CITY OF DETROIT  
BOARD OF POLICE COMMISSIONERS MEETING  
July 25, 2024 at 3:00 P.M.

1 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: And so, being that we don't have  
2 a quorum right now, we want to open it up to public  
3 comment.

4 MS. UNDERWOOD: Mr. Chair, we have four speakers. Our  
5 first speaker will be Ms. Charnita Williams, then Ms.  
6 Hitchcock Minister Eric Blount, and Ms. Bernice Smith.

7 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay.

8 MS. UNDERWOOD: Please state your name and speak in  
9 the mic.

10 MS. WILLIAMS: I'm not going to waste my two minutes  
11 on this. Hello everyone, my name is Charnita Williams. Is  
12 that clear enough?

13 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes. Speak to the Chair.

14 MS. WILLIAMS: Okay. Was that clear enough, Chair?

15 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes.

16 MS. WILLIAMS: Okay. I'd like to discuss what's going  
17 on concerning undercover officers at 12900 West Chicago.  
18 Two male officers. One name is Frank, and one name is Mr.  
19 Bowman. And like I stated before, they are preying on  
20 women sleeping with them, and they continue to violate my  
21 civil rights every day. It's like four other undercover  
22 police women in that facility also. And like the deputy  
23 chief said, it is not on books, but somebody gave them  
24 the authority to be at that facility. And like I said  
25 before, they endanger my life. Every time I go out of

1 that facility, my constitutional rights are being  
2 violated. Illegal cameras, listening devices in my room  
3 when I get undressed. The garbage truck comes every week  
4 to disclose, I mean, every day to get rid of the evidence  
5 that police officers are sponsoring people at that  
6 facility to spy and watch over me; and my devices are  
7 being hacked into constantly and rerouted. I can't even  
8 make any doctor's appointments because they continue to  
9 reroute my calls and hack into my devices. And I have an  
10 issue with this. This has been going on for three and a  
11 half years, but since I've been in this facility, it's  
12 been going on for seven months. So somebody needs to find  
13 out what's going on because everybody said, oh, there's  
14 no officers in there. Here's a hospital band from an  
15 officer who is in that shelter. So I want to know who  
16 gave them permission, and then especially in there  
17 watching over Nikita Wilson after all this illegal stuff  
18 she had done to me.

19 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Alright. Thank you

20 MS. UNDERWOOD: Ms. Hitchcock. Again, everyone,  
21 please state your name for the record

22 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: And can we get the time placed  
23 on. Good afternoon. You could go ahead and speak.

24 MS. HITCHCOCK: Good afternoon. My name is Agnes  
25 Hitchcock. I've been down here before because a Detroit

1 police officer decided not to do her job. I have a  
2 letter. I put a package on your desk. In that package is  
3 a letter from the state of Michigan to me. And in that  
4 package is also a letter from Justin St. Clair, who works  
5 as an investigator in the Office of the Chief  
6 Investigator. And also there's a letter in that package  
7 from the Detroit Water and Sewage Department. Now, what  
8 happened was a rogue plumbing company, by the name of Any  
9 Moment Plumbing Company came into the alley where I live  
10 and dug 15 feet down into the infrastructure. They had  
11 been in that alley for more than a week. I'm retired. I  
12 don't have a life, and I very seldom take my car out of  
13 the garage. One day I decided to leave my garage while  
14 this plumbing company was working three lots for me. As  
15 soon as I took my dog...I had a doctor's appointment, and I  
16 was late for it. I took my dog out to the back fence and  
17 strapped him to the back fence. I got in my car and  
18 pulled into the alley to save time. As soon as I parked  
19 my car, one of those plumbers ran up to my car and said,  
20 you can't park there.

21 I did a head snap because I knew he wasn't talking  
22 to me. So I went on about my business. Next thing I know,  
23 another plumber from Any Moment Plumbing Company, a rogue  
24 plumbing company, walks up to me and says, you can't park  
25 your car there. I have a cement truck coming. He didn't

1 know how to talk to me. He could have told me kindly  
2 that, Miss, I'm working in the alley down the street and  
3 I have a cement truck coming. How long are you going to  
4 be?

5 MR. BROWN: Time, Mr. Chair.

6 MS. HITCHCOCK: Beg your pardon?

7 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Time.

8 MS. HITCHCOCK: Time?

9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes.

10 MS. HITCHCOCK: Okay. Beg your pardon. So, what he  
11 did...

12 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Excuse me, Ms. Hitchcock, that's  
13 the Chief.

14 MS. HITCHCOCK: This officer wrote to me that I am  
15 not going to pay. They had no right to barricade that  
16 alley. They had no right to barricade my garage. They had  
17 no right to do any of that.

18 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Thank you.

19 MS. HITCHCOCK: Now, I've been down here before, and  
20 it's your responsibility to do something about it. So  
21 here's what it's, I'm right...

22 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: You're out of time. They're there  
23 to work with you.

24 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: He's right behind you.

25 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: He's right behind you to work

1 with you.

2 MS. HITCHCOCK: I'm not going to pay additional  
3 insurance. I am not going to do it because an officer  
4 gave me a ticket. I'm not going to do it.

5 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you.

6 MS. HITCHCOCK: So what I want to do, you talked to  
7 me before...

8 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Miss Hitchcock.

9 MALE SPEAKER: Ma'am, can I speak to you in the hall,  
10 please?

11 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair.

12 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Excuse me, ma'am. Ms. Hitchcock.

13 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair.

14 MR. BROWN: Mr. Blount.

15 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair. I'd like to  
16 talk to Ms. Hitchcock. Ms. Hitchcock is definitely a  
17 District 5 resident.

18 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Excuse me. You're not recognized  
19 at this point.

20 COMMISSIONER BURTON: She's one of my constituents,  
21 I'm going to talk with her.

22 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Go ahead. You all be nice.  
23 Point order in here. Point of order. Point of order.  
24 Mother Smith. Mother Bernice. We're doing this in  
25 decency, and in order. Order, order, please. Minister

1 Blount.

2 MINISTER BLOUNT: Good afternoon, board. I'm Minister  
3 Eric Blount from Sacred Heart Catholic Church right here  
4 in Detroit. I'm calling for a moment of silence for Sonya  
5 Massey. If you don't know, she was murdered by police  
6 officers unjustly. But it just goes to show how quickly  
7 and easily things can get out of hand with law  
8 enforcement. And in fact, just here in Detroit, the  
9 innocent black man charged with murdering Samantha Wolfe  
10 is still in prison. The only charges that have really  
11 been approved are lying to police officers. Why do I  
12 bring that up? Because it is legal for a law enforcement  
13 person to lie to citizens. You see how sick this system  
14 is. So the lady before me has a right to be upset. It's  
15 crazy to deal with this system. And just this week, the  
16 Metro Times documented and detailed how law enforcement  
17 in this city has legally lied to residents, or should I  
18 just say, told less than the truth. So, we ought to be  
19 very compassionate with our citizens. The deck is stacked  
20 against us. Many systems and law enforcement are  
21 oppressive and downright wrong. Thank you.

22 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you Minister.

23 MR. BROWN: Ms. Bernie Smith, followed by Mr. Tyrone  
24 Allen, followed by Ms. Fredia Butler.

25 MS. SMITH: I'm Bernice Smith, former police

1 commissioner under Coleman Young in 1973. I have been  
2 dealing with the police department for years. I know  
3 their ins and outs, I just came back from Memphis,  
4 Tennessee. Compared to what the crime is down there it is  
5 outrageous. We're like in heaven. Whoever heard of a man  
6 raping a woman in a car, in a car right in front of her  
7 boyfriend? There are other crimes that I heard about when  
8 I was down there. I'm not going to take the time of my  
9 three minutes, but the fact is, we are doing a hell of a  
10 good job here in this city. I'm proud of my police  
11 department. They're doing the best that they can. They  
12 have problems, true enough, but give them a break and let  
13 them do their job. And stop coming here every week and  
14 complaining and complaining and complaining.

15       If you made a complaint, let it work out. Let them  
16 do what they have to do for it. I get distracted when  
17 people come here and talk about some BS all the time and  
18 the same thing. And then you've got a commissioner and  
19 he's no better off than they are because he doesn't help  
20 control the people that come here. Now, I am very much  
21 disgusted because of the fact that we do not have people  
22 that respect the police department. They're out there  
23 taking care of us. When they put that uniform on, they  
24 are risking their lives. We don't realize it. But I  
25 realize that I'm down there at Greektown every weekend. I



1 see what they do down there. I see the confusion that  
2 they have to endure down there. So I know what I'm  
3 talking about. I'm not just standing here for nothing. I  
4 don't come here every weekend, and tell you this and  
5 that. We have to do better. The citizens have to do  
6 better. You have to respect the police. They're doing  
7 their job and they're trying to do the best job that they  
8 can do. And I will not stand for these people to come  
9 down here, and complain about the police all the time.  
10 Let them do their job because I believe that they're  
11 trying the best they way that they can. And I want all of  
12 you to know, you better pray sometimes because God is  
13 watching all of us.

14 MR. BROWN: Time. Mr. Chair.

15 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you.

16 MR. BROWN: Mr. Allen.

17 MR. ALLEN: Good afternoon. For the record, my name  
18 is Tyrone Allen. I'm a precinct delegate in 208. Very  
19 briefly, this is my issue. Chief White made an  
20 announcement a couple of weeks ago, based on that popup  
21 party incident, that there would be new emphasis placed  
22 on, you know, the popup parties going on all over the  
23 city. I live in Palmer Park. I live directly behind Unity  
24 Temple. The officers at number 12, they do a great job of  
25 vacating the park at night. But what they're missing is

1 that those people leave the park and they park right on  
2 the corner of Second and Covington, which is my street.  
3 These people pull up and I have evidence to prove what  
4 I'm telling you right now, that you have one guy in  
5 particular. He'll pull up, he'll reach in his trunk and  
6 come up with a Bluetooth speaker and place it on the  
7 ground. And he's out there bumping music as loud as it  
8 will go, sometimes until daybreak. That's just totally  
9 unacceptable. And you know, in my situation, I'm a  
10 disabled veteran with a PTSD diagnosis. And nobody,  
11 nobody should have to be exposed to anything like that. I  
12 reached out to number 12 a number of times, and you know,  
13 they send out cars when I dial 911. But again, this  
14 happens every night. I've been there for 12 years. I  
15 didn't just move there. And this is as bad as I've seen  
16 it. Thank you.

17 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you. Deputy Chief, can you  
18 get someone to respond to that... Can you respond and have  
19 someone address that concern?

20 DC SLOAN: the Chair, sir. Yes, sir. I took some  
21 notes. Commander Chambers is right there. He'll get your  
22 information and we'll make sure that's taken care of for  
23 you, sir.

24 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you.

25 DC SLOAN: Yes, sir.

1 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yep. We would have a quorum but  
2 Commissioner Burton is outside and he has to be seated in  
3 order for us to have this meeting to have a quorum here.  
4 And it's very, very unfortunate to our candidates who had  
5 to be interviewed for secretary.

6 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Through the Chair. Can we go... I  
7 mean, let's get him. I mean, come on.

8 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah, we made that attempt.  
9 Commissioner Pressley is out there trying to get that  
10 addressed. So, the next public commenter.

11 MS. UNDERWOOD: Mr. Jackie Hunt.

12 MR. HUNT: Hi. How's everyone? So I'm here to again,  
13 bring up the point about the abandoned vehicles and the  
14 police towing it, towing them. I wanted to bring up some  
15 more points. I happened to just drive around the city and  
16 I saw one or two or a few of the orange stickers on cars.  
17 Mine happened to be legally parked, insured, et cetera,  
18 et cetera, but I still received three stickers. It seems  
19 that you're taking poor people's cars, especially at this  
20 time of election, and they surely may not be able to even  
21 drive to a precinct, August 1st. So I think that's  
22 inappropriate, but I wonder, is anybody speaking for  
23 those like me, who just happen to be poor and we  
24 certainly can barely afford the insurance. And maybe it's  
25 different... Maybe you can do nothing about it. I know the

1 legislature, maybe the mayor, but the last person who  
2 tried before the legislature did this new thing was  
3 Sharon McPhail.

4 And after she got, I suppose, what she needed  
5 elected or appointed somewhere, Detroiters heard nothing  
6 about trying to reduce insurance for the city. And I  
7 understand this new law from the state, people are  
8 disgusted with it because it's not doing what they  
9 thought it would do. So you're taking our cars, poor  
10 people's cars and nothing in return. The mayor, does  
11 anybody have his ear so that we can get underneath, get  
12 away from this just seemingly, picking on the poor in  
13 their cars or their homes or their property taxes so  
14 high, et cetera, et cetera. That's my point.

15 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you. Madam Vice Chair.

16 VICE CHAIR SMITH: Excuse me, sir, through the Chair.  
17 For the last speaker, in regards to your car being towed,  
18 are your plates current?

19 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: You, can you come back up to the  
20 mic, sir? Not a problem.

21 MR. HUNT: It was not towed. It was in front of the  
22 house each time it received three orange stickers.

23 VICE CHAIR SMITH: Oh, abandonment stickers. So I'm  
24 asking, are your plates current on your vehicle?

25 MR. HUNT: Yes, they are. But it seems like Detroit

1 police do not know that they can run the 60... well, in my  
2 case, I got a 60-day temporary plate. Seems they don't  
3 know that they can run that, or can they?

4 VICE CHAIR SMITH: So you have a temporary plate on  
5 your car. You can just consistently get a temporary plate  
6 instead of getting a permanent plate for your car. I'm  
7 just trying to find out the confusion as to why you're  
8 getting ticketed.

9 MR. HUNT: I have a temporary plate now.

10 VICE CHAIR SMITH: And you keep getting a temporary  
11 plate instead of the two weeks that you are supposed to  
12 have one and then get a permanent plate.

13 MR. HUNT: No, no, no, no. It's not two weeks. This  
14 is state of Michigan law. And that's when I talked to  
15 officers like at the church the last time. Do they know  
16 about these temporary plates? Evidently they don't, from  
17 what I get in my head.

18 VICE CHAIR SMITH: Okay.

19 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay.

20 VICE CHAIR SMITH: Well thank you, sir. I was just  
21 trying to get an understanding.

22 MR. HUNT: I appreciate that. Thank you.

23 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Alright. Next public commenter.

24 MS. UNDERWOOD: Sir, we're going to go into Zoom.

25 MR. BROWN: Ms. Butler.

1 MS. UNDERWOOD: Oh, I'm sorry.

2 MS. BUTLER: Good afternoon commissioners.

3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Good afternoon.

4 MS. BUTLER: Commissioners, in the Detroit Free  
5 Press. July 21st, it was reported that Mayor Duggan's top  
6 officials don't live in the city. It confirmed what I  
7 believe that we are not highly thought of. If you recall  
8 a statement made by Mr. Cermack that the mayor doesn't  
9 care about you, other than being who he is, are you  
10 contributing to that narrative? You are in the position  
11 to show leadership. Are you? Are you performing the job  
12 of doing the work you are elected or appointed to do?  
13 Commissioners that have been coming here for several  
14 years, and you have been looking for a secretary. You had  
15 two people who I thought performed well and you fired  
16 them. You hired two other people, and one is no longer  
17 here. For the first time, we heard people being  
18 interviewed for the job of secretary, and what happened?  
19 I thought several of them qualified, and you did not  
20 choose one of them. What is that saying about you? Wake  
21 up and get your act together. Do you like yourselves that  
22 you can't work together? We are great people. Let's live  
23 up to that. There are people listening to these meetings,  
24 and I'm ashamed when Minister Blount and others make such  
25 demeaning statements before this body out of fear or

1 receive crumbs, let all of us represent our better  
2 selves. This is a new day, let's stand up, listen, read  
3 and learn and move forward. Thank you.

4 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you. Next public commenter,  
5 and we are still waiting on quorum. Commissioner Bernard  
6 was in court and she's supposed to be here right after  
7 court, so hopefully she's on her way. And of course  
8 Commissioner Burton is outside in the hallway.

9 MS. UNDERWOOD: We're going into Zoom. Our next  
10 speaker will be Scotty Bowman.

11 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: You may be heard.

12 MR. BOWMAN: Okay, first question is, is it possible  
13 to yield my two minutes over to Agnes Hitchcock?

14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: She's not in the room.

15 MR. BOWMAN: Okay. Again, I just wanted to say that  
16 she was starting to tell us something and whatever it  
17 was, I'm certain that it was not frivolous because I know  
18 Agnes Hitchcock over the years, and when she brings up an  
19 issue, it is something of substance. It is not a trivial  
20 matter. And I really hope that her concerns are  
21 addressed. And I just want to get that out there right  
22 away. I'm concerned...

23 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Mr. Bowman she's back in the  
24 room, and if you want to yield the remainder of your  
25 time, you can do that.

1 MR. BOWMAN: I'd like to do that.

2 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: What's the remainder of the time.

3 MR. BROWN: 1 25.

4 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: 1 25.

5 MS. HITCHCOCK: Thank you. Once again, the state of  
6 Michigan sent me a letter as a result of that ticket from  
7 a police officer, which was a ticket for driving in a  
8 construction zone, which did not exist. Those plumbers  
9 were not city contractors. They did not have a permit to  
10 be in the alley, and they had no right to barricade my  
11 garage. Now the state of Michigan has sent me a letter  
12 saying that I need to go to driving school because of  
13 those tickets that Officer Peacock gave me. And that the  
14 person who teaches me how to drive cannot charge me more  
15 than a hundred dollars. And then if I don't go to driving  
16 school for those illegal tickets that she gave me, they  
17 tell me that two points are going to go on my driver's  
18 license, which will be forwarded to my insurance company,  
19 resulting in an increased rate. I keep explaining to you  
20 that you need to get those tickets out of the system. If  
21 you had a side piece and she got a ticket, you would pull  
22 that ticket out of the system. So just pretend and go and  
23 get that ticket out of the system. And I thank you so  
24 much for this 1:25 seconds. Thank you.

25 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Alright, next public commenter.



1 MS. UNDERWOOD: Our next public speaker will be  
2 former Commissioner, William Davis.

3 MR. DAVIS: Oh, good afternoon. Can I be heard?

4 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, you may be heard.

5 MR. DAVIS: Okay. I think that this board needs to do  
6 something to help Ms. Agnes Hitchcock. I have known her  
7 for years, and you cannot continue to allow white  
8 contractors coming to our city and abuse our black women,  
9 and you cannot continue. That's a problem that's gotten  
10 worse as more and more of our police officers live  
11 outside the city. You know, police officers; there should  
12 be more incentives for them to live in the city. You all  
13 should try to come up with more incentives, but you all  
14 need to help Ms. Agnes Hitchcock today. Also, Tyrone  
15 Allen, about the issue over in Palmer Park; you know,  
16 those Palmer Park apartments. That's been going on for  
17 years. I know of, you know, action needs to be taken. It  
18 seems like action only happens when there are certain  
19 people complaining. We need to make sure that everybody  
20 in this city is treated correctly and everybody has  
21 rights and, you know, people's rights are not being  
22 pushed over.

23 Because I remember when Coleman Young got elected in  
24 1973 and took office in 1974, and that's when the police  
25 commission was formed in July of '74. I know we have some

1 people that are confused, but we need to make sure that  
2 we are doing all we can to help the people of the City of  
3 Detroit. And also, I think it is criminal that this board  
4 does not have a quorum half the time. I worked for the  
5 City of Detroit for the Water Department for 34 years. If  
6 I didn't go to work... something needs to happen. You all  
7 need to have tighter standards. I need to make sure that,  
8 you know, if people are tuning in or coming down to the  
9 board meetings, the board members are going to be there  
10 and be there on time. Thank you.

11 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you very much. Next public  
12 commenter.

13 MS. UNDERWOOD: Our last speaker will be the caller  
14 with the last three digits, 124.

15 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: You may be heard. Are you there,  
16 public commenter?

17 CALLER 124: Yes. Good afternoon. May I be heard?

18 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes.

19 CALLER 124: Okay. Thank you. Please check things  
20 out. I came in, raised my hand, checked it, and it had  
21 been lowered. So it sounds like somebody wrote Ms. Agnes  
22 Hitchcock a fraudulent ticket. That really needs to be  
23 checked into because they can't just make stuff up to  
24 make up a ticket. Also what you're seeing there are in  
25 certain areas like the north end, there's a whole lot of

1 gentrification pressure. And frankly, I think the way the  
2 city's going about business is causing a lot of undue  
3 tension that makes it more difficult for a police  
4 officer. I support police officers, not all of them,  
5 because you need to clean house with the bad ones. And it  
6 seems like, I hear there's heavy enforcement going on in  
7 the north end. The neighborhood police officer who I've  
8 been asking her to locate an arsonist who cut his tire  
9 off.

10 I found out she is going around ticketing people for  
11 having cars parked on their own property. Supposedly,  
12 that's because of possible rat infestation. But my  
13 neighbor, they're hitting up and I think he's being  
14 targeted because people want his property. Not that they  
15 really care, because I know he wouldn't have rats in  
16 there. So it seems very un-American to be hitting people  
17 up for \$250 tickets just because the cars are parked in  
18 their own property and there's no leaking oil or anything  
19 that seems so un-American, but that you're using the  
20 neighborhood police officers to do that instead of  
21 dealing with these other issues. Like somebody should  
22 have come to that situation and deescalated it and  
23 investigated instead of turning around and giving her  
24 tickets. And there's a lot going on, folks. People are  
25 very stressed out. That's why we need trauma informed

1 care. I imagine the police officer has trauma, but a lot  
2 of the residents do. And the way people are being treated  
3 secretive, planning false narratives, shoving stuff down  
4 their throat, picketing enforcement. But oh, some people  
5 get ticketed, but some people don't. Oh, do.

6 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: All right. Thank you everyone. It  
7 appears that we now have a quorum. I would ask Mr. Brown  
8 to do the introductions of commissioners.

9 MR. BROWN: Yes. Chairperson Woods - Here.

10 MR. BROWN: Vice Chairperson Smith - Present.

11 MR. BROWN: Commissioner Banks - Present.

12 MR. BROWN: Commissioner Bill asked for an excused,  
13 absent.

14 MR. BROWN: Commissioner Burton - Mr. Chairman, I  
15 have to step back out to be with one of my constituents  
16 and check on them. They came before the board and they  
17 spoke during public comments. So, excuse me for a moment.  
18 I'm present, but excuse me.

19 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Well, you're not present now, you  
20 know, and it's holding up our meeting. And it is very,  
21 very disgraceful that we will treat citizens like this.  
22 You know, and I apologize to the citizens of the City of  
23 Detroit for this type of behavior. You guys do not  
24 deserve it. You do not deserve it in no shape, form, or  
25 fashion. He is an elected official and he represents

1 District 5. And it's a sad day in the City of Detroit,  
2 that we treat citizens in this regard. We highly respect  
3 you. We highly regard you. We listen very intently and  
4 everything that we could do in our power to be able to  
5 represent your complaints and interests we're going to do  
6 that to the best of our ability. You know, we can't take  
7 cases from the top to the bottom. We have a process. We  
8 have complaints that we have to get through, and we are  
9 working hard to get through, and we need the staff to be  
10 able to do this, to be able to do the business of the  
11 people of the City of Detroit. And we all took an oath,  
12 and I am very, very sorry that you are being treated like  
13 this by certain commissioners.

14 MS. UNDERWOOD: Can something be done about it?

15 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay, no outbursts, please.

16 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: So Mr. Chair, is there any  
17 other matter of business that can be handled in our  
18 amended agenda? Did we already do announcements or the  
19 secretary's report?

20 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you for calling that to our  
21 attention. Mr. Secretary?

22 MR. BROWN: Yeah, Mr. Chair. Under my report, you  
23 have two incoming correspondences, both of them from the  
24 chief investigator, and so those are in your package. And  
25 I go to announcements. The next BOPC meeting is Thursday,

1 August 1st, 2024 at 3:00 PM. That meeting is held here at  
2 Detroit Public Safety Headquarters. Address 1301 Third  
3 Street. And the next community meeting will be Thursday,  
4 August 8th, 2024 at 6:30 PM with the Fifth Precinct  
5 hosting. And that will take place at WC3 Eastern Campus.  
6 That address is 5901 Conner Street, Detroit, Michigan,  
7 48213. And those are the announcements Mr. Chair.

8 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Thank you so much.

9 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Mr. Chair, I think that we  
10 will, unfortunately, have to reschedule the interviews  
11 that we have for today. Noting that it looks like we're  
12 not going to be able to maintain a quorum and saying that  
13 I think we've amended. I mean, we have expended rather  
14 all of the amended agenda that we could have. Either you  
15 can call for recess and see if that provides us enough  
16 time for Commissioner Bernard to arrive. But if not, then  
17 unfortunately we'll have to reschedule. And again, I  
18 expressed my apologies to the two remaining candidates  
19 because this would be the second time that we have  
20 rescheduled. And I recognize that comes with travel  
21 obligations and schedule changes and the like. So please  
22 do on behalf of the commission, accept my apologies for  
23 our inability to be effective in moving forward with  
24 these interviews. But Mr. Chair, what's your desire?

25 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: I'll ask for a five-minute recess

1 so that we can be able to try to get Commissioner Bernard  
2 on the phone.

3 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Alright.

4 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you. We are in recess.  
5 Yeah. Get a point of order. Yep. Excuse me. Thank you.  
6 There was another public commenter. Is that person  
7 available?

8 MR. ROBBINS: Yes.

9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Alright. Yep. You may be heard.

10 MR. ROBBINS: I'd like to...

11 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: You have to come to the mic.

12 MR. ROBBINS: Oh, good afternoon. My name's Tom  
13 Robbins III, and I'm coming in to help a fellow citizen,  
14 Agnes Hitchcock. And I want to give my minutes to her.

15 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: You may be heard. Ms. Hitchcock.

16 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: How much time does she have?

17 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: You have two minutes. Excuse me,  
18 how much time?

19 MR. BROWN: 1:44.

20 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: 1:44.

21 MS. HITCHCOCK: Okay. 144. This is my letter from  
22 the Detroit Water and Sewage Department. Mrs. Hitchcock,  
23 276 East Philadelphia, Detroit, Michigan. Please find  
24 this correspondence as a follow up to the communications  
25 you provided on February 21, '24 to the Detroit Water and

1 Sewage Department and the Board of Water Commissioners  
2 regarding Any Moment Plumbing and yourself. We're  
3 saddened by the report and accounts of events transpired  
4 as described by Mrs. Hitchcock. Your comments have been  
5 received and an investigation has been conducted. Upon  
6 review, Detroit Water and Sewage has determined, Any  
7 Moment Plumbing is not a DWSD hired vendor, or  
8 contractor. Furthermore, DWSD did not authorize work to  
9 be completed at or near 276 East Philadelphia and was not  
10 on site during the incident, which Mrs. Hitchcock  
11 described. DWSD security will leave the case file open in  
12 the event any further information is presented. Should  
13 you have any further questions or concerns, please do not  
14 hesitate to reach out to our office directly. A copy of  
15 this letter will be submitted to BOWC on March 6th, 2024.  
16 Thank you for being a valued customer. Respectfully,  
17 Matthew Phillips, Chief of Staff, Customer Service  
18 Officer, Board of Water Commissioners. Thank you.

19 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you. Chief Investigator  
20 Warfield, do we have a complaint on file from Ms.  
21 Hitchcock?

22 MS. HITCHCOCK: Yes.

23 CI WARFIELD: Through the Chair? Yes, we do have a  
24 complaint on file.

25 MS. HITCHCOCK: Are you ready?



1 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Well, he recognized that we do  
2 have one.

3 MS. HITCHCOCK: Okay.

4 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you so much Ms. Hitchcock.

5 MS. HITCHCOCK: If anybody else wants to give some  
6 minutes, I've got some.

7 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: What is your pleasure board?

8 MS. UNDERWOOD: Entertain a motion?

9 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Well not entertain, I'm not  
10 the Chair anymore. I move that we adjourn.

11 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Motion made by Commissioner  
12 Pressley.

13 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Second with discussion.

14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir.

15 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: I'll just be entirely brief.  
16 I think we owe the public an apology. We have made  
17 several attempts. This is not just the first attempt that  
18 we've done at attempting to fill this vacancy, this  
19 critical vacancy that we have. As many of you know, the  
20 board's secretary is often viewed as the executive  
21 director of the Board of Police Commissioners. It's very  
22 unfortunate that there is division in the sense of  
23 calling out appointees versus elected individuals on this  
24 body. I think what you have noticed, and then you can go  
25 back and see minutes, and you can see the consistency. We

1 have our members here, whether we be elected, whether we  
2 be appointed. I think there is a unity component to what  
3 we're trying to accomplish. We would ask that you  
4 exercise your voice in the future, should that be your  
5 pleasure, in terms of just having better attendance,  
6 having quorum not stepping outside, not attempting to  
7 disrupt the process that we're trying to achieve. Because  
8 again, this process has been ongoing for over a year. And  
9 apologies to the candidates as well; as we understand  
10 that most of you have traveled from quite a distance. But  
11 we look forward to connecting with you offline to be able  
12 to reschedule these meetings.

13 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah. And I would like to deeply  
14 apologize from the bottom of my heart to the citizens of  
15 the City of Detroit, and, as well as to the candidates.  
16 And, you know, we should have another commissioner take  
17 the seat very, very soon. And we are going to work very,  
18 very hard to maintain a quorum so that we can be able to  
19 do the people's business in this setting. But rest  
20 assured that OCI is fully staffed right now, and OCI is  
21 doing the work of the people of the City of Detroit. We  
22 have some real great talented new investigators that just  
23 came in. And if I'll just ask Mr. Warfield to take a  
24 couple of minutes and just be able to share to the public  
25 how that process is working for us now. And we're working

1 very hard to tackle the backlog and be able to attack the  
2 issues that come as they come.

3 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: And Mr. Chair, not to disrupt  
4 your prerogative, but we are in the midst of a motion for  
5 adjournment.

6 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Absolutely. Thank you.  
7 Absolutely. I stand corrected, and I apologize to my  
8 constituents. But the motion was made by Commissioner  
9 Pressley, and it was second by Commissioner Hernandez.  
10 All in favor. Well, I guess we can please...

11 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Can't necessarily vote, so.

12 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. And all in favor say aye.

13 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: The motion is carried, we are  
15 adjourned.
