- 3 DC BLISS: So, we don't have a DPD connect
- application, but they can call the precinct, they can 4
- call the Second Precinct. 5
- COMMISSIONER BURTON: No, it used to be an app. I 6
- don't know if you still use it or not. But DPD used to
- have an app, DPD Connect, where you could go there. You 8
- had all the NPOs information there, all the precincts
- information, and you even talked about crime training for 10
- 11 the various precincts.
- 12 Okay. So, I would reach out to the precinct, that's
- 13 596-5200.
- COMMISSIONER BURTON: I remember that was one of the 14
- 15 apps. I think that was the app during the time Chief
- 16 James Craig when he was here, but I don't know if the
- department is still using that or not, but it was very 17
- user friendly and a lot of Detroit residents were logging 18
- 19 onto that app.
- 20 DC BLISS: Well, the other, through the Chair. The
- 21 other thing is we can, you can go to DPD Facebook; you
- can also go to the City of Detroit website and go to 22
- 23 Detroit Police Department and all that information is on
- 24 there also.
- CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Commissioner Moore. 25



- 1 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Just very briefly, Mr. Chairman,
- 2 I can't speak for any other District or any other
- 3 precinct, but in the Second, Sixth and Tenth Precincts in
- 4 District 7, our captains and commanders have been very
- 5 engaging over the years with the citizens, to a point
- 6 where I don't have to attend the meeting because they're
- 7 engaged. But when I hear this, that makes me think I
- 8 should be over the Second Precinct a little bit more
- 9 doing something, and when I go over there, it's not going
- 10 to be really nice because Ms. Parnell and Madam President
- 11 run it over there. So it's like, you know, why do I have
- 12 to go over there and bigfoot the situation when we have
- 13 competent leaders that can handle it.
- 14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir.
- DC BLISS: Through the Chair, if I could just add,
- 16 Commissioner Moore, if you could send me her contact
- 17 information.
- 18 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Right now.
- 19 DC BLISS: Because I'd like to reach out to her.
- 20 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: All right. Next. Yes, sir.
- MR. BROWN: Mr. Chair, we have three speakers. Ms.
- 22 Taura Brown, followed by formal Commissioner William
- 23 Davis, followed by Mr. Bowman.
- 24 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Alright.
- MR. BROWN: Mr. Davis.



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- 1 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Or Ms. Brown.
- 2 MR. BROWN: Ms. Brown.
- 3 MS. BROWN: Good afternoon, commissioners. Can you
- 4 all hear me?
- 5 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, ma'am, you can be heard.
- 6 MS. BROWN: I apologize. I'm dealing with the flu
- 7 right now. I wanted to call in to ask respectfully that
- 8 you all take another look at the Sherman Butler case. I
- 9 know there's nothing that you all can do about it as far
- 10 as prosecuting it. I'm clear on that. What I do think
- 11 needs to be done is there needs to be some oversight of
- 12 the police department and how this case was handled. I
- 13 got a police report yesterday. It was 26 pages long.
- 14 Everybody's statement was different. I didn't see any
- 15 civilian statements, even though from the video, you can
- 16 clearly see them standing in the doorway. Sherman
- 17 Butler's case was overkill. In my opinion, it was
- 18 mishandled and the fact that the public has repeatedly
- 19 been lied to, it looks like a coverup. Then when you FOIA
- 20 information for it, to speak to what the previous
- 21 speakers were saying, when you send DPD, a FOIA, I just
- 22 got one back today when I requested Officer Goff, who was
- 23 present on the scene, his body cam video, I was sent a
- 24 bill for \$219. But remember they told us they've released
- 25 the video. So why is his video \$219 when the public



- 1 didn't have to pay for the other one? The other thing is,
- 2 when I requested some of the information from his file,
- 3 from the investigation, I got sent a bill for over
- 4 \$5,000. Again, what is it that's trying to be hidden? I
- 5 had case files before, several pieces of information,
- 6 police reports and all sorts of things. I get a FOIA back
- 7 every single day. So I don't understand what makes the
- 8 Sherman Butler case any different other than what we've
- 9 seen. And what we've seen has not been good because as
- 10 I've said before, damn near every statement on this case
- 11 is inconsistent with the video, and it's inconsistent
- 12 with what we were initially told by Kym Worthy and James
- 13 White. Please look into this, protocol was not followed
- 14 and something needs to be done.
- 15 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you so much. We referred
- 16 this to the department to take a look at Deputy Chief
- 17 Bliss, and we had the attorney looking into it, and they
- 18 also referred to OCI, in terms of that it was received as
- 19 a citizen complaint. And so, we wanted to make sure that
- 20 the department is working with the OCI, making sure all
- 21 of the stuff that needs to be reviewed; that there's full
- 22 cooperation with that. And we will be open and
- 23 transparent with those findings far from OCI. But we are
- 24 also looking for the department to respond to the
- 25 document that was given last week. Commissioner Bernard.



- 1 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Just quickly. We, as
- 2 commissioners, referred it to OCI, and the response from
- 3 OCI was that they needed the original unedited videos.
- 4 The video that you posted and that you indicated was the
- 5 video was actually a combination of two videos, but it's
- 6 our understanding that there were four videos. OCI needs
- 7 all videos, all original unedited videos, and OCI, along
- 8 with the attorney, is going to report back to us and we
- 9 will report to the community about any policy violations
- 10 depicted in those videos. Based on what I just saw on the
- 11 ones that you already did, there's several policy
- 12 violations. I mean, tremendous ones, but that's separate.
- 13 He's insisted on the unedited videos. He's handling it
- 14 personally. He's here?
- 15 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: No, no, he's not here yet.
- 16 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I'm looking that way. So, that
- 17 is very important and this is for us; priority one.
- 18 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Alright. All right. Next call.
- 19 Yep.
- MR. BROWN: Commissioner William Davis.
- 21 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: You may be heard, sir.
- MR. DAVIS: Good afternoon. Can you hear me?
- 23 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir.
- MR. DAVIS: Okay. I'd like to start off by saying
- 25 that I do live in the Second Precinct also, and during



- 1 the time that I was a police commissioner for District 7,
- 2 the Second Precinct, along with the Tenth, and the Sixth
- 3 had more stable leadership. I think it's a problem when
- 4 you rotate the captains and commanders a lot, in and in
- 5 and out, you know. Don't get me wrong, there may be a
- 6 need sometimes to do that, but that makes it more
- 7 difficult for the police community relationship
- 8 counselors to understand, and interact, which helps
- 9 everyone also, especially the Second Precinct in the last
- 10 couple years. I don't go to every meeting, but it seems
- 11 like every time I do go to a meeting, there's a different
- 12 commander or a captain. The Board of Police Commissions,
- 13 every time a captain or a commander is assigned to the
- 14 precincts to get moved, you actually get notification.
- Also, as it relates to something that the board
- 16 chairman brought up at the last community meeting, you
- 17 know, I think it's a problem anytime people's vehicles
- 18 being towed and they getting these huge bills I think
- 19 that you all should be looking into that, and we need to
- 20 get some resolution because people have been complaining
- 21 about towing in this city for years. I know during the
- 22 time that I was on the board, I knew another
- 23 commissioner, she had her car towed, and, you know, it
- 24 was a lot of money. We need to know what's going on, why
- 25 is it taking so much, and there should be a cap on how



- 1 much they could turn somebody, especially if they just
- 2 had it for a day or two. Thank you.
- 3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you very much,
- 4 commissioner.
- 5 MR. BROWN: Mr. Chair, your next speaker will be Mr.
- 6 Bowman, followed by Ms. Marguerite Maddox.
- 7 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, you may be heard, sir.
- 8 MR. BOWMAN: Hello? yeah. This is Scotty Bowman. I am
- 9 speaking on behalf of Detroit Residents Advancing
- 10 Civilian Oversight, (DRACO), as well as expressing my
- 11 support for a lot of the opinions and the papers put
- 12 forward by the coalition for Police Transparency and
- 13 Accountability. So first of all, regarding criminal
- 14 complaints, non-criminal complaints, there seems to be
- 15 this misperception that if a crime is involved or a
- 16 potential behavior that could be a crime is involved,
- 17 that somehow this absolves the Board of Police
- 18 Commissioners from holding anybody accountable. And that
- 19 is simply not true. And I heard this come up way back
- 20 when there were repeated calls for investigating the
- 21 coverup of the murder of Kaneisha Coleman, and now lately
- 22 because of, I'm sorry, Kym Worthy desire to not prosecute
- 23 Sherman, I mean, prosecute the bailiff and the murder of
- 24 Sherman Butler.
- 25 But in both cases, whether or not there was a crime



- 1 committed, it does not change the fact that there could
- 2 be a non-criminal complaint involved in that. Violation
- 3 of policy isn't necessarily a crime. However, if you
- 4 commit a crime, it is a violation of policy, and a person
- 5 could still be found guilty for violating the policy, if
- 6 one is clearly identified. In this case, there should be
- 7 an investigation of the officers' present at the scene of
- 8 this murder, even though the shooter was the bailiff, and
- 9 not them. Generally, people present are considered
- 10 accomplices, but again, that would be a criminality. Did
- 11 they violate policy? Did they follow the proper
- 12 procedures at the scene? And if they did, then they
- 13 should be held accountable accordingly. That is the job
- 14 of the Board of Police Commissioners and the chief
- 15 investigator. Thank you.
- 16 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Let it be clear; we have received
- 17 the complaint and we have considered it to be a citizen
- 18 complaint. And it is in the office of the chief
- 19 investigator, and it will be investigated thoroughly. And
- 20 there will be a response to it accordingly, just like any
- 21 other civil complaint, the thousands that we receive
- 22 every year, and we have competent staff to be able to
- 23 look at it. An attorney will work with the chief
- 24 investigator on this particular issue. So there's nothing
- 25 else that we can do, but do our fiduciary responsibility,



- 1 and that's what we are going to do. And we are not
- 2 shirking our responsibility in no shape, form, or
- 3 fashion. And wrong is wrong, right is right, you know
- 4 plain and simple. Next call.
- 5 MR. BROWN: Ms. Maddox.
- 6 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: You may be hurt, ma'am. Are you
- 7 there, Ms. Maddox?
- 8 MS. MADDOX: Yes, yes, I am. Happy New Year to
- 9 everyone. Number one. We do not have the [unclear11:55].
- 10 I think you could find a better way to [unclear12:55]. I
- 11 am getting feedback inside it is [unclear13:11], so I do
- 12 not, I hear what is being said, but I could not
- 13 understand because of the feedback. And another issue I
- 14 had is that we cannot get police officers of the court to
- 15 begin our text by telling them to try to live in the city
- 16 of Detroit.
- 17 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you very kindly. I
- 18 entertain a motion for approval for the January 16th,
- 19 2025 agenda.
- 20 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: So, moved.
- 21 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Support.
- 22 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Motion made by ---

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- 1 COMMISSIONERS: All.
- CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Anyone opposed? The motion is 2.
- carried. II entertain a motion for the approval of the 3
- minutes of January 9th, 2025. 4
- 5 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: So, moved.
- 6 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Support.
- CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Moved by Commissioner Pressley, 7
- supported by Commissioner Moorey. Any discussion? 8
- COMMISSIONER BURTON: Discussion? Yes, sir. 9
- COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair. I would like 10
- to ask madam secretary, was I excused last week? I did 11
- 12 not see that in the minutes, the online minutes.
- 13 MS. GARNIER: I apologize for the oversight. And you
- 14 were excused. You did send communication, sir.
- 15 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Thank you.
- 16 DR. JACKSON: Mr. Chairman. That's a question that
- was in the minutes; it should be noted that if there's no 17
- objection, that correction can be made. 18
- 19 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: If there's no objection,
- correction can be made. But another one here. 20
- 21 COMMISSIONER MOORE: I just see that it says excused
- right here in the notes. Are these the minutes right 22
- here, or is it some kind of ---23
- 2.4 DR. JACKSON: That is not a correction?
- 25 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes. So, right ---



- 1 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I'm referencing the online
- 2 minutes. The online transcript, not the piece of paper.
- 3 This is not the minutes.
- 4 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Same thing.
- 5 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah, it's the same thing. What
- 6 are you saying in the image?
- 7 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I'm referencing it in the
- 8 online minutes.
- 9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: That verbally, is with verbal.
- 10 Okay.
- 11 COMMISSIONER BURTON: The transcript that comes in
- 12 our email. I was not excused on that. And so, I like the
- 13 record to reflect that I was excused last week.
- 14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: If there is no objection. There
- 15 being no objection, all in favor say, aye.
- 16 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
- 17 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: To the correction, right?
- 18 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: I'm not sure there is a
- 19 correction. We are approving the minutes, and according
- 20 to the minutes, his excused absence is already here.
- 21 We're not approving a transcript.
- DR. JACKSON: The transcript is not something that
- 23 the board approves.
- 24 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. All right.
- 25 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair, and the



- 1 parliamentarian, the transcript is the minutes from the
- 2 meeting from the 9th that I had excused absence for. This
- 3 piece of paper says, excuse here, but it doesn't say that
- 4 on the transcript that went on in a meeting. So
- 5 therefore, someone wouldn't know whether I was excused or
- 6 not excused.
- 7 DR. JACKSON: Mr. Commissioner, and to the Chair.
- 8 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes.
- 9 DR. JACKSON: It is not that the correction cannot be
- 10 made on the transcript, it's that it's not the board that
- 11 has to make that approval. So, as the Chair, you can ask
- 12 staff to make that correction to the transcript. That's
- 13 different from approving the minutes.
- 14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. All right.
- DR. JACKSON: Is that difference clear?
- 16 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, absolutely. That will be
- 17 corrected, commissioner. So, all in favor say, aye.
- 18 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
- 19 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Anyone oppose? The motion is
- 20 carried. Introduction of the BOPC staff and so on and so
- 21 forth.
- MS. GRANIER: Present today, Board of Police
- 23 Commissioner staff, Attorney Dante Goss, Drew Fries,
- 24 Felicia Tyson, Teresa Blossom, Robert Brown, Mary Barber,
- 25 Candace Hayes, Artemisa Joshua, Jasmine Taylor, Chief



- 1 Investigator's Office are: Tiffany Stewart and LiSonya
- 2 Sloan, DPD HR Director, Katrina Patillo. For the Chief of
- 3 Police Office, Deputy Chief Mark Bliss. Our interpreters
- 4 today are Ms. Yakata and Dr. Stephanie Beatty. Court
- 5 reporter is Don Handyside. Charles Henry for media
- 6 services video. Elected officials. Noted are Marie
- 7 Overall of State Representative Tyrone Carter's Office.
- 8 Fredia Butler, Second Precinct, Community Relations
- 9 President, LaDon Davis, Office of Council member Fred
- 10 Durhal. And former Detroit Police Commissioner William
- 11 Davis. Those are records of the names that have been
- 12 submitted.
- 13 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you very kindly.
- DR. JACKSON: Mr. Chairman, the board parliamentarian
- 15 is also present. I really am here.
- 16 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Absolutely.
- 17 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: She's just back from the
- 18 Islands.
- 19 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: It is on.
- DR. JACKSON: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.
- 21 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes. Let's go to the Chief of
- 22 Police Report.
- DR. JACKSON: You do not have a report, Mr. Chairman.
- 24 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: No.
- DR. JACKSON: Just please state that.



- 1 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: There is no report for the Chair.
- DR. JACKSON: Thank you, sir.
- 3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you, ma'am.
- 4 DC BLISS: Good afternoon. Deputy Chief Mark Bliss,
- 5 on behalf of Chief Bettison. I'll start with the update
- 6 on injured officers. We currently have no department
- 7 members who are disabled due to on-duty injuries. Moving
- 8 on to crime data as of the 15th of January, homicides, we
- 9 are now 38%; non-fatal shootings, we are up 8%;
- 10 robberies, we are down 13%. Total part one, violent
- 11 crime, we're down 6% and carjackings are currently at 0%.
- 12 Moving on to mental health related calls for service. In
- 13 the last seven days, we had 339 calls for service, and we
- 14 serviced 305. In 2024, at this point, we had 571. We
- 15 currently have 701. Service calls in 2024, we had 504,
- 16 and currently we have 618. Moving on to overdose related
- 17 calls. In the last 7 days, we had 95 calls for service
- 18 and we serviced 77. For calls for service. In 2024, we
- 19 had 227, and currently we're at 208. For service calls,
- 20 we have 163, and currently we're at 159. Moving on to
- 21 significant incidents. First incident was a double non-
- 22 fatal shooting. On Wednesday, January 8th at 8:26 PM,
- 23 officers were dispatched to the 8,400 block of Patton to
- 24 investigate a double shooting. Officers were en route to
- 25 the 8,400 block of Patton, when DPD dispatch notified



- 1 them that victims were at the Detroit Firehouse, located
- 2 at 18140 Joy Road. Officers arrived at the firehouse and
- 3 observed two victims being treated by medical personnel.
- 4 The victims were transported to a local hospital and
- 5 treated for gunshot wounds. Both victims were listed in
- 6 temporary serious condition. The victim stated that
- 7 unknown males shot them as they drove down the 8,400
- 8 block of Patton. Officers arrived at the incident
- 9 location and observed evidence that a shooting occurred
- 10 there. Officers from the Sixth Precinct preserved the
- 11 scene and detectives from the Sixth Precinct Detective
- 12 Unit were notified.
- 13 The detectives determined that several young men
- 14 wearing all black fired at the victims as they drove down
- 15 Patton. Officers observed additional vehicles in homes
- 16 that were also struck by gunfire during the incident.
- 17 Detectives have no suspect identified at this time. The
- 18 incident is still under investigation. Detectives are
- 19 asking anyone with information regarding this incident to
- 20 contact Crime Stoppers at 1-800- SPEAKUP or
- 21 detroitrewards.tv. The second incident is shots fired. On
- 22 Saturday, January 11 , at 7:32 PM, officers were
- 23 dispatched to the 9,800 block of Chalmers to investigate
- 24 shots fired. Officers arrived at the location to assist
- 25 on-duty police officers who heard shots fired in the



- 1 area. No officers were injured as a result of the shots
- 2 fired. Officers stated they were conveying a citizen
- 3 home, traveling south on Chalmers, when a gold SUV
- 4 traveling north on Chalmers fired approximately 5 shots
- 5 as they drove by.
- 6 Officers notified DPD dispatch of the incident via
- 7 DPD radio and then dropped the citizens off at home.
- 8 Officers then returned to the location where the shots
- 9 were fired to conduct a follow-up investigation. Officers
- 10 from the Ninth Precinct preserved the scene and notified
- 11 detectives from the Ninth Precinct. Detective Unit.
- 12 Detectives determined that the passenger of a gold SUV
- 13 fired shots. Detectives were able to identify the
- 14 suspects who fired shots. And on January 14th, Detroit
- 15 Police arrested the suspects without incident. Detectives
- 16 are preparing a warrant to be submitted to the Wayne
- 17 County Prosecutor's Office. Incident number three, non-
- 18 fatal shooting. On Monday, January 13th at 8:07 AM,
- 19 officers were dispatched to the 9,400 block of a Holmur
- 20 to investigate a shooting. Officers arrived on scene and
- 21 were approached by the suspect who stated that he just
- 22 shot the victim. Officers arrested the suspect at the
- 23 scene. Officers entered the location to assist the victim
- 24 and observed the victim suffering from a gunshot wound to
- 25 the head.



- 1 Medics arrived at the location and conveyed the
- 2 victim to a local hospital where the victim was listed in
- 3 temporary serious condition. Officers from the Tenth
- 4 Precinct preserved the scene and detectives from the
- 5 Tenth Precinct Detective Unit were notified. Detectives
- 6 determined that the victim and suspect argued before the
- 7 shooting because the suspect turned the WIFI off while
- 8 the victim was using it. On January 14th, detectives
- 9 submitted a warrant to the Wayne County Prosecutor's
- 10 Office. On January 15th, the Wayne County Prosecutor's
- 11 Office denied the warrant due to a self-defense claim by
- 12 the suspect. It was determined that the victim pointed a
- 13 handgun at the suspect before the suspect shot the
- 14 victim.
- 15 Incident number four, fatal shooting. On Tuesday,
- 16 January 14th at 12:07 AM, officers were dispatched on a
- 17 2200 block of West McNichols to investigate a fatal
- 18 shooting. Officers arrived at the scene and observed the
- 19 victim's suffering from a gunshot wound to the chest. The
- 20 victim was transported to a local hospital by medics
- 21 where he was pronounced deceased on arrival. Officers
- 22 from the Eighth Precinct preserved the scene and
- 23 detectives from the Homicide Section were notified.
- 24 Detectives determined that the suspect and the victim
- 25 were involved in an argument before the shooting, and the



- 1 suspect left the location on foot after the shooting.
- 2 Officers from the Eighth Precinct Special Operations Unit
- 3 and the Headquarters Surveillance Unit discovered the
- 4 suspect walking in the area of Burgess, and West
- 5 McNichols. The suspect was arrested and conveyed to the
- 6 Detroit Detention Center. Detectives from the Homicide
- 7 Section are preparing a warrant to be submitted to the
- 8 Wayne County Prosecutor's Office for review. Incident
- 9 number five. Officer involved shooting. On Wednesday,
- 10 January 15th at 8:05 PM, officers were on routine patrol
- 11 in the Dupre and Morang area when they observed the
- 12 driver of a silver sedan on the cell phone while driving.
- Officers then conducted a traffic stop on the
- 14 vehicle. Officers approached the vehicle and requested
- 15 the appropriate paperwork at which time the driver of the
- 16 vehicle refused to comply with the officers. Officers
- 17 then opened the vehicle door to further investigate, at
- 18 which point the driver drove away from the officers. As
- 19 the suspect drove away, one of the officers was trapped
- 20 in the vehicle and was being dragged. The trapped officer
- 21 fired one shot before dislodging from the vehicle. The
- 22 suspect drove away from the location east of Dupre toward
- 23 Morang. The shot does not appear to have taken effect.
- 24 The officer was transported to a local hospital, and
- 25 treated for minor injuries. The incident is still under



- 1 investigation. Detectives are asking anyone with
- 2 information regarding this incident to contact Crime
- 3 Stoppers at 1-800-SPEAKUP or detroitrewards.tv. On a
- 4 positive note. Coffee and cake. On Monday, January 15th,
- 5 the retirement celebration was held for Captain Derrick
- 6 Maye in the Skylar room of the Detroit Public Safety
- 7 Headquarters. Captain Maye served with the department for
- 8 27 years. First responders' night. Tonight, members of
- 9 the Detroit Police Department and DPD Law Enforcement
- 10 Explorers will be attending the Detroit Pistons game at
- 11 7:00 PM for first responders' night. During the game,
- 12 officers will be competing with members of the Detroit
- 13 Fire Department in a multi-event race on the court. That
- 14 concludes my report out.
- 15 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Any question? Yes, sir.
- 16 Commissioner Moore.
- 17 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you, Mr. Chair. So Chief,
- 18 I heard what you stated about the officer being dragged,
- 19 and I was going to ask the question anyway, but can we
- 20 see the video today? I just don't understand the officer
- 21 being dragged, but usually because the officer went
- 22 inside of a vehicle while the door was closed. Are you
- 23 saying this time that the door was open or is that not
- 24 your report? If it's not your report, then I'll just stay
- 25 in.



- 1 DC BLISS: Through the Chair. I haven't seen that
- 2 video yet. So, as soon as we're able to see it I'm sure
- 3 that they'll release it to the board, in order for them
- 4 to review. So, I don't want to speak prematurely about
- 5 what actually happened. So, I'd like to kind of withhold
- 6 my comment while I'm able to visually see it myself.
- 7 COMMISSIONER MOORE: And also, the commander has been
- 8 in touch with Ms. Parnell, so they're going to work on
- 9 some things as early as tomorrow. So, we shouldn't have
- 10 that issue festering. So thank you.
- 11 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you Commissioner.
- 12 Commissioner Bernard.
- 13 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Two things. In response to
- 14 what my colleague just said, I thought that --- I don't
- 15 know --- Detroit I know that several cities, communities,
- 16 large cities in the country have decided not to, if you
- 17 will, to stop people. For example, you sit on your cell
- 18 phone, this whole incident happened because of a minor --
- 19 if it's a misdemeanor, I don't even know. But a minor,
- 20 almost still will be retrieved as a civil infraction. So
- 21 my question is, what is our position on that? And then I
- 22 have the second question: in our materials today, you
- 23 have a memo regarding a three-day training program called
- 24 Back to Basics: Fundamentals Training Course for any
- 25 officers who voluntarily want to be retrained. May I



- 1 suggest that those people that you have involved in
- 2 disciplinary actions, be they, those that come before us,
- 3 or those that you handle internally be required to go
- 4 back through the three-day basic training.
- 5 They get paid for it. It doesn't hurt to be
- 6 retrained. We can all hear it more than once and if we
- 7 want to really internalize it, but to me it's the
- 8 proactive way. You'd mentioned, when I walked in, you
- 9 were talking about drug testing of officers. This, of
- 10 course, basic training covers that. So, it is a proactive
- 11 approach rather than a reactive approach. And it may
- 12 just, you know, ring a bell and somebody's head, maybe I
- 13 need to do this differently. But back to my first
- 14 question.
- 15 DC BLISS: Through the Chair. We do enforce motor
- 16 vehicle loss. So, we don't have any reduction in any type
- 17 of --- we're not like other departments to say, you know,
- 18 these are lesser ones. We enforce the motor vehicle laws
- 19 totally. So, if somebody violates that, we will in
- 20 certain cases investigate. There is no lesser charge. It
- 21 doesn't matter if it's a civil infraction.
- 22 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: That includes reaching in
- 23 somebody's car because they were on their cell phone.
- DC BLISS: Well, through the Chair, as I already
- 25 explained, I haven't seen the video, so I don't want to



- 1 speak prematurely on it because it wouldn't be fair to
- 2 the investigation; it wouldn't be fair to give you false
- 3 information.
- 4 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you. But do send them to
- 5 training, please, or consider that.
- 6 DC BLISS: Through the Chair, absolutely.
- 7 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I'll recommend it to the chief
- 8 as well.
- 9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Anything further?
- 10 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Through the Chair.
- 11 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir.
- 12 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Again, related to the officer
- 13 involved shooting. So, it's my understanding that the
- 14 individual who drove off has not been in custody or
- 15 retrieved?
- DC BLISS: Through the Chair. It's my understanding
- 17 that the person has not been in custody yet, but I know
- 18 that we were currently out looking for that individual.
- 19 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: And so, was the stop long
- 20 enough to retrieve license plates number and information,
- 21 or was it --- I'm sure obviously having not seen the
- 22 video, do we know the tenure, the time of the stop.
- DC BLISS: Through the Chair. Yes, we do. There are
- 24 some specifics that we do have and if helping us in our
- 25 investigation.



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- 1 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Thank you.
- 2 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Anything further? Yes,
- 3 Commissioner Burton.
- 4 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I have a few questions.
- 5 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes.
- 6 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Chief, pertaining to the
- 7 officers that were not MCOLES certified, are there
- 8 updates status on those officers? Are they going through
- 9 the MCOLES?
- 10 DC BLISS: Through the Chair. I do have the director
- 11 of police personnel. She has been handling that
- 12 personally. And she's been working vigorously on getting
- 13 that. We are down to, how many?
- 14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Her report is next.
- 15 DC BLISS: Okay. But yes, we are currently working
- 16 through it, you know, as I explained, there are two parts
- 17 to it. First is us getting the paperwork, and then the
- 18 second part is MCOLES reviewing it and approving. So, we
- 19 are vigorous in getting all the paperwork to MCOLES, but
- 20 we, in some cases, are waiting on MCOLES to come back to
- 21 us and say, okay, yes, this is approved, or can you
- 22 resubmit this or fix this? So, it is a back and forth,
- 23 but we're definitely getting basically to the end of it
- 24 now.
- 25 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Oh, okay. I hope that we can



- 1 hear later from the HR director as well on that; and
- 2 also, we as a body, would like to know more about that
- 3 because we get a lot of calls from our constituents all
- 4 the time. And since this story has broken, in addition to
- 5 my following question, when it came to New Year's Eve and
- 6 New Year's Day, how many shooting incidents were reported
- 7 and how many guns were confiscated, and how many arrests
- 8 for New Year's Eve and New Year's Day? Do we have a
- 9 report on that?
- 10 DC BLISS: Through the Chair, I can get that
- 11 information. Commissioner, what I can do is as soon as
- 12 we're done here, I can make sure to make the request. So,
- 13 I'll follow up with you to make sure I get exactly what
- 14 you want in order to get that report to you.
- 15 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Can you send that to my email?
- 16 DC BLISS: Through the Chair, I can send it to the
- 17 Board of Police Commissioners and it can get to whoever's
- 18 email that it needs to get to.
- 19 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Sure. And then also at the next
- 20 meeting, if you can provide that with the public, because
- 21 the public would like to know more about that as, since
- 22 the City has invested heavily in ShotSpotter technology.
- DC BLISS: Through the Chair, we will provide that
- 24 report out, once we get the information.
- 25 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: All right. You good, Commissioner



- 1 Burton?
- 2 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I'm all set for right now.
- 3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: And that revision has been made
- 4 in the transcripts too. I have just been alerted. Yep.
- 5 Director Patillo.
- 6 DIRECTOR PATILLO: Through the Chair. I'll be
- 7 presenting the human resources report for the month of
- 8 December. As stated, this is for the December report. So
- 9 the department was currently filled at 97%. We get to the
- 10 4 officers. We were filled at 99% with 1% vacancy. On
- 11 December 31st, we had 31 vacancies for sworn officers.
- 12 And on that Saturday, we hired an additional 15, which
- 13 brought us down to the twenties. So, great job all
- 14 around. For the civilians, we were at 92% fill, and 8%
- 15 vacancies, and police assistance 97% filled, with a 3%
- 16 vacancy. For sworn recruiting from the beginning of the
- 17 fiscal year with a total of 1,724 applicants.
- 18 Applications 5; 106 were in process; 1 withdrew, 568 were
- 19 archived, 79 were hired during the fiscal year. 177 were
- 20 temporarily disqualified, 152 were permanently
- 21 disqualified, and 241 was waiting on MCOLES. For the
- 22 MCOLES testing for the month, we had a total of 157
- 23 scheduled for the written test,
- 94 appeared. 62 passed the exam. 32 failed, 2
- 25 reschedule, 2 withdrew. And 61 no showed. For the



- 1 physical exam, 152 were scheduled, 80 appeared, 53
- 2 passed, 27 failed. 4 rescheduled, 68 no-shows. For
- 3 academy graduates, we did not have an academy class
- 4 graduates graduation for the month of December. For total
- 5 new hires, we had 27 sworn, 31 civilians. Total
- 6 population for the new hires was 58. For Detroit
- 7 residency, for Detroit, total sworn 605, 9 Detroiters,
- 8 2028 for total civilians for Detroit. 430 for 9
- 9 Detroiters, 3.5 and f4 police assistances. We had 15
- 10 Detroiters, 17, 9 Detroiters. So, in the new hires, we
- 11 had 14 Detroit residents, 6 civilians, and 6 Detroit
- 12 residents were sworn. We did not have any interns. Our
- 13 last interns were to carry over from the Mayoral

st

- 14 Fellowship Program. Her last day was December 31 . For
- 15 attrition, we had sworn 11 officers who separated from
- 16 the department, 9 civilians for a total of 20. For leave
- 17 of absence, for the FMLA continuous, we had 21 sworn, 6
- 18 civilians. For FMLA intermittently, we had 108 sworn, 55
- 19 civilians. For paid parental leave, we had 8 sworn, 1
- 20 civilian; medical leave, 2 sworn, 3 civilians. military,
- 21 1 sworn. Restricted, we had 137 sworn, 6 civilians,
- 22 disabled, 22 sworn, 5. civilians. 6 status was 29 sworn,
- 23 3 civilians. For personal suspensions, we had a total of
- 24 22, 21 officers, 1 sergeant. For the monthly separations.
- 25 As I stated, it was a code of 11. That breakout was 6



- 1 officers, 1 sergeant, 1 lieutenant, 1 detective, 1
- 2 captain, 1 corporal. And we have a total of 500 in the
- 3 drop the [unclear38:45] program.
- 4 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Let me stop you for a minute. Did
- 5 the ones that were separated, were separated because of
- 6 discipline. Give me one second.
- 7 DIRECTOR PATILLO: Also in the category, we had one
- 8 that passed away. There was one that resigned under
- 9 charges, yes.
- 10 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes. Was that forward to MCOLES.
- 11 DIRECTOR PATILLO: That should have been. Let me just
- 12 check the name really quickly. The one I'm thinking of
- 13 was forwarded, but on this dispense roster you have, is
- 14 pending arbitrations. But I will definitely confirm that
- 15 it was, and I'll get back with you today.
- 16 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: All right, thank you. You can
- 17 continue.
- DIRECTOR PATILLO: So, just to give you a few year-
- 19 end stats. One second. So we had a net gain of officers.
- 20 So, when we took a look at --- as you all know, that the
- 21 contract was signed for the sworn increase in their
- 22 salaries that was implemented November of 2022. So, these
- 23 stats that I'm going to give you are from 1st January
- 24 until present. From 1st January of 2023, to the present,
- 25 we had a net gain of 347 police officers. Of the calendar



- 1 year of 2024, we had a net gain of 143. So, within
- 2 January the first of 2023, we hired 643 police officers.
- 3 We separated at 296. And that is your net gain for the
- 4 sworn. With the civilians, we had a net gain of 117 since
- 5 January the first. And the difference in that is that in
- 6 2023, we only had a net gain of 59. For the academy, we
- 7 actually have 6 classes that are at the academy right now
- 8 for a total of approximately 182 students. We started a
- 9 class on January the 6th with 32 officers. We're going to
- 10 graduate a class on January the 24th with approximately
- 11 39 officers.
- 12 And before I get into the MCOLES, I just wanted to
- 13 note, we are working with the city representatives for
- 14 the upcoming internship program, which would be the
- 15 Mayoral Fellowship Program, and also the Grow Detroit
- 16 Young Talent. The details have not been pushed out on
- 17 that. However, the Grow Detroit Young talent
- 18 applications, as I'm told, will be open starting around
- 19 February the 6th. And that is the youth that the city
- 20 department is trying to hire between the ages of 14 and
- 21 24. So, before I get into the MCOLES information, I just
- 22 want to, as we ended up with the year-end numbers, I do
- 23 this, because I didn't do this by myself and I'm a team
- 24 player, so I just wanted to thank the recruiting team and
- 25 the HR team for their hard work.



- 1 A lot of the individuals work more than 5 days a
- 2 week, more than 8 hours to do what they can do. I want to
- 3 thank the leadership for supporting us and all the
- 4 initiatives and also all three unions. Actually, they
- 5 supported us in every single initiative that we put
- 6 forward. The City Council; I've also spoken with them and
- 7 they graciously wanted us to come out to their Districts
- 8 to have recruiting events. That also along with the
- 9 mayor, he supported those initiatives as well. Our
- 10 leadership has already said here. And then for the BOPC,
- 11 you all actually supported our initiative. You passed out
- 12 our flyers, you showed up at the best of our events. So,
- 13 we could not have done those type of numbers without the
- 14 support of everyone. And so, we hope that you continue to
- 15 stand behind us and everything that we do because the
- 16 work is not over.
- 17 And so even though we might be in double digits
- 18 right now, that can all change. And so we still have to
- 19 put our efforts behind the recruiting efforts. So as far
- 20 as the MCOLES, when we originally started, it was 32
- 21 officers; 3 officers resigned, which brought the numbers
- 22 down to 29. 19 officers are on the streets right now. We
- 23 have 5 officers that are under review. And that means
- 24 their paperwork is up at MCOLES being reviewed. Hopefully
- 25 by today or tomorrow, I'll get an update as to whether



- 1 they will go to the final reviews. There are several
- 2 reviews that happen at M codes. It's not just one review.
- 3 They can come back for just something small. It could be
- 4 initials not at the top of the page or something like
- 5 that. So, we do have a process here that we are basically
- 6 streamlining, and looking at every single question, every
- 7 single form. So, 5 of those packages are under review.
- 8 Four packages, we are still pending some type of
- 9 paperwork. And then we have one officer that is currently
- 10 overtaking the RPTE course. And so when he is done, we
- 11 will complete his package or complete the process that we
- 12 need to do to get him back out. And so that is where we
- 13 are. So, we are working diligently to get all the
- 14 officers back on the streets. Pending any question, this
- 15 concludes my presentation.
- 16 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Commissioner Burton, then
- 17 Commissioner Bernard. Commissioner Moore
- 18 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair.
- 19 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir.
- 20 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Ouestion for our HR director.
- 21 There were a number of officers that were brought on that
- 22 were not MCOLES certified no longer. How a mistake like
- 23 that was made; how were they selected; how did they come
- 24 on board, and how long were they on the streets working
- 25 as DPD officers, but were not MCOLES certified? How was



- 1 that mistake made?
- 2 DIRECTOR PATILLO: DC BLISS, do you want to take
- 3 that?
- 4 DC BLISS: Through the Chair. So, we did a deep dive
- 5 and there were a certain number of failures on our side.
- 6 We were fortunate that one of our sergeants did an audit
- 7 and came back and was able to identify where there was a
- 8 deficiency. And that led us to audit our entire roster.
- 9 So, that's how we uncovered some of these issues. And it
- 10 just comes down to a couple things that the
- 11 investigations almost did, but it just comes down to ---
- 12 first it was an individual's responsibility to put it in
- 13 the system. He did not put it in the system. And then
- 14 another responsibility is to report out to MCOLES yearly
- 15 to verify our rosters. And what we found in that case is
- 16 that it was not happening. That was not happening at all.
- 17 So that check and balance that would've allowed us to
- 18 catch this didn't happen. Because, as you know, some of
- 19 these came back; they came on several years ago and some
- 20 of our rosters that were submitted, they were not
- 21 accurate. So, we are actually problem solving that right
- 22 now. We're putting in a new process to ensure that that
- 23 never happens again. We have quarterly audits and we are
- 24 just working through it to make sure that we were
- 25 fortunate to identify this and now that it'll never



- 1 happen again.
- 2 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Thank you.
- 3 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I'd just like a comment about
- 4 this. The problem that I have with your response, Chief,
- 5 and yours, as well, Ms. Patillo, is that there's been no
- 6 accountability whatsoever for what is a major, major
- 7 issue. If I'm flying on Delta Airlines, and I have 19
- 8 pilots or however many you had that aren't licensed as
- 9 pilots, and I discovered that later, I am very disturbed
- 10 about that, the potential consequences and liability for
- 11 the city as a result of a huge oversight. That's not even
- 12 fathomable in any business for any Personnel Department,
- 13 whether it's Ford Motor Company or a trucking company.
- 14 The first rule is not all this minutia at the back. It
- 15 is, do you have the license to drive a truck? Do you have
- 16 a pilot's license? Do I have a driver's license? That's
- 17 the first question an officer will ask me. Show me your
- 18 license. Show me that you have the right to drive the
- 19 truck. They must have officers on the street interacting
- 20 with people. And I'm going to ask him for a report on
- 21 that too. All of the officers that were not licensed were
- 22 on the street. I want to know what they were doing; if
- 23 they arrested anybody, if they were involved in any
- 24 grievances, if they were, I mean in any complaints or
- 25 anything else, I want to know what they did and if



- 1 there's any litigation involving any of them. Because I
- 2 can tell you as a lawyer, if you had seen me stab a
- 3 person to death, if you didn't have a license and you
- 4 arrested me, that would be the first thing I'd say to a
- 5 jury. This guy is just a person, he has no right to
- 6 arrest me; no right to hold me, no right to ticket me.
- 7 His or her observations are irrelevant because they're
- 8 unlicensed and may have any official evaluations. And I'm
- 9 also disturbed that you met with 3 members of the board,
- 10 and had a very intense, I understand meeting with them.
- 11 Fine, but that is not the full board. And for the board
- 12 not to be able to address you, question you about this
- 13 and address this issue is failing on our part, quite
- 14 frankly, because there's no corporation in America that
- 15 you could walk into a boardroom and say that people who
- 16 are, like I said, pilots who are supposed to be licensed,
- 17 were not licensed, and the HR director not appear for the
- 18 whole board, and in a confidential or other situation and
- 19 address this. But there have been no consequences to you,
- 20 there have been no consequences to the department and no
- 21 accountability.
- This doesn't fall through the cracks. This is bigger
- 23 than that. And our potential liability could be --- you
- 24 think it's bad for those firefighters in California, just
- 25 imagine what it would be for us in a microscopic state



- 1 compared to Los Angeles, given the fact these officers
- 2 were involved in anything. This is major and I want to
- 3 report on it, formal report like I requested just now on
- 4 these people; what they've been doing for us, and they
- 5 certainly should be doing anything right now until such
- 6 time as they are MCOLES certified. We can't afford the
- 7 liability. We don't want the exposure. And I think the
- 8 board has to address this seriously [unclear49:43], think
- 9 about it. Go out and put it on the airplane and have the
- 10 pilot not licensed. Think about how you feel about that.
- 11 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Through the Chair.
- 12 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Go ahead, Commissioner Moore.
- 13 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you, Mr. Chair.
- 14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes.
- 15 COMMISSIONER MOORE: I just want to seque off of the
- 16 MCOLES situation and get into more of this being
- 17 marketed. The statistics that you provide to us are
- 18 excellent every month as it relates to attrition rates
- 19 and things of that nature. How would we go about getting
- 20 this online posted so the citizens can see this for
- 21 themselves?
- 22 DIRECTOR PATILLO: I do believe that upcoming should
- 23 be the annual report, and that information will be in the
- 24 annual report.
- 25 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Or what about online?



- 1 DIRECTOR PATILLO: I don't know how the BOPC is
- 2 [unclear50:35], but I know we are preparing data for DPD
- 3 as well.
- 4 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah. We can work with our board
- 5 secretary and team with Ms. Blossom to be able to upload
- 6 it on our website for public consumption. That'd be
- 7 great. And we also can put it on our Facebook page. Is
- 8 that satisfactory?
- 9 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Absolutely, because Commissioner
- 10 Hernandez has highlighted how well it was a while ago,
- 11 and the citizen just asked me about it, and I said, well,
- 12 let's ask.
- 13 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes. Okay. Commissioner Banks.
- 14 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Through the Chair. Thank you Mr.
- 15 Chair. I'm going to concur with Commissioner Bernard on
- 16 the officers, not being certified. That's a solid
- 17 statement right there. I just want to back you up on
- 18 that. That was very solid. Very solid. That's very
- 19 important.
- 20 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: And no policy. You just
- 21 continue business as usual. Like it's usual. It's not.
- 22 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Commissioner Bell.
- 23 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, Mr. Chair. I want to
- 24 clarify a statement made by the commissioner, MLC,
- 25 Section 6764.17.



- 1 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: If you could talk into the mic.
- 2 COMMISSIONER BELL: Okay.
- 3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you.
- 4 COMMISSIONER BELL: A private person may make an
- 5 arrest in the following situation for a felony committed
- 6 in the private person present. I just want to clarify
- 7 that.
- 8 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: It's not a private person,
- 9 this is a person acting under color of law in uniform,
- 10 the pilot.
- 11 COMMISSIONER BELL: I just want to clarify ---
- 12 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Well, let me make it clear that
- 13 this situation is under investigation. Is that correct?
- DC BLISS: Through the Chair, as I was saying, we
- 15 have a current investigation and in our findings, those
- 16 that are at fault will be held accountable.
- 17 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah. So, you know, we know that
- 18 it's been investigated and let the record reflect that
- 19 all commissioners were invited to a meeting to be
- 20 briefed, excuse me, to be briefed on by Director Patillo
- 21 to make sure that it wasn't a quorum in the room. It had
- 22 to be done in sections and things of that nature. And
- 23 some folks were not satisfied with that. However,
- 24 everyone had the opportunity to be brief on that
- 25 particular day. And whoever is at fault would be held



- 1 accountable. If there's someone to be held accountable,
- 2 they would be held accountable. And the OCI do have the
- 3 names to be able to report to you, Commissioner Bernard,
- 4 as it relates to see if there are any policy violations
- 5 or any citizen complaints were done against any of those
- 6 officers.
- 7 And then for us, from the criminal liabilities and
- 8 things of that nature, the Wayne County Prosecutor's
- 9 Office is doing a deep dive investigation, and they are
- 10 actively investigating the different scenarios on what's
- 11 legal in that particular regard. And so, we await the
- 12 findings of all of these investigations, and actively
- 13 want to know what happened in that situation. And so
- 14 that's the factual aspect of things. And no officer at
- 15 this particular time that is not certified, is not
- 16 working in the streets and things of that nature. And how
- 17 many returned thus far, director?
- 18 DIRECTOR PATILLO: 19
- 19 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: 19 of them have returned. What is
- 20 the timeline and when do you think that all of this would
- 21 be done?
- 22 DIRECTOR PATILLO: I hope that by the end of the
- 23 month that it is done; that all the officers are back on
- 24 the street.
- 25 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah, absolutely. And you have



- 1 taken a more active different nuance to this situation,
- 2 and we await the full investigation report. We again
- 3 grasp at straws, but absolutely understand and believe
- 4 that we have our eyes on this and we would not let up
- 5 until the community get all the answers that they
- 6 deserve, and this commission as well. So, thank you,
- 7 Director Patillo. There are no more questions. Oh, you
- 8 have a question?
- 9 COMMISSIONER CARTER: I have a question.
- 10 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Commissioner Carter.
- 11 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you, Mr. Chair. My
- 12 question is about the DROP program, and it's been a
- 13 while, so if you could refresh my recollection. The DROP
- 14 program, how long can an officer participate in it? And
- 15 are all officers who I think are retired, are they all
- 16 able to participate in it? And you gave me a number on
- 17 how many are participating in it.
- 18 DIRECTOR PATILLO: I believe that number was 500.
- 19 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Are currently in the DROP
- 20 program?
- 21 DIRECTOR PATILLO: Currently in the DROP program.
- 22 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Can you give a brief
- 23 description of what it is?
- 24 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you.
- 25 DIRECTOR PATILLO: So, I don't have a contract in



- 1 front of me. DC, do you recall? I believe it was 10
- 2 years, I believe a couple years ago there was an MOU that
- 3 was signed for LSA, for the VLSA where when they came up
- 4 on that computer they would have to submit a memo through
- 5 channels to the chief of police to extend.
- 6 COMMISSIONER CARTER: So, can we start with an
- 7 overview?
- 8 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Yeah. I can tell you what it
- 9 is.
- 10 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Okay. Because you just asked
- 11 and I just need the overview. I know what it is because I
- 12 participated in
- 13 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: The public ---
- 14 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Oh, I know what it is. I'd like
- 15 for the director to tell us what it is or the deputy
- 16 chief, as well as give us the information that I
- 17 requested
- DC BLISS: Through the Chair. So, and I'm going to be
- 19 very general, but basically the DROP program is a program
- 20 to basically keep members, give them the option to
- 21 retire, but they would drop at a certain rank, and they
- 22 could take some of their money. They could reinvest some
- 23 of that money. But it allows us to maintain certain
- 24 levels of knowledge within the department. So, what it
- 25 allows us to do is a member can drop, and they have



- 1 automatic 10 years they can stay in the program, okay.
- 2 And after that 10 years, then they have an option of 5
- 3 more. But every year you have to apply to the chief of
- 4 police to extend the DROP program. After you get your 5,
- 5 then you're done. So, it's a total of 15 years that you
- 6 can be in the DROP program.
- 7 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Yes, commissioner.
- 8 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: It's my understanding that the
- 9 DROP program was initiated as a result of the bankruptcy
- 10 for the City of Detroit. The person who --- the receiver
- 11 for the City of Detroit said, we had lots of police
- 12 officers who had been on a payroll for many, many years,
- 13 and the issue was how do you get people to retire? The
- 14 DROP program says that, I think, you tell me that a
- 15 certain point. I think you are literally, if you were
- 16 forced out of the department, and then you can apply for
- 17 another job after you, you know, your full retirement,
- 18 and all that kind of stuff. But then you can apply for
- 19 another job. We have several people in this room
- 20 generally who are part of the DROP program, who are
- 21 officials with the department, as you know. And then they
- 22 can be rehired with the department in a new role
- 23 starting, like a new pension program, a new everything.
- 24 Is that correct? I mean, I know one or two.
- DC BLISS: Through the Chair. No, usually a person



- 1 that ends the DROP program still maintains their rank and
- 2 their current status within the department. It is purely
- 3 for retirement purposes and money. It doesn't go into
- 4 your pension that you can take that money and it can be
- 5 reinvested. But you don't go and get another job. You're
- 6 still working with the Detroit Police Department. And it
- 7 just allows you to reinvest money. And I don't know ---
- 8 it is my understanding that the DROP program was started
- 9 prior to the bankruptcy.
- 10 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: No, it requires the approval
- 11 of the chief individually. You can't do it for like 10
- 12 people. It has to be individually. You can be in the DROP
- 13 program. I apply, I want to be in the DROP program, and
- 14 then I'm approved by the chief, for example. And then I'm
- 15 able to double my money, so to speak, and, you know,
- 16 continue to work with the department. And that's really
- 17 what it is. Most people are not approved.
- 18 DIRECTOR CARTER: No.
- DC BLISS: No. Through the Chair. You have to be
- 20 approved. And it certainly ---
- 21 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I said most people
- 22 [Unclear58:58].
- DC BLISS: Not most; all have to be approved, not
- 24 most, or maybe; all have to be approved.
- 25 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I sure you have to be ---



- 1 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Point of order, speak to the
- 2 Chair, please.
- 3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Speak to the Chair, and you all
- 4 can talk offline on this. Are you done, Director Patillo.
- 5 Go ahead, commissioner.
- 6 COMMISSIONER CARTER: I'm done with her, but I just
- 7 have one comment about Grow Detroit Young Talent.
- 8 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, ma'am.
- 9 COMMISSIONER CARTER: And we've participated as the
- 10 board before in the past, so I would encourage staff to
- 11 look into it now, because in the summer when they start
- 12 to come, it'll be too late to look into it. So, it might
- 13 already be too late, but to work on that. It's an
- 14 opportunity for young people to actually work with the
- 15 Border of Police Commissioners, the staff as well as OCI,
- 16 and gain some invaluable experience. So, I would
- 17 encourage staff to look into that.
- 18 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Absolutely. I concur with that.
- 19 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Again, thank you. Through the
- 20 Chair for Director Patillo. I'm on the slide with the HR
- 21 monthly suspensions, and I'm noting that there is an
- 22 individual who has been suspended with no pay since 2020.
- 23 I'm just wondering if there is any kind of cap on the
- 24 tenure of a length of a suspension or how long a
- 25 suspension can go for an officer to still be an officer,



- 1 but not working
- DC BLISS: Through the Chair. There is no cap, or
- 3 once you're suspended, you can be suspended until either,
- 4 if there's a criminal case is adjudicated or the
- 5 administrative case is adjudicated; or in other cases, if
- 6 you have a criminal case and it's been extended because
- 7 you've had, you know, maybe another court date will go
- 8 until the end because that may affect the charges
- 9 administratively. So, you can continue to go for however
- 10 long. Now, it could impact your license. So, you could
- 11 come back, but that would now have an inactive license.
- 12 And now we have to look at getting you relicensed. So, it
- 13 does affect you.
- 14 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: But do you have a timeline on
- 15 that? The time that ---
- DC BLISS: Each is different. Through the Chair. Each
- 17 case is different in regards to how long a person will be
- 18 off.
- 19 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: And I mean, is less of a
- 20 concern because this individual is, no pay, but is it a
- 21 policy within the department to ensure that those who are
- 22 suspended with pay, that there a certain kind of
- 23 timeframe that those cases are being adjudicated; so,
- 24 we're not paying someone for not working for a long
- 25 period of time.



- 1 DC BLISS: Through the Chair. The members are
- 2 suspended with pay, and suspended without pay. In both
- 3 cases the investigative entity is working as those are
- 4 the priorities because we want to get them back. We want
- 5 to get that resolved as quickly as possible because we
- 6 don't want anyone out there that, number one, we're
- 7 paying and they're not doing anything; or number two,
- 8 they may need to be paid because they don't have any
- 9 money coming in. So, we don't want to do that. We want to
- 10 make sure that we can get that resolved as quickly as
- 11 possible. But in some cases, we are waiting for either
- 12 the criminal case or other things to be adjudicated
- 13 before we can go forward. But in those cases that we can,
- 14 they are the priority.
- 15 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Thank you.
- 16 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: And if you can do a review with
- 17 the chair of the citizens complaint committee on each one
- 18 of those individuals that are outstanding so that we can
- 19 know who they are and what's going on with their
- 20 situation, and move accordingly.
- 21 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Just one final.
- 22 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir.
- 23 COMMISSIONER MOORE: The board today, has requested a
- 24 lot of information at different points, not only from you
- 25 director, but from other folks. It's important for our



- 1 staff, and I'm sure you already know, to follow up on
- 2 this because follow up is key. Everything that goes into
- 3 an email I sent to the chief this weekend about three
- 4 leaders within the department, our experts that follow up
- 5 on different citizen complaints. So, I just want our
- 6 staff to be impressed where, commissioners, all these
- 7 different requests we have. Just please follow up. Thank
- 8 you.
- 9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah, we expect what we reported
- 10 on that as well. And yes, sir.
- 11 DC BLISS: Through the Chair. I'm requesting, since
- 12 there are a lot of requests, can you make a formal
- 13 request?
- 14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Oh, it will be.
- DC BLISS: Thank you so much.
- 16 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: It will be. Thank you.
- 17 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Transcript too.
- 18 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yep. Having said that, thank you
- 19 Director Patillo. We have one more oral communication
- 20 before we go to the section here. Mr. Smith, oh, you may
- 21 be heard. I'm sorry.
- 22 MR. SMITH: No problem. I just want to say this board
- 23 has a responsibility to hold officers accountable.
- 24 Everybody under the chief is responsible to this board
- 25 when it comes to the complaints and things of that



- 1 nature. Also, I want to say Deputy Chief Bliss, it was
- 2 very disrespectful for you to go back and forth with
- 3 Commissioner Bernard. She is in this capacity above you.
- 4 You can be suspended by her as well. You are under her
- 5 jurisdiction as a Board of Police Commissioners member. I
- 6 also want to say did --- I want to ask two simple
- 7 questions. Did everybody on this Board of Police
- 8 Commissioners watch the video on Sherman Lee Butler being
- 9 killed? And also, what is the process for the Board of
- 10 Police Commissioners to suspend an officer? As a citizen,
- 11 I request that the officers present when Sherman Lee
- 12 Butler was murdered to be suspended. I don't care what
- 13 the prosecutor said about charging the bailiff. The
- 14 officers who were on scene, did not follow their own
- 15 protocol in their command. I'm glad Tamara Olivia Smith
- 16 is in here because she had a lot to say last week. And
- 17 I'm here in person now, for her to disrespect people that
- 18 are coming to demand accountability from a board that has
- 19 the fundamental responsibility to hold officers
- 20 accountable. Also, just some of the things, some of the
- 21 questions that you ask are just mundane. I also want to
- 22 know about Lieutenant Brandon Cole. Is he still
- 23 suspended? Does he receive some type of settlement? Is he
- 24 paid? Maybe you can't explain the information, but I'm
- 25 going to keep asking, never going to go away. Also, if



- 1 you have power, I would like you guys to suspend officers
- 2 who are on the scene, who let a person going through a
- 3 mental health crisis be murdered and not wait for CIT,
- 4 not make the bailiff leave the room, not command the
- 5 situation.
- 6 There's no way anybody who's senior or whatever it
- 7 may be, needs to defend 4 armed officers who went through
- 8 one of the best police academies in the United States of
- 9 America. Am I correct? One of the best in America, all
- 10 right? People go to other states, or anywhere else. You
- 11 have a Detroit police certification; you can go anywhere.
- 12 Also, how do you get to walk around the streets and
- 13 detain people, and arrest people; give out tickets
- 14 without a certification and you go anywhere, okay, that
- 15 doesn't make any sense. The citizen's arrest is not
- 16 somebody being detained, taking their freedom. Security
- 17 quards can't do it. I couldn't take your freedom right
- 18 now if I wanted to. Misdemeanor, felony, whatever. That's
- 19 not how that works. You must have your certification. I
- 20 can't do any job and be paid without certification. Name
- 21 any job that I can be paid for without certification.
- 22 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you. Thank you so much.
- MR. SMITH: No problem, agent; start calling you
- 24 agent just to the officers.
- MR. BROWN: Mr. Chair, currently, we have one speaker



- 1 on Zoom. Ms. Yvonne Jones.
- 2 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. You may be heard.
- 3 MS. JONES: Good evening. This is Yvonne Jones and I
- 4 am a member of the Coalition for Police Transparency and
- 5 Accountability. And I wanted to just follow up also to
- 6 our last presentation trying to inquire about the Sherman
- 7 Lee Butler's case. What happened and with the police
- 8 officers and the response that we received from the
- 9 commissioner saying that that had been resolved by the
- 10 prosecutor's office. And that was not the question. The
- 11 question was not about who did the shooting, it was about
- 12 the behavior of the police, the misconduct, and that was
- 13 not addressed. And it needs to be investigated and
- 14 addressed and dealt with appropriately. I also want to
- 15 say that in these meetings where the public can only get
- 16 two minutes, and we spent so much time going over
- 17 administrative reports from the police, it seems the
- 18 meetings need to be restructured and pay more attention
- 19 to public concerns and citizens' complaints. Because we
- 20 have also requested information about citizen complaints
- 21 that we couldn't get from the Board of Commissioners. And
- 22 we keep getting sidewalled when we ask for information,
- 23 saying you can't do it for whatever reasons and feel like
- 24 that you're not exercising your authority because the
- 25 Board of Police Commissioner is the oversight body. And



- 1 you do have the authority if you would exercise it to
- 2 work with us to make sure we have police transparency and
- 3 accountability. Thank you.
- 4 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you. Unfinished business.
- 5 Yes, sir.
- 6 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Through the Chair. I'll move
- 7 to postpone it for a week. Is that not the right motion?
- 8 Oh, we are doing it outside.
- 9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah.
- 10 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: So, we are moving until
- 11 after the 22nd. Now? I stand corrected. Unfinished
- 12 business.
- 13 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: You were right.

nd

- 14 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: After the 22 ?
- 15 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: We'll wait until after the
- 16 criminal proceedings.
- 17 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Is that what was stated and what
- 18 is going on?
- 19 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: You just made a motion to ---
- 20 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: I'll make the motion to go
- 21 into closed session.
- 22 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: And I think we should be
- 23 mindful of what we share.
- 24 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Right. Absolutely.
- 25 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Both. Through the Chair,



- 1 I'll make a motion to go into closed section pursuant to
- 2 Section 8(a) of the Open Meetings Act. MCL 15.26(8a).
- 3 Department's request for the board to consider
- 4 administrative leave without pay but with medical
- 5 benefits for Police Officer Donavan Donehue, Badge 693,
- 6 assigned to the Twelfth Precinct.
- 7 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Support.
- 8 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Motion made by Commissioner
- 9 Hernandez to go into closed session and supported by
- 10 Commissioner Moore. Any discussion? All in favor say,
- 11 aye.
- 12 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
- 13 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Anyone opposed? The motion is
- 14 carried. This is a three-minute recess.
- 15 (Whereupon the Board Entered into Closed Session)
- 16 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Today is January the 16th. The
- 17 time is 4:52. The meeting is called back to order. Please
- 18 call the roll.
- 19 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Woods Here.
- 20 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Smith is excused.
- 21 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Bernard Present.
- 22 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Banks Present.
- 23 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Bell Present?
- MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Burton -
- MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Carter Here.



- 1 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Moore Present.
- 2 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Hernandez Present.
- 3 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Pressley Here.
- 4 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Dewaelsche Present.
- 5 MS. GARNIER: 9 present, sir?
- 6 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: There is a quorum. Everyone
- 7 introduced themselves just in the room, or do we need to
- 8 do that? We don't need to do that. Thank you. What is
- 9 your pleasure?
- 10 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Thank you. Through the
- 11 Chair, I'll make a motion to postpone the closed session
- 12 item. Do I have to read the entire motion, ma'am? I have
- 13 to read the entire, or can I say the item? Item A under.
- 14 DR. JACKSON: Item.
- 15 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Okay. So, I'll make a motion
- 16 to postpone until the next regularly scheduled meeting
- 17 item A under unfinished business.
- 18 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Support.
- 19 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Motion made by Commissioner
- 20 Hernandez to postpone the item and supported by
- 21 Commissioner Moore. Any discussion? All in favor say aye.
- 22 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
- 23 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Anyone opposed? The motion is
- 24 carried. Let's go to the new business. Commissioner
- 25 Hernandez.



- 1 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Thank you. As part of new
- 2 business, through the Chair, Personnel and Training
- 3 Committee held a series of different interview dates. We
- 4 obviously filled the senior investigator position
- 5 already. There were interviews that took place on, I
- 6 believe it was December 10th. And we had a few
- 7 commissioners present from Personnel and Training. They
- 8 interviewed a series of candidates for the position of
- 9 investigator. As a refresher, there were two different
- 10 positions that were open. And as such, there's going to
- 11 be two separate motions that I end up making on behalf of
- 12 the Personnel and Training Committee. Just as a very
- 13 quick overview, not only were there interview questions
- 14 of these candidates; there was also a two-minute video
- 15 that was asked along with the written sample that each
- 16 candidate had to complete. So, that's the only update
- 17 that we have regarding this position. And I'll go into
- 18 making the first of two motions. So, by the direction of
- 19 the Personnel and Training Committee. I move that Toya
- 20 Lawrence proceed to the next stage of the interview
- 21 process for the position of an investigator in the Office
- 22 of the Chief Investigator
- 23 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Support.
- 24 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Motion made by Commissioner
- 25 Hernandez.



- 1 DR. JACKSON: Made by the committee.
- CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Made by the committee, by 2.
- 3 direction of the Personnel and Training Committee, we are
- going to add and support it by ---4
- 5 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: It's not necessary.
- 6 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: No, it isn't necessary.
- DR. JACKSON: The motion by committee, no second is 7
- 8 required.
- CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Absolutely. And so, all in favor 9
- 10 say aye.
- 11 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
- CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Any discussion? 12
- 13 DR. JACKSON: Thank you, sir.
- 14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: All in favor say,
- 15 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
- 16 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Anyone opposed? The motion is
- carried. 17
- 18 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Thank you.
- 19 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir.
- 20 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: The second motion that I'll
- 21 move by direction of the Personnel and Training Committee
- is that Jereika Johnson be reappointed as an investigator 22
- 23 in the Office of the Chief Investigator.
- 24 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Any discussion?
- 25 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Yes, sir.



- 1 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir.
- 2 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Just as a point of clarity,
- 3 this was the second opening that was available, and we
- 4 were able to tap into an already or a previously
- 5 experienced candidate who was willing to come back, and
- 6 wanted to work and is excited to come back to work. We've
- 7 edited this through HR, and went through all the proper
- 8 channels to make sure that we could reappoint. And so,
- 9 we're in full compliance.
- 10 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yep. All in favor say aye.
- 11 COMMISSIONERS: Anyone opposed? The motion is
- 12 carried. Would you like to update about the search?
- 13 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Before we go to that?
- 14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah. Okay. Excuse me.
- 15 COMMISSIONER CARTER Through the Chair?
- 16 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes.
- 17 COMMISSIONER CARTER: There was an alternate
- 18 candidate.
- 19 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Oh, yeah, absolutely.
- 20 COMMISSIONER CARTER: So that we don't, in case ---
- 21 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Talk into the mic.
- 22 COMMISSIONER CARTER: And if the first candidate does
- 23 not accept the position, instead of going back through
- 24 everything, we recommend the second candidate be
- 25 considered for the investigator position.



- 1 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah. Any discussion on that?
- 2 Yes, sir.
- 3 COMMISSIONER BELL: Okay. Investigator certified with
- a work performance that was previously employed, is going 4
- 5 to be reappointed.
- 6 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah. Oh, absolutely.
- 7 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you.
- COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: So, does HR. 8
- 9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yep.
- 10 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yep.
- COMMISSIONER BELL: Chief Investigator, not the HR. 11
- 12 I'll come out, Chief Investigator.
- 13 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Yeah, both.
- 14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you, sir.
- 15 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yep. Any discussion as to the
- 16 motion Commissioner Carter made about the alternative?
- 17 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Point of order. Again, if
- it's coming out of committee, I 18
- 19 think that ---
- CHAIRPERSON WOODS: By the direction of the Personnel 20
- and Training Committee. 21
- COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: And I don't know if the 2.2
- motion was actually read because we don't know the name 23
- 24 of the individual of which we're speaking about.
- 25 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: I don't know the name.



- 1 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: It's in your report.
- 2 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Is it on the report? It is in
- 3 there.
- 4 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: I see.
- 5 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: It's not on the ---
- 6 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: It is, I'm thinking of the
- 7 motion in my head.
- 8 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay.
- 9 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Do you mind, through the
- 10 Chair, if I ask a clarifying question?
- 11 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes.
- 12 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Ms. Parliamentarian, through
- 13 the Chair. Would it be easier to amend the motion that we
- 14 already adopted, the first motion since we're pursuing a
- 15 candidate, and this would be the alternative for that
- 16 same exact position?
- DR. JACKSON: Amending a previously adopted motion is
- 18 more complicated. If there is agreement on what it is you
- 19 want to do, it would be easier if the Chair asked for
- 20 unanimous consent to allow it to be amended. If there's
- 21 no objection, that would be the fastest way to handle
- 22 that.
- 23 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: I'm asking for unanimous consent
- 24 to amend the motion
- 25 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: And add as an alternate, Mr.



- 1 Derek Cox.
- 2 DR. JACKSON: And ask, is there any objection to
- 3 amending the motion?
- 4 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Is there any objection to
- 5 amending the motion?
- 6 DR. JACKSON: There being no objection, the motion is
- 7 now, before you to add David Cox.
- 8 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: There being no objection, the
- 9 motion now before you, are to add David Cox.
- 10 DR. JACKSON: Is there any debate?
- 11 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Is there any debate? Derek Cox.
- 12 All right. No debate. No discussion. All in favor say,
- 13 aye.
- 14 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
- 15 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Anyone opposed? The motion is
- 16 carried. All right.
- 17 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: All right. Last item through
- 18 the Chair again. So as the public knows, and as we've
- 19 been reporting out pretty much weekly, the search for the
- 20 next Chief of Police has been underway for a few months
- 21 at this point. The most recent update is January 10th,
- 22 which was last Friday. The posting formally closed. Our
- 23 search firm has been very diligent about interviewing a
- 24 series of candidates. They're north of 20 different
- 25 candidate interviews that have taken place. They are



- 1 going to provide ---
- 2 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Say it, I didn't hear you.
- 3 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: It's north of 20, and I'm
- 4 going to get a final number of interviewed individuals.
- 5 That doesn't mean it's the whole pool. But we're going to
- 6 get a series of data points, including how many
- 7 candidates were in the pool, publicly available
- 8 information that we can release, not necessarily
- 9 demographically, but potentially based on location we
- 10 might be able to source, given that this is a national
- 11 search.
- 12 So, we'll have an update on those kinds of criteria.
- 13 And, in terms of next steps, we're anticipating getting
- 14 that full report along, with a list of five recommended
- 15 candidates from the search firm by mid next week; mid to
- 16 end of next week. At that point we'll have a special
- 17 search committee meeting to review all of the candidates
- 18 that were in the pool to feel comfortable with the five.
- 19 We will then make a motion to submit to the full body
- 20 that we interview all five of those candidates in person
- 21 during one of these 3:00 PM meetings. And the goal
- 22 ultimately is that we end up providing our charter
- 23 mandated obligation of providing three names to the mayor
- 24 by the first week of February. So, we're coming up on
- 25 pretty tight timelines. Those who are members of that



- 1 special search committee, you'll get a notification as to
- 2 the meeting. But that information will continue to be
- 3 publicly available or I would say, available to every
- 4 commissioner. And please check your inbox because you
- 5 have been receiving updates from the search firm.
- 6 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah. Thank you. Yes, ma'am.
- 7 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Just a clarification. So,
- 8 we only have about two weeks before our Thursday meeting,
- 9 which I don't think is February 3rd. It'll be the 4th or
- 10 the 5th. No, maybe the 5th. But my question is, so you're
- 11 saying that by the next two meetings, we're going to have
- 12 the top three candidates to refer to the mayor?
- 13 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: So, our tentative meeting
- 14 date, we have not yet confirmed this, nor the location.
- 15 We want to make sure that it's at a neutral site. Four
- 16 interviews of the five candidates would be in two weeks
- 17 from now, which is the 30th of January. And we feel
- 18 entirely comfortable with that timeline. And then after
- 19 that, based on the vote that occurs at that meeting by
- 20 this body, we would then submit to the mayor the first
- 21 week of February, which is the week of February 3rd.
- 22 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Thank you.
- 23 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yep. What is the pleasure of this
- 24 board?
- 25 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Vote for adjournment.



- 1 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Mr. Chair, on another
- 2 topic, if I may.
- 3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, ma'am.
- COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Before we adjourn the 4
- 5 meeting. We have a new administration that's coming into
- 6 office in less than a week, I believe. Is it a week or so
- many days? 7
- 8 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Monday.
- 9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Monday, yeah.
- COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Well, I didn't say that, 10
- but because I don't want it to be on Monday, but it is, 11
- 12 unfortunately. But what is the department doing as far
- 13 as, are they planning how this new administration may
- 14 impact, you know, some of the, you know, I'm concerned
- 15 about mass deportation, but there are other areas of the
- 16 department that may be impacted. Like, will the federal
- 17 law enforcement agency, or will they have some guidelines
- 18 or force us to do some things as it relates to protests,
- 19 you know, that occur you know, what they consider illegal
- activity. Are we planning to address those in advance, or 20
- 21 are we just waiting to see what's going to happen? I
- 22 guess, you know, I would expect that the leadership of
- 23 the department would have a committee that would be, you
- know, investigating or at least researching what the new 24
- 25 administration may force our state departments or city



- 1 departments to do, and be planning for it. That's just my
- 2 concern, and I would like to know.
- 3 DC BLISS: Through the Chair. So, we have had
- 4 discussions. A lot of the things that may happen after
- 5 January 20th because there are rumors all over. There are
- 6 a hundred executive orders, there's this, there's that. A
- 7 lot of it is waiting until we see what actually is put
- 8 out, how it impacts the states and what our response
- 9 would be. But we are like everyone else. Of course, we're
- 10 discussing it. Next steps, could this impact us? We don't
- 11 want to move on rumors and we want to wait, but at the
- 12 same time, we are actively discussing it. We are keeping
- 13 our ears to the ground, so to speak, to make sure that it
- 14 will never be a surprise to us.
- 15 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: And then another, just
- 16 follow up.
- 17 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, ma'am.
- 18 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: We do have four years of
- 19 experience already, so we could at least look at some of
- 20 those activities that severely impacted many of our
- 21 communities. So, thank you. I just wanted to make sure
- 22 you were in discussion.
- DC BLISS: Through the Chair. Absolutely. And like
- 24 you said, we've had four years. We've addressed a lot of
- 25 issues then. So, we come in with an advantage, but again,



- 1 it's the wait and see approach, but definitely the
- 2 discussion. Definitely the planning. But there's a lot of
- 3 other things that kind of have to fall out at the same
- 4 time. So, like every other law enforcement department, we
- 5 are patiently waiting to see what happens after the 20th.
- 6 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: And then just as a final,
- 7 you know, are we anticipating some cuts from the federal
- 8 department as far as our department funding.
- 9 DC BLISS: Through the Chair. It's possible. We've
- 10 had a lot of grants as you know, we've had ARPA and so
- 11 far that has not impacted us. So, as we wait until the
- 12 20th, and see what rolls out after that we'll see. I know
- 13 that there's a lot of pro policing things that are out
- 14 there. So, it could swing either way, but we have that
- 15 every four years. You just never know what's going to
- 16 happen. So, it is very fruitful for us to have those
- 17 conversations, and to, what if it; what's next? So, we
- 18 will, we will be ready for whatever comes at us.
- 19 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Thank you.
- 20 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you.
- 21 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I just want to comment. I
- 22 understand your position and certainly sympathize with
- 23 it, but as we all know, and many of us who were here
- 24 during the sixties, seventies, et cetera, federal law
- 25 preempts city and state law, irrespective of what they're



- 1 saying in California. And the proof of that is what
- 2 happened in Georgia and what happened in Arkansas when it
- 3 came to school desegregation. When the president used
- 4 Army, National Guard, and Federal, I mean, officers
- 5 acting federal capacity to integrate schools, to
- 6 integrate communities. There is no wiggle room on that.
- 7 And the precedent was, was established, as you and I both
- 8 know, it caused tremendous ranker within those
- 9 communities where officers for the army, where the
- 10 military was brought in to desegregate schools. So,
- 11 following federal law, they absolutely have the power to
- 12 do it. What I know of, in terms of your question
- 13 regarding cuts. And it was addressed in part on WJR the
- 14 other day with Chantelle Jenkins, which most people in
- 15 this room know who, I quess now is running for mayor. And
- 16 her statement was that no, I'm not making --- I was
- 17 surprised. Her statement was that she was here during the
- 18 bankruptcy, she understood what had happened with all
- 19 that. And she specifically stated to the reporter ---
- 20 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: You tethering ---
- 21 COMMISSIONER MOORE: That sound like a political ---
- 22 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: You are tethering. Be careful,
- 23 commissioner.
- 24 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Wait a minute. I'm responding
- 25 to my colleague that there would be approximately, she



- 1 thought, a billion dollars in cuts to the city because
- 2 the whole community, the whole country's been flushed
- 3 with money. That's why we've got all this, you know, this
- 4 36 trillion in debt. But a lot of that is going to change
- 5 and be redirected. So, there are going to be cuts. And I
- 6 agree with my colleague that we need to look to see,
- 7 particularly with respect to the police department, how
- 8 those particular cuts or what cuts could happen. I mean,
- 9 we know how much federal money we get.
- 10 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah. Well ---
- 11 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: That's the point.
- 12 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: I'm very, very appreciative of
- 13 Commissioner Dewaelsche, and the phenomenal job you have
- 14 been doing in terms of DPD budget. You have been doing a
- 15 stellar job. And we welcome the public to come out and
- 16 look what's been posted on, as far as our networks. But
- 17 you are doing a yeoman's job and scrutinizing our budget,
- 18 and we appreciate all the commissioners who have chimed
- 19 in on it. And so the only thing we could do is deal with
- 20 the budget that is before us at this time, and be very,
- 21 very prayerful that we don't experience anything major in
- 22 that regard. But, you know, I like to look at the glass
- 23 half full and not half empty. At this particular point,
- 24 you're doing a great job in saying what their budget is
- 25 and scrutinizing their budget. And let's continue the



job. And so, having said that, I'm done. COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: I move for adjournment. COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Support. CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Motion made by Commissioner Pressley, supported by Commissioner Hernandez. Any discussion? All in favor say aye. COMMISSIONERS: Aye. CHAIRPERSON WOODS: The motion is carried. (Meeting Adjourned at 5:09PM
