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2	VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Good afternoon. I would like
3	to call this meeting to order. We will have invocation.
4	Chaplin Gregory Wilson, are you on Zoom, please?
5	CHAPLAIN WILSON: Yes, I am.
6	VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: You can go ahead.
7	CHAPLAIN WILSON: Alright. Father, we first want to
8	say thank you. We want to thank you for all that you've
9	done for us. Before we ask you to do anything, we thank
10	you for your love, your grace, your mercy, and your
11	kindness. God, we ask that you bless this board of
12	commissioners; God, that they do everything decent and in
13	order. Lord, knit them together in unity. God, crown each

15	COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: So, moved.
16	COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Support.
17	VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Move by Commissioner
18	Pressley, supported by Commissioner Moore. All those in
19	favor say, aye? Any discussion?
20	COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
21	VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Any opposed? The motion is
22	carried. I would like to entertain a motion for the
23	approval of the minutes for February 20th, 2025.
24	COMMISSIONER BERNARD: So, moved.
25	COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Support.



1	VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: Moved by Commissioner
2	Bernard and supported by Commissioner Dewaelsche. Any
3	discussion? All those in favor?
4	COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
5	VICE CHAIRPERSON SMITH: The motion carries. And now
6	we have an introduction of BOPC. Staff, chief of police,
7	elected officials, or representative and community
8	leaders.
9	MS. GARNIER: Present today are attorney Dante Goss,
10	Chief Investigator Jerome Warfield. Also, from the Office
11	of the Chief Investigator LiSonya Sloan. Felicia Tyson,
12	Mary Barber, Teresa Blossom, Candace Hayes, Artemisia
13	Joshua and Jonya Underwood. DPD HR Director Katrina
14	Patillo. For Chief of Police Todd Bettison is Assistant
15	Chief Charles Fitzgerald. Court reporter is Don
16	Handyside. Henry Jackson audio visual. Charles Henry
17	Media Services Video. Elected Officials or
18	Representatives, signed in, as of the beginning of the

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1 those registered at this time.

2 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Thank you very kindly. I 3 don't know if the record reflect that I am present, but 4 I'm present, Darryl Woods. But I think we'll go to the 5 Chief of Police Report.

6 AC FITZGERALD: Good afternoon to the honorable 7 board. Can you hear me okay?

8 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes.

9 AC FITZGERALD: All right.

MALE SPEAKER: We'll get yelled at by Commissioner
Bernard.

12 AC FITZGERALD: All right. We're going to go through 13 our crime stats briefly. The numbers continued to occur 14 in the right direction. We are 26% down in homicides, 7% 15 down in non-fatal shootings, 11% down in robberies. 16 Overall part one crime is down 13% and 6% down in carjacking. So, that's a lot of hard work. We will 17 continue with those trends. Continuing updates, just 18 briefly I want to highlight the work of the officers in 19 the Sixth Precinct. They were dispatched to the 6,700 20 block of Penrod. There was a 13-year-old that was 21 kidnapped and taken from Garden City. When the officers 22 approached they knocked on the door really, really 23 24 cleverly by this 13-year-old. She was texting her mom to 25 say where she was.



1 Officers approached the suspect in this case who, this is not his first time doing the same thing, ran into 2 the back of the house and shot himself in the head. He is 3 deceased. But the officers did an amazing job getting in 4 5 quickly and getting this 13-year-old girl back into the arms of her parents. So, great job by them. Our 6 unsheltered population distance. We just had a prep 7 conference from the city's plans for assisting our 8 unsheltered community. Moving forward, Chief Bettison is 9 directing that. We pay special attention to, not only the 10 parking structures, but just cars in general in parking 11 12 lots, folks sleeping in cars. We're going to do a 13 widespread search of that and try to find folks that are 14 trying to live in their car when they really shouldn't. 15 You know, we had an unfortunate incident last week 16 where this gentleman was sleeping in his car using a 17 propane canister to heat himself and ended up passing with his two animals. It's just awful. But we're going to 18 do a much better job of trying to identify these folks 19 and get them assistance they need. Mary Duggan has 20 21 announced that anyone who's unsheltered can go to any police precinct. And since that time, we've assisted 25 22 people finding shelters and also transported another 61 23 folks to shelters from a location. So, really good 24 positive things. Also, this week we met with some local 25



1 business owners, Chief Bettison, and the chairperson was with us and I thought it was just a really, really good 2 conversation. Very impactful. A lot of it surrounded the 3 notion of selling stuff to our children, which you know, 4 5 obviously drugs, alcohol, cigarettes, that kind of stuff. So, more to come on that. I just thought it was a really 6 good meeting; very well attended. So, we're going to do a 7 lot more in the near future. And then lastly we had 8 9 another procedural justice summit. AC Ewing had a very good group of about 30 members from the community, and 10 also Chief Bettison attended. And it was just very well 11 received. So, that concludes my report, and I'll answer 12 13 any questions you have.

14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Any questions? I would say you 15 were in the news yesterday, I believe, yesterday or the 16 day before yesterday.

17 AC FITZGERALD: Yes, sir.

18 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah. and as it relates to that 19 facial recognition matter, can you clear that up for the 20 public or address that issue?

AC FITZGERALD: Absolutely. And again, because it is an ongoing legal matter, I will say that we 100% did not use facial recognition. This case would have fulfilled the requirement for facial recognition. We didn't have an image to use. We had a blurry photo at best. The



1 detectives did what they needed to do to get to a certain location to identify a person, but it stopped there. 2 There's an ongoing investigation into that as well. More 3 to follow. But I would've liked to have seen the 4 5 detective do a lot more. And unfortunately, we did arrest 6 the wrong woman; brought her in. She was released shortly thereafter. But no one needs to be put through that. 7 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: It was shortly thereafter? 8 AC FITZGERALD: It was within the work periods of 9 10 between six to eight hours once they got her to the DDC that they did an interrogation, they talked to her and 11 12 then she was released after that. 13 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: How long do you expect that 14 investigation to take place as it relates to that part of 15 things? 16 AC FITZGERALD: Oh, probably no more than 30 days. It should be a fairly quick one. 17 18 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. 19 AC FITZGERALD: Yep. CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Any further questions? 20 21 COMMISSIONER: I just have a comment. 22 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes. 23 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you for that update. But I'd also like for the public to be aware of the fact that 24 25 about an hour ago, the mayor had a press conference in



1 this room, and it was of course, attended by the chief, 2 by the head of the housing placement center for people who need shelter, as well as the new deputy mayor, who's 3 an African-American woman and was the former head of 4 5 District 5. Very impressive, extremely impressive women, both of these women that were in charge. But what 6 occurred at that press conference was the number of 7 accolades that were given to our chairman, Mister Woods. 8 9 I was standing there, but he was the man of the hour. I did not realize that he and the mayor met personally with 10 the young mother who lost her two children in the 11 12 freezing cold in the car.

13 But not only had they met with her personally, but the chairman himself had offered his personal financial 14 15 assistance and arranged for the funeral and everything 16 that was at Reverend Solomon Kinloch's church. It was 17 very nice to hear about this interaction between the mother and the leader, not only of the board, but also 18 the leader of our city. And there were no cameras there. 19 They said nobody; it was just them. And you could tell by 20 21 the way that both the mayor and Commissioner Woods were moved by even talking about it, how significant it was. 22 And I know that it is for all of you as well because I 23 can't even talk about it frankly, without being choked 24 25 up. The thought of a 3-year-old as a corpse frozen to



1 death is more than I can even imagine.

2 And anyone in this room, I'm sure, but I just wanted you to know that (1), the chairman went above and beyond, 3 and so did the mayor. And I was very impressed, deputy 4 5 chief, I mean, Assistant Chief Fitzgerald by that, and by 6 the officer that you interviewed on TV; the man who found them, the officer who was in the car and got the kids out 7 and all that. I mean, he was almost in tears. It was 8 9 unbelievable. I mean, the compassion that the entire force has demonstrated with respect to this issue is just 10 remarkable. And it was pointed out --- I'm almost 11 12 through, hold it --- when the mayor said that another 13 mayor called him from another city and said, well, how 14 are you going to get the police department to do that? 15 Homeless people aren't going to talk to the police. They 16 hate the police. And the mayor said, not in Detroit. They 17 know that they can trust our police department. So, I just want to congratulate you, the members of the force, 18 19 certainly the chairman and the mayor for all that you've done with respect to this horrific situation. Thank you. 20 21 If you don't mind, [unclear]. But you started it. Why 22 would he pick up like 60 people and take them places? 23 Thank you.

24 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yep. Well, I'll clear up a couple 25 things. It is embarrassing for me to stay on, even those



1 things. But a lot of things I've been trying to do very, very discreetly and just didn't want things to be out. I 2 didn't help with funeral services and things like that. 3 And some things that we did help with, and I want to keep 4 5 that private, you know, because I think it's a very, very 6 sensitive matter, and I think that the family deserves 7 privacy, you know, so far as funerals and all that type of stuff. I didn't help with any of that. It was to 8 9 support the family during that time. But again, this is a very sensitive issue, and it's an issue for all residents 10 of the City of Detroit to be able to stand resolutely, to 11 12 be able to help families in distress, like I know all of 13 us care about. But what was very, very impressive is what 14 she said that I want to applaud Chief Bettison for his 15 leadership in this situation, along with the mayor and 16 the men and women of Detroit Police Department, because it was a blizzard; it was frigidly cold within the last 17 couple weeks on a whole lot of days. And for them to be 18 able to have citizens come inside the Detroit Police 19 Department and be able to get them the services that they 20 21 needed, was very, very powerful. And also, to be able to go out on the streets, I've been out on the streets with 22 23 Captain Tanya, Leonard-Gilbert and her team, going to feed those who were in distress and helping people that 24 were in distress. 25



1 And that was very, very powerful, you know? And what she has been doing for a very long time and looking 2 forward to for those services to even get stronger, you 3 know? And definitely I have to say that Commissioner 4 5 Smith has been very, very actively involved in helping in this space. And again, a lot of this stuff is 6 confidential. A lot of this stuff is private because it's 7 private and personal for these families. So, this is not 8 9 anything to be applauded for. I thank you for your 10 thoughts, though. Yes, sir. 11 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Yes. Through the Chair.

12 Wonderful extending your heart like that with supporting 13 that family, you and Vice Chair Tamara Liberty, and 14 through the Chair, also is this Mr. Long right here? Mr. Long, this gentleman here is interested in --- he calls 15 16 me a lot. He's interested in becoming a Detroit police 17 chaplain, I mean, Detroit Police Reserve. I'm sorry. Can 18 you help him out? We have the assistant chief of the Detroit Police Department right here. Can you possibly, 19 because he has a strong desire for that. He wants to 20 21 become a Detroit Police Reserve really bad. And can you 22 possibly get him some help, please, assistant chief? 23 AC FITZGERALD: Absolutely. It's done. We'll take 24 care of it.

25 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Wonderful. Right there.



1 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: See that guy in the corner. Yep. 2 All right. So, let's go to the oral communications. 3 MS. UNDERWOOD: Thank you, Mr. Chair. We have five 4 speakers in the room. We'll first start with Ms. Toni 5 McIlwain, then Mother Bernice Smith, and Ms. Fredia 6 Butler.

MS. McIlwain: My name is Toni McIlwain. I'm the 7 President of the Ravendale Community, which is a 50-block 8 area on the Eastside of Detroit. Ravendale has been very 9 fortunate to ask to play a part of the CEI zone. We are 10 11 under Family and Friends, but because there have not been 12 any service or assistance from Family and Friend, which 13 is headed by Ray Wyman,. I have been to different 14 organizations and individuals to see how we as the 15 community can play a part or at least receive assistance 16 from this organization. So, I'm asking you, and I begging you. And also, we are working on a very desperate 17 situation with Traver in which it is located on Conner 18 and Harper. And we have taken it upon ourselves to 19 investigate, because 50% of the crime that is happening 20 in Ravendale is coming from the Travelers Inn. 21

So, I have met with him. I have personally gone over there by myself and called some of the police officers to assist me in talking to them. And just last night, there was an incident that happened over there at Travelers



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Inn. So, I'm putting it out there, that we are not receiving any help from Family and Friends in terms of any service in the community. My goal has always been to get the residents involved in the total process of changing their own environment. They are the ones that are working in their community. So, I just want to put it out there that we are working very hard to get Travelers Inn closed down, so that that could be a safer community. So, I'm just letting you know that that is happening, not because of Family and Friends, but because of the community. So, if anybody knows what I should do at this point to get that type of service that is needed, or that Family and Friends is getting paid for, because Ravendale is getting nothing, the money is actually coming out of my pocket, even for community meetings. So, does anyone know of anyone that can help us and get to the bottom of

17 this, and even with the Travelers Inn, because we are 18 getting ready to put out a petition in the community.

19 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, ma'am. I want to ask one of 20 the officers to make sure that you --- well, Second 21 Deputy Chief Hope is here. Connect with her and you will 22 get a response to what your request is. And thank you for 23 the great work you're doing in the community. I know a 24 lot about you and the work that you have done. I 25 appreciate you immensely. And I will say this Travelers



Inn is, you know, it is what it is. I want to say what I 1 2 want to, you know what I'm saying? But folks are very much aware of that situation. But connect with Second 3 Deputy Chief Hope. 4 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: And through the Chair. 5 6 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes. If I may; maybe give her some direction. I don't 7 know whether or not she's also communicated with the City 8 9 Council. But just to be clear, we don't have oversight of 10 CDI. So, if you want to make grievances about whatever 11 arrangement is there, then, then the City Council will be 12 a better aid. 13 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Absolutely. 14 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Through the Chair. 15 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir. COMMISSIONER BANKS: Thank you. What District is ---16 17 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: What is she talking about, Ravendale? 18 19 COMMISSIONER BANKS: What District is Ravendale 20 located? 21 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: 4. 2.2 COMMISSIONER BELL: Mr. Chairman. 23 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes. 24 COMMISSIONER BELL: She came out of retirement. There 25 is This issue, and I'm glad that she's back. And I want



to make this a priority in reference to helping her, assisting her. She's been through the whole gamut. She knows how the system works. It is not working for Ravendale with her return. So, I just want to say, that we need to do what we need to do to address this situation.

7 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Absolutely.

8 COMMISSIONER BELL: Staying around and addressing 9 this more.

10 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah. Absolutely. Thank you 11 Commissioner Bell and rest assured that we'd be willing 12 to work with you on that to be able to --- she's going to 13 get the help she needs. It is on the radar. Are you done? 14 COMMISSIONER BANKS: I'm all set.

15 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. You may be heard.

16 MS. SMITH: Good afternoon to the commissioners. This past Tuesday, we were able to attend the funeral of Chief 17 Knox. And I'm sorry, I didn't see but one commissioner 18 there. And in the meantime, I was very fortunate to sit 19 20 with our chief and the Southfield chief; Chief Aaron 21 came. And I was very, very delighted to see him. But 22 really, my heart is heavy because of the fact of these children. When I heard about it last week, I called in 23 24 regards to it. And I'm not going to tell you who. I 25 talked with, and I made the suggestion, and I hear that



1 it is being said today. With us having all the police 2 precincts open 24 hours, my suggestion was for them to 3 have a list of all the available homes that these or 4 shelters rather, for these people that need the shelter 5 to go in at night. I cried when I heard about the 6 children in Pontiac.

There is nothing we can do about that. But that is 7 sad. That is really sad. And I hope that they take care 8 of that mother. I'm a mother and if I can do it, 9 everybody else can do it. But it was a long time ago. But 10 the fact is, mothers have to take care of their children. 11 12 It is your pleasure to have children. They didn't ask to 13 get here. It is your pleasure. And then the two that died 14 in Casino, that was unnecessary. The child didn't have 15 any clothes on. What happened, that the mother didn't 16 have a blanket or something to put on that child, and the 17 other one. Words to relatives, don't we have relatives that look out for each other? Don't you care about what 18 happens with these mothers that have these children? You 19 don't care at all. because I can see it each day when 20 things like this are broadcast on the TV and it's sad 21 that we cannot do anything about it, but I want us to be 22 more able to have facilities at the police station. I 23 want the police to be able to help a little more. Thank 24 25 you.



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1 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay, next speaker.

2 MS. BUTLER: Good afternoon.

3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Good afternoon.

MS. BUTLER: Commissioners, President Trump has shut 4 5 down the database, which kept officers who have been 6 fired inspired for violating their oath to go through 7 other cities or departments and be hired. It is up to our administrators to be vigilant and held responsible for 8 9 whom they hire. The president has issued pardons to known January 6th criminals. And some have committed more 10 crimes after being pardoned. I have stated before about 11 12 an article in the New York Times written about officers 13 being white nationalists or members of the Klan. The 14 officer who told the lady to go back to Mexico. If this 15 was his only offense, I believe he should not have been 16 fired, but disciplined. Maybe there were more egregious 17 acts he had committed that caused his firing. I believe in fairness. Commissioners, I am in the Second Precinct 18 and receive calls about our NPOs not responding because 19 they don't have workable cars. I have reported this 20 21 problem before. To do their jobs, they must have more 22 than a badge and a gun. Should the person in charge be held responsible for the needs of officers in order for 23 them to respond to the citizens. As I warned before, we 24 25 are in a time where we all need to corroborate. Thank



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1 you.

CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you so much for that.
MS. UNDERWOOD: Our next speakers will be Ms.
Charnita Williams and Minister Eric Blount. And then
we'll go into Zoom.

6 MS. WILLIAMS: Hello everyone.

7 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Hello.

8 MS. WILLIAMS: Through the Chair. I've been

9 complaining about this for the last 10 months. Officers, not just police officers from the fire department; 10 officers also lived in these facilities. Maybe 10 months 11 12 ago, somebody would've taken me seriously, and did their 13 jobs correctly? Maybe these kids would be here. I've been 14 complaining about this for a long time. I've been to INI, 15 I've been here. It has been going on for two years. But 16 for these officers to live in these facilities, if she 17 couldn't get a referral through CAM, that's not acceptable. These kids can't come back. So, now you all 18 want to act like, oh, we got this covered. So, that's 19 cool, but these kids can't come back because the funeral 20 21 was last Thursday. You sit up here behind these chairs, 22 you know what's going on. But you choose not to do your 23 job correctly. Liberty Smith, you were at one of the graduations. I've been complaining about officers. You 24 25 were the guest speaker.



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1 These officers are on the Detroit Police Department website. I continue to complain about these officers 2 living in these facilities. Like I said, these facilities 3 are not for the people that have the means to pay rent. 4 5 They are for the people who are not in the position to pay rent, period. CAMS, HANDS. I have made grievances off 6 on this for months, 10 months, like I said, now you want 7 to act like everything is good. Wood, you weren't here. 8 9 Pressley was the chair at that time? But at the end of 10 the day, you can't sugarcoat this. Because like I said, 11 if someone had done their job and investigated it, like I 12 see what's going on because everybody is calling in 13 favors. I made reports on this all the time with these 14 officers. They need that at the library. Oh, they get 15 their weapons from the Dollar store to carry into the 16 facilities because we have security. You can't come in. 17 You come in through a different way. They know exactly what they are doing. Police helicopters, drones. It is 18 19 not acceptable. 20 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you. Next speaker.

21 MINISTER BLOUNT: Good afternoon board. I'm Minister22 Eric Blount from Sacred Heart Catholic Church.

23 Commissioner Pressley, you let the cat out of the bag,
24 brother. When someone came to complain about their
25 neighborhood and the services they're not getting, you



1 said, "Hold on, wait a minute. We're not in charge of 2 that." And you are right. But yet, the Board of Police Commissioners wants to be in charge of everything else. 3 You can't have it both ways. And please, concentrate on 4 5 what you are in charge of as far as oversight is concerned. These frozen children, I don't think any of 6 you should have been there. I think the mayor should have 7 8 been there. I think everyone responsible up and down the 9 line of command has been there apologizing and asking that it never happened again. 10

11 Why do I say you all shouldn't have been there? 12 Because for a third time, a black person has been 13 misidentified with facial recognition technology. That's 14 where you should have been, at the jail apologizing to 15 that person saying, you have resources to make sure that 16 never happens again. But no, we are playing here and there, and yet for the last five years, citizen 17 18 complaints have doubled. And yet we want to run here and run there and take over everybody else's responsibility 19 and leadership. There is more than enough work to be done 20 21 right here on the board. And yes, since DPD couldn't remember Porter Burke's name, I'll say the name, you 22 should remember this time around, Donna Crutchfield. And 23 yes, this is not an unfortunate incident. You, you 24 25 destroyed the whole family. You destroyed the whole



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community. That's why no one trusts you. I don't care
 what the mayor says. There are very few people in this
 city that trust the Detroit Police Department.
 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Next speaker.
 MS. UNDERWOOD: Ms. Mcgatney, then we'll go on to

6 Zoom.

7 MS. MAGATNEY: I'm Ms. Mcgatney. My mom was 75 years old and most of the police in the City of Detroit are 8 doing a great job. I lived through the sixties and 9 10 seventies. Regardless of what you may hear, we're not in 11 those times right now. Yes, there are some changes that need to be made. My question is, last week, and if I'm 12 13 incorrect, please correct me. The federal police 14 misconduct database was deleted; federal. Do we have a 15 database here in the City of Detroit that lists police 16 officers with misconduct? Thank you.

17 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: You want to answer that question? 18 AC FITZGERALD: Yeah. For the City of Detroit, our 19 Professional Standards Bureau has their own database that 20 keeps track of all the officers that have had issues both 21 criminal and administrative.

22 MS. MCGATNEY: So, how would the federal government 23 affect Detroit?

AC FITZGERALD: Truthfully, it won't affect us at 25 all, ma'am. I'm sorry. Through the Chair. We do our own



background checks. We do our own searching through all - the new applicant comes; we do exhaustive research to
 find out they're a qualified candidate for the City of
 Detroit.

5 MS. MCGATNEY: Thank you.

6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I have a question, Mr.

7 Chairman, if you don't mind? Oh, I didn't know. I'm

8 sorry. Go ahead.

9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Go ahead.

10 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: As I recall, we changed the 11 policy that said that disciplinary action regarding 12 police officers would be deleted from their files after, 13 what is it, two years or three years? What is it? What's 14 the time limit? Because there's no record --- after that 15 the discipline is gone, in response to --- what? 11 16 months?

AC FITZGERALD: Through the Chair, it's two years to be used against them, something that is current. But we keep track and we hold onto everything in their personnel file. So, we have a dating back from the time they start to the time they leave.

22 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: But it's not public 23 information because the complaint to us came from the 24 press itself because when they promote people and stuff, 25 they want to look up everything on everybody. And now,



the policy was changed. That's a fact. I remember, I was
 sitting here.

3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Chief Warfield, did we see a 4 complaint on that?

CI WARFIELD: We didn't receive a complaint to my 5 6 knowledge on it. However, I will say that we also keep the disciplinary records of the police officers from the 7 time that they come into the department, to the time that 8 9 they vacate the department. And the allegations, whether they were sustained or not sustained, are all there and 10 what they did. So oftentimes, we get requests for 11 12 disciplinary records, especially during promotion times. 13 And when the officers are coming back to the city the 14 department reaches out to us and we provide that 15 information, so they can compare it with their systems as 16 well.

17 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: No offense, but this was 18 negotiated with the union. I remember when it changed. 19 Well, you know what I'm talking about, I assume.

20 CI WARFIELD: I think we're speaking about different 21 things, ma'am. What we're saying is the record is always 22 there with us. We always have the record of what 23 happened. Whether that disciplinary measure is or is not 24 used against an officer is not our concern. But we keep 25 records of every disciplinary action that has been taken



and any complaint that has been filed against an officer,
 we keep that on file in our office.

3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: There have been times that we've 4 been asked to acknowledge officers who have retired and 5 looked at their disciplinary record and said that we were 6 not going to acknowledge that based upon the lengthy 7 discipline record, you know? And so, it's there. We get 8 it all the time, you know. So, thank you, ma'am, and 9 thank you, AC. Any further public commenters?

MS. UNDERWOOD: Yes, sir. We're going into Zoom. We have five speakers on Zoom. Our first speaker will be Ms. Julie, after Ms. Julie, Monkey Wrench Roo, and then Ms. Taura Brown.

14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: You may be heard.

15 MS. LYMAN: Good afternoon, commissioners. My name is 16 Juliet Lyman, and I'm here for different reasons. I've 17 been trying to contact Commissioner Darryl Woods. Council president's office referred me to him regarding my 18 husband Coral Lyman, who was currently incarcerated. He 19 spent five years and 11 months doing time. We were 20 granted an appeals bond where he was out on a GPS Tether 21 for four years and two months. And recently, on January 22 the 16th, after restoring relationships with his family 23 24 and everything; all has been forgiven and well; we had a court date January 16th, in front of a judge and sent him 25



1 back to prison where he, you know, established life. He's a pastor. He is a businessman, a husband, a grandfather, 2 a father. And so, I'm just trying to get some type of 3 support or some information resources from Commissioner 4 Woods, if possible, or any of the commissioners that 5 could assist me with just trying to navigate to move 6 7 forward to see how we can, you know, figure out something here. I don't know. I'm just trying to get some 8 assistance. 9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: I think I did get that the staff 10 did send me your telephone number. 11 12 MS. LYMAN: Yes, sir. CHAIRPERSON WOODS: I will get with you within the 13 14 next several days. 15 MS. LYMAN: Sounds good. 16 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Alright. You may be heard. Next speaker. 17 MONKEY WRENCH ROO: Darryl Woods. Listen up. Pay 18 close attention. Willie Bell, when I told you back in 19 2021 that I was different, I meant it. Now, Tamara 20 21 Liberty Smith, you pay close attention as well too. 22 Dietrich Mott, detective at the Eighth Precinct on July 16th, 2020 opened up an aggravated assault complaint, 23 24 based on the information that he gathered and got, when he arrived on the scene at the house where Kaneisha 25



1 Coleman was shot at, murdered, not suicide. He opened up an aggravated assault complaint on July 18th, 2020. That 2 complaint was turned over to Homicide. When Kaneisha met 3 her demise. And then, it was assigned to investigator 4 5 Marco Prasad, and he and the former captain of the Homicide Unit. Derek Maye concocted a scheme. They 6 7 ignored the aggravated assault complaint because there's no mention of it anywhere after it was turned over to 8 9 them. And they tried to push the suicide narrative, Kaneisha did not shoot herself. So, that's a false, 10 erroneous, bogus narrative. Now, there's a 7½ to 10-11 12 minute time period where Charmaine McLeod was dropped off 13 at McDonald's after leaving her house where Kenisha was 14 shot at. Now, her grandmother dropped her off, went to 15 her house. Before her grandmother got to her house, which 16 was a 7-to-10-minute tops away. She got a call from 17 Charmaine saying she had to get picked up because Kaneisha shot herself. Well, how the fuck did she know 18 19 Kaneisha shot herself?

20 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Just cut that off. Cut that off, 21 for using profanity. Can't use profanity in this public 22 domain like that. And you know, I'm going to shut up. 23 Next speaker.

24 MS. UNDERWOOD: Ms. Brown.

25 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: You may be heard. Ms. Brown, you



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1 may be heard if you are there.

2 MS. UNDERWOOD: I'll come back to her, sir.

3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yep.

MS. UNDERWOOD: Our next two speakers will be former
Commissioner William Davis and Ms. Betty Varner.

6 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: You may be heard, Commissioner7 Davis.

8 MR. DAVIS: Good evening. Can I be heard?

9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir.

10 MR. DAVIS: Okay. It's good I could be heard because 11 last week I had my hand up, but I wasn't able to do 12 public comments.

13 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: I apologize for that. They sent14 me a text on that. Take an extra minute today.

MR. DAVIS: Oh, I don't need the extra minute. Thank 16 you though.

17 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Thank you.

MR. DAVIS: Okay. I'd like to start off by saying 18 that I think that the police chaplains and the reserve 19 should get a stipend or at least gas cards. I think they 20 21 are doing very important work and very beneficial. Also, I think we need to make sure that all of the neighborhood 22 police officers have vehicles. Because, sometimes I've 23 been hearing complaints that they're not able to do 24 25 everything they should be doing, because sometimes



vehicles are not available. So, it would be good if you 1 all could have someone check and make sure that they do 2 have vehicles readily available. I think they do a vital, 3 very important job. And I think there should be more 4 neighborhood police officers. I think that would help to 5 reduce some of the tension that we have in the 6 neighborhood. Because far too often it's little things to 7 build up to big things. 8

9 If you can nip them in the bud early, we could 10 probably, you know, drop our crime even more. Then maybe my homeowner's insurance and my vehicles --- I might be 11 able to pay lower insurance because I think our insurance 12 13 rates are too high. So, anything you all could do to help 14 to reduce that. And also, for Fitzgerald, recently, no 15 Detroit police officers came to the ALL PAC meetings. I 16 know they used to come regularly. I remember one-time Bettison used to come before he was chief. This was a few 17 years back. Anyway, have a good weekend. Be safe 18 19 everyone.

20 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you very kindly. AC can you
21 address the issue about the vehicles?

AC FITZGERALD: Through the Chair, this is the first I'm hearing of them. I have the feeling they want new cars, most likely. I believe all the NPOs are assigned vehicles. The NPOs that live inside the city are assigned



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those vehicles to take home; those that don't have to 1 park it at their station. But I have not heard that 2 they're that short of vehicles. They are probably short 3 4 of vehicles and they are short because they need to stop 5 cracking them up. We're self-insured in the police 6 department. Don't tear up a car and think you're getting a brand new one again. So, I have not heard of NPOs, but 7 I have it in my notes. I'll take a look. 8 9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Alright, thank you very, very

10 kindly.

11 AC FITZGERALD: Certainly.

12 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yep. Next speaker.

MS. VARNER: Good afternoon to all within the sound 13 14 of my voice. I'm Betty A. Varner, president of Desoto-15 Ellsworth Block Association. I want to give kudos to the 16 NPOs of the Tenth Precinct. They have been very, very 17 good at assisting my association. When we have issues, they come and they're part of our events. They come to 18 our block club meetings. And if my NPO Officer Sumpter 19 isn't available, one of the other NPOs will step up. We 20 21 have a good rapport with the captain. But the little tidbit I have is that we cannot keep a commander at the 22 10th. And we feel that community relationships are very 23 important. I work hard on building rapports and letting 24 25 everyone know what's going on in our community. And I was

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trying to get to Chief Todd Bettison, but I couldn't get his telephone number because I wanted to have a conversation with him. I'm not complaining. Just a little

tidbit. If and when we get a new commander on the 10th, 4 5 I'm hoping we can get someone that we can build a relationship with that will be there for a while and work 6 with us and be involved in the continuation of keeping 7 our community safe. A good job is being done. I'm not 8 complaining, but I take pride in having a relationship 9 with the Tenth. And it's like, it's a revolving door. So, 10 thank you for this time. God bless you all. Take care. 11 12 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you very kindly. Next 13 speaker.

MS. UNDERWOOD: I'm going back to Taura Brown, sir.MS. BROWN: Hello, can you all hear me?

16 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, we can't hear you. You may 17 be heard.

MS. BROWN: Thank you. I just wanted to say that on 18 Monday, Detroit, COC will be having a meeting from 2:00 19 PM to 4:30 PM at 18100 Meyers, which is the Northwest 20 21 Activity Center. Public comment regarding homelessness and the incident with Tatiana Williams will take place 22 from 3:20 to 4:30. And if anybody has any grievances that 23 24 they want to air, and I heard one today, that is where 25 you need to bring it. I appreciate the police commission



and the police officers and all their effort with the 1 Tatiana Williams situation and the other various 2 situations affecting homeless people in the city. 3 However, it's not fair to turn police officers and police 4 commissioners into social workers. The city has social 5 workers at press conferences where the failures of 6 homelessness are being discussed. HRD, CAM, the COC, 7 nonprofits and HUD need to be standing there next to the 8 mayor, given an explanation as to why kids are still 9 dying. Yes. This year it was Tatiana Williams', two 10 children. I think her name was Amelia, and the little 11 12 boy's name was Darryl Jnr. Let's not forget, 2018 when 13 Kamaya Davis drowned in sewage because her mother lived 14 in an abandoned house owned by a friend. This cannot 15 continue to happen, and we should not be resting it at 16 the feet of the Detroit Police Commission meeting. You 17 all need to come out to the Northwest activity center and speak to the people who are in charge of this 18 homelessness. And regardless of what you are being told 19 about, there's not enough money to impact homelessness, 20 that is a lie. I'm on the board of the COC. I see the 21 money that Detroit gets. It's time to stand up and make 22 these shelters accountable. Make the COC and HRD 23 24 accountable and say something if you are experiencing 25 homelessness. Thank you.



CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you very kindly. 1 MS. UNDERWOOD: That's our last speaker, Mr. Chair. 2 3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, you may be heard. COMMISSIONER BANKS: Thank you. This is for AC 4 5 Fitzgerald. What's the difference between a taser and a 6 stun gun? AC FITZGERALD: I don't know that there necessarily 7 is a difference between a taser and a stun gun. 8 9 COMMISSIONER BANKS: There are two different names 10 though? 11 AC FITZGERALD: Different names, but same device. 12 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Okay. Thanks. 13 AC FITZGERALD: The joules are electronically charged 14 that gives you a nice little zap that knocks you down. 15 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Okay. 16 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Let's go to the secretary's 17 report. MS. GARNIER: The report predicts, sir. You will find 18 under tab five the two reports that were received in your 19 office this week, and the announcements are as follows: 20 The next board meeting is next Thursday, March 6th, 3:00 21 22 PM here at headquarters. The next community meeting is Thursday, March 13th, and in the Tenth Precinct at Union 23 24 Carpenters and Millwrights Skilled Training Center, which is located at 11687 American Street in Detroit. The 25



committee meetings are upcoming: Policy Committee will 1 meet next Tuesday, March 4th, 5:00 PM in this room, 2 Skylar Herbert Conference room. And on March 11th, the 3 Citizen Complaints Committee will meet in the Woodward 4 Conference room at 4:00 PM here at Public Safety 5 6 Headquarters. And that's the report for today's meeting, sir. 7 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you very kindly. Any 8 unfinished business? 9 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Unfinished business. 10 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Unfinished. Okay. Yes, sir. 11 12 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. 13 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir. 14 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I quess this will be a question 15 to the Chair because I don't think our secretary may be 16 aware of it because it was before her time, before she 17 arrived, I know the board has voted to rename, I'm sorry to name the board's conference room after the late Ron 18 Scott. And I know we celebrate Black History Month now, 19 and not many of us remember the great works of the late 20 great Coleman Alexander Young who created the Board of 21 Police Commissioners, but Ron Scott, you know, was a 22 trailblazer in our community, speaking truth to power, 23 24 and definitely was known for coming to board meetings and being outspoken on key issues. And when it comes to 25



police brutality and police oversight, but also gave a lot of recommendations over the years. We, as a board, had voted to name the conference room after him. I wonder, do we have any updates or anything about the planning of that? Because it was something that we voted on a while back.

7 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: I would say that that's something that we do need to move on; on being able to get some 8 9 signage lists, work with Ms. Blossom, as well as the secretary to be able to make that a reality. You know, I 10 don't know, reach out to his family if he has family 11 12 still around. And I think it should be something that we 13 really need to move on. I want to see us move on expeditiously too, because that is something that we 14 should do. We voted for it, and we should move on that. 15 16 So, Ms. Blossom as well as secretary, let us have a plan of action as soon as possible in terms of working with 17 Commissioner Burton and any other commissioners on being 18 able to get this done as soon as possible. Yes, sir. 19 20 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I just wanted to say that the 21 late Ron Scott, he helped us board out tremendously. I 22 mean, he pointed out a lot of things that we should know, 23 when it comes to policies. And he was really big on 24 accountability. I just want to just add that, and I just 25 can't wait to see that; the conference room named after

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1	him and see it used by you on this board.
2	CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Absolutely. Thank you for
3	reminding us of that. Any new business?
4	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Through the Chair?
5	CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes ma'am.
6	COMMISSIONER CARTER: I'm not sure about the postings
7	for the Personnel and Training Committee. I'm ready to
8	proceed with the motion. I know that we discussed some
9	things in the meeting Tuesday, but I'm ready to proceed
10	with the motion so that we can get the positions posted.
11	CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Please do.
12	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Okay. So, at this time I move
13	that the job postings and descriptions for the
14	administrative assistant grade two with a salary range of
15	\$43,015 to \$64,465 be posted.
16	COMMISSIONER MOORE: Support.
17	COMMISSIONER BURTON: Support.
18	CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Motion made by Commissioner
19	Carter and supported by Commissioner Moore. Any
20	discussion? All in favor say, aye.
21	COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
22	CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Any one opposed? The motion is
23	carried.
24	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Through the Chair.
25	CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes.



1 COMMISSIONER CARTER: At this time, I moved to a job 2 posting for administrative specialists' grade three with 3 a salary range of 67,726 to 77,634.

4 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: That's for BOPC?

5 COMMISSIONER CARTER: BOPC.

6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Second.

7 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Alright. Motion made by

8 Commissioner Carter, second by Commissioner Bernard. Any

9 discussion? All in favor say, aye.

10 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

11 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Anyone opposed? The motion is 12 carried.

13 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Through the Chair?

14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, ma'am.

15 COMMISSIONER CARTER: I'd like to say that the

16 Personnel and Training Committee did meet on Monday, and

17 this is the result, except that we had on one of the job

18 descriptions, we had the wrong title. So, the correct

19 title is what we moved today?

20 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes. Absolutely. Thank you, very 21 kindly, and thank you for moving expeditiously on this. 22 The community should know that these positions help us 23 keep this organization moving effectively and 24 efficiently. Commissioners have time to do a bunch of 25 things. We do a lot of things in our private and social



1 lives, and all kinds of things. And we have a staff that is hired to be able to investigate citizen complaints. 2 And when I want to make sure that we have on the agenda 3 very, very soon is that we can have Ms. Barbara as well 4 as Chief Warfield to take time out to update this 5 6 community in terms of where we are on citizen complaints 7 and how they are being responded to, and how this organization is thoroughly engaged in doing the business 8 of the citizens of the City of Detroit effectively and 9 efficiently. And I'm very, very happy to say that for the 10 very most part, that we have a great staff that's doing 11 12 the work. And so, you see us on a weekly basis, but 13 they're working tirelessly five days a week and beyond to 14 be able to do the work to be able to address citizen 15 complaints. Anything else before we close out? Yes. 16 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I just want to acknowledge, once again, the great work that Commissioner Carter is 17 doing in District 6, really out there rolling up her 18 sleeves, along for her husband, the state rep. Tyrone 19 Carter are really blessing a lot of families over in 20 District 6, you know, doing this whole flooded water main 21 break issue. But more importantly, they are really 22 helping --- I guess I'll let her share, but they put up 23 24 these nice little kits, but they are out there touching families, I guess you're getting over a hundred calls. 25



1 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Through the Chair. We've come together with a lot of community organizations including 2 LA SED, SER Metro, the Ambassador Bridge, the Gordy 3 Howell Bridge Authority along with my AmeriCorps program 4 5 at Wayne State University. And we did have a --- was it 6 yesterday? Distributed food with gift cards for the grocery store that's located right in that community. So, 7 they would spend the money locally. We put together 8 cleaning kits which included bleach, they had dog 9 supplies, beds, diapers, just a lot of different things. 10 We just had to put it together because it's what the 11 12 community was out there requesting. Heaters, 13 dehumidifiers, all that kind of stuff. 14 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Forgotten Harvest. 15 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Forgotten Harvest. Yes. Thank 16 you. COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair. Just to add, 17 if I may, is that the communities, you know, they see 18 commissioners in meetings. They don't see what the 19 commissioner's doing outside of the meetings, how many 20 families they are blessing, families that they're 21 touching, you know, popup lessons. You have a lot of 22 23 families in need across the city, but the Carter family have always stepped up, and have always shown the way 24 over in District 6. They consider the Carters like the 25



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1 mayor of Southwest.

2 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Be careful now.

COMMISSIONER BURTON: Or the Governor of Southwest, 3 but have held Southwest down for many, many years and 4 it's still holding it down together, blessing families in 5 need. But they are doing it, you know, they are digging 6 7 deep in their own pockets blessing people, but they also know how to work with a coalition. They are really 8 9 getting the job done. But, you know, I forgot to throw in 10 _ _ _

11 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Please don't.

12 A lot of people may not know this, Pressley does it13 every year. Commissioner Pressley.

14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Every day.

15 COMMISSIONER BURTON: First giving kids, children 16 backpacks, you know making sure that every child has a 17 backpack and have material to start school.

18 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Commissioner Carter, want 19 to ---

20 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Give the a the chance to see 21 that?

22 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: She wants to say something.

23 Commissioner Carter.

24 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you Commissioner Burton
25 for your accolades. We're going to move on to --- I know



1 that there's an issue with Ms. Barber and I wanted to see if we can get that addressed, being a task member, a task 2 employee or something like, and something needs to happen 3 4 for her to be moved into her permanent position. 5 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Well, that has been rectified. 6 COMMISSIONER CARTER: It's been rectified? Okay. 7 MS. GARNIER: It's in the final stage. I was given the date of March 3rd yesterday. 8 9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: We've rectified that. It was just 10 catching up. COMMISSIONER CARTER: Alright, thank you. 11 12 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yep. Alright. 13 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Through the Chair. Right here. 14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yep.
