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CITY OF DETROIT  
BOARD OF POLICE COMMISSIONERS MEETING  
June 12, 2025 at 6:30 P.M.

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4           COMMISSIONER BERNARD, PRO TEM: Good evening, ladies  
5 and gentlemen. I'm attorney Linda Bernard, the police  
6 commissioner for District 2 on the Northwest side of  
7 Detroit. It's a pleasure to be here this evening and see  
8 all of you in attendance. We're going to do a couple of  
9 procedural things and to see if we will have a quorum  
10 very shortly. And if we don't get a quorum, then, after  
11 public comment, we will adjourn. Today's invocation, I  
12 think, is going to be done by you, Reverend Warfield, the  
13 head of OCI.

14           REVEREND WARFIELD: Let us pray. Father, once again,  
15 we come before your presence filled with Thanksgiving and  
16 enjoy, thanking you for allowing us to get to this  
17 portion of our day; safe and free from hurt, harm, and  
18 danger as we come tonight, Lord, we ask that your hand of  
19 grace and mercy would be over this meeting, that you  
20 would guide us by way of your Holy Ghost power, and that  
21 you will allow the voices and the concerns of the  
22 citizens to, not only be heard, but to be acted upon. We  
23 thank you for the commissioners that have gathered,  
24 members of the department, the chief staff, all that are  
25 here to conduct this business. We ask that you'll bless

1 us now with your presence. In Christ's name we pray.

2 Amen.

3 COMMISSIONER BERNARD, PRO TEM: Okay, so we're going  
4 to go immediately into public comment. Do we have a list  
5 of people who want to make a presentation, Jonya?

6 MS. UNDERWOOD: Yes, Madam Chair. We're going to  
7 start with Mr. Ford; after Mr. Ford we'll have Dr.  
8 Gordon; after Dr. Gordon, we'll have Minister Eric  
9 Blount.

10 MR. FORD: Hello, I'm James Ford. I just want to say  
11 God bless everybody here. God bless everybody in this  
12 room. I'd like to thank the police chief for meeting with  
13 myself and Theo Broden, discussing red light running and  
14 drag racing. What a character, what a guy. He even sat  
15 down and talked with us because it's Detroit's most  
16 pressing problem. He even said, if we go back to Lansing,  
17 he might even want to go. So I take my hat off to him. I  
18 just want to say this, you saw me passing out flyers  
19 about the Obama weekend. The Obama Weekend Festival is  
20 something for everybody.

21 Children, we just want to bring back what we've  
22 missed. We cried when we lost the state fair. Now you  
23 have a chance to have your own state fair. So get in  
24 contact with me. My phone number is (586) 918-3061. I do  
25 want to say this. We're going to invite all the mayoral

1 candidates to answer one question. And the one question  
2 is, if they're elected, what would they do about drag  
3 racing and red light running in this city? We're sending  
4 out the invitations this week. They have to answer that  
5 question. If they do not show up, if they do not answer  
6 that question, they should not be considered to be  
7 elected. And I really believe that. And then if they get  
8 elected and do not address red light running and drag  
9 racing, they should be a one-term mayor. My name is James  
10 Ford. God bless you, and thank you.

11 COMMISSIONER BERNARD, PRO TEM: Thank you, Mr. Ford.

12 DR. GORDON: Hi, my name is Karen Gordon and I'm here  
13 to say that I ran from my home on the East side at  
14 Fischer because of Burns Fischer and Seneca College Block  
15 Club. I asked to speak to the captain, and the commander.  
16 They never talked to me. I had a Detective Clark and  
17 Walker, stated in every police report I made, which I  
18 made a lot because I was attacked. And for every attack I  
19 had, I had video. Because before they said without video,  
20 they couldn't do anything. So I put up cameras around my  
21 home to show that I was being attacked. Clark and Walker  
22 said among themselves, and other people were in the room,  
23 because he was talking to me, but he forgot to hang up  
24 the phone, because he was too busy wanting to talk about  
25 me, instead of giving me his email so I could send him

1 the video.

2 In the video, they state how every report I filed,  
3 they made sure, they made sure that the prosecutor would  
4 throw it out. And then the sad part about it is I asked  
5 in a meeting with their boss, the head detective who  
6 makes the final decision? And he said, I do. I said, so,  
7 you mean to tell me a woman could come at me and attack  
8 me and have been told to stay away from me? It's okay.  
9 And he said, yes. And then Walker stated that the  
10 commander wanted her in the meeting to justify what she  
11 did because he didn't want to be a part of it. Let her  
12 answer the question. And he said, she said so. He thought  
13 I was going to change my mind. They talked about not just  
14 me, they ran me out of my home. They ran me out of my  
15 home. They threatened that people should do something to  
16 my home.

17 COMMISSIONER BERNARD, PRO TEM: Excuse me.

18 DR. GORDON: So me and my baby no longer felt safe  
19 and said, we have to leave.

20 COMMISSIONER BERNARD, PRO TEM: Excuse me ---

21 DR. FORD: Because the police are part of the  
22 College.

23 COMMISSIONER BERNARD, PRO TEM: Excuse me, Ms. Ford.  
24 Excuse me, Ms. Ford. Where's Reverend Warfield? Oh, there  
25 he is. Reverend Warfield is the head of OCI. Have you

1 given your complaint to him?

2 DR. FORD: The complaint, it did not go anywhere.

3 I've been going through this for over 3 years and all I  
4 ever asked the police was for help. I did it the right --  
5 -

6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD, PRO TEM: Wait a minute. Wait a  
7 minute. Please, please, Miss, Miss, wait a minute. Your  
8 time is ---

9 DR. FORD: --my home was the the only one that was  
10 destroyed.

11 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Miss ---

12 DR. FORD: And I have been -

13 COMMISSIONER BERNARD, PRO TEM: Order ---

14 DR. FORD: Then ---

15 COMMISSIONER BERNARD, PRO TEM: Order ---

16 DR. GORDON: around my house to see how many cameras  
17 I have, and my baby said it's enough.

18 COMMISSIONER BERNARD, PRO TEM: Miss ---

19 DR. FORD: We are going to --

20 COMMISSIONER BERNARD, PRO TEM: Miss ---

21 DR. GORDON: Do something.

22 COMMISSIONER BERNARD, PRO TEM: You're out of order.

23 Out of order. Wait a minute. Excuse me. Excuse me.

24 Reverend Warfield,

25 CI WARFIELD: Thank you. To the board and thank you

1 Madam Chair. We received this complaint in May and it is  
2 one that we are actively investigating. We just got the  
3 complaint last month.

4 COMMISSIONER BERNARD, PRO TEM: Okay, thank you.

5 CHIEF BETTISON: If I may, through the Chair to Mrs.  
6 Gordon's point, I've actually met with Ms. Gordon under  
7 two administrations of command leadership at number  
8 seven. We sat down with her, we talked through, we looked  
9 through all of her cases. We even looked through some of  
10 the complaints she had about a previous commander there.  
11 Everything we're doing we're a hundred percent answering  
12 what she's doing. We're being very responsive. And she  
13 wouldn't look at me, but a hundred percent, I've met with  
14 her on several occasions with the command at number seven  
15 to try to answer her complaints and we'll do so, again.

16 DR. GORDON: No.

17 COMMISSIONER BERNARD, PRO TEM: Thank you. Next  
18 speaker.

19 MINISTER BLOUNT: Honorable Board. I'm Minister Eric  
20 Blount from right here, Sacred Heart Catholic Church here  
21 in Detroit. This church has a rich history of social  
22 justice and black liberation. We have a black Jesus on  
23 the cross and a Black Lives Matter banner on our pulpit.  
24 It is in this spirit that I say these words that I have  
25 said before, policing in this country is sick, and DPD is

1 part of the problem. Policing in this country is sick  
2 because cops have the constitutional right to lie to  
3 citizens, whether it's a traffic stop or at a gas station  
4 or wherever they are. They cannot lie in a court of law.  
5 But you can lie to us. That in itself should say a lot  
6 about what happens. DPD is partially the problem too.  
7 Your facial recognition technology supports the tool of  
8 institutional racism. Facial recognition technology  
9 allows that system to misidentify people of color more  
10 than white people. So in itself, you are saying white  
11 lives matter more than black lives. That's the only  
12 conclusion a reasonable person can have. For the Board of  
13 Police Commissioners, they will even lie to you on their  
14 agenda. Page three, you'll read that the Board of Police  
15 Commissioners has the final authority and discipline.  
16 That is a lie. 99% of the officers that are disciplined,  
17 get their discipline overturned in binding arbitration. I  
18 guess that's all I have. I don't see a clock, so I don't  
19 want to be too disrespectful.

20 COMMISSIONER BERNARD, PRO TEM: Thank you. Next,  
21 Jonya.

22 MS. UNDERWOOD: Our next three speakers will be Shay  
23 Howell, Reverend Conway and Victoria Camille.

24 MS. HOWELL: Hello, I'm Shay Howell and I'm a member  
25 of District 2, and glad to see my commissioner chairing



1 this evening. Welcome.

2 COMMISSIONER BERNARD, PRO TEM: Thank you.

3 MS. HOWELL: I'm here to talk about the resolution on  
4 the protection of the First Amendment, which came to you  
5 last week and was introduced by Commissioner Moore. It's  
6 a resolution that gives the Board of Police Commissioners  
7 the opportunity to stand up against the outrageous  
8 violation of First Amendment and due process rights that  
9 are happening on the federal level. We are watching  
10 federal government agents do things that no rookie  
11 Detroit police officer would consider doing. They are  
12 wearing masks. They are refusing to identify themselves.  
13 They are squashing descent. And all of us have seen  
14 what's happening in LA. We, from the Coalition for Police  
15 Transparency and Accountability, have written an  
16 opportunity for you through a resolution to make clear  
17 that the Detroit Board of Police Commissioners will not  
18 tolerate any federal troops on our streets. And we will  
19 not tolerate federal action that contradicts the policies  
20 and behavior of our own police department. Our police  
21 department sets the standard for what we expect from law  
22 enforcement. And you should direct the Chief of Police  
23 and all representatives to meet with their counterparts  
24 and make sure that Detroit streets are safe for our  
25 citizens and that the many, many years of effort that we

1 have spent in establishing good community relations  
2 continue. Thank you.

3 COMMISSIONER BERNARD, PRO TEM: Thank you. Next  
4 speaker.

5 REVEREND CONWAY: That's me. Good evening to the  
6 board and staff, as well as the citizenry. My name is  
7 Reverend Lucius Conway. I am [no audio] for Attorney  
8 Bernard seat as the second district for the Board of  
9 Police Commissioners. I rise, first of all in support of  
10 what Shay Howell just shared with regard to the  
11 resolution and its passage. It seems that this board  
12 serves as a paper lion, paper tiger, whatever the term  
13 is, and has no teeth. And I am remiss at how  
14 nonresponsive this board has been to me personally. On  
15 May 23rd, I submitted to the entire board, individually  
16 and collectively, a protocol to help remove the backlog,  
17 which has doubled since the former board of commissioner,  
18 now employee Warfield, has taken over that particular  
19 office with his seven-point plan. That backlog has not  
20 reduced. And of course he's saying it's staffing, but  
21 there's some infrastructural issues as well, which are  
22 addressed in the documentation that I provided you with,  
23 in addition to the fact that we have so many citizens who  
24 are not getting FOIA.

25 So much stuff that's happening with regard to our

1 presumption of misconduct. We talked about that in  
2 committee, and I just wanted to say that if this board  
3 can't do anything else, you can resolve to send a  
4 resolution to the City Council to put at least an  
5 ordinance on the book making the presumption of  
6 misconduct an Ordinance so that when these police  
7 officers do not turn on or wear their body cameras, the  
8 presumption of misconduct this board past several years  
9 ago that has still yet to be acted on can somehow at  
10 least provide the citizenry with some legal recourse so  
11 they can sue. My name again is Reverend Lucius Conway,  
12 and thank you for your time.

13 COMMISSIONER BERNARD, PRO TEM: Thank you. On the  
14 issue of the Freedom of Information Act, Conrad, your  
15 office handles those requests for our office. Do you want  
16 to explain to the public what we do with that or would  
17 you rather we do it a different time?

18 ATTORNEY MALLETT: Excuse me. Madam Chairperson, we  
19 get 9,000

20 COMMISSIONER BERNARD, PRO TEM: Talk a little bit  
21 louder or else you guys need to turn up his mic so they  
22 can hear him.

23 ATTORNEY MALLATT: I think not. We get 9,000 Freedom  
24 of Information Act requests a year. The statute requires  
25 that they be responded to, I think within 45-days. The

1 vast majority of the cases, unfortunately, are directed  
2 at DPD. The department I know has three or four civilian  
3 persons dedicated to responding to the request for  
4 information that come from the law department. I think we  
5 have been responsive, and if we're not, then there is the  
6 possibility always present that will be taken to circuit  
7 court and costs will then be assigned to the law  
8 department for a failure to meet the deadlines imposed.  
9 If there are concerns separate and apart, letters come to  
10 us, I read them. And I think that largely we have been  
11 responsive. And if not, you know, if there are concerns  
12 about non-responsiveness, we should be made aware of them  
13 so that we can rectify the problem. But the bottom line  
14 is, I think I have nine attorneys, Madam Chairperson,  
15 dealing with FOIA requests exclusively. And I know that  
16 in DPD there are any number of civilian persons whose  
17 sole responsibility it is to respond to these citizen  
18 requests. So we're working on it as hard as we can. And  
19 if we have not delivered let us know so that I can  
20 personally be sure that we're responding in a timely  
21 manner.

22 COMMISSIONER BERNARD, PRO TEM: Thank you. Conrad  
23 Mallett, of course, is the Corporation Counsel for the  
24 City of Detroit. He's in charge of the law department and  
25 also responsible for providing legal advice as well as

1 litigation support and attorneys in the event of any and  
2 all lawsuits. Who's the next person, Jonya? Oh, hi,  
3 Victoria.

4 MS. CAMILLE: Good evening commissioners. Good  
5 evening, Madam Chair. Okay, can you hear me?

6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD, PRO TEM: Yes.

7 MS. CAMILLE: Good evening commissioners. My name is  
8 Victoria Camille. And first I would like to also stand in  
9 agreement with the board adopting the resolution,  
10 strengthening and unleashing local control of law  
11 enforcement to pursue accountability and protect  
12 constitutional rights and standing in opposition to  
13 executive order number 14288 that's on your agenda. I  
14 don't know what some people think that they're going to  
15 do in Detroit. But in Detroit we uphold constitutional  
16 rights and that's what we're going to be doing here. And  
17 so we look for this board to uphold that as well. Through  
18 the Chair it is actually quite convenient that  
19 Corporation Counsel Conrad Mallet is here today because  
20 my concern that I'm bringing forward is in regards to his  
21 office. So just to refresh everyone's memory, and I know  
22 it's been a while because we're coming around on the  
23 anniversary of the murder of Sherman Lee Butler in July,  
24 where he was murdered by a bailiff. And DPD was present  
25 and tased him before he was shot by the bailiff. And

1 there was just egregious disregard for policy that  
2 resulted in this man's senseless killing. And so in  
3 response to that, I submitted a complaint to the Office  
4 of the Chief investigator, which has been closed for at  
5 least a month now. And on April 9th, I submitted a FOIA  
6 request to Counsel Mallet's office requesting the report  
7 to be provided. It's very important that we understand  
8 that when Sherman was killed very quickly, the department  
9 and prosecutor worthy came forward in the media to very  
10 quickly help everyone understand that he was killed and  
11 self-defense.

12       It wasn't until six months later after insisting on  
13 the body-worn camera footage being released that we  
14 realized that he wasn't killed in self-defense and that  
15 he was instead murdered. And yet we have not had anyone  
16 come forward and publicly talk about that, the video, it  
17 was partially released around Christmas with very little  
18 media coverage. And so that just reinforces the fact that  
19 it's important that body-worn camera footage is captured  
20 and that it's released timely because the citizens of  
21 Detroit do not need to be lied to. And we can see for  
22 ourselves what happens on video. And we need to have that  
23 to happen. I would hope that corporation Counsel Mallet  
24 will honor the FOIA request. Please send over whatever  
25 invoice for whatever amount you need to charge because

1 this information needs to be brought forward. That  
2 request is outstanding since April and DPD should have  
3 nothing to do. They should not have their hands on that  
4 request. That was investigated by the office of the Chief  
5 Investigator. So between the law department and Office of  
6 the Chief Investigator, we need to get that report and it  
7 should not go through the hands of DPD. Thank you. My  
8 name is Victoria Camille,

9 COMMISSIONER BERNARD, PRO TEM: Thank you. Next  
10 speaker.

11 MS. UNDERWOOD: Our next three speakers will be, Ms.  
12 Sharon Solomon, CAC, Scotty Boman, Adam Burette. You can  
13 state your name for the record.

14 MS. SOLOMON: Hello, my name is actually Sharon  
15 Solomon. I kind of reiterate what most of the people here  
16 have said because, you know, in 1974 when the Board of  
17 Police Commissioners was first established, they had much  
18 more authority and autonomy. Today that has been severely  
19 diminished. The board can be usurped by collective  
20 bargaining and the unions. So I'm just wondering if the  
21 members of the board feel that they really have a purpose  
22 when it comes to looking out for the best interest of the  
23 people of the City of Detroit. Because you hear so many  
24 complaints about complaints going unanswered. Where do we  
25 go to try to get more authority for the board? What do we

1 do? Because if you have no real authority, what's the  
2 real purpose? Thank you.

3 COMMISSIONER BERNARD, PRO TEM: Thank you. Our next  
4 speaker, please.

5 MR. BOMAN: Hi, I'm Scotty Boman, founder of DRACO,  
6 Detroit, Residents Advancing Civilian Oversight and  
7 current CAC member and BCA member, and fairly soon police  
8 commissioner. I'd like to kind of follow up on what's  
9 been said about authority. Actually, I would say the  
10 Board of Police Commissioners is the final authority on  
11 promotions. However, just as I have a right to free  
12 speech, however, that doesn't mean that I always would  
13 exercise my right to free speech. It does not always mean  
14 that I'm allowed to exercise my right to free speech in a  
15 similar manner, the charter gives the board an authority.  
16 Unfortunately, as one person just mentioned, the  
17 authority has been usurped by a legal process. There is a  
18 way to challenge these usurped patients, and that would  
19 be to appeal these decisions when there is an arbitration  
20 hearing, where they come to a conclusion that's against  
21 the charter.

22 So one thing is appealing, of course, you need an  
23 attorney to appeal. So the board needs to also, which it  
24 has the authority to also do, have its own attorney.  
25 Furthermore, we have the matter of, well, what does an



1 arbitrator decide based on, anyway? The arbitrator  
2 decides based upon the contract. And so what you need to  
3 do is make sure that city officials don't undermine their  
4 own. In fact, I would consider it malfeasance for any  
5 city official to negotiate a contract that has language  
6 in it that bypasses or works around the language of the  
7 charter that we need to prevent city officials from  
8 negotiating contracts that violate the charter. And if  
9 you do that, then it wouldn't even go past the  
10 arbitrator. The arbitrator would look at the contract,  
11 and go, the contract right here, says the Board of Police  
12 Commissioners is the final word on promotions.

13 COMMISSIONER BERNARD, PRO TEM: Thank you, Mr. Boman.  
14 Next Speaker.

15 MR. BARRETT: Yeah, Adam Barrett, I live in District  
16 6. I'm a member of Detroiters for Tax Justice and  
17 Moratorium Now Coalition and et cetera. I'm just here  
18 tonight ---

19 COMMISSIONER BERNARD, PRO TEM: Can you speak up a  
20 little bit? Thank you so much.

21 MR. BARRETT: Yeah, I'm just here tonight to stand in  
22 solidarity with CPTA and their ask around the resolution.  
23 You know, rejecting federal interference with local law  
24 enforcement. Detroit Police is under charter mandated  
25 control of the citizens of Detroit. So I ask that this

1 board does everything within its power to make that  
2 remain the case regardless of what federal authorities  
3 want to do in our city. Just quick side note this  
4 executive order that's being referenced from the White  
5 House number 14288. Maybe it's nothing, but I doubt that  
6 it's nothing. But the numbers 14 and 88 are probably the  
7 most common white supremacist dog whistles in the book.  
8 So, I mean, you can go to the ADL's website and look that  
9 up if you want to verify what exactly they refer to. But  
10 that's where we're at with the federal government right  
11 now. That's, that's the kind of thing that they're on. So  
12 thank you.

13 COMMISSIONER BERNARD, PRO TEM: Thank you. Next  
14 speaker. Our next speaker in the room will be Ms.  
15 Danielle Murdoch, and then we'll go into Zoom.

16 MS. MURDOCH: Hello everybody, I'm Danielle Murdoch.  
17 I was told about this meeting today by Warfield. Me and  
18 my children are here today because I'm emotional, sorry.  
19 But like that second lady who got up here, we are  
20 targeted at our home. We live on Goddard Street off of  
21 McNichols, in a very bad neighborhood. The police come  
22 there once I call them, and it's kind of like we're the  
23 suspect. Okay? Recently I've been living at my home for  
24 10 years, but recently the newer people that live on the  
25 block that have been living there all their lives, 40

1 plus years, are targeting me and my children. They are  
2 bringing notes with drones into our yard. Today, they  
3 have scratched in their names and somebody who I would  
4 see a name inside of my Durango on the doors. Every time  
5 I go to the precinct or when the police come to our house  
6 because not to mention the neighbors who are trying to  
7 get us out, they have hacked all of our devices, so they  
8 can use my phone to call 911 to say that I've killed my  
9 kids.

10 So then my house is getting swatted by 15 police  
11 cars, guns drawn, checking doorknobs surrounding my house  
12 while me and my kids don't know what's going on, because  
13 we didn't do this. This has happened more than 50 times  
14 since December. I believe I'm getting no assistance from  
15 the police because when I reached out to Reverend  
16 Warfield about something that happened in October, 2023,  
17 they had them under investigation; they don't like me for  
18 that. And I believe that is why every report that has  
19 been taken from me going down there or from them coming  
20 to our home because my home has been swatted. So they're  
21 swatted. That means a lot of police coming, like we're  
22 drug dealers or killers. In case anybody doesn't know  
23 what that means. They're acting like it's, and I don't  
24 understand why, but the only thing I could think of is  
25 because they're mad because Officer Tyler and Officer

1 Keller from the 11th Precinct violated my constitutional  
2 rights. And I'm smart enough to know that. And I was  
3 smart enough to call the precinct to get my registered  
4 legal firearms back. And then they got under  
5 investigation. And from that point on the 11th Precinct  
6 called CPS on me. I know, because a CPS worker told me  
7 they called adult protective services on me. I know,  
8 because when they came and did the visit, they told me.  
9 They checked me, my home, my children, and said ---

10 COMMISSIONER BERNARD, PRO TEM: Excuse me.  
11 Unfortunately, your time has expired. Chief, are you  
12 familiar with this case as well?

13 CHIEF BETTISON: No. I believe ---

14 MS. MURDOCH: They don't want me to go.

15 CHIEF BETTISON: Yeah, I believe this is from 11  
16 Precinct. So what I'll have is, I'll have some officers  
17 get this.

18 MS. MURDOCH: This is all the rock staff has been  
19 collecting from them throwing rocks at my house since  
20 school's been out? This is all the police reports. Plenty  
21 of the police reports are not in the system. I've called  
22 and talked to detectives and they said, we don't see that  
23 one. Oh, that's not in there. Oh, that's not in there. I  
24 have them right here. I have them right here with the  
25 officer's name on top that did them, the computer

1   hacking. No one has contacted me. They said I'm  
2   schizophrenic.

3           CHIEF BETTISON: Through the Chair.

4           COMMISSIONER BERNARD, PRO TEM: Yes.

5           CHIEF BETTISON: Well, I'll have someone --

6           COMMISSIONER BERNARD, PRO TEM: to respond as well.

7           CHIEF BETTISON: Someone from the back, commander,  
8   could we take that information and I'll make sure we get  
9   back with her. Myself personally as well as the command  
10   team from number 11.

11          MS. MURDOCH: I have all the proof.

12          COMMISSIONER BERNARD, PRO TEM: How soon can you get  
13   back, do you think?

14          CHIEF BETTISON: We'll do that tomorrow. I'll notify  
15   them tonight and we'll get the information and we'll ---

16          COMMISSIONER BERNARD, PRO TEM: Thank you.

17          MS. MURDOCK: Thank you all.

18          COMMISSIONER BERNARD, PRO TEM: Alright. Thank you.

19          MS. MURDOCH: Thank you. You all have a great day.

20          COMMISSIONER BERNARD, PRO TEM: Your daughters are  
21   beautiful. Wait a minute, Reverend Warfield?

22          MS. MURDOCH: On their computer, they hack into our  
23   stuff. Thanks for inviting me here. I'll be at everyone  
24   too.

25          COMMISSIONER BERNARD, PRO TEM: Thank you.

1 MS. UNDERWOOD: We'll go into Zoom now.

2 COMMISSIONER BERNARD, PRO TEM: Okay.

3 MS. UNDERWOOD: Our first speaker will be Ms. --- I  
4 apologize. Elena Herrera.

5 MS. HERRARA: Thank you. Good evening. Can you hear  
6 me? I'm Elena Herrera. I live in District 6, and I'm also  
7 a sister of a retired Detroit police officer, among the  
8 first Hispanic officers. And I also wanted to just  
9 reiterate that our community is under siege. And for  
10 those of us who are watching what's happening with ICE in  
11 the community, we are asking for the Detroit police not  
12 to align with them because we're being terrorized,  
13 literally terrorized. I've been at Western High School  
14 for the last six months working, and the students are  
15 literally being hunted outside in the community. Their  
16 families don't feel safe to go to work. It's very  
17 difficult. And when we have absences, we don't know what  
18 happened. You know, from watching all the news that a  
19 student has been deported this week after having gone on  
20 a field trip, he's now in Columbia.

21 This is a student who should have graduated this  
22 year. These are not criminals. They were refugees. Some  
23 of them were here on visas that have now been revoked  
24 because of the Trump administration. I'm asking you as  
25 the police commission, in remembering the role of the

1 commissioners, remembering that you were to be citizen  
2 body oversight of the police, right? You're supposed to  
3 oversee the police department. We don't want to have a  
4 situation like we have in Taylor, where the Taylor Police  
5 are turning over families to ICE. We don't want to have  
6 these agreements where people feel completely unable to  
7 trust any law enforcement. Law enforcement is scaring the  
8 people. I'm asking you to stand up and do everything that  
9 you can as your role as commissioners. Thank you.

10 COMMISSIONER BERNARD, PRO TEM: Thank you.

11 COMMISSIONER DEWAEELSCHÉ: Madam Chair.

12 COMMISSIONER BERNARD, PRO TEM: Go ahead.

13 Commissioner Dewaelsche.

14 COMMISSIONER DEWAEELSCHÉ: Thank you Elena. Elena,  
15 I've known you for a very long time and I'm so glad that  
16 you came to a meeting because I have been bringing this  
17 up at several meetings about what is going on. But it  
18 really is more effective when people from the community  
19 actually come and speak about this. So I encourage you to  
20 ask some of our other members of Southwest Detroit to  
21 come to the meetings and speak just as several of our  
22 other attendees here come regularly. So thank you for  
23 that. I appreciate it.

24 COMMISSIONER BERNARD, PRO TEM: Thank you. Jonya.

25 MS. UNDERWOOD: We will go into Zoom now. Our first

1 speaker will be Ms. Taura Brown, then Mr. Meeko Williams  
2 and Mr. Smith.

3 MS. BROWN: Good evening. My name is Taura Brown and  
4 I just want to uplift the comments made by the members of  
5 CPTA, particularly those of Vicki Camille. Yeah, I'm glad  
6 Conrad Mallet is here. I have sent emails to your office  
7 and have not gotten a response. So respectfully, Mr.  
8 Mallet, you all have not been responding to those emails.  
9 The other thing, FOIA was brought up. Now, I have not had  
10 some of the experiences that some of the people here are  
11 mentioning about FOIA. What I will tell you is, getting  
12 back to Sherman Butler, when I requested his  
13 investigation file after it was closed, I got a bill for  
14 \$6,000. \$6,000. I asked for a video camera, all of that  
15 included \$6,000. You know, people in Detroit don't have  
16 \$6,000. The other thing I wanted to bring up is the  
17 obvious conflict of interest. The elephant in the room.  
18 How is it that Conrad Mallett is representing the city  
19 and now he's here representing the BOPC?

20 Because I can assure you if Sherman Butler's mother  
21 goes to Sue the city, Conrad Mallett, sitting over there  
22 will be the person representing the interest of the City  
23 of Detroit. So how is it possible for him to represent  
24 the interest of the BOPC and the City of Detroit  
25 simultaneously? Again, I respect Conrad Mallett. I think



1 he's a good attorney. I think he's good at his job. I  
2 also don't think that he should be sitting here  
3 representing the BOPC. Obviously he can observe, but I  
4 mean, how is this working out? The other part of that is  
5 the terror to the neighborhood that Elena Herrara brought  
6 up. I mean, it's despicable that black officers are  
7 helping to push the agenda of Donald Trump. He doesn't  
8 like us. We should be in solidarity with the people  
9 getting put out of this country, because guess what?  
10 After they finish messing with us and everybody else who  
11 does not have papers, they are coming for black people.  
12 They're coming now with just some of these executive  
13 orders that have been passed. What the hell are we doing?  
14 That has been my time. Thank you.

15 COMMISSIONER BERNARD, PRO TEM: Thank you. Next  
16 speaker. Jonya, who's next?

17 MS. UNDERWOOD: Mr. Williams?

18 MR. WILLIAMS: Yes. Hi, can you hear me please?

19 COMMISSIONER BERNARD, PRO TEM: Yes.

20 MR. WILLIAMS: Yes. Hi. Yes. Meeko Williams,  
21 community resident taxpayer and legacy Detroiter. And I  
22 want to address this body in regards to the fireworks and  
23 what the plan is to make sure that our Detroiters are  
24 enjoying the biggest event of the year and that they are  
25 included and safe. But I heard Conrad Mallett's here.

1 Woo! Conrad Mallett. Oh, yes. I've been trying to get to  
2 you. Let me use this bully pulpit to get to your  
3 attention. You're CAM stealing. You have squandered the  
4 city. You've been there for many years, and the city has  
5 not done well under you. Now, your name is revolutionary,  
6 and I'm pretty sure people respect you, but I don't, you  
7 are the same slime of Detroit that is dirty, that is  
8 corrupt. You are a thug. You are one of the worst people  
9 to ever have been in Detroit. Mike Duggan picked you. It  
10 fits well for corruption. It fits well because if they  
11 use Conrad Mallett, you are not just there for 50 years.  
12 Conrad Mallett in the City of Detroit and stealing off  
13 the tick. You have literally ruined this city from the  
14 COVID money, from the CAM, from the CARES Act and even  
15 stealing through and squandering and manipulate ---

16 COMMISSIONER BERNARD, PRO TEM: Excuse me.

17 MR. WILLIAMS: The ARPA and the Board of Police  
18 Commissioners should not be using him, or should not have  
19 ---

20 COMMISSIONER BERNARD, PRO TEM: Your time is up.

21 MR. WILLIAMS: Opinion of him. No, you cannot take my  
22 time. I'm a citizen on Zoom and I just want to address  
23 this body. But for Conrad Mallett ---

24 COMMISSIONER BERNARD, PRO TEM: You have a fan.

25 ATTORNEY MALLETT: I do.

1 COMMISSIONER BERNARD, PRO TEM: You've got a fan  
2 club.

3 ATTORNEY MALLETT: I do.

4 MS. UNDERWOOD: Mr. Smith.

5 Hello, Mr. Smith. Are you there?

6 MS. UNDERWOOD: I'll go to the next speaker, then.

7 The next speaker will be iPhone5.

8 COMMISSIONER BERNARD, PRO TEM: iPhone5, going once,  
9 iPhone5, going twice.

10 MS. UNDERWOOD: We'll go to the next speaker. Former  
11 Commissioner, William Davis.

12 MR. DAVIS: Good evening. Can I be heard? Hello, can  
13 I be heard?

14 COMMISSIONER BERNARD, PRO TEM: Yes.

15 MR. DAVIS: Okay. I'd like to say that, I'd like to  
16 encourage everyone there to listen, and I'm going to be  
17 watching the rebroadcast. I encourage everyone to vote.  
18 This election is validly important. We have to remember  
19 to vote in August and in November. Also, I do know that  
20 there is a problem with FOIAs. I know I personally filed  
21 a FOIA, dealing with the BOPC two years ago, and Conrad  
22 Mallett, and no one from the law department has ever  
23 responded to it. I figured I'd let it go a little bit  
24 longer, and depending on what happens at the August  
25 primary, I might be doing something with that to draw

1 nationwide attention. Also, I think that more attention  
2 needs to be done as it relates to --- there are a lot of  
3 people running red lights. There are a lot of people  
4 running stop signs in the city.

5       There are a lot of people that run up to the red  
6 light, and then they'll go around the people already  
7 waiting for the light to change and run the red light. So  
8 I think the city needs to do more as it relates to people  
9 running red lights. The city also needs to do more in  
10 some of these neighborhoods where they reconfigure it,  
11 you know, it went from two or three lanes down to one  
12 lane in each direction, that is creating hazards for  
13 people all over the city. They are creating a whole lot  
14 of accidents. And it is very problematic, especially when  
15 buses are picking up and dropping off people. You know, I  
16 can see why my insurance is not going down because  
17 whoever came up with this concept and this idea, it's not  
18 very well thought out. Because there are more accidents,  
19 there are more hostile people because of the way the  
20 streets have been reconfigured. But hopefully you all  
21 will have a nice day, and I and you all will be hearing  
22 from me soon. Goodbye.

23       COMMISSIONER BERNARD, PRO TEM: Thank you. May I ask  
24 you, commissioner, how did you do that? You're sitting  
25 right there, but you're being recorded. You recorded it

1 ahead of time, I thought. Aren't you Commissioner Davis?

2 Oh, he looks just like him. Okay. I'm sorry.

3 MS. UNDERWOOD: We're going to go back to Mr. ---

4 COMMISSIONER BERNARD, PRO TEM: You do look like him.

5 You do. You are him. Okay, never mind. Next speaker.

6 MS. UNDERWOOD: Mr. Smith.

7 MR. SMITH: Good afternoon. Sorry about that. I had a  
8 phone call so I couldn't talk. But I just want to  
9 reiterate the words of Vicki Shaw. I couldn't hear what  
10 Taura said because of the phone call I had, but I want to  
11 reiterate what she said as well. Sure. It was about  
12 Sherman Lee Butler, and how to handle that situation. I  
13 wish I was there in person to be talking directly in  
14 front of corporation counsel, because that FOIA request  
15 that Victoria Camille mentioned is very important.  
16 Accountability is very important when it comes to our  
17 police officers. We definitely need to have visibility  
18 when it comes to the community relations with officers,  
19 and the fact that they are out in the community amongst  
20 people that they didn't grow up with, they don't live in  
21 the same neighborhoods, and they don't really represent  
22 in the same communities.

23 They don't live in the same communities as we do. So  
24 we need to really be able to monitor actions when we  
25 come; when we have negative interactions with the police,

1 and we have these complaints. Also, I was in a random  
2 situation last night, my friend got into a little vehicle  
3 accident, and I saw two young black officers; made me  
4 very happy to see young black officers on the force. I  
5 also want to say, the fact that Southwest Detroit is  
6 being targeted by ICE is terrible. But the Detroit Police  
7 Department in no way, shape or form, is enforcing federal  
8 statutes. The federal government is not in charge of the  
9 Detroit Police Department. The City of Detroit is in  
10 charge of the Detroit Police Department, and we are  
11 governed by the charter. And this board does have way  
12 more power than they lead on.

13 This board has so much power, especially when it  
14 comes to promotions, when it comes to suspensions; when  
15 it comes to suspensions with or without pay. That is very  
16 important. When it comes to the police department and how  
17 it's governed. If you can't be promoted because of your  
18 disciplinary actions or things in your file and history,  
19 and the board can stop that; that is power. If you can be  
20 suspended without pay or with pay because of the board's  
21 vote, that is power. I hate when I hear the commissioner  
22 say that the board does not have power. The board does  
23 have a lot of power. It's about if you exercise the power  
24 correctly. Also, we need a lawyer that is independent for  
25 the board, not one from the Corporation Counsel.

1 COMMISSIONER BERNARD, PRO TEM: Thank you.

2 MS. UNDERWOOD: Our next speaker will be --- I'm  
3 going to try to go back to the iPhone5.

4 COMMISSIONER BERNARD, PRO TEM: iPhone5.

5 MS. UNDERWOOD: They're not responding at this time,  
6 so we'll go to our last speaker in Zoom. Mr. Roo, aka,  
7 Mr. Real.

8 COMMISSIONER BERNARD, PRO TEM: Hello, sir?

9 MR. ROO/MR. REAL: Hey, Linda. Bernard, listen up.

10 COMMISSIONER BERNARD, PRO TEM: Yes.

11 MR. ROO/MR. REAL: Kaneisha Coleman death is not a  
12 suicide. That's DPD case 20-112, I demonstrated it. The  
13 conclusive evidence is that she could have not achieved  
14 the angle and trajectory that the bullet traveled with  
15 her own hand. There was no gun stepping on the entry  
16 room. There was no gun at the scene when the police  
17 arrived. Based on the information he gleaned and gathered  
18 when he arrived on the scene, Detective Dietrich Lever  
19 from the 8th Precinct, initiated an aggravated assault.

20 COMMISSIONER BERNARD, PRO TEM: Hello? Are you there?  
21 We lost the feed.

22 MS. UNDERWOOD: That was our last speaker.

23 COMMISSIONER BERNARD, PRO TEM: Okay. Alright then.

24 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair.

25 COMMISSIONER BERNARD, PRO TEM: Yes.

1 COMMISSIONER BELL: The time now is 7:15. I'm sorry,  
2 6:15, right?

3 FEMALE SPEAKER: 7:15.

4 COMMISSIONER BELL: 7:15. Due to the fact that we  
5 don't have a quorum, I move for adjournment.

6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD, PRO TEM: If there is no  
7 objection, ladies and gentlemen, we are adjourned. Thank  
8 you for coming. And thank you for your comments and  
9 letting us know what your issues are within the  
10 community.
