11	September 26, 2024 at 3:00 P.M.
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- 1 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Good afternoon. Today is
- 2 September 26th, 2024. The time is now 3:00 PM. The City
- 3 of Detroit Board of Police Commissioners meeting is now
- 4 called to order. Invocation today is by Chaplain Darren
- 5 Penson, who is on Zoom. Are you present?
- 6 MS. GARNIER: We're having difficulty getting the
- 7 chaplain on at the moment.
- 8 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Okay, thank you. So we will
- 9 have prayer by Reverend Chief Warfield.
- 10 REVEREND WARFIELD: Let us pray. Father, we come once
- 11 again just to say thank you for this day, for this hour
- 12 that you've allowed us to make it to this day. As we come
- 13 here to meet on the community concerns, and on the
- 14 community behalf, as it relates to policing and
- 15 community, we ask Father that your spirit will guide us
- 16 in this conversation and you will provide answers and
- 17 solutions that we need to make our city a better city and
- 18 a better place to live. Bless those who are conducting
- 19 this meeting, our commissioners, bless the citizens who
- 20 are here, and the staff and all those involved. We give
- 21 you honor; we give you glory. In Jesus' name we pray.
- 22 Amen.
- VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Amen. Thank you for that
- 24 prayer. Now we're going to have an introduction of our
- 25 commissioners by our Madam Secretary.



- 1 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Woods has asked to be
- 2 excused.
- 3 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Smith Present.
- 4 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Bernard has asked to be
- 5 excused.
- 6 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Banks has asked to be
- 7 excused.
- 8 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Bell has asked to be
- 9 excused.
- 10 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Burton -
- 11 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Carter -
- 12 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Moore Present.
- 13 MS. GARNIER: Cmmissioner Hernandez -
- 14 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Pressley -
- 15 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Dewaelsche Present.
- MS. GARNIER: Three commissioners present, Madam Vice
- 17 Chair.
- 18 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Thank you, ma'am. So we do
- 19 not have a quorum, so we'll start our oral
- 20 communications. Who do we have for that?
- MS. UNDERWOOD: Madam Chair, we have four speakers in
- 22 the room. We'll start with Bishop Bland, Ms. Bernice
- 23 Smith and Ms. Fredia Butler. Please state your name and
- 24 speak directly into the mic.
- 25 BISHOP BLAND: Bishop Fletcher Bland. I was here last



- 1 week and I had made recommendations regarding the
- 2 handicap parking at the end of the building, and I
- 3 suggested that the parking of the first two rows be
- 4 handicapped. But after I left the building yesterday, I
- 5 realized that from the four handicapped parking spaces
- 6 all the way up to the door, all of that is concrete,
- 7 flowers, weeds, and landscaping. You can extend the
- 8 handicap parking now from those four spaces all the way
- 9 to the building whatever the code is for a number of feet
- 10 before the building. But all of that could be handicapped
- 11 so people like myself and others don't have to walk all
- 12 the way down. Plus, it is getting cold, it's going to be
- 13 snowing and it'd be nice if the handicapped spaces could
- 14 be enhanced. So from where they are, all that space
- 15 that's just sitting there unused could be made
- 16 handicapped spaces.
- 17 The second thing I want to suggest is, you know, we
- 18 have a lot of people with mental health issues and as the
- 19 gentleman was shot the other day, he had a mental health
- 20 issue. We've had in the past, people with knives, axes
- 21 and other weapons, and I'd like to suggest that each
- 22 patrol car be housed with a shield. You know, when you
- 23 had Detroit Breathe on Seven Mile. When officers walk up
- 24 to a house, they don't know what they are walking up to.
- 25 They don't know what's confronting them. But if they had



- 1 a shield, so that if somebody's shooting or they have an
- 2 ax or a knife, not only can they be protected, but they
- 3 may be able to de-escalate the situation and talk to the
- 4 potential perpetrator and get him or her to disarm
- 5 themselves. So, if everyone had in their vehicle a
- 6 shield, when they walk up to a house, they won't be
- 7 ambushed. Another suggestion I had... well, those are the
- 8 two, but we need the... oh, one other thing. When you are
- 9 walking up to the building from the parking lot, right in
- 10 front of the door should be a handicapped ramp just for
- 11 people who may not park in the handicap, but they parking
- 12 in the regular parking space when they come up to the
- 13 door, like, I have a walker, I had to lift my walker up.
- 14 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Okay. Thank you, sir. That
- 15 is your time. Thank you. BISHOP BLAND: Thank you.
- 16 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Let the record reflect that
- 17 Commissioner Burton is present.
- MS. UNDERWOOD: Ms. Smith; after Ms. Smith, Ms.
- 19 Fredia Butler.
- 20 MS. SMITH: Good afternoon, commissioners.
- 21 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Good afternoon.
- 22 MS. SMITH: I constantly watch my news at 11 o'clock
- 23 in the morning, channel 2. And each morning it seems like
- 24 it's getting worse and worse as far as crime is in our
- 25 city and things that are unsuitable that's going on in



- 1 our city. I love this city and I'm sure there are a lot
- 2 of Detroiters who love this city; and we want it to be
- 3 the best that it can be. When it comes to a child that's
- 4 been missing for over three months, and I see on the TV
- 5 today, 14 years old, can't find a body yet. The chief
- 6 appeared and made his presentation. Our attorney, she
- 7 made her presentation. How in the heck that we, as
- 8 parents are not more cognizant of our children and where
- 9 they are.
- 10 I used to take my children back and forth to school.
- 11 I used to pick them up back and forth. Not that I was
- 12 worried about the danger, but I cared. I was a monitor in
- 13 the junior high school there at Western and at Mayberry
- 14 over in Southwest Detroit for all of my children, the
- 15 time that they were in school. Why can't parents be more
- 16 cognizant? I guess that's the word for it, I want to say,
- 17 of their children. They're looking like they're just
- 18 letting them go and no interest in them whatsoever. I
- 19 feel sorry for the parents, true enough, but anytime you
- 20 have a 14-year-old young girl who has been raped several
- 21 times and you don't know anything about it, I'm mad; I'm
- 22 mad as hell, because being a mother and a grandmother, I
- 23 know how it is to take care of children. And I don't know
- 24 what's the matter with these parents that they don't take
- 25 care of their children, pay more attention to where they



- l go and what they do. It's incorrigible the fact that... it
- 2 is horrible. And I feel bad today. I really feel bad,
- 3 because that child didn't belong to me, but I felt as
- 4 though... I have three daughters and I took care of them. I
- 5 was very careful of who they associated with and so
- 6 forth. But I'm just disgusted today really with these
- 7 parents in this city. Thank you.
- 8 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Thank you, ma'am.
- 9 MS. BUTLER: Good afternoon.
- 10 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Good afternoon.
- 11 MS. BUTLER: This is just a continuation from the
- 12 last time I was here. According to several reports in the
- 13 New York Times, there are officers who are clansmen
- 14 joining police departments; most, I believe, live outside
- 15 of the cities. We have problems here with our young men
- 16 applying to join the department, but not following up and
- 17 some unable to pass physical requirements. I'm very
- 18 concerned because I believe that working where you live,
- 19 one has a vested interest in maintaining the quality of
- 20 life, and it's more than just a job. I have reported
- 21 earlier that some of the mayor's top administrators don't
- 22 live in the city. Our tax dollars are going elsewhere,
- 23 supporting other cities, which includes paying lawsuits.
- 24 Something needs to be done because of the reversal of
- 25 decisions by the Supreme Court Project 2025 and



- 1 redistricting, we are living in an armed camp, police by
- 2 outsiders. The work started in, the work stated, I'm
- 3 sorry, in Project 2025 has been going on for some time.
- 4 Too many of us are not paying attention. We need to stop
- 5 complaining and take a look in the mirror. As I have
- 6 asked before, what are we doing where we live, working
- 7 together, we can change what is happening. We must move
- 8 forward. Thank you.
- 9 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Thank you.
- 10 MS. UNDERWOOD: Minister Eric Blount, and then we'll
- 11 go into Zoom.
- 12 MINISTER BLOUNT: Good afternoon board. I'm Minister
- 13 Eric Blount from Sacred Heart Catholic Church.
- 14 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Good afternoon.
- MINISTER BLOUNT: I'm asking for a moment of silence
- 16 for Marcellus Williams.
- Jesus wept for his friend. So I'm sure you can
- 18 afford me the opportunity to weep for an innocent, what a
- 19 vast majority of people feel is an innocent black man who
- 20 was executed this week. And I hope you realize why some
- 21 of us come here with very, very serious demands on this
- 22 board of police commissioners. We are here for police
- 23 officer misconduct, but the corruption on this board
- 24 doesn't allow us to address the duty we have. And yes,
- 25 vice chair, you have the ability to interrupt the chief



- 1 of police and say, look, we're not here for a crime
- 2 summit; we're not here to talk about kids and everything
- 3 else. We are here for police officer misconduct. So have
- 4 the police department first talk about their efforts in
- 5 the risk management system they have to detect bad police
- 6 officers. Let them talk about Internal Affairs and what
- 7 they've discovered and what they're doing to prevent bad
- 8 police officers. And OCI just a few months ago did an
- 9 analysis that warned us that cops, bad cops, are
- 10 handcuffing innocent citizens, but not arresting them.
- 11 That should be an alarm that something's going wrong and
- 12 you need to get to the bottom of it, and not just talk
- 13 about crimes and things that happened. We are waiting.
- 14 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Thank you, sir. That is your
- 15 time.
- MS. UNDERWOOD: We are going to go into Zoom, and our
- 17 first speaker will be Ms. Taura Brown and former
- 18 Commissioner William Davis.
- MS. BROWN: Thank you Commissioner. My name is Taura
- 20 Brown. Can you hear me?
- 21 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: You can be heard. Thank
- 22 you.
- MS. BROWN: Thank you Commissioner. My name is Taura
- 24 Brown. I was going to speak about Sherman Butler, but
- 25 today I'm going to speak about something that's been



- 1 really getting on my nerves. This meeting is at three
- 2 o'clock every Thursday, except when it's a community
- 3 meeting. And those are later and we know where they are.
- 4 I don't understand why this commission can't be here on
- 5 time and start at 3 o'clock like it's supposed to. It is
- 6 3:12, and from my vantage point, it looks like maybe two
- 7 or three people are sitting there. This is important. I
- 8 don't know if you all need to change the time or what
- 9 needs to happen, but the same people are always late and
- 10 I don't care where this meeting is held, whether it's
- 11 held here at a different location, on the moon, they are
- 12 the same people who manage to be late every single week.
- 13 This is a commitment. This is serious. The time
- 14 doesn't change, and when it does, you know, in advance. I
- 15 don't know what it's going on, but the rest of this
- 16 commission needs to learn to get here on time. This is
- 17 ridiculous. People set aside time to come here for public
- 18 comment, to come here for observation. You have senior
- 19 citizens, well into their nineties, you have pastors, you
- 20 have people who have left work to be here for this
- 21 meeting and for some reason the damn commissioners cannot
- 22 get here on time. It is ridiculous and they have more
- 23 excuses, and I don't know why they don't get here on
- 24 time. The other thing I want to mention is we are still
- 25 waiting for body cam video from Sherman Butler's murder.



- 1 And at this point I'm going to call it a murder and not a
- 2 shooting because it's clearly a cover-up because they
- 3 come up with more excuses as to why not to give us this
- 4 camera. We are just now finding out... well, I'm not just
- 5 now finding out. I've known for guite some time that
- 6 Craig Gregory was a former DPD police officer. They claim
- 7 they can't find any of his personnel records. His name
- 8 has come up in two lawsuits for civil rights violations.
- 9 I want to know when we should expect the video? When
- 10 should we expect the police report? When should we expect
- 11 to know what happened to Sherman Butler and see the video
- 12 that tells us. Thank you.
- 13 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Thank you.
- MS. UNDERWOOD: Former Commissioner Davis.
- 15 MR. DAVIS: Good afternoon. Can I be heard?
- VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: You can be heard. Go ahead
- 17 please.
- MR. DAVIS: Okay. I'd like to start off by saying, I
- 19 agree that the handicapped parking should be closer to
- 20 the door. I found that to be a problem when I was down
- 21 there, especially with some people who are elderly and
- 22 handicapped. They should be able to have parking closer
- 23 to the door, like in most places. Also, I think that
- 24 there is even a greater need for this commission to track
- 25 wrongful arrest and wrongful convictions. There should be



- 1 a regular quarterly report done to update the public on
- 2 what's being done about that. Also, there should be a
- 3 report dealing with officers that are frequently involved
- 4 in wrongful arrest, or wrongful convictions. You know,
- 5 this board can do a whole lot to improve its image by
- 6 doing more to let people know that you all are aware, and
- 7 working on the challenges that some people face. Because
- 8 you know, if more and more people think that people are
- 9 being arrested for no reason or being arrested because
- 10 somebody can get away with it. And also, there should be
- 11 a report generated every time an officer puts handcuffs
- 12 on someone. You know, if you're putting handcuffs on
- 13 someone, especially a young black person or a young
- 14 Hispanic, you know, just so that you could talk to them,
- 15 that's a problem. We need to make sure that everything's
- 16 above board with this commission and with this
- 17 department. Most of our officers are outstanding
- 18 officers, but if you let bad officers get away with
- 19 stuff, that makes the whole department and the board of
- 20 police commissioners look bad. Thank you.
- 21 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Thank you.
- MS. UNDERWOOD: We do have another speaker in the
- 23 audience. Mr. Ronald Foster.
- MR. FOSTER: Good evening. Through the Chair.
- VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Good evening.



- 1 MR. FOSTER: First thing I wanted to say is I'm
- 2 really very appreciative of you guys as a constant ear to
- 3 the community. I always see Commissioner Moore downtown,
- 4 and the community, as well as Ms. Smith is always in the
- 5 community. I'm very grateful today for you guys'
- 6 partnerships that you have and now that you all have
- 7 done, I think those are great; going in a great
- 8 direction, as well as the new department to help address
- 9 some of the crime victim rights. I think that's very
- 10 admirable and needed. And so I'm very, very grateful for
- 11 what you guys are doing and the efforts that you all are
- 12 making. They are visible and tangible things and so we
- 13 ask that you guys keep it up. I don't have anything
- 14 really bad to say today. I really just encourage you all
- 15 to keep up the good work and keep an ear to the community
- 16 and tighten up the areas that need to be tightened up.
- 17 And thank you all for listening.
- 18 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Thank you.
- 19 MS. UNDERWOOD: Ms. Williams. I think that's all who
- 20 are in the audience. If I miss someone, I'm...
- 21 MS. WILLIAMS: Hello everyone.
- VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Hello.
- MS. WILLIAMS: Today, I just want to speak about
- 24 honesty and integrity and being responsible and being
- 25 held accountable for whatever you've done in respecting



- 1 your job, whatever your position is. I've been speaking
- 2 about a whole lot of stuff a year and a half concerning
- 3 Detroit police officers. Can't say the whole 2,700. And
- 4 at this point in time, there's really nothing left for me
- 5 to say because I have said so much in these meetings and
- 6 making police reports and everything that's been going on
- 7 in my life. Nothing's changed. All I continue to do is
- 8 come in here to put stuff on record; Freedom of
- 9 Information Act. Because at the end of the day, everyone
- 10 who is in these positions are fully aware of what I've
- 11 been complaining about. And all I ask for you all to do,
- 12 is to do your job correctly and comply with the law rules
- 13 and regulations instead of doing what you guys do.
- I can't speak for everybody in this room, but I'm
- 15 talking about integrity and doing what you should do in
- 16 your position. Period. Last weekend I went to the market.
- 17 Now, the taxpayers pay for the helicopters to be put up
- 18 you know, to fill up, fly around. There's no way in heck
- 19 a helicopter should have been stalking me for five
- 20 minutes. That's not acceptable. I can't even go to the
- 21 market. Even when I was at 12, 900 drones and
- 22 helicopters, all over the place. And then they say there
- 23 are no officers there. I can take what you guys say on
- 24 record, but I'm far from stupid. But at the end of the
- 25 day, like I said, accountability, at the end of the day.



- 1 There's nothing else for me to say. Thank you very much
- 2 and have a good day.
- 3 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Thank you, ma'am.
- 4 MS. UNDERWOOD: Madam Chair, there's one more speaker
- 5 in Zoom, Black Bag Roo.
- 6 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Go ahead, you can be heard.
- 7 BLACK BAG ROO: Okay. It is the board of police
- 8 commissioners. Now, you all chairman Darryl Woods, after
- 9 the board voted to subpoena the records from the Detroit
- 10 Police Department at a Michigan State review of
- 11 investigation. The DPD case number 20-11112, on that
- 12 Thursday night, he went in Friday morning and told the
- 13 board secretary, and I believe they're there not to start
- 14 the subpoena process. It has been over a month now and in
- 15 your package, I understand is a letter from the Michigan
- 16 State Police denying the request for some videos or
- 17 something. You all didn't vote to subpoena. He served his
- 18 power, you served the board's authority and went in there
- 19 and told the board secretary not to do something that you
- 20 all voted to do. Now, Darryl Woods has to go. He got in
- 21 the way too. Everybody in Nene's way is going to have to
- 22 get out of the way.
- 23 That's from the mayor all the way down the line to
- 24 Darryl Woods. And then somebody on the school board, get
- 25 in the way, they have to go too. They've been cheating in



- 1 Detroit elections since 2020 that I could prove. And
- 2 tomorrow, Friday, number 45 is going to be out there in
- 3 Warren Macomb County at the Macomb County College out of
- 4 Warren. He got the information that he was cheating on in
- 5 Detroit in 2020. I gave it to him. I made sure he got it
- 6 on three different occasions now he got it; and he knows
- 7 all about it. So they went through the State of Michigan,
- 8 and found, I don't know how many cases of absentee ballot
- 9 fraud. They have nothing to do with Detroit. But I'm
- 10 going to focus on Detroit. All these elected officials
- 11 here in the City of Detroit, highly suspect, they are not
- 12 even cheated on. That's what's been happening. They are
- 13 all cheated in, every last one of those elected officials
- 14 on the city council, the [unclear] council, the Board of
- 15 Police Commissioners, and the school board and they are
- 16 lying and cheating. So they can still...
- 17 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Thank you. We're now moving
- 18 forward to a report from our board secretary. Madam
- 19 Secretary.
- 20 MS. GARNIER: The report from the board secretary
- 21 today under tab 11 is the Office of Chief Investigators
- 22 weekly inventory report for the date September 14th
- 23 through September 20th, 2024. The announcements for today
- 24 are as follows. The next meeting of the board is
- 25 Thursday, October 3rd, 2024 at 3:00 PM, here at Detroit



- 1 Public Safety Headquarters. The next community meeting is
- 2 Thursday, October 10th at 6:30 PM, Third Precinct, which
- 3 will be held at Goodwill Industries Career Center. 2777
- 4 East Grand Boulevard in Detroit, 48211. The October
- 5 monthly committee meeting is as follows: Citizens
- 6 Complaints Committee meeting, Tuesday, October 1st at
- 7 3:00 PM here at Public Safety Headquarters. The Policy
- 8 Committee will be meeting three times in October, all at
- 9 5:00 PM. On October 1st, October 15th and October 29th.
- 10 That concludes the report from the board secretary
- 11 office, Madam Vice Chair?
- 12 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Yes. Thank you, madam
- 13 secretary. So the time is now 3:24, and we still do not
- 14 have a quorum. So can I get a motion to adjourn?
- 15 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: I think we can't even vote
- 16 on it. Meeting adjourned.
- 17 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: The meeting is adjourned.
- 18 Thank you.

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
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
