BOPC VIRTUAL MEETING
June 8, 2023 at 6:30 P.M.

1 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Good evening. This meeting
2 will now come to order. My name is Chairperson Bryan
3 Ferguson, and I would like to have Reverend Cornelius
4 Neil Davis, Jr. Pastor of Scott Memorial United Methodist
5 Church, will give the invocation and he will give welcome
6 remarks.

7 REVEREND DAVIS: Good evening, everyone.

8 COMMISSIONERS: Good evening.

9 REVEREND DAVIS: We welcome you to Scott Memorial
10 United Methodist Church. We are a congregation that's
11 over 114 years. We started off on East Urban, near
12 downtown. We went to Chicago and because of a fire we are
13 located here now. We welcomed you once, we welcome you
14 twice, we welcome you in the name of Jesus Christ. Part
15 of our vision as a local church is to be in service to
16 our community. That's why you are here today. Because we
17 are very intentional about being in service to our
18 community. So with that being the case, let us be one of
19 my phrases for attitude of prayer as your invitation to
20 come forward. Amen.

21 COMMISSIONERS: Amen.

22 REVEREND DAVIS: Oh, precious Lord, once again, that
23 we look to you in your word, it says, first seek you your
24 kingdom and your righteousness and then all things will
25 be added. When you give, nobody can take away. So we are

1 here today with our Board of Police Commissioners,
2 Almighty God, to be about the business that they have to
3 take care of. Let us be open to you because you have our
4 best interest at heart. We pray that everyone here will
5 receive something by word or deed, that when they leave
6 this place, they can get a better understanding. It is
7 always in the might name of Jesus, the Christ we pray.
8 Amen. God bless you.

9 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you, Reverend. Thank you
10 so much. Couple of housekeeping. Free food back there.
11 Yes. Oh, you don't have to wait until after the meeting
12 to go eat. You can go and eat right now. But please keep
13 your snacking to a minimum. The restrooms are right over
14 to your right, men and ladies. If you have a cell phone,
15 please put them on silent. Thank you, Mr. Brown,
16 introduction of commissioners, please.

17 MR. BROWN: Chairperson Bryan Ferguson – Here,
18 District 1.

19 MR. BROWN: Vice-Chairperson, Annie Holt – Here,
20 Vice-Chair At-Large.

21 MR. BROWN: Commissioner Linda Bernard – Attorney
22 Linda Bernard. District 2. It's good to see everyone.

23 MR. BROWN: Commissioner Cedric Banks – Present.

24 MR. BROWN: Commissioner Willie Bell – Present,
25 District 4.

1 MR. BROWN: Commissioner Willie Burton submitted an
2 excuse.

3 MR. BROWN: Commissioner Lisa Carter –

4 MR. BROWN: Commissioner Ricardo Moore – Commissioner
5 Ricardo Moore, representing District 7. It's good to see
6 you.

7 MR. BROWN: Commissioner Jesus Hernandez –

8 MR. BROWN: Reverend Jim Holley – Present.

9 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you, Mr. Brown. Now I'd
10 like to have an approval for the agenda for June 8th,
11 2023.

12 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Some moved.

13 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Is there a second?

14 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Second.

15 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Any discussion? All in favor?

16 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

17 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: All opposed? All right. The
18 agenda will be approved. Now I'd like to have approval
19 for the minutes for June 1st, 2023.

20 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: So move.

21 COMMISSIONER: Support.

22 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Any discussion for the
23 minutes? No discussion. Those minutes will be approved.
24 Approval for both closed session minutes for June 1st,
25 2023.

1 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: So moved.

2 COMMISSIONER: Support.

3 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Any discussion? No discussion.

4 All in favor?

5 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

6 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: All opposed? Those minutes
7 will be approved. Let the record show that Commissioner
8 Carter has entered, and Commissioner Pressley is, I mean,
9 I'm sorry. Commissioner Hernandez has entered. Welcome.
10 Introduction of BOPC staff, Mr. Brown.

11 MR. BROWN: We have with us Chief investigator,
12 Jerome Warfield, Ms. Theresa Blossom. Ms. Mary Simmons,
13 Ms. Nicole Mesner, Ms. Brianna Shimmon, Mr. Henry Ellis,
14 Mr. Valdi Flemings, Mr. Justin St. Clair, Mr. Joseph
15 Mosley, Parliamentary Dr. Francis Jackson, DPD HR
16 Director Katrina Patillo, The American Sign Language
17 Interpreters team Carmen and Toia, Mr. Don Handyside, the
18 court reporter. Media Services is doing the video and
19 Sergeant Alan Quinn is doing the audio.

20 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Fantastic.

21 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Through the Chair. Mr. Brown, did
22 you call Investigator Sloan. Did you see her?

23 MR. BROWN: No. Investigator Sloan

24 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Keep going.

25 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: All right. Chief, who do we

1 have sitting in for you?

2 DEPUTY CHIEF SIMS: In for Chief White. Tonight, the
3 Second Precinct will be giving you guys a presentation.
4 So we have Commander Michael Chambers here. Captain
5 Derrick Maye's here. When they come up, I know they'll
6 introduce their team. I see Second Deputy Chief Kira Joy
7 Hope. I think that's it for now until the commander comes
8 up with his presentation.

9 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Fantastic. Mr. Brown, elected
10 officials.

11 MR. BROWN: Yes, Mr. Chair. Former Commissioner
12 William Davis, Ms. Fredia Butler, Community Relation
13 President of Second Precinct. Ms. Marie Overall, State
14 Representative Tyrone Carter's office. Mr. Chair, that's
15 it.

16 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: That's it. Fantastic. Welcome
17 everyone. I'm going to go off topic here for a second and
18 I want to do something under my Chair report. Our new
19 investigators are going to be sworn in today, so I'd like
20 to have you guys come up to the podium. Investigator
21 Harry Ellis, Investigator Baldy Fleming, Investigator
22 Nicole Meiser, Investigator Joseph Mosley, Investigator
23 Brianna Schinman, Investigator Mary Simmons, Investigator
24 Justin St. Clair, and Chief Investigator Reverend Jerome
25 L. Warfield Sr.

1 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Through the chair. Do I have your
2 permission to speak?

3 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes.

4 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay. I'm excited that you are
5 here to be appointed to this position. However, is this
6 on the agenda Chair?

7 COMMISSIONER: Can you guys turn around?

8 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Excuse me, Chair.

9 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes.

10 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Is this on the agenda?

11 COMMISSIONER: It's part of my Chair report.

12 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Ladies and gentlemen of Second
13 Precinct and honored guests, these are your new
14 investigators right here. Just got newly hired. Now you
15 guys are getting ready to be sworn. So I'm getting ready
16 to give you the oath of office so repeat after me. I,
17 state your name, hold your right hand up. Hold your right
18 hand up.

19 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Right hand.

20 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: I, state your name, do
21 solemnly swear or affirm that I will support the
22 Constitution of the United States and the Constitution
23 and the laws of the United States of Michigan and the
24 charter of the city of Detroit, Detroit, and that I will
25 faithfully and impartially perform and discharge the

1 duties of the office as an investigator for the city, for
2 the Detroit Board of Police Commissioners according to
3 the law and the best of my ability. Congratulations. Give
4 us one second audience. We're trying to get logged back
5 in on Zoom. Okay. I guess we're back up. Sorry for the
6 delay. The Zoom people. Again, my name is Bryan Ferguson,
7 Chairperson of the Board of Police Commissioners, and
8 I've had the honor to lead the men and women of the Board
9 and staff and OCI for almost a year now. My year is
10 winding down. As of July, the first my year will be up. A
11 lot of people said I was moving at light speed. That's
12 because I found out I only had a year to be in this seat.
13 So I had to try to do things that I thought was right and
14 after thinking, I knew it was right. Did I ruffle a lot
15 of thought recording in progress? Yes, I sure did.

16 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: I said, but some of the
17 mistakes I made, I corrected them right away. Some of the
18 changes I made, I hope they don't get undone. As you hear
19 my voice every week, I've been saying that every week.
20 Whoever you decide to put in this chair, please, I hope
21 they try not to undo what I've done. Try to enhance it.
22 Right. But then again, you still have to do things your
23 way. I may not like it, but I will follow your lead and
24 try to bring integrity, honesty, and transparency. That's
25 what I ran on.

1 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: This is just a journey I never
2 thought I would ever take. The light takes a turn, and I
3 got in that car and I took the wheel and I enjoyed every
4 minute of it. Trust me, I have met some amazing people.
5 Put me in situations I never dream I'd be in before and I
6 never would do it again. I mean, I'm sorry, I would do it
7 again. I wouldn't change a thing from the graduations.
8 You guys ever watched the graduations? I try to bring a
9 little flare to it. I open up the graduations with a
10 joke. They said, that's never been done before. That's a
11 trying time for a lot of people and they're nervous. I
12 try to bring some laughter just for a couple of minutes
13 while I'm up there. I'm going to miss sitting in this
14 seat, but I'm going to enjoy sitting back and just
15 watching and listening and see how the next Chair
16 performs so I can give him or her my full support.

17 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: VC Holt, I want to say thank
18 you for being my Vice-Chair. That was an honor for me to
19 have you as my Vice-Chair. I know I call on you a lot,
20 all hours of the night and when you don't answer, I call
21 back. I want to thank my family for listening to me while
22 I come home and gripe. I just want to say thank you. This
23 has truly been an honor. It really has. It's truly an
24 honor. Thank you. Thank you so much. I'm not going
25 anywhere. In fact, I'm going to be sitting in one of

1 these seats over here. Come July the first I'll probably
2 be the one sitting back talking and the Chair has to tell
3 me to be quiet. See how that works. Never get a chance to
4 do that. So with that being said, I don't want to delay
5 this anymore. The elections for the Board of Police
6 Commissioners for Chair, we're going to do the Chair
7 first and then we're going to do the vice-Chair second.
8 So now the nomination for Chair is up.

9 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Mr. Chairman.

10 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes.

11 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: To your left, I'd like to
12 nominate commissioner QuanTez Pressley for Chair.

13 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Second.

14 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: Mr. Chairman,
15 he has to accept the nomination.

16 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes.

17 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: The bylaws
18 require since Commissioner Pressley is not present that
19 he has indicated a willingness to serve.

20 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: I'm sorry, did I?

21 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: The bylaws
22 don't require that the person be present, but it does
23 require that they have indicated a willingness to serve.

24 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you.

25 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: From my understanding, he has.

1 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: Thank you.

2 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: So it has been seconded.

3 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Chairman, I'd like to nominate
4 Cedric Banks for Chair.

5 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: What's that, sir?

6 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Banks for Chair.

7 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Cedric Banks for Chair. Is
8 there a second?

9 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: No second is
10 required on a nomination.

11 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Any others for Chair?

12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Chair, may I move those two
13 names?

14 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Through the Chair. I moved that
15 Commissioner Linda Bernard be nominated as Chair.

16 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Is there a second?

17 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: No, second is—

18 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: I'm sorry. Any more
19 nominations?

20 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Mr. Chairman, I'd like to move
21 that nomination be closed on those three names.

22 COMMISSIONER: Second.

23 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Now there's a second for that
24 one, right?

25 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: Yes, sir.

1 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Okay.

2 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: It's non
3 debatable, however.

4 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Right. Non debatable.
5 Nominations are now closed. Now we'll be voting on
6 QuanTez Pressley.

7 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: No, sir. You
8 have to vote on closing the nominations.

9 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: What's that now?

10 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: You have to
11 vote on whether to close the nominations.

12 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Right. I'm just saying the
13 names of who we're going to be voting for.

14 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: No.

15 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: You don't have to do that?

16 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: Vote on closing
17 the nomination.

18 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Okay.

19 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Can we take a vote on closing
20 the nominations by show of hands.

21 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: It can be a
22 show of hands, but you have to vote on that motion.

23 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Show of hands for closing. All
24 opposed? All right. Nominations are now closed. Okay, now
25 the three nominations is Commissioner QuanTez Pressley,

1 Commissioner Cedric Banks and Commissioner Linda D.
2 Bernard.

3 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: Mr. Chairman.

4 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes.

5 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: I'm sorry for
6 disturbing you again, but I need to point out that the
7 bylaws of the Board of Police Commissioner require a
8 majority vote for election. Sometimes people confuse the
9 highest number of votes with majority vote. The majority
10 vote is the majority of votes passed. So if someone gets
11 four votes, someone gets three votes, someone gets two
12 votes, that's nine votes. No one is elected because the
13 majority of nine would be five. So I want to make sure
14 the commissioners understand that majority vote is
15 required. The majority of votes pass, not necessarily the
16 highest number. Secondly, there is no way in an election
17 to vote No. We're not voting yes or no on candidates. We
18 cannot do that in an election. Now, the issue of
19 abstentions can be addressed by Attorney Saxby, but
20 that's just my part.

21 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: But we still can do this on
22 show of hands. Correct?

23 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: It can be show
24 of hands. It's not going to be called for abstention and
25 there's not going to be a call for a No vote. You cannot

1 vote No. Can only vote for someone else.

2 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Got you. But if you don't
3 raise your hand, that's considered a No vote, right?

4 ATTORNEY ADAM SAXBY: Through the Chair, in this
5 instance, because there is no No vote, you have to vote
6 for a name, then that way there can be no No. So in other
7 words, because the OMA requires that the public have
8 notice of what the members of this public body want to
9 vote for. It is the law department's recommendation that
10 every member of this body vote for one of the people
11 nominated here rather than abstaining.

12 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Mr. Chairman?

13 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes.

14 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I apologize for having to do
15 this, but I would move that any and all remarks by Mr.
16 Saxby be deleted from the record and that he also be
17 asked to move to the audience. He is not a licensed
18 attorney in the state of Michigan. He has consistently
19 held himself out as an attorney. He is a paralegal. That
20 is not an attorney. So I would ask that you direct him to
21 do so.

22 ATTORNEY ADAM SAXBY: Through the Chair. That's
23 entirely untrue.

24 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: That's what?

25 ATTORNEY ADAM SAXBY: That's entirely untrue. I am a

1 licensed attorney in the state of Michigan and vetted
2 through the law department.

3 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Then why does your P number
4 say PL for paralegal?

5 ATTORNEY ADAM SAXBY: It doesn't say-

6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: It does say. I just looked it
7 up myself. You are not-

8 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: We can have this offline.

9 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Sorry, Mr. Chairman.

10 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: We can have this offline.

11 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: We don't have a problem. But
12 he should not hold himself out in this meeting as our
13 attorney.

14 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes, we'll have this-

15 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: In this state and four others
16 for more than 40 years. I know what I'm talking about.

17 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Okay. So now we're going to
18 move to vote for Commissioner Pressley for Chair. All in
19 favor? Raise your hand for QuanTez Pressley. Are we doing
20 who's doing the count?

21 COMMISSIONER: Six votes.

22 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Six. All in favor for Cedric
23 Banks. All in favor for Linda Bernard?

24 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: You can raise your hand but
25 once? Oh, I know that I'm voting by myself.

1 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: So QuanTez Pressley gets 6
2 votes. That's a majority. Congratulations QuanTez
3 Pressley, you are now the new Chair. Now I'm going to be
4 voting for Vice-Chair. I'd like to open up for
5 nominations for Vice-Chair. Nominations are now open up
6 for Vice-Chair.

7 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Through the Chair. I move that
8 Commissioner Holley be nominated with Vice-Chair of BOPC.

9 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Is there a second? No, second.
10 I'm sorry. Is there any more nominations for Vice-Chair?
11 No more nominations for Vice-Chair. One more time. Any
12 more nominations for Vice-Chair?

13 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I move Mr. Chairman that he be
14 Vice-Chair by acclimation.

15 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Nominations. Can we get a
16 motion for the nominations to be closed?

17 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: Yes. That
18 first.

19 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Can we have a motion for the
20 nominations to be closed for Vice-Chair?

21 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: So moved.

22 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Right.

23 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: Non debatable
24 motion.

25 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Right. Non debatable. All in

1 favor of Commissioner Reverend Jim Holley?

2 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: No. All in
3 favor of closing nominations, sir.

4 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Oh, all in favor of closing
5 the nominations. Raise your hand. Nominations are now
6 closed. Now we're going to vote. All in favor for
7 Commissioner Reverend Jim Holley to be Vice-Chair, raise
8 your hands. I mean, was that eight?

9 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Eight.

10 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Eight. That's the majority.
11 Congratulations, Commissioner Jim Holley. Welcome. Wow.
12 Chief, your report.

13 DEPUTY CHIEF SIMS: Through the Chair. Good evening,
14 everyone.

15 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Good evening.

16 DEPUTY CHIEF SIMS: My name is DeShaune Sims. I'm
17 Deputy Chief over Western operations. I'm sitting in
18 tonight for Chief James E. White. I'm going to provide
19 you with our department report. We have currently one
20 member of the department who was out disabled and
21 recovering at home to an on-duty injury. He's a police
22 officer from the Seventh Precinct. As it relates to our
23 crime data, we are up 7% in total part 1 violent crimes.
24 For homicides we're up plus 3 compared to last year. For
25 our non-fatal shootings, we're up plus 9 compared to the

1 same time last year. Going into our significant events.
2 On Saturday June 3rd at 11:00 PM officers were dispatched
3 to the area of Ashton and Belton to a call for service
4 related to a ShotSpotter run for shots being fired in the
5 area.

6 DEPUTY CHIEF SIMS: As officers arrived on the scene
7 to check, the officers were in plain clothes in a UC
8 capacity in an unmarked vehicle when they observed
9 several individuals standing in the driveway of a house
10 located on that block. The officers drove past
11 individuals still checking the area when shots were fired
12 at their car as it passed. The officers took cover and
13 requested backup. Several officers arrived on the scene
14 to assist and check the area where the individuals were
15 standing in the driveway where they were last seen.
16 Several individuals were detained and investigated.
17 However, no arrests were made. The case remains open and
18 pending further investigation. If anyone has any
19 information, we're requesting that you contact Crime
20 Stoppers at 1-800 Speak Up.

21 DEPUTY CHIEF SIMS: Our second incident is a double
22 fatal shooting. On Sunday, June 4th at 6:40 PM officers
23 were dispatched to Sinai Grace's Hospital to investigate
24 a call for service for a person dropped off at the
25 emergency room. Officers arrived at the location and

1 discovered that the victim was dropped off at the
2 hospital, suffering from a gunshot wound and stab wounds.
3 The victim was declared deceased upon arrival by hospital
4 staff. Officers were able to determine that the incident
5 may have occurred in the 12,000 block of Chapel. With
6 that information, they went to a home on the 12,000 block
7 of Chapel, where they found another individual who was
8 pronounced deceased at the scene. Homicide detectives
9 began their investigation canvassing the area for
10 additional witnesses, victims and or evidence, and spoke
11 to witnesses who said that they had come to the location
12 to check on one of the victims, which is a family member,
13 and discovered that the victim had been shot.

14 DEPUTY CHIEF SIMS: This case remains open as well,
15 and we're asking for anyone with additional information
16 to contact Crime Stoppers at 1-800. Speak Up. We have a
17 death investigation on June 5th at 3:40 AM in the 4,400
18 block of West Vernor Highway to investigate a call for
19 service on a person being shot. Officers arrived at the
20 scene and observed the victim suffering from an gunshot
21 wound to the head. The victim was transported to Detroit
22 Receiving Hospital for treatment where he was pronounced
23 deceased. Officers at the scene, which is a neighborhood
24 gas station, spoke to the person suspected of committing
25 the crime. They also reviewed video evidence at the scene

1 which showed a confrontation between the two individuals.
2 The suspect was arrested and conveyed to the Detroit
3 Detention Center. Homicide detectives have prepared a
4 warrant and submitted it to Wayne County Prosecutor's
5 office for review.

6 DEPUTY CHIEF SIMS: That warrant is currently still
7 under review. Again, if anyone with any other information
8 are encouraged to contact 1-800 Crime Stoppers.
9 Yesterday, June 7th, at 7:42 PM officers were dispatched
10 to Beaumont Hospital, Grosse Pointe to investigate a call
11 for service of a child. Shot officers arrived at the
12 scene and spoke to the parents or the victim that stated
13 that they were outside of the home in the 600 block of
14 Tennessee when the shooting occurred. Both stated that
15 they were unsure as to what happened as they were both
16 outside, only stating that they heard two shots prior to
17 running into the home and finding the child shot. Both
18 also indicated that a firearm was located inside the
19 home. In addition, several children, including the
20 victim, were in the home at the time of the shooting. The
21 parents were transported to the Detroit Police
22 headquarters to be interviewed by our Child Abuse Unit.

23 DEPUTY CHIEF SIMS: The victim is listed in stable
24 condition with a gunshot wound to his left cheek and
25 shoulder. Officers responded to the home of Tennessee and

1 discovered evidence of a shooting at the location.
2 However, arrests have been made at this time and child
3 abuses continue to interview witnesses to determine how
4 the shooting occurred. On the positive side. On Friday,
5 June 2nd, Chief White reinstated 4 members to the Detroit
6 Police Department. To date since our new contract went
7 into effect, the Chief has now reinstated 41 officers
8 that have gone to other police agencies but are now
9 coming back to Detroit. On Monday, June 5th at Gordon
10 Park, Chief White spoke at the Detroit City Council Gun
11 Violence Task Force, Gun Violence Awareness Month Press
12 Conference. Also, in attendance and speaking with Deputy
13 Mayor Todd Bettison, City Council President Mary
14 Sheffield, Council President Pro Tem James Tate and
15 council member Fred Durhal, among others.

16 DEPUTY CHIEF SIMS: Chief White spoke to the
17 community members in attendance regarding the effects of
18 gun violence and the need for everyone to work together
19 to stop the violence we see in our community and across
20 this country. CBS News, Detroit and Bridge Detroit
21 covered the event and photos and videos were shared on
22 the City of Detroit's social media pages. On June 5th,
23 the Sixth Precinct neighborhood Police officers Fatal
24 Squad, Eighth Precinct officers and DPD chaplains came
25 together to help treat three children in need after they

1 lost both parents in a car crash. DPD officers donated
2 food, diapers, and toiletries from the Sixth Precincts
3 community closet to the children after the tragic
4 accident, which occurred on Saturday June 3rd in the area
5 of Grand River and Telegraph. The sad but touching story
6 was shared on the Sixth Precinct social media pages with
7 media outlets, including Local four and Metro Detroit
8 News, Instagram also share the story.

9 DEPUTY CHIEF SIMS: On Wednesday, yesterday, June
10 7th, Chief White and members of the community joined for
11 Walk a Mile Wednesday in the Second Precinct. DPD members
12 met up at 5:30 PM at Vernor Elementary School. Walk a
13 Mile Wednesday represents the department's obligation to
14 fitness and it's instrumental in maintaining the
15 relationships between law enforcement and the community.
16 The next Walk a Mile Wednesday will be Wednesday, June
17 14th, beginning assembly at 5:30 PM at the 10th Precinct,
18 located at 12,000 Livernois Avenue. Then a step off will
19 be at 6:00 PM. Tomorrow, there will be a memorial service
20 for missing persons and cold cases from 12:00 PM to 2:00
21 PM at 2 Woodward Avenue. The memorial service will honor
22 the lives of missing persons and cold cases and allow the
23 impacted families a place to remember their loved ones.
24 The contact for this event is Chaplain Yolanda Stinson at
25 (313) -542-2191.

1 DEPUTY CHIEF SIMS: On Saturday, DPD will be holding
2 a fundraiser event at the Merri-Bowl Lanes located at
3 30950 Five Mile Road in Livonia, Michigan. Funds raised
4 will go toward the Detroit Police Community engagement
5 programs to build initiatives that focus on our youth
6 social justice awareness programs' community policing.
7 The cost includes \$25 per person for open bowling. It
8 includes three games, shoe rental slice of pizza and pop.
9 Over \$40 per person for a nine pin no tap tournament.
10 \$500 cash prize for the first-place winner. So come out
11 and join in the festivities. That concludes the report
12 for the police department.

13 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Wow. Fantastic. Wow. All
14 right. Commissioner Hernandez, questions? Commissioner
15 Bell.

16 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you. Deputy Chief, I'm
17 somewhat dating myself, but do DPD scrutinize our liquor
18 inspection like we used to be in the past in terms of
19 liquor stores being wine stores? Do we still have first
20 line supervisors going through that type of inspection
21 process?

22 DEPUTY CHIEF SIMS: Yes. We still conduct MLCC
23 inspections to make sure they're not selling alcohol to
24 underage individuals.

25 COMMISSIONER BELL: Okay. Thank you.

1 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Carter.

2 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Good evening. No questions.

3 Thank you.

4 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Holley.

5 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. No
6 questions.

7 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Banks.

8 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Yes. Thank you, Mr. Chair.
9 Through the Chair. Deputy Chief, how are the officers
10 wellbeing doing?

11 DEPUTY CHIEF SIMS: So that is something that we
12 check on constantly to make sure that they're not
13 necessarily being overworked, but that we're monitoring
14 their mental health and making sure that they get the
15 time off that they need. So we are in contact with our
16 command team, making sure that they're making roll calls
17 and checking on just their overall mental health and
18 their physical wellbeing.

19 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Thank you.

20 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: No question for you?
21 Commissioner Bernard.

22 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Just quickly do you know the
23 status of the federal government's contribution of, I
24 believe 200 million to the city of Detroit. The mayor and
25 the Chief of police said they're going to hire 225, I

1 believe officers. Has that process started already?

2 DEPUTY CHIEF SIMS: Hiring is always an ongoing
3 process. There was a conversation with our HR director to
4 let her know that we are looking to hire those additional
5 200 people. So that is something that we are constantly
6 doing in our recruiting efforts and we're heading in that
7 direction.

8 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Okay. One other thing that
9 wasn't mentioned in your report, I received a text
10 message from Malik Shabazz indicating I guess that the
11 Chief will be at WC3 tomorrow downtown along with most of
12 his hierarchy, his deputy chief staff. He has asked me to
13 communicate to everyone here today that all women in
14 particular should attend that meeting. It's about crime
15 and children, and I've got a long text about it, but no
16 sense of reading that. But if you can appear tomorrow at
17 10:30, you can meet with the Chief and this hierarchy on
18 all these crime issues in the city of Detroit. Thank you,
19 Mr. Chairman.

20 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you. VC Holt.

21 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you. No questions, Chair.

22 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Okay. I got a couple. The NPO
23 program, phenomenal program. I love it. Right? It's
24 usually one MPO to a car. Can we kind think outside the
25 box a little bit? We have the radio patrol, right? We

1 have community leaders. Some of those community leaders
2 kind of know where some of the hotspots are. Is there any
3 way they can ride with them, like a ride along so they
4 can show some of the NPOs where the issues are, maybe one
5 day a week or something like that.

6 DEPUTY CHIEF SIMS: So I know we do allow ride
7 alongs. They just have to contact the precinct that they
8 want to do the ride along in and sign a waiver for that.

9 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Fantastic. Done. That was
10 easy. Okay. I'll let them know. That's what one thing
11 they asked me. The other thing, I know I sound like a
12 broken record, but the ATVs, I get a lot of calls on
13 those, right? I know we see them getting pulled onto the
14 truck, but I have one neighbor tell me they swear they
15 saw that thing again like two weeks later.

16 DEPUTY CHIEF SIMS: So if it's a license, if it's a
17 legally owned ATV, they'll get cited for driving it
18 within city limits because it's an off-road vehicle. But
19 they can get their vehicle back. They can't drive it from
20 that location. They would have to get some way to tow it
21 back. But if it's legally owned and licensed ATV, they
22 can get them back. But again, they do get cited for
23 riding it within the city.

24 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Okay. To me it's, it's kind of
25 slowing down. Okay. The other thing is—

1 DEPUTY CHIEF SIMS: The other thing, if people are
2 seeing people out on the ATVs riding them, they can
3 always reach out or go on our social media platform to
4 our rewards TV. Give us the information anonymously so
5 that we can check on the locations where they're seeing
6 the ATVs.

7 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Okay. Now the other one, the
8 big thing that's trying to grow legs. Now the pop-up
9 parties. Shutting down a whole street and they claim
10 they're going to try to do another one this weekend. Are
11 you guys ready for that?

12 DEPUTY CHIEF SIMS: Yes.

13 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Good. I'm going to follow them
14 if-

15 DEPUTY CHIEF SIMS: We do have units deployed. But it
16 would be helpful in your neighborhoods when you see
17 groups starting to gather to contact 911 or call up to
18 your local precincts to let them know that the group is
19 gathering so that we can get there before it gets out of
20 order or too many people start to gather so we can break
21 it up earlier rather than later. So again, if you see any
22 large groups starting to form, contact us and let us know
23 so that we can get some resources over there to break up
24 that group.

25 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Fantastic. Thank you. All

1 right.

2 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Mr. Chairman.

3 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes.

4 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Can you acknowledge the
5 president of the Second Precinct.

6 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: We're going to do that one.

7 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Yeah. Right.

8 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Oral communications, Mr.
9 Brown.

10 MR. BROWN: Good afternoon, Mr. Chair. There're
11 currently 10 speakers. I'll call those in attendance,
12 first. Ms. Charnita Williams, followed by Ms. Bernice
13 Smith, followed by Tobe MPD.

14 MS. WILLIAMS: You guys spoke about the constitution.
15 For the last five weeks, I've been coming in here and the
16 million-dollar question is, who are you guys sprayed up
17 at this table? Because every time I speak about Nakita
18 Wilson and all these illegal activities that's going on
19 in my life, far as home invasion being associated with a
20 UPS robbery. I can go down the list. I had an appointment
21 with you, Linda Bernard, last week, and you did not show
22 up to your office. I'm asking myself if you guys on this
23 committee, OCI, are representing the people, what's the
24 issue and how can she continue to get away with all these
25 illegal activities and violate my constitutional rights

1 and preventing me from getting legal help period,
2 interfering with that? Every time I try to get an
3 attorney, or I go speak to an attorney, someone contacts
4 that office, and does not want to represent me. So I have
5 an issue with this and I'm going to continue to say it
6 every time I come to this, every week if I have to.
7 Because at the end of the day, there's no way this person
8 can continue to get away with all these illegal
9 activities, especially when I have illegal cameras and
10 listening devices in my home and she have it on her
11 phone.

12 MS. WILLIAMS: She can bring it up on her cell phone
13 to see exactly what I'm doing in my home and my car. I
14 made several reports in the detective from OCI seeing my
15 footage on my cell phone and who have the power to delete
16 that. None of my phones are on through power. I mean
17 through the companies. I just used them to record and
18 take pictures. The detective said I had seen them. I
19 can't understand how that was possible. But who has the
20 power to do that? Then first police officers following me
21 in their civilian cars. I have an issue with that too. I
22 have a whole lot of issues. If you guys are going to do
23 your job, you should do it correctly. You represent the
24 people. You work for us. It only takes 10,000 votes to
25 get you out of this committee. That's how I feel.

1 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Excuse me, miss, before you
2 leave, can you give me a piece of paper with your number
3 on it? We attempted to contact you. We had no contact
4 information. When you get time, just give me a paper.
5 Thank you.

6 MR. BROWN: Ms. Smith.

7 MS. SMITH: Good evening to everyone here.

8 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Good evening.

9 MS. SMITH: I'm glad to be here guys. You just don't
10 know. God was good to me last week. I made 91. But I will
11 tell you this, since I made this good nine one, my head
12 is kind of cold because you know what? September 16th, I
13 fell in my home. I was rushed to the hospital by my
14 children. I have 28 stitches in my head. So you see why
15 I'm ball up at the top.

16 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: You look pretty.

17 MS. SMITH: Well, I don't wear the wig no more, so I
18 kind of like it now. Like all the rest of them. My Vice-
19 Chair over there, you don't have no hair just about. But
20 anyway, I'm not going to talk about myself. But I'm just
21 glad to be here guys. You just don't know. God has been
22 certainly good to me. I had a wonderful birthday this
23 past Saturday and I was sorry most of you guys weren't
24 there, but I did have my Chairman there. But we had a
25 good time. But anyway, and it was a surprise to me. So

1 I'm sorry I didn't get all of you guys on the agenda. In
2 the meantime, what I want to tell you, we have to be
3 soak. In the meantime, I don't have any teeth either.
4 That's another thing. They won't give me my teeth back.
5 So you've all got to forgive me. So I'm just playing with
6 you. But in the meantime, I'm going to do the best I can.
7 I want parents, everyone in the city of Detroit to be
8 careful with these guns. I am tired of looking at Channel
9 2, talking about the guns being shot by these children.
10 How you can't get it locked? I think if we go to the
11 police station, we get it locked.

12 MS. SMITH: We get locks, the chief says, and you
13 should put them up. Put them high in the closet somewhere
14 where these kids cannot reach for them or go underneath
15 the bed to get them. You shouldn't let the kids know that
16 you got guns in the house in the first place. Next, I'm
17 upset about the 14 and 17 running around here, shooting,
18 and going on.

19 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: You're up. You're right.

20 MS. SMITH: Why? Where are the parents? How come you
21 don't know when your 14-year-old is not going to school.
22 That's what I'm saying. You need to be in school and
23 parents.

24 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Ms. Smith.

25 MS. SMITH: It my time up?

1 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yeah.

2 MS. SMITH: Oh, well, anyway. God bless each and
3 every one of them because I love all.

4 MR. BROWN: Mr. Impenda.

5 MR. IMPENDA: First, I want to begin by saying I
6 respect everyone here and I hope that everyone here
7 respects each other as well. I'm a lifelong Detroiter.
8 Took my first breath at Herman Kiefer Hospital, so it's
9 real with me. Now, I'm here representing myself, but I am
10 a member of Hood Research and I also involve myself with
11 James Ford, which is the Obama weekend. Now, what I want
12 to address to the audience, and I'm sure you've heard
13 this before, is that we have rampant red light running.
14 It's out of control really. If we don't do something to
15 corral, it will get worse. Now, I can say that I'm only
16 here by the grace of God. What do I mean by that? I was
17 driving west on Puritan one day and the light was green
18 as I was approaching it. So I had the legal right to go
19 through it. Something in my spirit told me to hesitate,
20 which I did. A car flew through with no intention of even
21 acknowledging, slowing down. Just blew right through. Had
22 I continued to drive, he would've t-boned me on the
23 driver's side and I wouldn't stand before you now.

24 MR. IMPENDA: So I'm hoping that all of you here will
25 take this into consideration because we have family and

1 loved ones and at some point, if this is not brought
2 under control, we will be mourning someone rather than
3 having it done. So I'm hoping that everybody here again,
4 as I say, I'm only here because something in my spirit
5 told me at that time, don't proceed. When I saw the car
6 blew by, I had to say thank you, God, because I knew if I
7 had continued having the green light and right away, I
8 wouldn't stand here. So I hope that you'll take this
9 under advisement because each and every one of us as we
10 leave, we're going to be out there with other people.
11 There are thousands of people out there. There are a few
12 who are reckless with no regard. So I just hope everyone
13 takes that into consideration because I would like to see
14 all of you at the next meeting. I don't want to read in
15 the paper or hear on the news where someone was hit by a
16 reckless, careless driver. Thank you for your time.

17 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you. Wow.

18 MR. BROWN: Mr. Chair, your next three speakers would
19 be Minister. Eric Blount, followed by Mr. James Ford,
20 followed by Pastor Lorenzo Sewell.

21 MINISTER BLOUNT: Good evening board and the people
22 here in this audience. I am Minister. Eric Blount from
23 Sacred Heart Catholic Church here in Detroit. I also, too
24 am a lifelong Detroiter. I want to make one thing
25 perfectly clear. I choose to believe that the vast

1 majority of police officers are hardworking, honest
2 people. It's how we don't deal with the bad ones that
3 makes this situation so dangerous. Today we commemorate
4 the third year of the funeral of George Floyd. Again,
5 please recall that we only know about his murder due to
6 the bravery of a 16-year-old Black female. Say her name,
7 Darnella Frazier, who used her cell phone to record this
8 murder. This recording is critical due to the fact that
9 the police officially released statement said the George
10 Floyd died of medical incidents. The police do lie. Some
11 bad police officers do lie. In this particular situation,
12 it went all the way to the top because it was released to
13 the public.

14 MINISTER BLOUNT: The new Chairperson must correct
15 this ship and demand that this Board's primary focus is
16 on police officer misconduct. This Board, these meetings
17 are not for crime fighting, not for crime analysis, not
18 for crime data. This city must find another way to
19 address these other issues. This is for police officer
20 misconduct. Thank you.

21 MR. BROWN: Mr. Ford.

22 MR. FORD: First of all, I'm James Ford. I'd just
23 like to thank everybody that came here that will speak on
24 the running red lights and traffic problems that we are
25 having. I just want to say this, every animal, every

1 human, every nationality protects their babies. We have
2 babies, as I told you before, riding around in these cars
3 and they're going to be the first ones that are hurt.
4 We've got to protect them. We got to do all we can.
5 Please, if you can, take time, speak out against it. I
6 just want to let the police commissioner. The mayor and
7 the city council know that. Keep on pushing that paper.
8 Keep on pushing those councils and do something about
9 this because we can align a whole lot of people to go far
10 as we can. If we have to go to Lansing, that's where we
11 will go.

12 MR. FORD: We will go to Lansing. I can get enough
13 people. Not I. We can get enough people and do what we
14 have to do. This is terrible. It's an isolated situation
15 that Detroit has. I'm going to tell you one thing, and
16 I'm going to hope that bell doesn't ring. Let me just say
17 this. We have a situation where there's a such thing
18 called the irreversible evil. If you don't stop this now,
19 the young people that are driving that's learning to get
20 their driver's license, they will start doing this and
21 they're going to think it's the right thing to do and you
22 will not be able to reverse this evil. I saw it happen in
23 Kingston, Jamaica. Please do something now or it'll be an
24 irreversible evil. God bless everybody. Thank you.

25 MR. BROWN: Pastor Lorenzo.

1 MR. LORENZO: My name is Pastor Lorenzo Sewell and
2 I'm so grateful to be here today. I have the honor of
3 being the senior pastor of 180 Church, which is also
4 known as Evangel Echoes Church of the Air. Pastor George
5 Boggle, he started it as a radio station, and I have the
6 honor of serving with the second priest and it's been
7 such a blessing. Mother Smith, you mentioned the young
8 people. This Saturday we have an event so that we can
9 scholarship young people from Detroit, Pontiac Flint, and
10 Saginaw, full ride scholarships to Rochester University.
11 We'll give cash prizes out. Tell the elementary
12 basketball players and middle school and high school and
13 also 18 and up. It starts at 12 o'clock. But my concern
14 is that yesterday someone broke into my church. Can you
15 imagine it? Can you imagine someone pillaging the house
16 of God, Reverend Holley? And the first time they tried
17 second priest and said no.

18 MR. LORENZO: The second time they tried second
19 priest and said no. The third time they tried, they said
20 no. But yesterday someone came, and they jeopardized the
21 event that we have on Sunday. They jeopardized the house
22 of God. I want to say thank you to Commander Mark
23 Chambers. We're meeting tomorrow at one o'clock to talk
24 about it. I want to say thank you to James White. We
25 walked yesterday and we talked about it. My hope and my

1 prayer is that we can be able to get back the house of
2 God because right now someone's staying in our church
3 that is not the senior pastor. My hope is that our larger
4 family would come together so that we can be able to wrap
5 our arms around our young people starting this Saturday.
6 Thank you so much for allowing me to be here. Thank you.

7 MR. BROWN: Mr. Chair.

8 MR. LORENZO: Church is 13660 Stansbury Avenue,
9 Detroit, Michigan, 48227. Thank you so much.

10 MR. BROWN: Mr. Chair, your next set of speakers will
11 be Ms. Theo Broughton, followed by Former Commissioner
12 William Davis, followed by Ms. Michelle Jordan.

13 MS. BROUGHTON: Good evening, community.

14 COMMISSIONERS: Good evening.

15 MS. BROUGHTON: Good evening, Council. My name is
16 Theo Broughton. I'm co-founder of Hood Research, a
17 community organization that believed that people would do
18 better if they cared. We have many issues in our
19 community and we must be concerned about addressing them.
20 One is the issue of those who fly through red lights, and
21 they seem not to care whether they get hit or not. I
22 believe that we need to have a traffic enforcement group
23 that is larger than the one that exists now. We had a
24 race downtown and it was covered very well, but no
25 traffic enforcement within the community as that was. So

1 we need to hire more officers and put them in the traffic
2 enforcement. Number two, I think that if a person is
3 stopped, if you catch them for running through a red
4 light, then if there is a legal way to take their
5 vehicle, take it.

6 MS. BROUGHTON: They can't run through a red light
7 with no vehicle. More of that needs to be done. Also, I
8 think that we need to have inspectors going to the
9 locations to find out if these stores, bars, gas stations
10 are fully licensed. You've been hearing about that. There
11 needs to be a double check on that. There should be a
12 police, I guess, unit that checks licenses and then there
13 needs to be another unit to check if there are licenses.
14 Check and balance to make sure that it is happening and
15 there's no hanky panky, like with the towing industry.
16 Hood Research will be at the Montford Marines tomorrow
17 night at 6:00 PM with Barton McFarland Neighborhood
18 Association. We love our Marines, all those who put their
19 lives in jeopardy for us. So if you are available at 6
20 o'clock tomorrow evening, please, they're located on Joy
21 Road 13721, Joy Road. Let them know we support them as
22 well.

23 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you.

24 MR. BROWN: Commissioner Davis.

25 MR. DAVIS: Hello again. It is a joy and a pleasure

1 to be here. This is my precinct, the Second Precinct.
2 This is my area. But there are things that are wrong.
3 There are things that need more attention, especially as
4 it relates to, I have a seven-year-old grandson. But I
5 cannot let him go too far from the house because we have
6 lots of people and not just in the Second Precinct, but
7 all over the city that's constantly running red lights.
8 We have an epidemic and we need more effort, more people
9 power to look into it. We need more people power to look
10 into all the various problems we have in the city of
11 Detroit, and we do have many problems. Hopefully, this
12 Board will encourage and motivate more action on these
13 people running these red lights. Hopefully, this Board
14 can and will motivate more action to try to cut down
15 crime in the neighborhood. I go downtown and I don't
16 worry about crime so much, but in our neighborhoods it's
17 still a problem.

18 MR. DAVIS: It's still a problem. You have people
19 racing. You have people running red lights. You have
20 people just being bad people to each other. So hopefully
21 this Board can help to encourage people to be better.
22 Hopefully, this Board could perhaps really start doing
23 some public service announcements. I know when I was on
24 the Board, there were some talks and discussion about
25 doing more regular public service announcements. In fact,

1 Commissioner Bell and I filmed one. I have never seen it.
2 But hopefully the Board can be done. I encourage each and
3 every one of us, not just these people sitting here, but
4 each and every one of us to do more. If you see
5 something, say something. Far too many people don't do
6 that. Thank you.

7 MR. BROWN: Mr. Chair, your next set of speakers
8 would be Mr. Martin Gonzalez, followed by Black, Ms.
9 Pitchell George first.

10 MS. GEORGE: Thank you, Mr. Brown. To the Chair,
11 thank you for your service. Chairman Ferguson and to the
12 Honorable Board and to the Chief. We did enjoy that walk
13 with Chief White and the Second Police Precinct.
14 Wonderful officers and the best officers. So we do thank
15 you for your support. Deputy chief Edison's office did
16 respond to my request about the missing children. But I
17 do want to thank the Board for your support to deal with
18 the missing children that are occurring in the city of
19 Detroit. Also, what's happening with the speeding is the
20 marijuana. Now I know at 6:30, Councilman James Tate, he
21 probably was glad I wasn't on the call. He is running
22 with the zoning in the neighborhoods that marijuana is
23 killing. Like I told them, they worry about making money
24 off people's brain cells, that marijuana, cannabis is
25 causing psychosis.

1 MS. GEORGE: A lot of times the person doesn't know
2 they're in a psychosis state. We hear it all the time.
3 Just driving down Plymouth, you could see mental health.
4 So I did email the mayor about a mental health hospital.
5 This is a major issue. I do want to say to the pastor we
6 are doing the march with the George Floyd in Washington,
7 DC. Felonious, George Floyd brother. We are doing our
8 work as National Action Network. How many minutes I have
9 Mr. Brown? Because I can't see a clock.

10 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: You've got 40 seconds.

11 MS. GEORGE: 40 seconds. Thank you. So I do want to
12 say to the Board, it's marijuana that is driving the
13 city. The speeding, the running the red lights. This is
14 serious. We are looking for young people to go in careers
15 as attorney, congressmen, nurses. We see what's happening
16 in our ED department. I'm not going to say what hospital
17 I work at, work in another. But we see what's happening
18 in the staff and the nursing staff. The physicians do
19 really well, but we are really having a problem in this
20 city. Even as we walked with Chief White yesterday, pit
21 bulls on the roof. Thanks to the officers, they had their
22 guns. That's the first time I didn't feel scared of pit
23 bulls because they had their guns. We're going to be
24 reaching out and I'll mention this to Deputy Mayor that
25 cannabis will be the killer as what's his name? Dick

1 Gregory stated, it's going to wipe out their memory and
2 it's going to wipe us out. Thank you.

3 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you. Wow.

4 MR. BROWN: Mr. Gonzalez.

5 MS. GONZALEZ: Good evening. My name is Martin
6 Gonzalez. I'm from the Eighth Precinct area. I have three
7 folders with the report. Multiple page. An individual
8 moved onto my block and on that block in Brightmore for
9 50 years. The officer in Eighth Precinct (Audio
10 Distortion)] my block one year ago. Now, if you look at
11 the first page, six addresses were shot up. We're talking
12 about gun violence here. Six addresses were shot up. It's
13 been two months. No one's come out to collect evidence.
14 I've asked for evidence, texts, I get berated and
15 belittled by the police officers. I was arrested for four
16 days for taking a picture of a cage and an individual's
17 front porch. While I was arrested and detained for four
18 days at the Detention center, a dozen cats were removed.
19 On the morning in which this happened, there was the
20 remains of a cat left on the porch next to my 92-year-old
21 mother's house.

22 MS. GONZALEZ: My daughter saw it when she came to
23 relieve me for caretaking. She thought it was a vesicated
24 rabbit that the cats had caught. Okay. My garage has been
25 burned down by this individual. Here's a letter that I

1 received stating they'll get to me when they get to me.
2 I've been to the police station. I've made reports. I've
3 got plenty of report numbers. My neighbors are afraid to
4 walk out of their doors because their houses have been
5 shot up and because they don't want their garage burned
6 down or them to be arrested like I was. But when the
7 police show up, oh, that's old. I've still got bullets in
8 the walls of my house. Is my time up?

9 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes. Yes sir. Now we talked on
10 the phone, right? But we're going to get you some help,
11 Mr. Gonzalez. Yes.

12 MS. GONZALEZ: Blessed you.

13 MR. BROWN: All right. Thank you.

14 MR. BROWN: Black Jesus.

15 BLACK JESUS: For the residents and citizens of the
16 city of Detroit, it's Motor City Rue. Now we got two
17 mayoral appointees now heading up the Board of Police
18 Commissioners. Annie Holt, you're not At-Large, you're
19 appointed just like the two heading up snake oil
20 salesman, Dr. Reverend Jim Holley with the snake oil
21 sales and QuanTez Pressley. I don't know you yet, but
22 Bryan Ferguson got to tell you that if Senior
23 Investigator Cromwell refer the matter to him to be for
24 outside law enforcement agency to be called in, let the
25 record reflect. Bryan Ferguson as chairman, you were

1 recommended that an outside law enforcement agency be
2 called in to investigate case number 20-11-12, the case
3 of Kaniesha Coleman suicide victim according to Derrick
4 Maye and the Homicide Unit. So I'm going to just throw it
5 all up in the air and let the chips fall where they may
6 look at his face, you all.

7 BLACK JESUS: He's right there in the audience right
8 now. Look at his face. It is a physical impossibility to
9 have a suicide by gun with no gun burns on an entry
10 wound. Derrick Maye, homicide, season detective, former
11 captain of homicide now over at the Second Precinct. Look
12 at his face you all. He knows this. No gun burns, no gun
13 stiffs, no suicide by gun. But you put some information
14 in Jeffrey Hudson's head, and he changed the opinion from
15 homicide to suicide. Let the chips fall where they made.
16 Now QuanTez Pressley and Jim Holley, the little
17 Leprechaun, your boss, the one that appointed you all,
18 Mayor Michael Duggan has issued 2.84 billion worth of
19 bonds in the citizens residence in the city of Detroit.
20 We only noticed about 260 million. Those Chase bank
21 accounts where the bomb proceeds are. We need to know the
22 information, the space prints, the dates of it. Derrick
23 Maye, Kaniesha Coleman did not shoot herself.

24 MR. BROWN: Mr. Chair, that was the last speaker.

25 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Mr. Chairman.

1 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes.

2 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: In regard to a couple of
3 comments, do we have anybody at OCI on the last? You got
4 that?

5 COMMISSIONER: Precinct.

6 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Another Mr. Chairman. in terms
7 of the Deputy Chief, in terms of these reports about red
8 light running, is there any information that do you do
9 technology, something with ability to know where most of
10 the lights or people running red lights? The hotspots
11 are? I'm just using where hotspots. That's the only
12 language I know right now.

13 DEPUTY CHIEF SIMS: Through the Chair, we don't have
14 information as it relates to running the lights, but we
15 do have intersections where the majority of accidents
16 occur. But I am going to be sending something out to the
17 east side Deputy Chief, and we'll be sending something
18 out to our command team to make sure that they have their
19 traffic cars because each precinct has traffic cars and
20 to have those traffic cars on a major thorough affair.

21 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay, Mr. Chairman, and I'll
22 leave you alone. Because we have so many, every week we
23 hear this so much. Is there anything that your office can
24 give to the community in terms of what you're doing in a
25 progressive light way of trying to deal with this red-

1 light running situation across the city.

2 DEPUTY CHIEF SIMS: I'll get something prepared for
3 the Board.

4 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: For the community.

5 DEPUTY CHIEF SIMS: For the Board. So you got—

6 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes. Thank you so much. Thank
7 you, Mr. Chair.

8 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Alright, fantastic. Now we're
9 going to have our presentation for the Board from the
10 Human Resource Bureau. Ms. Patillo.

11 MS. PATILLO: Good evening.

12 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: How are you doing?

13 MS. PATILLO: I'm great. How are you?

14 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Always good to see you every
15 month. All right.

16 MS. PATILLO: Good evening, through the Chair. I'll
17 be presenting the human resources report for the month of
18 May. The report's going to cover your departmental
19 staffing, personnel recruiting, recruiting initiatives.
20 Additionally, you already have the packet, but I did just
21 pass out flyers, not flyers, but the PowerPoint
22 presentation because it'll cover additional slides that
23 were not in your packet that I created. So if you go to
24 the next slide, departmental staffing. I depicted the raw
25 numbers for you for May. The department was filled at

1 90%. The sworn members were filled at 93%. Vacancies were
2 7%. Police assistance was filled at 69%. The vacancies
3 for police assistance were 31% for civilians, 81% as due
4 to the budget increase in civilian structure. Then for
5 the vacancies it was 19%. If you go to the next slide
6 where it says recruiting beginning of the fiscal year to
7 May 31st, we had a total of 3,455 applications.

8 MS. PATILLO: 71 were in processing at the time. 275
9 applications were withdrawn. 2047 applications were
10 archived. Of that 2047, 150 were archived for the month
11 of May. 471 temporary disqualified, 474 permanent
12 disqualified, 117 awaiting MCOLEs. During this period, we
13 have hired 199 personnel. If you go to the next slide for
14 MCOLE's testing, for the written test, we had 110 that
15 were scheduled. 78 appeared, 55 passed, 71% passing rate,
16 23 failed 29% failure rate, 2 reschedules and 30 no
17 shows. For the physical agility testing, we had 124 that
18 was scheduled. 64 appeared, 39 passed, 61% passing rate.
19 25 failed, 39% failure rate. 5 rescheduled, 3 withdrew,
20 and 52 no shows. If you go to the next slide, it should
21 say total new hires. We had 32 sworn. Of the 32 that were
22 sworn, 8 were reinstated officers. So those were officers
23 that had left and came back to the department.

24 MS. PATILLO: 16 civilian new hires for a total of
25 48. We did have an academy class graduate with 20

1 personnel. If you go to the next slide for Detroit
2 residency information for May, 553 sworn Detroiters, 427
3 civilian Detroiters, 15 police assistants. For non-
4 Detroiters, we have 1,856 for sworn, 222 for civilians,
5 and 22 police assistants. Of those numbers, 5 Detroiters
6 for civilian new hires and 6 sworn for Detroiters. Next
7 slide talks about the attrition. As you can see, we are
8 still maintaining below 15 for the sworn. So we have 13
9 that separated for sworn, 10 civilians for a total of 23.
10 The next slide covers the leaves of absences and
11 restricted for FMLA continuous. For sworn, we have 14 for
12 intermediate with 74, medical leave 3, military leave 3,
13 general leave 3, restricted 153, disabled 17 and sick 13.
14 For our civilians in those same categories, we had 12
15 FMLA continuous, 80 intermediate FMLA, 5 on medical
16 leave, 3 on general leave, 13 restricted, 1 disabled, and
17 1 sick.

18 MS. PATILLO: If you go to the next slide, it talks
19 about the monthly separation. As I stated, we had 13. 10
20 police officers, 1 detective, 1 sergeant and 1
21 lieutenant. We did have 15 suspensions for the month of
22 May. Some of those could have been carryover, so not just
23 total new cases. 14 police officers, 1 corporal. We had a
24 total of 538 personnel in the drop. Now these slides are
25 not in your packet, but I created them. So when you look

1 at a comparison of the separations to new hires from
2 January, 2002 to the present, we have net gained from
3 January to May of 2023, 96 officers. Looking at the
4 calendar, you see the bar graph January to May, we have
5 66 separations. From January to May of our new hires 162,
6 which is the net gain of 96. You go to the next slide.
7 After these sworn separations for the 2022 and 2023, you
8 can see the comparison.

9 MS. PATILLO: 2022, we had a total of 324
10 separations. For May, January to May, as I stated, 2023,
11 66. When you compare January to May of 2022 separations,
12 we had 124 last year during this time, compared to 66 of
13 the same time for this year. If you go to the next slide,
14 separations to other departments. As you can see, we are
15 still better than we were last year. We did have an
16 uptick with 6 in May that went to the ATF, the US
17 Customs, 2 to Sterling Heights, 1 in Livonia and 1
18 Plymouth, but we're still better than where we were last
19 year. If you go to the next slide, after sworn
20 appointments for new hires, this gives you our current
21 standing of where we are at the academy. We have 138
22 personnel that are in the academy. We have five classes
23 that are there. As I stated, our classes for last month
24 that we started, we did have 31. As of right now, as you
25 all know, with the new contract, we have laterals. So now

1 we're up to two laterals. I have 38 in background right
2 now and 28 in pre-background.

3 MS. PATILLO: If you go to the next slide, it says
4 2022 to 2023 reinstatements. Currently for 2023, we have
5 had 30 reinstated better than any year since 2014. If you
6 go to the next slide on the left-hand side, you will see
7 where by month, how many submissions we have received.
8 The month of May, we received 13 new requests. If you go
9 to the right-hand part of that slide where it says status
10 of reinstatement. So we have received, since the contract
11 announcement, 81 requests for former members to come
12 back. 41 have been approved. 36 of those 41 have been
13 hired. So there's 5 that have just not come to medical
14 and HR. We have 15 that are in processing since the last
15 time I briefed you. That was an additional 7 new cases.
16 Then we have 11 that withdrew and 13 that have been
17 denied.

18 MS. PATILLO: If you go to the next slide, recruiting
19 initiatives. If you go to that slide after that, it just
20 basically gives you a rundown of all the events that we
21 have done in the last two weeks. For the Mayor
22 Fellowship, we do have 19 that have started. So 19 mayor
23 college students are interning at the Detroit Public
24 Headquarters in really the Second Precinct. Then for
25 growth youth talent, we have 60 young students, high

1 schools over the Detroit Public Safety Academy that's in
2 our DPD Academy that's being coordinated with Sergeant
3 Richardson and other staff. Then we're going to have an
4 additional six to seven at the headquarters interning
5 with us beginning July the second. On June the 24th—I
6 will send you this flyer—we are going to have a DPD
7 career fair at the Light Guard Armory. So details are
8 forthcoming, but it is going to be a one stop shop as
9 well for recruiting. We're already working on the
10 advertising. Pending any questions? This concludes my
11 presentation.

12 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Awesome as always.
13 Commissioner Banks.

14 COMMISSIONER BANKS: I'm all set, Mr. Chair.

15 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Bernard.

16 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: No questions.

17 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: VC.

18 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you, Chair. Thank you again,
19 Human Resource Director, Patillo for the excellent job
20 that you've done ever since you received the appointment
21 about three, four years ago?

22 MS. PATILLO: Thank you.

23 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Holley.

24 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you. As always, I'm always
25 satisfied with your report. My concern is suspensions and

1 for some reason or another, I missed that in a minute.

2 I'm sure you had it every report these suspensions.

3 MS. PATILLO: Yes.

4 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: From the Chief. So I guess I'm
5 trying to figure it out, Commissioner Bell, help me with
6 this. What kind of suspensions where the Chief do that
7 don't go through us?

8 MS. PATILLO: DC Sims, do you want to answer that
9 question?

10 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Maybe I can get some help
11 from...

12 COMMISSIONER BELL: Suspension without pay comes to
13 us. Suspension with pay do not come to us. You want to be
14 aware of what you're trying to. So if the Chief should
15 provide the information to us, that's what we're seeking.
16 I think that would be the bottom line. Would that be un
17 unreasonable?

18 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: It is fine if that's what it is,
19 but it's the first for some reason or another, I just get
20 an alarm went off. 15 suspensions and it didn't go
21 through us. I'm sure Commissioner Bell knows more about
22 it than I do. But just ask you if you can email me
23 something. Just give my mind rest. That is it. Then I
24 want to know is it my prerogative to know maybe what
25 those suspensions will overall look like? Is that my

1 prerogative or because he does it on his own, I don't
2 have I oversight over that, Bell.

3 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes, sir.

4 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Will you tell me.

5 COMMISSIONER BELL: It would be appropriate if you
6 asked.

7 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I can ask.

8 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes.

9 MS. PATILLO: So I can take that or DC Sims can take
10 that back to the chief's office. Then additionally, in
11 your packet, it does cover the individuals with their
12 status of if it was admin leave, no pay or with pay or if
13 there's an arbitration pending.

14 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Because in my head
15 commissioners. In my head, when we evaluate when you ask
16 for office to be suspended without pay, and those are
17 suspended with pay, I like to have an idea of how that is
18 crossed. Am I making sense to you?

19 MS. PATILLO: Yes, sir.

20 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: It's a long day for me, but I
21 apologize for my language, my tiredness. But do you
22 understand what I'm saying?

23 MS. PATILLO: Yes, sir.

24 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay. I just need to be able to
25 reconcile that in terms of when he comes here on the

1 other side, what would be the difference?

2 MS. PATILLO: Yep. We'll get the information.

3 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Carter.

4 Commissioner Bell.

5 COMMISSIONER BELL: Briefly, director. When I see
6 separation from two or three years, are we still tracking
7 what happened to these officers, perhaps going to another
8 department? Are we still tracking them?

9 MS. PATILLO: Yes, I have a detailed list on where
10 every member, if they've separated, going to another law
11 enforcement agency.

12 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you. Thank you.

13 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Hernandez.

14 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Yeah, through the Chair. So
15 let me continue what Commissioner Holley started. Is it
16 fair to say that not every officer suspended with pay,
17 ultimately leads to a suspension without pay? Is that a
18 fair statement?

19 COMMISSIONER: We can't hear her.

20 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: We can't hear you.

21 MS. PATILLO: Sorry. It would depend on the
22 circumstances. What the person's being investigated for.
23 If a person is ultimately charged with a felony. If
24 they're charged with a felony, then we would come before
25 the Board and ask at that point to suspend that person

1 without pay. But if they're not charged with a felony or
2 is not going through a court process, then they may not
3 ever come for suspension without pay.

4 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Okay. Because we've had
5 several instances, especially over the last 12 months,
6 where we still haven't gotten yet to that court process
7 and yet we have these names coming before us for
8 suspensions without pay. I get that maybe the
9 circumstance sort of dictates that it might lead in that
10 direction, but I don't want to ask for you, but I'd like
11 some kind of report.

12 DEPUTY CHIEF SIMS: Okay.

13 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Indicating those that don't
14 come before us. So those that are suspended with pay, and
15 ultimately what percentage of those actually come our way
16 and escalate to without pay?

17 DEPUTY CHIEF SIMS: Okay. I will get with the Chief
18 and the staff, and we can.

19 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Okay.

20 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Chief.

21 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: I can put it in writing if
22 you want.

23 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Mr. Chairman, Chief and thank
24 you commission for helping with that. Because if it's
25 oversight, then I need to know both. If I'm oversight.

1 We're oversight. Even though it doesn't have to be a
2 public record, but oversight I need to know both.

3 DEPUTY CHIEF SIMS: Okay.

4 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Does it make sense to you?

5 DEPUTY CHIEF SIMS: We can definitely make that
6 happen.

7 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you. Thank you, sir. Thank
8 you for your patience with me.

9 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes. Now to even add on to
10 that, a few months ago, we promoted some officers. Right.
11 This Board had reservations on some of them. I promised
12 the public that I was going to have a progress report. 30
13 days, 60 days, 90 days, six months, and a year. Well, you
14 are already going to know the names. When is the timeline
15 can we get that progress report?

16 DEPUTY CHIEF SIMS: That is something that they're
17 working on to get to you.

18 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Oh, they're working on it now.
19 Awesome. Awesome. Okay. Thank you. Thank you. No
20 questions. Thank you.

21 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you.

22 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you. Okay. Now it's my
23 honor to bring up Mrs. Butler. She's the president of the
24 Second Precinct Community Relations. Yeah. She never
25 misses a meeting. Oh, it's so good to see you every time.

1 The floor is yours, ma'am.

2 MS. BUTLER: Good evening. Welcome to our first Board
3 Police Commissioner's in-person meeting for the Second
4 Precinct. Since the Covid Pandemic. I am Fredia Butler,
5 President of the Second Precinct Police Community
6 Relations Council. On behalf of the Second Precinct, we
7 thank Reverend Cornelius Davis and the congregation of
8 Scott Memorial United Methodist Church for giving us
9 permission to have our meeting here. Ms. Blossom, thank
10 you for following up to secure place and providing flyers
11 to help advertise for this meeting. The state of Michigan
12 requires our meetings to be held to accommodate equipment
13 so that those unable to attend can participate by Zoom.
14 This church met the needs for this meeting. Commissioners
15 welcome and thank you for coming to learn about our
16 concerns and the work our officers are doing in our
17 communities. Honor the leadership of Commander Michael
18 Chambers. Our neighborhood police officers are number one
19 in community service. They are Detroit's finest.
20 Commander Chambers is a people person, and he leads with
21 confidence in his officers. Commissioners, without
22 further boastfulness, I present to you the Commander of
23 the Second Precinct, Commander Michael Chambers.

24 COMMANDER CHAMBERS: Good evening, your honorable
25 Board. Thank you, Ms. Butler, for that introduction. I

1 appreciate it. Good evening again. I'm Commander Michael
2 Chambers. To my right is my outstanding Captain Derrick
3 Maye. I'm Going to introduce our NPO team in a minute,
4 but I'm just going to jump right in. The Second Precinct
5 encompasses roughly 10.5 square miles. We have a
6 population of about 60,000 residents. City council
7 districts 1, 2, 6, and 7 are within our precinct
8 boundaries. There are approximately 105 officers of
9 various ranks assigned to the precinct, working in
10 assignments such as control, special operations, traffic,
11 and investigations. Community relations is very important
12 within the Second Precinct. Our precinct is so very
13 fortunate to have outstanding community leaders, such as
14 Ms. Fredia Butler and Mrs. Sharon Pinnell, and is very
15 engaged as well with our community or association such as
16 Littlefield with Carol and Sandy Pickens, our Happy
17 Homes, Brilliant Detroit, with Ms. Charlotte Blackwell,
18 our Manor Community Association with Ms.

19 COMMANDER CHAMBERS: Lorreen Dixon, our Barton
20 McFarland associated with Ms. Theo Broughton and Mr.
21 William Davis and the Bethune community Council with Ms.
22 Joyce Brooks and so many others. We have five dedicated
23 neighbor police officers. When I call your name, please
24 stand. Earl Franklin, Paulette Burkes Weathers, Jennifer
25 Tyler might be out. David Vasquez. Okay, they're outside.

1 Brian Ferrera, he may be outside as well. Also, they're
2 led by an outstanding sergeant Edward Jackson, who did
3 very well on the promotional test and hopefully he'll be
4 a lieutenant very soon as well. So, our neighbor police
5 officer team address various concerns that arise in our
6 community and coordinate activities. While we may be the
7 Second Precinct, our NPOs, our officers in our
8 communities are truly second to none, as we like to say,
9 a number two. We are partnered with many community
10 stakeholders and an active business united with officers
11 and youth called Bowie that support events that we hold
12 throughout the year, like National Night Out, our
13 Halloween candy giveaway, our police week, our school
14 supply giveaway, and senior movie night.

15 COMMANDER CHAMBERS: So I'm going to jump in and talk
16 about some of our crimes, some of our positive crime
17 trends, and then I'll get into some of our challenges.
18 So, some of our successes with our robberies, we're
19 seeing nearly a 9% reduction year to date, as compared to
20 last year in our robberies. We're seeing close to a 15%
21 reduction in car jackings year to date, as compared to
22 last year within the Second Precinct. We're also seeing
23 nearly 4% reduction in both burglaries and larceny year
24 to date, as compared to last year in the Second Precinct.
25 So, some of our challenges, though, which we are

1 combating very hard, I should say. Our challenges have
2 been with aggravated assaults. We've seen a 10% increase
3 year to date and we've also, unfortunately, seen some
4 increases with our shootings as well, our non-fatal and
5 our homicides. So, on a positive note, over the last 28
6 days, there has been close to a 19% reduction in our
7 aggravated assaults. We've been down 16 aggravated
8 assaults as compared to the previous 28 days.

9 COMMANDER CHAMBERS: So we think we're trending in
10 the right direction as we move into our summer months. I
11 do want to mention the year to date, our hardworking
12 officers at the Second Precinct have removed 119 handguns
13 and eight long guns off the streets within a Second
14 Precinct year to date. So, just talking about some of our
15 strategies that we're deploying to continue to fight
16 crime. We're dedicating additional scout cards and
17 increasing officer patrol hours in our hotspot area. So
18 every day we're digging into those report, we're seeing
19 where our trends are at, where the crime's happening, and
20 we're putting our resources that we have in those areas.
21 So we put them in those hotspot scout car areas, which
22 we've identified some of our busier ones to be 21 and 22
23 to the north, and then 27 to the south. So they're
24 constantly staying in those scout car areas and making
25 their presence felt.

1 COMMANDER CHAMBERS: We also have a special
2 operations office, which is plain clothes officers. So on
3 a weekly basis, they're doing restore peace operations,
4 such as ticket and tow operations, excuse me, addressing
5 some of the concerns like speeding the red lights and
6 things like that. So we know our problematic locations,
7 and we deploy those traffic officers to those locations.
8 We also go after known offenders. So each day we're
9 combing through the police reports, and we're seeing that
10 there's individuals that are mentioned in those reports
11 that are wanted for violent crimes, especially those with
12 guns. We're sending a team of officers out every day
13 chasing after those known offenders. We also go out with
14 our embedded MDOC, which is a Michigan Department of
15 Corrections agents, and we do regular home checks of
16 probationers and also parolees.

17 COMMANDER CHAMBERS: We're doing that weekly. We're
18 also actively seeking search warrants to arrest
19 perpetrators in collecting evidence and do narcotics
20 related search warrants. Our precinct detectives, and we
21 have a dedicated cease fire team. They go out to every
22 single shooting that we have. They work tirelessly trying
23 to investigate it, collecting evidence, and getting those
24 individuals into custody, and they do an outstanding job.
25 Also, to supplement our strategy, we have joint efforts

1 with our neighboring precincts and specialized units to
2 come by at Prime. Just so today, and actually tomorrow,
3 we're running an operation within the Second Precinct
4 called Double Deuce. We have all the west side precincts,
5 2, 4, 6, 8, 10, and 12. All their officers special
6 operations are coming in our precinct assisting us in
7 some of our hotspot areas that we return the favor back
8 to them and help them when they need our help as well.

9 COMMANDER CHAMBERS: So they're actively out
10 searching for individuals wanted at warrants. They're
11 combating different traffic offenses, you name it. We're
12 doing home checks. So we're doing everything over the
13 next two days within the Second Precinct. From the early
14 reports, I know that they've been very effective out
15 there. So we're proud of what they're doing. We also have
16 a dedicated victim advocate, Ms. Maya, that's at the
17 precinct. She's in our Detective Unit, and she assists
18 individuals that are victims of domestic violence. So
19 they come in, she assists them in putting personal
20 protection orders into the court. So just in the first
21 quarter from January to March, she helped to submit over
22 a hundred personal protection orders to the court to help
23 out these individuals in need.

24 COMMANDER CHAMBERS: I'm closing up shortly. I just
25 want to talk a little bit more about our NPOs and what an

1 outstanding job they do. I mean, we have our NPOs that go
2 out into the community on a regular basis for events.
3 They go into schools, they do anti-bullying and conflict
4 resolution classes, stranger danger presentations, gun
5 safety tips, gun lock giveaways. They also oversee a very
6 active Explorers program with our youth, teaching them
7 how to become future police officers. Speaking lastly,
8 just talking about some of our upcoming community events.
9 We have our next week, the second Tuesday of each month
10 we have our community relations meeting at the precinct.
11 So next week on the 13th will be the last one we held at
12 the precinct for the summer, and then we'll get back to
13 it September 12th.

14 COMMANDER CHAMBERS: That's led by Mrs. Butler as
15 well. So we hope to see many in attendance next Tuesday.
16 We also do, as I spoke to earlier about our senior movie
17 night. That's always the third Thursday of the month. We
18 have a jazz concert coming up at the Second Precinct.
19 This will be our third. We're actually naming it in honor
20 of our fallen officer Lauren Ports who we lost last year.
21 So that's going to be on July 21st of this year coming
22 up. So that's going to be, I believe, our third one. It's
23 outstanding, and they have a great entertainer coming in.
24 We also have our National Night out on August 8th, and
25 we're going to be doing our Halloween candy giveaway on

1 October 31st. Our NPOs are constantly looking to do more
2 and more. They engage the community. If there's ever any
3 events that we know about, we always have a
4 representative presence. So with that I'll just open it
5 up to questions.

6 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Holley.

7 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you for the report. I feel
8 your feel your spirit.

9 COMMANDER CHAMBERS: Thank you, sir.

10 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: What I've been blessed with in
11 my life is relationships. One of the things that I get a
12 little concerned about is when I go from precinct to
13 precinct, I see women actively involved, few men, and no
14 preachers, no ministers. I'd really like to ask you to
15 maybe meet with you and Ms. Butler, or someone like Ms.
16 Butler might want to meet with someone else that I can
17 come and see if we can get ministers organize a church, a
18 number of preachers, ministers, pastors to really support
19 the precinct. That's right. So if you let me do that. I'd
20 like to try three precincts, and I'd like for this to be
21 one of them.

22 COMMANDER CHAMBERS: Yeah, we would love to have you,
23 sir. Just to mention one thing that I did fail to
24 mention, we have a wonderful, wonderful, wonderful
25 chaplain service within the department. They are very

1 engaged. They come every single day to our precinct on
2 all the shifts. When we're in need, when officers are
3 hurting or anything, they're always there. They come to
4 all our events, and they support them. So they are very
5 active. We do also go out to the churches. We engage in
6 walks with them. Any type of event, we are very engaged
7 with them.

8 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I hear you. I didn't mean to be
9 as if you weren't or didn't have a Chaplain Corps here.

10 COMMANDER CHAMBERS: Yes, sir.

11 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I'm familiar with the East
12 Chaplain Corps. They do a great job.

13 COMMANDER CHAMBERS: Yes, sir.

14 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: You got one that comes here
15 assigned here.

16 COMMANDER CHAMBERS: Yes, sir.

17 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I'm talking about when I look
18 about 15 to 20 churches that are here. It seemed like to
19 me this could be a way of really helping crime. The other
20 thing I wanted to ask you, commander, and I'll leave you
21 alone.

22 COMMANDER CHAMBERS: That's okay.

23 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Do your guys do walk patrols?

24 COMMANDER CHAMBERS: Yes. We were out walking
25 yesterday with the Chief.

1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I'm talking about not with the
2 Chief.

3 COMMANDER CHAMBERS: Yeah. But as far as foot beats.

4 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes.

5 COMMANDER CHAMBERS: We still occasionally do that.
6 Our NPOs love to get out on bikes. We have bike patrols,
7 and they'll go up and down the major streets and into the
8 residential as well. I mean, we post a lot of their
9 activities last summer on our Twitter page, which is very
10 active. But yeah, we constantly look for opportunities to
11 get out there, be visible and deter crimes.

12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Also, thank you for taking my
13 call today as well.

14 COMMANDER CHAMBERS: Thank you, sir.

15 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Carter.
16 Commissioner Bell.

17 COMMISSIONER BELL: No question.

18 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Hernandez.

19 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Through the Chair, just a
20 quick comment. Always very appreciative of your reports.
21 They're very thorough, they're very concise. You do a lot
22 of great work, both of you, captain May as well. I was
23 interacting with a few folks in the Department of
24 Neighborhoods, and they always have nothing but great
25 things to say about the work that you're both doing here

1 in this area. So I just wanted to translate that message
2 to you.

3 COMMANDER CHAMBERS: Thank you. I got a great team at
4 the Second Precinct and a great community that's always
5 supportive. So I appreciate everybody

6 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: VC Holt.

7 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you. Thank you, commander,
8 for your report. Obviously, we're in a community where
9 I'm greeted on the phone, wake up sleepy giant. So I have
10 every regard that things are working as they should in
11 this precinct. I do recall last summer when you had a
12 phenomenal jazz event out in the parking lot that was
13 very successful. So yes, you do, from my experience, stay
14 in touch with your community. Thank you.

15 COMMANDER CHAMBERS: Thank you, ma'am. Thank you.

16 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Bernard.

17 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Hi, I just want to say, you do
18 a great job here in the Second Precinct. I still remember
19 how your precinct reacted and how the community in
20 District 2 reacted when Officer Counts, Courts, pardon
21 me, was killed. The outpouring of support by people in
22 this room and throughout the community was overwhelming.
23 That is in part due to your leadership and direction. So,
24 again, I offer you the entire community condolences with
25 respect to that, but also appreciation for all that you

1 do here. Thank you.

2 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Moore.

3 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. My
4 first term is police commissioner, there was a young lady
5 that used to send out email blasts all the time. She told
6 me, she said, I'm a member of the Second Precinct. That
7 was Sharon Pinnell, by the way. Sharon said, we have the
8 best precinct, Number Two. You'll see that we are the
9 best. She just said, always giving you praise and props
10 back in the day. It's been consistent, but I just want to
11 say publicly, thank you for your responsiveness. The
12 emails I send you, emails, text messages I send you, you
13 respond. That's what I appreciate and that's what
14 citizens around the city want is responsiveness. You give
15 that.

16 COMMANDER CHAMBERS: Thank you.

17 COMMISSIONER MOORE: So I'm very thankful for that,
18 and I'm very thankful for the Sixth and 10th Precinct,
19 which are also in District 7. You guys are great. Your
20 NPOs are attending community meetings late at night.
21 You've even attended meetings late at night where I've
22 seen you out and about. So I appreciate it. I don't think
23 that a person can ask for more as it relates to reactive
24 to the community. So thank you.

25 COMMANDER CHAMBERS: Thank you.

1 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: All right. Commissioner Banks.

2 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Through the Chair. Peace and
3 blessings to you, commander. Commander, where are the
4 conflict resolution classes held, and is there a fee for
5 those classes?

6 COMMANDER CHAMBERS: Well, NPO Franklin normally puts
7 them on. If you want to speak to that and tell them the
8 locations.

9 OFFICER FRANKLIN: Neighborhood Police Officer
10 Franklin. Yes, with the conflict resolutions we have six
11 schools in the Second Precinct. So we have Bardon, John
12 R. King, Noble, McKenzie, Coleman Young, and John R.
13 King, McKenzie, and Noble. So what I do we have conflict
14 resolution. I usually talk to the deans. So any kids have
15 any problems, we usually meet up. Also just started back
16 up a program with our girls. I take them to the women
17 Correctional Facility in Ypsilanti. So I usually have the
18 deans give me the worst kids, and we usually select
19 between six and 10 of them. We'll take them up there to
20 talk to some inmates who's been locked up for life. So it
21 really changes them. So on the way, it's a 45 minute
22 drive. So on the way back, the girls usually talk about
23 the situations that the young ladies are locked up for.

24 OFFICER FRANKLIN: Two weeks ago, we went. One of the
25 young ladies they talked to was 17 years old. So she's

1 pretty close to their age. She's been locked up since she
2 was 15 years old. She killed the Uber driver, and she
3 told her story what happened. She said her boyfriend
4 ended up killing the guy, but she ended up still getting
5 charged and she got to do a life sentence for. So that's
6 kind of the things we do. We let them talk to them so
7 they could be deterred from going in that direction.
8 Also, with bullying. A lot of the teachers and the kids
9 don't know that kids can get written tickets for
10 bullying. So I do that. I write tickets to kids. If they
11 are caught bullying, we'll try to have a resolution. If
12 they continue to do it, then we'll take those measures
13 and steps to write the kids bullying tickets. So that's
14 some of the things that I do in school.

15 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Fantastic.

16 OFFICER FRANKLIN: Conflict resolution, bullying.

17 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you.

18 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Mr. Chair, I've got one more. I
19 got one more.

20 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes.

21 COMMISSIONER BANKS: What type of impact are the
22 classes making? Are you seeing a difference?

23 OFFICER FRANKLIN: Seeing a big difference. Actually,
24 I was at Northwestern High School last month. We did a
25 basketball Detroit police versus a high school basketball

1 team in honor of one of the students that died on the
2 court February the seventh. So we kind of honored him
3 playing the game. One of the students that was in there,
4 the principal, we were just walking around and then he
5 was just smiling at me and was like, hey, what's up
6 Officer Franklin? Then the principals, like, that's the
7 first time I ever seen you smile. It's just the impact
8 when you reach kids at a certain age, like in middle
9 school and elementary and you're really positive, they
10 remember that. So that's why we try to get into middle
11 schools and elementary schools to be an example for these
12 kids.

13 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Alright. Thank you.

14 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Officer Franklin, is there a
15 fee? Alright. Is there a fee for the class?

16 OFFICER FRANKLIN: No, there's no fee. No.

17 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Officer, if I may, I'd like to
18 volunteer my services to assist with that as well. I'm a
19 mediator. I was all over the state of Michigan yesterday
20 doing it. I'd be delighted to work with you with that
21 project.

22 OFFICER FRANKLIN: Okay. Sounds good. Yep. Well,
23 tomorrow's the last day of school, so next year we'll get
24 started. So yeah, we are doing a lot of programs with the
25 kids. Like I said, we started a basketball initiative

1 where we go play the high schools and even some middle
2 schools and basketball. I's also like a recruiting event.
3 So some of the kids, like the seniors, they'll sign up to
4 become a Detroit police officer. So we're just doing
5 different things here at the Second Precinct.

6 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Fantastic. Thank you.

7 OFFICER FRANKLIN: Sorry. One more thing. We have an
8 event coming up. I forgot to tell the commander. On June
9 the 20th, we're going to be in the area of Plymouth and
10 Wyoming. We're going to be doing a cleanup. We have a
11 church coming from out of state, and they'll be there
12 from 11:00 AM to 3:00 PM. They're going to feed the
13 community, and we're going to also provide service over
14 there. I'm partnering up with another community leader,
15 and she's going to give some use and we going to try to
16 clean up the area while the church community do the
17 hamburgers and hot dogs, and they're going to offer
18 prayer over there also.

19 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Fantastic.

20 OFFICER FRANKLIN: So that'll be, again, June 20th
21 right on Wyoming and Plymouth from 11:00 AM to 3:00 PM.

22 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: All right. Fantastic.

23 [Audio Distortion].

24 OFFICER FRANKLIN: That I'm not doing. The person
25 that I'm connecting with, she's going to coordinate that.

1 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Okay. All right. All right.

2 Thank you. Thank you. Now we're going to have our report
3 from our Chief Investigator, Jerome Warfield.

4 MR. WARFIELD: Thank you, Mr. Chair, and to this
5 honorable Board. Office of the Chief Investigator, Chief
6 Investigator, Reverend Jerome Warfield Senior, June the
7 eighth, 2023, regarding the backlog case elimination
8 plan. Commissioners, you can find it under tab number
9 five in your binder. Recently, the Board of Police
10 Commissioners inquired about the status of the backlog of
11 citizen complaints. Today, I'm pleased to present to you
12 OCIs backlog elimination plan developed through
13 collaboration with Supervising Investigator Ainsley
14 Cromwell, Acting Supervising Investigator LiSonya Sloan
15 and myself. The goal of the plan is to readily review,
16 thoroughly investigate and appropriately close all of the
17 253 backlog cases and compliance with the standard
18 operating procedures. These cases were collected from the
19 investigators in January of 2023. Initially, temporary
20 administrative service specialists, task workers, were
21 recruited to resolve and close these cases, but that
22 project was not approved. Without objection from this
23 honorable body, on Monday, this Monday coming up June the
24 12th, 2023, each OCI investigator will receive and select
25 two cases from their backlog caseloads, which are boxed

1 in Supervising Investigator Cromwell's office.

2 MR. WARFIELD: The investigator and their supervisor
3 will sign out and evaluate each case. The initial
4 investigation of these cases must be completed by July
5 the 14th, 2023. New investigators will be assigned one
6 background case from their supervisor. The requirement to
7 complete backlog cases is mandatory. The plan should
8 yield around 25 backlog cases a month. Incentives. After
9 two backlog cases have been successfully closed and
10 approved by the supervisor and the chief investigator,
11 each investigator will be eligible to work from home one
12 day the following week. If additional backlog cases are
13 completed, additional days to work from home may be
14 granted. Two cases equal one workday from home, four
15 cases will equal two workdays from home. The City of
16 Detroit Telework work weekly documentation of work form
17 is required by each investigator working from home.
18 Incentives to work from home will be evaluated as the
19 work continues.

20 MR. WARFIELD: If an investigator's regular caseload
21 becomes overdue, in other words, past 90 days, they will
22 not be eligible to work from home, but are still required
23 to complete their assigned backlog cases. Flexible work
24 schedule applications have been completed by each
25 investigator and supervisors. What are the controls?

1 Backlog cases are due within 30 days after investigator
2 signs the case out. Only two backlog cases will be
3 released to an investigator at any given time.
4 Supervisors will monitor through monthly reports the
5 progress investigators are making on a regular basis and
6 backlog cases. Supervisors weekly meetings and monthly
7 monitoring reports will be generated to evaluate the
8 efficiency of each investigator. Team members will be
9 limited to a small number of days each week to work from
10 home, which will reduce concerns of productivity issues.
11 The quality standards remain the same. The goal is to
12 readily review, thoroughly investigate and appropriately
13 close each backlog case.

14 MR. WARFIELD: Supervising investigators and the
15 chief investigator will validate the quality of the
16 backlog and regular case work. My goal is to have all 253
17 backlog cases appropriately resolved by February of 2024,
18 if not sooner. Thank you for your patience. Sincerely,
19 Reverend Jerome Warfield, Senior Chief Investigator,
20 Office of the Chief Investigator.

21 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: I like it. I like it, sir. I
22 like that.

23 COMMISSIONER BELL: Mr. Chairman.

24 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes.

25 COMMISSIONER BELL: I want to speak to the work for

1 home. The city of Detroit brought back people back to
2 work from work from home. We got into this situation
3 because of COVID and people went home and they did not
4 work. That's what created the backlog. So I think this
5 need to be careful review when you're talking about
6 working for home. That is not a proper incentive in terms
7 of this Board should really look into that instance
8 whereas it did not work then and why are we going to
9 reward people to work from home? We are not working for
10 home. DPD don't work from home. Nobody's working from
11 home. Now. They are engaging in daily activities in terms
12 of working on site. So I think we needed to carefully
13 review that type of proposal.

14 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Commissioner Hernandez.

15 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Thank you. Through the
16 Chair. I work from home and I'm very--

17 COMMISSIONER BELL: You're not the city of Detroit.

18 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: I'm extremely productive.

19 But now along those same lines, just a very quick, well,
20 two quick questions. One was that process, and I'm
21 assuming that's the case vetted through city HR work home
22 policy.

23 MR. WARFIELD: Yes. We were in communication with
24 City HR as it relates to work for home before we were
25 able to release this. Yeah.

1 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Perfect. Second question. 90
2 days equals overdue, correct?

3 MR. WARFIELD: Yes, sir.

4 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Backlogs are 30 days.

5 MR. WARFIELD: No.

6 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Well, no. I mean, you have
7 30 days to complete.

8 MR. WARFIELD: 30 days to complete the backlog case.

9 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Can you just expand upon
10 that?

11 MR. WARFIELD: Sure.

12 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Give a little more context
13 as to why it's only a 30-day window even though the
14 investigative tools and process still needs to play out
15 thoroughly.

16 MR. WARFIELD: Sure. Thank you for that question and
17 through the Chair. One of the things that we know and
18 understand that there is somewhat what we consider some
19 cases that could be moved fairly quickly. Certainly,
20 there are some cases that will take more resources and a
21 lot more time. But there is an inventory that has already
22 been conducted that was started with Secretary Shaw and
23 the supervising investigators when she came on board.
24 Looking at that inventory, it leads us to believe that
25 these cases inappropriately and efficiently and

1 thoroughly be closed within a 30-day window for the most
2 part. There will be some that will go a little bit
3 longer.

4 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Okay. Can I get one more?

5 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes.

6 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Can we expect or anticipate
7 in February 2024 or sooner at the completion of this plan
8 to receive more of a formal report out?

9 MR. WARFIELD: Yes.

10 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: That includes, you know,
11 the, the length of the, the backlog, how many were
12 administrative closed and so forth? Just the
13 subcategories that exist.

14 MR. WARFIELD: Through the Chair. Absolutely. That's
15 what we're planning on doing. I do want to be clear
16 because I don't want to be misleading to anyone. These
17 are the cases that we know what is in our shop, and there
18 may be others that are outside of our shop. But these are
19 the ones that are under our control that we have the
20 opportunity and the responsibility to do something about.
21 Those are the ones we definitely give that report to.

22 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Perfect. Thank you.

23 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes. Any other questions?

24 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Mr. Chairman.

25 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes.

1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: What's out of your shop? What
2 does that mean?

3 MR. WARFIELD: The ones that are out of our shop?
4 Well, there were several cases, hundreds of cases that
5 were taken out of our shop that are under investigation.
6 That happened some months ago.

7 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Through the Chair. We have no
8 idea when those cases are coming back?

9 MR. WARFIELD: We don't know. I'm sorry. Through the
10 Chair. We have no idea what the status of those cases
11 are, nor do we have any idea how they're going to be once
12 they get back.

13 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: I can speak on that. I was
14 told June the 30th is when the report is going to come
15 out.

16 MR. WARFIELD: Okay.

17 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: So hold on to your hats when
18 that report comes out June the 30th. Anything else?

19 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Well, through the Chair. So we
20 have no idea as to how many of those cases were out.

21 MR. WARFIELD: Through the Chair, not the ones that
22 were removed from OCI's office. We have no idea.

23 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you.

24 MR. WARFIELD: Thank you.

25 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Okay. Thank you. Report from

1 Board Secretary.

2 MR. BROWN: Mr. Chair, I'm sitting in for Board
3 Secretary Shaw, and there's a couple of items that you
4 wanted me to introduce. Currently you have some incoming
5 correspondence that's in your folder. They're listed on
6 the agenda. Regarding the committee meetings, Budget,
7 Disciplinary and Towing, there's nothing at this time.
8 Personnel and Training, there's an open chair position,
9 and within that Personnel and Training DPD applicant
10 appeals, there are three of them. Gary and Jones have
11 been outstanding since 12 of 2022. Rashard Dickinson
12 outstanding since January the first, 2023. Lorenzo Covin
13 outstanding since 12 of 2022. Also Supervising
14 Investigative position. Chief Investigator Warfeild has
15 selected his recommendation and would provide the
16 recommendation to Personnel and Training or the Board.
17 The executive manager for fiscal, Chairperson Ferguson,
18 is interviewing those four candidates during the week of
19 6-5 and will provide a recommendation to Personnel and
20 Training of this Board. Citizen complaint, which is
21 chaired by Commissioner Cedric Banks.

22 MR. BROWN: This complaint appeal processed. The SOP
23 revision draft was emailed to Committee Chairperson Banks
24 on 5-16. He has a tentative meeting date of 6-27. Policy
25 Committee, which is chaired by Commissioner Willie

1 Burton. BOPC bylaws is under reviewed by staff to add
2 language regarding committees. Proposed language will be
3 presented to the committee or this Board. License plate
4 readers directed 101.12 data sharing. There are
5 amendments that is being proposed for that. Potential
6 memorandum for outstanding concerns. Directive 205.11
7 officer involved shooting investigation is in progress.
8 The last action taken on that was November 2022. The
9 staff is conducting analysis and preparing to solicit
10 updated community feedback on this policy. 307.8 gunshot
11 detection system is in progress. The last action taken on
12 that one was on November 22. The staff is also conducting
13 the analysis and preparing to be solicited updated
14 commuter feedback. Mr. Chair, there are eight additional
15 policies that be coming forward.

16 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: All right.

17 MR. BROWN: That's Secretary report.

18 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you. Announcements.

19 MR. BROWN: Mr. Chair, the announcements. The next
20 BOPC meeting is June 15th, 2023, at 3:00 PM located at
21 Detroit Public Safety Headquarters. That address is 1301
22 Third Street, 48226. The next community meeting,
23 Thursday, July 13th, 2023 at 6:30 with the 10th Precinct
24 hosting at Labors local 1191. That address is 2161 West
25 Grand Boulevard. Zip code 482008. The announcements, Mr.

1 Chair.

2 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Thank you. Yes.

3 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Through the Chair for an
4 announcement. I still want to announce that we are still
5 looking for certified teachers at Detroit Academy Arts
6 and Sciences, and we are offering \$100,000 to each
7 certified teacher. Basically, so I'm saying that again.
8 We still have some openings. I'd just like to announce
9 that one more time just to make sure that if you know
10 somebody in your family or a friend that is certified and
11 looking for a good school and a good salary of a hundred
12 thousand in the beginning once they're hired, that will
13 be I'm asking that you get the word out. The second
14 thing, Mr. Chairman, I'm leaving Tuesday for East Africa
15 for two weeks, and I would like to ask that for your
16 prayers and also for an excused absence for two
17 Thursdays.

18 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: You got it, sir. You'll be
19 back for swearing in, all right?

20 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Yes.

21 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Okay.

22 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I'll do it from Africa.

23 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: All right. Unfinished
24 business. No unfinished business. New business.

25 COMMISSIONER BANKS: New business right here, Mr.

1 Chair.

2 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes.

3 COMMISSIONER BANKS: I moved to amend the previously
4 adopted motion to accept the recommendation of the Chief
5 Investigator that investigator Sanford Kelly be
6 discharged the amendment to add the effective date of
7 June 16th, 2023.

8 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Is there a second?

9 COMMISSIONER: Support.

10 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Any discussion? All in favor
11 of that new effective date of June 16th, 2023. All in
12 favor?

13 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

14 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: All opposed?

15 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: No.

16 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: No.

17 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Two nos. Okay. That has been
18 amended to June 16th, 2023. Now I'd like to have a motion
19 to adjourn.

20 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: What about new business. New
21 business.

22 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: That was still new business.
23 That was new business.

24 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I'm sorry then. I thought that
25 was unfinished business.

1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: No new business. Board members,
2 I'd like as we get ready to leave, I hate to be hogging
3 the time, but I think it's very important to know that
4 many of these committees are not meeting. I think we all
5 ought to be concerned about it. We're not getting these
6 reports out on time. It's throwing us behind. I'd like to
7 ask that I'd like to move and try to get support that in
8 the event a committee does not meet and address a matter
9 within 30 days of receipt, the matter is referred to the
10 Board's staff to address and provide a recommendation
11 directly to the full Board for the decision.

12 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Do we understand?

13 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes. If you don't meet with
14 your committees, we can't keep stalling these committees
15 out. So the staff is going to have to go ahead and—

16 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: Was that motion
17 seconded, Mr. Chair?

18 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: No, we were discussing.

19 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: You can't
20 discuss it if it's not seconded.

21 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Is there a second? He's making
22 a motion.

23 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: I second.

24 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: A second. Now discussion.

25 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: Thank you.

1 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: The discussion is when the
2 committees don't meet the work still has to get done. So
3 the staff has to do the work. It's just simple as that.
4 All in favor in that motion?

5 ATTORNEY ADAM SAXBY: Through the Chair. Pardon me. I
6 hate to interrupt. I just want to make sure that it's
7 clear that the Board is not delegating its discretionary
8 authority here and that the Board will be voting on the
9 final matter.

10 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes, sir.

11 ATTORNEY ADAM SAXBY: Thank you.

12 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Discussion.

13 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes.

14 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: I think it's more clarity.
15 So the ask is to delegate essentially that authority to
16 BOPC staff in the event that the Chairperson of a
17 committee does not act within 30 days. That's the
18 interpretation that I have. We are giving away our
19 authority.

20 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Correct. Yeah.

21 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: You're not giving away
22 anything. If you move on your committees, you're not
23 giving it away.

24 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: I'm not on committee. I'm
25 just saying in general.

1 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: But that's the thing. If you
2 are Chairperson of a committee, your committee is
3 responsible for meeting. So you should be able to meet
4 within 30 days. If not, ask for an extension, but to not
5 meet is not fair.

6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Mr. Chairman, I think you
7 should have that discussion with the committee Chairs. We
8 don't know who the new Chairman is going to create new
9 committees and new committee chairs so that the motion at
10 this point, I think is untimely. Because we don't have
11 committees. We just have a new election. We have a new
12 Chair. That person will make the decision regarding who
13 serves on committees and who will be Chair. So then we'll
14 see if that's the case.

15 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: That's fair. That's correct.

16 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: That is, I'll withdraw my
17 motion.

18 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Right. The motion has been
19 withdrawn. Now I'd like to have a motion to-

20 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: Mr. Chairman.

21 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Yes.

22 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: I'm sorry. But
23 once the motion is stated by you no one belongs to the
24 maker of the motion and the maker of the motion cannot
25 withdraw without permission of this body. All you need is

1 a motion to withdraw by the body, not the individual.

2 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Okay. Go ahead.

3 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay. I move that the motion be
4 withdrawn.

5 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: Yes.

6 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Second.

7 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Any further discussion? All in
8 favor?

9 CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Aye.

10 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: All opposed? Okay. The motion
11 is withdrawn. Now we have a motion to adjourn.

12 COMMISSIONERS: So move.

13 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: All in favor?

14 CHAIRPERSON FERGUSON: Aye. This meeting is now
15 adjourned.

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
