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- 3 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Good afternoon. It is now 3:00
- 4 PM and we'll call the September 21st, 2020 Board of
- 5 Police Commissioner's meeting to order. As you can see,
- 6 we don't quite have a quorum yet, but we do have what's
- 7 necessary to begin our meeting with invocation. So we are
- 8 excited to be able to invite Chaplain Troy Dansler, who
- 9 will provide our invitation for today's meeting.
- 10 CHAPLAIN DANSLER: All hearts and minds clear. Father
- 11 God, we're taking the time right now understanding Father
- 12 God, your word records Father God, that to whom much is
- 13 given much is required. We're praying for a spirit of
- 14 excellence this evening. Father God, we're asking that
- 15 you usher your presence in this place, Father God. We
- 16 know that you are omnipresent. So Father God, we're
- 17 praying for the vision, not division, Father God. Praying
- 18 for a spirit of excellence, Father God. We're praying
- 19 that anyone that comes up here with any weapon that's to
- 20 prosper, Father God does not prosper. It is in the name
- 21 that is above all names, Father God, that we pray for the
- 22 spirit of excellence in the name of Jesus we pray and
- 23 come together and say Amen.
- 24 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Amen. So again, noting that
- 25 there isn't a quorum, we'll move forward with our amended



- 1 agenda, which allows us to, let's go backwards. Let's
- 2 start with our announcements and then our secretary
- 3 report.
- 4 MS. SHAH: Thank you, Mr. Chair. For our
- 5 announcements today, our next meeting will be Thursday,
- 6 September 28th at 3:00 PM at Detroit Public Safety
- 7 Headquarters and the BOPC next community meeting is
- 8 Thursday, October 12th at 6:30 PM The Seventh Precinct
- 9 will be hosting at St. John Presbyterian Church at 1961
- 10 East Lafayette in Detroit.
- 11 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you for that. I note
- 12 that in your secretary's report, there may be some items
- 13 that require votes. So noting that we don't have a quorum
- 14 we cannot handle those items as of yet. But if there are
- 15 any other reports that you might be able to provide you
- 16 can do so now.
- MS. SHAH: Mr. Chair, I can certainly provide the
- 18 secretary report as well as the community impact report
- 19 if you would like, and then hold the items that are for
- 20 decision for when we have a quorum.
- 21 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: You may proceed.
- MS. SHAH: Thank you. So for the secretary report
- 23 today incoming correspondence are outlined in the agenda.
- 24 Just want to provide an update in regard to performance
- 25 management. The City of Detroit talent development and



- 1 performance management does facilitate a performance
- 2 evaluation cycle that runs from July 1st through June
- 3 30th of each year. As an update to BOPC administrative
- 4 staff as well as OCI, the performance evaluations for
- 5 fiscal year 2022 to 2023 have been completed for all
- 6 eligible staff members and individual goals for the
- 7 current fiscal year 2023 to 2024 have been drafted to
- 8 align with the Board's adopted goals, services, and
- 9 metrics workbook, which the Board adopted on the 17th of
- 10 August. Once finalized, those individual goals will be
- 11 loaded onto the system and monitored throughout the
- 12 fiscal year. Each staff member will receive regular
- 13 feedback on progress toward their goals throughout the
- 14 fiscal year and will receive a mid-year review between
- 15 January and February of 2024.
- MS. SHAH: In regard to critical incident debriefs.
- 17 The use of force resulting in serious injury that
- 18 occurred on the 1st of September at 6:50 PM the BOPC
- 19 office has not heard from the Chief's office as of yet,
- 20 advising when a critical incident debrief will be
- 21 provided to the Board. So when we are provided that date,
- 22 then the staff will let the Board know. For
- 23 administrative leave without pay consideration. There are
- 24 two scheduled for today on the agenda. In addition, the
- 25 department did submit a new administrative leave without



- 1 pay request and commissioners, you have received some of
- 2 those documents by email this week. Once all of the
- 3 documentation is received, you'll receive a full packet
- 4 for review. Also showing in your packets, it's an updated
- 5 document, the outstanding DPD request for today, and you
- 6 can reference that at your pleasure.
- 7 MS. SHAH: For contracted services procurement has
- 8 renewed the purchase agreement for parliamentarian
- 9 services for Dr. Jackson. The purchase agreement was
- 10 shared with the commissioners by email this week as well.
- 11 For citizen complaints, there was one transfer complaint
- 12 to communication operations. That case did close on
- 13 September 11th, and the allegations were demeanor and
- 14 service. In regard to staffing updates. I'll just give a
- 15 few of the ones that don't require decision today. Ms.
- 16 Stephanie Phillips the position change and salary
- 17 increase that was approved by the Board on the 17th of
- 18 August. That appointment letter with an effective date of
- 19 August 17th was written by HR recruiting and signed by
- 20 the Chairperson on September 19th. HR confirmed that Ms.
- 21 Phillips has received her letter. So that item is
- 22 complete.
- MS. SHAH: In regard to open positions, Ms. Jasmine
- 24 Taylor will be starting as a new administrative assistant
- 25 on Monday, September 25th. In addition, glad to report



- 1 that there is a posting up now. It went up today for
- 2 three investigators for OCI. So if you know someone who
- 3 has investigative skills and is committed to transparency
- 4 and oversight, please have them apply. In addition, the
- 5 task BOPC analyst position also went up and is posted as
- 6 of today. So if you know someone with analytical project
- 7 management and lean process improvement skills, please
- 8 also have them apply at the city website. Mr. Chair, that
- 9 concludes any reports that I have that do not require a
- 10 decision from the Board.
- 11 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you so very much. Let me
- 12 take this time again to encourage the public that you do
- 13 have an opportunity to make public comment. For those who
- 14 are in person you can fill out your public comment card
- 15 and give them to Mr. Brown. For those who are online, you
- 16 can identify yourself for public comment at that time.
- 17 So, noting that we have expended the majority of what we
- 18 can do in our amended agenda, guess we'll begin with
- 19 public comment, continue rather with public comment.
- MR. BROWN: Good afternoon, Mrs. Chair. Currently, we
- 21 have five speakers and they're all in attendance and I'll
- 22 call those first. Minster Eric Blount, followed by Ms.
- 23 Fredia Butler, followed by Ms. Bernice Smith.
- 24 MINISTER BLOUNT: Good afternoon, Board.
- 25 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Good afternoon.



- 1 MINISTER BLOUNT: I'm Minister. Eric Blount from
- 2 Sacred Heart Catholic Church here in Detroit. A surprise,
- 3 surprise, but no surprise this week, a young Black man
- 4 locked his keys in his car and the police showed up and
- 5 you can imagine what happened. They got pretty rough. I
- 6 believe I've been informed that he's still in the
- 7 hospital. But he locked his keys in the car, so the
- 8 police came. Everyone knew what to do. Put out your cell
- 9 phones because we could not trust the police to tell the
- 10 truth. So he was roughed up. Everybody got it on various
- 11 videos. So we're dealing with another situation, again,
- 12 of excessive force in the opinion of so many. Now, the
- 13 investigation is not complete. You can't release the
- 14 videos right now, but the public has released the video
- 15 so we can see what happened. But are you really
- 16 surprised? In my lengthy interview with Ross Jones of
- 17 Channel seven, I committed myself never to give up this
- 18 fight.
- 19 MINISTER BLOUNT: Because as you sit here and play
- 20 these games and laugh and joke and talk about missing
- 21 persons and lost dogs, I don't know what else you're
- 22 going to come up with to divert our attention away from
- 23 things. This Board is a danger to the citizens and
- 24 especially the Black men of Detroit, because they are the
- 25 most prevalent victims of police brutality. So every time



- 1 you sway, every time you get up some shiny object about
- 2 what else we should be paying attention to, young Black
- 3 men in this city are at risk. Thank you.
- 4 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you.
- 5 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Mr. Chair.
- 6 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Yes.
- 7 COMMISSIONER BANKS: We got a quorum now.
- 8 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: I do recognize that as soon as
- 9 Vice-Chair takes a seat. No rush to you. Thank you.
- 10 Noting that we do have a quorum at this moment, we'll
- 11 suspend public comment to when it arrives on our agenda.
- 12 So at this time, we'll have the introduction of
- 13 Commissioners by Secretary Shah.
- MS. SHAH: Thank you, Mr. Chair.
- 15 MS. SHAH: Chair QuanTez Pressley Here.
- 16 MS. SHAH: Vice-Chair Jim Holley Here.
- 17 MS. SHAH: Commissioner Linda Bernard Attorney
- 18 Linda Bernard, District 2 present.
- 19 MS. SHAH: Commissioner Cedric Banks Cedric -
- 20 Present.
- 21 MS. SHAH: Commissioner Willie Bell Present,
- 22 District 4.
- 23 MS. SHAH: Commissioner Willie Burton -
- MS. SHAH: Commissioner Lisa Carter -
- MS. SHAH: Commissioner Ricardo Moore submitted an



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- excused absence.
- MS. SHAH: Commissioner Annie Holt Here At-Large, 2.
- 3 and I will be leaving at four o'clock.
- MS. SHAH: Commissioner Jesus Hernandez -4
- 5 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. There is a quorum.
- 6 With that, we'll now move on to the approval of the
- September 21st, 2023 agenda. 7
- 8 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: So moved.
- 9 COMMISSIONER: Support.
- 10 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: It's been properly moved and
- second. Is there any objection? 11
- 12 COMMISSIONER BELL: Mr. Chairman.
- 13 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Commissioner Bell.
- 14 COMMISSIONER BELL: In reference to Chief White for
- 15 his representative, the designation of 10 minutes as you
- 16 well know, I have addressed that to you personally and
- 17 the Chief addressed that I think that's inappropriate
- that we will not restrict the Chief in terms of reporting 18
- out. It's a long tradition of this Board that the Chief 19
- by charter has the right to speak. But we do not restrict 20
- 21 him or his representative to speak. So I would ask
- 22 respectfully to move the 10 minutes designation.
- 23 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: Mr. Chairman.
- 2.4 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Yes.
- PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: The 25



- 1 commissioner can move to amend the agenda by striking out
- 2 the time limit.
- 3 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Okay.
- 4 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: If the time
- 5 limit is not removed, then when you adopt the agenda, you
- 6 are in fact adopting a 10-minute limit on the Chief. So
- 7 the commissioner could move to amend the agenda by
- 8 striking out 10 minutes.
- 9 COMMISSIONER BELL: So move Mr. Chairman.
- 10 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Second.
- 11 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Properly moved and second. Is
- 12 there any discussion? Let me say this is a way of
- 13 discussion. During my entire tenure being on this board,
- 14 and it hasn't been as long as you, there have been these
- 15 time allotments that have been placed next to
- 16 presentations. But as you are well aware, there has not
- 17 been one time in this meeting where we have limited the
- 18 Chief's remarks. This, again, has been a reference point
- 19 so that we can be efficient in moving forward. But never
- 20 has been a limitation to stop the Chief or his
- 21 representative for making any necessary remarks. So I
- 22 want that to be noted.
- 23 COMMISSIONER BELL: Mr. Chairman. All due respect.
- 24 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Yes.
- 25 COMMISSIONER BELL: I recall when the Deputy Chief



- 1 was speaking and he was restricted for speaking, and he
- 2 moved on to the precinct speaking. So that is something
- 3 that I brought that to your attention. That was
- 4 inappropriate. So I just want to clarify, this has been
- 5 an issue since we've been here. At least I observed not
- 6 too long ago, probably five or six, at a community
- 7 meeting.
- 8 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: That's noted because again, at
- 9 our community meetings, because we received presentations
- 10 from the Chief police as well as the precincts, there was
- 11 a request that those presentations happen at the same
- 12 time. There was a misunderstanding from the Chief's
- 13 representative at that time, and they chose to then allow
- 14 the precincts to report. But if, you know, in last week's
- 15 meeting, the Assistant Chief presented and the precinct
- 16 presented and there was no limitation on either. So
- 17 again, I just want to state.
- 18 COMMISSIONER BELL: That is appropriate.
- 19 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: As a standard, that is how we
- 20 have operated. I just wanted to make sure that was clear.
- 21 I think discussion has been commenced. So now we've moved
- 22 to the vote. All those in favor of striking the 10
- 23 minutes from the Chief's police report please signify by
- 24 saying aye.
- 25 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.



- 1 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: All those who opposed? That
- 2 motion passes. Now we move to begin the approval of the
- 3 agenda.
- 4 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: As amended.
- 5 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: As amended. We now move on to
- 6 the approval of agenda as amended. All those in favor
- 7 please signify by saying aye.
- 8 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
- 9 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: All those opposed. Right, that
- 10 passes. Next, we'll move on to the approval of minutes
- 11 for the September 14th, 2023 meeting.
- 12 COMMISSIONER HOLT: So move.
- 13 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Is there a second?
- 14 COMMISSIONER: Support.
- 15 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Properly moved and second. Is
- 16 there any objection? Hearing no objection, those minutes
- 17 have been approved. I'll move on to the introduction of
- 18 BOPC staff, Chief of Police elected official
- 19 representatives and Community leaders. Secretary Shah.
- MS. SHAH: Thank you, Mr. Chair. For BOPC staff, we
- 21 have present today Chief Investigator Jerome Warfield,
- 22 Parliamentarian Dr. Francis Jackson, Mr. Jonya Underwood,
- 23 Mr. Robert Brown, Mr. Drew Fries. We also have present
- 24 from OCI supervising Investigator LiSonya Sloan,
- 25 Supervising Investigator Ainsley Cromwell and



- 1 Investigator Henry Ellis. For our American Sign Language
- 2 Interpreters today we have Ms. Yakata and Dr. Stephanie
- 3 Beatty. We are present today also DPD HR Director Katrina
- 4 Patillo. Don Handyside is our court reporter. Cy is
- 5 providing video and Sergeant Alan Quinn is providing
- 6 audio. Sitting in for the Chief today, we have Deputy
- 7 Chief Mark Bliss. For elected officials and
- 8 representatives, Ms. Marie Overall from, I'm sorry, State
- 9 Representative Tyrone Carter's office, Ms. LaDon Davis
- 10 from City Council member Fred Durhal III's office, and
- 11 former Commissioner William Davis. Also present is Ms.
- 12 Fredia Butler from the Community Relations President
- 13 Second Precinct and Mr. Ron Thomas, VP of DPOA.
- 14 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. Again, we are
- 15 appreciative of everyone's attendance at today's meeting
- 16 hoping that it will be a productive one. With that, we'll
- 17 now move on to the BOPC officer's report. I don't think
- 18 that I have anything particular to suggest otherwise that
- 19 there are a couple of items that are moving forward. We
- 20 have had some conversation around securing the Board's
- 21 attorney and there have been some encouraging
- 22 conversations that have been had around that. Looking
- 23 forward to bringing that to the Board in the near future.
- 24 Then also, I know that there have been some serious
- 25 conversations around the appropriateness of the community



- 1 impact report. I just want you all to know that that is
- 2 under deliberation to ensure that what our goals are
- 3 through that community impact report is actually met. We
- 4 are in conversations to set the necessary boundaries for
- 5 that. Is there anything else from any officers regarding
- 6 our BOPC officer's report? Hearing none, we'll now move
- 7 on to our community impact report.
- 8 MS. SHAH: Thank you, Mr. Chair. The presentation
- 9 will be coming up shortly and is also located in your
- 10 packets behind tab number five. Please let the record
- 11 reflect that Commissioner Burton has joined us.
- 12 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Thank you, Mr. Chairman,
- MS. SHAH: Chief Investigator and I will be providing
- 14 today some insights into the OCI inventory and the
- 15 staffing needs to catch up the current inventory. Move on
- 16 to slide two.
- 17 MR. WARFIELD: So the current inventory in the Office
- 18 of Chief Investigator right now is 970.
- 19 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Chairman, but the video isn't
- 20 showing it and the community needs to see what it is
- 21 we're looking at, please.
- 22 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Duly noted. We're working on
- 23 that, but for the sake of time, you may continue.
- MR. WARFIELD: Sure.
- 25 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: There we go.



- 1 MR. WARFIELD: We're in slide two. The total
- 2 inventory of open cases at the Office of the Chief
- 3 Investigator as of 9-15-2023 is 947 cases. Of those 947
- 4 cases, 501 of those cases are designated as backlog
- 5 cases. 99 of those cases are between 61 and 90 days. 168
- 6 cases are between 31 and 60 days, and then 179 cases are
- 7 from zero to 30 days.
- 8 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: One more. One second here,
- 9 Chief investigator. I think we're on slide two here,
- 10 whoever is handling the PowerPoint presentation.
- MS. SHAH: We can just click two more times. We'll
- 12 have all of the information up on the slides.
- 13 COMMISSIONER HOLT: The report is behind o5. Okay.
- 14 Thank you.
- 15 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Sorry. Who's running the
- 16 PowerPoint?
- 17 MS. SHAH: Just one moment, Mr. Chair.
- 18 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. There we go. Thank
- 19 you. You may continue.
- MS. SHAH: Go back one, please.
- 21 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Can you repeat yourself Chief
- 22 Investigator now that that slide is up?
- MR. WARFIELD: Absolutely.
- 24 MS. SHAH: Go back one more slide and we'll be there.
- 25 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Which section?



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- 1 MS. SHAH: There we go.
- 2. COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Madam Secretary five. Did you
- 3 say five?
- 4 MS. SHAH: Section five in your...
- 5 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: That's what I thought. In our
- 6 binder.
- 7 MS. SHAH: Your binders, correct.
- MR. WARFIELD: We're all on the same page. 8
- CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Yes. I believe we're all on 9
- 10 the same page now we can continue.
- 11 MR. WARFIELD: Thank you, sir. Again, we have 947
- 12 open cases in the Office of the Chief Investigator as of
- 13 September the 15th. Of those 947 cases, 501 of those
- 14 cases are labeled as backlog cases. Those cases that are
- 15 90 plus days old. 61 to 90 cases, there are 99 cases and
- 16 cases that are 31 to 60 days old are 168 cases. Then we
- 17 have 179 cases that are zero to 30 days old. As you look
- at the slide, in the cases that are considered backlog, 18
- 19 24 cases have anniversary dates between October and
- 20 December of this year, the one-year anniversary date.
- 21 What we're trying to do, and we're attempting to do, is
- 22 to close out as many as these cases as we can so that the
- 23 department, if there is a sustainable allegation, can
- still meter out discipline. Because if it goes over a 24
- 25 year, then we lose the department's ability to meter out



- 1 discipline. One of those cases are in the 99 column that
- 2 represents cases that are 60 to 90 days old.
- 3 MS. SHAH: Next slide please. So on this slide, what
- 4 we are showing is a few things. So first of all, year
- 5 over year, OCI usually is not closing as many cases as
- 6 are coming in. This is definitely a recipe for developing
- 7 a backlog as we have. There are a few years where you see
- 8 closures met or surpassed the receipts. So in 2014, 2015,
- 9 2016, 2019, and then 2022 was an anomaly that's being
- 10 looked into as well. So that's what's showing on the blue
- 11 and orange bars. But then you can also see that
- 12 investigators are closing cases at just about the same
- 13 rate as they always have been about one case per week
- 14 except for 2022. Then lastly you can also see that
- 15 incoming cases that's in the blue bars are increasing
- 16 over time, but our staffing levels are actually
- 17 decreasing over time, and that's showing in the gray bar.
- 18 Next slide please.
- MS. SHAH: Now, this is the same type of data, but
- 20 it's showing month over month for 2023. Again, OCI is
- 21 receiving more cases than it's closing. A month over
- 22 month here, and investigators are closing at about one
- 23 case per week which is pretty typical. I will note here
- 24 that in July and August you see a slight uptick where
- 25 investigators are closing 1.2 cases per week on average.



- 1 That's a result of increased accountability that Chief
- 2 Investigator has been putting in place. So I think the
- 3 big takeaway here is that OCI is not right staffed. So
- 4 let's talk about what right staff looks like for OCI.
- 5 Next slide, please.
- 6 MS. SHAH: So for the volume of cases that are coming
- 7 in every month, about 135 on average, and considering
- 8 that the existing inventory is just around nine 50, and
- 9 if we assume that we want to get that closed, the
- 10 existing inventory closed within a six month period also
- 11 assuming that Chief Investigator will put processes in
- 12 place and accountability in place to have investigators
- 13 close two cases per week on average, we're still looking
- 14 at needing about 35 investigators. That includes the
- 15 seniors on staff in order to accomplish this. In addition
- 16 to that, you have more staff, you need more supervisor
- 17 support and administrative support. So that will require
- 18 six supervising investigators and four admins total.
- 19 That's for a target of closing 295 cases per month,
- 20 again, handling what's coming in as well as taking care
- 21 of the backlog. We can go to the next slide.
- 22 MR. WARFIELD: I want to talk about a total number of
- 23 cases that we know are in our shop and cases that we have
- 24 run across. Several weeks ago, we informed you that there
- 25 were some cases that we found in the system in the



- 1 database that was marked as closed. However, they were
- 2 never brought to the Board. You all never signed off on
- 3 them and the final decisions and the full investigation
- 4 had not been completed. But in the system, they were
- 5 marked as closed. Out of those 256 cases, about 159 of
- 6 those cases were dated back to 2021, and another 100
- 7 cases were dated back to 2022. There was only one case
- 8 for 2023. Those 256 cases, if they're added to our
- 9 backlog, would bring our totals to 1,203 total cases. If
- 10 they are to be reopened to be investigated, that would
- 11 take us to a total of 757 backlog cases. The rest of the
- 12 numbers remain the same. But that's if those cases are
- 13 reopened. Again, we discovered that a few months ago and
- 14 we brought that information to the Board at that
- 15 particular point in time.
- 16 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Mr. Chairman, who signed off
- 17 on those cases being closed?
- 18 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Do we have a response to that?
- MS. SHAH: So no commissioner signed those cases.
- 20 Those cases are closed in the system. Commissioners, you
- 21 actually received the spreadsheet a couple days ago that
- 22 list what investigator was assigned to each of those
- 23 cases, if you'd like to reference those. So we do know.
- 24 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I would like to know that.
- 25 Think all the Board would.



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- 1 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair.
- CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Commissioner Burton. 2.
- 3 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Thank you. I'd like to ask the
- question on the behalf of many Detroiters. They want to 4
- 5 know exactly how many cases were confiscated by another
- 6 agency.
- 7 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: I'm going to ask that you hold
- that question, and we hold our questions to the 8
- presentation end, and then we'll answer that.
- 10 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Thank you, Mr. Chair.
- 11 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you.
- 12 MR. WARFIELD: Thank you, Mr. Chair. To continue next
- 13 slide please.
- 14 MS. SHAH: On this last slide, I just want to make it
- 15 clear that Chief Investigator and myself, we are looking
- 16 for a decision at some point from the Board if these
- 17 cases should be reopened and investigated per the
- 18 charter.
- 19 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Through, the Chair.
- 20 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Commissioner Holt.
- 21 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Thank you. You gave some
- 22 information saying something you have access to.
- 23 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: It was a spreadsheet that was
- provided for us through email about a week ago. 24
- 25 MS. SHAH: Actually yesterday.



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- 1 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Yesterday.
- 2 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Alright, thank you for that.
- 3 MS. SHAH: The spreadsheet has a list of all those
- 4 cases, the 256 cases that are under consideration to
- 5 reopen, and it indicates which investigator was assigned
- 6 to those cases. Moving on to this next slide here, the
- 7 staffing requirements. Let's go back one please. So if
- 8 the Board provides direction to reopen those cases, as
- 9 Chief Investigator indicated, the inventory is going to
- 10 go up. So we've done a recalculation of what that means
- 11 for staffing, then if we need to work those cases as
- 12 well. So that would mean existing inventory would be
- 13 somewhere around 1200. Looking to close those still
- 14 within six months and still handling the regular incoming
- 15 volume. We're looking at needing 40 investigators,
- 16 including seniors total for that time period. That would
- 17 require seven, invest seven supervising investigators to
- 18 provide the supervisory support and still for admins,
- 19 admins to support. That'll be closing 335 cases per
- 20 month. Next slide.
- 21 MR. WARFIELD: We want to talk about now is our short
- 22 plan goal and our short plan how are we going to attack
- 23 this. So one of the things we are going to do is
- 24 implement a quick fix. So we are asking our investigators
- 25 to look for those cases that we can close somewhat



- 1 immediately, and they're within our SOP. There are
- 2 opportunities for us to do that. Once we've done a
- 3 preliminary investigation, once we've talked to the
- 4 complainant, and once we have looked at the video and all
- 5 the requirements. There are times when our investigators
- 6 will look at the video and understand that the actions
- 7 that are alleged did not occur at all. Those cases are
- 8 what I would consider low hanging fruit for us. So we
- 9 will look to be able to do that. Also, effective August
- 10 the 21st we gave the commitment that we're asking each
- 11 investigator to close two cases a week.
- MR. WARFIELD: We've sent that information before,
- 13 but it's in our presentation as part of our action plan.
- 14 We're also looking at performance improvement plans that
- 15 will be starting fairly quickly for those investigators
- 16 who are having some issues closing two cases a week so
- 17 that we can give them the support that they need to get
- 18 up to that two case per week number. Again, when you look
- 19 at the trend early on in the presentation, pretty much
- 20 from 2012, I believe on the number has been one case a
- 21 week, but we're trying to push that to two cases a week.
- 22 We also want to maximize our budgeted staffing. Again, as
- 23 was announced earlier, we have three investigator
- 24 positions that need to be filled. That posting went up
- 25 today. We also would like to have expedited backfields



- 1 for those investigators who are going to be retiring, or
- 2 for those investigators who are moving on to different
- 3 positions.
- 4 MR. WARFIELD: We will like an expedited process
- 5 versus the one that we've been dealing with. As it
- 6 relates to our budget amendment. When the secretary and
- 7 the Board will talk to city council, it includes the
- 8 staffing of task investigators to help with the backlog
- 9 to help get those numbers down as well as task
- 10 administrative assistance, interim senior investigators
- 11 and interim supervising investigators will be required to
- 12 help catch up the inventory by mid-2024. In addition, it
- 13 would include a cost of a new case management system, and
- 14 we've looked at a couple of management systems and we are
- 15 hopeful to be able to bring you a proposal shortly on a
- 16 case management system that we believe will be efficient
- 17 for our office. Finally, for a short-term plan, we want
- 18 to maximize our public value. What we mean by that, we
- 19 want to prioritize investigations, as I said earlier,
- 20 that are nearing that one-year mark because that's a
- 21 critical mark for us to make sure that anything that is
- 22 sustained as it relates to allegations will certainly
- 23 meet disciplinaries definition to have discipline metered
- 24 for those officers.
- MR. WARFIELD: DPD can also take action on all



- 1 sustained allegations even over a year by informal
- 2 counseling. So we're still able to get some counseling
- 3 done for those cases that are aging over a year. So we
- 4 don't want to take our eye off that ball as well. Next
- 5 slide, please. As it relates to our long-term action plan
- 6 we want to focus on process efficiency. This is some of
- 7 the things that we've already started. Continuous
- 8 improvement, our Six Sigma Green Belt project to improve
- 9 efficiencies and quality of investigative process. We'll
- 10 talk a little bit about that a little bit later, but one
- 11 of the things that we're doing is to make sure that when
- 12 you get your cases, that what's in your case are the
- 13 facts that you need to make sure that you can make the
- 14 decisions based on what's there.
- 15 MR. WARFIELD: We have some processes already set up
- 16 in office to ensure that. We also have again, a case
- 17 management system that we plan on implementing as well as
- 18 established production rates and a quality program as it
- 19 relates to our 2024/2025 budget. We will be submitting an
- 20 amended 2024/25 budget to reflect staffing needs based on
- 21 the process and the volume that is forecast.
- 22 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you so very much for
- 23 that. So there was a question lifted by Commissioner
- 24 Burton relative to the amount of cases that were
- 25 confiscated for investigation. Do we know that number?



- 1 MR. WARFIELD: I don't have an exact number, no.
- 2 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Do we have an estimate?
- 3 MR. WARFIELD: It's estimated about 700.
- 4 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Is that sufficient?
- 5 COMMISSIONER BURTON: No, that's really high and I
- 6 think that's something that we really need to continue to
- 7 address as a Board. I'm just so excited that we have the
- 8 new Chief Investigator on board with a solid, thorough
- 9 plan, how to move OCI further ahead so we can get these
- 10 cases down. But I'm all set right now at this time. Mr.
- 11 Chairman.
- 12 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Commissioner Bell.
- 13 COMMISSIONER BELL: I support commissioner in
- 14 reference to this issue here. I don't know why we don't
- 15 know the numbers of that. But I heard 300 at one time and
- 16 now you're talking 700. But we need to aggressively
- 17 pursue that with IG in reference to these cases because
- 18 they are sitting there doing nothing and I don't know the
- 19 in-depth investigation, but we should. We haven't sent no
- 20 notice, no concern to them about addressing this issue.
- 21 We should normally.
- 22 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Yeah, we have. But to the
- 23 point, and maybe they can provide some clarity. It's my
- 24 understanding that the cases that have been confiscated
- 25 were technically closed. They're closed cases, and the



- 1 only impact that they might have on backlog is if through
- 2 investigation they suggest that the process of closure
- 3 was insufficient and it may be opened again, but all of
- 4 the cases that were under investigation are technically
- 5 closed.
- 6 COMMISSIONER BELL: Well, just some clarity. Thanks
- 7 for that. 40% of the cases that we deal with is demeanor
- 8 and we have demeanor on video tape. It should not take a
- 9 long investigation to investigate demeanor. It's on tape.
- 10 So we need to aggressively look at that in terms of how
- 11 we want to approach those issues of that kind.
- 12 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Was that in the estimation
- 13 around the percentage of demeanor or was that debate.
- 14 COMMISSIONER BELL: 40% of our caseload. My
- 15 understanding's been that way for guite some time.
- MR. WARFIELD: It's one of the higher numbers.
- 17 Demeanor and procedure lead the allegations that come
- 18 into our office. Without question, I don't have the exact
- 19 percentage in front of me right now.
- 20 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: That would be helpful data
- 21 points for the next time we have this presentation. Any
- 22 further questions from our commissioners?
- 23 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Yes.
- 24 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Commissioner Bernard.
- 25 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Chairman, briefly. You said



- 1 that there were 256 closed cases, which are under
- 2 reconsideration to reopen because one, the investigation
- 3 was not completed. Two, there were no findings or
- 4 determinations, and three, there were no commissioner
- 5 signatures on it. So that just means somebody just
- 6 thought bum rush the files to just put a close on it even
- 7 though there had been no work done.
- 8 MR. WARFIELD: Ma'am, what we discovered that was
- 9 working late one night in OCI and I ran across one case
- 10 and I ended up doing a cross-reference on it. As I did
- 11 the cross-reference on it, that is what stuck out to me.
- 12 That one case that I found was closed in the system,
- 13 although I saw on the paper that it was not completed. So
- 14 I contacted Madam Secretary, Madam Secretary did a full
- 15 query, and we saw at that time, 711 cases. However, a
- 16 number of those cases were duplicates. So we worked
- 17 through each line item to bear it down to that 256. So I
- 18 cannot chronicle or describe how that number got to be.
- 19 I'm sorry, how those cases got to be closed, but that is
- 20 what we found as we were doing our internal checks.
- 21 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I just want to say, I
- 22 appreciate your efforts and those of the Board Secretary
- 23 as well in this matter and your initiative when you spoke
- 24 about us getting a new case management system. We've
- 25 obviously had people in both of your positions for some



- 1 time. None of this has ever been disclosed or even
- 2 recommended in terms of new case management systems. So I
- 3 applaud both of you for your initiative in this regard.
- 4 Thank you.
- 5 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Is there any further
- 6 questions?
- 7 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Chair.
- 8 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Commissioner Holt.
- 9 COMMISSIONER HOLT: To the secretary to the Board.
- 10 Ms. Shah. Now the case management system that you just
- 11 put on the budget amendment. I understand that the one we
- 12 were dealing with was somewhat antiquated. Yet, I thought
- 13 I also understood that there was some discussion about
- 14 you gaining access to one now. Was that the case
- 15 management system as I understand the discussion?
- 16 MS. SHAH: Through the Chair, I can provide some
- 17 clarity around that.
- 18 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: I think it's a short term and
- 19 a long-term plan. So in the short term we'll utilize the
- 20 current case management system with some extra licenses,
- 21 but noting that the long term, a more sufficient case
- 22 management system might be secure.
- 23 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Thank you for being on top of it,
- 24 Chair.
- 25 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: No problem. Any further



- 1 questions from commissioners? Hearing none, is there any
- 2 other report under the community impact report?
- 3 MS. SHAH: No. Mr. Chair. Thank you.
- 4 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Alright, no report. We'll now
- 5 move on to the Chief of police report with no time limit.
- 6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Absolutely.
- 7 DEPUTY CHIEF BLISS: Good afternoon. Deputy Chief
- 8 Mark Blis on behalf of Chief James White. I'm going to
- 9 start with the update on injured officers. Currently
- 10 there's 1 police officer from the Night Precinct who is
- 11 disabled and recovering at home due to an on-duty injury.
- 12 Crime data as of September 21st, 2023, we'll start with
- 13 homicide. Our 2023 year to date number is 198 homicides
- 14 compared to our 2022 year to date, which is 218. We have
- 15 a decrease of 9% in homicides. Non-fatal shootings,
- 16 again, year to date for 2023, 646 compared to 2022 year
- 17 to date, 704. That is a change of negative 8%. Robberies
- 18 year to date, 1059 compared to 2022, 1005. It's an
- 19 increase of 5%. Total part 1 violent crime. Our year to
- 20 date is 9,424 compared to 2022 year to date of 9,420 with
- 21 no change, we're at 0% there. Carjacking 2023 year to
- 22 date, 127. 2022 year to date, 182 for a decrease of 30%
- 23 for carjackings.
- DEPUTY CHIEF BLISS: I'm going to, am going to move
- 25 to the mental health related calls for service. In the



- 1 last seven days, we've had 271 calls for service. We
- 2 serviced 238 of them. For calls for service in 2022 at
- 3 the same time we had 10,645. Currently we're at 11,795.
- 4 Then service calls for 2022 at this time, 9,327, in 2023,
- 5 10,411. I'm also going to include overdose related calls.
- 6 In the last seven days, we've had 172 calls for service,
- 7 and we serviced 130 of them. Overall, in 2022, we had
- 8 6,273 overdose related calls compared to currently 6,200.
- 9 Then service calls overall in 2022, 4,473 and currently
- 10 we're at 4,553.
- 11 DEPUTY CHIEF BLISS: Moving on to significant events.
- 12 Incident number one is a triple shooting which is 1 fatal
- 13 and 2 non-fatal. On Saturday, September 16th, 2023, at
- 14 4:23 PM officers were dispatched to the 15,000 block of
- 15 West Chicago to investigate a call to service for a
- 16 shooting. Officers arrived on the scene and administered
- 17 aid to victim number one who was shot multiple times.
- 18 Medic 17 arrived at the scene and pronounced victim one
- 19 dead on the scene. As officers began securing the scene,
- 20 they were notified that two additional victims were shot
- 21 in the 9,000 block of Greenwood. Medic 71 transported
- 22 both victims number two and number three to Sinai Grace
- 23 Hospital for treatment. Victim number two was listed in
- 24 stable condition and victim number three was listed in
- 25 temporary serious condition. Detectives and officers from



- 1 the Second Precinct, Sixth Precinct and homicide task
- 2 force arrived at the scene to investigate.
- 3 DEPUTY CHIEF BLISS: Detectives determined that three
- 4 Black males wearing ski masks got out of a silver SUV
- 5 armed with an AK47 and shot the victims. After the shots
- 6 were fired, the suspects left the location northbound in
- 7 a silver SUV. Detectives are following up on all
- 8 available leads to identify the suspects. However, the
- 9 incident is still under investigation. The Detroit Police
- 10 Department is asking anyone with additional information
- 11 regarding this incident to contact Crime Stoppers at 1-
- 12 800 Speak Up. Incident number two, a fatal stabbing. On
- 13 Monday, September 18th at 11:27 AM officers were
- 14 dispatched to the 2300 block of Central to investigate a
- 15 call for service for a stabbing. Officers arrived at the
- 16 scene and observed the victim lying on the sidewalk
- 17 bleeding from the neck.
- 18 DEPUTY CHIEF BLISS: They also observed a female
- 19 holding a towel to the victim's neck to stop the
- 20 bleeding. Medic 11 was dispatched to the scene and
- 21 transported the victim to Henry Ford Hospital where he
- 22 was pronounced dead upon arrival. Detectives and officers
- 23 from the Fourth Precinct and Homicide arrived at the
- 24 scene to investigate. Detectives determined that the
- 25 victim was assaulted after an altercation with a Black



- 1 male slim build with dreadlocks. The suspect was last
- 2 seen walking south from the location. A short time later,
- 3 officers arrested an individual matching the suspect's
- 4 description. The suspect was conveyed to the Detroit
- 5 Detention Center for processing. Detectives from the
- 6 Homicide Unit are currently preparing a warrant to be
- 7 submitted to the Wayne County Prosecutor's office. The
- 8 incident is still under investigation. The Detroit Police
- 9 Department is asking anyone with additional information
- 10 regarding this incident to contact Crime Stoppers at 1-
- 11 800 Speak Up.
- 12 DEPUTY CHIEF BLISS: Incident number three, non-fatal
- 13 shooting of a 15-year-old. On Sunday, September 19th at
- 14 3:44 PM officers were dispatched to the 12,000 block of
- 15 Payton to investigate a ShotSpotter alert that was later
- 16 updated to a shooting. Officers arrived and observed a
- 17 victim, a 15-year-old male with a gunshot wound to his
- 18 right shin. Officers administered medical assistance
- 19 until the medics arrived. The victim was conveyed to
- 20 Henry Ford Hospital and was listed in temporary serious
- 21 condition. Officers detained a 17-year-old male who was
- 22 with the victim at the time of the shooting. Detectives
- 23 from the Ninth Precinct Detective Unit responded to the
- 24 scene. The detectives determined that the victim and the
- 25 17-year-old male were observed by witnesses shooting at a



- 1 house on Payton Street. The 17-year-old was arrested and
- 2 conveyed to the Night Precinct pending further
- 3 investigation. Eventually, both juveniles were released
- 4 into the custody of their parents.
- 5 DEPUTY CHIEF BLISS: Detectives continue to gather
- 6 evidence related to this case and expect JCO ones to be
- 7 submitted to the Wayne County Prosecutor's Office. Soon,
- 8 the Detroit Police Department is asking anyone with
- 9 additional information regarding this incident to contact
- 10 Crime Stoppers at 1-800 Speak Up. Now for some positives.
- 11 Coffee with the cop. On Tuesday, September 19th, the
- 12 Detroit Police Department's 10th Precinct held their bi-
- 13 monthly coffee with the cop at In Harmony Café Sweets &
- 14 More at 12,041 Dexter Avenue. Community members were
- 15 welcome to enjoy coffee and conversation with officers of
- 16 the 10th Precinct, voice their concerns and ask
- 17 questions. Commander Aric Tosqui, Captain Brandon Lewis
- 18 and the precinct neighborhood police officers were in
- 19 attendance. DPD and Health Quest Injury Clinic. On
- 20 Tuesday, September 19th, the Detroit Police Department
- 21 partnered with Health Quest Physical Therapy at Public
- 22 Safety Headquarters in the Skylar Room and hosted an
- 23 Injury clinic event.
- 24 DEPUTY CHIEF BLISS: This provided an opportunity for
- 25 staff members to have their injury concerns assessed, and



- 1 they were able to ask questions about potential injuries.
- 2 One Detroit Partnership Press Conference. On Wednesday,
- 3 September 20th, the United States Attorney's Office held
- 4 a press conference at 211 West Forte Street. United
- 5 States Attorney Don and Isam, Detroit Mayor Mike Duggan
- 6 and Chief James E. White announced the results of the
- 7 targeted strategy to reduce gun violence in Detroit's
- 8 neighborhoods with the highest incidents of violent
- 9 crime, which are Detroit's Eighth and Ninth Precincts.
- 10 The Hundred Club Valor Awards dinner. On Wednesday,
- 11 September 20th, 10 awardees from DPD were honored with
- 12 Valor Awards at the hundred club's 69th annual dinner at
- 13 the Detroit Athletic Club. Seven police officers, two
- 14 sergeants and one corporal were all honored for their
- 15 heroic efforts. Chief White also spoke and commended
- 16 their efforts. Finally, Youth Engagement Summit.
- 17 DEPUTY CHIEF BLISS: On Wednesday, September 27th
- 18 from 6:00 PM to 8:00 PM Chief White will be hosting a
- 19 Team Youth Summit at the Wayne County Community College
- 20 Northwest Campus at the Larry K. Lewis Education Center
- 21 building. The purpose of our YES, which is Youth
- 22 Engagement Summit, is to gather safety issues and
- 23 concerns through the perspective of Detroit's youth and
- 24 to hear what they feel they need for future success.
- 25 We'll also have resources available to enable kids to



- 1 stay and get on the right path. There will be a panel of
- 2 five to six, which includes Chief White who will engage
- 3 with the youth in a Q and A forum. This will be
- 4 educational, uplifting, and engaging. So if you have
- 5 time, please stop by. That concludes my report.
- 6 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. Any questions from
- 7 commissioners. Commissioner Banks.
- 8 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Yes. Through the Chair. Deputy
- 9 Chief Bliss, the individuals who was shot by the
- 10 individuals in the SUV. How were those victims doing that
- 11 was shot by those individuals with the SUV?
- 12 DEPUTY CHIEF BLISS: Through the Chair. I believe two
- 13 were in temporary serious conditions, so they're probably
- 14 still recovering. The other one was a fatal.
- 15 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Okay. I'm all set. Mr. Chair.
- 16 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you.
- 17 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Mr. Chair.
- 18 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Vice-Chair Holley.
- 19 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. Thank
- 20 you for your report. Very detailed. Maybe I'm missing
- 21 something, and it could be, I know I'm working a brain
- 22 injury, but when you say they took off the ski mask and
- 23 they were identified as Black males, normally, I don't
- 24 member us dealing with the color one way or the other
- 25 when we do the report. It's just something I'm just



- l missing this in terms of describing. Do you understand
- 2 what I'm saying?
- 3 DEPUTY CHIEF BLISS: Through the Chair.
- 4 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I'm not trying to say one way or
- 5 the other. It just seemed like I just, somehow, they just
- 6 grabbed me. That's the first time we started talking
- 7 about when they pull the ski masks off, they were
- 8 identified as Black males.
- 9 DEPUTY CHIEF BLISS: Through the Chair. For some of
- 10 these incidents, because we're asking people to speak
- 11 out, we're trying to give as best description we can to
- 12 the community at large, so they can look at it and really
- 13 understand who we're at best looking for.
- 14 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Okay. It makes sense.
- 15 DEPUTY CHIEF BLISS: If we do have that information,
- 16 we try to give it. If we don't, then.
- 17 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: But you would agree with me 98%
- 18 of our crime in Detroit is Black on Black. Again, for
- 19 some reason or another, I missed this over the time where
- 20 we basically describe the people as whether they're Black
- 21 or white. That's okay. I understand why as you indicated.
- 22 DEPUTY CHIEF BLISS: Okay.
- 23 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Thank you, Mr. Chair.
- 24 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Any further questions? Let the
- 25 record show that Commissioner Carter has joined us.



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- 1 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Through the Chair.
- 2 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Commissioner Holt.
- 3 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Thank you for your report. You
- 4 made mention about a press release that included the
- 5 Attorney General Ison, Mayor Duggan and Chief White, as
- 6 they attempted to-what was the objective of that press
- 7 release as it related to violent crimes or gun violence
- 8 in the two precincts, Eight, which is mine, and Nine.
- 9 What was the objective?
- 10 DEPUTY CHIEF BLISS: Through the Chair. We're
- 11 focusing on violent crime specifically. It's a targeted
- 12 strategy for any type of violent crime. Some using
- 13 firearms in those precincts.
- 14 COMMISSIONER HOLT: So was there a resolve, or, I
- 15 mean, are there going to be some kind of outside of
- 16 offering the information, what are the strategies? What
- 17 are the strategies that were suggested at that press
- 18 release?
- 19 DEPUTY CHIEF BLISS: Through the Chair. So one of the
- 20 things that we're looking at is how we're taking some of
- 21 these cases, how they're being looked at, how they're
- 22 being reviewed. Some of them can be taken federally. So
- 23 that's one of the things that when we look at targeting
- 24 violent crime, is trying to get those violent individuals
- 25 off the street and try to keep them off as long as



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- 1 possible.
- COMMISSIONER HOLT: Thank you. 2.
- CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. Commissioner Bell. 3
- COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, Mr. Chair. Could you 4
- keep us informed about the young man from senior high 5
- school from Ecorse that was shot and killed in Detroit? 6
- Could you give a special attention updates in reference
- to this young man losing his life in the drive-by 8
- shooting?
- CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: That may memorialize in the 10
- minutes. Any further questions or comments? 11
- 12 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Here. I got one quick one, Mr.
- 13 Chair.
- 14 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Commissioner Banks.
- 15 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Yes. Deputy Chief Bliss. Now,
- 16 these crooks who had on these ski masks, right? Did they
- have them on in broad daylight or was it nighttime or 17
- broad daylight. Can you tell us that? 18
- 19 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Through the Chair. It was
- approximately at 4:23 pm that it happened. So it was in, 20
- 21 in daylight.
- 22 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Okay.
- 23 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Alright. Hearing no further
- 24 questions from our commissioners. Thank you so very much
- 25 for the Chief's report. I'm sorry, Commissioner Burton.



- 1 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Yes, Mr. Chairman. Question for
- 2 the Chief. Can you give us an update of what occurred on
- 3 the Ninth Precinct where officers involved in use of
- 4 force pertaining to a guy that apparently did not show
- 5 his ID at the time? Also can you give us an update on
- 6 that as well as schedule a date with all of the
- 7 commissioners so we can see that body-worn camera and
- 8 audio which is very important for oversight body like
- 9 this to see all footage. So we can have a clear picture
- 10 on what occurred on that day. I believe that was Monday
- 11 at 5:00 PM I believe reported.
- 12 DEPUTY CHIEF BLISS: Through the Chair. I know that
- 13 there's going to be a briefing that's forthcoming. What I
- 14 would like to do is wait until everything is collected in
- 15 order to give you a comprehensive and complete briefing.
- 16 To give you bits and pieces, I don't think does anyone
- 17 any justice on it. I would much rather have at start to
- 18 finish where everyone's involved and any questions or
- 19 concerns can be addressed. I just think that right now
- 20 with where we're at, that's probably the best course of
- 21 action.
- 22 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair. Real quick,
- 23 briefly. The police are involved in the community 24/7, 7
- 24 days a week. Many of our Detroit residents has been
- 25 reaching out to individual commissioners and so I am



- 1 calling for the video and the audio today. I'd like it if
- 2 we can have that in a very time sensitive manner. Because
- 3 we want to know what really occurred on that day.
- 4 DEPUTY CHIEF BLISS: Through the Chair. I will make
- 5 that recommendation and send it up to make sure that we
- 6 can get that moving as expeditiously as possible.
- 7 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Were the officers wearing their
- 8 body-worn cameras? Each officer involved.
- 9 DEPUTY CHIEF BLISS: Through the Chair. There is
- 10 body-worn camera video.
- 11 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Alright. So no further
- 12 questions. Again, thank you so very much for your report.
- 13 At this time, we'll return back to oral communication Mr.
- 14 Brown, who do we have?
- 15 MR. BROWN: Mr. Chair, currently we have seven
- 16 speakers, Ms. Fredia Butler, followed by Ms. Bernice
- 17 Smith, followed by Ms. Charnita Williams.
- 18 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Yep. If there is any citizen
- 19 who would like to make public comment, if you're in the
- 20 room, please fill out public comment form and give it to
- 21 Mr. Brown. If you're online, you can identify yourself
- 22 for your remarks. Go right ahead.
- 23 MS. BUTLER: Good afternoon.
- 24 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Good afternoon.
- 25 MS. BUTLER: My name is Fredia Butler and I'm a



- 1 community activist. Commissioners at your meeting
- 2 September the seventh at 2023, you expressed concerns
- 3 about the community impact report. I agree that
- 4 information regarding an officer's name and behavior
- 5 should not be made public until you have carefully
- 6 considered the information given to you. The public and
- 7 the officer's life and livelihood are in jeopardy if it
- 8 has not been investigated and the decision has been made.
- 9 The community impact report should give the details and
- 10 results after your decision. Commissioners, when you have
- 11 a closed session and return within five minutes or less,
- 12 what kind of decisions are you making? I am aware that
- 13 this isn't a paid position, but don't you believe that
- 14 you should meet as a group to discuss the cases brought
- 15 before you? I have asked several of you why you don't
- 16 meet before going public. Are you not allowed to respond
- 17 to the public and address their concerns? Why and why
- 18 not? Thank you.
- 19 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you.
- 20 MR. BROWN: Ms. Smith.
- MS. SMITH: Good afternoon, commissioners.
- 22 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Good afternoon.
- MS. SMITH: I'm going to be brief because I know time
- 24 is of the essence here.
- 25 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: You have two minutes.



- 1 MS. SMITH: I know, I know. I have always supported
- 2 the police department, but seeing what happened this
- 3 week, I was kind of upset. It wasn't totally accepted in
- 4 my estimation. I even talked to my children, but they
- 5 said, mother, shut up and don't say nothing. I can't be
- 6 quiet because we are not used to the police having that
- 7 kind of attitude for anyone. The man told them that he
- 8 had keys and whatever happened afterwards, I'm not aware
- 9 of it. But the fact is, I think the police should be more
- 10 aware when a person tells you that a car belongs to them.
- 11 I'm thinking about why can't we have police there in
- 12 their cars patrolling the neighborhoods? You have the
- 13 group of 300 and the other group that's under contract
- 14 with the Detroit, I mean with medicine. I do not hear
- 15 about what they're doing out in the neighborhood.
- MS. SMITH: I would like to know. Matter of fact I'm
- 17 one of the first women, and Parnell was another one of
- 18 the 300. So you know how long we've been around. But
- 19 anyway, what I want to say is I think the police should
- 20 take time sometimes and get out of their cars and walk
- 21 down the street and let the neighborhood know who they
- 22 are and be very, very acceptable in speaking to them,
- 23 saying hello and so forth. I think that would be a good
- 24 beginning. This way we would know the police is visible
- 25 in the neighborhoods. That would be something that I



- l suggest. Alright, this is something that I got from my
- 2 mother years ago. Says, every time a fool speaks, he's
- 3 advertising his ignorance. Also, you cannot sleepwalk
- 4 through life. Detroit cannot cross the finish line if
- 5 they don't participate in the race. My last thing is, you
- 6 have the power. Let's use it.
- 7 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you so very much.
- 8 MR. BROWN: Ms. Williams followed by Mr. Bob Carmack
- 9 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Good afternoon.
- 10 MS. WILLIAMS: Good afternoon. I apologize. Hi guys.
- 11 This incident occurred last year in July 2022. I have
- 12 video around my house. This woman put a weapon on me and
- 13 said she was going to kill me and everything. So my
- 14 question is, with that recording, this is how all this
- 15 stuff happened. The detective who was over the case, I
- 16 want to know, does that video still exist? Because I
- 17 received a letter from the Chief office and I don't
- 18 believe it came from the Chief. Then another incident
- 19 concerning, I spoke to internal affairs about the UPS
- 20 robbery. All this, I've been coming to you guys for about
- 21 five to six months. It's sustained woman. Every time I
- 22 come up here and I speak concerning this issue, the
- 23 police department always helped this woman out escort
- 24 her.
- MS. WILLIAMS: Nikita Wilson, the fire department and



- 1 then Kim Worthy, do you even have her people come to my
- 2 house? They said, it's not even documented that the
- 3 sheriff's even came to my home. It wasn't even on record.
- 4 My point is, all of this, everything that I've been going
- 5 through and I'm still having issues with the same person
- 6 and for her to come into my house illegally and I seen
- 7 her on cameras and everything, and the police are still
- 8 helping the same person out. This is not acceptable. You
- 9 guys have a job and position to take care of this and
- 10 make it transparent. It's not at all period. When I came
- 11 in here, there wasn't even no card over here. They act
- 12 like they don't even want me to come up here and speak no
- 13 more.
- 14 MR. BROWN: Thank you, Mr. Carmack, followed by Mr.
- 15 Ronald Foster.
- MR. CARMACK: Yes, my name's Bob Carmack. Where's the
- 17 Porter Burks video? It's only been a year, year and a
- 18 half. Kid got shot 41 times. You guys are police
- 19 commissioner. You are responsible for the people of
- 20 Detroit. If you don't want to do a job, have you guys
- 21 read the charter book? You can investigate. You can
- 22 subpoena. You can investigate yourselves. You need to be
- 23 sued, taken to court, deposed, and you have to do a job
- 24 to protect these people. You're doing political work for
- 25 Mike Duggan. Mike Duggan is a criminal. He needs to be



- 1 put in jail and Chief White does what he's told to do.
- 2 People got to wake up. He's going to Black, kill Black.
- 3 He don't care. He is white from Livonia. Shit, the more
- 4 Black that die-
- 5 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Language, please.
- 6 MR. CARMACK: The more Black that died, the better
- 7 off he is. That the way more whites going to move in.
- 8 I'll be real with you. This is facts. You were checked.
- 9 Population out changed. Most of you are Black here. You
- 10 don't care about Porter Burks. How you're going to hide
- 11 this. If it happened in New York for some kid got shot 41
- 12 one times at five o'clock in the morning, there'd be
- 13 riots out there. What did he do? He had a fire call the
- 14 family at seven in the morning. How'd the fire get that
- 15 number? From Mike Duggan? Shut them down. Shut that
- 16 family. He told them to keep their mouth shut. All you
- 17 keep your mouth shut. Where's the video? Where is it? You
- 18 got Rebecca McKay here who filed false charge me because
- 19 I caught Mayor Duggan cheating on his wife. Put a video
- 20 of that. She signed a false order. She didn't even stay
- 21 an affidavit to a judge of a crime committed by me
- 22 because there was no crime. It follows state statute
- 23 565152, a deeded law. But she got a warrant because she
- 24 meets with the mayor every two weeks and because I caught
- 25 him cheating-



- 1 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. That's your time,
- 2 sir.
- 3 MR. CARMACK: Thank you.
- 4 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you.
- 5 MR. BROWN: Mr. Foster followed by Ms. Alexander
- 6 Field.
- 7 MR. FOSTER: Good evening.
- 8 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Good evening.
- 9 MR. FOSTER: First thing I wanted to say is Mr.
- 10 Mosley is pretty fair guy. Bring him back without delay
- 11 if you can. Secondly, in 1604, Sir Edward Coate declared
- 12 that quote, the house of everyone is to him as his castle
- 13 and fortress as well for defense against injury and
- 14 violence as for his repo. In the 1920s, former Mayor
- 15 Detroit, Governor Michigan, Eastern Michigan US Attorney,
- 16 chief Judge, and Supreme Court Justice Frank Murphy
- 17 reiterated during the sweet trials that a man's house is
- 18 his castle and it has the right to be protected. Dr.
- 19 Ossan Sweet fought and eventually committed suicide as a
- 20 result of those trials. Today, we cannot have anything
- 21 going on at people's houses under any conditions. So
- 22 whatever laws that you have, they're unjust If they're
- 23 going on at people's houses. Under no conditions can we
- 24 have white people balling up their fists in a uniform
- 25 assaulting residents.



- 1 MR. FOSTER: Okay? Training is farther than that.
- 2 Anybody that's blowing up their fist, it has some
- 3 internal rage and internal things inside that need to be
- 4 screened before they get in this office. I just want to
- 5 say and reiterate, just look up the sweet trials. I have
- 6 a major question. How many of our officers today are in
- 7 uniform that are on the Brady list? Or do you guys take
- 8 accountability or have oversight of the Brady list? Okay.
- 9 Should more of them be on the Brady list? So just take
- 10 these things into account. I've been coming down quite
- 11 frequently speaking about racism within the ranks, racism
- 12 within the community and they are manifesting without any
- 13 resolve, without any reprisal, and without any
- 14 consequences to it. The community will not stand up for
- 15 it. I ask that you guys get practice, identify non-lethal
- 16 uses of force.
- 17 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. That's your time.
- 18 MR. BROWN: Ms. Fields followed by Ms. Linda Bond.
- 19 MS. FIELDS: Good afternoon.
- 20 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Good afternoon.
- 21 MS. FIELDS: I just would like to kind of reinforce
- 22 how critical it is. I appreciate some of the people
- 23 speaking about this like last week and a gentleman just
- 24 before me, but how critical it is to ensure that these
- 25 meetings are focused on police accountability and police



- 1 oversight. We have DPD and WCPO for crimes that are
- 2 committed by civilians. But if you look at the paid that
- 3 we hit here on the, on that second page, it has the
- 4 duties of the Board and the vast majority of those duties
- 5 are for police oversight and police accountability. I've
- 6 been to several of these meeting and sometimes they kind
- 7 of feel like a little bit more of like a PR event for
- 8 DPD. Yeah, I just wanted to emphasize that. This young
- 9 gentleman right here, he detailed several civilian
- 10 criminal allegations that were still under investigation.
- 11 However a couple meetings ago he kind of got up and had
- 12 had a little bit of an outburst about how inappropriate
- 13 it was to talk about police misconduct, which I think it
- 14 may be a little bit inappropriate for an officer to
- 15 dictate what the Board should be talking about or what
- 16 the community should be talking about. But anyway, so I
- 17 just, sorry. I'm a little bit mixed up, but I just would
- 18 appreciate having the ability to have public comment and
- 19 yeah. Thanks.
- 20 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. We appreciate your
- 21 comment.
- MR. BROWN: Ms. Burner, followed by former
- 23 Commissioner William Davis.
- MS. BURNER: Good evening, everyone. This is my first
- 25 time here, so I'm not sure what's going to come out of my



- 1 mouth, but it will be respectable.
- 2 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you.
- 3 MS. BURNER: I live on Braille Street in Michigan.
- 4 Eighth Precinct has been in charge of every incident that
- 5 I have reported since last September and I have been
- 6 failed. My neighbors have been breaking in my home and up
- 7 till today, they are still coming into my home when I'm
- 8 not there and the Eighth Precinct has done nothing. I've
- 9 reported so many incidents, no return calls. These people
- 10 were not questioning, I didn't get any answers on why
- 11 this has continued today up until today. They came into
- 12 my house two days ago. I just put two new doors up
- 13 because they Jimmy Jam locks from the outside and they
- 14 get in. I can't control that, but I changed everything.
- MS. BURNER: My mother, I worry about her. She's 90,
- 16 we're senior citizens and she lives with me now. So I
- 17 have been contacting the commissioner office for reports,
- 18 I can't even go to the Eighth Precinct. No disrespect
- 19 ma'am, but you have some dirty, dirty, dirty, dirty
- 20 policemen up there who have done nothing for me but
- 21 laughed and that's it or take me to a mental institute
- 22 for being in my backyard trying to bless my home. He said
- 23 to me, you crazy. You're going to-where did they take me?
- 24 Sinai. I couldn't do anything. They threw me in the car.
- 25 Never been in a police car before in my life. I would be



- 1 70 years old in February and I am disgusted over what
- 2 goes on in my area. That's not, it is so much more to
- 3 tell they will come in my home at night.
- 4 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Sorry ma'am, that's your time.
- 5 But we are so heartbroken that you have had to experience
- 6 that type of violation at your home, and I'm sure that
- 7 that has been captured. So you can share that with Second
- 8 Deputy Chief Hope. She's there right behind you.
- 9 MS. BURNER: Yes, sir.
- 10 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: We'll capture that information
- 11 to ensure that it's followed up. Then for the complaints
- 12 that she says she wasn't receiving from the Eighth
- 13 Precinct, we want to follow up on that with our senior
- 14 investigator. So they'll take your request right behind
- 15 you. Right behind you.
- MR. BROWN: Former Commissioner Davis.
- MR. DAVIS: Good evening. Can I be heard?
- 18 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Yes, you can. Go right ahead.
- MR. DAVIS: Okay. I'd like to start off again saying
- 20 that I think the community impact report is one of the
- 21 best things this Board has done in the last 10 years. I
- 22 also agree that during the course, given that no
- 23 officer's name should be given. I haven't heard any
- 24 officer's name so far, but no officer's name should be
- 25 given until whatever action that was going on is



- 1 thoroughly investigated. Once those actions are
- 2 investigated, they should be returned, and the community
- 3 should get an update on those. Also, I think there needs
- 4 to be some stronger language about misconduct and
- 5 officers misrepresenting facts, especially if video shows
- 6 otherwise. That should be severe consequences. Because I
- 7 know when I was on the Board, I took part in the national
- 8 white paper on duty Tennessee so when one officer see
- 9 another officer doing something, they need to say
- 10 something. This Board still needs some help, but I think
- 11 they have better leadership now than what they've had in
- 12 the last six years. Thank you.
- 13 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you.
- MR. BROWN: Mr. Chair, that was your last speaker.
- 15 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you so very much for
- 16 your public comment. Now we will move on to the
- 17 presentation of the Board from our Human Resources
- 18 Bureau.
- 19 MS. PATILLO: Good afternoon. Through the Chair. I'll
- 20 be presenting the human resources, your report for the
- 21 month of August. I'm passing on a copy of the slides for
- 22 you all as well, so you can follow just in case the
- 23 PowerPoint doesn't get out. So for the current
- 24 departmental staffing for August, we were at 90%. For
- 25 sworn, we were at 93% with 177 vacancies. Vastly far



- 1 different than last year when we were well over 300. For
- 2 police assistance we're 94%, for civilians we're at 81%.
- 3 Next slide. For sworn recruiting, from the beginning of
- 4 the fiscal year until August 31st, we had 766
- 5 applications. 96 were in processing at the time, 28
- 6 applications withdrawn, 362 archive, 81 temporary
- 7 disqualified, 73 permanently disqualified, 126 awaiting
- 8 on MCOLEs testing. Next slide. For the MCOLEs testing,
- 9 for the written test, they had 116 scheduled, 60
- 10 appeared, 41 past 68% passing rate. 19 failed, 32%
- 11 failure rate, 5 rescheduled, 1 withdrew, 50 no-shows. For
- 12 physical agility, 145 were scheduled, 70 appeared, 40
- 13 passed, which was 57% passing rate. 30 fail, 43 failure
- 14 rate, 16 rescheduled, 2 withdrew, 56 no-shows. Next
- 15 slide.
- MS. PATILLO: For new hires, we had 23 civilians.
- 17 Looking, we did not have any new hires for the month of
- 18 August. We had two classes in June, and we had one in
- 19 July. For academy class graduation., we graduated 28 in
- 20 August. Next slide. For department residency, for
- 21 Detroit, we have 546 sworn, 421 civilians and 15 police
- 22 assistants. For your non-Detroiters, we have 1,880 sworn,
- 23 226 civilians, 19 police assistants. Of those new hires,
- 24 10 were Detroit residents for the civilians. Next slide.
- 25 For attrition, we were trying to keep it below 15 a



- 1 month. For the month of August we had 17. We had 4 that
- 2 resigned out of the academy, 1 that passed away. So that
- 3 put us over what we had been seeing since January. We had
- 4 12 civilians that separated, 1 police assistant for a
- 5 total of 30 for the month. Next slide. For leave of
- 6 absence, for FMLA continuous, we had 16 sworn, 8
- 7 civilians. FMLA intermediate, we had 49 sworn, 68
- 8 civilians. Paid parental leave, we had 8 sworn, 1
- 9 civilian. Medical leave, 3 sworn, 5 civilians. Military,
- 10 5 sworn. General leave, 3 civilians. Restricted, 165
- 11 sworn, 14 civilians. Disabled, 19 sworn, 2 civilians.
- 12 Sick, we have 15 sworn, 3 civilians. Next slide.
- MS. PATILLO: For monthly separations, we had a total
- 14 of 17, 16 were police officers, 1 sergeant. For
- 15 suspensions we had 18, 17 police officers, 1 corporal. We
- 16 have 541 in the drop program. Next slide. When we look at
- 17 separations, 2 hires from the beginning of January to
- 18 September. These are current as of today. So all these
- 19 slides are current up to month of September. We have 109
- 20 separations compared to the new hires 246. We have
- 21 surpassed last year's hire rate. You have a net gain of
- 22 137. Next slide. For sworn separations, when we look at
- 23 2022 to 2023 January to September. Last year you had 260,
- 24 this year you have 109. As I stated, we had 17 in August,
- 25 but we only have three for the month of September. Next



- 1 slide. Members going to other law enforcement agencies.
- 2 We had 5 in August and currently in September we have
- 3 zero. So if we keep that trend to zero that's better than
- 4 any month since last year of January, 2022. Next slide.
- 5 We have currently 4 academy classes at the academy. Next
- 6 class is going to graduate October 27th. Our next class
- 7 will start in the month of October. But first September
- 8 we've hired 24 already and we placed them at the
- 9 precincts just to get them familiarization and
- 10 acclimatized to DPD. Next slide.
- 11 MS. PATILLO: The next slide. For reinstatements for
- 12 2023, we have a total of 37. Next slide. For
- 13 reinstatements. Since the contract, we've had a total of
- 14 104 requests for members wanting to return to DPD. Eight
- 15 requests since the last time I briefed you all. 44 have
- 16 been hired, 48 have been approved. We have 17 that are in
- 17 some processing stage, 4 new submissions, 24 denied, 13
- 18 withdrew, and 1 under review. You can stay on that slide.
- 19 So if you can read that slide, that's just some new
- 20 recruiting initiatives that we're doing and some new
- 21 partnerships that we've established recently. Next slide.
- 22 Through our marketing advertising, we've received more
- 23 than 672 leads in the last three weeks. So we are making
- 24 sure that we contact all those individuals back. Next
- 25 slide. On next Saturday here at Detroit Public Safety



- 1 Headquarters, we're going to have a one day hiring
- 2 process.
- 3 MS. PATILLO: That means you can complete the process
- 4 pretty much all in one day. So we are looking for
- 5 citizens that want to be police officers or if they're
- 6 interested in law enforcement and they do not want to be
- 7 a police officer, but they're interested in civilian
- 8 careers. We will start at 7:00 AM and we will close at
- 9 5:00 AM. Next slide. The next slide is just basically
- 10 showing some additional outreach and education that we're
- 11 doing. Pending any questions. This concludes my brief.
- 12 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you so much for your
- 13 consistency and your thoroughness. We truly appreciate
- 14 it. Any questions from our commissioners? Hearing none.
- 15 Thank you so very much.
- MS. PATILLO: Thank you.
- 17 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: We now will return back to the
- 18 board of secretary's report as there are some action
- 19 items that needs to be considered. Secretary Shah.
- MS. SHAH: Thank you Mr. Chair. So the last item in
- 21 my secretary report is in regards to a memo that can be
- 22 found in your packets as well behind tab number six. This
- 23 is in regard to position amendment recommendation from
- 24 the staff and I will just read certain components of this
- 25 here. So as you know, the BOPC staff has been working



- 1 with the classification and compensation area to ensure
- 2 that BOPC staff is staffed with the right skill sets to
- 3 support the Board's charter mandated functions and class
- 4 that compensation has completed their review for the
- 5 position of attorney to the Board of police commissioners
- 6 as well as the legal assistant. Both our positions that
- 7 are budgeted for the Board. I'll move very quickly past
- 8 the attorney piece. No position amendment is recommended
- 9 based on class and compensation's recommendation.
- 10 MS. SHAH: So moving on to the legal assistant. The
- 11 staff does recommend the following position amendment for
- 12 the legal assistant position. To actually remove the
- 13 legal assistant position, job code 091941 and replace it
- 14 with job code 013374 which is an executive administrative
- 15 assistant level two. There're several items here have
- 16 listed as rationale for that. The first is that the
- 17 current legal assistant position is under the bargaining
- 18 unit law department paralegals UAW412, unit 86. The Board
- 19 will have restrictions based on union contracts and
- 20 corporation counsel approvals as the Board pursues that
- 21 particular legal assistant position. The second per class
- 22 and compensations estimation. The legal assistant job
- 23 description does not fully align with the functions that
- 24 the Board needs this position to perform. The executive
- 25 assistant two is an appointed position which allows the



- 1 Board the most flexibility to recruit and manage this
- 2 position to meet the needs of the board. Once ready for
- 3 posting, staff will work with recruiting to tailor the
- 4 posting to attract candidates with legal experience.
- 5 MS. SHAH: The recommended budgeted salary of 65,000
- 6 is just below the median of the compensation range for
- 7 the executive administrative assistant to per the city
- 8 Detroit compensation schedule. Just to note here, the
- 9 position amendment that's being recommended does not have
- 10 any type of budget impact as far as dollars, because
- 11 currently the legal assistant is budget for 65,000, and
- 12 the executive administrative assistant to position will
- 13 also be budgeted at 65,000 if approved by the Board.
- 14 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. As a result of that
- 15 presentation, the Chair entertains a motion to amend the
- 16 budget to remove the legal assistant and to add executive
- 17 administrative two pending approval from Budget, Finance,
- 18 and HR.
- 19 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: Mr. Chairman.
- 20 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Yes.
- 21 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: Was there a
- 22 motion to adopt the original position, the original
- 23 title, the legal assistant?
- 24 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: That would've been before my
- 25 tenure. I just think that's how it's been coded in the...



- 1 MS. SHAH: It's part of the Board's existing budget.
- 2 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: Okay. So the
- 3 motion is to amend the budget and the title.
- 4 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Mr. Chair, do you want me to
- 5 make that motion?
- 6 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Hold on one second.
- 7 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: You're not just
- 8 amending, you're amending, you're not amending the
- 9 budget. You're amending the title.
- 10 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Correct.
- 11 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: That title was
- 12 originally in the budget.
- 13 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Correct.
- 14 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: So the motion
- 15 is to, you're amending something previously adopted. This
- 16 is already adopted?
- 17 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: When we adopted our budget.
- 18 Yes.
- 19 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: Okay. So that's
- 20 going to require two thirds.
- 21 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Okay. Secretary.
- MS. SHAH: Through the Chair. If I can just clarify
- 23 as far as process. The Board doesn't adopt the Board's
- 24 budget. That's something that's approved by city council.
- 25 So the current budget that the Board has today, I'm



- 1 sorry, through the Chair. The current budget that the
- 2 Board has today was never formally adopted by the Board.
- 3 It was given to the board by city council.
- 4 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: I think what you're trying to
- 5 get to though—
- 6 COMMISSIONER BELL: Chairman, I think that's not-
- 7 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: It's two thirds is necessary
- 8 versus majority vote. Is that what the...
- 9 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: If this was
- 10 something that has already been adopted by the Board and
- 11 you're changing it to something else from legal assistant
- 12 to executive administrative assistant, that's the
- 13 question.
- 14 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Okay.
- 15 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: If this is not
- 16 something you've adopted, then you only need majority to
- 17 change it.
- 18 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Okay. Commissioner Bell.
- 19 COMMISSIONER BELL: I just want to speak that the
- 20 council does not dictates our budget. We present a formal
- 21 approval of the budget by the Board to the council. That
- 22 is normally how it works in terms of that process. They
- 23 don't give us our budget. The mayor doesn't give our
- 24 budget. We present it to the council.
- 25 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you.



- 1 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Mr. Chair, I got that motion for
- 2 you.
- 3 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: One second. I just need
- 4 clarification. We did something similar. What was that,
- 5 maybe about three weeks ago in changing a title for OCI
- 6 to a new title, and I don't think we did majority, I mean
- 7 two thirds majority then. Would that be of likewise
- 8 motion, or, because...
- 9 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: The issue is if
- 10 you've already adopted this title, that's the essential
- 11 question. If you've not adopted it, then this is just an
- 12 original main motion and you only need a majority.
- 13 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: I believe it's an original
- 14 main motion. This is what we've inherited that was
- 15 already created by whoever gave the title.
- 16 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: All you need is
- 17 a simple majority to adopt the motion to change the title
- 18 from legal assistant to executive administrative
- 19 assistant.
- 20 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Okay. Thank you. Commissioner
- 21 Banks.
- 22 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: Am I correct?
- 23 That's what you're doing?
- 24 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Yes, that's what we're doing.
- 25 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: Okay.



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- CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Commissioner Banks. 1
- COMMISSIONER BANKS: Am I released? 2.
- CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: You are released. Go right 3
- 4 ahead.
- COMMISSIONER BANKS: Alright. I move to amend the 5
- budget to remove the legal assistant and add executive 6
- administrative assistant to pending approval for Budget,
- Finance and HR. 8
- 9 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Is there a second?
- 10 COMMISSIONER: Second.
- CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: It has been properly moved and 11
- 12 seconded to remove the legal assistant and add
- 13 administrative assistant two pending approval from
- 14 Budget, Finance, I'm sorry. Budget, Finance and HR. Are
- 15 you ready for the question?
- 16 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Discussion.
- CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Commissioner Burton. 17
- 18 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. Mr.
- Chairman, I feel that we have more than enough 19
- administrative assistants working for the Board. Our 20
- office has recently hired additional administrative 21
- assistance. I feel that this Board is long overdue for 22
- 23 its own attorney as well as paralegal assistance.
- Something that we have fought for. Some of us have fought 24
- 25 for many years since I've been in this seat. I think that



- 1 it's a disservice to our community when we do not have a
- 2 legal attorney representing this Board, as well as a
- 3 paralegal. But to bring on additional administrative
- 4 assistant is something that is not going to move the
- 5 Board forward. I think the other components that are
- 6 missing will help as some point.
- 7 COMMISSIONER BURTON: But this is not the answer that
- 8 we continue to staff with more additional administrative
- 9 assistants. At what point in time we going to be budgeted
- 10 to bring on these other items. We already look at the
- 11 current budget of the Board and look at what we staffing
- 12 for our salaries. It's just not a good look for the
- 13 future of this Board. I'm sorry Mr. Chair, but I will
- 14 vote no on this. I think we need to revisit this. I think
- 15 this needs to go through committee overall. Sorry.
- 16 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Duly noted. No need for an
- 17 apology. Any other debate or discussion. Hearing none, I
- 18 think we're ready for the question. We'll do a roll call
- 19 vote.
- 20 MS. SHAH: Chair QuanTez Pressley Yes.
- 21 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Well, I should have stated
- 22 again, this vote is on the motion to amend the budget to
- 23 remove the legal assistant and add executive
- 24 administrative assistant to pending approval from Budget,
- 25 Finance and HR. That's a yes for me.



- 1 MS. SHAH: Vice-Chair Jim Holley It's a yes for me.
- 2 MS. SHAH: Commissioner Linda Bernard Want to
- 3 abstain on this.
- 4 MS. SHAH: Commissioner Cedric Banks Yes.
- 5 MS. SHAH: Commissioner Willie Bell Sustain.
- 6 MS. SHAH: Commissioner Willie Burton No.
- 7 MS. SHAH: Mr. Chair, you have—
- 8 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: I think we have one more.
- 9 Commissioner.
- 10 MS. SHAH: I'm sorry. Looking at the totals here.
- 11 Commissioner Lisa Carter. My apologies.
- 12 COMMISSIONER CARTER: No.
- 13 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: So that motion fails.
- 14 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: May I say something?
- 15 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Yes. Vice-Chair Holley.
- 16 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I have no problem with the vote.
- 17 I just want you to know this is not to take the place of
- 18 attorney. An attorney is coming. This vote that we just
- 19 made as legal assistance does not take the place of
- 20 attorney. We will have an attorney. Based upon my being
- 21 the over the personnel, I think that that will be coming.
- 22 So it does not take the place of being a legal attorney.
- 23 We will have an attorney, and it'll be very shortly.
- COMMISSIONER BANKS: Dr. Holley, when is the attorney
- 25 coming? Can you tell us please?



- 1 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: It is forthcoming. Again,
- 2 there was conversation that was had this week, and we'll
- 3 be presenting something to the Board sooner than later.
- 4 COMMISSIONER BELL: Mr. Chair.
- 5 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Commissioner Bell.
- 6 COMMISSIONER BELL: The question that Commissioner
- 7 Burton raised, could we clarify how many administrative
- 8 system that we have? I'm looking at specific duties and
- 9 responsibility of what we need to graph. We got some
- 10 serious charter mandated duties, and we got serious
- 11 action for more investigators. Perhaps we can make that
- 12 change to investigator.
- 13 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Those are budgeted for, and
- 14 that's a conversation to be had. But again, to assist
- 15 what is the oncoming attorney there will be need for
- 16 support staff. So this executive assistant position is to
- 17 provide the support staff for the attorney. So, I
- 18 completely recognize as the presentation presented
- 19 earlier, that the scale of work that we have to do
- 20 requires for us to have more investigators. I definitely
- 21 agree with that, but if we want our Board attorney to be
- 22 efficient in their work, then it'll require some support
- 23 staff for that as well. So we'll go back to the table and
- 24 try to craft it in a way that's more amenable rather to
- 25 this Board and then we'll bring that back. Commissioner



- 1 Bernard.
- 2 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I just want to say that I
- 3 can't say to the Board strongly enough how important it
- 4 is that you get your own attorney. About 50 pages in this
- 5 binder are quote, legal opinions from the General Office
- 6 of Corporation counsel by a person who does not have a P
- 7 number in the state of Michigan, which means they are not
- 8 a fully licensed attorney in the state of Michigan. We
- 9 have no legal representation right now. We desperately
- 10 need our own lawyer. Furthermore, as a licensed attorney
- 11 who's argued and won four cases, I'm sorry, three cases
- 12 in the Michigan Supreme Court, I don't agree as a labor
- 13 lawyer who's won labor cases for the city of Detroit and
- 14 the Michigan Supreme Court with any of this legal advice.
- 15 I so want us to have a person with labor law experience
- 16 and so forth. Because I mean, this is just way over
- 17 there.
- 18 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I could find probably five
- 19 volunteer attorneys who would review this information and
- 20 agree with me. We are not able to serve you the public-
- 21 that's a fact-right now by making independent decisions
- 22 regarding actions regarding police officers, police
- 23 discipline, and even the reports of the of the Chief
- 24 Investigator. How dare they challenge such a thing? So I
- 25 agree with you 100%. We desperately need a legal



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- 1 assistant and an attorney.
- 2 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair.
- 3 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. Commissioner
- 4 Burton.
- 5 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair. Commissioner
- 6 Holley raised a point that we have attorney coming, but
- 7 the rest of the Board, we are not in that conversation.
- 8 I'd like to know where did Commissioner Holley, where he
- 9 get his intel from? Whoever you've been speaking to
- 10 because we're all in the dark on this one.
- 11 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Yeah. I mean, it's too early
- 12 to actually say. So it's still in process, but we've been
- 13 in consultation with the law department to ensure that we
- 14 can get our own attorney to the Board.
- 15 COMMISSIONER BURTON: But how come we have not been
- 16 brought into those-
- 17 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Because the conversation is
- 18 not yet ready to be brought to the Board.
- 19 COMMISSIONER BURTON: But it sound like some planning
- 20 is being addressed, but it's not.
- 21 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: I opened it up in the report
- 22 stating that there were further conversations that be had
- 23 and there will be a report coming to the board sooner
- 24 than later. I communicated that at the beginning of the
- 25 meeting. Any further questions? Hearing none, we'll now



- 1 move on to, oh, sorry. Were you done with your secretary
- 2 support?
- 3 MS. SHAH: I am Mr. Chair.
- 4 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: All right. We did
- 5 announcements earlier, and so now we are here for a
- 6 manner of new business. We had this conversation about a
- 7 month ago relative to the consideration of the
- 8 appointment status of two currently suspended with paid
- 9 employees. At the time there was some unreadiness on by
- 10 the Board wanting some documentation from the law
- 11 department as well as HR relative to the decision. You
- 12 should see that documentation in your binders. So I'm
- 13 hoping that the Board is ready to make a motion one way
- 14 or another on what we will do in regards to the two
- 15 suspended employees.
- 16 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Mr. Chairman.
- 17 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Yes, Vice-Chair Holley.
- 18 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I'd like to move that the melody
- 19 White will be restored to full duty as Policy Director.
- 20 COMMISSIONER: Second.
- 21 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: One quick, is there an
- 22 effective date on that motion?
- 23 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I'm okay with whatever you said.
- MS. SHAH: Mr. Chair, you don't have a quorum.
- 25 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: We just lost the quorum. So



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- that means that we will take a...
- CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: How many do I need? 2.
- 3 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Just one.
- 4 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Go ahead and get it.
- CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Let's take a two-minute 5
- recess. Noting that we now have a quorum, the Chair now-6
- is it resume the meeting or call it back to order?
- PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: Call it back to 8
- order, Mr. Chair.
- CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: The Chair now calls the 10
- 11 meeting back to order. Vice-Chair Holley.
- 12 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I move that Mrs. White will be
- 13 restored full duty as Policy Director effective August
- 14 the second.
- 15 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: October the second.
- 16 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I'm sorry.
- 17 COMMISSIONER: Second
- CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: It's been properly moved and 18
- second that we restore Melanie White to her full duty as 19
- BOPC Executive Manager of Policy effective October the 20
- 21 second, 2023. It's been probably moved and second. Is
- 22 there any discussion?
- 23 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Discussion right here.
- 2.4 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Commissioner Banks.
- 25 COMMISSIONER BANKS: The only thing about that, about



- 1 Interim Secretary White, Interim Chief Investigator
- 2 Akbar.
- 3 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Well, Executive Manager Policy
- 4 White.
- 5 COMMISSIONER BANKS: She used to be Interim
- 6 Secretary, right?
- 7 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Policy Manager. She was policy
- 8 manager.
- 9 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Okay. The only thing about that,
- 10 we don't have no evidence on what took place. Before I
- 11 can vote yay or nay, I need to see some evidence. And the
- 12 secretary, I think the secretary was bringing something
- 13 up in about a week or two was it maybe?
- MS. SHAH: Through the Chair. I wouldn't refer to
- 15 that as evidence. There are formal investigations in
- 16 progress. Certainly, Chief Investigator and I can provide
- 17 information on inconsistencies or anything that we've
- 18 come across, but we don't have access to enough history
- 19 to give a definitive answer on any type of investigation.
- 20 COMMISSIONER BANKS: I think we should at least wait
- 21 for a week or two until she can provide a little
- 22 something for us and we can really make an accurate
- 23 decision.
- 24 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Mr. Chairman.
- 25 COMMISSIONER BANKS: That's what I'm thinking.



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- 1 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Mr. Chairman.
- 2 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. One second. Vice-
- 3 Chair. Holley? I just want to kind of again, set the
- 4 context for why we are here. Again, it was about a month
- 5 ago that we were at the table and there was unreadiness.
- 6 I think that I stated with some level of passion that we
- 7 should really do our due diligence in the time that we
- 8 have, so that we can make a decision one way or another.
- 9 Because I wholeheartedly hear what you're saying,
- 10 Commissioner Banks, but we can't comfortably say when an
- 11 investigation will be completed. The dilemma that we face
- 12 is whether or not we continue to pay them in full while
- 13 they're at home doing absolutely nothing or to bring them
- 14 back to at least get a work product out of what we are
- 15 paying them to do. So while we could postpone it another
- 16 week or two weeks a month, or even a year, if that's the
- 17 desire of the Board, I'm hoping that we can get to a
- 18 point that we can move one way or another to be
- 19 responsible stewards of the taxpayer's dollars. So your
- 20 point is well taken.
- 21 COMMISSIONER BANKS: I get that Mr. Chair. That's
- 22 good. Good. I get that. But at least let's wait a week or
- 23 two where she will have a little bit of documentation
- 24 because I can't convict anybody, or I can't announce
- 25 their innocence without seeing some type of document.



- 1 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Hold on second, Vice-Chair.
- 2 Let's just be clear. We are not a judge or jury. This is
- 3 not a matter of conviction or calling anybody guilty for
- 4 what they've done. These are at will employ appointees.
- 5 They're appointed at will by this Board, and we have the
- 6 right and authority to remove them from their position
- 7 without calls or to bring them back if that be our
- 8 desire. But this is not a matter of needing to adjudicate
- 9 evidence and figuring out if somebody did something
- 10 wrong. That is what the pending investigations are for.
- 11 We just want to find out what is the Board's desire when
- 12 it comes to the status of two employees that we currently
- 13 have suspended with pay.
- 14 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: Mr. Chair.
- 15 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Dr. Jackson.
- 16 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: This cannot be
- 17 postponed.
- 18 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: It cannot be postponed.
- 19 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: Down your next
- 20 meeting. You can't postpone it for two or three weeks.
- 21 You can postpone it to next week. Now, if you really are
- 22 not ready and you want more time, the only way to do that
- 23 is to refer the matter to a committee. That can't be a
- 24 file cabinet referral. In other words, you can't just do
- 25 it for form. You have to refer to a committee for them to



- 1 do certain things and then bring a report back. But if
- 2 you're talking about just postponing the motion, the
- 3 motion to restore Melanie White cannot be postponed
- 4 beyond next week's meeting. Now you get to next week's
- 5 meeting, you could postpone it again, but you can't-
- 6 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: The duration can only postpone
- 7 o the next. Right.
- 8 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: Not be beyond
- 9 next week's meeting.
- 10 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you for that. So, again,
- 11 to remind my colleagues, the motion that is currently on
- 12 the floor, excuse me, is to restore Melanie White to her
- 13 full duty as BOPC's Executive Manager of Policy effective
- 14 October the second, 2023.
- 15 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Mr. Chair.
- 16 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Commissioner Banks.
- 17 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Can I ask the secretary a
- 18 questions if you don't mind? In about a week's time, will
- 19 you be able to have a little information on them? Madam
- 20 Secretary in about a week's time.
- MS. SHAH: Through the Chair. What's been requested
- 22 is details around what Chief Investigator and I have seen
- 23 as inconsistencies and questions that have come up from
- 24 an administrative perspective in the roles. Certainly, we
- 25 can provide in the next week or so. Information around



- 1 that. I do want to be clear that that is a report out of
- 2 again, administrative inconsistencies that we've seen.
- 3 Really it is not intended to influence this vote.
- 4 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: To that point the awareness of
- 5 inconsistencies does not mean that those inconsistencies
- 6 are responsible for either of these employees. Again,
- 7 that's why the only medium that can really get to what I
- 8 think you're looking for is the conclusion of these
- 9 investigations. But unfortunately, we can't set a time
- 10 limit on when those investigations will be done. Vice-
- 11 Chair Holley.
- 12 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Mr. Chair.
- 13 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Vice-Chair Holley.
- 14 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioner Banks for other
- 15 commissioners. We had an executive meeting. In that
- 16 meeting-
- 17 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Microphone.
- 18 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: We had a meeting with HR. HR had
- 19 no problem with us restoring them, or all the way around.
- 20 We could do either. There's no problem with HR. We
- 21 checked it with HR and as a commissioner, I would like to
- 22 thank if you made the motion. I'd be confident if you
- 23 made the motion, I would basically support that and
- 24 expect that. I would not have this motion if I'm thinking
- 25 there is something there that basically would embarrass



- 1 this Board or embarrassed this city. I'm saying HR has
- 2 indicated to us, there's no problem with going one way or
- 3 the other.
- 4 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Again, that is not a matter of
- 5 a meeting that we had with HR. That's a matter of the
- 6 documents that you have in your binder right now. That
- 7 comes from HR as well as from the law department.
- 8 Commissioner Bell, and then Commissioner Burton.
- 9 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Then me.
- 10 COMMISSIONER BELL: Mr. Chairman, I just want to
- 11 remind the Board, there was no evidence or any wrongdoing
- 12 or concerns on the board secretary or the past Chair in
- 13 reference to this matter. Also, corporation Council
- 14 Mallard, we just revisit his report that we acted
- 15 improperly. It was no basic to act. He wanted us to
- 16 reinstate her back quite some time ago. So this, we
- 17 cannot talk about postponement. This is the proper time
- 18 to rectify a situation that the Chair took without
- 19 support of the Board. Thank you.
- 20 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: I want to be clear that
- 21 statement that there were no concerns is not completely
- 22 accurate because there are two investigations ongoing
- 23 right now. Right. At the same time, the law department's
- 24 opinion was that it was inappropriate as a matter of
- 25 procedure.



- 1 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Correct.
- 2 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Not that there wasn't a basis
- 3 for the suspensions, but how it was done by the former
- 4 Chair. The law department said it was inappropriate as a
- 5 result, they said to rectify that we should bring them
- 6 back so that that is accurate. But it was not a matter of
- 7 no basis for it. It was the procedure. Commissioner
- 8 Burton.
- 9 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair. I'd like to
- 10 amend the motion by moving that we eliminate the Policy
- 11 Manager position entirely because you have a very strong
- 12 policy subcommittee where we actually have attorney Linda
- 13 Bernard, who's now chairing, and I was the past Chair of
- 14 that. So we actually got some things that's actually
- 15 working here on the Board.
- 16 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Commissioner Burton, that
- 17 amendment is out of order. It's not in germane to the
- 18 motion that's on the floor. That would be a separate
- 19 motion.
- 20 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: However, the
- 21 commissioner could offer it as a substitute motion.
- 22 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I'd like to offer that as a
- 23 substitute motion.
- 24 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Is there a second? The
- 25 substitute motion to eliminate the BOPC executive manager



- 1 position completely.
- 2 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Second. It makes it a very
- 3 clean process.
- 4 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Alright, it been properly
- 5 moved and second. Is there any discussion on the
- 6 substituted motion? Hearing no discussion, let's take a
- 7 roll call vote. All those in favor. Secretary Shah.
- 8 MS. SHAH: Thank you, Mr. Chair.
- 9 MS. SHAH: Chair QuanTez Pressley No.
- 10 MS. SHAH: Vice-Chair Jim Holley No.
- 11 MS. SHAH: Commissioner Linda Benard Yes.
- 12 MS. SHAH: Commissioner Cedric Banks No.
- 13 MS. SHAH: Commissioner Willie Bell No.
- 14 MS. SHAH: Commissioner Willie Burton Yes.
- 15 MS. SHAH: Commissioner Lisa Carter No.
- 16 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Alright, that's 5 = Yes, 2 =
- 17 Nos. So that motion fails. Sorry. 5 = Nos, 2 = Yeses.
- 18 That motion fails. So is the substitute motion an
- 19 amendment? Do we go back to the original motion that was
- 20 there?
- 21 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: Yes, Mr. Chair.
- 22 You go back.
- 23 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: So we are now back to the
- 24 original motion that has been moved to restore Melanie
- 25 White to full duty as executive manage of Policy. Any



- 1 further discussion? Commissioner Banks.
- 2 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Right here.
- 3 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Mr. Chair, can we postpone this
- 4 to next week and maybe then the Madam Secretary may have
- 5 a little clarity for us.
- 6 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Is that a substituted motion?
- 7 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: No, sir. That
- 8 motion is higher ranking than the main motion.
- 9 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Okay. So is there a second?
- 10 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: Postpone
- 11 requires a second. It is debatable. If the motion to
- 12 postpone is adopted, then this matter would be under next
- 13 week's agenda as unfinished business.
- 14 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Finish business. Okay. So
- 15 there's been a motion that is made to postpone this to
- 16 next week's meeting. Is there a second?
- 17 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I'll second it because
- 18 information is what we need.
- 19 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Right. There you go.
- 20 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: That's what you all said last
- 21 time. Information is coming now. We're doing this again,
- 22 but it's been properly moved and second. So is there any
- 23 discussion?
- 24 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Can I make amendment? Another
- 25 amendment?



- 1 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: There's a proposed amendment
- 2 to the motion to postpone. I'll hear your proposed
- 3 amendment.
- 4 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Thank you, Mr. Chair.
- 5 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: The amendment
- 6 has to be germane to the motion to postpone.
- 7 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Correct.
- 8 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: It can't be
- 9 part of the main motion.
- 10 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Could it be amendment to
- 11 postpone for a closed-door session for that? So we can
- 12 have that party present, allow them to argue their case,
- 13 allow colleagues to raise questions as well. Would that
- 14 be appropriate?
- 15 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: Yes, sir. It
- 16 would be. Mr. Chair, if the commissioner wants to amend
- 17 the motion by adding for a closed-door session, that
- 18 amendment would be in order. But you have to vote on that
- 19 amendment.
- 20 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Now the only thing about that,
- 21 oh, I guess I'll do that in discussion. So that's been
- 22 the motion. That's the amended motion. Is there a second?
- 23 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Second.
- 24 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Linda, what's wrong?
- 25 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Is there a discussion. All



- 1 right. So the discussion that I have is that we have
- 2 attempted to handle this matter in closed session
- 3 previously, but was opined that these matters does not
- 4 fit under a closed session. Is that a Correct
- 5 description, Secretary Shah.
- 6 MS. SHAH: That is the direction that has come from
- 7 the law department before. There are very specific
- 8 guidelines for going into closed door session according
- 9 to the OMA. So those guidelines would have to be pursued
- 10 before the board can successfully do that.
- 11 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: If going into
- 12 closed session on this matter would be a violation of
- 13 OMA, the OMA would be the higher-ranking opinion. The OMA
- 14 does restrict closed sessions of a public body to certain
- 15 specific events. So that is a legal question that is not
- 16 in my play pen.
- 17 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Yeah. So I guess that motion
- 18 has been made. So let's vote on that motion, noting that
- 19 it may not be legal according to the Open Meetings Act.
- 20 COMMISSIONER BURTON: That's why we need attorney.
- 21 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: So all those in favor of
- 22 postponing-
- 23 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: Amending the
- 24 motion to add closed session.
- 25 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Okay. All of those were in



- 1 favor of amending the motion to postpone with the
- 2 addition of a closed session.
- 3 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: No, sir. You're
- 4 voting on the amendment, which is to add closed session.
- 5 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: The amendment to postpone.
- 6 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: Yeah. But
- 7 you're not voting on the motion to postpone, you're
- 8 voting on the amendment, which is to make it a closed
- 9 session.
- 10 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Yes, to the motion to
- 11 postpone. I'm just trying to be clear about what we are
- 12 amending to.
- 13 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: You're not
- 14 voting the motion to postpone.
- 15 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: I got that.
- 16 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: You're voting
- 17 on the motion to have-
- 18 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: A closed session to the
- 19 postponement. So this is about the closed session. So all
- 20 those in favor of having a closed session around this
- 21 matter, please signify by saying aye.
- 22 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
- 23 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Roll call vote, please.
- 24 MS. SHAH: Chair QuanTez Pressley No.
- 25 MS. SHAH: Vice-Chair Jim Holley No.



- 1 MS. SHAH: Commissioner Linda Bernard Yes.
- 2 MS. SHAH: Commissioner Cedric Banks Yes.
- 3 MS. SHAH: Commissioner Willie Bell No.
- 4 MS. SHAH: Commissioner Willie Burton Yes.
- 5 MS. SHAH: Commissioner Lisa Carter No.
- 6 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: All right. That was 3 = Yes
- 7 and 4 = Nos.
- 8 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: You're back to
- 9 the motion.
- 10 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: So that motion failed. So now
- 11 we're back to the original motion to postpone to next
- 12 week's meeting. I think discussion has been exhausted.
- 13 We're ready for the question.
- 14 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I think it was related to
- 15 Commissioner Banks's request that the staff come back
- 16 with their limited review.
- 17 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Right.
- 18 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: So the motion to postpone so
- 19 that the staff can come back with further information
- 20 relative to these employment conditions.
- 21 COMMISSIONERS: Correct.
- 22 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Is there any discussion? Yes,
- 23 Vice-Chair Holley.
- 24 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Commissioners, especially to
- 25 you, she's already told you there's no value to this



- 1 discussion. She has nothing that's going to add or
- 2 subtract the Secretary in terms of having a discussion
- 3 about this. This matter is basically just our matter, not
- 4 the Secretary and not the Chief Officer. She already
- 5 indicated she has nothing to add to this. I paraphrase a
- 6 little bit, but she's not adding anything to this.
- 7 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: He didn't say-
- 8 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Through the Chair.
- 9 Commissioner Banks.
- 10 COMMISSIONER: Can I go first?
- 11 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Commissioner Banks.
- 12 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Doctor. You know, I love you,
- 13 man.
- 14 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: I love you back.
- 15 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Now let me say this. She's
- 16 bringing something though. She's bringing something for
- 17 us. We got nothing right now.
- 18 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: That is not true. You have a
- 19 legal opinion, you have an HR opinion, and you have your
- 20 own position on whether or not you believe that they will
- 21 be valuable coming back or not.
- 22 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Who do we have though? I'm
- 23 talking about as far as in writing.
- 24 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: We don't have-
- 25 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: It's in your-



- 1 COMMISSIONER BANKS: That's what I'm talking about.
- 2 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: It's in your-
- 3 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Oh, in here?
- 4 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Yes, sir. Yes, sir.
- 5 Commissioner Bernard.
- 6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Just simply. We have a new
- 7 board secretary. She's had an opportunity to look at our
- 8 operations and see where our strengths are, where our
- 9 weaknesses are. We have a new investigator who has done
- 10 both of them actually a phenomenal job in showing us so
- 11 very many weaknesses we have been working under. To have
- 12 them come back with a specific report about this issue
- 13 and about these positions is very important to us. It
- 14 doesn't hurt us at all. Information is power and we don't
- 15 have it. I think everyone in this room can reach a
- 16 consensus about many of these issues. There is just a big
- 17 difference. There's an A and a B and she's the one that
- 18 has all the documents upstairs and the history of what
- 19 happened when she walked in. We haven't heard any of
- 20 that.
- 21 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Yes. So again, to that point,
- 22 the Secretary has done an amazing job at bringing that
- 23 information to the Board each week. Every time something
- 24 has been found, there's been an inconsistency she has
- 25 brought it to this Board in her secretary's report. In



- 1 addition to that, hold on, let me finish. In addition to
- 2 that our Chief Investigator, even today, brought to our
- 3 attention that there were some cases that were found that
- 4 were closed without any investigation or signatures. So
- 5 we have that information, but what they can't say is, is
- 6 that that was the responsibility of either Melanie White
- 7 or Akbar.
- 8 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: The Secretary's files are
- 9 currently locked up in the conference room upstairs. She
- 10 can go over those files. When she came, all of the
- 11 personnel files had been removed and now the whole room
- 12 is locked up. We can't use the conference room because
- 13 those files are in there. A summary or review of those
- 14 files and a report to us is important.
- 15 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Any further question?
- 16 Commissioner Bell or comment rather. Commissioner Bell.
- 17 COMMISSIONER BELL: Mr. Chairman, in six months,
- 18 nothing is materialized from the staff in reference to
- 19 this matter. IG is still working on this matter, and you
- 20 have a legal opinion in writing. Commissioner Holley
- 21 indicated to you, HR, the legal, it was badly handled. So
- 22 what information do you need any further?
- COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Stats that are signed, giving
- 24 people raises, things like that? Not by the Board Chair.
- 25 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Alright. Is there any further



- 1 discussion on the motion to postpone this the next week
- 2 meeting so that the staff might have an opportunity to
- 3 provide some more information to help you all make this
- 4 decision. Hearing on discussion, let's vote. Roll call on
- 5 the motion to postpone to next week's meeting.
- 6 MS. SHAH: Chair QuanTez Pressley No.
- 7 MS. SHAH: Vice-Chair Jim Holley No.
- 8 MS. SHAH: Commissioner Linda Bernard Yes.
- 9 MS. SHAH: Commissioner Cedric Banks Yes.
- 10 MS. SHAH: Commissioner Willie Bell No.
- 11 MS. SHAH: Commissioner Willie Burton Yes.
- 12 MS. SHAH: Commissioner Lisa Carter No.
- 13 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Alright. With 3 = Yes votes
- 14 and 4 = No votes, that motion to postpone has failed. Now
- 15 we're back to the very original motion, which was to
- 16 restore Melanie White to her full duty as BOPC Executive
- 17 Manager of Policy effective October the second 2023.
- 18 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair.
- 19 CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Move to question.
- 20 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: The question has been called,
- 21 is there a second?
- 22 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I'd like to.
- 23 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: It has been properly moved and
- 24 second. Although is debate on question?
- 25 PARLIAMENTARIAN DR. FRANCIS JACKSON: No.



- 1 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: All those in favor please
- 2. signify by saying aye.
- 3 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
- CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: All those opposed? Alright, 4
- the question has been called. We'll move directly to the 5
- vote on the motion to restore Melanie White to her full 6
- duty as Executive manager of Policy.
- COMMISSIONER BANKS: You got an oppose right here. I 8
- oppose it.
- CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Okay. Your opposition has been 10
- marked and two thirds has been secured until the motion 11
- 12 passes. Now again, we are too the hour.
- 13 COMMISSIONER: Look, I think they're calling,
- 14 Commissioner Bernard. Someone's calling.
- 15 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: We're now moving to the motion
- 16 to allow Melanie White to be restored to her full duty as
- 17 Executive Manager of Policy.
- CHAIRPERSON HOLLEY: Linda, he's asking to move it so 18
- we'll have no quorum. It's not that important. It's not 19
- that important. 20
- CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Point of order. Are you going 21
- 22 to be in the room or not? Right. So with two
- commissioners leaving the room. 23
- COMMISSIONER BANKS: You still got a quorum. 24
- CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Obfuscating their 25
