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3 MS. WILLIAMS: I am sorry. To stay in the City of Detroit, you get paid when you're in the academy and 4 you're also getting paid \$55,000. Like I said, they think 5 6 they are above the law. I see them all the time at my apartment building. Somebody who stayed in 204, he 7 continued stalking me, hacking into my devices. My phones 8 don't even work anymore. That's not acceptable. And when 9 you violate my constitutional rights, it's an issue. 10 Clearly a lot of people who are homeless are unable or do 11 12 not have the will to come to these meetings, or might not 13 even be aware of them. I'm speaking about the people who 14 really need help. The people that don't have an avenue 15 because officers are taking up bed spaces from the 16 homeless. There are 26 shelters in the City of Detroit. 17 Cameras are everywhere. Cameras surround all these neighborhoods. 18 19 INTERIM CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you, Ms. 20 Williams. 21 MS. WILLIAMS: Thank you very much. Have a great day. 22 INTERIM CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. 23 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Madam Chair, if I may. Deputy 24 Chief, if you would be kind enough at least to get the names from her. I don't have a problem with the officers 25



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1 living in a shelter. I don't know if their mothers threw 2 them out. I don't know if their wives put them out. I don't care about that. But I do care if somebody has 3 threatened her. So I just want to make sure that any 4 5 officers that are there don't threaten her or anyone else. That's all. If you would be kind enough to do that 6 7 for me, I'd appreciate it. 8 DC BLISS: Through the Chair, yes, ma'am. 9 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you. 10 INTERIM CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Next.

11 MS. UNDERWOOD: Our next speaker.

12 MS. HERZADA: Good afternoon.

13 INTERIM VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Good afternoon.

14 MS. HERZADA: I would like to just speak to the issue 15 of the Detroit Police supporting ICE in the raids in our 16 community. And I don't want to raise this necessarily 17 with the department itself because it seems like there 18 are rules that are being put forth that are terrifying to 19 our community. I really would like to address it more to you as human beings and to officers as human beings, not 20 21 as officers taking orders, not as officers that are 22 watching people get rounded up by masked people who are 23 not identifying themselves to police. The Detroit police do not need to help this kind of terror in our community. 24 25 The Detroit police don't necessarily have to have the



1 people in our community hate them. The way ICE is hated. ICE is absolutely acting as bounty hunters, and we're 2 asking for you to think about what you're doing to 3 support this kind of activity, if the Detroit police are 4 allowed to do this. I'm asking the Detroit police 5 officers and the commissioners to think about themselves, 6 not as people following rules, not as necessarily 7 government employees or city employees, but as human 8 beings and what this does to our community. Thank you. 9 INTERIM CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. I would 10 just like to add to that DC, if you could respond to a 11 12 question that I have as it relates to an incident that 13 occurred in Southwest Detroit where the ICE supposedly 14 had a search warrant and went to a home in Southwest 15 Detroit and Detroit Police came to assist them. And it 16 was my understanding that the Detroit Police's policy is not to work with or assist ICE. If I could get 17 clarification, because I'm getting a lot of calls and a 18 lot of texts regarding that incident that occurred. I 19 believe it was yesterday. Ms. Hazard, was it yesterday? 20 21 Yes. You need to go to the speaker, please.

MS. HERZADA: This is very well documented on all manner of videos, because all the neighbors were watching it and many people helped. We didn't say we don't want Detroit police to help ICE, unless of course ICE can't



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handle it themselves. We're asking that Detroit police do
 not intervene. Thank you.

3 INTERIM CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. Why don't you stay up there until we hear a comment. Thank you. 4 5 DC BLISS: Through the Chair. Deputy Chief Mark Bliss. Thank you for that. I want to first start off by 6 7 saying that the Detroit Police does not engage in immigration enforcement. That's not what we do, okay? As 8 9 a police department, we were called not to assist. We were called there to ensure that there is not a breach of 10 11 peace. Okay? And that is so that whatever warrant, if the 12 federal warrant, whatever they were acting out, we're 13 there to make sure that there is no breach of peace. That 14 is it. We're not assisting. We are there strictly for 15 breach of peace. When that happens, then we, as a law enforcement agency have to react. And that's what we did 16 17 yesterday, but we were not assisting in that type of 18 warrant. That is solely up to ICE. And I just want to 19 reiterate again, that we don't enforce immigration policy. The federal government has their own entity for 20 that. We do not do that. 21

22 MS. HERZADA: May I respond?

23 INTERIM CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes.

MS. HERZADA: Okay. If you know that there's someone coming toward you who is masked and is not identified,



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1 and you don't have a chance to say anything, you don't have a chance to show a passport, a birth certificate, or 2 anything else, you've simply been profiled, and also that 3 you can be deported to a third country, or that you can 4 be sent away without any due process at all, then if you 5 know that that's what's going to happen to you, then I 6 guess it will be a lot of occasions that you're going to 7 have to intervene to keep the peace because people are 8 trying to defend their own lives 9

DC BLISS: Through the Chair, ma'am. Unfortunately, II I'm not familiar with the case. I'm not familiar with the search warrant.

MS. HERZADA: Are you familiar with the world we're in?

15 DC BLISS: Yes ma'am. Yes, I'm very familiar with it, 16 and thank you for bringing that to my attention. But 17 unfortunately, because it's not a case that I can speak openly about, it would not be fair to ICE or to the 18 individual to speak on something that I don't have the 19 20 information in front of me about. But I can assure you that I'm well aware of what's going on in this world. 21 22 INTERIM CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you, DC if 23 there are any questions that you want me to follow up on Ms. Herzada, I will, just get those to me. 24

25 MS. HERZADA: I would actually ask you to have the



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1 police look at their own policy of assisting people who 2 are not identified and wearing masks. You don't know if 3 you're helping kidnappers; you don't know who you're 4 helping. Thank you.

5 INTERIM CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. Thank you.6 Next speaker, please.

7 MR. BARRETT: Yeah, my name is Adam Barrett. I live in District 6. I just want to reiterate my support for 8 the resolution that was recently passed regarding DPD 9 involvement in federal activity and ICE raids. I want to 10 thank the board for adopting it, but I also just want to 11 12 make sure that it's being implemented with all due speed. I see other cities kind of showing us the way in this new 13 14 era of whatever you want to call it. I hear Chicago's 15 actually arresting ICE agents and California is 16 introducing a measure that bans law enforcement from wearing masks or otherwise hiding their identity. I think 17 we can get some of that here in Detroit. If we believe 18 that crowd control is merely about protecting people on 19 both sides of a protest in a vacuum, then that's one 20 thing. But if we believe in context, then we're forced to 21 admit that the entire reason that crowd control is needed 22 is because the federal activity in question is so 23 objectionable to so many people in the area that it 24 25 sparks protest practically everywhere it occurs. Whether



the raids are constitutional or lawful is pretty much a 1 moot question. According to our City Charter, the people 2 have ultimate authority over the direction of the police 3 department. So if the federal activity in question cannot 4 proceed without crowd control from DPD because of that 5 objection ability, then DPD is in fact de facto 6 performing immigration work alongside of ICE. Are they 7 not? I mean, there's de jour and de facto and I like to 8 see it as de facto what's happening. Thanks. 9 10 INTERIM CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. Is there any response DC No. Thank you. Next speaker. 11 12 MS. UNDERWOOD: Our next three speakers will be Ms. Fredia Butler. Lieutenant Mark Young from DPOA and Ms. 13 14 Victoria Camille. 15 MS. BUTLER: Good afternoon, commissioners. 16 INTERIM VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Good afternoon. 17 INTERIM CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Good afternoon. MS. BUTLER: Wake up sleeping giants and think. As I 18 have stated several times before, we have some dark days 19 ahead. That day has arrived. The United States Supreme 20 Court has given President Trump unchecked powers to do as 21 he pleases. It is about black and brown people, citizens, 22 and non-citizens. Sometime ago I read in the Detroit Free 23

24 Press and leaders' response in addressing illegal people.

I believe no one is illegal, but undocumented. I equate 25



1 the bill that has passed the Senate and the possibility of passing it in the house with abatements that have been 2 given to businessmen and corporations in our city. 3 Businesses not paying their fair share in taxes, and 4 5 more. To pass the bill now on the floor of the house, 6 we'll provide money to create the largest federal law 7 enforcement agency, ICE to incarcerate and deport people. A couple of weeks ago, Commissioner Ricardo Moore was 8 9 reading from a document that we should hear when he referenced Ms. Michelle George and my name. Commissioner 10 Woods, I believe you didn't want to hear it, but we need 11 12 more information and not less. There is more to come. And 13 that bill passed while I was sitting in my car today. 14 Thank you. COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thanks for letting us know. 15 16 INTERIM CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I didn't know that. 17 LT. YOUNG: We didn't. Good afternoon Chair. 18 19 Congratulations. 20 INTERIM CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. 21 LT. YOUNG: Couldn't be a better person sitting 2.2 there. 23 INTERIM CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you kindly. 24 LT. YOUNG: I didn't plan on coming to the board 25 meeting today because I need a break. I'm tired. But I



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1 had to address something that happened last week. My members in the Detroit Police Department are not here to 2 play whack-a-mole with anybody. This is real. An 3 allegation was made that members of the Detroit Police 4 5 Department, bum rush individuals at gas stations, party 6 stores, and other venues with no proof. That's false and dangerous and inaccurate and misleading. Misleading, 7 falsehoods send a bad message to these citizens that 8 encounter the police; that count on the police. 9 Inaccuracies and truthfulness in our world are called 10 Giglio. It is termination. If you have something, bring 11 12 it. This union will work hard to address any issues to 13 make this department the greatest department that it 14 could ever be. And we do that, but don't make accusations

15 without backing it up.

16 Don't put things out there like that. It's not fair to you. It's not fair to the citizens. And it's damn sure 17 18 not fair to the people that I represent and the members of my profession with law enforcement, period. Let's not 19 20 throw a rock and hide our hands. Let's not make this about political pontification. Gas stations and party 21 stores call the police on a regular basis. I know. I was 22 23 one of those officers. They would ask us to come because 24 these guys are outside selling dope, have guns and 25 everything else. A gentleman stood before you last week

1 and told you that the cops encountered him and during the encounter, a gun fell from his waistband. Hmm. 2 3 Interesting. Silence is dangerous. Let's not play whacka-mole with the Detroit Police Department. These men and 4 5 women deserve better. If you have something, bring it. Let's address it. Let's deal with it, because we want 6 7 this to be the best department too. 8 INTERIM CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. Next 9 speaker. MS. CAMILLE: Good afternoon board. 10 INTERIM VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Good afternoon. 11 INTERIM CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Good afternoon. 12 13 MS. CAMILLE: Congratulations, Madam Chair. 14 INTERIM CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. MS. CAMILLE: I'm looking forward to continuing to 15 16 work with you and the other commissioners on improving 17 police policy. I want to just preface what I am going to say by reinforcing what was said earlier that our police 18 department is insubordination to the people of Detroit. 19 So that's the first thing that needs to be said. And I 20 want to commend the board for passing the resolution last 21 week that pushes back on federal agents and cooperation 22 23 with federal troops in our streets. However, the 24 activities that I've seen on video from the last couple 25 days regarding these raids from federal law enforcement,



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1 is not aligned with the direction that we thought we were 2 headed after that resolution. Now, I recognize that a 3 resolution is just that. It's pretty much a statement of 4 intent and that it takes a lot of work to put the 5 expectations and policies and procedures in place to 6 support that.

And so I would ask this board to move very quickly 7 on that, in collaboration with the community. And I'm not 8 talking about letting people come up for two minutes. And 9 Madam Chair, I commend you for allowing some ongoing 10 dialogue from the community members today. But it is time 11 12 for a real sit down and some open dialogue, especially 13 with the community members who are most impacted by this 14 activity, to get an understanding of what is the 15 expectation of the people on what DPD will do under these 16 circumstances. Because the reality is these circumstances are happening. The federal government is doing what it's 17 doing, and we need to hear very clearly from the 18 community what it is we expect law enforcement to do. And 19 we need you to then implement that into policy and direct 20 21 and hold DPD accountable to doing exactly what the 22 community wants them to do. Thank you.

23 INTERIM CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. Next24 speaker.

25 MS. UNDERWOOD: We're going to Zoom.



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INTERIM VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Yes. And before we
 go in there, Madam Chair, we can proceed with the
 swearing in and then go back to Zoom.

Also, I think 2 anytime the Detroit police officers have to go and 3 intervene for safety at an ICE event, they should ask, is 4 there a physical warrant or an electronic warrant that 5 6 they have for this person or persons? Far too often, you know, you hear about ICE raids and other things, but you 7 don't see, or you have people requesting a warrant and 8 9 asking to see a warrant. But it seems like we live in the 10 police state now.

And also, I'd like to say that I have gotten calls 11 12 from young people and their parents saying that they have 13 been bum rushed at the gas stations, and party stores, 14 where two or three officers would come up and pat them 15 down and, you know, and ask them a bunch of questions. 16 And all they could be doing is just walking out or 17 walking in to get service. My degrees are in law enforcement, criminal justice and what have you. But I do 18 believe the vast majority of Detroit police officers are 19 good, hard-working people. But as in any barrel, there's 20 21 always a couple of bad apples. And we need to make sure that everyone is above reproach and make sure that 22 everybody is serving our community. Thank you. 23 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. Next speaker. 24

25 MS. UNDERWOOD: Yeah. We have one more speaker.



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1 MS. GARCIA: Right here?

2 MS. UNDERWOOD: And state your name.

3 MS. GARCIA: Good afternoon.

4 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Good afternoon, everyone. 5 MS. GARCIA: My name is Jane Garcia. I'm from 6 Southwest Detroit. And I want to come before you all 7 commissioners to thank you. These are the most uncertain times we've been dealing with in our history. And the 8 9 idea that people are being picked up from school, they're being picked up from work, and the community has come 10 around and supported the families that are being 11 12 targeted. And I just want to thank the police department, 13 our police department, the Detroit Police Department, and 14 the City of Detroit that has not gone into collusion with 15 the ICE people because they are actually hiring bounty 16 hunters. So people are afraid to open doors. And it's 17 been happening and we are doing as much as we can to 18 educate our people, not to open the doors, but I just 19 thought it was very important that we come before you in these uncertain times. Thank you, all of you, for 20 21 participating and protecting this city and the community, and specifically the families. Gracias. 22

23 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you, Ms. Garcia.

24 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Gracias.

25 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Any other speakers?



1 MS. UNDERWOOD: That's it, Madame Chair. 2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. That concludes our public comment. 3 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: We don't have a quorum. 4 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: So, I'll entertain a motion 5 to adjourn. 6 7 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: So move. 8 VICE CHAIRPERSON WOODS: Second. 9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: It's been moved and seconded. All those in favor, please indicate by saying, 10 11 Aye. 12 COMMISSIONERS: Aye. 13 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed? Thank you.
