10 BOARD OF POLICE COMMISSIONERS MEETING

11 July 11, 2024 at 6:30 P.M.

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1 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Good evening. It is now 6:30  
2 PM and so we want to call this session of the Detroit  
3 Board of Police Commissioners meeting to order. I count  
4 my colleagues. I believe we are short one commissioner to  
5 have a quorum. But that does not prevent us from  
6 beginning the meeting with the word of invocation. And so  
7 we will have that word of invocation by Pastor Ellis. And  
8 as he comes, come on, let's put our hands together for  
9 this most generous host for providing us this space.

10 PASTOR ELLIS: Thank you, sir.

11 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: We celebrate you. And then  
12 after your invocation, you can provide words of welcome.

13 PASTOR ELLIS: (Video Froze) Help us God, because we  
14 just want to be a blessing to our city; want to be a  
15 blessing to our community; be a blessing to all around  
16 us. We thank you. We ask that you would just bless each  
17 person here that's present. Even those that's not here,  
18 even those that's yet to come. We give your name, out of  
19 the praise and the glory. We know all things will be well  
20 because you never do anything wrong, you never make a  
21 mistake. We put everything in your hands and we thank you  
22 in advance. In Jesus' name we pray. Amen.

23 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Amen.

24 PASTOR ELLIS: Amen. God bless everybody. We just  
25 welcome you all to the Citadel of Praise. I am Pastor

1 Spencer Ellis, pastor here at the Citadel of Praise. And  
2 I am grateful to be here. I have a great appreciation for  
3 what you all do. My late dad, the late Bishop David  
4 Ellis, was an, amen, commissioner on the Board of Police  
5 Commission way back in the day, amen, appointed by the  
6 late honorable Coleman Young. And I watched his  
7 dedication, and he served for many years on this great  
8 board. So I commend you all. I know the stress to go with  
9 it. I know the politics to go with it. I know the  
10 criticism that goes with it. Amen. But I know you are  
11 called to do what you are called to do. And I know you  
12 all will continue to do a great job and welcome  
13 everybody. I don't want to start calling names from the  
14 Deputy Mayor on down, all the community leaders. God  
15 bless you all. Make yourself at home. Just don't break  
16 anything, and we'll be alright. Bless you all. God bless  
17 you.

18 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Thank you so very much. I see  
19 that Commissioner Hernandez has joined us. And so with  
20 his addition, we do now have a quorum. And so with that,  
21 we will move forward with our official agenda, which  
22 calls for introduction of commissioners by Acting  
23 Secretary Brown.

24 MR. BROWN: Good afternoon, Mr. Chair.

25 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Good afternoon.

1 MR. BROWN: Chairperson Pressley - Here.

2 MR. BROWN: Chairperson-Elect, Darryl Woods - Here.

3 MR. BROWN: Vice Chairperson Smith - Present.

4 MR. BROWN: Commissioner Bell asked for an excused,  
5 absent.

6 Commissioner Burton -

7 MR. BROWN: Commissioner Carter asked for an excused  
8 absence.

9 MR. BROWN: Commissioner Moore - Present representing  
10 the mighty District 7.

11 MR. BROWN: Commissioner Hernandez - Present. Sorry.

12 MR. BROWN: Commissioner Banks is walking in.

13 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Okay. With that we do indeed  
14 have a quorum. And so now we'll move on to the approval  
15 of the July 11th, 2024 agenda.

16 CHAIRPERSON-ELECT WOODS: So move.

17 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Is there a second?

18 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Second

19 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: It's been properly moved, and  
20 seconded. Any discussion? Hearing no discussion, all  
21 those in favor, please signify by saying, Aye.

22 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

23 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: All those opposed? No. The  
24 ayes have it. The agenda is approved. Now we'll move  
25 on... Yes.

1 MR. BROWN: Excuse me. I forgot to call Commissioner  
2 Bernard.

3 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Oh, we're so sorry for that.  
4 We definitely know that her presence is here. We're so  
5 grateful to have you. Let the record reflect that  
6 Commissioner Bernard is indeed in attendance.

7 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you. Attorney Linda  
8 Bernard, District 2, present.

9 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: And so with that, we'll now  
10 move on to the approval of the minutes for June 27th,  
11 2024. Is there any objection to the approval of these  
12 minutes? Hearing no objection, the minutes are approved.  
13 And now we will have an introduction to BOPC staff, Chief  
14 of Police, elected officials, representatives, and  
15 community leaders for today's meeting.

16 MR. BROWN: Yeah. Good afternoon, Mr. Chair.  
17 Currently, we have with us, Chief Investigator Warfield,  
18 Ms. Jonya Underwood. Ms. Teresa Blossom. Ms. Jasmine  
19 Taylor, Ms. Artemisia Joshua, Ms. Candace Hayes.  
20 Supervising Investigator, LiSonya Sloan, ASL interpreter,  
21 Ms. Yakata, and Dr. Stephanie Beatty. Don Handyside is  
22 doing the court reporting. The Media Service is doing the  
23 video. And Sergeant Allen Quinn is doing the audio.  
24 Sitting in for the Chief is DC Pritchett; elected  
25 Official, Ms. Maria Overall, State Representative Tyrone

1 Carter's Office. Ms. Fredia Butler, Second Precinct  
2 Community Relations President, Mr. Don Davis, Office of  
3 Councilmember, Fred Durhall III, Ms. Vaughn,  
4 Office of State Representative Santana, and former  
5 Commissioner William Davis, and former Commissioner  
6 Reginald Crawford.

7 CHAIRPERSON PRESSLEY: Alright. And so the room is  
8 packed tonight with some amazing dignitaries. And again,  
9 in my estimation, we all are very important people. And  
10 so I'm grateful that you are here. And it's my hope that  
11 it will add to the productivity of today's meeting.  
12 Today's meeting is a very special meeting for a number of  
13 reasons. One, this meeting actually kicks off the 50th  
14 anniversary of the Constitution of the Board of Police  
15 Commissioners. And so we'll be celebrating throughout the  
16 year. But it's especially a wonderful day for me because  
17 I get to hand off the leadership of this board to a well  
18 capable and able leader. And so we are so grateful to now  
19 have the investiture of installation that will be offered  
20 by Honorable Judge Sean B. Perkins from the 36th District  
21 Court for both our Chair-Elect as well as our Vice Chair.  
22 Judge Perkins. Both can stand, follow his instruction.  
23 Yep. You can go there. Yes.

24 JUDGE PERKINS: Alright. First I'd like to thank Mr.  
25 Woods, Ms. Smith for giving me the opportunity and the

1 privilege of being able to swear you in today. I mimic  
2 Pastor Ellis' words. This is a very honorable and  
3 difficult job to do. And we know that you guys are very  
4 well capable and I just appreciate having this honor.  
5 Okay. Mr. Woods can you state your name for the record,  
6 please?

7 CHAIRPERSON-ELECT Darryl Woods: Darryl Woods.

8 JUDGE PERKINS: Alright. Can you raise your right  
9 hand please? And repeat after me.

10 I...

11 CHAIRPERSON-ELECT Darryl WOODS: I...

12 JUDGE PERKINS: Darryl Woods solemnly swear or  
13 affirm.

14 CHAIRPERSON-ELECT DARRYL WOODS: I, Darryl Woods  
15 solemnly swear or affirm.

16 JUDGE PERKINS: That I will support the Constitution  
17 of the United States.

18 CHAIRPERSON-ELECT DARRYL WOODS: That I will support  
19 the Constitution of the United States.

20 JUDGE PERKINS: And the Constitution and laws of the  
21 State of Michigan.

22 CHAIRPERSON-ELECT DARRYL WOODS: And the Constitution  
23 and laws of the State of Michigan.

24 JUDGE PERKINS: And the Charter of the City of  
25 Detroit,

1 CHAIRPERSON-ELECT DARRYL WOODS: And the Charter of  
2 the City of Detroit.

3 JUDGE PERKINS: And that I will faithfully and  
4 impartially perform and discharge the duties of the  
5 Office as Chairperson.

6 CHAIRPERSON-ELECT DARRYL WOODS: That I will  
7 faithfully...

8 JUDGE PERKINS: And impartially.

9 CHAIRPERSON-ELECT DARRYL WOODS: And impartially.

10 JUDGE PERKINS: Perform, and discharge the duties

11 CHAIRPERSON-ELECT DARRYL WOODS: And discharge the  
12 duties.

13 JUDGE PERKINS: Of the Office as Chairperson of  
14 Detroit Board of Police Commissioners.

15 CHAIRPERSON-ELECT DARRYL WOODS: Of Chairperson of  
16 the Board of Police Commission.

17 JUDGE PERKINS: According to the law and the best of  
18 my abilities

19 CHAIRPERSON-ELECT DARRYL WOODS: According to the law  
20 and the best of my abilities.

21 JUDGE PERKINS: Very well, congratulations.

22 CHAIRPERSON-ELECT DARRYL WOODS: Thank you.

23 JUDGE PERKINS: So you all have to forgive me. This  
24 is the first time I've sworn somebody into a position  
25 like this. I swear people in the court to tell the truth



1 every day. But not like this. Ms. Smith, how are you?

2 State your name for the record, please?

3 VICE CHAIRPERSON TAMARA LIBERTY SMITH: Tamara  
4 Liberty Smith.

5 JUDGE PERKINS: Alright. Can you raise your right  
6 hand? I, Tamara Liberty Smith.

7 VICE CHAIRPERSON TAMARA LIBERTY SMITH: I, Tamara  
8 Liberty Smith.

9 JUDGE PERKINS: Do solemnly swear or affirm.

10 VICE CHAIRPERSON TAMARA LIBERTY SMITH: Do solemnly  
11 swear or affirm.

12 JUDGE PERKINS: That I will support the Constitution  
13 of the United States.

14 VICE CHAIRPERSON TAMARA LIBERTY SMITH: That I will  
15 support the Constitution of the United States.

16 JUDGE PERKINS: And the Constitution and laws of the  
17 State of Michigan.

18 VICE CHAIRPERSON TAMARA LIBERTY SMITH: And the  
19 Constitution and laws of the State of Michigan.

20 JUDGE PERKINS: State of Michigan. And the Charter of  
21 the City of Detroit.

22 VICE CHAIRPERSON TAMARA LIBERTY SMITH: And the  
23 Charter of the City of Detroit.

24 JUDGE PERKINS: And that I will faithfully and  
25 impartially.

1 VICE CHAIRPERSON TAMARA LIBERTY SMITH: And that I  
2 will faithfully, and impartially.

3 JUDGE PERKINS: Perform and discharge the duties.

4 VICE CHAIRPERSON TAMARA LIBERTY SMITH: Perform and  
5 discharge the duties.

6 JUDGE PERKINS: Of the Office as Vice President of  
7 the Board of Police Commissioners. Vice Chairperson, I'm  
8 sorry.

9 VICE CHAIRPERSON TAMARA LIBERTY SMITH: Of the Office  
10 as Vice Chairperson of the Board of Police Commissioners.

11 JUDGE PERKINS: According to the laws and to the best  
12 of my abilities. Congratulations.

13 VICE CHAIRPERSON TAMARA LIBERTY SMITH: Thank you,  
14 sir.

15 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: I want to thank our past  
16 Chairman, the honorable QuanTez Pressley for his great  
17 leadership, being able to take on such a task during such  
18 a trying time. Absolutely. I think we should give him a  
19 standing ovation for all the sacrifices that he had to  
20 make.

21 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Thank you.

22 And let it be absolutely clear that this man  
23 sacrificed his time, his resources, and all of his  
24 efforts to be able to serve the citizens of the City of  
25 Detroit. Under his great leadership, we've been able to

1 get fully staffed, and OIG that was vitally important to  
2 be able to deal with the backlog that this community and  
3 the citizens of Detroit is very, very concerned about.  
4 This is not a rubber stamp committee. This is a committee  
5 that is very, very serious about serving the citizens of  
6 the City of Detroit. We took an oath to be able to serve  
7 the citizens of the City of Detroit. We didn't take an  
8 oath to serve any leader. We didn't take an oath to do  
9 anything for personal gain.

10       And I assure you that I'm not here because I have  
11 aspirations to go anywhere else. I'm here because I was  
12 willing to sacrifice my time and my efforts and my  
13 resources and my talent to be able to do everything that  
14 we possibly can to be able to rid ourselves of the  
15 backlog; to be able to bring dignity and respect and  
16 integrity to this office. And so you have my promise, and  
17 my dedication, that I would do everything possible to  
18 work with all of my fellow commissioners in a civil way,  
19 and a respectful way, and a honorable way to be able to  
20 do everything we can to reduce that backlog. That is a  
21 number one priority for us, as a commission. And you also  
22 have my promise that I would never, ever, ever, ever turn  
23 my back on the people of the City of Detroit.

24       I would not sell us out. I would do everything  
25 within my spirit and in my mind, with the fiber of my

1 being to be able to serve in a loving way, in a  
2 compassionate way. And I know that many of my fellow  
3 commissioners share that spirit. And it is time we  
4 continue to roll our sleeves up. We are fully staffed and  
5 we have some more innovation to do on this commission. We  
6 actually just have litigation with us. And please know  
7 that we will report back to this community and we will  
8 be, continue to stay open and transparent. And I think  
9 that you'll be very, very happy with some of the  
10 initiatives that we have in mind to be able to show the  
11 citizens of the City of Detroit that we mean business.

12 And having said that, I want to thank all of the  
13 commissioners, the ones who voted for me, the ones who  
14 did not vote for me, and for all the ones who didn't  
15 vote. And I would say that it is time for us to show up  
16 for the citizens of the City of Detroit. We need to be  
17 present at every meeting. We need to dedicate ourselves  
18 and make sure that we are rolling up our sleeves because  
19 You didn't take an oath to nobody else. You did it in the  
20 name of God to the citizens of the City of Detroit. And  
21 it is, they deserve for us to have a qualm at every  
22 meeting they deserve for us to work hard and work very  
23 diligently to be able to serve this community. And so,  
24 having said that, I would allow my... I can't do that on my  
25 own, you know what I'm saying?

1 I'm going to go by the agenda. And I'm sure that my  
2 Vice Chairman, our Vice Chairman, and because I am your  
3 Chairman, but I'm also your fellow commissioner, I don't  
4 go by labels. There's no big "I's" and little "You's,"  
5 here. I want to listen to everyone. I want to hear from  
6 everyone. I want to listen to the citizens. I want to  
7 listen to the ones who oppose me, the ones who ran to the  
8 Detroit News and all these presses on me. I love you. You  
9 know, I support you, I pray for you. And I don't have an  
10 ill will in my heart and in my spirit against anyone. And  
11 so my pastor's here, the honorable Bishop Charles Haywood  
12 Ellis III. If you stand, he's a very honorable leader in  
13 this community, and the First Lady.

14 The honorable Pastor Spencer T. Ellis, someone who  
15 was here, a dear friend of mine, if you were staying one  
16 more time. But this is the 50th anniversary in which we  
17 celebrate the Board of Police Commission. And one of  
18 those commissioners inspired me for decades. And it's the  
19 reason why I'm sitting in this seat. It is their father  
20 who touched my heart and touched my mind and ministered  
21 to me when I was in a weak place and a downtrodden place,  
22 and was able to advocate, and pray for me and love me.  
23 And his sons had done the same thing since their father  
24 had been gone since 1996. But his inspiration, who sat in  
25 this seat as a board of police commissioner, you know

1 that I am inspired by. You know, I'm inspired by the  
2 honorable Coleman Alexander Young; the brother who wrote  
3 the book "Hard Stuff." And you want to know about all of  
4 this stuff. Read his book. It's an autobiography from  
5 cover to cover. I read it three times and got some real  
6 inspiration. And my good friend the honorable Mayor Todd,  
7 the honorable Deputy Mayor Todd Bettison, a brother.

8       A brother who served this community as a slave for  
9 this community. And so I thank him for being here. And I  
10 have so many friends and brothers and sisters that are in  
11 this room today. The director of the Conviction Integrity  
12 Unit, the one who fights against injustices in reverse  
13 wrongful convictions. The honorable Valerie Newman is  
14 back there. Give her a hand. Let's stand up Valerie. And  
15 there are so many. And my grandson is here. There he  
16 goes. And my daughter is right there. My father and my  
17 brothers are in the room. My brothers are in the room, my  
18 cousins. So you all can't mess with me today. You all  
19 better be really good to me. You know and so does all of  
20 my family and friends, would you please stand as I give  
21 you, recognize you? Because I can't call everybody by  
22 name. You all stand.

23       Absolutely. And again, finally, I'll say to my  
24 friend who, I'm glad I was able to baptize you, judge,  
25 and get you to be; I'm your first, you know, and this is

1 a first for me. And I've definitely sacrificed a lot here  
2 and got a lot on the line. But you are a dear friend, a  
3 special brother, a person who means business in the  
4 courtroom. But you do it with integrity and love and  
5 compassion. And so I thank you for being here to swear my  
6 fellow colleague in, as well as myself. So much love and  
7 respect to you. And God bless you. Now, let's get to the  
8 business.

9 So we did the agenda and we did the minutes. So we  
10 are good. Okay. And so we finished it. That would be the  
11 Chairperson. I give you one thing as the Chairperson  
12 report. Please understand that we, and I think we all  
13 should at this moment, take another moment of silence for  
14 those who have been victimized for the 21 people who were  
15 shot on the Eastside of Detroit. I think we should take a  
16 moment of silence for those families and for that  
17 community. I was there yesterday. Many of us have gone  
18 over there, but let's take a moment of silence for them.

19 Thank you. And so please know that any, and  
20 everything that needs to be investigated in that  
21 situation will be investigated. And if there are some  
22 issues with anything in that area, we as a commission, my  
23 brothers and sisters and my colleagues, we are committed  
24 to being able to give the community the answers that they  
25 deserve. And we will be very, very open and transparent

1 in what comes out of that. And also for those we've been  
2 looking at as far as the monitors from legal aid, and my  
3 colleague, she will speak to that, and I will speak after  
4 that because I'm not going to upstage you on that. But  
5 please, you know that we hear you. And we will not ignore  
6 any of your voices. And so these are very, very serious  
7 issues. These are very trying times and it's a time for  
8 us to turn to each other and not on each other. And so  
9 let's go to... we did the introductions. Let's go to the  
10 resolution. Brother Moore, you are recognized.

11 Commissioner Moore. Commissioner Moore.

12 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you Mr. Chairman. To  
13 begin, I want to thank the staff of the Board of Police  
14 Commissioners. Ms. Jonya Underwood is on vacation and she  
15 came in today to be here for you, the community. So I  
16 think that deserves a round of applause as well as Ms.  
17 Teresa Blossom. Thank you so much for putting these  
18 certificates together. Is Ms. Betty Varner in the house?  
19 Alright, that's the boss. Please take your time.

20 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Commissioner Moore, if you could  
21 start reading the resolutions.

22 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Yes, Mr. Chairman. Resolution  
23 honoring Betty Varner.

24 WHEREAS Benny Varner is a lifelong resident of the  
25 City of Detroit and has lived in her neighborhood for



1 over 50 years, observing many changes in the  
2 neighborhood, some good and some bad. She dedicated to  
3 become a part of the resolution, I'm sorry, the solution  
4 in her community. Ms. Varner joined the Block Club and  
5 was elected president in 2015; and,

6 WHEREAS president of the DeSoto Ellsworth Block  
7 Association, a nonprofit organization established by  
8 senior citizens residing in the community, the goal is to  
9 improve the overall quality of living in the neighborhood  
10 by beautifying and maintaining the vacant lots, vacant  
11 homes and alleys of the community. They have purchased  
12 five vacant lots on the corner of Ellsworth and Monica  
13 for the sole purpose of building a landscape, pocket park  
14 and flower garden, and,

15 WHEREAS: Ms. Varner has been successful in bringing  
16 several programs to the neighborhood, the free minor home  
17 repair program, and the program to have vacant houses  
18 boarded up, the Lawn Academy snow removal, and other  
19 resources for residents.

20 Ms. Varner is presently working with the City of  
21 Detroit to revitalize the Fenkell Corridor from Livernois  
22 to Wyoming. She worked closely with her late vice  
23 president, Gwendolyn Lanier, to create a community park  
24 to give the children in the neighborhood a safe place to  
25 play, a place for seniors and residents to congregate

1 that provides tranquility, a place to interact with  
2 others and a place for community events; and,

3 WHEREAS in 2023, Ms. Varner advocated to the Detroit  
4 City Council to allocate monies from the budget to have  
5 seniors and people with disabilities houses made handicap  
6 accessible. The Council allocated \$2 million from the  
7 budget for the new program named Seniors Accessibility  
8 Home Repair Fund. She spoke every day that the Council  
9 had a meeting advocating for monies to be budgeted for  
10 the program; and,

11 WHEREAS Ms. Varner served as an "At-large" member of  
12 the 10th Precinct Community Relations Organization  
13 Executive Board. She attended and completed training for  
14 the Detroit Citizens Police Academy Alumni Association.

15 THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED

16 That the Detroit Board of Police Commissioners,  
17 speaking on behalf of the residents of Detroit and the  
18 Detroit Police Department, acknowledge the dedicated  
19 support of Ms. Betty Varner, her commitment and devotion  
20 to supporting the community of the 10th Precinct and the  
21 citizens throughout the City of Detroit merits our  
22 highest regards. We thank and congratulate you Ms. Betty  
23 Varner.

24 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: I entertain a motion to accept  
25 the resolution in our archives.

1 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: So moved.

2 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Second.

3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: It's been properly moved, and  
4 seconded by Commissioner Hernandez. Any discussion? No  
5 discussion. All those in favor?

6 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

7 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: All those opposed? The motion is  
8 carried.

9 MS. VARNER: Good evening everyone. First of all, I  
10 want to say thank God for giving me the health and the  
11 strength because I have health challenges to be able to  
12 continue to do the work that I love for my community that  
13 I love. I was born and raised. I don't do this work  
14 alone. Some of the members are here. Please stand. The  
15 vice president and our members that are here in the  
16 house, they are the ones who helped me to achieve the  
17 goals. And Mrs. LaDon Davis, when we first started out, I  
18 got to give her kudos. She was my mentor who led and  
19 guided me. And so I just thank you all for this time.  
20 Thank you. And I appreciate you, Commissioner Moore.

21 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you.

22 MS. VARNER: I can't forget about you. Thank you so  
23 much.

24 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Yes, ma'am.

25 MS. VARNER: And we appreciate your support.

1 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you.

2 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: So, Commissioner Moore is going  
3 to read a number of people that are going to receive  
4 certificates. We want to be able to do this in an  
5 efficient manner. And so when you hear your name call, we  
6 ask you to be able to kind of move expeditiously so that  
7 we would not prolong this process. And this is an  
8 alphabetical order. So if you hear me call the first  
9 name, which is Allen, you know the "Bs" are right behind;  
10 so just come on up front. Mr. Alex Allen III, Mr. Alex

16 Arthur Barry White Edge,

17 Pastor Spencer T. Ellis, Mr. Armand Fisher, Mr.  
18 Brian Flagg, Pastor Gregory Foster, Mr. Charles Grant,  
19 Mr. Joseph Haskins. And you all recommended these folks,  
20 they are not here. Where are they at? You all recommended  
21 them. Where are you all at? Chanel Haskins, Pastor  
22 Everett N. Jennings, Chaplain Anthony Johnson, Mr. Ali  
23 Johnson, Police Officer Jevon Jones, Dr. Pastor Lester B.  
24 Jordan, Mr. Allen, forgive me for butchering your name,  
25 Allan Kjellbert, Mr. William Lazensby, Mr. Joe Matney.

1 Joe can fix anything. Mr. Frankie McKnuckle, Chaplain  
2 Stanley Mobley, Mr. Walter Moore. The Commander Vernal  
3 Newson, Mr. Kevin Nolan, Mr. George Perdue, Sergeant  
4 Brandon Pierce, Mr. William Rankin, Mr. Gary Ringer, Mr.  
5 Brett Robinson, Mr. Ronald Roland, Mr. Tom Scott, Mr.  
6 Tommy Sewell, Reverend Larry Simmons. I have to say he  
7 has grandchildren here from New Jersey, so he has to go.  
8 Mr. Larry Slappy, Mr. Aaron Slaughter. His granddaughter  
9 is accepting on his behalf. Mr. Steve Smith. You are  
10 welcome. Mr. Jerry Springs. Police Officer Charles  
11 Staples. He's protecting the station. I don't think he's  
12 here tonight. Mr. Paul Stark, Mr. Steven Strickland, Mr.  
13 Eric Strickland. We got two Stricklands in the house,  
14 family.

15 MR. STRICKLAND: Right now, I'm going to put this  
16 right here. You know, I think I can walk a little bit  
17 now.

18 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you for your service.

19 COMMISSIONER MOORE: He forgot his cane. Right. You  
20 all are something else.

21

22 Bishop Kenneth Tate, Mr. Ishmael Terry. All for one,  
23 Mr. Carlos Topp. And last but not least, Pastor Gregory  
24 Foster. Hey, thank you for your patience, family. We  
25 really do appreciate it. On behalf of the Board of Police

1 Commissions, thank you.

2 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you for your patience. And  
3 we promise we are going to streamline that process as we  
4 move forward. And I want to recognize school board member  
5 Sherry Gay-Dagnogo. Let's give her a hand. I think we  
6 will go to the Chief of Police report.

7 DC PRITCHETT: Good afternoon everyone. Chief White  
8 couldn't be here. He's currently over at the prayer vigil  
9 in District 3, with Commissioner, I'm sorry, with  
10 Councilman Benson. So the update on the injured officers.  
11 Currently, there is one member of the department who was  
12 disabled and recovering at home to an on-duty accident  
13 injury. So the crime data as of 17/20/24, homicides, we  
14 are down 17% or 23 homicides. Nonfatal shootings, we're  
15 down 82 or 19%. Our robberies are down 174 or 24%. And  
16 our carjackings are down, I'm sorry, 33 or 38%. And  
17 currently our part one violent crime is down 11% or 740  
18 individual incidents for the drag racing enforcement for  
19 the weekend of July 4th through July 7th, there were 85  
20 people investigated, there were 22 traffic stops. There  
21 were 31 vehicles investigated, 4 were impounded, and 6  
22 were stolen. They were recovered. And the officers made 7  
23 felony arrests, and they also recovered 7 weapons. And  
24 they also attended 13 block party responses.

25 So the significant incidents for the past week. On

1 July 4th at 3:53 PM, officers were dispatched to South  
2 Phil and Pembroke to investigate a fatal shooting. Once  
3 they arrived, they observed the victim lying on the  
4 grass, suffering from multiple gunshot wounds to the head  
5 and body. Medic 24 arrived, and conveyed him to a local  
6 hospital where he was pronounced deceased on arrival.  
7 Witnesses report driving north on Southfield Service  
8 Drive, and seeing the body lying in the grass. This  
9 incident is still under investigation. Detectives are  
10 asking anyone with additional information regarding this  
11 incident to contact Crime Stoppers at 1-800-SPEAKUP or  
12 detroitrewards.tv. The second incident is another fatal  
13 shooting. On July 5th at 12:50 AM, officers were  
14 dispatched to the 14,000 block of Cherrylawn to  
15 investigate a fatal shooting. Once they arrived, they  
16 observed the victim at the location with the gunshot  
17 wound to the head.

18 He was transported to a local hospital, where he was  
19 pronounced deceased. Detectives determined the victim was  
20 at a block party on Cherrylawn when several unknown  
21 individuals started shooting. This incident also is under  
22 investigation. Detectives are asking anyone with  
23 additional information regarding this incident to contact  
24 Crime Stoppers at 1-800-SPEAKUP or detroitrewards.tv. The  
25 third incident, the homicide investigation where there

1 were two fatal and 19 fatal shooting victims. So on  
2 Sunday, July 7th at 2:23 AM officers were dispatched to  
3 the 13,000 block of Rossini, the Ninth Precinct to  
4 investigate a shooting in progress. And a ShotSpotter  
5 alert. Officers arrived and they were flagged down by  
6 medics. Stated they had two victims from the Rossini  
7 scene suffering from gunshot wounds and were transporting  
8 them to a local hospital. Officers continued to  
9 investigate and observe another victim lying in the  
10 street. They also were notified by DP dispatch, the  
11 various members, victims were arriving at local hospitals  
12 and the victims fleeing from the scene who were at  
13 multiple locations nearby, suffering from gunshot wounds.  
14 All the victims were eventually transported to local  
15 hospitals and seen by emergency staff. Two victims were  
16 pronounced deceased, and 19 victims were listed in  
17 stable, temporary, and critical condition. Of the 19 non-  
18 fatal shooting victims, 11 have been treated and  
19 discharged, and 8 are expected to be discharged in the  
20 coming days. At this point, evidence continues to suggest  
21 that this was not a random shooting. This incident is  
22 also still under investigation. Detectives are asking  
23 anyone with additional information regarding this  
24 incident to contact Crime Stoppers at 1-800 SPEAKUP or  
25 detroitrewards.tv. And finally, incident 4 was an arson,



1 and a homicide that happened on Tuesday, July 9th. At  
2 10:50 PM. Officers were dispatched to Gladstone and Third  
3 to investigate a vehicle fire. Once on scene, they  
4 extinguished a white Jeep Compass that was on fire. The  
5 deceased body of an unknown individual was discovered in  
6 the truck, in the trunk, I'm sorry, with a gunshot wound  
7 to the head. This case is still under investigation. So  
8 anyone with any information, please contact Crime  
9 Stoppers or 1-800 SPEAKUP or detroitrewards.tv. So the  
10 positive notes, I know that was somewhat depressing, but  
11 on Monday we announced a new four-point strategy to  
12 address illegal block parties in Detroit. And some of  
13 those things. We are non- classifying all block parties  
14 from priority 2s and 3s to priority 1, to get a faster  
15 police response. We will continue to enforce noise  
16 complaints, parking complaints, disorderly conduct, and  
17 underage drinking. And what we are requiring now is that  
18 for a permit to be approved, the block party hosts must  
19 get 75% of the resident's signature agreeing to allow the  
20 block party to take place. And it must be over at 10  
21 o'clock. So chop it up Tuesday, two days ago we held  
22 another chop it up Tuesday of the men of DPD. Chop it up,  
23 Tuesday is a round table barbershop style conversation  
24 about specific experiences that impact male officers  
25 professionally and personally with leaders, health

1 professionals, counselors, and life coaches. And  
2 tomorrow, Friday, July 19th, we will hold our DPD recruit  
3 class 2024 e graduation at Second Ebenezer Church. 26  
4 students, police officers are graduating. So that is it  
5 for the Chief's report.

6 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you very kindly. Fellow  
7 commissioners? Commissioner Moore.

8 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you Mr. Chairman. Deputy  
9 Chief, you mentioned about 80 officers being deployed to  
10 illegal block parties. Where are these officers coming  
11 from?

12 DC PRITCHETT: Through the Chair. Commissioner Moore,  
13 what we are doing is that some of the job assignments  
14 have been rearranged and some of our hours of operations  
15 have been changed in order to get that number. So we will  
16 have 40 officers on the Eastside and 40 on the Westside  
17 beginning Friday, Saturday, and Sunday starting this week  
18 until the end of the summer surge.

19 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Are they trained in mobile field  
20 force?

21 DC PRITCHETT: Yes, they are. The majority of the  
22 mobile field force is a component of the 40 officers.  
23 What we are doing now, we are increasing our mobile field  
24 force, and they are scheduled to have training next week,  
25 and we will increase that number. But mobile field force

1 is only a component of the 40 officers that would be  
2 assigned to the Eastside as well as the Westside.

3 COMMISSIONER MOORE: How many will work together,  
4 through the Chair

5 DC PRITCHETT: Through the Chair, Commissioner Moore,  
6 there will be 40 officers and they will have various jobs  
7 throughout the Westside Precincts and the Eastside  
8 Precincts. I'm not sure how they would be deployed, how  
9 many would go or how many would go west, but the special  
10 operations that are assigned to each precinct will be in  
11 their prospective precincts doing spotting and block  
12 party enforcement.

13 COMMISSIONER MOORE: And just to close out I'm just  
14 really concerned. I mean, we are like towards the  
15 beginning of the summer and because like I told the Tenth  
16 Precinct on Zoom last night, I might not be good in  
17 French and German history, but when it comes to the  
18 history of City Detroit and Detroit Police Department, I  
19 do know a little something. So it just takes me back to  
20 June of, I'm sorry, July of 1967, with the rebellion that  
21 took place in the Tenth Precinct. And a lot of the  
22 conditions which existed then exist now. So that's just a  
23 concern of mine that I have. And I know that you're doing  
24 what you can do to make the city safe. That's ultimately  
25 what the purpose is. That's just a concern of mine. Thank

1 you. Deputy Chief.

2 DC PRITCHETT: Through the Chair, I might respond to  
3 that. You know, I believe that there's work to be done,  
4 but I do believe that we have grown as a city since 1967.  
5 I believe that the oversight the board is doing for the  
6 police department is keeping us doing what we need to do.  
7 Like I said, we can't celebrate that we are down 21 fatal  
8 homicides that still have family members who have lost  
9 someone. And I still believe that we have work to do.  
10 We're not celebrating anyone that was shot. But we are  
11 doing what we can to keep this city safe. And I know  
12 myself, as well as the other Deputy Chief, and Chief  
13 White, is definitely engaged and our heart aches when we  
14 hear, get phone calls of someone being shot. And that  
15 mass shooting affected everyone and everyone in this room  
16 should be outraged. It is not acceptable, and we are  
17 doing what we can to get those responsible arrested and  
18 charged and hopefully convicted. So I do think that we  
19 have come further than 1967.

20 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you.

21 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Commissioner Bernard?

22 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. Just  
23 quickly. We've touched upon obviously the problem with  
24 the block clubs and so forth, and of course the incident  
25 that occurred over the July 4th weekend. Have there been

1 any arrests as a result of what happened during the July  
2 4th weekend.

3 DC PRITCHETT: Through the Chair. Currently, there  
4 have not been any arrests made, but the investigation is  
5 ongoing. Tips are coming in. We have a video to review,  
6 but I am confident that what we have thus far in the  
7 investigation, those that are assigned to this particular  
8 task will bring resolution to the family members about  
9 getting those responsible in custody.

10 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: And just a quick follow up.  
11 How many shell casings have you recovered at that scene?

12 DC PRITCHETT: Through the Chair, it is my  
13 understanding that there were over 101 spent shell  
14 casings recovered from that scene.

15 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you.

16 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Commissioner Hernandez.

17 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Thank you so much. Through  
18 the Chair. Just to ask a sort of a follow up question to  
19 what Commissioner Moore was inquiring. And I'm curious if  
20 the four-point plan also includes activation in the city  
21 parks. So from Connor to Rouge to Riverside and  
22 Southwest, even parks that are a lot more local, like St.  
23 Hedwig, you're seeing an uptick in gatherings in those  
24 spaces, whether they might have permitting or not,  
25 whether they might end up having alcohol on site and kids

1 and so forth. Does that four-point plan include parks or  
2 is it specific to just block parties that should be  
3 licensed through the city?

4 DC PRITCHETT: Through the Chair. The 40-member  
5 response team on each side will also ensure that the  
6 parks, you know, are not underage drinking, loud  
7 disorderly conduct, as well as large gatherings, and  
8 backyard barbecues, and things of that nature.

9 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Okay, thank you.

10 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Anyone else?

11 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Right here, Mr. Chair.

12 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Commissioner Banks.

13 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Through the Chair. We are down a  
14 commissioner. We've been down a commissioner since Rory  
15 Gamble left about four or five months ago. Can you give  
16 an update on when we will be getting that new  
17 commissioner in?

18 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: That is not germane to this issue  
19 right now, as far as the Chief of police report.

20 COMMISSIONER BANKS: So what, you have to wait until  
21 new business?

22 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah. Yep. Madam Commissioner  
23 Vice...

24 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Okay. That's fine. That's fine.

25 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Oh, excuse me. Were you done?

1 COMMISSIONER BANKS: I'm set. Go ahead.

2 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Alright. Thank you.

3 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Thank you, sir. Through the  
4 Chair. And concerning the shooting on Rossini, is this at  
5 all gang related?

6 DC PRITCHETT: Currently... because it's not a random  
7 shooting, we believe that the perpetrators were known to  
8 some of the victims. So I don't know if it was the so-  
9 called gang shooting or... it wasn't random. No one just  
10 pulled up and started shooting. That's what I can say.  
11 The investigation is still ongoing.

12 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Thank you.

13 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Anyone else?

14 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: I thank you. Through the  
15 Chair. You know, obviously there is a huge concern about  
16 the level of violence that we're seeing in our community,  
17 particularly that's victimizing our children. Oftentimes  
18 the victims are under the age of 20 years old, which is  
19 drastically heartbreaking. While there are measures being  
20 put in place by DPD, I mean, it can't be understated that  
21 the issue is, we have too many guns in our neighborhood,  
22 and whatever mechanism that they're using in these  
23 switches like, on these weapons, that allows over a  
24 hundred shells to be found outside. Are there any harsher  
25 penalties for those who are found to be utilizing these

1 illegal mechanisms, or does that fall under the same kind  
2 of penalty of just using an illegal firearm

3 DC PRITCHETT: Through the Chair, US Attorney Dawn  
4 Ison has committed to DPD that anyone that has been found  
5 to be in possession of a weapon with a Glock switch or  
6 have been found to have used it in the commission of any  
7 crime, would be charged federally. So the penalty would  
8 be a little, and would be higher.

9 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Okay. Great. And so  
10 secondarily to that would be how are we communicating  
11 this to the community? And I mean, I guess my concern is  
12 that it doesn't necessarily get to the audience that  
13 needs to hear it. So what is the DPD strategy or  
14 enlisting the city to ensure that our community and  
15 particularly young people in our community are aware of  
16 one safety measures that they can put in place to protect  
17 themselves, but then also consequences for those who  
18 might be bad actors

19 DC PRITCHETT: Through the Chair. We are currently  
20 with our CVI groups. Our CVI groups are out there  
21 pounding the pavement each and every day. And they are  
22 spreading that message. Also, the NPO should be out in  
23 the community meetings letting everyone know it shouldn't  
24 be. It's not DPD. We can't arrest our way out of  
25 anything. And we need the community's help to spread the



1 word that these Glock switches are taking lives, and that  
2 these young people should not be carrying guns. And also,  
3 I put a lot of responsibility on the parents. You have  
4 15-year-old females out at block parties at 2 o'clock  
5 like in the morning. Where is the parental  
6 responsibility? So it's a circle. So we need to get with  
7 the community, get with these parents,' and train these  
8 parents as well. So I believe the parents should become  
9 more accountable and more responsible for their child.  
10 Their children wouldn't be out at 3 o'clock in the  
11 morning fighting, getting shot.

12 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Yeah. And I obviously  
13 recognize and appreciate the fact that DPD is already  
14 overloaded with so many issues to deal with. And so, I  
15 don't know if this is something that you might be able to  
16 include the City of Detroit Communications Department in,  
17 but again, I think it's like some social media posts,  
18 something that can go viral, something that they see on  
19 their timelines. Again, making sure that it gets to the  
20 audience who is actually being victimized by these  
21 crimes, I think is going to be extremely important. So if  
22 anything I can do to assist in trying to make sure that  
23 young people are aware, I'm more than willing. But  
24 hopefully there are some resources that can be brought to  
25 bear to ensure that they are hearing this message.

1 DC PRITCHETT: Through the Chair, we have our media  
2 relations department, and I will take that back to them,  
3 to the director and I'm sure there are things out there  
4 that they post on Instagram, Twitter, as well as our  
5 Facebook Live, the consequences of using firearms. You  
6 know, we talk all the time regarding gun safety in the  
7 home. These babies are getting guns shooting themselves.  
8 So those are public safety announcements that go out on  
9 our Facebook Live page. And I know they're posting things  
10 to Twitter and to Instagram, but I would ensure that  
11 those messages that you spoke of, which are very, very  
12 important, everyone needs to hear, because young people  
13 are not here. They're on Instagram at home on their  
14 phones, and they need to see and hear this message as  
15 well.

16 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Thank you. Thank you, Mr.  
17 Chair.

18 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you. And to your point we  
19 are working with Teresa Blossom to... and we've worked with  
20 her the last couple of days to get a mockup of a placard  
21 or a card, postcard, you know, a larger stock size to put  
22 a powerful message to go out to every resident in the  
23 City of Detroit, you know. So we are very, very focused  
24 on making sure that it's very appealing. And we will be  
25 once we finish the mockup we'll make sure that all

1 commissioners give some input on that and maybe get some  
2 of the young people in the community, some of the  
3 influencers in the community to take a look at it. But we  
4 have determined that every citizen in the City of Detroit  
5 needs to get the message about how dangerous this is.

6 I was there yesterday. I was there the day before  
7 yesterday. I met with the families and community people.  
8 My family was impacted by it. One of my, you know,  
9 nieces, her sister was shot in the neck. The bullet came  
10 out of her shoulder, you know, and so this is something  
11 very, very serious. And I'm very appreciative of meeting  
12 with a number of the legislatures. In particular  
13 legislator representative Donavan McKinney who has put  
14 together a bill already to be able to ban the bunk stops,  
15 as well as switches in the State of Michigan, because we  
16 know that the United States Supreme Court knocked that  
17 down. And so let us all continue to stay vigilant on this  
18 particular issue.

19 Had I not been here, I would've been at that vigil.  
20 And I thank everybody who's rolling up their sleeves the  
21 love of that community. And if you have time, go over  
22 there and love that community. Bless them and wrap your  
23 arms around them because they very much need it. And  
24 Madam Deputy Chief, what I want to ask is that we have  
25 had serious concerns about people coming to us in the

1 meetings, and it's in the media. I want us to put it out  
2 in the opening as it relates to these 911 calls. Was 3  
3 received, 4 received, or is that information getting  
4 updated so that we can share with the public as it  
5 relates to how many 911 calls were made pre shooting?

6 DC PRITCHETT: Through the Chair. I'm not sure how  
7 many 911 calls were made prior to the shooting occurring.  
8 So I can't answer that question now, but I'm sure if the  
9 calls came in, they should have been updated, that there  
10 were shots fired, as if someone called and said there's a  
11 block party. And then they called back and said there  
12 were shots fired. It definitely goes from a priority  
13 three to a priority one. So what Chief White has done,  
14 not any call for a block party is a priority one.

15 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Absolutely, and I get that  
16 aspect, but you know, the community wants to know how  
17 many 911 calls were made prior to the shooting. And so  
18 those who have been victimized over there, some of the  
19 families, this is what they are crying out about. And  
20 it's all in the media now. And I think that we need to be  
21 very, very transparent with this community, and see how  
22 many 911 calls were made prior to the shooting

23 DC PRITCHETT: Through the Chair. I will get the  
24 information to you. I'm going to send a text out now.  
25 Hopefully I have you before the meeting's over. If not,

1 you will get the first thing tomorrow morning.

2 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you very kindly.

3 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Mr. Chairman.

4 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes.

5 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I just have one more very,  
6 very brief comment. This dispute that happened at the  
7 Block party, principally engaged girls. This is new in  
8 Detroit, and shocking probably to many of the females in  
9 this audience that girls are packing, girls are shooting,  
10 and girls obviously can't have the ability, obviously, to  
11 take someone's life. So I really think that we need an  
12 initiative in the city targeted for females in order to  
13 address criminal issues. As you know, most of the  
14 emphasis is on males, as it should be because of the  
15 plethora of crimes that involve males. But I think that  
16 we as sisters and as black women in this community can  
17 reach out and do something with this. And I'm really  
18 looking at you too, Sherry, out there, because this is  
19 serious. I've never heard of this in my life anywhere in  
20 the country. And this is, I mean, beyond the impact of  
21 the block party being a huge, you know, embarrassment to  
22 the city, the fact that it's females, that as black  
23 girls, and we've been taught that black girls rock, is  
24 particularly disturbing. So we need to do something  
25 specifically targeted toward girls in middle school and

1 high school and young..

2 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: And let me remind my colleagues  
3 of this, we are still under the Chief of Police report.  
4 And so Commissioner Moore.

5 COMMISSIONER MORE: And thank you Mr. Chair.

6 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Madame Vice Chair.

7 COMMISSIONER MOORE: One last question, Deputy Chief.  
8 Will the NPOs be involved in this 80-person mobilization?

9 DC PRITCHETT: Through the Chair. Yes, they will. The  
10 NPOs will be working during the neighborhood response,  
11 every Friday, Saturday, and Sunday night, evening through  
12 into the early morning,

13 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Madame Vice Chair, then we go to  
14 the Sixth Precinct report.

15 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Okay. Thank you. Through the  
16 Chair. I'm concerned with a follow-up basically behind  
17 Commissioner Woods. Prior to us coming into this meeting  
18 today, audio was released for the 911 recordings,  
19 dispatching officers out to the scene and basically  
20 saying that they couldn't go because they were tied up in  
21 another scene. And the operator stated that we have a  
22 victim with a gunshot wound to the head and a multiple  
23 victim shot. And he clearly stated, me and my team can't  
24 go. And that was just released at 5 o'clock as I was  
25 leaving out of the door coming to the meeting. Okay.

1 That's going to be a, a, a huge concern.

2 DC PRITCHETT: Through the Chair, it should be. Like  
3 you said it happened at 5 o'clock. I didn't hear it, but  
4 I definitely would... I'm sure Chief White is all over it.  
5 Knowing how he is, and knowing how engaged and how  
6 passionate he is about keeping everyone in this city  
7 safe. I'm sure he is going to demand answers. And I'm  
8 sure I would get that response back to you as well. I  
9 found...

10 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Through the Chair, it sounds  
11 as if the team was at another block party. So it sounds  
12 like they're overwhelmed with so many parties going on at  
13 the same time. And maybe, just in the defense of a  
14 massacre was prevented at another block party that could  
15 have been the same as Rossini, but they were over there  
16 trying to dispatch officers there, get that crowd under  
17 control while the other shooting was going on at the next  
18 one. But however, it was just recorded and placed out to  
19 the community.

20 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: And I'm sure that has to be  
21 peeled back, and all those things need to be  
22 investigated, and they need to be very, very transparent.  
23 We need to be very, very transparent to the community,

24 DC PRITCHETT: Through the Chair, this agency, this  
25 department under Chief White's leadership is very

1 transparent, and Chief White, once he finds it out,  
2 whether it's good, bad, or different.

3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Absolutely.

4 DC PRITCHETT: He brings it out. So, if this did  
5 occur I'm sure Chief White will peel back all layers to  
6 find out what happened. That's one of the reasons because  
7 the block parties are occurring all over the city. There  
8 are multiple ones throughout each precinct, and that's  
9 the reason for the new response team. And the numbers  
10 have been increased to 40 per Eastside and 40 per  
11 Westside. So we can have a bigger gauge and a bigger  
12 opportunity to go there and tackle more than one block  
13 party at a time.

14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you very kindly. Sixth  
15 Precinct.

16 COMMANDER NEWSON: Through the Chair. Good evening,  
17 ladies and gentlemen. I am Vernal Newson, the Commander  
18 of the Sixth Precinct. And if I could, sir, introduce my  
19 staff? With me tonight is Captain Shannon Hampton,  
20 Lieutenant Charles Gregory, he's in charge of my  
21 detective unit, Sergeant Lee Brown, my NPO Sergeant, and  
22 my staff Sergeant Brandon Pierce.

23 Just to give you a little background of the service  
24 area that we're responsible for in the Sixth Precinct.  
25 Currently, we cover 16 schools in the precinct. One high



1 school, Cody High School. And we cover approximately 14.2  
2 square miles, which encompasses 12 Scout car areas and  
3 approximately 80,000 residents and citizens. We are very  
4 aggressive in our commitment to the community. And we  
5 have a strategy and a plan in place that we believe will  
6 provide resources and also exchange in the community. And  
7 as I break the numbers down and talk about that, we will  
8 cover that as well. First off, just to give you a report  
9 card for the biannual numbers here, but the Sixth  
10 Precinct year to date, that will cover the homicides.  
11 We've had 4 homicides this year. Last year we had 16,  
12 which represents a 75% decrease.

13 In sex crimes, there were 19 sex crimes this year,  
14 41 last year, representing 53.7%. We're down in robberies  
15 this year as well, with 58, last year at 70, which is a  
16 17.4% decrease; aggravated assaults, we are down and  
17 we're currently at 561, I'm sorry. Last year there were  
18 682 representing 17.7%. The total reduction in part one  
19 violent crimes for year to date is 21.8%. We are  
20 currently at 648 part one, violent crimes. Moving on to  
21 property, some of our pain in the back, if you will.  
22 Burglaries, larcenies, both are down 17% and 18%.  
23 Burglaries are at 195, year to date. Last year there were  
24 235. Larcenies, which included a lot of our porch  
25 pirates, if you will, at 430. Last year was 527, a

1 reduction of 18.4%. Motor vehicle theft. I worked  
2 commercial auto theft for 18 years, and I'm going to tell  
3 you, I've never seen numbers like these. Currently for  
4 motor vehicle theft, the Sixth Precinct is down 21.8%,  
5 representing 340 thefts this year compared to last year  
6 at 435. I was during a time when auto theft was 31,000  
7 thefts in the City of Detroit. That is definitely an  
8 accomplishment for us. And overall, for part one property  
9 crimes, we have a reduction of 20.5%. In non-fatal  
10 shootings, we're looking pretty good there as well, with  
11 a 48% reduction for the year at 26 versus 50 last year.  
12 And we have a 35% closure rate with arrests this year. So  
13 we're looking very well there. Our carjackings are at 50%  
14 reduction compared to last year where this year we're at  
15 six, last year, we're at 12. Currently, there are no  
16 trends to report. However, we are taking measures to  
17 combat the block parties and drag racing as the deputy  
18 chief indicated. And the Sixth Precinct also has a  
19 contingency in the park areas. Knowing that River Rouge  
20 is one of the largest parks in the City of Detroit, we  
21 are staffing that and doing a great job at it. I can say,  
22 thank you.

23 At the beginning of the year there were two cameras,  
24 portable cameras that were deployed in River Rouge. It's  
25 kind of helping us, and supporting us in what we're

1 calling virtual patrol. So there have been no incidents  
2 in River Rouge to date. That's the beginning of the  
3 summer. Moving right along; going right into the strategy  
4 for the Sixth Precinct, we have a 5-point strategy.  
5 First, it involves community engagement, that's at all  
6 levels. We engage the community at each level so that we  
7 can get the bang for our buck, and give that bang right  
8 back. That includes our community groups, our block  
9 clubs, our CB Patrol; way to go Warrendale. We also have  
10 commitment from our stakeholders and just a number of  
11 collaborations in the community, helping us to reach the  
12 areas where we just haven't made contact yet.

13         And some of those entities would include our CVI  
14 groups, Detroit 300, Force Detroit, also the Chaplain  
15 Corps. And I must say that Chaplain Mobley, he left, but  
16 Chaplain Mobley and his team are instrumental in helping  
17 us when we respond to scenes that are critical scenes.  
18 And people need just more than the police assistance.  
19 They come out and they help with prayer and counseling.  
20 Second piece for our strategy is going to be target  
21 enforcement. We do a great job with that. And just to  
22 give you some results from that, our strategy targeted  
23 enforcement and netted us this year 245 guns taken off  
24 the street this year at 245. The men and women in blue  
25 are busy in the Sixth Precinct. Another constant

1 complaint that I received as commander of the precinct,  
2 and actually being a commander at several different  
3 precincts on the Westside. One of the biggest complaints  
4 that I received is traffic. So far this year, we've  
5 written 10,694 tickets in the Sixth Precinct. So I'd like  
6 to give kudos to the men and women in blue there at the  
7 Sixth Precinct. We've made 1,110 arrests, felony arrests.  
8 So we are busy, we are engaged; also, I can't go without  
9 saying our community involvement. I'm proud to say that  
10 because of our community involvement, we just started  
11 yesterday, 3 new community groups, community block clubs,  
12 and two of them are here tonight.

13       Sergeant Brown can speak to that. But we have 2 that  
14 are in attendance tonight. Moving along, we have  
15 partnerships with the Michigan Department of Corrections,  
16 Wayne County Sheriff's Office, who assist us with park  
17 enforcement and with our prostitution stings. We also  
18 share and collaborate with the Michigan DNR, also to help  
19 us in the parks. And again, our CVI groups are constantly  
20 out there, they're constantly engaged. We had a barber  
21 shop meeting, if you will, where the community was  
22 invited and the CVI Force Detroit, they were there. They  
23 were instrumental in the communication. And it was a  
24 success for that. We also, at the Sixth Precinct, share a  
25 unique relationship with Westside command teams. A boss,

1 Deputy Chief Pritchett. We have a strong force on the  
2 Westside. So I can call any commander on the Westside if  
3 I'm having a problem. And I have a strike team there  
4 immediately. Tenth Precinct, Second Precinct, Fourth  
5 Precinct, Twelfth Precinct, and Eighth Precinct. We do it  
6 together. So if we have a problem, thank you. If we have  
7 a problem in the Sixth Precinct, we have a problem on the  
8 Westside, and vice versa.

9 Moving right along for the third and fourth part of  
10 our strategy, investigative. So we've seen where, oh,  
11 from the pandemic, there were a lot of aggravated  
12 assaults taking place, a lot of domestic violence, if you  
13 will. And so we developed a plan and it's a command  
14 accountability actually in-house where we actually have a  
15 meeting every Tuesday. And we talk about each and every  
16 aggravated assault that's taken place in the precinct.  
17 That's led up by my detective lieutenant, Lieutenant  
18 Gregory. And we ensure that we go through each case to  
19 ensure that we gave the appropriate response. And so we  
20 are doing that and we promise and commit to continue to  
21 do that.

22 And I spoke about our partners again, as strategies.  
23 We did a great job with that year to date and moved right  
24 into our programs, community programs. We have upcoming  
25 community events. We've started doing yoga in the park on

1 Sundays. So that's going to be every Sunday through  
2 September. Seniors and University Rouge Park bus tour,  
3 that's Thursday, July 18th. Detroit United Lacrosse,  
4 that's going to be offered for youth and individuals  
5 interested in the game of lacrosse at the Body of Christ  
6 international in the praise in the park. That's going to  
7 be July 20th. We also have continually senior bingo and  
8 we started our movie night with various community groups.  
9 So we'll take a turn and have a movie night. It kind of  
10 takes the place of the old drive-in environment, if you  
11 will.

12         And lastly, just our commitment is just outstanding  
13 from our stakeholders. I'd like to mention a few of them  
14 who contributed and assisted us. Detroit Manufacturing  
15 Company, who manufactures the chairs and wheels in our  
16 police cars. They've been very instrumental in the  
17 community, Sherwood food distribution. Another ally in  
18 our efforts to impact the quality of life in the Sixth  
19 Precinct. And lastly, I want to talk about some training  
20 that we... I thought this would be unique just because of  
21 where we are in the meeting tonight. We just concluded  
22 our first stage of diversity, equity, and inclusion  
23 training, including our second phase of emotional  
24 intelligence training for our officers. We're committed  
25 to reduce, to eliminate demeanor complaints, and

1 hopefully reduce the backlog. So we're putting forth our  
2 efforts, and are committed to the battle.

3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you, Commander. Come on.

4 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Great report.

5 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Commissioner Moore.

6 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I just  
7 want to say thank you for your leadership between you and  
8 Deputy Chief Pritchett, the citizens of the Sixth  
9 Precinct have very little to worry about because you have  
10 what I call battle experience. You've been through the  
11 fire. I've seen both of you when I was a police officer  
12 at number 11, I remember seeing Snap or the Deputy Chief  
13 over there working hard, extremely hard. So between the  
14 two of you, your leadership goes a long way. Thank you.

15 COMMANDER NEWSON: Thank you.

16 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Anyone else?

17 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: I have something. Thank you.  
18 Through the Chair. Commander Newson, you spoke about the  
19 training, particularly around emotional intelligence to  
20 drive down demeanor. I have a two-part question. One,  
21 what is the size of the precinct in comparison to other  
22 precincts?

23 COMMANDER NEWSON: Through the Chair, the manpower  
24 speaking or?

25 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Yeah, as usual.

1           COMMANDER NEWSON: Okay. So we are just under 150  
2 police officers, detectives, and civilians at the Sixth  
3 Precinct.

4           COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Yeah, I asked that question  
5 because I think we were at the Eighth. Our chief  
6 investigator provides us a monthly report of citizen  
7 complaints.

8           COMMANDER NEWSON: Yes, sir.

9           COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: And I believe the Eighth  
10 Precinct had the highest, and they still do. And the  
11 response I got back was that it's the largest precinct in  
12 the city. Well, right under that is the Sixth Precinct.  
13 So, I was trying to get a gauge on the size of the  
14 precinct and seeing whether or not that might have aided  
15 to the Sixth Precinct being the second number of CCR  
16 allegations that we've received in the month of June.

17          COMMANDER NEWSON: We constantly look at that. I know  
18 certainly that my team and I, we look at each complaint  
19 that comes through. As a matter of fact, I got a copy of  
20 it. So that's something that we saw beforehand that we  
21 needed to immediately get ahead of. And that too, we have  
22 one thing that we've seen is the disparity in  
23 communications because of the different areas that we  
24 service ethnicities, if you will. And a lot of the time  
25 we've seen that in demeanor, that is, the communication



1 isn't always clear, but to understand another  
2 individual's language, their religion and also certainly  
3 the point that we need to understand as police officers.  
4 We are citizens, just like everybody else. So, I'm  
5 holding them to a higher standard.

6 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: You know, I was just grateful  
7 that it was a part of your presentation, that it's  
8 something that you are focused on to try to mitigate, to  
9 help us with the backlog. But obviously to help the  
10 citizens have a quality police department that doesn't  
11 deal with any issues of misconduct. And you don't have  
12 this, and so I'm not doing this to like, I got you, but  
13 only to suggest that out of the numbers that we have for  
14 June there are 30 CCR allegations, and I want to be clear  
15 they're allegations so that just because they've been  
16 filed doesn't suggest that they've been sustained. But 30  
17 of them have come and only 5 of them were demeanor  
18 complaints. The majority of them were procedure  
19 complaints. And so I'm sure that we can make sure that  
20 you get that information so that as you all are preparing  
21 your strategy around how to assist us, you'll have these  
22 numbers in front of you.

23 COMMANDER NEWSON: Yes, sir. Through the Chair. My  
24 grandfather used to always tell me, always reach for the  
25 low hanging fruit. So I know that's something I can

1 control.

2 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Wise man. Thank you, Chair.

3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you. Anything further? Oral  
4 communications.

5 MS. UNDERWOOD: Mr. Chair, you have 11 speakers. I'll  
6 call those in the sanctuary first, and then go into Zoom.  
7 The first three speakers will be members of our Youth  
8 Advisory Panel, Amulen Rozmus.

9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Let's give him a hand.

10 MS. UNDERWOOD: And could Alexis Escoto, and Angelica  
11 Williams line up as well?

12 MR. ROZMUS: They might not be here. Oh, nope. Sorry.  
13 Oh, they're here. Okay. Sorry. Good evening everybody.  
14 Good evening commissioners, officials and community  
15 members. My name is Amulen Rozmus. I'm a co-lead of the  
16 Youth Advisory Panel which serves directly under this  
17 board. It's an immense privilege to join all of you this  
18 evening. I'm joined here by two of our panel members.  
19 I'll let them introduce themselves as well, please.

20 MS. WILLIAMS: Good evening, everyone. My name is  
21 Angelica Williams. I joined the Youth Advisory Panel in  
22 its inaugural cohort in 2022, and I've been here since.

23 MR. ESCOTO: Hello, my name is Alexis Escoto. I'm  
24 also one of the founding members of the inaugural group  
25 back in 2022.

1 MR. ROZMUS: It is an immense privilege to join you  
2 all tonight, but I do want to take a moment to recognize  
3 that we as a panel set our condolences. The community is  
4 impacted by this weekend's event. It's tragic to hear  
5 that particularly as we as a panel are focused on how to  
6 better engage youth and how to better advance public  
7 safety from a youth perspective. It's really tragic to  
8 hear this occurring, but I am hopeful that through  
9 collaboration and always working together, we can  
10 continue to advance it and to try to reduce incidents  
11 like this. I'll continue with my prepared remarks. The  
12 Youth Advisory Panel mounted a second year as tasked with  
13 assessing relevant public policy policies, providing  
14 recommendations to this board. The Youth advisor panel is  
15 an innovative example of the BOPC's commitment to  
16 advancing public safety and civilian oversight.

17 We are here this evening because we want to  
18 celebrate 50 years since the inaugural meeting in July,  
19 1974. During this year's term, the Youth Advisory Panel  
20 has reviewed numerous policies. We have engaged in wide  
21 ranging discussions as a panel, taking insight from all  
22 of our lived experiences and backgrounds, while also  
23 highlighting the experiences of youth with public safety.  
24 Last month, the Youth Advisory Panel facilitated a  
25 successful forum, particularly focused on summer safety.

1 And, you know, the timing was tragic to hear what  
2 occurred and, but however we received positive feedback  
3 from that event. And I think these weeks' incidents are  
4 just more of an incident, so we need to continue engaging  
5 youth and continue to drive the message that we are all  
6 part of the social, public safety. As we conclude our  
7 term this year, I want to thank you all commissioners for  
8 unwavering support of the Youth Advisory Panel and your  
9 dedication to multi-stakeholder engagement. Our work  
10 would also not be possible without the direction and  
11 leadership of Ms. Teresa Blossom. A round of applause for  
12 her please. She leads us tirelessly and is actively  
13 engaged with us. My personal service on the Youth  
14 Advisory Panel has been an immense privilege. It has  
15 enriched my understanding of public safety and bolstered  
16 my commitment to the city that we all call home. And as I  
17 said earlier, I think collaboration and proximity, I'm  
18 convinced that all of us can advance both the safety and  
19 prosperity of this great city we call home. And I thank  
20 you for your leadership in this critical role. Thank you.

21 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Wow! Yeah. If you want to run,  
22 man, I'll fund your campaign, and I have some friends in  
23 here who would put some money behind it as well. Give him  
24 another hand, that whole team. You guys are amazing.  
25 Next?

1 MS. UNDERWOOD: Next will be Robert Daniel, and  
2 former Commissioner Reginald Crawford. And Mr. Jahdante  
3 Smith.

4 MR. DANIEL: It is evening, afternoon. I've been here  
5 for a minute. Good evening, afternoon, and good night.  
6 How about that? I want to honor everybody that's here in  
7 public service, and also the clergy. Pastor Spencer, I  
8 haven't met you. I'm your brother. but God bless you. I  
9 want to acknowledge you. Darryl Woods Sr. This brother,  
10 I'm here. My name is Robert Daniel too. But I'm here  
11 because that's my brother, and I'm inspired by him. But I  
12 wanted to come and acknowledge you, man, because in spite  
13 of everything that's going on, I want to kind of like  
14 give you your flowers, if you will. I know you have  
15 plenty of work to do. But you come a long way. And for  
16 those who don't know his testimony, he's really the  
17 definition of with God, all things are possible. And if  
18 you know it, you know it. If you don't, you don't. But  
19 you need to know it.

20 And I just want to pray and impart God's wisdom and  
21 grace and wherewithal to do what you need to do. because  
22 I believe in you, man. You have people looking at you,  
23 you don't even know what they're looking at. And they  
24 look the least of these, right? They're looking at you,  
25 man. They can see what God brought you from, what he's

1 doing, and they trust you. And so, I just want to  
2 encourage you, man, to say, stay focused and be rooting  
3 for you going to be working with you hand to hand. I'm  
4 part of the public, you know what I'm saying? But I'm  
5 willing to get out in the dirt with you. So, you can call  
6 on me, bro. But you know what it is. God bless everybody.  
7 Thanks.

8 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you.

9 MR. CRAWFORD: Yeah. Good evening commissioners. Good  
10 evening, Chief.

11 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Good evening. My name's Reggie  
12 Crawford. I'm a resident of District 3. I live not far  
13 from the worst mass shooting in the history of Michigan.  
14 Let me say that again. 21 shot, 2 dead. 0 offer of my  
15 condolences to the family and everyone who was impacted  
16 by that.

17 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Microphone.

18 MR. CRAWFORD: But I'm here because what was  
19 pathetic, what I observed, and I call it pathetic  
20 leadership. When you all's mayor and you all stood at a  
21 press conference, all of you who stood at the press  
22 conference in police headquarters, a safe place didn't  
23 come to the scene. Virtually every mass shooting I've  
24 seen in America, the mayor, elected officials, police  
25 chief, they come to the scene. Those people were impacted

1 by that. I kind of suspect why you didn't come to the  
2 scene is because of the phone calls that were made two  
3 hours prior to the police calling for police.

4 Three questions here. How many phone calls were  
5 made? What time they were made? And how many police  
6 officers were available in that precinct, the Ninth  
7 Precinct, the dispatch. Pathetic leadership, black folk.  
8 I'm talking about black, pathetic leadership. The reason  
9 why, because Dr. King once said, he often talked about  
10 black excellence. You all aren't the black excellence  
11 he's talked about; you all aren't representing. Eight  
12 years ago, as the commissioner, I sat on the board, and  
13 asked Chief "Hollywood" Craig about the priority one  
14 calls. He stated, it's in the record. Priority one calls  
15 are the Green Light project, property over people. Black  
16 Lives Matter in the City of Detroit. Black Lives Matter  
17 in the City of Detroit. So now we come 8 years later, and  
18 in that scenario, I said, well, if there's a fight in  
19 front of my house and there's a fight in the Green Light,  
20 which one you all go to? And that's what he said. Thank  
21 you.

22 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah, hold on a minute. Go ahead,  
23 Madam Vice Chair

24 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Through the Chair. Mr.  
25 Crawford, previous commissioner, wherever you are, I'm

1 not sure where you are. Okay. I'm sorry, sir. I don't  
2 know about anyone else, but I myself, along with my team,  
3 knocked doors in 95 degrees the day of the shooting and  
4 talked to every single resident within a three block  
5 radius to offer any type of resources, services, and just  
6 to get any type of information and basically to console  
7 them. That's what I do outside of this board. I knocked  
8 on doors and spoke with the residents. because I'm  
9 extremely concerned about what happened that day. My  
10 concern is that this is a massacre that is underrated.  
11 This should be on national news. The children of Oxford  
12 receive attention for over two years. We heard about  
13 Ethan Crumbly, and I'm not trying to diminish any other  
14 community, but I represent the community that I serve and  
15 live in. And I represent the people that look like me.  
16 And I think that this should have been talked about more,  
17 should be talked about as what happened. And it should be  
18 in the national news. So I'm in total agreement with you,  
19 sir.

20 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. All right. Thank you. Yes,  
21 sir.

22 MR. SMITH: My name is Jahdante Smith. I would like  
23 to say that, you know, because you all are going to hate  
24 me. I'm going to come here every time I have something to  
25 say. So, there's Sergeant Dowdy on homicide. I'm very,



1 very disappointed in Sergeant Dowdy. I have three mothers  
2 that represent other mothers called, "Mothers, keeping  
3 boots on the ground." They're complaining about him. So  
4 these two victims of this homicide that just happened,  
5 they're going to be dealing with homicide detectives. And  
6 if Sergeant Dowdy is racist and disrespectful to the  
7 victims of homicide, we need to do something about that.  
8 I also want to say Coleman Young will be rolling over his  
9 grave, the way this board acts, you guys arguing green  
10 stamping things. I want to speak to that specifically.  
11 There's only a few members on his board who actually  
12 fight.

13 So Willie Burton, I want to give him a major shout  
14 out for what he said in the interview. This board  
15 definitely green stamps so much stuff. I'm so surprised  
16 that Lieutenant Cole got suspended without pay. And I  
17 feel like if we didn't have a major video, it would never  
18 have come to day. That man told me. I was told, "I was  
19 protesting in NAACP." He told me, "Out of all the battles  
20 I picked, this is the one I picked." He told me I was a  
21 fan of suburbanites. That man, I've been organizing the  
22 city for 10 years at Church of the Messiah, where Force  
23 Detroit came out of, where missing liberation came out  
24 of. Pastor Barry Randolph, who taught me how to do this  
25 work 10 years ago. I've been doing it for 10 years. I've

1 been doing this longer than some of you on this board  
2 have been doing this work, maybe, and I'm young, but at  
3 the same time, for a white officer to tell me something  
4 like that and say, like Detroit, is ridiculous.

5 Also, I want to say the pastors in this room, in  
6 this entire city should be ashamed of themselves. The  
7 violence in the city is due to the community not stepping  
8 up and raising the kids. It takes a village to raise a  
9 child, but if the village is retarded, maybe the kid's  
10 going to be retarded, because nobody is stepping up. It's  
11 not about a block party. I don't give a fuck where you  
12 at. Excuse my French.

13 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Excuse me, excuse me.

14 MR. SMITH: I know; I understand it's the church.  
15 This is a mega church. I hate to say it. This church  
16 isn't in the community. Long story short, if the churches  
17 were doing their job, we would have less violence.

18 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: All right, that's your time.

19 MS. UNDERWOOD: Next will be Minister Eric Blount.

20 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Mr. Secretary, would you please  
21 take time? Let me know when the two minutes are up.

22 MS. UNDERWOOD: Next will be Minister Eric Blount,  
23 Mr. James Ford, and former Commissioner William Davis.

24 MINISTER BLOUNT: Good afternoon board. I'm Minister  
25 Eric Blount from Sacred Heart Catholic Church. And I have

1 to agree with the previous commenter. Religious leaders  
2 of this community have let us down. And so somebody's  
3 have to stand in the gap and say, not on my watch. But  
4 one of the things I want to make very clear is that  
5 poverty generates crime. It is not the other way around.  
6 You show me poverty and I'll show you crime. So don't you  
7 dare sit there and say that black men are the problem, or  
8 black women are the problem. No, poverty is the problem.  
9 And until it goes away, you will have these problems  
10 persisting. One of the other things I want to say is that  
11 I am glad to know that at least one area of DPD is under  
12 federal court ordered supervision. And that is facial  
13 recognition technology. Robert Williams, \$300,000. Court  
14 ordered judgment against the Detroit Police Department  
15 included this court ordered supervision. You want to know  
16 where the police officers are. All you have to look at is  
17 facial recognition and technology. There are over 100  
18 police officers and officers of the police department  
19 sitting there looking at cameras and video screens of  
20 what you're doing. And when you're doing it, surveillance  
21 is not safety.

22 Thirdly OCI, Chief Warfield sounded the alarm two  
23 months ago about a growing trend of citizens being  
24 handcuffed without being arrested. I think each and every  
25 one of you commissioners should be alarmed as well. But

1 we still haven't heard anything. As far as these  
2 resolutions go.

3 MR. BROWN: Time, sir.

4 MINISTER BLOUNT: Everybody deserves one, but not  
5 here as we address police officer misconduct.

6 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you. Next one,

7 MS. UNDERWOOD: Former Commissioner William Davis,  
8 Marvin Cotton, Victoria Camille. Oh, Mr. Ford is coming  
9 now. I see him now. Mr. Ford, please.

10 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Next. Oh, who did you say, next?

11 MS. UNDERWOOD: Mr. Ford.

12 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Mr. Ford, thank you.

13 MR. FORD: Peace. I just want to say this, we need a  
14 thousand people in Lansing, September 18th, to talk about  
15 red light running and drag racing. It is terrible in this  
16 city. It is hard to go tell a child that his brother's  
17 not coming home. It's hard to tell a mother that her son  
18 is not coming home. It's hard to tell a wife that her  
19 husband is not coming home. Either you're going to stand  
20 up, September 18<sup>t</sup> h, in Lansing, or you're going to live  
21 in agony forever. You have to make decisions all your  
22 life. You make a decision about what school you are going  
23 to go to. You make a decision about what neighborhood you  
24 are going to live in. You make a decision who you're  
25 going to marry, and you make a decision if you're going

1 to give them a good night kiss. But September 18th, we  
2 are going to Lansing. We need a thousand people to have  
3 the legislators try to enact new laws and enforce the  
4 ones that we have on the book.

5 We are sick and tired of this ignorance. There was a  
6 cartoon character named Popeye that said, I can't stand  
7 it, and I can't stand no more. But we are just going to  
8 say we can't stand it and we are not going to stand no  
9 more. So your people cannot go to Lansing because of your  
10 jobs, but those that can, go. If you can't stand up for  
11 your babies, who can you stand up for? God bless  
12 everybody here. I hope to see you in Lansing, September  
13 18th. I love everybody here, and we are going to try to  
14 get something done. We are going to make national  
15 attention and let them know we can't take it and we are  
16 not going to have it anymore. God bless everybody.

17 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you. Mr. Cotton

18 MR. COTTON: My wife told me, don't talk slowly. So,  
19 dear community members, in light of recent slanderous  
20 remarks concerning Darryl Woods Sr. appointment to the  
21 Detroit Police Board of Commissioners and his new role as  
22 Chairman, it is imperative that we address these  
23 unfounded criticisms with a collective voice of support.  
24 We often proclaim that we live in a society of  
25 redemption, yet when the moment arises to truly prove it,

1 many fall silent. This is not one of those times. Darryl  
2 Woods Sr. is a man whose life work speaks volumes  
3 tirelessly, helping others to get back on their feet,  
4 literally saving lives, mentoring and building better  
5 human beings. And advocating for those who haven't found  
6 their own voice yet are just a few of the many  
7 contributions. His work ethics and ethical values have  
8 permitted his rise in our society. And the beauty of his  
9 heart is undeniable. Who has the audacity to put a  
10 ceiling on one of God's creatures, if God himself  
11 forgives and redeems? Who are we to place limits on  
12 others that we don't measure ourselves with. After being  
13 directly impacted by poverty, broken homes, surviving  
14 disenfranchised communities, and prison Darryl Woods Sr.  
15 has emerged as a beacon of hope and change. Now there are  
16 those who wish him to survive the stigma and low  
17 expectations imposed by a society that often fails to  
18 practice what he preaches. Consider this, if we have  
19 placed limits on Nelson Mandela, the world will be void  
20 of one of the greatest rises from prison to presidency.  
21 Doesn't Darrel Woods' life have value too? What if Martin  
22 Luther King's life works stopped after his mugshot was  
23 snapped? This country would never have seen a righteous  
24 revolution. Doesn't Darryl Woods' life have value too. If  
25 Martin Luther King was caged to the idea that teaching

1 morals and values was not possible at a prison bid, what  
2 would the second chances actually look like?

3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Excuse me.

4 MR. COTTON: Does not Darryl Woods...

5 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Excuse me.

6 MR. COTTON: Life has value too.

7 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Excuse me.

8 MR. COTTON: I have more, and I'll print it and pass  
9 it out to everybody in here.

10 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Next.

11 MS. VICTORIA CAMILLE: Good evening board. For the  
12 record, Victoria Camille, District 7. Several community  
13 members are trying to locate meeting recordings, and  
14 they're not published on the website; you want to look  
15 into. Also, at the June 27th meeting, Chief White in  
16 indicated that he has a strong policy in place regarding  
17 legal observers. During public comments, I kindly asked  
18 the board to provide the public with the directive number  
19 of that policy. Commissioner Pressley, who was Chair at  
20 the time, attempted to obtain that information by the end  
21 of the meeting, but it has not been received. Can the  
22 board kindly provide the direct number for the policy  
23 that Chief White indicated is currently in place? Also,  
24 during the June 20th public comments, I asked the board  
25 about four outstanding issues. The first one on December

1 21st, the board voted to reiterate to the Chief that the  
2 board wanted the 33 outstanding data and information  
3 requests fulfilled.

4 Has the information been received, analyzed by the  
5 board staff and presented to the board and the public?

6 The second one, on March 7th, the board voted to write a  
7 letter to the DOJ demanding an investigation into the  
8 police killing of 70-year-old Darryl Vance. Has that  
9 letter been written, sent to the DOJ and made public?

10 Number three, on May 23rd, the board voted to waive the  
11 FOIA fees for request number A 24-02888, submitted by the  
12 CPTA. Please provide a public status on the CPTA  
13 receiving those records. And number four, this last one I  
14 asked about is making progress. So I would like to thank  
15 policy committee chair Linda Bernard and the policy  
16 committee for taking a strong stance on the charges  
17 against legal observers by writing a letter to Chief  
18 White and Corporation Counsel. We look forward to that  
19 letter being sent. Thank you.

20 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Next.

21 MS. UNDERWOOD: Former Commissioner William Davis,  
22 Deborah Price, Jackie Hunt, and Ms. Bernice Smith. Then  
23 we'll go into Zoom.

24 MR. DAVIS: Hello everyone.

25 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Hello.



1 MR. DAVIS: Now, I have a famous quote too by Fannie  
2 Lou Hamer, "I'm sick and tired of being sick and tired."  
3 We need to make some more improvements in our city. We  
4 need to make some more improvements on this board. We  
5 need to do some more improvement on the members of this  
6 board. As you know, I was a former commissioner during  
7 the four years I was on the board. I never missed a  
8 meeting. I was never late. I always stayed for the whole  
9 meeting. That doesn't happen nowadays. In fact, nobody  
10 since I've been on the board has attended as well as mine  
11 was. I think we need to make sure this board does a  
12 better job. I think we need to also make sure of the fact  
13 that that incident last weekend, 4th of July weekend,  
14 made international news. I had people from Europe call  
15 and ask me about it.

16 I am actively involved in a number of groups. And  
17 you know, you say you're going to have, you know, you're  
18 going to divide up between the Eastside and Westside.  
19 There are thousands more people that live on the  
20 Westside. You know, we need to make sure that it is fair  
21 and equitable. A lot of this stuff doesn't, and I'm still  
22 concerned as president of Detroit Chapter, Natural Action  
23 Network about the way you all treat legal observers.  
24 That's a problem. I think this board also is being the  
25 president of the City of Detroit retiree group called

1 Detroit Action Retired Employees Association. I'm  
2 concerned that if there's not more improvements, there's  
3 going to be more lawsuits. You know, so you all need to  
4 have firmware policies. You all need to be doing more  
5 public service announcements, as I've been saying for  
6 years. You all need to be more proactive. I know a couple  
7 people say they are in the community. I'm in the  
8 community every day. And more people need to be in the  
9 community. More people need to know what's going on. When  
10 I was on the board, I used to tell people all the time, I  
11 go to community meetings. If you see something, say  
12 something. And if you are afraid to say something...

13 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: That's your time.

14 MR. DAVIS: And if you are afraid to say something,  
15 tell me. I'll say something. And more of us out here need  
16 to be saying stuff. We need to know who our neighbors  
17 are. That's time. Next?

18 MS. UNDERWOOD: She's walking. She's walking now.

19 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Can we have your attention?  
20 The mic is yours.

21 MS. PRICE: My name is Mrs. Deborah Price. I was shot  
22 in my driveway August 31st, 2022, 9 millimeters, close  
23 range. Couldn't find out anything until I kept calling  
24 the Twelfth Precinct. Lieutenant Moore, they will not  
25 remove her from my case. My doctor made them sign for the

1 bullet that was giving me seizures and blackout. Now they  
2 tell me at the Twelfth Precinct, what bullet? So I have  
3 to call my doctor and ask him tomorrow, who signed for  
4 the bullet? It's a joke at the Twelfth Precinct. You  
5 cannot get a face-to-face meeting with Captain Rodriguez  
6 either. I'm also a community activist. Even though I  
7 couldn't walk, I had to wheel myself to meetings. I'm an  
8 outreach person for Healing Springs for people on drugs.  
9 I went to school for drug and alcohol counseling. I was  
10 born on 12<sup>th</sup> and Blain. So I know what it does to the  
11 community.

12 I'm an activist also with the parents standing up  
13 about the son shooting people. And in that neighborhood  
14 on Grace, Puritan, PA and Vice Lords, talked with the  
15 young man, you got the wrong house, I said, you know,  
16 they are killing people. I said, you know, it's a  
17 blackout house. I said, if you are drunk or high, go get  
18 something to eat from the Coney Island across from  
19 Marygrove College. Nothing. I've been shot twice in my  
20 knee, twice in my thigh, twice in my back on the right,  
21 one on the left that was making me have seizures. That's  
22 the bullet they have. And nobody can tell me anything.  
23 Police White, they say you can't see him unless you are  
24 doing a news interview or a press conference. The mayor,  
25 same thing. But then so many months ago, what I told the

1 lieutenant to tell Police White, he gets on TV, word for  
2 word, saying what? I said.

3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Ms. Price.

4 MS. PRICE: I'm really livid right now. I can't get  
5 any help.

6 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yep. Would you respond to that...?

7 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Deputy Chief.

8 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Deputy Chief.

9 DC PRITCHETT: Through the Chair, Lieutenant Gregory,  
10 can you give with Ms. Price and take down her  
11 information, give it all to me, so I can make sure that  
12 she gets what she's entitled to.

13 MS. PRICE: And also, I want to let you know when  
14 Detective Moore came to the hospital with blood all over  
15 me, sniggling, giggling.

16 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Okay.

17 MS. PRICE: The police officers young...

18 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Lieutenant...

19 MS. PRICE: What did she teach you?

20 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you, Ms. Price. Yep. Go  
21 ahead. Next?

22 MS. UNDERWOOD: Mr. Hunt, Mr. Jackie Hunt.

23 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Hello.

24 MR. HUNT: And thank you for having this community  
25 meeting. We need them and don't stop. And I'm thankful

1 for Coleman Young and those that started in the  
2 seventies. I'm here because of a complaint, an abandoned  
3 vehicle complaint. And it's my vehicle. And it was in  
4 front of my house. And I went to the Second Precinct the  
5 same day that I got it. And they kind of assured me, or  
6 tried to assure me that you put the sticker visible so  
7 they can see it's a temporary sticker, and you won't, or  
8 you shouldn't have any problems. This is the first one.  
9 Here's the second one that came on a Monday. This one  
10 came on a Friday. This one came on Monday for some  
11 reason, different people. And so I went downtown. They  
12 told me it's the wrong place, and they sent me to Palmer  
13 Park. So I went out there and I spoke with OCI, Chief  
14 Investigator, Office of the Chief Investigator. I spoke  
15 with an investigator; her name is Hiller. And it seemed  
16 like she wasn't going to write a complaint. She seemed to  
17 judge it. She says that's not officer misconduct.

18 I said, what do I have to do? Tow my vehicle at \$125  
19 and then what, \$15 a day? And I get maybe 500, a \$1,000  
20 bill. Then it might be misconduct when I tried to stop it  
21 at the beginning. So it seems like they just made excuses  
22 for how it happened, and why are you parked near a fire  
23 hydrant? Are you parked on the grass? Where are you  
24 parked? Is there anything in front? No. No, no. And then  
25 the officer brought up a Google satellite picture from

1 maybe 14 years ago. Thank you very much. But said, I  
2 parked in front of the house at the curb. So I guess I'm  
3 waiting for my 90 days for it to be reviewed and assigned  
4 to an investigator. And I'm looking out my window night  
5 and day and mornings too.

6 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you, sir.

7 MR. HUNT: If my car is still there.

8 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: That's your time. Thank you.

9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yep. Chief Investigator, would  
10 you respond to that?

11 CI WARFIELD: We will. Thank you. Through the Chair.  
12 We'll certainly follow up with Investigator Hiller to get  
13 the details. And we'll give you an update to the case.

14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Thank you.

15 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Through the Chair. DC  
16 Pritchett, is there anyone that he can talk to about the  
17 stickers being put on his vehicle?

18 DC PRITCHETT: Through the Chair. I'll have a... he's  
19 going to get them, talk to him right now. Officer from  
20 number 6.

21 MS. UNDERWOOD: Ms. Smith, and then we'll go into  
22 Zoom.

23 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Thank you.

24 MS. SMITH: Good evening everyone.

25 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Good evening.

1 MS. SMITH: I am proud to be in Spencer Ellis'  
2 Church. I'm from Chicago originally. Born and raised and  
3 knew your daddy, how about that? I can tell you about  
4 your daddy and when I got out of high school and  
5 everything. So we'll talk. I'm going to tell you, I told  
6 your brother already, years ago. But anyway, seriously  
7 speaking, you guys, I'm glad to be here because this  
8 event is so outrageous. It's a shame with the people that  
9 come and appear here. If you have a problem with the  
10 police, I know most of you go to the police and take care  
11 of it. This young man here and all, hundreds of them put  
12 that uniform on. And I say it all the time, every day to  
13 protect us, us not somebody outside of Detroit, us.  
14 They're lifting their... My teeth are bad. They're risking  
15 their lives, and don't worry about it.

16 But the fact is, these two agitators and the other  
17 one over there every week...

18 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Speak through the Chair.

19 MS. SMITH: They come. I'm speaking to the Chair,  
20 dear.

21 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Speak through the Chair.

22 Ms. SMITH: That's my son's friend. So I have to be  
23 nice. He'll tell my son about me. But anyway, I just want  
24 to let you know, I've been in politics since '73. That  
25 man up there put me on the police commission board, and

1 I'm still working and talking about the board. The fact  
2 is, if they do wrong, I will tell them about it. I'm the  
3 first one to tell them about it. They're not perfect. We  
4 have people that come every week and just agitate,  
5 agitate and talk. Why don't you have a solution? That's  
6 what I say, a solution. Let the board know what they're  
7 doing and have a solution for, instead of complaining all  
8 the doggone time. But I just want to let you know, I want  
9 the public to know we got a hell of a good police  
10 department. I'm going to the convention next month in  
11 Chicago, and I'm going to...

12 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: That's your time.

13 MR. BROWN: That's your time.

14 MS. SMITH: Already.

15 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah.

16 MS. SMITH: Anyway, I love my police department.

17 Thank you.

18 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Next we on Zoom?

19 MS. UNDERWOOD: Our last speaker is Election

20 Integrity Roo.

21 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay? Alright. Go ahead

22 ELECTION, INTEGRITY RUE: To the members in  
23 attendance. Commander Pritchett, if you're still there.  
24 Congratulations, Mr. Woods on your swearing in and  
25 appointment as the Chairman of the Detroit Board of



1 Police Commissioners. I want to tell everybody within the  
2 sound of my voice, as a little lady, she was 5 years old  
3 at the time that she asked me for help with her mother,  
4 Kaniesha Coleman, DPD case number 20-11112. Right now,  
5 there's a Michigan State Police Report that should say  
6 there's not enough evidence to determine that Kaniesha  
7 was a suicide. If there's physical evidence, it doesn't  
8 exist, and there's not enough evidence to deem it a  
9 homicide either. So technically it should be labeled  
10 correctly. Now, I want to switch elections. Elections,  
11 here in the United States of America, state of Michigan,  
12 especially Detroit. We have absentee ballot voter fraud,  
13 election fraud occurring at the Detroit Department of  
14 Elections. Case...federal case, 2: 24-CB-11072 outlines  
15 that absentee ballot voter fraud. There were numerous  
16 cases. Now, I'm going to tell everybody that all your  
17 votes don't mean anything. All votes lead directly to the  
18 Department of Elections in the State of Michigan's  
19 Secretary of State's Office for registering voters and  
20 the City of Detroit for casting ballots. They use Eric,  
21 which I now call the cheat code. Every elected position  
22 in the City of Detroit is now highly in question, every  
23 elected position.

24 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay? All right. Thank you. For  
25 those who gave public comments and everything we, we

1 would take it in and move as we can according to the  
2 Charter. So let's go to the presentation of the board.  
3 Who has the Sixth Precinct Police Community Relations  
4 Council, Ms. Mary McGee. You have 10 minutes. 10 minutes.  
5 If you could do it in two, that's good.

6 MS. MCGEE: Good afternoon. Welcome all. My name is  
7 Mary McGee. I am the proud president of the Sixth  
8 Precinct Community Relation. I'm going to make this real  
9 brief. Sixth Precinct Community Relations Council meeting  
10 will be held the last Wednesday of every month. This will  
11 be our first meeting since the pandemic. It will be July  
12 the 31st at 7:00 PM at 11450 Warwick. If you have any  
13 questions or concerns, you can call area code (313) 593-  
14 5663. And again, welcome all.

15 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you so much. I'm buying you  
16 a steak dinner. Absolutely. Yes. So let's go to, I  
17 believe the Secretary's Report.

18 MR. BROWN: Yeah, Mr. Chair. Currently, there are 4  
19 incoming correspondences, and I won't go through them  
20 because they're in your book as they're listed on the  
21 agenda. And Mr. Chair, with your permission, I go  
22 straight to the announcement.

23 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes.

24 MR. BROWN: The next BOPC meeting is July 18th, 2024,  
25 at 3:00 PM. It'll take place at Detroit Public Sector

1 headquarters. The address is 1301 Third Street. The next  
2 community meeting would be Thursday, August 8th, 2024 at  
3 6:30 PM, with the Fifth Precinct hosting it at WC3, the  
4 Eastern campus. That address will be 5901 Conner Street.  
5 And Mr. Chair, the monthly committee meetings scheduled  
6 for July, 2024. The policy committee meeting will be  
7 meeting, Tuesday, July 23rd, 2024 at 5:00 PM. All the  
8 meetings are taking place at the Detroit Public Safety  
9 Headquarters, and can also be viewed on Zoom. And Mr.  
10 Chair, those are the announcements.

11 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you very much. And I want  
12 to just, you know, thank Pastor Ellis, again. You know,  
13 it's good to be here with him. And thank you for this  
14 Community Sixth Precinct. And thank you to Commissioner  
15 Moore, for his leadership in this Precinct. Pastor Ellis  
16 is a stellar guy. We have passed out. I've helped raise  
17 probably over 3000 book bags and supplies for the  
18 students over here. He has given over \$100,000 worth of  
19 gas to the citizens here and has fed them with thousands  
20 and thousands of pounds of food. And has been a stellar  
21 member of this community. This church is bought and paid  
22 for and he's there to sacrifice his time and his life.  
23 And so I want to thank him for his leadership, and I  
24 think we should give him a round of applause even in the  
25 spirit of his father. Yep. Any new business? Policy

1 report?

2 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Quickly, I'm going to take a  
3 page from the book of our previous speaker. That's Ms.  
4 McGuire.

5 COMMISSIONER SMITH: McGee.

6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: McGee. I apologize. Ms. McGee.  
7 One-minute report. The Policy Committee met, a very  
8 distinguished committee, professors of law. Everyone was  
9 involved. And we met about a letter that we received from  
10 Congresswoman Rashida Talib about the mistreatment of  
11 legal observers by the Detroit Police Department, or what  
12 they stated was the mistreatment of legal observers.  
13 Myself and board President Woods reviewed the video  
14 regarding what happened to the legal observers. And we  
15 concurred with Congresswoman Rashida's statements in her  
16 letter. Pursuant to that, you'll be able to see it. I'm  
17 not reading it. We don't have that kind of time. We sent  
18 a letter to the Chief of Police and to Conrad Mallet,  
19 Corporation Counsel, asking that those legal observers  
20 that received tickets for exercising their First  
21 Amendment Rights as observers be dismissed. So we'll  
22 report back to you when we get a response from the Chief  
23 and from Conrad Mallet. End of the report.

24 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you. Any questions? There  
25 have been any questions. Commissioner Hernandez.

1 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Thank you. Through the  
2 Chair, we just wanted an update on the case.

3 DC PRITCHETT: Through the Chair, in regards to you,  
4 and the other Commissioner, Liberty Smith. Question  
5 regarding how many calls of 911? There were a total of 47  
6 calls. 3 calls were made prior to the shooting, and 44  
7 calls were made during and after the shooting.

8 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you. That's it. Alright.  
9 What's your pleasure?

10 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: I move that we adjourn.

11 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Second.

12 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Support.

13 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Yes.

14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Motion made by Commissioner  
15 Pressley, seconded by Commissioner Bernard. All in favor,  
16 show by raising your hand. Anyone opposed? The motion  
17 carries. Meeting adjourned.

18 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Yes.
