on the back 7 of those vehicles. That camera could transcribe a one as 8 9 an I, it could transcribe an O as a zero. We, at the ACLU 10 over the last years, have received reports of incorrect transcription of license plates. The result of that 11 12 imperfect technology is someone who is completely 13 innocent, completely unconnected to any suspected crime, 14 is then subject to an unwarranted and frankly, terrifying 15 police confrontation where their vehicle came up in 16 connection with a crime. It could be a serious crime. That police officer approaches that individual as a 17 suspect, as a potential offender of that crime. They're 18 19 also not very effective as far as costs and benefit go. The proposal on the table is to spend \$5 million. 3.8 20 million of which are Covid relief funds on this 21 22 technology.

23 MR. WADOAD: But the benefits we're talking about 24 when we talk about spending \$5 million on cameras, is at 25 most a handful of potential leads, most of which have to



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1 deal with vehicle registration issues and emissions issues. If you can go to the next slide. The ACLU has 2 analyzed data from the state of Maryland from license 3 plate readers across the state of Maryland. We've 4 5 determined that for every 1 million plates scanned by 6 license plate readers across Maryland-roll to the next slide-only about 2000 or 0.2% of those license plate 7 reads are hits against various lists of potential suspect 8 vehicles or vehicles that are connected to any ongoing 9 crime or traffic violation. If you go to the next slide, 10 that 2000 number is even misleading. The majority of 11 12 those 2000 hits are for registration issues and emissions 13 violations like I mentioned.

14 MR. WADOAD: If you go to the next slide, only 47 of 15 those 2000 hits according to our data analysis, were 16 connected with serious crimes. So it's obviously difficult to conduct a cost benefit analysis when lives 17 are on the line, when public safety's on the line. But 18 what we're essentially talking about here is \$5 million 19 for, at most, according to our analysis. Again, this is a 20 statewide analysis versus a consideration for a citywide 21 proposal. 47 leads, these are a license plate hits and a 22 conviction comes out. These are 47 leads on potential 23 suspects for an alleged crime. You can go to the next 24 25 slide. I wanted to talk about privacy issues,



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1 specifically data retention and data sharing. Now, like I mentioned at the front of this presentation, these 2 3 cameras aren't just capturing license plate numbers. MR. WADOAD: They're capturing the make and model of 4 5 the car, the bumper stickers on the car, the time and GPS location of the license plate read, the direction of 6 travel to create a full footprint of where, when, and 7 what this vehicle is. To really just expand the scope of 8 that immediate plate read, what we're talking about is 9 DPD proposing to keep a database of innocent travelers 10 throughout Detroit, not only of their license plate 11 12 again, but of this entire footprint of information about 13 that person and about that vehicle, and not only to keep 14 that database, but to share it with 30 plus police agencies around the area that DPD has data sharing 15 16 agreements with keeping a database of innocent civilians 17 just in the event that they may be connected to a crime in the future. Treating those innocent civilians as 18 potential suspects is antithetical to a free and 19 democratic society. You go to the next slide. It's the 20 21 same reason we-22 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: That was 10 minutes, sir. 23 MR. WADOAD: Okay. 24 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: I'm sorry.

25 MR. WADOAD: That's totally fine.



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CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: I'm sorry. I mean you spent
 eight minutes scolding us.

3 MR. WADOAD: I know. I completely understand. I'm
4 happy to-

5 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: We do have your presentation.

6 I was following right along with your presentation.

7 Awesome presentation. We need to hear from the Board

8 Secretary for the sake of time right now.

9 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair.

10 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you.

11 COMMISSIONER BURTON: No disrespect.

12 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Almost finished.

13 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair. No

14 disrespect. We heard a lot longer from the presentation

15 from the Detroit Police Department, but the ACLU is

16 getting a very limited time.

17 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: How much time have you got,

18 sir? How much time, sir?

25

19 COMMISSIONER BURTON: ACLU.

20 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Sir, please. I'm going to let-

21 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Presentation.

22 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: How much more time do you
23 have?

24 MR. WADOAD: I can wrap up in two more minutes.



CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Okay. Go right ahead.

MR. WADOAD: Thank you. Thank you, Chair.
 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: We're going to lose. Go ahead.
 Go ahead.

MR. WADOAD: No, I appreciate the extra time. I want 4 to just drive home the point is what, the Board's 5 6 responsibility. Obviously, you're not the ones giving the funds to the police department to procure this 7 technology. Your responsibility here is to be an equal 8 drafter with the police department on the specification 9 report. There are a number of concerns that I've 10 mentioned that are not reflected in the specification 11 12 report. It's this Board's responsibility to be an equal 13 drafter, to really take a close look at the specification 14 report and to provide considerable criticism and edits 15 before blindly accepting that specification report. 16 That's what the community input over government surveillance ordinance gives this Board the role and the 17 authority to do. I think it's the Board's responsibility 18 to play that equal role with the police department and 19 not just to accept a document with minor edits that the 20 police department has submitted to this Board. 21

22 MR. WADOAD: So I would ask that this be the 23 beginning of a conversation, not the end. This Board 24 really consider and take back specification report, 25 provide edits that's in your expertise and your



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1 responsibility as representatives of constituents to 2 provide to the police department and then to move forward as equals, not simply as a rubber stamp to the police 3 4 department. As equals towards the city council. So I appreciate the extra time. 5 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Alright, thank you. Now, we're 6 7 going to take questions after Ms. SHAH gives her side. Go ahead Ms. SHAH. 8 9 MS. SHAH: Thank you, Mr. Chair.

CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Oh, I'm sorry. The Board side.
 Go right ahead, Ms. SHAH.

MS. SHAH: Thank you, Mr. Chair. I'll make sure to 12 13 stay within my 10 minutes. So if we can have the 14 presentation up please. Good afternoon, honorable Board 15 and listening community. Commissioner, this presentation 16 in the most recent version of the LPR specification report can be found in the front pocket of your binder. 17 I'll provide an overview of the feedback received from 18 the public on the LPRs on May 11th and May 18th, and the 19 status of the specification report edits. The Board is 20 already voted to support the expansion of license plate 21 readers. So this is not a discussion around if the 22 expansion happens, but instead under what conditions it 23 happens. That is what the specification report is about. 24 We appreciate the tremendous amount of information 25



1 received by the Policy Committee and the BOPC staff on LPRs from DPD, the ACLU and other community resources. 2 MS. SHAH: I do want to recognize the BOPC 3 administrative team for really stepping up to research 4 and develop educational materials for the Board and the 5 public over the last several weeks. The staff is 6 7 committed to working with DPD to get this specification report to a place where the public's concerns are 8 9 addressed, and DPD has the tools to do their job. Next slide. Oh, no, we're on the right slide. Let's stay 10 there. Based on public feedback on the 11th and the 18th 11 12 of May, much of the concern was around ineffectiveness to solve the problems at hand, civil liberty infringement, 13 14 privacy and excess surveillance. This slide just shows 15 the number of individuals that gave feedback and if they 16 were supported, if they didn't support, and if they supported with conditions. We also included there the 17 number of emails that were received as well. 18

MS. SHAH: So the next slide goes into the individual changes that were requested. So the staff and I have been redlining the LPR specification report to address the concerns that have been raised by commissioners and the community. The back and forth with DPD has been very productive. DPD has adopted quite a few recommendations that we brought to them. So we do really appreciate that.



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1 The seven items with the green status were accepted by DPD. And I'll just go through those. So the first one is 2 clarifying that technology is able to capture drivers, 3 passenger, and personal property, but that is not the 4 5 intent of the technology. So that was adopted. The clarification that automatic comparison of information is 6 what was initially indicated, and that that's been 7 updated to specify license plates is the information that 8 is being compared. 9

MS. SHAH: The next item is around oversight 10 reporting. So there are specific elements that DPD will 11 12 be delivering to BOPC within 15 days of DPD. Identifying 13 that protected information or information that was not 14 supposed to be collected was indeed collected. That will 15 be reported to the Board. So we did get that request 16 clarification that the retention policy referenced is DPD only policy and that it is in compliance with Michigan 17 Law. Another item here regarding oversight reporting. 18 This one indicates that DPD will provide BOPC with a list 19 of the DPD members that have LPR technology access. So 20 that's now included in the report. We also have added 21 that there's a prohibition for taking photographs of 22 personal property that was added with a slight tweak to 23 24 the words prohibits willful taking of those photographs. 25 MS. SHAH: Then the last one in green is oversight



reporting indicating how many law enforcement agencies 1 DPD has sharing data sharing agreements with that was not 2 identified before in the report. So that the report has 3 been updated to indicate 31, which is the current number 4 5 at this time. Also, DPD added that they will update BOPC 6 on a monthly basis when that number changes. The items in yellow were adopted with some slight tweaks. A kind of a 7 meet in the middle type of discussion happened on those. 8 9 So for the oversight reporting we were looking for DPD to provide BOPC with the list of agencies that DPD has the 10 sharing agreement with. DPD verbally agreed to provide 11 12 that list but did not agree to actually indicate that in 13 the report.

14 MS. SHAH: The next one is in the case where 15 protected information is collected by the technology 16 where it should not have been collected, we were looking for an immediate deletion of that information and that 17 language was entered as deleted as soon as practical. 18 Then the last one in yellow is stored data on DPD servers 19 20 is what we were looking for rather than a centralized location. This data will instead be stored on vendor 21 servers, but those vendor servers do meet federal 22 security standards. Moving on to the next slide. These 23 24 are the items that are in red because they were not 25 adopted. We did not reach an agreement with DPD on these,



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1 and there's not an expectation to obtain all of these as 2 written, but to meet in some type of middle ground. So for number one we were looking to agree on a proposed 3 data management flow chart and add that chart either to 4 5 the report or as a supplemental document will be fine. 6 MS. SHAH: DPD did agree to collaborate on a data management flow chart, and that work has not started just 7 yet. The next one is ensuring that license plate reads 8 that do not have a match to a hot list are not stored. 9 We're looking for immediately destroyed. We talked about 10 11 privacy concerns. Data management is very important. The 12 longer that data is stored, there's an increased risk of 13 breaches and or inappropriate usage. Data retention 14 policies vary by state and city. For example, Jersey 15 City, New Jersey. There, they delete their LPR data after 16 five years. When their database was looked at in August 17 of 2012, there were 10 million reads just sitting in the database. On the contrary, Minnesota State patrol deletes 18 19 after 48 hours, so they only have about 20,000 reads sitting in the database at any given point. So, at any 20 21 given point, which is a huge difference. Currently in DPD 22 specification report the retention period for all reeds, even those that are not a hit against a hot list is 30 23 days or 90 days depending on the manufacturer. 24 25 MS. SHAH: Number three we were looking to ensure



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1 that license plate reads that do not have a match in the 2 hot list are also not shared. That was not accepted. Number four we were looking to indicate that DPD will not 3 enter into data sharing agreements with non-law 4 5 enforcement entities for sharing LPR data at all, or to 6 do so only with BOPC approval. So emphasis here is nonlaw enforcement agencies, like universities. So if 7 there's a reason that DPD needs to release this data to a 8 9 non-law enforcement agency, BOPC should understand why it's necessary and have the discretion to approve that 10 release. For number five. This one is around ensuring 11 12 that law enforcement agencies with the data sharing 13 agreements only use that data the same way DPD does. 14 MS. SHAH: So if DPD is saying, we only use this for 15 higher level crimes, then the law enforcement agencies 16 that accept this information from DPD should also use the data in the same manner. Number six and number seven are 17 around oversight reporting that will be helpful for BOPC 18 for their oversight. DPD has offered to provide some 19 aggregate or summary data. Summary data does not support 20 effective oversight. Itemized or raw data will give the 21 Board the ability to monitor appropriate use of the 22 23 technology, trends over time, accuracy of the aggregation of the data, anomalies to be researched further, and the 24 effectiveness of the technology for future decision 25



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1 making. Of course, it wouldn't be ideal for the Board to
2 have a list of actual license plate numbers. So a masking
3 mechanism will be appropriate for this purpose.

MS. SHAH: To give a non-law enforcement example, 4 5 when you file your routine tax return, you provide summary numbers. But if an IRS audit is conducted, you 6 have to provide the itemization behind those totals so 7 the IRS can verify the totals, the appropriate items were 8 9 included or excluded and proper categorization. Then for the last one, we're looking for a periodic audit, not 10 really specific around the days, possibly every 30 days, 11 12 just to determine if any protected information has been collected. So these items have not been addressed yet in 13 14 the specification report at this time. Going on to the 15 last slide. So based on the parliamentarian opinion 16 received by the Board staff, the Board has not yet 17 appropriately adopted this report. I know that there's some discussion back and forth about that at this time in 18 regard to the law department. 19

MS. SHAH: But if that is the case and if the Board so desires, there's opportunity for additional work to be done with DPD on this report to address the outstanding concerns, either directly in the report or in relevant policies. Once adopted, the LPR specification report does get publicly published as a DPD and BOPC collaborative



document, meaning that BOPC is saying that they agree with everything in the document. Then it'll be up to the public at that point to continue to work through other channels to get any outstanding concerns that they may have addressed down the line in the process. Mr. Chair, that concludes my presentation.

CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Wow. Still has seven seconds 7 left. Awesome. Thank you. So as you can see, this Board 8 9 is not rubber stamping anything. It's called negotiation. This is how it's done. Alright. This is what you guys 10 want. This is what the Board wants. This is what we're 11 12 hearing from the people, and we'll meet somewhere in the 13 middle. Is that going to be up so the public can see 14 that?

MS. SHAH: This presentation that I just went through.

17 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes.

MS. SHAH: It will be in the meeting documents forthis meeting.

20 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Fantastic. So I'm urging the 21 public and some of the people that came on public 22 comment, please look at that. Look it over and see 23 exactly what this Board wants for the people. Now each 24 commissioner gets to have two minutes to talk for the 25 second time. Commissioner Burton.



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COMMISSIONER BURTON: Mr. Chairman, save me for last.
 Thank you.

3 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: No, I'm going to go around the 4 room. I wanted you to go first, sir, because-

5 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Mr. Chairman, I will go last,

6 Mr. Chairman.

7 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Okay.

8 COMMISSIONER BURTON: No disrespect, but on behalf of 9 the citizens of Detroit, I prefer to go last. Thank you.

10 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Hernandez.

11 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: I just have, through the

12 Chair, a clarifying question. I think I know the answer,

13 but who actually crafted and submitted these changes that 14 you just presented?

MS. SHAH: The staff did that on behalf of the Board. COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: The staff on behalf of the Board, or at the direction of the Board. That answers it. Thank you.

19 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Banks.

20 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Yes. Through the Chair. Madam 21 Secretary these items, you mentioned that DPD has agreed 22 on several items. Now these items that DPD agreed upon is 23 DPD have agreed or looking to put them in a written 24 policy. I'm not trying to challenge their credibility in 25 that, but are they willing to put this in the policy?



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MS. SHAH: So the ones that-1 2 COMMISSIONER BANKS: They agreed upon. MS. SHAH: Right. The ones that they agreed upon 3 they're included in the report at this time and is before 4 5 the Board for review and approval if the Board agrees 6 with the changes. 7 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Again, are they willing to put this in a policy? 8 9 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Approve a policy to that effect? 10 11 COMMISSIONER BANKS: DPD? CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: It has to go through us first. 12 13 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Yeah. Okay. Once we approve 14 everything, are we going to let them know this needs to 15 be in the policy? 16 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: That's how it's done. Yeah. COMMISSIONER BANKS: Okay. I'm all set. 17 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Alright. Commissioner 18 19 Pressley. 20 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Thank you. Through the Chair. My question is relative to the continuation of public 21 22 input on this policy. It was my understanding that at the 23 adoption or passage or approval, whatever language was 24 used for the motion last week, that the community would still have several opportunities to still engage in the 25



1 policy. Is that correct?

2 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: That is correct.

3 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Thank you.

4 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner-

5 MS. SHAH: Mr. Chair, can I just clarify the answer 6 to-

7 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Go ahead and make some 8 clarification.

9 MS. SHAH: Sure, no problem. Yes. The community of 10 course continues to have an opportunity to provide input. 11 This particular report is approved by the BOPC. So after 12 it leaves the BOPC, it does not have adjustments by any 13 other body, the actual specification report.

14 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: So, point for clarification. 15 So this compromised specification report once approved by 16 BOPC, the public comment that is received, there is no 17 adjustment or amendments that are made at that point from 18 what might come from the public comment.

19 MS. SHAH: Correct. Not to the report itself.

20 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: So the function of the public 21 comment would then be what?

22 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: City council.

23 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: So, city council would then24 have the opportunity to amend it.

25 MS. SHAH: Not the report. So there are other



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1 documents that get drafted beyond the specification
2 report, such as the contract itself with the vendors so
3 the public can have some input on that. City council will
4 also hold a public hearing to get feedback from the
5 public on if the expansion should move forward at all at
6 that point

ATTORNEY ADAM SAXBY: Through the Chair. Just for 7 clarification. Under CIOGS, which is the format that is 8 being followed right now. City council must approve 9 before any of this happens. So if city council does not 10 agree with any of the terms based off of public comment, 11 12 they will not approve mm-hmm. So that is the additional 13 comment and the additional oversight that I think you 14 were asking about, commissioner?

15 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Yes. Thank you.

16 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: So could you state that one 17 more time, so everybody knows.

18 ATTORNEY ADAM SAXBY: Yes.

19 COMMISSIONER: About CIOGS?

20 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: About CIOGS, how is it done 21 again?

ATTORNEY ADAM SAXBY: So under CIOGS, which is the format that is being followed in this particular instance, city council has final approval. So the

25 procurement cannot occur unless city council approves



1 that the procurement. Therefore, if they don't agree to 2 the terms, if they object to any of the terms, they have the final oversight ability through their vote and based 3 off of the public comment, that will inevitably follow in 4 many formats at the city council level chair. 5 6 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Okay. Fantastic. 7 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Chair, may I? CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes, go right ahead. 8 9 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: It's about two minutes now, 10 right? 11 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: I don't know. 12 COMMISSIONER: Yes. 13 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I want to-14 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes, it's going to be part of 15 two minutes. 16 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Well, I wanted clarification 17 for what the attorney is saying. Because it just seemed like this is backwards. Because then if the city council 18 is going to approve something and they're looking for us 19 for policy. I mean, it seemed like to me that they're not 20 21 considering the policy according to you. Then I'll take my two minutes. The ALUC, it looked like to me-I'm sorry 22 if I missed the letters. Please, forgive me. But the 23 thing about it is, if they give them the money to 24



purchase something, then they give them money to purchase

25

it. They've already approved it. So the question should

2 have been to me, rather you trying to stop the train, you 3 should basically, well, on the train and help us format 4 policy.

5 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes.

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6 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Because there's a lot of stuff 7 you had in your report that I read had some good stuff in there. If you talk about Maryland, 8 and 7 million people 8 in Maryland, 700 people and 700,000 people in Detroit. I 9 got 90 hijackings going on. They only had 47 crime 10 reports in the world. Now the 7,000 population. I'm just 11 12 trying to ask you sir, it seemed like to me, because I 13 respect you guys. I really respect you guys down through 14 the years. But it seemed like to me where you guys should 15 have been on, I heard 15 people. I heard public comments. 16 I heard it. We had it all. I'm thinking, I already have comments. So I voted basically on what the compromise 17 18 was.

19 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: But to me, I would've needed you 20 in my policy rather than just having come to Burton's 21 meeting commissioner that we should have some help in the 22 policy. Because it's going back to city council for 23 approval. If I give you the money, I have already made up 24 my mind, I'm going to give you this equipment. So it 25 seems to me, the policy should have helped me with the



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1 policy before it goes back to this. Am I making sense to 2 you? Can you come up and just say if I'm making sense to 3 this or am I not making sense? 4 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Of course not. MR. WADOAD: If I might add. 5 6 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Please. MR. WADOAD: The specification report that this Board 7 has a responsibility to co-draft with the police 8 9 department, it is in some ways a policy. This is what the police department is bound by when it uses the 10 technology. So when I come here and say these are the 11 12 issues with the specification report, what I'm saying is 13 that these are the issues with the technology. This Board 14 has the ability to revise the draft so that it can 15 essentially implement policy in the way that DPD can and 16 cannot use the cameras. To the attorney's point, after 17 this point, after the Board approves the specification report, the city council can't amend it in any way if it 18 19 doesn't like it. It can say yes, it can say no. But in my opinion, if you truly want to support the police 20 21 department's proposal to expand license plate readers, you would send the city council your best proposal 22 alongside the police department. 23

24 MR. WADOAD: If you send them a premature proposal or 25 bad proposal, they're going to vote no on it and it's



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going to be back at this Board. It's going to be back at 1 the police department. Which is why I'm coming today. I 2 came last week as well to give public comment and telling 3 you all that it's your responsibility to look at this 4 5 specification report because that's what's going to be 6 really the governing document that governs the police department's use of license plate readers. I hope I 7 answered your question, sir. 8

CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Bernard. 9 10 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Just quickly Mr. Chairman. 11 Thank you for the presentation. What we see from the 12 report that has been prepared is that the staff has 13 negotiated seven changes to the proposed whatever you 14 want to call this acquisition, in terms of the policy 15 regarding the acquisition. There are 11 points that are 16 important points that we've not agreed upon. Those need to be continued. Those issues need to be continued to be 17 flushed out between our staff and the department. When we 18 send something to city council, it should be only after 19 20 we've done extensive due diligence and after we've listened to the people and listened to the experts. 21 That's not their job. Really what they do is appropriate 22 funds. They're looking to us as elected officials and so 23 24 forth to address the substance of an issue. They're dealing with an almost \$3 billion budget. 25



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1 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: This is a \$5 million item. This is a huge expression, a pimple on the elephant's 2 ass, comparatively speaking. So they're looking to us to 3 address this situation and that's what we do. That's what 4 we're supposed to do. What our staff has recommended is 5 that we hold off on addressing this report until their 6 discussions continue with the department and then the 7 things that we can't agree on, then the Board can make 8 9 the call where we're going to go with the department on this and go with our staff on this issue. We're not 10 neuter here. The council constantly looks to us, Jim, for 11 true guidance. We're not supposed to be able to shovel 12 13 and push the problem down the road, et cetera. We're 14 supposed to deal with these issues substantively and 15 accurately. All they're saying is, we're not ready yet. 16 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: We're not ready to move it 17 over to city council yet. We're not going to pass the 18 buck. Keep kicking the can down the road hoping that somebody down the road will say, oh yeah, this doesn't 19 make any sense. Keeping data for five years or five 20 21 months or whatever makes no sense. There're some constitutional issues here. As you pointed out, these 5 22 23 million purchases, like the 25 million they want to spend 24 on additional police officers does not address crime. 25 Crime is systemic. It is a community issue and we need to



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1 invest more in that. To the extent that our Board 2 Secretary has asked for additional time, that's what we hired her for, to do what we've never done as a body. 3 Listen to both sides, negotiate with the department, move 4 things forward progressively for the community. That's 5 6 all we're talking about. So then when we talked to the 7 council, oh yeah, the count commission dealt with it on three occasions. The commission negotiated this, the 8 9 commission did this, so that we don't look like a lame duck rubber stamp body. 10

11 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: VC Holt.

12 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you. Through the Chair. My 13 question is to the gentleman representing ACLU. On page 14 11 of your presentation, you indicated that the 15 statistics that you evaluated showed that of a 2000 hits, 16 the results were that they only identified 47 serious 17 crimes. Now my understanding, as I thought I understood, is that the license plate reader only activates if that 18 license plate has been put into some kind of data, 19 whereas there should be attention to that license plate. 20 May I understand how it is that you could document 2,000 21 22 hits and only 47 of those hits turned out to be a serious 23 crime matter?

24 MR. WADOAD: Right. If I may provide a brief answer. 25 So just a clarification on the way the technology works.



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1 It captures every license plate that crosses that camera. Not just license plates that are hits on various lists of 2 suspected or wanted vehicles. It captures every license 3 plate and, and the full fingerprint of the vehicle and 4 stores it in database like was mentioned 30 days or 90 5 days depending on the vendor. If there are lists that it 6 7 can run against, and it does that relatively immediately, but it does retain data on every single vehicle that 8 9 passes those cameras for 30 or 90 days. Obviously, this Board has the ability to negotiate a shorter time period, 10 like it was mentioned, multiple jurisdictions delete the 11 12 data in 48 hours unless it's a hit on a list. 13 MR. WADOAD: The state of New Hampshire deletes the 14 data after three minutes unless it's a hit on a list. So 15 you're really considering two separate services or 16 products of this technology. One is a hit list, right? 17 Triggering alerts if a license plate is on a list. The other is really this longer investigative database 18 collecting millions of data points and using it over the 19

this Board should be considering. Our opinion is that the only product that should be on the table is that hit list product where you run immediately and delete the data you don't need and don't want. But what's on the table right now from the police department is that longer database

course of 90 days. So those are the two products that

20



DBOPC 05/25/2023 1 full of millions of innocent data points. CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay. Thank you for that. I have 2 one other concern as it relates to the report that was 3 shared by Ms. SHAH. I see here you do in fact highlight 4 the fact that the Amber alert is a serious matter and 5 6 that the license plate detector should be able to capture that information. 7 MS. SHAH: Absolutely, commissioner. 8 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Because what? 9 MS. SHAH: This is a missing person's alert. Right. 10 11 The Amber alert's. Right. 12 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: I believe child support as well. I 13 don't know. 14 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: it shouldn't be beneficial 15 support. 16 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay. Because-17 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: It doesn't matter. CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Because at the meeting on May the 18 19 11th, was it, clearly at least. I see you're quoting folks who agree to not support the LPR as well as those 20 21 folks who wanted support. So in an example, there was a citizen who came to the mic who was an objection to the 2.2

license plate readers being used for Amber Alert. So I 23

hope that person's statistics were not included as 24

25 relevant because obviously you would want the license



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plate reader to pick up that kind of alert. That's okay. 1 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: I'm a solution-based person, 2 right? I don't have time to wait because I hear the 3 concerns. I hear and I see it. I live it. I live here in 4 5 Detroit, right? This is happening to me. I watch people just steal a car and take off down the freeway. I've seen 6 7 them with my own eyes. Is there something I can do to make that stop? Here's a technology that can make that 8 9 stop. The key is how do we use it correctly? Like I keep telling people, I don't mind you saying no to something, 10 but what's your solution to make it stop now? We don't 11 12 have time to be waiting. The calvary isn't coming, right? 13 It's not coming. If we have technology, we should use it 14 the right way correctly. Technology is here. We have to 15 embrace it. We got to, it's just the bottom line. But we 16 have to do it constitutionally and do it correctly. 17 That's what this body has to do. But to keep kicking this can down the road and keep having conversation, 18 conversation, conversation. 19

20 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Then all of a sudden now the 21 Kia boy's out there still stealing cars while we keep 22 talking. Who are we working for? The criminals. No, we're 23 working for the people. So it's up to us to do something. 24 That was my one minute. I'm going to yield my other 25 minute to Commissioner Holley. I'm going to have to say



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1 the Board, VC Holt is going to take the rest of my agenda 2 here because I do have another meeting I have to really 3 get to. I'm sorry. Thank you.

4 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Mr. Chairman. Thank you. My 5 friend, my understanding, you're not against the 6 technology. You just want responsible uses. You're not 7 against it. Is that what I'm hearing from ALUC, that 8 you're not against it. You basically want us to basically 9 to do the-

10 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Constitutionally,

MR. WADOAD: Right. So the reason I'm here today is because you are responsible for outlining how the technology is used. Any objections we have to whether or not this technology should be procured, we'll save that for city council. That's not between the two of us.

16 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: That helps me a whole lot. 17 MR. WADOAD: If this is helpful to the Chair's question about what are the solutions, I'll give you a 18 solution in five seconds, 48 hours data retention. Right 19 now, like I said, it's 30 to 90 days depending on which 20 vendor's providing it. So many jurisdictions, this is 21 becoming the industry standard, are keeping the data for 22 48 hours and then deleting it if it's just data of an 23 24 innocent person in an innocent vehicle. It goes to his specific scenario of a car theft. If your car is stolen, 25



1 you can report your license plate number to the police department. For the past 48 hours, they'll have all that 2 3 data of that car passing those cameras. So 48 hours is really becoming the industry standard, and there's no 4 5 need to go to the maximum that the vendor is providing, which is 30 days for flock and 90 days for Motorola 6 Vigilant. There's no need to adopt that maximum time 7 period. You can follow the number of jurisdictions that 8 are putting a 48-hour time limit on retaining data. 9 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Madam Chair. 10 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you. I believe Commissioner 11 12 Burton, are you prepared to take your questions. COMMISSIONER BURTON: Yes. Absolutely. 13 14 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: May I make just one final 15 point in response to what this gentleman said and what 16 Jim said. Jim, the problem is that this data is given to 17 people who finance cars. You mentioned people who owe child support. You can run that database and find people. 18 I mean, all of these superfluous things that this data 19 20 can be used for. That's why one of the recommendations is that it only be used by law enforcement in terms of us 21 sharing the data, and also that we maintain our own data 22 because we can't control data. We don't have the 23 ShotSpotter data because it goes to California. We don't 24 25 get that. I mean, if we're going to pay the 5 million, we



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1 ought to own it, we ought to keep it, and we ought to regulate how it's done. So far, this report doesn't do 2 3 that yet. That's the point. If you owe somebody some 4 money, they shouldn't be able to know where your car is 5 and come get the money. I mean, come on, go to court. CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you, Commissioner Bernard. 6 7 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you, Madam Chair for 8 indulging me.

9 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Right. Commissioner Burton, are 10 you prepared? Two minutes.

11 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Sure. I have different 12 arguments than most of you here. To my colleagues here on 13 the Board and to our Detroit constituents that's learning 14 about license plate readers for the first time. I'm here 15 to talk about my point of view of this technology that's 16 increasing being used by government agencies all over the 17 world. It is a technology that has been taught as highly effective in preventing crime and tracking down 18 criminals. But I'm here to tell you the truth. This 19 technology comes a number of serious concerns particular 20 when it comes to privacy and civil liberties here in 21 across America. I'm talking about license plate readers 22 and the many negatives that come with the use of license 23 24 plate readers and devices that are mounted on police 25 cars.



COMMISSIONER BURTON: I raised that concern at our 1 2 community meeting about the license plate readers. But 3 they're mounted on police cars and other types of vehicles, which scans the license plates of passing 4 vehicles and records them in a database. This database is 5 6 then used by law enforcement agencies to track the movement of vehicles, link them to criminal activity and 7 surface. This may seem like a great idea to those that 8 are probably hearing about it for the first time. But 9 unfortunately, the harm of this technology vastly 10 outweighs the benefits. First and foremost, license plate 11 12 readers are a major invasion of privacy. The information 13 captured by the devices is incredibly sensitive. It 14 reveals a wealth of personal information about a given 15 individual driving habits, associations, and even 16 whereabouts. This information is then easily accessible 17 to law enforcement and can be used against individuals in a court of law. 18

19 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you, Commissioner Burton.
20 Sir, your two minutes are up. Thank you. Now, I believe
21 we are at where on the agenda.

22 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Unfinished.

23 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: All the way down to unfinished 24 business, where now, in all honesty, I do not understand 25 the LPR Surveillance Technology Specification report.



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1 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: Madam

2 Chairperson. The next thing would be the report from the

3 Chief Investigator, James Warfield.

4 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: The agenda.

5 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Madam Chair, did we have a

6 timekeeper to say that my two minutes was up?

7 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: She kept time.

8 COMMISSIONER BURTON: We have a timekeeper. Who kept 9 time?

10 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: I did.

11 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Yeah.

12 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: I gave you-

13 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Show me where second.

14 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: That's right.

15 My mistakes.

16 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Burton.

17 COMMISSIONER BURTON: My time is totally different.

18 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Let's present ourselves in some

19 mature orderly manner.

20 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Well, for a point of

21 information, can you provide proof?

22 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: So as I understand.

23 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: No, it's right.

24 Unfinished business.

25 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Oh, okay. All right. So now, may I



1 have a clarification as to what this statement is? Basically, what should we see happening now? Ms. White, I 2 mean, Ms. SHAH. I'm sorry. So what should happen now as 3 it relates to this statement? 4 MS. SHAH: Any of the commissioners can make a motion 5 6 to either adopt the report or take whatever action is preferred by the Board at this time. 7 8 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Right here. I've got unfinished business right here, Madam Chair. 9 ATTORNEY ADAM SAXBY: Through the Chair. Can I 10 clarify on that motion before? 11 12 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Sure. Because I don't understand 13 why it just didn't spell out that we're supposed to. 14 ATTORNEY ADAM SAXBY: My question is what the intent 15 is for this motion. If the intent is that this bring back 16 the matter that has already been submitted to City Council based off of the motion from last week, then I do 17 18 believe that the more appropriate motion would be to rescind the previous motion if that is this Board's 19 intent. That is not to say the Board can't do that, but 20 21 we want to make sure that we are actually achieving the 22 Board's goal here. If the goal is to move this matter back and have further consideration over these matters, 23 24 then there is a reasonable interpretation that the motion 25 last week already moved these matters forward and they



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have already been, I believe, submitted to City Council. 1 ATTORNEY ADAM SAXBY: So in order to undo that, the 2 Board should simply rescind that motion and vote again on 3 that matter, whether or not to move that forward. That 4 would be the law department's recommendation. That said, 5 if the intent is not to undo that, if the Board does not 6 feel that they acted in haste, then I'm not sure what 7 this motion's intent is. So I would just ask for 8 clarification on that to better help for myself and the 9 parliamentary to help better help facilitate the Board 10 well. 11 12 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Point of information. Do we

13 know what has actually been sent to city council? Is it 14 the specification report with the amendments that our 15 Secretary has given on behalf of the Board?

16 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: No.

17 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Secretary.

18 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: I believe Ms. SHAH, you're being 19 asked.

MS. SHAH: I was not on the communication to city council, so I would expect that if DPD has sent something to city council, it is a copy of the report that you have in your hand right now with the most recent changes that I discussed today. The items that were in green and in yellow, and not the items in red.



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1 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: So, is there anybody who can 2 confirm that?

3 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: But you don't know that that's4 the point, you just assumed.

5 MS. SHAH: That's correct. I was not on the 6 communication to city council.

7 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: So, for the law department's 8 point of view, the reason why I'm asking that question is 9 that the approval of this specification report would be 10 needed if the motion to support the Chief's 11 recommendation was the specification report without the 12 Board's amendments.

13 ATTORNEY ADAM SAXBY: Can you clarify your?

14 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: So if the motion was to 15 support the Chief's recommendation to expand license 16 plate reader. The Chief or the police department had a 17 specification report that existed prior to the

18 commission's input.

ATTORNEY ADAM SAXBY: So my understanding is that the committee, the Board was voting on the most recent draft that was in front of the Board at that moment.

22 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Yeah. That's why I'm saying 23 when you asked about the intent, what would be the intent 24 of it would be to clarify that what we are approving is 25 not just the general Chief's expansion of the license



plate reader, but to ensure that the specification report
 that's given to the city council includes the amendments
 that has been made by the commission.

ATTORNEY ADAM SAXBY: So through the Chair, if the 4 5 end result of that vote, say if it were to be voted down and that not be adopted. If the intent of this Board is 6 that the end result would be that the matter not be 7 before city council for consideration right now, then it 8 should be a motion to rescind the previous motion from 9 last week. That's all I'm saying is that if that is the 10 11 intent and that is a possibility, then the more 12 appropriate motion would be to rescind I believe your 13 motion commissioner, and then re-vote on that. However, 14 if that is not this body's intent, then there's a 15 different intent. We want to make sure we understand that 16 so we can help facilitate this Board's will.

17 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you, attorney.

18 COMMISSIONER: Through the Chair.

CHAIRPERSON HOLT: May I commissioner Bernard. Thank
 you. Thank you, Attorney Saxby. To the parliamentarian,

21 what is your suggestion?

22 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: The

23 parliamentarians opinion was that the adoption of last 24 week's motion did not adopt the report, because it did 25 not specify the report. However, the parliamentarians



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1 opinion yields to the law department and the guidance that the law department has provided in accordance with 2 the ordinances of the city of Detroit. The law would 3 always take proceedings over Robert's rules of order. So 4 5 at this point, it seems to me that this Board has two levels of action, maybe three. If the Board is ready to 6 7 finish this matter, there are no other changes you want to make, there's nothing else you want to do, then in 8 9 accordance with the law department's opinion, the adoption of that motion last week ends your action with 10 this report. That the motion that was adopted supported 11 12 the specifications report and supports that the expansion 13 of license plate reader would go forward and this 14 matter's closed, and you move on.

15 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: If the Board is 16 not finished with this matter and there needs to be 17 specificity on what not being finished means, then the Board would have to rescind the motion to adopt the 18 motion that was adopted to support that. Then you're back 19 to square one and square one means you haven't done it. 20 If that motion is rescinded, then you haven't taken any 21 action on the license plate reader issue. Whether that is 22 to further negotiate what you want in the report or 23 whether or not you decided now you don't support it, you 24 are back to square one and the table's clean. 25



COMMISSIONER BERNARD: How do you rescind? 1 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: The motion to 2 rescind is a motion that's intended for previous notice. 3 Because it would be made without previous notice, it 4 would require two thirds or a majority of the entire 5 membership. So anyone can make the motion to rescind. 6 7 Anybody who's a voting commissioner can make the motion to rescind the motion adopted last week to support the 8 expansion. What the motion to rescind us is erase. It's 9 like you go to the blackboard and you erase it. That 10 means that at that point, if that motion is adopted, 11 12 you've taken no action on license plate reader 13 specifications report support of any of that. So you've 14 got two things. If you're finished with this and you're 15 ready to move on, and there are no other changes you want 16 to make, there's nothing else you want to do. If you let 17 this stand the way it is now, then this Board has supported the specifications report and the expansion of 18 license plate readers, and you can move on to the next 19 20 item.

21 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Through the Chair.

PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: If you're not ready to move on, if there are things that you still want to do, then you need to rescind that motion that was adopted, and then the floor is open for whatever it is



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1 the Board wants to do.

CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you, parliamentarian. Yes,
 Commissioner Hernandez.

COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Thank you, ma'am. I want to 4 just take us back to the original point of getting 5 6 clarity that Commissioner Pressley posed. Last week's 7 motion was adopted with the intent and interpretation of moving this process along, which included the spec 8 9 report. If that's the case, and that motion was approved and adopted last week, can we get clarity if that moved 10 11 along in the process to the next step? Whatever that next 12 step may be, that leaves this body.

13 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes. Thank you, deputy.

DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Madam Vice-Chair, and through the Chair. To answer that question, yes, it has moved. With the adoption and with the pathway to CIOGS the specification report was published, and the correspondent has been submitted and received by the officers of the city council president.

20 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: We have not received the 21 information on the number of vehicles that currently are 22 outfitted like this as the minutes indicate that the 23 Chief indicated that we were going to have, and now we 24 have additional information that we didn't have last 25 week.



1 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Madam Vice-Chair.

2 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes, sir.

3 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Just to respond to that, I believe it was stated that the Chief would provide that 4 information at a later date. I don't believe it had a 5 specific time that was there. So I just want to come from 6 7 a place that it was not ignoring the Board, but you're holding us to a timeline that hadn't been established. I 8 9 am prepared and that's why I am present today to follow up on the Chief's promise and commitment to this Board to 10 11 share with you how many license plate readers we have on 12 vehicles. The department has 55 vehicles that are 13 outfitted with license plate readers. Each vehicle has 14 two, one to the left, one to the right side. It actually 15 mirrors the license plate readers that are used by 16 municipal parking when they drive by and scan vehicles 17 that have boots on them. So the answer is 155. I'm sorry. It's 55 cameras, ma'am. 18

19 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you.

20 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you, Deputy Chief Hayes.
Well then, I guess at this point, we need-I'm sorry.

23 COMMISSIONER BANKS: I've got some unfinished

24 business.

25 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay, Commissioner Banks. Are we



1 still talking about the-

2 COMMISSIONER BANKS: License plate reader-

3 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: The adoption.

4 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Yes.

5 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Reconsideration.

6 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Yes.

7 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay.

8 COMMISSIONER BANKS: In the light of these

9 presentations, I moved that we rescind the adopted motion

10 to support Chief's recommendation for the expansion of

11 these license plate readers. This is because I believe

12 that BOPC staff need to continue negotiating the LPR

13 specification report and relevant policy language with

14 the DPD and address the outstanding concerns expressed by

15 the community. Is there a second? Do we have a second? We

16 need the second this.

17 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Second

18 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Discussion.

19 COMMISSIONER BANKS: You go ahead, through the Chair.20 You do what you want to do.

21 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Excellent. Second.

22 COMMISSIONER BANKS: I'm sorry, if I was out of line.

23 I'm sorry, Madam Chair.

24 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: Madam Chair,25 you have to state the motion. Before you ask for



1 anything, you must state the motion.

2 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: With all that he read from his

3 phone. Did you want to pass your phone around so I can

4 read it?

5 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: He can read it again.

6 COMMISSIONER BANKS: They can pass it around. Just do 7 it again.

8 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Just the motion.

9 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Do it again.

10 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Can we speak into the mic

11 for the viewing audience, please.

12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I know we are supposed to have 13 11 council people. 11 people. Evidently, we got 15 to 20. 14 That's really running this meeting.

15 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair. Questions 16 for clarity.

17 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: You're going to come here and-

18 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair. Question to

19 his motion. The commissioner's motion.

20 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: The motion?

21 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Yes.

22 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Commissioner. Do you want the

23 Policy Committee to work on this?

24 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Banks. No, I asked25 you to stay here.



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1 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Someone's texting him messages to read. Is that acceptable? That's allowed. Is that 2 allowed? 3 COMMISSIONER BANKS: How do you know somebody's 4 texting me? 5 6 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Sir, you're reading it from your phone-7 8 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner. COMMISSIONER BANKS: I'll put that in there. I'll put 9 that in there. 10 11 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner-COMMISSIONER BURTON: This comes from the staff. Did 12 13 the staff send you this? 14 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Banks, I'm asking you 15 to allow me to read your motion so that we can move 16 forward. COMMISSIONER BANKS: Madam Chair, I'm sorry. 17 18 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay, 19 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Go right ahead. You're in 20 charge. CHAIRPERSON HOLT: In light of these presentations, I 21 move that we rescind the adopted motion to support the 22 Chief's recommendation for the expansion of the license 23 plate readers. This is because I believe that BOPC and 24 staff need to continue negotiating the LPR specification 25



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1 report and relevant policy language with DPD to address

2 the outstanding concerns expressed by the community.

3 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Second it.

4 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Is there a second?

5 COMMISSIONER: Can't second your own motion.

6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Second. I'll second it.

7 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: Madam Chair.

8 COMMISSIONER BANKS: I tried.

9 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: Madam Chair.

10 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes ma'am.

11 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: Rationale for

12 the motion cannot be part of the motion.

13 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay.

14 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: So the motion

15 is to rescind the previously adopted motion to support

16 license plate reader expansion. The rationale is

17 something the commissioner can address during debate. But

18 it cannot be part of the motion.

19 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Please don't. I need to read it 20 again?

21 COMMISSIONER: No.

22 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you.

PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: You need to
restate the motion. It is moved and seconded to rescind.
That's it.



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CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay. The motion has been moved to 1 rescind and second. Is there a discussion? 2 3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Madam Chairperson. 4 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes, sir. CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Holley. 5 6 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Madam Chairperson. This situation has been brought to the city council. City 7 council now has the information. You want to now sit here 8 and snatch this from the city council back to here. There 9 is another way that we can do this, but I'm just saying, 10 this is just embarrassing. We've sent this to the city 11 12 council. They got it. We are here wanting to rescind 13 something that has already been published. We have to 14 find a way. I got to wait to offer it, but that's my 15 unreadiness. It's just asinine how we are acting and 16 doing this kind of thing. This is just not the way we do 17 stuff. I don't care who sends it, who reads it or who votes on it. You got a right to do all that. But the city 18 has got this. I think I'd like to make a substitute 19 motion. Is that appropriate? 20 21 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: That's what 2.2 that motion is. 23 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Right. 24 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: That we will send an appendant



to the city council of the concerns after we do a new

25

negotiation, send an appendant to whatever that word I 1 should have used, to the city council in regard to what 2 we've already said. 3 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: That motion is 4 not in order at this time, commissioner. 5 6 COMMISSIONER: Madam Chair. COMMISSIONER BANKS: Yeah. 7 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay. We are still in discussion 8 9 or are we ready? COMMISSIONER: Madam Chair. 10 11 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: I'm sorry. I'm hearing all types 12 of oh, okay. 13 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Through the Chair, to our 14 Secretary. The function of additional time for 15 deliberation would be to see movement on any of these 16 items that are currently in the red. Did you get any 17 sense from DPD of any movement on those issues that you feel like more time would actually produce? 18 19 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Banks. Commissioner 20 Pressley is attempting to get your attention. 21 MS. SHAH: I'm sorry, Commissioner Pressley, to make 22 sure I understand your question. You're asking if we got a sense that DPD is ready to move on any of these items? 23 24 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: More so willing, yeah, on the 25 red items. Because I believe that would be the function



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of continuing the negotiation discussion. If it seems 1 that there's any willingness on DPD to move on any of the 2 3 red dotted items.

MS. SHAH: There are some that seem to have some 4 5 potential for movement. In my opinion, the retention time is going to be a difficult point. But some of the other 6 items around release to non-law enforcement agencies 7 permission from the Board for that. Some of the other 8 items seem like items that we may be able to move on. 9 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Through the Chair. He's 10 standing right here. Could we just ask him? 11

COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Through the Chair. 12

13

CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Hernandez, yes. 14 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Madam Chair. Two things. With 15 all due respect to the honorable body, I sat back and two 16 weeks ago, I came before you. I was given five minutes to 17 speak and make a presentation. From that, it was open for rebuttal to anyone to I don't want to say attack or to 18 discuss the data that was given comprehensive data to 19 talk about the expansion of this technology. With all due 20 respect, our colleague from the ACLU, who certainly 21 22 respect your work, was given 10 minutes and there was no follow up for us to defend our position. From that, the 23 24 contents of what he presented today, we could be 25 comparing apples to oranges. He used the data from, I



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1 believe it was Washington or DC.

2 COMMISSIONER: Maryland.

3 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Maryland. I'm sorry. I don't know where they were placed. 8 million is a lot of hits. 4 5 It could be on a freeway. To talk about how we deploy, the data that's driving it and what it is that we are 6 7 doing. We don't know exactly what it is to compare. So I would ask under consideration that if there's something 8 9 that you saw today that gives you pause or concern, you would consider at least tabling the motion that you have 10 for another week to allow us to respond that not only the 11 12 concerns here, but the concerns and the documents that 13 when I gave my presentation, I had to stand and defend 14 that I didn't even see because they came from an outside 15 source.

16 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you, Deputy Chief Haynes. I 17 believe we are still at voting.

18 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Through the Chair.

19 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Discussion.

20 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: An opportunity to address the 21 second part, which is the department's willingness on any 22 of the red dotted items currently in the spec report. 23 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Again, through the Chair, if I

24 may. Those document or those red items, I hadn't even 25 seen that, that have been there. We are committed to



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being transparent and working with this Board that's in the best interest of the community and the responsible use of this technology that's fair. We will continue to work not only on this, but all items that we have forwarded. Never will we draw our line in the sand and say, this is it. Take it or leave it. We are committed to continuing to work with this Board.

8 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Thank you.

9 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you.

10 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Madam Chair, I appreciate-

11 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Bernard-

12 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Deputy Hayes' statement to 13 that effect. So why don't we do this? Why don't you and 14 your office meet with our office, and we negotiate these 15 11 points. It's only 11. We deal with this perhaps next 16 week that it's rescinded as of now. It could be reinstituted next week because it's just like the budget 17 with Congress. If there's no pressure to get it done, it 18 won't get done. We can't lay down on this issue. These 19 are important issues. The 13 issues that have been, 20 pardon me, 11 issues that have been identified, we need 21 to come to some agreement with. Then we can collectively 2.2 23 go to city council without any dissent from any of the commissioners. 24

25 COMMISSIONER BANKS: We've got a motion on the table.



1 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Sir, no, we're still discussing.

2 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Oh, okay. Can I say this?

3 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Oh, sure.

4 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Madam Vice-Chair Holt, I mean-

5 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes, sir.

6 COMMISSIONER BANKS: I'm sorry.

7 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: You're good, commissioner.

8 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Go ahead. Go ahead.

9 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Banks, I really need

10 you to make your point because I think we need to vote.

11 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Yeah, we got a second on this

12 and we are supposed to be voting on this today, right?

13 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: No, we're discussing, sir.

14 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Okay. We're still in discussion.15 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes, sir.

16 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair. I'd like to 17 discuss this matter, if I may, on behalf of the hundred 18 thousand people that live in the 5th District. Do I have 19 the floor, Madam Chair?

20 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: I didn't realize you were asking 21 my permission. I thought you were going out there. Please 22 do Commissioner Bernard. I mean, Commissioner Burton.

23 COMMISSIONER BURTON: So, Madam Chair, the Secretary 24 is unaware of anything been sent over. The department 25 can't tell us who sent something over whether or not they



sent it over to council or not. They don't know who that 1 person is or whether it went over or not. In addition to 2 that, this is something that still happens to be in the 3 Policy Committee. We have not taken action on this. We 4 5 are looking to read through this, also make our recommendations and like to report back to this Board. 6 But we haven't had our due diligence to really address 7 this. So it's not fair to this Policy Committee that's 8 been working on issues. So it's not fair to us. It's not 9 fair to the citizens because we have not taken action on 10 11 this.

12 COMMISSIONER BURTON: This is something that is very 13 important to our community, especially our Civil Liberty 14 activists and our residents, our Detroit residents. More 15 importantly that we work within our Policy Committee 16 within our scope to do our due diligence. But also, we have not seen accurate, positive spec report. So, from an 17 oversight standpoint, should we be questioning that? 18 Should we be one to see an accurate spec report before we 19 rubber stamp something? Colleagues, I ask you-20

21 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Mr. Chairman.

22 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Before we as a body approve the 23 Chief's ALPR policy directive, we will want to exercise 24 our fiduciary responsibilities. We want to see accurate 25 positive, spec report. We have not called for it. I'm



1 calling for it on behalf of the Chair of the Policy
2 Committee. As a Black man in America that wake up every
3 day in the city of Detroit, I'm calling for it as a
4 commissioner that was once the youngest commissioner in
5 America, in the US. I'm calling for it on a big behalf of
6 my constituents. A hundred thousand that wake up in the
7 Fifth District, so we will-

8 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Ms. SHAH.

9 COMMISSIONER BURTON: On behalf of the residence of 10 District 5, we'd like to see a positive, accurate spec 11 report we calling for it in District 5.

12 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: Madam Chair, 13 two thirds vote will require five people to vote in favor 14 of the motion to rescind in order to rescind the motion 15 that was adopted.

16 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you for that clarification. 17 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Madam, Madam Chair. May I say 18 one quick thing? It's going to be quick. It's going to be 19 quick. I just wanted to let you know you are doing a 20 great job.

21 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you.

22 COMMISSIONER BANKS: That's an understatement. I

23 mean, incredible. Incredible.

24 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you.

25 COMMISSIONER BANKS: You're holding your poise.



1 You're delivering. Incredible.

- 2 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you, sir.
- 3 COMMISSIONER BANKS: You're welcome.
- 4 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Ms. SHAH.
- 5 MS. SHAH: Would you like a roll call vote.
- 6 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes, please.
- 7 COMMISSIONER: What are we voting?
- 8 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: To rescind the motion.
- 9 MS. SHAH: To rescind the motion.

10 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you. No.

MS. SHAH: Commissioner Linda Bernard - Yes, to 12 rescind.

- 13 MS. SHAH: Commissioner Willie Burton Yes.

14 COMMISSIONER: Wonderful.

- 15 MS. SHAH: Commissioner Jesus Hernandez No.
- 16 MS. SHAH: Commissioner Jim Holley No.
- 17 MS. SHAH: Commissioner QuanTez Pressley No.
- 18 MS. SHAH: Commissioner Cedric Banks Yes.

MS. SHAH: Madam Chair, you have 3 = Yes votes, 4 = 20 No votes. The motion failed.

- 21 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: I'm sorry, repeat that for my 22 clarification.
- 23 MS. SHAH: You have 3 = Yes votes-
- 24 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: To rescind
- 25 MS. SHAH: To rescind and four no votes to rescind.



1 The motion to rescind fails.

2 COMMISSIONER: Madam Chair.

3 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Now I understand.

4 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Madam Chair.

5 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: Please say the 6 motion has failed.

7 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: The motion to rescind failed as it 8 relates to four votes as a no to rescind, and three votes 9 yes to rescind. Now, is there—

10 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Madam Chairperson.

11 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes, sir.

12 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I'd like to make a motion

13 madam.

14 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Madam Chair to the

15 parliamentarian.

16 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Holley.

17 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: There was the agreement with the 18 police department about the table eight. So we can go 19 back to the table again. That's out of the question now. 20 Right?

21 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: The motion to 22 the table was not in order in any case.

CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Is it now? Is it valid? I'msorry. Is it available to me now? In other words.

25 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: The problem,



1 Mr. Commissioner, as I see it and I'll ask Mr. Saxby to 2 weigh in, my understanding is that the law department has given the opinion that adoption of that motion by direct 3 Commissioner Pressley adopted the specifications report. 4 5 Since that motion to rescind was not adopted, that report is adopted and the support for the expansion of the 6 license plate readers is adopted and therefore action on 7 that is closed. 8

ATTORNEY ADAM SAXBY: Through the Chair. 9 Commissioner, if I can just clarify what your initial 10 question was. I believe what you were asking was whether 11 12 or not you can go back to the table if the police department is willing to discuss these matters further 13 14 and then submit an opinion to city council about 15 additional concerns perhaps that this Board has, is that 16 correct?

17 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: That is.

ATTORNEY ADAM SAXBY: There's nothing that would prevent this body from supplementing with an opinion to city council about any additional concerns. Just like any member of the public, when it's before city council can provide their own concerns, commissioner.

23 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: So I'm asking does that? I'm 24 sorry, Madam Chairperson. I don't mean it's an issue. 25 You're doing a good job. I don't want to offend you. So



1 I'm asking does that need to be a motion, sir to make

2 that happen?

3 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: They've

4 adopted.

5 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Yes.

6 ATTORNEY ADAM SAXBY: I would recommend that this not

7 be a specific motion because I'm not sure how to

8 implement that motion.

9 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I know how.

10 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I do.

11 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Well, please respect. Can we

12 please respect Commissioner Holley?

13 COMMISSIONER: That's what I'm saying.

14 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: He knows.

15 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Okay. Go ahead, Jim.

16 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Just help me with, because of my

17 speech. When I'm asking you, you just told me what I

18 want.

19 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: You're thinking it.

20 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay. But right now, I'm asking 21 you, I want to have the police department because we 22 missed some items. The police department has indicated 23 they see some things that we can agree on. I'm asking, 24 can we have with that the staff go sit down with the 25 Chief's department and work those things out that we are



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1 concerned about we failed to do. You and I know, and I'll
2 leave you alone, that the Secretary did not get a chance
3 to get her report in before we voted.

4 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Right.

5 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: That's the big problem-

6 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Last time.

CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: To be honest. You shouldn't be 7 throwing her under the bus. You shouldn't throw her under 8 9 the bus. She did not get it. We had heard her report, but before we voted, we will be different. This would be 10 different. Right. Because she didn't get a report. If 11 12 what we saw before, those 11 points, red facts, she 13 didn't get it in. So we voted basically on the Chief 14 basically to made a good.

15 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Presentation.

16 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Presentation. I would've voted 17 for him to be governor about that time. I'm just saying 18 to you again, that's what I'm trying to ask you to help 19 me with the Chair. I just need some help with that 20 because I need to have a motion so it can happen. It can 21 be done. Look, I'm asking you to help me with that Mr. 22 Madam Chairperson.

ATTORNEY ADAM SAXBY: Through the Chair. in response-CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I know you I can't make it, but to act like you're talking like me.



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1 ATTORNEY ADAM SAXBY: Just to clarify. The concern is not what anyone did or didn't do. The concern was the 2 legal interpretation of what that last motion was. 3 4 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: That's my preaching to me. 5 You're right. 6 ATTORNEY ADAM SAXBY: That's why we needed to clarify 7 so we could help this Board make sure that they were actually moving forward with their will. That's why we 8 need to clarify. 9 10 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I'm asking you to help me with a motion to basically, Madam Chairperson. Okay, go ahead. 11 12 I'm sorry. I'm sorry. 13 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Bernard understands 14 very well your passion to ensure our suggestions are part 15 of DPD's specification. COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Yeah. Thank you, Jim, for 16 raising the point that obviously the Secretary didn't 17 report last week, and we weren't as well informed about 18 19 this issue as we probably should have been. Even though I wasn't here, I've certainly heard a lot about it today. 20

21 I'd simply move that the Board approve a resolution that the staff and the Chief's office continue to negotiate on 22 the 11 points on which there has been no agreement. That 23 24 they do that fairly quickly and report back to us by the 25 next meeting so then we can then, if it's what we want to



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do, forward a memo to the city council saying that we 1 have addressed the issues that were raised by the ACLU 2 and by our staff, and that these are the proposed 3 resolutions and this is what the department and the 4 commission have agreed to do. 5 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: So that would be a motion that 6 7 we address those 11 issues and that the two of you report back at the next Board meeting so that we can also 8 9 continue and obviously report to city council because we want to resolve those. We don't want them outstanding. 10 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay. Thank you, Commissioner 11 12 Bernard. 13 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: To the community 14 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Deputy Chief Hayes, who I wish 15 were my fifth-grade student. I wish you were. This will 16 be your last comment. 17 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Thank you, Madam Chair. 18 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Sure. 19 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: I'm not sure if this goes to 20 Chairperson Ferguson, who's not here, or if you can 21 please convey. In the discussion, we are hearing two 22 different paths for requesting information. So from the 23 office of the Chief, whether the Board delegated that it'd be staff, there was mentioned that the Policy 24 25 Committee had not gotten any of this. Whatever the



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1	questions are or whatever asked of the police department,
2	it'd be one voice that speaks on behalf of the Board, and
3	we answer those questions. Because in the discussion that
4	happened, the Policy Committee sounds like they hadn't
5	seen it or hadn't even gone to work. So I respectfully
6	requested just one, where the questions come from one
7	source. We're moving in two different directions because
8	they could possibly delay any of the work that we're
9	trying to do.
10	CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you, Deputy Chief.
11	DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Thank you.
12	COMMISSIONER BERNARD: We can address that.
13	CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: That's good.
14	CHAIRPERSON HOLT: I'd like to say in response to
15	your question regarding the policy meeting that
16	transpired on that day. It was a very high-level
17	integrity-based presentation. Yes, it was noteworthy, and
18	I understood clearly what was being communicated at that
19	Policy Committee meeting.
20	MS. SHAH: Is there a motion on the floor?
21	CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Right.
22	COMMISSIONER BERNARD: What motion?
23	PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: The motion was
24	not seconded.

25 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Right. Well, the motion wasn't



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second because it went on. I think it went on and on and
 on. So we need to know what your motion was.

3 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I'd like to make a motion at 4 this time.

5 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Bernard has-

6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: My motion is-

7 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Se's opened up the floor.

8 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Our staff together with any 9 persons on the Policy Committee, meet with the department 10 to try to work out the 11 issues, which are redlined and 11 yellow lined within our report that we need to negotiate 12 and agree upon in terms of this technology, so that we 13 can better protect the public.

14 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Seconded.

COMMISSIONER BERNARD: It's a \$5 million expenditure.
 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Second.

17 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Mr. Chairman. I mean-

18 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: It has been moved and second.

19 COMMISSIONER: Through the Chair for discussion.

20 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Excuse me. So the motion was that 21 the Policy Committee meets.

COMMISSIONER BERNARD: No, and the staff be led by Ms. SHAH on this issue because she's begun negotiating it so far.

25 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair. How can the



new Secretary who just recently arrived here, take lead
 on something that-

3 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Bernard, you and your4 insults are often-

5 COMMISSIONER BURTON: That's not an insult.

6 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: You and your attempt insult.

7 COMMISSIONER BURTON: That's not an insult.

8 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Oftentimes contrary to the

9 movement or the progress that you should be thinking.

10 COMMISSIONER BURTON: That's not an insult.

11 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: Madam Chair,

12 until you state the motion, the motion is not on the

13 floor.

14 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Oh, I'm sorry. Okay.

15 COMMISSIONER BURTON: You need to go back and look at 16 the minutes, Vice-Chair.

COMMISSIONER BERNARD: The motion is for our staff 17 together with any persons on the Policy Committee who 18 want to have any input in that discussion, meet with the 19 department to discuss the 11 items, which are clearly 20 outstanding in terms of the implementation of a license 21 plate reader policy and the acquisition, obviously of 22 23 that technology. That motion was seconded and that they 24 start that immediately. It was seconded by Commissioner 25 Holley.



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1	CHAIRPERSON HOLT: I believe the motion was that the
2	staff along with the Policy Committee meet with DPD as we
3	discuss the 11 items presented by the staff as part of
4	the specification report. So is there a second?
5	CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: It's already second.
6	CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Second. Question
7	COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair.
8	CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes. Well, someone said through
9	the Chair.
10	COMMISSIONER BURTON: Me.
11	COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: It was me before that.
12	COMMISSIONER BURTON: Well, he didn't speak. I spoke.
13	I said through the Chair. This commissioner to the left
14	of me did not say through the Chair. I said it. He raised
15	his hand.
16	CHAIRPERSON HOLT: I believe everyone in this meeting
17	is at least 21, I think. Commissioner Hernandez.
18	COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Thank you. Through the Chair
19	a few moments ago, we just and I need this clarification
20	from the parliamentarian, from Dr. Jackson. A few moments
21	ago, there was a motion to rescind which failed. Is this
22	not also an attempt to rescind a motion to rescind?
23	COMMISSIONER BERNARD: No.
24	CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Excuse me. We do have a
25	parliamentarian and she knows-



1 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Excuse you.

CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Her craft. So let's please honor
her as she expresses her comment. I'm sorry. Well, okay.
I can zip up.

COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: If that's the case, which it 5 6 appears to be. So then this motion made by Commissioner Bernard would be improper. Could you clarify, please? 7 8 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: Certainly, speaking strictly from a parliamentary view, the motion 9 that was adopted last week adopted that specifications 10 report in its current form. The attempt to this motion 11 12 that says to continue negotiating with the DPD is outside 13 of any parliamentary movements I've ever seen. It is 14 difficult for the parliamentarian to rule on something 15 that is so odd. I'm not trying to be funny or 16 disrespectful. This Board by its motion adopted the 17 specifications report in its current form. The motion to rescind failed. From a parliamentary view, the action 18 taken on this Board on that report is over. Now, the law 19 department has provided an opinion that said the motion 20 to adopt the expansion of the license plate reader 21 included that report and that report has been sent. 22 23 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: What I'm

24 hearing you say with this motion is that you want the 25 staff and the Policy Committee to work on resolving the



1 11 issues that were referred to in the report. The question would be then to what end? What would you do 2 with that? You've already adopted the report. Now maybe 3 4 the lawyer has an answer to that question. COMMISSIONER BERNARD: If I may, we could tell city 5 council that we've resolved those issues. It's a 6 continuing process, just like a legislative process in 7 the legislature. We could say we've resolved these 11 8 9 points and we fully agree and concur with your approving this, as opposed to saying we want you to not approve it. 10 11 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Madam Chairwoman. 12 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yeah. 13 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Just continue to clarify for 14 us, again. If the current motion that's on the table, if 15 the action, if adopted would rescind-COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Oh, it won't rescind it. 16 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Yes, it will. It would 17 rescind the report. Therefore, it's out or it's an 18 improper motion. There's no two ways about it. The action 19 20 that would result in this motion that's on the table would ultimately rescind what we already voted to not 21

22 rescind five minutes ago.

23 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: It has the 24 appearance of a runaround. When I say runaround, I don't 25 mean runaround like confusion. It has the appearance of



1 saying, we've adopted this report, but now we want to

2 further discuss these other-

3 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Would it not-

4 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: Issues.

5 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: It's a simple yes or no.

6 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: Your adoption

7 of the report.

8 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: It pulls back.

9 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: Report is10 adopted.

11 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: That's right. It pulls it 12 back.

13 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: No, I'm not 14 sure it would do that.

15 ATTORNEY ADAM SAXBY: Through the Chair, to 16 commissioner. I believe that the parliamentarian's 17 absolutely right on that. What matters is the end result. What is the end intent? If the end intent is that the 18 report be changed, it cannot be changed at this point. 19 What can happen, and what I believe Commissioner Holley 20 was requesting was that the staff and the BOPC can go 21 22 back with the law department, discuss these matters further, and then submit an opinion or some supplementary 23 24 document to city council identifying any further issues or any additional clarifications from those 25



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conversations. But it necessarily cannot change that
 report because that report was what was just moved
 forward and the vote to rescind that along with the
 approval went away.

5 ATTORNEY ADAM SAXBY: So I believe that fundamentally 6 the question is to what end? I believe that if it is to 7 the end of what Commissioner Holley identified, which is 8 providing a supplementary document to city council based 9 on the conversations with DPD, there is nothing 10 preventing the BOPC from doing that. Any citizen can 11 provide commentary to.

12 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: So as a point of further 13 clarity, that is not the current motion. It's not to 14 provide an appendix. There's motion to pull it back to 15 policy and continue to work on those items.

16 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I was wrong.

17 ATTORNEY ADAM SAXBY: Right.

PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: It's a fine 18 distinction, but it's important, not the current. So to 19 provide a secondary report on this issue that does not 20 rescind adoption of the report as you voted I think could 21 be acceptable as long as nothing is done to try and 22 undermine the fact that that report was adopted. Since 23 the motion to rescind failed you are stuck with that 24 25 until the next meeting. Now look at the next meeting, you



1 could bring this issue up again. It renews at the next end since the motion to rescind failed. It can be renewed 2 at the next meeting if you feel that this is something 3 you want to continue. But what is important is what 4 5 Attorney Saxby said. As long as what you're doing is not an attempt to overturn the action that was taken to adopt 6 7 that report from last week, then there may be some other options for you moving forward. But the language of that 8 motion is critically important. 9

10 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: So this current motion would 11 just allow for people to gather and talk in the same room 12 but the train already left. That's essentially what's 13 happening. Because that train left, it's already in 14 council's hands.

15 ATTORNEY ADAM SAXBY: Through the Chair.

16 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Right.

17 ATTORNEY ADAM SAXBY: Unless again, if you want to bring that train back, as it were, that would be the 18 motion to rescind. Right. The issue is that we don't want 19 to supplant the will of this body. Right now, the will of 20 the body through the votes has moved that matter forward 21 and has declined to rescind. The body can do that again 22 next week. If they decide to do so, then they can rescind 23 the matter. If the intent, though, is to ask the staff 24 25 and the Policy Committee to get in a room with DPD and



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have further discussions and then let city council know what the results of those discussions were, I would recommend just a separate motion clarifying that so that the intent is clear. Because I believe that is the crux of some of the issues. We want to make sure that the intent of this body is clear so that their will is enacted.

8 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: So Commissioner Bernard, the 9 appropriate request, could you take back your motion. 10 Because I believe I understand what Commissioner Holley 11 is seeking as well as Commissioner Bernard and to some 12 effect, state the intent of why we are moving this 13 motion.

14 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: The intent is to address the-15 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Be willing to bring back your 16 initial motion and state the intent.

17 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: Once the motion 18 has been stated by the Chair, it no longer belongs to the 19 maker of the motion. It belongs to the assembly, and only 20 the assembly can amend it or withdraw it.

21 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay.

22 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: If the 23 commission is not ready to vote on something like that 24 today, you can consider and discuss it. You can talk with 25 me and make that motion next week. You lose nothing by



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doing that. But once that motion is stated by the Chair
 and no longer belongs to the maker of the motion,
 Commissioner Bernard cannot at this point amend or change
 her motion. Only the commission can do that. Only the
 Board can do that.

6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I'm not trying to amend or change it. I think it's to the benefit of the community 7 for us to continue these discussions. Like it could be 8 9 for any incident that happened in the city of Detroit or anything else. We've established you've said that we 10 support it. Okay. But this still needs to be flushed out 11 12 and it needs to be communicated in a way to the community 13 that makes sense so that when it gets to the city 14 council, if in fact we're not successful, for example, 15 with the department on these issues, then we can just 16 turn it over to city council and they can negotiate it 17 and I'll help them.

18 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: So are we ready for the question?
19 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I guess we need to know what the
20 question is.

21 COMMISSIONER BANKS: I liked that.

22 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: The motion is that the staff and 23 the Policy Committee meets with DPD to discuss the 11 24 items with which we have an objection to be part of-25 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: To help resolve our concerns.



1 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay. To help resolve our

2 concerns.

3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay.

4 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Make sense?

5 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Yes.

6 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I've got discussion too, Madam7 Chair.

8 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Congressman.

9 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay. I think we are in voting 10 mode.

11 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Discussion.

12 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Do I understand? I just restated 13 the motion so that we could call to question, I thought. 14 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: Has debate been 15 exhausted?

16 COMMISSIONER: Sure.

17 COMMISSIONER BURTON: No, it has not. I want to speak 18 on behalf of the residents of District 5 that elected me.

19 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: It's up to the20 Chair.

21 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: You don't have the-

CHAIRPERSON HOLT: I really thought that we had called a question and I called the question within, and that was why I restated the motion. So now we're saying it is appropriate for us to open up-



PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: A motion to 1 call the question is a motion. It has been seconded and 2 3 it has to be voted on. That did not occur. One person cannot decide that that room full of people have to stop 4 5 voting. So if someone wants to call the question, they can do that. But that's a motion. It has to be seconded. 6 It has to be voted on. It requires two thirds to be 7 adopted. 8 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I'm calling to discuss because 9 I have not discussed this. 10 11 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I've had a motion to call a 12 question. 13 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I seconded it. 14 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: Well, now you 15 have a motion to call the question and a second. Non 16 debatable. You cannot debate the motion to call the 17 question. 18 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you. 19 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: Vote on it. CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes, ma'am. So, Ms. SHAH. 20 MS. SHAH: Vice-Chair Annie Holt to call the question 21 22 - Call the question. Yes. 23 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Ms. Chair, I've asked to-24 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Call the question. 25 COMMISSIONER BURTON: To debate this before this got



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closed just now. I did call to debate this. I haven't had 1 my fair chance to do that on behalf of the consensual 2 that I served. This is a disservice to-3 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Point of order. We're in the 4 middle of voting. Yes. 5 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I called to discuss. I didn't 6 discuss this. 7 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: But the question was called, 8 which means all discussion is ended. 9 COMMISSIONER BURTON: It just got called. But I 10 11 asked-12 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Vote no. You vote no and then 13 if it fails-14 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I called the-COMMISSIONER BURTON: Point of order. We're in the 15 16 middle of voting. 17 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I called to be recognized 18 before it got closed. 19 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Ms. SHAH. 20 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I was waiting patiently. 21 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Ms. SHAH. 22 MS. SHAH: You're on the motion to call the question-23 COMMISSIONER BURTON: This goes against democracy. MS. SHAH: Commissioner Bernard. 24 25 COMMISSIONER BURTON: This goes against democracy.



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1	COMMISSIONER BURTON: Commissioner Willie Burton on
2	the motion to call the question - I'm going to sustain
3	because I do not agree with this process.
4	CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you.
5	COMMISSIONER BURTON: This is a role for-
6	CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you.
7	MS. SHAH: Commissioner Hernandez —
8	COMMISSIONER BURTON: Democracy.
9	CHAIRPERSON HOLT: I'm sorry, could we please move
10	on.
11	MS. SHAH: Commissioner Jesus Hernandez - to call the
12	question. Yes.
13	MS. SHAH: Commissioner Jim Holley - Yes.
14	MS. SHAH: Commissioner QuanTez Pressley - Yes.
15	MS. SHAH: Commissioner Cedric Banks - Yes.
16	MS. SHAH: Madam Chair, you have 6 = Yes votes and 1
17	= No vote for caller question. The motion passed.
18	PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: You move
19	immediately to vote on the motion.
20	CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay.
21	CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Roll call.
22	CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay. We understand what the
23	motion is.
24	COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Yes.
25	MS. SHAH: Do we need to restate? Okay. Everyone



1 understands.

2 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Just don't know what the questions are. The 12 questions. 11 question. 3 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: The motion is to have staff and 4 5 policy meet with DPD so that we can clear up some of the 6 11 items that have been proposed by the Board. COMMISSIONER BURTON: What are the 11 items? The 7 public would like to hear that. 8 9 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Get them already. 10 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: They're in the report. They're in 11 the report. Okay. Ms. SHAH, would you please call the 12 commissioners. 13 MS. SHAH: Vice-Chair Annie Holt - Okay. I am voting 14 no. 15 MS. SHAH: Commissioner Linda Bernard - Yes. 16 MS. SHAH: Commissioner Willie Burton - I'm going to 17 sustain because I don't agree with this process. MS. SHAH: Commissioner Jesus Hernandez - No. 18 MS. SHAH: Commissioner Jim Holly - What did you say? 19 20 No. CHAIRPERSON HOLT: I said no. 21 22 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes. Just the opposite of you. 23 MS. SHAH: Commissioner QuanTez Pressley - Yes. 24 MS. SHAH: Commissioner Cedric Banks - Yes. 25 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: He didn't do it for you. Okay.



1	What was the outcome, Ms. SHAH?
2	MS. SHAH: So Madam Chair, you have 4 = Yes votes and
3	3 = No votes. Does this require two-thirds?
4	CHAIRPERSON HOLT: No.
5	MS. SHAH: Require majority.
6	CHAIRPERSON HOLT: The majority.
7	MS. SHAH: Then the motion passed.
8	COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you. Praise God.
9	COMMISSIONER BURTON: The motion, Madam Chair.
10	CHAIRPERSON HOLT: So one second.
11	CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Move to adjourn.
12	COMMISSIONER BURTON: Agenda.
13	COMMISSIONER: Meeting go.
14	COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: The agenda. We still have
15	more meeting.
16	COMMISSIONER: Oh, really?
17	COMMISSIONER: Yeah.
18	COMMISSIONER BURTON: Madam Chair, I'd like to make a
19	motion at this time.
20	CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay. So that I understand. The
21	committee-
22	CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: What's left on the agenda?
23	CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Staff and Chief's report.
24	COMMISSIONER: Chief investigator.

25 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay, we'll move on.



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COMMISSIONER BURTON: Madam Chair, I'd like to make a
 motion.

3 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Now we'll have a report from-

4 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Madam Chair.

5 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Chief Investigator.

6 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Madam Chair.

7 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Madam chair.

8 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Jerome Warfield.

9 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Point of order. As presidents.

10 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes, Commissioner Holley, point of 11 order.

12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: This is timewise. He comes every

13 month. I'd like to extend this if you would please

14 because of time.

15 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Madam Chair, I did call before16 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: I believe-

17 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Holley to be recognized. Once 18 again, you're disenfranchising the hundreds of thousands 19 of people that live in the 5th District.

20 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner, you only got 135 21 votes when you got it.

22 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioners let's be

23 professional.

24 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: You only got 135 votes.

25 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Holley, I believe you



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1 call-

2 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I'm the top vote getter here and I got thousands of voters, thousands of followers-3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: On the ballot. You're the only 4 5 person on the ballot and you got 135 votes top. COMMISSIONER BURTON: You get elected, my friend, and 6 7 you learn how to serve people instead of being an appendage to the mayor and to the Chief and being a 8 disservice to majority of Detroiters. 9 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: These are fighting words now, 10 11 boy. 12 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay. 13 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I move that adjourn. 14 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay. The motion to adjourn has 15 been made. Is there a second? Motion to adjourn. 16 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Then the next meeting. 17 COMMISSIONER BURTON: You get ten thousand votes or more in the district you come-18 19 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Second. COMMISSIONER BURTON: Talk to me. You get 35,000 in 20 the city. 21 22 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Could you please-23 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: To adjourn is non debatable. 2.4 25 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Don't have to.



PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: But since there are items on the agenda that you have approved to do, you are essentially shortchanging your agenda. So this motion to adjourn is debatable.

5 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Can I say motion to adjourn 6 and then we continue the items that we haven't discussed 7 in next week. They're the same report items. Nothing's 8 different.

9 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: No, you can't 10 have a motion to adjourn and then continue to discuss.

11 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Oh, no. I mean, should I make 12 my motion different? That's my question.

13 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Next meeting.

14 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Got announcement.

15 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: You got make a next meeting.

16 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: What is your 17 motion?

18 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: To continue the discussion of 19 items that we haven't yet addressed, that we continue 20 those to the next meeting. They're the same items every 21 week. That therefore we move to adjourn presently, 22 because of the time.

23 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: You would first24 have to-

25 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Almost.



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PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: Because these 1 items there have been no motions associated with them, 2 the motions to postpone would not be in order. You would 3 have to make the motion to adjourn the meeting. Adjourn 4 5 the meeting and then they would be under unfinished business at the next meeting. 6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: For the next meeting. 7 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: At the next meeting. 8 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: The motion to adjourn and that 9 the items be under unfinished business at the next 10 11 meeting. That's the motion. Thank you, ma'am. 12 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: That motion 13 needs to be seconded. COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Oh, I need a second. 14 15 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Is there, okay. Is there a second? 16 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Jim, I need a second. 17 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: You all are not ready to go? COMMISSIONER BERNARD: No, we are. As soon as you say 18 19 second. CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: You all are not ready to go? 20 Yes. Second. 21 2.2 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you. 23 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Discussion. 24 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I know you're ready to go.

25 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Discussion.



1 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Burton.

COMMISSIONER BURTON: I want to just say that this is 2 a disservice to the citizens of Detroit. We approve the 3 agenda in the beginning of this meeting and we're trying 4 5 to cut out and bail out on the people that elected us. 6 Some of you all may be appointed by the mayor, but I 7 serve the people. I'm here to serve. I'm here to move forward alone this agenda. I'm here because I want to 8 9 stand here and do my due diligence. But commissioners, you all should be ashamed of yourselves for cutting now. 10 You got Detroit residents sitting here in the audience, 11 12 wanting to see a meeting. But you all choose to bail out, 13 cut out of a meeting early. But we signed up to serve. 14 Part of our service is being present today.

15 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Can I respond?

16 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Moving along each line item on 17 an agenda. Not setting things aside for next week or for 18 future dates. But what you're doing here is being a 19 disservice. You cannot be an appendage of the mayor and 20 the Chief. You must exercise your fiduciary 21 responsibilities. You are called here to serve today. 22 Let's serve. Let's stop rubber stamping meetings and

23 walking out of meetings.

24 COMMISSIONER: 3 hours sir.

25 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: That's correct. Three hours.



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1 COMMISSIONER BURTON: You speak for yourself. I am 2 District 5. District 5 is present, and we would like to 3 continue the meeting.

4 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: May I call the question?

5 COMMISSIONER BURTON: For the rest of you all, you 6 should hand in your resignations if you don't want to be 7 part of this meeting and serve.

8 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: You don't want me to respond.9 You want me to respond?

10 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: I actually call the question so 11 that we can decide to vote.

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
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
