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CITY OF DETROIT
BOARD OF POLICE COMMISSIONERS MEETING
July 24, 2025 at 3:00 P.M.

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3 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: I'd like to call the meeting
4 to order, but we do not have a quorum. So we're going to
5 go to the invocation and we have Chaplain Peggy James,
6 who will deliver the invocation via zoom.

7 MS. JOSHUA: She left.

8 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: She left?

9 MS. JOSHUA: Yes.

10 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Okay. Then could we ask
11 Reverend Warfield.

12 REVEREND. WARFIELD: Yes.

13 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Thank you.

14 REVEREND WARFIELD: Let us pray. Most holy and
15 eternal. Father, we come this afternoon giving you thanks
16 and praise for getting us to this portion of our week as
17 we come to this meeting with the community. And we know
18 that you are a God of order; that you are God that cares
19 about law and that cares about people. We ask, Lord, that
20 you allow this agenda to reflect your love, your care,
21 and your concern. Bless those who serve on our Detroit
22 Board of Police Commissioners. Bless our police officers
23 and the citizens of this great city and those who visit.
24 We ask, Lord, that your Holy Spirit will guide us
25 throughout all of our proceedings. In Christ's name I

1 pray. Amen.

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Thank you, Reverend. And
3 now, since we don't have a quorum, we'll go straight to
4 public comment.

5 MS. JOSHUA: We have 3 in the room at the moment, so
6 I'm going to call Valerie Parker, James Ford, and Eric
7 Blount.

8 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Yep. If Madam Chair, through the
9 Chair, if you can have her project through the mic.

10 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Yes. We couldn't hear very
11 well, please.

12 MS. PARKER: Hi, my name is Valerie Parker. I'm a
13 youth activist in the Brightmoor Castle Woods area. I'm
14 currently a priest and delegate in my area, and I am
15 running for City Council at large for Detroit. So for the
16 last six months, there has been a situation two doors
17 down for me, disrupting the community. Some kids had
18 taken over our house, 6040D. I'm calling the 6th
19 Precinct, and they wouldn't do anything.

20 The community officer wouldn't do anything for me
21 because in the meeting they said, because they are some
22 Republicans and they don't like Bush, they were not going
23 to do anything for me to my face. I was Republican before
24 Bush, but I'm still a community activist and I'm active,
25 and I'm a teacher. So somebody got shot. It didn't have

1 to be because we were reaching out. That was on Dale
2 Street. The next day, the neighbor, they got their car
3 shot up. The next day, the police gave me a search
4 warrant from my house. They came in my crib. Now I'm the
5 one who was petitioning. I have everything on Facebook. I
6 was telling them, trying to talk to Chief Bettison;
7 trying to talk to Commander Newson but nobody was giving
8 me the time of day. So I'm campaigning, so I came out
9 yesterday; so I got in my car, I saw a missed call. The
10 miss call was at 1:15.

11 So I just dial the number back. I said, this is
12 Valerie Parker. I said you called me? He said, yes. He
13 said, I'm Sergeant Brown. He said, would you like to help
14 with the investigation on Dale? I said, no. He said,
15 would you like to help with the investigation on Dale? I
16 said, no. I said, sir, we tried. We tried. That was the
17 end of the conversation. I went home at 3 o'clock, 20
18 police were at my door. You had 10 cars at my door. They
19 were geared up. They knocked my door in. So they put me
20 on the porch, told me if I didn't behave that they were
21 going to call the ambulance and had me evaluated. So I
22 said, they went to my house. I don't know what they did.
23 So they come back out; a man, black man, and a woman come
24 and give me this paper. Said they have a warrant for a
25 camera, a DVD. A DVD right there. You could have got the

1 DVD. I was trying to help the investigation. So I called
2 the man back, Sergeant Brown. I called him back on the
3 number. He said this is my cell phone number. Don't call
4 it any more. I said, well, this is the number you called
5 me on? I said, sir. I said, why did you do that? He said,
6 because I don't like how you talked to me.

7 Now I'm all jacked up. I've been fighting for this
8 community a long time. You embarrassed me like that
9 because you don't like how --- now I'm a cusser. I was
10 not even cussing. And because I said no, I didn't want to
11 get involved. We were just too traumatic. We've been
12 shooting for the last two days. When we called you all at
13 the 6th Precinct, still you have to come to my crib. That
14 was June 28th, this year, I turned 65. So in the midst of
15 that, they're playing little games. I'm 65. I could have
16 stroked out. I already have post-traumatic stress. So
17 we've been campaigning and you want us to trust them. You
18 want us to trust them. And I was willing to help. I was
19 on TV. I told them that my camera was in my house. I'm
20 campaigning. You don't like how I talk to you? Because I
21 said no. So my question is, I didn't know that if
22 somebody asked you a question, an open and closed
23 question, that you didn't have the right to answer and
24 say no. And because I said no, all that manpower, all
25 that man hours were right there. But you closed my kids'

1 school. But you have the Popo on me. But I'm still
2 waiting for them to go down to that building.

3 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. Ma'am, let me just
4 stop you for one second. Do we have the timer? Is there a
5 time?

6 COMMISSIONER WOODS: It was up there.

7 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: It was up. I'm sorry. Every
8 person has two minutes. Did you want to speak with the
9 Office of the Chief Investigator?

10 MS. PARKER: Who is that?

11 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Right here? We could have
12 someone if you would like to.

13 MS. PARKER: Yes, because ---

14 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: File a complaint.

15 MS. PARKER: But I've been filing complaints. My only
16 thing about it is that I'm in the streets and I hear what
17 they're saying. My turn came. Now, what do you want us to
18 do? That's all I'm saying. What do you want us to do?

19 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. Alright. Well, thank
20 you very much. Next speaker.

21 MS. JOSHUA: James Ford.

22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: We're having a hard time
23 hearing her. Is her microphone working? The green light
24 is on. Oh, okay. That's what the problem is. One second,
25 please.

1 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Say something in it now.

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: No, it's not working.

3 COMMISSIONER WOODS: So we're good?

4 MS. JOSHUA: We should be good.

5 MR. FORD: Hello, my name is James Ford. I'd just
6 like to say, I commend the police for what they're doing.
7 They're beginning to pull a lot of people over. They've
8 probably been working on this for a while, for running
9 red lights and drag races. And I've seen a lot of it, and
10 it is really good. Every time I see that, I think about
11 whenever they pull somebody over, they are putting their
12 lives on the line. Every time they put on that badge,
13 they are putting their lives on the line. But I'm really
14 here to talk about the Obama weekend, which is probably
15 the most productive weekend for children that I think can
16 happen. In other words, Obama weekend is not about
17 Michelle and Barack Obama. It's about the next Michelle
18 and Barack Obama. In other words, we're trying to create
19 and build an atmosphere where children can recognize
20 good, solid, positive people, whether black, white, red
21 or whatever. I would just like to say this as far as
22 talking about Michelle and Barack, the next Michelle and
23 Barack Obama; they could be crawling around in your
24 living room; they could be in the backseat of your car.
25 They could be playing in the seat of your car, as I said

1 before. They could be anywhere. And a matter of fact,
2 they could almost be in your granddaughter or daughter's
3 womb right now, ready to grow. So that's what the Obama
4 weekend is about. I want to say this now, that we've had
5 a real standstill. Somebody came and dumped trash over at
6 6559 Grand River, where we were going to have the event.
7 They've cut down trees and we're just trying to get some
8 people to understand and get a trash pickup over there to
9 pick up this debris. We would appreciate any help that
10 you can give because we're not able to pay. And if that
11 trash isn't picked up, we will not be able to have the
12 Obama weekend, which is about children, not about
13 Michelle and Barack Obama. It's about the next Michelle
14 and Barack Obama. And they can be any color, white,
15 black, red, Mexican, Puerto Rican, Cuban, Haitian,
16 Jamaica, anything else? That's what we are looking for.
17 God bless everybody and thank you for listening to me.
18 Please try to help us get that trash up on Vine Wood and
19 Grand Boulevard. I mean, Grand River. Thank you. Bye-Bye.

20 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Thank you. I appreciate it.
21 Next speaker.

22 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Through the Chair.

23 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Yes.

24 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Deputy Chief, if we can maybe
25 work with the gentleman to connect him to some of the

1 city services to be able to get that done. And thank you
2 for what you're doing. We do have the flyer. I'm going to
3 make my best effort to get over there and thank you for
4 your advocacy and thank you for what you're doing for the
5 community. And so, hopefully, they can get some of the
6 NPOs to work with you to get with the Neighborhood City
7 Hall to be able to help get that trash picked up over
8 there. Thank you.

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you. Next speaker.

10 MINISTER BLOUNT: Good afternoon board. I'm Minister
11 Eric Blount from Sacred Heart Catholic Church. The first
12 two speakers' kind of exemplify the problems that we face
13 here. The first lady had a legitimate concern about being
14 harassed by the police; address that, move on. The next
15 speaker talks about trash pickup, and you give him the
16 light of day. Why don't someone here just say, that's not
17 why we are here. Trash pickup is to be handled some other
18 way, some other person. But no, the systematic corruption
19 doesn't allow citizens to go anywhere else but here to
20 talk about trash pickup. So now we have to waste precious
21 time when people are concerned about police officer
22 misconduct. So chairperson Dewaelsche, I do admire you
23 breaking the rules, again, this meeting by allowing the
24 first speaker to have more than two minutes. If you want
25 to hold me for two minutes, let it be. I'm about justice

1 and equality, but I think there is a point in time where
2 you have to bend the rules in order to address traumatic
3 situations like the first speaker really spoke of. So I'd
4 like to offer some ideas, if you will, because
5 Commissioner, Chairperson, Dewaelsche, this is your first
6 time being chairperson. I believe every ---

7 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Correction. It's my second
8 time.

9 MINISTER BLOUNT: Being chairperson?

10 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes.

11 MINISTER BLOUNT: Okay. I stand corrected. I don't
12 mind being that. I'm a grown man, but I think meeting OCI
13 should be reporting on what is going on in trends. Risk
14 management should be reporting out on what officers are
15 headed toward misconduct. And Internal Affairs should be
16 reporting out on what they have found and seen. These are
17 just my ideas of what can be improved. Thank you. I know
18 you're shocked, right? Normally, I'm just criticized. But
19 I only get two minutes.

20 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you.

21 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Through the Chair.

22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes.

23 COMMISSIONER WOODS: The first speaker, and I'll just
24 speak to it. She had a conversation with us and the chief
25 investigator. And the chief investigator is handling that

1 situation. We handle citizen complaints through the
2 Office of the Chief Investigator. And so she's getting
3 that service that she needs. And so I don't want to make
4 it look like she's being ignored. She's not being ignored
5 in any shape, form or fashion. She's getting her concerns
6 addressed through that entity, and she will get a
7 response through the Office of the Chief Investigator.
8 And then the trash issue. If we can help anybody in this
9 city get some services, we'll help them, whether someone
10 had a loved one killed, whether an officer is doing
11 something wrong, or in anything. We have on our agenda a
12 suspension without pay that we have to deal with in
13 Closed Session. Those things can't be publicized. So we
14 deal with a myriad of issues as the board of police
15 commission. And so, I'm very appreciative of all the
16 moving parts. Thank you, Madam Chair.

17 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you. Next speaker,
18 please.

19 MS. WILLIAMS: Hello. Through the Chair. This is for
20 everybody who has been on this board, through the Chair.
21 OCI, you guys. Who's been telling the City Council
22 members that there are no Detroit police officers that
23 stay in these shelters? Because that's a lie. I've been
24 complaining about this for over a whole year. And like I
25 said, if you all are not capable of doing your job by the

1 law, you should call, get in contact with the FBI. I see
2 this every day. And it's an issue, constantly. And like
3 Chauncey, his grandfather was a police officer. He worked
4 at 3426 Mack Avenue. He was facilitating the officers,
5 making sure they were getting their weapons back and
6 forth. He is the same one who threatened my life. Phone
7 number (313) 933-4700. How would I know that? How do I
8 know he has a black Escalade?

9 He's from California. He was born in '88. Because he
10 was following me. It's an issue when you all sit up here
11 every week and act like nothing goes on illegally in the
12 Detroit Police Department. I'm talking at the highest
13 level. It's not acceptable because at the end of the day,
14 this is why you guys are here to do your job. The
15 complaints that I made over a year ago. Do you know how
16 many homeless people were unable to get beds because of
17 this illegal corruption? This is not acceptable by any
18 means. So can anybody answer that question? Who has been
19 telling City Council, Madam Mary Sheffield, that there
20 are no police officers staying in the shelters? I like to
21 know that. Because make it known, there is nobody
22 contacting Ms. Williams to say, come in, identify these
23 officers. I've been speaking about this, like I said,
24 over a whole year, constantly. I'm not on any committee.
25 I'm not kissing anybody behind. I'm not doing any

1 backdoor dealing. I'm speaking about equality and justice
2 for all people. Not because you are recruiting and they
3 are allowed to stay in these shelters. It's not
4 acceptable.

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you, ma'am. Your time
6 is up.

7 MS. WILLIAMS: Thank you.

8 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Next speaker.

9 MS. SMITH: Good afternoon to my commissioners.

10 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Good afternoon.

11 MS. SMITH: I didn't think I was going to speak
12 today, but we have a new young lady that didn't know that
13 I was going to get up. So, that's alright, baby. I just
14 want to congratulate my police department. They were out
15 the other day; it was the day before yesterday. Two
16 things I want to congratulate them about. The recruiting
17 last Saturday. Matter of fact, I was so energetic. I sent
18 my grandchildren out there and it was too late because
19 they had closed up. But my granddaughter's interested in
20 being in the police department and her fiancé. I told
21 some of the police that I met a couple of weeks ago that
22 they were my grandchildren. And they came in from Alabama
23 with a degree and they decided they want to come back to
24 Detroit to live.

25 So I'm so glad for that. In the meantime, who did I

1 see out there giving ice cream and putting ice cream on
2 top of the cones? And I was really upset because I wasn't
3 there. Not only was --- what's his name? Yeah,
4 Fitzgerald. Fitzgerald was out there just stacking the
5 ice cream on us. I said, oh my God, why can't I be there?
6 And then we had Washington, he was out there doing ---
7 they were doing a heck of a good job giving out that ice
8 cream. It was a good day for them. But what I want to say
9 is, and I said it over and over again, we must control
10 these youngsters. They're running amuck in our city. This
11 is our city to appreciate and love. And I get tired of
12 telling you guys every week that I'm upset about the
13 crime that's infested our city. Now, we must be more,
14 well, the parents especially, because I raised five and
15 I'm very proud of mine and they're very intelligent. But
16 the fact is, we must encourage these parents to do more
17 for their children. If they're staying at home,
18 especially, take care of what they're doing. And I'm
19 going. And do your job as a parent. I did mine. Thank
20 you.

21 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. Next speaker.

22 MS. UNERDWOOD: We're going to go into Zoom. Caller
23 with last digits 076.

24 MR. JACKSON: Hello. Could I be heard? Hello?

25 MS. JOSHUA: Your volume is really low.

1 MR. JACKSON: Can I be heard now? Hello? Hello? Can I
2 be heard now?

3 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Your volume is still too
4 low, sir.

5 MR. JACKSON: Could I be heard? Could I be heard now?
6 Hello?

7 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: No, we're still having a
8 hard time. Is it on our end by any chance?

9 MR. JACKSON: I'm trying. I'm trying.

10 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Oh, now we can hear you,
11 sir.

12 MR. JACKSON: Can you hear me now?

13 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes, we can.

14 MR. JACKSON: My name is Ramon Jackson, and I'm an
15 advocate in the City of Detroit. I'm calling because
16 there are some very concerning issues. Firstly, I caught
17 the city cheating our elected officials, which appoints
18 this board here. I'm not going to say that this board is
19 not righteous, but I'm saying that we have facts that the
20 city officials have been cheated. I'm calling about the
21 Detroit Police Department and how they are writing
22 reports with no post-education, meaning that they have no
23 education passed, high school diplomas, most of them. And
24 they're writing mental health reports, getting people
25 committed. I'm calling about, particularly, a situation

1 with Linda Little and her husband Brian Little. Officer
2 Rebecca O'Connell and Officer Ben Biddle, wrote diagnosis
3 reports. They're writing reports on people, putting these
4 reports, getting people either committed or getting
5 justice impeded with no post-education. That needs to
6 stop. The police officers in Detroit should not be
7 writing mental health reports on people, should not be
8 getting people committed to mental health hospitals, or
9 writing mental health diagnoses in reports to impede on
10 investigation. You all should look into that matter with
11 Ben Biddle, and Rebecca O'Connell. Little versus Little.
12 I don't even call about personal situations, but it's
13 very, very disruptive, and it's a very, very atrocious
14 situation going on, and it needs to stop.

15 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you. Next speaker,
16 please.

17 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Excuse me, if I may. Through
18 the Chair. Can you respond to his concerns?

19 MALE SPEAKER: [Unclear21:04].

20 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I'm sorry. I didn't hear you.

21 MALE SPEAKER: [Unclear21:08].

22 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Yeah, it was difficult to
23 understand. You need a microphone too,

24 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Through the Chair.

25 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Yes.

1 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: I think he was speaking about
2 his dissatisfaction with Detroit Police officers writing
3 up cases that are causing citizens to be committed,
4 mental health cases. He was drawing that to a lack of
5 education for certain officers and saying that they
6 aren't qualified to write these reports.

7 DC SLOAN: Through the Chair. Is that better?

8 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Yes.

9 DC SLOAN: I'm not sure if this is going to hold up,
10 but I'll do my best. So if he's referring to a petition
11 to a mental health facility, that is written due to
12 observations that an officer makes where somebody could
13 be in danger to others or danger to themselves. So if
14 that's what he's referring to, that's based on
15 observations and experience. That petition is then
16 evaluated by a mental health facility. For example, if we
17 believe that somebody could harm themselves or somebody
18 else, we would write out the petition and then that would
19 be taken to a mental health facility, a crisis center,
20 and then the evaluation would be made by a mental health
21 professional.

22 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: That mic's not on,
23 incidentally.

24 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Okay.

25 COMMISSIONER WOODS: We have a quorum.

1 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Yes, we have a quorum, and
2 I'd like to go into the meeting if that's good. Thank
3 you. Thank you so much. At this time, I'm going to call
4 the meeting to order and have the roll call and the
5 introduction of commissioners.

6 MS. GARNIER: Chairperson Dewaelsche - Present.

7 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Woods - Present.

8 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Bernard - Attorney Linda
9 Bernard. District 2, present.

10 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Banks is excused.

11 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Bell -Present. District 4.

12 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Burton is excused.

13 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Carter - Present.

14 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Moore is excused.

15 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Pressley - Here.

16 MS. GARNIER: Six present, ma'am.

17 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you. We have a quorum.
18 So I'd like to ask for a motion to approve the July 24th
19 agenda.

20 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: So, moved.

21 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Through the Chair. Well, I
22 guess that happens in discussion. I'm sorry.

23 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Okay. Is there a second?

24 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Second.

25 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Okay. It's been moved and

1 seconded. Any discussion?

2 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Yes. Through the Chair. I
3 would like to amend the agenda to move a new business
4 directly after the Chief of Police report. We have a
5 fragile quorum here, and I would like for us to be able
6 to handle the business that needs to be taken care of
7 before the quorum is no longer sustainable.

8 COMMISSIONER WOODS: So moved.

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. It's been moved. Is
10 there a second?

11 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Second. Well, he moved and I
12 second.

13 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: And you second it. Any
14 discussion? All those in favor indicate by saying, Aye.

15 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed? Motion carries.
17 Okay. And you said that would be right after the Chief --

18 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Chief of Police report.

19 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Chief of Police Report.

20 Okay. Thank you. Next we have approval of the minutes for
21 July 17th, 2025. Is there a motion to approve the
22 minutes?

23 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: So moved.

24 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Second.

25 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: It's been moved and

1 seconded. Is there any discussion? All those in favor
2 indicate by saying, Aye.

3 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

4 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Opposed? Motion carries. And
5 now if we could have introductions of the BOPC staff,
6 Chief of Police, et cetera. Thank you. Board Secretary,

7 MS. GARNIER: Madam Chair, registered at this time
8 are the following, Corporation Counsel, Conrad Mallett,
9 Chief Investigator Jerome Warfield, Drew Fries, Felicia
10 Tyson, Mary Barber, Candace Hayes, Artemesia Joshua and
11 Dior Mathis, Office of the Chief Investigator,
12 Supervising Investigator Elgin Murphy, DPD, HR Director
13 Katrina Patillo. For the Office of Chief of Police,
14 Deputy Chief Carrie Sloan. Our interpreters today are Ms.
15 Yakata and Dr. Stephanie Beatty. Court reporter Don
16 Handyside, Enrique Jackson for Audio Visual. And Charles
17 Henry for Media Services. Registered elected officials or
18 representatives are Marie? I'm sorry. I don't see Marie.
19 Overall. Fredia Butler, Second Precinct, Community
20 Relations President, LaDon Davis via Zoom of the Office
21 of Council member Fred Durhal. Ron Thomas, president,
22 Detroit Police Officers Association, and former Detroit
23 Police Commissioner William Davis by Zoom and Scotty
24 Bowman via Zoom. Those are all registered at this time,
25 Madam Chair.

1 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you. And at this time,
2 under the officer's report, we have a resolution honoring
3 ---

4 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Excuse me, Madam Chair.

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Yes.

6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Through the Chair, I think you
7 weren't through with public comment yet, were we?

8 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: We'll go back to it on the
9 agenda? Yeah, we'll go back. We have a couple more,
10 probably. At this time we have a resolution and I'd ask
11 Commissioner Pressley, if he would please read it.

12 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Sure. Thank you. Through the
13 Chair. Resolution, honoring Lieutenant Ronald Lockhart.

14 WHEREAS Lieutenant Ronald Lockhart was appointed to
15 the department on January 20th, 1986. That's the year I
16 was born. After successful completion of the police
17 academy, he began his admirable career assigned to the
18 8th Precinct. He has been assigned to various commands,
19 including Internal Control, Eastern Operations, 10th
20 Precinct Training, Technical Support, Communications,
21 Operations, Internal Affairs, Northwestern District, 6th
22 Precinct, and the 11th Precinct Investigative Operations
23 Unit. He was promoted to the rank of Sergeant on July
24 6th, 1995, and to the rank of lieutenant on January 22nd,
25 1999. On March 6th, 2017, he was assigned to the 2nd

1 Precinct, which is his current assignment; and.

2 WHEREAS as an officer in his various commands, he
3 was responsible for coordinating efforts to reduce crime
4 and patrol response times. He was also accountable for
5 increasing positive relations with the city's communities
6 and business stakeholders where he served; and

7 WHEREAS during his career, Lieutenant Lockhart was
8 the recipient of several meritorious awards,
9 commendations, citations, and letters of appreciation
10 from citizens of Detroit. He received the All-Star Game
11 Award, Rosa Parks Award, Super Bowl Award, Confinement
12 Judgment Award, Ford Fireworks Award, and the conclusion
13 of Consent Judgment Award; and

14 WHEREAS he served the Detroit Police Department and
15 the citizens of the City of Detroit with loyalty,
16 professionalism, integrity, and dedication. He is highly
17 respected throughout the law enforcement community.
18 Through his sharing of procedural knowledge, skills, and
19 techniques, he has contributed to the development of many
20 officers.

21 NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED.

22 That the Detroit Board of Police Commissioners,
23 speaking on behalf of the citizens of the great City of
24 Detroit, recognizes and honors the lifelong contributions
25 and commitment to excellence and public service of

1 Lieutenant Ronald Lockhart. His display of unwavering
2 community spirit has improved the quality of life for the
3 citizens of Detroit. We thank and congratulate you. I
4 move that this resolution be adopted to our archives.

5 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Second.

6 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: It's been moved and
7 seconded. Is there any discussion?

8 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Yep. Have we looked at the
9 background of this person? Have you gotten that
10 information to us?

11 MS. GARNIER: The incoming communication from the
12 Chief's Office included a number of commendations and
13 recommendations by the Chief. As far as the background,
14 it's my understanding that ---

15 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Excuse me, excuse me. Listen,
16 clearly. Have we looked at the background in terms of
17 have, we gone to the Office of the Chief Investigator to
18 see what the background is. You know we have given
19 commendation and have to retract some of them. And if he
20 has a good background. It's good. I'm good. You know what
21 I'm saying? So have we done that?

22 MS. GARNIER: Madam Chair? I see the commissioner. Am
23 I to respond or ---

24 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Through the Chair?

25 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Yes.

1 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Absolutely.

2 MS. GARNIER: Through the Chair. Therefore, the
3 procedure has not been to send to the Office of the Chief
4 Investigator. This is a recommendation by the Chief of
5 Police. I reached out to the Chair who approved this to
6 be placed on the agenda. If the process is to be
7 corrected, as always, I will follow the edict, the
8 guidance and advice of the board to check.

9 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Excuse me. It's always been the
10 practice since I've been the chair, to make sure that we
11 check the background. Ever since I've been the chair,
12 that was my practice as the chair, when those come on the
13 agenda that we make sure we look at the background
14 because we don't want any embarrassment on the board. You
15 know what I'm saying? But if the Chair is comfortable
16 with it, then it's not a problem.

17 MS. GARNIER: If I may.

18 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Yes.

19 MS. GARNIER: Madam Chair.

20 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Go ahead.

21 MS. GARNIER: Therefore, it has been my occasion
22 since taking this assignment in this role. On one
23 occasion there was an inquiry and it was done, and a
24 resolution was pulled. It was not processed, or our
25 procedure within the BOPC Office to send recommendations

1 for commendations. Because as I was handed off the
2 information by my immediate predecessor, Mr. Brown who
3 would also compose and draft most of the resolutions was
4 that it was thoroughly vetted by the Chief's Office. So
5 again, if it is the wish of this board to add that to the
6 process prior to presenting upon receipt from the Chief's
7 Office, I will follow. But that has been the procedure I
8 was handed off and given to me, and we followed to this
9 point.

10 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Go ahead, commissioner.

11 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Well, I'll defer until after
12 Commissioner Bell speaks.

13 COMMISSIONER BELL: I don't think it's the board. All
14 my years of serving on the board for 12 years. That is
15 not an issue. We go by the Chief's recommendation. This
16 is retirement in this room. And we give a whole lot of
17 resolution to different individuals in this community. I
18 have a whole lot of concern, but we don't challenge that.
19 We let it stand.

20 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Well, that's totally different.
21 Like you said, we have pulled it, through the Chair. And
22 I'm just saying that's what we are doing. You know what
23 I'm saying? It's as simple as that.

24 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: So it's my understanding.

25 One second, one second, one second. It's my understanding

1 that you just got this recommendation yesterday, or when
2 did you get it?

3 MS. GARNIER: I was contacted today by the Chief of
4 Staff, on behalf of the Chief of Police. And there were a
5 number of commendations regarding this particular
6 officer. I mean, some of the highest honors that I hadn't
7 seen on some of the others, if I may add that. And upon
8 that, because the retirement is upcoming, I was asked to
9 reach out to you, Madam Chair, as I did and followed it.
10 And that's why you approved placing it on the agenda,
11 because I don't just put it on the agenda. And it's my
12 understanding that everything was fully ---

13 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Madam Chair ---

14 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: One second.

15 COMMISSIONER WOODS: the second time I asked you to
16 call the question.

17 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. One second. So, moving
18 forward, we will discuss getting those recommendations
19 for resolutions sooner so that we can do some kind of
20 vetting on our end. But I would just say that's moving
21 forward.

22 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Madam Chair.

23 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Go ahead.

24 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: If I may.

25 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Wait. I'm sorry. Oh, yeah,

1 you, I'm sorry. Let the Commissioner speak.

2 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Madam Chair. This is a person
3 who's retiring, as I understand it. We have never ever
4 gone back through someone's record who retired after,
5 what is this, from 1986 to 2025. Somebody can do the math
6 probably quicker than I can, and looked into what they
7 did. This man is retiring. He's provided services to the
8 City of Detroit and to this department. And he has
9 obviously done a good enough job to stay here for 30
10 something years. So, I'm just saying, this is highly
11 irregular. We do not, we have never, ever, ever even when
12 I was a lawyer for the board, ever looked into the
13 background of a retiree

14 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Corporation Counsel.

15 COUNSEL MALLET: Madam Chairperson, I would only
16 suggest that the board act by resolution. If this is
17 going to be the process that the board wants to follow,
18 we make a motion to second it and vote. And then the
19 secretary will follow it. And this will be behind us.

20 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: You know, I would be
21 inclined to agree with Commissioner Bernard, that if it's
22 a retirement that's different than a promotion or any
23 other kind of a resolution. So I agree. I don't think
24 that there needs to be any vetting on our end if it's a
25 retirement.

1 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you.

2 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Through the Chair. But he said
3 we vote by resolution, that'll be by the majority vote.
4 You know, the fact of the matter is that you want to be
5 careful in terms of what you put your name on. But we
6 won't belabor the moment. And we can vote, now, whatever,
7 you know. But I would be inclined to say that you have to
8 do your vetting and do your due diligence.

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. The motion has been
10 made. It's seconded. And our discussion is, I'm calling
11 for the question. All in favor indicate by saying, Aye.

12 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

13 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed?

14 COMMISSIONER WOODS: No.

15 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: The motion carries. Thank
16 you.

17 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Madam Chair, I can make
18 another motion in response to what was just said. When
19 the Chief gives us resolutions honoring officers who have
20 served the department and who are retiring, it is not
21 required for the commission to vet that decision any
22 further. A 25-year, 30 year, whatever it is, retirement
23 is a retirement. And the officer deserves the
24 recognition.

25 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Commissioner.

1 COMMISSIONER BELL: It's unfortunate.

2 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: That's a motion.

3 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Are you making a motion? Go
4 ahead.

5 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Yeah, I made the motion. Will
6 you second the motion?

7 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Okay. The motion has been
8 made and seconded. Any discussion?

9 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair. It's unfortunate. At
10 this particular time and this resolution ---

11 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Can you speak into the mic,
12 please?

13 COMMISSIONER BELL: It's unfortunate that this
14 resolution has been passed and voted on and we bring
15 something up of this nature. It's totally inappropriate.
16 It's just really, as a retiree of this department and I
17 understand the process. Some of you understand the
18 process. They earned this. So we are not going to
19 challenge the Chief of Police and go through a process,
20 in my opinion. Thank you.

21 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Through the Chair.

22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Go ahead.

23 COMMISSIONER WOODS: It's all about doing our job.
24 I'm not challenging the Chief or questioning the Chief.
25 This is the Board of Police Commissioners. We need to do

1 our job, and we need to vet stuff. And so I won't belabor
2 the moment though.

3 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Motion has been made and
4 seconded. All those in favor, indicate by saying ---

5 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: That discussion continues.

6 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ:

7 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Go ahead, commissioner.

8 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: I'm unclear. So we are saying
9 that this happens as a result of the Chief's
10 recommendation. Are there other commendations that the
11 Chief actually provides to the retiring officer?

12 MS. GARNIER: In this particular one, there are other
13 commendations that the Chief will be restoring on this
14 officer. I'm not sure what happened administratively as
15 it was explained to me today. And as you know,
16 administratively, sometimes things get a little delayed,
17 because they go through a number of signatures. And so
18 when I was asked, I did due diligence to reach out to the
19 Chair as was requested. But yes, there are other
20 commendations and I can send that to the board members if
21 they would like to have.

22 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: I don't know if my question
23 was clear. So I'm clear on the commendations, because
24 some of those are listed here. It was my understanding
25 that the Chief would make us aware of people who are

1 retiring and it's the board's prerogative on whether or
2 not we choose to honor that individual or not. I just
3 wasn't clear that the Chief is telling --- well, not
4 telling us, but basically [crosstalk]. Okay. So if the
5 Chief is making a recommendation and we make a resolution
6 according to that Chief's recommendation.

7 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Correct.

8 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Okay. So yeah.

9 MS. GARNIER: And request for resolution. Yes, sir.

10 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Okay. Thank you for that
11 clarification.

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. A motion is on the
13 floor. It's been made and seconded. All those in favor
14 indicate by saying, Aye.

15 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed?

17 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Opposed? No.

18 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: No.

19 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: I think the motion carries.
20 Thank you. Now we're going to the Chief of Police report.

21 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Through the Chair.

22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes please, sir.

23 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Can you restate the motion?
24 What was the motion to carry?

25 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Linda.

1 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: To approve the resolution?

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Your motion was not to have
3 to vet.

4 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Be it resolved that the
5 Detroit Board of Police Commissioners, speaking on behalf
6 of the citizens recognizes ---

7 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: The motion that you just
8 made was not to have vet recommendations by the Chief of
9 Police for those who have retired.

10 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Related to retirement.
11 Absolutely not.

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: That was the motion.

13 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: It's not an industry. You get
14 your gold watch. Nobody objects after you've given years
15 of your life to service.

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay, the motion carries.
17 Alright. Next, the Chief of Police report. Thank you. DC?

18 DC SLOAN: Good afternoon. Can you hear me okay?

19 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes.

20 DC SLOAN: Okay. I'll try to be as loud as I can.
21 Through the Chair. First of all, thank you for allowing
22 me to be here today.

23 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: We're not able to hear.

24 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: We can't hear you.

25 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Maybe that one.

1 DC SLOAN: Alright, hold it. How's that? Okay. We'll
2 try that again. Thank you very much for allowing me to be
3 here today to represent the department and the Chief of
4 Police. So our crime numbers are heading in the right
5 direction. We keep continuing our strategy and working
6 toward decreasing ---

7 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: I'm sorry. Excuse me. We're
8 having a little bit of difficulty hearing, so please,
9 let's give the DC our attention.

10 DC SLOAN: Again, the crime numbers continue to go in
11 the right direction. We're still working our strategy to
12 continue those decreases, but today I'm happy to report
13 that our total part one violent crime is down 8%.
14 Homicides are down 19%. Non-Fatal shootings are down 33%.
15 Robberies are down 13 and carjackings are down 31%. So
16 we're proud of those numbers, but we're going to continue
17 to work to decrease crime numbers further,

18 Some community updates. Last week, our neighborhood
19 police officers from Chiefs Neighborhood liaison
20 patrolled the 12th Precinct. Officers addressed light in
21 the area, abandoned vehicles, parking violations, and
22 conducted project green light business checks and stopped
23 by community barbecues. On Monday, July 24th, 2025, the
24 Chief of Police and members of the executive team
25 appeared before City Council to speak about increasing

1 the fine for parental responsibility for curfew
2 violators. This proposal was announced in a press
3 conference with Mayor Duggan earlier this month. Since
4 then, we have seen a decrease in teen violence and we
5 want to thank the community and all of our partners for
6 addressing the issues of teen violence. This remains our
7 top priority in the department. Walk-a-mile Wednesday
8 occurred on Wednesday, July 23rd. That was yesterday.
9 Along with the Detroit Police Department and citizens
10 through the 8th Precinct Residents were able to speak to
11 the Chief regarding issues in their neighborhood. So stay
12 tuned to our department's social media pages for Walk-a-
13 Mile Wednesday, next time. A promotional ceremony will be
14 held on Friday, July 25th at 6:00 PM at Greater Grace
15 Temple, located at 23,500 West 7 Mile in Detroit. The
16 department will hold a promotional and appointment
17 ceremony for 15 members, which the Board of Police
18 Commissioners have approved. This is a great way to
19 recognize and celebrate these members as they take the
20 next step in their careers.

21 On Saturday, July 19th, 2025, the department's
22 recruiting unit held a one day hiring event at the
23 training center located at 6050 Linwood in Detroit. 402
24 people attended the event and 352 of those were applying
25 for police officer positions. We want to thank everybody

1 that attended; our recruiting unit and everyone who
2 worked to make this a successful event. And we want to
3 remind everybody that we are still hiring and anyone that
4 is interested in applying to the police department can
5 visit joindetroitsfinest.org. And that is for both
6 professional staff and sworn officers. Okay. All right.
7 That concludes this report.

8 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Thank you. Are there any
9 questions for the Chief? Go ahead, commissioner.

10 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you, Madam Chair. One of the
11 individuals who is leaving the department who, as I
12 understand it, it says that they have resigned. They're a
13 student in the academy, quote, "No family support." What
14 can we do about that, or can we do anything?

15 DC SLOAN: Through the Chair.

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Yes.

17 DC SLOAN: There are a lot of resources available to
18 our student police officers. We offer a variety of aids
19 to get them through the academy, whether it be mental
20 health; it could be physical health, and sometimes there
21 are issues that are inside the home and personal issues
22 that we do try to assist on. This specific issue, I'm not
23 sure what the details are, but we do have employee aid
24 that somebody could go to for situations where they
25 needed aid with childcare or possibly homelessness. So

1 there are a lot of services available through the
2 department.

3 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Could you check on that if you
4 don't mind?

5 DC SLOAN: Absolutely.

6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: And let us know if there's
7 anything that you were able to do later. Thank you.
8 Because it looks sad to me.

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Any other questions? Thank
10 you. Commissioner, any others? Yes. Commissioner Bell.

11 COMMISSIONER BELL: My understanding, Deputy Chief,
12 that homicide rate is down nationally. Is that accurate?

13 DC SLOAN: Yes, it is, through the Chair.

14 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you.

15 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Any other questions? Thank
16 you so much for your report.

17 DC SLOAN: Thank you.

18 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: At this time we move ---

19 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I have a question.

20 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes, go ahead.

21 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I'm sorry. One of your reports
22 indicates that someone had just purchased the house and
23 found skeletal remains inside of the garage. What's that
24 about?

25 DC SLOAN: That's correct, ma'am. Through the Chair.

1 That did occur a couple of days ago. A new homeowner did
2 find skeletal remains in the garage of the home. Our
3 Homicide Unit went out and is investigating that case. So
4 there's not been a determination yet on the cause of
5 death.

6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Or who it is?

7 DC SLOAN: Correct.

8 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Okay. Thank you.

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Any other questions? Hearing
10 none, then we'll move to new business to come after the
11 Chief of Police's report. And so under new business we
12 have a Closed Session Pursuant to Section 8(a) of the
13 Open Meetings Act, MCL 15.268a. The department's request
14 for the board to consider administrative leave without
15 pay, but medical benefits for Police Officer Ahmed
16 Aljebori, Badge 249, assigned to the 12th Precinct. So is
17 there a motion to go into Closed Session?

18 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: So moved.

19 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Second.

20 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: It's been moved and
21 seconded. Any discussion? All in favor indicate by
22 saying, Aye.

23 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

24 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed? Okay, we're going
25 into Closed Session.

1 MS. GARNIER: Madam Chair?

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yes.

3 MS. GARNIER: How many minutes?

4 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Three minutes. I mean, to
5 clear the room, you're saying? Three minutes recess.

6 (Whereupon the Board Entered into Closed Session)

7 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. Secretary, can we have
8 the roll call?

9 MS. GARNIER: Chairperson Dewaelsche - Present.

10 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Woods - Present.

11 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Bernard - Present.

12 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Banks is excused.

13 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Bell - Present.

14 MS. GARNIER: Comm. I'm sorry. Commissioner. Burton
15 is excused.

16 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Carter - Present.

17 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Moore is excused.

18 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Pressley - Here.

19 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Smith is excused.

20 MS. GARNIER: You have six present, ma'am.

21 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. What is the
22 pleasure of the board?

23 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Madam Chair, I make a motion to
24 accept the Chief's recommendation to change the duty
25 status for Police Officer Ahmed Aljebori, Badge number

1 249, assigned to the 12th Precinct to administrative
2 leave without pay, but with medical benefits.

3 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: There's motion has been made
4 and seconded by whom? Commissioner Bernard.

5 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Just that, Madam Chair, I
6 don't believe, as you know,

7 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: We're having discussion.

8 COMMISSIONER BELL: We have not approved the motion
9 yet?

10 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: No. The motion was made and
11 seconded.

12 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Yes.

13 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Discussion. Okay.

14 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I think it's an oxymoron to
15 say that taking someone's salary and benefits is not
16 punishment. It is clearly punishment. It would be a
17 punishment for any one of us in this room. And it
18 affects, as I've said, I don't know if you've heard me
19 before, it doesn't just affect that person. It affects
20 children, wives, et cetera. And it affects their long-
21 term ability to function in society, because it affects
22 your credit rating, your income, your house payment, your
23 car payment, et cetera. I don't believe that
24 circumstances that are draconian are warranted in this
25 case. Everyone has an opinion, of course, on facts as

1 they develop, as I would of course. And everyone's
2 opinion is always 20/20. After an event, your hindsight
3 is always 20/20. Well, you could do this, you could do
4 that. You couldn't do anything. But at the time, I think
5 in every circumstance, Madam Chair, we have to look at
6 the facts in the eyes of the person who was involved and
7 what their perception was; of what their danger was. So
8 that's just my comment. So I would be opposed to the
9 recommendation that has been made by the Chief.

10 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Is there any further
11 discussion? Hearing none, all those in favor of the
12 motion, indicate by saying, Aye.

13 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

14 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Opposed?

15 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Two-thirds.

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: We have to have a roll call.

17 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Woods - Yes.

18 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Commissioner Bernard - No.

19 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Bell - Yes.

20 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Carter - Yes.

21 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Pressley - Yes.

22 MS. GARNIER: Commissioner Dewaelsche - Yes. The
23 motion carries. Thank you. And at this time we're going
24 to move back to oral communications. Oral communication.
25 Do we have some people? Okay.

1 MS. JOSHUA: We have five more in the room.

2 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Go ahead.

3 MS. JOSHUA: First person, Adam Barrett.

4 MR. BARRETT: Adam Barrett, I live in District 6.

5 It's become obvious to those of us who monitor and
6 document the activities of ICE.

7 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Please speak up.

8 MR. BARRETT: Can you hear me okay?

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Yeah. Could you speak a
10 little bit more into the microphone?

11 MR. BARRETT: Yeah, thanks. It's become obvious to
12 those of us who monitor and document the activities of
13 ICE that they or their civilian contractor PALS have been
14 using multiple license plates on the unmarked vehicles
15 that they use to infiltrate our neighborhoods in their
16 attempts to snatch up suspecting people off of our
17 streets. They started doing this probably to thwart our
18 efforts to identify and track them. Clearly, license
19 plate swopping is not legal in Detroit or anywhere else,
20 for obvious reasons. Since there's been some pushback
21 against citizens calling for the police department to
22 have less involvement with ICE activities, maybe we can
23 at least ask the police to do something to make sure that
24 ICE is at bare minimum, adhering to the most basic laws.
25 This is like kidnapper behavior, right? So I don't think

1 we should allow government agents to do it or government
2 contractors to do it if we don't let the general public
3 do it. So that's my ask. Thanks.

4 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. DC, I'm curious
5 is that something that is allowed?

6 DC SLOAN: Through the Chair. I'm not aware that this
7 is something that they're using as a practice. But it
8 depends on a lot of factors. So I would need more
9 information to understand the use of the vehicle.
10 Sometimes there are exceptions to rules due to different
11 types of use of the vehicle. So I would just need more
12 information to understand.

13 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Madam Chair.

14 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Go ahead.

15 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Can I clarify what that
16 response was to? I don't know. I understand your request
17 as well. Were you saying is it allowed for ICE to be
18 changing license plates, or is it allowed for DPD to

19 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Allow that?

20 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Okay. Yes.

21 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: To happen.

22 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: So, which one?

23 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: And not do anything about
24 it?

25 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Okay. So for that point, does

1 DPD have any authority to monitor ICE if they are indeed
2 changing license plates?

3 DC SLOAN: Through the Chair. Authority? While we
4 would enforce the general rules of civil infraction on
5 the roads of the City of Detroit; there are exceptions to
6 uses of vehicles that we would not enforce on. But it's
7 not something that I'm aware that we're currently
8 tracking.

9 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Thank you.

10 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you. That makes it
11 clear. Thank you, sir. Any other speakers?

12 MS. JOSHUA: Next speaker, Elena Herrada.

13 MS. HERRADA: Thank you. I appreciate the
14 commissioner pronouncing my name. She can give you some
15 lessons. I want to just raise a couple of things here.
16 One of them is on July 3rd, Detroit Police entered Prince
17 Valley Market on Michigan Avenue and arrested two women
18 and took them out and handed them over to ICE. These
19 arrests were captured on social media, but also one of
20 the women was an older woman who is diabetic, and the
21 other one was a young woman with small children, and both
22 of them have already been deported. This was the Detroit
23 Police entering the store and bringing out the two women.
24 That's on July the third. I just wanted to raise that.
25 The second question that I have is what's happening to

1 the cars? Because when people are detained, particularly
2 if they don't have a driver's license, because as you
3 know, undocumented persons cannot get a driver's license,
4 thus cannot get a car in their name. What happens to the
5 cars? Who got that towing contract? I was just wondering
6 what happens to those who have been detained and there
7 have been many. Do we know what happens to their cars?
8 Thank you.

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Okay, I'll refer that to DC.

10 DC SLOAN: Through the Chair. Yes ma'am. So there are
11 procedures that are in place for any vehicle that is
12 impounded due to a person being arrested, it can be towed
13 by a private tower or by a Detroit police tow, authorized
14 tow. Those vehicles are taken to our tow lots and there
15 is a process and a procedure in place to have that
16 vehicle released. So it would depend on the situation.

17 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Okay.

18 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I have a question. If you are
19 arresting someone, that means that they can't take their
20 vehicle. That is supposed to be a police tow. It's not
21 supposed to be a private tow.

22 DC SLOAN: Yeah, I apologize ma'am. Through the
23 Chair. I meant to say Detroit police [crosstalk]. I
24 apologize for that.

25 MS. HERRADA: I want to actually add something else.

1 The person who has been detained does not have the title
2 in their name. Someone else has the title for that car.
3 They may not have a key, and they may not know what
4 happened to them. And the person who was arrested doesn't
5 have any way to communicate that to the person who owns
6 the car. Thus the impound fee is building and they have
7 lost a piece of valuable property that has been seized.

8 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Through the Chair.

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Commissioner Bernard, and
10 then Commissioner Woods.

11 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: The Detroit Police Department
12 only has two tow yards. They keep an extensive record, if
13 you will, on every vehicle that is towed, as they're
14 legally required to do. And if a vehicle is missing and
15 Detroit towed it, it is going to be in one of those two
16 yards and then that person, whoever wants to claim it,
17 has to provide whatever information the state requires
18 you to have in order to claim a vehicle that's in a tow
19 yard, a certificate of title, anything like that, or
20 registration.

21 MS. HERRADA: Thank you.

22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Commissioner Woods.

23 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Through my understanding, you
24 can verify this with the Attorney General's Office
25 because they put something out as it relates to that and

1 they came and presented it before the Board of Police
2 Commission several weeks ago. My understanding is, and
3 correct me if I'm wrong, DC that once a car is taken in
4 they have to make contact with folks, and that's by law.
5 And so can you explain that process?

6 DC SLOAN: Yes, sir. Through the Chair. So efforts
7 are required to be made in order to contact the
8 registered owner of that vehicle, or even the titled
9 owner. Once efforts are made and if somebody comes
10 forward and there's some type of hardships, there are
11 processes that are in place to allow for waivers of fees
12 for tow and storage.

13 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHKE: Commissioner Pressley.

14 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Thank you. Through the Chair.
15 I think we're burying the lead here. Are we aware of this
16 incident, the fact that DPD officers retrieved
17 individuals and then turned them over to ICE?

18 DC SLOAN: Through the Chair. That's not a particular
19 incident that I have knowledge about. I will have to
20 check into that. But as the department stands, we do not
21 enforce immigration. So there would be some more
22 information that I would need to be able to better answer
23 that.

24 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: Thank you. And to the public
25 citizen, is there a way that you can forward whatever

1 video you said captured that, so we can ---

2 MS. HERRADA: I will.

3 COMMISSIONER PRESSLEY: I will follow up on that.

4 Thank you.

5 MS. HERRADA: Thank you. Oh, we do have it. Okay. So
6 we can send it to the chief investigator's office so we
7 can look into that.

8 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Okay. Thank you, Ms.
9 Herrada.

10 MS. HERRADA: Thank you. I appreciate it. We know how
11 dangerous mothers and diabetic grandmothers can be. Thank
12 you. I appreciate it. Thank you.

13 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Okay. Next speaker.

14 MS. JOSHUA: Next speaker, Glenda Magatney.

15 MS. MAGATNEY: Good afternoon. My name is Glenda
16 Magatney and I just want to provide some information.
17 Earlier there was a caller, and I'm sure they're probably
18 not on the line, but this had to do with mental illness
19 and officers who are writing up these reports. There
20 needs to be proper training. In my neighborhood, 5 years
21 ago, we had a neighbor who was being harassed. And this
22 happened for more than three and a half years. And
23 finally, this year, well, that particular neighbor who
24 was harassing him went to jail. And then the judge told
25 him when he got out two months later, you are not to

1 cross the street to harass this other neighbor. And it
2 had to do with a racial issue. And now my fantastic
3 neighbor who had been there for 5 years, finally moved
4 out about a week ago because of this continual
5 harassment. Officers need to know, there is a Detroit
6 Police Department Crisis Intervention Team, and they are
7 who people need to contact. The number is (313) 267-2047.
8 That's the Detroit Police Department Crisis Intervention
9 Team. (313) 267- 02047. I got this information in October
10 of last year. We needed it when the first incident
11 happened and we did not get it. And so this progressed to
12 almost 5 years. Thank you.

13 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Thank you, ma'am. Next
14 speaker.

15 MS. JOSHUA: Victoria. Camille.

16 MS. CAMILLE: Good afternoon board.

17 CHAIRPERSON DEWAEELSCHÉ: Good afternoon.

18 MS. CAMILLE: Victoria Camille, District 7. A couple
19 items for you today. So the first one is just to follow
20 up on the resolution that the board passed on June 26th
21 regarding DPD not cooperating with ICE. The appropriate
22 process is, after a resolution is approved for the staff
23 to then update that resolution at the bottom indicating
24 that the Board of Police Commissioners approve the
25 resolution and on what date. And then that needs to be

1 published for the public so that it is complete for the
2 record. So if we could make sure that that occurs, that
3 would be wonderful. The other thing is that I would like
4 to remind the board that you answer to the residents, not
5 the Chief of Police, even when we have a good one. And I
6 would ask the board to actually reconsider if you should
7 be doing resolutions for members of the department at
8 all.

9 And then if you do, to really set some thoughtful
10 criteria for which types of members you would want to
11 elevate, and recognize, such as those who are supporting
12 transparency and accountability, like those who are
13 adhering to a duty to intervene. It might be a good piece
14 of criteria to recognize members of the department who
15 are doing that. And then the last thing I would like to
16 remind you, I brought this up last week. In October,
17 2023, a member of the public was shot by an officer
18 responding to a drag racing event, which I do just want
19 to say that drag racing should not be occurring, and
20 those are very dangerous situations. However, a judge has
21 now seen the body-worn camera footage two years later and
22 characterized it as officers acting like cowboys, looking
23 for an excuse to pull their guns. And officers, even in
24 the most stressful situations, should be adhering to
25 policy. And the public needs to understand what occurred

1 in that situation. We need to see the full body-worn
2 camera footage and understand if there was policy broken
3 or anything illegal that occurred from the officers, why
4 that was not addressed. Thank you.

5 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. Thank you ma'am.
6 Next speaker.

7 MS. JOSHUA: Reign.

8 MS. REIGN: How are you doing today? How are you
9 doing today? How are you doing today?

10 MALE SPEAKER: Good.

11 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Good. Thank you.

12 MS. REIGN: Okay. I had a stroke and now I have
13 aphasia, so it'll take time. I'm so sorry.

14 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: If you could just speak a
15 little closer to the speaker, please?

16 MS. REIGN: Okay. My dad raped me. He raped me and
17 the police did nothing, period. Then they took my house,
18 my dad's house. They took my mama's house, right? And my
19 grandma's house. And now they're trying to take my house.
20 Then, because I have a disability, I can't speak. It's
21 hard. Before that I was a speaker. I'm a minister. I
22 can't do it anymore because the doctor didn't do the job.
23 They gave me money. Where is that money? I don't know. I
24 need you to find out. I can't speak now. So I need that
25 money. I had two lawyers. They took my money. Thank you.

1 So there has to be due process. I don't have that. I'm
2 not sure why because it's hard for me to speak. That's
3 why. I don't know. I really don't know.

4 But I need you to find out. I had two lawyers and
5 they took all my money. I had real estate, okay? My mom
6 and my dad had a house. My grandma had a house in
7 Detroit, I'm sorry, Chicago. I had a house, where is it?
8 My dad and I had stocks. So we took the rent, right? And
9 so we say we are going to grow that rent. Excuse me,
10 where is that money? He died three years ago. So I had 1,
11 2, 3, 4 lawyers to do this. I'm not sure, but I need you
12 to find out. Thank you.

13 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Okay. Ma'am, is this
14 something that you've reported already to the police
15 department?

16 MS. REIGN: Yes. Well, when my dad raped me, I called
17 the police. Before that I said, you made me sick. So we
18 went to the doctor and the doctor did nothing. I mean,
19 they say, oh, he didn't do this. The doctor didn't know.
20 The doctor did not know. And no, no, no, no. Then I said,
21 Hmm.

22 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Ma'am, we're going to try to
23 see if we can get DC to have someone speak with you and
24 follow up on these complaints that you've filed.

25 MS. REIGN: Thank you so much.

1 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Okay. Right here, the
2 officer's going to speak with you. Thank you. Next
3 speaker.

4 MS. JOSHUA: We are going to go into Zoom. Mr.
5 William Davis.

6 MR. DAVIS: Good afternoon. Can I be heard?

7 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Yes, you can.

8 MR. DAVIS: Okay. I think that perhaps you all should
9 think about having a social worker at some of you all
10 meetings. Also, I think that there's an ongoing problem
11 and that I keep getting reports all over the city about
12 officers. There might be two officers that might stop a
13 young black person in a newer vehicle. And as soon as
14 they stop them, have them get out of the vehicle and they
15 handcuff them. You know, at one time, police weren't so
16 quick to always handcuff, especially a young person.
17 Sometimes they might tell you, go sit on the curb or what
18 have you, and try to check things out or whatever. You
19 know, it seems like there's a greater tendency now to
20 handcuff young black people or maybe brown people too.
21 But I know, especially young black people. I get reports
22 all over the city.

23 And also, I still get reports about police officers,
24 like bum rushing young people coming out of the gas
25 stations and party stores and looking for guns. I think

1 that it's a very sad time if officers think just because
2 somebody's black or young that they have to have a gun
3 on. I think it's a sad time if we allow stuff like this
4 to continue, especially in so much as a lot of our police
5 officers do not live in the city and are not as familiar
6 with our people. Sometimes I think that could create a
7 problem. Also, I think I need to do something to help to
8 encourage more board of police commissioners to actually
9 show up and attend the meetings. You all really need to
10 explore options. Thank you.

11 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHKE: Thank you, commissioner.
12 Next speaker.

13 MS. JOSHUA: Taura Brown.

14 MS. BROWN: Good evening commissioners. This has been
15 a pretty interesting meeting. I'm sitting here just
16 listening to some of the stuff that was addressed.
17 Imagine being a black woman and coming to a BOPC meeting
18 and announcing you're a Republican to cry about how the
19 police are storming and raiding your house. Isn't that
20 what you voted for? The other thing is, I want to salute
21 Woods for finally stepping it up and challenging. Because
22 yeah, before you all were rubber stamping these
23 resolutions from the chief of police. You all certainly
24 should be vetting these officers, whether they're
25 retiring or not. Everybody should retire. You don't get

1 an award at the end every time. And maybe that's the case
2 in some of these resolutions. I'm not saying that the
3 officer today that was recognized doesn't deserve one.
4 But I'm sure in the past there have been some that should
5 have been checked that were not.

6 And the other thing I wanted to raise, Ms. Williams
7 has been coming here for a year talking about police and
8 shelters. I'm on the board of the COC and I don't know
9 and can't confirm that she's not telling the truth. I
10 don't know if she is or not, but I think that's something
11 that should be looked in. And the reason that I'm raising
12 this, and it all ties in together, is because some of you
13 back in February, were standing up here in this very same
14 room with the mayor talking about Tatiana Williams, not
15 the same as Williams in the audience and about how her
16 children died and how things were going to get better
17 with the seven-point plan. And one of the reporters with
18 the Associated Press Ed White made reference to a shelter
19 that was deplorable. And again, I can't say it enough,
20 the mayor called it nonsense. And it absolutely was not
21 nonsense. But part of that vetting process, and maybe Mr.
22 Woods, you should look into it too. You were right there
23 with the mayor and you walked through the house with a
24 person whose background you should have been vetting.
25 Yes, look, your gift horses in the mouth because people

1 giving away houses and stuff usually have ulterior
2 motives. And you all should have checked into that and
3 vetted that person as well. Thank you. Have a good night.

4 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you. Next speaker.

5 MS. JOSHUA: The last caller is listed as Mr.
6 Overwith.

7 MR. OVERWITH: Can you hear me clearly?

8 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Yes.

9 MR. OVERWITH: Conrad Mallett Jr., now, Darryl Woods
10 is sitting up there as the vice chair on the Board of
11 Police Commissioners. But the board voted when he was the
12 Chairperson to subpoena the first time. They voted twice
13 to subpoena from the Detroit Police Department the
14 Michigan State Police report of their investigation into
15 DPD case 20-112, on a Thursday evening. But on a Friday
16 morning, Darryl Woods went into the Board of Police
17 Commissioner's Office and instructed the acting secretary
18 then to not start the subpoena process. That was the
19 first time, and instead sent an official letter to the
20 Michigan State Police because he had been talking to some
21 people over at the Michigan State Police. And they would
22 furnish the report. Well, they did. They furnished a
23 redacted version. So again, the board voted, but this
24 time to subpoena the unredacted version. It passed, and
25 there's been no unredacted version presented to the

1 board, to the best of my knowledge. Now, Conrad Mallett,
2 Kaneisha Coleman did not shoot herself. DPD case 20-112.
3 And there are three leading forensic experts throughout
4 the United States of America that agree the angle and
5 trajectory that bullet traveled, no gun stippling on the
6 entry wound and other matters conclusively demonstrate
7 Kaneisha didn't shoot herself. And I'm told by the DPD
8 Homicide Unit who the killer was. Now, I have some stuff
9 to talk about and I'm going to do it this weekend. I'm
10 outside. back, outside.

11 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. Next speaker.

12 MS. JOSHUA: It's all done.

13 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: That's the final one? Thank
14 you. Is there a presentation to the board? Secretary.

15 MS. GARNIER: No, ma'am.

16 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHE: Okay. Next is the report
17 from the board secretary.

18 MS. GARNIER: The report today, Madam Chair, are the
19 upcoming meetings. Also, the announcement in your binders
20 today. Once again, is the memorandum from a personnel and
21 training committee that was held yesterday. The job
22 announcement for the vacancies within the BOPC together
23 with a copy of the flyer are there for your sharing and
24 for your convenience. Also, the upcoming meetings are as
25 printed. And next week's Towing Committee meeting is next

1 Wednesday, 4:00 PM here at Detroit Public Safety
2 Headquarters in the Woodward Room. And that would be the
3 end of the report for today.

4 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you Madam Secretary.
5 Is there any unfinished business? Hearing none, what's
6 the pleasure of the board?

7 COMMISSIONER WOODS: Motion to adjourn.

8 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Second.

9 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: It's been moved and
10 seconded. All those in favor indicate by saying, Aye.

11 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

12 CHAIRPERSON DEWAELSCHÉ: Opposed? Thank you. This
13 meeting is adjourned. Thank you for your attendance.
