10 BOARD OF POLICE COMMISSIONERS MEETING

11 March 13, 2025 at 6:30 P.M.

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3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: It is 6:30 P.M., March 13th, 2025.

4 The Board of Police Commissioners meeting is called to

5 order. We have Commander Chaplin, Mike Cadotte, or

6 Cadotte to provide the invocation this evening. You can

7 tell us how to pronounce it --- did I get it right?

8 CHAPLAIN CADOTTE: Close, sir. Mike Cadotte.

9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Cadotte. Okay.

10 CHAPLAIN CADOTTE: Thank you, sir, to you and through

11 you, to the Board of Commissioners, and to those gathered

12 here today. On this, a very holy time where so many are

13 fasting, praying, and discerning the call of God. We give

14 thanks for this meeting and ask for God's blessings upon

15 it. May God bless this honored commission and the work

16 that they do that is so important to the police

17 department, the citizens of the City of Detroit. And God,

18 may your wisdom flow through them and your peace flow

19 through them and touch their minds and their hearts as

20 they do this most important duties tonight. We also ask

21 for your wisdom to travel with our police officers in our

22 police department, and ask your blessings upon them. And

23 may your angels travel with all of our officers and keep

24 them in all of us, free and safe from any and all evils,

25 before them, behind them, beside them, beneath them, and

1 above them. We thank you for their service. I also pray,  
2 oh Lord, for peace and love to be upon all of the  
3 citizens of the City of Detroit, and those gathered here  
4 tonight. And at the conclusion of this important meeting,  
5 and when the work is concluded, I pray for safe travels  
6 home for all of us. And may we all find peace, love, and  
7 joy in our home lives as well. In your most holy and  
8 exalted name, I pray. Amen.

9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Amen. Please call the roll.

10 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Woods - Present.

11 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Smith - Present.

12 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Bernard - Attorney Linda  
13 Bernard, District 2, present.

14 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Banks - Present.

15 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Bell is excused.

16 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Burton is excused.

17 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Carter - Here.

18 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Moore - Present, District  
19 7.

20 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Hernandez - Present.

21 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Dewaelsche- Present.

22 MS. GARNIER: 8 present, sir.

23 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: We have a quorum. I entertain a  
24 motion for the approval of the March 13th, 2025, agenda.

25 COMMISSIONER MOORE: So, moved.

1 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Second.

2 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Moved by Commissioner Moore,  
3 second by Commissioner Bernard. Any discussion? All in  
4 favor say, aye.

5 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

6 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Anyone opposed? The motion is  
7 carried. I entertain a motion for the approval of the  
8 minutes of March 6th, 2025.

9 COMMISSIONER SMITH: Support.

10 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Second.

11 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Motion moved by Commissioner  
12 Smith and supported by Commissioner Hernandez. Any  
13 discussion? All in favor say,

14 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

15 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Anyone oppose? The motion is  
16 carried. Introduction of BOPC Staff, Chief of Police,  
17 Elected Officials or Representatives of Community  
18 Leaders.

19 MS. GARNIER: Present at this time, through the  
20 Chair, attorney Dante Goss, chief investigator Jerome  
21 Warfield senior. Drew Fries, Felicia Tyson, Teresa  
22 Blossom, Candace Hayes, Artemisia Joshua, Jonya  
23 Underwood. Investigator Supervisor Ainsley Cromwell, DPD,  
24 HR Director, Katrina Patillo, Deputy Chief Jacqueline  
25 Pritchett for Chief of Police Todd Bettison. Our

1 interpreters on Zoom today are Ms. Yakata and Dr.  
2 Stephanie Beatty. Court reporter is Don Handyside, Audio  
3 Visual. Andre Jackson, Media Services Charles Henry.  
4 Elected Officials and Representatives registered at this  
5 time are Marie Overall of Office of State Representative  
6 Tyrone Carter, Fredia Butler, I believe is here,  
7 president of the 2nd Precinct, Community Relations. LaDon  
8 Davis, office of City Council member Fred Durhal III. I  
9 don't believe I saw either the union president here as of  
10 yet, and former Detroit Police Commissioner William  
11 Davis. That ends the list of officials and  
12 representatives.

13 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. I'd like to thank  
14 Commissioner Moore and Commissioner Carter for their  
15 great, great leadership and providing a meal for everyone  
16 today. Two special commissioners whom I admire a great  
17 deal and am really thankful to them to be able to serve  
18 in this capacity. And I know that we are in, I think you  
19 guys shared the districts together. I will split it off,  
20 Commissioner Moore.

21 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Ladies first, Commissioner  
22 Carte,. Mr. Chair.

23 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Me first?

24 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes.

25 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Well, just welcome to the 10th

1 Precinct. Thank you all for being here. I really  
2 appreciate all of you. It takes a village for everything,  
3 and I'm glad that everyone is here tonight. Thank you.

4 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Absolutely.

5 COMMISSIONER MOORE: And I'll just like to add, you  
6 know, it's four commissioners that represent the 10th  
7 Precinct, and I'm glad that Commissioner Carter heard the  
8 call to assist. So, this is my last year, as you well  
9 know as police commissioner. I didn't want to leave you  
10 all saying, "Well, who's going to be next? Who is going  
11 to be next? So, the two candidates that might --- one who  
12 might get elected or will get elected are present today.  
13 So, get a chance to meet and greet them. I'm not leaving  
14 you high and dry. I live in the 10th precinct, so you'll  
15 be seeing more of me. Thank you. And God bless each and  
16 every one of you.

17 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Alright. Yes, sir.

18 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Commissioner Moore, who are the  
19 two?

20 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: No, no, no.

21 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Okay. Well, I tried.

22 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: I don't want us to go to jail.  
23 There are too many police here.

24 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Okay. I have one more.

25 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir.

1 COMMISSIONER BANKS: One more thing. Commissioner  
2 Moore and Commissioner Carter, I just want to ask you,  
3 where did you get the delicious food?

4 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Well, President Stokes, when I  
5 put out the email, he responded. He said, "Hey, I know a  
6 great guy. Chef CJ," and that's Chef CJ in the middle.  
7 So, if you all like the food, give him a round of  
8 applause.

9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: I gave them a good tip, man.

10 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Oh, you did. Okay.

11 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: You know, so they deserve it.  
12 Service is the rent we pay for the space that we occupy.  
13 Certainly, they are in the service field to be able to  
14 make people feel better. So, we really thank you guys for  
15 your hospitality and your service. It was nothing but  
16 impeccable. Your smiles make it better for us. So, let's  
17 get to the Chief of Police Report. Deputy Chief  
18 Pritchett.

19 DC PRITCHETT: Through the Chair. These stats are  
20 from today's date. So, our homicides we're down 15  
21 incidents or 16%. Our nonfatal shootings were down 25  
22 incidents for a total of 28%. Our robberies were down 28  
23 for a 15% reduction. Our carjackings, we are down 8 for a  
24 reduction of 33%. And our overall part one, violent  
25 crimes were down 227 incidents for a total of 12%. So,

1 for the community updates on Tuesday, March 11th, at  
2 approximately 5:45 PM, officers from the 10th Precinct  
3 responded to a home in the 8,700 block of DeSoto for a  
4 dead person. They spoke with a female resident who said  
5 she left the home for about an hour and returned to find  
6 the door locked. She entered through the window and saw a  
7 male in his 60s, deceased. She then left and called 911.  
8 Officers from the 10th Precinct responded, went to the  
9 home and found an additional victim, a female in her 60s  
10 also deceased.

11 We are investigating this incident and ask anyone  
12 with any information to call our Major Crime Division at  
13 596 2260. Crime Stoppers at 1-800-SPEAKUP or visit  
14 detroitrewards.tv. So, on Friday, March 7th, we held our  
15 women's walk to celebrate International Women's Day, and  
16 all the female members of DPD. It was a successful event  
17 with a great turnout Chief Bettison and other department  
18 executives attended. So, on Saturday, last Saturday,  
19 March 8th, our neighborhood police officers in the St.  
20 Vincent and Sarah Fisher Center gave away school  
21 supplies, clothing, toys, and other items to more than  
22 200 members of the community. So, Chief Bettison also met  
23 with other police chiefs from around the State at the  
24 Michigan Association of Chiefs of Police this week. So,  
25 as you know, we have officers that are visiting schools



1 periodically to help with reading. So, officers from  
2 several of our precincts continue to visit schools across  
3 the city and read to students for reading month.

4 So, this is our recruiting event. So, this week we  
5 had our DPD Great Readiness Program event where we  
6 welcomed those interested in applying to DPD to learn  
7 more about the application process. Chief Bettison was  
8 there and spoke to the prospective applicants. On  
9 Saturday, March 15th from 7:00 AM to 5:00 PM at our  
10 training center is our one day hiring event. This is  
11 where those interested can apply to DPD and complete a  
12 large portion of the hiring process in one day. We  
13 encourage anyone who is looking for a rewarding career to  
14 come out on Saturday and join the DPD. Also, we had one  
15 member who was at home. She was assigned to the 5th  
16 Precinct. And on February 27th at approximately 2:42 AM  
17 she was the passenger in a fully marked scout car  
18 responding to a 911 dispatch police run. And they were  
19 rear ended while they stopped at a red light. And she  
20 sustained head, neck, and back injuries. She was conveyed  
21 to DRH for treatment. She's scheduled to follow up at DMC  
22 Rehabilitation Institute of Michigan on March 19th. So,  
23 she's currently at home recuperating. So, that is our  
24 report.

25 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Any questions? Yes

1 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I have a couple of co comments  
2 and one question. I'll start with the question. In the  
3 calls for service deputy chief, it indicates that we have  
4 had 3045 calls for mental health related reasons. Of  
5 those approximately 829 were, I'm sorry, nonviolent, but  
6 1200 of those were violent. And the other thing I want to  
7 call to the attention of our community, is the fact that  
8 we've had 1024, just this little year to date overdoses.  
9 My question number one is, were the overdoses related to  
10 fentanyl or what? And then my second question related to  
11 the first point regarding mental health related calls. A  
12 number of those, they say, were not responded to. And I'm  
13 just wondering why we would not, service calls versus  
14 serviced calls?

15 DC PRITCHETT: Through the Chair, ma'am, I really  
16 don't know the cause of the overdoses, what drugs they  
17 were taking. I can find that out and get it back to the  
18 board. And secondly, I don't have the information in  
19 front of me to see what you're looking at as far as calls  
20 not serviced. It's my understanding, whenever 911 is  
21 called, the cars are dispatched, those runs are answered  
22 unless the call is canceled or EMS gets there and the  
23 person is conveyed to the hospital.

24 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Okay. The other thing is that,  
25 can you tell us what happened on the 15th? Well, it's

1 coming up. I'm sorry. I wanted to know about that. But my  
2 real question is, why are we still recruiting when we  
3 have all the positions filled?

4 DC PRITCHETT: You know, I think we are at a 98%,  
5 through the Chair. I'm sorry. I think we are at like a 97  
6 or 98% filled rate. But we have officers that are 27/28  
7 years of service who are deciding to retire. So, we have  
8 to constantly hire to replace that due to attrition.

9 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: But as I understand it, MCOLES  
10 is back to more than a thousand people just trying to do  
11 certifications on people. So, it's going to be a long  
12 time before we can hire anybody if we're going to hire  
13 only after they passed MCOLES.

14 DC PRITCHETT: Through the Chair, ma'am, we had a  
15 hiring on March 10th there in academy. They started  
16 Monday. So, we are currently hiring.

17 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: They're MCOLES certified after  
18 they start here. Is that what you're saying?

19 DC PRITCHETT: Through the Chair, ma'am. Once they  
20 complete the academy and pass the post-test, then they  
21 become MCOLES certified.

22 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Okay. Thank you.

23 DIRECTOR PATILLO: And licensed.

24 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Any further questions? There are  
25 no others --- oh, yes, sir.

1           COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Thank you. Through the Chair,  
2 my question may be a bit granular, but it's a response to  
3 a CCR that I read. I know that it is one of the special  
4 orders that is here to be considered upcoming. But there  
5 was an incident where someone was having their property  
6 searched. There was a warrant for the search. However,  
7 the search began before the owner of the property  
8 arrived. And she was requesting to see the search warrant  
9 but the officers declined to provide her the search  
10 warrant upon her request but said it would be left in the  
11 property. And obviously, there was no violation of the  
12 policy because the policy didn't detail that the officers  
13 were required to provide the search warrant upon request.  
14 But I was just wondering what would be the rationale as  
15 to why officers wouldn't provide a search warrant to an  
16 individual when requested as opposed to just saying it'd  
17 be left once the search is completed.

18           DC PRITCHETT: Through the Chair, I'm going to have  
19 Commander Michael Parish, who is part of our legal team  
20 to answer that question.

21           CMDR PARISH: Good evening, everyone. We have to  
22 remember when a search warrant is being executed, there  
23 is a lot going on at a particular house. And sometimes it  
24 is simply safer for the officers to finish what they are  
25 doing at the scene and then leave the search warrant at a

1 conspicuous place inside. That way you don't have  
2 personnel having a discussion while the search warrant  
3 process is still being played out. You're right,  
4 Commissioner, there is no legal requirement that we give  
5 them a copy of the search warrant at the time they ask  
6 for it. But our policy is always to leave a copy of the  
7 warrant and a copy of the return in a conspicuous place,  
8 if no other place at the conclusion, once the search  
9 warrant has been executed.

10 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Thank you. And so, in  
11 response to that, the chair of our Policy Committee might  
12 want to make a notation of that because that might be of  
13 interest to citizens as we do review that policy coming  
14 forward, whether or not citizens are okay with the  
15 understanding that there's a lot going on. I definitely  
16 sympathize with that. But again, on behalf of the  
17 citizens who are seeing a lot going on and not knowing  
18 whether or not that documentation is available, that may  
19 be something to be considered.

20 CMDR. PARISH: And if I could add, sometimes it  
21 depends on the type of crime that's under investigation.  
22 So, how a narcotics location is rated differs  
23 substantially from a house that might be entered, or a  
24 business that might be entered for something that's not  
25 easily disposable. Like if you're looking for stolen

1 tires, it can be very hard for somebody to throw a bunch  
2 of them away while you show them the warrant. But when we  
3 get into narcotics, guns, these are things that can be  
4 destroyed, concealed, thrown out, or displaced in a  
5 hurry. So, like I said, depending on the type of warrant,  
6 the type of location being searched could dictate how  
7 things are performed.

8 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: And thank you. And again,  
9 through the Chair, I recognize that's very granular and  
10 it's on a case-by-case basis. But again, knowing that  
11 that policy is upcoming, I just figured that that might  
12 be something that we would consider. Thank you.

13 CMDR. PARISH: Thank you.

14 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: But a search warrant is  
15 required to search a residence or anything like that. You  
16 have to have probable cause, unless there's something  
17 you're looking for; you're looking at him TokenMe, then  
18 you could arrest, right?

19 CMDR. PARISH: Absolutely. And as I understood the  
20 commissioner's question, it was not an issue of whether a  
21 warrant is generally required to enter a home. Of course  
22 they are. And of course, that's our policy. It was at  
23 what point in time did we have to show a search warrant  
24 to somebody that comes to the location in the middle of  
25 the search? That's how I interpreted the question.

1 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Correct.

2 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yep. And I think, through ---  
3 well, I was about to say through the Chair. Through all  
4 these Chairs. I think that we can have a robust  
5 discussion on that during the policy meeting. And I'm  
6 sure it's a balance that could happen whenever possible.  
7 And so, I look forward to having that discussion in the  
8 policy meeting. So, thank you very kindly. Deputy Chief,  
9 it has been brought to my attention that the MDOC is  
10 getting out of the contract in terms of housing or  
11 securing DDC?

12 DC PRITCHETT: Through the Chair, yes.

13 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah. And that's a great public  
14 interest in a sense that DPD will be going back into, you  
15 know, the housing business. And I know that they're going  
16 to be looking for a number of staff members to house that  
17 facility to be able to make sure that they have people,  
18 officers, or I don't know what they will be classified  
19 as. And I'm sure that'll come out through HR and there'll  
20 be some postings on that, but be on the lookout as it  
21 relates to; I'm told it's going to be probably about 45  
22 positions available. You know, Wayne County Sheriff have,  
23 you know, they house folks the way they house them. But  
24 DPD is going back. It's going to continue to be  
25 centralized and all of that, right?

1 DC PRITCHETT: Correct. Through the Chair, yes, sir.

2 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yep. So, have at it. You want to  
3 say something about it?

4 CMDR. PARISH: Mr. Chair I'm happy to answer any  
5 questions you have.

6 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: I understand the process. And I'm  
7 sure that something will come out very, very soon on  
8 that. But that is of great public concern. You know, one  
9 of the issues that has gotten us into you know, federal  
10 oversight in terms of how we detain and those who are in  
11 custody. And so, we are going to make sure that there's a  
12 strong, robust policy to be able to protect citizens and  
13 also protect the staff in that place right now. So, you  
14 have something to say before we move on?

15 CMDR. PARISH: Mr. Chairman, I just guarantee we will  
16 have a strong policy in place. We will never go back to  
17 consent judgment days.

18 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Praise the Lord. Alright. 10th  
19 Precinct --- oh, excuse me. I'm so sorry. Commissioner  
20 Banks.

21 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Alright. Through the Chair.  
22 Thank you. We are down in criminal homicides. We had 22  
23 criminal homicides this year versus last year, 31  
24 aggravated assaults. We had 1335. Now, last year we had  
25 1499. And burglary, we're at 727 this year, and 845 this



1 year. I just wanted to talk about the new administration  
2 with mayor Todd. I mean Chief Todd Bettison.

3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: You have too many folks.

4 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Chief Todd Bettison, the new  
5 administration is definitely paying dividends in this  
6 season here, so, that's wonderful. Crime is going down  
7 and things, but he also has a good core surrounding him.  
8 And I just wanted to put that out to DPD.

9 DC PRITCHETT: Through the Chair. Thank you. You know  
10 we are still following some of the policies set by the  
11 prior chief. And, you know, he has a great executive  
12 team. We have some officers out there that are doing  
13 phenomenal work, and our number shows that we are  
14 engaged. We're trying to keep the citizens of this city  
15 safe as we possibly can without violating any of their  
16 rights. So, I think, you know, Chief Bettison is Chief  
17 Bettison. You know, we all love him and we embrace him  
18 and the work that we did prior to him coming here, we'll  
19 continue while he's here.

20 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: I thought we are going by all the  
21 policies of Chief Bettison, you know. I know we are not  
22 going by the prior chief. That's the old, we have the new  
23 coming in. I'm just joking, but these are Chief  
24 Bettison's policies now, and there's a new sheriff in  
25 town and his name is Chief Bettison. Let's go to the 10th

1 Precinct.

2 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Mr. Chair, before I forget, our  
3 staff worked hard to put this menu together. I forgot all  
4 about our staff, and I'll surely apologize. Madam  
5 Secretary, Ms. Blossom, Jonya, I appreciate you all for  
6 the logistics of this. It's not easy, you know, to put  
7 something like this together. So, before the captain  
8 begins, I just want to say thank you to the staff for ---

9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Absolutely. Let's give them a  
10 hand.

11 COMMISSIONER MOORE: And Attorney Dante Goss as well.

12 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah. Have at it, sir.

13 CAPTAIN DICICCO: Thank you. Good evening everybody.  
14 Thanks to the Millwrights and Carpenters for letting us  
15 come here today. Kind of a little side note, my son is  
16 actually in class right now, upstairs.

17 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Oh, wow! That's huge.

18 CAPTAIN DICICCO: Taking advantage of the  
19 opportunity. It's a great place. So, thanks the  
20 Millwrights and thanks to the board for letting me come  
21 and speak tonight. And thanks to the chief through DC  
22 Pritchett for having me represent the 10th Precinct. I've  
23 been captain of the 10th Precinct for about a year now,  
24 and the commanding officer for the last four months while  
25 our currently assigned commander is out fighting a

1 medical illness. So, I have been leading the troops for a  
2 few months now. And very proud of our big reductions in  
3 2024 leading into this year. 2025, 12% down in part one  
4 crimes overall with 394 incidents this year, 450 last  
5 year. So, continually making that improvement in part  
6 ones. Unfortunately, we are up in homicides year to date  
7 in this 2½ month span.

8       We have four incidents known, excuse me. Four  
9 incidents so far, year to date, plus the two from DeSoto  
10 the other day. Unfortunately, three out of those four  
11 incidents previously were known offenders. So, these  
12 happened inside houses or due to arguments or domestic  
13 violence partners, though definitely on our radar to try  
14 to bring these, these crimes to justice. Three out of  
15 those four known offenders' cases previously are solved  
16 now, or closed now at 75% closure rate. And I know that  
17 when I talked to the homicide detectives this morning  
18 about the DeSoto incident, and they have a few leads, but  
19 they're working on that as well. For nonfatal shootings  
20 this year to date, we have three last year at this time,  
21 also three. Pardon me?

22       COMMISSIONER BERNARD: That's great.

23       CAPTAIN DICICCO: Sure. Even better is that the first  
24 one of the year was on New Year's Day, and it was the  
25 person who admitted to accidentally shooting himself, but

1 he won't tell us where he shot himself. So, that will be  
2 backed out or closed once we get him to come forward, we  
3 can get it officially closed. And the other non-fatal  
4 shooting, we have two in custody for a 100% closure rate,  
5 so far year to date. Our robbery stats are showing  
6 currently a 38.5% increase with 18 incidents, I'm sorry,  
7 18 victims over 13 robberies from last year. However,  
8 there's only 16 incidents. They counted the number of  
9 victims, not just the incidents, four of which are  
10 believed to be false reports. We're working on the  
11 investigative piece to get those closed and backed out.  
12 So, our robbery numbers should be improving very shortly.  
13 Our sex assaults for the year are down 16.5%. Aggravated  
14 assaults are up around 13%. The deep dive on the  
15 aggravated assaults, we have 122 aggravated assault  
16 victims covering 92 incidents, 77 of which have known  
17 offenders, which makes about 85% either intimate partner  
18 violence or some sort of argument based.

19 So, we're looking to close, we're right around 60%  
20 closure rate between the Domestic Violence Unit, as well  
21 as our detective bureau at number 10. And in carjackings,  
22 we have two carjackings this year and zero at this point  
23 from last year. They both occurred in the month of  
24 January. So, we've been about a month free of that  
25 incident. For property crimes, we are down 23.5% in

1 burglaries from 2024. And the burglaries that we've had  
2 in the 10th Precinct over the last two years, where our  
3 focus of attention with our mayor's initiative and  
4 strategies, we were up around 25% last year, with it  
5 showing a 24% reduction this year, so far, we have an  
6 improvement about 45 to 50% just in the last few months  
7 alone. So, I'm very proud of that. Larceny is down 10.5%  
8 from last year, and motor vehicle thefts down around 22%.

9 Our strategies for violent crimes, we do targeted  
10 enforcement and high crime hotspot areas, which are ten-  
11 two, ten-three, primarily the Davison Corridor and ten-  
12 five, which is the middle of the precinct, in the Boston  
13 Edison area. Those are typically and historically been  
14 the high crime areas for the 10th Precinct. We put a lot  
15 of attention into those areas. We've made 242 total  
16 arrests, precinct wide year to date for guns and gun  
17 related crimes. We've taken 35 guns off the street,  
18 including search warrants, ShotSpotter warrants, as well  
19 as arrests for carrying concealed weapons illegally. We  
20 increased patrols throughout the Davison Corridor, as I  
21 mentioned, with our precinct motor units issuing around  
22 1800 tickets so far this year, precinct wide to help  
23 suppress accidents and speeders and keep motorists safe.  
24 We conduct warrant sweeps and MDOC home checks to focus  
25 on perpetrators of gun crimes.

1           We have a ceasefire gang initiative when aimed at  
2 disrupting and dismantling groups or gangs. We target  
3 high impact and known offenders with our federal partners  
4 and the ATF agents. We've sought to bolster and seek  
5 federal charges against the most heinous of our crime,  
6 I'm sorry, of our gun violence offenders. We've leveraged  
7 three enforcement grants for federal funding. The first  
8 being the Burn Criminal Justice Innovation, which was a  
9 traffic enforcement and business special attention in  
10 designated areas. We also run a community-based crime  
11 reduction grant, which includes traffic enforcement, B&E  
12 surveillance and enforcement and blight abatement. We  
13 also have a burn discretionary housing relocation  
14 assistance through a pilot program with our social  
15 worker. We use our Detective Bureau, the Chaplain Corps,  
16 and a resource coordinator under that grant to help  
17 relocate victims of crimes and even offer some services,  
18 including counseling for the perpetrators of crimes to  
19 try to break the cycle of violence.

20           Our strategies for property crimes; again, directed  
21 patrols based on the data that we find in areas  
22 experienced the increase in property crimes. Our  
23 deployments are focused on those hotspots I mentioned  
24 before, and strategies are developed by platoon and by  
25 the day of the week in some circumstances. Collaborative

1 investigations covering multiple precincts and  
2 specialized units are also conducted with Commercial Auto  
3 Theft, Vice and other detective bureaus from other  
4 precincts. We do a robust Project Greenlight initiative,  
5 including physical and virtual checks. So, the virtual  
6 check is where officers on the desk will monitor multiple  
7 project Greenlight locations. And when they find either  
8 disruptive behavior or even sometimes spot people  
9 carrying concealed weapons, they can immediately radio to  
10 street officers. We'll have a response pretty quickly,  
11 and we've made several arrests doing it that way for gun  
12 related crimes. And we also do physical checks.

13       Each platoon is required to have a certain number of  
14 checks per day for the whole week. So, every single one  
15 of our project Greenlights should be checked multiple  
16 times throughout the week. Our community engagement  
17 piece, our community meetings are held the first Thursday  
18 of every month. Throughout the winter months, we did them  
19 via Zoom, and I believe we're going to be starting soon  
20 with in-person meetings. We have a Youth Explorer  
21 program, facilitated citywide program, facilitated by one  
22 of our own NPOs, Roberto Berry. We did participate in the  
23 Women's Walk as DC Pritchett mentioned. We are also in  
24 the beginning stages of implementing the SKIP grant, as I  
25 mentioned before, which is going to be centered on

1 reducing gun violence through education and gun safety  
2 through schools and other means.

3 Our embedded social worker, again, I mentioned that  
4 already, but that's also another piece of our community  
5 engagement that we have daily. Current NPO programs. We  
6 run "Coffee with a Cop," two times a month, one at In-  
7 Harmony Cafe on Dexter, and the other one at "The  
8 Congregation," on Rosa Parks, where the NPOs and myself  
9 come and speak with any citizens that may have questions.  
10 And we try to give them updates and answers, you know,  
11 and handle any complaints they may have. NPOs have done a  
12 senior movie night at the Northwest Activity Center and  
13 ongoing gleaners and goodwill of donation drives. And  
14 throughout the summer this year, our bigger community  
15 events are in planning stages. We have the Police week  
16 coming up in May and National Night Out later in the  
17 summer, probably in around August. And we may plan a  
18 third larger event in the parking lot of our building of  
19 our precinct due to last year's unfortunate rain out we  
20 had at the chief night. So, we have lots of stuff going  
21 on this summer. And that's the report out for number 10.

22 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Good man. That was a long report,  
23 man.

24 CAPTAIN DICICCO: I'm sorry.

25 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir.



1 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Through the Chair. For the  
2 commander here. You mentioned hotspot areas.

3 CAPTAIN DICICCO: Yes, sir.

4 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Where is your high criminal, I  
5 mean, your high crime areas in the City of Detroit?

6 CAPTAIN DICICCO: Well, for the 10th Precinct, it's -  
7 --

8 COMMISSIONER BANKS: I mean the 10th Precinct. I'm  
9 sorry.

10 CAPTAIN DICICCO: Sure. The ten-two and ten-three  
11 corridor is primarily Davison, Dexter, Davison, all the  
12 way through from the Westside of the precinct to the  
13 East. So, there are a lot of businesses there, a lot of  
14 population, a lot of houses that are occupied. So, we  
15 have a lot of unfortunate victims, you would say, because  
16 we have the highest population in our precinct and  
17 highest number of businesses in that area. So, it's a lot  
18 of traffic. Anybody's driven through Davidson, Livernois  
19 knows how many cars are running through there all day  
20 long. There's no break. So, that's our primary area for  
21 our crime.

22 COMMISSIONER BANKS: So, Livernois is in Davidson?

23 CAPTAIN DICICCO: Yes, sir.

24 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Okay.

25 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Commissioner Moore. Are you done,

1 Commissioner Banks?

2 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Yeah, I'm all set. Thank you.

3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Moore.

4 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you Mr. Chair.

5 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir.

6 COMMISSIONER MOORE: You know, when I greeted the  
7 captain coming in today, I called him the hardest working  
8 captain in DPD because at one point he was running the  
9 10th Precinct and still assisting the 6th Precinct. So,  
10 he was very busy. I haven't forgotten that. And then you  
11 were still answering complaints. Your NPOs work on  
12 Saturday, sometimes. So, 10 is a very hardworking,  
13 productive precinct. You know, they're very responsive  
14 and that's what I look for, is responsiveness. You know,  
15 sometimes you can give somebody a complaint and it might  
16 take them a week to get back with you, and I don't like  
17 that, and the citizens don't like that either. But not  
18 you, captain, you have risen to the challenge and I look  
19 forward to seeing you going to bigger and better things.

20 CAPTAIN DICICCO: Thank you, sir.

21 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Very, very powerful, especially  
22 some decades ago, you know. It used to be the infamous  
23 10th Precinct. Now, it looks like the good 10th Precinct.  
24 Anything else before we move on? Yep. Alright, have a  
25 blessed one. Thank you for your service.

1 CAPTAIN DICICCO: Thanks everybody.

2 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: You all can give him a hand, you  
3 know. We are going to do oral communications. Please note  
4 that inappropriate language or comments may delay TV  
5 broadcast and meeting video posts. Ms. Underwood, are you  
6 ready?

7 MS. UNDERWOOD: Yes, sir. Mr. Chair, we have three  
8 speakers. Former Commissioner William Davis, Ms.  
9 Williams, and Victoria Camille.

10 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay.

11 MR. DAVIS: Hello there.

12 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Hello.

13 MR. DAVIS: I'm not going to start off saying  
14 anything bad about you all today because ---

15 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Praise the Lord.

16 MR. DAVIS: Because I got some good food today. That  
17 doesn't mean anything about next week. But I would like  
18 to see a greater effort, you know, to do something about  
19 the homeowner's insurance and auto insurance in the City  
20 of Detroit. If crime is steadily going down, and I  
21 believe it is, and if there's a number of things going  
22 on, I think the next step in order to help, especially  
23 with auto insurance, is to have a greater effort to deal  
24 with people running the red lights and traffic  
25 enforcement. Because we had to cut down the number of

1 people, run the red lights and cut down on vehicle  
2 accidents. Also, speaking of mental health, yesterday I  
3 was part of a forum that was at Second Ebenezer, where  
4 the U of M was helping the sponsor. And we had people  
5 from all over the eastern half of the United States. But  
6 this particular forum was dealing with mental health and  
7 black males because far too often, too many of our black  
8 males don't seek the help that they should seek. So, we  
9 need to do more to encourage people to get the help and  
10 assistance they need. So, other than that, I don't have  
11 anything else to say.

12 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Great job.

13 MR. DAVIS: For today.

14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: For today. Next speaker.

15 MS. WILLIAMS: Hello, everyone. Through the Chair.

16 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Hello.

17 MS. WILLIAMS: I'm going to be nice today. I'll wait  
18 until next week. You guys have a good day.

19 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Praise the Lord.

20 MS. CAMILLE: Good evening, honorable board and  
21 community members.

22 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Good evening.

23 MS. CAMILLE: My name is Victoria Camille, and I am  
24 the president of the Grand River Community Block Club.  
25 And I'm also a candidate for Police Commissioner and

1 District 7. I am very glad to be here today. Thank you.

2 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you.

3 MS. CAMILLE: So, as we know, the First Amendment  
4 protects the rights of speech, religion, press, lawful  
5 demonstrations, labor union strikes, and things like  
6 that. And we're in a time when, from the federal level,  
7 the protection of the First Amendment rights is under  
8 attack and has become very subjective. And it's more  
9 important now than ever that at the local level,  
10 community and government agencies and law enforcement are  
11 aligned with protecting constitutional rights and civil  
12 liberties. So, mid last year myself, along with some  
13 other community members presented to the BOPC Policy  
14 Committee, a draft policy to protect the First Amendment  
15 activities for the police department.

16 And at that time, we were very focused on making  
17 sure we pulled the protection of those rights to the  
18 forefront of that policy and to ensure that no one is  
19 retaliated against, based on their beliefs being  
20 different from those in law enforcement or in government.  
21 So, I want to thank Chief Bettison, who is not here  
22 today, but I want to thank him and his staff, as well as  
23 the board for being open to considering that policy that  
24 we draft. And we're definitely looking forward to an  
25 update on that draft. I do believe that together we can

1 create and maintain a Detroit that is safe, based on our  
2 local values. Thank you. Again, Victoria Camille.

3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Absolutely. Yes.

4 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Yes. Commander Parish, we  
5 passed that out of committee. Where is it? Still in your  
6 office? The draft that was prepared on First Amendment  
7 rights?

8 CMDR. PARISH: Through the Chair. I don't recall the  
9 First Amendment directive going through the committee. I  
10 believe it was discussed. We didn't have a meeting with  
11 Ms. --- I was about to call her Michelle --- Ms. Camille  
12 and her colleagues. It is still in the draft phase. We  
13 intend on having it submitted. We are adopting an  
14 overwhelming majority of the ideas and concepts that they  
15 are suggesting. So, Ms. Camille, I can assure you that  
16 that is being done. So, I anticipate we could probably  
17 get that submitted to the board within the next week or  
18 two. If that's a priority for the board, we'll make sure  
19 we treat it as such.

20 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: We will send it to you  
21 tomorrow, the one that we approved?

22 CMDR. PARISH: We have that; we have, yes. In fact,  
23 we met with Ms. Camille and her colleagues. It was  
24 discussed at length.

25 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Was it resolved?

1           CMDR. PARISH: I wouldn't say there was ever any  
2 conflict. I think that we were just trying to reach an  
3 understanding as to what they were proposing and why. We  
4 had a very good meeting. I did commit to them that we  
5 would start with their draft instead of the department's  
6 draft and build off of that. Again, I can't put an exact  
7 number on it, but the overwhelming majority of the draft  
8 that they provided is going to be adopted into policy.

9           COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Well, it's a priority item  
10 now, obviously, because of what's happening in New York  
11 and in other cities. And we need to be clear about our  
12 position on First Amendment rights of protestors. So,  
13 maybe we can talk about it not this evening, but maybe  
14 tomorrow or something and see if we can't move it along.  
15 I asked Felicia to do the same thing, madam secretary.

16           CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yep. We have done our due  
17 diligence on it already. They just finished doing what  
18 they need to do with it to get it to us. And you've done  
19 a great job. The policy manager Victoria Camille, in  
20 terms of --- well, it is a team effort, you know, and  
21 what's revolutionary about this process has been a  
22 community effort. And when they can come to the table  
23 with the Policy Committee, with the policy manager, with  
24 the Chief of Police, with Commander Parish, and we send  
25 it out to all these civil liberties organizations to let

1 it get scrutinized; that's how you create policy. And you  
2 know, I had a discussion about that today in terms of not  
3 just this particular policy, but the community is  
4 welcome, as we take a deep dive on all these policies.

5 And the department has been working as well as our  
6 policy chair. And the committee has been doing a deep  
7 dive on these policies. And I know when it was birthed  
8 and how it was born and why it was born. And it was a  
9 very powerful policy. And I accept that it would get to  
10 us within a week, so that we can take it across the  
11 finishing line. But everybody's done their job on it. And  
12 so, thank you very much. And thank you Ms. Camille for  
13 that engagement. You and your team were very much engaged  
14 in that process and we deeply appreciate that. And we  
15 welcome this entire community to continue to work with us  
16 on that level so that we can be able to have a "We versus  
17 us," and not an "I", my concept when it comes to policy.  
18 Thank you so much. Let's go to the ---

19 MS. UNDERWOOD: Mr. Chair, Ms. Betty Varner and Mr.  
20 Robert Olive.

21 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes. okay. Take your time. Amen.  
22 I don't have a physical one.

23 MS. VARNER: How's everybody doing?

24 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: We're doing good.

25 MS. VARNER: Good. I'll tell you all a short story.



1 We've been working. I planned and made all my plans. My  
2 member over there and good friend, neighbor Mr. Leroy; my  
3 family wasn't available to bring me to my meeting this  
4 evening, so he stepped up. All right. I've been blessed  
5 to have a lift, elevator lift, get on my lift, and it  
6 starts moving and it stops. Now, I'm stuck on my lift  
7 outside of my house on my way coming here. I could not  
8 open up the door, because it's a safety. Once it starts  
9 moving, the door locks. Well, I called the people who  
10 installed it. No technicians, nobody. Can't get nobody  
11 out there until tomorrow. I'm stuck on the elevator. It's  
12 getting cool. I'm cold. All right. They say you have to  
13 call 911. I called 911 and they, you know, asked me all  
14 the questions and everything. The 10th Precinct was out  
15 there within five minutes; five minutes. And I did not  
16 have to say there was some shooting and going on. They  
17 came out because there was a senior, 75 years old I am,  
18 and proud of it, in distress and the fire department. And  
19 they actually had to lift me up, over, you know, my lift  
20 and everything. And I'm here --- the unit, that's the  
21 word. And I'm here. So, I thank God for it. I'm very  
22 proud of my 10th Precinct. I'm very proud to be here.

23 I want to thank Commissioner Moore. He has been just  
24 on his job. I appreciate the work that he does and how he  
25 is supportive of my neighborhood. I appreciate all of the

1 NPOs, not just all Officer Sumpster, all of them, because  
2 they are on the job, they support my community and the  
3 captain. And if I had to complain about anything, the  
4 only thing I'm wishing that we can get us a commander,  
5 because I build and I network, I want us to have a  
6 commander that's going to be at the 10th Precinct where  
7 we can build that relationship and continue to do all  
8 that is necessary to improve our neighborhood. And we are  
9 now just this week, we are starting to have problems with  
10 shooting again. So, I'll be talking to the 10th Precinct  
11 about that. And I know you all heard on the TV about the  
12 two dead bodies that were found in DeSoto, but I'm  
13 president of DeSoto Ellsworth Black Association, proud of  
14 it, and a proud city resident of the City of Detroit.  
15 Thank you for this time.

16 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you so much. Mr. Robert  
17 Olive. Thank you so much.

18 MS. VARNER: Oh, you're so very welcome. Thank you  
19 all.

20 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes. The commander. I mean, the  
21 captain is about to come help you out.

22 MR. OLIVE: Evening, everyone.

23 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Good evening.

24 MR. OLIVE: I just want to commend the work of this  
25 commission, as well as the 10th Precinct; not just the

1 NPOs, but the precinct overall for the work that has been  
2 put in. Once again, my name is Robert Olive, Reverend  
3 Robert Olive. I just wanted to let the community know  
4 that starting the beginning of next month, I have a team  
5 of young men who I've been mentoring and working with  
6 that has decided that from now until the fall, at least  
7 once a week, we wanted to identify a senior or two who is  
8 in need of some additional help around the house, as far  
9 as raking up the leaves and other yard work and things  
10 like that, that they can't do on their own. So, I want to  
11 make sure that if you know anyone, please feel free to  
12 let me know.

13 I have my card out. So, that way anyone can contact  
14 me with that, or they can go to my nonprofit  
15 organization's website, which is [righteoussons.org](http://righteoussons.org); and  
16 feel free to leave that information at the section that  
17 says, contact us. So, that way we can assist with that.  
18 Also, the second Tuesday of every month at 16129  
19 Plymouth, which is the Assembly Church of God in Christ.  
20 We'll be doing a food giveaway as well as giving other  
21 necessities away to those who are in need. That starts at  
22 11:00 AM. And that's available while supplies and  
23 everything lasts. So, please feel free, if you all know  
24 anyone who is in need of any resources or food that they  
25 can come there the second Tuesday of every month at 11:00

1 AM until we run out. And if somebody doesn't have  
2 transportation, we can also provide a way for that.  
3 Lastly, I am also a candidate for your District 7 police  
4 commissioner. And so, win or lose, I most definitely  
5 would love to continue to be a part of this community.  
6 So, thank you for your time.

7 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you so much. Go get you  
8 some food and get your grass cut.

9 MS. UNDERWOOD: That was your last speaker, Mr.  
10 Chair.

11 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. No online?

12 MS. UNDERWOOD: No, sir.

13 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Oh, my Lord. God is good. I am  
14 not thinking like that. Today is Luther Keith's viewing.  
15 Luther Keith was with ARISE Detroit. He was a strong,  
16 strong community leader. I didn't want to leave here  
17 early, and that's why I said God is good because I wanted  
18 to try to stay here for the entire meeting, but I want to  
19 go pay homage to that great, great leader. It is at Kemp  
20 Funeral Home, and his funeral is at Fellowship Chapel,  
21 tomorrow. One of the greatest leaders that this community  
22 ever produced. A very, very good family. His uncle was  
23 judge Damian Keith; his daughter is Aaron Keith. He was a  
24 very, very powerful leader in this community. So, thank  
25 you. Pastor Keith, you are going to have to start cutting

1 grass too, doc. But the public comment is over with.

2 Let's go to the report from the Board of Secretary.

3 MS. GARNIER: We have under tab six in your binder  
4 tonight, the listing of the incoming communications is  
5 there for you. Also, within your binders, a reminder, the  
6 young people in 21st century policing our youth advisory  
7 panel of the Board of Police Commissioners at Wayne Law  
8 School this Saturday, from 11:00 AM to 1:00 PM. Great  
9 panel, and I'm sure we're going to support them this  
10 weekend.

11 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Hold on one second. Madam Teresa,  
12 do we have flyers of ---

13 MS. GARNIER: Yes, sir.

14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Teresa Blossom.

15 MS. GARNIER: They're on the table.

16 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Please, please go out and  
17 support these young people. These young people are  
18 vitally important. Their voices matter and you would love  
19 them. Please support those young people if you can, and  
20 get a flyer; you are on social media, any of those types  
21 of things, tweet it out; eat it out, X it out, or  
22 whatever you guys do, you know, and please support them.

23 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Mr. Chair, if I may, I think  
24 the best way to support is to also bring another young  
25 person with you. Because again, to see their peers

1 engaged in that way gives them hope and optimism of what  
2 they're able to do as well. So, if you have some cousins,  
3 some nieces and nephews, it would be great to have them  
4 to tag along with you as well. Thank you, Chair.

5 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes.

6 MS. GARNIER: The other announcements for today are:  
7 the next board meeting is next Thursday, March 20th, will  
8 be at 3:00 PM at Detroit Public Safety Headquarters. The  
9 next community meeting is next month, Thursday, April  
10 10th, 6:30 PM. We will be in the 9th Precinct at Ford  
11 Community Center, East on Madeline Street in Detroit. The  
12 next committee meeting, which prior to now, had a lot of  
13 conversation, the Policy Committee meets this coming  
14 Tuesday, March 18th, at Public Safety Headquarters at  
15 5:00 PM. And that ends the announcements for today, sir.

16 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you very much. Unfinished  
17 business. Commissioner Bernard.

18 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Oh, ladies and gentlemen,  
19 unfinished business is really a very, very brief item. I  
20 move that the special orders as listed on attachment  
21 27(a), which are all police special orders with the  
22 expiration date of March 25th, 2025, be extended for 90  
23 days to June 27th, 2025. We cannot possibly get through  
24 almost 40 orders without an extension. And we do not want  
25 the existing orders to lapse. The department is in

1 agreement with this, as is the committee. So, I move that  
2 the board authorized the extension of the orders to give  
3 us an extension.

4 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Second.

5 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: So, it's second by Dewaelsche.  
6 Okay? It has been moved by Commissioner Bernard. That  
7 special order is listed on the attachment 7(a) with the  
8 expiration date, March 25, 2025, to be extended to June  
9 27th, 2025. And it was supported by Commissioner  
10 Dewaelsche. Discussion?

11 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Through the Chair, just very  
12 briefly, is there any impediment to extending beyond just  
13 90 days or do we have to come back after 90 days to do  
14 this again, potentially?

15 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: There's no impediment except  
16 for the fact that we want to review them. Everything will  
17 have expired. So, we want to be as diligent as we can to  
18 make sure that we review the special orders and that we  
19 get new special orders. I'm only trying to extend them  
20 for 90 days.

21 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: I appreciate it.

22 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: And any board member --- the  
23 department was kind enough to present two. I have one,  
24 but a big binder with all the policies in it. So, you can  
25 just come in and flip through. And I'm going to ask that

1 we put them online if there's any community comment on  
2 any of the --- it's like 38 or 40 special orders. So,  
3 we'll put them online so you can communicate back with us  
4 if you have any comments, concerns, or recommendations.

5 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: And when you say put them online,  
6 it's the numbers, the memo that we have, because they can  
7 pull offline; the special orders already, because they  
8 already posted. And so, just put up what we're updating.  
9 But all in favor say, aye.

10 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

11 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Anyone oppose? The motion is  
12 carried.

13 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you.

14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: And I want to thank this robust -  
15 -- I don't know if it's happening like this in the State  
16 of Michigan or in the country, where an oversight body is  
17 working hand in hand with the department as well as with  
18 the community. And we are not talking about no fly by  
19 night community folks. You know, we are talking about  
20 some folks who are going to scrutinize the periods and  
21 the commas, you know, in these policies and to be able to  
22 give real feedback, you know. And so, I really appreciate  
23 this process and I believe that once it's finished that  
24 we will have that in place and it's going to be something  
25 big for the citizens of the City of Detroit. Having said



1 that under new business, I will entertain a motion to  
2 appoint Supervising Investigator Ansley Cromwell, without  
3 cause, from his current position as supervising  
4 investigator effective immediately. Supervising  
5 Investigator Cromwell is eligible to revert to the  
6 previous position he held prior to his current  
7 appointment.

8 COMMISSIONER MOORE: So, move.


