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3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: It is May 22nd 2025. It is 3:01. 4 The Board of Police Commissioners meeting is called to 5 Order. We have Chaplain Theresa Madison via Zoom for the 6 invocation.

MS. UNDERWOOD: I apologize, Chair, I cannot find her8 on Zoom at this time.

9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Can't find her on Zoom right now. 10 Okay. Where's the reverend? Ask him, would he? Yes, ask the 11 reverend really quickly. Ask him, would he come and do the 12 invocation for us.

13 Can you do the invocation for us, sir.

14 MINISTER BLOUNT: Yes, sir.

15 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir.

16 MINISTER BLOUNT: For the record, my name's Minister Eric Blount from Sacred Heart Catholic Church right here in 17 Detroit. In the name of the Father and of the Son, and of 18 19 the Holy Spirit. Let us pray. Heavenly Father, we thank you for this day and this opportunity to do justice and to walk 20 21 humbly with our God. Lord, we thank you, especially this day for whatever good works Commissioner Jesus Hernandez 22 has done for us in our community. There's always more, 23 always better. But Lord, we hope and pray that justice, 24 25 transparency, peace and love will reign in this city and in



1 this board. Lord, we ask that you bless everyone on the 2 Board of Police Commissioners, the whole police department 3 and all of the community who have benefited and some have 4 suffered under this reign. This we pray in Jesus' name and 5 for his sake. Amen.

6 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Amen. In the midst of us waiting on 7 a quorum, we want to be able to go to public comment. Let's 8 get that started.

9 MS. UNDERWOOD: Thank you, Mr. Chair. We have three 10 speakers so far. Our first speaker will be Ernest Riley, 11 and Minister Eric Blount, and Ms. Fredia Butler.

12 MR. RILEY: Hello. Hi, my name is Ernest Riley.

13 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: If you could talk to mic for us,14 please. Thank you.

15 MR. RILEY: Hello. Hi, my name is Ernest Riley. Please 16 excuse the waiting. I'm dressed. I wasn't prepared to come 17 today. Make a long story short, I went to the police 18 station about an hour ago to receive my merchandise. I'm a vendor. I've been a vendor for over 15 years in Detroit. I 19 keep getting tickets for a vendor with no license. Got them 20 21 all right here. The judge dismissed all my tickets over and 22 over again, she dismissed it. She got on the zoom and told me I can go back to the police station to receive my items, 23 24 which were things such as cowboy hats. There may have been 25 some Santa Claus hats, toys at this Christmas tree. I do a



1 lot of vending downtown, so a lot of police know me and a 2 lot of police officers don't mind me because they know I 3 have a vendor license. Well, to make a long story short, 4 make it shorter.

5 They told me I couldn't get my stuff back because I took a plea bargain, which I didn't take a plea bargain. I 6 7 have the paper right here saying that I didn't agree to a plea bargain. So, therefore, they keep telling me I can't 8 9 get my merchandise back. I have all my tickets dismissed. Another officer told me that my merchandise was donated. 10 I'm confused on how my merchandise was donated before the 11 court date even came. And if it was donated, I have like, 12 13 maybe over 10 tickets and each ticket was for a different 14 item that they confiscated from me. So every time that they 15 took stuff from me, or they donated, I just like to know 16 where it was donated to, how it was donated and why it was 17 donated. I went back to the police station and asked them, 18 well, could I get some documentation or if you all donated 19 my stuff or if it was forfeited. They told me, no, I can't get any of that. I got video recording, other police taking 20 21 my stuff. One particular time I was at the Lions game, the 22 NFL, they have the NFL riding around looking for bootleg merchandise. The NFL told me my merchandise was not 23 bootlegged; told me it was not counterfeit merchandise. He 24 25 told me that I did everything by the standards of the NFL



1 and they still took my merchandise.

2 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Chief, can you address that 3 situation?

CHIEF BETTISON: Yes. Chief Todd Bettison, for the 4 5 record. I'm somewhat familiar with Mr. Riley's case and have looked into it, and I'm not familiar with the most 6 recent aspects as far as how the court case concluded, 7 8 whether or not Mr. Riley plead. So I'll have to look at 9 that after the meeting, have my people look at it, my staff. But in regards, they did look into the actual 10 business license aspect of it, and in reading that he 11 12 doesn't have authorization to vend downtown. That's just 13 how the ordinance is issued by the City of Detroit. And so 14 in regards to his property, I did have my chief of staff 15 look and personally go over to the 3rd Precinct. And so 16 from what the report that I got back, is that his actual 17 property is at the 3rd Precinct. And so in fact, if what 18 you're saying is accurate, sir, and that the case was in 19 fact dismissed and you didn't plead to it, and that the 20 court is saying give the property back, then we will give 21 your property back to you, sir.

MR. RILEY: Yes, sir. Okay. I heard when you said that I didn't have a standard license to be downtown, but now I have one. Back then I had a foot vendor license, such as the Roseman or the Follower man, things of that nature. But



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1 now they granted me a stationary.

CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Can you talk on the mic, sir.
MR. RILEY: Now they've granted me a stationary
location for downtown, which says Midway and Adams, Adams
Park. So now I do have a stationary --CHAIRPERSON WOODS: So his team is going to get with

7 you and what needs to be rectified. I hear the Chief saying 8 will be rectified and we'll go from there. I'm sure that, 9 you know, we want a report out to us as to what was defined 10 one way or the other. So thank you, sir, and get with, I 11 think, Deputy Chief Williams was trying to reach out to you 12 and thank you.

MR. RILEY: Okay. Thank you very much for your time.
 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah. Madam secretary, please call
 the roll.

1 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: We have a quorum. Thank you. I entertain a motion for the approval of May 20th, 2025. 2 3 Agenda. 4 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: So moved. CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Moved by Commissioner Hernandez. 5 6 COMMISSIONER BELL: Second. CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Second by Commissioner Bell. Any 7 discussion? All in favor say aye. 8 9 COMMISSIONERS: Aye. CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Anyone opposed? The motion is 10 carried. I entertain a motion for the approval of the 11 12 minutes of May 15th, 2025. 13 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: So moved. 14 COMMISSIONER BELL: Second. 15 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Moved by Commissioner Hernandez and 16 second by Commissioner Bell. Any discussion? All in favor 17 say aye. 18 COMMISSIONERS: Aye. CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Anyone oppose? The motion is 19 carried. Introduction of BOPC staff, Chief of Police and 20 Elected Officials or Representatives. 21 GARNIER: Present today, Board of Police 22 MS. Our 2 interpreters today are Ms. Yakata and Dr. Stephanie Beatty. 3 Court reporter Don Handyside. Enrique Jackson for Audio 4 Visual and Charles Henry from Media Services Video. 5 Recorded thus far, having registered, and signed in, Marie 6 7 Overall for State Representative Tyrone Carter. Ms. Fredia Butler, 2nd Precinct Community Relations President LaDon 8 Davis from the Office of Council member Fred Durhal on 9 Mark Young, President of the Lieutenants and 10 Zoom. Sergeants Association, Scotty Boman and former Detroit 11 12 Police Commissioner William Davis, both on Zoom. And those 13 are the individuals registered at this time, sir.

14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you very kindly. We have a 15 resolution honoring retired Officer Calvin Patrick, 16 posthumously. And so we read the resolution honoring Police 17 Officer Calvin Patrick.

WHEREAS Calvin Patrick, a Detroit native with a love 18 of history and a dynamic personality, was drawn to public 19 service. This interest led him to submit applications to 20 become a Detroit police officer or a firefighter. The 21 police department proved quicker to secure his skills and 22 talent by accepting him to the training academy. On October 23 the 24th, 1977, Officer Patrick was appointed to the 24 25 Detroit Police Department; and.



WHEREAS Police Officer Patrick loved his job in law 1 enforcement. His assignments included Special Duty Unit, 2 Detroit Metropolitan Police Academy Section Communications 3 Operations Section and Western District. He became known as 4 a consummate professional for his respectful and effective 5 6 engagement in serving and protecting the community; and WHEREAS on Friday, May 24th, 1996, Officer Patrick and 7 his partner Officer Kathy Warren, were patrolling a 8 residential area, when they saw two youth on the street 9 during school hours. The officers stopped the patrol car to 10 question the teenagers, ages 14 and 16 years old about 11 12 skipping school. And in a shocking and violent attack, one 13 or both teenagers open fire striking Officer Warren in the 14 hand, and Officer Patrick several times in his torso, and 15 chest. One bullet pierced his spine and caused paralysis; 16 and.

WHEREAS Police Officer Patrick refused to let the attempted murder or the paralysis stop him from serving the public or from living and enjoying the full life. With grit and determination, he learned to drive using hand controls and returned to work for several years before receiving duty disability on August 14th, 2006, ultimately succumbing to the gunshot wound sustained in the line of duty.

Officer Patrick Badge 4458 passed away on February
6th, 2025. At 68 years old, the Greater Detroiter community



will gather Saturday, May 31st, 2025, for a special
 remembrance of his bravery, dedicated service and inspiring
 perseverance.

4 NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED.

Board of Police Commissioners awarded this 5 The resolution posthumously to Police Officer Calvin Patrick in 6 recognition of his dedicated and distinguished service to 7 the Detroit Police Department and the residents of the City 8 of Detroit. May his selfless sacrifice and commitment as a 9 law enforcement professional forever be remembered. Come 10 on, give this officer a hand and appreciation for his 11 12 dedicated service. As I don't know if there's anyone here to receive the award for him. If not, we would give it to 13 14 the Chief to make sure that the family is accommodated. Is 15 that right?

16 COMMISSIONER BELL: Mr. Chairman?

17 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes. Let me do the motion first and 18 then we do the discussion. What is the pleasure?

19 COMMISSIONER BELL: So move.

20 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Motion to move to adopt this 21 resolution is supported by Commissioner Dewaelsche. Any 22 discussion?

23 COMMISSIONER BELL: Mr. Chairman. I just want to add 24 that, please pray for his partner Kathy Warren. She's 25 having some health challenges.



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CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Absolutely. Any other further
 discussion? All in favor say aye.

3 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Anyone oppose? The motion is 4 carried. We also want to recognize our distinguished chair 5 of the Personnel and Training Committee. A very, very 6 honorable leader in this city. Someone who has dedicated 7 his time and resources and talents to the citizens of the 8 City of Detroit. And that being Commissioner Jesus 9 Hernandez. He has done a yomis job in serving this 10 community and has led our Personnel and Training Committee 11 12 with dignity, respect and compassion, and I'm just in awe 13 of his talents. Someone I consider to be a friend, has 14 really sacrificed a lot. This man, working in corporate 15 America and for those who don't know, the Board of Police 16 Commissioner doesn't get a paycheck, and doing committee meetings and coming to all these meetings and doing all the 17 things that he has done to sacrifice for the citizens of 18 the City of Detroit has been amazing to me. And so we have 19 a resolution for him. And I'm going to ask Chairman 20 Pressley to read that resolution and let the record reflect 21 2.2 that he's here.

23 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: It is my honor. Resolution24 honoring Police Commissioner Jesus Hernandez.

25 WHEREAS Jesus Hernandez has edged a lasting mark on



the City of Detroit, its residence and its institutions
 during many years of civic leadership and community
 service, including recently as a member of the Board of
 Police Commissioners; and.

WHEREAS Police Commissioner Hernandez joined the board 5 in May, 2020, following his appointment by Mayor Mike 6 Duggan and confirmation by the City Council. During a 7 8 critical time, he helped steer the board, the police 9 department, and the city through twin global challenges from the COVID-19 pandemic and a new police reform movement 10 after the murder of George Floyd by a city of Minneapolis, 11 12 Minnesota police officer; and.

WHEREAS along with his powerful commitments to community involvement in public service, Commissioner Hernandez contributed greatly to the Board of Police Commissioners through business acumen as an executive at Ford Motor Company, DTE Energy and Blue Cross Blue Shield of Michigan.

Most notably, commissioner Hernandez served as the Personnel and Training Committee chair during two national searches for a chief of police, which culminated in the tenures of Chief James White and Chief Todd Bettison. As committee chair, he also led the hiring expansion of investigators of the Office of Chief Investigator, the board's investigative unit for public complaints against



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1 police officers and other departmental employees; and. WHEREAS Commissioner Hernandez continues to be a 2 forceful leader for uplifting and improving the community 3 and his many other leadership roles in local and state 4 5 organizations such as the Michigan Hispanic Collaborative Detroit, is that MOTTEP Foundation and the Hispanic Latino 6 Commission of Michigan. Since last fall, Commissioner 7 Hernandez has been a part of the historic milestone as one 8 9 of two Hispanic board members serving at the same time as he completes his five-year term this month, the board and 10 community will long remember his contributions and impact. 11 12 NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED

13 That the Detroit Board of Police Commissioners awards 14 this resolution in recognition of dedicated and diligent 15 service by Police Commissioner Jesus Hernandez, your 16 dedication and commitment to civilian oversight in the City of Detroit and residents merit our highest regard. We 17 salute you, Commissioner Jesus Hernandez, for a job well 18 done and wish you continued success in the future. The 19 Board of Police Commissioners accountability through 20 civilian oversight adopted by the Board of Police 21 22 Commissioners, I guess after this motion on May 22nd, 2025. 23 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: What is the pleasure?

24 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: I move that we adopt this
25 resolution into our archives



1 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: So move.

2 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Moved by Commissioner Pressley and
3 second by Commissioner Dewaelsche. Any discussion?

COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: I have a discussion. It has 4 been an honor to serve with Commissioner Hernandez. You 5 know, he has, again, been a steady voice on this 6 7 commission, and as you stated in the resolution marks leading our Personnel and Training Committee. And I look 8 9 forward to his leaving because as I am getting older, there are very few settings that I get to be the youngest at the 10 table. So I am going to, so I can at least claim that for a 11 12 bit of time. But again, I honor your dedicated service and 13 you indeed will be missed at the commission.

14 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Mr. Chair.

15 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes.

16 COMMISSIONER DEWALSCHE: Yes. Thank you. And I would also like to commend the commissioner for his service on 17 this board. He sat on many committees, including the Budget 18 Committee, which I chair, and he was just a tremendous 19 support. His expertise was valuable to our Budget Committee 20 this year. And we made a lot of gains with our budget this 21 22 year. Thanks in parts to your input. And so I thank you for your service. I'm hopeful that we'll replace someone just 23 as valuable as you have been to this commission. And good 24 25 luck with your future. And you were right, Chair, the



Commissioner is very involved in our community. He is a pillar of our community. And so I know that he will continue to be in spite of his very demanding job. He has contributed quite extensively. And so, thank you, commissioner.

6 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Thank you.

7 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir.

COMMISSIONER BANKS: Yes, I have something to say. The 8 9 time that I served, which you commissioner, you've been 10 solid with the Policy and Training Committee. You displayed 11 a very solid platform. I listened to you over and over many 12 times, and you've just been solid, brother. You've been 13 like a protector. You put me in the mind of a protector of 14 this board, you know, and you are going on a new journey 15 now, God is taking you on a new journey. This journey has 16 come to an end. The Lord is taking you on a new journey. So it's time for you to pick up new nuggets and everything. 17 18 Your time has expired here, but you made an impact. I give 19 you that. And you don't say that about anybody who made an impact, baby. 20

21 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Thank you.

22 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes. And you have something to say? 23 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Yeah. Jesus. You know, when I 24 first met you, I said, Jesus; Jesus, plenty of us here 25 today, because a lot people just pronounce it as Jesus as,



1 you know. But you are a great guy. I've enjoyed working with you. I'm glad you're at my first employer now, Ford 2 Motor Company. I was their third black lawyer, and now 3 you're there. And that whole tradition of people on this 4 board from Ford has continued. I wish you the best in 5 everything you do, and you've got my number, you. I should 6 7 be on your speed dial in case you need me any time of day or night as Kwame Kilpatrick, our former mayor used to say, 8 all you have to do is holler! 9

10 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Alright. Any further discussion?
 11 There was no further discussion. All in favor say aye.
 12 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

13 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Anyone oppose? The motion is 14 carried. We also, council president, saw fit to honor you 15 today as well with the Spirit of Detroit Award for your 16 great work that you have been doing in this city. And so it is read by the City Council in recognition of exceptional 17 achievement, outstanding leadership and dedication to 18 improving the quality of life by the Council of Detroit, 19 Michigan. On behalf of the Detroit City Council President 20 Mayor Sheffield, I extend my heartfelt congratulations on 21 your exemplary service to the City of Detroit. You have 22 left an incredible mark through your steadfast leadership, 23 thoughtful oversight, and unwavering commitment to our 24 25 community. As you complete your term on the Board of Police



Commissioners, we thank you for your dedication, integrity, and the many ways you are, you've uplifted Detroit. May your next chapter be just as impactful as the legacy you leave behind. Give him another hand being recognized by this city. And we also have a retired badge for you as well. You know, come on, give him a hand. This man deserves it. He deserves it. Have anything to say?

COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: I guess I'll stand. I wrote 8 things down. I have to do a mic check for Commissioner 9 Bernard to make sure she can hear me. I'm overwhelmed with 10 11 gratitude to everyone here more than anything. And first 12 and foremost, I have to say, I have to thank God just for 13 the blessings that he brings every single day. Not just to 14 myself, but to our community and to everyone that's here. 15 Thank you to my parents. Thank you to my brothers, one of 16 which is here, my oldest brother. Actually, funny story, some of the gentlemen that are sitting here are lifelong 17 18 friends that I have. We support each other through so many 19 different ways. And even Commissioner Dewaelsche, I think, you were mentioning that we always show up. When there was 20 the water main break just a couple months ago in Southwest 21 Detroit, all these guys picked up the phone as fast as I 22 23 did to be able to support our community with translation 24 and with anything that we need. And they're always 25 available to do that. So big thank you to them. We actually



have a core group of about 15 of us. Some of them apparently couldn't make it today because they have day jobs. But two of them actually want to call out David Tinsley right here, and David Seiruta (phonetic) actually flew in from California, Florida, just to be here. I think it stands. Yeah, go ahead.

8 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: I don't know that I see. Is
9 Rico here?

COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: I don't see Rico, but he has 10 been --- many of you know him probably by his flashy suits 11 12 that he wears at a lot of different city functions and in 13 the community. He was a big reason why over 5 years ago 14 started to have conversations with Commissioner Dewaelsche, 15 with community leaders and with Mayor Duggan ultimately to 16 be able to get the appointment and join this board. I think 17 I'm a better person because of each of you, especially our 18 community. To the department, Chief Bettison, I think we're the first person outside of Chief Craig that I actually met 19 with one-on-one. And you've just been an inspiration since 20 21 the very beginning. It was my honor to be able to lead the 22 committee that ultimately searched and found you and kept 23 you here with us.

You've done some great work as deputy mayor when you were there, and I'm never going to forget, I think what



1 many of us probably know as one of the most iconic moments 2 right in the middle of demonstrations, George Floyd; there were lots of tensions and you've always lived the spirit of 3 community engagement, which is why we obviously wanted to 4 5 bring you back and keep you here. But just the empathy that you showed with the community and the solidarity that you 6 7 showed in taking a knee with those demonstrators says a lot about your character as a person, but a lot about the 8 9 direction that you're taking this department in. So I'm 10 really, really thankful for that. Thankful to obviously 11 Rico, for putting me on this path. Commander Shelley 12 Holderbaum is behind me somewhere. She probably is the 13 person who got the greatest number of calls by me easily, 14 along with a few others.

15 She is phenomenal. Hopefully we can do everything to 16 keep her happy and keep her there at 4th, selfishly because 17 she and her team have done a phenomenal job. DC Sloan, 18 Parish, Bliss Stewart, AC Ewing are here. I know Hayes is 19 in the back, newly appointed Assistant Chief Hayes. Each of 20 you have, you know, we've had some very tense moments 21 behind the scenes with different items that have come up. 22 But you've always shown up in a very balanced and neutral 23 way that always favors and keeps in my community. So I 24 always appreciate that. To the board and staff, I think 25 some of the acknowledgements were listed that I was



1 fortunate enough to be a part of. The work doesn't stop. It 2 obviously continues. And that's not just for those who are 3 here finishing out terms, but for those who might be 4 incoming in January with the new elections. To citizens, I 5 think Minister Eric Blount, it was very fitting that you 6 gave the blessing today.

7 I'm obviously a member of St. Anne Catholic Church in 8 Southwest Detroit, right by the Ambassador Bridge. I've 9 received a lot of support from Monsignor Kosanke there as 10 well. So shout out to him. But you know, you've brought a 11 level of accountability and passion that has grounded each 12 of us and continues to ground us. I ask that you continue 13 to do that.

14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: He's ready.

15 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Ms. Marie Overall, Ι 16 appreciate you in all the ways that you continue to show up 17 for the community as well, not just in Southwest Detroit, but everywhere else. And I think for the most part, that 18 probably is it. I ask that you just keep showing up with 19 purpose in everything that you do. Probably the most 20 exciting thing that we did was increase our budget. I think 21 everyone always wants more money, but we were able to 22 partner with council member Santiago Romero. We're able to 23 partner with obviously the budget committee and so many 24 25 people to try and get the backlogged down. And we haven't



quite gotten there. I know Chief Warfield is doing a
 phenomenal job in doing that. But the work continues to
 show up with purpose. Board secretary, I appreciate you
 more than you know. And thank you everyone.

5 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Rico just came in.

6 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Oh, flashy suit, showed 7 up..So, oh, wow. So, he's the culprit for those who might 8 not know him, as to why I'm here. And you know, I have to 9 thank obviously, Rachel, Connie and Ms. Shackleford and so 10 many community leaders for everything they've done for me 11 personally as well. So, thank you all. I appreciate it. I 12 won't be too far away,

13 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: My man, my man.

14 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Through the Chair.

15 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir.

16 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Now, we know that Commissioner Hernandez; and once again, congratulations to you 17 Commissioner. Job well done. Now, we know Commissioner 18 Hernandez has received its resolution today. It's a badge 19 today. And well, we have a term coming to an end in 6 more 20 21 months. And we have commissioners leaving this board. Now, 22 will they get a resolution and will they get honored? Will, 23 they get a badge. I'm going to put you on the front screen 24 right now.

25 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Make sure you all get a helicopter,



1 doc. You know what I'm saying?

2 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Just hold onto your word now.

3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: For sure.

4 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Okay, my man.

5 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: The fact of the matter is, that this is a thankless job, you know, for commissioners who 6 have sacrificed so much of their time and their treasure 7 and their talent. You know, it really is. There is a stack 8 9 of folders right there. You have to read those through the 10 wee hours of the night. You're not getting paid a dime for 11 that. You know, you have to get calls from citizens 12 constantly. You have to answer mails and emails from 13 citizens and stuff. You're not getting paid a dime. This is 14 a sacrifice from all of these commissioners up here. And I 15 say, hey, thank God for you. You know it's not easy to sit 16 in this seat. And I really appreciate you as a citizen of 17 the City of Detroit for all the sacrifices that every 18 commissioner has made of their time, and their talent and 19 their treasure. We don't get a gas card, none of that. You 20 know, you have to ride on the Eastside, Westside, to go and 21 meet with folks and stuff like that. You know, we don't 22 even get a car, thank God. I don't want one, you know what 23 I'm saying? But our staff, some of our staff members get 24 cars, but we don't get cars. So it's a lot that comes with 25 this. And so I really say I take my hat off to every



commissioner in this room. God bless you all. Chief of
 Police.

3 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. CHIEF BETTISON: Thank you, Mr. Chair. And I will say 4 5 on behalf of the Detroit Police Department, each and every member, we thank the Board of Police Commissioners. 6 7 Definitely, we recognize the sacrifice that you make, and it has to be a passion and a labor of love. So, I just want 8 9 my DPD folks really quickly to give the police 10 commissioners, and also Commissioner Hernandez a round of applause really quickly. 11

12 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you.

13 CHIEF BETTISON: Because it's a very, very important 14 job that you do, and to Commissioner Hernandez. You know, I 15 consider you a friend. You have been, as has been said, 16 solid. You're astute, well read, and, you know, held us accountable as well, and helped to move the department 17 18 forward. And so, you're going to definitely be missed. And 19 definitely, when a person leaves the appropriate words that we use in DPD when members are trying to transfer and go to 20 a different assignment, and before that commander lets them 21 22 go, they always say, we need a suitable replacement; we 23 need a suitable replacement. So, Commissioner Hernandez, we are definitely on the Detroit Police Department looking for 24 25 a suitable replacement for you. So, sir, job well done.



1 Thank you so much. I will start my chief of police report 2 at this particular point in time. Just going through our crime categories. Usually, our homicide numbers were down 3 10%, non-fatal shootings, down 31%, which is significant 4 because we closed the year out in 2024, as we know with 5 historic low numbers in all categories of violent crime. 6 And so we're beating last year's numbers as we continue to 7 trend down. Robberies down 15%, carjackings down a whopping 8 9 24%. We've only had this year, and I don't like having any carjackings or any numbers, but I can tell you that we've 10 11 had 26 this year, and we're almost halfway through the year 12 total.

Part one crime is down 9%. Community updates. 13 14 Recruiting, of course, we are blessed. I had an opportunity 15 to do an interview with CNN yesterday, and they wanted to 16 ask about, you know, is the department staffed? A lot of 17 major city police chiefs are having problems finding 18 individuals that want to be police officers. But when you 19 have a community and the community morale is high, the police officer morale is high, and you're doing the things 20 that you need to do as far as appropriately paying 21 22 officers, et cetera. You can hire and you can also retain. 23 Yesterday, Wednesday, the Detroit Police Department 24 Recruiting Unit spoke with potential applicants at the 25 Employee Resource Fair over at the Coleman A. Young



Municipal Center. So, the Coleman A. Young Municipal Center
 is open. I did a tour.

3 It is beautiful, and I would encourage everybody to get by there and check it out. It is absolutely gorgeous. 4 5 And on Saturday, the Recruiting Unit will be speaking with community members at the Motown Roller Club. PAL visited 6 7 the Detroit Police Department's training center yesterday with some students to expose them to how things occur over 8 9 at our academy. Join our community fund day, that will occur on Monday Memorial Day, and that will be from 10:00 10 AM to 3:00 PM. The Detroit Police Department's 11th 11 12 Precinct and 12th Precincts will be hosting the community 13 fun day at the Dakota Inn. And the community is invited out 14 to enjoy free food, refreshments, music giveaways, and 15 it'll be a car show. The kids will also be able to tour 16 police and fire department vehicles. Today, we celebrated our Women in Blue. 19 women of the Detroit Police 17 Department at our Annual Women in Blue Ceremony. 18

And it was hosted at the MGM Grand Casino Hotel. Congratulations to this year's nominee, and our winner, which is Police Officer Savannah Mann of the Special Response Team. I'll go into some of the community updates from the precincts. The 2nd Precinct continues to focus on community safety and traffic enforcement. For the past week, the 2nd Precinct made 49 arrests, confiscated 5 guns



1 for 5 tickets for no license plates, and impounded 2 2 vehicles for no plates. We're really concentrating on vehicles that don't have plates. Oftentimes individuals 3 will either obscure the plate or remove the plate in order 4 5 to do something nefarious in our community so that they can't be identified. The 3rd Precinct update. Officers from 6 7 the 3rd Precinct made 15 felony arrests and issued 128 8 tickets for traffic stops over the past week. 4th Precinct 9 update. On Thursday, officers were on patrol in the area of 10 Homer and Lawndale, when they saw a vehicle speeding and ran a red light. Officers conducted a traffic stop on the 11 12 vehicle.

13 The driver did not have a license and was placed into 14 custody. Officers also recovered a weapon from the vehicle taking a gun off the street. Officers from the 4th Precinct 15 16 made 23 arrests, confiscated eight guns and towed 2 boats 17 over the weekend. So, wherever they got those boats from; I 18 know some residents were very, very happy, because if a 19 boat is sitting on the street in front of your house, it 20 ruins your quality of life. And so we're working very, very 21 hard to get those abandoned blighted vehicles and boats off 22 the street. And I actually did a tour of the tow yards that 23 we have, and I can tell you that they're full. So they're 24 doing a phenomenal job. Officers at the 5th Precinct made 25 19 felony arrests and wrote 232 tickets for traffic stops



over the weekend. As Chief of Police, I've made it a promising pledge to do traffic enforcement. I've heard from the community, we get a lot of complaints when it comes to individual speeding, running red lights, et cetera. The focus is to educate and to slow folks down. And I can continue on and on, but I don't know if you want me to continue through each one of our precincts.

8 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: No, sir.

9 But as you can see, our officers are doing some amazing work. And I'll just say this, with the 9th 10 Precinct. Officers from the 9th Precinct made 30 felony 11 12 arrests last week. They wrote 120 tickets from traffic 13 stops over the past week. We will continue our efforts. 14 We're going into the Memorial Day holiday. I wish everybody 15 a great Memorial Day holiday, and downtown will be 16 extremely busy. We'll have about 150,000 people visiting 17 our downtown and our officers. The DPD is working very 18 hard. We're going to have the neighborhoods covered, we're going to have downtown covered, and we are doing it all. 19 Thank you so much. 20

21 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Any questions? Yes,22 commissioner.

23 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: A great report. Chief number 24 one, can we get a copy of those stats that you talked 25 about? I don't think they're in my pack. But in any event,



1 I want to ask you a question. Are all those arrests that 2 you talked about, the felony arrests and everything as a 3 result of the traffic stops?

4 CHIEF BETTISON: No, not every arrest is a result of 5 the traffic stop, no.

6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Okay. No, just police doing 7 their jobs is what you're saying.

8 CHIEF BETTISON: Police doing their jobs. And next I'll 9 give a report about how many 911 calls our officers answer. 10 The volume is just really amazing. And they're getting 11 there. And so they're doing it all. They're getting there 12 expeditiously, answering the police calls for service. And 13 so some of those arrests came as a result of 911 calls 14 also.

15 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I see. So you sort of enhanced, 16 or what are we being more vigilant now? Because I was 17 interested in the arrest that you made per precinct. That's 18 why it's interesting to me and what has changed, or you are 19 just reporting it to us now.

20 CHIEF BETTISON: I just want to make sure that, you 21 know, when we report out, our report and highlight the work 22 that they're doing. And so the men and women of DPD, 23 they've always been out doing this type of work, and so I 24 just wanted to bring it in, highlight it for the community 25 to just shine a light on it.



1 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you.

2 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: It was reported in the media the other day concerning an officer allegedly going through a 3 4 red light and injuring someone. Can we make sure that we 5 are putting out teletypes and communicating with officers in terms of running red lights and stuff. I see it a lot 6 7 myself, you know officers going through lights, and nothing 8 is going on, you know, but just not being patient, and 9 running those lights. And can you brief us as it relates to 10 that particular matter?

11 CHIEF BETTISON: I will definitely ensure that we put 12 out a teletype and we are stressing that to our members, 13 that we have to obey the traffic laws as well. And so we have taken a stance and a position that when officers are 14 15 involved in at-fault accidents, that we're sending them for 16 retraining, and that, you know, when they're found at-fault 17 in an accident that could have been preventable, then they 18 also receive the appropriate discipline also to correct 19 that type of behavior. And with that particular incident, I know it's under investigation. I don't have the particular 20 21 results, but I will make sure that I do share it with the 22 board. I did get a chance to see the video as well. And so, 23 you know, just looking at the video, until I get the remainder, I don't want to be the chief that speculates. 24 25 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: There you go.



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CHIEF BETTISON: But I will ensure that this board is
 updated post haste, as early as probably next week.

3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you very kindly.

4 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: One more question.

5 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Commissioner Pressley.

6 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Thank you, Chair. Chief 7 Bettison, in that same vein you know, in the numbers of citizen complaints that I have to review. Again, I think 8 that the department should be commended that for the most 9 part you know, they're operating according to policy and 10 11 procedure, which is why it's disappointing that the 12 sustained cases seems to be things that should be easily 13 avoidable and easily addressed. Which is a demeanor, which 14 is officers not using appropriate language in addressing 15 citizens. And so getting casual and calling them bro or 16 little bro and things of that nature, that seems like that 17 would be negligible, particularly when it's such a stellar job that the officers are doing for the most part. And then 18 we still are seeing incidents where officers aren't 19 activating their body-worn camera, if it's not for the 20 21 duration of time or at all that are coming up in the CCRs 22 that at least I'm reviewing. And so, you know, as you are 23 sharing communication with the department around the expectations around them following traffic laws, you know, 24 25 also reiterating, demeanor and how they refer to citizens,



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1 as well as making sure that they understand the 2 responsibility around the body-worn camera footage, so that 3 those things aren't being sustained

CHIEF BETTISON: And through the Chair. Absolutely. One 4 5 of the things that we brag about at DPD that we can celebrate is being able to hire and retain. And when we're 6 7 going to the various precincts, at our last academy 8 graduation, we graduated 39 brand new police officers. 9 Their ages range from, you know, roughly 18 to, you know, up to like 52. But we hire, and we have a lot of young 10 11 people, and with young folks many times you know, as they 12 mature and we provide that training, they'll get to a 13 certain level where they're not calling folks, bro. But I 14 told my daughter, don't call me bro. She's like, bro, I'm 15 like, I'm your dad. So, you know, and she's 22. And so with 16 our young people, when we hire them, it's a certain level 17 of maturity that comes along with it.

The benefit is that we are able to get and retain 18 19 Detroiters, and we're going to work with them and get them 20 there, our people there. And into the body-worn camera 21 aspect of it, absolutely. I understand that there will be technical difficulties at times, but that should be far and 22 few in between. And so we're going to continue to push that 23 and we're going to continue to also hold individuals 24 25 accountable because we take that from a department



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standpoint very, very seriously, because the body-worn cameras as we know, they vindicate, and it is that 2 independent eye that lets everyone know for the most part 3 4 exactly what happens. And that's the first thing that I go to when I'm looking for an investigation to see what 5 happened is that body-worn camera. Thank you. 6 7 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Really quickly. CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Commissioner. 8 9 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you, Mr. Chairman? 10 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes. 11 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: We've internally, within our policy committee and our staff, we've had a lot of 12 13 discussions about citizen complaints. And the issue that we're discussing isn't the actual behavior of officers, 14 15 it's the fact that apparently officers no longer carry the 16 OCI brochure telling people how they can file a complaint, giving them information. Not only that, there's no 17 information in any precinct. You know, there's a separate 18 brochure on how you file a citizen's complaint that you can 19 just hand out to people. But the community doesn't have 20 21 that. And one of the suggestions that we thought of just this past week was that, I know that now in your scout 22 23 cars, most of the time you print a ticket. Is that correct? 24 That there's a computer and a printer in there? So can you 25 put the information in bold letters at the bottom of that



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1 teletype, I'm calling it teletype, I don't know what it is. But anyway at the bottom of that piece of paper, 2 advising people about their right to file a complaint. 3 That's number one. Number two, as a result of the consent 4 decree, we were also required to provide people information 5 in the detention center about their ability to file a 6 7 complaint against an officer for whatever, you know, whatever their perspective was. They're not getting that 8 9 either. So we are falling down on the job that we agreed to do under the consent decree. And as you know, the most 10 11 important thing that we address, of course, are citizen 12 complaints. Can you help us with that? And can you tell us 13 what you think? 14 CHIEF BETTISON: Yes, absolutely. I can help with that 15 in utilizing technology and as we advance, everybody has a

16 QR code for everything these days, right?

17 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: On a QR code. I don't do QR 18 codes and a lot of people don't because you don't want the 19 information on your cell phone, quite frankly.

20 CHIEF BETTISON: I think that some people will want to 21 do it, you know ---

22 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Young people, right?

23 CHIEF BETTISON: So, I'm an "And" person, and so we can 24 work on doing what you want and we can work on putting a QR 25 code for technology to give people options, where citizens



1 can file a complaint via --- they can mail it in, they can go into the precinct and make a complaint. They can call it 2 in. So many different ways, but I'm definitely helping to 3 educate the community in every way and method possible. And 4 so, I don't have an issue as far as printing out, you know, 5 you get the template, we can work together to get thousands 6 of them printed out and we can put it in our officers' 7 scout cars. We can have it at the front precinct desk. It 8 9 can be at the DDC. And so that's very simple. You have my commitment to work with you to get it. Now, I don't believe 10 or know; I don't think that we can print it out on actual 11 12 speeding tickets with that because that's a little piece of 13 paper, a different type of equipment. But we can work 14 through it so that we come up with something that's 15 reasonable. 16 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Let's do something about it, 17 because right now we're not in compliance with the consent 18 decree. Thank you.

19 CHIEF BETTISON: Well, we are going to be in 20 compliance. And just for the record, we are out of the 21 consent decree.

22 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: We are. That doesn't let the 23 rules change.

24 CHIEF BETTISON: There are policies. We follow our own 25 policies.



COMMISSIONER BERNARD: We're working on that policy
 right now.

3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you. Commissioner Dewaelsche. 4 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Thank you, Mr. Chair. So, 5 Chief, can you explain to me so that I have an understanding of when the body-worn camera is supposed to 6 be turned on? And let me just give you a little bit of 7 information. I just reviewed 20 cases that we have this 8 past week, and there were these three. And you're going to 9 see my notes of cases that were unfounded or not 10 11 substantiated. But within those cases, you know, the 12 investigation notes indicate that the body-worn camera was 13 not on, or it was not turned on. And I thought that this 14 was something that anytime you had contact with someone, 15 you know, a community member, you had to turn it on. Is 16 that not the case, or why do we have officers that are not 17 turning it on? And how do you get informed that they're not being turned on? And what is the disciplinary action for 18 that activity? 19

20 CHIEF BETTISON: I'm going to have some of my team 21 members tap in as well, but I'll start out with police 22 contact and citizen engagement, then the expectation is 23 that the body-worn camera would be on when you're engaged, 24 and you're going to take police action. It could be 25 examples of where members are sitting in this room and they



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1 don't have their body-worn cameras on. And so there are some cases where a contact of a citizen involves just 2 asking some, you know, some random questions or things of 3 4 that nature where the body-worn camera may not be on. I've 5 had some community members say, well, shouldn't it be on all the time? No, that's not reasonable because when the 6 officers are on lunch break or they're not engaged, or 7 they're taking a restroom break or they're eating lunch, 8 9 things of that nature, they're not going to have the body-10 worn cameras on.

You may also get situations where it could be a 11 12 detective per se. They're not in a patrol function and they 13 wouldn't have their body-worn cameras. They're not walking 14 around with body-worn cameras. However, it could come to a 15 situation where a citizen did make a complaint there, and 16 your investigator would look for body-worn camera footage. And it wouldn't be. There are other situations where our 17 officers work in undercover capacities and it could be a 18 citizen complaint against one of them and they would not 19 have body-worn cameras. So those are some instances that I 20 21 can think of. When it comes to disciplinary, it's looked at 22 as the disciplinary matrix, you know, is this a first offense? Is it a second offense? Is it a third offense? And 23 repeat offenses for the same type of infraction, the 24 25 penalty escalates. And so right now I see Deputy Chief



Parish, and he's going to chime in if anything that I may
 have missed.

3 DC No, Chief, you pretty much caught PARISH: everything. As the board's aware, we have a list of 4 activities that requires the activation of the body-worn 5 camera. If I could sum it up to this, it's any citizen 6 encounter in furtherance of a law enforcement activity. 7 Okay. Any citizen encounter that's in furtherance of a law 8 9 enforcement activity. So if I'm going to a police run, I'm in furtherance of a law enforcement activity, my camera has 10 11 to go on because I'm going to be interacting with citizens at that run. If I'm going into a restaurant to eat lunch 12 13 and somebody says hello and I say hello back, that's a 14 citizen contact, but it's not in furtherance of a law enforcement activity. The camera would not have to be 15 16 activated at that time. Okay. We would also require the cameras be activated if people are engaged actively at a 17 18 scene, whether they're, at that moment in time, engaged 19 with a citizen or not, because they're still performing law enforcement work, and we would want that to be recorded. So 20 21 that would include police runs, that would include response 22 by investigators to an active scene, things of that sort. 23 And Chief, you articulated the disciplinary policy, 24 progressive discipline very well.

25 CHIEF BETTISON: So just to follow up on that as well -



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2	COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Just to clarify one, just
3	because I didn't get the answer for one. So I would assume
4	that if an officer is in a car and they get a call and they
5	repeat to notify and control that they're going to answer
6	that call, wouldn't the body camera be turned on that
7	point?
8	CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Absolutely.
9	COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Okay. I guess that's that
10	I'm sorry. I just need to get that.
11	CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Absolutely.
12	COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Thank you.
13	COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: And then my follow-up to that
14	is that it is communicated and understood that that's the
15	responsibility for all officers on the scene and not like
16	relying upon their partner that has the body-worn camera
17	on, and so they don't have to have theirs on as well.
18	DC PARISH: That's every officer engaged in the
19	activity that requires the activation of the camera.
20	COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Yes, because that's some of the
21	things that I'm seeing that they're relying upon their
22	fellow officer having their camera on and theirs is not so,
23	not reiterating that though.
24	COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Mr. Chair, just one more
25	question that wasn't answered. So, how do you get informed



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1 that officers are not turning their cameras on? CHIEF BETTISON: We have random audits, and so within 2 the precincts, the sergeants have to do video reviews, and 3 so they randomly do that. And how many do they do per day? 4 5 DC PARISH: I can't speak to the commands, but I know the Civil Rights Division is constantly auditing body-worn 6 camera compliance. We had a meeting with the chief 7 investigator not long ago to make sure that our numbers, at 8 9 least, did not conflict with OCIs numbers. And Dr. Martin 10 gave a presentation, I want to say the last sample that he worked with was, I don't want to be quoted on this number, 11 but it was in the thousands that they had looked at. 12 13 DC PARISH: Oh, 3,600. Oh, thank you. Thank you, sir. 14 So no, they audit a lot of camera footage for compliance 15 with our BWC. 16 CHIEF BETTISON: And we CompStat it too. So with our CompStat accountability of our command officers going 17 through there, we actually have a quality control mechanism 18 where individuals are held accountable for that. And so 19 it's a constant quality control mechanism in place. And 20 when it's identified with the deficiencies, we address it. 21

22 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: And we also keep track of 23 those numbers in each of our cases. So I'm not sure if 24 maybe we have to coordinate those numbers with your office. 25 Thank you.



CHAIRPERSON WOODS: And that was the meeting with the chief investigator and deputy chief to be able to go over

3 that. Because it is vitally important to us that we see a 4 reduction in these findings in our reports, you know? 5 Because it is a significant amount that they don't turn on 6 their body-worn cameras. Deputy Chief, you wanted to chime 7 in.

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8 CHIEF BETTISON: Through the Chair. Just a point of clarification on the question the commissioner asked about 9 when the cameras actually are activated. So the cameras are 10 not necessarily activated when the officers acknowledge a 11 12 run. They're not activated until they make contact and 13 they're on scene. And again, it's nuances to that. If 14 they're doing a pursuit the cameras automatically come on. 15 It is a number of triggers that are automatically set with 16 the cameras that allow the cameras automatic initiation. And I think we talked about that a little bit too. But they 17 18 don't always go on. Because sometimes the officers will 19 acknowledge a run when they're in the station. And again, it leads to what the chief was saying, they could be in the 20 bathroom or something else prior to being enroute. So I 21 just wanted to make that point of clarification. 22

23 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Thank you.

24 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Just one final point. The 25 command staff is never required to have on a body-worn



1 camera or whoever --- who is required? Just patrol 2 officers, not lieutenants, not commanders, not, of course, you guys. Who is required to wear a body-worn camera and 3 keep, I mean, have it on? 4 DC PARISH: Commissioner, during our last major event, 5 I was in the field. I had a body-worn camera on and 6 running. 7 8 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: You wore one. 9 DC PARISH: I was commander then, yes. 10 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Yes, I understand. But it's not 11 required. 12 CHIEF BETTISON: Typically, our commanders are not 13 going to have, I mean, he's an exception right there. Thank you, sir. But I don't want to make it seem like our 14 15 commanders are walking around with body-worn cameras. I 16 don't have a body-worn camera. But I'm not typically out 17 there. I will make an arrest if I have to. And, you know, I'll take police action as well, but that's not typically 18 my function if you will. 19 20 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: We have some rigorous training. 21 CHIEF BETTISON: I went through some various rigorous 22 training. I had to. 23 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Lieutenants aren't, right? At what level do you stop having to wear a body-worn camera? 24 25 CHIEF BETTISON: I wouldn't say necessarily a hard



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1 stop, but if you're going to be out there engaged in the 2 furtherance of making arrests and that's going to be your function, and you are part of a task force and you're out 3 there leading, then the lieutenant should have on a body-4 5 worn camera if they're going to be functioning as a police, as a police officer or sergeant, or it's something major 6 7 going on where you know that you're going to have that type of interaction. So say for example, if we had a protest and 8 like have a lieutenant out there on the field and the 9 probability that they're going to have to give orders and 10 commands and you will be directing our officers to take 11 12 some type of police action, then that lieutenant should 13 have on a body-worn camera, all the sergeants should have 14 on body-worn cameras as well. And, you know, looking back 15 in situations like that, they did.

16 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: And let me say this. Thank you, 17 deputy chief. Finally, I've read several disturbing cases 18 as relates to raids that happened at the wrong house. And in one situation I read where the door was kicked down and 19 wasn't replaced immediately. There should be a mechanism in 20 21 place if we made that type of serious mistake and went to the wrong house; that citizen deserved to have their door 22 put up there immediately, you know, and I was deeply 23 disturbed reading that, why I have to read a citizen 24 25 complaint where somebody home was raised by mistake, wrong



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house, not the right address, they didn't do anything and
 they don't get a door back on their house.

3 CHIEF BETTISON: Commissioner, I will say in the spirit of continuous improvement, I can definitely understand 4 5 where that's a reasonable request that you're making. And I could understand and would say that if I were that citizen 6 7 and that happened to me, I would expect within a reasonable 8 amount of time, very quickly, probably within 24 hours that 9 my door was replaced. And so we can work towards figuring out how to address that. But since I've been at the Detroit 10 11 Police Department and I've got 30 plus years, it has been 12 as is. And so that's an area where we can work together to 13 come up with a mechanism. And so that'll be a city 14 response. And then also, I'm sorry, I need a little water, 15 but that'll be a city response. And also coming up with a 16 line item in the budget so that I have funding to be able 17 to call somebody out, and it doesn't have to end up being a contract established to call somebody out to be able to 18 19 address those types of things, because that is reasonable. 20 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah. Thank you very kindly.

21 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Chair.

22 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir.

23 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Question for the Chief. Chief, 24 from last year, 2024 until now year-to-date, can you 25 provide the board at a later time, the number of lawsuits



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against the department and total payouts? In addition, it's 1 been raised at this table several times by Commissioner 2 Bernard, myself and also members of the community. In 3 addition to body-worn cameras what would be helpful for our 4 5 OCI staff and investigators, if we had officers probably wearing body-worn cameras more so like shoulder mount 6 because of whatever; when the officer turns their head 7 toward direction, it allows our investigators, our staff to 8 9 see what the officers see. Sometimes when they're wearing 10 their body-worn camera, I quess on the torso area, we don't always see what the officers sees, and I believe one of our 11 12 investigator staff can speak to that as well as our chief investigator Jerome Warfield. But I'd like to know what the 13 14 City of Detroit, the department, will be looking to do with 15 more shoulder mount cameras in the future.

16 CHIEF BETTISON: Commissioner Burton, through the Chair. You know that right there, I'll have to do research 17 into it and definitely want to know more of what you know. 18 So I'm not really aware of the shoulder mount camera that 19 you spoke to, but you know, if that's going to be the new 20 wave in what's going to put the field of view in the most 21 22 optimal position to be able to capture what the officer is seeing, then that's reasonable as well. So thank you for 23 bringing that up. I'll have my research team look into that 24 25 and be able to report back to you. And in regards to what



1 you started out with, the lawsuits and the number and the payout, I should be able to obtain that information from 2 Corp Council because the City of Detroit Corporation 3 Council has all of that information. So I'll make a request 4 5 from Corp Council to get that for the board. 6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you. CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you. Other comments. Let's 7 finish. 8 9 MS. UNDERWOOD: Thank you, Mr. Chair. 10 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you. MS. UNDERWOOD: We'll start off with, oh, Minister Eric 11 12 Blount, then Ms. Fredia Butler. MINISTER BLOUNT: Commissioner Hernandez, you are 13 14 leaving here, but truth and justice will always be a heavy 15 weight that you are demanded to carry the rest of your 16 life. One of the disturbing things I saw you do in this meeting is to accept a fake law enforcement badge. There's 17 no reason for any of you police commissioners to have a 18 fake law enforcement badge. If you don't think this is 19 serious, just recall a few years ago while you were here on 20 21 this board. The chairperson of the board of police commissioners got caught with a prostitute, and the first 22 23 thing he did was whip out his fake law enforcement badge 24 and say, hey, can't we work something out here? This is 25 serious. So each one of you that has, and I believe all of



1 you have been issued one, turn them in. There's no reason 2 for it. It is only a corrupt procedure that could only lead to devastation. For one, and I'm begging everyone to take 3 videos of police officer interaction with the public. 4 5 This police department in this city has refused to release body-worn camera footage easily, even for the 6 people that are involved in one. Just this week I saw an 7 older woman being pulled over by a police officer. So I 8 rolled down my window and before he could get to her 9 driver's side window, she's yelling, what did I do wrong? 10 11 This is the type of terror and oppression this police 12 department has over the citizens of this city. So it 13 doesn't matter how many rubber chicken dinners you give to 14 elderly or the candy you give out at Halloween, or Turkey. 15 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you, Reverend. That was two 16 minutes. 17 MINISTER BLOUNT: Are you kidding me? 18 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: No, sir. Next week, God's willing. And the creek don't rise. 19 COMMISSIONER BELL: Mr. Chairman. 20 21 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes. 22 COMMISSIONER BELL: Could we speak to the fake badges

23 that ---

CHAIRPERSON WOODS: You don't need that. You can -- COMMISSIONER BELL: We need to clarify.



1 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Go ahead.

COMMISSIONER BELL: We have authorized badges by the
Board of Police Commissioners. We picked those badges. I
don't know anything. I don't want the public to assume that
we are carrying those types of badges. No such thing.
CHAIRPERSON WOODS: It says police commissioner, and

7 it's like you say prosecutor and all other types of stuff 8 in there, different ---

9 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Judges carry them.

10 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Judges, all kinds of stuff. But the 11 --- I'm not about to answer that. If you want to answer, 12 you can answer that. You know, keep it moving. There you 13 go.

14 MS. BUTLER: Excuse me. Good afternoon. Commissioners, 15 I know you are the oversight board of the police, and you 16 listen to the concerns of the communities and also pose 17 questions and make statements to the chief or others who 18 represent the chief. I am sorry and embarrassed, when Mr. Blount, who is a minister and states the name of his 19 20 church, yells and calls you despicable names. Commissioner 21 QuanTez Pressley has asked Mr. Blount several times to stop 22 the name calling. I have asked Mr. Blount several times, 23 what is he doing in his community that could help all of us? And as of today, I haven't received an answer. Mr. 24 25 Blount, you are sending ---



CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Speak to the Chair, please. MS. BUTLER: the wrong messages to our youth. Not all of us are role models. At a time like this, we need to work together to educate our youth regarding their behavior. Commissioner Bernard, thanks for correcting Mr. Blount, when you quoted the law. You are a lawyer, and whatever information given from this body could possibly be used by others. We need to be careful of what we say and respect others' opinions. Mr. Blount, please stop disrespecting yourself and others. Our children are listening, and watching. Thank you. CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you very much. Next speaker.

MS. UNDERWOOD: Ms. Williams, and then we'll go into 14 Zoom.

MS. WILLIAMS: Hello. Can anyone hear me? Through the Chair?

17 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes.

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MS. WILLIAMS: The numbers are great, chief, but my 18 question is, and I said this on several different 19 occasions, I want to make it very clear. It is like going 20 21 into not all, but when you are recruiting from the 22 shelters, to me, it's like going back into the eighties, 23 going into the crack house. You never know what you're going to get differently. And people always want to mention 24 25 mental illness. So when you are recruiting in shelters, the



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1 numbers are fantastic. And then, like you said, they start off at 18, I ride the buses with these officers. Their 2 mental capacity is not there. Like you said, you are 3 working on it, but it's a split second, 20 seconds can 4 5 cause their life. I see how they behave on the buses. These officers have guns and badges. But like you said, the 6 numbers are great, but are they mentally ready to be 7 officers? 8

9 Okay, I've been stating this for a long time about 10 officers and they want to play like they're God, these new 11 officers that you guys are recruiting; their attitudes, 12 their dispositions. We are all human. And like you said, we 13 want to be treated --- the way I was raised. My parents 14 used to tell me a hard head makes a soft behind. You give 15 your children life lessons, you know, integrity, character, 16 honesty. And I've been coming to these meetings for over 17 two years and I'm very disappointed and I'm not calling any 18 names, but the truth will come out eventually. So at the 19 end of the day, everybody has a job to do. According to the 20 laws and bylaws of you guys up here, the chief, the board 21 of commissioners. It's just not acceptable when people that 22 stay in shelters, well, people that try to get into shelters are unable to because police officers are taking 23 24 the bed spaces. Thank you.

25 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you. Next speaker.



1 MS. UNDERWOOD: Our next speaker will be Ms. Denise Boyce Hardison. And then, I see Mr. CAC. Scotty Boman has 2 walked in. So, we'll have him after that. And then we'll go 3 4 into Zoom, sir. CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Alright, thank you. 5 MS. HARDISON: Good afternoon, commissioners. 6 7 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Good afternoon. Can you speak in the mic, please? 8 MS. HARDISON: Can you hear me? 9 10 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes. MS. HARDISON: My name is Denise Boyce Hardison, and 11 12 I'm the president of Bobby's TCB Towing Service. I'm here 13 today to respectfully speak to what I believe to be 14 wrongful termination from the Detroit police towing 15 rotation, which occurred May 15th. The termination was 16 based on a single tow request made directly by Officer 17 Scott on November the 25th, 2024, who informed me that the 18 dispatch system was down. In good faith, with over 25 years of trusted service to the city, we responded to the call. 19 Upon arrival, we were met by Officer Kowalski, Badge number 20 4084, who provided my driver with an official impound card 21 and control number. Because this call did not go through 2.2 the official dispatch system, my response is being seen as 23 a breach of towing protocol. However, I did not act 24 25 independently. I responded to an officer's directive,



believing it was being authorized by, I mean believing it

2 to be authorized and appropriate. Excuse me, I'm very 3 nervous.

4 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: It's okay.

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MS. HARDISON: If I am being held accountable for this. 5 I ask why there is no accountability for the officer who 6 initiated the tow outside of proper channels. I did not 7 undermine the system. I followed the instructions of a 8 uniform officer who claimed the system was down. Had I 9 known otherwise, I would've never accepted the tow. I have 10 never been accused of wrongdoing before. My reputation has 11 12 been built on integrity, professionalism, and dedication to 13 the City of Detroit. Based on misleading information, this 14 should never erase the legacy of service, nor cost me my 15 livelihood or those employees who have been dedicated to my 16 company.

I respectfully ask for the opportunity to reinstate 17 the police towing rotation for this matter to be reviewed 18 thoroughly with full context and fairness. I also have two 19 20 questions. 1) If an officer is not allowed to call companies directly, why did Officer Scott call my company? 21 2) If this wasn't an official call, why was he able to 22 provide the control numbers at the time of request? Not 23 only that, I have the recording of the phone call when he 24 called my office who stated that the system was down. And 25



on the day that I was terminated from the city's rotation
 list, I had another officer who called me and stated she
 was officer, I mean ---

4 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay, your two minutes are up, 5 ma'am. But we want to be able to see how that needs to be 6 addressed. I'm not sure how to ---

7 Yeah you have it. Okay.

8 CI WARFIELD: We'll, we can't take it.

9 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: You can't take it.

10 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: So, from the complaint aspect of 11 things, but Chief, I don't know if there is someone that 12 she can talk to, to try to appeal the decision or how that 13 situation works. We are not necessarily in a tow business. 14 We have a tow committee, but we have limited engagement in 15 that process. And so Chief, do you know how that can be ---16 ?

17 CHIEF BETTISON: Deputy Chief Stewart will look into it18 or, you know, if you have anything to say, DC Stewart?

DC STEWART: Just for matters of clarity. Through the board, the City of Choice, Office of Contracts and Procurement canceled the contract. There may be an appeal process. You can reach out to that office and they should be able to assist you with that. Okay. We'll see if we can get your name, and you can speak to someone.

25 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. And then in the meantime our



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investigator, if you have a complaint against the police
 department or any police officer, our investigator will
 take your complaint back there. Okay. Thank you.
 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Through the Chair.
 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes. Commissioner Pressley and then

6 Commissioner Burton.

7 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: This question is for Chief 8 Bettison. Hearing what she shared though, is that a 9 violation of policy? Is it expected that DPD if the system 10 is down, would call?

11 DC STEWART: Yes, it is.

12 CHIEF BETTISON: I have to really look into it. And so 13 with towing, and with that, I just need to verify. And so, 14 I'm going to look into it thoroughly. But with towing, it 15 can be complicated. And so I just want to make sure that, 16 even before I speak on it, we are going to thoroughly look 17 into it. And just when it comes to the officer, if the officer did violate policy, the officer will be held 18 accountable for that. And so I did hear her complaint, but 19 totally, and I just want to be very careful as far as what 20 21 I say and how I respond to it, sir.

DC STEWART: Through the Chair. There was an investigation completed. As I stated earlier, the Office of Contracting and Procurement elected to cancel the contract. Officers are not allowed to call tow companies directly.



Tow companies are aware of this. And as well, there is also
 discipline for the officers for calling.

3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Alright. We definitely want 4 to be updated on that aspect of things. And then nobody 5 wants to go to jail either. You know what I'm saying? There 6 is some questionable stuff there. You know, I'm glad I 7 don't have to mess with no towing, and I wouldn't. Yes, 8 sir.

9 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair, question for 10 the Chief. Since the City of Detroit entered the towing 11 business, do we have a list of how many tows are in the 12 City of Detroit has participated in since they received the 13 tow trucks?

14 CHIEF BETTISON: Through the Chair. Commissioner 15 Burton, I'm sure we do. So, you know, we keep track of that 16 type of information.

17 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Can you provide that to the board 18 as well?

19 We'll provide the board with everything we have.

20 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Thank you.

21 CHIEF BETTISON: Yes, sir.

22 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you Chief. Thank you 23 Commissioner.

24 COMMISSIONER BELL: Mr. Chairman.

25 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes.



COMMISSIONER BELL: Can I weigh in on this issue? I'm 1 just looking at a special order, in reference to the 2 officers not being called, but why should a business that 3 has been established in the City of Detroit, towing for 4 quite some time be penalized because of an officer's 5 action? Just like that. It should not be just for business 6 and therefore it needs investigation. I don't understand 7 it. So we need to act quickly because you're putting them 8 out of business in terms of towing with the City of 9 Detroit, DPD. 10

11 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Absolutely. I share that sentiment 12 with you that whatever investigation needs to be done 13 expeditiously. And if there's something, the gap can be 14 bridged in some type of way. I'm not an expert. I don't 15 know anything about any of that. You know, we just want the 16 right thing to happen.

17 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: One final point. Chief, I know 18 that you have a very close relationship, obviously with the 19 City Council. I think that from a city standpoint; City 20 Council needs to enact ordinances that also track what's 21 happening with private towers in Detroit. What happened to 22 Chairman Woods when his car was towed, \$550.

23 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: \$850.

24 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Oh, I mean, just what happens to 25 other people like that? It's a problem in Detroit and it's



something that could provoke obvious violence on the part of the citizens or the tow company. We've got to get this under control. It's outrageous that this happens to people and that this sort of abuse of authority of the licenses is happening. So if you could, because you know a lot about it. And so they will certainly listen to you on this issue. So please?

8 CHIEF BETTISON: Yes, ma'am.

9 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you very kindly. You're a
 very smart Chief. Any other comments? Yes, sir.

12 MR. BOMAN: Hi. First of all, I'm glad to be here face-13 to-face. I don't get to do that very often. But on the way here, I overheard the conversation just and FYI. I don't 14 15 know if someone just said it inadvertently without 16 thinking, but I heard someone refer to somebody as deputy 17 chief and I'm thinking, who could that be? And someone used to be deputy chief is not, he is Chief. So I think that 18 obviously maybe understandable if you used to interact in 19 this similar context with him when he was deputy chief, but 20 Mr. Bettison is in fact the chief, and I think everyone 21 22 here knows that. But okay. Just to get that out.

CHAIRPERSON WOODS: You have selective amnesia there.
MR. BOMAN: It was ---

25 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah, because no one said that



1 here.

2 MR. BOMAN: Oh, okay. I'm thinking someone who said it 3 had selective amnesia, but ---

4 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Go ahead, finish. I'll give you 105 extra seconds for you to.

6 MR. BOMAN: Okay. So yeah, I am glad to hear some emphasis in the conversation on investigation of 7 complaints. And I believe I heard Commissioner Bernard 8 9 mention that as one of the most important duties here. And it's important to remember that. And I'm hoping that Mr. 10 Warfield and his Office of the Chief Investigator are 11 12 getting the resources they need to get caught up on those 13 investigations. I remind you that when there are 14 opportunities such as when there's discussion of budget, 15 putting one together, that really two big expenditures come 16 into play and both of them being personnel. And that is having sufficient officers and having sufficient 17 investigators. I think those are two things that we don't 18 get so top heavy that we forget about all the people we 19 need to actually do the hands-on work and redundancy in 20 that area. So I think many of you are aware of that, but in 21 case, you know, it falls off the radar. I am a member of 22 the public here at the moment here to remind you. So 23 anyway, having a wonderful day. Thank you. 24

25 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you very kindly.



MS. UNDERWOOD: Our next two speakers will be Ms.
 Liddell and David Tinsley. Please state your name for the
 record.

MS. LIDDELL: Hello, my name is Cherise de Sean 4 Liddell. And this is my first time here, so I'm not sure 5 how this works, but I'm a citizen. I was pulled over by the 6 Detroit Police Department, 5th Precinct March 24. Since 7 then I've been arrested 3 more times. Lockt in Wayne County 8 Jail twice. And I've been involuntarily admitted into a 9 mental hospital, a psychiatric hospital. I have a letter 10 saying my investigation is closed from Reverend Warfield 11 12 and they've completely destroyed my driver's records. They 13 added all kinds of counts to my name and put a false 14 warrant out for my arrest. And so I have multiple officers 15 involved. This does not seem like something that was a 16 normal traffic stop. We have Joseph Boyer, we have lawyers, 7 prosecutors. I've had 6 attorneys. I have 3 investigator 17 numbers with the Chief Office of Investigator, Internal 18 19 Affairs, and nobody seems to want to investigate my case. And the officer gave me 8 breathalyzer tests, which are on 20 21 camera. I had a beauty supply taser that cost \$10, which 22 came up missing during the body cam, and then someone put it back in my purse at the detention center. And I almost 23 lost my home. I just bought my house. I've been at Chrysler 24 25 for 11 years. They continued to lock me in jail, so I



missed out on a lot of money. And I'm just curious why no
 one will investigate.

3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Chief Investigator. Is it an appeal 4 process as far as if the citizen is not satisfied with the 5 findings of their citizen complaint?

6 CI WARFIELD: Through the Chair. You're correct. There 7 is an appeal process. And one of our investigators did 8 communicate that to Ms. Liddell. I spoke with Ms. Liddell 9 earlier today. We have a total of 3 cases in our office. 10 One case has been closed, the other two cases are still 11 open and they're still under investigation.

12 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay, that's our answer.

MS. LIDDELL: Okay, well, how could it be closed if the letter states I had a probable cause conference. I never did. I have the attorney writing a letter saying that was skipped

17 CI WARFIELD: Through the Chair. That is not a finding 18 that we have as it relates to the findings that we give 19 out. That letter as it relates to probable cause did not 20 come from us.

21 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah, we don't have any criminal 22 matters. We deal with citizen complaints. But can you give 23 her a call and if there's anything that possibly can be 24 done and she can understand the full appeal process better, 25 you know, these complaints are signed on/off by



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1 commissioners that review them. You do have a right to appeal the decision. I don't know the timeframe, but he 2 would explain everything. He would give you a call. But at 3 this point, we stand by what our office has done thus far. 4 5 And if there's anything else that you could bring to the attention through the appeal process, we would be happy to 6 7 look at anything. So thank you. Have a nice one. He'll get 8 with you, alright. Next speaker.

9 MR. TINSLEY: Good afternoon guys. How are you doing? My name is David Tinsley. I represent Azul Hospitality. We 10 manage 5 hotels in downtown Detroit. As Jesus mentioned, I 11 12 just want to say I did come in from California, one to 13 celebrate Jesus for being a phenomenal partner for us in 14 the hotels that we have in Detroit. But so, to tell you 15 guys, I've been in California, I've been in Portland, I've 16 been in Denver and San Francisco in the past two months. And everyone's asking, how does Detroit do so well post 17 COVID. And it's the people around this table and it's the 18 Detroit police. You look at these other cities around the 19 country. They have almost deteriorated because of their 20 21 response with George Floyd, COVID. But this police commissioner and this Detroit police department should be 22 commended. because we are getting folks like me being 23 called in from Detroit. And I'm a guy from Joy Road and 24 25 Southfield, and they're asking, how are you guys doing it?



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And it's because of the work from Jesus, this board and this police department. You guys are phenomenal. You've done well. Celebrate yourself. Take a little time for some positivity. I think you deserve any badge that you get. You guys are phenomenal. And I'm just grateful to tell people I'm from Detroit and it has been a badge and honor for you guys. Thank you. Appreciate it.

8 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you so much. Sounds like you 9 should be on the radio. Next speaker.

MS. UNDERWOOD: Lieutenant Mark Young and then we'll go 11 into Zoom.

12 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you.

13 LT. YOUNG: Commissioner Pressley, congratulations. I 14 have respect for you. I found you to be very reasonable at 15 the times that you weren't at the table. I really regret 16 that you weren't here because often you are the most 17 reasonable of the party. So I have great respect for you. It's easy to criticize, it's easy to bash, it's easy to 18 criticize the Detroit Police Department, but apparently we 19 don't listen well; probably before this board made strides 20 in crime reductions. Allegations of wrongdoing, yes. And 21 maybe on occasion there has been wrongdoing. I just left 22 police week and they praised our department across this 23 nation. Sitting here today, all I heard was negative. 24 25 That's what the men and women that I represent here, crime



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1 does not occur by itself. If my men and women stood down for 24-hours, what would we be? We say things without 2 thinking. Sometimes the men and women of the department may 3 not activate their cameras because things happen so 4 5 quickly. That's what happens. When we vilify the police to the degree that we don't vilify and hold people accountable 6 7 that we arrest; shame on us. I've never stood before you and told you who my name was, what my title was, because 8 9 it's not about me. It's about these men and women that go out here for the ultimate sacrifice. Think about that for a 10 11 minute.

12 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Well, I have to push back on that 13 in the sense that absolutely, unequivocally in the sense 14 that this commission approved a \$450 million budget to make sure that the Detroit Police Department gets all the tools 15 16 that they need. And we are very, very judicious in terms of 17 how we even do suspensions without pay. The Chief doesn't 18 win them all. We're not a rubber stamp agency. We are not a tap-dancing board. You know, we call balls and strikes and 19 we do it with integrity. Absolutely. I tell folks in the 20 21 community all day long that we are not a police hate board. 22 We are a police oversight board. And so there are checks and balances there. And so when I heard Commissioner 23 Pressley talk about the body-worn camera footage, he said 24 25 for the, you know, the overall majority are doing the right



things, you know, and so we would be very, very negligent in not addressing those situations that do occur, you know, so that we can get it corrected for the citizens of the City of Detroit. And I think that we need to respect each

5 other's roles and understand that we're not here to rubber6 stamp anything for anyone. Thank you. Next speaker.

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MS. UNDERWOOD: Mr. Chair, we're going to go into Zoom
now, and our first speaker is Mr. Roo. After Mr. Roo is
former Commissioner William Davis.

MR. ROO: That name said Mr. Roo, aka, Mr. Real, Now, 10 to the residents, citizens and taxpayers of the City of 11 12 Detroit. Detroit, according to my investigation now, is a 13 corrupt entity being run by corrupt individuals that's on 14 the City Council, Board of Police Commissioners, School 15 Board, and some judges. Absentee ballot fraud was committed 16 in 2021; in previous years, 2021, 2022, 2020, and 2024. 17 Mary Elaine Beckman does not have an legitimate absentee ballot over at the Detroit Department of Elections. Now, 18 19 I'm going to send a big shout out to you, Chief Bettison. Chief Bettison, there are some issues and I've been trying 20 21 to reach out to you. Yesterday, 7 police officers arrived at my Veteran's Housing facility at 193027 West Chicago, 22 across the street from St. Suzanne's Church, Archdiocese of 23 Detroit affiliated. They arrived and they were asking where 24 25 people were living in there.



1 But according to the court order, we don't have the 2 certificate of occupancy. It's being held up by the City of Detroit. It's in room 434 on James Foster's desk. He needs 3 to send it down the hallway so I can get the certificate of 4 5 occupancy and proceed with my plans over there. And then we have the issue of what's going on with this 7½ to 10 minute 6 7 period that Charmaine McLeod was supposed to receive information regarding Kaneisha Coleman, but there is no 8 9 evidence of a phone call or a text going to her phone. CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you. Next speaker. 10 MR. DAVIS: Good afternoon. Can I be heard? 11 12 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir. 13 MR. DAVIS: Okay. I'd like to start off by saying I am 14 pleased to see that, you know, like I said, that the 15 commissioner is getting, you know, clerk praise and getting 16 a badge. You know, of course, myself, I was a police commissioner, and Darryl Brown was a police commissioner, 17 too. It looks like, I don't know if this is true, but it 18 19 looks like only appointees are getting badges, you know, retiring badges, if that's so, that opens up a whole new 20 21 possible realm of investigations. But I hope that's not so. Also, I think a greater effort needs to be made to make 22 sure that the Detroit Police Department and the Board of 23 Police Commissioners are not putting any black businesses 24 out of business in this city. We need to make sure that 25



everybody's doing everything the way they should be doing. 1 2 But if the police department is doing something that's putting a black business out of being able to operate, 3 that's a problem. 4 Also, I hope that some of the board members will start 5 having better attendance. You know, like say, during the 6 time that I was on the board, I was on the board for four 7 years. I never missed a meeting. I was never late. You 8 9 know, we need to make sure if you make a commitment to do something, I know it is not a salary. I know there's a 10 11 smart stipend that you receive, but if you make a 12 commitment, make sure to live up to your commitment. 13 Hopefully you all live up to a commitment to doing better 14 for all, not just for appointees. Thank you. 15 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you very kindly. MS. UNDERWOOD: Our next speaker will be Ms. Brown. And 16 17 our last speaker is Public Viewer, TN. CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Ms. Brown, you can be heard. 18 19 MS. UNDERWOOD: Just let me try again, sir. CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. 20 MS. BROWN: Can you all hear me? 21 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, ma'am. We can hear you. 22 23 MS. BROWN: Yes. Thank you. I wanted to ask a question to the chief. Is there a protocol for addresses that get a 24 25 lot of police calls, especially when they're businesses?



1 There are certain businesses. I FOIA a lot of documents, I read a lot of documents. There are certain businesses that 2 get a lot of 911 calls and have a lot of police presence, 3 4 and it almost feels like they shouldn't, specifically 5 homeless shelters. And when Ms. Williams spoke, it reminded me of that. I have been meaning to ask it previously. There 6 7 are homeless shelters in the city that are getting an awful lot of 911 calls. 911 calls against the people in the 8 9 shelter. 911 calls against the staff. I think there was one that I read that said somebody had to be arrested. And I 10 11 remember I managed, I took over a property on Jefferson 12 that had a lot of 911 calls, and I know back in 2014, that 13 was a problem.

14 Is that something, and I know that you're new, is that 15 something that the police are still keeping track of? The 16 other thing I wanted to say is I wanted to uplift what 17 minister Blount said. I definitely appreciate you pointing 18 out that these badges should not be given out willy-nilly. 19 That could be a problem in the future. And I'm not saying that Mr. Hernandez, or I'm sorry, Commissioner Hernandez 20 21 will do anything nefarious with it, but we have seen people 22 try it. The other question I wanted to ask is, is 23 Commissioner Hernandez leaving today? And if he is, who will be replacing him? And how soon will they be replacing 24 25 him? The other thing I wanted to point out is Minister



Blount actually does a lot in the community, and yes, he does complain, but this is an oversight board, and somebody should be complaining because we do a lot of celebrating and hand clapping and cheering in here. And sometimes people need to be held accountable. Minister Blount has come out to protest; he has come out to meetings when we are speaking to evicted people. He has helped write and FOIA documents for the CPTA, and he does a lot in this community, and we appreciate it. Thank you. And that's my

10 time.

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11 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Thank you. Next speaker.

MS. UNDERWOOD: They lowered their hands, sir, so thatis the end of the public comments.

14 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: All right. Thank you, Jesus. We're 15 going to go to the presentation to the board, DPD budget 16 presentation. You may be heard.

MR. NAZARKO: Good afternoon, Mr. Chair. I'm here to present the quarterly report, budget report on behalf of DPD. Is someone going to move the slides or show?

20 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, sir.

21 MR. NAZARKO: The reports that are presented before you 22 today are for the month ending March 31st, 2025. And the 23 reports are the quarter 3 year-to-date budget versus actual 24 expenditure and expenses; the revenues and expenses rather. 25 Year-to-date budget versus actual revenues and expenses,



vehicle purchase report, capital expenditure report, and
 grant activity report. Slide three, please.

As you can see from this slide the columns are as 3 follows: The first column shows the expected revenues for 4 5 the third quarter ending March 31st, 2025. The next column is the actual amounts, and then variance in dollar amounts 6 7 and the variance in percentage. As you can see on the slide 8 the general fund revenue, the budget amount was almost rounded up \$63 million. And we brought in the actual 9 amount, \$60.1 million. The \$2.7 million variance is mainly 10 11 due to the utility users tax, which is part of the police 12 department's revenue budget and came a little bit less than 13 what we had budgeted for. The forfeiture fund, we budgeted 14 \$906,000, and the actual was \$625,000. The grant revenues 15 are \$6.6 million budget versus the \$3.4 million actual. And the special revenue fund, which combines both the 911 fund 16 17 and the towing fund, the budget is approximately \$7 million. 18

And we brought in \$8.2 million. On the expenditure front, the expenditures for the 9 months ending on March 31st, was supposed to be \$301 million total general fund expenditures, and the actual expenditures were \$294 million for a positive variance of \$7 million. Forfeiture fund, we budgeted to spend \$927,000. To date, we had spent as much the reverse, again, \$620,000. Grant expenditures, we



1 budgeted to spend 16.9, and we actually, that's a mistake, should be 6.9. And we have spent only 4.1. Special revenue 2 fund, again, towing fund, plus the 911 fund. We budgeted to 3 spend \$11 million, and to date, we had spent \$7.5 million. 4 The amount that you see here the actual amounts most of 5 them are due to timing differences, because not all 6 7 expenditures are uniform throughout the year. Some expenditures come in the last quarter of the year versus 8 9 the beginning of the year. We expect that fully, that by the end of the fiscal year the budget amounts will be spent 10 almost entirely. Next slide, please. 11

12 This slide shows the breakdown between the major source of revenue, and they are municipal income tax. Our 13 14 budget, or the actual amount, rather, was \$25.8 million for 15 the whole year. We expect to bring in \$36 million from 16 income tax revenue. The percentage for the 9 months was 70.9%. So 71%, it should be approximately 75%. But as I 17 indicated earlier, there is a timing difference, for 18 example income tax revenue comes heavy in the month of 19 April, which is not presented in this report. Utility user 20 tax, we brought in \$26 million. We expect to get \$43 21 million. So that is going to be probably the source of 22 revenue that we're not going to meet the budget goal. Other 23 revenues, we brought in \$8.3 million at the end of the 24 year. We expect to bring \$13 million, and that's something 25



that we are counting that we are going to meet that revenue
 projection.

Then the following line items here are the breakdown 3 of the slide that I showed earlier, however, earlier was 4 5 the total amount, and now I'm breaking it down among salaries and wages, employee benefits, professional 6 7 contractual operating supplies, operating services, capital 8 equipment, and other expenses. So the \$301 million that you 9 see there as the actual amount is the exact same amount on the previous slide. However, the entire budget for the full 10 year is \$424.4 million. So we are sitting today or at the 11 12 end of March at 71%, which is very close to the 9 months out of 12. Next slide, please. 13

14 This slide is for detailed information for the board. 15 Basically, the amounts that I presented in slide number 4. 16 So this is slide number 5. This has more details as to what 17 are the major sources of revenue; revenues, and expenses and what goes, for example, into sales for charges and 18 19 services, license permits, and inspection charges, fines, forfeitures, and other revenues. Next slide, please. Slide 20 6. This slide represents detailed information about the 21 expenditures such as salaries and wages, employee benefits, 22 and a whole slew of items that go under the employee 23 benefits and professional contractual services. That there 24 are 4 subcategories that go under that slide. Next slide, 25



please. This slide, slide number 7, still continues with 1 2 the operating expenditures, operating services, capital equipment, and other expenses such as training and 3 contributions. Slide 8. Slide 8 represents the vehicle 4 5 purchase report that shows that we did not purchase anything during the month of January, 2025, and we 6 7 purchased 80 vehicles in February, and 19 vehicles in the month of March for a total of 99 vehicle purchases. Next 8 9 slide, please. This slide shows the repair, maintenance, 10 and capital improvements, depending on the amount, and they are broken down by location. For example, you see there the 11 12 DPD Auto pound, civil rights forfeiture, gaming gun range, 13 Harbor Master impound yard, and so on and so forth. So, the 14 amounts are not large amounts, but for the entire quarter, 15 we spent \$100,469 for the three months. Again, in all the 16 precincts and all the DPD operated locations. Next slide 17 please. One more. Yes, thank you. This slide shows the 18 active grants for the month or for the quarter ending March 19 31st. We did not start any new grants for the quarter, fiscal year 2025. However, we have active grants that are 20 listed here such as Project Safe Neighborhoods, VOCA 21 Grants, Burn State Crisis, interventional Program, Burn 22 Criminal Justice intervention, ATPA, MCOLES, Ceasefire 23 Earmark, and the Stop Grant. The total amounts for each 24 25 grant are listed on the right side of the slide. And



1 pending any questions, that concludes my presentation.

2 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Mr. Chair.

3 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes, ma'am.

4 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: I have several.

5 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes.

6 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: On page 3, your first slide that you showed the budget and the actual, I'm trying to 7 understand, like, are these line items that you've selected 8 in the revenue section to talk about, because the revenues 9 total, let's say in the budget, 77.5 million, but the 10 expenditures are 330.3 million. How do you reconcile that? 11 12 Ι mean, shouldn't the revenues be more than the 13 expenditures?

14 MR. NAZARKO: Through the Chair. Yes, that is a great question. Normally for the entire city, yes, the revenues 15 16 should be more or at least equal to the expenditures, 17 otherwise, we have a problem. In the police department, it works slightly differently. Police department is not a 18 19 revenue making or generating department per se, to support a hundred percent of its operations the other revenues we 20 collect. Therefore, we usually collect approximately \$90 21 million between those three major categories that I showed, 22 and the rest of the police budget is funded by the general 23 fund; it is given from the city. So whatever, we don't 24 25 bring in the gap, which is a large gap, close to \$350



1 million that comes from the city's general fund budget.
2 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Okay. So that'll always be
3 covered no matter whether expenditures are significantly
4 higher than the revenues.

5 MR. NAZARKO: Through the Chair, absolutely, yes. That 6 has been the case at least 50 years prior. And that will be 7 the case for the foreseeable future, because again, police 8 department does not bring enough revenue, but it is 9 supported by the general fund.

COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: And I think I've asked you 10 this a couple of times because we have met, you know, with 11 12 our budget with you frequently. So thank you for explaining 13 that again. On page 7, we indicate that our budget, well, 14 is 420.4 million, for the department. Our actual year to 15 date is 294.3 million. So are we on target as far as our 16 expenditures or our budget? Are we on target? We're 75%. 17 Are we 75% of the year?

MR. NAZARKO: Yes. As a matter of fact, we are a little bit below 75%, again, through the Chair. However, the budget, you see \$424 million is for the entire year. The column you're asking about is the actual amount for 9 months. And that's 12 months versus 9 months.

COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: But we're on target?
 MR. NAZARKO: We are on target. We are very much on
 target.



1 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Okay. Thank you so much. And 2 on page 8, on the vehicle report, we have a total of 99 3 that we've purchased. That's as of March, 2025, correct? 4 MR. NAZARKO: Correct.

5 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: What does our budget allow 6 for; for the whole year?

MR. NAZARKO: This report is brought to you as a 7 courtesy that I've been bringing to you every quarter, 8 9 every year. However, the vehicle purchases are not part of our main operating budget at \$424 million. This is part of 10 11 the centralized fleet budget that does not go through our 12 main budget, basically. I got this report from another 13 department from the KMAC building. I presented it to you. 14 However, the bills for these vehicles are not paid to us. 15 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Okay. Are they paid through 16 the city?

MR. NAZARKO: Absolutely, yes. But through another department, because they have centralized the vehicle purchasing through the city's main department.

20 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Okay. Thank you. And then on 21 page 9, there are certain columns that have \$1. What does 22 that mean? \$1, like DPD gaming for February, they have \$1 23 in the account.

24 MR. NAZARKO: This usually represents purchases that 25 have not happened are just as a placeholder. So they have



1 requested a certain expenditure. We have not received the 2 bid yet, so we put that as a placeholder until we receive 3 the bid. So the next quarter, then you'll see the exact 4 amount. 5 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Okay. So, I thought that 6 might be what it was, but I just wanted to clarify that.

7 And then on page 10 you have as a grand total for capital

8 improvements, 100.5 million, right?

9 MR. NAZARKO: No, \$100,000.

10 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: I'm sorry.

11 MR. NAZARKO: Just \$100,000.

COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Yeah. I'm in the millions
 \$100.5.

14 Mr. NAZARKO: \$100,500.

15 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: \$100,500. Is that all capital 16 improvements that we're doing for the entire department for 17 the fiscal year? That seems very low.

MR. NAZARKO: No. Through the Chair, again. This represents mainly repair and maintenance for only the months of January, February, and March. It does not show what we did prior, it's not showing what we are doing later. And this is the only amount that we spent during those 3 months.

24 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Okay. That's a little 25 confusing for me because on the chart it says October,



1 November, and December.

2 MR. NAZARKO: That's my error that I did not carry

3 forward, January, February, March.

4 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: That's why I couldn't 5 understand the chart.

6 MR. NAZARKO: I apologize for that, but the numbers are 7 correct. The column headings should be January, February, 8 and March.

9 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: And it's just 3 months? Not 10 the whole fiscal year to date?

11 MR. NAZARKO: Absolutely, yes.

12 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Okay. Thank you. And then my 13 final question was regarding the grants. We've only 14 achieved 49%, you know, less than half of the grant revenue 15 that we had budgeted. Is that a timing issue or do you 16 think we're going to end the year with significantly lower 17 grant revenue?

18 MR. NAZARKO: That is mainly a timing issue. I cannot 19 promise that at the end of the year, we are going to be a 20 hundred percent with the grants. I can promise you that 21 with the general fund, we are going to come very close. But 22 the grants work slightly differently, because on the grant 23 side of the operations, we need to spend the money and then we draw down to get reimbursed. Sometimes it's mainly the 24 25 timing indifference. But there are a couple of grants that



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the chief's office is aware of and it's a working grant 1 2 that we need to speed up the spending. It doesn't mean that if we don't spend this fiscal year, we're not going to have 3 the opportunity to spend at let's say, July, that is next 4 5 fiscal year. But with grants, it's slightly different because again because you have to spend it then, draw it. 6 7 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: And I guess I was looking 8 more at applying for grants like grant revenue coming in, 9 new grants. Are there any pending? Are we looking at more grant submissions? That's kind of where I was coming . 10 11 MR. NAZARKO: Every day. DPD, through the Chair, again, 12 has a dedicated team that works to look for new grants, to 13 obtain new grants, to spend the money on those new grants. 14 However, if we did not have anything awarded, because it's 15 a long process that DPD initiates. It goes through the 16 approval of the chief's office, the mayor, city council, 17 and all that. So until the city council officially accepts 18 a grant, we cannot show it on this report. 19 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: That makes sense. Thank you very much. I appreciate it. 20 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: I don't think any of us need to ask 21 22 any more questions. Great job, Commissioner. Thank you for

your report and answering the questions. We're going to unfinished business. I entertain a motion to provide an offer letter to Jasmine Espinosa and Dior Mathis for the



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1 position of administrative assistant within the salary

2 range of \$43,876 and 65,000 to \$755, pending for the

3 negotiation and background check.

4 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: So, move.

5 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Support.

6 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Moved by Commissioner Hernandez,

7 supported by Commissioner Dewaelsche. Any discussion? All

8 in favor say aye.

9 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

10 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Anyone oppose? The motion is

11 carried. No new business. No new business. Praise the Lord.

12 What is the pleasure?

13 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: I move for adjournment.

14 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Support.

15 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Motion made by Commissioner 16 Pressley to adjourn and supported by Commissioner 17 Hernandez.

18 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Through the Chair. Hold on, I'm 19 about to say something.

20 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Oh, yes. Give me a minute. Let me 21 finish.

22 COMMISSIONER BANKS: I want to talk to you before you23 close.

24 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: I'm not closed yet. Hold on.

25 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Okay.



CHAIRPERSON WOODS: All right. Second by Commissioner
 Hernandez. Any discussion?

3 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Yeah, right here. Through the 4 Chair?

5 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yeah.

6 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Okay. I have my towing committee.7 I'm okay to talk about that?

8 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Oh yeah, absolutely, sir.

9 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Okay. Because I have the towing 10 committee coming up this Wednesday at 4 o'clock. You know, 11 it is going to be very exciting. Those of you want to learn 12 about towing, we're going to have the audit general there. 13 I think the inspector general, people in high places with 14 the Detroit Police Department will be able to bring great 15 information about towing. Now, I'm going to need a vice 16 chairman, Tamara Liberty and Commissioner Burton, well, I don't know. But anyway, he is gone. He moved out really 17 quickly. I was trying to catch him, Chair. 18

19 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: We got you.

20 COMMISSIONER BANKS: Okay. I thank you. That way we can 21 have a quorum.

22 CHAIRPERSON WOODS: We will have a quorum.

23 COMMISSIONER BANKS: You know, we have something 24 exciting starting up. We need a quorum for the people in 25 the community to see what's going on with towing. Huh? a



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1	good-looking vice chair. I'm still being here.
2	CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Okay. Alright. And no further
3	discussion. All in favor say aye.
4	COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
5	CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Anyone oppose? All opposed? The
6	motion is carried. This meeting is adjourned.
