4 9th, 2025. [Unclear00:09]. Point of order [unclear00:11]  
5 Reverend Warfield to open up with invocation.

6 REVEREND WARFIELD: Let us pray. Most holy and  
7 righteous Father, we come before your presence this  
8 evening, and thank you for your grace and mercy as we  
9 gather for this portion today. [Unclear00:28]. As we come  
10 here in this meeting; this being the meeting to address  
11 some our safety needs, any concerns. We ask that you  
12 embrace us with our [unclear00:35] and concerns, we ask  
13 that you embrace us with our [unclear00:36 to 00:42] on  
14 the agenda. God, bless all those here in attendance, and  
15 those who are watching, and those [unclear00:47 to  
16 00:59].

17 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: [Unclear01:01].

18 MS. GARNIER: Chairperson Woods - Present.

19 MS. GARNIER: Vice Chair Smith - Present.

20 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Bernard - [unclear01:20]  
21 representing District 2. Hello everyone, and Happy New  
22 Year.

23 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Banks - Present.

24 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner. Commissioner Bell is  
25 excused.

1 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Burton -

2 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Carter - Present.

3 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Moore - Present.

4 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Hernandez -

5 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Pressley -

6 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Dewaelsche - Present.

7 MS. GARNIER: 7 Present, sir.

8 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: [Unclear01:52 to 02:45]. Any  
9 discussion? All in favor, say, aye.

10 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

11 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Anyone oppose? Motion carried. I  
12 entertain a motion [unclear02:55to02:58].

13 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Support.

14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Supported by Commissioner Moore.  
15 Any discussion? All in favor, say aye.

16 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

17 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Introduction of BOPC staff and  
18 Chief of Police.

19 COMMISSIONER [Unclear03:15].

20 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: No. By the secretary.

21 MS. GARNIER: [Unclear03:28] the police commissioner,  
22 staff present are: Attorney Dante Goss, Chief  
23 Investigator Warfield. Robert Brown, Jonya Underwood,  
24 Teresa Blossom, Candace Hayes, Artemisia Joshua, Drew  
25 Fries, Felicia Tyson, Jasmine Taylor, Deputy Chief

1 Jaqueline Pritchett for Chief Police, Supervising  
2 Investigator, OCI, Ainsley Cornwell. And thus far we have  
3 Ms. Fredia Butler present. I'm not aware of having  
4 received any other names. I see former Commissioner Davis  
5 as well.

6 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: [Unclear04:18].

7 MS. GARNIER: I'm sorry. I am so sorry.

8 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: [Unclear04:24 to 04:26]. So,  
9 let's go to [unclear04:27 to 04:41] unreported. We'll be  
10 moving expeditiously with the search, and Commissioner  
11 Hernandez [unclear04:52], can give us an update  
12 [unclear04:58] of the final stages of that  
13 [unclear05:03], Commissioner, [unclear05:07]. But if you  
14 can brief the committee?

15 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Yes, sir, absolutely.  
16 Through the Chair.

17 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes.

18 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: So, thank you everyone,  
19 [unclear05:19], for being here. We have a timeline that  
20 we set in place that started a few months ago, announcing  
21 the departure and former Chief White. That timeline and  
22 partnership is one of our referred vendors or firms,  
23 certain firms for [unclear05:36], is supporting us, not  
24 only in doing a local [unclear05:41], but also national  
25 search as well. They are doing a series of candidates,

1 their obligation to us to provide a list of 25 names  
2 along with five recommended candidates for this body to  
3 interview. So, part of next steps that voting is going to  
4 close at the conclusion of this, this following week. At  
5 that time, we'll set up five interviews in person at a  
6 date and time to be determined, but it will be available  
7 open to public, and we absolutely want to be part of  
8 that.

9 And at that time, during that meeting role  
10 ultimately we come up with three candidates that will run  
11 over based on our charter landing and allegation for send  
12 to defendant. So that process is going to conclude the  
13 month of January. But we send over either by the last  
14 week of January or by the first of February.

15 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you very kindly. And as it  
16 relates to a [unclear06:43] we announce them under right  
17 now. Absolutely. On today's agenda, we intend move  
18 special recognition for the 2024 [unclear07:13] that just  
19 wrapped up his work in [unclear07:18]. In 2022, he  
20 provided feedback on draft policy and have been in  
21 community events by the PC. We also participated in our  
22 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of [unclear07:45] of Detroit public  
23 library, had a great year in 2024, [unclear07:55] small,  
24 our appreciated certificates be even better with about  
25 five members joining us and getting uniform of Chief

1 Bettison, and the [unclear08:14] for Saturday March 15th  
2 at Wayne Law. That information will be provided and all  
3 of the members of the public [unclear08:28] copy of  
4 November all management five. I just want to acknowledge  
5 the members and ask them to stand if they are here. Is  
6 [unclear08:43] Anderson, here? Aurora Williams and  
7 Jeremiah Williams.

8 Thank you for joining. Welcome them with a round of  
9 applause. [Unclear09:17 to 09:37] Those were the prepared  
10 statements. You know, I want to say that I absolutely,  
11 absolutely appreciate you, young people. We do appreciate  
12 you guys stepping up. We thank you for your strong  
13 leadership and we thank you for being a blessing in your  
14 community and we look forward to hearing great things  
15 about you guys. And if we can support you in any kind of  
16 way, don't hesitate to let us know. Our information is  
17 back there on that table. You give us a call and we have  
18 your back 1000 percent. So, thank you. God bless you all.

19 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I just want to say to you,  
20 thank you and [unclear10:20] colleagues, as  
21 [unclear10:22], don't forget that when you legally turn  
22 18, you can become a member of the Detroit Police  
23 Department. We have both officer positions as well as  
24 civilians' positions. And guess what? We pay really,  
25 really well for the highest in the country. So, therefore

1 the high school diploma and no felonies, things like  
2 that, you become, and empower and help law enforcement  
3 and keep order with their communities. Thank you, Mr.  
4 Chair.

5 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Alright. Thank you.

6 [Unclear10:58] do anything else?

7 COMMISSIONER [Unclear11:01 to 11:12]?

8 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Resolutions.

9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Well, [unclear11:15 to 11:38].  
10 So, number seven is the unfinished business. Is that  
11 right?

12 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Mr. Chairman, I'd like to move a  
13 motion to adjourn item number 7 until next week.

14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Motion made Commissioner Moore  
15 and second by Commissioner Dewaelsche to adjourn item  
16 number 7 to next week. Any discussion? All in favor, say  
17 aye.

18 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

19 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Any oppose? The motion is  
20 carried. Let's go to [unclear12:21], what's your  
21 pleasure? [Unclear12:40].

22 COMMISSIONER DEWAEELSCHÉ: Support.

23 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Motion made by Commissioner  
24 Dewaelsche, and supported by [unclear12:47].

25 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Mr. Chairman, I would simply

1 like to point out that the policy was go thoroughly for  
2 review by the policy committee, including myself, just to  
3 make [unclear12:57].

4 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Motion made and second by  
5 Commissioner Bernard. Any discussion?

6 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Through the Chair.

7 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir.

8 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: I just want to [unclear13:13  
9 to 13:18]. I need to know where you stand.

10 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Absolutely. And I'm very grateful  
11 to you [unclear13:27], as a whole that [unclear13:31 to  
12 34], great things happen in 2025.

13 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: If I could vote.

14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Absolutely. We acknowledging  
15 that. Amen. And so, anyone [unclear13:46]. So, the  
16 motion's carried. And we are moving on. Alright, let's  
17 talk to the Chief of Police report.

18 CMDR. PRITCHETT: Good evening, everyone. We'll start  
19 with [unclear13:55 to 14:17].

20 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Can you talk directly into the  
21 mic because the interpreters are actually interpreting.

22 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I think the mic is the  
23 problem.

24 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: [Unclear14:30] texting.

25 CMDR. PRITCHETT: Is that better? Okay. So currently

1 there are not any requirement minimum to court  
2 [unclear14:37]. The crime data as of 1-8-2025 homicides  
3 reported incidents from last year for non-fatal shootings  
4 are tied at 14. Currently, we are down 5 robberies from  
5 the same time last year. We were down 20 incidents of our  
6 total part, one violent crime. And our carjacks, our tied  
7 [unclear15:01]. The mental health calls for service have  
8 been 101 calls, but mental is not tied. There have been  
9 34 calls for mental violence that were armed, and 19  
10 calls for mental violence, not armed. And there have been  
11 29 calls of suicide for couples having problems; 75 calls  
12 for suicide threats. So, a couple will [unclear15:25  
13 to15:35]. The first one was a fatal accident  
14 [unclear15:40]. On Sunday, January 5th at 1:21 AM,  
15 officers were dispatched to the 11,000 block of  
16 [unclear15:45] to investigate an accident that had just  
17 occurred. Once they arrived, they observed a 2000 jeep  
18 pulled over in the north October. Officer discovered that  
19 the victim was an mounted police officer. Medics conveyed  
20 the victim to a local hospital where he was pronounced  
21 asleep while driving.

22 Officers from number 9, secured the scene and the  
23 [unclear16:09]. Detectives arrived. At the scene and were  
24 able to determine that the driver of the white van,  
25 [unclear16:16]. Detectives were able to identify suspect.

1 On January 6th, the suspect was arrested by the Detroit  
2 police. Detectives from the Fatal Squad Unit submitted a  
3 warrant to the Wayne County Prosecutor office. The second  
4 incident occurred on Wednesday, January 1<sup>st</sup>, at 12:05 AM.  
5 Officers were dispatched to the 1700 block of  
6 [unclear16:43] to investigate shots fired. It was  
7 upgraded to a person shot in the face. Officers made the  
8 same [unclear16:50 to 16:59] Officers from the Tenth  
9 Precinct secured the scene [unclear17:01] to follow up  
10 the victim. Officers secured the scene for Homicide.  
11 Detectives determined that the victim and the suspect had  
12 an argument before the suspect shot him. [Unclear17:13].  
13 On January 13 detectives submitted a warrant to Wayne  
14 County prosecutor's office. The warrant was approved and  
15 the suspect was arraigned on the following charges:  
16 second degree murder, firearm possession by a  
17 [unclear17:33] person, 2 counts of felony firearm in  
18 habitual court. Currently, the Wayne County jail is  
19 filled with [unclear17:40]. The incident occurred on  
20 Saturday, January 4<sup>th</sup>. At 7 AM. [Unclear17:48]. Officers  
21 arrived at the scene [unclear17:52]. Officers responded  
22 to the scene. Detective from the Homicide Section were  
23 notified. Detectives determine that the victim was an  
24 arguing two unknown black men who took him to take a bag  
25 away from him before he was shot.

1           The suspect left the location in a gray sedan. The  
2 incident is still under investigation. Detectives are  
3 asking anyone who has any information regarding this  
4 incident, contact Crime Stoppers at 1-800-SPEAKUP or  
5 detroitrewards.tv. The fourth incident is a carjacking  
6 that occurred on Sunday, January 5th, 8:36. Officers were  
7 dispatch the 5500 block of [unclear18:36]. The victim's  
8 vehicle, cell phone, [unclear18:50]. Officers who secured  
9 the scene notified Commercial Auto Theft Unit. Detective  
10 said the suspect was a very young black male with a thin  
11 and no facial. On January 5th, detectives from CAT,  
12 located the vehicle in 14,000 block of [unclear19:10] off  
13 of the ninth. Surveillance was conducted. The vehicle was  
14 observed being driven by a black male matching the  
15 suspect's description; where police got the vehicle and  
16 arrested the driver; a 16-year-old male. On January 6th,  
17 detectives submitted a warrant to the Wayne County  
18 prosecutor's office. This is still currently under  
19 investigation. On a positive note. Yesterday we had two  
20 coffee and cakes. One for Sergeant Ramon Childs, of Crime  
21 Data Analyses. He served for 35 years. The second one was  
22 Sergeant McQuinn who served in the Central Photo for 30  
23 years. But we also had a homicide that occurred in 2025  
24 that was [unclear19:58] deemed the homicide.  
25 [Unclear20:00 to 20:04]

1 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Any questions? Yes.

2 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: I was in a conversation with  
3 [unclear20:19 to 20:44]. CMDR. PRITCHETT: [Unclear 20: to  
4 21:07]. So, they are searching location in the area.  
5 Officer made that location has notified, she knows that  
6 her father was missing, [unclear21:22 to 21:28] the  
7 investigation.

8 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: [Unclear21:28]

9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: [Unclear21:32 to 21:52]

10 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: And then to that point, you  
11 know, there's some communication because that online  
12 [unclear21:59 to 22:15].

13 CMDR. PRITCHETT: Through the Chair, I will have a  
14 conference with the chief tomorrow to make sure they both  
15 are on the same page of what we do [unclear22:21].

16 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Thank you.

17 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: And well, we did receive  
18 communication dealing with our department to prioritize  
19 or even [unclear22:36] some community members. We want to  
20 share this with you with the department and we ask for  
21 the department to give us a response on this expeditious  
22 to us [unclear22:50].

23 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Yes, Commissioner.

24 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you.

25 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I'd like to remind

1 [unclear23:22]. I think we probably covered, but it's so  
2 important that this week, the week of January 7<sup>th</sup>, 2025,  
3 to January 8 [unclear23:35]. And that's the great  
4 thing, particularly because we both know, we would be the  
5 first week [unclear23:46] very, very difficult. We happy  
6 about that. [Unclear23:53].

7 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Absolutely. Okay. Alright. That's  
8 all [unclear24:01] as it relates to [unclear24:24]

9 FEMALE SPEAKER: Good evening.

10 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Good evening.

11 FEMALE SPEAKER: Here with me today, I have my  
12 partner, Captain Phillip Rodriguez, and [unclear24:42 to  
13 29:45].

14

15 FEMALE SPEAKER: We also use our internal resources  
16 of community groups that work with us together so that we  
17 [unclear29:51] from the precinct. Our police officers do  
18 a phenomenal job with our mentors. They also mentor our  
19 brotherhoods programs. Last year they gave out gun locks  
20 distribution. So, we don't have those children to get a  
21 hold of guns and have useless senseless thefts because  
22 [unclear30:17] secure guns last year. And they're always  
23 meeting with our community groups. We do have a senior  
24 movie day coming up in March [unclear30:29] about that.  
25 You know, so we want you to know, because our citizens

1 here, they already know that we prioritize our engagement  
2 with our seniors, with our community, all our community  
3 groups. In-house. we have a social worker who assist our  
4 victims of domestic violence who are victims of sexual  
5 assault and ensure that they have resources, and they are  
6 available to help them either with emergency locations or  
7 [unclear31:06]. DC spoke about [unclear31:08] mental  
8 policy this year, and today is only January the 9th.  
9 That's how important that it is that we have the CIT  
10 program. In the 12th Precinct, we have multiple members  
11 who are trained in CIT, who we can call for a mental  
12 health call to our precinct to help address those calls  
13 so that we can have a peaceful resolution to those calls.  
14 Our officers are going out and answering police runs or  
15 ShotSpotter. So last year, in February of 2023, we  
16 received ShotSpotter assistance. This year we're going to  
17 focus heavily on our ShotSpotter locations; heavily on  
18 them. What we want to do is utilize that technology to  
19 apprehend suspects who are plaguing our community with  
20 illegal gunfire by confiscating those illegal weapons and  
21 making our community safe. We're dedicated to our  
22 citizens. We're dedicated to our local business partners  
23 and working with them so we can have a safe 12 Precinct  
24 and a safe Detroit. With that being said, I'll take any  
25 questions and thank you for your attention.

1 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Commissioner Banks.

2 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Through the Chair. Is it  
3 commander or captain?

4 CMDR PRITCHETT: It's commander now.

5 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Okay. Commander, wonderful.

6 Commander, the senior movie day, where's that going to be  
7 held? I know it's going to be held in March, but is that  
8 going to be held at the 12th Precinct?

9 CMDR. PRITCHETT: So, what happens is, we have a  
10 community van and we actually pick them up. We'll have  
11 them meet us at the precinct. We'll take them out to work  
12 a community movie day. And what we do, it'll be on our  
13 Facebook page, all the information and details of what  
14 time that they need to be there and where we'll be going.

15 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Thank you.

16 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, Commissioner Moore.

17 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Commander, I just want to say  
18 thank you for your efforts and your neighborhood police  
19 officers for the potential human trafficking  
20 investigation that you, Assistant Chief Fitzgerald, and  
21 Captain Stacy Greer-Travis were a part of. So, I just  
22 want to say, even though I'm in District 7, folks call me  
23 about stuff and you were hands on deck. So, thank you  
24 very much.

25 CMDR. PRITCHETT: You're welcome, sir.

1 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, Commissioner Bernard.

2 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Okay. Just quickly, the gas  
3 station that we closed down on 6 Mile and James Couzens,  
4 have you noticed that they've got their lights back up  
5 advertising their gas prices? We had told them that night  
6 they could not be open, have any signage, et cetera. But  
7 I passed there yesterday and the lights were on. So, you  
8 might want --- I don't know if anybody's coming in and  
9 out or anything like that, but I know that there is a  
10 court order in place saying they can't be open. So, I  
11 don't know why they're saying gas premium super, you  
12 know, et cetera. I just thought it'd call it your  
13 attention.

14 CMDR. Thank you, ma'am. I'll look into that and I'll  
15 respond to you via email.

16 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, I think that has been  
17 lifted. And you can take a look at it. I'm almost certain  
18 it has, yes.

19 CMDR. PRITCHETT: I'm not sure if BC was able, if  
20 they were able to get their license.

21 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah. They had one hearing, and  
22 then I think they just had another hearing the other day,  
23 you know, so, and I think that issue was resolved or  
24 whatever, you know. So, follow up on it. Commissioner.

25 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Yes. Through the Chair.

1 Commander, the program that you all have to assist  
2 victims of domestic violence and sexual abuse with the  
3 social worker being on site; is that specific to the 12th  
4 Precinct or is that across the department? And then also,  
5 is it just one that you have per department and is that  
6 enough for the number of cases that that social worker  
7 might see?

8 CMDR. PRITCHETT: Through the Chair. No, sir. That is  
9 an operation where we partner and multiple precincts have  
10 their own embedded social worker. And those resources are  
11 not only in the precincts, but also at Homicide and also  
12 DV downtown.

13 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: And in that capacity is the  
14 department, the precinct confident that there is enough  
15 for the number of individuals they might be servicing for  
16 those cases?

17 CMDR. PRITCHETT: I would say yes, but, you know,  
18 we'll always need more. We always need more hands-on deck  
19 to ensure that people get the resources that they need.

20 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Thank you.

21 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes.

22 COMMISSIONER SMITH: Thank you. Through the Chair. I  
23 just wanted to thank you personally for your previous  
24 role for missing persons and Homicide for all the  
25 countless hours that you put into the Na'Ziyah Harris

1 case. I've been attending as well as watching this case.  
2 And just to know all of the evidence and findings that  
3 the department came up with to bring justice for her,  
4 because she deserves it. And I just want to, personally  
5 thank you.

6 CMDR. PRITCHETT: Through the Chair. Thank you. Thank  
7 you. Through the Chair. That case, as you know, it's very  
8 near and dear to our hearts. During my time at Homicide  
9 and missing persons. We were happy to bring charges and  
10 be able to be in the process and stages that we are now  
11 and hopefully obtain a conviction, so, this can't happen  
12 to anybody else.

13 COMMISSIONER SMITH: Thank you so much.

14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Alright. Thank you very kindly.  
15 Oh, is Danny in the hand up? Right back down. There is a  
16 commissioner --- you didn't have your finger up, did you?  
17 Okay. Alright. Thank you very kindly, captain. Great job,  
18 oh, commander, yeah. Thank you. You have something else  
19 to say?

20 CMDR. PITCHETT: Through the Chair. Yes, sir. We  
21 would also like to let everyone know that we do have  
22 refreshments here. The 12th Precinct welcomes you to  
23 partake if you please.

24 Na'Ziyah Thank you very kindly. All right. Great  
25 job. Always answering the phone. That's all I have to

1 say. I want to acknowledge our county clerk Kathy Garrett  
2 is here. Let's give her a hand. And very, very, very  
3 honorable person doing tremendous work throughout this  
4 county and this nation. So, we just really deeply respect  
5 her and regard her. And she got her second half back  
6 there too, you know. He's all right. You know, the  
7 chairman is back there. My good friend Keith Williams.  
8 Come on, let's give him a hand with the Black Caucus.  
9 Yep. And so, let's do the presentation as it relates to  
10 the resolution, if you can do that resolution for us. The  
11 first one for us is Commissioner Pressley.

12 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Yes. Through the Chair.  
13 Resolution, honoring a Police Officer Cameron Deshawn  
14 Richardson, posthumously.

15 WHEREAS Cameron Richardson was appointed to the  
16 Detroit Public, excuse me, was appointed to Detroit  
17 Police Department on January 6th, 2024. Upon graduating  
18 from the Metropolitan Police Academy, officer Richardson  
19 began his career at the Ninth Precinct; and

20 WHEREAS Officer Richardson, due to police served the  
21 Ninth Precinct, displaying tremendous knowledge and  
22 leadership skills. On Sunday, January 5th, 2025, Police  
23 Officer Cameron Richardson, badge 0754 died in the line  
24 of duty; and

25 WHEREAS before joining the Detroit Police

1 Department, Cameron Richardson enlisted in the US Army.  
2 He served 10 distinguished years with an honorable  
3 discharge as the staff sergeant, E-6. He was the  
4 recipient of the following awards: Army Commendation  
5 Medal, Army Achievement Medal, Army, Good Conduct Medal,  
6 National Defense Service Medal, Global War on Terrorism  
7 Expeditionary Medal, Global War on Terrorism Service  
8 Medal, and Non-Commissioned Officer, Professional  
9 Development Ribbon, as well as numerous letters of  
10 commendation from his superiors; and

11 WHEREAS Interim Police Chief Todd Bettison,  
12 described Officer Richardson as a fine officer and a  
13 family man with two daughters. We lost one of Detroit's  
14 finest. He was a humble servant and wanted to be a  
15 Detroit police officer. For the public, his parents  
16 provided a poignant glimpse of the magnitude of the  
17 family's loss and grief. He was an amazing dad and a  
18 great son. While the board and Detroit community will  
19 long remember and honor Officer Richardson for his  
20 service and ultimate sacrifice, we continue to lift the  
21 Richardson family and our thoughts and prayers for an  
22 unimaginable and enduring personal loss.

23 NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED

24 That the Detroit Board of Police Commissioners,  
25 speaking for the citizens of Detroit and the Detroit

1 Police Department, award this resolution posthumously in  
2 recognition of Police Officer Cameron Richardson, for his  
3 dedicated and diligent public service. His  
4 professionalism, integrity, and standard of commitment to  
5 the City of Detroit and its citizens merit our highest  
6 regard. We salute you, Police Officer Cameron Deshawn  
7 Richardson for a job well done.

8 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: What is the pleasure of the  
9 board?

10 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Second.

11 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Support.

12 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Motion made by Commissioner  
13 Bernard, supported by Commissioner Moore. Any discussion?  
14 I would like to say that we are deeply praying for this  
15 family and for the Ninth Precinct. We know that they had  
16 a loss before this, and we certainly our hearts and  
17 prayers go out to this beloved family. I had a chance to  
18 meet mom and dad and his sister; and his just was a gut-  
19 wrenching situation. And we are very, very appreciative  
20 of the Detroit Police Department in bringing someone in  
21 custody regarding this matter. Having said that, all in  
22 favor say, aye.

23 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

24 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Anyone opposed? The motion is  
25 carried. As it relates to, if you can read first preamble

1 of the --- you know --- this guy is here, you know, this  
2 38, I think he is what? 38-year-old guy, but you know, he  
3 38 years old. Go ahead.

4 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: And you said, just read the  
5 preamble?

6 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: You can give it to him. He can  
7 get it.

8 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Okay. Resolution honoring  
9 Master Sergeant Alan J. Quinn. That's where we are,  
10 right?

11 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes.

4 you, Master Sergeant Allen J. Quinn.

5 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: There you go, right there.

6 COMMISSIONER MOORE: So, moved.

7 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Second.

8 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Moved by Commissioner Moore,  
9 second by Commissioner Bernard. Any discussion? All in  
10 favor say, aye.

11 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

12 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Anyone opposed? The motion is  
13 carried. Thank you. Thank you, Sergeant for everything,

16 SERGEANT QUINN: I am not preamble.

17 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Through the Chair.

18 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah, that stuff. Yes.

19 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Is it Raymond or Ramon? All  
20 right. So, resolution honoring Sergeant Ramon Childs.

21 WHEREAS Ramon Childs was appointed to the Detroit  
22 Police Department on August 14th, 1989. Upon graduating  
23 from Detroit Metropolitan Police Academy, Officer Childs  
24 began his career at the Eighth Precinct; and

1 played a pivotal role in strengthening the bridge between  
2 police, residents and stakeholders, as he tirelessly  
3 served the Detroit Police Department and the residents,  
4 visitors and stakeholders of Detroit for more than 35  
5 years. He served the Detroit Police Department and the  
6 Detroit community with loyalty, professionalism,  
7 integrity, and dedication, and is widely respected  
8 throughout the law enforcement community as a consummate  
9 professional.

10 NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED

11 That the Detroit Board of Police Commissioners,  
12 speaking on behalf of the residents of the great City of  
13 Detroit, recognizes and honors the lifelong contribution  
14 and commitment to excellence and public service of  
15 Sergeant Ramon Childs. His display of courage and  
16 unwavering community spirit has improved the quality of  
17 life in our city, and he's deserving of our best wishes  
18 in all his future endeavors. We thank and congratulate  
19 you, Sergeant Ramon Childs,

20 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: What is the pleasure of the  
21 board?

22 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: So, moved.

23 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Support.

24 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Moved by Commissioner Bernard,  
25 supported by Commissioner Moore. Any discussion? All in

1 favor say, aye.

2 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Anyone opposed? The motion is  
4 carried.

5 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Through the Chair.

6 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes.

7 COMMISSIONER BANKS: What I noticed was that Sergeant  
8 Quinn was a master sergeant. What is a master sergeant? I  
9 never heard of that before. Can you explain that to me?  
10 Through the Chair?

11 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Deputy Chief Pritchett:

12 CMDR. PRITCHETT: Through the Chair. A master  
13 sergeant is someone that the lieutenant or the officer in  
14 charge of that case deemed to be responsible enough to  
15 take the place of a lieutenant in the lieutenant's  
16 absence. So, since Sergeant Quinn is very resilient and  
17 know what he's doing, and is engaged and he's a mentor,  
18 the officer in charge of graphic arts deemed him to be  
19 capable to standing as a role of lieutenant in that  
20 lieutenant's absence.

21 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yep. Thank you very kindly.

22 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Okay.

23 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: That's it?

24 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Yeah. All set. Thank you. Great.

25 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Alright. And I would like to

1 apologize. I'm going to have to exit. The vice chair  
2 would take over. I tried to stay as long as I could.  
3 Unfortunately, my vehicle was towed today. And it was  
4 gone just for a brief moment. And I had to pay \$825 to  
5 Goch & Sons. You know, they are not Detroit towers, you  
6 know, Detroit authorized towers. But and I didn't want  
7 the hookup. I am not trying to flex anything. I just  
8 wanted to see how the citizens are treated. And I have  
9 seen firsthand how the citizens of the City of Detroit  
10 are being abused with a \$825 tow. And I absolutely detest  
11 it. You know, the fact of the matter is that citizens who  
12 are struggling in this city do not deserve that type of  
13 treatment in no shape, form, or fashion. And in fact, I  
14 paid \$840 because they didn't have change for 20, you  
15 know, and that's what they told me. I have them all on  
16 video too. I have them on audio too. I did the taro, you  
17 know, and you know, and I recorded it very, very well.  
18 You know, and it is despicable that you would do a  
19 citizen like that in the City of Detroit, and I detest it  
20 to the umpteenth power. And you will hear more in the  
21 near future

22 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Are we not doing ---?

23 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yep. I mean ---

24 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: That's already done, right  
25 there.

1 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: And young people, God bless you.  
2 And I'm going to applaud you guys again for your good  
3 speeches and I'm going to listen to the video and see  
4 what's going on. And you all have my number back there.  
5 Anything I can do to help you guys, I have you all back  
6 and I'll be listening to the public comment on the video  
7 as well. You know, good, bad or indifferent? God bless  
8 you all.

9 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Go catch that bus.

10 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: I have to catch the bus.

11 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Go catch the bus. Better go  
12 catch the bus.

13 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Oh, there she has.

14 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Oh, she has public comment.  
15 That's all that's left.

16 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: No, the certificates first for  
17 the children.

18 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Okay. So now we'll move  
19 forward to the certificates of appreciation for the Youth  
20 Advisory Panel, yeah. Is Jayden Allen present?

21 Oh, okay. You're going to do it?

22 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHÉ: Madam Vice Chair, there are  
23 3 2024 cohort members present. If you could read all the  
24 names of the 2024 group and have the ones who are here  
25 come and stand. They have their certificates. They're

1 going to post for a picture.

2 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Okay.

3 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Thank you, Vice Chair.

4 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: So, the ones that will be  
5 receiving certificates today will be: Jayden Allen, and  
6 that will be Brittny Benjamin-Kelly, Alexis Escoto,  
7 Jeremiah Gill, Jabari Jefferson, Keyaira Johnson, Perriel  
8 Pace, William Perkins, Ivani Phillips, Amulen Rozmus,  
9 Ilana Spencer. Sorry if I butchered your name. Alana  
10 Spencer and Angelica Williams. Those that are present,  
11 could you please come stand? Thank you so much for your  
12 service and your dedication, and congratulations on your  
13 certificates.

14 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Excellent.

15 MR. ROZMUS: Good evening everybody. Can you hear me?

16 AUDIENCE: Yes.

17 MR. ROSMUZ: Thank you. Vice Chair Smith. Thank you  
18 for those awards. I want to give some brief remarks on  
19 behalf of the panel. But first of all, good evening to  
20 everybody here evening, commissioners. Our Nobel  
21 officials are here with us and community members. My name  
22 is Amulen Rozmus. I'm a business student at Wayne State  
23 University, and I've had the privilege of serving as the  
24 co-lead for the advisory panel for the 2023 and 2024th  
25 term. It's an immense privilege to join you again. The

1 last time I was here, I addressed the board and joined in  
2 celebration for the Board of Police Commissioner's 50th  
3 anniversary, an historic milestone 50 years after its  
4 creation. YAP is an innovative example of how the board  
5 is adapting to meet its mandate in advance, both public  
6 safety and civilian oversight right here in the city.  
7 This past term, YAP has continued to support the board in  
8 meeting its mandate through monthly meetings and various  
9 community activities and engagements. Last June, YAP  
10 hosted a forum on youth safety to usher in a safe summer  
11 for all young people in Detroit and to foster dialogue on  
12 critical issues. The forum received overwhelmingly  
13 positive support and we plan to do it again this summer.  
14 Rover Yap furthered its reach by presenting at a  
15 community meeting held by council president pro temp  
16 James Tate, Commissioner Carter, Angelica Williams, and  
17 myself answered and received questions from members of  
18 the community in District 1, regarding public safety and  
19 the role of youth in advancing it.

20 YAP also participated in a town hall in partnership  
21 with Bridge Detroit, held at the Detroit Public Library  
22 main branch earlier in the fall. Looking ahead to 2025,  
23 YAP will welcome new members who the board recognized  
24 earlier and will also begin a new term. I'm also excited  
25 to share that on March 15th, YAP, in partnership with

1 Wayne State University's Law School will be hosting a  
2 first of its kind public safety symposium held at Wayne  
3 Law. The symposium will convene police chiefs from  
4 surrounding areas, including Interim Chief Todd Bettison,  
5 to discuss what public safety and strengthen the ties  
6 between youth and public safety leaders. We welcome all  
7 members of the board and the community to join us on  
8 March 15<sup>th</sup>, and to stay tuned with further updates  
9 regarding the symposium. As we begin our third term, the  
10 Youth Advisory Panel continues to support the board in  
11 advancing its mandate and bridging the gap to create more  
12 effective public policy safeties. To those aged 15  
13 through 24, I encourage you to apply each September to  
14 join the app to make a meaningful difference in your  
15 community and your city. On behalf of Youth Advisory  
16 Panel, I thank the board for its unwavering commitment  
17 and support to youth engagement and to the panel. I'm  
18 also grateful to Ms. Teresa Blossom who is in the back  
19 there. Her work makes our jobs possible. I'm very  
20 grateful to her. Through continued collaboration, I am  
21 convinced and I know we can and will advance both safety  
22 and prosperity in the city that we call home. And I thank  
23 you all for your role in making that possible. Thank you.

24 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Thank you so much. And once  
25 again, the board appreciates your commitment, your

1 dedication, and we're looking, as we told you before, to  
2 be a future board member. I can see you here. Thank you  
3 so much. Okay, we'll now move forward to oral  
4 communication. Ms. Jonya, who do we have present, please?

5 MS. UNDERWOOD: Madam Chair, we have 11 speakers. Our  
6 first speaker will be Ms. Bernice Smith. Our next speaker  
7 will be Ms. Williams, and after Ms. Williams, it'll be  
8 Ms. Fredia Butler.

9 MS. SMITH: Good evening to everyone.

10 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Good evening.

11 MS. SMITH: Happy and blessed New Year to everyone.

12 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Hope you'll speak in the  
13 mic, please. Speak in the mic.

14 MS. SMITH: I'm going to get to the mic. I had to see  
15 my boss back there; my former boss. I can't believe she's  
16 here. Bless your heart. Good to see you, Kathy. Anyway, I  
17 used to be an election supervisor. You know what? We  
18 should all be glad to see another year. I know I am.  
19 Being 92, God has been good to me. So, I will be  
20 campaigning for the mayoral election. The two candidates  
21 came to me and asked me to help them. So, I haven't  
22 decided yet. But anyway, I'm not going to tell you who it  
23 is. It's going to be a surprise.

24 We have been through this week, so much crime. I  
25 can't understand why. What is wrong? This is a good city.

1 We have the sports that's really putting us in the public  
2 and they're doing good. And then we have the crime that's  
3 coming along behind it. And that's so disgusting. I get  
4 tired of looking at it every morning at 11 o'clock, the  
5 news telling us about somebody that robbed someone or  
6 they're shooting someone. Can't we just behave and put  
7 the guns away? That's all I ask. And I pray each day that  
8 we will understand that God is watching us, whether we  
9 know it or not, he is watching us. And he's going to put  
10 a stop to it eventually. I don't know when. I may not be  
11 here, but it's going to stop eventually because we can't  
12 continue to go along having good on this side; and then  
13 the evil is overbearing to us. We must talk to our  
14 children, and check on them and find out what they're  
15 doing. I wrote something here a little bit. And I'm going  
16 to be through.

17 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Next time Ms. Smith, that's  
18 your time.

19 MS. SMITH: It is?

20 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: It is. I'm sorry. But I look  
21 forward to you next week to hear it. MS. SMITH: Every  
22 time a fool speaks, and advertise, he's showing his  
23 ignorance. So, I'm going to get off. Thanks so much for  
24 every, everything that you do for me.

25 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Thank you, ma'am.

1 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: God bless you. Bye.

2 MS SMITH: Thank you.

3 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: More than welcome, mother.

4 MS. WILLIAMS: Hi, everyone. Through the Chair. He's  
5 not here, Vice Chair.

6 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Thank you, ma'am. Happy New  
7 Year.

8 MS. WILLIAMS: You as well. The Twelfth Precinct is  
9 hosting this, and I've been going through a whole lot the  
10 last four years, but I'm going back to two years.

11 Detective Douglas at the Twelfth Precinct falsified  
12 reports. Her boss signed off on it. They went to 36th  
13 District Court Diaz, the prosecutor went to a judge. He  
14 was elected, Adam Subree in November. He wasn't even  
15 working for the 36th District Court yet. But the moral of  
16 the story is, if the person would've, done their job  
17 correctly, I would have never been in that situation. And  
18 when you have this type of authority and you know your  
19 position and you do your job correctly, it shouldn't have  
20 never been an issue. Abuse of authority, that's what I  
21 call it. And when she wrote up the report, the report  
22 stated that my 9-millimeter was in this report. My 9-  
23 millimeter is at the 12<sup>th</sup> Precinct. So Chief Warfield  
24 know clearly what I'm speaking about concerning that. And  
25 Linda Bernard, we had a sit- down conversation, closed

1 doors concerning this issue. The bottom line is there's a  
2 whole lot of good Detroit police officers then some who  
3 do not respect the oath or their job, and they take  
4 advantage of the position they have and the power. And  
5 that's just not acceptable when you plan with somebody's  
6 livelihood. There's nothing else to be said. Thank you  
7 and have a great day.

8 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Thank you all as well. Have  
9 a great day, ma'am.

10 Next speaker, please.

11 MS. BUTLER: Good evening.

12 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Good evening.

13 MS. BUTLER: Commissioners, this is the beginning of  
14 a new year and a new administration in Washington DC. So,  
15 we need to be ---

16 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Can you speak in the mic  
17 please? Thank you.

18 MS. BUTLER: So, we need to be prepared to anticipate  
19 and litigate more issues. I have stated before that our  
20 communities need more neighborhood police officers and  
21 city inspectors. We have been neglected too long and are  
22 NPOs in the Second Precinct are stretched too thin to  
23 respond to the needs of over 54,000 citizens. With all of  
24 the abatements given to millionaires and billionaires,  
25 the burden is on us to support their businesses, while we

1 receive fewer benefits from our tax dollars. They won't  
2 have to pay their full taxes in 20 years or more. Our tax  
3 dollars are supposed to provide services for our  
4 communities. The citizens are being told abatements  
5 create jobs, wake up giants and think. A study was made  
6 that we have overpaid \$600 million in taxes, and as of  
7 today, no one is addressing this issue. Are we supposed  
8 to forget and be satisfied with crumbs? We want  
9 beautiful, clean, and safe neighborhoods. I have made two  
10 suggestions that could help. One was denied, and yet I  
11 see my ideas being in other areas.

12 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Okay, thank you ma'am. That  
13 is your time.

14 MS. NUTLER: Oh, you have copies of it.

15 MS. UNDERWOOD: Our next three speakers will be Ms.  
16 Victoria Camille, Ms. Taura Brown. Ms. Yvonne Jones.

17 MS CAMILLE: Good evening board.

18 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Good evening.

19 MS. CAMILLE: Earlier, the Chair mentioned a document  
20 that you have in front of you, property prioritized over  
21 human life and policy. There are also copies here in the  
22 room for the public. I'll just highlight a few points for  
23 the sake of those who are online. DPD finally released  
24 footage of Sherman Lee Butler's murder at the hands of  
25 the Wayne County Police bailiff. The bailiff exceeded his

1 functions and DPDs officers disregarded their own  
2 policies. This put everyone in danger and resulted in  
3 Sherman's murder. DPD should have sent the bailiff into  
4 the other room, secured the scene, and monitored Sherman  
5 until the mental health co-response team arrived.

6       DPD special order 22-28, responding to mental health  
7 crisis says that in many cases, gaining the trust of an  
8 individual suffering from mental illness, and or crisis,  
9 takes time and includes disengagement, area containment  
10 and or surveillance. Waiting out a subject calling in  
11 specialized commands. DPD's, excuse me, DPD's Mental  
12 Health co- response team includes critical incident  
13 trained members, behavioral health specialists and  
14 homelessness advocates, resources and services, all of  
15 which would've been helpful if the bailiff and DPD  
16 officers had just waited for them to arrive. Instead, DPD  
17 allowed the bailiff to rush them into using the tasers  
18 while Sherman laid in his bed and had already allowed  
19 them to start collecting his belongings. And the bailiff  
20 positioned himself in the back of the room where he was  
21 cornered, where the only place that Sherman could run to  
22 running away from the tasers was toward the bailiff.

23       The bailiff should not have been in the room at all.  
24 And DPD officers allow him to be there. How will you hold  
25 the officers accountable for not following the policies

1 which resulted in Sherman's death?

2 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Thank you.

3 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Madam Chair, if I may. Ms.  
4 Shaw, excuse me. I just want to indicate --- I'm sure you  
5 were here when the Chair said that your memo and I read  
6 it and I'm very concerned, has been referred to the Chief  
7 of Police for a response. It has been referred to the law  
8 department for a response and to OCI; and we will get all  
9 of those documents prior to addressing your specific  
10 concerns. And thank you for raising them.

11 MS. CAMILLE: Thank you. Through the Chair. I hope  
12 that the board will independently look at it as well and  
13 not depend on DPDs analysis. All of you, as well as, all  
14 the public can see and can read. And you have copies of  
15 the policies in front of you.

16 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Thank you. Yes.

17 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Through the Chair. I want to let  
18 you know, Vicky, you did a wonderful job explaining that.  
19 Good job. That was solid.

20 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Thank you.

21 MS. BROWN: Good evening commissioners. I want to  
22 echo exactly what Victoria just brought up. I'm looking,  
23 and at the documents you all gave us, it says, the Board  
24 of Police Commissioners has supervisory control and  
25 oversight of the police department as set forth in this

1 chapter. Keep that in mind as you all allow the police to  
2 come in here and give you information. I don't want to  
3 blame Chief Bettison because he wasn't in charge, but I  
4 fully blamed Chief White. On August 19<sup>th</sup>, he sent out, or  
5 the City of Detroit Police Department, sent out a press  
6 release that said Detroit police officers were not  
7 responding to help with an eviction. Instead, the  
8 officers were there in response to the bailiff safety  
9 concerns. That's a lie. The video that we saw on TV was  
10 chopped and cut and screwed and put back together. The  
11 police were already there before that 10:53 AM call was  
12 made.

13 They're standing at the door with the bailiff  
14 asking, what weapon do you have? When he called dispatch,  
15 he said it was a spike, I believe he said it was. If you  
16 know he has a spike, why are you at the door asking, what  
17 weapon do you have? When we saw the video start, that was  
18 the first encounter that they made with them when the  
19 Detroit Police Department should not have been there.  
20 They accompanied that bailiff as they had been doing  
21 previously to assist him with an eviction. If you read  
22 the paperwork that was issued by Victoria Camille, you'll  
23 see that they are reading the eviction to him. They are  
24 there to assist with the eviction. Also, Chief White came  
25 to us repeatedly saying that this was not an officer

1 involved shooting. I FOIA the PPL Pharrell's daily  
2 report. Someone put a note in there from the police  
3 department that said the shooting will be handled like a  
4 "Officer involved shooting." One of the 4 officers that  
5 were there was a corporal. They were trained. They didn't  
6 secure the scene. According to Kym Worthy's press  
7 release, the bailiff and an officer decided to tase  
8 Sherman Butler. The bailiff's job is to move furniture.  
9 Sherman Butler said, and I quote, "Put my shit in a bag  
10 and get out of here." That is exactly what he should have  
11 been doing.

12 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Thank you.

13 MS. BROWN: Sherman Butler was cooperating when his  
14 eviction, when he was murdered. You all need to look into  
15 this and those officers need to be suspended.

16 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: That is your time.

17 MS. BROWN: Thank you.

18 MS. JONES: Yvonne Jones, and I'm a member of the  
19 Coalition for Police Transparency and Accountability. And  
20 I'm also here to support the further investigation of the  
21 murder of Sherman Lee Brown. It says the disregard of DPD  
22 says, I just want to read this. Sherman shouted, "you  
23 have already been paid already to kill me, so use it  
24 already. "This is how it's going to end it, here," to  
25 which DPD officer inappropriately replied, "This is how

1 we're going to end it. All right, let's do it then."

2 I want to go to the agenda, the second page where we  
3 talk about the duties of the Board of Police  
4 Commissioners. Number three; receive and resolved as  
5 provided in this charter. Any complaints concerning the  
6 operation of the police department? We spend the majority  
7 of these meetings giving high fives to the police  
8 department. And that's okay. We can do that. But I think  
9 for this body, we need to be concerned with what's  
10 happening to the citizens. We need to make sure that our  
11 police department is functioning in the way that it is  
12 structured to function and finding ways to make it  
13 better. Detroit spent over a third of its annual budget  
14 on policing. And we stand up here and we cry about  
15 things. Things don't get any better. And this body is the  
16 oversight for the citizens to make sure that things get  
17 better. So, I appeal to you to, not only this matter, but  
18 other matters that we take them seriously and that we  
19 work for the people of Detroit. VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH:  
20 Thank you.

21 MS. JONES: And I also want to bring up the  
22 ordinance.

23 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Thank you. Thanks for the  
24 time. Thank you.

25 MS. JONES: The ordinance on body worn camera for the

1 police department.

2 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Thank you.

3 MS. UNDERWOOD: Mr. Johnson. Mr. Don Johnson. Mr.  
4 Scotty Bowman, and Mr. Foster. And then Madam Chair,  
5 we'll go into Zoom.

6 MR. JOHNSON: Okay. Thank you, honorable board for  
7 this opportunity. I want to say that the one thing I love  
8 about the Twelfth Precinct, which I've been president of  
9 community relations for almost 40 years because nobody  
10 wants to take the job. When we get a new commander, a new  
11 Captain NPOs, Sergeant Bledsoe, Sergeant of the NPO just  
12 retired with 46 years. And we have many great NPOs, or we  
13 got a few of back in the back there. The good news is we  
14 work together. What we're trying to do as a community is  
15 step up our efforts to make things better. We had a  
16 program we were trying to put in place --- I heard all  
17 the information about people with mental issues and what  
18 have you. And a lot of them are veterans. In the city of  
19 Dearborn. They write down all those things so that once a  
20 911 call is made, they know that that person may have a  
21 mental issue or have a problem.

22 We also got a program we putting in called I call it  
23 welfare check, but it's a wellbeing check on our seniors,  
24 because we're finding a lot of our seniors living at home  
25 by themselves that have either passed out or they were

1 cooking and they were burning up the house and stuff like  
2 that. So, we're trying to work together on how we can  
3 corral some of this stuff. And what I've done with our  
4 community group is told them that they need to step up  
5 their efforts and do what we call a welfare check.  
6 Whether you know your neighbor or not. If you don't see  
7 your neighbor, go check on your neighbor because too many  
8 seniors are dying in their home. Thank you very much, and  
9 keep up the good word.

10 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Thank you, sir.

11 MR. BOWMAN: Hey, first of all, you know, I just want  
12 to say this right? First time, this is Scotty Bowman,  
13 founder of Detroit, Residents Advancing Civilian  
14 Oversight and accountability. See, the first time I've  
15 been to a face-to-face meeting in quite a while and I  
16 walked in, I saw 9 commissioners. That's the best  
17 attendance I've seen all year.

18 Just wanted to say that. But, hmm. I'm really ---  
19 tonight I would like to express my agreement support and  
20 just really echoing the words of the people from the  
21 Coalition for Police Transparency and accountability.  
22 Whether it be the issue of the tragic killing of Sherman  
23 Lee Butler or the unfortunate lack of transparency much  
24 of the time regarding video that has been in the custody  
25 of the Detroit Police Department that really should, at

1 the very least, it should be immediately accessible as, I  
2 mean, as physically possible procedurally for board  
3 members to even get the video. They are the oversight.  
4 So, whether or not something's under investigation or  
5 not, I mean, this is a very small group of people that  
6 can be entrusted, I hope. And, you know, you can have  
7 non-disclosure agreements or whatever. But yeah, the  
8 people at large, the public really should be able to view  
9 these recordings, you know, after an appropriate process.  
10 And I think working toward that and as a guide, the  
11 recommendations made by the coalition, I think would be a  
12 very good move forward to improve civilian oversight in  
13 the City of Detroit.

14 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Thank you. Sherman Lee  
15 Butler shooting, and I'm very sorry for his loss and my  
16 deepest condolences go to him and his family and all his  
17 supporters and loved ones, friends, and everyone who has  
18 been fighting and advocating for him. But his shooting  
19 was not a department-based shooting. The Detroit Police  
20 Department did not fatally injure or wound Sherman Lee  
21 Butler. And our Madam Prosecutor has made her findings in  
22 regards to the case.

23 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Point of order.

24 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Ma'am, I'm talking and you  
25 shouldn't be. It is not the board's findings. Madam

1 Prosecutor has made her determination in regards to this  
2 case. So, I'm asking anything you should take it up with,  
3 with that process. We don't have that power here at the  
4 board. We don't have that power. Thank you. We don't have  
5 that power. And you are out of order. You would you like  
6 to leave? I'm here, sir. Thank you, sir.

7 MR. FOSTER: Thank you. You as well. Good evening.  
8 Just wanted to take a little time out. I have my kids out  
9 there. I always speak about keeping our children first  
10 and I like to always practice exactly what I preach. And  
11 so today I wanted to take a little time out to really  
12 just say, and speak about the good work that's been going  
13 on in the Twelfth Precinct. And particularly, they've  
14 been doing a really good job bridging gaps, responding,  
15 being visible, and more importantly, directly saving  
16 lives. And what I mean by directly saving lives, I mean  
17 by having an ear to the community, being available, being  
18 in a position where they could prevent crime and prevent  
19 things from escalating. And I think that cannot be  
20 overstated. And that's what this community needs. If we  
21 going to drive crime down, you have to have senior  
22 command.

23 You have to have all your officers; you have to have  
24 a whole precinct that's dedicated and have an open ear to  
25 the community. You cannot know what's needed in the

1 community if you don't have the means available to listen  
2 to the community. And with that being said, I personally  
3 have spoken and have access and can attest to directly to  
4 saving lives, to deescalating to how we can manage mental  
5 illness by simply listening and, and acting on what we  
6 listen to. And so, we don't need all these magical pills,  
7 we don't need all these billions of dollars. We got  
8 budgets to do that. We need people to exercise in the  
9 spirit of what they are and who they are in their  
10 occupation. So, I'm very, very grateful. Ceasefire has  
11 been doing a very good job, always with their proactive  
12 approach to prevent crime.

13         And then more importantly, lastly, before I get off  
14 of here, with Officer Richardson, he was a veteran, a  
15 combat veteran, a ranger as well. And when I look at you  
16 guys' as bargaining agreement, I look at him being on a  
17 job one year, and dying off duty, you know, and I hear  
18 the officers talk about how they have to pay into their  
19 own retirement and social security. You guys have to redo  
20 this bargaining agreement. What type of social security  
21 do his two young girls have? What's available to them?  
22 And this is coming from a citizen, a community to have  
23 nothing to do with law enforcement. You all have to do  
24 right by your people at all times. Redo that bargaining  
25 agreement, make it equitable for them, and anybody that

1 live a high-risk life or work a high-risk life. VICE

2 CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Thank you, sir. That is your time.

3 MR. FOSTER: Respect it. Thank you.

4 MS. UNDERWOOD: Former Commissioner William Davis.

5 After former Commissioner William Davis, it would be

6 Joyce Jennings, and then we'll go into Zoom.

7 MR. DAVIS: Hello everyone.

8 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Hello. How are you doing?

9 MR. DAVIS: You know, I came because I wanted to say  
10 something about the fact that we have too many hit and  
11 runs in this city. We had too many people running red ---

12 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Microphone.

13 MR. DAVIS: We have too many hit and runs in this  
14 city. We have too many people running red lights. I think  
15 that this board should be advocating with the City  
16 Council for help to make sure the state law is changed so  
17 it's more enforcement. We should not have to see an  
18 officer killed or anyone killed because somebody is hit  
19 and run and they doing things that they shouldn't be  
20 doing. Also, during the time that I was on the board,  
21 there was a certain commissioner that had a one-person  
22 towing committee who was also the chair at that time. And  
23 I brought to his attention to the fact that if he didn't  
24 change that I was going to make sure the whole country  
25 knew.

1           And I helped make sure a lot of people did know. But  
2 you know, we need to make sure we more aggressively look  
3 at what's going on with towing in this city. You know,  
4 because people are being robbed. People are being robbed,  
5 and you all need to be saying something about that.  
6 Because it is horrible that somebody could pay \$800 and  
7 the car just got towed within the last day or two. That's  
8 crazy. So, I think this board, for this upcoming year,  
9 should be a little bit more aggressive and should be  
10 asking for more from itself and from City Council and my  
11 state representatives. Thank you.

12           VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Thank you, sir.

13           MS. JENNINGS: Good evening, honorable body, and to  
14 all the citizens that are gathered here today. Happy New  
15 Year to you all. I just want to thank you for the work  
16 that you do. I also want to thank you for the opportunity  
17 to have my youngest daughter inducted to the Youth  
18 Advisory Council for this year. There are many concerns  
19 that have been shared today in public comment and more  
20 will come via Zoom. And I pray daily that the City of  
21 Detroit would become the healing and wellness capital of  
22 the world. For far too long, the City of Detroit has had  
23 many issues that oftentimes become national news. I'm  
24 very happy to hear about the decline in many areas in  
25 which we are plagued by issues that have to be reported

1 to police. Personally, I have been impacted by sexual  
2 assault that still has not been investigated by the  
3 Detroit Police Department.

4 It resulted in my family being relocated from our  
5 home because we were told that my home was the scene of a  
6 crime. This is actually the area where we had relocated  
7 to, 48235. My daughter loves this area, but in last year,  
8 we returned back to our home, located on the Eastside of  
9 Detroit in District 3, City Council, District 3. And my  
10 daughter has stated that being back in our home, it's  
11 passionate her to want to get involved to address issues  
12 that are oftentimes overlooked. And this zip code area,  
13 the police do a phenomenal job. City services are  
14 excellent in this area, but we have seen the disparities  
15 between how different zip codes throughout the City of  
16 Detroit are responded to. And it's my prayer ---

17 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Thank you. That's your time.  
18 And once you so much congratulations to your daughter.

19 MS. JENNINGS: Thank you so much. We really  
20 appreciate you. Thank you.

21 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Thank you.

22 MS. UNDERWOOD: Our next speaker will be Mr. Smith.  
23 And after Mr. Smith, Mr. Crowley,

24 MR. SMITH: Good afternoon and Happy New Year. I just  
25 want to start off by saying, the Twelfth Precinct is

1 probably the most political precinct we have in the City  
2 of Detroit because of this close residence to the Palmer  
3 Woods neighborhood. I also want to say this board is  
4 super political with the appointees being chair and vice  
5 chair. Very disappointing to hear the comments about  
6 Sherman Lee Butler and his murder. At the hands of a  
7 scene where Detroit Police Department were present,  
8 witnessed a murder. I don't care what the prosecutor  
9 said, prosecutors can be wrong. Those are just opinions.  
10 The former prosecutor is now mayor, tried to cover up the  
11 Malice Green murder. So, are we going to call that  
12 correct? No. So, I also want to say to attack citizens  
13 because of advocacy for a person who was murdered in cold  
14 blood from officers who did not follow their oath, who  
15 did not take control of the scene. There's no way a  
16 bailiff would be able to protect for armed officers.

17 That makes no sense. Officers are top priority over  
18 the bailiff. They had to secure the scene; it was their  
19 responsibility. They were not to assist with that  
20 eviction, which is what they did. And just to see that  
21 defendant from a board member is kind of ridiculous, is  
22 really, really sad and disheartening to see that type of  
23 behavior covered up. And that's why we have to advocate.  
24 That's why we have to be very strong and steadfast  
25 against some of these officers and their behaviors. Every

1 officer who does not respect their oath, who does not do  
2 good by their badge, is a disgrace to all those officers  
3 who do well by their badge and who do respect their oath.  
4 And this is what we're here to talk about. So, if you  
5 don't want to hear things like that about officers and  
6 their mishaps and what they're doing correctly, you  
7 shouldn't be on this board whether you chair, vice chair,  
8 whatever. And I also want to say God don't like ugly.  
9 It's kind of funny to see the chair get his car towed.  
10 And people have been preaching about this, specifically  
11 myself and all of their malfeasance with towing.

12 MS. UNDERWOOD: Mr. Crowley?

13 MR. CROWLEY: Can you hear me clearly?

14 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Yes, we can hear you.

15 MR. CROWLEY: Can you hear me clearly?

16 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Yes, we can hear you. Go  
17 right ahead.

18 MR. CROWLEY: Charmaine McLeod did it. Charmaine  
19 McLeod. Now I've been for a couple weeks trying to get  
20 this information to the Homicide Unit for the Detroit  
21 Police Department and explained to them how it was. I was  
22 able to ascertain that ---

23 MS. UNDERWOOD: That is your last speaker.

24 MR. CROWLEY: I want to speak to another issue. And  
25 the next issue I want to speak to is absentee ballot

1 fraud. Election fraud. Voter fraud has been happening and  
2 occurring in Detroit elections since 2020 that I can  
3 prove and demonstrate. It seems that the Detroit  
4 Department of Election is putting in fraudulent absentee  
5 ballots for former Detroit citizens as well as current  
6 Detroit citizens. Now, Detroit city clerk Janice Winfrey  
7 is bold. Detroit, Department of Elections Director Gina  
8 Avery Walker is bold. There are numerous Detroit police  
9 commissioners who have fraudulent absentee ballots cast  
10 and votes cast Detroit City Council fraudulent absentee  
11 ballots and votes cast, school boards, Detroit school  
12 board fraudulent absentee ballots cast, and some judges  
13 here in the city of Detroit. Fraudulent absentee ballots  
14 cast in their favor, as well as the mayor. Fraudulent  
15 absentee ballots cast in the 2021 Detroit election. It  
16 can be proven and demonstrated beyond any shadow of any  
17 doubt.

18 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Thank you. Next we have our  
19 report from our Madam Secretary. You have your report  
20 ready?

21 MS. GARNIER: Excuse me. The report from the board  
22 secretary this week; the incoming communications that are  
23 listed. Special note regarding policies that are posted.  
24 Currently, the Board of Police Commissioner's Policy  
25 Committee is reviewing over a dozen policies within the

1 next 30 days. The board is welcoming feedback on these  
2 and the policies that are under review for the next 30  
3 days are posted on our website. Please share your  
4 comments or suggestions in person at board and committee  
5 meetings or by email that is listed on the website or on  
6 the handout that is at the reception table tonight. The  
7 announcements of upcoming meetings are as follows. The  
8 budget committee will be meeting on Tuesday, January 14th  
9 at 4:30 PM at DPS headquarters. Also, the next board  
10 meeting is scheduled for Thursday, January 16th, next  
11 week at Public Safety Headquarters, and there is a typo  
12 there. It should have been 3:00 PM next Thursday, January  
13 16th. Our next community meeting will be held Thursday,  
14 February 13th. It'll be held at Eleventh Precinct at say,  
15 Detroit Play Center, located at 19320 Van Dyke Avenue in  
16 Detroit. That will be the next community meeting. And  
17 those are the announcements and incoming communication,  
18 vice chair.

19 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Thank you. And what is the  
20 pleasure of the board? COMMISSIONER MOORE: Motion to  
21 adjourn.

22 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Second.

23 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Whoever --- asked Warfield.

24 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Chief Warfield.

25 CI WARFIELD: Through the Chair. Commissioners, you

1 have in your packet a couple of reports for me. One of  
2 the reports deal with the additional findings that our  
3 investigators have been chronically and keeping track of.  
4 And I will go over this report in greater detail next  
5 week. So, it will remain in your binder, but I want you  
6 to know this is in the report. We also shared it with  
7 Captain Carter, who is in our office. And we believe that  
8 it will serve as a great training tool for the members of  
9 the department. Again, we'll talk more about it next  
10 week. What I also wanted to apprise you of is at one of  
11 the prior meetings of the personnel and training  
12 committee, we had discussed implementing an  
13 apprenticeship program for OCI senior investigators and  
14 other members of our staff who may be interested in  
15 receiving leadership training as relates to supervising a  
16 team.

17 So, one of the things that we put together, and this  
18 is also in your mind, it is a memo that details the  
19 benefits of starting a supervising apprenticeship  
20 program. And so, we want to apprise you of that effort so  
21 that you are fully aware of what our thoughts are. We are  
22 not certainly adding any staff members, and we are not  
23 adding any cost to the budget as a result of this. But  
24 those people who are interested in leadership positions,  
25 it is a great training tool. So that when we have

1 vacancies in the future, we'll be able to pull from a  
2 good pool of candidates already developed in their  
3 office.

4 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Thank you. And what is now  
5 the pleasure of the board? COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Madam  
6 Chair, I just want to ---

7 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Yes, ma'am.

8 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Thank you. Madam Chair.  
9 With regard to the apprenticeship program, are there  
10 going to be or is there going to be a set of criteria  
11 that will be set up, or will any investigator be able to  
12 become a part of this training program?

13 CI WARFIELD: Yes. Through the Chair and Commissioner  
14 Dewaelsche. Those who are wishing to be a part of this  
15 program will be able to access it. Absolutely. whether  
16 they are senior or just a regular investigator.

17 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Okay. Thank you.

18 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Ma'am.

19 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Thank you. Yeah.

20 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: If I could. So, the  
21 aforementioned program is preliminary. We haven't  
22 discussed the details, nor have we approved within  
23 personnel and training committee, nor is there a launch  
24 date. So, there's still some legwork that has to happen  
25 before we formally announce, adopt, implement, and so

1 forth.

2 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Okay. Thank you.

3 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Through the Chair?

4 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Yes, sir.

5 COMMISSIONER BANKS: A motion was passed about three  
6 months ago from the board here when DPD was subpoenaed on  
7 the Kaneisha Coleman case, and the chairman mentioned  
8 that he put that in your hands.

9 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Yes.

10 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Can I get an update on that,  
11 please, through the Chair?

12 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Through the Chair.

13 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Yes, sir. The update is, the  
14 report was made for MSP and we're waiting for a response.

15 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Okay. Thank you.

16 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Thank you.

17 COMMISSIONER BANKS: You're welcome.

18 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: What is the pleasure of the  
19 board?

20 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Motion to adjourn.

21 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Second.

22 VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Meeting is now adjourned.  
23 Thank you.
