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3 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Good evening, everyone. It is
4 now 6:30. I call this session to the Detroit Board of
5 Police Commissioners meeting to order. So grateful to be
6 here at New Providence Baptist Church. And so we'll begin
7 this meeting with a word of invocation by the great
8 leader here, the Executive Associate Pastor here,
9 Reverend Booker, who will provide us with some words of
10 welcome as well as invocation.

11 REVEREND BOOKER: Thank you so much. Good evening,
12 everyone. We welcome you to the New Providence Baptist
13 Church. On behalf of our pastor, Dr. Everett Jennings
14 Senior, the administrators, and the entire congregation
15 at large, we welcome you and thank you for being here. Be
16 at home. As this meeting takes place, we want you to feel
17 welcome, and we just want to welcome you again to New
18 Providence Baptist Church. Please bow your heads for a
19 word of prayer. Father, we thank you for this day. We
20 thank you for this occasion. Lord, we pray that you will
21 come and be in this meeting. Bless the agenda. We thank
22 you for the elected officials. We ask that you continue
23 to keep them and all other public servants, Lord that are
24 here tonight. Lord, let this agenda go off smoothly. Let
25 this meeting be able to voice our concerns, and you will

1 get the glory for the safety and protection of the City
2 of Detroit and even this district. We ask it in Jesus'
3 name. Amen.

4 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Amen. Thank you so very much
5 for your warm words of welcome as well as your powerful
6 invocation. According to my math we don't quite yet have
7 a quorum, so we'll move forward with our amended agenda
8 which will allow us to receive reports from our staff.
9 And so we'll go from the bottom up, Secretary Shah. Let's
10 begin first with announcements and then your report.

11 MS. SHAH: Thank you, Mr. Chair. For announcements,
12 the next Board of Police Commissioner's meeting is
13 Thursday, November 16th at 3:00 PM at Detroit Public
14 Safety Headquarters. And the next community meeting will
15 be Thursday, December 14th at 6:30 PM. The Third Precinct
16 will be hosting at Constantine Recreation Center in the
17 auditorium, 8904 Woodward Avenue in Detroit. For the
18 November committee meetings that are scheduled. The
19 policy committee is scheduled to meet on Tuesday,
20 November 21st at 5:00 PM and the Citizen Complaints
21 Committee is scheduled to meet on Tuesday, November 28th
22 at 5:00 PM.

23 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. I do see
24 Commissioner Burton making his way to the table and that
25 would provide us a quorum. And so with that, we will go

1 to our introduction of commissioners with Secretary Shah.

2 MS. SHAH: Thank you, Mr. Chair.

3 MS. SHAH: Chair, QuanTez Pressley - Here.

4 MS. SHAH: Vice Chair, Jim Holly submitted an excused
5 absence.

6 MS. SHAH: Commissioner Tamara Liberty Smith -
7 Present.

8 MS. SHAH: Commissioner Linda Bernard - Attorney
9 Linda Bernard, District 2. Welcome everyone and excuse my
10 glasses. I have an eye infection.

11 MS. SHAH: Commissioner Cedric Banks, submit an
12 excused absence.

13 MS. SHAH: Commissioner Willie Bell - Present,
14 District 4.

15 MS. SHAH: Commissioner Willie Burton - Present. On
16 behalf of the men and women of District 5.

17 MS. SHAH: Commissioner Lisa Carter -

18 MS. SHAH: Commissioner Ricardo Moore - Present.
19 Representing District 7, the home team tonight.

20 MS. SHAH: Commissioner Jesus Hernandez -

21 MS. SHAH: Commissioner Rory Gamble submitted an
22 excused absence.

23 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Alright. And so with that, we
24 do have a quorum. And so with that quorum, we'll now move
25 to the approval of the November 9th, 2023 agenda. Is

1 there any objection to the approval of that agenda?
2 Hearing none, the agenda will be approved. Now we'll move
3 on to the approval of the minutes for November the
4 second, 2023. Is there any objection to the approval of
5 the minutes? Hearing no objection, those minutes will be
6 approved. Last week we held a closed session, and so now
7 the Chair will entertain a motion to approve the minutes
8 from the closed session of November 2nd, 2023.

9 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: So moved and support.

10 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: It's been properly moved and
11 seconded. All those in favor please signify by saying,
12 Aye.

13 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

14 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: All those who oppose name? No,
15 the Ayes have it. And so with that, we will now move on
16 to the introduction of BOPC Staff, Chief of Police,
17 elected officials and representatives as well as
18 community leaders by Secretary Shah.

19 MS. SHAH: Thank you, Mr. Chair. For BOPC staff, we
20 have Chief Investigator Jerome Warfield joining by Zoom.
21 We have present today also Ms. Theresa Blossom, Ms. Jonya
22 Underwood, Ms. Jasmine Taylor, Mr. Robert Brown and Ms.
23 Candace Hayes is joining by Zoom. The American Sign
24 Language Interpreters today are Ms. Yakata and Dr.
25 Stephanie Beatty. We also have present today DPD HR

1 Director Katrina Patillo. Don Handyside is the court
2 reporter today. Si and Lucas are providing video.
3 Sergeant Allan Quinn is providing audio and we also have
4 present today from OCI, Acting Supervisor, Supervising
5 Investigator Elgin Murphy. Chair, I can't see down the...
6 Do we have the Chief here today?

7 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: He's not here yet. I believe
8 DC Hayes will be here. He did mean say that he would be a
9 few minutes late.

10 MS. SHAH: Okay. Thank you. So sitting in for Chief
11 James White, we will have Deputy Chief Franklin Hayes.
12 And for elected officials and representatives, we have
13 Ms. Marie Overall from State Representative Tyrone
14 Carter's Office. Ms. LaDon Davis City Council member Fred
15 Durhal III's Office, former Commissioner William Davis
16 and Ms. Fredia Butler, Community Relations President for
17 the Second Precinct.

18 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Excellent. We are so grateful
19 for everyone's attendance. It is such an amazing turnout
20 tonight and it is our hope that it would aid to the
21 productivity of today's meeting. And in that way you have
22 an opportunity to make a contribution in today's meeting
23 in the area of public comment. So if you so desire to
24 make public comment, for those who are in the room, you
25 can fill out public comment card and give it to this

1 gentleman right here in the white sweater, Mr. Brown. And
2 those who are on the Zoom you can identify yourself on
3 that platform to make public comment. With that, we'll
4 now move on to the BOPC Officers Report where we first
5 have some recognitions and appreciation. We will start
6 with the commissioner who represents this area, none
7 other than Commissioner Moore. And I would be remiss if I
8 didn't say one of the commissioners who represents this
9 area as Commissioner Burton represents this area as well.

10 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Well, it's actually Commissioner
11 Smith.

12 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Well, whoever wants to take
13 credit for this amazing community?

14 COMMISSIONER MOORE: So my Sixth precinct family, I
15 just want to say good evening, and thanks for showing up
16 and showing out like you always do. This meeting tonight,
17 and I'm sure that folks who have passed around the city
18 this year will tell you this is probably the well-
19 attended meeting, citywide this year, 2023. So give
20 yourselves a hand because I truly appreciate you. I want
21 to also say thank you to Jonya Underwood, Board Secretary
22 Shah and Sergeant Lee Brown for helping put this
23 presentation together. It's not easy trying to figure out
24 who to honor, who not to honor, but guess what? You
25 picked each other. So that made it just a little bit

1 easier.

2 So without further ado, let's get it started. We

20 Wallace. Two more names. Angie Webb. And last but not
21 least, Sarah West. Congratulations to everyone. We so
22 appreciate you. Thank you.

23 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Well, now my cheekbones have
24 gotten an extra workout, unexpectedly, but what a reason
25 to smile for such an engaged community that's truly

1 making a difference for all the residents in this area.
2 And I think that Commissioner Moore has just unlocked a
3 secret. The way you get the people to turn out to the
4 meetings, is to give them an award of appreciation.
5 Brilliant.

6 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Which precinct turned out
7 anyway, Mr. Chairman?

8 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Duly noted, and second.

9 COMMISSIONER MOORE: And the Second Precinct.

10 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Alright. So with that, we also
11 have a recognition for our youth advisory panel. And that
12 we'll be provided by Commissioner Carter, who we should
13 note has joined us as well as Ms. Blossom. Commissioner
14 Carter?

15 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you, Mr. Chair. It's been
16 my honor to work with former Police Commissioner Annie
17 Holt, as well as staff and others to create a youth group
18 to work with the board and ensure the voices of young
19 Detroiters are heard regularly and have impact. So last
20 year we, the Detroit Board of Police Commissioners voted
21 unanimously and approved a resolution to create a youth
22 advisory panel.

23 Thanks to the hard and fast work of the staff, as
24 well as other police commissioners, the first youth
25 advisory panel met November 8th, 2022. Our youth advisory

1 panel is now one year old. Tonight, we want to recognize
2 the historic first members and their service during the
3 last year. So as I call your name, would you please stand
4 and come to the podium? Alexis Scuttle, Kiara Johnson. I
5 think she's on... is she on Zoom? She's on Zoom. Perielle
6 Pace, Alana Spencer and Angelica Williams. Those of you
7 that are present, please stand and come to the podium.

8 These youth had their say on all policies and issues
9 that came before the board during the last year and often
10 before our nation. Facial recognition, license plates,
11 readers, fatal police use of force investigation, just to
12 name a few. So, Alexis, Perielle, Alana, and Angelica, we
13 present you with this certificate of appreciation for
14 serving in an inaugural as an inaugural member for the
15 first youth advisory panel for the City of Detroit Board
16 of Police Commissioners. Your outstanding contributions
17 have advanced civilian oversight of law enforcement and
18 police community relations. Mr. Chair, at this time I
19 would like to pause and give the youth advisory panel
20 their certificate.

21 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Please do.

22 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Alright, thank you.

23 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: We are so grateful for your
24 trailblazing service for the Detroit Board of Police
25 Commission.

1 COMMISSIONER CARTER: There's one more. Just face
2 this camera. Oh, face that way. Okay. Thank you.

3 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Great job for putting this
4 together. Great job of putting this youth program
5 together, Commissioner Carter.

6 COMMISSIONER CARTER: So thank you Mr. Chair. Now I
7 would like to welcome 11 new members of the panel that we
8 affectionately call YAP. Going into 2024 YAP will cover
9 all of our districts and most DPD precincts. So they are
10 very diverse and representative of Detroit. So I ask that
11 the returning members and the new members, please stand
12 up where you are to take the YAP pledge, wherever you
13 are. All right, thank you. The names are here, the
14 members of...

15 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: All right. And so all of our
16 new members, please raise your right hand and repeat
17 after me. I say your name, I mean your real name. No, I'm
18 just pulling, pledge to fulfill the responsibilities of
19 the youth advisory panel with integrity, cooperation, and
20 diligence. I pledge to work with respect of the opinion
21 of my fellow members and to follow approved decisions to
22 carry out the panel's, missions, goals, and activities. I
23 pledge always to represent the panel in a positive and
24 supportive manner in the community, and with members and
25 staff of the Board of Police Commissioners, police

1 departments, and other city agencies. Congratulations.

2 Thank you for your contribution.

3 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Mr. Chair, one last request.

4 We'd like to get a group photo real quick.

5 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Group photo, will you all

6 please come to the front for a photograph for this manner

7 of record.

8 COMMISSIONER CARTER: And while they're coming to the

9 podium, Mr. Chair, YAP meets once a month on the second

10 Wednesday on Zoom.

11 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: How about we do this? Come

12 around the table back here. You all are the advisors of

13 this great board, and you all can stand behind us as we

14 take this picture together.

15 COMMISSIONER Or come this way, come this way. It'll

16 be quicker. Come on. Oh, you're taking a picture?

17 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Once again, congratulations.

18 And as close as you are to these seats, it's an

19 indication of your future. We look forward to you

20 replacing us. Thank you.

21 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Mr. Chair. I just wanted to

22 reiterate that the YAP meets once each month on the

23 second Wednesday on Zoom. So those who missed tonight's

24 meeting will take their pledge at the December meeting

25 and the board will continue to get reports and updates

1 from you and the panel. Thank you, Mr. Chair.

2 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. Our last BOPC's
3 Officer Report is relative to the fact that we're excited
4 that now the board is fully staffed, well fully
5 positioned now with our most recent member, Rory Gamble.
6 We look forward to welcoming him at our next meeting. And
7 we are in great anticipation and expectation of the
8 productivity that this board can now have, now that we
9 are fully staffed. With, that are there any other
10 questions or comments under the Board of Police
11 Commission's officer's report? Hearing none, we'll now
12 move to our Community Impact Report by Chief Investigator
13 Warfield.

14 MR. WARFIELD: To the Chair. My apologies for not
15 being able to be there in person, but I a little bit
16 under the weather, but I certainly wanted to still make
17 this report. And before I get into the presentation that
18 will appear on your screen...

19 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: One second. Is there a way
20 that we can increase that volume? It's a bit hard to
21 hear.

22 MR. WARFIELD: Testing 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8.

23 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Okay that's good. Thank you.
24 Go right ahead.

25 MR. WARFIELD: Alright, thank you. Through the Chair.

1 I wanted to, again, I want to thank Secretary Shah for
2 just outstanding support that she gives the Office of the
3 Chief Investigator and certainly to this wonderful board
4 for your support as well. Commissioner Hernandez always
5 encourages us to make sure that we are ready to handle
6 citizens who may have language barriers or other
7 barriers. And this week was a prime example. We had
8 someone come in who was hearing impaired, who needed to
9 file a complaint, and certainly we want to thank the
10 Mayor's Office. We want to thank Civil Rights Office as
11 well. We were able to service that person through Zoom in
12 our office with an interpreter. And so I'm very, very
13 proud to the investigators, Investigator Miser,
14 Investigator Counts who did an excellent job in setting
15 it up for us.

16 It was a walk-in citizen, and we were able to take
17 care of it. So just very proud of the team that we have
18 behind us at Office of the Chief Investigator. Alright,
19 so my report for tonight is I want to do a couple things.
20 One, I want to talk about some tools, just one tool that
21 we use to facilitate some of our investigations. And then
22 secondly, of course, I want to go over the numbers as it
23 relates to our productivity and what we do and how we do
24 it. So I just ask for your undivided attention as we move
25 forward. Next slide, please?

1 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Well, commissioners, you can
2 find his presentation after tab five. Go right ahead.

3 MR. WARFIELD: Thank you, sir. The mission of our
4 office is again to fairly effectively and objectively
5 receive, investigate, and make recommendations regarding
6 complaints concerning the Detroit Police Department and
7 its personnel. And it is the goal of OCI to assist in
8 improving the quality of law enforcement services by
9 instilling citizen confidence in the integrity of the
10 Detroit Police Department. Next slide, please? Tonight,
11 this is one of the tools that we use to help us in our
12 investigation. And this is representative of the body-
13 worn camera that officers use as they're out in the field
14 working. The top picture that you see there is actually
15 one that is properly displayed on an officer's chest. And
16 then the picture that you see at the bottom, that is the
17 mounted unit that goes in the car and that stays in the
18 car. Next picture please, next slide, please.

19 So the question is, who is required to wear body
20 worn camera footage? Well, according to DPD policy, all
21 sworn members at body worn camera equipped commands who
22 have citizen interactions in the daily performances of
23 their duty are mandated to wear body worn cameras, unless
24 an exception is specified in this directive. And so, when
25 are body worn cameras activated? Except as otherwise

1 provided in the directive, the body-worn camera shall be
2 activated prior to initiating or soonest practical after
3 initiating the following police actions. And we'll go
4 over those actions in a minute. But I'm going to talk
5 about when can a body-worn camera be deactivated? And
6 this is one of the things we'll talk about a little bit
7 more in a second here. But if a member purposefully
8 deactivates their body-worn camera without justified
9 calls, they may be subject to disciplinary action. And
10 what we mean by that is members are instructed to not
11 deactivate their body-worn cameras until that scene has
12 cleared until they have left the scene. Next slide,
13 please?

14 So, why shall members activate their body-worn
15 cameras members shall activate their body-worn cameras,
16 to record all significant contacts with citizens, which
17 are or could be reasonably determined as pertinent
18 regarding the performance of their official law
19 enforcement duties. So in these situations, so when we
20 say significant contacts, what is a significant contact?
21 It is calls for service, vehicle stops execution of
22 search and or arrest warrants, citizens encounters, which
23 necessitate police involvement. Those are some of the
24 things that they have to record. And once activated, the
25 body-worn camera shall remain on and, again, that event

1 is completed in order to ensure the integrity of the
2 recording. And then finally, failure to activate body-
3 worn camera footage.

4 If a member knowingly fails to activate his or her
5 body-worn camera, or if the member determines that the
6 body-worn camera failed to activate, in other words, due
7 to a technological malfunction, the member shall document
8 on their daily detail log why the recording was not made.
9 So we had talked a lot about, this board has talked a lot
10 about the importance of body-worn camera footage, and we
11 follow the policy very strictly when we are investigating
12 these cases to make sure that if, for whatever reason we
13 don't have body-worn camera footage, that is documented
14 in the officer's daily detail. And if it's not
15 documented, then we do sustain the officer for that. Next
16 slide, please?

17 So, how are body-worn cameras triggered to activate?
18 So there are few areas that actually the body-worn
19 cameras will come on automatically. If the police cruiser
20 reaches a certain speed and that speed in Detroit is 90
21 to 95 miles an hour, then the cameras automatically come
22 on. Another way that they are triggered is that if the
23 back doors of the cruiser opens because there are cameras
24 inside the car as well that record the back seat and the
25 front, those activate the camera as well, when the back

1 doors are open. When you have the emergency lights to
2 come on, or the siren to come on, the cameras are
3 activated. And then also, if there's hard braking, if
4 there's like a hard stop to the vehicle, the cameras are
5 activated. Next slide, please? And before I go into the
6 numbers, I want to thank certainly the Chief's office,
7 Deputy Chief Blitz.

8 Also want to thank from the "DO IT" team, Mr.
9 Melinder for answering some of the questions that I had
10 and put in that part of my presentation together. And so
11 thank you. I want to deal with now the numbers, some of
12 the statistics that we have for October of 2023. As you
13 see in your file before you, we have a total of 1,323
14 open cases at OCI. Of those 1,323 cases, 450 of them are
15 within our zero to 90 day period before they reach
16 backlog status. And we have 873 cases now that are in the
17 backlog status. Now, I do want to give some definition to
18 this because that number jumps significantly by about 260
19 cases. Those are the cases that the board said that we
20 need to reopen to investigate. Those are the cases that
21 we know were closed but did not have complete
22 investigations. So we added that number to the aged
23 cases. And now our backlog number is 873. Next slide,
24 please?

25 When we look at our closed cases versus our

1 submitted cases versus investigators that we have on our
2 team that's able to do investigations, I wanted to put
3 this slide in as a point of reference so that we can see
4 before picture and the workload that we do over at OCI.
5 And you see the three teams at the bottom, Senior
6 Supervising Investigator Cromwell, Acting, Supervising
7 Investigator Murphy, and Supervising Investigator Sloan's
8 team. And so when you look at what they're able to do
9 when you look at the total cases, the total cases
10 submitted and the investigators that are available right
11 now to do cases. And when you look at the total cases
12 that have been submitted, and you look at the total cases
13 that are actually closed, you looking at about 111 cases
14 for the month of October that investigators have
15 completed their investigation and turned those cases in
16 for review.

17 In addition to that, some of those cases had
18 actually closed. Why is that important for me to point
19 that out that way? Well, it's simply because, so that you
20 know that the workload is getting done. We do some very
21 intensive reviews of these cases so that when you're
22 signing your name to that bottom line, you know that you
23 have a very thorough investigation in front of you. And
24 so there are times that we have the investigators go back
25 and revisit their findings.

1 There are times where we will you know, of course
2 consult with policy and others to make sure that what we
3 are writing in our investigations is very accurate and to
4 the point. So there are times that we have small
5 bottlenecks. And so as you know, once the investigator
6 completes their investigation, it goes to their
7 supervisor. Their supervisor then reads their
8 investigation and either sends it back for corrections or
9 they'll send it on to our quality assurance reviewers.
10 Our quality assurance reviewers then will really take a
11 fine look at that investigative report and then send it
12 to myself for final approval or for more investigation.
13 And so we have a very thorough check and balance system
14 within the office of the chief investigator. But again,
15 for the month of October, you looking at 111 cases that
16 were either submitted and or closed that month. Next
17 slide, please.

18 This slide right here, deals with the receipts
19 versus the closure versus our staffing. And the numbers
20 are pretty transparent there. And you're looking at from
21 January all the way to up to October of this year. We're
22 still at a record pace as it relates to the number of
23 cases that we are receiving that are coming into the
24 office. As it relates to the number of closed cases that
25 we're able to produce, again, we are still understaffed,

1 we're still not fully staffed.

2 We do have five new investigators who have just
3 completed their six months of being with OCI and then
4 obviously that's still a learning curve for them. And
5 they're doing a great job, by the way too. And so as they
6 are learning the craft and as they're learning what's
7 expected you know, our numbers will improve steadily and
8 greatly. When you look at the budgeted staff, our
9 budgeted staff is for 18 investigators. But we are right
10 now at 13, however, that number is really 12 because one
11 of our investigators we use on a month by month basis as
12 a quality assurance reviewer. So there are really 12 that
13 are in rotation at this particular time. And when you
14 look at OCI investigators the cases that we've closed in
15 2023, 808 cases to date that we've closed in 2023, and
16 we've received a total of 1,458 citizen complaints to
17 date. Next slide, please.

18 When we look at the total CCR allegations received
19 in October, as I think Commissioner Bell knows all too
20 well, what leads the way is procedure followed by
21 demeanor and then of course service. And those numbers
22 bear out. In the month of October, we receive 157 citizen
23 complaints in October, I'm sorry, that's an error. That
24 should be October, not September, with a total of 374
25 allegations. And as I've said before in my report, each

1 complaint that we have, or a lot of the complaints that
2 we have, have multiple allegations to it. And you can see
3 how it's broken down right there. Next slide, please.

4 This slide right here, a little busy, but it deals
5 with the allegations that are received by precinct or by
6 unit. And at the top, obviously, you see the precincts
7 and then you see the various command units as well that
8 are listed there. And you see which precincts or which
9 units you know, are trending in a good way. And you see
10 those precincts or units that are trending in a not so
11 good way. And so when we use this information to share it
12 with the department and others so that if there's any
13 training that needs to be done, the department can do
14 training in the areas that are you know, trending,
15 especially trending in a negative way. Next slide,
16 please.

17 This deals with our allegations of findings. And I
18 think Chairman, you had asked for this a few meetings
19 ago. And what this deals with is what are the results of
20 our investigations, moving forward? When you look at the
21 ones that are closed again in I think September, 2023
22 this, slide is from September of 2023. When you look at
23 those that had no charge, that was 25% of those
24 allegations that came in, unfounded was 18%, sustained
25 was 15%, our administrative closures was 14%. And last

1 time I presented, we talked about the administrative
2 closure investigation process. Exonerated was 11%,
3 inclusive was 8%, void was 8%, and duplicates were 1%.

4 Now duplicates and void is almost the same category.
5 One we catch on the front end. In other words, someone
6 hands the complaint in about the exact same situation.
7 It's pretty much the exact same complaint. The other we
8 catch later because it slipped through. But void and
9 duplicate really can be one category. And again, OCI
10 investigators closed 224 allegations in September of 2023
11 and 15 of those allegations were sustained. Next slide
12 please.

13 This is from October, the same graphic, but just
14 from October. And as you can see 9% of the allegations
15 that came in were sustained. And you see the other
16 numbers there. And so investigators closed 198
17 allegations in October. 9% of those allegations were
18 sustained. I want to say this, as I talked about the
19 body-worn camera footage early in the presentation. That
20 is just a great tool from the standpoint that it also
21 exonerates a number of officers from the complaints that
22 we get in, we're able to see the body worn camera footage
23 the tremendous job that officers are doing through that
24 tool. And so we're certainly grateful to have that tool
25 in our bag. Next slide, please.

1 This deals with allegations closed versus sustained
2 from January of 2022, all the way up through October of
3 2023. And certainly you can see the trends there and in
4 July or August of 2022 and November, December there's a
5 little bit of a breakout there. And that was because of
6 some of the efforts that were going to close some of the
7 cases there. But when you look at our sustained cases,
8 the number of cases that were sustained you can see it
9 there in that, I want to say almost the middle line
10 there. And you can see that it's fairly consistent for
11 the most part. I would say that it average out to be
12 about 10% of sustained cases for a year. Next slide,
13 please. Any questions or concerns?

14 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you for such a thorough
15 report and to do so with such resilience. We do pray that
16 you feel better quickly. But we do appreciate the report,
17 nonetheless. Any questions for Chief Investigator based
18 off of what has been presented? Commissioner Bernard.

19 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I just want to add a comment
20 for our audience. Our office receives any and all
21 complaints that you may have about police officers.
22 That's what the Office of the Chief Investigator does.
23 You call in or you send in, you can do it online or by
24 walking into a precinct. The forms are all there. If you
25 or any member of your family have an issue with respect

1 to the way a police officer conducted himself, then you
2 are welcome to come and let our office know about it. Our
3 investigators investigate it, we talk to you and you get
4 a response back. It's not just, you know, like in file 13
5 and it never comes up again. You will get a written
6 response back. It's very important to us. We, of course,
7 celebrate our police officers, but as we have been told
8 by many citizens the issue of police misconduct is what
9 we have to focus on, because in order to protect the
10 community, and we do. So, I just wanted to let you know
11 that you can do that.

12 COMMISSIONER BURTON: MR. Chair.

13 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Commissioner Burton.

14 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I just want to add to that for
15 my colleague, you know, years ago, I advocated and fought
16 for citizens' complaint forms to go on the city's
17 website, which they're located@detroitmi.gov under the
18 Board of Police Commissioner's page. And so you don't
19 necessarily have to, you know, get a citizen's complaint
20 form from our officer, or, you know, you can also have
21 the opportunity to go on the city's website@detroitmi.gov
22 under the Board of Police Commissioner's page, the
23 citizen's complaint form is there. But we also want to
24 hear good stories that you may have in the community
25 about an officer that went the extra mile. And so those

1 are good testimonials, you know that you could share with
2 the board as well. I just want you to know that as a
3 board, you know, we plan to be, you know, to be fair,
4 balanced, and your input definitely matters a lot to us.
5 Thank you.

6 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. Commissioner Bell.

7 COMMISSIONER BELL: Mr. Chairman, I think it's an
8 excellent report. I just want to remind the community
9 that the officers are concerned that sometime you are not
10 accurate in terms of your report. So by all means, keep
11 that in mind. And I agree with Commissioner Burton that
12 officers are there 24 hours, outstanding job, as you well
13 know, not just the NPOs, but the officers in that uniform
14 patrolling every day.

15 Keep that in mind that they are there for you. And I
16 know the thousand run they make, in most cases, they do
17 an excellent job. But sometime, we only hear about the
18 negative encounter, and by all means, that is our
19 function. But I do want to share with the commissioners a
20 position that has strongly been advocated by Mark Young,
21 Lieutenant Sergeant Association President. He appeared
22 for us quite some time, as you well know. So I want to
23 share this article, and there are some bad points, there
24 are some good points, but I think the commissioners need
25 to be aware because they are the sergeant, lieutenant,

1 primarily, they're supervising these officers. So I want
2 to circulate this article from the bars and strikes, not
3 bars.

4 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. Any further
5 questions or comments for Chief Investigator? This is for
6 sitting commissioners. You'll have your opportunity
7 during public comment to make your address. Any comments
8 from, or questions from commissioners? Hearing none.
9 We'll now move on to our Chief of Police report, which
10 will also be inclusive of the Sixth Precinct
11 presentation. Deputy Chief Hayes.

12 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Mr. Chair, good evening,
13 certainly to this honorable body and the residents here
14 in the community. My name is Franklin Hayes, Deputy Chief
15 of our Crime Strategies Bureau, and I will be bringing
16 you the Chief's report this evening. We want to start off
17 with our injured officers. We currently have one member
18 of the department who is out disabled and recovering at
19 home due to on-duty injuries. This officer was shot in
20 the line of duty while responding to a call in the Ninth
21 Precinct. He is still recovering. He has a long road to
22 recovery.

23 It was mentioned at last week's meeting, his heroism
24 was honored at the recent Above and Beyond awards just to
25 talk about his bravery in getting the bad people off the

1 streets. And this was his reality that he was shocked.
2 But again, he is on the mend. And please keep words of
3 encouragement thoughts and prayers if you are a religious
4 person for this officer, as he recovers. I want to share
5 some stats with you. We are certainly working hard to
6 keep our numbers down and keep our city safe. And just a
7 few categories that I'd like to share with you and keep
8 you updated on that progress.

9 Homicides last year, year-to-date, we had 263
10 homicides. This year, year-to-date, we are at 220. That's
11 43 less victims of homicide, 43 less families that have
12 been impacted negatively by homicide here in our city.
13 Our non-fatal shootings. Last year to date, we were at
14 824. This year we are at 728. That's 96 less victims of
15 non-fatal shooting in our city. Those two numbers,
16 homicide reflective of a 16% decrease non-fatal shooting,
17 reflective of a 12% decrease. And we will continue to
18 drive this number down and change behaviors and decision
19 making, as it relates to these violent gun crimes. Our
20 robberies, we continue to drive this number down as well.
21 In 2022, we had 1,212 robberies.

22 This year we had 1,214, so we're up to but we are on
23 par to address this issue. And with the same efforts that
24 we've put into driving our homicides and non-fatal
25 shootings down, we will continue our focus on robberies.

1 Carjackings. Last year, year-to-date, we had 222. This
2 year, we have 146. That is reflective of a 34% decrease
3 in carjacking. So we continue to fight crime, be where we
4 need to be to stop people from being victims, encouraging
5 others to make better decisions, whether it be conflict
6 resolution or just changing their mind that this isn't
7 the right decision to make. And we hope to continue with
8 these numbers, certainly trending favorably as we make
9 Detroit a safer city.

10 One of the areas that we continue to support are
11 those in need of mental health services. As far as calls
12 that we've responded to there are two different numbers
13 that I want to share. The first are mental health related
14 calls, which would consist of someone mental nonviolent,
15 mental violent that's armed, mental violent not armed,
16 suicide and progress and suicide threats. Last year we
17 had 1,105, I'm sorry, 11,105 calls that we responded to
18 year-to-date. This year, we are at 12,253. That's over a
19 thousand more calls, 1,148 to be exact this time this
20 year compared to this time last year. So again, we are
21 doing the best we can, leveraging our relationships, our
22 partners into mental health support community to get
23 those in need, the services that they deserve, being
24 mindful that mental health is not a crime.

25 There's another set or overdose related calls,

1 whether it's yeah, so our overdose, whether it is drug
2 overdose or one down. Last year, year-to-date, we had
3 5,344. This year we had 5,408. That's 64 additional calls
4 for that. So again, with our partnerships with DWIN and
5 so many others, we are working to get those, whether it's
6 mental health, whether it's substance abuse, whatever
7 help that is that they need, we continue to leverage
8 those relationships as we see the increase in the call
9 for the services are there, we're doing our very best to
10 get them that help. Just a few significance events I'd
11 like to update the community on. The first is a fatal
12 stabbing that, quite frankly, the entire world's eyes
13 were on the City of Detroit a few weeks back that
14 happened in the 1300 block of Joliet Place where we
15 received a call for an unresponsive individual lying on
16 the ground.

17 The emergency medical personnel later declared the
18 victim, deceased on the scene. And while at the location,
19 officers discovered a trail of blood leading them inside
20 the victim residence, where the crime is believed to have
21 occurred. An examination of the body led to discovery of
22 multiple stab wounds, and the victim was a prominent
23 community leader. Our investigators worked diligently
24 with the FBI to forensically analyze all of the
25 information obtained to ascertain the timeline that

1 ultimately led to the decedent's death, Samantha Wall. As
2 an update, yesterday a suspect was arrested. The
3 detectives and Wayne County prosecutors are currently
4 gathering additional information regarding this case and
5 working together until the investigation's conclusion. If
6 anyone still has any information, even though we do have
7 a person in custody please contact Crime Stoppers or 1800
8 Speak Up.

9 I want to talk about a felonious assault nonfatal
10 shooting that occurred on November 3rd in the 13,000
11 block of Dwyer. Officers, while en route to this location
12 were flagged down and spoke to the victim, an Uber
13 driver. The victim stated that he picked up the suspect
14 on Fenelon Street and was taking him to his home on Dwyer
15 Street when the subject pulled a handgun and struck him
16 twice in the head. The victim exited the vehicle, at
17 which point the suspect fired shots at the victim. The
18 victim, a CPL holder, produced his firearm and fired
19 shots at the suspect. The suspect escaped on foot and
20 left the location by the time the officers had arrived.
21 The victim was treated at the scene by the medics for a
22 large laceration to the side of his head. And the
23 detectives, the work began. While they were doing the
24 work, a call for service came out for the 13,000 block of
25 Dwyer for a suspect that was shot.

1 What they discovered was that the suspect who was
2 originally there was later transported to Detroit
3 Receiving Hospital. And it was there that we verified
4 that the person shot was the individual that struck the
5 Uber driver in the head. Suspect was treated in the
6 emergency room, and then from there, he was taken into
7 custody and at the detention center for processing. On
8 Sunday, November 5th a warrant was submitted to the Wayne
9 County prosecutors for review. The suspect was arraigned
10 at 36 District Court on November 6th for the following
11 charges, assault with intent to murder, assault with
12 intent to rob while armed assault with intent to do great
13 bodily harm, less than murder, weapons carrying concealed
14 assault with a dangerous weapon and felony firearms,
15 looks like habitual force.

16 A couple things going on in the community lens. At
17 the Twelfth Precinct on Tuesday, November 7th the NPOs
18 had a gun lock delivery program where they informed the
19 community through social media that we were delivering
20 gun locks right to their door if they requested it. If
21 you couldn't be there, then to called 596 1400 or 596
22 1221. I know we're not in the 12, but this program is
23 still here, and they have plenty of gun locks. As you'll
24 meet your new Sixth Precinct Commander here shortly, as
25 well as the captain, they have them too, but if not those

1 numbers, I gave work. And we'll get number 12 to drop
2 some off at number six here, and we'll get you some gun
3 locks. In the Third Precinct, on the same date, they had
4 coffee with the Commander Michael Chambers of the Third
5 Precinct where citizens came out, voiced concerns and met
6 their NPOs and their command staff. Commander Chambers is
7 relatively new at the Third Precinct as well.

8 And then yesterday in partnership with Chief White,
9 in partnership with Chief Baron from Southfield, as well
10 as the Chief from Oak Park in Farmington Hills, and the
11 Wayne County Sheriff. They were together for Domestic
12 Violence Roundtable, where local law enforcement, along
13 with court and healthcare professionals, discussed ways
14 to reduce domestic violence. Mr. Chair I will obviously
15 yield back to you for questions, but after this portions
16 conclude, I would like to invite up the commander and
17 captain, the leadership here of the Sixth Precinct,
18 Commander Vernal Newsom, and Captain Michael Diseco, at
19 your direction, sir.

20 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. We'll take
21 potential questions from our commissioners for the
22 Chief's report, and then we'll invite the commander and
23 captain up. Commissioner Moore.

24 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. Chief
25 Hayes, last week, the Chief was present. He stated that

1 he would have a report on facial recognition to the
2 board. Do we know the status of that report?

3 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Through the Chair. A document
4 was submitted to my understanding for the information
5 that was requested. And that has been sent through
6 channels to your office.

7 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Okay. My second question, the 48
8 hour rule as it relates to arrests, you mentioned the
9 Samantha Woll's homicide. Can you explain to the public
10 what the 48 hour rule is as it relates to holding
11 suspects without a warrant?

12 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: So there are two numbers, and
13 actually there's a 48 hour, and then there's a 72 hour
14 piece that I must speak, just to kind of put it all in
15 context. Michigan State law dictates that from the time a
16 person is arrested, they have 48 hours to be arraigned.
17 There's another 24 hours in which once they are
18 arraigned, that hearing must happen for a total of 72.
19 However, there are exceptions. In the instance of,
20 perhaps, and we could use circumstances similar to the
21 incident with the Uber driver.

22 It is possible that in that 48 hours, the person is
23 at the hospital, medical treatment may be rendered, or
24 they may be an issue where they're incapacitated to where
25 there may be an asterisk or an exception to the 48 hour

1 rule. And if we get to 48 or that 72, then we may do
2 what's called a "Not in custody warrant," meaning that
3 time has expired. And then from that, once they are clear
4 from their medical treatment, then at that point they
5 would be arrested for the charge, and a warrant
6 submitted. I'm sorry, a warrant submitted after they have
7 left.

8 COMMISSIONER MOORE: And one quick question, my last
9 question. Dealing with the Second Precinct Deputy Chief,
10 there's been a lot of movement. I'm just going to echo
11 with Deputy Commissioner Penal stated last week at the
12 board meeting, there's been a lot of movement at the
13 Second Precinct. Citizens can't get a chance to relate to
14 the commander. The commander tonight was at the Second
15 Precinct just two weeks ago. So what are we doing to
16 notify the citizens proactively of the movements taking
17 place in the precinct? Of course, that is the Chief's
18 prerogative. At the same time, the city's charter says,
19 we should be submitted to the people, the police
20 department should be submitted to the people. So what can
21 we do to prevent these further actions from happening
22 again?

23 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Through the Chair. Once the
24 Chief, by the way, Commander Newson, you obviously left
25 some big shoes to fill at the Second Precinct, but when

1 movement is made, we do our very best to update, and meet
2 the community, and formally introduce ourselves. And
3 that's evidenced by Commander Chambers who just had
4 coffee with the commander. He's the new commander at the
5 Third Precinct. And he had that open house for that meet
6 and greet. So I can assure you that that will happen at
7 the Second Precinct very soon. And going forward across
8 the city, we would do our very best understanding that
9 there may be an affinity or a relationship to a certain
10 command officer, but overall, it's the needs that the
11 department can best serve the entire city.

12 So sometimes decisions are made, sometimes it may be
13 because someone's doing a great job and we need that
14 skill set and another opportunity, and it could be some
15 that quite frankly, aren't doing the best job, and there
16 are areas of opportunity that we can perhaps send someone
17 else to do it. We have retirement. There are a couple
18 different things as to why that change may be, but we
19 will do our very best to be transparent, keep the
20 community, anyone affected by those movements updated and
21 that connectivity there so we can continue to work
22 together, commissioner.

23 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Just to clarify, I believe
24 Commander Newson just came in and the Sixth Precinct
25 residents are going to love Commander Newson. He came in

1 giving out a cell phone number. He is coming to community
2 meetings. So we just need that same type of energy at the
3 Second Precinct where citizens can have access to the
4 commander. Thank you, sir.

5 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Commissioner, if you're not
6 getting it, please let me know.

7 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Got you.

8 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Any further questions from the
9 Chief's report?

10 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair.

11 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Commissioner Burton?

12 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Yeah, I have a question to the
13 Chief. Chief, question for you is, when it comes to
14 Secure City's partnership, where's the department, what's
15 the department's thoughts about the Secure City
16 partnership and how is that working in Detroit?

17 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Through the Chair. Please excuse
18 my ignorance. I don't know the specifics of the program
19 you've mentioned. However we continue to work and embrace
20 any initiative that we can to make our city safe. So I
21 can do my homework and certainly get that before Chief
22 White and certainly he can share his prerogative as to
23 that program and how it would fit here in the city.

24 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Any further questions? And
25 hearing none, we're so looking forward to welcoming the

1 captain and commander of the Sixth Precinct. Come right
2 on up.

3 COMMANDER NEWSON: Thank you very much. Thank you
4 very much. And thank you Chief good evening board
5 commissioner. My name is Vernal Newson and I am the
6 commander, the new commander of the Sixth Precinct.
7 Although I'm no stranger to District 7. I've worked with
8 several tremendous citizens in this area and made some
9 great relationships. So it's an honor for me to come
10 before you and talk about the project that I have in mind
11 for the Sixth Precinct. So I would like to start off, if
12 you don't mind, sir?

13 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Go right ahead.

14 COMMANDER NEWSON: Let me give you a little bio of
15 the Sixth Precinct. The Sixth Precinct is located at
16 11450 Warwick Street at the corner of Plymouth and
17 Warwick. I'm sorry. There we go. The square mileage of
18 the precinct is approximately 14.2 square miles with
19 approximately 80,000 citizens that we serve, which
20 encompasses 12 scout car areas. We have a total of 18
21 schools, 4 high schools. A tremendous amount of
22 stakeholders that are involved and help us do our day-to-
23 day operation. Also included in my staff, I would like to
24 introduce commander, I'm sorry, captain, maybe that means
25 something, Captain Michael Chambers, who's no stranger to

1 District 7, and to the Sixth Precinct, I'm sorry, Lee, I
2 apologize, Diseco, Michael Diseco. Also Lee Brown, the
3 NPO sergeant.

4 He has been a great help to me. This is only my 9th
5 day here, so please bear with me. I would like to get
6 into some stats, if we will; just talk a little bit about
7 some of the great work that's been done here at the Sixth
8 Precinct. In terms of murder we are just at 10% under the
9 year's total which is looking pretty good. And with our
10 non-fatal shootings, we are just 10% up with a 29%
11 closure rate. The detectives are doing an outstanding job
12 and getting our suspects in custody. With aggravated
13 assaults, we are just at 7.4% for the 28 day period,
14 we're under at 17%.

15 For our burglaries, we are down, well 0.2%. And our
16 larcenies, we are also down just under a percent there.
17 One great comment I would like to make about statistics
18 here is motor vehicle theft, which I used to work at a
19 commercial auto theft and I worked there for 18 years.
20 Auto theft has always been a problem in the City of
21 Detroit, but this is the first year that I can report
22 that we are actually 15.6% down in auto theft in the
23 Sixth Precinct. That's great.

24 **A total percentage is at 20.6% overall for part one**
25 **crime. We are down in that percentage. I want to**

1 highlight also in our carjackings, carjackings for the
2 Sixth Precinct is down 13%. So that's another tremendous
3 hurdle there. Some of the strategies implemented for the
4 Sixth Precinct as part of any commander's initiative or
5 strategy going into a precinct, he should always have
6 something and be prepared to respond to community
7 involvement, enforcement, traffic. Traffic is always a
8 big discussion with the community, as well as the
9 proactive engagements to help with certain issues related
10 to quality of life. So with that, I want to speak to the
11 number of guns that we confiscated thus far for 2023, and
12 that's 244 guns taken off the street. Yeah, that's pretty
13 good. With that and our partnerships and our strategy in
14 restore order operations, we work closely with organized
15 crime with the Department of Corrections, MDOC, the Wayne
16 County Prosecutor's Office, the Legacy Unit, Ceasefire,
17 and our new partnership with the ShotSpotters who help us
18 with the non-fatal shootings, and that's Detroit 300.
19 Yes.

20 And also for Detroit. We are, something that I
21 brought over, I'm actually bringing over from the Second
22 Precinct, is what we call the aftercare. The aftercare is
23 going to include our detectives, social workers, our
24 chaplains, and that's for a collaboration to provide
25 services to victims of aggravated assaults after the

1 offense, primarily focusing on repeat offenders or repeat
2 victims, if you will. In our numbers for aggravated
3 assault, we see where it is continually the same victim
4 or same offender that's involved in the crime. Some of
5 the positive activities taking place or that have taken
6 place, thanks to Sergeant Brown and his staff, the Anti
7 bullying committee reading to the children in the
8 elementary schools, conflict resolution that's really big
9 in the community, with our NPOs and a council, positive
10 police encounters.

11 The Deputy Chief spoke about gun locks, we passed
12 out 175 gun locks, and we have many more. So the Sixth
13 Precinct, we have gun locks for you if you need any. We
14 also participated in the Blight Coalition, the Explorers
15 program, the Sisterhood program, and we have what we call
16 our Youth Summit program, which is similar to the
17 Brotherhood program at the Eighth Precinct. Also, we
18 participated and we are rolling out again the community
19 closet for the holidays. So we look forward to doing
20 that. Some of the events that are coming up here, this on
21 Saturday, November the 11th, there will be a Breakfast
22 with the veterans. We will sit down and have breakfast
23 with the veterans, and that's going to be located at
24 15858 Joy Road, the Village of St. Martha's. Also coming
25 up, we have three events that will take place on

1 Saturday, November 18th at 10:00 AM. Each event, actually
2 will start at 10.

3 We will be participating and giving away 700 turkeys
4 at the CNS Healthcare, located at 15560 Joy Road. That's
5 one location. The other location is going to be the Cody
6 Rouge Community Resource Center, and that's going to be
7 at 19321 West Chicago Avenue. And also Councilman Dural
8 will roll out a turkey giveaway for us as well at the
9 Boys Club at 16500 Retirement. And we expect a tremendous
10 turnout at those events. And on Monday, November 20th at
11 10:00 AM at 19321 West Chicago, the Suzanne's Cody Rouge
12 community will have a turkey basket and dinner that day.
13 So that's an opportunity for folks to come out and to
14 mingle and talk about some of the issues in the community
15 there. Goodfellas start up on December the 7th. We're
16 excited about that. It'll run through the 21st of
17 December. And our team will be out on the corners
18 offering for sale the Goodfellas newspapers.

19 Also, what we're doing at the Sixth Precinct this
20 year, we are adopting two families. So that's going to be
21 another one of our ventures for this holiday season. And
22 myself, I will participate as well in all of the events,
23 as we all know, I will be there. And one thing I want to
24 stress is we talk about the complaints. If anyone should
25 have a complaint regarding an officer at the Sixth

1 Precinct, just as I did at the Second Precinct, please
2 feel free not only to make the registry with the
3 complaint, but you also call me. Please call me. And I
4 would like to, if you don't mind, sir, give my number
5 out. That is (313) 236 7615. They laugh because we always
6 joke about that when I give out my number. It's (313) 236
7 7615. That's all I have.

8 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you so very much. Yes,
9 Captain, come right on up, Captain.

10 CAPTAIN DISECO: How you doing, everybody? So I'm
11 sure most of you in the room knows that former commander
12 Arnold Williams is elevated to Deputy Chief and we have
13 an amazing replacement with Commander Newson. He's hit
14 the ground running right off the bat. He's got my full
15 support. I'm going to do everything I can to help him as
16 much as I can. But I think he's got this licked, he's
17 been around a bit longer than me, overall. So he's a
18 Rockstars. So we're in good hands here at the Sixth, and
19 I'm just happy to work here. It's a great place to work
20 and great officers and appreciate you guys' support.

21 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. Alright, so, any
22 questions for the Sixth Precinct? I have one. That
23 amazing news about confiscating 244 guns out of the
24 neighborhood. My question is, it's excellent, excellent.
25 What happens to the firearms?

1 COMMANDER NEWSON: So the firearms are destroyed
2 after the case is adjudicated and we go through the legal
3 process, all the firearms are destroyed.

4 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Excellent. Thank you so very
5 much. Any other questions? Alright, hearing none, thank
6 you for your report, both commander and captain. You have
7 some excellent leadership over here. You all should be
8 very, very proud. Alright, now we will move on to oral
9 comment or well, oral communication, public comment. Mr.
10 Brown, how many do we have?

11 MR. BROWN: Good afternoon, Mr. Chair and this
12 honorable board. We currently have 11 speakers, and I'll
13 call those in attendance. We have 8 in attendance and 3
14 on Zoom, 4 on Zoom, now. Ms. Shanita Williams, followed
15 by Black Bag Ru, followed by Mr. James Ford.

16 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Right. And so just to remind
17 the public, you have two minutes for your public comment.

18 MS. WILLIAMS: Good evening everyone.

19 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Good evening.

20 MS. WILLIAMS: Okay. I'd like to talk about the issue
21 I've been having concerning Detroit police officers. When
22 I be parked in MGM parking structure, I complained to
23 OCI, I've been to the police department complaining about
24 officers breaking into my car, my weapons being there,
25 and they're not just the Detroit Police Department

1 officers, MGM and Liberty Security. And I'm going to file
2 a police report on that. I have an issue every time you
3 come in my car, you damage my vehicle, you mess with my
4 weapons. And are you putting an illegal device in my car?
5 I don't know. But I complain about this constantly, every
6 time I go make a police report. This is nothing new. And
7 also it's going on three years' concerning people
8 stalking me. When it first started, I went to the Twelfth
9 Precinct, not just the police department, but citizens
10 stalk me through social media.

11 So that's going on 3 years, it'll be three years
12 last than two months. I wrote a letter to the Board of
13 Commissioners, OCI and the Chief of Police. And this
14 person who I always speak to, her name is Nikita Wilson,
15 continue to have people stalking me, all type of illegal
16 stuff that she's behind and that I always speak on. And
17 then I also like to talk about Internal Affairs
18 concerning the police officers following me in civilian
19 vehicles, if not Internal Affairs do their job correctly,
20 I shouldn't have to be going through this. Now, let me go
21 back to people following me for 3 years as there are a
22 lot of crazy people out here and I went to try to diffuse
23 the situation, but like I said, if I'm in fear of my
24 life, you know what I'm saying? I came here to diffuse
25 the situation, but apparently it's not being taken care

1 of correctly like it should.

2 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. That's your time.

3 MS. WILLIAMS: Okay.

4 MR. BROWN: Mr. Ru, followed by James Ford, Mr. Ru,
5 followed by Mr. Ford.

6 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Right on up.

7 MR. RU: Hey, Willie Bell, before you get up out of
8 here, I see you easing your way out. You know, you read a
9 whole one person touring committee on the Board of Police
10 Commissioners, right? And you the director of the housing
11 trap over there across from the hospital, right? And then
12 you cover up the cover up the Kenisha Coleman's murder.
13 I'd like to welcome the newest members to the board.
14 QuanTez Presley. Hey, guess what? Sloppy toppy. Brian
15 Ferguson was sitting in that seat that you sitting in,
16 and he told me he couldn't call Michigan State Police in
17 because the law department told him, he advised him he
18 couldn't.

19 This Board of Police Commissioners need your own
20 lawyer because if the law department is telling the
21 chairman of the Board of Police Commissioners that they
22 can't pick up the phone and do what Mr. Ricardo Moore did
23 on his own without asking anybody when he called in the
24 United States Attorney to investigate this board. Lisa
25 Carter, Linda Bernard talking to you all. Annie Holt now

1 where is Jesus Hernandez? Now what we got going on is
2 Rebecca McKay over at the New Commander over at the
3 Eleventh Precinct, same officer brought those charges
4 against Robert Cormac. Officer Fitzpatrick promoted to
5 Sergeant. She's moved on now. I'm in court on two
6 different cases. Well, two different courtrooms, four
7 different cases two disorderly conducts and one
8 trespassing. And to everybody in the room, citizens'
9 residence, watching, listening, I didn't break any laws
10 nor committed no crimes this time. Now in 1997, that was
11 a different story. They shot my aunt, and the police
12 covered it up. They said that she raised a 38.

13 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: That's your time.

14 MR. RU: Yeah. Okay.

15 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you.

16 MR. BROWN: Mr. Ford, followed by Ms. Christiana
17 Williams, I mean Banks, followed by Ms. Charice Greer.

18 MR. FORD: If you don't mind, I want to just turn
19 this mic around just a little bit. I'm really proud of
20 the Detroit Police Department. I'm going to be very
21 honest with you. I'm James Ford from the Obama weekend. I
22 just want to say this, you know, you email DoorDash,
23 GrubHub, Steak 'n Shake and everything else, but now I'd
24 like you to send me an email to
25 detroitredlights@gmail.com. Again,

1 detroitredlights@gmail.com. You have 20,000 car accidents
2 here a year. You have 156 people killed a year by cars.
3 That's almost three a week. That's a high rate. And the
4 drag racing and red lights is the cause of this.

5 Please, I would like, if you can, send me just an
6 email, just be a sentence or a paragraph to
7 detroitredlights@gmail.com. Please, I want to take a
8 hundred people, I want to take a hundred letters to
9 Lansing saying that we're tired of this, we can't take it
10 anymore. For you people that didn't get it. Again,
11 detroitredlights@gmail.com, or you can call me at (586)
12 918-3061. The Detroit Police Department is doing their
13 job. And I think so, but we have to try to get these red
14 lights taken care of and get some stuff done. I've got
15 Senator Chang working with me and other people working
16 with me. We want to go in June. Again, Gmail,
17 Detroitredlights@gmail.com. My phone number is (586) 918
18 3061. Give me a call. This is a very serious situation.
19 As I said, try your best. You email everything else. Take
20 your time. You email the casinos and everything else.
21 Detroit Gmail, I mean detroitredlights@gmail.com. My
22 phone number is (586) 918 3061.

23 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. That is your time.

24 MR. FORD: Thank you.

25 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you.

1 MR. BROWN: Ms. Banks, followed by Ms. Charice Greer,
2 Ms. Banks.

3 MS. BANKS: Hello everybody.

4 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Hello. Go right ahead.

5 MS. BANKS: So I'm with the 11th Precinct, but my
6 problem is like a whole Detroit DPD DUI problem. I think
7 there is a problem with the way we handle and treat
8 domestic violence cases, mostly because they go up
9 steadily every year in the culture around domestic
10 violence. And as somebody who dealt with DPD while going
11 through a domestic violence situation while I was a child
12 and seeing it matriculate, I would just like to say first
13 and foremost, we can say that the police are doing their
14 job. I think that's fine, but I think we can also get
15 better at things. And I think one thing we can get better
16 at is the culture of how we treat domestic violence
17 victims, how we view domestic violence victims, and
18 offering them resources. I think one thing that DPD
19 should improve on is how they talk to domestic violence
20 victims, how they protect them, and how they shelter them
21 after the fact. So we can go down on femicide rates
22 domestic abuse rates, and also child abuse rates. So
23 yeah, that was my comment, and now I'm finished.

24 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Very thankful for your
25 comment. And if you have an agenda you will see that the

1 policy committee meets on Tuesday, November the 21st. And
2 that's our opportunity to create policy that helps to
3 control the operations of DPD. And so this is our policy
4 chair, Commissioner Bernard, and I'm sure she will
5 welcome any recommendations or suggestions you might
6 have. Thank you.

7 MR. BROWN: Ms. Greer, followed by Ms. Lucretia
8 Montgomery, followed by Mr. Foster, followed by Mr.
9 Arthur Edge.

10 MS. GREER: Hello?

11 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Hello, go right ahead.

12 MS. GREER: My cousin was murdered.

13 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Can you talk a little bit more
14 into the mic there?

15 MS. GREER: My cousin was murdered on October 1st by
16 hit and run. Her name is Charmel Montgomery. No one came
17 to speak to her mother to investigate the murder, the
18 people who were with her. The mom had to call several
19 times just to get a report made. And we're still looking
20 for justice for my cousin. Thank you.

21 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: So sorry for your loss. Do you
22 know the precinct that they live in? This precinct. Okay,
23 so there are some individuals here I'm sure can get in
24 contact with you to follow up with that family relative
25 to that incident. But our condolences to you and your

1 family.

2 MR. BROWN: Ms. Greer, followed by Mr. Foster.

3 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Mr. Brown.

4 MR. BROWN: Ms. Greer.

5 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Ms. Greer.

6 MR. BROWN: Okay, so she's okay. Ms. Montgomery.

7 MS. MONTGOMERY: Well, my name is Lucretia
8 Montgomery. I am the mother of Charmel Montgomery. The
9 girl that was murdered October the first, who my cousin
10 was just speaking about. My daughter murder was not
11 investigated until 33 days later after she was hit by a
12 car on Grand River and Patton. I haven't even met any
13 detectives. Witnesses have put stuff on the Facebook,
14 left telephone numbers and everything, and now they have
15 deleted their Facebook pages. And 33 days later, the
16 police department is now starting to investigate. Crime
17 Stoppers, Detective Swab is on my daughter's case.

18 I never seen him. I never met him, but at my
19 daughter's repass, when there was a fight and the police
20 was called and someone was shot, he was there. I still
21 haven't seen him. I appreciate now, after 33 days when I
22 made a complaint against the Sixth Precinct, because no
23 one never... I watched my daughter die 17 times in the
24 hospital. The ambulance took her away from lovely vibes
25 at 1: 32 in the morning, and at 22:48, my daughter took

1 her last breath. And to this day, I still have not met
2 any detective. My daughter has three children.

3 My daughter went to Triumph Church. She was a law by
4 the citizen, me and her pay taxes. I done seen ring
5 doorbells, find dogs that got stolen and it had been 33
6 days and these car just got put on the TV. You all say it
7 take 48 hours to find the criminal. Nobody looked for the
8 criminal. I can't sleep you all. What I'm going to tell
9 my daughter's three sons. It was my son's birthday on the
10 day she died and her 14 year old son turned 14, 11 days
11 later, and now his daddy in the hospital with a bacterial
12 infection. I have to leave here and take care him there
13 to say bye to his daddy. My cousin Mark Greer trained the
14 police. My daddy fought in the war. You all please find
15 these killers. My birthday was October 9th. My son died
16 in his sleep, but not somebody who murdered my daughter.
17 This the second child. I'm not reaping nothing I sowed.

18 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: We're so sorry.

19 MS. MONTGOMERY: Look on the cameras and find these
20 people, you all. That's all I'm asking.

21 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Deputy Chief Hayes is getting
22 ready to connect with you to make sure you get the
23 information that you're looking for.

24 MR. BROWN: Mr. Foster.

25 MR. FOSTER: Good evening.

1 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Good evening.

2 MR. FOSTER: First off, my condolences go to young
3 lady in her family. And I just want to first say that
4 it's not the police responsibility to console her. It's
5 all of our responsibility as a community to see what she
6 needs and console her. That's first and foremost.
7 Secondly, I just want to say Happy Veterans Day to any of
8 my fellow veterans who are here and had served, and just
9 wish you all a happy holiday. Just leave you a quote or
10 requote from Martin Luther King. "One may well ask, how
11 can you advocate breaking some laws and obeying others?"
12 The answer lies in the fact that there are two type of
13 laws, just and unjust. I would be the first to advocate,
14 obeying just laws. One has not only illegal, but a moral
15 responsibility to obey just laws. Conversely, one has a
16 moral responsibility to disobey unjust laws.

17 I would agree with St. Augustine that an unjust law
18 is no law at all. Now what is the difference between the
19 two? How does one determine whether a law is just or
20 unjust? A just law of manmade code that squares with the
21 moral law or the law of God? An unjust law is a code that
22 is out of harmony with the moral law. To put it in terms
23 of St. Thomas Akin, an unjust law is a human law that is
24 not rooted in eternal law and natural law. Any law that
25 uplifts human personality is just any law that degrades

1 human personality is unjust. I ask you all to go down and
2 advocate to legislators, remove any unjust laws from
3 these books and replace them with just laws, and be good
4 law enforcement officer out here. Thank you all for
5 listening.

6 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you.

7 MR. BROWN: Mr. Edge.

8 MR. EDGE: Good evening everyone.

9 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Good evening.

10 MR. EDGE: My name is Arthur Edge. I'm President of
11 Far West Detroit Civic Association, Vice President,
12 Friends of Rouge Park, and part of the Detroit 300 with
13 ShotSpotters. I just want to thank the board tonight for
14 the great job that they're doing, and I want to thank our
15 Commissioner Ricardo Moore for honoring these women. We
16 have a lot of strong women here. You ladies, give
17 yourself a hand for the great work that you're doing.
18 Deputy Chief Hayes had to step away and I want to thank
19 him for what he's doing. I've known him since he was a
20 kid, and I want to thank him. He got the mobile what was
21 that? The mobile, I can't even read my own right.

22 The Mobile Field Force. They were blowing up bombs
23 in Rouge Park and he got that moved and I just want to
24 thank him. I'll catch him in the hall and give him
25 another thanks for that. But the main reason I'm standing

1 up here tonight is for our new commander, Mr. Newsome.

2 Thank you, sir. Thank you for coming here. We have had a

3 lot of great commanders and we made them shine, and we

4 are here to make you shine. You work with us, we're going

5 to work with you. And I just congratulating you for

6 coming over here to the Sixth Precinct. Thank you.

7 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you.

8 MR. BROWN: Mr. Chair, your last five speakers, we'll

9 all be on Zoom, starting with Minister Eric Blunt,

10 followed by DC CAC member, Scotty Bowman.

11 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Minister Blunt, are you there

12 Minister Blunt. Blunt. Going once, going twice. We'll

13 come back around to Minister Blunt.

14 MR. BROWN: DC member, Scotty Bowman.

15 MR. BOWMAN: Hello everyone. First of all, I would

16 like to thank the number of people that I have heard

17 secondhand, really. I just kind of found out like people

18 saying, "Hey you know, people are trying to advise that

19 you get appointed to fill vacancies on the Board of

20 Police Commissioners." I thank those people for their

21 enthusiasm and their support. I am currently in the

22 Office of Community Advisory Council and I'm a person and

23 I'm secretary on that board right now. And right now, I'm

24 in fact working on the minutes for that organization. And

25 so I just wanted to thank people for their support, but

1 also say that, you know, I have other obligations right
2 now and those obligations are for the office to which
3 I've been elected and I've scheduled myself around that
4 office until the conclusion of my term after that, who
5 knows?

6

7 But I just wanted to say that's what the situation
8 was and why I didn't apply for that post this time
9 around. Now, on a more important matter, I've heard
10 community members tonight talking about poor response and
11 not just response time on the scene, but I mean response
12 as far as follow up and investigation regarding
13 homicides. I mean, this is the most severe crime. Violent
14 crime needs to be taken seriously in the city. Violent
15 crime is the reason the city has many other problems.

16 People don't invest in a city where they don't feel
17 safe. People don't move into a city where they don't feel
18 safe unless they feel like there's nowhere else they can
19 go. That is the problem we're facing here. And, you know,
20 it goes back too. I mean, still, you know, like we heard
21 Motor City Ru talking about Keneisha Coleman. I have
22 never heard any follow up on that. He's coming again and
23 again, it's like a broken record, but I haven't heard the
24 follow up. I haven't heard any response from the office,
25 from the police about this. Thank you.

1 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you.

2 MR. BROWN: Mr. Chair, I don't see the caller with
3 the last three numbers. 315. So I go to former
4 Commissioner William Davis, followed by person with the
5 acronym NTP 313. Mr. Davis.

6 FORMER COMMISSIONER MR. DAVIS: Good evening. Can I
7 be heard?

8 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Yes, you can go right ahead.

9 FORMER COMMISSIONER MR. DAVIS: Okay. I'd like to
10 start off by saying my heart goes out to the young lady
11 that lost her child. I hope that you all can handle it.
12 And U will do everything I can to assist her. You know,
13 not just the police, but also the Board of Police
14 Commissioners. Also, I was pleased to see that you all
15 have youth that you all are working with and you are
16 doing something with them. You know, we need to be doing
17 more with our youth. Also as a former elected police
18 commissioner for District 7, and the Sixth Precinct was
19 one of my favorite precincts. I know there are a lot of
20 very capable, outstanding individuals over there, and I
21 was pleased to see that some of them, just some of them
22 got recognition today and they are well deserved. Also
23 for those who may not know for the Second Precinct,
24 there's going to be a coffee with a cop this coming
25 Saturday from 12 to 2 with the new commander, the new

1 captain, and hopefully a new neighborhood police officer.

2 We continue to try to do things over here. In fact,
3 your new commander was just at our Bar McFarland meeting
4 last month. Normally at Bar McFarland, we meet the second
5 Friday of every month. This month we're not meeting the
6 second Friday. We're going to meet the third Friday. And
7 we all need to be asking everybody to take an active role
8 in our communities because we can make Detroit better,
9 but it takes all of us working. Thank you.

10 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you.

11 MR. BROWN: Caller with the acronym NTP313.

12 CALLER NTP313: Yes. Hello, my name is Tiffany
13 Thompson. How are you all doing tonight?

14 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Great, go right ahead.

15 CALLER NTP313: Alright. I was making a comment of
16 I've been teaching in the community for about 20 years,
17 and my son has been getting abused by his father. His
18 father is a son of a former police officer. His name is
19 Dolly Linton, III. And my son's name is...

20 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: If you could refrain from
21 using a personal name.

22 CALLER NTP313: Yeah.

23 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: When making your public
24 comment.

25 CALLER NTP313: Yes, I can. So my son, he's only

1 three years old and he's been burned by his father,
2 second degree burns to the face. And the officer who was
3 over the Child Abuse Unit Sharon Johnson, she has not
4 given me the safety plan for my son, a copy that the
5 courts need just to put on file. She has not given me
6 that. So I was just wondering how can I get that safety
7 plan and if someone can, you know, get ahold of that
8 safety plan because it's very important in my civil case
9 right now. So I just want to, you know, make you all
10 aware of that.

11 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. DC Hayes, how would
12 you inform her to get that report?

13 DEPUTY CHIEF HAYES: Actually, I met the caller last
14 night at the event in Southfield. It is best to certainly
15 support follow up, is what quite frankly, anyone who's a
16 victim of a crime is owed. So we will certainly do that.
17 As it relates to document, there was indication that
18 there was a civil piece that they're looking for. We will
19 do everything that we can in the civil, in the criminal
20 investigation to make sure that all the I's were dotted
21 and T's were crossed, but I can't speak to the civil case
22 in any supplement she might need.

23 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you.

24 CALLER NTP313: Okay, thank you.

25 MR. BROWN: The last speaker would be Ms. Alana

1 Spencer from the APP.

2 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Ms. Spencer? Ms. Spencer, are
3 you there?

4 MS. SPENCER: Yeah. Hey, I'm just about to unmute.
5 I'm sorry I'm not there tonight. I work nights for Amazon
6 and I'm a Wayne State student. I'm on the youth advisory
7 panel. I just wanted to thank you all for the award that
8 you all presented, and I'm sorry I'm not able to be
9 there. Thank you again.

10 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Well, thank you.

11 MR. BROWN: Mr. Chair that was your last speaker.

12 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Is Mr. Blunt, Minister Blunt
13 there?

14 MR. BROWN: Try again.

15 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Minister Blunt, are you there,
16 Mr. Blunt, are you there? We do apologize for whatever
17 inconvenience that may have prevented you from making
18 your public comment. But we do trust that you'll be at
19 the next meeting and if it is the will of the colleagues,
20 we can compensate you for your lost time today. With
21 that, we'll now move to the presentation to the board
22 from the Sixth Precinct Police Community Relations
23 Counsel Ms. Mary McGee.

24 MS. MCGEE: Good afternoon and thanks for everybody
25 coming. I just love the Sixth Precinct. We are family.

1 Look how we show up for each other. And this is not just
2 today, this is all the time. There are different
3 organizations Block Clubs, community organizations. We
4 come together as one. We attend each other's meeting. And
5 also, our CB Patrol as well. We attend each other's
6 meetings so we can spread the wealth of information to
7 keep this community together. And so far, thank God,
8 we're on a very positive road. It's a long road, but we
9 have each other to shoulder. And I have basically lived
10 in this area all of my adult life. And personally, I'm
11 not moving. I love my community. I love what I do. I love
12 the corporation that I get from each individual. You
13 know, we can put things together at the last minute. No
14 problem. They come, they go like, what do you need next?
15 I know I only have 10 minutes, but this is a beautiful
16 place to live. I wouldn't live any place else. Board of
17 the Police Commissioner, I see a lot of faces that's been
18 around a long time too, Mr. Bell.

19 And I'm glad to have you around. I am glad that we
20 have a new commander. I personally have issues with, we
21 train them and the Chief takes them away. In fact, I
22 think you at the Sixth Precinct as well. I know we have
23 excellent people and we do have this camaraderie with our
24 officers, our NPOs Sergeant Lee. Let them stay around a
25 little longer, please. Thank you. Welcome. Beautiful

1 meeting. Very informative. Excellent job, Board of Police
2 Commissioners. Ricardo, excellent, job well done. Thank
3 you.

4 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. Could you help us
5 with just one question if there are any more questions,
6 but your meeting date and times, just in case there's
7 somebody who's listening who wants to show up?

8 MS. MCGEE: Our meeting is the last Wednesday of
9 every month, and we're meeting by team. Unfortunately,
10 like most areas, we've lost a lot of leaders in our area
11 and they still feel secure meeting by team and Zoom. So
12 until further notice, we will be meeting there. We are
13 not meeting in the month of December. Our vacation starts
14 from August and September, but every last Wednesday of
15 the month, unless it falls on a holiday. And we'll let
16 you know in advance. Is it okay if I give you my email?

17 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: It's okay, if you don't mind
18 sharing it on public record.

19 MS. MCGEE: Oh, I'm on it.

20 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Okay, well go right ahead.

21 MS. MCGEE: That way I can send you an email and all
22 the information so you can attend our meeting. It is an
23 unusual one. It's mlms515@sbcglobal.net. Yes, I've had it
24 a long time.

25 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: No judgment here. Well, thank

1 you so much. Are there any other questions or comments
2 for the precinct president? Hearing none, thank you so
3 very much. We truly appreciate your service and maybe Ms.
4 Blossom and Commissioner Carter can look in our youth
5 advisory panel and there might be some young person who
6 is in the Sixth Precinct who might be able to assist in
7 getting some young people out to these community
8 relations meetings. Alright, with that, we will now move
9 to the report from the board Secretary and incoming
10 Communications, Secretary Shah.

11 MS. SHAH: Thank you Mr. Chair. For the Secretary
12 report today, Commissioners your incoming correspondence
13 are outlining your agenda, including the updated tracking
14 of outstanding requests to DPD for data and information.
15 The City of Detroit will be observing Veterans Day on
16 Friday, November 10th, and the BOPC and OCI Offices will
17 be closed on that day. Due to the NACO Conference, a
18 quorum of commissioners will not be present for the
19 November 16th board meeting. The board may convene the
20 meeting without a quorum, take public comments and
21 adjourn. There will be staff present to support.
22 Commissioners if you still need assistance with your per
23 diem and submitting expenses for the conference, please
24 see Mr. Brown. City Council had their formal session on
25 Tuesday, November 7th and confirmed Commissioner Rory

1 Gamble's appointment to the Board of Police Commissioners
2 effective immediately through October 17th, 2028.

3 Commissioner Gamble was onboarded at the Detroit Public
4 Safety Headquarters office, yesterday.

5 Commissioners, please reference your packets for the
6 first draft of the 2024 BOPC calendar. It has
7 incorporated a concept of community meetings being based
8 on district rather than precinct. If the board chooses to
9 go in this direction. Staff appreciates your feedback as
10 draft edits continue. In regards to staffing updates, the
11 acting attorney to the board was voted on, on November
12 2nd, and the board voted to adopt a letter of
13 understanding establishing Stephanie LaBelle as the
14 acting board attorney for 90 days. You have copies in
15 your packet of the signed letter. Attorney LaBelle was
16 onboarded at Detroit Public Safety Headquarters on the
17 6th of November and plans to join staff at the board
18 table starting at the November 30th meeting. In regards
19 to open positions for investigators and analysts, on last
20 week's meeting, the board voted to offer contingent
21 appointments to five investigator candidates and one
22 analyst.

23 HR is currently negotiating salaries and conducting
24 background checks. Tentative start date for these
25 individuals will be November 27th. And the position of

1 the executive assistant two that position is now posted
2 on the city website for interested in qualified
3 individuals to apply. The last item in my report is
4 related to budget and OCI staffing. Chief Investigator
5 gave updates today on OCI inventory and staffing levels.
6 Commissioners, we want to thank you for doing your part
7 interviews, appointment considerations, budget and
8 position amendments. You are definitely doing your part
9 to get the BOPC and OCI fully staffed to budget and
10 that's greatly appreciated. Staff continues to navigate
11 changing direction and processes with various city
12 departments. However, we are committed to secure the
13 staff and skillsets necessary for the board to fulfill
14 its charter mandated functions and establish and maintain
15 public trust. Chief investigator and I have been working
16 with the City of Detroit Lean Team to identify areas to
17 gain efficiencies and increase quality in the OCI
18 processes, including submitting an RFP for a new case
19 management system.

20 While efficiencies will certainly be gained, it will
21 not be a 1300 cases worth of efficiencies. OCI needs more
22 investigator hands on deck and there really is no way
23 around that executive manager Drew Friez has communicated
24 to the board that BOPC is underspent against its fiscal
25 year 2023/2024 budget and is currently \$278,000

1 underspent and projected to be over \$500,000 underspent
2 by the end of the fiscal year. Understandably, BOPC needs
3 to first exhaust this XX budget prior to pursuing a
4 budget increase, which will still be needed. There is
5 sufficient surplus to hire six investigators for up to
6 six months to help with the backlog. Remember, the need
7 is closer to 20, which is why a budget increase is still
8 needed. HR has advised that BOPC staff refrain from
9 hiring task workers and to instead, use the surplus to
10 add actual union investigator positions to the budget and
11 hire.

12 And then when the surplus is exhausted to pursue
13 layoffs based on seniority. Staff is waiting for budget
14 and finance to approve leveraging the current surplus to
15 add those six union investigators. Due to the NACO
16 conference and Thanksgiving, the board will not be
17 meeting with the quorum for two weeks. Staff recommends
18 that the board approve the addition of up to six union
19 investigators to the fiscal year 2023/2024 budget using
20 existing surplus and pending the approval of budget,
21 finance, HR, and LR. This will allow staff to move
22 forward with any necessary amendments during the two
23 weeks that the board is not meeting. Mr. Chair that
24 concludes the Secretary report.

25 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you for your report. And

1 as a response to the last item on your report, the Chair
2 entertains a motion to amend the current budget to add up
3 to six investigator positions, leveraging the underspent
4 monies in the fiscal year 2023/2024, budget pending
5 approval from HR, LR, budget and finance.

6 COMMISSIONER CARTER: So moved.

7 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: And properly moved in second.
8 Is there any discussion? Hearing No discussion. All those
9 in favor please signify by saying, aye.

10 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

11 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: All those opposed. No. The
12 Ayes have it, and that motion passes. We've already gone
13 through announcements. Is there any new business?

14 COMMISSIONER BURTON: New business, Mr. Chairman.

15 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Commissioner Burton.

16 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Looking at the board is going
17 to be returning from NACO on Thursday the 16th, I move
18 that we move our meeting to the following day for, you
19 know, for next week to the 17th, due to the fact that
20 you're not going to have anyone in attendance to have a
21 quorum. And so, since the charter speaks to the fact that
22 the board shall meet weekly, I just think we would do our
23 due diligence by making ourselves available for our
24 constituents, if we move the 16th meeting to the 17th.

25 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Do you have a time for the

1 17th? Is there a time that you're recommending for the
2 17th?

3 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Same time as our normal
4 meetings at 3 o'clock.

5 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: So there is a motion by
6 Commissioner Burton to move next week's meeting to Friday
7 September, excuse me, Friday, November the 17th at 3:00
8 PM. Is there a second?

9 COMMISSIONER BELL: Support.

10 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: And properly moved, and
11 second, is there any discussion? Hearing no discussion,
12 all those in favor, please signal by saying, Aye.

13 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Aye.

14 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: All those who opposed? The
15 Ayes have it. So the meeting now, of again, for all of
16 the public, and we'll make sure that that is communicated
17 is not next Thursday, November the 16th, but rather next
18 Friday, November the 17th at 3:00 PM at the Detroit
19 Public Safety Headquarters, pending that there's no
20 scheduling conflict in that regard. With that, is there
21 any further new business? Commissioner Bernard?

22 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Only one item ladies and
23 gentlemen, and I'd like to acknowledge the presence of
24 Lily Robinson, who is a mother, Derek Anderson, who is a
25 dad and the loss of their son, LaValle Anderson who was

1 attacked by a pit bulldog and killed. It was on all the
2 national media. I'd just like to say on behalf of myself
3 and behalf of our colleagues, and especially Tamara who
4 is my new colleague, how distressed we all are by that
5 occurrence. What was most impressive about it to me was
6 the announcement concerning him. He had on a Spider-Man
7 outfit and every little boy I know, likes Spider-Man. And
8 his nickname is Turkey, a little four year old boy, just
9 as cute as he could be in his mother's arms. But it's a
10 real tragedy.

11 It grieved my heart greatly, and Tamara as well. And
12 I just wanted to acknowledge your presence here this
13 evening and tell you that you have, I think mine and all
14 of our colleague's prayers. And if there's anything that
15 we could do for you please let us know. From a police
16 standpoint, and Chief Hayes is here right now. I don't
17 believe we have recovered the dog yet that did this. We
18 had picked up, as I understand, four dogs, none of them
19 had Turkey's DNA on them and one other dog, but we don't
20 know where this animal is. They say it's a pit bull, but
21 in my own neighborhood, there was a coyote, which is over
22 near six mile. So I don't know. There are animals around
23 the city. But in any event, I just wanted to convey my
24 condolences, our condolences, and I know that all of you
25 are with me in terms of wishing Lily Robinson, and Derek

1 Anderson, our condolences regarding Turkey.

2 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. Commissioner Smith,
3 do you have anything to add?

4 COMMISSIONER SMITH: Thank you, Chair. Just following
5 through what Commissioner Linda, I did get a chance to go
6 over to the viewing and speak with the family and pay my
7 condolences to you, to Turkey. I was at the candlelight.
8 I'm just so sorry that this has happened. My deepest
9 condolences go out to you and the family. Thank you.

10 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. There's any other
11 new business?

12 COMMISSIONER BURTON: The Chair.

13 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Commissioner Burton.

14 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I don't know if this is the
15 appropriate time or not, but I'm going to give it a try.
16 In the past practices being on this board two of my
17 colleagues, which is Commissioner Bell, and also
18 honorable Commissioner Carter, they have always advocated
19 for us to be able to have one or two meetings per school
20 per year to be held at a school. And I believe
21 Commissioner Moore probably recall that during his first
22 term on the board as well. But this is something that we
23 have always had in place. And so I looked at the
24 calendar, the calendar seems fine, but we should get back
25 to the tradition when we first came on as elected body to

1 have one or two meetings per year at a school. And I
2 believe those was at 3 o'clock meetings and that was
3 something that Commissioner Bell, and Commissioner Carter
4 has championed over the years. I'd like it if I make a
5 motion at this time that we move to have one or two
6 meetings for the upcoming calendar for 2024 to be held at
7 a school.

8 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Commissioner Burton has
9 offered a motion...

10 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Second.

11 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: That the schedule for the 2024
12 BOPC meeting should include at least two sites at
13 schools. That motion has been seconded. Is there any
14 discussion?

15 COMMISSIONER BELL: Mr. Chairman.

16 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Commissioner Bell?

17 COMMISSIONER BELL: I was to suggest one meeting.
18 It's a whole lot of logistic trying to host a meeting in
19 the high school or middle school. A whole lot of issues
20 of concern of that as facility and student body. So one
21 meeting, would you make that the amendment?

22 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Sure. no problem. I'd like to
23 amend that we have at least one meeting held at a school
24 for the year of 2024.

25 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Second.

1 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Is there any objection to the
2 amendment? No objection to the amendment. Again, the
3 motion on the floor is that in the 2024 BOPC schedule,
4 that at least one of our meetings will be held at a
5 school. Is there any further discussion? Hearing none.
6 All those in favor please signify by saying, Aye.

7 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

8 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: All those opposed? No. The
9 Ayes have it.

10 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: The motion passes. Is there
11 any further new business? Hearing none. The Chair
12 entertains a motion for adjournment.

13 COMMISSIONER CARTER: So moved.

14 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: There's a second. It's been
15 properly moved, and second. All those in favor, please
16 signify by saying, Aye.

17 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

18 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: All those opposed, nay. The
19 Ayes have it. This meeting is adjourned. Thank you.

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
