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CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Good afternoon, everyone. Today 1 th is September 5 , 2024. It is 3:01. The Board of Police 2 Commissioners meeting is called to order. We are going to 3 ask for the invocation by Chaplain Duncan, who is on 4 Zoom. Are you there? 5 6 CHAPLAIN DUNCAN: Yes, sir, I am here. CHAIRPERSON WOODS: You may proceed. 7 CHAPLAIN DUNCAN: All right. Heavenly Father, we come 8 to you today asking for your guidance, for your wisdom 9 and your support, as we begin this meeting today. Help us 10 to engage in meaningful discussions. Allow us to grow 11 12 closer as a group and to nurture the bonds of community. 13 We welcome your presence among us, and we ask that you 14 quide our discussions and the decisions, helping us to 15 seek what is best for all that are involved. We pray for 16 open hearts and minds to receive your plans and purposes. And may we be sensitive to the leading of your obedient 17 will. We lift our leadership represented in this 18 19 collective today, and we ask that you draw close yourself 20 to them, and that your wisdom and your ways and your 21 grace be upon them all. Please allow each individual in 22 this collective to feel heard and supported. 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1 a motion to approve the September 5 , 2024 agenda.

2 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: So moved.

3 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Support.

4 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Moved by Commissioner Bernard,
5 second by Commissioner Moore. All in favor, say, aye.
6 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

7 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Any discussion? Anyone opposed?
8 The motion is carried. I entertain a motion for the
9 approval of the minutes of, of August 29th, 2024.

10 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: So moved.

11 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Support.

12 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Moved by Commissioner Bernard, 13 supported by Commissioner Moore. Any discussion? Anyone 14 opposed? The motion is carried. Let's go to the 15 introduction of BOPC staff and Chief of Police, Elected 16 Officials or Representatives and Community Leaders.

MS. GARNIER: We have present for Board of Police 17 18 Commissioners staff, chief investigator Jerome Warfield, 19 Parliamentarian, Dr. Francis Jackson, Mr. Robert Brown, 20 Ms. Jonya Underwood. Ms. Teresa Blossom, Ms. Artemisia 21 Joshua, Ms. Mary Barber. Mr. Drew Fries, supervising 22 investigator Ainsley Cromwell, our ASL Interpreters, Ms. 23 Yakata, and Dr. Stephanie Beatty, Joyce Washington. Court 24 reporter Don Handyside. Sergeant Quinn is on audio, Mr. 25 Charles Henry Media Services video, Attorney Dante Goss.



1 Deputy Chief Arnold Williams, elected officials and representatives, Ms. Marie Overall, for State 2 Representative Tyrone Carter's office. Ms. Fredia Butler, 3 president of Second Precinct Community Relations. Ms. 4 LaDon Davis, office of Councilman Fred Durhal III. 5 Lieutenant Mark Young, Lieutenant and Sergeants 6 Association president. Ron Thomas, vice president of 7 Detroit Police Union, and former Commissioner William 8 Davis. 9 10 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Alright, thank you. The person 11 doesn't have a report, but we'll go to the Chief of 12 Police report. 13 DC WILLIAMS: Through the Chair, we'll start off with 14 our crime data. Looking at our homicides, we're down 38 15 homicides from last year. This year we had 145, last year 16 we had 138. For our non-fatal shootings, we're showing reductions as well. We have 40 less non-fatal shootings 17 18 this year than we had last year. This year we had 455, last year we had 495. For robberies, we're continuing to 19 show decreases, pretty much in all of our part one 20 violent crimes. Robberies, last year we had 997, this 21 year, 761. That was a decrease of 236 robberies. We've 22 had 43 less carjackings this year than we had last year. 23 Last year we had 117, this year we've had 74. 24 25 Going into our calls for service. For our mental,



ice for

1 not violent, we've had 278 more calls for service for mental nonviolent this year than we had last year. And 2 looking at our actual mental violent armed, we've had 10 3 less calls for those who were armed, and were 4 experiencing a mental crisis. Going into our significant 5 events or significant incidents. We'll start off with a 6 non-fatal shooting. We have a 6-year-old victim who 7 received a graze wound to his left knee. This happened 8 9 Thursday, August 29th, 2024, at 1:12 AM. Officers were dispatched to the 1000 block of Bassett to investigate a 10 non-fatal shooting of a 6-year-old. Officers arrived on 11 12 scene and Medic 11 was treating the victim who was a 6year-old male for a gunshot wound. Medics transported the 13 14 victim to a local hospital where the victim was listed in 15 stable condition.

16 The home was occupied by three adults and five additional juveniles, ages 3 to 17. No further injuries 17 were reported at the scene. Officers from the Fourth 18 Precinct preserved the scene and detectives from the 19 20 Fourth Precinct Detective Unit were notified. The detectives are asking anyone with additional information 21 to contact Crime Stoppers at 1-800-SPEAKUP or 22 23 detroitrewards.tv. Incident number two was a fatal 24 shooting. This occurred Thursday, August 29th at 9:05 PM. Officers were dispatched to the 1500 block of Evergreen 25



1 to investigate a fatal shooting. Officers arrived on scene and observed the victim being treated for a gunshot 2 wound. The victim was transported by Medic 21 to a local 3 hospital where the victim was initially listed in 4 critical condition. Unfortunately, the victim succumbed 5 to his injuries. Officers on the scene received 6 information that the suspect ran to a location at 15,000 7 block of Evergreen. After the shooting officers from the 8 9 Eighth Precinct preserved the scene and a barricaded gun person situation was declared. Officers from the Special 10 Response Team were notified and officers from the Special 11 12 Response Team responded to the scene, checked the 13 location. After a thorough search of the location, the 14 officers were unable to locate the suspect. Detectives 15 from the Homicide Unit arrived on the scene and conducted 16 a preliminary investigation. Witnesses confirmed that the 17 victim was shot after an argument with the suspect. The incident is still under investigation. Detectives are 18 19 asking anyone with additional information to contact 20 Crime Stoppers at 1-800-SPEAKUP or detroitrewards.tv. 21 The next incident was a nonfatal shooting. This 22 occurred Friday, August 30 at 2:12 AM. Officers were 23 dispatched to the 1200 block of St. Antoine to 24 investigate a non-fatal shooting. Officers arrived on the 25 scene and observed the victim suffering from a gunshot



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wound to the left ankle. Medic 41 arrived on scene and 1 transported the victim to a local hospital where he was 2 listed in temporary serious condition. Officers from 3 Downtown Services preserved the scene and detectives from 4 the Third Precinct Detective Unit were notified. 5 6 Detectives determined that the victim and the suspect 7 were in an argument before the shooting. The suspect was described as a black male wearing a black varsity jacket 8 9 and black jeans and was last seen leaving the area in a gray Jeep Compass. Detectives were asking anyone with 10 additional information concerning this incident to 11 contact Crime Stoppers at 1-800-SPEAKUP or 12 13 detroitrewards.tv. The next incident was a fatal shooting 14 that occurred Sunday September 1st at 2:13 AM. Officers 15 were flagged down in the area of Greenfield and Midland 16 to investigate the fatal shooting. Officers were flagged down by Medic 17. Medic 17 17 informed the officers that they were flagged down by a 18

19 victim and a witness, and the victim was suffering from a 20 gunshot wound. Medic 17 conveyed the witness to a local, 21 I'm sorry, conveyed the victim to a local hospital where 22 the victim was pronounced deceased on arrival. Officers 23 from the Eighth Precinct preserved the scene and 24 detectives from the Homicide Section were notified. 25 Detectives interviewed a witness who stated that he and



the victim were leaving Views Bar, East on Grand River 1 when someone in a gold sedan pulled alongside them and 2 fired shots into their vehicle striking the victim. The 3 witness did not get a good look at the suspect. 4 Detectives are asking anyone with additional information 5 regarding this incident to contact Crime Stoppers at 1-6 800-SPEAKUP or detroitrewards.tv. The last incident 7 reported out on is going to be one fatal shooting. 8 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Can you slow it down just a 9 little bit. 10 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Microphone. 11 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Excuse me. Can you slow it down a 12 13 little bit, so ASL team can keep up with you? We want to 14 make sure that they can keep up, but you're doing great, 15 you know. Thank you. 16 DC WILLIAMS: Okay. CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah. Alright. Thank you. 17 DC WILLIAMS: Incident number five. This was a fatal 18

19 shooting and now fatal shootings occurred early in the 20 morning yesterday, I'm sorry, in the evening, yesterday 21 evening. So the officers that were dispatched to the 22 18,000 block of Raymond about 10:00 PM for a fatal 23 shooting. Officers arrived at the scene, observed victim 24 number one and victim number two, suffering from gunshot 25 wounds. Officers provided medical aid until paramedics



1 arrived on the scene and transported victim number one to a local hospital. She was pronounced deceased on arrival, 2 suffering from a gunshot wound. Victim number two was 3 transported to a local hospital by medics where he was 4 listed in critical condition with multiple qunshot 5 wounds. Officers from the Ninth Precinct preserve the 6 scene and detectives from the Homicide Section were 7 notified. Detectives discovered that victim number one is 8 the mother of victim number two and was shot while trying 9 to intervene in a fight between victim number two, and 10 the suspect. Detectives are asking anyone with additional 11 12 information regarding this incident to contact Crime 13 Stoppers at 1-800-SPEAKUP or detroitrewards.tv.

14 And then if I may continue through the Chair?15 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir.

16 DC WILLIAMS: There was an inquiry that was submitted to the Chief and the Chief's officers this morning from 17 Commissioner Moore. And there is a response that we want 18 to make sure it happens. And this was regarding our 19 article in the Bridge, Detroit. For the benefit of the 20 21 public, the Detroit Police Department has several mechanisms in place for waiving or reducing towing and 22 23 impound fees. First, as a general matter, the Detroit Police Department does not assess fees for vehicles 24 seized as evidence for crime such as homicide, armed 25



robbery, carjacking, criminal, sexual conduct, and

2 nonfatal shootings. Second, the Detroit Police Department 3 does not assess fees when a vehicle is stolen and 4 recovered in the city of Detroit. Exceptions include 5 situations where the vehicle is being picked up by a 6 corporate or business entity, such as an insurance 7 company, or the individual has insurance that includes 8 payment of towing and storage fees.

1

9 Third, the Detroit Police Department may waive or reduce fees for individuals suffering from economic 10 hardship. A decision to waive fees is not automatic. It 11 12 is judged on a case by case basis. Considerations 13 include, for example, the underlying circumstances for 14 the impounded vehicle and whether the individual lives 15 below a certain economic threshold that would trigger the 16 receipt of government benefits. Individuals are asked to complete a form that includes information needed to make 17 a fair deliberation of the individual circumstances. 18 Recently, Bridge Detroit published an article suggesting 19 20 that there have been at least several individuals assessed fees and recovered stolen vehicles. That 21 shouldn't have been. To date, the department has not been 22 provided sufficient information to verify the claims. In 23 any event, individuals who are assessed fees and they are 24 25 free to contact the Detroit Police Department at the



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Abandoned Vehicle Unit for assistance and obtain a
 reimbursement at (313) 596 8832.

We recently, this past Tuesday, had a promotional 3 4 ceremony where DPD appointed and promoted a commander, 5 captains, lieutenants, sergeants and detectives at the 6 Wayne County Community College District of Northwest 7 Campus. On Saturday September 7th at 9:00 AM there will be a Healthy Detroit Better Together 5K walk. This will 8 9 occur at the DMC Heart Hospital. Participants will receive an award and a T-shirt after the race. Also, 10 we'll have a free gun lock event. This is going to happen 11 12 Saturday, September 7th from 11:00 AM to 3:00 PM. A free 13 gun lock event will be held in the parking lot of Detroit 14 Police Department Rouge Gun Range. The event will also 15 include free resources, a barber and a bounce house for families. That will conclude our report pending your 16 questions. 17

18 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Commissioner Moore.

19 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

20 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir.

21 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Well, Chief, thank you for 22 reading that about the stolen vehicles into the record. I 23 was just wondering; how do we go about educating the 24 citizens? I mean, we know 'because the citizens who 25 attend these meetings come all the time. So I was just



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1 more so concerned about educating the citizens through a 2 press release. And if you can get that back to the chief. This just came up. I just saw there are two academy whose 3 students resigned under charges. I was just wondering if 4 5 you can get back to the board on that in regards to, you know, why they resigned, two academy students. Next, what 6 is the purpose of the 45-day video protocol that's in 7 place when an officer involved shooting, the purpose? 8 9 DC WILLIAMS: So, I directly can't speak to the purpose. What I can say is that is the policy that the 10 Chief created. The one thing I will say is there are a 11 12 lot of jurisdictions that don't even allow the open and 13 free viewing of officer involved shootings when they take 14 place. So the Detroit Police Department is one, and we actually make sure that when we have one, we stick to 15 16 that timeline and we make sure that that goes out. And 17 with that it is the department's entire intent to be thoroughly transparent in any officer involved shooting 18 or when one of our officers fires a shot. And that is 19 20 what we will continue to do

21 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Because a lot of times the 22 prosecutor's office hasn't made a decision on the 23 shooting. So if the purpose is transparency, which I 24 believe; I just use that as a parallel or a nexus to the 25 Sherman Lee Butler shooting, how come we are not using



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1 transparency in the release of the video? Because the 2 information is the information. I mean, the shooting is the shooting. It doesn't change. So I appreciate Detroit 3 being the leader in the release of the officer involved 4 5 shootings. I just wish that we could expedite the process 6 to release the Sherman Lee Butler video because I just 7 think things are going to escalate as it relates to protests and things of that nature because these folks 8 9 think it's a cover-up.

DC WILLIAMS: Through the Chair. The Sherman Butler 10 incident was not an officer involved shooting. That was a 11 12 bailiff shooting who was contracted with 36 District. So, 13 officers from Detroit were present, but the shooting took 14 place with a contractor from 36th District. So if an 15 officer from DPD had fired, 100% percent, we would 16 release that as OIS under the 45-day policy the Chief has 17 established. So I just want to be clear on that. And I do understand what you're saying, commissioner. 18

19 COMMISSIONER MOORE: And I don't want to go back and 20 forth with you, but I would disagree to say it was an 21 officer involved shooting because police were on the 22 scene, police did involve tasers in the situation which 23 caused, according to the Detroit Police Department press 24 release for Mr. Butler to attack the bailiff, and then 25 that speed things up. So I would just push back and say,



1 I disagree with that. But my next question and final question deals with the investigation or the issues 2 surrounding the former homicide detective that Detroit 3 Metro Times reported on. I don't know if you're familiar 4 5 with that story, but back in 2010 or some years prior to 6 that, caused some citizens to be falsely arrested. And I just wanted to know, what can we do to give confidence to 7 citizens to say, this is not a widespread issue, this is 8 9 not a cultural issue of the police department. What can we do to make sure that this isn't taking place in the 10 11 current DPD?

12 DC WILLIAMS: Well, again, this was over a decade ago and under new leadership several times with changes of 13 14 chiefs. The one thing I can say is that it is the Detroit 15 Police Department's policy. And it is a standard that 16 we're holding that truthfulness, and true facts are 17 brought out. We 100% support the Innocence Project. And 18 when those cases come up, we cooperate fully with the prosecutor's office, but we do not tolerate any of our 19 officers, detectives, sworn members or civilian members 20 21 pushing for any false or written statements. So it is 22 100% not the policy. It's 100% not the standard. And we 23 100% support the prosecutor's office in going forward and looking at these cases. 24

25 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you, Chief.



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CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Commissioner? Yes. Commissioner
 Burton and then Commissioner Bernard.

3 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Thank you.

4 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir.

COMMISSIONER BURTON: Chief, since I asked about DPD 5 6 conducting his own investigation into former detective Barbara Simon, I have learned that one of her victims 7 filed a complaint with the department. Can you speak 8 9 about the steps DPD is taking in investigating this matter as reform? What would be, you know, implemented to 10 11 ensure that this never happens again? And also maybe our 12 own chief investigator, Jerome Warfield, can also speak 13 to it as well, because I believe the complaint was filed 14 with the department and with OCI. It was just filed 15 within a few days

16 CI WARFIELD: Through the Chair. If there was a 17 complaint filed in the matter. Certainly I'm not aware of 18 it right now, but I can get that information and bring it 19 back to the board next week.

20 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. And we will not talk about21 the investigation openly. Alright.

DC WILLIAMS: And through the Chair. Commissioner to address your question, I'm not aware if the department has received a complaint. I'm not aware where it actually went. If it went to the prosecutor's office, if it came



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to the department or if it came to OCI, I'm not even sure what mechanism was used for it to be submitted. But I did read the news article where it was said that an individual did file a complaint, but I have no idea of where it was filed or who received it. So at this point, I'm not ready to speak on that because I don't know where it actually is.

8 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: You good, Commissioner?

9 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I will have some additional 10 questions at a later time. But I'm going to give the 11 department and OCI to get together, and look and see 12 where exactly this complaint has been filed. But it has 13 been filed with it, you know, just more recently. And so 14 I guess we will hear back from our chief investigator as 15 well as the Chief's office.

16 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Alright. Commissioner
17 Bernard. And let the record reflect that Commissioner
18 Smith is present

19 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: On the issue of the activity 20 of the former Detroit Police detective, which has been 21 widely reported in the press. I don't think that what we 22 are suggesting is enough. Quite frankly, I think this is 23 a bigger issue than OCI and the department. And I think 24 there should be a task force put together or assembled to 25 address this issue. I don't know if it would involve



1 Michigan State Police, our department. You always like 2 the US attorney, but I'll try to stay out of the Fed's 3 way most of the time. But I do not think that this is 4 something that is a casual situation. I mean, there are 5 major civil rights issues that have been raised in, in 6 these, in this matter. I have people ask me on the 7 street, is this person still a retiree?

8 Are they still getting money from the city of 9 Detroit? Of course, their retirement is a whole separate issue, but the community is concerned that she's getting 10 anything based on her performance with the department. So 11 12 this is not something that's casual. And I urge the man 13 and, and the board to consider us putting together a task 14 force to look into this. And it may involve the Inspector 15 General's office. It may involve whatever parties that 16 you think are appropriate. But I don't like the idea the 17 department has had about a month to respond to this. They've not responded. So I don't think it's appropriate 18 that we ask them to investigate themselves on this issue. 19 And I just think that it's too big of an issue. 'because 20 21 If it was me, you, or anyone at this table, and we had been arrested or convicted as a result of this person, 22 you know, we would, we would view it as an outrage and as 23 a civil rights issue. So, I think that we need something 24 25 much bigger than what's being discussed. Mr. Chairman.



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1 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Well, let me ask the attorney,

2 our jurisdiction is? Is that correct?

3 ATTORNEY GOSS: That's correct.

4 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Can we investigate criminal

5 issues?

6 ATTORNEY GOSS: No. The charter does not give you the 7 authority to investigate criminal matters.

8 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes. So I don't want it to be out 9 there as if we have power to do anything. Now, our voices 10 are very vitally important to advocate for the right 11 thing. And this has been 10 years. Do we have any 12 jurisdiction on the case after 10 years, Chief

13 Investigator?

14 CI WARFIELD: Through the Chair, from a criminal 15 perspective, we would not have any jurisdiction. However, 16 we have looked at, and we are looking at instances where 17 crimes or allegations of misconduct have gone beyond a year. So we have done three, four, even 10 years if 18 19 necessary. So depending on the egregiousness of the situation, it is possible. However, if it's a criminal 20 21 manner, we typically transfer that over to an agency 22 that's very equipped to handle it.

23 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Yeah. And you know, I ask 24 those questions because I want to understand what's in 25 our power. What are our charter mandated duties and what



1 we can and can't do? You know we strongly suggest folks to connect to the Conviction Integrity Unit and Wayne 2 County Prosecutor Office that has some jurisdiction. The 3 Michigan Innocence Clinic with the University of Michigan 4 5 and Cooley Law School, they have an innocent project. So there are various, you know, and we are not giving no, no 6 7 advice on anything, you know, because I don't want to be 8 seen as we are given any legal advice, but anything that 9 comes on our jurisdiction, we have a complaint. That complaint has to be looked at and dealt with 10 professionally by our staff. And they are to get a prompt 11 12 response just like any other citizen. But I don't want to pretend as if we have ours that 13 14 we do not have. So we can't undo some of the things 15 there. But again, I share the sentiments of my colleagues 16 that some governing body that has the power to address

17 these issues should address it, and if we need to send a 18 letter to those particular entities, I'm with that, you 19 know, I encourage folks to take a look at this intently, 20 you know. So anything else for the Chief? You had your 21 hand up.

22 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Yes. We can request that there 23 be, first of all, we can form a task force, if we want 24 to, and we can invite other entries...

25 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: What kind of task force?



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COMMISSIONER BERNARD: A task force to investigate 1 the activities in the Tenth Precinct by this former 2 employee. We have that ability and the authority to do 3 that. And I'm sure that Dante would agree with me. The 4 5 law department could do the same thing with respect to a 6 lawyer. If there were allegations regarding a lawyer, for 7 example, sexually harassing or doing something to somebody even 10 years ago, you can always investigate 8 9 yourself. And since we are the governing body for the DPD, we can do that. We can ask for the assistance of our 10 inspector general. We can ask for the AG's assistance. We 11 12 can ask for Michigan... 13 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: On an employee who's no longer 14 here? COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Doesn't it matter? This is an 15 16 activity that happened. You investigate things that 17 occurred, even though they're long past and they're things that are set up to investigate all kinds of things 18

19 from the rape case. I mean, for example, that was 30
20 years ago.

21 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: And the BOPC didn't investigate 22 any cases that didn't go to the chief investigator. You 23 know, we don't have any power or any criminal cases. 24 Commissioner Moore, I think you wanted to say something 25 before we move on. COMMISSIONER MOORE: Disregard.



CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yep. Alright, thank you very
 kindly. Anything else Chief?

3 DC WILLIAMS: No.

4 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you for your report. Let's 5 go to oral communications.

6 MS. GARNIER: Thank you, Mr. Chair. We have four speakers in the office at this time. Our first speaker 7 will be Minister Eric Blount, then Ms. Michelle George, 8 Mr. Ronald Foster, and then Ms. Fredia Butler. Please 9 speak into the mic and state your name for the record. 10 MINISTER BLOUNT: Good Afternoon board. I'm Minister 11 Eric Blount from Sacred Heart Catholic Church right here 12 in Detroit. 13

14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Good afternoon.

MINISTER BLOUNT: Good afternoon. Somebody has to say 15 16 it; it is diabolical that a simple request can be denied 17 by the Detroit Police Department. Just release the video. It doesn't change evidence; it doesn't change facts. But 18 no, there's something very wrong with this. And this 45-19 day trick should not be accepted on any level. And even 20 look at the video they finally released of Porter Burr, 21 they released a very small portion of that video to the 22 public, and it never included shots being fired. So how 23 can you say you're going to release it, and you don't 24 25 even include the shots that were fired, even though there



were 38 of them. No. and please... I'm glad some of you
 commissioners force the police department to do something
 other than just report on crime.

This is not a crime reporting board. This is about 4 5 police officer misconduct. And so when you do that, you 6 also have to look at the HR report. The HR report should 7 include things like officers that are suspended, when and 8 how long, the risk management system, who is in it, when, 9 and how long. OCI should be reporting every week on the number of complaints, what's happened to those 10 11 complaints? And yes, of course Internal Affairs has a 12 part in this. How many cases are they looking into? These 13 types of things can lead you to a more robust analysis of 14 what's really going on. Thank you.

15 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you. Next speaker.

16 MS. GEORGE: Good evening, Mr. Chair.

17 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Good evening.

MS. GEORGE: And this honorable board and assistant 18 19 chief. I just want to make a brief comment, just hopefully going forward. because I got in on the last 20 21 discussion, so I'm not going to comment too much on it. 22 But I would just say when there comes a video dealing 23 with our community, please release it. It shouldn't wait 24 a long time. We see what's happening across the country 25 in a lot of States when it comes to releasing police



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1 cameras from Tennessee to where, you know, George Floyd and everything. And one of my organizations, we were 2 responsible for the cameras, National Action Network. So 3 what we're asking is that if you release the camera, you 4 5 will do very well without dealing with all the 6 controversy to do that. And if you just showed or they 7 didn't show the shots, even in other States, they're showing shots. I wanted to make that comment. 8

9 I also want to make the comment pretty soon, it happened during the pandemic, the Caucasian woman that 10 had the four African American kids in the car. She'll be 11 12 sentenced very soon. And I remember I had asked Chief 13 White at the time what was happening with this case, but 14 I know; I thank God for those officers that did catch 15 with the most four kids, especially after the movie: 16 Sound of Freedom. I believe she was going to traffic those kids. So she will be charged very soon. Hopefully I 17 will be there to make sure justice is done for those 18 kids, because this should not have gone this long. She 19 kidnapped those children and we thank God that Detroit 20 Police were able to stop her and be astute to find out 21 22 what was happening with these children. So I will report out to this board to, and hopefully, the Lord's will, I 23 will be there when they sentence this woman for 24 25 kidnapping those four children. But thank God those



1 children were brought safely home. That's my comment.

2 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you. Next speaker.

3 MS. GARNIER: Mr. Ronald Foster, and then Ms. Fredia 4 Butler. And then we'll go into Zoom.

5 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you.

6 MR. FOSTER: Good afternoon.

7 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Good afternoon.

MR. FOSTER: Through the Chair. First thing, I just 8 9 wanted to speak on is justice. The meaning of justice is the ethical, philosophical idea that people are to be 10 treated impartially, properly and reasonably by the law 11 12 and by arbitrators of the law, that laws are to ensure 13 that no harm befalls another, and that where harm is 14 alleged, a remedial action is taken. What the community 15 is asking for is justice. We're simply asking for social 16 justice; to be treated fairly, that those that messed up be held accountable. We don't think that that's a harsh 17 request to ask for, especially coming from a body that 18 represents law enforcement. Part of social justice is to 19 self-police. We know that a lot of you guys are new. You 20 can't make up for things that have happened in the last 21 22 20, 30 years, but you have to acknowledge that there was 23 a bad culture there.

And we have to come to the table and figure out how to have a common ground. The officer that was spoken of



today is not the only officer. Every week we turn on the 1 TV and find another former Detroit police officer doing 2 egregious behavior in communities. For example, Officer 3 Morningstar was accused in Genesee County under the 4 5 ghosts of sexual misconduct of lying and a lot of other things. Now, as a citizen here, I don't believe that 6 that's the first time that he ever did anything. And to 7 have these types of people running our streets and in our 8 9 community, and the only time we hear about it is when they victimize somebody else. It's unacceptable. I'm here 10 today standing on behalf of the people and we are simply 11 12 asking for justice. We want everybody that's elected in 13 position to hold themselves accountable. Thank you.

14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you very kindly.

15 MS. BUTLER: Good afternoon.

16 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: And before we start, Mr. Foster, 17 I want to also say that I'm deeply sorry what happened to 18 you the other week. I want to say that publicly and 19 openly and I'm praying that you are doing much better. 20 Yes, sir.

MS. BUTLER: Last week, I stated that I was going to tell you about what the four ladies and I were doing at Wayne State and why? I must state that I met a Wayne State police officer who offered his assistance and as I said before, I was going the wrong way with the Detroit



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police officer. But this was an incident in which he was 1 just trying to be of assistance, the Wayne State police 2 officer, who was a very nice gentleman. The four ladies 3 and I were working in our communities at Wayne State, 4 5 registering voters. Registering voters at Wayne State provided an opportunity for us to talk with young men and 6 young women. The work was not easy. After listening to a 7 report given by Human Resources, I decided to ask for 8 more information about the number of officers living 9 outside of the city and what can be done. 10

According to several reports in the New York Times, 11 12 there are officers who are clansmen joining police 13 apartments; most, I believe, do not live in the cities. 14 We have problems here with our young men applying to join 15 the department but not following up and some unable to 16 pass physical requirements. I'm very concerned because I 17 believe that working where you live, one has a vested interest in maintaining the quality of life. And it's 18 more than just a job. I have reported earlier that some 19 of the mayor's, top administrators don't live in the 20 city. Our tax dollars are going elsewhere, supporting 21 other cities, which include paying lawsuits. Something 22 must or needs to be done because reversal of decisions by 23 the Supreme Court Project 2025 and redistricting, we are 24 living in an armed camp policed by outsiders. 25



1 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you very kindly. MS. GARNIER: Mr. Chair, we're going to zoom. Our 2 first speaker will be Victoria Camille, then Mr. Scotty 3 Bowman, then former Commissioner William Davis. 4 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. You may be heard. 5 MS. CAMILLE: Good evening board. This is Victoria 6 7 Camille, District 7, and the CPTA. The Detroit City Charter indicates that one of the board's duties is to 8 9 establish policies and consult the mayor, and that one of the chief's duties is to recommend rules, regulations, 10 and procedures to the board for its approval. So far 11 12 within the last year, two policies have been mentioned in 13 the board meetings and in the media, and it's unclear if 14 these policies have come before the board for approval. 15 In the June 27th meeting, Chief White indicated that he 16 has a policy in place around legal observers. I 17 understand, as you've stated, Mr. Chair, that the policy committee has drafted in collaboration with CPTA a policy 18 for First Amendment activities, including legal 19 observers. However, I've requested several times that the 20 board share publicly the directive number of the policy 21 22 that Chief White stated is already in place. Please share that directive number and the day on which this policy 23 24 was approved by the BOPC.

25 The second one refers to, on November 30th, 2023,



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1 Chief White announced to the board that he has a policy in place to release body-worn camera footage within 45 2 days. A policy should clearly identify which body-worn 3 camera footage is subject to this 45- day release. For 4 example, since the officer that tased Sherman Lee Butler 5 used force; why isn't this video subject to this so-6 called policy. In addition, prior to board approval, the 7 board typically publicly posts a draft policy and holds a 8 public hearing for feedback. In the November 30th 9 meeting, Chief White mentioned how his policy is modeled 10 after LAPD, during which he stated, and I quote, "That's 11 12 the one that worked for us." But who is us? If the public 13 has not weighed in and the board has not approved. Can 14 you please provide the directive number for that policy, 15 and the date on which it was approved by the BOPC? Public 16 trust is paramount that the charter is being followed here. I hope DPD does not have policies in place that 17 18 have not been approved.

19 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you. You may be heard. 20 MR. BOWMAN: Hello? Yeah, first of all, I want to 21 address this. Basically, I don't know, I guess I call it 22 a kind of false diversion regarding the criminal versus 23 the non-criminal cases. It is true that the charter gives 24 the Board of Police Commissioners the authority to 25 investigate non-criminal complaints. However, the fact



1 that one is committing a crime does not mean that there is not also a violation of policy, which would be a non-2 criminal matter. One does not remove the other from being 3 possible. Commissioner Bernard was pretty well on point 4 5 when she was bringing up the various powers that you can 6 do that you can investigate situations. In fact, you have 7 the authority to subpoena witnesses. You can, for instance, in the case of Detective Simon, in that case, 8 9 you can go and investigate that case and probably there was a policy violation in addition to other matters that 10 maybe were criminal. 11

12 Furthermore, it may not just be her. Now, maybe she 13 is no longer working for the department, but maybe some 14 of the other people that helped keep it quiet, that 15 cooperated, that looked the other way; maybe some of 16 those other people still are working for the department 17 and still can be disciplined. So it does not leave 18 relevance all because one person has departed. The fact is it's hard to believe all this could happen with her 19 being the only person who knows it's going on. I heard 20 21 the same excuse used in the case of, you know, the coverup of the murder of Kaniesha Coleman. And in that case, 22 the board kind of blew up because, oh, obviously 23 homicide's a criminal matter. Of course, they changed it 24 25 to a suicide, which was part of the cover-up. But no, and



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1 once again, one person alone doesn't have all the 2 knowledge. There's other people looking the other way. 3 There's reasons to investigate non-criminal policies. 4 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you. Next speaker. MR. DAVIS: Good afternoon. May I be heard? 5 6 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: You may be heard, sir. MR. DAVIS: Well, I'd like to say it again, and I 7 8 probably have to say it again. I think the DPD and the 9 Board of Police Commissioners should be tracking wrongful arrests in the City of Detroit. In other places they do 10 11 that. Also, you all should be tracking lawsuits 12 associated with wrongful arrest. In my many different 13 hats, however, one of them is president of Detroit Active 14 Retired Employee Association. As a City of Detroit 15 retiree, they had my pension cut. I think it is willful 16 neglect that you all don't investigate, and generate a report on how millions of dollars are being ... the city is 17 being sued for millions of dollars for wrongful arrest 18 and lawsuits associated with that. You know, this board 19 20 can and should do a whole lot more than it is doing. You know, I think this board has the potential of doing a 21 number of outstanding things. So far, I've been 22 23 disappointed in the fact that you all are not pushing the 24 envelope more than what you all are. Thank you. 25 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you very much.



MS. GARNIER: Mr. Chair, our final speaker is Mr.
 Jahdante Smith.

3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: You may be heard, Mr. Smith.
4 MR. SMITH: Good afternoon.

5 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Good afternoon.

6 MR. SMITH: So, I just want to say a couple things. So, I've had a lot of issues with the way I've been 7 hearing about Homicide is running their department, and 8 their section of DPD. I don't know if there's a clear 9 policy directive about how much contact they must have 10 with the victims of homicide, their family members, but I 11 12 asked the chief about that last night, and he didn't give 13 me an answer. He gave me a politician's answer. I feel 14 like that is something I would like for the board to 15 raise, a specific policy on how much contact a homicide 16 detective must have with the family members of victims of homicide. I also want to talk about just the fact that 17 there's so much going on with this Sherman Lee Butler 18 case, and I feel like there's so much being ignored, even 19 though there is a criminal investigation being put afoot. 20 21 I've heard two different conflicting narratives 22 about a warrant request being sent to Kym Worthy. I was 23 told, there was an article saying; there was one sent

24 yesterday, and there was an article saying that there was 25 one sent previously to that. So you can only send one



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1 warrant request for one situation, and there's no new evidence. That video needs to be released. I missed the 2 policy meeting on Tuesday, but Linda Bernard, I will be 3 at that next policy meeting and I will ask that you make 4 5 a policy to have those releases down to one day, like Commissioner Moore, which I really do commend to ask for 6 that one-day release could be something that happens 7 because like you said at Linda Bernard, in different 8 states like Chicago and LA, which are huge mega cities 9 with way more residents than Detroit, they released those 10 videos and one day with blood and gore and all, 11 12 regardless of a police investigation or not. And also the fact that the chief is trying to hide behind the fact 13 14 that there was not a police officer doing the shooting. A 15 taser is less than lethal force, but it is a use of force 16 and that video should be released. And also, James White needs to be ashamed of himself to tell me that, just 17 because the family members didn't ask. And the family 18 members of Shirley Lee Butler have asked about that 19 video, but just to hide behind that is ridiculous. Shame 20 21 on him.

22 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you. We have presentations23 to the board, DPD budget report quarter four.

24 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Mr. Chairman, before Mr. Nazarko25 speaks, I just want to clarify one thing.



1 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yep.

2 COMMISSIONER MOORE: The board voted for a 21-day 3 reduction from the 45-day protocol. It was from Community 4 Output, specifically Minister Blount wanted the one-day 5 policy or introduction, so to speak, to go to the policy 6 committee. So that's where that came from. So, to Mr. 7 Smith, it came from Minister Blount, I just pushed it to 8 the subcommittee. Thank you, Mr. Chair.

CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes. And preferable the 9 subcommittee would take that item up at its next meeting. 10 But rest assured that, you know, that discussion will 11 12 have to be with the Board of Police Commissioners, the 13 department, as well as the mayor. You know, we cannot 14 approve a policy on our own. If we could approve a policy 15 on our own, we will have a ton of policies in place. But 16 it would take all of us to come to the table and come 17 into an agreement on this policy. So we are going to 18 negotiate the best that we possibly can for this policy. And we want everybody's voice to be involved with it as 19 20 well.

VICE CHAIR SMITH: Thank you. Through the Chair. Can you also explain too, to Mr. Smith how you did have the conversation publicly in regards to Homicide with our previous captain?

25 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Oh, absolutely. And we're happy



to have the new captain, Captain Thirkill, here in the 1 meeting right now, Homicide. I met with him for almost 2 two hours before this meeting, and I don't want to say 3 some of the things that he was doing because it's private 4 to these families and things of that nature, but he is 5 6 hitting the ground running very hard. And he hears the commission, he hears the community and he's very 7 sensitive to that. And we are looking for some great 8 things that happen under his leadership and under the 9 leadership of the commander. And they'll be presenting 10 before the board within the next month to some of the new 11 12 things that they want to push out and that they are 13 pushing out. But we have great, great leadership in 14 Captain Thirkill. Absolutely. Yeah. You can stand up, 15 Captain Thirkill. Yep. Alright. Yes, sir.

16 MR. NAZARKO: Good afternoon, Mr. Chair, good afternoon honorable board. For you who are new and do not 17 know me. My name is Nevrus Nazarko. I'm the agency CFO 18 for the Detroit Police Department. I've been in this 19 position for over five and a half years. And today I'm 20 going to present to you at a high level the financial 21 information for DPD. The slides were given to the 22 honorable board yesterday through the finance manager, 23 Mr. Drew Fries. And is someone moving the slides on the 24 screen? Yes. Thank you. And the reports that we are going 25



1 to see today are the quarter four, which is the June 2 30th, 2024 budget versus actual expenses and revenues 3 general fund 2024 budget versus actual revenues and 4 expenses grand activity report, vehicle purchase report, 5 and capital expenditure report.

Next slide, please. As the slide shows on the screen 6 the total revenue of all funds for the quarter ending on 7 June 30th, 2024, we brought in revenue wise \$30,357,000. 8 9 Broken down General fund. A portion was \$26.4 million. \$322,000 was brought in from forfeiture Fund grant fund, 10 \$1,664,000 and Special Revenue Fund, which is a 11 12 combination. There are two funds included in that \$1.9 13 million. And that's the total fund plus the E911 fund, 14 which handles the E911 response revenues that we receive 15 through the State of Michigan and Wayne County. That was 16 the budget. The actual amount was a little bit over that. 17 So the actual amount was \$32.2 million, and the positive variance. So we received close to \$2 million, \$1.927 18 million to be exact over what we had budgeted on the 19 revenue side. The expenditures that we expensed during 20 21 the fourth quarter, so months April, May, and June, we spent a total of 125. The budget, I'm sorry, was 22 \$125,968,000. The actual amount was a little bit over 23 24 that \$126,551,000 for a negative variance of \$582,000. 25 This was, by the way, the combination of all four funds,



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the General Fund, Forfeiture Fund, Grant Fund, and the
 Special Revenue Funds. Next slide, please.

The municipality... for the entire fiscal year 2024. The reason why I bring that up is because quarter four as we all know, is the end of the fiscal year. The city's fiscal year starts on July 1st of any given year, and ends on June 30th. Unlike the other private businesses that normally start January 1st to the end of December. Governments operate from, yes.

CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Can you speak up a little bit? 10 MR. NAZARKO: Okay. Sorry about that. The reason why 11 I bring up the entire year's financial information on 12 this slide is because quarter four coincides with the end 13 14 of the fiscal year. The city's fiscal year ends on June 15 30th, 2024, or of any given year. But in this particular 16 example, 2024. So for the entire year, we brought the 17 actual amount of revenues that we brought in was \$85,032,000 versus a budget of \$83,939,000. 18

So we brought in 101%, so 1% over what we had budgeted, which is really good, not just because we brought more, but shows that we were accurate in budgeting the revenues. On the expense side and this is broken down, but the total expenses, the entire department for the fiscal year 2024, the budget was \$390,731,000. The actual amount was \$389,914,000. This is



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1 a little bit inaccurate in the sense that after the date 2 of this report, the city, although the year ends on June 3 30th, of any given year, our activity still happens. And 4 we still have invoices and bills that we have not paid 5 from the time that they incurred before June 30th. So, as 6 we go through that process, and actually we are going 7 through that process, now, we book those expenses.

8 For example, let's say that we have a utility bill, 9 you know, which is a very small one, or if we purchased something that was delivered to us on June 20th, we did 10 not get an invoice until August. We still now are 11 12 required by law to book that expense back before June 13 30th. Therefore, these numbers here represent the actual 14 amounts. However, as we go through the process of, we 15 call it year-end closed, we are accruing, we are booking 16 some additional revenues and expenses alike to more 17 accurately reflect what we spent last year. My numbers as of today reflect that instead of being under budget on 18 the good side, kind of like 1% lower, not even 1%, 0.2%, 19 as you see on this slide this slide shows that we spent 20 99.8% of our budget. 21

Actually, we were above that little bit, not by much in the great scheme of things. If you are looking at a \$400 million budget, you know, a million dollars is not looking that bad, you know, but that's a reality. So just



1 when I provide the next round of reports, and you see that there is instead of \$389 million or 390, or almost 2 if I show \$391 million, that's the effect that I just 3 described earlier, that we are still accruing some 4 expenses that we did not have information at that time. 5 6 But overall this picture shows a very healthy and wellrun police department. We stayed within our budget and 7 made all the work, the good work that the DPD is doing, 8 9 as you heard, the deputy chief of the crime center, these 10 dollars supported all that activity, and the police department did not go over budget. So that's my take on 11 12 these numbers. Next slide, please.

13 This slide just shows you a snapshot of the revenues 14 versus expenditures. So if we brought in \$85 million in 15 revenues, and we spent \$390 million in expenditures, technically the net amount is \$304 million, meaning that 16 17 this \$304 million as I have mentioned before this 18 honorable board many times ago, is the actual amount that 19 is financed by the taxpayers' dollars, by the revenue sharing we receive from State of Michigan and other 20 revenue sources. But DPD has earmarked already \$85 21 22 million, and any amount we spent over and above that, it 23 comes from the general fund and other sources. Next slide, please. This next 3... 1, 2, 3 slides are basically 24 25 details of what I showed you earlier. For example, if you



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see on top of this, it says municipal income tax. We had
 budgeted \$30,201,000 and we brought in \$35,622,000. So
 this gives you a little bit more details on the revenue
 side on this slide.

And then the next slide on the expenses. Next slide, 5 please. Expenses here, show more details as to that \$390 6 million that I mentioned earlier. What was that spent on. 7 And then you can see the salaries. The actual amount was 8 9 \$301 million or \$301,990,000. Salary and wages. So that 10 includes salaries, wages, and overtime. Then the pension benefits, hospitalization or, you know, insurance 11 12 expense; FICA, which is the social security, Medicare, 13 workers compensation, sick leave, longevity, all those 14 breakdowns that I don't want to bore the honorable board 15 or the public with all those details, but those are given 16 to you just as we enter into the new budget season, because believe it or not, by the end of this month, we 17 18 are going to enter into new budget season to budget for the next fiscal year that start July 1st, 2025, which I 19 have talked to you again, financial manager and Mr. 20 21 Brown, that we are going to this board expects us to be 22 more proactive in providing the budget information ahead 23 of time.

And I'll be happy to discuss that with you as well as with the Chief's office. So this is basically, again,



1 more detailed information that you see here, that the honorable board, if you have any questions, I'll be happy 2 to answer that. The following slide, not the detailed 3 one, but one after that, is, this one shows the vehicle 4 5 purchase report. And this shows that the whole entire 6 quarter again, months, April, May, and June, we purchased \$406,000 worth of pursuit fully marked vehicles; tow 7 vehicles, we purchased \$99,448 and other vehicles in the 8 9 amount of \$477,711 for total of \$1,265,000, the entire vehicle purchase that happened during the fourth quarter, 10 April, May, and June. Next slide, please. The next slide 11 12 shows the capital improvements that GSD, which stands for 13 General Services Department, spent on DPD related 14 buildings, and that again, the DPD uses our own. The 15 total amount that they're broken down, as you see here 16 from DPD starts with DPD out of bounds, DPD, civil 17 rights, DPD DDC, forfeiture, gun range, harbormaster and 18 whatnot.

19 The total amount that was spent for the whole 20 quarter was \$354,643,000. Next slide, please. And the 21 last slide we are showing here in this slide, the grant 22 activity report for the fourth quarter of 2024, as well 23 as the entire year of 2024. Two grants that we started 24 during the fourth quarter of 2024, is the grant called 25 Project Safe Neighborhood in the amount of \$151,199. This



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1 doesn't mean that we spent that amount, we were awarded that amount, started that grant, and we are in process of 2 expanding those funds during the remainder of the fiscal 3 4 year. And the other grant is the Burn State Crisis 5 Intervention Program for \$400,000. Again, that's the award amount we were awarded, received when the project 6 started, the amount of money will still be expensed and 7 reported to you in the following quarters, namely, the 8 9 next one that we are going to talk about is end of 10 September.

And then underneath that is the grant activity 11 12 report during fiscal year 2024. And as you see here, I 13 have given you details of the grants that DPD has 14 utilized during the year. And as you see there, the two 15 major grants, or actually three that are qualified major 16 in the amount of over \$500,000 are the VOCA grant in the 17 amount of \$850,000. The Justice Assistance Grant (JAG), which is a recurring grant in the amount of \$950,000, and 18 then the out of theft grant in the amount of \$3,644,000. 19 20 So with that I would like to answer any questions that the honorable board may have. 21

22 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Commissioner Moore.

23 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you. Mr. Chair.

24 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir.

25 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Mr. Nazarko, I didn't hear



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anything about legal settlement dollars in your 1 2 presentation. Do you have any numbers on those? MR. NAZARKO: Through the Chair. That's a good 3 question. The reason you did not hear those numbers is 4 5 because the DPDs budget does not allocate dollars for 6 legal settlements. Those amounts are paid and budgeted 7 through the Legal Department of KMAC. COMMISSIONER MOORE: Okay. So that's the general 8 fund? 9 MR. NAZARKO: It is the General Fund, yes. But it's 10 not part of DPDs budget the way that you approve. And we 11 12 spend. 13 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Understood. My next question is, 14 and this is going to sound wild up front, so I apologize 15 to you all for asking. Have you ever heard anyone getting 16 their house note or car note paid from a city budget for 17 any professional reasons? MR. NAZARKO: From the DPD standpoint budget that I 18 handled, I have never heard that. COMMISSIONER MOORE: 19 What about the city? 20 21 MR. NAZARKO: It's hard. I would say no, but I don't 2.2 have full information. COMMISSIONER MOORE: You hesitated. So that's why I 23 24 asked. 25 MR. NAZARKO: I'm trying to hedge against, you know,



1 who knows this ARPA thing that, you know, whatever is happening with that and you know, like we do with 2 education, all that fund. But through DPD's budget, I'm 3 absolutely sure, no. 4 COMMISSIONER MOORE: And my last question, Mr. 5 Nazarko, for the last three or four years, we haven't had 6 7 a board attorney, but we've budgeted for a board attorney. What happens to those funds when we don't use 8 9 them year after year? 10 MR. NAZARKO: Again honorable Commissioner, great question. There is a thing in the budget, especially the 11 12 general fund that, use it or lose it. So as of June 30th, 13 if you had the money in your budget for board of attorney 14 or secretary or, or CI whatnot and you do not use it, it 15 stays with the city, but you have to again, be 16 appropriated next year, again to use that. You don't have 17 the right to double it next year. COMMISSIONER MOORE: And does that money carry over 18 19 to the next year? 20 MR. NAZARKO: No, it does not. 21 COMMISSIONER MOORE: But it stays with the city. 22 Mr. NAZARKO: It stays with the city, yes. 23 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Understood. Thanks Mr. Nazarko. MR. NAZARKO: You're welcome. 24

25 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair.



CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir. Oh, Commissioner
 Bernard, then you.

COMMISSIONER BERNARD: In response to my colleague's 3 question regarding litigation costs, can you provide, not 4 5 today, but can you provide us a subsequent report 6 regarding how much the department how much of the litigation costs for the City of Detroit that includes 7 legal fees and settlements and judgements is eligible to 8 9 the police department one, and also separately, applicable to the police commission. We both have 10 different litigation budgets, so to speak. So if you 11 12 could provide that to us at your earliest convenience, 13 that would be great.

14 MR. NAZARKO: Absolutely.

15 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: But my question relates to the 16 issue of overtime. Excuse me, initially this year the department the budget for overtime for sworn officers was 17 \$37,464,000, and then some more, but that doesn't matter, 18 roughly \$38,000, I mean 38 million. And for non-uniform, 19 20 it was roughly 2 million. You amended that budget. It doesn't say when you did it, but you amended it to almost 21 double the overtime for sworn officers to \$55 million and 22 added another million, if you will. Not a million, but 23 24 something less than that for civilian employees. But your year to date expenditures for overtime for officers is 25



1 \$60,469,000. And for civilians, 9 million from 1 million 2 from, I'm sorry, from nearly 2 million now, 9 million. My 3 guestion is, was that related to the draft?

MR. NAZARKO: The simple response is, no. Yes, we did spend some overtime during the draft days, four days or how many other days we had, but that would be an amount that is not even close to what we spent.

8 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: A significant increase in, in 9 overtime initially budgeted for \$ 37 million to now \$60 10 million. There has to be a reason for the year to date to 11 be \$60 million.

MR. NAZARKO: I'll leave that response to the deputychief's office.

14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: I say you probably want to direct 15 that through...

16 MR. NAZARKO: I can explain the budget process and 17 how we amended the budget, but the reasons...

18 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Right, right. Well, what I'm19 saying, he can forward that question.

20 MR. NAZARKO: Yes. I'll forward that question to the 21 chief's office.

22 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah, Well, the chief office is 23 right here.

DC WILLIAMS: I can give some insight. I can't give exactly where it was at, but for the draft, the draft was



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1 over the days we had the draft was a restrictive, CHAIRPERSON WOODS: We know you guys did spend 60 2 million on the draft. We are just saying in terms of the 3 overtime, in general as a whole, the \$60 million, you 4 know, how do that look in terms of where the bulk of 5 those dollars went in terms of the overtime? Is that 6 correct? 7 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Part of it. Where did it come 8 9 from? But was it simply as a result of that event? I 10 mean, this is huge. 11 MR. NAZARKO: Absolutely not. 12 DC WILLIAMS: It wasn't. And just to be clear, the 13 numbers we're looking at, through the Chair, those 14 represent the numbers for FY24, correct? 15 MR. NAZARKO: Yes. 16 DC WILLIAMS: So if we're looking for the numbers for 17 FY24, you'd be looking at a more detailed report if you want to know exactly where each dollar came from. But 18 19 generally, we run pre-scheduled overtime; we run emergency overtime to make sure we fill our minimums that 20 21 are required for policing each precinct. And then there 22 are a number of other details that may be possible. And 23 when I say details, those could be details that come about because we have a presidential visit. Those could 24 25 be details that come about because we have land protests



1 that come up or because we have protests that just come out of nowhere. But again, for detail, accountability of 2 where all those overtime dollars went, that would be a 3 4 report that would have to come at some other time. COMMISSIONER BERNARD: But my point is that a \$70 5 6 million variance for civilian and sworn officers, if you will, in overtime is related to something. And the 7 biggest event, it's not these little things when Kamala 8 9 Harris is coming to town, you got a little overtime and they locked down the street. That's not the point. That's 10 not what we're talking about. But what I really want to 11 12 know is, because the citizens have a right to know how 13 much these things actually cost in terms of tax dollars 14 and everything else where one, where all the money came 15 from, and two, did we get any from the NFL? It wasn't 16 just us, I know. It was the secret service here for the 17 draft. It was Homeland Security here. I met several of the officers, and of course all our federal office, but 18 that's all on the federal government. I'm just talking 19 about what happened with the city in terms of this budget 20 for the police department. And I don't recall that there 21 22 was any litigation, or there may be, when you give us a 23 report there was some litigation against the department as a result of the draft and these types of events. And I 24 25 appreciate it, I understand you don't have the answers.



1 That's just my comment.

MR. NAZARKO: Chair, quickly. On that, just to 2 alleviate your fear of that NFL draft. It's hard to 3 pinpoint exactly the dollar amounts that were spent on 4 the NFL draft. However, I can tell you that we are in 5 neighborhood of anywhere between \$300,000 to \$400,000 for 6 the entire NFL draft, and the impact that brought, you 7 have read the newspapers, it was millions of dollars that 8 came through the City of Detroit that we basically 9 received revenue on the other side through the taxes and 10 through the revenue sharing and all that. But the 11 12 overtime was not a factor at all. And the NFL, by the 13 way, did not reimburse the city for overtime. And it is 14 their policy that they do not reimburse everywhere they 15 go every year, they do not reimburse for overtime.

16 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I know they don't pay for 17 everything.

18 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Alright, thank you. Commissioner19 Burton and then Commissioner Dewaelsche.

20 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Thank you. Question. Looking at 21 the most previous budget, did any dollars go into any 22 form of military grade equipment? Did any dollars go over 23 to any one of the two programs with the Department of 24 Defense, whether it's a 1022 program or a 1023 program 25 and are any dollars in this new budget going towards any



1 military grade equipment as well.

MR. NAZARKO: Through the Chair. Commissioner Burton, 2 not sure what the definition of military equipment is. 3 I'm a finance guy. But in our budget there are no dollars 4 allocated for anything or that I can recall, or classify 5 in my mind as military equipment. Now, I just gave you a 6 report on some cars, the vehicles that we purchased, or 7 there is a command post that the DPD purchased. Is that a 8 military grade? I don't know what again, the definition 9 is, but title 22, absolutely not military grade 10 equipment, to my knowledge, absolutely not. There is not 11 12 a single dollar in this budget in regard to that 13 definition

14 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Or technology, military grade 15 technology equipment, whether it is fleet anything that 16 deals with military grade equipment.

17 MR. NAZARKO: Not to my knowledge.

18 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I mean, even a flash gate 19 grenade is classified as military grade equipment, night 20 gargles that Detroit Police Department had purchased in 21 the past, is still qualified as military grade equipment. 22 DC WILLIAMS: Through the Chair, if I may.

23 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir.

DC WILLIAMS: The equipment that the commissioner is asking for is law enforcement equipment. And of course,



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1 the military can use that equipment as well. But distraction devices, if you came up with a list of what 2 you were looking for, specifically, we could provide 3 that. But we do have distraction devices. They're called 4 5 flash bangs. We also have chemical munitions that we deploy when necessary if we have a crowd control 6 7 situation. But we don't classify those as military grade, and when we purchase them, we don't purchase them through 8 9 a military supplier. Of course the military may use that same manufacturer, but I think that your question needs 10 to be more tailored, and then we could probably answer in 11 12 a report that can be submitted to the board. 13 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Commissioner Dewaelsche.

14 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Thank you, Mr. Chair. Yes. 15 Under benefits, employee benefits, there's a line item 16 that's called other benefits expense. And the amended 17 budget for that line item was \$541,000, and the actual was 3.7 million. I'm just trying to understand what those 18 benefits are and why there's such a large variance. 19 20 MR. NAZARKO: The thing that comes to mind, 21 commissioner, is the payouts that we do. The pension benefit is a portion of that, and then payouts when the 22 police officers retire, is my other item. However, I can 23 give the board more detail on what exactly goes into 24 25 that. But those are two big items.



1 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Right. Okay. Thank you.

2 MR. NAZARKO: You are welcome.

3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Mr. Fries, if you can come4 up here with him, you stay there.

5 MR. FRIES: Sure.

6 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: I want to make sure that 7 everything is on point in terms of us being able to 8 review for the next budget. Everything is on track that 9 we, our staff, our secretary, yourself and our team have 10 a chance to go over this budget in a sufficient amount of 11 time. You know, where do we stand with that?

12 MR. FRIES: Through the Chair. Thank you for the 13 question. It's a pertinent one. That is as the executive 14 fiscal manager to the BOPC, I think the most important 15 thing in terms of reviewing this budget for DPD is to 16 review it with an accelerated timeline versus what we 17 received last year. So, Mr. Nazarko has been a great partner. He spoke to that today, which is maybe the most 18 important part, I think, of his presentation that I am 19 now looking forward to, is that we are able to review the 20 next fiscal year budget submission, instead of receiving 21 and in February to receive it at the end of this year. 22 And we've been working with Mr. Nazarko on following 23 24 through with that, and I think we should expect that as a board. 25



1 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes. And that'll give 2 commissioners the opportunity to be able to go through 3 this budget for next year, you know, we are, raiser touch 4 sharp. And get it to the budget committee and get it to 5 the full commission so that we can really go through it, 6 line by line in an efficient manner.

MR. FRIES: Through the Chair. With that extra time 7 that the board would receive... I think that there are 8 some of these questions that are being raised that 9 deserve investigation, and Mr. Nazarko, as the CFO might 10 not be the right person for the board to dig deeper with. 11 12 But again, with this greater time the right area experts 13 in the right format we can submit inquiries with, or even 14 bring them into the budget committee or bring them before 15 the board.

16 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Absolutely. Mr. Moore,

17 Commissioner Moore.

18 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Mr. Fries, do we have an update 19 on the citizens' request that we were discussing a couple 20 weeks ago?

21 MR. FRIES: Commissioner, there are still 22 investigations that need to be done. I need to check with 23 the Budget Department to see if spent can be had by the 24 board. And a suggestion from a member of the staff is 25 that maybe in terms of the execution, we could partner



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with DPD, and their budget has a degree of resources that
are much greater than ours. And so maybe we could play a
role, but maybe it's a partnership with other
departments, and that this initiative will serve the
total city and all the departments within it.
COMMISSIONER MOORE: I like the partnership. Thank

7

you, sir.

CHAIRPERSON WOODS: And move forward. I want us to 8 9 really put our heads around going after some grants, you know, getting with a lot of organizations and things of 10 that nature to be able to make sure that we are able to 11 12 identify some places that can partner with us so that we 13 can be able to do some community events, and also bring 14 in more staff to be able to deal with that backlog. But 15 thank you Mr. Fries, and thank you Mr. Nazarko. Thank you 16 for the report, and we look forward to baptizing the new 17 budget in a more thoughtful and meaningful way.

MR. NAZARKO: Same here, Mr. Chair. Thank you.
CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yep. Let's go to the board
secretary. Yeah. Thank you, kindly.

MS. GARNIER: The report from the secretary today, incoming information only, which should be in your binders, and the announcements are as printed. Next meeting is Thursday, September 12th, 6:30 PM, Fourth Precinct at Kemeny Recreation Center, which is located



2260 South Fort Street in Detroit. The next community
 meeting is scheduled for Thursday, October 10th at 6:30
 PM, Third Precinct Goodwill Industries Career Center,
 which is located at 2777 East Grand Boulevard in Detroit.
 That concludes the report from the board secretary today,
 sir.

CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you very kindly. And I want 7 to thank you for working with us. We've been contacting 8 9 institutions to be able to get some interns on board. And so we had a great conversation with the University of 10 Detroit law school, and that's moving very well. And, you 11 12 know, look forward to being able to execute that 13 expeditiously so that we can bring more help in so that 14 we can get some more work done. So thank you Madam 15 Secretary and even Mr. Brown for your leadership and your 16 hard work there. And then the board attorney has been 17 working very diligently with us on a lot of things as well. Let's go to the we did announcements, policy 18 19 committee.

20 COMMITTEE: Thank you, Mr. Chairman, and my 21 colleagues. On behalf of the policy committee; most of 22 you have a summary of the policy committee updates in 23 your package. I attended the committee along with 24 Commissioner Eva Dewaelsche. The community committee 25 attendees included the board secretary Lydia Garnier.



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CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Let the record reflect that we 1 don't have committee members, other than board members on 2 3 there. So, the community attendees. COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Ms. Jasmine Taylor, 4 5 Administrative Assistant Teresa Blossom, Community 6 Relations Coordinator, Ms. Mary Barber, Civilian 7 Oversight Analyst, Mr., I mean, Attorney Dante Goss, Interim board attorney, Stephen Lameroux, Director of 8 Crime Data Analytics and Deputy Chief Hayes of the Crime 9 Strategic Bureau. Strategies Bureau. Sorry. We reviewed 10 the DPD approved specifications report on the Skydio 11 12 unmanned aerial system, Stephen Lameroux, and 13 Commissioner Bernard provided an introduction and 14 overview of the specification report, highlighting that 15 the drones will be used for search and rescue crime, 16 accident scenes and mental health issues in the 17 community. Steven Lameroux provided answers that the committee had about the Skydio unmanned aerial system 18 drones. There was a staff review and community review 19 20 conducted by Ms. Teresa Blossom. Ms. Blossom presented 21 community feedback gathered via SurveyMonkey prior to the approval of the specification report. Key points included 22 the community familiarity with drones. 23 24 Their support for drones in enhancing surveillance

25 evidence, collection officer safety and response times.



Concerns were also noted regarding privacy and potential 1 misuse. Following this direction, myself and Commissioner 2 Dewaelsche voted and agreed to move the specification 3 report out of committee to the full board for review and 4 approval. I don't know what's wrong with this phone; 5 6 anyway, for review and approval. So we are going to, we're, our report would be that it would be removed of 7 course, and approved for submission to the full board. 8 The second item that we addressed was the specification 9 report. Novo Digital Radiography Technology Professional 10 for the Professional Development Bureau. Stephen Lameroux 11 12 presented the specification report outlining an upgrade 13 to the existing system used by DPDs Bomb Disposal Unit. 14 The Novo Digital Radiography Technology, which are really 15 X-rays, will enhance the unit's ability to safely 16 photograph and investigate suspicious packages aiding in

17 rapid risk management and community safety.

Stephen Lameroux addressed committee concerns and 18 provided various clarifications. After discussion around 19 20 the report, committee Bernard, I'm sorry, myself and 21 Commissioner Dewaelsche voted and agreed to move the specification report out of committee to the full board 22 for review and approval. Finally, there was a request for 23 24 the approval of the SIG COGS specification report for 25 dumping cameras. Stephen Lameroux introduced an overview



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of the specification report, noting that the cameras will 1 be used to address illegal dumping activities in Detroit. 2 I expressed concerns regarding the number of cameras, 3 265, and the potential for constant surveillance of city 4 residents. Deputy Chief Hayes provided detailed 5 explanations on the camera's usage, highlighting their 6 capability to capture a range of criminal activities 7 beyond illegal dumping, including homicides, narcotics, 8 operations, human trafficking, and other offenses. Deputy 9 Chief Hayes assured the committee that the cameras are 10 not intended for community surveillance, but as a tool 11 12 for crime prevention and enforcement. He also ensured the 13 committee that he will be provided with updated stats on 14 illegal dumping enforcement efforts and related crimes. 15 The specification report will be deferred until the 16 September 17th, 2024 meeting to allow for further evaluation of the need for additional cameras and to 17 better understand the justification for their deployment. 18 That includes my report. The next meeting will be 19 20 September 17th, 2024. 21 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Any questions? 22 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Yes, Mr. Chairman. 23 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir.

24 COMMISSIONER MOORE: I'm just wondering, is the 25 department willing to be transparent and provide us a



1 monthly update as it relates to the usage of these cameras providing the raw data? We haven't seen that 2 before. Whether it be license plate readers or any of the 3 other issues we've had regarding electronic surveillance, 4 5 you know, the board passes it and then we don't hear anything else from it. We don't know how it's being used. 6 If there's a check and balance, it's an internal check 7 and balance and the board never hears anything about it. 8 So I'm just wondering if that's on the table. DC? 9 DC WILLIAMS: Through the Chair. I quess it's on the 10 table now, but it is definitely something I'll push to 11 12 the Chief and I'm pretty sure that we will come up with 13 something that the board will find acceptable. 14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah. Thank you. Thanks man. Yes.

DR. JACKSON: Does the chair of the committee wish to make these motions to have the board adopt these reports? CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes.

18 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Yes. I'd move that the board 19 adopt the reports.

20 DR. JACKSON: So the motion would be by direction of 21 the Policy Committee because it's not a personal motion; 22 any motion. By direction of the Policy Committee, you 23 move that the board will adopt the unmanned aerial 24 systems report. Does the board wish to divide these two 25 motions?



1 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Yes.

2 DR. JACKSON: So, you'll report one. You'll do one 3 and then do the other Madam Chair?

4 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: You may go right ahead and 5 report both of them since my eyes aren't as good as 6 yours. Excuse me.

DR. JACKSON: No, it's the matter of whether or not
8 the commission wants to handle these two motions
9 separately.

10 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes.

DR. JACKSON: So then the first motion would be by direction of the Policy Committee. You move adoption of the...

CHAIRPERSON WOODS: I will ask Commissioner 14 15 Dewaelsche, being a committee member to make the motion? 16 DR. JACKSON: Who wants to make the motion? As long as they say by direction of the Policy Committee because 17 it's not a personal motion, it's a committee motion. 18 19 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: By direction of the Policy Committee, our motion is that the board adopt the report 20 regarding the specification report for the Skydio 21 unmanned aerial system and our report regarding drones 22 and other specific reports presented by Ms. Blossom and 23 24 that we adopt the Novo Digital Radiography Technology Professional development bureau specification report. And 25



1 then finally the approval...well, no, that's...

2 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Alright.

3 DR. JACKSON: There's no second required because...
4 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Right. Okay. If there's no
5 objection, yes sir.

6 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Well, discussion more so. So I 7 would prefer to table it until I understand the energy is 8 there. So I'll just go ahead and vote my conscience.

9 DR. JACKSON: That would be a motion to postpone not 10 to table.

11 COMMISSIONER MOORE: I didn't make the motion. I was 12 just speaking out loud.

13 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Alright. Motion made by 14 Commissioner Bernard. There being no objection, you know, 15 it is approved. There is one objection? So do we have a 16 roll call?

DR. JACKSON: You would have to state the motion, Mr.Chair.

CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. The motion made by
Commissioner Bernard to approve the specs report for
Skydio unmanned aerial system and also to approve
specification report for the Novo Digital Radiology Rafi
Technology Professional Develop Development Bureau.
COMMISSIONER BERNARD: That's it. All in favor.
DR. JACKSON: You have to ask for debate, Mr. Chair.



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1 Are you ready for the question?

2 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Are you ready for the question?

3 DR. JACKSON: Go, sir.

4 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Are you guys all approved ready

5 for the question?

6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Yes.

7 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: And so did we entertain a motion 8 or...?

9 DR. JACKSON: No, you have a motion. At this point

10 you can ask, any objections?

11 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Any objections?

12 DR. JACKSON: Okay. So then when you need... you don't

13 have to have a roll call vote. You can just ask...

14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: All in favor?
