CITY OF DETROIT
BOARD OF POLICE COMMISSIONERS MEETING
June 13, 2024 at 6:30 P.M.

1 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Good afternoon, Seventh Precinct
2 Family. My name is Ricardo Moore, Chair pro tem of the
3 Detroit Board of Police Commissioners. As you can see, we
4 do not have a quorum at this time, so I will ask for a
5 brief five-minute recess until the quorum develops. Thank
6 you for your patience

7 DR. JACKSON: You can ask for invocation and public
8 comment. The Open Meetings Act allows you to get staff
9 reports and public comment, and we could do the
10 invocation, so we don't hold up the Chaplain.

11 COMMISSIONER MOORE: So we're going to go forward
12 with our meeting folks, because we don't want to hold you
13 up because of the weather outside. So we're going to ask
14 the chaplain to step forward for invocation.

15 CHAPLAIN PUCKETT: Good evening. Let us join
16 together. Heavenly Father, I pray your blessings upon
17 this meeting tonight. To our Chair, to our assistant
18 Chair, every commissioner, city official, as well as the
19 citizens under the sound of my voice. Dear Lord, we ask
20 for guidance, wisdom, and support to the engagement of
21 meaningful discussion. On behalf of this City of Detroit,
22 we ask, oh Lord, for open minds and listening hearts.
23 Help us to be guided by the spirit of community, honor,
24 honesty, peace, and love. Help us to build today from
25 yesterday's grace so that we will be impactful on behalf

1 of the future of our great city. We ask these blessings
2 and all blessings. In Jesus' mighty name. Amen.

3 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Amen.

4 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you so very much for
5 your words of invocation. Still waiting on a few of our
6 commissioners to arrive so that we might maintain a
7 quorum. And so with that, again, we'll continue with our
8 amended agenda and I'll ask that Acting Secretary Brown
9 provide us with any incoming communications, his report,
10 as well as announcements.

11 MR. BROWN: Yeah. Good afternoon, Mr. Chair. Under
12 the Acting Secretary report, you have a letter from
13 Congressman Talabi. There's an opinion from Dr. Jackson,
14 who's our parliamentarian concerning our policy committee
15 meeting, which was withheld on May 14th, 2024 in the OCI
16 Weekly report. And Mr. Chair, from there I go to the
17 announcement.

18 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you.

19 MR. BROWN: The next BOPC meeting would be June 20th,
20 2024, 3:00 PM That meeting takes place at Detour Public
21 Safety Headquarters. That address is 1301 Third Street
22 48226. And the next BOPC community meeting would be
23 Thursday, July 11th at 6:30 PM with the Sixth Precinct
24 hosting at Citadel Appraised. That address is 20280
25 Linden Street, Detroit, Michigan 48223. And Mr. Chair,

1 for the month of June, 2024, our committee meetings.
2 Policy Committee meeting meets Tuesday, June 25th at 5:00
3 PM. That meeting also takes place at Detroit Publicity
4 Safety Headquarters, and you can view it on Zoom. The
5 announcements as Chair.

6 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you so very much. I
7 apologize. In my haste, I didn't provide an opportunity
8 to express my gratitude to Detroit Edison for opening up
9 this space for us to be able to have our community
10 meeting here. We're so grateful to be in this community
11 and at this precinct. Then also there are some words of
12 welcome, I believe that is going to be provided to us by
13 Superintendent Ralph Bland. if he's present today. This
14 handsome looking brother here, sharp as a tack. Need that
15 for our virtual audience.

16 SUPERINTENDENT BLAND: I just want to welcome the
17 police commissioners. Our building is always open to
18 holding this meeting because if our school is not doing
19 justice by opening the building to the community, we're
20 not a true community school. I like to look at it that
21 way. I would like to say, welcome to the community.
22 Detroit Edison Public School Academy is a pre K through
23 eight school. One of the highest performing schools in
24 the metropolitan area. Not just Detroit, but also the
25 high school right across the street from the parking lot.

1 We focus on, not high school graduation, but college
2 graduation. We had one of the highest persistence rates
3 in the State of Michigan for students staying in college
4 and graduating. So I want to say hello again. Thank you
5 for coming out, and our home is your home; and anytime
6 you would like to have a meeting, just let us know, our
7 arms are open, and welcome. Thank you.

8 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you so very much. And we
9 can give him a round of applause for remarks inviting us
10 to this place. Thank you. Again, since we don't yet have
11 a quorum, we still are able to receive staff reports. And
12 so with that, I'm going to ask that Chief Investigator
13 Warfield provide us his presentation relative to our
14 community impact report.

15 CI WARFIELD: Thank you, Mr. Chair, and to this
16 honorable board, there are two communications that I left
17 on top of your binders regarding some occurrences that
18 you may want to take a look at and read. And I'll also be
19 placing these in your email box as well. I do want to go
20 into one of the communications, though. Last meeting,
21 Commissioner Carter gave us a question as relates to the
22 type of investigations and the type of findings and the
23 results as it relates to those backlog cases that came
24 back to us from the Office of the Inspector General. And
25 as I said last week, we have some of our newer

1 investigators that are going through that process of
2 investigating all of those complaints and they're doing
3 an outstanding job. Those five investigators have really
4 tackled over 105 allegations. Of those 105 allegations
5 that they have investigated, 20% of those allegations
6 have been sustained, which is above our normal number,
7 just above our normal number of about 15% of allegations
8 sustained. And in addition to that, the vast majority of
9 those investigations were of our standard investigation,
10 meaning that they did the very long form of investigating
11 those complaints. And they have, again, done just a
12 yeoman's job. And they have led the way in our office as
13 it relates to the number of investigations that are being
14 completed in the Office of the Chief investigator. And
15 that, again, I wanted to provide that in writing for this
16 board and more in particular to Commissioner Carter who
17 raised that effort. That's my report. Thank you, sir.

18 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. See what else we
19 can do here while we wait on some of my colleagues to
20 arrive. Well, I'll inquire of the parliamentarian whether
21 or not questions are appropriate for the staff reports
22 with no quorum.

23 DR. JACKSON: The Open Meetings Act would allow you
24 to ask questions. You just can't make any motions.

25 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Okay. So questions are in

1 order. Commissioner Moore.

2 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. So
3 Chief Investigator, I'm looking at the second memo. It's
4 very concerning to me. I don't know if other board
5 members have read it, but it's very concerning. It goes,
6 if true it goes totally against our mission as the Board
7 of Police Commissioners that was established in 1974 by
8 the late great Coleman Alexander Young. And you just give
9 the overview of it. I know you don't probably want to
10 read the entire letter, but you just give a brief
11 overview of this because it is concerning, and I believe
12 this is public knowledge.

13 CI WARFIELD: Yes, sir. And through the Chair to
14 Commissioner Moore and the rest of the commissioners, I
15 was alerted last week and this week to what seems to be a
16 potential work slowdown or work stoppage in our office by
17 a few investigators. I addressed this issue with the
18 MAPE, which is, which stands for Municipal Association of
19 Public Employees Union President. I've also discussed
20 this with the City of Detroit labor relations
21 representative. All three of us are on the same page that
22 if this activity is taking place, that it is not only
23 unethical, but it is also illegal. And so the MAPE
24 president, Mr. James is addressing this with the union
25 employees in our office. We are also going to address it

1 in our next meeting as well. But I've seen evidence which
2 gives me pause. And so I want to make sure that we have
3 all of the facts before you. But we definitely want to
4 bring this, and I don't know if it'll be in a closed
5 session, open session, but it's something we want to
6 apprise this board of in full.

7 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you, Chief.

8 CI WARFIELD: Thank you.

9 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. Are there any
10 further questions? Hearing none we will move forward and
11 we still are yet waiting on one commissioner, but I do
12 see that there are a number of certificate appreciations
13 that are being offered today. And so we should be able to
14 move forward with these certificates. Parliamentarian, is
15 that appropriate? There's no voting that needs to be done
16 in distributing these certificates, resolutions. I do
17 understand.

18 DR. JACKSON: Do they require a motion for adoption?

19 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: No.

20 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: It's my opinion, you can do
21 them.

22 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. Alright, and so
23 I'll turn it over to the commissioner who is providing
24 the number of certificates. Are they not yet here? Okay.
25 Well, we will hold off on the certificates as well. I do

1 apologize to the community. I do understand that you all
2 are here and it would be great if commissioners were here
3 in a timely fashion for us to move forward in our
4 business. But it is summer, it's getting warm outside,
5 you know, people get a little relaxed and the like. But
6 hopefully we'll be able to move forward quickly. With
7 that, we will then move to public comment, and we will
8 have those who are here or on Zoom to be able to share
9 two minutes, please.

10 MR. BROWN: Yeah, Mr. Chair, currently we have six
11 speakers. We have four in attendance. I call them first.
12 Ms. Charnita Williams, followed by Andrea and Victoria.
13 Yes, ma'am.

14 MS. WILLIAMS: Hello everyone. I was at the board of
15 commissioners meeting last week at the headquarters. Two
16 officers went through my personal belongings, and I'm so
17 disgusted, disappointed. And every time I get up there
18 and I speak about people, were officers disrespecting
19 their oath and not doing their job correctly and
20 disrespecting me. How dare anyone go into my personal
21 belongings at the board of commissioners' meetings? I
22 mean, that's so disrespectful. And then, like I said, it
23 is always some type of cover up. Officers, when you
24 conspire to cover up anything illegal, it is conspiracy.
25 You keep on trying to cover up my rape. I am so tired of

1 this. Someone at Avalon is working with the Detroit
2 police officers trying to cover up my rape. And clearly I
3 was raped. I'm not just going to continue to talk about
4 my rape and nobody's not doing anything about it. And I'm
5 in the shelter and I have been complaining about this
6 person for a very long time, and I want to know who is
7 paying these bills or who's calling the shots when
8 helicopters continue to be stalking over the facility
9 that I'm in, and watching somebody like she is the First
10 Lady. That's not acceptable. And all this illegal stuff
11 is going on. Why should my life be interfered with? And I
12 continue to talk about officers following me in their
13 civilian vehicles. It's been going on for three years and
14 six months. Somebody needs to do their job correctly.

15 MR. BROWN: Andrea followed by Victoria.

16 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Andrew and Victoria.

17 ANDREA AND VICTORIA: Okay. So thank you so much for
18 hearing us out. And well it seems, maybe it may seem like
19 a minor issue to a lot of people, but it still
20 significantly impacts the quality of our life and our
21 neighbors. And what we want to speak precisely about is
22 the noise in the north end involving the park and also
23 involving parties; block parties that are being approved
24 by the mayor's office that end last weekend of May.
25 Literally, for the whole Sunday, our house was vibrating

1 from 2:00 PM until 8:00 PM. We just could not function in
2 our own home. And we were told that the party was
3 approved by the mayor's office and there was nothing we
4 could do. And so we just want to find out, you know, what
5 our rights are in terms of the noise and what is
6 acceptable and what's not. Because from what we
7 understand by law it should not be heard within a hundred
8 feet, but we were four blocks, we're almost half a mile
9 within that party, and we still could hear it within our
10 house with all the windows closed. And it's also a
11 concern because there's a lot of vacancy in our block.
12 And our neighborhood has been designated for the
13 population for the population density. And it's like
14 whenever anybody... right now... how many houses... we have
15 four vacant houses out of, what's

16 ANDREA: Four out of about 12 on our block are vacant
17 right now. And it's designated as a transportation hub
18 near the Q line as a target area for increase in the
19 population density. So we're concerned about being able
20 to recommend to our friends and people that we know that
21 you know, it's a great place to live, which we love
22 everything about it except the noise and the interference
23 that we have mostly from Delores Bennett Park and
24 occasionally these parties.

25 VICTORIA: Yeah, and also, like, people ask us

1 whenever we ask them like, oh, move from Bloomfield
2 Hills. And the question we ask, we usually get is how
3 safe it is and how quiet it is, you know, how safe we can
4 feel in this neighborhood, and can we get a peace of
5 mind? Can we rest on the weekend, or in the evening after
6 a stressful day on the job? And I would say, you know,
7 during warmer months, I cannot answer that question
8 positively because as soon as the weather gets warmer
9 mid-April through mid-October, it's really tough for us.
10 And we spoke to the precinct and they directed us to call
11 911 and then neighbors... it's like a lot of us actually,
12 were calling 911, and 911 directs us to precinct. So we
13 feel like we're being bounced by, you know, ping pong
14 ball, back and forth, but nobody can really help.

15 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Alright. Thank you. DC
16 Williams, could you provide us with the noise ordinance
17 so that they have some clarity on the timeframe in which
18 they should expect their communities to be quiet?

19 DC WILLIAMS: So the noise ordinance is basically, if
20 you can hear the music, I think it's 250 feet away. And
21 don't quote me on it, but if it's loud enough where you
22 hear it from your house, then that's too loud and you can
23 call the police and the police will investigate that.
24 From what I'm hearing, through the Chair, I would like,
25 after you get finished, just for the neighborhood police

1 officers in the back to get your address and your where
2 you are, and we'll work that out.

3 ANDREA: Thank you.

4 VICTORIA: Thank you so much.

5 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you.

6 MR. BROWN: Mr. Chair. Your next speaker will be
7 Minister Eric, and then we'll go into Zoom with Call with
8 the last three numbers, 534.

9 MINISTER BLOUNT: Good afternoon board.

10 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Good afternoon.

11 MINISTER BLOUNT: I'm Minister Eric Blount from
12 Sacred Heart Catholic Church right here in Detroit and
13 not far away. I've been coming to these meetings for
14 roughly 10 years. I've counted 20 commissioners that have
15 come and gone, but the corruption stays the same. So
16 since we are at a school, I want to make sure that the
17 young people know what their rights are when they get
18 stopped. We have a male mentoring program at our church
19 and we had a defense attorney, criminal defense attorney
20 present to them in front of a police officer, and there
21 was no dispute. So I want to make these things clear.
22 One, when you are stopped by the police, you have a right
23 to refuse to be searched, you or your car. Two, if you
24 are commanded to exit the vehicle, you must do it.

25 Three. If you are asked to exit the vehicle and the

1 officer does nothing, but tell you stories, you have the
2 right to ask the officer, am I being detained or am I
3 free to go? If you are not being detained, then you are
4 free to go. But speaking of being detained at last week's
5 meeting, OCI, Reverend Warfield mentioned something very
6 disturbing. His office has noticed a trend of police
7 officers handcuffing citizens during traffic stops with
8 no valid reason for being detained. If you commissioners
9 did not take specific notes of that, then I want you to.
10 The other thing is the HR report was delayed again last
11 week. This is now going on two months, but the HR report
12 only talks about retention and attrition and things like
13 that. But this board was created,

14 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. That's your time.
15 And I do see that Commissioner Hernandez has joined us.
16 And with that addition, we now have a quorum. And so we
17 will return to our official agenda, which now calls for
18 the introduction of commissioners by Acting Secretary
19 Brown

20 MR. BROWN: Chairperson Pressley - Here.

21 MR. BROWN: Vice Chairperson Smith - Present.

22 MR. BROWN: Commissioner Bernard asked for an excused
23 absent.

24 MR. BROWN: Commissioner Banks - Present.

25 MR. BROWN: Commissioner Bell asked for an excused

1 absent.

2 MR. BROWN: Commissioner Carter -

3 MR. BROWN: Commissioner Moore - Present.

4 MR. BROWN: Commissioner Hernandez - Present.

5 MR. BROWN: And Commissioner Wood, asked for an
6 excuse absent.

7 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Alright, with that, we do
8 indeed have a quorum. And now we'll move on to the
9 approval of the June 13th, 2024 agenda. Is there any
10 objection to this agenda? Hearing no objection, the
11 agenda is approved. And next we'll move on to the
12 approval of the minutes for the June 6th, 2024 meeting.
13 Is there any objection to these minutes being approved?
14 Hearing no objection, the minutes are approved. We'll now
15 have an introduction of BOPC staff, chief of police,
16 elected officials, representatives, and community leaders
17 by Acting Secretary Brown.

18 MR. BROWN: Good afternoon, Mr. Chair. Currently, we
19 have with us Parliamentarian, Dr. Francis Jackson, Chief
20 Investigator Jerome Warfield. Ms. Candace Hayes, Ms.
21 Teresa Blossom, Supervising Investigator Ainsley
22 Cromwell, ASL Interpreters, Ms. Yakata and Dr. Stephanie
23 Beatty, Ms. Jasmine Taylor, Youth Advisory panelist
24 Amulen Rozmus. Mr. Don Handyside is doing our court
25 reporting. Sergeant Brian is doing our video, and

1 Sergeant Allen Quinn is doing our audio. Sitting in for
2 the Chief is Deputy Chief Arnold Williams. Elected
3 Officials, Ms. LaDon Davis, Office of the Councilmember
4 Fred Durhal III Office, and former Commissioner William
5 Davis.

6 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: All right. Thank you for that.
7 And again, we're grateful for everyone's attendance at
8 today's meeting. And now we'll move on to our Board of
9 Police Commissioners' Officers report where today we are
10 having our elections for Board of Police Commissioners'
11 Chair and Vice Chair. So with that, the Chair opens the
12 floor for nominations for the position of Chair of the
13 Board of Police Commissioners. Are there any nominations

14 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Right here.

15 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Commissioner Banks.

16 COMMISSIONER BANKS: I'm nominating Commissioner
17 Bernard for Chairman.

18 DR. JACKSON: Mr. Chairman.

19 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Yes.

20 DR. JACKSON: The bylaws allow someone who's not
21 present to be nominated as long as they have previously
22 indicated the willingness to serve. I would advise the
23 Chair to ask the commissioner if Commissioner Bernard has
24 indicated she would be willing to serve if she's elected.

25 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: So I asked Commissioner Banks,

1 are you aware of whether or not Commissioner Bernard is
2 willing to serve?

3 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Well, I know she ran last year,
4 you know, and I do believe she's willing to serve, yeah,
5 as far as I know.

6 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: So, has there been any
7 conversation relative to your nominating her today about
8 her willingness to serve?

9 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Have I had a conversation with
10 her?

11 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Correct.

12 COMMISSIONER BANKS: No, I just you know, I had
13 mentioned to you a few days ago that, you know, I owe her
14 a vote when I was nominated by Commissioner Moore, when I
15 ran for Vice Chair, I owe a vote that, you know, she was
16 going to run for Chair. We agreed to that back then. We
17 agreed to that because...

18 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Again, I'm only responding to
19 what the parliamentarian has suggested is necessary in
20 order for nomination to go forth. And so it's based on
21 your confidence or conversation with her about her
22 willingness to serve?

23 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Because she told me she was
24 running for Chair in June. So I said, I got her back.
25 I'll vote. So that's a willingness to serve me... seemed

1 like.

2 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Yes, I will accept that.

3 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Correct. Mr. Chair?

4 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Yes.

5 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Okay. Thank you.

6 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Are there any further
7 nominations?

8 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Through the Chair.

9 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Commissioner Carter.

10 COMMISSIONER CARTER I nominate Commissioner Tamara
11 Liberty Smith.

12 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Are there any further
13 nominations?

14 COMMISSIONER SMITH: Through the Chair.

15 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Vice Chair Smith.

16 VICE CHAIR SMITH: I nominate Darryl Woods.

17 DR. JACKSON: Same issue. Mr. Chair.

18 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Are you confident in his
19 willingness to serve?

20 VICE CHAIR SMITH: Yes. I spoke with Mr. Woods in
21 regards to chairing the board, and he is accepting the
22 nomination.

23 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. Are there any
24 further nominations? Alright, hearing no further
25 nominations, nominations are closed with the following

1 commissioners. Attorney Linda Bernard. Excuse me.

2 DR. JACKSON: I'm sorry. Mr. Chair. The bylaws
3 require a motion to close nominations and must be
4 seconded as non-debatable.

5 COMMISSIONER CARTER: So moved.

6 COMMISSIONER Moore: Support.

7 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: So the Chair entertains a
8 motion to close nominations. I heard support and second.
9 Is there any discussion?

10 DR. JACKSON: Non-debatable.

11 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Hearing no discussion, now the
12 nominations are closed. We now will have nominations
13 closed with the following commissioners..

14 DR. JACKSON: Mr. Chair, you have to vote on that
15 motion. It's non debatable, but it doesn't mean you don't
16 vote on it.

17 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you very much. All those
18 in favor, please signify by saying Aye.

19 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

20 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: All those opposed? No.
21 Alright. The Ayes have it. That motion passes. Now, the
22 nominations are closed. Thank you. Nominations are closed
23 with Commissioner Bernard, Vice Chair Tamara Liberty
24 Smith, and Commissioner Darryl Woods. So all those in
25 favor of Commissioner Linda Bernard, becoming Chair,

1 raise your hand.

2 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Get a roll call vote,
3 please?

4 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: So, a part of my consternation
5 is that I have a script here that is not as comprehensive
6 as what has been provided to me by Dr. Jackson. And in
7 this script, it just says raise the hands. And then the
8 Chair reads the hands that are raised. Does that serve as
9 a roll call?

10 DR. JACKSON: A roll call vote would not be
11 appropriate for this reason. You cannot vote against
12 someone who's nominated. You can't vote, no.

13 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Thank you for the clarity.

14 DR. JACKSON: So, it's not like a motion. So a roll
15 call vote in this case... you could, I guess vote present,
16 but it doesn't make a lot of sense. It would make more
17 sense to take a vote by raising your hands. And then
18 people can vote for whoever they want to vote for. And
19 because there are six of you, someone would have to get
20 four votes in order to be elected. Thank you, sir.

21 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. Alright. So again,
22 all those in favor of Commissioner Linda Bernard becoming
23 Chair, raise your hand. For the record, Acting Secretary
24 Brown, can you state the commissioners with their hands
25 raised?

1 MR. BROWN: Commissioner Banks.

2 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. All those in favor
3 of Vice Chair Tamara. Liberty Smith becoming Chair, raise
4 your hand.

5 MR. BROWN: Commissioner Moore, Commissioner Carter.

6 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. All those in favor
7 of Commissioner Darryl Woods becoming Chair, please raise
8 your hand.

9 MR. BROWN: Commissioner Pressley. Commissioner Smith
10 and Commissioner Hernandez.

11 DR. JACKSON: There is no election, Mr. Chair.

12 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: So in this first round, there
13 is no election, so we will do this again. All those in
14 favor of attorney, excuse me, Commissioner Linda Bernard,
15 serving this Chair, please raise your hand.

16 MR. BROWN: Commissioner Banks.

17 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: All those in favor of Vice
18 Chair, Tamara Liberty Smith serving as Chair, please
19 raise your hand.

20 MR. BROWN: Commissioner Carter, Commissioner Moore.

21 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: And all those in favor of
22 Commissioner Darryl Woods serving as Chair, please raise
23 your hand.

24 MR. BROWN: Commissioner Pressley, Commissioner Smith
25 and Commissioner Hernandez.

1 DR. JACKSON: You have to declare that there's no
2 election, Mr. Chair.

3 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: There is no election.

4 VICE CHAIR SMITH: Through the Chair.

5 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Vice Chair Smith.

6 VICE CHAIR SMITH: I would like to back out of the
7 nomination as the Chair for the board.

8 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Is that allowable?

9 DR. JACKSON: That is allowable. For the record, it
10 needs to be on the record that Tamara Smith declined
11 nomination for the office of Chair.

12 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Let the record reflect that
13 Vice Chair Chamber Smith has declined nomination for
14 Chair. Noting said, all those in favor of Commissioner
15 Linda Bernard, serving as Chair, please raise your hand.

16 MR. BROWN: Commissioner Banks.

17 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: All those in favor of
18 Commissioner Darryl Woods serving as Chair, please raise
19 your hand.

20 MR. BROWN: Commissioner Smith, Commissioner
21 Pressley, Commissioner Hernandez,

22 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: There is no election. So I
23 mean, the parliamentarian has been asked, are there a
24 possibility for new nominations?

25 DR. JACKSON: There would have to be a motion to

1 reopen nominations. It requires a majority vote.

2 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Is it debatable?

3 DR. JACKSON: But you can make that.

4 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Is it debatable?

5 DR. JACKSON: Yes.

6 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Is there any motion? Hearing
7 no motion, again, the nominations are Commissioner Linda
8 Bernard and Commissioner Darryl Woods. All those in favor
9 of Commissioner Linda Bernard serving as Chair, please
10 raise your hand.

11 MR. BROWN: Commissioner Banks.

12 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: All those in favor of
13 Commissioner Darryl Woods serving as Chair, please raise
14 your hand.

15 MR. BROWN: Commissioner Smith, Commissioner
16 Pressley, Commissioner Hernandez.

17 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: And there is no election.

18 DR. JACKSON: My apologies. The motion to open
19 nominations is not debatable.

20 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. Is there any room
21 for discussion?

22 DR, JACKSON: Not without a motion, sir.

23 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: I'm sorry. I'm asking, is
24 there any room for commissions to have conversations
25 around votes that are being made?

1 DR, JACKSON: No.

2 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: So, I just don't...

3 DR. JACKSON: When a nomination is made, anyone who
4 wanted to speak about the qualities of the person they
5 were nominating, they could have asked permission to say
6 something at that point.

7 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Okay. So, I just feel as if,
8 as a Chair, my hands are tied in this circular process
9 where these votes are continuing to remain the same. So
10 I've asked for a motion, there was no motion, and we kind
11 of keep going in this cycle. So if you provide some...

12 DR. JACKSON: I appreciate the Chair's frustration.
13 But at this point, all you can do is hope that someone on
14 the commission will see the impasse, and give us the
15 fourth vote, or give three votes to give us four votes
16 for somebody.

17 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Well, then there's no other
18 action that can be made. So whether that's a motion to
19 table to delay to

20 DR. JACKSON: The problem, Mr. Chair, is that your
21 bylaws require that the election takes place at this
22 meeting. The only way to circumvent that would be to set
23 an adjourn meeting. An adjourned meeting is a
24 continuation of this meeting, and it would have to be set
25 prior to next Thursday's meeting. In order to comply with

1 the bylaws that the election occurs at this meeting, you
2 would have to set an adjourn meeting and the Open
3 Meetings Act would provide restrictions on giving notice
4 to the public that you would also have to meet

5 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Can we call a recess?

6 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: It was just a question. Can we
7 call a recess?

8 DR. JACKSON: Yes, sir, one can.

9 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: So is there a motion?

10 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Motion.

11 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: So moved.

12 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: And it is moved that we enter
13 into a five-minute recess

14 DR. JACKSON: Non debatable motion.

15 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: And it's been seconded, is non
16 debatable. All those in favor please signify by saying,
17 Aye.

18 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

19 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: All those opposed? No. The
20 ayes have it. We will enter into a five-minute recess.

21

22 (Whereupon the Board entered into a recess)

23

24 DR. JACKSON: Yes, and no. The parliamentarian has
25 done some additional reading and research in the bylaws

1 of the BOPC, under voting, it says that a form is
2 required, only members present are eligible to vote, and
3 any member may vote for himself or herself. The
4 parliamentarian does not see, but the problem is the
5 bylaws don't specify whether the majority or plurality
6 vote is required. And if the bylaws are silent, then
7 Roberts requires a majority, but that is the majority of
8 votes passed. So you have four votes passed and a
9 majority of four votes passed was three.

10 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Okay.

11 DR. JACKSON: Now with three votes out of four being
12 cast, you could declare Darryl Woods as elected.

13 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Okay.

14 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair.

15 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: One second, Commissioner
16 Burton. Right. Commissioner Burton.

17 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Can we get the attorney to the
18 board to weigh in for a legal opinion on that? Because
19 that has been the case in past practices. It was always
20 who could get to four votes. And that's how it has always
21 been. And so now, I'm wondering what's the problem today?

22 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: I'm concerned about the
23 grounds of your question because it wouldn't have always
24 been four votes because the votes will be determined upon
25 the commissioners who are present and the number of

1 nominees that are had. So I'm sure that there have been
2 Chairs elected with a different vitality than four. So I
3 don't know if that is in any measure, the standard but we
4 can ask the attorney whether or not she agrees with the
5 parliamentarian's rendering of Robert's Rules.

6 DR. JACKSON: In addition, Mr. Chairman, the
7 situation is complicated by the fact that the Open
8 Meetings Act requires people who are elected to office to
9 vote. And so the situation is complicated by the fact
10 that not everybody voted. So the attorney could give the
11 opinion and should, since this is the Open Meetings Act,
12 this is in vernacular her playpen, that those who did not
13 vote, whether or not they had the right to not vote. The
14 reading of the Open Meetings Act says that as elected
15 people, elected officers, the public has the right to
16 know where you stand on any issue on which your voting.
17 So that if you are going to abstain, you can only abstain
18 for very narrow specific reasons, not just because you
19 haven't made up your mind. So that complicates the
20 situation because not everybody voted. And that would be
21 something that the lawyer would have to respond to the
22 Open Meetings Act in terms of the law of that situation
23 is certainly for the attorney to speak to.

24 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Okay? Alright. So as has been
25 provided his opinion from the parliamentarian that

1 because there were four votes cast and Darryl Woods
2 received three votes while Commissioner Bernard received
3 one vote that Darryl Woods technically received the
4 majority of votes. I find it complicated that as the
5 Chair, I voted for Darryl Woods to then make that claim,
6 which might disenfranchise two of my colleagues. And so
7 what I will ask to do is that we'll do one more round
8 noting what the parliamentarian has suggested. That if
9 your no vote is not a vote, then the majority will go
10 forth so that your no vote can be done under the
11 awareness of that. And so with that being said, we are
12 again under nominations for Chair. So all those in favor
13 of..

14 COMMISSIONER BURTON: For discussion, Mr. Chairman.

15 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Unfortunately, I was explicit
16 that there is no discussion now. Nominations have been
17 closed. Correct?

18 DR. JACKSON: There would have to be a motion to
19 reopen nominations. It's non debatable. It requires a
20 majority vote to be adopted. The motion can be made to
21 reopen nominations. It has to be seconded. It's non
22 debatable. It requires a majority vote to reopen.

23 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Is there a motion?

24 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I move that we open up
25 nominations, Mr. Chairman, so we can have a proper

1 discussion.

2 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Is there a second? Hearing no
3 second, there is no motion. So the Chair, now again, all
4 those in favor of Commissioner Linda Bernard becoming
5 Chair, please raise your hand.

6 MR. BROWN: Commissioner Smith. Commissioner, I mean,
7 sorry. Commissioner Banks, Commissioner Burton.

8 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Right. All those in favor of
9 Darryl Woods becoming Chair, please raise your hand.

10 MR. BROWN: Commissioner Pressley, Commissioner
11 Smith, Commissioner Hernandez.

12 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Right. So with five votes
13 casted and receiving the majority of those five votes,
14 Darryl Woods is the next Chair of the Detroit Board of
15 Police Commissioners. COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the
16 Chair.

17 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Commissioner Burton.

18 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I believe this is improper
19 because before I did call for the board attorney to weigh
20 in. I think it's very important to have the board
21 attorney at today's meeting. I also believe we need
22 experience, you know, to really move the commission
23 forward. And you know, Commissioner/Attorney Linda
24 Bernard definitely brings, you know, an intensive
25 background of experience when it comes to policing and

1 the community. And so out of all fairness, I think my
2 request calling for the attorney to weigh in, you know,
3 that's definitely needed, especially at this meeting
4 here.

5 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Well, madam parliamentarian,
6 are there any grounds to challenge the Chair's decision
7 or to argue for the resolution of this vote?

8 DR. JACKSON: A point of order can be called on an
9 election, but the point of order has to specify what rule
10 has been broken. Generally that falls under one of two
11 categories. Either someone who was not authorized to
12 vote, who was not supposed to be voting, or someone who
13 was eligible to vote was prevented from voting. So if
14 there is something about either one of those issues, is
15 there someone who voted, who was not authorized, did not
16 have the right to vote, or did someone have the right to
17 vote and was prevented from voting? Unless those are the
18 issues, then the point of order would fail. And to the
19 parliamentarian, you all look very familiar, and I don't
20 believe anyone voted who was not authorized and everyone
21 had the same opportunity to vote. So the point of order
22 would have to rise on those. You can't just object to an
23 election because one doesn't like the outcome. There has
24 to be a rule that has been broken

25 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair.

1 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Commissioner Burton.

2 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Thank you. You know, through
3 the Chair, we have always, in past practices, have, you
4 know, to most of my knowledge is that we have had someone
5 with experience. Lately, we had individuals, you know,
6 for Chair and Vice Chair without the experience. And
7 experience is very much needed here. And as one of the
8 oldest police oversight boards in the country. We are
9 celebrating 50 years of police oversight this year. So
10 experience is very important. It was 1963 where Dr.
11 Martin Luther King delivered, I have a Dream Speech.

12 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Commissioner Burton, is your
13 comments germane to an actual challenge, based on what
14 was just communicated to us by our parliamentarian?

15 COMMISSIONER BURTON: It's relevant to this because..

16 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: I know. Can you hold that for
17 another point in the conversation or in the meeting,
18 rather. Commissioner Burton. We still have the election
19 for the Vice Chair to take place

20 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Ten years later, the first
21 African American mayor..

22 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Commissioner Burton...

23 COMMISSIONER BURTON: By the name of Coleman Young
24 was elected mayor.

25 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Your comments are not germane

1 to the matter at hand.

2 COMMISSIONER BURTON: And the board of police
3 commissioners were created a year later in 1974, which...

4 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Commissioner Burton.

5 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair.

6 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you so very much.

7 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair,
8 experience...

9 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Commissioner Burton.

10 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Going to my point of order, is
11 that experience matters here. We have individuals on this
12 board who have...

13 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Your point of order is not
14 accepted, Commissioner Burton.

15 You have not stated a rule that has been broken,
16 Commissioner Burton.

17 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Is...

18 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Commissioner Burton. You have
19 an opportunity to assuage your concern through your Vice
20 Chair nomination. There's an opportunity in the
21 leadership for you to add experience to what you feel our
22 Chair lacks. So now, the Chair opens nominations for the
23 position of Vice Chair for the Board of Police
24 Commissioners. Are there any nominations?

25 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Through the Chair.

1 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Commissioner Carter.

2 COMMISSIONER CARTER: I nominate Commissioner Tamara
3 Liberty Smith.

4 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Are there any further
5 nominations?

6 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Through the Chair, I'd like to
7 nominate Jesus Hernandez

8 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair, I...

9 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Commissioner Burton.

10 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I'm going to nominate Cedric
11 Banks out of District 3. I really think this..

12 COMMISSIONER BANKS: I'm not... I'm declining this. I'm
13 not getting into that.

14 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Let the record reflect that
15 Commissioner Banks declined nomination as Vice Chair. Are
16 there any further nominations? Thank you Commissioner
17 Banks. Are there any further nominations?

18 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair, I'm...

19 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Commissioner Burton.

20 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I'm going to nominate Linda
21 Bernard, Commissioner Linda Bernard.

22 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Now, you weren't here earlier,
23 but it was suggested that, again, in order for a person
24 who is absent to be nominated, you have to have
25 confidence or conversation that they're willing to accept

1 the nomination. Have you had any conversation with Linda
2 Bernard, relative to your nomination of her as Vice Chair

3 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair. I really
4 disagree with this whole process, but we definitely need
5 experience. Right now, the current Vice Chair...

6 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Commissioner Burton...

7 COMMISSIONER BURTON: According to, you know...

8 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Very directly, I asked you,
9 have you had any conversation about Commissioner
10 Bernard's willingness to serve as Vice Chair?

11 COMMISSIONER BURTON: She would serve as Vice Chair
12 if nominated here today by the honorable board.

13 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: My question is, have you had
14 any conversation with Commissioner Bernard relative to
15 her willingness to serve as Vice Chair?

16 COMMISSIONER BURTON: She would serve as Vice Chair

17 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Are there any further
18 nominations?

19 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Through the Chair.

20 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Commissioner Hernandez.

21 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Can I, just as a point of
22 clarity, I think I understand the answer. Are
23 commissioners able to run consecutively for leadership
24 roles?

25 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Not the same position? Well,

1 relative, not the Chair. The Chair, according to our
2 bylaws, can only serve one term non-consecutively.

3 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Through the Chair.

4 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Thank you.

5 COMMISSIONER BANKS: From my understanding, the Vice
6 Chair can serve consecutive terms.

7 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Correct. That's why I
8 clarified my statement. And I do believe that is true. It
9 is only the Chair that cannot serve consecutive terms in
10 leadership.

11 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair. That has not
12 happened in my decade or my tenure here. And I've been
13 here, I'm a senior, a statesman here on this board.

14 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: What has not happened?

15 COMMISSIONER BURTON: And we haven't had a Vice Chair
16 to serve consecutively back to back as Vice Chair is
17 actually something that we have not done. And so the
18 question is why are we doing that now? And I like to call
19 for a legal opinion on that as well, because, you know, I
20 feel that not only do the public have a right to know,
21 but we as commissioners have a right to know as well.

22 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Dr. Jackson, according to our
23 bylaws, do you have any opinion on whether or not a vice
24 Chair can conserve consecutive terms?

25 DR. JACKSON: Article four, section two of the BOPC

1 bylaws states, the Chairperson may not conserve
2 consecutive terms. It does not address the Vice Chair.

3 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Through the Chair.

4 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Commissioner Carter.

5 COMMISSIONER CARTER: I believe that Commissioner
6 Annie Holt did serve consecutive terms as vice chair.

7 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. So both in bylaws
8 and in practice that has been proven to be unfactual.
9 Commissioner Burton.

10 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Through the Chair. I want to
11 ask...

12 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Commissioner Banks.

13 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Commissioner Carter, did you
14 just nominate somebody?

15 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Yes.

16 COMMISSIONER BANKS: You did?

17 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: So the two nominees, as the
18 floor is still open, you could have asked the Chair as
19 the Chair.

20 COMMISSIONER BANKS: I didn't hear.

21 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: The two nominees that the
22 nomination is still open are Vice Chair Tamara Liberty
23 Smith and Commissioner Jesus Hernandez. Are there any
24 further nominations? All right. Hearing no further
25 nominations, the Chair entertains a motion to close

1 nominations for Vice Chair. It's been properly moved and
2 seconded. All those in favor please signify by saying
3 Aye.

4 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

5 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair...

6 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: It is non debatable. All those
7 opposed? No, the Ayes have it. Nominations are closed.
8 With that, all those in favor of Tamara Liberty Smith
9 becoming Vice Chair, please raise your hand.

10 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Right here, Mr. Chair. Pressley,
11 I mean, Pressley, Chair Pressley and Carter and
12 Commissioner Carter and Smith, Commissioner Smith.

13 MR. BROWN: Sir, I can't see hands down there. They
14 have to raise them a little higher.

15 Commissioner Pressley, Commissioner Banks.
16 Commissioner Smith and Commissioner Carter.

17 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: All those in favor of
18 Commissioner Jesus Hernandez, serving as vice chair,
19 please raise your hand.

20 MR. BROWN: Commissioner Moore, Commissioner
21 Hernandez.

22 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: All right. With four of the
23 six votes that have been casted, Tamara Liberty Smith is
24 declared as the Vice Chair of the Board of Police
25 Commissioners. Congratulations.

1 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair. Through the
2 Chair.

3 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: I just want to make sure I'm
4 done with that. I've done what I needed to do with that
5 election. Correct.

6 DR. JACKSON: Correct, Chair, you're finished.

7 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Okay. Thank you so very much.
8 Commissioner Burton.

9 DR. JACKSON: I just want to point out that the
10 bylaws state that they take office July 1st.

11 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Correct.

12 DR. JACKSON: I just want to make sure everyone...

13 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: But they are Chair elect and
14 Vice Chair elect until July 1st.

15 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair.

16 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Commissioner Burton.

17 COMMISSIONER BURTON: You know, I just want to point
18 out there that the Board of Police Commissioners lack
19 experience when it comes to the chair and the vice chair
20 positions. The board has always had someone that was very
21 proficient and policing the history of the board, as well
22 as police oversight in past practices. I don't know what
23 went wrong in the past few years, but experience really
24 matters to this community right here in number seven,
25 right here in District 5. Today, the Detroit Board of

1 Police Commissioners, let the citizens down today by
2 electing two individuals that have less than six months
3 service on a board of police commission. Also..

4 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: I'm going to ask that the
5 community, please keep your commentary to a minimum.

6 COMMISSIONER BURTON: a legal opinion was sought by
7 the attorney, where the attorney is not even present at
8 today's meeting. What does that tell you?

9 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. Alright. Now we'll
10 move forward to, well, before we move forward, let me
11 apologize. I truly do. You know, as the Chair, I have
12 tried my best to maintain some sense of decorum. And I
13 know that we may have presented a level of unseriousness
14 here that can be frustrating to, particularly residents
15 who take this very seriously. But again, I am grateful
16 that my colleagues were able to come to a resolution. And
17 I'm hopeful that as our next leadership assumes their
18 responsibilities that we will do a better job of being
19 responsible and respectful of our community's time and
20 their investment of trust in us to do our jobs. And while
21 I recognize that there are all kinds of influences and
22 considerations that have to be necessary, I just hope
23 that in the future we can be a little bit more proactive,
24 so at the moment that we come to this meeting before the
25 public again we can be better and more professional at

1 handling these matters. So, again, I do apologize for
2 that. But, you know, democracy can be messy. Alright, now
3 we will move forward to our resolutions and certificates
4 of appreciation. And I believe that it is being offered
5 to us by Commissioner Burton.

6 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I'm going to go with the
7 resolutions first. First I want to just... I guess I'll go
8 up here. First, I want to just welcome everyone here in
9 District 5, the mighty Seventh Precinct. This is the home
10 where you have a lot of great community leaders,
11 organizers like yourselves, but we also have some really
12 good police officers here in number seven, especially
13 your neighborhood police officers, where leadership goes
14 a long way. When I look at the Seventh Precinct, I look
15 at this community, what I see is law enforcement and
16 Detroit residents working together. You know there's no
17 better precinct that I would rather be part of and live
18 in with my family than number seven. I remember 2014 and
19 2015, this precinct was number one in total overall
20 reductions of crime. And they're still leading in other
21 areas throughout the city, especially with community
22 engagement, which is something that we all are very
23 familiar with. So I want to start off with the
24 resolutions for two in particular. I want to start off
25 right here with number seven, Ms. Hardman, are you here?

1 Can you come up please?

2 You know, Ms. Hardman is no stranger to our
3 community, and she understands the value of hard work,
4 and also community. I'm going to put my flashlight on so
5 I can get through your resolution. Ms. Hardman. So
6 resolution honoring Artina Hardman.

7 WHEREAS Ms. Hardman has been a devoted resident of
8 the City of Detroit for over 70 years, dedicating her
9 life to the betterment of our community. Her dedication,
10 hard work, and unwavering support for the City of Detroit
11 and its residents make her a truly deserving candidate of
12 this resolution. Ms. Hardman was born and raised on the
13 Eastside of Detroit, attending Scripps Elementary School,
14 Foch Middle School, and graduating from Southeastern High
15 School in 1969. She furthered her education at Wayne
16 County Community College Nursing School, obtaining her
17 License in Practical Nursing; and

18 WHEREAS On November 3, 1998, Ms. Hardman was
19 elected as Michigan State Representative from the Third
20 District, a position she held with distinction until

23 synonymous with community service and excellence.
24 Currently, Ms. Hardman serves as the Executive Director
25 for the Mack Alive nonprofit foundation. In this role,

1 she has been instrumental in several community
2 initiatives, including Community Bank, which organizes
3 the distribution of food boxes to seniors every third
4 Wednesday and public food distribution every fourth and
5 fifth Saturday of the month, Read Eat Art Learn
6 (R.E.A.L.) Program, a program that mentors youth ages 6-
7 12, Praise in the Park, an initiative aimed at community
8 engagement and spiritual inspiration and Annual Mack
9 Alive Parade, a beloved community event that celebrates
10 unity and diversity; and

11 WHEREAS Ms. Hardman is also an active member of
12 the NAACP, continuously advocating for civil rights and
13 community welfare. Ms. Hardman's heart is as big as her
14 accomplishments. Her humble and welcoming personality
15 makes her a cherished figure in our community. She is
16 known for her warm smile and the comforting hugs she
17 shares, making everyone feel valued and loved. Her
18 selflessness and dedication to putting others' needs
19 before her own make her a living example of grace and
20 compassion.

6 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Wonderful.

7 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Is there a second?

8 COMMISSIONER MOORE: It's been properly moved, and
9 seconded. All those in favor please signify by saying,
10 Aye.

11 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

12 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: All those opposed? No, the
13 Ayes have it. The resolution passes. Congratulations.

14 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Congratulations. Yeah.

15 MS. HARDMAN: Really quick. To God be the glory
16 because he is. There's something each one of us can do to
17 help the suffering of another human being. We don't have
18 to go outside of our community. We know who these people
19 are. We are our brothers and sisters' keeper. I thank the

7 in. Thank you. How are you doing today?

8 Okay, so this is the fun part, right? Alright. So,
9 this resolution right here is honoring Ms. Cassandra
10 Daniels.

12 hardworking, caring, and longtime supporter and resident
13 of the 7th Precinct and its community. Affectionately

4 annual community Christmas party. As an active member of
5 the Seventh Precinct Citizens Police Community Relations
6 Council, she plays a pivotal role in planning and
7 organizing community meetings, ensuring everything runs
8 smoothly and efficiently; and

9 WHEREAS Her commitment extends to Sacred Heart
10 Church, where she remains an active member and an
11 alumnus. Under the mentorship of the late Father Norman
12 P. Thomas, Lady Daniels developed a profound dedication
13 to her church duties. These include serving communion to
14 the sick and shut-in, maintaining the church bulletin,
15 and participating in the Health Task Force. In addition,
16 she volunteers at St. Vincent De Paul for their monthly
17 food drive every third Wednesday; and

18 WHEREAS Lady Daniels also contributes
19 significantly to her residential community at Ralph
20 Bunche Co-op, where she has lived for over 40 years. She
21 serves on the by-laws committee, demonstrating her
22 dedication to her neighbors and their well-being. In her
23 spare time, she enjoys taking walks around the
24 neighborhoods and visiting local parks, embodying the
25 spirit of community engagement. Ms. Daniels' love for the

1 city of Detroit is evident in her enthusiastic
2 personality and her unwavering willingness to help and
3 volunteer whenever called upon. Within the Seventh
4 Precinct, she is a beloved figure, known for her frequent
5 visits to check on her "officers" and her continuous
6 efforts to generate new ideas to keep the community
7 involved and engaged.

20 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Is there a second?

21 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: It's been properly moved, and
22 seconded. All those in favor please signify by saying,
23 Aye.

24 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

25 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: All those opposed? No. The

1 Ayes have it. The resolution passes. Congratulations.

2 MS. DANIELS: Good evening, everyone. First I would
3 like to give thanks to our Lord and Savior and Father
4 Norman Paul Thomas of the Sacred Heart Catholic Church,
5 located at 1000 Elliot Street at the corner of Norman
6 Paul Drive, formerly known as Rivard Street for getting
7 me involved with the Seventh Precinct. Because if it
8 hadn't been for Father Thomas, I never would've been
9 involved with the Seventh Precinct. And I have enjoyed
10 every moment. I enjoy the people over at the Seventh
11 Precinct. They're just like my family. I am deeply
12 honored and grateful for this award. Thank you. Thank
13 you, thank you. Seventh Precinct and Detroit Police
14 Commissioners.

15 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Congratulations.

16 COMMISSIONER BURTON: You know, I just wanted to add
17 that I have known Ms. Daniels for many years and I love
18 the heart that she has; she has a heart that is as wide
19 as the Grand Canyon. She's always there when the
20 community needs her. And I just thank God that we have
21 Ms. Daniels with us today to receive this award and just
22 her wisdom and knowledge about this District. I remember
23 years ago attending different community meetings, and one
24 of the meetings I ended up going to was at Sacred Heart
25 and there goes Ms. Daniels. And so, Ms. Daniels has

1 definitely been a pillar and a leader right here at
2 number seven. So number seven, forever be home to Ms.
3 Daniels. Thank you. The next one would be Ms. Ivy.
4 Nichole, are you with us? How are you doing? Welcome. All
5 right. So here's a resolution honoring Ms. Ivy Nichole.

6 WHEREAS Ivy Nichole is a native Detroiter with the
7 desire to make the world a better place. She has a great
8 passion for bringing resolutions to women and girls who
9 have been through a traumatic and stressful experience.
10 Ivy Nichole works effortlessly to bring awareness to
11 social issues such as human trafficking within
12 underserved communities; and

13 WHEREAS Ivy Nichole is the founder of Let's Have
14 Girl Talk, a mentoring program designed to give girls age
15 12 to 16 a platform to express themselves freely about
16 everyday challenges. Under the umbrella is the "Have You
17 Seen Her" initiative, which invites the community to
18 canvas when girls go missing in the Metro Detroit area.
19 Ivy Nichole became a partner with The Joseph Walker
20 Williams Recreation Center in Detroit in the summer of
21 2015 where she held "Girl Talk" sessions for girls in the
22 community. In 2016, she was introduced to the importance
23 of community involvement and social justice with the
24 Change Agent Consortium; and

25 WHEREAS Ivy Nichole attended Oakland Community

1 College, Auburn Hills Campus where she studied Mental
2 Health/Social Work, receiving her Associates Degree with
3 honors in 2016. She is currently attending Wayne State
4 University pursuing a Bachelor of Arts in Gender,
5 Sexuality & Women's Studies and a second Bachelor of
6 Science in Psychology. Her work experience includes
7 inpatient psych with adults and adolescents, residential
8 foster care for girls, homeless shelter for women and
9 children, Applied Behavioral Analysis for children with
10 autism and outpatient psych for mental health and
11 substance abuse disorders. Ivy Nichole plans to work with
12 Church of the Messiah to create a human trafficking task
13 force in the Metro Detroit area; and

14 WHEREAS In 2020, Ivy Nichole became a candidate
15 for Michigan House District 6, campaigning around issues
16 of mental health, human trafficking and women's rights.
17 Although she did not win the seat, she won the hearts of
18 the community and law enforcement by continuing to
19 educate individuals on mental illness and sex
20 trafficking.

21 NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED

22 That the Detroit Board of Police Commissioners,
23 speaking on behalf of the citizens of the great City of
24 Detroit, recognizes and honors the lifelong contributions
25 and commitment to excellence in public service of Ms. Ivy

1 Nichole. Her display of unwavering community spirit has
2 improved the quality of life for the citizens of Detroit.
3 We thank and congratulate you, Ms. Nichole.

4 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: The Chair entertains a motion
5 to adopt this resolution to our archives. Is there a
6 second? It's been properly moved and seconded. All those
7 in favor please signify by saying, Aye. All those
8 opposed? No. The Ayes have it. Congratulations.

9 MS. NICHOLE: I'm sorry, so bear with me. Okay. I
10 just want to say thank you all for recognizing my work
11 and I invite you all to join me in the fight of hope to
12 help look for missing girls, and educate the community on
13 sex trafficking. Because the last time I checked, we were
14 number two in the nation.

15 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Congratulations.

16 COMMISSIONER BURTON: So I just want to just add
17 that, you know we, we are really honoring some many good
18 leaders right here in the Seventh Precinct, right here in
19 this community. Ms. Ivy, Nichole is no stranger around
20 number seven, you know, community speaking with residents
21 doing those canvases, you know handing out brochures and
22 things of that nature and, and just really organizing you
23 know, members of the community to get out there and join
24 her on some of these walks. And so anytime you have a
25 young lady like Ms. Ivy Nichole you know, just, you know,

1 rolling up her sleeves, you know you know, speaking out,
2 addressing these issues is definitely commendable. We
3 need more people to join the fight with her. Let's give
4 Ms. Ivy Nichole another round of applause everyone. Let's
5 see, which one I'm at now? Is the honorable Attorney
6 Sharon McPhail with us? So we have a resolution for the
7 honorable Sharon McPhail. She's not here, but I will go
8 ahead and read the resolution, or do we hold it off for
9 next week? Mr. Chairman?

10 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Sorry.

11 COMMISSIONER BURTON: We have a resolution honoring
12 attorney Sharon McPhail for the work she does. She lives
13 right here in number seven but she's not with us at this
14 time. Do we read the resolution in the record today or do
15 we hold it over for next week?

16 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: That's your prerogative,

17 COMMISSIONER BANKS: The audience and next week,
18 commissioner. So many out there.

19 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Okay. So we'll add it to the
20 agenda for next week. Mr. Chairman. The next one that we
21 have here today, resolution is honoring, Driving While
22 Impaired Shock Prevention. Are you here today?
23 Organization. Apparently, Driving While Impaired Shock
24 Prevention program is not here today, Mr. Chairman, so I
25 guess we will hold these two over for next week.

1 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: We can hold them until we can
2 ensure those people will be present, if that's your
3 desire.

4 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Yes. Thank you. Alright, so we're
5 going to go to other awards. Do we have Harbor Town
6 Market here? We hold that one over too. Do we have the
7 Principal, Shirley Brown here today? Another one we'll
8 hold over? Do we have Sergeant McDaniels here from number
9 seven? Okay. We have Officer Davis who is going to accept
10 this one on behalf of Sergeant

11 Jamerio McDaniels. Certificate of Appreciation for
12 Sergeant Jamerio McDaniels for developing strong ties
13 with residents and community organ organizations in the
14 Seventh Precinct and enhancing public safety through
15 stronger police community relations in our city. And so
16 today, the Detroit Board of Police Commissioners
17 acknowledge Sergeant McDaniels or a great job, well done.
18 Chairman, my signature is supposed to go on all of these
19 certificates. And I see my signature is not on any of
20 these.

21 We have something that our office does inside and
22 put the commissioner's name on it where the certificates
23 go.

24 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Do you have a pen for
25 Commissioner Burton?

26 COMMISSIONER BURTON: No. It's something that our
27 office does for us. Yeah.

28 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: In the past, I have signed
29 those manually.

1 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Okay. So this certificate right
2 here is honoring Officer Sylvester Hill, neighborhood
3 police officer here at number seven.

4 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Handing them out with no
5 signature. I mean, this is his thing.

6 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Yeah. But in the past, we'll,
7 always, before you arrived, Pressley, it has always been
8 electronic signature. Yes. Oh. So, Certificate of
9 Appreciation for neighborhood police officer Sylvester
10 Hill for developing strong ties with residents in the
11 community organization in the Seventh Precinct and
12 enhancing public safety through stronger police community
13 relations in our city. NPO, Sylvester Hill, Officer Hill,
14 is one of our great officers who's always there when
15 Detroit residents call here in the Seventh Precinct. I
16 love the work this good brother has been doing throughout
17 the years and even continue to do today you know, for
18 quality of life issues, making Detroit residents lives
19 here. Number seven, a lot better. You're talking about
20 good leadership, talking about good officers today. We
21 acknowledge a few of those good officers right now. And I
22 would like to thank Officer Hill for the great job you
23 are doing here every single day.

24 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Commissioner Burton.

25 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Another thing I want to say is

1 that Officer Hill is also CIT certified and one of our
2 first earlier days of officers being certified with the
3 CIT. It was great to see that pen on his uniform because
4 this precinct loves the work that he does, as well as our
5 community. And so, I wanted to say thank you so much for
6 a good job. Well done

7 OFFICER HILL: I just would like to say thank you to
8 everyone. My partners in the back, my command staff. I
9 appreciate it. Love the community. Love my singers and my
10 kids that I work with. I just want to say thank you.

11 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. Now, Commissioner
12 Burton, because all of the certificates read the same and
13 for the sake of time as we have read it into record, if
14 we can just name the recipients and acknowledge them in
15 that way, I think that that will help us be a little more
16 expedient. Thank you.

17 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Sure. I want to call Officer
18 Davis' partner up, Officer Strickland, who happens to be
19 a neighborhood police officer here in number seven. You
20 know, she is the glue, the catalyst, and the magic of
21 great, fun things happening right here in number seven.
22 So, a lot of these, a lot of attractions that you see in
23 number seven you know, events and stuff is, you know,
24 Officer Strickland is just amazing. She and her whole
25 entire team. So congratulations for a job well done.

1 Okay?

2 OFFICER STRICKLAND: Thank you. It's a team effort.

3 COMMISSIONER BURTON: So, I agree with someone in the
4 audience. Give her a raise. We actually have some really
5 great decorated officers over at number seven, and I agree
6 many of them deserve raises, you know, and so community,
7 let's push to get that done. Let's keep fighting for our
8 good officers for raises. They need it. The next one is a
9 young man by the name of Jaylin Harris. Jaylin, are you
10 with us? Jaylin is no stranger to our community. I
11 remember when this young man was in high school. And I
12 look up years later, he's a grown man and a family man,
13 and doing great things right here in number seven. You
14 know I see this guy being a police commissioner someday,
15 you know, and it may be soon. Who knows? So, you know,
16 just remember Jaylin Harris.

17 Yep. Congratulations Mr. Harris for the great work
18 you're doing in the community. Jaylin has a lot of events
19 on his calendar, I mean he's one of those guys that stays
20 busy, stays active, and so I really love the work he
21 does. You're talking about young people and leader
22 leadership, that man you know, leadership has to be his
23 middle name, right? So the next one is Ray Smith. Is Ray
24 Smith here? I guess we'll hold this one over too. Kenneth
25 Kabaka Reynolds. Are you with us today? We'll hold this

1 one over too. Beverly Kindle-Walker. Are you with us
2 today?

3 Ms. Beverly Kindle-Walker. You know, I admire her
4 leadership. You know, she's a true fighter and a champion
5 right here in number seven, in this community right here
6 on the East side. She does a wonderful job working with
7 our youth and over at the city airport you know in that
8 aviation program that they're doing with young children,
9 and also the safety component. So I do like to have Ms.
10 Beverly Kindle-Walker say a few words. And this is for
11 you, Ms. Beverly.

12 MS. KINDLE-WALKER: Well, thank you, Commissioner
13 Burton. I appreciate this opportunity to stand before the
14 community, not that I'm a stranger to standing before the
15 community. I am not, but when you invoke the name of
16 Coleman, Alexander Young, that's why I do what I do, is
17 because when he looked in my eyes and asked us, Mrs.
18 Ernestine Gordon, to take up the challenge of defending
19 this airport, I have done that for the last 34 years. So
20 right now I have a room full of Tuskegee Airmen waiting
21 on me since seven o'clock, because this was supposed to
22 go on. But nevertheless, democracy isn't always pretty.
23 But we do what we do because we believe it and we love
24 it. So thank you again for recognizing me and honoring me
25 with this wonderful tribute. And I'll say, I haven't seen

1 my mother over here in so long. I appreciate you. Stay in
2 the fight. Amen.

3 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Congratulations.

4 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Appreciate you. Mr. Emory
5 Reeves. Is Mr. Emory Reeves available? Mr. Emory Reeves
6 is another pillar community leader right here in the
7 Seventh Precinct, District 5 community. And so I really
8 want to just take the time and a moment to thank you for
9 the great job you are doing in the community. You know
10 man, congratulations.

11 MR. REEVES: Thank you.

12 COMMISSIONER BURTON: You know, this is an amazing
13 job that you're doing, as far as public safety, educating
14 families right here in our community. So thank you for a
15 job well done. Ms. Nancy Burst, are you with us? Ms.
16 Nancy Burst is not with us today? She's a senior as well,
17 very active here in the Seventh Precinct community, here
18 in District 5. I mean, anytime something goes wrong in
19 the community, she's right there to notify her neighbors.
20 I mean just a wonderful lady who just recently got out of
21 the hospital that long ago, and I'm going to make sure
22 that she gets this. Jason Pruitt, are you here today?
23 Curtis Lyons, are you with us today? Everybody knows
24 Curt.

25 You know, Curtis Lyons. Mr. Lyons has been a long

1 time resident right here, in the Seventh Precinct
2 community. No stranger to our community. He's always
3 there when Citizens call. Whenever our community comes
4 together, you are always going to find Curtis Lyons at
5 those meetings, talking about public safety, talking
6 about money and banking, and working with our youth in
7 the school systems. Just the other day we were at three
8 schools talking to our youth. You're talking about
9 mentorship, working with young males. To our brothers out
10 here, we really have to start mentoring, and raising up
11 this whole new generation. So I really want to take the
12 time to thank Mr. Curtis Lyons, Lyons Legacy Planning for
13 being here today for a great job that you're doing, with
14 our youth and the school system. And thank you for being
15 here today.

16 I also want to just say too you know, over the
17 years, whenever there was an officer down in the line of
18 duty, and I would go to the hospital and I'd be there
19 with our officers and with the officer's family, Curtis
20 Lyons was always my sidekick right there with me, you
21 know great guy right here in the community. I'm talking
22 about a leader. This is the leader. This is leadership
23 right here. All of you in this room are leaders.

24 Somebody who could just stop what they were doing,
25 and be there. I could be anywhere in the city. I get a

1 notification, get a call. I'm there with our officers,
2 with the officer's family. This guy is right there with
3 me in the hospital. You're talking about a decade of
4 service right here on this board. This job is not easy
5 for commissioners. It's not easy for elected officials,
6 but somebody has to do this. It's not easy for our
7 officers, right? But guess what? Somebody has to do it.

8 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Commissioner Burton, it
9 appears we have about 10 of these remaining. And so
10 again, if we can kind of keep the pace.

11 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Okay. We said Shirley Brown,
12 the other one is for Miss Wendy Brown, who also happens
13 to be a principal too. I don't see her in the audience.

14 Reverend Charles Williams, Sr. I don't see him.
15 That's the National Action Network. Reverend Charles
16 Williams Sr. Reverend Charles Williams II, I don't see
17 him either. Charles Collins, Eddie Dos Santos, Terry
18 Pain, John Williams-Save Detroit. D and Dee, Grassroots.
19 So, you know, D and Dee Grassroots, I want to present you
20 with this Certificate of Appreciation for the hard work
21 you guys are doing, and your organization right here in
22 number seven. You all feed more families here in
23 Southeastern Michigan than most organizations. But more
24 importantly, right here, number seven, you all do
25 something that you know what you come to share with some

1 of the work you're doing.

2 D AND DEE GRASSROOTS: We'd just like to say thank
3 you to Commissioner Burton for this award and recognizing
4 our work. And we'd like to thank you all for the work
5 that you do, too. Thank you very much.

6 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Congratulations.

7 D AND DEE GRASSROOTS: And also, can never forget, to
8 God be the glory.

9 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Amen.

10 D AND DEE GRASSROOTS: Thank you.

11 COMMISSIONER BURTON: You know, it's an amazing job
12 that they're doing with you know, with the community
13 group, and over at the recreation center. Great job, well
14 done.

15 D AND DEE GRASSROOTS: I'd like to thank our team,
16 our staff members, our grassroots, Detroit (Low Audio)
17 grassroots Detroit. There's nothing without their
18 community, especially our team work. We thank our team
19 members for making all of these things possible. And our
20 (Low Audio)and everyone.

21 COMMISSIONER BURTON: You know, D and Dee Grassroots,
22 are always at the Seventh Precinct community relations
23 meetings; very active, very strong right here in this
24 community. So thank you for the great work you all are
25 doing. This one is for Lafayette Foods, which happens to

1 be a Green Light here in number seven. And Harbor Town
2 Foods is also Green Light as well. I don't see their
3 representatives here. But you know, everyone that we have
4 named here is doing a remarkable job in, in public safety
5 education, mentoring, outreach. And that happens to be
6 right here, number seven, doing a great job in the fifth
7 District. So I just wanted to say thank you all for the
8 great work you all are doing, and thank you all for being
9 here. That'd be it for me, Mr. Chairman.

10 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Alright. Thank you so very
11 much. And again, congratulations to all of our recipients
12 of either resolutions or certificates. With that we'll
13 move to the Chief of Police report, as well as the
14 Seventh Precinct. And that will be offered to us by DC
15 Williams.

16 DC WILLIAMS: So, I'll go ahead and start with the
17 Chief of Police report, then I'll pass it off to
18 Commander Svec from the Seventh Precinct. Through the
19 Chair.

20 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Go right ahead and start.

21 DC WILLIAMS: So update on injured officers. We have
22 one officer who is currently disabled and at home resting
23 from his injury. That officer is with downtown services.
24 The crime data I'll read is as of June 12th. So we're
25 currently down in all of our violent crime categories,

1 and for homicide, we're down 22%. So we've had 25 less
2 homicides this year than we had last year. Last year we
3 had 114, this year we had 89. For our non-fatal
4 shootings, we're down 21%. So that means we've had 70
5 less non-fatal shootings this year than we had last year.
6 Last year we had 337, this year we had 267. For
7 robberies, we're also down. We're down 28%. That means
8 we've had 179 less larcenies this year, I'm sorry,
9 robberies this year than we had last year. Last year we
10 had 636, this year we've had 456 total. Part one violent
11 crime, we're down 11%. So that just means citywide. Our
12 violent crime is down by 11%. That means we've had 620
13 less part one violent crime incidents than we had last
14 year. Last year we had 5,547, this year we've had 4,927.
15 Carjacking, we're down 48%. Last year we had 80
16 carjackings. This year we've had 42 for a difference of
17 38. Before I go any further, the Chair asked a question
18 about the noise ordinance, and he asked specifically
19 about time. So I didn't have that at the time, but the
20 actual time is from 10:00 PM to 7:00 AM. There should not
21 be noise to upset or disrupt the neighborhood. So just to
22 put that out as well.

23 Going into drag racing, for our drag racing
24 enforcement this past weekend, we had six vehicles
25 investigated, two vehicles impounded, one felony arrest,

1 two weapons recovered. We had one block party response,
2 and we issued tickets to four spectators doing the drag
3 race and enforcement. So going to our mental health and
4 related calls for service. So this week we've had 73
5 calls for service for individuals who are in mental
6 crisis who are unarmed. We had... give me one second, here.
7 We had 38 where they were armed, and we had a total of
8 1,590. That's an increase of 144 from last year. Last
9 year we only had 1,446. For overdose related calls, and
10 this is year to date, we had 2,176, last year we had I'm
11 sorry. This year we had 2,176, 2000, I'm sorry, 2023, we
12 had 2,318. We've had a decrease of 142 calls for service
13 for overdose related incidents. Significant incidents.
14 Going from Saturday June 8th, we had a triple shooting,
15 one fatal, two non-fatal. This occurred in a 4,700 block
16 of Nevada. We basically had one individual who was shot
17 while in the backseat of a black Jeep. And then we had
18 two other individuals who were found shot later in the
19 18,000 block of Healy. We do have video of the incident.
20 One of the individuals was fatally wounded. The other two
21 received non-life threatening injuries. The circumstances
22 behind it, it was a group of people at the 4,700 block of
23 Nevada, and they were attending a candlelight vigil for
24 someone who had passed away. And during that vigil,
25 somebody in the back of a small white SUV, produced a

1 long gun and started firing into the crowd.

2 If you have any information, please call 1800
3 SpeakUp. And that's the Crime Stoppers number, or you can
4 go on Detroit Rewards TV. Incident number two, fatal
5 shooting. This happened on June 8th, Saturday. This
6 occurred in the area of West Warren and the Southfield
7 Freeway Service Drive. And this was about 10:11 PM on
8 Saturday. Officers got a call that someone had, well,
9 they actually had a couple calls. We had a ShotSpotter
10 run that identified the shots had been fired in that
11 area. And we also had a run to Oakwood Hospital where
12 someone was transported. And once they got to Oakwood
13 Hospital, the wound was fatal and they were pronounced
14 dead on scene. We basically have a weapon that was
15 recovered from the vehicle. That individual was
16 transported from the scene by one of the witnesses at the
17 hospital.

18 We were able to recover that vehicle that was used
19 to transport the victim. That vehicle did have bullet
20 wounds, or I'm sorry, bullet holes in it. And it also had
21 a firearm that was recovered from the scene. So we have a
22 couple of leads that we're working up with that based on
23 the recovery of the weapon. We don't know exactly what
24 happened, but we know that they were driving and we were
25 able to find rifle casings at that scene of Southfield

1 Freeway Service Drive in West Warren. If anyone has any
2 information on that contact Crime Stoppers at 1800
3 SpeakUp or Detroit Rewards TV. We had another double now
4 fatal shooting. This occurred on Sunday, June 9th at
5 10:16 PM. This occurred on the 14,000 block of Rutland.
6 And we basically had a 15 and 16-year-old individual.

7 They were playing around with handguns and they were
8 not fatally wounded. Both of them were shot through the
9 hands while they were playing with the weapons. So this
10 was an accidental shooting. We were able to recover the
11 weapon. I believe we recovered two weapons at that scene.
12 And the next incident was a fatal shooting. This occurred
13 on Monday, June 10th at 4:00 AM. Officers were dispatched
14 to the 11,000 block of Marlowe. For this shooting, we
15 believe that the circumstances behind the shooting was a
16 neighbor's trouble. Officers did get to the scene and
17 found one individual who was fatally wounded. The actual
18 suspect was determined, identified, and arrested at the
19 hospital.

20 That concludes the critical incidents that we've had
21 up until Monday. Serving our seniors. On Tuesday,
22 recruits from Class 2024E served lunch to seniors at
23 Hartford Nursing and rehabilitation. Before their
24 graduation. Each Academy class will participate in at
25 least one community engagement project to Serve, then

1 Protect Initiative. And that's part of that Serve, Then
2 Protect Initiative. There'll be a peacenik this upcoming
3 Saturday, and this will be occurring at the Heilmann
4 Recreation Center in the Ninth Precinct. It's going to be
5 from 3:00 PM to 7:00 PM. This is basically a gathering
6 where police and community eat and have fun together in
7 the name of peace. Silence the violence. On Saturday,
8 June 15th from 10:00 AM to 12:00 PM, there will be a 17th
9 annual Silence to Violence march and rally at Church of
10 the Messiah. With that, there are two events that will be
11 happening at Seventh Precinct, but I'll call up Commander
12 Speck and I'll have him start to address that. But before
13 I do that if there are any questions on the Chief's
14 report,

15 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: We're going to do a few things
16 here. Because one with the many certificates that were
17 being distributed, there was one name that we
18 unfortunately overlooked. And so I want Commissioner
19 Burton to provide that now, so this individual does have
20 to stay longer than she's already been here.

21 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I'd like to call up Ms. Denise
22 Barnes. So I wanted to say today, it is an honor to be
23 able to recognize in the knowledge with a Certificate of
24 Appreciation to Ms. Denise Barnes over at Martin Luther
25 King High School. What a wonderful job you are doing with

1 our young people. Thank you.

2 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Congratulations. And again,
3 sorry for the oversight. And so then we're going to ask
4 questions for the Chief, and then we'll have the Seventh
5 Precinct report. So, any questions? Commissioner Moore.

6 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. First
7 of all, thanks for your leadership, Deputy Chief
8 Williams. To the Seventh Precinct family, I'm a West side
9 commissioner, so the majority complaints I get are from
10 the west side. However, I have received a few that you've
11 assisted with personally, and I just want to say thank
12 you and you are missed over at the Sixth Precinct, even
13 though Commander Newsom's doing a great job. Can you pass
14 a message to Deputy Chief Hayes? I asked a few weeks ago
15 about the Wayne State University protests. I want to know
16 what unit from DPD assisted Wayne State. Was it the
17 mobile Field force? Was it the local precinct? Whatever.
18 I just want to know who assisted.

19 DC WILLIAMS: Through the Chair. I can answer that.
20 Yes. I was actually there during that time. So are we
21 talking specifically about the...

22 COMMISSIONER MOORE: There was a protest at Wayne
23 State where more of an encampment was removed.

24 DC WILLIAMS: Okay. So we're talking spec because at
25 different times there'll be different entities from the

1 Detroit Police Department that'll assist Wayne State. For
2 the actual encampment DPD was on site and we were
3 standing by, in case Wayne State needed assistance. We
4 took no active role except assisting them with prisoner
5 processing. But if something would've happened, we were
6 there to give them further aid. And it was the Mobile
7 Field Force Unit.

8 COMMISSIONER MOORE: And through the Chair, I just
9 want to know what unit was there?

10 DC WILLIAMS: Through the Chair. It was a Mobile
11 Field Force Unit.

12 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Oh, okay. Thanks a lot.

13 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Any further questions?

14 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair.

15 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Commissioner Burton.

16 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I don't have a question, but I
17 just want to just add this really quick. I just wanted to
18 talk about two great leaders that we've seen here. At
19 number seven, I watched Captain Hope come from this
20 precinct and became a second deputy chief. I watched a
21 captain get promoted to Commander and became the
22 commander of this precinct, number seven, which was
23 Commander Williams who now is sitting in the capacity of
24 assistant deputy chief right here with the Detroit Police
25 Department. Great leadership has come from number seven.

1 So let's give DC second Deputy Chief Hope, who used to be
2 our captain at number seven, a round applause. And let's
3 give our Assistant Chief Arnold Williams, DC Deputy Chief
4 Arnold Williams. A round of applause too, because they
5 both came from number seven.

6 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Alright, amazing. Any further
7 questions or comments? Hearing none, introduce the
8 Seventh Precinct.

9 DC WILLIAMS: We have Commander Svec, come up to the
10 podium.

11 COMMANDER SVEC: Good evening, everyone through the
12 Chair, I'd like to start by introducing some of my
13 coworkers.

14 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Go right ahead.

15 COMMANDER SVEC: NPO Hill, NPO Davis and our newest
16 NPO Baxter. NPO Stribling outside talking to some
17 citizens. But getting into the crime information for
18 number seven. Number seven is having a good year for
19 crime. We are down in homicides, 25% down in sexual
20 assaults, 50% down in aggravated assaults, 18.3% down in
21 robbery, 51.4%. The one area that we are up in is
22 burglary. We are up 28.4%, down in larceny, 6.1% down in
23 motor vehicle theft, 9.5%. Non-Fatal shootings we're down
24 47.4%. And carjackings, we are currently down a hundred
25 percent. We have had none year to date.

1 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Excellent.

2 COMMANDER SVEC: So that combines for a 23% reduction
3 in part one violent crime and 4.4 in property crime.

4 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Wonderful.

5 COMMANDER SVEC: Thank you. Strategy result, as I
6 mentioned, our reduction of 23.7 in violent and 4.4 in
7 property crime. Homicides are down. Our current
8 identified trend as burglaries; we're focused on
9 burglaries, is as our only part one crime that's shown
10 increase. We run weekly operations that target known
11 offenders. We had a recent arrest for a repeat offender
12 that closed seven home invasions. He is suspected in 12
13 more in the Seventh, and Eleventh Precincts. The
14 investigation in those open cases are ongoing. We
15 conducted warrant sweeps for burglary and burglary
16 related offenses. And we've seen a trend in release,
17 recent domestic violence related burglaries. And those
18 are being addressed with our warrant unit arresting known
19 offenders. Precinct strategy. We have a warrant unit that
20 works closely with our detective unit to arrest known
21 offenders, target enforcement, and identify hotspots,
22 directed traffic enforcement in those identified
23 hotspots.

24 We do weekly home checks with our MDOC partners.
25 Partnership with homicide gang intelligence, major

1 violators, vice enforcement, and CATS have led to a
2 reduction in all violent crimes. Community programs, we
3 have dozens. I'd like to highlight some of the actions.
4 Our MPOs, we threw a haunted house party. This past
5 Halloween trick or treating events. Turkey bingo, Turkey
6 giveaway, Thanksgiving dinners, holiday party, senior
7 movie day adopt a Family on Christmas. Christmas dinners,
8 game day potlucks, reading with little darlings,
9 community readings, real man read, anti-bullying
10 presentations. Seventh Precinct Annual Memorial for
11 fallen officers,' spaghetti dinners. And like DC
12 mentioned, we have our 17th annual Silence of Violence
13 March this Saturday at 10:00 AM at Lafayette and East
14 Grand Boulevard. That concludes my report, if you have
15 any questions.

16 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. Any questions?
17 Commissioner Moore?

18 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. Good
19 seeing you again. Commander. Last time I saw you was
20 lieutenant at number 10. I have a question in regards to
21 court appearances. I know that's a little bit off topic,
22 but it's in reference to section 202.5-5.8 of the DPD
23 manual. It talks about how the commanding officer shall
24 initiate an investigation to determine the reason for the
25 member's failure to appear as scheduled. Do you do a lot

1 of those as it relates to officer's failing to appear in
2 court?

3 COMMANDER SVEC: I don't conduct the investigation
4 myself, but I assign those. But yes, our detective unit
5 routes those out weekly. Anyone that misses court is
6 subject to discipline.

7 COMMISSIONER MOORE: How in depth is that report?

8 COMMANDER SVEC: We see if they've received their
9 notice. We have an electronic court book that we track
10 when they were served, which supervisor served them. And
11 then we ask them why they weren't in court. See if they
12 called in sick, see if they were on vacation. Even if
13 they're on vacation, they're required to notify a
14 supervisor that they won't be available. And if they
15 cannot justify their absence, their discipline starts.

16 COMMISSIONER MOORE: And finally, so when you say
17 supervisor and the manual reference is a term called
18 Watch Commander?

19 COMMANDER SVEC: Yes, sir.

20 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Is that what we're talking
21 about, the supervisor?

22 COMMANDER SVEC: We generally have a span of control.
23 Every officer is assigned to a sergeant and that sergeant
24 handles the investigation.

25 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you.

1 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Any further questions?

2 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Yes.

3 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Commissioner Burton.

4 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair. I wanted to
5 say how you doing, Commander?

6 COMMANDER SVEC: Good, sir.

7 COMMISSIONER BURTON: And it's great to see you
8 today. You know, we have a commander here at number seven
9 that's very hard at work and that loves this community.
10 And so it is great to see the commander here today who's
11 very hard at work and loves this community. I remember a
12 year ago we walked with Willie in the community. So we
13 had members of the community come out and walk and the
14 commander was like the first person that arrived and he
15 and I sat there and talked for a minute until community
16 members came about. So it's always great to see our
17 commander here at number seven. Commander. I just want to
18 just ask, what do you all have planned for National Night
19 Out this year, or are you all still working on it?

20 COMMANDER SVEC: We're still in the planning phase.

21 We won top last year of course. COMMISSIONER BURTON:
22 Okay. So, National Night Out to our community is
23 something that we look forward to each and every year. I
24 know number seven does a great job at National Night Out,
25 and so forth other precincts, but I, you know, I believe

1 national Night Out this year at number seven is going to
2 be outstanding just like it was last year, and for years
3 going forward as well as past years, when Captain Hope,
4 who's now second deputy chief was the captain here. So
5 commander, I just want to say, we appreciate the work you
6 do and your team does here at number seven. And I'm
7 looking forward to coming over there for National Night
8 Out.

9 COMMANDER SVEC: Thank you, sir.

10 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you. Any further
11 questions? Commissioner Banks. COMMISSIONER BANKS:
12 Through the Chair. What does National Night Out and what
13 does it consist of?

14 COMMANDER SVEC: That's an annual event. Every
15 precinct hosts a party. Last year we had a live DJ, we
16 had a bounce house, just to celebrate, reach out to the
17 community, establish a relationship, a tighter
18 relationship with the community.

19 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Okay.

20 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Any further questions or
21 comments? Hearing none, thank you so very much for a
22 thorough report, both you and DC Williams.

23 COMMANDER SVEC: Thank you, sir.

24 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Alright, with that, we'll now
25 return back to oral communication.

1 MR. BROWN: Yeah. Mr. Chair, currently we have four
2 speakers left. I call Ms. Bernie Smith, followed by a
3 caller with the last three numbers, 534. Ms. Smith.

4 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Mr. Chairman, I just wanted to
5 say...

6 MS. SMITH: Good afternoon everyone. I'm sorry. I am
7 so happy to see you here. We miss you over there at the
8 Sixth. At least my son and his sister, because what has
9 happened over there on their street, got some little drug
10 dealers and I told him that you're no longer over there,
11 but he should get acquainted with whoever the chief is
12 over there. I don't know who's over there that's taking
13 your place. But in the meantime, they had a little
14 skirmish over there on their street, and it's all quiet
15 now because my son did talk to the young man that he saw
16 that was dealing about three doors from him there on
17 Betting. But anyway, I'm glad to see you and hope that
18 you'll stay safe. I've been going downtown, the Greek
19 town. I have been sitting there observing what the police
20 are doing down there.

21 I used to do it a couple of years ago, so I'm doing
22 it again just for the heck of it. And I tell all of them
23 to be safe and I want you to take care of yourselves. And
24 they love the fact that I extend that greetings to them.
25 I'm just about, I mean, I'm satisfied that they're doing

1 a good job. But there's only one thing. You have the cars
2 that are constantly coming. Once they turn off Beaubien,
3 and they come into... what's the street? Well anyway, you
4 know what I'm talking about. And they park here on the
5 side, on the right side constantly and they block up the
6 traffic and then they'll jump out and go across the
7 street to the, I think it's an ice cream place or
8 something over there. And sometimes they will be on this
9 side of the street on the right side also. So my thing
10 is, we should have at least a couple of the police
11 that'll be on the corner and when they come around there
12 and stay and park unnecessary, all they have to do is go
13 up there and flash the flashlight. because I've seen it
14 done before, especially on the weekends, but on a weekday
15 it's really hectic down there. So I just want to bring
16 that to your attention.

17 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you.

18 MS. SMITH: And my time up already?

19 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Yes, unfortunately it is.

20 MS. SMITH: I'll talk a little faster from now on.

21 Alright. Thank you so much. Seeing you again Chief. And
22 to my commissioners, keep up the good job. I'm very proud
23 of you.

24 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you.

25 MR. BROWN: Call her with the last three numbers,

1 534. Call her with the last three numbers. 534. Mr.

2 Chair, I'll go to the next... Oh, there you go.

3 CALLER 534: Yes. Good evening. May I be heard?

4 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Yes, you can go right ahead.

5 CALLER 534: Okay. Well we have a lot more concerns
6 in the North end. I mean, there's the issue of loud noise
7 for people in the park. We also have an arsonist on the
8 loose. Most unfortunate. It took me a long time to get
9 through to an NPO officer. That's one of the reasons that
10 I wanted my Commissioner Burton to please give me a call.
11 But finally I went to the precinct, got the names of the
12 community policing officers, finally got some, but it was
13 very difficult to get attention on the North end when
14 there's an arsonist on the loose. I also would like you
15 to know that the Club Detroit Land Bank Authority is
16 running around trying to take people's property, claiming
17 a vacant, boarded up building as a nuisance. When they
18 get a bunch of stuff for people they contract with, isn't
19 even boarded up the whole way.

20 Opened a human trespass. And you know, I have a
21 situation where I have a building and it got hit by an
22 arsonist after my neighbor had reported the guy stealing
23 off his porch six times on camera and the police did
24 nothing. Then he lit several houses on fire. Now he has
25 been released. He only did a year in jail or wherever he

1 was, got released to team wellness. And voila, no
2 surprise, he cut his tether off and he violated the stay
3 away order. He's in the north end. It should not take a
4 resident this much effort to get attention to a situation
5 like this. But I'll be able to amply prove to the judge
6 that this is not a concern about safety. It's more about
7 the Land Bank trying to control and commandeer private
8 property and enforce development. It's disgusting what
9 they're doing. The Land Bank attorney won't even discuss
10 with me their legal authority. Well probably because they
11 don't have any. And by the way, former Police Chief Craig
12 submitted a declaration. I don't know. He is an expert on
13 blight. But just because you could find a dead body in a
14 building, a vacant building, which never happened in my
15 case, doesn't mean that a house is some sort of...

16 MR. BROWN: The election integrity, Rue.

17 RUE: Hello.

18 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Yes.

19 RUE: Commissioner Pressley. Linda Bernard is not
20 there. She asked about a month ago, close to a month now
21 for the Michigan State Police Report. Can you take it
22 upon yourself to insist that this report is presented to
23 the board so the rest of the board members and yourself
24 can see the report today before you leave? Now I want to
25 jump right into the fact that Dennis M. Winfrey, 19 years

1 of services, city of Clerk, city of Detroit, and the
2 director of the Detroit Department of Elections, Gina
3 Avery Walker as a federal lawsuit that alleges for now,
4 election fraud, absentee ballot voter fraud, to be
5 specific. We have the Detroit Voter Trap. District 5, you
6 have a number of voting trap houses. Now, these
7 particular houses slang votes, they don't slang dope as a
8 normal trap house would. Now over in District 5, you have
9 a pattern of people moving out of the city, out of the
10 district, and then to other states. And then being re-
11 registered after they surrender their license in other
12 states, they re-registered in Detroit, Detroit Department
13 of Elections by absentee ballot voter application. These
14 people don't know that they're casting votes in Detroit
15 elections.

16 District 7, Fred Durhal did not win that election.
17 Not by those 60 votes under the 12,000 cast, that iron
18 clad. Still to prove evidence of voter fraud.

19 MR. BROWN: Mr. Chair, your last speaker will be
20 former Commissioner William Davis.

21 MR. DAVIS: Good evening. Can I be heard?

22 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Yes, you can. Go right ahead.

23 MR. DAVIS: Well, I'd like to start off by saying
24 that these meetings are too long. I mean, there's too
25 much dead time in them. Also, I think that this board

1 just made history, you know, by voting for a Chairperson.
2 Well, actually, I see what the appointees voting for a
3 non-appointee that's a convicted felon. You know, if
4 somebody's a convicted felon, especially if it's
5 homicide, I don't think that person... and I know
6 Commissioner Woods and I like him and he's doing a lot of
7 good things. But that's setting a bad example that the
8 eyes of the nation are going to be looking at you all.
9 You know, you tell young people they can't be a police
10 officer being a convicted fellow, but yet you elect
11 somebody to be the Chairperson of the Board of Police
12 Commissioners. I noticed there were just the appointees
13 that voted for him, but you all sat in a very poor
14 example. A very poor example. You know? And Lord, Lord,
15 Lord, I mean, how could you all have oversight and tell a
16 22-year-old or so that they can't be a police officer
17 because they committed something, you know, or a 30-year-
18 old or a 40-year-old. You know, I don't think you all
19 really, you know, this board probably should just cease
20 to exist if you all are going to have a convicted felon
21 over it. Thank you.

22 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you again. Thank you for
23 everyone's public comment. At this time, we will now move
24 to a presentation to the board. Commissioner Banks, are
25 you staying or leaving? Hey, well, we need a quorum in

1 order to hear this final presentation. And having had
2 this individual wait here for several, I mean a few
3 hours, I hope that there is a way that you can give us at
4 least seven more minutes. Commissioner Banks. Oh, she
5 left. Oh, well, well then, well, that was just given to
6 me. Is there any new business?

7 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair.

8 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Commissioner Burton?

9 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I just want to just say, you
10 know, I just asked Commissioner Hernandez to please cover
11 his mouth when he coughs. You know, I lost several people
12 to this pandemic, to Covid.

13 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Okay.

14 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Off the Covid.

15 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: At this point, the Chair
16 entertains the motion for adjournment.

17 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Please cover your mouth.

18 **A CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Alright. We lost the quorum.**
19 **So the meeting is adjourned.**
