10	BOARD OF POLICE COMMISSIONERS MEETING
11	April 10, 2025 at 6:30 P.M.
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3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Good evening everyone. Today is 4 Thursday, April 10th, 6:31 PM. The Board of Police 5 Commission meeting is called to order. We have for 6 invocation, Chaplain Mark Hill via Zoom. You may be 7 heard.

CHAPLAIN HILL: Amen. We'll go before the Lord in 8 prayer. Lord, we thank you for this day. Truly, this is 9 the day which you have made, and we shall rejoice and be 10 glad in it. Lord, we ask that you bless this meeting 11 12 today. Let there be unity in the atmosphere. Let there be 13 peace. Lord, help every member to accomplish the goals 14 that they set out. We ask you to bless this community 15 right now in the name of Jesus; we are actually healing 16 in our bodies, Lord, right now, understanding and wisdom 17 we give you praise, honor, and glory in Jesus' name. 18 Amen.

19 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Amen. We do not have a quorum at 20 this present time, so, what we're going to do is go to 21 the Chief of Police Report. Deputy Chief Williams. 22 DC WILLIAMS: Through the Chair, Deputy Chief 23 Williams, on behalf of Chief Todd Bettison. For this 24 report, I'll start off with some of the crime stats. So, 25 for homicides, we're down 7%. We've had 3 less homicides



1 this year than we had last year. Nonfatal shootings are 2 down 37%. We had 52 less nonfatal shootings this year than we had last year. For robberies, we're down 14%. 3 We've had 36 less robberies this year than we had last 4 5 year. And for carjackings, we're down 32%. We've had 9 6 less carjackings this year than we did last year. So, 7 we're still trending in the right direction. And again, we just look to continue to improve on those numbers. For 8 9 case updates, we had a significant arrest. And this is concerning the case that I believe a lot of people are 10 familiar with in the city where we had 3 people who were 11 12 found burned in a vehicle. Our deepest condolences go out 13 to the family and our investigators did a great job going 14 after this one and continuing to investigate. We do have 15 a suspect in custody at this time, but the investigation

16 is still ongoing.

The 11th Precinct had a safety seminar and we want 17 to thank members of the community who came out. The 11th 18 Precinct basically hosted an "Act of assailant attacks in 19 a House of Worship, " seminar, and they did that on 20 21 Saturday, April 5th. It was a great turnout and a lot of 22 useful safety tips were given to those who attended. For 23 recruiting events, we had 3. Yesterday, the recruiting 24 team attended a first responders career expo in Windsor, 25 Ontario, and the career and Resource Fair at the



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1 Northwest Activity Center. On Friday, April 11th, there'll be a Crime Victims' Rights Week event at the 2 Wayne County Criminal Justice Center, and our recruiters 3 will be there as well. On Saturday, April 12th, the 4 5 recruiting team will be at the College Expo 2025 at the Boys and Girls Club, located at 16,500 Tireman. The 6 Public Safety Trust Fund Round Table. This week, Chief 7 Bettison, along with Mayor Mike Duggan, House Speaker 8 Matt Hall, hosted a roundtable discussion with other law 9 enforcement agencies and lawmakers from across southeast 10 Michigan on the proposed Public Safety Trust Fund 11 12 legislation. These bills will give police departments 13 across the state additional funding every year to reduce 14 crime. The money can be used for public safety 15 initiatives like hiring more officers and investing in 16 community via intervention programs. Following the round table, Chief Bettison gave Speaker Hall and other 17 lawmakers in law enforcement, and officials who attended 18 a tour of the Real Time Crime Center. Placing of 19 pinwheels. For Child Abuse Awareness Month and 20 recognition of Child Abuse Awareness Month, we invite the 21 community to join a Special Victims Unit on the front 22 lawn of Detroit Public Safety Headquarters on Tuesday, 23 April 15th, 2025 at 10:00 AM to place pinwheels in honor 24 25 of children in our community. The pinwheel represents the



trauma and pain suffered by child victims. It is also a 1 sign of resilience, hopefulness, and healing for a joyous 2 future that every child deserves. The pinwheel also 3 represents the responsibility each of us have to ensure a 4 5 supportive and loving environment for the children in our community. Through the Chair, with that, that'll be the 6 end of the Chief's report, pending the questions of the 7 board. 8

9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes. Any commissioners. Can you 10 give the public an update as there is a video that's out 11 there going viral of a young man who had an interaction 12 with the police, I believe at a gas station. Everybody 13 has been sending me that video, and I'm sure that many 14 board members probably saw that surface. Can you give us 15 an update on what action is being taken there?

16 DC WILLIAMS: Yes. Again, through the Chair. The actual incident happened on March 31st around 3:00 AM at 17 a gas station on the westside of Detroit. Officers were 18 alerted just through observation, there were two males 19 20 and two females appeared to be having some type of argument. The officers pulled up to investigate, and upon 21 pulling up to investigate, they observed one of the black 22 males who is the subject of the actual video reaching 23 into the vehicle and placing an object in what appeared 24 to be under the seat. 25



1 The officers, upon further investigation, were able to discover there was a firearm that was recovered. They 2 recovered the firearm, and at the point they recovered 3 the firearm, they moved to place the suspect in custody, 4 5 and that was the point where the use of force by the police was made. So, he was resisting, the officers had 6 7 to overcome his resistance. And just so everybody knows whenever we use force, it's not a pretty thing. So, the 8 9 use of force was necessary because of the resistance they were facing. They were able to take him in custody. He 10 has been arraigned; he's been arraigned and charged on 11 12 having a concealed weapon and also for resisting and 13 obstructing. And he was held, I believe, with a \$25,000 14 personal bond. And just one more thing too, the actual 15 use of force that occurred is still under investigation 16 as well.

17 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Say that last part for me please.
18 DC WILLIAMS: The use of force that actually occurred
19 is being investigated as well.

20 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. And that's being

21 investigated by Internal Affairs.

DC WILLIAMS: At this point, I'm not sure if it's
Internal Affairs or the precinct itself.

24 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Yep. And we'll let the 25 record reflect that our chief of OCI did receive an



1 anonymous complaint today on that. And so, the chief investigator is handling that accordingly. Go ahead. 2 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Through the Chair. Was that the 3 Linwood incident? Because I saw one where two officers 4 were fighting with a ---5 DC WILLIAMS: No. So, this was not Linwood. 6 7 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Are you familiar with the Linwood situation? 8 DC WILLIAMS: I am not familiar with the Linwood 9 10 situation. COMMISSIONER MOORE: A lot is going on these videos, 11 12 but the Linwood situation, two officers were wrestling 13 with the suspect, and the suspect got away. 14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Oh, yeah. 15 COMMISSIONER MOORE: So, there was another video 16 where a police officer was on TikTok doing the dance that some folks called, I don't know --- was it boots on the 17 ground? That's my deputy police ---18 19 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Hey man. How are you doing? 20 COMMISSIONER MOORE: He speaks; I listen. I don't 21 know what songs. Well, I think it was something by GMac 22 Cash. So, there has been a couple videos around Deputy 23 Chief. Okay, if you can get back to me, I'd appreciate 24 it. DC WILLIAMS: Will do. And through the Chair, if I 25



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1 could. You said a police officer was seen on TikTok and 2 he was dancing to --- what was that?

3 COMMISSIONER MOORE: A local rapper, Gmac Cash.4 DC WILLIAMS: Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah, I probably can show you the 5 videos. Yeah, not that one. The one with the Linwood 6 episode. That's when the officer ran out of gas. out of 7 gas, yeah. Yeah. It was a really, really tight situation. 8 9 So, it is unfortunate that a lot of this stuff --- you know, these are real situations, live situations and we 10 11 appreciate you updating the community on that because 12 people who sent it to me asked if it happened today. And 13 this is something that happened on the 31st of March, and 14 it just catching up. But it's going viral out there. And 15 so, I wanted the department to be able to address that 16 and see where we are at in the investigation on both 17 sides. Any other questions of the Chief? There being no 18 other questions, let's go to public comment. We don't 19 have a quorum, right now. I want to thank, before we go to public comment, the commander of 9th Precinct is here. 20 Is he here? I want to thank you for being here and we 21 22 thank you for hosting us. And you have a new captain 23 right there. I appreciate you guys being here and hosting us in the 9th Precinct today. Commander. 24

25 COMMANDER SVEC: Thank you, sir. Through the Chair,



1 I'd like to introduce the new captain of the 9th

2 Precinct, John Stewart.

3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Absolutely.

4 COMMANDER SVEC: Introduction.

5 CAPTAIN STEWART: Yeah, just happy to be here, man. 6 Through the Chair. I appreciate the board appointing me a 7 couple weeks ago, just hit the ground running and like I

8 said, happy to be here, happy to serve.

9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah, happy to have you.

10 COMMANDER SVEC: All right, sir, you ready for my

11 report out?

12 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir.

13 COMMANDER SVEC: Alright. The 9th Precinct. Currently 14 we're showing a 14.3% increase in homicides. That's 8 15 this year compared to 7 last year. Non-Fatal shootings 16 are down 51.9%. That's 14 cases. Sexual assaults are down 16.7%. That's 3 cases. Robberies down 34.2%. That's 13 17 18 cases. Carjacking. We're currently down a hundred 19 percent. That's 6 cases. We're currently at zero. Aggravated assault we're down 17.6%, which is 60 cases. 20 21 Motor vehicle theft is down 70, I'm sorry, 27%, which is 22 70 cases. We're struggling with property crime. Burglary, 23 we're currently up 21.5, which is 31 cases. And larceny 24 we're up 1.4%, which is 4 cases. Non-fatal shootings. We 25 finished last year, 2024 with a 9.4% decrease. The first



quarter we were sitting at a 40.9% decrease and we are currently at a 51.9% decrease. Homicide. We finished 2024

3 with a 5.1 decrease.

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We finished the first quarter at the 14.3% increase, 4 which was one case. And that is where we currently sit at 5 6 14.3% increase. Our strategy has shown an impact on nonfatal shootings, which is at a 52% decrease. Homicides 7 8 have shown a slight increase with 14.3%. All violent 9 crimes were down in 2024, except carjacking, which showed a 47% increase from 19 cases in 2023 to 28 and 2024. And 10 currently with carjackings, we are at a hundred percent 11 12 decrease. Burglaries, like I said, we are up 21%. We are 13 focusing with our Detective Unit, unknown suspects, and 14 with our partnership with the MDOC on home checks. To 15 combat this trend, we have directed additional resources 16 into the hotspots and directed patrol to our frequently 17 affected businesses.

Violent crime strategy. We've taken 246 illegal guns 18 off the street. We have targeted enforcement with weekly 19 restore order operations, partnerships with MDOC, 20 21 homicide gang intelligence and major, I'm sorry, major violators have shown increase in violent crime reduction. 22 ShotSpotter. I'd like to highlight that. Currently, year 23 to date, we are down 28% reduction in shooting incidents 24 25 and 36% down in gunshots; compared to 2023 when the



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1 program started. We are 49% reduction in shooting incidents and 51% reduction in gunshots. Currently, year 2 to date, we have executed 45 search warrants in 3 conjunction with ShotSpotter and recovered 54 firearms. 4 5 Community engagement. Our NPOs distribute gun locks, 6 continuous meetings with community groups and a brotherhood and sisterhood programs. And to name just a 7 few of our NPO programs, we have trick or treating 8 events, Turkey giveaways, Thanksgiving dinner, holiday 9 parties, painting with a cop, adopt a Family Christmas 10 Outreach, Christmas dinners, reading with little 11 12 Darlene's program, community readings, anti-bullying 13 presentations, 9th Precinct Memorial for Fallen Officers 14 Brotherhood and Sisterhood Circle programs, community 15 movie day, Goodfellas, Black Family Development, National 16 Police Week, Faith in Blue, National Night Out, and Precinct fundraisers. 17

And if I may, I'd like to introduce some of my NPOs who are here, or one of them who is here at the meeting today. And Sergeant Harper's here somewhere too as well. But that concludes my presentation if you have any questions.

23 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir.

24 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Thank you, Mr. Chair. So, we 25 missed you at the 10th Precinct as a Lieutenant.



1 COMMANDER SVEC: I appreciate that.

2 COMMISSIONER MOORE: 9th Precinct historically has 3 been one of the most dangerous precincts, especially on 4 the eastside of Detroit, going even further than Midwest. 5 What are some needs that you think, outside the box 6 thinking, do you think that you could be given, so that 7 it can be safer in the 9th Precinct?

COMMANDER SVEC: I think one of the best things that 8 9 former Chief White got was a ShotSpotter that covers the entire 9th Precinct. Like I said, there's been a 48% 10 reduction in shots fired in the 9th Precinct. And those 11 12 don't even you know, people are calling more often now 13 because they are seeing our quick response. We're recovering evidence from those, we're developing a lot of 14 15 leads on our cases off those shootings. So, I think that 16 ShotSpotter has been a great help in the precinct.

17 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Any more questions? There 18 being no more questions. Thank you very much. We will go 19 to public comment.

MS. UNDERWOOD: Thank you, Mr. Chair. We have five speakers in the audience. Our first speaker will be Mr. Dana Lund, Ms. Victoria Camille, Ms. Bernice Smith.

23 MR. LUND: You ready?

24 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: You may be heard.

25 MR. LUND: I know you guys know my face, and my voice



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1 by now. All I want to say is when I make these comments 2 and everything and come up here and speak, and I do get phone calls and phone calls from some of the officers, it 3 seems like they don't want to be bothered. I just want to 4 5 stress and say I am human just like they are. Why is it that they act like they have a problem when I address you 6 guys. When they called the commander, I think his name is 7 spelled SVEC, he called and he acted like it was a 8 9 problem for him to call. I just want to say I'm human just like they are. So, if you don't want to call, they 10 don't have to call me. I just want to always, and I'm 11 12 going to continue to come up here and complain about it. 13 I just want the police to understand, don't take the job 14 if you can't do the job. It states that they are supposed 15 to serve and protect. If you can't do that job, don't 16 take that job. That's all I'm saying. Serve and protect. If you give me respect, you're going to get respect. 17 That's all I want to say. They don't want to do it. Don't 18 19 do a job if you can't do it. That's all I got to say because they're not doing their job. Thank you. 20 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Thank you very kindly. Next 21 22 speaker. Someone taking time down there. Oh, you are. All 23 right. Thank you.

24 MS. CAMILLE: Good evening board.

25 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Good evening.



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MS. CAMILLE: And good evening community. My name is 1 Victoria Camille. Couple of things today. So, in regards 2 to the --- I won't talk about this long. In regards to 3 the embarrassment that the board had last week. My 4 recommendation would be to have the staff provide weekly 5 reports on any administrative activities in progress or 6 planned related to open positions, as well as any 7 recruiting so that the entire board is aware of all the 8 steps that are going on. And so that if anything is in 9 progress that shouldn't be, that can be addressed before 10 it goes too far. The next item that I have is in regards 11 12 to an open citizen complaint that I have where DPD failed 13 to follow multiple policy directives leading to the 14 killing of Sherman Lee Butler in July of last year. So, I 15 would like the status of that complaint. And then the 16 last City Council is considering an ordinance that is mandating the release of body-worn camera footage. And at 17 the public and safety committee this week, it was stated 18 that the topic was being postponed because they're 19 20 waiting for the board to have a conversation with Second Deputy Chief Ha. And so, those of us who are advocating 21 for this ordinance are wondering why does that 22 conversation need to happen? What is that conversation 23 24 about? And will that conversation be held in public? 25 Thank you.



1 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Update on our complaint? CI WARFIELD: Through the Chair, regarding the 2 citizen complaint concerning the bailiff shooting. Our 3 investigators have completed their work. This past 4 5 Tuesday, we completed that --- I'm sorry. We presented 6 that report at the Citizens Complaint Committee meeting. And the Chairman is in receipt of that report. He is 7 reviewing it. 8

9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: The chair of the Citizen10 Complaint Committee.

11 CI WARFIELD: Thank you. Through the Chair. The Chair 12 of the Citizen Complaint Committee, is reviewing that 13 report and as soon as he signs off on it, we will send it 14 to the other board members and the Chair of this body 15 will determine what to do with it at that point. Thank 16 you.

17 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: You may be heard.

MS. SMITH: Thank you. It seems like I missed a lot 18 in the last couple of weeks, but that's all right. I'll 19 catch up. Good evening to everyone in the neighborhood 20 here, occupants. I'm Bernice Smith, known as Mother 21 Bernice to the police department. I love them. I've been 22 23 involved with them since '73 when I was on the crime 24 committee, when they had it named. But now that I'm still 25 here and still complaining and fussing, because I want to



1 know, and I'm glad. I had been crying all week about two things that's happening in our city. The incident about 2 the mother, daughter and the little girl in the burnt car 3 4 that was in the neighborhood where I raised my children 5 on West Grand Boulevard and they went to the school on 6 30th Street. I didn't even want to go over there to see the area, but I was in the area Sunday when I first heard 7 8 about it. And my son, he told me, he said, "Mama, don't 9 go over there." I said, "No, I'm not going." But I just 10 want to know, women, I have 3 girls. I raised them to be 11 decent, respectful girls. If a man doesn't do you right 12 or mistreat you, leave him alone. I pray to you that you 13 do this. You are not here on earth to be abused, beat up, 14 or taken advantage of you. I'm telling you I want all 15 these women to stop dealing with these men who wants to 16 abuse them. That's number one. The next thing, I want you 17 men to be respectful to the women. If they don't want to 18 leave them alone. This man that did what he did this past 19 week, as far as I'm concerned, he doesn't need a trial. And he needs to be in the jail by himself, in solitary 20 21 confinement, feeding him once a day, and that's it. For 22 him to think about. You know what I'm talking about, 23 Wood?

24 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: No. We don't support torture.25 MS. SMITH: Well, that's the way I feel because he



1 shouldn't have done that to that young lady. He shouldn't

2 have done it, and a baby too, and a mother.

3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Time Is up.

4 MS. SMITH: Already?

5 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes.

MS. SMITH: Anyway, to my police department, I love you all, you know I do. And I want you to be safe out there, once you put that uniform on.

9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Absolutely.

10 MS. UNDERWOOD: Our next speakers will be Minister 11 Eric Blount and District 4, CAC Scotty Boman. Then we'll 12 go into Zoom.

MINISTER BLOUNT: Good evening board. I'm Minister
Eric Blount from Sacred Heart Catholic Church here in
Detroit.

16 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Good evening.

17 MINISTER BLOUNT: We have to be very honest. No one in this country should ever be executed without a fair 18 trial. We have facial recognition in this city that 19 misidentifies black people on a constant basis, okay? So, 20 21 unless you are a person of color that doesn't mind you or 22 your relatives being executed, I suggest you support a 23 fair and speedy trial. The embarrassing things of this week, another wrongful arrest and imprisonment using 24 25 facial recognition technology and a license plate reader.



And then the firing and hiring of 6 employees, just makes 1 this place a laughing stock of the whole city. The video 2 release ordinance. Why not? Let's not forget that this is 3 the same police department that started facial 4 recognition technology without the approval of the board. 5 6 So, they can do things quick, fast, and in a hurry 7 when they want to. And as we talk about video release, all we're saying is that we want the truth. And so many 8 times the truth is hidden because they turn off the 9 cameras, Oh, okay. Turn off the cameras. We don't have 10 11 enough evidence. Case dismissed. No, no, no. As far as ShotSpotter is concerned, Chief Bettison said to me, and 12 13 I'm sure he'll say it in public, because I hold back 14 nothing. And I feel like everything I say and do is being recorded. But Chief Bettison admitted to me that a 15 16 silencer on a gun can prevent ShotSpotter from ever detecting that shot. So, I mean, we're not talking 40/50 17 years ago. Silencers were used a long time ago, and I'm 18 sure they can be used now. The 9th Precinct ---19

20 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Time.

21 MINISTER BLOUNT: Don't let anyone tell you, you are 22 the most dangerous precinct in this city. That is not 23 true.

24 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: It is time.

25 MINISTER BLOUNT: Other precincts have private



1 security forces that protect them over and beyond what
2 they expect the police department to do. I guess my time
3 is up. Are you starting to mumble?

4 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah, yeah, right. Next speaker? 5 MR. BOMAN: Yeah. Hello. Yeah. I'm Scotty Boman, 6 District 4 Community Advisory Council, elected position. I have constituents. I'm also founder of Detroit 7 Residents Advancing Civilian Oversight and a member of 8 9 the Coalition for Police Transparency and Accountability. Today, I'm really mainly concerned about the board's role 10 of investigating those complaints. And I'm sure the 11 12 secretary has been doing a good job, and I know Jerome 13 Warfield is very concerned about the investigation of 14 complaints as well. And I know for a fact that there's 15 quite a backlog. I know of at least one that's probably 3 16 years old. Now, I don't know if they're prioritized the 17 way calls are prioritized, where more severe complaints get kind of moved to a quicker investigation than some 18 19 that are perhaps very minor. Mine was very minor, for 20 instance.

Perhaps. But there is a tremendous backlog, and I think it's unfair to the people who make the complaints that if they're legitimate, that their mistreatment is not addressed and that officers are not held accountable for that. It's unfair for the officers who were in the



1 right and have this hanging over their head. It's unfair to the residents that expect to have their board of 2 police commissioners and the OCI get to all those 3 complaints. Now, in my opinion, I hear a lot of talk 4 about a lot of different things at these meetings. And 5 6 whether you see me in person or not, I'm listening to Zoom. There's been times I've been on Zoom and I didn't 7 get to speak and I hear a lot of talk about a lot of 8 9 things. But I think until those complaints are caught up, until we are current with the complaints, I say we as a 10 11 city, that really, all the other things that are talked 12 about that aren't directly prescribed to this group in 13 the charter, you need to get to those things. I mean, get 14 to the complaints because that is a core function. And I 15 think there should be more transparency. And maybe there 16 is, maybe I'm missing them. Maybe I'm not looking at the 17 right part of the website where we can see how many complaints are backlogged, how old is the oldest 18 complaint, and so forth. I see the Chair, which means ---19 20 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes. And you can stand right 21 there. Let me ask you this. When did you file your 22 complaint?

MR. BOMAN: I don't have the date right in my head,but I believe it was in 2022.

25 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: 2022.



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1 MR. BOMAN: And it was a minor one. It was really just about a traffic incident where I did not think the 2 report had addressed things accurately. And more 3 importantly that when I attempted to reach, because I was 4 5 referred to the officer who wrote the report, when I 6 attempted to reach the person, I had tried diligently over an extended period of time, never got a response. 7 And that was really when I made a complaint to the BOPC; 8 9 I'm not getting a response. CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Pause one second. We are 10 past 2022 complaints, right, in the backlog, right? 11 12 CI WARFIELD: Through the Chair. There are a few 20, 13 22 complaints that are still in our universe. So, there 14 are a few. However, I can look you up, Mr. Boman, and get 15 back with you tomorrow. I remember looking it up before 16 and I thought we had finished that investigation, but I'll check. I'll recheck to make sure. And if you haven't 17

18 heard from us, I guarantee you you're here from us

19 tomorrow.

20 MR. BOMAN: Thank you. And again, it's so old I have 21 trouble remembering, right?

22 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Right, I understand.

MR. BOMAN: I guess my point is there's backlog and 24 --

25 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah. Absolutely. And we don't



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1 shy from the fact that we have been working diligently and bringing in staff to do that. And when you see these 2 folders, these are citizen complaints that the 3 commissioners have to review. In fact, to date we have 50 4 5 more to give over to the board. And they've been picking them up. They have been rising in rapid numbers now. And 6 7 so other plans are underway to be able to address this thing. And that's been a stickler for me, because, like 8 9 you said, it is the backbone of the board of police commission and to be able to deal with these complaints. 10 These are very, very serious to us because they're 11 12 something that the citizens took time to address and to 13 complain about. And we definitely want them to be held in 14 a sacred type of manner, you know? And so, thank you for 15 your patience and your indulgence and your advocacy and 16 your passion, and we continue to welcome it. Rest assured 17 you'll get a call back. However, there are others that we 18 are working on and they are in the pipeline. And so, you 19 have to keep on working that, and working that until you get it done. I came into this and many of us came into 20 this and things happen and things are being fixed to be 21 able to deal with this. So, thank you. 22

23 MR. BOMAN: Thank you, Mr. Chair, and Mr.

24 Investigator.

25 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir.



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MS. UNDERWOOD: Thank you, Mr. Chair. We'll go into Zoom now. Our first speaker is Torpedo. Our next speaker will be Ms. Crystal Rice.

4 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Are you there?

5 TORPEDO: Yeah. Hey, Darryl Woods. You think it's 6 funny? Listen to this and pay close attention. The 7 president of the United States is Donald J. Trump. Now, I had somebody take to him that video of me standing on the 8 9 porch with them talking to the Venezuelan immigrants at 12842 Sussex Street. That was back in July, June, July of 10 11 2024. Then again in August. I had someone take him 12 personally, flew out to his rally and took him to the 13 allegations on voter fraud by the Anonymous Citizen 14 Report done by Janice M. Winfrey, the Detroit City clerk 15 and chairperson of the Detroit Election Commission, a 16 cheater and a liar. Now, you spoke my name to somebody. 17 You don't know who knows me. You don't know who I know. While you were over there in Ryan, and I told you to ask 18 Mark about me. Mark McLeod, the one who was calling you 19 on the phone that day, and you said his name with such 20 21 reverence.

Mark knows me. And I'm surprised he didn't tell you that I am one of the coldest. Now, I'm going to just put it out here. Keep my name out of your mouth. You don't know who I know. Now, when I saw you going up in the



1 mayor's office, you were going in there to talk to that little leprechaun. See, there are a lot of things you 2 don't know about me. I got a 40-year reputation around 3 4 the City of Detroit on the streets of being a standup 5 100. That's with the pastors and priests, and the gangsters too, and the kids. So, watch your mouth, joker. 6 7 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Lord Jesus, the one that Cody is hanging out with Donald Trump, you know, hey. 8 9 Next speaker.

10 MS. RICE: Good evening, everyone. My name is Crystal Rice. I recently moved back to Detroit after 13 years. 11 12 And probably about 3 weeks after I moved in October of 13 last year, I got carjacked at gunpoint. And I wanted to 14 shout out to the 2nd Precinct for assisting me and 15 helping me, as well as the carjacking task force. I want 16 to thank them personally for --- I mean, getting it done 17 because they did get 6 people and they got the people. So, I'm really glad about that. Another thing, you know, 18 19 I like to say the plus. Now, the second thing I want to talk about is Police Commissioner Liberty Smith, Tamara 20 Liberty Smith. I know I'm a little late in the game with 21 this because I work a lot. But I think it's very 22 23 inappropriate for a police commissioner to be on video videotaping a person who was involved in something with 24 the two children that were found frozen and died in the 25



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1 casino. I think that's very distasteful, not just as a police commissioner, but as a mother. I don't think that 2 that was proper etiquette to be on; from what I know, and 3 I know some people in the police department, you are not 4 supposed to be on social media. I don't know what it is 5 for the police commissioner, but for you to be 6 videotaping, talking to radio stations, telling the 7 girl's business, meeting someone at a nail shop and 8 9 showing a video of her, I think is very distasteful on her end. And I think it's very rude. And then for her to 10 11 say that she saw me. I haven't seen you in two years, but 12 since, I mean, I'm sorry, a year, when you were at my 13 cousin's event. And I think you need to focus on finding 14 somebody, helping the community find their victims that 15 were murdered like my cousin was murdered. The gentleman 16 on Fenkell, the young man, figure that out instead of 17 videotaping a public service announcement for this girl. I think that's inappropriate and unprofessional. 18 19 MS. UNDERWOOD: We're going to go next to Mr. Jahdante Smith and former Commissioner, William Davis. 20 MR. SMITH: Good afternoon. May I be heard? 21 22 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir. 23 MR. SMITH: Yeah. So, good afternoon. I hate to hear about the nasty words towards Commissioner Smith, but 24 those words should have been directed towards other 25



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1 members on the board, like Commissioner Pressley, and also Commissioner Hernandez for the terrible work that 2 you guys have done in holding up motion and things of 3 that nature. I do want to talk about that via release 4 5 ordinance. That's going to be a very big thing because 6 some officers don't even have body cameras on, as one of 7 the Lieutenant, Brandon Cole. 25 years on the force, not 8 enough common sense to even have a body cam, a body-worn 9 camera on at a protest. Also, I want to say I have just seen a very disturbing video of two officers punching a 10 young black male in his head, in the back of his body 11 12 while trying to arrest him. And he's a son of a Detroit 13 police detective. Very, very terrible. That's how we get 14 all these lawsuits.

15 Also, the facial recognition and the lawsuits we're 16 getting from that ShotSpotter as well. We have all of 17 this technology and we're still getting all of these lawsuits. Very ridiculous. Also, I feel like Brandon Cole 18 19 has still not been --- even though he was suspended for all that time, I feel like he's still in the same 20 21 position. He's still a lieutenant. He also still has all 22 of his rank and all of his pay. Very ridiculous to be 23 able to do certain things that he's done. Take political stances, take racist stances, and be a terror to the 24 25 community and still hold your job. In no other job can



you do things like that and still hold your job. Also,
 when it comes to complaints, I filed several complaints
 over the years.

I don't even get calls back on some of these 4 complaints. And I think there are complaints that I filed 5 6 in at least 2022, maybe even before, that I'm just getting letters from investigators. I understand there is 7 a backlog, but the transparency behind that is still not 8 there. It's kind of ridiculous how you file a complaint 9 and you never know if it's followed up on or the 10 officer's still in the streets, which we know there are 11 12 still in the streets, but if they have severe complaints, 13 they're still out there creating more situations where 14 they could get more complaints. So, you just never know. 15 Also needs to be investigated; just how that process is 16 working. I know you're doing ---

MS. UNDERWOOD: Mr. Chair, that's your last speaker.
CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Commissioner Davis is not there?
MS. UNDERWOOD: I'm sorry, Mr. Chair.

20 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes. Thank you. Commissioner21 Davis, you may be heard.

22 MR. DAVIS: Good afternoon. Can I be heard?

23 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir.

24 MR. DAVIS: Okay. I thought you all were going to 25 overlook me again. It wouldn't be the first time. I think



1 that actually I should have a process developed where you all reach out to the people who file citizen complaints; 2 3 that you all reach out to them every 6 months. You know, even if you all haven't closed the case or thoroughly 4 5 investigated. I think that's a problem and the fact that 6 citizens need to be updated, at least know that you all are working, or somebody is looking at it or doing 7 something. And I think it's horrible that you all have 8 backlogs from 2022. You know, ideally you shouldn't have 9 anything over a year old. Also, is there a plan if you 10 all are about to get additional monies from the state to 11 12 help? Is there a plan on how to use that? Is that going 13 to be for these community groups that are helping the 14 police or is that going to be for additional officers? Or 15 is that going to be for additional neighborhood police 16 officers? It would be good for more information to come. I'm sure there's already a plan. It'd be good for us to 17 18 know what the plan is. Because we need to be doing more 19 in the community, in the neighborhoods. Because when I go downtown, and I go downtown a lot, I see a lot of police 20 21 officers, but I don't see as many in the communities, in the various districts outside of downtown Midtown and 22 Corktown. You know, I think there's an opportunity to 23 increase the number of police officers that's actually 24 serving in the different precincts and not overdo it 25



Downtown. Also, I think that we need to make sure that we try to encourage more Detroit residents to be in the Detroit Police Department. I think the numbers are

4 horrible about the number of officers that live outside
5 the city and the number of command officers that live
6 outside the city. Thank you.

7 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you so much.

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8 MS. UNDERWOOD: Mr. Denika Williams. This is the last 9 speaker, sir?

10 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir. Mr. Denika Williams?
11 MR. WILLIAMS: Yes. Hi. Can I be heard, please?
12 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir.

13 MR. WILLIAMS: Yes. Hi, Denika Williams. I'm a 14 private citizen resident taxpayer, legacy Detroiter. I 15 would like to know if this body can tell me how many 16 missing black women and children there are in the City of 17 Detroit, and what are the efforts and the process is to find them. Do they get amber alerts? Do they get any type 18 of notification or is there a blast sent out? And it does 19 not have to be an emergency or a life-threatening 20 situation, but that's connected to all the complaints 21 that have gone unanswered. I ask this question at the 22 23 council all the time, and I get no answer or response. And when I come here, I'm hoping that I can get those 24 25 numbers, so that we can find missing black women and



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children instead of letting them, you know, be found dead
 in cars or in homes or things of that nature.

As well as I'm concerned most definitely about what 3 is this facial recognition for? I mean, we have so much 4 5 surveillance in the City of Detroit. I wonder, do the 6 cameras even work? How do you all monitor those cameras, 7 if you all have a shortage? How do you all manage to get the information and such, if you can't comprehend ---? I 8 mean, get real time information as to finding the 9 location and whereabouts. I just heard about the 10 ShotSpotter statistics and such. You know, while I 11 12 believe that it doesn't solve the crimes that should be 13 reduced to 15% or zero, I thought we were aiming for 14 zero. But also, the racism of this police department is 15 out of control. You let Brandon Cole get back on the 16 force. I don't care what. He should be fired and removed. 17 He'll be put in another department, but it's setting an example. And this department, including its 18

19 commissioners, have failed, mostly ---

20 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you very kindly. Can you, 21 Deputy Chief give an update as relates to the missings 22 and how people can stay in tune with that? I know there's 23 a process for the department, I believe vis-a-vis social 24 media and other apparatus. So, can you give us an update 25 on that?



1 DC WILLIAMS: Through the Chair. The department on a weekly basis posts the missing numbers. We post the year 2 to date, how many missings we have, and then how many 3 have been recovered. It's on the department's social 4 5 media page on Facebook, and I believe it can also be accessed through X. X and Instagram, I believe. I'll have 6 a more concrete answer for the board tomorrow, but I know 7 that we do post those to social media so, the community 8 can't see those and monitor those as well. 9

10 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Thank you. Commissioner 11 Moore.

12 COMMISSIONER MOORE: One question that did come up 13 through that last speaker, Deniko Williams was about 14 Amber Alerts. Can you let the public know what the 15 process is for getting an Amber Alert put out?

16 DC WILLIAMS: Yes. So, for Amber Alert, that's a 17 statewide notification. Everybody knows it goes off on the phone. In order for that to actually be approved, 18 departmentally, we have some things we have to do, then 19 we submit it to the state and the state makes the 20 ultimate approval. If I'm correct, I believe that's the 21 process. It's been a minute since I've actually put out 22 an Amber alert, so I can double check on that to make 23 24 sure. I think if there is anyone here who's actually done 25 it recently, let me know. Otherwise, I'll get back to the



board to just confirm that what I put out was correct.
 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes. Commissioner.

3 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: So, DC, if I could ---4 through the Chair, if I could just ask another question 5 with regard to that. What is the timeline for issuing an 6 Amber Alert? Like what is the gap, the time gap between 7 the time the person is reported missing and the Amber 8 Alert goes out?

9 DC WILLIAMS: So, I'll just give a real quick sample. So, officers get a call of a missing person. They go and 10 11 they confirm that there is a missing person. Either the 12 missing is serious because of mental issues or it's a 13 juvenile. So, those cases where there is an Amber Alert, 14 we get the information, we get the photo release from the 15 family, and then we submit that to, I believe we submit 16 it through a lien to the state, and then it's released. 17 The time, I would say probably doesn't take much, maybe one, two hours; once we have confirmation. 18

19 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Thank you.

20 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. I'm asking Ms. Blossom and 21 our team to be able to make sure that once we get those 22 numbers that we make sure on our social media handles and 23 on our website, that those numbers are included as they 24 are included with the department. Yes.

25 MS. GOSS: This is like my second or third meeting.



My name is Michelle Goss. I lived in Detroit all my life. 1 2 When I hear people ask questions about their complaints as far as an officer being inappropriate or doing 3 something that they think is wrong, like you all didn't 4 5 address that. So, what is the process? So, I understand 6 that people, I'm sorry, that people are [unclear]. But what is the process? Like, if I have a complaint about 7 somebody being racist towards me that's in this 8 9 particular authority, I would like to know what's the 10 process; like, what do you do? Do you do anything that you can tell us, so that when people make a comment like 11 12 that, at least their mind can be at ease about, you know, 13 something is being done?

14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Well, that's a good question. 15 That's something that we have already investigated and 16 something that has been adjudicated through the proper 17 channels. And so, a lot of times there's not a comment that we can make on it because it's something that has 18 already been done. This is our purview right here. These 19 cases that are inside this folder, and we get stacks of 20 folders on a weekly basis. And so, we investigate citizen 21 22 complaints and ---

23 MS. GOSS: Not the police, that the guy was asking. 24 So, let me just ask a clarifying question if I may.

25 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, ma'am.



MS. GOSS: So, is there a place, you said it's already been adjudicated, so is there a place to say, hey, Michelle, you can go check whatever website, and this is the answer about what was the ---CHAIRPERSON WOODS: The stuff that was mentioned today was something over a year ago, that has been already addressed and it's already been dealt with. So, there is no reason for us to address something that we have no power over and there is nothing that we can do about it. You know, some things --- oh, are you asking for you specifically? You're saying in general, right? MS. GOSS: I'm just mean, period. So, if somebody, so all the stuff they brought up, I had never heard those things before, right, because I am new to this. CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Well, if you go and view some of our videos, you'll see a lot of stuff. MS. GOSS: The board of police commissioners' site. CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Absolutely.

19 MS. GOSS: Got you.

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20 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: You know, so a lot of this stuff 21 is just muddy waters, and rest assured when there's a 22 citizen complaint that our office of the chief 23 investigator is going to make sure that those complaints 24 get handled in a manner in which they should be handled. 25 And if a person wants to lodge a complaint, even in this



1 room, they take that complaint here, and if they are
2 online; if they want to file a complaint then there are
3 ways to do that too, online, in here or going to the
4 office of the chief investigator. So, it's a process. So,
5 sometimes, and that's quite frankly, most of the people
6 who speak at the board of police commissioners, speak
7 every single week. And we meet every single week.

I think we meet too much; we meet just to meet, and 8 9 meet and meet and meet. And they are working and working and working and working in the office of the chief 10 investigator. So, we have a number of investigators who 11 12 investigate cases 5 days a week, and they are diligent in 13 their investigations. They talk to the people who have 14 the complaint. Can you explain the process, Chief 15 Investigator, because I think that is a very good 16 question, and I appreciate the dialogue.

17 MS. GOSS: Yes.

18 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah, absolutely.

19 CI WARFIELD: Thank you. And through the Chair. As 20 Chair Woods said that we have supervising investigators 21 here and investigators here in the room at every meeting 22 to make sure that if a citizen has a complaint, we take 23 that information down immediately and we go back and 24 begin the investigative process. The investigative 25 process, typically in a normal fashion, when we are not



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1 backed up, lasts somewhere between 60, maximum 90 days that it takes us to investigate the cases. But for a 2 number of reasons, we'll do another presentation on this 3 very shortly. Right now, our office is backed up with 4 complaints, but it doesn't mean we're not actively 5 6 investigating complaints. We are, as a matter of fact, just for the record, for the first quarter of this year, 7 we closed, not just investigated, but closed 614 8 complaints. That's from January through March. 9 And we received 473 new complaints from January 10 through March, meaning that for the first time in a 11 12 number of years, we have actually closed more complaints 13 than we received at that particular period of time. And 14 so, our investigators, all 21 investigators are working 15 extremely hard, very diligently, and we interview the 16 officers. So, we Garrity the officers, we gather all of the evidence that we do. One of the things we're not 17 going to do is compromise the thoroughness of the 18 investigation. Unfortunately, some of the investigations 19 may take a little bit of time to get all of the evidence 20 we need to come to a correct finding. Now, one of the 21 things that you might also need to know is that we don't 22 get involved in the disciplinary process. So, we don't 23 24 recommend the discipline nor do we sanction the 25 discipline in any way.



1 Our job is to make sure we find the evidence and find the facts and present that to this board and to the 2 department for them to carry it further. But our 3 investigators work sometimes 6, I work sometimes 7 days a 4 5 week to make sure that we are doing it the best we can. We know that it is an issue with the public, which is why 6 7 we work so hard. And just so you know, the progress of 8 how we're getting those complaints in; about a year ago, 9 we were handing in about 15, maybe 20 complaints a week to the board for them to sign. Now, we're doing 48 to 50 10 complaints every week for the board to sign off on, 11 12 because those investigations have been completed. This 13 board, under this leadership, has worked very diligently 14 to make sure that our office is fully staffed with 15 investigators. And we had gone years without that; 16 without our staff being fully staffed. So, we're doing 17 the very best we can. Certainly, I can go into more detail at another meeting, but I just want you to know 18 that we are working very diligently to get the job done. 19 20 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes. And also, we cannot compromise the investigation by speaking about it 21 publicly on certain things too. The investigations are 22 23 addressed through this and through the process. And so, 24 when there is time for us to comment on something, we'll comment on it. You know, just like if you were here 25



earlier, we asked about the video that was out there surfacing because that was of public interest, and we wanted to make sure that the public understood what was going on with that process. And take a look at our dashboard, take a look at our citizen complaint dashboard and you'll see the trends there. Anything else? Before we don't have a quorum.

8 DC WILLIAMS: Through the Chair.

9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir.

DC WILLIAMS: If I could. So, first I wanted to 10 11 answer the question. I did get confirmation. So, it's the 12 Detroit Police Department's missing page, and that's on 13 Facebook. Year to date, we had 585, missings. 507 have 14 been recovered. 29 were runaways and 49 are missing. So 15 that's where we stand right now. And that's our year-to-16 date number. And it's updated weekly on the department's 17 Facebook page for Detroit Police, missing. And then for the Amber Alert, that was a confirmation. Local law 18 enforcement, we get all the information together and then 19 we submit it to Michigan State Police. If it fits the 20 21 criteria to release as an Amber alert, then Michigan State Police will issue that alert. 2.2

CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, ma'am. Excuse me,
Commissioner Banks, you'll go after her. Ladies first.
COMMISSIONER BANKS: Let her go.



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1 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: All right.

2 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. Through the 3 Chair. Just a quick question with regard to the numbers 4 that you just mentioned. Are they divided or separated by 5 demographics, age, et cetera?

DC WILLIAMS: So, we're actually working on that now. Chief Bettison received a report, I believe it was about two weeks ago, and he wanted to have a breakdown by age and sex and by ethnicity as well.

10 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah,

11 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Through the Chair. I would 12 think that it would be very important that we know how 13 many juveniles are missing. I mean, everybody has a 14 priority, but especially, you know, young children, I 15 would think. Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you. Commissioner Banks. 16 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Thank you. Through the Chair. 17 18 Yes. There was a young man shot by the Detroit Police Department on the westside of Detroit. Deputy Chief, I'm 19 requesting a video cam of that. If you could help me out, 20 please. Because I want to make sure that the Detroit 21 Police Department followed protocol, followed standard 22 procedure when this altercation went down. And then also, 23 I like to possibly, if I could relay this message to you 24 25 to reach out to the family, because I'm willing to be a



1 shoulder for the family to lean on.

2 DC WILLIAMS: Through the Chair. Commissioner, could

3 you give me the date of that incident?

4 COMMISSIONER BANKS: The date?

5 DC WILLIAMS: If you don't have it, I get it from you

6 at a later time.

7 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Deputy Chief, all I have is the

8 young man that was 16 years old. He was shot on the

9 westside of Detroit. I don't have a date.

10 DC WILLIAMS: I believe I am familiar with this. This

11 happened last year?

12 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Yes.

DC WILLIAMS: Okay. I'm familiar with this. I'll make sure you get that information.

15 COMMISSIONER BANKS: I appreciate that.

16 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay.

17 DC WILLIAMS: Through the Chair, if I may?

18 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir.

DC WILLIAMS: Chair, you did ask a question about an incident that was seen on social media with two officers who appeared to be wrestling suspects who got away. So, the suspect did get away. He briefly got away. The officers were investigating domestic violence. After the scuffle, both officers appeared to possibly be suffering from broken fingers. We're still waiting on the final



1	diagnosis of that. But the canine was ordered. The	
2	suspect was taken into custody. And both officers are	
3	fine. We are just seeing if they have possible broken	
4	fingers from the tussle.	
5	CHAIRPERSON WOODS: That's satisfying, Commissioner	
6	Moore?	
7	COMMISSIONER MOORE: Yes, sir. Very much.	
8	CHAIRPERSON WOODS: When did that happen?	
9	DC WILLIAMS: That happened on the 6th.	
10	CHAIRPERSON WOODS: On the 6th, okay.	
11	DC WILLIAMS: April 6th.	
12	CHAIRPERSON WOODS: All right. There is nothing	
13	further, Commissioners. We don't have a quorum, so this	
14	meeting is adjourned.
