September 14, 2023 at 6:30 P.M.

1 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Good evening, everyone. That
2 mic is really loud there. We are going to begin our
3 Detroit Board of Police Commissioner's meeting. It is
4 6:30. Noting that we don't have a quorum, but I do see
5 Commissioner Bell coming down the corridor. So we'll move
6 forward with our invocation. We're so grateful to be
7 joined by Commander Chaplin Jacqueline Timmons, who will
8 be providing our invocation by Zoom.

9 CHAPLAIN TIMMONS: Good evening let's pray. Father,
10 we just thank you for this day. We thank you for your
11 goodness, your love, and your kindness. We ask Heavenly
12 Father, that you would bless this Board of Police
13 Commissioners as they come together, father, to just
14 bless the citizens of Detroit. We thank you, father, that
15 this will be a meeting of agreement and unity, and we
16 just give you praise, honor, and glory that you will
17 bring, bring things back to their remembrance, and you
18 will cause things to be completed. Give you glory, honor,
19 and praise in Jesus' name, amen.

20 COMMISSIONERS: Amen.

21 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: At this time, we will have our
22 introduction of commissioners by Secretary Shah.

23 MS. SHAH: Thank you, Mr. Chair.

24 MS. SHAH: Chair QuanTez Pressley – Here.

25 MS. SHAH: Vice-Chair Jim Holley – Here.

1 MS. SHAH: Commissioner Linda Bernard -

2 MS. SHAH: Commissioner Cedric Banks - Present.

3 MS. SHAH: Commissioner Willie Bell -

4 MS. SHAH: Commissioner Willie Burton submitted an
5 excused absence.

6 MS. SHAH: Commissioner Lisa Carter -

7 MS. SHAH: Commissioner Ricardo Moore also submitted
8 an excused absence.

9 MS. SHAH: Commissioner Annie Holt - Present At-
10 Large.

11 MS. SHAH: Commissioner Jesus Hernandez -

12 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. We do have a
13 quorum. Before we move to the approval of agenda, we are
14 so grateful to be in this beautiful edifice here at the
15 Kemeny Recreation Center. So we would like to have a
16 brief word of welcome by Valerie. Did I say that name
17 correctly? Okay. She can come forward.

18 MS. VALERIE: Hello, my name's Valerie. I'm the
19 Recreation Center supervisor here at Kemeny. I'd just
20 like to welcome everybody from joining us here tonight.
21 It's great to see a lot of familiar faces in the
22 audience. Please come and join us again. We're here
23 Monday through Saturday. We have a lot of programs. We
24 are also hosting our open house this evening. So if you
25 didn't get a chance to check out our flyers and program

1 on the way in, please stop and see the information on the
2 way out. We'd love to have you come back.

3 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you so very much. Again,
4 we are so grateful to be in this space. Your hospitality
5 and accommodation is greatly appreciated. With that,
6 we'll now move on to the approval of the September 14th,
7 2023 agenda. So the Chair entertains a motion.

8 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: So move.

9 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Second.

10 COMMISSIONER HOLT: It's been properly moved and
11 second. Is there any objection? Hearing no objection, the
12 agenda has been approved. Now we'll move on for the
13 approval of minutes for the meeting of September the
14 seventh, 2023. The Chair entertains a motion.

15 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: So move.

16 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Second.

17 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Been properly moved and
18 second. Is there any objection? Hearing no objection
19 those minutes for September the seventh, 2023 has been
20 approved. There were three closed sessions last week and
21 so the Chair now entertains a motion for the approval of
22 the three closed session minutes for September the
23 seventh, 2023.

24 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: So move.

25 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Second.

1 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: It's been properly moved and
2 second.

3 MS. SHAH: Mr. Chair.

4 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Yes.

5 MS. SHAH: If you can make those motions for each
6 once separately, please, for the record. You can identify
7 them as number one, number two, and number three. Thank
8 you.

9 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: So we'll begin with the
10 approval of the closed session minutes regarding CPL
11 Melanie Armstrong.

12 COMMISSIONER HOLT: So moved.

13 COMMISSIONER: There's.

14 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: It's been properly moved and
15 second. Is there any objection? Hearing no objection
16 those minutes are approved. We'll now move on to the
17 approval of the closed minutes regarding police officer
18 Rakan Hamawi. Is there a motion?

19 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: So moved.

20 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Second.

21 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: It's been properly moved and
22 second. Is there any objection? Hearing no objection
23 those minutes have been approved. Lastly, we have the
24 approval of closed session minutes regarding Jajuan
25 Sandifer.

1 COMMISSIONER HOLT: So moved.

2 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Second.

3 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: It's been properly moved and
4 second. Is there any objection? Hearing no objection
5 those minutes have been approved. With that, we'll now
6 move on to the introduction of BOPC staff, Chief of
7 Police, elected official representatives and community
8 leaders by our secretary.

9 MS. SHAH: Thank you, Mr. Chair. For staff present
10 today, we have Chief Investigator Jerome Warfield, Ms.
11 Theresa Blossom, Ms. Jonya Underwood, Ms. Candace Hayes,
12 Mr. Robert Brown, and Mr. Drew Fries. We also have
13 present supervising investigator Ainsley Cromwell. Our
14 American Sign Language Interpreters are Ms. Yakata
15 Thompson and Ms. Wigart. On Zoom, we have DPD, HR
16 Director Katrina Patillo. Don Handyside is our court
17 reporter. Si and Jason from Media Services are providing
18 video. Sergeant Alan Quinn is providing audio. Sitting in
19 for the Chief today, we have Deputy Chief Tiffany
20 Stewart. Elected officials and representatives present,
21 we have Ms. Marie Overall, State Representative Tyrone
22 Carter's office, Ms. LaDon Davis City Council member Fred
23 Durhal III's office, and former commissioner William
24 Davis.

25 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. Again, as I say,

1 every week that I'm present, we do appreciate your
2 participation in these meetings and particularly in the
3 evening. We know that you have numbers of things that you
4 can be doing with your time but we greatly appreciate you
5 being here to ensure the efficiency and effectiveness of
6 our work. With that, we'll now move on to the Board of
7 Police Commissioner's Officers Report where we have the
8 opportunity to lift some commendations for individuals
9 who are doing extraordinary work in our community and in
10 police oversight. So with that I'll turn it over to
11 Commissioner Lisa Carter.

12 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you, Mr. Chair. So good
13 evening, everyone, and thank you all for coming out to
14 the southwest Detroit, the part of the city that's most
15 southern to the city of Detroit. Often forgotten, 48217.
16 But we are a live and a vibrant community and at this
17 time, I would like to honor one of our district's own,
18 precincts own Nicole Fisher. I've known Nicole for quite
19 a few years now. So this is a resolution honoring
20 Southwest Detroit leader, Nicole Fisher, for supporting
21 the Fourth Precinct and stronger community police
22 community relations.

23 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Yeah, we want to see you.

24 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Whereas Nicole Fisher is a
25 proud born and raised third generation Southwest

1 Detroit, and a graduate of Western International High
2 School. Her mother instilled in her and her three
3 siblings, a strong spirit of civic responsibility,
4 leading Ms. Fisher to make a commitment early in life to
5 community service and advocacy. Whereas Ms. Fisher has
6 led or participated in organizations closely aligned with
7 the mission of the Board of Police Commissioners, she is
8 a long, I'm sorry, longtime member of the Springdale
9 Woodmere Block Club and currently serves as secretary.
10 She is an alumna of the AmeriCorps Community Safety
11 Program at Wayne State University Center for Urban
12 Studies. She also graduated from both the FBI Citizens
13 Academy, and the Detroit Police Department Citizens
14 Academy. Whereas since 2013, Ms. Fisher has been a member
15 of the West Werner Civilian Patrol dedicated to alerting
16 the police to drug dealing, gang activity, human
17 trafficking, and other crimes.

18 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Through her leadership, the
19 Citizen Patrol played a vital role in 2016 in identifying
20 and bringing to justice to young men in the disappearance
21 and murder of Amanda Burton. In 2018, the group helped
22 lead the successful battle for a state ban on sales of
23 nitrous oxide devices to minors who were buying the
24 devices known as Whippets to get high on laughing gas.
25 With the recent merger of patrols, Ms. Fisher now serves

1 as president of the Southwest Hope Civilian Patrol.
2 Whereas past and present, police commissioners have
3 worked with and known Ms. Fisher through her work in the
4 Southwest neighborhoods and with the Fourth Precinct, she
5 has been an active member of the Police Precinct Police
6 Community Relations Council and serves as board
7 secretary. Her support and contributions help ensure the
8 success of National Night Out, Family Fund Day, and many
9 other outreach events vital to building trust between law
10 enforcement and all residents.

11 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Now, therefore, be it resolved
12 that the Detroit Board of Police Commissioners speaking
13 for the citizens of Detroit and the Detroit Police
14 Department, congratulates and salutes Ms. Nicole Fisher
15 for a contributions to the Fourth Precinct police
16 community relations, public safety, and the quality of
17 life in Detroit through her community service and
18 leadership. We thank and congratulate you, Ms. Nicole
19 Fisher. Signed by the Detroit Board of Police
20 Commissions. Well, congratulations.

21 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: The chair entertains a motion
22 to adopt this resolution to our archives.

23 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: So move.

24 COMMISSIONER: Second.

25 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Any objection?

1 Congratulations. Thank you so very much for your years of
2 dedicated service.

3 COMMISSIONER CARTER: So this does not speak to the
4 volume of work that Ms. Fisher has put into the Fourth
5 Precinct. She's gone door to door when it's fleeting and
6 raining to build the community patrols. She's worked with
7 DPD, the community patrol officers to try to build or
8 bridge a community patrol in this area as well. So she's
9 done some phenomenal work, not to mention board up
10 cleanups and all of that with the AmeriCorps program that
11 she's done. She's just a vital member of this community.
12 Thank you.

13 MS. FISHER: Hello. I'd just like to say how humbled
14 I am to receive this award, because what I do isn't for
15 something like this. It's for all of us to live and
16 thrive in a vibrant community like Southwest is. I want
17 to thank Ms. Lisa Carter. I love the Carters. But thank
18 you all, and I accept this and I appreciate it.

19 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Congratulations once again. We
20 thank you.

21 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Second, I'd like to offer this
22 certificate of appreciation to neighborhood. Now, all of
23 our neighborhood police officers do a phenomenal job. You
24 call them and they answer the call no matter what time of
25 day it is. In the evening, whenever it is, the Carters

1 rely on neighborhood Police Officer Garrett Taylor. Oh, I
2 do have all three. Okay. Thank you. Was this on your
3 table?

4 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: I can go speak, but you're
5 so articulate.

6 COMMISSIONER CARTER: No.

7 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: You do.

8 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Well, you also live in the—you
9 know this area. You're more than welcome to do the other
10 two.

11 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Okay. Alright, sorry to
12 interrupt.

13 COMMISSIONER CARTER: All right. But I'm going to do
14 Gary Taylor. So like I said, this certificate of
15 appreciation does not speak to the, like I said, the
16 calls answered, the quality of life issues that Corporal
17 Taylor has addressed in this community. Just wanted to
18 let you all know that we appreciate you, and this is just
19 a small token of appreciation. Thank you. So Corporal
20 Taylor. Come up. You can come up too. We appreciate you.
21 Also have Rick. Did you want to say anything?

22 CORPORAL TAYLOR: Just want to say thank you to my
23 community. I feel like this is my community. They welcome
24 me in with open arms. Took a little bit to earn their
25 trust, but I feel like I have it now. So thank you all.

1 Appreciate it. I got it on silent.

2 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: All right. So I guess I'm
3 stealing the mic from Commissioner Carter hearing. Again,
4 for the record, I'll say she's much more articulate than
5 I am. Look, I think Commissioner Carter did a great job
6 touching on just the diversity that exists in the
7 footprint of what the Fourth Precinct has responsibility
8 over. Commander Holderbaum is doing a phenomenal job.
9 Captain Carter, the entire team. Leadership does start at
10 the top. That's where it lives. Oh, we have a new
11 captain. I still am a huge fan of Captain Carter, though.
12 Leadership does start at the top. But I'm a big believer
13 that the execution of that leadership happens and lives
14 in the field. So these two recognitions are for police
15 officers, Kai Rodriguez and Alex Rojas. Absolutely.

16 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: I just think when you look
17 at the Southwest community there is a diversity of need,
18 not just diversity of culture and vibrance and food and
19 culture. Obviously, that's there. There's a diversity of
20 need when it comes to quality of life and the Fourth
21 Precinct does a phenomenal job of addressing just the
22 complexity of issues that come up in our community. So
23 both of these officers on a variety of different cases
24 have chosen, I mean, they choose every single day to wear
25 this uniform and this badge, and they do it proudly. But

1 it's reflective in the work that they do. It's reflective
2 in how they show up, and it's reflective in the results
3 that they produce in and for our communities and being a
4 part of this community in particular. So thank you to
5 both of them.

6 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: I look forward to hopefully
7 giving this to them in person, if it's okay with you,
8 commander. But I know that they couldn't make it tonight,
9 but just very much appreciative of not just them. I think
10 these two have their name on it, but if Commissioner
11 Carter and I actually could, we would probably think the
12 entire Fourth Precinct for all the work that they do. So
13 this is for the entire department.

14 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Including the community
15 relations team.

16 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Excellent.

17 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you.

18 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Well, we are so grateful to
19 Commissioner Carter and to Commissioner Hernandez who led
20 this effort, and again, to express our gratitude and
21 appreciation to those who enhance the quality of life of
22 all of those who live in the city of Detroit. With that,
23 it should be stated. I mean, we heard his voice, but for
24 the record, Commissioner Hernandez has joined us. Now we
25 will move forward with our community impact report. So as

1 far as our community impact, there is a critical incident
2 debrief that myself and our Board Secretary attended on
3 September the 12th 2023 regarding an officer involved
4 shooting that occurred on I75 in Werner on August 18th
5 2023. We were able to receive a presentation from Detroit
6 Board, I mean, excuse me, from the Detroit Police
7 Department using visual aids of a PowerPoint
8 presentation, still shots, the audio of the dispatch call
9 only and the on scene video and audio of this incident.

10 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: BOPC's understanding is based
11 on what was verbally communicated at that meeting by DPD
12 leadership with the supporting PowerPoint, still photos
13 and dispatch audio. What we heard was that the dispatch
14 was made aware of a white male in an apparent mental
15 health crises. He was reported as in the street
16 interrupting traffic with the green shirt, dark pants,
17 and what appeared to be something under his shirt or
18 jacket. A supervisor or sergeant patrolling the area
19 approaches the male in the patrol vehicle. The still
20 shots from the dash cam showed the following. They showed
21 a man standing in front of the patrol vehicle at some
22 distance with a black jacket in hand. The male reaches
23 under or in the jacket and produces a handgun that can be
24 viewed in the still shot pointing directly in the
25 direction of the vehicle, which DPD indicates the

1 supervisor is standing next to.

2 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Per DPD, the supervisor told
3 the male to put the gun down and he did not comply. The
4 supervisor shot at the male who then fell on the ground.
5 While lying on the ground, the man raised the handgun
6 again and can be viewed in the still shot, pointing in
7 the direction of the vehicle, which DPD indicates the
8 supervisor is again, standing next to. Per DPD, the
9 supervisor told the male to put the gun down and he did
10 not comply again which led the supervisor to shoot the
11 male again at which point he then releases the handgun.
12 The supervisor immediately renders aid followed by medics
13 who arrive on the scene. Medics transported the male to
14 the hospital where he was pronounced deceased. The
15 supervisor fired a total of seven rounds of the number of
16 shots that the first time and the second time is not yet
17 known.

18 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: An investigation is ongoing
19 but the number of rounds that struck the male is also
20 unknown as we are awaiting the medical examiner's report.
21 It should be noted that the male, although pointed the
22 gun at the vehicle where the supervisor was standing
23 twice he did not fire any shots. The supervisor was not
24 injured in this incident and per protocol Michigan State
25 Police submitted a request for a warning to the Wayne

1 County Prosecutor's Office, and it is still currently
2 under review with the Wayne County Prosecutor's Office. A
3 Detroit Police Department preliminary administrative
4 review anticipates that no force or policy violations by
5 the officer. So our next steps, as the Board of Police
6 can monitor for any citizen complaints filed in
7 relationship to this incident, to request an official
8 report from the Wayne County Prosecutor's Office
9 regarding the warrant decision on the officers, and
10 suspect one-to-one has been reached.

11 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: To share more information,
12 including visual aids with the public as Board of Police
13 Commissioners receive them. Also, we welcome any
14 questions from the public that we can follow up on this
15 incident as you are so led. So, no matter the
16 circumstance, the loss of a life is tragic. On behalf of
17 the Board of Police Commissioners, we sincerely offer our
18 condolences to the family and the loved ones of the
19 deceased. But again, in our desire to be transparent and
20 to provide the community the information that we're
21 receiving from the Detroit Police Department, that is our
22 critical incident debrief. Next we'll have the Citizen's
23 complaint and OCI update by Chief Investigator Warfield.

24 MR. WARFIELD: Thank you, Mr. Chair, and certainly to
25 the honorable body, and certainly to this community. We

1 thank you for hosting us and having us here. What I would
2 like to do is to give an overview of some process
3 improvements that we are undertaking at the office of the
4 Chief Investigator. OCI has partnered with the City of
5 Detroit Continuous Improvement Department to conduct an
6 analysis on the citizen complaint investigative process.
7 Here's the high-level overview of the efforts that we
8 believe will bear out fruit. There is an immediate time
9 study that is in progress to determine a reasonable
10 production rate for investigators given OCIs current
11 process and systems. This will inform the Board staff
12 leadership and the city how many investigators are
13 actually needed to handle the inventory volumes that
14 we're experiencing at OCI and that we have experienced in
15 the past, and the volumes that we anticipate on
16 experiencing in the future, and what production rate to
17 hold investigators accountable to.

18 MR. WARFIELD: So this study is actually going to be
19 very pivotal to make sure that we are right sized in
20 every way at the office of the Chief investigator.
21 Secondly, there's an analysis of the Citizen complaints
22 investigative process that's going on to determine where
23 and how to gain efficiencies, improve the reporting,
24 adhere to record retention standards and et cetera. So
25 one of the outputs will be a recommendation of a new case

1 management system. We've actually seen a couple of
2 presentations presented to us. In consultation, obviously
3 with the Board, once we get your feedback, we'll
4 hopefully move forward soon with the recommendation for a
5 case management system to bring all of our efforts
6 together. Also, want to update you on transferred cases
7 as we said a few weeks ago, we would do. We have
8 transferred a case to enforced investigations.

9 MR. WARFIELD: That case closed in our shop on August
10 the 30th of 2023. The allegation in that case is force.
11 Finally, I am making a passionate appeal. I want to first
12 of all, thank all of the commissioners who are able to
13 take our cases the CCRs and reports and read them.
14 However, it would be extremely helpful if we had more
15 commissioners who will avail themselves to read some of
16 the reports and sign off and to spread the work. We are
17 handing more cases, I'm sorry, our investigators are
18 producing more cases per week. Tonight, there are 26
19 cases that went out to you all, and we are ramping up
20 that number. So the more people we can get to help us
21 sign off on those cases, read them, and then sign off on
22 them, it would be greatly appreciated. That's our report
23 tonight. Thank you.

24 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. Is there any
25 questions, comments, or feedback from my colleagues

1 regarding any of the items mentioned in our community
2 impact report?

3 COMMISSIONER CARTER: I do have a comment through the
4 Chair.

5 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Commissioner Carter.

6 COMMISSIONER CARTER: I don't know. I used to get the
7 cases, so it stopped coming to me, but I don't mind
8 reviewing the cases. There are several commissioners that
9 don't mind reviewing the cases.

10 MR. WARFIELD: That is great news. Thank you,
11 Commissioner Carter.

12 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Yeah, my expectation is that
13 we all will be reading those cases. If there's anyone
14 having any objection to that, I'm open to conversation.
15 Commissioner Bell.

16 COMMISSIONER BELL: I do have one concern, well,
17 perhaps two. Can we get an idea of the workload for each
18 investigator? Especially just have an idea who's working
19 and what activity they engage in. My other concern is
20 that OCI was not present for Lieutenant Sergeants on
21 Friday at one o'clock. Is there an explanation? My
22 activities from 2014, we never missed an opportunity.
23 That was a great opportunity to speak and interact
24 because that was the sergeant Lieutenant who are the
25 foundation of the leadership that we spoke about earlier.

1 I was not have a PowerPoint, but I think I did excellent
2 job representing this Board, representing Commissioner
3 Bell, something that I started in 2014. This was not a
4 Board project. This was something that Commissioner Bell
5 initiated then we got OCI to join me, and especially the
6 Chief Investigators. So I would like to have an
7 explanation why there was no forewarning or no show in
8 terms of explanation what took place, what did not take
9 place.

10 MR. WARFIELD: Sure. Through the Chair. The Chief
11 Investigator myself, I was on vacation on Friday, and you
12 and I had talked before, I think last week's meeting
13 about it. I was unsure. I don't think the plans were
14 solidified as it relates to what OCI's role was supposed
15 to be that day. However, I will guarantee you this
16 Commissioner Bell that in the future we will make sure
17 that there is a representative at the Lieutenant and
18 Sergeants meeting. So we will absolutely be there.

19 COMMISSIONER BELL: Board Secretary read it off last
20 week in terms of confirmation at the Board meeting. Am I
21 correct, Madam Secretary?

22 MS. SHAH: Yes, that's correct. I did mention that
23 that class was going on.

24 COMMISSIONER BELL: Right. I assume that we can sort
25 with OCI in terms of the Chief Investigator's not theirs

1 designate person, which we can talk offline.

2 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Yeah. Your passion around this
3 issue is duly noted, and we'll ensure that it doesn't
4 happen again. So we'll definitely circle back around and
5 ensure we get our processes together to ensure we have
6 presence at those meetings. He asked firstly about
7 ensuring that we have a sense on work each investigators
8 are doing. I know we're currently researching that. So
9 we'll be expecting a work product in that regard. I'll
10 let the record also show that we have been joined by
11 Commissioner Bernard. So good to see you. Thank you for
12 being here. Yes, Vice-Chair Holley.

13 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you. I'm sort of like the
14 Vice-Chairperson, obviously. I'm like the Chair's kind of
15 shotgun man. We need to know what commissioners are not
16 taking the work. We need to know that. I think the
17 Chairman need to know that. Then if some reason or
18 another they're not doing it, then allow me to help you
19 with this because I'm retired. But I'm just saying to
20 you, we need to know who's not doing the work of the
21 commissioner. It'll be a good reason. But I do feel the
22 Chairman, I need to report to him what commissioners are
23 not doing the job expected of them in terms of these
24 reports. Is that okay, Mr. Chairman?

25 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: That's perfect. Thank you. Any

1 further questions, comments, or feedback regarding the
2 Community Impact report?

3 COMMISSIONER BELL: Mr. Chairman.

4 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Yes. Commissioner Bell

5 COMMISSIONER BELL: At the last meeting, three
6 commission, including myself, raised concern about the
7 impact. I would hope that we can have—

8 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: The community impact report.

9 COMMISSIONER BELL: Have some form. That was
10 excellent, what you reported out from the Chief of Police
11 in terms of Board participation. But I think we need to
12 have that discussion in terms about other issues that we
13 have raised about a month ago in terms of what took place
14 in profanity language, and even with not due process in
15 terms of painting a certain picture, then even
16 commissioner had dialogue about once you open that box
17 up. I think we need to have some, and perhaps
18 commissioner, Vice-Chair Holley and Commissioner Carter,
19 myself would be involved in that process because we are
20 past chairs of this Board here, so I think you should
21 utilize that experience.

22 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Yeah, no, I'm definitely open
23 to your feedback in this regard, but also equally as
24 committed to ensuring that we're communicating to the
25 public the information that's necessary in order to have

1 conversation about police misconduct. I think that there
2 is a perfect compromise there if we open up the channel
3 for communication. So I'm definitely open.

4 COMMISSIONER BELL: I agree. Just what I stated, you
5 did an excellent job at this meeting. But in the past, we
6 raised that concern just as a blast.

7 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. I remember having
8 to apologize on behalf of the Board because of one of
9 those reports. So we'll do our best to ensure that we get
10 to a point that meets the standard that we desire as well
11 as the residents deserve. Any other questions or
12 comments?

13 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Right here. Right here.

14 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Commissioner Banks.

15 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Through the Chair. Sorry. I know
16 last week they were talking about possibly getting rid of
17 the Community Impact report, but that's a very valuable
18 report. That's something that we need to reach out and
19 extend to the community. So I'm all in favor of that
20 Community Impact report staying, because it's very, very
21 valuable and the community need to hear that, what takes
22 place with that Community Impact Report.

23 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you for that.

24 Commissioner Banks, I think we are all on the same page
25 now.

1 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Through the Chair. I'm sorry.

2 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Commissioner Carter.

3 COMMISSIONER CARTER: We're talking about getting rid
4 of it. I think that the issue for me was that according
5 to our bylaws, we have an agenda that we're supposed to
6 follow. So if it's going to be added, it should be, the
7 bylaws need to be changed to reflect the community impact
8 report.

9 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. There is a larger
10 discussion to be had. We did get some renderings from I
11 think our parliamentarian around the language that says a
12 normal agenda. So we have to do some definition about
13 what a normal agenda would mean. But again, there's some
14 benefit in the conversation. But I concur. I think we're
15 all on the same page that the channel to communicate to
16 the community the information we're receiving is
17 absolutely necessary. I think what we're talking about is
18 what kind of guardrails we have to ensure that we all are
19 on the same page on what to expect when we hear the
20 Community impact report. Commissioner Bernard.

21 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. The
22 Community impact report is really part of the director's
23 report, Board Secretary's report. She allows the Chief
24 Investigator, of course, to make that report because he's
25 the one that is receiving direct information from the

1 community about the police department. It's totally
2 appropriate that that information be provided to the
3 community and to the Board on an unfettered basis. If I
4 may, I'll give you an example. As you know, the Chief
5 generally comes and tells us when he's present. I'm not
6 sure what happened today. The most heinous things that
7 have happened with respect to public safety or this
8 person shot this person and this police officer did a
9 great job when he apprehended Linda, let's say, doing X,
10 Y, or Z. We are very supportive of that.

11 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: We are very supportive of the
12 Chief's honesty and of course, his viewpoint of that
13 situation. Those situations, as you and I both know,
14 always wind up in litigation. So that's not even a
15 factor. In the community impact report, when our Chief
16 Investigator and our Board Secretary State, this happened
17 to Sarah. This is what Sarah says the police did to her
18 on X, Y, Z, and this was wrong when they did such and
19 such to her, or whatever they did to Sarah, John, or
20 James. Then there's this pushback that we shouldn't hear
21 the facts as related to us by a citizen. Those facts are
22 to me, as important as the facts stated by the Chief. So
23 I suggest that we continue with our current process.
24 Let's hear from the community. Let's hear from the Chief
25 on an unfettered basis.

1 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. I think we've
2 exhausted that conversation. So if there's no objection,
3 we can move forward. Now to the report from the Chief
4 Police and the Fourth Precinct.

5 DEPUTY CHIEF STEWART: I am Deputy Chief Tiffany
6 Stewart, sitting there for Chief White today. Providing a
7 report on updated or injured officers for the city. We
8 currently have one police officer from the Ninth Precinct
9 who is disabled and recovering at home due to an on-duty
10 injury. Moving on to our crime data. We are continuing
11 reductions in our part 1 crime. We have a 10% reduction
12 in homicide. At this point, we have a 7% reduction in
13 non-fatal shootings, and we actually have a 29% reduction
14 in carjacking citywide for the City of Detroit. We do
15 have a 6% increase in robberies leading to a total part 1
16 violent crime of 0.01%. We additionally have like a 0.03%
17 increase in aggravated assault as well. Our hope is to
18 sustain the reductions for the remaining year. That is
19 our goal. We are doing well so far, and our hope is just
20 to continue to do as well as we've done so far this year
21 in combating the crime.

22 DEPUTY CHIEF STEWART: We are still participating in
23 our drag racing and drifting details. Year to date we've
24 had 22 felony arrests based on our drag racing and
25 drifting detail, 5 misdemeanor arrests just related to

1 that. We've recovered 9 weapons during those details.
2 We've recovered 6 vehicles. We've investigated over 337
3 vehicles and issued over 157 traffic citations during the
4 drag racing and drifting details. We still are
5 participating, still in tune to them. We still get a lot
6 of complaints via 911 or for the community, from the
7 various neighborhoods, or just from officers riding along
8 the street and just coming across them in their own
9 routine patrol. Mental health related calls for service.
10 So far we've had what, 81 calls for service in the last
11 seven days for either suicide in progress or a suicide
12 threat.

13 DEPUTY CHIEF STEWART: We've had 70 service calls for
14 mental nonviolent. We've had 31 service calls for mental
15 violent armed, and 96 for mental violent not armed. So
16 that's just the last seven days. Year to date, there have
17 been increases from our mental health related calls. From
18 this year over last, we've had over 2000 mental
19 nonviolent calls. In 2023, we've had over 3000 suicide in
20 progress or threat calls. We've had over a thousand
21 mental violent armed calls. So it is clearly a mental
22 health crisis within the city of Detroit. We're doing all
23 that we can within Detroit Police Department to combat
24 those calls, to try and provide empathy, to try and
25 provide our critical...

1 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Crisis intervention.

2 DEPUTY CHIEF STEWART: Crisis intervention, thank
3 you. Training for officers, just so we can mitigate those
4 issues in a way that's healthy for the entire community.
5 Moving on to some of our significant incidents. We did
6 have shots fired at officers in the Eighth Precinct. On
7 Friday, September 8th at about 10:00 PM officers were on
8 routine patrol in the area of St. Mary's in West seven
9 Mile. They observed a vehicle traveling at a high rate of
10 speed. The vehicle actually almost ran into the officers,
11 which made them provide a conducted traffic stop to
12 investigate the vehicle. There were three individuals
13 inside of the vehicle. They removed all three of the
14 individuals, and at one point discovered a handgun in the
15 vehicle. One of those individuals fled into the
16 neighborhood of 18,000 blocks of St. Mary's. One officer
17 pursued him on foot and they began to search the area. A
18 homeowner exited his home and fired one shot at the
19 officers.

20 DEPUTY CHIEF STEWART: They took cover and identified
21 themselves. They did not return fire. The suspect who
22 fired shots at the officer was arrested at the scene.
23 Officers did call K9 in and continued to look for the
24 initial suspect who fled, and they were successful in
25 finding him hiding on top of a garage in that direct

1 area. They also placed him under arrest. The detectives
2 from the Eighth Precinct Detective unit along with the
3 Homicide Task Force Unit arrived to conduct an
4 investigation. Homicide Task Force Unit comes out when
5 shots are fired at officers or officers fired shots to
6 citizens and conducted an investigation. They submitted
7 warrants on both suspect to the Wayne County Prosecutor's
8 office, and both were charged. The suspect who fired
9 shots at the officer was arraigned on a reckless use of
10 firearms charge. Then the suspect who fled from the
11 officers from the traffic stop was arraigned on carrying
12 concealed weapon and resisting an obstructing police
13 officer charge.

14 DEPUTY CHIEF STEWART: Another incident, we had a 14-
15 year-old shot Sunday, September 10th at about one o'clock
16 in the morning on a 13,000 block of Shields in the 11th
17 Precinct. Officers arrived at the scene and observed the
18 victim being treated by medics. He had a gunshot wound to
19 his hip. He was in temporary serious condition when he
20 was conveyed to the Children's Hospital. Detectives from
21 the 11th Precinct arrived at the scene to investigate.
22 What they found occurred is that there was a large block
23 party slash wrap video shoot on the block. Witness stated
24 that a silver pickup truck may have been involved in a
25 shooting and they were seen driving away from the scene

1 at a high rate of speed. This incident is still currently
2 under investigation. If anybody has any information to
3 provide, please contact Crime Stoppers at 1-800 Speak Up.

4 DEPUTY CHIEF STEWART: Same day Sunday, September
5 10th at 1:20 AM a 15-year-old was shot in the 10th
6 Precinct. In the 4,000 block of Petoskey officers
7 received a ShotSpotter alert that was later updated to a
8 shooting. They arrived at the scene and observed the
9 victim a 15-year-old male with a gunshot wound to his
10 right arm. He was conveyed to the hospital and also
11 pronounced in a temporary serious condition. The 10th
12 Precinct detectives responded to the scene and determined
13 that he was standing on the front porch of the location
14 on a gray Kia Fort, driving westbound on Elmhurst toward,
15 I say, go just down the street fired shots at him,
16 hitting him once in the arm. So this incident is also
17 still under investigation. Again, if you have any
18 information regarding or related to this, please call
19 Crime Stoppers at 1-800 Speak Up.

20 DEPUTY CHIEF STEWART: Or you can also get in contact
21 with Detroit Rewards tv. That's also another avenue for
22 providing tips to assist us in solving some of these
23 crimes. A last significant incident was a quintuple
24 shooting with two fatal victims in the Sixth Precinct on
25 Sunday, September 10th. It was a busy day, Sunday,

1 September 10th. This was in the 8,000 block of Rosemont.
2 Officers arrived at the location and observed a victim
3 lying on the front yard, face down with multiple gunshot
4 wounds. Medics pronounced him deceased on the scene. A
5 second victim was found lying on his back in the backseat
6 of a silver Chevy with multiple gunshot wounds to his
7 torso. He was also pronounced deceased on the scene by
8 medics. Another victim walked into the hospital and we
9 were able to determine that he was also a party to the
10 scene. Then again, additional juveniles. We had two, a
11 14-year-old and a 17 year old also non fatally shot in
12 this incident. Both suffered multiple gunshot wounds and
13 were listed in critical condition.

14 DEPUTY CHIEF STEWART: What did the detectives
15 determine happened? In summary, there was a dispute
16 between two families on the block on Rosemont Street. The
17 dispute was initially an argument that turned into a
18 physical altercation. Witnesses stated that the suspect
19 shot the victims, and then the victim's family returned
20 fire. So then detectives were successful in identifying
21 suspects who fired shots and are preparing a warrant to
22 the Wayne County Prosecutor's office. So, great work on
23 their behalf. But we are still looking for additional
24 information. If anybody has any video, if anybody was a
25 witnesses who fled the scene. There were a number of

1 people outside during that scene as well. Again, Crime
2 Stoppers 1-800 Speak Up. So just a lot of juvenile shot
3 on one day. Two of these two were both out at one o'clock
4 in the morning, just hanging out, doing a lot when they
5 probably should be at home, at school time, writing a
6 paper or reading a book. But that's just my opinion.

7 DEPUTY CHIEF STEWART: Moving on to some positive
8 stories. For the last week, we had the 9/11 Memorial
9 service at Campus Martius on September 11th. The event
10 honored and remember those lives lost 22 years ago on
11 September 11th. Local first responders and community
12 members gathered to remember those who sacrificed their
13 lives on 9/11. The event was MCD by WDIV's Demand.
14 Hernandez and Chief White, Commissioner Sims and Deputy
15 Mary Todd Battison all spoke at the event. We did also
16 later that evening on Monday, September 11, at our
17 appointment and promotional ceremonies for the Detroit
18 Police Department at Wayne County Community College
19 district at the ceremony. Four people were appointed and
20 58 were promoted to the ranks of Lieutenant Sergeant and
21 detective. They were very excited. Families were happy to
22 be able to experience this transition into a leadership
23 role into the Detroit Police Department.

24 DEPUTY CHIEF STEWART: So we certainly are proud of
25 them and happy for them. Those members who were appointed

1 to the rank of Deputy Chief were Melissa Gardner,
2 Commander Aric Tosqui, Commander Dietrick Lever and
3 Captain Scott Hall. So though they had previously been
4 appointed, we did offer them an opportunity to walk into
5 the ceremony so that their parents can see them get this
6 recognition of appointment to a higher position. Let's
7 see. Lastly, we had a coffee and cake for those who may
8 have come, or for Assistant Chief David LeValley on
9 Tuesday, December, September 12th for his retirement at
10 Detroit Public Safety Headquarters. We had it in the
11 Skylar room. He had 28 years of service and he will take
12 a civilian position as Detroit Fire Department's Chief of
13 Staff in October. So his last day is September 29th.
14 Assistant Chief LeValley has been Assistant Chief since
15 2018, and he was a Deputy Chief on the police department
16 for five years prior to his appointment to his current
17 rank. So it was a very nice sized party. A lot of food, a
18 lot of gifts. We wish him well and we are thankful for
19 his service to not only the police department, but the
20 city of Detroit. That's my report out.

21 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. Before we bring up
22 the Fourth Precinct for their report, any questions or
23 comments for Deputy Chief Stewart? Vice-Chair Holley.

24 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. Deputy
25 Chief, can you let the chief let the Chairman know that I

1 did a good job?

2 DEPUTY CHIEF STEWART: You did an awesome job,
3 Commissioner Holley.

4 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: I trust that.

5 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Also, if you would please. In
6 the incident there last week at the grocer, there was an
7 incident this past week at the post office downtown on
8 Fort Street and a minimum situation, obviously. But I
9 stayed there for about maybe 35-40 minutes or so, just
10 observing what was going on. Say there was a good, I
11 think it counted like 12 peace officers, about 5 cars
12 trying to handle the situation. Deescalate it. But my
13 concern is what happens when someone basically is in that
14 state where you can't let him go home. You can't let him
15 go because I mean, he was just erratic. So what is the
16 place where we take him?

17 DEPUTY CHIEF STEWART: So typically speaking, we will
18 take them to one of the local crisis centers and usually
19 speaking, they will admit them and they remain on
20 premises for could be up to 72 hours. The doctors at
21 those facilities will provide the medication in hopes of
22 evening out their mental health at that point in time.

23 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Then finally, Mr. Chairman
24 there's a concern across this country where marijuana now
25 is legal of course, in the city of Detroit. But the

1 concern that many of us are having is that that's not the
2 same marijuana that Commissioner Bell had when he was on
3 the police deployed on the police force. So is there
4 anything that's going on in Detroit that seems where we
5 are finding death and things that basically where
6 marijuana is now being docketed up to where death is taking
7 place those kind of things. Are we seeing anything in
8 that area of what's going on in some cities?

9 DEPUTY CHIEF STEWART: So I can't speak intelligently
10 regarding that. I do know with regard to there have been
11 occasions where fentanyl has been placed in marijuana or
12 they would smoke it. But unfortunately I don't work major
13 violators, which is our local narcotic unit. So I can't
14 really speak intelligently about that.

15 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Quickly, the I'll leave you
16 alone, Mr. Chairman. Do you think we ought to have some
17 type of report in terms of that kind of activity taking
18 place where people are dying from overdosing. I'm just
19 concerned that we know it's legal, but we know also that
20 now people are stepping it up to where people are dying.
21 I just don't know what's going on. Do we have any
22 statistics that tells what we doing in Detroit in regard
23 to those kind of deaths? How many people shot, how many
24 people died from shots, all that, but not from.

25 DEPUTY CHIEF STEWART: So no, we don't keep local

1 statistics on deaths related to marijuana. So marijuana
2 is legal. So those patrons who are getting marijuana
3 legally probably are going to a facility that sells the
4 marijuana. So I would not imagine that they are having
5 health concerns, if you will. The marijuana that would be
6 illegal is probably if there are such issues occurring,
7 it probably will be occurring from illegal marijuana
8 sales.

9 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you. Thank you, Mr. Chair.

10 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Yeah, Vice-Chair. That's a
11 reasonable conversation. I just don't know if DPD is the
12 right person to present on it. So we can have Secretary
13 Shah investigate. Maybe there's an organization that's
14 keeping their eye upon marijuana use in the city and
15 might be able to speak intelligently on that regard. Any
16 other questions?

17 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Just a real short comment.

18 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Commissioner Bernard.

19 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I want to congratulate you,
20 Deputy Chief and the Chief on the fact that we had the
21 promotion ceremony on 9/11. That is such a significant
22 day in the history of this country. If I was an officer
23 and I was being promoted the day that I would want to be
24 promoted, most would be on 9/11 which honors all first
25 responders, fire, police, everybody. That was a very

1 impactful decision on your part and I think it was
2 impactful for the individuals that were there and
3 including obviously, I guess LeValley because he just
4 left the department and now he's gone over the fire. I
5 mean, even in the future, I think I would consider that
6 day, the day. Because that's the day that all first
7 responders are honored and that's the day I'd want to get
8 my stuff.

9 DEPUTY CHIEF STEWART: Well, thank you. I concur. I
10 thought it was absolutely amazing.

11 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. Commissioner Banks.

12 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Thank you, through the Chair.
13 Deputy Chief, blesses up on you and your household. Okay.
14 What's the protocol when you got a suspect and you got an
15 officer in a confrontation and that suspect gets hurt. Is
16 it a protocol that officer render aid to that suspect?
17 What's the protocol on that, Deputy Chief?

18 DEPUTY CHIEF STEWART: Well, typically speaking law
19 enforcement officers or any public safety officer,
20 whether it is law enforcement, fire, EMS. If we come
21 across as a first responder, we come across someone who's
22 injured whether in contact with us or not we typically do
23 render aid.

24 COMMISSIONER BANKS: So that's a standard protocol,
25 or you just do.

1 DEPUTY CHIEF STEWART: It should be a standard
2 protocol. Now, when you're talking about render aid, what
3 are you speaking about specifically? Are you talking
4 about getting down and doing mouth to mouth?

5 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Whatever the suspect need to
6 survive to live.

7 DEPUTY CHIEF STEWART: I'm sure the officer is going
8 to do what they're knowledgeable to do. If the person
9 requires mouth to mouth and the officer hasn't been
10 trained on mouth to mouth, and I'm just speaking in
11 general terms, I don't imagine that they would give mouth
12 to mouth.

13 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Okay.

14 DEPUTY CHIEF STEWART: I'm sure that they would call
15 for EMS or somebody who could provide that.

16 COMMISSIONER BANKS: But with DPD, isn't there a
17 basic training where DPD officers take up CPR?

18 DEPUTY CHIEF STEWART: I just spoke in general terms,
19 Commissioner Banks. They should, and I just gave that
20 just as an example. But again, if it's something that
21 they are not trained on doing, then they would call EMS
22 for further assistance.

23 COMMISSIONER BANKS: But they should though.

24 DEPUTY CHIEF STEWART: Depends on what it is. I, I
25 can't say that I, you'd have to speak to the injuries.

1 There are a whole bunch of aspects to that. Alright.

2 There's a policy on it. We can pull it.

3 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Okay. Thank you. Any further
4 questions?

5 COMMISSIONER BELL: Mr. Chair.

6 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Commissioner Bell.

7 COMMISSIONER BELL: I just want to speak to my hour
8 and a half I spent with the sergeant lieutenant and they
9 were present and you was present and they were really
10 concerned about this Board in terms of interaction. They
11 was not impressed. They told me that one-on-one and told
12 me that collectively, and I apologized to them for this
13 Board in terms of how we conduct our business. I hope if
14 we do future promotion, we'll have a better process of
15 dealing with that situation because we invite people to
16 our house, they should not be treated in that manner.
17 Now, I just want to add one more comment that I was at
18 forefront of drug education for about 10 years out of
19 narcotics for the Black police officer movement. We went
20 from elementary to high school citywide for about 10
21 years.

22 COMMISSIONER BELL: That's something that we
23 initiated and we got approval from Mayor Young and Chief
24 our. So that's something that we had an impact in terms
25 hopefully on young people educating. I used to have all

1 those facts, drug kick and everything. In fact, you
2 remember my officer, Michael Lemon, okay. He came along
3 thereafter for the department after we started the
4 program. Some of you probably know him. One other
5 comment, if you just bear with me. There was a public
6 comment about I was engaging in criminality in terms of
7 the towing such and such. That was followed up by a
8 certain commissioner indicating that I should be removed
9 from the towing. But you should know that it is private
10 entity involving this. This is Nicholas Hood Medical
11 Center court, the late councilman and Reverend. You know
12 him real well over the years.

13 COMMISSIONER BELL: This unit is by Crosman Children
14 Hospital. We have signed, posted, and we have an ongoing
15 interaction with the public because they want to park on
16 private property. For 20 years we have tried, but we have
17 no choice. There's big signs there but also towing is for
18 police towing. They don't deal with private property. I
19 just want to make that clear. If there's an investigation
20 going on that commissioners called for, I would hope that
21 include him also, in terms of engaging this Board is
22 corrupted has been stated publicly in the media? So I
23 just want to clarify that point. I do not engage in that
24 type of criminality. It is private entity. I've been
25 involved over 20 years and this United Church of Christ.

1 You know that church, you know them about. We are the
2 only, what do you call it, non-profit, affordable housing
3 in the city of Detroit that still left. That started in
4 1967. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

5 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. For the questions
6 for Deputy Chief, we'll now move on to the Fourth
7 Precinct report.

8 COMMANDER HOLDERBAUM: Good evening, Board, Deputy
9 Chief Stewart. Residents of the fourth precinct. I want
10 to say thank you very much for this opportunity to serve
11 in the Fourth Precinct.

12 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Your name.

13 COMMANDER HOLDERBAUM: [Foreign language 00:55:34].

14 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I'm sorry, your name. I missed
15 it.

16 COMMANDER HOLDERBAUM: I'm Commander Shelley
17 Holderbaum.

18 COMMISSIONER: Thank you.

19 COMMANDER HOLDERBAUM: Tonight I have my partner with
20 me, Captain Tanya Leonard.

21 COMMISSIONER: Crisis Intervention.

22 COMMANDER HOLDERBAUM: Yes. Crisis intervention team.
23 So yes, yes. Very excited to have her at the number four
24 with us and the members of the team I brought with me as
25 well. We'll be standing by after the meeting to assist

1 with anything that the citizens would like us to address
2 with them. I'm going to read everybody our violent crime
3 report for the Fourth Precinct, and then we're going to
4 move into property crimes. If I go too fast and there's
5 something you want to question me on, please let me know.
6 But we did a comparison for this week, last week and the
7 previous week for homicides and we're at zero. From the
8 last 28 days compared to the previous 28 days, we had 1,
9 which put us up a hundred percent, yeah, for the one.

10 COMMANDER HOLDERBAUM: For the period comparing to
11 2022, we were even. Comparison of 2023, right now we have
12 nine homicides in the Fourth Precinct compared to last
13 year, 8, which is a 12% increase. Looking at criminal
14 sexual conduct, sex crimes, we had zero in the last
15 previous three weeks. From the last 28 days compared to
16 the previous 28, we went down from 1 to 5, which is an
17 80% decrease. In 2022 in that same period where an 83%
18 decrease. In comparison from 2023 to 2022, we're 22 from
19 27. So a 19% decrease. Robberies. We this week had zero,
20 the previous week three and then the previous week 35
21 we're at 5. So we're at a 40% decrease.

22 COMMANDER HOLDERBAUM: The last 28 days, we had 11
23 compared to the previous, which was 6, which put us up as
24 an increase at 83%. But we're going to contribute that
25 40% decrease for an arrest we had. For the period of 2022

1 comparison, that would be seven we're 50% up. 2023
2 comparison to 2022 we're up 9%. Assaultive crimes are
3 aggravated assaults. This week we had zero, the previous
4 week, 8, and then the previous week prior to that 11. So
5 we're down 11%. 28 days comparison we're at 55 and we
6 were 65. So we're 15% down. 2022, 68% decrease. From the
7 comparison of 2023, we're at 434 and this time last year
8 we're at four 30, which is a 1% increase.

9 COMMANDER HOLDERBAUM: I'm going to go to burglaries.
10 We've had zero this week, but the previous two weeks, we
11 had 4 and 4, which keeps us even. Last 28 days we had 20.
12 Then to comparison to 23, which gives us a 13% decrease
13 for 2022, where we had 15, which gives us an increase of
14 33%. Comparison for 2023 to 2022, we're at 143 to 155,
15 which is the 7% decrease. Larcenies as well as vehicle
16 thefts, we are down and even with the vehicle thefts. We
17 show decreases from previous 28 days on all of those
18 crimes for 28% for the larceny, 34 for the motor vehicle
19 theft and 28 total all offenses down. The comparison from
20 the 2023 to 2022 burglaries were down 7%. We are up on
21 larcenies by 6%, motor vehicle theft by 2 in the total
22 fence 3% overall. I'm going to speak a little bit about
23 our non-fatal shootings in the Fourth Precinct.

24 COMMANDER HOLDERBAUM: On March 31st, 2023, we were
25 at 75% increase. We were at 237 compared to the 224. On

1 June 30th, we had decreased that down to 13%. The
2 comparison for 2023 we're at 17 in 2022 to 15. As of
3 August 31st, we were at 4% increase in non-fatal
4 shootings. In 2023, 29, compared to the 22 of 28 today.
5 Well, as of the date pulled of September 12th, we had
6 zero. We're at zero at 2023, 29 compared to 2022, 29. A
7 comparison of our homicides. On March 31st, we were at a
8 200% increase. 2023, we had 3 homicides compared to the 1
9 in 2022. June 30th, we had a 166% increase of homicides.
10 In 2023, we were 8 in 2022 at 3. As of August 31st, our
11 increases at 12%, where we've had 9 in 2023 and 8 in
12 2022. Strategy results. Our strategy has had an impact on
13 our non-fatal shootings that have been consistently
14 decreasing.

15 COMMANDER HOLDERBAUM: Our homicides are starting to
16 sharply decrease in the last quarter. Robberies in the
17 last 28 days, we had shown a 83% increase, which is 11
18 compared to the 6. Robberies are up 8% compared to the
19 2023 of 97 when we had 89 and 2022. In the past three
20 weeks, our robberies have declined 40% and we're going to
21 contribute that to arrest, and we're hoping to be able to
22 tie that person into other arrests and be able to close
23 further cases. To date, Fourth Precinct has had 98
24 arrests for carrying and concealing weapons, gun charges.
25 We're targeting enforcement. We're working with building

1 safety and engineering and environmental BC and licensing
2 and blight. We're doing restore orders, tickets, and tows
3 on a weekly basis. We have a partnership with the
4 Michigan Department of Corrections, and we're doing MDOC
5 checks.

6 COMMANDER HOLDERBAUM: With custom notification and
7 ceasefire. We now have an embedded social worker at our
8 precinct, who I believe is here tonight. We also have a
9 victim's advocate who assists citizens with PPOs and
10 works with our office and chaplains on domestic violence
11 reduction program. Both our social worker and our victims
12 advocates speak Spanish and English. Yes, we're very
13 excited about that. Our NPOs are conducting afterschool
14 programs, which include gun safety. We give a class, if
15 you find it, what to do, conflict resolution, police
16 encounters, cyber bullying, cell phone usage, stranger
17 danger, and how to communicate and report trauma. Our
18 upcoming events within the precinct. We have our monthly
19 community relations meeting every second Tuesday of the
20 month. We just had one this past Tuesday.

21 COMMANDER HOLDERBAUM: We had an excellent show out.
22 Thank you. Our Southwest Church of God, we're going to
23 have a backpack giveaway Saturday, September 16th, senior
24 citizens movie night. Our Papa Davis senior citizens will
25 be coming over Thursday, September 21st. Our other two

1 facilities are being scheduled for movie night. We have
2 showers here. We're going to start our showers again at
3 the Kemeny Center every Tuesday from 12:00 PM to 2:00 PM
4 and our national faith in blue will be October 6th
5 through October the ninth. That completes our report for
6 the Fourth Precinct.

7 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. Any questions or
8 comments relative to the fourth-

9 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Right here to your-

10 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Commissioner Banks.

11 COMMISSIONER BANKS: To your left, Mr. Chair. Okay.

12 Through the Chair. Is it Commander?

13 COMMANDER HOLDERBAUM: Yes, sir.

14 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Huh?

15 COMMANDER HOLDERBAUM: Yes, sir.

16 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Commander.

17 COMMANDER HOLDERBAUM: Yes, sir.

18 COMMISSIONER BANKS: You mentioned that you all have
19 a partnership with Michigan Correction. Right?

20 COMMISSIONER: Great. Minds alike.

21 COMMISSIONER BANKS: What's the partnership? What all
22 takes place in that relationship?

23 COMMANDER HOLDERBAUM: We go out with them and we do
24 checks for people who are on probation and on parole to
25 make sure that they're in with compliance of what they're

1 supposed to be doing.

2 COMMISSIONER BANKS: No, I hold up. I hold up. I'm
3 through Mr. Chair. I'm all set. Thanks.

4 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Any further questions?
5 Commissioner Hernandez.

6 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Through the Chair. I don't
7 have questions, unfortunately. Not today at least. you
8 know this for me. Anytime that I have resident concerns
9 and I bring them to you, you're very proactive. I'm a
10 very big fan and admirer of the work that you're doing at
11 Fourth Precinct. You're very proactive, even to the
12 degree that you call me before I even have to call you on
13 a lot of issues that come up. So I just can't thank you
14 enough for everything that you've been doing since you
15 joined the Fourth Precinct and have been leading it. I'm
16 just looking forward to everything else that's ahead of
17 us on this journey together. So thank you, thank everyone
18 on the team, obviously. I neglected to thank Nava. I just
19 saw her floating around somewhere. She was here. I am so
20 sorry that I didn't publicly thank you before because
21 you've been phenomenal as well and the work that you do
22 is so critical. So thanks to the entire team.

23 COMMANDER HOLDERBAUM: Yes. Ms. Minnie and both the
24 both of them. When we have citizens who come in and can't
25 speak Spanish, they'll come up and we don't have a

1 Spanish speaking officer at that time in the precinct.
2 They'll come up and translate and help us out. They do a
3 wonderful job. I can't say enough about them and all the
4 officers. I will tell you this Board, as you know, I got
5 my dream job. I've always wanted to work at the Fourth
6 Precinct and it took me 25 years to get there. So it's
7 funny. I have a permanent smile on my face that I just
8 can't wipe off. So thank you so much. Appreciate it.

9 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. Any further
10 questions?

11 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Chairman.

12 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Commissioner Bernard. One
13 second, commander.

14 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Commander.

15 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: One second. We got one more
16 question.

17 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Commander. Just a comment. I'm
18 sitting here and I'm listening to your report and I said,
19 are we in Detroit or is this Grosse Point? I just had to
20 figure it out because you've done such a great job and
21 all your crime statistics are solo. You are a phenomenal
22 woman. Thank you. In the words of Maya Angel,
23 congratulations.

24 COMMANDER HOLDERBAUM: Thank you.

25 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: I don't know if I like that

1 comment. This is Detroit.

2 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Yeah, they're sidekick.

3 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: All the women.

4 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: This is Detroit city. We have
5 intelligent, articulate people in the city of Detroit as
6 well.

7 COMMANDER HOLDERBAUM: This is on all the precincts.
8 This is the only female dual here. So we take pride in
9 this.

10 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Excellent. Thank you so very
11 much for those reports. Now we'll move on to what I say
12 is the most important part of the meeting that's hearing
13 from the community. So again, it is time for public
14 comment.

15 MR. BROWN: Good afternoon, Mr. Chair.

16 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: If you haven't filled out a
17 public comment card, make sure you do that so that you're
18 able to speak.

19 COMMISSIONER: Give it to Mister.

20 MR. BROWN: Give it to me over there. As of right
21 now, Mr. Chair, we have four speakers with more to come.
22 So I'll call those couples that I have right now. Ms.
23 Bernice Smith, followed by Minister Eric Blount.

24 MS. SMITH: Good evening to my commissioner.

25 COMMISSIONERS: Good evening.

1 MS. SMITH: I am so happy that we come to Carter
2 Town. Seriously speaking this city should be very
3 thankful that we're here because did you hear the report
4 that she gave? I couldn't believe it. Zero and a zero.
5 But you know what? I'm not surprised. This young lady
6 here, she went to Western where my children went. She's
7 grown though. But I still re remember that face because I
8 used to be the hall guard there in at Western. But what I
9 want to tell you, this is a wonderful area of the city.
10 It really is. I had my bakery located on Fourth and
11 Waterman and all the kids used to come in there. When
12 they get off the bus, they come in there and get the
13 donuts and everything. I even taught them how to say good
14 morning when they come in that door.

15 MS. SMITH: But I just want to let you know, I feel
16 comfortable down here because It was in 83 to 87, so you
17 know how long ago there was. Young lady, you look
18 wonderful. You don't look the same student, but you look
19 wonderful. So I am telling you, I'm not surprised that
20 the statistics that they have just given for Southwest
21 Detroit. They are very low in crime here. I don't know
22 what the reason is, but they all live together and they
23 communicate together and they do a hell of a good job
24 down here. I can verify that during the time that I had
25 my business. I used to come down here to Brothers Bakery.

1 Do they still have it? I don't know if they're still in
2 business. See they had the best pastry that you can ever
3 buy. I used to deal with Hudson, but Hudson could not
4 compare with brothers.

5 MS. SMITH: So I'm happy to be down here to see how
6 the people are getting along and they're doing the same
7 thing that they were doing in the eighties. So good.
8 Congratulations to the Fourth Precinct, which was down
9 the street from me. So I didn't have no problem
10 whatsoever, even with the kids. So I will tell you again,
11 it's a pleasure to be down here in southwest Detroit.
12 Carter, keep up the good work. Don't buy too many houses
13 now. I mean, come on, let me have some of them.

14 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you so much.

15 MS. SMITH: Thank you so much.

16 MR. BROWN: Minister. Blount. Followed by Mr. Blunt
17 would be Mr. James Ford, followed by Mr. Ronald Foster.

18 MINISTER BLOUNT: Good evening, Board.

19 COMMISSIONERS: Good evening.

20 MINISTER BLOUNT: I'm Minister Eric Blount from
21 Sacred Heart Catholic Church here in Detroit. I don't
22 come with good news. I have grave concerns about the
23 corruption that happens and the facts are very clear.
24 Over and over again other police departments show how it
25 can and should be done, but the Detroit Police Department

1 refuses to do it and this Board will not hold them
2 accountable and very rarely even offers up a single
3 voice. This week, four officers have to stand in front of
4 a federal judge on charges of federal crimes in the
5 murder of Tyree Nichols. He was murdered. The videos were
6 clear. Everyone knows it. It happened on January 7th. The
7 videos were released January 27th, the same month, same
8 year, 20 days apart. But yet the killing of Porter Burks
9 here in Detroit happened in October of 2022. 11 months
10 now have gone by and we still don't have the body-worn
11 camera footage for the killing of Porter Burks.

12 MINISTER BLOUNT: You can bring up any excuse you
13 want to, but none will hold water because other police
14 departments do it. I choose to believe that the vast
15 majority of police officers are honest, hardworking
16 people, but it is how we do not address the bad officers
17 that makes this whole situation very dangerous. Again,
18 with this Board, your community impact report, the August
19 18th incident, still shots from the dash cam. Where are
20 the body-worn camera footage? Where's the dash cam
21 footage?

22 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. Your time is up.

23 MINISTER BLOUNT: I knew it would be.

24 MR. BROWN: Mr. Ford.

25 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: I'm sorry. There might have

1 been jarring to those who listen, but everyone has two
2 minutes for a public comment.

3 MR. FORD: My good people. City council, mayor,
4 police, police commissioners, Black, white, red, yellow,
5 green, whatever. To be great. You have to do things
6 that's great. You don't have to ask anybody for
7 permission to make your city safe. You have to make your
8 city safe. You have to demand respect. When you go
9 through Ohio, they do not ask you do you want to slow
10 down? You slow down and you going to slow down coming
11 back. City officials, you have to dream of making your
12 city great. You just don't come up with a great city. You
13 have to dream of making it safe. I propose and a whole
14 lot of other people propose that are not with me. That
15 you have a city ordinance that says if a police can prove
16 that you blatantly ran a red light and you did it, that's
17 manslaughter. Especially if you hurt somebody, you got to
18 take care of some business.

19 MR. FORD: We want to make the city safe. If you
20 blatantly run a red light, we want to take your license.
21 We want to take your car and impound it. We want to make
22 you pay a fine and we want to put you in jail. City
23 leaders. What you got to do is put up some invisible
24 signs all around your city on every interest into your
25 city that says you are in Detroit. You're going to have

1 to respect us. We're not asking for respect. You're going
2 to give us some respect. Drive. You should have some
3 signs to say drive safe and see our beautiful city. Drive
4 fast and reckless, you'll see our jails. Please adhere to
5 what I just told you. They don't ask you for respect in
6 Ohio. They make you respect. That's what we got to do in
7 this city. Put up some signs and demand some respect. God
8 bless everybody. Thank you.

9 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you.

10 MR. BROWN: Mr. Foster. Followed by Mr. Foster will
11 be Ms. Theresa Landrum, followed by Mr. Wendell Amica.

12 MR. FOSTER: Good evening.

13 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Good evening.

14 MR. FOSTER: Brought a little piece of literature
15 with me. I'm just going to go over a few outlines here
16 that I think is essential moving forward. The literature
17 comes from a Federal Commission and enact by Linda B.
18 Johnson, 1967. It goes through a lot of different
19 departments. I'm just going to share the particular
20 Department of Police functions. Our investigation of the
21 1967 Riot Cities established that virtually every major
22 episode of violence was foreshadowed by an accumulation
23 of unresolved grievances and by widespread
24 dissatisfaction among Negroes with the unwillingness or
25 inability of local government to respond.

1 MR. FOSTER: Overcoming these conditions is essential
2 for community support of law enforcement and civil order.
3 The commission recommends that the local governments
4 develop neighborhood action task force, establish
5 comprehensive grievance response mechanism, bring the
6 institutions local government, establish neighborhood
7 outlets for local, state, and federal administrative and
8 public service agency, expand opportunities for federal
9 residents to participate in a formation formulation of
10 public policy and implementation of programs.

11 MR. FOSTER: State and federal finance assistance for
12 mayors and city councils to support the research. State
13 cooperation, provide municipalities with the judicial
14 tools needed to deal with their problem. The abrasive
15 relationship between the police and the minority
16 communities have been a major and explosive source of
17 grievance, tension and disorder. The blame must be shared
18 by the total society. The police are faced with demands
19 for increased protection and services in the ghetto. Yet
20 the aggressive patrol practices start necessary to meet
21 these demands themselves, create tension and hostility.
22 The result and grievances are being further aggravated by
23 the lack of effective mechanisms for handling complaints
24 against the police.

25 MR. FOSTER: Special programs for veteran police

1 community relations have been instituted. Review police
2 operations and the ghetto, provide more adequate police
3 protection to ghetto resident, establish fair and
4 effective mechanisms, developing policy guidelines to
5 assist officers, develop and use innovative program,
6 recruit more Negroes into the regular police force and
7 review promotion policies to ensure a fair promotion for
8 Negro officers.

9 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you.

10 MR. FOSTER: Establish a community service officer
11 and on and on and on. Take a longer current report.

12 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you so very much.

13 MR. BROWN: Mr. Landrum.

14 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Mr. Chairman.

15 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Yes.

16 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Now with your permission,
17 could our staff look at these recommendations and see
18 where DPD falls within them right now? I think we've got
19 a lot of them, but some of them I don't think we have.

20 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: That's reasonable.

21 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Have permission. Thank you.

22 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you.

23 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thanks Mr. Chair.

24 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Go right ahead. Good evening.

25 MS. LANDRUM: Good evening. As mentioned, my name is

1 Theresa Landrum. I'm a lifelong resident of Southwest
2 Detroit, 48217. I would like to extend the thank you and
3 welcome here by extended by Commissioner Carter and Ms.
4 Valerie. We thank you because we know you can't be
5 everywhere all the time. So this is a welcome site
6 because many of our residents don't have the opportunity
7 to visit a Police Board Commissioner's meeting. I would
8 just like to express some concerns for our community. I
9 appreciate Commander Shelley for her report, but I would
10 like to ask is there any way that in her report she can
11 include the overdose deaths that have received police
12 calls? Just this morning we had an overdose on the corner
13 of Fort Street and Outer Drive. On the August the 10th on
14 the corner of Deacon and Gleeson, another overdose death.

15 MS. LANDRUM: Just a week and a half ago, another
16 overdose death behind the old Washington Barber shop or
17 in visitor in Annabel. We have seen an increase of
18 overdose deaths in our community. We awake to wake out to
19 roll up our garbage bins to find dead being laying on the
20 side of people houses. We know that they are not from the
21 community because this is a predominantly African
22 American community and the people that have been found
23 deceased have been white. We have an influx of panhandler
24 and drug activity that constant on the corner of Otter
25 Drive and Fort Street at the old Happy's Pizza. Just

1 about a month ago, they broke into a home and habituated
2 there and they ended up arguing and throwing a fire bomb
3 in the home, burning it up on Outer Drive.

4 MS. LANDRUM: As well as Commander Shelly and her
5 team have been very responsive. They had set up an
6 encampment on the corner of Outer Drive in electric and
7 the Department of Neighborhoods and the police department
8 came and removed it. So we thank the commander. We thank
9 Officer Taylor because we do call him daily and he does
10 respond. So I just want to say in this report, could
11 there be a place for overdose deaths in the city?

12 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you.

13 MS. LANDRUM: Because I think that needs to be
14 reported. Thank you.

15 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. Deputy Chief
16 Stewart is there a current reporting on overdoses?

17 DEPUTY CHIEF STEWART: No, we can pull that
18 information. It used to be in our report for the mental
19 health calls. There was a category for overdose deaths.
20 But I believe we pulled it out. But we can certainly
21 provide that information. Thank you.

22 MR. AMIKA: Good evening everyone.

23 COMMISSIONERS: Good evening.

24 MR. AMIKA: My name is Wendell Amica. I am a resident
25 here in southwest Detroit. Actually, I moved from

1 Roseville Park here. I actually grew up in Ecorse, so I
2 have a love for this area of the city. I know when we say
3 Southwest, we talk about the whole Southwest precinct
4 area. But my drive is to just inform you of what's going
5 on in southwest Detroit as Sister Theresa just made
6 mention. I have a friend who anything I have informed her
7 about, she contacts the police and they do a great job.
8 But what I would like you to just consider, and I've
9 heard before that they wouldn't want that, but this part
10 of Detroit is the only part of Detroit that's surrounded
11 by five cities. So we need to understand that. I'm close
12 with River Rouge and Ecorse but I live right here on
13 Annabelle and we are pretty much entrapped.

14 MR. AMIKA: I can tell you how everybody arrived here
15 came either 75 Bridge, Miller Bridge, Fort Street Bridge,
16 or Jefferson. That's the entrance to this area here. The
17 police station when it was built, it was over on Fort
18 Street, close away. But what I'm telling you, the
19 gunshots, the response. I did the walk for a mile with
20 Chief White. Think he's doing a great job and the police
21 force. I was a Wayne County Sheriff Officer, myself. So I
22 understand that, to understand the support. I think what
23 you have in this area, there's a lot of people who felt
24 like their backs have been turned away. What Theresa's
25 telling you now, Tyrone Carter did a great job clearing

1 that area off. Right now, I was just passed there.
2 They're building it right back by the Happy Pizza, right
3 behind the church over here. What I'm just concerned
4 about? I think I have what it's take to protect my home.
5 But we have several churches out here. We have people out
6 here are mostly elder.

7 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you, sir.

8 MR. AMIKA: In their nineties. But I mean, far as the
9 police, I think they do a good job. But we need to
10 consider a mini station.

11 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you.

12 MR. AMIKA: As any way possible.

13 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you.

14 MR. BROWN: Mr. Chair, your next set of speaker would
15 be Ms. Genia Boynton, followed by Ms. Ann Byrne.

16 MS. BOYNTON: Hello.

17 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Hello.

18 COMMISSIONER: Hi there.

19 MS. BOYNTON: So I live on Rosedale and I've been
20 here for 54 years, but I love my street. Love my street.
21 But we're getting these boarding houses now with
22 different people living in the homes. I don't know, is
23 there a noise ordinance?

24 COMMISSIONER: There's a noise.

25 MS. BOYNTON: They're not licensed. No. No. Yeah,

1 they're horrible. I'm down for boarding houses because
2 people need somewhere to live. But it is about respecting
3 the neighborhood and keeping the noise. One of them play
4 the drums on the porch. Is there a noise ordinance? Can
5 somebody.

6 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: There is.

7 MS. BOYNTON: Is there is?

8 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: There is.

9 MS. BOYNTON: Okay. What is it like? Is it a time or
10 something?

11 COMMISSIONER: 10 o'clock.

12 MS. BOYNTON: 10 o'clock.

13 COMMISSIONER: 10 o'clock at night.

14 MS. BOYNTON: Oh, I was giving them eight o'clock.
15 But yeah, so we have that. Now they're parking on, like
16 right there at their porch. Is that something that's
17 supposed to happen?

18 COMMISSIONER: That's illegal. That's illegal to park
19 on the front.

20 MS. BOYNTON: That is horrible. That is horrible.

21 COMMISSIONER: It's illegal to park on your front.

22 MS. BOYNTON: It's illegal.

23 COMMISSIONER: City council throughout the city of
24 Detroit.

25 MS. BOYNTON: Say it again. It's illegal or illegal.

1 Illegal. So I work every day, seven days a week. I got a
2 ticket for parking. I have a Jeep. So the little ramp was
3 like a little bit over the sidewalk and I got a ticket.
4 They parked cross the sidewalk on the grass and they have
5 never gotten a ticket. Never. I'm not understanding that.
6 I work every day. They don't work no days. So it's just
7 like they're tearing down our neighborhood. The drugs are
8 in the house. It's loud all the time. So I just don't
9 know. I don't know what to do. I mean, like, if I say
10 something, I don't want anybody retaliating against me
11 because it's just me. I don't want to take measures in my
12 own hands.

13 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. You're in the right
14 place for that. I mean, we can make sure that the
15 officers can get that information to ensure that those
16 things are followed up on and that your identity is kept
17 protected. Yes. Commissioner Bernard.

18 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Ask the commander to give that
19 area what's called special attention, where the officers
20 are patrolling much more regularly and they will ticket
21 every car that is on the lawn of a house. That is just so
22 outrageous. So do that and then let us know what happens.
23 You can come to any of our meetings at 3:30 on a Thursday
24 that aren't community meetings. So feel free.

25 MR. BROWN: Ms. Brian.

1 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Which means at three o'clock.

2 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Oh, Thursday. I'm sorry. What
3 I'm saying. Right. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

4 MS. BRYNE: Good evening and thank you for your time.

5 COMMISSIONERS: Good evening.

6 MS. BRYNE: My name is Anne Byrne. I'm a lifelong
7 Detroit resident and I live in this precinct. I'm so
8 grateful that I do because the culture here of police
9 community relations is completely different than the
10 centralized culture of police community relations. We get
11 along, we communicate, we work together to find
12 solutions. But I've been a radio patroller since 1976 and
13 that program was founded the end of 1968, the beginning
14 of 1969. So it is older than most of you. Here's the
15 thing. We've been coming up with solutions for what was
16 happening downtown. We brought groups like Detroit 300
17 that I love and respect to the table.

18 MS. BRYNE: But we did not include the radio patrols.
19 There was no seat at the table. These are the people who
20 patrolled the streets. That's very important in a city
21 where we are understaffed in a police department and
22 sometimes our police only go from run to run. So if you
23 run a problem out of downtown, it's going to go to the
24 neighborhoods and you need to have a contingency plan. If
25 you don't have those patrols at that table, you haven't

1 developed it. I want you to bring the message back to the
2 entire department. The patrols are not to be handled.
3 That's not police community relations. We're not to be
4 dragged out for a press conference and then never
5 listened to. So put it out there, share it and ingratiate
6 yourself to the wisdom of the people out here on the
7 street.

8 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you.

9 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Through the Chair.

10 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Yes. Commissioner Holt.

11 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Thank you. That same sentiment
12 was shared over in my area, which is Precinct Eight. In
13 our example, we don't know if Detroit 300 or New era is
14 patrolling our area. One of the citizen patrol people
15 made mention that, again, the Citizen Patrol people, and
16 you've given a historical validation as to why you should
17 have been included in the dialogue. Through the Chair.
18 Ms. Shah, is there some person who could come and speak
19 as to why the citizen patrol community was not involved
20 in that whole discussion of ShotStoppers?

21 MS. SHAH: I can reach out and get more information
22 on that Commissioner.

23 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Okay. I believe the gentleman
24 that presented through the Chair.

25 MS. SHAH: Last week.

1 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Right from the mayor's office
2 could help us get a dialogue going whereby citizen patrol
3 attitudes could be included in that whole discussion.
4 Thank you Chair.

5 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: You want a short answer?

6 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. No, I can't let you
7 do that. I can't let you do that. Mother Bernice, because
8 then everybody's going to do that, but thank you.

9 MR. BROWN: Mr. Chair, your last speaker will be
10 former Commissioner William Davis.

11 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. Okay.

12 COMMISSIONER: Can't help yourself.

13 MR. DAVIS: Hello? Can I be heard?

14 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Yes, we can hear you. Go right
15 ahead.

16 MR. DAVIS: Okay. First off, I have three things I
17 want to bring up. One the Springdale Police. I get many
18 reports about the Springdale Police stopping Detroiters
19 on the Detroit side writing tickets. That was going on a
20 number of years ago and we looked into it and it was
21 greatly reduced. Can someone there look into it and see
22 what could be done to help reduce the number of
23 Detroiters, especially Black Detroiters, getting tickets
24 in Detroit from the city of Springdale . Also next thing,
25 the Community Impact report. I think that's one of the

1 best things that this Board of Police Commissions have
2 done in the last 20 years. That's one of the few things
3 that you all get high marks on. So I hope you all won't
4 discontinue it. Also I'd like to bring up the fact that
5 it is like an epidemic in this city of people running red
6 lights.

7 MR. DAVIS: Some people, they'll go around cars that
8 stopped to run red lights. That's even doubly dangerous.
9 So I think that a special task force needs to be set up
10 on positive ways that we can reduce that because people
11 are steady dying and steady dying. Also, since I have a
12 little bit more time, there's another concern I have
13 dealing with marijuana. Some of you all know, some of us
14 have adopted different schools and we go up to different
15 schools. There's a major problem that a lot of people
16 don't talk about. There are young children coming to
17 school that reek of marijuana. Obviously, their parents
18 are smoking in the car, smoking near them, around them.
19 Perhaps you all could do, or someone can do some public
20 service announcements telling parents they may be legally
21 smoking marijuana, but it is illegal for them to be
22 smoking it close to and near their children. That is a
23 problem. Thank you.

24 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you.

25 MR. BROWN: Mr. Chair, that was your last speaker.

1 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. Again, we take
2 everyone's comments to heart and we'll do our best to
3 follow up on actionable items for those who had those to
4 offer. It is now 8:01 and it is my hope to allow this
5 meeting to be done at 8:30. So I'm going to ask for the
6 permission of my colleagues that we do that for the sake
7 of the public. But we have just a few more items on the
8 agenda. We are so looking forward to hearing from the
9 community relations leader from the Fourth Precinct. So,
10 Ms. Ramirez is now on you.

11 MS. RAMIREZ: Thank you.

12 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you.

13 MS. RAMIREZ: Former. We want to welcome our, again,
14 thank you so much, this honorable body, the Detroit Board
15 of Police Commissioner as well as our, through the Chair,
16 and our district commissioner, Commissioner Lisa Carter.
17 I just want to do a real quick introduction. I have my
18 vice president Marie Overall. Nicole Fisher is our
19 secretary. Our recording secretary is Norma Galvan. So I
20 just wanted to make sure you knew who they are. I know
21 you have our presentation in your packet and I just
22 wanted to briefly tell you who we are.

23 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Mr. Chairman.

24 MS. RAMIREZ: My name is Eminia. I'm sorry.

25 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: One second. Yes, commissioner

1 Bernard.

2 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Can you take a picture with
3 these ladies? This is important. I think it should be in
4 our newsletter.

5 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Yes, indeed. As soon as the
6 report is done, we'll do that.

7 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you Mr. Chair.

8 MS. RAMIREZ: Actually, my name is Eminia Ramirez,
9 known as Minia Ramirez. I am a lifelong resident of
10 Southwest Detroit. Born and raised. Went to public
11 school, went and got educated, came back and I still work
12 in Southwest Detroit.

13 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Board of Police Commission.

14 MS. RAMIREZ: And a former Board of Police
15 Commissioner. Yes, ma'am. I also wanted to say that I am
16 the victim applicant that is housed inside the Fourth
17 Precinct. So I'm the one that does personal protection
18 orders, liaison to the judicial process, as well as
19 connecting them to their detectives and for criminal
20 charges and any other community resource. So I am there.
21 I am bilingual and because of the error that we are
22 entrusted in we definitely need even more bilingual
23 individuals to assist our community. With that as a
24 Fourth Precinct Community relations president we work
25 really hand in hand in hand with our Commander Holderbaum

1 as well as our captain.

2 MS. RAMIREZ: I remember Commander Holderbaum came
3 and I remember telling her out of courtesy that I was
4 going to do a fundraiser for our backpack. She said, what
5 would you like for me to do? I said well, this is your
6 precinct. She goes, no, she corrected me real fast. She
7 said, no, this is our precinct. So with that, I said, oh
8 yeah, we're going to get along real good. So also we are
9 dealing with a lot residents. Solution has to do with
10 residents. We also have to work with the police
11 department and we work with quality of life issues. Just
12 to let you know, we have very good neighborhood police
13 officers. We have Officer Kellogg that wasn't mentioned.
14 Officer Taylor, Corporal Taylor, Alfonso Reiss is an
15 excellent NPO as well as LeBron and Police Officer
16 Rodriguez.

17 MS. RAMIREZ: So we acquired a few that we had to
18 make sure that we name because they do work diligently
19 and work and Officer Gutierrez. Yes. Gutierrez who is the
20 Sergeant. Gutierrez who oversees these MPOs. So he
21 cracks, I mean he cracks that whip. I'm telling you. So I
22 just wanted to mention that. We deal with quality life
23 issues. We deal with them with the MPOs because It's very
24 important for our MPOs to know who they serve. So they
25 are constantly out there. They not only deal with

1 physical, mental and spiritual, they're out there giving
2 out dumping tickets, abandoned cars, city issues,
3 neighborhood problems, which is constant. Project Green
4 Light issues. They ticketed those who mishandle our
5 parks. So they are out there. So in the community fourth
6 precinct, we have a good relationship and it doesn't
7 matter.

8 MS. RAMIREZ: We get into the agencies, the
9 businesses, educational status, their work environment.
10 We deal with whatever we have to do with the residents.
11 We do a joint decision making process. We do social
12 belonging so that we feel we belong here. No matter who
13 you are I don't care what shade of color you are, we are
14 going to work together. That's what our heart here at
15 Fourth Precinct Community Relation council does and
16 speaks it out there. We have advocated. We also have
17 advocated for the ShotsStoppers. We have testified in
18 city council. We are in agreement with this community
19 violence intervention tool. We believe in that. We also
20 advocated, and I came before the Board when it came to
21 the crisis intervention team that they were going to
22 remove just like that without telling us. We came before
23 you and did some letter writing and we did not want our
24 crisis intervention team to be removed.

25 MS. RAMIREZ: I said out loud, poor Theresa Blossoms,

1 I just read her ears. I said, what the hell, I'm sorry,
2 what the hell is going on? So we did secure our officers.
3 They are here with us, Fourth Precinct, Corporal Dean, as
4 well as a police Officer Houser, even though we do share
5 Ms. Davenport, our mental health social worker with
6 second and fourth. But it's okay. I mean, but they did
7 not remove them. So we were very proud and we thank the
8 Chief for that. You make sure Chief knows that.
9 Appreciate that. Everybody that helped us, we really
10 appreciate it. We also have advocated for our gym park, a
11 very Diamond Park who I sit on at a Riverside Advisory
12 Council since 2015. We have seen it move forward. We have
13 fought for our Riverside Park to continue and we won.

14 MS. RAMIREZ: Our park is going to continue to be
15 finished and we hope to. We are so proud of it and so
16 proud of it that they have asked me as a community leader
17 to join the City General Services. So we are going to be
18 presenting in Minneapolis, Minnesota. We're going to go
19 to the conference of Landscape Architecture and we're
20 going to present what we went to, especially as a
21 community, the pros and cons of it. The dislikes, the
22 negatives, and the positives. But we reached that end
23 product. So we are very proud. I'm very proud that we're
24 going to be able to present. Also, we want to let you
25 know that as Fourth Precinct community Relations, as a

1 victim advocate, we are constantly doing resource tables.
2 We are doing outreach throughout Southwest Detroit both
3 in English and in Spanish and dealing with quality life
4 issues.

5 MS. RAMIREZ: We work closely with our NPOs when we
6 do our outreach. So we have done the Family Fun Day. We
7 have gone out to National Night Out, Backpack event we
8 just had, Walk a Mile with our Chief White. We did Faith
9 and Blue and Blue Peace Walk. We're going to have another
10 one this week, no, in October. We also have done resource
11 tables at the Elton Park Community Fund Day. This Faith
12 and Blue Peace Walk was done in conjunction with the new
13 Mount Hermon Church. The Elton Park Community Fund Day,
14 we were here in present. Community day with the Kingdom
15 of Apostolic Church. I can't really say that word,
16 Apostolic Church. Also, I am part of the Hispanic Police
17 Association, which we have presented three scholarships
18 to the schools here in Fourth Precinct. That's just a
19 little bit. I just wanted to let you know what we're
20 doing and we're working diligently. If you could see who
21 we are, we are full-time employees. Ms. Nicole works for
22 who?.

23 UNNAMED SPEAKER: I'm the parent family community
24 engagement manager for Matrix Head Start. So I (Audio
25 distortion.)

1 MS. RAMIREZ: So we pass out our DV materials, our
2 Fourth Precinct community relations. You have in your
3 packet all the speakers that we have presented in our
4 community meetings and all the way back to the Covid,
5 there was a moment there where we were sending out
6 through emails, Covid, and we couldn't meet. We thank Ms.
7 Blossom for putting them in your packet just to see the
8 speakers that we had brought in to empower our residents,
9 to learn from it. It's more like community issues. Things
10 that they can deal with and get information from these
11 speakers. They're very good speakers. Very hard. We're
12 very hard. We don't like people that tell us no. We don't
13 know that word.

14 MS. RAMIREZ: So we will go all the way to the top if
15 I have to, but they usually will say yes or they will not
16 be back. We are all women too. We also provide
17 information on senior citizen services and returning
18 citizens. There's a lot of information that we write. I
19 want to say thank you. You have what we present. I have
20 this very good saying that Ms. Marie Overall said it to
21 me one time and I said, wow, I never thought about it.
22 She said, we not only serve and protect, we teach as
23 well. So thank you so much.

24 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. Thank you. Your
25 monthly meetings are every second Tuesday at 6:00 PM at

1 the Fourth Precinct building Atrium 4700 West Fort
2 Street. You need to be on this Board. All this talking
3 you're doing from the seat. Is there any questions or
4 feedback from our fellow commissioners? Yes, Commissioner
5 Bell.

6 COMMISSIONER BELL: I'd like to ask Madam President.
7 I think I heard you say PPO Personal protection order. I
8 understand what it is. I used to be a part of that
9 process and still, but that's been a hot issue in this
10 state.

11 MS. RAMIREZ: Right.

12 COMMISSIONER BELL: It is just a piece of paper. I
13 think we need to sort of look into that issue because we
14 had a high-profile deaths just recently. They wrote
15 extensive articles concerning that. We know. We issue
16 them out all the time. I need to hear your personal, not
17 perhaps not, but briefly.

18 MS. RAMIREZ: Okay.

19 COMMISSIONER BELL: But I think we need to look at it
20 in terms of the Board, in terms of PPO.

21 MS. RAMIREZ: I do go out and do outreach and explain
22 what a personal protection order. There is various kinds
23 of personal protection orders. There's non-domestic,
24 which means there's no relationship, no nothing. It's
25 more like neighbors or somebody stranger. Those are non-

1 domestic. Then you have a personal protection order.
2 Those are the ones you live with, have children with. So
3 there's those. Yes, it is a piece of paper. It's how you
4 use that piece of paper and how you explain it to them.
5 They come to my office. Now, I know you can do PPOs
6 online, but when they come to me, I provide information,
7 community resources, and I explain what a personal
8 protection order. Once they do get it, I make sure they
9 are served either by the sheriff's department or we have
10 agency that serves it. Then I teach them if they violate
11 this personal protection order, start logging what they
12 did, 1, 2, 3, come back and I can help you do show cost,
13 which means you go back to the judge.

14 COMMISSIONER BELL: One more.

15 MS. RAMIREZ: Go ahead.

16 COMMISSIONER BELL: I think I heard that sometime you
17 expect a person to serve that individual.

18 MS. RAMIREZ: I teach them how to serve it. I even
19 show them how.

20 COMMISSIONER BELL: That is an issue as you well know
21 perhaps. But we can have that discussion in the future.

22 Thank you.

23 MS. RAMIREZ: Okay.

24 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Through the Chair.

25 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Yes. Commissioner Carter.

1 COMMISSIONER CARTER: I just wanted to say thank you
2 to the Fourth Precinct Community Relations Council. They
3 do a phenomenal job. It's not a paid position, but
4 they're always there and they do phenomenal work. So just
5 thank you for all that you do.

6 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Indeed. Thank you. Thank you
7 for the amazing work you're doing in this community. I've
8 done several of these community meetings and it feels
9 like a family room in here. Like everybody just know each
10 other and love each other. So that's due to your great
11 work that you're doing. So keep it up. Any further
12 questions or comments?

13 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Through the Chair. I'd like to
14 also commend the community relations committee.
15 Commissioner Carter and I once attended a forum whereby
16 you spoke on human trafficking. So that was a phenomenal
17 discussion as well.

18 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Alright, thank you. With that,
19 we'll now move on to our secretary's report.

20 MS. SHAH: Thank you, Mr. Chair. Commissioners, your
21 incoming correspondence are outlined in your agenda. I'll
22 be referencing several documents in your packets. They
23 are all located behind tab number six. This includes the
24 first one that I'll mention, a retirement notification
25 from Lieutenant Stanley. Lieutenant Stanley did arrive to

1 the Board office and delivered this notice to the board
2 asking that it be disseminated to all of you. It does
3 contain recommendations around improving oversight of
4 DPD. As far as critical incident debrief updates. Of
5 course today Chair Pressley read the incident on I75 and
6 Vernor and upcoming we are waiting for the Chief's office
7 to advise when the Board will be debriefed on the use of
8 force resulting in serious injury that occurred on
9 September 1st at 6:50 PM. Also in your package you will
10 see an update on outstanding DPD requests dated for
11 today. Emails were sent to DPD requesting update to all
12 requests that are due or overdue.

13 MS. SHAH: Commissioners that requested those reports
14 and data were copied on those email requests. Also in
15 your packet, you will find a document titled DPD
16 litigation 09-14-2023. So lawsuits against DPD do appear
17 on city council agendas starting this current fiscal year
18 2023/2024, BOPC staff will start to collect this
19 information from the city council agendas and compile
20 them on a monthly basis for your awareness. As you can
21 see on the document in your packets, 15 of these cases
22 were on city council's agenda requesting legal
23 representation and indemnification. The other six were on
24 the agenda to consider settlement amounts. As staff
25 continues to build out this monitoring process, we'll be

1 able to provide the Board and the community with more
2 details. As far as staffing updates.

3 MS. SHAH: As you are aware, commissioners, Senior
4 investigator Elgin Murphy, continues to support
5 supervising investigator functions at OCI. That started
6 on the 12th of June. Per our HR consultant step code K
7 appointed positions such as supervising investigator do
8 not qualify for out-of-class pay with the city. So Chief
9 Investigator and I just want to acknowledge Senior
10 Investigator Murphy for supporting OCI in the absence of
11 one of the supervising investigators for this extended
12 time. The Board approved the conversion of office
13 assistant three to administrative assistant and salary
14 increase for Ms. Stephanie Phillips. That requisition was
15 submitted and that is a request to increase her salary
16 effect on August 17th.

17 MS. SHAH: It is at the last approval step with HR
18 recruiting. So we are waiting to hear back from them. As
19 far as open positions and staff administrative assistant
20 Jasmine Taylor, the Board salary offer was accepted. Her
21 background check is at the last step and her tentative
22 start date is the 25th of this month. There are three
23 open investigator positions. The requisition for
24 recruiting is at the last approval step in HR recruiting
25 and for the task BOPC analysts. That requisition is also

1 at the last approval step in HR recruiting. Updates
2 regarding contract services. So just want to provide the
3 Board for transparency and update regarding the Board's
4 transcription and court reporting contract. After several
5 meetings with procurement and procurements research,
6 there's now clarity around that contract and I'll just
7 give some points here.

8 MS. SHAH: Last professional services contract
9 between BOPC and Hansen's is number 6002571 and it ran
10 from December of 2019 to December, 2021. Hansen's has
11 continued to provide the transcription services beyond
12 2021, under four non-standard purchase orders. That's how
13 their services have continued to be paid. All Hansen's
14 invoices have been paid through the end of the 20 22 20
15 23 fiscal year. So far, invoices for services rendered
16 from July, 2023 to present are unpaid. Staff did submit a
17 requisition for a two year personal services contract for
18 those services to begin this current fiscal year.
19 Hansen's was the only bidder. However, the contract
20 cannot go to city council for approval until Hansen's
21 receives their clearances. Those were submitted to the
22 city in April. So procurement has escalated the clearance
23 request so the contract can move forward. In the
24 meantime, Hansen will continue to provide transcription
25 services that they're critical to the Board's meetings

1 and the invoices will be paid in batches via the non-
2 standard purchases process until the contract can be
3 signed.

4 MS. SHAH: The last updates I'll provide are around
5 committees. The following matters have been emailed to
6 the respective committee Chairs for consideration to
7 schedule meetings. Committee chairs, we ask that you
8 notify staff at least two full business days prior to
9 your desired meeting so that the staff can notify the
10 public in compliance with the OMA. For the Budget
11 Committee chaired by Commissioner Carter, there are two
12 items. The fiscal year 2023-2024 budget proposal that is
13 being drafted by executive manager Mr. Fries and is
14 planned to present to the Board by the 28th of this
15 month. Then also the comp and class analysis and staff
16 recommendations for amendments to the attorney and legal
17 assistant positions. Under the Personnel and Training
18 Committee. Chaired by commissioner and Vice-Chair Holley.
19 The class comp analysis and staff recommendations for
20 amendments to the attorney and legal assistant positions
21 also may fall under that committee for consideration as
22 it relates to personnel.

23 MS. SHAH: Then there are four applicant appeals that
24 are waiting to be reviewed. Then also consideration for
25 DPD's promotional request process and HR data and

1 information requests. For Citizen Complaints Committee
2 chaired by Commissioner Banks the Citizen complaints
3 appeal SOP draft staff is still working on that on behalf
4 of that committee. As well as complaints against
5 investigative units. There are drafts to the standard
6 operating procedures for that. Escalated CCRs and case
7 management system and CCR data collection are topics that
8 can be taken up by that committee. Almost done. The
9 Policy Committee is chaired by Commissioner Bernard. This
10 committee, I would say by far has the most work to do.
11 There are 11 DPD policies in queue for the Board's
12 approval. Then in addition to that, the staff is working
13 with DPD to take a look at an audit of the current
14 policies that are out there to see what else is due for
15 review.

16 MS. SHAH: Then also this committee has consideration
17 of updates to the BOPC bylaws and standard operating
18 procedures. The disciplinary DPD Administrative Request
19 Committee is chaired by Commissioner Burton and that
20 committee may consider the DPD administrative leave
21 without pay process and DPD disciplinary data and
22 information requests. Then finally, the Towing committee
23 Chaired by Commissioner Holt. There is a consideration to
24 take a look at a review of the hardship waiver data that
25 comes into the Board's office, as well as a review of DPD

1 towing yards. Thank you for your patience. That concludes
2 my report, Mr. Chair.

3 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. I ask does any
4 commissions have any questions of feedbacks to put that
5 in communication and email for the sake of time. Our
6 announcements. Secretary Shah.

7 MS. SHAH: Thank you, Mr. Chair. The Board's next
8 meeting is Thursday, September 21st at 3:00 PM at Detroit
9 Public Safety Headquarters. The next community meeting is
10 Thursday, October 12th at 6:30 PM. The Seventh Precinct
11 is hosting at St. John Presbyterian Church at 1961 East
12 Lafayette in Detroit.

13 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. Is there any new
14 business hearing? Hearing none.

15 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Mr. Chairman.

16 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Yes, Commissioner Bernard.

17 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I just want to say thank you
18 to the Board and also to the community. As you may have
19 noticed, I've been absent for about three or four weeks.
20 My aunt, who was actually my mother was critically ill.
21 She passed away last week. I've been in Chicago most of
22 that time. I came today before the Board meeting and
23 tomorrow, actually tomorrow morning I fly back to
24 Chicago. The funeral will be on Monday. I want to thank
25 everyone for doing what they do. All my colleagues

1 actually for doing my job and their job. Just tell you, I
2 appreciate you all. God bless you all.

3 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: God bless you.

4 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Everyone in this room.

5 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Our condolences and heartfelt
6 prayers to you and your family in this most difficult
7 time. That's right. Any new business? Hearing no new
8 business. We now have unfinished business that is held
9 over from last week's meeting. There were two motions to
10 postpone closed sessions. So the question before the
11 Board is a motion to adopt the Chief's recommendation
12 that Officer Rakan Hamawi should be placed on
13 administrative leave without pay, but with medical
14 benefits. Is the Board ready for the question?

15 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: You had the discussion
16 already, Mr. Chairman.

17 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: This was again, a holdover
18 from last week. There was a desire for postponement. But
19 I think that the interest of the Board is to postpone
20 this again until next week's meeting.

21 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Mr. Chair, I got the motion.

22 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Okay. Commissioner Banks.

23 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Alright, I move to postpone this
24 motion to next week's meeting.

25 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Is there a second?

1 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Second.

2 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Properly moved and second. Are
3 we ready for the question? All those in favor, please
4 signify by saying aye.

5 COMMISSIONER: Aye.

6 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: All those who opposed. That
7 motion passed to postpone this matter until next week's
8 meeting. Then again during last week's meeting, there was
9 a motion to go into closed session to consider the
10 Chief's recommendation regarding officer Javier Smith
11 which failed. The closed session is now under unfinished
12 business today. But the question before the Board again
13 is to adopt the Chief's recommendation that Officer
14 Javier Smith be placed on administrative leave without
15 pay but with medical benefits. Are you ready for the
16 question?

17 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Yes.

18 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: The Chair recognizes
19 Commissioner Banks.

20 COMMISSIONER BANKS: I move to postpone this motion
21 to next week's meeting.

22 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Is there a second?

23 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Second.

24 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Properly moved and second. All
25 those in favor, please signify by saying aye.

1 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

2 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: All those who oppose. That
3 motion passes to have that closed session postponed to
4 next week's meeting. With that, we are now moving on to
5 adjournment. The Chair entertains a motion for
6 adjournment.

7 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: So move.

8 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Is there a second?

9 COMMISSIONER: Second.

10 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: All those in favor please by
11 saying aye.

12 COMMISSIONER: Aye.

13 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: All those opposed? Meeting is
14 adjourned. Let's take this picture.

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
