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- 3 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Good evening. My name is Ricardo
- 4 Moore, Pro Tem, of this evening's meeting. To begin, and
- 5 guess who's just walking in? Our chairman and vice man.
- 6 So, I'm going to stand down.
- 7 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thanks, sir. You on the dock?
- 8 COMMISSIONER: I on the dock.
- 9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Keep it moving. Keep it going.
- 10 Commissioner Moore.
- 11 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Alright, Mr. Chair.
- 12 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes.
- 13 COMMISSIONER WOODS: At this time, we have an
- 14 invocation by Chaplain Glen Hodges. Chaplain.
- 15 CHAPLAIN HODGES: Let us bow our heads? Oh Lord, our
- 16 Lord. How excellent is thy name in all the earth? The
- 17 heavens declare the glory of thee, and the permanent
- 18 showeth your handiwork. Day unto day utters speech and
- 19 night, unto night, showeth knowledge. There is no speech,
- 20 no language where thy voice is not heard. We thank you
- 21 once again for allowing us to assemble as one body.
- 22 Today, we stand with you, oh God. And continue to thank
- 23 you for presiding over this meeting. Although we may have
- 24 different opinions, we thank you for giving us unity of
- 25 spirit. As we discuss the concerns of the citizens and



- 1 the affairs of the City of Detroit Police Department, we
- 2 ask that your will be done. Show us your purpose,
- 3 enlighten us that we may know how you want us to
- 4 accomplish our assignment.
- 5 Direct our thoughts, words, decisions, and actions
- 6 toward the right path. And help us stay on track. Let us
- 7 not make decisions based upon what we know. But let us
- 8 act based upon your wisdom. Enable us to think and
- 9 strategize in ways that will achieve great results.
- 10 Father, let your will be done in this meeting that you
- 11 will get glory. We also hold up the board members, every
- 12 police officer and their command staff, the citizens,
- 13 also the staff of the Board, and DPD, and all of the
- 14 homes that are represented in this meeting today. We pray
- 15 that they will be homes of peace, homes of love, but most
- 16 of all, homes where your spirit dwells in Jesus' name.
- 17 Amen.
- 18 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Amen. Can you please call the
- 19 roll?
- 20 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Woods Present.
- 21 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Smith Present.
- 22 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Bernard Present,
- 23 District 2.
- 24 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Banks is excused.
- 25 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Bell Present, District

- 2 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Carter -
- 3 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Moore Present, District
- 4 7.
- 5 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Hernandez is excused.
- 6 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Pressley is excused.
- 7 MS. GARNIER: And Commissioner Dewaelsche is excused.
- 8 MS. GARNIER: Six, present, sir.
- 9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you very kindly. I
- 10 entertain a motion for the approval of the May 8th, 2025
- 11 agenda.
- 12 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: So, moved.
- 13 COMMISSIONER SMITH: Second.
- 14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Moved by Commissioner Bernard.
- 15 Second by Commissioner Smith. Any discussion? All in
- 16 favor say aye.
- 17 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
- 18 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Anyone oppose? The motion is
- 19 carried. I entertain a motion for the approval of the
- 20 minutes for May 1st, 2025.
- 21 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: So, moved.
- 22 COMMISSIONER SMITH: Second.
- 23 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Moved by Commissioner Bernard.
- 24 Second by Commissioner Smith. All in favor say aye.
- 25 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.



- 1 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Anyone oppose? The motion is
- 2 carried. Introduction of the BOPC staff and Chief of
- 3 Police and Elected Officials and Representatives.
- 4 MS. GARNIER: Through the Chair. This evening, excuse
- 5 me. BOPC staff: Attorney Dante Goss. Drew Fries, Felicia
- 6 Tyson, Mary Barber, Teresa Blossom. Candace Hayes
- 7 Artemisia Joshua Jonya Underwood. Office of the Chief
- 8 Investigator's Office, Supervising Investigator. Tiffany
- 9 Stewart, DPD HR Director Katrina Patillo. For Police
- 10 Chief Todd Bettison is Deputy Chief Michael Parish. The
- 11 interpreters for this evening are on Zoom, Ms. Yakata and
- 12 Dr. Stephanie Beatty. Court reporter Dan Handyside,
- 13 Enrique Jackson, Audio Visual. Charles Henry, Media
- 14 Services Video. Registered at this time are Marie
- 15 Overall, for State Representative Tyrone Carter's Office.
- 16 Shania Sutton of Representative Stephanie Young's Office.
- 17 On Zoom are: LaDon Davis of Office of Council member Fred
- 18 Durhal III, as well as former Detroit Police Commissioner
- 19 --- excuse me, William Davis. Also, from the 8th
- 20 Precinct, Police Community Relations Council: We have
- 21 Gail Tubbs, president, Michelle Ruffin, vice president,
- 22 Val Lever, treasurer, Peggy Noble, Deborah Chapman and
- 23 Randall Herbert, members at large. And on Zoom from the
- 24 Community Relations Council of the 8th Precinct is Nicole
- 25 --- I'm sorry, Nicole Fisher of the 4th Precinct. My



- 1 apologies. And that ends those who are registered at this
- 2 time, sir.
- 3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you very kindly. I don't
- 4 have a report for this evening. We'll go to the Chief of
- 5 Police Report.
- 6 DC PARISH: Thank you Mr. Chairman. Through you to
- 7 the rest of the board. Beginning with our crime stats we
- 8 are down 14% in homicides, down 32% in non-fatal
- 9 shootings, down 13% in robberies. For total part one
- 10 violent crimes we're down 9%.
- 11 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Let the record reflect that
- 12 Commissioner Burton is present.
- DC PARISH: And with respect to carjackings, we are
- 14 down 28%. Our community updates: the 12th Precinct
- 15 traffic operation. Speaking first to that, the 12th
- 16 Precinct recently completed a traffic operation that
- 17 started in January, 2025. The goal was to reduce
- 18 accidents by educating drivers and forcing traffic
- 19 violations. During the operation, officers made 40 felony
- 20 arrests, including 3 for carrying concealed weapons, 2
- 21 for possession of stolen motor vehicles and 92
- 22 misdemeanor arrests. Officers also wrote several tickets
- 23 for license plate violations and many for other traffic
- 24 violations. Compared to the same time period last year,
- 25 there were fewer accidents that occurred in the 12th



- 1 Precinct when compared to this year. So, it appears that
- 2 operation was a success. Speaking now to the 7th Precinct
- 3 Traffic Enforcement Initiative. The 7th Precinct is
- 4 continuing to conduct traffic enforcement along Jefferson
- 5 Avenue. Over the past few weeks, officers wrote 42
- 6 speeding tickets, 27 signal violation tickets, and
- 7 several license plate violations. The officers also made
- 8 one felony arrest from this operation. The department
- 9 will continue to emphasize traffic enforcement in an
- 10 effort to keep our residents and visitors safe while
- 11 driving in the city.
- 12 Speaking now to search warrants with a focus on
- 13 guns, keeping guns and drugs off the streets. Officers
- 14 from our Narcotics Section conducted two search warrants
- on April 30th, 2025, in the 9300 block of Homer and the
- 16 9600 block of Yosemite. They made 2 felony arrests, 10
- 17 misdemeanor arrests, and confiscated 11 firearms,
- 18 including four handguns and 7 shotguns. 8.8 grams of
- 19 fentanyl worth approximately \$880, 106.1 grams of
- 20 marijuana worth \$1,061. 93.2 grams of cocaine worth
- 21 \$7,456. 117 pills worth \$1,170 and \$243 in cash. Thanks
- 22 to the officers from our Narcotics Unit. Their efforts to
- 23 remove these items from our communities is worthy of
- 24 praise.
- DPD members graduating. On Thursday, May 1st, 2025,



- 1 26 sworn and professional members of the Detroit Police
- 2 Department graduated from the Wayne State University Mike
- 3 Ilitch School of Business, with their Master's degrees.
- 4 On Saturday, May 3rd, 2025, 86 sworn and professional
- 5 members of the Detroit Police Department graduated from
- 6 Cleary University with their bachelor's and master's
- 7 degrees. And I'll note that my wife was one of those
- 8 individuals. Turning to the 10th Precinct arrest and
- 9 search warrant activity. On Thursday, May 1st, 2025, the
- 10 10th Precinct, arrested a suspect wanted for felonious
- 11 assault for allegedly pointing a gun at two women. The
- 12 officers also served a search warrant. In connection with
- 13 this incident. Officers recovered a digital scale,
- 14 ammunition, 29 grams of cocaine, 3.6 grams of fentanyl,
- 15 and several grams of other narcotics. The offender was on
- 16 probation for controlled substances and was a convicted
- 17 felon. He was ultimately charged with two counts of
- 18 controlled substance delivery and manufacturing less than
- 19 50 grams. Felon in possession of ammunition and habitual
- 20 offender fourth degree.
- We're also reporting on the Cinco de Mayo safety
- 22 situation and isolating a homicide and search warrant. We
- 23 need to thank the officers from the 4th Precinct and
- 24 other units who assisted our law enforcement partners,
- 25 our businesses in the community for another safe and



- 1 successful Cinco de Mayo. This was the third straight
- 2 year without any major incidents. There was a fatal
- 3 shooting at West Grand Boulevard and Risdon in the Fourth
- 4 precinct on the day of the Cinco de Mayo parade. However,
- 5 the shooting was not related to the parade or any of the
- 6 festivities. It was regarded as an isolated incident. The
- 7 offender was taken into custody and has been charged.
- 8 Also in the Fourth Precinct. On April 29th, 2025, a
- 9 Detroit police officer observed a felonious assault of a
- 10 juvenile in the 4400 block of West Vernor. The offenders
- 11 fled in a vehicle and the vehicle was later identified
- 12 through video.
- On May 2nd, 2025, officers executed a search warrant
- 14 after locating the vehicle. Spent casings were found
- 15 inside the vehicle, and in the backyard of the location.
- 16 Officers searched the location and 8 firearms were
- 17 recovered. We consider this outstanding work by the
- 18 Fourth Precinct and getting guns off the streets. I'd
- 19 also like to report on a barricaded gunman incident that
- 20 occurred on Saturday May 3rd, 2025. Officers responded to
- 21 West Chicago and Hubble for a stolen vehicle that had
- 22 crashed. The suspect refused to leave the vehicle, and
- 23 the Technical Services Section was called to the scene.
- 24 Negotiations lasted for a couple of hours before the
- 25 suspect peacefully surrendered. The officers deserve



- 1 praise for their work with this difficult situation and
- 2 commended for their patients in a situation fraught with
- 3 uncertainty. Speaking of Motor City Makeover. On
- 4 Saturday, May 3rd, 2025, officers from our 8th and 11th
- 5 Precincts helped residents beautify their neighborhoods.
- 6 Motor City Makeover is a citywide beautification
- 7 event for the first 3 weekends of May, and we're happy
- 8 that our officers were able to assist in that endeavor.
- 9 The Renaissance Center. Cutting Suspect has been
- 10 arrested. This is an update regarding that incident. I
- 11 believe it was reported first to the board last week. The
- 12 suspect was arrested on Monday, May 5th, 2025. We want to
- 13 thank the community and the media for their assistance in
- 14 this investigation. Without the community, nothing that
- 15 we do would be possible. A warrant has been submitted,
- 16 and the offender is scheduled to be arraigned today.
- 17 The Sixth Precinct. On May 5th, 2025, Commander
- 18 Renell Newson of the Sixth Precinct honored two members
- 19 of the South Warrendale Radio Patrol. These radio patrol
- 20 members assisted the Sixth Precinct Patrol Unit, who were
- 21 involved in a struggle with a suspect. Thanks to this
- 22 radio patrol --- I'm sorry, for this. Thanks to the South
- 23 Warrendale Radio Patrol for aiding our members, ensuring
- 24 that we best serve our community. Fifth Precinct Traffic
- 25 Enforcement Initiative. The Fifth Precinct recently added



- 1 another motor officer, allowing them to conduct
- 2 additional traffic enforcement for the week of April 27th
- 3 to May 3rd. They made 1 felony arrest and 6 misdemeanor
- 4 arrests, conducted 84 traffic stops and issued 131
- 5 tickets, including 16 tickets for license plate
- 6 violations. The chief on May 7th, 2025 kicked off the
- 7 first walk a mile Wednesday of this year. And that took
- 8 place in the Ninth Precinct. Former chief of Police,
- 9 James E. White joined the department in passing the
- 10 torch, as he started this tradition back when he first
- 11 became chief. Throughout the summer the department will
- 12 continue to walk through different precincts in the city
- 13 on a biweekly schedule.
- Also, on May 7th, 2025, the 11th and 12th Precincts,
- 15 along with the Vice Unit, Wayne County, Sheriff's
- 16 Deputies, Highland Park Police, City of Detroit Health
- 17 Department, and others conducted a quality-of-life
- 18 operation for our residents in the area of John R from
- 19 McNichols to 8th Mile. This was a zero-tolerance
- 20 initiative with an aim for high visibility, aimed at
- 21 targeting illegal activity, enforcing traffic laws, and
- 22 addressing ongoing community concerns. We want to thank
- 23 our partners who worked with us, as well as the media for
- 24 coming out and covering it. This was not a one-time
- 25 operation. It will be conducted again. We have a class



- 1 graduating tomorrow. On Friday, May 9th, 2025, 39 student
- 2 police officers will take the oath and become members of
- 3 the Detroit Police Department. This graduation will be
- 4 held at 10:30 AM at Greater Grace Temple. Our recruiting
- 5 events. On Tuesday, May 6th, 2025, the Recruiting Unit
- 6 visited careers fairs at Mumford High School and Lincoln
- 7 Park High School. Also, the Recruiting Unit visited the
- 8 Saginaw Career Complex. This concludes my report. Thank
- 9 you.
- 10 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you very kindly. Yes, sir.
- 11 Commissioner Moore.
- 12 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. Chief,
- 13 did you receive any complaints regarding Cinco de Mayo?
- DC PARISH: I'm not aware of any complaints regarding
- 15 Cinco de Mayo. I'm not sure if the chief investigator
- 16 received any, but nothing that I'm aware of.
- 17 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Because the Detroit Metro Times
- 18 did a story on the Detroit El Club that said that Detroit
- 19 police were intimidating citizens at the El Club.
- 20 DC PARISH: I'm not aware of any issue at that club.
- 21 I can look further into it to see if we in fact received
- 22 any complaints, but I'm not aware of any.
- 23 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Okay. Thank you very much.
- 24 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Any other questions?
- 25 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I just want to point out that



- 1 on Cinco de Mayo, it was raining. You know, there was a
- 2 very bad cold and rainy day this year.
- 3 COMMISSIONER MOORE: So what are you saying?
- 4 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I say it to mean that there
- 5 weren't a lot of people out, I don't think.
- 6 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Okay. Yeah. But they did an
- 7 extensive article that said police intimidation with
- 8 dealing with the locks, you had to go to Detroit Metro
- 9 Steve Neavling who wrote the story. I think it's an
- 10 interest in reading. I'm glad Chief Parish is going to
- 11 follow up on it.
- 12 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes.
- 13 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you.
- 14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah. Thank you. And if it was
- 15 cold outside, that meant they went on the inside. Any
- 16 further questions? No further questions. Thank you Deputy
- 17 Chief Parish, and thank you for all that you do. The
- 18 Deputy Chief has been a bull work in terms of helping us
- 19 to get these policies updated and been a strong partner
- 20 with the Policy Committee to be able to work on our
- 21 policies. And it was good to see you in the room only
- 22 yesterday. And, I almost said --- but it is good seeing
- 23 you guys. The community input is very, very valuable to
- 24 us, and it's invaluable to the department. He's been
- 25 very, very welcoming to that. And so, for those who pay



- 1 attention to our website and have an interest in policy,
- 2 please reach out and be involved in that and participate
- 3 in that because it's a robust process. Yes.
- 4 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Just quickly, there are a
- 5 couple of administrative messages that I think the
- 6 community would be interested in. The first is that, and
- 7 you may have read about it in the paper, the Supreme
- 8 Court has said that the smell of marijuana, when you roll
- 9 down your window for a police stop, is not cause to check
- 10 the car or anything like that. I can read the whole
- 11 thing, but perhaps you want to explain it, Chief?
- DC PARISH: Yeah, absolutely. Yes. The Michigan
- 13 Supreme Court recently affirmed a court of appeals
- 14 decision that stated that the smell of marijuana alone
- 15 will not constitute probable cause to believe that a
- 16 crime is occurring which would otherwise give the officer
- 17 the authority to conduct a warrantless search of the
- 18 vehicle. The Supreme Court noted that at the time, the
- 19 prior case law was decided, it was a case called People v
- 20 Casperceck. Marijuana was illegal. All forms of
- 21 marijuana, all possession of marijuana was illegal. So,
- 22 the former law made sense that if you smelled marijuana,
- 23 illegal activity was taking place, or at least had taken
- 24 place. But since that time that decision has been
- 25 implicitly repealed or nullified by the fact that the



- 1 voters in Michigan have voted to legalize marijuana; well
- 2 legalize it in most cases.
- 3 So, because marijuana is now legal in most cases,
- 4 the court determined that it didn't seem reasonable to
- 5 say that the officers had probable cause, merely because
- 6 they smelled marijuana. The smell of marijuana could
- 7 indicate legal activity just as likely as it indicated
- 8 illegal activity. So, based on that the Supreme Court
- 9 said it cannot constitute probable cause in and of
- 10 itself. Now, it's not to say that the smell of marijuana
- 11 cannot be relevant to an investigation. If we stop a car
- 12 that's filled full of juveniles, for example, well,
- 13 juveniles are not supposed to possess or use marijuana.
- 14 That could be a different sort of situation. But as a
- 15 general matter, the adult use of marijuana has been
- 16 decriminalized. So, the smell of it does not indicate
- 17 criminal activity. And so, that cannot be used as a basis
- 18 to search vehicles.
- 19 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you. The other thing the
- 20 community might want to note is that the fireworks are
- 21 going to be June 23rd, 2025, Monday. It's always on a
- 22 Monday. But if it's a rainy day, it'll be the following
- 23 day, June 24th. And there are some rules regarding that
- 24 level of that type of participation. But most of us are
- 25 already aware of them. And then finally --- there was



- 1 something else I wanted to call to your attention. Oh,
- 2 the school threat policy has changed. Oh, you want to
- 3 explain that? It references Anthony O'Rourke and Carrie
- 4 Sloan, the deputy chiefs. But you want to explain how
- 5 they're going to be handling them now?
- 6 DC PARISH: Yeah, I'd feel more ---
- 7 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: There would be two card ---
- 8 DC PARISH: I'd feel more comfortable if either
- 9 Deputy Chief Sloan or Commander O'Rourke would speak to
- 10 it. I don't believe either of them are here.
- 11 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Okay. Well, it has changed and
- 12 it includes cybercrimes as well. I can make a copy. I can
- 13 have this available at the next board meeting, next week,
- 14 downtown, or I'll put it on the website. That's what I'll
- 15 do.
- 16 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay.
- DC PARISH: Mr. Chairman, could I append something to
- 18 the Chief's report? A couple of weeks ago the board might
- 19 remember that the supervisor in charge of civil rights
- 20 gave a report regarding body-worn camera compliance
- 21 committed to the board that we would sit down with the
- 22 chief investigator, try to reconcile our numbers. And we
- 23 did that. I think the point of confusion was all that Dr.
- 24 Martin was referring to when he was speaking of
- 25 compliance, was overall compliance with activating the



- 1 body worn camera. That wasn't to say that all of the
- 2 conduct on body-worn cameras was compliant. That is just
- 3 to say that the officers complied with policy 99% of the
- 4 time, or I believe that was the figure he gave. That is
- 5 to say that they turned it on. So, that was where our
- 6 data in Chief Investigator's data appeared to be
- 7 conflicted. I promise to get back to the board and see
- 8 the opportunity to do it now. So, I'm doing it now.
- 9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you very kindly. So, we
- 10 have a promotion here. You want to speak on it before we
- 11 go there?
- DC PARISH: I don't have the name.
- 13 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: You don't have it?
- DC PARISH: Mr. Chairman, I apologize.
- 15 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: So, it's Police Officer Tatiana.
- 16 Is that Tatiana? Walton. and is there a motion to accept
- 17 the recommendation of Chief Bettison to promote to the
- 18 rank of detective, Police Officer Tatiana Walton?
- 19 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Support.
- 20 COMMISSIONER BELL: Bell.
- 21 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Supported by Commissioner Moore,
- 22 and anyone? Second Bail
- 23 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Bell made the motion.
- 24 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Second by Commissioner
- 25 Bell. Any discussion?



- 1 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Yes, Mr. Chairman.
- 2 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yep.
- 3 COMMISSIONER MOORE: I did have a concern initially
- 4 about the candidate because it wasn't done with the
- 5 grouping. I did contact the chief's office and they said
- 6 that it wasn't budgeted and that it won't be over
- 7 budgeted. So, I am in approval of this.
- 8 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah. Absolutely. And it was
- 9 because one didn't go before and it was like a swap. And
- 10 also, I wasn't going to force this on the agenda for last
- 11 week until all commissioners had the opportunity to go
- 12 through it and be able to scrutinize the candidate. And
- 13 we haven't done that. We received a motion from
- 14 Commissioner Moore and second by Commissioner Bell. Any
- 15 further discussion?
- 16 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Just quickly. I had some
- 17 concerns. Well, I have a note for the chief that I want
- 18 you to give him, if you don't mind about the candidate.
- 19 But I noted that she had straight A's in all of her
- 20 tests, I mean, all of the training. She's a very
- 21 obviously smart person, but please give him this for me
- 22 anyway.
- DC PARISH: Will do.
- 24 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Yeah. Thank you. And you have
- 25 my vote.



- 1 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. All in favor, say aye.
- 2 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
- 3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Anyone oppose? The motion is
- 4 carried. Let's get to the 8th Precinct report. How are
- 5 you doing, commander?
- 6 CMDR. LEVER: I'm doing very well. How are you doing
- 7 today?
- 8 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Alright, great. Thank you for all
- 9 that you do.
- 10 CMDR. LEVERS: Thank you for recognizing it's not all
- 11 me, but I'll talk about that now. So, thank you for
- 12 having me. I am Commander Dietrich Lever. I want to
- 13 introduce my team to you. It's very important to us. I
- 14 have more than a few people out here in the audience that
- 15 came to show their support. So, I have with me my newly
- 16 promoted captain, Captain Bray. I can see in the back, I
- 17 have Lieutenant Ransom Williams. He's in charge of my
- 18 Special Operations. I can see Sergeant Krystal John,
- 19 she's in charge of my neighborhood police officers. I can
- 20 see two detectives, Detective Dietrich Mott, and I see
- 21 Detective Vanessa Burke, who works in the PDU. I see
- 22 Police Officer Deshaun Perry, who works in our PDU. I see
- 23 NPO Officer Wesley, I see NPO, officer Children, and
- 24 anybody else there hiding, but I can see some more of
- 25 Detroit police officers.



- 1 So thank you guys for coming out. So, I want to say
- 2 it's my honor and privilege to be here today. And I want
- 3 to start by saying a couple more thank yous. Thank you to
- 4 the community. I think this is an amazing community. I've
- 5 been in this job for 31 years, and I haven't seen anyone
- 6 better. I love working in the 8th Precinct. Thank you to
- 7 the 160 officers that we have assigned to the 8th
- 8 Precinct. They do an amazing job day in and day out to
- 9 keep this community safe. And thank you, most of all,
- 10 excuse me, to the chief of police and the executive staff
- 11 who had the confidence in me to let me lead the 8th
- 12 Precinct. So, today, I'm going to tell you a little bit
- 13 about the crime, some of our enforcement efforts and some
- 14 community engagement efforts that we have.
- 15 And take any questions that you may have for me
- 16 about the 8th Precinct. So, our philosophy, I'll say this
- 17 one time, and I think you said it best Commissioner
- 18 Woods, is service and protection. So, at the 8th
- 19 Precinct, my philosophy is service, service, service,
- 20 protection, community partnership, to keep this community
- 21 safe. With that, I'll tell you about the numbers that we
- 22 have that I'm proud of these officers that they're doing.
- 23 Right now, we are even in homicides and on non-fatal
- 24 shootings, I'm showing a 33.3% reduction; in our sexual
- 25 assault complaints, I'm showing a 71.4% reduction; in our



- 1 robberies, I'm showing a 16.7% reduction; in our
- 2 carjackings. I'm showing a 20% reduction; in our
- 3 aggravated assault, I'm showing an 8.8% reduction; in our
- 4 motor vehicle theft, I'm showing a 36.8% reduction; in
- 5 our burglary, we're showing a 21.1% reduction, and in our
- 6 larceny. These are all our part one crimes. We're showing
- 7 a 31.6% reduction in the 8th Precinct. So, thank you to
- 8 those officers again. They make it happen. So ---
- 9 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: 31% reduction is significant.
- 10 CMDR. LEVERS: I believe we're very engaged with our
- 11 community. And I never come before them without telling
- 12 them that if it's important to you, it's important to me.
- 13 And why I may not solve all problems, it will never be
- 14 from lack of effort. And I say that because, and I'm very
- 15 transparent with them. We have identified some trends
- 16 that I'm going to talk about, and I'll talk about the
- 17 strategies that we use at the 8th Precinct to deal with
- 18 them. So, my first trend that I saw at the 8th Precinct
- 19 is all our crime is trending down, right? All of the part
- 20 one crimes are trending down in the 8th Precinct, and
- 21 overall, we're down 20%. I can tell you in the last 60
- 22 days we had 18 non-fatal shootings. These are year-to-
- 23 date numbers, by the way, excuse me, for that.
- Those were year-to-date numbers from January 1st up
- 25 until May 5th, the day they were pulled. We showed that



- 1 we had 18 non-fatal shootings, which is still a
- 2 reduction. However, 8th of those, or 45% of those,
- 3 happened on the 7-Mile corridor between Greenfield and
- 4 Southfield. Since we know that we did something about it.
- 5 And I'll tell you about the strategy a little bit later.
- 6 Also, what we notice trending in the 8th Precinct is, the
- 7 car thieves are favoring the Jeep Grand Cherokee. The
- 8 Jeep Grand Cherokee is a target. The other Chrysler
- 9 products and the Dodge Rams are targeted. And also, the
- 10 vehicles that are parked on the street. And I'll tell you
- 11 a little bit about our strategies for that as well. So,
- 12 talking about strategies, for the 7-Mile corridor, what
- 13 we did is we used old fashioned policing with data and
- 14 new policing.
- So, we use high visibility targeted enforcement. So,
- 16 you will see my traffic enforcement up there, enforcing
- 17 traffic, educating the public. You'll see my special
- 18 operations up there. You'll see on that 7-Mile corridor,
- 19 you'll see my ceasefire team up there. The ShotSpotter
- 20 team will be there. Also, our NPO team is up there doing
- 21 some enforcement and education as well. And we also use
- 22 special attention from the police officers. So, that
- 23 means when they're not on the run, my expectation of them
- 24 is to be on 7-Mile, paying special attention, tapping
- 25 down that crime. So, as a result of that, in the last



- 1 month, we have had no more non-fatal shootings in that
- 2 corridor. So, again, we don't have it all figured out. We
- 3 have work to do, but we are addressing crime, especially
- 4 when we know it. And for the crime reduction for the
- 5 vehicles, I leaned on the community.
- The community are my eyes and my ears, and they
- 7 trust me. I thank them for trusting me. They bring me
- 8 their problems, they bring me their information, and they
- 9 trust me to work on them. So, what we did for that one,
- 10 right now, we literally just partnered with the
- 11 community. If you have a I started with the Jeep, Grand
- 12 Cherokee, excuse me for that. If you have a Jeep Grand
- 13 Cherokee, and if it's safe for you, please pull it in the
- 14 garage, pull it up in the driveway, put something behind
- 15 it, take it off the street. And right now that's coming
- 16 through community meetings. But I was talking to the
- 17 chief today, we're going to put it out on a social media
- 18 platform too; how to harden your vehicles to make it more
- 19 difficult or uninviting for car thieves.
- We also use data driven responses. We run restore
- 21 operations twice a week with our special operations where
- 22 they're addressing and suppressing violent crime in the
- 23 8th Precinct. We have the Michigan Department of
- 24 Corrections partnered with us. They are in our Precinct
- 25 twice a week, they're doing home checks on returning



- 1 citizens to make sure that they're where they're supposed
- 2 to be, and abiding by the rules and regulations and
- 3 standards set for them. And also, every Tuesday, I have
- 4 our federal, state and local partnerships in the 8th
- 5 Precinct talking about how to reduce violent crime. And
- 6 it's very successful. And again, the community, I have
- 7 very transparent community meetings. If I have a problem,
- 8 I'll bring it to them first, and we will try to solve it
- 9 together. So, some of the tools that we use, and I'll be
- 10 quick.
- 11 Some of the tools that we use are ShotSpotter. We
- 12 talked about ShotSpotter. I just want to give some
- 13 numbers from ShotSpotter. ShotSpotter for the community,
- 14 it's when shots go off in an area that's protected by
- 15 ShotSpotter. It literally gives us a compass or area or
- 16 where it is so we can respond fast. And what we do with
- 17 that is we use that data and that information to help
- 18 curtail illegal gun activity. And I want to give you some
- 19 numbers. And this is from last year, year-to-date. So,
- 20 last year we had gunfire incidents. In the 8th Precinct,
- 21 there were 874. This time of year, we're down to this
- 22 year, it's 478. That's a difference of 365, a 43%
- 23 reduction in gunfire incidents in the 8th Precinct alone.
- Also, rounds fired. The ShotSpotter has the
- 25 capability of counting rounds. So, in the 8th Precinct,



- 1 last year, there were 3,286 rounds fired at the 8th
- 2 Precinct. This year it's 1,773, a difference of 1,513
- 3 rounds, which is a 46% reduction. We are using that to
- 4 change decisions to make people make better decisions
- 5 about using firearms in the City of Detroit, specifically
- 6 in the 8th Precinct. And we thank you for that
- 7 technology. We are also using our camera assets to help
- 8 us with crime. We have our license plate readers. They
- 9 help us out. We have body-worn cameras and our in-car
- 10 cameras to help us out as well. And we also partner with
- 11 our Project Greenlight Partners. Community Engagement, my
- 12 favorite part. This is my favorite part of policing,
- 13 community engagement, I would tell you that.
- So, for community engagement, I want to tell people
- 15 a lot of those aggravated assaults that I talked about
- 16 earlier involve domestic violence, which is unfortunate.
- 17 And hopefully today, nobody here is impacted by domestic
- 18 violence. And even if you are, if you're not, I want to
- 19 share something. We have a senior social worker, Ms.
- 20 Megan Davis. I talk about her all the time. She can do
- 21 some amazing things. She's right in the 8th Precinct and
- 22 available and ready for you. I will share a number for
- 23 you. If you're ready to copy, please. If you're not
- 24 impacted, if you know somebody who's impacted, please
- 25 give him or her Ms. Megan Davis's number so she can help



- 1 curtail this domestic violence. Again, her name is Megan
- 2 Davis. She works right at the 8th Precinct. Her phone
- 3 number is (313) 596-5825. Again, (313) 596-5825. And her
- 4 cell phone number is (313) 833-1660.
- 5 That's Ms. Megan Davis. She has some amazing tools,
- 6 it's her ability. We also have the Brotherhood program.
- 7 You heard me talk about the Ceasefire program for my
- 8 targeted enforcement on 7-Mile, but they will pivot. They
- 9 also have a program where they pick up at-risk or high
- 10 risk youth, and they spend time with them. They mentor
- 11 them right in this building, as a matter of fact. They
- 12 come to the Coral Center, they teach them how to box.
- 13 They teach them how to play basketball. They have
- 14 partnerships where they teach them how to be better
- 15 citizens, how to invest. They teach them about education.
- 16 It's all about giving them an opportunity or a chance to
- 17 succeed. That's a very good program. I have some NPO led
- 18 programs where they do a lot of things with our citizens,
- 19 and they do a lot of things with our youth.
- Like, for instance, our trunk or treat is the best
- 21 in the city. I'm going to tell you that. And also, last,
- 22 but certainly not least, our command staff, me and
- 23 Captain Bray, we stay uniquely available. We stay
- 24 inaccessible. I always try to come to each and every ---
- 25 and I remember when I first came here, and I'm going to



- 1 get off my soapbox, my NPOs, they said, you cannot make
- 2 every community event. And they're right. At first, I
- 3 didn't believe them, but I can tell you, I'm probably
- 4 batting about 85%. So, I am very uniquely acceptable. I
- 5 don't care if it's two citizens there to 25, I am there,
- 6 or my Captain Bray is there as well. So, last but not
- 7 certainly not least, we have our CVI group. And I'll take
- 8 this right off the internet because I don't want to
- 9 misquote, but our CVI stands for our Community Violence
- 10 Intervention Program.
- 11 We have two of them in the 8th Precinct. The CVI
- 12 uses evidence-based community-driven strategies to
- 13 prevent and interrupt violence established by
- 14 relationships with people who are involved in, or
- 15 affected by violence crime in the community. And we have
- 16 a unique relationship and a partnership. And we also have
- 17 a common goal of reducing violent crime in the 8th
- 18 Precinct. It works very well. I'll give you just three
- 19 quick snippets of what they do. I can tell you we have
- 20 the people's action. They're in the northern part of our
- 21 precinct. I am very proud of them. We work very, very
- 22 well together. Vu, Negus Vu, he has literally town hall
- 23 meetings where we sit down very much like this. It's like
- 24 a community meeting. And he gives informational sessions
- 25 as well. I can tell you the last one that I went to, I



- 1 did not go in uniform.
- I go as a citizen. So, I can hear from a different
- 3 perspective. So, I can see how we can help reduce
- 4 violence in the community from a different perspective.
- 5 But I go in plain clothes. And the last one I went to at
- 6 the town hall meeting, it was actually at a children's
- 7 daycare. He had one of the members of the Black Panthers
- 8 who was there telling how the Detroit Police now
- 9 partnered with them versus how it was back when he came
- 10 up. So, it was very powerful. It was enlightening for me
- 11 as well. They have an adoption block and he told me he's
- 12 going to have an anti-violence basketball tournament, and
- 13 I'm going to try to get the police in there too, so we
- 14 can win. With that, we also have Detroit 300.
- They're actually out on patrol and they let you know
- 16 who they are. They have their signs on the board. They
- 17 have some covert operations, but they are uniquely aware
- 18 there. They have community education events as well, like
- 19 domestic violence prevention and everything. And he had
- 20 immediate impact programs. Like, for example, last night
- 21 he called me on my phone. It's Mr. Eric Ford, he's in
- 22 charge of Detroit 300. He was going to partner with the
- 23 Detroit Police Department to go find the missing. He
- 24 said, Hey, I want to help. This is what's going on. So, I
- 25 gave him the information he needed. I put him in touch



- 1 with the Missing Person Unit. I'm closing out. I can tell
- 2 you that we also address quality of life issues. I'm
- 3 going to go take a phrase from my chief of police.
- 4 He said, he's a person. So, we're doing the violent
- 5 crimes and we're addressing quality of life issues. And
- 6 we do that through SeeClickFix. My neighborhood police
- 7 officers, they work extremely hard to keep our
- 8 SeeClickFix, attended to, and we appreciate them for
- 9 that. And last and all, and I keep saying this last but
- 10 not least, but I actually promise this time, right?
- 11 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Make this the last, but not
- 12 least.
- 13 CMDR. LEVERS: This will be the last but not least.
- 14 We have access to the James Tate Community Access Center
- 15 for community, excuse me, for community events. Right
- 16 now, College Park is holding their community meetings
- 17 there. So, it's available. Give us a call. We'd love to
- 18 have you come over. The number to call my admin, and
- 19 she'll get you in at (313) 596 5810 (313) 596 5810. And
- 20 with that, I'll take any questions that you may have for
- 21 me or the 8th Precinct.
- 22 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you very kindly.
- 23 Commissioner Moore.
- 24 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. It's
- 25 always good seeing you, Commander in the 8th Precinct



- 1 family, civilian and police. My question deals with the
- 2 30 series. Can you explain to the community what the 30
- 3 series is at the 8th Precinct?
- 4 CMDR. LEVERS: Sure. Well, 30 series is what I did
- 5 when I was in the 8th Precinct about 20 years ago. But
- 6 what we have now is special operations. So, our special
- 7 operations officers, I mentioned Lieutenant Ransom
- 8 Williams in the back. Those are our officers that you
- 9 see. They have on the black shirts and the green pants.
- 10 And they are responsible for policing on violent
- 11 offenders in the 8th Precinct. They lead our restore
- 12 orders twice a week, and we really rely on them to impact
- 13 violent crimes, to make people make different decisions.
- 14 And then doing an awesome job year-to-date, we have
- 15 confiscated over 210 guns.
- 16 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Okay. Have you received any type
- 17 of complaints against the 30 series?
- 18 CMDR. LEVERS: I have received complaints against my
- 19 special operations, yes, I have.
- 20 COMMISSIONER MOORE: I mean, generally speaking. Can
- 21 you say what they are? Because I was going to mention
- 22 something. You want me to just mention it or ---?
- 23 CMDR. LEVERS: Sure. That would be easier.
- 24 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Anything for you, Commander.
- 25 Okay. So, citizens at gas stations, specifically young



- 1 black males, are at gas stations, and it appears that
- 2 they're being targeted without any probable cause.
- 3 They're being run up by 30 series and not just the 8th
- 4 Precinct. I've just heard it a lot at the 8th Precinct.
- 5 And that without a cause, they're just patting them down.
- 6 Where's the gun? Where's the gun at? Or if they're
- 7 pulling them over on a traffic stop, they're using
- 8 articulate words like, I saw heavy breathing as if I was
- 9 scared of the police and to obtain a gun, which
- 10 eventually comes out of the situation. Have you heard
- 11 about anything like that?
- 12 CMDR. LEVERS: So, yes, but no. I'll say that was
- 13 very, very general. And sometimes they do. But I can tell
- 14 you, the one I saw; I was watching a body-worn camera. I
- 15 did get a complaint, as a matter of fact. A person I
- 16 won't name today, but he was very hot. He called a lot of
- 17 people. And I actually had to sit down with him. So, in
- 18 this instance, the guy was walking down the street and on
- 19 body-worn camera, I was actually able to see the weapon.
- 20 It was hanging out of his pocket. And they asked the guy
- 21 if he had a CPL. And those would be my expectations.
- 22 That's how you keep guns off ---
- 23 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: That's the situation I brought to
- 24 you?
- 25 CMDR. LEVERS: That is the situation you brought to



- 1 me. So, we talked about it, and we had a very candid
- 2 conversation and I can tell you this and we preach this,
- 3 everything that you're looking for, that I expect there
- 4 on body-worn camera. So, if they are abiding by the rules
- 5 and regulations of their department, they're activating
- 6 their camera. Sometimes they're not happy. If they're
- 7 doing what's right, we're going to uplift it. If they're
- 8 doing what's wrong, I'm going to hold them accountable to
- 9 the standards of the Detroit Police Department.
- 10 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you, Commander.
- 11 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah. What my struggle is, is
- 12 that if a person is open carrying versus CPL holder, you
- 13 know, because of the laws, and we went through that;
- 14 that's what I struggled with when we had to get through
- 15 it. Residents need to understand what open carrying is.
- 16 And I think it should be more of a campaign out there.
- 17 Maybe we could work together with the department to come
- 18 up with a strong public service campaign to educate the
- 19 public on what open carry was not open carry. Because if
- 20 you have the butts showing, you think you're open and
- 21 carrying. That isn't open and carrying. And then when
- 22 you're transporting the weapon, the bullets have to be
- 23 out. You know, one has to be in the glove box, one has to
- 24 be in the trunk; all that type of stuff.
- 25 And a lot of innocent citizens; citizens who are



- 1 being criminalized, you know, thank God that 36th
- 2 district court is creating programs to be able to help
- 3 some of them. But a lot of folks are getting caught in
- 4 the fray. And so, I would like to see us work hard. You
- 5 know, maybe that could be a signature piece for you
- 6 Commissioner Moore, so that we can educate the public
- 7 more and more about that, because that's vitally
- 8 important. And then, CPL is CPL, but the open carry law
- 9 gets a lot of folks every year not only just in the City
- 10 of Detroit, but throughout the State of Michigan.
- 11 COMMISSIONER MOORE: And Mr. Chairman, I don't want
- 12 to misconstrue what you're saying and what the
- 13 Commander's saying for officers sitting at a gas station
- 14 stationary and just seeing somebody walk up and pat them
- 15 down. So, it's two different things. I agree with what
- 16 both of you're saying, but I'm talking about this third
- 17 category ---
- 18 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Don't looking for some trouble,
- 19 is what you're saying.
- 20 COMMISSIONER MOORE: That part.
- 21 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah. You know we're not
- 22 intentionally trying to just find someone a criminal. You
- 23 know, you have to deal with crime, but in the same token,
- 24 if you are targeting folks at gas stations, that's a
- 25 robust conversation to have. Yes.



- 1 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Chief, I have a couple of
- 2 comments, but the first is, can you define for our
- 3 audience here today, or Commander Parish, either one of
- 4 you exactly what open carry is in Michigan, I know that
- 5 you can carry a rifle on your back, on a motorcycle. You
- 6 can't have a T-shirt hanging over your gun and your belt.
- 7 If you have on a wifebeater type shirt and it's tucked
- 8 in, then your gun can show that it's open carry or an
- 9 assault weapon. You can carry guns. But can you explain
- 10 it for our audience so they'll get it from the police?
- 11 DC PARISH: I can speak to it at a very high level.
- 12 Open carry is just as it sounds, you are carrying your
- 13 gun out in the open with no effort to conceal it. Now, at
- 14 what point does a little bit of coverage become enough to
- 15 trigger the CCW laws? That's a very case by case fact,
- 16 specific analysis that we refer to the prosecutors. So,
- 17 it's very hard to give direction. But if you are going to
- 18 open carry, make sure your gun is fully exposed. Okay.
- 19 Not partially hidden, not partially concealed. Make sure
- 20 it is fully exposed, because that is the only way that I
- 21 can tell you that you will avoid a CCW charge with
- 22 certainty. But the Chairman also made something very
- 23 clear. Understand that if you happen to get into a
- 24 vehicle, that open carry will now become a CCW motor
- 25 vehicle.



- 1 So if you have plans on getting into a vehicle from
- 2 an open carry situation, then stepping into a vehicle,
- 3 you've got to take the firearm out. You have to unload
- 4 it, you have to secure the ammunition in the glove box,
- 5 preferably; secure the gun so that it is far as far,
- 6 excuse me, as far away from the ammunition as possible.
- 7 Preferably the trunk. But if you don't have a trunk in
- 8 your vehicle, as far away from the gun as possible, so on
- 9 the very back depending on how your gun is set up, how
- 10 your car is set up. Excuse me. So, that is the best
- 11 description that I can afford at this time.
- 12 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: But what happens when people
- 13 are getting on the bus? A man talked to me about it. He
- 14 had a T-shirt, you know, just a plain, regular T-shirt.
- 15 And he had his gun in his belt, and the T-shirt as he was
- 16 getting on the bus, getting his money and putting in the
- 17 thing, you could see, I mean, the gun was there.
- DC PARISH: Again, you can see an outline of a gun
- 19 and it still might trigger the CCW laws. Again, it's very
- 20 case by case, fact specific. The best advice that I can
- 21 give citizens, because I don't want to see anybody
- 22 inadvertently, you know, needlessly charged with a felony
- 23 crime in Michigan. If you are carrying a weapon, make
- 24 sure it is fully exposed and stay out of vehicles unless
- 25 you plan on transporting it in a way that is consistent



- 1 with Michigan law. So, I would even advise people don't
- 2 take the chance of even getting on a bus because you're
- 3 technically entering a vehicle and there's no bus
- 4 exception that I'm aware of to the CCW laws. So, best
- 5 advice I can give, make sure it's fully exposed and stay
- 6 out of vehicles unless you're going to transport it in
- 7 accordance with Michigan law.
- 8 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Holsters help you, I mean,
- 9 whatever those things are. Pistol carrier for your ---
- 10 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Again, I strongly suggest that
- 11 some type of public service announcement be flooded out
- 12 there, because again, I know a number of folks who have
- 13 gotten caught up in that. I've gotten numerous calls on
- 14 this particular issue. And we need to protect citizens
- 15 from this, especially well-intended citizens from this.
- 16 But thank you very kindly and I appreciate your report
- 17 and appreciate all the work that you do.
- 18 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: To the commander. I just want
- 19 to thank you for acknowledging your staff before you
- 20 started your presentation. That's unusual, and it shows
- 21 what a good manager and what a good leader you are.
- 22 CMDR. LEVERS: Thank you.
- COMMISSIONER BERNARD: And also, congratulations,
- 24 obviously on your crime stats, which are very, very
- 25 significant at a 30% reduction.



- 1 CMDR, LEVERS: Thank you, ma'am. And through the
- 2 Chair. I'm sorry. I did miss NPO Cox and NPO Reid.
- 3 They're hiding in the back.
- 4 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: That's right. Good. All right.
- 5 Thank you guys for your service. Yes.
- 6 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I have a question for the
- 7 commander.
- 8 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes.
- 9 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Thank you. Commander, great
- 10 presentation by the way. I want to ask you about, you
- 11 know, the month of May is mental health awareness month.
- 12 What actions are you all taking in the 8th Precinct on
- 13 addressing mental health with numbers to report out on;
- 14 how to educate the community more effectively, how they
- 15 can get involved, but also do you all have any --- I
- 16 mean, I'm pretty sure the precinct level has social
- 17 workers, but are those social workers going out on some
- 18 of those mental health runs? It was something that
- 19 Commissioner Carter, and myself addressed years ago. I
- 20 want to say, go back to 2014, when we learned that Kansas
- 21 City had a pilot program where they had social workers
- 22 going on mental health runs and something, it was
- 23 something that we were trying to advocate to come to
- 24 Detroit. But I'd just like to know what your precinct is
- 25 doing? And how many calls per service are you all



- 1 receiving in mental health? And has there been any change
- 2 in those numbers from last year to this year? I know you
- 3 probably can't answer all of those questions today, but I
- 4 just wanted to hear from you about that since this is
- 5 Mental Health Awareness month.
- 6 CMDR. LEVERS: Yes, sir. So, through the Chair, this
- 7 was actually part of my presentation. But in the essence
- 8 of time, because I kept telling you, this is the final
- 9 one, I kind of left it out. However, we do have the
- 10 crisis intervention team. We have a dedicated car, which
- 11 actually my son works in one of them for the precinct at
- 12 all times. So, we are first responders, we do respond to
- 13 the runs. However, we have a mental crisis intervention
- 14 team car available. They will respond to us. I don't have
- 15 the exact numbers, but we are partnered and we are very
- 16 aware of our mental health crisis issues. So, I can get
- 17 the exact numbers for you to compare them with you. But I
- 18 don't have that today. But they are a part of our
- 19 partnership and our community engagement, because they're
- 20 very important.
- 21 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Sure. I just want to make a
- 22 quick correction. That's what Commissioner Carter, myself
- 23 and Commissioner Bell learned in 2014 when we were at a
- 24 NACO meeting. And that was the year we were in Kansas
- 25 City. And we learned how Minneapolis has stepped up in



- 1 regards to that and how they were making some different
- 2 changes. We also learned over the years that other cities
- 3 have stepped up and in regards to you putting more help
- 4 out there to help the community become more aware and
- 5 things of that nature. Here in Michigan, we realized that
- 6 Engler closed a number of facilities and it really makes
- 7 it harder on the Detroit community and surrounding
- 8 communities.
- 9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: I think that was an excellent
- 10 point, Commissioner. And even on yesterday during the
- 11 walk a mile Wednesday, the former Chief White who is now
- 12 over in mental health and substance abuse for Wayne
- 13 County had mobile units out there for the community and
- 14 has invited everyone, all the communities who have a need
- 15 for these mobile units to come out. They will be housed
- 16 with mental health professionals, dental assistants and
- 17 have a nurse on these mobile units as well. And so, you
- 18 can go on the Detroit Wayne Integrated Health Network
- 19 website to be able to access that. And they said that
- 20 unit will pull up on you at any community event as well.
- 21 So, two of the mobile units were out yesterday. And I was
- 22 happy to see them out there.
- In fact, I was riding around with them a little bit.
- 24 I sit on their board as well. So, I definitely appreciate
- 25 that question, Commissioner. That was a great question,



- 1 and I reached out to CEO White and got the unit over
- 2 there. Free dental, free nurses and mental health
- 3 professionals on these units, brand new units. And they
- 4 will pull up on you Detroit Wayne Integrated Health
- 5 Network. And that's open to everybody in the community.
- 6 We have community groups that you need to access that.
- 7 Tap into that. Moving on.
- 8 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair.
- 9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir.
- 10 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Really quickly. Through the
- 11 Commander. When you get those numbers, can you please
- 12 email those to the Commissioner's office so we can all
- 13 take a look at those?
- 14 CMDR. LEVERS: Yes, sir.
- 15 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Thank you.
- 16 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you very kindly. Oral
- 17 communication.
- 18 MS. UNDERWOOD: Thank you, Mr. Chair. Our first
- 19 speaker will be Ms. Virginia Emmanuel, Ms. Williams.
- 20 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Hello. How are you doing? Are you
- 21 the community person over here? Is the community person
- 22 here for the 8th Precinct? Oh, I'm looking right at her.
- 23 When we finish oral communication, I apologize. I want
- 24 you to greet everyone. Thank you for allowing us here,
- 25 and we appreciate you. And I'm sorry I overlooked that it



- 1 wasn't on my agenda, but thank you so much.
- MS. EMMANUEL: Good evening. My name is Virginia
- 3 Emmanuel. I've developed spasms, so please bear with me.
- 4 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, ma'am.
- 5 MS. EMMANUEL: I've been a nurse for 30 years. I have
- 6 been teaching for 20 years. I have 5 degrees. I'm up in
- 7 age, but I got my last degree at 53, carried a 3.8
- 8 average. Now, I'm not saying this to brag. Why can't we
- 9 lead by example? Many of our children are not being
- 10 educated and they look at us. I have taught at 7 places.
- 11 I was there, Redford Community Center, the Village of
- 12 Redford, Mr. Bird came to my class, made the link to
- 13 Michael, the mayor, all Brittany Hills came. But I've
- 14 noticed here they don't want to come. I'm trying to slow
- 15 the progression of Alzheimer's. Alzheimer's kills,
- 16 there's no cure. And it's devastating. What I do is
- 17 refresh math, spelling, reading, writing, art, a lot of
- 18 black history, teach piano, even give away a keyboard.
- 19 Why don't they come, I am at the Northwest Activity
- 20 Center. I've been moved from my classroom 5 times. That
- 21 causes my students to leave. They will come to the front
- 22 desk and ask where I am, and they say they don't know.
- 23 So, they leave. I need help in order to help others. I'm
- 24 on a mission, to love thy neighbor as thyself.
- 25 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Amen.



- 1 MS. EMMANUEL: Right?
- 2 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, ma'am.
- 3 MS. EMMANUEL: Help me. Don't just sit. Most of you
- 4 don't know your math, don't know how to spell, don't know
- 5 how to write a letter, but you won't come. You won't
- 6 come. You'll come and eat, eat, eat, but nothing up here.
- 7 That is destroying us.
- 8 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Amen.
- 9 MS. EMMANUEL: But lack of knowledge, and we are not
- 10 dumb. We have a rich history. We have such a rich
- 11 history. Let's keep it going. Help the seniors, help the
- 12 young people. Please come. Northwest Activity Center
- 13 every Tuesday, 1 o'clock until 3 PM. Room 1. My father
- 14 gave me strength and encouragement. He came up from down
- 15 south, got into Fords, sold cars, and became the Public
- 16 Safety commissioner for many years. My mother went back
- 17 to school after 4 children, became a nurse. That's where
- 18 I got my encouragement. And I'm not giving it up for
- 19 anybody. I may only have so many years left, but I'm on a
- 20 mission. Help me; come to the Northwest Activity Center.
- 21 1 o'clock, room 1 or the Village of Redford every Friday.
- 22 Northwest is every Tuesday. Thank you.
- 23 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you, thank you. She did
- 24 share some of the community reports. So, that's all that
- 25 was. Yeah. Well, no, we will finish with public comments



- 1 and then we'll come to you.
- MS. WILLIAMS: Hello everyone. 424925. When
- 3 promotions were given out, somehow two names were
- 4 withheld. And normally that's not the case. And I wanted
- 5 to know why, because I've been coming to these meetings
- 6 for over two years. And when you give out promotions,
- 7 their names are to be mentioned. It's like you guys
- 8 intentionally did not mention these two officers. But
- 9 like I said, accountability and transparency. And I'm so
- 10 happy that you mentioned mental illness. Everyone in this
- 11 room has a badge or took an oath or any type of
- 12 association dealing with Detroit police officers. And
- 13 this is for, since the commander is here from the 8th
- 14 Precinct. And the question is for you commander, how do
- 15 you feel about officers that work at your precinct that
- 16 live in the shelters and taking up bed spaces, come to
- 17 work and conceal that they stay in shelters on the buses.
- 18 And like I said, I'm not following no one. I catch the
- 19 bus, not by choice. I haven't been on the bus in 30
- 20 years, but I get around because I have to. And I'm
- 21 speaking about the people and the injustice and
- 22 inhumanity that's going on. And how it's always an excuse
- 23 about officers living in these facilities, taking up bed
- 24 spaces. And they're all over the city, all 12 Precincts.
- 25 And everybody always has some type of excuse like it's



- 1 not going on. These shelters are for the homeless. People
- 2 who do not have the means to pay rent. Not ones that get
- 3 paid \$3,000 to live in Detroit and start off at 55,000 a
- 4 year. Thank you very much. And you have a great day.
- 5 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you. Next speaker.
- 6 MS. UNDERWOOD: Our next speaker is Mauca, and then
- 7 Dr. Gordon.
- 8 MS. MYCU; Hi, my name is Lisa Maruca.
- 9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Hello.
- 10 MS. MARUCA: And I yield the rest of my time to Ms.
- 11 Gord.
- 12 MS. GORD: Hi.
- 13 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Hello.
- MS. GORD: I'm proud that this commander says what
- 15 he'd do, because the 7th Precinct commander, I've been
- 16 trying to get in touch with for a week and a half; have
- 17 not returned my call, but I'm going to play some of this.
- 18 RECORDING: Good, ma'am, I don't have anything on
- 19 [unclear]. Yeah, he did. Huh? You said what? Special
- 20 training? The conversation. She's like, oh, okay. He's
- 21 like, oh, in some of you all write you all report where
- 22 the prosecutor won't approve it. You know, that was me,
- 23 right? I said absolutely not over and pushed her
- 24 wheelbarrow, in the middle of the sidewalk talking about
- 25 damage to her property. And she's running, listen, you



- 1 didn't see it all. I said, I've seen every angle you sent
- 2 me. Hey, listen.
- 3 MS. GORD: going to say about what she's talking
- 4 about, I got videos and this is what they were talking
- 5 among themselves. How they dogged me out. Wanted to know
- 6 why hasn't anybody burned my home down? Why doesn't
- 7 anybody beat my ass.. These were Detective Clark and
- 8 Walker, and there were two other detectives. I don't know
- 9 the other one's name, but I know her voice. They talked
- 10 about why they haven't destroyed my home; that I have
- 11 been messing with people in the neighborhood. I'm the one
- 12 with the video footage. I'm the one that can show how
- 13 I've been harassed, not just by the neighbors, but by the
- 14 7th Precinct. I'm scared to go down there. How can I go
- 15 to the 7th Precinct when they are talking about me like
- 16 this? This is 8 minutes of them dogging me out. You know,
- 17 I called the mayor's office and I said, what should I do?
- 18 And the guy said, give the commander a chance. I
- 19 called the 7th Precinct, like I said, a week and a half
- 20 ago. And still today, I haven't received a call. I have
- 21 been harassed by the 7th Precinct. I told ya'll downtown
- 22 the 7th Precinct was harassing me. I told you letters
- 23 that they put on two of my homes, and then those letters
- 24 that I told you all about, they mailed me two more to say
- 25 the same thing to harass me. I got documentation to show



- 1 the people across the street wrote bogus police reports.
- 2 You know what? He thought it was a joke. Go tell the
- 3 prosecutor. I said, then what is your job? I have that on
- 4 recording too. What is his job? It's to make fun of me.
- 5 They said I was crazy. I'm not crazy. Everything they
- 6 said, which I can't play because it's so long that they
- 7 studied dog me out and everything they have, I have a
- 8 recorder to show you that they lied on me. Why? These
- 9 detectives, not just police officers, but the police
- 10 officer, he said they could look at the body cam. I told
- 11 you all, look at the police body cam. It'll show that
- 12 they set up and wrote those letters because I call it a
- 13 cult because the police, because the Block Club decided
- 14 they want me to leave my home, that they want to
- 15 intimidate me to move. And now the police, the detectives
- 16 feel the same way. This man said he came to my house. He
- 17 took pictures all around my house. He said she didn't
- 18 have a camera on the side to show that the thing broke my
- 19 window, my screen the other day. He is a detective. If he
- 20 had a look, I got a camera right there. That's how good a
- 21 detective he is. He didn't see that camera sitting.
- 22 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Thank you, ma'am. Well,
- 23 excuse me, excuse me. Let me answer that for you. Deputy
- 24 Chief, can you have this situation looked into and
- 25 investigated through Internal Affairs, if there is a



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- 1 threat? Because I'm hearing you said your house was
- 2 threatened? Was it threatened to be blown up by a police
- 3 officer?
- 4 MS. GORD: They said they should set my house on
- 5 fire. And they [crosstalk].
- 6 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Are you alleging that the
- 7 detective said that?
- 8 MS. GORD: It's not what you want to hear.
- 9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Well, that isn't what we are
- 10 doing right now. Are you alleging that that's what you're
- 11 saying?
- 12 MS. GORD: They said they wonder why nobody ---
- 13 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. So, if you're saying that,
- 14 excuse me, ma'am. Excuse me.
- MS. GORD: My phone.
- 16 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Excuse me.
- MS. GORD: You know what, because I'm doing the
- 18 right, I'm calling the police. They tear up my property.
- 19 I'm calling the police. I don't go over to their house
- 20 and tear up theirs. My property is the only one being
- 21 torn up. And I have video and the police are not doing
- 22 anything. They're attacking me with them because they
- 23 were with that block club.
- 24 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay.
- MS. GORD: I don't leave my home.



- 1 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: So, you can file a complaint with
- 2 the Office of the Chief Investigator but I [unclear].
- 3 Okay. Excuse me. Excuse me, ma'am.
- 4 MS. GORD: 45 days. This was last year.
- 5 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: So, you filed a complaint with
- 6 us, okay? Yes, ma'am. So, what you're alleging here ---
- 7 MS. GORD: [Unclear] for me. She's terrified. They
- 8 want me to stay out of my family home because she said
- 9 the police don't physically do something to you. And
- 10 there isn't anybody going to ---
- 11 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Deputy Chief, can we have that
- 12 looked into? And please get her name and follow up.
- 13 MS. GORD: [Unclear1] justice.
- 14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: No, whatever injustice, we want
- 15 you to have justice, if that's what you are looking for.
- DC PARISH: Ma'am, ma'am, listen, an officer is going
- 17 to take all of your information. You have our commitment.
- 18 We'll look into everything that you're saying.
- 19 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: And our investigator will get her
- 20 information and follow up with her complaint as well.
- 21 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you, Tiffany.
- 22 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yep.
- DC PARISH: Officer Nelson. Thank you.
- 24 OFFICER NELSON: Yes.
- 25 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. All right. Next speaker.



- 1 MS. UNDERWOOD: Thank you, Mr. Chair. Our next
- 2 speaker is Victoria Camille, Minister Eric Blount. Scotty
- 3 Boman and Mr. Smith. And then we'll go into Zoom.
- 4 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, ma'am.
- 5 MS. CAMILLE: Good evening, commissioners. Working.
- 6 Can you all hear through this?
- 7 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Louder.
- 8 MS. CAMILLE: This is not working well. I just want
- 9 you to know that.
- 10 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah, we can hear you.
- 11 MS. CAMILLE: Good evening commissioners. My name is
- 12 Victoria Camille, District 7. Before I get into what I
- 13 wanted to talk about today, I do want to thank
- 14 Commissioner Moore for lifting the targeting at the gas
- 15 stations because I have a personal example of that. My
- 16 own son was targeted at a police station, I'm sorry, at a
- 17 gas station and asked if he was accused of --- should I
- 18 pause my comment?
- 19 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: You'll have to restart. I hear
- 20 you.
- 21 Ms. CAMILLE: I appreciate it. So, he was approached
- 22 by a police officer and accused of having a gun on him.
- 23 My son has never carried a gun, except now that he's in
- 24 the military serving our country. And he didn't have
- 25 anything bulky on him that would even appear to be a gun.



- 1 And he called me very shaken up that he had been
- 2 approached by the police and they were like, yeah, you
- 3 have one. You know, you have a gun. So, I just want to
- 4 say that those things do really happen, for sure. So,
- 5 onto what I wanted to speak about. So, I did want to get
- 6 an update on the complaint that I filed number 79425.
- 7 That was a complaint of allegations of DPD, failing to
- 8 follow department procedure and policy, as well as
- 9 misconduct resulting in the killing of Sherman Lee
- 10 Butler.
- 11 And so, I would like an update on that outstanding
- 12 complaint. The other is, I'm not sure if the board is
- 13 aware of a program called 287G, which allows ICE to
- 14 delegate certain immigration enforcement duties to the
- 15 local police departments. We have 4 departments in
- 16 Michigan that have signed on to these programs so far.
- 17 Berrien County, Sheriff Department, Calhoun County
- 18 Sheriff Department, Jackson County Sheriff Department,
- 19 and Taylor Police Department recently signed on as well.
- 20 So, I would like to know if you are aware of DPD
- 21 considering signing on to 287G. And if at any point DPD
- 22 does pursue this program, the matter should be brought
- 23 here before the board and discussed in the public forum,
- 24 since it will result in changes in the policies that the
- 25 DPD follows and requires approval from the board in an



- 1 open meeting. Lastly, I should not involve our local
- 2 police department in immigration enforcement. Anyway, we
- 3 have complaints from citizens about concerns with traffic
- 4 such as running red lights and speeding. DPD recently
- 5 picked up providing security on the bus system, and there
- 6 have been complaints about delays in investigations and
- 7 not following up with citizens about their
- 8 investigations. Our police department has enough to do
- 9 and ICE can do what they need to do in regards to
- 10 immigration. They should not be involving our local
- 11 police department in those matters. Thank you.
- 12 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you very kindly. Next
- 13 speaker.
- 14 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I just want to congratulate
- 15 you on your son. He's a young naval officer, ladies and
- 16 gentlemen from Detroit, from Detroit Public high schools.
- 17 He graduated; he joined the Navy. He's in Carolina, isn't
- 18 he? Significant.
- 19 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: You don't want to speak about our
- 20 son publicly. You know, this --- and I'm sorry for that.
- 21 Yeah, go ahead.
- 22 MINISTER BLOUNT: Good afternoon board. I'm Minister
- 23 Eric Blount from Sacred Heart Catholic Church right here
- 24 in Detroit. What happened to Ms. Camille's son has been
- 25 created by this board. For those of you that don't know,



- 1 this board was created to address police officer
- 2 misconduct. But Chairman Woods, you sit there and let the
- 3 police department and the precinct talk about crime this,
- 4 crime that; crime this; crime that. The issue before you,
- 5 what you are charged to do, is to address police officer
- 6 misconduct. So, ask the chief officer about police
- 7 officer misconduct. How many have been suspended? For how
- 8 long did they serve their full term? Did they get their
- 9 back pay as 99% of them do? So, this policy stuff, they
- 10 don't care. They violated, they got suspended, they got
- 11 the money back, you know. So, what a big deal. And I say
- 12 this because, as you sit here today, you know that over
- 13 the last 5 years, citizen complaints about the police
- 14 department conduct have doubled in the last 5 years. But
- 15 yet you want to talk about crime and, and carjacking, but
- 16 yet you hijack the meeting and the purpose of this
- 17 meeting. And that should be as criminal as carjacking.
- The precinct talked about addressing high risk
- 19 youth. How about high-risk police officers? What
- 20 detection system do you have for detecting whether or not
- 21 a police officer is headed toward misconduct? But no, no
- 22 talk about that at all. One other point. The community
- 23 must know the police have a right to lie to you in a
- 24 police stop.
- 25 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Yes, that's true.



- 1 MINISTER BLOUNT: How sick is this system? They can't
- 2 lie when you go to court. So, you have to have a lawyer,
- 3 but they can lie and manipulate the situation when they
- 4 are stopping you for a police stop. Lastly, Commissioner
- 5 Bernard, I do not admire anything about you. I am only
- 6 horrified at your actions here on this board. Thank you.
- 7 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Your obsession. You should buy
- 8 me that perfume.
- 9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes sir. You may be heard.
- 10 MR. BOMAN: Yeah. Hi, I'm Scotty Boman the founder of
- 11 Detroit Residents Advancing Civilian Oversight and
- 12 elected member of the Community Advisory Council in
- 13 District 4. First of all, I want to thank Deputy Chief
- 14 Parish for helping to facilitate the meeting regarding
- 15 first Amendment handling, handling First Amendment
- 16 matters and policy. But one thing that did come up in
- 17 those discussions was the idea that some ideas that
- 18 would've been good ideas if they were practical, were not
- 19 written in. And the reasoning being that we did not have
- 20 sufficient staff necessarily to handle some of the
- 21 procedures that would be involved in some cases. And I
- 22 think I see a thing here regarding staffing. Apparently a
- 23 problem with staffing, not having enough police officers
- 24 to be more thorough in having a plan of action, for
- 25 instance, ahead of certain events like large protests.



- 1 But also having sufficient investigators in the
- 2 chief investigator office to handle complaints against
- 3 officers. And the more officers you have, I mean, sad to
- 4 say, but it's simply a fact that you are probably going
- 5 to end up with more complaints because there's more
- 6 people for the public to complain about. And you need to
- 7 be able to investigate those complaints or else it kind
- 8 of defeats the purpose of even having an OCI. So, both
- 9 levels need to be staffed better, as it sounds like to
- 10 me, we need more officers. We also need more OCI
- 11 investigators on duty there to investigate those cases of
- 12 complaints. Another thing I noticed is when I was walking
- 13 out of that meeting and everyone was pretty much gone,
- 14 this man's walking up to me in a parking lot and I'm
- 15 like, okay, what's going on?
- And I'm like can I help you? And he's like, well,
- 17 yeah, I need to be able to get some help. I'm homeless.
- 18 And according to the mayor and the chief, we are supposed
- 19 to be able to stop by any precinct to get help. And I'm
- 20 like, well, this is headquarters. But I don't know, maybe
- 21 someone's at the lobby, maybe not. He's like, nope, no
- 22 one's answering. And so, I guess one thought is, I mean,
- 23 I know the difference between a precinct office and the
- 24 headquarters, but it would seem, I think most people
- 25 would assume that if there's certain help available at



- 1 any precinct, I think most people would assume that if
- 2 you go to the headquarters, that same help would be
- 3 available. And I think something needs to be done to
- 4 address that, because it's an expectation. People have
- 5 been going through the news watching TV and hearing this
- 6 and hearing about it. Now it is a warm day, so it's not
- 7 going to freeze to death or anything. But hearing about
- 8 the fact that if people really need shelter, that somehow
- 9 they can get it by first stopping by a police precinct.
- 10 We need to have somebody present, at least answering the
- 11 door at the headquarters if you're going to make that
- 12 kind of trip. Okay. That's it. Thank you.
- 13 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you very kindly.
- MR. SMITH: Good afternoon.
- 15 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Good afternoon.
- MR. SMITH: I just want to say, I walk it like I talk
- 17 it when it comes to community organizer, when it comes to
- 18 accountability work. I'll be working on finding missing
- 19 young people and adults with the department by will or by
- 20 not. I'm going to go to the chief. I have a meeting
- 21 coming on Monday. So, anybody who would like to help can
- 22 assist. If not, you know, it's okay, even commissioners.
- 23 I also want to say I probably filed the most civilian
- 24 complaints against officers because I do something called
- 25 cop watch, which is when you record traffic stops from a



- 1 safe and reasonable distance, which is all about
- 2 accountability and transparency. And I've been targeted,
- 3 especially in the 7th Precinct. To hear an elder talk
- 4 about her experiences with the 7th Precinct is very, very
- 5 traumatic. I almost said it's hearing about her
- 6 experience.
- 7 And I've had similar bad experiences with
- 8 detectives, officers, supervisors, sergeants,
- 9 lieutenants, not really a captain, but all the way up,
- 10 which is very, very sad. I want to say no commander
- 11 should be able to manage their child. That's a direct
- 12 conflict of interest if you ask me. No offense to
- 13 anybody, but that shouldn't be able to happen. There's an
- 14 inherent thing that you have when you have a nepotism
- 15 relationship with somebody that you manage. Also, under
- 16 Chief White, the CCW arrests went up 200%, which is by
- 17 choice. It was not an accident to go up 200% in CCW
- 18 arrests. Also, the Jameson Williams stop. It should teach
- 19 you that officers don't understand a reasonable thing
- 20 about property versus owning a property. If something is
- 21 found in the vehicle with somebody, if it's not on their
- 22 person, it is not responsible to --- you can't just pin
- 23 it on somebody like you want to and say you're going to
- 24 arrest somebody and make a scandal out of it. I also want
- 25 to say Robert Olive is running for board of police



- 1 commissioners to my knowledge. And that man is an abuser.
- 2 He has an active case for breaking, entering against one
- 3 of my friends. And anybody who supports him is supporting
- 4 and insulating an abuser. I also want to say that to be
- 5 able to have that much pool to fight an open case in
- 6 court and run for board of police commissioner who's
- 7 going to be the oversight of a police department, that's
- 8 ridiculous. That shouldn't ever be able to happen. What
- 9 else?
- 10 Also, body cams at 99% compliance are also a
- 11 problem. I see Commander Johnson on New Year's Day 2025
- 12 at a protest with a body cam not rolling. I have a live
- 13 experience with body cams. His body cam was not rolling.
- 14 You can have a body cam on. If it's not rolling, does it
- 15 capture any footage, any video? No. So, to just have it
- 16 on is not good. You want to have it rolling because if
- 17 it's not rolling, it's not capturing anything. And this
- 18 is a commander at the 7th Precinct and he even put his
- 19 body camera in another officer's camera to show that it
- 20 was recording and it was not recording.
- 21 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Alright. Thank you. Next
- 22 speaker.
- MS. UNDERWOOD: Mr. Chair, we're going to go into
- 24 Zoom. Our first speaker is Patricia Montgomery. Our next
- 25 speaker, excuse me, would be Mr. Roo.



- 1 MS. MONTGOMERY: Good afternoon or good evening.
- 2 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Good evening.
- 3 MS. MONTGOMERY: This is Patricia Montgomery. I am a
- 4 grandmother of two granddaughters that live near the 9th
- 5 Precinct. I've been getting harassed relentlessly by a
- 6 neighbor. I've been arrested twice. The first time I was
- 7 taking a picture of someone that was standing on a porch
- 8 with a long kitchen knife, and the lady went and told the
- 9 police that I had a gun that I was lawfully allowed to
- 10 carry, but was in my house and not in my car. I was
- 11 arrested, went to court. Thankfully, in less than 5
- 12 minutes, the jury saw that there was nothing there. The
- 13 second time I was arrested, it was after the lady was
- 14 served PPO papers, then she called the police and said
- 15 that I tried to run her over with my car.
- The police came to my house; they injured my arm. I
- 17 was later let go with no charges. But as of today, I
- 18 still don't have use of my right arm. I have videos of
- 19 every incident. I've still been stalked. I've been
- 20 harassed. This has been going on for 4 years. I've made
- 21 17 police reports and I've also filed two complaints with
- 22 the Office of the Chief Investigator. As of yesterday
- 23 morning, they're kids are coming into my property,
- 24 they're destroying my property. Yesterday morning they
- 25 ripped off the back of my windshield on my car and I've



- 1 been trying to get help from the 9th Precinct. They're
- 2 not doing anything to help me. My granddaughters can't
- 3 even walk out the house without them calling them
- 4 derogatory names. They're 4 and 9. I just need help.
- 5 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Can you freeze her? Okay. Keep
- 6 rolling. Can you stay on and make sure that we have the
- 7 information? We can forward that information to the
- 8 department and we are asking that the department give us
- 9 a response within a week on what her complaints are. And
- 10 then make sure that someone from OCI lets her know where
- 11 her complaints are with us.
- MS. UNDERWOOD: Ms. Montgomery, if you can please
- 13 stay on the line and I'll get right back with you after
- 14 public comments.
- MS. MONTGOMERY: Yes, I will. Thank you.
- MS. UNDERWOOD: We're going to go to Mr. Roo.
- MR. ROO: That's Mr. Roo, aka Mr. Real. Everybody
- 18 with their earshot, everybody listening, pay close
- 19 attention. In 2023 November, I caught Janice Winfrey and
- 20 Gina Avery Walker, cheating in Detroit elections
- 21 Commander Deitrich, you know me, Ms. Linda Bernard, what
- 22 the reverend said about you, I applaud and commend him
- 23 for saying it and putting it up front. Whether he is
- 24 obsessive or not, you're a fraud. Willie Bell, I told you
- 25 I was different. You stood in the way, now you have to



- 1 get out of the way. Just now, before this meeting
- 2 started, I got a call from the Homicide Unit, a
- 3 lieutenant. For the past 2 weeks, there've been 12
- 4 occasions that I've been hung up on at the 596 226
- 5 number. That's the Homicide Unit for the Detroit Police
- 6 Department. Now, Darryl Woods and Tamara Liberty Smith,
- 7 listen closely. You all have been cheated in, and the
- 8 elected officials here in the City of Detroit and
- 9 appointed officials by the mayor who have been cheated in
- 10 as well. Now, Darryl Woods and Tamara Liberty Smith. I
- 11 told you all Kaneisha didn't shoot herself. Now, I'm
- 12 getting ready to demonstrate it to everybody. Nene asked,
- 13 did you all stop saying her mama killed herself? You all
- 14 didn't want to do it, so now I'm going to take it. That's
- 15 right, Deitrich. I said, I'm going to take it. And if you
- 16 know anything about me, my word is my bond. So, Darryl
- 17 Woods, you are a fraud. And Tamara, I don't know what to
- 18 say about what you did, but it is what it is.
- MS. UNDERWOOD: That's the end of our public
- 20 comments, sir.
- 21 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: That's it. Okay. What is next is,
- 22 I think, the Secretary report. No, no, excuse me. Our
- 23 community leader. Thank you so much for your patience,
- 24 Ms. Gail Tubbs the phenomenon Gail Tubbs, come on, give
- 25 her a hand.



- 1 MS. TUBBS: Can you hear me? So, first of all, I do
- 2 want to acknowledge the woman that was up here that was
- 3 quite emotional and I will say that I could feel that she
- 4 was so, I mean, it hurt her to her core. So, for that, I
- 5 say that I pray that we will have worked towards a
- 6 resolution for whatever that might be. Because it does
- 7 sound like something's going on with the Block Club.
- 8 Having said that, what I will say as I represent the
- 9 Eighth Precinct Community Relations Council. So, I will
- 10 say that it's hard work because we are really elementary
- 11 and we are working towards bigger and better things. But
- 12 most importantly, we're working on partnership and
- 13 collaboration. What I will say, with the officers of the
- 14 Eighth Precinct, and I'm talking from my commander to our
- 15 captain all the way down. I have to say from my heart and
- 16 from the heart, from my council, we appreciate each and
- 17 every one of you. I have never been around a bunch of
- 18 people who, on a drop of a dime will come out and come to
- 19 a meeting with a day's notice. Like I'll be there, to
- 20 come out and represent our district. I can't tell you how
- 21 much I'm so proud of their collaboration and partnership
- 22 with our Councilman, Councilman Tate. Our commander comes
- 23 to every last one of those satellite hours, every other
- 24 week to report out what is being done and to hear from
- 25 the community. if they have any issues. He will take them



- 1 aside and do that. To our crisis intervention team that
- 2 have been going strong for some years. I don't know why
- 3 people don't know. We know that go out and actively try
- 4 to, you know, deflate issues before they can get violent.
- 5 We thank them. We will have a police luncheon that
- 6 we will celebrate and feed the mess out of our 160
- 7 officers. A lot of them eat double dip. You all come in,
- 8 leave and then come back. It's okay. We make sure that we
- 9 have enough food for you all. That's the least we can do
- 10 for our officers. Speaking about the DWIN, Detroit Wayne
- 11 Integrated Health Network and our beloved former Chief of
- 12 Police, who is now CEO. My organization, O'Hare Park, has
- 13 met with him. He plans to do the walk-a-mile in our
- 14 community. Once he gets the 7-Mile behavioral --- it's
- 15 another word in there, Behavioral Health Campus. But is
- 16 right there on the corner of 7-Mile and Greenview
- 17 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Absolutely.
- 18 MS. TUBBS: That he is working on right now.
- 19 Actually, they are doing construction. I can't give you
- 20 an end date. I'd love to say 2026 fall, but it might even
- 21 fall into spring of 2027, which our community --- we were
- 22 asked to come in and be a part of all of that discussion.
- 23 And so, I have to say that I think we've been blessed
- 24 here in the Eighth Precinct. My community has been
- 25 blessed by the people who are willing to support all of



- 1 us. For the people there that complain about the Seventh
- 2 Precinct, I'm really, truly sorry that you've had a bad
- 3 experience. I will tell you that's not every experience.
- 4 I will ask you to just pray because there is hope. I will
- 5 always root for hope for all of our citizens in Detroit.
- 6 Oh, I'm District one down, I'm district one down baby.
- 7 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Excuse me, sir. Point of order,
- 8 sir. Point of order. Point of order, sir.
- 9 MS. TUBBS: All I'm saying is ---
- 10 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: You'll get removed from this
- 11 meeting if you're going to be disruptive. Point of order.
- MS. TUBBS: All I'm saying is, I'm acknowledging that
- 13 you guys have had some issues and I just want to say, I'm
- 14 a half full person anyway, and I'm a hugger. So, for me,
- 15 I concentrate on what can be done in the future. There
- 16 are obviously problems. We are going to have problems;
- 17 we've been having problems. However, if people can get
- 18 together in a room and decide, make a decision, we are
- 19 going to do better, then there's always going to be hope
- 20 as far as I'm concerned. So, again, I acknowledge that
- 21 you guys have been going through some stuff and I'm
- 22 praying that you guys get it. Other than that, that's
- 23 all. I just always want to praise my officers, come on,
- 24 get a talk, get a talk because they are worthy of it, as
- 25 far as they and community engagement, I have to say, A1,



- 1 number one, love them. And that's really all I've had to
- 2 say. Thank you for being here in our community.
- 3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you. Madam Secretary.
- 4 MS. GARNIER: The report this evening includes the
- 5 weekly facial recognition report, the ShotSpotter weekly
- 6 report, as well as the memorandum from the Personnel and
- 7 Training Committee meeting of this week. The upcoming
- 8 meetings are as follows: Our next board meeting is
- 9 Thursday, May 15th, 3:00 PM at Public Safety
- 10 Headquarters. The June community meeting will be held in
- 11 the Seventh Precinct at Sacred Heart Activities
- 12 Buildings. 5431 Rivard Street in Detroit. That's
- 13 Thursday, June 12th, 6:30 PM. Upcoming committee meetings
- 14 are on Friday, tomorrow, May 9th at 1:30 PM Personnel and
- 15 Training Committee in the Woodward Conference room at
- 16 Public Safety Headquarters. Next week, Tuesday, May 13th
- 17 at 3:00 PM is the Citizen Complaints Committee at
- 18 headquarters. At 4:00 PM, the Budget Committee, which
- 19 will also be in the Woodward Conference Room, as well as
- 20 the Policy Committee at 5:00 PM on Tuesday, May 13th..
- 21 And that ends the report for this evening.
- 22 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you very kindly. Unfinished
- 23 business. I would like to entertain a motion to accept
- 24 for interview the recommended name applicants for the
- 25 position of administrative assistant to the Board of



- 1 Police Commissioners Louis Abraham, Krystal Fields,
- 2 Jasmine Horas Espinasa (Phonetic), Dior Mathis and
- 3 Phillip Tarver.
- 4 COMMISSIONER Moore: So, moved.
- 5 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Second.
- 6 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Moved by Commissioner Moore and
- 7 second by Commissioner Bernard. Any discussion? All in
- 8 favor say aye.
- 9 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
- 10 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Anyone oppose? The motion is
- 11 carried. I'd like to entertain a motion to interview the
- 12 recommended name, applicant for the position of
- 13 administrative specialist three to the Board of Police
- 14 Commissioners, Jerome Jacksons, Dior Mathis, Candace,
- 15 Roy, Jonya Underwood, and Jelani Yeager.
- 16 COMMISSIONER MOORE: So, moved.
- 17 COMMISSIONER BERNARD:
- 18 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Moved by Commissioner Moore.
- 19 Second by Commissioner Bernard. Any discussion? All in
- 20 favor say aye.
- 21 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
- 22 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Anyone opposed? The motion is
- 23 carried. Is there any new business? There been no new
- 24 business, what is the pleasure?
- 25 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Motion to adjourn, Mr. Chair.



COMMISSIONER BELL: Second. CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Motion to adjourn by Commissioner Moore. Second by Commissioner Bell. CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Any discussion? All in favor say aye. COMMISSIONERS: Aye. CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Anyone opposed? The motion is carried. This meeting is adjourned. (Meeting Adjourned at 7:54 p.m.)
