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BOARD OF POLICE COMMISSIONERS MEETING

11

October 10, 2024 at 6:30 P.M.

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1 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Good evening. The time is
2 now 6:30 PM and I would like to call this meeting to
3 order for the Board of Police Commissioners tonight. We
4 have the invocation by Chaplain David Boyd. Are you
5 present?

6 CHAPLAIN BOYD: Yes, I am.

7 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: I can hear, sir.

8 CHAPLAIN BOYD: Alright, let us pray. Father, in the
9 name of Jesus, first I want to just tell you, thank you
10 Lord. Lord, we thank you for this meeting that's about to
11 take place. We ask that you will just have your weight in
12 this meeting today, God. We ask that you will fill us
13 with wisdom, God. In the name of Jesus, touch each and
14 every last person that's here, that we follow the vision.
15 Lord, we pray for our chief of police. We pray for every
16 police officer, Lord. We pray that you continue to cover
17 them and keep them. We thank you for this commission
18 meeting today, Lord. Give us what we need to X out the
19 vision of what you called us to do, God. God, we thank
20 you for each and every last person who is present today,
21 up under the sound of my voice. And God, we give you all
22 honor, glory, and praise. In Jesus' name we pray. Amen.

23 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Amen. Thank you so much. So
24 we do not have a quorum, so we will get ready to move
25 into oral communication.

1 MS. UNDERWOOD: Madam Chairman, we have two speakers,
2 Jasper Miller and Victoria Camille.

3 MR. MILLER: Good evening.

4 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Good evening.

5 MR. MILLER: My name is Jasper I'm with the Marcus
6 Garvey Movement and we be out here with crime stoppers,
7 building up communities with turkeys hat coats scarfs. I
8 have done a block party every year, 14 years. No fights,
9 no news when you come out there. But it's okay because
10 the guys were shooting at each other in my neighborhood.
11 So I told my friend over here, you bring some potato
12 salad, you bring some bread, and we can go to a block
13 party, go get a permit legal and get the DJ, 500-600
14 people every year, 14 years, I've been harassed by all we
15 do with some, not my memory, we should ask. A couple
16 weeks before the event, two police officers asked me, I'm
17 sorry. Two police officers rolled home, said, you got ID,
18 two white guys? I said, "Yeah." They said, "Need to see
19 it."

20 I said, what for? I said, "You suspect me of a
21 crime? They said, "No, I need to know who you are." I
22 said, "Why do you need to know who I am? "He said, "I
23 need to know." I said, "Man, [unclear] . The dog and
24 [unclear]. I don't want to get blood on the gloves. He
25 put the gloves on. I said, "Are you serious? [unclear]"

1 Then I said, I act like I was videotaping. That scared
2 the police off, [unclear] the video cases. It is amazing
3 how much they break the law and they promise to uphold
4 it. These guys were ready to take my ID, or force me, and
5 I haven't committed anything. [unclear] from my sister, a
6 police officer. She lives two blocks down from where I
7 live. So I called her and said, these guys are harassing
8 me. She came around and let me go. Two weeks later, my
9 son got pulled over, banged up on the corner. I was out
10 there, police pulled up and pulled him out of the car.

11 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Sir, that's your time. I'll
12 give you five more seconds, really quickly.

13 MR. MILLER: Okay. I need the police to be held
14 accountable. They held my arm, messed me up, arrested me
15 illegally, and the police precinct won't even take my
16 complaints. I have to stay in the house. They've been
17 harassing me.

18 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Okay. Thank you, sir.

19 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: So what precinct was it?

20 MR. MILLER: The Eleventh Precinct.

21 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: The Eleventh Precinct.

22 MR. MILLER: And all we do for the community
23 precinct.

24 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: We have our staff, as well as
25 officers to work with him, but one of our investigators

1 is in the audience as well. Did you file a complaint with
2 the Board of Police Commissioners?

3 MR. MILLER: No. That's what I am trying to do.

4 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: You can do that complaint online,
5 but our investigator will help you.

6 MR. MILLER: Okay.

7 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: So can you help him out and then
8 talk to Officer Jalen after that?

9 MR. MILLER: Okay. Talk to our investigator first.

10 MR. MILLER: Thank you all.

11 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yep.

12 MS. CAMILLE: Good evening commissioners.

13 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Good evening.

14 MS. CAMILLE: Victoria Camille, District 7. Coalition
15 for Police Transparency and Accountability. This
16 situation right here, that body-worn camera needs to be
17 looked at, and that's exactly why we need it released on
18 a regular basis. But anyway, that's not what I came here
19 to talk about. So I do want to commend the staff over the
20 last several months. They have been posting kind of the
21 storyline of the policies that the board has been
22 reviewing over time, which is perfect, so that the public
23 can go out there and see what's being reviewed and see
24 which meetings it was reviewed at the Policy Committee
25 Meeting, as well as here. What's not up to date, is the

1 actual current policies, which are further down on the
2 page, which haven't been refreshed since December of last
3 year. And so, the board has approved multiple policies
4 since then. And so, the DPD policy manual that is
5 published for the public right now is not aligned with
6 what they're following because it's all the way from
7 December. So that can be updated, that will be greatly
8 appreciated by the public. Thank you.

9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Absolutely. Thank you for
10 pointing that out. And our policy manager is here. She's
11 on Zoom. Okay. She would definitely take a look at that.
12 I've been very, very pleased with our policy manager. She
13 has taken a deep dive at all the policies and the special
14 orders from DPD and seeing what is current and what is
15 outdated. And thank you Ms. Camille for always keeping us
16 abreast to that and always coming to our meetings. And we
17 welcome everybody in the public to have an open policy
18 discussion with our team and our new policy manager.
19 She's on board now, and she's off to a great, great
20 start. And I think you'll be very, very pleased with her
21 actions. So let the record reflect that Commissioner
22 Burton is here. And so having said that, I'm going to
23 entertain a motion for the approval of the agenda. And
24 let the record reflect that Commissioner Bernard is
25 present now as well.

1 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: And DPD.

2 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Off the record.

3 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Woods - Present.

4 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Smith - Present.

5 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Bernard - Attorney Linda

6 Bernard, present. District 2. MS. MS. GARNIER:

7 Commissioner Banks - Present.

8 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Bell is excused.

9 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Burton - Present on behalf
10 of District 5.

11 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Carter is excused.

12 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Moore - Present.

13 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Hernandez is excused.

14 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Pressley is excused.

15 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Dewaelsche - Present.

16 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: We have a quorum. I'd like to
17 entertain a motion for the approval of October 10th,
18 2024, agenda.

19 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: So moved.

20 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Second.

21 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Moved by Commissioner Moore, and
22 second by Commissioner Bernard. All in favor, say aye.

23 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

24 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Any discussion? Anyone opposed?

25 The motion is carried. Thank you very kindly. I entertain

1 a motion for the approval of minutes for October 3rd,
2 2024.

3 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: So moved.

4 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Second.

5 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Moved by Commissioner Dewaelsche,
6 and second by Commissioner Moore. All in favor say aye.

7 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

8 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Any discussion? Anyone opposed?
9 The motion is carried. Introduction of BOPC Staff, Chief
10 of Police, and Elected Officials.

11 MS. GARNIER: Chairman, and the honorable board, we
12 have Chief Investigator Jerome Warfield. Mr. Robert
13 Brown, Ms. Jonya Underwood. Ms. Teresa Blossom. Ms.
14 Jasmine Taylor, Ms. Felicia Tyson, Ms. Artemisia Joshua,
15 Ms. Mary Barber, Mr. Drew Fries, Acting Supervising
16 Investigator Elgin Murphy. Our interpreter for this
17 evening is Dr. Stephanie Beatty, court reporter Don
18 Handyside, Sergeant Quinn, Audio, and Mr. Charles is
19 handling Media Services. Deputy Chief Arnold Williams is
20 here. Elected Officials and Representatives are as
21 follows: Marie Overall, for State Representative Tyrone
22 Carter's office, Fredia Butler, president of the Second
23 Precinct Community Relations, LaDon Davis, Office of
24 Councilman Fred Durhal III, former Commissioner William
25 Davis. Also, we have Leslie Malcolmson, and Rita Smith.

1 That ends the introductions, Mr. Chair.

2 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Thank you very kindly; and
3 I don't know if Greg Anderson is here, the Executive
4 director of this facility but I want to thank him
5 publicly for allowing us to use this space. This space is
6 a bedrock for transformation. I've come here a number of
7 times and talked to the people here and engaged with
8 them, and he's doing a remarkable job and helping
9 transform the lives of those who have been unjustly
10 impacted by him and his team. I want to applaud them for
11 their hospitality this evening. Definitely, hat off to
12 them and all of the great work they do on the same lives
13 of the citizens of the City of Detroit. So this evening
14 we are in the Third Precinct. This is an overlapping
15 District of Districts 5, and 6, within the precinct of
16 Commissioner Burton representing District 5. We will have
17 some remarks from him at this time.

18 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

19 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir.

20 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I just wanted to say that it is
21 great to be here at the Third Precinct. You know, this is
22 a great precinct with a rich history. I really love the
23 work that you all are doing over here, especially with
24 the NPOs; the neighborhood associations, and the block
25 clubs. You have really strong leadership and it's great

1 to be back over here. As I recall, I had to knock on
2 probably about 10,000 doors in the area alone when I
3 first got elected. I knocked on like 33,000 doors in the
4 District, but 10,000 doors right here within precinct
5 ten. And so far, it's [unclear] with you all.

6 I always come for a national night out it nice to
7 have fellowship with you all. But it's great to see Ms.
8 Rita Smith and Leslie Malcolmson and your president.

9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you very kindly. We'll give
10 greetings to the commander in a few, but he's hit the
11 ground running in terms of his District. Very remarkable
12 commander in this district, and I appreciate your
13 leadership here. This is also Commissioner Carter
14 District, as part of hers, and she's not here today, but
15 I want anything, a motion to cancel the October 17th,
16 2024 meeting of the Board of Police Commission due to the
17 NACOLE Conference for which we are going to be out of
18 town. COMMISSIONER BERNARD: So moved.

19 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Support.

20 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Moved by Commissioner Bernard and
21 supported by Commissioner Moore. All in favor say, aye.

22 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

23 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I want to amend the motion.

24 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay, we can do it under
25 discussion. All in favor say, aye. COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

1 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Any discussion?

2 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Yes, I have a discussion.

3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes.

4 COMMISSIONER BURTON: The Charter speaks that the
5 representatives on the board meet weekly. And so if the
6 conference is going on until the 17th, I'd like to move
7 that the board has this meeting on, say the 18th. If we
8 move that meeting, we should still meet so we can be in
9 compliance with the City Charter.

10 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Anybody wants to chime in?

11 I don't know if anybody wants to second that motion.

12 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: There's no staff. There will
13 be no staff here to prepare for the meeting, prepare
14 binders, documents, et cetera. It's impossible to do a
15 meeting on the day that many people are coming; either
16 that day or...

17 COMMISSIONER BURTON: There will be some here where
18 we can still have a meeting for the public on, you know,
19 say the 18th. Once again, this is our fiduciary
20 responsibility to meet weekly. And just like you have the
21 community involved in these meetings, but you also have
22 the police that's involved in the community 24/7. So we
23 have to be able to hear from both sides; and therefore we
24 should be able, as commissioners, to exercise our
25 District responsibility by having that meeting since this

1 term mandates that we meet weekly.

2 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Any support? There has been no
3 second, and then we are going to end the discussion on
4 note. Anyone opposed to the motion that there was no...?

5 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair. I just want
6 it very clear that the Charter speaks very clearly to
7 what meetings that we can cancel, and this is not one of
8 those. And it is definitely not for us to cancel any of
9 our meetings at this time.

10 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. well, you don't have a
11 second to your motion or it is not as it relates to... Did
12 we exhaust that motion already?

13 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Already.

14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. The motion has been
15 carried. All right. Thank you. All right. Chief of Police
16 and Third Precinct Report.

17 DC WILLIAMS: Through the Chair.

18 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir.

19 DC WILLIAMS: Updated probation on the injured
20 officers with the [unclear].

21 We had two police officers from the Second Precinct.
22 They were on duty patrol in the vehicle. Involved in
23 vehicular accident, which occurred on September 8th. He
24 responded to a driveway complaint that the officer is
25 currently off with injury. We also have another officer

1 from the Fifth Precinct who was also involved in an on
2 duty patrol accident with another vehicle, which occurred
3 also [unclear], by responding to a home invasion, also
4 off duty, Going into our crime data, the information I'm
5 going to read was updated as of October 9th. So for
6 homicides, we are down 19% from last year. So we've had
7 38 less homicides this year. In '23, our non-fatal
8 shootings were down 28%. We had 190 less non-fatal
9 shootings this year than what we had last year. For
10 robberies, we are down 18%. I'm sorry, we are down 18%.
11 That is correct. That is 204 less robberies this year
12 than last year. For overall part one violent crime, we're
13 down 8%. So we've had a decrease of 796 part one violent
14 crime incidents during 2004, I'm sorry, 2024. For
15 carjacking down 25%. And that is a decrease of 33
16 carjackings this year.

17 I'm looking at mental health calls for individuals
18 in crisis. We had 309 more calls this year than we had
19 last year. And we're looking at the total numbers. Our
20 number is 2,701, I'm sorry, 2,751. Looking at our
21 overdose calls we had this year, 207 less overdose calls
22 than we had last year. If we look at the actual number,
23 that's going to be 4,447 calls we've actually had. That
24 is a reduction of 270, as compared to 2023.

25 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Can you speak in the mic clearly

1 because our ASL team; it's hard for them to pick you up.

2 I just got a text.

3 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I hear you loud and clear,

4 Chief.

5 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. A member of the ASL team

6 just texted me and said, it is hard for them to hear and

7 it's not clear

8 DC WILLIAMS: Through the Chair. Understood. Also, I

9 want to make sure I am talking slower. I know the last

10 time I was here, I was going a little too fast. with our

11 incidents. So we've had a couple incidents that we're

12 going to bring to the board's attention. One is the

13 update. We had a fatal stabbing that occurred on Sunday,

14 September 29th, 2024. This was about 3:59 PM. Officers

15 were dispatched to the 6,000 block of Minock to

16 investigate a possible missing person. Officers were

17 dispatched to the scene to meet someone whose coworker

18 had not shown up to work in a few days. They spoke to the

19 witness, who stated that he came to check on the victim

20 and discovered a line on the floor in the front room,

21 suffering from an apparent stab wound. Officers observed

22 the victim lying on the floor in a pool of blood. Medic

23 33 arrived at the scene and pronounced the victim

24 deceased. Officers also notified that the victim's 1999

25 Mercedes was missing.

1 Officers from the Sixth Precinct preserved the scene
2 and a detective from the Homicide Section. Detectives
3 were informed that the victim's vehicle was recovered in
4 Dearborn and a 17-year-old male was detained. Officers
5 from Detroit Police Department, Dearborn PD, conveyed the
6 suspect to Wayne County Youth Home and the Youth Home
7 investigators interviewed the suspect and concluded that
8 the suspect murdered the victim. On October 3rd, 2024,
9 detectives submitted a warrant to the Wayne County
10 Prosecutor's office for review. On October 8th, the
11 suspect was arraigned in 36th District Court for first
12 degree homicide, premeditated felony murder, and unlawful
13 driving away of the vehicle. The suspect who will be
14 charged as an adult was remanded to custody and remains
15 in custody at the Wayne County jail.

16 Incident number two, fatal shooting of an officer
17 involved. On Tuesday, October 8th, 2024, at 7:15 PM,
18 officers were on routine patrol and recognized the
19 individual riding a bike, a person who was wanted for a
20 violation of parole. Officers confirmed that the suspect
21 had an active warrant for parole violation and attempted
22 to investigate the suspect at Chandler Park Drive and
23 Kennedy. The suspect jumped off his bicycle, removed a
24 handgun from his waistband, and began firing shots at the
25 officers. The officers returned the fire. At this time,

1 preliminarily, the evidence suggests that the individual
2 fatally wounded himself. We're waiting for the medical
3 examiner to confirm that, but the officer did return
4 fire. But at this time, all the evidence points that the
5 individual fatally wounded himself. None of the officers
6 were injured, and Michigan State Police is currently
7 investigating this with our Homicide Task Force. Incident
8 number three, fatal shooting. On Sunday, October 6th,
9 2024 at 12:07 AM, officers were dispatched to the 17,000
10 block of Stansbury to investigate a fatal shooting.

11 Officers responded to the scene and observed the
12 victim lying on the sidewalk suffering from multiple
13 gunshot bullets. Medics arrived on scene and announced
14 the victim deceased on scene. Officers from the 12th
15 Precinct preserved the scene. The detectives from the
16 Homicide Section were notified. Detectives determined
17 that the victim was shot last, sorry, was shot and was
18 scheduled to appear on a trial related to a past
19 shooting. The case is still under investigation.
20 Investigation detectives were asking anyone with
21 additional information regarding this incident, contact
22 Crime Stoppers at 1-800-SPEAKUP or detroitrewards.tv. On
23 Monday, October 7th, 2024 at 2:50 PM, officers were
24 dispatched to the 17,000 block of Cooper to investigate a
25 fatal shooting. Officers arrived at scene and observed

1 victims sitting in the passenger seat of a vehicle
2 suffering from multiple gunshot wounds. Medic 13
3 responded to the scene and transported the victim to the
4 local hospital where the victim was pronounced deceased
5 on arrival. Officers from the Ninth Precinct preserved
6 the scene and detectives from the Homicide Section were
7 notified. The suspect was last seen driving a gray Dodge
8 pickup. Detectives are asking anyone with any information
9 about this homicide to contact Crime Stopper at 1-800-
10 SPEAKUP or detroitrewards.tv.

11 Incident number five. Felonious assault of a 7-year-
12 old female. On Tuesday, October 8th at 3:53 PM, officers
13 were dispatched to the 5,800 block of Greenview to
14 investigate a child stabbing. Officers arrived at the
15 scene, and observed the victim suffering from a cut along
16 her neck. The victim was transported by Medic 48 to a
17 local hospital where the victim was listed in stable
18 condition. Officers interviewed witnesses who reported
19 observing an older white male exit a white van; walk over
20 to the victim and place a knife through her neck. The
21 suspect then escaped the area in a white van. Officers
22 from the Sixth Precinct preserved the area and detectives
23 from the Sixth Precinct Detective Unit were notified.
24 Detectives were informed that a 911 call had just come in
25 and the caller stated that he was going to commit suicide

1 because he just cut the little girls throat. Officers
2 determined the suspect was in a 6,000 block of Penrod.
3 They responded to the suspect's location where they
4 detained him, and he was arrested at the scene.

5 Detectives from the Sixth Precinct Detective Unit, are in
6 the process of preparing a warrant to be submitted to
7 Wayne County Prosecutor's Office soon.

8 And that's all for the actual criminal incidents
9 that we had or violent incidents that we had that were
10 reported to the board. The positives were the Honor
11 Connor Run, which took place yesterday. This took place
12 at Detroit Police Public Safety yesterday. And the run
13 was to honor Connor Donahue, who was a student police
14 officer who was critically wounded off duty. He had
15 actually pulled off to the side of the road to help stray
16 dog who was on the freeway. He was hit while in the
17 process of doing that. So the Detroit Training Academy
18 actually held the Honor Connor Run, which will be an
19 annual event. And that takes place with the graduating
20 class from the Detroit Police Department. They conduct
21 that every year. Walk-a-Mile Wednesday, concluded for
22 this year; yesterday. Walk-a- Mile Wednesday kicked off
23 at Detroit Public Safety Headquarters.

24 We called it Walk-a-Mile, but because it was the
25 last mile that we were going to walk this year, we walked

1 two. So we had a lot of presence there for a lot of
2 officers. And so it was very well received. Also,
3 Domestic Violence Awareness Month kicks off Friday. The
4 event will be held in the Skylar Room at the Detroit
5 Public Safety Headquarters. And it'll be from 9:30 AM to
6 2:00 PM. At 10:00 AM, the Domestic Violence Walk, which
7 honors those who lost their lives as a result of domestic
8 violence, will be held in front of the Depart Public
9 Safety Headquarters. At 11:00 AM speakers and resources
10 will be available in the Skylar Room. Faith and Blue
11 events. Tomorrow, the Faith and Blue opening ceremony
12 will be held at the corner of Ballpark, at 4:00 PM. There
13 will be several faith events for officers. That concludes
14 the chief report. Questions from the board?

15 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Commissioner Banks.

16 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Thank you. Through the Chair.

17 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir.

18 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Deputy Chief, you stated the
19 suspect wounded himself.

20 Is there any medications or proof that he wounded
21 himself?

22 DC WILLIAMS: Well, that's all preliminary
23 information. We're waiting for the medical examiner's
24 report to come back for his firearm. But from all the
25 preliminary evidence that we have...

1 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Okay. Now, did he kill himself
2 or wounded himself?

3 DC WILLIAMS: Killed himself. He wounded himself to
4 the point where he killed himself.

5 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Okay. I thought you said wounded
6 himself.

7 DC WILLIAMS: He fatally wounded himself.

8 COMMISSIONER BANKS: But he ends up dying.

9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Commissioner Moore.

10 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you, Mr. Chair.

11 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir. So, Deputy Chief, you
12 mentioned an incident on the Sixth Precinct as relates to
13 a 7-year-old girl. I just want to let the community know
14 if that is being treated as a hate crime. She was from a
15 Middle Eastern descent, and the man that was [unclear
16 29:08] was a white male; and in these times around the
17 world, Detroit Police Department was doing a [unclear],
18 investigated as a hate crime. So I just wanted to add
19 that. Secondly, you know, you mentioned drag racing that
20 an officer was injured. Are you aware of any police
21 officers that are actually participating in drag racing?

22 DC WILLIAMS: I'm not; but it's something I can
23 definitely look into

24 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Okay. Thank you, sir.

25 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes. Commissioner Bernard, then

1 Commissioner Smith.

2 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Just quickly. Thank you for
3 that report. But all of the incidents that you reported
4 regarding incidents that involved police officers or
5 others in the neighborhood, they're not in our materials.
6 If you would be kind enough to make sure that the same
7 incident report material that you have, that we get, I
8 would appreciate this report. Maybe it was an oversight?

9 DC WILLIAMS: Through the Chair. That was definitely
10 oversight because they make sure you have the abridged
11 information.

12 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Every page that, but thank you
13 for an excellent report. The other thing; first of all,
14 according to your administrator messages for the
15 community, you can come to police headquarters on Friday,
16 on the 18th, I believe, and get a Covid shot. And all the
17 rest of the vaccinations that you're supposed to get for
18 the winter, you have to bring your ID, irrespective of
19 what your insurance card is, just bring that to.. They'll
20 bill it. But it's being done by CVS at police
21 headquarters on Third. And then finally, in terms of the
22 domestic violence event that you're speaking about for
23 tomorrow, everyone is asked to wear purple. So if you can
24 wear purple, it's a sign of peace and courage and
25 survival. And do the walk and then come upstairs to the

1 Skylar Room. We'll make sure we'll have refreshments and
2 stuff like that of people that are there. And there will
3 be speakers on the issue of domestic of violence. Thank
4 you.

5 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: The question is, all of those
6 things that you're referring to is open to the public in
7 line with your report. Finish reporting your questioning?

8 DC WILLIAMS: Well, so I'm aware of those events
9 taking place. I'm not sure of the opening, but I'm going
10 to go with whatever Commissioner Bernard has stated and I
11 thank you Commissioner.

12 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Definitely, that this is Domestic
13 Violence Awareness Month. And we get a ton or the
14 department gets a ton of domestic violence calls. And
15 that's a high thing in the Detroit Police Department. Can
16 you talk about that a little bit?

17 DC WILLIAMS: Well, at the Detroit Police Department,
18 we receive yearly a number of what we call aggravated
19 assaults, which are assaults, felony assaults. And we
20 also have simple A and B, which are just simple assaults
21 basically, hand in hand. We have generally about 35% of
22 all of our aggravated assaults have a domestic violence
23 nexus. So our Domestic Violence Unit is really active. We
24 also have social workers at the precincts to assist those
25 victims, and also to try to get some help to the actual

1 perpetrators to try to break that cycle. But domestic
2 violence is a big issue, and is one of those control
3 issues. because It is something that happens with known
4 individuals. So it's a lot that we try to do to stop
5 that. And it is a problem.

6 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you. I just wanted to get
7 that out, as he stated that. And we absolutely denounce
8 it as a commission. Commissioner Smith and then
9 Commissioner Dewaelsche.

10 COMMISSIONER SMITH: Thank you. Through the Chair. I
11 wanted to know about the fatality that occurred on
12 Minnock that you referred to was not a result of a sex
13 offender indulging in an act.

14 DC WILLIAMS: Through the Chair. I don't have the
15 specifics on it, so I'll have to get back to see.

16 COMMISSIONER SMITH: Thank you, sir.

17 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Commissioner Dewaelsche.

18 COMMISSIONER DEWAEELSCHÉ: Thank you, Mr. Chair.
19 Chief, I noticed in some of the data that was provided as
20 it relates to mental health related laws in service that
21 our numbers are going up, right? So I noticed the grand
22 total, it's almost 800 more for the grand total. And then
23 within each category, the only one that didn't go up is
24 rental calls that are violent with that, you know, the
25 person's armed. So that pretty much stayed the same, but

1 all of the others have increased. And what are we doing
2 as a department to address the increase?

3 DC WILLIAMS: So I think one of the reasons for the
4 increase is, we have an increase in, through the Chair;
5 we have an increase in awareness. As a department, we
6 have an actual crisis intervention team, which is an
7 actual unit. And their job is to work directly with DWHIN
8 to have outreach and to do intervention on individuals
9 within the community that we know to have a mental
10 crisis. So we're extremely active with that unit. We work
11 hand in hand with DWHIN to provide resources. And I think
12 we put a lot of information out to bring mental health to
13 the forefront, on a lot of people's minds. So, you know,
14 have more reports. And I think that's one of the things.

15 COMMISSIONER DEWALSCHE: Through the Chair, just
16 another really quick question. How does the unit work for
17 the benefit of the public? Is it assigned? Do we have
18 individual officers assigned to various precincts or is
19 it citywide? Does that unit assist and go from, I don't
20 know if they're requested? Where do they start from that
21 unit? The DWHIN unit or the group that are working with
22 DWHIN.

23 DC WILLIAMS: Through the Chair. So our CIT Task
24 Force Team, they're citywide. So they're a centralized
25 unit and they basically go out and they have people that

1 they check on. So they will be given some names and
2 they'll check on some names or they develop a list of
3 people who receive mental health services and they'll
4 check on them. One of the other things that they do is
5 they are open for calls. So if there is a person in a
6 mental crisis, dispatch will dispatch that mental health
7 unit. And then if, let's say we have a regular police run
8 where officers are responding, they get to the scene and
9 they determine that they have someone who's in a mental
10 crisis, they'll actually request the mental health unit.
11 And the mental health unit is just really phenomenal with
12 what they've been doing.

13 We all know that it is very difficult for the police
14 to manage individuals who are in a mental crisis. With
15 the closing of a lot of hospitals and a lot of resources
16 that used to have the state, that were provided by the
17 state, those are gone. So the Detroit Police Department
18 tried to fill that gap. And our Crisis Intervention Team
19 Unit is our task force, which is one way to fill that
20 gap. And they've been doing a phenomenal job. We actually
21 had an instance last Thanksgiving where we had an
22 individual who was in a mental crisis who had a knife and
23 he was in a vehicle and he was threatening harm himself.
24 And it was on Thanksgiving Day, and the CIT officers
25 spent six hours talking him out and that ended very

1 successfully for that unit. So they do a phenomenal job.

2 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Thank you.

3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Before we go to Commissioner
4 Moore, I'd let the record reflect that the vaccination is
5 not open to the public at Public Safety Headquarters.
6 That was Commissioner mispoke on that. It says employees
7 must have medical insurance cards and employee
8 identification cards with them at the time of service.
9 And so but you know, you go to CDS with your medical
10 doctor, you know to get service for that. Thank you.
11 Commissioner Moore.

12 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you, Mr. Chair. Just to
13 piggyback on Commissioner Dewaelsche's mental health
14 question. Commander Pierce and I were going back and
15 forth, you know, not in a negative way, but just for
16 informational purposes. And I brought up a model called
17 the Eugene Oregon model called CAHOOTS. It's for Crisis
18 Assistance, Helping Out On The Streets, because I believe
19 that police officers should not be in the mental health
20 business, and I don't think that they want to be in the
21 mental health business. There's a lot of stress on them,
22 things of that nature. So I would just challenge the
23 community to check that model out of Eugene, Oregon and
24 see if they like it and see if we can implement some
25 parts of it. I think it might be a funding issue. And I

1 have a couple of interesting strategies as Chair, we can
2 get some by rating a budget CAHOOTS. Thank you.

3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you Commissioner Moore.
4 Alright. You were asking? You want to be recognized?
5 Okay. Commissioner Burton.

6 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Thank you.

7 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes.

8 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Chief, I have a couple
9 questions. Basically, I know that the Third Precinct is
10 now in the old teachers Federation building. I remember
11 years ago they were right there on the corner, Grand
12 Boulevard and Woodward. Since they've been in a new
13 building; now that building had a build out or, you know
14 where it's conducive for the officers that work in that
15 location.

16 DC WILLIAMS: Through the Chair. So that building is
17 receiving the usual periodic maintenance that's required
18 of quartered buildings. As far as a specific build out,
19 we had to add different things to the interior. We had to
20 add basically a security sound cord door that has
21 controlled entries for people coming in. We had to add
22 more cubicles for offices. But we are always doing
23 updates and maintenance. We had some issues within the
24 building recently, and we've had a lot of support from
25 basically all the city GSD and also the contractors that

1 work for GSD to come in and support. But there is
2 maintenance that takes place.

3 COMMISSIONER WOODS: What is GSD?

4 DC WILLIAMS: I'm sorry. General Services Department,
5 general, sir. And what they do is they provide
6 maintenance and other services for departments within the
7 city. And going back to your question, we also have what
8 we call a capital approval. So the parking lot, we had to
9 re-gravel the parking lot and I think we're doing a lot
10 to make sure that both the citizens and the officers who
11 come to work; it's a great place to continue to be.

12 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Awesome. You know, the reason I
13 ask is because I know, not long ago, we were talking
14 about budgeting and stuff like that. The department's
15 budget wasn't as well as the BOPC budget. And I don't
16 think it came up at that time where any of us, whether
17 myself or my colleagues, raised a concern about number
18 three. And so I'm raising it now. I know that electric
19 charging stations are something that a lot of buildings
20 are going with across the city, especially in the
21 downtown area in Cork town. Are we going to start seeing
22 any of that for the precinct? I know that DPD does have
23 some electric vehicles from my understanding as well as
24 municipal parking.

25 DC WILLIAMS: So for me to answer that infrastructure

1 change, I don't have the answer.

2 I can find that answer. I can bring it.

3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Absolutely. And also the budget
4 chair, they are going to be taking another at DPD budget
5 and that's a good point to make with them as they look at
6 the budget and have that budget discussion.

7 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I have a follow up question. I
8 used to serve on the finance committee for NACOLE years
9 ago. What are we looking for with Fleet? And I'm not sure
10 if you can answer that question or not, but I'd like to
11 know how we look first with the fleet throughout the
12 department and also with number three. Some years back, I
13 think vehicles were donated to the department. Was that
14 Dan Gilbert and Robert Penske, if I recall correctly? But
15 how are we holding up right now for Swift Fleet and like,
16 say you have an officer that's 6'5" or 6'4"? The fleet
17 that the department is looking to go into, is that deal
18 was going to be conducive for someone that's 6', 6' 3",
19 6' 4", 6' 5", or someone that may be 280 pounds or 300
20 pounds or whatever, the fact that case may be. I do have
21 concerns about the fleet, and I'm looking at, you know,
22 as far as travel time, as far as officers responding to
23 businesses, responding to mental health runs, as well as
24 residential and things of that nature. I know that we
25 have a lot of good men and women on this force, this

1 department, and I know police response time has made a
2 tremendous improvement from the time I first started
3 here, until where we are now. And that only comes from
4 good leadership from the top, and the rank and file and
5 down to members. I would love to hear something at a
6 later time, but not today. But what can we do to help
7 with the [unclear]. We want to make sure that your
8 department team has all of the tools and resources for
9 the team to respond to servicing residents, as well as
10 the business community. I see the Project Green Light has
11 definitely expanded; expanded a lot in precinct 3, so far
12 throughout the city. I know a lot of our members in our
13 community support Green Light and things of that nature.
14 And we know that officers often have to respond to a
15 number of businesses as well as resumes. So I would love
16 to hear something at some point in time, 40 years out,
17 about the week.

18 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: You can make that happen for him,
19 Deputy Chief, make sure that we can get a report back out
20 on the fleet. And I'm sure that our budget chairperson is
21 going to be looking at all of those things as it relates
22 to the budget. But DPD, you know, so they had a good
23 huddle and they focused on making sure that we take a
24 deep dive in the budget. But thank you for listening,
25 hearing him out, and make sure that, you know, if you can

1 get a response to him on that. Yes?

2 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Whenever you get through, I just
3 want to get your attention.

4 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Oh.

5 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Continue.

6 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay.

7 COMMISSIONER BANKS: No, I'm good.

8 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: It was Commissioner Bernard next.

9 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Just very quickly on the
10 domestic violence issue. It's important that we reach out
11 to men who are also victims of domestic violence by
12 women. I've had personally, several clients that were
13 male, that were beaten up, had all their stuff destroyed,
14 and everything else. Women are violent too. This is not a
15 girl issue. It is. As the Chairman said, this is a
16 violence issue. And I think that we have to make a
17 special effort because men look, you know, so they're not
18 supposed to be beat up by girls, but they can be. A lot
19 of girls are big. They're not saying that objects and
20 they do stuff. So males are victims of domestic violence
21 too. But I think that part of our outreach in that way
22 should also be outreached from men.

23 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you very kindly.
24 Commissioner Banks, and then we're going to go to the
25 commander.

1 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Thank you. Through the Chair.
2 Deputy Chief, what type of topics is going to go forward
3 in the domestic violence abuse event? What type of
4 topics?

5 DC WILLIAMS: Through the Chair, just give me a quick
6 second to go through.

7 COMMISSIONER BANKS: No, you don't have to give them
8 all, but just a few. Maybe three, two?

9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: And maybe Ty is one of them
10 Jaylen, you guys, you all are working with that project
11 for the department in accordance with domestic violence,
12 so that comes to mind.

13 MALE SPEAKER: That particular event has been
14 publicized on the social media platform. So that idea is
15 open to everyone. It's not only for women, it's for
16 everyone. And not even just survivors, but, you know,
17 allies or family members of that picture. That's open for
18 everyone to be part of. And that's being led by our
19 Domestic Violence Unit.

20 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Alright.

21 DC WILLIAMS: Through the Chair.

22 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes.

23 DC WILLIAMS: I just want to go back to the notes
24 earlier. At 10:00 AM, there is going to be a domestic
25 violence walk. And again, the actual event starts at 9:30

1 AM. At 10:00 AM it will be a domestic violence walk,
2 which will start right outside front of Detroit Public
3 Safety Headquarters at 11:00 AM, that's when the speakers
4 will be in the Skylar Room, and they'll also have
5 different representatives providing resources. So those
6 are two of the things that...

7 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Well, what I wanted to know,
8 would they be having things like topics like how to spot
9 an abuser or signs of an abuser, you know, can I get a
10 few topics, a couple topics?

11 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Deputy Chief.

12 COMMISSIONER BANKS: That's what I wanted. When the
13 officer came up here, he didn't have any topics.

14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay.

15 COMMISSIONER BANKS: I knew everybody was invited. I
16 want to hear some topics.

17 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: He's really good at it.

18 MALE SPEAKER: I don't have the topics right now for
19 you, Commissioner Banks. Again, this event is being put
20 on by our Domestic Violence Unit, and so they have their
21 agenda and their run of show, and they have their plan
22 and they have their speakers that they've invited to come
23 out. So I'm not sure exactly what their topics will be,
24 but I believe it's going to be a very good event that
25 we'll all get some very knowledgeable information. If we

1 have any questions, they'll have some great speakers that
2 we will be able to ask them those questions at that
3 event. That portion begins at 11:00 AM in the Skylar
4 Room.

5 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Wonderful. I'm all set. Mr.
6 Chair.

7 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you, sir. Commander and I
8 think the Commander had done a stellar job yesterday with
9 the Tigers game. Your precinct has been stellar. We had
10 over 45,000 people in the City of Detroit down at that
11 game. And I wanted to vent and hats off to you. Go
12 commander.

13 COMMANDER FULGENZI: Through the Chair.

14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: I like to hear waht other people,
15 what they have to say about the city of Detroit. It's a
16 very resilient city.

17 COMMANDER FULGENZI: Absolutely. Can't echo that
18 enough. Good evening, honorable board. Good evening to
19 everyone in the audience community. Those that are this
20 evening virtually. The first one I introduce on my team;
21 to my right, my partner, Captain Conway Petty, NPO,
22 there's an amazing NPO team for this community. NPO
23 Moore, NPO Sergeant [unclear 50:32] and I believe NPO
24 Pritchard, Ann Hawkins. Great team. I just want to
25 acknowledge them before I get started.

1 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: What's your name, Commander,
2 please?

3 COMMANDER FULGENZI: I'm sorry. Commander. Matthew
4 Fulgenzi.

5 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Can you spell the last name
6 for me?

7 COMMANDER FULGENZI: Absolutely. F as in Frank,
8 ULGENZI.

9 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you.

10 COMMANDER FULGENZI: I'm going to start off giving an
11 overview of the precinct, how we're looking year to date.
12 Go into some of our strategies, current trends, and
13 engagement. So year to date, going in from October 7th,
14 the Third Precinct is off to a great start for the year.
15 Data went down 10.3% in part one crime, 1.7% reduction in
16 part one violent crime, and 12.3% reduction in part one
17 property crime. I do want to highlight the Third Precinct
18 on the not violent crime precinct, as you would see
19 numbers in the 8 to 9 we were high in property crime. So
20 when we talk about a reduction of 12% year to date for
21 the Third Precinct, that's a true impact when it comes to
22 businesses, home invasions being the autos in the
23 downtown area, we see rate reductions and we initially
24 started this year off in the red. We were up part of the
25 dedication by the men and women of this department.

1 The strategy has been put in place; we have now seen
2 a 12% reduction. We are going to continue those
3 strategies moving forward. When you're looking at violent
4 crime, I do want to talk about non-fatal shootings and
5 homicides. We ended last year with historic road numbers.
6 So I want to take a deeper dive and look at a two-year
7 average and really see deep down how we are trending.
8 When you compare a two-year average for our nonfatal and
9 our homicides, you truly see the impact that's made in
10 this community. Homicides were down 18% over the last two
11 years. Nonfatal shootings, really large reduction of
12 51.1%, comparing two years overall. Sexual assault down
13 to 15.7%. Motor vehicle theft down 14.8%. And then moving
14 forward, carjacking down 12.5%. So when you're comparing
15 numbers from year to year, you're still seeing
16 reductions. When you bring that out even further. In two
17 years, we've seen rate reductions here in the Third
18 Precinct.

19 Next, I want to talk about crime trends. Finally,
20 crime in the last 28 days, great reduction of 27.6%.
21 That's 24 fewer violent crimes that have occurred in this
22 community. Sexual assault, being down, angry, assault
23 female down, angry assaults and robberies down to 21%.
24 Property crime that we touched on year to date, down 12%,
25 we carried that through the last 28 days ending through

1 summer. We're down about even and larceny, we're down
2 another about half a percent. And we talk about numbers
3 and statistics and they're grades, but still a number and
4 it's still a victim that's been impacted. So our approach
5 is one, crime is too many, no crime, too small. And it's
6 the approach that we take as a community that needs
7 objectives in our mission. Reductions are great, but it's
8 one too many. We need to handle that case, provide the
9 highest level of service to that victim, provide closure
10 and prevent reoffending acts in this community.

11 And that's our commitment to this community. When we
12 talk about increasing strategy, it's a multilayer
13 approach. We believe in the data. We believe in the data
14 approach of our strategy and deployment. Weekly briefings
15 with our special operations, our precinct detective unit.
16 And identifying those individuals that are driving up
17 crime in this community. Most importantly, holding them
18 accountable. Having park details so the community that's
19 out in the park can be free, safe, and not become
20 victims. So staffing parks during key points are traffic
21 enforcement, not only about enforcement on education, but
22 the public. We had great success in our detective bureau,
23 great leadership there. Taking the technology and the
24 tools, leveraging that and identifying, holding those
25 accountable in the community. We have beat units, also

1 part of the Third Precinct. It's kind of unique here and
2 it's really a supplement to the NPOs and they do
3 outstanding work every day.

4 But those beat officers are in certain neighborhoods
5 tied in. We have a walking beat now, not too many places
6 have that. We have an officer that walks through the
7 community, checks in with these businesses, and really
8 ties in with the schools in that area. Those community
9 members do the same job every day. Our special
10 operations, dedicated group of officers, again, doing
11 restore orders, pulling those violent criminals
12 accountable, those warrant sweeps, not leaving an
13 offender that's violent out in the community or the
14 warrant. Get them off the street, hold them accountable,
15 bring it justice to those victims. It's our partnership.
16 State, local, federal. Our Prime Intelligence Unit has
17 done an amazing job all year. It's when you look at
18 illegal gatherings, block parties get out of control. Our
19 strategy is to get ahead of it. Not waiting for that act
20 to occur. Getting out there, communicating, making sure
21 they do file proper permits and helping them through that
22 process as well.

23 We talk about Green Lake Green Lake, I support it.
24 It's been a great initiative, but leveraging that
25 technology, helping our detectives out at all times.

1 Juvenile curfew and enforcement. We've had great success
2 in the downtown area, especially with juveniles and
3 addressing any type of crime. We discussed mental health
4 today, big believers. We need to do more on that, getting
5 those resources out there. If it's unsheltered, if
6 someone suffering from mental illness, getting them the
7 resources they need; if they need shelter, providing them
8 those necessary shelters. Importantly, provide all those
9 with resources. And our biggest strategy that's most
10 effective is this community. We understand we can't do
11 this job alone. And working together, we've seen success.
12 As Commissioner Burton pointed out, this is a very strong
13 community. I've been here since February to this precinct
14 and blown away by the support of everyone here reaching
15 out and the partnerships of everyone.

16 So that's the number one layer. And I think if we're
17 going to see improvement, building a strong community.
18 And just lastly, I just want to go over some unit
19 success. And I want to emphasize that the team men and
20 women's department do a great job every day. In the
21 downtown area as you are aware, we hosted the NFL draft,
22 talking to 800,000 people, over the course of three days.
23 And have been reached out from cities from all over the
24 US and putting Green Bay that's hosting the draft next
25 year. And they're looking at us saying, how did you put

1 it down? What resources? How did you engage the
2 community? And we are truly the model of that. And now
3 people are coming to us to ask for help. And again, it's
4 great work by the men and women's department. The Grand
5 Prix, the fireworks, numerous presidential visits. We can
6 deploy downtown numerous concerts, sport events, I can
7 keep going on. But that all occurs here in the Third
8 Precinct. And some dedication of men and women engaged in
9 the community. It's great for the community, great for
10 the businesses. We're going to continue that. Tigers are
11 playing tonight is very exciting. We just left down
12 there. You're talking another 45,000 and the wings start
13 at eight o'clock. So after this meeting I'm going back
14 down there. Just want to echo great work. I'm excited
15 about being here. It's been a great community. I'm going
16 to turn over to Captain Petty. Just a few things on some
17 key involvement.

18 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir.

19 CAPTAIN PETTY: Good evening. Through the Chair.

20 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Good evening. Make sure you're
21 talking through the mic for our ASL.

22 CAPTAIN PETTY: Good evening. Through the Chair.

23 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes.

24 CAPTAIN PETTY: I'm Captain Conway Petty. I'm going
25 to go on a few community engagements. The Commanders

1 said, we're really big with our community first. We do a
2 lot of things. Some of the things that we've done;
3 National Night Out, things like that. We have Trunk or
4 Treat coming up, which will be on 31st at the Precinct.
5 We have a brand new paid lot. So make sure you guys come
6 out and support us.

7 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: We know Commissioner Burton will
8 be out there.

9 CAPTAIN PETTY: Hey, come on out. Now, on the 19th,
10 do you have any fancy cars or motorcycles for the car
11 show? And we're raising coats for kids. So we're going to
12 try to do that. Asking if people bring donations from 1
13 to 16 years of age.

14 We're going to try to give them out on Halloween,
15 but we're going to collect them on the 19th. Also on the
16 19th, it's not ours, but they are doing a voting on
17 Boulevard at the Voting Center. That was a long day. They
18 are going to be extending to Saturday morning. So, if you
19 haven't registered or you're going to have bands out
20 there and literature and everything, you can let the
21 communities know to come out, and support that. Everybody
22 has to vote. And not only who you vote for, you have to
23 vote. It's our God given right. Our next community
24 meeting at the precinct is October 15th 6:00 PM. I'm
25 going to talk about some of the things that our

1 neighborhood police officers do; man do those to you. So
2 we do things like the Sisterhood Mentorship program. We
3 do the school crossings. We deal with the charter schools
4 because they don't have their own security police.

5 . So we do daily visits at the charter schools that
6 are in the precincts. We do anti-bullying classes,
7 conflict resolution there. We do DARE, which is a drug
8 abuse resistance education and ego gun safety classes.
9 And we do Stranger Danger, which are just some of the
10 programs. There's a lot more that they do; gun lock. We
11 offer gun locks..

12 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Phenomenal. Commissioner Moore.

13 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you, Mr. Chair. I just
14 have two positive comments. First is about the captain; a
15 lot of people don't know that Captain Petty was one half
16 of a crime fighting law in the Detroit Police Department
17 that's known as Secret Squirrel. And that guy, Steve
18 Miller, they took care of a lot of business to keep
19 everybody in this room. So I just want to say thank you
20 for that publicly. I always tease you about it privately,
21 but I want to say publicly thank you for your service.
22 Commander, you helped some citizens in the second
23 precinct. It wasn't that you just helped them over the
24 past four, three weeks, but it was the follow up. And
25 that's something that, you know, how me and the assistant

1 chief [unclear] have talked about over the past two
2 months was your follow up, and you bring additional
3 resources to [unclear] and that's what citizens, the
4 victims world. So I just want to say thank you.

5 Everything you said I heard because of what we just
6 [unclear] capacity a couple weeks ago. So thank you for
7 your service. Thank you both for your leadership at
8 number three and officers you should appreciate. Thank
9 you.

10 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Absolutely. Anyone else? Thank
11 you very, very much. Commissioner Burton.

12 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I just want to say thank you to
13 the commander, thank you to the captain of number three
14 for the wonderful work that you and your team does to
15 keep this community safe 24/7, 7 days a week. You could
16 not have done it without, you know, great leadership over
17 here at number three. And so you have a great team. I
18 love your NPOs. The work that they do as well, just the
19 overall team and the performance, because this is a team.
20 And what I love about the Third Precinct is that not only
21 your team, but it is family oriented. I mean, when you
22 look at Detroit residents in the Third Precinct, and you
23 look at our officers at number three, I mean, it is one
24 big family over here. And that's what it takes when you
25 talk about policing the community, the bridge coming

1 together. And so I think what's going on at number three
2 can be something that can really shape and impact the
3 entire city.

4 I think it is something special here, something
5 special at number seven. All of these precincts have
6 something special, but it's really the magic over here
7 with the leadership, with the captain, commander and
8 NPOs, and the whole body. Thank you for the job you all
9 do. Thank you.

10 COMMANDER FULGENZI: Thank you, Chair and honorable
11 board. And you can recognize [unclear] agree with our
12 team, they do an outstanding job and we talk about our
13 next community meeting. They bring the media out. They're
14 very supportive. Every time we have an event by calling
15 them, they're on it. I just want to acknowledge them and
16 say thank you for the wonderful work that they do each
17 and every day.

18 MS. SMITH: We're only going to take two minutes of
19 your time.

20 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you so much.

21 MS. SMITH: So let the church say amen.

22 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Amen.

23 MS. SMITH: Well when we were here before in the
24 Third Precinct, I know you were treated to a great
25 presentation by our president Leslie Malcolmson. She

1 talked about the businesses and different communities
2 that make up the Third Precinct. Leslie is having surgery
3 on her vocal cord so she can't talk. So me and my
4 partner, we're going to try and fill her shoes. I'm going
5 to take the right shoe, and he is going to take the left
6 shoe. So my partner is...

7 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Take as much time as you need.

8 MS. SMITH: We are only going to take a couple
9 minutes.

10 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Go ahead.

11 MS. SMITH: Okay. I want to begin by introducing the
12 executive board for the Third Precinct Council. First I
13 want to introduce our president, Leslie Malcolmson.
14 Leslie lives in Midtown. And I don't want to be remiss, I
15 want to introduce her husband to Peter, because that's
16 the man behind the woman. Peter does so much for our
17 community, and in helping us in the Third Precinct, he is
18 always there and volunteers. So I would be remiss if I
19 didn't recognize him. Next, this handsome gentleman
20 waiting to speak Ken Smith is our vice president and, and
21 our vice president lives downtown. And next would be our
22 energizer bunny treasurer, Ernest Little. Ernest lives in
23 Iron Park, East Boston, North End area, and I call him
24 the energizer bunny because anytime you're driving
25 through there, you may see Earnest out there picking up

1 trash, cutting vacant lots and all the rest of it. He
2 volunteers all the time and he makes sure that the area
3 where he lives in looks good all the time and so forth.
4 Our corresponding secretary was unable to make it.
5 Lastly, I'm Rita Smith. I'm the recording secretary and
6 sometimes sergeant, I'm sorry, okay. And I live in what's
7 called Heidi Hill. So now I'm going to turn it over to
8 the [unclear].

9 MR. SMITH: Good evening.

10 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Good evening.

11 MR. SMITH: Okay. My name is Kenneth Smith. I'm the
12 vice president.

13 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Can you pull it up as much as
14 possible and talk louder for our ASL people who are
15 interpreting for us for the city. Thank you.

16 MR. SMITH: Okay. Yes. I'm the Vice President of the
17 Third Precinct. Okay.

18 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: He said they can't hear you.

19 MR. SMITH: You can hear that now?

20 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah, we can hear you good now.
21 Great. Okay.

22 MR. SMITH: Our Commander, Matthew Fulgenzi, is in
23 charge of the Third Precinct, also Downtown Services,
24 also task operations for all the events downtown. Three
25 gaming units, which, you know, by the way, I guess

1 everybody knows, that's three casinos and security for
2 the QLine. Also security for the three movers. I like to
3 say go Tigers. Thank you very much.

4 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Absolutely.

5 MS. SMITH: I just want to say one last little word
6 on this. In the immortal words of Isaac Hayes, our Third
7 Precinct officers are some bad... talking officers of the
8 Third Precinct.

9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Alright. Come on and give them a
10 hand. We thank you, community leaders, for making an
11 impact in your community. Your voices matter all day,
12 every day. And I don't know if that's the NPO right
13 there, she was riding up the street when they had the...
14 well they had a little party out there, and the new store
15 opened for the Morris Ford Bay and came and saw some cars
16 that were parked out there. And they were parked in fire
17 lanes and all of that type of stuff. And she graciously
18 went to the residence and, you know, they were everywhere
19 and had all the fire lanes there, but she went there,
20 took action and was able to talk to the residents to be
21 able to move their vehicles and stuff. So I've seen them
22 in action, and Fulgenzi knows he's my guy. And I
23 appreciate you guys and appreciate your leadership. Now,
24 get downtown.

25 COMMANDER FULGENZI: Through the Chair. Yes, sir.

1 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes.

2 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: To change places again, really
3 very impressive.

4 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes. I think before we went
5 there, you had some presentations.

6 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I'd like to acknowledge
7 individuals that are here today. CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes.

8 COMMISSIONER BURTON: The first person on the call up
9 is the president of the Third Precinct Community
10 Relations Ms. Leslie Malcolmsen.

11 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: And if you want to do it from
12 that mic there, commissioner that might be better for
13 you. She can't talk... Her voice.

14 MALE SPEAKER: No, don't let her talk.

15 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Wave your hand.

16 COMMISSIONER BURTON: This is appreciation for Ms.
17 Leslie Malcolmsen, Third Precinct Committee Relations,
18 for developing strong ties for residents and community
19 organizations in the Third Precinct in enhancing public
20 safety, stronger police community relations in our city.

21 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Alright.

22 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Ms. Rita Smith, back up. It was
23 years ago when I met Ms. Rita Smith, and this is a strong
24 leadership, and still retains a strong leadership now. I
25 love what you are doing; great energy.

1 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Blessings to you.

2 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: You have a commitment of great
3 energy, great blessings.

4 COMMISSIONER BURTON: It just crossed my mind. We met
5 through Dolores Bennett years ago.

6 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Pioneer.

7 COMMISSIONER BURTON: The lady Dolores Bennett.

8 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Absolutely.

9 COMMISSIONER BURTON: This one here is a certificate
10 appreciation for Police Officer of the quarter, Mario
11 Esselman. Is he available? [unclear] Oh yes. Okay. So we
12 have one, we have a certificate of appreciation for
13 officer Mario Esselman for a police officer of the
14 quarter. And so this, sorry.

15 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: And if you could talk more into
16 the mic for us too, Commissioner, too.

17 COMMISSIONER BURTON: You know, this year I said to
18 myself, I said, we have officers of the quarter, so I'm
19 going to acknowledge the officers of the quarter for each
20 precinct that District 5 touches. And so District 5
21 touches 3, and 5, and 7, and 10 and Downtown Services.
22 So, I looked up, I said, hold on. We have some officers
23 for this quarter for this precinct. It's great to
24 recognize the officers that are serving, which is all of
25 the men and women in this room are serving. So let's get

1 every officer in this room a round of applause. The last
2 certificate appreciation is for Rodney Day. Fortunately,
3 he's not here, he's actually at the game, but we have a
4 certificate of appreciation for him as well. So I guess I
5 will leave this with the staff. So Rodney Day can come
6 and get his [unclear].

7 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Thank you very kindly.

8 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Thank you.

9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir. Going back to oral
10 communications.

11 MS. UNDERWOOD: Yes, Mr. Chair. The next three next
12 three people to speak will be Mr. Jahdante Smith, Ms.
13 Maddox, and Ms. Rain Kennedy

14 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Mr. Chair, before we go into
15 public comments, can we acknowledge all the NPOs in the
16 room, please? Can we get all the NPOs to rise?

17 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes.

18 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Because our community cannot
19 thrive or function without our NPOs.

20 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you for your service. And
21 Jahdante is he here? You go. Yes, sir.

22 MR. SMITH: Good afternoon.

23 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Good afternoon.

24 MR. SMITH: My name is definitely Jahdante. I'm fine
25 with that, commissioner.

1 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Alright, thank you.

2 MR. SMITH: I just want to say, I have a question
3 about this helicopter. How many helicopter pilots do we
4 have in the department? We got a 2-million-dollar
5 helicopter. I want to know if anybody could fly it in the
6 department, and how much will it be used, hopefully? I
7 also want to say it is very sickening to hear about what
8 happened to the brother that works with Malik Shabazz. I
9 can't remember his name, but I've been out there with
10 him. He does excellent work. His face should be plastered
11 in these departments. Nobody should be falting him. He
12 does excellent work. He has done a lot of police work as
13 a civilian for volunteer purposes. I also want to say the
14 chief's EPU Unit needs some retraining.

15 I was out at the Walk-a-Mile yesterday, and one of
16 the officers in his EPU Unit tried to physically stop me
17 from walking. I wasn't even close to the chief. That
18 almost got you guys next to a lawsuit. I also want to
19 ask, does the department monitor protestors? Like
20 Lieutenant Cole said. That man has 25 years on the force.
21 He came out and said that he was suspended for something
22 that he was trained to do. And he said he had an entire
23 unit. So, I mean, is that a thing that happens? Because I
24 protest a lot, so I want to know if I'm not, am I being
25 monitored by officers while I'm just living my regular

1 life? Are you guys spending that much time and effort
2 then violating our First Amendment rights? I'll concede
3 the rest of my time.

4 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Alright. Next, Are you good? You
5 need some help or you got it?

6 Okay.

7 MS. MADDOX: [unclear], and I have two. I left in the
8 Community. And people with [unclear] because I have been,
9 and I am, they stick to put clothes to the clothes, but
10 did do that and the black, I the first understanding
11 something this past week, I've been spending a lot of
12 time walking and trying to get out of the way and make
13 our city that I was sitting on the shoulder. Thank you,
14 I'm done. Thank you very much.

15 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you very much. If we can
16 make sure that this messaging Deputy Chief Williams, you
17 know, to the city in terms of, you know, with those, with
18 disability in terms of the bus. I know that the
19 department has a Transit Unit now to be able to make sure
20 that they are in compliance with all ADA laws and making
21 sure that our residents who have disabilities are being
22 treated with dignity and respect and they are operating
23 under the ADA law. You know, and if you can make sure
24 that that message is communicated and tag the board, you
25 know, on an email that the Transit Unit is ensuring that

1 all ADA compliances are taking place on the bus, that no
2 one is violating the law in that regard.

3 DC WILLIAMS: Through the Chair, if I could just be
4 clear. So the Transit Unit does not run DDOT. So that
5 messaging, that's not something that can come from us to
6 be effective. What we primarily do is, we just make sure
7 that the bus line is safe. One of the things that she did
8 say was that the bus was parked in front of the bus stop
9 and it was difficult for people to get off. So that's
10 something that I can put out to make sure department
11 wide, that's not occurring.

12 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: So if a DDOT bus driver is
13 violating the law.

14 DC WILLIAMS: That's going to be a complaint that
15 goes to EI.

16 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. And you don't enforce..

17 DC WILLIAMS We don't enforce any of the federal
18 violations.

19 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: I got you.

20 DC WILLIAMS: There are going to be more complaints,
21 and so criminal laws.

22 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: I'm asking our attorney to send a
23 letter to the DDOT on behalf of the department or the
24 board and asking them to ensure that residents are being
25 treated with dignity and respect and that the ADA laws

1 are in compliance, you can reference this particular
2 meeting's concerns. We ask that there be a meeting.

3 MS. UNDERWOOD: Mr. Chairman.

4 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Hold on, hold on. Commissioner
5 Banks.

6 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Okay. I just wanted to say it's
7 so good, finally see Ms. Maddox in person because ever
8 since I've been on the board for the last three years she
9 was always on. She was always on Zoom and it's so good to
10 meet her, and see her in person. Does she catch the bus
11 down here?

12 MS. MADDOX: Thank you.

13 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Your welcome, Miss Maddox.

14 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Did she catch the bus down here?

15 MALE SPEAKER: I'm not so sure. [unclear].

16 COMMISSIONER BANKS: [unclear] a way in?

17 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: An officer can give her a
18 ride.

19 COMMISSIONER BANKS: I mean, we can't let it go out
20 like that, you know?

21 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. We can find that out
22 offline, you know and do whatever we need to do, I'll put
23 it in on as well, whatever.

24 COMMISSIONER BANKS: I appreciate it.

25 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Go ahead.

1 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: What I want to ask you, Chief
2 is, she raised Mrs. Maddox, and raised a very good point.
3 I didn't think about it until she mentioned it. There is
4 no cutoff in the curve that allows people like herself to
5 be able to get on the bus or I know some buses have the
6 thing, I guess it goes down that you can roll onto, roll
7 onto that, but the streets himself, if that bus doesn't
8 have that, then what do we do? Because you can't get a
9 wheelchair or a person who is disabled. I want you to
10 raise it, okay. And the second thing is that we've got a
11 formal complaint at the police commission about
12 headquarters. The front door; you can open one panel of
13 the door, but you can't open the whole door for
14 handicapped people. And the handicapped spaces are,
15 pardon me, are too far back, are way down at the corner
16 down there, as opposed to being in front of the doors and
17 in front of the building, where they're supposed to be.
18 That's a problem. It is a real problem for them to walk
19 from the end of the parking lot to the front door. The
20 handicapped spaces should be at the front, please,

21 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Commissioner Moore.

22 COMMISSIONER MOORE: I was just going to say some of
23 these issues are City of Detroit issues.

24 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Absolutely.

25 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: That's ours

1 COMMISSIONER MOORE: City Detroit issue. And that's
2 what we need to be addressing. It is good that the Deputy
3 Chief's sitting here, but the police are involved in
4 operations, whether that administrative, it should be
5 addressed. I'm not saying it shouldn't be addressed, it
6 should be; however, it should be addressed as an item.

7 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Absolutely. And that's why we
8 directed our attorney to do the letter saying that's
9 going to be done. Excuse me. Next?

10 MS. UNDERWOOD: Thank you, Mr. Chair. Rain Kennedy.
11 And then we'll go into Zoom with Election Integrity Roo,
12 and former Commissioner Davis.

13 MS. KENNEDY: Hello.

14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Hello. Can you speak up in the
15 mic while interpreters are trying to interpret it.

16 MS. KENNEDY: Who is [unclear]? Five years ago I had
17 a [unclear 01:28:39] and I have a [unclear] me because my
18 lawyer took all my money. I have nothing. I need somebody
19 to help me because I have lost lots of money because the
20 doctor didn't [unclear]. Then I have one house and I have
21 an apartment. I haven't seen my apartment rent four years
22 ago. My dad died two years ago. My mom died a long time
23 ago; and my sister died also. That means me. What is the
24 problem? I don't know. That's why I had a lawyer and now
25 I have no money. They took my food stamp. How could I

1 live? I don't know. I'm very scared. Before that, I was a
2 speaker. I am a minister; I'm a coach. I did a diva
3 dance. I am very mad because I can't speak and nobody
4 helped me. Thank you. What will you do? I need to know
5 what will you do? I have a lawyer. 1, 2, 3, 4, lawyers.
6 Thank you.

7 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you. Next speaker.

8 MS. UNDERWOOD: Election Integrity.

9 ELECTION INTEGRITY ROO: Yeah. And Ms. Underwood,
10 that's Election Integrity Roo. And Darryl Woods, listen
11 up. Now, you are fresh off what? A 28 year stretch over
12 at the Ryan Correctional Facility. Same facility, 28
13 years. I'm from the streets. I know what that means. Now
14 you circumvented the board's directive to subpoena the
15 report. That's the Michigan State Police report, on the
16 review of the investigation of DPD case 20-1112, the
17 death of Kaniesha Coleman, which is the murder cover-up
18 of Kaniesha Coleman by the Homicide Unit of Detroit
19 Police Department. Now, it is my understanding you
20 circumvented the director of the board. because the next
21 morning you went in, and told the board secretary not to
22 subpoena the report, overstepping your boundaries. You
23 are way out of line, cross the line. You didn't have any
24 authority to do that and tell the secretary to do, not
25 what the board voted on. You don't have that authority,

1 man. Then you have a meeting with Conrad Mallett, and
2 Mike Duggan in regards to this report that the other
3 commissioners don't seem to know about. Well, it seems
4 that the Michigan State Police, that letter that you told
5 the board secretary to send off to the Michigan State
6 Police, they answered it. And they sent back a redacted
7 review investigation of the report that they got at the
8 Detroit Homicide Unit in the case filed unredacted, which
9 the board authorized and voted to subpoena. So let's get
10 this together and get the unredacted report and dismiss
11 it to, you know, disseminate it amongst all the board
12 members. Unredacted. Darryl Woods. Kaniesha's birthday is
13 next week.

14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Next speaker.

15 MR. DAVIS: Good evening. Can I be heard?

16 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: You may be heard.

17 MR. DAVIS: Okay. I'd like to start off by saying, I
18 think the board should be requesting additional funding.
19 I think the budget should be expanded as you have more
20 and more police officers coming online. And as you have
21 police taking over transit duties. I think the number of
22 citizen complaints is going to jump and we already have a
23 backlog. I think that henceforth you should be pushing
24 the city to give you a larger budget. You all also should
25 be doing more as relates to community events, you know,

1 town halls, all sorts of things to be more engaged. Also,
2 I would like for you all to maybe do some public service
3 announcements, and encourage people to vote. You know,
4 not necessarily tell them who to vote for, but let people
5 know that they can be protected. Because we have some
6 people that, you know, when I was on the board in 2020,
7 that was harassing people from outsiders that were coming
8 to our city, harassing people from voting that was trying
9 to count the votes. So we need to make sure people are
10 aware that voting can't be done in the City of Detroit;
11 voting can be fair and voting can be protected. We want
12 to make sure all of our people feel protected. So, you
13 know, I like to say that you all should push for more
14 money, push for more staff, push for more investigators.
15 Thank you.

16 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you, very kindly.
17 Commissioner Moore.

18 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you, Mr. Chair. I was just
19 going to address Mr. Crowley and state that after I spoke
20 with you earlier today, Mr. Crowley, I did talk to a
21 couple other folks and they did advise me on the avenue
22 that would possibly satisfy you and your request for
23 information in regards to Ms. Coleman's death. So I'll be
24 reaching out to you later on tonight.

25 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: And let me make it absolutely

1 clear that the report from the Mission State Police and
2 the information that was requested, whether that was
3 homicide or suicide they concluded to agree with the
4 department, federal system, you know, so we don't want to
5 muddy the waters. And so that report is absolutely clear
6 in what it says, as far to the conclusion. And so, we can
7 play politics and games but this is not the Kaniesha
8 Coleman family reaching out to us; this is a community
9 person who's reaching out for this. And you have the
10 right to reach out to whatever you want to reach out to,
11 but you can't make a report say something that it doesn't
12 state.

13 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Through the Chair.

14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes.

15 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Now, the documentation from the
16 state police, they couldn't lean either way, whether it
17 was a suicide or a homicide, if you read that
18 documentation; they didn't lean either way. They didn't
19 say it was suicide. They didn't say it was a homicide.

20 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: You would have an attorney give
21 you, you know, [unclear], you cannot prove that this was
22 a homicide. You know what I'm saying? And it didn't go
23 against the report that the DPD state. So if you read the
24 entire report and get to the entire conclusion of that;
25 that's what it says clearly. Yes, Commissioner.

1 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: But he's absolutely correct.
2 The board voted to subpoena the entire report. The board
3 is entitled to the report, not just you, but everybody on
4 board, right? And we can issue that subpoena and then
5 support the order.

6 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Would be a pleasure. And the
7 thing you want to do with that is illegal. Hold on. First
8 of all, as you do your research and understand.

9 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I have to research; I subpoena
10 a document. I'm a lawyer.

11 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: I have the floor.

12 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: What you're saying?

13 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: I have a floor.

14 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Go ahead.

15 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes. Hold on. Excuse me.

16 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Yeah, the problem.

17 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay, do what you need to do. But
18 the fact of the matter is, the report says what it says,
19 and that is the report from the state police and the
20 department does not own that report. And it is up to the
21 state police to authorize the release of that report. And
22 if you need to contact the state police, you contact the
23 state police, excuse me. If you need to contact the state
24 police, contact the state police and pay state police and
25 let you know who owns that report and who can give out

1 that report and who can release that report.

2 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: If the department has it, we
3 can get it. It's just that simple.

4 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: You are a lawyer, do what you
5 need to do. Alright? Commissioner Burton.

6 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Thank you. Through the Chair. I
7 just wanted to say, you know, when you silence attorney
8 Linda Bernard, you're silencing a hundred thousand people
9 that live in a second District, which is her District.
10 She's one of the top vote getters here in the City of
11 Detroit.

12 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: You never let me finish speaking,
13 I didn't silence her?

14 COMMISSIONER BURTON: You did.

15 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: I had the floor at the time, and
16 I was speaking, and then when I finished speaking, she
17 finished her remarks. This is the Robert Rule of Order;
18 this is parliamentary procedure. And if we don't
19 understand it, we need to go and study it, or go talk to
20 the parliamentarian.

21 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I think that...

22 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Excuse me.

23 COMMISSIONER BURTON Some of us...

24 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Excuse me, sir.

25 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Nothing.

1 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Excuse me, sir. Next online..

2 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Out of order.

3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Next online.

4 MS. UNDERWOOD: I'm sorry, sir. That's the last.

5 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: That's it. Okay. Moving the
6 agenda right along, a presentation to the board by Daniel
7 Eichinger, attorney Daniel Eichinger.

8 ATTORNEY EICHINGER: Good evening.

9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: He's with the Wayne County
10 Defense Services. And thank you for coming and requesting
11 to be here. And thank you for your service to the
12 citizens of the city of Detroit, especially those who are
13 indigent and fighting for their freedom, and fighting for
14 justice. And thank you for serving them with dignity and
15 respect. You may be heard.

16 ATTORNEY EICHINGER: Thank you. Thank you,
17 Commissioners. Thank you Chair Woods for having me here.
18 I reached out to a mutual friend, so I could inform the
19 Board of Police Commissioners, and the community about
20 what my department does, and also talk about how we, in
21 building out robust public defense, how it supports
22 safety, public safety, and public health. My name is Dan
23 Eichinger. I'm a program manager at Maine County's
24 Defense Department.

25 What our mission is in the Indigent Defense Services

1 Department, is to make sure that individuals who are
2 charged with felonies in Wayne County and are unable to
3 afford an attorney receive high quality representation
4 from their assigned counsel. So, I just want to talk
5 about how we do this and also how we factor into the
6 public safety discussion. We do this in a number of ways.
7 We qualify attorneys who are assigned to take certain
8 types of cases based on experience training. We offer
9 continuing training opportunities and research assistance
10 to those attorneys. We pay assigned counsel a competitive
11 wage to incentivize quality representation so they aren't
12 just representing their private clients over there;
13 imaging clients. We remove the assignment process away
14 from the courts, so there's no conflict of interest. We
15 give the attorneys ample access to expert and
16 investigative resources. We also have a growing team of
17 social workers who assist in addressing the root cause of
18 our client's conduct.

19 Moving on to how we, without providing robust public
20 defense factors into public safety. We go beyond just
21 restoring somebody's constitutional right to an attorney.
22 The way we do this is we already know what the research
23 shows that if somebody spends even a short term pretrial,
24 incarcerated rates of reoffending increase, we know the
25 harmful consequences of conviction throughout one's life.

1 Let alone ending up in jail or prison that carries
2 negative consequences on social family ties, employment,
3 housing, health and its potential quality. Well-resourced
4 attorneys are able to mitigate its harms and consequences
5 by achieving beneficial outcomes whenever possible. This
6 assists their clients, their communities, they save
7 taxpayers money. I mentioned the social workers. We have
8 a growing cast of social workers that are uniquely
9 situated to address the root cause of crime. I heard that
10 means you talk about the growing instances of mental
11 illness. So we definitely play a role in that by the
12 social workers, connecting folks with mental health and
13 substance abuse treatment, stable housing, employment,
14 educational health needs. We also help prevent forms of
15 convictions. Wayne County has the highest number of
16 exonerations in the state with growing resources
17 dedicated to investigations and policies that require
18 investigations in certain cases, as well as experts here
19 in Michigan and across the whole country. They're able to
20 contest cases with serious evidentiary issues. This
21 includes science that is unreliable, but yes, it pervades
22 a system and that's pretty much what we do, who we are. I
23 just wanted to introduce our department because we're
24 still fairly new as a department. We began in about 2020
25 and we're growing. We're supporting defense attorneys and

1 we play a significant role in the public safety, public
2 health fight. And I also wanted to let the community know
3 who to contact. You can go to our website, Wayne County
4 Indigent and Services department. Email is
5 idsdwayne@waynecounty.com. The phone is (313) 202-7103.
6 So if you don't have an assigned attorney, Wayne County
7 would that to help you do that.

8 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes. Commissioner Bernard.

9 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you for the
10 presentation. And Mr. Chairman, thank you for inviting
11 Mr. Eichinger here to speak. What is the budget for your
12 department?

13 ATTORNEY EICHINGER: Budget for the whole department?

14 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Yes.

15 ATTORNEY EICHINGER: It includes the Public
16 Defender's Office. NBS. It includes all of the attorney
17 bills, I believe for the past 15 years, about 15 million.

18 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: How many?

19 ATTORNEY EICHINGER: About 15 million.

20 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: 15 million.

21 ATTORNEY EICHINGER: We are by far the largest.

22 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: And you said you hire outside
23 counsel and then you have staff attorneys as well?

24 ATTORNEY EICHINGER: We have staff attorneys who
25 assist with training standards. The application process,

1 like myself, we don't represent clients directly. There
2 are some jurisdictions that do that. So the Public
3 Defender's office in Detroit is a nonprofit organization
4 that. They take 35% of felony cases. We have a roster
5 assigned counsel that takes 65% of the cases. So it is
6 [unclear], but generally if they go to the agency defense
7 office in front of the case. But you have a roster,
8 private attorney qualified case, and then they get the
9 option for any case that comes up on the list or they can
10 pass.

11 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: And do you have any high
12 profile cases that the community might know about?

13 ATTORNEY EICHINGER: I mean, yeah, I'm not sure about
14 high profile cases. I specifically am in the field of
15 investigating experts consulting with attorneys. You
16 signed up new experts and investigators. I can tell you
17 that we've had cases recently, like we had a case where a
18 child died accidentally and was charged as a homicide. A
19 case went to trial after about five years, and the father
20 was accused, involving the child. And we had a
21 pediatrician through our program who was able to testify
22 that there were maybe underlying issues; and they were
23 equipped. So we have cases like that. I could go through
24 multiple instances of those types of cases, but I can't
25 think of any signs for our cases.

1 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Commissioner Moore.

2 COMMISSIONER MOORE: My colleague just played into
3 where I was going. Do you agree with the Michael Jackson-
4 Bolanos case, where he fatally stabbed Samantha Woll?

5 ATTORNEY EICHINGER: Yes.

6 COMMISSIONER MOORE: What are your thoughts on that?

7 ATTORNEY EICHINGER: I think it's a basic retrial,
8 correct?

9 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Well, that's what I'm asking.
10 What are your thoughts?

11 ATTORNEY EICHINGER: I didn't follow as closely as I
12 would have liked, but I can tell you that, I mean, from a
13 personal perspective, just a perspective follows issues,
14 that's kind of where I come from. That's my forte. That's
15 my ground. So I'm trying to see problems in evidence in
16 the type of case

17 COMMISSIONER MOORE: No, I'm just curious, because
18 the Detroit police officer was involved in the case. Did
19 you see anything as it relates to DPD?

20 ATTORNEY EICHINGER: I cannot comment at this time. I
21 haven't looked at the attorney. I haven't looked at the
22 police report. All I'm talking about is what I see from
23 the [unclear].

24 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Okay.

25 ATTORNEY EICHINGER: And I'll leave it there.

1 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Talk into the mic was to the
2 attorney.

3 COMMISSIONER MOORE: And my second question, last
4 question deals with, are you familiar with Wayne County
5 issue as relates to documents, the files?

6 ATTORNEY EICHINGER: I just read an article about
7 that. I mean, I'm fairly new. I came back to Michigan. So
8 that's my cover. No, but I did just read a story about
9 that. .

10 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you.

11 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Alright. Thank you. Thank
12 you so much. And thank you for your service and thank you
13 for your presentation. Next, Yes, sir.

14 COMMISSIONER BURTON: The officer for number three
15 whom we had an appreciation for, he's here, because he
16 has to go back.

17 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Go ahead. Have it your way.

18 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Thank you.

19 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir.

20 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair, I want to
21 call up Officer Mario Esselman to come up to receive a
22 certificate of appreciation for developing strong ties
23 with residents and community organizations, at the Third
24 Precinct, enhancing public safety through stronger police
25 community relations in our city. Officer Mario Esselman

1 is on the wall, at least headquarters for a police
2 officer of the quarter.

3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Alright. Okay. Congratulations.

4 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Also, the Detroit Tigers are
5 winning.

6 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Oh, okay.

7 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Detroit Tigers winning 3-2, top
8 of the 7; we're going.

9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: You're going to be the only one
10 we last speak to, man. You wanted to say so. I like that.
11 Go ahead.

12 NPO [unclear]: Thank you. Honestly, I don't know
13 what I did. [unclear) Wow!

14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you for doing your job.

15 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: A report from the board
16 Secretary.

17 MS. GARNIER: Mr. Chairman and the honorable board
18 members; communications, you'll find under Tab 11, the
19 reports from the Office of Chief Investigator. The weekly
20 report, as well as another report is included there. The
21 announcements, excuse me, for this evening, are the
22 remaining meetings for October, 2024. The meeting for
23 Thursday, October 17th, has been canceled earlier during
24 this meeting. The next meetings are Thursday, October
25 24th, 3:00 PM Thursday, October 31st at 3:00 PM and the

1 location at Detroit Public Safety Headquarters, 3rd
2 Street in Detroit.

3 For November, the meetings are as follows: Thursday,
4 November 7th, Thursday, November 14th, Thursday, November
5 21st, November 7th and November 21st are at 3:00 PM at
6 Safety Headquarters. The community meeting Thursday,
7 November 14th, 6:30 PM, will be in the Second Precinct at
8 Adam Butzel Recreation Center, which is located on Lyndon
9 Street in Detroit. For October 24. Committee meetings
10 scheduled at this time, both being held at Detroit Public
11 Safety Headquarters are as follows: Policy Committee
12 meeting, Tuesday, October 29th, 5:00 PM; Budget Committee
13 meeting Wednesday, October 30th at 6:00 PM. That
14 concludes the report and the announcements, Chairman
15 Woods, and board.

16 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you very kindly. I think we
17 have new business now. And what I would say is that, as
18 it relates to, and I guess it might be a little bit of
19 old business and new business, I'm going to defer
20 everything about any type of subpoena and all of that to
21 the attorney. And I'm going to recuse myself from it and
22 defer it to the vice chairperson. And although I know
23 what the facts are, what the truth is. But I'm a very
24 transparent person. I'm a very community oriented person,
25 and I seek the truth and I stand on truth. And so, having

1 said that, I'm going to direct an attorney to whatever
2 the ruling was and what you feel the ruling was about any
3 type of subpoena, communicate that to the vice chairman
4 who will work with you as it relates to that, to vet that
5 situation all the way out on what can be done and what
6 cannot be done as it relates to that. You know because
7 the fact of the matter is that, we don't need to get
8 caught up in isms and schisms when we are dealing with
9 the citizens of the City of Detroit.

10 And so my overall objective is not to play with the
11 emotions of people, and play with the livelihood of
12 people. When citizens come here and they are looking for
13 the truth. And we are not here to play any games with the
14 citizens of the City of Detroit, but we are trying to do
15 our best as a commission to be able to get them the right
16 answers without any political gamesmanship or any type of
17 politics or any type of emotional gains. Because at the
18 end of the day, you have a young lady who is dead and her
19 family, I'm sure, is suffering over that. And no one is
20 here to play with the emotions of anyone and haven't said
21 that. I will leave it at that.

22 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Thank you. Through the
23 Chair. So, being an oversight board and handling this,
24 there is nothing that we can do as far as changing an
25 opinion, a medical decision. We're just overseeing and

1 giving this information that we have already received.

2 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: We can absolutely, and Council
3 agrees with me. When the City Council requests a
4 document, they get the document. We are an oversight
5 board. The City Council has oversight for the City of
6 Detroit. When we request that, when we vote that a
7 document should be supplied, the document has to be
8 supplied. Now, it can be, if it's redacted, it's a
9 separate structure, but that's a separate issue. We might
10 have to deal with that separately.

11 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: And we receive the redacted
12 entire report.

13 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Yeah.

14 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: My final Question. Does it
15 matter; after receiving the report and after reviewing a
16 report that was already written, what is it that is
17 expected for us to do afterwards?

18 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: We requested the report. You
19 have to look at...

20 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: The citizen has a right to FIAA
21 documents.

22 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: No, we don't have to.

23 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Excuse me.

24 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Freedom of information.

25 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Excuse me. I'm speaking though.

1 I'm not a freedom of information. You are a commissioner;
2 excuse me. Excuse me. You know, all these games, we have
3 to stop the games and quit playing with the emotions of
4 the people. COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair.

5 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Excuse me.

6 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Can we please have respect for...

7 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Excuse me, and I'm going to
8 recognize...

9 COMMISSIONER BURTON: It is very disrespectful. How
10 you insult this woman; she's our attorney, the past
11 attorney to this board.

12 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Commissioner, you are out of
13 order. You are out of order. You are out of order. You
14 know, the thing is, we don't have to continue to play
15 these games. You are in your District, this is
16 embarrassing.

17 COMMISSIONER BURTON: It's embarrassing how you greet
18 a woman that's old enough to be your mother.

19 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Look at her, this is my girl.
20 This is our deal with each other every single day. I
21 respect and regard this commissioner and this is
22 absolutely business. But I'm trying to play games on... I
23 respect this lady and I work with her. You know. Yeah,
24 right? For we are going to have this meeting.

25 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Motion to adjourn, Chairman.

1 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: A motion made by Commissioner
2 Moore to adjourn.

3 VICE CHAIRPERSON: Second.

4 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Seconded by Commissioner Smith.

5 All in favor say aye.

6 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

7 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Any discussion? Anyone opposed?

8 The motion is carried. Thank you.

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
