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CITY OF DETROIT
BOARD OF POLICE COMMISSIONERS MEETING
August 15, 2024 at 3:00 P.M.

1 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: All right. It is 3:01. Today is..
2 what is the date? August 15th 2024. The Board of Police
3 Commissioners' meeting is called to order. We don't have
4 a quorum here yet, but we are looking to have a quorum,
5 very soon, and being that we don't have a quorum, we want
6 to see if the chaplain is available. Chaplain who? Who is
7 the chaplain?

8 MS. UNDERWOOD: Commander Shari Lowman.

9 CHAPLAIN LOMAN: Good afternoon.

10 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Good afternoon. You may proceed.

11 CHAPLAIN LOWMAN: Okay. Most gracious Father God, we
12 thank you, Father God, for this day. We thank you, Father
13 God, for bringing us together, just one more day, oh,
14 God. And we just ask you, Father God, to be in this
15 meeting, oh God. We ask you to guide us in this meeting,
16 oh, God. And everything that is needed for this need, oh
17 God, that you will supply it, oh God, in deep and in
18 order, oh God. Whatever information is needed, oh, God.
19 We thank you, father, God, that you will bless it, and we
20 give you all the praise and honor and glory. In Jesus
21 name, I pray. Amen.

22 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Amen. It appears that we do have
23 a quorum now. And so we will go to the introduction of
24 commissioners.

25 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Chairperson Woods - Present.

1 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Commissioner Bernard says
2 she'll be a little late. CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Someone is
3 there neglecting their duties, and walking out. And so we
4 have lost the quorum, but we are expecting another
5 commissioner to be here. It is very, very unfortunate
6 again, that a commissioner will treat the citizens of the
7 City of Detroit in this manner. And we are expected to
8 have a quorum, very, very soon. Having said that, we
9 will... What is it, public condiment?

10 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Yeah. Mr. Chair, you can go
11 to public comment.

12 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: All right. We'll start public
13 comment, and we are expecting a quorum very soon.

14 MS. UNDERWOOD: Good afternoon, Mr. Chair. We have
15 two speakers. One speaker here in the room, Ms. Charnita
16 Williams, and then we'll go into Zoom, Election integrity
17 Roo.

18 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: You may be heard.

19 MS. WILLIAMS: Hello everyone. I'm here today to
20 discuss me going to file police reports, and I have like
21 over 35 police reports at the Second Precinct. And I just
22 want to know why no one at that precinct did a job
23 correctly and reached out to me concerning my issues that
24 I have. Every time I leave the facility at 12900 West
25 Chicago. I have to be concerned about my life every day.

1 And that's not acceptable, especially when police
2 officers are behind me, people are stalking me like they
3 are when I leave the facility. Like I said, should nobody
4 know when I'm coming and going, I have to be concerned
5 about my life every day. People that just got released
6 from prison, halfway house, all types of nuts. I'm unable
7 to carry my weapons legally because I'm in that facility,
8 but at the end of the day, I shouldn't have to worry
9 about my life every day. That's a huge issue. So, like I
10 said, I have over 30 something complaints, and I'm
11 looking over at you, Chief Warfield. And it is
12 unfortunate when I go into the police department that
13 when I get back to that facility, the officers that's in
14 that facility, they are fully aware of the reports I
15 make, and how is that possible. It is just not
16 acceptable. When somebody is in a position to do their
17 job, and does not do their job correctly, I have an issue
18 with that, and they don't respect their oath. Thank you.

19 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Thank you. We now have a
20 quorum. Let us continue with the introduction of the BOPC
21 staff via commissioners.

22 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Chairperson Woods -
23 President.

24 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Commissioner Banks asked for
25 an excused absence. Commissioner Bernard says she'll be

1 here shortly.

2 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Commissioner Bell - Present.
3 District 4.

4 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Commissioner Burton -
5 Present. District 5.

6 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Commissioner Carter asked for
7 an excused absence. ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Commissioner
8 Moore - Present.

9 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Commissioner Hernandez -
10 Present.

11 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Commissioner Dewaelsche -
12 Present.

13 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Commissioner Pressley - Here.

14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Thank you very much. We
15 move for the approval of the August 15th, 2024 agenda.

16 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: So moved.

17 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Support.

18 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Moved by Commissioner Hernandez,
19 and supported by Commissioner Moore. All in favor say,
20 aye.

21 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through Chair.

22 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: So moved Hernandez.

23 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Excuse me. All of her say,
24 aye.

25 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

1 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Anyone oppose?

2 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I'd like to amend the agenda.

3 I'd like to move the executive appointment to the rank of
4 commander, and captains to new business; so the board
5 will be able to get its business done, and then go to the
6 promotions component.

7 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Anyone second that? There's no
8 second to that. So the agenda is approved. Approval of
9 the minutes.

10 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: So moved.

11 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: By Commissioner Hernandez.

12 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHÉ: Support.

13 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Supported by Commissioner
14 Dewaelsche. All in favor, say, aye.

15 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

16 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Anyone opposed? The motion is
17 carried. Introduction of BOPC staff, chief of police and
18 other officials and representatives.

19 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Mr. Chair, currently, we have
20 with us, Chief Investigator Warfield, Parliamentarian,
21 Dr. Francis Jackson, Ms. Jonya Underwood, Ms. Teresa
22 Blossom, Ms. Artemisia Joshua, Ms. Mary Barber, Mr. Drew
23 Fries, acting supervising guest investigator Elgin
24 Murphy, ASL interpreter, Ms. Yakata and Dr. Stephanie
25 Beatty. Our court report is Mr. Don Handyside. Sergeant

1 Quinn is doing our audio and media services are doing our
2 video. Sitting in is Chief James White himself. Elected
3 officials. Ms. Marie Overall from State Representative
4 Tyrone Carter's Office. Mr. Fredia Butler, Second
5 Precinct Community Relations president, Ms. LaDon Davis,
6 Office of Council member Fred Durhal III, Lieutenant Mark
7 Young, LSA president, Mr. Ron Thomas, DPOA vice
8 president, and former Commissioner William Davis.

9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you. Let the record reflect
10 that Commissioner Smith is present. We're going to go to
11 the Chief of Police Report.

12 CHIEF WHITE: Alright. Good afternoon, honorable
13 body.

14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Good afternoon.

15 CHIEF WHITE: I'll start with the crime. We continue
16 to move in the right direction. Our strategy is working.
17 As I say often, we don't celebrate numbers, but we do
18 have to have a basis for which we do our work, and to see
19 if what we're doing is in fact working. Coming off of
20 historical crime reduction numbers last year, lowest
21 since 1966, we knew that we would have some challenges
22 this year. But then the privileged department continues
23 to work very hard for the city. And as a result, we were
24 looking at a 16% reduction in homicides this year. Last
25 year, again, coming in historical low numbers with 166.

1 At this time last year, we were looking at 139; and still
2 139 too many, but certainly lower than we've quite
3 frankly, ever seen, at least in my career.

4 And I've talked to some folks that have
5 significantly much more time than I do. Not saying that's
6 the same thing. Non-committal shootings 23% reduction.
7 Robberies are 26% reduction. And in total part one,
8 violent crime is 11%. And carjacking continues in the
9 right direction. They're working very hard. We're looking
10 at a 39% reduction in carjackings. And to put that into
11 some context you know, I'm sure this board remembers the
12 time when there was a carjacking a day in Detroit. As of
13 today's date, year to date, there were 66 carjackings in
14 our city in late August of '24, or mid-August in '24.
15 That's incredible. When we look at our sexual assaults,
16 we see a 16% reduction; in aggravated assaults, we see an
17 8% reduction. We look at the proactive crimes where the
18 officers have to be engaged to reduce. And those are your
19 burglaries, which requires proactive patrol. We're seeing
20 a 2% reduction in those. And that's significant because
21 you look at pre-Covid numbers, when we saw that
22 significant dip during Covid, because people were home,
23 the homes were being broken into. So we have to look back
24 a couple years, three years to see what the numbers look
25 like. And these numbers are quite robust looking at a 2%

1 reduction in robberies and burglaries, I'm sorry, strike
2 that. 25% reduction in robberies and a 2% reduction in
3 burglaries, motor vehicle theft, moving in the right
4 direction as well, 4% reduction. And then we look at our
5 total property crimes at 8.2% reduction. So a lot of hard
6 work by the men and women of the Detroit Police
7 Department, and those numbers are moving in the right
8 direction. I'd like to highlight just a couple of
9 incidents before we get into some recommendations to this
10 body.

11 A death investigation on August 7th, at 12:00 PM.
12 Officers were dispatched to the 15,000 block of the
13 Liberal, to investigate a dead body observed in that
14 area. Officers arrived at the scene and observed the
15 victim suffering from a wound to the head. Medic 13
16 responded to the scene and unfortunately pronounced the
17 victim deceased. Officers from the Ninth Precinct
18 preserved the scene, and detectives from the Homicide
19 Section were notified. Homicide detectives arrived,
20 conduct a preliminary investigation. A witness stated
21 that they came to the location to check the property and
22 found the victim there unresponsive and suffering from
23 the wounds I indicated. The incident is still under
24 investigation, and the detectives put out information
25 asking anyone for information to let us know. Our

1 carjacking is the second incident. Thursday, August 8th,
2 11:35 PM. Officers were dispatch, 3,900 block of Wabash.
3 An investigative carjacking officer arrived on the stand
4 and spoke with the victims, and stated, as she pulled
5 into her driveway of the location, parked the vehicle in
6 the garage. As the victim exited the vehicle, the suspect
7 approached the vehicle and said, get out of the car. The
8 victim ran into her home, and the suspect drove away.
9 Officers from the Third Precinct preserved the scene, and
10 detectives from the Commercial Auto Theft Unit were
11 notified. On August 9th, officers from the Third
12 Precinct, and detective from Commercial Auto Theft
13 discovered the stolen vehicle in the area of Ashton,
14 front unoccupied. Officers conducted surveillance on the
15 vehicle. Eventually observing the suspect, entered the
16 vehicle and drive away. Officers followed the vehicle to
17 the area of Stalin and Paul, at which point the suspect
18 exited the vehicle. As the officers approached the
19 suspect to make an arrest, the suspect, again, ran from
20 the officers. After a brief foot chase the suspect was
21 arrested without further incident. On August 10th,
22 detectives from CATS submitted a warrant to Wayne County
23 Prosecutor's Office for review. The warrant was approved.
24 The suspect was rendered to the 36 District Court for
25 stolen property, receiving concealment of a motor

1 vehicle. And the suspect is being held in Wayne County
2 jail on a \$200,000 bond.

3 There was a fatal shooting on August 9th at 4:39 PM.
4 Officers were dispatched to the 3,700 block of Burlingame
5 to investigate a fatal shooting; arrived on the scene,
6 and observed the victim being treated by Medic 13. The
7 victim was suffering from a gunshot wound to the chest,
8 transported to a local hospital where the victim was
9 pronounced dead. Officers from the Tenth Precinct, once
10 again, held the scene. Homicide came out. Detectives
11 spoke with witnesses who said that they observed the
12 victim arguing with the suspect prior to being shot. They
13 described the suspect, what he was wearing and the
14 vehicle he was driving. Detectives are asking, once
15 again, anyone with information to provide us with the
16 information. Crime Stoppers will be doing a presentation
17 on that soon. Also, and I don't have the information
18 here, I do apologize, but I'm sure the body recognized
19 that there was a young child reported as kidnapped over
20 the weekend.

21 That report was false. We were able to recover the
22 child and charge the parent with filing a false police
23 report. I can provide the board with details on that, but
24 it was a false claim. And then there was a second
25 incident involving a missing child. This particular child

1 has wandered away from the home; I believe four times
2 now. So we're getting Child Protective Service involved
3 in that. And our Child Abuse Unit is looking into that
4 case as well. Most recently, the Sixth Precinct held a
5 cookout. These are the positive stories at St. Suzanne
6 Cody Rouge Community Resource Center and families came
7 out and enjoyed interacting with the police. Our
8 Explorers Camp Academy graduation occurred yesterday
9 right here in the Skylar room. We had coffee and cake as
10 well for Police Officer Nathaniel Womack. I'm sorry,
11 strike that. Nathaniel Womack's coffee and cake will be
12 Friday after serving the department for 25 years. So
13 that'll be tomorrow. Everybody knows that. Nathaniel
14 Womack is an NPO, a very hardworking NPO. Sorry to lose
15 him, but 25 years of this work, it's time for him to
16 enjoy doing something else. And at three it'll be here in
17 this room. If it pleases the board, if there are no
18 questions, I can move on to the recommendations, or I can
19 pause here for questions.

20 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Any questions, commissioners?
21 Commissioner Moore.

22 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. Chief,
23 last Saturday, I believe it was, there was an illegal
24 block party, and there was a discharge of a firearm by an
25 officer. Can you give us some details on that?

1 CHIEF WHITE: I can. In fact, if AC Fitzgerald, who
2 was sitting in for me; I was at Noble last Saturday, can
3 provide some updated details.

4 AC FITZGERALD: Yeah. To the board, this is Chief
5 Charles Fitzgerald, gathering 50, 60 people lots of
6 alcohol. When the first unit arrived, they saw a young
7 man with a bulge on the side of his pocket. I mean, the
8 side of his hip. They went to investigate him. Family
9 members joined in, mixed with a lot of alcohol. The
10 officer had his weapon out, had it in a low ready
11 position. As he went to holster it, one of the young men
12 in the group hit him in his mouth, hit him repeatedly.
13 And that's when, as he started to put it back toward his
14 holster, that's when it discharged.

15 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Hitting the officer in the
16 mouth?

17 AC FITZGERALD: So the officers were out there
18 breaking up his block party, mixed with beer, muscles,
19 and all the rest of that stuff. They struck the officer.
20 The discharge did happen. No one was injured. Force came
21 out. The Homicide Task Force came out. We went through
22 all of our normal stops, but no one was hurt or injured.
23 There were four arrests made immediately, and then two
24 others were detained during this incident.

25 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you.

1 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yep. And any more questions?

2 Commissioner Pressley.

3 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Thank you. Through the Chair.
4 Chief, my questions regarding some of the citizen
5 complaint reports that I'm reading and maybe hoping that
6 you might be able to provide some information to the
7 public relative to the expectation of communication from
8 detectives. So, there's a number of cases where citizens
9 are saying they're not being reached out for updates on
10 their cases, where I haven't heard from detectives in a
11 while after the case. What is the department's
12 expectation relative to detectives reaching out to the
13 citizens who have pending cases?

14 CHIEF WHITE: Through the Chair. I would be remiss if
15 I didn't mention the fact that this was actually brought
16 to my attention once before by Commissioner Moore, very
17 recently, in the past couple months. So this is an issue
18 of concern that has been brought up. And one of the
19 conversations around it has been candidly that because
20 officers are working details, where we've always worked
21 details into Detroit Police Department, and the
22 expectation is that we still meet our responsibilities of
23 making contact with our complainants. So we have a couple
24 things going on right now. One is an audit to ensure that
25 we have a process in place at every level to contact

1 people who are victims of crime. The most urgent being
2 homicide, of course. And there have been issues around
3 that, and I think we can do a better job there.

4 And we need to explain to people when they're going
5 to be contacted, we need to have some recorded cadence,
6 where we can say, by policy, this is what we're going to
7 do. And I'd like to work with this body to develop that
8 policy. We have Deputy Chief Sloan, who's over
9 investigations and can handle that process with us. She's
10 got a process in place already. We talked about this
11 afternoon, improving it. But going back to your initial
12 question, it is not just homicides. It's all cases that
13 we're hearing that on. The requirement to your question
14 is that you make contact with your complainants, that you
15 give them an opportunity to come in and make an
16 investigation. And maybe they can, maybe they can't find
17 their way to the precinct for a variety of reasons.

18 Then we would accommodate them before we give them
19 cars, go out to the house and take, take complaints and
20 things such as that. So to say that it is working
21 flawlessly to make an excuse would be improper. It is not
22 working. I'm hearing it too much. So obviously there's a
23 problem. But my commitment is to build a process that
24 makes sense, present it to the board, not in a long time,
25 I mean, in the next few weeks and see how we can make

1 some improvements. But if you have a specific area or a
2 specific precinct or complaint, let me know where I can
3 get engaged in that one right away. And then as we build
4 out the process long-term, as well.

5 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: That's helpful. And I'm sure
6 that I speak on behalf of my colleagues to say that we
7 welcome being able to help shape that policy. I think a
8 lot of it will be mitigated if there was an understanding
9 of the communication expectation for citizens. And then
10 obviously, some of the cases are very close and
11 passionate to the individual. And so I can just imagine
12 that, you know, there'll be very little that will satisfy
13 by way of communication. But as long as there's a policy
14 in place, I think that helps this board hold the
15 department accountable and how citizens are being
16 communicated to.

17 CHIEF WHITE: Yes, sir.

18 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Thank you.

19 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Let the record reflect that the
20 four people that came to the Board of Police
21 Commissioners last week, who had those complaints, they
22 all have been contacted. We worked expeditiously with the
23 department to be able to make sure that they got the
24 responses that they needed, you know, and we will
25 continue to navigate that until we get this all the way

1 together. So I appreciate the department responding
2 expeditiously to those families from last week. So we can
3 say that was done. Yes, sir. Commissioner Burton.

4 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Questions for the Chief. Our
5 community wants to know how many officers your department
6 currently has right now?

7 CHIEF WHITE: Sorry. Have what?

8 COMMISSIONER BURTON: How many officers do your
9 department have, currently?

10 CHIEF WHITE: I believe we're at 2647. I looked at it
11 this morning, but I don't know if I conflated those
12 numbers. I believe it's 2647. But, if I may through the
13 Chair, that the HR Director confirms those numbers for
14 me.

15 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Absolutely. Alright.

16 COMMISSIONER BURTON: And also, where are we at right
17 now when it comes to police response times?

18 CHIEF WHITE: Response times, through the Chair, are
19 averaging under 13 minutes. We have some precincts as
20 full as nine minutes. We have some precincts that fall
21 five of the 13. We looked at that today in our CompStat.
22 But our average, in fact, I have the actual average right
23 now. 12 minutes and 14 seconds on average citywide for
24 response time, priority one.

25 COMMISSIONER BURTON: And Chief my final question is,

1 just recently a few weeks back, it would appear, appear
2 that Detroit had experienced the worst mass shooting, and
3 the community wants to know, why police did not respond
4 sooner, and what wen The traffic, push back on over an
5 hour. t wrong; where officers you know, took too long to
6 show up. It took on over an hour.

7 CHIEF WHITE: No, it didn't take over an hour. That's
8 factually incorrect.

9 COMMISSIONER BURTON: But what time did the first
10 call come in?

11 CHIEF WHITE: The first call that came in, the
12 officer respondent, I believe, within eight minutes.
13 Let's start with what went on.

14 COMMISSIONER BURTON: So it took...

15 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Let him answer, commissioner.

16 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Point of order. I'm still
17 raising the question here. So, for clarity from the first
18 time, we don't know what time the first call came in. And
19 that's what we would like to know. What time did the
20 first call come in? When the officers were dispatched,
21 and when did they arrive? I guess that's the
22 miscommunication there, and hearing from the community,
23 it took forever for the police to show.

24 CHIEF WHITE: That's not true.

25 COMMISSIONER BURTON: You had over 20 something

1 people who were shot.

2 CHIEF WHITE: Let's start off with the question, and
3 then I'll answer it, and then you can add another
4 question so I can keep up with your concerns. Through the
5 Chair, and I think it's important that we articulate
6 properly to the community. So the first question was what
7 went wrong? What went wrong was that someone made a
8 decision, 21 people. That's what went wrong. What went
9 wrong is that someone decided to resolve a dispute
10 regardless of who was at risk and shoot 21 people. And I
11 share your concern, commissioner, that that is an
12 intolerable circumstance. And as a part of that, we're
13 doing an investigation to ensure that we did everything
14 we could have done and that we hold the person or persons
15 accountable, who did it, who engaged in this act, the
16 shooting 21 people, and could have been worse.

17 People died in that incident. And we looked at every
18 aspect of it. And there is an active investigation right
19 now with homicide as it relates to the shooting, as well
20 as to the homicide. So two different things. Homicide's
21 doing both the shooting and the homicide together. We're
22 also looking at our response. The fact that you stated
23 that we responded an hour after the initial call was
24 factually incorrect. We responded within eight minutes.
25 There was a decision made by a supervisor that we are

1 evaluating. And that decision involved him going to
2 another run, which was a few blocks away, where shots
3 were fired.

4 The first call that came in was 1:31 AM. The
5 supervisor responds to that run, then goes to another run
6 where shots are fired. Now, preliminarily, an
7 investigation is active. The decision to leave the one
8 run for being loud and disruptive, no shots fired, and go
9 to the other run where shots were fired was his decision.
10 At 1:39, the call comes back in. Now shots are fired, and
11 that's what we're looking at. And I have been transparent
12 with this board. There is no reason for me to, in any
13 regard, decide that if the officer or supervisor made a
14 poor decision not to hold them accountable for it. But
15 what I'm looking at is if the decision is a poor
16 decision, or the decision is an improper decision, a poor
17 decision we have to deal with, maybe we wouldn't have
18 done it if given the same opportunity in the same
19 circumstances, but an improper decision that's suggested
20 dereliction in duty, is one that I'm going to get highly
21 engaged in. And that's where we're at right now.

22 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you, Chief White. And I
23 want to say that you have been open and candid to this
24 board about that. And it is irresponsible to say one
25 hour, you know, that it's very, irresponsible and not

1 factually sound even with many of the media reports. So
2 we need to be very, very accurate when we put information
3 out to the public. Commissioner Smith and then Hernandez,
4 then we will move on.

5 DR. JACKSON: Mr. Chairman.

6 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes.

7 DR. JACKSON: Yeah, this is the parliamentarian. If I
8 could please, sir, I would like to remind the
9 commissioners that when you raise a point of order, a
10 point of order says there is a rule that has been broken,
11 and you have to state what rule has been broken. A point
12 of order is not used, if you want to disagree or if you
13 have a different opinion. You have to say what rule has
14 been broken, and then the Chair will rule on whether or
15 not your point of order is well taken or not. Thank you,
16 sir.

17 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you so much. Let the record
18 reflect that. Commissioner Bernard is here. Commissioner
19 Smith and Commissioner Hernandez. And Chief, you can do
20 your presentation.

21 CHIEF WHITE: Thank you.

22 COMMISSIONER SMITH: Thank you. Through this Chair,
23 good afternoon, Chief. I'm speaking today in regards to
24 the missing Na'Ziyah Harris. In the past few days,
25 there's been a lot of vicious rumors, a lot of vicious

1 residents, and just overall, a lot of rumors that are
2 flying in the community in regards to her disappearance
3 and her being missing. Her father passed away a couple
4 weeks ago. His funeral was a couple Saturdays ago. And if
5 you can just update the community of any formal
6 information, that will only come through the Detroit
7 Police Department and not any rumors that are floating
8 through the street please.

9 CHIEF WHITE: Yes, commissioner, thanks for bringing
10 that up. The Na'Ziyah Harris case, is one that not only
11 keeps us up thinking about, but the homicide team, a
12 special victims' unit by missing person's group. They
13 have been working this case like you would not believe.
14 We are prepared very soon to make an announcement on this
15 case. We certainly have looked at every aspect. I have to
16 be careful because we are working with the Prosecutor's
17 Office right now. We have looked at every piece of
18 evidence that has come our way, every tip. We've done a
19 number of searches and sadly what I can tell you is that
20 it is not going to be the desired outcome that any of us
21 want. And I have to stop there as Madam Prosecutor will
22 probably start ringing my phone here in a minute.

23 But there's a lot to do and we're getting close. But
24 it is a very tragic and sad case that has made all of us
25 very, very sad. So I have a whole lot more to say and

1 answer the questions very, very soon. But the case is
2 moving. It is not cold. We have purposely not jumped in
3 front of cameras to talk about it, because we didn't know
4 if any witnesses were going to turn into suspects. We are
5 very confident in the fact that we're on right now. We do
6 know that some people may have intentionally misled us
7 and sent us all on goose chases, to be honest with you.
8 But we are very confident. The investigators have done an
9 amazing job. I could not be more proud of them. I can
10 tell you that they're emotionally connected to this case.
11 I can get briefed on it weekly; and, as you will soon
12 see, and hear they did everything that they could to
13 bring this baby home and chase everything down that we
14 could.

15 COMMISSIONER SMITH: Thank you, Chief, because right
16 now, as we speak, they're out and searching. You know, I
17 just want the community to know that you all have not
18 given up, but thank you so much.

19 CHIEF WHITE: And, you know, and I may need to say
20 this. Oftentimes, like we just made an arrest on the Dr.
21 Hoover case. And you have to understand, you know, that's
22 a high profile case, right? And then municipal cases. And
23 I think a lot of times this misconception is that we just
24 stop, or that everybody's just doing that. That's not it
25 at all. The homicide team is broken down into squads. I

1 can take you to a desk in Homicide right now, where in
2 the Na'Ziyah's picture is on this investigator's desk,
3 and she is studying that picture and everything else, and
4 chases, every lead, goes all over the state, running down
5 evidence and information and phones, and you name it. But
6 because of the high profile nature, in some of those
7 cases, people feel like we're not; we're we are, and
8 we'll be ready to say something very soon.

9 COMMISSIONER SMITH: Thank you, Chief.

10 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: All right. Commissioner
11 Hernandez.

12 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: I'll rescind.

13 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Thank you. Chief.

14 CHIEF WHITE: All right. Thank you. Moving on to
15 recommendation for appointment. I'd like to start by
16 thanking the board. I sent these off three weeks ago. A
17 lot of questions came in, a lot of evaluation. I know it
18 was a lot of data to look at. I'm hopeful that the board
19 finds that, as I do, these are the right people to lead
20 this department at the right time. I will start with
21 Captain McCord. She was appointed to the Detroit Police
22 Department on September 26th, 2007. After completing the
23 requirement following the police academy, Officer McCord
24 was assigned to Eastern District Operations. During her
25 time as an officer, she was also assigned to attend

1 Precinct Professional Education and Training. On August
2 1st, 2016, Police Officer McCord was promoted to the rank
3 of sergeant and assigned to Internal Affairs.

4 In addition to serving as a supervisor in the Police
5 Integrity Unit, Sergeant McCord was responsible for
6 investigating allegations of misconduct and abuse of
7 authority within a department. Sergeant McCord was also
8 assigned to the Police Recruiting Unit, handling Police
9 Recruitment and hiring and enforcing department policies
10 and procedures. On September 12th 2021, Sergeant McCord
11 was promoted to the rank by this body of lieutenant, and
12 was assigned to the Tenth Precinct Detective Unit.
13 Lieutenant McCord was also assigned to the Risk
14 Management Unit, which involved identifying and assessing
15 and mitigating potential risks and officer misconduct
16 that adversely affects the department's operations. On
17 September 26th, 2022, Lieutenant McCord was promoted to
18 the rank of captain by myself with the approval of this
19 body. Her responsibilities included overseeing
20 investigations at Homicide, coordinating with detectives,
21 and ensuring thorough examination of all cases. She also
22 collaborated with other law enforcement agencies, and
23 provided leadership to her team.

24 And just an additional point; some of the work that
25 she's been tasked with, some of the responsibilities of

1 reaching out to families, and communicating and
2 coordinating, I've watched, I've watched her growth, I've
3 watched her commitment to the city. I've watched her
4 commitment to, to the overall health of this agency which
5 is why this recommendation is being made. I'm confident
6 that she will continue to lead with distinction as she
7 takes on her new role. As far as education is concerned,
8 Captain McCord holds a bachelor's degree in criminal
9 justice from Ferris State University, a Master's of
10 Business Administration from Purdue University, and she's
11 a graduate of the Mike Ilitch School of Business, as well
12 as myself. I say that for, I hear that theme a lot here
13 in a few minutes. Captain McCord served in the United
14 States Army and military service instilled in her strong
15 sense of discipline, leadership, and resilience. I'm very
16 proud of her. Young time in the department in 2007, has
17 gone through the ranks quite swiftly, like I did myself.
18 But there is no question that she's ready to lead. I
19 proudly make that recommendation.

20 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Absolutely. What is the pleasure
21 of the board?

22 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: So, I move for her
23 appointment.

24 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Second.

25 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: And congratulations.

1 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: And if I may...

2 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: We could do that description.

3 Okay.

4 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I want to say something.

5 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Motion made by Commissioner

6 Bernard, and second by Commissioner Moore. Any

7 discussion?

8 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Yes. I just want to

9 congratulate you, as did the Chief, and as did the Chair

10 on your many, many accomplishments. I have tremendous

11 respect and regard for people who have served our country

12 honorably, particularly in a leadership position. The

13 reason I was late today was because I was visiting my

14 uncle, who's 92, served 25 years in the military in

15 Vietnam and Korea. You, I take off my hat, my everything.

16 I give you your flowers while you can hear them and see

17 them today for your very, very distinguished career and

18 your leadership. And I thank you for your leadership and,

19 and everything you've done for our country. And as a

20 military person, you did it for our whole world. So thank

21 you very much, and thank you for what you're doing with

22 DPD.

23 CMDR. McCORD: Thank you, ma'am.

24 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair?

25 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes,

1 DR. JACKSON: Mr. Chairman, you have to say that the
2 motion's been carried.

3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: We haven't carried it yet; it is
4 still in discussion. Okay. The motion is made by
5 Commissioner Bernard and supported by Commissioner Moore.

6 DR. JACKSON: Yeah. And then you went into the vote,
7 I believe Mr. Chairman, if I'm not mistaken. If I'm
8 mistaken, I apologize. I thought you went into the vote,
9 and then asked for those opposed, which meant the debate
10 was over.

11 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: No.

12 DR. JACKSON: Am I wrong?

13 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah, you're wrong.

14 DR. JACKSON: I apologize, sir.

15 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Well, keep me together.
16 Commissioner Burton.

17 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Yeah. You know, I just wanted
18 to say that's why it's important for the Parliamentarian
19 to really be present in these meetings physically in
20 person, but...

21 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: It has been germane.

22 COMMISSIONER BURTON: But overall, I just want to
23 just say congratulations to Captain McCord for a
24 great job she does with not only our community, but
25 also with the department. I actually can see her one

1 day being deputy chief, if not the chief of police
2 of the City of Detroit or somewhere else. I mean,
3 her leadership skills are definitely very high. And
4 I remember when the board approved her previous
5 promotion. So, I definitely see her going a lot
6 further than captain and commander. I could see her
7 one day, perhaps, being the deputy chief of this
8 department, if not the chief of police someday.

9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Any further
10 discussion? I would say that I would absolutely say
11 -- I was in the office about three hours two days
12 ago. And you help navigate so many of these issues
13 where these families and a number of the numerous
14 family members have connected with you. You have
15 come to numerous meetings, and so you are a bonafide
16 leader. And so, having said that, all in favor say,
17 aye.

18 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

19 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Anyone oppose? The motion is
20 carried. Congratulations. CMDR McCORD: Thank you.

21 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Would you like to comment?

22 CMDR. McCORD: Yes. So first I'd like to thank Chief
23 White's belief in me and, and trusting me to promote me.
24 I have seen growth in myself that I didn't even know I
25 had. And being in Homicide, I've learned so many things

1 and helped so many people, and I hope to help even more.

2 So thank you for your kind words, and thank you for your

3 vote.

4 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Absolutely. Alright. Commissioner

5 Burton.

6 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Oh, I'm sorry. I just wanted to

7 just add really briefly because Chief White has made some

8 really great appointments over the years. This happens to

9 be one great promotion that we all approve of. And so,

10 you know, he definitely understands leadership and he

11 understands where he may have reassurance within the

12 department. But he's filling those gaps, and I love this

13 appointment. I love a few other good appointments that

14 has been made by the Chief, the crew, and by my

15 colleagues. So, yes. That's it.

16 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you, commissioner.

17 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Chief.

18 CHIEF WHITE: Thank you. I wish I had (Audio Not

19 Clear) And to the commissioner's question earlier, we

20 currently have 2,616 police officers.

21 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Thank you, Chief.

22 CHIEF WHITE: The next is Lieutenant Starr Gonzalez.

23 Lieutenant Starr Gonzalez was appointed to the Detroit

24 Police Department on September 26th, 2007. Police Officer

25 Gonzalez was assigned to the Southwest District Patrol

1 Operations after completing the Detroit Police Academy.
2 In addition to Operations, Officer Gonzalez was assigned
3 to the Vice Detective Bureau, Fiscal Operations and
4 Training Staff. On August 1st, 2016, Police Officer
5 Gonzalez was promoted to the rank of sergeant and
6 assigned to fill recruiting. In the role of sergeant, she
7 was responsible for overseeing recruitment of new
8 officers and ensuring that the department met his
9 staffing needs. On December 21st, 2020, Sergeant Gonzales
10 was promoted to lieutenant. In addition, Lieutenant Starr
11 Gonzales started as supervisor of the Training Staff
12 Unit. So she's promoted to lieutenant, and then she went
13 to the Training Staff. She's done numerous stints in
14 patrol, most recently, the 11th Precinct.

15 Her current role is Chief Neighborhood Liaison, and
16 her job is a unique one. She's responsible for everything
17 from meeting with our community to ensuring that there's
18 a bridge between my office within the community, keeping
19 me informed, on most training in the community, some of
20 the concerns that come up; some of our ambassadors and
21 some of the issues that they have. The positioning of the
22 department and the perception of the department from a
23 ground level. It's one thing to be told what the
24 department is viewed like. It's a different thing to be
25 told what the department is viewed like from people in

1 the field. The position was instrumental in dealing with
2 the community perception and cooperation. And that role
3 was Chief Neighborhood Liaison for the department. She's
4 a graduate of University of Phoenix, holds a bachelor's
5 in criminal justice.

6 She's a graduate of the Michael Ilitch School of
7 Business with a certificate in business, and a masters
8 from the university. Lieutenant Gonzalez was in the
9 United States Air Force from military experience and has
10 honed her relationship and leadership with the
11 department. She is the leader. Everyone who knows her
12 likes her, and if they don't, there's something wrong
13 with them. She works very hard. She tries to outwork me.
14 She cannot; that's the only thing she's working to do.
15 But she's everything from bike train, to mental health
16 training. Loves and cares about this community and does a
17 really, really good job for us. It is with pride that I
18 make the recommendation for her as captain.

19 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: What is the pleasure of the
20 board?

21 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: So moved.

22 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHÉ: Second.

23 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Moved by Commissioner Hernandez
24 and second by Commissioner Dewaelsche. Any discussion?
25 Commissioner Hernandez.

1 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Through the Chair. Any
2 insight you might share as to her next responsibility?
3 Because I don't know if she's been extremely valuable in
4 her current role. I mean, if you're not able to share
5 now, I completely understand.

6 CHIEF WHITE: I'm working through that with AC
7 Fitzgerald. It will be patrol. We're working through some
8 things right now.

9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Any further discussion?

10 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Yes.

11 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Go ahead. You were first, Ava.

12 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Thank you. Yes. Thank you,
13 Mr. Chair. I had the pleasure of working with, at that
14 time it was Sergeant, I believe Gonzalez, such passion
15 and commitment. She was working in recruitment and
16 recruiting. And Commissioner Brooks and I were co-Chairs
17 of the recruitment committee for the board. And we met
18 with her often. She not only was very, very active in
19 Southwest Detroit, which is the community that I work in
20 where I'm from, but everyone knows her. I just saw her
21 last night; I didn't get a chance to talk to her because
22 she was surrounded by people. But during that time, four
23 or five years, when I was on commission before my last
24 term, we worked closely almost weekly or biweekly, we had
25 meetings with her, and she was just so passionate about

1 recruitment. So I know that she's that way with all of
2 her assignments and duties. So, congratulations.

3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Absolutely. Commissioner.

4 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I just want to say thank you
5 again, and not only for your service to the department,
6 but also your service to our country. It means a great
7 deal to me, and I'm sure to most people in this room.
8 Thank you, and congratulations.

9 COMMISSIONER SMITH: I just want to say
10 congratulations. You do so much work. You're everywhere.
11 And we do a lot in the community, and I see you
12 everywhere. Your spirit is always high; you're always
13 friendly and outgoing and greeting everyone with hugs. I
14 just appreciate everything that you do. Thank you so
15 much.

16 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yep.

17 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Mr. Chair?

18 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir.

19 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: I have a procedural question,
20 relative to whether or not we'll be handling these
21 individually or as a bundle, the promotions from
22 lieutenant to captain.

23 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: We can do those as a bundle, and
24 individualize with the sergeants.

25 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Okay. Thank you.

1 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yep. I would say that she thinks
2 she's my mother. You know I was just that Alternative for
3 Girls with her, with a group of young children who did
4 not know that these were all police officers. And some of
5 them just said they didn't like the police. And she took
6 it, and she has taken it hundreds of times that we have
7 put these events together. And so the years I've known
8 her working with DC Hope, and all of the team has been
9 phenomenal. This lady has been stellar in this community
10 to be able to try to work with people who don't like the
11 police, and see what she could do to help them. And I
12 know that we had a baby shower at Alternative for Girls
13 and, and it was phenomenal. And so I appreciate the
14 leadership and I absolutely agree with this. All of you
15 say, aye?

16 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

17 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Anyone opposed? The motion is
18 carried. Anything to say.

19 CAPTAIN GONZALES: Through the Chair. Chief, and the
20 executive team, thank you so much for giving me this
21 opportunity and seeing the abilities that I have to move
22 forward in a higher role. And I believe as I move up, I
23 can connect more with people that I need to connect with.
24 Everybody knows that the community's my heart. So,
25 wherever you place me, they're going to become my

1 community and I'm going to lead them and guide them the
2 same way you do with us. Thank you.

3 CHIEF WHITE: Thank you very much.

4 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Alright. Chief, if you heard
5 Commissioner Pressley, we could bundle all of them up,
6 all the way up to, as far as the lieutenants and..

7 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair.

8 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: I just ask to be clear about
9 the motion that, through the Chair, so as to your
10 discretion.

11 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah. I'll bundle it. Yes, sir.

12 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair. I'd like to
13 move that we do each, and every last one of them
14 individually, instead of the bundle.

15 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Any support of that? There's no
16 support.

17 DR. JACKSON: Mr. Chairman?

18 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes.

19 DR. JACKSON: Yeah. When you have a motion to bundle
20 like this, any individual can, without a motion or a
21 second, pull names from the bundle. So the motion would
22 be to approve the promotions of each other as
23 individuals. But if there is an objection, then anyone
24 without a motion or a second can pull individual names or
25 they can unbundle the whole thing.

1 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Keep on rolling.

2 CHIEF WHITE: Alright. So, if it pleases the Chair,
3 then I will continue with the individualization of the
4 captains and commanders because of the importance of that
5 role.

6 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir.

7 CHIEF WHITE: We will be starting the lieutenants,
8 equally important, but different. I will bundle those and
9 you can pull out who you want.

10 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Don't bundle the sergeants.

11 CHIEF WHITE: Okay. Do not bundle the sergeants.

12 Alright. Moving on to recommendation from Lieutenant

13 Shaun Dunning. Lieutenant Shaun Dunning was appointed to
14 the Detroit Police Department on October 6th, 2008.

15 Police Officer Dunning was assigned to the Sixth Precinct

16 Patrol Operations. After completing the Detroit Police

17 Training Academy, Officer Dunning was assigned to Patrol

18 and Special Operations. Obviously, that responsibility

19 involves handling high risk situations with specialized

20 operations. On November 25th, 2013, Police Officer

21 Dunning was promoted to the rank of detective and

22 assigned to Investigative Operations in the Eighth

23 Precinct Detective Unit.

24 During that time, he did felony investigations,

25 interviews major crimes including murder, home invasion

1 and carjacking, and robberies. He also worked at
2 organized crime. And I don't think this is correct unless
3 he worked at narcotics, and I missed that at my briefing.
4 Did you work at narcotics? Alright. That's not correct. I
5 didn't think so. Alright. His deep understanding of
6 criminal behavior and patterns was crucial for solving
7 complex cases. He also assisted in high profile case
8 investigations by interviewing witnesses and
9 interrogating suspects. On December 19th, 2016, Detective
10 Dunning was promoted to the rank of sergeant and assigned
11 to the Eighth Precinct Structural Ops. He was over at
12 Ceasefire. Under supervision, the Ceasefire Unit saw a
13 significant reduction in crime gun violence within that
14 precinct. Additionally, Sergeant Dunning led the
15 Commercial Auto Theft Unit where they successfully
16 reduced false carjackings within the City of Detroit by
17 using innovative technology and really following the data
18 and interviewing those who are making the complaints.

19 The other thing that should be noted, that is not
20 here, is his commitment to community. He started a
21 program called Brotherhood, along with Captain Thirkill
22 that has since become brotherhood and sisterhood. It came
23 out of the Ninth Precinct on his own time with his own
24 money, took some high risk kids, and it continues to this
25 day, brought them into an environment where they can play

1 basketball, talk off the issues that's going on in the
2 community in a non-threatening way. He connected with
3 them, they connected with him. We were able to reduce
4 gang violence, reduce gun violence amongst that group;
5 that spread. And it's now touching over 200 kids in our
6 community. It is so successful that it's been adopted now
7 by the Wayne County Executive Office. They're going to
8 assist us in branching out as you're well aware.

9 And so we have an opportunity based on something
10 that he came up with then Officer Thirkill, to do
11 something other than arrest our kids right. To do
12 something that makes sense for them is going to now touch
13 thousands of kids. We have over a million dollars in this
14 program around this city. So I think that alone is worthy
15 of a compliment. But in addition to that, he was promoted
16 to lieutenant, signed a gang intelligence to defend the
17 support team where he was responsible for monitoring gang
18 activity. Lieutenant Dunning works to prevent violence
19 and criminal behavior. That's his goal. But if arrest is
20 necessary he doesn't mind making it. Lieutenant Dunning
21 earned a Master's degree in criminal justice from Oakland
22 University. Additionally, Lieutenant Dunning has a
23 Master's of Science degree in criminal justice from Wayne
24 State University. He's also a graduate of Mike Ilitch
25 School of Business at Wayne State University. I recommend

1 Lieutenant Dunning to the rank of captain.

2 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: What is the pleasure of the
3 board?

4 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Moved.

5 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Support.

6 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: It has been moved by Commissioner
7 Hernandez, supported by Commissioner Moore. Any
8 discussion? Yes, sir.

9 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: What an impressive
10 representation that you provided for this wonderful
11 officer. However, I want to know, Chief, if you could
12 speak to the force investigating complaints on his record
13 and you know, and how that aids into your decision?

14 CHIEF WHITE: I look at him and, you know, I've taken
15 some risks, as have been pointed out by this body, and I
16 believe in second chances, I do. But this is the one that
17 requires a second chance. What I looked at was the youth
18 of the officer, the nature of the work that he was
19 involved in, in conversations with him, asking him, you
20 know, what were you thinking? What were you engaged in?
21 One of the things that was most impressive is no excuses;
22 I made a mistake, learned from it, moved on, and I'm
23 teaching other young officers how not to make the same
24 mistake. And then I look at the current state. I looked
25 at what he's done since he's been a supervisor from

1 sergeant, not captain or lieutenant. What did he do as a
2 sergeant when he first got the stripes?

3 He's been a great leader and a great mentor to many.
4 He's connected with a lot of our captains and commanders.
5 Our Assistant Chief and AC Fitzgerald speaks very highly
6 of him, and meets with him constantly. Was very firm on
7 the recommendation. We knew that we could hit a bump in
8 the road with it, with the body. But we talked about who
9 he is and how we would both stand firm on who he is. So I
10 make this recommendation with pride, knowing that he has
11 been disciplined a while ago; quite a while ago as a
12 young officer in the department running and Gunning. And
13 he recognizes that he could do things better than he has.

14 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: I don't know if you've seen
15 the report that we have, and this might be able to help
16 me. The numbers in front, does that represent the year
17 that the incident was investigated?

18 CI WARFIELD: Through the Chair, I'm not familiar
19 with...

20 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Within the document of the
21 promotional candidate summary do provide that under the
22 force investigation complaints where it says case number,
23 then it says FI, then it provides the number 11-019. I'm
24 wondering if that first number can help me to identify
25 the year that this happened, because, again, to the

1 Chief's point, it would be encouraging to know that this
2 happened some time ago. But there isn't a year.

3 CI WARFIELD: Through The Chair, that is the year.

4 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Okay. Thank you. That's
5 helpful. No further
6 questions.

7 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Any further questions? Go ahead.

8 COMMISSIONER SMITH: Through the Chair. I've had an
9 opportunity of working with Dunning through a community
10 engagement specialist with Ceasefire Detroit, as well as
11 being a mentor with the Sisterhood program that derived
12 from you and Brotherhood. I think you do an outstanding
13 job. You're an amazing officer and congratulations.

14 LT. DUNNING: Thank you.

15 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Absolutely. I had had the
16 opportunity to speak with the Brotherhood, and I've seen
17 him work in this community tirelessly. So the redemption
18 is real with this young man. And it's been far past. He
19 has paid his dues in terms of serving his community and
20 loving on these young people and people who have been in
21 gang infested situations, being able to work with them,
22 and have gone inside the juvenile detention facility to
23 talk with them on his own time and on his own dime to be
24 able to make sure they have services there with them, to
25 work with those young people. So, I deeply admire that of

1 you, young man. And I would say, all in favor say, aye.

2 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

3 Anyone opposed? The motion carries. Congratulations.
4 Captain, have you anything to say?

5 CAPTAIN DUNNING: Through the Chair, I want to say
6 thank you to the board. Thank you to the Chief of Police,
7 thank you to the executive staff for appointment to the
8 rank of Captain. I want to ensure the board I will lead
9 with integrity and ensure the safety and services to our
10 community. Again, thank you.

11 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Absolutely.

12 CHIEF WHITE: Alright, moving on to Lieutenant Stacy
13 Greer-Travis. Lieutenant Stacy Greer-Travis was appointed
14 to the Detroit Police Department on January 26th, 1998.
15 After completing the Detroit Police Metropolitan Training
16 Academy, Officer Travis was assigned to the Eighth
17 Precinct Patrol Operations. During her tenure, she has
18 worked for Patrol Operations, Eighth Precinct, Tenth
19 Precinct. And aside from Patrol Operations, Officer
20 Travis also worked at the Office of the Chief of Police
21 and Internal Controls. Officer Travis was exposed to a
22 variety of patrol, investigative, and administrative
23 duties. Overall, Officer Travis has acquired a wide range
24 of skills. One of the things this board will know is she
25 spent the overwhelming majority of her time in an

1 enforcement capacity. She did do some [unclear55:27] at
2 IA. She also did work advice but you will note that as a
3 supervisor she consistently works patrol. On December
4 22nd, 2010, Police Officer Travis was promoted to the
5 rank of sergeant. She was assigned to Southwestern
6 District.

7 Sergeant Travis also served as a supervisor at
8 TechOps, and an administrative supervisor at CIB, which
9 is the Criminal Investigation Bureau, is forced in the
10 role of Officer in Charge of a Vice Unit. She coordinated
11 undercover operations and ensured that her team adhered
12 to the legal and ethical standards. During her
13 investigations advice. On July 8th, 2017, Sergeant Travis
14 was promoted to the rank of lieutenant and was sent to
15 the Fifth Precinct where she served at the office in
16 charge of the third Platoon, afternoons. She also served
17 as a dep supervisor for communications, responsible 911
18 operators and dispatchers and telephone crime reporting.
19 And here, she's done a little of everything. Further,
20 Lieutenant Travis has served as the driver of the Second
21 Precinct of Operations, in the Cease Fire Unit and
22 Firearm Training as the AIC. So she worked at Firearm
23 Training. Then it goes back to the Officer in Charge of
24 the Second Precinct, Cease Fire Unit. And now she's
25 currently, which is not only here at the Tenth Precinct.

1 Correct me if I'm wrong.

2 LT. TRAVIS: Yes and Special Op.

3 CHIEF WHITE: And she's a special officer as well.

4 Leading, as I indicated earlier, very high profile cases
5 to the most violent of the violent and she's going with
6 distinction. She's a graduate of the University of
7 Phoenix. She holds a bachelor's degree in criminal
8 justice and a certificate from the Michael Ilitch School
9 of Business. (Audio Unclear) Her business acronym
10 provides her the skills necessary to manage resources and
11 personnel effectively. She is a person that people talk
12 to the officers about, but direction in the leadership
13 certainly being at the forefront of special operations
14 with the amount of time that she had on the job really
15 serves as a beacon for those who are on patrol to get
16 promoted. So it is with great pride that I make her
17 recommendation to that of captain.

18 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: What is the pleasure of this
19 board.

20 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: So moved.

21 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Support.

22 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Moved by Commissioner Hernandez,
23 supported by Commissioner Bernard.

24 COMMISSIONERS: All in favor?

25 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

1 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Any discussion? Congratulations.

2 We got a vote. Yeah. All in favor?

3 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

4 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Any opposed? The motion is
5 carried.

6 CAPTAIN TRAVIS: Chief, I just want to say to you,
7 thank you so much for having the confidence in me that
8 I'll be able to move a step further with the department.
9 Also to the board, I would like to say thank you for
10 giving me this opportunity, and I will not let you down.

11 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you.

12 CHIEF WHITE: All right. We're getting good in here
13 on these. Recommendation to rank a captain for Lieutenant
14 Scott Pellerito. Lieutenant Scott Pellerito was appointed
15 to the Detroit Police Department, September 27th, 1999.
16 Police Officer Pellerito was assigned to Special
17 Operations. After completing a duty department, following
18 the police academy, Officer Pellerito was assigned to the
19 Eastern District, where he further honed his skills and
20 into operations, crime, sustained investigations and
21 public relations. On November 25th, 2013, Officer
22 Pellerito was promoted to sergeant, assigned to the
23 Seventh Precinct and Special Operations. Sergeant
24 Pellerito was designated as the precinct's Admin
25 Sergeant, overseeing records management and compliance

1 with the department's policies. It should be noted, that
2 was the time that we were right in that consent judgment,
3 (Audio Not Clear) He also was responsible for the overall
4 supervision of the patrol at the same precinct. On May
5 2nd, 2022, Master Sergeant Pellerito was promoted to
6 lieutenant and was assigned to Crime Scene Services. So,
7 again, on May 2nd, 2022, Master Sergeant Pellerito gets
8 promoted to lieutenant, and is assigned to the Officer in
9 Charge crime scene services. As commanding officer of
10 Crime Scene Services, where he came to my attention. So
11 we looked for leadership across the department. One of
12 the things that I saw in Lieutenant Pellerito, at Crime
13 Scene Services is that we have a huge number of civilians
14 that don't get the respect, that don't feel that they get
15 the respect that they deserve. And that comes from just
16 really a lack of access to command, lack of access to me
17 and perception is reality for the perceiver. They didn't
18 feel cared about. They didn't feel that their needs were
19 being met and had a very sensitive and important job. It
20 was his courage that came to me and said, hey, chief,
21 this is what we need for this operation.

22 He puts in various requests for equipment, noting
23 alliance needed, noting that his people needed to get
24 their jobs done. Morale was an issue there. He has not
25 only sustained morale, but we've seen less turnover since

1 we've been there. He's done just amazing work. And that's
2 the heck of a leader we want to impact this department;
3 unafraid to bring bad news to the chief. And not just
4 shake your head, yes. I asked a question, sometimes the
5 answer's no. And so I appreciate that about him, and ask
6 that he continues to do that. And I'm confident that he
7 will. Lieutenant Pellerito earned a Bachelor's of
8 Business Administration in diversity in leadership and
9 public service from Cleary University. Lieutenant
10 Pellerito has also earned an Esteem Management
11 certificate from Cleary University, and he is also a
12 graduate of Michael Ilitch, Wayne State School of
13 Business. He also has a degree in organizational
14 leadership from Wayne State, which is also phenomenal.
15 With that, I proudly recommend his position to captain.

16 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: What is the pleasure of this board?

17 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHÉ: Support.

18 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Second.

19 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: It was moved by Commissioner
20 Dewaelsche, and second by Commissioner Bernard. Any
21 discussion? Yes, sir.

22 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Yeah. Through the Chair,
23 just very quickly. Between the range of 2006 to as early
24 as 2019, there are a number of use of force incidents
25 that occurred. Is there any more insight that you might

1 be able to articulate in terms of your decision making?

2 CHIEF WHITE: Yes. I looked at those, and I looked at
3 the outcomes as well. And the assignments that he had at
4 the time. It was more that I would've liked to have seen.
5 But looking at the leadership, where he worked, a couple
6 of those were complaints against a number of people,
7 including him. I have no concerns that I saw as an
8 outlier. Again, talking to both AC Fitzgerald, and AC
9 Ewing; AC Ewing, having had personal interaction with him
10 a number of times I asked about his personality, his
11 character, his demeanor. He highlighted one particular
12 incident where a coaching situation occurred at the
13 Eleventh Precinct that was positive in my interview with
14 Lieutenant Pellerito. He brought that incident up himself
15 about what I thought was really positive, that he
16 recognized that as a coaching moment, took it as such and
17 moved forward. Talking to the people that work for him.
18 Many of them said to me, please don't promote him. I'm
19 like, oh God, what did he do? They said, we don't want to
20 lose them. And so that's always something positive to be
21 here. So I have no concerns.

22 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Thank you.

23 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Any further discussion? All in
24 favor say, aye.

25 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

1 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Anyone oppose? The motion is
2 carried. Congratulations.

3 CAPTAIN PELLERITO: Through the Chair. I just want to
4 thank you guys for the confidence. And Chief, thank you
5 so much for the opportunity. I promise not to let you or
6 the executive team down.

7 CHIEF WHITE: Thank you. Okay.

8 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. So if we can slide the
9 bundle of these lieutenants, you know, if everyone reads
10 everything, if anything stands out, you know, or we can
11 discuss it between, if we can bundle those up, we can go
12 for that.

13 CHIEF WHITE: I think I can get the board to where we
14 want to be.

15 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Alright. Thank you.

16 CHIEF WHITE: Alright. Moving on to the rank of
17 lieutenant. In order to maintain operational efficiency,
18 I'm requesting to fill the open budgeted positions to
19 which motion from the rank to lieutenant is requested for
20 following members.

21 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: When he calls your name.

22 CHIEF WHITE: Sergeant Aaron Yopp. Sergeant Donald
23 Covington, Sergeant McDaniel, Sergeant Jason Burke,
24 Sergeant Christina Dunbar, and Sergeant Craig Pomaville.

25 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Are they here? Come on up. I

1 guess the rest of them didn't want it, man.

2 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Which one is, Sorry. Thank
3 you.

4 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. All right. Go ahead, Chief.

5 CHIEF WHITE: I have reviewed their eligibility for
6 promotion to lieutenant. This bill opens positions. What
7 the board will note is that one lieutenant in particular
8 position will take place after the position is vacated by
9 a member who has put in their retirement paperwork. That
10 person will be falling off the books of law in a week. So
11 he will be delayed. The last one is starting ironically
12 one clear, Sergeant Craig Pomaville. But he will attend
13 an LPAC as scheduled.

14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Alright. Are we done?

15 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Motion for approval of the
16 recommendations as stated by the Chief.

17 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Motion made by Commissioner
18 Bernard to approve. Second by Commissioner Moore.

19 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Yes.

20 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes. Any discussion? All in favor
21 say, aye.

22 COMMISSIONERS: Aye. Any oppose? The motion is
23 carried. Congratulations. Congratulations.

24 MALE SPEAKER: Thank you. The board. Thank you.

25 CHIEF WHITE: No, I'm going to use this.

1 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: So does anyone in Section D stand
2 out for anyone? You know, just let it be known, but you
3 can go ahead, Chief.

4 CHIEF WHITE: Alright. Recommendation to the rank of
5 sergeant as previously discussed, and the reasoning for
6 promotion to lieutenant. The promotion from police
7 officer, corporal, or detective to the rank of sergeant
8 is requested for the following members. Detective Markala
9 Moore to Sergeant, Detective Whitney Willis to Sergeant
10 Detective Andre Camp to Sergeant, Police Officer Tyrell
11 Jones to Sergeant, Police Officer. Detective William
12 Farber to Sergeant. Police Officer Jeremy Parrinell to
13 Sergeant, Detective Lauren Adams to Sergeant, Detective
14 Michael McKivens to Sergeant, Police Officer Justin
15 Matthews to Sergeant, Police Officer Adams Szlarski to
16 Sergeant, Detective James Ande to Sergeant, Corporal
17 Anthony Carrion to Sergeant, Police Officer Robert Beach
18 to Sergeant, Detective Terrance Warner to Sergeant
19 Police. Officer Victoria Riley to Sergeant Police.
20 Officer Dajuan Smith to Sergeant. The board will note
21 that I make these recommendations proudly and think that
22 they are a position to lead and supervise this
23 department.

24 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Are you guys here? Any of
25 you here? Oh, for real. COMMISSIONER MOORE: Mr. Chair, I

1 have a question. Chief, was there ever a special
2 conference with some of these folks up for promotion with
3 the union? I'm just curious.

4 CHIEF WHITE: I did not have a special conference
5 with them. Oh, wait a minute. Was there a special
6 conference?

7 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you.

8 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. All right. What is the
9 pleasure of the board?

10 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I move the approval of these
11 candidates. Some of the information, of course, as you
12 know, Chief is a little sketchy. But I have confidence in
13 your ability to make those decisions. And I also firmly
14 believe in the fact that if you're going to lead a team,
15 you get to pick your team. So therefore any other
16 reservations?

17 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: You move for approval. Second by
18 Commissioner Hernandez. Any discussion?

19 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: I would like to remove from
20 the bundle Police Officer, Jeremy Parrinell.

21 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. So, is there a second to
22 that motion?

23 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Well, it doesn't need a
24 second.

25 DR. JACKSON: There's no second required to remove

1 someone from the bundle.

2 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Chair.

3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes.

4 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I would like to ask our chief
5 investigator what names that you like to see removed
6 since your office has already done some batting?

7 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: He's not commissioner. It is the
8 commissioners who make that decision. And it would be,
9 ill-advised for him to make that statement public

10 COMMISSIONER BURTON: But it could be his expertise
11 from his office and his position that he stands as Chief
12 Investigator is definitely entitled to making a
13 recommendation to this board. And so, therefore, his
14 opinion would definitely be...

15 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Commissioner. We've been properly
16 advised. We have been sent materials from the Chief
17 Investigator's Office. And it is up to us to scrutinize
18 these documents and to make whatever decision that we are
19 going to make. I hear what you're saying, but the
20 information has been provided, and so we have to move on.
21 So state the officer's name that is to be removed from
22 that batch.

23 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Police Officer Jeremy
24 Parrinell. I think I'm saying that right.

25 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. All right. So Parrinell is

1 removed from that batch. Parrinell is removed from that
2 batch with the displeasure of the board.

3 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Excuse me, I don't understand
4 the removal process.

5 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Well, that's what...

6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Made a recommendation to us, a
7 whole group of people. I understand us having an
8 individual objection to someone, but I don't understand
9 how that person is therefore removed.

10 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Well, we would deal with that
11 separately.

12 DR. JACKSON: So you want me to explain, Mr.
13 Chairman?

14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes.

15 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you.

16 DR. JACKSON: When you have a motion to adopt a
17 bundle of names, as the motion would be for whatever
18 number of names that there are, you're basically saying,
19 instead of having seven individual motions to adopt the
20 recommendation that you're going to adopt these seven
21 names with one motion. Now, what Robert says is, that's
22 fine, but if one person wants to remove a particular
23 name, they can do so without requiring a second, or at
24 that point, providing an explanation. So, at this point,
25 any commissioner can say, I want to remove so and so from

1 the bundle. And what you then are left to do is to move
2 adoption of who remains in the bundle and to adopt a
3 recommendation. Once you've done that, then you go back
4 to the person who has been removed from the bundle, and
5 that whoever removed that name from the bundle must be
6 prepared to, now you'll still need the motion to adopt a
7 recommendation, but then at that point, whoever removed
8 the name from the bundle must be prepared to discuss what
9 their reasons are for doing so.

10 So you're taking one motion and saying, we're going
11 to adopt all these people with one motion. And someone
12 says, no, not person A, and they have the right to remove
13 that person. You then go ahead and complete the motion
14 for all those who remain in the bundle. Then you go back
15 to the person who was not approved, move adoption of the
16 recommendation. And then the person who removed that
17 person from the bundle can speak in debate as to why they
18 wanted that name removed.

19 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: So then we vote that name
20 individually.

21 COMMISSIONER: Correct.

22 DR. JACKSON: You will vote on that name
23 individually.

24 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you.

25 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yep. So what Parrinell... What's

1 their name?

2 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Jeremy Parrinell.

3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Jeremy Parrinell is removed from
4 that batch. With him removed from the batch, all in favor
5 signify by saying aye.

6 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

7 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Any opposed?

8 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Sustained opposed.

9 DR. JACKSON: Mr. Chairman, are you moving adoption
10 of the remaining names at this point?

11 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes.

12 DR. JACKSON: Okay. I wasn't clear, because you're
13 not moving adoption of the removal. You're moving
14 adoption of the police recommendation for the others.
15 Okay, sir, thank you very much for that clarification.

16 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Absolutely. Being that it was an
17 extension, two extensions, do we need a roll call or, but
18 I think the majority, there are two as extensions. Do we
19 need a roll call?

20 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: It is your decision.

21 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Roll call, vote. And I don't
22 think an extension is... Madam Parliamentarian, can we
23 abstain?

24 DR. JACKSON: The law department has given the
25 opinion that an abstention is a no vote. That's the law

1 department's written opinion. The parliamentarian do not
2 agree with that, but that's what the law department has
3 given.

4 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I don't agree either.

5 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Mr. Secretary.

6 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Chairperson Wood - Yes.

7 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Vice Chairperson Smith - Yes.

8 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Commissioner Bernard - I'll
9 approve the rest of them, yes. But I want to come back to
10 this.

11 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Commissioner Bell - Yes.

12 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Commissioner Burton -.

13 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Commissioner Burton? We move to
14 the next.

15 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Commissioner Hernandez - Yes.

16 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Commissioner Moore - Abstain.

17 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Commissioner Dewaelsche -
18 Yes.

19 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Commissioner Pressley - Yes.

20 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. So the motion is approved.
21 And so do we go straight into the objection or the one
22 that we've removed?

23 DR. JACKSON: You need a motion to adopt the
24 recommendation. And then during debate, the individual
25 who moved the name would be speaking first as to why they

1 wanted that name removed.

2 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Commissioner Pressley.

3 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Through the Chair.

4 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: I'm not, excuse me.

5 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Could we first congratulate
6 the officer?

7 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah. Oh, absolutely not. Still
8 alive. Phenomenal brother too. He's phenomenal.

9 CHIEF WHITE: And I would like to know for the board
10 that Police Officer Joseph Malouf who was not included in
11 that group. I am contractually obligated to promote him
12 in looking at the contract and looking at the collective
13 bargaining agreement, the terms of the agreement
14 necessitates that I submit his name. And that's Police
15 Officer Joseph Malouf. As Chief, I have concerns,
16 significant concerns. But absent anything beyond that, I
17 cannot exercise any authority. No overrides his
18 contractual rights to a promotion. Okay.

19 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Through the Chair?

20 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir. And Chief, that's why I
21 was asking about the special conference to see if it was
22 some conversation you had regarding some concerns you
23 might have had, but you answered it.

24 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes. And so what is the pleasure
25 of the board?

1 COMMISSIONER BELL: Chairman, we have been down the
2 road before, and the Chief is correct, in reference to
3 the contract. We should honor that. In terms we have no
4 choice. Past practice.

5 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes. What's the pleasure of the
6 board?

7 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: To act in accordance with the
8 contract.

9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Where do you stand?

10 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: What the Chief has
11 recommended, we will follow, I recommend that we accept
12 the determination and recommendation of Chief White.

13 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes. Excuse me, Mr. Secretary,

14 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: You still haven't satisfied
15 the removal of one of the...

16 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah. So let's deal with that
17 first, and then we'll come to that. All right? Yep. Go
18 ahead, commissioner.

19 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: I'm not going to make a
20 motion because I'm objecting to it. So again, when
21 discussion comes, that gives me the opportunity to
22 suggest why I am not so someone who is in favor of the
23 chief recommendation to promote Police Officer Jeremy
24 Parrinell to the rank of Sergeant and make that motion.

25 COMMISSIONER BELL: So move.

1 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Second.

2 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Motion made by Commissioner Bell,
3 second by Commissioner Bernard. Discussion?

4 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: If so, I truly recognize that
5 there is very little authority that the board has to
6 serve what has already been contractually agreed to. But
7 I do think that it's important with my vote, you know, to
8 state my position in this regard. And, you know, as
9 stated earlier, you know, I do pay attention to the
10 timing and recognize that both happen. But there are a
11 number of incidences on the candidate summary that are
12 relatively recent, that are pretty alarming. And that's
13 inclusive of Internal Affairs investigation, as well as,
14 conduct that has been deemed to be unbecoming of a police
15 officer heard as early as 2020. And then not to mention
16 the number of abusive incidents forces, which I recognize
17 that in a tenure in the police department might be, you
18 know, a high number before my preference is just, just
19 too high. And so, for those reasons, I cannot support the
20 Chief's recommendation for this promotion.

21 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Any further discussion?

22 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Does the Chief have any
23 comments?

24 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: I'm sure he doesn't. I share the
25 sentiments of my colleague. I would not put my name on

1 this, you know and there are too many alarming things
2 there. And so, roll call vote?

3 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Yes. Commissioner Woods - No.

4 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Vice Chair Smith - No.

5 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Commissioner Bernard -
6 Abstain.

7 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Commissioner Bell - Yes.

8 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Commissioner Burton - No.

9 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Commissioner Moore - No.

10 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Commissioner Hernandez - No.

11 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Commissioner Pressley - No.

12 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Commissioner Dewaelsche -
13 Abstain.

14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: So it doesn't go past. So Malouf;
15 what is your pleasure? Police Officer Malouf to the rank
16 of sergeant, what is your pleasure?

17 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: It's recommended by the
18 Chief's Office, right?

19 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Reluctantly.

20 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Okay. Well, I move the
21 approval. It's consistent with the contract. It doesn't
22 make sense for us to pay lawyers and foreign arbitration
23 for something that's going to happen anyway. I mean it...

24 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Motion made by Commissioner Bell.

25 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: You have to obey our

1 contracts.

2 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Second by Commissioner Bernard.

3 Any discussion?

4 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Roll call please.

5 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: I do have discussion. Just

6 so, again, so for the

7 public's information, again the candidate summary,

8 you know, possesses some very

9 questionable and concerning behavior as recent as

10 2023 and 2024. And so again looking at these things that

11 are on the record I can't, in good conscience, support

12 this promotion.

13 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: I judge; I'm going to mess up my

14 colleague. This is too alarming for me to approve. So any

15 other comments? No further comments. Roll call vote.

16 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Chairperson Woods - No.

17 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Vice Chairperson Smith - No.

18 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Commissioner Bernard - I just

19 saw this. Hold on a minute. I'll abstain. I'm not

20 prepared to vote, yes.

21 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Commissioner Burton - No.

22 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Commissioner Bell - Yes.

23 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Commissioner Moore - No.

24 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Commissioner Pressley - No.

25 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Commissioner Hernandez - No.

1 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Commissioner Dewaelsche: -

2 No.

3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: So if it fails with us, you know,
4 and Chief.

5 CHIEF WHITE: Noted, I have noted both of those and
6 they will not move forward. But as his body is well aware
7 it will now move likely to an arbitration decision from
8 here, but they will not move forward.

9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir.

10 CHIEF WHITE: Finally, recommendations to the rank of
11 detective have previously been discussed in my reasoning
12 for promotion to lieutenant and sergeant promotion to
13 police officer or corporal to the rank of the detective,
14 who is requested for the below members. And note that
15 these members come to my recommendation. Police Officer
16 Kellie Patillo, Police Officer Alanna Flint, Police
17 Officer Lindsey Rogan, Police Officer Brendan Brown,
18 Police officer Roman Kozak, Police Officer Angela
19 Podgoski, Police Officer Eric Dudley, Police Officer
20 Terence Barron or Barone, Police Officer Erica Smith,
21 Police Officer, I can't do the first or last name.

22 MS. UNDERWOOD: Elpidio Sancen.

23 CHIEF WHITE: Sanon Hanson. Thank you. Police Officer
24 Chase Malloy, Police Officer Jonathan Glowacki, Police
25 Officer Dana Ford, Police Officer Shannon Bullock, Police

1 Officer James Reeves. The board will also note that there
2 are at least two members that I went on the sequence
3 where the contract allowed me to skip based on their
4 previous performance. So it was not sequential with the
5 list. I skipped it because of their disciplinary history.
6 However, i.e. Police Officer Larry Jenkins, who you'll
7 find in your list, I am contractually obligated to
8 promote did not meet the threshold for me to skip as I
9 skip the other two. And as I am obligated to endorse that
10 individual, you will see him noted on the recommendation.

11 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Would this please this board? Do
12 we want to separate Jenkins out of the batch?

13 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Point of information, about
14 the parliamentarian, is it appropriate to remove from the
15 bundle prior to a motion?

16 DR. JACKSON: I'm getting some feedback when you're
17 speaking. So I didn't completely hear the question. I'm
18 sorry, Mr. Commissioner,

19 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: I'll ask again. Through the
20 Chair, your acting secretary requires your attention.

21 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Mr. Chair. Mr. Jenkins is
22 already removed from that bundle.

23 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay.

24 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: And so, Madam
25 Parliamentarian, my question was, is it appropriate to

1 remove from the bundle prior to a motion being made?

2 DR. JACKSON: Yes, sir.

3 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Okay. I would like to remove
4 from the bundle Police Officer Eric Smith.

5 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. So Jenkins is already
6 separated and Eric Smith is removed from the batch.

7 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Mr. Chair, through the Chair,
8 I make a motion to accept the Chief's recommendation to
9 promote to the rank of detective those officers named
10 with the exception of the ones removed from the bundle.

11 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Support.

12 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: The motion was made by
13 Commissioner Pressley, second by Commissioner Dewaelsche.
14 All in favor say, aye.

15 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

16 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Any discussion?

17 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Concern.

18 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Anyone opposed? Okay.
19 Opposed? No. Okay.

20 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I abstain too.

21 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Mr. Chair, I don't know if
22 you've heard this opposition here from Commissioner
23 Burton.

24 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: You vote no. Give us a roll call
25 vote.

1 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Chairperson Woods - Yes.

2 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Vice Chairperson Smith - Yes.

3 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: I'm sorry, Mr. Chair. The
4 roll call vote is for removing Eric Smith.

5 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Well, not for the removal; to
6 accept all of them, you know. COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE:
7 Thank you.

8 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yep. We continue on. Mr.
9 Secretary.

10 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Commissioner Bernard - Yes.

11 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Commissioner Bell - Yes.

12 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Commissioner Burton -
13 Abstain.

14 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Commissioner Moore - Abstain.

15 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Commissioner Hernandez - Yes.

16 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Commissioner Pressley - Yes.

17 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Commissioner Dewaelsche -
18 Yes.

19 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. So the eyes have it.
20 Congratulations.

21 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Congratulations.

22 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Congratulations.

23 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Any motion as it relates to Eric,
24 was it Eric Smith?

25 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Yes.

1 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: What is your pleasure, as to Eric
2 Smith?

3 DR. JACKSON: You need a motion to accept the
4 recommendation, then you can discuss it.

5 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah, that's why I'm waiting on a
6 motion.

7 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: I entertain a motion?

8 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: There's no motion to accept
9 it.

10 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: So, there's no motion to accept
11 Eric Smith? Is there a motion to accept Larry Jenkins?
12 There appears not to be a motion to accept Larry Jenkins.
13 Is this final? Alright. No motion to accept Larry
14 Jenkins. Chief?

15 CHIEF WHITE: Again, he will not be moving to the
16 training portion for promotion. I will not promote based
17 on this board. But we know that the operation decision
18 will come back. We will testify to the operation. As to
19 the concerns that not only this board has, but I have, I
20 will say this, just regardless of the arbitration
21 decision, we have a responsibility to provide excellence
22 in policing to this community. They will all be held to a
23 standard. I will express my concerns to them. I will
24 express my concerns to their supervisor. And if they
25 don't meet the one-year evaluation, then there will be a

1 recommendation to take them from those provisions,
2 despite what the arbitrator may find. And not to do
3 anything to compromise the arbitrator's decision. But
4 they have to meet the standards of their new position.
5 And if they do not, that will be independent of the
6 arbitrator's decision. It'll be documented and we'll be
7 able to defend it if they don't meet the standards. That
8 includes customer service, that includes their ability to
9 interact with our community without getting this
10 exorbitant number of citizens' complaints. That includes
11 personal conduct, as I'm sure the board has seen, at
12 least with two of the members. They're outside of our
13 activity or outside of the work activity. That's
14 concerning, is a work activity.

15 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Through the Chair.

16 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir.

17 COMMISSIONER MOORE: And Chief, I don't know if this
18 question is for you or if it is for a corporation Counsel
19 Mallet, but why would you all lock you all ourselves in
20 so tight with the collective bargaining agreement that it
21 says about discipline?

22 CHIEF WHITE: Well, I don't know if it's locked in
23 tight. I think, you know, you look at where they started
24 and there has been a lot of expansion of that. Not a lot,
25 but some you know. I think what we've learned is that

1 really the conduct that occurs to prevent them from
2 taking the test, is not after they take it. And that's
3 where the restrictions are. It has to be a certain
4 threshold. It has to be met quickly. They're not allowed
5 to be promoted, which is what we met on a couple of them
6 that you don't even see before you, but you'll probably
7 be hearing from them soon. But to your point Commissioner
8 Moore, I think we should have done a better job on the
9 front end to keep them from taking the test. We've got
10 some room to do that now with this new contract. Nothing
11 dramatically different than the old contract. We are just
12 going to follow it now.

13 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you.

14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah. Thank you for your moral
15 clarity in this and thank you for your leadership. And
16 you know, we have an obligation to the citizens of the
17 City of Detroit that we make sure that we put out a great
18 product, you know, and we see what's going on around the
19 country, and we have to continue to prevent that from
20 happening in the City of Detroit. And thank you for your
21 constitutional excellence in this space.

22 CHIEF WHITE: Thank you very much. And thank you to
23 this body for these promotions. I appreciate it.

24 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Absolutely.

25 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair.

1 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir.

2 COMMISSIONER BURTON: You know, I just wanted to just
3 add that it is very important that the board play a part,
4 and an important role, and going forward with the
5 collective bargaining, conversations, because the board
6 has to have a presence there if we are going to be in
7 charge of police oversight. And so this is something to
8 note.

9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: That's an excellent point. I
10 think we had announcements or oral communications.

11 MS. UNDERWOOD: Thank you, Mr. Chair. We have Ms.
12 Demetrius Robinson here in the room, and then we'll go
13 onto Zoom.

14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Thank you. Number one. Make
15 sure they keep the time.

16 MS. UNDERWOOD: It's up there.

17 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: It's up there. Oh, thank you.

18 MS. ROBINSON: Good afternoon.

19 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Good afternoon.

20 MS. ROBINSON: My name is Mrs. Robinson. I am...

21 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Microphone, please.

22 MS. ROBINSON: Good afternoon. My name is Demetrius
23 Robinson. I'm the voice of my deceased daughter. And I
24 thank you for bringing to attention that the detectives
25 are not reaching out to the families. On December 31st,

1 2022, my daughter was murdered. The police, for some
2 reason, are addressing it as a suicide. When the medical
3 examiner put evidence that said homicide, we were
4 shuffled around. We have been pushed around. I had a
5 detective stay on the phone with me until midnight,
6 asking me was I the murderer? I had the police come to my
7 home with their guns drawn on me, accusing me of
8 kidnapping my granddaughter. There's no justice in
9 justice. So I'm hoping that we can get some type of
10 results, that they have enough evidence.

11 And I was told this by several detectives who
12 arrested the man who had done it to my daughter, in the
13 same home that she was murdered in. A few weeks later, a
14 homeless man was murdered and hung from the basement with
15 a dog collar. I just need justice from my daughter's
16 surviving 7-year-old daughter. This was my firstborn of
17 eight. And I just need something. I'm tired of... I have
18 a daughter that had to run out of State because my
19 granddaughter is in danger and my daughter's voice. We
20 have been beating up the pavement, doing the job of the
21 police, and it's been shuffled around too long for us not
22 to get anything. "So, we'll get back with you next week,"
23 and next week, don't come. So that's why I'm going to be
24 here. And I'm not going anywhere until I hear something
25 about my deceased daughter, Shante Wallace was a voice

1 that needs to be heard, and I'm speaking for her because
2 she was brutally murdered on New Year's Eve. So please,
3 please help me as best you can. I'm just a mother trying.
4 Thank you.

5 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, ma'am. And if you stand
6 there, I know your daughter is on the line too. And we
7 did bridge that gap with her in Homicide yesterday. She
8 should have gotten a call from the lieutenant on the
9 case. And I don't want to share online or whatever, you
10 know, because this is a very sensitive situation. But I
11 did hear from your daughter the other day and I went to
12 Homicide personally and got that information to them, you
13 know, and so we are just going to continue to pray that
14 it'd be expeditiously resolved. We just have to pray over
15 it. But we did bridge that gap and you will get ongoing
16 communication. And so we see what the State has to say. I
17 know that she's online because she texted me. And can you
18 speak to her as well, DC Sloan?

19 DC SLOAN: Through the Chair. Deputy Chief Carrie
20 Sloan. Ma'am, I'm over the detective bureau and I have
21 Commander Rebecca McKay, who's in the audience. She's
22 going to take you aside and speak with you personally,
23 right there, just so you know.

24 MS. ROBINSON: Thank you.

25 DC SLOAN: Your welcome.

1 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: And then lastly, did you
2 share any communication with detectives at midnight that
3 something was said to you, you're found to be
4 inappropriate. Now, that might be within their function
5 and as a detective, ask those questions. But if you feel
6 that it went across the line of appropriateness then we
7 can definitely follow up with an assistance and claim
8 report as well.

9 MS. ROBINSON: Thank you so much. Thank you all.

10 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yep. Alright. Next person.

11 MS. UNDERWOOD: Ms. Bernice Smith.

12 MS. SMITH: I'm going to be very brief today because
13 I have an appointment, but I want to tell you, and I wish
14 the Chief was here. I'm going to Chicago and I'm going to
15 speak in regard... That's my hometown, in case you guys
16 don't know it. I was born and raised there. But I'm going
17 to tell them about my police department here in the City
18 of Detroit. I was very active in politics there in 1955.
19 So I'm still keeping up with some of my friends there,
20 but I just want to let them know what kind of police
21 department that we have here in the City of Detroit. And
22 I'm going to be bragging about my so and so off. Because
23 I do believe in our police department. I'm down there at
24 Greektown on the weekends, and I survey what our police
25 are doing down there, and they're doing a hell of a good

1 job. They know me, and I tell them all the time to be
2 safe down here because you are taking care of the City of
3 Detroit.

4 So, wish me luck when I go and talk to them and tell
5 them what a hell of a police department that we have here
6 in the City of Detroit. I know we have crime just like
7 everybody else, but compared to last month when I was
8 down in Memphis, we don't even come near those people
9 down there. So I'm just telling you, I'm going to talk
10 about you and I'm going to tell the truth. We do have
11 some, you know, we do have some false with our
12 department, but in all the years that I've been here in
13 the City of Detroit and dealt with the police since '73
14 when Coleman Young was the mayor, I think I'm doing a
15 good job in saying that our police department is the
16 best. And those that are on this board that don't give
17 credit to our police department, you need to pray, and
18 consider yourself lucky to be in the City of Detroit. I
19 thank you very much.

20 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you.

21 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair.

22 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir.

23 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I just wanted to add that it'd
24 be nice if you can also talk about the community
25 participation and how they plug into the Police Board of

1 Commissioners meeting, and how they express policy
2 concern issues when involved in oversight, which is the
3 board's primary duties. And so this is always good to
4 share that too, because we wouldn't be an elected
5 commissioners body, as well as those that are appointed
6 were filed with the community, echoing for a charter
7 change, which some of us came on, and because of the 2012
8 charter change you have Commissioner Bell and myself,
9 Commissioner Moore, and Carter, they came on because of
10 the charter change. We remember when there was a five-
11 member commission board. So now you have, those are
12 elected and those are appointed, which makes it a very
13 unique board across the country.

14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Thank you. Great point.

15 MS. UNDERWOOD: Mr. Foster.

16 MR. FOSTER: Good evening.

17 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Good evening.

18 MR. FOSTER: And through the board, first, I wanted
19 to just come down and say transparency. I'm very grateful
20 that you guys are asking the right questions and making
21 efforts to keep our community a lot safer from not just
22 criminals, but from police as well. I think that's
23 important that you guys are taking that stance. Secondly,
24 I want to encourage you all to do a little more to bridge
25 the gaps within our community. And what I mean by bridge

1 the gaps, it's not just being visible, but really helping
2 change the perspective and how we all conduct ourselves
3 and interact and engage with our community. Our youth,
4 whether we know it or not, they are big and are craving
5 for engagement, they're craving for positive engagement.
6 You know, they don't want to have the fear or anxiety of
7 police encounters.

8 And those are things that we personally could work
9 on and change their perspectives and how we encounter our
10 youth. Thirdly, I know it was a sad situation with the
11 sheriffs here, but I'm personally, asking this board to
12 create policies that anybody going to any police
13 district, should stop and check in with the watch
14 commander or the duty supervisor, regardless of whatever
15 positions that they're going in the city, it is very
16 important. That nobody is running around our city rouge,
17 and trying to enact or enforce laws, while simultaneously
18 breaking laws. The color of law, color of State is real.
19 You cannot put on a uniform and enforce and enact
20 anything outside of your jurisdiction or by any other
21 means. And lastly crime victims have a right. MCO section
22 780.766 highlights everything that our victims have
23 rights to. Let's do a better job in giving them their
24 rights. Thank you.

25 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you. Next speaker.

1 MS. UNDERWOOD: We're going into Zoom. Election
2 Integrity Roo.

3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: You may be heard.

4 ELECTION INTEGRITY ROO: Can you hear me clearly,
5 Darryl Woods?

6 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir.

7 ELECTION INTEGRITY ROO: Last week, Commissioner
8 Bernard was about to make a request to subpoena the
9 Michigan State Police report about Kaniesha's death, but
10 Nene wants what she wants? I'm going to tell everybody
11 this whole city, you're in the way now, man; you're in
12 the way. Get out of the way, because me and Nene are
13 coming through. Now, there's no way that Kaniesha, a
14 left-handed individual, took a 9 millimeter weapon and
15 shot herself in the left side at that trajectory that
16 that bullet traveled to go out her back. There was no
17 bullet fragment at the scene, no suicide weapon at the
18 scene. The Michigan State Police found out what happened
19 to that unemployment insurance fraud money that came up
20 missing, Kaniesha's money. They found out exactly what
21 happened to that. Now, there was... I'm going to ask you to
22 step down, man, resign from the Board of Police
23 Commissioners. I didn't check into you when you were over
24 there via the correctional facility. Step down from the
25 Board of Police Commissioners, man, get out Nene's way.

1 Get out of her way. She's coming through. She wants to
2 know the truth about her mom... She knows her mama didn't
3 shoot herself. I promised to take her to Disneyland. She
4 asked me this in 2021. I've been going through all this.
5 Now we need to subpoena the Michigan State Police report
6 so the truth can be known. Michigan State Police said
7 there's not enough evidence to deem it a suicide. That's
8 what they told Kaniesha's mother. That's what that damn
9 report should say, too.

10 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: All right, thank you. Next
11 speaker.

12 MS. UNDERWOOD: Former Commissioner, William Davis.

13 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: You may be heard.

14 MR. DAVIS: Can you all hear me?

15 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir.

16 MR. DAVIS: Okay. I'd like to start off by saying I
17 think DPW and OTC should do more about tracking law
18 arrests in Detroit. Also, (Audio Unclear), how much in
19 lawsuits does the City of Detroit, because I'm also
20 president of Detroit Active Retired Employee Association.
21 So, you know, we should not be burdened with the cost of
22 people that are doing wrong. Also, as a change, I like to
23 say that I was pleased to see that you all voted against
24 some officers today. That was one of the problems I had
25 with some of my colleagues who I was on board with. There

1 were a number of times when I was the only person voting
2 against a promotion for someone in the past. In fact,
3 that was one of the problems I had with Eva coming back.

4 I personally like Eva, but far too often, too many
5 people are too willing to go along to get along. I think
6 if an officer has a bad record, even if ultimately
7 arbitration gives them the promotion, you know, the board
8 should take a strong stand against people who have bad
9 records. So, I hope you all do a little bit more,
10 especially as it relates to tracking wrongful arrests in
11 the City of Detroit. Far too many black and brown people
12 get wrongfully arrested. That still goes on. It's been a
13 problem for 30 years in the city. Thank you.

14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you. Anymore?

15 MS. UNDERWOOD: Yes, sir. We have three more. Caller
16 with the initials, SHRWL.

17 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: State your name for the record.
18 Are you present?

19 MS. UNDERWOOD: I can go to the next speaker, sir.

20 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay.

21 MS. UNDERWOOD: Our next speaker will be Mr. Jahdante
22 Smith. Please state your name for the record. because I
23 mispronounced your name.

24 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: You may be heard. Mr. Deonte
25 Smith.

1 MR. SMITH: It is Jahdante Smith. Good afternoon
2 commissioners. I just want to give a shout out to
3 Commissioner Moore for bringing up that rogue detective
4 who had all of those, you know, fraudulent convictions
5 based on her methods. I also want to speak about Sherman
6 Butler, the lieutenant that was murdered in a Palmer Park
7 eviction. I would love for one of the commissioners to
8 make a motion to release that body cam footage, and
9 another commissioner to second that motion. I also want
10 to talk about the missing persons' cases in the City of
11 Detroit, and the mother who came last week with her son's
12 name's Kamarie. We recovered yesterday within less than a
13 week without any police resources, and after the police
14 put the wrong picture of her son out. I just want to say
15 there are so many missing kids because officers are not
16 doing enough to look for these missing kids.

17 There's no way that a few people just using the
18 community resources without any big budget, like the city
19 has, this multimillion dollar budget the city has for the
20 police department, should be able to recover children
21 that are missing in this city. And we have all these
22 officers out here getting promotions. And also I want to
23 talk about Homicide, the fact that Homicide, and the
24 chief is just promoting officers to different ranks and
25 their cases are being left open. And the fact that we

1 have two people talking about murders that are deemed
2 suicides by these detectives in Homicide, because they
3 don't want to have to do the work that they have to do to
4 solve and close these cases. I also want to talk about
5 the Seventh Precinct and the fact that I filed several
6 complaints in the Seventh Precinct, and the fact that
7 these officers, there's lots of good officers in the
8 Seventh Precinct, but there are lots of bad officers at
9 the Seventh Precinct especially. I want to talk about
10 Lieutenant O'Gorman, who is over in Metro. And I also
11 want to talk about the fact that I'm going to skip around
12 for Lieutenant Cole. I have not talked to Internal
13 Affairs about Lieutenant Cole, but there's Lieutenant
14 O'Gorman, who's a part of Metro, who's breaking up these
15 block clubs, who watched the officer assault me and
16 didn't do anything to intervene. As a lieutenant who's
17 been on the force for several years with 20 plus years,
18 I'm sure. And he's a training lieutenant. That's
19 unacceptable. We need to fix these issues.

20 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you. Next comment.

21 MS. UNDERWOOD: Ms. Taura Brown.

22 MS. BROWN: Hi, my name is Taura Brown. Good evening
23 commission.

24 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Good evening.

25 MS. BROWN: I want to echo... can you hear me?

1 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes. Good evening.

2 MS. BROWN: I'm sorry. Good evening. I want to echo
3 what Jahdante said. It would be great if one of you all
4 made a motion to get that body cam and another one of you
5 second it in Sherman Butler's case. Again, Sherman Butler
6 has been dead 30 days, and the public has no information
7 on what happened to him. There are problems in 36
8 District Courts. I've had the opportunity to look at some
9 of the records surrounding his housing. It looks like the
10 company that took him to court wasn't even supposed to be
11 taking him to court because the building had been sold to
12 somebody else, and it had been sold well before he was
13 taken to court. So there are some things that need to be
14 investigated in that case, and we would like to see the
15 body cam. The other thing I want to say is usually I'm in
16 here complaining about the police commission, but tonight
17 I was really proud of you all because I noticed some
18 information.

19 I came across some information regarding one of the
20 officers that you turned down. Joseph Malouf. If you all
21 aren't sure, you need to speak to Conrad Mallet and Mike
22 Duggan about him because they worked with him when he was
23 terminated from DMC. He has some problems, and this is a
24 part of the problem. The City of Detroit hires suburban
25 police officers that are not vested in our community, and

1 they come here and beat the hell out of the residents and
2 mistreat them and cause lawsuits. And then they get to go
3 back to their suburban communities, and the millions of
4 dollars that they are costing us is not affecting them.
5 And that needs to stop. And even though you all will
6 probably go to arbitration and lose, just know the
7 community is supporting you all for doing the right thing
8 tonight. Again, he definitely needed to be stopped, and
9 it was probably a couple of them in other batches that
10 needed to be stopped. But you all are making some steps
11 and I'm really proud of you all tonight because again,
12 like I said, I sent you all some information and I had
13 the opportunity to review a lot of that information. And
14 yes, he did not need to move forward. And the fact that
15 the chief had to sit there and dryly mention that he was
16 going to be promoted should concern everybody in the
17 city. Thank you.

18 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you.

19 MS. UNDERWOOD: I was going to go back to the last
20 person. I was going to try again. The person with the
21 initials, SHRWL. They're not responding, sir.

22 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay.

23 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Mr. Chairman?

24 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir.

25 COMMISSIONER MOORE: I do have a question for Deputy

1 Chief Sloan.

2 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir.

3 COMMISSIONER MOORE: The department is categorizing
4 this as a non-officer involved shooting in regards to
5 Sherman Lee Butler, the man in Palmer Park. It does
6 appear that he was officer involved, not that the officer
7 did the shooting, but the officers were involved in the
8 shooting because of the Taser. Can you elaborate on that,
9 please?

10 DC SLOAN: Through the Chair. I can't give specifics
11 as to the investigation, but it is ongoing. It's being
12 handled by the Homicide Task Force with MSP, taking the
13 lead on the investigation.

14 COMMISSIONER MOORE: And that's going to be your job,
15 correct?

16 DC SLOAN: Yes, sir.

17 COMMISSIONER MOORE: So, I would like to make a
18 motion in conjunction with what the public wants, Mr.
19 Chairman, for the release of the body worn camera footage
20 in regards to the Sherman Lee Butler shooting that
21 occurred July 12th, 2024, under the Chief's 45-hour day
22 release mandate.

23 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Second.

24 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Motion made by Commissioner Moore
25 to release the footage of the Sherman Lee Moore?

1 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Butler.

2 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Butler, excuse me case within the
3 45-day mandate. And it was second by Commissioner Willie
4 Burton. Discussion? Yes, sir.

5 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Thank you. Through the
6 chair. It may be, and this is my own opinion, but it may
7 be a little too preliminary. Second, we'll have to
8 probably review policy, but it's very likely out of the
9 jurisdiction of this board to be able to request that.
10 So, I would just put that out there in consideration as
11 you vote. It's not that we don't have a desire for
12 transparency, clearly we do as a body. I would just ask
13 that we consider all factors that are at stake when
14 making this decision to vote.

15 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Absolutely.

16 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: And my question, DC Sloan, is
17 I guess, building off of Commissioner Moore's injury. Is
18 categorizing an incident as an officer involved shooting
19 or not? What triggers the 45 days? So in this instance,
20 because it was not considered an officer involved
21 shooting, was it the department's intention to eventually
22 release the minor worn camera footage or because it was
23 not considered an officer involved shooting the
24 department would not be required to do so.

25 DC SLOAN: Through the Chair. Commander McGinnis, do

1 you have any specifics related to that?

2 CMDR. MCGINNIS: Yes. Because this is not an officer
3 involved shooting, it doesn't fall into the policy
4 related to the 45 days. So it's a totally separate
5 incident; a criminal investigation being conducted by the
6 Homicide Task Force.

7 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Okay. And that's a big
8 concern to me. And I don't know if there's something we
9 can do in reviewing the policy, because I did not to
10 suggest that this is what the department is doing, but to
11 classify something as non-officer involved shooting,
12 allowing them to not have to release the body-worn camera
13 footage. Maybe something that can, creates a loophole
14 where I don't think we want one in the policy.

15 CMDR. MCGINNIS: If I could make the recommendation.
16 I think the board, if they could make the request for the
17 video through the chief's office, and then the chief's
18 office will respond appropriately.

19 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Okay. Thank you.

20 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Put the letter... You want to put a
21 letter together and send it?

22 COMMISSIONER MOORE: We could put the letter together
23 and send it.

24 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yep. Okay. All so do you...

25 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Would you favor making that

1 motion?

2 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah.

3 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Well, in the interest of the
4 public, I want to keep the motion up. I would really like
5 to (Audio Unclear).

6 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Absolutely, yes. Yes, sir.

7 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Could I, if my colleague
8 would accept, would you consider, through the Chair,
9 would my colleague consider rewording the language of the
10 motion to state that it's a letter that's going to the
11 chief?

12 COMMISSIONER MOORE: So in other words, the motion
13 would be for a letter to go to the chief to release the
14 body worn camera footage to us, the board, or to the
15 public?

16 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: To the board. Well, we're,
17 through the Chair, sorry. The letter would be a request
18 that we send to the chief of police to make that
19 determination if it's released to the public.

20 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Okay. That's how I'll reword it
21 for the letter to go to the chief for the release of the
22 body-worn camera footage.

23 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Motion made; what that is,
24 you want to amend that? I need to make... we need to vote
25 on the amendment now, right?

1 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Have to ask the
2 parliamentarian.

3 DR. JACKSON: Until that original motion was stated
4 by the Chair, it belongs to Commissioner Moore. So since
5 you had not stated the motion, Mr. Chair, Commissioner
6 Moore was free to amend it or withdraw it, however he
7 wanted to do.

8 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you. So motion made...

9 DR. JACKSON: There's no amendment at this point.
10 What you need to do at this point, Mr. Chairman, is state
11 the motion as he has restated it with the conditions that
12 he added.

13 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Absolutely. Motion made by
14 Commissioner Moore to send a letter to the chief asking
15 to release the body cam footage of the Sherman Lee Butler
16 incident to the public. Motion made by Commissioner
17 Moore. Any second?

18 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Second.

19 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Second by Commissioner Hernandez.
20 All in favor say, aye. COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

21 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: I should say, any discussion? All
22 in favor say, aye.

23 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

24 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Anyone opposed? The motion
25 carries. Thank you. Doing surgery up here. So let's get

1 the report from the Acting Board Secretary.

2 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Mr. Chair, I have no report,
3 but I go straight to announcements.

4 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes.

5 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: The next BOPC meeting will be
6 Thursday, August 22nd, 3:00 PM, here at Detroit Public
7 Safety Headquarters. The next BOPC Community meeting will
8 be Thursday, September 12th, 2024, 6:30 PM with the
9 Fourth Precinct hosting at Kennedy Recreation Center.
10 That address is 2260 South Fort Street, 4217. And Mr.
11 Chair, the monthly committee meeting scheduled for all
12 August, 2024. Policy Committee meetings would be meeting
13 Tuesday, August 20, 2024 at 5:00 PM and those would take
14 place here at the Detroit Public Safety Headquarters, and
15 also can be viewed on Zoom.

16 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Thank you. New business.
17 Budget Committee, Chair. Commissioner Dewaelsche.

18 COMMISSIONER DEWAEELSCHÉ: Thank you, Mr. Chair. On
19 behalf of the Board of Police Commissioner's Budget
20 Committee, I'd like to present the key updates from the
21 committee meeting that was held yesterday. August 14th.
22 Commissioners and attendance were Commissioner Darryl
23 Woods, Commissioner Jesus Hernandez, and myself. The
24 Budget Committee discussed an important matter regarding
25 pay discrepancy and disparities for four employees within

1 our organization. This was also presented at the full
2 board meeting two weeks ago. Upon careful review and
3 analysis, the Budget Committee has identified
4 opportunities to reconcile pay for the following
5 positions. One administrative assistant, one supervising
6 investigator, one OCI investigator and one acting
7 secretary to board. The Budget Committee would like to
8 recommend the following pay adjustments, which will bring
9 parity to the BOPC staff and provide back pay to
10 employees that have stepped up into a higher band of
11 title and responsibility. For the sake of the BOPC. These
12 recommendations are being brought to the full board for
13 consideration number one, 931440, administrative
14 assistant position of the Board of Police Commissioners.
15 On behalf of the Budget Committee, I would like to
16 recommend closing the pay gap in our administrative
17 assistant employee compensation, bringing this employee
18 salary up to 57,550. Number two, supervising investigator
19 of the Board of Police Commissioners. On behalf of the
20 Budget Committee, I would like to recommend bringing our
21 supervising investigator salary up to \$82,450.
22 Additionally, this is the Budget Committee's
23 recommendation to provide this employee the prorated
24 amount of 40,505,000 in back pay for the three plus years
25 that this individual was working out of class, and the

1 supervising investigator. That some reconcile disparities
2 between standard levels out of class pay OCI peers have
3 received for the same title and the levels of
4 compensation this employee has received over these years.
5 Number three, 932503. Investigator of the Board of Police
6 Commissioners. On behalf of the Budget Committee, I would
7 like to recommend bringing our investigator salary up to
8 54,500.

9 Additionally, it is the Budget Committee's
10 recommendation to provide this employee the prorated
11 amount of \$550 in back pay for the 15 months this
12 individual was being paid below the standard Union guided
13 salary. This sum reconciles disparities between what this
14 employee is currently making with more than a year of
15 experience and what new hires are making today. And then
16 number four, standing Secretary of the Board of Police
17 Commissioners. On behalf of the Budget Committee, I would
18 like to recommend providing the prorated amount of
19 \$34,318 and out class pay for the eight months, our
20 standing secretary has stepped up into this role and
21 responsibility for the board. For all of these
22 recommendations, there is a favorability in the current
23 fiscal clear budget to execute these may reconciliations.
24 Thank you for your consideration. The next Budget
25 Committee meeting will be determined at a later date.

1 That concludes my report, Mr. Chair.

2 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair.

3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes.

4 COMMISSIONER BURTON: When it comes to the secretary
5 position and the acting secretary position, has the State
6 HR weighed in on this matter to see if the raise is
7 proper.

8 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Mr. Fries, can you come up? it
9 was discussed in the meeting; he can answer that.

10 MR. FRIES: Through the Chair.

11 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes.

12 MR. FRIES: Good afternoon. The city HR, as well as
13 the Compensation Division, have reviewed these
14 recommendations, and they have not raised any flags. They
15 did call out, a similar call out to the board the last
16 time this was presented, that some of these
17 recommendations originally were guided; that they should
18 be line paid all at the same time. Sentiment from the
19 board is that we need to acknowledge and respect tenure
20 and seniority. It has since been amended to make sure
21 that the latter of seniority is acknowledged. That was
22 the one call out from HR, no other red flags were raised
23 by HR.

24 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Do we have a copy of that?

25 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Through the Chair.

1 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir.

2 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Could we allow the
3 chairwoman of the Budget Committee to provide the
4 recommendation that came out of that committee?

5 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah, absolutely.

6 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: The recommendation...

7 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: To adopt the report.

8 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah.

9 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Yes. I make a motion. Is
10 that what you're asking? CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes.

11 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Okay. I move that we adopt...

12 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: By recommendation of the...

13 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: By recommendation of the

14 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Budget Committee.

15 DR. JACKSON: Mr. Chairman.

16 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes.

17 DR. JACKSON: The motions were made by the committee

18 and she said recommendation, but she really is making a

19 motion by the budget committee, and therefore the board

20 does not need to make a motion. She made four motions.

21 The board has the authority to take them seriatim, which

22 means one by one, or you could adopt all four, or the

23 same thing that we did with the recommendations for

24 promotion. You can take all four motions made by the

25 committee. The committee can bring the motion, as long as

1 it's a committee of more than one person. So she can
2 bring the motion and then all the board has to do is vote
3 it up or down.

4 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes. By recommendation of the
5 Budget Committee, I entertain a motion to accept the
6 Budget Committee report.

7 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair. Can I call
8 for a division on each one of these line items?

9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay.

10 DR. JACKSON: They can be taken, seriatim Mr. Chair,
11 you can take them one by one.

12 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. All right.

13 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Okay. So you want me to
14 read each one individually, again?

15 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Read the title. Just the title.

16 DR. JACKSON: And if the chair of that committee,
17 instead of saying recommendation, could say by order of
18 the Budget Committee I move, it would still be the Budget
19 Committee's motion. So, Mr. Chairman, what you would say
20 when you carry that motion is it is moved by the Budget
21 Committee. But the language needs to be, excuse me, Madam
22 Chair, by order of the Budget Committee, I move the
23 following recommendation.

24 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you.

25 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Thank you for that. Okay.

1 By order of the Budget Committee, I moved the first item,
2 the pay gap in our administrative assistant employee's
3 compensation, bringing this employee salary up to
4 \$57,550.

5 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Do we need a second?

6 DR. JACKSON: No second is required because it's a
7 motion by a committee.

8 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay.

9 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Discussion. If I could.

10 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes.

11 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Through the Chair. I'll just
12 remind my colleagues that a few weeks ago, this body
13 actually adopted a motion to send it to the Budget
14 Committee so that we had the proper amount of time to do
15 our due diligence, which Mr. Fries has doubled down and
16 stated just moments ago. So I would ask each of you to
17 consider that in the way that you vote for these motions,
18 we've had this information for quite some time, and it's
19 important for us to move forward with this.

20 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Absolutely. Any further
21 discussion? We don't need a motion. Any further
22 discussion?

23 DR. JACKSON: Mr. Chairman, it's important that you
24 state the motion, because that's what puts it in front of
25 the board. Thank you.

1 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: I'm looking. Where's my memo?

2 Thank you.

3 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: All at the back.

4 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: All right. Thank you.

5 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair.

6 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Excuse me. Any further

7 discussion? Go ahead.

8 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair. Before we
9 approve any of this today. I urge this body to do an
10 evaluation. I mean, to approve salary increases without
11 an evaluation of performance, I think is preposterous at
12 this time. Not to say that the employee's not a good
13 employee. Not to say that they're a bad employee, not
14 saying neither, or, but I think it is very important that
15 we do performance evaluations before we start negotiating
16 salaries or proven salaries or pay raises at this time.

17 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay.

18 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Through the Chair.

19 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes.

20 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: So, evaluations have been
21 conducted, and I don't know if Mr. Fries would like to
22 elaborate.

23 MR. FRIES: Through the Chair. The task of
24 Commissioner Burton was also called out by the
25 commissioners that sit on the Budget Committee. And

1 performance is important to acknowledge and to be a part
2 of these decisions. that the performance has been
3 garnered from that of Chief Warfield and the standing
4 Secretary, Robert Brown. And was contingent on this
5 decision for the recommendation from the Budget
6 Committee. And it is with that performance and the
7 acknowledgement of that performance, that the
8 recommendation is being made.

9 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair. One question
10 is, when was the evaluation conducted? Have commissioners
11 received anything in writing about the evaluation and who
12 was present for that? And so what type of timeframe were
13 you talking about?

14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: It is up to the supervisors to do
15 the evaluations? You know, they are their immediate
16 supervisor.

17 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Yeah. But the staff works for
18 the full board.

19 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Absolutely.

20 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Move to the question I'm asking
21 for, what was the timeframe. When was the...

22 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Second dollar question.

23 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: The question is moved. Yes. What
24 is your pleasure?

25 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Move to the question. We go

1 right to the vote.

2 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah. all in favor for adopting
3 the Budget Committee or report and to adopting the
4 compensation for the administrative assistant on item of..

5 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Point of order. I want to
6 make sure I ordered. Madam, parliamentarian, I moved to
7 the question. It was seconded. Does that require a vote?

8 DR. JACKSON: Yes, sir. It does.

9 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Yes. We had to vote on one
10 question.

11 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: All in favor of moving to the
12 question, say, aye.

13 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Anyone oppose? The motion is
15 carried. And now by recommendation of the Budget
16 Committee on issue one, 931440, administrative assistant
17 to the Board of Police Commissioners to adopt the Budget
18 Committee report on issue one. All in favor say aye.

19 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

20 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Anyone opposed? The motion is
21 carried.

22 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Abstain.

23 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: You were saying? One extension.
24 Okay. Number two.

25 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Number two. By order of the

1 Budget Committee. And this is regarding the supervising
2 and investigating of the Board of Police Commissioners.
3 By order of the Budget Committee, I would like to move
4 that we bring the supervising investigator salary up to
5 \$82,450. In addition, we recommend that we provide, or
6 move the employee, the prorated amount of \$40,505 in back
7 pay for the three plus years this individual has been
8 working out of class as the supervising investigator.

9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Any comments? No comments. On the
10 recommendation of the Budget Committee, I entertain a
11 motion to adopt...

12 DR. JACKSON: No, no. The motions made by the Budget
13 Committee, Mr. Chair. You just need to state it.

14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. If there are no objections?
15 Okay. There being no objections, we move forward to
16 number three.

17 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHÉ: Number three, 9322503. The
18 investigator position of the Board of Police
19 Commissioners. By order of the Budget Committee, I move
20 to bring our investigator salary up to \$54,500, and move
21 that we provide the employee the prorated amount of \$550
22 in back pay, with the 15 months the individual was being
23 paid below the standard Union added salary

24 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: By recommendation of the Budget
25 Committee, I entertained a motion or did not entertain a

1 motion that...

2 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: A motion has been made.

3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: A motion has been made to adopt
4 item three, 932503, investigator of the Board of Police
5 Commissioner. No, if there's any discussion? COMMISSIONER
6 BURTON: Discussion.

7 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yep.

8 COMMISSIONER BURTON: You know, question for the
9 chief investigator. How many cases have they closed year
10 to date? How many cases they have that's been working on,
11 pending at this time, and...

12 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: With this, you know, if this is
13 talking about this particular individual, we would not
14 want to go there. That would be against the law for us to
15 do that.

16 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I think Chair.

17 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir.

18 COMMISSIONER BURTON: When we talk about pay raises
19 and increases, things of that nature, and we talk about
20 other individuals that's working out of the class,
21 evaluations, performance, very important. Also as well as
22 we need to know how many cases those investigators are
23 working on, how many are closed, how many are still
24 pending, where we are with the backlog of cases. You
25 know, so many cases that were confiscated not long ago by

1 the State's Inspector General.

2 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: And it is just not themselves to
3 this particular issue.

4 COMMISSIONER BURTON: But still...

5 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: The evaluation was done.

6 COMMISSIONER BURTON: But Mr. Chairperson, when we're
7 talking about giving someone a pay raise or whatever, we
8 have not seen the evaluation. We have not read the
9 evaluation. We don't know when the evaluation was
10 conducted. We don't even know, far as any investigators,
11 how many cases that these individuals have received here
12 to date. How many were closed by this individual year to
13 date.

14 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Call the question.

15 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Second.

16 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: The question is called...

17 COMMISSIONER BURTON: And it is very important to
18 know that before we move forward.

19 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Call the question.

20 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: All in favor of moving forward
21 with questions, say, aye.

22 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

23 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Anyone oppose? The motion is
24 carried. So by recommendation of the Budget Committee
25 issue, item three, 932503, the investigative board of the

1 Detroit Board of Police Commissioner is adopted. If there
2 are no objections, we're going to go to item four.

3 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I'm going to abstain.

4 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay.

5 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Thank you, Mr. Chair. The
6 standing Secretary of the Board of Police Commissioners.
7 By order of the Budget Committee, I would like to move to
8 provide the prorated amount of \$34,318 from an out of
9 class pay for the eight months, our standing secretary
10 has stepped up into this role, and the responsibility for
11 the board.

12 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Mr. CHAIRMAN, I have a question.

13 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir.

14 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Why is it called standing
15 secretary as opposed to acting secretary?

16 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: An acting secretary?

17 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah.

18 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Was the State writing standing
19 secretary. That's the first I've heard of the title,
20 standing secretary.

21 MR. FRIES: Through the Chair. I believe that
22 standing and acting, I have had the impression that both
23 of these are synonymous. If this is a typo and it should
24 be acting, then you have my apologies.

25 COMMISSIONER MOORE: I just never heard the term

1 before. So if it is, you know, okay. Thank you.

2 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair.

3 DR. JACKSON: I'm sorry, Mr. Chairman, you need to
4 state that motion before you have debate. Until you state
5 the motion is not in front of the board to be discussed.

6 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Thank you. Item four,
7 standing secretary, Board of Police Commissioners is
8 recommended for adoption. Is there further discussion?

9 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair.

10 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: I'm trying to bring this to a
11 close so we could finalize our meeting.

12 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair.

13 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir.

14 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Our understanding as a board
15 was that the acting secretary position was not a
16 temporary position. It was more acting; it didn't have
17 anything to do with change of when it comes to salary or
18 pay raise or anything of that nature. It was more
19 someone, you know, and so that's why it's very important
20 to have this go before city HR to see if this raise is
21 proper. Not to say that the employee was a bad employer
22 or a good employee, but our understanding as a body, as a
23 voting body, that this position, acting secretary, was
24 just something that was given at the time. But it didn't
25 have anything to do with... I mean, they were not the

1 secretary to the board, and so therefore they didn't have
2 anything to...

3 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Open, Chair, the order that
4 we know, remember there was not...

5 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Not an interim...

6 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: I think I have the floor,
7 point of order. I think it is important... point of order.
8 I have the floor.

9 COMMISSIONER BURTON: For information, I want the
10 board to...

11 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Point of order, Commissioner
12 Burton.

13 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Point of information.

14 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Point of order, Commissioner
15 Burton, I have the floor.

16 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Point of order. I was still
17 speaking and you cut me off.

18 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: I was recognized by the
19 Chair.

20 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Point of information. It's very
21 important that we have that information.

22 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Thank you. Point of order.
23 Just for the matter of context. I was the Chair at the
24 time of the transition when our secretary resigned and
25 asked Mr. Brown. I think it's important to note that he

1 unwillingly accepted it. I mean, he didn't want to do it,
2 but he said he would. And that was for six weeks. It was
3 my intent that he only had to do that job for six weeks.
4 It's been eight months. And I think that the language
5 that is being used about raises and things of that
6 nature, is a bit misleading. Because in this case, this
7 is work that has already been done. That, again, was
8 outside of his normal classification. And even for the
9 ones that we've already voted on, it is to bring them up,
10 but what we're bringing new people in on. And so again, I
11 think there's some need for clarity in that regard. So
12 again, I asked him for six weeks. It's been eight months,
13 and I think he's more than earned to be back at eight.

14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Commissioner Hernandez.

15 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Thank you. Through the
16 Chair. Again, I'll just maybe for the 10th time, remind
17 my colleagues, and assure the public in that same
18 sentence that the Budget Committee has highly trained and
19 educated and qualified commissioners on the budget
20 committee. And also on Personnel and Training. And so
21 we've done our due diligence on more than one occasion.
22 And I just want to reassure everyone that we have checked
23 with every stakeholder possible to ensure we're in full
24 compliance and within budget.

25 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you. So, by recommendation

1 of the Budget Committee, if there are no objections, we
2 adopt the standing secretary Board of Police
3 Commissioners pay adjustment or I would say the pay
4 adjustment, if there are no objections.

5 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Mr. Chairman, no objection. But
6 I do have a question before you go to item B of the new
7 business for the deputy chief, if that's okay?

8 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir.

9 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I have a new business item.

10 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: All right. So, if there are no
11 objections, it is adopted. All right. Go ahead.

12 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you, Mr. Chair.

13 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Thank you Mr. Chair.

14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Excuse me. Alright. You're done,
15 ma'am? Alright, thank you. Commissioner.

16 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Thank you.

17 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Commissioner Moore.

18 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Deputy Chief, have you heard any
19 complaints about officers running up on people in gas
20 stations looking for CPLs or CCWs, and they're using
21 their pre-contact of just being at the gas station and
22 just running it up on folks? Have you heard anything like
23 that?

24 DC SLOAN: Through the Chair. No, sir. I have not
25 heard any complaints about that. But as you know, our

1 department is committed to policing constitutionally. So
2 if there's any specific complaints that you have, we'd be
3 happy to address them.

4 COMMISSIONER MOORE: I've just been hearing it often.
5 No one for a minute, and I just wonder if it has risen to
6 your level yet. And I don't know if OCI has heard of that
7 and I hear affirmative, yes. So that is a concern that,
8 you know, I would like the department to look into, you
9 know, people pumping gas, they're just there to pump gas,
10 but it just seems like folks are being targeted at gas
11 stations for guns. So, thank you.

12 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Deputy Chief, I've heard the
13 same concern.

14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Go ahead.

15 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: That you just be minding your
16 own business, either in a gas station buying potato chips
17 or whatever, and the officers will approach you and say
18 are you carrying a gun? Are you carrying a gun? You know,
19 that sort of thing in a very aggressive tone. So it is a
20 problem, and it happens only to young black males. So it
21 is a real problem, and it's one that needs to be
22 addressed because it is floating, it is happening as
23 we're speaking. So if you could remind the officers in
24 your day talked, or whatever you call them in the morning
25 when you meet with them, that that is a violation of

1 policy, a violation of procedure, and that they can be
2 obviously held accountable.

3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: I move that we go into closed
4 session.

5 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Wait a minute, before we do
6 that, I have a motion for a new business. We're new
7 business, new business?

8 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah, we are still under new
9 business. That's what I want to do. We are on part B of
10 the new business. So, I entertain a motion to go into
11 closed session.

12 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: It's only one minute.

13 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: So moved.

14 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Second.

15 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Motion made by Commissioner
16 Pressley, second by Commissioner Hernandez. All in favor
17 say, aye.

18 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

19 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Anyone oppose? The motion is
20 carried. All right. We're going into a closed session.
21 Alright. This meeting is called back to order at 5:51. We
22 are back in open session. Call the roll.

23 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Chairperson Woods - Present.

24 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Vice Chairperson Smith -
25 Present.

1 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Commissioner Hernandez -

2 Present

3 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Commissioner Burton -

4 Present.

5 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Commissioner Pressley - Here.

6 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Commissioner Bernard -

7 Present.

8 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Commissioner Moore - Present.

9 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Commissioner Dewaelsche -

10 Present.

11 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Commissioner Bail - Here.

12 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. All right. Thank you.

13 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Through the Chair.

14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir.

15 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: I'll make a motion to adopt

16 the department's request for the board to consider

17 administrative leave without pay, but with medical

18 benefits for Police Officer Albert Edward Graham. Badge

19 2859, assigned to the Detroit Detention Center.

20 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Motion made by Commissioner

21 Hernandez. Is there a second?

22 COMMISSIONER BELL: Second.

23 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Second by Commissioner Bell. Any

24 discussion? And please understand that we have limited

25 comments on this, or be careful with your comments in

1 this. No discussion. All in favor say, aye.

2 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Anyone oppose?

4 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: I'm confused, as though, for
5 the point of information, and this is maybe trauma from
6 when I was chair. I don't want... some of these need the
7 two-third need two third.

8 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Yes. You need a roll call.

9 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: So this one requires the two-
10 third vote?

11 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: So roll vote.

12 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Help me out, Mr. Secretary.

13 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Chairperson Woods - Make me
14 last.

15 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Vice Chairperson Smith - Yes.

16 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Commissioner Hernandez - Yes.

17 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Commissioner Burton -

18 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: I'll come back.

19 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Commissioner Pressley - No.

20 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Commissioner Bernard -

21 Absolutely not.

22 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Commissioner Moore - Abstain.

23 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Commissioner Dewaelsche -

24 Yes.

25 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Commissioner Bell -

1 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Commissioner Burton -
2 Abstain.

3 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Commissioner Woods - I would
4 say no, because we don't have the...

5 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: How about you, you say, no?

6 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Right? No.

7 ACTG. SECRETARY BROWN: Mr. Chair, there were five no
8 votes and four yes votes.

9 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Mr. Chairman.

10 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir.

11 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Motion to adjourn?

12 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: No.

13 DR. JACKSON: Mr. Chairman, you need to say the
14 motion failed.

15 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: The motion has failed.

16 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Mr. Chairman, motion to
17 adjourn.

18 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Second.

19 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Motion made by Commissioner
20 Hernandez.

21 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I had an item under new
22 business.

23 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Hold on. Hold on. And second by
24 Commissioner Pressley. Any discussion?

25 DR. JACKSON: Mr. Chairman.

1 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. No discussion?

2 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Chairman, I asked for...

3 DR. JACKSON: Mr. Chairman.

4 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes.

5 DR. JACKSON: There are six things that can be done,
6 even when the motion to adjourn has been made.

7 Commissioner Bernard has the right to identify what she
8 wants to do. If it's not within the confines of those six
9 things, I'll advise the Chair. Okay. Go ahead. Six
10 things.

11 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Six things. No, I have one
12 thing we talked about last week. I want to make the
13 motion simply that the board be authorized, the issuance
14 of a subpoena to whether we issue it or not. I don't know
15 that it is going to be necessary. I'm not suggesting; it
16 may or may not be, but that I have been authorized to
17 issue a subpoena to get the file of Kaniesha Coleman,
18 case number 201112. The Michigan State Police made
19 findings indicating that a case that had been classified
20 as a suicide was not a suicide.

21 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: No, no, no, no, no.

22 DR. JACKSON: Mr. Chairman, she's making a motion. It
23 has to be seconded before she can go into debate.

24 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Right. Let me finish my
25 motion.

1 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay.

2 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Please. I'm not trying to
3 debate it right now. In order to get the Michigan State
4 Police findings about this young woman, a Detroit
5 resident. This was a Detroit Police investigation. And
6 for two years, she has been unable to collect life
7 insurance and take care of business concerning a mother
8 because...

9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Excuse me, it's out of order.

10 DR. JACKSON: It's not a motion. That's a debate.

11 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes.

12 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Okay. The motion is to
13 authorize, as I said, the issuance of a subpoena to get
14 the file, to get that case file.

15 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Second.

16 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Motion made by Commissioner
17 Bernard to authorize for a subpoena for the State Police
18 report.

19 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: What police?

20 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: It was the State Police report or
21 you...

22 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Oath, the file.

23 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: The file

24 Case number 21112.

25 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Case number 21112. And it

1 is second by Commissioner Burton. Any Discussion?

2 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Discussion. Just for myself,
3 I don't have enough information around our ability to do
4 that in this case or not, or just based on the... or
5 information on the case itself. And so I'll plan to vote
6 accordingly.

7 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir.

8 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: And then again, through the
9 Chair, I share the sentiments to Commissioner Hernandez.
10 I feel like I have a learning curve. Have we asked for
11 it?

12 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes. we did.

13 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: We did not.

14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Excuse me. I've been told by the
15 Michigan State Police that they can FOIA the report. I
16 talked to higher ranks. And that's why I put Lieutenant
17 Shaw. He has given us the way that we get that report
18 from the State Police. And Secretary Brown is working on
19 getting that report.

20 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Just so we're clear, for the
21 family or for the board?

22 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: For the board, and we will
23 release it. We have the ability to release it. And also,
24 there has been a request being made for the State Police
25 to come and talk about that particular case to the Board

1 of Police Commissioners, because there is a lot of
2 inaccurate information that is being spoken of. And I'll
3 leave it like that because I'm not the State Police, and
4 I'm not DPD. We don't do criminal investigations to make
5 any conclusions here. And I'll warn commissioners to
6 never do that to state something that we don't have any
7 facts. Because we don't want to open ourselves up for any
8 liability. And so you have to be very careful when you
9 speak in that manner. Commissioner Hernandez.

10 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I
11 would just ask, maybe it's a rhetorical question, maybe
12 not, if this motion might be too premature, based on
13 everything that you just mentioned that's going on behind
14 the scenes. And add on top of that again, the lack of
15 information that some commissioners on this board have or
16 don't have, rather.

17 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes.

18 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Mr. Chairman, the motion is
19 not premature. For two years, his family has been
20 requesting this information from their police department,
21 which is us, which initially made the determination that
22 this young woman had committed suicide. All of them.

23 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Don't speak on it. Don't speak on
24 it, because what? You know, again, because you do not
25 know...

1 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Mr. Chairman, I was speaking.

2 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Excuse me.

3 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I don't care...

4 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: You do not know what you're
5 talking about in this regard. And you are absolutely out
6 of order to say what some, excuse me.

7 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: You are out of order. You
8 don't tell me...

9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: You are out of order to say
10 what's in a report that you have not read. You know? And
11 so that is wrong. And it is...

12 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: We cannot read...

13 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: No, it is irresponsible.

14 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Don't call me irresponsible.

15 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: I said it is. I'm not saying you,
16 I'm saying it is irresponsible to

17 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: To the (Audio Unclear)

18 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Point of order. Commissioner
19 Bernard the Chair runs the meeting; the Chair runs
20 the meeting.

21 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: He insulted me.

22 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: I am not insulting you. I
23 apologize if you feel that way, but I'm trying to give
24 you some fair warning about something that can come your
25 way legally by stating something that is not right. It is

1 absolutely not right. You know, and so, I'll leave it at
2 that.

3 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Can Mr. Brown respond. He's
4 aware of this. He'll tell you what happened.

5 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Mr. Brown has been working
6 together vigorously about this. And absolutely. And I
7 appreciate your passion, your diligence on this. But
8 again, we're not going to forecast who we talk to and all
9 that type of stuff, but I guarantee that this report will
10 be produced and we're not going to play games with the
11 community about this particular matter because it's a
12 very sensitive matter.

13 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair.

14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir.

15 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Being on this board, and
16 observing, public comments with families pouring out in
17 tears and waking up in pain. You know, coming into this
18 board, it is hard for a lot of Detroiters. It is really
19 hard. Because they don't know who they can go to. They
20 don't know. They come to the board about the issues. They
21 come to the department about their issues, their
22 concerns. But as a board, we have our fiduciary
23 responsibilities as well when it comes to oversight. And
24 if it's something we don't know, we can always request
25 it, and we can also, for your information. And I'd just

1 like for the board to operate within our scope of
2 fiduciary responsibility.

3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir. I must agree with you
4 100%.

5 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I just clarify. May I?

6 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, ma'am.

7 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Number one, we don't for your
8 information, the charter says that the Board of Police
9 Commissioners can subpoena any information that they
10 want. We are the only commissioners in the city that has
11 the ability to subpoena other than the city council to
12 subpoena information. So we have the ability to subpoena
13 any information we want. This motion was simply to
14 authorize the issue, not us, not to issue the subpoena,
15 but to authorize our ability to do that. But we have that
16 ability to authorize.

17 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: The term authorizes; we don't
18 need authorization. So the term authorizes...

19 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: If we don't get it, then we
20 subpoena.

21 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Absolutely.

22 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Quick question.

23 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Through the Chair. Can we
24 call for the vote?

25 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes. Call for the vote. And this

1 is the vote on the subpoena, right?

2 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Yes.

3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: For those who are in favor of
4 authorizing and subpoena, say yes.

5 COMMISSIONERS: Yes.

6 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: For those who are opposed, say,
7 no. Okay. it appears as the ayes have it. Okay.

8 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

9 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Move for adjournment.

10 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Second.

11 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: A motion made by Commissioner
12 Pressley. Second by Commissioner Hernandez. All in favor
13 say, aye.

14 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

15 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Anyone oppose? The motion is
16 carried.
