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CITY OF DETROIT
BOARD OF POLICE COMMISSIONERS MEETING
June 20, 2024 at 3:00 P.M.

1 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: Good afternoon everyone.
2 My name, Ricardo Moore, Pro tem, of the Detroit Board of
3 Police Commissioners. I would like to open up today with
4 our invocation.

5 CHAPLAIN JOHNSON: Hello, how are you all doing?

6 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: Great.

7 CHAOLAIN JOHNSON: My name is Chaplain Anthony
8 Johnson. I came to do the invocation for you. Heavenly
9 Father, and the authority of Jesus Christ, we thank you
10 heavenly Father, for this is the day that you have made,
11 Father God in heaven. We thank you heavenly Father, that
12 you made an opportunity for this day to happen. We pray
13 for the police commissioners, heavenly Father, that they
14 will act on one accord for your glory. We pray for our
15 chief. We pray for the Department of the Detroit Police
16 Department. We pray for the chaplain court. We pray,
17 heavenly Father, for those who are in need of healing,
18 that they'll be healed from the point of their head to
19 the soles of their feet. We thank you heavenly Father,
20 for according to Psalms, chapter 20, for being attentive
21 to my prayer, my suffocation for your glory. Heavenly
22 Father, I declare not to decree this right now in the
23 authority of Jesus Christ, of Nazareth, by his blood, in
24 Jesus name. Amen.

25 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: Amen. Thank you

1 Chaplain.

2 CHAPLAIN JOHNSON: Thank you, sir.

3 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: Since we do not have a
4 quorum, we'll go straight to the acting Secretary's
5 report. Mr. Brown, are you available?

6 MR. BROWN: Good afternoon Pro-Chair. Can you hear
7 me?

8 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: Yes, sir.

9 MR. BROWN: Under the Secretary's report, there are
10 several incoming correspondences. You have one from the
11 Chief of Police Office for an appointment to Captain for
12 Lieutenant Sederic Dunbar, a letter of recognition from
13 Corporation Counsellor Mallett, pertaining to attorney
14 Stephanie LaBelle. DPD sent the board some BOPC
15 inquiries. You also received the CR specification report,
16 OCI weekly report and a letter from Congresswoman Tlaib
17 on 6/10/2024. And Mr. Chair, I go to the announcements.

18 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: Okay.

19 MR. BROWN: The next BOPC meeting is June, 2024 at
20 3:00 PM. That meeting would be held at Detroit Public
21 Safety Headquarters, 1301 Third Street, in the Skylar
22 Herbert room. The next community meeting would be
23 Thursday, July 11th, 2024 at 6:30 PM, with the Sixth
24 Precinct hosting at Citadel of Praise. That address is
25 20280 Linden Street, 48223. And Mr. Chair, the meeting

1 for the month of June, committee meeting for the month of
2 June. Policy Committee meeting, Tuesday, June 25th, 2024
3 at 5:00 PM And that meeting can be viewed on Zoom and
4 also take place at Detour Public Safety Headquarters.
5 Those are the announcements.

6 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: Thank you, Mr. Brown. Do
7 any of the commissioners have any questions regarding the
8 secretary's report?

9 DR. JACKSON: Mr. Chair Pro tem, I don't have a
10 question, but my concern I'd like to express. When
11 Victoria Shaw was the secretary to the board, Attorney
12 LaBelle, Secretary Shaw, and I did rather extensive work
13 on the bylaws and I would like to know if it's possible
14 to request that work product from Attorney LaBelle before
15 she leaves her position.

16 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: Absolutely. Lieutenant
17 Attorney LaBelle, are you online?

18 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Her last day was...

19 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: That's right. Her last
20 day was June 14th.

21 MR. BROWN: She might still be willing to get it, but
22 can we ask Mr. Brown if he would be willing to contact
23 her?

24 MR. BROWN: Yes, I'll make a request for that.

25 DR. JACKSON: Thank you very much, sir.

1 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: Outstanding.

2 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Also, Attorney LaBelle expressed
3 strong passion to be able to help us in every way in any
4 type of transition. Excuse me. I'm sorry. Thank you.
5 Attorney LaBelle expressed strong passion to be able to
6 help in our transition and do everything she can to help.
7 You know, I saw her out at the Peacenik this past weekend
8 doing the clean slate work.

9 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: Awesome.

10 MR. BROWN: Mr. Chair, I just received notification
11 from Attorney LaBelle that the chairperson has the
12 bylaws.

13 DR. JACKSON: Okay.

14 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: Okay. Thank you. I do
15 have a question, Mr. Brown, as it relates to the
16 congresswoman's letter. I know and understand that there
17 has been a complaint filed. I just want to make OCI aware
18 that there was a teletype issued back in 2020 regarding
19 the same issue from the Congressman woman's letter as it
20 relates to protests and legal advisors of that. So I
21 believe it was in June or July of 2020. So, as you look
22 into this investigation that was submitted, please make
23 sure you include that teletype. Seeing, we still do not
24 have a quorum, I would like to move to the community for
25 public comment. Who do we have online?

1 MS. UNDERWOOD: Good afternoon, pro tem.

2 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: Good afternoon.

3 MS. UNDERWOOD: So far, we have three in the
4 audience. So I'll start with Ms. Charnita Williams, Ms.
5 Bernice Smith, and then Minister Eric Blount.

6 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: Awesome.

7 COMMISSIONER BANKS: I think we have the quorum no,
8 Chair Pro tem. Commissioner Bernard. Yeah.

9 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: And we do have a quorum,
10 but I would still like to continue with the public's
11 commentary. Who's first?

12 MS. WILLIAMS: Hello everyone.

13 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: Hello.

14 MS. WILLIAMS: Two weeks ago, as I stated, two
15 officers went into my bag when I was here, rambled
16 through my personal items, and Mr. Bell made a comment
17 afterwards concerning mental illness. So this is for you,
18 Willie Bell.

19 Just hypothetical speaking, if you get locked up,
20 and then you were sexually molested, raped for over 30
21 days, maybe you might need a psychologist to sit down on
22 somebody's couch to get some help. That statement you
23 made was not acceptable. because I guarantee you, after
24 they rambled through my bags, if the FBI checked your
25 personal devices and when those officers went through my

1 personal belongings, when they sent out texts to people
2 sitting behind those tables, that's just not acceptable.
3 And people have positions and do not respect their jobs.
4 I'm not saying everyone, but everyone should be held
5 accountable for their actions in doing their job
6 correctly. Regardless of what your position is, you
7 should do it correctly. You took an oath, people took
8 oaths, and they disrespect their jobs, their badges, and
9 you are violating people's civil rights.

10 That's not acceptable. I go to OCI, and the thing
11 about it, let me say this. People continue to call in
12 favors; people that work at OCI and got promotions, and I
13 said this on several different occasions. I saw them
14 before they got promotions. They're calling them favors
15 and they want to go behind everybody's backs, and act
16 like they're going to do the job. Prime example, I went
17 to OCI, the detective sitting at the desk, I'm ringing
18 the doorbell. She said she was on the phone; she didn't
19 hear the doorbell. That's not acceptable. You just didn't
20 want me to come in to make any reports. If you are not
21 going to do your job, you shouldn't be in that facility,
22 period. If you want to continue to cover up. because when
23 you cover up, and you conspire to cover up illegal
24 activities, it is conspiracy. Thank you.

25 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: Thank you.

1 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Through the Chair. Can I ask her
2 one quick question? CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM:
3 Commissioner.

4 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Thank you. Young lady, you said
5 the officers went through your bag here, while you were
6 here.

7 MS. WILLIAMS: Yes, sir. Mr. Banks.

8 COMMISSIONER BANKS: What for?

9 MS. WILLIAMS: I guess the... Well, I don't have an
10 answer. I was standing. How would I even know someone
11 would go through my bag? And so I got home. Ricardo, we
12 talked about it. I know exactly how my personal items
13 were.

14 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: Thank you.

15 MS. SMITH: Good afternoon. I have so much to tell
16 you. I don't even know where to start. But I'm going to
17 start with the worst news that I can give to you. I don't
18 know why people come to our city and think we are fools.
19 You know, that campaign here in our city and I think we
20 don't know any better. And I'm addressing all those
21 ministers that were, in other words, they did not accept
22 the invitation. I listened to Roland Martin and I got all
23 my information from him the other night. There were eight
24 he counted, he went over the screen. He counted eight
25 blacks that were present. All the rest were whites. Now,

1 I don't see Pressley here, so I can't give him my message
2 that I want to tell him. But I want to tell all the
3 ministers, I am proud of you that didn't accept the
4 invitation and was embarrassed by having the candidate
5 here, which you all know who I'm talking about.

6 So I just want to thank the ministers, Kinlock, my
7 minister and all those that I do know, that you stood
8 firm. Because you know this is a serious election now.
9 And I know I shouldn't bring it to the board, but I want
10 the board to know what my feelings are. It's horrible.
11 And I'm going to get out here next Monday. I'm going to
12 Chicago to campaign. And I'm going to do my best to talk,
13 because this man is horrible. I don't even want to
14 mention his name. You know who he is. I don't have to
15 tell you. I met him several years ago myself personally.
16 And he treated me like I was nobody. We were at the
17 Rooster Tail, Congresswoman Carolyn Kilpatrick. She had
18 this event there; a women's luncheon.

19 And when they were asking questions, I raised my
20 hand and I asked him the question, do you have any
21 minority workers on your campaign, on your project that
22 you want to build the hotel here in the city of Detroit?
23 He looked at me like I was crazy and he ignored me. And
24 later on, I know several months later I went to Chicago
25 and there was his hotel right there on the lake, on North

1 Michigan Avenue. So I'm telling you, do the right thing,
2 vote for the right person. And that's all I have to say.
3 because I will be out there campaigning. Thank you.

4 MINISTER BLOUNT: Good afternoon, board.

5 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: Good afternoon.

6 MINISTER BLOUNT: I'm Minister Eric Blount from
7 Sacred Heart Catholic Church and my comments will be
8 restricted to the Board of Police Commissioners and
9 police officer misconduct. First of all, I don't give a
10 rats' ass who is on this board, as far as whether or not
11 you are a returning citizen. You paid your dues to
12 society, you've shown yourself to be a productive member
13 of society, and that's good enough for me. Because the
14 last eight chairpersons have shown nothing but
15 corruption, systemic corruption. And related to the
16 election, I'll choose a returning productive citizen over
17 a lawyer that has proven to have a lack of moral and
18 ethical judgment. So that's the best election I could
19 see, people voted and it was democratic and it happened.
20 As far as the Human Resource report goes, I demand that
21 this board require that the Human Resource Department
22 report out on those officers that are on the Giglio
23 Bradley list.

24 That's the list that the prosecutor has determined
25 has been so egregiously lying that their testimony cannot

1 be taken in the court of law. How many of those officers
2 are there on that list? And why are they on that list?
3 Secondly, the Human Resources report should also show the
4 number, and perhaps the badge numbers of those officers
5 that are under suspension. For the general public, we
6 don't know if their suspension really lasted more than a
7 day with or without pay. And then their suspensions were
8 overturned through arbitration, and so they got their
9 jobs back. We know from Dwayne Jones that you can be
10 disciplined and yet still be promoted. This system has
11 got to stop. Thank you.

12 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: Thank you.

13 MS. UNDERWOOD: So we have another speaker in, in
14 house, Kim Sherobbi, District 7.

15 MS. SHEROBBI: Good afternoon everyone.

16 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: Good afternoon.

17 MS. SHEROBBI: I just want to make some comments
18 about the legal observers. I know Commissioner Moore made
19 reference to it. I don't think we're going to be speaking
20 about that today, but I actually came here to make sure
21 to go on the record to say that all citizens should be
22 heard without harassment, without having legal
23 allegations placed upon them. And so any legal matters
24 that's been placed upon the observers should be removed
25 and just destroyed. So I just wanted to go on record to

1 say that.

2 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: Thank you.

3 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Yeah. If I may. I heard about,
4 and we read the letter and we've been listening to, you
5 know, various attorneys. Attorney John Royal of this
6 issue. This is something that we take very, very
7 seriously and we will be definitely making sure that we
8 look into that to the full extent. You know, and we want
9 to review all bodycam as it relates to that because they
10 are legal observers. You know, this is something that has
11 been customarily done. And so definitely we take that
12 very, very seriously.

13 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: Chief Morph, are you
14 familiar with what we're talking about here?

15 CHIEF MURPHY: Through the Chair. I read the letter
16 just now, so I'm familiar with it. I was not familiar
17 with it and did not know it was an issue prior to today.
18 However, I will turn it over to our staff and our staff
19 will definitely look into this and contact the parties
20 that are involved, through the letter that Congresswoman
21 Tlaib sent.

22 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: And that has been past
23 practice whenever legal observers get into any type of
24 issue for them to file a complaint with the Office of the
25 Chief investigator. Commissioner Bernard, we were talking

1 about a letter that Congresswoman Tlaib sent the board
2 regarding legal observers being ticketed. It's been in
3 two of our packets, today's packet as well as a couple
4 weeks ago.

5 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Okay. Thank you.

6 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: You are welcome.

7 MS. UNDERWOOD: So we can go into Zoom. We have six
8 speakers in Zoom. The next speakers will be Julia
9 Horowitz, please excuse the mispronunciation, Victoria
10 and former Commissioner William Davis.

11 MS. HOROWITZ: Thank you. My name is Julie Horowitz.
12 Can you hear me?

13 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: Yes.

14 MS. HOROWITZ: Great. Thank you so much for allowing
15 me to speak. I am an attorney. I am a former officer of
16 the National Lawyers Guild, and I was the person.. I've
17 been a legal observer now for over 30 years participating
18 as an attorney and as a legal observer representing the
19 rights of protestors and the First Amendment. I was
20 directly involved in the summer of 2020 with then Deputy
21 Chief Bettison at the time when there were legal
22 observers who got wrongfully arrested while doing their
23 jobs during the summer of 2020. And he and I had a very
24 lengthy conversation about the important role that legal
25 observers have played historically since the 1970s in our

1 country and in this community. And he agreed with me, at
2 the time, that that was a very important role to be
3 played. And that he assured me, once I explained to him
4 the role that legal observers play, that he would make
5 sure every officer on shift would be advised and informed
6 of the little green hats, the baseball hats that we wear
7 as legal observers and advise his officers to allow these
8 legal observers to do their jobs.

9 And he arranged to have the criminal charges against
10 the legal observer in 2020, dismissed. And I urge you to
11 take whatever action you can take, to take a strong
12 position against arresting and stopping and interfering
13 with the important role that legal observers play and
14 have the charges dismissed against the current... I believe
15 there are four or five legal observers from Congresswoman
16 Tlaib's letter, who are now facing charges to be
17 dismissed. Thank you.

18 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: Thank you.

19 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Mr. Chairman, while we're
20 waiting for the next speaker, the last speaker of the
21 public comment, the young lady who is a lawyer, stated
22 that there were charges pending against these people.
23 Were these tickets that were issued to them or are these
24 actual charges by the prosecutor's office?

25 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: These were actual

1 tickets that went to court. And they do have a prosecutor
2 that's prosecuting the city prosecutor.

3 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: But these were citations
4 written by Detroit police?

5 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: Citations.

6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Okay. So have we contacted,
7 I'm sorry, I've been in Washington for two weeks. My 91-
8 year-old uncle who's a veteran of three Wars. I've been
9 dealing with him. He's in the hospital now. We had any
10 communication with the chief's office about this?

11 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: Not to my understanding,
12 no.

13 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Deputy Chief.

14 DC MURPHY: Through the Chair, I guess. So we have
15 put out a reflash to teletype that we are not going to
16 arrest or interfere with illegal advisors when they are
17 not breaking laws, but just advising on these specific
18 cases. I don't know exactly which ones we're talking
19 about because we've had a lot of protests recently in
20 which we've issued a number of ordinances and also made
21 some arrests. So I'd have to know specifically about the
22 personnel we're talking about here.

23 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Can you report back to the
24 board at the next meeting on the tickets that were issued
25 to legal observers, people with the P number who are

1 licensed lawyers within the State, paralegals. Would you
2 mind doing that?

3 DC MURPHY: Yeah, we'll look into it and we'll see
4 what we can do. I can't commit to saying I'll actually be
5 able to find it because I'll have to be able to search
6 and find out if they have P numbers.

7 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you. Can you report back
8 to the next meeting if that's okay?

9 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: That is okay.

10 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you.

11 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: Thank you. Chief.

12 COMMISSIONER WOODS: If I can...

13 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: Commissioner.

14 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Chair, this situation derived
15 out of the incident, out of the NAACP dinner. So that you
16 can narrow the scope that happened on that same day
17 during that particular protest.

18 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: I thought it was later,
19 like March. When was the NAACP... I thought it was like
20 March 5th, early March.

21 COMMISSIONER WOODS: It was in May.

22 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: May, okay.

23 DC MURPHY: Yeah. For the NAACP, there was one arrest
24 that was made with an individual with a P number, and
25 that arrest was made after all protests were completed.

1 And that was an interference ticket that was written, if...

2 COMMISSIONER WOODS: That's been also for March 2nd
3 as well.

4 DC MURPHY: March 2nd.

5 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Yep.

6 DC MURPHY: March 2nd.

7 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: If you'd let us know about it
8 and what the status of that ticket is currently and so
9 forth, so we can find out what's going on. I'd appreciate
10 it.

11 COMMISSIONER WOODS: And off the record, we can give
12 you the names that's involved.

13 DC MURPHY: Okay. Perfect.

14 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: Next caller.

15 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you, Mr. Chair.

16 VICTORIA: Good afternoon Board. This is Victoria
17 from District 7. The board has to take tangible action
18 itself and remove barriers for those who are taking
19 tangible action around police transparency and
20 accountability. I'll give four examples. Number one,
21 commissioners, you requested numerous data and
22 information from DPD that went unfulfilled. On December
23 21st of last year, the board voted to reiterate to the
24 Chief that the board still wants the 33 outstanding
25 requests fulfilled. Tangible action means following up.

1 Do you know if you've received the data? If you have, has
2 staff analyzed it and presented it to you and the public
3 in such a way that its transparency informs how you
4 oversee DPD. The second is on March 7th, the board voted
5 to write a letter to the DOJ demanding an investigation
6 into the killing of 70-year-old Darryl Vance. Tangible
7 action means following up. Has the letter been written
8 and sent to the DOJ?

9 And if so, was the letter made public. Number three.
10 On May 23rd, the board voted to waive the FOIA fees for
11 request number A24-02888, submitted by CPTA. Tangible
12 action means following up. Did OCI pull the records? And
13 if so, did the CPTA receive the records? If not, why not?
14 And number four, regarding the letter you have from
15 Congresswoman, Tlaib, legal observers must not be
16 targeted by law enforcement. As an oversight agency of
17 DPD, please take tangible action by writing a letter to
18 corporation counsel, advising that DPD has overstepped
19 their authority to target and arrest legal observers. And
20 that DPDs evidence should be inadmissible. At least if
21 corporation counsel does not heed your request, the judge
22 who hears their cases will have your letter to consider.
23 Thank you for allowing me to speak today.

24 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: Thank you. Acting
25 Secretary Brown, I would like to follow up on one issue

1 that was just mentioned. The letter to the Department of
2 Justice regarding the death of Bill Vance. Was that
3 letter ever written?

4 MR. BROWN: That letter was written and submitted to
5 the chairperson because his signature has to go on it, so
6 I just have to check with him to see if he went on and
7 forwarded, because there's a, how can I say? The DOJ has
8 like a link. You just can't send it to the... what's her
9 name? Ms. Ison herself. You have to send it through a
10 link that they have. So I have to check with the
11 chairperson.

12 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: Okay. Thank you.

13 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: And would you let us know at
14 the next meeting?

15 MR. BROWN: Yes.

16 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you.

17 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: Next caller.

18 MS. UNDERWOOD: Former Commissioner William Davis.

19 MR. DAVIS: Good afternoon. Can I be heard?

20 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: Yes, sir.

21 MR. DAVIS: Okay. I would also like to bring up the
22 fact that it looks really bad for a city and a State and
23 any police unit if they beat up, ticket or harass legal
24 observers. I've been involved in a number of protests and
25 have helped to utilize legal observers a number of times.

1 In the past, during the time I was on the board, there
2 were times when it appeared as if Chief Craig,
3 especially, did not like legal observers. You know, we
4 need to make sure that all officers know that legal
5 observers, as long as they're not blatantly doing
6 anything illegal, have a right to be there and should be
7 respected. In the past, we've had legal observers harmed,
8 you know be the subject of harm from police officers. We
9 need to make sure that we are above board, and that legal
10 observers are protected in the city.

11 Also I think this board needs to be more
12 aggressively making sure that cases are closed and that
13 they are actually researched and closed. You know it
14 shouldn't take more than 60 days for a complaint to be
15 filed and to be resolved. If need be, this board needs to
16 get more investigators, and I think this board should
17 have, at least, a percentage of the police department's
18 budget, a flat percentage. Because as the police
19 department goes up and they take on more responsibility,
20 especially dealing with transportation in the city,
21 complaints are going to keep going up. So you all need to
22 do more and start planning ahead and get more
23 investigators to investigate these cases and close these
24 cases. Thank you.

25 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: Thank you.

1 MS. UNDERWOOD: The next three speakers will be
2 Scotty Bowman, Shea Howell, and Marguerite Maddox. And
3 then that would be it.

4 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: Thank you.

5 MR. BOWMAN: Hello. (Bad Audio) person. I highly
6 respect the minister's comment, but God can forgive debt.
7 But there is a debt that cannot be paid. (Bad Audio) even
8 can't do that.

9 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Excuse me.

10 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: Your phone is going in
11 and out.

12 Start all over.

13 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I didn't understand anything
14 he said.

15 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: Your phone is going in
16 and out. Is there any way that you can clarify your phone
17 on that end, because we'd like for you to start over, if
18 you can?

19 MR. BOWMAN: Okay. Hold on. Okay. I could try again.
20 Can you hear me now?

21 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: Absolutely. Can we start
22 this time over please? If that's possible. One second
23 before you start. Okay, go ahead, Mr. Bowman. Mr. Bowman?

24 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Gone altogether.

25 MR. BOWMAN: Hello? Can you hear me?

1 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: Yes, we can.

2 MR. BOWMAN: Okay, great. Well, what I was saying was
3 there are certain debts that cannot be paid. Murder is
4 not a debt anyone can pay. Anthony Capers is not going to
5 get his life back regardless of what any human being
6 does. So I just wanted to get that out of the way and
7 move forward the fact that, you know, all because a
8 person can be released from prison, and I do believe
9 people deserve a second chance at, you know, living a
10 life, getting work, getting a job, earning a living,
11 having a home, all that stuff. But that does not mean
12 that it is the best choice to put someone in a position
13 of authority who has committed the ultimate crime,
14 homicide, murder one. That is something that I don't see
15 as something a person should be chair of a board of
16 police commissioners for.

17 You know, I personally interviewed at one point to
18 be appointed to fill a vacancy on the BOPC. So I mean,
19 the idea that someone, are they so desperate that they
20 need to dig that deep to put in convicted murders? I
21 would think not. And then the board, a majority voting to
22 put a convicted murderer in charge of the board, when we
23 have long time people without such records. People like
24 Willie Burton who have been around as long as we've had
25 an elected board, he hasn't gotten to be chair. What's up

1 with that? And this is a bad look. I mean, there are more
2 immediate matters such as, you know, police oversight,
3 and the huge backlog of complaints and so forth. But this
4 just seems like one more bad thing to see happening in
5 the city.

6 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: Thank you. Next caller.

7 MS. HOWELL: Thank you. My name is Shea Howell and
8 I'm a resident of District 2. And I want to speak to
9 three things. First, I want to say that it's really
10 important for the board to take a stand with regard to
11 the protection of legal observers. It's essential that
12 you make clear to the police that any kind of harassment
13 or any kind of use of authority against the right of
14 people to protect protest, will not be tolerated by you.
15 Secondly, I think you need to understand that the
16 aggression toward legal observers is directly related to
17 the aggression toward protestors. This board has not
18 taken a strong stand to protect the right of people to
19 demonstrate and exercise their First Amendment rights.
20 You have allowed the police to tell you what they're
21 going to do, and you need to start telling them what
22 behavior is unacceptable. That leads me to the third
23 conclusion, which is that without a strong statement with
24 you, you are fostering a climate where police feel they
25 can do anything at any time to anyone. And we have seen

1 this time and again in our city. So I strongly urge you
2 to take the first step by making clear that any actions
3 against legal observers will not be tolerated by you, and
4 you will demand action against any officer who in any way
5 participates in that. And secondly, that you demand
6 action to protect the right to protest in our city. We
7 were built by protest and we need to protect it. Thank
8 you.

9 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: Thank you.

10 DC MURPHY: Through the Chair, if I may?

11 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: Go ahead. Well,
12 Commissioner Burton had his hand up first.

13 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Chair, I'd like to make a
14 motion at this time that we draft a letter to the
15 Attorney General's Office to protect the rights of legal
16 observers.

17 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: Which AG, the US or
18 State?

19 COMMISSIONER BURTON: The State.

20 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: A motion.

21 DR. JACKSON: You need a second?

22 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: I'm just going so don't
23 even read it.

24 DR. JACKSON: Still need a second.

25 COMMISSIONER BANKS: She second.

1 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Mr. Chairman.

2 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: Are you seconding it?

3 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: No. I want to make, possibly
4 an amendment.

5 DR. JACKSON: It can't be amended because it's not a
6 motion if it's not seconded.

7 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Then okay, I'll second it.

8 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: It's been properly moved
9 and seconded.

10 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: But just in terms of
11 discussion, I simply...

12 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: Commissioner, I haven't
13 got there yet.

14 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Oh, I'm sorry. I apologize.

15 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: There's been a motion on
16 the floor as it relates to drafting a letter to the
17 Attorney General. You did say State Attorney General
18 regarding the legal observers. Any discussion?

19 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Yes. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.
20 What I think we should do, based on the comments that
21 we've heard today, is that, number one, it's not just a
22 statement to the Attorney General. It would be a
23 statement to our police department and to the Corporation
24 Counsel, and obviously to the Mayor's office. This is a
25 matter of critical importance. We've had a couple of

1 speakers speak about it, very ad jointly, I might add,
2 pinpointing the First Amendment issues and the other
3 issues related to this. And I think that before we write
4 a letter, we should make a policy on this issue so that
5 it's very clear and that our position is clear to the
6 community. And then we can send it to the Attorney
7 General and everybody else. But this is an internal
8 policy for the City of Detroit and a statement based on
9 what happens in the City of Detroit. And we should opine
10 on that through a policy and then a subsequent letter.

11 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: Commissioner

12 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Yes, I think that we should
13 draft up something strong to the Corporation Counsel and
14 let them know that this is very alarming to us, and that
15 we want to see the body count footage as soon as
16 possible, and to urge our dissatisfaction of this
17 decision making to the Corporation Counsel. We don't need
18 the Attorney General to do our job. We should not shirk
19 our responsibilities as commissioners, and we don't even
20 know what's going on with this. So we need to be fully
21 abreast and aware to find out what's going on. And if
22 there was some wrongdoing there, it needed to be
23 corrected immediately.

24 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: Commissioner Burton, are
25 you willing to amend your amendment to have a letter go

1 to Corporation Counsel, or would you like to keep it the
2 way it is?

3 DR. JACKSON: Mr. Chair, Pro tem?

4 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: Yes, ma'am.

5 DR. JACKSON: We don't need Commissioner Burton's
6 permission. The commissioner just needs to move to amend
7 what it is she wants to do. And Commissioner Woods, if
8 it's germane, can offer a secondary amendment to her
9 amendment if it does not include what you think it needs
10 to include. So what we really need is a motion from
11 Commissioner Bernard about what you want to do, which
12 would be an amendment to the motion made by Commissioner
13 Burton.

14 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I would ask for a friendly
15 amendment, Commissioner Burton. But before that we don't
16 ask the Corporation Counsel for permission, Commissioner,
17 that's not his role, to give us permission to do
18 something. We can adopt policies that are legal, ethical,
19 and constitutional on our own. It's not an issue. This is
20 a department, a police department issue. So my question
21 to you is, is it permissible to you, Commissioner Burton,
22 for us to within the next two weeks' draft and bring to
23 the board a policy, share that policy with the community
24 as well, regarding the issue of the protection of
25 protestors and legal observers? And then have the board

1 vote, and we send it, and then we can publicize it for
2 the community as well.

3 DR. JACKSON: I'm sorry, Mr. Chair.

4 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: Parliamentarian.

5 DR. JACKSON: Again, we don't ask his permission.

6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Okay. I'm sorry.

7 DR. JACKSON: All you have to do Commissioner
8 Bernard, to say I move that, and then say what it is you
9 want to do. He can't give you permission. He doesn't have
10 that authority.

11 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Okay. I didn't realize that.
12 Thank you. Thank you for advising me, Madam
13 Parliamentarian. So that would be my motion to put
14 together a policy, and the protocol within 14 days,
15 because there's some urgency associated with this. And we
16 can obviously get some assistance from other cities and
17 so forth on this and get the proper language so we can
18 put some teeth in it. As you pointed out the Attorney
19 General has nothing to do with what the Board of Police
20 Commissioners does and what policies we adopt. We do that
21 and we have the ability to do that and to act on the
22 concerns of our citizens in this city, regarding what
23 they feel to be unconstitutional behavior and harassment.

24 DR. JACKSON: Okay. So this is the problem. The
25 commissioner's motion was to draft a letter. Your

1 amendment is to draft a policy.

2 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Correct, and a letter.

3 DR. JACKSON: That's not germane to his motion. So we
4 would have to, Mr. Chair, vote on the motion made by the
5 commissioner, whether it's voted up or down, Commissioner
6 Bernard can still make what would then be a main motion
7 to draft a policy. But her motion about the policy is not
8 germane to his motion about drafting a letter. They're
9 not necessarily mutually exclusive, but it's really not
10 germane to what he said. So at this point, Mr. Chair, pro
11 tem, we're back to the motion made by Commissioner Burton
12 about drafting a letter. That motion was seconded, it's
13 open to debate, and then you need to vote on whether
14 you're going to adopt it or not. And whatever happens
15 after that, then Commissioner Bernard can make the motion
16 to draft the policy.

17 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: Alright, thank you,
18 Madam Parliamentarian. Chief, did you have anything you
19 wanted to say?

20 DC MURPHY: I do. I want to be clear that it is not
21 the Detroit Police Department's policy to arrest or to
22 properly investigate any legal advisor during an actual
23 protest. That is not what we do. Just to be clear,
24 talking about the last protest we had in which someone
25 who was arrested, who did have a P number, she was not

1 acting as a legal advisor. She just happened to be an
2 attorney who was arrested while interfering. Now, we have
3 to look at the other case, the March 2nd incident, and
4 I'll look at those names as well. But I want to be clear
5 to the board, the department puts it out to our officers,
6 especially those officers who are engaged in monitoring a
7 protest that we are not interfering with the green hats.
8 As a matter of fact, the green hats make sure that they
9 observe, and at some point, they assist us to make sure
10 that they tell those individuals to protest correctly.

11 Now I will say, if a green hat or anybody else in
12 this city commits a crime, they're going to be
13 investigated and will take appropriate action; just to be
14 clear on that. And the second piece is, every officer who
15 wears this uniform takes an oath to uphold the
16 Constitution. And the last I remember, the First
17 Amendment was part of the Constitution. We will uphold
18 and protect everybody's right to protest. Now, if you go
19 online, we'll do what we need to do, but we always make
20 sure we advise those individuals of that. So I just want
21 to make sure I put that on record for the Chief and for
22 the department.

23 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: Thank you, Chief. So
24 there is a motion on the floor to draft a letter to the
25 State Ag, Attorney General's Office regarding the legal

1 advisors. All in favor say aye. All opposed?

2 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: No.

3 COMMISSIONER WOODS: I oppose it.

4 DR. JACKSON: The motion fails.

5 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: The motion fails. Nobody
6 even said that.

7 DR. JACKSON: Now, we can go back to Commissioner
8 Bernard.

9 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: It's simply for us to put
10 together, for us to review whatever existing policies
11 there are. And I understand your position Deputy Chief,
12 but that decision, what one person considers
13 interference, another person may consider legitimate
14 protesting. So this particular issue regarding whoever
15 these individuals are in court, and I'm almost certain
16 that it'll be dismissed. So obviously the position of the
17 officer, if it's dismissed, would be null and void. But
18 that has nothing to do with our duty, as espoused by our
19 congresswoman to address this issue systemically, with
20 respect to the Detroit Police Department, which is the
21 only department that's in question here today. So again,
22 my motion is to, within 14 days put, bring back to the
23 board of policy regarding the protestors and legal
24 observers that protects the rights of those individuals.
25 And further, I'd ask the people who are online, who've

1 been watching this, the lawyers who spoke, if they have
2 any information that would be helpful to us in terms of
3 doing this, I would be appreciative to get it because
4 it's hard to, you know, I don't want to reinvent the
5 wheel if it already exists. So that's my motion. Mr.
6 Chairman.

7 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: So, Commissioner
8 Bernard, can you reduce your motion?

9 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I'm sorry. To put together a
10 policy within 14 days regarding the board's position,
11 regarding legal observers, and protestors and their right
12 to do so. And then bring it to the board for a vote, and
13 then we can send it wherever we want to send it. Once it
14 is approved by the board, it is approved.

15 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: Is there a second?

16 DR. JACKSON: The only thing, do you want the Policy
17 Committee to do this?

18 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Yes.

19 DR. JACKSON: So the motion is that the Policy
20 Committee will draft a policy within 14 days.

21 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you.

22 DR. JACKSON: Thank you.

23 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: Thank you. Is there a
24 second?

25 COMMISSIONER WOODS: I'll second.

1 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: It has been moved and
2 properly second for the Policy Committee to draft a
3 policy within 14 days regarding the legal observers. Is
4 there any discussion? Hearing none, all in favor? I'm
5 sorry.

6 COMMISSIONER WOODS: I would just say, I wouldn't put
7 the handcuffs on the 14 days, and Madam Commissioner,
8 through the Chair. When I spoke of the Corporation
9 Counsel these tickets are under the jurisdiction of that
10 entity, you know...

11 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Jurisdiction DPD.

12 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Well, no. The tickets you know,
13 in terms of them being reviewed, are under the...

14 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: The court process.

15 COMMISSIONER WOODS: The court process; the decision
16 making in there. You know, the Corporation Counsel has a
17 lot to weigh in on that. These are city attorneys; it's
18 not going to the 36th District or anything of that
19 nature. So it behooves us to be able to make an inquiry
20 in terms of what happened in that situation, and to be
21 able to look at those body cams to see exactly what's
22 going on instead of swinging in the air. That's the only
23 thing I'm saying. We need factual information.

24 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: Any other discussion?

25 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Only that I have no objection

1 to reviewing the body cams, but I'm talking about an
2 issue bigger than these two individuals or three
3 individuals that have been arrested or received
4 citations. I'm talking about the board looking at this
5 systemically and addressing it with our police
6 department.

7 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: Any other discussion? So
8 there is a motion on four for the Policy Committee to
9 draft a policy within 14 days regarding the legal
10 observers. All in favor say, Aye.

11 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

12 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: All opposed? The Ayes
13 have it. The motion passes.

14 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair.

15 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: Go ahead.

16 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I'd like to make another motion
17 at this time. I'd like to make a motion that the board
18 still draft a letter, but this time we draft our letter
19 to the US Attorney's Office for protection of the legal
20 observers.

21 DR. JACKSON: Is that the same motion that was voted
22 down previously?

23 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: The first motion was for
24 the State Ag. The second one is for the US Attorney.

25 DR. JACKSON: It's a judgment call, but there's a

1 rule called the settled rule. And the settled rule says
2 that when an assembly has either voted a motion up or
3 down, either the same motion or a similar motion cannot
4 be made at the same meeting. Now, Mr. Chair, it's up to
5 you to decide if you think this is similar. If you don't
6 think it's similar, then handle the motion. If you think
7 it's similar, then it's out of order.

8 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: Okay. Unfortunately,
9 that motion will be out of order. Seeing that we have a
10 quorum, we will return to our regular agenda. Acting
11 Secretary, can you please have an introduction of
12 commissioners?

13 MR. BROWN: Yes. Based on what I see in the room,
14 Commissioner, I'm sure Commissioner Pressley has an
15 excuse, absent.

16 MR. BROWN: Commissioner Smith has an excuse, absent.

17 MR. BROWN: Commissioner Bernard - Attorney Linda
18 Bernard, District 2, present.

19 MR. BROWN: Commissioner Banks - Present.

20 MR. BROWN: Commissioner Bell - Present, but I'm
21 going to ask, unfortunate to be excused for a situation.
22 Thank you.

23 MR. BROWN: Commissioner Burton - Present.

24 MR. BROWN: Commissioner Carter asked for an excuse,
25 absent.

1 MR. BROWN: Commissioner Moore - Present.

2 MR. BROWN: Commissioner Hernandez asked for an
3 excuse, absent.

4 MR. BROWN: Commissioner Woods - Present.

5 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: But we have lost our
6 quorum. Do we have any other action items?

7 MS. UNDERWOOD: We have two public comments still
8 waiting.

9 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: Okay. Let's get back to
10 public comments.

11 MS. UNDERWOOD: So that would be Marguerite Maddox,
12 and then the other. Oh, he left. Ms. Maddox.

13 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: Go ahead, Ms. Maddox.

14 MS. UNDERWOOD: Just a moment.

15 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: And for the record to
16 the public, I did not know I would be hosting this
17 meeting today. I just sat down, and it was in my face. So
18 just to let you know, I had no prior warning or anything.

19 DR. JACKSON: He was also ready.

20 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: Thank you. That's what
21 the word says. I wanted our chair elected to do it, but
22 he passed it to me. Ms. Maddox, you on the line? Ms.
23 Maddox?

24 MS. UNDERWOOD: She's not responding at all.

25 MS. MADDOX: Yes. Yes.

1 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: Go ahead.

2 MS. MADDOX: Good afternoon. I have a big concern
3 about the protestors, and about the observers, because
4 it's going both ways. If we are for the [unclear] for the
5 observers [unclear] for the protestors too. And [unclear]
6 make sure that there is no reasonable cause, because that
7 could be a safety issue. And about scooters, and leaving
8 them anywhere that they can be dropped off. My issue is
9 [unclear] and everyone's safety is to put the scooters
10 inside from the middle of the sidewalk because sometimes
11 people will be riding [unclear] that people, and walkers
12 have to stop to make sure that they do not get run over.
13 So we need to come up with a better way for people to
14 feel safe going around the city. Walking, or riding their
15 bikes. I'm done. Thank you very much.

16 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: Thank you. And to Acting
17 Secretary Brown, there were some action items given to us
18 by the callers in public comment. Can you please review
19 the tape and follow up on those issues, and please
20 present to the board as soon as you can? At this time,
21 I'd like to take a motion to end the meeting.

22 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: So moved.

23 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Support.

24 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: It's been moved and
25 supported. All in favor say, Aye.

1 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

2 CHAIRPERSON MOORE, PRO TEM: Thank you public for
3 coming out.

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
