January 25, 2024 at 3:00 P.M.

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2 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Good afternoon. It is now 3:00
3 PM and so we will begin this Thursday, January 25th, 2024
4 Board of Police Commissioner's meeting. And so noting
5 that we are short one individual for a quorum, though, I
6 believe that Commissioner Burton is on his way, we can
7 move forward with our amended agenda. But either way it's
8 always appropriate to begin with word of invocation. And
9 so we're so grateful to be joined today by Zoom with
10 Chaplain Irvin. And so Chaplain Irvin, you can go right
11 ahead.

12 CHAPLAIN IRVING: Amen. Well, Heavenly Father, we
13 thank you for this day. We thank you and lift up before
14 you, our Mayor and his executive team. We lift up our
15 Chief today, and his executive officers and the many
16 officers that are protecting our city on this day.
17 Father, we lift up the Board of Commissioners before you
18 today, and ask that you would allow them to have a
19 productive meeting, that you will cover them, that you
20 will keep them, that you would allow them to take care of
21 the business at hand. And Father, we just pray for their
22 safety and pray for their continued blessings. And just
23 lift up this city before you today and ask that you will
24 have your way and we will give you all the glory, honor
25 and praise in Jesus' name. Amen.

1 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Amen. Thank you so very much
2 for your words of invocation. And so at this moment,
3 again, noting we yet don't have a quorum, we'll move
4 forward with announcements. And we'll have someone from
5 our staff to provide us with our announcements today. Mr.
6 Brown.

7 MR. BROWN: Yes, sir. Good afternoon, Mr. Chair. Our
8 announcement. The next BOPC regular meeting will be
9 February 1st at 3:00 PM here at Detroit Public Safety
10 Headquarters. Our next community meeting is Thursday,
11 February 8th at 6:30 PM with our 11th Precinct hosting.
12 And that location is forthcoming. The monthly committee
13 meeting scheduled for the month of February, 2024, Policy
14 Committee Meeting would meet Tuesday, February 6th, 2024
15 at 5:00 PM, and Citizens Complaint Committee Meeting will
16 meet Tuesday, February 27th, 2024 at 5:00 PM. All
17 committee meetings are held here at Detroit Public Safety
18 Headquarters, and Mr. Chair, those other announcements.

19 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. You can go right
20 ahead with in-coming correspondences.

21 MR. BROWN: Yes, sir. Mr. Chair, currently there are
22 about 4 correspondence, 3 correspondence on the report.
23 As of today, you have two news, article one from the
24 Detroit News article listed 1/19/2024. And the other one
25 you have a WXYZ article listed 1/20/24, which is also in

1 your package. And then there's a specification report
2 regarding freeway, cameras, PowerPoint that I believe
3 Commissioner Bernard would go over doing her committee
4 report. And Mr. Chair, those are all the incoming
5 correspondence.

6 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: All right. Thank you. And so,
7 having dealt with what we can in our amended agenda,
8 we'll have public comment quite early in the meeting. But
9 because of our promise to the community about the
10 timeframe we may have two segments of that public
11 comment. And so who do we have currently?

12 MS. UNDERWOOD: Mr. Chair. We have 3 people in the
13 audience. First person we'll have is Ms. Sharnita
14 Williams, Ruebin X and Minister Eric Blount.

15 MS. WILLIAMS: Oh, you guys ready for me?

16 MS. UNDERWOOD: Yes, ma'am.

17 MS. WILLIAMS: Okay. Great. Hello there everyone.
18 It's been 800 days. 800 days that my life has been upside
19 down. So I've been coming here for like the last 9
20 months. Now, I've been trying to figure out how are all
21 these people stalking me. And it's genius the way some of
22 these Detroit police officers are participating in all
23 this social media stuff. This incident occurred 2 weeks
24 ago on Randolph and Cadillac. Patrol Car 225141, Randolph
25 and Cadillac Square, at 8:55. He was in his patrol car,

1 his window was down, and he took a picture of me. So
2 later after that, people started, you know, following me
3 like they normally do, like I'm Pokémon, and for some
4 reason, they prey on people that's fortunate and not
5 enough financial situation, offering them cash app, and
6 gift cards to continue to follow me on the bus. My car
7 been a pound almost two months. Like I said, last week,
8 the Transit Police pulled me over, and how was that
9 possible when they don't even deal with vehicles? The
10 issue I have with all these illegal activities with
11 police officers. I cannot say the entire 2000 police
12 officers. My life should never be in this situation. And
13 like I call you guys on this Board of Commissioners, seat
14 warmers because you all are just sitting there and not
15 doing your job. And I am entitled to my opinion, like I
16 said, especially when I'm in this situation. And I should
17 never have been in this situation. And like I said, when
18 you guys conspired to cover up a crime, it's conspiracy.
19 That's the bottom line.

20 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. I don't see Mr.
21 Ruebin X in the room, so we'll go with Minister Blount.

22 MINISTER BLOUNT: Good afternoon Board. I'm Minister
23 Eric Blount from Sacred Heart Catholic Church here in
24 Detroit. It never ceases to amaze me the depth of
25 corruption on this Board. And you knew Commissioners,

1 your silence is the betrayal. All we have to do is look
2 at the facial recognition technology reports. They really
3 don't say much, but that is such a lethal tool of
4 institutional racism. This week, this Police Department,
5 again, was highlighted in a national newspaper article
6 because this Police Department was the first Police
7 Department to wrongfully arrest someone based on facial
8 recognition technology. And the real evil of it all is
9 that it spreads. So this article was from Dallas, Texas.
10 Surprise, surprise, a young black man falsely arrested
11 based on facial recognition technology. While arrested,
12 he was raped 3 times and then the evidence came out that
13 he wasn't even in the State in which the crime occurred.
14 So you do nothing and you say nothing, and you allow this
15 evil to fester. And I'm so glad that the Dallas Texas
16 News article cited Detroit as the first one where facial
17 recognition technology was used to falsely arrest
18 someone. It's all I got.

19 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you.

20 MS. UNDERWOOD: Sir, we can go to Zoom, if there is
21 no one else in the audience that didn't fill out a
22 comment card, then we'll go to Zoom. We have 2 speakers
23 on Zoom. The first speaker will be Professor Robichaud.
24 And then after Professor Robichaud we'll have former
25 Commissioner William Davis.

1 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you Professor. Professor
2 Robichaud.

3 PROFFESOR ROBICHAUD: I'm sorry, I don't have any
4 comment. I'm just attending.

5 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Okay, great. We are so
6 grateful to have your attendance here.

7 PROFESSOR ROBICHAUD: Thank you.

8 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Former Commissioner, William
9 Davis.

10 MR. DAVIS: Good afternoon. Can I be heard?

11 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Yes, you can. Go right ahead.

12 MR. DAVIS: Okay. I still think that the Board of
13 Police Commissioners need to do some public service
14 announcements. I still think there should be a greater
15 effort to broadcast these meetings live on TV like City
16 Council, and other meetings that are broadcast live,
17 especially the meetings to start at 3 o'clock. I can
18 understand about the community meetings to start at 6:30,
19 which is more problematic. But I think this Board should
20 make a greater effort to broadcast and make sure more
21 people know what you're doing. Also, at least recently,
22 you all corrected a mistake that the Board of Police
23 Commissioners have been laughed about for months as it
24 relates to having 2 employees suspended with pay for, you
25 know, since March. You know, that's very troubling. Also,

1 it appears as if you're not taking action against...
2 there was also a recommendation by the Inspector General
3 to take action against Willie Bell.

4 You know, you all need to look that up and find out
5 that it is still an ongoing recommendation that's been in
6 the records for some time. You all need to make sure that
7 the next Chair and the Vice Chair is not people that's
8 already been Chair of Vice Chair. Because you need to
9 make sure you all cut down on past questionable practices
10 because there have been and continue to be a number of
11 questionable practices. Hopefully you all would strive to
12 improve you all image. The image of this Board needs to
13 improve. If not, I can really see a number of people not
14 being reelected when they redo the district lines. Thank
15 you. Have a good day.

16 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. Mr. Ruebin X is
17 back in the room.

18 MS. UNDERWOOD: We have two more people on Zoom.

19 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Okay, let's get him and then
20 we'll go to Zoom again. Thank you. Go right ahead.

21 RUEBIN X: Okay. To the citizens, residents, and
22 taxpayers here in the City of Detroit. What we have is a
23 Vice Chairman of the Board of Police Commissioners that's
24 on audio violating the City Charter. A number of times
25 he's done other things as running a one person towing

1 committee on the Board of Police Commissioners, as well
2 as running a housing director at the towing truck across
3 from receiving hospital. Now, I don't know what it's
4 going to take, but I asked the man to stand down and move
5 out the way. I made a promise, Willie Bell. Look up, I'm
6 talking to you, man. I made a promise to a little girl
7 and you stood in the way. She wants you all to stop
8 saying her mama killed herself, man. The legitimate,
9 valid request. You were in the way, Lawrence Akbar,
10 Melanie White. They got rid of Melanie White, and
11 Lawrence Akbar, but you are still here and I can't stand
12 it.

13 And she can't stand it either. Now, I told you
14 Keniesha Coleman's murder was going to be addressed, sir.
15 I asked you to stand down, sir. I told you I was
16 different. Willie Bell, I am one of the coldest. Over the
17 last 4 decades, one of the coldest here in the City of
18 Detroit. And I only say that because some of the coldest
19 in Detroit history have told me to my face that I'm cold
20 with it. Now, whatever it takes to address what Mini
21 wants, you're going to have to stand out joker, because
22 I'm not playing with you now. Whatever kind of political
23 situation you have going on it's going to be over with.
24 So you need to just go on and resign today, get off the
25 Board of Police Commissioners and get somebody in here

1 that's going to do the job of civilian oversight over
2 this Police Department, period.

3 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. Alright, with that,
4 I believe we do have a quorum, and so we can move to our
5 regular agenda. And so I'll ask that Acting Secretary,
6 Mr. Brown, to begin with the introduction of
7 Commissioners.

8 MR. BROWN: Chairperson, QuanTez Pressley - Here.

9 MR. BROWN: Vice Chairperson Willie Bell - Present.

10 MR. BROWN: Commissioner Tamara Liberty Smith -
11 Present.

12 MR. BROWN: Commissioner Linda Bernard - Attorney
13 Linda Bernard, District 2, present.

14 MR. BROWN: Commissioner Banks submitted an excused
15 absent.

16 MR. BROWN: Commissioner Willie A. Burton - Present.

17 MR. BROWN: Commissioner Lisa Carter -

18 MR. BROWN: Commissioner Ricardo Moore, submitted an
19 excused absent.

20 MR. BROWN: Commissioner Jesus Hernandez -

21 MR. BROWN: And Commissioner Roy Gamble - Here.

22 MR. BROWN: And Mr. Chair, Commissioner Darryl Woods
23 says he'll be here by 3:33.

24 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Okay. Thank you.

25 MR. BROWN: And Mr. Chair, you have a quorum.

1 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: And we do indeed have a
2 quorum. And so with that, we'll move forward with the
3 approval of the January 25th, 2024 agenda. Is there any
4 objection to the approval of this agenda? Hearing no
5 objection, the agenda is approved. We'll now move on to
6 the approval of the minutes for the January 18th, 2024
7 meeting. Is there any objection to the approval of these
8 minutes? Hearing no objection, the minutes for January,
9 18th, 2024 are approved. We did have a closed session
10 next last week, and so there is now the approval of the
11 closed session minutes from January 18th, 2024. Is there
12 any objection to the minutes from the closed session?
13 Hearing no objection, those minutes are also approved.
14 And now we'll have an introduction to BOPC Staff, Chief
15 of Police, Elected Officials and Representatives as well
16 as Community Leaders by Mr. Brown.

17 MR. BROWN: Good afternoon, Mr. Chair. Current, we
18 have Chief Investigator Warfield, Attorney Stephanie
19 LaBelle, Supervising Investigator, Ms. LiSonya Sloan, Ms.
20 Theresa Underwood, Ms. Candace Hayes, Ms. Jonya
21 Underwood, Ms. Jasmine Taylor, ASL American Sign
22 Language, Ms. Yakata, and Dr. Stephanie Beatty, Sy is
23 doing the video. And I go to the VIPs, Ms. LaDon Davis of
24 Councilman Fred Durhal's Office. Ms. Marie Overhaul from
25 State Tyrone Carter's Office. Those are the

1 introductions. Mr. Chair.

2 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. It should be noted
3 that we have lost our quorum, and so we'll return back to
4 public comment. Who do we have?

5 MS. UNDERWOOD: Thank you, Mr. Chair. We have Detroit
6 Metro, DSA.

7 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Detroit Metro.

8 DETROIT METRO: Hi. Good afternoon. Can I be heard?

9 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Yes, you can go right ahead.

10 DETROIT METRO: Hi sorry, I forgot to change my zoom
11 name. My name is Chris Gilmer-Hill. I'm a member of the
12 Metro Detroit DSA, as well as a lifelong resident of the
13 city's second district. I'm calling in today, firstly to
14 voice my opposition to further expansions of the license
15 plate reader, license plate camera system, especially
16 given the way that the previous expansion was rubber
17 stamped through this committee in violation of your own
18 procedures. And in light of the fact that we still
19 haven't gotten, well, we haven't had enough time to look
20 at the results from that. We shouldn't overcorrect just
21 because the Police Department can point to say one case
22 where cameras were useful in another city and use that as
23 an excuse to go sort of full-hog, balls to the wall on
24 this without really considering is this right for
25 Detroit.

1 And this Board just has not done that. You have not
2 taken the time to consider these policies. You have not
3 done your due diligence, you have not done your oversight
4 duty. And advancing this to Council today, without doing
5 any of that, would be a disservice to the Board and to
6 the community that it serves. I also believe that in
7 their own right, these cameras post significant civil
8 liberties issues. The Board has not taken the steps that
9 Commissioner Burton took in the past to invite members of
10 the community, members of the ACLU, Civil Rights groups,
11 et cetera, to weigh in on these proposals. I'd like to
12 thank Commissioner Burton for doing those sorts of
13 actions in the past because that's what really forced us
14 to be an open, transparent process. Without that there's
15 not any way for you to get public input, and there's no
16 way for us as members of the public to tell you that we
17 think this is a bad idea. Again, I'd like to reiterate,
18 the Commission should not move forward on these rubber
19 stamp plans today. And if they do, you should expect that
20 we will oppose them at City Council with our full
21 capacity. Thank you.

22 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. We do indeed have a
23 quorum. And it should also be noted that Commissioner
24 Lisa Carter has joined us. And so with that, we'll return
25 back to our approved agenda. And there is no report from

1 the Board of Police Commissioner's officers. And so we'll
2 move on to the community impact report.

3 MR. BROWN: Mr. Chair, currently at this time, we
4 have no community impact report.

5 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: There is no community impact
6 report. And now we will have the Chief of Police Report.

7 DC SLOAN: Good afternoon, everybody.

8 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. Can you pull your
9 mic a bit closer?

10 DC SLOAN: Good afternoon. Is that better?

11 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Yeah. And can we turn her up a
12 bit? Thank you.

13 DC SLOAN: To the Chair. I'm Deputy Chief Carrie
14 Sloan of the Detective Bureau here representing the Chief
15 today. Thank you for allowing me to be here.

16 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: It's still a challenge. I
17 don't know if there's maybe another mic we can...

18 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: A handheld or whatever.

19 DC SLOAN: Thank you.

20 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Is that better?

21 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Let's see.

22 DC SLOAN: Okay. How's that?

23 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Yes. Thank you.

24 DC SLOAN: Good afternoon, everybody. To the Chair.
25 Thank you very much. I'm Deputy Chief Carrie Sloan of the

1 Detective Bureau. I appreciate you allowing me to be here
2 to report on behalf of the Chief of Police. Update today
3 on injured officers within DPD. Today, we currently have
4 one department member who is off disabled and recovering
5 at home due to an on-duty injury. Our crime data so far
6 this year, we are down 19%, overall in violent crime.
7 Down 56% in homicides, 24% in non-fatal shootings. And
8 we're still working every day to continue to lower those
9 numbers further.

10 For our mental health-related calls for service,
11 year to date. This year, we've had 821 calls for service
12 that our CIT program and members have been taking care of
13 for us. We have also had 255 overdose-related calls for
14 service this year. A couple of significant incidents to
15 make you aware of, the first is a death investigation. On
16 Wednesday, January 17th, 2024, around 8:00 AM, officers
17 were dispatched to the 8,300 block of Longworth for a
18 death investigation. When officers arrived on scene, they
19 observed a deceased male wrapped in a blanket wearing a
20 black hoodie. The victim was lying face down with his
21 right arm exposed from beneath the blanket, and officers
22 found no weapons or footprints in the area. Detectives
23 from the homicide scene, or from the homicide section,
24 excuse me, were notified and responded to the scene for
25 an investigation. While there detectives received

1 information from the family on a missing male and that
2 the family had received a sad phone call from an unknown
3 person saying that their family member had been put in a
4 blanket and left at that location. The Detroit Police
5 Department is asking anyone for any information in this
6 case to please call Crime Stoppers, 1-800-SPEAKUP or
7 Detroit Rewards TV.

8 Another incident of importance is a carjacking that
9 occurred on Sunday, January 21st, 2024, around 9:00 AM
10 officers were dispatched to the area of the 8,000 block
11 of Grandville to investigate a carjacking report. When
12 officers arrived at the location, they spoke to the
13 victim who stated that he had started his vehicle in the
14 driveway, which is a red Chevy Silverado. After a short
15 time, he exited his residence and entered his vehicle and
16 observed a black Jeep pull alongside of him. The victim
17 stated that the male who approached him was wearing all
18 black and a black ski mask, armed with a handgun. The
19 person pointed the gun at him and demanded his vehicle
20 from him. The victim did exit the vehicle and the suspect
21 drove away from the location with his vehicle followed by
22 the Black Jeep. The suspects were last seen driving in
23 the area of Warren and Grandville.

24 Thankfully, nobody was injured in this incident, but
25 we are asking for the community's help in this case. And

1 if anybody has any information to contact Crime Stoppers
2 again at 1-800-SPEAKUP, or Detroit Rewards TV. In answer
3 to some of the BOPC requests that have been made to the
4 department, I want to make you aware that the Board's
5 request for information from DPD regarding updates on the
6 high school senior from Ecorse, Michigan that was
7 unfortunately killed in the City of Detroit. That
8 information is being sent over. DPD is also scheduled to
9 facilitate the viewing of 2 videos requested by the
10 Board. The video footage is involving Nakia Wallace, as
11 well as the video incident involving Sergeant Juan
12 Anderson. So that viewing is scheduled to take place
13 tomorrow, and we encourage the Board to attend if they're
14 available.

15 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: At what time?

16 DC SLOAN: I can get that for you, ma'am. It's not in
17 my notes.

18 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: I believe it's 1 o'clock. Yes.

19 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. Okay.

20 DC SLOAN: Also in accordance with the Board's
21 request, DPD has also provided video footage involving
22 Officer Juwan Brown. The video was sent over in the box
23 to attorney Stephanie LaBelle. DPD has sought
24 clarification regarding at least one of the requests from
25 the Board, and we are working towards fulfilling that

1 request. It is an ongoing process. I'd also like to make
2 you aware that the DPOA recently issued a letter
3 objecting to the release of certain information
4 pertaining to its members, and that DPD is working toward
5 a resolution that will avoid any unnecessary civil
6 litigation. DPD has also submitted a copy of its budget,
7 as well as a PowerPoint presentation in accordance with
8 the Board's request made last week.

9 And we will continue to provide updates to the Board
10 regarding any remaining requests. A couple of positive
11 stories from the past week with DPD, is we participated
12 in a DEA Drug Takeback Presentation. This was on Tuesday,
13 January 23rd, 2024. Our partners at the DEA Drug
14 Enforcement Administration and the Youth Connection came
15 to headquarters to present several Neighborhood Police
16 Officers awards for keeping our residents and children
17 safe by collecting unused and expired medications. The
18 11th Precinct NPOs and leadership were honored for
19 collecting the most prescription drugs in October of
20 2023, which was 85 pounds of unused narcotics.

21 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Wow!

22 DC SLOAN: Last night, a vigil was held with DPD
23 officers in relation to the 11-year-old that was killed
24 in a shooting last month. The candlelight vigil was for
25 Latrell Mines, who was an 11-year-old killed in a drive-

1 by shooting on the Detroit's Eastside. DPD officers were
2 there to show their support to the family and let them
3 know that the investigation continues and we are working
4 around the clock to bring the killer to justice. And that
5 completes my report.

6 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. Are there any
7 questions for DC Sloan? Yes. Commissioner Gamble.

8 COMMISSIONER GAMBLE: Hi. Thank you, Officer. Have
9 you looked into the bags that destroy the opiates?
10 There's a bag that when you put opiates into it, it
11 breaks them down and destroys it. I was wondering if that
12 was something that we could probably look into
13 distributing. We, gave them out before at my previous
14 job, and they seemed to work pretty well. You just put
15 the pills in there, you close it up like a Ziploc bag.
16 The chemical inside the bag destroys the medication.

17 DC SLOAN: Through the Chair. Not that I'm aware of
18 currently, but I can check into it and find out if that's
19 something that we're utilizing. It sounds like a
20 wonderful product.

21 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: To follow up on that what is
22 done with the pills that are confiscated.

23 DC SLOAN: It's turned over to the DEA and they have
24 a destruction process that they adhere to. Okay.

25 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. Commissioner

1 Burton.

2 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.
3 Question for the Chief. Looking at last year for the year
4 of 2023, how many shootings, how many shootings that
5 occurred on, shooting incidents that occurred on the
6 freeway and how many arrests were made for the year 2023?

7 DC SLOAN: Through the Board, or I'm sorry. Through
8 the Chair. I'm sorry, sir. I don't have the information.
9 Michigan State Police as an agreement with us and them,
10 they handle the highway shootings. So I don't have the
11 information readily available, but we can certainly
12 provide that to you.

13 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Because our Detroit residents
14 will be concerned, you know, concern is to want to know
15 that number. And so can you get those numbers to us as
16 soon as possible?

17 DC SLOAN: Absolutely, sir.

18 COMMISSIONER BURTON: We are more concerned about
19 those in Detroit.

20 DC SLOAN. Understood.

21 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Mr. Brown, I'm going to ask
22 that you record that question again. Place it in writing
23 to the Department to follow up. Again, the request is
24 about shootings that has happened on Detroit freeways and
25 how many arrests have been made on those shootings for

1 the year of 2023.

2 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Thank you.

3 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Let the record reflect that
4 Commissioner Woods has joined us. Are there any further
5 questions? Hearing none, thank you so very much for your
6 report. We'll now move back to our communications. And
7 again, because we didn't have a quorum to start, we did
8 handle some of our public comments. But again, if you are
9 desiring to make public comment and are either here or in
10 the Zoom you still have an opportunity to do so now. And
11 so again, we will resume with public comment.

12 MS. UNDERWOOD: Thank you, Mr. Chair. We have 2 on
13 Zoom. The first would be excuse me for mispronouncing
14 your name Jahdantee Smith, and after that...

15 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Hold one second. Can you
16 remove the mic? Thank you.

17 MS. UNDERWOOD: After Jahdantee Smith, Ms. Maddox.

18 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Mr. Jahdantee Smith.

19 MR. SMITH: Hello. Can you hear me?

20 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Yes, go right ahead.

21 MR. SMITH: Good afternoon Board. I have a few things
22 I'd like to talk about. First would be the malfeasance
23 and towing with the Detroit Police Department. That is
24 very, very bad. Like I keep saying every time I come to
25 these meetings, because I had a vehicle that was

1 impounded by DPD after an accident for no reason, with no
2 reason given. Still going to follow up on that. I'm also
3 going to talk about something odd. So, rape kit, the
4 past, so I know that's more of a prosecutorial thing, but
5 I have a friend who was raped in the past 15 years ago.
6 We were kids. And so she has just been contacted by
7 Detroit Police Department, a detective about rape kit
8 from 15 years ago. And there was malfeasance on the
9 police department's part. Officer from the 7th Precinct
10 did not follow up correctly.

11 I'd also like to say that Detroit Police Department
12 needs federal oversight again. I'm going to be pushing
13 for that very, very hard. I've seen a lot of corruption
14 outside of towing, outside of different issues,
15 especially coming out of the 7th Precinct. The 7th
16 Precinct is the most corrupt Precinct in the City of
17 Detroit, going back to the days of Kwame Kilpatrick and
18 the party at the Manoogian Mansion. The MPOs at the 7th
19 Precinct are fine. There's a specific Lieutenant Gorman,
20 who's terrible. There's a new captain, Captain Coles. He
21 might be all right, but outside of that, the 7th Precinct
22 is terrible. I'm also going to go again and speak out
23 against Deputy Chief Hayes. He's probably going to be the
24 first Deputy Chief to get a complaint. He's going to get
25 a complaint from me. I also like to say that nobody in

1 the Detroit Police Department scares me. I will not be
2 silenced. I'm going to speak about towing, and the issues
3 that affect the inner city Detroit as much as possible.
4 I'd also like to say more of Tamara Green. I'm going to
5 still be investigating that. Also, there needs to be
6 updates about that 11-year-old boy that was murdered as
7 well. So, I feel like there's a lot of issues that
8 Detroit Police Department just skims over. But I yield my
9 time.

10 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. Chief Investigator,
11 I don't know if you made a note about his grievance
12 regarding the 7th Precinct's handling of a rape kit. So
13 can we follow up with that...?

14 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: And report back to us. Thank
15 you.

16 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Who do we have next? Ms.
17 Maddox, go right ahead.

18 MS. MADDOX: Yes. Thank you. My biggest concern will
19 be the safety of everyone and speaking about the Detroit
20 Lions, (unclear) why is it happening? Because I got some
21 things that might work to celebrate after the AFC game.
22 But where are we supposed to be able to park without
23 being charged an arm and a leg. And did you along the
24 river there is coming up in April, May, June, July,
25 August, and September, the scooters, the SUVs and the

1 motorized vehicles. They need to find a way to ticket
2 them from riding on the sidewalk because I came very
3 close to getting to getting hit by one of those ATV's.
4 Thank you very much.

5 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. Part of our comment
6 brought something to mind for me, DC Sloan, and I don't
7 know if this is played out, but have there been any
8 destructive incidences in celebrations following the
9 football team's win? And if so, are there any special
10 measures being put in place for this coming weekend.

11 DC SLOAN: Through the Chair? Hopefully you can hear
12 me. I came very close. Sir, the incidents that we're
13 aware of were a couple of drag racing incidents where we
14 have recovered both of the vehicles and impounded them in
15 both cases. And we do have a plan in place for every game
16 that's happening for events that are planned and even to
17 react to occasions where a crowd might gather that we
18 were not aware of. So yes, there's a plan in place, sir.

19 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Okay. Thank you. Is there any
20 further public comment?

21 MS. UNDERWOOD: Yes, sir. Your last speaker is Mr.
22 Antonio McCarty.

23 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Good. Go right ahead.

24 MR. McCARTY: Alright. I'm here to talk about the
25 bright. . .

1 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Microphone.

2 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Hold on. Can we give him the
3 handheld? It looks like he might need some movement.

4 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair.

5 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Commissioner Burton.

6 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I just want to bring to your
7 attention that public comments are at -

8 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Duly noted. Duly noted.

9 COMMISSIONER BURTON: 4:00 PM, which is this hour.

10 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Yep. Duly noted.

11 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: This gentleman knows we can't
12 see him?

13 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Yeah, go right ahead.

14 MR. McCARTY: Okay. Now, I'm a resident in Detroit,
15 Michigan, and I've been here for a while. My family have
16 a quite a bit of tickets. There are 31 tickets on one of
17 my properties that I have from the same inspector
18 starting February 28th, all the way to December to the
19 1st. June and February. I've been getting multiple
20 tickets on one property. I bought a property from
21 Landbank. It had been abandoned house, right next door to
22 me. There were no doors, unsafe for kids. I've been
23 taking care of that property for a long time. Not one
24 ticket, I have not gotten one ticket the whole year,
25 period. My neighbors only had one or two tickets the

1 whole year. I have 31 tickets. I take care of my
2 neighbor's yard in the yard over there, and it's all
3 about accessories. It's about just numbers of things,
4 right?

5 I have a transcript I had to pay for. I got the
6 transcript showing that the officer that you all have in
7 the hearing, he threw all some of these tickets out. I
8 still get this first offense, second offense, third
9 offense. He threw second offense out. He threw some of
10 the first offense out. The same expect on 31 tickets is
11 insane. I went down there and made a complaint like my
12 attorney told me, I was treated like a criminal. I paid
13 taxes. They treated me like a criminal. I talked to all
14 the supervisors down there. They called officers up the
15 first time, no answers, nobody wanted to give me they
16 cards. The second time they called the officers up there,
17 and they said I threatened them. I said, officer, you're
18 sure I threatened them? "No. Well, he said, you sound
19 like you threatened them." That's unacceptable. Why? As
20 I'm going down there to get answers, not the start
21 problems. Why I'm getting 31 tickets on one property and
22 I'm being forced to get sale my property. That's how I
23 feel. I'm getting forced out of my property big
24 corporations because that house right there has been
25 abandoned for over 2 years. It's a big company that owns

1 it because I know.

2 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Okay that's your time.

3 MR. McCARTY: Okay.

4 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Those are DPD officers writing
5 those tickets?

6 MR. McCARTY: No. These are inspectors from the City
7 Department writing violation notes.

8 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Okay. Yeah. So I was going to
9 have an investigation.

10 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Can I respond?

11 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Yes. They are not police
12 officers. Go right ahead.

13 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Okay. I was the first
14 administrative law judge for the Blight Court. I'm very
15 familiar with the type. These tickets are issued by
16 inspectors who work for CED. I don't know who the new
17 director of CED is, but I can give you, when this is
18 over. The Director of CED is appointed by the Mayor. I
19 would suggest that you talk to him or her. I'll give you
20 the number to the Mayor's Office that will allow you to
21 get the information on who, or I can call and find out
22 who the person is, quite frankly. But after 4 o'clock
23 they're not there. I'll be happy to help you in any way
24 that I can. I'm very sorry that happened to you. I know
25 it's very troubling. And the series of tickets that are

1 the third citation can go up to \$10,000 a ticket for
2 waste removal. It's just terrible. So I'll help you if
3 that's okay with everybody in this room. I'll try to help
4 you do that interface to try to get to the bottom of this
5 and get those tickets withdrawn.

6 MR. McCARTY: Thank you, ma'am.

7 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I feel terrible for you.

8 MR. McCARTY: And I have pictures to go with each.

9 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I know you do.

10 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: So you all can connect after
11 the meeting is concluded.

12 MR. McCARTY: Thank you.

13 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you so very much.

14 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: And also, you don't have
15 anything to do with it because it's not a police ticket.

16 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: No. This would be something
17 you'll be doing out of the kindness of your heart.

18 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Absolutely.

19 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Is there any further public
20 comment?

21 MS. UNDERWOOD: Two more.

22 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Yes.

23 MS. UNDERWOOD: But on Zoom and Mr. Foster is here.

24 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Okay. So we'll call Mr. Foster
25 now and then we'll let you get a chance to get your mic

1 back and then we'll deal with the Zoom public comments.

2 MR. FOSTER: Good evening.

3 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Good evening. Go right ahead.

4 MR. FOSTER: The first thing I want to say is I
5 appreciate a lot of work...

6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Microphone.

7 MR. FOSTER: I appreciate a lot of work that's going
8 on from those that are doing good. You guys need to keep
9 it up. One of the things is this human trafficking
10 awareness month. And I think it's important that you guys
11 be aware of human trafficking and other ways to address
12 it. This is also an election year where border patrol and
13 immigration is a big issue within our country and within
14 our city, having different districts and different things
15 like that. And so I'd like to encourage more recruiting
16 in our 6th District to try to get officers that are
17 familiar, that look like the people that they serve and
18 minorities, period. Second thing, our census says we are
19 in poverty, 31% of our city is in poverty.

20 When it comes down to enforcements and tickets, our
21 impoverished citizens are the ones that get the most of
22 those tickets and enforcements. I ask you all to take
23 that into consideration. Get policies here where you
24 could use compassion, use compassion. Ultimately, these
25 tickets on impoverished people come back to the people to

1 pay the tab, okay? They linger in other places. Bills
2 don't get paid, children get neglected. Different things
3 like that. So we have to find other ways in our
4 enforcement to match the conditions in which we live in.
5 Until those conditions change, let's show more compassion
6 where we can show compassion within our community. And
7 lastly, I heard a young lady hear from the Youth Advisory
8 Panel, and I just want to magnify her voice. She said she
9 wanted to see more sex assaults, and a lot of those other
10 things that aren't on the record, and aren't in the
11 reports to be put in there. So I just want to advocate
12 and manifest her voice a little louder and make sure that
13 the Youth Panel is heard. Thank you all.

14 MS. UNDERWOOD: Mr. Chair, you have one guest on Zoom
15 and that is Takaris Nokia.

16 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Right. I believe that's
17 Takaris.

18 MR. NOKIA: Yes, Board.

19 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Yes. Go right ahead.

20 MR. NOKIA: The Board of Police Commissioners answers
21 to the department and to the people. And if you guys
22 haven't figured it out yet, the voters will remind you of
23 that in November. I think that the Board should stop
24 rubber stamping items, certain items that are on the
25 agenda, and moving public comments to before you guys

1 make crucial decisions that affect the community and the
2 department. And it's also a concern that if you don't,
3 there might be civil rights violations that will bring
4 the Board and the city to possible lawsuits, specifically
5 with the license plate readers, and how they're use, and
6 how that data, and that information is stored, and other
7 small issues. But the main point of the message is that
8 the Board needs to readdress how and when you guys vote
9 and listening to the people first before you make crucial
10 decisions that affect everybody.

11 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Alright. Thank you. And to be
12 noted, there is some desires from my colleagues that we
13 positioned public comment at the end of meetings as they
14 are enumerated in our bylaws. It was the former Chair,
15 attempting to be accommodating towards the public as our
16 meetings had gone very lengthy, a few hours' worth of
17 length that we would have public comment to occur
18 earlier. But that is your comment. I'll take under
19 advisement with my Vice Chair, and we'll review a more
20 appropriate time for public comment. With that, again, we
21 thank everyone for their comments and we look forward to
22 continuing the business of the Board. We'll now move to
23 the presentation to the Board on Greenlight technology
24 from the department. It will be a 10 minute presentation.

25 CAPTAIN FULGENZI: Good afternoon, Honorable Board.

1 My name is Captain Matthew Fulgenzi. I'm the Captain over
2 at Crime Intelligence Unit. First slide. What is Project
3 Greenlight? Project Greenlight is a place-based risk
4 reduction crime prevention strategy. This is a
5 partnership with the business owners and the Police
6 Department.

7 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: One second. Colleagues, you
8 should find that after tab 4 in your packet. Go right
9 ahead.

10 CAPTAIN FULGENZI: Okay. It's a multi-prone approach
11 to increase deterrence detection and engagement. Next
12 slide, please.

13 The roles for Project Greenlight. Again, this is a
14 partnership with this business owner. The costs are to
15 the business, so the business owner will either buy or
16 lease their cameras. There is a lighting requirement. As
17 you drive throughout the city, you see that flashing
18 light, which is a requirement, and also signage on the
19 business. On the DPD side of it, our responsibility is
20 monitoring these locations. Each Project Greenlight
21 location is flagged through dispatch. So if a run does
22 occur at a Project Greenlight location, we get an audible
23 alert in our Real-Time Crime Center. Our analyst staff
24 24/7, the Real-Time Crime Center have direct access to
25 this video. They'll immediately pull it up and they'll be

1 able to guide and direct officers as responding to the
2 location. Also, proactively, our dedicated staff filter
3 through these cameras, and if they see anything like a
4 crime occurring, some suspicious, they proactively will
5 get on the radio and broadcast this information to
6 address those problems. Again, another benefit is Project
7 Greenlight locations, our priority one response. Also, in
8 addition, we have a compliance team that ensures the
9 standards of this program are met at all times. Next
10 slide.

11 You'll see on your slides several different images.
12 It's one of my favorite to look at, and it looks at the
13 investment, looking back from 2016, how we started the
14 Real-Time Crime Center and Project Greenlight.

15 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: One second. Do we know what's
16 happening with the slides for the public? Okay, you're
17 working on it? Okay, go right ahead.

18 CAPTAIN FULGENZI: So, your first image, that's how
19 we started 2016 with Project Greenlight, with those 8
20 businesses, and we call them the original 8. They're
21 still with us today. And as you move to the right, you
22 see where we're at today with the Real-Time Crime Center
23 and Project Greenlight. As of this morning, we're at 907
24 businesses throughout the State of Detroit, and it's
25 remarkable of the investment here in the Detroit Police

1 Department and the positive impact it's had on the
2 community. Next slide. This, this next chart just shows
3 from 2016, starting with the 8 locations and year after
4 year, how we've increased the number of businesses and
5 continued that partnership. Next slide.

6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Excuse me, because the slides
7 aren't up, can you please read what's on that slide so
8 that the public will know what we're talking about?

9 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: We haven't come to that slide
10 just yet, but I'm sure he'll handle it. Go right ahead.

11 CAPTAIN FULGENZI: Yes. So our next slide right here,
12 shows our 907 partners throughout the City of Detroit.
13 Each of those dots represent a Project Greenlight
14 location. And the chart just does a breakdown of the type
15 of the Project Greenlight locations. So it's not just a
16 gas station, or liquor stores, we're in apartment
17 buildings, daycares, you name it. We're spread out
18 throughout the entire City of Detroit. Next slide.

19 So, I touched on it briefly already about the
20 benefits of Project Greenlight, but that priority one
21 response, is our special attention. So our officers are
22 out in our neighborhoods stopping by and paying special
23 attention to each of these locations. The benefit of the
24 Real-Time Crime Center and virtual patrols, and also
25 having direct access to this video. Each Project

1 Greenlight location has 30 days of cloud storage video.
2 So if a critical incident does occur, our staff can
3 immediately pull up that video, view it, get that
4 information out to those detectives, and we can start
5 working these investigations. And those people that
6 commit crimes in our community, we're holding them
7 accountable. We see higher clearance rate when we have
8 this level of video, and it produces high quality
9 investigations. Next slide. This next chart just shows
10 from the time a potential business would like to apply
11 for Greenlight to the time they go live. It's
12 approximately a 3 to 7 day process if they would like to
13 go forward with the program. Next slide.

14 This discusses the cost of Project Greenlight. Every
15 business owner has an option to buy or lease the cameras.
16 If you lease the cameras, it's a minimum of 4 cameras,
17 and that comes out to 139.75 per month. You purchase it,
18 you'll own your cameras outright, but it's a higher cost.
19 There's also cloud storage fees. There's a lighting
20 requirement and signage. To the right, you'll see there
21 are vendors. We have approved vendors. Again, we want to
22 maintain the integrity of the program and the compliance.
23 So we have certain vendors that each of these businesses
24 have to go through. And then below it you'll see the
25 breakdown of the 907 businesses and how many locations

1 have the number of cameras. So the minimum is 4 cameras,
2 and we have 236 locations with that minimum of 4. And
3 then as we go on 618 locations have 5 or 10 cameras. So
4 the bulk of our program is to have 5 to 10 cameras at a
5 business. I just want to say we're very proud of the
6 program, Project Greenlight. This is a model across the
7 United States. I'm contacted by numerous departments
8 throughout the United States regarding our program, and
9 they've come to the City of Detroit to our Real-Time
10 Crime Center and taking what we've built back to their
11 agencies. If you have time, you'll see that Miami-Dade
12 recently launched Project Greenlight, Miami-Dade. And
13 that's from them seeing the impact we've had here in
14 Detroit. And they want to model our success. Thank you.

15 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. Questions from
16 colleagues. Commissioner Gamble.

17 COMMISSIONER GAMBLE: Yes. Do you have the data on
18 how many in progress arrests were made, or how many after
19 the fact arrests were made directly from the information
20 you gleaned from Project Greenlight?

21 CAPTAIN FULGENZI: I don't have that information in
22 front of me. If there's a certain timeframe you're
23 looking for, we can get that information back to you. But
24 I'm unprepared to provide any data at this time.

25

1 COMMISSIONER GAMBLE: Yeah, I think it'll be
2 beneficial that we see it. You know, to justify the cost,
3 I mean the data. The proof of the program working is in
4 the data.

5 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: So is there a particular
6 timeframe you would like to place on that?

7 COMMISSIONER GAMBLE: Whenever they get it.

8 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: I mean for the research for
9 the data he's looking for. So maybe 2023 or is it a 6
10 month period? Like how much?

11 COMMISSIONER GAMBLE: We can go back about 6 months
12 to a year. I'd just like to see just what the impact is.

13 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: You know, I think that's what
14 he was asking for. So 6 months to a year worth of data
15 and we can, again, make sure that that request is made
16 through writing.

17 COMMISSIONER GAMBLE: I have one more.

18 CAPTAIN FULGENZI: Through the Chair.

19 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Yes.

20 CAPTAIN FULGENZI: I just want to make it very clear
21 too, the cost that went over, that's cost is associated
22 to the businesses. The City of Detroit, the Police
23 Department, we're not paying for Project Greenlight.

24 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Yep. Okay. Thank you.

25 COMMISSIONER GAMBLE: That's clear, but I have one

1 more.

2 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Go right ahead.

3 COMMISSIONER GAMBLE: Alright, so we have vendors.
4 How many of these vendors are Detroit-based? That's my
5 question.

6 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: So obviously that's a lot of
7 my colleagues' interest around cameras, lightning and
8 signage. Maybe you can share what the process is for you
9 all selecting these vendors. And again, how many of these
10 vendors are Detroit-based businesses?

11 CAPTAIN FULGENZI: Those vendors are based on the
12 standards that we set for Project Greenlight. I can
13 follow back up on which location, if they're within the
14 City of Detroit, but I also welcome all vendors if they'd
15 like to be part of Project Greenlight and they can help
16 costs and bring in more of these businesses, we are
17 welcome to bring additional vendors. So if there's a
18 vendor in the City of Detroit and they want to meet our
19 standards, please I'll have my contact information and I
20 would love to share more information.

21 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Okay. So please copy that
22 request as well for the processes on how many of these
23 vendors are Detroit-based businesses. Commissioner
24 Carter.

25 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you, Mr. Chair. You said

1 that the data is stored for 30 days and you have access
2 to it.

3 CAPTAIN FULGENZI: Yes. All video is 30 days of cloud
4 storage. And part of that agreement is that we are able
5 to access that video and that's how Project Greenlight
6 works.

7 COMMISSIONER CARTER: So, it's still owned by the...

8 CAPTAIN FULGENZI: Correct. This video, the cameras.
9 I'm sorry to cut you off, but yes, it is. This is the
10 business video. We just have the agreement that we're
11 able to access the video if necessary.

12 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Okay. Thank you.

13 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair.

14 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Commissioner Bernard, then
15 I'll come to you, Commissioner Burton.

16 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: My colleague asked about the
17 number of Detroit-based vendors. When you're looking at
18 that question, please look at the number of minority-
19 based vendors as well. The department wants to obviously,
20 we want to encourage the involvement of minority-based
21 vendors with our contracts and businesses. You also
22 stated that there was no cost because all of the costs,
23 which are, I think about \$12,000 or what's the general
24 cost for the 4 cameras or for the, let's say 10.

25 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: I think you're looking at, you

1 know, again, the leasing 139 to 182, and then if you
2 purchase, 2800 to 3200.

3 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: But we pay for our officers
4 and for the Real-Time Crime Center downstairs or
5 upstairs. I'm sorry. So what is the line item budget, if
6 you will, for Project Greenlight for DPD?

7

8 CAPTAIN FULGENZI: Through the Chair. When you look
9 at cost of the Real-Time Crime Center, I'm talking about
10 their only focus is not Project Greenlight. There are
11 many tasks and duties and responsibilities that are done
12 out of there. Project Greenlight is one piece. And also
13 our police officer on the street, they're not focused
14 just on Project Greenlight. They're responding to all
15 sorts of calls for service as well.

16 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: But I understand that. I've
17 been to the Real-Time Crime Center. It's in a room bigger
18 than this. I mean, there are screens everywhere, and
19 computers and personnel. We're just asking is, what is
20 the cost for the Real-Time Crime Center, which was
21 initiated by Chief Craig?

22 CAPTAIN FULGENZI: The real, sorry, go ahead.

23 MS. UNDERWOOD: If I may, through the Chair, we can
24 provide that information you specifically asked for, the
25 line item, correct?

1 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Yes.

2 MS. UNDERWOOD: We can ensure to that we get that to
3 you.

4 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: But does it cost us to do
5 this? It's a lot of surveillance, and then you're using a
6 lot of different technologies, not just Greenlight, which
7 you're using license plate readers and everything else.
8 So we just want to know how much that costs.

9 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Well, I'll try to amend that
10 question, and maybe you can answer it this way. In the
11 prices that are set for leasing and purchasing, does any
12 of that go to DPD for operations?

13 CAPTAIN FULGENZI: No.

14 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Okay. Thank you. Commissioner
15 Burton.

16 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.
17 Question for the Chief's Office, gentleman at the podium.
18 The National Institute of Justice did not see a
19 significant reduction of crime in the City of Detroit
20 with Project Greenlight. We saw stats where Dallas, Texas
21 doubled the size and population, and had fewer homicides
22 than the City of Detroit. Concerns from the community is,
23 when they signed up for Project Greenlight, officers are
24 not coming in signing the log. I think that was something
25 that they were under the impression that officers would

1 come in daily, sign the log and things of that nature. A
2 number of senior citizens buildings in my District have
3 gone Project Greenlight. In fact, I advocated years ago
4 for senior buildings and recreation centers to go
5 Greenlight at a time where former Chief Craig didn't want
6 to see those facilities going Greenlight.

7 And what happened, we ended up getting Greenlight.
8 We did a press conference in front of 1401 Chene, and
9 then later that year, they became a Greenlight. And then
10 you start seeing Friendship Meadows, River Towers, and
11 what's the other building? 75, and Warren. They end up
12 going Greenlight. But a lot of the residents in those
13 senior homes don't see the presence of officers coming in
14 and signing a log or just being friendly. So how is
15 Greenlight reducing crime when crime is still high in
16 pockets in our community? And this is just what I get
17 from Detroiters as they reach out to me daily. And so I'm
18 going to echo some of their words here today. But you
19 know, the NIJ even have concerns about the uses of
20 projects. So, Project Greenlight. I'd just like it if you
21 all can just share with us a little bit more.

22 CAPTAIN FULGENZI: Yeah. Through the Chair. We always
23 have room for improvement, and we do look at special
24 intentions. And in our internal meetings, we're looking
25 at recruitment for Project Greenlight, making sure the

1 community, the business owner is happy with our success,
2 our partnership, and we're looking at special attentions.
3 And when we're not reaching special attentions at certain
4 locations, we talk to our command officers and making
5 sure that those NPOs officers are stopping into each of
6 those locations.

7 [Unclear15:04]

8 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: One second. Go right ahead.

9 MS. UNDERWOOD: Mr. Chair, I can add to that, please.
10 And just as the Board, I'm sure is aware, Project
11 Greenlight is a tool that is a part of our layered
12 approach in crime reduction. So we've seen some
13 significant gains, but as a department, we feel that it's
14 part of all of our strategies. And not just that alone.

15 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: But I think that...

16 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Commissioner Bernard.

17 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I
18 think Commissioner Burton was trying to ask you as well,
19 how many arrests have been generated, and or convictions,
20 which is the other part as a result of Project
21 Greenlight. We might have that data for 2023, and we'd be
22 interested in it because it's a real big expensive
23 technology, sort of, if you will, projects.

24 MS. UNDERWOOD: Through the Chair. We'll be happy to
25 provide that information.

1 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

2 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Any other questions?

3 VICE CHAIR BELL: Yes, sir.

4 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Vice Chair Bell.

5 VICE CHAIR BELL: I would suggest Mr. Chair, at our
6 next community meeting at the 11th Precinct, we get some
7 feedback from the community themselves to speak to this
8 issue. I think it'd be very informative, very helpful.
9 Well, I know in my District they are really positive
10 about Greenlight and all the other technologies. And I
11 know we have two community chairs of the community,
12 police community. Ms. Butler, is that you back there?

13 MS. BUTLER: Yes.

14 VICE CHAIR BELL: And Ms. Maria Overall. I think we
15 need that type of feedback. I think it'd be helpful at
16 our next community meeting to build that in the process.

17 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Okay.

18 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Mr. Chair, one final question.

19 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Go ahead, Commissioner Burton.

20 COMMISSIONER BURTON: And another concern that I
21 didn't raise, but I'll raise it now, is that how many
22 lawsuits in the past 3 years have generated from Project
23 Greenlight? And that's something that I received earlier
24 today, prior coming.

25 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Alright. So I'm going to ask

1 that our Acting Secretary to try to compile all of these
2 questions that are being asked so that we can get timely
3 responses to them and maybe share it with the
4 Commissioner so that they can make sure they've been
5 accurately captured. My question, if we can go back to
6 the 907 partner locations and I just kind of want to get
7 a better sense on these breakdowns. I'm always concerned
8 with the graphs that say other, and I just want to try to
9 get a sense on what the other might be, particularly
10 since the other categories seem quite comprehensive. So
11 if it's not community, not residential, not retail, not
12 services, what are the partners that are falling under
13 others?

14 CAPTAIN FULGENZI: Through the Chair. Other would
15 consist of locations such as parking lots, junk yards,
16 warehouse, and industrial locations.

17 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Okay. Thank you. That's
18 clarifying.

19 CAPTAIN FULGENZI: Yes.

20 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Commissioner Woods.

21 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Yes. Can you talk about any type
22 of deterrent effect that Project Greenlight may have with
23 some of these businesses? And what type of, and have you
24 surveyed the business community that you are a partner
25 with in terms of how they feel about it? Do you guys

1 chime in with them and get their feedback, and is that a
2 matter of record in terms of their feelings, in terms of
3 the service that's being provided to them?

4 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Good question.

5 CAPTAIN FULGENZI: Yeah. Through the Chair, two parts
6 with that, the deterrent factor that's why we have that
7 flashing green light. And we want the community to know
8 that these locations are in partnership with the Police
9 Department. We have a Real-Time Crime Center. If a 911
10 call does come in, how we're going to respond with that
11 video and our officers receiving that priority one run
12 out there. So symbolizing that partnership, that flashing
13 light, the community knows where they can visit. Now, the
14 second piece, talking about the community, we've had many
15 incidents where there's been a critical location at a
16 non-Greenlight location where community has rallied
17 around a business owner and then said, if you're going to
18 operate in our community, we want you to join Project
19 Greenlight. The community wants safe locations where they
20 can visit, and they want that partnership with the Police
21 Department. And that's why we've seen success over the
22 years. You know, the numbers speak volume going from 8
23 locations in 2016, to now over 900 this morning.

24 COMMISSIONER GAMBLE: Yes, but I don't think you
25 pretty much understood my question in terms of, have you

1 guys been able to survey with the businesses that you are
2 doing business with and to get their feedback, you know,
3 like what are your thoughts about the Greenlight? Is
4 there anything that we can do to be able to help enhance
5 our service with your business? That's just good customer
6 service, you know?

7 CAPTAIN FULGENZI: Yeah. Sorry about that. We do have
8 a compliance team, a program manager that has that direct
9 communication with the business owners. If there's a
10 complaint about Project Greenlight, if we need to enhance
11 or we need to change our process or how we can make our
12 program better, we always welcome feedback and we
13 continue on to grow the program as well.

14 COMMISSIONER GAMBLE: Is this like, on paper, you
15 know, say, do you get a report and you compile this
16 report from the various businesses, or is it a survey
17 dispatched to all 900 of these businesses just to get
18 their feedback and then you can compile that information
19 and say, okay, 60% of the businesses are saying that they
20 are satisfied with the service, 10% saying, okay, we can
21 make some adjustments here, or if an incident occurred
22 within the business, what was the response time? What was
23 the communication like? You know, something like that.

24 CAPTAIN FULGENZI: Yeah. Through the Chair. I don't
25 have a report regarding 907, however, we did late last

1 year make a survey that we sent out to all the businesses
2 and they would fill it out if they had a complaint
3 regarding Project Greenlight or areas how we can improve.
4 Some businesses did send us feedback, and then we would
5 follow up to ensure that it is addressed.

6 COMMISSIONER GAMBLE: Okay. Do we have that like in a
7 report?

8 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Compiled?

9 CAPTAIN FULGENZI: Not in a full report, but we can
10 follow back up. I can give you some responses.

11 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Captain Fulgenzi, it looks
12 like one of your colleagues wants to either add or
13 respond to that question.

14 COMMANDER RUSSELL: Good afternoon Board. Through the
15 Chair, Commander Sonia Russell, Crime Control Strategies.
16 Some of the things that we've done, originally when we
17 first started the Project Greenlight program myself and
18 Deputy Chief Sloan today, we did initially have a survey
19 that rolled out in the very beginning. But of course that
20 was back in 2016. Since that time, we've done what we
21 call Project Greenlight Business Meetings. And those
22 meetings are done every 6 months, in which we call in our
23 current vendors, and we have a meeting and we get
24 feedback sections. In addition to that, there was a
25 Smartsheet that was instituted, I want to say October.

1 And it was a feedback Smartsheet, specifically for the
2 vendors, to give us feedback as to what's happened at the
3 location. We've also put in auditing processes as regards
4 to special attention at business locations. So those
5 things are audited at CompStat as well. But to get you an
6 actual up-to-date survey, we would have to do that again
7 this year. But we do follow up with our businesses, and
8 that's what we have at this point.

9 COMMISSIONER GAMBLE: I think it would be very, very
10 prudent to do that so that we can understand how this is
11 working. I wouldn't plan on my phone, you know, I was
12 doing some research and, you know, I see different
13 reports out there. I understand what, you know, the
14 Department of Justice has to say about it. I understand
15 what Metro Times have to say about it, and various other
16 organizations. But I think just getting a direct feedback
17 from those vendors or from those customers because they
18 are actually customers, and just to have that so that we
19 can see how it is working. If there's anything that would
20 need to be done to be able to enhance the product or the
21 services, you know, we've seen, I think what last year,
22 when folks were trapped inside a gas station and a person
23 you know, went on a zigity boom (Phonetic) and murdered
24 folks in there. You know, it was a terrible situation.
25 How did project Greenlight work in that regard, you know,

1 and other regards, you know, so I think that feedback is
2 vitally important.

3 COMMANDER RUSSELL: I understand, sir. We'll get that
4 information for you.

5 COMMISSIONER GAMBLE: Thank you very kindly.

6 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Any further questions, and
7 hearing none, again, thank you for your report. Be
8 looking forward to those questions and we look to hear
9 back from you on those responses.

10 CAPTAIN FULGENZI: Thank you.

11 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. Alright. With that,
12 we will now, we've already done the report of incoming
13 communications. We've done announcements in our amended
14 agenda, so we can now move to new business where we have
15 the Policy Committee's Report. Chair Bernard of the
16 Policy Committee.

17 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I had
18 visit Kresge Eye Institute right before I came back down,
19 and my eyes are still dilated. So I asked my, our
20 committee member Mr. Woods, Commissioner Woods to read
21 the report, if that's okay with the Chair.

22 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: That is fine. Go right ahead,
23 Commissioner Woods.

24 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you.

25

1 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Absolutely. On behalf of the
2 Board of Police Commissioners Policy Committee, please
3 see key updates from the committee meeting held on
4 January, 23rd, 2024. The Board attendees were Chairperson
5 Linda Bernard, Commissioner Darryl Woods and Commissioner
6 Willie Burton. The status of outstanding requests.
7 Chairperson Linda Bernard provided updates to the
8 following outstanding requests. 307.8 gunshot detection
9 system the Board approved. Requested changes were emailed
10 to DPD for feedback on 12/28/ 2023, awaiting a response.
11 205.11, officer involved shooting the Board approved.
12 Requests changes were emailed to DPD for feedback on
13 12/28/2023. Awaiting response. Mobile fingerprinting
14 devices information request to DPD. The request was
15 submitted to the Acting Board Attorney to submit to DPD
16 on 12/28/2023. Awaiting response. OIG 230006,
17 investigation recommendation. The training recommendation
18 has not started.

19 The bylaws updated were included in the recommended
20 bylaws. Changes passed to the Board on 12/21/2023. The
21 request to add a doc-u-sign for the Chair's signature
22 when wet signatures is not required, has been submitted.
23 This will be discussed in the February 6th, 2024 policy
24 meeting. DPD specification report, freeway cameras, and
25 LPRs PowerPoint was reviewed by committee Chairperson

1 Linda Bernard, Commissioner Darryl Woods, and
2 Commissioner Willie E. Burton and presented by Chief
3 Hayes. Chairperson encouraged public to be in attendance
4 to share comments. If public is not able to attend, send
5 in comments to the BOPC's email to be reviewed.
6 Chairperson Linda Bernard, reviewed, raised question from
7 previous policy meeting dated 1/9/2024. Request DPD to
8 provide an update list of the agencies received, request
9 DPD to provide the Board a copy of the agreement,
10 received, request DPD and MSP to provide data on the
11 number of crimes committed on the freeways or in
12 comparison to overall crimes received but not has been
13 compared to overall crimes.

14 Invite the Director of MSP to speak at
15 committee/Board meetings. Chief Hayes provided a response
16 that the community will be able to attend and share
17 comments during public hearing. The contract calls for
18 procurement is \$30 million, and then 3.5 million annual;
19 request DPD to provide more details about the source of
20 funding. Timothy Stark from the Mayor's Office provided
21 more detail on time sensitivity of the funds. 2026 is the
22 end date of spending the funds. Commissioner Woods made
23 the motion to vote out of committee during meeting.
24 Chairperson second the motion with a caveat that the
25 Policy Committee will develop a policy regarding the

1 freeway cameras and LPRs with DPD, which will regulate
2 the uses of the freeway cameras and LPRs. The next Policy
3 Committee meeting is scheduled for February 6, 2024 at
4 5:00 PM. Sincerely, Chairperson Linda Bernard.

5 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. Chair Bernard, do
6 you have anything further?

7 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Yes. Really quickly. There was
8 a report that I'd like to, if we don't have the copies
9 here today at the next board meeting, the report that was
10 provided by Deputy Chief Hayes, I'd like the community to
11 have that report on freeway shootings. And it starts with
12 this issue about freeway shootings have tripled since the
13 pandemic. This is to me... I'm very much against the
14 intrusion of government into the personal lives, personal
15 affairs of people. And this, you know, this whole
16 surveillance world that we're in now. But as I pointed
17 out at the meeting, ladies and gentlemen, the United
18 States Supreme Court, like almost 25 years ago, wrote an
19 opinion that said, we have no right to privacy in public
20 areas. It was an opinion that was generated as a result
21 of surveillance at Miami Beach in Florida.

22 And they put all these cameras out there. And then
23 there were these number of challenges and so forth to it.
24 But it's clear, and the court has reaffirmed that
25 decision that there is no right to privacy in a public

1 area. Obviously a freeway is a public area. I mean, it's
2 not indoors or anything like that. So it's controversial,
3 it's concerning to me. What we agreed to do, and what we
4 are prepared to recommend to the Board today, is to
5 approve the sharing of the specifications report on the
6 freeway camera system for progression if you will, for
7 forwarding to City Council. There are things in that
8 report that bothers me a lot. And I think bothered our
9 other Commissioners. Clearly Commissioner Burton. So, the
10 agreement that we agreed to was that we would approve it
11 out of committee, but with the caveat that the Policy
12 Committee would generate a policy on the use of freeway
13 cameras that controls what DPD can do with it.

14 That's all we can do anyway. So that's the reason
15 that we approved it out. It initially was designed for
16 serious crimes, like you couldn't, and we are going to
17 make this extremely clear. Like a bank robbery that just
18 happened, or a freeway shooting or rage, you know,
19 felony, only high level felonies. We are supposed to be
20 collecting and keeping this data concerning. And then the
21 issue of how long we keep the data and all these. All
22 these things will be spelled out in the policy. But right
23 now, the State of Michigan has given us \$30 million to do
24 this, only on our freeways here in Detroit. So it cuts
25 off, you know, when you get down the road to Grosse

1 Pointe and all that kind of stuff. These are cameras that
2 will be on Detroit area freeways only.

3 So we're going to develop that policy. We're going
4 to have a big public meeting where everyone can read the
5 policy. I'll make sure that you have a copy of the
6 specifications and a copy of the department's report so
7 you can really say what you think about it. And so we can
8 air this out, and then we're going to put together the 3
9 of us on our committee, we're going to put together a
10 policy concerning that, pulls it back that restricts it
11 to what its design purpose is, which is to address
12 serious felonies. Not something like child support.
13 Nothing, you know, no, you know, minor, not minor, but
14 there are felonies. And then, of course, there are
15 felonies. So we're interested in those that are violent
16 and that pose a threat, Amber alerts to the community. So
17 you're going to get something back. But we felt it was
18 important, and I'll let my colleague, both colleagues
19 speak to it, but I think Mr. Woods spoke to it most
20 passionately regarding, because he's been to some of
21 these funerals involving shootings on freeways. And so
22 I'll just let him speak and then of course...

23 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Well, before he speaks...

24 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: If that's okay.

25 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: I just want to be clear, is

1 there any voting action coming out that committee?

2 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Yes.

3 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: So what is that motion?

4 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: It is to approve the contract,
5 if you will, or the forwarding of the specifications
6 report to City Council so that we can begin to act on it,
7 because the Council is not going to act without the
8 approval of the Board. So we can get the ball rolling and
9 we can, of course, refine the policy. This body will
10 refine the policy.

11 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. So since that was
12 voted on in the Policy Committee again, the motion to
13 approve the specification report for freeway camera
14 projects and for that to city council it doesn't require
15 a second, but is there any discussion?

16 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I'd like to, yeah, I'd like to
17 add a discussion and amend.

18 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Commissioner Burton.

19 COMMISSIONER BURTON: For discussion, Mr. Chairman,
20 is that you know, we received a presentation at Tuesday's
21 Policy Subcommittee, and we didn't have an attorney
22 that's assigned to this Board present in that meeting,
23 nor did we have anyone from our office you know, like a
24 policy person present, you know, in that meeting as well.
25 So therefore, and where we're the community? We didn't

1 hear from Civil Liberty activist groups, organizations.
2 You have the Post Institute here that's local, you have
3 ACLU and many other prominent organizations. So we didn't
4 hear from any of them. And so to hear a presentation and
5 then to vote it out the same day, I just find that it
6 was, you know, it was preposterous at that moment. I
7 think to hear a presentation is one thing. When work is
8 being done in the committee, it's another. The work is
9 not done in the committee. It appeared that this
10 committee just moved it right out of committee. And to
11 me, that was improper. And I think there's a way that we
12 should do things. And so that's for discussion. And I
13 guess I'll allow my other colleagues to make discussion,
14 but I do like to amend the motion after discussion, Mr.
15 Chair.

16 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Is there any further...?

17 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Mr. Chairman, I'd just like to
18 correct the fact the Board has had this document on the
19 request for the freeway cameras since December. It is now
20 almost the end of January. It was presented to the full
21 Board. It came in from the Chief's Office, and then they
22 want to move this forward. They came to us that day. It
23 was on the agenda anyway, but saying that it was
24 important that we move it out so we can capture the \$30
25 million. And of course, the city, we, DPD will pay 3.5

1 million a year to maintain the system. So that's the
2 framework under which this occurred. It is not a
3 surprise, and anyone and everyone could have responded to
4 it prior to the day of the committee meeting.

5 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: I'll have Commissioner Woods
6 to say something, but let me say that I think that the
7 efficiency that we hope to capture in committees, having
8 committees is so that we don't then have a committee
9 meeting in the full Board. Okay. So I recognize that the
10 Policy Committee should have, and I have confidence that
11 you all have already deliberated this and come out with a
12 recommendation. And so to echo what you already did in
13 your committee meetings may not be the best use of our
14 time. And so, again, just in the future that we might be
15 a bit more efficient if we're going to keep standing
16 committees. Commissioner Woods.

17 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Absolutely. We made a strong
18 recommendation for this. And just without belaboring it,
19 I'll just talk about the tyranny that has happened on
20 these freeways. And personally going to a 2-year-old
21 funeral whose life was snuffed out, you know, seeing a
22 little baby casket and many others. We did have vigils. I
23 think Commissioner Smith was probably at one of the
24 vigils with us on the Southfield Freeway with other
25 families and things of that nature. It is just something

1 that we need to move on with the fierce urgency on how to
2 protect our citizens on these freeways, to have the
3 numbers quadruple. That's why we made that
4 recommendation. We stand by the recommendation.

5 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Alright. Thank you. Any
6 further discussion? Vice Chair Bell.

7 VICE CHAIR BELL: Perhaps I think Deputy Chief Sloan
8 could give me some clarity on the cameras and the
9 freeway. Do we have any authority in terms of
10 investigating or policing or monitoring that at all? I
11 think it was the Michigan State Police that had that
12 assignment, that protocol.

13 DC SLOAN: To the best of my knowledge, sir, through
14 the Chair. Apologize. To the best of my knowledge, no.
15 The project is funded from the State and then would be
16 managed by the Detroit Police Department. That's the best
17 of my knowledge, yes.

18 VICE CHAIR BELL: Okay. I just want clarity. Thank
19 you.

20 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Any further discussion? Yes.
21 Commissioner Woods.

22 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Absolutely. And this will be a
23 partnership. You know, the Michigan State Police is
24 definitely involved with this, and the governor saw fit
25 to bless the City of Detroit with \$30 million to help

1 protect its citizens.

2 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Okay. Any further questions
3 and debate on this motion, coming out of the Policy
4 Committee? Hearing no further discussion, again, the
5 motion coming out of the Policy Committee is to approve
6 the specification report for the freeway camera project
7 and forward that to City Council. All those in favor,
8 please signify...

9 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I'd like to amend the motion,
10 Mr. Chairman.

11 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Go right ahead.

12 COMMISSIONER BURTON: You know, I'd like to amend the
13 motion to send this back to committee. A request has been
14 made for, I'm requesting for attorney, our attorney to
15 weigh in on this as well. I'm also requesting today for
16 the number of freeway shootings that occurred in Detroit
17 incidents, how many incidents that occurred as far as
18 freeway shootings in Detroit, and how many arrests that
19 were made for the year 2023. And so...

20 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Sorry. That is out of order.
21 Your amendment doesn't amend the actual motion that is
22 currently on the floor. That sounds like a different
23 motion.

24 COMMISSIONER BURTON: You're absolutely right, Mr.
25 Chairman. I guess the motion that I would amend today is

1 to amend to send this back to committee.

2 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Is there a second? Right.

3 Hearing none, there is no second. So there's no amendment
4 to that motion. Again, all those in favor of approving
5 the specification report for the freeway camera project
6 and sending that to City Council, please signify by
7 saying, aye.

8 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Roll call vote, Mr. Chairman.

9 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Aye.

10 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: A roll call vote has been
11 called for. I ask that Mr. Brown, ask for attendance.

12 MR. BROWN: Chairperson Pressley - Aye.

13 MR. BROWN: Vice Chairperson Bell - Yes.

14 MR. BROWN: Commissioner Liberty Smith - Yes.

15 MR. BROWN: Commissioner Bernard - Yes.

16 MR. BROWN: Commissioner Burton - No.

17 Mr. BROWN: Commissioner Carter - Yes.

18 MR. BROWN: Commissioner Gamble - Yes.

19 MR. BROWN: Commissioner Woods - Yes.

20 MR. BROWN: Mr. Chair, 7 votes to 1 vote.

21 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: So that motion passes.

22 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Mr. Chairman, if I may.

23 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Yes.

24 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I just want to remind everyone
25 that we're going to create a policy concerning this

1 procurement. This is not going to happen for the actual
2 installation for months. And the department has agreed,
3 because we're going to make it narrower, at least in my
4 opinion, narrower. So that you absolutely have an
5 absolute right to review all the documents that we have.
6 All of these documents are online. Everything that the
7 Policy Committee does, all the proposed policies and the
8 one that we will be putting together concerning this will
9 be on there. Please let us know what you think. Please
10 come to the meetings. They are every other Tuesday at 5
11 o'clock, open free. You don't have to go through the
12 search downstairs or anything like that. You can come
13 right out into the committee meeting. I invite you.

14 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Go ahead, Commissioner Woods.

15 COMMISSIONER WOODS: If I may just to add to that.
16 The public should know that no type of traffic type
17 incidents will be involved. And so this has nothing to do
18 with traffic or any of those type of things. Only for
19 violent crimes when someone is killed, shot at, and
20 harassed on the freeway in the manor or Amber alert. So,
21 no type of misdemeanors, no type of traffic things that's
22 in these serious, serious type situations. Thank you, Mr.
23 Chairman, for your indulgence.

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
