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BOARD OF POLICE COMMISSIONERS MEETING

11

February 13, 2025 at 6:30P.M.

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3 MR. ROO: Can you hear me?

4 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, you may be heard.

5 MR. ROO: I didn't know public comments started, but  
6 this is Monkey Wrench Roo, appearing on behalf of Nene.  
7 Darryl Woods. I don't see Tamara Liberty Smith in there,  
8 but I'm going to tell you, I don't know what that little  
9 white man has done to you all. But the coverup or the  
10 coverup or the coverup is going to be uncovered and  
11 exposed now. I don't know why you all have not taken that  
12 tag off Nene's mama yet, but Marko Prestage,  
13 investigator, homicide investigator, Marco Pestage, and  
14 homicide captain, former homicide captain, now Second  
15 Precinct commander, Derrick Maye, has to plot to cover up  
16 the murder of Kaniesha Coleman. Now, I didn't reach out  
17 to Homicide and tried to give him the information. Ain't  
18 nobody called me back. So, now I'm taking it to the  
19 streets. See, if you all want to play games and this  
20 little political stuff, that's the City Council, Board of  
21 Police Commissioners and the mayor. I'm with it. That's  
22 why they called me Monkey Wrench Roo. I have their name  
23 in 1991 for a specific reason and purpose. Now, I'm  
24 getting ready to use it and demonstrate it on you. Darryl  
25 Woods and Tamara Liberty Smith, the Detroit Police

1 Department, Michael Prestage, Derrick Maye, and whoever  
2 else is standing in Nene's way. That's my word. Now, I  
3 told you to ask Mark McLeod about me. You said you talked  
4 to him on the phone. You don't have to ask him about me.  
5 I'm getting ready to show you and demonstrate to you  
6 Darryl Woods exactly how I'm cut, how I'm built and made.

7 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: I hope that is not a threat, sir.

8 MR. ROO: It isn't no damn threat. It's the truth.

9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. All right, you tethering.  
10 Next caller, next speaker.

11 MS. UNDERWOOD: Mr. Sheila Gunn. Yes ma'am.

12 MS. GUNN: Good evening. I'm here representing ---

13 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Can you put the mic close please?  
14 Thank you.

15 MS. GUNN: I'm here representing Findlay County  
16 Keystone Block Club on Outer Drive in Findlay. It's a  
17 school that's not active. Van Zile Elementary School has  
18 been emptied for about 20 years. We've been having a  
19 problem with squatters, rave parties, drug activities,  
20 sex parties. And we reached out to our neighborhood  
21 police. They come sometimes. The school was boarded up  
22 with plexiglass. They break it and go in there. Back in  
23 November, someone set it on fire trying to warm themself  
24 up. And we had about eight fire trucks out there; gurneys  
25 lined up because they thought there were going to be dead

1 people. We've been trying to get the city, the police  
2 department to come because now it's open for real because  
3 they had to break the glass. The front door is open. It's  
4 right next door to Mason School, where the kids walk to  
5 school.

6 Our block club in our neighborhood is concerned  
7 about somebody still being in there. And we're trying to  
8 see if the police or someone can expedite it getting  
9 secured again. And we've been to the school board  
10 meetings. We know it's not the city per se, but we need  
11 some help getting that building secured and getting some  
12 kind of police activity. Because they come from across 8  
13 Mile, Ritz High School. And it's a party place. You know,  
14 the teenagers hang out there and it's concerning because  
15 we see them going in and out. But I just want to put that  
16 on the record that we need some kind of police activity  
17 over there.

18 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes. So, Commander Chambers is  
19 going to talk with you, but the chief has a great  
20 relationship with the school superintendent. And he's  
21 going to, I'm sure, follow up to make sure, if it's a  
22 city issue or if it's a DPSCD issue that they issue would  
23 get addressed. Next caller.

24 MS. UNDERWOOD: Our next speaker is former  
25 Commissioner William Davis.

1 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: You may be heard, commissioner.

2 MR. DAVIS: Good evening. Can I be heard?

3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir.

4 MR. DAVIS: Okay. I don't really have much to say  
5 today, other than the fact that I agree that certain  
6 staff members need to be paid more. I also think that  
7 there actually should be more investigators. I also think  
8 that for people to actually come, the commissioners to  
9 actually come, they should actually get more of a stipend  
10 than what they do. But I think there should be  
11 consequences for the commissioners that don't show up or  
12 don't notify them not coming and don't show up at all.  
13 You know, I worked for the City of Detroit for 34 years  
14 and from 2000, I mean from 1978 to 2012. The last time I  
15 called in sick was October 8th, 1992. During the time  
16 that I was on the board, I didn't miss a single meeting.  
17 In fact, I haven't missed a meeting since before I was on  
18 the board. And I think if you're going to be a police  
19 commissioner, you need to show some determination and  
20 commitment. Thank you.

21 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you very kindly.

22 MS. UNDERWOOD: That was your last speaker, Mr.  
23 Chair.

24 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. All right. Let's get to the  
25 Secretary Report.

1 MS. GARNIER: This evening, we have a number of  
2 correspondent communications under tab five in your  
3 binders tonight. They're listed on the agenda, notably  
4 from the budget committee memo and the announcements of  
5 meetings coming up. Next board meeting is next Thursday,  
6 February 20th at 3:00 PM at Public Safety Headquarters.  
7 The next community meeting is Thursday, March 13th. It  
8 will be held in the Tenth Precinct at Union Carpenters  
9 and Millwrights Skill Training Center. That meeting also  
10 is at 6:30 PM and it is located at 11687 American Street  
11 in Detroit. Our next committee meetings of the board are  
12 as follows: budget committee meeting next Tuesday,  
13 February 18th at 4:30 PM at Public Safety Headquarters.  
14 And the policy committee will meet on that same day,  
15 Tuesday, February 18th at 5:00 PM at Public Safety  
16 Headquarters. That ends the reports today, sir.

17 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Mr. Attorney - thank you  
18 very much, Madam Secretary. We can have the chief of  
19 police give his report. We're not voting on it. It's  
20 nothing, it's not an actionable item. Where does it say  
21 that he can't.

22 INTERIM CHIEF BETTISON: You're able to get the  
23 report from the chief, but no ---

24 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah, there are no votes.

25 INTERIM CHIEF BETTISON: Just a presentation.

1 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Absolutely. Let's go to the  
2 chief of police, the honorable Todd A. Bettison.

3 INTERIM CHIEF BETTISON: Thank you, sir. Through the  
4 Chair, Commissioner Woods and to this honorable body. And  
5 always thank you for your service as well. I'll start  
6 out, I don't know if we did introductions of my folks  
7 here yet?

8 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Say that one more time.

9 INTERIM CHIEF BETTISON: We did introductions of my  
10 staff and the deputy chiefs and the folks in the audience  
11 yet, or you just want me to ---?

12 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: No, we haven't. When our quorum  
13 gets here, we can do that. And they should be here very  
14 momentarily, but you could introduce your crew all you  
15 want.

16 INTERIM CHIEF BETTISON: Well, I'll have them stand  
17 up and introduce themselves. So of course we got Deputy  
18 Chief Arnold Williams here, and then we'll just start  
19 from there. Chief of Staff Shonda Starks, and we'll just  
20 go around and have them introduce themselves.

21 INTRODUCTION OF THE INTERIM CHIEF'S STAFF: Commander  
22 Michael Chambers, Eleventh Precinct.

23 INTERIM CHIEF BETTISON: I guess that's it, right?  
24 Okay. Neighborhood police officers?

25 INTRODUCTION OF NPOs:

1 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Those great NPOs back there. I do  
2 a lot of work with that one, right there, NPO Williams.

3 INTERIM CHIEF BETTISON: Absolutely. So, I'll start  
4 my report right now. Crime is continuing to trend down.  
5 And so, our homicide numbers this year, year-to-date is  
6 33% reduction; non-fatal shootings. It's a small uptick  
7 where it's a 4% increase, robberies down 1%. Total part  
8 one crime at this particular point in time is down 11%.  
9 And carjackings continue to trend down at 21%.  
10 Significant events. The thing that troubles our heart,  
11 definitely the most, has been what we've seen on  
12 television with the tragic case where we lost two of our  
13 youngest people, which occurred at the Hollywood Casino,  
14 the parking lot on the ninth floor. You know, it's been  
15 very frigid when we look at the weather. And so, with the  
16 mother and the grandmother who were living in their van  
17 along with five children.

18 And so, we know that we lost a 2-year-old and a 9-  
19 year-old; had a press conference, and like I said in the  
20 press conference, it's not a whole lot that I can say,  
21 but when it comes to cause of death we leave that up to  
22 the medical examiner. And so, you know, on the face it  
23 appears to be hypothermia. And if anybody wants to know,  
24 like the signs of hypothermia, you can Google it. I just  
25 had a First Aid class. And when you go through and you



1 kind of look at it, I say, yeah, refresher. But when you  
2 look at it, it doesn't take a whole lot. But with that  
3 being said, we're going to wait for what the medical  
4 examiner has to say in regards to the actual cause of  
5 death. Just a real tragedy, because we saw the mother on  
6 television. You know, anytime anyone loses their kid and  
7 that they're unsheltered in a position like that, we have  
8 to look at the system and say, you know, what could, and  
9 it's on all of us, what could we have done better?

10       You know, and it goes to family, it goes to friends  
11 of the mayor at his press conference. And I thank Darryl  
12 Woods, I thank Commissioner Linda Bernard for standing  
13 with us, and I know all the board members there in  
14 spirit, but, you know, what can we do? And one of the  
15 things, looking at what we can do as a police department,  
16 we've opened up our precincts as warming centers, and  
17 then also anyone can come there. I put out an  
18 administrative message, and not just putting it out, but  
19 my command officers have been there instructing the  
20 police officers on the doors. And so, if any citizen  
21 comes in and needs shelter, our officers know what to do.  
22 They'll contact our unsheltered response team to work to  
23 ensure that outreach gets to the precinct to offer  
24 services and make sure that individuals get into a drop-  
25 in center.

1           And what I will say to the community is this, when  
2 you see something, we have to act. And it's not just the  
3 City of Detroit problem. This is a nationwide problem,  
4 but it's more deadly in these frigid temperatures. How  
5 many times have you been at Walmart and you got out of  
6 your car and you looked at the car next door, you know,  
7 like right next to your vehicle and it got a whole lot of  
8 stuff in it. Sometimes you don't think, but that's  
9 somebody living in that car. So, we typically think of an  
10 unsheltered person as on the streets, but we do have a  
11 lot of unsheltered individuals that are in their  
12 vehicles. But as we know, a vehicle is not the safest  
13 place because in this particular incident, the mother  
14 did, in my opinion, what she thought was the best.

15           But with a car and it running, it can run out of gas  
16 or it can have a mechanical failure. At this particular  
17 point, I still don't know because the investigation is  
18 ongoing. But I know that the City of Detroit has stepped  
19 up, we're wrapping our arms around her, we're doing the  
20 best that we can, and you all definitely keep the board  
21 updated and that's really the most significant event that  
22 I have. You know, and I will tell you this, I've seen a  
23 lot of stuff, but the children still get to me. Anytime  
24 we lose somebody, like a kid. And I know it gets to you  
25 all as well. That's the most significant thing.

1 Everything else is really minor when it comes to  
2 significant stuff. The other thing that I would say as  
3 far as celebration, I really appreciated Monday, the  
4 community support, when the mayor announced me as his  
5 pick for chief of police, and he sent my name up to the  
6 City Council. I'm still the interim chief because it's a  
7 process. And so, I did my interview yesterday before the  
8 Internal Affairs Committee, and I received their support.  
9 And so, they're going to take the final vote up on  
10 Tuesday before the committee of the whole. And so, I'm  
11 expecting a good outcome. And next Thursday when I'm  
12 before this board, I should be effective - listen, I'm  
13 anticipating with Council's blessing actually being able  
14 to call myself your chief of police. So, that's very  
15 positive. But right after my celebration very shortly  
16 thereafter, I got the horrific news that we lost those  
17 two children in that condition. And that just let the air  
18 out of my balloon right there. At this point, because  
19 tomorrow is Valentine's Day. And so, when it's  
20 Valentine's Day, you know, our department and our  
21 neighborhood police officers always do it big. And I know  
22 over here at the Eleventh Precinct with Neighborhood  
23 Police Officer D. Rob and his whole crew, they're going  
24 to do some amazing things as well. So, we're going to  
25 have the fifth annual Valentine's Day Cupid dance, and

1 that's going to be at Sacred Hearts Activity Center. And  
2 they're going to welcome the community over there at the  
3 Cupid Dance. I know the Seventh Precinct is doing that  
4 one. And then it's going to be a Valentine Day luncheon  
5 and movie. And that's going to be Friday, of course,  
6 February 14th for the senior residents. And they're  
7 invited out to the luncheon, and that's going to be at  
8 the River Towers. And the event is going to be hosted  
9 also at the Seventh Precinct. And Commander Chambers will  
10 be telling you all what's going to be happening at the  
11 Eleventh Precinct because I know he has something in  
12 store as well. And that concludes my report.

13 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Oh, I want to say thank you very  
14 much for your bold, bold leadership. And I'm glad that  
15 Commissioner Smith is here as well, you know, to really  
16 say thank you for wrapping your arms around this family.  
17 **A lot of people can judge but you are not intimately**  
18 **involved in the situations. And thank you for rolling up**  
19 **your sleeves. I know how much you have rolled up your**  
20 **sleeve in this situation. I've been intimately involved**  
21 **working with you in this situation. And your compassion**  
22 **and your willingness to be able to open up these**  
23 **precincts and your engagement has been very, very**  
24 **powerful. Certainly, you have the support of this board.**  
25 **I can speak confidently to say that you have the support**

1 of this board in terms of City Council. I was in Council  
2 right after you while you were testifying and, you know,  
3 I got grilled a little bit, but I handled it very well, I  
4 believe. But the work that you guys are doing is  
5 powerful. And not only that, I've seen you work in some  
6 spaces that this community doesn't really understand.  
7 They see what you're doing outwardly, but behind closed  
8 doors, what you're doing intimately to be able to be a  
9 blessing to so many people that's hurting. I want to say  
10 hats off to you. And again, salute to Commissioner Smith,  
11 I had just left for moments ago over at an undisclosed  
12 location and she was doing God's work there with that  
13 family, you know. So, again, any questions to the chief?  
14 There being no questions or comments? You're doing good  
15 today, doc?

16 INTERIM CHIEF BETTISON: And I just want to let the  
17 board know, the viewing audience know as well, that  
18 during my interview with City Council, one of the  
19 questions --- they had me there for an hour and you know,  
20 a lot of questions. But one of the things that they  
21 really uplifted was, how do you respect the Board of  
22 Police Commissioners? What is your relationship and how  
23 do you respect them? And highly respect the Board of  
24 Police Commissioners. But I wanted to emphasize that  
25 point, because your City Council really respects the

1 Board of Police Commissioners and wanted to make sure  
2 that before they put a chief in place, that the chief  
3 respects the Board of Police Commissioners. So, I  
4 understand that the Board of Police Commissioners is an  
5 oversight. And one of my commitments that I've made is, I  
6 definitely plan on --- I'm going to try to break the  
7 attendance record for being the most attended chief at  
8 the Board of Police Commissioners, and Dionne Warwick,  
9 she called in during public comment and she said, you  
10 know, I want the chief to stay to hear the public  
11 comments as well. And so that's going to be one of my  
12 commitments to that. When I'm here, I'm here with you  
13 all. And so, I'm just letting the public know that I  
14 appreciate it and I know that the public comments are not  
15 going to be all rosy and everything, but you know, I'm  
16 here for it. And that's what we here to have transparent  
17 exchange, and that's what it's really about. So, I'm here  
18 for it.

19 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Absolutely. And you're not just  
20 saying that because we have the budget right now, are  
21 you?

22 INTERIM CHIEF BETTISON: I'm on the record saying it.  
23 When I'm on the record, I'm on the record.

24 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: All right. So, introduction of  
25 commissioners, roll call.

1 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Woods - Present.

2 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Smith - Present.

3 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Bernard is excused.

4 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Banks - Present.

5 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Bell is excused.

6 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Burton is excused.

7 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Carter - Present.

8 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Moore - Present.

9 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Pressley - Here.

10 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Dewaelsche - Present.

11 MS. GARNIER: Seven are present, sir.

12 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Alright, we have a quorum, okay.

13 I entertain a motion for the approval of the February  
14 13th agenda.

15 COMMISSIONER MOORE: So, moved.

16 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Moved by Commissioner Moore.

17 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Support.

18 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Supported by Commissioner Banks.

19 Any discussion? All in favors, say, aye.

20 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

21 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Anyone oppose? The motion is  
22 carried. I entertain the motion for the approval of the  
23 minutes of the January 30th, 2025 minutes.

24 COMMISSIONER MOORE: So, moved.

25 COMMISSIONER DEWAEELSCHÉ: Support.

1 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Moved by Commissioner Moore,  
2 supported by Commissioner Dewaelsche. Any discussion? All  
3 in favor, say aye.

4 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

5 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Anyone oppose? The motion is  
6 carried. I entertain a motion for the approval of the  
7 minutes of the February 6th, 2025 minutes.

8 COMMISSIONER MOORE: So, moved.

9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Moved by Commissioner Moore.

10 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Support.

11 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Supported by Commissioner Carter.  
12 Any discussion? All in favor say, aye.

13 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Anyone oppose? The motion is  
15 carried.

16 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: So, the introduction of elected  
17 is not on my agenda. Oh, here we go under (e).  
18 Introduction of BOPC staff, Chief of Police and elected  
19 officials. And let me say hello to my good friend  
20 representative Carter. Tyrone Carter. How are you doing?  
21 All right. Good. Good to see you today. And thank you for  
22 championing the police accountability bills in the house  
23 last year. And I'm looking forward to engaging with you  
24 more. And thank you for being a strong support for the  
25 Public Safety Trust Fund that will bring millions of



1 dollars back here to the City of Detroit. \$18 million to  
2 be exact, that will fund policing as well as CVI groups  
3 here in the City of Detroit. Thank you for being a  
4 champion and so many other things that you have  
5 championed during your tenure as state rep. I wanted to  
6 point that out. Thank you very kindly.

7 MS. GARNIER: The Board of Police Commissioner, staff  
8 present today are Attorney ---

9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Speak into the mic.

10 MS. GARNIER: I'm sorry. Attorney Dante Goss, Drew  
11 Fries, Felicia Tyson, Teresa Blossom, Mary Barber,  
12 Candace Hayes, Artemisia Joshua, Jasmine Taylor. Chief  
13 Investigator Jerome Warfield, Office of Chief  
14 Investigator Supervisor Elgin Murphy, DPD, HR Director.  
15 Katrina Patillo, Interim Chief of Police, Todd Bettison,  
16 Deputy Chief Arnold Williams. We also have Commander  
17 Michael Chambers, Twelfth Precinct and Chief of Staff, as  
18 well as here tonight. The interpreters online are Ms.  
19 Yakata and Dr. Stephanie Beatty, court reporter Don  
20 Handyside. And for Audio Visual Sergeant Henry Jackson,  
21 and retired Sergeant Alan Quinn for audio visual. Charles  
22 Henry for Media Services video. We also have elected  
23 officials, Marie Overall of State Representative. Tyrone  
24 Carter's Office is on Zoom. Kim Jackson, Eleventh  
25 Precinct, president of Community Relations, Fredia

1 Butler, Second Precinct Community Relations President. We  
2 also have Ms. LaDon Davis, Office of Council member Fred  
3 Durhal, who's on Zoom. Damien Mitchell, who's the  
4 community liaison for City Council. Councilman Scott  
5 Benson. We also have Kenneth Johnson L, of City Council  
6 Coleman Young II. We also have Lieutenant Mark Young,  
7 president of Lieutenants and Sergeants. Mr. Ron Thomas,  
8 president of Detroit Police Officers. And we also heard  
9 from former Detroit Police Commissioner William Davis.  
10 And those are who I have listed and signed in thus far,  
11 sir.

12 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you very, very kindly. And  
13 I thank all of the council members who have sent  
14 representatives; very fine men. And I know this is  
15 councilman Scott Benson, district. I want to thank, SAY  
16 Detroit. He has done great work with SAY Detroit. Eric  
17 Reid but also Mitch Albom. This is the, this is the place  
18 that Mitch Albom built and I worked directly with Mitch  
19 Albom. I was at the groundbreaking here and watched this  
20 place get built. And I know Councilman Vincent was very,  
21 very, very supportive of this project. Councilman Young  
22 team members are here as well, and all of the council  
23 members who have been represented online. So, let's go to  
24 the BOPC office report. This is a resolution honoring  
25 Karen L. Washington. Commissioner Banks.

1 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Yeah, thank you. Thank you,  
2 Chair.

3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir. It's Karen Washington  
4 here, present?

5 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Sick.

6 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay.

7 COMMISSIONER BANKS: All right. Karen Washington was  
8 here. She and her husband. Her husband became sick and  
9 she had to rush him to the hospital. So, we are just  
10 praying that all is well with her husband. I got a call  
11 from Teresa Blossom and she filled me in on everything.  
12 So, I wasn't here when she was here, but a resolution  
13 honoring Karen L. Washington.

14 WHEREAS Karen L. Washington is a resident of the  
15 City of Detroit and has served the residents of Northeast  
16 Detroit for over 30 years. She is currently the executive  
17 director of Emanuel Community House Inc. Founder and the  
18 director of Restore Northeast Detroit, and immediately  
19 passed resident of WE Care, Van Dyke and 7 Mile  
20 Community; and.

21 WHEREAS Washington's effort at Emanuel Community  
22 House Inc., provided her an opportunity to build 31 units  
23 of single-family housing, 9 of which were sold, and 22  
24 are currently in a 15-year rental program. She also built  
25 a community park known as John R. Community Park,

1 provided educational and recreational programs for  
2 children and families, mentoring, jobs readiness, food  
3 distribution, and developed partnerships with community  
4 business owners and church leaders; and.

5       WHEREAS In November of 2011, Karen organized  
6 partnerships of 6 collaborative partners known as  
7 Residents. Empowered, strengthened, transformed our  
8 residential environment, Northeast Detroit, NED, to  
9 address what residents could do to further improve their  
10 quality of lives. The focus of Restore NED is to address  
11 crime and safety, neighborhood beautification, economic  
12 and community development, build and sustain and  
13 investment club, and empower youth and education as a  
14 resident restores dedication to improving the quality of  
15 life for residents in Detroit. The organization was  
16 granted \$500,000 grant from ArtPlace America for the  
17 project and title Create NED. Create NED is dedicated to  
18 enhancing city parks and providing artists of Detroit  
19 opportunities to showcase their talent throughout the  
20 neighborhoods; and.

21       WHEREAS In 2014 restored NED, reached a level of  
22 fame by organizing residents to fight the City of Detroit  
23 sale of Lipke Recreation Center. After lobbying the City  
24 Council and the Mayor, Lipke was saved. The protest drew  
25 the attention of Mitch Albom, and before long, Mr. Albom,

1 through his nonprofit, SAY, Detroit Play, officially  
2 entered an agreement with the City of Detroit to reopen  
3 Lipke as a recreational, and after school programming  
4 facility for the youth of Northeast Detroit. Today, Lipke  
5 playfield is home to SAY, Played Detroit for Detroit  
6 Lions quarterback, former Detroit Lions quarterback  
7 Matthew Stafford's football field, the Detroit Tigers  
8 Judge Damon, Keith Baseball Field, and will soon debit a  
9 soccer field.

10 NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED

11 That the Detroit Board of Police Commissioners,  
12 speaking on the behalf of the citizens of the great City  
13 of Detroit, recognizes and honors the long-life  
14 contribution and commitment to excellent and public  
15 service of Ms. Karen Washington. Her display of  
16 unwavering community spirit has improved the quality of  
17 life for the citizens of Detroit. We thank and  
18 congratulate you. Through the Chair, I move that we place  
19 this resolution into the archives of the Board of Police  
20 Commissioners. Is there a second?

21 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Support.

22 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Motion made by Commissioner Banks  
23 to adopt the resolution and put in our archives and is  
24 supported by Commissioner Moore. Any discussion? All in  
25 favor say, aye.

1 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

2 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Anyone oppose? The motion is  
3 carried. Let's go to the commander of the Eleventh  
4 Precinct. Thank you very much, commissioner.

5 COMMANDER CHAMBERS: Good evening, your honorable  
6 body, the online audience and those in attendance. I'm  
7 Commander Michael Chambers. I've been the commander here  
8 at the Eleventh Precinct since September. I am blessed to  
9 be here. It's an outstanding community, and we have  
10 wonderful officers at the Eleventh Precinct. So, I'm  
11 first going to start talking about crime stats in 2024  
12 and 2025, and then I'm going to talk about various  
13 community activities we are doing within the precinct.  
14 So, due to the hard work of the Eleventh Precinct,  
15 officers with assistance from other entities around the  
16 department, we saw significant crime reductions,  
17 specifically violent crime in the Eleventh Precinct in  
18 2024. We closed the year with a 25% reduction in  
19 homicides. We had 6 less in 2024 compared to 2023. We saw  
20 a 25.7% reduction in non-fatal shootings with 25% less  
21 non-fatal shootings last year than 2023. We saw a 12.8%  
22 reduction in robberies with 16 less last year than the  
23 previous year.

24 And one of our biggest drops was a 50% reduction in  
25 carjackings with eight less than the previous year. So,

1 our strategy, which I will discuss shortly, is working.  
2 As of today, the Eleventh Precinct is either showing a  
3 reduction in or is even with 2020 fours, crime numbers in  
4 eight of the nine crime categories in 2025. So, this year  
5 when looking at our homicides year to date let me knock  
6 on something. We do not have a homicide in Eleventh  
7 Precinct this year. And at this time, last year we had  
8 five. So, for our non-fatal shootings we are, even with  
9 last year, we have two non-fatal shootings year to date,  
10 and we had two at this time last year. Our sexual  
11 assaults this year are down 66%. We, at this point, last  
12 year, we had six and we're down to two this year.

13 Our robberies; we're seeing a 36.4% reduction in our  
14 robberies. We're down 4 from this point last year.  
15 Knocked again. We have not had a carjacking this year  
16 within the Eleventh Precinct as well. So, we're even with  
17 last year, they did not have one at this time last year  
18 as well. We've also seen a 41% reduction in our motor  
19 vehicle thefts. We have 28 less vehicle thefts in our  
20 precinct this year as opposed to last year, at the same  
21 time. We're also seeing a 23.9% reduction in burglaries  
22 and an 8.8% reduction in larceny. So, like I said, there  
23 are 9 categories that we're measuring daily, and in 8 of  
24 those were either down or even with last year. So, we're  
25 off to a great start. So, the only area that we are up

1 this year is our aggravated assaults.

2 Year to date, we're up 32% in our aggravated  
3 assaults as compared to last year. So, the majority of  
4 that is our domestic violence and known offender  
5 incidents that's actually occurring within residences.  
6 So, it's awful. It makes it difficult to police. But what  
7 we're doing to combat this trend; we're working closely  
8 with our department's domestic violence section to target  
9 repeat offenders and apprehend those committing these  
10 offenses. Additionally, our precinct's assigned social  
11 worker assists in offering resources in an effort to  
12 reduce these instances of domestic violence. And she also  
13 assists victims with obtaining personal protection  
14 orders. Further, we're directing additional patrols into  
15 our scout car areas, showing the largest increases. So,  
16 now I'll talk more about our violent crime strategy that  
17 has helped to reduce our numbers, both in 2024 and 2025.  
18 We are using targeted enforcement, while we're putting  
19 additional cars in our hotspot areas out of service being  
20 proactive.

21 We're also utilizing dedicated traffic officers for  
22 increased traffic enforcement in our hotspots. We're  
23 paying special attention to our parking lots, to our  
24 bars, to our halls, to our dollar stores, and also our  
25 problem spots. We're doing weekly restore peace



1 operations, which consists of our ticket and tows are  
2 offered to engage operations and warrant sweeps. We also  
3 have what I think are the best NPOs in the city. They are  
4 focusing on our quality-of-life issues, establishing  
5 block clubs, addressing blight, recruiting additional  
6 Green Light locations. And they're regularly addressing  
7 our "See Click Fix" complaints by impounding vehicles on  
8 the street on private property and handling traffic and  
9 squatter complaints. We also have an apprehension team  
10 that goes out daily and pursues our known offenders,  
11 specifically those committing violent crimes, utilizing  
12 guns and even knives or anything like that, non-gun  
13 related as well.

14 We also have an embedded Michigan Department of  
15 Corrections agent. So, our officers will go out with that  
16 MDOC agent and do home checks on our probationers and  
17 parolees. We have a very active special operations and,  
18 and detective section that is typing up search warrants  
19 daily, which we execute as one of our tools. And we have  
20 a ceasefire unit within our precinct that goes out,  
21 responds to all the shootings, assists with evidence  
22 collection, the apprehension of suspects; and we also  
23 work with our ceasefire chaplains to go out and do  
24 messaging to the gang members and try and get them to  
25 live properly. We offer them jobs, different things to

1 get them help so that maybe they can give away from those  
2 different criminal acts. So, we have that going on as a  
3 supplement to our ongoing strategy, we have joint efforts  
4 with our neighboring precincts. So, we border the  
5 Seventh, the Ninth, and the Twelfth Precincts, as well as  
6 Highland Park, Hamtramck, Hazel Park, and Warren. As a  
7 force multiplier, we also utilize specialized units  
8 across the department. So, we'll have our CAT Unit, which  
9 is our Commercial Auto Theft Unit, come in, we'll have  
10 Narcotics, Gang Intel, and Traffic Enforcement. So, just  
11 now shifting gears over to community engagement. Like I  
12 said, our NPOs are just outstanding. They get out there,  
13 they're heavily involved attending events, and holding  
14 events. One of our NPOs, Robinson leads the Youth  
15 Explorers, which is across the city. We also go into  
16 schools, do anti-bullying, conflict resolution classes,  
17 stranger danger, gun safety tips, gun lock giveaways.  
18 Also, NPO Williams does a sisterhood program. And NPO,  
19 Eric Hill also goes and does an active assailant  
20 prevention program with schools and churches.

21 Just to talk a little bit about the upcoming  
22 community events within the Eleventh Precinct. Tomorrow,  
23 at the VFW, located at 18651 Mound from 11 to 3:00 PM  
24 we're going to have a senior Valentine's Day dance at the  
25 VFW tomorrow. On Saturday, the 22nd here at SAY Detroit

1 Play Center. We're going to have a police community  
2 summit that's going to be from 10:00 AM to 4:00 PM that's  
3 going to bring citizens in as well as our police  
4 officers. And we're going to all come together and just  
5 kind of talk from different angles, different  
6 perspectives, and see where we can meet and compromise on  
7 different things. We're also going to have a safety  
8 summit at Vernon Chapel, located at 18500 Norwood. That's  
9 going to be on February 27th. That's going to be from  
10 6:00 PM to 8:00 PM So that's going to be actually led by  
11 NPO Hill.

12 He's going to, not only talk to the churches about  
13 how to handle different incidents, should they happen in  
14 the church, but he is also going to talk to any citizens  
15 that come up and also talk to them about how they can  
16 improve safety at the residences. And lastly, we took the  
17 last couple months off with our community meetings, but  
18 we're going to start back up next month on March 11th,  
19 we're going to have our Eleventh Precinct Community  
20 Council Advisory Board meeting. And that's always the  
21 second Tuesday of the month at the Eleventh Precinct at  
22 6:00 PM And that'll conclude my report.

23 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir. Commissioner Banks.

24 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Through the Chair. Captain, I  
25 believe you mentioned you haven't had a single homicide

1 at number 11 this year.

2 COMMANDER CHAMBERS: That's correct, sir.

3 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Okay, wonderful. Now, you know,  
4 we are almost into March in about a couple of weeks. How  
5 are you having that type of success? You beefing up  
6 patrols or what are you doing special, because we are  
7 almost into March in a couple of weeks.

8 COMMANDER CHAMBERS: Well, I mean, it's citywide.  
9 There's an outstanding job being done at all the  
10 precincts across the city. It's attributed to our  
11 outstanding officers. It's attributed to our community,  
12 assisting us, working with us. There are a lot of factors  
13 that come together. We can't do it alone. We have the  
14 community working with us and, and it's been effective  
15 and we're just going to stay at it.

16 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Okay. I'm all set. Mr. Chair.  
17 Thank you, captain.

18 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Any more questions or comments  
19 for the commander? Commander, you are a great, great guy.  
20 I met you when you were in the Second Precinct, right?

21 COMMANDER CHAMBERS: Yeah, I was at the Second  
22 Precinct.

23 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah. I've known you since then.  
24 Amazing work. Great, great work you've been doing. And I  
25 was in DC with that guy back there last week. And I was

1 present at the meeting. I was just online. So, I have a  
2 record of not missing one meeting since I've been on the  
3 Board of Police Commission. But you are doing amazing  
4 work with the Explorers. Chief, you guys --- the plan  
5 that you guys are engaging this community; maybe you  
6 could speak to the community about that, or how do they  
7 engage in these vape shops and these marijuana shops  
8 that's poisoning children? I know that Commissioner  
9 Pressley was with us here in Eleventh Precinct when we  
10 engaged the shop that was selling two children in Persian  
11 High School. And a very, very powerful response from the  
12 department to close that shop down and close the other  
13 shop down; down the street. That is the type of  
14 engagement we love. But the Explorers under this man's  
15 leadership have been doing an amazing job. And we need to  
16 make sure that they are properly resourced because these  
17 children are going in there and they deserve all of the  
18 love and the attention that we can give them because they  
19 are stopping a lot of poisoning and happening in the City  
20 of Detroit.

21 INTERIM CHIEF BETTISON: Yeah. Through the Chair.  
22 Commissioner Woods, thank you for that. The Explorer  
23 program is an excellent program. And neighborhood police  
24 officer Robinson, leads that effort up citywide with the  
25 young people. And then, that also is a pipe for the young

1 folks to ultimately choose the profession of policing. As  
2 a matter of fact, when I was before City Council  
3 yesterday as well Council Member Johnson expressed her  
4 support and encouragement to continue on in supporting  
5 the Explorer program. But the explorers, under the  
6 leadership of NPO Robinson, are very beneficial and it's  
7 beneficial citywide. And oftentimes, we say as adults,  
8 when we're meeting, we're talking about what we need to  
9 do for young people. But this is an avenue where young  
10 people get to sit at the table as well and offer their  
11 input. And so, working with our police officers that are  
12 under the age of 21, we send them undercover to these  
13 smoke shops, to these liquor stores, to these gas  
14 stations along with our explorers, to attempt to purchase  
15 things that shouldn't be sold to minors.

16         And we do have gas stations and smoke shops and  
17 others that have sold vapes to them, and we're taking a  
18 hardline stance. And some of them have actually been  
19 Green Light locations. So, if you are a business and  
20 you're participating in our Green Light program and you  
21 sell an illegal product, you know, unauthorized to one of  
22 our minors, I'm going to pull that Green Light so, they  
23 will not any longer be in our Green Light program. I met  
24 with Mr. Nesor Beydoun today, and many of you know Nesser  
25 Beydoun. He was one of the original 8 Green Lights that

1 started the program. And I have his full support. And so,  
2 we're going to be calling all of the gas station  
3 operators to put them on notice. But I'm going to be  
4 taking a hardline stance and utilizing the law  
5 department, utilizing all city resources to ultimately,  
6 if they don't get their act together, shut them down.

7 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Absolutely. And we got state  
8 representative Carter here. I know that they had a  
9 building to strengthen the laws in that area. And  
10 unfortunately, we weren't able to get it done in that  
11 lame duck session. It was brutal, you know, but it was  
12 right there. And we are praying that you guys will  
13 champion that again in this legislative session to make  
14 those penalties swifter to those bad actors that's  
15 poisoning our children. Again, and you might want to talk  
16 to the state rep., to try to get you some earmark for  
17 those children too. Yes. So, thank you commander. We have  
18 a couple more people on Zoom, right? Okay.

19 MS. UNDERWOOD: Yes, Mr. Chair. We have two more  
20 speakers on Zoom. CAC, Scotty Bowman, and after Mr.  
21 Bowman, Ms. Rhonda Adams. And then that'll be it, sir.

22 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Thank you very kindly. You  
23 may be heard Mr. Bowman.

24 MR. BOWMAN: Yes. First of all, I wanted to bring up  
25 the fact that when you had the part of introducing

1 elected officials, you left me out. The Community  
2 Advisory Council is an elected body.

3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: I apologize for that.

4 MR. BOWMAN: Actually, I think it was the secretary  
5 who was reading out those names.

6 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay.

7 MR. BOWMAN: The other thing is that I originally  
8 came on to comment about. First of all, congratulations,  
9 Mr. Bettison. I know it's not done yet, and I appreciate  
10 that you're respecting the process as you must, as a non-  
11 member of the board. And as a person who's not in your  
12 shoes I of course go ahead and be presumptuous and say  
13 that I think you're going to be approved, don't worry  
14 about it. In any case there are a couple issues I think  
15 the commissioners need to pay attention to. And one of  
16 those is, again, I think you need to look into more  
17 transparency as regards to the release of videos. When  
18 there are incidents, especially officer involved  
19 shootings, (1). (2). You need to have your own attorney.  
20 You did at one time have your own attorney.

21 I understand one of the former board members who is  
22 now corporation counsel, apparently disagrees. I think  
23 you should challenge that in court. Now, how do you  
24 challenge things in court if you don't have your own  
25 attorney? Well, I know there are board members who --- or



1 at least one is an attorney. I know that there are people  
2 who agree with me who are attorneys. Perhaps you can find  
3 someone willing to represent you and challenge the  
4 corporation counsel in court so you can have your own  
5 attorney once again, which is absolutely necessary for an  
6 independent oversight board. Thank you for your time.

7 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you very kindly. Next  
8 speaker.

9 MS. ADAMS: Yes. Hi. I'm so glad to be representing  
10 the Businessmen and Women's Social Club of Detroit. My  
11 name is Ms. Adams, and what I'd like to say is, I do  
12 believe that the citizens that we are, as an at-large  
13 group, have stated from our organization thus far  
14 regarding the support of the public safety trust fund is  
15 positive. Also, other alignable emphasis with the CBI  
16 protocols for the upcoming budget. And one of the main  
17 things we want to look at when it comes to the protocols  
18 for the DDOT Plus, we want to look at the housing and  
19 transit for public safety and for our land use and equity  
20 for the City of Detroit in public health and safety.

21 Okay? And so innovative transit housing should be  
22 considered in that DDOT plus, because that's a large  
23 chunk of our budget. And if we can revise it and get some  
24 of that funding to go towards public safety and transit  
25 for housing. And what I mean by that is, there are many

1 ways to skin a cat when it comes down to having our  
2 homeless being sheltered; one being emphasis on transit,  
3 housing and for RVs, as well as making it safer for our  
4 community and putting that in our protocol. And so that  
5 is why I say, public health and safety, interaction and  
6 transit is necessary to make those types of things  
7 happen. Thank you.

8 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you very kindly. Is there a  
9 community person here for this city, for this district?  
10 If you want to come and welcome us and have any comments,  
11 I want to afford you that. I didn't see it on the agenda,  
12 but I wanted to make sure that we give you the respect  
13 that you are due. And thank you for your leadership and  
14 work that you're doing in this community.

15 MS. JACKSON: Thank you. And thank you guys for being  
16 here. My name is Kim Jackson. I'm the president of the --  
17 -

18 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: If you could talk into the mic a  
19 little bit more. Thank you.

20 MS. JACKSON: I'm the president of the Eleventh  
21 Precinct Police Community Relations Council. And of  
22 course, as it was already mentioned, we meet every second  
23 Tuesday. We take January, February off. Thank you all for  
24 being here this evening. Thank you for picking this  
25 beautiful place, Detroit SAY. I appreciate you guys

1 coming in tonight. Thank you for coming. It's so good to  
2 always see you. Interim Chief Bettison for now. But thank  
3 you for attending. That makes the community feel really  
4 good that you actually come out. You've always been a  
5 community person and I thank you for that because the  
6 community likes to see our chief. So, thank you for doing  
7 that. Thank you for always having our backs, and thank  
8 you guys for being here this evening. And if you have any  
9 questions for me, I'm here.

10 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you so much, and thank you  
11 for your hospitality. So, let's go to unfinished  
12 business. This is closed session pursuant to section 8(a)  
13 of the Open Meetings Act. I want to say that this matter  
14 remains unready when the parties are ready to advise,  
15 this item will be renewed under new business. New  
16 business; what is your pleasure? Commissioner Moore?

17 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Mr. Chairman, I'd like to make a  
18 motion to postpone items A and B under section A (7).

19 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: I think you have to do them  
20 separately.

21 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Okay. I'd like to make a motion  
22 to postpone item 7a until next meeting.

23 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Motion made by Commissioner Moore  
24 to second 7 (a). Any support?

25 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Second.

1 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Second by Commissioner

2 Dewaelsche. Any discussion? All in favor say, aye.

3 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

4 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Anyone oppose? Motion is carried.

5 What is your pleasure?

6 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Mr. Chairman, I'd like to make a  
7 motion to move item 7(b) to postpone it until next week.

8 COMMISSIONER DEWAEELSCHÉ: Second.

9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Motion made by Commissioner  
10 Moore to postpone 7(b) and second by Commissioner  
11 Dewaelsche. Any discussion? All in favor say aye.

12 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

13 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Anyone oppose? The motion is  
14 carried. Now, we are going to go to— are there other new  
15 businesses? I want to entertain a motion to rescind the  
16 appointment of Jasmine Taylor, administrative assistant  
17 to the Board of Police Commissioners.

18 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: So, moved.

19 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Support.

20 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Motion made by Commissioner  
21 Pressley. Second by Commissioner Moore. Any discussion?  
22 All in favor say, aye.

23 COMMISSIONERS: Aye. Anyone opposed? The motion is  
24 carried. Any other new business before we close? Yes.

25 COMMISSIONER DEWAEELSCHÉ: I'm not sure this is new

1 business. I just wanted to make a comment so that the  
2 chief would know. In our community in southwest Detroit,  
3 a lot of people are concerned and living in fear, as we  
4 all know. But I wanted to give a shout out to Commander  
5 Holderbaum. She has been meeting with the leadership in  
6 the community on a regular basis and has kind of allayed  
7 some of the fears that many of our people have there, as  
8 well as representative Carter having been meeting with  
9 her. And I want to thank him as well. But I wanted you to  
10 know that that is happening. And I would just say, other  
11 commanders and other precincts probably should bring up  
12 those issues because it's not just Hispanics that are  
13 being targeted. Anyone who comes from another country is  
14 being targeted. At least this is what we're hearing. So,  
15 you know, thank you for that and for the support. I just  
16 wanted you to know that she's doing a great job there.  
17 Thank you.

18 INTERIM CHIEF BETTISON: Through the Chair,  
19 Commissioner Dewaelsche, thank you for bringing that up.  
20 I was just in a meeting with her yesterday and we had  
21 representatives from all nationalities within my office,  
22 the leadership. And we had a robust conversation. And the  
23 great thing about Commander Holderbaum also is that she's  
24 fluent in Spanish. And so, we had individuals who  
25 couldn't speak English sitting in my office, and she was

1 able to translate. But all of our command staff, they  
2 have been having those conversations. We have been  
3 pushing it all the way down to our patrol officers as  
4 well. You know, we are a welcoming city. We stay within  
5 our lanes and our lane is to enforce local and state law.  
6 And I use the example all the time, just like if an FBI  
7 agent is riding down the street and they see somebody on  
8 Woodward and East Warren commit a traffic violation and  
9 run a red light, that FBI agent is not going to pull that  
10 car over and write a citation.

11 We have bright lines. And our bright line is to make  
12 sure that we are doing public safety. And so, if you're  
13 undocumented and you're the victim of a crime, I want you  
14 to feel comfortable to come into any police precinct and  
15 still report that without fear that our officers are  
16 worried about your immigration status. And so that's what  
17 we don't do. And so, folks will say, well, what do you  
18 do? How do you cooperate with ICE? Our relationship when  
19 it comes to that is, like I said, we stay within our  
20 lanes. Now, they have a job to do. They do their job. If  
21 an individual is arrested, whether you're a United States  
22 citizen or citizen from another country, and we take you  
23 into custody, well, you're going to get fingerprinted and  
24 you're going to have your information entered into the  
25 Law Enforcement Information Network.

1           When that's entered. Of course, state police, other  
2 police agencies, including custom border patrol and ICE,  
3 can see it. Now, if they're looking for you and they  
4 submit a detainer to us we will cooperate. But if you've  
5 committed a violent crime, you've committed a crime  
6 within our city, we're going to take care of you first.  
7 And so, we are going to do what we do as far as  
8 submitting a warrant to the Wayne County prosecutor. But  
9 if they do have a detainer, and when we are done with  
10 them, we will turn them over and honor that detainer.

11           COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you so much for those  
12 details. Appreciate it.

13           CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Commissioner Banks.

14           COMMISSIONER BANKS: No, I'm all set. Commissioner  
15 Dewaelsche asked what I was going to ask.

16           CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Alright. Thank you. And I just  
17 want to thank you again, chief and thank this community  
18 and thank all of the support staff for your hard work,  
19 the tech staff, and everyone in here. What is the  
20 pleasure of this board?

21           COMMISSIONER MOORE: Motion to adjourn.

22           CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Motion made by Commissioner Moore  
23 to adjourn.

24           COMMISSIONER BANKS: Second.

25           CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Second by Commissioner Banks. Any

1 discussion? All in favor say, aye.

2 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Anyone oppose? The motion is  
4 carried. This meeting is adjourned.
