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What is the current need in Detroit's early childhood care landscape?



37,000

Detroit children ages 0-5 have parents who are participating in the workforce and need access to child care (of the ~52,000 children 0-5 in Detroit)



21,500

The number of children 0-5 that Detroit's childcare ecosystem currently has the capacity to serve



15,500

The number of seats that need to be added to Detroit's 0-5 childcare ecosystem to meet the current need



+ 12,000




The number of parents unable to fully engage in the workforce due to lack of adequate childcare

*When taking into account families who may need care due to circumstances beyond workforce participation (i.e. schooling) and the licensed classrooms that are not open due to staffing shortages, this number is even higher. According to the IFF's 2017 early childhood landscape analysis, *Building a Better System*, the actual seat gap could be as high as 28,000 in the city of Detroit alone.

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Helpful Child Care Definitions

Term	Definition
<p><u>Child Care Center</u></p> 	<p>A facility, other than a private residence, receiving 1 or more children under 13 years of age for care for periods of less than 24 hours a day, where the parents or guardians are not immediately available to the child. Child care center includes a facility that provides care for not less than 2 consecutive weeks, regardless of the number of hours of care per day.</p>
<p><u>Family Day Care Home</u></p> 	<p>An accessory use to a private home in which 1 but fewer than 7 minor children are received for care and supervision for compensation for periods of less than 24 hours a day, unattended by a parent or legal guardian, except children related to an adult member of the household. Family day care home includes a home in which care is given to an unrelated minor child for more than 4 weeks during a calendar year. A family day care home does not include an individual providing babysitting services for another individual.</p>
<p><u>Group Day Care Home</u></p> 	<p>An accessory use to a private home in which more than 6 but not more than 12 minor children are given care and supervision for periods of less than 24 hours a day unattended by a parent or legal guardian, except children related to an adult member of the household. Group day care home includes a home in which care is given to an unrelated minor child for more than 4 weeks during a calendar year. Group day care home includes a private home with increased capacity.</p>

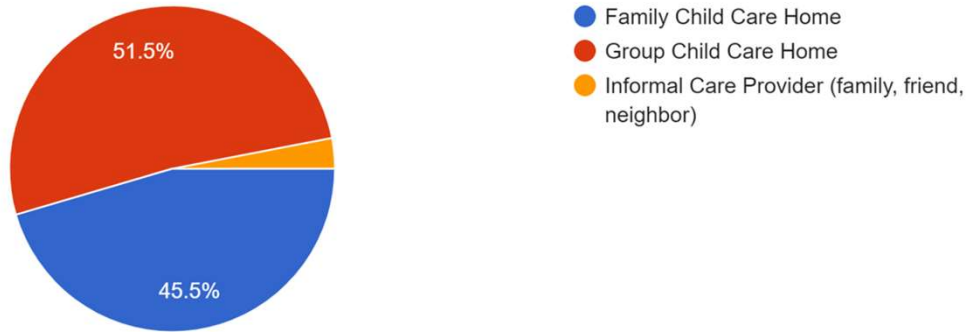

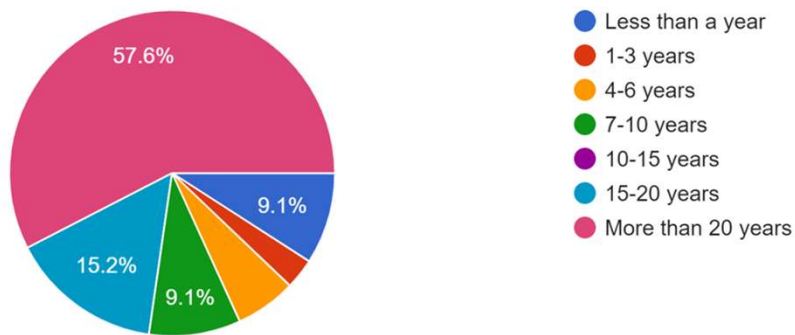

How long have you been caring for children other than your own?

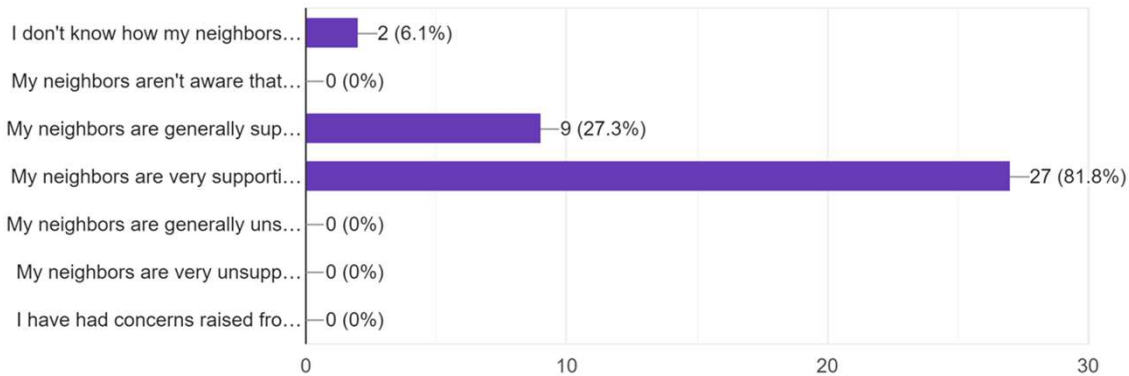

My neighbors recommended my services to others

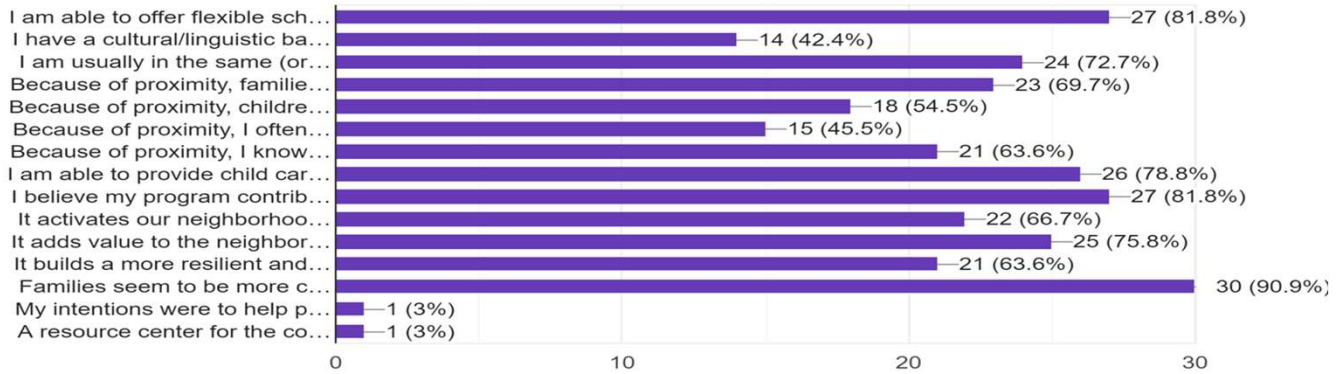

Because of the proximity of the families it unites the neighborhood. We look out for each other. The neighbors always make sure the children and myself are good.

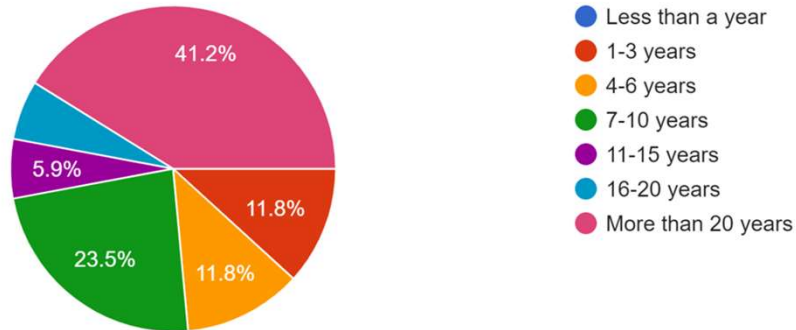

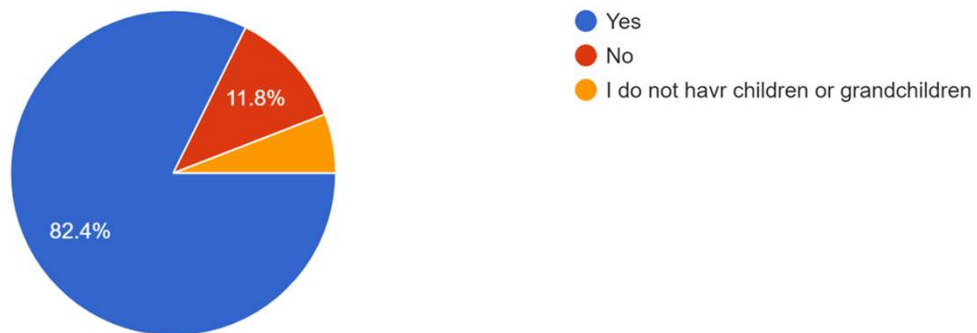


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Community Impact Survey-Neighbor Perspective

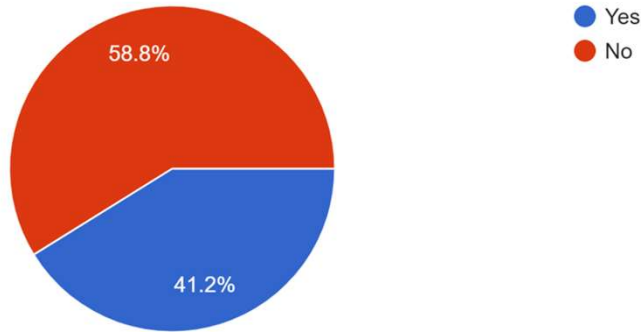


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Community Impact Survey-Neighbor Perspective

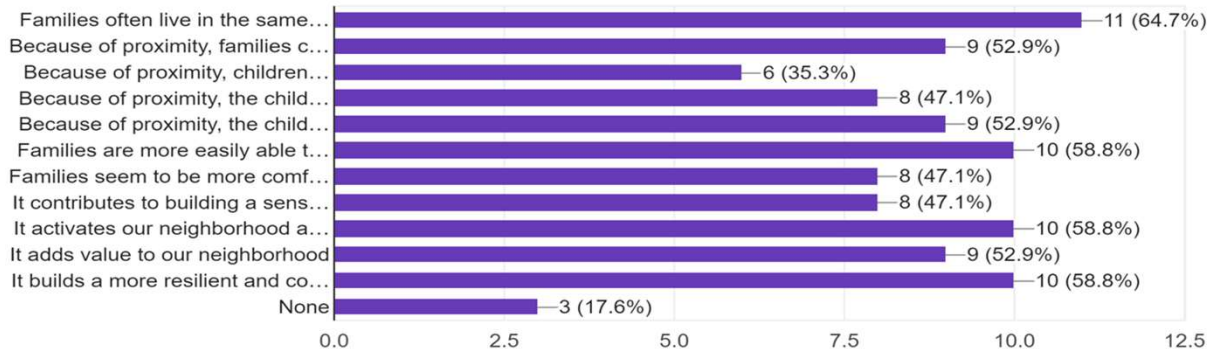

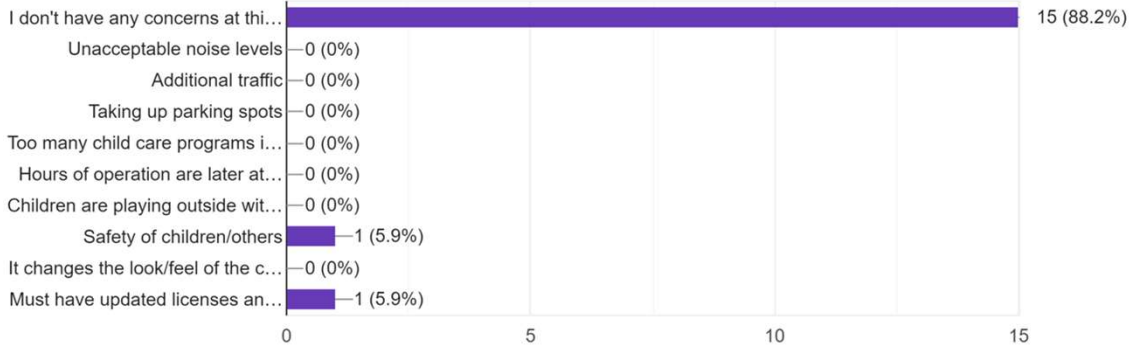

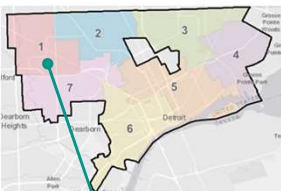
Are there any concerns you have/or have experienced when there is a child care program in the heart of your neighborhood? Check all that apply:

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District 1 Overview: Northwest Detroit Brightmoor, Grandmont, Rosedale, Old Redford

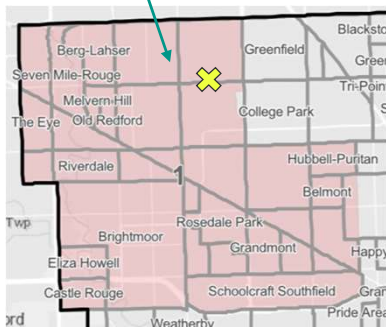

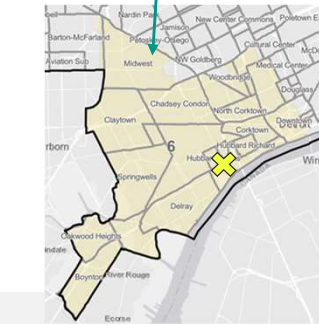
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District 6 Overview: Southwest Detroit Corktown, Westside Industrial, Chadsey

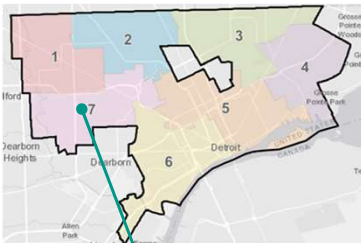
